

OWNER

Mary Rockett Brock joined the Atlanta Dream's ownership group in January 2011 and is an avid sports advocate. Brock serves on the Board of Trustees of Usher's New Look Foundation and Spelman College, the Board of Directors of the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra, Metro Atlanta Chamber and Horizons National, a program for underserved youth that focuses on the learning achievement gap with 36 affiliates across the country, and the Board of Advisors of the Winship Cancer Institute. Mary and her husband John have funded chairs in biomedical engineering at Emory University and Georgia Institute of Technology with a particular emphasis on cancer research. They support scholarships in the Department of Chemical Engineering and have been active supporters of Georgia Tech Athletics, where they funded the major leadership gift for the Georgia Tech "John and Mary Brock Football Facility." A native of Moss Point, MS, Mary graduated summa cum laude from Miami University of Ohio, earning her Bachelor of Science in Science and Math Education and her Masters of Science Education in Curriculum Development. The Brocks, who grew up together on the Mississippi Gulf Coast, were married 45 years ago while John was a student at Georgia Tech, and moved to Atlanta eight years ago. Previously, they lived in Wilton, CT, and Cincinnati, OH, and a 10-year stint in Europe, living in Brussels, Belgium, and London. They have three children – Rebecca, John IV and Major – and five grandchildren – John V, Everett Mary, Leighton Annise, Lily Anise and Alexis Noelle.



HELLY LOEFFLER

OWNER

Kelly Loeffler is Senior Vice President of Corporate Communications, Marketing and Investor Relations at Intercontinental Exchange, Inc. (NYSE: ICE). She is responsible for Intercontinental Exchange's investor relations program, public relations, corporate communications and media relations, global marketing including brand strategy, events and sustainability. Prior to joining ICE in 2002, Loeffler managed investor relations at Crossroads Investment Advisers, L.P., a private equity firm. She held equity research roles at William Blair & Company and Citi Global Asset Management. Loeffler began her career in the automotive industry, holding operations and marketing roles at Toyota Motor Sales, USA. Loeffler is also co-owner and co-chairman of the WNBA Atlanta Dream, the first women-owned professional sports team in Georgia. As a result of her own positive experiences gained through athletic participation, she is an advocate for combining education and sports as a way to contribute to the success of young people from the classroom to the workplace. Loeffler is a Board Trustee for the Georgia Research Alliance and a member of the Board of Grady Memorial Health Corporation, the Metropolitan Atlanta Chapter of the American Red Cross, the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra and Skyland Trail. She also serves on the Advisory Board of the Gene Siskel Film Center in Chicago. Loeffler earned a Bachelor of Science in Business Administration from the University of Illinois and an MBA at the Kellstadt Graduate School of Business at DePaul University. She is a CFA charterholder.



CHRIS SIENKO

PRESIDENT & GENERAL MANAGER

Sienko was named 2018 WNBA Basketball Executive of the Year for his work with the Dream team. The 2018 squad won a franchise-record 23 regular season games and reached the WNBA Semifinals. He was previously tabbed as a consultant for the organization, which led to the hiring of 2018 WNBA Coach of the Year Nicki Collen.

"As we enter the Atlanta Dream's twelfth season, we are proud to build on what the Dream brings to our city and in extending the basketball community with an exciting professional women's team," Brock and Loeffler said. "Not only does the Dream represent the best of basketball, but reflects the spirit of Atlanta's diverse and inclusive community. We look forward to building on the success the Dream achieved in 2018."

A former employee of the WNBA, Sienko served as the Vice President, COO and General Manager of the Connecticut Sun for 14 seasons, taking over with the Mohegan Tribe purchase of the Orlando Miracle and relocation of the team to Connecticut on January 28, 2003.

During his tenure, Connecticut became the first profitable team in WNBA history and has maintained a positive revenue flow in every year since 2007. Sienko helped orchestrate 25 trades during his tenure and the Sun advanced to the postseason eight times, reaching the Eastern Conference Finals five times and the WNBA Finals twice. He hired head coaches Mike Thibault, Anne Donovan and Curt Miller.

Sienko served on many different committees for the WNBA, including the Competition Committee, Rules and Regulations and was an Alternate Governor on the WNBA Board of Governors.

In 2013, Sienko was chosen to serve on the 2013-16 USA Basketball Women's National Team Player Selection Committee quadrennial. Sienko helped pick the 2014 USA World Championship and 2016 U.S. Olympic teams during the four-year commitment.

Prior to joining the Mohegan Sun, Sienko was an integral part in the start-up of another professional sports team, the ABL's New England Blizzard, where he served as vice president of marketing, then general manager. Most recently, Sienko was President of the Berkshire Upland Group, a sports consulting firm in Hartford, Connecticut.

Sienko is a graduate of the University of Connecticut.

 DIRECTOR OF DIGITAL MEDIA AND MARKETING

Prior to the Hawks, the Atlanta Thrashers hired Pfeifer in 1998 as the director of marketing, where he was tasked with promoting an NHL expansion franchise.

Before moving to Atlanta, Pfeifer spent nine years in New York working at Madison Square Garden in the marketing department promoting the New York Knicks and New York Rangers.

A graduate of the University of Richmond, Pfeifer lives in Johns Creek with his wife and two children.

NICKI COLLEN HEAD COACH

Nicki Collen enters her third year as the Head Coach of the Atlanta Dream in 2020.

In her first season in Atlanta, Collen led her team to a franchise-best 23-win season, finishing with a 23-11 record in the WNBA Playoff Semifinals. She was named the WNBA Coach of the Year in her first season as a head coach at any level, after earning WNBA Coach of the Month honors in both July and August.

Prior to landing her first head coaching position, she led the Connecticut Sun to many successful seasons as an assistant coach. Working for 2017 WNBA Coach of the Year Curt Miller, Collen helped the Sun compile an impressive 21-13 record and finished with the fourth-best regular season record in the WNBA, earning the franchise's first postseason appearance since 2012.

Before her position at Connecticut, Collen served as an assistant coach starting in 2014 under coach Karl Smesko at Florida Gulf Coast. She helped guide the Eagles to consecutive 30 win seasons. The 2015-16 team completed a 33-6 campaign with a trip to the WNIT Championship game, where it was edged by South Dakota. The 2014-15 Eagles were 31-3 with a 26-game winning streak and an undefeated record in the Atlantic Sun Conference. That team also made history with its first Division I national ranking and its first NCAA Tournament victory, a 75-67 win over 10th-seeded Oklahoma State.

She enjoyed great success before FGCU as an assistant coach at Arkansas, Louisville, Ball State and Colorado State. Collen was an assistant coach for nine years at the collegiate level and she helped teams reach three NCAA tournaments and five WNITs.

Collen played one year of professional basketball with the BCM Alexandros team in Greece.

As a player at Purdue, Collen was a member of Big 10 championship teams that advanced to the Final Four in 1994 and the Elite Eight in 1995. Collen transferred to Marquette as a junior, competing in two more NCAA tournaments while also securing a Bachelor of Science degree in Mechanical Engineering.

Collen and her husband Tom have three children, Connor, Reese and Logan.



MIKE PETERSEN

ASSISTANT COACH

Mike Petersen is entering his third season as the Atlanta Dream's assistant coach. Prior to landing his position with the Atlanta Dream, Petersen was a former women's basketball head coach at North Texas, Wake Forest, Gonzaga, New Mexico State and TCU and the men's basketball associate head coach at Minnesota.

At Wake Forest, Petersen won 125 games which made him the program's all-time winningest coach.

Before college coaching, he had a successful college career of his own. He began his college years at the College of the Redwoods in Eureka, California. After two seasons, he transferred to Northwest Christian College, an NAIA school in Eugene, Oregon. He was inducted into the Northwest Christian College inaugural athletics Hall of Fame in 2007.

Petersen and his wife, Patty, have two sons, Riley and Jake.



DARIUS TAYLOR

ASSISTANT COACH

Darius Taylor is entering his third year as an assistant coach for the Atlanta Dream.

Prior to his arrival in Atlanta, Taylor served as the assistant coach at South Carolina for five seasons. He coached back-to-back SEC Freshman of the Years in Alaina Coates (2013-14) and A'ja Wilson (2014-15). In his final season with the Gamecocks, the team finished the season ranked number 3 overall which was the highest final ranking in program history. That year they won their first SEC Tournament and reached the Final Four for the first time in program history.

Prior to joining the University of South Carolina staff, he was the manager of community and player programs for the NBA Developmental League (NBADL). He worked with the NBADL for two years promoting personal, professional and social development in the league's players. He devised a comprehensive program that educated players about nutritional health, money management and career development.

Before the NBADL, Taylor spent four seasons with Dawn Staley's staff at Temple, helping the Owls to consecutive Atlantic 10 Tournament titles and four NCAA Tournament appearances.

Taylor also has two years of experience with USA Basketball, serving as its assistant director of competitive programs. He started his coaching career as a team leader at the Chicago Bulls Basketball Schools while at the same time serving as an intern at the Big Ten Conference working with marketing and merchandising programs. A four-year basketball letter winner at the University of Michigan, Taylor was a Big Ten Academic All-American en route to his bachelor of arts in sport management and communications (2000).

Taylor married Joni Crenshaw in 2015 and the couple welcomed their first child, Jacie Elise, in 2016.

Prior to joining the Dream she spent 8 seasons as an Athletic Trainer at the University of Arkansas working with Women's Basketball and Women's Golf. She also spent four years (2008-2012) as an Assistant Athletic Trainer at Arkansas State University. Natalie also received degrees from Jones County Jr College 2003 (Ellisville, Ms), Valdosta State University 2006 (Valdosta, GA), (Intern at Auburn University Spring of 2006), and Troy University 2008 (Troy, AL).

Natalie is passionate about the profession of athletic training and has served on several committees state, district and national: SEC rep for the ICSM/NATA, District VI Representative for National Athletic Trainers' Association's Ethnic Diversity Advisory Committee (Southwest Athletic Trainers' Association Chair), chair of the Arkansas Athletic Trainers' Association's Ethnic Diversity Committee, as well as a member of the AATA Young Professionals and Program Committee. OCTOBER 17, 2007: WNBA COMES TO ATLANTA

WNBA President Donna Orender announces that the city of Atlanta has been awarded a WNBA franchise, becoming the 14th team in the WNBA. The team will be owned by Atlanta businessman J. Ronald Terwilliger.

NOVEMBER 28, 2007: MEADORS SELECTED AS COACH & GM

Marynell Meadors is announced as the team's first Head Coach & General Manager, her fourth stop in the WNBA. Meadors was one of the eight original head coaches in WNBA history, serving as the first head coach of the Charlotte Sting from 1997 – 1999.

JANUARY 23, 2008: THE DREAM IS OFFICIAL

The franchise unveiled its team name, logo, and colors. The team is officially named the Atlanta Dream with a sky blue and red color scheme. Fans voted for their favorite choice of four team names (Dream, Flight, Sizzle and Surge) and five color schemes (hot pink/silver/black, mint green/silver/black, sky blue/red, navy blue/gold, and green/gold).

FEBRUARY 6, 2008: BUILDING A FRANCHISE

The Dream builds its inaugural roster, choosing 13 players in the 2008 WNBA Expansion Draft. After orchestrating several trades, the Dream's roster consists of: Chantelle Anderson, Iziane Castro Marques (via trade), Erika de Souza, Katie Feenstra, Kristin Haynie, Jennifer Lacy, Ivory Latta (via trade), Betty Lennox, Yelena Leuchanka, Kristen Mann, Ann Strother, Carla Thomas, and Ann Wauters.

APRIL 3, 2008: UNIFORM UNVEILING

Dream players Katie Feenstra and Ivory Latta help officially unveil the team uniform. The home uniform is white with sky blue piping, bright red stars on the sides and the Dream logo in blue and red across the front. The away uniform is sky blue with bright red piping, white stars on the sides and the Atlanta logo in white and red across the front.

APRIL 9, 2008: DRAFT DAY

The Dream selects guard Tamera Young from James Madison University with their first draft pick (No. 8 overall) in franchise history.

APRIL 20, 2008: TRAINING CAMP

The Dream opens its inaugural training camp in Atlanta.

APRIL 30, 2008: TEAM MASCOT INTRODUCED

The Dream's official mascot, Star, is unveiled at Zoo Atlanta. The Dream held a "Name the Mascot" contest for youth. The final name selections were Dazzle, Dash, Dreamer and Star. Season ticket holders voted to select "Star" as the official mascot.

MAY 3, 2008: FIRST PRESEASON GAME

The Los Angeles Sparks defeat the Atlanta Dream, 86-80, in the first preseason game in front of 7,932 fans at Philips Arena.

MAY 17, 2008: FIRST REGULAR SEASON GAME

The Dream opens up its inaugural season on the road against the Connecticut Sun, losing 100-67.

MAY 23, 2008: HOME OPENER IS A SELLOUT

The Dream falls to the Detroit Shock, 88-76, in the home opener at Philips Arena in front of a sellout crowd of 11,609 fans.

JULY 5, 2008: FIRST VICTORY

After starting the 2008 season with 17 straight losses, the Dream earns its first victory in franchise history with a 91-84 victory over the Chicago Sky.

JULY 9, 2008: FIRST WIN ON THE ROAD

The Dream earns its first road victory in franchise history, defeating the Minnesota Lynx 73-67.

NOVEMBER 18, 2008: CAROL ROSS JOINS STAFF

Carol Ross is announced as the Dream's new assistant coach.

APRIL 9, 2009: NUMBER ONE PICK

The Dream selects forward Angel McCoughtry from the University of Louisville with the No. 1 overall pick in the 2009 WNBA Draft.

APRIL 20, 2009: HOLDSCLAW JOINS DREAM

Forward Chamique Holdsclaw officially comes out of retirement to join the Atlanta Dream. A WNBA All-Decade team honorable mention, Holdsclaw averaged 17.7 points, 8.3 rebounds and 2.6 assists per game at the time of her return.

JULY 20, 2009: FIRST ALL-STARS

Center Erika de Souza and forward Sancho Lyttle are the first Dream players in franchise history to be selected to compete in the WNBA All-Star game. Both are voted in as reserves for the Eastern Conference.

SEPTEMBER 11, 2009: PLAYOFF BOUND

The Dream clinches its first playoff berth in franchise history. The team completed the second-greatest single season turnaround in league history. Atlanta secured the No. 2 seed in the Eastern Conference.

OCTOBER 1, 2009: ROOKIE & COACH OF THE YEAR

Dream forward Angel McCoughtry is named the 2009 WNBA Rookie of the Year and Head Coach Marynell Meadors earns 2009 WNBA Coach of the Year honors.

OCTOBER 29, 2009: KATHY BETTY ANNOUNCED AS NEW OWNER

Atlanta businesswoman Kathy Betty is introduced as the new owner of the Atlanta Dream, heading the investment group Dream Too LLC.

AUGUST 14, 2010: DREAM BACK IN PLAYOFFS

The Dream clinched its second consecutive playoff berth, finishing the regular season with a 19-15 record.

SEPTEMBER 7, 2010: EASTERN CONFERENCE CHAMPIONS

The Dream completes a sweep of the New York Liberty to win the WNBA Eastern Conference Championship on their home court.

SEPTEMBER 16, 2010: DREAM FALLS IN FINALS

The Dream falls in three games to the Seattle Storm in the 2010 WNBA Finals. The three games are decided by a total of seven points.

JANUARY 18, 2011: BROCK AND LOEFFLER JOIN OWNERSHIP

The Dream announces the additions of Mary Brock and Kelly Loeffler to the team's ownership group, Dream Too LLC, forming the only all-female ownership group of a professional sports franchise in Atlanta. Kathy Betty remains the managing partner.

MAY 29, 2011- FIRST WNBA GAME IN EUROPE

The Dream faces the Great Britain National team in Manchester in the first ever WNBA game to be played in Europe.

JULY 15, 2011: MCCOUGHTRY NAMED ALL-STAR

Dream forward Angel McCoughtry is named a starter in the 2011 WNBA All-Star game.

SEPTEMBER 3, 2011: OWNERSHIP TRANSITION

Mary Brock and Kelly Loeffler become sole owners of the Atlanta Dream.

SEPTEMBER 4, 2011: BACK IN PLAYOFFS

The Dream clinches a third consecutive playoff berth and goes on to finish the season with a 20-14 record, setting the franchise win mark.

SEPTEMBER 27, 2011: BACK-TO-BACK CONFERENCE CHAMPS

The Dream clinches a second straight Eastern Conference Championship, defeating the Indiana Fever in a best of three series.

OCTOBER 4, 2011: MCCOUGHTRY EARNS ALL-WNBA HONORS

Dream forward Angel McCoughtry is selected to the 2011 All-WNBA First Team.

OCTOBER 7, 2011: DREAM FALLS IN FINALS

For a second straight season, the Dream falls in the WNBA Finals, losing to the Minnesota Lynx in three games.

JANUARY 10, 2012: CIAMPI JOINS STAFF

Joe Ciampi, a member of the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame, is announced as the Dream's new assistant coach.

JANUARY 20, 2012: MEADORS NAMED OLYMPIC ASSISTANT COACH

Dream Head Coach Marynell Meadors is named as an assistant coach for the 2012 U.S. Olympic team.

MARCH 30, 2012: MCCOUGHTRY NAMED TO OLYMPIC TEAM

Dream forward Angel McCoughtry is announced as a member of the 2012 U.S. Olympic team.

AUGUST 11, 2012: MCCOUGHTRY, MEADORS HELP TEAM USA TO GOLD MEDAL

Angel McCoughtry and Marynell Meadors help Team USA win the gold medal in London with a 36-point win over France. McCoughtry finishes the Olympics as the team's second-leading scorer.

AUGUST 27, 2012: FRED WILLIAMS NAMED HEAD COACH/GM

Fred Williams, an assistant coach since the Dream's first season, is promoted to Head Coach/General Manager.

SEPTEMBER 14, 2012: DREAM CLINCHES FOURTH CONSECUTIVE PLAYOFF BIRTH

A loss by Chicago one night after Atlanta's win over Seattle clinches the team's fourth consecutive playoff berth.

OCTOBER 1, 2012: ASHLEY PREISINGER NAMED CEO

Ashley Preisinger, a 17-year Atlanta-based business executive, is named the team's Chief Executive Officer.

FEBRUARY 25, 2013: PLANK JOINS STAFF

Julie Plank, former Washington Mystics head coach, is announced as the Dream's new assistant coach.

JULY 18 & 26, 2013: MCCOUGHTRY/DE SOUZA NAMED TO ALL-STAR TEAM

Dream forward Angel McCoughtry is named a starter on the All-Star team on July 18, and eight days later, center Erika de Souza is named to the squad as a reserve.

SEPTEMBER 4, 2013: BACK IN PLAYOFFS

The Dream clinches a fifth consecutive playoff berth with an overtime win against the Indiana Fever, and goes on to finish the season with a 17-17 record, earning the No. 2 seed in the East.

SEPTEMBER 9, 2013: ALTON BYRD NAMED CHIEF REVENUE OFFICER

Alton Byrd, a former Columbia University and British basketball league standout, is named the team's Chief Revenue Officer.

SEPTEMBER 25, 2013: MCCOUGHTRY EARNS ALL-WNBA HONORS

Dream forward Angel McCoughtry is selected to the 2013 All-WNBA Second Team.

SEPTEMBER 27, 2013: THIRD CONFERENCE CHAMPIONSHIP

The Dream claims its third Eastern Conference Championship in four seasons, sweeping the defending champion Indiana Fever in a best of three series.

OCTOBER 10, 2013: DREAM DROPPED IN FINALS

The Dream falls in the WNBA Finals, losing to the Minnesota Lynx in three games.

NOVEMBER 21, 2013: MICHAEL COOPER NAMED HEAD COACH

Michael Cooper, a former two-time WNBA champion head coach with the Los Angeles Sparks and five-time NBA champion as a player with the Los Angeles Lakers, is named the team's head coach.

Karleen Thompson, former Houston Comets head coach/GM, is announced as the Dream's new assistant coach.

JANUARY 22, 2014: TAYLOR NAMED EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT/GENERAL MANAGER

Angela Taylor, the former Vice President and General Manager of the Washington Mystics, is named the Dream's Executive Vice President and General Manager.

MARCH 4, 2014: EDWARDS ADDED TO STAFF

Five-time Olympian and Hall of Famer Teresa Edwards rounds out Michael Cooper's staff, joining the team as an assistant coach.

MAY 19, 2014: TAYLOR NAMED PRESIDENT

Four months after being named the team's Executive Vice President and General Manager, Angela Taylor is promoted to President and General Manager.

JULY 8 & 15, 2014: MCCOUGHTRY, SCHIMMEL AND DE SOUZA NAMED TO ALL-STAR TEAM

Dream forward Angel McCoughtry and guard Shoni Schimmel are named starters on the All-Star team on July 8, and one week later, center Erika de Souza is named to the squad as a reserve. They join head coach Michael Cooper and the Dream coaching staff at the All-Star Game, and de Souza is later named a starter as an injury replacement as well.

JULY 19, 2014: SCHIMMEL NAMED ALL-STAR GAME MVP

Dream rookie guard Shoni Schimmel is named MVP of the All-Star Game after scoring an All-Star record 29 points and dishing out eight assists while leading the East to a 125-124 overtime victory.

AUGUST 3, 2014: SIXTH STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS

The Dream clinches a sixth consecutive playoff berth just 26 games into the season, and goes on to finish the season with a 19-15 record, earning the No. 1 seed in the East for the first time in team history.

JUNE 2, 2015: DREAM FINALIZES ROSTER

The Dream finalized its roster on June 1, with the opening night roster of 12 players including nine players who were on the team last year, including the entire front court. Holdovers from the 2014 season include Matee Ajavon, Nadia Colhado, Erika de Souza, Tiffany Hayes, Aneika Henry, Sancho Lyttle, Angel McCoughtry, DeLisha Milton-Jones and Shoni Schimmel. The lone newcomers are veteran guard Roneeka Hodges and rookie guards Samantha Logic and Erica Wheeler.

JUNE 18, 2015: NEW FACES JOIN DREAM

The Dream added a pair of new players on June 17 following the temporary suspensions of Tiffany Hayes and Aneika Henry, who are competing in the 2015 European Games, signing fourth-year guard Sydney Carter and rookie forward Cierra Burdick. Carter has now played for four Eastern Conference teams in four years (also Chicago, Connecticut and Indiana) and her career high of 14 points came while playing against the Dream in Philips Arena last May for the Fever. Burdick was the No. 14 overall pick in the 2015 WNBA Draft by Los Angeles before being waived during camp. In her WNBA debut, Burdick scored 11 points off the bench to help the Dream defeat the Sky on June 19.

JULY 6, 2015: LOGIC DEALT

The Atlanta Dream traded rookie Samantha Logic to San Antonio in exchange for the Silver Stars' 2016 second round draft pick on July 5. Logic, a graduate of the University of Iowa, appeared in four games during her rookie season for the Dream after being selected No. 10 overall in the 2015 WNBA Draft. The 5-9 guard averaged 0.8 points and 0.5 assists while seeing 5.8 minutes of action per contest.

JULY 6, 2015: HAYES RETURNS AS SHE LEFT

Tiffany Hayes returned to action for the Dream on July 5 vs. Seattle for the first time in five games after competing in the 2015 European Games alongside teammate Aneika Henry in Baku, Azerbaijan. In the win over Seattle, Hayes recorded 12 points, which marked the sixth straight game this season she has hit double-figures. The streak ended on July 7 as Hayes finished with seven points in the home loss against Tulsa. Hayes has posted double-figure points in 21 of 26 games for which she has been active.

Carter opened at the point and recorded 12 points and four assists, while Burdick registered 12 points, four rebounds and two assists in the win. Both players joined the squad on July 17 as replacements for Tiffany Hayes and Aneika Henry, who missed five contests while competing at the 2015 European Games.

JULY 15, 2015: CHARITY STRIPE DISCREPANCY IN PHOENIX

Possibly the most telling stat from Atlanta's 80-71 setback in Phoenix (7/14) was the totals for each team from the free throw line. The Dream attempted a season-low seven attempts (making six), while the Mercury were rewarded with a total of 30 charity stripe attempts and connected on 27. Phoenix attempted an average of 4.3 free throw attempts for every one by Atlanta in the Dream loss.

JULY 26, 2015: ALL-STAR RECAP

Atlanta's Angel McCoughtry and Shoni Schimmel both started the 2015 Boost Mobile WNBA All-Star Game on July 25 at Mohegan Sun Arena in Uncasville, Conn. Schimmel, who was named MVP of last season's All-Star contest, posted 13 points and six assists, while McCoughtry tallied nine points in the East's 117-122 loss to the West.

JULY 22, 2015: ANGEL MCCOUGHTRY - SECOND FASTEST ALL-TIME TO 4,000-POINT CLUB

Angel McCoughtry became the second-fastest player in WNBA history to reach the 4,000-point milestone on July 21 at Chicago - taking just 206 games. Only Diana Taurasi reached the figure faster - needing just 197 games.

AUGUST 10, 2015: ATLANTA BACK IN THE WIN COLUMN

Atlanta's 98-90 win at Tulsa on August 9th snapped a streak of six consecutive losses - the longest losing streak in franchise history since dropping 10 consecutive games from July 18 - Sept. 8, 2008.

AUGUST 15, 2015: HODGES ON THE MEND

Roneeka Hodges left the August 14 game 1:16 into the first quarter with a left calf injury – she did not return and is been ruled out for the remainder of the season.

The Dream sent the rights to the No. 4 pick in the 2016 WNBA Draft to the Connecticut Sun in exchange for second-year forward/center Elizabeth Williams. The Duke product was the No. 4 overall pick in the 2015 WNBA Draft.

FEBRUARY 10, 2016: LISA BORDERS NAMED WNBA PRESIDENT

Lisa Borders, who brings more than 25 years of experience in operations, marketing, government relations and public service, was named WNBA President.

MARCH 2, 2016: THERESA WENZEL NAMED TEAM PRESIDENT

Theresa Wenzel, a 21-year sports-industry veteran, took over as the Atlanta Dream team president.

APRIL 14, 2016: DREAM ADDS FOUR PLAYERS AT 2016 WNBA DRAFT

The Atlanta Dream selected four players in the 2016 WNBA Draft, including West Virginia standout Bria Holmes with the No. 11 overall selection.

APRIL 18, 2016: MILES COOPER ADDED TO ATLANTA DREAM COACHING STAFF

Miles Cooper was named an assistant coach for the Atlanta Dream, joining his father and the second active father/son coaching duo in the WNBA.

MAY 10, 2016: ATLANTA DREAM ACQUIRES LAYSHIA CLARENDON FROM FEVER

The Dream acquired guard Layshia Clarendon from the Indiana Fever in a trade between the franchises. In return, the Dream sent the Fever a second-round selection in the 2017 WNBA Draft it received from the New York Liberty on May 2, 2016 in exchange for guard Shoni Schimmel.

JUNE 3, 2016: DREAM OPEN SEASON 6-1

The Atlanta Dream started the season 6-1, the franchises best since opening the 2013 season 10-1 when it went on to advance to the WNBA Finals.

JUNE 5, 2016: SANCHO HITS 3,000 POINTS FOR CAREER

Sancho Lyttle registered the 3,000th point of her career in the June 5 loss vs. Washington.

JUNE 27, 2016: DREAM SIGNS MARKEISHA GATLING, WAIVES CIERRA BURDICK

The Atlanta Dream signed center Markeisha Gatling to a contract after claiming her off waivers. The Dream also waived forward Cierra Burdick to finalize the roster move.

AUGUST 20, 2016: ANGEL GRABS SECOND OLYMPIC GOLD MEDAL

Angel McCoughtry helped lead the U.S. Olympic Team to a perfect 8-0 mark and the gold medal. McCoughtry won her second gold medal, also winning the medal in 2012.

SEPTEMBER 21, 2016: WILLIAMS NAMED WNBA'S MOST IMPROVED PLAYER
