GET UP



In June 2015, the Timberwolves opened their state-of-the-art training center that features cutting-edge technology and equipment. At 107,000 sq. ft., the facility is twice the size of the average NBA training center and continues to play a significant role in recruiting free agents and giving players the ability to develop to their full potential.

The facility, a \$25 million all private investment, is home to the team's training center, basketball and business operations, the Mayo Clinic Sports Medicine Center and the Timberwolves and Lynx Basketball Academy. Occupying the third and fourth floors of Mayo Clinic Square in downtown Minneapolis, the facility includes expanded training areas and two basketball courts, with the Timberwolves and Lynx each having a primary court.

The team's medical provider, the world-renowned Mayo Clinic, operates a sports medicine center directly connected to the courts, giving players convenient access to one of the most sophisticated and respected medical systems in the world.



Selected by Minnesota in the 1st round (1st overall) of the 2006 WNBA Draft. Signed on April 19, 2006. Re-signed to a four-year contract on February 9, 2010. Re-signed to a three-year contract on September 13, 2013. Signed a two-year contract extension on September 15, 2016. Re-signed to a one-year contract on February 2, 2019.

WNBA CAREER CAPSULE

2018: Finished her 13th season in Minnesota by starting 33 games... Averaged a career-low 10.8 ppg, 1.8 rpg and 2.6 apg in 26.2 mpg... Ranked 3rd among guards in FG accuracy (46.7%) while shooting 31.8% from threepoint range and 70.6% from the FT line... Tallied 10+ points on 22 occasions, boosting her career total to 299... Dealt a season-high six assists Aug. 12 vs. Seattle; she totaled 45 assists and just 14 TOs over the final 16 games (3.21-to-1)... Scored 14 points in the 2018 All-Star Game, held July 28 at Target Center... Passed Katie Douglas and DeLisha Milton-Jones into 11th place on the WNBA's career scoring list June 7 at Washington... Registered season highs with five rebounds and four steals May 29 in Atlanta and led all scorers with 21 points May 25 at New York, her 109th career 20+ effort.

2017: Wrapped up her 12th season with the Lynx by starting 32 games, her top total since playing all 34 in 2011... Missed a pair of contests (July 30-Aug. 3) for personal reasons... Led the Lynx with a career-high 127 assists, shattering her previous best of 83 set in 2008; she ranked 11th in the WNBA in assists (4.0 apg) and 6th in ast/TO ratio (2.82-to-1)... Averaged a career-low 10.9 ppg but topped 50% from the field for the fifth time in her career; the 50.2% accuracy was good for 12th in the league (4th among guards)... Also netted 2.9 rpg in 27.7 mpg while shooting 43.2% (19-for-44) from three-point range and 86.8% from the line... Reached double figures on 18 occasions, including a season-high 19 points July 14 at Phoenix... Tied her career high with 10 assists July 28 at Atlanta (also June 10, 2008 vs. Connecticut), en route to her second career double-double; she collected 108 ast/31 TOs in her final 25 outings (4.3 apg, 3.48-to-1 ratio)... Chipped in four points in the 2017 All-Star Game, held July 22 in Seattle... Claimed a game- and season-high seven rebounds June 3 at Seattle, and swiped a season-best three steals June 17 vs. Connecticut... Sank the tie-breaking jumper with :04.3 to play May 20 at Dallas, capping an 18-point effort.

2016: Concluded her 11th season in Minnesota by starting 29 games, her top total since 2013. Was sidelined for two games (July 9-12) due to a sore left knee and drew three DNP-CDs. Averaged a career-low 11.2 ppg, 2.9 rpg and 2.4 apg in 26.4 mpg, shooting 46.0% from the floor, 33.3% (13-for-39) from beyond the arc and 80.4% from the FT line. Boosted her accuracy to 51.8% (72-for-139) in her last 13 outings, and hit 45.0% (9-for-20) from beyond the arc over her last 12. Signed a two-year contract extension on September 15. Netted 20 points September 11 at San Antonio, her fourth 20+ point night of the season and extending her franchise-record career total to 108. Sank the game-winner with :15.3 left in OT on July 17 at Dallas; she also scored the 5000th point of her WNBA career in that game. Scored 20 points July 15 vs. New York, adding a season-best seven rebounds -- including the 1000th of her career. Tallied a season-high 21 points June 11 at Washington, one of six times she was the Lynx' top scorer. Saw her string of made FTs halted at 43 on May 27 vs. Indiana, one shy of Candice Wiggins' club record. Dished a season-high six assists May 18 at Chicago.

2015: Saw her 10th season with the Lynx interrupted by injuries. Started 16 games, missing 10 (July 17-August 11) after undergoing arthroscopic surgery on her right knee and the final eight (August 21-September 11) with a sprained left foot. Averaged a career-low 13.8 ppg, 2.9 rpg and 2.4 apg in 30.0 mpg, shooting 44.0% from the floor. Made all 26 of her FT attempts on the season, running her string of makes to 35, nine short of Candice Wiggins' franchise record. Chosen for the 2015 WNBA All-Star Game, held July 25 in Connecticut, but did not play due to injury. Had 21 points and a season-high five assists July 14 at Connecticut, her third 20+ effort of the year and 104th of her career (extending her own franchise record). Tallied a season best 24 points (in a season-high 37:21) June 25 at Seattle, helping the Lynx overcome an 18-point deficit to win. The June 6 game at Indiana was the 250th of her WNBA career.

2014: Finished her ninth season with Minnesota averaging 16.5 ppg and 3.6 rpg. Started 24 games, missing 10 due to soreness in her left knee. Averaged 16.5 ppg, 3.6 rpg and 2.4 apg in 31.2 mpg, the latter her highest figure since 2010. Led all guards (12th overall) in FG accuracy at 51.1%, the third time she's topped 50%; she also shot 84.6% from the FT line and 33.3% from three-point range. Converted 11 of her final 23 trey attempts, following a 11-for-13 start. Tallied 20+ points on five occasions, pushing her club-record career total to 101 such games, and was Minnesota's top scorer five times. Sank the game-winning basket as time expired on August 5 at Indiana, her first career buzzer-beater. Hauled in a season-best eight rebounds July 31 vs. Phoenix; she dished a season-high six assists July 25 vs. San Antonio, one of three times she led. Selected for the 2014 WNBA All-Star Game, held July 19 in Phoenix, but did not play due to injury. Tallied a game and season-high 26 points June 8 at Los Angeles. Led all scorers with 25 points June 1 at San Antonio; she averaged 19.9 ppg (on 55.6% shooting) during Minnesota's season-opening seven-game winning streak. Dished her 500th career assist May 30 at Chicago. Sank the game-tying FG with :02.3 left in regulation May 18 vs. Connecticut; the minute total (41:37) is her

high since 2010.

2013: Averaged 16.3 ppg and shot a career-best 51.6% from the floor. Started 31 games, missing three (July 9-13) due to a sprained left ankle suffered July 7 vs. Phoenix. Ranked 9th in the WNBA in scoring, 7th in FG accuracy and 8th in FT accuracy (87.9%) while logging 29.7 mpg. Shot a career-low 29.0% from three-point range, but converted 35.1% (13-for-37) from beyond the arc in her final 16 contests after a 7-for-32 (21.9%) start. Tallied 20+ points on eight occasions, pushing her club-record career total to 96 such outings, and was Minnesota's top scorer six times. Her nine FT attempts September 12 at Los Angeles are a season high, and her most in a road game since July 24, 2008 at Indiana. Grabbed a season-high eight rebounds August 27 at New York; she pulled in 6+ boards five times in August. Dished a season-high six assists August 22 at Connecticut, one of five times she's led; her 2.5 apg this year is the second-best of her career (2.7 in 2008). Scored the 4000th point of her WNBA career August 16 vs. Tulsa, becoming the 19th player in league history to do so; only Diana Taurasi, Cappie Pondexter and Lauren Jackson required fewer games to reach that mark. Finished with a season-high 29 points in that August 16 vs. Tulsa; she had a team-best 26 points and six assists (in a season-high 39:20) August 11 at Chicago. Started the 2013 WNBA All-Star Game on July 27 in Connecticut, scoring 12 points. Matched her career best with three blocks June 14 at Tulsa; her 27 FG attempts June 8 at Washington were one short of her career high.

2012: Again led the Lynx in scoring. Played in 29 games, missing two (June 6-9) due to a strained right quadriceps and three more (September 9-14) with a sprained right foot. Ranked 9th in the league in scoring (16.6 ppg), 27th in assists (2.5 apg) and among the top 15 in all three shooting categories -- 13th in FG accuracy (49.1%), 4th in three-point accuracy (a career-best 43.7%) and 11th in FT accuracy (85.2%) -- while logging a career-low 28.5 mpg. Her 45 treys made are also a career high; she ran her string of consecutive made three-pointers to eight June 27 vs. Phoenix, one shy of the WNBA record. Closed the year by making 20 consecutive free throws (and 35 of her final 37), but dipped to 39.0% (46-for-118) from the floor over her last eight contests. The September 17 win vs. Indiana halted her run of double-figure scoring nights at 29 games. Drilled a career-high six three-pointers September 4 vs. Los Angeles, part of a game-high 23-point performance; it was her franchise-record 88th career 20+ outing (8th this year, with Minnesota going 8-0). Moved past Katie Smith (3605) into 1st place on the Lynx' career scoring list in the September 4 game, as well, ending the season with 3684 points. Her nine rebounds August 31 vs. Tulsa tied a career best. Tallied a game-high 23 points August 25 at Atlanta, one of 13 times she was the Lynx' leading scorer. Totaled a season-high 26 points June 21 vs. New York, adding seven rebounds and a season-best eight assists; the latter figure is her high since dealing nine vs. New York on June 24, 2008. Collected a game-high 25 points and a season-high three steals May 24 vs. Los Angeles.

2011: Started all 34 games for the first time since 2007 (third total). Again, led the Lynx in scoring, averaging 16.2 ppg to rank 8th in the WNBA, while logging a team-high 29.3 mpg (18th in the league). Also placed among the top 12 in all three shooting categories -- FG accuracy (50.4%, 12th), three-point accuracy (41.7%, 9th) and FT accuracy (86.5%, 10th) -- to become only the third player in league history to post a 50/40/85 season (Lauren Jackson, 2007; Penny Taylor, 2010). Earned Western Conference Player of the Week recognition three times (July 25, August 8, August 29), hiking her career total to seven. Was Minnesota's leading scorer on 17 occasions, reaching double figures 30 times. Went over the 3000-point mark August 9 at Phoenix, doing so in her 151st WNBA game to tie Diana Taurasi for the fastest ever to 3000. GLEN TAYLOR - OWNER



The Minnesota Lynx team is owned by Glen Taylor and has been since their inaugural season in 1999.

During the 2009 off-season, Taylor appointed longtime successful WNBA assistant coach Cheryl Reeve as the franchise's head coach.

On March 23, 1995, Glen Taylor closed the deal that made him majority owner of the Minnesota Timberwolves. He added the title of NBA owner to a list that already included international businessman, state senator, entrepreneur, philanthropist and executive of the year.

Glen Taylor is chairman of the multinational Taylor Corporation, based in Mankato, MN. He earned a Bachelor of Science degree from Minnesota State University, Mankato. During this period, he worked part time at Carlson Wedding Service, a print shop specializing in formal invitations. After graduation, he continued to work at the company, developing strategies to cut delivery time, improve service and expand offerings. Taylor purchased the company in 1975, assembled a passionate leadership team and dramatically expanded the firm's capabilities, growing it into one of the largest privately held companies in the United States. Today Taylor Corporation, based in North Mankato, includes more than 80 subsidiaries providing business and personal communications products, technologies and marketing services. Other enterprises owned by Glen are in securities, agricultural, and medical fields.

He continued his education at the Harvard Graduate School of Business. In 1997, Mankato State University awarded Taylor their first honorary doctorate. Taylor received the degree of Honorary Doctor of Laws for his distinguished professional career and volunteer service. In October 2001, Taylor was inducted into the Minnesota State University, Mankato Hall of Distinction.

Taylor's business savvy has been recognized by Corporate Report magazine, which honored him as its Executive of the Year (1987), and the Sales and Marketing Executives of Minneapolis/St. Paul, who awarded him with their Sales Executive of the Year Award (1999). He was also inducted into the Minnesota Hall of Fame (2002) by Twin Cities Monthly Magazine.

Taylor was elected to the Minnesota Senate in 1980, where he served until 1990. He became assistant Senate minority leader in 1982. From 1984 to 1986, he served as Senate minority leader. While in the Senate, Taylor was instrumental in providing leadership in the areas of higher education, child care and economic development policies. He has served on the NBA Planning Committee and has been Chairman of the Audit Committee. In October of 2008, Taylor was named chairman of the NBA's Board of Governors.

Through personal involvement, Taylor has remained active in many community, civic and charitable causes. He has also served on his church's board of deacons and board of trustees and on the Mankato State University Foundation board of directors.

Taylor and his family have provided financial assistance and participated in missions to Africa, Turkey, Egypt and Central America to support the Starkey Hearing Foundation and Common Hope. Nationally, Taylor has provided expert testimony on business and child care issues to the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives and served as a committee chair on the 1991 Commission on Reform and Efficiency (CORE).

Taylor and his wife, Becky, live in Mankato. Their children and grandchildren enjoy attending many of the Timberwolves and Lynx games.

ETHAN CASSON - CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER



Ethan Casson is finishing his third season as the Chief Executive Officer for the Minnesota Timberwolves, the Minnesota Lynx and the Iowa Wolves, the Timberwolves' G-League team. Adding to his extensive scope of responsibilities, Casson also serves on the NBA Board of Governors as the Timberwolves and Lynx Alternate Governor. Prior to his current role, he served as the Chief Operating Officer for the San Francisco 49ers of the National Football League.

As the CEO, Casson oversees the business operations, working closely with the executive team on setting the organization's strategic vision. In his tenure with the team, Casson has implemented several initiatives as part of an aggressive rebuild of the organization. In the Fall of 2016, Casson led a brand overhaul that included the rollout of a new logo and court, the unveiling of team uniforms, and the launch of a new marketing campaign. In an effort to re-establish Target Center's resurgence in downtown Minneapolis, Casson oversaw the completion of the building's \$150 million renovation, the first major facelift in the venue's 27-year history. The success of the project resulted in a nomination for the Sports Business Journal's 2018 Facility of the Year and was chosen as Minnesota's Finance & Commerce Top Project of 2017.

In the interest of growing the franchise's popularity, Casson worked with the NBA to secure the Timberwolves as a participant in the 2017 NBA Global Games in China, playing against the defending NBA Champion Golden State Warriors. Additionally, the franchise purchased the NBA's G-League team from Des Moines, now the Iowa Wolves, expanding the organization's footprint throughout the Upper Midwest. On a local level, Casson partnered with the WNBA in bringing the 2018 WNBA All-Star Game to the Twin Cities, where the Minnesota Lynx played host.

Since Casson's arrival, the Timberwolves have seen tremendous growth in all key business metrics including season tickets, attendance, television viewership, corporate partnerships, merchandise, and social engagement. The Lynx remain the model franchise in the WNBA, having been recently named WNBA Franchise of the Year for the second straight season. Further, Casson led the efforts in securing an NBA 2K team, T-Wolves Gaming, joining 21 other NBA franchises with a 2K eSports team.

Casson spent six seasons with the San Francisco 49ers, initially as the team's Vice President of Corporate Sales. He was promoted to Chief Revenue Officer in 2014 and Chief Operating Officer in 2016. Casson led a team focused on generating corporate revenue associated with the 49ers' new stadium project. He spearheaded the organization's effort in securing a 20-year, \$220 million naming rights partnership with Levi Strauss & Co., one of the largest naming rights deals in NFL history. Additionally, the team sold more than a dozen founding partnership deals, resulting in over \$600 million in committed corporate revenue prior to the opening of Levi's Stadium.

Under Casson's direction, Levi's Stadium saw record-breaking growth in several areas of the 49ers business, inclusive of ticket and premium sales and corporate partnerships. In addition, Casson helped procure some of the most prominent events in sports and entertainment, including Super Bowl 50, WrestleMania 31, the NHL Outdoor Stadium Series, Pac-12 Championship Football, various music headliners and was awarded the host site for the 2019 College Football Playoff National Championship. The success of Levi's Stadium resulted in several industry awards including the Sports Business Journal's 2015 Facility of the Year and Venue of the Year at the 2015 Stadium Business Awards in Barcelona, Spain. Leveraging technology with sustainability, Levi's Stadium generated international acclaim for its green efforts, becoming the first NFL stadium to be twice LEED Gold certified and was named the 2016 Green Sports Alliance Environmental Innovators of the Year.

Casson worked for 11 years with the Timberwolves and Lynx. As Senior Vice President of Corporate Partnerships and Game Presentation, Casson established many long-term partnerships with key Twin Cities brands while working to enhance the overall in-arena fan experience. Before his tenure with the organization, Casson served in sponsorship development at ESPN.

Casson has garnered industry-wide recognition for his accomplishments throughout his career, including being named to Minnesota Magazine's 2018 Minnesota 500, profiling the top business professionals in the state, C-Level Magazine's CEO of the Month in February 2017, featured in Profile Magazine's 2017 Q1 Executive Leadership Edition and Twin Cities Business Journal's list of "100 People to Know" in 2016. He was honored as a member of Sports Business Journal's Forty Under 40 class of 2014 and Minneapolis/St. Paul Business Journal's Forty Under 40 class of 2008.

Casson earned a Bachelor of Science in sports management from Colby-Sawyer College in New London, New Hampshire. A standout college basketball player, he was inducted into the New England Basketball Hall of Fame in 2013 and the Colby-Sawyer College Athletic Hall of Fame in 2015. Casson served on the Board of Directors for the Make-A-Wish Foundation Greater Bay Area and was previously a board member for the Make-A-Wish Foundation Minnesota during his first stint with the franchise. He currently serves on the Board of Directors for the Timberwolves and Lynx Fastbreak Foundation, the Board of Directors for YMCA of the Greater Twin Cities, and the Advisory Board for Positive Coaching Alliance. He is a member of the Twin Cities chapter of Young Presidents Organization (YPO) and a member of the Twin Cities Dunkers. He is also actively involved in Big Brothers Big Sisters Twin Cities and the Greater Twin Cities United Way.

Casson and his wife, Lisa, reside in Minneapolis.



CHERYL REEVE - HEAD COACH AND GENERAL MANAGER



Cheryl Reeve enters her 10th season as Lynx head coach and second in the dual role as head coach and general manager. In 2017, she led the Lynx to a 27-7 record and their fourth WNBA championship in the last seven years. Since taking over as Lynx head coach, Reeve owns a career 213-93 record, the most coaching wins in franchise history. She was initially named head coach on Dec. 8, 2009, taking over for former head coach Jennifer Gillom. On Dec. 6, 2012, Reeve signed a multi-year contract extension with the club. Prior to the 2016 season, the Lynx signed Reeve to a multi-year contract extension. On December 28, 2017, Reeve signed a multi-year contract extension and was also named general manager.

Reeve is the sixth dual Head Coach and General Manager currently in the WNBA, joining James Wade (Chicago), Curt Miller (Connecticut), Pokey Chatman (Indiana), Bill Laimbeer (Las Vegas) and Mike Thibault (Washington).

Under Reeve's tutelage, the Lynx have compiled 213 wins over the last nine seasons, the most prolific nine-year run in WNBA history. Finishing the 2017 season 27-7, Minnesota has registered its sixth 25-win campaign in the last seven years, becoming the first WNBA franchise to win 27+ games in a season four separate times. Since taking over in 2010, Reeve's .696 winning percentage (213-93) ranks first in league history; she's one of just two coaches to win more than 60% of their games (Van Chancellor, .655).

In 2018, Reeve registered her 200th career victory June 19 vs. Dallas, joining Chancellor and Thibault as the only WNBA coaches to win 200 games with one franchise. She passed the late Anne Donovan to become the league's winningest female head coach and passed Donovan for sixth on the all-time coaching wins list.

Reeve guided the Lynx to the first championship in franchise history in 2011, being named the WNBA Coach of the Year after leading Minnesota to a league-best 27-7 regular season record. The Lynx made a 14-game improvement from 2010, marking the second-largest single-season win increase in WNBA history. Reeve went on to lead the Lynx to WNBA championships in 2013, 2015 and 2017.

On May 12, 2014, USA Basketball named Reeve as an assistant coach to the 2014 USA Basketball Women's World Championship Team. After assisting head coach Geno Auriemma to the gold medal and a 6-0 record at the 2014 FIBA World Championship, USA Basketball announced on Feb. 9, 2014, that Reeve would return as an assistant for the USA National Team through the 2016 Olympic Games. She recently joined Dawn Staley's staff as a 2018 USA National Team assistant coach when Team USA went a perfect 6-0 to capture gold at the 2018 FIBA World Championship. Additionally, Reeve's coaching résumé includes 26 years as both an assistant and a head coach at the collegiate and WNBA levels. In 2009, Reeve served as an assistant coach with the WNBA's Detroit Shock, and was promoted to the team's general manager position just three games into the season. Hired by three-time WNBA

champion head coach Bill Laimbeer, Reeve joined the Shock coaching staff in 2006 and helped the franchise reach the WNBA Finals in each of her first three years, winning WNBA titles in 2006 and 2008. During her four years with Detroit, the team held an 87-49 win/loss record and won at least 18 games each season, including 24 in 2007. Reeve also served as the Shock's director of player personnel in 2008.

Reeve got her start in the WNBA with the Charlotte Sting in 2001 when she joined Anne Donovan's staff as an assistant coach. After posting an 8-24 record in 2000, Charlotte turned things around in Reeve's first year, going 18-14 en route to advancing to the WNBA Finals. Reeve spent the 2002 season again in Charlotte before joining Dan Hughes' coaching staff in Cleveland for the 2003 season. Reeve returned to the Sting in 2004 and 2005 before joining Detroit in 2006. In Reeve's nine years as an assistant, she compiled a .543 winning percentage (163-137 W/L), including seven postseason appearances and advancing to the WNBA Finals four times.

Before joining the WNBA coaching ranks, Reeve spent 12 years coaching collegiately, including a five-year stint as head coach at Indiana State from 1995-2000. Reeve guided the Sycamores to the program's first postseason berth in 20 years following the 1998-99 campaign.

Reeve also spent five years as an assistant coach at George Washington. During that time, the Colonials posted five 20-win seasons, captured three Atlantic 10 Conference Championships and appeared in four NCAA Tournaments. Reeve got her start in coaching at her alma matter, La Salle, as an assistant coach for two seasons.

As a player at La Salle, Reeve led the nationally-ranked Explorers to a 25-5 record in 1987-1988. She was named All-Metro Atlantic Conference and was an All-Big 5 selection as a senior. Reeve holds the school record for most games started (110) and ranks fourth on La Salle's career assist leader board (420).

Reeve excelled athletically and academically at La Salle, graduating with a degree in computer science/management information systems. A Rhodes Scholar nominee, Reeve received both a MAAC Scholar-Athlete Post Graduate Award and a NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship in 1988. She went on to earn her master's degree in business administration from her alma mater while also serving two years as an assistant coach for the Explorers.

SHELLEY PATTERSON
ASSISTANT COACH

The 2019 season will be Patterson's 10th year as an Assistant Coach with the Minnesota Lynx.

With the Lynx, Patterson provides support in opponent scout preparation and game planning as well as individual player development.

Prior to coming to the Lynx, Patterson, a 22-year coaching veteran in both the professional and collegiate ranks, spent the previous three years on the coaching staff in Seattle, one under Anne Donovan in 2007 and the other two seasons on Brian Agler's staff. Prior to that, Patterson spent parts of eight years work-ing in different capacities with five WNBA organizations.

Patterson began her career in Houston where she served as Director of Basketball Operations and won a WNBA Championship with the Comets during the 1999 WNBA season. She then spent four years (2000-2003) working as an assistant coach with the Indiana Fever before joining the coaching staff of the Phoenix Mercury in 2004.

In addition to her work in the WNBA, Patterson served as head coach for the National Women's Basket-ball League's Chicago Blaze in 2005 and worked as an assistant coach under Donovan with the Philadelphia Rage of the ABL during the 1998-99 season.

Patterson began her coaching career in 1989 as a recruiting coordinator at Indiana State University and has held positions at Ohio University, the University of Arizona, Wake Forest and Dayton.



WALT HOPKINS
ASSISTANT COACH

The 2019 season will be Walt Hopkins' third season as an assistant coach with the Minnesota Lynx, and this will be his first season at the front of the bench as a full-time assistant under head coach Cheryl Reeve.

In addition to sharing in game planning responsibilities for upcoming opponents during the season, Hopkins, in the offseason scouts future WNBA talent at the college level, as well as developing and implementing plans for player skill development in the off-season. Hopkins uses a holistic approach in his coaching, combining his studies of psychology with his nuanced understanding of on-court skill work in an effort to maximize the Lynx players' basketball skills while also seeking to improve each player's mental resilience, focus, and response to failures and mistakes.

Hopkins started in the WNBA as the player development coach for the Tulsa Shock (2013), and he also served as an assistant women's basketball coach at Utah Valley University (2013-2014) before joining the Lynx prior to the start of their 2017 championship run. Hopkins earned his bachelor's degree from the University of Nevada, Reno, and also holds master's degrees from both Harvard and UC Berkeley, where his studies focused primarily on applying findings from Social, Developmental, and Educational Psychology to coaching settings.



PLENETTE PIERSON
ASSISTANT COACH

The 2019 season will serve as Pierson's first year as an Assistant Coach with the Minnesota Lynx and first in WNBA.

The 15-year WNBA veteran returns to the Twin Cities where she won a championship in 2017, her last season playing in the league, after she spent the past college season as an assistant coach at Wayne State University. There, Pierson led post player development, prepared opponent scouting reports and evaluated and recruited prospective student-athletes.

With the Lynx, she will assist in the team's talent evaluation, scouting and assist in the team's player development. She is the 12th former WNBA player to currently be on a coaching staff in the league.

The Houston, Texas native played a total of 444 games with four different franchises (Minnesota, Phoenix, Detroit/Tulsa/Dallas, New York) and averaged 8.0 points on 44.4% shooting including 36.4% from deep, 4.2 rebounds and 1.4 assists per game. In her best season with the Detroit Shock, in 2007, Pierson averaged 11.6 points, 5.8 rebounds and 1.7 assists per game off the bench and was named WNBA Sixth Woman of the Year.

Pierson's playing career includes four trips to the WNBA Finals among her nine postseason appearances. She additionally won WNBA Championships in 2006 and 2008 with the Shock, where she played under then-assistant and current Lynx head coach Cheryl Reeve.



CLARE DUWELIUS
ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER

The 2019 season will be Clare Duwelius' sixth season with the Minnesota Lynx, second as Assistant General Manager after serving the previous four seasons as the Basketball Operations Manager.

Duwelius is responsible for assisting General Manager and Head Coach Cheryl Reeve in all day-to-day tasks of the basketball operations department, including organizing and executing of team travel arrangements, scheduling of team practices at home and on the road, facility setup for the Lynx and visiting teams and managing in-market player logistics. Her duties also include serving as a liaison between the business department and basketball operations and carrying out WNBA initiatives. During the WNBA offseason, Duwelius assists Reeve and the Lynx coaching staff in the scouting of WNBA prospects and player development.

The 2019 season will be Will Dunn's first with the Minnesota Lynx.

In his role with the team, Dunn will provide video edits on opposing teams and statistical and analytical data on Lynx and opposition play calls. Additionally, he will assist the coaching staff in creating scout game plans for each opponent.

Dunn joins head coach Cheryl Reeve's staff after spending the 2018-19 NBA G League season with the Fort Wayne (Ind.) Mad Ants, serving as the team's Basketball Operations Intern.

Chuck Barta returns for his 13th season as Head Athletic Trainer for the Minnesota Lynx. Barta brings almost three decades of experience as an athletic trainer to the Lynx staff, including 18 seasons with the Minnesota Vikings.

After earning his athletic training degree from the University of Wisconsin-LaCrosse in 1988, Barta joined the Minnesota Vikings as an assistant athletic trainer. 

MEDIA INFORMATION

CREDENTIALS

Press seating at Lynx home games at Target Center is available to accredited media at tables located courtside, in the court-level auxiliary media section. Single-game credentials must be requested no later than noon the day before the game (Friday at 5:00 p.m. for Sunday and Monday games). Requests should be made via e-mail (aaron.freeman@lynxbasketball.com or sara.perez@lynxbasketball.com) or phone (612-673-8413) to Lynx Basketball Communications Manager Aaron Freeman and Lynx Basketball Communication Coordinator Sara Perez. Credentials are good for admittance to Target Center, the arena floor, the locker rooms, the media work room and the media dining room. Those requesting single-game credentials will be seated on a first-come, first-served basis. Those holding Lynx or WNBA season credentials may enter the building through the Target Center Media Entrance located at the corner of Sixth St. and Second Ave. Single-game credentials may also be picked up at the Media Entrance. ALL MEDIA WILL BE REQUIRED TO PRESENT A PHOTO IDENTIFICATION PRIOR TO RECEIVING THEIR CREDENTIALS. ALL BAGS ARE SUBJECT TO INSPECTION PRIOR TO RECEIVING A CREDENTIAL. Media members holding season passes should notify the public relations department if planning to cover a game in order to reserve seating. A media credential cannot be used to sit in spectator seating areas.

DINING ROOM

Accredited media is offered a \$10 concession stand voucher, redeemable at any of Target Center's concession stands. Dining room usage will be limited to members of the media with valid Lynx or WNBA media passes. It is impossible to accommodate family members, friends, guests or others. ANY ABUSE OF DINING ROOM PRIVILEGES WILL CAUSE FORFEITURE OF YOUR MEDIA PASS.

SERVICES

Complete statistics, along with pregame media notes, lineup information regarding injuries and other pertinent facts, will be furnished by the Lynx public relations department. Play-by-play sheets, halftime and final box scores and postgame coach/player quotes will be delivered to working media areas. There are sufficient electrical outlets available, and telephones are located at various points along press row and in the media work room. Preference for telephone use will be given to writers and broadcasters filing stories on deadline. The Lynx also provide one fax machine, which is available for complimentary use by working media.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Only those photographers on assignment will be allowed space on the floor, and their media credentials must be worn prominently at all times. Credentials are good for admittance to Target Center, the arena floor, media work room and media dining room. Photographers are only allowed within the designated photographers area at each end of the court, unless permission is granted through the Lynx public relations department to shoot in other areas of the arena. Spaces will be reserved for local dailies and wire service photographers. Other spaces are available on a first-come, first-served basis. Positions may be switched or rotated upon agreement of all parties involved. Professional courtesy should apply in all cases. ALL BAGS ARE SUBJECT TO INSPECTION PRIOR TO RECEIVING A CREDENTIAL.

LOCKER ROOM

Both the Lynx and visitors locker rooms will be opened 90 minutes before game time and will remain open until 60 minutes before the contest begins. For example, locker rooms will be open from 5:30 p.m. - 6:00 p.m. for a 7:00 p.m. game. Both locker rooms will re-open 10 minutes after the game. Cell phone use inside WNBA locker rooms is prohibited.

Your cooperation is requested in maintaining a working atmosphere in the media room, at courtside and in the locker room areas. During postgame interviews, preference for obtaining players and coaches will be given to game broadcast crews conducting live postgame shows, newspapers writing on deadline and television stations conducting live reports.

Sylvia Fowles tallied a team-high 18 points and 12 rebounds, and Temi Fagbenle added a career-best 15 points and four rebounds off the bench as the Lynx were eliminated from the playoffs by Los Angeles, 75-68, on Tuesday evening at Staples Center. The Lynx held the Sparks to 43.5 percent from the field, but turned the ball over 15 times and shot only 26.7 percent from beyond the arc to L.A.'s 36.8 percent. Minnesota led by as much as 11 points in the first half following a Fagbenle layup with 5:31 left in the second quarter. Los Angeles would then go on a 16-3 run over the final 4:05 in the first half to take a 40-37 lead into the halftime break. The Sparks would stretch their largest lead of 14, 57-43 with a Riquna Williams three-pointer in the final three minutes of the third quarter. Minnesota responded with a 9-1 run to close out the third quarter to cut the LA lead to 58-52. The Lynx would be able to get the Sparks' lead down to three points with 2:22 left in the fourth quarter, but LA would close out the game with free throws. Chelsea Gray led the way for the Sparks with 26 points, five rebounds and six assists, while Nneka Ogwumike added 19 points and five rebounds.

Forward Katie Smith started (due to an injury to Cynthia Cooper) and played 18 minutes in the 2000 WNBA All-Star Game at America West Arena in Phoenix. Smith (two assists, two steals) became the first player in team history to start an All-Star Game. Guard Betty Lennox, the game's only rookie, scored three points and grabbed five rebounds in 13 minutes off the bench.

JULY 29

Forward Katie Smith sank a three-pointer with 7:21 left in the first half at Washington, setting a WNBA single-season record for three-point field goals. She eclipsed New York forward Crystal Robinson's previous record of 76 three-pointers set in 1999. Smith finished the season with 88 three-point field goals. Head coach Brian Agler earned his 100th professional victory with the 87-85 win. Agler became the first coach to record 100 regular-season wins in U.S. women's professional basketball history. He posted a 72-18 record in two-plus seasons with the ABL's Columbus Quest (1996-97-1998-99).

AUGUST 11

Guard Betty Lennox is named the 2000 WNBA Rookie of the Year after receiving 59 of a possible 62 votes from a panel of sports writers and broadcasters. Lennox led all rookies with 16.9 ppg and topped the Lynx with 5.6 rpg.

AUGUST 23

Guard Betty Lennox and forward Katie Smith are selected to the 2000 All-WNBA Second Team. Smith led Minnesota with 20.2 ppg, becoming only the fourth WNBA player to average 20-plus points in a season, and Lennox averaged 16.9 ppg.

2001

APRIL 20

Selected five players in the 2001 WNBA Draft: Connecticut forward Svetlana Abrosimova (first-round, seventh overall), The Master's College guard Erin Buescher (second-round, 23rd overall), Tulane center Janell Burse (second-round, 28th overall), Florida guard Tombi Bell (third-round, 39th overall) and Iowa State guard Megan Taylor (fourth-round, 55th overall).

MAY 5

Allina Hospitals & Clinics and the Minnesota Lynx teamed up for the Third Annual "Great Basketball Dribble" to raise money for breast cancer research in the state of Minnesota. The Lynx garnered the highest enrollment in three years for the event with over 2,000 registrations.

MAY 31

Minnesota defeated Portland 82-65 at the Rose Garden for the team's third consecutive opening night victory. Forward Katie Smith scored 31 points and became the 26th WNBA player to score 1,000 career points.

JUNE 2

The Phoenix Mercury handed the Lynx their first loss in a home opener, 89-80.

JUNE 4

Forward Katie Smith is named WNBA Player of the Week for the week of May 28-June 3. She averaged a league-best 26.5 ppg, while shooting 82.0% (9-for-11) from three-point range.

JUNE 17

Forward Katie Smith joins Cynthia Cooper as the only players in WNBA history to reach the 40-point plateau in a game. She tallies 40 points at Detroit in a 71-63 Lynx victory. Smith's 40 points represent 56.3% of the Lynx' offense, the highest single-game ratio in league history.

JULY 8

Forward Katie Smith sets a WNBA single-game scoring record with a 46-point outburst at Los Angeles. Smith broke Cynthia Cooper's previous single-game record of 44 points. Smith finished the game 18-for-19 from the free throw line, second-best in league history. The Lynx lost to the Sparks 100-95 in overtime. The contest is the highest scoring game of the 2001 WNBA season and the third-highest combined total in league history.

Rebekkah Brunson swiped her 400th career steal versus Connecticut.

SEPTEMBER 6

Janel McCarville went over the 6000-career-minute mark in the matchup at L.A.

SEPTEMBER 11

Maya Moore played in her 200th career game in the match at San Antonio.

SEPTEMBER 20

Maya Moore was named Western Conference Players of the Month for the month of September. The award was her second Western Conference Player of the Month of the season and eighth of her career.

APRIL 13

Selected Alexis Jones, Lisa Berkani and Tahlia Tupaea in the 2017 WNBA Draft.

MAY 22

Sylvia Fowles was named Western Conference Player of the Week for May 14-21, averaging 21.7 points, 10.0 rebounds and 2.0 blocks.

MAY 30

Sylvia Fowles was named Western Conference Player of the Week for May 22-28, averaging averaged 18.3 ppg, 11.3 rpg, 2.00 spg and 2.67 bpg while logging 26.0 mpg. Rebekkah Brunson scored 21 points in the 100-77 win over Seattle, upped her career points to 2,054 career points in a Lynx uniform, surpassing Svetlana Abrosimova (2,033) for fifth place in franchise history.

JUNE 9

With Minnesota's win over the Washington Mystics, Lindsay Whalen secured win No. 295 in her career, surpassing Swin Cash (294) as the all-time winningest player in WNBA history.

JUNE 23

Sylvia Fowles totaled 21 points, a season-high 15 rebounds and five blocks against Washington, her second 20+ pts/10+ reb/5+ blk game this year (sixth career) and the third in Lynx history. Marking the league's top individual scoring, rebound and assist outings of 2017.

JUNE 25

The victory over San Antonio was the 122nd regular-season victory for the Lynx quartet of Seimone Augustus, Rebekkah Brunson, Maya Moore and Lindsay Whalen (now 129-31 overall), the top total for any foursome in WNBA history.

JULY 22

Forward Maya Moore was named Most Valuable Player of the 2017 All-Star Game on July 22 at KeyArena in Seattle, after helping the West post a 130-121 win. She becomes the third player in league history to be chosen MVP in consecutive All-Star Games, joining Lisa Leslie (2001, 2002) and Swin Cash (2009, 2011).

JULY 30

Clinched the franchise's seventh straight trip to the playoffs (nine overall) with a victory over Seattle and marked the 200th regular season home victory in franchise history.

AUGUST 1

Center Sylvia Fowles was named WNBA Western Conference

Player of the Month for July, her third consecutive monthly honor and the eighth of her career. Fowles averaged 21.1 ppg, 9.4 rpg and 2.38 bpg while shooting 71.7% from the floor and 81.6% from the line as Minnesota went 7-1 for the month.

AUGUST 3

The victory over Atlanta marked the Lynx' 20th of the year, extending their string of 20-win seasons to seven – the longest such run in WNBA history. Minnesota completed its 19th WNBA season by winning three in a row (and five of its last six contests) to finish with the league's best record for the fifth time in seven years.

Maya Moore was named the Sports Illustrated Performer of the Year.

DECEMBER 14

Sylvia Fowles was named Minnesota Professional Athlete of the Year at the Minnesota Sports Awards. The Lynx center won the award for her outstanding WNBA season as league and Finals MVP, and for her work in the community.

DECEMBER 27

Coach Cheryl Reeve was named the Star Tribune's Sportsperson of the Year.

Coach Cheryl Reeve was selected as an assistant coach for the 2018 USA Basketball Women's National Team.

APRIL 12

In the 2018 WNBA Draft, the Lynx selected Ji-Su Park and Khalia Lawrence with the 17th and 24th picks, respectively, before trading both players to the Las Vegas Aces for the 32nd overall selection Jilji Barta and the Aces' 2019 second-round selection. With the 36th pick, the Lynx selected University of Minnesota's Carlie Wagner.

MAY 16

In the WNBA's annual General Manager Survey, Lynx



forward Maya Moore was tabbed as the early favorite to win the MVP.

MAY 20

Maya Moore recreated the famous Michael Jordan “Wings” poster right across from the Lynx offices at Mayo Clinic Square.

MAY 20

In the season opener against the Los Angeles Sparks, the Lynx celebrated the 2017 Championship season and enjoyed a wonderful ring ceremony in front of a boisterous Target Center crowd.

MAY 23

Lindsay Whalen played in her 450th WNBA game, tying Becky Hammon for 9th all time. The Lynx downed the Wings, 76-68.

MAY 23

Sylvia Fowles recorded the first 20 point-20 rebound (23 points, 20 rebounds) game in Lynx regular-season history. The performance was the 18th such accomplishment in league history.

MAY 26

Fowles went 9-for-12 from the free-throw line against the Liberty and had then made 1,001 for her career. She’s the 20th player in WNBA history to reach such a mark.

JUNE 7

The Lynx celebrated the 2017 Championship with service in the Washington D.C. community. Minnesota teamed up with Samaritan’s Feet, a nonprofit that provides new socks and shoes to children in underserved communities. The team also visited Payne Elementary, a D.C. public elementary school where all the students are low-income, and 30 percent are homeless.

JUNE 7

With the victory over the Washington Mystics, the trio of Rebekkah Brunson, Maya Moore and Lindsay Whalen earned their 155th win together and became the winningest trio of players in WNBA history.

Additionally, Augustus passed DeLisha Milton-Jones to move to 11th on the WNBA’s all-time scoring list. At the time, Augustus had 5,573 career points.

JUNE 19

With the Lynx’s victory over the Dallas Wings, coach Cheryl Reeve earned her 200th career win, a milestone only seven other WNBA coaches have reached.

JUNE 25

Maya Moore was named the Western Conference Player of the Week for games played June 18 through June 24. The award was the 18th of her career. During the week, Moore led the West in minutes with 34.3 per game and ranked second in the Western Conference in scoring with 22.3 ppg.

JUNE 26

In the 91-79 win against the Seattle Storm, Maya Moore scored, what was then, a season-high 32 points on 52.2 percent shooting. It was the 21st time in Moore’s career she had scored 30 or more points.


