

After more than 26 seasons, 3,400 games and 10.5 million fans, there's no question that the West Michigan Whitecaps are firmly established as a pillar of the greater West Michigan community.

With more than 50 locations, 1,400 employees and 480,000 members, the same could be said about Lake Michigan Credit Union.

So, it only made sense for the two organizations to agree to a 10-year partnership this past offseason and bring a whole new ballgame this summer to the Whitecaps' newly named stadium, LMCU Ballpark.

"There are a lot of people here in West Michigan that are going to

benefit from these two organizations joining forces," Whitecaps President Steve McCarthy said. "It's only going to grow from here and add value to the entertainment offerings we have."

It's not the first time the ballpark has undergone a name change. The stadium debuted as Old Kent Park in 1994 and remained that way until 2000, when it was renamed Fifth Third Ballpark. And it remained that name for another 20 years until the Whitecaps and Fifth Third Bank decided to amicably part ways at the end of their most-recent sponsorship term.

In stepped LMCU, the largest credit union in Michigan, which previously had expressed an interest in growing its partnership with the Whitecaps. "Fifth Third was a wonderful partner, the timing just aligned" McCarthy said. "This partnership is going to springboard us to being in a good place as we work with LMCU and get the two teams working together on new promotions and ideas that will continue to make it fun for fans to come out to the ballpark."

The partnership is an extension of LMCU's focus on community involvement and support, which has been part of the organization's culture since it was founded in 1933. LMCU participates in hundreds of volunteer opportunities annually, and teaming up with the Whitecaps is another way to increase its community support.

In a statement, LMCU President



and CEO Sandra Jelinski said she is thrilled to have two well-known and well-respected organizations partner up in West Michigan.

"The positive impact the Whitecaps have on our community is something that I have admired for the last 27 years, certainly from a business perspective but also as a longstanding member of the community," Jelinski said. "We value the ongoing success of the Whitecaps as a premier entertainment and community-focused organization and are exceptionally pleased to partner with them for all of their banking needs. From one homegrown organization to another, we see this as a perfect fit for both of our teams. and we are excited about the future opportunities this partnership holds."

"We were incredibly excited to cement this partnership," Whitecaps CEO Joe Chamberlin said. "It took a lot of work, but the naming rights continue the momentum we enjoyed this past off-season and will help carry us through 2021."

The Whitecaps' front office staff has spent months working hard to update all of their marketing materials, including business cards, advertisements, souvenirs, social media content and, of course, the giant sign thousands of commuters see on a daily basis near Exit 91 on U.S. 131.

It may take fans a little while to get used to the stadium's name change, but McCarthy is confident that fans will make the adjustment quickly.

Especially as LMCU Ballpark continues to host hundreds of events annually, including baseball games, concerts, outdoor festivals, high school and college sports, fundraisers, corporate outings, weddings and more.

"Publicly, it's the name on a facility. But it also becomes an association with experiences," McCarthy said. "When you go to a baseball game or a concert or have a company picnic, what comes to mind is a location. When you think of the ballpark, that's your destination.

"LMCU is a community-focused organization. They believe in what the Whitecaps do, and we want to partner with them for years to come. We are going to make this a true community partnership."





West Michigan Whitecaps Vice President and General Manager Jim Jarecki has planned his summer schedules for decades using nothing more than a small, fold-up 3x3 pocket calendar. He knew when the Whitecaps would play at home, when they would be on the road, what time they would play, and even when he could enjoy a rare day off.

But he had an idea that might need to change on March 11, 2020. Jarecki, who has been with the Whitecaps since their 1994 debut, was enjoying dinner at HopCat with his wife, Christine, and son, Carson, when they noticed a scroll on ESPN announcing that the NBA had suspended their season due to coronavirus concerns. Other sports, like college basketball, the NHL, and PGA, would do the same.

The Whitecaps were less than a month away from their scheduled season-opening date on April 9 with the Lansing Lugnuts, but Jarecki and the rest of this staff continued preparing for the season opener with cautious optimism.

Of course, no one knew then exactly how massive and wide ranging the impacts of COVID-19 would be on everyone's lives.

"Nobody had answers, nobody knew what to say. It was such an unknown at that point," Jarecki said. "Maybe it will be a couple weeks, maybe a month or so. Then, as it started adding up, we knew it wasn't good.

"I'll be honest, when they said that on April 1 we're not going to have Opening Day, that's when we knew there was trouble."

As the days continued to pass, the Whitecaps held out hope that they would be able to play baseball at some point

in 2020. Jarecki did his best to remain transparent with the staff working remotely, keeping everyone informed during meetings held via Zoom and Microsoft Teams, and communicating regularly with the parent club Detroit Tigers. But it was difficult to answer questions because no one seemed to have any clear answers.

"We were very fortunate; we have a very strong staff. There were a lot of positive attitudes right from the get-go," Jarecki said. "People got frustrated because we weren't able to deliver on what we do best. But I give credit for the staff on how they handled themselves. There was no playbook for this. This was truly the unknown."

One answer finally came on June 30, when Major League Baseball announced that teams would not be providing players to minor league affiliates, effectively cancelling the entire 2020 season.

"These are unprecedented times for our country and our organization as this is the first time in our history that we've had a summer without Minor League Baseball played," Minor League Baseball President and CEO Pat O'Conner said in a statement at the time.


For the Jarecki family, it was especially disappointing. Carson had planned spend the summer working on the grounds crew, joining his dad and his siblings, Addison and Alex, at the ballpark.

To top it all off, Jarecki later did some research and discovered that the Whitecaps would have had only one rainout all season. After 27 years, it was difficult to process all the emotions.

"It's the experiences you miss. You miss the sounds of music playing in the ballpark, the opening of the gates, the fans rushing in," Jarecki said. "You miss seeing people leaving on a Saturday night feeling good and knowing you had a hand in those experiences."

It would have been easy for the Whitecaps to let their disappointment carry through the entire summer. Instead, they started brainstorming ideas for how they could use the ballpark to host events that could provide an escape and a sense of normalcy during an uncertain time. The Whitecaps have long hosted a variety of outdoor events, from concerts and festivals to weddings and picnics, but the pandemic forced the organization to put in a little extra work.

The Whitecaps contacted the Kent County Health Department in an effort to keep everyone as safe as possible. Then, in late July, the team started hosting family movie nights with a variety of safety measures put in place. The Whitecaps enforced strict social distancing guidelines and mask requirements. Capacity was limited to only 8 percent. Food transactions went cashless. Temperature checks were conducted prior to entry.



They also regularly interacted with fans via social media and hosted virtual fundraising events. They talked with other teams to find new ideas. Anything to maintain their connection with the West Michigan community.

"What I'll remember is working with the staff to continually reinvent what we were doing," Whitecaps President Steve McCarthy said. "Movie nights, small picnics, ways to have activities in whatever form or fashion we could. It was unusual because we're used to inviting half a million people into our home each summer and that was the one thing we couldn't do."

"I'm incredibly proud of this organization and team of people," Whitecaps CEO Joe Chamberlin said. "There aren't a lot of clubs that have the

staff that we have, who would have been able to pull through the way that we did."

Through it all, though, the organization was eager to host baseball games again.

Finally, in early January 2021, Major League Baseball informed all Double A and Class A affiliates that the 2021 season would be delayed, but it was being planned. On Feb. 18, MLB announced Class A teams would play a 120-game schedule starting in May.


At that point, more than 600 days had passed since the Whitecaps last played in front of their home fans, a 1-0 loss to the TinCaps, way back on Tuesday, August 27, 2019.


No matter how the 2021 season

ultimately plays out, everyone in the Whitecaps organization is going to appreciate spending time once again at LMCU Ballpark.

"The ballpark has always been one of those places people come to have fun. I don't know anybody who has come to the ballpark and didn't leave happy. Whether it's the grandpa bringing a grandson to their first game, or businesses getting together for an outing, you know it's a fun place to be. That's what we we're going to bring back."

"I think coming out of last year, we feel confident about our ability to get through just about anything," Chamberlin said. "In a weird way, it's a confidence booster. But it's not one I would recommend anyone going through again."



BRAYAN PEÑA

MANAGER

In November 2019, former Detroit Tigers catcher Brayan Peña was named the 14th manager in West Michigan Whitecaps history. The 38-year old will look to return the club to the playoffs after missing the Midwest League postseason for the first time in six seasons last year. Peña arrives in West Michigan to lead the team beginning in 2021 after managing the short-season 2019 Connecticut Tigers of the New York-Penn League. In 2018, Peña made his managerial debut as the skipper of the Gulf Coast League Tigers-West team and led the club to Detroit's first-ever GCL Championship. Peña replaces Lance Parrish, who spent two seasons as Whitecaps manager before being reassigned as a Special Assistant to Tigers Executive Vice President, Baseball Operations and General Manager Al Avila.

The native of Havana, Cuba, played for five different Major League teams and was part of the 2013 Tigers Central Division Championship roster. Peña broke into the big leagues in 2005 as a member of the Atlanta Braves before joining the Kansas City Royals for four seasons before his Tigers arrival. Peña's 2013 season in Detroit was punctuated by a .297 batting average – the highest in his Major League career while playing in 71 games as the backup to former Tigers and Whitecaps catcher Alex Avila. In his final game as a Tiger, Peña took over for an injured Avila in Game 5 of the American League Championship Series against the Boston Red Sox, going 1-for-3 with an RBI-single. After leaving Detroit, Peña spent the next two seasons as the primary catcher with the Cincinnati Reds in 2014 and 2015 before playing his final big-league season with the St. Louis Cardinals in 2016.

Upon the start of the 2018 season, Peña returned to the Tigers as a Minor League free agent but quickly transitioned into a role in coaching. Later that summer, he was named the manager of the Tigers West Gulf Coast League souad.

Peña currently resides in Miami, Florida during the off-season with his wife, Lina and their children Brayan Jr., Javy, and Isabella.



WILLIE BLAIR

PITCHING COACH

Former Tigers pitcher and 12-year MLB veteran Willie Blair returns for his second season as pitching coach. He previously spent three seasons in the same role for Detroit's Double-A Erie affiliate – two of which he served under former Whitecaps manager Lance Parrish. Blair arrived with Midwest League ties, having made a start with West Michigan during a Major League rehab assignment back in 1997, and serving as pitching coach for the Fort Wayne TinCaps for two seasons in 2011 and 2012. His 1997 season saw him achieve a career-best 16–8 record and an earned run average (ERA) of 4.17. In 1999, Blair was the starting pitcher for the final Opening Day in Tiger Stadium history, where he threw eight shutout innings of three-hit baseball.

The native of Paintsville, KY, went to the postseason in 1996 as a member of the San Diego Padres, throwing two innings in relief during the National League Division Series against the St. Louis Cardinals

Resides is Richmond, KY in the off-season with his wife Trina, daughter Paige and sons Taylor and Jaxson

BILL SPRINGMAN

HITTING COACH

Springman returns for his fourth year in the Tigers organization, serving as the hitting coach at High-A West Michigan in 2021. If not for the COVID-19 pandemic, he would have held the same role with Single A Lakeland in 2020, following his time as hitting coach at Short-Season Connecticut in 2019.

In 2018, he served as the hitting coach for the Gulf Coast League Tigers West, after spending 2017 as the hitting coach for the Uni-Lions of the Chinese Professional Baseball League. Prior to coaching in the Chinese Professional Baseball League, he spent the 2015 season as an advisor to player development and senior hitting advisor for the Kansas City Royals. He previously spent 14 seasons in the Minnesota Twins organization serving in various including as a Minor League hitting coordinator and mental skills coach (2006-14), Triple A coach (2005) and Triple A Salt Lake hitting coach (1997-2000). Springman also served as a scout for the Chicago Cubs (1995-96) and Milwaukee Brewers (2001-02). Originally drafted by the California Angels in the seventh round of the 1978 draft, the former infielder played three seasons in the Angels Minor League system.

Brown University graduate Kevin Guthrie joins the Whitecaps for his first season in 2020 and first in the Tigers system after two years in Minor League Operations for the Pittsburgh Pirates. The Ivy-leaguer spent his collegiate days at Brown University, playing in 91 career games. As a two-way player, the native of Sarasota, Florida, posted a .309 on-base percentage as a first baseman while pitching in 25 contests. He also serves as a Director for Diamond Diagnostics Baseball - a company that offers hitting and pitching lessons integrating advanced, professional technologies.

Guthrie's father is longtime Major Leaguer Mark Guthrie, who pitched parts of 15 seasons for eight MLB teams, including the 1991 World Series Champion Minnesota Twins. Kevin's brother Dalton played college baseball for the University of Florida and became a sixth-round selection of the 2017 MLB Draft by the Philadelphia Phillies.

TAKE NOTHING FOR GRANTED

Brayan Peña has no problem climbing out of bed when his alarm goes off at 5:30 a.m. each morning.

Not because he's healthy, happy and has a beautiful family. Not just because he was lucky enough to parlay a 12-year Major League Baseball career into a nascent coaching career that now includes his first season as manager of the West Michigan Whitecaps. It's because he knows just how far he's come – and how far he still wants to go.

And if he can help a few young ballplayers realize their own dreams, even better.

"I wake up every single day telling myself, 'Take nothing for granted,'" he said. "After everything that I went through and everything that is going on now, you can't take anything for granted."

In baseball circles, Pena's story is well known. In a first-person column published online by The Players Tribune in 2016, Pena described in detail how he defected to the United States in 1999 as a 16-year-old playing for the

Cuban national team. With nothing but the clothes on his back during a tournament in Venezuela, he climbed out an open window in a hotel bathroom – a security guard was waiting for him right outside the door – and sprinted to a waiting car, where a friend helped ferry him to Costa Rica.

He had no money and no passport. No one in his family had any clue he was leaving. What he had, though, is what he called his "window of opportunity."

"It was my dream to play in the big leagues, but it wasn't like I was some big star and had an MLB team waiting to sign me to a million dollar contract. I was just a chubby 16-year-old catcher from Havana who was a pretty decent ballplayer," he wrote. "If I got caught trying to defect, the consequences would be devastating."


Fortunately, he made it safely to Costa Rica and quickly was signed by the Atlanta Braves as an amateur free agent in 2000. He debuted in the majors in 2005 and went on to spend time with the Kansas City Royals, Detroit Tigers, Cincinnati Reds, St. Louis Cardinals. While his career numbers may appear modest – 468 hits, 164 RBIs, .259 average – his value as a backup catcher and role players was undeniable.

"I was a grinder. A grinder with all capital letters: GRINDER," Peña said. "I went out there and gave it my all, 100 percent. The good and bad moments, I enjoyed every single one of them. I respected the jersey I was wearing and, most important, I showed that anything is possible.

"I believe in the American Dream because I'm one of those guys. I came from Cuba, I didn't have anything and America gave me an opportunity to be a citizen, which has been one of the

most important things in my life. It's something I'm very proud and honored to be part of."

The 2013 season Peña spent with the Tigers arguably was the best of his career, with a career high .297 batting average and .713 OPS. It also marked his lone postseason appearance, and he was honored to play alongside stars like Miguel Cabrera, Torii Hunter, Victor Martinez, Max Scherzer and Justin Verlander during the Tigers' run to the American League Championship Series.

"It was a blessing to be a part of that team," Peña said. "We came up short, but we enjoyed each other, we respected each other, we learned a lot from each other and that's what it's all about." Following the 2017 season, the Tigers signed Peña to a minor league contract with an invitation to spring training. He was released on June 11, 2018 and announced his retirement one week later. He wasn't idle for long, though, as he immediately stepped into a managerial position with one of the Tigers' two Gulf Coast League teams. That summer, Peña led his team to a 37-16 record and its first-ever league championship.

Then, in November, the Whitecaps announced that the 38-year-old would be the team's 14th manager in franchise history, replacing Tigers legend Lance Parrish, who had been reassigned as a special assistant to Detroit General Manager Al Avila.

Peña paid his first extended visit to West Michigan this past January as part of the Tigers' Winter Caravan, but he said the Whitecaps' reputation as a prominent minor league franchise preceded that trip.

"It's very famous because they treat everybody like big leaguers. That's their motto," Peña said. "Everybody was always talking about that. 'The fans will treat you like a big leaguer, the front office treats you like a big leaguer, the press, everybody.'"

Now Peña is focused on carrying on the winning tradition of the Whitecaps, who have won six Midwest League

championships in franchise history and have served as a steady pipeline to the majors in Detroit. To help him, Peña will rely on the lessons he learned playing for legendary managers that have won World Series titles: Jim Leyland, Bobby Cox and Ned Yost.

"My goal is always to put our players in position to be successful. With that being said, I understand that this is a very tough game," Peña said. "I want to give them everything that I know, all my experiences, everything that I learned along the way from great managers.

"I love players who hustle hard. I love the players who go out there and represent not just themselves, but represent our organization and what the Detroit Tigers are all about. I'm a very aggressive manager. I love to handle the bullpen in the right way because I believe that you need to know how to handle your pitching staff to be in position to win close games."

Peña can relate to the experience of his players since he went through the

same situations as a young catcher. Even though his playing days aren't that far in the past, Peña isn't dwelling on the end of his career or longing for one last at-bat at Comerica Park. He wants to help new players feel grateful and appreciative for every day spent at the ballpark.

"Honestly, I'm great with my decision. What I mean by that, is the day that I decided to put my spikes to the side and I left my gear in my garage, that's something I have no regrets about," he said. "It was time for me to continue my baseball career, but on a different path. I always knew I wanted to be a manager one day, I always knew that I wanted to pass along everything I learned along the way and give back to the game. Every single moment, every single opportunity on the field, I gave it my all. But I don't miss it at all. I was very happy, very humbled, to accept this assignment."

Peña's story of risking it all and overcoming the odds to become both an American citizen and Major League

ballplayer isn't lost on the current generation. He said that whether rookies are drafted out of high school or college or signed as free agents from countries such as Dominican Republic or Venezuela they are immediately researching their new coaching staff. Along the way, they are bound to learn about the inspirational path Peña took to West Michigan.

"And that's OK. That's creating that relationship and that's what we want as an organization," he said. "Remember, we're not just coaches. We are friends, brothers, fathers, sometimes financial advisors, sometimes we are psychologists. We are the closest thing our players have to a family. A lot of them are far away from home and that's a lot of responsibility, making sure they trust you and they believe in you.

"I was blessed to be able to play at the highest level for so many years. Now, I have an opportunity to give back to the game."

THE HISTORY OF THE







In 1947, six baseball franchises were established as the Class D Illinois State League. However, the league didn't stay exclusive to Illinois for long. When the Marion Indians relocated to Paducah, KY in 1940, the league's name changed to the Mississippi-Ohio Valley League, in recognition of its expanding boundaries.


The Mississippi-Ohio Valley League expanded to include two teams from Iowa in 1954, resulting in the circuit's moniker, the Midwest League. The league's membership increased significantly in 1961 after the collapse of the Class B IllinoisIndiana-Iowa League. The following season, the defunct leagues Appleton, Burlington, and Cedar Rapids franchises joined the Midwest League. One year later, after a reorganization of the Minor League categorization system, the Midwest League was classified as a Class A league, a designation that remains until 2020.

In 1982, the league expanded to 12 teams by adding the Beloit Brewers, Danville Suns, Madison Muskies, and the Springfield Cardinals. The league expanded to 14 teams in 1988 with the addition of franchises in South

Bend, Indiana and Rockford, Illinois. During the 1990s, several teams changed cities: Kenosha, Madison, Rockford, Springfield, Waterloo, and Wausau lost teams during the '90s, while Battle Creek, Dayton, Fort Wayne, West Michigan, Kane County, and Lansing gained teams. The 2010 season brought the addition of two more teams to the league: the Bowling Green Hot Rods and the Lake County Captains. Both teams were members of the South Atlantic League before bringing balance to the Eastern and Western Divisions of the Midwest League.

The Fort Wayne TinCaps are currently the oldest franchise in the league. The Tincaps started as the Mattoon Indians in 1947 and played in Keokuk, IA, Wisconsin Rapids, WI, and Kenosha, WI before moving to Fort Wayne in 1993. The Clinton Lumber Kings hold the distinction of being in one city the longest, having played in Clinton from 1954-2019.

Beginning in 2021, the Midwest League is known as High-A Central after Major League Baseball's reorganization of MiLB.





Many of the Detroit Tigers' top prospects probably had to pack a little differently at the start of this season.

In the past, most of Detroit's first and second-round draft picks likely would have stayed in Florida when spring training ended and played for the Lakeland Tigers. However, when the parent club Tigers announced in December that the West Michigan Whitecaps would be their new High-A affiliate, that meant rookies probably needed to bring a few extra layers to deal with the unpredictability of spring in Michigan rather than Florida.

And that actually was probably just fine with them.

"I think a lot of the guys were looking forward to it, to be honest," Whitecaps Vice President and General Manager Jim Jarecki said. "The way the draft works, a lot of the top guys would go down to the Florida State League, where it's 92, 93 degrees and humid, and it's not the most ideal conditions to play in."

In addition to a generally cooler climate, the Whitecaps offer plenty of additional incentives for young players chasing their major league dreams, including:

- A long track record of success, with six Midwest League titles
- Top tier baseball facilities at LMCU Ballpark,
- Closer proximity to coaching staff and front office personnel in Detroit
- The opportunity to regularly play in front of thousands of loyal fans.

"I love this level of baseball. We kind of operate and approach what we do much closer to what a Triple-A or Double-A team would do anyway," Whitecaps CEO Joe Chamberlin said. "We think this is a great fit. Grand Rapids is truly one of the best markets out there, and the fans are going to appreciate the change."

"The Whitecaps have been standout partners for us, and do a great job ensuring our players are in the best position for growth and development to become impactful contributors to our organization," Al Avila, Tigers Executive Vice President of Baseball Operations and General Manager, said in a press release.

Since their debut in 1994, the Whitecaps' mission

has been to provide affordable family entertainment options, which have been enjoyed by nearly 11 million fans and counting, and that won't change. The minor league promotion only enhances West Michigan's already strong relationship with the Tigers, which dates back to 1997, and raises the level of talent fans see on the field.

"This is a meaningful promotion," Chamberlin said. "Going from Low-A to High-A is a big jump in development. From a prospect perspective, it was not uncommon for us to miss those top-tier prospects as they kind of skipped Low-A and went right to High-A. Now, we'll likely see every top-tier prospect playing in West Michigan and they'll be one step closer to playing at Comerica Park."

Lakeland is now Detroit's Low-A affiliate, while the Tigers' Triple-A and Double-A teams remain in Toledo and Erie, respectively. The Tigers also have rookie teams in the Gulf Coast and Dominican leagues.


The promotion was one of a number of changes

that affected baseball at all levels this past off season. Approximately 40 teams lost their affiliations when Major League Baseball announced that each parent club would have one team at each of the four levels of the minor leagues for a total of 120 clubs. Major League Baseball also announced new minor league alignments, which placed the Whitecaps in the High-A Central League that is made up of teams that were formerly in the Midwest League with West Michigan.

While former opponents like the Burlington Bees, Clinton LumberKings and Kane County Cougars did not join the newly formed league, the Whitecaps never felt like they were in danger of losing their connection with the Tigers or minor league baseball.

"This was part of the larger restructuring and shifting of the minor league baseball footprint that has been underway for quite some time. We knew there were lots of possibilities, but we never had to sweat it," Chamberlin said. "The No. 1 driver of who was going to remain an affiliate was the opinion of the big league


club. We have a great relationship with the Tigers, and we feel like we are on really solid ground with them. We felt really good about where we were, but we weren't worried about being on the outside looking in."

It's a testament to the continued support of the fans, who have been eager to return to the ballpark after missing the entire 2020 season due to the Coronavirus pandemic. The affiliation promotion also further enhances the status of minor league sports in West Michigan. That's one reason why Grand Rapids/

Comstock Park was named "Top Minor League Market" in the United States by Street and Smith's Sports Business Journal in 2019.

"From a community pride perspective, I don't think the promotion happens if we're averaging 750 fans a game," Whitecaps President Steve McCarthy said. "The Tigers know that West Michigan has a great fanbase and they aren't hesitant of moving us up a level, and that's a credit to our fans."

ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICES: The West Michigan Whitecaps administrative offices are open Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. until 5 p.m. On game days our ticket office is open from 10:00 a.m. until after the game and can be reached at (616)784-4131.

ALCOHOL MANAGEMENT: In compliance with Michigan state law, anyone under the age of 21 will not be served alcohol at LMCU Ballpark. If customers wish to consume alcohol while at LMCU Ballpark, they must have their hand stamped. Customers can get their hand stamped at any alcohol sales location. Violators of the law will be removed from LMCU Ballpark. As part of our alcohol management policy, the Whitecaps offer free cab rides.

ALTOGAS BARBEQUE AREAS: Enjoy a pre-game or in-game barbeque on the first or third base Altogas Grill Area. Let the Whitecaps serve your group dinner and then head to a reserved seating section with your group to watch the game.

APPEARANCES: On pause until further notice.

ATM: A LMCU Bank ATM is located behind home plate at Gate A.

AUTOGRAPHS: Until further notice, autographs will not be permitted in 2021.






