THE COACHES

TOM LANDRY — Head Coach

Tom Landry, a native of Texas and a veteran player and coach in the National Football League, was a natural choice to coach Dallas' new entry

in the strongest league in the history of football.

Born in the Rio Grande Valley, Landry has made Texas his home through the 36 years of his life, except for the past 11 autumns which he has spent establishing himself as one of the finest defensive strategists the game has ever known. He molded that reputation as a halfback and defensive coach with the New York Giants of the NFL and a halfback with the New York Yankees of the old All-American Conference.

Landry was born in Mission, Texas, in 1924. After graduating from Mission High School, where he was an all-regional fullback, Landry enrolled

in the University of Texas in the fall of 1942.

He remained there only one semester, however, before entering the Army Air Corps in 1943. He earned his wings as a B-17 pilot and flew 30

combat missions with the Eighth Air Force.

After his discharge in November of 1945, Landry returned to the University of Texas and played football three years. He was co-captain his senior year and second team All-Southwest Conference his junior year. He was a mainstay on Longhorn teams that whipped Alabama in the 1948 Sugar Bowl, 27-7, and Georgia in the 1949 Orange Bowl, 41-28.

Landry met his wife, Alicia, at Texas and they were married in January, 1949, four months before he received a bachelor of business administration degree. They now have three children — Tom, Jr. aged 10; Kitty, seven;

and Lisa, two.

In 1949 Landry joined the old New York Yankees, playing offensive and defensive halfback. When the two leagues merged Landry began his ten-year association with the Giants and began building the reputation that now ranks him among the best all-time defensive coaches.

He was an active player from 1950 through 1953 and a player-coach in 1954 and '55, handling the Giants' defense. In 1956, he retired as a player and became the full-time defensive coach. From 1950 through 1953, he was a defensive halfback in Steve Owen's famed umbrella pass defense.

He was named to the All-Pro defensive team in 1954.

The Giants enjoyed their greatest successes during Landry's stay with them. They lost a playoff to Cleveland in 1950 for the Eastern Division championship. In 1956, Landry's first year as full-time coach, the Giants won the world championship in a 47-7 rout over the Chicago Bears. They won the division title in 1958 and '59, after which Giant Head Coach Jim Lee Howell called Landry "the best defensive coach in the business."

Among the many defensive records the Giants set during Landry's stay with them are these NFL firsts: recovered 27 of 43 opponents fumbles in

1950; intercepted 41 passes in 1951.

During Landry's tenure as full-time defensive coach, the Giants fashioned a 33-14-1 record in regular play.

He became a Dallas resident in 1957. During the off-season he is associated with Gus Hansch and Associates (Insurance) of Dallas.

ASSISTANT COACHES

BORIS "BABE" DIMANCHEFF, Assistant Coach of the Dallas Cowboys, is a veteran of seven years as a player and three years as a coach in professional football. He is a native of Indianapolis, Indiana, and a graduate of Purdue University.

Coach Dimancheff began his "pro" playing career with the Boston Yanks in 1945 as a halfback. Following the 1956 season he joined the Chicago Cardinals and played with that team from 1947 through 1950. He was a regular on the Cardinals' NFL Championship Teams of 1947 and 1948. He held Cardinal records for Most Yardage Cained on Kickoff Returns and Longest Kickoff Returns. His final year as an active player was the 1952 season when he was a regular with the Chicago Bears.

Dimancheff's coaching experience has been varied and extensive. In 1951 he served as a backfield coach at Butler University and held the same position at Purdue University in 1953. He took over the outstanding high school football team of Hamtramck, Michigan, which he coached in 1954-55-56. He then joined the NFL as an offensive backfield coach with the Pittsburgh Steelers.

Dimancheff was born in Indianapolis in 1922. He graduated from Washington High there in June, 1940. In high school he lettered in football, basketball, and track and was captain of the football and basketball teams. Among his high school honors were the Dyer Medal Award in 1940 for Best Character and Athlete in the City of Indianapolis, and being named All-City and All-State in both football and basketball in 1940.

He played freshman football at Butler in 1940, then left halfback on the Varsity in the 1941-42 seasons. His college career at Butler University was interrupted by a hitch with Uncle Sam. Following his discharge from the service he entered Purdue University where he switched to fullback for the 1943-44 seasons. He captained the 1944 team when he was chosen All-America, All-Big Ten, All-Midwest, Most Valuable Player at Purdue, Chicago Tribune Most Valuable Player in Big Nine, and was chosen to play in the East-West Shrine Game. At Purdue he led the Big-Ten Conference in scoring during the 1944 season with 72 points.

He graduated from Purdue in 1945 with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Physical Education. He is married to the former Hilda Hine, also a native of Indianapolis.

ASSISTANT COACHES

TOM DAHMS, an All-America tackle in his collegiate days at San Diego State College and a veteran of seven years as a player in the NFL, will coach the defensive line.

Dahms, who coached last season at the University of Virginia, broke into pro football with the Los Angeles Rams in 1951 and played offensive tackle on the Ram eleven that won the NFL Championship that season. After four years with the Rams, Dahms saw action as a player with the Green Bay Packers, Chicago Cardinals and San Francisco 49ers.

Following his final collegiate season at San Diego, Dahms had coached the line at San Diego Naval Training Center, and he returned to that area when he quit playing in the pro loop, taking a post as Athletic Director at San Diego Junior High School for 1958. After one year on that job he took over as the defensive line coach at Virginia, where he was coaching when summoned by the Cowboys.

A native of California, he was born in San Diego and attended high school in that city. In college, he was named on the 1949 All-America team, the Little All-Coast by both the Associated Press and the United Press and Tom Harmon's All-America.

Highlights of his pro career were the '51 season with the Rams when the Rams defeated the Cleveland Browns 21-17 for the title, the 1956 campaign when he was with the Cardinals and that team finished second in the Eastern Division and then the 1957 season when as a member of the 49ers he was involved in the tight race to the wire with the Detroit Lions which saw the Lions win the Western Division championship in a 31-27 playoff victory over the 49ers.

BRAD ECKLUND, came to the Cowboys from an assistant line coaching post at the University of Oregon.

Thirty-six-year-old Ecklund was born in Los Angeles. He moved to Portland and attended high school in Milwaukee, Oregon. He attended the University of Oregon one year before entering the Marine Corps in 1941 and served until 1945.

Ecklund played with the University of Oregon from 1946 through 1948, during which time that team played in the Cotton Bowl. Upon completion of college, he started playing with the New York Yankees team which was in the All-American Conference, then became the Yanks of the N.F.L. which team existed in New York for two years. Then the franchise moved to Dallas to become the Dallas Texans of the N.F.L. in 1952. Ecklund was the All-Pro Center in 1950 and 1951. After his pro playing career, he began coaching in high schools—first at Gresham, Oregon, where his boys were state finalists two of his three years there and were league champs all three years. Then he went to Roseberg High School for one year where his team was runner-up to the league champs. For the past two years he has been assistant line coach at the University of Oregon.

THE COWBOYS

GENE BABB, 6-3, 220, fullback in his third year of pro ball after starring for Austin College in Sherman, Texas . . . obtained by the Cowboys from the 49ers . . . a Golden Gloves boxer in college, he has been used both as a runner and pass receiver by the Cowboys . . . ran 30 times for 59 yards and caught four passes for 38 more in pre-season contests.

BOB BERCICH, 5-11, 185, defensive halfback . . . Michigan State ex playing his first season in the National Football League . . . 24 years old, he came to the Cowboys from the New York Giants . . . impressed Giant coaches with his liking for defensive football.

RICHARD ADAM BIELSKI, 6-1, 228, end came to the Cowboys from the Philadelphia Eagles where he holds the club record with two 50-yard field goals . . . a 27-year-old end, with six years NFL experience, put the majority of his kickoffs out of the end zone last season, and caught 15 passes for 264 yards and one TD . . . is used primarily as a short pass receiver . . . at Maryland University he won fame as a fullback and blocker . . . he caught 11 passes for 103 yards in pre-season games.

DON BISHOP, 6-1, 204, defensive end and tackle starting his second year in pro ball . . . a native of Los Angeles, who attended City College of Los Angeles, the 24-year-old defensive specialist was with the Chicago Bears last season.

NATE BORDEN, 6-1, 240, 27-year-old defensive end, having five years NFL experience, came to the Cowboys from Green Bay Packers . . . playing in 36 straight games he never missed one while at the University of Indiana . . . as a freshman he played tackle, end in his sophomore and junior years and back to tackle in his senior year . . . first string defensive end the last four seasons for the Packers, was All-State fullback and tackle at Jersey City, N.J., High School . . . makes his home in Cincinnati.

TOM BRAATZ, 6-2, 211, line backer, with three years experience in NFL... was acquired by the Cowboys from the Washington Redskins, and has also been with the Los Angeles Rams and Green Bay Packers... this 27-year-old Marquette product switched from end to linebacker as a rookie in the season with Green Bay... is a native of Kenosha, Wisconsin.

BYRON BRADFUTE, 6-3, 246, offensive tackle from Beeville, Texas, who played his college football at Mississippi Southern after transferring from Abilene Christian College . . . started final three pre-season games at right tackle.

BILL BUTLER, 5-10, 182, defensive safety, from Windy Hills, South Carolina . . . came to the Cowboys from the Green Bay Packers with one year of NFL experience . . . graduated from Chattanooga University, and was used primarily as a punt return and kick-off return specialist last season . . . this 23-year-old has good speed and is a shifty runner . . . last year he ran a punt back against the Bears for a 70-yard touchdown.

FRANK CLARKE, 6-1, 210, wingback with three years NFL experience . . . this 26-year-old Colorado product was drafted sixth in 1956 . . . competed in football, basketball and track at University of Colorado . . . saw limited duty at offensive right end the last two seasons with Browns . . . before going to Colorado, he spent two years at Trinidad (Colo.) Junior College, where he was elected "King" of the CU days, annual spring campus celebration . . . lives in Cleveland, Ohio . . . top Cowboy receiver in pre-season games with 14 catches for 382 yards and four touchdowns.

FRED CONE 5-11, 198, fullback and placement specialist, who has seven years NFL experience with the Green Bay Packers, has been coaching at University Military School in Mobile, Alabama . . . a 34-year-old Clemson product who played in two bowl games . . . was an outstanding fullback and kicking specialist at Green Bay, and led the league in 1955 in field goals with 16.

MIKE CONNELLY, 6-3, 235, rookie center from Utah State . . . came to Cowboys from Los Angeles Rams after pre-season schedule was completed . . . 24 years old.

GENE CRONIN, 6-2, 230, defensive end, is one of the comparative unknowns of college football who has made a name for himself in the pro ranks . . . this 26-year-old College of Pacific graduate was obtained by the Cowboys from the Detroit Lions, where he had four years experience . . . a Sacramento native, who was tabbed on the sixth round in 1956, excells at putting pressure on passers . . . a personable Irish descendent, earned considerable recognition from pro scouts in the East-West game of 1956.

PAUL DICKSON, 6-5, 250, offensive tackle who starred for Baylor University for three years before going to Los Angeles in 1959... the 22-year-old native of Uvalde, Texas, played in 10 games for the Rams last year on alternate unit ... nicknamed "Suitcase" because of his large hands and feet.

FRED DOELLING, 5-10, 190, rookie defensive halfback from Penn... all-time ground gaining leader at Penn, he was selected All-Ivy League and All-East last year by the Associated Press... gained 707 yards on 133 carries and lead team to league championship... 21 years old... native of Valparaiso, Indiana.

JAMES DORAN, 6-2, 216, end obtained by the Cowboys from the Detroit Lions after nine years NFL experience . . . ranked fourth in the NFL in average gain per completion standings, recording 22.5 yard average on 22 catches, he has caught 118 passes in the last four seasons . . . great hands enable Doran to make some of the most outstanding catches in NFL . . . also deceptive speed plus know-how makes him one of the most dangerous receivers in the game . . . this 33-year-old Iowa State product took up the game late in career, as sophomore in college, but still managed to establish an NCAA record by gaining 203 yards on eight catches against Oklahoma as a junior in 1949 . . . earning early honors in NFL as tenacious defensive end, he was most valuable player by note of teammates in Lions title year of 1952 . . . his 10 receptions gained 104 yards in pre-season play.

FRED DUGAN, 6-3, 195, offensive end with two years NFL experience, came to Cowboys from the San Francisco 49ers . . . 25 years old, a Stamford, Conn. native, he made spectacular catches as a rookie in 1958, although his playing time was limited, nabbed nine passes for 122 yards . . . is an excellent faker with good speed . . . won All-America recognition at Dayton where he also played defensive halfback and safety . . . caught more passes than any other Cowboy in pre-season games — 15 for 230 yards and two touchdowns.

L. G. DUPRE, 5-11, 190, offensive halfback with five years NFL experience . . . 27 years old, this Maryland product came to the Cowboys from the Baltimore Colts . . . this high-spirited line-slasher ripped through opposing defenses for 390 yards and a 4.2 average last year to increase his four-year pro output to 1,285 yards . . . "Long Gone" also caught 71 passes for 819 yards while he was with the Colts via the third round of the 1955 draft . . . he had attracted attention at Baylor by rushing 593 yards for a school record in 1953 . . . is originally from New Orleans, a steady performer who rarely fails to pick up that vital first down yardage, even if it means hurtling a pile of enemy linemen . . . busiest ball-carrier of pre-season action, he carried 39 times for 157 yards and a 4-yard-per-try average . . . caught six passes for 26 yards.

MIKE FALLS, 6-1, 240, offensive guard from University of Minnesota . . . 26-year-old resident of Brainerd, Minn., came to the Cowboys week of opening game on waivers from Green Bay Packers . . . expected to fill in as reserve guard behind Putnam and Guy.

RAY FISHER, 6-1, 247, defensive tackle, from Charleston, Illinois, came to the Cowboys from the Pittsburgh Steelers . . . 26 years old, his college career was at Eastern Illinois and he has one year of experience in the league.

TOM FRANCKHAUSER, 6-10, 190, defensive back, after one year NFL experience came to the Cowboys from the Los Angeles Rams . . . a happy

combination of speed, receiving ability, competitive spirit and versatility made this ex-Purdue co-captain appealing to the Rams when they made him their third round draft choice a year ago . . . he was shifted from end where he played in college, to the defensive backfield, then finished the season as a starter at a safety position . . . an outstanding tackler, he also intercepted three of the seven intercepted passes for the Rams during the 1959 season . . . played in both the East-West game and the Senior Bowl game; was voted by his teammates at Purdue as the squad's most valuable player . . . he is a native of Stuebenville, Ohio.

BOB FRY, 6-4, 233, has been a starter all five years of his NFL experience despite the fact that he ranks among the lightest offensive tacklers in the league . . . came to the Cowboys from the Los Angeles Rams, where he started as a rookie in 1953 . . . he spent two years in the service . . . then took up right where he left off in 1956 . . . speed, mobility and great blocking techniques make up for what Bob lacks in size, although often he is required to give up as much as 25 pounds to his opponent of the day . . . this 27-year-old, whose home is Cincinnati was drafted by the Rams on the third round after a brilliant career at Kentucky.

JOHN GONZAGA, 6-3, 250, offensive tackle was obtained by the Cowboys from the San Francisco 49ers . . . with four years NFL experience, is one of the few non-college players who have made good in pro football . . . was starting left tackle on offensive for three seasons . . . graduating from Mt. Diablo High in Concord, California, he went to work to support his family . . . while playing semi-pro ball he was recommended to the 49ers, and began a successful career . . . he is 27 years old.

MELWOOD "BUZZ" GUY, 6-3, 248, offensive guard, came to the Cowboys from the New York Giants, after two years NFL experience . . . drafted third by Cleveland Browns in 1958, the Giants acquired him as a free agent after Cleveland released him that year . . . this 24-year-old lettered three years at Duke and alternated between guard and tackle . . . earned All-Sectional, All-Conference and All-State honors with the Blue Devils . . . at his home in St. Petersburg, Florida, he works in the steel business during off season.

WAYNE HANSEN, 6-2, 228, center obtained from the Chicago Bears . . . one of league's oldest hands in point of service . . . now in tenth year of NFL play . . . one of several Texas natives on Cowboy roster, he played college ball at Texas Western . . . 30 years old, joined Cowboys after one year of retirement.

DON HEALY, 6-3, 273, guard, with two years NFL experience . . . another great lineman from Maryland, was top line star for College All-Stars against Detroit Lions in 1958 game . . . a member of East team in Shrine game and

Senior Bowl, was rated fastest Maryland tackle to enter pro football in recent years . . . originally Cleveland's No. 3 choice, he was traded to the Chicago Bears in 1958 . . . improved steadily through his rookie season, particularly in in-line blocking, pulling, trapping and open field work . . . the 23-year-old Rome, N.Y. native came to the Cowboys from the Chicago Bears.

DON HEINRICH, 6-0, 180, quarterback with six years NFL experience . . . this 29-year-old Washington University product came to the Cowboys from the New York Giants . . . drafted on third round in 1951 as a future, he was starting quarterback on the 1956 title team . . . was used primarily to probe opposing defenses before Chuck Conerly came into the game to capitalize on weaknesses . . . a shrewd play caller, he led the nations collegiate passer in 1950 and 1952 . . . his 60.9 percent of completions in 1950 set an NCAA record . . . missed 1951 season because of a shoulder separation . . . played for Fort Ord while in service . . . his completion percentage with the Giants was 41.2 on 112 completions in 269 attempts, and his passes were good for 1,475 yards, 12 TDs, and 13 interceptions . . . he lives in Bremerton, Washington . . . has thrown for three touchdowns in pre-season games, completing 22 of 67 passes for 271 yards.

BILL HERCHMAN, 6-1, 246, defensive tackle and a five-year veteran of the National Football League . . . did all his football playing in his hometown with Lubbock High and Texas Tech before joining the pros . . . played in every game with San Francisco last year . . . 26 years old, came to Cowboys in trade with 49ers.

JOHN HOUSER, 6-2, 238, another young professional who proved himself in two seasons with the Rams . . . the 23-year-old graduate of Redlands University saw action in every Los Angeles game last year . . . lives in Encino, California . . . was end and fullback in college, but was capable at both guard and center with the Rams.

BILL HOWTON, 6-2, 195, one of the all-time great pass receivers in the NFL . . . a seven-year veteran with the Green Bay Packers and Cleveland Browns, Howton went to pro stardom after winning All-American honors at Rice in 1952 . . . ranks second to Don Hutson as Packers' all-time leading receiver . . . has caught 342 passes for 6,091 yards and 44 touchdowns . . . sensational as rookie when he caught 53 passes for 1,231 yards and 13 touchdowns . . . president of NFL Players' Association . . . attended school at Plainview, Texas . . . he's now a contractor in Houston during the off season.

ED HUSMANN, 6-0, 230, defensive tackle and linebacker from University of Nebraska . . . after five years NFL experience, he came to the Cowboys from the St. Louis Cardinals where he was ninth draft choice in 1953 . . . this 28-year-old Ogallah, Nebraska resident earned three letters

in football and two in wrestling at Nebraska . . . won starting offensive guard job in 1953, went into service the following year and has done a good job wherever used since returning in 1956.

DICK KLEIN, 6-4, 255, one of 16 first and second-year men to make grade with the Chicago Bears last year when they finished one game behind the champion Colts in the Western Division after scoring a 26-21 victory over the Colts . . . 25-year-old former Iowa star . . . lives in Pana, Illinois.

WALT KOWALCZYK, 6-0, 205, fullback who starred in college at Michigan State . . . came to Cowboys from Detroit after playing two seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles . . . one of lightest fullbacks in the league . . . 25 years old . . . lives in Philadelphia during off season.

EDDIE LE BARON, 5-7, 160, from College of Pacific . . . most honored player of all time, with seven years NFL experience as Washington Redskins quarterback . . . came to Cowboys in June this year in trade deal . . . the three time unanimous little All-America selection, was the league's top passer in 1958 when he completed 79 of 149 passes for 1,365 yards and 11 touchdowns . . . his seven year career record shows 538 completions in 1,104 attempts for 7,165 yards and 58 touchdowns . . . often acclaimed as greatest ball handler in T-formation history, he is rated as one of the best play callers of all time . . . studied at George Washington University Law School during pro career and recently began legal practice in Midland, Texas . . . the Cowboys' top passer in pre-season games with 43 completions on 93 attempts, good for 635 yards and three touchdowns.

WOODLEY LEWIS, 6-0, 195, at 33 years old and in eleventh year of proball, this end is the elder statesman of the Cowboys . . . came to Dallas from the Cardinals . . . has been a league standout on both offense and defense, catching 46 passes for 690 yards in 1958 and intercepting 12 passes for the Rams to lead league in 1950, his rookie season . . . led the league in kickoff returns in 1954 . . . works as probation officer in the off season.

DON McILHENNY, 6-1, 100, offensive halfback, came to the Cowboys with four years NFL experience from the Green Bay Packers . . . graduate of SMU he was the Detroit Lions' third draft choice in 1956, but immediately went to the Packers . . . was the Packers' leading ground gainer in 1957 with 100 carries for 384 yards, and he also caught 18 passes for 210 yards . . . turned in outstanding performances in both the North-South Shrine game in 1955 and the Senior Bowl game in 1956 . . . he was named "Sophomore of the Year" in the Southwestern Conference in 1953 to earn All-America honorable mention . . . gained 544 yards rushing in 104 tries for 5.23 average in 1955 . . . was named to a starting post with the 1956 All-Star squad . . . 25 years old, he is of Scotch-Irish descent and a native of Nashville, Tennessee . . . leads

Cowboy runners with 4.5-yard average on 153 yards in 34 carries, and caught four passes for 24 yards.

RAY MATTHEWS, 6-0, 205, offensive wingback and end with nine years NFL experience, was obtained by the Cowboys from the Pittsburgh Steelers . . . the 30-year-old Clemson product played in two bowl games and the 1951 All-Star game before going to the Steelers . . . a top end with great speed, last year he caught 25 passes for 495 yards and four touchdowns and gained a reputation as one of the toughest men to cover in the league . . . once the baseball property of the St. Louis Browns, he also played some offensive halfback . . . from Bethel Park, Pennsylvania . . . his three pre-season receptions gained 76 yards.

DON MEREDITH, 6-2, 195-pound, All-American quarterback from S.M.U... played his prep ball at Mt. Vernon High School, Mt. JACK PATERA, 6-1, 240, veteran linebacker . . . with five years experience in the NFL, came to the Cowboys after two seasons with the Chicago Cardinals, he was the Colts fourth draft choice in 1955 . . . the 26-year-old Portland, Oregon, resident played four years at University of Oregon, where he played in the East-West, Hula Bowl and College All-Stars games.

DON PERKINS, 5-10, 200, University of New Mexico, halfback from Waterloo, Iowa . . . this All-America selection rewrote New Mexico's record book with no less than 12 records falling to his performances during his three-year career . . . Outstanding Sophomore in Skyline Conference in 1957, he wound up collegiate career with 2,001 yards rushing for one of his school and also a conference record . . . scored 138 points during career . . . made

AP Back of Week after scoring three TDs and rushing 126 yards in New Mexico's victory over Air Force last year . . . made various All-America selections in both junior and senior years . . . led nation in kickoff returns . . . injured in College All-Star camp, he will miss a great deal of early season.

DUANE PUTNAM, 6-0, 221, offensive guard from Los Angeles, came to the Cowboys from the Los Angeles Rams . . . when this three-time All-Pro guard started last season, it made the eighth straight year he had been a first stringer . . . joining the Rams as a rookie in 1952 as a sixth round pick, has eight years experience in the NFL . . . an outstanding blocker, particularly on end sweeps, he was captain-elect for the past two years . . . during off season he operates an exclusive boy's camp in Northern California . . . this 31-year-old College of Pacific product is from Granda Hills, California.

DAVE SHERER, 6-3, 234, end and punter, with one year NFL experience . . . the 23-year-old Carlsbad, New Mexico product came to the Cowboys from the Baltimore Colts . . . after an outstanding season in 1957, when he paced the nation's punters with a 50.1 yard average, Dave was plagued by injuries at SMU through most of the 1958 season . . . he mended sufficiently, however, to participate in the East-West game . . . the Colts thought enough of his punting ability and his potential as a pro pass receiver to draft him on the second round . . . was a junior college wingman prior to entering SMU for his junior year . . . his 36 pre-season punts for the Cowboys averaged 38.2 yards.

MIKE SOMMER, 5-11, 187, starred at halfback for the world champion Colts after twice being released by Washington . . . played last eight games with Baltimore last year and in the title game . . . he gained 227 yards in 61 carries and had a 53-yard touchdown run . . . he led the nation in punt returns as a sophomore at George Washington . . . also a good threat as a pass receiver.
