THE COACHES

TOM LANDRY — Head Coach

Although he's only 38 years old, Tom Landry enters his fourteenth season of professional football this season.

A native of Texas, he was a natural choice to coach Dallas' entry in the National Football League when the club franchise was granted in 1960.

He had been a player, player-coach and assistant coach before joining the Cowboys. After graduating from the University of Texas in 1949, Landry joined the New York Yankees of the old All-America Conference.

When the two leagues merged, Landry began a 10-year association with the New York Giants. He was an active player from 1950 through '53, a player coach in '54 and '55 and defensive backfield coach from '56 through '59.

Landry's Cowboys teams fared well in Yankee Stadium their first two seasons—gaining a 31-31 tie with the Giants in 1960 and defeating them last season, 17-16.

Born in Mission, Texas, Landry entered the University of Texas in 1942. He left after one semester to enter the Army Air Corps and returned there in 1945 after flying 30 combat missions as a B-17 pilot with the Eighth Air Force.

Landry, his wife, Alicia, and three children — Tom, Jr., 12; Kitty, 9; and Lisa, 4; have been Dallas residents since 1957.

ERMAL ALLEN — Offensive Backfield Coach

One of three new coaches on the Cowboys staff this season, Allen's 14 previous years in the profession have all been spent at Kentucky.

He was a quarterback at Kentucky (1939, '40, '41), a member of the Fort Benning and Army All-Star teams during World War II and a defensive back with the Cleveland Browns in 1947.

At Kentucky he worked under Paul Bryant from 1948 through 1953 and under Blanton Collier from 1954 through 1961.

Allen '41, earned three letters each in football, basketball and golf at Kentucky and is still a champion amateur golfer. His son, Ken, was the No. 1 freshman quarterback at Georgia Tech last year. The other Allen children are Ann, 16, and Amy, 7.

TOM DAHMS — Chief Scout, Assistant Line Coach

Dahms spent his early playing and coaching days on the West Coast, where he was an All-America tackle at San Diego State College.

The 35-year-old San Diego native is a veteran of seven years as a player in the NFL and has been with the Cowboys since they were organized in 1960.

Dahms played his high-school and college ball at San Diego, coached there at the San Diego Naval Training Center and in the school system and broke into pro ball in 1951 with the Los Angeles Rams. He also played with the Chicago Cardinals and San Francisco 49ers and was line coach at Virginia in 1959.

Tom and his wife are the parents of three sons — Tommy, 5; and twins Timothy and Jeffrey, 2.

BRAD ECKLUND — Defensive Line Coach

Ecklund moves to the defense after two seasons of coaching the Cowboys' offensive line.

The 40-year-old native of Los Angeles was a member of Dallas' original NFL entry, the Texans, in 1952, after being an all-pro center with the New York Yankees in 1950 and '51.

After his pro days ended, Brad returned to Oregon, where he had attended college, and was a highly-successful high school coach for four years and an assistant coach at the University of Oregon for two years.

The Ecklunds have three children — Sterling, 16; Daryle Lynne, 11; and Brant, 9.

JIM MYERS — Offensive Line Coach

A long-time coach in the collegiate ranks, Myers joined the Cowboys last January after four years as head coach and athletic director at Texas A&M.

He was an assistant coach at Wofford College, Vanderbilt and UCLA and head coach at Iowa State before going to Texas A&M.

The 40-year-old Myers played his college ball at Tennessee ('41-'42 and '46) and Duke ('43). While at Duke in the Marine V-12 program, he was named All-Southern Conference guard.

Jim and his wife, whom he met in college, have three daughters — Susan, 16; Kathy, 13; and Carol, 12.

DICK NOLAN — Defensive Backfield Coach

Another newcomer to the Cowboys staff, Nolan turns to coaching after eight years as a top defensive safetyman in the NFL.

The 30-year-old Maryland product and Tom Landry are no strangers. They were teammates in 1954 and '55 when Landry was a player-coach for the New York Giants. Nolan was also Landry's pupil in 1956, '57 and '59 when the latter was full-time defensive coach. Dick went to the Chicago Cardinals in 1958, but returned to the Giants for the past three seasons. He could also see service as a player this season.

A native of White Plains, N.Y., Dick is the father of four children—Richard Jr., 7; Nancy, 6; Michael, 3; and Kelly, 2.

CLINT HOUY — Trainer

A native of Fredericksburg, Texas, Clint Houy has an extensive background as an athletic trainer despite being only 28 years old.

"Pee Wee" Houy started as a student assistant at the University of Texas, where he received his bachelor of science degree in 1955.

His first job was at the Air Force Academy when it opened for the first time in 1955. He fulfilled his military obligation while serving as athletic trainer there and was with the Air Force team that played a scoreless tie with TCU in the 1959 Cotton Bowl game.

With the Ottawa Rough Riders in the Canadian professional league in 1959, Houy returned to his native state to become the Cowboys' trainer in 1960.

JACK ESKRIDGE — Equipment Manager

A basketball player who holds one Kansas University scoring record that even Wilt Chamberlain never bettered, Jack Eskridge has been in most every phase of athletics since graduating from high school in Independence, Mo.

The 40-year-old Kansas City, Kan., native played pro basketball for two seasons (1949-50) with the Chicago Stags and Indianapolis Jets of the NBA after playing at Kansas in 1946-47-48. He also coached five years in Iowa and Kansas high schools and five years at Kansas University.

Chamberlain, the Jayhawks' great scorer while Eskridge was an assistant there, never bettered Eskridge's record of 30 points in one half.

"But he came awfully close the night he had 57 in one game," Eskridge recalled. "He had 29 one half and 28 the other."

GIL BRANDT — Player Scouting Director

A native of Milwaukee, Gil Brandt is another 28-year-old who has managed to crowd a maximum of experience into a few years.

This is his seventh season of professional football talent hunting, his fourth year at it on a full-time basis.

After his graduation from the University of Wisconsin in 1954, Gil scouted on a part-time basis for the Los Angeles Rams from 1955 through '57.

In 1958 he became a full-time scout for the San Francisco 49ers and remained with them until joining the Cowboys in the winter of 1960.

A Look at 1962 Prospects

By TOM LANDRY, Head Coach

The 1961 Dallas Cowboys were a much improved team over our 1960 group and I fully expect the 1962 Cowboys to be equally improved over the 1961 group.

That doesn't mean our record will necessarily show as much progress. We had an 0-11-1 record our first year and a 4-9-1 record last season.

But the improvement will be there. You'll find it in the execution by the veterans who are now thoroughly familiar with our system. And you'll find it in an unusually large number of rookies who need only experience to go along with first-class potential. These rookies are taking over at positions where we were in trouble last year.

Our offensive line was a big problem in 1961. Now we feel we have bright future prospects in tackles Don Talbert and Lorenzo Stanford and guard Joe Bob Isbell. We have a couple of top pass-catching rookies in Pettis Norman and Donnie Davis and another quick, young runner in Amos Bullocks.

Our already-strong receiving corps of Bill Howton and Frank Clarke was further strengthened when rookies Norman and Davis developed rapidly in pre-season camp.

The remainder of our offensive line improvement hinges on whether John Houser and Ed Nutting can regain their form after suffering serious pre-season injuries.

We feel we're set in our backfield. Quarterback is solid with Don Meredith and Eddie LeBaron now fully in command of our system. Although injured early in pre-season, Don Perkins should have another big year. Fullbacks Amos Marsh and J. W. Lockett should be improved with a year's experience behind them.

Three rookies figure prominently in our defensive plans. George Andrie and Guy Reese will help our line and Mike Gaechter should strengthen the secondary. Robert Lilly is rapidly developing into a top end.

The acquisition of veteran Sam Baker will also play a major role in our improvement. Baker is a first-rate punter and placement specialist, a man we've needed for two years.

Jerry Tubbs and a vastly-improved Mike Dowdle give our line-backing a new dependability.

Pre-season injuries hurt us in the secondary with veterans Bob Bercich, Glynn Gregory and Warren Livingston missing considerable training time. But Don Bishop, who intercepted eight passes last season, looks better than ever and we acquired a steady old pro in Jerry Norton.

Overall, I feel we will be improved defensively, have a better goal-line punch and have the type of kicking game that will aid us both offensively and defensively.

championship at 77 points . . . joined Redskins in '53, became kicker in '56 after returning from military service . . . greatest ground gainer in Oregon State history (2,043 yards on 487 carries), he was voted most valuable player by teammates three straight years . . . kicked a 48-yard field goal and an 85-yard punt in '62 pre-season games . . . lives in Tacoma, Wash.

Bob Bercich **Defensive Safety** **Michigan State**
Ht: 6-1 **Wt: 198** **Born: 11-9-36** **Third Year**

A member of Cowboys' promising young defensive secondary in 1960 and '61 . . . intercepted three passes in 1961 before a concussion forced him out at mid-season . . . intercepted two passes in 1960 . . . underwent knee operation in August and missed entire '62 pre-season . . . now makes his home in Dallas.

Don Bishop **Defensive Halfback** **City College of LA**
Ht: 6-1 **Wt: 210** **Born: 7-1-34** **Fourth Year**

Tremendous year in '61 made him one of NFL's outstanding defensive backs . . . second in league in interceptions with eight, which he returned for 172 yards . . . holds club record of 57-yard return of interception . . . had three interceptions in '60 . . . the Los Angeles native played with Chicago Bears in '59.

Nate Borden **Defensive End** **Indiana**
Ht: 6-1 **Wt: 238** **Born: 9-22-32** **Eighth Year**

Durable seven-year veteran of the NFL, popular Nate worked as college scout for Cowboys during last off season . . . played first five years of pro ball with Green Bay before joining Cowboys in 1960 . . . as tackle and end at Indiana, he played in 36 straight games . . . a native of Jersey City, New Jersey, he now makes his home in Cincinnati.

Clyde Brock **Offensive Tackle** **Utah State**
Ht: 6-5 **Wt: 265** **Born: 8-30-40** **First Year (D2)**

A second-round draft choice of the Chicago Bears, he joined Cowboys week preceding final pre-season game . . . All-Skyline tackle and top shot putter in college, he also gained some All-America honorable mention . . . married and has one child . . . lives in Ogden, Utah.

Amos Bullocks **Offensive Halfback** **Southern Illinois**
Ht: 6-1 **Wt: 202** **Born: 2-7-39** **First Year (D20)**

Drafted 20th in this year's draft, this powerful young back could develop into a first rate alternate for Don Perkins . . . has size, speed and fine balance . . . was top rusher in pre-season Colts game with 51 yards on 11 carries . . . three years All-Illinois Intercollegiate Conference, and back of the year in 1960 . . . gained almost 3,000 yards rushing in three collegiate seasons . . . makes his home in Chicago.

Frank Clarke **Wingback** **Colorado****Ht: 6-1** **Wt: 215** **Born: 2-7-34** **Sixth Year**

Cowboys' second leading pass receiver in '61 with 41 catches, but had by far the greatest yardage, 919, in averaging 22.4 yards per catch . . . also set club scoring record of 54 points on nine touchdowns and club record of 80-yard reception against Redskins . . . averaged 32.2 yards on nine receptions, three for touchdowns, in '60 . . . played three seasons with Cleveland Browns before joining Cowboys in '60 . . . makes his off season home in Cleveland.

Mike Connelly **Center** **Utah State****Ht: 6-3** **Wt: 242** **Born: 10-16-35** **Third Year**

Switched to center in 1961 after playing guard the previous season . . . came to Cowboys from Los Angeles Rams after '60 pre-season schedule was completed . . . moved to Dallas from Los Angeles during last off season to work as insurance man.

John Cornett **Offensive Tackle** **Rice****Ht: 6-5** **Wt: 250** **Born: 2-17-41** **First Year**

Came to the Cowboys midway the pre-season schedule in a trade with the Los Angeles Rams . . . was the Rams 3rd round draft pick in '62 . . . equipped with size, speed, agility and desire, he could be of help in development of young but potentially solid offensive line . . . born in Neodesha, Kansas, moved with his family to Alice, Texas after elementary school . . . slow start with Cowboys due to hand injury . . . a brother Mike is a top hurdler at the University of Kansas now.

Andy Cvercko **Guard** **Northwestern****Ht: 6-0** **Wt: 243** **Born: 11-6-37** **Fourth Year**

Came to Cowboys less than two weeks before '61 NFL opener in trade with Green Bay and was a starter much of season . . . fifth draft choice in 1958, he was injured before opener in rookie season and didn't play until '59 . . . three-year starter at Northwestern . . . maintained B average in electrical engineering . . . lives in Campbell, Ohio.

Donnie Davis **Wingback** **Southern University****Ht: 6-4** **Wt: 199** **Born: 9-18-40** **First Year (D6)**

This highly-regarded rookie has the speed and hands to develop into a standout receiver . . . saw considerable action in pre-season and may play even more during the season . . . a good hurdler in college . . . home is in Houston.

Mike Dowdle **Linebacker** **Texas****Ht: 6-3** **Wt: 237** **Born: 12-6-37** **Third Year**

He made successful switch from fullback to linebacker in 1961 and made a strong showing in late season games . . . showed good

pass-rush ability and strong pursuit . . . the former University of Texas standout fullback moved to Dallas this year from San Angelo.

Dave Edwards **Linebacker** **Auburn**
Ht: 6-2 **Wt: 213** **Born: 12-14-39** **First Year (FA)**

An All-Southeast Conference end in 1961, he also tried out at offensive end with Cowboys early in camp . . . a rugged performer, he gives Cowboys depth at linebacker . . . lives in Abbeville, Alabama.

Lee Folkins **Offensive End** **Washington**
Ht: 6-5 **Wt: 220** **Born: 7-4-39** **Second Year**

Came to Cowboys week of final pre-season game from Packers for future draft choice . . . gained repete in 1962 All-Star Game by swinging at a collegian and connecting with head linesman, rendering him unconscious . . . mechanical engineering student at Washington . . . played in All-America Bowl . . . lives in Seattle.

Ken Frost **Defensive Tackle** **Tennessee**
Ht: 6-4 **Wt: 242** **Born: 11-17-38** **Second Year**

Joined Cowboys as free agent in '61 after NCAA's five-year rule made him ineligible for college ball . . . held out of competition as a sophomore, he ran into classroom difficulties in spring of 61 and became ineligible for final collegiate season . . . very strong, he does a good job of holding his area . . . was voted Tennessee's outstanding lineman in '60 and member of NFL all-rookie squad in '61 . . . lives in Franklin, Tennessee.

Bob Fry **Offensive Tackle** **Kentucky**
Ht: 6-4 **Wt: 232** **Born: 11-11-30** **Eighth Year**

Has been a starter in all seven previous years in the NFL, although he's one of the lightest offensive tackles . . . makes up for lack of size with speed, mobility and great blocking techniques . . . played five seasons for Los Angeles Rams . . . lives in Cincinnati, Ohio.

Mike Gaechter **Defensive Safety** **Oregon**
Ht: 6-0 **Wt: 196** **Born: 1-9-40** **First Year (FA)**

Handed a starting role in pre-season when injuries hit veterans of the secondary, and quickly demonstrated ability that may make him tough to move out of the No. One unit . . . possesses quickness plus excellent speed . . . he was a member of Oregon's championship track relay team . . . was voted Oregon's Linebackers Award as top defensive player in 1961 and also picked by his teammates that season as the most improved player . . . plans to become a stockbroker . . . lives in West Lancaster, Calif.

Cornell Green **Defensive Halfback** **Utah State**
Ht: 6-4 **Wt: 216** **Born: 2-10-40** **First Year (FA)**

Did not play collegiate football, but demonstrated excellent potential

from the start of this year's training . . . an All-State high school gridder at Richmond, Calif., but developed into an outstanding basketball player and concentrated on that sport in college . . . he scored over 20 points per game in each of his three varsity seasons . . . was named basketball All-America in 1960 . . . brother Pumpsie is Boston Red Sox second baseman . . . home is in Richmond, Calif.

Glynn Gregory **Offensive End-Defensive Safety** **S.M.U.**

Ht: 6-2 **Wt:** 195 **Born:** 7-6-39 **Second Year**

A favorite with Texas football fans since his high school days, he caught three passes for 30 yards in '61 and saw considerable action as a defensive halfback . . . led Abilene High School to three straight state championships and was leading Southwest Conference receiver in 1959 as batterymate of Cowboys quarterback Don Meredith . . . All-Southwest Conference in football and baseball, he passed up baseball bonus offers in favor of the Cowboys . . . missed most of '62 pre-season with knee injury . . . born in Paris, Texas, he now ranches near Kerrville in Texas hill country.

Bill Herchman **Defensive Tackle** **Texas Tech**

Ht: 6-1 **Wt:** 255 **Born:** 3-10-33 **Sixth Year**

This Texas product has been a defensive line mainstay for Cowboys through first two seasons . . . played high school and college ball in Lubbock, but now makes his home in Dallas after being obtained by Cowboys from San Francisco 49ers.

John Houser **Guard** **Redlands**

Ht: 6-4 **Wt:** 235 **Born:** 6-21-35 **Fourth Year**

Has played center, guard and tackle on offense . . . versatility dates back to college days where he was guard and fullback . . . with Los Angeles Rams in '58 and '59, he has played in every league game his teams have played for last three seasons . . . suffered severe knee injury in first '62 pre-season game and may miss most of season . . . now lives in Van Nuys, Calif.

Chuck Howley **Linebacker** **West Virginia**

Ht: 6-3 **Wt:** 223 **Born:** 6-28-36 **Fourth Year**

Proved last season a knee injury had mended after laying out of football in '60 . . . came to Cowboys in spring of '61 in trade with Chicago Bears and won job as regular linebacker . . . a former Southern Conference athlete of the year, Chuck played in Shrine Bowl, Senior Bowl and College All-Star games after completing collegiate career . . . lives in Wheeling, West Virginia.

Billy Howton **Offensive End** **Rice**

Ht: 6-2 **Wt:** 194 **Born:** 7-3-30 **Tenth Year**

Redskins Game—Sept. 16

The Tyler Junior College Apache Belles and Apache band lead a salute to their home town, the Rose Capital of the World. Also featured is the 110-piece Ennis High School band, a consistent winner of state marching contests.

Steelers Game—Sept. 23

From Enid High School in Enid, Okla., a 120-piece precision marching band that won the Tri-State Band Festival last year. Closing the show will be a local precision drill team, "The Dallas Darlings."

Eagles Game—Oct. 14

For the second straight year the Cowboys bring back "Cinderella's Circus Dream." It combines the Gil Gray International Circus, Arlington State College band and Dallas high school gymnasts into an eight-ring spectacular.

Cardinals Game—Oct. 28

Music and motion highlight this show. It features 16 minutes of music ranging from Dixieland to Big Band swing. The participants are the Lumberjack Band from Stephen F. Austin College and the Twirl-O-Jacks, SFA's girls precision drill team.

Giants Game—Nov. 11

A Salute to the Veterans of our 50 States is the theme. One of the country's finest high-school bands, from Pampa in the Texas Panhandle, joins the Sam Houston Rifles from Arlington State College and 100 color bearers from the Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and Campfire Girls.

Bears Game—Nov. 18

Two more fine high-school bands headline this show. They're both from Odessa, Texas—the Odessa High School band and the Permian High School band. They will combine forces in the last portion of the show to present a 270-piece concert.

Browns Game—Dec. 2

Regional finals of the National Football League-Ford Motors Pass, Punt and Kick Contest will be staged. Sharing the billing will be the Arlington State College Rebel Band.

On hand at all Cowboys games this season, for the first time, will be the Lions Club Band of Greater Fort Worth. This band's membership is made up of Lions Clubbers who live in the Fort Worth area. Director is Charles Hoffman and band president is Harold E. Taft.

Jim Skinner of Dallas is director of halftime activities at all Cowboys home games.



COWBOYS PRE-SEASON

The Dallas Cowboys held their third pre-season training camp at Northern Michigan College in Marquette, Mich. It was their first time to train in Michigan after headquartering at Pacific University in Forest Grove, Ore., in 1960 and St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minn., in 1961.

Results of the Cowboys' pre-season games in 1962:

PACKERS 31, COWBOYS 7

At Dallas—In their first start against an NFL team since winning the world championship last December, the Packers had to go to their passing game in 94-degree heat at Dallas. The Cowboys led the Packers in rushing, 114 yards to 110, but the passing of Bart Starr, John Roach and Paul Hornung was too much for the Cowboys' rookie secondary. Boyd Dowler caught five for 66 yards and a touchdown.

LIONS 35, COWBOYS 24

At Cleveland—It was the first game of the first double-header in pro football history. Don Meredith threw three touchdown passes. The lead changed hands four times before Earl Morrall passed for two touchdowns in the final 11 minutes.

COLTS 24, COWBOYS 10

At Roanoke — The Colts scored three touchdowns in an 11-minute span of the third period; otherwise it was a fine defensive battle. Johnny Unitas completed only eight of 19 and had one intercepted by the young Dallas secondary. Rookie Amos Bullocks led Cowboys rushers with 11 carries for 51 yards.

49ERS 26, COWBOYS 7

At Sacramento — A 19-point fourth period again ruined a good defensive game. The 49ers scored on passes of 77 and 65 yards. Rookie Pettis Norman caught an 11-yard pass from Eddie LeBaron for the Cowboys' touchdown in the second period.

VIKINGS 45, COWBOYS 26

At Atlanta — Fran Tarkenton's arm outscored Sam Baker's foot as the Cowboys closed their first winless pre-season. Operating in his home state, sophomore Tarkenton threw four touchdown passes. Baker kicked field goals of 51, 49, 38 and 26 yards and Cornell Green scored on an 85 yard run of a Viking fumble.
