SCHRAMM

The Dallas Cowboys are owned by a former 130-pound halfback for Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

The Cowboys are run by a former sportswriter.

This combination has, while nursing along an expansion team until it became a division champion, proved to be a most effective combination.

The ex-halfback is Clint Murchison, Jr., the Dallas businessman, who originally served as president of the club. He is still chairman of the board.

Texas E. Schramm is the former sportswriter who served as vicepresident and general manager until being named president three years ago.

There are few better qualified club presidents than the California native, who has become recognized as one of the most progressive administrators in professional sports.

Schramm holds a BA degree in Journalism from the University of Texas, acquired between 1939 and 1947 with time-out for a four-year hitch in the Air Transport Command where he made Captain.

While still in school, Schramm was a member of the sports staff of the Austin American Statesman and later sports editor.

In 1947 he joined the Los Angeles Rams as publicity director, and in a 10-year career there, rose to general manager.

He left the Rams to join Columbia Broadcasting System as Assistant Director of Sports in 1957 and was there until summoned by Murchison and Bedford Wynne to guide the Cowboys.

One of his major assets is to be a sound judge of men. It was Schramm who brought Pete Rozelle into pro football as publicity man for the Rams.

Aside from the development of the Cowboys, perhaps his major achievements have been his work with scouting systems, both with the Rams and Cowboys, and the merger of the NFL and AFL.

It was Schramm and Lamar Hunt, owner of the Kansas City Chiefs, who handled preliminary negotiations for the merger.

THE COACH



TOM LANDRY

Coach Tom Landry begins his second 10 years with the Dallas Cowboys in 1970 and, although there was a transitional year, it really is the beginning of a new era.

The first nine years, the Meredith Era as Tom calls it, was an exciting but frustrating time when the Cowboys inched along from an expansion team without benefit of a first year draft to become

a National Football League power.

From that humble beginning, it took the Cowboys until 1965 to turn the corner, the Club finishing 7-7 that year. Since that time there have been three Capitol Division Titles and two Eastern Championships. And, twice the Cowboys were at the brink of winning the NFL Championship and going to the Super Bowl, losing by the narrowest of margins to Green Bay in the Title Games.

That all came in the Meredith Era before the Cowboys two Dons, Don Meredith and Don Perkins, retired prior to the 1969 season. That's when Craig Morton took over at quarterback and the Cowboys found running back Calvin Hill. And even in that transitional year the Cowboys finished 11-2-1, from where they now launch the new

era.

Tom has accomplished all of this with basic defensive concepts which he helped refine himself while with the New York Giants, and with multiple offense techniques which stamp the Cowboys as the most explosive and exciting team in the League.

the most explosive and exciting team in the League.

As early as 1962 the Cowboys were second in the NFL in offense.

They were second in team defense as early as 1964. Then last year, the Cowboys led the NFL in offense, both rushing and passing.

And, Tom moved his career coaching record above the .500 mark

with a 67-65-6 record.

It would be fitting that the native Texan, the only coach the Cowboys have had and the dean of National Football Conference coaches begin the new era with a championship.

Tom was born in Mission, Texas, in 1924 and became an all-

Regional fullback prior to enrolling at the University of Texas.

He was at Texas only one semester before going into the Air Force. He spent the bulk of his service time in England where he flew 30 missions as a B-17 pilot for the Eighth Air Force.

Following his discharge in November of 1945, Tom returned to Texas where he carved out a solid scholastic and football career for the Longhorns. His stay there was marked by some of the strongest teams in Texas' history. He was co-captain his senior year and second team all-Southwest Conference his junior year. Landry was a mainstay on the Longhorn teams which whipped Alabama in the 1948 Sugar Bowl, 27-7, and Georgia in the 1949 Orange Bowl, 41-28

In 1949 Landry joined the old New York Yankees, playing half-back, both offensively and defensively. When the two leagues merged in 1950, Landry began his long association with the Giants and began building the solid reputation he holds today.

He was an active player from 1950 through 1953 and player-coach in 1954 and 1955, handling the Giants' defense. As a player, he was a defensive halfback in Steve Owens' famed umbrella pass defense, and he played it well enough to be named to the All-Pro defensive team in 1954. In 1956 he retired as a player and became the full-

time defensive coach.

The Giants enjoyed some of their greatest successes during Landry's stay with them. They lost a playoff to Cleveland in 1950 for the Eastern Division championship. In 1956, Landry's first year as a full-time coach, the Giants won the world championship in a 47-7 rout over the Chicago Bears. They won the division title in 1958 and 1959, after which Giant head coach, Jim Lee Howell called Landry "the best defensive coach in the business." During Landry's tenure as full-time defensive coach, the Giants fashioned a 33-14-1

record in regular league play.

Before moving here, he lived in Houston during the off-season. Landry received an industrial engineering degree from University of

Houston in 1952 and was employed there as an engineer.

Landry enters his 21st professional football season this year and the way his contract reads, he'll still be with the Cowboys when he enters his 25th season. On February 5, 1964, Cowboys' owner, Clint Murchison, Jr., announced he had signed Landry to a contract running through the 1974 season. It was the longest contract in the history of pro sports, as well as newsmen could determine

"It's in line with my philosophy that when you get a good man you

want to hold on to him," Murchison explained.

Tom devotes what little non football and family time he has in the off-season to work with the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

At Texas Tom met his wife, Alicia, and they were married in January, 1949, four months before he received a bachelor of business administration degree. They have three children, Tom, Jr., Kitty and Lisa. Young Tom is attending Duke.

THE ASSISTANTS







ERMAL ALLEN

Special Assistant

Ermal Allen joined the Cowboys in 1962 after 14 years as a coach at his alma mater, Kentucky, and in his first Dallas season the Cowboys ranked second in the NFL in total offense, touchdowns and points scored.

He quarterbacked the Wildcats in his undergraduate days ('39-'41) and was a member of the Fort Benning and Army All-Star teams during World War II and a defensive back with the Cleveland Browns in 1947.

Returning to Kentucky, he worked under Bear Bryant from 1948 through 1953 and under Blanton Collier from 1954 through 1961.

Allen, 49, earned three letters each in football, basketball and golf in college. He won the Southern Amateur in 1938 and was Kentucky State Amateur champion in 1955 when he defeated Bobby Nichols in the semifinals, and again in 1958 when he defeated Frank Beard in the finals.

Allen and his wife, Allie, are grandparents, thanks to their son Ken, a former halfback for Georgia Tech. They have two other children, Mrs. Pat Cunningham, and Amy, 15.

BOBBY FRANKLIN Defensive Backfield Coach

Bobby, who came to the Cowboys in 1968 after one season of coaching experience as an assistant at Georgia Tech, now has two years of NFL coaching experience under his belt to go with an excellent playing background.

A native of Clarksdale, Mississippi, he was a multisport star as a

prep. He attended Ole Miss where he was the regular quarterback under Johnny Vaught for his two final years. The Rebels played in three bowls during his stay.

Drafted 11th by Cleveland in 1960, he was a regular in the secondary for three years and a sometimes starter thereafter in a career that went through the 1966 season.

JIM MYERS Offensive Line Coach

A long-time coach in the collegiate ranks, Myers joined the Cowboys in 1962 after four years as head coach and athletic director at Texas A&M.

He was an assistant coach at Wofford College, Vanderbilt and UCLA and head coach at Iowa State before going to Texas A&M.

The 47-year-old Myers played his college ball at Tennessee ('41-'42 and '46) and Duke ('43). While at Duke in the Marine V-12 program, he was named All-Southern Conference guard.

Between his time at Duke and the return to Tennessee, Jim served in the Marine Corps and was discharged a captain. Jim and his wife, Carolyn, have three daughters and two grandchildren. Their daughters are Mrs. Harrison Jones, Mrs. Michael Daly, and Carol, who attends North Texas.

DAN REEVES Offensive Backfield Coach (See Page 36)

RAY RENFRO Pass Offense Coach

Ray brought with him a solid background of playing and coaching experience when he joined the Cowboys in 1968. Prior to joining the Cowboys he had last been with Washington as offense coach. The Redskins had the best passing game in the league that year.

He also coached at Detroit after wrapping up his 12-year playing career at Cleveland where he saw duty both as a running back and flanker, although he was used exclusively as a flanker after 1959. He was All-Pro six times.

The 40-year-old Whitesboro, Texas, native was a small college All-American at North Texas where he averaged 7.7 yards per carry and was a 9.5 sprinter.

Renfro and his wife, the former Sandra Clarke of Fort Worth, have three children, Mike 15, Mark 13 and Mitch 11. He makes his home in Fort Worth where he has a dry cleaning establishment.



ERNIE STAUTNER Defensive Line Coach

Ernie Stautner joined the Cowboys staff in 1966 after a season with the Washington Redskins, preceded by two years as player-coach with the Pittsburgh Steelers.

One of the most honored and popular interior linemen of modern times, Ernie was voted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame this year immediately after becoming eligible. He played 15 years with the Steelers as a 235-pound defensive tackle and appeared in nine Pro Bowl games. He was All-Pro in 1958 and 1959, and, along with former roommate Bobby Layne, is something of a legend in Pittsburgh.

Stautner played four seasons with Boston College after completing a 1943-46 hitch with the Marines.

He and his wife, Helen, have three children: Joseph Robert, 15; Teresa Anne, 14; Carol Anne, 9.

JERRY TUBBS Linebacker Coach

Jerry became a full time coach in 1968 after serving two seasons as a player-coach for the Cowboys. The 34-year-old Breckenridge, Texas, native spent 11 seasons as an active pro after an outstanding collegiate career at Oklahoma.

Tubbs was a three-year regular for Bud Wilkinson and the recipient of the Walter Camp Award as the nation's outstanding player following his senior season in 1956.

He was drafted No. 1 by the Chicago Cardinals, but went to the San Francisco 49ers on waivers a year later. He was one of the 36 original Cowboys and played as a regular for six seasons, making All-Pro in 1962.

Jerry and his wife, Marlene, have two children, Alan, 12, and Kayla Lynn, 7.

GIL BRANDT - Player Scouting Director

Gil, who has headed the Cowboys scouting department since the formation of the club, is generally recognized to be leader in his field.

The 36-year-old Milwaukee native is moving into his 16th season of hunting professional football talent, his 12th year on a fulltime basis.

After his graduation from the University of Wisconsin in 1954, Gil scouted on a part-time basis for the Los Angeles Rams from 1955 until 1957. And part of that time he was a baby photographer in Milwaukee.

Under Brandt's direction the Cowboys have topped all clubs in the signing of free agents who made the grade, including some

basketball players.

DON COCHREN - Trainer

Don Cochren joined the Cowboys in June 1965 after one year as head trainer at the University of New Hampshire.

A graduate of Purdue University who gained his physical therapy certificate from Pennsylvania, the 38-year-old Cochren spent two years as trainer at Case Institute in Cleveland and four years as trainer of the Toronto Argonauts of the Canadian football league. He also spent two years as a physical therapy officer in the Air

LARRY GARDNER — Trainer

When Larry, 31, joined the Cowboys in 1965, it wasn't the first time he'd been in Texas. The McNeese State alum had graduated from the Hermann Hospital School of Physical Therapy at the Texas Medical Center in Houston in 1962.

He spent two years at the University of California, with time out for a six-month tour of duty in the Army, before becoming football trainer at Stanford University in 1964.

Larry was named secretary of the Professional Football Trainers

Assn., in 1969.



JACK ESKRIDGE — Equipment Manager

A basketball player who holds one Kansas University scoring record that even Wilt Chamberlain never bettered, Jack Eskridge has been in most every phase of athletics since graduating from

high school in Independence, Mo.
The 44-year-old Kansas City, Kan., native played pro basketball for two seasons (1949-50) with the Chicago Stags and Indianapolis Jets of the NBA, after playing at Kansas in 1946-47-48. He also coached five years in Iowa and Kansas high schools and five years at Kansas University. He joined the Cowboys their first season.

Eskridge's KU basketball record: He scored 30 points in a half.

A storybook player at Kirkpatrick High School in Fort Worth and in Junior College in Athens, Margene has played three years in the Canadian League for Ottawa where he caught 47, 32 and 56 passes and averaged 10 touchdowns per season. "He's another Bob Hayes," said Coach Tom Landry. "He took Ottawa to the Gray Cup and we knew he was great when he was at Henderson County. We timed him once in Levis and he ran a 4.5". When he was at Henderson County he played in the Junior Rose Bowl twice. He did not play high school ball until he was a junior, preferring basketball instead. He can dunk a basketball with both hands. His vertical jump has been measured at 38 inches. "That's like being 6-4," says talent expert Gil Brandt. Between Henderson and Canada, he had a brief stop at Wichita University. He is married and makes his home in Fort Worth.

ANDRIE, GEORGE

Defensive End

Marquette

PRO: George had a good off-season. Right after he was named the Most Valuable Lineman for the East in the Pro Bowl, the big end teamed with Ron Santo of the Chicago Cubs to win the Astrojet Golf Classic in Phoenix, putting him in the money for the fourth time in four years. He and Ralph Terry were second in 1967, he and Mickey Mantle were fifth in 1968 and he and Sammy Ellis were eighth in 1969. He also finishes in the money each year in sacking the quarterback, something the Cowboys rank high in each year. Despite having put in eight years, if anything he's quicker than he used to be and teams with Bob Lilly on the Cowboys right side, making it as tough as any tandem in the game. In the 1967 championship game with Green Bay, George scored one of two Cowboys touchdowns when he picked up a ball knocked loose from Bart Starr and ran in from the seven.

COLLEGE: Missed his entire senior season when Marquette dropped organized football, yet the Cowboys took him in the 6th round. Played end in college under Coaches Lisle Blackbourne and John Druze.

PERSONAL: Native of Grand Rapids, Michigan, where he attended Catholic Central. Married Mary Lou Lorscheider of Waukesha, Wisconsin. They have two boys—George, 6 and Michael, 5 and Marie, 1. ANDRUSYSHYN, ZENON Kicker U. C. L. A. Ht: 6-2 Wt: 212 Born: 2-25-47 1st Year (D-9 for '70)

Born in Germany of Ukrainian parents, the Big Z grew up in Canada and played his collegiate football in California. That's covering a lot of ground, which is what a lot of his kicks do. Since he is both a punter and a place kicker, if he could develop consistency, the Cowboys could have the greatest kicker in football. He led the NCAA in punting as a sophomore with 44.2 average and was 42.1 in each of the last two. His final year he was 33 of 44 in extra points and 8 of 12 field goals. He has kicked 65-yard field goals in practice. His longest that counted was 52 yards. He went to UCLA on a track scholarship and is an excellent javelin thrower.

ASHER, BOB Tackle Vanderbilt Ht: 6-5 Wt: 250 Born: 6-13-48 1st Year (D-2 for '70)

Bob was a three-year regular for Vandy, made the NEA All-America and generally has had rave notices out of the Southeastern Conference. But scout Red Hickey says: "All of his football is in front of him. He has all of the factors to be a great one." Coach Tom Landry says he can be a Ralph Neely-type player, that within a year he could be a regular. To get Asher in the second round, the Cowboys, during the heat of the draft, traded running back Craig Baynham and defensive back Phil Clark to the Bears for their choice. That made Bob the 27th player selected. The Falls Church, Virginia, native is a math major and lettered in basketball, track and tennis in addition to football while in high school.

ATHAS, PETE Right Safety Dade JC
Ht: 6-0 Wt: 186 Born: 9-15-46 1st Year (D-10 for '70)

Pete comes to the Cowboys after two years of driving Continental League quarterbacks nuts. Playing primarily at cornerback, with a little duty at free safety, he intercepted 19 passes in 24 league games. He got 10—a league record—in 1968 and nine last year for the Orlando Panthers. He returned those nine for 187 yards and one touchdown. Counting pre-season games and post-season championship games he picked off 27 in 34 games. Pete is from Miami, Florida, Edison High School. He has displayed some possibilities with throwing accuracy and his ability to absorb the football picture. A reserve quarterback for Notre Dame, Bob had been All-Ohio for Canton Central Catholic. He was a member of the Blue Circle Honor Society in college. He served in mop-up roles for the Irish, but had good stats when he played.

BROADHEAD, TOM Running Back U. C. Santa Barbara Ht: 6-0 Wt: 210 Born: 4-14-46 1st Year (D-12 for '69)

Tom came to the Cowboys just before training camp along with Dave Whitsell from New Orleans for Jackie Burkett. The all-time rushing king for the University of California at Santa Barbara had a big senior season with 841 yards and nine touchdowns. He was a junior college transfer from Menlo Park. He was drafted in 1969, was cut late and played minor league ball last season at Richmond in the Atlantic Coast Football League. A native of Blackfoot, Idaho, he is a history and physical education major. He and his wife, Diane, live in Goleta, California.

BROWN, OTTO Left Safety Ht: 6-1 Wt: 188 Born: 1-12-47 2nd Year (FA for '69)

PRO: Otto is living proof there is still a place for free agents in pro football. He was given a good look in training camp last year and impressed everyone with his hitting. "He'll strike anything that moves," was the way Landry phrased it. "Everytime we looked up he was in a receiver's face," said Bobby Franklin. He stuck, played on the specialty teams mostly, but late in the year played a game at cornerback, shutting out Eddie Hinton and intercepting a pass. Then, he played in the Eastern Conference Title Game. Thought to have a good future as a strong safety.

COLLEGE: Earned two letters, playing running back and cornerback for Coach Hoover Wright. He won the Thomas Burton Award in college for the athlete having the highest average in science. Twice

scored on interception and punt returns in college.

PERSONAL: A pre-med major, Otto grew up in Tallahassee, Florida. Single, he returned to class in the off-season.

CLARK, MIKE Place Kicker Texas A & M Ht: 6-1 Wt: 205 Born: 11-7-40 8th Year (FA for '63)

PRO: For the second straight year, Mike was the No. 2 scorer in the NFL last season with 103 points, two less than in his first year with the Cowboys. And in the process, he established a club record for field goals with 20. Dallas' only Texas Aggie on the squad had a year with Philadelphia and four with Pittsburgh before coming to the



Cowboys for center Mike Connelly. The seven-year vet has been one of the top kickers in the League since 1966 and has kicked a 50-yard field goal in competition. "Any time we get to midfield," says Landry, "we'll let Clark go for it, unless there is a hurricane blowing in his face."

COLLEGE: Mike had never tried to kick a field goal until he went to college. He tried it on freshman team and after one game had the job. He says that was when the guy who was kicking ahead

of him was knocked cold breaking up a wedge.

PERSONAL: Mike's hometown is Marshall, Texas. Mike and his wife, Darlena, have one son, Michael Kyle (10-13-67). Mike works for Computer Services in the off-season.

PRO: Coach Tom Landry once said that Cole "moves on the ball in mysterious ways." The Redskins will support this view. In the four games against Washington in his two years in the NFL, Larry has scored three touchdowns. At Washington his rookie year he scored on a 21-yard run with a fumble recovery and at Dallas on a 5-yard run with an interception. Last year at Washington he returned another interception 41 yards. He was blanked in Dallas. Despite the 50 per cent reduction in scoring, his effectiveness increased tremendously. "At one time," Landry says, "we thought he had that 'rookie luck' his first year. We weren't sure how much potential he had. But last year confirmed the fact that this boy could be a real outstanding player. He learned to escape for the first time." A 16th round draft choice and the first from the University of Hawaii made Larry something of a gamble. But it was a good one.

COLLEGE: Larry was one of the better traveled collegians. After a strong high school career, he enrolled at Air Force. But during the cribbing scandals he failed to turn in a classmate and was forced to leave. He tried Houston for less than a semester and then wound up at Hawaii.

PERSONAL: Larry is a native of Granite Falls, Minnesota, also the home of Les Josephson. Larry answers to the name of Joe Palooka for obvious reasons. He attended University of Minnesota and completed his degree in Civil Engineering in the off season and now lives in Dallas. His wife is the former Linda Kleinert.

"Ken is the man we feel we can turn to with confidence when we've got to complete a pass," says former Vol Coach Doug Dickey. "As for his blocking, he is capable of clearing out an entire side of the defensive line." DeLong led the Vols with 34 catches as a junior and he caught 22 last year for 235 yards and 3 TD's. Ken's brother is Steve DeLong, the former All-America guard at Tennessee. A three-year regular, he's from Norfolk, Virginia.

DITKA, MIKE Tight End Pittsburgh Ht: 6-3 Wt: 225 Born: 10-18-39 10th Year (D-1 for '61)

PRO: Quiz: Who is the leading active receiver in the National Football Conference? Mike Ditka. Despite dividing time at tight end with Pettis Norman, the nine-year veteran still bagged 17 passes in his first season with the Cowboys last year. Those 17 gave him a total of 372 for his career. But his pass receiving, and even his blocking, were not the most significant contributions he made to the Cowboys. Mike came to the Cowboys after having problems in Philadelphia, and in his latter years there, Chicago, too. But if he had any flaws he left them behind. Immediately popular with the vets, the fiery vet inspired the younger players. "I want to be just like Mike Ditka," said rookie flash Calvin Hill. "It gets me to see him psyching himself up before a game. He's all by himself, just sitting there, and occasionally he'll say something terse—I mean it starts me getting ready to play." Mike shrugs off the references to his ferocity. But he adds: "You'll notice, I never pick on anybody with a number higher than 30." A No. 1 draft choice by the Bears in 1961, he made All-Pro his first four seasons. He went to Philadelphia in the Jack Concannon trade and came to Dallas in a deal for David McDaniel.

COLLEGE: A great collegian at Pittsburgh, Ditka was an All-America in 1960. He played in the College All-Star game. Eight of 10 Pitt foes his senior year picked All-Opponent teams and Mike made all eight. He also played some basketball at Pitt.

PERSONAL: A native of Aliquippa, Mike now lives in Downers Grove, Illinois, and works as a stockbroker for Shearson-Hammill & Company. The Ditkas have four children — Michael 8, Mark 7, Megan 5 and Matthew 3.

An All-Stater from Lawton, Oklahoma, Jerry has been active in FFA work and has a roomful of ribbons of champion livestock and poultry exhibits. Majoring in marketing, he has worked summers as a welder's helper. He is married to the former Rhonda Bennett. He was a good field man in track in his Oklahoma prep days.

DOUGLAS, JOHN Linebacker Missouri Ht: 6-2 Wt: 212 Born: 9-6-45 1st Year (D-4 for '68)

John made it through rookie camp in 1968, just long enough to excite the coaches about his potential before being called into the service. Now, after two years in the Army, which included a stint in Viet Nam, he's back for another try. John played two years of college football, leaving school to work after his freshman season. A unanimous All-Big Eight selection as a senior, he played in the North-South and Senior Bowl games. A rugged hitter, John has good speed and displayed good pass coverage potential. A native of Columbia, Missouri, John was co-captain his senior year along with quarter-back Gary Kombrink.

EAST, RON Defensive Tackle Ht: 6-4 Wt: 242 Born: 8-26-43 Montana State 4th Year (FA for '67)

PRO: Going into the 1969 season, Coach Tom Landry said: "This season will tell for Ron East." Coming out of that third season for East, Landry said: "He gained valuable experience when Pugh was hurt. He played a very good game against Los Angeles and showed us he was starting potential." With that in mind, a string that East started in 1967 likely will be broken, that of a rookie defensive lineman making the team in each of three straight years: East, Larry Cole and Halvor Hagen. A free agent, East first got his opportunity when Willie Townes was injured in the pre-season. He saw a lot of

action and would not be dislodged. Aggressive and a great hustler. COLLEGE: As a 212-pound collegiate lineman, East didn't have too much chance of playing. But he went on a heavy work and eat diet and moved up to 247 pounds. A Cowboys scout who had discounted him earlier, decided he should be looked at again. He stuck.

PERSONAL: Moved to Dallas in the off-season and worked as a salesman for Henry S. Miller Company. Married to the former

Marcia Moen. They have one daughter, Erica Ann (3-9-69).

EDWARDS, DAVE Linebacker Auburn Ht: 6-1 Wt: 225 Born: 12-14-39 8th Year (FA for '62)

PRO: It is perhaps unfair, but true that Dave has fallen into the category of the "other linebacker", working as he does with All-Pro Chuck Howley and captain and defensive signal caller Lee Roy Jordan. A step further in that direction was taken in 1969 when it was decided that Howley and Edwards would flip-flop strong and weak side with Edwards going to the strong side. "It worked well for us," Landry said. "Dave had another good year." While the lack of personal notoriety does not bug him, the failure to win the championship does. "I feel like if we can win a championship, get over the top, we'll have a championship team for several seasons." A free agent, Dave was an end in college. He failed to make the Cowboys when tried at offense his first year, but tried again on defense and was obviously successful.

COLLEGE: All-SEC end at Auburn in '61, Dave played under

FLOWERS, RICHMOND Safety-Wide Receiver Tennessee Ht: 6-0 Wt: 180 Born: 6-13-47 2nd Year (D-2 for '69)

PRO: "Richmond was probably our most improved football player last year," Landry says. "He has the speed and the competitiveness. It wouldn't be surprising if he came through for us." This assessment came after a long and difficult year for the Cowboys No. 2 draft choice of 1969. With his outstanding speed, he was looked at first as a wide receiver, then moved to the secondary where he saw duty late as a free safety. He also returned kickoffs.

COLLEGE: Richmond had a brilliant career in track and football for Tennessee. Playing under Doug Dickey as a wide receiver two years and as a tailback one, Flowers was on teams which piled up 8-3, 9-2 and 8-2-1 records. His best track times were hurdles (13.3), 100 (9.3) and high hurdles indoors (6.9). He was the NCAA high

hurdles champion.

PERSONAL: One of the most heralded prep stars ever to come out of the South (Sidney Lanier High School in Montgomery, Alabama), Richmond is the son of the former Attorney General of Alabama. In the off-season Richmond returned to school, receiving his degree in business administration.

FOX, DENTON Safety Texas Tech Ht: 6-2 Wt: 205 Born: 5-21-47 1st Year (D-3 for '70)

"He's not only a good pro prospect, he plays like a pro right now," said Bobby Boyd of Fox, while he was still starring for Texas Tech. A three-year regular with 4.6 speed, Fox intercepted seven passes during his career, including four as a senior. He ran one back for a touchdown. The All-America was born in Sayre, Oklahoma, but grew up in Claude, Texas, better known to Paul Newman fans as Thalia as it was called in Hud. Fox and his wife, only they weren't married then, had a bit part in the film for 10 bucks each. "A lot of people couldn't tell it was me," Fox says. "But I could.

I saw it six times." Fox lettered in basketball and track at Claude. A physical education major, he is married (Sara Beth) and has one daughter. He played in the Blue-Gray and Hula Bowl games.

GAECHTER, MIKE Left Safety Oregon
Ht: 6-0 Wt: 190 Born: 1-9-40 9th Year (FA for '62)

PRO: Mike came into the 1970 season facing a comeback, not because of lack of performance but due to injury. In the final game of last season, the Runner-Up Bowl against the Rams in Miami, Mike tore his Achilles, a difficult injury to come back from. The eight-year veteran had, as he has had most every year since he came into the NFL as a free agent, a good one. He has faced adversity before: he played little collegiate football; he had problems with the Cowboys organization; he has played with a particularly difficult occupational hazard; that of having an allergy to grass and playing on a bad leg. Despite this he has been one of the best, if not most underrated strong safeties in the game. Says Eagles General Manager Pete Retzlaff of the vicious hitter: "If I had him on me every Sunday, I would have gotten out of this business a long while ago."

COLLEGE: Lettered only as a senior at Oregon, where he was more noted as trackman...won "Most Improved Player" award as senior halfback...in track was a 9.5 sprinter and 14.1 high hurdler...ran leg on 40 flat sprint relay team and was member of NCAA championship track team of '62...majored in education.

PERSONAL: Born in Santa Monica, Calif., but grew up in Lancaster, Calif., where he was 150-pound halfback and track standout ... married to the former Barbara Clarke of Columbia, S. Carolina ... lives in Dallas where he is in the outdoor sign business. Mike and his wife have one daughter, Katharine Elizabeth (7-29-69).

PRO: His teammates call Walt "puddin". It best be in jest. He is the epitome of the Marlboro Man, both on and off the field. The former Oklahoma State star served a three-year apprenticeship behind all-time Cowboys great Don Perkins and while he had looked good

when called upon, there remained the question of whether he could produce regularly or not. Then Perk retired just before the 1969 season. The answer came quickly and decisively. He rushed for 818 yards in his first year as a regular and combined with Calvin Hill to form the best one-two running punch in the Club's history. Walt is a genuine Cowboy and experts who watched him said he could have been highly successful on the rodeo circuit, bulldogging, riding and roping. Walt is typical of a tough competitor. Asked the difference in taking a late blow in football and a lusty shot from a Brahma bull, Walt says: "Shucks, you can't blame the bull. After all, you started the whole thing." Walt, a fifth round choice, was the first draftee who ever received a horse trailer as part of his bonus. "I don't imagine I'd be here now if they hadn't given me that trailer," he said.

COLLEGE: All-time star at Oklahoma State . . . two-time all-Big Eight selection . . . rushed for 730 yards as junior and 924 as senior, including 121 against unbeaten Nebraska and 173 against Kansas State . . . played in East-West and Senior Bowl games.

PERSONAL: A native Texan from Lewisville. Married Dallasite Pam Phillips and they have one son, Phillip Martin (6-5-69).

GREEN, CORNELL Cornerback Utah State Ht: 6-3 Wt: 208 Born: 2-10-40 9th Year (FA for '62)

PRO: Cornell is the first to admit that when he finished his brilliant basketball career at Utah State his intentions were to take his football bonus, report to Cowboys camp, sweat it out a while and move on to the professional basketball camp and make that his career. Now eight years and four All-Pro years later he never has made it to that basketball camp. Cornell came to that first camp greener than his name and typically, in his philosophical manner he figures that may have been a plus. He was lined up with half a million free agents like himself, but most had played collegiate football. "Most of those guys had developed bad habits," Cornell says. "Me? I hadn't developed any habits at all. Basketball was no hindrance," he adds. "You come into the League and everybody has it all to learn anyway, whether they know it or not." It is hard to refute Green. He has been the regular left cornerback for all but five games since he's been there, and stands until today as one of the all-time free agent finds ever. He has been so solid in fact that the quarterbacks have ignored him and driven a half dozen right cornerbacks nuts for the Cowboys. Veterans will tell you that attitude is a big factor in the success of a cornerback, the ability to shake defeat. At 6-3 and 208

he is a big cornerback. His attitude is bigger.

COLLEGE: Skipped collegiate football to concentrate on basketball, averaging over 20 points a game in each of 3 seasons... basketball All-America selection in 1960, his soph season...3-year All-Skyline Conference choice... studied business and social science.

PERSONAL: Born in Oklahoma City, he grew up in Richmond, California, where he was all-star cager... played football (full-back) only as a senior and made several all-star selections... one of five boys, a brother being former major league baseballer Pumpsie Green...married to former Betty Jones and they have two boys—Randy, 6, and Ronnie, 4.

PRO: Halvor spent his rookie season on defense, saw little action except for the specialty teams, and now moves to offense. There seems little question now but what the Cowboys No. 3 draft choice of 1969 has a future. It is simply a matter of finding out where. He showed so much in rookie camp that he was worked offensively and defensively in the line and asked to do some work at linebacker. "That means," he quickly tallied at \$500 per book, "\$1,500 worth of playbooks."

COLLEGE: Hagen played one year of Junior College football at Shoreline Community in Seattle and two seasons for Weber State where his development came at a fantastic rate. From Spring ball until the start of his senior year he went from 210 to 240 pounds

and could handle it, as his 5.0 speed attests.

PERSONAL: A business administration major, Hagen has what could be described as exciting hobbies. He has a private pilot's license and has followed in his father's footsteps as a skier. His father, Gunner, was one of the greats of his time. Halvor is single.

HAYES, BOB Wide Receiver Florida A & M

PRO: Until such time as the game has been altered drastically, touchdowns will remain a rather major factor. So when you check your list of all-time active receivers in the NFC and find Hayes 10th, keep two things in mind. One, he's been in the League only five years, and, two, if the chart went by touchdowns, the former Olympic king

would be resting on top. The Bullet is the trademark of the Cowboys slashing, high scoring attack. Bombs are his business and the threat is almost as valuable as the six points. "If he never catches a pass, he's worth a couple of touchdowns a game," says teammate Dan Reeves. Add to this, he is perhaps the best punt returner in the game and the package is most explosive. As President Tex Schramm says: "The remarkable thing about Hayes is that he does something outstanding in every game. Something different each time." For the first time in his career injury became a factor in 1969 as he missed the first four games of the season after suffering a shoulder separation in the pre-season. It cut down on his statistics, but he still caught 40 balls and now ranks as the No. 2 all-time Cowboys receiver behind Frank Clarke's 281, a figure he will pass by mid season, based on his 50 catches per year average. "Hayes," Landry says simply, "is our game breaker. Even if most teams double-team Bobby, we still have to hit him."

COLLEGE: Mixed football with track at Florida A&M where he became famous as "World's Fastest Human", set world records in both 100-yard and 100-meter dashes... won 1964 Olympic 100 meters. He was drafted as future in 1963, he signed after 1964 Olympics, was named to College All-Star game.

PERSONAL: Born in Jacksonville, Florida, where he grew up and played football (halfback) and track (best sprint time 9.6)... one of three children. Married to former Altamease Martin of New Brunswick, New Jersey. Bob owns a chain of men's clothing stores called "22 Shops." Bob and his wife have one daughter, Adrienne LaRori (12-31-68).

The result was he was All-Pro, Rookie of the Year everywhere, won trips abroad and ultimately was named Bachelor of the Year in Dallas. His encore has to be interesting. "You always have a little hesitation with a rookie sensation in that sometimes they tend to have sophomoritis," says Landry. "When they start to learn a little bit what's going on, it tends to have them digress slightly. I don't think we'll find that with Hill. I think he's an exception, in the mold of Jim Brown and Leroy Kelly and this type of back." . . . "He has what you can't teach," said all-time great Hugh McElhenny the first time he saw Hill. "He has such natural ability, a natural built in change-of-pace. Because of his long strides, he appears to be coasting. He looks slow, then wow! he puts it on the floorboard." Says Hill on the same subject: "Coach Landry told me to just run natural, do whatever comes natural to you as long as it works." Calvin missed three weeks with a bad foot. A bad blister, which became infected and required a type of surgery on the same foot and kept him in the hospital over six weeks during the off-season. With Hill at running back the Cowboys retained their great success with the running

PRO: "Lee Roy," says Landry "gives you 100 percent. Then he gives you 10 per cent more." That's an old story with Lee Roy and it began a long time ago at Alabama. If the testimony is questioned you can line up a terrific character witness in Bear Bryant. At Alabama, Bryant like any coach worries about a lot of things, but one of the major decisions he faces from time to time is who will wear No. 54, the jersey Lee Roy wore in college. Bryant has always been Lee Roy's biggest booster. "Lee Roy takes it mighty personal when anybody comes at him with a football," the Bear says. "I mean downtown, in the backyard or in your living room." Unquestionably the smallest man in the middle in the NFL, Lee Roy has seen his weight wilt to as low as 213 during the season and has taken some steps he hopes will correct it. He had sinus surgery during the off-season in hopes it will cut down his susceptibility to colds which have plagued him frequently in the past and contributed to his weight loss. This surgery was in addition to knee surgery which he had immediately after the season. Lee Roy is co-captain along with Craig Morton, and is a Pro Bowl regular.

COLLEGE: Named nation's outstanding lineman his senior year at Alabama . . . capped All-America season by making 31 tackles vs. Oklahoma in '63 Orange Bowl . . . went on to College All-Star game . . . Bear Bryant called him the best linebacker he had ever coached.

PERSONAL: Born in Excel, Alabama, one of 7 children ... grew up as Excel farmboy and excelled as high school fullback ... married to the former Mary (Biddy) Banks of Tuscaloosa and they

KINER, STEVE Ht: 6-1 Wt: 220 Linebacker Born: 6-12-47 Tennessee 1st Year (D-3 for '70)

A two-time All-America after being named Sophomore of the Year in the Southeastern Conference, Kiner brings to the Cowboys the reputation of being tough and a hitter. He once made 12 tackles and had two interceptions playing with a broken wrist. Alabama Coach Bear Bryant called him the best SEC linebacker since Lee Roy Jordan. A 168-pound quarterback-linebacker out of Hillsborough High in Tampa, Florida, Kiner was lauded by former Vol Coach Doug Dickey for leadership ability as much as his playing skills. If he makes the club, he will be the fastest linebacker. "And if he doesn't make the club," says scout Red Hickey, "it will be only after the battle."

LEWIS, D. D. Linebacker Mississippi State
Ht: 6-1 Wt: 225 Born: 10-16-45 2nd Year (D-6 for '68)

PRO: D. D. spent the bulk of last season in the service and the remainder on the military reserve list. He was with the Club his rookie season and played on all the specialty teams but saw limited action. He was described his rookie year by Scout Red Hickey as: "pound for pound the best player in the country." A hitter, D. D. went into the 1970 season with a chance, along with John Douglas and Tom Stincic, of making the Cowboys linebacking corps as deep and talented as any in the game.

COLLEGE: A three-year regular for Mississippi State, D. D. was a two-time All-SEC player, making All-America his senior season as well as being named Defensive Player of the Year in the Conference. He played in the Senior Bowl and Blue-Gray games. A late

addition to the All-Star game in Chicago.

PERSONAL: One of 14 children, D. D. grew up in Knoxville, Tennessee. An Education major, D. D. and his wife, Margaret, have one daughter, Christi (10-17-69). D. D. returned to school at Miss. State in the off-season. He also was an assistant coach.

LILLY. BOB **Defensive Tackle** TCU Ht: 6-5 Wt: 260 Born: 7-26-39 10th Year (D-1 for '61)

PRO: It is annually written that Bob is as good as any defensive tackle in football. He has been All-Pro for the past six years and he owns the Pro Bowl, having made seven trips to that. So the question was put to Hall of Famer Ernie Stautner: "Forget who is playing now, has there ever been anyone who plays defensive tackle better than Bob?" "Absolutely not," said Ernie. "My span goes back to 1950 and there have been some good ones. But in my opinion, Bob is the best I've ever seen." There is strong evidence other coaches around the NFL agree. Says Tom Landry: "Man, they're hitting him from every direction. It's kind of pathetic when you watch them, you know, they're putting two men or three men on him ... every conceivable weapon to keep him out of there. You just don't see him at the quarterback all of the time because he's fighting through half the team to get there." Many have had a theory on why he is so great. While Landry does not minimize his other qualities - strength, size, intelligence, experience and will, quickness always pops into his mind. "Nobody," says Tom, "is as quick as Lilly. A Lilly comes along once in a lifetime. The hardest combinations to find in a defensive lineman are quickness and strength. You're talking about Lilly and Deacon Jones." Says Lilly: "Your moves or nothing else are going to work until you run over a few people first. You've got to stomp your guys into the ground a few times to get their respect. Then, the moves may work."

COLLEGE: All-American tackle at TCU, where he was two-time all-SWC choice, with defense his specialty . . . played in College All-Star game . . . Abe Martin called him the best tackle he had

coached . . . nicknamed "Purple Cloud" at TCU.

PERSONAL: Born in Throckmorton, Texas, and lived there all his young life except as high school senior when the family moved to Pendleton, Oregon . . . Made All-State teams in both football (end) and basketball for Pendleton . . . married to the former Katharine (Kitsy) Waltman of Fort Worth and they have three children — Bob, Jr. (7-19-62), Katharine (4-22-64), and Christienne (7-21-65). PRO: Beginning with the 1966 season Tony has performed as a regular at two different positions. He has performed well and without fanfare. Drafted third in the 1963 draft by Green Bay, he was tried at defense and barely missed making the club. The Cowboys picked him up and gave him a shot at offense. He played some in 1963, and in 1964 was as good a lineman as Dallas had. But he was injured late in the season and surgery complications kept him out all of 1965 and the experience explains why he is such a fine competitor now. "It was pure hell," he said of the experience both of trying to get well and sitting on the bench unable to contribute. Last season going into the game against New Orleans he was injured but he played anyway, and compounded the injury in the game. But he didn't come out. "Well," he said, "after I got started, I just couldn't come out. You know, I sat on the bench one whole season and it's hard to take, knowing you're not making a contribution to the team." He hasn't failed that since 1965. He was a regular at guard in 1966 and was moved to tackle when John Niland became a regular in 1967. "Tony is one of the strongest, most effective and consistent players we have," says Landry. After that 1966 season he was second in the voting to Dick Bass as the Comeback Player of the Year. An excellent pass blocker.

COLLEGE: A three-year regular as a two-way tackle at Tulsa, Tony made All-Missouri Valley the last two years and was team captain as a senior. Tony majored in industrial psychology and played for Bobby and Glenn Dobbs. Played basketball as a freshman.

PERSONAL: Tony was a 13-pounder at birth in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, where he went on to stardom at Westinghouse High (All-East in football and All-City in basketball). Tony has five brothers and one sister and is married to Annette Nail of Shreveport. They have three children, Tony II (4-26-64), Michele (3-8-66) and Michael (9-2-69). Tony lives in Dallas. Tony opened Cappello's Imported Foods during off-season.

MANDERS, DAVE Center Michigan State Ht: 6-2 Wt: 250 Born: 2-20-41 6th Year (FA for '62)

PRO: In the early years of the Cowboys, a critical problem was depth. Then a couple of seasons back depth became a strength. And when they talk about depth and the competitiveness which goes with it, as much as anywhere else they're talking about center and Dave Manders. Mandy, one-time regular who now backs up Malcolm Walker was in the Pro Bowl after the 1966 season just to put things in their proper perspective. After a shaky start in pro ball as a free agent which saw him play two seasons of minor league ball, he made the club in 1964. He had the No. 1 center job in 1965 and then his big season in 1966. But in the pre-season game at San Francisco he tore up a knee and missed all of 1967. In 1968 he got off to a slow start with infected feet. Walker won the job and is a difficult man to dislodge. A former player rep for the Cowboys, Manders has the respect of everyone, not only for his ability but also for his hustle. "He's such

a hard worker," says offensive line coach Jim Myers, "that he's one of the ones you have to watch on a hot day. He'll work himself right into the ground."

COLLEGE: A top two-way lineman at Michigan State under Duffy Daugherty . . . played center and was named honorable mention All-America as senior.

PERSONAL: Native of Milwaukee, he was schoolboy star at Kinsford, Michigan . . . Married to the former Betty Ashenbrenner in '61 and has three children — Mark (10-18-62), Mike (6-18-65) and Catherine Elizabeth (10-3-69)...lives in Dallas in the off-season and is an account executive for KBOX radio.

MARTIN, JULIAN Wide Receiver North Carolina Central Ht: 6-2 Wt: 190 Born: 8-26-48 Ist Year (D-14 for '70)

A four-year regular, Julian was a three-time All-Conference receiver. He made first team All-Conference as a sophomore and senior ("We didn't throw to him much as a junior because we ran the ball," says Coach George Quiett) and had excellent touchdowns per catch ratios. For his 41 catches as a senior he had 14 TD's. He had six on 19 catches as a junior and 11 on 37 as a sophomore. He's from New Bern, North Carolina and majored in Physical Education. His brother played with the Rams and Eagles.

MORTON, CRAIG Quarterback California Ht: 6-4 Wt: 214 Born: 2-5-43 6th Year (D-1 for '65)

PRO: In May after Tom Landry's quarterback school, he stopped by in Club President Tex Schramm's office. Like everyone else, Schramm wanted to know how Morton's arm felt after the workouts. "Did it feel normal when you cut loose?" Schramm asked him. "I don't know what normal feels like," said Craig. "But it didn't hurt." And that is the Morton story. He came into the 1970 season older and wiser, but not unlike he did in 1969 in that neither he nor the fans know just how good he can be. Everyone has an idea and it's exciting to think about it. For the record, after four years of serving behind Don Meredith he got his chance last year and came to camp ready for it. He exhibited the necessary leadership qualities and threw well in the pre-season games. Then, he dislocated a finger and missed the first regular season game. But in games two, three and four he was unbelievable. He was rocking along with a 73% passing percentage when he was racked up in Atlanta. He suffered a shoulder separation; he played the rest of the way, never missing a game, but he was a 50% passer the rest of the way as he was not able to work out effectively. Then, in the off-season he had the surgery. He retained his sense of humor. "I learned something with this surgery," he said. "I learned how to change a tire lefthanded." This after having a flat the week he got out of the hospital. He retained his enthusiasm. "Quarterback school this Spring was, as far as I'm concerned, the best we've ever had. Things seemed to fall into place so much better." And he retained his determination. "We're at a point in our history

PRO: "Ralph," says teammate Bob Lilly, "is the only player I've seen who was never a rookie. He moved right in and did the job." This was sometime ago when Bob made the observation. Certainly Ralph proved him accurate as in five seasons in the NFL, Ralph has been All-Pro at tackle four of them, missing only his first year. And even then he didn't miss by much and his teammates re-

garded him as such for he had "made" the Cowboys theretofore inadequate offensive line. Now, near the peak of his career Ralph gets to prove he's a "pro" once again. During the off-season the Cowboys traded regular right guard John Wilbur to St. Louis and Coach Tom Landry announced he was moving Ralph to guard with the idea of inserting Rayfield at tackle. Ralph made the move without reservation other than the idea it would take him a while to adjust to the position. "We needed height and strength at right guard," said Cowboys Coach Jim Myers. "It's a challenge to Ralph and will take a lot of sacrifice on his part to play the new position. But he was an All-Pro at tackle and I think he'll be an All-Pro at guard." It was Myers, who, when asked how long it would take Ralph to break into the starting lineup as a rookie despite missing camp for the All-Star Game, said: "About the second quarter of the first game." Asked about the move Ralph said simply: "I told the coaches I'd play anywhere they thought it would help the team." Hopefully, Ralph will continue to receive his football thrills although they'll start a yard to the left. "The greatest thrill in football," says Ralph, "is Tuesday morning when we review the game films and the head coach says 'Neely, you did a good job.' Some tackles are weightlifting fanatics. I'm a fanatic on technique. I want to be perfect."

COLLEGE: A two-time All-America tackle at Oklahoma, including consensus selection as a '64 senior... Lettered three years, started in all 20 of his games as junior and senior... played at 6-5, 245... double-majored in financing and accounting.

PRO: Quiet and personable off the field, the Dallas business man and humanitarian is one of the real leaders of the Cowboys and without question one of the finest team players. No better example than last season when the club acquired Mike Ditka, who was there to battle Pettis for the tight end job. He was the first to help Ditka. "I knew the system and he didn't," was Pettis' simple explanation. "So I offered suggestions that might help him. If he's able to beat me out, I'll still feel like I've helped the team. If I hadn't done my best toward him, and I kept the job, I wouldn't have been able to live with it." Pettis, in his ninth season, is a rugged competitor and something of a policeman. Long recognized as perhaps the premier blocking tight end in NFL, Pettis is a better receiver than given credit for. When thrown to he can catch it. "Being recognized as a good blocking end is a nice compliment but I'd like to be recognized as the best tight end, period. I'd hate to have that blocking reputation embedded

in everybody's mind so much they get the impression I'm not a receiver also." Pettis is the No. 6 all-time pass receiver for the Cowboys despite dividing time during his career with both Frank Clarke and Ditka.

COLLEGE: A standout as end at little-known Johnson C. Smith, where he was also top student . . . in one '61 game, he caught 5 passes for 133 yards and two TDs and made 14 tackles . . . also clocked a 9.7 time in the 100 in track.

PERSONAL: Born in Lincolnton, Georgia, and grew up in Charlotte, North Carolina... married to former Margaret Clinkscales of Charlotte and they have three daughters, Shareen (12-3-64), Sedonna (6-5-68), and Shandra (4-27-70). PRO: Through the 1968 season Jethro had established himself after four years in the League to the point Coach Tom Landry said: "Outside of Bob Lilly, I don't know another tackle in the Eastern Conference better than Jethro." But in 1969, while he didn't play poorly, he did not have a big year. This was due to illness and then injury, even to the point he missed a game. In training camp he had an ulcer attack, something he has a history of. Then, later he got a shoulder knocked down and at one point had leg problems. A mild comeback is in order and there is no doubt it will be there. Jethro was an 11th round draft choice who became a windfall. Out of Elizabeth City State, Jethro came to camp with nothing much to exhibit but size. But patience allowed his talent to come to the front. It also helped, as he will tell you, to have Bob Lilly playing on the other side. Someone mentioned to Pugh one time that Lilly might someday retire and he would draw the double and triple teaming Lilly does. "Don't you know I have ulcers?" Jethro said. "Please don't mention anything to me about Bob not being there." Pugh is ready now though and it doesn't matter much who is on the other side: "When he's aroused," says Ernie Stautner, "he a great one."

Reeves stands third on the all-time rushing charts; he's seventh on the alltime receiving charts; he's been as good a running pass thrower as just about anybody in the game and he's eased minds by serving as insurance quarterbacking help. Now he's the offensive backfield coach. "This is an unbelievable opportunity. I've always wanted to coach, and now I can learn from the man who I've always thought was the best coach in football, I like the system and the philosophy of offense It just couldn't have worked out better for me." While an adjustment period was anticipated, it isn't like he is moving into a new business. Landry and Ermal Allen have always been impressed with Dan's knowledge of the game. "I think my quarterbacking background and attending the quarterback meetings have helped me in understanding the overall picture. I've always tried to learn as much as I could about the game because I knew someday I'd like to coach." A free agent. Reeves was tried in the secondary and as a receiver and finally as a running back. In his sophomore season he made it big, rushing for 757 yards. PRO: If you are not a team player, talent can be a handicap. It is well, then, that Renfro is a team player. Because he has talent running out his ears. The result has been that Renfro has been moved, and moved, and moved again, always performing well. He is, whether at safety, cornerback or even on offense as it was in 1966, a team strength. He is easily the career leader in interceptions. Yet he has been in the League only six seasons. He has been the premier kickoff return leader. He has been tried on offense, where he did well until injured. He is second only to Bob Hayes as a punt return man. Thus he went into 1970 as he did in 1969, headed for cornerback, but facing the possibility of going to safety. "We feel like right now he could help the team more at cornerback. But, we must have a good free safety in our system to be effective."
And on that subject Landry says: "Mel's the best there is in the League at free safety. He's just got a great knack for the position." The thought had been to put Mel at corner for 1969, but once again he ended up at free safety where he set a club record for 10 interceptions (he has 31 for his career) and made All-Pro for the third time. He's been in the Pro Bowl six times. Mel's first love has always been carrying the football and he did well until he was injured in 1966. Now he gets his hands on it only when he intercepts. "The opponent doesn't only have to worry about him getting the ball," says 49'er Coach Dick Nolan, "they have to be very concerned with what he does with it when he gets it." Mel has a 100-yard kick-off return to his credit.

COLLEGE: One of the all-time performers at Oregon as an All-America halfback, also standout trackman with bests of 9.6 in 100, 13.8 in high hurdles and 25-11% in the broad jump . . . Played in the 1964 All-Star game.

PRO: The heretofore blithe spirit of the Cowboys took on a new role in the off-season and has been working toward the forming of an organization of young people of the silent majority. "I believe in the right to dissent," says Rentzel, "but I think some demonstrations have gotten out of hand. I think our generation should take a positive stand and not action which causes more problems." Rentzel turned out to be one of the big bargains in Club history, coming to the Cowboys from Minnesota for a third round draft choice after spending two seasons with the Vikings primarily on specialty teams. He has led the Club in number of catches in each of his three seasons, bagging 58, 54 and 43, and ranks fourth among all-time Cowboys receivers. And he holds the Cowboys single game record of 13 catches for 223 yards. The low of 43 last year could probably be explained in two ways—the increased running of Calvin Hill and that running mate Bob Hayes missed four games, allowing the opponents to double-team more. When Hayes is in the line-up, there is obviously little double coverage on Rentzel. Last year was Rentzel's biggest in touchdowns as he scored 13 times, 12 of them catching passes. His catches averaged 22.3 yards.

COLLEGE: All-Big Eight halfback at Oklahoma . . . broke into college football in Cotton Bowl against Texas as sophomore . . . came off injured list too late and hitchhiked to game, suited up and caught two long passes . . . caught TD pass against Cleveland in All-Star game.

PERSONAL: An All-America high schooler at Casady in Oklahoma City where he grew up... born in Flushing, New York, he is making his home in Dallas... math major and an accomplished pianist and organist who has played professionally... recording contract with Columbia Records, and pondering acting parts... has a younger brother at SMU. Married to Joey Heatherton and has done considerable television work himself.

PRO: Few players have come into the pro world with more fanfare than Staubach. And the indications are they were justified. The elderly rookie of last season played well in the only regular season game which he started, that being the opener when Craig Morton was out with a dislocated finger. Landry says Roger is capable of challenging Morton, but seriously for 1970 only if Morton should have difficulty re-establishing his passing form of the early part of 1969. The jolly scrambler proved as time went on that he could drop back and throw the football. Roger has, in addition to his physical ability, great leadership qualities. As teammate Ralph Neely recalls from the time they were in the All-Star game together: "After 30 minutes on the field we could have taken a vote and elected Staubach captain. I don't know why—it's just something about the guy that exudes leadership. He's got it."

COLLEGE: Roger must be rated as one of the outstanding collegiate players of all time and certainly as great a figure as ever played for Navy. He won the Heisman Trophy as a junior and still holds 13 of the 28 Naval Academy records he set as a midshipman. Some are phenomenal. He hit 67.3 per cent of his passes as a sophomore and his career total was 63.6. He averaged 9.9 yards per attempt in 1962 and 9.2 the following year. His career record for total offense was 4,253 yards. Some of his awards were AP and UPI Back of the Year, Maxwell Trophy, Sport's Top Performer in College and Football, etc. The list is lengthy. In addition, he won a basketball letter and was a regular in baseball, batting .420 one season as a centerfielder.

PRO: Like most rookies, Stincic did not play a lot in his first season last year, but he showed enough to all concerned that he has a future and it could begin in 1970. "I think the most challenging player to the regulars right now would be Tom," Landry says. "He has the size, speed, the agility and the ability to move into pass defense."

COLLEGE: All-Big Ten his last two years at Michigan, Tom was captain his senior year. However, his leadership qualities were recognized earlier when as a freshman defensive end, he received the award given annually for that trait.

PERSONAL: Tom grew up in Cleveland where he attended John Marshall High. Tom is single. He spent the off-season in Cleveland.

THOMAS, DUANE Running Back West Texas State
Ht: 6-1 Wt: 220 Born: 6-21-47 1st Year (D-1 for '70)

The name Calvin Hill stunned the world when he was chosen No. 1 in the draft in 1969. He became rookie of the year. This makes scout Red Hickey's remarks impressive: "If we rated on pure ability—running, catching, blocking—we'd probably rate Thomas ahead of Hill. Whether he turns out to be another Hill is another story. He

has great hands, he's a good blocker, he's got great size and speed. When you say that, you've said about all you can." In three seasons, he averaged 6.0 yards per carry with 2,378 yards on 396 carries. Beginning as a sophomore he rushed for 595 (in five games), 708 and 1,072. A physical education major, Thomas is from Dallas Lincoln High School where he was also a good hurdle and sprint man in track. Asked what type of runner he was, Thomas said: "I'm in and out and over. Wherever they tell me to go, I'll go." Thomas has 4.6 speed.

TOOMAY, PAT Defensive End Vanderbilt

Pat was a three-year letterman for Coach Bill Pace and he has the speed and quickness to rate a chance. He was a high school All-America out of Thomas Edison High School in Alexandria, Virginia, where he was a quarterback. Pat was also an All-State pitcher and lettered in basketball. Scouts say he needs to put on weight, but that his frame is capable of carrying it. He has never worked at beefing up before. A quick learner, he is an electrical engineering major. He played in the Blue-Gray game.

He has unusual athletic ability. He has good quickness and excellent moves."

COLLEGE: All-American and two-time Missouri Valley All-Conference choice...outstanding lineman in Bluebonnet Bowl against Mississippi as a sophomore...enrolled originally at Indiana, but transferred to Tulsa after freshman season.

PERSONAL: One of 10 children (seven sisters and two brothers), grew up in Hattiesburg, Miss. . . . prep whiz at end, tackle and full-back, playing at 6-3 and 220 . . . worked hurdles and weights in track and averaged 14 points per game in basketball . . . Willie and his wife, DeeDee, make their home in Dallas.

PRO: In three years the Cowboys had three different centers until Malcolm took the job in 1968. Now the big former Rice star will be going for his third, trying to recover from a bad knee which required surgery and, as usual, fighting off Dave Manders. Walker is a classic case of patience paying off, for while he has played only four seasons he was drafted second in 1965. He was injured practicing for the All-Star Game in Chicago and missed all of his rookie season following surgery. Still not sound, he didn't make his debut until late in 1966 on specialty teams. Early in his career he had weight problems, but has worked hard for better distribution, taking for instance, three inches off his thighs. "When you start playing regularly, you gain a certain confidence. And it helps you believe you can do the job."

Married to former Mary Jo Holder of Houston and they have one son, Joel Wyane (12-13-68).

WASHINGTON, MARK Cornerback Morgan State Ht: 5-11 Wt: 183 Born: 12-28-47 1st Year (D-13 for '70)

Mark was voted comeback player of the year at Morgan State after his junior season, was named co-captain and responded by intercepting six passes to climax a four-year career as a regular. For the career he intercepted 15 passes. Mark, a native of Chicago where he attended Harlan High School, has a B average in chemistry. Good speed and a hitter.

WATERS, CHARLIE Cornerback-Safety Clemson Ht: 6-1 Wt: 193 Born: 9-10-48 1st Year (D-3 for '70)

Charlie comes to the Cowboys blessed with an excellent reputation as a pass receiver, gained after being converted from quarterback. But it will all be cast aside since it is believed he has an excellent chance as a defensive back. The North Augusta, South Carolina, swiftie (4.65) finished his career for Coach Frank Howard as the No. 3 all-time pass receiver and would have been No. 1 had he played there all the way. But he was a quarterback as a sophomore and through the first three games of 1968 when the regular quarterback was injured. For his career he caught 68 for 1,165, that in only 15 games. Charlie won three letters each in baseball and basketball in high school and two in football. He majored in science teaching. When his name came up in the draft, scout Red Hickey told Coach Tom Landry: "Tom, I'd take this boy and tell him to start back pedaling. He's a good athlete and he can play defense."

WELCH, CLAXTON Running Back Oregon Ht: 5-11 Wt: 203 Born: 7-3-47 2nd Year (D-9 for '69)

PRO: On the active roster only part of the time last year, Welch is another of the Cowboys strong crop of rookies in 1969 who could make his presence felt this year. He has good speed (4.6) and needs only to run under control more to be extra.

COLLEGE: Was a tremendous inside runner for Oregon, rushing for 525 yards as a senior despite missing three of the last four games. As a junior he gained 474 yards rushing and caught seven passes

for 109 yards.

PERSONAL: A Sociology major, Claxton grew up in Portland, Oregon, where he was an All-State player in both football and basketball for David Douglas High. He is single. He spent the off-season in the National Guard.

WHITSELL, DAVE Safety Indiana
Ht: 6-0 Wt: 185 Born: 7-14-36 13th Year (D-24 for '58)

PRO: David came to the Cowboys from New Orleans with rookie running back Tom Broadhead in a trade for Jackie Burkett just before the season started. The dozen-year veteran, who has played with three clubs and been on the roster of two others, ranks second among active pass thieves in the National Conference with 46. And only three years ago he led the NFL with 10. The past two seasons he picked off six and three, but played hurt the last five games. He was named the UPI Comeback Player of the Year the 1967 campaign. If he can put it together for another season he could be a valuable asset for the Cowboys.

COLLEGE: Played two years of defense for Coach Phil Dickens

at Indiana.

PERSONAL: Dave has a BS degree from Indiana. He and his wife, Jacque, have four children: Amy Jo, Lisa Kay, Mike and Danny. He makes his home in New Orleans where he is in several businesses. He also has business ties in Indianapolis.

COLLEGE: Attended Brigham Young before transferring to California Poly. Had concussion and missed tragic airline trip when California Poly team went down in Ohio. He was an NCAA heavyweight boxing champion and had opportunities to fight professionally.

PERSONAL: A California resident, Fred teaches school in Glendora. A native of Boston, Massachusetts, he has a masters degree in education. He and his wife, Nancy, have three sons.

PRO: Although he's been punting only two years in the NFL, Ron finished the 1969 season as the No. 2 punter with his 43.3 average, second only to David Lee's 45.3. A big improvement for Ron was in consistency. His average came saddled with one lousy punt (eight yards) and without any lucky kick, his longest going 62 yards. Ron was originally drafted by New Orleans but came to Dallas where he taxied and played a year for Oklahoma City in the minors.

COLLEGE: Widby was the NCAA punting champion as a senior at Tennessee with a 43.8 yard average and was also a collegiate All-America as a basketball player.

WRIGHT, RAYFIELD Tackle Ft. Valley State (Ga.) Ht: 6-6 Wt: 255 Born: 8-23-45 4th Year (D-7 for '67)

PRO: Ever since Rayfield came up in 1967, the word potential has been used as if an actual piece of his name, and this whether he was at tight end or offensive tackle or ever so briefly in camp at one time, as defensive end. So much so a couple of college students last year began a campaign to "Unleash Rayfield Wright". At times he was unleashed, particularly against Los Angeles when Ralph Neely was unable to go. As a result of his performance against Deacon Jones in that game he went into the 1970 season as a threat to start. Said Landry: "It may be particularly difficult for the regulars to keep Wright out of the line-up. Where he could break in we don't know. If he didn't beat out a tackle, it is possible that we might have a readjustment in the line, switching some guards and tackles." The coach's observations were made in early spring. Then, shortly before training camp the confidence in Wright was further stressed. Regular right guard, John Wilbur, was traded to St. Louis, All-Pro tackle, Ralph Neely, was moved to that guard spot and the right tackle assignment was Wright's. The improved weight program worked wonders with Wright and he went into camp at about 255.

COLLEGE: From Ft. Valley State in Georgia, "Big Tom" was all-Conference football and basketball player as well as track man. He logged 50 flat quarter.

PERSONAL: From Griffin, Georgia, Wright now makes his home in Dallas and was married in 1968 to long-time sweetheart, Andrea Joyce Lampkin in Atlanta. He worked with Sanger-Harris in the off-season.

Historical Highlights

1960

NFL FRANCHISE—Clint Murchison, Jr., and Bedford Wynne were awarded an expansion franchise in the NFL at the annual league meeting in Miami Beach, Fla. The Cowboys were to play as a "swing" team, playing every other team one time during their first season, although listed in the Western Conference standings (January 28).

COWBOYS STOCKED—A player pool was set up in a league meeting at L.A., with each of 12 NFL teams freezing 25 names on its roster and the Cowboys allowed to pick three from each team for a total of 36 veterans. Dallas, once given the list, had to select its 36 players within 24 hours (March 13).

TRAINING STARTS—Rookies report to first Cowboys camp at Pacific U., in Forest Grove, Oregon (July 9).

FIRST PRE-SEASON GAME—The Cowboys, less than six months in existence, get their first test and drop a 10-16 pre-season game to San Francisco in Seattle (August 6).

FIRST HOME GAME—In their Dallas debut, in the Salesmanship Club pre-season game, the Cowboys led the World Champion Baltimore Colts into the final minute before a 71-yard pass from Johnny Unitas to Lenny Moore gave the Colts a 14-10 victory (August 19).

FIRST VICTORY—In a pre-season game at Louisville, Ky., the Cowboys beat New York's Giants, 14-3, with Frank Clarke catching touchdown passes of 73 yards (Eddie LeBaron) and 74 yards (Don Meredith). (August 27).

FIRST LEAGUE GAME—In their first league game, Dallas fell to Pittsburgh, 35-28, with Bobby Layne leading a fourth period Steeler rally (Sept. 24, Saturday night).

STREAK SNAPPED—Dallas snaps a 10-game loss streak by tying New York, 31-31, at Yankee Stadium (Dec. 4).

1961

TRAINING STARTS — Rookies launch training at new campsite—St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minn. (July 9).

FIRST LEAGUE WIN—Scoring ten points in the final 56 seconds, the Cowboys score their first NFL victory, 27-24, over Pittsburgh in the '61 league opener in the Cotton Bowl. Allen Green's 27-yard field goal on the game's final play won it before 23,500 (Sept. 17).

1962

TRAINING STARTS — Team begins training at new campsite — Northern Michigan College in Marquette, Mich. (July 13).

PENALTY HISTORY — For the first time in anyone's memory in an NFL game, points were awarded for a penalty. The Cowboys were

detected holding in the end zone on a 99-TD pass from LeBaron to Clarke, and Pittsburgh was awarded a safety. The Steelers eventually won, 30-28 (Sept. 23).

100-YARD FIRSTS — Cowboys Amos Marsh returned a kickoff 101 yards and Mike Gaechter returned a pass interception 100 yards, both plays for fourth quarter TD's in a 41-19 win over Philadelphia in Dallas. It was the first time in NFL history that two 100-yard runs had been made in the same game, much less by the same team in the same quarter (Oct. 14).

1963

SHIFT TO KANSAS CITY—The rival Dallas Texans of the AFL announce they are moving the franchise to Kansas City (Feb. 8).

CALIFORNIA TRAINING SITE—The Cowboys open training at California Lutheran College in Thousand Oaks, Calif. (July 12).

HOWTON SETS RECORD—Bill Howton broke Don Hutson's alltime receiving mark with a 14-yard catch against Washington (there). Hutson's record was 7,991 yards and the catch gave Howton an even 8,000 yards (Sept. 29).

ANOTHER HOWTON MARK — Howton breaks another Hutson mark by catching his 490th NFL pass, against NY in Yankee Stadium (Oct. 20). Howton went on to stretch his career total to 503 for 8,459 yards during 1963, then retired.

1964

LANDRY CONTRACT — With one year to go on his original contract, Tom Landry is signed to a ten-year extension, in effect giving him an 11-year pact, possibly the longest in major pro sports history (Feb. 5).

1965

NEELY AWARDED TO COWBOYS — A U.S. District Court Judge ruled the contract of Oklahoma tackle Ralph Neely with Houston invalid. Neely had signed with Houston before the Gator Bowl game; Dallas signed Neely on Jan. 1 (June 22).

FIRST SELLOUT — An overflow crowd of 76,251 jams the Cotton Bowl for the Cleveland game, notching the team's first home sellout. Cleveland won, 24-17 (Nov. 21).

1966

PLAYOFF BOWL — After defeating New York, 38-20, in the season finale (and winning five of their last seven games) to get into the Playoff Bowl at Miami, the Cowboys fall to Baltimore, 35-3 (Jan. 15).

NEELY DECISION REVERSED — U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Denver reverses District Court decision, awards tackle Ralph Neely to Houston (May 18).

MERGER — Peace comes to pro football with Cowboys GM Tex Schramm completing two months of negotiations with AFL's Lamar

Hunt, resulting in merger of the two leagues under the NFL banner (June 8).

SCHRAMM ELEVATED — Texas E. Schramm, Vice-President and General Manager of the Cowboys from the beginning, was named President of the club by owner Clint Murchison, Jr., who retained the title of Chairman of the Board.

NEELY CASE SOLVED — Dallas and Houston reached agreement in the Ralph Neely case. Neely remained with Dallas with Houston receiving the Cowboys Nos. 1, 2 and two fifth place picks in the 1967 draft (Nov. 17).

THE CHAMPIONSHIP — The Cowboys won their first championship, capturing the Eastern Conference title with a 10-3-1 record, but lost the NFL Championship Game to Green Bay, 34-27.

1967

TEXAS STADIUM — On Dec. 23, owner Clint Murchison, Jr., formally announced plans to build Texas Stadium in suburban Irving. The stadium, to be financed through a bond-option plan, would be ready for the 1970 season. The stadium would seat a minimum of 58,000.

SECOND CHAMPIONSHIP — Under the NFL's new format, the Cowboys easily won the Capitol Division and defeated Cleveland, Century Division winner, 52-14, in the Cotton Bowl for the Eastern conference championship. However, on Dec. 31 in Green Bay, the Cowboys lost their second bid for an NFL title, falling to the Packers, 21-17, in the 13 degree below weather.

1968

TEXAS STADIUM — On December 26th, the Tecon Corporation bid of \$17,964,000.00 was accepted by the Irving City Council and it was full speed ahead.

WIN CAPITOL — For the second straight year the Cowboys won the Capitol Division, but for the first time in three years the Cowboys did not win the Eastern Championship, being upset at Cleveland, 31-20, on December 21st. Dallas won the Runner-Up Bowl over Minnesota, 17-13.

1969

TEXAS STADIUM — On June 29th, Bert Rose was named general manager of Texas Stadium.

ORIGINALS RETIRE — An era ended for the Cowboys in July. On July 5th at a press conference in Dallas, quarterback Don Meredith, the last of the original Cowboys, announced his retirement. Then, on July 18th, the day the veterans were to report to training camp, all-time rushing great Don Perkins officially retired.

REPEAT CAPITOL WINS—Once again the Cowboys rolled to the Capitol Division Championship with an 11-2-1 season. However, the Cowboys failed to win the Eastern Championship when on Dec. 28, the Cowboys lost to Cleveland, 38-14, in the Cotton Bowl. Dallas lost the Playoff Bowl game in Miami to Los Angeles, 31-0.
