There are three men with the Dallas Cowboys today who were with them when Clint W. Murchison Jr. was awarded an expansion franchise in 1960 - President and General Manager Texas E. Schramm, Head Coach Tom Landry and Vice President Gil Brandt.

Sam Blair of the Dallas Morning News, writing in the 1976 edition

of Dave Campbell's Dallas Cowboys Magazine, noted:

"Shortly after Schramm moved to Dallas, Tom Landry and Gil Brandt joined him, Landry in his first head coaching job and Brandt in his first experience as a full-time director of scouting. All three obviously have thrived in their jobs. Schramm, Landry and Brandt now are approaching their 17th season together (18th in 1977), a longevity which none of their contemporaries in pro football can match - or even threaten.

"They're still there because they've been highly successful and

because they like what they're doing and where they're doing it."

Schramm controls the day-to-day operations of the club. He was named President in 1966, retaining the position of General Manager.

Brandt directs the Cowboys' scouting operation and supervises the signing of all veteran players as Vice President for Personnel Development.

Schramm, a graduate of the University of Texas, joined the Los Angeles Rams as publicity director in 1947. In a 10-year career with the Rams he rose to General Manager.

Tex left the Rams in 1957 to join CBS as Assistant Director of

Sports and was there when Murchison called from Dallas.

Schramm, during the spring of 1977, received an honorary degree

from California Lutheran College (Doctor of Humane Letters).

Brandt pioneered many of the scouting techniques used by most clubs today. He may have been the first to look seriously at basketball players and trackmen as prospective NFL stars.

A native of Milwaukee and a graduate of the University of Wisconsin. Gil was a part-time scout with the Rams (and a baby photographer in Milwaukee) when he showed the flair for discovering talent that led him to Dallas.



THE COACH

Tom Landry, the quiet, analytical boss of the Dallas Cowboys who is the only head coach the club has had, probably is best described as the coach who created defenses to overcome offenses, then created offenses to overcome those defenses.

The former all-conference fullback at the University of Texas and All-Pro cornerback with the New York Giants had — heading into the 1976 season — guided the Cowboys to 11 consecutive winning seasons

and into the league playoffs in 10 of those 11 years.

Leadership has been a perfect fit on Tom Landry for a long time, even as far back as World War II when he flew 30 missions over Germany with the U. S. Air Corps. So it's only fitting that he is one of the leaders in total victories among active pro coaches, being second only to Miami's Don Shula. Landry's Cowboys have won 74 percent of their games the past 11 seasons after struggling through the lean, early years of an expansion franchise.

Tom is No. 6 on the list of all-time winningest NFL coaches.

Twenty-some years ago, when he was defensive coordinator of the Giants, then-New York Head Coach Jim Lee Howell called Landry "the greatest defensive coach in football." Those were the days when the Giants were the scourge of the NFL and Landry's defensive unit was a big reason for the dynasty.

Recalls Cowboys President and General Manager Tex Schramm, "The only area of decision in hiring Landry hinged on the fact that you take a very big gamble any time you take an assistant coach and make him a head coach. For each one that succeeds, there are four or five who don't.

"But there was no question about Tom, because he had been so successful as an assistant and he was so highly regarded by his players and the people who worked with him. And with a new club, it would be better to start with someone young and bright like Tom rather than with someone older. He could grow with the organization."

At age 53 this September you might say Landry has grown with the Cowboys — and prospered. Last year's 11-3 record upped his alltime mark to 137-93-6 for 17 seasons. The Cowboys have been 112-40-2 since 1966, a better record than any team in professional football during that span.

And yet Landry says he goes to training camp every year "scared to death." He adds. "That keeps me on edge, it makes me careful

about evaluating what has happened in the past.

Thus, as far as the Cowboys' past successes, they are to Landry somewhat like cold potatoes. "I don't look at past records, because they mean nothing."

There was plenty of motivation for the head coach in 1977, since a blazing 9-1 start in 1976 dropped off to a 2-2 finish and a first-game

playoff loss to the Los Angeles Rams.

"It was an unusual year," says Landry of '76. "Our major goal was to win the Eastern Division (which they did). We felt if we won the East we would have a good enough football team to go back to the Super Bowl (for the fourth time). It didn't work out that way. The first seven games were probably the best we've had as a team. In my opinion, we lost our momentum and were never able to regain it."

With just a brief glance over his shoulder, Landry added, "This team has been a very consistent football team over the past 11 years, and it's basically due to the caliber of players we have. We have players with good character — a quality that enables them to overcome adversity. Of course, I know it's impossible to stay up all the time. Eventually

we're going to have to sit back and regroup. "I hope it's not in the near future."

Tom was born in Mission, Tex., on Sept. 11, 1924. He was an All-Regional fullback at Mission High School before enrolling at the University of Texas. Following one semester, he went into the Air Corps

and flew those B-17 missions with the Eighth Air Force.

Following his discharge as a 1st Lieutenant in November of 1945, Tom returned to Texas where he earned All-Southwest Conference honors as a junior and co-captained the Longhorns as a senior. Those Texas teams defeated Alabama in the 1948 Sugar Bowl and Georgia in the 1949 Orange Bowl.

Landry joined the old New York Yankees of the All-America Conference in 1949, moving to the Giants in 1950. He was a mainstay in the Giants' defensive backfield through 1955, the last two years as player-

coach. He was All-Pro in 1954.

Retiring as a player following the 1955 season, Tom was the Giants'

defensive coach through 1959.

Tom and his wife Alicia, whom he met at Texas, have three children Tom Jr., 27; Kitty, 24, and Lisa, 19. Kitty is married to former

University of Texas quarterback Eddie Phillips.

Tom devotes much of his spare time to the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, and also has served as chairman of the State American Cancer Society, and as area chairman for the All-American Roundup of the Boy Scouts of America.

The coach has received honorary degrees from California Lutheran College (Doctor of Humane Letters), John Brown University (Doctor of

Humanities) and Southwest Baptist College (Doctor of Laws).

JIM MYERS, Assistant Head Coach . Offensive Line

Entering his 16th season with the Cowboys, Jim has the added title of Assistant Head Coach, a new position on Tom Landry's staff.

"Jim will take over many of my responsibilities," said Landry. "He's been with us so many years he knows just about everything there is to know about our system.

"He'll still work with the offensive line and coordinate the running game, where he has done such an outstanding job."

Jim joined the staff in 1962 after head coaching stints at Iowa State and Texas A&M.

Concentrating on the offensive line, Myers' tutelage paid off in All-Pro recognition for tackles Rayfield Wright and Ralph Neely and guards Blaine Nye and John Niland.

Myers is a native of Madison, W. Va. (11/12/21), who was a standout lineman at Tennessee in 1941-42 and at Duke in the Marine V-12 program in 1943.

Jim was an assistant coach at Wofford College, Vanderbilt and UCLA before becoming a head coach. He and his wife Carolyn have three daughters and six grandchildren.

ERMAL ALLEN, Special Assistant

Allen is the "inside man" on the Dallas coaching staff, heading the Cowboys' Research and Development Department in its study and evaluation of all players and teams in the NFL.

Ermal quarterbacked the University of Kentucky from 1939 through 1941 and played on the Fort Benning and Army All-Star teams during World War II. After the war he spent one year in the old All-America Conference as a Cleveland Browns defensive back in 1947.

Allen returned to his alma mater in 1948 and remained there as an assistant coach for 14 years under Paul Bryant ('48-'53) and Blanton Collier ('54-'61). He joined the Cowboys in 1962 and, along with Assistant Head Coach Jim Myers, is a senior member of Tom Landry's staff.

Ermal, born on Christmas Day, 1920, is the best golfer in the Cowboys organization. He is a two-time Kentucky Amateur champion, defeating Bobby Nichols in 1955 and Frank Beard in 1958.

In June of 1976, Ermal was honored with an "Ermal Allen Day" in a golf tournament for Kentucky lettermen which he usually wins.

Ermal and his wife Allie have a son, two daughters and five grandchildren.

MIKE DITKA, Special Teams • Receivers

Ditka joined the Cowboys staff in 1973 after 12 years in the NFL, the last four of them with Dallas.

Everybody's All-America at the University of Pittsburgh, Mike became the prototype of the modern tight end after the Chicago Bears drafted him No. 1 in 1961. His career totals show 427 receptions for 5,913 yards and 43 touchdowns.

The Aliquippa, Pa., native (10/18/39) always was noted for his aggressiveness on the field, and he admits that attitude carries over into his coaching. In 1975 with Ditka in charge of the special teams, special recognition for outstanding suicide squad performers, the "Headhunter Award," was initiated and remains a treasured honor for members of the unit.

Mike has three sons and a daughter.

DAN REEVES, Offensive Coordinator • Offensive Backs

Dan moved up to Offensive Coordinator during the past off-season when Jim Myers was promoted to Assistant Head Coach.

Reeves was a Cowboys running back for seven seasons (1965-71) and, despite a series of knee injuries, rose to the fifth spot among all-time Dallas rushing leaders. He was a player-coach in '70 and '71 and coached the offensive backfield in 1972. Dan spent a year in private business before rejoining the Cowboys staff in 1974.

Dan is a native of Rome, Ga., (1/19/44), who quarterbacked South Carolina for three years and was inducted into the Gamecocks' Hall of Fame. He signed with the Cowboys as a free agent in 1965.

Dan and his wife Pam have two daughters and a son.

GENE STALLINGS, Defensive Backfield

Gene's defensive backfield was instrumental in 1976 in helping the Cowboys establish a club record for fewest net yards allowed passing, and drew outspoken praise from Coach Tom Landry.

Stallings, in his sixth year with the club, is a Paris, Tex., native (3/2/35) who spent seven years as head coach at Texas A&M.

He was an All-Southwest Conference end at A&M under Paul Bryant and was a tri-captain on Bryant's undefeated 1956 team. After one season as student assistant at A&M, Gene moved with Bryant to

Alabama and was assistant head coach there when the chance came to return to his alma mater in 1965.

Gene and his wife Ruth Ann have four daughters and a son.

ERNIE STAUTNER, Defensive Coordinator • Defensive Line

Since Ernie joined the Dallas staff in 1966, the Cowboys consistently have been among the league's top defensive teams. The "Doomsday Defense" began to assert itself almost from the day Stautner arrived on the scene.

A star defensive lineman with the Pittsburgh Steelers for 15 years, despite being "only" 6-0 and 235 pounds, Ernie was voted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame immediately upon becoming eligible in 1969. He played in nine Pro Bowl games.

Ernie is a native of Kham, Bavaria (4/20/27), who grew up in Albany, N.Y. After serving in the Marine Corps from 1943 through 1946 he was a football star at Boston College.

Ernie has a son and two daughters.

JERRY TUBBS, Linebackers

Jerry is the only "original" Cowboys player still with the organization. He came to the club in 1960 as a middle linebacker and played in Dallas for eight years before joining the coaching staff in 1968.

Born in Breckenridge, Tex., on Jan. 23, 1935, Jerry was an All-America center-linebacker for the 1954-56 Oklahoma teams that never lost a game. He received the Walter Camp Award as the nation's outstanding player in '56.

Jerry was the No. 1 draft choice of the Chicago Cardinals in 1957 and also played for the San Francisco 49ers before settling in Dallas in '60.

Jerry and his wife Marlene have a son and a daughter.

BOB WARD, Conditioning

Ward was a track coach at Fullerton, Calif., Community College for 11 years before joining the Cowboys in the spring of '75. His position

encompasses the wide range of conditioning, including running, weight-lifting, flexibility, etc.

Ward, 43, is a graduate of Whitworth College in Spokane, Wash. Bob and his wife Joyce have two children.

DON COCHREN, Trainer

Don is in his 13th season with the Cowboys, joining the club in 1965 after experience in college, military and Canadian football training.

A graduate of Purdue, Don earned his physical therapy certificate at Pennsylvania. The 45-year-old Cochren spent two years as trainer at Case Institute in Cleveland, a year at the University of New Hampshire, four years with the Toronto Argonauts and two years as a physical therapy officer in the Air Force.

Don and his wife Jan live in suburban Carrollton. Don has two daughters and three sons.

KEN LOCKER, Assistant Trainer

Locker is in his fifth season as assistant trainer after serving from 1969 through 1972 in the North Texas State University athletic department.

Ken, 25, was an assistant trainer at North Texas and also put in some time as interim head trainer when the Eagles' Skip Cox left to become Baylor's trainer. Locker earned his master's degree in Physical Education at Texas Woman's University.

BUCK BUCHANAN, Equipment Manager

Buchanan joined the Cowboys in 1973 after 20 years in the Air Force, with most of that time spent supervising and maintaining military athletic programs.

For four years, SMSgt. Buchanan was Non-Commissioned Officer in Charge of Athletics and Programs at the U.S. Air Force Academy Prep School in Colorado Springs. He was awarded the Bronze Star for his performance during a 1968-69 tour of duty in Thailand.

Buck, 44, and his wife Geraldine have a son and daughter.

PRO: Long the leader of the Cowboys specialty teams, Barnes arrived in 1976 as a full-fledged starter at left cornerback. Benny took over as starter when Mark Washington suffered two con-

cussions at the beginning of the year, and according to Tom Landry, he was "stable and maintained a good level of play throughout the season." Following the 20-7 victory over Washington in D. C., Landry said, "Barnes made a great solo tackle on the specialty teams and for a guy who is playing as a starter on defense to come up and make a play that way continues to show his importance to the specialty unit. He is one of the best overall all-around players on our team." Benny spent his first four seasons backing up the entire secondary although a late-season ankle injury in '74 was all that kept him from becoming a full-time starter sooner. Barnes earned game balls for his play in wins over the Redskins and St. Louis last year and he had one interception. Benny is happy with his new role at left corner: "Getting more playing time at just one position and concentrating on that position helps your confidence. Once I got my movement down for the left corner, I felt good there. Also, once I relaxed I hoped they would throw the ball in my area so I'd get a chance to intercept."

COLLEGE: Benny played on two Rose Bowl victors at Stanford. He was an All-Pacific Coast free safety in college. He is another of the many Cowboy free agents making good.

PERSONAL: Benny and his wife Joyce live in Dallas during the off-season. They have two sons, David (1/20/72) and Damon (8/8/74). A native of Lufkin, Tex., Barnes and his wife grew up in Richmond, Cal.

backer in every game as a second-year man in '76, Breunig met an early challenge in his still-budding career and capably replaced 13-year man Dave Edwards, finishing among the top five tacklers on the club with 63 tackles and 33 assists. He also led the team with three fumble recoveries. In assessing how the retired Jordan's shoes will be filled, Coach Tom Landry explained, "Our final decision was to put Randy White at strongside linebacker and move Bob Breunig to his natural position in the middle, where he played in college. He will make the adjustment to the middle more quickly than Randy would have." Thus, Breunig faces the latest major challenge of his career as he sets out to become the axis of "Doomsday II." Says fellow linebacker Thomas Henderson of Breunig's dedication to daily hard work in practice, "Bob comes to practice with blood in his eye, ready to try to take somebody's head off." Breunig feels that hard work during the week "is like money in the bank."

COLLEGE: An All-America at Arizona State in '74 and three-time All-WAC selection, Bob recovered 10 fumbles and intercepted six passes in college.

PERSONAL: Bob and his wife Mary are active in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes and traveled to the Holy Land and through Europe during the off-season. Now a year-'round resident of Dallas, Breunig plays the guitar for relaxation, a talent he taught himself.

PRO: Among Cowboys veterans, Larry Cole was the lowest round draft choice who has remained with the team. He's remained so well that the quiet man of the defense is now in his 10th

season with the club. Cole has been a starter since his rookie year, first at defensive end. He shared the defensive right tackle position with Bill Gregory the past two seasons following Bob Lilly's retirement. "Larry is bigger and stronger than Bill and fundamentally plays the run a little better," says Landry. "Larry is an extremely unselfish and strong, consistent player." Long lauded as a "big-play" man, Cole also is a charter member of the Zero Club along with Blaine Nye. The Zero Club is a fraternal organization which prides itself on lack of publicity, total apathy and a fanatical dedication to boredom. Reports Nye, "Cole is the only perfect Zero. He is a veritable god in the pantheon of anonymity. In his defensive line group," Nye goes on, "There are six players and one coach. Larry was an hour late for their meeting once,

and nobody missed him. Once he sacked Billy Kilmer on national TV. That was embarrassing to the Club." For the record, Cole had five QB traps last year and forced two others. He also recovered one fumble and accumulated 57 tackles. He has converted three opponents' turnovers into touchdowns during his career, all against Washington.

COLLEGE: One of two Hawaii grads (Golden Richards is the other) on the Cowboys, Cole captained that school's first winning football team in 50 years and became the first University of Hawaii graduate to be drafted by an NFL team.

PERSONAL: Business has been good in 1977 for Larry Cole Builders, headquartered in suburban Bedford. "We built 50 to 60 homes by the half-way point in the year," Cole reports. He also built a home in Bedford where he and wife Linda, and their children Michael (11/3/70) and Christina (3/18/73), reside. Larry is a native of Granite Falls. Minn.

Along with Randy Hughes and Ralph Neely, Davis is one of three Oklahoma graduates now with the Cowboys. Kyle's version of football pressure in the pros: "You're surrounded by such great players that you want to perform up to your capabilities and up to their expectations. So you want to do as well as possible and that leads to a definite type of pressure."

COLLEGE: Kyle played behind All-America center Tom Brahaney (now with St. Louis) for two years before becoming a starter as a junior and earning his own post-season accolades.

When I go in with a play I can be thinking about it, exactly what I have to do. And it keeps our backs fresher, too." A tough runner inside, Dennison has scored 17 touchdowns in his three seasons, including six last year. "He's one of our toughest runners, a great competitor and a great team man," said Landry. "He will again challenge for a starting position." Added the head coach, "You always know Doug will give 100 percent. If you had to go to war, Doug would be the man to go with." A slashing runner who has put on 14 pounds since his rookie season, Doug says he is "not looking to be just a hard, tough runner, but more of an exceptional runner."

COLLEGE: Injuries cut short Doug's career at Kutztown State, a small school in eastern Pennsylvania, limiting him to just two football

PRO: Donovan looms as an important performer since he backs up both starting tackles, veterans Ralph Neely on the left side and Rayfield Wright at right tackle. "I would rate Pat Donovan

as probably our best athlete in the line," said Landry in the off-season. "We feel Pat will make a real challenge this summer at one of the tackle positions." A talented, all-around athlete, Pat's 40-yard dash composite is 4.85, as fast as any Cowboy lineman on the current squad. Pat is a product of Stanford, where he was a defensive end. Like Blaine Nye of Stanford, Donovan has made the switch to the offensive line in Dallas. "I like to feel I'm capable of backing up Ralph or Rayfield," says Donovan. "Those two are the masters and I can learn a lot from them." Pat has started one game so far in his career — the regular season finale against the New York Jets in '75. Coach Landry rated Donovan as "probably our No. 1 specialty teams man at the end of the '76 season."

COLLEGE: A two-time All-America at Stanford, Pat was a Montana state shot put and discus champion in high school and also all-state in football and basketball.

PERSONAL: Pat married his college sweetheart, Christa Battelle, at Stanford, Cal., 20 days before leaving for camp this year. The Donovans will settle in Dallas for the regular season. Pat holds a degree in mechanical engineering from Stanford, where he graduated with honors.

PRO: Billy Joe bounced back from a series of injuries in 1975 to have in '76 the finest season of any tight end in the history of the Cowboys. DuPree set a team record for number of receptions



by a tight end, 42, eclipsing Mike Ditka's previous single season mark of 30 catches. Says Ditka, "DuPree is the best tight end in the business now." BJ footnotes, "I WANT to be the best in the business." In addition to being a first team All-NFC choice in 1976, DuPree played in his first Pro Bowl in January. With Jean Fugett playing out his option and joining Washington prior to last year, the pressure was on DuPree to take charge of the tight end slot full-time. "Billy Joe became a key member of our receiving corps," said Tom Landry, "especially in the first part of the year when he made so many great plays. We think he'll continue to improve. He can catch the ball extremely well almost any place you throw it." Adds Drew Pearson, "Billy Joe has taken a lot of pressure off Golden Richards and me. Opponents are going to have to start paying special attention to him or he'll kill them." And from Roger Staubach, "I can't say enough about him, he's opening up a lot of things for us the way he's playing." DuPree also ran seven end-arounds for 50 yards last year. The Cowboys have had high hopes for DuPree ever since they drafted him in the first round in 1973. He now has 109 career receptions (11th all-time on the club) for 1,676 yards and 12 TDs. Still, adds Billy Joe, "You have to look at the overall picture. As long as the team is doing well, I do well. It's just no good if you're not winning."

COLLEGE: BJ caught 60 passes in a run-oriented offense during his career at Michigan State. He also was a varsity basketball player for the Spartans for a season before giving up the cage sport to concentrate on football.

PERSONAL: Although he helped organize the Cowboys off-season basketball team, he turned the "in-charge" duties over to Drew Pearson this past year, although Billy Joe continued as one of the squad's top performers. He and his wife Marsha and son Shon (10/27/72) live in Garland where he is active with Big Brothers of America. BJ was a football and basketball star in high school in Monroe, La.

His philosophy for being an interior lineman is patterned after the philosophy of his college coach, Bob Tyler: "I try not to have too many highs and lows...you just do your job and stay down the middle. For an offensive lineman, it's all self-control to play this game." Eidson also can snap for punts and placements.

free agent of the trio, has achieved continued acclaim in the NFL as evidenced by his second consecutive All-Pro naming in 1976. Hailed as the top free safety in the business, Cliff played in his third Pro Bowl last year where he was joined for the first time by long-time buddy (and fellow safetyman) Waters. Harris and Waters put in their first full season together at safety in '76. Praises Buffalo wide receiver Bob Chandler about the duo: "You can't miss the Dallas safeties looking at ANY film. Harris and Waters look like linebackers out there. They're the best tackling, hardest hitting guys at their positions in the league. You just don't ordinarily think of safeties as guys who'll come up and bust you." Says Harris, "If you blast a receiver and turn his helmet around, then he'll be looking for you." Harris led the Cowboys with 118 combined assisted and unassisted tackles in 1976. Concludes scout Bob Griffin, "If any rookie receiver ever complains he didn't get a fair shake in trying out with us, I'd like to bring him back and let him run a crossing pattern against Cliff Harris."

COLLEGE: Harris was passed up in the '70 draft but Dallas scouts knew about him from watching his play on a pair of films from tiny Ouachita (pronounced WASH-e-taw) Baptist College (Ark.). The only time Harris hasn't been a starter for the Cowboys since arriving in Dallas was when a military service call interrupted half of his rookie season.

PERSONAL: A native of Fayetteville, Ark., Cliff is active during the off-season with numerous personal appearances and speaking engagements. He served as chairman of the Arthritis Foundation of Arkansas this year, did environmental work with Dallas EPA agencies and remained active with the Diabetes Association. In addition, Harris became a businessman in the Dallas area, by opening a shoe store and a steak-house during the off-season.

Says Mike, "I like to play pass defense. I try to be a smart player and study the plays to know what to look for." Efren was a solid tackler on kickoffs and the players respect him for this." A knee injury knocked him out for the 1975 season and Efren found himself battling veteran Toni

Fritsch for the job last pre-season, "Herrera had a super year," adds Landry. "I thing Efren's performance was really more than anybody expected. I believe it will continue in '77." Herrera added another dimension to the Cowboys offense last year by becoming proficient with "pooch kicks." which are punts from field goal formation. A confident performer, Herrera said during the '76 season, "I really don't have any way to relax other than to work very hard ... the pressure gets worse when you are on top ... staying on top is tough. I think I'm the best kicker in the NFL and I know I have to come through." Herrera kicked three field goals from 40 yards or better last year and says, "I think I have a good shot at anything inside the 50."

COLLEGE: A graduate of UCLA, Herrera led all kickers in scoring in the nation during his senior season in 1973.

PERSONAL: Born in Guadalajara, Mexico, Efren (like a-FRIEND without the D on the end) and his wife Suzy live in the Dallas area. He works for Pamex of Ft. Worth and also has his own radio show on the Texas State Network, a Spanish-speaking program entitled "Ser Vicio Informativo en Espanol." Suzy formerly taught at the University of Dallas English Language Center. Efren grew up in California.



Other Cowboys With NFL Experience

- LES BENSON, a 6-2, 257-pounder, will be trying to make the transition to offensive lineman with the Cowboys. He was a nose guard and defensive tackle at Baylor and tried out as a defensive end with Buffalo last year after being drafted sixth by the Bills in 1976.
- STU BETTS, 6-3, 228, from NCAA Division II powerhouse Northern Michigan, where he was team's '75 outstanding back and captain. Drafted in eighth round by New England for '76, Betts could be tried at running back or linebacker with the Cowboys.
- DOUG JACKSON, a 5-11, 211-pound running back free agent who was in the Cowboys camp for a brief time a year ago, is a graduate of Columbia giving it a second try with the Cowboys.
- GREG JOHNSON, a fifth-round draft selection by Philadelphia last year, is a 6-4, 250-pound lineman who was rated Florida State's top pro prospect two years ago as a defensive tackle. He will be tried by the Cowboys along the offensive line.
- JOHN SMITH, a 5-11, 186-pound speedster from Boise State, was drafted in the third round by Dallas in '76 and showed early promise until sidelined for the season with a broken foot. After setting five school offensive records and being the Big Sky Conference's MVP in '75, Smith scored his only pro TD in a preseason game against Detroit in Memphis last year.
- MIKE SMITH, a 6-5, 248-pound defensive lineman, was drafted fourth by Philadelphia for '76 after performing at defensive end for the University of Miami.
- ROD WELLINGTON, a 6-2, 208-pound running back from lowa, was a seventh-round draft pick of the Chiefs last year after an lowa career that was laced with injuries, limiting him to just one full season.

Percy Howard • 81

PRO: Percy Howard started the long road back from knee surgery once and now he's on that same road again. The former basketball star turned free agent wide receiver by the Cowboys had a run of



bad luck in the last year. Howard first suffered a knee injury that required surgery during pre-season a year ago. Then Howard reinjured the same knee in the spring of '77 during conditioning work-outs and once again underwent surgery. "That's the time you want to sit down and cry because here's a guy who worked so hard to get his legs back in shape and then have that happen . . ." said Tom Landry. Offensive Coordinator Dan Reeves says Howard "knows no fear" and Percy himself began rehabilitation again in June in order to report to camp with the veterans in July. Adds Reeves, "Percy has all the tools to do it. He has a lot of raw talent. His knee problems have hurt him though." Concluded Landry, "We'll just have to wait and see how he comes along." Howard subbed for injured Golden Richards in Super Bowl X and caught the final touchdown pass of the game.

COLLEGE: Although an outstanding college forward in basketball at Austin Peay, the Cowboys scouting dragnet had remembered his 13 TD receptions and nine interceptions as a high school football star

in Fort Lauderdale, Fla.

PERSONAL: Last year's run of bad luck for Howard continued when his house in suburban Garland burned down. The house has been rebuilt and a second child, Philip (10/24/76), has joined daughter Pamela Trenace (6/4/73) and wife Pat as, hopefully, a sign of better times for the future. Percy described his off-season this year "as one rehabilitation program after another."

strong safety if anything happens to Pro Bowler Charlie Waters. So Randy will continue to wait his turn to play. "In our system, the way to get better is to actually play, to get out on the field and apply the techniques and what you've learned," Randy said. Says Landry, "Randy Hughes is an excellent prospect at safety. He has that great range and speed and temperament that make a good football player. He's got a tough nut to crack with Harris and Waters at the safeties, but he's got the ability and if anyone falters there I'm sure Randy can step in and perform exceptionally well." Hughes got a chance to play during preseason and early regular season last year when Harris was sidelined with a knee injury. Randy drew unanimous praise for his performance from players and coaches alike. blossomed into a Pro Bowl performer and Tom Landry is looking for similar development from Jones on the left flank, "Jones has improved a great deal in fundamentals," says Landry. "Hopefully, Ed is where Harvey was a year or so ago. We hope he'll come alive the same way Harvey did last year. If he does, we're sure we'll have two fine ends." Not that Too Tall was a non-entity last year. Ed accumulated five quarterback traps and three forced traps in '76 and also finished with more than 80 unassisted and assisted tackles. "I think I have the ability to dominate a game," says Jones. good start. Then, after replacing injured Robert Newhouse with a couple of top performances in '76, Laidlaw went out for a few games himself with severe rib bruises. His return was further hindered by a bout with flu. Referring to the blast he took fom all sides in the Colts game that injured his ribs, Laidlaw said, "I just told those guys, 'here, you can have the ball;' it was the hardest I was ever hit." Laidlaw can take the licks though. "Scott is tough," says Roger Staubach. "He runs with a

Scott then opened the regular season with 104 yards in 19 carries against the Eagles, along with catching seven passes for 66 yards. Laidlaw returned from his own injuries late in the season to rush for 88 yards in 15 carries against Atlanta. "I think I proved I can contribute," said Scott, who finished third on the team in rushing and receiving and fourth in scoring. Adds Landry, "Scott proved last year that he can perform in the clutch, and he could be No. 1 with a great summer this year."

COLLEGE: Scott came to the Cowboys with a reputation as a good blocker and receiver after playing in a pro set at Stanford, where he also rushed for 1,300 yards his final two seasons.

PERSONAL: Scott and his wife Michele have moved to Texas year-'round and live in the rural area of Parker northeast of Dallas. Originally from Hawthorne, Cal., he spent the off-season working as an architect and consultant with Rockwell, Collins Industries.

Lawless spent all of last year trying to hold onto what was his after being the first rookie since Ralph Neely (in 1965) to start on the Cowboys offensive line in 1975. Then, in '76, Lawless began as the starter, gave way to fellow second-year man Herbert Scott early in the year, and later alternated with Scott as a messenger guard. "We need to establish a starter at left guard," is the way Landry put it. "Lawless and Scott have been alternating, but I feel if one of them can move ahead and become the starter we'll be stronger overall. They're both young players with excellent qualities, and it should be a good battle." Says Lawless, "I really think I had a bad year in '76. It was just a real bad slump. But I was playing well at the end of the year." Referring to the role of messenger guard, Burt says, "No, I've never forgotten a play but it has crossed my mind what might happen if I did." He was named to the Pro Football Writers and UPI All-Rookie teams in 1975.

But there's more. Once the club's backup punter and still capable if ever needed in that area, he filled in last year as the squad's long snapper for punts. "We used D. D. to snap for punts because he is quick and can help in the coverage," reports Assistant Head Coach Jim Myers. As far as D. D.'s linebacking, Dan Pastorini says, "Lewis always seems to know what the quarterback is thinking." Lewis learned his lessons well while spending his first four years with the Cowboys understudying All-Pro Chuck Howley.

COLLEGE: The Southeastern Conference Player of the Year his senior year at Mississippi State, D. D. also earned All-America honors and was twice All-SEC despite being slightly more than 200 pounds. One scout in those days described him as "pound for pound maybe the best player in the country."

PERSONAL: D. D. plans to fulfill some career ambitions next off-season when he'll continue work as a residential real estate man for the Paula Stringer Co. of the Metroplex area. A year-around resident of the suburb of Richardson, D. D. (for Dwight Douglas) and his wife, Margaret, have two daughters, Christi (10/17/69) and Victoria (11/17/75).

PRO: If there is a member of the Cowboys who is trying to give back to his native city of Dallas all the affection that Dallas has showered upon him, then it has to be the Cowboys' right

defensive end Harvey Martin, who made the Pro Bowl for the first time in 1976. Martin constantly works with youth groups, makes personal appearances and does volunteer work for charities in Dallas. And being among the most popular Cowboys has been helped by his rising stature as a player. Says defensive tackle Larry Cole, "To me, Harvey can be a super All-Pro. He's fast, quick, smart and competitive." According to Tom Landry, "I thought Harvey Martin was the bright spot of the defensive line last year. Harvey had great enthusiasm, worked hard in practice every day and that enabled him to be a truly outstanding defensive end and play in the Pro Bowl. I think he came into his own, and I see no reason why he shouldn't continue to play the way he did in '76." Martin has led the team in quarterback traps the past three seasons. Harvey had 15 in '76 and forced five other traps. Martin also had more than 90 combined tackles in 1976 and intercepted a pass. Says Harvey, "It is strictly quickness and technique playing in our defense. It takes a true athlete to play our defense but it's the best defensive scheme in the league. To trap the quarterback, you combine speed with 250 pounds and squeeze." Martin credits nightly studying of films at home for his improvement: "You cannot under-estimate the importance of studying films. You have to know everything about the man across the line from you, his techniques, so that when he does something in a game you know what he's up to."

COLLEGE: Harvey was an all-conference performer at East Texas State where another top defensive end in pro football, Pittsburgh's Dwight White, was a teammate. Martin lists as one of his biggest thrills returning to his alma mater to address a crowd there: "Some of them were my professors out there; they knew how smart I was. They wanted to know what I've acquired in my mind."

PERSONAL: Harvey works for Dr Pepper during the off-season, handling promotions, youth groups and the minority market. He also has worked on Dr Pepper trucks a time or two delivering the beverage ("those guys work hard"). The "Beautiful Harvey Martin Show" on KRLD Radio in Dallas, starring "The Smiling Assassin" or "The Hard-Hearted Headhunter" is also a big hit in the Metroplex. A bachelor, Harvey worked for the American Diabetes Association this year.

PRO: For three consecutive post-seasons now, Offensive Coordinator and Assistant Head Coach Jim Myers has said that, "Ralph Neely had his best season for us this year." At age 34 (in Sep-



tember) one would think that 12 years in the NFL might not leave much more room for improvement for Neely. But Ralph says that's not necessarily so: "Every year you learn a little something you used to be able to do but can't anymore. THAT . . . you keep a very secret thing. I refine and develop techniques to compensate for inadequacies I have because of age or injury." And referring to his playing weight, which was down to 238 at the end of last year, he says, "The older you get the more football-wise you should become. You don't have to rely as much on bulk. Look, you are only as old as you think you are - except in training camp." And concerning training camp, Neely says, "What I'd like to do is come to camp and wear a baseball hat. And not coach. It bugs me to be away from the family during training camp, but that's part of the game. What you have to do is lock that out of your mind." Four times an All-Pro at right tackle, Ralph switched to left tackle in 1970 when Rayfield Wright joined the lineup for good. Neely has had three knee operations, a broken hand and a broken ankle that made him miss the Super Bowl VI victory. Despite numerous appearances in the Pro Bowl and his lengthy service in the league, Ralph adds, "Football is a never-ending learning process. Sure, it's repetitious. It gets monotonous, but I don't know that you'd call it dull." Used occasionally as a tight end or wingback in certain short yardage alignments. Neely also continues to receive praise for his stellar blocking on the kickoff return team, where he again helped out last year. "The thing that is unique about the Cowboys," says Ralph, "is the amount of confidence each individual has in the other members of the team. It makes coming back again each year worthwhile."

COLLEGE: Ralph was a two-time All-America at Oklahoma, including a consensus selection his senior year in 1964. Neely was a Business Administration major in financing and accounting.

PERSONAL: The assistant to the vice president in charge of marketing for Optimum Systems, Inc., Ralph and wife Dianne and children Dale (12/31/66) and Dedra (6/23/69) live in Dallas. He and Dianne are active in diabetes work and Ralph is on the board of directors at Camp Sweeney (north Texas). Neely is a native of Little Rock, Ark., and grew up in Farmington, N. M.

PRO: Even though he's been a full-time starter only once in his five years with the Cowboys, full-back Robert Newhouse entered the 1977 season as No. 4 on the all-time rushing list in Dallas club

history with 2,433 career yards. The one year he was the starter all season, after Walt Garrison retired in 1975, Newhouse rambled for 930 yards, the fifth best single-season performance in Cowboys history. The stocky running back went into 1976 as the starting fullback and that was the case again during '77 pre-season. Last year, despite recurring injuries, Robert rushed for 450 yards in 116 carries (3.9 avg.) and scored three touchdowns. He also caught 15 passes for 86 yards. Robert had one of the two 100-plus yard rushing games (Scott Laidlaw had the other) achieved by a Cowboys running back last year when he churned for 120 yards vs. Seattle. Buffalo defensive end Sherman White says, "Newhouse is such a good blocking back, as well as being a good runner. He can get into you." Describing his blocking role, Newhouse says, "You've just got to fasten your chin strap two or three times and go out and hit those big guys."

COLLEGE: Newhouse gained nearly 3,000 yards rushing during his career at Houston, averaging 6.4 yards per carry in the Cougars' veer offense, and scoring 19 touchdowns despite a junior season shortened by a serious auto accident.

PERSONAL: Robert and his wife Nancy had a busy off-season traveling throughout the West and Southwest. In addition to son Roddrick Breon (5/21/75), a niece, Veona (11/10/62) joined the Newhouse(hold) during the past year. PRO: "I'm like salt. Nobody remembers the brand they buy." So says Blaine Nye. It is just one of the many self-assessments made by this 10-year veteran who once again was named to the



All-NFC team and the Pro Bowl squad in 1976. It is the statements that Nye expresses that make him better known than he would care to admit. The key spokesman for the anonymity-stressed Zero Club (whose motto, according to Nye, is "One for None, and All for Naught"), Blaine even plays right guard with his tongue planted firmly in cheek. "When I line up across from one of the younger guys in the league, I don't say anything to him because he'll think I'm trying to psych him or something," Nye has said. "But with the older ones across the line from me, it's like old folks week." When asked late last season why he pursued a career in professional football, Nye replied, "Because playing rugby would have required moving to England." Nye is notorious for his lack of off-season training but is always ready to go once the season gets underway. Says Tom Landry, "Blaine has considered retirement and this will be a key factor in our offensive line. If he decides to play and devote all his time to that objective, he'll get the job done." Adds Cliff Harris, "Blaine gets the job done and that's the important thing." And from Assistant Head Coach Jim Myers, "I don't know a guard in the league I'd take over him." Nye is one of several Cowboys interior linemen who have made the successful switch from a defensive lineman in college to offense in the pros. "Strength and balance are probably the two things I play most on," Nye reports. "Maybe studying the game has helped a little too. Playing the offensive line is like assuming the floor is always there. Or the staircase, and if it isn't, you fall two floors. But you don't praise it while it's there." Says Eagles Coach Dick Vermeil, "Don't tell me Blaine Nye can't knock you off the ball." And, in response, Nye says, "My mother almost made me quit in high school when they made me a tackle. She wanted me to carry the ball."

COLLEGE: Nye started out as an offensive lineman at Stanford but moved to defense his final two seasons there. He has two masters' degrees (Business Administration and Physics) and is pursuing his Ph.D. at Stanford during the off-season.

PERSONAL: Back at Stanford "where studying is an understatement," Blaine related that "about the only other thing I've done in the off-season is drop by the city dump a couple times." He and his wife Annabelle and children Melissa (2/6/68) and Blaine (12/21/69) live in Dallas during the season. They will return to Menlo Park, Cal., during the off-season.

PRO: Sometimes Cowboys fans have to stop and pinch themselves to believe it's true what Drew Pearson, the free agent from New Jersey via Tulsa University, has accomplished the past four

seasons. His NFC-leading 58 receptions (for 806 yards and six touchdowns) last season gave Pearson 188 catches in four years — third best in Cowboys history behind Bob Hayes and Frank Clarke. "Drew Pearson is simply the finest receiver in pro football," says Roger Staubach. Adds Tom Landry, "Drew has performed so well for us and won so many big games for us. He had one of his great years in '76. He'll have another big year." Known not only for numerous catches but also for his game-turning, clutch grabs, Drew says, "The reason I've been able to make the clutch catches is that the quarterbacks have had confidence in me in crucial situations. I appreciate that. But the big play is just one part of being a consistent receiver." Drew was named All-Pro for the second time in 1976. Says fellow All-Pro Roger Wehrli of the St. Louis Cardinals, a cornerback who has drawn Pearson one-on-one many times, "Drew simply has great hands and he really has deceiving speed. He always has something extra, acceleration, or a little something. And anything he touches, he catches." Says Rams Coach Chuck Knox succinctly, "He's sweet."

COLLEGE: A college quarterback his first two years at Tulsa, Drew switched to wide receiver as a junior but went generally unnoticed his

final two seasons in a run-oriented offense.

PERSONAL: Married to the former Marsha Haynes, daughter of Harlem Globetrotter all-time great Marques Haynes, it was only natural that Drew took over the direction of the Cowboys basketball team during the off-season. Drew and Marsha are actively involved with many charities around the Metroplex, including MS, March of Dimes, Big Brothers of America and with autistic children. They live year-around in Dallas and have one daughter, Tori Nichole (7/23/74).

PRO: After being the free agent "find" of 1975 and the man credited most for sprucing up the Cowboys attack in the drive to the Super Bowl two years ago, Preston Pearson went through a



difficult 1976 campaign because of knee surgery following a training camp injury. Listed as the starting tailback at the beginning of the year, Preston managed to start just two games — against Atlanta and St. Louis late in the campaign. According to Roger Staubach, going into this year's training camp, "Preston is in the best shape of his life. He's ready to make it all the way back." Adds Tom Landry, "Preston is a move man, a tremendous route runner who is like having another wide receiver in the lineup. There are few who can do as much with a screen pass as Preston. He's a fine football player with great character."

COLLEGE: An All-Big Ten basketball player at Illinois where he was a starter for three years after walking on as a freshman, Preston

did not play college football.

PERSONAL: Preston was with Baltimore three years and Pittsburgh five others (1968-74) as a part-time starter at running back. He still has plenty of business interests in his off-season home, Pittsburgh, where he is active in buying and selling duplexes and apartment buildings. PRO: Among other niceties he wrote about Jethro Pugh prior to last year's Rams playoff game, Los Angeles syndicated columnist Jim Murray probably put it better than anyone else about Pugh's

ably put it better than anyone else about Pugh's career when he penned: ". . . Jethro is the best defensive tackle in the history of the National Football League who never made it to the Pro Bowl." As Pugh once put it, "Without a name like Jethro Pugh, I might really be anonymous." Last year turned out to be one of the toughest of his career as Jethro played the entire season with a bad shoulder. having to protect the arm by wearing a harness while he played. His number of tackles and assists fell off, as did his quarterback traps, but it's too soon to write off Jethro Pugh as a top player. Even though he is in his 13th season with Dallas, Pugh is just 33 years old since he came out of tiny Elizabeth City State in 1965 at age 20. "As for me. I've been playing so long I should have learned something," Jethro states. "I can do a good job for at least a couple more years." Tom Landry, in his off-season analysis of the '76 Cowboys, said that the biggest problem in the defensive line last year was the injured shoulder suffered by Pugh early in the season. "He couldn't raise his arm or use his hands well after that, and didn't have the year he normally has," said Landry. "The injury was corrected by surgery during the off-season, and with a good rehabilitation program, he should return to form at left tackle. He's our most experienced defensive lineman." Jethro's playing weight the last three years has dropped 10 or 12 pounds to give him more quickness. St. Louis' rough and tumble guard Conrad Dobler says about Pugh, "Jethro's one of the best around. He doesn't gripe and complain. He just goes out and does his job. Nothing you can do or say to him will knock him off his game." Says Pugh, "You aren't going to tear the heads off most NFL players because they are too quick. I just try to get the job done."

COLLEGE: Since Elizabeth City State University (N. C.) did not award football scholarships in the 1960s, Jethro enrolled there with no fanfare, yet went on to be his squad's most valuable lineman as a senior and twice received All-Carolina Intercollegiate Athletic Association honors.

PERSONAL: An active businessman in Dallas during the off-season, Jethro and his wife Beverly have two children, Jethro III (10/20/68) and Jethrolyn Jo (3/3/71).

You get a lot of ankles in the throat with people trying to jump over you." Tom Landry sees Rafferty as a potential starter at guard in the future. "He showed good promise last year," said Landry, "and if he continues to progress, he will become a good offensive lineman." Rafferty was considered the top pulling guard in the '76 draft by Cowbovs scouts. one of whom, Reed Johnson, put it this way about Tom: "Rafferty practices well and plays well. He seems to have a singleness of purpose much like a lot of Penn State football players."

PERSONAL: Born in Syracuse, N. Y., Tom grew up in Manlius, N. Y. and was a high school All-America lacrosse player, in addition to being a starter in football and basketball at Fayetteville High School. He and his wife Donna were married a month before training camp in 1976 and live in Dallas.

PRO: The lowest draft choice to survive among the Cowboys' 10 rookies last year (ninth round), Reece split his time between cornerback and wide receiver. "Beasley requested the opportunity to

compete at defensive back this season," reported Coach Tom Landry. "This works out well, because with Mel (Renfro) and Mark (Washington) having off-season surgery, we want to be sure we have sufficient depth at the corners." Added Landry, "Reece shows a lot of quickness and speed. He was a good defensive back in college." A member of a football family of fleet-footed pro players, Reece is a cousin of Greg

Pruitt of the Browns and Randy Logan of the Eagles. A dedicated member of the off-season conditioning program, Beasley says, "My religion and football have received my entire dedication."

COLLEGE: Reece played left cornerback at North Texas State his junior and senior seasons and accumulated four career interceptions, returning one 41 yards against Tennessee. A Journalism major, Beasley relates that the most humorous thing that happened to him in college was getting his bell rung against Memphis State so hard that he staggered into the Memphis State huddle and lined up with the opponent for the next play.

Again this year during the off-season he was a leader among the veterans, working himself back into top condition. "I'm an old cagey ball player," is the way 'Fro puts it. "I plan to play as long as I can do the job. Each year you must work harder and harder to keep up with the younger players. So I have to get better and better each year." COLLEGE: One of the greatest all-around athletes in Oregon history, Renfro was All-America as a halfback and a world class performer in track and field.

PERSONAL: Renfro was born in Houston but calls Portland, Ore.. his hometown. He has residences in both Portland and Dallas and has three children — Melvin Jr. (1/25/64), Anthony (3/29/65) and Cynthia (3/14/68). 

Last year Herbert moved in ahead of Lawless as the starting left guard early in the year because, according to Tom Landry, "He is doing a very good job pulling and hitting people. Herb is a strong and explosive blocker." Later in the '76 season Scott and Lawless were alternating as messenger guards when Landry abandoned the tactic of using his running backs for that role. As far as making it with the Cowboys, Scott says, "The veterans here always encouraged me. They told me to keep trying . . . that I had a chance to succeed if I stayed in there and kept it up."

PRO: After 1975 was Mark's first full year as a starter at left cornerback (injuries had slowed him in previous seasons), the crafty veteran from Morgan State moved to right cornerback for '76.

The switch came after a concussion first cost Mark his left corner job (when Benny Barnes stepped in and played well) and then when right cornerback Mel Renfro had recurring knee problems. Washington intercepted four passes (for the second season in a row) to lead the Cowboys in that category in 1976. In addition to an ankle injury that put him out of the starting lineup in '74 and the head injury that eventually forced him to shift around last season, Washington had knee surgery twice, including the past off-season. "I think Mark played very well for us at the right corner," said Tom Landry. "He had knee surgery, but I think he can come back this year and play well again." Washington is called "Strip" by his teammates for his uncanny ability to loosen the ball from a receiver's grasp.

COLLEGE: While Morgan State was winning 31 consecutive games during Mark's career there, he was named comeback player of the year as a junior and co-captained the squad as a senior. He finished with 15 career interceptions.

PERSONAL: Mark and his wife Linda and their daughter Lisa Joy (3/16/74) live in Dallas where Mark hustles between two off-season jobs. In addition to working for the Department of Commerce in their Business Management program, Washington joined the Western Company of North America this year as a sales trainee. That latter firm services oil wells.

PRO: Never has intense concentration—from the beginning of training camp to the season's conclusion — helped a veteran play to his fullest ability as it helped Charlie Waters in 1976. Waters,



who admitted that he totally engrossed himself in everything he did on the football field last year, saw the concentrated effort pay off, "For a while I thought he might burn himself out, he was hitting so hard and going all-out, even in early practice sessions," said fellow safety Cliff Harris. "But he didn't (burn out) and Charlie really had a great season." Waters made the Pro Bowl for the first time in '76 after settling in at strong safety for his first full season there. Prior to last year, Waters had played free safety and both cornerbacks. "Strong safety is my best position," Waters reports, "and I want to continue being successful. At strong safety, I invite things to happen." Said Tom Landry, "Charlie became an excellent strong safety, probably the best in the league at the end of the year. I think he will continue to improve. He's dedicated to becoming a top pro and when you have that kind of dedication and the ability that Charlie has, you usually achieve great success." Waters was one of three Cowboys to notch more than 100 tackles in '76 with 65 tackles and 38 assists. He also intercepted three passes for a career total of 26, fourth all-time in Dallas club history. Waters' best seasons appear to be ahead of him. "I just don't want to be the best at my position," he says, "but the best in my eyes . . . I'm my biggest critic." Charlie recovered one fumble last year, filled the short man role on punt returns, held for place kicks and worked especially hard on his technique against the run.

COLLEGE: Charlie split time between quarterback and wide receiver at Clemson. In just 15 games as a pass-catcher, he nabbed 68 passes for 1,165 yards.

PERSONAL: Charlie married former Dallas model Rosie Holotik last January and they live in Dallas. Charlie works with Frank Parra Chevrolet in Irving during the off-season.

management also made sure they received Houston's third pick in the deal. That selection turned out to be Danny White, who may eventually make the deal look like a bigger coup than it already has been. Following two years with Memphis in the now-defunct World Football League, White joined the Cowboys last year and won the backup quarterback job to Roger Staubach in pre-season. "He's a great athlete and a great quarterback," says no less an authority than Roger himself. One year the leading punter in the WFL, White was booming 'em for the Cowboys in '76 until a training camp knee injury cut down his efficiency, "White is going to be one of the top punters in the league," reports Tom Landry. "He couldn't do his best last year because of torn cartilage in his knee which has been corrected by off-season surgery." As far as his quarterbacking, Landry says, "White is an excellent prospect, a good young football player who has the type of leadership ability and competitiveness that enables him to get the job done. We didn't get to play Danny as much as we would have liked last season, but when we put him in he performed for us."

COLLEGE: White guided Arizona State to a 32-4 record as quarter-back for three seasons, establishing seven major collegiate passing records. He was second among NCAA Division I players in total offense in 1973.

PERSONAL: A native of Mesa, Ariz., Danny and his wife JoLynn and two sons, Ryan (4/26/73) and Geoffrey (1/4/76), live in Dallas.

White was expected to become a starter for the Cowboys after two seasons of understudying Lee Roy Jordan at middle linebacker (while occasionally being used in the defensive line in passing situations). The one change for '77 is that White will not replace Jordan in the middle but will move to strongside linebacker which, according to Tom Landry, "will be a familiar position to White because he played a similar position throughout his college career at Maryland." Says Randy, "I'm working hard to learn strongside linebacker. I'm going to play the best I can at that spot." Revered by his teammates for his strength and speed, he also has received praise for his coachability. Says Linebacker Coach Jerry Tubbs, "Randy's such a great competitor and is extremely quick, tough-minded and strong. He'll fight if he has to. You couldn't ask for a better person to coach. He's 100 percent football player." Randy was named to the Pro Football Writers All-Rookie team in '75 when he had seven quarterback traps and numerous other big plays. In 1976 White had 25 tackles and 17 assists and five quarterback traps. "He's going to be fantastic," said Jordan, "and he's also a great team player." With a 4.75 composite in the 40-yard dash and the ability to bench press more than 400 pounds, White and close friend Bob Breunig (who moved to the middle to replace Jordan) should have much to do with the performance of the Cowboys' new defense, "Doomsday II."

COLLEGE: The consensus All-America from Maryland won the Outland Trophy as the best college lineman in the nation his senior year and also received the Vince Lombardi award. A defensive end in college, he was the second person selected in the 1975 draft.

PERSONAL: A bachelor, White gets plenty of physical therapy during the off-season working on his farm near Landenberg, Pa. Born in Pittsburgh, he played high school football in Wilmington, Del., and is one of the few pro football players who prepped in that state. He also maintains an apartment in Dallas during the season.

PRO: Rayfield played in his sixth consecutive Pro Bowl last year, as the giant tackle continued to etch a place for himself among the great offensive linemen in the game. Known as the "Big Cat,"

Wright long has received the praise of opponents who have played across the line. Says Carl Eller, "I think Rayfield is pretty much the composite of an All-Pro tackle. An all-day fight with him is definitely not my idea of a pleasant afternoon." Adds All-Pro Jack Youngblood. "Ravfield is my biggest weakness. He's a nightmare. We cancel each other out." A four-time All-Pro himself, it hasn't been all success for Wright. He came out of little Fort Valley State (Ga.) where he played tight end and safety. His first three years with the Cowboys were spent trying to find a position. Rayfield was tried at tackle, tight end, defensive end, then settled at right tackle for good in 1970 when Ralph Neely moved to left tackle. "Most teams are right handed (on offense) so opponents usually put their best defensive players on the left side," says Wright. "As the right offensive tackle that means I usually get their best defensive end." Playing the offensive line is a lot more complicated than some might think, according to Rayfield, "You look for certain situations because you're not always blocking the man in front of you. One of the hardest things to do in this business is to prepare the same way no matter who you're playing. You get up for the tough teams, but if you don't get up for all the teams, you will lose," Wright worked extensively during the off-season to strengthen a knee that gave him some trouble in '76. Says Tom Landry, "The knee hampered Rayfield last year and the intensive rehabilitation program is an effort to get him back to where he was physically. This is a major key to our offensive line's performance in '77." Wright lines up at tight end in some short yardage situations, reminding him of the old days at that position. "I'd like to get a couple more touchdowns," muses Rayfield. who scored one in 1968. "That would be nice for a tackle."

COLLEGE: A three-sport star in college, Rayfield ran a 50-flat 440 in track and lettered in football and basketball and also was all-conference in the latter two sports.

PERSONAL: "I had a very quiet off-season," Big Cat reported. "I worked very hard in our conditioning program and getting myself ready for this season." Wright and his wife Andrea and their children, LaRay Adrian (3/25/72) and Anitra Joyclyn (4/21/74), live in Dallas. The Wrights return to their home state of Georgia on vacation every year where Rayfield earned 21 merit badges in Boy Scouts as a youngster.

"We've had great hopes for Charlie Young ever since we drafted him in the first round in 1974," said Tom Landry during pre-season '77. "He's had a lot of injuries and really hasn't reached the level we would like to have seen at this point. Maybe he'll come through for us this year. We hope so."

COLLEGE: Young had a brilliant three-year career at N. C. State, rushing for 1,657 yards, scoring 17 touchdowns and averaging six yards per carry after coming to the Wolfpack from cross-town Enloe High School in Raleigh.



The Cowboys drafting of Dorsett created national interest after Dallas and Seattle swapped first-round choices (the Seahawks were to draft second, the Cowboys 14th) and Dallas additionally dealt three second-round picks to Seattle. "We have never had a back with this much breakaway ability," said Coach Tom Landry of the Heisman Trophy winner from Pittsburgh. "We've never had a player who demonstrated so much ability in college." Dorsett became an All-America as a freshman for Coach Johnny Majors and the Panthers, and went on to rush for an all-time NCAA record of 6,082 yards, plus 58 touchdowns. He was the first player ever to have three 1,500-yard-plus seasons (including 1,948 and 21 touchdowns as a senior), and the first to have four 1,000-yard seasons.

"The thing that really impressed me about Dorsett," said Landry, "was his tenacity. He might be contained for three quarters, but he would keep after it and break a long one in the fourth quarter."

"Pittsburgh had a 1-10 record the year before Dorsett arrived," said Cowboys Vice President Gil Brandt. "His senior year they were 12-0 and won the national championship. The record speaks for itself."

GLENN CARANO • Quarterback • Nevada-Las Vegas
Ht: 6-3 • Wt: 195 • Born: 11/18/55 • D-2

After the trade with Seattle that brought Tony Dorsett to Dallas, the Cowboys sent wide receiver Duke Fergerson to the Seahawks in return for Dallas' original second-round pick. That choice was used to select Carano, who holds all the Nevada-Las Vegas passing records. "We think he is a terrific prospect," said Cowboys scout Red Hickey. "Coach Landry thinks we will carry three quarterbacks and this kid is the type who could eventually battle Danny White when Roger (Staubach) gets through. He can read defenses and he can scramble out of the way. I think we've got a good one here."

Carano played his first three years at Las Vegas under current Southern Methodist Coach Ron Meyer, a former Cowboys scout who strongly recommended him. Glenn completed 337 of 636 passes for 5,095 yards and 37 touchdowns in four years of varsity play, and scored another 19 touchdowns rushing.

TONY HILL • Wide Receiver • Stanford
Ht: 6-2 • Wt: 196 • Born 6 (22 (55)

"We're very happy with this choice," said Coach Landry. "Tony is the type of athlete who could help us in a hurry." Hill was the sixth player chosen in the third round, thanks to a 1975 trade that sent guard John Niland to the Philadelphia Eagles. Tony was an honorable

Tony was an honorable mention All-American as a junior and senior, ranking seventh in NCAA receiving both years. His four-year totals came to 140 receptions for 2,225 yards and 18 touchdowns.

"He went to the same high school, Long Beach Polytechnic, as (San Francisco 49er) Gene Washington, and broke all of Washington's records," said Red Hickey. "Then he broke all of Washington's records at Stanford. He was a great basketball and baseball player in high school, just a tremendous all-around athlete.

"Tony was bothered by an injured ankle during his senior year, and that's the reason he didn't go sooner in the draft," Hickey added.

Cleveland fits the mold of a number of previous Cowboys draft picks and free agents who became big success stories.

"This was a real gamble," Hickey said, "because he played only one year of football. He was a basketball player and is the fastest of the linemen we drafted. He could be tried on offense or defense, but he has size and potential."

Williams gained 3,381 yards in his career at Arizona State, averaging 5.4 per carry, scoring 19 touchdowns and earning All-Western Athletic Conference honors. Hickey explained why Fred still was available in the eighth round:

"Here is a well-known player who had a fine collegiate career, but during his senior year he was bothered with a sore ankle, gained only 523 yards and didn't score a touchdown. But, he has proven he can run with the football. We place a lot of emphasis on quickness for running backs and this runner has excellent quickness."

Cantrell was a Football News second team All-American as a senior at North Carolina, and earned honorable mention honors from both wire services.

"He's not huge, so naturally we'll want to get him on our weight program in a hurry," said Hickey. "But, at this particular point in the draft we felt we needed a center and he was the best one available. Mark has possibilities."

"This kid could be a pleasant surprise to some people," according to Hickey. "He's not a speedy guy, not a scrambler, but he reads defenses very well and has some of the best statistics in the draft. He graded out very well in the films, and he could give Carano a battle for a quarterbacking spot."





Historical Highlights

1960

NFL FRANCHISE — Clint Murchison, Jr., and Bedford Wynne were awarded an expansion franchise in the NFL at the annual league meeting in Miami Beach, Fla. The Cowboys were to play as a "swing" team, playing every other team one time during the first season, although listed in the Western Conference standings (January 28).

COWBOYS STOCKED — A player pool was set up in a league meeting at L.A., with each of 12 NFL teams freezing 25 names on its roster and the Cowboys allowed to pick three from each team for a total of 36 veterans. Dallas, once given the list, had to select its 36 players within 24 hours (March 13).

TRAINING STARTS — Rookies report to first Cowboys camp at Pacific U., in Forest Grove, Oregon (July 9).

FIRST PRE-SEASON GAME — The Cowboys, less than six months in existence, get their first test and drop a 10-16 pre-season game to San Francisco in Seattle (August 6).

FIRST HOME GAME — In their Dallas debut, in the Salesmanship Club pre-season game, the Cowboys led the World Champion Baltimore Colts into the final minute before a 71-yard pass from Johnny Unitas to Lenny Moore gave the Colts a 14-10 victory (August 19).

FIRST VICTORY — In a pre-season game at Louisville, Ky., the Cowboys beat New York's Giants, 14-3, with Frank Clarke catching touchdown passes of 73 yards (Eddie LeBaron) and 74 yards (Don Meredith) (August 27).

FIRST LEAGUE GAME — In their first league game, Dallas fell to Pittsburgh, 35-28, with Bobby Layne leading a fourth period Steeler rally (Sept. 24, Saturday night).

STREAK SNAPPED — Dallas snaps a 10-game loss streak by tying New York, 31-31, at Yankee Stadium (Dec. 4).

1961

TRAINING STARTS — Rookies launch training at new campsite — St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minn. (July 9).

FIRST LEAGUE WIN — Scoring ten points in the final 56 seconds, the Cowboys score their first NFL victory, 27-24, over Pittsburgh in the '61 league opener in the Cotton Bowl. Allen Green's 27-yard field goal on the game's final play won it before 23,500 (Sept. 17).

1962

TRAINING STARTS — Team begins training at new campsite — Northern Michigan College in Marquette, Mich. (July 13).

PENALTY HISTORY — For the first time in anyone's memory in an NFL game, points were awarded for a penalty. The Cowboys were detected holding in the end zone on a 99-TD pass from LeBaron to Clarke, and Pittsburgh was awarded a safety. The Steelers eventually won, 30-28 (Sept. 23).

100-YARD FIRSTS — Cowboys Amos Marsh returned a kickoff 101 yards and Mike Gaechter returned a pass interception 100 yards, both plays for fourth quarter TD's in a 41-19 win over Philadelphia in Dallas. It

was the first time in NFL history that two 100-yard runs had been made in the same game, much less by the same team in the same quarter (Oct. 14).

1963

SHIFT TO KANSAS CITY — The rival Dallas Texans of the AFL announce they are moving the franchise to Kansas City (Feb. 8).

CALIFORNIA TRAINING SITE — The Cowboys open training at California Lutheran College in Thousand Oaks, Calif. (July 12).

HOWTON SETS RECORD — Bill Howton broke Don Hutson's all-time receiving mark with a 14-yard catch against Washington (there). Hutson's record was 7,991 yards and the catch gave Howton an even 8,000 yards (Sept. 29).

1964

LANDRY CONTRACT — With one year to go on his original contract, Tom Landry is signed to a ten-year extension, in effect giving him an 11-year pact, possibly the longest in major pro sports history (Feb. 5).

1965

FIRST SELLOUT — An overflow crowd of 76,251 jams the Cotton Bowl for the Cleveland game, notching the team's first home sellout. Cleveland won, 24-17 (Nov. 21).

1966

PLAYOFF BOWL — After defeating New York, 38-20, in the season finale (and winning five of their last seven games) to get into the Playoff Bowl at Miami, the Cowboys fall to Baltimore, 35-3 (Jan. 15).

MERGER — Peace comes to pro football with Cowboys GM Tex Schramm completing two months of negotiations with AFL's Lamar Hunt, merging the two leagues under the NFL banner (June 8).

SCHRAMM ELEVATED — Texas E. Schramm, Vice-President and General Manager of the Cowboys from the beginning, was named President of the club by owner Clint Murchison, Jr., who retained the title of Chairman of the Board.

NEELY CASE SOLVED — Dallas and Houston reached agreement in the Ralph Neely case. Neely remained with Dallas with Houston receiving the Cowboys Nos. 1, 2 and two fifth place picks in the 1967 draft (Nov. 17). THE CHAMPIONSHIP — The Cowboys won their first championship, capturing the Eastern Conference title with a 10-3-1 record, but lost the NFL Championship Game to Green Bay, 34-27.

1967

TEXAS STADIUM — On Dec. 23, owner Clint Murchison, Jr., formally announced plans to build Texas Stadium in suburban Irving. The stadium, to be financed through a bond-option plan, would be ready for the 1970 season. The stadium would seat a minimum of 58,000.

SECOND CHAMPIONSHIP — Under the NFL's new format, the Cowboys easily won the Capitol Division and defeated Cleveland, Century Division winner, 52-14, in the Cotton Bowl for the Eastern conference championship. However, on Dec. 31 in Green Bay, the Cowboys lost their second bid for an NFL title, falling to the Packers, 21-17, in the 13 degree below weather.

1968

WIN CAPITOL — For the second straight year the Cowboys won the Capitol Division, but for the first time in three years the Cowboys did not win the Eastern Championship, being upset at Cleveland, 31-20, on December 21st. Dallas won the Runner-Up Bowl over Minnesota, 17-13.

1969

TEXAS STADIUM — Ground was broken for Texas Stadium in suburban Irving on January 25, and on June 29 Bert Rose was named general manager of the stadium.

ORIGINALS RETIRE — An era ended for the Cowboys in July. On July 5th at a press conference in Dallas, quarterback Don Meredith, the last of the original Cowboys, announced his retirement. Then, on July 18th, the day the veterans were to report to training camp, all-time rushing great Don Perkins officially retired.

REPEAT CAPITOL WINS — Once again the Cowboys rolled to the Capitol Division Championship with an 11-2-1 season. However, the Cowboys failed to win the Eastern Championship when on Dec. 28, the Cowboys lost to Cleveland, 38-14, in the Cotton Bowl.

1970

FIVE STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS — The Cowboys won their last five games to finish 10-4, claim the Eastern Division championship and make the playoffs for the fifth year in a row. They defeated Detroit, 5-0, in the opening round to get a shot at the National Conference championship.

FIRST NFC TITLE — The Cowboys captured the biggest prize of their 11 year history on Jan. 3 when they downed San Francisco, 17-10, for the NFC crown. A 16-13 loss to Baltimore in the Super Bowl Jan. 17 left Dallas with one major goal still unrealized.

1971

TEXAS STADIUM — The Cowboys opened a new era in their sparkling Irving, Tex., home with a 44-21 victory over the New England Patriots on October 24. Duane Thomas scored the first touchdown in the new stadium, a 56-yard run just two minutes and 16 seconds after the opening kickoff. Attendance was 65,708.

SIX STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS — The Cowboys won their last seven games to finish 11-3, claim the Eastern Division championship and make the playoffs for the sixth year in a row. They defeated Minnesota, 20-12, in the opening round.

SECOND NFC TITLE — For the second consecutive year, the Cowboys met the San Francisco 49ers in the National Conference showdown. This time Dallas won, 14-3, to qualify for its second straight Super Bowl. FIRST WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP — The Cowboys downed the Miami Dolphins, 24-3, to win Super Bowl Vi in New Orleans on Jan. 16. It was the 10th victory in a row for Dallas as Roger Staubach passed for two touchdowns and was named the game's Most Valuable Player.

1972

FIRST 1,000-YARD BACK — Calvin Hill became the first Dallas player to rush for 1,000 yards when he gained 111 on Dec. 9 against the Washington Redskins in Texas Stadium. Hill wound up with 1,036 yards for the season on a record 245 carries.

SEVEN STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS — The Cowboys qualified for the NFL playoffs a record seventh consecutive year, their 10-4 record earning them the National Conference Wild Card berth. Roger Staubach passed for two touchdowns in the last 1½ minutes to give the Cowboys a 30-28 victory at San Francisco in the first round. Then, at Washington on New Year's Eve, Dallas was foiled in its bid for a third straight NFL title when the Redskins won, 26-3.

1973

100 VICTORIES — The Cowboys and Coach Tom Landry recorded their 100th victory with a 40-3 Texas Stadium win over the New Orleans Saints on Sept. 24. Landry, the only head coach the Cowboys have had, ended the season with a career mark of 108-80-6 to rank ninth on the list of the NFL's all-time winningest coaches.

EIGHT STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS — The Cowboys regained the NFC Eastern Division title with a 10-4 record and broke their own NFL record by reaching the playoffs for the eighth year in a row. Dallas defeated Western Division champion Los Angeles in the first round, 27-16, but fell to Central Division winner Minnesota in the NFC Championship Game, 27-10.

1974

FIRST TOP DRAFT CHOICE — For the first time in their history, the Cowboys had the very first choice in the NFL college draft. The No. 1 pick came to Dallas from Houston in exchange for Tody Smith and Billy Parks. The Cowboys selected Ed "Too Tall" Jones, a 6-9, 260-pound defensive end from Tennessee State.

PLAYOFFS MISSED — The Cowboys' record-breaking string of eight straight years in the NFL playoffs was broken when the club's 8-6 record failed to qualify.

1975

LILLY HONORED — "Mr. Cowboy" was honored on Bob Lilly Day at Texas Stadium at halftime of the Philadelphia game on Nov. 23. It was the first such recognition ever given to a Dallas player. Lilly never missed a game in 14 years with the Cowboys, earning All-Pro honors seven times at defensive tackle before retiring prior to the '75 season.

TEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS — The Cowboys' 10-4 record earned them the NFC Wild Card berth in the playoffs. The composite record over 10 straight winning seasons was 101-37-2.

THIRD NFC TITLE — After shocking Minnesota in the first round, 17-14 on Roger Staubach's 50-yard "Hail Mary" pass to Drew Pearson, the Cowboys traveled to Los Angeles for the NFC showdown. Staubach threw four touchdown passes, three to Preston Pearson, and Dallas won, 37-7. Pittsburgh won Super Bowl X on Jan. 18 in Miami, 21-17.

1976

ELEVEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS — The Cowboys won the NFC Eastern Division title with their 11-3 record, giving them their 11th straight winning season and 10th playoff berth in that period. A 14-12 first round loss to Los Angeles — the first time Dallas had lost in the first round under the current playoff setup — ended the season.

MEREDITH, PERKINS HONORED — Former Cowboys greats Don Meredith and Don Perkins joined Bob Lilly in the "Ring of Honor" at Texas Stadium.
