## President and General Manager



The reality of the Dallas Cowboys' improbable two year turnaround from a disappointing 1-15 team in 1989 to a playoff qualifier is one of the NFL's most well documented stories. In 1991, the Cowboys finished with an 11-5 record and came within one victory of the NFC Championship Game. In the process, the confidence level of Cowboy fans across the country soared with tidal wave force, and Dallas Cowboys owner Jerry Jones wouldn't have it any other way.

"The most rewarding aspect of our recent success has been the excitement and enthusiasm that I see every day from the people who support this football team," says Jones. "We no longer have fans who wonder if we will ever return to the Super Bowl. Now, they just want to know how quickly it's going to happen."

The always-upbeat Jones is the driving force behind that reborn confidence, and the owner's contagious spirit sets the tone for the entire Cowboys organization.

With a style of management that offers a throwback to an earlier era of ownership in the National Football League, Jones personally oversees every aspect of the Cowboys operation. His "hands on" approach continues to carry his own unique stamp of innovation, rapid progress and a commitment to winning as soon as possible.

Winning as soon as possible translates into Jones' own personal commitment to providing the necessary leadership, resources and aggressiveness that has distinguished the Cowboys rebirth.

- ★ After an inaugural 1-15 season, Jones displayed his eagerness to rapidly improve the Cowboys' overall talent level. In the spring of 1990, he was the NFL's most aggressive executive in the area of Plan B free agency signing 16 Plan B players one of which was 1991 Pro Bowl tight end Jay Novacek. The following season, Dallas went 7-9 and missed qualifying for the playoffs by one game.
- Since purchasing the Cowboys, Jones and head coach Jimmy Johnson have orchestrated 41 trades which have triggered the influx of young talent to the organization. Just prior to the 1991 NFL Draft, Jones completed a last minute deal that brought the first overall pick in the draft to Dallas, and the Cowboys used that selection to choose Outland Trophy Winner Russell Maryland. Recent deals have brought defensive tackle Tony Casillas and quarterback Steve Beuerlein to Dallas, and both players were key figures in the Cowboys' return to the NFL playoffs in 1991.

Jones supervised a movement that enabled the Cowboys to sign their top three draft choices within hours of their selection in the 1991 NFL Draft. Dallas went on to draft a club record 17 players in '91, and the Cowboys were one of only three NFL teams to have all of their players under contract by the opening day of 1991 training camp.

★ In a development that has proved tremendously popular among fans throughout the State of Texas and the Southwest, Jones moved the Cowboys' annual summer training camp to an in-state site for the first time in team history. Over the past two years, nearly 200,000 fans have journeyed to St. Edward's University in Austin to get an "up-close" view of the Dallas Cowboys.

★ A revised marketing strategy has seen Texas Stadium attendance figures rise in rapid fashion in the past three seasons. Since the 1988 season, Cowboys home crowds have increased by 27.8%, or by an average of 13,597 fans per game. The Cowboys will enter the 1992 season by looking to extend a team record streak of 15 straight crowds of at least 60,000 fans.

Jones' accomplishments have not gone without notice of late. In the summer of 1991, he was voted as the best sports franchise owner in the Metroplex, receiving 48% of the votes that were tabulated in a Dallas Morning News readers' poll. Following the 1991 season, he was selected as the NFL's Owner of the Year by the Edelstein Pro Football Letter. In February of 1992, Jones was named the winner of the "Big D Award" by the Dallas All Sports Association. The "Big D Award" annually recognizes the sports figure who has done the most to bring excitement to the Metroplex through athletics.

On May 1, 1992, Jones was appointed to the NFL's prestigious Competition Committee by NFL Commissioner Paul Tagliabue. Jones became the first owner to serve on the committee since the death of Cincinnati's Paul Brown, and he joins a very small number of owners who have formerly served on the committee such as the Giants' Wellington Mara and the Raiders' Al Davis.

The face of the Dallas Cowboys organization has taken on a new look since Jerry Jones purchased the team from H.R. "Bum" Bright on February 25, 1989. Jones, however, maintains that the storied tradition of success that the organization has developed through 32 years will always remain as a primary priority.

"The Dallas Cowboys represent winning and achieving at the highest level," says Jones. "Those are the goals that are set by our fans and our entire organization. It is our job to see that those goals are achieved on an annual basis."

Only the third owner in the history of the Dallas franchise, Jones is also the owner of Texas Stadium Corporation, a sister organization to the Cowboys which operates the stadium for the City of Irving.

Jerral Wayne Jones was born on Oct. 13, 1942 in Los Angeles. He learned his business style from his father, J.W. "Pat" Jones, a successful entrepreneur first in supermarkets, then in insurance.

Pat Jones moved his family to North Little Rock, Ark., soon after Jerry was born. After starring in football as a running back at North Little Rock High School, Jerry received a scholarship to play at the University of Arkansas. He was a starting guard and co-captain of the 1964 team that went 11-0, defeated Nebraska in the Cotton Bowl and captured the national championship. Jerry's teammate and road roommate was Jimmy Johnson.

Upon graduating in 1965 Jerry joined his father's insurance company, Modern Security Life in Springfield, Mo., as executive vice president.

After receiving his master's in business from Arkansas, Jerry entered the oil and gas exploration business in Oklahoma in 1970 and soon became a phenomenal success. His oil and gas concern now has offices in Fort Smith and Little Rock, Ark., Oklahoma City, Sacramento, Calif., and Calgary, Canada.

In addition to professional football, stadium management and energy production, Jones has business interests in banking, real estate, crude oil shipping and refining, and poultry processing.

One of a very small number of NFL owners who actually earned a significant level of success as a football player, Jones is currently living his dream of engineering the fortunes of an NFL franchise. A man of varied interests who will not rest on yesterday's achievements, he is a dedicated businessman and family man — sharing a passion for both worlds.

Jerry is involved in numerous civic and charitable causes. He serves on the board of directors for the Dallas-based Childworks International, a foundation for the funding of children's surgery. He also enjoys an association with the Boys Clubs of America and the National Paralysis Association. Among his favorite hobbies are hunting, fishing, tennis, water skiing and snow skiing. Jerry and wife Gene, a former Arkansas beauty pageant winner whom he met while both attended the University of Arkansas, live in Dallas. They have three children, Stephen, Charlotte and Jerry, Jr.

Stephen is a 27-year old graduate of the University of Arkansas who serves as a Cowboys' Vice President, and Charlotte (25) is a Stanford graduate who is the Marketing and Special Events Coordinator for the organization. Jerry Jr. is a recent graduate of Georgetown University.

## Chronology Since Jerry Jones' Purchase of the Dallas Cowboys:

**February 25, 1989** — Jerry Jones purchases the Dallas Cowboys and the lease to manage Texas Stadium Corp. from H.R. "Bum" Bright. Jones names Jimmy Johnson as the new head coach of the Dallas Cowboys.

**April 6, 1989** — Jones signs Jimmy Johnson to a 10-year contract to coach the Dallas Cowboys. Jones cites commitment and continuity as the major reasons behind the agreement to the long term contract.

**April 20, 1989** — Jones completes negotiations on Troy Aikman's contract — a six-year deal that is completed four days before Aikman is the top overall selection in the 1989 NFL Draft.

October 12, 1989 — Herschel Walker is traded to Minnesota for five players, six conditional draft choices, and a 1992 first round draft choice. Current players who actually came to Dallas as a result of the trade include: Emmitt Smith, Russell Maryland, Issiac Holt, along with eight players who were selected in the 1992 draft, including first round pick Kevin Smith.

**October 29, 1989** — Former Cowboy Lee Roy Jordan becomes the first player inducted into the Ring of Honor since Roger Staubach was inducted in 1983.

**December 9, 1989** — Training camp is moved from Thousand Oaks, California to Austin, Texas, marking the first time in the 30-year history of the organization that the team will conduct training camp within the State of Texas.

March 19, 1990 — Five weeks worth of facility renovations at the Valley Ranch Training headquarters accumulate costs in excess of \$180,000. The open air weight room is enclosed into a fully carpeted facility that is air conditioned and heated.

March 29, 1990 — Dallas signs an NFL-high 16 Plan B free agents, including 1991 starters TE Jay Novacek, LB Vinson Smith, SS James Washington. Jones spent over one million dollars in signing bonuses for the record Plan B group.

August 10, 1990 — The Cowboys' first-ever in-state training camp concludes at St. Edward's University in Austin. Over 100,000 fans attend work-outs, while more than 400 media credentials are issued in the three-plus weeks of work. Austin officials estimate that the camp brings an additional \$3.2 million of income into the Austin area.

August 25, 1990 — Texas Stadium opens for the 1990 season, and for the very first time, the facility is equipped with televisions at every concession stand and live radio broadcasts piped throughout the stadium and the Corral.

September 5, 1990 — The Cowboys trade Steve Walsh to the New Orleans Saints for a 1st and 3rd round draft choice in 1991 and a conditional 2nd round pick in 1992.

**April 19, 1991** — A deal is made to bring the No. 1 overall selection in the 1991 NFL Draft to Dallas in exchange for a first and second round selection and three veteran players. Dallas selected Outland Trophy winner Russell Maryland with the top pick.

April 21-22, 1991 — In an unprecedented action among the NFL, the Cowboys sign their top three draft choices on draft day. The team also drafts a club record 17 players.

July 16, 1991 — The Cowboys open training camp in Austin with all 17 of their draft choices under contract.

August 16, 1991 — The Cowboys conclude their second training camp at St. Edward's University in Austin, Texas. During the four weeks of work in Austin, over 75,000 fans watch the Cowboys' practices, while 465 media credentials are issued.

September 9, 1991 — Monday Night Football returns to Texas Stadium for the first time since November of 1987. Dallas falls to the Washington Redskins by a 33-31 score in one of the highest rated MNF games of the year.

September 22, 1991 — Dallas defeats Phoenix 17-9 in a Sunday night game that produces the largest television audience to ever witness an NFL game on Turner Network Television.

September 29, 1991 — Dallas defeats the defending Super Bowl Champion New York Giants by a 21-16 score at Texas Stadium.

November 24, 1991 — The Cowboys end the Washington Redskins 1991 undefeated streak at 11 games with a 24-21 Cowboys victory at RFK.

**December 15, 1991** — Dallas defeats Philadelphia, 25-13, at Veterans Stadium to secure a wild card playoff spot. The victory marks the team's first trip to the playoffs since the 1985 club went 10-6 and won the NFC Eastern Division title.

**December 22, 1991** — Dallas closes the 1991 season with a 31-27 win over Atlanta, marking the team's best record (11-5) since the 1983 team finished 12-4. The victory total marks the 11th time in club history that Dallas has won 11 games or more.

**December**, **1991** — Since the 1988 season, attendance at Cowboys home games has increased by 27.8%, representing a growth of more than 13,000 fans per game. The team also set a new Texas Stadium record for consecutive crowds of more than 60,000 fans. The Cowboys have now drawn 60,000 fans or more to their last 15 straight home games. The previous franchise record was 11. The Cowboys' average home attendance in 1991 was 62,738, the club's highest home attendance average since the 1983 team drew 63,224 fans per game.

January 5, 1992 — Dallas defeats Chicago by a 17-13 score in an opening round playoff game at Soldier Field. The victory marks the Cowboys' first playoff win since 1982, and the first playoff win on the road since 1980.

**April 26-27, 1992** — Dallas drafts 15 players overall in the 1992 NFL Draft, including a pair of first round defensive players: cornerback Kevin Smith of Texas A&M and linebacker Robert Jones of East Carolina. The Cowboys agree to contract terms with their top four draft choices within hours of the completion of the draft.

May 1, 1992 — Jerry Jones is appointed to the NFL's Competition Committee by Commissioner Paul Tagliabue. Jones becomes the first owner to serve on the prestigious committee since the death of Cincinnati's Paul Brown.

**Jimmy Johnson** 





In the hours just prior to the start of summer training camp for the 1991 season, Dallas Cowboys head coach Jimmy Johnson publicly expressed his lofty expectations for his current club to a gathering of media representatives in Austin, Texas. "I expect this team to not only quality for the playoffs, but to have some success in the playoffs this year."

Many of those in the room that day responded to Johnson's forecast with laughter.

Five months and 11 victories later, the only people who were still laughing were the Dallas Cowboys fans.

In an inspiring turn-around season, which validated the coach's confidence in his young and enthusiastic team, Dallas posted an 11-5 record — the club's best record since 1983. Along the way, the Cowboys posted five straight wins down the stretch to finish second in the NFC Eastern Division and qualify for the NFC playoffs for the first time in six seasons.

As the NFC's No. 2 wild card qualifier, the Cowboys traveled to Chicago for an opening round playoff win (17-13) over the veteran Bears, before eventually facing playoff elimination one week later in Detroit.

Following the season, Johnson was named the NFL Coach of the Year by the Football Digest, and another chapter had been written in the unique tranformation that has taken the Cowboys from a 1-15 club in 1989 to the ranks of an NFL playoff team. The journey has featured some interesting developments:

- ★ The 1991 playoff victory in Chicago, marked the Cowboys first post season win since 1982. It was also the Cowboys' first road playoff victory since the 1980 season.
- ★ An explosion of young talent erupted in 1991 as Dallas sent four offensive players to the Pro Bowl for the first time since 1979. The Cowboys also became the first team in NFL history to produce the league's leading rusher, Emmitt Smith, and receiver, Michael Irvin, in the same year.
- ★ In 1990 Johnson was named the NFL's Coach of the Year by the Associated Press, while earning NFC Coach of the Year recognition from U.P.I. and College & Pro Football Newsweekly.
- ★ In the last two seasons, Dallas had claimed at least one victory over 10 of the 12 NFC teams that the Cowboys have faced. Last year, the Cowboys defeated the defending Super Bowl Champion New York Giants, while also handing the '91 World Champion Washington Redskins their only defeat at RFK Stadium.

- ★ Thus far in the decade of the '90s, only four NFC head coaches have won more games than Johnson's 18 victories. They are Joe Gibbs (24), George Seifert (24), Mike Ditka (22) and Jim Mora (19).
- ★ Since 1960, 17 teams have finished with one win or less, but none have qualified for the playoffs in fewer successive seasons than the 1991 Dallas Cowboys. Dallas pulled the trick in just two seasons, just one season less than the time it took for Chuck Noll's Steelers to go from 1-13 in 1969 to a playoff berth in 1972.

"I really believe that we're just getting started," says Johnson. "This is a very young team, and we are still developing.

"We made great progress last year, but when you play in the league's toughest division, the NFC East, you know there's no room for complacency. It's a battle every week, and we still have a lot of work to do."

Named by Jerry Jones as the Dallas Cowboys head coach on February 25, 1989, Johnson's tenure has been visibly characterized by one sharply focused purpose — that of constantly improving the football team.

While exploring every avenue of upgrading the Cowboys' talent pool, Johnson and Jones have worked rapidly and effectively. Recent trades have brought in defensive tackle Tony Casillas and quarterback Steve Beuerlein. Plan B has produced a Pro Bowl tight end in Jay Novacek. The NFL draft has provided a plentiful nucleus upon which to build a long term winner with the likes of first rounders Troy Aikman, Emmitt Smith, Russell Maryland and Alvin Harper.

The numbers involved in the building plan have been staggering to say the least. In the three years since Jones and Johnson have taken charge, the Cowboys have drafted 54 players, made 41 trades and signed 29 Plan B free agents.

It should come as no surprise that Johnson has put the stamp of a winner on the Cowboys sooner than expected. Rapid success has been a trademark of his at every professional stop.

At the University of Miami (1984-88) Johnson led the Hurricanes to a 52-9 record, including a 44-4 mark over the final four seasons. His Hurricane teams also captured two Orange Bowl titles, a national championship in 1987 and two No. 2 finishes (1986 and 1988). Only a combined five-point difference in two losses separated Miami from three straight 12-0 seasons from 1986-88.

During Johnson's reign the Hurricanes were amazingly consistent. They were 21-9 against teams that were ranked in the Top 20, and 5-0 against preseason No. 1s. They avoided upsets, putting together an unblemished 31-0 mark versus unranked teams. They won 36 straight regular-season games from 1985-88, the fifth longest streak in NCAA history. And they won 20 consecutive road games from 1984-88.

In his first head coaching job, Johnson took over a losing program at Oklahoma State in 1979 and brought it to national prominence, compiling a 29-25 record in five seasons, including two bowl appearances. Johnson was named Big Eight Coach of the Year following his first season.

A native Texan, James William Johnson (7/16/43) grew up on the Gulf Coast in Port Arthur, where he earned all-state football honors at Jefferson High School as a two-way lineman.

Despite his relatively small size, Johnson became an All-Southwest Conference defensive lineman at Arkansas and helped lead the Razorbacks to the 1964 national championship. A three-year letterman, Johnson was named to Arkansas' All-Decade Team of the '60s. Arkansas was also where he forged a friendship with Jerry Jones that 25 years later led both men to Dallas.

Johnson, who earned his degree in psychology, began his coaching career on the defensive line at Louisiana Tech in 1965. When an assistant's job fell through at Florida State in 1966, Jimmy spent the year as an assistant coach at Picayune High School in Mississippi.

He resumed his college coaching career one year later in 1967 as Wichita State's defensive line coach. In 1968 he became a 25-year-old defensive coordinator when Johnny Majors, an Arkansas assistant when Jimmy played there, brought him to lowa State.

After two years at Iowa State, Johnson moved to Chuck Fairbanks' Oklahoma staff (1970-72) as defensive line coach. He returned to Arkansas in 1973 for a fouryear tenure as his alma mater's defensive coordinator under his college coach, Frank Broyles.

In 1977 Johnson went to Pittsburgh as assistant head coach and defensive coordinator, directing one of college football's all-time great defenses for two years. Johnson's 14-year career as an assistant came to end in 1979 when he took over the rebuilding mission at Oklahoma State.

Jimmy has two sons — Brent, an attorney, and Chad, an account executive for Mercill Lynch.

## Dave Wannstedt Assistant Head Coach/Defensive Coordinator/Linebackers

Two things have remained constant for the Cowboys defense over the past few seasons, change and Dave Wannstedt. The Dallas defense opened the 1991 season with new starters at six of the 11 positions. By the end of the year, rookies Russell Maryland and Larry Brown were with the first team, leaving only three remaining starters from the previous season.

Five other rookies also contributed down the stretch to a Cowboys defense that held opponents to 82.4 yards rushing per game over the final five games, all Dallas wins, including no touchdowns on the ground in the final three games, to propel the Cowboys to their first playoff appearance in six seasons.

Despite the revisions, the Dallas defense improved from 18th against the rush in 1990 to ninth last year and held opposing offenses to 28 touchdowns, second in a 16-game season by a Cowboys defense only to the 24 allowed by the 1978 team that advanced to Super Bowl XIII.

Wannstedt continues to be recognized throughout the NFL for his job directing Dallas' defense. In 1992 he was a finalist for the Pittsburgh Steelers head coaching job and in 1990 was honored by The National as the NFL assistant coach of the year. Cowboys Head Coach Jimmy Johnson elevated Wannstedt to the position of assistant head coach in January, 1992.

In Wannstedt's three seasons as defensive coordinator, the Cowboys have compiled the second longest streak (7 games) in team history of not allowing an opponent to gain over 300 yards; the club's third longest stretch (12 quarters) ever of not allowing an offensive touchdown; and the longest streak since 1980 (23 games) of not allowing an opposing passer to throw for 300 yards. In addition Dallas led the NFC in pass defense in 1990.

At linebacker last year, Dallas' first string featured one player who had only one previous pro start and two others who switched positions, including Ken Norton, the team leader in tackles for losses in 1991 despite moving from weakside in 1990 to strongside last year.

Wannstedt also oversaw the development of four rookie linebackers, including Dixon Edwards who returned an interception for a touchdown against Cincinnati and played some at the weakside spot the final stretch of the season.

During Wannstedt's tenure as defensive coordinator at Miami from 1986-88, the Hurricanes held opponents to 2.2 yards per carry and 10.9 points per game while averaging 48 sacks a season. In Wannstedt's three seasons, the Miami defense turned out six All-Americas and 11 NFL draft choices, including five in the first two rounds.

After he began his coaching career at Pittsburgh in 1975, Wannstedt became an assistant at Oklahoma State (1979-82) and Southern California (1983-85) before going to Miami.

An offensive tackle at the University of Pittsburgh from 1970-73, Wannstedt earned second-team All-East honors and was a captain on the 1973 Panthers team that featured freshman Tony Dorsett. Wannstedt was drafted by Green Bay in the 15th round in 1974 and spent the season on injured reserve.

A native of Pittsburgh (5/21/52), David Raymond Wannstedt graduated from Baldwin High School. In May, 1990 he was inducted into the Western Pennsylvania Sports Hall of Fame. He and wife Jan have two daughters — Keri and Jami.



## Norv Turner Offensive Coordinator/Quarterbacks

When Norv Turner became the Cowboys offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach in February, 1991, the confidence the players immediately developed in Turner and his offensive system was so great that last year's dramatic improvement came as little surprise.

The Dallas offense went from last in the National Football League in 1990 to ninth in 1991, the biggest jump ever offensive.

ly in the NFL from 28th, and the largest gain from last in the league in offense since the New York Jets went from 26th in 1971 to second in 1972.

Even while increasing its output, the Cowboys offense limited its mistakes. Twice, under two different quarterbacks, Dallas bettered team records for consecutive quarters without a turnover. The first streak of nine came early in the season under starter Troy Aikman. Later in the year, with Aikman injured, Steve Beuerlein led a streak of 15 straight quarters without a fumble or interception.

Aikman, who completed a team-record 65.3% of his passes in 1991 to lead the NFC, compiled streaks of 116 and 93 straight pass attempts without an interception, the fifth and 10th longest, respectively, in team history. Aikman also tied the Cowboys' second longest completion streak with 12 straight against Green Bay.

Beuerlein, whom Dallas acquired after preseason, didn't throw an interception in his first 111 attempts with the Cowboys, the sixth longest streak in team history.

In addition the Cowboys produced four offensive Pro Bowlers — Aikman, Michael Irvin, Jay Novacek and Emmitt Smith — for the first time since 1979. Irvin led the NFL with 1,523 receiving yards, the sixth most in league history, and led the NFC with 93 catches, the seventh most ever in the NFL.

Novacek tied his career season-high last year with 59 catches, including a 1991 NFC game-high 11 catches against Green Bay. He also tallied a season career-high 664 receiving yards, highlighted by a career game-best 131 yards at Detroit.

Smith led the NFL in rushing with 1,563 yards, the second most in Cowboys history, and caught a career season-best 49 passes in 1991.

As an assistant with the Los Angeles Rams from 1985-90, Turner oversaw wide receivers Willie Anderson, the NFL leader in yards per catch in 1989 and '90, and Henry Ellard, the league's leading receiver in 1988, along with tight end Pete Holohan, who caught 49-ormore passes each season from 1988-90.

Prior to joining the Rams, Turner was offensive coordinator of the 1984 University of Southern California squad that defeated Ohio State in the Rose Bowl. Turner oversaw quarterbacks (1981-83), defensive backs (1980) and receivers (1976-79) before he was named offensive coordinator for the Trojans.

After a three-year careeer as a quarterback at Oregon, Turner became a graduate assistant for the Ducks in 1975. He was recruited to Oregon by John Robinson, the head coach Turner worked under from 1976-82 at USC and then with the Rams from 1985-90.

Born in Le Jeune, NC (5/17/52), Norval Turner grew up in Martinez, CA, then starred as a quarterback/defensive back at Alhambra, CA, High School. He and wife Nancy have three children — Scott, Stephanie and Drew.

## Hubbard Alexander \* Receivers

Since coming to the Cowboys in 1989, Hubbard Alexander has guided the development of Michael Irvin, who emerged as one of the top wide receivers in the National Football League in 1991. Last season Alexander also oversaw the progress of rookie Alvin Harper, who could team with Irvin to give Dallas one of the league's best wide receiver tandems.

Irvin, who was named Most Valuable Player of the 1992 Pro Bowl, led the NFL with 1,523 receiving yards, sixth most in NFL history, and the NFC with 93 catches, seventh best ever in the league. He also set a club record for 100-yard receiving games in a season with seven and tied the team mark for consecutive 100-yard games with three.

Harper became a starter in the ninth game of the year and three weeks later caught four passes for 101 yards in the Cowboys win over Washington at RFK. In the Cowboys' two playoff games, he averaged over 20 yards per catch, including grabs of 45 and 39 yards at Chicago.

In 1990 "Axe" guided a pair of starting wide receivers, who each were returning from major knee surgery. Kelvin Martin had his best pro season with a team-high 64 catches to finish eighth among NFC wide receivers in catches. Irvin scored a touchdown every four receptions and averaged 20.7 yards per catch, the highest by a Cowboys player since 1981.

His first year with the team, Alexander lost Irvin and Martin to knee injuries and had to quickly develop an inexperienced group. Rookie James Dixon, who joined the Cowboys after preseason, led the team in yards per catch and set a club rookie record with 203 receiving yards against Phoenix on Nov. 12.

In 10 seasons at the University of Miami, Alexander developed the three leading receivers in school history. As tight ends coach from 1979-84, he worked with Glenn Dennison (1981-83) who set the school record for career receptions, which was surpassed by another Alexander protege All-America Willie Smith (1984-85).

In 1985 Alexander took over the wide receivers and began to mold a trio consisting of Brian Blades, Brett Perriman and Irvin. All three were among the first 52 players selected in the 1988 draft, and all three led their respective NFL teams in receiving last year. Irvin also broke most of Miami's receiving records, including Smith's career catch mark.

Following seven terms as a highly successful high school coach in Memphis, TN, Alexander spent six seasons as an assistant at Vanderbilt before joining Miami. A three-year starter at center at Tennessee State, Alexander earned All-America honors as a senior and signed as a free agent with Dallas. He began his coaching career with his alma mater in 1962.

Hubbard Lindsay Alexander (2/14/39) graduated from Atkins High School in Winston-Salem, NC. He and wife Gloria have three sons — Todd, Chad and Bard.



## Joe Avezzano 🛪 Special Teams

The play of the Cowboys special teams was so impressive in 1991 that following the season Joe Avezzano was named the NFL Special Teams Coach of the Year, by the widest margin ever, in a vote of the league's 28 special teams coaches.

Dallas led the NFL in points scored on special teams with 20 and in kickoff return average with a 21.7 mark. Also, for the first time in the same season in team history, Dallas placed a player in

the top three in the league in both punt return average (Kelvin Martin, 11.6) and kickoff

return average (Alexander Wright, 24.5).

In addition the Cowboys were the first team since Buffalo in 1978 to have the NFL's longest punt return (Martin, 85 yards) and kickoff return (Wright, 102) in the same season. Wright's 102-yard kickoff return was the longest ever by a Cowboys player and the longest in the NFL since 1979.

In Avezzano's two seasons with the team, Dallas has blocked six punts while allowing Mike Saxon to increase his streak of punts without a block to 143, the third longest in club history. In 1990 Issaic Holt tied a club season mark with two blocked punts and last year against Houston batted down another to equal the team career record of three. In the second game of Avezzano's first season in Dallas, Wright returned a kickoff 90 vards for a touchdown against the Giants.

Before coming to Dallas, Avezzano coached the offensive line at Texas A&M for four terms, during which time the Aggies won three Southwest Conference titles and two Cotton Bowls.

During his tenure at Texas A&M, Avezzano groomed six All-Southwest Conference picks, including All-Americas Richmond Webb and Doug Williams. Four of his charges were selected in the NFL draft, three of those (Webb, Williams and Jerry Fontenot) in the first three rounds.

Avezzano took on the additional duties of offensive coordinator in 1988 when sophomore running back Darrin Lewis finished second in the nation in rushing to earn first-team All-America honors.

Before joining the Aggies, Avezzano spent five seasons as head coach at Oregon State. From 1977-79 he served as offensive coordinator at Tennessee.

As offensive line coach at the University of Pittsburgh from 1973-76, Avezzano's troops, which included current Cowboys assistant Dave Wannstedt, led the way for Heisman Trophy running back Tony Dorsett. Wannstedt joined Avezzano on the Panthers' coaching staff in 1975 and Pitt won the national title in 1976.

Avezzano began his coaching career at Washington High School in Massillon, OH, in 1967. He then coached at Florida State for a season before joining lowa State where Jimmy Johnson was also an assistant in 1969.

Born in Yonkers, NY (11/17/43), Avezzano grew up in Miami where he played football at Jackson High School under current Cowboys running backs coach Joe Brodsky. After starring at guard for Florida State, Avezzano was drafted by the Boston Patriots. Joe and wife Diann have a son, Anthony.



## Joe Brodsky \* Running Backs

Under Joe Brodsky's guidance, Emmitt Smith led the National Football League in rushing in only his second season as a pro in 1991 and went to the Pro Bowl his first two years in the league. Brodsky also oversaw the development of starting fullback Daryl Johnston, who, like Brodsky, came into the league in 1989, and had an outstanding season blocking for Smith and set personal highs for receptions and receiving yards in 1991.

However, the biggest surprise of the running back corps last season was the rapid progress of first-year free agent Ricky Blake, a former World League player, who scampered 30-yards for a touchdown on his first NFL carry and averaged over five yards per rush in 1991.

In 1990 Brodsky oversaw the quick development of Smith, who, despite missing all of training camp, led league rookies in rushing yards and earned NFL Rookie of the Year honors.

Brodsky also polished fullback Tommie Agee, who, entered the season with career totals of five yards rushing and three catches, but then led all Cowboys backs in yards per carry Brodsky, Cont.

and receptions in 1990.

In 11 seasons (1978-88) as running backs coach at the University of Miami, Brodsky groomed 10 NFL draft picks, including three — Ottis Anderson, Alonzo Highsmith and Cleveland Gary — picked in the first round. Gary set a Miami record for catches in a season by a back with 57 in 1988.

Not included in the draftees is Indianapolis running back Albert Bentley who played in the United States Football League before joining the Colts. More impressive is that Highsmith went to Miami as a defensive lineman and Bentley as a walk-on. Five of Miami's top 10 all-time rushers worked under Brodsky.

For 13 seasons Brodsky was one of South Florida's most successful high school coaches at Miami-Jackson (1965-70) and Hialeah-Miami Lakes (1971-77) where in 1975 he guided the team, quarterbacked by his son, Joe, Jr., to the Florida state title. One of his charges at Jackson High School was current Cowboys special teams coach Joe Avezano.

A four-year letterman in football, basketball and track at Florida, Brodsky started at fullback and linebacker for the Gators.

Joseph Brodsky (6/9/34) is a native of Miami, where he graduated from Jackson High School. He and wife Joyce have three sons — Joe, Jr., Larry and Jeffrey — and two grandchildren, Amanda and Joe. Larry, a wide receiver at Miami from 1979-81, is fifth on the Hurricanes' all-time receiving list.



Dave Campo ★ Defensive Backs

Under Dave Campo, Larry Brown emerged as one of the pleasant surprises of 1991 for the Dallas Cowboys. When he moved into the starting lineup at right cornerback in the season's fourth week, Brown, who earned NFL all-rookie honors, became the first 12th-round draft choice to start as a rookie for Dallas.

For the second straight year, the Cowboys secondary kept opponents from the big pass play in 1991. Of the NFL's top 10 pass

defenses in terms of fewest total yards allowed last season, only five gave up fewer yards per pass attempt than the 6.75 yards per toss, to which Dallas limited its opponents. In 1990 the Cowboys held enemy passers to 6.24 yards per throw, the fewest allowed by a Dallas defense since 1984.

Late in 1989, Campo's first year with the team, the Dallas secondary began a streak of 23 straight games without allowing an opposing passer to throw for 300-or-more yards in a game, the fourth longest such stretch in team history. In addition, Dallas held opponents to less than 100 yards passing in each of the last two games of 1990, including the season finale when Atlanta was held to 59 net passing yards, the fewest allowed by Dallas since 1986.

In their first year as Dallas starters in 1990, cornerback Issiac Holt and safety James Washington each earned NFC Defensive Player of the Week honors.

During his stint with the Hurricanes in 1987-88, Campo oversaw the best defensive back in school history. In his first season with the Hurricanes, Campo fine-tuned the talents of Bennie Blades. A Jim Thorpe Trophy (best collegiate defensive back) recipient, Blades was drafted by Detroit with the third overall pick in the 1988 draft.

Prior to joining Miami, Campo spent three seasons (1984-86) as part of a staff that turned Syracuse into a national championship contender.

He began his career at his alma mater, Central Connecticut State, where he spent the 1971-72 seasons. His coaching trek then took him to Albany State (1973), Bridgeport (1974), University of Pittsburgh (1975), Washington State (1976), Boise State (1977-79), Oregon State (1980), Weber State (1981-82) and Iowa State (1983).

In addition to starring at defensive back in college, David Cross Campo (7/18/47) twice earned All-East honors at shortstop at Central Connecticut State. He attended Robert E. Fitch High School in Groton, CT. He and his wife Kay have six children — Angie, Eric, Becky, Tommy, Shelbie and Michael. THE COACHING STAFF



## Butch Davis \* Defensive Line

By the end of the 1991 season, Butch Davis had combined three rookies and Tony Casillas, acquired during training camp last year, with Jim Jeffcoat, Jimmie Jones and Tony Tolbert to form a unit that that held opponents to 82.4 yards rushing over the final five games of the season, all Dallas wins, and no rushing touchdowns in the final three weeks.

The defensive line also played a key role in the Cowboys' improvement from 18th in the National Football League against the rush in 1990 to ninth last year.

Of the three rookie defensive linemen tutored by Davis in 1991, Russell Maryland made 29 tackles, 4½ sacks, 5 tackles for losses, and three forced fumbles as a starter the final seven games of the season to earn all-rookie honors. Defensive end Tony Hill played regularly on third downs as a pass rusher, and defensive tackle Leon Lett, a seventh round draft choice, relieved Casillas and Maryland.

In 1990 Davis oversaw the quick development of Jones, who tied for the team lead in sacks and earned all-rookie honors. Davis also has been a big key in the progress of defensive end Tony Tolbert from a 230-pound collegiate linebacker drafted in 1989, Davis' first season in Dallas, to the team leader in sacks and quarterback pressures last season.

In five seasons as defensive line coach at the University of Miami, Davis led his players to impressive heights. Fifteen of his linemen were picked in the NFL draft, including All-Americas Bill Hawkins, taken in the first round by the Rams in 1989; Cortez Kennedy, taken with the third pick in the 1990 draft by Seattle; and Maryland, who rejoined Davis after being drafted with the first overall pick in 1991.

Davis' line was a key part of a Miami defense that finished second in the nation in both scoring and total defense in 1988. The Hurricanes also set a school record with 49 sacks in 1986, then broke it with 50 in 1988 and held opposing rushers to fewer than 2.3 yards per carry in 1987 and 1988.

After working as a high school coach in Arkansas and Oklahoma, Davis joined Jimmy Johnson's Oklahoma State staff in 1979 before moving with Johnson to Miami in 1984.

A native of Tahlequah, OK (11/17/51), Paul Hilton Davis was a defensive end at Arkansas where he earned his degree in anatomy and physiology. Butch graduated from Bixby, OK, High School. He and wife Tammy live in Coppell, TX.



## Robert Ford \* Tight Ends

In his first year overseeing the Cowboys tight ends, Robert Ford guided Jay Novacek and Alfredo Roberts to their best pro seasons in 1991.

Novacek tied his season career-high for catches and surpassed his season career-high for receiving yards last year. He also was named to his first Pro Bowl and earned All-Pro honors in 1991. Roberts set season career-highs for catches and receiving yards

while tying his game career-high for catches three times last year.

Although 1991 was Ford's first full-time assignment with Dallas, he was not a stranger to the Cowboys' staff after spending the previous summer at training camp as one of the recipients of the Jerry Jones Minority Coaching Fellowship.

Ford coached 15 years on the collegiate level and one season with the Houston Gamblers of the United States Football League before coming to Dallas. He spent 1989-90 as receivers coach with Texas A&M, helping the Aggies to two bowl appearances and guiding wide receiver Shane Garrett, who played for the Cincinnati Bengals in 1991.

Prior to joining Texas A&M, Ford spent two seasons at Texas Tech where he developed

a trio of wide receivers — Tyrone Thurman, Eddy Anderson and Wayne Walker — who each earned All-Southwest Conference honors, finished one-two-three on the Red Raiders' all-time receiving list and were named the nation's best group of receivers by the The Sporting News in 1988.

As receivers coach of the Gamblers in 1985, Ford oversaw current NFL wide receivers Ricky Sanders, Clarence Verdin and Richard Johnson. Under Ford, Johnson caught 103 passes for 1,384 yards, Verdin had 84 catches for 1,004 yards and Sanders, who grabbed 101 receptions for 1,378 yards in 1984, caught 48 passes for 538 yards despite playing only 10 games in 1985.

After beginning his coaching career at Saginaw, MI, High School in 1973, Ford moved on as receivers coach at Western Illinois (1974-76), New Mexico (1977-79), Oregon State (1980-81), Mississippi State (1982-83) and Kansas (1986). Ford was also the recruiting coordinator with New Mexico. While at Oregon State, Ford was on the same staff with current Cowboys assistants Joe Avezzano, then the Beavers' head coach, and Dave Campo.

The only player in the history of the NCAA to catch two 99-yard touchdown passes, Ford led the University of Houston in receiving, punt returns and kickoff returns in 1972, when he earned third-team All-America honors. While with the Cougars, Ford roomed with former Cowboys fullback Robert Newhouse.

A native of Belton, TX (6/21/51), Robert starred at Belton High School. He earned a bachelor's degree in education from Houston and a master's in athletic administration from Western Illinois. He and wife Janice have two sons, Bobby and Jason.



## Steve Hoffman \* Kickers/Quality Control

Under Steve Hoffman, Cowboys kickers have had some of the best performances in team history the past two seasons. Veteran punter Mike Saxon averaged 42.6 gross yards per boot in 1991, second only to his season career-high 43.2 in 1990. He also set a season career-high for average net yards last year with a 36.8 mark, bettering this 35.6 pace from 1990.

Hoffman also oversaw the development of Ken Willis, who signed with Dallas as a free agent rookie in 1990 and set or tied eight Cowboys placekicking records, including field goals in a season and longest field goal, during his two sesons with the team.

After joining the Cowboys to coach the kickers in 1989, Hoffman added the duties of quality control in 1990.

From 1985-87 Hoffman oversaw the kickers at the University of Miarni where one of his charges was Jeff Feagles, a four-year pro who punted for Philadelphia the past two seasons. Hoffman also was a top instructor for Ray Pelfrey's kicking camps where his students included Barry Helton, who booted for the Rams in 1991, and Brian Hansen, the Saints' all-time leading punter, who kicked for Cleveland last season.

For two springs Hoffman coached in Italy as offensive coordinator of the Bellusco Seahawks in 1987 and the Rho Blackknights in 1988. In the fall of 1988 he coached at Sunset High School in Miami.

In 1983 Hoffman punted for the Washington Federals of the United States Football League. He also went to training camp with the Redskins in 1981 and 1983, Seattle in 1984 and New Orleans in 1985.

Born in Camden, NJ (9/8/58), Hoffman starred in baseball and football at York Suburban High School in York, PA. He earned All-Mid-Atlantic Conference honors at Dickinson College where he played quarterback, running back and wide receiver while handling the punting duties. He met his wife Raffaella while coaching in Italy.

## Bob Slowik \* Defensive Assistant

The latest addition to the Cowboys coaching staff is Bob Slowik, formerly defensive coordinator and inside linebackers coach at East Carolina University.

In 1991 Slowik (SLO-ik) coached outside linebackers for a Pirates squad that garnered its highest national ranking (ninth), the best record (11-1) in school history, and its first winning season and bowl apperance since 1983. East Carolina won its final 11

games last year, including a Peach Bowl victory over North Carolina State on New Year's Day. Slowik was elevated to defensive coordinator following the season.

In two campaigns with East Carolina, Slowik developed one of the school's best tandem of outside linebackers. As a sophomore in 1990, Jerry Dillon became a starter and finished second on the team in tackles to earn East Carolina's most improved defensive player award. He finished fourth in tackles, third in tackles for losses and led the team with two blocked kicks in 1991.

Bernard Carter, who played only one season of football in high school, was named the team's outstanding defensive newcomer in 1990 and last year led the Pirates with a school sophomore record 7½ sacks. In addition he set an East Carolina single-game record with three sacks against Central Florida in 1991.

His first season at East Carolina, Slowik oversaw linebacker George Koonce, who led the Pirates in sacks and tackles for losses in 1990 and went to training camp with Atlanta in 1991.

Prior to joining the Pirates staff, Slowik coached defensive backs from 1984-89 at Rutgers, where he oversaw cornerbacks Jean Austin and Sean Washington, both free agent signed by Dallas in 1988, and Harold Young, an honorable mention All-America pick, who went to training camp with the Los Angeles Raiders in 1985.

After beginning his coaching career as a graduate assistant at his alma mater, the University of Delaware, in 1977, Slowik spent four years as a part-time assistant at Florida and a season coaching the secondary at Drake before moving on to Rutgers.

A two-year starter at cornerback for Delaware, Slowik helped the Fightin Blue Hens to a two-year record of 16-6, including the quarterfinals of the NCAA Division 1-AA playoffs as a senior.

The Pittsburgh, PA, native (5/16/54) attended Baldwin High School. Slowik earned his undergraduate and master's degree in physical education from Delaware. Bob and his wife Carol have four children — Ryan, Andrea, Bobby and Steven. His brother Joe played football for Penn State in 1974.



## Tony Wise \* Offensive Line

Over the past two seasons Tony Wise has developed a unit that in 1991 provided protection and opened holes for a Dallas offense, which produced four Pro Bowlers while going from 28th in the league in total yards in 1990 to ninth last year. In addition the Cowboys front wall sprang Emmitt Smith for a league-leading 1,563 yards, and allowed Troy Aikman to complete a team record 65.3% of his passes and Michael Irvin to

lead the NFC in catches and the NFL in receiving yards in 1991.

Last year Wise also oversaw the successful switch of Kevin Gogan from tackle to left guard, where he started 16 games, and the progress of rookie tackle Erik Williams, who started three games, including the Cowboys win over Washington at RFK on

November 24, when he held All-Pro defensive end Charles Mann to two tackles and no sacks.

Entering the 1990 season only one offensive lineman — left tackle Mark Tuinei — had started at the same position for Dallas for more than four games. Right guard John Gesek joined the team after preseason. Crawford Ker moved from right guard to left guard to replace Nate Newton, who moved to right tackle. Center Mark Stepnoski didn't start until the 13th game of his rookie year in 1989. Despite its inexperience, this group paved the way for Smith to lead all rookies in rushing yards and earn rookie of the year honors.

In 1989, Wise's first year with Dallas, the offensive line allowed only 30 sacks in 16 games, tying the team record from 1976 when the NFL schedule was 14 games. It was a trend continued from his final year at Miami in 1988, when the front wall gave up just five sacks, a school-record low for one campaign.

During Wise's four seasons at Miami, the Hurricanes had their two best offensive seasons ever, with a school-record 461.5 yards per game his first year and 452.5 yards per game in 1988.

The greatest challenge for Wise came in the 1988 Orange Bowl that decided the national championship, when he had to start three linemen at new positions. The Hurricanes defeated Oklahoma 20-14 in that game.

Wise began his coaching career at Albany State in 1973. He served one-year stints at Bridgeport, Central Connecticut State and Washington State before joining the University of Pittsburgh in 1977. He coached at Oklahoma State from 1979-83 and Syracuse in 1984 before going to Miami.

A letterman in football, lacrosse and hockey at Ithaca College, Anthony Charles Wise (12/28/51) graduated from Shaker High School in Latham, NY.



## Mike Woicik s

Strength and Conditioning

Whether he's lifting weights or running, Mike Woicik's hands on involvement with the Cowboys players in their conditioning programs has been a big part of the team's success. Upon his arrival in Dallas in February, 1990, Woicik supervised the renovation of the Cowboys' weightroom, where he maintains a constant presence.

Since coming to the Cowboys, Woicik has introduced "surgical tubing" and various other drills to help improve speed. In addition he oversaw the production of a video to help players with their conditioning programs when they're away from Dallas.

Woicik joined the Cowboys staff after 10 years as the strength and conditioning coach at Syracuse University, which became one of the nation's top football programs over the past decade. One of Woicik's prize pupils was fullback Daryl Johnston, who was picked in the second round by Dallas in 1989. Woicik also worked with current Cowboys assistants Dave Campo and Tony Wise at Syracuse.

"We have said many times that no one did as much for our program as Mike has," said former Syracuse Football Coach Dick MacPherson, who now is head coach of the New England Patriots. "In the early days when we weren't able to recruit as many great athletes as we do now, Mike made great athletes out of them."

From 1978-80 Woicik was the track coach and weightroom coordinator at Springfield College in Massachusetts.

An outstanding discus thrower at Boston College, Woicik set a school record of 180 feet, 5 inches, earned All-East honors and qualified for the NCAA championships. He also competed in the shot put and hammer throw.

A native of Westwood, MA (9/26/56), Mike Woicik (pronounced WOY-sick) competed in football and track at Westwood High School. Woicik, who is an ardent bowler, organizes a players' weekly bowling outing. He earned his degree in history from Boston College and master's in physical education from Springfield.

Most recently, Lacewell had served as the defensive coordinator at the University of Tennessee (1990-1991), and prior to that, he was the head coach and athletic director at Arkansas State.

"I believe Larry Lacewell is uniquely qualified for this job," said Cowboys President and General Manager Jerry Jones. "He is not only a knowledgeable football man, but he has been a college athletic director and has a solid administrative background. The combination of his management experience, his skill as an administrator and his vast knowledge of football talent are very special.

"We are fortunate to have a person like Larry who has earned a great deal of respect around the country for his work in college athletics," added Jones. "In these sensitive times involving the relationship between college football and the National Football League, a person of Larry's background will provide a visible benefit to not only the Dallas Cowboys, but to the NFL."

In 1990 Lacewell helped guide a Tennessee squad that captured the Southeastern Conference title and defeated Virginia in the Sugar Bowl. In 1991, the Volunteers placed second in the SEC to earn a berth in the Fiesta Bowl.

Arkansas State compiled a 69-48-4 record with Lacewell at the helm from 1978-89. A three-time Southland Conference coach of the year, Lacewell led the Indians to two conference championships.

Lacewell began his coaching career as an assistant at Alabama in 1959. Following two seasons with the Crimson Tide, he moved on to Arkansas State (1961), Arkansas A&M (1962-63), Kilgore Junior College (1964-65), Oklahoma (1966), Wichita State (1967) and Iowa State (1968). Lacewell rejoined the Sooners' staff in 1969 as assistant head coach and defensive coordinator and over the next nine seasons helped Oklahoma to six Big Eight titles and two national championships.

A native of Fordyce, AR, Lacewell attended Fordyce High School then played halfback at Arkansas A&M from 1955-59. He and his wife Criss have two children, Bryant Land and Logan.



Jim Garrett \star Scout

Jim Garrett, who spent 26 of the past 27 seasons as either a coach or scout in the NFL, re-joined Dallas in 1987.

He previously scouted for the Cowboys in 1968-69 and 1974-75. Prior to his first stint in Dallas, Garrett served two seasons as a scout for the BLESTO scouting combine. He then coached with the New York Giants from 1970-74 before returning to Dallas.

Garrett was also an assistant coach with New Orleans (1976-77) and Cleveland (1978-84). After a season as the head coach at Columbia, he scouted for Buffalo in 1986.

While he was with the Giants they twice played in the NFL Championship Game, including a 47-7 win over Chicago for the title in 1956. Following four seasons in New York, he finished his playing career in San Francisco in 1959.

Yowarsky returned to the Giants as a scout and assistant coach in 1959. After two seasons he joined the first coaching staff of the new franchise in Minnesota where he coached for six seasons. He then moved on as an assistant coach at New Orleans (1967-68), Atlanta (1969-70), Houston (1971) and San Diego (1972-73).

In the 1951 Sugar Bowl Yowarsky earned most valuable player honors as he led Kentucky to a 13-7 win over Oklahoma, ending the Sooners' 33-game winning streak. He played three seasons for the Wildcats under Paul "Bear" Bryant.

# What To Look For In 1992

The Cowboys improving their NFL-best opening day record of 24-7-1 (.766). Dallas, which holds the NFL record for consecutive wins in opening games with 17 straight from 1965-81, has won two straight openers.

- The Cowboys, along with the New York Giants, playing the toughest schedule in the NFL. Dallas' 1992 opponents combined for a 1991 record of 146-110 (.570), the hardest entering a season since 1989. In addition, only the Giants play more games against opponents with 1991 winning records (11) than the 10 Dallas faces. Only Denver plays more games (9) against 1991 playoff teams than the Cowboys, who play eight.
- The Cowboys improving their NFC-best 45-27 (.625) record against AFC foes in games against Denver, Kansas City, Seattle and the Los Angeles Raiders.
- The Cowboys improving their 16-7-1 (.688) record on Thanksgiving Day. Dallas has played annually on the holiday since 1966, except for 1975 and 1977. The Cowboys have won two straight Thanksgiving Day games. In the game immediately following the holiday contest, Dallas is 18-6 (.750), 9-2 at home. In all regular-season games after playing on Thanksgiving Day, the Cowboys are 45-29 (.608).
- Bill Bates, Jim Jeffcoat and Mike Saxon adding to their team-high streak of games played at 76. This season Bates and Jeffcoat also can play in their 150th NFL game. Jeffcoat enters 1992 with 140 games played, while Bates has played in 135.
- Michael Irvin becoming the first player in NFL history to accumulate over 1,500 receiving yards in consecutive seasons. Irvin led the league with 1,523 receiving yards in 1991. Charley Herrigan of Houston (1,746 yards in 1961 and 1,546 yards in 1964) and Jerry Rice of San Francisco (1,570 yards in 1986 and 1,502 yards in 1990) are the only players in NFL history with more than one 1,500-yard receiving season.
- Michael Irvin becoming only the third player in NFL history to catch 90-or-more passes in consecutive seasons. Lionel Taylor of Denver caught 92 receptions in 1960 and 100 in 1961. Art Monk of Washington snared 106 passes in 1984 and 91 in 1985. Irvin caught 93 in 1991.
- Michael Irvin and Kelvin Martin moving into the Cowboys' top 10 all-time receiving list. Martin enters 1992 with 180 career catches and Irvin with 171 career receptions. Herschel Walker is in 10th place on the team's all-time reception list with 211 career catches. Directly ahead of Walker are Timmy Newsome (212 career receptions), Ron Springs (222), Billy Joe DuPree (267) and Frank Clarke (281).
- Jay Novacek matching Herschel Walker as the only Cowboys player with 50-or-more catches in three consecutive seasons. Novacek caught 59 passes in 1990 and 1991. He also could become the first Cowboys tight end with three seasons of 50-or-more catches.
- Mike Saxon adding to his streak of 143 punts without a block, the third longest in team history. He needs 47 punts without a block in 1992 to match the second longest streak in team history of 190, which he set from 1986-89.
- Emmitt Smith moving up the Cowboys' all-time rushing list. With 2,500 rushing yards in two seasons, Smith stands seventh among the team's best rushers. Within reach in 1992 are Herschel Walker (3,388) in sixth spot and Walt Garrison (3,886) in fifth place.
- Emmitt Smith becoming the ninth player in NFL history, the first since Eric Dickerson for the LA Rams in 1983 and 1984, to lead the league in rushing in consecutive seasons.

Tommie Agee FULLBACK • AUBURN HT: 6-0 • WT: 225 • BORN: 2/22/64 FA FOR '90 • 5th YEAR

**PRO:** Since arriving as one of Dallas' 16 Plan B free agents in the spring of 1990, Tommie Agee has carved out a valuable niche on the roster through his versatility and

unselfish attitude. As a consistent blocker out of the backfield, a solid receiver or a stalwart special teams performer, Agee's contributions over the past two years have come in many subtle ways. Last year, he was used mostly as the second fullback behind Darryl Johnston, although he knew both backfield positions and saw action at both spots. He was also used some as the lone back in passing downs late in second half of the season. Agee finished the '91 season with nine carries for 20 yards, including his first career NFL rushing touchdown. The four yard run in the fourth guarter against New Orleans (12/8) put the game out of reach for Dallas by the final score of 23-14. His best rushing game came in the opener at Cleveland, three carries for 16 yards, while his top receiving outing was against the Giants (9/29): two catches for 10 yards. He finished the year with eight total special teams tackles — ranked second in stops among offensive players who contribute to special teams. Agee was a visible member of the Cowboys' kickoff coverage, punt coverage and kickoff return teams all year. He ranked fifth on the Cowboys' participation chart in total number of special teams plays. A quietly productive performer in 1990, Agee arrived via Plan B from the Chiefs and he started 11 games for Dallas at fullback. He was the team's second leading rusher with 213 yards on 53 carries and led all Dallas running backs in yards per carry (4.0) and receptions (30). He was the team's leading rusher in the first two games of the year, and earned a game ball in the season opening win over San Diego (59 yards on 13 carries). His biggest individual play of the year came at a critical time in that opening 17-14 win over the Chargers. Late in the fourth quarter, Agee burst 16 yards for a first down on fourth down-andtwo from the San Diego 45. He scored his first NFL touchdown on a six-yard pass from Troy Aikman against the Rams (11/18). After spending the first half of the 1989 season on injured reserve at Kansas City with torn ligaments in his left ring finger, Agee finished the season as a back-up to Christian Okove. He joined the Chiefs as a Plan B free agent from Seattle in 1989, where he was a fifth round draft choice in 1987. He missed his entire rookie year with the Seahawks because of a knee injury, GAMES/STARTS: 1987 (IR-Sea.), 1988 (16/0-Sea.), 1989 (9/0-K.C.), 1990 (16/11), 1991 (16/0). Total - 57/11.

**COLLEGE:** At Auburn, Agee was a four-year starter at fullback, where he was used as a lead blocker for both Bo Jackson and Brent Fullwood. He finished his career with 356 carries for 1,735 yards and 10 touchdowns. As a kick returner, he averaged 21.5 yards for his career. He was the special teams captain at Auburn as a senior. His best single season rushing totals came as a freshman when he gained 606 yards on 115 carries. Agee was a college teammate of Cowboys receiver Alexander Wright.

**PERSONAL:** Thomas Lee Agee was born and raised in Maplesville, AL, where he earned all-state honors in football, basketball and track at Maplesville High School. He earned his degree in criminal justice from Auburn. In the off-season, Tommie speaks to Fellowship of Christian Athletes and Athletes in Action groups in Alabama. He is also involved as a youth counselor for the Alabama Department of Youth Services. Tommie and wife Anchylus live in Montgomery, AL.

**Troy Aikman** QUARTERBACK • UCLA HT: 64 • WT: 222 • BORN: 11/21/66 D-1 FOR '89 • 4th YEAR

**PRO:** Last fall in only his third season, Troy Aikman emerged as one of the elite quarterbacks in the National Football League, however it was his dedication and leader-

ship in the spring of 1991 that not only led to his success, but to the improvement of the Cowboys offense last year. Soon after Dallas hired offensive coordinator Norv Turner in February, 1991, Aikman spent each morning learning the new system. By the time the team assembled for its first minicamp three months later, Aikman was able to relay his knowledge and confidence in the scheme to his teammates which allowed the offense to make great strides in its first season. The results of his determination came early in the campaign when he completed a single-game careerhigh 27 passes for three touchdowns in a Monday Night tilt against Washington (9/9). Three weeks later in the Cowboys' big win over the defending Super Bowl Champion New York Giants (9/29), Aikman earned NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors after completing 5-of-6 passes for 84 yards, including a 23-yard scoring toss to Michael Irvin, on the game-winning drive late in the fourth guarter. Against Green Bay (10/6) he again increased his career-high with 31 completions, including 12 straight at the end of the game to tie the second longest streak in team history. The next week against Cincinnati (10/13), Aikman led a fourth-quarter comeback to win and in the process averaged a career-high 12.6 yards per completion. The Bengals game marked the sixth time in the past two years that Aikman led Dallas from behind to win in the fourth quarter, including twice in the last two minutes. Despite missing the final four regular-season games after spraining the lateral collateral ligament in his right knee in the third guarter of the Cowboys' victory at Washington (11/24), Aikman completed a club-record 65.3% of his passes to lead the NFC and earned his first trip to the Pro Bowl. Prior to the injury, Aikman led the conference in completions and passing yards and was threatening the team season record for completions and on a pace to go over 3,700 passing yards, the second most in team history. In only 12 games, he still established single-season careerhighs for completions and passing yardage. In 1991 Aikman threw for five of his seven biggest NFL passing yardage days, including a season-high 331 yards, his second most as a pro, at Detroit (10/27). Aikman began the season throwing 93 straight passes without an interception and later had 116 straight attempts without having one picked off, the fifth longest streak in team history and the longest since 1978-79 when Roger Staubach threw 149 passes without an interception. In the past 15 games that Aikman started and did not leave due to injury, he completed 288-of-445 passes (64.7%) - 12 of 38-yards-or-more - for 3,416 yards and 16 touchdowns

while leading Dallas to a 10-5 record. In 1990 Aikman's value to Dallas was evident in the team's seven wins. In only one of those victories were the Cowboys ahead entering the fourth quarter. In the other six, Aikman completed 32-of-45 passes (71.1%) for 456 yards, two touchdowns and no interceptions in the final period to put Dallas on top. In the season-opening victory over San Diego (9/9), Aikman capped a 53-yard drive with his first NFL rushing touchdown, a one-yard sneak, to win the game with 1:58 remaining. In Tampa (10/21), he led Dallas on an 80-yard scoring drive — throwing for 60 and scrambling for 20 — that culminated in the game-winning 28-yard touchdown pass to Michael Irvin with 1:56 left. Against the Rams (11/18), Aikman led the team 89 yards to set up the winning field goal in the fourth quarter. Four days later vs. the Redskins, he led the Cowboys to scores from 67 and 78 vards in the final period of a 27-17 Dallas win. Aikman completed 11 straight passes in the second half while engineering fourth-quarter scoring drives of 80 and 50 yards to beat the Saints (12/2). Earlier in the season against the New York Giants (9/30), Aikman completed a career-high 80.8% (21-of-26) of his passes. For his efforts he was named to the All-Madden Team in 1990. Early in the Philadelphia game (12/23), Aikman injured his right shoulder forcing him to miss the season finale. When Aikman had surgery to repair the shoulder he also had loose bodies removed from his right elbow. In 1989 Aikman showed tremendous poise for a rookie. After missing five games due to a broken left index finger. Aikman threw for an NFL rookie record 379 vards at Phoenix (11/12). In that game against the Cardinals he was knocked unconscious after rifling an 80-yard scoring strike to put Dallas up 20-17 with 1:43 remaining. Against the Rams (12/3) Aikman became the first Cowboys player since Danny White in 1987 to throw four touchdown passes. The first rookie quarterback to start a season opener for Dallas since Roger Staubach in 1969, Aikman was named to most All-Rookie teams. During his three-year career, Aikman has been successful 17-of-the-26 times he's scrambled for a first down on third downs. GAMES/STARTS: 1989 (11/11), 1990 (15/15), 1991 (12/12). Total - 38/38.

**COLLEGE:** In two seasons at UCLA Aikman completed 64.8 percent of his passes for 5,298 yards and 41 touchdowns while throwing only 17 interceptions. He finished his collegiate career as the third rated passer in NCAA history. The All-America led the Bruins to a 20-4 record, including wins in the 1988 Aloha Bowl and the 1989 Cotton Bowl. He transferred to UCLA after two seasons at Oklahoma.

PERSONAL: Troy Kenneth Aikman grew up in Cerritos, CA, and earned all-state honors at Henryetta, OK, High School after his family moved when Troy was 12. The town of 6,000 named a street after Aikman. Last fall he pledged to match any funds raised to build a health and fitness center for the schools in the town. He also sponsors a scholarship at Henryetta High School for students who want to attend college but can't afford it. This past offseason he established the Troy Aikman Foundation, which will benefit children's charities in the Dallas-Fort Worth area. The proceeds from his annual golf tournament, which he began in 1992, will also go to his foundation. Aikman also is involved with the Irving, TX, Youth and Family Counseling Center, including heading the "No Thanks, I'll Pass" anti-drug campaign. Aikman was the honorary chairman of both the "Weekend to Wipe Out Cancer" and "Arlington Cares", which aids homeless children in Arlington, TX. He also worked with Roger Staubach on a poster to benefit the Children's Medical Center of Dallas. In 1992 Aikman will appear on posters benefitting the USDA National and Texas State school lunch programs. He set up a permanently endowed scholarship at UCLA, where he majored in sociology. Aikman also supports the West Texas Rehabilitation Center, and Wednesday's Child, which helps find homes for orphans in the Dallas-Fort Worth area. In March, 1992, Troy sang in a celebrity choir during Farm Aid V. Last year Aikman was one of the five finalists for the NFL Man of the Year, which honors players for their contributions to the community.

**PRO:** Vince Albritton is looking for a new beginning in 1992, trying to regain the form that earned him 24 straight starts in 1989-90 before injuries knocked him out of the

starting lineup. Last season Albritton was originally released on the final cutdown (8/26) and then re-signed the following day after the roster was finalized. He then played in six games, primarily as a key contributor on special teams before fracturing his left forearm at Green Bay (10/6). He was placed on injured reserve for the remainder of the season on October 7. Only in 1988, when he was also limited to six games, has Albritton had a season cut so short during his eight NFL seasons. Before the injury Albritton had recorded six special teams tackles, ranking him fourth overall on the team, and he led the Cowboys with two solo tackles on special teams against the Giants (9/29). Along with his special teams duties Albritton also backed up James Washington at strong safety. After earning a spot on the roster as a free agent defensive back in 1984, Albritton moved to linebacker in 1985. He pulled a hamstring in training camp and was placed on injured reserve during preseason. Albritton was reactivated with seven games remaining and played well on special teams and as a linebacker in the 4-0 defense. In his first career start as strong safety, in place of an injured Bill Bates, Albritton recorded four tackles and recovered a fumble to set up a touchdown vs. Washington (10/12). In 1987 Albritton's play earned him the Cowboys' special teams player of the year award. A deep bruise to his left thigh, suffered during the preseason in 1988, landed Albritton on injured reserve until Oct. 28. Upon his return, he forced a fumble and recorded two sacks in three games before injuring his right thigh and missing two more games. His two sacks led all defensive backs. In 1989 Albritton put together his first full season as a starter and recorded 111 tackles, nearly triple his previous career-high of 42 tackles in 1986, and finished third on the team, second among defensive backs, in tackles. He reached double figures in tackles three times during the season, including a key performance in the Cowboys' win against Washington (11/5) when he recorded 10 tackles and picked off a Doug. Williams pass for his first career interception. As a starter at strong safety the first eight weeks of 1990, Albritton led defensive backs with 63 tackles and was tied for the team lead with two fumbles recovered before suffering a season ending deep thigh bruise in the eighth game of the season. Until then he had been on pace to record a career-high 126 tackles, which would have been his second straight 100-tackle season. Albritton led the team in tackles in three games, including the team's season and his career-high 16 tackles at the Giants (9/30). GAMES/STARTS: 1984 (16/0), 1985 (7/1), 1986 (16/1), 1987 (11/1), 1988 (6/0), 1989 (16/16), 1990 (8/8), 1991 (6/0). Total - 86/27.

**COLLEGE:** Albritton played safety, linebacker and cornerback at Washington. As a strong safety his senior year, he led the Huskies' secondary in tackles and played in the Japan Bowl. An honorable-mention All-West Coast and second team All-Pac 10 pick in 1983, Albritton played in the same defensive backfield at Washington as Cowboys teammate Ray Horton.

**PERSONAL:** Vince Denader Albritton attended McClymonds High School in Oakland, CA, where he concentrated mostly on baseball, but in his senior year he led the football team to the Oakland Athletic League title, intercepting a league-leading and school-record eight passes and earning All-OAL honors. Vince graduated from high school with Rap singer MC Hammer. He majored in speech communications at Washington.

Gerald Alphin WIDE RECEIVER • KANSAS STATE HT: 6-3 • WT: 220 • BORN: 5/21/64 FA FOR '92 • 3rd YEAR

**PRO:** Veteran wide receiver Gerald Alphin joined the Cowboys in the offseason after two years with the New Orleans Saints. Last year Alphin saw action in the first five

86

games of the season with the Saints, but did not record any receptions. He did not play in week six and then was deactivated week seven before being waived. Orginally signed by the Saints as a free agent during the 1990 offseason, Alphin played in the final 11 games at wide receiver after being deactivated the first five weeks of the season. He saw most of his action in the Saints' four wide receiver sets, catching four passes for 57 yards. In his first NFL game, at Houston (10/21), Alphin recorded his first NFL reception, a 17-yarder. Before joining the Saints, Alphin spent four years in the Canadian Football League, three years with Ottawa and one with Montreal, amassing 219 receptions for 4,216 yards and 25 touchdowns. With Ottawa he caught 199 passes for 3,807 yards and 23 touchdowns, leading the Rough Riders in receiving in both 1988 and 1989 with 64 and 68 receptions, respectively. He finished second in the CFL with 1,471 yards receiving in 1989 and also threw a 14 yard touchdown pass. In each of his three years with Ottawa, he recorded over 60 receptions and 1,000 yards receiving. In 1986 Alphin went to training camp with the L.A. Raiders, but was released during preseason. He then signed with the Montreal Alouettes and saw action in six games, recording 20 receptions for 409 yards. After the season he was released by Montreal and signed with Ottawa. GAMES/STARTS: 1990 (11/0-NO), 1991 (5/0-NO). Total - 16/0.

**COLLEGE:** Alphin worked his way into the Wildcats starting line-up by the middle of his junior season and recorded 14 receptions for 256 yards and one TD. As a senior he earned all-Big Eight and honorable mention All-America honors while leading the team in receiving with 34 catches for 524 yards and three TDs.

**PERSONAL:** Gerald Alphin played wide receiver and tight end at University City High School in St. Louis, MO, earning all-state selection as a tight end his senior year. He also lettered in basketball and baseball. He is the founder of Omnipotent Investment Co. in St. Louis, where he works in the offseason. He majored in communications with an emphasis in radio and television broadcasting. He and wife Jeanette have a son, Devin (2/9/89).

**Bill Bates** SAFETY • TENNESSEE HT: 6-1 • WT: 205 • BORN: 6/6/61 FA FOR '83 • 10th YEAR

PRO: A long-time Cowboy fan favorite, and an inspirational team leader, Bill Bates exemplifies the qualities of perserverence and dedication every time he steps onto the field. His

streak of having played in the last 76 straight games is tied for the current club lead with Jim Jeffcoat and Mike Saxon. Prior to the 1990 season, Jimmy Johnson tabbed Bates as the Cowboys' special teams captain, and, 1991 his leadership and intelligence helped the Dallas special teams become one of the NFL's very best. Bates finished second on the team in special teams tackles last year with 22 stops. He was also on the field for more special teams plays than any other Cowboy player in 1991. He was also a very visible member of the Dallas nickel defense at the middle linebacker position picking up 28 solo tackles and five passes defensed. His seven tackles (all solos) in the season opener tied for the Dallas team lead and marked Bates' highest individual tackle performance since 1989. He registered fumble recoveries on the punt coverage unit in back-to-back games against Phoenix (11/3) and Houston (11/10). His recovery at the Oiler 10 yard line set up a Michael Irvin TD reception that sent the game into overtime. Bates tied for the team lead in fumbles recovered in '91 with two and he also forced a key Eagles fumble in the Cowboys' playoff clinching win in Philadelphia (12/15). Along with Mark Tuinei and Jim Jeffcoat, Bates has the longest current tenure as a Cowboy as all three players enter their tenth season this fall. His last minute interception at Chicago's Soldier Field preserved Dallas' 17-13 win in the team's triumphant return to the playoffs after a six year absence. Bates was one of only a handful of Dallas players who had previous post season experience as a Cowboy. In 1990, he led the Cowboys in special teams tackles with 23. He made a big play in the season opening win over San Diego. Bates' heads-up tackle on a fourth guarter fake punt attempt by the Chargers set the Cowboy offense up for the game winning drive. He also tied for second on the team in passes defensed (seven) at the middle linebacker post on nickel situations. Bates forced two fumbles in 1990 and also picked up his 12th career pass interception at Tampa Bay — a fourth quarter theft that preserved the Cowboys third win of the season. One of the NFL's true success stories, Bates has been overcoming the odds his entire career, starting in 1983 when he made the team as a long shot free agent rookie. He immediately became a visible figure on the field with his ferocious special teams play. It was Bates' notoriety that helped propel the NFL into adding a spot on the Pro Bowl teams for special teams coverage players. In 1984 he became the first NFC player so honored. Bates was named the NFL Alumni Association's special teams player of the year in 1983 and '84. He led the Cowboys in punt returns in 1985. After leading all non-starters in tackles his first three seasons, Bates became the starting strong safety in 1986. He held the position for three seasons, leading the defensive backs in sacks in '86 and '87 and the team in solo tackles and total tackles in 1988. **COLLEGE:** Bates was a four-year starting safety at Tennessee. He was named second-team All-Southeastern Conference his junior and senior seasons. Bates developed a reputation as the Vols' hardest hitter and surest tackler. He intercepted nine passes and recovered six fumbles in his career.

**PERSONAL:** William Frederick Bates was born and raised in Knoxville, TN, where he starred in football, basketball and as a sprinter on the track team at Farragut High School. He was all-state in football and basketball. A 1985 NFL Man of the Year finalist, Bill supports the United Way, the Boys Clubs, the Special Olympics, the March of Dimes and other organizations. He serves as honorary chairman of the annual Wednesday's Child golf tournament benefitting Dallas-area orphans and of the Keystone Academy golf tournament for the learning disabled. Bill is also active in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes. He and wife Denise, a fashion model, live in Dallas. Bill has been named the winner of the Bob Lilly Award in each of the past two seasons. The Lilly Award is selected by a vote of the fans and annually goes to the Cowboy player who displays leadership and character on and off the field. Their family includes triplets Graham William, Brianna Gail and Hunter James (5/24/89) and Tanner Forest (2/18/91). The Bates family attends Park Cities Baptist Church in Dallas.

Steve Beuerlein QUARTERBACK • NOTRE DAME HT: 6-2 • WT: 209 • BORN: 3/7/65 TRADE, RAID., '91 • 5th YEAR

**PRO:** The preseason trade that brought Steve Beuerlein to the Cowboys from the Raiders on August 25 of 1991 paid tremendous dividends on November 24 when Beuerlein

received the call to relieve the injured Troy Aikman in a tough spot at RFK Stadium in Washington. With Dallas holding onto a third quarter (14-7) lead over the undefeated Redskins, Beuerlein coolly stepped into the Dallas huddle — completed seven of 12 pass attempts for 109 yards and a TD — and finished directing the Cowboys to a 24-21 win over Washington. Beuerlein then started the remaining four games on the Cowboys regular-season schedule and guided the team to victories in every assignment. He threw a touchdown pass in each of those four wins, over Pittsburgh, New Orleans, Philadelphia and Atlanta while pushing the Cowboys into their first playoff appearance since 1985. In 1991 Beuerlein attempted 111 straight passes without an interception — the sixth longest streak in team history — while

leading the Cowboys to come-from-behind victories in the fourth quarter of each of the last three regular-season games. In the fourth quarter of all of his regular-season outings last year, Beuerlein was 20 of 33 for 328 yards and three touchdowns. His first start as a Cowboy was a very productive outing against Pittsburgh (11/28) where he completed 14 of 25 passes for 217 yards and a 66-yard scoring strike to Michael Irvin. He threw a season-high 18 completions vs. Atlanta (12/22) while turning in his second highest career total for passing attempts in that outing with 35. In the 49 offensive possessions he engineered last year, 29 ended inside the opponents' 37 yard line including nine TD's, 10 field goals and six missed field goals. Beuerlein's streak of throwing one touchdown-per-game was extended to six straight weeks when he guided the Cowboys to the club's first playoff win since 1982 with a 17-13 NFC wild-card victory over the Bears (12/29) at Soldier Field. In 19 NFL regular season starts, Beuerlein now has a record of 12-7 (8-7 with the Raiders). After missing the Raiders' 1990 training camp due to a contract dispute, Beuerlein did not play in any games that year for Los Angeles. In 1989, he started seven games and led the Raiders in passing with 108 completions on 217 attempts for 1,677 yards and 13 TD's. He started eight games in 1988 and turned in his career-best passing yardage day with 375 yards against the Rams (9/18). Drafted in the fourth round by the Raiders in 1987, Beuerlein missed the entire '87 season with a foot injury that followed an impressive preseason camp. The 110th player taken in the 1987 draft, Beuerlein was the 8th quarteback selected that year, behind Vinny Testaverde, Kelly Stouffer, Chris Miller, Jim Harbaugh, Cody Carlson, Mark Vlasic and Rich Gannon. GAMES/STARTS: 1987 (IR-Raid.), 1988 (10/1-Raid.), 1989 (10/7-Raid.), 1990 (0/0-Raid.), 1991 (7/4). Totals - 27/19 (Dallas-7/4).

**COLLEGE:** A four-year starter at Notre Dame, Beuerlein holds nearly every passing and total offense record for the Fighting Irish. As a senior he completed 151 of 259 passes for 2,211 yards with 13 TD's en route to being named honorable mention All-America by the Associated Press. He was also voted offensive player of the year by his teammates after his final season in which his completion and yardage totals were the second-best single-season figures in school history. Beuerlein holds Notre Dame career passing marks for attempts (850), completions (473), yardage (6,527) and total offense (6,459). He also set the school record for consecutive attempts without an interception (119). He finished his career by completing 12 of 15 passing attempts for 148 yards in the Blue-Gray Game. As a sophomore he set the school single-season completion percentage mark (60.3%) while leading his team to an Aloha Bowl berth. He became a starter in the fourth game of his freshman year.

**PERSONAL:** Steve Beuerlein was born in Hollywood, CA and attended Servite High School in Anaheim. A two year letterman in football, he earned All-America recognition from Scholastic Coach Magazine. As a senior, he set school records for completions, yards and touchdown passes. He also was named the Orange County player of the year after leading his school to the No. 1 ranking in the state in his final prep season. Beuerlein was also a stand out performer in basketball, baseball and as a diver on the swimming team. Last February, Beuerlein displayed his athletic versatility at the Superstars competition in Cancun where he qualified for the finals of the event and finished fifth. Steve is involved in several charitable activities in the off-season including active roles with Athletes and Entertainers for Children, the Party Smart Campaign, and the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation. Beuerlein majored in American Studies at Notre Dame.

PRO: Ricky Blake's travel plans in 1992 should be much simpler than the past couple years when he spent time playing football for a semi-pro team in Oklahoma City, San

Antonio of the World League and Winnipeg of the Canadian Football League before joining the Cowboys. Blake signed with Dallas on July 18, 1991, as a free agent and proceeded to earn a roster spot with his hard-hitting running and solid blocking skills. "He's a big ox, truly an ox," Cowboys running backs coach Joe Brodsky said. "He's got nice balance; he's strong; and has speed. He's a fullback-type quy with halfback skills." After earning a roster spot, Blake was forced to spend the first four weeks of the season on injured reserved with a neck problem that developed during his grueling spring and summer football schedule. Blake returned from I.R. on September 25, seeing action in two games, but he made the most of those appearances. He carried six times for 38 yards against Cincinnati (10/13), including a 30 yard touchdown run on his first NFL carry. With that score, Blake has a touchdown in three different pro leagues: NFL, CFL and World League. Two weeks later against Phoenix (11/3) he had a season-high nine carries for 42 yards and recorded his first NFL reception, a five-yard gain, but on the last play of the game Blake suffered a season-ending right hip fracture. He still finished the year second on the team in rushing and averaged 5.3 yards per carry. Blake spent the entire offseason rehabilitating the injury. Before joining the Cowboys, Blake spent the spring with the San Antonio Riders, seeing action in nine games. He finished third in the WL in rushing with 554 yards, including a World League record 140 yards rushing against Raleigh-Durham on April 15. Two weeks later Blake, who earned first-team All-World League honors, caught a single-game season-high five passes at Birmingham (4/29). He had two multiple touchdown games, against Orlando (3/25), in the Riders' season-opener, he logged two touchdowns, including his only touchdown catch of the season, and vs. Montreal (5/19) he rushed for two touchdowns. Nicknamed "Amtrak" due to his size and running style, Blake was the first running back to wear the helmet cam tele-

vision camera. Following the World League season, Blake spent two weeks in training camp with Winnipeg before joining the Cowboys in Austin. Originally signed as a free agent by the Blue Bombers in 1989, Blake did not play until the 11th game of his rookie season, then started all six of the games he played over the final eight weeks of the year. In his professional debut against British Columbia, Blake rushed for 92 yards on 20 carries. Two weeks later in Edmonton, he gained 107 yards on 17 carries. Blake injured an ankle before the start of his second season, and, due to a limit on the number of American players on Canadian rosters, never regained his spot. Late in 1990 he played briefly with a semi-pro team in Oklahoma City. GAMES/STARTS: 1991 (2/0).

**COLLEGE:** After two years at Northwest Mississippi Junior College, Blake transferred to Alabama A&M. However, he left prior to his first season with the Bulldogs, because the coaching staff was fired.

**PERSONAL:** Ricky Darnell Blake attended Lincoln County, TN, High School, and growing up, his childhood hero was former Cowboys great Tony Dorsett. Blake majored in criminal justice at Alabama A&M. His brother, Eddie was an All-America guard at Auburn and was drafted by the Dolphins in the second round in 1992.

and big-play ability through the first month of training camp, battling for a spot in the defensive backfield, but at Kansas City, in the first preseason game of the year, Brooks suffered a torn anterior cruciate ligament in his left knee and spent the season on injured reserve. Brooks originally joined the Cowboys as a member of the practice squad on November 7, 1990 after being released by San Diego on the final cut of the preseason. Brooks was activated December 10, after late-season injuries to Issiac Holt and James Washington left the defensive backfield thin. In three games Brooks recorded two special teams tackles and downed a punt on the one-yard line at Philadelphia (12/23). Originally signed as a free agent by San Diego in May, 1989, he spent the first 14 weeks of the season on the developmental squad before being activated for the final two games. As a junior Brooks led North Carolina State in tackles with 105, including a career-high 13 against South Carolina. He played outside linebacker as a freshman but moved to free safety before the 1986 season. Brooks finished his colleg-

iate career with 277 tackles, 30 passes defensed, eight interceptions, four forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries.

**PERSONAL:** Michael Antonio Brooks was an all-state running back and linebacker at Page High School in Greensboro, NC. He led his high school team to three straight state titles and won the state championship in the 100-meter dash as a senior. An All-America sprinter, Brooks helped North Carolina State win three straight ACC outdoor track titles. Brooks majored in business management at North Carolina State.

**PRO:** Alvin Harper and Larry Brown entered training camp last season at opposite ends of the spectrum. While Harper was a first-round selection, the 12th player selected overall,

and the second wide receiver taken in the draft, Brown was a 12th-round selection. the 320th player taken overall and the 57th defensive back selected. Harper was the Cowboys future at wide receiver, while Brown entered training camp one step ahead of the rookie free agents. Once in Austin, however, Brown began turning heads with his tight coverage of Harper during the passing drills. "Larry has owned Harper," secondary coach Dave Campo said during camp. "And the way (Harper) has looked, that's saying something." Campo wasn't alone in his assessment of Brown, "Larry is the best corner I've faced as far as guys who were in college last year," said Harper, who at Tennessee in 1990 faced Rams' first-round draft choice Todd Lyght, formerly of Notre Dame. Brown far exceeded any Cowboys expectations and joined the ranks of other secondary long-shots who have become Cowboys over the years: Cliff Harris, Everson Walls, Bill Bates, Vince Albritton and Robert Williams. Only the eighth of 31 12th-round draft choices in Cowboys history to make the active roster, Brown finished the season eighth on the team in tackles with 68, third among defensive backs. At Phoenix (9/22), four weeks into the season, Brown broke into the starting lineup, becoming the first rookie to start at right cornerback since Dec. 21, 1987, when Ron Francis started against the Rams. The Phoenix game also marked the first time in team history a 12th-round draft choice started as a rookie. Brown is only the third 12th-rounder to ever start a game for Dallas, and in his first start he recorded seven tackles, one for a loss, and a pass defensed. The following week against the Giants (9/29) he recovered a fumble at Dallas' one-vard line. For the season Brown earned 13 starts and finished second on the team in passes defensed with 18. Against Houston (11/10) Brown had a single-game career-high 11 tackles and four passes defensed. Two weeks later against the undefeated Washington Redskins (11/24) he recorded his first NFL interception, returning it 20 yards. His second career interception came at Philadelphia (12/15) and set up a third guarter field goal. In the playoffs Brown led the team in passes defensed with three, tied for fourth with 10 tackles and also intercepted a Jim Harbaugh pass in the endzone against Chicago (12/29). Brown's play in 1991 earned him selection to the Pro Football Writers, Football News, Pro Football Weekly and Football Digest All-Rookie teams. He chose the uniform number 24 after making the team because of his admiration of former Cowboys cornerback Everson Walls who wore No. 24 for Dallas from 1981-89. The last Cowboys' 12th-round draft choice to make the active roster was another TCU product, Scott Ankrom in 1989. GAMES/STARTS: 1991 (16/13).

**COLLEGE:** A two-year starter at cornerback for TCU, Brown recorded 75 tackles and led the team with 10 passes defensed as a senior. He earned Most Valuable Player honors in the Blue-Gray All Star Game following his senior season. As a junior Brown registered 27 tackles before suffering a season-ending foot injury in the fifth game of the year. Brown transferred to TCU after two years at Southwest Community College in Los Angeles, where he was a standout in football and track, earning football all-league honors in 1988.

**PERSONAL:** Larry Brown was an All-City selection in both football and track at Los Angeles, CA, High School. He was a criminal justice major at TCU.

Tony Casillas to Dallas after five years with the Atlanta Falcons. In starting all 16 games at left tackle in 1991, Casillas became a run stopping force on a Dallas defense that finished the season as the NFL's eighth best unit against the run (98.2 yards per game). After five years as a nose tackle with Atlanta, Casillas made a smooth transition to the left tackle spot on the Cowboys even front. He finished the year tied for third on the team in tackles for loss (5 for -17) and guarterback pressures (14). His most productive day as a Cowboy came in the playoff clinching win at Philadelphia (12/15) when he recorded a season high nine tackles (five solos), three quarterback pressures and one tackle behind the line of scrimmage. His nine stops against the Eagles tied for the season high among Dallas defensive linemen last year. He earned a game ball following a solid performance against Cincinnati (10/13) that included seven tackles, a sack of Boomer Esiason, and a forced fumble that Dallas recovered at the Bengals 26 yard-line in the fourth guarter. Casillas finished the '91 season with a career high 2.5 sacks and was ranked ninth on the team in tackles with 61. In 1989 - his last full season as a starting nose tackle for Atlanta - Casillas earned secondteam All-Pro honors after recording a career-high 152 tackles to finish second on the squad. He also registered career high figures for fumble recoveries (3) and quarterback pressures (16) in 1989. In 1990, Casillas played in only nine games, backingup all-rookie selection Tory Epps. The second player selected in the 1986 draft (after Bo Jackson was taken by Tampa Bay), Casillas was a consensus rookie of the year choice after recording 111 tackles. He helped turn around a Falcons' defense that went from 28th in the NFL in 1985 to seventh in the league in 1986. Casillas was a Pro Bowl alternate in both 1987 (Carter and McMichael) and 1988 (Millard and Carter). A starter in all 57 games he played from 1986-89, he missed three games in 1987 with a stress fracture and three others because of the strike. Casillas recorded a

**COLLEGE:** A two-time All-America at Oklahoma, Casillas was named the Big Eight Conference's Defensive Player of the Decade for the 1980s. The offensive player for that same distinction was Barry Sanders. Casillas won the Lombardi Trophy in 1985 when he set a school record with 21 tackles behind the line of scrimmage for a Sooner defense that led the nation. He recorded four sacks in a game against Iowa State and had a season-high sack total of 10 as a junior. He was a teammate of Troy Aikman while at Oklahoma.

**PERSONAL:** Tony Steven Casillas starred in football and baseball at East Central High School in Tulsa, OK, and he later received his degree in communications from Oklahoma. Last year he served as a spokesman for the Austin Police Department in an effort to educate youngsters as to the dangers of joining a gang. Casillas owns a Days Inn Hotel in Pittsburgh. His wife, Dr. Lisa Clayton, is a doctor in Atlanta. Casillas is an avid golfer.

first eight games of the season on the practice squad. Against Phoenix (11/3), in his first NFL game, he recorded two special teams tackles. The following week at Houston (11/10) Cooper strained his left quadricep and was placed on injured reserve November 11. Originally signed as a free agent in the spring of 1991, Cooper was released on the cut down to 60 players but then re-signed to the practice roster a week later. **PRO:** Although Frank Cornish will be a newcomer to the Dallas offensive line in 1992, he is no stranger to an offensive unit that is directed by Troy Aikman. Acquired as a Plan B

free agent in March, Cornish's relationship to Aikman dates back to their collegiate days at UCLA where they made up the starting center/quarterback combination for two complete seasons in 1987 and 1988. After starting his third and final season for the Bruins in 1989, Cornish was drafted in the sixth round (143rd player overall) by the San Diego Chargers in 1990. Thrust into the starting center position only days before the start of his rookie season, Cornish handled the pressure and the assignments that accompanied 16 straight regular season starts as a rookie. His first NFL game and start came in Texas Stadium in Dallas' 17-14 win over the Chargers to start the 1990 season (9/9). That successful performance in 1990 led to his being named to the all-rookie teams selected by College & Pro Football Newsweekly, Football Digest and Football News. Last year, he served as a backup to Pro Bowl alternate Courtney Hall at the center spot, where Hall had been the starter throughout the 1989 season. While seeing action in all 16 regular season games in 1991, Cornish served as the team's long snapper on extra points and field goals — a position he will compete for in Dallas in 1992. GAMES/STARTS: 1990 (16/16-S.D.), 1991 (16/0-S.D.). Total - (32/16).

**COLLEGE:** A three-year starter for UCLA, Cornish earned first-team All-America recognition from the Football News and was an all-Pac 10 second team selection following his senior year. He was a starter on Bruin teams that were victorious in the Aloha and Cotton Bowls. He finished his career ranked fourth in the school's weight room record book with a three lift (bench, squat and clean) total of 1,253 pounds.

**PERSONAL:** Frank Edgar Cornish was born in Chicago, IL. He was one of the most highly recruited linemen in the country coming out of Mt. Carmel High School in Chicago. He earned three letters as a two way tackle in high school. His father, Frank, played defensive tackle for the Miami Dolphins in 1970 and 1971. Frank was a history major at UCLA.

**PRO:** In July of 1991 Brad Daluiso started his NFL career as a free agent kicker with Green Bay, but by January he was kicking-off to start Super Bowl XXVI for the AFC Cham-

pion Buffalo Bills. Originally signed as a rookie free agent by Green Bay in 1991, Daluiso handled all the Packers kicking chores in preseason while veteran kicker Chris Jacke was involved in a contract holdout. During the preseason Daluiso hit seven of eight field goals, including kicks of 44 and 42 yards, and all 12 of his extra point attempts. On August 26, two days after Jacke signed, Daluiso was traded to the

Atlanta Falcons where he opened the regular season as the Falcons kicker, and against Kansas City (9/1), in his first NFL regular season game, he hit a 20 yard field goal. The following week, against Minnesota (9/8), he was one-of-two on field goal attempts, hitting a 23-yarder, and two-of-two on extra points. After the Minnesota game the Falcons waived Daluiso, and he was claimed by Buffalo on September 10. Daluiso had an impressive start handling kickoffs in Buffalo, putting his first kickoff out of the zone, and against Indianapolis (10/13) four of his seven kickoffs went for touchbacks. For the season Daluiso had 26 touchbacks on 78 kickoffs (33.3%), and in three playoff games he handled 16 kickoffs, recording five touchbacks. In February he joined the Cowboys as a Plan B signee and is set to compete for the vacant kicker spot on the Dallas roster. GAMES/STARTS: 1991 (2/0-Atl.; 14/0-Buf.)

**COLLEGE:** A second-team All-Pac 10 selection, Daluiso took over as UCLA's kicker his senior year. He hit 13-of-19 field goals, including 11-of-12 inside of 40 yards, and 32-of-33 PAT tries in 1990 to lead the Bruins in scoring. After making the team as a walk-on in 1989, he handled 46 of the team's 48 kickoffs, reaching the goal line (or deeper) on 30 of his 46 kicks (65.0%) and recording 20 touchbacks. In 1987 Daluiso was a member of the Grossmont (Calif.) Junior College soccer team before becoming a kickoff specialist on the football team in 1988. He attended San Diego State in 1986 but did not play football.

**PERSONAL:** Bradley William Daluiso (DAAH-loo-ee-so) was born in San Diego, CA, and attended Valhalla High School in El Cajon, CA, earning letters in soccer, while leading the team to the 1986 CIF 3A soccer championships, and tennis. He majored in sociology at UCLA.

**PRO:** When Dixon Edwards was activated from injured reserve on September 25, he became an integral part of the special teams that were acknowledged as the best in the

National Football League in 1991. In only 12 games Edwards made 10 special teams tackles to tie for fourth on the squad. Later in the season when he received opportunities to play with the defense, Edwards made similar contributions to that unit. In his first significant playing time with the regular defense, in place of injured starting weakside linebacker Vinson Smith, against Cincinnati (10/13), Edwards forced an incompletion while covering Pro Bowl running back James Brooks in the endzone on a 3rd-and-goal from the one yard line in the third quarter with Dallas holding onto a 21-17 lead. On the Bengals' next series, Edwards snuffed Brooks for no gain at the Cowboys' nine and Cincinnati again had to settle for a field goal. In the fourth quarter, Edwards, who finished the day with five tackles, returned his first career interception 36 yards for a touchdown to seal the Cowboys' 35-23 win. It was the EDWARDS, Cont.

first interception by Edwards since high school, thus earning him the nickname "Stonehands" in college. When he came to Dallas his problem with catching the ball was found to be not with his mitts but due to his eyesight, which was corrected prior to training camp. Against Phoenix (11/3) in his first NFL start, Edwards again made five tackles. He split time with Smith at weakside linebacker late in the season, when Dallas was winning five straight games to make the playoffs, and in the postseason victory over Chicago (12/29). Edwards was hampered in training camp by a hamstring problem that forced him onto injured reserve for the first four games of the season. The fourth linebacker taken in the 1991 draft (Mike Croel, Denver; Alfred Williams, Cincinnati; Roman Phifer, Rams), Edwards was selected with the highest choice Dallas has used on a linebacker since Billy Cannon was selected in the first round in 1984. GAMES/STARTS: 1991 (12/1).

**COLLEGE:** Named Michigan State's Co-Defensive Player of the Year as a senior, Edwards led the Spartans with a single-game career-high 16 tackles in their upset of then-No. 1 ranked Michigan. In his first season as a starter in 1989, Edwards finished second on the club in tackles and tied for the team lead in tackles for a loss to earn honorable mention All-America honors. Over one three-game stretch his junior year, Edwards tallied 14 tackles against Miami, 13 vs. Michigan and and 14 against Iowa. The Spartans compiled a 31-14-3 record, earned at least a share of two Big 10 titles, and played in four bowl games during Edwards' collegiate career.

**PERSONAL:** Dixon Edwards III earned all-district honors as a tight end and defensive tackle at Aiken High School in Cincinnati, OH. His father, Dixon, Jr. played fullback at Marshall University from 1958-61. A building construction major at Michigan State, Dixon and wife Secola have twins, son Dixon, IV, and daughter Taylor (8/19/91).

**PRO:** A reserve cornerback in his first two seasons with Dallas, Kenneth Gant will be given a look at the strong safety position this fall. Last year, Gant established himself as one

of the NFL's premier special teams players and received some Pro Bowl consideration from his peers around the NFC. Gant led Dallas with 25 special teams tackles (18 solos) while participating in the teams's third highest number of special teams plays for the season. He excelled at making the big hit on kickoff and punt coverage units, while also developing into a solid kickoff return man in the last nine games of the season. Gant played cornerback in several of the Cowboys' multiple defensive back alignments last year and made his first NFL start at left corner against the Giants (11/17). He finished the year with 14 tackles from the cornerback position to go along with three passes defensed. He also registered his second career interception on the

last play of the first half of the Cowboys 23-14 win over New Orleans (12/8). He tied or led the team in special teams tackles in four games last year, while earning a game ball after the Cincinnati game (10/13) when he had four kick overage stops. Gant forced one fumble on the punt coverage unit vs. Philadelphia on 9/15, and he recovered that Eagle miscue on the Philly 11 yard line. He returned six kickoffs for 114 yards with a long of 26 yards vs. Houston (11/10). Gant earned a roster spot as a rookie in 1990 on the strength of his fine speed, and limitless potential. Playing in 12 games in 1990, he quickly learned the intricacies of becoming a productive special teams performer in the NFL. He recovered Issiac Holt's blocked punt vs. Philadelphia (10/28), setting up a fourth quarter TD that put Dallas ahead until a last minute Eagle TD pass. **COLLEGE:** A four-year starter for the Golden Rams of tiny Albany State (GA), Gant recorded 158 tackles, 14 interceptions, 17 passes defensed and recovered four fumbles during his collegiate career. He also missed only one game in his Albany State career. He averaged 23.2 yards per return on his five interceptions as a senior, including one returned 46 yards for a touchdown against Morris Brown College. Gant also blocked a punt for a safety against West Virginia State. **PERSONAL:** The third player ever drafted by the Cowboys from Albany State, Gant is the first from that school to ever play for Dallas. One of the most successful NFL players from Albany State's conference, the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, is former Cowboy great Rayfield Wright, from Fort Valley State. Kenneth Gant majored in criminal justice at Albany State. He graduated from Kathleen High School in Lakeland, FL. Gant is active in several off-season charitable pursuits. He and his wife Aris were married in April of 1992.

**PRO:** Over the past two seasons, John Gesek has become a cornerstone on the Cowboys offensive line, starting 28-of-the-past-30 games at right guard and 29-of-33 games for

his career in Dallas. In 1991 he started the first 14 games of the season at right guard before suffering a sprained left ankle against New Orleans (12/8). The injury limited him to playing only during short yardage situations against Philadelphia (12/15), but he returned to the starting lineup the following week against Atlanta (12/22) and for both playoff games. For his performance against Phoenix (11/3),

he received a game ball as the Cowboys rolled up 121 yards rushing in a 27-7 victory. Gesek played a key role in blocking for Emmitt Smith who led the NFL in rushing in 1991 and became the first player to run for over 100 yards in the playoffs against the Chicago Bears, a record dating back to 1932 and spanning 27 games. Dallas was also the only team to have a player rush for over 100 yards against New Orleans. For the season Gesek and the offensive line led Smith to eight 100 yard rushing days and helped land four offensive players (Emmitt Smith, Michael Irvin, Jay Novacek and Troy Aikman) in the Pro Bowl. Dallas acquired Gesek from the Los Angeles Raiders on September 3, 1990, for a fifth round pick in the 1990 draft. After sitting out the San Diego game (9/9), Gesek logged playing time at left guard the following week against the Giants (9/16). His first start as a Cowboy came one week later at Washington (9/23) when he replaced an injured Crawford Ker. Against Tampa Bay (10/7), in the fifth week of the season, Gesek settled into a regular spot at right guard, remaining there 11 games. A sprained lower back against Philadelphia (12/23) forced him out of the season finale in Atlanta. Gesek, who started 23-of-the-31 games he played in Los Angeles, was the Raiders starting left guard the entire 1989 season. He was replaced in 1990 by All-Pro Max Montoya who was signed by the Raiders as a Plan B free agent. Originally drafted in the 10th round in 1987, Gesek was limited to three games due to back and knee injuries his rookie year. In 1988 he started six games, including two at center, before being placed on injured reserve the final three weeks of the season due to a knee injury. GAMES/STARTS: 1987 (3/1-Raid.), 1988 (12/6-Raid.), 1989 (16/16-Raid.), 1990 (15/12), 1991 (16/15). Total 62/50 (Dallas-31/27).

**COLLEGE:** As a senior at Cal. State Sacramento, Gesek was the only returning starter on an offensive line that paved the way for 400.5 yards per game and won the Western Football Conference title. He earned all-conference honors his final two seasons after moving from defensive end to offensive tackle prior to his junior year. He tallied 34 tackles and four sacks as a sophomore. Gesek transferred to Cal State Sacramento after a season at Diablo Junior College.

**PERSONAL:** John Christian Gesek, Jr. (GEE-sik), starred as an offensive and defensive lineman in high school. He attended San Ramon High School in Danville, CA as a freshman and senior and went to Bellflower High School in Long Beach as a sophomore and junior. Gesek majored in physical education at Cal. State Sacramento. He, wife Gina and their son Tanner (1/30/91) reside in Cameron Park, CA.



Kevin Gogan GUARD • WASHINGTON HT: 6-7 • WT: 317 • BORN: 11/2/64 D-8 FOR '87 • 6th YEAR

**PRO:** In 1991, Kevin Gogan returned to the status of being a fulltime starter - at a new position - and responded with his most productive season as a professional player. A starter

at right tackle for mostly all of 1987, '88 and '89, Gogan became the Cowboys' No. 1 man at left guard in 1991 and registered 16 straight starts at the new position. His efforts helped Emmitt Smith lead the NFL in rushing with 1563 yards, while also providing the pass protection that enabled Michael Irvin to lead the league in receiving yards with 1523. The Cowboys offensive line was one of the team's most dramatically improved areas in 1991, and the unheralded unit permitted two-sacks-or-less in 11 of the 16 regular season games last year, while surrendering one sack-or-less on eight

different occasions. One of the Cowboys' most versatile offensive linemen, Gogan played every position along the Dallas offensive front except center in 1990. Since the start of the 1989 season, he has started games at both tackle positions and at both guard spots. Gogan is generally considered to be one of the offensive line's most gifted natural athletes, and his athletic ability is clearly visible on the racquetball court where he is regarded as one of the team's best players. In 1990, he earned four starting assignments — three at left tackle, in place of the injured Mark Tuinei and one at right guard in the season's final game at Atlanta. Prior to the 1990 season, he had been the Cowboys' starting right tackle since early in his rookie year, starting 38 of the 42 games leading into 1990. The former eighth-round draft choice was thrust into the starting lineup as a rookie in 1987 when Phil Pozderac suddenly retired after the players' strike. His very first opponent was Philadephia All-Pro left end Reggie White, and Gogan made a good showing against White in his starting debut. GAMES/STARTS: 1987 (11/10), 1988 (15/15), 1989 (13/13), 1990 (16/4), 1991 (16/16). Total — 71/58.

**COLLEGE:** Gogan was a three-year starter for Washington at right tackle. He earned honorable mention All-PAC 10 honors as a junior. He was an honorable mention All-America and second-team All-PAC 10 pick his senior year when he served as a team co-captain. Kevin played in the 1987 Hula Bowl.

**PERSONAL:** Born in Pacifica, CA, Kevin Patrick Gogan led Sacred Heart High School in San Francisco to two city championships as an offensive and defensive tackle. He also was an outstanding baseball catcher and first baseman. Kevin is an avid bass fisherman and one of the Cowboys' lockerroom comic wits. He has four dogs, including a prized Newfoundland which has fared quite successfully in a handful of regional show competitions. Kevin and his wife Heather have one child, Hannah (3/27/91).



Alvin Harper WIDE RECEIVER • TENNESSEE HT: 6-3 • WT: 203 • BORN: 7/6/67 D-1 FOR '91 • 2nd Year

**PRO:** Whether it was matching barbs with the veteran receivers in the lockerroom or making the tough catches on the field, Alvin Harper acted not like a naive rookie, but a

wily veteran last season. Against Kansas City, in Dallas' preseason opener, he caught three passes for 94 yards and two touchdowns. When the Cowboys began their regular-season home slate on Monday night against Washington (9/9), Harper made his first regular-season pro catch, a 29-yarder to set up a field goal that gave Dallas a 24-23 lead late in the third quarter. He suffered a jammed neck after a 23-yard catch against the Giants (9/29) and was forced to sit out the next game against Green Bay. After moving into the starting lineup in the ninth game of the year. Harper caught 17 passes for 263 yards over the final half of the regular season. Against Phoenix (11/3) in his first NFL start, Harper caught a 37-yard pass at the Cardinals' six-yard line to set up a touchdown and kept alive a drive to a fourth-quarter field goal with a 15-yard third-down grab for a first down. In Dallas' big win over the half, outjumped a crowd of Redskins at RFK (11/24), Harper caught a 39-yard pass on the Cowboys' first offensive play then, on fourth down at the end of the first half, outjumped a crowd of Redskins in the endzone to snare a 34-yard touchdown pass, his first in the NFL. Harper finished the day with a season-high 101 yards

Including the Washington game, Harper made four catches on third or fourth down to give Dallas a first down during the Cowboys' five-game winning streak to end the season and land a playoff berth. In two postseason games Harper averaged a team-high 20.6 yards on seven catches, including a team playoff-long 45-yard catch at Chicago (12/29). He finished his rookie season with four catches of 34-or-more yards. Selected with the 12th overall choice, Harper was the second wide receiver (Herman Moore, Detroit), taken in the 1991 draft. Of the six Tennessee wide 11th overall pick in 1982, was taken higher than Harper. GAMES/STARTS: 1991 (15/5).

**COLLEGE:** A two-time All Southeastern Conference pick, Harper set a school mark for touchdown receptions in a season with eight in 1990 and tied the career touchdown catch mark held by Tim McGee of 16. He finished his career fifth on the Volunteers' all-time receiving list with 102 catches. In his first collegiate start he caught a team-record 12 passes against Washington State in 1988. Against Auburn his senior year, Harper made an 82-yard touchdown grab, the third longest in school history.

**PERSONAL:** Alvin Craig Harper earned All-America honors at Frostproof, FL, High School, where he also set the Florida state high jump record with a leap of 7'1". He earned his degree in psychology at Tennessee. Harper won the high jump title at the 1989 SEC Indoor Meet with a personal-best of 7'2½". He also competed in the 400-meter dash and anchored the 4 × 100 and 4 × 400-meter relay teams. His brother, Willie, was a teammate at Florida A&M of Cowboys tackle Nate Newton. Alvin's brothers, Bobbie and Roosevelt, played basketball at Florida A&M.

# Dale Hellestrae

**PRO:** In 1991 the Dallas special teams units were among the NFL's elite in a number of categories as punter Mike Saxon recorded the fifth-best season ever for a Dallas punter

with a 42.6-yard average, kicker Ken Willis scored 118 points for the third-highest total in Cowboys' history, and Joe Avezzano was named 1991 Special Teams Coach of the Year by the NFL's special teams coaches. At the center of all these great performances was Dale Hellestrae, the Cowboys deep snapper. Playing a position people only notice when something goes wrong, he has been able to remain anonymous with his consistent snaps on Dallas' punts and kicks. With Hellestrae at center, Saxon has never had a punt blocked in 143 kicks, the third longest streak in club history. Playing in every game over the past two seasons, Hellestrae has provided Dallas a versatile offensive lineman and top-notch deep snapper. In 1991 he saw considerable action at center against Atlanta (12/22) when Mark Stepnoski was injured in the first half, playing an important role in Dallas' 31-27 come-from-behind victory. Hellestrae was acquired from the Los Angeles Raiders August 20, 1990, for the Cowboys' seventhround draft choice in 1991. After struggling through training camp and the preseason trying to find a quality deep snapper, the Cowboys made the trade following the pre-

season game with the Raiders (8/18). Hellestrae, who has played every position on the offensive line during his pro career, backed up at both guard and center in 1990, while also deep snapping. He was signed as a Plan B free agent by the Raiders in February of 1989 after four seasons with Buffalo but spent the 1989 season on injured reserve after breaking his leg in training camp. Hellestrae had his most productive year in 1988 when he started at right guard the final two games of the season and in the Bills' two playoff games, including the AFC Championship Game against Cincinnati. Drafted in the fourth round by Buffalo in 1985, Hellestrae missed the final 12 games of his rookie year with a broken thumb. He played in the first two games of 1986 before a broken wrist forced him to miss the next eight games. Hellestrae missed the 1987 season due to a hip injury. GAMES/STARTS: 1985 (4/0-Buff.), 1986 (8/0-Buff.), 1987 (IR-Buff.), 1980 (16/2-Buff.), 1989 (IR-Raid.), 1990 (16/0), 1991 (16/0). Total 60/2 (Dallas-32/0).

**COLLEGE:** A four-year letterman and two-year starter at tackle for Southern Methodist University, Hellestrae earned All-Southwest Conference honors as a senior in 1984. The Mustangs tallied a 41-5-1 record during his stint there and participated in the Cotton, Sun and Aloha Bowls. While at SMU, he played his college home games in Texas Stadium.

**PERSONAL:** Dale Robert Hellestrae (HELL-u-stray) was an all-state pick at Saguaro High School in Scottsdale, AZ. He spent one year at the Marine Military Academy in Harlingen, TX, after high school. Dale earned his degree in business administration from SMU. He and his wife Brooke have a daughter, Hillary (2/17/92).

**PRO:** In training camp and preseason last year, Tony Hill showed signs of becoming an eventual star in the National

Football League, then in the playoffs he played as if that future may be sooner than most thought. In his first game as a pro in Dallas' preseason opener in Kansas City (8/3), Hill had three tackles, a sack, a quarterback pressure, forced a fumble and recovered a fumble. He led the Cowboys in tackles and sacks and tied for the team lead in tackles for a loss in preseason to earn a roster spot playing left end in passing situations. However, in the season opener at Cleveland (9/1), Hill re-aggravated a left shoulder problem from his senior year in college and was placed on injured reserve on September 14. Hill resumed his duties as a pass rusher from left end when he was re-activated prior to the Houston game (11/10). In the Cowboys' two playoff games he recorded two tackles, a tackle for a loss, a pass defensed and recovered a fumble. Against Chicago (12/29), Hill smothered a loose ball at the Dallas 49 to end the Bears' first series and batted down a pass in the fourth quarter. He is the second highest draft choice, 108th overall, in Tennessee-Chattanooga history to tight end Travis McNeal, who was taken by Seattle with the 101st pick in 1989. The only other former Moccasin to play for the Cowboys was defensive back Bill Butler in 1960. GAMES/STARTS: 1991 (8/0).

**COLLEGE:** During his final three seasons at Tenn.-Chattanooga, Hill recorded 187 tackles, 30 tackles for loss, 13 sacks, broke up seven passes and blocked six kicks. Despite being slowed by strep throat early in the season and an injured left shoulder late in the year, Hill was named All-Southern Conference as a senior. In 1989 he led the Moccasins in sacks to earn second-team all-conference honors.

**PRO:** With 21 career pass interceptions, Issiac Holt is the leading active interceptor among Cowboys players. Last year, he led the team in interceptions (4) and passes de-

fensed (21) for the second straight year. A big hitter who has the ability to make big plays, Holt has returned two of his last eight interceptions for touchdowns, and he has three blocked punts in his last 25 games. His biggest play of the year was a fourth quarter interception in the end zone that thwarted a New York Giants drive with 1:18 remaining, preserving the Cowboys win over the defending World Champions by a 21-16 count on 9/29. He also had another fourth quarter theft vs. Cincinnati (10/13) with Dallas clinging to a 28-23 lead, ensuring the Cowboys' eventual 35-23 victory. His two other picks in '91 came against Green Bay (10/6), setting up a Cowboy TD, and against Washington (9/9) that led to a Cowboy field goal. He had a season-high mark for tackles against Green Bay with eight. His most recent blocked punt, at Houston (11/10), landed in the arms of Robert Williams who ran it in for a Dallas TD. Holt later left that game with bruised ribs and missed his only start of the season the following week at the New York Giants. In 1991, he registered 53 tackles, tying the career-best single season total he set in 1990. In last year's Pittsburgh game, Holt batted down five passes, marking the most by a Dallas defensive back since Everson Walls knocked down six against Green Bay in 1984. In 1990, Issiac Holt enjoyed what many believed to be a Pro Bowl caliber season. Holt made enough plays to earn second team All-NFC recognition by the U.P.I. in '90. He led the team in passes defensed with 18, while also tying for the team lead in interceptions with three. His most important interception of the year was a 64-yard TD theft at Tampa Bay that tied the score in the fourth quarter and put the Cowboys in position to win their third game of the season. Holt also blocked two punts - marking the first time Dallas (as a team) has recorded two blocked punts in a single season since 1977. Both of those blocked punts set up Dallas touchdowns vs. Philadelphia (10/28) and Washington (11/22). He registered 15 starts in 1990, missing the first Redskin (9/23) game with a groin injury. The Cowboys acquired Holt from Minnesota on Oct. 12, 1989 as part of the Herschel Walker trade. The Vikings' starting left cornerback in 29 games from 1986-88, Holt played in nine games for the Cowboys in '89 and dislocated his left shoulder against Philadelphia. Holt was the Vikings' second-round draft choice in 1985, the 30th player selected overall. He won a starting job in '86 and tied for fourth in the NFC and fifth in the NFL with a team-leading eight interceptions. He also blocked two punts, one in each of the two Green Bay games, and recovered a blocked punt in the end zone

for a touchdown against San Francisco. He had a four-game interception streak in October and intercepted two passes against the Giants on Nov. 16. In '87 Holt played in only nine games after suffering a knee injury in training camp. He intercepted a pass in the the Vikes' wild card playoff victory over the Saints. In '88 Holt started the first nine games before missing three of the next four with a bruised thigh. He played as a reserve the final three weeks of the regular season and the playoffs. During the '88 season Holt got his third career blocked punt and a last-minute gamesaving interception in a win over Philadelphia. He recorded his first career safety when he tackled New England's punter in the end zone. The week before joining the Cowboys in '89, Holt returned an interception 90 yards for a touchdown against Detroit on Oct. 8. It was the NFC's longest interception return of the year. GAMES/ STARTS: 1985 (15/1-Minn.), 1986 (16/15-Minn.), 1987 (9/5-Minn.), 1988 (13/9-Minn.), 1980 (15/15), 1991 (15/15). Totals — 97/61 (Dallas-39/30).

**COLLEGE:** Holt set the NCAA Division I-AA career record with 24 interceptions in four years as a starter at Alcorn State. He was named to the Kodak All-America team and the All-Southwestern Athletic Conference squad. His career totals included 38 passes defensed and 319 interception yards.

**PERSONAL:** Issiac Holt III is a native of Birmingham, AL, where he became the Birmingham area defensive back of the year as a senior at Carver High School. Issiac and wife Burnadeen have a daughter, Brianna (5/9/88), and live in Dallas.

Ray Horton SAFETY • WASHINGTON HT: 5-11 • WT: 190 • BORN: 4/12/60 FA FOR '89 • 10th YEAR

**PRO:** In addition to being the quarterback of the defense, Ray Horton quietly has been one of the defense's biggest playmakers since joining Dallas as a Plan B free agent in

1989. A starter at free safety in 48 of the Cowboys' past 50 games, including a secondary-high 29 straight starts, Horton has forced more fumbles and recovered more fumbles over the past three seasons than any Cowboys player. After topping the team in fumble recoveries in 1990, Horton tied for the team lead last season. In 1989 he led the team in forced fumbles then tied for second on the club in fumbles caused each of the past two years. Last season Horton became the first player in franchise history to record a defensive touchdown in back-to-back games and only the third Cowboys player (Jim Ridlon, 1964 and Larry Cole, 1968) ever to have two defensive victories in several years, Horton took the ball out of running back Jarrod Bunch's arms and returned the fumble 20 yards for a touchdown to put Dallas ahead 14-3 in

the third guarter. The next week in Milwaukee against the Packers, Horton stepped in front of a Blair Kiel toss at the Dallas 35 and returned the interception for a touchdown in the second quarter of the Cowboys' 20-17 win. "He has more savvy than any player on this team," said Cowboys Head Coach Jimmy Johnson. "His intelligence allows him to make plays. You know he'll always be around the ball." In the season finale against Atlanta (12/22), Horton picked up a fumble at the Falcons' 37-yard line and returned it 17 yards to set up a field goal. He also led the secondary in tackles for a loss in 1991. In addition, Horton, finished third on the team last season with 105 tackles, second in his career only to the 116 stops in 1989. His 12 tackles against the Oilers (11/10) were the most since he made 14 tackles in Kansas City in 1989. "He's extremely smart," said Cowboys Defensive Backs Coach Dave Campo. "He knows everything that's going on during a play on both sides of the ball." In 1990 Horton was a big factor in the Cowboys leading the National Football Conference in pass defense. From 1989-91 Dallas held opposing passers under 300 yards passing in 23 straight games, the fourth longest streak in team history. After missing the 1990 season opener against San Diego (9/9) due to a stomach virus, Horton recovered a fumble on the Redskins' eight-yard line two weeks later at RKF. Against the Giants (9/30) Horton sprained his left knee, which forced him to miss the next game and slowed him the rest of the season. "When you're injured, I think you play a little smarter," said Horton. "You know you can't get there with the speed, so you get there with your mind." At Phoenix (10/14) he forced a fumble on the Dallas one-yard line to prevent a score and then the next week in Tampa scampered 11 yards to the Buccaneers' 26-vard line with a fumble recovery to set up a field goal. Against San Francisco (11/11) Horton intercepted a pass in the endzone to end a scoring threat. In the Cowboys' 17-13 win over New Orleans (12/2), he played strong safety in the second half due to an injury to James Washington and recovered a fumble with 46 seconds remaining. Horton played on a sore right ankle against Phoenix (12/16) but came back the following game to force two fumbles in Philadelphia. In 1989 against Washington (9/24) in his first regular-season game at Texas Stadium with Dallas, Horton sacked Mark Rypien at the Dallas 21-yard line to force a fumble that Jim Jeffcoat returned for a touchdown. Horton's first interception with Dallas came against the Rams (12/3) and set up the touchdown that put Dallas ahead 24-21 in the fourth quarter. He had a season-high 15 tackles against Green Bay (10/8). In 1988 Horton played mainly as a nickel back on Cincinnati's AFC Championship team after he was moved from cornerback to safety. A second-round draft pick by the Bengals in 1983, Horton intercepted five passes, including one returned for a touchdown against Denver, as a rookie. The next year he replaced Ken Riley at right cornerback and returned an interception 48 yards for a touchdown against Kansas City. **COLLEGE:** Horton earned All-America and All-PAC 10 honors at Washington where he played in the same defensive backfield as Cowboys teammate Vince Albritton. A three-year starter at cornerback, Horton played in the Hula and Senior Bowls in 1982.

**PERSONAL:** Raymond Anthony Horton was an All-America at Mount Tahoma High School in Tacoma, WA. He and wife Leslie have a daughter, Taylor (7/18/88) and a son Jarren (12/27/91).

Michael Irvin WIDE RECEIVER • MIAMI HT: 6-2 • WT: 199 • BORN: 3/5/66 D-1 FOR '88 • 5th YEAR

**PRO:** It was only April and it was only a brief throwing session for quarterbacks and receivers, but to Michael Irvin it was a chance to improve. "I've got to go get better," the

1991 consensus All-Pro said to no one in particular as he trotted to the field. Just a repeat of last year would make Irvin the first player in National Football League history with consecutive seasons of 1,500-or-more receiving vards and only the third player in league annals to catch over 90 passes in back-to-back campaigns, however to Irvin even a reproduction of a great season is not enough. "I feel that if I'm sitting still, somebody is catching up with me," said "Playmaker" Irvin. Nobody kept pace with Irvin in 1991. The NFL Alumni Wide Receiver of the Year set new team season standards for receiving yards, with 1,523 to top the NFL and place sixth in NFL history, and catches, with 93 to lead the NFC, land second in NFL and tie for the seventh most ever in the league. In addition Irvin set club marks for 100-yard receiving games in a season with seven, tied the Cowboys' record for consecutive 100-yard receiving games with three and caught a career-high eight touchdown passes, the most by a Cowboys player since 1985. In two postseason games, he led Dallas with nine catches for 167 yards. The first Cowboys wide receiver to play in the Pro Bowl since Drew Pearson in 1977, Irvin caught eight passes for 125 yards and a touchdown to earn most valuable player honors in the all star game. More important than big numbers and accolades to Irvin were the clutch catches and wins. Over the past two seasons, Irvin, who owns four of the Cowboys' six longest plays from scrimmage since 1990, caught 31 passes for first downs on third or fourth down the past two seasons, including a team-high 23 in 1991. Of Irvin's 11 catches of 25-or-more vards in

1991, 10 came during scoring drives (8 TDs). His most significant catches were against the NFL's best cornerbacks during the Cowboys' five-game winning streak to end the season and land a playoff berth for the first time since 1985. During that span Irvin caught 37 passes, including 11 on third or fourth down for a first down, for 649 yards and four touchdowns. Against Washington (11/24) at RFK, Irvin caught nine passes for 130 yards and one score working mainly against Darrell Green. He caught a 23-yard touchdown pass early in the final quarter then made a 13-yard grab on thirdand-nine late in the game to keep alive Dallas' drive to the game-winning field goal. Four days later vs. Pittsburgh and Rod Woodson, Irvin snared eight balls for 157 yards and a touchdown, and was a big factor in the 10-point winning margin. After accounting for 34 yards in the 40-yard drive to a field goal early in the fourth quarter, on the Cowboys' next series, he scored on a career-long 66-yard catch that saw him change his route to avoid double coverage and break Woodson's tackle near the 10-yard line. Irvin's 29-yard catch on third-and-10 early in the fourth quarter against New Orleans (12/8) gave him team season records for catches and receiving yards, and maintained Dallas' drive to the game-winning field goal. In Philadelphia (12/15) against a secondary led by Eric Allen, Irvin brought in five passes for 92 yards and one touchdown. Midway through the fourth quarter vs. the Eagles, he caught a 36-yard pass to set up his four-yard touchdown catch that gave Dallas a 22-13 lead. In the season finale against a Falcons' squad with cornerback Deion Sanders, Irvin had single-game career-highs for catches with 10 and receiving yards with 169 to earn NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors. Irvin caught a 58-yard touchdown pass on the game's first series and had five third-down catches that led to first downs, including two that sustained touch-down scoring drives, vs. Atlanta. Irvin also was a factor in the Cowboys' big win over the Giants early in the year. On the game-winning 84-yard drive in the fourth quarter, Irvin caught a 30-yarder, then five plays later caught a 23-yard strike in the endzone with three minutes remaining to win the game. Against Houston (11/10) and their Pro Bowl cornerback Cris Dishman, Irvin caught seven passes for 84 yards and a touchdown. Irvin needs 41 receptions in 1992 to move past Herschel Walker into 10th place on the Cowboys' all-time receiving list. Also within Irvin's reach this season are Timmy Newsome (212 career catches) in the ninth spot, Ron Springs (222), Billy Joe DuPree (267) and Frank Clarke (281). In 1990 Irvin battled back from a torn anterior cruciate ligament in his right knee, which forced him to miss 14 games (last 10 in 1989, first 4 in 1990), to lead Dallas in yards per catch and record the team's longest reception. His 20.7 average was the highest by a Cowboys player since 1981 when Butch Johnson gained 22.1 yards per catch. Irvin, who scored on every fourth catch in 1990, made some key plays after returning to the active roster on October 9. He caught his first two passes of the season, including a 28-yard touchdown with 23 seconds left, in the Cowboys' game-winning drive against Tampa Bay (10/21). Irvin returned to the starting lineup against San Francisco and was a vital part of the club's march to four straight wins. Against the Rams (11/18) he caught touchdown passes from 61 and 10 yards. the Cowboys' first multiple TD catch game since Irvin snared a career-high three scoring passes at Washington as a rookie. On the drive to the deciding touchdown over New Orleans (12/2), Irvin made a 24-yard reception. Against Phoenix (12/16) he grabbed a 41-yard pass to set up Dallas' first touchdown and a 39-yarder to set up his eight-yard touchdown catch. In 1989 Irvin was on a pace to 69 catches for 1,008 yards and leading the team in receiving yards and touchdown catches before suffering the season-ending knee injury against San Francisco (10/15). In 1988 Irvin, whose 20.4vards-per-catch average led the NFC, became the first Cowboys rookie to start a season-opener at wide receiver since Bob Hayes in 1965. After missing two games due to a sprained ankle, Irvin caught six passes for 149 yards and three touchdowns at Washington (12/11) his rookie year. He was the 11th player selected and third wide receiver chosen, after Sterling Sharpe (Green Bay) and Tim Brown (Raiders), in the 1988 draft. **COLLEGE:** Irvin holds Miami career records for catches(143), receiving yards (2,423) and touchdown receptions (26). His 11 touchdown catches in 1986 also is a Hurricanes' record. In Miami's 1987 national championship season, Michael caught touchdown passes of 26 and 73 yards in the fourth quarter to hand No. 2-ranked Florida State its only loss and the game-winning touchdown in the Orange Bowl win over Oklahoma.

**PERSONAL:** A native of Fort Lauderdale, FL, Michael Jerome Irvin earned allstate honors at St. Thomas Aquinas High School. Also a fine basketball player, Irvin won several slam dunk contests in the Florida area while in college. Michael comes from a family of 17 children and grew up within three miles of fellow NFL stars Lorenzo White and the Blades brothers, Bennie and Brian. Irvin, who earned his degree in business management from Miami, appears in "Stay In School" posters sponsored by the Dallas All-Sports Association. He and wife Sandy live in Carrollton, TX.

# Jim Jeffcoat

DEFENSIVE END • ARIZONA STATE HT: 6-5 • WT: 274 • BORN: 4/1/61 D-1 FOR '83 • 10th YEAR

**PRO:** Since September 3, 1984, when Jim Jeffcoat walked to the line of scrimmage against the L.A. Rams in his first NFL start, fourteen different players have lined up next to

him as starters on the defensive front four for Dallas, and the countless others have played back-up roles on these same defensive lines. So for Jeffcoat, 1991 proved that the more things change, the more they stay the same. For the eighth consecutive year Jeffcoat opened the season as the starting right end and remained there all season. He has now played (140) in more and started (120) more NFL games than any current Cowboys player, and he extended his string of consecutive games played to 76 straight, tied for the team lead. Jeffcoat finished the season seventh on the team in tackles with 70, second among defensive linemen, and over the past three seasons his 235 tackles lead all defensive linemen. Against Cleveland (9/1) in the season opener he tied for the team lead in tackles with seven and had a tackle for a loss. For the season he tied for the team lead among defensive linemen in batted passes with a

single-season career-high five and was tied for third on the team in guarterback pressures with 14. Jeffcoat leads the team in career NFL sacks with 70, adding four in 1991. Two of those four sacks also forced fumbles; against Green Bay (10/6) he sacked Blair Kiel on the Dallas 17-yard line, forcing a fumble Dallas recovered to prevent a score in a 20-17 win; against New Orleans (12/8) he forced a fumble at the Saints 10-yard line. Perhaps one of the club's biggest defensive plays of 1991 came against the New York Giants (9/29) when, on 3rd-and-1 at the Dallas six-yard line, Jeffcoat teamed with Ken Norton to throw Rodney Hampton for a five-yard loss, forcing the Giants to settle for a field goal in the Cowboys 21-16 victory. Over the vears Jeffcoat has become almost as big a threat offensively as he is defensively. His four career touchdowns place him sixth on the Cowboys active touchdown list, behind Emmitt Smith (24 TDs), Michael Irvin (20), Jay Novacek (8), Daryl Johnston (6) and Kelvin Martin (6). After being on the receiving end of tipped passes for two interception returns for touchdowns in his career, Jeffcoat moved to the role of tipper in 1991, knocking a Boomer Esiaison pass into the hands of linebacker Dixon Edwards who returned it 36 yards for a touchdown against Cincinnati (10/13). Late in the 1990 season against New Orleans (12/2), Jeffcoat suffered a compound fracture in his right hand, but stayed in the game and recorded two key tackles behind the line of scrimmage. Limited the final three weeks of the season by the injury, he still finished second on the team in quarterback pressures with 28 and eighth in tackles, second among defensive linemen, with 65. He recorded the sixth double digit tackle game of his career with 10 stops at the N.Y. Giants (9/30). In the 1989 season finale against Green Bay (12/24), Jeffcoat tallied three sacks, the most by a Cowboys' player since 1987. For the season he recorded a career-high 100 tackles, including a 12 tackle performance versus Philadelphia (11/23), his best since recording 13 against Washington in 1985. Also in 1989 against Washington (9/24) Jeffcoat scored his fourth career touchdown, rambling 77 yards with a fumble recovery. Jeffcoat set up three scores with his team-high 3 1/2 forced fumbles in 1988. In 1987 he returned a Phil Simms pass, that was tipped by Ed Jones, 26 yards for a touchdown. In 1986 Jeffcoat led Dallas with a career-high 14 sacks. The Simms-to-Jones-to-Jeffcoat combination worked for the first time in 1985 when Jeffcoat went 65 yards with an interception. He recorded a single-game club-record five sacks against the Redskins at Washington in 1985. Jeffcoat's initial NFL touchdown came when he fell on a fumble in the end zone to send the game into overtime against New Orleans in 1984. Jeffcoat is a native of New Jersey along with fellow end Tony Tolbert. GAMES/STARTS: 1983 (16/0), 1984 (16/16), 1985 (16/16), 1986 (16/16), 1987 (12/12), 1988 (16/15), 1989 (16/16), 1990 (16/13), 1991 (16/16). Total - 140/120.

**COLLEGE:**A three-year starter at Arizona State, Jeffcoat earned All-PAC 10 and honorable mention All-America honors after anchoring the 1982 Sun Devil defense that led the nation. He was named outstanding defensive player in Arizona State's 1983 Fiesta Bowl victory over Oklahoma after recording 16 tackles, a forced fumble and a sack, and in September, 1991 he was named to the All-time Fiesta Bowl team.

**PERSONAL:** From a family of six children, James Wilson Jeffcoat, Jr., is a Cliffwood, NJ, native who earned All-America honors at Matawan Regional High School. He also lettered in wrestling. In October, 1991 his high school retired his football jersey, No. 79, and he was also awarded the New Jersey Sportswriters' Association Unsung Hero Award for his community service in 1991. Jeffcoat, who was the Cowboys' 1987 and 1990 Man of the Year nominee, works with Special Olympics, Make-A-Wish Foundation, the Leukemia Society and the Boys Clubs. He earned his bachelors degree in communications and his Masters degree in Business Administration from Arizona State. Jim and wife Tammy have three children - Jaren (10/1/87) and twins Jackson and Jacqueline (12/26/90).

Daryl Johnston

HT: 6-2 • WT: 236 • BORN: 2/10/66 D-2 FOR '89 • 4th YEAR

**PRO:** As the starting fullback in the Cowboys offense, you might expect Daryl Johnston to relax around the locker room with the higher profile running backs, but instead Johnston

can usually be found with the offensive linemen, because as the Cowboys starting fullback, he has one basic function: block for running back Emmitt Smith. "When you're growing up you never look at the Rocky Bleiers, the Jim Braxtons and Robert Newhouses - the guys who do the dirty work," says Johnston. But the dirty work is exactly what Johnston does. Over the past two seasons as Smith's lead blocker, he has lead the way for 2,500 rushing yards, two Pro Bowl appearances, and the 1991 NFL rushing title. Johnston's blocking origins stem from his freshman year at Syracuse. He had been switched from fullback to tailback in his senior year of high school, but on his first day at Syracuse he was told to join the fullbacks. "And I've been running into people the rest of my life," says Johnston. But blocking is not the only skill in Johnston's jack-of-all-trades repertoire. Last summer offensive coordinator Norv Turner's new system allowed Johnston to post single-season career-numbers in receptions (28) and receiving yards (224). The first true fullback taken in the 1989 draft, Johnston has not posted the rushing totals of some of his fellow draftees, but only Barry Sanders, Eric Metcalf, Todd McNair, Keith Jones and Dave Meggett have more career receptions than Johnston's 58. When it comes to putting those catches in the end zone, Johnston, with five career touchdown receptions, is behind only Meggett (eight TDs) from the class of '89. Johnston also leads all Cowboys running backs in career NFL receiving yards with 525. In 1991 he touched the football 45 times (17 rushes, 28 receptions), and 21 times he came away with a first down (six rushing, 15 receiving), including a 3-of-4 on third down carries for a first down (for his career he is 7-of-8 in third down carries for a first down). Despite being slowed early in the year with a knee injury, Johnston led the team in receptions with a career high four catches for a career high 47 yards against Phoenix (9/22). Two weeks later at Green Bay (10/6) he tied those marks with another four catches for 47 more yards. Against Phoenix (11/3) he gained 19 yards rushing on three carries, his highest rushing output since

gaining a career-high 60 yards against Green Bay on December 24, 1989, and in the regular-season finale against Atlanta (12/22) Johnston hauled in four more catches for 23 yards. Somewhat of an iron man, Johnston played in all 16 games for the third straight season, and has not missed a game since entering the NFL. A valuable contributor on the Cowboys' kick coverage units, Johnston tied for fourth on the team, and led all non-defensive players, in special teams tackles with ten. The past three seasons, only Bill Bates (64 tackles) has recorded more special teams stops than Johnston's 32. In the 1990 season opener against San Diego (9/9), the ever versatile Johnston lined up at both fullback and running back. Against New Orleans (12/2) Johnston hauled in a five-yard reception for the game winning TD in the fourth quarter of Dallas' 17-13 victory, and the following week against Phoenix (12/16) Johnston recorded his first NFL rushing touchdown on a six yard dash in the fourth quarter. Over the final six weeks of the 1989 season, Johnston gained 194 yards on 56 carries and caught a team-high three touchdown passes. Johnston, often the lone back in passing situations, also helped the Cowboys offensive line hold opponents to a club-record low 30 sacks. At Green Bay (10/8) Johnston became the first Cowboys rookie to start at fullback since Timmy Newsome in 1980. He recorded his first pro touchdown on a six yard reception against Miami (11/19). A second round draft pick, Johnston was drafted higher than any Syracuse running back since Larry Csonka was taken in the first round by Miami in 1968. GAMES/STARTS: 1989 (16/10), 1990 (16/0), 1991 (16/14). Total - 48/24.

**COLLEGE:** An All-America and All-East pick at Syracuse in 1988, Johnston rushed for 1,830 yards and caught 46 passes during his collegiate career. Against Boston College in 1988 the senior co-captain gained a career-high 138 yards rushing, the most by a Syracuse back since Larry Csonka rushed for 154 yards in 1967. The Orangemen won 21 games during Johnston's final two seasons.

**PERSONAL:** Daryl Peter Johnston was named Western New York player of the year in 1983 while playing for Lewiston-Porter High School in Youngstown, NY. Daryl graduated first in his class of 290 students with a 4.0 grade-point average. His sister JoAnn played goaltender for the University of Rochester soccer team, which won two national championships. He earned his degree in economics from Syracuse.

**Jimmie Jones** 



**PRO:** If the Dallas defensive line is to rise to the next level in 1992, the performance of young players such as Jimmie Jones will go a long way toward that end. Jones, who has

displayed flashes of dominance in spurts over the past two years, will be counted on to fulfill his potential — that of a tremendously gifted athlete with size, speed and

guickness. After bouncing back and forth between the right and left end positions during the 1991 training camp, Jones started five straight games on the inside, at right tackle, from weeks 4 through 9. Included in that stretch was a week 4 performance at Phoenix (9/22) where he recorded season-high figures for tackles (5) and tackles for lost yardage (3 for minus 8 yards). He finished the season ranked second on the team in tackles for loss with six for minus 16 yards. Jones athletic ability (4.71 forty) made him an effective spot player in pass rushing situations late in the year from the end and tackle positions. He registered two big sacks, and two other QB pressures, in the Cowboys' playoff clinching win over the Eagles on (12/15). As a rookie in 1990, Jones made a fast adjustment to the pro game, and he turned out to be one of the true steals, as a third-round pick, in the '90 NFL Draft. Jones started six games at tackle in 1990 and was named to the All-Rookie Teams as selected by the U.P.I., The National, and the Pro Football Writers Association. He tied for the team lead in sacks as a first year player with 7.5, and finished the year sixth in sacks among NFL interior defensive linemen. He was also fourth among NFL rookies in sacks behind Aaron Wallace (L.A. Raiders), Renaldo Turnbull (Saints) and James Francis (Bengals). Jones registered 2.5 sacks vs. Tampa Bay, the most in one game by a Cowboy rookie since Randy White in 1975. Jones earned his first NFL start at left tackle in Week 6 at Phoenix (10/14) and started at that position through Week No. 10. He recorded his single game and career-high tackle total with seven stops against Philadelphia (10/28), and finished the year ranked fifth in quarterback pressures with 14. GAMES/STARTS: 1990 (16/6), 1991 (16/6). Total - (32/12).

**COLLEGE:** Jones was a key performer for three years on what was one of the best defensive lines in college football history. He was scheduled for stardom as a starter in his senior year, but missed spring drills prior to that campaign in order to take a job to support his family. When the 1989 Hurricane season began, Jones was listed as a back-up to Cortez Kennedy, the third player picked in the 1990 draft. Jones worked in a three-man rotation at defensive tackle for the '89 'Canes along with Kennedy and Russell Maryland, the first player selected in the 1991 draft by Dallas. That trio was the core of a Miami unit that led the nation in total defense en route to the 1989 Sugar Bowl and a Miami national championship. Jones was also a solid contributor to the 1987 national championship team in Coral Gables. He collected 173 total tackles and 16.5 sacks in his four years as a Hurricane. Including Jones, 11 Miami defensive linemen have been drafted in the first three rounds of the last 10 NFL drafts.

**PERSONAL:** Jones did not play football in his senior season a Okeechobee (FL) High School, because he had family obligations that forced him to hold down a full-time job. Jimmy Johnson offered the unknown talent a scholar-ship to Miami based on the performance he displayed on film as a junior. Jimmie majored in business at Miami. He has a daughter, Jimmeria.

RUNNING BACK • KANSAS STATE HT: 6-2 • WT: 220 • BORN: 5/8/65 FA FOR '92 • 3rd YEAR

**PRO:** An outstanding athlete with fine size, speed and running ability, Jordan will be looking to earn a roster spot as a backup to Emmitt Smith at the running back position.

Jordan comes to the Cowboys with experience in the NFC East having played in 22 regular season outings with the Cardinals in 1989 and 1988. Injuries have curtailed his development as an NFL player. Last year, after a season out of football, he made the Houston Oilers' final roster, but was released after the first game. In his third training camp with Phoenix in 1990, he was placed on injured reserve in the preseason with a shoulder injury and was then released without playing in a game. He spent that 1990 season out of the NFL, serving as a youth supervisor at a juvenile detention center in Rochester, New York. In his two seasons with the Cardinals. Jordan rushed for a career total of 371 yards on 144 carries and five touchdowns. In 1989, he played in 13 games for Phoenix, with eight starts (for the injured Stump Mitchell). He finished that year with 211 yards and two TDs on 83 carries. Jordan's first start in '89 was against San Diego (10/1). He started the next five games before suffering a shoulder injury that forced him to miss a game vs. Dallas (11/12). He registered his season-best numbers against the Cowboys on (10/29) with 18 carries for 68 yards and a long run of 14 yards. He registered rushing TDs vs. the Seahawks (9/17) and the Rams (11/19). A shoulder problem caused him to miss late-season games against Washington (12/3) and the Raiders (12/10). Jordan was drafted by the Cardinals as the second of two fifth round selections in 1988 (132nd overall). and he went on to play in nine games (with two starts) as a rookie. Those two starting assignments came in place of the injured Mitchell against the Browns (10/23) and Cowboys (10/31). He scored his first two NFL TDs on a pair of one yard runs in a 30-21 win over the Redskins (9/25). His third TD of 1988 was another one-varder vs. Pittsburgh (10/9). GAMES/STARTS: 1988 (9/2-Phoe.), 1989 (13/8-Phoe.), 1991 (0/0-Hou.). Total - 22/10.

**COLLEGE:** In four seasons at Kansas State, Jordan amassed 1593 career yards on 427 carries (3.7 average) and nine TDs. He also caught 46 passes for 378 yards and two touchdowns. As a junior, he established a KSU single-game record with 215 yards on 35 attempts, including TD runs of four and 89 yards (longest in school history) against Iowa State. He also had a 74-yard TD reception in that ISU game.

**PERSONAL:** A native of Rochester, New York, Anthony Jordan was a secondteam all-state selection as a senior running back at East High School in Rochester. He rushed for 1054 yards and 12 scores in his final prep season. Jordan was also a stand-out basketball and track performer, winning the state 100-meter dash championship. A prominent community worker throughout his career, Jordan has given his time to Special Olympics and Community Settlement House. He owns a complete set of professional disc jockey equipment, including mixing boards and over 1000 records. He earned a degree in social science at Kansas State.

**PRO:** When the Cowboys claimed Craig Kupp on waivers November 7, 1991, a day after he was released by Phoenix no one seemed to think much of his arrival,

but a couple weeks later, when Troy Aikman went down with a knee injury agaist Washington, Kupp was the proverbial play away from becoming the Cowboys' guarterback. That play never materialized for him in Dallas, but a training camp injury to the Cardinals' Timm Rosenbach did allow Kupp to gain some experience while with Phoenix. In his only National Football League game, Kupp completed 3-of-7 attempts for 23 yards in the fourth quarter of the Cardinals' 34-0 loss to the Redskins at RFK on Sept. 15, 1991. This spring Kupp was one of three Cowboys' players to join the World League. He spent the first six weeks of the season with San Antonio, seeing little action, before being acquired by Montreal, where he spent the remainder of the season. Originally drafted in the fifth round by the New York Giants in 1990, Kupp was the ninth guarterback taken that year after Jeff George, Andre Ware, Tommy Hodson, Peter Tom Willis, Neil O'Donnell, Troy Taylor, Cary Conklin and Scott Mitchell. He signed with Phoenix following his preseason release from the Giants and spent the rest of the year on the Cardinals' practice squad. GAMES/STARTS: 1991 (1/0-Phoe.).

**COLLEGE:** As a senior at Pacific Lutheran, Kupp completed 185-of-286 pass attempts (64.7%) for 2,398 yards and 25 touchdowns while throwing only three interceptions to set a record for passing yards in a season and an NAIA Division II record for interception rate with a 1.04 mark. Against Southern Oregon late in the 1989 campaign, the unanimous All-Columbia Football Association pick set Pacific Lutheran records for yards passing (411) and touchdown throws (6) in a game while leading the Lutes to a 52-50 win. Kupp began his collegiate career at Montana Tech where he earned All-Frontier Conference honors as a quarterback and punter.

**PERSONAL:** Craig Kupp starred in football, basketball and as the No. 1 singles player on the tennis team at Selah, WA, High School, He majored in business administration and public relations at Pacific Lutheran. His father Jake was drafted by Dallas in the ninth round in 1964 and played guard for two seasons with the Cowboys. He was traded to Washington in a multi-player swap in 1966 then went on to play nine seasons (1967-75) with New Orleans, where he was voted to the Pro Bowl in 1969. Craig and his younger brother Kyle, a defensive back, were teammates at Pacific Lutheran. Craig's wife's name is Karin.

**PRO:** Coming out of tiny Emporia State University in Kansas, Leon Lett never experienced a strength program or training table until he joined the Cowboys in Austin last

summer. Despite two-a-day workouts in the Texas heat, Lett managed to add nine pounds after the first week of camp. He was placed on injured reserve with a back problem on August 27 after making the 47-man roster and spent the next 11 weeks working under conditioning coach Mike Woicik. Lett improved his strength, gained more weight and was re-activated on November 21. Against undefeated Washington at RFK (11/24) on his first regular-season play in the National Football League. Lett stuffed Redskins running back Earnest Byner after a one-yard gain. Lett played some at defensive tackle the final five games of the season and in the playoffs. "I just try to make a big play every chance I get," said Lett. He took advantage of his opportunities early in training camp and in the Cowboys' preseason opener at Kansas City (8/3), when he forced Chiefs' quarterback Mark Vlasic into an incompletion then later nabbed Vlasic for a five-yard sack. In the preseason finale against Atlanta (8/23), Lett forced a fumble while tackling Steve Broussard for a loss at the Falcons' 27-yard line in overtime to set up the game-winning field goal. He also recorded two tackles for a loss and tied for the team lead in tackles with six in that Atlanta game. Lett finished the preseason knotted for the club lead in tackles for a loss with three. "Leon was the biggest surprise of training camp to me." said Defensive Line Coach Butch Davis. "At some point during every single drill at camp, he did something extraordinary. I never dreamed he could do some of the things he's done." The first person from Emporia State to make a Cowboys' roster, Lett was the first player to be drafted from the school since Steve Henry in the fifth round in 1979 and the first defensive lineman selected from Emporia State since John Lohmeyer in the fourth round in 1973. "When I line up against a guy, I'm not thinking about where he's from," said Lett."I'm competing against him as a football player. People always bring up the small-school thing, but to me it's blown out of proportion." GAMES/STARTS: 1991 (5/0)

**COLLEGE:** A big part of a defense that held opponents to 4.1 yards per play and 3.1 yards per carry during his two years at Emporia State, Lett finished second on the team in sacks and earned All-NAIA District 10 honors despite missing three games due to a leg injury as a senior. He had a monster effort with six tackles, two tackles for a loss, a sack, an interception and a blocked kick against Northeastern Oklahoma State in 1990. Lett transfered to Emporia State after two seasons at Hinds, MS, Junior College.

**PERSONAL:** Leon Lett starred in football and basketball at Fair Hope, AL, High School. A sociology major at Emporia State, Lett aided the Shriner's Christmas Gift Drive in 1991. He has a daughter Shanavia (7/3/87).

**PRO:** In a move to strengthen both the secondary and special teams, Dallas acquired Garry Lewis in January, 1992, from the Los Angeles Raiders in exchange for a seventh-

round draft choice in 1992. Lewis played in all 16 games for the Raiders in 1991, starting against Houston (9/1) and Buffalo (12/8) and recording 23 tackles and five passes defensed. A key special teams player for the Raiders, he saw considerable action on the kickoff and punt coverage teams as well as their kickoff return squad. Originally a seventh-round draft choice (173rd overall) in 1990, Lewis had a strong showing during the 1990 training camp, earning the starting spot at cornerback for the first three games of the season. Because of a shoulder injury, he was forced to spend four weeks on injured reserve before returning to the active roster November 4. He logged 34 tackles and had three passes defensed and one forced fumble in 12 games. His first NFL interception came during the AFC Championship game at Buffalo. GAMES/STARTS: 1990 (12/5-Raid.), 1991 (16/2-Raid.). Total - 28/7.

**COLLEGE:** A four-year letterman at Alcorn State, Lewis earned All-Southwestern Athletic Conference honors at cornerback as a junior and senior. # **Kelvin Martin**

PRO: After establishing himself as a top receiver in the National Football League by catching 45-or-more passes each season from 1988-90, last season Kelvin Martin was

one of the top punt returners in the NFL, while cementing a place among the best punt returners in team history. Against Philadelphia (12/15) in a critical game for the Cowboys' playoff hopes. Dallas was trailing 13-11 in the fourth guarter when K-Mart brought back a punt 85 yards for the winning touchdown. It was the longest punt return in the NFL last season, the third longest in team history and the longest by a Cowboys' player since Dennis Morgan's 98-yarder against St. Louis in 1974. In addition it was the first punt returned for a touchdown for Dallas since Gary Allen in 1983. Martin set a club record with 124 punt return yards against the Eagles. Last year he averaged 11.6 yards per return - the fifth highest in team history and the highest since Morgan's 15.1 mark in 1972 — to place third in the NFL, the highest by a Cowboys' player since Morgan finished third in 1974. Only Bob Hayes with an 11.1 mark from 1965-74 has a better career punt return average in team history than Martin's 9.4 standard. Over the final 11 games, including playoffs, of 1991, Martin averaged 13.2 yards per return (18-237). Although he was limited to the role of the third wide receiver in passing situations. Martin, who has 27 catches on third or fourth down for a first down since 1989, made some big catches for Dallas last season. Almost half (seven) of his catches in 1991 came on third down to sustain drives. Both of his season-long 27-yard receptions (vs. Phil., 9/15; @ Wash., 11/24) came on third-down plays. "I want to be on the field so I'm happy to do what is necessary," said Martin. "When my number is called, I'll be ready." With six catches of 18-or-more yards, Martin averaged a single-season career-high 15.2 yards per catch last season. "When Kelvin goes into the ball game, he makes plays for us." said Cowboys Head Coach Jimmy Johnson. With 180 career catches, Martin needs 31 receptions to tie Herschel Walker in 10th spot on the Cowboys' all-time receiving list. Despite a torn anterior cruciate ligament in his left knee that ended his 1989 season after 11 games and limited his offseason preparation for 1990, Martin led the Cowboys in receiving each season. In 1990 he caught a single-season career-

high 64 passes - tying him for the third most in a season by a Cowboys' wide receiver - to finish eighth among NFC wide receivers. From 1988-90 Martin matched Hayes, Tony Hill and Drew Pearson as the only wide receiver in team history to catch 45-or-more passes in three consecutive seasons. In 1989 Martin caught a team-high 11 passes on third down that gave Dallas a first down and with nine was second to Jay Novacek's 11 drive-sustaining receptions the next season. In the 1990 season opener against San Diego (9/9) in his first start since suffering the knee injury against Miami on Nov. 19, 1989, Martin made two big catches to finish with a season-high 78 receiving yards. He set up the Cowboys' first touchdown with a 19-yard catch to the Chargers' 25-yard line in the first quarter and had a 24-yard grab at San Diego's one that led to Troy Aikman's sneak for the winning score with 1:58 remaining. Over the season's final half, when he caught 38 passes, Martin led or tied for the team lead in receiving in six of eight games. Against the Jets (11/4) he tied his single-game career-high with eight catches. At the time of his injury in 1989, Martin was 10th in the NFL in receptions and receiving yards. Against the Giants (10/1) Martin caught a career-long 46-yarder to set up a field goal. Martin established himself as a top NFL wide receiver in 1988 when he caught a single-game career-high eight passes for 95 yards and two touchdowns in a Monday night game at New Orleans (10/3). Three weeks later he had another eight-catch game, this time for a career-high 97 yards in Philadelphia (10/23). As a rookie in 1987, Martin averaged 9.8 yards per punt return, which at the time was the best by a Cowboys' player since James Jones' 10.1 average in 1980. Due to injuries, Martin did not play until the ninth game of his rookie season. GAMES/STARTS: 1987 (7/0), 1988 (16/7), 1989 (11/11), 1990 (16/16), 1991 (16/0). Total - 66/34.

**COLLEGE:** Martin finished among the nation's top 10 punt returners in each of his final three seasons at Boston College, including a 15.3-yard average his last two years. Martin also led the nation's receivers in yards per catch with a 19.6 average in 1985. He caught a school-record 10 touchdown passes in 1984. Martin also set Boston College career marks for receptions (133), receiving yards (2,377) and touchdown catches (28).

**PERSONAL:** Kelvin Brian Martin earned all-city and all-conference honors at Ribault High School in Jacksonville, FL. Kelvin and wife Lynn live in Coppell, TX, with their son Kelvin, Jr. (10/20/89). They also have two Akita dogs - Roscoe and Sheba. Kelvin majored in speech communications at Boston College.

**PRO:** Hard work and determination have been the keys to Russell Maryland's success. Each day after practice last season, Maryland would trudge over to the blocking sleds

and work on his techniques. Sometimes he would be alone. On other occasions he would be joined by 10-year veteran Jim Jeffcoat who would pass on advice to the rookie. These sessions continued some in the spring when they were joined by several of the Cowboys young defensive linemen. It was another example of the work habits and ability to influence others that earned Maryland the nickname "The Conscience" at the University of Miami. As his playing time increased mid-

way through 1991, Maryland began to make big contributions. After a season-high three guarterback pressures against Phoenix (11/3). Maryland was promoted to the first unit the next week vs. Houston. On the Oilers' final play from scrimmage before kicking the game-winning field goal in overtime, Maryland dropped Lorenzo White for a two-yard loss and almost forced a fumble. He finished his first pro start with five tackles, a sack, a guarterback pressure and the tackle for a loss. Over the final seven regular-season games, no Cowboys player had more sacks or guarterback pressures than Maryland. He finished the year with 4 1/2 sacks to lead NFL rookie defensive linemen and place second behind Denver's Mike Croel among all rookies in the league. Despite starting only seven games, Maryland finished second on the team in guarterback pressures with 16. Only Tampa Bay's Keith McCants, who started 16 games last year, had more forced fumbles among defensive linemen in the league in 1991 than Marlyland. Named the NFL Rookie of the Year by the Edelstein Pro Football Letter, Maryland earned all-rookie honors from Pro Football Writers of America, Pro Football Weekly and College & Pro Football Newsweekly. During the Cowboys' five-game winning streak to end the season and make the playoffs, Maryland spurred a defensive effort that held opponents to 82.4 yards rushing per contest. In addition Dallas did not allow a touchdown on the ground the final three weeks of the season. Against Pittsburgh on Thanksgiving Day, he recorded two sacks, then in the win at Philadelphia to clinch a postseason berth, Maryland had a season-high seven tackles. When Dallas beat the Bears in Chicago (12/29) in a first-round playoff match, he came through with five tackles, a sack, two guarterback pressures and batted down a pass. Maryland joined Buck Buchanan (1963), Bubba Smith (1967) and Ken Sims (1982) as only the fourth defensive tackle to be drafted with the first overall pick in the NFL draft. Including Maryland, four Miami defensive linemen — Jerome Brown (1987), Bill Hawkins (1989), Cortez Kennedy (1990) - were selected in the first round from 1987-91. GAMES/STARTS: 1991 (16/7).

**COLLEGE:** A two-time All-America and 1990 Outland Trophy winner, Maryland played a big role on a Miami team that compiled a 44-4 record, never lost at home, won four straight bowl games, captured two national titles and finished no lower than third in the rankings during his tenure. Maryland's final game with the Hurricanes came in Dallas against Texas in the 1991 Cotton Bowl where he tied a career-high with three sacks to earn defensive player of the game honors. Maryland also had a big day in Miami's 1989 Sugar Bowl win over Alabama, with eight tackles and two sacks. When Miami played Notre Dame in 1990, Maryland recorded a career-high 20 tackles.

**PERSONAL:** Russell Maryland starred as a two-way lineman at Whitney Young High School, where he also competed on the track team in the shot put and was undefeated in the "Big Man's 60-yard dash," which was open only to competitors in the field events. Due to his scholastic achievements at Whitney Young, one of Chicago's toughest for academics, Maryland could have attended several lvy League schools. He graduated with a degree in psychology prior to his final season at Miami and wrote a column for USA Today on underclassmen entering the NFL draft. During the offseason Russell helped award badges to inner-city Boy Scouts in Dallas and judged students' drawings as part of an anti-drug campaign in McKinney, TX.

33 tackles in 1991. In the Falcons' home opener against Minnesota (9/8), Mitchell tallied a season-high six tackles, a figure he matched at San Francisco (10/13), when he also recorded a quarterback pressure and forced a fumble from 49ers wide receiver Jerry Rice. A week later in Phoenix (10/20), Mitchell twice caught Cardinals quarterback Tom Tupa for a sack on blitzes. Mitchell, who was drafted in the seventh round by Atlanta in 1991, was released on the final cut of training camp then re-signed by the Falcons after the first regular-season game. **COLLEGE:** An honorable mention All-America in 1990, Mitchell led Brigham Young in passes defensed and also led the secondary in tackles as a senior. The two-time All-Western Athletic Conference honoree set a school record with a 97yard interception return for a touchdown against New Mexico in 1989 when he led the Cougars in solo tackles, interceptions and punt returns. He also brought back an interception 49 yards for a score against Colorado State in 1990.

**PERSONAL:** Brian Keith Mitchell earned all-district honors as a running back and defensive back at Waco, TX, High School. He earned All-America recognition for track at BYU in the spring of 1990. Brian's brother Patrick was a freshman defensive back for the Cougars in 1991. Brian majored in marketing at BYU.

**PRO:** When the pain in his shoulder subsided enough for him to play, Godfrey Myles showed the signs of being a top player for the Cowboys in 1991. The source of the discomfort

was a screw, from a surgery while at the University of Florida, that was too long and tore at the muscle in his right shoulder. After missing several weeks of training camp due to the injury, Myles led the Cowboys in tackles with six in his first pro game, a preseason skirmish at Houston (8/18). He topped the team in special teams tackles against Philadelphia (9/15) then the next week in Phoenix had to leave the game due to the shoulder problem. Myles was placed on injured reserve September 25, underwent surgery to repair the injury October 10 and missed the rest of the season. The eighth linebacker selected in the 1991 draft, Myles was placked with the highest choice used on a Florida linebacker since 1988 when Clifford Charlton was taken in the first round by Cleveland. Myles was the ninth University of Florida player to be drafted by Dallas between 1983-91. GAMES/STARTS: 1991 (3/0)

**COLLEGE:** An honorable mention All-America pick in 1989-90, Myles started 11 games at "Gatorback", a combination strong safety/outside linebacker in Florida's defense as a senior. He finished third on the team in sacks and tackles to earn All-Southeastern Conference in 1990. Named the "most underrated player in the country" by The Sporting News prior to his junior year, Myles compiled 15 tackles for a loss, four interceptions, eight passes batted down, 3½ sacks, three forced fumbles and one fumble recovery in his final 19 starts for the Gators.

**PERSONAL:** Godfrey Myles was a second-team all-state pick at Carol City High School in Miami. He also was selected to Florida's 35-man Super Squad that met a team of Georgia prep all-stars in the summer of 1987. Myles majored in sociology at Florida.

**PRO:** Nate Newton's play against some of the top defenders in the National Football League was a cornerstone, particularly down the stretch, in the Cowboys' drive to

the playoffs in 1991. After missing the Giants (11/17) and Washington (11/24) games due to a sprained right knee, Newton played a big role in the Cowboys' six-game winning streak at the end for the year. Against a New Orleans (12/8) team that ranked second in the NFL in total defense, rush defense and pass defense, in addition to tying for third in the league in sacks, Dallas did not give up a sack and allowed Emmitt Smith to become the first back in 1991 to top 100 yards rushing against the Saints. In that game Newton held New Orleans linebacker Rickey Jackson, who finished ninth in the NFL with 11½ sacks last season, without a sack. The next week in the playoff-clinching win at Philadelphia (12/15), Newton limited All-Pro

Reggie White to one sack, the Eagles only sack of the day and what proved to be the low sack output of the season for Philadelphia, who led the league in defense and sacks in 1991. Earlier last year Newton held Pro Bowl defensive end Charles Mann without a tackle as the Cowboys offense rolled up 349 total yards against Washington (9/9). In addition Dallas ran behind Newton for most of the afternoon as Emmitt Smith gained 122 yards, 98 in the second half, against Green Bay (10/6), which entered the game as the NFL's top run defense. Oilers defensive end William Fuller, who earned AFC Pro Bowl honors, was limited to one tackle and no sacks by Newton on November 17. In five games last season Newton lined up opposite a player who finished in the top 10 in sacks in 1991, allowing a total of two sacks in those battles. Named to the All-Madden team for the third consecutive season in 1991, Newton, who has missed only three starts in the Cowboys' past 75 games, has 74 career NFL starts, tops among the Dallas offensive unit. The starting left guard for Dallas from 1987-89, Newton switched to right tackle early in training camp in 1990. He made a quick transition to his new spot and played well from the beginning with his mostanticipated matchup coming against the Eagles' White. "He's the big dog, the top dog," said Newton. "I want to come with my best because I know he's coming with his best. It's the type of game you don't dread because if you do well against Reggie White and get his respect, everyone will know." In two 1990 meetings between the Cowboys and Eagles, White tallied three total tackles and no sacks. Newton was named the Cowboys' Most Valuable Offensive Player by Pro Football Weekly and was the only Dallas offensive lineman to earn All-Pro votes from Associated Press. After signing with Dallas as a free agent in 1986, Newton served as a backup guard before winning the starting left guard position the next season. He joined the Cowboys following two campaigns with the USFL's Tampa Bay Bandits. Newton originally signed with the Washington Redskins out of college as a free agent in 1983 but was released on the final cut. GAMES/STARTS: 1986 (11/0), 1987 (11/11), 1988 (15/15), 1989 (16/16), 1990 (16/16), 1991 (14/14). Total - 83/72.

**COLLEGE:** Newton played on both the offensive and defensive lines while winning four letters at Florida A&M. He was a team captain as a senior when he was named all-conference. One of Newton's teammates was Willie Harper, brother of Cowboys wide receiver Alvin Harper.

**PERSONAL:** Nathaniel Newton, Jr., was an all-around athlete at Jones High School in his native Orlando, FL, where he played football, basketball, wrestling and track (shot put). Nate's younger brother, Tim, is a defensive tackle for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. Nate served as a spokesman for the 1989 GTE/Cowboys Food Drive and he enjoys teaching at youth football camps. In March, 1992 he spoke to the Drug Abuse Resistance Education graduation in Coppell, TX. Newton also served as an analyst the morning after games last year for KKDA-FM in Dallas-Fort Worth. He and wife Dorothy live in Coppell, TX, with their children, Jessica (12/9/83) and Nathaniel III (10/15/89).

**PRO:** With all the new faces on the defensive line in 1991, Danny Noonan, in only five NFL seasons, has quickly become one of its more senior members. Of the eight line-

men from last year, only Noonan, Tony Casillas and Jim Jeffcoat have more

than three NFL seasons under their belt. Noonan's experience and versatility earned him the starting right tackle spot the first three games of the 1991 season before he assumed a backup role at both right and left tackle. Against Washington (9/9) he recorded four solo tackles, a tackle for a loss and sacked Mark Rypien for an 11 yard loss late in the fourth quarter. When Casillas went down with an injured elbow against Houston (11/10), Noonan stepped in and recorded a season-high five tackles, and the following week against the Giants (11/17) he recorded two tackles and a tackle for a loss while lining up some at both right and left tackle. In 1990 Noonan led all defensive linemen, and fninished fourth on the team, with 85 tackles, surpassing his previous single-season high of 84 tackles from 1988. His nine tackles at Atlanta (12/30) were his highest single-game tackle total since October 30, 1988, when he had nine against Phoenix, and his two sacks at Tampa Bay (10/21) were his best since October 23, 1988, when he had three sacks against Philadelphia. Noonan earned a game ball from the coaching staff for his eight tackles and two passes defensed vs. New Orleans (12/2). After missing most of the first 10 weeks of 1989 with a sprained groin suffered in training camp, Noonan showed his versatility against Miami (11/19) by playing every defensive line position in his first game back. With his return to the starting lineup the final four weeks of the season, came a dramatic improvement from the defense, holding opponents to 301.6 total yards, including 95.8 yards rushing and 205.8 passing. In 1988 Noonan led all defensive linemen in tackles and tied for the team lead in sacks despite injuries to his left knee and hip. Against Atlanta (9/25) he intercepted a tipped pass and returned it 17 yards for a touchdown and sacked Chris Miller in the endzone for a safety. After beginning his rookie season as a reserve defensive end, Noonan was moved to right tackle where he shared the position with Randy White the second half of the year. Noonan was the 12th player selected in the 1987 draft, and he is one of the three Dallas defensive tackles who were selected within the first 12 picks of their respective drafts (Russell Maryland, 1st, 1991; Noonan, 12th, 1987; Casillas, 2nd, 1986). GAMES/STARTS: 1987 (11/0). 1988 (16/16), 1989 (7/5), 1990 (16/15), 1991 (15/3). Totals - 65/39.

**COLLEGE:** Noonan was a consensus All-America at nose tackle in 1986 after anchoring a Nebraska defense that ranked second in the nation, allowing just 235.5 yards per game and 2.4 yards per rush. Noonan had 53 tackles and a team-high seven sacks as a senior. In 1985 he earned honorable mention All-America and second-team All-Big Eight honors. In September, 1991, Noonan was inducted into the Nebraska Football Hall of Fame. A dedicated worker in the weight room, Noonan was lifting weights when the Cowboys drafted him.

**PERSONAL:** A native of Lincoln, Noonan was born six miles from the University of Nebraska campus. He led his Lincoln Northeast High School team to the state championships in 1982 while earning All-America honors. Noonan, who is working towards his degree in criminal justice from Nebraska, donates his time to the Make-A-Wish Foundation in Dallas. Danny and wife Penny live in Coppell, TX.

**PRO:** "Jack of all trades, master of all positions" is what Ken Norton has become among the Cowboys linebacking corps. The starter at weakside linebacker in 1989-90, Norton

was switched to middle linebacker early in training camp last year, then to the strongside prior to the final preseason game. In 1992 he's slated to return to the weakside. "He's played more positions here the last two years than some guys play in 10," said Defensive Coordinator and Linebackers Coach Dave Wannstedt. "That's a credit to his ability and willingness and intelligence." Whether at weakside or strongside, Norton has been the Cowboys' big-play linebacker the past two seasons. In 1991 he led Dallas with 13 tackles for a loss, including 12 in the final nine regular-season games. Norton also led all non-linemen in guarterback pressures with seven. In the playoff-clinching victory over Philadelphia (12/15), he had a season-high three tackles behind the line. Against Atlanta in the season finale, Norton partially blocked a punt at the Falcons' 13-yard line to set up the winning touchdown in the fourth quarter. "When it's late in the game and you're down, the opponent is driving the ball and you need a play to pull the team together, that's when leadership comes about," said Norton. "When the intensity rises, you raise your own level of play. That's what makes you a leader," In two playoff games he set the pace with a team-high 17 tackles, along with a tackle for a loss, two guarterback pressures and a pass batted down. In the firstround playoff game against the Bears (12/29), Norton first teamed with Tony Tolbert to stop Neal Anderson for no gain on a thrid-and-goal from the Dallas one-yard line, then stopped Anderson again this time for a seven-yard loss on a screen pass in the fourth guarter. The next week in Detroit he led the way with seven stops. "I felt I had a slow start because of the changes," said Norton. "But as the season went on and I understood what I could get away with on the strongside, things started to take off." At weakside linebacker in 1990, Norton led Dallas in solo tackles, finished second in total tackles, topped all linebackers in sacks for the second straight year and tied for second on the club in both forced fumbles and fumbles recovered. All this despite missing most of the final two games after suffering torn cartilage and a sprained ligament in his right knee in the first guarter at Philadelphia (12/23). After surgery he spent most of the offseason prior to 1991 rehabilitating the injury. Earlier in 1990 Norton recovered a fumble on the Dallas two-yard line in Phoenix (10/14) then made a team-high 11 tackles, a sack and forced a fumble at the Buccaneers' 26-yard line to set up a field goal the next week in Tampa. In the Cowboys' 24-21 victory over the Rams (11/18), Norton forced and recovered a fumble at the Dallas six-yard line with the score tied in the fourth quarter. Dallas scored the winning field goal on the ensuing drive. In 1989 Norton played the equivalent of nine games, because he missed three games with an injured knee and played only the first and third quarters the last half of the season. He still finished sixth on the team in tackles with 87, which would project out to over 150 tackles if he played four quarters for 16 games. Norton had 12 tackles in his first NFL start in the season opener against New Orleans (9/10) and two sacks the next week in Atlanta (9/17) before spraining his left knee against Washington (9/24). Norton returned to the lineup in Kansas City (10/22) then recorded a career-high 13 tackles the following game against Phoenix (10/29). After missing most of the season after breaking a thumb in preseason, Norton recovered a fumble and batted down a pass in the final three games of his rookie year. Selected in the second round in 1988, Norton was drafted with the highest pick used on a UCLA

linebacker since Jerry Robinson was taken in the first round by Philadelphia in 1979. GAMES/STARTS: 1988 (3/0), 1989 (13/13), 1990 (15/15), 1991 (16/16). Totals — 47/44.

COLLEGE: An All-America inside linebacker at UCLA, Norton led the Bruins in tackles each of his final two seasons. Norton, who was the only West Coast nominee for the Butkus Award in 1987, also broke up 18 passes during his Bruins career.

**PERSONAL:** Ken Norton, Jr., averaged 8.8 yards per carry as a senior tailback at Westchester High School in Los Angeles. He did not play football until his junior year. His father Ken, Sr., is the former heavyweight boxing champion and played football at Northeast Missouri State. Ken, Jr., a political science major at UCLA, won the players' racquetball tournament during the offseason. He contributes his time to the Big Brothers and to Entertainers and Athletes for Kids in Los Angeles. In Dallas Ken works with the Pediatric Aids Foundation and the Special Olympics. He and wife Angela have a daughter Brittney (3/15/85).

Jay Novacek TIGHT END • WYOMING HT: 6-4 • WT: 231 • BORN: 10/24/62 FA FOR '90 • 8th YEAR

**PRO:** After establishing himself as one of the National Football League's top tight ends over the past two seasons, in 1992 Jay Novacek can accomplish what only one other

Cowboys player and no Dallas tight end has ever done. With 50-or-more catches this season, Novacek will match Herschel Walker as the only player in team history with three consecutive 50-reception seasons. He also would become the first Dallas tight end to accumulate three seasons of 50-or-more catches. In addition Novacek enters 1992 with three 100-yard receiving games with Dallas (five in the NFL). The Cowboys career record for 100-yard receiving games by a tight end is four by Doug Cosbie from 1979-88. Novacek began last season where he left off in 1990, when he led NFL tight ends in catches and Dallas in third down catches for first downs. Against Green Bay in Milwaukee (10/6), Novacek had 121 yards on a career-high 11 catches, which were the most in the NFC in 1991, tied the second most caches in a game in team history and matched the club game record for a tight end set by Doug Cosbie in 1985. Two games later in Detroit (10/27), Novacek caught 10 passes for a career-high 131 yards, the second most ever by a Dallas tight end to Cosbie's 159 receiving yards in 1985. Novacek's 49-yard reception against the Lions is the longest by a Dallas tight end since Cosbie's 61-yarder in 1983. "We do things with Jay that I don't think many other teams even think of trying with their tight ends," said Cowboys quarterback Troy Aikman. "I can't imagine a tight end who does more for his offense than Jay does for us." Novacek's fine season was somewhat marred when he suffered a sprained left knee late in the fourth quarter against the Giants (11/17) in the

11th game of the year. Before the injury Novacek was on a pace to collect 79 catches, which would have set a club season record for tight ends and been the second most in team history to Michael Irvin's 93 catches, also from last season. Novacek, who enters 1992 with a team-high 201 career NFL catches, was on a rate to accumulate 876 receiving yards, which would have surpassed the Cowboys' season record for tight ends of 789 set by Doug Cosbie in 1984. Heading into that Giants game, Novacek was fourth overall in the NFC in catches and led league tight ends in receiving yards. He was limited to holding for extra points and field goals in the next two games, which halted his 30-game streak with at least one reception. After returning part-time to the offensive unit against Pittsburgh (11/28), Novacek caught at least one pass in the Cowboys' final five games, including playoffs, to give him a 35-game pass catch streak when he lines up at tight end. Novacek returned to the starting lineup at Philadelphia (12/15) where he caught his 200th career pass. Despite the injury, Novacek matched his season career highs for catches (59 in 1990) and touchdown receptions (4 in 1988 and '90) and surpassed his season career high for receiving yards of 657 in 1990 with 664 yards last year. He led the NFC and placed second in the NFL in both receptions and receiving yards to earn his first trip to the Pro Bowl. In addition he was named first-team All-Pro by College & Pro Football Weekly; second team All-Pro by Associated Press and Newspaper Enterprise Association; and All-NFC by United Press International, Football News and Pro Football Weekly. Nicknamed "Paycheck" by teammates because "when you throw it to him, you can take it to the bank. He doesn't drop anything," explained Cowboys fullback Tommie Agee. Novacek, has 23 third or fourth downs catches for first downs since 1990, including 12 to finish second on the Cowboys in 1991. The biggest catch of his career was a game-winning touchdown grab on third-and-goal from the Bears' three-yard line in the fourth guarter of the first-round playoff game at Chicago (12/29) last season. In 1990 Novacek was named first-team All-Pro by Football News, second-team All-NFC by UPI and third-team All-Pro by Associated Press. He led the team in catches in five of the first eight games, despite missing most of the Giants game (9/16) and playing only in passing situations at Washington (9/23) due to a sprained shoulder. He returned to start the next week against the Giants at the Meadowlands (9/30) and snared a season-high nine passes. In addition, Novacek scored his first touchdown with the Cowboys on his 100th NFL grab in that Giants game. Dallas signed Novacek as a Plan B free agent from Phoenix in 1990 after he caught 81 passes for 1,048 yards and eight touchdowns with the Cardinals from 1987-89. His best season with Phoenix came in 1988 when he grabbed 38 passes for 569 yards and four touchdowns. Novacek led NFC tight ends with 26 catches after seven weeks before a hamstring injury limited him the rest of the 1988 campaign. In the season's third game against Tampa Bay (9/18), he caught five passes for 102 yards, including a 42-yarder for a touchdown late in the fourth quarter to win the game. Two weeks later against the Rams (10/2), Novacek caught a season-high nine passes. He opened the 1987 season as the starting tight end and caught seven passes for 101 yards, the most by a Cardinals' tight end since 1974, against San Diego (9/20). However, a broken bone in his elbow in the sixth game forced him to miss five weeks. In 1986 he sat out the first six games of the year with a broken thumb and the final two games with a strained knee. A sixth-round draft pick by the Cardinals in 1985, Novacek played mainly on special teams as a rookie. GAMES/STARTS: 1985 (16/0-Card.), 1986 (8/0-Card.), 1987 (7/4-Card.), 1988 (16/1-Card.), 1989 (16/1-Card.), 1990 (16/15), 1991 (16/12). Total - 95/33 (Dallas - 32/27)

He also participated in a celebrity cutting horse competition to benefit Texas A&M's children therapeutic program. Novacek hosts a one-week youth football camp at East Texas State University in Commerce, TX during the offseason. Jay and wife Yvette live on a 30-acre ranch in Denton, TX, with their yellow labrador dogs, Marlo and Teal and own a ranch in North Platte, NE. He donates time to help the Party Smart campaign, the Drug Abuse Resistance Education program and appeared on a 'Stay in School' poster for the Dallas All Sports Association. His brother Jason, also an outstanding decathlete, was signed as a free agent tight end by Cincinnati in 1990 after playing at Fresno State.

**PRO:** When the Cowboys claimed Mickey Pruitt off waivers from Chicago on August 27, 1991, he became the only veteran backup linebacker on a roster loaded with rookies. He added

depth and experience both at linebacker and on special teams, while helping ease the rookies' transition to the NFL. Pruitt, who was released by Chicago on the final cut, saw action on special teams in the Cowboys' first two games before suffering a pulled left hamstring that forced him onto injured reserve September 10. Re-activated October 11. Pruitt saw action in the second quarter against Cincinnati (10/13), replacing an injured Ken Norton at strongside linebacker and on his first play stopped James Brooks for a 1-yard loss. Against Phoenix (11/3) he tied for the team lead in special teams tackles with three. Two weeks later at the Giants (11/17), Pruitt earned his first start as a Cowboy, moving into the lineup at strong-side linebacker while Norton moved to the weakside, and he took full advantage of the opportunity, recording a single-game career-high nine tackles. Signed as a free agent by Chicago in 1988, Pruitt was used mainly as a nickel linebacker and a special teams player during his three years with the Bears. His first NFL start came against Buffalo (10/2) in the fifth game of his rookie year, and he also started the next week in Detroit (10/9). Two games later Pruitt started against San Francisco (10/24) and had a season-high six tackles before suffering a sprained ankle that forced him out of the Bears' next two games. In Chicago's win over Philadelphia (12/31) in the "Fog Bowl" to earn a berth in the NFC Championship Game, Pruitt recorded his first pro interception. In 1989 Pruitt missed two games midway through the year but returned to start against

Detroit (12/10). A starter in Chicago's last two regular-season games (Tampa Bay, 12/23 and Kansas City, 12/29) of 1990, Pruitt recorded six tackles in each of those starts and, against the Chiefs, his first career sack. He did not miss a game in 1990 despite breaking a bone in his left hand during practice on October 14. The Bears were 5-1 in Pruitt's six career starts. GAMES/STARTS: 1988 (14/3-Chic.), 1989 (14/1-Chic.), 1990 (16/2-Chic.), 1991 (12/1). Totals — 56/7 (Dallas-12/1).

**COLLEGE:** An All-America pick at safety in 1987, Pruitt set a school record for tackles by a defensive back with 116 his senior year at Colorado. He was Sports Illustrated's Player of the Week for his 18-yard interception return for a touchdown in Colorado's 26-17 win over Washington State. The three-time All-Big Eight pick started eight games as a freshman for the Buffaloes.

**PERSONAL:** Mickey Aaron Pruitt earned all-state honors at Chicago's Paul Robeson High School as a receiver, running back, safety and punt returner. He received his degree in communications from Colorado.

**Alfredo Roberts** 

**PRO:** A key Plan B acquisition from Kansas City following the 1990 season, Alfredo Roberts' presence was felt throughout the 1991 season in Dallas — a year in which Emmitt

Smith became the first Cowboys player to ever lead the NFL in rushing with 1,563 yards. Roberts, one of the more physical players among his NFL peers at the tight end position, was a key figure in the Cowboys' potent ground game. As the second tight end behind 1991 Pro Bowler Jay Novacek, Roberts saw action in all 16 games last year and drew starting assignments in 10 of those contests. From the receiving standpoint, he turned in his most productive season as a pro recording career-high numbers for catches (16) and receiving yardage (136) in a season. Roberts got off to a fast start in his debut outing as a Cowboy, tying his career-best mark for catches in a game with three for 33 yards in the season-opening win at Cleveland (9/1). He registered his longest catch as a Cowboy in his first starting assignment for Dallas — a 21-varder vs. the Giants (9/29) at Texas Stadium. After Novacek suffered an injured knee at New York (11/17), Roberts received the call for full-time duty in the Cowboys' next three wins over Washington (11/24), Pittsburgh (11/28) and New Orleans (12/8). During that stretch, he caught seven passes for 53 yards. His one-yard TD catch at Detroit (10/27) was the second scoring reception of his career, with his only other touchdown coming indoors also — at Seattle in 1989. A rugged player, who has also been very durable as a professional. Roberts has not missed one of his 64 career regular season games with the Cowboys and Chiefs since entering the NFL as an eighth-round draft choice in 1988. In 1990, he started 13 games and led all Kansas City tight ends in receptions with 11 catches for 119 yards, as the team earned an AFC wild card playoff berth. He registered his career-long reception in '90 - a 27-yarder against

Detroit (10/4). In 1989, Roberts made two starts and caught eight passes for 55 yards. He picked up his first career TD reception on a two-yard toss from Ron Jaworski that provided the winning margin in a 20-16 win over Seattle (10/8). As a rookie in 1988, Roberts started the first seven games of the season and became the Chiefs' lowestround draft choice to start on opening day since 1967. Roberts caught nine passes for 90 vards through the first six games of his rookie season but was slowed by a mid-season shoulder injury that required arthroscopic surgery following the season. GAMES/STARTS: 1988 (16/7-K.C.), 1989 (16/2-K.C.), 1990 (16/13-K.C.), 1991 (16/10). Total — 64/32 (Dallas-16/10).

COLLEGE: Roberts played for Jimmy Johnson-coached teams at the University of Miami that compiled an overall record of 41-8 from 1984 to 1987. As a senior, he shared the starting tight end position, catching 13 passes for 137 yards, as the Hurricanes finished 12-0 and captured the 1987 national championship with a win over Oklahoma in the Orange Bowl. His career numbers included 29 receptions for 296 yards and four touchdowns. Roberts was also a red-shirt freshman on the 1983 Miami national championship squad. His college teammate, long-time friend and fellow Ft. Lauderdale, FL native is Cowboys wide receiver Michael Irvin.

PERSONAL: Roberts was an all-city and (second team) all-state selection at South Plantation High School in Ft. Lauderdale, FL. He led his football team to two straight city championships and was a second-team all-state catcher/first baseman on the baseball team. He also led his team in hitting for two of his three high school baseball seasons. Roberts graduated from the nearby University of Miami with a degree in criminal justice. He has put his college major to work in the Dallas area by serving on the Law Enforcement Advisory Board at Dallas Baptist University. Roberts owns two houses in Broward County, FL that are used for a family-owned project called Home Sweet Home. The houses are operated to provide a home-styled family environment for handicapped children. Alfredo and his wife Angel live in Carrollton, TX.

PRO: The biggest indicator of the coaching staff's opinion of Mike Saxon is the team hasn't brought another punter to training camp since 1989. That show of support agrees with

Saxon, the team career record holder in gross (41.4) and net (34.9) punting averages. as the past three seasons have been his best as a pro. In 1991 he finished second in the National Football Conference and tied for fourth in the National Football League in net punting average with a 36.8 mark to better his career-high for the second consecutive year. After entering the season with a single-game best gross average of 48.8, Saxon exceeded that mark three times in 1991. Against Philadelphia (9/15) he averaged 49.5 yards, then against Phoenix (11/3) maintained a career-high 49.8 pace, the highest

by a Cowboys player since Danny White averaged 50.0 yards against the Rams in 1979. When Dallas handed Washington its only 1991 defeat at RFK (11/24), Saxon averaged 49.7 gross yards per punt, while keeping a 47.7 net pace to exceed his previous single-game high net average (43.3 vs. Redskins in 1985) by more than four vards. Meanwhile Saxon continued to be one of the league's masters at pinning opponents inside their 20-yard line. Last season he totaled 16 inside 20s to run his league-high total to 147 since 1985. He needs 12 punts inside the 20 to tie the club career mark of 159 set by Danny White from 1976-88. Over the final nine games of 1991, including playoffs, Saxon killed 11-of-his-33 punts inside the 20 while allowing only two touchbacks. Of his five career punts of 60-or-more yards, four came the past two seasons, including a career-long 64-yarder against Atlanta in 1991's regular-season finale. Some of Saxon's best games have come in the playoffs. In the Cowboys' first-round win over Chicago (12/29) last year, he knocked a 52-yard punt to pin the Bears at their own fouryard line with Dallas ahead 17-13 and two minutes remaining. In three postseason matches, Saxon averaged 45.7 yards with five inside the 20 on 15 punts. He needs five more punts to qualify for the NFL playoff record, currently held by Rich Camarillo with a 44.5 average. In a 1985 postseason game against the Rams (1/4/86), Saxon set a club playoff-record by averaging 46.9 yards. He enters 1992 with streaks of 76 straight games played, to tie for the team lead, and 143 straight punts without a block, the third longest in team history. His career-long stretch, also the second longest in club annals, without having a punt blocked is 190 from 1986-89. In 1990 Saxon finished fourth in the NFL in gross average with a career-high 43.2 mark, which is the fourth highest in team history and the best since 1969 when Ron Widby averaged 43.3 yards per boot. Saxon also tied for fourth in the league in punts inside the 20 with 20. He is the only NFL player to knock 16-or-more punts inside the opponents' 20 in each of the past six campaigns, including 1986 and 1987 when he led the league. In 1990 against Tampa Bay at Texas Stadium (10/7), Saxon earned a coaches' game ball after cornering the Bucs twice inside their 10-yard line. After signing with Dallas as a free agent in 1985, Saxon quickly showed he could handle pressure, despite his rookie status. His first NFL punt, against Washington (9/5) before a national Monday night television audience, sailed a season-long 57 yards. He wrapped up his best day as a pro with a 48.8 average, 43.3 net average and four punts inside the Redskins' 20. For his rookie season, Saxon averaged 41.9 yards per punt, highest ever by a Cowboys' rookie. In 1986 he set a Cowboys' record for punts in a season with 86 to eclipse the old mark of 82 set by Danny White in 1984. An 11th-round draft choice by Detroit in 1984, Saxon was released on the final cut after averaging 43.5 yards per kick in preseason. GAMES/STARTS: 1985 (16/0), 1986 (16/0). 1987 (12/0), 1988 (16/0), 1989 (16/0), 1990 (16/0), 1991 (16/0). Total - 108/0.

**COLLEGE:** A walk-on at San Diego State, Saxon set school records for punting average in a game (54.8 vs. BYU in '83), season (45.5 in '83) and career (44.1). The honorable mention All-America also holds the record for the longest punt in Aztecs history with an 80-yarder against BYU in 1982. Saxon attributes much of his punting success to his collegiate coach, Gary Zauner. Mike attended Pasadena City College before transferring to San Diego State.

PERSONAL: A native of Whittier, CA, Michael Eric Saxon starred in baseball and as a wide receiver, defensive back and punter at Arcadia High School. Mike, wife Sheri Jo and their daughter Erika Leigh (1/25/90) reside in Nellie Gale Ranch, CA, where Mike works in the real estate business. He also is an instructor with Ben Agajanian's youth kicking camps in Long Beach. In 1991 Saxon donated \$100 for each punt inside the 20 to the Dallas Children's Medical Center. He also appeared on the "DFW Classics Calendar," which was sold to raise money for the Kent Waldrep National Paralysis Foundation. Saxon majored in business management at San Diego State.

# **Derrick Shepard**

WIDE RECEIVER • OKLAHOMA HT: 5-10 • WT: 183 • BORN: 1/22/64 FA FOR '91 • 5th YEAR

**PRO:** With the added emphasis Cowboys Head Coach Jimmy Johnson has placed on special teams since coming to Dallas, Derrick Shepard's role as a return man has be-

come quite important to the club. Shepard understands that hard work on special teams has been his ticket to a career in the NFL, and this attitude has enabled Shepard to average 9.1 yards per punt return for his career (75 returns, 679 yards) and lead the Cowboys in punt returns and punt return yardage two of the past three seasons. Originally released on the final cut on August 26, 1991, Shepard re-signed with Dallas September 10 and returned both punts and kickoffs against Philadelphia (9/15) and Phoenix (9/22). Against Cincinnati (10/13) Shepard had three punt returns for 35 yards, including a 14-yarder his longest return since November 5, 1989 when he had a 17-yarder against Washington at RFK stadium. Two weeks later he had a 12-yard punt return at Detroit (10/27) before spraining his right ankle. He was placed on injured reserve October 29 and remained there the rest of the season. Also released on the final cut of preseason in 1990, he re-signed on September 6, but a hamstring injury landed him on injured reserve September 8. Re-activated November 2, Shepard returned punts the final eight games of the season, including a seasonhigh five punt returns for 45 yards against the Jets (11/4) in his first game back. Shepard joined the New Orleans Saints in 1989 as a Plan B signee from Washington, and opened the season with a 56-yard punt return for a touchdown against the Cowboys (9/10). Waived by the Saints on October 4, Dallas claimed him and he was the team's leading punt returner for the season. Injuries to the receiving corps earned Shepard his first NFL start at Kansas City (10/22), and he remained in the starting lineup eight of the final 10 games. Against Phoenix (10/29) Shepard had his finest day as a receiver, grabbing four receptions for 92 yards, including a career-long 37-yarder, for his first career touchdown reception. In 1988 he was limited to five games with Washington due to a hip injury and a concussion that forced him onto injured reserve.



#### SHEPARD, Cont.

Originally signed as a free agent by Washington in 1987, Shepard was released before the start of the regular season, re-signed by the Redskins following the second game and released again following the season's 11th week. He returned a punt 73 yards against St. Louis as a rookie. Washington re-signed Shepard the following spring. GAMES/STARTS: 1987 (2/0-Wash.), 1988 (5/0-Wash.), 1989 (4/0-N.O.; 11/8-Dallas), 1990 (8/0), 1991 (6/0). Total - 36/8 (Dallas-25/8).

**COLLEGE:** Shepard finished his collegiate career tied for second on Oklahoma's all-time receiving list with 70 catches. He caught a career-long 77-yard touchdown pass against lowa State in 1985. Against a Jimmy Johnson coached Oklahoma State team in 1983, Shepard scored on a 73-yard grab in the fourth quarter with Oklahoma down 20-6 in a game they came back to win 21-20. His best season came as a sophomore when he caught 24 passes for 305 yards. Shepard was a teammate of current Cowboys quarterback Troy Aikman and defensive tackle Tony Casillas at Oklahoma.

**PERSONAL:** Derrick Lathell Shepard attended Odessa, TX, High School. He majored in communications at Oklahoma and enjoys bowling. Derrick and wife Cheri have a daughter, Ashleigh (1/10/90).

**Emmitt Smith** 

PRO: Comparing Emmitt Smith to Tony Dorsett may be a bit premature since Dorsett, the NFL's No. 2 all-time rusher, spent 12 seasons amassing 12,739 yards, but after two

seasons, Smith's rushing totals are near carbons of Dorsett's start. Over the first 32 games of his career, Smith, the first running back taken in the first round by Dallas since Dorsett in 1977, has 606 carries for 2,500 yards (4.1 avg.) and 23 touchdowns while Dorsett posted 537 carries for 2,494 yards (4.6 avg.) and 19 touchdowns. Over his career (157 games) in Dallas, Dorsett averaged 17.6 carries and 76.7 yards per game, and Smith is currently averaging 18.9 carries and 78.1 yards per game. Always a goal setter, Smith entered 1991 with a number of plans, including a 1,500-yard rushing season, 40-to-50 receptions and a starting spot in the Pro Bowl. With 1,563 yards rushing in 1991, more than 11 teams gained, Smith met his first goal and became the first Cowboys player to lead the league in rushing, posting the second highest total in team history behind Dorsett's club record 1,646 yards in 1981. At 22 years and seven months of age, he became the youngest player in league history and 28th overall to rush for over 1,500 yards in a season, and that performance helped earn him a starting spot in the Pro Bowl, the first Cowboys player to go to back-to-back

Pro Bowls since Herschel Walker in 1987-88. If Smith were to repeat as the NFL's leading rusher in 1992, he would become the ninth player to lead the league in rushing in consecutive seasons and the first since Eric Dickerson in 1983 and 1984. By repeating his 1,500 yard season he would become only the fifth runner to post back-to-back 1,500 yard seasons, giving him 4,000 career yards and moving him ahead of Herschel Walker (3,388 yards) in the sixth spot and Walt Garrison (3,886) in the fifth spot on the Cowboys all-time rushing list. Smith also met his receiving goal in 1991 by hauling in 49 receptions, more than double his 1990 total of 24, to finish third on the team in receptions. With 365 carries he led the NFL, becoming the 19th player in league history to record over 350 carries in a season, and surpassed the club's season record of 361 carries by Herschel Walker in 1988. Smith, the third youngest player to reach the 500-carry plateau, joined Walter Payton and Barry Sanders as the only players to do so before their 23rd birthday. Even though he tied the club record with 414 carries and receptions, Smith lost just two fumbles on the year. His value to the Cowboys' success can be seen in the club's 11-1 record when he has rushed for 100 yards and 17-0 mark when he has carried the ball 18-or-more times in a game during his career. Since failing to lead the team in rushing vs. Philadelphia on Oct. 28, 1990, he has tied Walker's club record of consecutive games leading the team in rushing by topping the Cowboys ground attack in 26 straight games (31-of-34 for his career). The century mark has become a big number in Smith's career, having rushed for 100 yards in 82-of-117 games dating back to high school (45-of-49 at Escambia H.S., 25-of-34 at Florida and 12-of-34 at Dallas.) His eight 100-yard rushing games in 1991 were the second most in team history trailing only Tony Dorsett's club-record of nine from 1981, and, with 11 career 100-yard games. Smith is third on the Cowboys all-time 100-yard rushing games list behind Dorsett (43 games) and Calvin Hill (16). After opening the season with a 112-yard performance at Cleveland (9/1), Smith scored on a career-long 75-yard dash, the longest run in the NFC in 1991, and averaged a career-high 10.2 yards per carry in posting a 112-yard game vs. Washington (9/9). Smith, slowed by a stomach virus most of the game, was still able to come off the bench to record a team-high and single-game career-high eight receptions, including his first career touchdown pass. Against Phoenix (9/22) Smith earned NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors by putting together the third best rushing day in Cowboys history with a single-game career-high 182 yards rushing and two touchdowns, including a 60-yard TD run. With his 75 and 60-yard runs. Smith became the second player in team history to have more than one 60-yarder in the same season (Dorsett had an 84 and 77-yard run in 1977). Against the Cardinals (11/3) Smith lit up the scoreboard with three rushing touchdowns, giving him nine career scores in four career games vs. Phoenix. Smith played five games against the top three run defenses in the league (No. 1 - Philadelphia, No. 2 - New Orleans and No. 3 - Washington), but against the Redskins (11/24) Smith rushed for 132 yards, his second 100vard game against the Redskins in 1991 and the only two 100-yard games allowed by the Super Bowl Champions, on a single-game club record 34 carries. In that game Smith became the fourth player in team history to reach the 1,000-yard rushing plateau. marking the 12th time in team history and the first since Walker in 1988 to reach that milestone. Four days later he gained 109 yards against Pittsburgh (11/28), and the following week he became the only player to gain 100 yards rushing against the Saints (12/8) in 1991 by picking up 112 yards. With three straight 100-yard rushing games. Smith matched the second longest streak in team history set by Dorsett in 1981 and again in 1983. Smith's 160 yards and two touchdowns rushing against Atlanta (12/22) allowed him to surpass Sanders and Thurman Thomas to win the league rushing title. Smith also finished second in the NFC, and third in the NFL in yards from scrimmage, second in the NFL in touchdowns (13) and rushing touchdowns (12) and he tied the team season record of 12 rushing TDs set by Dorsett in 1977 and tied by Walker in 1986. Coupled with the 11 rushing touchdowns he had as a rookie, Smith

became the first player to post consecutive seasons of 10-or-more rushing touchdowns in team history. For all his late season heroics in the Cowboys playoff drive, Smith was named NFC Offensive Player of the Month for December. He then opened the playoffs in Chicago (12/29) by recording 105 yards against a Bears' team that had never allowed a running back to go over the century mark in postseason play, a record dating back to 1932 and spanning 27 games. Despite missing training camp and the preseason in 1990, Smith finished fifth in the NFC and 10th in the NFL with 937 rushing yards, tops among rookies. In addition, his 11 rushing touchdowns led NFL rookies, placed third in the NFC and fifth in the NFL. Smith earned his first professional start against the Giants (9/16) after little more than a week with the club, and the following week at Washington (9/23) he scored his first NFL touchdown. Smith's 241 carries broke Dorsett's rookie club record of 208 carries set in 1977, and his three 100-yard rushing games were the second most by a Cowboys' rookie to the four by Duane Thomas in 1970. A vital part of the Cowboys' four-game win streak late in the season. Smith caught four passes for a career-high 117 yards, including a career-long 57-yarder, against the Rams (11/18) in game one of the streak. Four days later he scored on a 48-yard scamper on his way to a season-high 132 yards rushing against Washington (11/22). Facing Phoenix (12/16), Smith rushed for 103 yards and four touchdowns to tie the club record for rushing touchdowns in a game set by Calvin Hill in 1971 and total touchdowns in a game by Hill and three others. The first rookie halfback to start for the Cowboys since Ron Springs in the 1979 season opener, Smith was named NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year by AP, Football News, Pro Football Weekly and Pro Set Trading Cards and made the All-Rookie team of The National, Pro Football Writers Association, UPI, Football Digest, College & Pro Football Newsweekly, Football News, and Pro Football Weekly. He also became the first Cowboys player to participate in the Pro Bowl since Walker in 1988. GAMES/ STARTS: 1990 (16/15), 1991 (16/16). Total - 32/31.

**COLLEGE:** An All-America and three time All-Southeastern Conference selection at Florida, Smith established 58 school records in three seasons, including a career rushing mark of 3,928 yards. He surpassed the 1,000-yard rushing mark in his seventh game, earlier than any player in college football history. He also became the second freshman to finish in the top 10 in the Heisman Trophy balloting (Herschel Walker was the other) and earned Freshman of the Year honors from UPI and The Sporting News. In 1989 he set a school single-game rushing mark with 316 yards against New Mexico on his way to a school-record 1,599 yards rushing for the season. In three seasons he became the fifth leading all-time rusher in SEC history and led the Gators in receiving in two-of-his-three seasons.

PERSONAL: Emmitt J. Smith III was a consensus All-America running back and prep Player-of-the-Year by PARADE Magazine and USA TODAY as a senior at Escambia, FL, High School. He posted the third highest career rushing and scoring totals in national high school history with 8,804 yards and 106 touchdowns. He also averaged 7.8 yards per carry, ran for over 100 yards 45 times and recorded only six fumbles. In 1986 he represented the nation's prep football players at the White House as part of the "Just Say No" anti-drug campaign. He was a Miller Lite NFL Player-ofthe-Year finalist in 1991 and had \$5,000 donated to the Sickle Cell Anemia Foundation of Dallas in his name. Smith also works with the Salvation Army, American Lung Association, and B.A.D. (Boxers Against Drugs), and he donated a sound system to the University of Florida for the weight room. Emmitt has three brothers - Erik, Emory and Emil - and two sisters - Marsha and Connie. Erik is a junior at Troy State, Emory is a freshman on the Clemson football team and Emil is involved in track at Escambia High School. Emmitt's mother, father and sister, Marsha, head up Emmitt Inc., a marketing and promotions company that handles Smith's merchandising. Emmitt continued working toward a degree in therapeutic recreation at Florida in the offseason.

**PRO:** Two years ago, in the final game of the 1990 season, Vinson Smith earned his first start as a Dallas Cowboy in a sustitute role for the injured Ken Norton at the weekside

linebacker position. He repsonded with a team-high 11 solo tackles and a fumble recovery in that game at Atlanta, and, in the process, Smith opened the eyes of the Cowboys coaches who made him a full-time starter at that position in the summer of 1991. Twelve regular season starts later, Smith was the sixth leading tackler on a defense that ranked No. 8 in the NFL against the run (98.2 yds. per game) while the Cowboys earned their first playoff spot in six years. A bout with hepatitis forced Smith to miss a mid-season stretch of three straight games against Phoenix (11/3), Houston (11/10) and New York (11/17). He led the defense in tackles in two of the four games prior to his illness vs. the N.Y. Giants (9/29) with a careerhigh 12 stops and against Cincinnati (10/13) with nine tackles. His aggressive, hardhitting style of play was especially effective in the run-oriented NFC East. Last year, he averaged 6.8 tackles per game in the six games that he played against divisional foes. In his first year as a Cowboy in 1990, Smith surfaced as an invaluable special teams player, and a very capable substitute at weak side linebacker. He collected 22 tackles on kick coverage situations - a total that was second only to Cowboys special teams captain Bill Bates (23). Smith earned a special teams game ball for his performance in the Cowboys' 17-13 win over the Saints (12/2). In his first Cowboys game Smith recovered a fumble on the opening kickoff of the second half vs. the Chargers (9/9). He joined the Cowboys as a Plan B signee from Pittsburgh in 1990. Smith missed the 1989 season with the Steelers because of a foot injury. He entered the NFL by making the Atlanta Falcons roster as a free agent in 1988. He then moved on to Pittsburgh via the Plan B route after appearing in three games with the Falcons in 1988. An injured elbow limited his playing time with Atlanta. GAMES/STARTS: 1988 (3/0-Atl.), 1989 (IR-Pitt.), 1990 (16/1), 1991 (13/12). Total - 32/13 (Dallas - 29/13).

**COLLEGE:** A two-year starter at inside linebacker, Smith led East Carolina in tackles each of his last two seasons, including 118 as a senior. Smith, who spent his first two seasons as a defensive lineman, finished his collegiate career with 294 tackles, four interceptions and two fumble recoveries. Robert Jones, the Cowboys' second first round pick in the 1992 draft, is also a former middle linebacker from East Carolina.

**PERSONAL:** Vinson Robert Smith earned all-state honors in both football and baseball at Statesville, NC, High School. He received his degree in communications at East Carolina. Vinson enjoys reading and working with mentally handicapped children in North Carolina. He has a daughter, Jayme (12/23/84).

**PRO:** In 1991, the Dallas Cowboy offensive unit stepped up to the forefront of productivity in the National Football League, producing the NFL's top rusher in

Emmitt Smith (1,563 yards) and the leader in receiving yardage, Michael Irvin (1,523 yards). It was the first time in league history that one team had produced both statistical leaders in the same season, and, when the plaudits for that success were issued at season's end, Mark Stepnoski's name was frequently mentioned as a quietly consistent force at the center of the Cowboys' offensive line. The starting center in each of the Cowboys' last 36 games. Stepnoski has a current streak of consecutive starts that is tops among all Dallas offensive players. In 1991, he was a key figure in an offensive line that was easily the team's most dramatically improved position group. In addition to Smith and Irvin's numbers, the Cowboys' offensive line permitted two-sacksor-less in 11 of the 16 regular season games last year, while surrendering one sack-or-less on eight different occasions. As a result, Dallas guarterbacks Troy Aikman and Steve Beuerlein passed for 3,663 yards — the club's highest figure since 1985 — the year the team last qualified for the NFL playoffs. An intelligent and physically tough competitor with an abundance of natural football instincts. Stepnoski has the type of ability that has quickly earned him the respect of his opponents around the NFL. In 1991 he was awarded a coaches' game ball following a dominant performance in the Cowboys' 20-17 win over Green Bay in Milwaukee. Throughout all of 1991 and 1990, he has consistently graded out among the Cowboys' top offensive linemen on a weekly basis. Stepnoski is the highest draft choice (3rd round - 57th overall in 1989) of all Dallas' offensive linemen. He finished his rookie season in 1989 by starting the final four games at center and grading out as the team's best offensive lineman during that stretch. He was the first rookie to start at center for Dallas since Robert Shaw in 1979. Stepnoski was part of the Cowboys' 1989 draft class that produced four current starters - Troy Aikman, Daryl Johnston, Stepnoski and Tony Tolbert — in the first four rounds. GAMES/STARTS: 1989 (16/4). 1990 (16/16), 1991 (16/16). Total - (48/36).

**COLLEGE:** Stepnoski became a starting guard for Pitt in the third game of his freshman year. As a sophomore in 1986 he earned third-team All-America notice and made the Football News Sophomore All-America team. He was slowed by an ankle injury in '87 that forced him to miss his only college game, but he rebounded to win first-team All-America honors in '88. He also was named an Outland Trophy finalist and Lombardi Award semifinalist that year. Stepnoski was a two-time Academic All-America and in '88 was one of 11 National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame scholar-athletes.

**PERSONAL:** Mark Matthew Stepnoski attended Cathedral Prep High School in his native Erie, PA, where he was a star football player and member of the National Honor Society. In 1984 Mark was named a high school football All-America by USA Today and Parade Magazine. Tony Tolbert DEFENSIVE END • TEXAS-EL PASO HT: 6-6 • WT: 265 • BORN: 12/29/67 D-4 FOR '89 • 4th YEAR

**PRO:** Tony Tolbert is a former project player who has produced. The fourth round draft choice — who checked in as a 230 pound outside linebacker in 1989 — has carved

out a spot as a very active and physical end in a rapidly improving Dallas front four. In 1991, Tolbert's first complete season as a full-time starter (left end), he made a visible impact on a defense that finished the year ranked No. 8 against the run in the NFL, allowing just 98.2 rushing yards per game. An active run-stopper, Tolbert also led the Cowboys in sacks (7) and quarterback pressures (25), while tying for the lead among defensive linemen in passes batted down with five. He closed out the season ranked fifth on the team in tackles with 73 - a figure that was also the best among his defensive line mates. Tolbert has started the last 19 regular season games, giving him the longest such streak on the line. His nine tackles at Houston (11/10) and at the Giants (11/17) were single game-highs among Cowboy defensive linemen in 1991 and second only to his career-best 11 tackle performance at Atlanta in 1990. He finished tied for second on the team in forced fumbles with two (vs. Phoenix and Atlanta) and he picked up his lone fumble recovery of the year at Green Bay (10/6). From weeks four through eight in 1991, he put together a five game streak where he accounted for four of his team-leading seven sacks. In 1990, Tolbert played at both end positions and at tackle in nickel pass rushing downs. He started the last three games of the season at right end, and collected 18 tackles, eight QB pressures, one sack and one forced fumble in those final three outings. Tolbert finished the year ranked third in sacks with 6.0. He also finished third on the squad in quarterback pressures with 24. In 1989, he made his NFL starting debut against the defending Super Bowl Champion San Francisco 49ers (10/15), marking the first start by a Cowboy rookie defensive end since Randy White in 1975. The following week in Kansas City, he had one of his best career outings with 10 tackles, a pass defensed and a forced fumble. Drafted in the fourth round, Tolbert is the highest NFL draft pick from Texas-El Paso since Fred Carr was selected in the first round by Green Bay in 1968. He is also part of the Cowboys' 1989 draft class that produced four current starters - Troy Aikman, Daryl Johnston, Mark Stepnoski and Tolbert - in the first four rounds. GAMES/STARTS: 1989 (16/5), 1990 (16/4), 1991 (16/16). Total - (48/25).

**COLLEGE:** A team captain his senior year, Tolbert led Texas-El Paso to a 10-2 record, their best since 1931, and their first bowl appearance since 1967. He earned All-Western Athletic Conference and honorable mention All-America honors after leading the Miners in sacks with 11 and tackles for a loss with 15 in 1988.

**PERSONAL:** Tony Lewis Tolbert earned all-conference recognition at Dwight Morrow High School in Englewood, NJ, where he grew up a big fan of the New York Giants. He joins his fellow defensive end Jim Jeffcoat, as natives of the Garden State. Tolbert earned his degree in criminal justice from UTEP following his second season in the NFL.

Mark Tuinei TACKLE • HAWAII HT: 6-5 • WT: 299 • BORN: 3/31/60 FA FOR '83 • 10th YEAR

**PRO:** Mark Tuinei enters his seventh season as the starting left tackle for Dallas, and joins Bill Bates and Jim Jeffcoat in finishing a decade in the NFL. Tuinei,

who has played in more NFL games (112) than any other Cowboys offensive player, started the first five games of the season and earned offensive player of the game honors from the coaching staff for his blocking at Phoenix (9/22) during Emmitt Smith's 182-yard rushing outburst. Against the Giants (9/29) Tuinei suffered a groin injury that forced him to miss the next four contests, but he returned to the starting lineup at Houston (11/10) and remained there the rest of the season. He played a key role in blocking for Smith who led the NFL in rushing in 1991 and was the only player to rush for over 100 yards against Washington (twice) and New Orleans, and the Cowboys line was also the first to keep the powerful Saints defense from recording a sack in 1991. For the season Tuinei and the offensive line led Smith to eight 100 yard rushing days and helped land four offensive players (Smith, Michael Irvin, Jay Novacek and Troy Aikman) in the Pro Bowl. Tuinei started all 13 games he played in 1990, missing three games with a sprained right knee suffered in the Jets game (11/4). After being slowed with an injured left knee in 1987 and 1988, Tuinei started all 16 games in 1989. Working mostly against All-Pro Lawrence Taylor, Tuinei earned player of the game honors after Dallas held the Giants (10/1) without a sack. He originally injured his left knee in the 1987 Thanksgiving Day game against Minnesota and missed the rest of the year. He re-injured the knee after five games in 1988 and again sat out the remaining games. It took a few years before Tuinei settled at the left tackle position. He made the club in 1983 as a free agent defensive tackle where he played for two years. After moving to the offensive line in 1985, he backed up Tom Rafferty at center. In 1986 Tuinei worked at all three offensive line positions in training camp until injuries in the defensive line forced him to split practice time between offensive and defensive tackle. Against Denver in 1986 he led the Cowboys defensive linemen with six tackles while playing for injured Randy White. The next week against Washington he became the starting left offensive tackle. GAMES/STARTS: 1983 (10/0), 1984 (16/0), 1985 (16/0), 1986 (16/11), 1987 (8/8), 1988 (5/4), 1989 (16/16), 1990 (13/13), 1991 (12/12). Total - 112/64.

**COLLEGE:** Tuinei played his first two collegiate seasons at UCLA where he started at defensive tackle as a sophomore, finishing fifth on the team in tackles. He transferred to Hawaii but was nagged by injuries his senior year and played in only seven games.

**PERSONAL:** Mark Pulemau Tuinei (TOO-ee-nay) was born in Oceanside, CA, and raised in Honolulu, where he starred at Punahou High School. He was Hawaii prep lineman of the year as a senior, a state shot put champion and an all-star basketball player. His brother Tom was an All-Western Athletic Conference defensive tackle at Hawaii and played for the Detroit Lions and the Canadian Football League's Edmonton Eskimos. He also has a cousin, Dan Saleaumua, who is a nose tackle for the Kansas City Chiefs. Mark and wife Ponolani live in Carrollton, TX with their Rottweiler, Shaku Zulu, and Lhasa Apso, Lil' Mama.



Alan Veingrad

OFFENSIVE TACKLE • EAST TEXAS STATE HT: 6-5 • WT: 280 • BORN: 7/24/63 FA FOR '91 • 6th YEAR

PRO: As one of Dallas' two 1991 Plan B acquisitions to make the club in August, Alan Veingrad's presence along the Cowboys offensive line paid valuable dividends right on

through to the NFC playoffs in January of 1992. After coming to the Cowboys from Green Bay last year, Veingrad's versatility, intelligence and experience enabled him to contribute in key situations at tackle, guard and as a third tight end on short vardage situations. Providing much needed depth along the offensive front, Veingrad was a visible part of a Cowboys' offensive line that was easily the team's most improved position group in 1991. Although used mostly in a utility capacity, his efforts helped Emmitt Smith lead the NFL in rushing with 1,563 yards, while also providing the pass protection that enabled Michael Irvin to lead the league in receiving yards with 1,523. He also assisted an unheralded unit that permitted two-sacks-or-less in 11 of the 16 regular season games last year, while surrendering one sack-or-less on eight different occasions. His introduction to full-time play with Dallas began in the (9/29) win over the Giants when starting left tackle Mark Tuinei went down in the first quarter with a groin injury. Veingrad stepped into Tuinei's spot vs. Lawrence Taylor and the defending Super Bowl champions and helped lead Dallas to a 21-16 win. He then started at left tackle for the next three straight games at Green Bay (10/6, his first Cowboy start), Cincinnati (10/13) and at Detroit (10/17) in a three game stretch where the Cowboys permitted just three guarterback sacks in 113 passing plays. He earned his fourth start of the year at right guard in Philadelphia (12/15) in place of the injured John Gesek. On that day, the Dallas line limited the NFL's most powerful defensive front to just one quarterback sack, while registering a 25-13 win. Veingrad started four games at offensive tackle for Green Bay in 1990. In 1989, he started the entire 16 game schedule at right tackle - playing ahead of the highly regarded rookie, Tony Mandarich, who was widely considered to be the top line prospect to come out of the college ranks since Anthony Munoz. The 1989 season was a success in more ways than one for Veingrad, as he returned to action after a career-threatening hip injury, and surgery, forced him to miss the entire 1988 season. The nature of the surgery required a very extensive rehabilitation process that has enabled him to return to 100% health. Veingrad earned a roster spot with the Packers as a free agent in 1986 and proceeded to win the starting right tackle job in camp. He started all 16 games as a rookie and played in 11 of 12 games - with two starts - in 1987. Veingrad had tryouts with both Tampa Bay, with whom he signed after the 1985 NFL draft, and Houston prior to making the Packer roster in 1986. GAMES/STARTS: 1986 (16/16-G.B.), 1987 (11/2-G.B.), 1988 (I.R.-G.B.), 1989 (16/16-G.B.), 1990 (16/4-G.B.), 1991 (16/4). Total - (75/42) (Dallas - 16/4).

**COLLEGE:** Veingrad was a two-time All-Lone Star Conference selection at East Texas State. A four-year letterman, he was also the team captain as a junior and senior in 1983 and '84. Following his senior season, he was named to the Kodak All-America team, as well as earning National Strength and Conditioning All-America honors. Veingrad was also a member of the East Texas track (discus) team for three years.

**PERSONAL:** Born in Brooklyn, New York, Alan Stuart Veingrad graduated from Sunset High School in Miami, Florida. He earned a degree in health and physical education at East Texas State University. His interests include fishing, reading, bike riding and racquetball. He resides in Miami.



James Washington

SAFETY • UCLA HT: 6-1 • WT: 197 • BORN: 1/10/65 FA FOR '90 • 5th YEAR

**PRO:** Like in Hollywood, James Washington's work as a supporting actor for three years finally paid off in 1991 when he got his chance at the lead role. Washington, for

the first time in his career, entered the season as a starter, and with Dallas added emphasis on stopping the run in 1991, Washington finished second on the team in tackles, leading all defensive backs, with a single-season career-high 113 stops, topping the 101 tackles he had his first three NFL seasons combined. He led the team in double-figure tackle games with four and led or tied for the team lead in tackles five times, including a single-game career-high 16 tackles against the Giants (11/17) which tied him for the team's single-game season high. His 16 stops were the most by a Cowboys defensive back since Vince Albritton had 16 tackles vs. the Giants in 1990. Against Phoenix (9/22) Washington recorded 10 stops to lead the team in tackles for the first time in his career, and the following week he had 11 tackles and forced a fumble at the Dallas six-yard line against Giants (9/29) to prevent a score. He led the team with his 11 tackle performance against Phoenix (11/3) and recorded his first interception of 1991 when he picked off a pass at the Dallas 11-yard line to deny the Cardinals a score. Against Philadelphia (12/15), Washington, who finished third on the team in passes defensed with nine, intercepted his second pass of the season and batted away two others as Dallas clinched its first playoff spot since 1985. A Plan B signee from the Rams, he earned his first NFL start at free safety in 1990 against San Diego (9/9). He went on to start 10-ofthe-15 games he played, including the final eight at strong safety, led the Cowboys in forced fumbles and tied for the team lead in interceptions. His 70 tackles led Dallas defensive backs, and his three interceptions and two recovered fumbles led to four Dallas touchdowns and a field goal. Washington earned NFC Defensive Player of the Week Honors against Phoenix (12/16) when he was involved in three turnovers - two interceptions and a fumble that he forced and recovered - that led to three touchdowns. He had a season-high nine tackles against San Francisco (11/11), and two weeks later vs. Washington (11/22) he recorded his first interception as a Cowboy. With the Rams in 1989 Washington played behind Vince Newsome at free safety before suffering a thigh injury that forced him to miss the final half of the year. Drafted in the fifth round by the Rams in 1988, Washington finished second on the team in special teams tackles as a rookie and recorded his first NFL interception, against Seattle (10/23). GAMES/STARTS: 1988 (16/0-Rams), 1989 (8/0-Rams), 1990 (15/10) 1991 (16/16). Total - 55/26 (Dallas-31/26).

**COLLEGE:** A four-year starter at UCLA, Washington led the Bruins in tackles his first two years. He also led the team in interceptions his freshman year. Washington earned honorable mention All-America honors as a freshman and was a second-team All-America his sophomore year. His UCLA teammates included current Cowboys Troy Aikman, Frank Cornish and Ken Norton.

**PERSONAL:** James McArthur Washington earned All-America honors at Jordan High School in Los Angeles, CA, where he caught 31 touchdown passes and had 12 interceptions. He also set a city record with a 95-yard interception return. This spring James and wife Dana were Honorary Chairmen of the sixth annual Easter Seals "Back a Fighter" campaign, helping raise money for children with disabilities. He has also organized a student outreach program in Los Angeles to motivate

youngsters to stay in school and away from drugs. Washington, who earned his degree in history from UCLA, owns Summation Financial in Los Angeles. The Washingtons have a daughter Shanel (8/14/84) and a son Richard (3/15/91).

PRO: Chuck Weatherspoon joined the Cowboys March 9, 1991, bringing both powerful running skills and soft hands as a receiver to the Dallas backfield. Originally drafted in

the ninth round by Philadelphia in 1991, Weatherspoon was released at the end of training camp and claimed by Tampa Bay. He saw action in the Buccaneeers' first four games before being released. Detroit then signed him to the practice squad where he spent the rest of 1991. GAMES/STARTS: 1991 (4/0-T.B.)

COLLEGE: An All-America and two-time All-Southwest Conference selection at Houston, Weatherspoon is the conference's all-time leader in all-purpose yards (5,715) and broke Robert Newhouse's school rushing record with 3,247 yards in his career, becoming the first Houston back to gain over 1,000 yards three times. He finished third in the nation in all-purpose yardage as a junior, averaging 217.4 yards a game.

PERSONAL: Johnny Weatherspoon, Jr. earned all-state honors at La Habra, CA, High School, where he particiapted in football, baseball, track, basketball and wrestling. An industrial distribution major at Houston, Weatherspoon was also active in Boys and Girls Club and Star of Hope while in school. Chuck has two brothers -Anthony, who was a fullback at Colorado, and Linton, who was a defensive end at Houston - and a sister, Dawn.

PRO: Playing offensive tackle in the National Football League takes almost as much mental strength as physical power. Because he was making the jump to the NFL from

tiny Central State University in Wilberforce, OH, Erik Williams required even greater

internal fortitude, however from the time he even took part in his first pro minicamp, Williams never backed down from anybody. "What I like most is that he's nasty," said 10-year defensive end Jim Jeffcoat, who practiced against Williams last year. "He has a mean streak. He didn't care what anybody thought. You can tell players the first day and he was a player." Against Green Bay (10/6) in his first significant playing time of 1991, first subbing some at left tackle then replacing injured Nate Newton for most of the fourth guarter at right tackle, Williams faced the intimidation tactics of the Packers' defense and responded with a big effort as Dallas did not allow a sack. In addition Emmitt Smith's game-long 26-yard scamper to set up the winning field goal in the fourth quarter came over Williams on the right side. Smith finished the day with 122 yards rushing, including 56 in the fourth guarter. Against Phoenix (11/3) in his first NFL start, in place of injured Mark Tuinei at left tackle, Williams opposed Cardinals pass-rushing terror Ken Harvey, who in the first half chalked up three sacks. After some technique adjustments at halftime, Williams held Harvey without a sack the rest of the game. "He got me a couple of times. but I held my own," said Williams. "I learned a lesson." Two weeks later against the Giants (11/17), Williams started at right tackle in place of injured Newton and was a big part of the effort that held New York to a lone sack, which came in the fourth quarter. Williams also started at right tackle the next game at RFK (11/24) when Dallas handed the Redskins their only home defeat of the season. For most of the afternoon Williams worked against Washington All-Pro defensive end Charles Mann, who finished the game with two tackles and no sacks. In the regular-season finale against Atlanta (12/22), Williams replaced Newton at right tackle for most of the second half then helped Dallas rally for a fourth-quarter touchdown to beat the Falcons 31-27. The first Central State offensive lineman ever drafted by the NFL, Williams was only the third player selected by the league in the history of the school. Defensive back Vince Buck, a second-round pick by New Orleans in 1990, and defensive end Curtis Anderson, a fifth-round choice by Dallas in 1979, were the only prior draftees from the small college. Linebacker Victor Simmons, who played for Dallas in 1987, is the only former Central State player to make a Cowboys' regular-season roster. GAMES/STARTS: 1991 (11/3)

**COLLEGE:** A small college All-America as a senior, Williams paved the way for a Central State offense that led the NAIA in total offense with 492 yards per game and in scoring with 54.8 points per game in 1990, when the Marauders captured the NAIA national title and had an average winning margin of 33.5 points. Central State made the playoffs each of Williams' four seasons there. Recruited as a defensive tackle, Williams was moved to offensive line prior to his freshman year and became the starting left tackle as a sophomore.

**PERSONAL:** Erik George Williams grew up an Eagles' fan in Philadelphia. Prior to 1991, he last witnessed a game at Veterans Stadium in 1984 when Dallas played the Eagles and came away with a 24-10 victory. After starring at John Bartram High School, Williams was recruited by several major colleges but barely missed the academic requirements to play at those schools. He also competed in the shotput and discus in high school. Williams majored in physical education at Central State.

**PRO:** Few defensive people can say they look forward to facing the Run-and-Shoot offense, but for defensive back Robert Williams facing the wide open passing

attack more and more teams are starting to employ has become his forte. For the 1992 season the versatile Williams will also be attacking these offenses from a free safety position, where he worked during the offseason. He saw action in all 16 games in 1991, including starts at weakside linebacker against Houston (11/10) and Atlanta (12/22). Against these Run-and-Shoot offenses and on occasion against Washington (9/9) and Detroit (10/27) he was brought in to cover wide receivers in their multiple wide-out sets. For the season Williams was the leading tackler among non-starters with 49, including a team high eight tackles in the regular-season finale against the Falcons. He was the only non-lineman with a sack in 1991, recording the first of his career at Phoenix (9/22) when he brought down Tom Tupa and forced a fumble that Dallas recovered. After blocking a punt to set up a third quarter touchdown and intercepting a pass at the Cowboys 5-yard line vs. Phoenix (11/3), Williams was awarded a special teams game ball. The next week at Houston (11/10) he returned a blocked punt 18 yards for his first career touchdown and recorded 10 tackles, tying his single-game career high. Williams, who also saw action at the right corner spot vs. Philadelphia (12/15) filling in for an injured Larry Brown, played a valuable role on the Cowboys' special teams units, recording nine tackles. Over the past four seasons only Issiac Holt, with 41 passes defensed, has knocked down more balls for the Cowboys than Williams with 39. He saw action in every game in 1990, starting the first six at right cornerback and filling the right corner spot in the nickel defense the second half of the season. Against the N.Y. Giants (9/16) he recorded a season-high eight tackles and against Philadelphia (12/23) he recorded the third interception of his career. In 1989 Williams tied for the team lead in passes defensed with 10 and opened the season by tying a career-high with 10 tackles at New Orleans (9/10). After missing three games with a sprained left knee, Williams knocked down four passes against Phoenix (10/29) and three more against Washington (11/5). In 1988 Williams tied for the team lead in interceptions and finished second in passes defensed with 19. In the Cowboys' victory over Washington (12/11) he knocked down four passes and set up the winning touchdown with an interception. A running back in college, Williams signed as a free agent wide receiver with Washington in 1986 but was released before the season began. After signing him in 1987 Dallas moved Williams to cornerback. The Cowboys released Williams on the final cut then re-signed him after two games. GAMES/STARTS: 1987 (11/3), 1988 (16/14), 1989 (13/11), 1990 (16/6), 1991 (16/2). Total - 72/36.

**COLLEGE:** Williams was used mainly as a receiver in passing situations at Baylor. In 1985 he rushed for 409 yards on 119 carries and caught 19 passes for 210 yards. He backed up Alfred Anderson, now with the Vikings, his first two seasons and former Cowboy Ron Francis to begin his junior year in 1984.

**PERSONAL:** Robert Cole Williams was the football and track MVP at Ball High School in Galveston, TX, where he won the district high hurdles title

as a senior. A business management major at Baylor, Robert donates his time to the March of Dimes in Dallas, speaks against drug abuse in Dallas, Cleburne and Galveston schools, and works with Clown Ministries, which visit children's hospitals in the Dallas area. This offseason Williams and Minnesota Vikings defensive back Todd Scott organized a celebrity basketball game to raise money for the Galveston Boys Club. Robert has a daughter, Davina (11/29/83), and a son, Brandon (12/13/86).

Alexander Wright WIDE RECEIVER • AUBURN HT: 6-0 • WT: 190 • BORN: 7/19/67 D-2 FOR '90 • 3rd YEAR



**PRO:** Alexander Wright has the type of brilliant athletic tools that make him a threat to score a touchdown from any position on the field. Last June, he won the DHL/NFL's

Fastest Man competition in Palm Springs with a winning 60-yard dash time of 6.14 against the Cardinals' Randal Hill in the finals. Wright has also been timed at 4.14 in the forty at the Cowboys' Valley Ranch running track in April of 1991. An intense weight room worker, "Ace" has a unique blend of speed, guickness and upper body strength makes him a difficult player for defenders to jam at the line of scrimmage. In 1991, he surfaced as one of the league's most dangerous kickoff return men, finishing the season with a 24.5 yard average that was third in the NFL behind Detroit's Mel Gray (25.8) and San Diego's Nate Lewis (25.1). He electrified a Texas Stadium crowd in the season finale by going the distance for 102 yards and a touchdown against Atlanta - registering the longest kickoff return of the year, and the longest in the NFL since Ira Mathews of the Raiders went 104 yards against San Diego in 1979. His 102-yard effort was also the best ever by a Dallas player. A 71-yard kickoff return vs. Phoenix (11/3) has helped push his career average to 23.9 yards per effort. He was the starter in the first eight games of the season at wide receiver (took the first snap in only five of those games due to two-tight end alignment) before yielding to promising rookie Alvin Harper. His three catches at Detroit (10/27) tied his careerbest outing vs. Philadelphia (10/28) as a rookie in 1990. Wright picked up his careerlongest pass reception - a 53-yarder from Troy Aikman - to set up Dallas first touchdown against Cincinnati (10/13). He also had a 38-yard effort in the first guarter of the win over the Giants (9/29) at Texas Stadium. Wright missed nearly the entire 1990 training camp while waiting to sign his rookie contract, and was only able to contribute on a limited basis that year. The majority of his action came as a member of the Dallas special teams, where he returned kickoffs and registered three tackles on the coverage unit. His game-breaking ability was showcased early in his career,

in Week 2 against the Giants (9/16), when he took a first-half kickoff and out ran the coverage for a 90-yard touchdown. He closed the '90 season with 12 kickoff returns for 276 yards and 11 catches for 104 yards. Selected by the Cowboys with the first pick in the second round of the 1990 draft (26th overall), Wright was the first wide receiver drafted in 1990. The highest Auburn player ever drafted by the Cowboys, Wright was also the highest wide receiver selected by the NFL from Auburn since Terry Beasley was taken with the 19th pick by San Francisco in 1972. Only four other Cowboy wide receivers have been selected higher than Wright: Alvin Harper (12th pick, in 1991), Michael Irvin (11th, 1988), Mike Sherrard (21st, 1986) and Dennis Homan (3rd, 1968). GAMES/STARTS: 1990 (15/1), 1991 (16/5). Total — (31/6).

COLLEGE: "Ace" averaged 24.3 yards per reception in 13 starts at Auburn. Prior to his senior year, he was a backup at wide receiver to Lawyer Tillman who was the Browns' second-round selection in 1989. One out of every five of his 56 collegiate catches went for a touchdown, and six of those 11 TD grabs covered distances of more than 50 yards. While playing on teams that compiled a 39-7-2 record, Wright was a member of four bowl teams and set the Auburn school record for career yards-per-catch at 23.6. In the '89 season opener against Pacific, he set school single-game records with 263 receiving yards and an average of 52.6 yards-per-catch on five receptions. That game produced Wright TD catches of 78, 73, 60 and 41 yards. He grabbed a careerhigh seven passes in his final regular-season game as a senior vs. Alabama. A stand-out track athlete, he won the 1988 SEC championship in the 55-meter and 200-meter sprints. He also became only the second athlete in conference history to be named All-America in three events (55-meters, 200-meters, and 4 x 100 relay). His time of 6.18 in the 55-meter dash tied him with Bo Jackson for sixth place on the all-time Auburn chart.

**PERSONAL:** Last spring, Wright served as the honorary coach for the Texas entry in the 1992 U.S. Transplant Games — a national competition for transplant recipients held in Los Angeles. Wright earned his degree in adult education from Auburn. He and his wife Veerle make their home in nearby Lewisville, TX.

# **Other Cowboys With Pro Experience**

- Rich Bartlewski, a 6-4, 239-pound tight end from Fresno State, caught 14 passes for 122 yards for Montreal of the World League this year. Originally signed as a free agent by the Raiders in 1990, Bartlewski (Bart-less-key) played in the Raiders' final four regular-season games as a rookie. In 1991 he was signed as a free agent by Atlanta and played in one game for the Falcons. An All-Big West Conference pick in 1989, Bartlewski was backed up at Fresno State by Jason Novacek, brother of Cowboys tight end Jay Novacek. Born in Butler, PA (8/15/67), Bartlewski starred at Chowchilla Union High School in Chowchilla, CA.
- Tony Burse, a 6-0, 218-pound running back from Middle Tennessee State, had 28 carries for 86 yards and 22 receptions for 215 yards for Sacramento of the World League this spring. In 1991 he captained the Surge's special teams and recorded 13 receptions for 72 yards. Originally drafted by Seattle in the 12th round in 1987, he saw action in 12 games, with seven carries for 36 yards. Seattle released Burse during training camp in 1988, and he later signed with Miami for the final game of the season. Seattle signed him as a Plan B free agent in 1989, but he was released prior to the season. A two-time all-Ohio Valley Conference selection at Middle Tennessee State, Burse caught 63 passes for 715 yards and two tuchdowns during his career. He attended Lafayette, GA, High School.
- Anthony Butts, a 6-4, 300-pound, defensive tackle from Mississippi State, had 21 tackles and four quarterback pressures this spring with the Ohio Glory of the World League. In 1991 he played with Raleigh-Durham (which became the Glory in 1992) compiling 16 stops in nine games. Originally a 10th round draft choice of the Denver Broncos in 1989, Butts was released during preseason and signed by Tampa Bay, who then released him before the start of the season. A three year starter at Mississippi State, he totaled 178 tackles during his career. A native of Atlanta, GA (8/12/66), Butts earned All-America honors at Fulton High School.
- Maurice Crum, a 6-0, 220-pound linebacker from the University of Miami, spent last season on Tampa Bay's practice squad. Signed as a free agent by the Buccaneers in 1991, Crum made Tampa Bay's final 47-man roster but was moved to the practice squad the next day. Crum, the Hurricane's leading tackler his last three seasons at Miami, earned first-team All-America honors and was a finalist for the Butkus Award his senior year. A draftee of the Chicago White Sox out of high school, Crum also played baseball at Miami. He attended Hillsborough High School in Tampa, FL.
- Jason Garrett, a 6-2, 195-pound quarterback from Princeton, was with Ottawa of the Canadian Football League for 13 games in 1991. In the spring of 1991, Garrett started for San Antonio of the World League but suffered a separated shoulder in the opener. He came back to complete 60-of-113 passes for 609 yards, three touchdowns and three interceptions. Originally signed by New Orleans in 1989, Garrett spent his rookie year on the Saints developmental roster. He was released by New Orleans piror to the 1990 seson. Named the Ivy League Player of the Year in 1988, Garrett attended Univeristy High School in Chagrin, OH.

Lorenzo Graham, who averaged 7.8 yards per carry and 25.2 yards per kick return for British Columbia of the Canadian Football League in 1991, joined the Cowboys practice squad after the CFL season last fall. Originally signed by Toronto in 1988, the 5-11, 200-pound fullback from Livingston University went to Calgary after two games in 1989 and to British Columbia in 1990. In four CFL seasons, Graham rushed for 1,771 yards and 16 touchdowns, caught 84 passes and averaged 21.7 yards per kickoff return. Livingston's leading rusher in 1986, Graham attended Baldwin County High School in Perdido, AL.

- Anthony Green, a 5-11, 190-pound wide receiver from Western Kentucky, began the 1992 World League season with Sacramento then was picked up by Birmingham late in the year. He originally signed with Cincinnati in 1990 but was slowed by a hip injury and released. Last season he went to training camp with San Francisco, injured a shoulder and was waived before the season began. As a senior at Western Kentucky, Green tied a school record with two kickoff returns for touchdowns, including a 97-yarder against Southwest Missouri State. Green, who played two seasons at Tyler Junior College before transferring to Western Kentucky, also led the Hilltoppers in receiving with 28 catches for 435 yards in 1989. A native of Dallas (6/12/67), Green earned all-district honors at Samuell High School.
- Kevin Harris, a 6-5, 251-pound defensive end from Texas Southern, was a fourth round draft choice of the Cowboys in 1991. Shortly after the draft, he underwent knee surgery and sat out the entire 1991 season on the reserve/non-football injury list. Harris is expecting to challenge for a spot along the defensive line, as well as a deep snapper. An All-SWAC selection at Texas Southern in 1989 and 1990, Harris was a bigplay man for four straight seasons. He closed his career with 31½ sacks, 36 tackles for losses and 434 total tackles. Harris is a product of South Oak Cliff High School in Dallas.
- Todd Jones, a 6-3, 295-pound guard from Henderson State, played this spring for Orlando of the World League, where he was part of an offensive line that held opponents to 10 sacks this season. He was drafted by Cleveland in the 11th round in 1991 but released during preseason. After playing at Arkansas in 1987-88, Jones transferred to Henderson State where he earned small college All-America honors in 1990. A native of Hope, AR (7/3/67), Jones attended Central High School in Little Rock, AR.
- Curvin Richards, a 5-9, 195-pound running back from Pittsburgh who was a fourth round draft choice of the Cowboys in 1991. He was a member of the Cowboys active roster in the first two weeks of the season before being placed on injured reserve. His first NFL appearance was against Washington (9/9) when he carried twice for four yards. Richards was the Cowboys' second leading rusher in the 1991 preseason behind Emmitt Smith, and he had the longest Dallas run of the preseason, a 32-yarder vs. Atlanta. Richards played just three seasons at Pitt but finished his career as the Panthers' second-leading all-time rusher (561 carries for 3,036 yards) behind Tony Dorsett. Richards also had 32 career receptions for 351 yards at Pitt. A native of Trinidad (12/26/68), he grew up in Houston and attended LaPorte High School.

# COWBOYS DRAFT CHOICES



### **Kevin Smith**

CORNERBACK • TEXAS A&M HT: 5-11 • WT: 173 • BORN: 4/7/70 • D-1A FOR '92

The biggest question on Kevin Smith coming out of college is "What can't he do?" Nothing epitomized this more than the Aggies game against Texas Tech the fifth week of his

senior season, when Texas A&M found themselves, due to injuries, without a punt returner against one of the nation's best punters. Although he hadn't returned a punt in his three-and-a-half years with the Aggies, All-America cornerback Kevin Smith was pegged for the job due to his excellent hands.

He averaged 7.7 yards on three returns against the Red Raiders then three games later, returned a punt 71 yards for a touchdown against Rice. In the season finale against Texas, Smith brought another punt back for a score, this time from 73 yards, boosting his season average to 14.5 yards to lead the Southwest Conference and finish sixth in the nation.

Throughout his football career, Smith, who scored six special teams/defensive touchdowns in four years at Texas A&M, has made big plays when given the opportunity.

He set a SWC record for career interceptions with 20, tied the conference mark for career touchdowns on interceptions with three and set Texas A&M career records for interceptions yards (289) and passes defensed (32). In addition Smith, who missed only one game during his four years at Texas A&M, started 38 straight games to end his collegiate career.

Last year Smith was the cornerstone of an Aggies' secondary named the best in the country by *The Sporting News* prior to the season. The Texas A&M defensive backfield lived up to its billing when the Aggies led the nation in defense and finished second in the country in pass defense in 1991. Smith also recovered two fumbles and tied for the team lead with three forced fumbles.

Against Southwest Louisiana he stripped the ball and returned it 63 yards for a touchdown, the longest fumble return at Texas A&M since 1975. A semifinalist for the Jim Thorpe Award, given to the nation's best defensive back, Smith also earned consensus All-America honors and, for the third straight year, All-SWC recognition in 1991. He played in the Japan Bowl and the East-West Shrine game following his senior year.

In 1990 Smith earned SWC Defensive Player of the Week mention against Southwest Louisiana and Rice, against whom he had a career-high seven tackles and scored twice on interception returns, including a career-long 78-yarder.

After becoming the starting left cornerback as a sophomore, Smith returned an interception 40 yards for a touchdown against Louisiana State in the 1989 season opener. For the year he picked off nine passes, the second most in a season in school history, to lead the SWC and finish fourth in the nation.

As a freshman against Houston in his first collegiate start, Smith tackled James Dixon from behind to prevent one score then forced Chuck Weatherspoon to fumble after a 70-yard run. The next week vs. Baylor, Smith returned an interception 52 yards but barely missed the touchdown when he stepped out of bounds at the one-yard line.

His senior year at West Orange Stark High School in Orange, TX, Smith not only

recorded 12 interceptions but caught nine touchdown passes while playing wide receiver. He was recruited as a wide receiver by the University of Houston and Louisiana State University but chose to play defensive back at Texas A&M.

"He'd have been our best receiver," said Aggies Head Coach R.C. Slocum. "I have no doubt, if given the chance, he'd busted his butt and become a great receiver. That's the kind of competitor he is. What he has inside you can't teach."

The driving force behind Smith's success is that competitiveness. "I guess I developed it starting with board games my family would play," said Smith. "When I would lose, my sisters would rub it in so much and it would just make me furious. I learned right off the bat to hate losing. I hate to lose at anything."

After earning second-team all-state honors while leading his high school team to a 15-0 record and a second consecutive Texas 4A state championship, Smith was a big part of an Aggies squad that compiled a 27-9-1 (.743) record, including the 1991 SWC title, and played in three bowl games during his career.

"He has everything you'd ever want to see in an NFL cover cornerback," said Cowboys Defensive Backs Coach Dave Campo. "He's got the speed, surprising strength and he's a great athlete with the timing, instincts and anticipation. But most of all, you could tell Kevin is a fierce competitor. That came through in every film we watched and every interview we did."

The 17th overall pick in the 1992 draft, Smith was selected with the highest choice ever used on a defensive back from Texas A&M. He follows a group of ex-Aggies (Yal Lary, Det.; Bob Smith, Det.; Dave Elmendorf, Rams; Pat Thomas, Rams; and Lester Hayes, Raiders) who earned NFL All-Pro honors playing in the secondary.

Smith, who is one of three players from the Texas A&M secondary (Chris Crooms, fifth round, Rams and Kary Vincent, sixth round, Saints) selected in the 1992 draft, is the first Aggies player drafted by Dallas since guard Matt Darwin in the fifth round in 1985. During his senior year Smith roomed with linebacker Quentin Coryatt, who was selected by Indianapolis with the second overall pick in the 1992 draft.

Only the third defensive back (Aaron Kyle, 1976 and Rod Hill, 1982) selected in the first round by Dallas, Smith was chosen with the highest pick the Cowboys have ever used on a defensive back.

Kevin Rey Smith was a successful baseball player in high school until his sophomore year, when a fastball hit him on the left side of the face, leading him to devote more time to football. He also competed in basketball and track in high school. Smith majored in recreation, parks and tourism at Texas A&M. His twin sisters received track scholarships to college but both chose to bypass athletics and pursue engineering degrees.

**Robert Jones** 

LINEBACKER • EAST CAROLINA HT: 6-2 • WT: 236 • BORN: 9/27/69 • D-1B FOR '92



Robert Jones is the complete package at linebacker. He has the size at 6-foot-2 and 236 pounds. He has the strength, enough to bench-press 480 pounds and squat 660 pounds in

college. He has the agility, in the form of a 38-inch vertical jump, and speed, as in a 4.63 40-yard dash. Plus he is durable, missing one play (for an equipment problem) his last two seasons at East Carolina.

"If you wanted to carve out a perfect middle linebacker specimen, you'd carve out Robert," said Cowboys Defensive Assistant Bob Slowik, who coached Jones the past two years at East Carolina. "He has all the tools to be dominating at this level."

But there is more to Jones who, after his mother's death, was raised, along with his four older sisters and four cousins, by his uncle and aunt, Earnest and Betsy Watson. They took in the Joneses, giving them shelter, love and a code with which to live. To Earnest honest sweat was a virtue, and in raising Jones, he tried to instill these same beliefs. "He believes in working for what you want," Jones says. "I was never given anything. I believe that carries over to football. Work hard, and things will go your way."

More than the physical tools Jones possesses, it is this attitude and work ethic that make him a complete package, 'I'd like to be remembered as a person who gave his all and was the best at what he did,'' said Jones. 'Since my freshman year, I knew I had the potential to be among the best in the game. But I also knew the key was going to be for me to keep working at it to allow myself to accept coaching and make myself the best player I could possibly be.''

The numbers Jones posted on the field during his four years at East Carolina are as equally impressive as the numbers he has in the weight room and on the track. In 37 starts at inside linebacker, including the last 34 straight during his career, he recorded double-figures in tackles 26 times. A unanimous first-team All-America selection as a senior and ECU's first All-America since offensive lineman Terry Long in 1983. Jones ended his career, with 478 stops, the second highest total in school history behind Dallas' 1978 draft choice Harold Randolph's 493 from 1974-77. Jones was a finalist for the Butkus Award, given annually to the nation's top collegiate linebacker, and one of 12 semifinalists for the Lombardi Award, while leading the Pirates to a 12-1 record and a No. 9 national ranking. He recorded 151 tackles to become the second player in school history to lead the team three consecutive seasons, and in the season's biggest win, a 23-20 upset of Syracuse, he had 18 tackles - three behind the line for 22 yards in losses — and three guarterback pressures. Two weeks later against Tulane he was named defensive player of the week by the coaching staff for his 15 tackles and a quarterback pressure — Jones led the team with eight for the season — that forced an interception which was returned for a touchdown. His season-high 19 stops, including a sack, came in the Pirates' 31-20 victory over South Carolina. Jones wrapped up his college career with 16 tackles, an interception and a blocked extra-point in the Pirates' 37-34 victory over North Carolina State in the Peach Bowl. He also participated in the East-West Shrine Game after the season.

In October, 1990, Jones put on a tackling clinic, amassing 68 stops — including a school record tying 23 tackle performance against Temple — over a four game stretch. He posted 21 tackles, a fumble recovery and an interception against Southern Mississippi in game one of the streak and was *Sports Illustrated*'s Defensive Player of the Week with 17 tackles, a 15-yard interception return for a touchdown and a

blocked field goal in a 56-32 win over Cincinnati in game three of the streak. For the season Jones put together nine double-digit tackle games in his 11 starts at linebacker and led the team in tackles with 167 for the year, the second highest tackle total in school history. For his performance, Jones was a finalist for the Butkus Award, earned the ECU Defensive Most Valuable Player Award and second-team All-America honors.

As a starter in every game at inside linebacker his sophomore season, Jones earned honorable mention All-America honors and led the team in tackles with 117, including a single-game season high 16 stops against both Louisiaina Tech and Southern Mississipppi. Jones went on to post double figures in tackles four more times during the season.

Recruited to East Carolina by Cowboys and former East Carolina linebacker Vinson Smith, Jones stepped into the lineup as a freshman, earning freshman All-America honors and freshman Linebacker of the Year accolades from *The Sporting News*. He earned three starts in the ten games he played in 1988 and posted 43 tackles, including 10 and 11 stops respectively in his first two collegiate starts.

A four year letterman at Nottaway High School in Blackstone, VA, Jones recorded 120 tackles and led his team to the 2A state championship as a senior. He then spent a year at Fork Union Military Academy before moving on to East Carolina.

The third linebacker taken in the 1992 draft, Jones is the first first-round draft pick ever out of East Carolina (Jody Schulz, a second round selection by Philadelphia in 1983 had been the highest) and joins Les Strayhorn, a running back drafted in the 17th round in 1973, Harold Randolph, a linebacker drafted in the sixth round in 1978 and Chris Hall, a safety drafted in the ninth round in 1992, as East Carolina players drafted by Dallas. Jones was a member of the honor roll as a criminal justice major at East Carolina.

# **Jimmy Smith**

WIDE RECEIVER • JACKSON STATE HT: 6-1 • WT: 200 • BORN: 2/9/69 • D-2A FOR '92



Heritage and tradition have an important meaning to Jimmy Smith. As one of the most highly recruited receiving prospects coming out of high school in Jack-

son, Mississippi, Smith could have landed at almost any college program in the Southeast. Yet, he chose to take his game-breaking, pass catching skills to Jackson State for three very sound reasons. First, his father, Jimmy Smith, had been a standout tight end at JSU and a member of the Tigers' football class of 1968 that sent 11 players to the NFL via the draft. Second, Smith felt comfortable with the prospect of playing for JSU head coach W.C. Gorden — who was the defensive coordinator at the school when Jimmy's father played there. And third, JSU has produced such NFL offensive stalwarts as Walter Payton, Harold Jackson, Willie Richardson and Richard Caster. The latest of those tremendously gifted Jackson State products

appears to be Smith who comes to the Cowboys with the complete package of fluid movement, 4.4 speed and outstanding body control. Not surprisingly, Smith's nickname in college was "Silk" for his style of making the big plays look easy. As a senior, he led the team in receptions with 43 catches for 804 yards and an impressive 18.4 yard average. Against Delaware State, he earned national player of the week honors by catching a school record 10 passes for 239 yards, including a 71-yard touchdown grab. He went on to earn second-team All-Southwestern Athletic Conference honors and a spot on the Senior Bowl roster. The numbers from his junior year are even more impressive. He teamed with Tim Barnett (third round choice of Kansas City in '91) to form the top receiving tandem in the country. Smith was the team leader in receptions (40) and yards (877) while also compiling a stellar 21.3 yard average with nine TD catches. His big-play ability was evident in JSU's 52-14 win over Southern University when Smith had four catches for 184 yards and TD receptions of 70, 64 and 37 yards. His three TD catches tied the school record that was set in 1960 by Willie Richardson, and Smith earned national player of the week honors for that performance. The 1990 Tigers finished the season with an 8-3 mark and advanced to the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs. Smith finished his career with 107 receptions for 2,047 yards, a 19.1 yard average and 15 TDs. He also ran the ball 19 times for 138 yards and a 7.3 yard career rushing average. Smith was an all-conference performer at Calloway High in Jackson, MS. His father, Jimmy, Sr., was a linebacker in 1968 for the Cincinnati Bengals. The elder Smith was a teammate of former Rams wide receiver Harold Jackson.

A highly-sought after prospect coming out of Maryvale High School in Phoenix, AZ, Woodson didn't have the grades to play football at Arizona State but instead of going to junior college, chose to pay his own way to the school in 1987 with the promise of a scholarship if he did well in classes. Woodson joined the football team in 1988 but in the third game of the year suffered a hip injury and was forced to sit out the season.

In 1989 Woodson made such an impact in spring drills that the coaches made room for him at outside linebacker with the first unit. He also played middle linebacker in ASU's nickel defense. Against Kansas State in his first collegiate start,

Woodson led the Sun Devils in tackles. He finished the season sixth in the PAC 10 with 122 tackles, more than 21 ahead of his closest teammate and more than former Sun Devils great linebacker Vernon Maxwell recorded in any collegiate season. Woodson also earned honorable mention all-conference honors as a sophomore.

Woodson recorded double-digit tackles in seven games in 1989, including against Stanford when he had a career-high 16 tackles. Woodson also tied his career-high for solo tackles with 12 against the Cardinals. He first tallied 12 solos earlier in the season against Oregon State.

In 1990 Woodson led the Sun Devils in passes defensed and tied for third on the team in tackles despite missing two games in midseason due to a sprained ankle. Prior to suffering the injury Woodson had a sack, a tackle for a loss and a team-high 14 tackles against Missouri in the third game of the year.

Last season as a senior captain, Woodson recorded five tackles, an interception, batted down one pass and intercepted another in the Sun Devils win over Southern California. After missing two games with a sprained right ankle, Woodson finished his collegiate career with seven tackles and two interceptions against California. Then a week later in the season finale against Arizona, Woodson had 10 tackles and a sack as the Sun Devils defeated the Wildcats for the first time since 1981.

The win over Arizona was particularly important for Woodson and a group of his teammates who are from the same West Phoenix area and dreamed of playing together at Arizona State then later made it their goal to beat the Wildcats. Woodson, cornerback Fillippi Spark — taken by the New York Giants four picks after Woodson in 1992 — and junior running back Kevin Galbreath played at Maryvale High School, where as running backs they formed the "dream backfield," that led their team to the semifinals of the AAA-I playoffs. In addition junior cornerback Kevin Miniefield grew up in the same neighborhood but attended Camelback High School. "Darren likes to play, he likes to practice," said Dennis Brown, Arizona State's defensive coordinator during Woodson's career. "The only guys I know that like to practice are quarterbacks. He's a detail guy. He doesn't just want to know what he's supposed to be doing. He wants to know what everyone else is doing in the scheme of things."

Selected with the 37th overall choice in 1992, Woodson was taken with the highest draft pick used on a defensive player from the school since 1987 when cornerback Eric Allen was taken by Philadelphia with the 30th pick. Allen, Cincinnati's safety David Fulcher and former Raiders cornerback Mike Haynes are former Sun Devils defensive backs, who became NFL Pro Bowlers. Cornerback Mike Richardson, who started on Chicago's 1985 Super Bowl Championship team, also was drafted out of Arizona State.

The first of five defensive players taken from Arizona State in the 1992 draft, Woodson is the first Sun Devils player selected by Dallas since running back Darryl Clack was taken with the 33rd choice in 1985.

Clayton Holmes

In two years Clayton Holmes has gone from being a junior college quarterback to joining the Cowboys secondary as a third round draft choice, the 13th defensive

back (58th player overall) taken in the 1992 NFL draft. His speed — Holmes ran a 4.23 40-yard dash in Dallas' post-draft mini-camp, the fastest 40 among both the Cowboys' rookies and veterans — and natural ability have allowed him to make the transition from guarterback to cornerback without a hitch.

A two-time NAIA All-America selection at cornerback for Carson-Newman. Holmes quickly proved he had the ability to play his new position after arriving in Jefferson City, TN. The South Atlantic Conference's Defensive Player of the Year as a senior, Holmes finished second in the NAIA and tied the Carson-Newman single season record with eight interceptions. His 199 yards in interception returns gave him 462 return yards for his career, establishing a school record for career interception return yardage, and he played a key role in helping the Carson-Newman defense establish a single-season school record with 32 interceptions, including a record eight returned for touchdowns. Holmes opened the year with a 41-yard interception return against Fayetteville State, and then in the Eagles' 52-16 victory over Gardner-Webb, he had seven tackles, one interception, five passes defensed and a 91-yard kickoff return for a touchdown to earn SAC Defensive Player of the Week honors. In the opening round of the NAIA Division I playoffs, Holmes had six tackles and two interceptions. returning one 77 yards for a touchdown, in the Eagles' loss to Western State, CO. The team leader in kickoff returns (13) and average (27.2), he wrapped up his collegiate career by participating in the Blue-Gray All-Star Game.

In his first season at cornerback, Holmes earned first-team NAIA All-America and All-SAC honors as he helped lead Carson-Newman to a 10-0 regular season record and into the second round of the NAIA playoffs. He led the team in both interceptions (six) and passes defensed (17), and he established both a Carson-Newman and NAIA single-season record with 263 yards in interception returns and a 43.8 yard interception return average. In his first collegiate start at cornerback, Holmes had a 41-yard interception return, and two weeks later against Elon College he earned SAC Defensive Player of the Week honors with six tackles, 3 passes defensed and two interceptions, including a 79-yard touchdown return, in the Eagles' 47-24 victory. Against Mars Hill, Holmes had two more interceptions, returning one 66 yards for a touchdown, to establish a school record with two touchdowns on interception returns in a season. Holmes also earned NAIA All-America honors in the long jump during the spring.

Before transferring to Carson-Newman, Holmes was a Junior College All-America quarterback at North Greenville, SC, Junior College.

The first player ever drafted by Dallas from Carson-Newman, Holmes joins Todd Collins, a linebacker drafted in the third round (64th overall) by New England, as the only Carson-Newman draftees in 1992. The last time a Carson-Newman player was taken as high as Holmes was in 1973 when Tim George was taken in the third round by Cincinnati.

Holmes earned all-conference honors as a quarterback and defensive back at Wilson High School in Florence, SC, and he set the South Carolina state record in the long jump. He was a management major at Carson-Newman.

## **James Brown**

OFFENSIVE LINEMAN • VIRGINIA STATE HT: 6-6 • WT: 331 • BORN: 1/3/70 • D-3B FOR '92

In 1991, the Dallas Cowboys were looking to draft some talented offensive linemen and selected a relatively unknown small college product named Erik Williams

in the third round. Williams, a Philadelphia native who played at Central (OH) State went on to earn a roster spot and make a solid contribution to the Dallas offensive line as a rookie. In the third round of the 1992 NFL Draft, the Cowboys gave the impression of trying to re-create history by selecting mammoth James Brown from tiny Virginia State (enrollment 3,989). Like Williams, Brown is a native of Philadelphia who has tremendous physical size and outstanding natural athletic ability. He also shared Williams aggressive style of play, large wing-span and quick feet. The only unknown factor regarding Brown's chances for success in the NFL came from his lack of experience against major college competition — a shortcoming that had absolutely no bearing on Williams' progress and success from a year ago. Brown's athletic promise was measured at the NFL scouting combine where he turned in the sixth best vertical leap of all offensive line prospects. His 28-inch jump was impressive for a man of his 6-6, 330-pound frame. He was also the second-best rated line prospect in the power index category (a combination of a player's body fat percentage and vertical leap). A three-year starter at left tackle for Virginia State, Brown was also a starter at tight end during his red-shirt freshman season. In his final two collegiate seasons, he was a team captain and earned first-team All Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association honors. As a senior, he graded out at 89% for blocking consistency, while not surrendering a single sack for a VSU team that amassed 223.2 yards passing per game. He was named first team Division II All-America by the Associated Press following that final college season. James Lamont Brown was the first Virginia State Trojan player drafted by the NFL since 1972. A physical education major in college, he is also the very first Virginia State player ever drafted by Dallas. A two-way standout as a lineman at Philadelphia's Mastbaum High School, Brown also was a productive performer on the track team (shot put). Brown's roots in the NFC East run deep, having grown up as a Philadelphia Eagles fan. He and Erik Williams faced off against each other as high school players in Philadelphia.


Tom Myslinski GUARD • TENNESSEE

HT: 6-2 • WT: 291 • BORN: 12/7/68 • D-4 FOR '92



Over the past three seasons the University of Tennessee has had some of its best offensive performances, both as a team and individually, in school history and one of the

biggest constants through this success has been Tom Myslinski.

A starter at left guard in 37 straight games dating back to 1988, Myslinski (mish-LIN-skee) has paved the way for an offense that has set a school record for total yards each of the past three seasons. In addition he protected Volunteers' guarterback Andy Kelly, who holds school career marks for completions, passing yards and touchdown throws. Kelly also set a Tennessee season-record for passing yards with 2,241 in 1990 then surpassed it last year with 2,759 yards.

Myslinski also helped pave the way for six of the school's 10 best rushing games by four different running backs, including Chuck Webb who gained a school-record 294 yards on the ground against Mississippi in 1989. Last season Myslinski sprung holes for running backs Aaron Hyden and James Stewart, who were both named to the SEC All-freshman team in 1991. Stewart also tied a school record for 100-yard rushing games in a season with six.

In 1991 Myslinski earned All-Southeastern Conference and honorable mention All-America honors after Tennessee led the SEC and finished eighth in the nation in total offense (467.7). The Volunteers also topped the conference in third-down conversions (49%) and fourth-down conversions (76%).

During Myslinski's three-years as a starter, Tennessee compiled a 29-6-2 (.811) record, played in three bowl games and won SEC titles in 1989 and '90, when the Volunteers finished ranked fifth and seventh in the nation, respectively.

"He has the potential to be every bit as good as some of the players starting in this league right now," said Cowboys Offensive Line Coach Tony Wise.

Myslinski's pregame preparation may someday equal the legend of former NFL and Tennessee star Jack "Hacksaw" Reynolds, who earned his nickname after sawing a car apart while in college. Just before the team left the lockerroom for each game, Myslinski would go into the shower area and bang his unhelmeted head against the shower wall until it bled.

"I have no idea why I did," said Myslinski. "After the game I always said it was stupid because my head hurt. On game day I'm a maniac. When the game's over I go back to being my old cheerful personality."

After redshirting in 1987, Myslinski received his first collegiate start at right guard against Duke in the second game in the 1988 season, due to an injury, then suffered a sprained ankle which forced him to miss five games.

One of nine Tennessee players drafted in 1992, Myslinski is one of 12 Volunteer offensive linemen, including tackle Bernard Dafney in the ninth round by Houston this year, to be drafted since 1984. He is the first Tennessee offensive lineman taken by Dallas since center Robert Shaw was the Cowboys' first-round choice in 1979.

Myslinski, a kinesiology major, twice earned SEC All-Academic honors. Last season he was presented with the Toyota Leadership Award during ESPN's telecast of the Tennessee-Auburn game for serving as an honorary coach for the University of Tennessee Medical Center's "Fighting Chance Games," which allow physically challenged individuals to participate in sports.

In 1990 Myslinski finished fourth in the shot put in the SEC outdoor meet with a career-best 59'91/2". In 1991 Myslinski placed fifth in the SEC outdoor meet in

the hammer throw. His career best in that event is 155'9".

Rated by one recruiting service as one of the top centers in the nation. Thomas Joseph Myslinski earned all-state honors after leading Free Academy High School in Rome, NY to an undefeated season and a state title his junior year. Following the season opener as a senior, Myslinski was involved in a car accident, in which he was thrown through a rear door window breaking a leg and forcing him to have over 100 stitches to his head. Despite the injuries Myslinski pulled the two passengers in the front seat from the car.

He won the state title in the discus and finished third in the shot put in high school.



Greg Briggs SAFETY • TEXAS SOUTHERN HT: 6-3 • WT: 209 • BORN: 10/19/68 • D-5A FOR '92



Greg Briggs spent his high school and early college days playing the game he loved, basketball, but three years ago he decided to give footbll a try and now hopes to follow in

the footsteps of Cornell Green who spent 13 seasons in the Dallas secondary after making the transition from basketball to football. Although he has a head start on Green, who never played college football, Briggs still spent most of his senior season making a name for himself at Texas Southern University, and three days before Christmas that work paid off when he received what was the highlight of his football career up to that point, an invitation to the NFL Scouting Combine in Indianapolis. With impressive workouts at the combine, his athletic ability and raw talent vaulted him toward the top among defensive backs after arriving virtually unknown.

Because the Tigers returned almost their entire secondary in 1991, Briggs, a transfer from the University of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, started his senior season playing mostly in the nickel defense and on special teams, but when one of the outside linebackers went down with an injury early in the year, Briggs moved up to plug the hole. "I knew we had something special then," said Texas Southern defensive coordinator C.L. Whittington, who played five years at safety for the Houston Oilers. "Greg displayed toughness and good coverage ability and, by the end of the season, had made a name for himself." At 6-3, 209 pounds Briggs, while playing linebacker, often had the responsibilities of a safety. He had the size to stop the running game at the line of scrimmage and the speed to cover slot receivers and running backs in the passing game, recording 42 tackles and two sacks as well as a 31-yard interception return.

Before joining Texas Southern, Briggs spent 1990 at the University of Arkansas-Pine Bluff, where he planned to play basketball, but the football coaching staff talked him into joining their squad. He played in the first two games of the season before being declared ineligible because of a class conflict. Following the season the Pine Bluff program was suspended for 1991 by the NAIA which paved the way for Briggs and six of his teammates to attend Texas Southern.

Briggs, who did not play football in high school, was heavily recruited by Southern Mississippi to play basketball before choosing to enroll at Copiah Lincoln Junior College in Wesson, MS, on a basketball scholarship. A member of the team in both 1987 and 1988, he then joined the footall team in 1989, started all season at safety for the Wolves and recorded six interceptions to earn JUCO all-state honors.

An all-district basketball player as a senior at Franklin County High School in Meadville, MS, Briggs was also a member of the track team.

Briggs (the 120th player selected overall) joins Kevin Harris, a defensive end drafted in the fourth round in 1990, and James Ford, a running back drafted in the 13th round in 1971, as the only players from Texas Southern ever drafted by the Cowboys. Briggs joins teammate Alberto White (a linebacker drafted in the 10th round by the L.A. Raiders) as the only Texas Southern players to be drafted in 1991.

### **Rod Milstead**

offensive front that led the NCAA Division I-AA ranks in rushing with 298.7 yards per game. Last year, as a senior All-America, Milstead's troops cleared the way for 298.5 yards per game and 5.2 yards per rush to finish the season as the nation's No. 2 ranked rushing offense. Productivity and consistency have been characteristics that have summarized Milstead's performance on the football field for some time. Throughout his college career, he never missed a practice or a game while making 42 straight starts at right guard for the Hornets. As a senior he was selected as the Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference's Offensive Lineman of the Week on four occasions en route to earning firstteam Walter Camp recognition. He was also a first-team all-conference selection in each of his final two college seasons. As a junior, Milstead helped the Hornets register a school-record 518-yard rushing performance against Towson State, and as a senior, Milstead helped Delaware State to 380 yards rushing against Northeastern. From 1989 to 1991. Milstead served as the anchor on Delaware State offensive line units that helped the team produce an overall record of 22-10. Regarded as the nation's top pulling guard in Division I-AA last year, Milstead has exceptional guickness and agility that is apparent in his first step off the ball. His guickness afoot was evident at the 1992 NFL scouting combine in Indianapolis where he recorded the fastest time in the 20 yard dash (2.98) among all offensive guard prospects. He also ran a 4.91 in the forty. Milstead was a two-time all-state selection as an offensive lineman, while also lettering in track, at Lackney High School in Bryans Road, MD. He majored in criminal justice at Delaware State.



Fallon Wacasey

Tight end Fallon Wacasey's best move of his football career actually came as a defensive end. In Spring, 1989 a National Football League scout was at Tulsa

pass blocking skills. Wacasey, who spent his first two years at Tulsa with the basketball team, happened to be playing hoops on a nearby court and was recruited to rush the prospect. After the workout the scout advised Wacasey that he may have a future as a pro football player.

Wacasey (way-CAY-see) also was encouraged when Tulsa Head Coach Dave Rader told him he'd have three years of football eligibility if he chose to switch to the gridiron. Although he earned All-America honors as a tight end at Kansas, OK, High School and was offered football scholarships to UCLA, Alabama and Stanford, Wacasey had difficulty at first with the transition. "I was really lacking in strength, the blocking techniques, and the change in size and speed was more than what I was ready for," said Wacasey.

He continued to improve each season, culminating with the 1991 campaign, when Wacasey finished second in receptions on a Tulsa club that compiled a 10-2 record, the school's best since a 10-1 mark in 1982. The Golden Hurricane finished the season with a victory over San Diego State in the Freedom Bowl.

A starter in Tulsa's past 23 games, Wacasey had a team-high 23 catches after six games last season. In the season opener against Southwest Missouri State (8/31), he scored Tulsa's first two touchdowns of the season on catches of four and a career-long 35 yards to finish the game with a team-high 64 yards receiving.

After leading the Golden Hurricane with four catches for 61 yards against Oklahoma State (9/7), Wacasey had a career-high five receptions the following week against Kansas. He matched that career high for catches vs. then No. 2 ranked Miami (9/28), when he also tallied a career-high 85 receiving yards to again lead the Golden Hurricane.

The recipient of Tulsa's Athletic Academic Achievement Award in 1989 and 1990, Wacasey became Tulsa's starting tight end before his junior year. Against Colorado State in the 10th game of 1990, he caught a season-high four passes for 65 yards, including a season-long 22-yard reception.

His first catch as a collegiate tight end was a two-yard touchdown grab against Arkansas in only his third football game with Tulsa in 1989. The next week he was named the Golden Hurricane's Lineman of the Week after he partially blocked a field goal attempt by New Mexico to preserve a 35-33 win. Tulsa earned a spot in their first bowl game since 1976 when they played Oregon in the Independence Bowl following the 1989 season.

The eighth tight end taken in the 1992 draft, Wacasey was selected with the highet NFL draft choice ever used on a tight end from Tulsa and highest pick used on an offensive player from the school since 1987, when Philadelphia took guard David Alexander in the fifth round. Wacasey is the first tight end drafted by Dallas since Keith Jennings in the fifth round in 1989 and the first Tulsa player taken by the Cowboys since defensive end Bill Purifoy in 1982.

After the 1991 football season was over, Wacasey re-joined the Tulsa basketball team, for which he played in 1987-88 and 1988-89. Despite missing the first part of the Hurricane's hoop slate, Wacasey tied for third on the team in blocked shots with seven. He led Tulsa with 10 rebounds against Oral Roberts (2/17) and scored a career-high nine points against Bradley (2/29) in 1992.

A three-time all-conference pick in basketball in high school, Wacasey earned all-state honors as a senior when he averaged 24.0 points and 14.3 rebounds to lead his team to the state 2A semifinal. Wacasey earned his degree in public relations from Tulsa.

### Nate Kirtman

SAFETY • POMONA-PITZER HT: 6-1 • WT: 186 • BORN: 6/6/71 • D-9A FOR '92



In this day-and-age of specialization on the football field, there has been talk of reducing the size of each club's roster. If that were to take place, Nate Kirtman may be one of the

few players who would thrive with the opportunity to fill multiple roles on the club. A throwback to the days when players never came off the field, Kirtman spent his college career as a jack-of-all-trades, lining up at safety, cornerback, wide receiver, kickoff returner, punt returner and punter. Although he spread himself out at Pomono-Pitzer, few doubt he has the talent to make it in the professional ranks. "I don't think there's any question of that, because he's got the physical and mental ability and he's a hard worker," said Pomona-Pitzer Head Coach Clarence Thomas. "You can't coach speed and he's got the speed, along with the other intangibles to go with it."

As a senior Kirtman's speed allowed him to lead the Sagehens in all-purpose yards with 977 (122.1 yards per game) and receiving with 18 catches for 356 yards (19.7 avg.) and two touchdowns. As the team's punter he posted a 37.7 yard average on 25 kicks, including a 70-yarder. On the defensive side of the ball Kirtman, who primarily played as a safety in passing situations, recorded two interceptions to lead the defense. He was also the top punt and kick returner on the club with a 9.9 yard average on punts and a 21.1 yard average on kicks.

After sitting out most of the 1989 season, Kirtman earned All-America honors as both a kick returner and a punter in 1990, leading all Division III return men with a 33.9 yard kickoff return average and finishing second with a 39.6 yard punt average (51 punts, 2,018 yards). The team leader in all-purpose yards with 916 (114.5 yards per game), he recorded his first collegiate touchdown on a 60-yard interception return against Whittier. The following week against the University of San Diego he ran back a kick 98 yards for a touchdown. The big plays continued against Occidental when he hauled in a career-long 83-yard touchdown pass, and the following week posted a career-long 103-yard kickoff return against Redlands. His final big-play of the year came in a re-match with Occidental when he had a career-long 84 yard touchdown run, giving him a team high 36 points for the season. The team leader in interceptions with three, he was also the Sagehens second leading rusher (23 carries, 212 yards) and fourth leading receiver (9 receptions, 127 yards).

Kirtman stepped right into the lineup as a freshman cornerback, leading the Southern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference in interceptions as a freshman with four, including a pair of thefts against Cal-Lutheran. He also returned five kickoffs for 84 yards and handled the punting duties with 46 kicks for a 36.6 yard average.

In addition to his numerous football talents, Kirtman was also a two-time NCAA

Division III long jump champion (1990 and 1991). As a sophomore he also finished second in the triple jump at the NCAA Division III Championships. In 1991 he finished third at the national meet in the triple jump with a 50'8" mark and fifth in the 100 meters along with his second long jump title (24'73''). In leading Pomona-Pitzer to the SCIAC track title that season, Kirtman won the long jump, triple jump, 100 meters, 200 meters and ran the opening leg of the winning 4 × 100 meter relay. He also finished second in the 110 meter high hurdles and was named the meet's outstanding male athlete.

The first player ever drafted by the NFL from Pomona-Pitzer, Nathaniel Kirtman was only 16 years old and weighed only 155 pounds when he graduated from St. Mary's College High School in Berkeley, CA, where he was an all-conference selection in track while also lettering in football and soccer. He chose Pomona-Pitzer because it was a small school that was academically strong and would still give him the opportunity to participate in intercollegiate athletics.

He earned his degree in government from Pomona College.

### **Chris Hall**

SAFETY • EAST CAROLINA HT: 6-2 • WT: 184 • BORN: 4/25/70 • D-9B FOR '92



When the Cowboys entered the 1992 draft they were looking to find defensive backs who had a feel for making the big play. A productive defensive back makes the big play

through the turnover, and Chris Hall personally accounted for 13 opponent's takeaways during his four years in the secondary at East Carolina. When not forcing a change of possession, Hall was instrumental in stopping offensive drives in other ways, as he established a new East Carolina career record for pass deflection with 26. Recruited as an offensive player at running back, Hall wasted no time in making his mark at ECU. By the middle of his true freshman season, Hall was moved into a starting role in the secondary, and he immediately responded with three of nine career interceptions. At the conclusion of his senior season, he was voted to the position of defensive co-captain along with current Cowboys' teammate and first-round draft choice Robert Jones. Throughout his career, Hall distinguished himself as a player who came to the front in the big games. Last fall, he registered a season-high 12 tackles in the Pirates' only loss of the season — a nationally televised game at Illinois. He later picked up 11 tackles in the Pirates' last minute win over Pittsburgh, while adding 10 stops and an interception in ECU's win over regional rival South Carolina. Considered the best cover man in the secondary. Hall played primarily at corner-

back throughout his career, recording interceptions against Memphis State, South Carolina and Virginia Tech as a senior. He also led a defensive backfield that helped East Carolina to its best record (11-1) and highest national ranking (9th by A.P.) in school history. A starter in the secondary for just over three years, Hall collected a career-high 20 tackles as a junior in a game against South Carolina. The sixth of seven defensive backs drafted by Dallas in 1991, Hall will be given the opportunity to make the Cowboy's team as a safety. He is the fourth East Carolina player to be drafted by Dallas and the first former Pirate defensive back. Charles Christopher Hall was a business management major at East Carolina. The son of a U.S. Army staff sergeant, Chris was accustomed to moving around as a youngster. His father is currently stationed at Fort Stewart in Georgia. While living at Fort Dix in New Jersey, Hall attended Pemberton High School where he earned two letters each in football, basketball and track. He was a second-team all-state running back and an allconference selection at forward in basketball.

John Terry earned first team All-Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association honors at Livingstone College last season after leading the way for sophomore running back

Rob Clodfelter, who led the conference and finished seventh in NCAA Division II in rushing with 137.9 yards per game. He also scored a conference-high 14 touchdowns on the ground.

After transferring to the tiny school in Salisbury, NC in January, 1990, Terry became the Blue Bears' starting left guard. In his first year at Livingstone, Terry blocked for an offense that produced Clodfelter, who topped the conference in rushing as a freshman, and Ben Coates, an All-America tight end drafted by New England in the fifth round in 1991. Coates is Terry's cousin.

A second-team All-CIAA pick as a junior, Terry has never missed a game due to injury during his collegiate career.

In 1986 Terry lettered as a freshman tackle at Johnson C. Smith University, which produced Pettis Norman, a tight end for Dallas from 1962-67. Terry started at left tackle for the Golden Bulls as a sophomore then redshirted the 1988 season due to academic reasons. He spent the 1989 school year working in his hometown of Greenwood, SC.

Terry will be attempting to follow the same path to the National Football League as defensive back Kenneth Gant, who played the past two seasons for the Cowboys after being drafted in the late rounds in 1990 from Albany State, a small division II school.

He is the first player from Livingstone to be drafted by Dallas. No player from the school has ever made the Cowboys' regular-season roster.

A star at defensive and offensive tackle at Greenwood High School, John Henry Terry, III was recruited by several major colleges but, due to grades, chose Johnson C. Smith. He majored in business management at Livingstone College.



### Tim Daniel WIDE RECEIVER · FLORIDA A&M

HT: 5-11 • WT: 184 • BORN: 9/14/69 • D-11 FOR '92

With the emergence of Tim Daniel as a receiver came the evolution of Florida A&M as a passing football team. Before his arrival in Tallahassee, the Rattlers' offense averaged only 70 yards per game through the air in both 1986 and 1987, but over the past two seasons, behind the speed and explosiveness of Daniel, Florida A&M has become pass happy, averaging 238 yards per game through the air. The Rattlers' big-play receiver, Daniel posted five catches over 40 yards during that span, including TD grabs of 98, 80 and 77-yards, and during that time no receiver has hauled in more touchdown receptions than Daniel's six. For his career, Daniel averaged 21.7 yards per catch and a touchdown every 8.7 receptions. The Rattlers' put together four straight winning seasons during his career, including the school's first ever outright Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference title in 1990 with a 6-0 conference mark.

As a senior, Daniel finished second on the team with a career-high 30 receptions for a team and career-high 580 yards and three touchdowns, earning honorable mention All-MEAC recognition. In the season opening 47-24 victory over Tuskegee, he hauled in three passes for 115 yards, including an 80-yard touchdown grab to lead the Rattlers' air attack. Two weeks later, against Georgia Southern he added 71 yards on two receptions, and, in a 24-20 decision over Southern University, he had two catches for 49 yards and a touchdown. In his final game as a collegian, Daniel had a single-game career-high nine receptions for 141 yards and a touchdown in a 46-28 win over Bethune-Cookman. His nine catches were one short of the school record 10 set by Clarence Chester in 1981 and tied by former Cowboys receiver Ray Alexander in 1983.

Án honorable mention All-MEAC selection in 1990, Daniel hauled in 19 receptions for 512 yards in posting a conference leading 26.9 yards per catch. Against Delaware State, in his finest game as a collegian, he set a schooi record with 152 yards and two touchdowns on four receptions, breaking the old mark of 150 yards set by Ray Alexander against Howard in 1983. In that game Daniel grabbed a 98-yard scoring pass, the second-longest touchdown pass in school and conference history. The following week he recorded two more receptions for 70 yards and a touchdown in a 37-17 win over South Carolina State, and later in the year his 61 yards on two receptions helped lead the Rattlers to a 39-20 win over Howard.

Daniel saw his first real action in the passing game as a sophomore, hauling in 12 receptions for 198 yards and a touchdown. In the season opening victory over Tuskegee he logged his first collegiate touchdown on a season-long 38-yard catch.

An all-conference and all-county selection in both football and track at Benjamin Mays High School in Atlanta, GA, Daniel walked-on at Florida A&M but spent most of his freshman year serving as a blocker in the Rattlers' running game.

Daniel, the only Florida A&M player taken in this year's draft, is the first player

drafted by Dallas from A&M since Art Robinson, a tight end taken in the seventh round in 1966. The only other player Dallas has ever drafted from A&M was also a wide receiver, Bob Hayes, a seventh-round choice in 1964 who went on to set club records for the longest pass reception (95 yards) as well as average yards per reception (20.0) and receiving touchdowns (71).

Tim majored in journalism at Florida A&M.

### **Donald Harris**

SAFETY • TEXAS TECH HT: 6-0 • WT: 185 • BORN: 11/12/67 • D-12 FOR '92

The Cowboys have a tradition of drafting players who, for one reason or another, are not projected to join the Dallas organization until a few years down the road. Some, such

as Roger Staubach (drafted in 1964) and Chad Hennings (1988), have had military commitments to fulfill before joining the team. Others have been involved in athletic careers in other sports, including Bob Hayes (1964) in track; Mery Rettenmund (1965) in baseball; and Pat Riley (1967) in basketball. The latest addition to the intriguing list of potential down-the-road possibilities is Donald Harris, a former first-round draft choice of the Texas Rangers who is currently with the organization's Class AA ball club in Tulsa. Selected by the Rangers with the fifth overall pick in 1989, Harris was a two-sport stand-out at Texas Tech from 1987 to 1989. As a freshman in the fall of 1987, he was named the Southwest Conference's Defensive Newcomer of the Year after starting all 11 games at free safety and recording 104 tackles and three interceptions. His tackle total ranked second on the team for the year, and he turned in a season-high 18 stops against Texas (10 solos). His 64-yard interception return for a TD against Tulsa was the second longest in the SWC in 1987. As a sophomore, he earned second team All-SWC honors after tying for the team lead in tackles with 141 stops, including a single-game school record for tackles with 30 stops against Arizona. He also intercepted three passes, caused two fumbles and recovered three others. In two seasons as a centerfielder for the Tech baseball team, Harris batted .322 with 10 home runs and 44 RBI. In his first year of professional baseball in the Rookie League at Butte, MT, Harris hit .284 with a leagueleading eight triples. In 1990, he split time between Gastonia (A) and Tulsa (AA), and last season he played in 130 games at Tulsa before being called up to the Rangers on September 3. He appeared in 18 major league games and went three for eight with a home run and two RBI. Regarded as perhaps the finest defensive centerfielder in the Rangers organization, Harris brings a very aggressive and athletic style of play to both sports. While at Tech, he was noted as a very fierce competitor who was a solid hitter in the secondary. Before enrolling at Tech, Harris spent a year at McLennan Community College in Waco, TX. Born and raised in Waco, Harris earned all-district honors in baseball at Jefferson-Moore High School. He also starred in football, basketball and track.

### Chad Hennings

DEFENSIVE END • AIR FORCE HT: 6-6 • WT: 272 • BORN: 10/20/65 • D-11 FOR '88



When talking of Chad Hennings, it's difficult to concentrate on the present and avoid thinking of the past or dreaming of the future. The 1987 All-America and Outland

Trophy winner at the Air Force Adacemy has been serving his military commitment the past four years. He joined Dallas in June, 1992, after the Pentagon shortened the duty time required for those who attended the various academies.

Hennings is following the same path to the National Football League as former Cowboys Hall of Fame quarterback Roger Staubach, who joined Dallas in 1969 as a 27-year-old rookie after a four-year hitch in the Navy. Drafted by Dallas out of the Naval Academy in the 10th round in 1964, Staubach led the Cowboys to six NFC Championship Games, four Super Bowls and two NFL titles.

As a pilot of the A-10 tankbuster (also known as the "Warthog"), Hennings was stationed in London the past two years. In the final days of the Gulf War, he escorted the planes that dropped supplies to the Kurds in northern Iraq and southern Turkey as part of "Operation Provide Comfort."

He underwent pilot training at Sheppard Air Force Base in Wichita Falls, TX, which is approximately 100 miles northwest of Dallas.

When pro scouts worked out Hennings after his senior year, he was focusing on losing weight in order to get into flight school. At the time he was 6-foot, 5inches tall and weighed 251 pounds. After his stint in the military, he is 6-foot, 6-inches in height, weighs 272 pounds and appears to be quicker and stronger.

"The four years I spent in the Air Force helped me mature a lot physically, as well as mentally and spiritually," said Hennings. "Being a fighter pilot is sort of like being on defense. You get to take it to the person. You set the tempo, the pressure, the aggressiveness, the knocking of heads. You inflict the pain."

In 1987 Hennings set a Western Athletic Conference record with 24 sacks to earn WAC defensive player of the year honors. Against Wyoming in the season opener, Hennings had seven tackles, three sacks, one fumble recovery, one forced fumble and three batted passes, including one that was intercepted.

After playing his freshman season as a 220-pound tight end, Hennings moved to the defensive line in 1985 and earned honorable mention All-America and second-team All-WAC honors as a sophomore. He warranted first-team All-WAC recognition in 1986 while again being named honorable mention All-America.

Chad Hennings is a native of tiny Elberton, IA (pop. 150), where he grew up on a 900-acre farm. He was a two-time all-state football player and state-champion wrestler at Brenton Community High School. A former member of the 4-H club and Future Farmers of America, Hennings earned his degree in management at the Air Force Academy. His wife's name is Tammy.

### **Rookie Free Agents**

Michael Beasley, a 5-10, 203-pound running back from West Virginia, spent his senior year at wide receiver after three seasons at running back, finishing second on the team with 17 receptions for 272 yards and two touchdowns. He also posted the team's longest run of the season with a 63-yard touchdown dash. After sitting out in 1989 following his transfer from Maryland, Beasley lead the team in rushing as a junior with 125 carries for 607 yards and three touchdowns, including a 197-yard performance at Pittsburgh. After finishing second in the ACC with a 21.1 yard kickoff return average as a freshman at Maryland, he gained 528 yards and five touchdowns on 115 carries as a sophomore, including a career long 74-yard dash. Beasley starred at Owen J. Roberts High School in Pottstown, PA.

- Swift Burch, a 6-4, 272-pound defensive lineman from Temple, was an All-Big East selection and team captain as a senior, recording 69 tackles, 11 tackles for losses and two sacks. He won the squad's most valuable player award for 1991 and the John Rienstra Award for his performance in the weight room. For his career, Burch posted 19 starts in 35 games and had 136 tackles and six sacks. An all-metro selection at Roosevelt High School in Washington D.C., Burch also starred in basketball and swimming.
- Lin Elliott, a 6-0, 180-pound kicker from Texas Tech, made 17-of-26 field goal attempts in 1991, including a career-long tying 52 yarder against Cal-Fullerton. An All-Southwest Confrence selection as a senior, Elliott holds the school's all-time career records for kick scoring (220 points), conversions (100), and consecutive extra points (85). For his career Elliott hit 100-of-101 extra points and 40-of-62 field goals. Over the past three seasons he has had 69 touchbacks on his 179 kickoffs, and the longest return an opponent ever recorded against him was 36 yards. Elliott starred at Waco, TX, High School, where he was also a four-time alldistrict selection in soccer.
- Melvin Evans, a 6-2, 316-pound guard from Texas Southern, was a twoyear starter and two-time All-Southwestern Athletic Conference selection at right guard, blocking the way for a Texas Southern ground game that led the conference with 210.6 yards per game rushing in 1991. Evans transferred to Texas Southern after earning All-America honors as an offensive guard and tackle at Garden City, KS, Community College. Evans was an all-conference selection at Peter Quinn High School in Trenton, NJ.
- Patt Evans, a 6-6, 261-pound tight end from Minnesota, earned honorable mention All-America and first-team All-Big 10 honors in 1991. A team captain as a senior, he led the Gophers in receiving with 35 catches for 454 yards and a touchdown, earning team most valuable player honors. Evans also excelled on special teams, recording 12 tackles. As a junior in his first season at tight end after two seasons as a reserve center, he was the team's third leading receiver with 22 catches for 244 yards. Evans was a three-time all-conference selection at tight end, defensive end and placekicker at Stath Haven High School in Swarthmore, PA.

Melvin Foster, an All-Big 10 selection as a senior, led Iowa in tackles in 1989 and '90. After suffering a knee injury following his senior season with the Hawkeyes, the 6-1, 243-pound linebacker did not play football in 1991. He finished his collegiate career sixth on Iowa's all-time tackle list and led the Hawkeyes' defensive effort that, in 1989, held Purdue to minus 73 yards rushing, a record low for an Iowa opponent. A native of Houston, TX (12/23/66), Foster was a two-time all-state pick at Yates High School, which went undefeated on its way to the state 5-A title his senior year. PARADE Magazine rated Foster the top linebacker in the country in 1985.

Harold Heath, a 6-3, 249-pound tight end from Jackson State, was a two-time first-team All-Southwestern Athletic Conference (SWAC) pick and helped guide the team to the 1990 SWAC title. Over the past two seasons he has hauled in 51 passes for 794 yards and three touchdowns. Before sitting out the 1989 season with knee and shoulder injuries, Heath had a pair of receptions for 65 yards and played in eight games with the school's basketball team as a sophomore. Heath earned all-state honors in both football and basketball at Canton, MS, High School.

Michael James, a 5-11, 184-pound defensive back from Arkansas, started the past three seasons at cornerback, earning first-team All-Southwest Conference honors in 1991. As a senior James recorded 50 tackles and led the team with five interceptions. He also finished second in the conference with 19 punt returns for 272 yards (14.3 average), including a 75-yarder for a touchdown in a 29-17 win over Houston. In 1990 he was third among defensive backs in tackles with 39 and added a pair of interceptions. James was an all-state selection as a wishbone quarterback at Pine Bluff, AR, High School.

BOB LILLY

**BOB LILLY**, defensive tackle, 1961-74. Nicknamed "Mr. Cowboy," Bob Lilly was the franchise's first draft choice in 1961, the first name in the Ring of Honor in 1975 and its first inductee into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1980. A seventime All-Pro, Lilly was named to a clubrecord 11 Pro Bowls He was a two-time All-SWC pick and an All-America at Texas Christian University before being drafted by Dallas. DON MEREDITH

- DON MEREDITH, quarterback, 1960-68. Don Meredith led the Cowboys to their first winning season and their first NFL Championship Game in 1966. Signed by Clint Murchison, Jr., before Dallas was granted its NFL franchise, "Dandy Don" played in two Pro Bowls and was named NFL player of the year in 1966. A twotime All-America at SMU, Don's name was added to the Cowboys' Ring of Honor in 1976.

DON PERKINS

**DON PERKINS**, running back, 1961-68. Don Perkins was the first Cowboys player to rush for more than 6,000 yards. A six-time Pro Bowl selection, Perkins finished among the top ten NFL rushers in each of his eight seasons. He was named NFL rookie of the year in 1961 and All-Pro in 1962. Perkins was signed before Dallas was granted its NFL franchise. A threetime All-Skyline pick at New Mexico, he was inducted into the Ring of Honor in 1976.

- CHUCK HOWLEY, linebacker, 1961-72. When Chuck Howley retired in 1973, Tom Landry said "I don't know that I've seen anybody better at linebacker than Howley." A six-time All-Pro, Howley was the most valuable player in Super Bowl V. The Cowboys traded for Howley, who was drafted by Chicago in 1958. He was All-America center at West Virginia. A six-time Pro Bowl selection, Howley was added to the Ring of Honor in 1977.
- MEL RENFRO, defensive back, 1964-77. Mel Renfro was named to the Pro Bowl his first ten seasons in the NFL. He is the club's all-time interceptor with 52 and kickoff returner with a 26.4-yard career average. Renfro was drafted in the second round in 1964 after a career as an All-America halfback and world class sprinter at Oregon. A five-time All-Pro, Renfro was inducted into the Cowboys' Ring of Honor in 1981.
- ROGER STAUBACH, quarterback, 1969-79. Roger Staubach led the Cowboys to six NFC Championship Games, four Super Bowls and two Super Bowl titles. A great clutch performer, Staubach led Dallas to comeback victories 23 times, 14 in the last two minutes of overtime. A five-time Pro Bowler, he was drafted by Dallas in 1964 after winning the Heisman Trophy and Maxwell Award at the Naval Academy. Inducted into the Ring of Honor in 1983, Roger was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1985.
- LEE ROY JORDAN, linebacker, 1963-76. The inspirational leader of the Cowboys' first championship teams was Lee Roy Jordan. The Cowboys' first-round draft choice in 1963 following an All-America career at Alabama, Jordan anchored the "Doomsday Defense" from his middle linebacker position for 14 years. He was named to the Pro Bowl five times and All-Pro twice. Lee Roy was inducted into the Ring of Honor in 1989.



### HALL OF FAME

Four members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio, have been elected based on their accomplishments with the Cowboys — Bob Lilly in 1980, Roger Staubach in 1985, Tom Landry in 1990 and Tex Schramm in 1991.

Lilly, the first college player ever drafted by the Cowboys, was selected to play in the Pro Bowl 11 times while playing for Dallas from 1961 to 1974. Lilly came to the Cowboys after a collegiate career at Texas Christian University.

Staubach, known as "Captain Comeback" to Dallas fans, quarterbacked the Cowboys to four NFC Championships and victories in Super Bowl VI and XII. Staubach, a native of Cincinnati and a graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy, played for Dallas from 1969 to 1979.

Tom Landry compiled an overall record of 270-178-6 with two World Championships as the head coach of the Cowboys from 1960 to 1989. Landry helped build the Cowboys into "America's Team" along with Tex Schramm who served as the team's President and General Manager from 1960 to 1989.

# **Historical Highlights**

### 1960

**NFL FRANCHISE** — Clint Murchison, Jr., and Bedford Wynne were awarded an expansion franchise in the NFL at the annual league meeting in Miami Beach, Fla. The Cowboys were to play as a "swing" team, playing every other team one time during the first season, although listed in the Western Conference standings (January 28).

**COWBOYS STOCKED** — A player pool was set up in a league meeting at L.A., with each of 12 NFL teams freezing 25 names on its roster and the Cowboys allowed to pick three from each team for a total of 36 veterans. Dallas, once given the list, had to select its 36 players within 24 hours (March 13).

TRAINING STARTS — Rookies report to first Cowboys camp at Pacific U., in Forest Grove, Oregon (July 9).

FIRST PRE-SEASON GAME — The Cowboys, less than six months in existence, get their first test and drop a 16-10 pre-season game to San Francisco in Seattle (August 6).

FIRST HOME GAME — In their Dallas debut, in the Salesmanship Club preseason game, the Cowboys led the world champion Baltimore Colts into the final minute before a 62-yard pass from Johnny Unitas to Lenny Moore gave the Colts a 14-10 victory (August 19).

**FIRST VICTORY** — In a preseason game at Louisville, Ky., the Cowboys beat New York's Giants, 14-3, with Frank Clarke catching touchdown passes of 73 yards (Eddie LeBaron) and 74 yards (Don Meredith) (August 27).

FIRST LEAGUE GAME — In their first league game, Dallas fell to Pittsburgh, 35-28, with Bobby Layne leading a fourth-period Steeler rally (Sept. 24, Saturday night).

STREAK SNAPPED — Dallas snaps a 20-game loss streak by tying New York, 31-31, at Yankee Stadium (Dec. 4).

### 1961

TRAINING STARTS — Rookies launch training at new campsite — St. Olaf College in Northfield, Minn. (July 9).

FIRST LEAGUE WIN — Scoring ten points in the final 56 seconds, the Cowboys score their first NFL victory, 27-24, over Pittsburgh in the '61 league opener in the Cotton Bowl. Allen Green's 27-yard field goal on the game's final play won it before 23,500 (Sept. 17).

### 1962

**TRAINING STARTS** — Team begins training at new campsite — Northern Michigan College in Marquette, Mich. (July 13).

**PENALTY HISTORY** — For the first time in anyone's memory in an NFL game, points were awarded for a penalty. The Cowboys were detected holding in the end zone on a 99-yd. TD pass from LeBaron to Clarke, and Pittsburgh was awarded a safety. The Steelers eventually won, 30-28 (Sept. 23).

100-YARD FIRSTS — Cowboys' Amos Marsh returned a kickoff 101 yards and Mike Gaechter returned a pass interception 100 yards, both plays for fourth-quarter TDs in a 41-19 win over Philadelphia in Dallas. It was the first time in NFL history that two 100-yard runs had been made in the same game, much less by the same team in the same quarter (Oct. 14).

### 1963

SHIFT TO KANSAS CITY — The rival Dallas Texans of the AFL announce they are moving the franchise to Kansas City (Feb. 8).

CALIFORNIA TRAINING SITE — The Cowboys open training at California Lutheran College in Thousand Oaks, Calif. (July 12).

**HOWTON SETS RECORD** — Bill Howton broke Don Hutson's all-time receiving mark with a 14-yard catch against Washington (there). Hutson's record was 7,991 yards and the catch gave Howton an even 8,000 yards (Sept. 29).

### 1964

LANDRY CONTRACT — With one year to go on his original contract, Tom Landry is signed to a ten-year extension, in effect giving him an 11-year pact, possibly the longest in major pro sports history (Feb. 5).

### 1965

FIRST SELLOUT — An overflow crowd of 76,251 jams the Cotton Bowl for the Cleveland game, notching the team's first home sellout. Cleveland won, 24-17 (Nov. 21).

### 1966

**PLAYOFF BOWL** — After defeating New York, 38-20, in the season finale (and winning five of their last seven games) to get into the Playoff Bowl at Miami, the Cowboys fall to Baltimore, 35-3 (Jan. 15).

**MERGER** — Peace comes to pro football with Cowboys GM Tex Schramm completing two months of negotiations with AFL's Lamar Hunt, merging the two leagues under the NFL banner (June 8).

SCHRAMM ELEVATED — Texas E. Schramm, Vice-President and General Manager of the Cowboys from the beginning, was named President of the club by owner Clint Murchison, Jr., who retained the title of Chairman of the Board.

**NEELY CASE SOLVED** — Dallas and Houston reached agreement in the Ralph Neely case. Neely remained with Dallas with Houston receiving the Cowboys Nos. 1, 2 and two fifth place picks in the 1967 draft (Nov. 17).

**THE CHAMPIONSHIP** — The Cowboys won their first championship, capturing the Eastern Conference title with a 10-3-1 record, but lost the NFL Championship Game to Green Bay, 34-27.

### 1967

**TEXAS STADIUM** — On Dec. 23, owner Clint Murchison, Jr., formally announced plans to build Texas Stadium in suburban Irving. The stadium, to be financed through a bond-option plan, would be ready for the 1970 season. The stadium would seat a minimum of 58,000.

SECOND CHAMPIONSHIP — Under the NFL's new format, the Cowboys easily won the Capitol Division and defeated Cleveland, Century Division winner, 52-14, in the Cotton Bowl for the Eastern conference championship. However, on Dec. 31 in Green Bay, the Cowboys lost their second bid for an NFL title, falling to the Packers, 21-17, in the 13 degree below weather. 

### 1968

WIN CAPITOL — For the second straight year the Cowboys won the Capitol Division, but for the first time in three years the Cowboys did not win the Eastern Championship, being upset at Cleveland, 31-20, on December 21st. Dallas won the Runner-Up Bowl over Minnesota, 17-13.

### 1969

TEXAS STADIUM — Ground was broken for Texas Stadium in suburban Irving on January 25, and on June 29 Bert Rose was named general manager of the stadium. ORIGINALS RETIRE — An era ended for the Cowboys in July. On July 5th at a press conference in Dallas, quarterback Don Meredith, the last of the original Cowboys, announced his retirement. Then, on July 18th, the day the veterans were to report to training camp, all-time rushing great Don Perkins officially retired.

**REPEAT CAPITOL WINS** — Once again the Cowboys rolled to the Capitol Division Championship with an 11-2-1 season. However, the Cowboys failed to win the Eastern Championship when on Dec. 28, the Cowboys lost to Cleveland, 38-14, in the Cotton Bowl.

### 1970

FIVE STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS — The Cowboys won their last five games to finish 10-4, claim the Eastern Division championship and make the playoffs for the fifth year in a row. They defeated Detroit, 5-0, in the opening round to get a shot at the National Conference championship.

FIRST NFC TITLE — The Cowboys captured the biggest prize of their 11-year history on Jan. 3 when they downed San Francisco, 17-10, for the NFC crown. A 16-13 loss to Baltimore in the Super Bowl Jan. 17 left Dallas with one major goal still unrealized.

### 1971

**TEXAS STADIUM** — The Cowboys opened a new era in their sparkling Irving, Tex., home with a 44-21 victory over the New England Patriots on October 24. Duane Thomas scored the first touchdown in the new stadium, a 56-yard run just two minutes and 16 seconds after the opening kickoff. Attendance was 65,708.

SIX STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS — The Cowboys won their last seven games to finish 11-3, claim the Eastern Division championship and make the playoffs for the sixth year in a row. They defeated Minnesota, 20-12, in the opening round.

SECOND NFC TITLE — For the second consecutive year, the Cowboys met the San Francisco 49ers in the National Conference showdown. This time Dallas won, 14-3, to qualify for its second straight Super Bowl.

FIRST WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP — The Cowboys downed the Miami Dolphins, 24.3, to win Super Bowl VI in New Orleans on Jan. 16. It was the 10th victory in a row for Dallas as Roger Staubach passed for two touchdowns and was named the game's Most Valuable Player.

### 1972

FIRST 1,000-YARD BACK — Calvin Hill became the first Dallas player to rush for 1,000 yards when he gained 111 on Dec. 9 against the Washington Redskins in Texas Stadium. Hill wound up with 1,036 yards for the season on a record 245 carries.

SEVEN STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS — The Cowboys qualified for the NFL playoffs a record seventh consecutive year, their 10-4 record earning them the National Conference Wild Card berth. Roger Staubach passed for two touchdowns in the last 1½ minutes to give the Cowboys a 30-28 victory at San Francisco in the first round. Then, at Washington on New Year's Eve, Dallas was foiled in its bid for a third straight NFL title with the Redskins won, 26-3.

### 1973

100 VICTORIES — The Cowboys and Coach Tom Landry recorded their 100th victory with a 40-3 Texas Stadium win over the New Orleans Saints on Sept. 24. Landry, the only head coach the Cowboys have had, ended the season with a career mark of 108-80-6 to rank ninth on the list of the NFL's all-time winningest coaches.

EIGHT STRAIGHT PLAYOFFS — The Cowboys regained the NFC Eastern Division title with a 10-4 record and broke their own NFL record by reaching the playoffs for the eighth year in a row. Dallas defeated Western Division champion Los Angeles in the first round, 27-16, but fell to Central Division winner Minnesota in the NFC Championship Game, 27-10.

### 1974

FIRST TOP DRAFT CHOICE — For the first time in their history, the Cowboys had the very first choice in the NFL college draft. The No. 1 pick came to Dallas from Houston in exchange for Tody Smith and Billy Parks. The Cowboys selected Ed "Too Tall" Jones, a 6-9 260-pound defensive end from Tennessee State.

**PLAYOFFS MISSED** — The Cowboys' record-breaking string of eight straight years in the NFL playoffs was broken when the club's 8-6 record failed to qualify.

### 1975

LILLY HONORED — "Mr. Cowboy" was honored on Bob Lilly Day at Texas Stadium at halftime of the Philadelphia game on Nov. 23. It was the first such recognition ever given to a Dallas player. Lilly never missed a game in 14 years with the Cowboys, earning All-Pro honors seven times at defensive tackle before retiring prior to the '75 season.

**TEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS** — The Cowboys' 10-4 record earned them the NFC Wild Card berth in the playoffs. The composite record over 10 straight winning seasons was 101-37-2.

THIRD NFC TITLE — After shocking Minnesota in the first round, 17-14 on Roger Staubach's 50-yard "Hail Mary" pass to Drew Pearson, the Cowboys traveled to Los Angeles for the NFC showdown. Staubach threw four touchdown passes, three to Preston Pearson, and Dallas won, 37-7. Pittsburgh won Super Bowl X on Jan. 18 in Miami, 21-17.

### 1976

**MEREDITH, PERKINS HONORED** — Former Cowboys greats Don Meredith and Don Perkins joined Bob Lilly in the "Ring of Honor" at Texas Stadium during halftime ceremonies at the New York Giants game on Nov. 7.

**ELEVEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS** — The Cowboys won the NFC Eastern Division title with their 11.3 record, giving them their 11th straight winning season and 10th playoff berth in that period. A 14-12 first round loss to Los Angeles — the first time Dallas had lost in the first round under the current playoff setup — ended the season.

### 1977

**HOWLEY HONORED** — Former All-Pro linebacker Chuck Howley, a Cowboy from 1961 through 1973, became the fourth member of the Ring of Honor. Howley was honored during ceremonies at halftime of the Detroit Lions game on Oct. 30.

TWELVE STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS — Getting off to an 8-0 start, their best ever, the Cowboys rolled to a 12-2 record, the championship of the NFC East, and their 12th consecutive winning season. They opened their 11th visit to the playoffs in those 12 years with a 37-7 first-round victory over the Chicago Bears at Texas Stadium.

**FOURTH NFC TITLE** — Dallas crushed the Minnesota Vikings at Texas Stadium, 23-6, for National Conference crown No. 4 and the right to meet the Denver Broncos in Super Bowl XII.

SECOND WORLD CHAMPIONSHIP — The Cowboys stopped the Denver Broncos, 27-10, to win Super Bowl XII in New Orleans on January 15, 1978. In the process, Dallas tied Minnesota for most Super Bowl appearances (four) and Green Bay, Miami and Pittsburgh for most Super Bowl victories (two). Defensive linemen Harvey Martin and Randy White were named co-Most Valuable Players in the game.

### 1978

THIRTEEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS — After a mediocre 6-4 start, the Cowboys won six straight games to finish the expanded regular season with a 12-4 record and their 10th division crown. It marked the Cowboys' 13th consecutive winning season and 12th trip to the playoffs in that span. Dallas rallied to beat Atlanta 27-20 in a divisional playoff at Texas Stadium, sending the Cowboys to their seventh NFC championship game in the past nine years.

FIFTH NFC TITLE — Dallas shut out the Rams in Los Angeles 28-0 in the National Conference title game to advance to the Super Bowl a record fifth time, including three of the last four. In the first Super Bowl rematch, Pittsburgh edged the Cowboys 35-31 for the NFL championship on Jan. 21 in Miami's Orange Bowl.

### 1979

TWENTIETH ANNIVERSARY — The Cowboys celebrated their 20th anniversary season at halftime of the St. Louis Cardinals game at Texas Stadium on Oct. 21. Stars from each of those 20 seasons plus Coach Tom Landry were introduced during the halftime ceremonies.

FOURTH STRAIGHT NFC EAST TITLE — Rallying from a mid-season slump the Cowboys won their final three games to finish with an 11-5 record, their 11th division championship, including the past four NFC East titles, and 14th consecutive winning season. The Cowboys made their 13th trip to the playoffs in those 14 years, but were eliminated by Los Angeles 21-19 in a divisional playoff at Texas Stadium.

### 1980

STAUBACH RETIRES — At a press conference at Texas Stadium on March 31, quarterback Roger Staubach announced his retirement after 11 record-breaking years with the Cowboys. Staubach held all major Cowboys' passing records and was the all-time leading NFL passer.

LILLY ENTERS HALL OF FAME — Bob Lilly, a seven-time All-Pro defensive tackle in his 14-year career with the Cowboys from 1961-74, became the first Cowboys' only player to be inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Enshrined along with Lilly on Aug. 2 at Canton, Ohio, were Herb Adderley, who played for the Cowboys from 1970-72, Jim Otto and Deacon Jones.

FIFTEEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS — Behind new starting quarterback Danny White, the Cowboys rolled to their 15th consecutive winning season with a surprising 12-4 record, tied for best in the league with Philadelphia and Atlanta. The Cowboys lost the NFC East tille to Philadelphia on a tie-breaker, but entered the playoffs for the 14th game in 15 years, this time as a wild card team. The Cowboys beat Los Angeles 34-13 at Texas Stadium in the NFC Wild Card Game and rallied past the Falcons at Atlanta 30-27 to advance to the NFC Championship Game at Philadelphia. But the Cowboys lost 20-7 in their bid for a sixth Super Bowl appearance. LANDRY'S 200th VICTORY — Tom Landry joined George Halas and Curly Lambeau as the only coaches with 200 NFL victories when the Cowboys beat Los Angeles 34-13 on Dec. 28 at Texas Stadium in the NFC Wild Card Game, raising Landry's record to 200-119-6, counting regular season and playoff games.

### 1981

**RENFRO HONORED** — Former All-Pro defensive back Mel Renfro, the Cowboys' all-time leading pass interceptor, became the fifth member of the Cowboys' Ring of Honor. Renfro, who played for Dallas from 1964 through 1977, was honored during halftime ceremonies of the Cowboys-Miami Dolphins game at Texas Stadium Oct. 25. **TWELFTH DIVISION CHAMPIONSHIP** — The Cowboys regained the NFC Eastern Division Championship, their 12th division title since 1966, with a 12-4 record and tied Oakland's NFL mark of 16 consecutive winning seasons. Entering the playoffs

for the 15th time in that span,the Cowboys advanced to the NFC Championship Game for the ninth time in 12 years by routing Tampa Bay 38-0 at Texas Stadium. But for the second year in a row Dallas lost the conference title game. San Francisco scored a last-minute touchdown at Candlestick Park to edge the Cowboys 28-27 for a berth in Super Bowl XVI.

1982

**200TH REGULAR-SEASON VICTORY** — The Cowboys beat Washington 24-10 at RFK Stadium on Dec. 5 for the club's and Coach Tom Landry's 200th regular season victory.

SEVENTEEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS — The Cowboys finished the strikeshortened regular season with a 6-3 record to establish an NFL record of 17 consecutive winning seasons. Entering the playoffs for a record-tying eighth straight year and for the 16th time in 17 years, the Cowboys beat Tampa Bay 30-17 and Green Bay 37-26, both at Texas Stadium, to advance to the NFC Championship Game for the third year in a row. But again the Cowboys come up short, losing 31-17 at Washington.

1983

**STAUBACH HONORED** — Former quarterback Roger Staubach, who led the Cowboys to four Super Bowls, became the sixth member of the Ring of Honor during halftime ceremonies of the Cowboys-Tampa Bay game on Oct. 9.

NEW HEADQUARTERS — Ground was broken on Nov. 29 for the Cowboys' new headquarters and training facility at The Valley Ranch in northwest Dallas County. EIGHTEEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS — The Cowboys extended their NFL record to 18 consecutive winning seasons with a 12-4 finish. The club also set a league record with its ninth straight playoff appearance, qualifying as a wild card entry. The Los Angeles Rams eliminated the Cowboys from the playoffs, however, with a 24-17 upset victory at Texas Stadium in the NFC Wild Card Game on Dec. 26.

### 1984

SILVER SEASON — The Cowboys kicked off their 25th anniversary with a news conference at Texas Stadium on Jan. 27. Club President Tex Schramm announced the Cowboys would celebrate their 25th anniversary during 1984 under the theme "Silver Season."

**OWNERSHIP CHANGES HANDS** — The sale of the Cowboys from the Murchison family to an 11-member limited partnership headed by Dallas businessman H. R. "Bum" Bright was approved by NFL owners on March 19 at the league's annual meeting in Honolulu. The sale was completed on May 18.

**COWBOYS CENTER** — The Cowboys and Triland International announced plans on March 27 for Cowboys Center, an innovative joint venture that will develop business opportunities in a conference center, Cowboys ShowPlace, athletic club, sports arena, office park, housing, and retail and restaurant outlets on 200 acres at The Valley Ranch, adjacent to the Cowboys' new headquarters.

NINETEEN STRAIGHT WINNING SEASONS — The Cowboys defeated the Eagles 26-10 in Philadelphia to extend their NFL record to 19 consecutive winning seasons. The Cowboys finished 9-7 and missed the playoffs for the first time in 10 years and only the second time in 19 years.

### 1985

STAUBACH ENTERS HALL OF FAME — Roger Staubach, the master of the comeback victory during his 11-year career as a Cowboys quarterback, was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in his first year of eligibility. Enshrined with Staubach on Aug. 3 at Canton, Ohio, were Pete Rozelle, Joe Namath, O. J. Simpson and Frank Gatski. Staubach joined Bob Lilly as the only players who spent their entire career with the Cowboys to be elected to the Hall of Fame. TEXAS STADIUM IMPROVEMENTS — Texas Stadium unveiled a new look when the Cowboys opened their preseason schedule against Green Bay on Aug. 10. The stadium became the first to have two DiamondVision color scoreboards, and the addition of 118 Crown Suites gave Texas Stadium more private suites, 296, than any stadium in the nation.

CÓWBOYS RANCH OPENS — Cowboys players and coaches reported on Aug. 27 to the team's new headquarters and training facility at Cowboys Center in Valley Ranch.

**DORSETT PASSES 10,000 YARDS** — On a 19-yard sweep around left end, Tony Dorsett became the sixth player in NFL history to rush for 10,000 yards. Dorsett's feat highlighted a 27-13 victory over Pittsburgh at Texas Stadium on Oct. 13.

THIRTĚENŤH DIVISION CHAMPIONSHIP — The Cowboys edged the New York Giants 28-21 on Dec. 15 at Texas Stadium to capture the NFC Eastern Division championship for the first time since 1981. Picked in most season previews to finish third or fourth in the division, the Cowboys rallied for their NFL record 20th consecutive winning season, a 13th division title in 20 years and a playoff berth for the 18th time in that span. But in their NFL record 36th playoff game appearance, the Cowboys fell 20-0 to the Los Angeles Rams in Anaheim Stadium on Jan. 4.

#### 1986

COWBOYS GO TO LONDON — The Cowboys began preparations for their first trip to a foreign country when the NFL announced on March 12 that the Cowboys would play the Super Bowl champion Chicago Bears in a preseason game at London's Wembley Stadium on Aug. 3.

100TH WIN AT TEXAS STADIUM — Dallas defeated St. Louis 37-6 for the club's 100th victory at Texas Stadium. Since the facility opened in 1971 the Cowboys have compiled a 100-25 (.800) record.

STREAK BROKEN — The Cowboys' streak of 20 consecutive winning seasons from 1966 through 1985, third longest in professional sports history, came to an end when the club finished with a 7-9 record after losing seven of its last eight games. Only baseball's New York Yankees (39 straight winning seasons, 1926-64) and hockey's Montreal Canadiens (32 from 1951-52 through 1982-83) surpassed the Cowboys' accomplishment. After the 1986 season, the Washington Redskins' five straight winning campaigns (1982-86) represented the NFL's longest active streak.

#### 1987

FOUNDER DIES — Cowboys founder Clint Murchison, Jr., died March 30 after a long illness. Murchison, 63, who owned the club until 1984, acquired the expansion Dallas franchise in the NFL in 1960. He hired Tex Schramm as general manager, gave Tom Landry a 10-year contract when his coaching career was in doubt in 1964 and was instrumental in the building of Texas Stadium.

**DORSETT GETS 12,000 YARDS** — Tony Dorsett became the fourth rusher in NFL history to gain more than 12,000 yards when he registered 52 yards against the Rams on Dec. 21 for a career total of 12,036. The only runners ahead of Dorsett were Walter Payton, Jim Brown and Franco Harris.

### 1988

LANDRY TIES LAMBEAU — Dallas opened the 1988 season against Pittsburgh on Sept. 12 and Tom Landry tied an NFL record held by Curly Lambeau by coaching in his 29th consecutive season with the same team. Lambeau led the Green Bay Packers from 1921-49.

### 1989

JONES ACQUIRES COWBOYS, NAMED JOHNSON COACH — Jerry Jones reached an agreement to purchase the Cowboys from Bum Bright on Feb. 25 and announced that University of Miami Coach Jimmy Johnson would replace Tom Landry. SALE APPROVED, SCHRAMM RESIGNS — The sale of the Cowboys to Jerry Jones was unanimously approved by NFL owners on April 18 at a special meeting in New York. At the same meeting Tex Schramm was named president of the new World League of American Football. He announced his resignation as president and general manager of the Cowboys after 29 years with the club.

**AIKMAN SIGNED** — The Cowboys, holding the No. 1 pick in the NFL draft for only the second time in their history, announced the signing of quarterback Troy Aikman to a six-year contract on April 20.

### 1990

AUSTIN TRAINING CAMP — Beginning on July 18, nearly 100,000 fans visit the Cowboys' first ever in-state training camp at St. Edward's University in Austin.

LANDRY ENTERS HALL OF FAME — Tom Landry, who led the Cowboys to five Super Bowls and 20 consecutive winning seasons as the Cowboys head coach from 1960-88, was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in his first year of eligibility. Enshrined on Aug. 4 at Canton, Ohio, Landry joined former Dallas players Bob Lilly and Rober Staubach as the only Hall of Fame members who built their achievements with the Cowboys.

SMITH ROOKIE OF THE YEAR, JOHNSON COACH OF THE YEAR — Following a dramatic turn-around season where the team posted a 7-9 record and missed the playoffs by one game, Jimmy Johnson was named the NFL Coach of the Year by the Associated Press. Running back Emmitt Smith, who led all NFL rookie running backs in rushing yardage and touchdowns, was named the A.P.'s NFC Offensive Rookie of the Year.

#### 1991

**RECORD DRAFT HAUL INCLUDES MARYLAND AS NO. 1 OVERALL PICK** — After a pre-draft trade with the New England Patriots, the Cowboys used the No. 1 overall selection in the NFL Draft for only the third time in franchise history. Dallas chose Outland Trophy winner Russell Maryland (DT) with the top pick. The Cowboys went on to acquire 16 more choices, setting a club record for most selections in a 12 round draft with 17 overall.

SCHRAMM ENTERS HALL OF FAME — One of the NFL's true innovators, and the guiding force behind the development of America's Team, Tex Schramm was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on July 27, 1991. Schramm, who served as the President and General manager of the Dallas Cowboys from the team's conception in 1960 until his retirement in 1989, joined Staubach, Lilly and Landry with his enshrinement in Canton, Ohio.

**RETURN TO THE PLAYOFFS** — After winning the final five games of the season, Dallas finished with an 11-5 record — the team's best mark since the 1983 season. The initial spark to the winning streak was a 24-21 win over the eventual World Champion Washington Redskins on Nov. 24. The win, at Washington's RFK Stadium, ended the Redskins' bid for a perfect regular season after 11 straight wins. Dallas finished second in the NFC East and qualified as the NFC's No. 2 wild card playoff entry, marking the club's first post season trip since 1985. Dallas traveled to Chicago and defeated the Bears 17-13 in the opening round wild card game before dropping a 38-6 decision at Detroit the following week.

SMITH AND IRVIN LEAD NFL — Running back Emmitt Smith and wide receiver Michael Irvin became the first two players from the same team to lead the NFL in rushing yardage and receiving yardage in the same season. Smith had 1,563 yards rushing, while Irvin set single season club records for receptions (93) and receiving yardage (1,523). Both players were named to the NFC Pro Bowl squad along with tight end Jay Novacek and quarterback Troy Aikman. The Cowboys sent four offensive players to the Pro Bowl for the first time since 1979, and Irvin was named the MVP of the Pro Bowl Game.

The Corral, outside Gate 8, features food, beverage, entertainment and large screen televisions for fan hospitality before, during, and after all Cowboys home games and special events.
