## GREEN BAY ENTERS DRAFT WITH 10 SELECTIONS

Later this week, the Green Bay Packers will welcome another rookie class to their roster through the NFL Draft, which will be held April 23-25.

- ▶ Armed with 10 selections for the second straight year, the Packers will have plenty of opportunities to add more talent and depth to their roster. All picks are eligible to be traded.
- ▶ Green Bay enters the draft with a pick in every round, including three selections in the sixth round and two in the seventh round.
- ▶ If the Packers draft 10 players, it will mark the third draft in the last four years that Green Bay selected 10-plus players (11 in 2018 and 10 in 2017). From 2000-19, the Packers selected 10-plus players in a single draft eight times (2013, 11; 2011, 10; 2007, 11; 2006, 12; 2005, 11; 2000, 13) according to pro-football-reference.com.
- ▶ The event will begin in prime time on Thursday night, with Round 1 on April 23 beginning at 7 p.m. CT.
- ▶ Rounds 2-3 also will be held in prime time, beginning on Friday, April 24, at 6 p.m. CT. Rounds 4-7 will complete the draft on Saturday, April 25, starting at 11 a.m. CT.
- ▶ Teams will have 10 minutes in between selections in the first round and seven minutes between each choice for Round 2. Rounds 3-6, including compensatory picks, will allow up to five minutes in between picks and Round 7, including compensatory picks, will allow four minutes. ## GUTEKUNST LEADS PACKERS IN THIRD DRAFT AS GM

GM **Brian Gutekunst** enters his 22nd draft with the Packers and his third as the general manager.

- ▶ In the 2019 draft, Gutekunst selected eight players overall, including LB **Rashan Gary** (No. 12), S **Darnell Savage** (No. 21) and G **Elgton Jenkins** (No. 44) in the first two rounds. All three players played in 14-plus games last season with Savage and Jenkins both starting 14 16 games. Green Bay also got immediate returns from later-round picks DL **Kingsley Keke** (No. 150), who played in 14 games, and LB **Ty Summers** (No. 226) who played in all 16 games. Overall, all eight 2019 draft picks saw action in at least four games as rookies.
- ▶ In his first draft as general manager in 2018, Gutekunst made a couple of trades involving first-round picks that resulted in the Packers selecting CB **Jaire Alexander** at No. 18 and gaining the No. 30 pick in the 2019 draft. Alexander was named to the 2018 NFL All-Rookie team by

the PFWA and has led the Packers in passes defended in each of his first two seasons.

- ▶ Green Bay selected 11 players in Gutekunst's first draft as GM. For the first time since 2006 (five), the Packers had four or more rookies start six-plus games in 2018 (Alexander, 11; fifth-round pick WR **Marquez Valdes-Scantling**, 10; second-round pick CB **Josh Jackson**, 10; sixth-round selection WR **Equanimeous St. Brown**, seven). The Packers had rookies play in a league-high 171 games in 2018 and account for 50 starts, the most for Green Bay since 2006 (66 starts).
- ▶ Gutekunst spent his first 13 seasons with Green Bay as a college scout, serving as an East Coast regional scout for two years (1999-2000) before switching to the Southeast region (2001-11).
- ▶ During his first 13 drafts with the Packers, Gutekunst was part of a personnel department that drafted several Pro Bowlers, including WR **Donald Driver** (seventh round, 1999), who is the team's all-time leading receiver, QB **Aaron Rodgers** (first round, 2005), LB **A.J. Hawk** (first round, 2006), who is the leading tackler in franchise history, WR **Jordy Nelson** (second round, 2008), and LB **Clay Matthews** (first round, 2009), who is the franchise leader in sacks.
- ▶ Gutekunst was promoted to director of college scouting in 2012, a position he served in through 2015. Over that time period, Green Bay selected Pro Bowlers T **David Bakhtiari** (fourth round, 2013), who became the first Green Bay rookie to start every game at LT since the league went to a 16-game slate in 1978 and has been honored as an All-Pro by *The Associated Press* each of the last four years, RB **Eddie Lacy** (second round, 2012), who was named the NFL's Offensive Rookie of the Year by *AP*, and WR **Davante Adams** (second round, 2014), who has been selected to three straight Pro Bowls (2017-19).
- ▶ In 2016-17, Gutekunst served as director of player personnel and those two drafts were highlighted by the addition of DL **Kenny Clark** (first round, 2016), who earned his first trip to the Pro Bowl in 2019, and RBs **Jamaal Williams** (fourth round, 2017) and **Aaron Jones** (fifth round, 2017), who became the first Packers rookie duo to both register 400-plus rushing yards in a season (2017). In 2018, Jones became the first Packer to lead the NFL (min. 100 att.) in yards per carry (5.47 avg.), and in 2019 he recorded a franchise-best 23 total touchdowns (including postseason).

### WHO HAS BEEN THERE AT NO. 30?

Green Bay will have the No. 30 selection in the first round of the 2020 NFL Draft.

- The last time Green Bay entered the draft with the No. 30 selection (acquired from Seattle in 2018) was last year when they used it in a trade with the Seahawks to move up and draft S Darnell Savage at pick No. 21.
- The last time the Packers chose a player with the No. 30 pick was in 2015 when they selected DB Damarious Randall out of Arizona State.

- While first-round choices certainly can be key players for a franchise, as the Packers have shown with Pro Bowl selections QB **Aaron Rodgers** (2005), DL **Kenny Clark** (2016), LB **A.J. Hawk** (2006), LB **Clay Matthews** (2009), DT **B.J. Raji** (2009) and S **Ha Ha Clinton-Dix** (2014), and starters CB **Jaire Alexander** (2018) and T **Bryan Bulaga** (2010), second-round selections can prove to be just as valuable. WRs **Jordy Nelson** (2008) and **Randall Cobb** (2011) were both picked in the second round and became the first duo in NFL history to both have 90-plus receptions, 1,200-plus yards and 12-plus touchdown receptions in the same regular season (2014). Other second-round picks included G **Elgton Jenkins** (2019), who started the final 14 games and both postseason contests last season and was only the

second Packers guard to be selected to the PFWA All-Rookie team since 1974 (Daryn Colledge, 2006), CB **Kevin King** (2017), who tied for No. 4 in the NFL in 2019 with a career-best five interceptions, WR **Davante Adams** (2014) who became the first Packer wide receiver to make three consecutive Pro Bowls (2017-19) since Sterling Sharpe (1992-94), CB **Casey Hayward** (2012), who became the first CB in franchise history (since 1974) to be named to the All-Rookie Team by *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA, and RB **Eddie Lacy** (2013), who was named the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year by *The Associated Press* and earned a Pro Bowl selection in 2014.

- This year, Green Bay's has one pick in the second round (No. 62 overall). Here is a look at the players selected at No. 62 over the past 10 drafts (2010-19), including two times the Packers selected a player at No. 62:

- With 22 starters and a 53-man roster, selections in the third round often turn into significant contributors for a team. Examples are WR **James Jones** (2007), TE **Jermichael Finley** (2008), S **Morgan Burnett** (2010) and LB **Kyler Fackrell** (2016).
- The fourth and fifth rounds have also been a spot the Packers have found starters. The top two rushers for Green Bay last season were **Aaron Jones** (2017/fifth round) and **Jamaal Williams** (2017/fourth round). LB **Blake Martinez** (2016/fourth round) led the team in tackles each of the last three seasons. Of the Packers' main starters on the recent offensive lines, five were drafted in the fourth or fifth round: G **Josh Sitton** (2008/fourth round), G **T.J. Lang** (2009/fourth round), three-time All-Pro T **David Bakhtiari** (2013/fourth round), C/G **JC Tretter** (2013/fourth round) and C **Corey Linsley** (2014/fifth round). A mainstay on the Packers' defensive line from 2012-18, Pro Bowl DT **Mike Daniels** (2012) was also drafted in the fifth round. Green Bay has also found key contributors in all three phases in the fourth and fifth rounds: DB **Micah Hyde** (2013/fifth), LB **Jake Ryan** (2015/fourth), DL **Dean Lowry** (2016/fourth), P **JK Scott** (2018/fifth) and WR **Marquez Valdes-Scantling** (2018/fifth).
- Green Bay has received contributions from several late-round picks over the years, including DT **Johnny Jolly** (2006/sixth round), LB **Desmond Bishop** (2007/sixth round), K **Mason Crosby** (2007/sixth), QB **Matt Flynn** (2008/seventh), LB **Brad Jones** (2009/seventh), RB **James Starks** (2010/sixth), DE **C.J. Wilson** (2010/seventh), LB **Sam Barrington** (2013/seventh), LS **Hunter Bradley** (2018/seventh) and LB **Ty Summers** (2019/seventh).

## A LOOK INTO THE PERSONNEL DEPARTMENT

General Manager **Brian Gutekunst** heads up a talented and experienced player personnel staff.

► Members of the personnel staff have spent months, if not years with some prospects, studying for the 2020 NFL Draft. They visit schools throughout the season, attending practices, dozens of games and pro days in the spring. In each area, they have formed relationships with high school and college coaches, trying to get a better idea of who the person is, not just the football prospect.

► Working closely with Gutekunst year-round is Director - Football Operations **Milt Hendrickson** (16th NFL season), Co-Director of Player Personnel **Jon-Eric Sullivan** (17th NFL season), Co-Director of Player Personnel **John Wojciechowski** (25th NFL season), Director of College Scouting **Matt Malaspina** (23rd NFL season), National Scout **Sam Seale** (25th NFL season), Director of Pro Personnel **Richmond Williams** (13th NFL season), Assistant Director of Pro Scouting/Salary Camp Analyst **Chad Brinker** (11th NFL season), Personnel Executive **Lee Gissendaner** (20th NFL season) and Senior Advisor to Football Operations **Ted Thompson** (29th NFL season).

► Members of the scouting department include college scouts **Luke Benuska** (fifth NFL season), **Joe Hueber** (sixth NFL season), **Patrick Moore** (eighth NFL season), **Mike Owen** (ninth NFL season), **Charles Walls** (eighth NFL season), **Brandian Ross** (fourth NFL season), **Brett Thiesen** (second NFL season) and college scouting coordinator **Danny Mock** (33rd NFL season).

## DRAFT-A-THON
