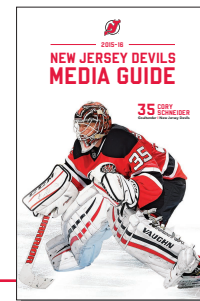

JOSHUA HARRIS — OWNER/CHAIRMAN/GOVERNOR

Along with Co-Owner David Blitzer, completed the purchase of the New Jersey Devils and its long-term operating interest in Prudential Center and related assets on August 15, 2013. He also serves as Managing Owner and Governor of the NBA's Philadelphia 76ers. In August 2014, was named *The Star-Ledger's* most influential individual – along with David Blitzer – in New Jersey sports. Harris is Managing Partner of Apollo Management, L.P., which he co-founded in 1990. He graduated summa cum laude from the

University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School of Business with a Bachelor of Science degree in Economics and received his MBA from the Harvard Business School where he was named a Baker and Loeb Scholar. Among other civic activities, Josh serves as a member of The Federal Reserve Bank of New York Investors Advisory Committee on Financial Markets and the Undergraduate Executive Board of The Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania. Josh has strong ties to northern New Jersey; his grandparents lived in Newark, while his father attended Caldwell High School.

DAVID BLITZER — OWNER/VICE CHAIRMAN/ALT. GOVERNOR

Along with Co-Owner Joshua Harris, completed the purchase of the New Jersey Devils and its long-term operating interest in Prudential Center and related assets on August 15, 2013. He is also the Co-Managing Owner and Alternate Governor of the NBA's Philadelphia 76ers. Named the most influential individual in New Jersey sports – along with Joshua Harris – by *The Star-Ledger*, August 2014. Blitzer is a Senior Managing Director and Co-Chair in the Private Equity Group at The Blackstone Group and is a member of the firm's

Executive Committee. David is based in New York following 10 years in London establishing Blackstone's corporate private equity business in Europe. Since joining Blackstone in 1991, David has been involved in the execution of its investments in Spirit Group, SULO, Allied Waste, Aspen Insurance Holdings, Houghton Mifflin, Universal Orlando, Centerplate, Cadillac Fairview, Edward J. DeBartolo Corporation, Southern Cross, NHP, Orangina, United Biscuits and Jack Wolfskin. Blitzer graduated magna cum laude from the Wharton School of the University of Pennsylvania, and he currently serves as a Director of United Biscuits and Jack Wolfskin. A native of Scotch Plains, NJ, David's parents still live in the home that he was raised in, while his grandparents also grew up in New Jersey.



SCOTT O'NEIL — CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER, NEW JERSEY DEVILS AND PRUDENTIAL CENTER



Scott O'Neil, one of the most respected executives in the sports business industry, was named Chief Executive Officer for the NHL's New Jersey Devils and the Prudential Center on August 15, 2013. He is charged with leading the Devils' business operations, as well as overseeing the Prudential Center and its broad entertainment offerings, which was added to the responsibility he had assumed three weeks earlier when he was named in a similar capacity as CEO of the Philadelphia 76ers – both ownership groups are led by Josh Harris. O'Neil will also serve as an Alternate Governor for both the Devils and Sixers at the Board of Governors meetings for the respective leagues.

O'Neil has built a reputation as a strong leader who excels in challenging situations by attracting and developing world class talent and creating an unrivaled performance based culture and discipline. He has been invited to be the featured speaker at some of the nation's most prestigious universities, including Harvard, Princeton and the University of Pennsylvania, while also serving as a panelist at the industry's most influential conferences, the Bloomberg Sports Business Summit and the Beyond Sport Summit.

Most recently, O'Neil served as president of Madison Square Garden Sports, where he oversaw the business operations of The Madison Square Garden Company's (MSG) three professional sports teams, the New York Knicks, New York Rangers and New York Liberty, leading some of the most coveted brands in sports. O'Neil was the key architect in several of the largest deals in NBA history, resulting in record-setting revenue in sponsorships, tickets and suites.

O'Neil came to MSG from the NBA, where as senior vice president, he oversaw the league's team marketing and business operations. He advised NBA and WNBA teams on ticket sales and service, sponsorship development, and marketing. He also managed the NBA's Canadian business, Relationship Marketing, and the NBA Development League.

Prior to joining the NBA in May 2001, O'Neil served as President of HoopsTV.com where he oversaw a management team and staff of 60 and orchestrated strategic partnerships with leading companies such as ESPN, Footaction and numerous online partners. During his career, O'Neil also spent five years with the Philadelphia Eagles, where he was appointed the youngest Vice President of Sales in the NFL, and two years with the New Jersey Nets as a Corporate Marketing Manager.

An avid writer, O'Neil has published two cases for the Harvard Business School, "Success Factors in Minor League Baseball" and "Balancing Work and Family" in 1998. He has also written and published a book titled, "Fantasy Land to the Rat Race" released in 2000 and geared towards young executives in the workplace.

O'Neil holds a degree in Marketing from Villanova University and M.B.A. from the Harvard Business School. He and his family currently reside in Pennsylvania.

HUGH WEBER — PRESIDENT OF BUSINESS OPERATIONS



As president of business operations, oversees all aspects of Devils Arena Entertainment, including the franchise's business operations and Prudential Center. Weber has a track record of creating fan-friendly, partnership-driven and "elite" best-in-class organizations.

Most recently, Weber was president and alternate governor of the NBA's New Orleans Hornets. In his seven-year tenure, the organization experienced success on and off the court.

The team achieved record-setting ticket sales and sponsorship numbers while creating a number of significant community initiatives. Through the tireless efforts of every employee, coach and player, the Hornets' organization gained long-term stability in the region under difficult circumstances.

The organization took a leading role in the renaissance of the region. In an unprecedented initiative, "100 events in 100 nights," the team executed small gatherings hosted in the homes of current season ticket holders, partners, and local businesses. Through a coordinated effort, the team secured financial success, a long-term lease with the state, and stable local ownership.

In 2010, Weber reorganized the Hornets' basketball operations, using a collaborative philosophy, defined value system, and strong work ethic as key principles. He was able to assemble one of the best young organizations in the league, described by some as an "All-Star" team. Weber brought in a dynamic, young head coach in Monty Williams, and hired General Manager Dell Demps, a prodigy from the highly-successful San Antonio Spurs organization.

Prior to his role as team president, Weber served as chief operations officer and vice president of business operations, overseeing all aspects of the New Orleans market, while the team was temporarily headquartered in Oklahoma City from 2005-2007.

Weber is a board member of a variety of community, economic development and entrepreneurship organizations, reflecting his priority to invest in the community.

Hugh has four children, Brenna (20), Zoë (20), Hugh III (14) and Jackson (13). In addition to his Devils' duties, he enjoys running, reading and being a father.



**RAY SHERO — EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT,
HOCKEY OPERATIONS/GENERAL MANAGER**



Named fourth general manager in team history May 4, 2015; has overall authority regarding all hockey decisions...Spent eight seasons, 2006-07 through 2013-14, as executive vice president and general manager of the Pittsburgh Penguins...Named to post in May 2006 and turned the club into a perennial playoff contender...During that time, the team compiled a 373-193-56 (.645) mark, won the 2009 Stanley Cup Championship, two consecutive Eastern Conference titles in 2007-08 and 2008-09 and had three first-place divisional finishes...Recipient of the General Manager of the Year Award in 2012-13, as voted on by the 30 NHL GMs, a panel of NHL executives, as well as print and broadcast media...Previously spent 14 seasons as an assistant general manager with the Ottawa Senators (1993-98) and Nashville Predators (1998-2006)...Actively involved with USA Hockey; is a member of its National Team Advisory Board, and most recently served as associate general manager for the 2014 Winter Olympic Games...Also spent seven seasons as a player agent prior to making the transition to the

front office...A forward, was drafted by Los Angeles in the 11th round (216th overall) of the 1982 NHL Entry Draft...Played collegiately for four seasons at St. Lawrence University (Canton, NY) and served as the team's captain on two occasions...Led the school in scoring twice, and graduated in 1984 as one of the top-ten scorers in Saints' history...Son of the late Hockey Hall of Fame Head Coach Fred Shero; Ray and his dad are one of the few father-son tandems to each have their names engraved on the Stanley Cup...Fred served as the Devils' radio commentator in the 1980's...A native of St. Paul, MN; Ray and his wife, Karen, have two sons: Chris, 18, who attends Boston College and Kyle, 15, who is attending Kimball Union Academy (NH).

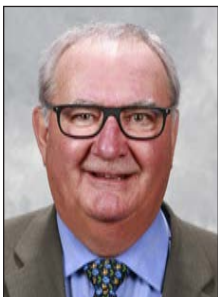

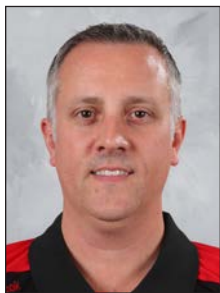

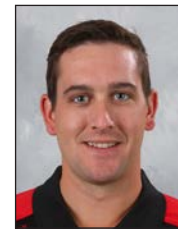

Prudential Center is among the National Hockey League’s newest arenas, and at the time of its opening, was the first state-of-the-art, major sports and entertainment facility to open in the New Jersey/New York metropolitan area in more than 25 years.

Kansas City-based HOK Sport+Venue+Entertainment, a renowned leader in sports facility design and construction, served as the project architect. The exterior of the building was designed by Morris Adjmi Architects of New York City, and is based on the rich history of Newark – the nation’s third-oldest major city. Newark’s El Taller Colaborativo, among the largest and fastest-growing minority-owned architectural firms in the northeastern United States, also collaborated on the project.

In just eight years since opening its doors, Prudential Center has enjoyed a meteoric rise to the top of the sports and entertainment industry. “The Rock” is an industry leader, not only in New Jersey, but worldwide. It has also become one of the hottest music venues of its size in the United States to host Hispanic cultural shows.

Part of Newark’s Downtown Core District Redevelopment Plan, Prudential Center is bound by Edison Place on the north, Lafayette Street on the south, Mulberry Street on the east, and off Broad Street on the west.

Prudential Center is located just two city blocks from Newark’s Penn Station, and is among the most accessible sports venues in the country, serviced by New Jersey Transit’s rail and bus lines, PATH, light rail and AMTRAK. In fact, nearly half of the arena’s guests arrive by mass transit.

Prudential Center is a multi-purpose venue that holds 16,592 fans for hockey and 18,711 for basketball, serving as the home to Seton Hall University Men’s Basketball. Versatile enough to hold any sized event with more loading docks and storage space than its competitors to load in back-to-back events, Prudential Center is capable of hosting concerts, mixed martial arts, boxing, skateboarding, family shows, circuses, conventions, corporate events, ice shows and more.

Over the last several years, Prudential Center has hosted the 2012 NHL Stanley Cup Finals and professional basketball games including the New Jersey Nets and the New York Liberty. Prudential Center also hosted the 2013 NHL Entry Draft, the 2011/2012 NBA Drafts, the 2011 NCAA Men’s Basketball East Regionals, 2011-2013 Street League Skateboarding Championships, Rolling Stones, Taylor Swift, Bruce Springsteen, Andrea Bocelli, Bruno Mars, Foo Fighters, Cirque du Soleil, Michael Jackson-THE IMMORTAL World Tour, *X Factor* and *American Idol* auditions and McDonald’s *Gospelfest*. The Rock has also hosted a speech by President Barack Obama and New Jersey Governor Chris Christie’s Inauguration party.

The Devils’ practice facility – AmeriHealth Pavilion – is located along Lafayette Street. Prudential Center is one of only two National Hockey League arenas to have a connecting practice rink. It also serves as the home to Brick City Boxing, in addition to youth, high school and adult hockey programs and *Hockey In Newark*.

Prudential Center features a four-level seating bowl, four sideline suites, and two exclusive club level lounges. There are 74 suites spanning two private concourses, along with two larger party suites.

On Suite Level One, the Bud Light Goal Bar overlooks the arena floor on the north end. It offers premium seating with the luxury one would find in their own home. The 350-seat restaurant on the south end overlooks both the main rink and AmeriHealth Pavilion. The restaurant offers an extensive wine collection unrivaled among North American arenas.

The focal point of the seating bowl is an eight-sided, multi-level, center-hung scoreboard featuring four primary high-definition 16:9 video screens. Two full-color LED rings, and eight additional rectangular screens complete the 65,000-pound, 30-foot tall by 32-foot wide scoreboard. A 940-foot display circle the lower arena bowl, while four additional horizontal displays line the upper level.

Some of Prudential Center’s best features are its ultra-wide concourses which allow for ease of movement, and an array of superb food options (including the first gluten-free offerings in an arena). Carefully designed sightlines create spectacular views from every seat while giving visitors an intimate feel for the action.

The fan experience begins outside Prudential Center in Championship Plaza, a brick-paved, fan message-driven courtyard. Championship Plaza features a 22-foot tall, three-ton, metal “Ironman” hockey player statue and live entertainment with a block-party atmosphere during FanFest celebrations.

SPORTS & THE ARTS

Prudential Center includes original abstract, contemporary and figurative paintings created by the renowned artists of Los Angeles, CA-based Sports & the Arts, and have been selected from across the United States and Canada.

The 200-foot wide by 30-foot high free-form mural on the west side of Prudential Center's Grand Concourse was created on site by artist Tom Mosser, and depicts local points of interest, architecture and teams. The mural is titled "Impressionistic Realism," and features artwork that captures the essence of New Jersey's sports and entertainment history.

AMERIHEALTH PAVILION AT PRUDENTIAL CENTER

On September 11, 2008, the Devils' practice facility was formally introduced as "AmeriHealth Pavilion at Prudential Center," during a ribbon-cutting ceremony.

Among those in attendance were: former Devils' Chairman/Managing Partner Jeff Vanderbeek; former Co-owner Mike Giffillan; AmeriHealth New Jersey President/CEO Judith L. Roman; and Vice President, Sales/Marketing Mike Munoz.

Prudential Center remains one of just two NHL arenas with a practice rink. The AmeriHealth Pavilion at Prudential Center's logo sign at the Lafayette/Mulberry Street entrance was unveiled during the program.

CHAMPIONSHIP PLAZA

Prudential Center's Championship Plaza is an outdoor area celebrating the rich 34-year history and tradition of the New Jersey Devils. Located across from PNC Bank Tower on Mulberry Street between Edison Place and Market Street in Newark, it has become the gathering place for Devils' fans before and after each game.

The centerpiece of Championship Plaza is an in-ground, 60-foot in diameter Devils' logo. Constructed of granite, the logo is surrounded by pieces of stone commemorating each of the team's three Stanley Cup Championships. A 22-foot tall, 7,000-pound, stainless steel hockey player statue, sculpted by New Jersey native Jon Krawczyk, graces the north end of the plaza on Market Street. Championship Plaza also include bricks recognizing the team's 1987-88 Patrick Division Playoff Championship, five Eastern Conference Championships and nine Atlantic Division titles.

Centered along Mulberry Street is a solid granite, custom-sculpted Prudential Rock. Prudential Financial's well-known brand symbol was inspired by the Rock of Gibraltar, and represents the company's strength, stability and financial security. Prudential has been part of the Newark community since its founding in 1875.

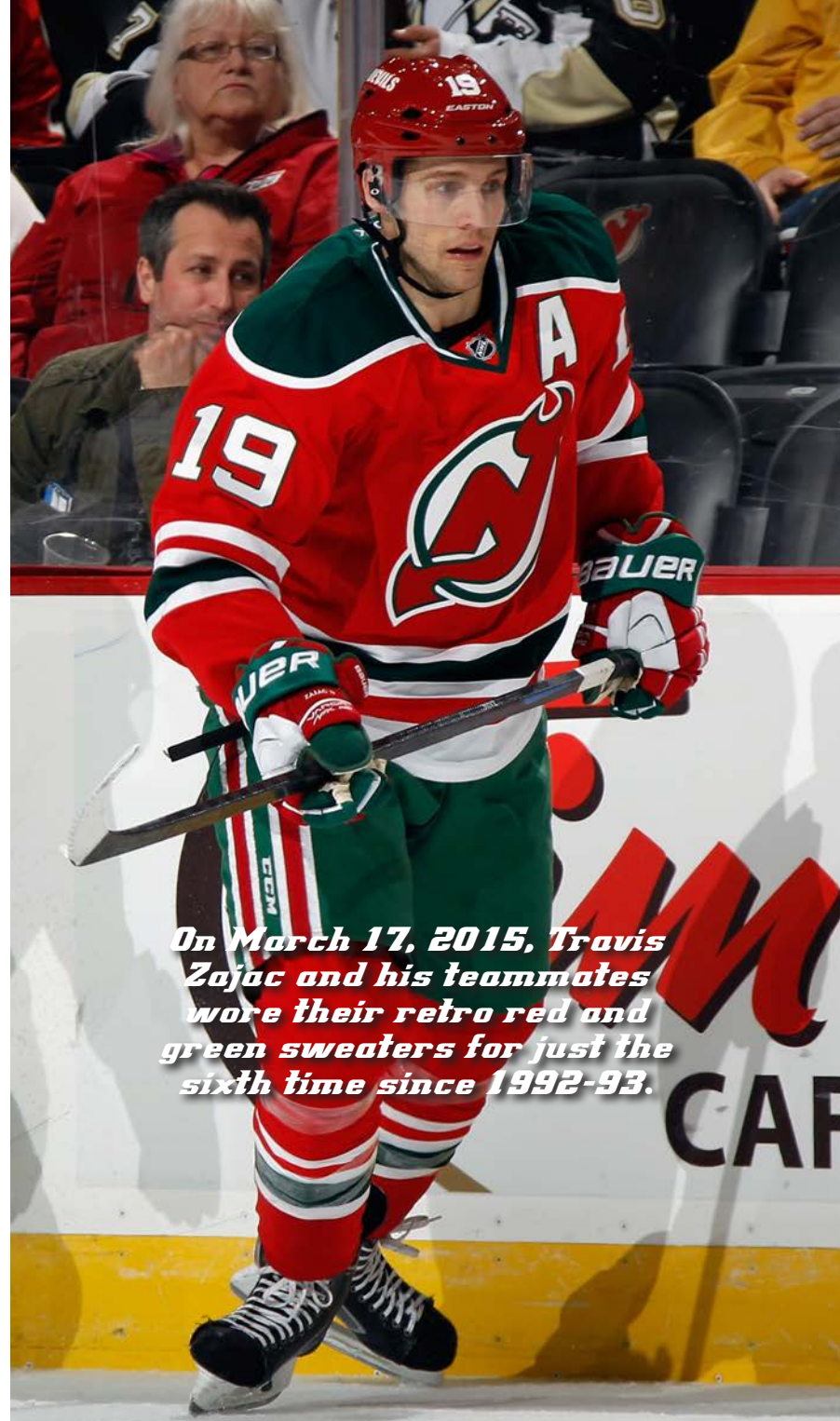

ALUMNI ASSOCIATION**MISSION STATEMENT**

The Devils Alumni Association was formed with the purpose of bringing together former Devils' players to develop enjoyable civic activities and charitable fundraisers, of participating in worthwhile charity/community service programs, and developing means to help promote amateur hockey.

CHARITY GOLF CLASSIC

The organization held its 15th annual charity golf classic on Wed., Sept. 16 at Neshanic Valley Golf Course in Neshanic Station, NJ. The event benefited various programs through the alumni association.

Former Devils' defenseman and association director Bruce Driver was the tournament's chairman. Among the participants were former Devils Shawn Chambers, Tom Chorske, Ken Daneyko, Jim Dowd, Bob Hoffmeyer, John MacLean, Grant Marshall, Glenn Resch, Mike Rupp, Chris Terrier and Colin White, as well as current players, coaches, and broadcasters.

Devils/Sports Radio 66 AM/101.9 FM WFAN broadcasters Matt Loughlin and Sherry Ross handled the emcee duties for the tournament dinner.

SCHOLARSHIPS

Among the association's charitable endeavors, four \$2,500 scholarships are provided annually to deserving high school senior hockey players. The purpose of this program is to assist in their education at the college or university of their choice.

This year's winners were: Sean Crowley (St. Peter's Prep), Fordham University; Benjamin Handler (Hanover Park H.S.), Butler University; Austin Knapp (Jonathan Dayton H.S.), University of Connecticut; and Michael Slavin (Randolph H.S.), University of Maryland.

The scholarships were presented at the NJSIAA scholarship luncheon on Sun., May 17 in Edison, NJ. Winners were nominated by their athletic director or coach and complied with scholarship rules, which included the following criteria: through their most recent grading period, the applicant must have attained a high school cumulative grade-point average of 2.5 (on a 4.0 grading system) or equivalent grade if the student's school uses a different grading system.

Additionally, the applicant must have shown a commitment to volunteer work and community service through continued participation in a variety of projects or community organizations. Community activities should reflect that the applicant is unselfishly "giving back" to society and that the applicant is motivated to serve.

Each winner must be accepted for admission on a full-time matriculating basis to a two- or four-year academic program at an accredited post-secondary educational institution.

This marked the 12th year of the alumni association's scholarship program.

PLAYER INVOLVEMENT**HOSPITAL VISITS**

During the holiday season, members of the Devils visit the pediatric wards of local hospitals, following a practice session at Prudential Center in Newark.

Hospitals included annually are: Hackensack University Medical Center, Hackensack, NJ; Holy Name Medical Center, Teaneck, NJ; Robert Wood Johnson University, New Brunswick, NJ; Morristown Medical Center, Morristown, NJ; Overlook Hospital and Valerie Center, Summit, NJ; Saint Barnabas Medical Center, Livingston, NJ; Saint Joseph's Hospital, Paterson, NJ; and University Hospital, Newark, NJ.

For the first time, more than 40 Devils' players visited four hospitals during the team's 2015 development camp. The visits took place on July 16 throughout northern New Jersey.

GAME BREAK

Following the Devils' March 18 practice session at AmeriHealth Pavilion, the players broke up into seven groups of three-four each to attend community events throughout northern New Jersey.

Events included *Read Across America*, Public School no. 23, Jersey City, NJ and Robert D. Reynolds School, Upper Saddle River, NJ; *Hockey in Newark*, Ironbound Arena, Newark, NJ; PSE&G Luncheon, Prudential Center, Newark, NJ; Saint Barnabas Medical Center pediatric ward, Livingston, NJ; Randolph High School ice hockey team, Randolph, NJ; and the management of the Ice Vault, Wayne, NJ.

The Devils join schools across the United States each spring in celebrating *Read Across America*. Players, alumni, and broadcasters visit local schools in an effort to promote literacy and education by reading to elementary school children.

As part of the NHL's *Hockey is for Everyone* initiative, *Hockey In Newark* is a non-profit organization committed to offering the game of hockey to Newark youth, regardless of their backgrounds or abilities. Over 200 children have taken part in their programming this year, and over 1,000 since its creation in 2003.

Newark-based PSE&G is one of the largest combined electric and gas companies in the United States and is also New Jersey's oldest and largest publicly owned utility.

Since 1865, Saint Barnabas Medical Center, New Jersey's oldest nonprofit, nonsectarian hospital has worked to exceed the community's highest expectation for compassionate, comprehensive health care.

The 2015 Devils/NJSIAA High School Ice Hockey Championships, *presented by Barnabas Health*, took place Mon., March 9 with three games at Prudential Center, marking the 19th year that the team hosted the state championships. Randolph defeated Howell, 2-1, in the Public A School Championship; Middletown North defeated Ramsey, 5-4, in the Public School B Finals; while Christian Brothers Academy defeated Delbarton, 4-3, in the Non-Public School Championship.

Through the Devils' Grassroots Department, the organization has partnered with more than 20 local hockey rinks throughout the metropolitan area. Through this program, the team provides on-ice clinics, roller hockey clinics, in-arena banners, dashboard signs, mascot appearances, email blasts, alumni appearances and contests.

HOCKEY FIGHTS CANCER

Hockey Fights Cancer™ is a charitable initiative founded in December 1998 by the National Hockey League® and National Hockey League Players' Association. The Devils hosted *Hockey Fights Cancer* Night at Prudential Center on Tue., Nov. 4. Devils' executives, coaches and broadcasters wore *HFC* lavender ties, while *HFC*-themed merchandise was available for sale, including ties, hats, and scarves, to help increase awareness for the program.

To date, *HFC* has raised more than \$15 million via the National Hockey League's United States and Canadian charitable foundations. *HFC* is also a component of *The Biggest Assist Happens Off The Ice*®, the National Hockey League's and National Hockey League Players' Association's social responsibility program that builds on hockey's long-standing tradition of addressing important social issues in North America and around the world. Devils' game night drives are successful for one reason – we receive tremendous support from our fans.

At each of our drives, wives/girlfriends of the Devils' players are on hand to assist in the collections at each of Prudential Center's entrances.

For approximately four weeks prior to the events, each drive is promoted through press releases, the Devils' *Center Ice* game program, MSG Plus, Devils/Sports Radio 66 AM/101.9 FM WFAN broadcasts, as well as scoreboard and public address announcements, to raise the public's awareness of each drive as well as each organization involved.

FOOD DRIVE

The Devils' Food Drive was held Sat., Nov. 15 in conjunction with the Community FoodBank of New Jersey. Fans attending that night's game were encouraged to bring unopened cans or boxes of non-perishable food. Requested items included canned fish/meat, powdered milk and infant formula, boxed/canned meals, peanut butter, and canned vegetables/fruits.

The CFB of NJ, a member of *Feeding America*, distributes 43 million pounds of food and groceries annually, helping non-profit groups such as food pantries, shelters, soup kitchens, child care centers and senior programs. The CFB of NJ serves nearly 1,400 organizations in 18 counties throughout the state, picking up donations from more than 250 corporations with its small fleet of trucks. Its staff and volunteers fight hunger and poverty not only through

the distribution of food and grocery products, but by education, training, and by creating new programs to meet the needs of low-income people.

NEW JERSEY HOCKEY**HIGH SCHOOL PLAYERS OF THE MONTH**

The Devils continue to honor top student-athletes throughout the state of New Jersey with its High School *Player of the Month/Year* program. Each month from December through February, seven high school hockey players from different conferences are selected as recipients of the award.

Three All-Tournament Teams are selected in March, while overall boys' and girls' High School *Players of the Year* are chosen at the conclusion of the season.

Junior defenseman Ryan Bogan of Christian Brothers Academy was named the boys' *Player of the Year*, while senior forward Kendall Corinne of Morristown-Bear School was the girls' *Player of the Year*.

Award winners and their guests receive tickets to a Devils' game, a plaque presented by a Devils' player, and dinner, compliments of the Devils. This year marks the 24th season that the Devils will honor high school student-athletes.

AC Joint: Acromioclavicular joint, joint of the shoulder where acromion process (tip of the scapula) and the distal end of the clavicle meet; most shoulder separations occur at this point.

Adhesion: Abnormal adherence of collagen fibers to surrounding structures during immobilization following trauma or as a complication of surgery which restricts normal elasticity of the structures involved.

Aerobic: Exercise in which energy needed is supplied by oxygen inspired; required for sustained periods of hard work and vigorous exercise.

Anaerobic: Exercise without the use of oxygen as an energy source; short bursts of vigorous exercise.

Anterior Cruciate Ligament (ACL): Ligament of knee attaching the anterior tibial plateau and the posterior medial aspect of femoral condyle. It provides stability in keeping the lower leg from coming forward.

Anterior Talofibular Ligament: A ligament of the ankle that connects the fibula (lateral ankle bone) to the talus (dome-like bone of the foot). This is the most common ankle ligament sprain.

Anti-inflammatory: Any agent which prevents inflammation (such as aspirin or ibuprofen).

Arthroscope: An instrument used for visualization of the interior of a joint cavity; sometimes referred to as "scope".

Arthroscopy: Examination of the internal structures of a joint by means of a surgical viewing apparatus (arthroscope) inserted into the joint.

Atrophy: To shrivel or shrink from disuse, as in muscular atrophy.

Bone scan: "Radionuclide Imaging," which is useful to demonstrate stress fractures not evident on routine x-rays.

Brachial Plexus: Network of nerves originating from the cervical vertebrae and running down into the arms.

Bursa: A fluid-filled sac that is located in areas where friction occurs most; its purpose is to minimize any friction in these areas (for example, between a tendon and a bone).

Cartilage: Smooth, slippery material covering the (articular) ends of bones allowing contact of the joint surfaces. The substance that degenerates with age or trauma and leads to arthritis.

CAT Scan: Use of a computer to produce a cross sectional view of the anatomical part being investigated by x-ray data.

Cervical Vertebrae: Group of seven vertebrae located in the neck.

Charley Horse: A bruise to the quadriceps resulting from a direct blow to the front of the thigh, characterized by intramuscular bleeding. No other injury should be called a charley horse.

Chondromalacia: A roughening of the cartilage surface. Best known for the softening of the underside of the knee cap.

Clavicle: Collar bone; the bone connecting the breastbone with the shoulder blade.

Coccyx: The "tail bone", a group of four vertebrae that are fused together to form a small triangular bone, located at the terminal end of the spine.

Concussion: Jarring injury of the brain resulting in dysfunction. Can be graded as mild, moderate or severe depending on loss of consciousness, amnesia and loss of equilibrium.

Contusion: An injury to the muscles and tissues caused by a blow from a blunt object.

Cryotherapy: A treatment with the use of cold.

Deltoid Muscle: Muscle at the top of the arm, just below the shoulder, responsible for shoulder motions to the front, side, and back.

Disc, Intervertebral: A flat, round-like, plate structure between each vertebrae of the spine. The disc consists of a thick fiber ring which surrounds a soft gel-like interior. It functions as a cushion and shock absorber for the spinal column.

Dislocation: Complete displacement of the joint surfaces.

Electrical Galvanic Stimulation (EGS): An electrical therapeutic modality that sends a current to the body at select voltages and frequencies in order to stimulate pain receptors, disperse edema, or neutralize muscle spasms among other functional applications.

Epicondylitis: Inflammation in the elbow due to overuse of either the flexor or extensor muscles attaching to the medial or lateral epicondyle of the humerus.

Fat Percentage: The amount of body weight that is adipose, fat tissue. Fat percentage can be calculated by underwater weighing, measuring select skinfold thickness or by analyzing electrical impedance.

Fibula: The smaller of the two bones in the lower leg; runs from the knee to the ankle along the outside of the lower leg.

Fracture: Breach in the continuity of a bone. Types of fractures include simple, compound, comminuted, greenstick, incomplete, impacted, longitudinal, oblique, stress or transverse.

Grade One Injury: A mild injury in which ligament, tendon, or other musculoskeletal tissue may have been stretched or confused, but not torn or otherwise disrupted.

Grade Two Injury: A moderate injury when musculoskeletal tissue has been partially, but not totally, torn which causes appreciable limitation in function of the injured tissue.

Grade Three Injury: A severe injury in which tissue has been significantly, and in some cases totally, torn or otherwise disrupted causing a virtual total loss of function.

Groin: Junction of the thigh and abdomen; location of muscles that rotate, flex and abduct the hip.

Hamstring: Muscle running from the buttocks to behind the knee. Often injured as a result of improper conditioning or lack of muscle flexibility. Responsible for flexing the knee joint.

Hematoma: A tumor-like mass produced by an accumulation of coagulated blood in a cavity.

Hip Pointer: Contusion to the iliac crest and rectus femoris muscle of the quadriceps.

Hydrotherapy: Treatment using water.

Hyperextension: Extreme extension, or straightening, of a limb or body part.

Inflammation: The body's natural response to injury in which the injury site might cause pain and display various degrees of swelling, heat, redness and/or loss of function.

Internal fixation: A surgical procedure to repair fractures that are unstable and require the use of screws, plates or internal metal rods.

Isometric (static) Contraction: A muscle contraction in which tension is developed but no mechanical work is done. There is no appreciable joint movement and the overall length of the muscle remains the same.

Lateral Collateral Ligament (LCL): Ligament of the knee attaching the lateral femoral condyle to the fibula head. It provides lateral stability to the joint.

Ligament: Band of fibrous tissue that connects bone to bone or bone to cartilage and supports and strengthens joints.

Ligament Reconstruction: Surgical procedure to recreate an irreparable ligament using a tendon or ligament graft from another site or cadaver.

Lumbar Vertebrae: Five vertebrae of the lower back that articulate with the sacrum to form the lumbosacral joint.

Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI): Provides highly detailed pictures of the body's interior, using highly magnetic fields. Does not require radiation and is very useful in the diagnosis of soft tissue, disc and meniscus injuries.

Medial Collateral Ligament (MCL): Ligament of the knee attaching the medial femoral condyle to the medial tibia. It provides medial stability to the knee.

Meniscus: Crescent shaped soft cartilage usually pertaining to the knee joint that acts as a shock absorber, assists in lubrication and adds joint stability.

Metacarpals: Five long bones of the hand, joining the fingers to the wrist.

Metatarsals: Five long bones of the foot, running from the ankle to the toes.

Orthotic: Any device applied to or around the body in the care of a physical impairment or disability, commonly used to control foot mechanics.

Patella: The kneecap. Functions to protect the distal end of the femur as well as increase the mechanical advantage and force generating capacities of the quadriceps muscle group.

Patella Tendinitis: Inflammation of the patella tendon; also known as "jumper's knee".

Posterior Cruciate Ligament (PCL): Ligament of the knee attaching the posterior tibial plateau to the anterior lateral aspect of the femoral condyle. It provides stability in keeping the lower leg from going backward.

Quadriceps (Quads): The four powerful muscles in the front of the thigh, responsible for extending the knee joint.

Radius: Forearm bone on the thumb side.

Rotator Cuff: Comprised of four muscles in the shoulder area: supraspinatus (most commonly injured), infraspinatus, teres minor and subscapularis. Often irritated by overuse.

Sacroiliac: Relating to the juncture of the hip bone and lower part of the spine.

Sciatic Nerve: Largest nerve in the body located in the back of the leg which controls most of its function.

Spondylosis: Abnormal vertebral fixation or immobility.

Sprain: A joint injury. A violent twisting, stretching, pulling or tearing of a ligament.

Strain: A muscle injury. The stretching, pulling or twisting of a muscle or tendon.

Stress Fracture: A hair-line type of break in a bone caused by overuse.

Subluxation: Partial dislocation of a joint. The term usually implies that the joint can return to normal position without formal reduction.

Temporomandibular Joint (TMJ): The articulation of the jaw and skull.

Tendinitis: Inflammation of the tendon and/or tendon sheath, often caused by chronic overuse and/or sudden injury.

Tendon: Fibrous tissue that connects muscles to bone.

Tibia: Larger of the two bones of the lower leg and is the weight-bearing bone of the shin.

Transcutaneous Electrical Nerve Stimulator (TENS): An electrical modality that sends a mild current through pads at the injury site which stimulates the brain to release the natural analgesic endorphin.

Triceps: Muscle of the posterior upper arm, opposite the biceps, that extends the elbow.

Ulna: One of two bones in the forearm; extends from point of elbow and is found on the outer (little finger) side.

Ulna Nerve: Nerve in the elbow commonly irritated from excessive throwing or repeated trauma.

Ultrasound: An electrical modality that transmits a sound wave through an applicator into the skin to the soft tissue in order to heat the local area for relaxing the injured tissue and/or dispersing an edema.

"Wind Knocked Out": Syndrome describing a contraction of the abdominal nerve trunk, the solar plexus, as a result of an abdominal contusion.

2015-16 NATIONAL HOCKEY LEAGUE ALIGNMENT

On March 14, 2013, the National Hockey League's Board of Governors approved realignment and a division-based format for the Stanley Cup Playoffs, effective for the 2013-14 season. The realignment plan creates two eight-team divisions in the Eastern Conference and two seven-team divisions in the Western Conference.

The new alignment will place several clubs in more geographically-appropriate groupings and will intensify already-fierce rivalries throughout the league. The new scheduling matrix will ensure that all 30 teams play in all 30 arenas at least once a season.

STANLEY CUP PLAYOFF FORMAT

Playoff qualification will be primarily division-based, with the top three finishers in each division qualifying for the first 12 spots in the Stanley Cup Playoffs (and the first three "seeds" in each division).

The two additional playoff spots in each conference, designated as "Wild Cards," will be awarded to the next two highest-placed finishers in each conference, ranked on the basis of regular-season points and regardless of division.

"Seeding" of the Wild Card teams within each divisional playoff will be determined on the basis of regular-season points. The first-place finisher with the highest number of regular-season points in the conference will be matched against the Wild Card team with the lowest number of regular-season points, and the first-place finisher with the second-highest number of regular-season points in the conference matched against the Wild Card team with the second-lowest number of regular-season points.

The playoffs will proceed as follows:

- #1 vs. #4 / #2 vs. #3 – winners play each other for berth in conference championship.
- Conference finals – two advancing teams in the West and two advancing teams in the East meet in conference championship.
- Eastern and Western Conference Champions will meet in Stanley Cup Finals.

The NHLPA has given its consent to play under this new alignment and playoff system for a minimum of three seasons, through the 2015-16 NHL season.

ASSIST: An assist is awarded to the player or players (maximum of two) who touched the puck prior to the goal, provided no defender plays or possesses the puck in between.

GAME PLAYED: A player receives credit for playing in a game if: i) he steps on the ice during time played or; ii) serves any penalty.

GAME-WINNING GOAL: After the final score has been determined, the goal which leaves the winning club one goal ahead of its opponent is the game-winning goal (example: if Team A beats Team B 8-3, the player scoring the fourth goal for Team A receives credit for the game-winning goal).

GOAL: A goal is awarded to the last player on the scoring club to touch the puck prior to the puck entering the net.

GOALS-AGAINST AVERAGE: Multiply goals allowed (GA) by 60 and divide by minutes played (MINS).

GOALTENDER: A goaltender receives a "W" for a win in regulation, overtime or shootout; an "L" for a loss in regulation; or an "OT" for a loss in overtime or shootout.

PENALTY-KILLING PERCENTAGE: Subtract total number of power-play goals allowed from total number of shorthanded situations to get total number of power-plays killed. Divide the total number of power-plays killed by the total number of shorthanded situations.

PLUS-MINUS: A player receives a "plus" if he is on the ice when his club scores an even-strength or shorthand goal. He receives a "minus" if he is on the ice for an even-strength or shorthand goal scored by the opposing club. The difference in these numbers is considered the player's plus-minus statistic.

POWER-PLAY GOAL: A goal scored by a club while it has a manpower advantage due to an opponent's penalty. Following are some examples of what is and is not considered a power-play goal:

- if a club has an advantage on a minor penalty starting at 2:02 of the period and it scores at 4:02, the goal is not a power-play goal.
- if a club scores on a delayed penalty, the goal is not a power-play goal.
- if a club has an advantage due to a five-minute major or match penalty, that club is always credited with having one more advantage than the number of power-play goals it scores during that advantage, because the penalty does not expire. A new advantage begins after each power-play goal. For example, if Team A scores three goals during a major penalty, it is credited with four advantages.
- if a club is on a power-play for any length of time, it is considered to have had an advantage.
- if a minor penalty is incurred by a club on a power-play due to a major penalty, a new advantage is given to that club when its minor penalty expires, provided the opponent's major penalty is still in effect.

POWER-PLAY PERCENTAGE: Total number of power-play goals divided by total number of power-play opportunities.

SAVE PERCENTAGE: Subtract goals allowed (GA) from shots against (SA) to determine saves. Then divide saves by shots-against.

SHOOTING PERCENTAGE: Divide the number of goals scored by the number of shots taken.

SHORTHAND GOAL: A goal scored by a club while it is at a manpower disadvantage. The same cases apply for shorthand as for power-play goals, but in the opposite manner.

SHOT ON GOAL: If a player shoots the puck with the intention of scoring and if that shot would have gone in the net had the goaltender not stopped it, the shot is recorded as a "shot on goal."

SHUTOUT: If two goaltenders combine for a shutout, neither receives credit for the shutout. Instead it is recorded as a club shutout.

TENTHS OF A SECOND: If a penalty or goal occurs in the last minute, the time is rounded off to the previous second (ex: if a penalty is called with 12.4 seconds left in a period, the time is indicated as 19:47 and not 19:48.)

COACHES RECORD: A coach receives a "W" for a win in regulation, overtime or shootout; an "L" for a loss in regulation; or an "OT" for a loss in overtime or shootout.

** NOTE: No individual skater/goaltender statistics apply for the shootout

Entering her ninth season as the radio color commentator of the New Jersey Devils; named to post September 20, 2007...Provides interviews and content for newjerseydevils.com; re-joined the Devils after 12 years with the *New York Daily News* sports department, covering both hockey and horse racing...Previously served the team as radio analyst for three-plus seasons from January 1992 through its 1995 Stanley Cup Championship season, becoming the first woman to broadcast a male professional sports team...On November 25, 2009, became the first woman to provide radio play-by-play of an NHL game when the Devils played the Ottawa Senators...Provided radio play-by-play of a second game later in the season...Was honored by the State of New Jersey March 22, 2010 with a ceremonial resolution for breaking the gender barrier in the broadcast booth...Also covered the 1994 Stanley Cup Finals as an analyst for NHL Radio, another first for a woman broadcaster...Has covered the Stanley Cup Finals on 15 occasions, while attending the Kentucky Derby six times...Authored *Hockey Scouting Report* for 14 seasons, 1990-91 through 2003-04...Previously

worked as a sports journalist for *Newsday*, *The National*, and *The Record* (Bergen County, NJ), while freelancing for *Sports Illustrated*, *The Hockey News* and *Beckett Hockey Monthly*...Began career in 1978 by covering hockey for the *Daily Record* (Morristown, NJ)...In May 2007, was among the inaugural class inducted into the Randolph (NJ) High School Hall of Fame...Earned a bachelor of arts degree in English from Rutgers University-Newark in 1977...Also attended the University of Illinois, where she studied veterinary medicine before choosing journalism as a career...A horse racing enthusiast; lists Secretariat as her favorite athlete of all time...A big fan of Bruce Springsteen and the E Street Band, and has attended over 125 of their concerts...Born in Dover, NJ and currently resides in West Orange, NJ.

DEVILS' RADIO INFORMATION

With more listeners than any other station of its kind, The FAN provides audiences across the tri-state area with live and local programming 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Listen to WFAN on-air, online at wfan.com and via the Radio.com app available on a variety of mobile devices.

Due to scheduling conflicts, select games will be moved to News Radio 880 WCBS or another local station. Please check newjerseydevils.com or your local listings for up-to-date information.

EXECUTIVE OFFICES: The Devils' executive offices are located adjacent to AmeriHealth Pavilion at Prudential Center on Lafayette Street.

CREDENTIALS: Season passes are issued to those members of the media who regularly cover the New Jersey Devils. These passes will be honored for entrance to Prudential Center and all working areas for all 2015-16 regular-season home games. Single-game passes may be requested by contacting the Devils' Communications Department at least 24 hours prior to game time. Accredited individuals are strictly prohibited from obtaining player autographs while in a working capacity. **Credentials will be issued only to representatives of legitimate news gathering agencies.**

MORNING SKATE: Morning skate will take place at Prudential Center's main rink or AmeriHealth Pavilion. All media (print and broadcast) covering the morning skate at Prudential Center must be credentialed. Please contact the Devils' Communications Department to confirm time and location. Credentials for practices and morning skates will be available at the Event Staff Entrance adjacent to the Lafayette Street security entrance near the intersection of Broad Street.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Accredited photographers may shoot only from designated areas. The Devils' Communications Department issues location assignments just outside the press room approximately 30 minutes prior to game time. **No roving passes will be issued.**

GAME-TIME PRESS ENTRANCE: Members of the media should enter the building through the Mulberry Street Press Entrance. Credentials will be available two and one-half hours prior to game-time. All credentials must be picked up individually.

PRESS RESOURCES: The New Jersey Devils Communications Department provides the working media with resources throughout the season. Media can find team and league information including press releases, stats, game notes, newspaper clips and interviews at njdevilspr.com. Interviews from Head Coach John Hynes and players can also be found at youtube.com/newjerseydevilspr and the NHLDevilsPR page on Google+. The Official Twitter feed of the department is [@NHLDevilsPR](https://twitter.com/NHLDevilsPR).

PRESS LOUNGE: The press lounge/working room is located behind the press entrance on Mulberry Street. The lounge is open only to properly accredited and identified members of the media, as well as club and league personnel. A buffet meal will be served approximately two hours prior to faceoff. Refreshments are available prior to, during, and after all games.

PRE-GAME: The Devils' locker room is closed at all times prior to the start of the game. Select players may remain available until 90 minutes prior to game time. A representative from the Devils' Communications Department will remain outside the Devils' locker room to assist members of the media wishing to interview players. After that time, only members of the media requiring access to television production areas are permitted near the dressing room once it has been closed.

PRESS BOX: An elevator to the press box is located adjacent to the press lounge. Seating charts are displayed throughout the press lounge and in the press seating area. The Devils provide a limited number of courtesy phones in the press box for use by the media. Anyone who wishes to order a private line should contact Doug Grant of Prudential Center at 973-757-6528. Wireless, high-speed internet access is available. Media should be prepared for hard-wired access as well.

POST-GAME: Locker rooms will open to the media no later than five (5) minutes following the conclusion of the game. Head Coach John Hynes will be available to the media in the coaches' press conference area, approximately 20 minutes after the conclusion of each home game.

ANIMALS

Only service dogs, either certified or in-training, will be permitted in Prudential Center. All other animals are prohibited.

ATM's

There are seven PNC Bank ATM's located throughout Prudential Center. The locations are as follows: one in the Box Office, four on the Main Concourse and two on the Upper Concourse.

BAG/SECURITY SEARCH

All patrons and patrons' belongings are subject to a bag search and security check via physical pat down and/or metal detector. Plan on passing through security before each event and figure this into your arrival time for events.

BANNERS AND SIGNS

Signs and banners are allowed if they do not block the view of other guests and are deemed appropriate by Prudential Center Management. Any arena signage must meet the approval of Prudential Center Management.

BOX OFFICE

Prudential Center Box Office is located inside the arena at the corner of Mulberry Street and Edison Place. You can enter from the corner of Mulberry Street and Edison Place, next to PNC Bank Tower. Box Office hours are 11:00 AM – 6:00 PM, Monday through Saturday and closed on Sundays.

CAMERAS/CAMCORDERS

Small, non-professional, still cameras may be brought into Prudential Center. Please note that for certain events cameras may not be allowed into the arena. Video, audio, and professional camera and recording devices are prohibited. Fans may not reproduce any film, digital, video or audio recording for commercial purposes without the express written consent of Prudential Center.

CELL PHONES

Cell phones are allowed inside Prudential Center, however we request you use the public concourse areas to make and receive calls.

CONCESSION LOCATIONS

There are ten permanent concession stand locations in the arena, in addition to a number of portable food and beverage locations on each level.

DOOR OPENINGS

Arena doors will open approximately 60 minutes prior to the start of the event, but times may vary. Please check prucenr.com to see when doors open.

ELEVATOR/ESCALATOR

There are elevators and escalators located throughout Prudential Center allowing easy access to all levels of the arena.

EMERGENCIES

In the event you need emergency attention, please notify the nearest security guard, usher, ticket taker or go to Guest Services located on the concourse at sections 9, 114 and 214.

ENTRANCES

There are three main entrances to Prudential Center: PNC Bank Tower, Mulberry Street and Edison Place; Southeast Tower, Mulberry and Lafayette Streets; adjacent to the practice rink on Lafayette Street.

EVACUATION

When you arrive, please take a moment to find the two closest exits to your section. In the event of an emergency evacuation, please follow the direction of Prudential Center staff members to exit the arena in a safe manner.

FIRST AID

First Aid stations are located on the Main Concourse and the Upper Concourse.

Main Concourse – Outside the Golia Ice Lounge at Sections 8 & 9
Upper Concourse – Outside Sections 115 and 215.

During events, the first aid stations are staffed by paramedics. If for any reason you are unable to make it to the first aid rooms, please summon a Guest Services staff member and they will alert first aid.

GUEST SERVICES

Guest Services locations are available to answer your questions, collect lost and found, provide Assisted Listening Devices and provide assistance to guests. In addition, Guest Services can assist with finding lost guests and providing wheelchair escorts during events. There are two locations for Guest Services.

GUESTS WITH DISABILITIES

Prudential Center has a unique building design which allows full access for guests with special needs and disabilities including an entrance designed for easy access into and out of the building for transportation.

INTERNET

For a schedule of events, to purchase tickets and to get the most up-to-date information on Prudential Center visit prucenr.com.

INTOXICATED GUESTS

Prudential Center has the right to refuse entry to any guest deemed intoxicated upon arrival to the arena. In addition, Prudential Center staff has the right to remove any guest from the premises who is intoxicated and causing a disturbance or is potentially dangerous to himself/herself or other guests.

LOST AND FOUND

All Lost and Found items will be collected at our Guest Services locations and held for one week. Prudential Center is not responsible for lost or stolen property arising from attendance at an event at Prudential Center.

OUTSIDE FOOD & BEVERAGE

No outside food, beverages, coolers, bottles or cans may be brought into Prudential Center.

PARKING

There is ample parking located within blocks of Prudential Center. Way-finding signage, Guest Services personnel and security will assist in getting you to your destination.

PROHIBITED ITEMS

For safety reasons, guests are refused entry if they are in possession of prohibited items. Illegal items will be confiscated and turned over to the police. If a guest is found inside the arena with prohibited items, the items will be confiscated and the guest may be ejected from the facility. Guests with specific or special dietary needs due to medical conditions or religious requirements should contact the Prudential Center Guest Services Department prior to the event.

The following items are not permitted at Prudential Center:

aerosol cans, animals/pets (except service animals), audio/video recording equipment, balloons and beach balls, cans, bottles, glass or other beverage containers, chains, studded bracelets, etc., coolers or ice chests, illegal drugs, large bags and purses, laser pens and pointers, noisemaking devices (i.e. whistles, air horns), outside food and beverage, professional photography equipment, poles to display banners, flags, etc., skateboards and/or rollerblades, un-approved pamphlets, handouts, advertisements, etc., weapons (i.e. pepper spray, tear gas, handcuffs, stun guns, etc.). Any other item deemed to be inappropriate or dangerous by Prudential Center Management. This list is subject to change.

PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION

Prudential Center is easily accessible by NJ Transit trains, light rail, bus, PATH and Amtrak. Newark Penn Station is located a short two blocks east of the arena. To exit the arena towards Newark's Penn Station, head to the northeast corner of the building near sections 20-22, 130-133 or 231-233. To get on the buses to Broad Street Station, exit onto Edison Place or Lafayette Street and go 1/2 block west to Broad Street.

RE-ENTRY

Prudential Center has a no re-entry policy during events. Exceptions are made in the cases of medical reasons or returning prohibited items to vehicles. In these cases, the guest must coordinate with a Guest Services Supervisor before exiting the arena. Ask the nearest usher or security representative to speak with a Guest Services Supervisor.

RESTROOMS

There are 25 women's restrooms, 25 men's restrooms, and seven family restrooms located throughout Prudential Center.

SMOKING

There is NO smoking allowed inside Prudential Center or within 25 feet of any Prudential Center entrance or exit.

STAIRS

Stairwells are located in each of the four corners of the building and are accessible to every level of the arena.

STROLLERS

Small, fold-up umbrella strollers are allowed in Prudential Center. Fold-up strollers should be stored under your seat. Strollers that cannot fit under your seat will not be permitted.

TEAM STORE

Devils Den is located near the Prudential Center Box Office on the corner of Mulberry Street and Edison Place. The Team Store is open daily and open for all Devils and Seton Hall games.

TICKETING

Any guest over one year of age must have a ticket in order to gain entrance to Prudential Center. Children under one year may enter without a ticket but must sit on their parent's or guardian's lap. Age restrictions vary per event, please visit prucenr.com to check ticket policies for your event.

WILL CALL

Box Office will call windows are located in the main box office area located just inside the PNC Bank Tower on Mulberry Street and Edison Place. To pick up will call tickets, you must present a valid photo ID. It is also recommended to bring the credit card used to purchase the tickets.

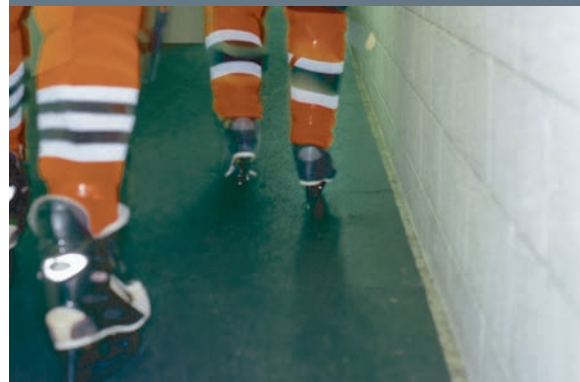
