Created in the summer of 2000, SVS&E oversees all business operation aspects of the San Jose Sharks, HP Pavilion at San Jose and select HP Pavilion events. In addition, SVS&E manages all or parts of Sharks Ice at San Jose (the Sharks official training facility), Sharks Ice at Fremont, Oakland Ice Center operated by Sharks Ice, the SAP Open (San Jose, Calif.) and Regions Morgan Keegan Championships (Memphis, Tenn.) ATP Tour Tennis tournaments, Cellular South Cup (Memphis, Tenn.) WTA Tour tennis tournament, the Racquet Club of Memphis, the American Hockey League's Worcester Sharks (the Sharks top development affiliate) as well as select HP Pavilion events including Strikeforce Mixed Martial Arts.

In August 2007, SVS&E became a minority partner in Major League Soccer's San Jose Earthquakes. SVS&E previously operated the Earthquakes from 2000-02, including their first MLS Championship season in 2001.

Benefits of a business arrangement with SVS&E allow the San Jose Sharks and HP Pavilion Management to combine existing marketing programs, sales resources, facilities operations and contacts to create more efficient and meaningful business partnerships. SVS&E also allows the organization to provide fully integrated advertising/corporate partnership packages that reach the multiple demographic segments represented in Silicon Valley.

Another option for business partners, SVS&E Publishing, was created in 2001. SVS&E Publishing, a full-service publishing division, handles a majority of the design, editorial and printing needs for most of the SVS&E properties, as well as outside professional sports organizations, including The Oakland Raiders.

In 2003, SVS&E Merchandise was added to the SVS&E family. SVS&E Merchandise is an industry leader and innovator in all aspects of building a brand. With a client list that includes many of the Silicon Valley's top corporations, professional sports teams and major sporting events, SVS&E Merchandise has both the expertise and understanding necessary to help develop and sustain a brand. Services include graphics and production, event merchandise management, online stores with fulfillment and customer support, VIP Gifting and motivational/recognition programs. Current clients to take advantage of the services provided by SVS&E Merchandise include Adobe Systems, Brocade, Cisco, Coca-Cola, Lockheed, Rosendin, SAP, SAWIS, Electronic Arts and more.

SVS&E was a key element in the 2002 purchase of the organization and its assets from previous Owner George Gund III by a local ownership group, San Jose Sports & Entertainment Enterprises (SJSEE), led by former Sharks President and Chief Executive Officer Greg Jamison.

In 2001, the organization entered into a naming rights rebranding of San Jose Arena with Compaq Computer Corporation and the City of San Jose. The agreement, which was amended in 2002 to reflect the subsequent merger between Compaq and HP, runs through 2015 and provided a new name to Northern California's premier sports and entertainment venue, resulting in HP Pavilion. The agreement ensures the Sharks will remain in San Jose for the foreseeable future and the facility receives necessary amenities, upgrades and improvements its patrons have come to expect and enjoy.

In 2007, SVS&E, along with the City of San Jose, oversaw \$16.5 million of improvements — which included new LED signage displays throughout the seating area of the Pavilion, a new state-of-the-art high-resolution scoreboard and a superior sound and video system to support high definition.

Business arrangements similar to SVS&E aren't uncommon in the sports and arena management industry. Other examples of this type of business arrangement include Orca Bay Sports & Entertainment in Vancouver, which oversees the management of the Vancouver Canucks of the National Hockey League and Rogers Arena; Kroenke Sports Enterprises in Colorado which manages the NBA's Denver Nuggets, the Colorado Avalanche of the NHL and the Pepsi Center; and Palace Sports & Entertainment in Detroit which operates the NBA's Detroit Pistons, the Palace of Auburn Hills as well as the DTE Music Theatre.

TWO DECADES OF TEAL

The First 20 Years of the San Jose Sharks

Everybody knows that old saying: time flies when you're having fun.

That little aphorism can certainly apply when one realizes the San Jose Sharks are entering its 20th National Hockey League season.

Through two decades, the franchise and the city have grown together and now appear poised to make a major charge at the coveted Stanley Cup.

How shall we look back at the history of Sharks hockey? There have been ups, downs, two trips to the Western Conference Finals, great games and great players. But for our purposes, let's break things down into a set of clear eras:

THE COW PALACE ERA: 1991-93

The San Jose Sharks returned the NHL to the Bay Area in franchise form for the first time since the 1970s. You could say that it was the end of a Great Circle Route that began in Oakland with the California Golden Seals, moved to Cleveland to become the Barons, merged with the team in Minnesota to become the North Stars, and de-merging from that franchise through a dispersal draft, an ownership diaspora and a \$50 million payment to the NHL.

The Sharks would move to San Jose by 1993, but while they waited for their new home to open in Silicon Valley, they played two seasons at the Cow Palace, located near the San Francisco border in Daly City. From the start, Owners George and Gordon Gund quickly made their mark by spending millions to ensure that San Jose's new arena would have every state-of-the-art feature to allow for the building to succeed in an excited community.

But before everyone could enjoy the amenities, the Sharks and their fans needed lots of patience through those Cow Palace years. There were those arcane rules that virtually assured the Sharks, like all expansion teams, would have major trouble competing and there





were the challenges of the arena itself. The “Palais de Boeuf” was the home of the Grand National Rodeo and the sight lines weren’t optimal for hockey. However, the quirkiness of the Cow Palace didn’t prevent the Sharks from selling out for each of their home games.

These fans got to see the team’s first two NHL Entry Draft picks, forwards Pat Falloon (first round) and Ray Whitney (second). The Cow Palace Era Sharks also included a veteran defenseman named Doug Wilson, who would become the team’s first captain and eventual executive vice president and general manager.

The Sharks barely lost their first game on Oct. 4, 1991, a 4-3 decision in Vancouver. Goaltender Jeff Hackett stood on his head as he faced 52 shots. The first Sharks goal was assisted on by Mark Pavelich, a member of the 1980 U.S. Olympic “Miracle on Ice” squad. Ironically, the first goal was scored by Craig Coxie — ironic not because he was more of a physical force on the ice, but because he was from the California town of Chula Vista.

The very next night, the same two teams squared off at the Cow Palace, but the Sharks lost, 5-2. They wouldn’t capture their first win until their next game, on Oct. 8, when they defeated Calgary, 4-3.

Yet, the bigger stories in this expansion year will never be found in the box scores or the statistics.

The Flat Tire

Sitting at the airport before a scheduled 10 a.m. cross-country flight to Hartford, a flat tire caused by the pilot while practicing touch-and-go landings brought on a delay. As numerous “only two more hours” announcements were made on the status of plane repairs, the drama was just beginning...

- Left wing and future Nashville Predators Assistant General Manager Paul Fenton passed out in the waiting area. Carted off by emergency personnel and later pronounced okay, he was the first casualty of the trip.
- In a friendly poker game, a couple of players lost all of their meal money, creating the first fiscal crisis.
- Finally arriving in Hartford at approximately 4 a.m., there was no bus to pick up the team as someone forgot to tell the bus company of the situation. So the Sharks arrival at the hotel was delayed for another hour.
- Amazingly, the team lost “only” 3-0.
- After that inauspicious start, the Sharks went 0-7 on the road trip, extending their losing streak to 13 games.

The Missing Link

Jim Carr, the Charlestown Chiefs play-by-play announcer in the classic film “Slap Shot,” said this about Syracuse’s Ogie Ogelthorpe: “This young man has had a very trying rookie season. What with the litigation, the notoriety, his subsequent deportation to Canada and that country’s refusal to accept him, well, that’s more than the average 21-year-old can handle.”

This description about a fictional on-ice tough guy neatly summed up the emotions, if not the actual facts, surrounding the most notorious player in the Cow Palace Era: forward Link Gaetz.

“The Linkster” picked up 326 penalty minutes in just 48 games and got an automatic 10-game suspension when he left the penalty box at the end of a game to start an altercation. When he wasn’t playing, he had a scurrying cadre of fans following him around the Cow Palace as if he were the Pied Piper of Hamelin.

When he was playing, there was a legendary battle with Bob Probert, a fluke goal against Montreal that bounced off the side glass and fluttered into the net from long distance and a display of hockey ability that made people shake their heads with the contrast that it had with his other off-ice difficulties.

The Wedding and the Delay

On the occasion of the first visit by the Montreal Canadiens, a 55-minute delay ensued when the Zamboni driver carved a major gash into the Cow Palace ice, because he used to leave the goal net marsh pegs

in place while cutting the ice. Between the first and second periods, an on-ice wedding took place. Oh yeah, Montreal's Guy Carbonneau scored the only goal of the game just one minute into overtime.

S.J. Sharkie Debuts

That lovable fish, S.J. Sharkie, was born in January of 1992 when he was whelped out of the Zamboni, much to the delight of the Cow Palace crowd.

Tie With Montreal

With time expiring in another game vs. Montreal, Kelly Kisio won a key faceoff and Falloon scored the game-tying goal with 0.5 seconds left on the clock. The Canadiens just couldn't believe it.

Magnificent Mario

Pittsburgh's Mario Lemieux was one of the most dominating opponents in those years, scoring 42 points in his first 11 games against the Sharks. On one road trip, he wasn't supposed to play because of a bad back. However, he flew out on his own to join the team at the Cow Palace. All he did was score one goal and six assists, still a record for a Sharks opponent in a game.

The Longest Losing Streak

Modern Sharks fans can't comprehend this, but during the 1992-93 season, the Sharks tied an NHL record by losing 17 straight games. They had lost

15 straight at the All-Star break and Coach George Kingston pursued practices with positive thinking before embarking on a road trip. The team took a 1-0 lead in Calgary, but the final score was 13-1, Flames. Then, they tied the record with a 6-0 loss in Edmonton.

Memories were plentiful from the Cow Palace Era, but the franchise was ready for a new home and a new dawn when they moved to San Jose.

THE GREATEST TURNAROUND IN NHL HISTORY (1993-97)

The Sharks wound up with 24 points in their final season at the Cow Palace, so when they assembled in San Jose at the spectacular new building just completed, expectations were low. However, a new coach, Kevin Constantine, installed a rigid new system that he said had produced "instant success" in the past.

Coming Home to a New Beginning

San Jose Arena, as HP Pavilion was then known, opened to much fanfare on West Santa Clara Street. Seventeen years later, the building still is a spectacular place to watch hockey, concerts and just about anything else.

The 0-8-1 Start

It looked as if the Cow Palace Era was going to continue on the ice when the Sharks began at 0-8-1. The first win came in game No. 10 against Edmonton.

The Greatest Turnaround

After that 10th game, the Sharks went 1-8-5 over their next 14. Things weren't going in the right direction and while Constantine stuck rigidly to his defense-first system, he did make one exception.

On the suggestion of newcomer Igor Larionov, the five-man unit concept from the old Russian style of hockey was revived for the team's top group. Larionov was the center, Sergei Makarov played right wing and Johan Garpenlov was on the left. On defense, young Sandis Ozolinsh was complemented by the smooth-skating Jeff Norton.

The "OV" Line didn't have the rigid restrictions of the Constantine system and they did what they had to do: score goals and help the Sharks win. Makarov became the first 30-goal scorer in Sharks history, getting his 30th on a penalty shot, the first in club history. Ozolinsh scored 26 goals, a club record for defensemen that still stands. Larionov was always "the Professor." Norton was the steady veteran who could skate and create. Garpenlov was the one forward who could think as quickly as his two Russian linemates.

The quintet weren't the only ones with a role on the team. Todd Elik, a waiver acquisition from Edmonton, combined with trade-deadline acquisition Ulf Dahlen and Gaetan Duchesne to form a second scoring unit that played entirely differently than the "OV" Line.

Jamie Baker, now my broadcasting partner, was often part of the "grinder" line with captain Bob Errey, a

Cup winner in Pittsburgh; and Jeff Odgers, who brought lots of muscle. But by the playoffs, Baker was also skating with Whitney and Falloon at times, depending on the situation.

And who could forget goaltender Arturs Irbe? During this season, he told a reporter that he had to be "like wall." And he was, playing in 74 games and making many memorable saves throughout the season.


On April 5, 1994 in Los Angeles, Baker scored two shorthanded goals and nearly got a third one, as the Sharks won their seventh straight game and guaranteed themselves a playoff position for the first time in history. For most teams, the greatest single-season turnaround ever would have been enough, but not for this gritty Sharks team.

A Series to Remember

We all know the Sharks, as the Western Conference's No. 8 seed, shocked the hockey world by upsetting the top-seeded Detroit Red Wings in their initial playoff series. But there were numerous sidebars worth remembering...

- Defenseman Shawn Cronin, known for his rugged play, scored the first playoff goal in club history on a shot from the point that made it clear to Wings Coach Scotty Bowman that veteran Bob Essensa wouldn't be in goal for long in this series. That was cemented by rookie Vlastimil Kroupa's game-winner later in the contest.
- True to expectations, the Wings won the next two games with young Chris Osgood in net, but the checking was tighter and the schedule was a bit unsettling for the

favored club. The top seed was home the first two and final two games of the series, while the bottom seed played hosts to the middle three in their arena. This scenario doesn't exist anymore, but it did then and the Sharks were able to take advantage.

- In Game Four, Makarov scored a spectacular game-winner to even the series at 2-2. This caused Baker to ask: "So, you think we have a chance?"
- Few people know what happened after that Game Seven. There was a trip to the airport that wound up being a lengthy wait and stay in a motel, because the team didn't know whether it would travel to Vancouver or Toronto. When Vancouver's Pavel Bure scored in triple overtime of another Game Seven against future Sharks (but then Calgary) netminder Mike Vernon in the middle of the night, the Sharks knew they were off to Toronto and Leafs Nation.

This Close

The upstart Sharks had a 3-2 lead over Toronto, but it all came down to a series of missed opportunities in Game Six. The Sharks trailed twice in the game, but the "OV" Line equalized twice. Then, Errey and Whitney had a 2-on-1 with 5:30 left that missed the net. Just 90 seconds into overtime, Garpenlov's drive beat goaltender Felix Potvin, but hit the crossbar. Finally, a turnover behind the net led directly to Mike Gartner's game winner for Toronto, and a Game Seven at Maple Leaf Gardens that was won by Toronto, 4-2.

In the locker room, the story goes that Irbé broke the

post-mortem silence by standing and saying, "This is the best team that I have ever been on."

The next season brought on the lockout, the shortened season and the rise of rookie Jeff Friesen to prominence. He scored 15 goals in 48 games and earned a spot on the NHL's All-Rookie Team.

In the playoffs, the seventh-seeded Sharks faced No. 2 Calgary. San Jose bobbed and weaved its way to another Game Seven, when Wade Flaherty provided goaltending heroics with 56 saves and Whitney tipped a Makarov shot past Trevor Kidd in double overtime of the decisive game.

San Jose faced Detroit again in the playoffs, but the Wings remembered the humiliation from 1994 and dispatched the Sharks in four games.

That 1995 postseason was the last the Sharks would experience for two years. Changes were made as the Sharks slid to the bottom of the Western Conference and they did some serious soul searching to get them moving back in the right direction. One bright spot: seeing forward Tony Granato, signed as a free agent in 1996, become the Sharks first major award recipient by getting the Bill Masterton Memorial Trophy.

"BIG D" COMES TO TOWN (1997-2003)

Restoration of the franchise's character and definition of what type of team the Sharks wanted to be were foremost when San Jose went to the 1997 NHL Entry Draft. They already had some solid prospects that were on the verge of arriving, but none had the pedigree of Patrick Marleau, who was selected with the No. 2 overall that year. Marleau, along with veterans Owen Nolan, Gary Suter and Mike Ricci and homegrown defensive talent such as Mike Rathje and Marcus Ragnarsson formed a strong core group.


In goal, a young Evgeni Nabokov was learning his trade in the American Hockey League. So, veterans Vernon and Kelly Hradey brought experience to the net and more character to the locker room. Others who helped develop that character in the dressing room were Bryan Marchment, Ron Sutter, Dave Lowry and Murray Craven.

And behind the bench, Darryl Sutter brought grit and a hard hat-lunch pail type attitude to a young team sorely needing direction.

As a result, the Sharks returned to the playoffs in 1998, the first of five consecutive postseason appearances. However, there were some memorable moments in this era, too...

- Ed Belfour's acquisition, then defection to Dallas, made him one of the more reviled figures in Sharks history.
- The Sharks opened the 1998-99 season in Tokyo, the first time San Jose opened the season outside of North America.
- Tragedy at Colorado's Columbine High School

delayed a 1999 Sharks-Avalanche playoff series.

- Finishing eighth in 1999-00, the Sharks faced Presidents' Trophy-winning St. Louis and won in seven games. Who can forget when Marc Bergevin accidentally knocked the puck into his own net in Game Two? Or when Nolan took a shot from center ice that skipped past Roman Turek in Game Seven?
- A division title in 2002 brought another step forward...and hope. Nabokov, who had won the Calder Memorial Trophy two years earlier, took the club through an easy five-game series win against Phoenix. But in Round Two, after having Colorado on the ropes with a 3-2 series lead, Peter Forsberg took over, scoring an overtime goal in Game Six and the only goal in a Game Seven remembered as much by Teemu Selanne's wrap-around miss of an open net earlier in the game.
- A largely forgettable 2002-03 dropped the team out of the playoffs. Ron Wilson replaced Sutter behind the bench and Doug Wilson succeeded Dean Lombardi as general manager.

BECOMING ONE OF THE NHL'S ELITE (2004-08)

Not only did the struggles of 2003 prove to be a blip in the Sharks timeline, the team came out and won the Pacific Division with a terrific campaign in 2003-04 that brought them to the Western Conference Final for the

first time. Here are some highlights:

- Niko Dimitrakos had one of the highlight goals of the playoffs in round one vs. St. Louis, when his overtime tally gave the Sharks a 1-0 victory.
- Although the Sharks won the first three games in the next round vs. Colorado, the skilled Avalanche would win two consecutive overtime games, with Joe Sakic acting as the big hero. But back in Denver for Game Six, the Sharks closed out the series with a 3-1 win.
- In the Western Conference Final against Calgary, who would've thought that the Flames would win the first two games in San Jose?
- With that in mind, who would have fathomed that the series would be tied, 2-2, after the games in Calgary? Nabokov was outstanding in 3-0 and 4-2 wins in which the Flames continued their mugging and badly outshot the visitors.
- But the critical game was Game Five at HP Pavilion, a 3-0 defeat that still may rank as the worst playoff game in franchise history. There was little room on the ice to do anything, and the Sharks seemed to be a little low on reserves. That proved to be true, as Calgary took the final game, 3-1.

The next year, 2004-05, brought a cancelled season, and for San Jose, a lost opportunity to win the Stanley Cup. But there were great things to come...

The Arrival of Joe Thornton

On Nov. 30, 2005, Baker and I were eating dinner in the Dallas Stars press room. We noticed that Jim Fahey and Dimitrakos were also having a light meal. This was usually the indication that they weren't playing.

At game time, there was a commotion over by the Sharks bench. Ron Wilson had called the referees over to go over the lineup card. The assumption was they must've been worried that a mistake had been made and were making sure that it was correct.

But then, on the first line change, I called a play in which Dimitrakos passed the puck to Fahey. Wait a minute. Weren't they just eating dinner in the press room and not playing?

We counted the players on the bench. There was one short of the normal total. Then, we saw that the missing players were Marco Sturm, Brad Stuart and Wayne Primeau. We knew that a big trade had been consummated.

The game had become secondary and we started combing our information sources while calling the game at the same time. Finally, the news had come: Joe Thornton had been traded to the San Jose Sharks!

This trade was big news for everyone, especially right wing Jonathan Cheechoo, who wound up with 56 goals and a Maurice "Rocket" Richard Trophy. Thornton won the Art Ross and the Hart Memorial Trophies.

An American Original

Jeremy Roenick came to town in 2007 and immediately endeared himself to Sharks fans with his lively personality and his focus on ending his career with a bang. The Sharks had an uneven 2008 first round series against Calgary and Roenick was taken out of the

lineup for Game Six. Placed back in for the pivotal Game Seven, Roenick had one of the most inspiring efforts in Sharks playoff history, scoring two goals and two assists and sending San Jose to the conference semifinals.

The Ultimate Agony of Defeat

The longest game in Sharks history occurred in 2008 in Game Six of an emotional conference semifinal series against Dallas. Down 3-0 in the series, the Sharks won two straight games, including one on an overtime goal by Joe Pavelski in Game Five. They flew into Dallas for Game Six, hoping to force a seventh game back at HP Pavilion. What they didn't know was that Game Seven would be played, but it would be played that very night at American Airlines Center.

With seconds left in regulation, Brenden Morrow hammered Milan Michalek to the ice, ending his night. In the first overtime, Nabokov made perhaps the greatest save in franchise history when his glove hand stopped Brad Richards' opportunity right on the goal line.

But Morrow would get the last laugh. His goal in that fourth overtime period ended San Jose's hopes to rejoin the elite club of conference finalists.

SERIOUS CUP CONTENDERS (2009-PRESENT)

Expectations were high when Coach Todd McLellan entered the 2008-09 season. All the Sharks did was roar out to a 25-3-2 start and cruise to their first-ever Presidents' Trophy.

Rob Blake joined the team and became the elder statesman, leading with a calm sense of resolve. Newly-acquired defenseman Dan Boyle, one of the elite creative





artists in the NHL, made the Sharks a more dangerous team.

But the Sharks slipped a bit as the playoffs drew nearer and they picked up Kent Huskins and Travis Moen from Anaheim in exchange for a couple of prospects at the trade deadline. It was expected that the acquisitions would bolster the Sharks chances to go deep into the playoffs.

Ironically, Anaheim was the first round opponent and they had Ryan Getzlaf, Selanne, Scott Niedermayer and Chris Pronger, among others. Huskins was hurt and didn't play. Moen played, but never really found his rhythm. On the other side, Jonas Hiller had a spectacular series in goal as Anaheim eliminated San Jose in six games.

The series loss stunned the Sharks. The organization called their postseason analysis an "autopsy." While the elimination was painful, the team used that as motivation.

In 2009-10, San Jose finished first again in the Western Conference by winning eight of their final 10 games. The momentum led the Sharks to their opening round series vs. Colorado and some memorable moments...

The Wayward Puck

A decade earlier, Bergevin accidentally deposited the puck into his own net and St. Louis lost their opening round series to San Jose. A decade later in the final seconds of the opening game, a puck deflected off Blake's skate and into the net for a 2-1 Colorado road win. In a wild Game Two, Devin Setoguchi's goal proved to be the winner in a 6-5 overtime thriller. But then, it was time for Game Three in Denver.

Craig Anderson was stifling the Sharks, who were outshooting Colorado, 51-17.

At the end of regulation, it was still 0-0, and that's when disaster struck. Boyle's pass attempt in the opening minute of overtime ticked off rookie Ryan O'Reilly's stick and flew at a seemingly impossible angle past Nabokov for the game-winning goal. It was one of the most inexplicable, stunning playoff losses in franchise history.

But unlike the Blues, the Sharks filled themselves with a steely resolve and refused to let the disappointing moment ruin them. They survived the mental challenge

and showed a tremendous reservoir of character and went on to eliminate the Avalanche in six games.

Marleau's Moment

After scoring 44 goals in the regular season, Marleau scored one of the most important tallies of his career in the third game of the Detroit conference semifinal series. Scoring a beautiful one at 7:07 of overtime, Marleau gave the Sharks a 3-0 series lead as San Jose dispatched the Red Wings in five games.

A Sweep That Wasn't A Sweep

San Jose's second trip to the Western Conference Final wound up going the way of the Chicago Blackhawks, who went on to win the Stanley Cup. Of the seven goals scored by San Jose, five were from Marleau. But Antti Niemi made 44 saves in the first game and 44 more in a pivotal Game Three, won by the Hawks in overtime on a Dustin Byfuglien goal.

The Blackhawks and the Sharks both knew how close this series was and it wasn't a traditional sweep by any means. For the Sharks, it was another lesson learned by a team that had thought it had learned everything they needed to know.

Heading into their 20th season, the Sharks appear poised to cash in and remain as one of the NHL's elite for seasons to come. It's going to be an exciting journey on the road to bringing a Stanley Cup to San Jose.



On Sept. 1, long-time San Jose Sharks President and Chief Executive Officer Greg Jamison announced that he had decided to step away from his position and the day-to-day operations of the running the hockey team, along with Silicon Valley Sports & Entertainment. Under his guidance, the organization has grown into one of the most respected in all of sports, building a strong and talented front office and executive team.

"This organization, including the hockey team and HP Pavilion, has become part of the fabric and culture of the downtown core, the city of San Jose, Silicon Valley and beyond," Jamison said. "We have brought quality entertainment to countless residents of the Bay Area. The organization will continue to strive towards our goal of winning the Stanley Cup for our tremendously loyal fan base. I can attest that the Sharks and SVS&E remain in the capable hands of an extremely talented, dedicated and experienced staff."

Moving forward, Jamison will continue to be involved with the franchise. He remains a member of the ownership group and serves as the franchise's Governor to the NHL as well as on the League's 10-person Executive Committee, a position he was elected to by the NHL's Board of Governors in 2007. In addition, he will remain active in his position as president of the Sharks Foundation.

"On behalf of the ownership group of SVS&E, we want to thank Greg for his incredible leadership," Owners Kevin Compton and Stratton Scavos said. "He leaves a legacy of accomplishment both on-and-off the ice, strong devotion to the fans and community and a culture of integrity and passion that will carry on for decades to come."

During his tenure, Jamison oversaw the transformation of the Sharks into one of the NHL's most respected and successful franchises. In his 13 seasons as president, the team has advanced to the Stanley Cup Playoffs 11 times, including capturing the Presidents' Trophy in 2009 and the berths in the Western Conference Final in 2004 and 2010. The Sharks have won five Pacific Division Titles in the past eight years.


Highlights of his tenure included hiring Executive Vice President and General Manager Doug Wilson, directing overall company objectives and philosophy and overseeing the recent \$17.5 million upgrade to facility's scoreboard, fascia signage and sound system. He presided over the renaming of San Jose Arena to HP Pavilion in 2001, ensuring that the team would remain in San Jose through 2015 and provides resources to maintain the facility.

HP Pavilion accounts for more than 175 events per year, and over the past 10 years has ranked consistently in the top-five in North America and top-10 in the world based on ticket sales for non-sporting related events by *Pollstar*, the leading concert industry trade magazine. Total attendance since opening in 1993 is more than 20 million guests with more than 2,400 events.

He was initially hired in 1993 as vice president of business operations for his proven leadership and ability to mesh the unique needs of all franchise supporters — including fans, businesses and corporate partners — with the talents of the club's front office personnel.

In addition, Jamison helped create the Sharks Foundation in 1994 — established to meet the educational, social and cultural needs of the local community by offering unique resources and financial support to those in need. It has awarded more than \$4.1 million since its inception. Other community-minded programs have placed the Sharks at the forefront of community relations.

**MALCOLM BORDELON**

EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT OF BUSINESS OPERATIONS

Malcolm Bordelon enters his 17th season with Silicon Valley Sports & Entertainment and the San Jose Sharks, his 15th as executive vice president of business operations, having been promoted to the post by former President and Chief Executive Officer Greg Jamison on March 15, 1996. Bordelon previously served as vice president, broadcast and media marketing since joining the club in July 1994.

Bordelon, 52, oversees the following departments of the Sharks: broadcasting; marketing; ticket sales and service; event presentation and communications, which includes fan development, internet services, media relations and public relations; and corporate partnerships, which includes suite sales and hospitality. He also oversees business operations for the SAP Open tennis tournament (ATP circuit) and two tennis properties in Memphis, Tenn. (Regions Morgan Keegan Championships [men's] and Cellular South Cup [women's]).

Furthermore, as a member of Senior Management, Bordelon is involved in review and pursuit of new business opportunities for SVS&E. In addition to overseeing the business operations of the Sharks, Bordelon has played a key role in developing and is also responsible for managing Silicon Valley Sports & Entertainment.

This division of the company, created in the summer of 2000, oversees all business operation aspects of the San Jose Sharks, HP Pavilion at San Jose and select HP Pavilion events. In addition, SVS&E manages all or parts of Sharks Ice at San Jose (the Sharks official training facility), Sharks Ice at Fremont, Oakland Ice Center operated by Sharks Ice, the SAP Open (San Jose) and Regions Morgan Keegan Championships (Memphis, Tenn.) ATP Tour Tennis tournaments, Cellular South Cup (Memphis, Tenn.) WTA Tour tennis tournament, the American Hockey League's Worcester Sharks (the Sharks top development affiliate) as well as select HP Pavilion events such as Strikeforce Mixed Martial Arts.

Most recently, Bordelon played an integral role in the planning and launch of the Sharks updated logo for the 2007-08 season as well as this season's 20th anniversary marks. Bordelon also worked closely with Reebok/CCM and the National Hockey League to develop and coordinate the launch of the Sharks new uniform for 2007-08 and has been a central figure in the concept, design and implementation of the Sharks third "black" jersey.

In addition, Bordelon is the franchise contact for a number of NHL sponsorship, broadcasting and other business-related issues. In that capacity, he served as the team's primary contact and coordinator with the NHL for the 1997 All-Star Game as the Sharks and the City of San Jose played hosts to what has been called one of the most successful mid-season classics ever conducted. He also worked with the NHL as the club's main liaison for the Sharks two-game series vs. the Calgary Flames in GAME ON Japan, the NHL's kick-off weekend to the 1998-99 season in Tokyo. Bordelon will play a similar coordination role working with the NHL on the Sharks 2010-11 season opening games in Stockholm, Sweden vs. the Columbus Blue Jackets as part of the NHL Premiere games in Europe as well as an exhibition match vs. the DEL Mannheim Eagles at SAP Arena in Mannheim, Germany.

The Sharks have also made significant gains in corporate partnerships under Bordelon's direction, including the naming of HP Pavilion at San Jose and the club level of the facility as the Comerica Bank Club. Since he joined the organization, numerous Bay Area high-tech companies have made their first forays into sports sponsorship with the Sharks and other SVS&E properties.

Bordelon was named to the initial steering committee of the San Francisco Chapter of the National Sports Marketing Network, an industry trade organization for sports business professionals. Bordelon currently serves on the board of the San Jose Downtown Foundation and also served as the San Jose Downtown Association president in 1998 and 1999. Bordelon is a member of the American Leadership Forum-Silicon Valley, (Class XVIII), a nonprofit organization dedicated to building a better Silicon Valley community by joining and strengthening leaders to serve the public good.

Bordelon joined the Sharks after spending six years as director of sponsorship sales and promotions with the Indiana Pacers. Previously, he spent seven years within the advertising industry, including stints in media sales with Carlisle Outdoor Advertising and advertising agencies Ogilvy & Mather and Cunningham & Walsh, claiming numerous national and local awards and citations for outstanding creative and professional achievement.

A native of Houston, he graduated from Texas Tech University with a degree in advertising. Upon his graduation, he was named the American Advertising Federation Outstanding Advertising Student and the Texas Tech School of Mass Communications Most Outstanding Student. In addition, on Oct. 16, 1999, Bordelon was awarded the "Outstanding Alumni of the School of Mass Communications" during Texas Tech's homecoming festivities. He and his family live in the Almaden area of San Jose.





CHARLIE FAAS

EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT AND CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER

Charlie Faas enters his eighth year with Silicon Valley Sports & Entertainment as executive vice president and chief financial officer.

Faas oversees finance, accounting, information technology and human resources. As the chief financial officer, he's responsible for all financial matters with regards to Silicon Valley Sports & Entertainment, including the San Jose Sharks, HP Pavilion Management, Sharks Ice at San Jose (the Sharks official training facility), Sharks Ice at Fremont, Oakland Ice Center operated by Sharks Ice, the SAP Open (San Jose) and Regions Morgan Keegan Championships (Memphis, Tenn.) ATP Tour Tennis tournaments, Cellular South Cup (Memphis, Tenn.) WTA Tour tennis tournament, the American Hockey League's Worcester Sharks (the Sharks top development affiliate) and Strikeforce Mixed Martial Arts.

Along with HP Pavilion Executive Vice President and General Manager Jim Goddard, Faas serves as a board member of Explosion Entertainment, LLC, which is a joint venture between SVS&E and West Coast Productions to operate Strikeforce Mixed Martial Arts (MMA). Strikeforce events appear on Showtime, airing on Friday and Saturday nights each month.

Faas works closely with the board of directors of San Jose Sports & Entertainment Enterprises. His duties also include compliance with National Hockey League and City of San Jose reporting requirements. He also serves as a board member of the Sharks Foundation.

Faas is a member of the board of directors for the Bay Area After School All Stars (ASAS) and the San Jose Sports Authority (SJSA). In June 2006, he was honored as the 2006 recipient of the "Mary Angela DiGiovanni Beacon of Light Award," presented on behalf of the National Board of Directors of the After School All Stars program for outstanding contributions by an individual. ASAS is a non-profit organization that provides year-round sports, cultural, academic and technology programs for at-risk youth throughout the greater San Jose community. It's part of the National ASAS program founded by California Governor Arnold Schwarzenegger. The San Jose Sports Authority is a non-profit organization that serves as the sports marketing agency for the City of San Jose. Since its inception in 1991, it has worked with community partners to bring more than 150 premier events and programs to the San Jose area. Faas has served as treasurer since 1995.

In November 2008, Faas received the "CFO of the Year" Award from the *Silicon Valley Business Journal*, in the private business category.

Before joining the organization, Faas held various finance positions in California and New York, most recently as the chief financial officer at Pharsight Corporation. His additional experience includes stints as corporate controller for ZLand.com, methodology services controller and finance director with Cadence Design Systems and numerous financial management positions at IBM.

A native of upstate New York, Faas earned a bachelor's degree in business administration and accounting from Siena College and graduated from the executive education program from the Anderson School at UCLA.

Faas has also served as an adjunct professor at the University of San Francisco, teaching finance and accounting for their master's degree program in sports management.





JIM GODDARD

EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT, GENERAL MANAGER (HP PAVILION AT SAN JOSE)

Jim Goddard enters his 20th season with Silicon Valley Sports & Entertainment and his 13th as executive vice president and general manager of HP Pavilion at San Jose. Goddard, 61, oversees all facets of the building's operation, including ticket operations, event booking, guest services, parking, food services, engineering and facility technical operations. He's the point person for all discussions between building management and the City of San Jose. Goddard also implements and oversees all building improvements, from the design phase to final construction and sign-off.

In the summer of 2007, Goodard helped implement an ambitious, \$17.5-million capital upgrade project to HP Pavilion that included a new, multi-level LED scoreboard, LED full-color fascia display, a state-of-the-art seating area sound system, roof-rigging weight capacity increase, a new HDTV control room and an additional concourse level suite.

Goddard also oversaw two separate expansion and renovation projects of Sharks Ice at San Jose, which included the addition of a multi-million dollar, 58,000-square foot training and practice facility for the Sharks in August 2000 and a fourth sheet of ice in 2005. The facility is the largest ice facility under one roof west of the Mississippi River. In addition, the facility operates Stanley's, a 5,400 square-foot sports bar which overlooks three of the four ice surfaces and boasts 11 flat-screen plasma televisions and a state-of-the-art sound system.

From 1993-96, he served as vice president of building operations and from 1990-93, Goddard served as San Jose Arena project manager, helping oversee the design and construction of the facility. He represented the Sharks and HP Pavilion Management interests in working with the City of San Jose, architects, consultants and contractors.

Goddard came to San Jose from Minnesota, where he completed a 23-year term of service at the Met Center, finishing as vice president of Met Center Operations. While at the Met Center, Goddard was involved in all aspects of the management and operation of the facility, working with promoters, tenants, concessionaires and suppliers to ensure a consistent level of superior service was enjoyed by everyone involved with the building.

Goddard attended the University of Minnesota.



DON GRALNEK

EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT AND GENERAL COUNSEL

Don Gralnek begins his 13th season with Silicon Valley Sports & Entertainment and ninth as executive vice president and general counsel. Having previously served as vice president and general counsel since August 1997, Gralnek oversees all legal matters with regards to all of SVS&E's properties.

Gralnek previously was a senior partner in the Los Angeles office of Jones, Day, Reavis & Pogue and he served as outside legal counsel to the Sharks and the building since the team's inception in 1990. In addition, he also worked closely on behalf of San Jose Arena Management with the San Jose Redevelopment Agency and the City of San Jose on the original facility construction.

Gralnek has concentrated his practice of the law in the areas of real estate and environmental protection. His experience in real estate extends from land use regulation, acquisitions, development, financing, sales, learning and partnerships/joint ventures.

A graduate of the University of California at Berkeley's prestigious Boalt Hall School of Law, Gralnek also earned a master's degree in city planning from Berkeley in 1971 and an undergraduate degree in history with honors from Stanford University in 1967.

The Chicago native is a member of State Bar of California, as well as the Los Angeles and Santa Clara County Bar Associations and has taught courses for the University of California and San Jose State University.





DOUG WILSON

EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT AND GENERAL MANAGER

Through strong drafting, shrewd trades and timely free agent signings, Executive Vice President and General Manager Doug Wilson has crafted one of the National Hockey League's most successful on-ice franchises since being named to his post before the 2003-04 season.

In his six seasons in charge of the Sharks Hockey Department, Wilson, who also serves as the team's alternate governor to the NHL, has guided the team to its most successful era since the franchise's inception, capturing the Presidents' Trophy (2009), four Pacific Division titles (2004, 2008, 2009 and 2010) and advancing to the Western Conference Final in 2004 and 2010.

In his tenure as general manager, only the Detroit Red Wings have appeared in more Stanley Cup Playoff rounds (16) than San Jose (13).

During that same span, the Sharks rank second in regular season points (648, 291-135-66 record), second in wins among all NHL teams and has nearly posted six consecutive 100-point seasons (2003-04 – 104; 2005-06 – 99; 2006-07 – 107; 2007-08 – 108, 2008-09 – 117) and 2009-10 – 113), an average of 108 points per season.

Last season, the Sharks finished first in the Western Conference, advancing to the Western Conference Final before falling to the eventual Stanley Cup Champion Chicago Blackhawks.

In his current role, Wilson has overall authority regarding all hockey-related operations. He oversees all player personnel decisions, negotiates player contracts, coordinates the efforts of the team's scouting department, leads the team in its draft day preparation and administers the club's player evaluation process at all professional, minor and junior levels.

In his previous role as the team's director of pro development (1997-03), the 16-year NHL veteran's responsibilities included evaluating talent at all professional and minor league levels and continuous assessment of the Sharks roster and reserve list. In addition, he provided valuable input assisting in the club's player development programs and consulting with the hockey department on all major personnel issues, special assignments and contract negotiations.

Working closely with the entire hockey department, Wilson played a major role in creating a positive atmosphere in the dressing room and on-the-ice attractiveness to obtaining and retaining veteran free agents such as Vincent Damphousse, Mike Ricci, Gary Suter, Scott Thornton and Mike Vernon.

The 51-year-old Wilson was an integral member of the NHL Players' Association for four years (1993-97). With the NHLPA, he served as coordinator of player relations and business development and was primarily responsible for overseeing player relations, the development of business ventures and managing international affairs. Wilson is also a past president of the NHLPA.

Wilson sat on the board of the Canadian Hockey Association and has extensive experience in talent evaluation. He served as management consultant for Canada's entries in the 1994, 1995, 1996 and 1997 World Junior Championship tournaments — resulting in four consecutive gold medal finishes and also served on the management team for Canada's entry in the 1998 Winter Olympic Games.

Wilson draws on a vast amount of hockey knowledge and expertise throughout his on-and-off the ice experiences. His older brother, Murray, played seven NHL seasons, capturing four Stanley Cup Championships with the Montreal Canadiens (1973, 1976-78). As a member of the Ontario Hockey League's Ottawa 67s, Wilson played for Hall of Famer Brian Kilrea, junior hockey's all-time winningest coach. During his tenure with the Chicago Blackhawks, he was a teammate of NHL legend Bobby Orr and a roommate with Hall of Famer Stan Mikita.

In 2004, Wilson was named to the NHL Game Committee, a panel of players, coaches, executives and media responsible for examining all aspects of the game. The committee, which initially met during the offseason, included Hall of Fame Coach Scotty Bowman, Pittsburgh's Chairman of the Board Mario Lemieux and former national television analyst/goaltender and current St. Louis President of Hockey Operations John Davidson, among others.

A first round draft choice (sixth overall) by the Blackhawks in 1977 after a stellar junior career with the Ottawa 67s, Wilson played 14 seasons in Chicago and still ranks as the club's highest scoring defenseman in points (779 — fifth overall), goals (225 — 12th overall) and assists (554 — third overall). Wilson ranks fifth all-time in games played (938) for Chicago. In addition, he led all Blackhawks defensemen in scoring for 10 consecutive seasons (1980-81 through 1990-91) and captured the 1982 James Norris Memorial Trophy, symbolic of the League's top defenseman, when he tallied 39 goals and 85 points — still Blackhawks single-season records for goals and points for a defenseman.

He was selected to eight NHL All-Star Games (seven with Chicago and one with San Jose) and while with Chicago, Wilson was named as an NHL First Team All-Star in 1982 and twice was named as an NHL Second Team All-Star (1985 and 1990).

Acquired by San Jose from Chicago just before the Sharks inaugural season (1991-92), Wilson brought instant credibility and respect to the young franchise. He played two seasons for the Sharks, scoring 48 points (12 goals, 36 assists) in 86 games and, entering this season, ranks tied for 56th on the Sharks all-time scoring list, tied for 17th all-time among defensemen.

Included in Wilson's Sharks career highlights are serving as the franchise's first team captain (1991-93), being





the team's first representative in an All-Star Game (1991-92), playing in his NHL-milestone 1,000th game on Nov. 21, 1992 (77th player in League history) and twice named Sharks nominee (1992 and 1993) for the King Clancy Award (for leadership and humanitarian contributions both on-and-of the ice). At his 1,000th NHL game played ceremony, he announced the creation of the Doug Wilson Scholarship Foundation, to provide assistance to worthy college-bound Bay Area students, which continues today.

Wilson announced his retirement as a member of the Sharks during training camp in 1993-94 after playing in 1,024 career games. In addition, he played in 95 career playoff games and scored 80 points (19 goals, 61 assists). The Ottawa, Ontario native scored 827 points (237 goals, 590 assists) during his career that began in 1977-78 with Chicago.

In 2004, Wilson was named to the Positive Coaching Alliance's National Advisory Board. PCA, established at Stanford University in 1998, looks to create a positive character-building experience by using sports to teach life lessons while de-emphasizing the "win-at-all-cost" mentality.

Wilson was inducted into the Chicago Sports Hall of Fame in September 1999. He also serves on the NHL's board of directors for the alumni association.

In October 1998, the Ottawa 67s honored his stellar career by retiring his No. 7 sweater. Known as an offensive defenseman, he recorded 295 points in 194 Ontario Hockey League games with the 67s from 1975-77. In addition, during the same weekend of activities in his hometown, he was inducted into the Ottawa Sports Hall of Fame.

Wilson and his wife, Kathy, have four children: Lacey, Doug, Chelsea and Charlie.

In addition, he's responsible for various parts of the SVS&E operations (SVS&E Merchandise and SVS&E Publishing) and the exploration of new opportunities in domestic and international properties.

This division of the company, created in the summer of 2000, oversees all business operation aspects of the San Jose Sharks, HP Pavilion at San Jose and select HP Pavilion events. In addition, SVS&E manages all or parts of Sharks Ice at San Jose (the Sharks official training facility), Sharks Ice at Fremont, Oakland Ice Center operated by Sharks Ice, the SAP Open (San Jose) and Regions Morgan Keegan Championships (Memphis, Tenn.) ATP Tour Tennis tournaments, Cellular South Cup (Memphis, Tenn.) WTA Tour tennis tournament, the American Hockey League's Worcester Sharks (the Sharks top development affiliate) as well as select HP Pavilion events such as Strikeforce Mixed Martial Arts.

Lehr also continues to serve as the Worcester Sharks Alternate Governor to the AHL Board of Governors.

Over the past four seasons, Lehr has guided the Worcester Sharks to become one of the top regarded franchises in the AHL. Along with current Worcester President Michael Mudd, Lehr was instrumental in developing and producing the Worcester bid to the AHL Board of Governors in order to secure the 2009 AHL All-Star Classic for the city of Worcester, the first time in 50 years the AHL All-Star Classic was held in Massachusetts. The 2009 AHL All-Star Classic was a tremendous success, with all four events filled to capacity and showcased the city of Worcester to host such an event.

Under the direction of Lehr, the Worcester Sharks have developed and implemented several groundbreaking community initiatives including the "Be a Leader" program and the opening ceremonies for the Special Olympics Massachusetts. He also serves on the board of directors for the Worcester Regional Chamber of Commerce.

Before joining SVS&E, Lehr successfully worked in Major League Baseball and for regional sports networks. He served as the regional director of programming and network operations for SportsChannel Ohio in Cleveland and Cincinnati from 1991-93. Under his direction, SportsChannel captured its first local Emmy Award for "Outstanding Sports Coverage" of Indians Baseball. He has been active for such charity groups as Big & Little Brothers, Cleveland Indians Charities, Orioles Foundation, American Lung Association, Grant-A-Wish, YMCA, Special Olympics, Cleveland Sports Commission and several other youth sports organizations.

A native of Chicago, Lehr earned a bachelor's degree in communications and political science from the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

VICE PRESIDENT OF FINANCE

Ken Caveney begins his ninth year as vice president of finance for Silicon Valley Sports & Entertainment and has been associated with the organization for 20 years. He has been employed by the organization since 1994, previously serving as tax manager and director of finance.

VICE PRESIDENT OF BUSINESS OPERATIONS

Rich Sotelo enters his 18th year with Silicon Valley Sports & Entertainment and his 11th as vice president of building operations. From 1995-99, he served as director of operations for San Jose Arena Management.

Sotelo, 53, oversees various aspects of HP Pavilion at San Jose's Building Operations Department, including audio/visual, engineering, security, conversion, cleaning, facility enhancements and construction projects. In addition, Sotelo is responsible for coordinating the facility's Emergency Response Contingency Planning and, utilizing his past knowledge and involvement with labor union negotiations, he is HP Pavilion at San Jose's liaison and main negotiator in handling all collective bargaining agreements with the various unions.

WAYNE THOMAS

VICE PRESIDENT AND ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER

Wayne Thomas recently completed his 14th season as assistant general manager and his ninth as vice president, providing Executive Vice President and General Manager Doug Wilson with an experienced, versatile and valuable assistant.

Thomas, 62, is well versed in all aspects of the National Hockey League, garnering experience from his 40 years of being a player, head coach, assistant coach, advance scout and executive. Before his promotion in March 1996, he was in his third season as Sharks assistant coach and assistant to the general manager.

An Ottawa, Ontario native, Thomas is intimately involved with all aspects of the Sharks on- and off-ice operations, including evaluating players on the Sharks reserve list with special emphasis on goaltenders, scouting other NHL teams and taking an active role in contract negotiations and player personnel matters.

In addition, Thomas serves as the general manager of the American Hockey League's Worcester Sharks (the organization's top development affiliate) and also supervises the relationship between the organization and its other player development teams, including the ECHL's Stockton Thunder. Last season, with one of the youngest teams in the AHL, Worcester finished as Atlantic Division Champions and second in the overall in the Eastern Conference, advancing to the AHL Eastern Conference Semifinals.

For the past seven seasons, Thomas has also taken on a more advanced, day-to-day role in working with the Sharks goaltenders on-and-off the ice. He also oversees the work of Goaltending Development Coach Corey Schwab, who handles goaltending coaching duties for Sharks prospects in Worcester, Stockton and other amateur leagues.

Thomas serves an important role as a liaison between the coaches, training staff and the hockey department, facilitates the interaction of hockey department personnel within the organization, coordinates the construction of the NHL pre- and regular season schedules, assists the efforts of the Sharks scouting staff and coordinates a variety of front office administrative matters.

Under Thomas' direct supervision and following the franchise's goal of developing players from within, the Sharks AHL affiliate system has produced a number of key players on the Sharks current roster which were acquired through the NHL Entry Draft including Ryane Clowe, Logan Couture, Jason Demers, Thomas Greiss, Jamie McGinn, Douglas Murray Joe Pavelski and Devin Setoguchi.

In his role as Sharks assistant coach from 1993-96, Thomas assisted with game strategy, advance scouting of opponents and performed individual work with the Sharks goaltenders. In addition, he collaborated with the general manager on a year-round basis regarding administrative matters.

Thomas joined the Sharks coaching and management staff for the 1993-94 season after spending three seasons (1990-93) as an assistant coach with the St. Louis Blues. Thomas also served in that capacity with the Chicago Blackhawks in 1987-88 and was head coach at Peoria (International Hockey League) from 1988-90 and at Salt Lake City from 1985-87. His 1985-86 squad captured the IHL's Turner Cup Championship.

A former NHL goaltender, his playing career consisted of 243 games over nine seasons, including stints with Montreal, Toronto and the New York Rangers. Thomas was a member of the Canadiens 1972-73 Stanley Cup Championship squad. Additional career highlights included being selected to and getting the win at the 1976 NHL All-Star Game as a member of the Maple Leafs, posting 10 career shutouts — including one in his first NHL start — and a lifetime goals-against average of 3.34. After his retirement in 1981, Thomas spent four seasons as an assistant coach with the Rangers.

Thomas has a bachelor's degree in physical education from the University of Wisconsin, where he played three years of hockey from 1967-70.





JOE WILL

DIRECTOR OF HOCKEY OPERATIONS

Joe Will, 46, begins his sixth season as director of hockey operations. Will has been a member of the Sharks organization since its inception in July 1990, serving as scouting coordinator and assistant to the general manager before his promotion.

Will works closely with Executive Vice President and General Manager Doug Wilson on all daily departmental functions and his primary responsibilities include contract research and negotiations, scouting operations, fiscal planning and salary cap analysis and hockey administration. He's the lead coordinator and planner for the Sharks training camp scouting meetings and scouting conference each season.

One of his most important duties involves the tracking, analyzing and projecting of the team's player payroll relative to the current and future National Hockey League salary cap to prevent the team from becoming financially handcuffed.

Will also works with the organization's professional scouts and management team in player research for expansion, waivers, free agency and trades. His expert analysis of economic trends in the NHL has led to the Sharks acquisition and retention of key veteran players over the years.

The Bloomington, Minn. native also works with Director of Scouting Tim Burke in the development and implementation of draft prospect testing, draft table operations and computer scouting analysis. He's an integral part of draft-day strategy that has acquired players such as Jonathan Cheechoo. Without his coordinating efforts, the team would not have drafted 2001 Calder Memorial Trophy winner Evgeni Nabokov in 1994. In addition, he developed the Sharks computer scouting program that pioneered the advent of scouting programs used throughout the NHL.

Before joining San Jose, Will spent six years in the Minnesota North Stars organization in various capacities.



TODD MCLELLAN

HEAD COACH

Todd McLellan recently completed his second season as the Sharks head coach, becoming just the third coach in National Hockey League history to record 50-plus wins in his first two seasons. Overall, his NHL coaching record stands at 104-38-22.

In 2009-10, McLellan led the Sharks to a first place finish in the Western Conference, a third consecutive Pacific Division title and a berth in the Western Conference Final. The team finished in the top-five among all NHL teams in goals per game (3.13), power play (21.0 percent), penalty killing (85.0), faceoff percentage (55.6) and even-strength goal differential (plus-32).

In 2008-09, McLellan, 42, was named as a finalist for the Jack Adams Trophy and became just the sixth NHL coach (and first since 1990) to lead his team to the Presidents' Trophy for the best overall regular season record (53-18-11) in his first season behind the bench. Only Tom Johnson's 1970-71 Boston Bruins won more home games (33) than McLellan's Sharks (32) and the team's 53 wins placed him tied for second behind Johnson (57 wins) for most overall coaching wins by a rookie head coach. In addition, McLellan's .713 points percentage ranks third all-time among first year bench bosses with at least 80 games coached.

Named as the eighth head coach in San Jose Sharks franchise history on June 12, 2008, the 2008-09 Sharks collected 52 points through the first 30 games of the season (32-5-4, an NHL record) and began the season 20-0-2 at HP Pavilion. They were the only team in the League to be in the top-five of each of the following categories: power play (third, 24.2 percent), penalty kill (fifth, 83.3), shots for (third, 33.2), shots against (first, 27.2) and faceoffs (second, 53.8).

Before joining San Jose, McLellan spent three seasons as an assistant coach under Mike Babcock with the Detroit Red Wings. During that span, no NHL team won more games (162) or earned more standings points (352) than Detroit. One of McLellan's key responsibilities was working with the Red Wings power play, which finished third in the NHL in 2007-08 (20.7) and first in 2005-06 (22.1).

In his five seasons coaching in the NHL with San Jose and Detroit, McLellan's teams have won one Stanley Cup (2008 with Detroit), three Presidents' Trophies (2006 and 2008 with Detroit – finishing second overall in 2007, tying the Buffalo Sabres for first in points (113) but having three fewer wins – and 2009 with San Jose), three appearances in the Western Conference Final (2007 and 2008 with Detroit, and 2010 with San Jose) and five division titles.

Before being hired in Detroit, McLellan spent four seasons as head coach of the Houston Aeros in the American Hockey League, including capturing the 2003 Calder Cup Championship. Under his guidance, McLellan led the Aeros to a 154-111-37-18 mark (.567 winning percentage). He was named 2003 Minor Coach of the Year by The Hockey News and also was selected to coach two AHL All-Star Games during his tenure in Houston.

In 2000-01, he was the head coach of the Cleveland Lumberjacks of the International Hockey League, posting a 43-32-7 record.





From 1994-95 through 1999-00, McLellan coached the Swift Current Broncos of the Western Hockey League, where he also served as general manager in his final four seasons. He was named 2000 WHL Coach of the Year and 1997 WHL Executive of the Year. The team captured division titles in 1996 and 2000.

In his 15 years of serving as a head and assistant coach, McLellan's teams have never missed the postseason.

McLellan, a native of Melville, Saskatchewan, played his junior hockey with Saskatoon (WHL) and was drafted by the New York Islanders in the fifth round (106th overall) in the 1986 NHL Entry Draft. He played parts of two seasons with Springfield in the AHL and played in five games with the Islanders in 1987-88, posting two points (one goal, one assist) before a shoulder injury ended his career.

McLellan and his wife, Debbie, have two sons: Tyson and Cale.



Under Todd McLellan, the Sharks have finished first in the Western Conference for two straight seasons.

TRENT YAWNEY

ASSISTANT COACH

Veteran National Hockey League coach Trent Yawney enters his third season with San Jose as an assistant coach on Head Coach Todd McLellan's staff. Yawney's primary responsibilities are working with the team's defensemen and penalty killing units, both of which made significant strides under his guidance last season.

In 2009-10, San Jose finished fifth in the NHL in penalty killing (85 percent) and allowed the eighth-fewest goals per game (2.55).

Along with the support of the coaching staff, Yawney succeeded in getting the Sharks defensemen more involved in the team's offensive attack.

The team's blueliners set franchise records in 2008-09 for most points (203), shots (816) and power play goals (22). In addition, the Sharks became just the fourth team in NHL history to have four defensemen post 30 or more assists in a single season (Dan Boyle, 41; Rob Blake, 35; Christian Ehrhoff, 34; Marc-Edouard Vlasic, 30)

Before joining the Sharks, Yawney, 44, spent the 2007-08 season as a scout for the Anaheim Ducks in their Stanley Cup-winning season. He also served as head coach of Team Canada at the 2007 World Under-18 Championships.

A native of Hudson Bay, Saskatchewan, Yawney spent 14 seasons with the Blackhawks organization, most recently having served as the 35th head coach in franchise history from 2005-07. He posted a 33-55-15 record in just over one season as Chicago's bench boss.


Before serving as head coach with the Blackhawks, Yawney was the head coach for their American Hockey League affiliate, the Norfolk Admirals, for five seasons. Under Yawney's guidance, Norfolk posted a 189-144-42-25 regular season record over five seasons while winning back-to-back South Division titles in 2001-02 and 2002-03. The Admirals made five consecutive playoff appearances and advanced to the conference semifinals twice while seeing more than 50 players advance to the Blackhawks during that span. Yawney was honored by The Hockey News as their 2003-04 "Minor Pro Coach of the Year."

Yawney's coaching experience began during the 1998-99 season. He appeared in 20 games with the Blackhawks before suffering a broken arm in January. Out for the season due to the injury, Yawney began assisting the Blackhawks coaching staff on an informal basis. Upon being named head coach in February, Lorne Molleken formally named Yawney an assistant coach on Feb. 22, 1999.

Yawney played in 593 NHL games over 12 seasons with Chicago, Calgary and St. Louis. The defenseman collected 129 points (27 goals, 102 assists) along with 783 penalty minutes. He also appeared in 60 postseason contests, helping lead the Blackhawks to the 1989 and 1990 Western Conference Finals. Yawney was named as captain for Team Canada in the 1988 Winter Olympics. He was originally drafted by the Blackhawks in the third round (45th overall) of the 1984 NHL Entry Draft.

Yawney was teammates in Chicago with Executive Vice President and General Manager Doug Wilson from 1987-91 and former Sharks forward Jeremy Roenick from 1988-91. He was also teammates with McLellan from 1983-85 on the Western Hockey League's Saskatoon Blades.

Yawney and his wife, Char, have two children: Ashley and Connor.





MATT SHAW

ASSISTANT COACH

A former assistant coach with Todd McLellan on the American Hockey League's Houston Aeros, Matt Shaw enters his second season as an assistant coach. He joined the Sharks in July 2009.

Before joining the Sharks, Shaw spent two seasons (2007-09) with the Minnesota Wild on former Head Coach Jacques Lemaire's staff. He served as assistant coach for the 2008-09 season after spending 2007-08 as the team's video coach. Shaw's duties with the Wild included video responsibilities, pre-scouting opposing teams and in-game analysis and adjustments.

Shaw has been behind the bench for more than 1,000 professional and collegiate hockey games in his coaching career and spent seven seasons as an assistant coach for the Aeros, including 2001-05 as McLellan's assistant, before joining the Wild. He also served as assistant general manager for Houston. Shaw helped lead the Aeros to a record of 273-215-74 (.552), including the 2003 Calder Cup, in his seven years with the organization.

Before joining Houston, Shaw served as head coach of the Quad City Mallards of the United Hockey League (UHL) in 1999-00, leading the team to a 53-16-5 record and a trip to the UHL Finals. He also spent two seasons as an assistant coach in Quad City from 1995-97 and they won the 1996-97 UHL Championship. Shaw was also an assistant coach for the Chicago Wolves of the International Hockey League (IHL) in 1998-99 and served as head coach of the ECHL's Mobile Mysticks in 1997-98.

The Phoenix, Ariz. native began his coaching career with his alma mater, Colorado College, where he served as an assistant coach for the Tigers from 1989-92. His primary responsibilities were coordinating practices and recruiting. During his tenure, Shaw was the youngest recruiter in NCAA Division I.

He played 138 collegiate games as a defenseman with U.S. International University (1985-88) and Colorado College (1988-89) and was a tri-captain with the Tigers during his senior season and earned All-WCHA Honorable Mention.



JAY WOODCROFT

ASSISTANT COACH

Jay Woodcroft begins his third season in San Jose as an assistant coach and sixth in the National Hockey League.

Woodcroft's primary responsibilities include designing penalty kill schemes alongside fellow Assistant Coach Trent Yawney (fifth in the NHL in 2009-10), working with the team's centers on faceoff theory/technique (first in 2009-10), pre-scouting the opposition with his fellow coaches and on-ice skill development work with individual players. As the "eye in the sky" during games, Woodcroft's analysis helps the coaching staff make necessary in-game adjustments.

Woodcroft, 34, spent three seasons alongside Sharks Head Coach Todd McLellan with the Detroit Red Wings (2005-08) as video coach, including their 2008 Stanley Cup Championship season.

In five seasons in the NHL, Woodcroft has been a part of teams that have won 266 regular season games, five Western Conference regular season titles (three Central Division and two Pacific Division Championships), three Presidents' Trophies, 38 playoff games and one Stanley Cup.

Woodcroft joined the Red Wings following a six-year minor league career. He spent the 2004-05 season in Germany playing for the Stuttgart Wizards and, in his career, played with the Corpus Christi Rayz (CHL), Flint Generals (UHL), Anchorage Aces (WCHL), Missouri River Otters (UHL) and Jackson Bandits (ECHL).

The Toronto, Ontario native spent four seasons on a full scholarship with the University of Alabama-Huntsville, where he was an Academic All-American and graduated Summa Cum Laude with a degree in finance.

Woodcroft and his wife, Jaclynn, reside in San Jose.





COREY SCHWAB

GOALTENDING DEVELOPMENT COACH

Former National Hockey League goaltender and Stanley Cup-winner Corey Schwab enters his third season as the goaltending development coach for the San Jose Sharks. Schwab, 39, handles the bulk of the goaltending coaching duties for Sharks prospects in Worcester (AHL), Kalamazoo (ECHL) and amateur leagues and will work closely with Wayne Thomas, whose responsibilities as the vice president and assistant general manager of the

San Jose Sharks and general manager of the Worcester Sharks include coaching the goaltenders at the NHL level.

Schwab spent three seasons (2005-08) as associate goaltending coach and scout for the Tampa Bay Lightning, where he reported to Tampa Bay assistant coach and former goaltender Jeff Reese and worked with the organization's goaltenders in Springfield (AHL), Norfolk (AHL) and Johnstown (ECHL), as well as the organization's goaltending prospects.

The North Battleford, Saskatchewan native also served as one of the team's goaltending scouts and collected detailed information on all other team's goaltenders and goaltending prospects while assisting with scouting draft-eligible goaltenders.

A veteran of 147 regular season games with New Jersey, Tampa Bay, Vancouver and Toronto over his eight-year NHL career, Schwab posted a 42-63-13 record with a 2.89 goals-against average and a .896 save percentage, along with six shutouts. Schwab was a member of the 2003 Stanley Cup Champion New Jersey Devils, as well as the 1995 Calder Cup Champion Albany River Rats.

Schwab and his wife, Debbie, have two sons: Austin and Brady.



MIKE RICCI

DEVELOPMENT COACH

One of the most beloved players to ever don a Sharks sweater, Mike Ricci enters his third season as development coach following one season as an advisor to San Jose's Hockey Operations Department.

In this role, Ricci, 39, works with Head Coach Todd McLellan and his staff to provide on-ice instruction and assistance when the team is at home and will also work closely with Scout Bryan Marchment, visiting and working with the Sharks prospects in Worcester and various junior teams.

Ricci finished his stellar, 16-year National Hockey League career in 2007 after notching 605 points (243 goals, 362 assists) and 979 penalty minutes in 1,099 games with Philadelphia, Quebec/Colorado, San Jose and Phoenix. He also added 66 points (23 goals, 43 assists) in 110 Stanley Cup Playoff games. Ricci won a Stanley Cup with Colorado in 1996.

His 263 points (101 goals, 162 assists) with San Jose ranks eighth on the Sharks all-time list and his 529 games place him fifth all-time. In 59 Stanley Cup Playoff games with San Jose, Ricci ranks fifth with 33 points (14 goals, 19 assists) and his 59 postseason games ranks third in Sharks history.

Ricci was originally selected by the Philadelphia Flyers in the first round (fourth overall) of the 1990 NHL Entry Draft. In June 1992, he was part of the blockbuster trade between Philadelphia and the Quebec Nordiques that saw the Flyers trade Ricci, Ron Hextall, Peter Forsberg, Steve Duchesne, Kerry Huffman, Chris Simon, first round selections in the 1993 and 1994 NHL Entry Drafts and \$15 million to the Nordiques in exchange for Eric Lindros.

Ricci was acquired by the Sharks on Nov. 21, 1997, along with a second round selection in the 1998 NHL Entry Draft, in exchange for Shean Donovan and a first round selection in the 1998 NHL Entry Draft.

TIM BURKE

DIRECTOR OF SCOUTING

Director of Scouting Tim Burke enters his 14th season as the head of the Sharks scouting department.

Burke, 55, coordinates and oversees the Sharks efforts in the National Hockey League's annual Entry Draft while working closely with Executive Vice President and General Manager Doug Wilson and his staff. In addition to being the principal decision-maker at the draft table, Burke is also responsible for evaluating amateur talent at every level in all North American and European leagues and supervises all aspects of the club's amateur scouting efforts.

Burke's hard work and keen decision making, coupled with the talents of his competent staff at evaluating players, has produced admired results. Burke's selection process has helped the Sharks create a solid foundation of talented players from which to build the franchise around — including Patrick Marleau (1997), Douglas Murray (1999), Ryane Clowe (2001), Joe Pavelski (2003), Thomas Greiss (2004), Torrey Mitchell (2004), Devin Setoguchi and Marc-Edouard Vlasic (2005), Jamie McGinn (2006) and Logan Couture (2007), all of whom played prominent roles in the Sharks recent seasons.

Since the 2003-04 season, the Sharks rank second in regular season points (642, 291-135-66 record), second in wins among all NHL teams and has nearly posted six consecutive 100-point seasons (2003-04 – 104; 2005-06 – 99; 2006-07 – 107; 2007-08 – 108, 2008-09 – 117; 2009-10 - 113), an average of 108 points per season.

In 2009-10, the team captured their second straight Western Conference regular season championship and their fifth Pacific Division title (third consecutive). San Jose finished in the top-five in the League in power play percentage (21.0 percent, T-4th), penalty killing (85.0, fifth), goals for per game (3.13, fourth) and faceoff percentage (55.6, first).

A member of the Sharks scouting department since the 1992-93 campaign, Burke was promoted to his current position on June 4, 1996. Before his promotion, Burke served as director of professional scouting from 1992-96 and evaluated talent throughout all North American professional leagues and assisted with amateur scouting.

From 1987-92, he spent five seasons in the New Jersey Devils organization, serving in several capacities, including as a Devils assistant coach, head coach for the American Hockey League's Utica Devils and as a pro scout. Burke was also an assistant coach at Princeton University from 1984-86.

A former defenseman, Burke was selected by the Montreal Canadiens in the seventh round (124th overall) of the 1975 NHL Entry Draft and by the Chicago Cougars in the second round (25th overall) of the 1974 World Hockey Association Entry Draft. He was a four-year letterman in both hockey and baseball at the University of New Hampshire, where he was named to the NCAA's All-America hockey team after his senior campaign.

He played seven years of professional hockey following his outstanding collegiate career, including three seasons (1977-80) with the Nova Scotia Voyageurs, the Canadiens AHL affiliate, and one season with Jokerit Helsinki in the Finnish Elite League.

JOHN FERGUSON

DIRECTOR OF PRO SCOUTING

Entering his third season as the Sharks director of pro scouting is National Hockey League front office veteran John Ferguson. He joined Executive Vice President and General Manager Doug Wilson's staff in September 2008.

Ferguson works closely with Wilson and Director of Scouting Tim Burke analyzing and evaluating professional hockey players at the NHL and American Hockey League levels.

Before joining the Sharks, Ferguson, 42, spent four-plus seasons as vice president and general manager of the Toronto Maple Leafs. During his tenure, the Maple Leafs set single-season franchise records for most points (103, 2003-04), wins (45-tied, 2003-04), home wins (26, 2005-06) and most road wins (23, 2003-04). He compiled an overall record of 145-110-10-30, including three, 40-plus win and 90-plus point seasons. His .559 winning percentage is the second-highest among all general managers in Maple Leafs history.

Ferguson also served on the management team of Team Canada, working alongside Steve Yzerman, for their undefeated, gold-medal winning campaign at the 2007 IIHF World Championships, the youngest-ever squad to win a World Championship.

Before working in Toronto, Ferguson spent seven seasons (1997-03) with the St. Louis Blues organization, including five as assistant general manager before being promoted to vice president and director of hockey operations in February 2001. There, he worked closely with Senior Vice President and General Manager Larry Pleau in managing all facets of the Blues hockey operations department, including analyzing and negotiating player contracts, evaluating professional and amateur players in North America and Europe and serving as president and general manager of the Worcester IceCats, the team's American Hockey League affiliate.

The team made the Stanley Cup Playoffs in each of his seven seasons with the hockey department, including a trip to the 2001 Western Conference Finals and a Presidents' Trophy in 2000.

Before working in St. Louis, Ferguson was an amateur and professional scout with the Ottawa Senators organization from 1993-96 and was as a player agent during the 1996-97 season.

A 12th round (247th overall) selection of the Montreal Canadiens in the 1985 NHL Entry Draft, Ferguson played four professional seasons with Sherbrooke, Fredericton and New Haven of the AHL. He was alternate captain of the 1992 Fredericton team that won the AHL regular season championship and was named the team's "unsung hero" in consecutive years (1991 and 1992).

Ferguson played collegiately at Providence where he served as an assistant captain, was an Academic All-American and graduated Magna Cum Laude with a degree in business administration in 1989. Following his professional hockey career, he enrolled at Suffolk University Law School, where he graduated Cum Laude. Ferguson was admitted to the Massachusetts State Bar in 1996.

The Montreal, Quebec native is the son of the late five-time Stanley Cup champion and former NHL general manager John Ferguson, who spent 11 seasons with the San Jose Sharks Hockey Department.



GILLES COTE

SCOUT

Returned to the Sharks scouting staff for the 2002-03 season and concentrates scouting efforts in junior leagues in Quebec...previously served as a scout for the Sharks from 1997-99...served as director of player personnel for Acadie-Bathurst (QMJHL) from 2001-02...was general manager and a member of the ownership group for Chicoutimi (QMJHL) from 1999-00...spent 1996-97 season as general manager for Drummondville (QMJHL)...scouted the Quebec area for the Washington Capitals for 11 seasons (1985-96)...vice president of the Quebec Ice Hockey Federation from 1982-85...served on coaching staff of Midget "AAA" champions of Montreal-Laval and the Laurentian regions...general manager of the Midget "AA" elite in the Laval region from 1982-84...a former president of the Laval Est Sports Association for 17 years...was a founding director of the Montreal Minor Hockey League...organized and coordinated the first World Championship for under 17-year olds...brought home the Bantam championship for the city of Montreal in 1967.

Responsible for scouting all of Western Canada, U.S. juniors, U.S. colleges and high schools...scouting experience with Sharks since inception in 1991-92...also scouted for the New York Rangers and Minnesota North Stars from 1982-91...served as a coach at the high school and college level in Minnesota for 21 years, where he also taught physical education and health in the St. Paul Public School system...received his bachelor's degree from University of St. Thomas, in addition to performing graduate work at University of St. Thomas and Minnesota State University-Mankato...resides in Minnesota with wife Candace...their two sons, Matt and John, and daughter, Liz, are all coaching at the high school level.



JACK GARDINER

SCOUT

Joined Sharks in 2004 and is entering his 31st year as a professional National Hockey League scout...focuses his efforts in the eastern U.S...worked as a scout for the St. Louis Blues from 2000-03...spent 19 years with the Toronto Maple Leafs...responsibilities included ranking and rating amateur prospects and covering all summer camps, high school and college tournaments...worked at the Central Scouting Bureau, where he ranked and rated all amateur players for draft and reported directly to NHL Senior Vice President of Hockey Operations Jim Gregory...was a professional football scout...received advanced graduate degree from Boston State College and a master of science degree from Boston's Suffolk University.



DIRK GRAHAM

SCOUT

ARTHUR TING, M.D.

TEAM PHYSICIAN

Heading up the Sharks medical staff for the 20th consecutive season is Arthur Ting, M.D., an experienced and established figure in Bay Area sports medicine. The San Francisco native directs a talented staff of medical specialists devoted to the treatment and prevention of the Sharks organization's sports-related injuries.

Ting is currently a practicing orthopedic surgeon at the Fremont Sports Therapy and Surgery Center, which is responsible for the medical treatment of many Bay Area professional sports organizations, including the Oakland Raiders.

In addition to his work with the Sharks, Ting has also served as the head physician for several major professional sports organizations at HP Pavilion at San Jose, including the National Lacrosse League's San Jose Stealth (2005-07) and the 2007 Arena Football League Champion San Jose SaberCats. Also the chief medical officer for the U.S. Moto GP and at Laguna Seca, Ting is chief medical physician for the East/West Shrine Game and serves as a consultant to Yamaha Motor Sports.

His extensive work with Bay Area amateur athletes includes being team physician for Menlo College, Cañada Community College and numerous high schools throughout the Bay Area.

Ting was the head physician for the U.S. Track & Field squad at the 1990 Goodwill Games in Seattle, the 1993 Pan Am Games and a 1994 dual meet against Great Britain. He was a member of the medical staff at the 1984 Summer Olympics in Los Angeles and at the U.S. Olympic Trials in 1988 and 1992.

Ting received his medical degree from St. Louis University, completing an orthopedic residency at the University of Southern California Medical Center in Los Angeles. He completed a fellowship in sports medicine at the Kerlan-Jobe Orthopedic Clinic in Inglewood, Calif.



RAY TUFTS, ATC

HEAD ATHLETIC TRAINER

In his 15th season with the San Jose Sharks as head athletic trainer is Ray Tufts, who provides Sharks players with both long-term medical care for serious injuries needing rehabilitation as well as maintaining the Sharks day-to-day medical needs both on the road and at home. In addition, he serves as the liaison between the hockey department and the organization's team of highly-respected medical specialists.

This past season, Tufts worked his 1,000th National Hockey League game on Nov. 4, 2009 in Columbus and served as head athletic trainer for the U.S. Olympic Team that won the silver medal at the 2010 Winter Games in Vancouver. He also headed the training staff for the 1997 National Hockey League Western Conference All-Star and the Heroes of Hockey teams during the 1997 NHL All-Star Weekend in San Jose.

Before joining the Sharks, Tufts, 45, was an athletic trainer for 10 years with the San Francisco 49ers. During his tenure with the 49ers, he was a part of three Super Bowl Championships in 1988, 1989 and 1994, serving as assistant trainer from 1991-96 and as a training staff assistant from 1987-90.

With San Francisco, Tufts was heavily involved with both the day-to-day preventive care for the team and post-injury rehabilitation. He was instrumental in the quick recoveries of several 49ers players from very severe injuries, including tight end and current Blue Line Associates committee member Brent Jones, offensive tackle Harris Barton and the extensive rehabilitation of Pro Football Hall of Fame quarterback Joe Montana between 1988-91.

A native of the San Jose area, Tufts graduated from Cal State-Sacramento in 1987 as a physical education major with an emphasis in athletic training. He received his National Athletic Trainers Association (NATA) certification in 1987 and is an active member of the NATA District VIII Association, California Athletic Trainers Association (CATA) and is currently the president of the Professional Hockey Athletic Trainers' Society (PHATS).

Tufts and his wife Michelle have a son, Henry, and reside in Los Gatos, Calif.





WES HOWARD, ATC

ASSISTANT ATHLETIC TRAINER

Wes Howard, a native of Fremont, Calif., enters his 13th season with the Sharks. Howard, 41, shares duties coordinating and implementing the training and rehabilitation protocols for injured athletes and conducting daily treatments with Head Athletic Trainer Ray Tufts. He's also responsible for ordering and maintaining all medical supply needs.

In addition to his work with the Sharks, Howard was the assistant athletic trainer/equipment manager for the Arena Football League's San Jose SaberCats from 1995-00 and served again as their assistant athletic trainer during the 2002 Arena Bowl Championship season. During the hockey work stoppage in 2004-05, he returned to the SaberCats as their assistant athletic trainer.

Previously, Howard was the assistant head athletic trainer at Menlo College from 1997-98 and head athletic trainer and equipment manager for the ECHL's Fresno Falcons from 1995-97.

Howard earned a bachelor's degree in kinesiology from San Jose State University and is certified by both the National Athletic Trainer's Association (NATA) and National Council of Strength and Fitness (NCSF). He resides in San Jose with his wife Diana and their three children: Rebecca, Aaron and Alyssa.



MIKE POTENZA

STRENGTH AND CONDITIONING COORDINATOR

Mike Potenza begins his fifth year as the Sharks strength and conditioning coordinator. He's responsible for the team's overall strength and conditioning programs -- including the creation of individualized postseason workout programs and assistance in the rehabilitation efforts for all injured players.

Before coming to San Jose, Potenza served as the strength and conditioning coach for the University of Wisconsin men's and women's hockey teams, both of which were 2006 NCAA National Champions. There, he worked with current Sharks center Joe Pavelski. Potenza also had responsibilities with the wrestling and softball programs at Wisconsin.

A 2000 Springfield College graduate, Potenza earned his bachelor of science degree in applied exercise science. From there, the Providence, R.I., native went to Boston University where he was a graduate assistant until 2002, earning his master's degree in human movement science.

Potenza completed an assortment of strength and conditioning coaching and internship experiences before his time at Wisconsin. At the University of Miami (Fla.), he served as a weight training, speed and post-workout coach for the perennial nationally-ranked Hurricanes football team. While earning his master's, Potenza instructed professional, amateur and collegiate athletes at Mike Boyle Strength and Conditioning, a private training facility specializing in various weight training, conditioning, agility, plyometric, stretching and rehabilitation programs.

Since graduating from Springfield, Potenza has held notable positions for Harvard and Colgate Universities. He assisted and supervised all phases of strength training programs for all intercollegiate programs at Harvard and Colgate and held primary coaching responsibilities with football, men's and women's hockey, men's and women's basketball, lacrosse and field hockey.

Potenza was part of the evaluation staff for the U.S. World Junior hockey team that competed at the 2008 World Junior Championships in the Czech Republic. His responsibilities included offering presentations on nutrition and recovery, administering physical testing and designing performance evaluations for each prospect.

Potenza, his wife Bonnie, their son Griffin and daughter Natalie, reside in San Jose.





ARNULFO AGUIRRE, CMT, ART

MASSAGE THERAPIST

Arnulfo Aguirre enters his fourth season as the Sharks full-time massage therapist. He had worked with Head Trainer Ray Tufts' staff on a part-time basis since the 2000-01 season.

In his role, Aguirre works with the team's players to facilitate and improve injuries, as well as increasing their range of motion.

Previously, Aguirre served as the sports massage therapist for the San Jose Earthquakes from 2000-02, including their 2001 Major League Soccer Championship season.

In addition, he served in a similar position with the University of California-Berkeley Men's Swim Team in 1999.

Aguirre received his certification from the National Holistic Institute in Emeryville, Calif., where he also assisted in managing the massage clinic.



MIKE ALDRICH

EQUIPMENT MANAGER

Mike Aldrich enters his 15th season as equipment manager for the San Jose Sharks. In his 18th season with the organization, Aldrich served in the same capacity for the International Hockey League's Kansas City Blades for the three seasons (1993-95) that Blades were the Sharks top development affiliate.

Aldrich served as equipment manager for the U.S. Olympic Team that won the silver medal at the 2010 Winter Games in Vancouver. He also worked for Team USA for the 2005 World Championships and the 2004 World Cup of Hockey. In the summer of 2003, he served as the head equipment manager for Team USA at the World Championships in Finland.

2008-09 SEASON REVIEW

SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

- San Jose wins first Presidents' Trophy. For the first time, the Sharks finish first in the Western Conference while winning its fourth overall and second straight Pacific Division Championship. San Jose accomplishes these feats while setting franchise records for wins (53), home wins (32) and points (117).
- Under rookie head coach **Todd McLellan**, San Jose gets off to the best start in National Hockey League history by recording 52 points (25-3-2) through the first 30 games. The Sharks set a franchise standard by going undefeated (20-0-2) in their first 22 home games while extending a streak from 2007-08 by not losing in regulation for 31 straight games (28-0-3).
- As a team, San Jose ranks among the NHL's top-five in road power play percentage (28.2 — No. 1 and club record), overall power play (24.2 — third), 83.3 penalty kill (fifth), 27.2 shots allowed (No. 1), 33.2 shots per game (third and club record) and 2.43 goals allowed per game (third).
- McLellan finished as a finalist for the Jack Adams Trophy (third in voting). C **Jeremy Roenick** ended his career and the season as the third-highest American-born goal scorer (513) in NHL history. RW **Claude Lemieux**, at the age of 43, returns to the NHL after a five-year absence to play in 18 games.

2007-08 SEASON REVIEW

SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

- San Jose set then-team records for most points (108) and points percentage (.659), road wins (27), most road points (58), fewest shots allowed (1,981), fewest power play goals allowed (44) and fewest regulation losses (23) in a single season.
- San Jose also set team standards for longest overall winning streak (11 games, Feb. 21, 2008 at Philadelphia through March 14, 2008 vs. St. Louis), longest road winning streak (10 games, Nov. 14, 2007 at Dallas through Dec. 31, 2007 at Minnesota), most consecutive overall games recording a point (20, Feb. 21, 2008 at Philadelphia through April 1, 2008 vs. Los Angeles) and most consecutive road games recording a point (14, Oct. 29, 2007 at Dallas through Jan. 13, 2008 at Anaheim).
- G **Evgeni Nabokov** finished second in the Vezina Trophy voting after achieving team regular season goaltending records in wins (50), appearances (77), minutes (4,561), most consecutive starts (50) and most consecutive wins (10). Nabokov also played in his second NHL All-Star Game and became the first goaltender since 2002 to stop all of the shots he faced (eight in the second).

2006-07 SEASON REVIEW

SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

- San Jose set a franchise record and led the League with 26 road wins. In addition, the Sharks set club marks for wins in a season (51) and points (107).
- Goalenders **Evgeni Nabokov** (seven) and **Vesa Toskala** (four) combined to tie a San Jose record with 11 shutouts.
- Defensesmen **Marc-Edouard Vlasic** and **Matt Carle** were named to the NHL All-Rookie Team. The duo became the second pair of defensive teammates in NHL history to be named to the team in the same year (1991-92 — Detroit's Nicklas Lidstrom and Vladimir Konstantinov).

2001-02 SEASON REVIEW

SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

2000-01 SEASON REVIEW

SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

- The Sharks advanced to the Stanley Cup Playoffs for a franchise-record fourth consecutive season and became just the fifth franchise in NHL history to improve its point total for the fifth consecutive season, setting franchise records for wins (40) and points (95).
- The Sharks finished with the sixth-best road record in the NHL (fourth-best in the Western Conference) and set a franchise record with a 10-game unbeaten streak on the road.
- G Evgeni Nabokov** received the Calder Memorial Trophy as the NHL's Rookie of the Year. "Nabokov" set new franchise records for wins (32), goals-against average (2.19) and shutouts (six) en route to being named the "Sharks Player of the Year" and the PlayStation "Sharks Rookie of the Year." He was named to the NHL's 2001 World All-Star Team, NHL Rookie of the Month for November and December and "Sharks Player of the Month" for October and December. 

HART MEMORIAL TROPHY — An annual award to “the player adjudged to be the most valuable to his team.” Winner selected in a poll by the Professional Hockey Writers’ Association in all NHL cities at the end of the regular season schedule. **2010 Winner: Henrik Sedin, Vancouver Canucks**

ART ROSS TROPHY — An annual award to “the player who leads the League in scoring points at the end of the regular season.” **2010 Winner: Henrik Sedin, Vancouver Canucks**

MAURICE “ROCKET” RICHARD TROPHY — The Maurice “Rocket” Richard Trophy, a gift to the National Hockey League from the Montreal Canadiens, is presented to the player finishing the regular season as the League’s goal-scoring leader. During his 18-year career with the Canadiens from 1942-43 through 1959-60, Richard was the first player in NHL history to score 50 goals in a season and 500 for his career. He was the League’s top goal-scorer five times, played on eight Stanley Cup Champions and was inducted into the Hockey Hall of Fame in 1961.

2010 Winners: Sidney Crosby, Pittsburgh Penguins and Steven Stamkos, Tampa Bay Lightning

CALDER MEMORIAL TROPHY — An annual award to “the player selected as the most proficient in his first year of competition in the National Hockey League.” Winner selected in a poll by the Professional Hockey Writers’ Association at the end of the regular season schedule. To be eligible for this award, a player cannot have competed in more than 25 games in any single preceding season nor in six or more games in each of any two preceding seasons in any major professional league. Beginning in 1990-91, to be eligible for this award, a player must not have attained his 26th birthday by September 15 of the season in which he is eligible. **2010 Winner: Tyler Myers, Buffalo Sabres**

JAMES NORRIS MEMORIAL TROPHY — An annual award to “the defense player who demonstrates throughout the season the greatest all-round ability in the position.” Winner selected by a poll of the Professional Hockey Writers’ Association at the end of the regular schedule.

2010 Winner: Duncan Keith, Chicago Blackhawks

VEZINA TROPHY — An annual award to “the goalkeeper adjudged to be the best at his position” as voted by the general managers of each NHL club. Until the 1981-82 season, the goalkeeper(s) of the team allowing the fewest number of goals during the regular season were awarded the Vezina Trophy.

AT SAN JOSE

NORTHERN CALIFORNIA'S TOP ENTERTAINMENT VENUE

HP Pavilion at San Jose has been recognized as the biggest success story in the revitalization of downtown San Jose. For more than a decade, the facility with its distinctive 10-story glass pyramid entry and unique stainless steel façade has been the place-to-be-and-be-seen in the Bay Area.

Located in the heart of Silicon Valley, HP Pavilion is an exemplification of the architectural excellence and technological innovation that defines the area.

That statement carries more weight today, especially after the completion of a \$16.5-million renovation in the summer of 2007. The costs were shared by the City of San Jose and HP Pavilion.

Guests entering HP Pavilion now enjoy the latest in audio and video technology to enhance their viewing experience. Most noticeable to the eyes is the high resolution LED center hung scoreboard — one of the largest in North America. The middle of the arena bowl features a full-color moving LED fascia display (also known as a ribbon board).

For the ears, there's a new state-of-the-art digital sound system and acoustical improvements. Finally, there were some minor changes to allow for interfacing with high definition telecasts originating from HP Pavilion and an increased rigging capacity for concerts and shows.





INSIDE THE IMPROVEMENTS



CENTER HUNG SCOREBOARD

- the new high resolution display is 18-by-24 feet and provides a 16x9 video image ratio used in High Definition television displays. The old analog video display was 9-by-12 feet
- HP Pavilion at San Jose is now one of 22 National Hockey League playing venues that have HD LED scoreboards

LED FASCIA DISPLAY

- this full-color, moving LED display (also known as a ribbon board) provides a very dramatic visual experience for guests
- the display allows HP Pavilion to provide flexible programming for events such as the NCAA Championships that require specific guidelines

SEATING AREA SOUND SYSTEM

- the new sound system uses state-of-the-art digital equipment and incorporates outward facing speaker clusters as opposed to distributed speaker placement
- guests will notice a clearer, more audible sound quality as sound will be generated from the center of HP Pavilion, as opposed to all around the building

RIGGING CAPACITY UPGRADE

- the capacity was increased from 75,000 pounds to 150-200,000 pounds
- concerts and in-arena events now utilize standard loads of 60-80,000 pounds and larger shows run 125-150,000 pounds. When HP Pavilion opened in 1993, a standard show load was 40,000 pounds and large shows had an average load of 60-80,000 pounds

HD VIDEO EQUIPMENT UPGRADE

- more sporting events are now being televised in HD, as opposed to Analog
- the upgrade insures reliability and interfacing with the new center hung scoreboard, LED systems, TV trucks and the new HP HD televisions within HP Pavilion.



TELEVISION BROADCASTS

In September 2009, Comcast SportsNet California, the home of "Authentic Bay Area Sports," and the San Jose Sharks announced a long-term agreement making Comcast SportsNet California, the team's exclusive regional cable television home. Comcast SportsNet California will present the most comprehensive Sharks television schedule in the team's history, including 76 exclusive games for the 2010-11 NHL season with the majority in High Definition.



Sharks fans also will enjoy extended coverage with "Sharks Pregame Live" and "Sharks Postgame Live" shows, giving fans player and coach reaction along with behind-the-scenes features. These shows will be anchored from Comcast SportsNet's Northern California headquarters boasting state-of-the-art studios, a 24-hour newsroom and HD production facilities. "Sharks Pregame Live" and "Sharks Postgame Live" will be anchored by CSN's talented pool of hosts.

Calling all the Sharks games on television will be the veteran announcing team of Randy Hahn and Drew Remenda. Brodie Brazil will again serve as CSN's ice-side reporter during home telecasts.

For approximately 24 hours following each game, Comcast SportsNet California's Sharks telecasts will be available on Comcast Digital Cable's ON DEMAND Channel 1 at no additional cost. Select Sharks HDTV games will also be available ON DEMAND Channel 1.

RADIO BROADCASTS

SHARKS RADIO NETWORK

For the 19th consecutive season, the Sharks are broadcasting their entire 82-game regular season schedule and all playoff contests on the multi-station Sharks Radio Network, which reaches much of Northern California and parts of Nevada. The Network's flagship station, 98.5 K-FOX (KUFX-FM), continues its multi-year deal with the Sharks to bring all regular season and playoff games in their entirety to avid listeners in the region.



Along with the regular season and playoff schedule, the San Jose-based radio station, also known as "98.5 K-FOX, the Classic Rock Experience," will air live coverage of two preseason games. Coverage begins with the popular 30-minute pregame show, "Sharks Warm-Up," which airs on 98.5 K-FOX in all regular season games except when a game originating outside the Pacific Time Zone occurs on a weekday. In these limited instances, the program will still be available on most Sharks Radio Network affiliates and on the Internet. During the playoffs, "Sharks Warm-Up" will air on 98.5 K-FOX in all instances.

Dan Rusanowsky returns for his 19th consecutive season of broadcasting Sharks games on the radio. Entering this season, Rusanowsky has witnessed and broadcast 1,335 regular season Sharks games and every playoff contest (125) in the team's history, including a consecutive game streak of 774 contests (725 regular season and 49 playoff games) that was snapped on Nov. 25, 2000 due to a serious automobile accident. Rusanowsky, who's one of the club's most recognizable figures both on-and-off the ice, called his 1,300th NHL regular season broadcast on Jan. 29, 2009 vs. Phoenix.

For the fifth consecutive season, former Sharks center Jamie Baker will provide color commentary alongside Rusanowsky. A 10-year NHL veteran, Baker spent four seasons with the Sharks. Joining the duo to provide additional analysis on select broadcasts is ex-Sharks forward Dave Maley, who won a Stanley Cup with Montreal in 1986.

FRANK ALBIN

DIRECTOR OF BROADCASTING

Frank Albin is entering his 14th season as Sharks director of broadcasting. Albin serves as telecast director for the Sharks 76-game television package on Comcast SportsNet California. Known around the National Hockey League for his hockey-first approach, his productions have been well received by the Bay Area, satellite viewers and the NHL.

Albin also serves as the broadcast liaison between the Sharks, Comcast SportsNet California, visiting broadcasters and the NHL.

A 20-plus year veteran of live sports broadcasting, Albin spent nine years at PASS Sports in Detroit, where he worked on a wide variety of sports programming. From 1988-94, he produced and directed Detroit Red Wings telecasts, as well as the syndicated "Central Collegiate Hockey Association (CCHA) Game of the Week."

From 1995 until joining the Sharks in 1997, Albin spent three seasons with Major League Baseball's Detroit Tigers, producing and directing broadcasts for their state-wide television network.

A graduate of Michigan State University and a native of Detroit, Albin has won multiple regional Emmy Awards for directing and feature producing, including one for Sharks coverage on Comcast SportsNet California in 2008.



RANDY HAHN

TELEVISION PLAY-BY-PLAY BROADCASTER

Experienced broadcaster Randy Hahn provides Bay Area hockey fans with all the play-by-play action for Sharks games on Comcast SportsNet California. Hahn, who enters his 18th full season with the club, served in the same capacity on selected telecasts during San Jose's first two seasons (1991-93).

In 2009-10, Hahn captured his fifth Northern California Emmy Award in the "On Camera Talent-Play by Play" category. He also earned the award in 1999, 2002, 2006 and 2008. On Dec. 5, 2009, Hahn called his 1,000th National Hockey League game when the Sharks faced the Calgary Flames.

Hahn and broadcast partner Drew Remenda are featured as the primary play-by-play and color voices on the recently released hockey video game, NHL 2K11.

Hahn has more than 30 years of sports broadcast experience, including a unique first assignment when he was just 16 years old – calling the "paw-by-paw" action of a dog sled race in the Yukon Territory in 1974. He continues to be a versatile broadcaster, having done play-by-play on television and radio, anchoring radio sports shows and serving as television studio host for various sports programs. Hahn became the interim co-host of San Francisco CBS-5's "Evening Magazine" in February 2005, working alongside popular Bay Area personality Malou Nubla.

A native of Edmonton, Alberta, Hahn's other hockey broadcast experience came as studio host of Los Angeles Kings games on the Prime Ticket cable network before joining the Sharks. Early in his career, he was on the radio broadcast team of both the Vancouver Canucks and Edmonton Oilers, in addition to performing various broadcast roles in those cities.





Hahn is also an experienced soccer announcer. He called matches on ABC and ESPN during the 1994 World Cup. From 1982-92, he was the play-by-play voice of the North American and Major Indoor Soccer League's San Diego Sockers. Hahn also announced the 1990 World Cup, the 1991 Women's World Cup and has called the action for USA National Team soccer games on SportsChannel and for Major League Soccer's Kansas City Wizards.

From 1991-94, Hahn was a studio anchor for SportsChannel Chicago's nightly highlight show and worked on broadcasts for collegiate basketball, baseball, volleyball and gymnastics. Hahn has been a play-by-play broadcaster for Arena Football League games on FSN.

In 1990, Hahn lived in San Jose and was instrumental in helping bring the NHL to this area, serving as vice president of Pro Hockey San Jose — a grassroots, non-profit corporation formed for the purpose of attracting an NHL franchise to the new multi-purpose venue being built in downtown San Jose.

Hahn is actively involved in charity work in the Bay Area, especially with The Role Model Program in San Jose, The San Francisco Bay Area Council Boy Scouts and the Providing Autism Research (PAR for Kids) Foundation.

Hahn's wife, Roberta Gonzales, CBS-5's evening news weathercaster, is an Emmy Award winner herself and has been awarded the Associated Press Television-Radio Award for "Best Weather Segment" nine times. She's a former weathercaster at KNTV in San Jose and was honored as 1990 Woman of the Year in the field of communications by the San Jose Mercury News for her contributions to the South Bay.



DREW REMENDA

TELEVISION COLOR ANALYST

Drew Remenda returns for his 10th season as the team's television color analyst, joining Television Play-by-Play Broadcaster and co-Emmy Award winner Randy Hahn for Sharks telecasts on Comcast SportsNet California. The duo recently won the 2009-10 Northern California Emmy Award in the "On Camera Talent-Play by Play" category.

Remenda also serves as the host of "SharkByte," Comcast SportsNet California's popular magazine-style show dedicated to Sharks hockey on-and-off the ice.

Remenda returned to the Sharks family in 2007 after spending the 2006-07 season as an analyst for the Canadian Broadcast Company's (CBC) celebrated "Hockey Night in Canada" program, which followed six seasons as the Sharks television color analyst, where he won three Bay Area Emmy Awards (1999, 2001 and 2006). Previously, Remenda spent three seasons working with Dan Rusanowsky as radio color commentator on 98.5 KFOX and the Sharks Radio Network.

Drawing upon his extensive network of hockey contacts and his background as an assistant coach, Remenda skillfully provides in-game analysis, insightful information and anecdotes.

The Saskatoon, Saskatchewan native also serves as the host of "The Drew Remenda Sports Show," a staple on 650 CKOM Radio in Saskatoon and on 980 CJME in Regina.

Remenda and Hahn are also featured as the primary play-by-play and color voices on the recently released hockey video game, NHL 2K11.

A Sharks assistant coach from 1991-95, Remenda also served as associate coach for the Kansas City Blades of the International Hockey League, then the Sharks top developmental affiliate, in 1995-96. Before joining the Sharks organization, he served as the video coordinator for Hockey Canada, where he provided support for Canada's National Team and the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association. Remenda's vast hockey background also includes a stint as assistant coach at the University of Calgary from 1988-90 and coaching at the amateur level since 1983.



DAN RUSANOWSKY

RADIO PLAY-BY-PLAY BROADCASTER

Veteran Radio Play-by-Play Announcer Dan Rusanowsky returns for his 20th consecutive season as the "Voice of the Sharks" on 98.5 KFOX (KUFM-FM) and the Sharks Radio Network.

A 31-year veteran of hockey broadcasting at all levels, Rusanowsky is one of the club's most recognizable figures, both on-and-off the ice. He's responsible for producing all radio broadcasts, directs and administers the multi-station Sharks Radio Network (which provides coverage of all games for hockey fans in Northern California and parts of Nevada and Oregon) and oversees the relationship with flagship station 98.5 KFOX. A versatile performer, he also contributes to *Sharks Magazine*, the team's official game program, and sjsharks.com with regularly featured columns and broadcast reports. He also appears on 98.5 KFOX on weekday game afternoons with "What's on Tap," previewing the upcoming action.

An active, year-round member of the Bay Area broadcasting community, Rusanowsky is one of a select few play-by-play announcers who have been tapped by NHL Radio to announce the "Game of the Week" on the Westwood One Radio Network. He was on the broadcast team for NHL Radio's production of the 1997 NHL All-Star Game in San Jose and has presented feature work on the League's network broadcasts.





Rusanowsky has provided the play-by-play call on several Major League Soccer radio broadcasts and A-League "digicasts." He has served as a guest host on KNBR 680 and 1050 AM, as well as the nationally syndicated "Sports Byline USA/Sports Overnight America" programs. He has brought his voice to radio and television commercials, Atari video games, feature films and corporate video programs over the years. He also hosted "Dan's Dugout" on Oakland Athletics radio broadcasts in 1993. He ventured back into the baseball world in the summer of 2005 with "Dan's Diamond Notes," a regular weekly segment which aired during Greg Kihn's top-rated morning program on 98.5 KFOX.

Born in Milford, Conn., Rusanowsky's resume also includes television play-by-play work. A motor racing enthusiast, he was a member of the San Jose Grand Prix's closed circuit track telecast team, covering Champ Car, Toyota Atlantic, Trans-Am, U.S. Touring Car, Historic Stock Car and Formula D action in front of more than 150,000 fans per year from 2005-07. Rusanowsky currently appears on Comcast SportsNet Bay Area's "Race Week" program. He has called the action on Comcast SportsNet Bay Area's coverage of Roller Hockey International telecasts, including the Oakland Skates and the 1995 Murphy Cup Champion San Jose Rhinos. He was also the TV voice of the now-defunct Continental Indoor Soccer League's San Jose Grizzlies and worked the "CISL Game of the Week" for Prime Network. He also makes regular appearances on Sharks television features.

Rusanowsky was injured in a serious automobile accident on Nov. 25, 2000, ending a continuous broadcast streak of Sharks regular season and playoff games at 774 (he has been behind the microphone for all 140 playoff games in Sharks history). Rusanowsky called his 1,000th Sharks regular season game on March 21, 2004 vs. Edmonton.

Along with his broadcasting duties, Rusanowsky makes numerous public speaking appearances in the community. He's the co-chair of the annual Ultimate Fantasy Hockey Playoffs Draft, benefiting the Foundation Fighting Blindness. This event has raised more than \$450,000 over its history in San Jose. He serves on the Executive Board of the Santa Clara County Council, Boy Scouts of America and serves on the Advisory Boards for the Boys and Girls Clubs of Silicon Valley and Services for Brain Injury. He also works with many other community organizations and is an active member of the NHL Broadcaster's Association.

Before arriving in the Bay Area, Rusanowsky provided the radio play-by-play call for the American Hockey League's New Haven Nighthawks (1986-91) and was the voice of St. Lawrence University's NCAA Division I hockey program from 1979-86. He received a bachelor's degree at St. Lawrence and subsequently earned his M.B.A. at Clarkson University.



JAMIE BAKER

RADIO COLOR ANALYST

Former Sharks forward Jamie Baker returns to the airwaves for his sixth season of providing color analysis. Baker accentuates Dan Rusanowsky's radio broadcasts in explaining the finer details of the game, drawing from his experience as an ex-National Hockey League player.

Baker's high-energy personality, enthusiasm and excellent knowledge of the NHL have greatly enhanced Sharks radio broadcasts and his dedication to grassroots marketing have helped expand the ever-growing youth hockey population in the Bay Area.

Known for his speed, grit and tenacity as a player, Baker was always at his best when the game was on the line.

Following an outstanding college career at St. Lawrence University, Baker went on to play in parts of 10 NHL seasons, including three with the Sharks (1993-96). In 404 games with Quebec, Ottawa, San Jose and Toronto, he tallied 150 points (71 goals, 79 assists). Baker also appeared in 25 Stanley Cup Playoff games with the Sharks, posting nine points (five goals, four assists) and 42 penalty minutes.

Baker is still recognized for scoring what has been called the biggest goal in Sharks franchise history. As a member of the 1993-94 Sharks, a team just one year removed from an NHL-record 71 losses, the team posted the largest turnaround in NHL history the following season. The team improved by 58 points and earned a berth in the Stanley Cup Playoffs. As the No. 8 seed, San Jose drew the Presidents' Trophy-winning Detroit Red Wings. Baker scored the game-winning, series-clinching goal in Game 7 against Chris Osgood, allowing the Sharks to become the first eighth-seeded NHL team to defeat a No. 1 seed. The victory is also viewed by many as the "flash point" for turning San Jose into a hockey-passionate city.

Baker also serves as a co-host of Comcast SportsNet California's "Pregame Live" and "Postgame Live" programs which air on most Sharks home game nights.





DAVE MALEY

RADIO REPORTER

Dave Maley begins his fifth season with the Sharks radio team. A veteran of nine National Hockey League seasons (including two with San Jose), Maley provides color analysis for selected home games and participates in the pregame "Sharks Warmup" and intermission programming.

Known during his career as a physical, hard-hitting forward, Maley was a winner at every level. As a freshman at the University of Wisconsin in 1983, he was an important component to the Badgers NCAA Division I Champion squad. Maley compiled 124 points (43 goals, 81 assists) and 1,043 penalty minutes and played in 466 games with Montreal, New Jersey, Edmonton, San Jose and the New York Islanders. In addition, he also appeared in 46 Stanley Cup Playoff games. During his second professional season in 1987, Maley won a Stanley Cup with the Canadiens.

In 1996, Maley founded Rollin' Ice at the Santa Clara County Fairgrounds, which became the Bay Area's premier inline hockey facility. Recently, Maley re-located the facility to south San Jose, where it has become the Silver Creek Sportsplex, a multi-faceted sports and fitness destination featuring 240,000 square feet of state-of-the-art facilities and professional expertise.

He has served as president of the San Jose Sharks Alumni since 2003, playing an integral part in raising funds for the Sharks Foundation.

Maley also serves on the board of the Police Activities League (PAL) and recently founded the Dream On Foundation, both of which give youth a chance to participate in sports that they could otherwise not afford.

Maley and his wife Karin live in Almaden Valley with their three children, Michaela, Ryan and Shae.

MEDIA INFORMATION

ACCESS: The San Jose Sharks organization and Media Relations Department strive to make its players, coaches, management and other personnel available in a timely and responsible fashion to all accredited members of the media.

CREDENTIALS: Press seating for Sharks home games at HP Pavilion at San Jose is available to accredited media in the press box located on the north side of the building's upper level. Credential requests should be made in writing to Director of Media Relations Scott Emmert via E-mail at "semmert@svse.net" or fax at 408-999-5822. Credentials are good for admittance to the press room (building's first level) and to both teams' postgame locker rooms. The elevator to the press room and press box is located on the north side of the building's concourse. **ALL MEDIA MUST NOW ENTER HP PAVILION FOR SHARKS GAMES VIA THE SECURITY ENTRANCE LOCATED AT THE REAR OF THE BUILDING, NEXT TO, BUT NOT IN, THE LOADING DOCK.**

All international credential requests must go through NHL Public Relations AT LEAST 24 hours prior to the requested game.

Due to limited press box seating, those requesting single-game credentials will be seated on a space-available basis, with preference given to the following: television stations with broadcast rights, radio stations with broadcast rights, beat writers and columnists, local daily newspapers and wire services, visiting media, national media, wire services and approved websites. Next preference goes to other Bay Area media including weekly newspapers, general topic magazines and television shows and any other media, which have a specific assignment to cover a Sharks game. Single-game credentials must be picked up at the Security Entrance. Possessing a full-season or single-game media credential DOES NOT provide parking privileges in HP Pavilion parking lots. If you do not hold a full season parking pass, you may request a single-game pass from Scott Emmert. Single-game spots are EXTREMELY limited and are distributed at the media relations director's discretion on a priority basis.

MEDIA MEMBERS HOLDING SEASON PASSES SHOULD NOTIFY THE MEDIA RELATIONS DEPARTMENT IF PLANNING TO COVER A GAME IN ORDER TO RESERVE SEATING. A MEDIA CREDENTIAL CANNOT BE USED TO SIT IN SPECTATOR SEATING AREAS.

DAY-OF-GAME INTERVIEWS: After the completion of the morning skate (which typically begins at 10:30 a.m. for a 7 or 7:30 p.m. start), is the best time to interview players and coaches on a game day. "Pre-tape" television or radio requests to interview a player upon his arrival to the building for the game must be made no later than the conclusion of the team's morning practice and cannot be guaranteed. If the team is not practicing, the request must be made to the Sharks, or visiting team public relations department, no later than 10 a.m. on the day of the game. The Sharks Media Relations Department cannot guarantee access to players or coaches if practice is not scheduled.

DAY-OF-GAME PRACTICES: On home game days when the Sharks choose to practice, they will typically take the ice at approximately 10:30 a.m. at HP Pavilion at San Jose. Media members should plan on arriving by 10:30 a.m. for game-day practices to ensure the availability of the requested players. The visiting team's practice usually follows the Sharks, beginning normally at 11:30 a.m. **TIMES AND LOCATIONS FOR BOTH THE HOME AND VISITING TEAMS ARE SUBJECT TO CHANGE.** Contact the Sharks Media Relations Department if there is a question regarding either team's practice schedule.

PREGAME MEDIA ACCESS: Sharks players and coaches may be made available to credentialed members of the media two-and-a-half hours before game time. For example, pregame media access for a 7:30 p.m. home game would likely be at 5 p.m.. Media members who wish to utilize this media access window MUST contact the Sharks Media Relations Department in advance with their interview requests.

LOCKER ROOMS: The home and visiting team locker rooms will re-open within five minutes after the game. The officials' locker room is off-limits to the media. Should a comment or interpretation from the game's referee or NHL supervisor be needed, contact a member of the Sharks Media Relations Department and a pool reporter may be assigned.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Only those photographers on assignment from a recognized, approved media outlet will be allowed access to designated photography locations at rink level and in overhead positions. Priority will be given to local dailies, wire service photographers and local TV crews (for non-televised games) and one ice-level photography position will be reserved for Sharks team photographers. Additional photography positions are determined on a priority basis as determined by the Sharks media relations director. In cases of increased photographer (i.e. playoffs) attendance, positions will be assigned by the Sharks Media Relations Department. In all cases, photographers should check in with a media relations representative in the press room before game time. Because of very limited photography locations and NHL Images regulations, it is not possible to accommodate free lance photographers.

PRESS ROOM: Media possessing full-season credentials or those granted single-game credentials are invited to have a meal, for a nominal fee, before each game in the press room, located on the lower level (building's north side). The room opens two-and-one-half (2:30) hours before game time. Dining room usage is limited to those presenting valid Sharks or NHL Team Management passes. It is impossible to accommodate family members, friends, guests or others. Any abuse of dining room privileges may cause forfeiture of a media pass. Limited refreshments are also available during intermissions as well as in the press box during games.

SERVICES: Game notes, lineups, press releases, complete statistics and other pertinent information will be furnished by the Sharks Media Relations Department. There are sufficient electrical outlets and telephones available in the press box and media work room (adjacent to the Press Room). Preference for phone use will be given to writers and broadcasters filing stories on deadline. The Sharks can also provide complimentary FAX services for working media, if necessary. The press room and press box are equipped with Wi-Fi wireless Internet service, as well as high-speed DSL headlines.

TELEVISION COVERAGE: All television stations are prohibited by the National Hockey League from shooting and distributing footage of any game that is being broadcast from HP Pavilion at San Jose by either the San Jose Sharks, the visiting team or network television, including a window 30 minutes before puck drop. Requests for special features and the like should be directed to the Sharks Media Relations Department.

MICHAEL A. MUDD

President



Michael A. Mudd serves as the president of the Worcester Sharks, working alongside San Jose Sharks Executive Vice President of Business Development Michael T. Lehr and Vice President and Assistant General Manager Wayne Thomas, while playing a vital role in all aspects of the Sharks operations.

Mudd oversees the overall business operations of the franchise while managing the corporate, ticket, marketing, community relations, public relations, merchandise and broadcasting departments.

A personable and highly respected team executive in the American Hockey League, Mudd serves as a Worcester Sharks alternate governor and a member of the AHL's Collective Bargaining Committee. Through his leadership and guidance, Mudd was instrumental in developing and producing the Worcester bid to the AHL Board of Governors to secure the 2009 AHL All-Star Classic for the city of Worcester and was project manager of the extremely successful event.

In addition to directing the day-to-day business side of the hockey club, he serves as the Sharks liaison with the AHL office for all hockey-related administrative issues — including regular season and playoff scheduling. He's also responsible for the development and the management of the hockey operations budget, team travel and the administration of training camp. In addition, Mudd has a hand in evaluating Sharks prospects in Worcester as well as prospects from other AHL teams. When the Sharks roster is depleted due to player injuries or player recalls to San Jose, he works alongside Thomas in researching or locating talent from other hockey leagues.

Mudd enters his 10th season with the Sharks organization having served in various capacities during his tenure within the organization while progressively moving up to his current position as president. Mudd was extremely involved in relocating the club to Worcester, restructuring the front office and developing new concepts such as the thriving High School Hockey Doubleheaders.

Before joining the Sharks, he was general manager of the International Hockey League's Cleveland Lumberjacks. During his two years in hockey operations with the 'Jacks, Mudd compiled an 83-62-19 record, helping lead the club to two straight Turner Cup Playoff berths.

From 1997-99, he served as general manager and director of hockey operations for the Chesapeake Ice Breakers of the East Coast Hockey League. Under his guidance and through difficult off-ice circumstances, the expansion team posted a combined record of 68-53-19 and qualified for the Kelly Cup Playoffs in each of its two seasons. Before going to the Ice Breakers, Mudd was the assistant general manager for the AHL's Baltimore Bandits, where he also was the team's goaltending coach and led the Bandits to Calder Cup playoff berths in both their years of existence.

Mudd is also an active participant with several local community organizations, including serving on the advisory board of the March of Dimes, Devereux Center and the Worcester Regional Research Bureau.

A native of Amherst, N.Y., Mudd is a 1990 graduate of St. Lawrence University where he earned a bachelor's degree in Economics. He was a four-year member of the school's hockey team which won ECAC Division I Championships in 1988 and 1989 and were also NCAA Division I Finalists in 1988. Mudd, a goaltender, had a standout senior season and was among the NCAA Division I statistical leaders in all categories, culminating in receiving the team's "Coaches" Award.

Mudd attended the 1990 St. Louis Blues training camp and played professional hockey for two seasons, splitting time between the ECHL and the IHL. An all-around athlete, he was also a four-year starter on the school's baseball team where he was named All-ICAC as a center fielder. Mudd earned his master's in Sports Management from Miami University (Ohio), where he was the assistant coach of the hockey team from 1992-94 under NCAA coaching legend George Gwozdecky.

Mudd and his wife, Holly, have two sons Tyler and Connor, and a daughter Ashley.





ROY SOMMER

Head Coach



Worcester Sharks Head Coach Roy Sommer, who plays a major role in developing players for the San Jose Sharks, is currently the longest-tenured coach in the American Hockey League.

The Oakland, Calif. native returns for his 13th season behind the bench of San Jose's top development affiliate and his 15th season overall with the Sharks organization. In his 12 seasons as head coach, Sommer has compiled a 442-402-57-59 record in the regular season and has made the postseason seven times, including reaching the Atlantic Division Finals the last two seasons.

Last season, Sommer led Worcester to a franchise-record 49 wins and captured the regular season Atlantic Division title. He won his 400th game as an AHL head coach after a 4-1 victory over Springfield at the DCU Center on Nov. 1, 2009. Entering 2010-11, Sommer's 442 wins ranks fourth all-time among AHL head coaches. Sommer is scheduled to coach his 1,000th AHL game in game no. 40 of the 2010-11 season.

As head coach for San Jose's top development team, Sommer has coached more than 80 players who've spent time in the National Hockey League, including defenseman Jason Demers, who was named 2009-10 PlayStation "Sharks Rookie of the Year."

In 2009-10, San Jose used 20 players who developed under Sommer's tutelage. In fact, 16 players have made their NHL debuts with the Sharks over the last three seasons — including Demers, Frazer McLaren, Steven Zalewski, Logan Couture and John McCarthy last year.

Sommer, 52, began coaching San Jose's top development affiliates in 1998-99 with the AHL's Kentucky Thoroughblades. He coached the T-Blades for three seasons before San Jose relocated their AHL team to Cleveland. In his first season with Kentucky, the Thoroughblades registered franchise records for most regular season wins (44), most road wins (21) and total points (98) in a season while posting the AHL's fifth-best record. This success came despite having 17 players promoted to the NHL during the season.

From 1999-01, Sommer's club went 84-50-21-5 to capture two consecutive Mid-Atlantic Division titles and went to the Calder Cup Playoffs each season. Sommer's success was recognized during the 1999-00 season with his selection as the head coach for the Canadian All-Star Team, where his squad topped PlanetUSA, 8-3.

Before being named head coach of the Thoroughblades in 1998, Sommer spent two seasons (1996-98) as an assistant coach with the San Jose Sharks.

With San Jose, Sommer was responsible for pre-scouting upcoming opponents for their offensive and defensive tendencies, line combinations and special teams tactics. In addition, he assisted in running practices and provided special on-ice extended workouts with scratched players and those rehabilitating injuries.

Before Sommer joined San Jose, he was head coach of the ECHL's Richmond Renegades from 1991-96 and was named 1995-96 Coach of the Year after leading his team to a league-best 46-11-13 mark and a league record 105 points in capturing the Brabham Cup (best regular season record). Sommer led the Renegades to the Riley Cup (league championship) in 1994-95 after posting a 41-20-7 regular season record. In addition, he served as head coach of the ECHL's East All-Star Team in 1994-95 and the North All-Star Team in 1995-96.

Sommer's additional ice hockey coaching experience includes assistant coaching stints with the Albany Choppers and Muskegon Lumberjacks of the International Hockey League and working with USA Hockey as an assistant coach at several evaluation camps for 16- and 17-year-old players.

In 1998, he served as head coach and general manager for the silver-medal winning Team USA (4-1-0 record) at the International Ice Hockey Federation In-Line Hockey World Championships in Anaheim. Sommer's squads won gold medals in each of the first two tournaments (1996 in St. Paul, Minn. and 1997 in Anaheim) and posted undefeated records each year. His three-year coaching mark at this prestigious tournament stands at 17-1-0.

The former Bay Area youth hockey player coached Roller Hockey International's San Jose Rhinos for three seasons (1994-96), including capturing the Murphy Cup (league championship) in 1995. In addition, Sommer served as head coach for RHI's 1996 Western Conference All-Star Team.

Before stepping behind the bench, Sommer played nine seasons of professional ice hockey. A sixth round selection by the Toronto Maple Leafs in 1977, Sommer played in the Leafs system as well as those of the St. Louis Blues, Edmonton Oilers, New Jersey Devils and Pittsburgh Penguins. The highlight of Sommer's NHL career came during the 1980-81 season when, as a teammate of Wayne Gretzky, Sommer scored a goal in his NHL debut with the Oilers.

Sommer was captain of the Wichita Wind from 1980-83 and again with Muskegon in 1986-87. Sommer, who played left wing and center, was a member of the AHL Calder Cup Champion Maine Mariners in 1983-84 and helped lead Muskegon to the 1985-86 IHL title (Turner Cup). He played his junior hockey for the Spruce Grove Mets, which won the 1975 Centennial Cup, and for the Calgary Centennials. Sommer was a member of the United States National Team at the World Junior Championships in 1976-77.

Sommer resides in Shrewsbury, Mass. with his wife Melissa and their three children: Marley, Caston and Kyra.

IT'S A SMALL WORLD

Worcester Sharks Assistant Coach Dave Cunniff was a participant in Worcester Head Coach Roy Sommer's first American Hockey League coaching win. On Oct. 17, 1998, Kentucky defeated Albany, 6-4, at Rupp Arena in Lexington, Ky. One of the Albany players who recorded an assist on one of their four goals was Cunniff.

Since 2001-02 with the Cleveland Barons, Cunniff has been Sommer's assistant coach. In fact, Cunniff has been on the bench for 65 percent (288) of Sommer's 442 wins.

Assistant Coach

David Cuniff returns for his ninth season as assistant coach for San Jose's top affiliate, the Worcester Sharks. Cuniff has played an integral role in assisting Head Coach Roy Sommer in all coaching duties including video breakdown, player assessment and scouting.

Cuniff's coaching efforts are primarily focused on the defensive end. His presence was pivotal in the rapid development of several defensemen including Douglas Murray, Derek Joslin and Jason Demers. With a focus on player development, Cuniff assists in the annual Sharks Summer Development Camp and the Sharks Rookie Tournament.

For the past eight seasons, Cuniff has been an instructor at the San Jose Sharks Summer Hockey School. By doing so, he shared his expertise with more than 1,000 campers ranging from age six to adult.

The son of the late NHL veteran and U.S. Olympic Team Coach John Cuniff, David played eight seasons of professional hockey in the American and East Coast Hockey Leagues. That stint included playing two seasons under his father with the AHL's Albany River Rats (1998-00). After a one-year hiatus, Cuniff concluded his playing career in 2001-02 with Louisiana and Richmond in the ECHL. In 268 AHL and ECHL games, Cuniff scored 82 points (38 goals and 44 assists) and posted 555 penalty minutes.

The South Boston native played his college hockey at Salem State College and currently resides in Milton, Mass. with his wife Mary-Ann and their two sons, Patrick and David.

Strength and Conditioning Assistant





DCU CENTER

For 28 years, the DCU Center in Worcester, Mass. has been recognized as the gathering place for people to experience the finest in entertainment, sporting events and public functions. Hailed as one of the most successful entertainment and convention facilities in the nation, the DCU Center opened its doors in September 1982 with the legendary Frank Sinatra Inaugural Concert. Since that time, acts of all musical genres have found their way to the arena stage. From rock to rap, country to contemporary, millions of fans from all over the world have come to the DCU Center to see their favorite performers.



The arena features annual appearances of the top family shows including Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey Circus, Sesame Street Live, Disney On Ice, Harlem Globetrotters and The Wiggles among others. The DCU Center also plays host to a variety of sporting and entertainment events including NCAA basketball and hockey, Holy Cross basketball, professional bull riding, the MIAA High School Basketball Championships, Monster Trucks and more. In addition, the facility is proud home to the American Hockey League's Worcester Sharks. The Worcester Sharks are owned, operated and affiliated with the San Jose Sharks and host 40 regular season home games.

The facility expanded in 1997 with the opening of an attached state-of-the-art convention center that features panoramic views of downtown Worcester. The complex, described as an architectural gem, added 50,000 square feet of exhibit space, 11 meeting rooms, a 12,144 square foot ballroom (the largest in Central Massachusetts) and a state-of-the-art kitchen. The facility's 100,000-plus square feet of exhibit space is filled by consumer shows, trade shows, conventions, conferences and other public and private functions year-round.

In October 2004, DCU (Digital Federal Credit Union) and the City of Worcester entered into a naming rights partnership to rename the arena and convention center to the DCU Center. DCU is a full-service, not-for-profit financial institution cooperatively owned by and operated for its members. DCU was chartered in October of 1979. More than 300,000 DCU members have made them one of the fastest growing credit unions in America.

During the summer of 2009, the DCU Center underwent the first phase of a multi-year capital improvement project, which included an electrical service upgrade and the complete replacement of the ice surface. A new ice plant and chillers were replaced and new dasher boards and state-of-the-art seamless glass were installed for the start of the Worcester Sharks fourth season. Future phases of renovations are expected to incorporate amenities that are standard to new arenas including suites and club seats, as well as improved restrooms, concession areas and facility accessibility.

Continuing to provide the best possible experience for the promoter, performer and patron, the DCU Center is owned by the City of Worcester and managed by SMG, the world's leading private management and developing firm for public assembly facilities. Headquartered in Philadelphia, SMG provides management services to more than 200 venues. SMG also offers food and beverage operations through their in-house catering company, SAVOR...Catering by SMG.

2009-10 IN REVIEW



The 2009-10 Worcester Sharks won their first Atlantic Division title by winning a club-record 49 games.

ACES IN THE ATLANTIC

In 2009-10, the Worcester Sharks won their first Atlantic Division title. To accomplish this feat, Worcester set club records in wins (49, was 42 set in 2008-09), home victories (26, 24 in 2006-07), road wins (23, 19 in 2008-09), points (104, 93 in 2006-07) and goals scored (275, 247 in 2006-07). Out of Worcester's 49 wins, 35 came within the Atlantic Division. In fact, Worcester's .650 win percentage was fourth-best in the American Hockey League behind Calder Cup Champion Hershey (.769), Hamilton (.719) and Chicago (.656).

STRONG FINISH

Worcester was 21-5-2-1 in their last 29 home games. The Sharks went 11-4-0-0 in March (including 5-0-0-0 at the DCU Center). On top of that, Worcester was 41-15-3-2 in their final 61 games (compared to 8-10-0-1 in the first 19).

A TEAM GAME

Worcester had the AHL's No. 3 power play on the road (20 percent) and was 11th overall (18.6). The Sharks were second in average goals per game (3.44) and had five 20-goal scorers. Worcester also went 42-5-1-0 when allowing three goals or less.

TWO IN A ROW

The Worcester Sharks advanced to the Atlantic Division Finals for the second straight year. The Sharks lost the first game of their quarterfinal series against Lowell before taking the next four. The division finals series vs. Manchester featured five one-goal games and two overtime contests, but the Monarchs won in six games.

THE 400 CLUB

Head Coach Roy Sommer became the fourth man in AHL history to win at least 400 games. Sommer joined the elite club on Nov. 1, 2009 when Worcester defeated Springfield, 4-1. Entering 2010-11, Sommer has 442 wins in 960 games.





2009-10 IN REVIEW

INDIVIDUAL PLAYER HIGHLIGHTS

LOGAN COUTURE

The center ended the 2009-10 season on San Jose's roster, but he made a major impact in Worcester. Couture was one of two (Stalock) Sharks named to the AHL All-Rookie Team. He was one of three who represented the Sharks at the Time Warner AHL All-Star Classic. Couture played in only 42 games with Worcester, but finished third in AHL rookie scoring (53 points) and seventh in assists (33).

BENN FERRIERO

This rookie center started 2009-10 with San Jose but played in 58 games for Worcester and scored 19 goals (one of 12 Sharks to score 10-plus goals). Ferriero was sixth amongst AHL rookies with 50 points. His brother (Cody) was drafted by San Jose in the fifth round of the 2010 National Hockey League Entry Draft.

DEREK JOSLIN

The fourth-year Worcester defenseman was second amongst Sharks defensemen in assists (27) and points (32). He's the only player to have played in each of Worcester's four seasons.

BRANDON MASHINTER

The freshman center made an immediate impact with Worcester. Mashinter was one of five Sharks to score 20 goals (22) and led the team with 13 fighting majors.

JOHN MCCARTHY

He was one of 15 first-year professionals on Worcester's roster. The left wing led the Sharks with a plus-36, while scoring 15 goals and 42 points.

ALEX STALOCK

He led the AHL in wins (39) and was second in minutes played (1,522). Those 39 wins were the most by an AHL rookie goaltender, the 12th most in AHL history and a Worcester Sharks franchise record. Stalock was one of two Sharks (Couture) named to the AHL All-Rookie Team.

The Sharks have been associated with the Thunder since January 2010 when the clubs agreed to a working partnership.

Stockton is a two-time recipient of the ECHL's Award of Excellence, given to teams who excel in all categories of sales and marketing and who distinguish themselves in their community. The Thunder has also led the ECHL in attendance for four straight seasons.

On the ice, the Thunder has been in the Kelly Cup Playoffs for four consecutive years. In fact, Stockton advanced to the National Conference Finals for the first time in 2010.
