


## LETTER TO THE MEDIA

**O**n behalf of the San Diego Gulls, welcome to the 2018-19 American Hockey League (AHL) season. We hope to make your job covering the San Diego Gulls as easy and pleasant as possible. In order to help you achieve your goals in the most efficient manner, we have a few procedural guidelines of which you should be aware.

Media credentials are issued to working media only. All season and individual game credential holders should enter through the press entrance at the East Entrance of the San Diego Sports Arena. The press entrance and press will-call opens two-and-a-half hours prior to all games. Credentials are non-transferable, and unauthorized use will subject bearer to ejection from the arena and result in a loss of credential privileges.

Season media passes will be issued to major publications, television and established radio stations, as well as websites affiliated with major broadcast outlets. Requests for credentials must be made on a company letterhead. Credentials will be distributed on an individual basis. Season pass holders must notify the communications office of their intentions to cover a game in order to reserve press seating. Please note, press seating is limited and will be granted on a first-come, first-served basis.

Individual game credentials should be requested through the club's website by visiting

[www.sandiegogulls.com/credentials](http://www.sandiegogulls.com/credentials) a minimum of 24 hours prior to game time or by 2:00 p.m. Friday for all Saturday or Sunday contests. Pre-arranged passes must be picked up at the press entrance located at the East Entrance of the arena a minimum of 20 minutes before game time (6:45 p.m. for a 7:05 p.m. game). Credentials will be issued on an availability-only basis. No admittance to the arena will be provided anywhere other than the East Entrance.

Credentials are good for admittance to the arena, press box, dining room and both locker rooms once they have been opened to media. We suggest attending the morning skate if you need an interview before the game, typically held by the Gulls at 10 a.m. and visiting team at 11:15 a.m. Both teams' locker rooms will open 10 minutes after the last player has left the ice, following the game's conclusion. Your cooperation is asked in maintaining a working atmosphere. **ABSOLUTELY NO AUTOGRAPHS ALLOWED DURING MEDIA ACCESS PERIODS.**

Interviews that need advanced preparation or special accommodation can be arranged by contacting the Gulls communications department. You can email requests to [sbrown@sandiegogulls.com](mailto:sbrown@sandiegogulls.com), or call (619) 359-4704. This includes all live television interviews for pre- and post-game.

Facsimile and photocopy services are available by contacting the Gulls communications department prior to the game.

Please contact the Gulls communications department if there is a question regarding either team's game-day practice schedule. ALL requests for in-between period interviews must be made by the time of the Gulls' skate that morning.

We hope this outline of procedures and guidelines will assist you in your coverage of the Gulls and the American Hockey League at San Diego Sports Arena for the 2018-19 season. Please don't hesitate to contact us if you need additional assistance. We look forward to working with you this season.

### SUSAN SAMUELI

Susan Samueli was born and raised in Los Angeles, CA. She earned a B.S. in Mathematics from UC Berkeley in 1972. From 1972 to 1985 she was with IBM Corporation, where she worked initially as a software programmer in the Federal Systems Division, Westlake Village, CA, and then as a Systems Engineer in the National Marketing Division, Los Angeles, CA, providing technical marketing and sales support for IBM's mid-range computer systems. In 1985, she left IBM and focused her energy on raising her children, at which time she developed a keen interest in alternative health care. She developed an active consulting practice in the areas of nutrition, homeopathy and Chinese herbs, and subsequently received a Ph.D. degree in nutrition from the American Holistic College of Nutrition in 1993 and a diploma in Homeopathy from the British Institute of Homeopathy in 1994.

### HENRY SAMUELI

Henry Samueli was born in Buffalo, NY and grew up in Los Angeles, CA. He earned a B.S., M.S. and Ph.D. in

Electrical Engineering from UCLA in 1975, 1976 and 1980, respectively. From 1980-1985, he worked in the defense industry and held various engineering and management positions in the Electronics and Technology Division of TRW Inc. in Redondo Beach, CA. Since 1985 Dr. Samueli has been a professor in the Electrical Engineering Department at UCLA, and since 2003 he has also served as a Distinguished Adjunct Professor in the Electrical Engineering and Computer Science Department at UC Irvine. In 1991 he co-founded Broadcom Corporation, a global leader in providing semiconductor solutions for wired and wireless communications and took a leave of absence from UCLA in 1995 to be at Broadcom full-time. In 2016 Broadcom Corporation was acquired by Avago Technologies Limited and renamed Broadcom Limited. Dr. Samueli continues to serve as Chief Technical Officer of Broadcom Limited. He was elected a Fellow of the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE) in 2000, a member of the National Academy of Engineering in 2003, and a Fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences in 2004.

In December 2003 Susan and Henry purchased the management contract for the Honda Center sports and entertainment venue, creating Anaheim Arena Management, LLC, to oversee all operations of the arena, and in June 2005 they purchased the Anaheim Ducks National Hockey League club, Honda Center's largest tenant. In 2007 the Anaheim Ducks became the first California team ever to win the Stanley Cup championship. Henry serves on the Executive Committee of the NHL Board of Governors.

The success of Broadcom Corporation has also provided Susan and Henry the opportunity to support many worthwhile nonprofit organizations. After Broadcom's initial public offering in 1998 they created the Samueli Foundation, and to date have gifted over \$300 million primarily in the areas of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) Education, Integrative Health, Youth Services and Jewish Culture. In 2003 and 2004, Susan and Henry were listed among BusinessWeek's 50 Most Generous Philanthropists in the nation. In 2012, they joined the Giving Pledge, initiated by Warren Buffett and Bill and Melinda Gates, whose members pledge the majority of their wealth to philanthropy.

Since relocating to Orange County, CA in 1995, Susan and Henry have become very active in the community. Susan is on the Board of the Orangewood Children's Foundation and is a member of the Board of Trustees of the Samueli Academy, a public Charter High School in Santa Ana for community, underserved and foster teens. She serves on the Board of the Susan Samueli Center for Integrative Medicine at UC Irvine's College of Medicine, which she and Henry established in 2001. In 2000, Susan was honored with the UC Irvine Medal. In 2002, she received the Ellen Cooperman Angel Award from the John Wayne Cancer Institute. In 2005, she received the General William Lyon Crystal Vision Philanthropy Award from the Orangewood Children's Foundation, and in 2012 she was awarded an Honorary Doctorate in Humanities from the Southern California University of Health Sciences.

Henry serves on the Dean's Advisory Board of both the Henry Samueli School of Engineering and Applied Science at UCLA and the Henry Samueli School of Engineering at UC Irvine. In 2000 he was awarded the University of California Presidential Medal, the UC Irvine Medal, the UCLA School of Engineering and Applied Science Alumnus of the Year, and the IEEE Circuits and Systems Society Industrial Pioneer Award. In 2005 he was awarded an Honorary Doctor of Science degree from the Technion-Israel Institute of Technology and the Edward A. Dickson Alumnus of the Year from UCLA. In 2006 he received the IEEE Communications Society Distinguished Industry Leaders Award. In 2010 he received the UCLA Medal. In 2011, he received the Global Semiconductor Alliance Dr. Morris Chang Exemplary Leadership Award, and in 2012, he was awarded the Marconi Society Prize and Fellowship.

## MICHAEL SCHULMAN

**Chairman of the Board, Anaheim Arena Management, LLC**  
**Chief Executive Officer, Anaheim Ducks Hockey Club, LLC**  
**Chief Executive Officer, San Diego Gulls Hockey Club, LLC**  
**Managing Director, H&S Ventures, LLC**

Michael Schulman serves as Chairman of the Board of Anaheim Arena Management (AAM), Chief Executive Officer of Anaheim Ducks Hockey Club (ADHC), Chairman of the Board of the Anaheim Ducks Foundation and serves on the board of NHL Enterprises. He is also an Alternate Governor for the NHL Board of Governors.

Schulman is Chief Executive Officer of the San Diego Gulls Hockey Club (SDG) and the Alternate Governor for the AHL Board of Governors. In addition, he is Managing Director of H&S Ventures, the entity that manages the Samueli Family Office. Schulman reports directly to owners Dr. Henry Samueli and Susan Samueli, and is responsible for managing and long-term planning of their profit and nonprofit entities.

Schulman was the lead negotiator on behalf of the Samueli family in the acquisition of the Honda Center management agreement from the bankruptcy court and the City of Anaheim. He acts as liaison between the Samueli family and AAM management and supervises all financial, legal and charitable decisions of the arena. He also acts as liaison with the other partners of AAM and the City of Anaheim. In addition, Schulman oversees all long-term capital projects, including the 57 Freeway Marquee, two 360° LED rings, revamping of the video room, new scoreboard and sound system, and remodeling of the company offices and locker rooms.

Schulman also represented the Samueli family in purchase negotiations with Disney for the Anaheim Ducks, and in qualifying the Samueli family for the purchase of the team with the NHL.

Schulman was also involved with the family in changing the team name and logo, and forming the Anaheim Ducks Foundation. Schulman led the negotiation with the American Hockey League (AHL) in forming the new AHL Pacific Division along with four other NHL teams. He was the lead negotiator in purchasing the Norfolk AHL team and moving the team to San Diego. He also formed the San Diego Gulls Foundation.

He is responsible for developing additional ice and inline rinks in the Orange County area and was instrumental in the purchase of several ice and inline rinks, including Irvine, Corona and Huntington Beach inline rinks, and Westminster, Yorba Linda and Lakewood ice rinks. Schulman is the Chairman of THE RINKS Program and oversees its development, including the advancement of the Anaheim Ducks High School Hockey League, California State Championship and the Learn to Play Hockey Program. Schulman spent over 10 years working with the City of Irvine in developing the Irvine Ice & Sports Complex and forming the Irvine Ice Foundation, which will be responsible for the building of the complex.

Schulman's role at H&S Ventures is multi-faceted. He is the Managing Director of the family office, which oversees all of the family's profit and nonprofit operations. H&S Ventures serves as the manager of AAM, ADHC, SDG as well as a number of other business entities in which the Samuelis are involved. Schulman was a founding member, and is a past board member, of the Santa Clara Institute of Sports Law and Ethics and the USC Sports Business Institute (SBI) Advisory Council.

Schulman serves on the boards of AAM, ADHC, Anaheim Sports Holdings, Anaheim Ducks Foundation, HS Hockey Development, San Diego Gulls Hockey Club and ECH 2101. He is also a current member of the board of the Telluride Ski and Golf Company.

Schulman also serves on many nonprofit boards. He has been a member of the University of California, Irvine Foundation Board since 1991. He was one of the founding members and past chair of the UCI Planned Giving Leadership Council. Schulman serves on the boards of the Samueli Foundation, Samueli Institute, the Orange County Jewish Campus, Anaheim Ducks Foundation and San Diego Gulls Foundation.

After earning his Bachelor of Arts in Economics from University of California, Berkeley, Schulman went on to the University of Santa Clara Law School. In addition, Schulman studied economics for one year at the University of Leeds in England.

Following law school, he was hired as a full-time law professor at the University of Southern California, after which he was a practicing attorney for a number of years and a partner with the law firm of McDermott, Will & Emery.

A native of California, Michael and his wife, Sherry, reside in Laguna Beach and have four children: Annie, Danielle, Bryant and Natasha.

### BOB MURRAY

#### **Executive Vice President and General Manager Anaheim Ducks Hockey Club, LLC**

Bob Murray enters his 43rd consecutive year in the National Hockey League, his 10th as Executive Vice President and General Manager of the Anaheim Ducks. He won the NHL General Manager of the Year award in 2013-14 and has been a finalist for the honor in three of the last five seasons. He also served as an Assistant General Manager for Team Canada during the 2016 World Cup of Hockey. Murray played in 1,008 NHL games and has been a General Manager for an additional 875 games (188 with Chicago, 687 with Anaheim).

Under Murray's guidance, the Ducks have claimed five of the previous six Pacific Division titles, including four consecutive years with 100+ standings points. The 2016-17 Ducks were the seventh different team in NHL history to win five consecutive division titles and the only team to win the Pacific Division five consecutive years since its creation in 1993-94. Anaheim defeated Calgary and Edmonton in the first two rounds of the Stanley Cup Playoffs before falling to Nashville in the Conference Final. It was Anaheim's fourth trip to the Conference Final since Murray joined the team in 2006 (only Chicago, 5, and Pittsburgh, 4, have made as many appearances).

The 2015-16 club went 46-25-11 for 103 points, fourth in the Western Conference. In 2014-15, Anaheim finished with the best record in the Western Conference (51-24-7, 109 points), becoming the first team since 2011-12 (Vancouver) to post consecutive 50+ win seasons. Anaheim defeated Winnipeg and Calgary in the first two rounds of the postseason before falling in the Conference Final to Chicago (seven games). The 2013-14 team finished with a record of 54-20-8, the best mark in franchise history. Anaheim posted the top record in the Western Conference for the first time in club history that season, setting season records for standings points (116), wins (54) and win/points percentage (.707), while also leading the league in goals (263). The 2012-13 club finished the regular season with the third-best record in the NHL (30-12-6, second in the West).

Murray was named to his current position on Nov. 12, 2008 after spending the previous three-plus seasons as the club's Senior Vice President of Hockey Operations. In that role, much of Murray's work behind the scenes led directly to many successful trades and other player transactions by Anaheim. During that three-year period, the Ducks won a Stanley Cup (2007), a Pacific Division title (2007), and qualified for the playoffs each season. Murray was the General Manager of the Portland Pirates (Anaheim's AHL affiliate) from 2005-06 through 2007-08. The Pirates went to the Conference Finals twice (2006 & 2008), appearing in six playoff rounds. Between 2005 and 2008 (three seasons), Anaheim and Portland combined to win 10 and appear in 14 playoff rounds, both the most of any organization in hockey.

Prior to joining the Ducks in July 2005, Murray worked as a Professional Scout with the Vancouver Canucks from 1999-05. Murray's scouting expertise helped to build teams that recorded 100+ point seasons two years in a row (2002-03 and 2003-04) and advanced to the Stanley Cup Playoffs four seasons in a row (2001-04). Before his stint in Vancouver, he served as a Scouting Consultant for Anaheim during the 1998-99 season.

Murray was a member of the Chicago Blackhawks organization for 25 years, serving as General Manager from 1997-99. He was named the sixth General Manager in team history on July 3, 1997. He was promoted to the post after serving as Assistant General Manager under Bob Pulford for two seasons. Before joining upper-management, Murray was named the Director of Player Personnel in 1991 and was largely responsible for the club's NHL Entry Draft selections over eight seasons.

Drafted by the Blackhawks in 1974, Murray spent his entire 1,008-game, 15-year career in a Chicago uniform. He became just the fourth player in Blackhawks history to reach the 1,000-game plateau in 1989-90. In addition, he became the first defenseman in club history to appear in 100 postseason contests, reaching the mark during the 1990 Stanley Cup Playoffs. In all, Murray scored 132-382=514 points and currently ranks second in all-time points among Blackhawks defensemen (15th overall in club history). He was named to both the 1981 and 1983 NHL All-Star Games. Murray retired at the conclusion of the 1989-90 season. Known for his work ethic, intelligence and determination as a player, Murray remained with the organization as a Professional Scout following his retirement in 1990.

Bob and his wife, Betsy, have four children: Kevin, Amanda, Andrew and Katie; and four grandchildren: Mikayla, Aisley, Lily and Kaden.

## MATT SAVANT

### **President of Business Operations San Diego Gulls Hockey Club, LLC**

Matt Savant is in his third season as President of Business Operations of the San Diego Gulls, the primary development affiliate of the National Hockey League's (NHL) Anaheim Ducks.

Savant is the primary liaison between the San Diego Gulls Hockey Club and the Anaheim Ducks, oversees all business operations in San Diego, including sales, marketing, communications, community relations, corporate partnerships, fan development and game day operations. He is also responsible for overseeing agreements for all television and radio rightsholders.

In his first season leading San Diego's business operations in 2016-17, the Gulls were named winners of the President's Award as the AHL Team of the Year, given to an AHL organization for overall excellence as voted on by all 30 AHL team presidents. The Gulls ranked third in the league in attendance during the regular season (8,876 avg.) and were named ticket sales department of the year and the Western Conference recipient for group-ticket sales growth.

Savant also oversaw the agreement and implementation of the first televised game for the Gulls, the highest level of San Diego hockey broadcast in the region on FOX 5 San Diego. The televised game was also the first in the newly-created AHL Pacific Division. He also spearheaded the addition of more televised games in 2017-18, with six Gulls games televised by FOX 5 San Diego. Entering the 2018-19 season, the Gulls will televise eight games with FOX 5 San Diego, and enter uncharted territory by televising a road content for the first time.

In 2017-18, the Gulls led the AHL in attendance (9,305 average) to become the first team in 12 seasons to usurp the Hershey Bears atop the league's attendance charts. For their efforts, the Gulls were named ticket sales department of the year for third consecutive season and honored for top revenue growth in overall ticket sales.

Savant serves on the board of directors for The Leukemia & Lymphoma Society San Diego and the San Diego Hall of Champions.

Prior to joining the Gulls, Savant spent 13 years in various marketing, fan development and brand management positions with the Anaheim Ducks. Savant started his professional sports career with the Ducks in 2003 as Marketing Manager where he was responsible for all advertising (placement and design) in addition to team branding, events and promotions.

In 2005, Savant took on a Director role and launched the Fan Development department for the Ducks, implementing grassroots marketing initiatives for the team. In 2014, Savant transitioned to Director of Marketing and Brand Management where he continued to oversee Fan Development as well as all team marketing elements, premium sales marketing and graphic design.

Savant earned a bachelor's degree in 1999 from Bowling Green State University, where he also played three years of hockey with the Falcons' club team in the Mid-American Conference (MAC).

Matt and his wife Jennifer, and their three children, Ainsley, Luca and Teagan, reside in San Marcos, Calif.

### BOB FERGUSON

#### General Manager

Bob Ferguson enters his 10th season with the Anaheim Ducks organization and fourth as General Manager of the San Diego Gulls. Ferguson is a hockey lifer, having been involved in either professional or amateur hockey for the past 38 years, as a player, coach, or member of a front office.

In his three previous seasons as a General Manager with the Gulls, Ferguson helped build teams that have a combined 118-71-10-5 record (.615 points percentage) along with a pair of appearances in the Pacific Division Finals in 2016 and 2017. San Diego's 118 wins since the club and division's inception in 2015 rank first among Pacific Division clubs.

The 2016-17 club went 43-20-3-2 for 91 points, second in the Western Conference and third in the American Hockey League (AHL), while defeating Ontario in the first round of the postseason before falling in the Pacific Division Finals to San Jose (five games). The Gulls were named winners of the 2016-17 President's Award as the AHL Team of the Year, given to an AHL organization for overall excellence as voted on by all 30 AHL team presidents. In the club's inaugural season in 2015-16, the team finished with a 39-23-4-2 record for 84 points, earning second place in the Pacific Division and the club's first berth in the Calder Cup Playoffs. Under Ferguson's guidance, San Diego won its first-ever playoff series over the Texas Stars, 3-1, prior to falling to Ontario in the second round (five games).

Ferguson was the Assistant General Manager of the Norfolk Admirals for the previous three seasons (2012-2015) and prior to that manned the same position for the Ducks' prior AHL affiliates, the Syracuse Crunch (2010-12) and Iowa Chops (2008-09). He also spent one season as a college/amateur scout for the Ducks in 2009-10.

Before joining the Ducks organization, Ferguson spent 26 seasons on the bench as a head coach in the professional and junior ranks. He had head coaching stints with Augusta (ECHL, 2005-08), Florida (ECHL, 1998-2001) and Indianapolis (IHL, 1995-98). In his nine seasons as a professional head coach, Ferguson's teams never missed the playoffs. He is a two-time John Brophy Award winner as ECHL Coach of the Year, winning the honor in consecutive seasons with the Florida Everblades in 1998-99 and 1999-2000.

Ferguson's illustrious 17-year career as a head coach in the United States Hockey League with Sioux City (1981-90) and Des Moines (1990-95, 2001-04) garnered 517 career wins, the third-most in league history. Ferguson guided Sioux City to a pair of Clark Cup championships and won three Clark Cups with Des Moines. He is a three-time Gold Cup winner (U.S. Junior 'A' National Champion), five-time USHL Coach of the Year and five-time USHL General Manager of the Year.

A native of Kingston, Ontario, Ferguson and his wife, Lisa, have two children: Brett and Kaylee. The family resides in San Diego. His son Brett serves as the Gulls' assistant coach.

### JILLIAN REDDIN

#### Director, Minor League Hockey Operations

Jillian Reddin, daughter of Susan and Henry Samueli, enters her 10th season with the Anaheim Ducks organization, her fourth in San Diego. Primarily responsible for player contracts, transactions, immigration, travel and the Collective Bargaining Agreement, Reddin regularly coordinates with the Anaheim Ducks Hockey Operations department.

Reddin previously spent three seasons in the same role with the Norfolk Admirals (2012-14) and two with the Syracuse Crunch (2010-12). Prior to her stint with Anaheim's AHL affiliates, Reddin spent a year in the Ducks front office.

A native of Newport Beach, Calif., Reddin graduated from the Fashion Institute of Design & Merchandising (Los Angeles) in 2006, receiving a degree in Merchandise Marketing.

Reddin and her husband Colin reside in San Diego.

## DALLAS EAKINS

### Head Coach

The only coach in San Diego Gulls history, Dallas Eakins is now in his fourth season as head coach of the Gulls. Named to his current post on June 26, 2015, Eakins led the Gulls to a 36-28-3-1 record last season. In his three seasons behind the bench in San Diego, Eakins has led San Diego to a 118-71-10-5 record (.615 points percentage) and a pair of appearances in the Pacific Division Finals in 2016 and 2017.

San Diego's 118 wins under Eakins since the club's inception in 2015 lead the Pacific Division, while the club's .615 points percentage is the second highest all-time by a head coach of an Anaheim Ducks primary affiliate and the 118 wins rank tied for second (also Moe Mantha from 1996-00) behind Kevin Dineen's 135 wins.

Under Eakins, San Diego has advanced to the Pacific Division Finals in each of the club's first two seasons, leading the club to a 3-2 series win over Ontario in the opening round of the 2017 Calder Cup Playoffs before falling in the Division Final to San Jose (five games). In 2016, Eakins guided San Diego to the club's first postseason series victory with a 3-1 series win in the First Round over Texas before being eliminated in the Division Finals by Ontario (five games).

On Nov. 12, 2016, Eakins earned his 200th career AHL win as the Gulls defeated the Manitoba Moose, 6-3, while he also appeared in his 500th game behind an AHL bench on Mar. 6, 2018 vs. the Cleveland Monsters.

Eakins previously served as Head Coach of the NHL's Edmonton Oilers from 2013-14 (113 games) after spending eight years in the Toronto Maple Leafs organization.

Eakins was Head Coach of the Toronto Marlies (AHL) from 2009-13, leading the team to a 157-114-41 record in 312 games. The Marlies finished atop the North Division during Eakins' final two seasons behind the bench winning four of six playoff series. In 2012 and 2013, Eakins was named as one of two head coaches representing the Western Conference for the AHL All-Star Games. During the 2011-12 campaign, Eakins led the Marlies to a division-best 44-24-8 record and an appearance in the Calder Cup Final. Eakins has a career 275-185-25-31 record as Head Coach in the AHL.

Selected by Washington in the 10th round (208th overall) of the 1985 NHL Draft, Eakins appeared in 120 NHL contests with the Winnipeg Jets, Florida Panthers, St. Louis Blues, Phoenix Coyotes, New York Rangers, Toronto Maple Leafs, New York Islanders and Calgary Flames. The defenseman collected 0-9=9 points with a +6 rating and 208 PIM in his NHL career. Eakins also played in both the AHL and International Hockey League (IHL) during his professional career, winning both the Calder Cup (2002) and Turner Cup (2000). Eakins recorded his best season with the Chicago Wolves in 1999-00, recording 5-26=31 points in 68 contests. His final professional season was with the Manitoba Moose (AHL) before retiring on May 26, 2004.

Eakins, his wife Ingrid, and daughters Emerson and Cameron reside in Poway, Calif.

Sylvain Lefebvre is in the midst of his first season as Assistant Coach with the Gulls. Lefebvre is a veteran of 945 career NHL games with Montreal, Toronto, Quebec/Colorado and the New York Rangers. He recorded 30-154=184 points with a +108 rating during his 14-year NHL career. Lefebvre was part of Colorado's first Stanley Cup championship team in 1996 and went on to appear in 129 career Stanley Cup Playoff games. Lefebvre also played parts of four AHL seasons with Sherbrooke (1987-89) and Hartford (2001-02), earning 18-61=79 points in 171 career regular-season games.

Sylvain and his wife, Marie Claire, have four children: Jade-Isis, Djan-Alexandre, Jordan and Alexanne. The family also has two grandchildren: Sky and Flynn.

### DAVID URQUHART

#### Assistant Coach

David Urquhart is in his first season as Assistant Coach for the Gulls. Urquhart joins the Anaheim organization after serving as Assistant Coach with McGill University in Montreal for four seasons from 2014-18. He also served as Head Coach for Team Serbia at the 2018 IIHF World Hockey Championship Division II. Urquhart appeared in 130 career AHL games from 2008-11, collecting 6-17=23 points with a +8 rating with Hartford and Hamilton. The Thorold, Ontario native also played three seasons in Italy from 2011-14, highlighted by a league championship victory in 2013-14.

Urquhart played four collegiate seasons with the McGill Redmen from 2004-08 and earned a Commerce Degree in 2008. Named to the 2006-07 All-Canadian Second Team, Urquhart recorded 23-84=107 points in 147 career games and led McGill to the Ontario University Athletics conference championship as captain in 2007-08. The three-time All-Star concluded his time at McGill tied with Mike Babcock as the eighth-highest scoring defenseman in Redmen history. Inducted into the McGill Sports Hall of Fame on Oct. 11, 2018, Urquhart is currently completing a master's degree in Sports Psychology at McGill.



## BRETT FERGUSON

### Assistant Coach

Brett Ferguson is in his fourth season with the San Diego Gulls, and second as Assistant Coach after spending the two previous seasons as Video Coach with the club. He enters his ninth season as a coach for the Anaheim Ducks' AHL affiliate having previously served as Video Coach with both the Norfolk Admirals (2012-15) and the Syracuse Crunch (2010-12).

## J.F. LABBE


### Goaltending Coach

J.F. Labbe is in his third season as goaltending coach for the San Diego Gulls. Labbe previously served as goaltending coach for the Sherbrooke Phoenix of the Quebec Major Junior Hockey League (QMJHL) in 2015-16.

The program is designed for participants ages four to 12 years old. Rental skates will be available at the rink each week.

The use of full hockey equipment not only gives participants the feel of what it's like to be a hockey player but also enables them to get used to skating, wearing all of the hockey gear.

## ANDY ZILCH

### Play-by-Play

Andy Zilch enters his first season as the San Diego Gulls' play-by-play voice on FOX 5 San Diego and The Mighty 1090-AM/ESPN 1700-AM. Zilch joins the Gulls after spending the past six seasons calling professional hockey in the National Hockey League (NHL), AHL and ECHL. Zilch spent the past two seasons as the Utica Comets play-by-play broadcaster and Director of Communications for the AHL club. During the 2018 AHL All-Star Classic, Zilch was the radio play-by-play broadcaster for league's flagship event on SiriusXM NHL Network Radio.

He spent the 2014-15 and 2015-16 AHL seasons as the play-by-play broadcaster for the Springfield Falcons of the AHL in addition to serving as the club's Manager of Communications. Zilch was selected by the St. Louis Blue to fill in for radio play-by-play broadcaster Chris Kerber.

Prior to his AHL career, Zilch spent two seasons with the Greenville Road Warriors of the ECHL, serving as the voice of the hockey club and overseeing media relations.

He also served as a broadcast intern with both the St. Louis Blues (2010-12) and St. Louis Rams (2006-09). Earning a bachelor's degree in mass communications at Lindenwood University, Zilch served three years as the television and radio play-by-play announcer for men's and women's ice hockey, as well as men's roller hockey. He also called the 2006 Division I women's national championship game.

A native of St. Louis, Mo., Zilch earned a bachelor's degree in Mass Communications at Lindenwood University, while also serving three years as the television and radio play-by-play announcer for men's and women's ice hockey, as well as men's roller hockey. He also called the 2006 Division I women's national championship game.

Zilch now resides in San Diego.

## BJ MACPHERSON

### Color Analyst

B.J. MacPherson enters his fourth season as the television and radio color analyst for the San Diego Gulls. He has called all 102 home games and numerous away games during the club's first three seasons, and also serves as co-host of the weekly podcast.

MacPherson played seven seasons of professional hockey from 1994-2001, appearing in a combined 774 games in the AHL, West Coast Hockey League (WCHL) and International Hockey League (IHL). He was a member of the WCHL San Diego Gulls from 1996-2001 (captain in 2000-01), earning 137-208=345 points with a +163 rating and 699 penalty minutes (PIM) in 309 games. He helped lead the Gulls to three Taylor Cup championships in 1997, 1998 and 2001, scoring 19-29=48 points with 115 PIM in 52 Taylor Cup games.

The Toronto, Ontario native appeared in 13 career AHL games with the Worcester IceCats (1995-96), earning 1-1=2 points with 18 PIM. In 133 ECHL contests, MacPherson collected 42-82=124 points with a +10 rating and 402 PIM with the Greensboro Monarchs (1994-95) and Toledo Storm (1994-96). He also appeared in 10 IHL games with the Long Beach Ice Dogs (1996-99) and Las Vegas Thunder (1996-97), collecting 2-2=4 points and 11 PIM.

MacPherson played four years in the Ontario Hockey League (OHL), earning 112-168=280 points with 409 PIM in 233 career games with the Oshawa Generals (1990-94) and North Bay Centennials (1994). He scored 1-1=2 points in three Memorial Cup Games with North Bay in 1994.

On May 4, 2001, MacPherson was injured on the ice during Game 3 of the Taylor Cup Finals in Boise, Idaho, suffering a broken neck. MacPherson was released from the hospital in Boise on the day of Game 7, flew to San Diego, and made a dramatic appearance in the Gulls' locker room prior to puck drop, helping inspire his teammates to a 4-1 victory and the Taylor Cup championship.

MacPherson and his wife, Angela, have two daughters: Avery and Leyton.



Born out of the vision and commitment of San Diego sports legend Bob Breitbard, the San Diego Sports Arena (formerly Valley View Casino Center), was built in 1966 with the purpose of bringing professional sports to the San Diego region.

The arena opened its doors on Nov. 17, 1966 when the San Diego Gulls of the Western Hockey League won their home opener, 4-1, over the Seattle Totems in front of a crowd of 11,682 San Diego sports fans. Since then, the venue has housed professional basketball, hockey and indoor soccer, and will welcome professional lacrosse this fall. On Nov. 18, 2016, the newest iteration of the San Diego Gulls commemorated the 50-year anniversary of San Diego Sports Arena when they defeated the San Jose Barracuda, 3-2.

The San Diego Sports Arena has played host to some of the most memorable moments in sports history, including Ken Norton's split decision over Muhammad Ali in 1973, delivering boxing's world championship to Norton in a famous bout. Irish miler Eamonn Coghlan stunned the world of track and field not once, but twice at the Valley View Casino Center, shattering the world record for the indoor mile in both 1979 and 1981, setting a standard in 1981 that stood for sixteen years.

Among the illustrious musical acts to have performed at San Diego Sports Arena, the names and sold-out crowds' memories are too many to fully capture. Elvis Presley (1970), Jimi Hendrix (twice), The Rolling Stones (four times), Led Zeppelin (seven times), Pink Floyd and Elton John are but a few of the legends to have graced the arena. Today, modern blockbuster acts like Taylor Swift, Carrie Underwood, U2, Bruno Mars and Justin Bieber continue the tradition with a new generation of music fans.

Under the direction of AEG and the Hahn family, recent improvements have been made to San Diego Sports Arena, and the return of San Diego Gulls hockey has taken the arena a step higher from its already elite position as a multi-purpose facility. A brand-new scoreboard and LED ring greets Gulls fans as they enter the bowl of the arena, in addition to a \$5 million transformation the past five years which includes a new parking lot, new entrances, new bathrooms, new seating, the renovation and rebrand of the Stella Artois Lounge and the addition of the GMC Denali PIT, among many other improvements.



# HISTORY OF THE **ANAHEIM DUCKS**

---

**The NHL made a second entrance into the Southern California region in December of 1992, when the Walt Disney Company was awarded the rights to an expansion NHL franchise, beginning play during the 1993 season.**

On the heels of the hit movie "The Mighty Ducks", released on October 2, 1992, Disney announced their new team would be named the "Mighty Ducks of Anaheim". The franchise debuted on October 8, 1993 at home, a 7-2 loss to the Detroit Red Wings, and played to sellouts in 27 of its first 41 home games. The Mighty Ducks rose to reach the Stanley Cup Finals in 2002-03, losing a classic seven-game series to the New Jersey Devils. Goalie Jean-Sebastian Giguere was named the Conn Smythe Trophy winner as playoff MVP, only the fifth recipient to earn the honor as a member of the losing team.

In the spring of 2005, Henry and Susan Samueli entered into an agreement with the Walt Disney Company to purchase the Ducks franchise. In the Samueli's first year of ownership, the Ducks showed immediate success on the ice, setting a then-franchise record for wins [43] while winning two playoff series over Calgary and Colorado before eventually bowing in the 2006 Western Conference Finals to Edmonton.

On June 22, 2006, a new era began as the franchise was officially renamed the Anaheim Ducks. The team debuted a new logo and color scheme, featuring a color palette of black, gold and orange, with the orange accent a nod to the team's Orange County home. A stylized "D", echoing the image of a duck's foot or footprint, was incorporated into the team logo.

The Ducks debuted under their new name and logo in the 2006-07 season, and the conversion was as successful as any NHL team could dream or hope for, as the franchise advanced all the way to win its first Stanley Cup. Breaking team records for wins (48) and standings points (110), the Ducks won their first Pacific Division title in franchise history, leading the standings for the final 72 games of the regular season. The Ducks defeated the Minnesota Wild (4-to-1), Vancouver Canucks (4-to-1), Detroit Red Wings (4-to-2) and Ottawa Senators (4-to-1) on the road to the Stanley Cup. Defenseman Scott Niedermayer was named the franchise's second Conn Smythe Trophy award winner. It was the first Stanley Cup championship for a West Coast team since the Victoria Cougars in 1925, and the first for a U.S. West Coast team since the 1917 Seattle Metropolitans.

Under General Manager Bob Murray, who was named to his current post in 2008, the franchise has enjoyed a sustained run of success, winning

consecutive Pacific Division titles from 2013-17 while qualifying for the playoffs for the sixth consecutive year, equaling the second-longest streak in the NHL. In 2017-18, with 101 points, Anaheim became the only NHL team to post 100-plus points in each of the last five

Seasons, and since the start of the 2013-14 season, the Ducks co-lead the NHL in standings points (534 pts., 241-117-52) with Washington.

Anaheim 2018-19 regular-season is the club's 25th Anniversary season presented by UCI Health. The team will hold its home opener on Oct. 8 versus the Detroit Red Wings at Honda Center, 25 years to the day after Anaheim's inaugural game in 1993. The Ducks will retire the jerseys of Paul Kariya and Scott Niedermayer this coming season as part of the franchise's 25th anniversary celebrations and join Teemu Selanne's retired No. 8 jersey in the Honda Center rafters. Kariya's No. 9 jersey will be raised on Oct. 21 vs. Buffalo, with Niedermayer's No. 27 to follow on Feb. 17 vs. Washington.

# HISTORY OF THE SAN DIEGO GULLS

**On Jan. 29, 2015, the Anaheim Ducks announced that the National Hockey League (NHL) club would purchase the Norfolk Admirals American Hockey League (AHL) franchise and relocate it from Norfolk, Va., to San Diego. The Ducks joined affiliates from the Los Angeles Kings (Ontario, Calif.), San Jose Sharks (San Jose, Calif.), Calgary Flames (Stockton, Calif.) and Edmonton Oilers (Bakersfield, Calif.) in the newly created AHL Pacific Division.**

The official logo and team colors of blue, orange and black were unveiled at a free event on Feb. 22, 2015. More than 8,500 eager hockey fans waited in a line, wrapping around the Valley View Casino Center for the opportunity to be a part of hockey's return to San Diego.

Dallas Eakins was named Head Coach of the Gulls on June 26, 2015. Eakins, who appeared in 120 NHL contests with Winnipeg, Florida, St. Louis, Phoenix, NY Rangers, Toronto, NY Islanders and Calgary, has coached at the AHL and NHL levels for the past 13 seasons and spent nearly 20 seasons prior as a player professionally.

The San Diego Gulls took the ice on Oct. 10, 2015 to open their inaugural AHL season in front of a sellout crowd of 12,920 at Valley View Casino Center. Nick Ritchie, selected by Anaheim in the first round (10th overall) of the 2014 NHL Draft, scored the first AHL goal in Gulls history en route to a 4-2 victory over the Grand Rapids Griffins.

San Diego concluded the 2015-16 regular season with a record of 39-23-4-2, earning second place in the Pacific Division and fifth in the Western Conference. The Gulls made their first appearance in the Calder Cup Playoffs on April 21, 2016 at the Texas Stars and won their first-ever playoff series (3-1) after a 6-2 series-clinching victory vs. Texas on April 29, 2016. The Gulls advanced to the Pacific Division Finals, eventually falling to the Ontario Reign in five games (4-1).



In the inaugural season, San Diego ranked second among league leaders in average attendance (8,675), bringing nearly 300,000 fans to watch Gulls hockey at Valley View Casino Center.

San Diego's second season in the AHL improved on their successful launch in year one, finishing with a 43-20-3-2 record and 91 points. The Gulls ranked second in the Western Conference and third overall in the AHL. For the second consecutive season, the Gulls advanced to the Calder Cup Playoffs, facing division rival Ontario in the First Round that went the maximum five games, San Diego defeated Ontario in Game 5 (4-1). The Gulls again progressed to the Pacific Division Finals, where the club eventually fell to the San Jose Sharks in five games (4-1).

One of the highlights of 2016-17 was the introduction of Gulls hockey to the masses, as the club televised the first AHL game on Feb. 12, 2017 (a 4-0 win vs. Bakersfield), the highest level of San Diego hockey broadcast in the region on FOX 5 San Diego. The televised game was also the first TV broadcast by a club in the newly-created AHL Pacific Division.

Off the ice, the Gulls were recognized as winners of the President's Award as the AHL Team of the Year, given to an AHL organization for

overall excellence as voted on by all 30 AHL team presidents. The Gulls continued to excel in year two, leading the Pacific Division and ranking third in the league in attendance during the regular season (8,876 avg.), with more than 301,000 total attendance, including three sellouts.

San Diego finished its 2017-18 season with a 36-28-3-1 record and 76 points, tied for fourth in the Pacific Division. The Gulls lost a tiebreaker scenario with San Jose due to head-to-head points in the eight-game season series and missed the playoffs for the first time in club history.

Off the ice, the Gulls led the AHL in attendance (9,305 avg.) in 2017-18, setting new club marks for a third consecutive season in average and overall attendance (316,368), in addition to a franchise record six sellouts. San Diego became the first team in 12 seasons to usurp the Hershey Bears atop the league's attendance charts. For a third consecutive season, San Diego was named the AHL's ticket sales department of the year.

In three seasons, San Diego has a 118-71-10-5 record and 251 points (.615 points percentage). San Diego's 118 wins since the club's inception in 2015 lead the Pacific Division.

# SAN DIEGO HOCKEY HISTORY

Professional hockey in San Diego has a rich history, dating to the San Diego Skyhawks of the Pacific Coast Hockey League in 1944. San Diego has been home to several professional hockey teams and leagues through the years, including the aforementioned Skyhawks (1944-50), Gulls of the Western Hockey League (1966-74), Mariners of the World Hockey Association (1974-77) and Pacific Hockey League (1977-78), Hawks of the PHL (1978-79), and Gulls of the International Hockey League (1990-95), West Coast Hockey League (1995-03) and ECHL (2003-06). San Diego hockey teams have won six championships, including the 1948-49 PCHL Championship (Skyhawks), and WCHL Championships in 1995-96, 1996-97, 1997-98, 2000-01 and 2002-03 (Gulls).

The San Diego Skyhawks won the 1948-49 President's Cup with Morden "Ducky" Skinner behind the bench. In their six seasons playing in the downtown San Diego Glacier Gardens, the Skyhawks posted a combined record of 156-151-17. Glacier Gardens was located at Harbor Drive and Eighth Avenue, adjacent to the present-day PETCO Park.

In 1966, San Diego was awarded a Western Hockey League franchise after the completion of the San Diego Sports Arena. Following a write-in contest for the team name, the Gulls and mascot Sandy Gull were born. The WHL Gulls played eight seasons at the Sports Arena from 1966-74, led by General Manager/Head Coach Max McNab for the first six seasons and Head Coach Jack Evans for the final two campaigns. McNab, father to



current Anaheim Ducks Senior Vice President of Hockey Operations David McNab, served as Gulls General Manager for all eight seasons. The Gulls drew more than 315,000 fans for their inaugural season in 1966-67 as one of the top draws in the city of San Diego. They debuted on Nov. 17, 1966 with a 4-1 victory over the Seattle Totems in front of a sellout crowd at the San Diego Sports Arena.

Perhaps the most prolific player in the history of San Diego hockey was forward Willie O'Ree, who played seven of the Gulls' eight WHL seasons from 1967-73. O'Ree, who had broken the NHL's color barrier as a member of the Boston Bruins, scored 153-161=314 points in 407 career games with the Gulls. He also made seven consecutive trips to the WHL Playoffs with the Gulls from 1968-74, collecting 19-17=36 points in 40 postseason games. Wearing No. 20, O'Ree scored a career-tying 38 goals and won the WHL scoring title with 38-41=79 points in his second season with the Gulls in 1968-69.

In 1974, hockey returned to San Diego with a World Hockey Association team, the San Diego Mariners. The Mariners played three seasons at


the Sports Arena from 1974-77, posting a record of 119-106-14 over their three seasons in the WHA, which disbanded following the 1976-77 campaign. Hockey remained in San Diego the following two seasons as a Pacific Hockey League affiliate, first as the Mariners (in 1977-78) and later as the San Diego Hawks (1978-79). O'Ree returned to San Diego as a member of the Hawks in his final professional season in 1978-79, collecting 21-25=46 points in 53 games.

The Southern California expansion of the International Hockey League in the 1990s returned hockey and the Gulls nickname to San Diego. The Gulls played five IHL seasons at the Sports Arena from 1990-95, going 216-149-44 and qualifying for the playoffs in four of five years. The IHL Gulls set a professional hockey record for most wins in a single season, going 62-12-8 en route to the Fred A. Huber Trophy with an IHL-record 132 standings points in 1992-93.

In 1995, San Diego's IHL franchise was relocated to Los Angeles, but the Gulls remained as a member of the newly created West Coast Hockey League. The WCHL Gulls won five league championships in 1996, 1997, 1998, 2001 and 2003 before joining the ECHL for three seasons from 2003-06. San Diego's final season of professional hockey came in 2005-06 with the ECHL's Gulls.

On Jan. 29, 2015, the Anaheim Ducks announced that the club would purchase the Norfolk Admirals American Hockey League franchise and relocate it from Norfolk, Va., to San Diego, Calif. The Ducks joined affiliates from the Los Angeles Kings (Ontario Reign), San Jose Sharks (San Jose Barracuda), Calgary Flames (Stockton Heat) and Edmonton Oilers (Bakersfield Condors) as well as existing affiliates from the Dallas Stars (Texas Stars) and Colorado Avalanche (San Antonio Rampage) in the newly created AHL Pacific Division.



### THE 2017-18 SEASON

San Diego finished 2017-18 with a 36-28-3-1 record and 76 points, tied for fourth in the Pacific Division. The Gulls lost a tiebreaker scenario with San Jose due to head-to-head points in the eight-game season series and missed the playoffs for the first time in club history.

### GULLS TOP ATTENDANCE CHARTS

The Gulls led the AHL in attendance (9,305 avg.) in 2017-18, setting new club marks for a third consecutive season in average and overall attendance (316,368), in addition to a record six sellouts. San Diego became the first team in 12 seasons to usurp the Hershey Bears atop the league's attendance charts.

### POWER SURGE

The Gulls 21.9 percent mark on the man advantage ranked first in the AHL, with the 62 power-play goals in games leading the league in power-play goals per game. San Diego's 23.7% mark at home led the Western Conference (second in AHL). The 62 power-play goals also marked a single-season club record, while Corey Tropp tied his 2016-17

club record for single-season power-play goals with 11 on the man advantage.

### SECOND HALF STRENGTH

The Gulls had a strong second half of the regular season (Games 35-68) and have done so dating to 2015-16. San Diego finished 17-14-2-1 this season in the second half to rank second in AHL win percentage (.673%, 64-30-6-2) during the three-year span. In three seasons, the Gulls have ranked second among AHL clubs in second half wins (64) and the second-fewest second half losses (30) since 2015-16.

### CALL IT A COMEBACK

The Gulls recorded 15 come-from-behind wins during 2017-18 to set a new single-season record, including 10 from one-goal deficits, four from two-goals and one from a three-goal deficit. On Jan. 17, San Diego trailed 3-0 at 9:35 of the second period but scored five consecutive goals to match the largest deficit overcome in a win in club history. The two previous deficits of three goals overcome were on Jan. 3, 2016 at San Antonio (trailed 3-0 at 4:17 of the third period to win 4-3) and Apr. 6, 2016

vs. Bakersfield (trailed 3-0 at 2:58 of second period and 5-2 of the second period at 15:52 to win 6-5 in overtime).

### GOING STREAKING

San Diego won a club record-tying eight straight games from Jan. 26-Feb. 17, tied for the all-time club record for consecutive wins (also Nov. 11-Dec. 2, 2016). San Diego won five straight games from Dec. 9-23 and won four consecutive from Jan. 3-10. The Gulls won five straight road games from Jan. 3-Feb. 18, tied for the longest road win streak in Gulls history (also Jan. 25-Feb. 7, 2017). The Gulls won a season-high six straight home games from Feb. 3-Mar. 2, the second longest home win streak in club history (three other times; last: Jan. 7-Feb. 14, 2017).

### RECORD BREAKERS

On Feb. 3, Corey Tropp passed current Anaheim Ducks defenseman and former Gull Brandon Montour for the franchise's all-time scoring record when he tallied his 90th point for San Diego. Corey Tropp scored his 38th career goal (shorthanded goal) for San Diego on Feb. 25 to set the all-time club record for goals to pass Antoine Laganiere (37). Tropp earned his 38th goal in 107 games with San Diego, setting the franchise goal record in 14 fewer contests than Laganiere's 121. Kalle Kossila scored his 100th career point on Apr. 6 to become the second Gull to reach the 100-point milestone following Tropp's 100 points, while the Finnish center also recorded his 65th assist with the club on Mar. 24 to pass Montour's 64 career assists with San Diego.

### ROOKIE SCORER

Giovanni Fiore set a new club rookie record for goals in a season to surpass the previous record of 16 set by Kevin Roy (2016-17) and Nick Ritchie (2015-16). Fiore scored his 17th goal of the season on Mar. 13 to pass the two previous leaders, marking his record tally in his 56th game on Mar. 25. Fiore began his San Diego tenure with a career high five-game point streak to start his AHL career from Oct. 13-Oct. 25 (2-3=5) to become the first Gulls rookie to record a point in his first five career games.

### NATURAL HAT TRICK HEROES

Corey Tropp scored the second hat trick and first natural hat trick (three consecutive goals in a game) in club history to lead the Gulls to a 4-3 win at the Texas Stars on Jan. 3 at H-E-B Center. Tropp scored

all three goals on the power play in a span of 3:32 in the second period (7:39, 8:15 and 11:11). Giovanni Fiore scored his first career hat trick with three consecutive goals in the third period in a span of 7:33 (goals at 5:01, 7:07 and 12:28) to lead San Diego to a 5-3 comeback win over the Tucson Roadrunners at Tucson Convention Center Arena. Fiore's hat trick was the third in Gulls history the second natural hat trick in a seven-game, 14-day span.

### GETTING THE CALL

Four players to appear with the Gulls in 2018-19 made their NHL debut with the Anaheim Ducks, pushing the mark to 14 in three years since the club's inception. Giovanni Fiore made his NHL debut on Oct. 7 vs. the Philadelphia Flyers, going scoreless in 7:53 TOI. Kevin Roy made his Ducks debut on Nov. 9 vs. Vancouver, scoring his first NHL on Nov. 15 vs. Boston (Tuukka Rask). Andy Welinski debut came on Dec. 11 vs. Carolina, with the defenseman earning his first career point (assist) on the game-winning goal. Marcus Pettersson made his debut on the road Feb. 15 @ Chicago, going scoreless with a +2 rating in 13:28 TOI. Pettersson scored first NHL goal Mar. 4 vs. Chicago (Anton Forsberg).

# POSTSEASON NOTES

## IN PLAYOFF SECTION

### THE 2016-17 SEASON

The San Diego Gulls finished the 2016-17 season with a 43-20-3-2 record and 91 points, good for second in the Western Conference and Pacific Division, and third in the AHL. It marked the second consecutive season The Gulls climbed six spots in the Pacific Division to finish second after falling to last in the division on Nov. 10, .500 percentage points behind then-leader Tucson (.830 Tucson win % to .330 win % San Diego). After the holiday break, San Diego sat 11 points behind then-division leader Stockton, surpassing four teams (Stockton, Tucson, Ontario and Texas) and earning the joint-most points in the league since Dec. 26 (68 points, also Chicago) despite playing three fewer games than the Wolves.

### STRONG FINISH

The Gulls closed out the 2016-17 on a three-game win streak, posted a 9-5-0-0 record in their final 14 games and a 15-6-1-0 mark in the last 22 games overall. Dating back to the midway point of the season, San Diego recorded wins in 25 of their last 34 contests (25-8-1-0) and 32 of the last 43 overall (32-9-1-1). San Diego also earned standings points in 20 of the last 28 (18-8-1-0), as well as points in 36 of 45 contests since Dec. 26 (32-9-2-2).

### AT HOME STRENGTH

San Diego's 23-9-1-1 record and 48 points at Valley View Casino Center ranked fourth in the Western Conference and sixth in the AHL. The Gulls outscored opponents by a 122-88 margin on home ice and boasted the fifth-best home power-play in

the AHL with a 23.7% success rate. Additionally, San Diego won nine of its final 11 games at Valley View Casino Center to close out the regular season and posted a 15-3-0 record on home ice dating back to Jan. 7.

### ROAD WARRIORS

San Diego won 20 road games to lead the Pacific Division in wins away from home, and the club ranked tied for third in the Western Conference with a .632 road win percentage (20-11-2-1) and allowed the second-fewest road goals against in the AHL (90). The Gulls set a club record 10-game road standings point streak (9-0-0-1) from Dec. 29 to Feb. 7 (19 of a possible 20 points), surpassing the previous mark of seven consecutive road wins set from Feb. 12 to Mar. 19, 2016. The Gulls won 12 consecutive road games outside of California to conclude their 2016-17 out-of-state schedule with wins over Tucson (5), Texas (2), San Antonio (2), Rockford (1) and Iowa (1). The only two losses (one regulation, one overtime) outside of California came in Canada at Manitoba on Oct. 28-29.

### NIFTY 50

Throughout the 2016-17 regular season, 50 different players appeared in a game for San Diego, tied for the most players to appear in a game for a single team this season (also San Antonio). Of the 50 players, 14 were rookies that contributed 70-134=204 points in a combined 403 games (70 goals were 32% of team's 221 goals).

### ON THE LEADERBOARD

The Gulls ranked seventh among AHL teams in goals scored per game (3.25) and goals against per game (2.62), allowed the third-fewest goals in the league (178), and ranked fifth in shots for per game (32.4). San Diego also boasted the eighth-best power-play in the AHL (20.1%) and the seventh-best road penalty-kill at 83.1%.

### LEADING SITUATIONS

When leading after the first period the Gulls posted a 28-0-1 record and a 31-1-2 mark when leading after two periods. San Diego also earned a 28-2-2-1 mark when scoring the game's first goal, ranking second in the AHL in win percentage when scoring first (.894). The club also had a 39-6-1-1 record when scoring three goals or more in a game.

### SEASON STREAKS

San Diego set a club record 12-game point streak from Jan. 7 to Feb. 7 (11-0-1-0), the Gulls' longest standings point streak in franchise history, surpassing an 11-game point streak from Feb. 19 to Mar. 16, 2016 (9-0-1-1). The Gulls won a franchise-best eight consecutive games from Nov. 11 to Dec. 2 (8-0-0), the longest winning streak in club history (previous: four games, set three times in 2015-16; last: Mar. 8-16, 2016) and tied for the second longest win streak in the AHL this season. San Diego had three win streaks of five games or more this season: 8 games; Nov. 11-Dec. 2, 6 games; Jan. 25-Feb. 7 and 5 games; Jan. 7-20. San Diego also won a club record seven consecutive home games from Feb. 24 to Mar. 22, surpassing the previous record of six set on three previous occasions (Jan. 7 to Feb. 14, Nov. 11 to Dec. 6, 2016 and Oct. 10 to Nov. 11, 2015). San Diego's 10-game road point streak from Dec. 29 to Feb. 7 was also tied for the second-longest in the AHL.

### DEFENSIVE PRESENCE

The Gulls allowed 178 goals, the third-fewest goals against in the AHL, and allowed the second-fewest road goals in the league (90). The club boasted the seventh-best goals-against per game in the league (2.62) and allowed the second-fewest first period goals in the AHL (48), along with the fourth-fewest second period goals (59). San Diego allowed two goals or fewer in 22 of its final 38 games (84 goals, 2.21 GAA) and allowed three goals or fewer in 50 of their final 60 contests (141 goals, 2.35 GAA).

### NET GAINS

Jhonas Enroth (16-5-0) led all AHL goaltenders with a 1.91 GAA and .931 SV% (minimum 21 games). He posted a 14-4-0 record with two shutouts, a 1.73 GAA and .936 SV% in 18 games with San Diego after being acquired by the Anaheim Ducks from Toronto on Jan. 10. Enroth finished the season with a 9-2-0 road record with a 1.63 GAA and .939 SV% in 11 starts away from home. Dustin Tokarski (17-8-1) started the season winning his first six home starts from Oct. 14-Dec. 6 (6-0-0) and finished with a 10-3-1 record at Valley View Casino Center this season. Tokarski posted a 7-2-0 record with one shutout, a 2.63 GAA and .903 SV% in his last 10 appearances to close out the regular season. Kevin Boyle earned a 10-3-3 record in his

last 16 AHL games with one shutout, a 2.14 GAA, a .927 SV%, ranking tied for fourth among AHL rookie goaltenders in GAA and SV% (minimum 19 games).

### RECORD SETTER

Corey Tropp led the Gulls in scoring (21-33=54), goals (21) and PPG (11), and ranked second in assists (33). Tropp set the club record for goals in a single season on Mar. 18 at San Antonio with his 21st of the season, surpassing Chris Mueller's 20 goals in 2015-16, and also became the third player in club history to record 50 points in a season, joining 2015-16 Gulls leaders Mueller (20-37=57) and Brandon Montour (12-45=57). Tropp finished the campaign with eight goals in his last 18 games (8-6=14), points in 9-8=17 his last 20 games, 13-15=28 points over his last 31 games and 33 points in the last 38 games overall (15-18=33).

### STEADY MEGS

Jaycob Megna led the AHL with a +34 rating this season and ranked second among active Gulls defensemen in goals (5), assists (22) and points (27). Megna set career highs in all of those categories, surpassing last year's previous career

high of 0-12=12 points. Over his last 41 games he earned 5-19=24 points and also earned a plus or even rating in 31 of his final 35 games (+30). The 24-year-old also ranked second in the league in shorthanded points (5) and assists (4).

### ANAHEIM CONNECTION


Nineteen (19) players that appeared in a game with San Diego in 2016-17 also appeared in a game with the Anaheim Ducks in the National Hockey League (NHL). Players that appeared with the Gulls this season scored 28-42=70 points in 368 NHL games this season. In addition, eight Gulls players made their NHL debut with Anaheim this season (Joseph Cramarossa, Ondrej Kase, Nic Kerdiles, Kalle Kossila, Jacob Larsson, Jaycob Megna, Brandon Montour, Nick Sorensen) and four scored their first NHL goal with the Ducks (Cramarossa, Kase, Stefan Noesen, Montour).

# POSTSEASON NOTES

## IN PLAYOFF SECTION

### THE 2016-17 SEASON

San Diego Gulls completed the 2015-16 inaugural season with a record of 39-23-4-2, earning second place in the newly-created Pacific Division and fifth in the Western Conference. The Gulls won their first-ever AHL game with a 4-2 victory over the Grand Rapids on Oct. 10, 2015 in front of a sellout crowd (12,920) at Valley View Casino Center.

San Diego went 6-2-2-0 in the last 10 games and 16-3-3-1 in the past 23 games, clinching their first-ever spot in the postseason on April 6, 2016. The Gulls made their first appearance in the Calder Cup Playoffs on April 21, 2016 at the Texas Stars and won their first playoff series three-games-to-one with a 6-2 victory over the Stars on April 29, 2016. San Diego advanced to the Pacific Division Finals, eventually falling to the Ontario Reign four-games-to-one.

### THE TURNSTILE

In the inaugural season, San Diego ranked second among league leaders in average attendance (8,675), bringing nearly 300,000 fans to watch Gulls hockey at Valley View Casino Center. In hockey's return to San Diego Opening Night as the team hosted Grand Rapids, Gulls fans packed the Valley View Casino Center with a sellout crowd of 12,920.

### LEADING THE WAY

Veteran center Chris Mueller (20-37=57) and rookie defenseman Brandon Montour (12-45=57) co-led the club in scoring during the club's inaugural season, while defenseman Jaycob Megna paced all skaters with a +23 rating. Montour also led the team in appearances, playing the full 68-game schedule.

**ALL-LEAGUE**

Montour was named both to the AHL All-Rookie Team and as an AHL First Team All-Star defenseman, and was ranked tied for 12th in the AHL in total scoring and tied for third in the league in assists (45), while he co-led in power play assists (24) and ranked second in power play points (30). The rookie blueliner ranked third among league rookies in scoring while pacing the group in assists.

**ROOKIE ALL-STARS**

Rookie's Montour and Nick Ritchie participated in the 2016 AHL All-Star Challenge in Syracuse, N.Y. Representing the Pacific Division team, Ritchie netted a pair of goals (2-0=2) and Montour added an empty-net goal (1-0=1) during the three mini-games played against the other three divisional All-Star teams. The Pacific Division went 1-2 in their three contests, falling short of the championship round. Montour (6-26=32) and Ritchie (15-11=26) led the Gulls in scoring at the All-Star break.

**ROTATING ROSTER**

There were 14 different players who saw the ice for both the Ducks and the Gulls during the 2015-16 season and nine players who dressed for San Diego on Opening Night made appearances with the big club. Anaheim Ducks first round draft picks Shea Theodore (2013) and Ritchie (2014) both made their NHL debuts after successful starts in San Diego. Theodore added 9-28=37 points in 50 games with San Diego in addition to his 3-5=8 points with a +7

rating in 19 games with Anaheim. Ritchie notched 16-14=30 points in just 38 AHL games and collected 2-2=4 points with 37 PIM in 33 games with the Ducks.

**STAR NETMINDER**

San Diego's Opening Night goaltender, John Gibson, posted the Gulls' first-ever shutout with 23 saves in a 3-0 win Oct. 23 at San Jose. Gibson appeared in 13 contests with San Diego before his eventual recall to Anaheim where he went on to be named an NHL All-Star and claim the William M. Jennings Trophy along with Frederik Andersen as the NHL's goaltenders who play a minimum of 25 games for the club allowing the fewest goals. Gibson appeared in 40 games with Anaheim ranking second in the NHL with a 2.07 goals-against average, and paced all rookie netminders with four shutouts and co-led rookies in wins (21).

**LEADING SITUATIONS**

When the San Diego Gulls scored the game's first goal, they were 28-1-2-1 on the season (.922 points percentage). San Diego had not lost in regulation all season when scoring first, until Ontario's 4-2 win over the Gulls during the season's final weekend. When leading after the first period, the Gulls went 18-2-0-1 on the season. That trend was even more pronounced after two periods where San Diego posted a 31-0-0-0 record when leading after 40 minutes. San Diego was the only team in the AHL to finish with a perfect record when leading after two periods.

The San Diego Gulls entered the 2017 Calder Cup Playoffs as the second seed in the Western Conference having finished their second season with a 43-20-3-2 record and 91 points. The Gulls set records for standings points (91), wins (43), win percentage (.669), goals (217; excluding shootout tallies) and goals against (178). San Diego faced Ontario in the First Round of the Calder Cup Playoffs for the second time in the past two seasons..The Gulls defeated the Reign, 3-2, in the best-of-five series, the club's first deciding game win in its short history. In the Pacific Division Final, San Diego and San Jose met for the first ever postseason series between the two teams. The Gulls eventually fell on May 13 at Valley View Casino Center in Game 5. **Nic Kerdiles** led the team in playoff scoring (4-4=8) and co-led in goals despite missing two games while with the Anaheim Ducks in the Stanley Cup Playoffs. **Sam Carrick** co-led the team in goals (4) with Kerdiles, while **Spencer Abbott** led the team in assists (5). 
