PLEASE NOTE: Any of the above information is subject to change. Please reach out to a member of the Chicago Sky's Public Relations department with any questions. The following information is courtesy of the WNBA.

There will be no in-person media interviews at WNBA games or practices. We will continue to evaluate this policy during the season and adjust as the circumstances around the national health situation dictate.

Zoom is the mandatory platform for virtual media availabilities as it enables us to share most efficiently to the NBA content network. Teams will coordinate all virtual media availabilities, including developing the link, sharing the link with media and moderating the sessions at both practices and games.

In order to facilitate league-wide media coverage, Team PR will send zoom media availability information no later than 4 PM ET daily to Sam Tager, stager@nba.com. Combined team media availability information will be sent out to media the night prior.

GENERAL MEDIA AVAILABILITIES

Practice Days Media Availability (Training Camp, Preseason, Regular Season)

Teams must allow their team content person and team photographer access to 10 minutes of practice to acquire "b-roll" and photos that will be shared as soon as possible on the NBA Content Network for use by NBA Entertainment as well as national and local media.

Teams must make their head coach and two pre-selected players, including at least one projected starter, available on a rotational basis during any practice day.

When on the road, teams are permitted to do these media availabilities at the team hotel if resources are not available at the practice site.

Teams should make best efforts to accommodate the player requests made by the media attending the virtual media availability.

Practice is defined as any time a majority of players take the court for a non-game day workout with the head coach present.

If a team is not routinely practicing, the NBA Communications department will work with the team to determine on which off-days the team must have availability, even if they do not practice.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Game Day Shootaround/Arena Walkthrough

For shootaround/arena walkthrough, teams must make two players available, including at least one projected starter, available on a rotational basis to media prior/after the team's shoot-around. When on the road, teams are permitted to do these media availabilities at the team hotel if resources are not available at shootaround site. Teams should make best efforts to accommodate the player requests made by the media attending the virtual media availability. Shootaround/Walkthrough is defined as any time a majority of players take the court on gameday with the head coach present.

Pregame Media Availability

The head coach for both teams must be available via a virtual press conference before the game. The home coach will be available 75 minutes prior to the game and the visiting coach 60 minutes prior.

Postgame Media Availability

After a 10-minute cooling off period, both head coaches – first one, then the other – will make themselves available to the media via virtual press conference.

Following the head coaches, teams will additionally provide a minimum of three (3) players, including two (2) starters, individually to media through the pre-scheduled Zoom call.

Post-game player media availabilities will run concurrently and be moderated by Team PR, zoom links will be issued to media following the calls.

Specific requests can be made directly to the Team PR Director and teams should make best efforts to accommodate those requests.

Both home and visiting teams will have one virtual interview room available to their team at the arena.

ONE-ON-ONE INTERVIEWS

As mentioned above and until communicated otherwise, there will be no in-person interviews between the media and WNBA team or league personnel. All interviews may only be done virtually or by phone.

Teams are encouraged to facilitate virtual one-on-one interviews that are typically coordinated at practices and games (ie., beat reporters, national columnists and writers, national and local broadcast partners, etc.)

Team content staff will be permitted to conduct in-person interviews at practices and games, subject to all existing Health & Safety protocols, as long as general media is provided opportunities with similar level players for one on ones virtually or by telephone.

In-game and walk-off interviews will be permitted for local and national broadcast partners. These interviews should either be touch-less or with headsets per the WNBA's Cleaning and Sanitizing Guidelines. For local broadcasts, please work with your individual RSNs on processes. For national broadcasts, WNBA Broadcasting will help facilitate the exact process from site.

NETWORK TALENT/SHOOTAROUNDS

Until further notice, teams are not required to open game day shootarounds to network television talent, provided that the team makes its head coach and as many as two key players (as requested by the talent) available via zoom interviews specifically with the talent.

MICHAEL ALTER



PRINCIPAL OWNER

As President Michael Alter is responsible for all planning and operations of The Alter Group, named NAIOP's 2010 Developer of the Year. He is also a Board member of Be The Change Inc., a non-profit dedicated to organizing campaigns to create opportunity, empower veterans and promote national service; a Trustee of Robert Morris University of Chicago; and the Board Chair of LEAP Innovations, the new leading non-profit connecting innovation and education.

Most recently, Michael has been committed to the advancement of opportunities for women in professional athletics. In 2005, he brought the WNBA to Chicago as the Principal Owner of the Chicago Sky. The Sky clinched their first playoff berth in team history on August 23, 2013 and their first WNBA Finals appearance on September 3, 2014.

Michael holds a Bachelor of Arts in Government from Harvard University; a Doctor of Jurisprudence from the University of Chicago; and an Honorary Degree from Knox College.

JOHN ROGERS JR.



OWNER

John W. Rogers, Jr. is Founder, Chairman, Chief Executive Officer and Chief Investment Officer of Ariel Investments. Headquartered in Chicago, the firm offers six no-load mutual funds for individual investors and defined contribution plans as well as separately managed accounts for institutions and high net worth individuals.

After working for 2 years as a stockbroker at William Blair & Company, LLC, John founded Ariel Investments in 1983 to focus on undervalued small and medium-sized companies. Patience served as the cornerstone of a disciplined approach that still drives the firm today.

John's passion for investing started when he was 12 years old when his father bought him stocks, instead of toys, for every birthday and Christmas. His interest grew while majoring in Economics at Princeton University. In addition to following stocks as a college student, John also played basketball under Hall of Fame coach Pete Carril. He was captain of Princeton's Varsity Basketball Team his senior year. There, Carril's courtside lessons on teamwork profoundly shaped his views of entrepreneurship and investing.

Early in his career, John's investment expertise brought him to the forefront of media attention, including being selected as Co-Mutual Fund Manager of the Year by Sylvia Porter's Personal Finance magazine as well as an All-Star Mutual Fund Manager by USA TODAY. Furthermore, he has been highlighted alongside legendary investors Warren Buffett, Sir John Templeton and Ben Graham in the distinguished book: The World's 99 Greatest Investors by Magnus Angenfelt. A sought after market commentator and speaker, John is regularly featured and quoted in a wide variety of financial broadcast and print publications.

Beyond Ariel, John is a board member of Exelon, McDonald's, The New York Times Company and serves as trustee to the University of Chicago. Additionally, he is a trustee of Rush University Medical Center and a life trustee of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra. Nationally, John is a member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and a director of the Robert F. Kennedy Center for Justice and Human Rights.

In 2008, John was awarded Princeton University's highest honor, the Woodrow Wilson Award, presented each year to the alumni whose career embodies a commitment to national service. Following the election of President Barack Obama, he served as co-chair for the Presidential Inaugural Committee 2009, and more recently, he joined the Barack Obama Foundation's Board of Directors.

JAMES WADE

GENERAL MANAGER / HEAD COACH

James Wade is in his third season as the General Manager and Head Coach of the Chicago Sky. He was hired as the team's sixth head coach in November of 2018.

Throughout his first three years in Chicago, Wade has turned the franchise into a major destination among the WNBA player landscape, most recently by recruiting future WNBA Hall of Famer Candace Parker to the Sky in the offseason.

Wade has the most wins by any Chicago Sky coach throughout his or her first two seasons (32) and is the only coach in franchise history to have a winning percentage above .500 through two years (.571). He led the Sky to a historic offensive season in 2020, breaking the all-time record for highest field goal percentage in a single season.

During his first season in Chicago, Wade helped the Sky reemerge as a contender in the WNBA. The team earned its first 20-win season in three years and Wade was named as the league's Coach of the Year. The Memphis, Tennessee native is the first coach of the Sky to win the coveted award.

Wade spent two seasons as an assistant under Head Coach Cheryl Reeve of the Minnesota Lynx before joining the Sky. He was a part of the staff that brought home a fourth WNBA championship to Minneapolis in 2017. Prior to his time with the Lynx, Wade worked with current Seattle Storm coach Dan Hughes' staff with the San Antonio Stars from 2012-16.

Prior to becoming a coach, Wade played across Europe for 13 seasons with stops in the United Kingdom, France, Russia, Spain, the Czech Republic and Belgium. He is a dual citizen of the United States and France. Wade played collegiately at Middle Tennessee State, Chattanooga State and Kennesaw State University, where he graduated in 1998. Wade is married to former San Antonio Stars guard Edwige Lawson-Wade. They have one son, James III.

Assistant Coach

Olaf Lange begins his second season in the Chicago Sky organization after joining the team in December 2019.

The Berlin, Germany native brings more than 25 years of experience to the coaching staff in Chicago. His coaching career began in 1995 where he worked as an assistant for BTV 1846 Wuppertal in Germany. The club won the FIBA EuroLeague Championship in 1996. As a result of his efforts, Lange was promoted to Head Coach in the following season.

Lange most recently worked as an Assistant Coach with the Australian Women's National Basketball team, where the Opals qualified for the Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games.

Before his tenure in Australia, Lange served as the Head Coach of UMMC Ekaterinburg for six years (2012–18). During his final season with the team, he worked alongside current Sky Head Coach and General Manager James Wade. Over the course of his time in Russia, the club won five consecutive league championships and two FIBA EuroLeague titles.

Lange has been affiliated with the WNBA since 2007, with his first stint coming with the now-relocated San Antonio Stars as an Assistant Coach. While Lange was on that staff, the Stars earned their first and only trip to the WNBA Finals in 2008.

Following his time in San Antonio, Lange has since worked as a consultant for multiple WNBA franchises, including the Phoenix Mercury and Los Angeles Sparks.

EMRE VATANSEVER

Assistant Coach

Emre Vatansever joined the Chicago Sky in May of 2018 and was named as a Player Development Coach.

Vatansever has been around professional basketball for more than a decade. He served as the Senior Team Assistant Coach for Turkish powerhouse Galatasaray SK women's team for six seasons (2008-14). During his tenure in Istanbul, the club won the Turkish Women's Basketball League once, the Turkish Cup four times and the Turkish Super Cup on two occasions.

He moved to the Seattle Storm as an advanced scout in 2015, and also works currently as an assistant for Yakin Dogu University's (located in Northern Cyprus) Women's Basketball Team.

Vatansever graduated with a bachelor's degree in Sports Science and Basketball Coaching from Marmara University in Istanbul.



ANN CROSBY

Strength and Conditioning Coach/Basketball Operations Director

Ann Crosby has worked in the Chicago Sky organization since the team's founding in 2006. She is the team's longest tenured employee and is in her 16th season.

Crosby joined the Sky with nearly two decades of experience as an independent strength and conditioning consultant for professional athletes. Prior to working with the Sky, Crosby was the head strength and conditioning coach for all 18 University of Illinois at Chicago athletic teams for three years. She has a multitude of experience working at other major collegiate programs such as Georgia Tech and Northwestern University as well.

Originally drafted by the Washington Mystics with the seventh overall pick in the 2016 WNBA Draft. Appeared in 153 career games, making 37 starts over the course of her first five seasons...22 of those 37 starts came in the 2020 WNBA season...Averaging 7.9 PPG (.437 FG%, .353 3P%, .775 FT%), 2.7 RPG, 1.0 SPG.

Appeared in each game of the 2020 season, making 22 starts
Was one of three Sky players to start in every game (Vandersloot, Quigley)
Averaged career-highs in PPG (14.8), RPG (5.5), SPG (1.0) and APG (2.1)

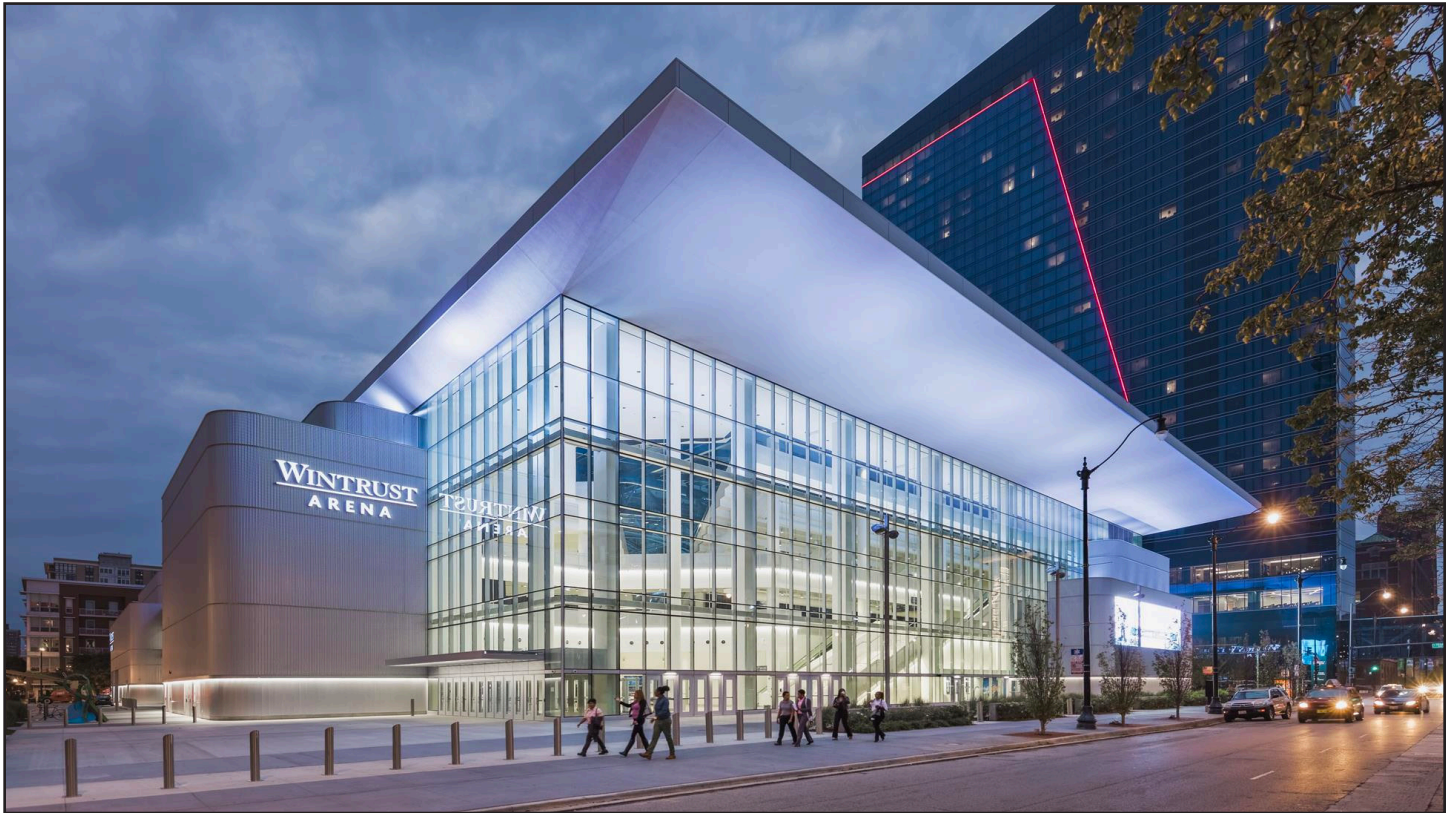

Designed by the internationally-renowned architecture firm Pelli Clarke Pelli, the new building is unique from an architectural standpoint complementing McCormick Place and the surrounding area.

The Wintrust Arena is a multi-purpose venue for concerts, sporting events, general session hall for business meetings and conventions as well other major special events. With 10,000 seats and 22 state of the art suites, the Wintrust Arena can accommodate a myriad of events. Featuring a first-class NCAA basketball court that is the new home court for DePaul University Men's and Women's basketball teams. The Arena also serves as the home for the WNBA Basketball team the Chicago Sky.

Part of a vibrant and walkable urban experience for convention goers, the Wintrust Arena is located in the heart of McCormick Square, making it a prime tourism destination for local residents and visitors alike. The arena serves as a further catalyst for economic development of the historic Motor Row along South Michigan Avenue and other surrounding neighborhoods.

PARKING

Parking Lot A (2301 South Prairie Avenue, Chicago, IL 60616)

Parking Lot A (8' height clearance) is a six level garage with 2,100 parking spaces located on Martin Luther King Drive, adjacent to the West Building. Covered walkways from Lot A leading directly into McCormick Place and the Hyatt Regency McCormick Place Hotel also provide added convenience. The parking rate is \$25 for up to 16 hours and \$38 from 16 to 24 hours.* There are no in-and-out privileges. Overnight parking is available in Lot A only. Lost tickets will pay the \$38 (overnight) fee per day.

Parking Lot B (3050 South Moe Drive, Chicago, IL 60616)

Parking Lot B (also known as 31st Street Lot) is an outdoor surface parking lot located at 31st Street near Lake Shore Drive South and Moe Drive. It holds over 1,800 vehicles. The parking rate is a flat fee of \$16 per day with no in-and-out privileges.* This parking lot is open throughout event hours. Overnight parking is not available.

Parking Lot C (Fort Dearborn Drive, Chicago, IL 60616)

Parking Lot C (6'4" height clearance) is an underground garage with 1,900 parking spaces and is located on Ft. Dearborn Drive, adjacent to the Lakeside Center. The parking rate is a flat fee of \$25 per day with no in-and-out privileges.* This parking lot is open throughout event hours. Overnight parking is not available.

Prepaid Parking

A limited number of prepaid guaranteed parking spaces are available at the rate of \$38 per day by advance order. Parking spaces are guaranteed even if lots fill to capacity.

Franchise Establishment (2005-06)

- Late NBA Commissioner David Stern announced in February of 2005 that the basketball-rich city of Chicago would welcome a new franchise to the WNBA. Alter Group President Michael Alter was awarded with ownership.
- The Chicago Sky's home would be UIC Pavilion (now known as Credit Union 1 Arena), located in the Near West Side of Chicago.
- Two-time NBA Champion Dave Cowens was named as the team's first head coach and general manager.
- The Sky's colors of blue and yellow were deemed to convey a picturesque Chicago day mixed with the sun's rays and natural beauty shining off of Lake Michigan toward the iconic city skyline.
- On November 16, 2005 the Sky announced the selection of 13 players to join its roster through an expansion draft. The selections were [*indicated a restricted free agent, meaning Chicago had the right to match any offer the player received for that upcoming season]:

SKY TEAM HISTORY: KEY DATES

Inagural Season (2006)

- **Candice Dupree** was selected sixth overall in the 2006 WNBA Draft by the Sky, making her the first draft choice in franchise history. The Temple alum is a seven-time WNBA All-Star.
- The Sky played its first game as a franchise on **May 20, 2006**. It came on the road against the Charlotte Sting, where the team emerged victorious with a nailbiting 83-82 final. Dupree led the Sky with 19 points off the bench in her league debut.

First Offseason

- **December 12, 2006-Glenn “Bo” Overton** was named as the team’s new head coach and general manager.
- **April 4, 2007**-Chicago selcted Ole Miss shooting guard **Armintie Price Herrington** with the No. 3 overall pick in the 2007 WNBA Draft.
- The Sky selected 2006 WNBA All-Rookie Team member **Monique Currie** with the top pick in the dispersal draft of the Charlotte Sting.

Quick Turnaround In Year No. 2 (Summer 2007)

- The Sky **improved its win total** by nine games from its inagural season, coming up just short of making the playoffs.
- **June 29-Jia Perkins scores 39 points and adds 10 assists** as part of the Sky’s 92-84 victory over the Sacramento Monarchs.
- **Armintie Price Herrington** was named as the league’s **Rookie of the Year**, averaging 7.9 points per game and starting in all 34 apperances.
- **Candice Dupree** earned her second consecutive All-Star apperance.

SKY TEAM HISTORY: KEY DATES

Season No. 3: Fine Tuning (2008)

- **March 12**-Former Assistant Coach **Steven Key** was named as the newest head coach and general manager of the Chicago Sky.
- **April 9**-2008 SEC Player of the Year **Sylvia Fowles** was picked second overall by the Sky in the 2008 WNBA Draft. Despite being injured for most of her rookie season, Fowles was named to the 2008 Summer Olympics team in Beijing and the league All-Rookie Team.
- Eight of the Sky's 12 victories came in front of fans at UIC Pavilion.
- **Fowles finished as the leading scorer** for Team USA (13.4 points per game).

Momentum Building (2009)

- **April 9**-Recent (and now two-time) **WNBA Champion Kristi Toliver** was selected third overall by the Sky in the 2009 WNBA Draft.
- The Sky began the season by **winning six out of its first nine games**. Candice Dupree and Jia Perkins finished as the leading scorers for eight of those tilts.
- **June 23-Six players on the Sky**, including Perkins and Dupree, recorded double-figure scoring totals in a 99-98 victory over the Atlanta Dream in overtime.
- **July 25-Dupree, Perkins and Sylvia Fowles** earned trips to the 2009 WNBA All-Star Game, with Dupree and Fowles named as starters. The Sky tied with Seattle Storm for **most players represented (3)** by team in the mid-summer tilt.
- Chicago finished with what was at the time a franchise best 16-18 record in the regular season.
- The Sky continued to defend home court well, going an impressive 12-5 at UIC Pavilion.

'In Good Hands' (2010)

- **The Sky moved** its home venue to Allstate Arena in the Chicago suburb of Rosemont, Illinois. It is the longest-used home arena for the franchise thus far (2010-17).
- **April 8**-Rutgers University product and Russian citizen **Epiphanny Prince** was selected by the Sky with the fourth pick overall in the 2010 WNBA Draft.
- **June 5**-**Sylvia Fowles dominates** against the Tulsa Shock with a 32-point, 13-rebound double-double while shooting 12 of 16 from the floor.
- **Fowles** was named as the WNBA Eastern Conference Player of the Week twice (**May 29 & June 26**).
- **September**-Prince named to the 2010 WNBA All-Rookie Team after averaging an impressive 9.8 points per game.
- **September 13**-Fowles earns her first **All-WNBA First Team** and **All-WNBA First Defensive Team** appearances.
- **October**-Former LSU head coach **Pokey Chatman** assumes the role as the fourth head coach and general manager of the Chicago Sky.

'Hungary' For More (2011)

- **April 11**-Current star guard **Courtney Vandersloot**, a dual citizen of the United States and Hungary, was selected by the Sky No. 3 overall in the 2011 WNBA Draft.
- **June 4**-Vandersloot makes her WNBA debut in the season opener, posting a **team-high seven assists** against the Indiana Fever.
- **July 19**-**Sylvia Fowles, Epiphanny Prince and Vandersloot** were named as reserves for the 2011 WNBA All-Star Game. It was the second time in three years that the Sky had three players named to the game, and also the second time where Chicago tied for having the most players represented in the game (3).
- Fowles continued her dominance as one of the best centers in the Eastern Conference, earning Player of the Week honors on **three occasions** (July 11, August 8 and August 22).

SKY TEAM HISTORY: KEY DATES

- **September 1**-Fowles wins the WNBA Eastern Conference Player of the Month for August.
- **September 11**-Fowles finishes the season averaging 20 points and 10.2 rebounds per game, making her just the **second player in league history** to average 20 points and 10 rebounds per game in a season.
- **Fowles was named as the league's Defensive Player of the Year, earned her first All-WNBA second team honor and second All-Defensive First Team honor while Vandersloot was named to the All-Rookie Team.**

Endless Talent (2012)

- The Sky acquired a slew of veterans to join their talented young side, including three-time WNBA Champion **Swin Cash**, two-time WNBA Champion **Le'Coe Willingham**, WNBA legend **Ticha Penicheiro** and former WNBA Finals MVP **Ruth Riley**.
- Chicago opened the season **winning seven of eight games**. Epiphanny Prince and Sylvia Fowles finished as the team's leading scorers for the first eleven contests of the season.
- Prince went on a tremendous stretch in June, scoring **at least 30 points in three consecutive comeback victories** to keep the winning streak alive.
- Shortly after, Prince suffered a foot injury that ultimately dropped the Sky's chances for success drastically. Following her return, Fowles went down with a knee injury and was forced to miss nine games, which put a huge damper on the team's offensive production.
- Prince finished with 18.1 points per game, good for fourth in the league. She topped Candice Dupree as the Sky's **all-time steals leader**.
- Fowles again averaged a double-double (16.2 points and 10.4 rebounds), and also became the franchise's **all-time leading scorer (2,140 points)**. She earned her second consecutive All-WNBA second team honor.
- Fowles and Cash represented the Sky on Team USA at the 2012 Summer Olympics in London, winning a gold medal.

Legends Arrive At The Perfect Time (2013)

- **March**-Current star guard **Allie Quigley** signs with the Sky in free agency, returning to Chicago for the first time since she played collegiately at DePaul University.
- **April 15**-In what was an extremely top-heavy draft, the Sky selected two-time WNBA MVP **Elena Delle Donne** with the No. 2 overall pick.
 - The Delaware product made an immediate impact on a side already full of veterans. She became the **first rookie to lead All-Star Voting, averaged 18.1 points per game (first among rookies and fourth in the league) and was the unanimous selection for WNBA Rookie of the Year.**
- **May 31**-**Sylvia Fowles sets a franchise-record 22 rebounds** against Connecticut.
- **June 24-July 7**-Delle Donne wins **back-to-back Player of the Week awards**, and also was named as the league's **Rookie of the Month for June.**
- **July 8-14**-Fowles was named as the **Eastern Conference Player of the Week.**
 - The Sky posted another impressive start to the season by going 12-5 heading into the All-Star break. Delle Donne joined Epiphanny Prince and Fowles in the game. Once again, Chicago had three players represented at the league's prized exhibition showdown. However, Delle Donne did not play in the game due to a concussion. Prince tied for an Eastern Conference team-high 15 points in front of a crowd of over 9,000 in Connecticut.
- **August 2**-With Delle Donne still sidelined due to a concussion, Fowles led the way in the first game after the All-Star break with **a dominating 32-point, 15-rebound double-double in a win over Washington.**
- **The rest of August**-The Sky finished with a 9-3 record for the month, and **clinched the franchise's first playoff berth on August 23.**
- **August 31**-The Sky finish with the best record in the Eastern Conference, going **24-10 overall and owning a tremendous 14-3 record at Allstate Arena.**
- **September**-Fowles wins her second **WNBA Defensive Player of the Year** and earned her second **All-WNBA First Team** recognition. Delle Donne wins league **Rookie of the Year** and makes her first **All-WNBA Second Team.**

SKY TEAM HISTORY: KEY DATES

Expect The Unexpected (2014)

- **March**-The major move of the offseason for the Sky was signing free agent **Jessica Breland**, who became a key contributor to Chatman's side and **was named to the 2014 WNBA All-Star game**. The North Carolina product finished the season with a career-high 9.7 points per game, starting 32 of 32 games in which she appeared.
- **April 14**-The Sky selected North Carolina State center **Markeisha Gatling** with the No. 12 overall pick in the 2014 WNBA Draft.
- **May 16**-Chicago opened the regular season against Indiana, emerging victorious by a score of 74-71. **Elena Delle Donne wasted no time** getting into the swing of things by scoring 23 points while **Breland impressed in her Sky debut with a double-double**.
- The Sky would go on to win four of its next five outings, which gave the team a 5-1 start.
- Following the strong start, injuries would once again play a factor in the team's success. Sylvia Fowles missed the first 13 games of the season after having to recover from hip surgery during the offseason, and Delle Donne was forced to miss an extended period of the season due to battling Lyme disease. She played in only three games between the end of May and the All-Star Game. In addition, Courtney Vandersloot sat out for 15 games with a sprained MCL.
- **July 19-Breland drops six points and snatches 12 rebounds in 22 minutes of play in the WNBA All-Star Game**. Despite hardly playing up to this point, Delle Donne was still named to the game as well. However, it was the second straight year where she did not participate because of an injury.
- After a 7-5 stretch over the final 12 games of the season, the Sky finished at 15-19 overall and were tied for the fourth and final spot in the Eastern Conference playoffs with the New York Liberty.
- Chicago won the head-to-head tiebreaker (beating New York on four occasions) that proved to be critical in the team's long-term goals for this season.

SKY TEAM HISTORY: KEY DATES

Late August-September

- The **patented duo of Vandersloot and Allie Quigley** both recieved major honors after carrying the team in the regular season. Quigley earned her **first WNBA Sixth Woman of the Year** after averaging 11.2 points per game and shoorting nearly 40% from three. Vandersloot finished as the **league's leader in assists** for the first time in her career, averaging 5.6 per game.
- **August 22**-In Game 1 of the playoffs against the top-seeded Atlanta Dream, **the Sky made history by recording the team's first-ever postseason victory (80-77). All five starters for the Sky reached a double-digit scoring total.**
- **August 26**-In a do-or-die Game 3, **the Sky came back from a 17-point deficit in the fourth quarter to win the game by a score of 81-80 and advanced to the Eastern Conference Finals.** Delle Donne hit the eventual series' winner with eight seconds remaining to complete the near-improbable comeback.
- **September 1**-After dropping Game 1 in Indiana, the Sky kept the series alive in a two-overtime thriller which was made possible by forward **Tamera Young's game-tying shot** with one second left in regulation. Fowles continued to be a force for Chicago offensively, recording a team-high 27 points in addition to nine rebounds and three blocks.
- **September 3**-Despite having to return back to a hostile enviornment in Indiana for a spot in the WNBA Finals, **the Sky rode the momentum from Game 2 into Game 3 with a decisive 75-62 victory. Quigley scored a team-high 24 points in 26 minutes of play off the bench, helping the Sky reach the WNBA Finals for the first team in franchise history.**

WNBA FINALS

- **September 12**-With the Sky on the brink of elimination against arguably one of the best teams in WNBA history (Phoenix's 29 wins from this year set a league record), Chicago put together one of its best performances from a historical season. Delle Donne, Fowles and Quigley registered 23, 20 and 19 points, respectively, which put the Sky in a position to win and force a Game 4. Unfortunately, the superstar duo of Diana Taurasi and former Sky forward Candice Dupree answered the call, each scoring 24 points and adding five and six assists, respectively. The Mercury ended up winning 87-82 and won the series in three games.

A Record-Setting Year (2015)

- **February**-The Sky acquired veteran guard and Chicago native **Cappie Pondexter** from the New York Liberty in exchange for Epiphanny Prince.
- **June 5**-Prior to opening night against Indiana, the Sky revealed the franchise's **first banner to hang in the rafters of Allstate Arena-2014 WNBA Eastern Conference Champions**. Chicago capped off the start of the season with a dominant performance led by Elena Delle Donne, who scored 31 points in the 95-72 rout.
- **June 6**-Delle Donne follows up her strong season debut with a **then-career-high 40 point performance** against the Tulsa Shock.
- **June 24**-Delle Donne continued to dominate just about anyone that came in her way, scoring a career-high 45 points and career-high six blocks against the Atlanta Dream in front of a sellout crowd. She shot 19-for-19 from the free throw line, the third most made in a game in WNBA history.
- **July 1**-Delle Donne wins the **Eastern Conference Player of the Month for June** after averaging 28.7 points per game over a 10-game stretch, the most by any WNBA player in her team's first 10 games.
- **July 14**-Delle Donne finishes as the leader for the Eastern Conference in All-Star voting ballots for the second straight year and as the overall league-leader in votes too (18,034). It was the second time in three years she led the entire WNBA in voting.
- **July 25**-Pondexter joined Delle Donne as the two representatives from the Sky in the 2015 WNBA All-Star Game.
- **July 27**-Chicago acquired veteran center **Erika de Souza** from the Atlanta Dream in a three-team trade that sent Sylvia Fowles to the Minnesota Lynx.
- **September 13**-The Sky end the regular season with the **second best record in the Eastern Conference (21-13), and make the playoffs for the third consecutive year**. Chicago once again was terrific at defending home court, finishing with an **Eastern Conference best 13-4 record at Allstate Arena**.

SKY TEAM HISTORY: KEY DATES

- **September 16-Delle Donne**, who recorded the fifth-highest scoring average in WNBA history that season, (23.4 points per game) became the Sky's first-ever league MVP. She was one vote from a unanimous decision (38 of a possible 39 first-place votes).
- **September 17-Allie Quigley** wins her second consecutive WNBA Sixth Woman of the Year. **Delle Donne** and **Courtney Vandersloot** win WNBA Peak Performer Awards for scoring and assists, respectively.
- **September 21**-After taking Game 1 of the Eastern Conference Semifinals in Chicago, the Sky were eliminated by Indiana despite a **40-point effort from Delle Donne** and **Vandersloot registering 14 assists in the decisive Game 3**.
- **October 8-Delle Donne** named as an unanimous selection to the **All-WNBA First Team**, **Vandersloot** named to her first **All-WNBA second team**.
- Chicago became the only team in WNBA history to record more than 200 blocks in three different seasons. The Sky broke its own record for team blocks in a season with 227. It also set a league and franchise record for lowest turnovers per game in a season (12.09).

Legitimate Contenders (2016)

- **April 14**-Texas center **Imani Boyette** joined the Sky as the 10th overall pick in the 2016 WNBA Draft.
- **May 24-Erika de Souza** passes **Tammy Sutton Brown** for **19th all-time in WNBA history for career rebounds**.
- **June 21-Cappie Pondexter** named to the **WNBA Top 20@20 Presented by Verizon**. Pondexter was recognized among 19 other players from the league's first 20 seasons as one of the most influential and greatest to be on and off the court. **Elena Delle Donne** and **de Souza** also made the group of 60 involved with the list.
- **July 1-Delle Donne** registered her **600th career point** during a 28-point performance in a victory over Washington.
- **End of July-Most of August-The Sky** sent three players to the **2016 Summer Olympics in Rio**. Delle Donne and the United States took home the gold medal while de Souza and Clarissa Dos Santos represented the host nation of Brazil.

2016, Cont.

- Following the Olympics, the Sky went on a four-game winning streak that pushed the team to two games over .500 (15-13).
- **September 7**-Delle Donne suffers a season-ending thumb injury against Washington.
- **September 11**-Cappie Pondexter surpasses WNBA legend Lisa Leslie for fifth on the league all-time scoring list (6,312 points).
- **September 19**-Chicago finishes the season with a 18-16 record, which allowed it to secure the fourth seed in the restructured WNBA playoffs. It would be the fourth consecutive season that the Sky would play postseason basketball.
- **September 25**-In a one-game tilt against the Atlanta Dream in the second round, the Sky exploded offensively for a 108-98 win. **The Sky set a league postseason record for most points scored in a quarter after the 37-point eruption in the opening frame. Courtney Vandersloot led the team in points (21) and rebounds (13).**
- **September 29**-Boyette was named to the WNBA All-Rookie team after receiving 10 out of 11 possible votes. She finished second among rookies in rebounds (5.6 per game) and blocks (1.4 per game.)
- **October 4**-The Sky lost in four games to the eventual 2016 WNBA Champions Los Angeles Sparks. **Vandersloot had a game-high 17 points in Chicago's 70-66 victory in Game 3.**
- **October 14**-Delle Donne was named to the All-WNBA First Team for the second consecutive season after posting an average of 21.5 points per game and shooting just under 94% from the free throw line.
- **December 6**-The Sky hired former Los Angeles Sparks Assistant Coach Amber Stocks as the team's new head coach and general manager.

A New Core Is Formed (2017)

- **January 30**- The Sky traded Elena Delle Donne to the Washington Mystics in exchange for current star center **Stefanie Dolson**, guard **Kahleah Copper** and what turned out to be center **Alaina Coates** from South Carolina in the April draft with the No. 2 overall pick. The Sky also selected **Tori Jankoska** with the ninth pick overall.

SKY TEAM HISTORY: KEY DATES

A New Core Is Formed (2017) Cont.

- The Sky began the season without three key veterans in **Courtney Vandersloot** and **Allie Quigley**, both of whom were playing overseas, and **Jamierra Faulkner**, who was injured.
- **July 16-Dolson** wins the Eastern Conference Player of the Week.
- **August 7**-Vandersloot wins the Eastern Conference Player of the Week.
- **Quigley** posted career-highs in points (16.4 per game) and assists (3.6 per game) while shooting over 50% from the floor. She represented the Sky well during the All-Star festivities in Seattle, **winning the three-point contest and making her first appearance in the game.**
- **Vandersloot** set multiple records including the highest assists average in a season (8.1 per game) and most points/assists double-doubles in a row with six. In addition, she posted career-highs in points (11.5 per game), rebounds (3.7 per game), field-goal percentage (51.6%), three point shooting (38.2%) and minutes per game (30.3).
- Thanks to the production from **Vandersloot** in the assist department, **the Sky set a new WNBA record for most helpers in a season (718).**
- Newcomer **Dolson finished as the team's leading scorer** at 14.5 points per game, which remains her career-high. She joined Quigley in Seattle at the All-Star Game and received an invite to the USA Women's National Team training camp.

Back To The City (2018)

- **February 2-Former Chicago Mayor Rahm Emanuel formally announced the Sky's return to the city with the opening of Wintrust Arena in the South Loop. The Sky also announced a partnership with University of Chicago Medicine as the official medical provider and sponsor of the franchise.**
- **April 12**-The Sky owned back-to-back picks in the 2018 WNBA Draft (No. 3 and No.4 overall), and selected guard **Diamond DeShields** from Tennessee and forward **Gabby Williams** from Connecticut.
- **July 17-Allie Quigley** named to the WNBA All-Star Game for the second consecutive season.

SKY TEAM HISTORY: KEY DATES

- **July 28-Quigley** wins the WNBA All-Star Three Point Contest for the second consecutive season.
- **August 14-DeShields** drops a career-high 28 points, the highest scoring regulation performance by a rookie in the Sky's history.
- **August 20-Courtney Vandersloot** wins the WNBA Peak Performer Award for assists for the second consecutive season after recording a WNBA-record 8.6 assists per game. In addition, she broke the league record most assists in a season with 258.
- **James Wade was named as the sixth general manager and head coach of the Chicago Sky on November 13. He remains in the position today.**

SKY TEAM HISTORY: KEY DATES

Returning To The Playoffs (2019)

- Prior to the All-Star break, the Sky had won five out the six previous games and owned an 11-8 record. The lone loss during this stretch came at the hands of the Minnesota Lynx, and only by a point.
- **July 15 - Diamond DeShields, Quigley and Vandersloot were named as reserves to the 2019 WNBA All-Star Game.**
- **July 26 - DeShields wins the 2019 WNBA All-Star Skills Challenge, beating out her teammate in Vandersloot among other league stars.**
- **August 7 - Chicago set an WNBA record for most points in a quarter (42)** since the league moved to a four-quarter format in 2006.
- **August 26 - Vandersloot** wins the WNBA Eastern Conference Player of the Week.
- **September 8 - The Sky finish with a record of 20-14, qualifying for the playoffs for the first time since 2016. The team improved its win total by seven games from 2018.**
- **September 9 - Vandersloot wins her third consecutive Peak Performer Award for assists after setting a league single-season record for assists with 300.**

About: The Women's National Basketball Association, or WNBA, is a professional basketball league that has 12 teams featuring the best women's basketball players in the world. Founded on April 24, 1996, the WNBA's first season began in 1997. The 2021 season marks the 25th in league history.

When the WNBA began, it had eight teams: Charlotte Sting, Cleveland Rockers, Houston Comets, New York Liberty, Los Angeles Sparks, Phoenix Mercury, Sacramento Monarchs and Utah Starzz.

Now, there are 12 teams – six in each conference. The conferences are divided between the Eastern Conference and the Western Conference. It is organized as follows: Atlanta Dream (Eastern Conference), Chicago Sky (Eastern Conference), Connecticut Sun (Eastern Conference), Dallas Wings (Western Conference), Indiana Fever (Eastern Conference), Las Vegas Aces (Western Conference), Los Angeles Sparks (Western Conference), New York Liberty (Eastern Conference), Minnesota Lynx (Western Conference), Phoenix Mercury (Western Conference), Seattle Storm (Western Conference) and Washington Mystics (Eastern Conference).

History: On April 24, 1996, women's basketball announced "We Got Next" as the NBA Board of Governors approved the concept of a Women's National Basketball Association (WNBA). For 25 years, the WNBA has featured some of the most exciting moments in professional sports and has been powered by the game's best players. Take a look back at some of the key people, players and moments that have shaped the league to what it is today.

Timeline:

April 24, 1996: The NBA Board of Governors approves the concept of a WNBA and Women's basketball announces "We Got Next."

August 7, 1996: Val Ackerman is named first president of the WNBA.

October 23, 1996: Houston Comets forward Sheryl Swoopes becomes the first player signed by the WNBA.

October 30, 1996: WNBA announces eight teams to compete in the inaugural season – Charlotte, Cleveland, Houston, Los Angeles, New York, Phoenix, Sacramento and Utah.

January 22, 1997: The league's first 16 players are separated into teams, a group composed of Olympians and collegiate stars.

April 19, 1997: Spalding and the WNBA introduce the league's official game ball during WNBA Pre-Draft Camp at Disney's Wide World of Sports complex in Orlando.

June 21, 1997: The New York Liberty and the Los Angeles Sparks tip-off the first WNBA game at the Great Western Forum in Los Angeles. Sparks guard Penny Toler scores the league's first basket at 19:01. New York defeats Los Angeles, 67-57.

August 30, 1997: The Houston Comets become the first WNBA Champions, as star Cynthia Cooper and a top-notch defense performance help the Comets record a 65-51 victory over the New York Liberty at The Summit.

October 1, 1997: Franchises in Detroit and Washington join the WNBA as expansion teams for the 1998 season.

April 22, 1998: The WNBA announces expansion teams in Orlando and Minnesota will be added for the 1999 season. This brings the total number of teams to 12.

July 18, 1998: Houston's Cynthia Cooper becomes the first player to reach 1,000 career points during the Comets' 75-44 win against the Sacramento Monarchs.

April 29, 1999: The WNBA and WNBPA come to a final accord as the league's first Collective Bargaining Agreement is signed.

June 7, 1999: WNBA announces the addition of four expansion teams for the 2000 season – Indiana, Miami, Portland and Seattle. The league now boasts 16 teams in major cities across the United States.

July 27, 1999: Sheryl Swoopes notches the WNBA's first triple-double with 15 points, 14 rebounds and 10 assists in an 85-46 win over Detroit at the Compaq Center.

August 25, 2000: Cleveland Rockers guard Suzie McConnell Serio is named the recipient of the first Kim Perrot Sportsmanship Award presented by American General. This award is named in honor of Houston's Kim Perro.

August 26, 2000: Cynthia Cooper turns in a clutch performance to earn her fourth WNBA Finals MVP as the Houston Comets claim their fourth straight title by defeating the New York Liberty. The series marks Cooper's last appearance in the WNBA Final and Cooper retires as the WNBA's all-time scoring leader.

"As we look to celebrate the first 25 years of the league, we are also setting the stage for the next 25 years. The WNBA's new distinctive 25th season logo and Count It campaign signify what makes the league unique," said WNBA Commissioner Cathy Engelbert in a press release distributed by the WNBA. "We are celebrating a quarter of a century of the impact the WNBA has made on sports and society, and on generations of young and diverse athletes."

The commemorative logo will be displayed on the courts, jerseys and game ball.

"We are thrilled to launch a new narrative around the upcoming WNBA season that is rooted in defying expectations and excelling in the face of adversity," said Phil Cook, WNBA Chief Marketing Officer. "The WNBA's 25th Season logo signifies that the league isn't done 'Counting' achievements because there are countless more to come. The advisory board consists of iconic retired WNBA players, including four-time WNBA champion and four-time WNBA finals MVP Cynthia Cooper, WNBA champion and founder of Electra Beverages Fran Harris, two-time WNBA champion and three-time MVP Lauren Jackson, two-time WNBA champion and three-time MVP Lisa Leslie, WNBA All-Star and current ESPN reporter and analyst, Rebecca Lobo, four-time WNBA champion and three-time MVP Sheryl Swoopes, four-time WNBA champion and current University of Minnesota Women's Head Coach Lindsay Whalen and Teresa Weatherspoon, five-time WNBA All-Star and New Orleans Pelicans Assistant Coach. Additional advisory board members are Val Ackerman, Commissioner of the Big East and the WNBA's founding President, Carol Stiff, ESPN Vice President of Programming and Acquisitions, and Rick Welts, President and Chief Operating Officer of the Golden State Warriors, 1998 Marketer of the Year for his assistance launching the WNBA and a member of the Basketball Hall of Fame's Class of 2018.

WNBA Social Justice

Established in the lead up to the 2020 season, the WNBA Justice Movement is the platform through which the league will continue to lead important work in the community to combat racial and gender inequality, promote advocacy for LGBTQ+ rights, and champion reform in systems where injustice persists. These collaborative efforts, led by the WNBA/WNBPA Social Justice Council, represent a continued commitment to advancing social justice and being a driving force of necessary change. During the 25th season, The Justice Movement will celebrate the league's history of advocacy across a variety of societal issues.

WNBA Commissioner's Cup

The WNBA's 25th season also marks the debut of the WNBA Commissioner's Cup, an innovative and multi-faceted competition platform. A "competition within a competition" that features player prize pools, the Commissioner's Cup is comprised of 10 designated regular season games per team and culminates in a championship game between the two teams atop the standings in each conference. Uniquely, the Commissioner's Cup platform also convenes fans, players, and partners in local communities for conversations and programming centered on equality and social justice. The Commissioner's Cup Championship Game will take place following the Olympic break as an exciting jumpstart to the resumption of WNBA regular season action. Additional information about Commissioner's Cup will be forthcoming.

2021 WNBA KEY DATES

Included are the key dates for the 2021 WNBA season. Due to the ongoing pandemic and the Olympic break, instead of the originally planned 36 games, the 2021 regular season has WNBA teams play 32 games – 16 at home and 16 on the road. Additionally, each team will play three games apiece versus 10 opponents, and two games – one home and one away – against one team from the opposite conference. All dates are subject to change.

Specifics on Zoom Conferencing will be detailed at a later date and distributed to media and teams.

1. Non-Game Days

Media will receive a tentative schedule prior to media availabilities throughout each week of the season from Team PR, subject to change.

Head Coach and pre-selected players on a rotational basis will be available on any practice day.

Additional specific player requests can be made directly to the Team PR Director.

2. Game Day Shoot-arounds

Media will receive a tentative schedule prior to media availabilities throughout each week of the season, subject to change.

The Head Coach will not be mandated to do shoot-around media availability.

Specific requests can be made directly to the Team PR Director

Two or three players will be made available to media prior to or after the team's shoot-around.

3. Pre-game Media Availability

Media will receive a tentative schedule prior to media availabilities throughout each week of the season, subject to change.

The Head Coach for both teams will be available pre-game via Zoom Conferencing: the home team coach will be available 75 minutes prior to the game and the visiting team coach 60 minutes prior to the game, in each case, subject to change.

There is no required media availability for players pre-game.

Specific requests can be made directly to the Team PR Director.

4. Post-game Media Availability

No later than 10 minutes following the game, both team head coaches will be available through a pre-scheduled Zoom call.

Following each coach's media availability, teams will provide a minimum of three additional players individually to media through the pre-scheduled Zoom call.

Post-game media availabilities will run concurrently and be moderated by Team PR; Zoom links will be issued to media following the calls.

All media shall abide by all other WNBA rules, regulations and policies throughout the season, including, without limitation, the WNBA Policy for Online Use by Media, which governs the media's online use of non-game footage and game and non-game photographs (including the media availability and other content contemplated herein), and is accessible to media via WNBA Media Central.

2021 WNBA SEASON RESTART VIRTUAL MEDIA OUTLINE

The following is in place for media access for the 2020 WNBA Season Restart, which is tentatively scheduled to be held at the IMG Academy in Bradenton, Florida. With the fluid situation resulting from the pandemic, the main priority remains the health and safety of players and others on site. Due to the limited operational space at the game (and other) venues, along with the health and safety plan developed by league medical staff, as of now the WNBA has restricted in-person access to players, coaches and essential team and league staff, and all media access and interviews will take place virtually (e.g., virtual press conferences) via Zoom Conferencing (or such other virtual meeting platform determined by the WNBA).

The league will continue to review the appropriate health and safety protocols and adjust throughout the season if needed.

ACCESS PLANS FOR VIRTUAL MEDIA ATTENDANCE:

- Throughout the season, no media credential application is necessary.
- Prior to the start of the season, during the Training Camp portion of the season, each WNBA team will conduct an individual virtual media day during which players and coaches will be made available via Zoom Conferencing. Schedule will be distributed at a later date.
- Throughout the season, shoot-around, pregame and postgame media availabilities will be done virtually.
- Following media availabilities, video files will be archived and posted on WNBA Media Central, and player quotes and video files will be distributed by Team PR to media.
- Additional specific player and coach media interview requests can be sent directly to Team PR.
- Media members will receive a tentative schedule of media availability sessions throughout each week of the season from Team PR, subject to change.
- The league and teams encourage media to continue to access WNBA Media Central throughout the season as the main hub for media information, including player quotes.
- WNBA will provide select WNBA game action photos to media following each game, details of which will be distributed at a later date.
