MEDIA INFORMATION

AMERICAN AIRLINES ARENA: The American Airlines Arena mailing address is 601 Biscayne Boulevard, Miami, FL 33132. It is located just north of Port Boulevard and Bayside Marketplace and east of Biscayne Boulevard across from a Miami landmark, the Freedom Tower. Arriving via I-95, take 395 east to the Biscayne Boulevard exit, make a right at the light and the arena will be on your left.

AMERICAN AIRLINES ARENA MEDIA GATE: Media covering a HEAT game in the AAA should enter the building through the Command Center, located at the southwest corner of the building (off Port Boulevard) next to the loading dock in the TV truck bay. This is where credentials can be picked up. The credential gate opens three and a half hours prior to the scheduled start of the game.

THE ROBES PATTON MEMORIAL PRESSROOM: The media workroom, named in memory of late HEAT beat writer Robes Patton, is located near the northwest corner of the building. Upon entering the media gate, proceed to the left past the court entrance and the Robes Patton Memorial Pressroom will be on your left. Admission to the workroom is granted with a HEAT game credential or NBA season pass only. There is a working area where media can file stories and will be provided with game information. Team statistics, news releases, media guides, game notes and out-of-town scores are available in the Robes Patton Memorial Pressroom.

AMERICAN AIRLINES ARENA LOCKER ROOMS: The HEAT locker room, as well as the visiting team's locker room, is located off the same hallway as the Robes Patton Memorial Pressroom. Making a left out of the Robes Patton Memorial Pressroom or Media Dining Room, the visiting team locker room is located on the right (behind the visiting team bench) on the North side of the building. Continue down the hallway, past the post-game interview room, as it wraps around to the right, the HEAT locker room is located on your left (behind the corner by the HEAT bench). As per NBA policy, access to the locker room is strictly limited to pre- and post-game only to media with appropriate credentials. Those credentials are limited only to media working the game. No still cameras or cell phones are allowed in the HEAT or visitors locker rooms.

HEAT INTERVIEW PROCEDURES: Access to HEAT players is pre- and post-game only in accordance with NBA directives. Both the HEAT and visitors locker rooms will open 90 minutes prior to the scheduled start time of each game for a period of 45 minutes and will close 45 minutes prior to the scheduled start time. Media members are prohibited from entering the HEAT Training Room, Weight Room or Player Lounge. The HEAT Sports Media Relations Department is available to assist with pre-game interviews. HEAT Head Coach Erik Spoelstra will hold a pre-game press conference 105 minutes prior to the scheduled game time (5:45PM for a 7:30PM game) in the post-game interview room. After the conclusion of games and the NBA mandated "cool down" period, HEAT players are available for media interviews. These sessions are conducted inside the team locker room and valid HEAT credentials with locker room access are required for admittance. HEAT Head Coach Pat Riley is available to the media in the post-game interview room, located down the hall from the HEAT locker room.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Photographers work from assigned positions at each baseline and under the baskets. The sidecourt space in front of the scorer's table and on the opposite sideline, is off limits, except for television camera crews approved by the NBA. Photographers must remain stationary and stay on the apron along each baseline, at least four feet off the court at all times. Photographers are also not allowed to shoot from the Upper Press Level or public walkways. Under no circumstances are flash-bulbs permitted during games. In accordance with NBA rules and to reduce the risk of injury to players, rubber lens shades are REQUIRED for all still photographers, broadcasters, news and entertainment video and film crews who are authorized to shoot NBA games. Any requests for strobe equipment at HEAT games must come to Rob Wilson at the HEAT Sports Media Relations Department for approval. There is limited availability for strobes and if approved will cost the media outlet \$250 per game.

PARKING: The HEAT has a limited amount of media parking available, both on a season and single-game basis. Media parking is sold at a reduced rate of \$10 per game and the media parking lot is located across the street at Bayside Marketplace. Media members in need of parking should contact the HEAT Sports Media Relations Department with as much advance notice as possible to assure a spot in the media parking lot. In addition to the media parking lot, there are 15,000 parking spaces within a 15-minute walk of the AAA.

TELEPHONE/INTERNET/ISDN: The HEAT provide a limited number of complimentary phones and phone lines for the media to use in the Robes Patton Memorial Pressroom with the availability coming on a first-come, first-served basis. Wireless internet is available in the work room, but not in the arena bowl. Media outlets wanting their own dedicated lines, hard wired internet or ISDN lines should order them online at: www.heatlife.com/phonelines, or contact Tony Cobra at 786-777-1216.

AUTOGRAPHS: Seeking autograph items or souvenir items from players or coaches is strictly prohibited and subject to forfeiture of credential. Media members are also prohibited from taking personal photos with players or coaches.

AMERICAN AIRLINES ARENA ACCESS: To reiterate, media personnel need HEAT game credentials or NBA season passes for access to American Airlines Arena, as well as the Robes Patton Memorial Pressroom, Media Dining Room, courtside, the locker rooms and interview areas. Credentials are non-transferable. It is the media outlet's responsibility to follow up with a call to confirm the request has been received and approved.



In 14 years as managing general partner of the Miami HEAT, Micky Arison has guided the franchise to unprecedented heights, including bringing South Florida its first NBA championship in 2006.

As the leader of the most successful cruise operation in the world, the 59-year-old Arison and his family have always been involved with the team. Although his father, Ted, brought the NBA franchise to South Florida in 1988, it has only been since Micky took control in 1995 that the HEAT has evolved into one of the NBA's top organizations.

Arison, who was elected Chairman of the NBA Board of Governors in October 2005, brought to the HEAT the same standard of excellence that propelled Carnival Corporation & plc into a global vacation leader. One of Arison's first moves was to dramatically re-shape the franchise by hiring Pat Riley, one of the NBA's all-time winningest coaches, as Miami's President.

Arison and Riley acquired franchise cornerstones Alonzo Mourning, Tim Hardaway, Dwyane Wade, and Shaquille O'Neal. They also strengthened their roster by making a blockbuster 13-player trade, the largest in NBA history, in which they acquired James Posey, Jason Williams and All-Star Antoine Walker, all key cogs in Miami's title run.

Together, Arison and Riley have built an organization that is considered one of the NBA's elite and most competitive franchises. In addition to winning the 2006 NBA championship, with Arison and Riley at the helm Miami has made the playoffs in 11 of the last 14 seasons, winning seven division titles, one Eastern Conference championship and advancing to the Eastern Conference Finals three times.

Arison showed his commitment to the fans of South Florida when he worked successfully with Miami-Dade public officials to keep the heart and soul of the HEAT in downtown Miami. The result of his diligence was an innovative public-private partnership that together built the county-owned state-of-the-art AmericanAirlines Arena that fans enjoy and the HEAT calls home.

Arison grew up in the cruise business and spent the better part of two decades learning it from the ground up before becoming chairman in 1990. Arison followed his education with a two-year stint in the Carnival Cruise Lines sales department. He became reservations manager in 1974, and took over the post of vice president of passenger traffic in 1976, succeeding to the presidency in 1979. In 1990, he was appointed chairman of the company's board of directors.

In 1987, the company went public, generating \$400 million for future expansion. As Carnival continued its growth through the traditional avenue of new ship construction, Arison also sought to expand the company's cruise operations by entering new market segments of the industry.

In 1989, Arison engineered the acquisition of the venerable Holland America Line, giving Carnival entry to the premium segment of the cruise industry. Arison also led the company's effort in the acquisition of ultra-luxury leader Seabourn Cruise Line, as well as Cunard Line, operator of the largest ocean liner in the world, the 150,000-ton Queen Mary 2, and Costa Cruises, Europe's number one cruise company.

Arison also spearheaded Carnival Corporation's acquisition of P&O Princess Cruises, one of the most recognizable names in travel, in a deal valued at approximately \$8.2 billion. The combined Carnival/Princess group, named Carnival Corporation & plc, is the largest cruise operator by far, operating 89 ships totaling 171,000 lower berths. The Carnival/Princess entity is truly a global vacation leader with its stock trading on both the New York and London exchanges.

Under his direction, Carnival Corporation & plc has grown into the largest, most successful cruise operator in the world. Arison's keen attention to marketing and growth priorities has also increased revenues from approximately \$600 million in 1988 to more than \$14.6 billion in 2008.

Today, as chairman and CEO of Carnival Corporation & plc, he oversees diversified travel and tourism holdings, including a portfolio of cruise ships serving virtually every market segment -- from contemporary to ultra-luxury -- as well as leading tour operators and hotel chains in Alaska and the Yukon Territory.

The Arison family and Carnival Corporation & plc is devoted to South Florida and over the years has supported a variety of arts-related and community service organizations.

Organizations supported by the Arison family and Carnival include the New World Symphony, National Foundation for Advancement in the Arts, Miami Children's Museum, Jackson Memorial Foundation, Miami City Ballet, Miami Art Museum, American Red Cross, Big Brothers/Big Sisters, United Way, Community Partnership for Homeless and many others.

Arison's contributions to the cruise industry have been recognized by a wide range of international organizations. He has been named an "Officer of the French Legion of Honor" -- the country's highest civilian honor -- by French President Jacques Chirac, received a honorary doctorate in naval architecture from the University of Genoa, and has been awarded the Decoration of Commander, First Class, of the Order of the Lion of Finland by the President of the Republic of Finland.

He has also been awarded the insignia of "Onorificenza al Merito della Repubblica Italiana" by the President of Italy, which confers that country's highest title on a civilian.

Completing his 14th season with Miami, HEAT President and now Hall of Fame inductee Pat Riley earned one of the highest praises bestowed upon an individual in the NBA on September 5th, in only his first year of consideration, when he was enshrined with the class of 2008 into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame.

Riley has established a standard of excellence within the franchise, both on and off the court that has allowed the team to reach unprecedented heights and has positioned it as one of the most successful in the NBA. Never was that more evident than when Riley guided his group of "15 Strong" to the franchise's first NBA championship in Dallas on June 20, 2006. After the game, Riley commented that he had packed one suit, one shirt and one tie for the trip to Dallas, what he brought back to Miami was one championship, fulfilling a vision he spoke about when arriving in Miami in 1995.

When he returned to the sidelines for his second stint as the HEAT head coach on Dec. 12, 2005, after a two-year hiatus from the bench where he concentrated on building the team from the front office, many experts questioned whether the Miami team that he assembled was capable of reaching the NBA's ultimate destination. Six months later the answer was a resounding "yes", as Riley had successfully navigated the HEAT to the pinnacle of the basketball world and added more luster to a legacy and resume that did not need further validation.

Riley's resume is filled with many milestones during an NBA career that spans 40 years as a player, assistant coach, head coach, administrator and broadcaster and has produced seven NBA championships. He has compiled a 1,210-694 (.636) all-time record guiding the Los Angeles Lakers, New York Knicks and the Miami HEAT during a 24-year head coaching career that is one of the most impressive in all of sports. His 1,210 regular season victories trail only Lenny Wilkens and Don Nelson on the NBA's all-time list. His 171 postseason victories rank second in NBA history, just eight behind Phil Jackson. His 282 postseason games coached rank first all-time in the league. His five NBA championships as a head coach tie him with John Kundla for the third highest total in NBA history. Riley has averaged 50 wins per season in his coaching career. His 1,904 games coached rank fifth all-time in the NBA, his .636 winning percentage in regular season play place him sixth in league history and his .606 postseason winning percentage is the 10th best all-time in the league annuals. As a result of his many accomplishments, in 1996-97 as the NBA celebrated its 50th Anniversary, Riley received one of the highest honors for an NBA coach when he was named one of the Top 10 Coaches of All-Time by a panel of media who regularly cover the league. Simply put, Riley is a winner.

No matter the odds, "getting the job done" has never been a problem for a person who has seen winning from all angles. As a youthful role player for the 1971-72 Los Angeles Lakers, Riley earned the first of his seven NBA championship rings. He claimed another as an assistant under Lakers coach Paul Westhead in 1979-80. The New York native collected four more titles for the Lakers as the team's top man in 1982, 1985, 1987 and 1988. Eighteen years later, he guided the HEAT to their first NBA Championship, his fifth as a head coach. The 18-year span between championships as a head coach established an NBA record. His teams have advanced to the NBA Finals nine times and the Conference Finals on 12 occasions. As a head coach, he has captured 18 divisional championships, nine conference championships and five NBA titles. He has been honored as the NBA Coach of the Year on three occasions, the only coach in NBA history to receive the award with three different teams. Riley has also captured NBA Coach of the Month honors a league-record 11 times. His 21 total postseason appearances as a head coach are tops in league history, two more than Hall of Fame coach Red Auerbach and his string of 19 consecutive postseason appearances as a head coach from 1982-2001 set a league record for consecutive postseason appearances. Riley has also served as a head coach in nine NBA All-Star games.

In his illustrious career, Riley has guided his teams to at least 50 wins in a season an NBA-record 17 times, three more than the closest coach in league history. He also has registered an NBA-record seven 60-win seasons, accomplishing the milestone with each of the three franchises he guided. When he began the 2000-01 season with an Opening Night victory over intrastate rival Orlando on November 1, he became the fastest coach or manager to reach 1,000 wins in the history of the four professional sports in North America. Not only did Riley break the record, he smashed the mark previously held by Fred Clarke of the Pittsburgh Pirates, bettering it by an astonishing 144 games. Riley recorded his 1,000th victory in just his 1,434th game. On Nov. 25, 2006 with a 102-93 victory in Charlotte, he became the only head coach in NBA history to record at least 400 victories with two different franchises. Riley currently stands as the all-time leader in both regular season and postseason victories for both the Lakers and the HEAT.

Always recognized as one of the league's best coaches, Riley continues to work his magic in the front office as well. During his tenure leading the HEAT, he has brought excitement to the organization by managing to pull off some of the biggest blockbuster trades in the NBA. Those trades have netted the HEAT All-Stars Shawn Marion, Shaquille O'Neal, Alonzo Mourning, Tim Hardaway and Eddie Jones. Riley also made trades to acquire talented players Brian Grant, Jamal Mashburn and Anthony Mason who all made big contributions to the HEAT's success. Prior to the 2005-06 season, he once again made headlines throughout the league as he helped engineer the largest trade in NBA history, a five-team, 13-player blockbuster, in which the HEAT obtained All-Star forward Antoine Walker from Boston and point guard Jason Williams and swingman James Posey from Memphis, all key contributors in the HEAT's first NBA championship.

He has also used the free agent market to help build the HEAT into a championship team. Riley made a big splash in free agency in the summer of 2003 when he signed Lamar Odom, who went on to enjoy his finest NBA season before becoming the centerpiece in the trade to acquire the then 11-time All-Star O'Neal. Riley has also added solid veterans in P.J. Brown, Dan Majerle, Terry Porter, Damon Jones, Michael Doleac and Gary Payton through the free agent route. Additionally, he has supplemented the roster over the years by signing unheralded free agents Malik Allen, Rafer Alston, Isaac Austin, Bruce Bowen, Udonis Haslem and Yshon Lenard. Using every option available to him, Riley has also added quality youth to the team through the successful drafting of Daequan Cook, Dwyane Wade, Caron Butler, Dorell Wright and Wayne Simien. It's moves like these that have bolstered Riley's reputation as being a shrewd judge of talent, helping the HEAT maintain a standard of excellence unparalleled within the NBA.

With all the big moves Riley has made to shape the HEAT, the most important trade he was involved with might very well have been the one that delivered him to Miami. Looking to change the face of an organization in its infancy, and become a solid contender year after year, HEAT Managing General Partner Micky Arison agreed to send a first-round draft pick and \$1 million dollars to the New York Knicks on September 1, 1995 for the rights to Pat Riley. One day later, Riley was named the team's fourth head coach and team president. From that point, the face of the organization changed. Riley brought with him star power, a proven track record, professionalism and results. Since he arrived in 1995, the HEAT has compiled a 566-468 (.547) record, the eighth best mark in the NBA over that 13-year span and the third best in the Eastern Conference. Miami has made 10 postseason appearances since his arrival and its seven division titles in the last 13 seasons are tied for the most in the NBA. With him came a winning culture that was lacking and now the HEAT is recognized as one of the hardest working, most respected organizations throughout the NBA.

During his first stint guiding the HEAT, Riley led Miami to 354 victories and four division titles over an eight-year period. His teams captured four consecutive Atlantic Division championships from 1996-2000, a mark of dominance not seen in the Atlantic Division since the Celtics had won five straight division titles from 1983-88. Riley, Miami's all-time leader in games coached with 849, has compiled a 454-395 record (.535 winning percentage) during his 11 seasons on the sidelines in South Florida and guided the HEAT to eight playoff

appearances and 34 postseason victories. Prior to his arrival the franchise had compiled a 205-369 (.357) mark, with one winning season, two playoff appearances and two postseason wins in its first seven years. Upon his arrival, Riley turned the fortunes of the franchise around. Through his tireless work ethic he has transformed the Miami HEAT into one of the premier franchises in all of professional sports.

Certainly regarded as one of the league's top coaches of all-time, Riley added to his legacy in the 2000-01 season when, in addition to earning his 1,000th career victory, he turned in what many experts claim was one of the best coaching jobs of his amazing career. After re-working the roster in the summer of 2000 by acquiring three-time All-Star Eddie Jones and hard-working power forward Brian Grant to make a run at a possible championship, Riley had to guide the franchise through one of the biggest jolts in its history. On October 16, in the middle of the pre-season, Alonzo Mourning, the team's centerpiece, announced that due to a kidney disease (focal glomerulosclerosis) he was expected to miss the entire season. After Miami received the devastating news most experts predicted the HEAT season was over and that they would not make the playoffs. But Riley, as he has proven throughout his career, demonstrated his ability to adapt and lead. He guided the HEAT to a 50-32 record for a second place finish in the Atlantic Division and the third best record in the conference. All this despite the fact he had to constantly re-make his team's line-up as Miami would rack up a total of 283 missed player games due to injury, one of the highest totals in the NBA that season. In addition to Mourning, key contributors Jones, Hardaway and Majerle were all saddled with injuries during the season.

The Hall of Fame coach guided the HEAT to one of its most successful seasons during the 1999-2000 campaign. Riley led Miami to a 52-30 mark and its fourth consecutive Atlantic Division crown. In the process he guided the HEAT to the Eastern Conference Semifinals after recording the franchise's first playoff sweep, a 3-0 Opening Round triumph against the Detroit Pistons. That season also culminated a dream for the franchise as Riley ushered Miami into its beautiful new home, the AmericanAirlines Arena, a state-of-the-art downtown bayside arena. The HEAT christened the arena with an exciting overtime win in the inaugural game against Orlando on January 2, in a game which saw Miami erase a 10-point deficit in the final 2:33 of regulation.

The 1998-99 season saw the HEAT finish with a 33-17 overall record, capturing its third straight division championship in the lockout shortened season. The .660 winning percentage gave Miami the top seed in the Eastern Conference Playoffs for the first time in franchise history. Riley also set some lofty marks of his own during the season as he surpassed legendary coaches Dick Motta, Red Auerbach, and Bill Fitch to become the second winningest coach in NBA history before being subsequently passed several years later by Don Nelson.

The accolades kept pouring in during the 1997-98 season for the hard-working Riley. On March 1, he became the fifth coach in NBA history to win 900 games, doing it in 1,278 games, quicker than any coach in NBA history at the time, breaking Auerbach's record of 1,360. In addition, Riley was named February Coach of the Month after guiding Miami to a league-best 13-2 record. The team established a franchise-record for road wins in a month (nine) and the 13 wins and .867 monthly winning percentage both rank second in franchise history. On February 10, 1998, he became the winningest coach in HEAT history when Miami defeated Cleveland, 91-81, for HEAT win number 134.

In 1996-97, in just his second year with Miami, Riley guided the HEAT to the best regular season mark in franchise history and built the foundation for success that the organization has enjoyed ever since. He garnered a third NBA Coach of the Year honor with his third team, an unprecedented feat in league history, after leading Miami to a 61-21 (.744) record and the HEAT's first trip to the Eastern Conference Finals. The 60-win season was a first for Miami, but marked the seventh for Riley, who has won at least 60 games in a season with each of the three organizations he has coached. He guided Miami to its second consecutive Atlantic Division championship and exciting playoff series wins over Orlando and New York which each went the maximum number of games. He also earned the honor of being selected one of the Top 10 Coaches in NBA history as part of the league's 50th Anniversary celebration.

On the eve of his first season in Miami, Riley changed the look of the HEAT by designing a six-player trade that brought in Mourning, who became the HEAT's first All-Star that season. He sprang into action again on February 22, 1996, making three trades involving 10 players just hours before the trading deadline that cleared the way for future free agent signings and brought Hardaway to Miami, a player many believed was past his prime. Hardaway became a two-time All-Star during his stint with Riley and in 1996-97 was named to the backcourt with Michael Jordan on the All-NBA First Team.

Despite all the sweeping changes in 1995-96, Riley's first season in Miami was a success. The team finished 42-40, a 10-win improvement over the previous season, despite the fact a franchise-record 22 players appeared in at least one game that season for the HEAT. Miami excelled at what has become a Riley trademark: meshing as a team. The HEAT finished with an 18-11 mark after the trade deadline and advanced to the playoffs for just the third time in franchise history.

Before joining the HEAT, Riley spent four successful seasons as the head coach of the New York Knicks. Prior to Riley's arrival the Knicks had posted just four winning seasons in the previous 10 years (1981-91). During his four-year stint in New York, Riley guided the Knicks to four straight winning seasons, four consecutive playoff berths and compiled a 223-105 record. His .680 winning percentage is the best in Knicks history, easily outdistancing former assistant Jeff Van Gundy who ranks second (.590), and his 223 victories rank fourth on the club's all-time list. He recorded at least 50 wins in each of his four seasons in New York, the only time in Knicks history the team posted at least 50 wins in four consecutive years. The highlight of his career with the Knicks was leading them to the 1994 NBA Finals, New York's first trip to the Finals since the 1972-73 season. Riley's teams won three consecutive Atlantic Division titles in his first three years (1991-94) in New York, and his tireless dedication earned him his second NBA Coach of the Year honor in 1993. In his first year with the Knicks they improved by 12 victories over the previous season (from 39 to 51).

Prior to leading the Knicks, Riley was head coach of the Lakers for nine years and guided the team to four NBA titles and three other NBA Finals appearances during its glory years. After taking over for Paul Westhead 11 games into the 1981-82 season, he led the Lakers to the NBA Championship in his first season as a head coach in the league. Under Riley, the Lakers became the first NBA team to win 60 games in four consecutive seasons (1984-85 through 1987-88). He won the Pacific Division title in each of his nine years leading the Lakers and was honored as the 1990 NBA Coach of the Year. He compiled a 533-194 (.733) regular season record in his nine seasons in L.A. and won at least 50 games in each of the nine years. Riley, who averaged 59 regular season wins a season in L.A., brought "Showtime" to the Great Western Forum. Under Riley the Lakers recorded a 305-59 (.838) regular season mark at home. His teams also compiled a 102-47 (.685) postseason record. Both the 533 regular season wins and the 102 postseason victories rank first on the Lakers all-time list.

After leaving the Lakers, Riley served as co-host of "NBA Showtime" on NBC in 1990-91 before joining the Knicks in the fall of 1991. It was a return to the television booth for Riley who was Chick Hearn's partner on Lakers' broadcasts after his playing days ended (1977-79). He returned to the bench early in the 1979-80 campaign when Lakers' Head Coach Paul

Westhead asked him to become an assistant.

As a player, Riley had an extensive nine-year career. He was the 1967 first-round pick (seventh overall) of the San Diego Rockets for their inaugural 1967-68 season. After three seasons, he joined the Lakers' in 1970-71 and played five years. He was a member of the 1971-72 Lakers that won a then-NBA record 33 consecutive games and the NBA Championship. Riley finished his playing career with the 1976 Western Conference Champion Phoenix Suns.

Born in Schenectady, NY, Riley attended Linton High School where he became a two-sport star in basketball and football. He was a member of the Linton basketball team that beat historic Power Memorial High and center Lew Alcindor, who, as Kareem Abdul-Jabbar, would later lead Riley's Lakers to greatness. As a tribute to his accomplishments, Linton renamed its gym in Riley's honor in 1997 and inducted him into its hall of fame in 2000.

After turning down an offer to play football for Bear Bryant at Alabama, Riley decided instead to play basketball for Adolph Rupp at Kentucky from 1963-67. He was a collegiate star, earning team MVP honors three times and averaging 22 points per game on the Wildcats' famed "Rupp's Runts" squad that lost in the 1966 NCAA Finals to Texas Western. A gifted athlete, he was an 11th-round draft choice of the NFL's Dallas Cowboys in 1967 although he never played college football. His brother, Lee, played defensive back for the Detroit Lions, Philadelphia Eagles, and New York Giants of the NFL (1955-60) and for the New York Titans of the American Football League (1961-62). His father, Leon, was a major league catcher/outfielder with Philadelphia in 1944 and became a minor league manager in the Phillies' organization.

Along with his wife, Chris, Riley has been involved with numerous charity and community service projects throughout his career. They founded The Miami HEAT Family Outreach in 1997 which has raised over \$11 million for the South Florida community and whose primary beneficiaries include Jackson Memorial Foundation's Guardian Angels which supports the Holtz Center for seriously ill children, SafeSpace which is a domestic violence shelter for women and their children and the Miami Coalition for a Safe and Drug-free Community. They are also involved in the Pediatric AIDS Foundation's Kids for Kids organization which they started in 1992 in New York, and the YMCA in Los Angeles, New York, and Miami. For over 30 years the Riley's have been actively involved with Boys and Girls Clubs of America. As a result of his efforts, Riley has received many prestigious awards, including the Miami Project Sports Legend Award in 1992, Boys and Girls Clubs Miami Person of the Year Award in 1998, and was honored by the YMCA Miami in 1998.

Riley is not only one of professional basketball's winningest coaches, but his speeches before hundreds of corporations have earned him the title of "America's Greatest Motivational Speaker." He has been rated by Success Magazine as "The best in his field." Riley has also completed an award winning 30-minute motivational video entitled "Teamwork" in which he applies his winning philosophies to business and life in general. In addition to being one of the most sought after motivational speakers in the country, Riley has authored two books, "Show Time" and "The Winner Within". Pat and his wife, Chris, have two children, James Patrick, and Elisabeth Marie.

ASSISTANT TO THE PRESIDENT

Ed Maull completes his fifth season as a member of the HEAT organization and his fourth as Assistant to the President. In his current role, Maull assists President Pat Riley with the daily operations of the club and oversees all administrative areas of the Basketball Operations department, including the medical and athletic training services, team services, security, sports media relations and the charitable fund departments. Maull also serves as a liaison between all department heads within Basketball Operations and The HEAT Group.

A proven leader with a strong business background and acumen, Maull was a perfect fit when Riley decided to add a front office executive. Maull's contributions and assistance have proven to be invaluable as the HEAT organization continues to operate on a championship level both on and off the court.

Along with Riley, Maull worked on the intricate design of the HEAT Championship Ring, and helped to develop its merchandising plan. He also worked closely with architects and general contractors to help implement Coach Riley's vision of HEAT Championship Alley.

Prior to his current role, Maull held the position of Director of Pro/Minor League Scouting after joining the club in September 2004. His primary responsibilities were to scout NBA personnel and other pro leagues, including the NBDL, CBA and ABA and various summer leagues. In that position he worked closely with Riley, General Manager Randy Pfund and Vice President, Player Personnel Chet Kammerer evaluating potential prospects. He was also involved in the evaluation of collegiate prospects.

Maull, a native of Dayton, Ohio is a 1971 graduate of the University of Cincinnati where he played basketball under NBA veteran coach Lee Rose and Tay Baker. After graduation, Maull spent time with the NBA's Cincinnati Royals. Maull then spent the next 33 years in business, holding management positions for the Kroger Company of Cincinnati, Ohio, Southland Financial of Dallas, Texas, and for 25 years as Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of Timco, an Atlanta based company. While living in Atlanta, Maull devoted much of his time to various charities, schools, churches and civic work. He also served on the Board of Advisers at Presbyterian College in Clinton, South Carolina.

Maull and his wife, Jill, reside in Coral Gables. They have two children, Molly and Teddy.

ANDY ELISBURG

SENIOR VP, BASKETBALL OPERATIONS

Completing his ninth season as Senior Vice President, Basketball Operations, Andy Elisburg continues to assist HEAT President Pat Riley and General Manager Randy Pfund in the areas of salary cap management, league compliance and the day-to-day business of basketball operations.

Elisburg is a HEAT original, joining the franchise in its inaugural 1988 season. For the past 13 years, Elisburg has played an integral role in salary cap planning and basketball operations management, while overseeing the day-to-day operations at AmericanAirlines Arena.

With the challenges and the complexities in dealing with the league salary cap and luxury tax, Elisburg's knowledge and experience continues to be called upon to build on the team's unprecedented success, which has resulted in an NBA Championship, 11 postseason berths in the last 14 years, including a franchise-record six consecutive playoff appearances from 1996-2001, four consecutive Atlantic Division Championships from 1996-2000, the Southeast Division Championship in 2005, 2006 and 2007, and ranks for the ninth most wins (609 in the NBA (third most in the Eastern Conference) from 1995-2009. During the off-season, Elisburg assists Riley in maneuvering through the framework of the salary cap and the luxury tax to transform the roster, ensuring the HEAT maintains its status as one of the league's top teams.

Elisburg began the team's inaugural campaign as an intern in the public relations department before becoming a public relations assistant at the end of the season. He has served in many different capacities, including assistant director of public relations, director of team services and information, director of team operations and vice president, basketball operations.

A native of Potomac, MD, Elisburg served an internship with the Washington Bullets in the summer of 1988 before coming to the HEAT. He holds a degree in sports administration from St. Thomas University and was honored by his alma mater in June of 2004 with their first Leader for Life Award which goes to recognize an alumna/alumnus who has made a significant contribution to their chosen profession. Elisburg is single and lives in Miami.

NICK ARISON

VICE PRESIDENT, BASKETBALL OPERATIONS

Nick Arison completes his sixth year with the HEAT organization and his first as Vice President, Basketball Operations.

Arison joined the HEAT organization as a full-time staff member in 2003 as an Account Manager, Premium Partnerships. He was then promoted in 2006 to Director, Corporate and Premium Services where he oversaw the Account Management Team.

In addition to his responsibilities with the HEAT, Arison has served as a member of the United States Senior National Men's Team support staff since 2004. Arison assisted with the day-to-day operations for USA Basketball's bronze medal winning team at the 2004 Olympics, the bronze medal winning 2006 World Championship team, the 2007 gold medal winning FIBA Americas Championship team and the 2008 USA team that captured the gold medal in Beijing.

Prior to joining the HEAT, while attending Duke University, Arison spent four seasons as Team Manager of the Blue Devils men's basketball team and was named the Head Team Manager during his senior year. Over that span, Arison became the only Team Manager in ACC history to be a part of four-straight ACC Championships, including a 2001 NCAA National Championship.

In addition to his duties as Team Manager for the Duke men's basketball team, Arison interned with the HEAT during his junior year, serving internships in the Arena Operations, Community Affairs, Sales and Marketing departments. He also served as the HEAT's Team Attendant for four seasons from 1995 through 1999. Arison graduated from Duke with a degree in Public Policy.

Completing his 14th season with The HEAT Group and eighth at the helm of the organization as President, Business Operations, Eric Woolworth has made an indelible impression on both the Miami HEAT and AmericanAirlines Arena. His leadership has helped transform the organization and redefine its corporate identity into a customer service and sales driven machine that is among the elite in the sports and entertainment industry. Under Woolworth's direction the HEAT has been consistently recognized as an NBA leader in customer service, fan entertainment, marketing, sales, and Arena operations, and has become a recognized leader in the South Florida business community. Working side by side with Pat Riley, Eric's efforts have made the HEAT a first-class organization away from the court as much as it is on it.

The team's innovative fan-friendly and flexible renewal program compliments its very successful and often imitated season ticket holder "Buddy Program" and its in-Arena SMILE program aimed at exceeding a guest's expectations and creating an exciting experience at events. These initiatives have brought a high level of service and value to season ticket holders and guests, as well as a streamlined renewal and playoff payment process while introducing new and exciting benefits for loyal season ticket holders and other lucky fans.

Recognizing the power of database marketing, Woolworth turned the company's focus toward becoming an early adopter of this technology and quickly capitalized on it. In the past eight years, the HEAT has compiled one of the richest direct marketing databases in the NBA. The HEAT Group has become proficient in utilizing these powerful channels to deliver sales offers and news, now leads the NBA in terms of revenue derived from database marketing, and leverages these assets to support the marketing efforts of its ever-expanding corporate partner base.

Under Woolworth's guidance, The HEAT Group Business Operations division continues to garner accolades in a variety of disciplines within the division. Success stories for the 2007-08 season included winning the 2008 John I. Smith Award given by the Miami-Dade Coalition for Community Education for its HEAT Academy after school educational initiatives; having the HEAT broadcasting department, HEATV, the in-house production house for the Miami HEAT and Sun Sports, the exclusive broadcast partner of the HEAT, nominated for 10 regional Emmy Awards for excellence in programming and production; being consistently recognized by the NBA for its "Best Practices" in game operations, community relations, marketing and retail operations, as well as having the team website, HEAT.com, recognized during the 2008 NBA Sales & Marketing Meetings as one of the top three websites in the League. Additionally, the 2007-08 Season marked the third year the Miami HEAT Dancers were voted "The Most Popular Dance Team in the NBA" by basketball fans from around the world.

Woolworth's efforts have also firmly planted AmericanAirlines Arena on the map of elite venues, hosting such world-class events such as Madonna, Marc Anthony, Billy Joel, Eric Clapton, Paul McCartney, The Rolling Stones, U2, Luis Miguel, Hannah Montana/Miley Cyrus and many others that play before sold-out crowds. The Arena also secured the 2004 and 2005 MTV Video Music Awards, the first two times in the award show's history it was hosted outside of New York City or Los Angeles. Popular family shows that make annual stops at the Arena include classic favorites Disney On Ice, Wiggles, the Harlem Globetrotters and the RB&BB Circus.

Woolworth's primary responsibility consists of directing and overseeing all non-basketball aspects of the organization from Marketing and Community Affairs to Sales and Service, Human Resources, Merchandising, Finance, Publications, Event and Arena Operations, and more. His efforts have created a professional cutting edge atmosphere for both the employees and the customers.

Woolworth steadily climbed the ranks of The HEAT Group after first joining the HEAT as General Counsel in 1995 and a successful legal career in Washington, D.C. His business acumen and key role in the development of the AmericanAirlines Arena led to his promotion to President, Business Operations in January of 2001. He had served as interim President from August of 2000 to January of 2001.

Woolworth is a cum laude graduate of both Georgetown University and Georgetown University Law Center. He lives with his wife, Jocelyn, their son, Jackson, and their daughter, Cassidy, in Pinecrest. They generously spend their time and resources to assist the community, donating time to several charitable organizations including serving on the Boards of Big Brothers Big Sisters and the Children's Craniofacial Association.

Erik Spoelstra completes his first season as Head Coach of the Miami HEAT and his 14th within the HEAT organization. He finished with a team-best 43 wins for a first-year head coach, surpassing the record of 42 originally set by current HEAT President Pat Riley during the 1995-96 season and then matched by former head coach Stan Van Gundy during the 2003-04 campaign.

Guiding one of the NBA's youngest rosters, with four of the top seven players garnering only two years or less NBA experience, Spoelstra turned in one of the best coaching performances in the NBA this season, leading the HEAT to the greatest single-season improvement in franchise history. He took a 15-win team from last season and directed them to a 28-win improvement, marking the greatest single-season improvement ever in NBA history under a rookie coach, bettering the record of a 20-win improvement by former Chicago Bulls Head Coach Ed Badger during the 1976-77 season. It also marked the seventh-best single-season improvement in NBA history. In just his first season at the helm, Spoelstra led the HEAT to the 2009 NBA Playoffs, making Miami just the second team in NBA history to win 15 or fewer games one year and make the postseason the next, only the San Diego Rockets achieved that feat during the 1968-69 season. Ironically, Pat Riley, the person that elevated Spoelstra to his current post on April 28, 2008, was a member of that Rockets team.

Known for his game preparation and superb attention to detail as the HEAT's Assistant Coach/Director of Scouting, Spoelstra had the primary role of developing game plans for upcoming opponents for the past seven seasons. To that end, he coordinated the video staff and advance scouts while overseeing the development of scouting reports and videos.

Spoelstra, has earned the respect of players throughout the league and has also built a strong reputation as a teacher over the years by heading the HEAT's Individual Player Development Program. Erik has worked with many of the HEAT's young players in areas of fundamentals, skill development and shooting. He also served as the head coach of the HEAT's summer league squad for three seasons (2005-07).

Additionally, Spoelstra helped design and integrate a proprietary statistical database and scouting software for the HEAT. The HEAT continue to use the state-of-the-art statistical software to evaluate team productivity, individual player productivity and trends for both the HEAT and the team's opponents.

Spoelstra originally joined the HEAT as the team's video coordinator in 1995 where he spent two seasons preparing scouting tapes and developing the team's information technology for the coaching staff. He served as Assistant Coach/Video Coordinator the following two seasons (1997-99). He was then promoted to Assistant Coach/Advance Scout and served in that role for two seasons (1999-01) before being elevated to Assistant Coach/Director of Scouting.

Spoelstra entered the 2008-09 season as the NBA's youngest head coach, born on November 1, 1970 in Evanston, IL. He is 70 days younger than the second youngest head coach, Lawrence Frank of the New Jersey Nets.

A 1992 graduate from the University of Portland with a degree in communications, Spoelstra was the starting point guard for four years for the Pilots and was named the West Coast Conference Freshman of the Year. After college he spent two years as a player/coach for Tus Herten, a team in the professional sports league of Germany.

Spoelstra is the son of Jon Spoelstra, a long-time NBA executive who has guided the Portland Trail Blazers, Denver Nuggets and New Jersey Nets. His grandfather, Watson, was a Detroit Tigers beat writer for many years.

A native of Portland, Spoelstra resides in Miami.

BOB McADOO

ASSISTANT COACH

Bob McAdoo completes his 14th season as an assistant coach with the Miami HEAT. As a former NBA MVP, McAdoo works primarily with the HEAT big men and has been instrumental in developing their overall skills. He also works on a constant basis with all players to improve their shooting skills, while imparting the wisdom and knowledge derived from a 14-year NBA playing career. McAdoo is in charge of charting the team's offensive efficiency and focusing on the strengths and weaknesses of opponent's big men. He also served as the head coach of the HEAT's Summer League team in 2004.

McAdoo, generally considered the greatest shooting big man in NBA history, enjoyed a storied 14-year playing career in the NBA, which included three consecutive scoring titles from 1973-74 through 1975-76 — making him one of only six NBA players to accomplish the feat. He appeared in five consecutive All-Star games, where he averaged 17.6 points and 6.0 rebounds, as well as being named the NBA MVP in 1975. McAdoo received the game's greatest honor when he was elected into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame in 2000. Additionally, McAdoo ranks as the third youngest player in NBA history to reach the 10,000-point plateau, accomplishing the feat at 25 years and 148 days old, topped only by Los Angeles Lakers guard Kobe Bryant and Houston Rockets guard Tracy McGrady.

Over his career, "Mac" averaged 22.1 points and 9.4 rebounds while connecting on 50.3 percent of his field goal attempts, and has worked with many of the best in the business. In 1982, he was a member of Riley's first championship team with the Los Angeles Lakers. Former HEAT broadcaster and fellow Hall of Famer Dr. Jack Ramsay was McAdoo's first coach in Buffalo in 1972. His career also included tours with New York, New Jersey, Boston and Philadelphia. After finishing in 1986 with the 76ers, McAdoo played professionally in Italy (1986-92) where his teams went on to win the Italian Championship three times and the European Championships twice. Individually, he captured MVP honors in both the Italian League and European Championships. Additionally, he appeared in the first McDonald's Open in 1987, averaging 42 points in losing causes to the Milwaukee Bucks and Russian National team. In May of 2008 he was named as one of the 50 most influential personalities in European Club Basketball over the last half century. McAdoo was one of 35 players to receive that honor.

McAdoo's success began early in his career, as he earned the 1972-73 NBA Rookie of the Year award after averaging 18.0 points and 9.1 rebounds for the Buffalo Braves. In each of the next three seasons he averaged at least 30 points and 12 rebounds. McAdoo was an All-American at every level of play, starting in high school, and then at Vincennes JC, where he was a member of the JUCO national championship team in 1970. He also received All-America honors while playing at the University of North Carolina, where he helped guide the Tar Heels to a Final Four appearance. McAdoo also played for the United States in the 1971 Pan American Games.

Besides his accomplishments on the court, McAdoo was the basketball technical advisor for the 1993 motion picture "The Air Up There," starring Kevin Bacon. He also took part in the NBA Legends Tour to South Africa in 1993, which included a goodwill tour with NBA Commissioner David Stern and other players to promote the NBA. For his musical exploits on the alto saxophone, McAdoo was selected as a member of the North Carolina All-State High School band team. Rounding out his high school career, he was also the North Carolina High School high jump champion as a senior.

McAdoo and his wife, Patrizia, reside in Miami with their children Russell, Rasheeda, and Ryan. McAdoo's eldest son Robert III and daughter Rita live in New York, while their other son, Ross, lives in Miami.

KEITH ASKINS

ASSISTANT COACH

The 2008-09 season marked the ninth year that Keith Askins is a full-time assistant coach on the Miami HEAT coaching staff. Askins joined the coaching staff under Pat Riley as a volunteer assistant halfway through the 1999-00 season and was promoted to full-time status the following season. Askins, who served as an advance scout for the HEAT for two seasons (2000-02), works extensively with the HEAT's forwards. His primary duties include the development of Miami's players both during the season and in the off-season. He also is responsible for analyzing the strengths and weaknesses of opposing players.

Askins enjoyed a productive nine-year NBA career, one spent entirely with the HEAT organization. He still ranks among Miami's all-time leaders in games played (second), three-point field goals made (seventh), three-point field goals attempted (seventh), offensive rebounds (10th), steals (11th), blocked shots (11th), total rebounds (12th), defensive rebounds (13th), minutes (14th) and three-point field goal percentage (tied-17th). He also owns the seventh best single-season three-point field goal percentage mark in franchise history, connecting on a career-high 41.8 percent of his attempts during the 1995-96 campaign. Known for his aggressive play and long range shooting, Askins served as a captain for the HEAT four straight seasons from 1995-99 and captured the team's Leadership Award in both the 1994-95 and 1995-96 seasons.

Askins is also a former participant in the HEAT's TeamUp program, which prompts kids to become involved in community service, and was one of the team's most active community spokespersons during his career. In his free time, he enjoys golf, cigars, dominoes and music.

A graduate of the University of Alabama, Askins resides in Miami Lakes.

RON ROTHSTEIN

ASSISTANT COACH

A quick look at his resume will tell you that Ron Rothstein has enjoyed a great deal of success in all levels of the game of basketball from high school to the professional ranks. A resume which is highlighted by over 40 years in the game, Rothstein brings a wealth of experience and knowledge as he continues in his third stint with the HEAT organization. The 2008-09 season marked Rothstein's 29th season of involvement in the NBA. Beginning as a regional scout in 1979, Rothstein has served as a head coach twice in the NBA, an assistant coach with five different franchises, as a regional scout with three teams and also spent one season as an NBA television analyst. During his 21 years on an NBA bench his teams have captured an NBA title, five divisional championships, made 13 postseason appearances, highlighted by five Eastern Conference Finals appearances, two Eastern Conference championships and two NBA Finals appearances.

The 2008-09 season marked Rothstein's fifth as an assistant coach with Miami, but his ties to the HEAT organization are deep-rooted. He became the club's first Head Coach on July 12, 1988 and guided the HEAT through its start-up and first three seasons, increasing the team's victory total each year. He also served as General Manager and Head Coach of the WNBA's Miami SOL during its three-year history. He returned to the HEAT following one season as an assistant coach for the Indiana Pacers. Over the past two seasons, he stepped in as acting head coach while President and Head Coach Pat Riley underwent and recovered from hip replacement surgery and once again was called upon as Riley scouted collegiate tournaments, guiding the team to a 13-13 (.500) record over the span.

After his tenure as the HEAT's first Head Coach, Rothstein spent two seasons with the Detroit Pistons, first as color commentator for radio and television broadcasts and a Western Conference scout, then as the club's Head Coach for the 1992-93 season. In 1993, Rothstein became an assistant coach with the Cleveland Cavaliers under Mike Fratello, where he spent six seasons before making his return to South Florida to guide the SOL.

Rothstein began his NBA career in 1979 as the Northeastern regional scout for the Atlanta Hawks. In 1982, he moved to a similar position with the New York Knicks before becoming an assistant coach with the Hawks in 1983. After spending three seasons on the Hawks bench, Rothstein joined the Detroit Pistons coaching staff as an assistant in the summer of 1986.

Prior to joining the pro ranks, Rothstein enjoyed a successful coaching career at the college and high school level. He served as an assistant coach at Upsala College in New Jersey from 1974-75 and was selected the Westchester County Coach of the Year in 1979 while at Eastchester High School in New York.

Rothstein was a three-year starter on the University of Rhode Island basketball team and captain of the 1963-64 squad that finished 19-7 and tied Connecticut for the conference championship. After graduating from URI in 1964, Rothstein earned a master's degree from Hunter College in New York. He was inducted into the University of Rhode Island Athletic Hall of Fame in 1989 and was inducted into the Miami Sports Hall of Champions in 2005.

Rothstein and his wife, Olivia, reside in Miami and have two children. Their son David, lives in Miami with his wife, Patty, and their children, Aidan and Ava. Their daughter, Dana, also lives in Miami with her husband, Greg Brenner, and their children, Lucas and Hailey.

DAVID FIZDALE

ASSISTANT COACH

David Fizdale completes his first season as an assistant coach for the HEAT after serving the previous five seasons as an assistant coach for the Golden State Warriors and Atlanta Hawks. He began his professional career assisting in the HEAT's video room during the 1997-98 season. Among his responsibilities in his new role, he will be assisting in the areas of player development, scouting, game preparation and other duties assigned by Head Coach Erik Spoelstra.

Fizdale returns to Miami after spending four seasons (2004-08) as an assistant coach with the Atlanta Hawks where he played an instrumental role in the development of their young players. He helped the Hawks increase their win total in each of his final three seasons and during the 2007-08 season, they earned the franchise's first postseason appearance since 1999. He began his NBA coaching career as an assistant coach with the Golden State Warriors for one season (2003-04).

Directly before joining the Warriors, Fizdale worked as an assistant coach for one season at Fresno State University (2002-03) where his responsibilities included player development and serving as the school's recruiting coordinator. After concluding his collegiate playing career and spending one year as the HEAT's video intern in 1997-98, he began his coaching career with a four-year stint (1998-2002) as an assistant coach at his alma mater, the University of San Diego. During his final year with the Toreros he was the top assistant for coach Brad Holland. While at USD, he was in charge of scheduling, served as the recruiting coordinator and worked in player development and on-court coaching.

A three-year starter at point guard while playing at the University of San Diego, Fizdale was selected to the All-West Coast Conference team after his senior season in 1996.

A Los Angeles native, Fizdale earned a bachelor's degree in communications and a minor in sociology from San Diego in 1996. He is single and currently resides in Miami.

CHAD KAMMERER

ASSISTANT COACH

Chad Kammerer completes his first season as an assistant coach and his eighth year with the Miami HEAT. His responsibilities include assisting in the areas of game planning, scouting, player development and other duties assigned by Head Coach Erik Spoelstra.

Kammerer, who originally joined the organization on a part-time basis during the 2001-02 season, spent the previous six years as the HEAT's full-time advance scout. In addition to providing scouting reports and player evaluations to assist the HEAT coaching staff in their game preparations, Kammerer has also served as an assistant coach for the HEAT's summer league team the past four years.

Prior to joining the HEAT, Kammerer served as an assistant coach at Valparaiso University, the University of California at Los Angeles (UCLA), Concordia University (CA) and the University of Mississippi.

Kammerer graduated from Westmont College in 1990 with a degree in physical education and later went on to earn his masters degree at the University of Mississippi in 1993. He was born in Indiana and raised in California and is the son of HEAT Vice President, Player Personnel Chet Kammerer.

OCTAVIO DE LA GRANA

PLAYER DEVELOPMENT COACH/ADVANCE SCOUT

Octavio De La Grana completes his third year with the Miami HEAT and his first as Player Development Coach/Advance Scout. In this position, De La Grana is responsible for working with individual players in developing their game. He also serves as an advance scout, responsible for creating scouting reports of upcoming opponents.

Prior to joining the HEAT, De La Grana had a combined 18 years of head coaching experience at the high school level, including two stints at Florida Christian High School, where he led his team to the Class 2A State Championship in 1996. He also spent eight years as Head Coach of Westminster Christian High School's basketball team. In 2005, he reached his 400th high school coaching victory. During his tenure at Florida Christian, De La Grana also spent time as Florida Christian's Athletic Director (1990-95) and taught health and personal fitness courses. De La Grana also established Coach D's Basketball Camp in 1996, which is still held every summer in Miami for area youth.

De La Grana is a graduate of Liberty University where he graduated with a degree in general studies. He attended high school and played basketball at Florida Christian, where, in 1979, he was chosen All-Dade County and remains in the Athletic Hall of Fame. He and his wife, Angie, reside in Palmetto Bay with their five children, Derrick, Daniel, Chelsea, Jenny and Annie.

BILL FORAN

ASSISTANT COACH/STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

Completing his 21st season overall with the HEAT and his 11th in the position of Assistant Coach/Strength & Conditioning, Bill Foran is charged with improving the proper health, strength and overall conditioning of the HEAT players. To achieve these goals, Foran supervises a combination of weight training, plyometrics, stretching and dieting to ensure the players' maximum results on the court.

Foran joined the HEAT in the club's first season as a consultant before becoming a full-time staff member a year later as the team's strength and conditioning coach. Prior to coming to the HEAT, Foran spent four years as the head strength and conditioning coach for the University of Miami. There, Foran helped keep UM's football players in shape for the championship years of 1987 and 1989. Prior to his tenure at UM, he spent four years in a similar capacity at Washington State University.

A graduate of Central Michigan University, he earned a dual degree in physical education and health education in 1977 and his master's degree in exercise physiology from Michigan State University in 1981. Foran is the former president and co-founder of the National Basketball Conditioning Coaches Association (NBCCA) and a published author. He is the main author, along with nine other NBA strength and conditioning coaches, of three published books titled "Condition the NBA Way", "NBA Power Conditioning" and "Complete Conditioning for Basketball". Foran was also the sole editor of "High Performance Sports Conditioning."

Foran and his wife, Karen, reside in Davie, their son Eric and daughter Kaylee both attend the University of Florida where Eric is a member of the Gator Track Team.

JAY SABOL

ATHLETIC TRAINER/TRAVEL COORDINATOR

Jay Sabol completes his first season as Head Athletic Trainer/Travel Coordinator for the HEAT. He spent the previous 18 seasons with Miami, including the last 13 as Assistant Athletic Trainer. In his current capacity, he oversees the training staff to keep the HEAT healthy during the regular season, postseason and off-season. He is also responsible for handling all of the travel arrangements for the team throughout the season. Sabol previously also served as the team's equipment manager and assistant strength and conditioning coach, and served as a team attendant for his first five years with the organization.

Sabol was born and raised in Miami and graduated from Florida International University in 1992 with a master's degree in exercise physiology. As Assistant Athletic Trainer, Sabol covered basketball and soccer for FIU until 1995 when he joined the HEAT. He is certified by the National Athletic Trainers Association, National Strength and Conditioning Association, National Academy of Sports Medicine and licensed by the State of Florida Department of Health.

Sabol and his wife, Michelle, enjoy fishing and boating in their free time.

REY JAFFET

ASST. ATHLETIC TRAINER/DIRECTOR OF REHABILITATION

Rey Jaffet completes his first year with the HEAT organization as a full-time staff member. Jaffet brings his 26 years of rehabilitation and sports medicine experience to the organization which includes assisting the HEAT with the rehabilitation of its players over the last 12 years.

In addition to his past duties with the HEAT's athletic training staff, Jaffet served as Director of Clinical Services, Administrator and Market Manager at Select Medical Corporation, formerly HealthSouth, where he handled patient care as well as management responsibilities.

Before joining HealthSouth, Jaffet was the Head Athletic Trainer for Florida International University for 12 years, from 1984 through 1996. Prior to his tenure at FIU, Jaffet was the Head Athletic Trainer for the Ft. Lauderdale Strikers of the North American Soccer League for two seasons.

Jaffet graduated from the University of Puerto Rico with a degree in physical education/biology and went on to earn a degree in physical therapy and a master's of science degree in physical education from FIU.

Jaffet, a native of Puerto Rico, is married to his wife Grace and resides in Miami with their two children, Rey Jr. and Rafael.

DAVID PARKS

ASST. ATHLETIC TRAINER/EQUIPMENT MANAGER

David Parks completes his first year with the HEAT organization as a full-time staff member after spending the last 12 years as a part-time Athletic Trainer Assistant.

TEAM NOTES

NBA PLAYOFFS: The HEAT clinched its 13th postseason berth in franchise history and its fifth in six years, with their win on 4/3 at CHA. This marks as Miami's 11th postseason appearance over the last 14 years. Only Detroit, which has earned 12 postseason berths, has made more postseason appearances in the Eastern Conference than the HEAT over the last 14 years. Only one other Eastern Conference team, Indiana, has even hit double-figures in postseason appearances with 10 over the past 14 years. Additionally, with their win vs. NY and a PHI loss at TOR on 4/12, the HEAT clinched the fifth seed in the 2009 NBA Playoffs. Overall the HEAT is 53-53 in postseason play (37-19 at home and 16-34 on the road).

MAKING HISTORY: After clinching a playoff berth with their win at CHA on 4/3, the HEAT became just the second team in NBA history to make the playoffs after winning 15-or-fewer games the previous season. The HEAT finished last season with a 15-67 record. The only other team to accomplish that feat was the San Diego Rockets who went 15-67 in 1967-68 and made the playoffs during the 1968-69 season with a 37-45 record. HEAT President Pat Riley was a member of those San Diego Rockets teams.

AMONG THE BEST: Miami HEAT Head Coach Erik Spoelstra guided the franchise to a 28-win improvement over last season. Miami won 43 games this season, having finished with only 15 wins last season. The 28-win improvement is the best among rookie head coaches in NBA history. Additionally, the 28-win improvement surpasses the previous franchise record of 19 when the HEAT won 42 games during the 1995-96 season and then followed that season by winning 61 games in the 1996-97 season. MOST WINS: Miami HEAT Head Coach Erik Spoelstra finished the season with 43 wins in his first year as HEAT Head Coach. The 43 wins by Head Coach Erik Spoelstra rank as the most wins by a first year HEAT coach. The previous high was 42. Current HEAT President Pat Riley recorded 42 wins in his first year coaching Miami during the 1995-96 season and former coach Stan Van Gundy also recorded 42 wins in his first season guiding the HEAT during the 2003-04 season.

FRANCHISE BEST DEFENSE: The HEAT held opponents to under 50 percent shooting from the field in a franchise-tying 35 straight games from 11/5/08 thru 1/14/09. The last time the HEAT has held opponents to under 50 percent from the field in 35 consecutive games was from 4/19/98 thru 4/10/99.

BALL SECURITY: Miami finished the season having committed 10 or fewer turnovers on 24 occasions. The 24 times with 10 or fewer turnovers is a new franchise record. The previous single-season record was 15 times during the 2002-03 season. Additionally, as a team, the HEAT finished third in the league for turnovers per game.

FROM BEYOND THE ARC: With eight three-point field goals made in the fourth quarter at WAS on 4/4, the HEAT set a franchise record for the most three-point field goals made for any quarter. The previous record was seven and occurred on eight occasions, most recently at WAS on 4/4/08, also in the fourth quarter. Ironically, the last time it happened prior to the 4/4/08 contest was also at WAS on 12/15/06 in the second quarter.

TEAM NOTES

MV3: Dwyane Wade finished the 2008-09 season amongst the best in many statistical categories across the NBA as well as helping the HEAT to their 13th postseason appearance. Below are some facts and stats from Wade's MVP caliber season:

- Finished the season as the NBA's leading scorer at 30.2 points per game and in total points with 2,386.
- Finished as the only player in the NBA to rank among the Top 10 in four major statistical categories; scoring, steals (2nd, 2.19), minutes (T-6th, 38.6) and assists (8th, 7.5). Also ranks among the NBA leaders in blocks (16th, 1.34) and field goal percentage (T-31st, .491).
- Set personal career highs in points (2,386), field goals made (854), field goal attempts (1,739), three-point field goals made (88), three-point field goal attempts (278), assists (589), steals (173), blocked shots (106) and games played (79).
- Finished first among all guards in the NBA in blocks and ranks first among non-point guards in assists.
- Became the only player in NBA history to record at least 2,000 points, 500 assists, 150 steals and 100 blocks during a single season.
- In a thrilling win where Wade hit the game-winning shot at the buzzer vs. CHI on Mar. 9, he became just the second player in NBA history, along with Wilt Chamberlain, to score at least 48 points and dish out 12 assists while shooting 71.4 percent from the field during a single game.
- Was the only player in the league to amass at least 100 blocks and 100 steals this season.
- His 33.7 ppg average during the month of March set a new HEAT franchise record for any month as well as his 505 total points in March.
- Scored at least 20 points in a HEAT franchise-record 21 consecutive games from Jan. 30, 2009 thru Mar. 14, 2009.
- Scored a career-high 55 points vs. NY on 4/12, breaking the AmericanAirlines Arena scoring record including a new team-high against the New York franchise.
- His 42 points at TOR on 3/6 was the most points scored by a HEAT player against the Toronto Raptors franchise.
- Led the HEAT in scoring on 71 occasions this season, eclipsing the franchise record he set during the 2005-06 season with 58.
- Scored his 500th point of the season in only his 18th game, tying the franchise mark. Additionally, he scored his 1,000th point in his 35th game, a new team record.
- Matched his career-high of grabbing at least one steal in 18 consecutive games from 12/12/08 thru 1/17/09, the third-best streak in HEAT history.
- Recorded 13 games of 40+ points, setting a new career-high for a single season.
- Became only the third HEAT player to score 50+ points in a game and the first to hit the mark on multiple occasions.
- Was named as a starter on the 2009 NBA All-Star Team.
- Named NBA Player of the Month twice (December and February) and NBA Player of the Week three times (Nov. 24, Dec. 8, Mar.9).

NEW MARK: Dwyane Wade set the new HEAT franchise all-time scoring record on 3/14 vs. UTA with his first basket (a dunk) to start the third period of play. Wade has 9,922 points in his HEAT career. The previous franchise record was held by Alonzo Mourning with 9,459 points. Additionally, Wade scored a game-high 27 points on 3/23 vs. MEM, and in the process established the highest scoring season by a HEAT player in franchise history. He scored 2,386 points this season, surpassing the 2,040 points he scored in the 2005-06 season.

GET SHORTY: Dwyane Wade recorded his 100th block of the season on 3/26 at CHI, and finished with 106 blocks this season; the most blocks in a season in NBA history by a player 6-4 or under:

QUARTER SCORING: With his three double-figure scoring quarters vs. NY on 4/12 (16 in 1st Q, 11 in 2nd Q, 23 in 3rd Q), Dwyane Wade produced a team-high 91 double-figure scoring quarters this year and recorded multiple double-figure scoring quarters in the same game on 25 occasions. Last year he had 40 double-figure scoring quarters and tallied multiple double-figure scoring quarters in a game 10 times. For his career he has produced 324 double-figure scoring quarters and on 83 occasions has recorded multiple double-figure scoring quarters in the same game (16 times he has had three double-figure scoring quarters in a game; 10 this season).

GOOD CROWD: With 505 points and 119 assists in March, Wade joined Allen Iverson (twice), Michael Jordan (four times), Larry Bird (twice) and Nate Archibald (four times) as the only players in the NBA to record at least 500 points and 100 assists in a month since February 1972, and the first since Iverson had 544 points and 127 assists in December 2005. SUPER MARIO: Mario Chalmers' start on 4/15 vs. Detroit marked as his 82nd this season. He became the only HEAT rookie in franchise history to start in all 82 games during a single season surpassing the previous high of 78 which was held by Caron Butler during the 2002-03 season. He also became just the fourth player in franchise history to start in all 82 games, the first since Brian Grant appeared in all 82 games during the 2002-03 season. Additionally, he became only the third HEAT rookie to play in all 82 games, joining Grant Long (1988-89) and Bimbo Coles (1990-91).

STEALING THE SHOW: Rookie Mario Chalmers set a new HEAT record on 11/5 vs. PHI when he recorded nine steals. The previous high, set by Tim Hardaway, was eight steals, recorded on 12/20/97 at ATL. He also set the HEAT rookie record, passing Caron Butler, who recorded seven steals at DEN on 1/8/03. Additionally, his five steals in the first half was one shy of the mark set by Grant Long vs. PHI on 1/20/93. The last rookie to record at least nine steals was Ron Harper, who recorded 10 on 3/10/87 vs. PHI.

ROOKIE FIRST: Michael Beasley recorded a career-tying 28 points and a career-high 16 rebounds, including a new HEAT rookie record 14 defensive rebounds on 4/12 vs. NY. He finished with 439 rebounds this season. Along with his 1,123 total points this season, Beasley has become the first rookie in HEAT history to score at least 1,000 points and grab at least 400 rebounds. Additionally, his 22-point effort on 4/15 vs. DET marked as his fifth consecutive game of 20+ points. He is the first rookie to achieve that feat since Dwyane Wade recorded a franchise best six-straight 20-point games during his rookie campaign from 12/14/03 thru 12/23/03.

BEASLEY SCORING: Michael Beasley finished with 1,123 points this season. He became just the fifth HEAT rookie to score 1,000 points. Beasley finished third among HEAT rookies for total points in franchise history. Additionally, he recorded 58 double-figure scoring games. That is also the third most by a HEAT rookie in franchise history. Below you will find the top five total points and double-figure scoring efforts by a HEAT rookie in franchise history.

TEAM NOTES

EARLY RISING: Michael Beasley recorded his first 20-point game in only his third pro game, when he scored 25 points at Charlotte on 11/1. The only HEAT rookies to do it in fewer games were Willie Burton and Steve Smith (1st game) and Kevin Edwards (2nd game). Sasha Danilovic, Eddie House and Udonis Haslem are next, each doing it in their fourth game.

B-EASY FROM THE BENCH: Michael Beasley recorded 10 games of 20+ points off the HEAT bench. That ranks tied for the most in franchise history. Additionally, his 10 games of 20+ points off the HEAT bench ranks as the most for a rookie in franchise history. Below is the breakdown of 20+ point scorers off the HEAT bench and the top rookies to achieve the feat.

RECORD BREAKING: Michael Beasley set a HEAT rookie scoring record when coming off the bench with a career-high 28 points on 3/4 vs. PHO, breaking the mark set by Willie Burton when he scored 27 points off the bench at DEN on 12/27/90 and matched by Harold Miner when he scored 27 points off the bench at UTA on 1/12/93. Beasley scored the second most points by any HEAT player in franchise history when coming off the bench with his 28 points, one-point shy of the team record held by Voshon Lenard, who scored 29 points coming off the bench vs. MIL, on 12/16/99.

MULTIPLE 20+ POINTS: Both Michael Beasley (28 points) and Daequan Cook (27 points) scored 20+ points from the HEAT bench vs. PHO on 3/4, marking the second time this season that two players have scored 20+ points off the HEAT bench. Cook (with 24 points) and Beasley (with 21 points) scored 20+ points from the bench at MIL on 1/14. Prior to that, the last time two Miami players scored 20+ points from the bench came during the 1990-91 season. Additionally, the feat marked as only the fifth time in franchise history that two players have scored 20+ points from the HEAT bench. Below are all five HEAT feats.

ROOKIE SCORING: HEAT rookie Michael Beasley averaged 13.9 points while HEAT rookie Mario Chalmers averaged 10.0 points. Only two times in HEAT history has at least two rookies averaged double-figure points during the same season. Rookies Sherman Douglas (14.3) and Glen Rice (13.6) accomplished the feat during the 1989-90 season while Kevin Edwards (13.8), Grant Long (11.9) and Rony Seikaly (10.9) posted a double-figure points average during the inaugural 1988-89 season.

OT: The HEAT's 140-129 triple overtime win on 3/14 vs. Utah marked as the team's fifth consecutive overtime victory, tying the franchise record. Miami has previously won five-straight overtime games on three separate occasions, 3/18/00-12/30/00, 1/17/02-4/9/02 and 11/15/05-12/7/06. Also, Dwyane Wade finished with 14 points during the three overtime periods, which are the most points scored by a HEAT player in overtime during a single game in franchise history. The previous record was 12 points which was held by three different players including Wade on 4/14/05 at Philadelphia, Bimbo Coles on 12/21/94 vs. Milwaukee and Rony Seikaly on 11/20/92 at Philadelphia. Additionally, HEAT Head Coach Erik Spoelstra became the 11th coach in NBA history to win his first five overtime decisions. TRIPLE OT: The HEAT put in extra work in their 140-129 triple-overtime victory on 3/14 vs. Utah. The 140 points scored by the HEAT marked as the franchise record for an overtime game. The previous high was the 131 points scored in a double-overtime win vs. Denver on 3/10/89. It was also the second highest output for any game in franchise history, second to only the 141 points scored vs. Denver on 2/14/91. Additionally, it was also only the second triple-overtime game in franchise history. The previous 3OT game came during the 1992-93 season when the HEAT lost to Philadelphia 129-128.

COMEBACK KIDS: After being down by 16 points, Miami's 97-92 win over CHA on 4/3 marked the 14th time this season the HEAT overcame a double-digit deficit. The other games were against DET (11 points) on 3/22, CHI (13 points), NY (16 points) on 2/28, MIL (10 points) on 1/14, MIN (13 points) on 1/13, SAC (10 points) on 1/9, POR (16 points) on 1/7, NJ (16 points) on 1/3, GS (11 points) on 12/23, UTA (10 points) on 12/3, GS (10 points) on 12/1, IND (15 points) on 11/22 and NJ (12 points) on 11/10. The 16-point comeback win at Charlotte on 4/3 marked as the largest deficit the HEAT overcame on the road to win a game since coming back from 16 down to defeat POR on 1/7/07. Additionally, the 14 double-digit comeback wins tie Cleveland, Denver and the L.A. Lakers as the third most in the NBA this season. Portland recorded 18 double-digit comeback wins this season as Chicago tallied 15.

GOOD MOURNING: The HEAT retired Alonzo Mourning's No. 33 jersey during a special halftime ceremony on 3/30. Mourning announced his retirement on 1/22 and became the first Miami HEAT player to have his jersey raised to the rafters.
