OWNERSHIP



R. THOMAS GAGLARDI

OWNER AND GOVERNOR

R. Thomas (Tom) Gaglardi is the owner and governor of the Dallas Stars Hockey Club and the president of Northland Properties Corporation, the largest family-owned hospitality company in Canada with its head offices located in Vancouver, B.C. He was officially introduced as the sixth owner in franchise history on November 21, 2011.

Since acquiring the club, Gaglardi has revitalized hockey in the Dallas-Fort Worth Metroplex, overhauling the team's front office by hiring veteran administrator Jim Lites to serve as president and installing one of the most respected hockey minds in Jim Nill as general manager. He also spearheaded the overhaul of the team's logo and uniform,

forging a new identity for the club to fit his vision. Under his watch, industry insiders have consistently identified the Stars as a team "on the rise" for both the business and hockey operations side of the organization. During the 2014-15 season, Gaglardi purchased the Texas Stars of the American Hockey League (AHL) and acquired the operating rights to H-E-B Center at Cedar Park in Cedar Park, Texas. The move reinforced his commitment to sustaining and growing the sport of hockey in the state of Texas and creating a seamless organizational process to develop and train NHL-caliber players, coaches and front office staff.

A passionate and knowledgeable leader who is deeply involved in all aspects of the family's business, Gaglardi began his career in the hospitality industry at age 13 as a busboy and has worked in virtually every area of his business since that time. He spent considerable time in construction, hotel and restaurant operations, real estate development and finance. At age 23, he was promoted to president of the Sandman Hotel Group, and at 26 he became president of Northland Properties Corporation, the Gaglardi family's umbrella company.

Under his direction, Northland has grown to be the largest family-owned hospitality company in Canada including a large portfolio of hotels with the Sandman Hotel Group and the Sutton Place Hotels & Resorts, several restaurant chains including Denny's Restaurants of Canada, Moxie's Grill & Bar, Chop Steakhouse & Bar and Shark Club Bar & Grill. In 2009, Gaglardi began expanding his brand of hospitality to the United Kingdom and more recently began operating in the United States, with the first Moxie's Grill & Bar opening in Dallas in November of 2016, and the first Sandman Hotel opening in Plano in February of 2019. The family also owns and operates a large real estate portfolio and the world renowned Revelstoke Mountain Resort. In addition to his role with the Stars, Gaglardi is a co-owner of the Kamloops Blazers Hockey Club of the Western Hockey League and serves as its governor.

An active member of the community, Gaglardi founded the Sandman Harvest Foundation, which has raised over \$1 million for disadvantaged and medically challenged children living in the Okanagan Valley of British Columbia. He also serves as trustee for the PA and JM Gaglardi Senior Citizens Society, a non-profit society providing housing for seniors in Kamloops, B. C. and serves on the board of St. George's School in Vancouver. He founded the Josh Dyck Foundation to assist Josh with his recovery from an auto accident in October 2006, which left him paralyzed and confined to a wheelchair.

Gaglardi and his wife Brittney have three sons, Charlie, Bennett and Wilson, all of whom play competitive hockey. In addition to his own participation on his hockey team, Gaglardi enjoys playing golf and spending time with his family at their cottage on the shores of Kamloops Lake near Savona, B.C.

BRAD ALBERTS

DALLAS STARS/TEXAS STARS PRESIDENT

Brad Alberts is in his second tenure with the Dallas Stars and currently serves as President after rejoining the team in February 2011.

Named team President on March 2, 2018, Alberts oversees all aspects of the Stars business operations. Previously leading all sales and marketing, he is also in charge of all aspects of the organization's finance and administration, box office, human resources and information technology. Additionally, Alberts serves alongside Stars CEO Jim Lites on the American Airlines Center Board of Directors, assisting in the management of one of the busiest arenas in the United States. Alberts will also continue to act as president and alternate governor of the Texas Stars, Dallas' top development affiliate in the American Hockey League, roles which he has served in since July 1, 2017.

Alberts' career includes nearly two decades of professional sports experience selling tickets, suites, premium seating, and sponsorships. From 1996-2009, Alberts worked for the Dallas Stars and Texas Rangers in various sales management roles in tickets, suites and corporate sponsorships. From 2006-09, Alberts served as the Executive Vice President of the Hicks Sports Marketing Group, the in-house sponsorship sales group for the Stars, Texas Rangers, and Liverpool Football Club. In 2009, Alberts took over as the Vice President of Sponsorship and Sales at Legends/CSL, overseeing a number of events at numerous venues around the country, most notably the Circuit of The Americas, a Formula One racing track in Austin, Texas.

Since rejoining the team in 2011, Alberts has played an integral role in the resurgence of the Stars in the Dallas-Fort Worth Metroplex, helping lead the organization to tremendous growth in brand visibility, attendance and sponsorship sales. Alberts and his leadership team were instrumental in the sweeping rebrand of the team, retiring the numbers of Mike Modano and Jere Lehtinen and creating tremendous sponsorship value for the team and its partners.

Alberts received his bachelor's degree from Ripon College in 1992 where he was a four-year letterman and co-captain of the basketball team, earning an induction into the Ripon College Athletic Hall of Fame in 2002. He received a master's degree in sports administration from Northern Colorado in 1995. Alberts is an avid golfer, and fitness enthusiast.

He resides with his wife and their daughter, Grace, in Southlake, Texas.

TEXAS STARS AND H-E-B CENTER, CHIEF SALES & MARKETING OFFICER

Michael Delay, Chief Sales and Marketing Officer, begins his eleventh full season with the Texas Stars.

In his role as CSMO, Delay oversees the day-to-day business operations for the Texas Stars and H-E-B Center's sponsorship and suites. He also sits on The Texas Stars Foundation Board of Directors as its President. Under his leadership, the Stars front office has been recognized for its success by the AHL, receiving a number of sponsorship sales, ticket sales, and game operations achievement awards over his first nine seasons.

Prior to joining the Stars, Delay served first as Director of Corporate Services and later as the Vice President of the Las Vegas Wranglers (ECHL) in Las Vegas, Nevada. His responsibilities in Las Vegas covered a wide range of the day-to-day team operations including sponsorship fulfillment, sales, marketing, game operations and hockey operations. The 2018-19 season marked his 20th full season in professional ice hockey.

His past sports experience also includes time with the Colorado Gold Kings (WCHL), Las Vegas Thunder (IHL), Las Vegas Stars (AAA baseball), Florida Panthers, Florida Marlins, and Lipton Tennis Tournament (Miami).

Delay is a graduate of the University of Miami, earning a Bachelor of Science degree with a double major of Marine Science & Biology (1993). He also holds an MSEd with a concentration in Sports Management (1996).

He currently resides in Cedar Park with his wife Meredith and daughter Caitlyn.



SCOTT WHITE

TEXAS STARS GENERAL MANAGER DALLAS STARS ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER

Scott White was hired as the first general manager of the AHL's Texas Stars on November 19, 2008, and has served in that capacity over the club's twelve-year existence. In the summer of 2016, he was promoted to Assistant General Manager of the Dallas Stars while continuing his role with Texas. Under his guidance, the Texas Stars have compiled an all-time regular season record of, seven post-season appearances, three Calder Cup Final appearances and one Calder Cup Championship.

White was the architect behind the 2013-14 Calder Cup-winning team that set a franchise-record 48 wins, claimed the Macgregor Kilpatrick Trophy as the AHL's regular season points champion, and won the John D. Chick Trophy as the Western Conference Champions. He was also instrumental in building the 2009-10 inaugural season team that made a run to the Calder Cup Final.

A member of the Dallas Stars organization since 2005, White previously served as a professional scout, Director of Minor League Operations, and the Director of Hockey Operations. He headed up the hockey department for the Iowa Stars, Dallas' then-primary affiliate, for three seasons. Prior to joining the Stars organization, he served as head coach of the Columbia Inferno of the ECHL for four years, qualifying for a playoff berth each year. He also guided Columbia to a Kelly Cup Final appearance in 2003 and finished with a 165-87-36 record (.635) in over four seasons with the Inferno. In Columbia, he was responsible for all of the club's hockey operations activities including recruiting, scouting and roster transactions. White also worked as an Assistant Coach with the Greensboro Monarchs (ECHL) for a season and a half, and was an Assistant Coach at his alma mater, Michigan Tech University, from 1994-1999.

White and his wife, Kathy, have four children: Emily, Katie, William and Madelyn.





COACHING STAFF



NEIL GRAHAM

TEXAS STARS ASSISTANT HEAD COACH

Neil Graham was promoted to head coach of the Texas Stars on December 10, 2019 to fill the vacancy left by Derek Laxdal who was promoted to assistant coach of the Dallas Stars the same day. The following night he earned his first win as the head coach of the Stars, a 3-1 victory over Manitoba and finished the shortened season with an 18-15-2-2 record at the helm. Graham was previously hired as assistant coach of the Stars on July 8, 2019, joining the team for his first stint of coaching at the American Hockey League level.

Graham, 35, served as head coach of the Idaho Steelheads, the ECHL affiliate of the Dallas Stars, from 2015 to 2019 before making the move to Cedar Park, Texas. Over that span, he amassed a 166-91-31 record in 288 regular-season contests and led Idaho to three consecutive 40-win seasons. Graham guided the Steelheads to the Kelly Cup Playoffs in all four of his campaigns as head coach, recording a 14-20 record in 34 postseason games.

He helped continue the club's streak of qualifying for the postseason in each of last 22 seasons, which is the longest active postseason streak in professional hockey. Prior to being appointed head coach on Aug. 7, 2015, he was named Idaho's full-time assistant coach during the 2013-14 and 2014-15 seasons after serving as a player/coach for the 2012-13 campaign.

The Calgary, Alberta native is a graduate of Mercyhurst University where he played hockey for four seasons before turning pro, recording 60 points (23-37=60) and 128 penalty minutes over 137 games. He split three seasons between the ECHL and Southern Professional Hockey League, scoring 98 points (42-56=98) in 113 professional games





COACHING STAFF



TRAVIS MORIN

SKILLS COACH

Travis Morin was promoted to assistant coach of the Texas Stars on December 10, 2019. Morin was previously hired as Skills Coach and Director of Business Development with the organization on July 31, 2019. During the shortened 2019-2020 season, Morin stepped in for Head Coach Neil Graham for a pair of games and recorded a win in his debut commanding the bench, a 5-4 win against Colorado on March 10, 2020.

Morin, 36, ended his playing career with the Texas Stars after the 2018-19 after playing 10 seasons with the team and 12 overall. Morin retired as the franchise leader in points, goals, assists, and games played and became the first player in team history to have his jersey number retired on Oct. 19, 2019. He accrued franchise records with 560 points, 175 goals, 385 assists, and played in 686 games, the most by an AHL player with one organization since 1974. The Brooklyn Park, Minnesota native captained the team for the 2015-16 and 2016-17 seasons, was a four time AHL All-Star, led the Stars in scoring across five of his 10 seasons. He was a focal point of Texas' 2014 Calder Cup Championship season, capturing

the Les Cunningham Award (AHL MVP), John B. Sollenberger Award (Regular Season Scoring Leader), and Jack A. Butterfield Award (Calder Cup Playoff MVP). Morin is also the organizations most decorated post season scorer, earning 64 points (23-42=64) in 87 playoff games.

Morin is a graduate of Minnesota State University-Mankato where he played all four years before turning pro. Over 151 games at his alma mater, Morin recorded 133 points (58-75=133) and served as team captain in his senior season of 2006-07. Before joining the Stars, he also played for the South Carolina Stingrays in the ECHL and Hershey Bears from 2007 to 2009.



PATRICK DOLAN

VIDEO COACH

Patrick enters his second season as the Video Coach for the Texas Stars and his fourth season overall in professional hockey.

Before joining the Texas Stars, he spent two years with the Ontario Reign in the same role. He was responsible for all team pre-scouting needs and statistical tracking from 2017 to 2019. Prior to his move to California, Patrick served as the Director of Hockey Operations for the Chicago Steel in the USHL for the 2016-17 season. As a member of the Steel's coaching staff, Dolan helped the club return to the playoffs for the first time in nine seasons and also capture the organization's first Clark Cup Championship.

The Fort Collins, Colorado native began his professional career in 2014, spending two seasons within the Arizona Coyotes' AHL organizations. Dolan joined the Portland Pirates for the 2014-15 season as Video Coordinator and held the same position with the

Springfield Falcons in 2015-16.

Dolan is a 2014 graduate of Gustavus Adolphus College (Saint Peter, Minnesota) where he earned a Bachelor's Degree in Business Management and a minor in Coaching.

BRIAN GARCIA

EQUIPMENT MANAGER

Brian Garcia enters his twelfth season as the Equipment Manager for the Texas Stars and his twentieth season overall in professional hockey.

Before joining the Texas Stars, he spent four years with the ECHL's Las Vegas Wranglers from 2005-2009 and was selected to work the 2009 ECHL All-Star Game in Reading, Pennsylvania. A native of Covina, California, Garcia also worked four seasons (2001-2005) with the Long Beach Ice Dogs (ECHL) as an Assistant Equipment Manager prior to moving to Las Vegas.

Garcia resides in Austin, Texas.

Julio Romero is entering his fifth season in the role of assistant equipment manager with the Texas Stars, and his twelfth working in professional hockey.

VENUE SHIELD

COVID-19 SAFETY PRECAUTIONS



All events at H-E-B Center at Cedar Park will include activation of ASM Global's "Venue Shield"—an advanced environmental hygiene protocol that will also be deployed in more than 325 ASM facilities around the world. ASM Global, which manages H-E-B Center at Cedar Park, is the world's leading venue management and services company. Venue Shield reduces physical touch points, increases venue sanitization and cleanliness, and provides various health monitoring guidelines and services.

The safety guidelines and protocols in place at H-E-B Center at Cedar Park include:

FACE COVERINGS REQUIRED -

All employees and visitors MUST wear a cloth face mask to cover both nose and mouth, except when ACTIVELY eating or drinking at the guest's designated seating location. One-time use disposable masks are provided if the guest does not already have one. Those who cannot keep a face mask in place, including small children, are exempt.

WASH HANDS / HAND SANITIZING STATIONS -

Fifty (50) hand sanitizing stations have been added throughout the arena. Guests are encouraged to wash hands for 20 seconds or use a hand sanitizing station often.

CONSTANT CLEANING -

All employees receive contactless temperature checks prior to entering the venue each day and testing as needed.

- Floor markers installed at all line queues (main entrances, box office, concessions, restrooms, merchandise).
- Limited capacity in elevators to one party or family at a time.
- Limited capacity in restrooms at one time.

- All staff is required to wear masks and gloves
- Cash is no longer accepted; only credit card payment accepted or purchase mobile parking ticket in advance at [ticketmaster.com](https://www.ticketmaster.com).
- Valet is suspended until further notice.

BOX OFFICE

- **Contactless Payment** - Cash is no longer accepted and signatures have been waived.
- **Mobile Tickets** - All tickets purchased at the box office are digital tickets that can be managed/transferred to another guest from your phone.
- No will call

- Expanded entry points for social distancing.
- Staggered entry times for guests.
- Guests encouraged to use clear bags or avoid bringing bags if possible to reduce contact with personal items during security checks.

- Water fountains turned off until further notice.

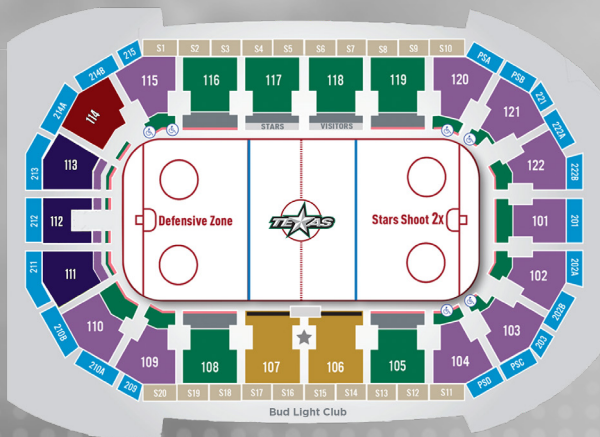

Dear Fans,

It is my pleasure to welcome you to the 2020-21 American Hockey League season, the latest chapter in a tradition of excellence that can be traced back more than eight decades.

The last several months have been difficult in so many ways, and this season is going to look and feel different than what we are all used to. But we are looking forward to being back on the ice and continuing our role as the top development league for nearly all of the players, coaches, executives, trainers, broadcasters and officials in the National Hockey League today. THE BEGINNINGS

Embarking on its 85th season of play in 2020-21, the American Hockey League is continuing a tradition of excellence that began in 1936 when the Canadian-American Hockey League joined with the International Hockey League to form what is today known as the AHL. Eight teams hit the ice that first season, representing Buffalo, Cleveland, New

Haven, Philadelphia, Pittsburgh, Providence, Springfield and Syracuse.

Frank Calder, the National Hockey League's president at the time, was instrumental in the forming of this new league, and his name would be given to its championship trophy. **The first Calder**

Cup was won by the Syracuse Stars in 1937; the Hershey Bears have

championships in league history with 11.

From those roots, the American Hockey League has grown into a 31-team, coast-to-coast league that provides fans with exciting, high-level professional hockey while preparing thousands of players, coaches, officials, executives, trainers, broadcasters and more for careers in the NHL.

THE PLAYERS

In today's National Hockey League nearly 90 percent of the players are AHL alumni, including 2020 Vezina Trophy winner **Connor Hellebuyck**, Norris Trophy recipient **Roman Josi** and Hart Trophy winner **Leon Draisaitl**. The 2020 Stanley Cup champion Tampa Bay Lightning were stocked with AHL graduates including **Andrei Vasilevskiy**, **Nikita Kucherov**, and former Calder Cup champions **Ondrej Palat**, **Alex Killorn** and **Tyler Johnson**.

During the 2019-20 season, a total of 866 AHL alumni played in the National Hockey League. There were 353 players who skated in both leagues last year alone, including the New York Rangers' **Igor Shesterkin**, Anaheim's **Troy Terry**, Dallas's **Joel Kiviranta** and Montreal's **Jesper Kotkaniemi**.

In addition, more than 220 former first- and second-round NHL draft picks developed their skills in the AHL last season, including **Filip Zadina**, **Evan Bouchard**, **Morgan Frost**, **Owen Tippett**, **Jack Studnicka**, **Josh Norris** and **Jake Bean**.

THE LEGENDS

For the past eight decades, the American Hockey League has been home to some of the greatest players in the history of our sport.

In fact, **more than 100 honored members of the Hockey Hall of Fame have been affiliated with the AHL during their careers.**

All-time greats like **Johnny Bower**, **Toe Blake**, **Gump Worsley**, **Terry Sawchuk**, **Glenn Hall**, **Brad Park**, **Ken Dryden**, and **Brett Hull** came through the AHL ranks and now find themselves enshrined in Toronto, and the coveted Calder Cup is inscribed with the names of legendary AHL alumni like **Patrick Roy**, **Larry Robinson**, **Gerry Cheevers**, **Andy Bathgate**, **Tim Horton**, **Al Arbour**, **Emile Francis**, **Doug Harvey**, and **Billy Smith**.

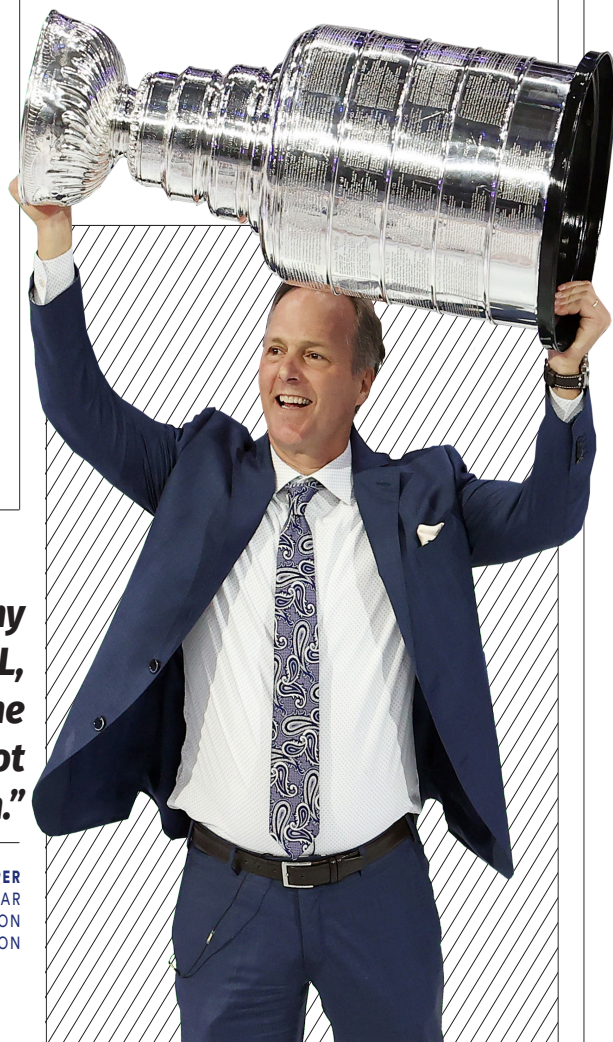

HOCKEY 101

BACK CHECK

To hinder an opponent heading toward and into the defending zone.

BLUE LINES

The pair of one foot wide blue lines which extend across the ice, 64 feet from each goal. These lines break up the ice into attacking, neutral and defending zones.

BODY CHECK

Use of the body on an opponent. It is legal when the opponent has possession of the puck or was the last player to have touched it.

CREASE

The area directly in front of the goaltender. It is four-feet wide and eight-feet long and marked off by red lines. Offensive players who do not have possession of the puck may not enter.

DROP PASS

The puck carrier leaves the puck behind to be picked up by a trailing teammate.

FACEOFF

Dropping the puck between one player from each team to start or resume play.

FIVE-HOLE

The path the puck travels in a goal scored between the goalie's legs.

FORECHECK

To check an opponent in his end of the rink, preventing an offensive rush.

FREEZING THE PUCK

When a goalie covers the puck with his glove or blocker, drawing a whistle for a faceoff.

GOAL MOUTH

The area just in front of the goal and crease lines.

ONE-TIMER

Hitting the hockey puck simultaneously when receiving a pass. The offensive player takes his back swing while the puck is on its way to him. He times his swing with the arrival of the puck.

HAT TRICK

The scoring of three goals by a player in one game.

ICING

Called when a player, from his own half of the ice, shoots the puck beyond the goal line of the opposing team. Attacking players can

negate the call by beating the defensive team to the offensive face-off dot. The violating team is unable to make a line change. The icing rule is removed for a team on a penalty kill.

LINESMEN

Two are used to call offsides, icing and handle all faceoffs not occurring at center ice.

MAJOR PENALTY (5 MIN.)

Called for fighting or when minor penalties are committed with deliberate attempt to injure. Any player who receives two major penalties for fighting or three major penalties for any infraction in the same game will receive an automatic game misconduct.

MINOR PENALTY (2 MIN.)

Called for tripping, hooking, spearing, slashing, charging, roughing, holding, elbowing, obstruction, high-sticking, cross-checking, boarding or interference.

MISCONDUCT PENALTY

Ten minutes for various forms of unsportsmanlike behavior or when a player incurs a second major penalty.





HOCKEY 101

OFFSIDE:

Called if a player from the attacking team precedes the puck over the blue line into the attacking zone.

PENALTY SHOT

A free shot, unopposed except for the goalie, given to a player who is illegally impeded from behind when he has possession of the puck with no opponent between him and the goal except the goalie, or when a skater freezes the puck in the crease.

POKE CHECK

Dislodging possession of the puck from an opponent by stabbing at it with the blade of a stick.

POWER PLAY

A power play occurs when a team has a one or two-man advantage because of an opponent's penalty.

REFEREES

Two are used to supervise the game, call penalties, determine goals and handle faceoffs at center ice to start each period.

SCREENED SHOT

The goaltender's view is blocked by players between him and the shooter.

SLAP SHOT

Hitting the puck with the blade of the stick after taking a full back swing.

SLOT

The area immediately in front of the goal. It is from this zone that most goals are scored and where the most furious activity takes place.

TIME OUTS:

Each team is allowed one 30-second time out during the course of a game, including overtime.

TOP SHELF

Term used to describe when an offensive player shoots high in an attempt to beat the goalie by putting the puck in the top right or left corner of the net.

TRAPEZOID

The trapezoid-shaped area located behind the goal. Goaltenders are restricted to handling the puck in this area when behind the goal line.

WRAPAROUND

When a player skates around behind the opposing goal and attempts to wrap the puck around the goal post under the goalie.

WRIST SHOT

Hitting the puck with the blade of the stick using a quick snap of the wrist rather than a full back swing.

PROHIBITED ITEMS

TICKET SCALPING

The resale of H-E-B Center admission tickets is strictly prohibited on the premises.

VIDEO RECORDERS

Video cameras are prohibited unless the event allows. Video cameras should be returned to the guest's vehicle and should never be held or secured by H-E-B Center staff for insurance reasons. If a guest is caught with a video camera at an unauthorized event, the guest will be asked to delete the content and take the camera back to their vehicle. If a guest records video on a mobile device (phone, tablet, laptop) the guest will be asked to stop and may be asked to delete the content pertaining to the event. Some 3rd party events may allow video cameras (graduations, school functions).

WATER FOUNTAINS

CODE OF CONDUCT



H-E-B Center at Cedar Park welcomes all guests to today's event. For the benefit and enjoyment of everyone in attendance, we would like to explain the Guest Code of Conduct.

- 1** All guests should consume alcohol responsibly: any guest who appears intoxicated may be denied entry or ejected. Any person under the age of 21 who is in possession of alcoholic beverages regardless of how they obtained the beverages is subject to ejection without refund and arrest.
- 2** Guests using foul or abusive language or gestures are subject to ejection without refund.
- 3** Guests may not bring artificial noisemakers of any type to H-E-B Center events. For Texas Stars games, the team has determined that all noisemakers except for cowbells are prohibited. Patrons will be allowed to bring in one cowbell per person. Cowbell size will be restricted to 8" in length and H-E-B Center Security will utilize this size restriction when determining if cowbells will be allowed into the arena. Guests using cowbells should be courteous to other fans and not detract from their enjoyment of the game.
- 4** At sporting events, we encourage everyone to cheer for his or her favorite team and players, but to do so in a manner as to not detract from another fan's enjoyment of the game.
- 5** Hand-held banners and signs, no larger than 22" x 28", are allowed at H-E-B Center for Texas Stars games and must remain in the guest's possession at all times. Banners or signs may not be placed on the ice or court, be commercial in nature, obscene or cause any disturbance to other guests. Poles to display banners or flags are prohibited. Banners and signs may not obstruct the view of other guests or obstruct building signage. Management reserves the right to remove any banner or sign without exception or change this policy at any time.
- 6** Guests wearing clothing with language or graphics that may be deemed offensive by other guests may be denied entry into, or ejected from the arena without refund. Clothing that reveals parts of a guest's body that may be offensive to other guests may also be denied entry or ejected from the arena without refund. At no time may a guest remove their shirt inside the arena.
- 7** Smoking and the use of e-cigarettes are prohibited in H-E-B Center. Guests may smoke or use e-cigarettes in designated smoking areas.
- 8** Guests attempting to enter the arena without a valid ticket or occupying a seat for which they do not hold a ticket will be ejected without refund.
- 9** Any guest encountering difficulties with any other guest is encouraged to notify any representative of H-E-B Center. Guest Services is located on the concourse behind section 121.
- 10** Backpacks are not permitted within H-E-B Center and all bags/purses must be no larger than 14" x 14" x 6" *unless the bag is a giveaway item from a Texas Stars game. All bags are subject to inspection and any prohibited items will be thrown away or must be returned to the guest's vehicle. Prohibited items include: alcoholic beverages; illicit/illegal drugs; knives; objects that may be used as weapons (i.e. bats, sticks, rocks); unlicensed handguns (see CHL policy); explosives or explosive devices including, but not limited to, fireworks, poppers, cap guns; video and video recording devices; laser pointers; helium balloons, inflatable balls, and backpacks.
- 11** Outside food and beverage and beverage containers are prohibited with the exception of guests with medical conditions or small children. Small snacks and bottled water are permitted in those instances and are subject to security approval.
- 12** Professional cameras are not allowed for any H-E-B Center events with the exception of Texas Stars games. The photography policy for all non-Texas Stars events is determined by the individual event promoter or tour and varies by event.
