TRAINING CAMP—

The Seattle Seahawks will open training camp on July 9 and continue through late August at Eastern Washington State College in Cheney, Wash. The media will be headquartered in Streeter Hall, Cheney, WA 99004, (509) 359-7577. Over 100 players will be housed at Louise Anderson Hall and all personnel will dine at Tawanka Commons. The Seahawks will play one pre-season game in the eastern part of the state, August 7, against the Chicago Bears in Spokane's Joe Albi Stadium. Prior to selecting Eastern Washington State College as the club's training site, the Seahawks had also considered Washington State University in Pullman, University of Puget Sound and Pacific Lutheran University in Tacoma and Gonzaga University in Spokane.

THE NORDSTROM FAMILY

Majority Owners

"The problems are different, but the solutions are about the same," says Elmer J. Nordstrom on comparing running a football club to his previous business experience.

Football is new to the Nordstrom Family but certainly not business. The Nordstrom Family is recognized as business and community leaders in the Northwest and is now embarking on a new career — as majority owners of the Seattle Seahawks.

Bruce Nordstrom is Chairman of the Board of Nordstrom, Inc., and serves as a trustee for the Seattle Chamber of Commerce and Seattle Goodwill, along with being Treasurer of the King County American Bi-Centennial Commission.

John Nordstrom is President and Director of Nordstrom, Inc. and a board member of the University of Washington Alumni Association.

James Nordstrom is Executive Vice President of Nordstrom, Inc. and a member of the Executive Committee of the Seattle Downtown Development Association, as well as director for Family Savings & Loan Association, University District Parking Association and Alaska Pacific Bank.

Sarkowsky is Chairman of the Board of Trail Capital Corporation and a Board Member of the Council of Housing Producers. He is also active in the community and is National Chairman of the University of Washington Alumni Fund. He is a Board Member for the Seattle Repertory Theatre and Seattle Symphony along with being Past President and a Board Member for PONCHO

Lynn P. Himmelman.






JOHN THOMPSON

General Manager

It was March 6, 1975, when the Seattle Seahawks named their general manager. It was no surprise however. The choice was easy

John Thompson was the logical choice — a University of Washington graduate, a former UW employee and a successful administrator in the National Football League for 16 years.

"Seattle could not have made a better choice," said New York Giants President Wellington Mara. "John Thompson has experienced success at every level of professional football, and when my opinion was asked by the Seattle people, he was my only candidate."



"We hope to build our club along the lines of other successful expansion teams, such as Minnesota and Dallas, by building a strong foundation," says Thompson.

"We think that the players we acquired in our first college draft and the veteran allocation lead us to believe we are on the right track."

Prior to assuming the Seattle position, Thompson was the first full-time executive director of the NFL's Management Council, the collective bargaining agent of the league's clubs. When he assumed the position in 1971, he became the first non-owner to head management negotiations in collective-bargaining situations. He is still an associate member of the Council's executive committee.

"We're fortunate to have a man like John," said Elmer Nordstrom after coming out of his first NFL meeting and seeing his team's general manager at work. "In the meetings, when a question arises, they often ask John and he has all the answers."

A native of the Northwest who served as Sports Information Director at the University of Washington, Thompson joined the Minnesota Vikings as the team's first publicity director when the club was formed in 1960.

Thompson later became assistant general manager of the Vikings. In 1970, he assumed the position of assistant to the president of the National Football Conference, where he worked under NFL President George Halas to serve as liaison between the league office and the conference members.

He is married and the father of three. He and his wife, Mimi, live on Mercer Island, a Seattle suburb, with sons Rick, a graduate of Hamline (Minn.) University and Mike, a graduate of Colorado College. Daughter, Kathi, is a student at Michigan State.



MARK DUNCAN

Assistant General Manager

In his 40th year as a player, coach or football executive, Mark Duncan assumed the post of Assistant General Manager with the Seahawks in April of 1975. He was Director of Player Personnel with Los Angeles for two years before accepting his current post. Prior to joining the Rams, Duncan spent 10 years in the NFL office as Director of Personnel and Supervisor of Officials. He broke into the NFL as an aide with San Francisco (1955-62). He played college ball at Denver University and then served as an assistant coach at Colorado College and Denver before being named head coach at his alma mater in 1946. He was an assistant at Colorado State for seven years before joining the 49ers.



DON ANDERSEN

Director of Public Relations

Don Andersen, former Director of the Athletic News Service at the University of Southern California and World Football League executive, joined the Seattle staff as Director of Public Relations in December of 1975. After seven years at USC, Andersen spent the last two years with the World Football League (1974) and Southern California Sun (1975), respectively, as Vice President of Public Relations. While at USC, he served as press manager for five Rose Bowl games, two NCAA basketball championship tournaments and as color commentator on USC radio broadcasts. Prior to joining USC in 1967, Andersen had spent four years as an administrator with the California Interscholastic Federation.

DICK MANSPERGER

Director of Player Personnel

Dick Mansperger, Director of Player Personnel with the Dallas Cowboys since 1972. heads the same department for Seattle. Prior to being promoted in the Dallas organization, Mansperger was a Cowboy scout for six years. After lettering for two seasons at Arizona State, he joined the ASU staff in 1958 and was head coach at Palo Verde, Calif. J.C. for two years. He coached at West Texas State in 1961 and returned to Arizona State in 1962. Mansperger then ioined the UCLA coaching staff, where he worked with Seahawks offensive line coach Sam Boghosian, for the 1963 and 1964 seasons. He went to Dallas as a scout for one year and then coached a season at lowa (1966) before returning to the Cowboys.



CHUCK ALLEN Director of Pro Scouting

A former all-star linebacker with the San Diego Chargers, Chuck Allen is Seattle's Director of Pro Scouting. He joined the Seahawks staff in June of 1975 coming from an assistant coaching post at the University of Washington (1973-74). Following an All-Coast and all-conference career at Washington, Allen played nine seasons with the Chargers. He made the All-American Football League team in 1961 and was a second team choice in 1964. He also served as the Chargers' defensive captain. He spent 1970, 1971 and part of 1972 with Pittsburgh and finished his professional career in 1972 with the Philadelphia Eagles.





VINCE LOMBARDI

Administrative Assistant

Vince Lombardi joined the Seattle organization in July of 1975 as Administrative Assistant to General Manager John Thompson. It will be Lombardi's first official venture into professional football but he's been close to the game since childhood. Son of the late Vince Lombardi, legendary coach of the Green Bay Packers and Washington Redskins, young Vince is a graduate of St. Thomas College in St. Paul. Minn., where he played fullback on his college team. He served as an assistant coach for one year following his graduation. Since that time, he has been an attorney in Minneapolis, Minn., and a representative in the Minnesota State Legislature (1973-74).



HAL SOUFFAY Business Manager

Hal Souffay is serving as Seattle's business manager after working as controller for the Sudden Valley Community Assn. in Bellingham, Wash. A native of Seattle and a graduate of Washington State University, Souffay spent five years with Touche Ross and Company as an auditor and consultant prior to joining Sudden Valley in 1975. He began his duties with the Seahawks on Feb. 1, 1976. He is a graduate of Ballard High School in Seattle, Wash. and an Army veteran who saw duty in Viet Nam in 1967 and 1968.

GORDON GREEN

Ticket Manager

Gordon Green, former assistant director of sports programs and ticket manager at the University of Washington, is the Seahawks' ticket manager. Green worked in the UW athletic department for 17 years prior to ioining the NFL's expansion franchise. He was first hired as assistant publicity director in 1958 and was then named sports publicity director in 1960 and sports information director in 1963. Green has also held the position of director of events. Prior to joining the Unviersity of Washington, Green spent a year in public relations for the Boeing Company and was with Associated Press for six vears. He is a 1951 graduate of Washington and is a native of Wilbur, Wash.



GARY WRIGHT Publicity Director

Gary Wright joins the Seattle staff as publicity director after two years in the same capacity with the World Football League (1974) and Southern California (1975). He has also worked as Vice President of Operations for the Phoenix Racquets of World Team Tennis. Wright was Sports Information Director at Long Beach State for four years and was the school's media liaison at three NCAA basketball tournaments and the Pasadena Bowl football game. While in Long Beach, he worked two years as color commentator for football and basketball radio broadcasts. He has also been a high school coach and journalism instructor.





BRUCE SCOTT

Trainer

Bruce Scott, former assistant trainer with the Detroit Lions, is Seattle's head trainer. Scott attended Ball State University and the D. T. Watson School of Physiatrics in Leetsdale, Pa., prior to becoming assistant trainer at the University of Washington. After three years at the University of Washington, he spent one year as head trainer at the University of Arkansas. From Arkansas he went to the Lions, where he spent four years as assistant trainer.



JIM WHITESEL

Assistant Trainer

Jim Whitesel brings a long list of credentials to his position as assistant trainer with the Seahawks. Prior to joining the Seahawks, Whitesel was head trainer at Seattle Pacific College for two years. He has also worked as an assistant trainer at Washington State (two years) and the University of Washington (one year) after serving as a student trainer for four years at the University of Washington. Whitesel is a UW graduate and earned his Masters Degree in Sports Medicine. He is also a member of the Certified Athletic Trainers Association. A Seattle resident, Whitesel graduated from Pierce High School in Parkland, Wash.

HARRY YALACKI

Equipment Manager

Harry Yalacki is serving as the Seahawks' equipment manager after five years in a similar position at the University of Washington. He spent three years as assistant equipment manager at Washington prior to assuming the top position. A native of Grand Rapids, Mich., Yalacki retired from the Navy in 1964 after a 20-year service career. He was a chief aviation machinist mate while in the Navy.



TOM LeCOMPTE

Assistant Equipment Manager

Tom LeCompte, former equipment manager at the University of Puget Sound, is Seattle's assistant equipment manager. A native of Aberdeen, Washington, LeCompte worked the past year as Puget Sound's equipment manager and assistant field house superintendent. He has also worked as a teacher in the Tacoma School District. He graduated from Puget Sound with degrees in Elementary Education and Physical Education. He attended Aberdeen High School and Grays Harbor Community College prior to enrolling at Puget Sound.



TOM FERMSTAD

Tom Fermstad is the Seattle Seahawks' first film director. After spending one year in the army in Viet Nam, Tom became interested in film making as a possible career. In 1972, Fermstad started working for the Minnesota Vikings, and spent three years as their assistant film director. Aside from working with football films, Tom became interested in doing nature documentaries and working on short dramatic presentations in and around Minnesota. Tom has also had experience in starting film labs in Minneapolis.



SCOUTING STAFF

CHARLES GARCIA

Charles Garcia, a former scout for CEPO, joins the Seahawks as the club's Midwest scout. Garcia played at Prairie View and graduated in 1957. After one year as athletic director and head coach at Cuero, Tex. High School, Garcia spent three years in the Army. He then served as head coach and athletic director at Hitchcock, Tex. and followed that as defensive coordinator at Pinkston High in Dallas, Tex. Prior to joining CEPO in 1972, Garcia was defensive coordinator at Bishop College for four seasons.



RALPH GOLDSTON

East

Ralph Goldston joins the Seattle scouting staff after serving as offensive backfield coach with the Chicago Bears last year. Goldston played college football at both Indiana and Youngstown. He was drafted by Philadelphia in 1952 and played four years with the Eagles. He then played nine seasons with Hamilton in the Canadian Football League and closed out his career with Montreal in 1965. He served as defensive coach for Montreal between 1966 and 1969 and then scouted for the New York Giants. He coached at Harvard (1971-72) and Colorado (1973) before joining the Bears.



MIKE KELLER

West Coast

Mike Keller, former Dallas Cowboys line-backer, will serve the Seahawks as West Coast scout and a player personnel assistant. He was a third round draft choice by the Cowboys in 1972 after an All-America career at Michigan. He spent the 1973 season on Dallas' Injured Reserve List and worked under Dick Mansperger, now Seattle's Director of Player Personnel, in the scouting department. He joined Dallas as a full-time scout in 1974. Keller was a defensive end at the University of Michigan.

JACK PATERA

Head Coach

From Seattle general manager John Thompson to Minnesota defensive end Jim Marshall, National Football League people believe the Seahawks made an excellent choice in naming Jack Patera as their first head coach

Patera, 42-years old, moves to Seattle with a proven winning record as an NFL assistant coach. He has coached the Minnesota defensive line for the past seven years and prior to that was an assistant with the New York Giants (1967-1968) and Los Angeles Rams (1963-1966).

"One of the earliest criteria in our search was to find someone who had been associated with winning programs," said Thompson. "That's certainly true of Jack."



In his years with the Vikings, Minnesota played in two Super Bowl games and four NFC championship games while compiling a 76-22 regular season record.

"He's had the experience and he's the right age to make the jump," says Minnesota head coach Bud Grant. "He has the temperment, and he's attuned to the modern-day football player.

"Technically, he has all the knowledge and he's got the capacity for work that he needs. He doesn't look at the clock — he just works until the job is done. And he's had the respect of all the players he's worked with."

Patera has worked with an impressive list of players, like the Purple People Eaters in Minnesota and the original Fearsome Foursome in Los Angeles.

"Jack's the kind of person you hate to lose," says Marshall. "He's absolutely the best person Seattle could have hired."

Marshall's teammate Alan Page agrees.

"I have personally enjoyed working with Jack, and the Vikings will be hard pressed to replace him. He's a good person, he knows football."

Prior to entering the coaching field, Patera played seven seasons in the NFL as a guard and linebacker. He played with Baltimore from 1955 through 1957, was with the Chicago Cardinals in 1958 and 1959, and then played for two years with the expansion Dallas Cowboys.

"I'm just happy being back in the Northwest," says the former University of

Oregon star, "and I hope it's a long stay."

Patera lettered four years at Oregon (1951 through 1954) and was named to the All-Pacific Coast Conference team and played in the College All-Star, Hula Bowl and East-West games.

One of the coaches on the Oregon staff during Patera's years was John McKay, now head coach at Tampa Bay

A graduate of Washington High in Portland, Ore., he has three brothers. One brother, Dennis, played with the San Francisco 49ers, and another, Ken, was an Olympic weightlifter and is now a professional wrestler.


Patera and his wife Susan have four children, Michael, 20, Mary, 16, John,

BOB HOLLWAY

Defensive Backs and Coordinator

Bob Hollway, former St. Louis Cardinals head coach, will coordinate Seattle's defense this fall along with coaching the defensive backs. After coaching the Cards in 1971 and 1972, Hollway has served as an assistant with the Detroit Lions (1973-74) and San Francisco 49ers (1975). He broke into coaching in 1951 at Maine after lettering for three seasons as an end at Michigan. Following two years at Maine and one at Eastern Michigan, Hollway returned to his alma mater as an assistant (1954-65). He spent 1966 as a radio broadcaster and then joined the Vikings, where he was an assistant for four years. His final two seasons with Minnesota. Hollway served as defensive coordinator



SAM BOGHOSIAN Offensive Line and Coordinator

Sam Boghosian joins the Seattle staff after two seasons with the Houston Oilers. Boghosian developed the Oilers' offensive line, which helped transform the club into a contender. Broke into coaching at UCLA under Henry "Red" Sanders in 1955 after earning All-Coast honors on the Bruins' 1954 national championship team. During his three years as a player at UCLA, the Bruins compiled a 25-3 record. He coached at UCLA through 1964 when he moved to Oregon State as offensive coordinator and line coach. Among his proteges at OSU were current Seattle players John Didion and Rocky Rasley. He coached under Dee Andros with the Beavers until moving to the NFL in 1974.





EARL LEGGETT

Defensive Line

A 12-year National Football League veteran, Earl Leggett will coach the Seahawks' defensive line. After an All-America career at Louisiana State, Leggett was drafted on the first round by the Chicago Bears in 1956. He played nine years as a defensive lineman with Chicago and helped the Bears win the 1963 NFL championship. He then played one year with the Los Angeles Rams (1966) and two years with the New Orleans Saints (1967-1968). He broke into coaching in 1971 at Nicholls State and then moved to Texas Christian for the 1972 and 1973 seasons. The past two years he coached the defensive line for the Southern California Sun of the World Football League



ANDY MacDONALD

Offensive Backs

Andy MacDonald, former offensive coordinator at Michigan State, will coach the Seahawks' offensive backs this year. MacDonald worked at Michigan State for three seasons after serving as offensive coordinator at Colorado State (1970-71) and as backfield coach at Tulsa (1969). Prior to moving to Tulsa, he was head coach at Northern Arizona (1965-68) after four years as an aide at lowa (1961-64). He was head coach at Flint Northern High in Flint, Mich. from 1954 through 1960. MacDonald was a national college division passing leader and Little All-American quarterback at Central Michigan in 1950 and 1951.

LARRY PECCATIELLO

Linebackers


An assistant coach with the Houston Oilers for the past four seasons, Larry Peccatiello will coach the Seattle linebackers this fall. An All-Southern Conference receiver and co-captain at William & Mary before his graduation as a Dean's List student in 1958, he returned to his almamater in 1961 as an assistant coach. He staved at William & Mary until 1969 when he moved to the U.S. Naval Academy as an assistant under Rick Forzano, current Detroit coach. In 1970 he joined Bill Peterson's staff at Florida State and followed Peterson to Rice in 1971, where Peccatiello served as defensive coordinator. When Peterson became head coach of the Oilers he made the move with him



JERRY RHOME Quarterbacks and Receivers

Runner-up in the 1964 Heisman Trophy ballotting as a senior at the University of Tulsa, Jerry Rhome will coach Seattle's quarterbacks and receivers. After an eightyear NFL career as a quarterback with Dallas (1965-68), Cleveland (1969), Houston (1970) and Los Angeles (1971-72), Rhome joined the coaching staff at Tulsa in 1973. As an undergraduate, he broke 16 NCAA records. His 68.7 percent accuracy and 198 attempts without an interception still stand as records. Rhome was named All-America. Back of the Year by Associated Press and the Washington TD Club and led the nation in passing and total offense following his senior season in 1964.





OUTLOOK

The Seattle Seahawks first-ever training camp will be conducted on a note of optimism.

"Controlled optimism," cautions Jack Patera, the 13-year National Football League assistant coach, who makes his head coaching debut with the expansion Seahawks.

Twenty-five collegiate draft choices, 38 players attained in the veteran allocation and an assortment of free agents will form the first-ever Seahawks training camp roster.

"We have to control our optimism," says Patera. "We must remember that while we feel our collegiate draft was very successful, the reason we have the 38 veterans is that other teams thought them expendable."

In the collegiate draft the Seahawks selected Notre Dame's giant defensive tackle Steve Niehaus on the first round and Florida's gifted linebacker Sammy Green on the second.

"Niehaus obviously gives us more quality in the defensive line. As a rookie, however, he may not perform as well as he and the spectators might like," Patera cautions. "He's mature enough to know he will get both credit and criticism he doesn't deserve."

Green (6-2, 228) led Florida in tackles with 202 last season and was credited with six sacks, forced four fumbles and recovered one.

"Many people around the league have told us that Sammy may have been the best pick of the entire draft," noted Patera.

"Normally an NFL team figures that your first, second and third draft choices have a good chance to make the team," Patera said. "We'd probably say that about our first seven. In fact, you can figure that there will be more than seven rookies making this team," he added.

The Seahawks also figure to strengthen themselves through acquisition of players waived by other NFC teams. The Seahawks have first choice on players waived by NFC clubs.

But back to the controlled optimism.

"I love to shuffle the linebackers' names on paper," said Patera. "They look so good. The best quality on the team is most likely at linebacker. We feel we can be pretty strong at that position," said Patera, himself a former linebacker.

Patera can start with the likes of veteran all-pro Mike Curtis from Baltimore, who Jack says is "probably the premier middle linebacker in the league."

Ken Geddes has been a three-year starter for the Los Angeles Rams and Don Hansen of Atlanta, Ed Bradley of Pittsburgh, and Ken Hutcherson from Green Bay give the Seahawks a solid nucleus.

Add draft choices Sammy Green and Randy Coffield (6-3, 215, Florida State) and free agent Gordon Riegel (6-5, 230, Stanford) and you can see Jack's reason for optimism.

On offense, Patera admits, the Seahawks could use some added firepower.

"It is quite obvious we don't have a proven corps of running backs." Patera said. "It is an area that we will continue to try to better ourselves."

OUTLOOK

Baltimore's Bill Olds, a three-year veteran from Nebraska, and Kerry Marbury, out of West Virginia by way of the CFL, have the most playing experience among the veteran selectees. Gary Hayman, starting his third year from Penn State, was O.J.'s backup at Buffalo and, obviously, had little playing time.

Marbury scored 18 touchdowns in his junior year at West Virginia, then

played in Toronto in 1973 and Ottawa in '74 and '75.

Éight quarterbacks are in the Seahawks picture going into training camp. Gary Keithley and Neil Graff from St. Louis and New England, respectively, are the veterans acquired in the allocation. Steve Myer was a fourth round draft choice from New Mexico and Jim Zorn is a free agent who was Dallas' final cut before the 1975 season. Others are free agents Scott Christman from Oklahoma State, Herb Singleton from Oregon, Bob Cason from Puget Sound, and Chris Rowland from the University of Washington, a 17th round selection.

In the offensive line Patera counts on help from veteran Miami star Norm Evans, a 10-year starter for the Dolphins. Along with Evans on the offensive line, the Seahawks picked up Cleveland's John Demarie, who can play any line position; San Francisco guard Bob Penchion; Atlanta tackle Nick Bebout; Houston center Fred Hoaglin; Kansas City guard Rocky Rasley; Detroit tackle Gordon Jolley; and center Art Kuehn, who was selected from Washington, but was a starter with Southern California in the World Football League.

Heading a fine corps of receivers is free agent signee Ahmad Rashad, former St. Louis Cardinals and Buffalo Bills star. Other wide receivers include veterans Sam McCullum, Bob Picard, Dave Williams, and Don Clune, plus draft choices

Steve Raible and Sherman Smith.

Tight end candidates include Ron Howard, John McMakin and Charles Waddell, all selected in the veteran allocation, along with sixth round draft choice Alvis Darby and free agents Reggie Brown, Greg DenBoer, and Ruben Hodges.


"Defensively, we've got some good players with talent and good experience. Offensively, we were helped by the availability of some veteran linemen," said

Patera.

To go along with the linebacking unit on defense are nine defensive backs and five linemen from the veteran allocation.

Seahawks up front are Carl Barisich from Cleveland; Larry Woods from the Jets; Dave Tipton fron San Diego; Joe Owens from New Orleans; and Wayne Baker from San Francisco.

Seattle's secondary includes Eddie McMillan, a starter from Los Angeles; Lyle Blackwood from Cincinnati; Steve Taylor from Denver; Jerry Davis from the Jets; Rolly Woolsey from Dallas; Al Matthews from Green Bay; Rondy Colbert from the Giants; Dave Brown from Pittsburgh; and Dwayne Crump from St. Louis.

BUILDING THE FRANCHISE

CHRONOLOGY

June 15, 1972 Seattle Professional Football, a group of business and community leaders, announce their intention to attempt to secure a National Football League franchise for the City of Seattle. Herman Sarkowsky serves as spokesman for the group. November 2, 1972 Construction began on The Kingdome. June 4, 1974 The National Football League announces that Seattle will have a franchise for the 1976 season. The National Football League announces that it has December 5, 1974 voted membership to Seattle Professional Football, Inc., headed by Lloyd W. Nordstrom with partners Herman Sarkowsky, D. E. "Ned" Skinner, Howard S. Wright, M. Lamont Bean, and Lynn P. Himmelman. March 6, 1975 John Thompson, Executive Director of the NFL Management Council, named General Manager of the Seattle franchise. Nickname "Seahawks" selected from 20,365 entries June 17, 1975 and 1,741 different names. One hundred fifty-one suggested "Seahawks." June 25, 1975 1977 Pro Bowl awarded to Seattle. July 25, 1975 Mailed season ticket applications. July 28, 1975 Season ticket applications accepted - 24,168 received the first day. August 5, 1975 Chamber of Commerce-sponsored kick-off luncheon attended by 1,700 including Commissioner Pete Rozelle. Season ticket sales closed after 27 days - 59,000 August 23, 1975 tickets sold. September 7, 1975 Cleveland Browns vs. New York Giants at University of Washington Stadium sponsored by Seahawks. November 6, 1975 Agreement reached between KIRO and Seahawks for radio broadcast rights. November 24, 1975 Dave Williams, former University of Washington All-America, becomes first Seahawk player to sign contract.

January 13, 1976	Seattle and Tampa Bay file joint legal action against NFL Players Association seeking judicial declaration of legality of plan to stock new teams.
January 20, 1976	Lloyd W. Nordstrom, spokesman for the Nordstrom family, the Seahawks' majority owners, dies of a heart attack while vacationing in Mexico.
January 22, 1976	Pete Gross of KIRO named play-by-play announcer for Seahawks radio broadcasts.
February 20, 1976	Judge Joseph Eaton dismisses Seattle and Tampa Bay suit when NFL Players Association agrees not to challenge legality of veteran allocation or finance challenging action by individual players. Way is cleared for veteran allocation and college draft to be held.
February 27, 1976	Kirkland site selected for Seahawk office and practice facilities.
March 30, 1976	Veteran allocation held in New York City. Seahawks select 39 NFL veterans.
April 8-9, 1976	College draft. Seahawks select 25 collegians in their first college draft. Notre Dame's Steve Niehaus is the first choice and he flies to Seattle for evening news conference on April 8.
April 23-25, 1976	Rookie orientation. Jack Patera greets 53 rookies for three-day session including physicals, equipment fittings, team meetings, two light workouts and boat tour of Seattle's Lake Washington.

VETERAN ALLOCATION

The Seattle Seahawks added 38 names and one future to its first roster in the National Football League's recent veteran allocation.

Some were familiar all-pro names like Mike Curtis and Norm Evans. Others were names of young stars like Ken Geddes and Eddie McMillan. And yet others like Kerry Marbury and Ron Howard carry plenty of potential.

"We had a plan established going into the allocation and followed it closely," said Seahawks head coach Jack Patera. "It turned out favorably and we are very pleased with our selections.

'Defensively, we got some good players with talent and good experience. Offensively, we were helped by the availability of some veteran linemen."

The one future player is defensive end Jesse O'Neal, who was selected from Houston's list but is under contract to Saskatchewan in the Canadian Football League.

The average Seahawk selected in the veteran allocation is 6-2, 222 pounds, just under 26 years old and is entering his fourth NFL season.

"We feel Steve Niehaus will be as valuable to us as a quarterback would be to many teams," said Seattle coach Jack Patera in announcing the first ever draft choice of the Seahawks.

"He can be an anchor for our defense, who will be here for 10 years."

Patera could very easily be right. Expansion teams in the past have had remarkable success with their very first choice — in fact, all but one achieved all-star recognition.

Dallas went for Bob Lilly, a 14-year veteran and perennial all-pro. Minnesota went for Tommy Mason, who had an 11-year star-studded career. Atlanta went for all-star linebacker Tommy Nobis, who will start his 11th season this fall, and the Bengals went for talented center Bob Johnson, who enters his ninth campagin.

When New Orleans entered the NFL they traded away their first pick and Miami's initial choice, Jim Grabowski, signed with Green Bay.

Including Niehaus, Seattle selected five players who earned All-America honors, Sammy Green, Rick Engles, Randy Johnson and Don Dufek.




THE KINGDOME

The country's newest domed stadium — The Kingdome — will be the home of the country's newest professional football team — The Seattle Seahawks.

Both will make their National Football League debut this fall.

At a cost of \$67 million and with a seating capacity of 65,000 for football, The Kingdome is the least expensive domed, air-conditioned stadium of its size anywhere in the world.

Despite its relative low cost, The Kingdome will not take a backseat to any facility in the country.



The project was completed by Peter Kiewit Sons' Construction Co. and was originally a bond issue passed by a 62 percent majority of the voters of King County and spearheaded by County Executive John Spellman. Construction began on November 2, 1972.

At The Kingdome's grand opening March 27, 1976, over 50,000 curious spectators came to see everything from the AstroTurf to the scoreboard, while anticipating a monumental traffic jam.

Tommy Walker produced a three-and-a-half-hour entertainment extravaganza that included 7,000 participants and traffic problems were minimal. Best of all, everything worked — the television screen, the water fountains, the elevators, and the sound system. Lines at the 36 concession stands moved briskly and the food was good.

The traffic was kept down because of the varied mode of travel by Seattle sports fans. They came by car, by bus, by boat and by train.

For those that came by car there were 17,000 on and off-street parking spaces within a nine-block perimeter and they are serviced by shuttle bus.

The Kingdome's second public appearance was just as impressive when over 58,000 fans were attracted to a North American Soccer League contest between the legendary Pele, his New York Cosmos teammates and the Seattle Sounders.
