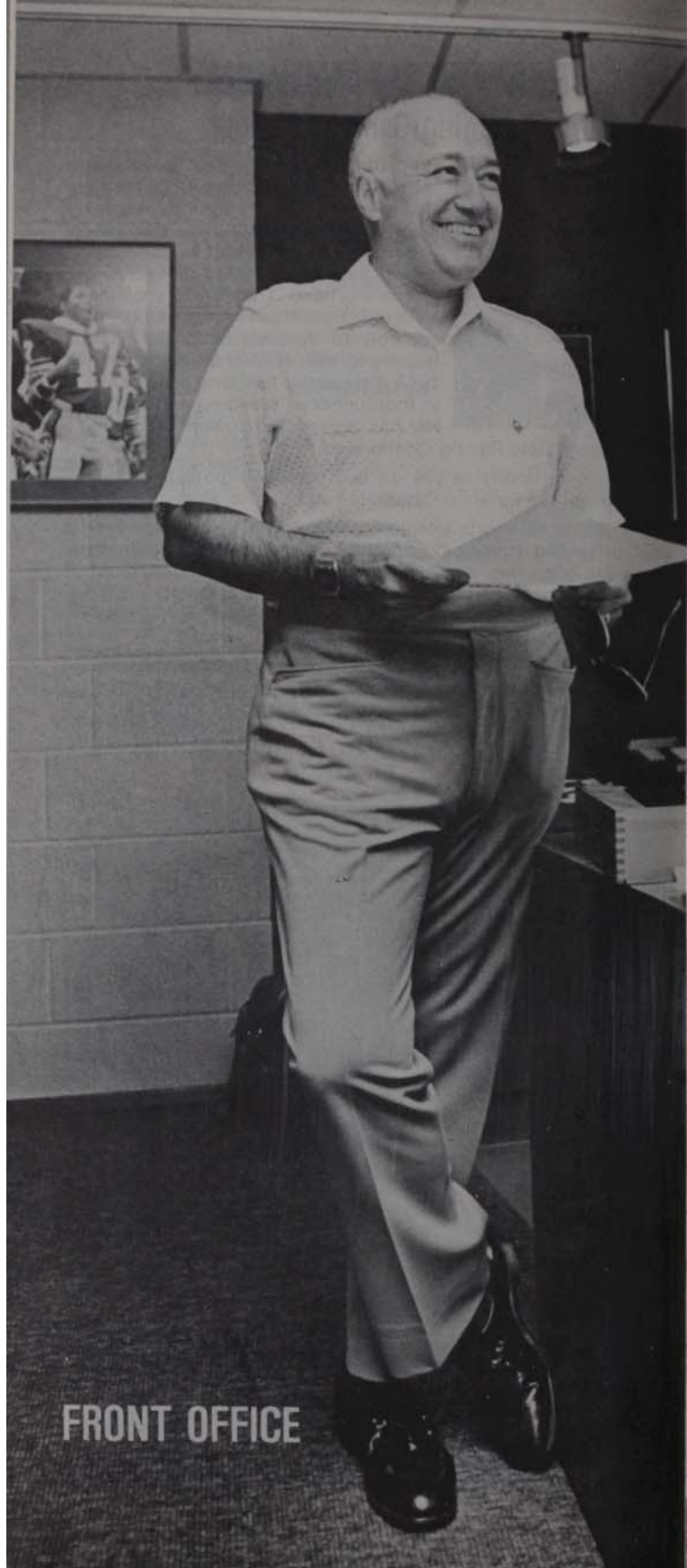
Washington State Racing Commission.

JOHN THOMPSON

General Manager



Appointed: Named General Manager of the Seattle Seahawks on March 6, 1975. Following the Seahawks' 9-7 season last year, Thompson was named NFL Executive of the Year by The Sporting News. In addition to serving as the Seahawks' General Manager, he is on two National Football League committees — College-Pro Relations Committee, and the Pre-Season Schedule Committee.

NFL Experience: His first NFL position was as Publicity Director of the Minnesota Vikings, when the club was formed in 1960. Thompson later served as Assistant General Manager of the Vikings before assuming the position of Assistant to the President of the National Football Conference in 1970. In 1971, he became the first full-time Executive Director of the NFL's Management Council.

Previous Experience: Prior to moving into professional football, Thompson was Sports Information Director at the University of Washington.

College: He graduated from the University of Washington as a Journalism major.

High School: Attended South Bend High School in South Bend, Washington.

Personal: Thompson and his wife Mimi are residents of Mercer Island, a Seattle suburb. They have three children, Rick, a graduate of Hamline (Minn.) University and the Seahawks' Training Camp Director; Mike, a graduate of Colorado College; and Kathi, a graduate of Washington State University.

MARK DUNCAN

Assistant General Manager



Mark Duncan carries 23 years of National Football League experience with his position of Assistant General Manager with the Seahawks. He assumed his duties with Seattle in April of 1975 and is credited with the planning and directing of the club's Kirkland office and practice complex. Before coming to Seattle, he was Director of Player Personnel with the Los Angeles Rams for two years. Duncan spent 10 years in the NFL

office as Director of Personnel and Supervisor of Officials before moving to Los Angeles. He broke into the NFL as an assistant coach with the San Francisco 49ers (1955-62). A member of the Colorado Sports Hall of Fame, Duncan played college football and basketball at Denver University and then served as an assistant football coach at Colorado College and Denver before being named head coach at his alma mater in 1946. He was an assistant football coach and head baseball coach at Colorado State before joining the 49ers.

DON ANDERSEN

Director of Public Relations



Don Andersen is in his fourth year as the Seahawks' Director of Public Relations. Andersen joined the Seattle staff in December of 1975 after serving two years in the World Football League, first as Vice President of Public Relations for the league office and then in a similar capacity for the Southern California Sun. Prior to moving into professional football, Andersen was the Director of the Athletic News Service at the University of Southern California

for seven years. While at USC, he served as press manager for five Rose Bowl games, two NCAA basketball championship tournaments and as color commentator of USC radio broadcasts. Prior to joining USC in 1967, Andersen was an administrator with the California Interscholastic Federation for four years.

DICK MANSPERGER

Director of Player Personnel



Dick Mansperger is in his fifth year as Director of Player Personnel with the Seattle Seahawks. One of the first employees hired by the Seahawks, Mansperger came to Seattle from Dallas, where he had been Director of Player Personnel since 1972. Prior to being promoted, Mansperger had been a Dallas scout for six years. After playing under Dan Devine and Frank Kush at Arizona State, Mansperger joined the ASU coaching staff in 1958 and

later became head coach at Palo Verde, Calif., J.C. for two years. He coached at West Texas State in 1961 and returned to Arizona State in 1962. Mansperger then joined the UCLA coaching staff for the 1963 and 1964 seasons. He went to Dallas as a scout for one year and then coached a season at Iowa (1966) before returning to the Cowboys.

CHUCK ALLEN

Director of Pro Scouting



Chuck Allen is in his fifth year as a member of the Seattle Seahawks staff. He joined the organization in June of 1975 as Director of Pro Scouting. A former all-coast and all-conference player at the University of Washington, Allen was an assistant coach with the Huskies (1973-74) prior to taking his current position. Allen played nine seasons with the San Diego Chargers and was named to the All-American Football League team in 1961 as a rookie.

He was a second-team choice in 1964. During his playing career, Allen served as the Chargers' defensive captain. He spent 1970, 1971 and part of the 1972 season with the Pittsburgh Steelers and finished his career in 1972 with the Philadelphia Eagles. He was selected to the All-Time All-Northwest team in 1976 for his play at the University of Washington and in professional football.

BOB ANDERSON

Business Manager



Bob Anderson is in his third year as Business Manager for the Seattle Seahawks. Helped in instituting a computer system for Seahawks ticket department. A Certified Public Accountant, Anderson was with Niemi, Holland and Scott for four years prior to joining the Seahawks. He also worked for Arthur Andersen and Company in Portland for four years. Anderson is a graduate of Central Washington State College in Ellensburg, Wash. A native of the state, he was born in

Wenatchee and attended Rainier Beach High School in Seattle.

THOM FERMSTAD

Film Director



Thom Fermstad became the Seattle Seahawks Film Director in April of 1976. Fermstad came to Seattle after three years as the Minnesota Vikings' Assistant Film Director. He has also worked on nature documentaries and short dramatic presentations in Seattle and the Minnesota area. This off-season, he produced Paper Route, a 15-minute dramatic short story. Fermstad has also had experience in starting film labs in Minneapolis. Prior to joining

the Vikings, he was in the army and served a tour of duty in Viet Nam.

BOB FERGUSON

Dir. of Group Sales, Special Events



Bob Ferguson, who has worked in the Seahawks scouting and ticket departments since July of 1975, assumed his duties as Director of Group Sales and Special Events in June of 1978. Ferguson was a three-year football letterman at the University of Washington and earned first team All-Coast honors in 1971 and 1972 as a linebacker. He graduated with a degree in Radio and Television Communications. Following his collegiate career, he had tryouts with

the San Diego Chargers and Los Angeles Rams. He is a graduate of Federal Way High School in Federal Way, Wash.

MIKE KELLER

Asst. to the General Manager



Mike Keller is in his fifth year as a member of the Seahawks organization and was promoted to the post of Assistant to the General Manager in June of 1978. He had previously been a staff scout. A third-round draft choice by Dallas in 1972 after an All-America career as a defensive end at Michigan, Keller spent the 1973 season on Dallas' injured reserve list and worked in the Cowboys scouting department under the direction of Dick Mansperger, now

Seattle's Director of Player Personnel. The following year he joined Dallas as a full-time scout and then joined the Seahawks in May of 1975.

EARL LEGGETT, JR.

Assistant Equipment Manager



Earl Leggett, Jr., who served as visiting clubhouse attendant in 1976, is in his second year as Assistant Equipment Manager. He is the son of Earl Leggett, former Seattle defensive line coach. The 23-year-old Leggett worked in the Texas Christian University equipment room for two years and then spent two seasons assisting the Southern California Sun equipment staff.

JAMES NAGAOKA

Assistant Ticket Director



James Nagaoka joined the Seahawks staff in June of 1978 as Assistant Ticket Director. Prior to joining the Seattle staff, he was Assistant Director of Ticket Sales and Promotion at the University of Washington, a position he held since April of 1976. A graduate of the University of Washington, he is the former President of Husky Winter Sports and worked as a public relations consultant for Goodrich, Snyder and Ohlenkamp, a public relations firm in

Seattle, prior to joining the Washington staff.

Bruce Scott is in his fourth year as head trainer with the Seattle Seahawks after four years as assistant trainer with the Detroit Lions. In addition to his regular duties, Scott coordinates the club's off-season weight training program. He attended Ball State University and the D.T. Watson School of Physiatrics in Leetsdale, Pa., prior to becoming assistant trainer at the University of Washington. After three years at the University of Washington, he spent one

year as head trainer at the University of Arkansas prior to joining the Lions. He is a member of the Certified Athletic Trainers Association.

RICK THOMPSON

Training Camp Director



Rick Thompson joined the Seattle Seahawks staff in 1975 and has assisted the scouting department until June of 1978 when he assumed the position of Training Camp Director. Thompson also assists the scouting department. He is a graduate of Hamline University in St. Paul, Minn., where he earned a degree as a Sports Administration major. As an undergraduate, Thompson worked for the Minnesota Vikings for five years. A graduate of

Lincoln High School in Bloomington, Minn., Thompson played high school football with linebacker Monte Johnson of the Oakland Raiders and linebacker Tom Ruud of the Buffalo Bills.

CHUCK VELTE

Ticket Director



Chuck Velte is in his third year as the Seahawks' Ticket Director. Helped initiate computer system for Seahawks ticket operation. He is the Seahawks representative to the Kirkland Chamber of Commerce. Prior to joining Seattle, he was with Northwest Orient Airlines where he had been in that company's sales offices since 1973. During that time he handled commercial accounts, group sales tours, promotions and travel agency relations.

Velte had been with Northwest Orient since 1966 in various capacities. He served as a member on the Alaska Committee of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce and was program chairman of the executive committee of the Alaska Visitors Association. A licensed private pilot, Velte is a graduate of St. Thomas College in St. Paul, Minnesota.

JIM WHITESEL

Assistant Trainer



Jim Whitesel is in his fourth season as assistant trainer with the Seattle Seahawks. Prior to joining the Seahawks, Whitesel was head trainer at Seattle Pacific College for two years. He has also worked as an assistant trainer at Washington State and the University of Washington. Whitesel is a UW graduate and earned his Masters Degree in Sports Medicine. He is a member of the Certified Athletic Trainers Association. Whitesel graduated from Franklin Pierce High School in Parkland, Wash.

Gary Wright is in his fourth year as Director of Publicity for the Seattle Seahawks. He joined the club after two years in the same capacity with the World Football League and Southern California Sun. While at Long Beach, he also served as color commentator for football and basketball radio broadcasts. Wright has also been a high school football coach and journalism instructor.

Staff Scout

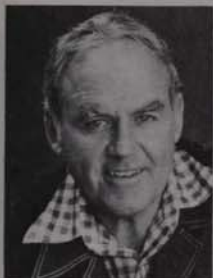


Ralph Goldston, in his fourth year as a staff scout, came to the Seahawks from the Chicago Bears, where he had been offensive backfield coach. Goldston played college football at Indiana and Youngstown State and then was drafted by the Philadelphia Eagles in 1952. He played four years with the Eagles and then nine seasons with Hamilton in the Canadian Football League. He closed out his career with Montreal of the CFL in 1965.

Goldston served as defensive coach for Montreal from 1966 through 1969 and then scouted for the Giants. He then coached at Harvard (1971-72) and Colorado (1973) before going to the Bears.

CHARLIE HALL

Staff Scout



Charlie Hall is in his third year as a member of the Seattle organization as a staff scout. Prior to joining the Seahawks he was with the QUADRA scouting combine for six years. Prior to joining QUADRA, Hall was Director of Player Personnel for five years with the Houston Oilers. After graduating from Whittier College, Hall coached at Bellflower, Calif., High School and Cerritos Junior College in Norwalk, Calif., before joining John McKay's

staff at the University of Southern California. He was an assistant under McKay from 1960 through 1965.

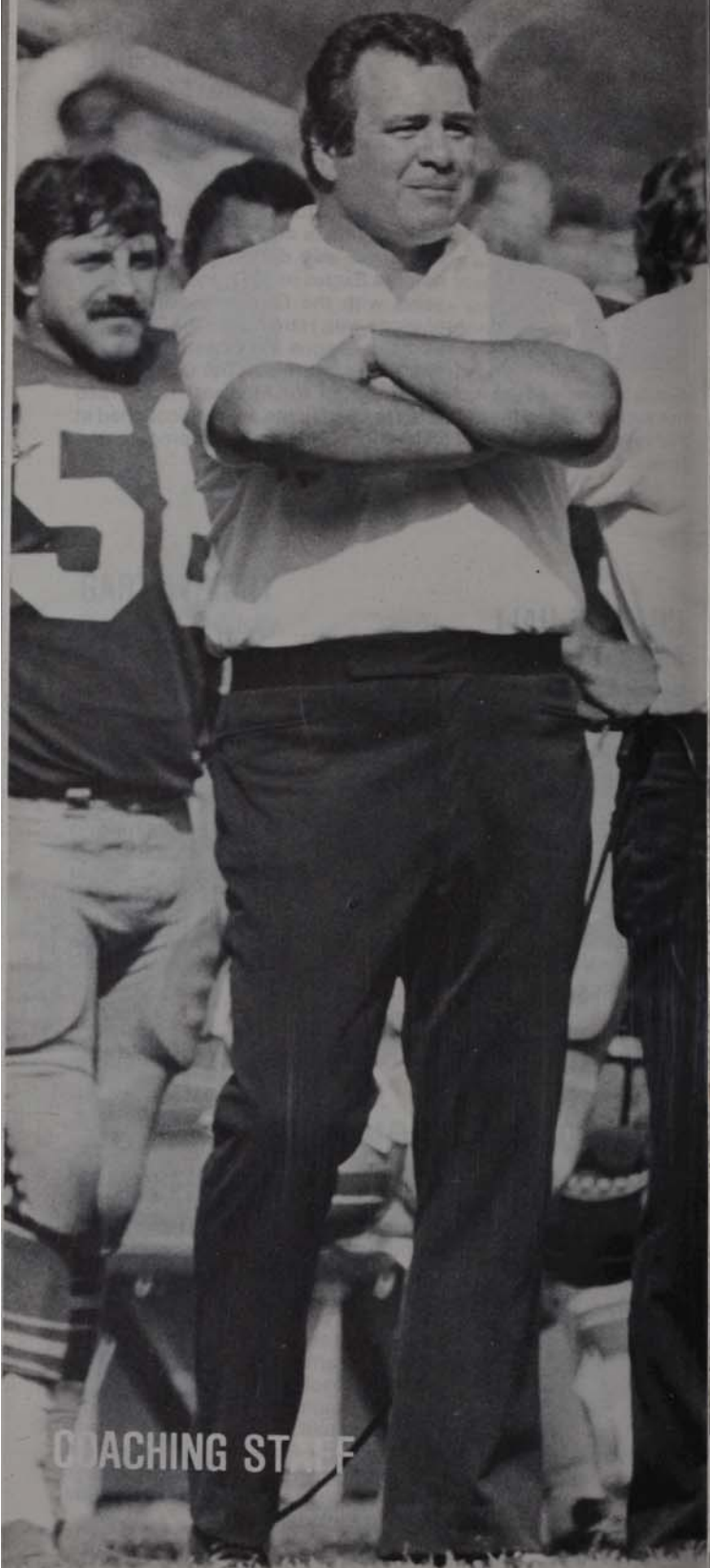
VIC LINDSKOG

Staff Scout



Vic Lindskog joined the Seattle scouting staff in 1977 after 13 years as a scout with QUADRA. Lindskog joined QUADRA in 1964 after a career as a player and coach in professional football. Prior to breaking into scouting he was an assistant coach with the Los Angeles Rams from 1961 through 1963. He also coached for four years with the British Columbia Lions of the Canadian Football League and three seasons with the Philadelphia Eagles after

playing with the Eagles for eight years. Lindskog played his college football at Stanford and coached at Stanford for two years prior to signing as a player with Philadelphia.



COACHING STAFF

JACK PATERA

Head Coach



Seahawks: Named head coach of the Seattle Seahawks Jan. 3, 1976. Patera originally signed a three-year contract and was given an extension through the 1980 season after his second year. Patera was named NFL Coach of the Year by Associated Press, The Sport-News, the Touchdown Club of Washington, D.C., and the Seattle Gold Helmet board of selectors following last season's 9-7 campaign. Patera was also named AFC Coach of the Year by

Kansas City 101 Club. Patera coached the Seahawks to a 2-12 season in their first year of operation and followed that up with a 5-9 mark in 1977. Seattle's 1977 and 1978 win totals established NFL expansion records for second and third-year teams, respectively.

Coaching Experience: Patera's first coaching assignment was as defensive line coach for the Los Angeles Rams, where he coached the original Fearsome Foursome of Lamar Lundy, David (Deacon) Jones, Rosey Grier and Merlin Olsen. He left the Rams in 1967 to coach the defensive line for the New York Giants and then joined the Minnesota Vikings coaching staff in 1969. At Minnesota, he coached another of pro football's great defensive lines, the Purple People Eaters of Jim Marshall, Carl Eller, Alan Page and Gary Larsen. During his tenure with the Vikings, Minnesota played in three Super Bowls and four National Football Conference championship games and compiled a 76-22 regular season record.

Pro Playing Experience: A fourth-round draft choice of the Baltimore Colts, Patera played from 1955 through 1957 with the Colts. He then played two years, 1958 and 1959, with the Chicago Cardinals before closing out his career with the expansion Dallas Cowboys in 1960 and 1961. A guard and linebacker during his seven years in the NFL, Patera intercepted five passes and recovered four fumbles during his career.

College: Patera graduated from the University of Oregon in 1955 with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Education. He lettered four seasons under Len Casanova from 1951 through 1954 and earned All-Pacific Coast Conference honors in 1954. He culminated his collegiate career with performances in the College All-Star, Hula Bowl and East-West games.

High School: A graduate of Washington High in Portland, Oregon, Patera lettered three years as a tackle.

Personal: Married the former Susan Bennett. They have four children, Michael, 23; Mary 20; John 17; and Beth, 16. The Pateras reside on Mercer Island, a suburb of Seattle. He has two brothers who have been active in athletics, Dennis and Ken. Dennis was a kicker with the San Francisco 49ers in 1968, while Ken is a former Olympic weightlifter and current professional wrestler. He was born August 1, 1933, in Bismarck, North Dakota.

CUTDOWN DATES

National Football League clubs will observe the following cutdown dates for the 1979 season: Rosters must be trimmed to 60 players by August 14; 50 players by August 21; and 45 players by August 27.

LARRY PECCATIELLO

Defensive Coach, Linebackers



Larry Peccatiello is in his second season directing the Seattle defense and his fourth season as linebacker coach. Before coming to Seattle, Peccatiello coached the Houston Oilers linebackers for four seasons. An all-conference receiver and a member of the William & Mary Hall of Fame, he started his coaching career as an assistant at his alma mater in 1961 and stayed there until moving to the United States Naval Academy in 1969, where

he was an assistant under Rick Forzano. In 1970, he joined Bill Peterson's staff at Florida State and followed Peterson to Rice in 1971, where he served as defensive coordinator before moving into the National Football League with the Oilers.

JERRY RHOME

Offensive Coach, Quarterbacks



Jerry Rhome is in his fourth season coaching the Seattle quarterbacks and receivers and in his second season as the club's offensive coach. Rhome broke into coaching in 1973 at Tulsa following an eight-year career in the NFL as a player. During his career, Rhome played on three conference championship teams and was in the playoffs a fourth time. Drafted by Dallas, he played with the Cowboys from 1965 through 1968 and also saw

service with Cleveland (1969), Houston (1970) and Los Angeles (1971-72). As a collegian at Tulsa, he broke 16 NCAA passing records on his way to earning All-America recognition and being selected by the Washington Touchdown Club and Associated Press Back of the Year as a senior. He was also runner-up in the 1964 Heisman Trophy balloting.

JACK CHRISTIANSEN

Defensive Backs



Jack Christiansen, former head coach of the San Francisco 49ers and at Stanford University, is in his second year as defensive backfield coach for the Seahawks. He broke into coaching as an assistant with the 49ers in 1959 and became head coach three games into the 1963 season. He served as head coach through the 1967 season and had a 26-38-3 record. He joined John Ralston's staff at Stanford in 1968 and became head coach in 1972 and com-

plied a five-year record of 30-22-3. He coached the Kansas City Chiefs' offensive backs in 1977. Following a standout collegiate career at Colorado State, Christiansen played eight seasons in the NFL with the Detroit Lions and earned All-Pro recognition six times. He played on four conference championship teams, three NFL title winners and in the Pro Bowl five times. He intercepted 46 passes during his career and scored 13 touchdowns, including eight as a punt returner. Christiansen was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1970.

ANDY MacDONALD

Offensive Backs



Andy MacDonald is entering his fourth season coaching the Seattle Seahawks offensive backs. Before coming to Seattle, MacDonald coached for three seasons at Michigan State where he was offensive coordinator. He has also coached at Colorado State (1970-71), Tulsa (1969) and Iowa (1961-64), along with being head coach at Northern Arizona (1965-68). MacDonald was also a highly-successful high school coach at Flint Northern in Flint,

Michigan. As a collegian at Central Michigan in 1950 and 1951, he led the nation in college division passing and earned Little All-America recognition.

JIM MORA

Defensive Line



Jim Mora is in his second season in the National Football League after an outstanding career as a college coach. Mora came to the Seahawks from the University of Washington, where he was defensive coordinator for the 1978 Rose Bowl champions. He joined the University of Washington staff in 1975 after spending one year at UCLA, six at Colorado and a season at Stanford. A graduate of Occidental College, he spent three years in the Marine Corps,

where he played one season at Quantico and two years at Camp Lejeune. He returned to Occidental in 1960 as an assistant coach and became head coach in 1964. His three-year head coaching record was 18-9.



HOWARD MUDD

Offensive Line



Howard Mudd is in his second year as offensive line coach of the Seahawks. A former all-pro offensive guard with the San Francisco 49ers, Mudd joined the San Francisco coaching staff last season as offensive line coach after serving in a similar capacity for three years with the San Diego Chargers. He started his coaching career in 1972 as an assistant at the University of California. Mudd played six seasons with the 49ers and earned All-Pro honors

in 1967 and 1968 and participated in three Pro Bowls. He closed out his playing career with two seasons in Chicago. He was drafted by San Francisco on the ninth round in 1964 from Hillsdale College in Michigan. Following his professional career, he was named to the All-1960s team and last winter was inducted into the NAIA Hall of Fame.

RUSTY TILLMAN

Special Teams



Rusty Tillman is in his first season as an assistant coach with the Seattle Seahawks. Tillman's first coaching assignment comes after an eight-year career as a linebacker with the Washington Redskins. Tillman joined the Redskins in 1970 as a free agent out of Northern Arizona, where he played for Seahawks assistant coach Andy MacDonald. Tillman played in 107 games during his eight years with the Redskins, including 84 in a row, and

served as Washington's special teams captain. Played in Super Bowl VII. At Northern Arizona, he played linebacker, defensive end and tight end, along with setting a school record with a 44.5 punting average.

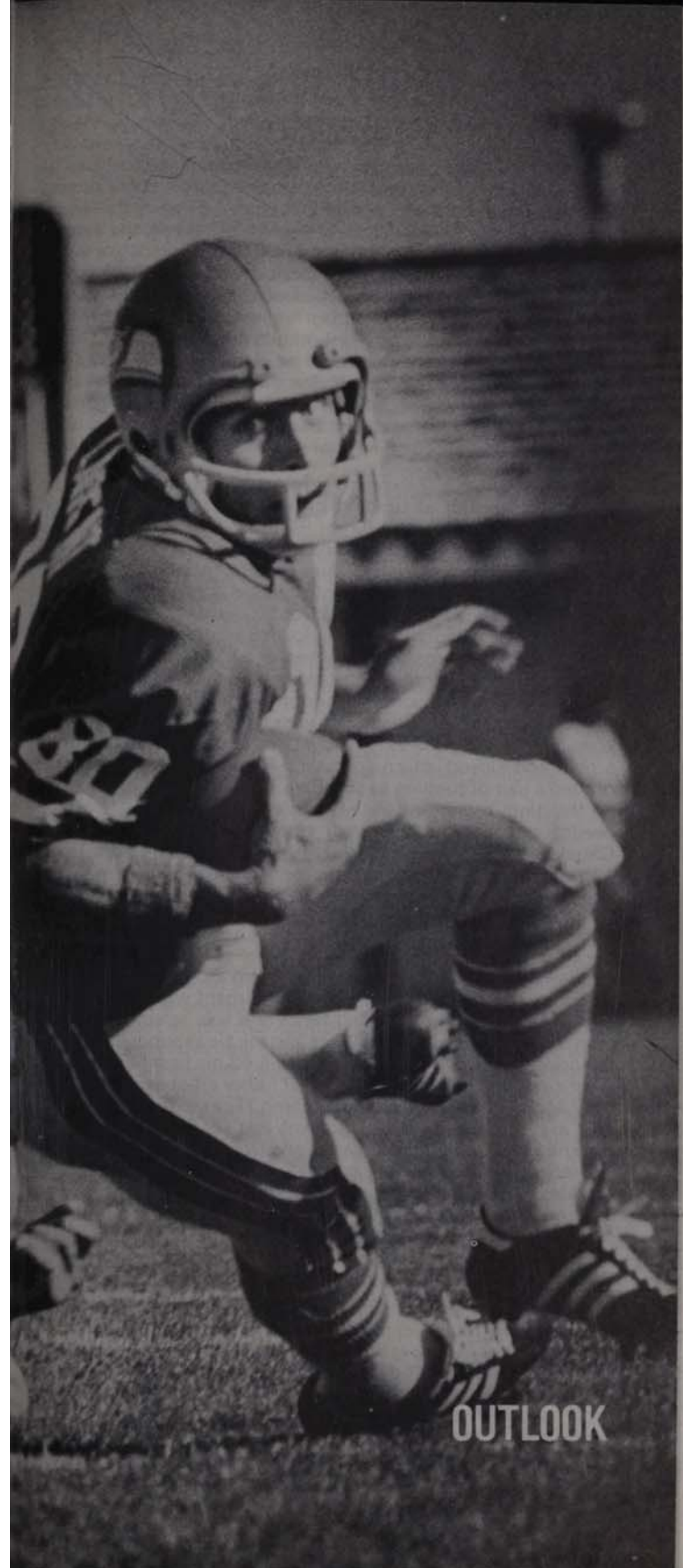
TICKET INFORMATION

OUTLOOK

OFFENSE

QUARTERBACKS: Veterans — Jim Zorn is coming off his best of three professional seasons. After completing 248 of 443 passes for 3,283 yards, Zorn was named first team All-Pro by the Newspaper Enterprise Association and the AFC's Player of the Year by the Touchdown Club of Washington, D.C. His attempts, completions and yardage all led the American Football Conference. Steve Myer saw limited duty last season, playing in four games in 1978. However, Myer has proven himself as a valuable backup. Last season he engineered a last-minute drive that culminated in a field goal and sent the Denver game in overtime and in 1977 he threw four touchdowns against Tampa Bay. The Seahawks are also high on reserve Sam Adkins. **Rookies** — Seattle will take only one new prospect to camp, Tim Ellis. Ellis, a four-year starter at Mississippi, had a free agent trial with Washington last season.

RUNNING BACKS: Veterans — Talented Sherman Smith and David Sims return at running back, plus reserves Al Hunter, Tony Benjamin and kick returner Rufus Crawford. Smith has led the club in rushing each of his three seasons and has averaged 4.7 per carry during that period. Sims led the entire NFL in touchdowns last season with 15. Both missed four games in 1978 because of injuries. Smith rushed for 805 yards on 165 carries, a 4.9 average, and caught 28 passes for 366 yards last season, while Sims gained 752 yards on 174 carries for a 4.3 average and caught 30 passes for 195 yards. Hunter closed out the 1978 season with a 133-yard and two touchdown performance against Kansas City. Benjamin carried only once last year after coming back from a knee injury suffered in 1977, while Crawford was used mainly as a punt and kickoff return specialist. **Rookies** — The Seahawks drafted a pair of running backs, Ezra Tate of Mississippi College on the ninth round and Jeffery Moore of Jackson State on the twelfth round. Other first-year hopefuls include free agents Chuck Benbow from Long Beach State, Gary Davis from Texas A&I and Vince Thomas from Tennessee State. Thomas had a free agent trial with Cleveland last year.

WIDE RECEIVERS: Veterans — Steve Largent has established himself as one of the top receivers in the game. He became the Seahawks first representative to the Pro Bowl last year after catching 71 passes to lead the AFC. Largent was named first-team All-AFC by The Sporting News and was selected second-team All-NFL by Associated Press and the Newspaper Enterprise Association. Sam McCullum is coming off his best NFL season. After catching just nine passes in 1977 after off-season knee surgery, McCullum rebounded by catching 37 passes for 525 yards, a 14.2 average and three touchdowns last season. Steve Raible, who had 22 catches for 316 yards, and Duke Fergerson, who had 11 receptions for 116 yards, are also proven NFL veterans. **Rookies** — The Seahawks will bring seven free agent candidates to camp. David Charles of Wisconsin was a three-time, second-team, All-Big Ten selection. Among the other prospects are Robert Chatman of Mississippi State, Dwayne Hall of Oregon State, Greg Laetsch of Furman, Jeff Morgan of Alabama State, Bucky Shamburger of Georgia Tech and Theodis Williams of Arkansas Tech.



TIGHT ENDS: Veterans — John Sawyer took over as the starter at tight end for the final five games of the year. He moved ahead of Ron Howard, who started there for two-and-a-half years. Sawyer finished the year with nine catches for 101 yards. Also returning is Brian Peets, a free agent who played in seven games last year, and Marcus Hatley, who spent the entire season on the injured reserve list after suffering a knee injury in the club's annual intra-squad scrimmage. **Rookies** — Four rookies will also vie for spots on the roster, including fourth-round draft choice Mark Bell from Colorado State. Other candidates include three free agents, Tim Beyer of Oregon, Gus Hobus of Washington State and Brant Tunget of Fresno State.

OFFENSIVE LINE: Veterans — Talent runs deep in the offensive line. Nick Bebout has been a starter at left tackle since joining the team in the 1976 veteran allocation, while right tackle Steve August, left guard Tom Lynch and center John Yarno came in the 1977 college draft. Bob Newton, a nine-year NFL veteran who came to Seattle on waivers in 1976 from Chicago, took over at right guard when starter Ron Coder was declared out for the season. Coder, a third-year pro, suffered a back injury in training camp. Art Kuehn, who has started 24 games at center for the Seahawks in three years, also returns as does backup tackle Louis Bullard. Bullard also saw duty as a short-yardage tight end last season. Another returnee is guard Charlie Aiu. **Rookies** — Jim Hinesly, Seattle's eleventh-round draft choice, reports to camp with plenty of credentials. He was a first-team All-Big Ten choice and was part of an offensive line that allowed only four sacks in 342 pass attempts last year. Free agent candidates include tackle-center Bob Jordan, a sixth-round draft choice by the New York Giants in 1977; tackle Tom Jesko from Kent State; center Mark Stevenson from Western Illinois; guard Chuck Harbin from Central Michigan; and tackle Dave Hopewell from Kentucky.

DEFENSE

DEFENSIVE LINE: Veterans — Bill Gregory and Ernie Price joined the Seahawks early in the 1978 season and made significant contributions at defensive end. Gregory came to the Seahawks in a trade with Dallas prior to the regular season opener and went on to set a club record with nine-and-a-half sacks. He recovered three fumbles, including two against Cleveland, and intercepted a pass against Oakland. Price came to Seattle prior to the fifth regular season game in a trade with Detroit. He finished the season with four sacks, including two in Seattle's 27-7 win over Oakland. Dennis Boyd started all 16 games at defensive tackle last year, while Bill Sandifer opened in 13 contests playing both tackle and end. Steve Niehaus started six games at defensive tackle. Dave Kraayeveld, a free agent rookie in 1978, also returns. **Rookies** — Among the new faces will be Seattle's first-round draft choice, Manu Tuiaosopo from UCLA, and tenth-round choice, Robert Hardy from Jackson State. Other prospects include Charles Coles from Newberry, Jeff Morrow from Minnesota, Ken Thomas from Cameron and Ross Varner from Brigham Young.

LINEBACKERS: Veterans — The Seahawks return a solid group led by starters Sammy Green and Keith Butler on the outside and Terry Beeson in the middle. All three were second-round draft choices — Green in 1976, Beeson in 1977 and Butler in 1978. Butler earned All-Rookie honors last year as selected by Pro Football Weekly. Beeson has led the club in tackles in both 1977 and 1978. Peter Cronan and Charles McShane bring quality depth to the position. Cronan saw extensive duty last season as a fourth linebacker, while McShane was a standout on special teams.

Rookies — For the fourth year in a row the Seahawks selected a linebacker on the second round of the draft, Joe Norman of Indiana. Seattle went for another linebacker on the third round, Washington's Michael Jackson and added another on the seventh round, Larry Polowski of Boise State. Another rookie candidate is George Halas, Seattle's eleventh-round draft choice in 1978. Other prospects include free agents Howard Dodge of Nevada Reno; Jim Frith of Rice; Bob Grefseng of Mississippi; and James Lamar of San Diego State.

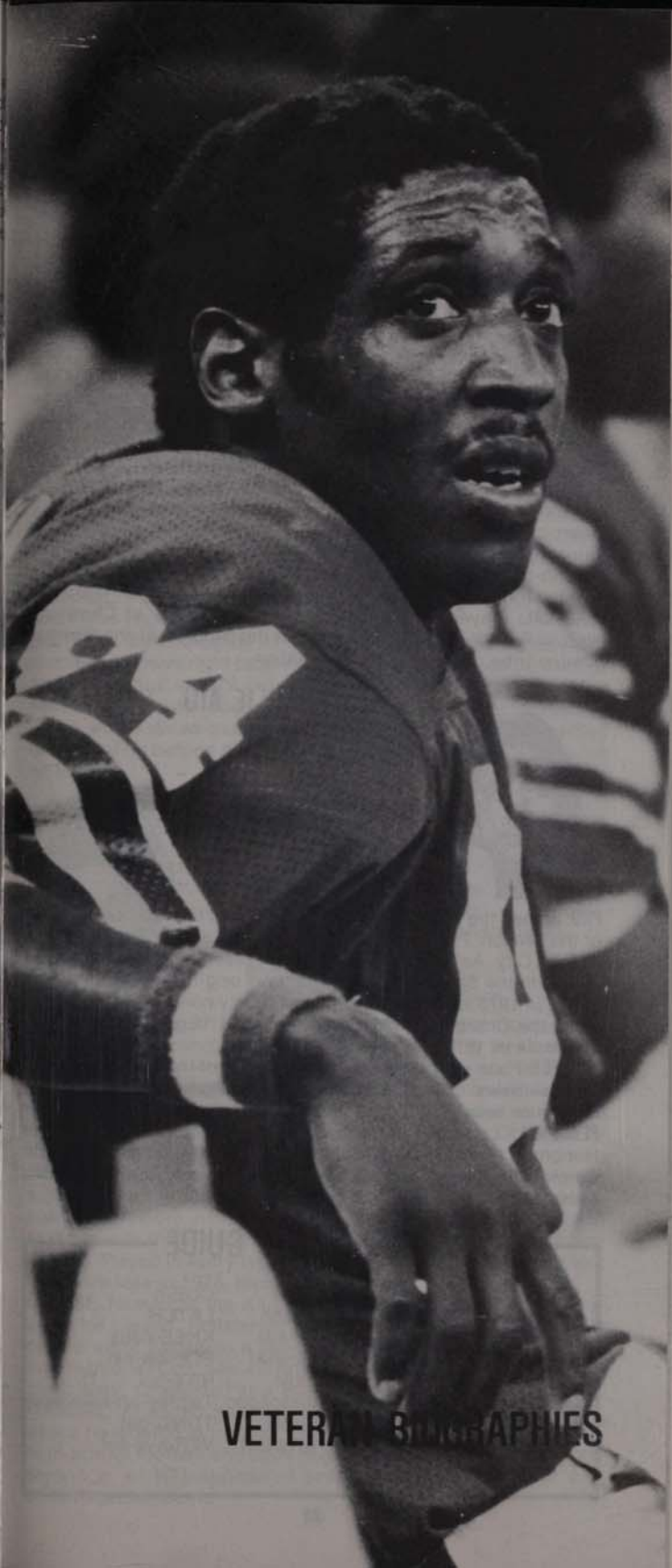
CORNERBACKS: Veterans — The Seahawks got fine play from starters Cornell Webster and Dave Brown, plus reserve Keith Simpson, last year. Webster, who signed as a free agent in 1977, led the Seahawks in interceptions with five. Brown, the only member of the club to start in every game, picked off three in 1978. Simpson, the Seahawks' number one draft choice last year, had two interceptions including a 40-yard touchdown against Cleveland. Kerry Justin, a free agent rookie last year, played in all 16 games as a reserve. **Rookies** — Free agent John Patterson of Syracuse will battle the veterans for playing time.

SAFETIES: Veterans — John Harris broke into the starting lineup at free safety as a rookie and was named to all the All-Rookie teams. In his first game, a pre-season contest against San Diego, Harris intercepted two passes and recovered a fumble. He finished the regular season with four interceptions, as did starting strong safety Autry Beamon. One of the team's co-captains, Beamon finished the season with 108 tackles. Doug Long, who played in 15 games as a backup last season, and Don Dufek, who missed the entire year on the injured reserve list, also return. **Rookies** — Byron Hemingway, a linebacker with the Hamilton Tiger-Cats of the Canadian Football League in 1977, will be given a look at safety along with Herman Jones, who was drafted by the Chicago Bears on the seventh round in 1978 as a wide receiver. Other prospects include free agents Bob Cale from North Carolina; Mike Johnson from California Davis; and Jim Mickelson from Montana State.

SPECIALISTS

KICKER: Veteran — For the first time in the club's history, the Seahawks will take only one kicker to camp. Efren Herrera joined the Seahawks prior to the start of the regular season in a trade with Dallas and went on to have an outstanding season. He had field goals against Minnesota and Oakland in the final seconds to win those games and sent the Denver game into overtime with a field goal. His kicking was also the difference in wins over Chicago and Kansas City. A consensus all-pro in 1977, Herrera hit 40 of 44 extra point attempts and 13 of 21 field goal tries to score 79 points for the Seahawks last year.

PUNTERS: Veteran — Herman Weaver enters his tenth NFL season hoping to rebound from a season that saw him average only 37.0 yards per punt on 66 kicks. During his career, Weaver has ranked among the best in the league. In fact, he led the NFL with a 42.0 average in 1975. Weaver takes a 40.1 career average into this season. Herrera was effective as a short punter, averaging 24.3 on three kicks with two of those being downed inside the five-yard line. Bidding for a spot on the roster will be Mike Korvas, who missed all of last year on the injured reserve list. **Rookies** — First-year candidates include Mike Deutsch, a ninth-round draft choice by Minnesota last year, and Gavin Hedrick, an eighth-round draft choice by San Diego in 1978. Other prospects are Mark Conrad from Puget Sound; Phil Vierendeel from Illinois; and Jay Wyatt from Houston.

BUILDING THE FRANCHISE

CHRONOLOGY

June 15, 1972 Seattle Professional Football, a group of business and community leaders, announce their intention to attempt to secure a National Football League franchise for the City of Seattle. Herman Sarkowsky serves as spokesman for the group.

November 2, 1972 Construction began on the Kingdome.

June 4, 1974 The National Football League announces that Seattle will have a franchise for the 1976 season.

December 5, 1974 The National Football League announces that it has voted membership to Seattle Professional Football, Inc., headed by Lloyd W. Nordstrom with partners Herman Sarkowsky, D. E. "Ned" Skinner, Howard S. Wright, M. Lamont Bean, and Lynn P. Himmelman.

March 6, 1975 John Thompson, Executive Director of the NFL Management Council, named General Manager of the Seattle franchise.

June 17, 1975 Nickname "Seahawks" selected from 20,365 entries and 1,741 different names. One hundred fifty-one suggested "Seahawks."

July 25, 1975 Mailed season ticket applications.

July 28, 1975 Season ticket applications accepted — 24,168 received the first day.

August 5, 1975 Chamber of Commerce-sponsored kick-off luncheon attended by 1,700 including Commissioner Pete Rozelle.

August 23, 1975 Season ticket sales closed after 27 days — 59,000 tickets sold.

November 6, 1975 Agreement reached between KIRO and Seahawks for radio broadcast rights.

December 18, 1975 Seahawks agree to a 20-year lease agreement to play all games in The Kingdome.

January 3, 1976 Jack Patera, assistant coach of the Minnesota Vikings, named head coach of the Seahawks.

January 20, 1976 Lloyd W. Nordstrom, spokesman for the Nordstrom family, the Seahawks' majority owners, dies of a heart attack while vacationing in Mexico.

January 22, 1976 Pete Gross of KIRO named play-by-play announcer for Seahawks radio broadcasts.

February 27, 1976 Kirkland site selected for Seahawks office and practice facilities.

March 30, 1976 Veteran allocation held in New York City. Seahawks select 39 NFL veterans.

April 8-9, 1976 College draft. Seahawks select 25 collegians in their first college draft. Notre Dame's Steve Niehaus is the first choice and he flies to Seattle for evening news conference on April 8.

April 23-25, 1976 Rookie orientation. Jack Patera greets 53 rookies for three-day session including physicals, equipment fittings, team meetings, two light workouts and boat tour of Seattle's Lake Washington.

May 3-5, 1976 Veteran orientation. Forty-one veterans report for orientation session similar to that of rookies.

CHRONOLOGY

June 1, 1976 Seahawks and KIRO-TV sign a five-year agreement whereby the station will carry the club's pre-season games in the Seattle area.

July 9, 1976 Seahawks open training camp at Eastern Washington University in Cheney.

August 1, 1976 Seahawks play first game before 60,825 fans in the Kingdome. San Francisco holds on to defeat Seattle, 27-20, as Jim Zorn is tackled on the two-yard line when the gun sounds.

August 29, 1976 Seahawks capture first victory, a 17-16 win over San Diego as Ron Howard catches a three-yard Jim Zorn pass for the winning touchdown with only 13 seconds remaining.

September 12, 1976 Seattle opens regular season play with a near miss against St. Louis, 30-24. The game ends with the Cardinals intercepting a pass in the end zone.

October 17, 1976 Seahawks win Expansion Bowl with 13-10 victory over host Tampa Bay. Linebacker Mike Curtis blocked a Tampa Bay field goal attempt with 42 seconds remaining to preserve the victory.

November 7, 1976 Seahawks capture their first regular season victory at home with a 30-13 win over Atlanta. Sherman Smith becomes the first Seattle back to rush for over 100 yards with 124 yards on 14 carries.

January 17, 1977 Seahawks host the Pro Bowl and it is the first sellout in the 27-year history of the Pro Bowl and is the largest crowd under the AFC vs. NFC format. AFC scored a 24-14 win before 63,214 fans.

May 3, 1977 Seattle trades its first-round draft choice, the second player in the draft, to Dallas for the Cowboys' first-round selection and three second-round picks. The Seahawks select Steve August, offensive tackle from Tulsa, on the first round.

July 17, 1977 Seahawks open their second training camp at Eastern Washington State College.

August 7, 1977 Steve Myer comes off the bench to help the Seahawks past San Francisco, 34-24, in pre-season opener.

August 13, 1977 Seattle drives 71 yards in three plays of overtime to defeat the Dallas Cowboys, 23-17.

August 18, 1977 Seattle defense holds Oakland to just 50 yards in the second half, while the offense is running up 236 yards. Seattle wins 12-10 for its third straight of the pre-season.

October 16, 1977 Steve Myer passes for a club record four touchdowns as he completes 20 of 30 passes for 252 yards in 30-23 victory over Tampa Bay.

October 30, 1977 After missing four games with an injury, Jim Zorn returns to lead Seattle in its biggest victory ever — a 56-17 triumph over Buffalo. The Seahawks set 15 club records and equal six, including Zorn's four TD passes.

November 13, 1977 Seattle defense blanks the New York Jets, 17-0, in Shea Stadium. It's the first time an established team is shutout by an expansion team in its second year.

December 18, 1977 Seahawks win their fifth game of the year, a 20-19 decision over Cleveland before 61,583 fans in the

Kingdome, to establish a record for most wins ever by a second-year expansion team.

May 3, 1978 Keith Simpson, cornerback from Memphis State, selected as Seattle's first-round draft choice followed by his college teammate Keith Butler, a linebacker, on the second round.

August 24, 1978 Seahawks defeat Chicago, 16-7, in the Kingdome to finish 3-1 in the pre-season as Efren Herrera kicks a 44-yard field goal in his first game as a member of the Seattle club.

September 17, 1978 David Sims rushes for 121 yards and scores three touchdowns as Seattle captures its first win of the season, 24-17, over the New York Jets. Jim Zorn completes 73 percent of his passes by hitting 19 of 26.

September 24, 1978 Jim Zorn leads 21-point fourth quarter by Seahawks in 28-16 win over Detroit. Zorn passes for three scores and runs for Seattle's other touchdown.

October 8, 1978 Efren Herrera kicks a 19-yard field goal on the final play of the game to give Seattle a 29-28 win over Minnesota before 62,031 fans.

October 22, 1978 Seattle builds up 27-0 lead in the third quarter against the Oakland Raiders and coasts to 27-7 win in the Kingdome. Seahawks defense intercepts four passes, records three sacks and holds Oakland running game to only 70 yards.

November 5, 1978 Sherman Smith runs for 152 yards, including a 67-yarder, and Cornell Webster intercepts two passes to help spark Seattle to a 31-29 victory over the Chicago Bears.

November 19, 1978 Dave Brown forces and then recovers fumble on Kansas City's final play of the game from the one-yard line to preserve a 13-10 Seattle win.

November 26, 1978 Seattle becomes the first team since 1965 to beat Oakland twice during the regular season with a 17-16 win on Efren Herrera's 46-yard field goal with just three seconds remaining.

December 3, 1978 David Sims runs for three touchdowns and Seattle offense gains 418 yards in 47-24 triumph over Cleveland.

December 17, 1978 Seahawks finish third season with a 9-7 record and finish one game behind Denver in the AFC West standings following 23-17 win over Kansas City. Al Hunter rushes for 133 yards on 27 carries as Seahawks perform before sixth straight home sellout crowd.

January 3, 1979 Jack Patera named NFL Coach of the Year and Jim Zorn AFC Player of the Year by the Touchdown Club of Washington, D.C.

KINGDOME

The Kingdome, at a cost of \$67 million and with a seating capacity of 64,757 for football, is the least expensive domed, air-conditioned stadium of its size in the world.

Built on a 35.9-acre site just south of Seattle's central business district, the walls of the Dome anchor the world's largest self-supporting concrete roof.

The project was completed by Peter Kiewit Sons' Construction Co. and was originally a bond issue passed by a 62 percent majority of the voters of King County and spearheaded by County Executive John Spellman. Construction began on November 2, 1972.

The first professional football game in the Kingdome, August 1, 1976, between the Seahawks and San Francisco 49ers drew 60,825 fans. Since that time, the Seahawks have played before 11 regular season sellout crowds, including the final six home games in 1978. The Seahawks have finished in the top eight among all NFL clubs in attendance each of their first three seasons. The Kingdome is also the home of the American League Seattle Mariners, National Basketball Association Champion Seattle SuperSonics and North American Soccer League Seattle Sounders. Among other events held in the Kingdome have been the Auto Show, Seattle Boat Show, rock concerts, and the Billy Graham Crusade. The Billy Graham Crusade on May 14, 1976, which attracted 74,000 people, still ranks as the single event attendance leader in the Kingdome.

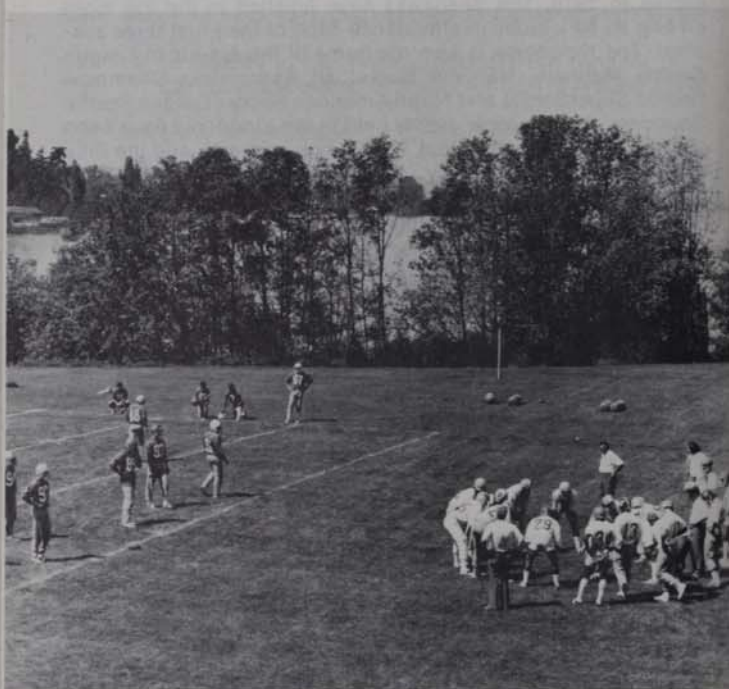

KIRKLAND COMPLEX

The Seattle Seahawks office and practice complex located in Kirkland has to rank as one of the finest, if not the finest, of its kind in the National Football League.

Designed by Assistant General Manager Mark Duncan, the complex houses the Seahawks administrative and coaching staffs on the top floor of the 20,000-square foot building. On the bottom floor are player dressing facilities, a training room, weight room, equipment room, coaches dressing facilities and team meeting rooms.

Behind the building is the equivalent of two-and-one-half practice fields located on waterfront property on the eastside of Lake Washington owned by the Skinner Corp.



TRAINING CAMP

The Seattle Seahawks will open their fourth training camp at Eastern Washington University in Cheney when rookies report in the morning on Saturday, July 14, and practice for the first time that afternoon. The veterans will report the morning of Wednesday, July 18 and practice for the first time that afternoon. The Seahawks will conduct their annual intra-squad scrimmage, the club's only public showing in the eastern part of the state, on Saturday, July 28. The media will be headquartered in Streeter Hall on the EWU campus, while the players will be housed in Louise Anderson Hall. All personnel will dine at Tawanka Commons. 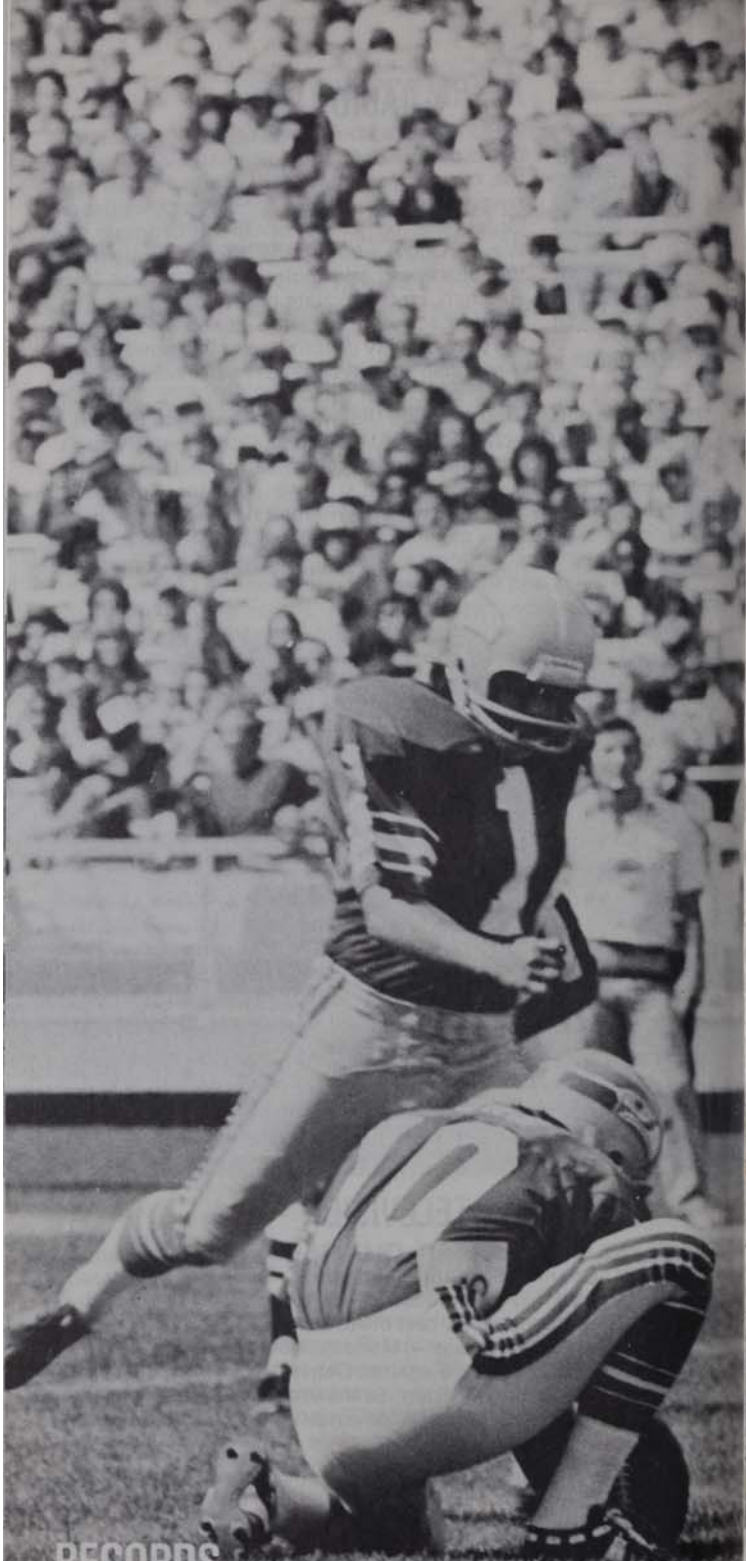

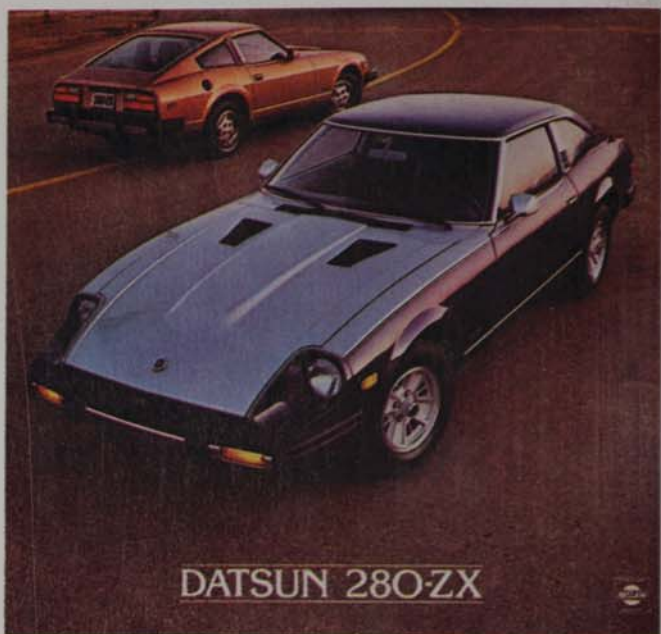
HALFTIME
