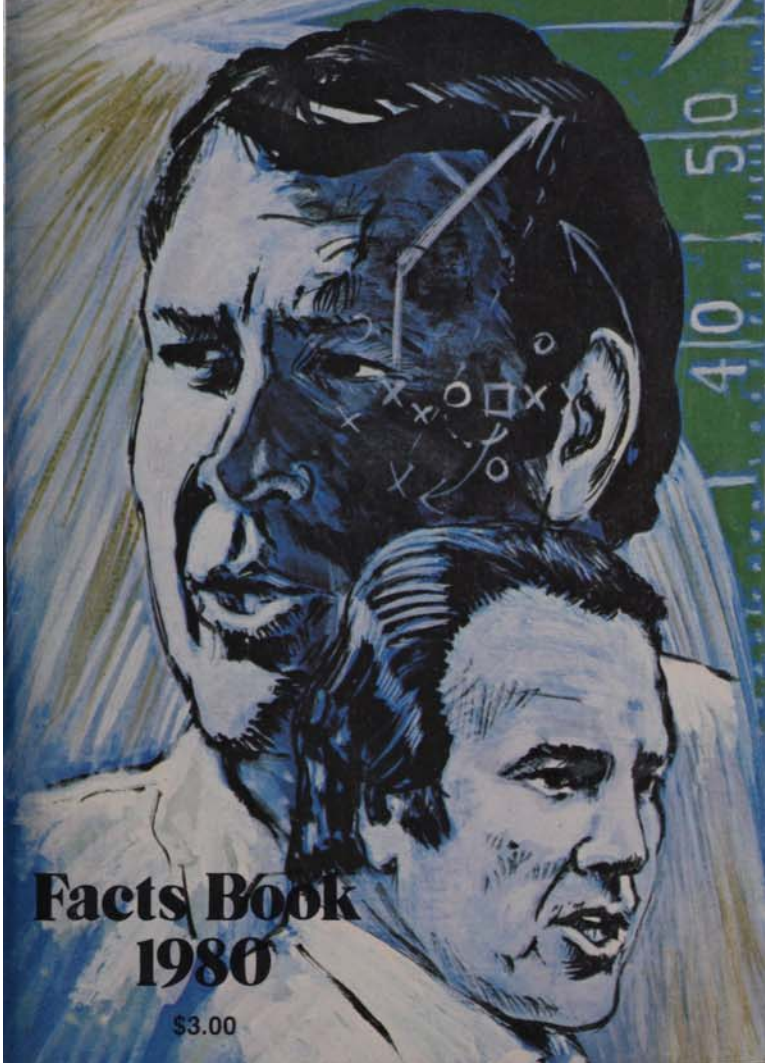
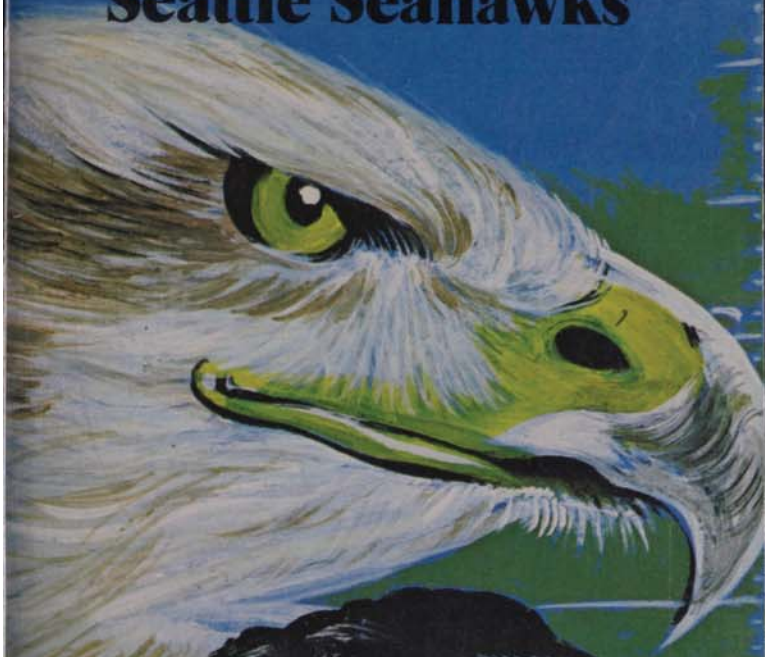

HERMAN SARKOWSKY

Managing General Partner



Herman Sarkowsky, the Seahawks' Managing General Partner, possesses a strong combination of business experience and sports management knowledge. A founder of the Seahawks, Sarkowsky previously served as President of the Portland TrailBlazers of the National Basketball Association. In addition to helping build the TrailBlazers to their NBA championship in 1977, Sarkowsky has long been active in thoroughbred breeding and racing. He has served as a member of the Washing-

ton State Racing Commission.

Sarkowsky currently serves on two National Football League committees, the Finance Committee and the Retirement Board.

In addition to his sports activities, Sarkowsky is the former President of United Homes Corporation; former Vice Chairman of Levitt and Sons, Inc.; and is a lifetime member of the board of the National Association of Home Builders. He is currently on the Board of Directors of Glass Rock Products, Inc., CHG International and Cimarron Homes, Inc.

Also active in community affairs, Sarkowsky is a Board Member of the Seattle Foundation, United Way and Board of Trustees of University of Washington Hospital, along with being a past President and a Board Member of PONCHO. A graduate of the University of Washington, he is the former National Chairman of the UW Alumni Fund and past President of the UW Presidents Club.



JOHN THOMPSON

General Manager



Appointed: Named General Manager of the Seattle Seahawks on March 6, 1975. Following the Seahawks' 9-7 season in 1978, Thompson was named NFL Executive of the Year by The Sporting News. In addition to serving as the Seahawks' General Manager, he is on three National Football League committees — College-Pro Relations Committee, the Pre-Season Schedule Committee and NFL Properties Executive Committee.

NFL Experience: His first NFL position was as Publicity Director of the Minnesota Vikings, when the club was formed in 1960. Thompson later served as Assistant General Manager of the Vikings before assuming the position of Assistant to the President of the National Football Conference in 1970. In 1971, he became the first full-time Executive Director of the NFL's Management Council.

Previous Experience: Prior to moving into professional football, Thompson was Sports Information Director at the University of Washington.

College: He graduated from the University of Washington as a Journalism major.

High School: Attended South Bend High School in South Bend, Washington.

Personal: Thompson and his wife, Mimi, are residents of Bellevue. They have three children, Rick, a graduate of Hamline (Minn.) University and the Seahawks' Training Camp Director; Mike, a graduate of Colorado College; and Kathi, a graduate of Washington State University.

MARK DUNCAN

Assistant General Manager



Mark Duncan carries 24 years of National Football League experience with his position of Assistant General Manager with the Seahawks. He assumed his duties with Seattle in April of 1975 and is credited with the planning and directing of the club's Kirkland office and practice complex. Before coming to Seattle, he was Director of Player Personnel with the Los Angeles Rams for two years. Duncan spent 10 years in the NFL office as Director of Personnel and

Supervisor of Officials before moving to Los Angeles. He broke into the NFL as an assistant coach with the San Francisco 49ers (1955-62). A member of the Colorado Sports Hall of Fame, Duncan played college football and basketball at Denver University and then served as an assistant football coach at Colorado College and Denver before being named head coach at his alma mater in 1946. He was an assistant football coach and head baseball coach at Colorado State before joining the 49ers.

SCOUTING STAFF

DICK MANSPERGER

Director of Player Personnel



Dick Mansperger is in his sixth year as Director of Player Personnel with the Seattle Seahawks. One of the first employees hired by the Seahawks, Mansperger came to Seattle from Dallas, where he had been Director of Player Personnel since 1972. Prior to being promoted, Mansperger had been a Dallas scout for six years. After playing under Dan Devine and Frank Kush at Arizona State, Mansperger joined the ASU coaching staff in 1958 and later

became head coach at Palo Verde, Calif., J.C. for two years. He coached at West Texas State in 1961 and returned to Arizona State in 1962. Mansperger then joined the UCLA coaching staff for the 1963 and 1964 seasons. He went to Dallas as a scout for one year and then coached a season at Iowa (1966) before returning to the Cowboys.

CHUCK ALLEN

Director of Pro Scouting



Chuck Allen is in his sixth year as a member of the Seattle Seahawks staff. He joined the organization in June of 1975 as Director of Pro Scouting. A former all-coast and all-conference player at the University of Washington, Allen was an assistant coach with the Huskies (1973-74) prior to taking his current position. Allen played nine seasons with the San Diego Chargers and was named to the All-American Football League team in 1961 as a rookie. He was

a second-team choice in 1964. During his playing career, Allen served as the Chargers' defensive captain. He spent 1970, 1971 and part of the 1972 season with the Pittsburgh Steelers and finished his career in 1972 with the Philadelphia Eagles. He was selected to the All-Time All-Northwest team in 1976 for his play at the University of Washington and in professional football.

RALPH GOLDSTON

Staff Scout



Ralph Goldston, in his fifth year as a staff scout, came to the Seahawks from the Chicago Bears, where he had been offensive backfield coach. Goldston played college football at Indiana and Youngstown State and then was drafted by the Philadelphia Eagles in 1952. He played four years with the Eagles and then nine seasons with Hamilton in the Canadian Football League. He closed out his career with Montreal of the CFL in 1965. Goldston served as defensive

coach for Montreal from 1966 through 1969 and then scouted for the Giants. He then coached at Harvard (1971-72) and Colorado (1973) before going to the Bears.

CHARLIE HALL

Staff Scout



Charlie Hall is in his fourth year as a member of the Seattle organization as a staff scout. Prior to joining the Seahawks he was with the QUADRA scouting combine for six years. Prior to joining QUADRA, Hall was Director of Player Personnel for five years with the Houston Oilers. After graduating from Whittier College, Hall coached at Bellflower, Calif., High School and Cerritos Junior College in Norwalk, Calif., before joining John McKay's staff at the Uni-

versity of Southern California. He was an assistant under McKay from 1960 through 1965.

AL ONOFRIO

Staff Scout



Al Onofrio is in his second year as a member of the Seahawks scouting staff. When he joined the club he brought with him 28 years of coaching experience, including seven seasons as head coach at Missouri (1971 through 1977). After a 1-10 first season, Onofrio coached Missouri to a 37-31 record in the next six years and took the Tigers to two bowls — the Fiesta Bowl in 1972 and Sun Bowl in 1973. He was honored as the Big 8 Coach of the Year in 1972 and served on

the Board of Trustees of the American Football Coaches Association from 1974 through 1977. He graduated from Arizona State as an Education major after earning All-Border Conference honors as a halfback in 1942. He joined the ASU physical education staff in 1946 and became an assistant coach for the Sun Devils in 1947. He moved to Missouri as an assistant coach in 1958.

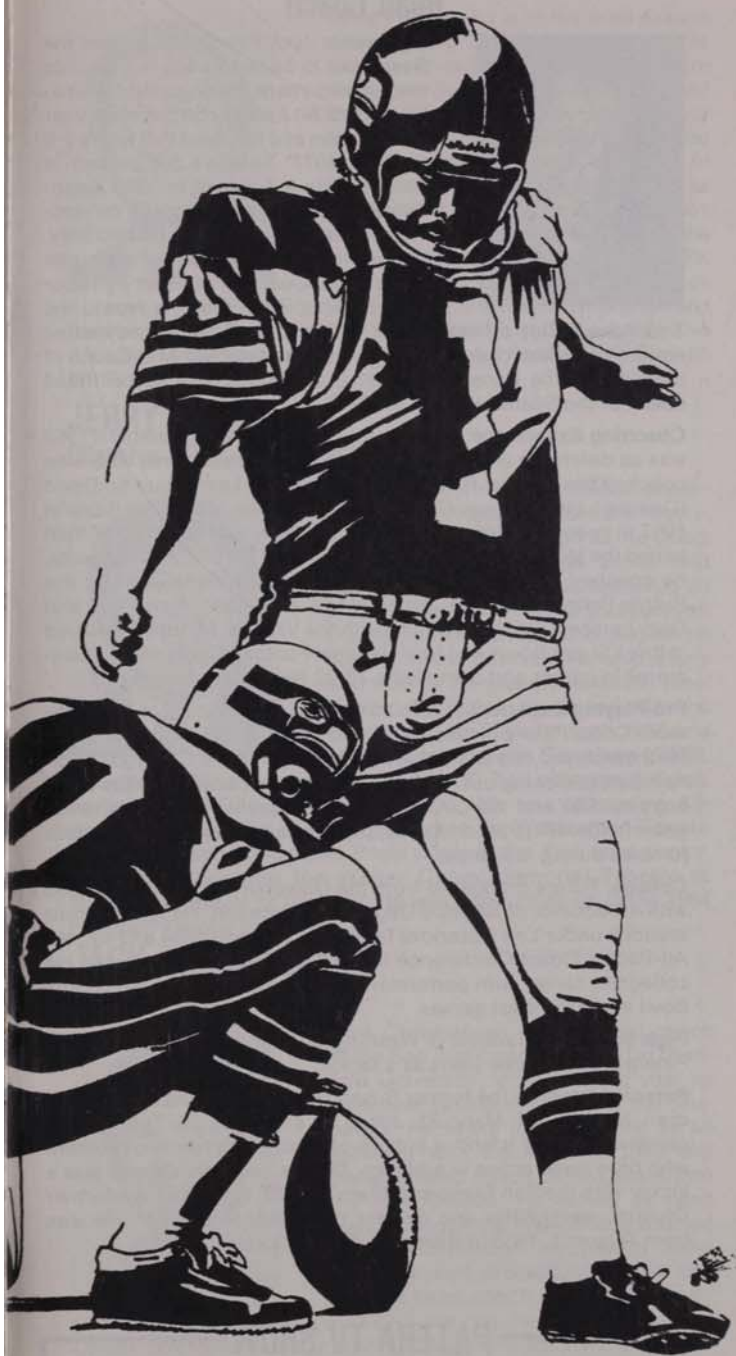
JEFF SMITH

Staff Scout



Jeff Smith is in his first year as a member of the Seahawks scouting staff after working three years on a part-time basis for the scouting department. A graduate of Washington State University, he played football at both Washington State and the University of Hawaii. He began his coaching career as an assistant at Clarkston High in Clarkston, Wash., in 1969 while finishing work on his degree in science education and mathematics at WSU. His coaching

career in the state of Washington has encompassed both junior high school and high school football. After coaching at Kalles Junior High in Puyallup and South Mercer Island Junior High, he was an assistant at Mercer Island High for four years.



COACHING STAFF

JACK PATERA

Head Coach



Seahawks: Jack Patera has guided the Seahawks to back-to-back 9-7 records the last two years. He coached the Seahawks to a 2-12 season in their first year of operation and followed that with a 5-9 mark in 1977. Seattle's 5-9 record in 1977 and its 9-7 record in 1978 established NFL expansion records for second and third-year teams, respectively. Following the 1978 season, Patera was named NFL Coach of the Year by Associated Press, The Sporting News, the

Touchdown Club of Washington, D.C. and the Seattle Gold Helmet nationwide board of selectors. He was also selected AFC Coach of the Year by the Kansas City 101 Club. Patera was named head coach of the Seahawks Jan. 3, 1976.

Coaching Experience: Patera's first coaching assignment in 1963 was as defensive line coach for the Los Angeles Rams, where he coached the original Fearsome Foursome of Lamar Lundy, David (Deacon) Jones, Rosey Grier and Merlin Olsen. He left the Rams in 1967 to coach the defensive line for the New York Giants and then joined the Minnesota Vikings coaching staff in 1969. At Minnesota, he coached another of pro football's great defensive lines, the Purple People Eaters of Jim Marshall, Carl Eller, Alan Page and Gary Larsen. During his tenure with the Vikings, Minnesota played in three Super Bowls and four National Football Conference championship games and compiled a 76-22 regular season record.

Pro Playing Experience: A fourth-round draft choice of the Baltimore Colts, Patera played from 1955 through 1957 with the Colts. He then played two years, 1958 and 1959, with the Chicago Cardinals before closing out his career with the expansion Dallas Cowboys in 1960 and 1961. A guard and linebacker during his seven years in the NFL, Patera intercepted five passes and recovered four fumbles during his career.

College: Patera graduated from the University of Oregon in 1955 with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Education. He lettered four seasons under Len Casanova from 1951 through 1954 and earned All-Pacific Coast Conference honors in 1954. He culminated his collegiate career with performances in the College All-Star, Hula Bowl and East-West games.

High School: A graduate of Washington High in Portland, Oregon, Patera lettered three years as a tackle.

Personal: Married the former Susan Bennett. They have four children, Michael, 24; Mary, 21; John, 18; and Beth, 17. The Pateras reside on Mercer Island, a suburb of Seattle. He has two brothers who have been active in athletics, Dennis and Ken. Dennis was a kicker with the San Francisco 49ers in 1968, while Ken is a former Olympic weightlifter and current professional wrestler. He was born August 1, 1933 in Bismarck, North Dakota.

PATERA TV SHOW

The Jack Patera Show, hosted by Norm Evans, will be televised by KING-TV (Channel 5) on Sunday evenings again this season. The half-hour show is scheduled to be seen every Sunday evening, starting September 7, at 6 p.m.

LARRY PECCATIELLO

Defensive Coach, Linebackers



Larry Peccatiello is in his third season directing the Seattle defense and his fifth season as linebacker coach. Before coming to Seattle, Peccatiello coached the Houston Oilers linebackers for four seasons. An all-conference receiver and a member of the William & Mary Hall of Fame, he started his coaching career as an assistant at his alma mater in 1961 and stayed there until moving to the United States Naval Academy in 1969, where he was an assistant under Rick

Forzano. In 1970, he joined Bill Peterson's staff at Florida State and followed Peterson to Rice in 1971, where he served as defensive coordinator before moving into the National Football League with the Oilers.

JERRY RHOME

Offensive Coach, Quarterbacks



Jerry Rhome is in his fifth season coaching the Seattle quarterbacks and receivers and in his third season as the club's offensive coach. Rhome broke into coaching in 1973 at Tulsa following an eight-year career in the NFL as a player. During his career, Rhome played on three conference championship teams and was in the playoffs a fourth time. Drafted by Dallas, he played with the Cowboys from 1965 through 1968 and also saw service with Cleveland (1969),

Houston (1970) and Los Angeles (1971-72). As a collegian at Tulsa, he broke 16 NCAA passing records on his way to earning All-America recognition and being selected the Washington Touchdown Club and Associated Press Back of the Year as a senior, along with winning the Walter Camp Memorial Trophy as the College Player of the Year. He was also runner-up in the 1964 Heisman Trophy balloting.

JACK CHRISTIANSEN

Defensive Backs



Jack Christiansen, former head coach of the San Francisco 49ers and at Stanford University, is in his third year as defensive backfield coach for the Seahawks. He broke into coaching as an assistant with the 49ers in 1959 and became head coach three games into the 1963 season. He served as head coach through the 1967 season and had a 26-38-3 record. He joined John Ralston's staff at Stanford in 1968 and became head coach in 1972 and compiled a five-year record of 30-22-3. He coached the Kansas City Chiefs' offensive backs in 1977. Following a standout collegiate career at Colorado State, Christiansen played eight seasons in the NFL with the Detroit Lions and earned all-pro recognition six times. He played on four conference championship teams, three NFL title winners and in the Pro Bowl five times. He intercepted 46 passes during his career and scored 13 touchdowns, including eight as a punt returner. Christiansen was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1970.

ANDY MacDONALD

Offensive Backs



Andy MacDonald is entering his fifth season coaching the Seattle Seahawks offensive backs. Before coming to Seattle, MacDonald coached for three seasons at Michigan State where he was offensive coordinator. He has also coached at Colorado State (1970-71), Tulsa (1969) and Iowa (1961-64), along with being head coach at Northern Arizona (1965-68). MacDonald was also a highly-successful high school coach at Flint Northern in Flint, Michigan. As a

collegian at Central Michigan in 1950 and 1951, he led the nation in college division passing and earned Little All-America recognition.

JIM MORA

Defensive Line



Jim Mora is in his third season in the National Football League after an outstanding career as a college coach. Mora came to the Seahawks from the University of Washington, where he was defensive coordinator for the 1978 Rose Bowl champions. He joined the University of Washington staff in 1975 after spending one year at UCLA, six at Colorado and a season at Stanford. A graduate of Occidental College, he spent three years in the Marine Corps, where

he played one season at Quantico and two years at Camp Lejeune. He returned to Occidental in 1960 as an assistant coach and became head coach in 1964. His three-year head coaching record was 18-9.

HOWARD MUDD

Offensive Line



Howard Mudd is in his third year as offensive line coach of the Seahawks. A former all-pro offensive guard with the San Francisco 49ers, Mudd joined the San Francisco coaching staff in 1977 as offensive line coach after serving in a similar capacity for three years with the San Diego Chargers. He started his coaching career in 1972 as an assistant at the University of California. Mudd played six seasons with the 49ers and earned all-pro honors in 1967 and 1968

and participated in three Pro Bowls. He closed out his playing career with two seasons in Chicago. He was drafted by San Francisco on the ninth round in 1964 from Hillsdale College in Michigan. Following his professional career, he was named to the All-1960s team and last winter was inducted into the NAIA Hall of Fame.

RUSTY TILLMAN

Special Teams



Rusty Tillman is in his second season as an assistant coach with the Seattle Seahawks. Tillman's first coaching assignment comes after an eight-year career as a linebacker with the Washington Redskins. Tillman joined the Redskins in 1970 as a free agent out of Northern Arizona, where he played for Seahawks assistant coach Andy MacDonald. Tillman played in 107 games during his eight years with the Redskins, including 84 in a row, and served as Washington's

special teams captain. Played in Super Bowl VII. At Northern Arizona, he played linebacker, defensive end and tight end, along with setting a school record with a 44.5 punting average.

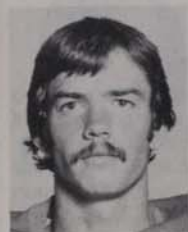

Completed six of nine for 58 yards against San Francisco. Went zero-for-three in only regular-season appearance at quarterback last season against Houston. Participated against Kansas City and Oakland as a member of the kickoff return team. Only regular season performance prior to last year was in 1977 against the New England Patriots when he rushed for six yards on three carries and was sacked once for eight yards. Drafted by the Seahawks on the tenth round in 1977.

COLLEGE: Three-year starter at Wichita State where he completed 336 of 661 passes for 3,882 yards during his career. As a senior, he completed 108 of 214 passes for 1,201 yards and five touchdowns. Team captain in 1976 and was selected Wichita State's Most Valuable Player in 1974, 1975 and 1976. Was a three-time, second-team All-Missouri Valley Conference pick. Business Administration major.

PERSONAL: Played football, basketball and tennis at Cleveland High in Reseda, California. Half-Indian, a descendant of the Chickahominy tribe of the Algonquian Nation.

PRO: Started all 16 games at offensive right tackle last season. Became a starter in 1978 and opened in 14 games that year, missing two games with injuries. Suffered an ankle injury prior to training camp as a rookie in 1977 and missed all but the final six games of the regular season. Part of an offensive line that was penalized for holding only 11 times last year — the lowest in the NFL. Seattle quarterbacks were sacked only 23 times last season, which ranked first in the AFC and fourth in the NFL. Was Seattle's first-round draft choice in 1977 and the 14th player selected overall.

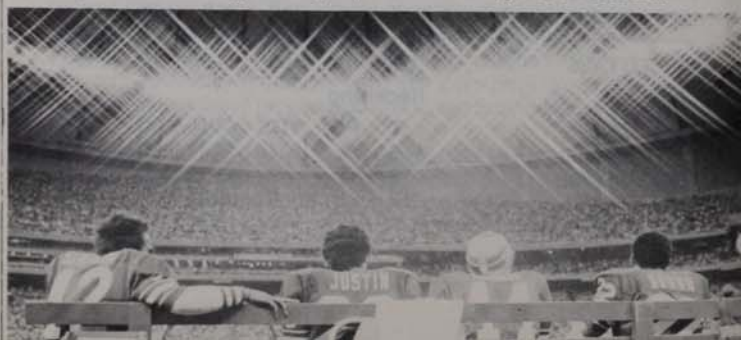

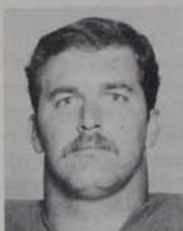

In 1978, Herrera kicked the game-winning field goal (19 yards) against Minnesota; sent the Denver game into overtime with a 37-yard field goal with 54 seconds left; and beat Oakland with a 46-yard field goal with only three seconds remaining. That season he underwent an appendectomy operation following the 15th game of the season against San Diego and came back the next week to make a 31-yard field goal and two of three extra points against Kansas City in the season finale. In 1977 at



Dallas, Herrera earned consensus all-pro honors and his 93 points that season were the highest in the NFC by a kicker. He has missed only two field goals inside the 30 in his entire career. Herrera had 82 straight conversions before missing against Philadelphia in 1977. His 52-yard field goal against Washington in 1977 still stands as his longest. Namath threw for 12,753 yards in his first four seasons, followed by Zorn with 11,202 career yards and Snead at 10,212 yards. He had his finest season last year by attempting more passes (505), completing more (285), throwing for more yards (3,661), throwing more touchdowns (20) and less interceptions (18) than ever before in his career. Zorn finished the season ranked fourth among AFC quarterbacks with a 77.6 rating behind San Diego's Dan Fouts (82.6), Oakland's Ken Stabler (82.2) and Cincinnati's Ken Anderson (80.9). Through 56 regular season games Zorn has thrown for more than 200 yards 26 times, including five times over the 300-yard mark. He had three 300-yard plus games in 1979, including a club record 384 against New Orleans. Besides his 384 yards against New Orleans, Zorn threw for 308 yards against Denver (including a game-winning 43-yard touchdown to Steve Largent with 1:40 remaining) and 314 against Oakland. His other 300-yard plus games came in 1978 when he threw for 329 against San Diego and 308 yards against Green Bay. His four touchdown passes against the Saints equalled a club and personal best. Twice in 1977, against Buffalo and San Diego, he threw four touchdown passes. Zorn's 3,661 yards last year ranks seventh on the NFL's all-time single-season yardage list. He had the three longest runs of his career last season, including a 41-yard run against Kansas City. Has started in all but four games, which he missed with a knee injury in 1977, as a member of the Seahawks. In 1978, Zorn was named AFC Player of the Year by the Touchdown Club of Washington, D.C. He was also selected first team all-pro by the Newspaper Enterprise Association, was second team All-NFL as selected by Associated Press and second team All-AFC as picked by United Press International in 1978. That same year, he finished in a tie for second in the AFC Player of the Year balloting by UPI as Houston's Earl Campbell won the award and Zorn finished next along with Pittsburgh's Terry Bradshaw. In 1976, Zorn was selected as the NFC's Offensive Rookie of the Year by the NFL Players following a year that saw him establish both first-year and expansion passing records. 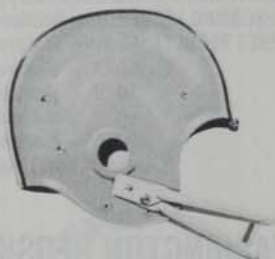

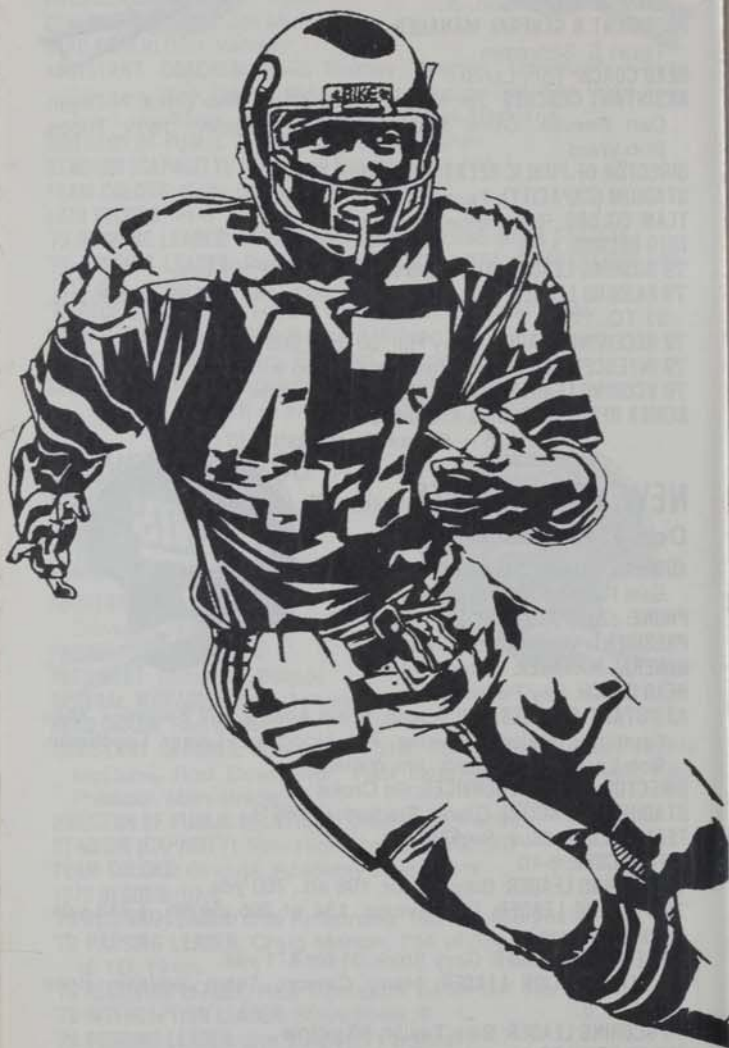

BUILDING THE FRANCHISE

CHRONOLOGY

- June 15, 1972** Seattle Professional Football, a group of business and community leaders, announce their intention to attempt to secure a National Football League franchise for the City of Seattle. Herman Sarkowsky serves as spokesman for the group.
- November 2, 1972** Construction begins on The Kingdome.
- June 4, 1974** The National Football League announces that Seattle will have a franchise for the 1976 season.
- December 5, 1974** The National Football League announces that it has voted membership to Seattle Professional Football, Inc., headed by Lloyd W. Nordstrom with partners Herman Sarkowsky, D.E. "Ned" Skinner, Howard S. Wright, M. Lamont Bean, and Lynn P. Himmelman.
- March 6, 1975** John Thompson, Executive Director of the NFL Management Council, named General Manager of the Seattle franchise.
- June 17, 1975** Nickname "Seahawks" selected from 20,365 entries and 1,741 different names. One hundred fifty-one suggested "Seahawks."
- July 25, 1975** Mailed season ticket applications.
- July 28, 1975** Season ticket applications accepted — 24,168 received the first day.
- August 5, 1975** Chamber of Commerce-sponsored kick-off luncheon attended by 1,700 including Commissioner Pete Rozelle.
- August 23, 1975** Season ticket sales closed after 27 days — 59,000 tickets sold.
- November 6, 1975** Agreement reached between KIRO and Seahawks for radio broadcast rights.
- December 18, 1975** Seahawks agree to a 20-year lease agreement to play all games in The Kingdome.
- January 3, 1976** Jack Patera, assistant coach of the Minnesota Vikings, named head coach of the Seahawks.
- January 20, 1976** Lloyd W. Nordstrom, spokesman for the Nordstrom family, the Seahawks' majority owners, dies of a heart attack while vacationing in Mexico.
- February 27, 1976** Kirkland site selected for Seahawks office and practice facilities.
- March 30, 1976** Veteran allocation held in New York City. Seahawks select 39 NFL veterans.
- April 8-9, 1976** College draft. Seahawks select 25 collegians in their first college draft. Notre Dame's Steve Niehaus is the first choice and he flies to Seattle for evening news conference on April 8.
- April 23-25, 1976** Rookie orientation. Jack Patera greets 53 rookies for three-day session including physicals, equipment fittings, team meetings, two light workouts and boat tour of Seattle's Lake Washington.
- May 3-5, 1976** Veteran orientation. Forty-one veterans report for orientation session similar to that of rookies.
- June 1, 1976** Seahawks and KIRO-TV sign a five-year agreement whereby the station will carry the club's pre-season games in the Seattle area.
- July 9, 1976** Seahawks open training camp at Eastern Washington University in Cheney.

CHRONOLOGY

August 1, 1976 Seahawks play first game before 60,825 fans in the Kingdome. San Francisco holds on to defeat Seattle, 27-20, as Jim Zorn is tackled on the two-yard line when the gun sounds.

August 29, 1976 Seahawks capture first victory, a 17-16 win over San Diego as Ron Howard catches a three-yard Jim Zorn pass for the winning touchdown with only 13 seconds remaining.

September 12, 1976 Seattle opens regular season play with a near miss against St. Louis, 30-24. The game ends with the Cardinals intercepting a pass in the end zone.

October 17, 1976 Seahawks win Expansion Bowl with 13-10 victory over host Tampa Bay. Linebacker Mike Curtis blocked a Tampa Bay field goal attempt with 42 seconds remaining to preserve the victory.

November 7, 1976 Seahawks capture their first regular season victory at home with a 30-13 win over Atlanta. Sherman Smith becomes the first Seattle back to rush for over 100 yards with 124 yards on 14 carries.

January 17, 1977 Seahawks host the Pro Bowl and it is the first sellout in the 27-year history of the Pro Bowl and is the largest crowd under the AFC vs. NFC format. AFC scored a 24-14 win before 63,214 fans.

May 3, 1977 Seattle trades its first-round draft choice, the second player in the draft, to Dallas for the Cowboys' first-round selection and three second-round picks. The Seahawks select Steve August, offensive tackle from Tulsa, on the first round.

October 16, 1977 Steve Myer passes for a club record four touchdowns as he completes 20 of 30 passes for 252 yards in 30-23 victory over Tampa Bay.

October 30, 1977 After missing four games with an injury, Jim Zorn returns to lead Seattle in its biggest victory ever — a 56-17 triumph over Buffalo. The Seahawks set 15 club records and equal six, including Zorn's four TD passes.

November 13, 1977 Seattle defense blanks the New York Jets, 17-0, in Shea Stadium. It's the first time an established team is shutout by an expansion team in its second year.

December 18, 1977 Seahawks win their fifth game of the year, a 20-19 decision over Cleveland before 61,583 fans in the Kingdome, to establish a record for most wins ever by a second-year expansion team.

May 3, 1978 Keith Simpson, cornerback from Memphis State, selected as Seattle's first-round draft choice followed by his college teammate Keith Butler, a linebacker, on the second round.

September 17, 1978 David Sims rushes for 121 yards and scores three touchdowns as Seattle captures its first win of the season, 24-17, over the New York Jets. Jim Zorn completes 73 percent of his passes by hitting 19 of 26.

September 24, 1978 Jim Zorn leads 21-point fourth quarter by Seahawks in 28-16 win over Detroit. Zorn passes for three scores and runs for Seattle's other touchdown.

October 8, 1978 Efren Herrera kicks a 19-yard field goal on the final play of the game to give Seattle a 29-28 win over Minnesota before 62,031 fans.

November 5, 1978 Sherman Smith runs for 152 yards, including a 67-yarder, and Cornell Webster intercepts two passes to help spark Seattle to a 31-29 victory over the Chicago Bears.

CHRONOLOGY

November 19, 1978 Dave Brown forces and then recovers fumble on Kansas City's final play of the game from the one-yard line to preserve a 13-10 Seattle win.

November 26, 1978 Seattle becomes the first team since 1965 to beat Oakland twice during the regular season with a 17-16 win on Efen Herrera's 46-yard field goal with just three seconds remaining.

December 3, 1978 David Sims runs for three touchdowns and Seattle offense gains 418 yards in 47-24 triumph over Cleveland.

December 17, 1978 Seahawks finish third season with a 9-7 record and finish one game behind Denver in the AFC West standings following 23-19 win over Kansas City. Al Hunter rushes for 133 yards on 27 carries as Seahawks perform before sixth straight home sellout crowd.

January 3, 1979 Jack Patera named NFL Coach of the Year and Jim Zorn AFC Player of the Year by the Touchdown Club of Washington, D.C.

January 29, 1979 Steve Largent catches a record-equalling five passes as Seattle's first representative to the Pro Bowl. National Football Conference defeats Largent and his AFC teammates, 13-7, in the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum.

March 17, 1979 John Thompson is named NFL Executive of the Year by The Sporting News. Earlier Jack Patera had been named NFL Coach of the Year by The Sporting News.

May 3, 1979 Manu Tuiaosopo, defensive tackle from UCLA, becomes Seattle's first-round draft choice.

August 12, 1979 Seahawks defeat Dallas, 27-17, in the club's first nationally televised game. Sherman Smith runs for two touchdowns, including a 41-yarder, in pre-season contest on ABC-TV.

October 29, 1979 After trailing 14-0, the Seahawks rebound for a 31-28 win over Atlanta in Seattle's first appearance on ABC's Monday Night Football. Dan Doornink rushes for 122 yards on 27 carries and scores twice.

November 11, 1979 Seattle controls the ball the final 7:41 to preserve a 29-24 win over host Cleveland. Sherman Smith scores three touchdowns and Al Hunter equals a club record with a 67-yard run from scrimmage.

November 26, 1979 Seattle wins its second appearance on ABC Monday Night Football by defeating the New York Jets, 30-7. Efen Herrera kicks three field goals of 40 yards or more and Jim Zorn throws for three touchdowns in the win.

December 8, 1979 Steve Largent catches a 43-yard pass from Jim Zorn with 1:40 remaining to give the Seahawks a 28-23 win over Denver in a nationally televised game. Despite playing with a broken wrist, Largent catches two touchdown passes. Game marks Seattle's 17th consecutive home sellout.

December 16, 1979 The Seahawks close out their second straight 9-7 season with a 29-24 win over Oakland. Sam McCullum sets a club record with 173 yards receiving on eight catches.

April 29, 1980 Seattle trades its first-round draft choice and a third-round pick to Buffalo for the Bills' first-round choice, the tenth player in the draft. The Seahawks then select defensive end Jacob Green of Texas A&M on the first round.

Seattle's Friday, August 29, pre-season game against the New England Patriots in the Kingdome will be televised nationally by NBC. The Saturday, August 23, contest in San Francisco will be televised live at 7 p.m. by KIRO-TV (Channel 7) with Wayne Cody calling the play-by-play. The remaining pre-season games — Thursday, August 7, against Atlanta and Monday, August 18, against Miami — will be televised live by KIRO-TV if the games are sold out 72 hours in advance.

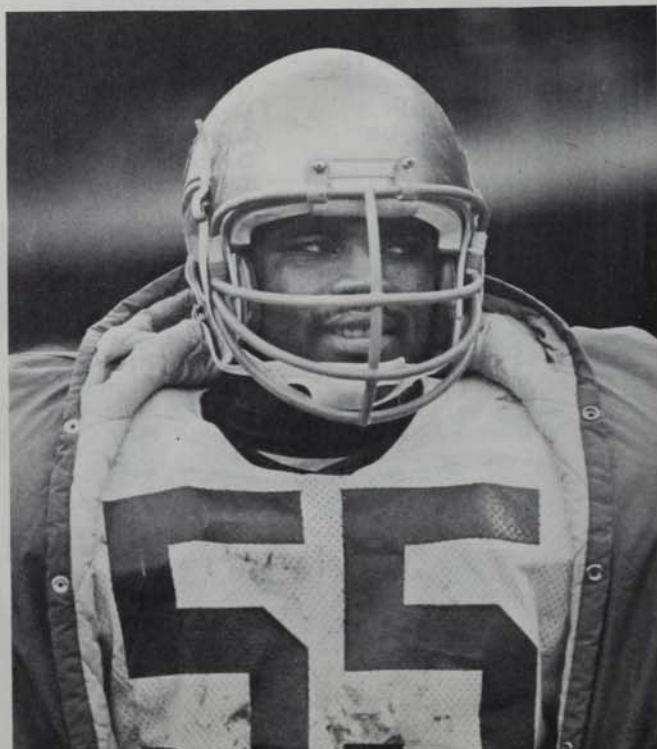

KINGDOME

The Kingdome, at a cost of \$67 million and with a seating capacity of 64,757 for football, is the least expensive domed, air-conditioned stadium of its size in the world.

Built on a 35.9-acre site just south of Seattle's central business district, the walls of the Dome anchor the world's largest self-supporting concrete roof.

The project was completed by Peter Kiewit Sons' Construction Co. and was originally a bond issue passed by a 62 percent majority of the voters of King County and spearheaded by County Executive John Spellman. Construction began on November 2, 1972.

The first professional football game in the Kingdome, August 1, 1976, between the Seahawks and San Francisco 49ers drew 60,825 fans. Since that time, the Seahawks have played before 19 regular season sellout crowds, and have a string of 17 consecutive sellouts, including pre-season games, dating back to 1978. The Seahawks have finished in the top eight among all NFL clubs in attendance each of their first four seasons. The Kingdome is also the home of the American League Seattle Mariners, National Basketball Association Seattle SuperSonics and North American Soccer League Seattle Sounders. Among other events held in the Kingdome have been the Auto Show, Seattle Boat Show, rock concerts, and the Billy Graham Crusade. The Billy Graham Crusade on May 14, 1976, which attracted 74,000 people, still ranks as the single event attendance leader in the Kingdome.

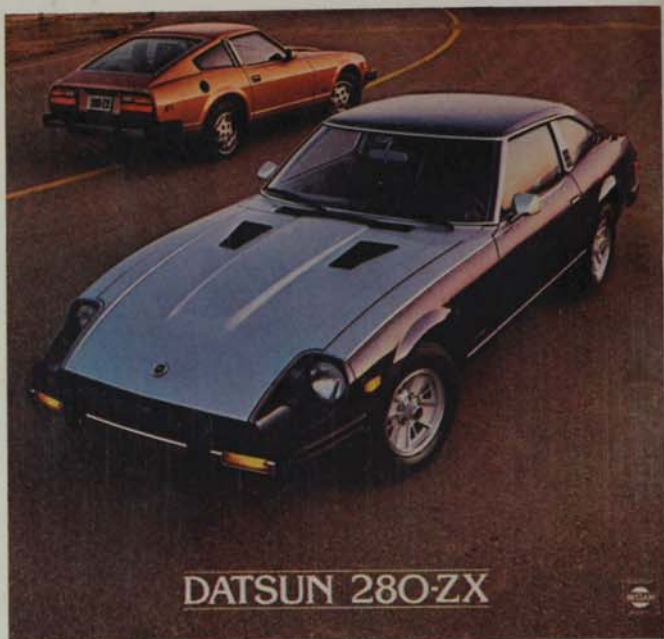
