JOHN THOMPSON

General Manager



Appointed: Named General Manager of the Seattle Seahawks on March 6, 1975. Following the Seahawks' 9-7 season in 1978, Thompson was named NFL Executive of the Year by The Sporting News. In addition to serving as the Seahawks' General Manager, he is on three National Football League committees — College-Pro Relations Committee, the Pre-Season Schedule Committee and NFL Properties Executive Committee.

NFL Experience: His first NFL position was as Publicity Director of the Minnesota Vikings, when the club was formed in 1960. Thompson later served as Assistant General Manager of the Vikings before assuming the position of Assistant to the President of the National Football Conference in 1970. In 1971, he became the first full-time Executive Director of the NFL's Management Council.

Previous Experience: Prior to moving into professional football, Thompson was Sports Information Director at the University of Washington.

College: He graduated from the University of Washington as a Journalism major.

High School: Attended South Bend High School in South Bend, Washington.

Personal: Thompson and his wife, Mimi, are residents of Bellevue. They have three children, Rick, a graduate of Hamline (Minn.) University and the Seahawks' Training Camp Director; Mike, a graduate of Colorado College; and Kathi, a graduate of Washington State University.

MARK DUNCAN

Assistant General Manager



Mark Duncan announced this past spring his intention to retire following the 1982 season. A highly-respected administrator throughout the National Football League, Duncan is in his 26th professional season. He assumed his duties with Seattle in April of 1975 and is credited with the planning and directing of the club's Kirkland office and practice complex. Before coming to Seattle, he was Director of Player Personnel with the Los Angeles Rams for two years. Duncan spent 10

years in the NFL office as Director of Personnel and Supervisor of Officials before moving to Los Angeles. He broke into the NFL as an assistant coach with the San Francisco 49ers (1955-62). A member of the Colorado Sports Hall of Fame, Duncan played college football and basketball at Denver University and then served as an assistant football coach at Colorado College and Denver before being named head coach at his alma mater in 1946. He was an assistant football coach and head baseball coach at Colorado State before joining the 49ers.

MIKE McCORMACK

Director of Football Operations



Mike McCormack joined the Seahawks staff as Director of Football Operations in March, 1982. McCormack brings with him 25 years of service in the National Football League as a player and coach. He came to Seattle from Baltimore, where he served as head coach during the 1980 and 1981 seasons. McCormack was also head coach of the Philadelphia Eagles (1973-75) and served as an assistant coach with the Washington Redskins (1966-72) and the Cincinnati Bengals (1976-79). An all-conference selection at Kansas, McCormack participated in the East-West Shrine Game and the College All-Star Game following his senior season. He was a number one draft choice by the NFL's New York Yanks in 1951 and then spent the 1952 and 1953 seasons in the service before being involved in a 15 player trade with the Cleveland Browns. During his nine seasons with the Browns (1954-62), McCormack played in six Pro Bowls and three NFL championship games, winning two, as an offensive tackle. Following his retirement, he was in the insurance business for three years.

DON ANDERSEN

Director of Non-Football Operations



Don Andersen was named Director of Non-Football Operations for the Seahawks in March, 1982, after serving six seasons as Director of Public Relations. He joined the Seattle staff in December of 1975 after two years in the World Football League, first as Vice President of Public Relations for the league office in 1974 and then in a similar capacity for the Southern California Sun in 1975. Prior to moving into professional football, Andersen was the Director of the Athletic News Service at the University of Southern California for seven years. While at USC, he served as press manager for five Rose Bowl games, two NCAA basketball championship tournaments and as color commentator on USC radio broadcasts. Prior to joining USC in 1967, Andersen was an administrator with the California Interscholastic Federation for four years.



SCOUTING STAFF

DICK MANSPERGER

Director of Player Personnel



Dick Mansperger is in his eighth year as Director of Player Personnel with the Seattle Seahawks. One of the first employees hired by the Seahawks, Mansperger came to Seattle from Dallas, where he had been Director of Player Personnel since 1972. Prior to being promoted, Mansperger had been a Dallas scout for six years. After playing under Dan Devine and Frank Kush at Arizona State, Mansperger joined the ASU coaching staff in 1958 and later

became head coach at Palo Verde, Calif., J.C. for two years. He coached at West Texas State in 1961 and returned to Arizona State in 1962. Mansperger then joined the UCLA coaching staff for the 1963 and 1964 seasons. He went to Dallas as a scout for one year and then coached a season at Iowa (1966) before returning to the Cowboys.

CHUCK ALLEN

Director of Pro Scouting



Chuck Allen is in his eighth year as a member of the Seattle Seahawks staff. He joined the organization in June of 1975 as Director of Pro Scouting. A former all-coast and all-conference player at the University of Washington, Allen was an assistant coach with the Huskies (1973-74) prior to taking his current position. Allen played nine seasons with the San Diego Chargers and was named to the All-American Football League team in 1961 as a rookie. He was

a second team choice in 1964. During his playing career, Allen served as the Chargers' defensive captain. He spent 1970, 1971 and part of the 1972 season with the Pittsburgh Steelers and finished his career in 1972 with the Philadelphia Eagles. He was selected to the All-Time All-Northwest team in 1976 for his play at the University of Washington and in professional football.

RALPH GOLDSTON

Staff Scout



Ralph Goldston, in his eighth year as a staff scout, came to the Seahawks from the Chicago Bears, where he had been offensive backfield coach. Goldston played college football at Indiana and Youngstown State and then was drafted by the Philadelphia Eagles in 1952. He played four years with the Eagles and then nine seasons with Hamilton in the Canadian Football League. He closed out his career with Montreal of the CFL in 1965. Goldston served as

defensive coach for Montreal from 1966 through 1969 and then scouted for the Giants. He then coached at Harvard (1971-72) and Colorado (1973) before going to the Bears.

DOUG KRETZ

Staff Scout



Doug Kretz joined the Seattle Seahawks scouting staff in June of 1981 after working two years on a part-time basis in the scouting department. A Seattle Pacific University graduate, Kretz lettered in soccer as a collegian and earned his degree in Physical Education. He has coached on both the high school and junior high level. He broke into coaching at Redmond Junior High in Redmond, Wash. The past four years he has been an assistant football coach and soccer coach at Newport High in Bellevue, Wash. A native of Seattle, Kretz attended Mercer Island High School, where he played football and baseball.

AL ONOFRIO

Staff Scout



Al Onofrio is in his fourth year as a member of the Seahawks scouting staff. When he joined the club he brought with him 28 years of coaching experience, including seven seasons as head coach at Missouri (1971 through 1977). After a 1-10 first season, Onofrio coached Missouri to a 37-31 record in the next six years and took the Tigers to two bowls—the Fiesta Bowl in 1972 and Sun Bowl in 1973. He was honored as the Big 8 Coach of the Year in 1972 and served on the Board of Trustees of the American Football Coaches Association from 1974 through 1977. He graduated from Arizona State as an Education major after earning All-Border Conference honors as a halfback in 1942. He joined the ASU physical education staff in 1946 and became an assistant coach for the Sun Devils in 1947. He moved to Missouri as an assistant coach in 1958.

JEFF SMITH

Staff Scout



Jeff Smith is in his third year as a member of the Seahawks scouting staff after working three years on a part-time basis for the scouting department. A graduate of Washington State University, he played football at both Washington State and the University of Hawaii. He began his coaching career as an assistant at Clarkston High in Clarkston, Wash., in 1969 while finishing work on his degree in science education and mathematics at WSU. His coaching career in the state of

Washington has encompassed both junior high school and high school football. After coaching at Kalles Junior High in Puyallup and South Mercer Island Junior High, he was an assistant at Mercer Island High for four years.

COACHING STAFF



JACK PATERA

Head Coach



Seahawks: Jack Patera begins his seventh season as head coach of the Seahawks this fall. He is the only head coach in the club's history. After impressive records of 9-7 in 1978 and 1979, the Seahawks slipped to 4-12 in 1980 and improved to 6-10 last fall. He coached the Seahawks to a 2-12 mark in their first year, 1976, and followed that with a 5-9 mark in 1977. Seattle's record of 5-9 in 1977 and its 9-7 mark in 1978 established NFL expansion records for second and

third year teams, respectively. Following the 1978 season, Patera was named NFL Coach of the Year by Associated Press, The Sporting News, the Touchdown Club of Washington, D.C. and the Seattle Gold Helmet nationwide board of selectors. He was also selected AFC Coach of the Year by the Kansas City 101 Club. Patera was named head coach of the Seahawks January 3, 1976.

Coaching Experience: Patera's first coaching assignment in 1963 was as defensive line coach for the Los Angeles Rams, where he coached the original Fearsome Foursome of Lamar Lundy, David (Deacon) Jones, Rosey Grier and Merlin Olsen. He left the Rams in 1967 to coach the defensive line for the New York Giants and then joined the Minnesota Vikings coaching staff in 1969. At Minnesota, he coached another of pro football's great defensive lines, the Purple People Eaters of Jim Marshall, Carl Eller, Alan Page and Gary Larsen. During his tenure with the Vikings, Minnesota played in three Super Bowls and four National Football Conference championship games and compiled a 76-22 regular season record.

Pro Playing Experience: A fourth-round draft choice of the Baltimore Colts, Patera played from 1955 through 1957 with the Colts. He then played two years, 1958 and 1959, with the Chicago Cardinals before closing out his career with the expansion Dallas Cowboys in 1960 and 1961. A guard and linebacker during his seven years in the NFL, Patera intercepted five passes and recovered four fumbles during his career.

College: Patera graduated from the University of Oregon in 1955 with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Education. He lettered four seasons under Len Casanova from 1951 through 1954 and earned All-Pacific Coast Conference honors in 1954. He culminated his collegiate career with performances in the College All-Star, Hula Bowl and East-West games.

High School: A graduate of Washington High in Portland, Oregon, Patera lettered three years as a tackle.

Personal: Married the former Susan Bennett. They have four children, Michael, 26; Mary, 23; John, 20; and Beth, 19. The Pateras reside on Mercer Island, a suburb of Seattle. He has two brothers who have been active in athletics, Dennis and Ken. Dennis was a kicker with the San Francisco 49ers in 1968, while Ken is a former Olympic weightlifter and current professional wrestler. He was born August 1, 1933 in Bismarck, North Dakota.

PATERA TV SHOW

The Jack Patera Show, hosted by Don Poier, will be televised by KING-TV (Channel 5) on Saturday evenings this season. The half-hour show is scheduled to be seen every Saturday, starting September 11 at 6:30 p.m.

JERRY RHOME

Offensive Coach, Quarterbacks-Receiver



Jerry Rhome is in his seventh season coaching the Seattle quarterbacks and receivers and in his fifth season as the club's offensive coach. Rhome broke into coaching in 1973 at Tulsa following an eight-year career in the NFL as a player. During his career, Rhome played on three conference championship teams and was in the playoffs a fourth time. Drafted by Dallas, he played with the Cowboys from 1965 through 1968 and also saw service with Cleveland

(1969), Houston (1970) and Los Angeles (1971-72). As a collegian at Tulsa, he broke 16 NCAA passing records on his way to earning All-America recognition and being selected the Washington Touchdown Club and Associated Press Back of the Year as a senior, along with winning the Walter Camp Memorial Trophy as the College Player of the Year. He was also runner-up in the 1964 Heisman Trophy balloting.

JACKIE SIMPSON

Defensive Coach, Linebackers



Jackie Simpson is in his second season directing the Seattle defense and coaching the linebackers. Prior to joining the Seahawks, he spent seven years as defensive coordinator with the San Diego Chargers. He broke into coaching with the Chargers in 1967 and remained with the club until 1972 when he joined the Houston staff. He spent one season (1973) in St. Louis before returning to San Diego in 1974. Simpson played eight years as a professional linebacker. He

joined Montreal of the Canadian Football League in 1958 and played there through one game of the 1961 season when he joined the Denver Broncos. From 1962 through 1964 he played for the Oakland Raiders and concluded his playing career with Winnipeg of the CFL in 1965. He served as a staff scout for the American Football League in 1966. He was an All-America selection at the University of Mississippi and named the Outstanding Offensive Lineman in the 1958 Senior Bowl.



JACK CHRISTIANSEN

Defensive Backs



Jack Christiansen, former head coach of the San Francisco 49ers and at Stanford University, is in his fifth year as defensive backfield coach for the Seahawks. He broke into coaching as an assistant with the 49ers in 1959 and became head coach three games into the 1963 season. He served as head coach through the 1967 season and had a 26-38-3 record. He joined John Ralston's staff at Stanford in 1968 and became head coach in 1972 and compiled a five-year record of

30-22-3. He coached the Kansas City Chiefs' offensive backs in 1977. Following a standout collegiate career at Colorado State, Christiansen played eight seasons in the NFL with the Detroit Lions and earned all-pro recognition six times. He played on four conference championship teams, three NFL title winners and in the Pro Bowl five times. He intercepted 46 passes during his career and scored 13 touchdowns, including eight as a punt returner. Christiansen was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1970.

FRANK LAUTERBUR

Defensive Line



Frank Lauterbur is in his first season with the Seattle Seahawks after joining the club in March. Prior to joining the Seahawks, Lauterbur coached the Los Angeles Rams' defensive line from 1978 through 1981. He broke into professional coaching with the Baltimore Colts in 1955 and 1956 and returned to Baltimore from 1974 through 1977. After four years of high school coaching, he joined the Kent State staff in 1953 and 1954 before his first stint at Baltimore. He was at West

Point from 1957 through 1961 and then served one season as defensive coordinator at the University of Pittsburgh before being named head coach at Toledo. At Toledo for eight seasons (1963-70), he guided his teams to three conference championships and two undefeated seasons. He served as head coach at Iowa (1971-73) before rejoining the Colts. Lauterbur played guard at Oberlin College in 1943 before joining the service. He finished his college career at Mt. Union College in 1946 through 1948.

ANDY MacDONALD

Offensive Backs



Andy MacDonald is entering his seventh season coaching the Seattle Seahawks offensive backs. Before coming to Seattle, MacDonald coached for three seasons at Michigan State where he was offensive coordinator. He has also coached at Colorado State (1970-71), Tulsa (1969) and Iowa (1961-64), along with being head coach at Northern Arizona (1965-68). MacDonald was also a highly-successful high school coach at Flint Northern in Flint, Michigan. As a

collegian at Central Michigan in 1950 and 1951, he led the nation in college division passing and earned Little All-America recognition.

HOWARD MUDD

Offensive Line



Howard Mudd is in his fifth year as offensive line coach of the Seahawks. A former all-pro offensive guard with the San Francisco 49ers, Mudd joined the San Francisco coaching staff in 1977 as offensive line coach after serving in a similar capacity for three years with the San Diego Chargers. He started his coaching career in 1972 as an assistant at the University of California. Mudd played six seasons with the 49ers and earned all-pro honors in 1967 and 1968

and participated in three Pro Bowls. He closed out his playing career with two seasons in Chicago. He was drafted by San Francisco on the ninth round in 1964 from Hillsdale College in Michigan. Following his professional career, he was named to the All-1960s team and is in the NAIA Hall of Fame.

RUSTY TILLMAN

Special Teams



Rusty Tillman is in his fourth season as an assistant coach with the Seattle Seahawks. Tillman's first coaching assignment comes after an eight-year career as a linebacker with the Washington Redskins. Tillman joined the Redskins in 1970 as a free agent out of Northern Arizona, where he played for Seahawks assistant coach Andy MacDonald. Tillman played in 107 games during his eight years with the Redskins, including 84 in a row, and served as Washington's

special teams captain. Played in Super Bowl VII. At Northern Arizona, he played linebacker, defensive end and tight end, along with setting a school record with a 44.5 punting average.

KIRO Newsradio 71 will serve as the flagship station for the Seattle Seahawks Radio Network for the seventh consecutive year. Pete Gross will again call the play-by-play, while Wayne Cody will handle pre-game and post-game shows and former Seahawks wide receiver Steve Raible will serve as the analyst.

PRO: Played in three regular season games last year. Established career bests against Houston by completing six of 10 for 87 yards and one touchdown, along with rushing for 28 yards on three carries against the Oilers. During the 1981 pre-season, he completed eight of 15 for 107 yards. Adkins' career pre-season statistics find him with 58 completions in 109 attempts for 612 yards. Threw his first regular season touchdown pass in 1980 against the Denver Broncos, a five-yarder to Lawrence McCutcheon. Played in two 1979 regular season games, Kansas City and Oakland, as a member of the kickoff return team. Drafted by the Seahawks on the tenth round in 1977.

COLLEGE: Three-year starter at Wichita State where he completed 336 of 661 passes for 3,882 yards during his career. As a senior, he completed 108 of 214 passes for 1,201 yards and five touchdowns. Team captain in 1976 and was selected Wichita State's Most Valuable Player in 1974, 1975 and 1976. Was a three-time, second-team All-Missouri Valley Conference pick. Business Administration major.

BUILDING THE FRANCHISE



CHRONOLOGY

June 15, 1972 Seattle Professional Football, a group of business and community leaders, announce their intention to attempt to secure a National Football League franchise for the City of Seattle. Herman Sarkowsky serves as spokesman for the group.

November 2, 1972 Construction begins on The Kingdome.

June 4, 1974 The National Football League announces that Seattle will have a franchise for the 1976 season.

December 5, 1974 The National Football League announces that it has voted membership to Seattle Professional Football, Inc., headed by Lloyd W. Nordstrom with partners Herman Sarkowsky, D.E. "Ned" Skinner, Howard S. Wright, M. Lamont Bean, and Lynn P. Himmelman.

March 6, 1975 John Thompson, Executive Director of the NFL Management Council, named General Manager of the Seattle franchise.

June 17, 1975 Nickname "Seahawks" selected from 20,365 entries and 1,741 different names. One hundred fifty-one suggested "Seahawks."

December 18, 1975 Seahawks agree to a 20-year lease agreement to play all games in The Kingdome.

January 3, 1976 Jack Patera, assistant coach of the Minnesota Vikings, named head coach of the Seahawks.

January 20, 1976 Lloyd W. Nordstrom, spokesman for the Nordstrom family, the Seahawks' majority owners, dies of a heart attack while vacationing in Mexico.

March 30, 1976 Veteran allocation held in New York City. Seahawks select 39 NFL veterans.

April 8-9, 1976 College draft. Seahawks select 25 collegians in their first college draft. Notre Dame's Steve Niehaus is the first choice and he flies to Seattle for evening news conference on April 8.

July 9, 1976 Seahawks open training camp at Eastern Washington University in Cheney.

August 1, 1976 Seahawks play first game before 60,825 fans in the Kingdome. San Francisco holds on to defeat Seattle, 27-20, as Jim Zorn is tackled on the two-yard line when the gun sounds.

August 29, 1976 Seahawks capture first victory, a 17-16 win over San Diego as Ron Howard catches a three-yard Jim Zorn pass for the winning touchdown with only 13 seconds remaining.

September 12, 1976 Seattle opens regular season play with a near miss against St. Louis, 30-24. The game ends with the Cardinals intercepting a pass in the end zone.

November 7, 1976 Seahawks capture their first regular season victory at home with a 30-13 win over Atlanta. Sherman Smith becomes the first Seattle back to rush for over 100 yards with 124 yards on 14 carries.

January 17, 1977 Seahawks host the Pro Bowl and it is the first sellout in the 27-year history of the Pro Bowl and is the largest crowd under the AFC vs. NFC format. AFC scored a 24-14 win before 63,214 fans.

May 3, 1977 Seattle trades its first-round draft choice, the second player in the draft, to Dallas for the Cowboys' first-round selection and three second-round picks. The Seahawks select Steve August, offensive guard from Tulsa, on the first round.

CHRONOLOGY

October 30, 1977 After missing four games with an injury, Jim Zorn returns to lead Seattle in its biggest victory ever — a 56-17 triumph over Buffalo. The Seahawks set 15 club records and equal six, including Zorn's four TD passes.

December 18, 1977 Seahawks win their fifth game of the year, a 20-19 decision over Cleveland before 61,583 fans in the Kingdome, to establish a record for most wins ever by a second-year expansion team.

May 3, 1978 Keith Simpson, cornerback from Memphis State, selected as Seattle's first-round draft choice followed by his college teammate Keith Butler, a linebacker, on the second round.

October 8, 1978 Efren Herrera kicks a 19-yard field goal on the final play of the game to give Seattle a 29-28 win over Minnesota before 62,031 fans.

November 26, 1978 Seattle becomes the first team since 1965 to beat Oakland twice during the regular season with a 17-16 win on Efren Herrera's 46-yard field goal with just three seconds remaining.

December 17, 1978 Seahawks finish third season with a 9-7 record and finish one game behind Denver in the AFC West standings following 23-19 win over Kansas City. Al Hunter rushes for 133 yards on 27 carries as Seahawks perform before sixth straight home sellout crowd.

January 3, 1979 Jack Patera named NFL Coach of the Year and Jim Zorn AFC Player of the Year by the Touchdown Club of Washington, D.C.

January 29, 1979 Steve Largent catches a record-equalling five passes as Seattle's first representative to the Pro Bowl. National Football Conference defeats Largent and his AFC teammates, 13-7, in the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum.

March 17, 1979 John Thompson is named NFL Executive of the Year by The Sporting News. Earlier Jack Patera had been named NFL Coach of the Year by The Sporting News.

May 3, 1979 Manu Tuiaosopo, defensive tackle from UCLA, becomes Seattle's first-round draft choice.

October 29, 1979 After trailing 14-0, the Seahawks rebound for a 31-28 win over Atlanta in Seattle's first appearance on ABC's Monday Night Football. Dan Doornink rushes for 122 yards on 27 carries and scores twice.

December 16, 1979 The Seahawks close out their second straight 9-7 season with a 29-24 win over Oakland. Sam McCullum sets a club record with 173 yards receiving on eight catches.

April 29, 1980 Seattle trades its first-round draft choice and a third-round pick to Buffalo for the Bills' first-round choice, the tenth player in the draft. The Seahawks then select defensive end Jacob Green of Texas A&M on the first round.

September 28, 1980 Seahawks score second shutout in the club's history with a 14-0 win over Washington Redskins in Robert F. Kennedy Stadium.

October 5, 1980 Sam McCullum catches two touchdown passes and Efren Herrera kicks four field goals in 26-7 win over Houston at the Astrodome.

April 28, 1981 Seahawks select UCLA safety Kenny Easley on the first round of the NFL draft.

CHRONOLOGY

October 25, 1981 Theotis Brown makes his first start as a member of the Seahawks and rushes for 104 yards in leading Seattle to a 19-3 win over the New York Jets at Shea Stadium.

November 8, 1981 Seattle holds the Pittsburgh Steelers scoreless in the second half and rally for a pair of fourth quarter touchdowns to capture a 24-21 victory at the Kingdome.

November 16, 1981 The Seahawks score on their last eight possessions to defeat the San Diego Chargers, 44-23, on Monday Night Football. It is the Seahawks' first regular season victory over the Chargers after eight straight losses.

December 6, 1981 Dave Krieg makes his first professional start at quarterback, replacing the injured Jim Zorn, and completes 20 of 26 passes to guide Seattle to a 27-23 win over the New York Jets at the Kingdome.

December 20, 1981 A 39th consecutive sellout crowd sees the Seahawks close out the 1981 regular season with a 42-21 win over the Cleveland Browns. Seattle's defense recovers seven Cleveland fumbles, intercepts three passes and registers six sacks. Kenny Easley intercepts two passes and returns one 82 yards for a touchdown. He had a third interception returned 74 yards for a touchdown called back.

March 11, 1982 Mike McCormack, former head coach with the Philadelphia Eagles and Baltimore Colts, is named Director of Football Operations and Director of Public Relations Don Andersen is elevated to the position of Director of Non-Football Operations.

April 27, 1982 Seahawks select Clemson defensive end Jeff Bryant in the first round of the college draft.

KINGDOME

The Kingdome, at a cost of \$67 million and with a seating capacity of 64,757 for football, is the least expensive domed, air-conditioned stadium of its size in the world.

Built on a 35.9-acre site just south of Seattle's central business district, the walls of the Dome anchor the world's largest self-supporting concrete roof.

The project was completed by Peter Kiewit Sons' Construction Co. and was originally a bond issue passed by a 62 percent majority of the voters of King County and spearheaded by County Executive John Spellman, now state Governor. Construction began on November 2, 1972.

The first professional football game in the Kingdome, August 1, 1976, between the Seahawks and San Francisco 49ers drew 60,825 fans. Since that time, the Seahawks have played before 35 regular-season sellout crowds, and have a string of 39 consecutive sellouts, including pre-season games, dating back to 1978. The Seahawks have finished in the top nine among all NFL clubs in attendance each of their first six seasons. The Kingdome is also the home of the American League Seattle Mariners, National Basketball Association Seattle SuperSonics and North American Soccer League Seattle Sounders. Among other events held in the Kingdome have been the Auto Show, Seattle Boat Show, rock concerts, and the Billy Graham Crusade. The Billy Graham Crusade on May 14, 1976, which attracted 74,000 people, still ranks as the single event attendance leader in the Kingdome.
