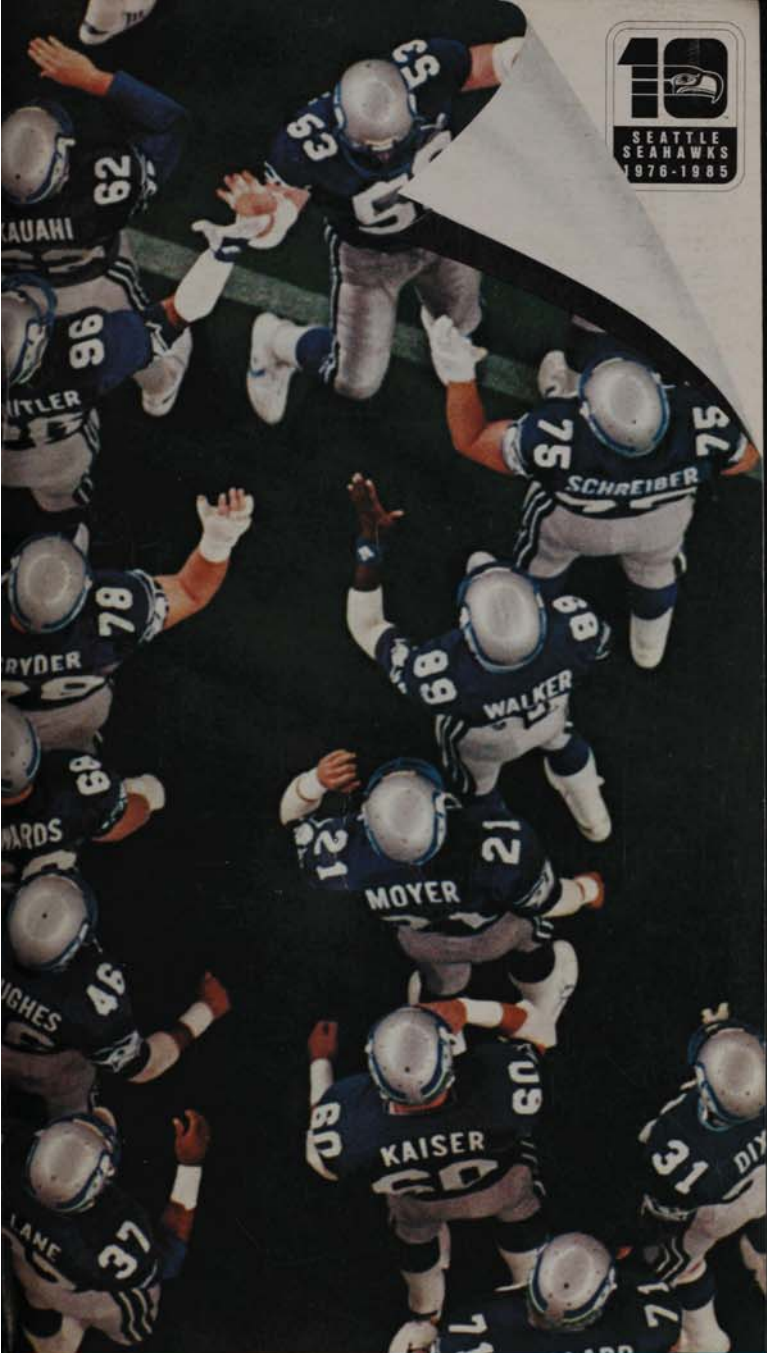

MIKE McCORMACK

President/General Manager



Seahawks: Mike McCormack was elevated to the position of President and General Manager of the Seattle Seahawks on January 3, 1983, after serving as the club's interim head coach for the final seven games of the 1982 season. The Seahawks won four of their seven games under McCormack, who took over the head coaching duties on October 13 from Jack Patera. He originally joined the Seattle staff on March 12, 1982, as Director of Football Operations.

NFL Experience: Prior to joining the Seahawks, McCormack served as head coach of the Baltimore Colts in 1980 and 1981. He was also head coach of the Philadelphia Eagles from 1973 through 1975 and spent 11 years as an NFL assistant coach with the Washington Redskins (1966-72) and Cincinnati Bengals (1976-79).

Hall of Fame: McCormack was one of four former players inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame on July 28, 1984, in Canton, Ohio. McCormack was honored along with Arnie Weinmeister, Willie Brown, and Charley Taylor.

Pro Playing Experience: He was a number one draft choice by the NFL's New York Yanks in 1951 and then spent the 1952 and 1953 seasons in military service. In 1954, he was involved in a 15-player trade that sent him to the Cleveland Browns. During his nine seasons (1954-1962) with the Browns, the standout offensive tackle played in six Pro Bowls and three NFL Championship Games, winning two. Following his retirement, he was in the insurance business for three years before entering the coaching field.

College: He is a member of the University of Kansas' all-time team selected in 1976 by the Lawrence *Journal-World*. He served as a team co-captain in 1950 and concluded his collegiate career by participating in the East-West Shrine Game and College All-Star Game following his senior season. He was an All-Big Seven Conference selection in 1950.

High School: A graduate of DeLaSalle High in Kansas City, Missouri, McCormack participated in football and basketball as a prep.

Personal: He married the former Ann Helsby on January 28, 1956, in Kansas City. The McCormacks have four children, Michael, an attorney; Tim, a May graduate of the University of Cincinnati; Molly, married and living in Cincinnati; and Colleen, married and living in Cincinnati. Mike and Ann McCormack reside in Bellevue. He was born June 21, 1930, in Chicago.

CHUCK ALLEN

Assistant General Manager



Chuck Allen is in his eleventh year as a member of the Seattle Seahawks staff. He joined the organization in June of 1975 as Director of Pro Scouting and was named Assistant General Manager in March of 1983. A former all-coast and all-conference player at the University of Washington, Allen was an assistant coach with the Huskies (1973-74) prior to joining the Seahawks. Allen played nine seasons with the San Diego Chargers and was named to the All-American

Football League team in 1961 as a rookie. He was a second-team choice in 1964. During his playing career, Allen served as the Chargers' defensive captain and was inducted into the Chargers' Hall of Fame in 1984. He spent 1970, 1971 and part of the 1972 season with the Pittsburgh Steelers and finished his career in 1972 with the Philadelphia Eagles. He was selected to the All-Time All-Northwest team in 1976 and was inducted into the Washington State Sports Hall of Fame.

MIKE ALLMAN

Player Personnel Director



Mike Allman enters into his second year as Player Personnel Director with the Seahawks after serving six years with the Washington Redskins in the same capacity. Allman joined the Seahawks staff on July 1, 1984, after spending 19 years with the Redskins, first as a scout, then as Director of College Scouting, and as Director of Player Personnel since 1978. A native of the Washington D.C. area, he graduated with a B.A. degree in Economics from Mt. St. Mary's

College in Emmitsburg, Maryland. He also played baseball, lettering three years as an outfielder and twice was an all-conference selection. He attended St. Francis Xavier and Gonzaga High Schools and taught junior high social studies from 1962 through 1965 before joining the Redskins. Mike and his wife, Ann, have four children: Maureen Mary, Theresa Ann, Michael Francis, and Patrick James.

RALPH GOLDSTON

Staff Scout



Ralph Goldston, in his eleventh year as a staff scout, came to the Seahawks from the Chicago Bears in 1975, where he had been offensive backfield coach. Goldston played college football at Indiana and Youngstown State and then was drafted by the Philadelphia Eagles in 1952. He played four years with the Eagles and then nine seasons with Hamilton in the Canadian Football League. He closed out his career with Montreal of the CFL in 1965. Goldston served as

defensive coach for Montreal from 1966 through 1969 and then scouted for the Giants. He coached at Harvard (1971-72) and Colorado (1973) before going to the Bears.

WARREN HARPER

Staff Scout



Warren Harper enters into his third year with the Seahawks as a staff scout. Prior to joining Seattle, he spent 15 seasons at the University of Oklahoma. Harper was a highly-successful high school coach in Texas, before going to Oklahoma, compiling a 31-8-2 record in two stints, first in Sherman, Texas, and then at Amarillo, Texas, and then at Amarillo, Texas. In between he spent three seasons at the University of Texas at El Paso.

DOUG KRETZ

Staff Scout



Doug Kretz joined the Seattle Seahawks scouting staff in June of 1981 after working two years on a part-time basis in the scouting department. A Seattle Pacific University graduate, Kretz lettered in soccer as a collegian and earned his degree in Physical Education. He broke into coaching at Redmond Junior High in Redmond, Wash. The next four years were spent as an assistant football coach and soccer coach at Newport High in Bellevue, Wash.

PHIL NERI

Staff Scout



Phil Neri joined the Seahawks scouting staff in July of this year, after seven seasons, 1979-1985 with the Philadelphia Eagles college scouting department. Prior to joining Philadelphia, Neri worked one year, 1978, for the BLESTO scouting combine. A graduate of Santa Clara University, where he lettered in football, he coached two seasons at Notre Dame High in Sherman Oaks and spent two years as a graduate assistant coach at San Jose State before joining

BLESTO. Phil's father, Jerry, was a scout with the Detroit Lions.

RICK REIPRISH

Staff Scout



Rick Reiprish enters into his second season as a staff scout with the Seahawks. Prior to joining Seattle, he spent two years with the Kansas City Chiefs scouting staff. Reiprish worked three years for the scouting combine, Blesto. He was a college assistant coach for six seasons. He coached at Austin Peay from 1973 through 1976. Reiprish moved to East Tennessee State in 1977 and then to North Alabama in 1978.



COACHING STAFF

CHUCK KNOX

Head Coach



Seahawks: Chuck Knox enters into his third season as head coach of the Seattle Seahawks. He joined the Seahawks on January 26, 1983, after five seasons as vice president and head coach of the Buffalo Bills. Knox guided the Seahawks to their best record in franchise history, 12-4, in 1984, and into the playoffs for the second consecutive year. For his efforts he was named NFL Coach of the Year by The Sporting News, Associated Press, and the Seattle Gold Helmet Committee,

and AFC Coach of the Year by UPI and the Pro Football Writers' Assn. Knox was also honored as Seattle's Sports Star of the Year for 1984. In 1983, he led the Seahawks to the first playoff appearance in the team's history, as Seattle advanced to the AFC Championship Game. He was named NFL Coach of the Year by the Seattle Gold Helmet Committee and the Vince Lombardi Committee and AFC Coach of the Year by UPI, Football News and the Kansas City 101 Club.

Head Coaching Experience: Knox has 12 years of head coaching experience with a 112-62-1 regular season won-loss record. His winning percentage of .643 ranks second among active head coaches with more than 100 wins trailing only Don Shula (.730). In 1983, he became only the 15th coach in NFL history to win 100 regular season games in his career. He has been named NFL Coach of the Year four times, in 1973 with the Los Angeles Rams and in 1980 with the Buffalo Bills along with the Seahawks in 1983 and 1984. With Los Angeles from 1973 through 1977, his teams won five division championships and compiled a 54-15-1 record. He moved to Buffalo in 1978 and inherited a team that had won just two games in 1976 and three games in 1977. He equalled that total in his first year with a 5-11 mark, and improved that to 7-9 the following season. In 1980, the Bills captured their first division title since 1966 with an 11-5 record. Buffalo finished 10-6 in 1981 and advanced to the playoffs, while in 1982 they were 4-5. In all, Knox-coached teams have won six division championships and made the playoffs nine times in his 12 years as a head coach. He is the only coach in NFL history to take three different teams into the playoffs.

Assistant Coaching Experience: Prior to being named head coach of the Rams in 1973, Knox worked as an NFL assistant coach for 10 seasons. He joined the New York Jets in 1963 as offensive line coach and then moved to Detroit as offensive line coach in 1967. He broke into coaching as an assistant at Juniata College, his alma mater, in 1954, and then coached one year at Tyrone High in Tyrone, Pa., before being named head coach at Ellwood City High in Ellwood City, Pa., in 1956. He remained there until joining the Wake Forest University staff for the 1959 and 1960 seasons and then moved to Kentucky for the 1961 and 1962 seasons.

College: Graduated with a bachelor of arts degree in history from Juniata College in Huntingdon, Pa., where he lettered four years as a tackle and served as a team co-captain as a senior. He received the school's National Alumni Achievement Award in 1974, is currently on the college's Board of Directors, and was given an honorary doctorate degree in 1983.

High School: Attended Sewickley High in Sewickley, Pa.

Personal: He is married to the former Shirley Rhine and they have four children; Chris, who operates a travel agency; Kathy, a teacher; Colleen, a health management director; and Chuck, who is a running back at the University of Arizona. He was born April 27, 1932, in Sewickley, Pa.

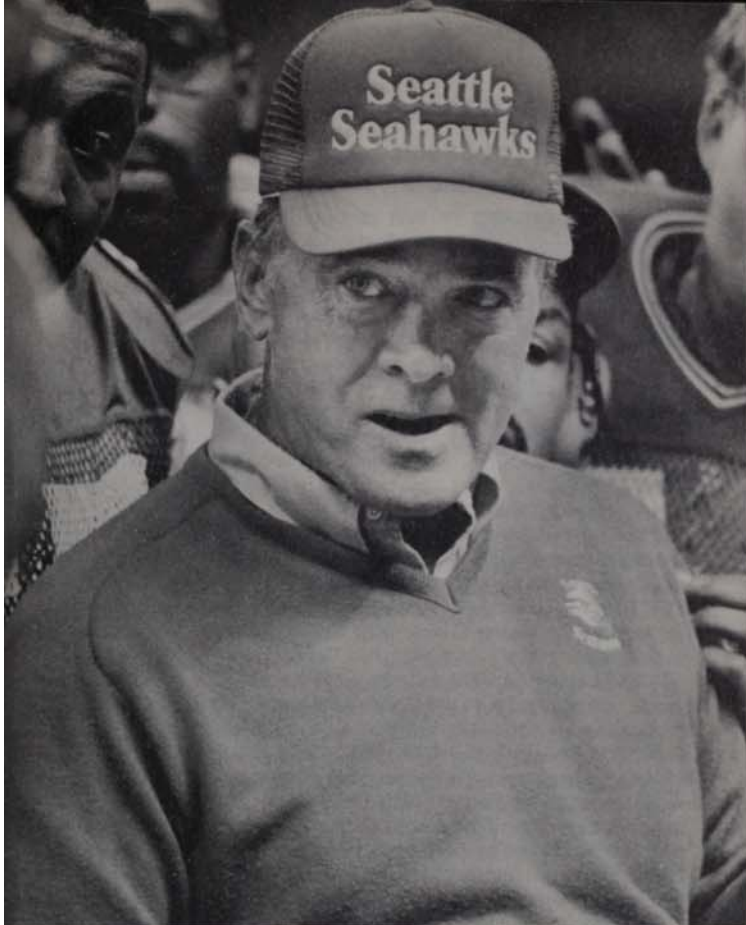

TOM CATLIN

**Assistant Head Coach,
Defensive Coordinator, Linebackers**



Will be entering his 26th season as a professional coach and 13th year with Chuck Knox . . . last season, the Seahawks defense moved from 27th overall in 1983 to sixth . . . they also led the NFL in takeaways with 63, the second most in league history . . . joined the Seahawks after spending five seasons (1978-1982) with the Buffalo Bills . . . as Buffalo's defensive coordinator in that time, the Bills finished second among NFL teams on defense in 1982 and led the league in

1980 . . . prior to taking over as the team's defensive coordinator, Buffalo ranked 23rd in defense in 1977 . . . was named Buffalo's assistant head coach in 1980, along with his defensive responsibilities . . . also served with Knox for five years in Los Angeles (1973-1977) . . . worked under George Allen and Tommy Prothro while with the Rams (1966-1972) . . . broke into coaching as an assistant for Hank Stram with the Dallas Texans of the American Football League in 1960 and moved to Kansas City with the club in 1963 . . . remained with the Chiefs until joining the Rams in 1966 . . . played five seasons in the NFL as a linebacker and center with the Cleveland Browns (1953-1954, 1957-1958) and Philadelphia Eagles (1959) . . . his playing career was interrupted by military service . . . while in the Air Force (1955-1956), he got his first coaching experience directing the plebes at West Point . . . originally a fourth-round draft choice by Baltimore, he was traded to the Browns and became a starter midway through his rookie year . . . played in three NFL championship games and was a member of Cleveland's 1954 NFL championship team . . . lettered three years (1950-1952) under Bud Wilkinson at Oklahoma and earned All-America honors as a junior and senior . . . attended Ponca City High in Ponca City, Oklahoma . . . he and his wife, Betty, have two children, Kim and Tom . . . born 9/8/31.

RAY PROCHASKA

Offensive Coordinator



Will be entering his 28th and final season as an NFL coach and 13th working with Chuck Knox . . . plans to retire at the end of the season . . . spent five seasons (1978-1982) as offensive coordinator and offensive line coach for Knox with the Buffalo Bills . . . in 1982, the Bills led the entire NFL in rushing offense . . . was with Knox in Los Angeles (1973-1977) and was the Rams' offensive coordinator his final year . . . offensive coordinator at Cleveland (1971-1972) and for his final

two years under George Allen in his first stop with the Rams (1966-1970) . . . he broke into coaching in the NFL with the Chicago Cardinals in 1958 and remained with the club, and their move to St. Louis, through the 1965 season . . . prior to moving to the NFL, Prochaska coached the Edmonton Eskimos offensive line (1955-1957) . . . he broke into coaching as an assistant at the University of Nebraska (1946-1954) . . . played at Nebraska and earned All-Big Six Conference honors as an end in his senior year, 1940, and participated in the Rose Bowl game against Stanford . . . also played in the College All-Star Game . . . in 1941 he played one season for the

Cleveland Rams before entering the U.S. Army for four-and-a-half years . . . he reached the rank of Major at the time of his discharge . . . Prochaska is pronounced with a silent "c" . . . he and his wife, Jo Ann, have four children, Craig, Mark, Judy and Scott . . . born 8/9/19.

GEORGE DYER

Defensive Line Coach



Is beginning his fourth season in the NFL and third with the Seahawks this fall after working with the Buffalo Bills in 1982 . . . prior to moving to the NFL, he served as defensive coordinator at Arizona State (1980-81) . . . in 1980 the Sun Devils scored seven touchdowns on defense, and in 1981 ASU led the Pac-10 in rushing defense . . . he was the defensive coordinator at Michigan State (1977-1979) after three seasons with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers (1974-1976) in the

Canadian Football League . . . broke into coaching as an assistant at Humboldt State College (1964-1966) and was head coach at Coalinga Junior College in Coalinga, California, in 1967 . . . he moved to Portland State as defensive coordinator (1968-1971) and then coached at Idaho (1972) and San Jose State (1973) . . . Dyer played at the University of California at Santa Barbara as a center and linebacker . . . attended San Gabriel High in San Gabriel, California . . . he and his wife, Marjorie, have five children, two boys, George and Doak, and three daughters, Tami, Darci and Marni . . . born 5/4/40.

CHICK HARRIS

Offensive Backfield Coach



Will be in his fifth NFL season as an assistant coach and third with Seattle, after working with Chuck Knox in Buffalo (1981-1982) . . . joined the Bills after six seasons as secondary coach at the University of Washington under Don James . . . during his tenure with the Huskies, he coached in two Rose Bowl games and the Sun Bowl . . . Washington defeated Michigan, 27-20, following the 1977 season and lost to the Wolverines, 23-6, following the 1980 campaign in the Rose

Bowl . . . Washington beat Texas, 14-7, in the Sun Bowl after the 1979 season . . . prior to joining the Huskies, Harris was with the Detroit Wheels (1974) of the World Football League for a season . . . he broke into coaching at Colorado State (1970-1971) and then moved to Long Beach State (1972-1973) . . . he lettered in football and track at Northern Arizona . . . Harris attended Long Beach Poly High in Long Beach, California . . . he and his wife, Cheryl, have two children, Tarana and Tyler . . . born 9/21/45.



RALPH HAWKINS

Defensive Backfield Coach



Will be in his 17th season as an NFL assistant coach and fifth working with Chuck Knox . . . came to Seattle in 1983 from the Buffalo Bills (1981-1982) . . . Buffalo's secondary in 1982 ranked second in the entire NFL against the pass . . . served as defensive coordinator with the New York Giants (1979-1980) prior to moving to Buffalo . . . Hawkins broke into professional coaching with the Bills in 1969 and remained there through the 1971 season before joining George Allen's staff with the Washington Redskins (1972-1977) . . . he then coached at Baltimore (1978) for one season . . . 1984: Started all 16 games at wide receiver and led the Seahawks in receptions for the ninth consecutive season and earned his fourth trip to the AFC-NFC Pro Bowl in the process. Finished fourth in the AFC (second among wide receivers) and ninth in the NFL with 74 catches for 1,164 yards, and 12 touchdowns. Was fifth in yards in the conference and second, to Mark Clayton's 18, in touchdowns in the league. His 12 scores broke his team record of 11 set in 1983 and placed him tied for third among non-kick scorers in the AFC. Finished the season one reception off his team record of 75 set in 1981 and 73 yards off his club record 1,237 in 1979. Caught at least one pass in each game and will enter the 1985 season having at least one reception in 107 straight regular season games, the NFL's third-longest all-time streak. Had the best day of his career with 12 receptions for 191 yards and a touchdown in 27-24 win at Denver. The 12 catches tied the team record, while the 191 yards eclipsed the old mark of 173. Started the season slowly with eight receptions in the first four games, but caught 24 in his next four, including three 100-yard afternoons. Had eight for 130 yards and a touchdown at Minnesota, five for 106 and two touchdowns against Buffalo, and seven for 129 yards and a score versus Green Bay in Milwaukee. In the season's last four games he accounted for two more 100-yard days and two games that just fell short. Had 191 at Denver and 104, on eight receptions and two TDs, versus Detroit. Accounted for 98 yards on four catches at Kansas City, and 96 on seven against the Broncos. His five 100-yard receiving games were one off his club record six in 1979. Of his season's 74 receptions, 61 gave Seattle either a first down or a touchdown. His 51-yard scoring catch with 8:07 left gave the Seahawks a 31-28 win over Buffalo. Had four receptions in the Monday night game at San Diego, the first three of which went for



touchdowns, tying his team one-game record. Started both Seahawks playoff games. Was held without a reception for the first time in 110 regular season and playoff games in the wild card game versus the Raiders. Seahawks completed only four passes (in 10 attempts) on the afternoon. Came back the following week to score Seattle's only touchdown in a 31-10 AFC Divisional Playoff loss at Miami. Caught six passes that afternoon for 128 yards, including a 56-yard touchdown reception in the second quarter. The 128 yards and 56-yard scoring play were both Seahawks single-game playoff records.

CAREER: Has played in more games (130) with more starts (127) than any other member of the Seahawks. Enters the 1985 season as the NFL's ninth all-time leading receiver with 545 receptions for 8,772 yards and 72 touchdowns. He's the only player in the league's all-time Top 20 with less than 10 seasons experience. Only one active player, San Diego's Charlie Joiner with 657, has more catches than Largent entering 1985. Also ranks ninth all-time in receiving yards and tenth in touchdowns scored. Has averaged 60.5 receptions, 974.6 yards, and eight touchdowns in nine seasons. His 107 straight regular season games with at least one reception is third in history trailing Harold Carmichael (127) and Mel Gray (121). Totals seven seasons with at least 50 receptions to tie the league record. Has six seasons with at least 1,000 yards receiving, second all-time to Lance Alworth's seven and 32 career 100-yard receiving games, third in history trailing Don Maynard (50) and Alworth (41). Four of his 1,000-yard seasons (1978-81) came consecutively. Led the AFC in receptions in 1978 with 71 and finished second in yardage with 1,168 in the NFL. Was fourth in the conference in 1979 and 1980 with 66 each season. Finished 1981 second (to Kellen Winslow's 88) in the AFC with a team-record 75 receptions. His 1,224 yards was third. Finished sixth in 1983 with 72 catches and was seventh in yards with 1,074. Only caught 33 passes in 1977, but finished second in the AFC in touchdowns with a then club record 10. Broke that mark with 11 in 1983, including three at St. Louis. Has 16 games with two or more touchdown receptions, including four in 1979 and three each in 1977, 1983, and 1984. Has 23 scoring receptions in the past two seasons, tops in the AFC and second in the NFL to Roy Green's 26. Started all three 1983 playoff games and finished with eight receptions for 157 yards and a touchdown. Scored the Seahawks first-ever post season points with a 17-yard TD reception versus Denver. CHRONOLOGY

- June 15, 1972** Seattle Professional Football, a group of business and community leaders, announce their intention to attempt to secure a National Football League franchise for the City of Seattle. Herman Sarkowsky serves as spokesman for the group.
- November 2, 1972** Construction begins on The Kingdome.
- June 4, 1974** The National Football League announces that Seattle will have a franchise for the 1976 season.
- December 5, 1974** The National Football League announces that it has voted membership to Seattle Professional Football, Inc., headed by Lloyd W. Nordstrom with partners Herman Sarkowsky, D.E. "Ned" Skinner, Howard S. Wright, M. Lamont Bean, and Lynn P. Himmelman.
- March 6, 1975** John Thompson, Executive Director of the NFL Management Council, named General Manager of the Seattle franchise.
- June 17, 1975** Nickname "Seahawks" selected from 20,365 entries and 1,741 different names. One hundred fifty-one suggest "Seahawks."
- January 3, 1976** Jack Patera, assistant coach of the Minnesota Vikings, named head coach of the Seahawks.
- January 20, 1976** Lloyd W. Nordstrom, spokesman for the Nordstrom family, the Seahawks' majority owner, dies of a heart attack while vacationing in Mexico.
- March 30, 1976** Veteran allocation held in New York City. Seahawks select 39 NFL veterans.
- April 8-9, 1976** Seahawks select 25 collegians in their first college draft. Notre Dame's Steve Niehaus is the first choice.
- July 9, 1976** Seahawks open training camp at Eastern Washington University in Cheney.
- August 1, 1976** Seahawks play first game before 60,825 fans in the Kingdome. San Francisco holds on to defeat Seattle, 27-20, as Jim Zorn is tackled on the 49ers' two-yard line when the gun sounds.
- August 29, 1976** Seahawks capture first victory, a 17-16 win over San Diego, as Ron Howard catches a three-yard Jim Zorn pass for the winning touchdown with only 13 seconds remaining.
- September 12, 1976** Seattle opens regular season play with a near miss against St. Louis, 30-24. The game ends with the Cardinals intercepting a pass in the end zone.
- October 17, 1976** Seahawks win Expansion Bowl with 13-10 victory over host Tampa Bay. Linebacker Mike Curtis blocks a Tampa Bay Field goal attempt with 42 seconds remaining to preserve the victory.
- November 7, 1976** Seahawks capture their first regular season victory at home with a 30-13 win over Atlanta. Sherman Smith becomes the first Seattle back to rush for over 100 yards with 124 yards on 14 carries.
- May 3, 1977** Seattle trades its first-round draft choice, the second player in the draft, to Dallas for the Cowboys' first-round selection and three second-round picks. The Seahawks select Steve August, offensive guard from Tulsa, on the first round.
- December 18, 1977** Seahawks win their fifth game of the year, a 20-19 decision over Cleveland before 61,583 fans in the Kingdome, to establish a record for most wins ever by a second-year expansion team.
- November 26, 1978** Seattle becomes the first team since 1965 to beat Oakland twice during the regular season with a 17-16 win on Efren Herrera's 46-yard field goal with just three seconds remaining.

CHRONOLOGY

October 29, 1979 After trailing 14-0, the Seahawks rebound for a 31-28 win over Atlanta in Seattle's first appearance on ABC's Monday Night Football. Dan Doornink rushes for 122 yards on 21 carries and scores twice.

March 11, 1982 Mike McCormack, former head coach with the Philadelphia Eagles and Baltimore Colts, is named Director of Football Operations.

September 21, 1982 Players go on strike for 57 days.

October 13, 1982 Mike McCormack named interim head coach after the firing of head coach Jack Patera and general manager John Thompson.

November 21, 1982 Seahawks capture 17-10 victory over the host Denver Broncos in Mike McCormack's first game as head coach following the players' strike. Steve Largent catches a 34-yard touchdown pass from Jim Zorn with 49 seconds left for the victory.

January 3, 1983 Mike McCormack named President and General Manager of the Seattle Seahawks after previously serving as Director of Football Operations, since March 11, 1982, and interim head coach since October 13, 1982.

January 26, 1983 Chuck Knox named head coach of the Seahawks. Knox previously had served as head coach of the Los Angeles Rams (1973-77) and the Buffalo Bills (1978-82). He guided seven of his ten teams to the playoffs, while winning six division championships.

September 11, 1983 Seahawks win first game under Chuck Knox, 17-10, over the New York Jets, as the club sets a team record with 57 rushing attempts and Curt Warner gains 128 yards on 24 carries.

December 18, 1983 Seahawks clinch first playoff berth with 24-6 win over New England.

December 24, 1983 Dave Krieg throws three touchdown passes and Curt Warner rushes for 99 yards in 31-7 win over Denver in the AFC Wild Card Game before 60,752 fans in Kingdome.

December 31, 1983 Seahawks drive 66 yards in five plays late in the fourth quarter to capture playoff win over Miami, 27-20, before 71,032 fans at the Orange Bowl.

January 8, 1984 Los Angeles Raiders defeat the Seahawks, 30-14, in the AFC Championship Game at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum before 88,734 fans.

September 3, 1984 Seahawks win regular season opener for the first time in franchise history, a 33-0 victory over Cleveland Browns. The enthusiasm is dampened by an injury to Curt Warner, that will keep him out for the rest of the season.

October 29, 1984 Seahawks post their second shutout of the season with a 24-0 victory over the San Diego Chargers on Monday Night Football. Kenny Easley intercepts a club record three passes and Steve Largent catches three touchdown passes.

November 4, 1984 Seahawks set an NFL record by returning four interceptions for touchdowns, including two by Dave Brown, in a 45-0 win over the Kansas City Chiefs. Kenny Easley and Keith Simpson had the other two interception returns for touchdowns.

November 25, 1984 Dave Krieg throws for 406 yards and three touchdowns, including an 80-yarder to Daryl Turner on the first play of the game, to lead the Seahawks past Denver, 27-24. Steve Largent catches 12 passes for 191 yards and one score.

December 22, 1984 Seattle eliminates the defending Super Bowl Champion Los Angeles Raiders, 13-7, from the playoffs in the AFC Wild Card Game at the Kingdome. Seahawks rush for 205 yards and force three turnovers, along with registering six sacks, in the victory.

December 29, 1984 Miami defeats the Seahawks, 31-17, in an AFC Divisional playoff game at the Orange Bowl.

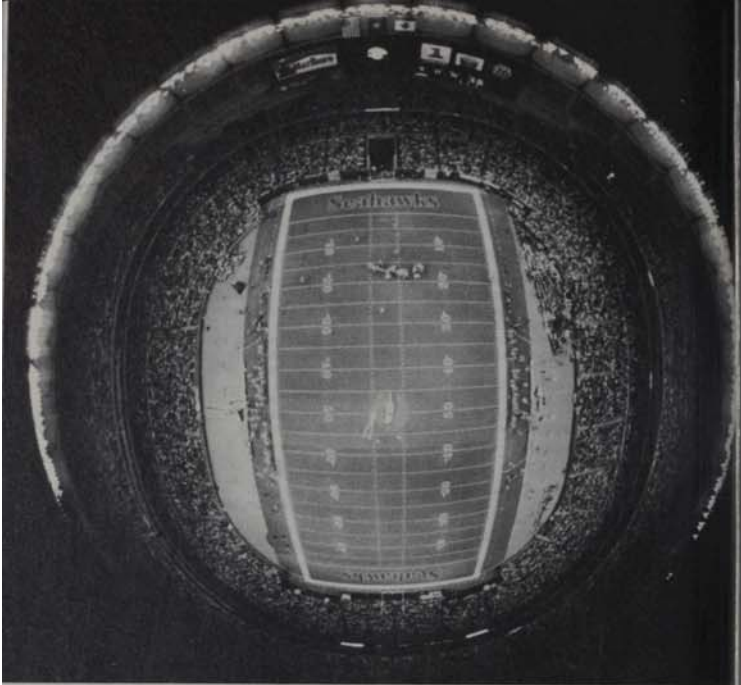

KINGDOME

The Kingdome, at a cost of \$67 million and with a seating capacity of 64,984 for football, is the least expensive domed, air-conditioned stadium of its size in the world.

Built on a 35.9-acre site just south of Seattle's central business district, the walls of the Dome anchor the world's largest self-supporting concrete roof.

The project was completed by Peter Kiewit Sons' Construction Co. and was originally a bond issue passed by a 62 percent majority of the voters of King County and spearheaded by former County Executive John Spellman. Construction began on November 2, 1972.

The first professional football game in the Kingdome, August 1, 1976, between the Seahawks and San Francisco 49ers drew 60,825 fans. Since that time, the Seahawks have soldout 66 of their last 67 games, including preseason and postseason games, dating from 1978 to 1984. The Seahawks have finished in the top nine among all NFL clubs in attendance each of their first nine seasons. The Kingdome is also the home of the American League Seattle Mariners. Among other events held in the Kingdome have been the Auto Show, Big Seattle Boat Show, rock concerts, the 1984 NCAA Final Four basketball tournament, and the Billy Graham Crusade. The Billy Graham Crusade on May 14, 1976, which attracted 74,000 people, still ranks as the single event attendance leader in the Kingdome.

KINGDOME DIRECTIONS

Cars arriving from the north on I-5, take Airport Way exit (#164). Turn left onto I-90 Truck Route and follow Royal Brougham Way to south parking lot entrance. When arriving from the south, take the Spokane Street exit (#163) and proceed to 4th Avenue South. Turn right heading north to Royal Brougham Way. Turn left and proceed to south lot. If the north lot is your destination, follow 4th Avenue north to Jackson. Go left on Jackson to 2nd Avenue. Left on 2nd which will lead to the North Lot entrance.

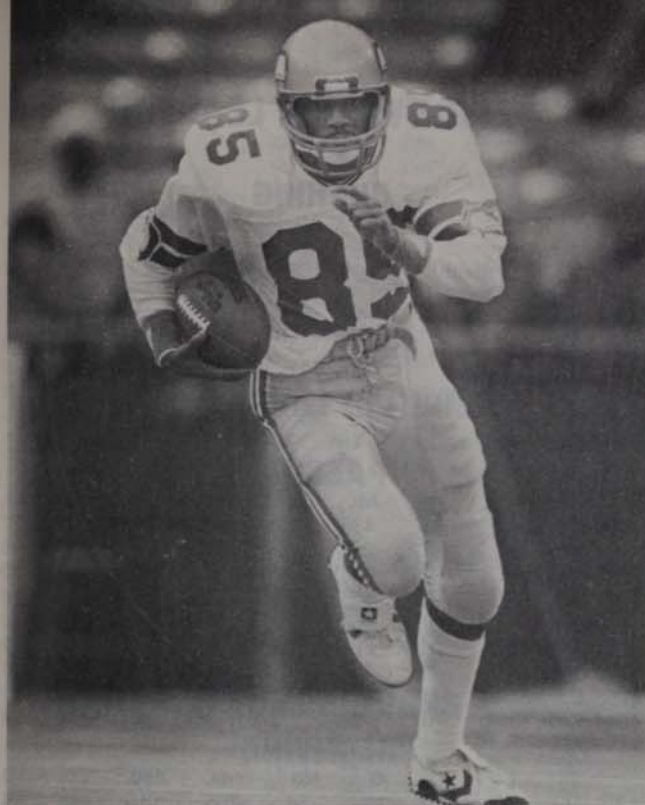

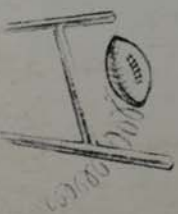
