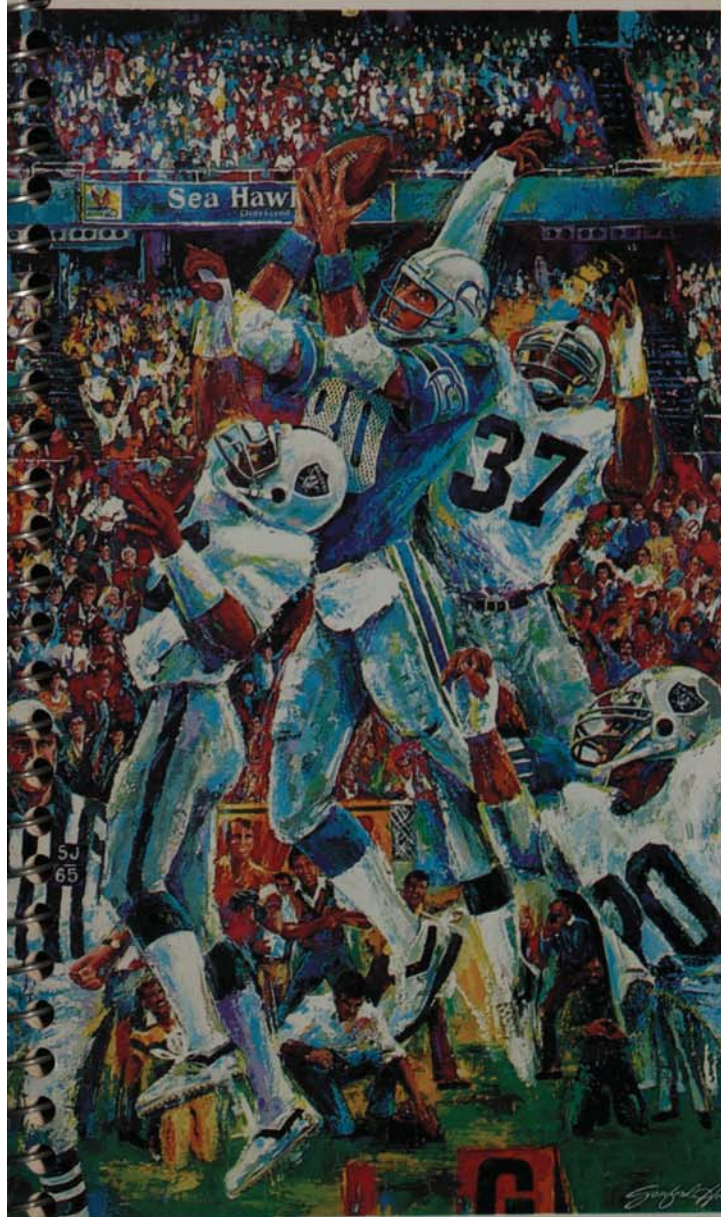

MIKE McCORMACK

President/General Manager



Seahawks: Mike McCormack was elevated to the position of President and General Manager of the Seattle Seahawks on January 3, 1983, after serving as the club's interim head coach for the final seven games of the 1982 season. The Seahawks won four of their last seven games under McCormack, who took over the head coaching duties on October 13 from Jack Patera. He originally joined the Seattle staff in March, 1982, as Director of Football Operations.

NFL Experience: Prior to joining the Seahawks, McCormack served as head coach of the Baltimore Colts in 1980 and 1981. He was also head coach of the Philadelphia Eagles from 1973 through 1975 and spent 11 years as an NFL assistant coach with the Washington Redskins (1966-72) and Cincinnati Bengals (1976-79).

Hall of Fame: McCormack was one of four players inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio, on July 28, 1984. McCormack was honored along with Arnie Weinmeister, Willie Brown, and Charley Taylor.

Pro Playing Experience: He was a number one draft choice by the NFL's New York Yanks in 1951 and then spent the 1952 and 1953 seasons in the military service. In 1954, he was involved in a 15-player trade that sent him to the Cleveland Browns. During his nine seasons (1954-1962) with the Browns, the standout offensive tackle played in six Pro Bowls and three NFL championship games, winning two. Following his retirement, he was in the insurance business for three years before entering the coaching field.

College: He is a member of the University of Kansas' all-time team selected in 1976 by the Lawrence *Journal-World*. He served as a team co-captain in 1950 and concluded his collegiate career by participating in the East-West Shrine Game and College All-Star Game following his senior season. He was an All-Big Seven Conference selection in 1950.

Personal: He married the former Ann Helsby on January 28, 1956, in Kansas City. The McCormacks have four children, Michael, an attorney; Tim, in graduate school at the University of Cincinnati; Molly, married and living in Cincinnati; Colleen, married and living in Cincinnati; and one grandson, Ryan. Mike and Ann McCormack reside in Bellevue. He was born June 21, 1930, in Chicago.

CHUCK ALLEN

Assistant General Manager



Chuck Allen is in his twelfth year as a member of the Seattle Seahawks staff. He joined the organization in June of 1975 as Director of Pro Scouting and was named Assistant General Manager in March of 1983. A former all-coast and all-conference player at the University of Washington, Allen was an assistant coach with the Huskies (1973-74) prior to joining the Seahawks. Allen played nine seasons with the San Diego Chargers and was named to the All-American

Football League team in 1961 as a rookie. He was a second-team choice in 1964. During his playing career, Allen served as the Chargers' defensive captain and was inducted into the Chargers' Hall of Fame in 1984. He spent 1970, 1971 and part of the 1972 season with the Pittsburgh Steelers and finished his career in 1972 with the Philadelphia Eagles. He was selected to the All-Time All-Northwest team in 1976 and was inducted into the Washington State Sports Hall of Fame for his play at the University of Washington and in professional football. Chuck, and his wife, Linda, have five children, Cathy, Julie, Cheryl, Jean and Patrick.

MIKE ALLMAN

Player Personnel Director



Mike Allman enters into his third year as Player Personnel Director with the Seahawks after serving six years with the Washington Redskins in the same capacity. Allman joined the Seahawks staff on July 1, 1984, after spending 19 years with the Redskins, first as a scout, then as Director of College Scouting, and as Director of Player Personnel since 1978. A native of the Washington D.C. area, he graduated with a B.A. degree in Economics from Mt. St. Mary's College in

Emmitsburg, Maryland. He also played baseball, lettering three years as an outfielder and twice was an all-conference selection. He attended St. Francis Xavier and Gonzaga High Schools and taught junior high social studies from 1962 through 1965 before joining the Redskins. Mike and his wife, Ann, have four children: Maureen Mary, Theresa Ann, Michael Francis, and Patrick James. Michael is a freshman defensive back at the University of Washington.

ORIGINALS

Cornerback Dave Brown and wide receiver Steve Largent are the only two original Seahawks remaining from the 1976 season. Brown came in the veteran allocation draft and Largent in a trade with the Houston Oilers. Brown is the only player still active in the NFL from the allocation draft.



RALPH GOLDSTON

Staff Scout



Ralph Goldston, in his twelfth year as a staff scout, came to the Seahawks from the Chicago Bears in 1975, where he had been offensive backfield coach. Goldston played college football at Indiana and Youngstown State and then was drafted by the Philadelphia Eagles in 1952. He played four years with the Eagles and then nine seasons with Hamilton in the Canadian Football League. He closed out his career with Montreal of the CFL in 1965. Goldston served as

defensive coach for Montreal from 1966 through 1969 and then scouted for the Giants. He coached at Harvard (1971-72) and Colorado (1973) before going to the Bears. Ralph and his wife, Sarah, have four children, Monique, Ralph, Jr., Urula, and Beverly.

WARREN HARPER

Staff Scout



Warren Harper enters into his fourth year with the Seahawks as a staff scout. He brought 28 years of high school and college coaching experience to Seattle, including 15 seasons as linebacker coach and administrative assistant coach at the University of Oklahoma. Harper was a highly-successful high school coach in Texas before going to Oklahoma, compiling a 31-8-2 record in two stints, first in Sherman, Texas, and then at Amarillo, Texas. In between he

spent three seasons at the University of Texas-El Paso, the first as an assistant to O.A. "Bum" Phillips and the last two as head coach. Warren and his wife, Gene, have two children, Robert and Patricia.

DOUG KRETZ

Staff Scout



Doug Kretz joined the Seattle Seahawks scouting staff in June of 1981 after working two years on a part-time basis in the scouting department. A Seattle Pacific University graduate, Kretz lettered in soccer as a collegian and earned his degree in Physical Education. He broke into coaching at Redmond Junior High in Redmond, Wash. The next four years were spent as an assistant football coach and soccer coach at Newport High in Bellevue, Wash. A native of Seattle,

Kretz attended Mercer Island High School, where he played football and baseball.

PHIL NERI

Staff Scout



Phil Neri joined the Seahawks scouting staff in July, 1985, after seven seasons, 1979-1985, with the Philadelphia Eagles college scouting department. Prior to joining Philadelphia, Neri worked one year, 1978, for the BLESTO scouting combine. A graduate of Santa Clara University, where he lettered in football, he coached two seasons at Notre Dame High in Sherman Oaks, California, and spent two years as a graduate assistant coach at San Jose State before joining

BLESTO. Phil's father, Jerry, is a scout with the Detroit Lions.

RICK REIPRISH

Staff Scout



Rick Reiprish enters into his third season as a staff scout with the Seahawks. Prior to joining Seattle, he spent two years with the Kansas City Chiefs scouting staff. Reiprish worked three years for the scouting combine, BLESTO, before joining the Chiefs. Prior to BLESTO, he was a college assistant coach for six seasons. He coached the receivers in 1973 and the running backs from 1974-76 at Austin Peay while finishing up work on his master's degree in admini-

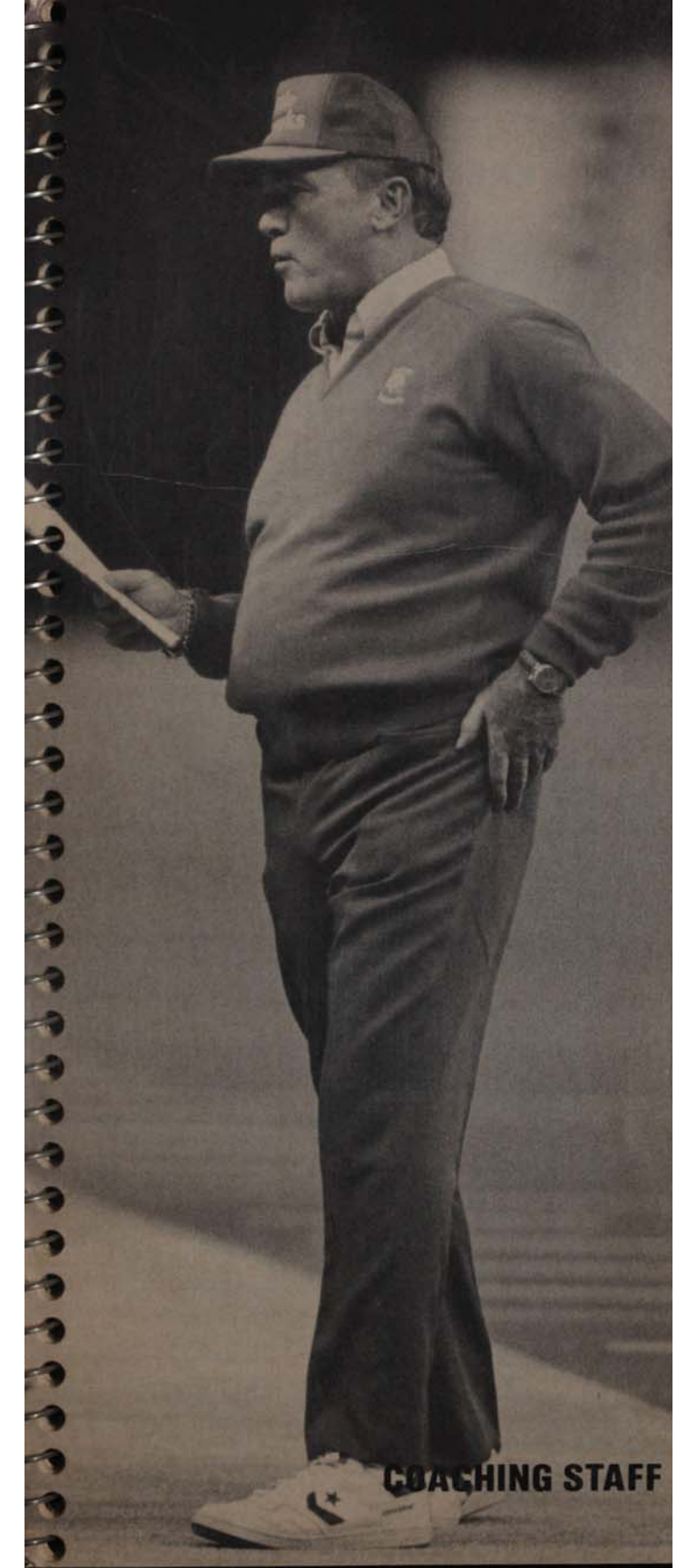
stration. Reiprish moved to East Tennessee State in 1977 to handle the offensive backfield and quarterbacks, and then to North Alabama where he worked with the offensive line in 1978. Rick and his wife, Janet, have a son, Drew.

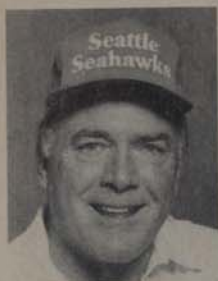

COACHING STAFF

CHUCK KNOX

Head Coach



Seahawks: Chuck Knox enters into his fourth season as the head coach of the Seattle Seahawks having taken the team to a pair of playoff appearances in his first three seasons. Knox was named head coach on January 26, 1983, after five seasons as vice president and head coach of the Buffalo Bills. Knox took the Seahawks into the playoffs for the first time in their eight-year history in 1983, and advanced to the AFC Championship Game. In 1984, Seattle posted the best

record in team history - 12-4 - and advanced to the divisional playoff round. Last year, Seattle finished 8-8. Knox earned NFL Coach of the Year honors after the 1983 season by the Seattle Gold Helmet Committee and the Vince Lombardi Committee and AFC Coach of the Year honors by UPI, Football News and the Kansas City 101 Club. After the 1984 campaign, he was awarded NFL Coach of the Year honors by the Gold Helmet Committee, the Sporting News, and Associated Press. He received AFC Coach of the Year awards from UPI and the Pro Football Writers' Association.

Head Coaching Experience: Knox has 13 years of head coaching experience with a 120-70-1 regular season won-loss record. His winning percentage of .631 ranks third among active head coaches with more than 100 wins trailing only Don Shula (.731) and Tom Landry (.636). In 1983, he became only the 15th coach in NFL history to win 100 regular season games in his career. He has been named NFL Coach of the Year four times, in 1973 with the Los Angeles Rams and in 1980 with the Buffalo Bills along with the Seahawks in 1983 and 1984. With Los Angeles from 1973 through 1977, his teams won five division championships and compiled a 54-15-1 record. He moved to Buffalo in 1978 and inherited a team that had won just two games in 1976 and three games in 1977. He equalled that total in his first year with a 5-11 mark, and improved that to 7-9 the following season. In 1980, the Bills captured their first division title since 1966 with an 11-5 record. Buffalo finished 10-6 in 1981 and advanced to the playoffs, while in 1982 they were 4-5. In all, Knox-coached teams have won six division championships and made the playoffs nine times in his 13 years as a head coach. He is the only coach in NFL history to take three different teams in to the playoffs.

Assistant Coaching Experience: Prior to being named head coach of the Rams in 1973, Knox worked as an NFL assistant coach for 10 seasons. He joined the New York Jets in 1963 as offensive line coach and then moved to Detroit as offensive line coach in 1967. He broke into coaching as an assistant at Juniata College, his alma mater, in 1954, and then coached one year at Tyrone High in Tyrone, Pa., before being named head coach at Ellwood City High in Ellwood City, Pa., in 1956. He remained there until joining the Wake Forest University staff for the 1959 and 1960 seasons and then moved to Kentucky for the 1961 and 1962 seasons.

College: Graduated with a bachelor of arts degree in history from Juniata College in Huntingdon, Pa., where he lettered four years as a tackle and served as a team co-captain as a senior. He received the school's National Alumni Achievement Award in 1974, is currently on the college's Board of Directors and was given an honorary doctorate degree in 1983.

High School: Attended Sewickley High in Sewickley, Pa.

Personal: He is married to the former Shirley Rhine and they have four children, Chris, who operates a travel agency; Kathy, a teacher; Colleen a health management director; and Chuck, who is a running back at the University of Arizona. He was born April 27, 1932, in

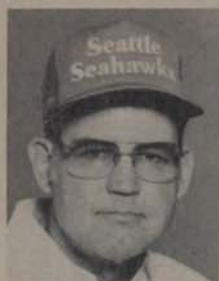

TOM CATLIN

**Assistant Head Coach,
Defensive Coordinator, Linebackers**



Will be entering his 27th season as a professional coach, 14th year with Chuck Knox and fourth season with the Seahawks . . . In 1984, Seattle led the NFL in takeaways with 63, the second most in league history, last year finished second in the AFC with 44 and led the AFC with 54 in 1983 . . . joined the Seahawks after spending five seasons (1978-1982) with the Buffalo Bills . . . as Buffalo's defensive coordinator in that time, the Bills finished second among NFL teams on defense in 1982 and led the league in 1980 . . . prior to taking over as the team's defensive coordinator, Buffalo ranked 23rd in defense in 1977 . . . was named Buffalo's assistant head coach in 1980, along with his defensive responsibilities . . . also served with Knox for five years in Los Angeles (1973-1977) . . . worked under George Allen and Tommy Prothro while with the Rams (1966-72) . . . broke into coaching as an assistant for Hank Stram with the Dallas Texans of the American Football League in 1960 and moved to Kansas City with the club in 1963 . . . remained with the Chiefs until joining the Rams in 1966 . . . played five seasons in the NFL as a linebacker and center with the Cleveland Browns (1953-1954, 1957-1958) and Philadelphia Eagles (1959) . . . his playing career was interrupted by military service . . . while in the Air Force (1955-1956), he got his first coaching experience directing the plebes at West Point . . . originally a fourth-round draft choice by Baltimore, he was traded to the Browns and became a starter midway through his rookie year . . . played in three NFL championship games and was a member of Cleveland's 1954 NFL Championship team . . . lettered three years (1950-1952) under Bud Wilkinson at Oklahoma and earned All-America honors as a junior and senior . . . finished 10th in the 1952 Heisman Trophy balloting . . . attended Ponca City High in Ponca City, Oklahoma . . . he and his wife, Betty, have two children, Kim and Tom . . . born 9/8/31.

STEVE MOORE

Offensive Coordinator, Receivers



Is entering his ninth NFL season . . . promoted to offensive coordinator prior to the 1986 season . . . joined the Seahawks in 1983 after five years as an assistant with the Buffalo Bills (1978-82) . . . with Buffalo he handled offensive special assignments and was special teams coach . . . prior to joining the Bills, he coached the quarterbacks and receivers at Rice (1976-1977) . . . broke into college coaching at West Point (1975) coaching the quarterbacks and receivers . . . earned junior college All-America honors as a wide receiver at Glendale College in Glendale, Calif., and then played two seasons at the University of California at Santa Barbara, where he was an All-Coast selection . . . following his senior year, he played in the Coaches All-America Game . . . his first coaching assignment was as a graduate assistant at his alma mater (1970-1971) . . . he worked as an assistant football coach and head track coach at Temple High in Temple, Texas (1972-1973) before being named the head football coach at Mesa Verde High, just outside of Sacramento, Calif., for the

1974 season . . . Moore is a graduate of Glendale High in Glendale, Calif. . . he and his wife, Carol, have three children, Steve, Jr., Kim and Christy . . . born 8/19/47.

second among NFC wide receivers to Dallas' Drew Pearson (58). Has finished in the NFL's top 10 in receiving yards six times, including a first place finish in 1985, a second in 1978, fifth in 1981, sixth in 1980, seventh in 1979, and ninth in 1984. 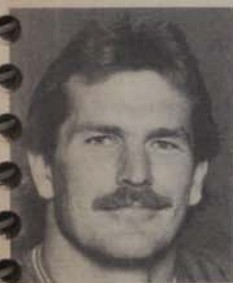

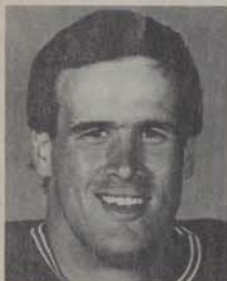

Named Aggie Defensive Player of the Game four times as a senior and four times as a junior. Along with his 140 tackles as a senior, he had 12 sacks, seven forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and one interception. Returned 12 kickoffs for 374 yards, a 31.2 average and two touchdowns (a 92-yarder against Drake and a 90-yarder against West Texas State). Had eight punt returns for 41 yards as a senior after leading the Missouri Valley Conference with a 12.2 average on 20 returns, including a 57-yard touchdown against Illinois State as a junior. Had a single game high 15 tackles against Louisiana Tech along with six sacks, two fumble recoveries, three forced fumbles and four bad passes. Criminal Justice major.

BUILDING THE FRANCHISE

CHRONOLOGY

- 1972 — 6/15** Seattle Professional Football, a group of business and community leaders, announce their intention to attempt to secure a National Football League franchise for the City of Seattle. Herman Sarkowsky serves as spokesman for the group. **11/2** Construction begins on The Kingdome.
- 1974 — 6/4** The National Football League announces that Seattle will have a franchise for the 1976 season. **12/5** The National Football League announces that it has voted membership to Seattle Professional Football, Inc., headed by Lloyd W. Nordstrom with partners Herman Sarkowsky, D.E. "Ned" Skinner, Howard S. Wright, M. Lamont Bean, and Lynn P. Himmelman.
- 1975 — 3/6** John Thompson, Executive Director of the NFL Management Council, named General Manager of the Seattle franchise. **6/17** Nickname "Seahawks" selected from 20,366 entries and 1,741 different names. One hundred fifty-one suggest "Seahawks." **12/18** Seahawks agree to a 20-year lease agreement to play all games in The Kingdome.
- 1976 — 1/3** Jack Patera, assistant coach of the Minnesota Vikings, named head coach of the Seahawks. **1/20** Lloyd W. Nordstrom, spokesman for the Nordstrom family, the Seahawks' majority owner, dies of a heart attack while vacationing in Mexico. **3/30** Veteran Allocation held in New York City. Seahawks select 3 NFL veterans. **4/8-9** College draft. Seahawks select 25 collegians in their first college draft. Notre Dame's Steve Niehaus is the first choice and he flies to Seattle for evening news conference on April 8. **7/9** Seahawks open training camp at Eastern Washington University in Cheney. **8/1** Seahawks play first game before 60,825 fans in the Kingdome. San Francisco 49ers hold on to defeat Seattle, 27-20, as Jim Zorn is tackled on the 49ers' two-yard line when the gun sounds. **8/29** Seahawks capture first victory, a 17-16 preseason win over San Diego, as Ron Howard catches a three-yard Jim Zorn pass for the winning touchdown with only 13 seconds remaining. **9/12** Seattle opens regular season play with a near miss against St. Louis, 30-24. The game ends with the Cardinals intercepting a pass in the end zone. **10/17** Seahawks win Expansion Bowl with 13-10 victory over host Tampa Bay. Linebacker Mike Curtis blocks a Tampa Bay field goal attempt with 42 seconds remaining to preserve the victory. **11/7** Seahawks capture their first regular season victory at home with a 30-13 win over Atlanta. Sherman Smith becomes the first Seattle back to rush for over 100 yards with 124 yards on 14 carries.
- 1977 — 1/17** Seahawks host the Pro Bowl and it is the first sellout in the 27-year history of the game and is the largest crowd under the AFC vs. NFC format. AFC scores a 24-14 win before 63,214 fans. **5/3** Seattle trades its first-round draft choice, the second player in the draft, to Dallas for the Cowboys' first-round selection and three second-round picks. The Seahawks select Steve August, offensive guard from Tulsa, on the first round. **10/30** After missing four games with an injury, Jim Zorn returns to lead Seattle in its biggest victory ever — a 56-17 triumph over Buffalo. The Seahawks set 15 club records and equal six, including Zorn's four TD passes. **11/13** Seattle defense blanks the New York Jets, 17-0, in Shea Stadium. It's the first time an established team is shutout by an expansion team in its second year. **12/18** Seahawks win their fifth game of the year, a 20-10 decision over Cleveland before 61,583 fans in the Kingdome, to establish a record for most wins ever by a second-year expansion team.

1978 — 5/3 Keith Simpson, cornerback from Memphis State, is selected as Seattle's first-round draft choice followed by his college teammate Keith Butler, a linebacker, on the second round. 10/8 Efren Herrera kicks a 19-yard field goal on the final play of the game to give Seattle a 29-28 win over Minnesota before 62,031 fans. 11/26 Seattle becomes the first team since 1965 to beat Oakland twice during the regular season with a 17-16 win on Efren Herrera's 46-yard field goal with just three seconds remaining. 12/17 Seahawks end their third season with a 9-7 record and finish one game behind Denver in the AFC West standings following 23-19 win over Kansas City. Al Hunter rushes for 133 yards on 27 carries as Seahawks perform before sixth straight home sellout crowd.

1979 — 1/29 Steve Largent catches a record-equalling five passes as Seattle's first representative to the Pro Bowl. National Football Conference defeats Largent and his AFC teammates, 13-7, in the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum. 5/3 Manu Tuiaosopo, defensive tackle from UCLA, becomes Seattle's first-round draft choice. 10/29 After trailing 14-0, the Seahawks rebound for a 31-28 win over Atlanta in Seattle's first appearance on ABC's Monday Night Football. Dan Doornink rushes for 122 yards on 21 carries and scores twice. 12/16 The Seahawks close out their second straight 9-7 season with a 29-24 win over Oakland. Sam McCullum sets a club record with 173 yards receiving on eight catches.

1980 — 4/29 Seattle trades its first-round draft choice and a third-round pick to Buffalo for the Bills' first-round choice, the tenth player in the draft. The Seahawks then select defensive end Jacob Green of Texas A&M on the first round. 9/28 Seahawks score second shutout in the club's history with a 14-0 win over Washington Redskins in Robert F. Kennedy Stadium. 10/5 Sam McCullum catches two touchdown passes and Efren Herrera kicks four field goals in 26-7 win over Houston at the Astrodome.

1981 — 4/28 Seahawks select UCLA safety Kenny Easley on the first round of the NFL draft. 11/8 Seattle holds the Pittsburgh Steelers scoreless in the second half and rallies for a pair of fourth quarter touchdowns to capture a 24-21 victory at the Kingdome. 11/16 The Seahawks score on their last eight possessions to defeat the San Diego Chargers, 44-23, on Monday Night Football. It is the Seahawks' first regular season victory over the Chargers after eight straight losses.

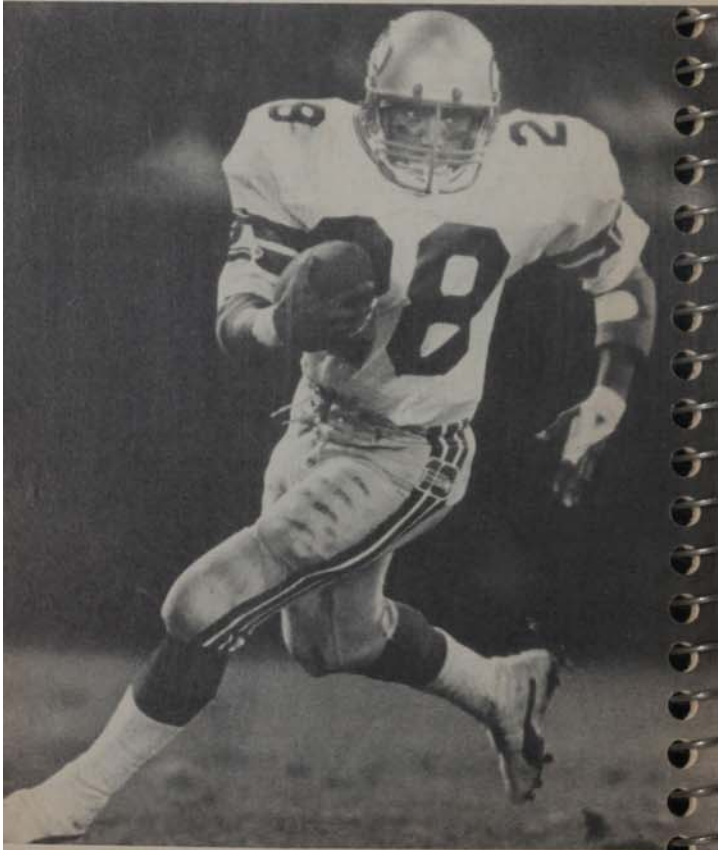
1982 — 3/11 Mike McCormack, former head coach with the Philadelphia Eagles and Baltimore Colts, is named Director of Football Operations. 4/27 Seahawks select Clemson defensive end Jeff Bryant in the first round of the college draft. 9/21 Players go on strike for 57 days. 10/13 Mike McCormack

named interim head coach after the firing of head coach Jack Patera and general manager John Thompson. **11/21** Seahawks capture 17-10 victory over the host Denver Broncos in Mike McCormack's first game as head coach following the players' strike. Steve Largent catches a 34-yard touchdown pass from Jim Zorn with 49 seconds left for the victory. **11/28** Seahawks shut out the Pittsburgh Steelers, 16-0, for the club's third shutout in history and first at the Kingdome.

1983 — **1/2** Seahawks conclude nine-game season with a 13-11 win over the Denver Broncos as Dave Krieg throws a 19-yard touchdown pass to Roger Carr with just 47 seconds left. The Seahawks drive 87 yards in 10 plays with no timeouts to score the winning touchdown. Seattle finishes the season 4-5 but were 4-1 under Mike McCormack. **1/3** Mike McCormack named President and General Manager of the Seattle Seahawks after previously serving as Director of Football Operations since March 11, 1982, and interim head coach since October 1, 1982. **1/26** Chuck Knox named head coach of the Seahawks. Knox previously had served as head coach of the Los Angeles Rams (1973-77) and the Buffalo Bills (1978-82). He guided seven of his ten teams to the playoffs, while winning six division championships. **3/15** Chuck Allen, who joined the Seahawks staff in June of 1975 as Director of Pro Scouting, named Assistant General Manager. **4/26** Seattle selects Penn State running back Curt Warner in the NFL draft. Warner is the third player taken on the first round. To be able to get Warner, the Seahawks trade their first, second and third round selections to the Houston Oilers for the Oilers first round pick. **9/11** Seahawks win first game under Chuck Knox, 17-10, over the New



York Jets, as the club sets a team record with 57 rushing attempts and Curt Warner gains 128 yards on 24 carries. **10/16** Seahawks force eight turnovers and register eight sacks in 38-36 victory over the Los Angeles Raiders. **10/30** Seahawks make it two straight over Raiders with 34-21 win. **12/18** Seahawks clinch first playoff berth with 24-6 win over New England. **12/24** Dave Krieg throws three touchdown passes and Curt Warner rushes for 99 yards in 31-7 win over Denver in the AFC Wild Card Game before 60,752 fans in Kingdome. **12/31** Seahawks drive 66 yards in five plays late in the fourth quarter to capture playoff win over Miami, 27-20, before 71,032 fans at the Orange Bowl.

1984 — 1/8 Los Angeles Raiders defeat the Seahawks, 30-14, in the AFC Championship Game at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum before 88,734 fans. **5/1** Seahawks select cornerback Terry Taylor of Southern Illinois as their first round choice in the annual NFL draft. **9/3** Seahawks win regular season opener for the first time in franchise history, a 33-0 victory over Cleveland Browns. The enthusiasm is dampened by an injury to Curt Warner which will keep him out for the rest of the season. **10/29** Seahawks post their second shutout of the season with a 24-0 victory over the San Diego Chargers on Monday Night Football. Kenny Easley intercepts a club record three passes and Steve Largent catches three touchdown passes. **11/4** Seahawks set an NFL record by returning four interceptions for touchdowns, including two by Dave Brown, in a 45-0 win over the Kansas City Chiefs. Kenny Easley and Keith Simpson had the other two interception returns for touchdowns. **11/25** Dave Krieg throws for 406 yards and three touchdowns, including an 80-yarder to Daryl Turner on the first play of the game, to lead the Seahawks past Denver, 27-24. Steve Largent catches 12 passes for 191 yards and one score. **12/2** Seahawks clinch playoff berth with a 38-17 win over Detroit as Dave Krieg throws a team record five touchdowns passes. **12/22** Seattle eliminates the defending Super Bowl Champion Los Angeles Raiders, 13-7, from the playoffs in the AFC Wild Card Game at the Kingdome. Seahawks rush for 205 yards and force three turnovers, along with registering six sacks, in the victory. **12/29** Miami defeats the Seahawks, 31-10, in an AFC Divisional playoff game at the Orange Bowl.

1985 — 6/18 Seahawks and Northwest College agree to a long-term lease for a new practice and office complex for the club in Kirkland. The facility will be built on 9.9 acres adjacent to Northwest College. A 36,000-square foot building will house the club's administrative offices, locker room and training facilities. **7/20** Seahawks open their tenth training camp at Eastern Washington University in Cheney. **9/8** Curt Warner returns to the Seattle lineup after missing all but the 1984 opener as the Seahawks defeat Cincinnati, 28-24, at Riverfront Stadium. Warner gains 66 yards on 17 carries and scores the game-winning touchdown on an 11-yard run with 7:07 remaining. **9/15** Daryl Turner sets a club record with four touchdown catches and Dave Krieg throws five touchdown passes in Seattle's 49-35 victory over the San Diego Chargers at Jack Murphy Stadium. **10/13** Dave Krieg passes for 405 yards and four touchdowns, including a 12-yarder to Paul Skansi for the winning touchdown with 35 seconds remaining. KINGDOME

The Kingdome, at a cost of \$67 million and with a seating capacity of 64,984 for football, is the least expensive domed, air-conditioned stadium of its size in the world.

Built on a 35.9-acre site just south of Seattle's central business district, the walls of the Dome anchor the world's largest self-supporting concrete roof.

The project was completed by Peter Kiewit Sons' Construction Co. and was originally a bond issue passed by a 62 percent majority of the voters of King County and spearheaded by former King County Executive John Spellman. Construction began on November 2, 1972.

The first professional football game in the Kingdome, August 1, 1976, between the Seahawks and San Francisco 49ers drew 60,825 fans. Since that time, the Seahawks have soldout 77 of their last 78 games, including preseason and postseason games, dating from 1978 to 1985. The Seahawks have finished in the top nine among all NFL clubs in attendance each of their first ten seasons. The Kingdome is also the home of the American League Seattle Mariners. Among other events held in the Kingdome have been the Auto Show, Big Seattle Boat Show, rock concerts, the 1984 NCAA Final Four basketball tournament, and the Billy Graham Crusade. The Billy Graham Crusade on May 14, 1976, which attracted 74,000 people, still ranks as the single event attendance leader in the Kingdome.

Cars arriving from the north on I-5, take Airport Way exit (#164). Turn left onto I-90 Truck Route and follow Royal Brougham Way to south parking lot entrance. When arriving from the south, take the Spokane Street exit (#163) and proceed to 4th Avenue South. Turn right heading north to Royal Brougham Way. Turn left and proceed to south lot. If the north lot is your destination, follow 4th Avenue north to Jackson. Go left on Jackson to 2nd Avenue. Left on 2nd which will lead to the North Lot entrance.



SEAHAWKS HEADQUARTERS

The Seattle Seahawks will begin their second decade in the National Football League in new surroundings as they move into their recently completed headquarters situated on a 12-acre site adjacent to Northwest College in Kirkland.

The 36,000 square foot two-story building will be the Seahawks year-round home, containing facilities for training camp as well as offseason and regular season practices.

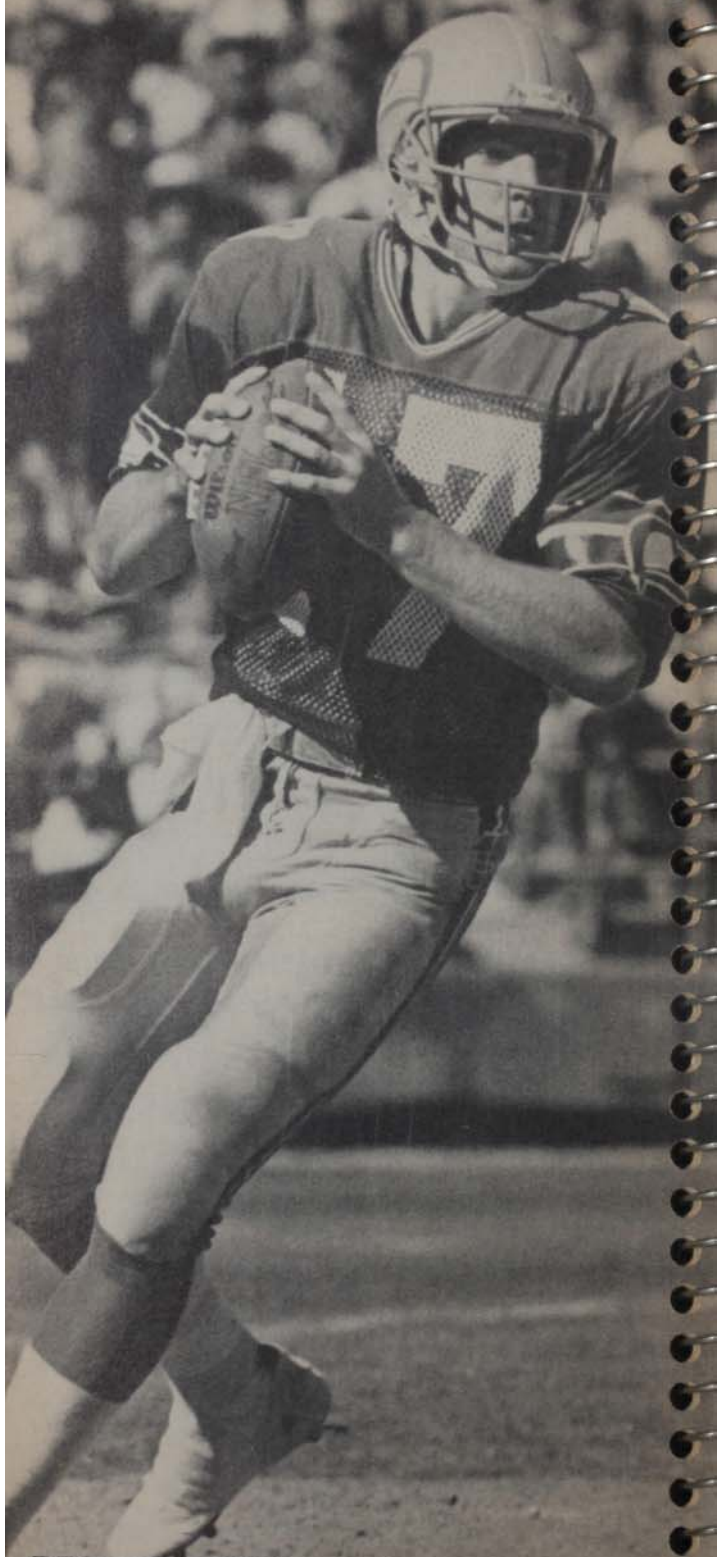
Downstairs contains a 105-man meeting room, six 10-man meeting rooms, a 1,700 square foot weight room, two racquetball courts, an enlarged locker room, training room, with rehabilitative facilities, and equipment room.

Upstairs will house the administrative offices, coaches offices, ticket office, and conference rooms.

Outside, the Seahawks will be able to practice on three fields, two of natural grass and one artificial turf field. That field will be covered by a 55-foot high inflatable bubble top eliminating travel to the stadium in inclement weather.

To reach the headquarters, take the N.E. 70th Street exit off I-405 travelling either north or southbound. If arriving southbound, take a left at N.E. 72nd Place and another left at 108th Avenue N.E. Go left at N.E. 53rd Street. The headquarters is approximately one-quarter mile up N.E. 53rd Street.

From Northbound, go left at the exit stop sign and left at N.E. 72nd Place, crossing back over I-405. Take a left at 108th Avenue N.E. and left at N.E. 53rd Street.

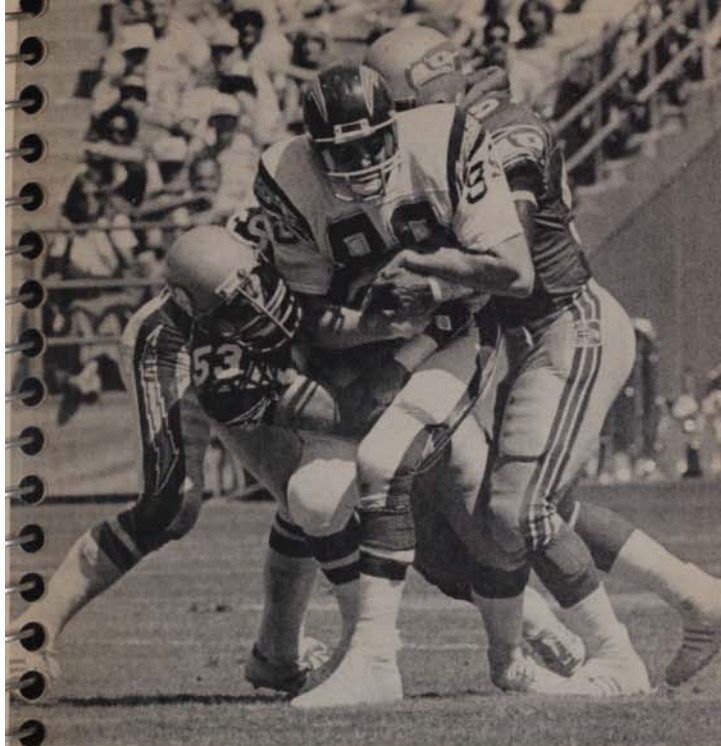

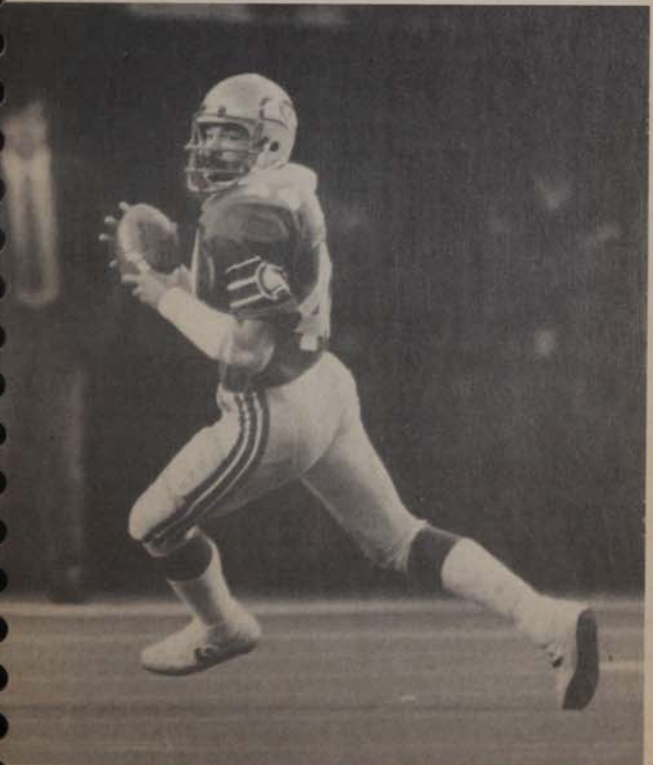
