


MIKE McCORMACK

President/General Manager



Seahawks: Mike McCormack was elevated to the position of President and General Manager of the Seattle Seahawks on January 3, 1983, after serving as the club's interim head coach for the final seven games of the 1982 season. The Seahawks won four of their last seven games under McCormack, who took over the head coaching duties on October 13 from Jack Patera. He originally joined the Seattle staff in March, 1982, as Director of Football Operations.

NFL Experience: Prior to joining the Seahawks, McCormack served as head coach of the Baltimore Colts in 1980 and 1981. He was also head coach of the Philadelphia Eagles from 1973 through 1975 and spent 11 years as an NFL assistant coach with the Washington Redskins (1966-72) and Cincinnati Bengals (1976-79).

Hall of Fame: McCormack will be one of four former players inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame this July 28th, in Canton, Ohio. McCormack will be honored along with Arnie Weinmeister, Willie Brown, and Charley Taylor.

Pro Playing Experience: He was a number one draft choice by the NFL's New York Yanks in 1951 and then spent the 1952 and 1953 seasons in military service. In 1954, he was involved in a 15-player trade that sent him to the Cleveland Browns. During his nine seasons (1954-1962) with the Browns, the standout offensive tackle played in six Pro Bowls and three NFL championship games, winning two. Following his retirement, he was in the insurance business for three years before entering the coaching field.

College: He is a member of the University of Kansas' all-time team selected in 1976 by the Lawrence Journal-World. He served as a team co-captain in 1950 and concluded his collegiate career by participating in the East-West Shrine Game and College All-Star Game following his senior season. He was an All-Big Seven Conference selection in 1950.

High School: A graduate of DeLaSalle High in Kansas City, Missouri, McCormack participated in football and basketball as a prep.

Personal: He married the former Ann Helsby on January 28, 1956, in Kansas City. The McCormacks have four children, Michael, 25, currently enrolled in Georgetown University's Law School; Tim, 24, a student at the University of Cincinnati; Molly, 22, married and living in Cincinnati; and Colleen, 20, a student at the University of Cincinnati. Mike and Ann McCormack reside in Bellevue. He was born June 21, 1930, in Chicago.

CHUCK ALLEN Assistant General Manager



Chuck Allen is in his tenth year as a member of the Seattle Seahawks staff. He joined the organization in June of 1975 as Director of Pro Scouting and was named Assistant General Manager in March of 1983. A former all-coast and all-conference player at the University of Washington, Allen was an assistant coach with the Huskies (1973-74) prior to taking his current position. Allen played nine seasons with the San Diego Chargers and was named to the All-

American Football League team in 1961 as a rookie. He was a second team choice in 1964. During his playing career, Allen served as the Chargers' defensive captain. He spent 1970, 1971 and part of the 1972 season with the Pittsburgh Steelers and finished his career in 1972 with the Philadelphia Eagles. He was selected to the All-Time All-Northwest team in 1976 and was inducted into the Washington State Sports Hall of Fame for his play at the University of Washington and in professional football.

SCOUTING STAFF MIKE ALLMAN Player Personnel Director



Mike Allman begins his first year as Player Personnel Director after serving five years with the Washington Redskins in the same capacity. Allman joined the Seahawks staff on July 1, after spending 19 years with the Redskins, first as a scout, then as Director of College Scouting, and as Director of Player Personnel since 1978. A native of the Washington, D.C. area, he graduated with a B.A. degree in Economics from Mt. St. Mary's College in Emmitsburg, Maryland. He

also played baseball, lettering three years as an outfielder and twice was an all-conference selection. He attended St. Francis Xavier and Gonzaga High Schools and taught junior high social studies from 1962 through 1965 before joining the Redskins. Mike and his wife, Ann, have four children: Maureen Mary, Theresa Ann, Michael Francis, and Patrick James.

RALPH GOLDSTON Staff Scout



Ralph Goldston, in his tenth year as a staff scout, came to the Seahawks from the Chicago Bears, where he had been offensive backfield coach. Goldston played college football at Indiana and Youngstown State and then was drafted by the Philadelphia Eagles in 1952. He played four years with the Eagles and then nine seasons with Hamilton in the Canadian Football League. He closed out his career with Montreal of the CFL in 1965. Goldston served as

defensive coach for Montreal from 1966 through 1969 and then scouted for the Giants. He then coached at Harvard (1971-72) and Colorado (1973) before going to the Bears.



WARREN HARPER Staff Scout



Warren Harper enters into his second year with the Seahawks as a staff scout. Prior to joining the Seahawks, he spent 15 seasons as linebacker and administrative assistant coach at the University of Oklahoma. In his tenure in Norman, the Sooners posted a 137-34-2 record, won one national championship, seven Big 8 titles, and went to 12 bowl games. Harper was a highly-successful high school coach in Texas, before going to Oklahoma, compiling a 31-8-2 record

in two stints, first in Sherman, Texas, and then at Amarillo, Texas. In between he spent three seasons at the University of Texas at El Paso, the first year as the Miners' offensive backfield coach, and the next two seasons as head coach.

DOUG KRETZ Staff Scout




Doug Kretz joined the Seattle Seahawks scouting staff in June of 1981 after working two years on a part-time basis in the scouting department. A Seattle Pacific University graduate, Kretz lettered in soccer as a collegian and earned his degree in Physical Education. He has coached on both the high school and junior high level. He broke into coaching at Redmond Junior High in Redmond, Wash. The next four years were spent as an assistant football coach and soccer

coach at Newport High in Bellevue, Wash. A native of Seattle, Kretz attended Mercer Island High School, where he played football and baseball.

OVERTIME -

The Seahawks have played two overtime games in their history, in 1978 versus Denver and in 1983 against Kansas City, both in the Kingdome. Jim Turner's 18-yard field goal with 2:01 remaining beat Seattle 20-17 on October 29, 1978 in the Seahawks first-ever overtime game. Seattle won their second overtime contest 51-48 last season as Norm Johnson hit a 42-yard field goal with 0:02 left in regulation to tie it, and then hit another 42-yarder with 1:46 gone in the extra session for the win. The 99 points by both teams constituted the third highest scoring game in NFL history.



CHUCK KNOX Head Coach



Seahawks: Chuck Knox enters into his second season as head coach of the Seathle Seahawks. He joined the Seahawks on January 26, 1983, after five seasons as vice president and head coach of the Buffalo Bills. Knox led the Seahawks to the first playoff appearance in the team's history in 1983, as Seattle advanced to the AFC Championship game. He was named NFL Coach of the Year by the Seattle Gold Helmet Committee and the Vince Lombardi Commit-

tee and AFC Coach of the Year by UPI, Football News and the Kansas City 101 Club.

Head Coaching Experience: Knox has 11 years of head coaching experience with a 100-58-1 regular season won-loss record. His winning percentage of .634 ranks third among active head coaches behind only Don Shula (.712) and Tom Landry (.640). He became only the 15th coach in NFL history to win 100 regular season games in his career. He has been named NFL Coach of the Year three times. in 1973 with the Los Angeles Rams and in 1980 with the Buffalo Bills along with the Seahawks in 1983. With Los Angeles from 1973 through 1977, his teams won five division championships and compiled a 54-15-1 record. He moved to Buffalo in 1978 and inherited a team that had won just two games in 1976 and three games in 1977. He equalled that total in his first year with a 5-11 mark, and improved that to 7-9 the following season. In 1980, the Bills captured their first division title since 1966 with an 11-5 record. The Bills finished 10-6 in 1981 and advanced to the playoffs, while in 1982 they were 4-5. In all, Knox-coached teams have won six division championships and made the playoffs eight times in his 11 years as a head coach. He is the only coach in NFL history to take three different teams into the playoffs.

Assistant Coaching Experience: Prior to being named head coach of the Rams in 1973, Knox worked as an NFL assistant coach for 10 seasons. He joined the New York Jets in 1963 as offensive line coach and then moved to Detroit as offensive line coach in 1967. He broke into coaching as an assistant at Juniata College, his alma mater, in 1954, and then coached one year at Tyrone High in Tyrone, Pa., before being named head coach at Ellwood City High in Ellwood City, Pa., in 1956. He remained there until joining the Wake Forest University staff for the 1959 and 1960 seasons and then moved to Kentucky for the 1961 and 1962 seasons.

College: Graduated with a bachelor of arts degree in history from Juniata College in Huntingdon, Pa., where he lettered four years as a tackle and served as a team co-captain as a senior. He received the school's National Alumni Achievement Award in 1974, is currently on the college's Board of Directors and was given an honorary doctorate degree in 1983.

High School: Attended Sewickley High in Sewickley, Pa.

Personal: He is married to the former Shirley Rhine and they have four children; Chris, 30, operates a travel agency; Kathy, 28, a teacher; Colleen, 24, a health management director; and Chuck, 19, who will be a freshman running back this fall at the University of Arizona. He was born April 27, 1932, in Sewickley, Pa.

Chuck Knox can be heard on the radio twice weekly during the 1984 season. He will be a regular part of KIRO Newsradio's Sportsline talk show hosted by Wayne Cody. Knox will be on for 15 minutes on Tuesday evening at 7:30 p.m. and for a half hour on Thursdays at 7:30 p.m.



TOM CATLIN Assistant Head Coach, Defensive Coordinator, Linebackers



Will be entering his 25th season as a professional coach and 12th year with Chuck Knox . . . joined the Seahawks after spending five seasons (1978-1982) with the Buffalo Bills . . . as Buffalo's defensive coordinator in that time, the Bills finished second among NFL teams on defense in 1982 and led the league in 1980 . . . prior to taking over as the team's defensive coordinator, Buffalo ranked 23rd in defense in 1977 . . . was named Buffalo's assistant head coach in 1980, along with

his defensive responsibilities . . . also served with Knox for five years in Los Angeles (1973-1977) . . . worked under George Allen and Tommy Prothro while with the Rams (1966-1972) . . . broke into coaching as an assistant for Hank Stram with the Dallas Texans of the American Football League in 1960 and moved to Kansas City with the club in 1963 . . . remained with the Chiefs until joining the Rams in 1966 . . . played five seasons in the NFL as a linebacker and center with the Cleveland Browns (1953-1954, 1957-1958) and Philadelphia Eagles (1959) ... his playing career was interrupted by military service . . . while in the Air Force (1955-1956), he got his first coaching experience directing the plebes at West Point . . . originally a fourth-round draft choice by Baltimore, he was traded to the Browns and became a starter midway through his rookie year . . . played in three NFL championship games and was a member of Cleveland's 1954 NFL Championship team . . . lettered three years (1950-1952) under Bud Wilkinson at Oklahoma and earned All-America honors as a junior and senior . . . attended Ponca City High in Ponca City, Oklahoma . . . he and his wife, Betty, have two children, Kim and Tom . . . born 9/8/31.

RAY PROCHASKA Offensive Coordinator, Offensive Line



Will be entering his 27th season as an NFL coach and 12th working with Chuck Knox...spent five seasons (1978-1982) as offensive coordinator and offensive line coach for Knox with the Buffalo Bills...in 1982, the Bills led the entire NFL in rushing offense...was with Knox in Los Angeles (1973-1977) and was the Rams' offensive coordinator his final year...was offensive coordinator at Cleveland (1971-1972) and for his final two years under George Allen in his first stop with

the Rams (1966-1970) ... he broke into coaching in the NFL with the Chicago Cardinals in 1958 and remained with the club, and their move to St. Louis, through the 1965 season ... prior to moving to the NFL, Prochaska coached the Edmonton Eskimos offensive line (1955-1957) ... he broke into coaching as an assistant at the University of Nebraska (1946-1954) ... he played at Nebraska and earned All-Big Six Conference honors as an end in his senior year, 1940, and participated in the Rose Bowl game against Stanford ... he also played in the College All-Star Game ... in 1941 he played one season for the Cleveland Rams before entering the U.S. Army for four-and-a-half years ... he reached the rank of Major at the time of his discharge ... Prochaska is pronounced with a silent "c" ... he and his wife, Jo Ann, have four children, Craig, Mark, Judy and Scott ... born 8/9/19.

GEORGE DYER Defensive Line Coach



Is beginning his third season in the NFL and second with the Seahawks this fall after working with the Buffalo Bills in 1982 . . . prior to moving to the NFL, he served as defensive coordinator at Arizona State (1980-81) . . . in 1980 the Sun Devils scored seven touchdowns on defense, and in 1981 ASU led the Pac-10 in rushing defense . . he coached the defensive line at Michigan State (1977-1979) after three seasons with the Winnipeg Blue Bombers (1974-1976) in the

Canadian Football League . . . he broke into coaching as an assistant at Humboldt State College (1964-1966) and was head coach at Coalinga Junior College in Coalinga, California, in 1967 . . . he moved to Portland State as defensive coordinator (1968-1971) and then coached at Idaho (1972) and San Jose State (1973) . . . Dyer played at the University of California at Santa Barbara as a center and linebacker . . he attended San Gabriel High in San Gabriel, California . . . he and his wife, Marjorie, have five children, two boys, George and Doak, and three daughters, Tammy, Darci and Marni . . . born 5/4/40.

CHICK HARRIS Offensive Backfield Coach



Will be in his fourth NFL season as an assistant coach and second with Seattle, after working with Chuck Knox in Buffalo (1981-1982) . . . joined the Bills after six seasons as secondary coach at the University of Washington under Don James . . . during his tenure with the Huskies, he coached in two Rose Bowl games and the Sun Bowl . . . Washington defeated Michigan, 27-20, following the 1977 season and lost to the Wolverines, 23-6, following the 1980 campaign in the Rose

Bowl... Washington beat Texas, 14-7, in the Sun Bowl after the 1979 season... prior to joining the Huskies, Harris was with the Detroit Wheels (1974) of the World Football League for a season... he broke into coaching at Colorado State (1970-1971) and then moved to Long Beach State (1972-1973) ... he lettered in football and track at Northern Arizona... Harris attended Long Beach Poly High in Long Beach, California... he and his wife, Cheryl, have two children, Tarana and Tyler... born 9/21/45.

Defensive Backfield Coach



Will be in his 16th season as an NFL assistant coach and fourth working with Chuck Knox... came to Seattle last year from the Buffalo Bills (1981-1982)... Buffalo's secondary in 1982 ranked second in the entire NFL against the pass... he served as defensive coordinator with the New York Giants (1979-1980) prior to moving to Buffalo... he broke into professional coaching with the Bills in 1969 and remained there through the 1971 season before joining George Allen's

staff with the Washington Redskins (1972-1977)...he then coached at Baltimore (1978) for one season...Hawkins lettered at Maryland as a quarterback, running back and defensive back in 1954, 1955, and 1956...he also participated in lacrosse while in college...he broke into coaching at Bishop O'Connell High in Arlington, Virginia, (1958) and served as a graduate assistant at Maryland (1959) for a season...in 1960 he played defensive back for the New York Titans of the American Football League and resumed his coaching career at Southern Methodist University the following season (1961)...he then coached at Kentucky (1962-1965) and his first year on the Wildcats' staff he was an assistant with Knox...Hawkins coached at West Point (1966), Maryland (1967) and the University of Cincinnati (1968) before moving into the NFL...he attended St. John's High in

Washington, D.C....he and his wife, Carol Ann, have three children, Mary Kathleen, Kristin Leigh, and Karianne...born 5/4/36.

KEN MEYER Quarterback Coach



Will be entering his 15th season as a coach in the National Football League and sixth with Chuck Knox... begins his second season with the Seahawks after spending 1981 and 1982 as offensive coordinator at Tulane University... before joining the Tulane staff, he was offensive coordinator for the Chicago Bears under Neill Armstrong (1978-80)... he served as head coach of the San Francisco 49ers in 1977 and won five of the club's final nine games after an 0-5

CHRONOLOGY

June 15, 1972 Seattle Professional Football, a group of business and community leaders, announce their intention to attempt to secure a National Football League franchise for the City of Seattle. Herman Sarkowsky serves as spokesman for the group.

November 2, 1972 Construction begins on The Kingdome.

June 4, 1974 The National Football League announces that Seattle will have a franchise for the 1976 season.

December 5, 1974 The National Football League announces that it has voted membership to Seattle Professional Football, Inc., headed by Lloyd W. Nordstrom with partners Herman Sarkowsky, D.E. "Ned" Skinner, Howard S. Wright, M. Lamont Bean, and Lynn P. Himmelman.

March 6, 1975 John Thompson, Executive Director of the NFL Management Council, named General Manager of the Seattle franchise.

June 17, 1975 Nickname "Seahawks" selected from 20,365 entries and 1,741 different names. One hundred fifty-one suggested "Seahawks."

December 18, 1975 Seahawks agree to a 20-year lease agreement to play all games in the Kingdome.

January 3, 1976 Jack Patera, assistant coach of the Minnesota Vikings, named head coach of the Seahawks.

January 20, 1976 Lloyd W. Nordstrom, spokesman for the Nordstrom family, the Seahawks' majority owner, dies of a heart attack while vacationing in Mexico.

March 30, 1976 Veteran allocation held in New York City. Seahawks select 39 NFL veterans.

April 8-9, 1976 College draft. Seahawks select 25 collegians in their first college draft. Notre Dame's Steve Niehaus is the first choice and he flies to Seattle for evening news conference on April 8.

July 9, 1976 Seahawks open training camp at Eastern Washington

July 9, 1976 Seahawks open training camp at Eastern Washingto University in Cheney.

August 1, 1976 Seahawks play first game before 60,825 fans in the Kingdome. San Francisco holds on to defeat Seattle, 27-20, as Jim Zorn is tackled on the two-yard line when the gun sounds.

August 29, 1976 Seahawks capture first victory, a 17-16 win over San Diego, as Ron Howard catches a three-yard Jim Zorn pass for the winning touchdown with only 13 seconds remaining.

September 12, 1976 Seattle opens regular season play with a near miss against St. Louis, 30-24. The game ends with the Cardinals intercepting a pass in the end zone.

October 17, 1976 Seahawks win Expansion Bowl with 13-10 victory over host Tampa Bay. Linebacker Mike Curtis blocks a Tampa Bay field goal attempt with 42 seconds remaining to preserve the victory.

November 7, 1976 Seahawks capture their first regular season victory at home with a 30-13 win over Atlanta. Sherman Smith becomes the first Seattle back to rush for over 100 yards with 124 yards on 14 carries.

January 17, 1977 Seahawks host the Pro Bowl and it is the first sellout in the 27-year history of the Pro Bowl and is the largest crowd under the AFC vs. NFC format. AFC scored a 24-14 win before 63.214 fans.

May 3, 1977 Seattle trades its first-round draft choice, the second player in the draft, to Dallas for the Cowboys' first-round selection and three second-round picks. The Seahawks select Steve August, offensive guard from Tulsa, on the first round.

CHRONOLOGY

October 30, 1977 After missing four games with an injury, Jim Zorn returns to lead Seattle in its biggest victory ever — a 56-17 triumph over Buffalo. The Seahawks set 15 club records and equal six, including Zorn's four TD passes.

December 18, 1977 Seahawks win their fifth game of the year, a 20-19 decision over Cleveland before 61,583 fans in the Kingdome, to establish a record for most wins ever by a second-year expansion team.

May 3, 1978 Keith Simpson, cornerback from Memphis State, is selected as Seattle's first-round draft choice followed by his college teammate Keith Butler, a linebacker, on the second round.

October 8, 1978 Efren Herrera kicks a 19-yard field goal on the final play of the game to give Seattle a 29-28 win over Minnesota before 62,031 fans.

November 26, 1978 Seattle becomes the first team since 1965 to beat Oakland twice during the regular season with a 17-16 win on Efren Herrera's 46-yard field goal with just three seconds remaining.

December 17, 1978 Seahawks end third season with a 9-7 record and finish one game behind Denver in the AFC West standings following 23-19 win over Kansas City. Al Hunter rushes for 133 yards on 27 carries as Seahawks perform before sixth straight home sellout crowd.

January 29, 1979 Steve Largent catches a record-equalling five passes as Seattle's first representative to the Pro Bowl. National Football Conference defeats Largent and his AFC teammates, 13-7, in the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum.

May 3, 1979 Manu Tuiasosopo, defensive tackle from UCLA, becomes Seattle's first-round draft choice.

October 29, 1979 After trailing 14-0, the Seahawks rebound for a 31-28 win over Atlanta in Seattle's first appearance on ABC's Monday Night Football. Dan Doornink rushes for 122 yards on 21 carries and scores twice.

December 16, 1979 The Seahawks close out their second straight 9-7 season with a 29-24 win over Oakland. Sam McCullum sets a club record with 173 yards receiving on eight catches.

April 29, 1980 Seattle trades its first-round draft choice and a third-round pick to Buffalo for the Bills' first-round choice, the tenth player in the draft. The Seahawks then select defensive end Jacob Green of Texas A&M on the first round.

September 28, 1980 Seahawks score second shutout in the club's history with a 14-0 win over Washington Redskins in Robert F. Kennedy Stadium.

October 5, 1980 Sam McCullum catches two touchdown passes and Efren Herrera kicks four field goals in 26-7 win over Houston at the Astrodome.

April 28, 1981 Seahawks select UCLA safety Kenny Easley on the first round of the NFL draft.

November 8, 1981 Seattle holds the Pittsburgh Steelers scoreless in the second half and rallies for a pair of fourth quarter touchdowns to capture a 24-21 victory at the Kingdome.

November 16, 1981 The Seahawks score on their last eight possessions to defeat the San Diego Chargers, 44-23, on Monday Night Football. It is the Seahawks' first regular season victory over the Chargers after eight straight losses.

CHRONOLOGY

March 11, 1982 Mike McCormack, former head coach with the Philadelphia Eagles and Baltimore Colts, is named Director of Football Operations.

April 27, 1982 Seahawks select Clemson defensive end Jeff Bryant in the first round of the college draft.

September 21, 1982 Players go on strike for 57 days.

October 13, 1982 Mike McCormack named interim head coach after the firing of head coach Jack Patera and General Manager John Thompson.

November 21, 1982 Seahawks capture 17-10 victory over the host Denver Broncos in Mike McCormack's first game as head coach following the players' strike. Steve Largent catches a 34-yard touchdown pass from Jim Zorn with 49 seconds left for the victory.

November 28, 1982 Seahawks shut out the Pittsburgh Steelers, 16-0, for the club's third shutout in history and first at the Kingdome.

January 2, 1983 Seahawks conclude nine-game season with a 13-11 win over the Denver Broncos as Dave Krieg throws a 19-yard touchdown pass to Roger Carr with just 47 seconds left. The Seahawks drive 87 yards in 10 plays with no timeouts to score the winning touchdown. Seattle finishes the season 4-5 but were 4-3 under Mike McCormack.

January 3, 1983 Mike McCormack named President and General Manager of the Seattle Seahawks after previously serving as Director of Football Operations, since March 11, 1982, and interim head coach since October 13, 1982.

January 26, 1983 Chuck Knox named head coach of the Seahawks. Knox previously had served as head coach of the Los Angeles Rams (1973-77) and the Buffalo Bills (1978-82). He guided seven of his ten teams to the playoffs, while winning six division championships.

March 15, 1983 Chuck Allen, who joined the Seahawks staff in June of 1975 as Director of Pro Scouting, named Assistant General Manager.

April 26, 1983 Seattle selects Penn State running back Curt Warner in the NFL draft. Warner is the third player taken on the first round. To be able to get Warner, the Seahawks trade their first, second and third round selections to the Houston Oilers for the Oilers first round pick.

September 11, 1983 Seahawks win first game under Chuck Knox, 17-10, over the New York Jets as the club sets a team record with 57 rushing attempts and Curt Warner gains 128 yards on 24 carries.

October 16, 1983 Seahawks force eight turnovers and register eight sacks in 38-36 victory over the Los Angeles Raiders.

October 30, 1983 Seahawks make it two straight over Raiders with 34-21 win.

December 18, 1983 Seahawks clinch first playoff berth with 24-6 win over New England.

December 24, 1983 Dave Krieg throws three touchdown passes and Curt Warner rushes for 99 yards in 31-7 win over Denver in the AFC Wild Card Game before 60,752 fans in Kingdome.

December 31, 1983 Seahawks drive 66 yards in five plays late in the fourth quarter to capture playoff win over Miami, 27-20, before 71,032 fans at the Orange Bowl.

January 8, 1984 Los Angeles Raiders defeat the Seahawks, 30-14, in the AFC Championship Game at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum before 88,734 fans.

May 1, 1984 Seahawks select cornerback Terry Taylor of Southern Illinois as their first round choice in the annual NFL draft.

KINGDOME

The Kingdome, at a cost of \$67 million and with a seating capacity of 64,984 for football, is the least expensive domed, air-conditioned stadium of its size in the world.

Built on a 35.9-acre site just south of Seattle's central business district, the walls of the Dome anchor the world's largest selfsupporting concrete roof.

The project was completed by Peter Kiewit Sons' Construction Co. and was originally a bond issue passed by a 62 percent majority of the voters of King County and spearheaded by County Executive John Spellman, now state Governor. Construction began on November 2, 1972.

The first professional football game in the Kingdome, August 1, 1976, between the Seahawks and San Francisco 49ers drew 60.825 fans. Since that time, the Seahawks have played before 55 regularseason sellout crowds, and had a string of 47 consecutive sellouts, including preseason games, dating from 1978 to 1982. The Seahawks have finished in the top nine among all NFL clubs in attendance each of their first eight seasons. The Kingdome is also the home of the American League Seattle Mariners and National Basketball Association Seattle SuperSonics. Among other events held in the Kingdome have been the Auto Show, Seattle Boat Show, rock concerts, the 1984 NCAA Final Four basketball tournament, and the Billy Graham Crusade. The Billy Graham Crusade on May 14, 1976, which attracted 74,000 people, still ranks as the single event attendance leader in the Kingdome.
