MIKE McCORMACK

President/General Manager



Seahawks: Mike McCormack was elevated to the position of President and General Manager of the Seattle Seahawks on January 3, 1983, after serving as the club's interim head coach for the final seven games of the 1982 season. The Seahawks won four of their last seven games under McCormack, who took over the head coaching duties on October 13 from Jack Patera. He originally joined the Seattle staff in March, 1982, as Director of Football Operations.

NFL Experience: Prior to joining the Seahawks, McCormack served as head coach of the Baltimore Colts in 1980 and 1981. He was also head coach of the Philadelphia Eagles from 1973 through 1975 and spent 11 years as an NFL assistant coach with the Washington Redskins (1966-72) and Cincinnati Bengals (1976-79).

Hall of Fame: McCormack was one of four players inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio, on July 28, 1984. McCormack was honored along with Arnie Weinmeister, Willie Brown, and Charley Taylor.

Pro Playing Experience: He was a number one draft choice by the NFL's New York Yanks in 1951 and then spent the 1952 and 1953 seasons in military service. In 1954, he was involved in a 15-player trade that sent him to the Cleveland Browns. During his nine seasons (1954-1962) with the Browns, the standout offensive tackle played in six Pro Bowls and three NFL championship games, winning two. Following his retirement, he was in the insurance business for three years before entering the coaching field.

College: He is a member of the University of Kansas' all-time team selected in 1976 by the *Lawrence Journal-World*. He served as a team co-captain in 1950 and concluded his collegiate career by participating in the East-West Shrine Game and College All-Star Game following his senior season. He was an All-Big Seven Conference selection in 1950.

Personal: He married the former Ann Helsby on January 28, 1956, in Kansas City. The McCormacks have four children, Michael, married and an attorney in Seattle; Tim, who has a master's degree; Molly, married and living in Cincinnati; Colleen, married and living in Seattle; and four grandchildren, Ryan, Joshua, Evan, and Graham. Mike and Ann McCormack reside in Bellevue. He was born June 21, 1930, in Chicago.



CHUCK ALLEN

Vice President/Assistant General Manager



Chuck Allen is in his fourteenth year as a member of the Seattle Seahawks staff. He joined the organization in June of 1975 as Director of Pro Scouting, was named Assistant General Manager in March of 1983 and added the title of Vice President on June 10, 1987. A former all-coast and all-conference player at the University of Washington, Allen was an assistant coach with the Huskies (1973-74) prior to joining the Seahawks. Allen played nine seasons with the San

Diego Chargers and was named to the All-American Football League team in 1961 as a rookie. He was a second-team choice in 1964. During his playing career, Allen served as the Chargers' defensive captain and was inducted into the Chargers' Hall of Fame in 1984. He spent 1970, 1971 and part of the 1972 season with the Pittsburgh Steelers and finished his career in 1972 with the Philadelphia Eagles. He was selected to the All-Time All-Northwest team in 1976 and was inducted into the Washington State Sports Hall of Fame for his play at the University of Washington and in professional football. Chuck, and his wife, Linda, have five children, Cathy, Julie, Cheryl, Jean, and Patrick.

MIKE ALLMAN

Player Personnel Director



Mike Allman enters into his fifth year as Player Personnel Director with the Seahawks after serving six years with the Washington Redskins in the same capacity. Allman joined the Seahawks staff on July 1, 1984, after spending 19 years with the Redskins, first as a scout, then as Director of College Scouting, and as Director of Player Personnel since 1978. A native of the Washington D.C. area, he graduated with a B.A. degree in Economics from Mt. St. Mary's College in

Emmitsburg, Maryland. He also played baseball, lettering three years as an outfielder and twice was an all-conference selection. He attended St. Francis Xavier and Gonzaga High Schools and taught junior high social studies from 1962 through 1965 before joining the Redskins. Mike and his wife, Ann, have four children: Maureen Mary, Therasa Ann, Michael Francis, and Patrick James. Michael is a wide receiver at the University of Washington and Patrick is a quarterback at Brown.

Rick Thompson was promoted to Assistant Player Personnel Director in July of 1984. In addition to his player personnel duties, Thompson has served as the Seahawks' training camp director since 1978. An original member of the Seattle staff, Thompson joined the Seahawks in 1975 as an assistant in the player personnel department. He is a graduate of Hamline University in St. Paul, Minnesota, where he earned a degree in Sports Administration. As an undergraduate, he

worked for the Minnesota Vikings for five years. Thompson is a graduate of Lincoln High School in Minneapolis, Minnesota. He and his wife, Kathy, have a daughter, Casie.

RALPH GOLDSTON

Staff Scout



Ralph Goldston, in his fourteenth year as a staff scout, came to the Seahawks from the Chicago Bears in 1975, where he had been offensive backfield coach. Goldston played college football at Indiana and Youngstown State and then was drafted by the Philadelphia Eagles in 1952. He played four years with the Eagles and then nine seasons with Hamilton in the Canadian Football League. He closed out his career with Montreal of the CFL in 1965. Goldston served as

defensive coach for Montreal from 1966 through 1969 and then scouted for the Giants. He coached at Harvard (1971-72) and Colorado (1973) before going to the Bears. Ralph and his wife, Sarah, have four children, Monique, Ralph, Jr., Ursula, and Beverly.

WARREN HARPER

Staff Scout



Warren Harper enters into his sixth year with the Seahawks as a staff scout. He brought 28 years of high school and college coaching experience to Seattle, including 15 seasons as linebacker coach and administrative assistant coach at the University of Oklahoma. Harper was a highly-successful high school coach in Texas before going to Oklahoma, compiling a 31-8-2 record in two stints, first in Sherman, Texas, and then at Amarillo, Texas. In between, he

spent three seasons at the University of Texas-El Paso, the first as an assistant to O.A. "Bum" Phillips and the last two as head coach. Warren and his wife, Gene, have two children, Robert and Patricia.

DOUG KRETZ

Staff Scout



Kretz attended Mercer Island High School, where he played football and baseball. Doug and his wife, Gerri, were married in December 1987.

Doug Kretz joined the Seattle Seahawks scouting staff in June of 1981 after working two years on a part-time basis in the scouting department. A Seattle Pacific University graduate, Kretz lettered in soccer as a collegian and earned his degree in Physical Education. He broke into coaching at Redmond Junior High in Redmond, Wash. backs and linebackers for two seasons (1984-85) with the Jacksonville Bulls of the United States Football League before joining the Seahawks. A graduate of the University of Maryland with a degree in Physical Education, Recreation and Health, Nusz played on three Terrapin teams that won 27-of-32 games, played in two Orange Bowls (1953 and 1955) and won the 1953 National Championship with a 10-1-0 record. The 1955 squad finished third in the nation also with a 10-1-0 mark. Dave and his wife, Bette, have a daughter, Kerry, and a son, Tommy. His last name is pronounced "News."

Dave Nusz enters into his third season as staff scout, having joined the Seahawks in July, 1986. He spent 28 years as a collegiate assistant coach at the University of Maryland (1956-57), William and Mary (1958-61), University of Detroit (1962-65), University of Texas-El Paso (1966-70), Mississippi State (1971-72), Memphis State (1973-74), Southern Methodist (1974-75), Vanderbilt (1976-78), and the University of Louisville (1979-83). Rick Reiprish enters into his fifth season as a staff scout with the Seahawks. Prior to joining Seattle, he spent two years with the Kansas City Chiefs scouting staff. Reiprish worked three years for the scouting combine, BLESTO, before joining the Chiefs. Prior to BLESTO, he was a college assistant coach for six seasons. He coached the receivers in 1973 and the running backs from 1974-76 at Austin Peay while finishing up work on his master's degree in admini-

stration. Reiprish moved to East Tennessee State in 1977 to handle the offensive backfield and quarterbacks, and then to North Alabama where he worked with the offensive line in 1978. Rick and his wife, Janet, have a son, Drew.

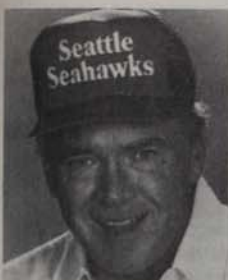

COACHING STAFF

CHUCK KNOX

Head Coach



Seahawks: Chuck Knox enters into his sixth year as head coach of the Seattle Seahawks. Knox was named head coach on January 26, 1983, after five seasons as vice president and head coach of the Buffalo Bills. Knox has led the Seahawks into the playoffs three times, in 1983, 1984, and 1987, the only such appearances in franchise history. The 12-4 record posted by the 1984 team is the most wins in team history, and the 10 wins registered by the 1986 squad are

the second-most. Knox's first Seahawks team won nine regular season games, made the playoffs, and advanced to the AFC Championship Game, losing to the eventual Super Bowl Champion Los Angeles Raiders. His 1984 team advanced into the division playoff round, losing to the eventual AFC Champion Miami Dolphins. His 1987 squad finished second in the AFC West and lost the AFC First Round Playoff Game at Houston. The winningest coach in Seahawks history (48-31-0), Knox earned NFL Coach of the Year honors after the 1983 season by the Seattle Gold Helmet Committee and the Vince Lombardi Committee and AFC Coach of the Year honors by UPI, Football News, and the Kansas City 101 Club. After the 1984 campaign, he received NFL Coach of the Year honors by the Gold Helmet Committee and AFC Coach of the Year honors from UPI and the Pro Football Writers' Association.

Head Coaching Experience: Knox has 15 years of head coaching experience with a 139-82-1 regular season won-loss record. His winning percentage of .628 trails only Miami's Don Shula (.712) among active coaches with at least 100 regular season wins and ranks seventh among coaches with at least 10 seasons of experience. His 139 regular season wins places him ninth all-time. In 1983, he became only the 15th coach in NFL history to win 100 regular season games. He has been named NFL Coach of the Year four times; in 1973 with the Los Angeles Rams and in 1980 with the Buffalo Bills, along with the Seahawks in 1983 and 1984. With Los Angeles from 1973 through 1977, his teams won five straight division championships and compiled a 54-15-1 record. Knox still ranks as the winningest coach in Rams' history. He moved to Buffalo in 1978 and inherited a team that had won just two games in 1976 and three games in 1977. He equalled that total in his first year with a 5-11 mark and improved that to 7-9 the following season. In 1980, the Bills captured their first division title since 1966 with an 11-5 record. Buffalo finished 10-6 in 1981 and advanced to the playoffs, while in 1982 they were 4-5. Knox is only the second coach in NFL history to win division titles his first five seasons as head coach (Paul Brown won titles his first six seasons, 1950-55, with Cleveland) and is one of only nine coaches in NFL history to have inherited a team with a losing record and take it to the playoffs his first season, something Knox has done twice, with the Rams in 1973 and the Seahawks in 1983. He is also the only coach in NFL history to take three different teams to the playoffs. In all, Knox-coached teams have won six

HARD KNOX

Hard Knox, the life story of Seahawks head coach Chuck Knox, will be published this fall by Harcourt Brace Jovanovich. Expected to be released in October, the 250-page book by Chuck Knox and Bill Plaschke will feature Knox's entire coaching career from high school through 15 seasons as an NFL head coach and the philosophy that has made him so successful.

division championships and made the playoffs ten times in his 15 years as a head coach.

Assistant Coaching Experience: Prior to being named head coach of the Rams in 1973, Knox worked as an NFL assistant coach for 10 seasons. He joined the New York Jets in 1963 as offensive line coach and then moved to Detroit as offensive line coach in 1967. He broke into coaching as an assistant at Juniata College, his alma mater, in 1954, and then coached one year at Tyrone High in Tyrone, Pa., before being named head coach at Ellwood City High in Ellwood City, Pa., in 1956. He remained there until joining the Wake Forest University staff for the 1959 and 1960 seasons and then moved to Kentucky for the 1961 and 1962 seasons.

College: Graduated with a bachelor of arts degree in history from Juniata College in Huntingdon, Pa., where he lettered four years as a tackle and served as a team co-captain as a senior. He received the school's National Alumni Achievement Award in 1974, is currently on the college's Board of Directors and was given an honorary doctorate degree in 1983.

High School: Attended Sewickley High in Sewickley, Pa.

Personal: He is married to the former Shirley Rhine and they have four children, Chris, who operates a travel agency; Kathy, a teacher; Colleen, a health management director; and Chuck, who is a student at the University of Arizona. He was born April 27, 1932, in Sewickley, Pa.

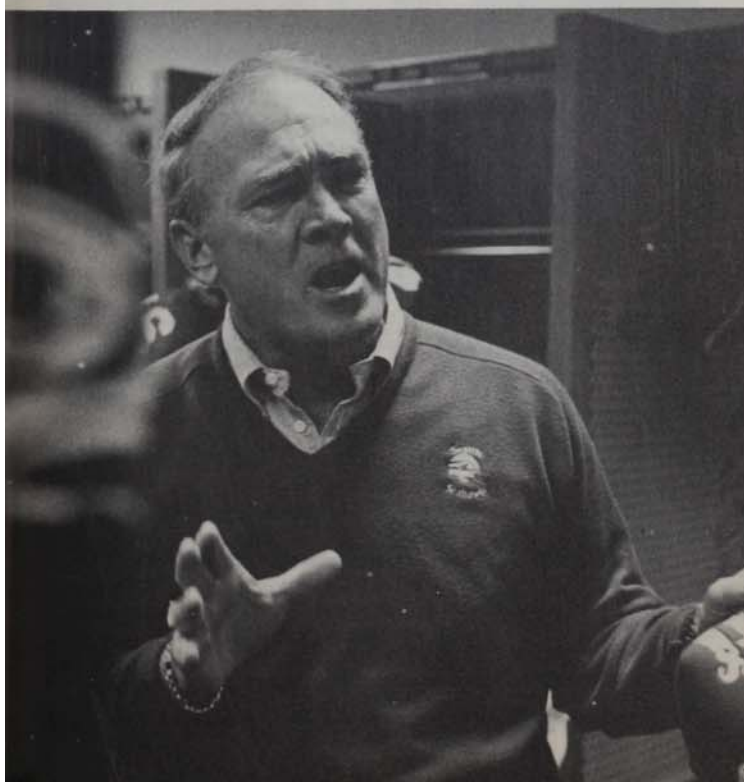

**Assistant Head Coach,
Defensive Coordinator, Linebackers**



Will be entering his 29th season as a professional coach, 16th year with Chuck Knox and sixth season with the Seahawks . . . In his five seasons in Seattle, the Seahawks lead the NFL in total take-aways (236) and in fumble recoveries (109) . . . In 1984 Seattle led the league with 63 takeaways, second-most in history . . . joined the Seahawks after spending five seasons (1978-1982) with the Buffalo Bills . . . as Buffalo's defensive coordinator in that time, the Bills finished second

Finished second in the AFC with 58 receptions for 912 yards and eight touchdowns. Ranked fifth in yards and tied for first in touchdowns. Broke his own team records for single-game receptions and yardage by catching 15 passes for 261 yards at Detroit. Both totals were NFL highs. Added three touchdowns and was named AFC Offensive Player of the Week. Became the NFL's all-time leading receiver at Kansas City on December 27 by catching six passes. Ended the year with 752 receptions, two more than Charlie Joiner's 750. Extended his consecutive game streak with at least one reception to 152 by catching at least two passes in every game. Is the league's all-time leading receiver with 752 and holds records with ten 50-catch seasons, eight 1,000-yard seasons, and has a 152 consecutive game streak with at least one reception. Totals 12,041 yards receiving and 95 touchdowns and needs 106 yards to pass Charlie Joiner's league record of 12,146 and five touchdowns to better Don Hutson's mark of 99. Green Bay's Hutson is the only player in NFL history to hold the

Has equalled Lionel Taylor's mark of six 70-catch seasons and co-holds the record with Lance Alworth of four consecutive 1,000-yard seasons. BUILDING THE FRANCHISE

CHRONOLOGY

- 1972 — 6/15** Seattle Professional Football, a group of business and community leaders, announce their intention to attempt to secure a National Football League franchise for the City of Seattle. Herman Sarkowsky serves as spokesman for the group. **11/2** Construction begins on The Kingdome.
- 1974 — 6/4** The National Football League announces that Seattle will have a franchise for the 1976 season. **12/5** The National Football League announces that it has voted membership to Seattle Professional Football, Inc., headed by Lloyd W. Nordstrom with partners Herman Sarkowsky, D.E. "Ned" Skinner, Howard S. Wright, M. Lamont Bean, and Lynn P. Himmelman.
- 1975 — 3/6** John Thompson, Executive Director of the NFL Management Council, named General Manager of the Seattle franchise. **6/17** Nickname "Seahawks" selected from 20,365 entries and 1,741 different names. One hundred fifty-one suggest "Seahawks." **12/18** Seahawks agree to a 20-year lease agreement to play all games in The Kingdome.
- 1976 — 1/3** Jack Patera, assistant coach of the Minnesota Vikings, named head coach of the Seahawks. **1/20** Lloyd W. Nordstrom, spokesman for the Nordstrom family, the Seahawks' majority owner, dies of a heart attack while vacationing in Mexico. **3/30** Veteran Allocation held in New York City. Seahawks select 39 NFL veterans. **4/8-9** College draft. Seahawks select 25 collegians in their first college draft. Notre Dame's Steve Niehaus is the first choice and he flies to Seattle for evening news conference on April 8. **7/9** Seahawks open training camp at Eastern Washington University in Cheney. **8/1** Seahawks play first game before 60,825 fans in the Kingdome. San Francisco holds on to defeat Seattle, 27-20, as Jim Zorn is tackled on the 49ers' two-yard line when the gun sounds. **8/29** Seahawks capture first victory, a 17-16 preseason win over San Diego, as Ron Howard catches a three-yard Jim Zorn pass for the winning touchdown with only 13 seconds remaining. **9/12** Seattle opens regular season play with a near miss against St. Louis, 30-24. The game ends with the Cardinals intercepting a pass in the end zone. **10/17** Seahawks win Expansion Bowl with 13-10 victory over host Tampa Bay. Linebacker Mike Curtis blocks a Tampa Bay field goal attempt with 42 seconds remaining to preserve the victory. **11/7** Seahawks capture their first regular season victory at home with a 30-13 win over Atlanta. Sherman Smith becomes the first Seattle back to rush for over 100 yards with 124 yards on 14 carries.
- 1977 — 1/17** Seahawks host the Pro Bowl and it is the first sellout in the 27-year history of the game and is the largest crowd under the AFC vs. NFC format. AFC scores a 24-14 win before 63,214 fans. **5/3** Seattle trades its first-round draft choice, the second player in the draft, to Dallas for the Cowboys' first-round selection and three second-round picks. The Seahawks select Steve August, offensive guard from Tulsa, on the first round. **10/30** After missing four games with an injury, Jim Zorn returns to lead Seattle in its biggest victory ever — a 56-17 triumph over Buffalo. The Seahawks set 15 club records and equal six, including Zorn's four TD passes. **11/13** Seattle defense blanks the New York Jets, 17-0, in Shea Stadium. It's the first time an established team is shutout by an expansion team in its second year. **12/18** Seahawks win their fifth game of the year, a 20-19 decision over Cleveland before 61,583 fans in the Kingdome, to establish a record for most wins ever by a second-year expansion team.
- 1978 — 5/3** Keith Simpson, cornerback from Memphis State, is selected as Seattle's first-round draft choice followed by his

college teammate Keith Butler, a linebacker, on the second round. **10/8** Efren Herrera kicks a 19-yard field goal on the final play of the game to give Seattle a 29-28 win over Minnesota before 62,031 fans. **11/26** Seattle becomes the first team since 1965 to beat Oakland twice during the regular season with a 17-16 win on Efren Herrera's 46-yard field goal with just three seconds remaining. **12/17** Seahawks end their third season with a 9-7 record and finish one game behind Denver in the AFC West standings following 23-19 win over Kansas City. Al Hunter rushes for 133 yards on 27 carries as Seahawks perform before sixth straight home sellout crowd.

1979 — 1/29 Steve Largent catches a record-equalling five passes as Seattle's first representative to the Pro Bowl. National Football Conference defeats Largent and his AFC teammates, 13-7, in the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum. **5/3** Manu Tuiasosopo, defensive tackle from UCLA, becomes Seattle's first-round draft choice. **10/29** After trailing 14-0, the Seahawks rebound for a 31-28 win over Atlanta in Seattle's first appearance on ABC's Monday Night Football. Dan Doornink rushes for 122 yards on 21 carries and scores twice. **12/16** The Seahawks close out their second straight 9-7 season with a 29-24 win over Oakland. Sam McCullum sets a club record with 173 yards receiving on eight catches.

1980 — 4/29 Seattle trades its first-round draft choice and a third-round pick to Buffalo for the Bills' first-round choice, the tenth player in the draft. The Seahawks then select defensive end Jacob Green of Texas A&M on the first round. **9/28** Seahawks score second shutout in the club's history with a 14-0 win over Washington Redskins in Robert F. Kennedy Stadium. **10/5** Sam McCullum catches two touchdown passes and Efren Herrera kicks four field goals in 26-7 win over Houston at the Astrodome.

1981 — 4/28 Seahawks select UCLA safety Kenny Easley on the first round of the NFL draft. **11/8** Seattle holds the Pittsburgh Steelers scoreless in the second half and rallies for a pair of fourth quarter touchdowns to capture a 24-21 victory at the Kingdome. **11/16** The Seahawks score on their last eight possessions to defeat the San Diego Chargers, 44-23, on Monday Night Football. It is the Seahawks' first regular season victory over the Chargers after eight straight losses.

1982 — 3/11 Mike McCormack, former head coach with the Philadelphia Eagles and Baltimore Colts, is named Director of Football Operations. **4/27** Seahawks select Clemson defensive end Jeff Bryant in the first round of the college draft. **9/21** Players go on strike for 57 days. **10/13** Mike McCormack named interim head coach after the firing of head coach Jack Patera and general manager John Thompson. **11/21** Seahawks capture 17-10 victory over the host Denver Broncos in Mike McCormack's first game as head coach following the players' strike. Steve Largent catches a 34-yard touchdown pass from Jim Zorn with 49 seconds left for the victory. **11/28** Seahawks shut out the Pittsburgh Steelers, 16-0, for the club's third shutout in history and first at the Kingdome.

1983 — 1/2 Seahawks conclude nine-game season with a 13-11 win over the Denver Broncos as Dave Krieg throws a 19-yard touchdown pass to Roger Carr with just 47 seconds left. The Seahawks drive 87 yards in 10 plays with no timeouts to score the winning touchdown. Seattle finishes the season 4-5 but were 4-3 under Mike McCormack. **1/3** Mike McCormack named President and General Manager of the Seattle Seahawks after previously serving as Director of Football Operations since March 11, 1982, and interim head coach since October 13, 1982. **1/26** Chuck Knox named head coach of the Seahawks. Knox previously had served as head coach of the Los Angeles Rams (1973-77) and the Buffalo Bills (1978-82). He guided seven of his ten teams to the playoffs, while winning six division

championships. **3/15** Chuck Allen, who joined the Seahawks staff in June of 1975 as Director of Pro Scouting, named Assistant General Manager. **4/26** Seattle selects Penn State running back Curt Warner in the NFL draft. Warner is the third player taken on the first round. To be able to get Warner, the Seahawks trade their first, second and third round selections to the Houston Oilers for the Oilers first round pick. **9/11** Seahawks win first game under Chuck Knox, 17-10, over the New York Jets, as the club sets a team record with 57 rushing attempts and Curt Warner gains 128 yards on 24 carries. **10/16** Seahawks force eight turnovers and register eight sacks in 38-36 victory over the Los Angeles Raiders. **10/30** Seahawks make it two straight over Raiders with 34-21 win. **12/18** Seahawks clinch first playoff berth with 24-6 win over New England. **12/24** Dave Krieg throws three touchdown passes and Curt Warner rushes for 99 yards in 31-7 win over Denver in the AFC Wild Card Game before 60,752 fans in Kingdome. **12/31** Seahawks drive 66 yards in five plays late in the fourth quarter to capture playoff win over Miami, 27-20, before 71,032 fans at the Orange Bowl.

1984 — **1/8** Los Angeles Raiders defeat the Seahawks, 30-14, in the AFC Championship Game at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum before 88,734 fans. **5/1** Seahawks select cornerback Terry Taylor of Southern Illinois as their first-round choice in the annual NFL draft. **9/3** Seahawks win regular season opener for the first time in franchise history, a 33-0 victory over Cleveland Browns. The enthusiasm is dampened by an injury to Curt Warner which will keep him out for the rest of the season. **10/29** Seahawks post their second shutout of the season with a 24-0 victory over the San Diego Chargers on Monday Night Football. Kenny Easley intercepts a club record three passes and Steve Largent catches three touchdown passes. **11/4** Seahawks set an NFL record by returning four interceptions for touchdowns, including two by Dave Brown, in a 45-0 win over the Kansas City Chiefs. Kenny Easley and Keith Simpson had the other two interception returns for touchdowns. **11/25** Dave Krieg throws for 406 yards and three touchdowns, including an 80-yarder to Daryl Turner on the first play of the game, to lead the Seahawks past Denver, 27-24. Steve Largent catches 12 passes for 191 yards and one score. **12/2** Seahawks clinch playoff berth with a 38-17 win over Detroit as Dave Krieg throws a team record five touchdown passes. **12/22** Seattle eliminates the defending Super Bowl Champion Los Angeles Raiders, 13-7, from the playoffs in the AFC Wild Card Game at the Kingdome. Seahawks rush for 205 yards and force three turnovers, along with registering six sacks, in the victory. **12/29** Miami defeats the Seahawks, 31-10, in an AFC Divisional Playoff Game at the Orange Bowl.

1985 — **6/18** Seahawks and Northwest College agree to a long-term lease for a new practice and office complex for the club in Kirkland. The facility will be built on 12 acres adjacent to Northwest College. A 36,000-square foot building will house the club's administrative offices, locker room and training facilities. **7/20** Seahawks open their tenth training camp at Eastern Washington University in Cheney. **9/8** Curt Warner returns to the Seattle lineup after missing all but the 1984 opener as the Seahawks defeat Cincinnati, 28-24, at Riverfront Stadium. Warner gains 66 yards on 17 carries and scores the game-winning touchdown on an 11-yard run with 7:07 remaining. **9/15** Daryl Turner sets a club record with four touchdown catches and Dave Krieg throws five touchdown passes in Seattle's 49-35 victory over the San Diego Chargers at Jack Murphy Stadium. **10/13** Dave Krieg passes for 405 yards and four touchdowns, including a 12-yarder to Paul Skansi for the winning touchdown with 35 seconds remaining, as Seahawks defeat Atlanta, 30-26. Krieg directs the Seahawks 86 yards in 16 plays on the winning

drive. **10/21** Ceremonial ground-breaking is held for team's new headquarters. **11/3** Terry Taylor returns an interception 75 yards for a touchdown and blocks a field goal attempt that is recovered by Byron Walker and returned 56 yards for a touchdown in Seattle's 33-3 win over the Los Angeles Raiders at the Kingdome.

1986 — 4/29 Seahawks select Florida fullback John L. Williams as their first round draft choice. Williams is the 15th player picked overall. **6/18** Seahawks move into new headquarters on a 12-acre site adjacent to Northwest College in Kirkland. **7/16** Seahawks open their 11th training camp but first at their new headquarters. **9/7** Seahawks kickoff their 1986 regular season schedule with a 30-0 victory over the Pittsburgh Steelers at the Kingdome. **10/6** Seahawks defeat San Diego Chargers, 33-7 on Monday Night Football as Steve Largent breaks NFL record for most consecutive games with a pass reception. Largent catches a pass in the 128th straight game in which he participated. **10/19** Jacob Green registers four sacks and Dave Brown intercepts two passes in leading Seattle to a 17-12 win over the eventual Super Bowl champion New York Giants. **11/27** Seahawks defeat the Dallas Cowboys, 31-14, on Thanksgiving Day as Curt Warner runs for 122 yards and Dave Krieg completes 16 of 24 passes for 214 yards and two touchdowns. **12/8** Seattle hands the Los Angeles Raiders their biggest defeat since 1962, 37-0, as Curt Warner gains 116 yards and Dave Krieg passes for 243 yards and two touchdowns. Seattle gains 407 yards in total offense, while the defense holds the Raiders to 138 yards. **12/20** Seahawks close out five-game winning streak and a 10-6 season by defeating eventual AFC Champion Denver, 41-16. The Seahawks gained a season high 536 yards, including a club record 298 yards rushing, led by Curt Warner's 192 yards and three touchdowns on 24 carries.

1987 — 4/28 Seahawks select Pittsburgh linebacker Tony Woods in the first round of the NFL draft. Woods is the 18th player picked. **6/12** Seahawks win lottery for first choice in supplemental draft and select Oklahoma linebacker Brian Bosworth. **9/13** After first two regular season games, NFL Players Association calls a strike that will last four weeks. Games for Sunday, September 18, are cancelled. **10/25** Seahawks defeat the Los Angeles Raiders, 35-13, in first game with regulars following the strike. Seattle builds up a 28-0 halftime lead and wins in Los Angeles for the first time since 1983. **12/13** Dave Krieg completes 23-of-33 passes for 238 yards and Ray Butler catches six passes for 107 yards and two touchdowns in leading Seattle past Denver, 28-21, at the Kingdome. **12/20** Seahawks defeat the Chicago Bears at Soldier Field as John L. Williams sparks the offense with a 75-yard touchdown on a screen pass from Dave Krieg and the defense contributes five takeaways. **1/3** Seahawks close out the 1987 season with a 23-20 overtime loss to the Houston Oilers at the Astrodome in the AFC First-Round Playoff Game.

KINGDOME

The Kingdome, at a cost of \$67 million and with a seating capacity of 64,981 for football, is the least expensive domed, air-conditioned stadium of its size in the world.

Built on a 35.9-acre site just south of Seattle's central business district, the walls of the Dome anchor the world's largest self-supporting concrete roof.

The project was completed by Peter Kiewit Sons' Construction Co. and was originally a bond issue passed by a 62 percent majority of the voters of King County and spearheaded by former King County Executive John Spellman. Construction began on November 2, 1972.

The first professional football game in the Kingdome, August 1, 1976, between the Seahawks and San Francisco 49ers drew 60,825 fans. Since that time, the Seahawks have soldout 95 of their last 98 games, including preseason and postseason games, dating from 1978 to 1987. The Seahawks have finished in the top nine among all NFL clubs in attendance each of their first twelve seasons. The Kingdome is also the home of the American League Seattle Mariners.

SEAHAWKS HEADQUARTERS

In June, 1986, the Seattle Seahawks moved into their new office and training headquarters on a 12-acre site adjacent to Northwest College in Kirkland.

The 36,000 square foot, two-story building is the Seahawks year-round home, containing facilities for training camp as well as offseason and regular season practices.

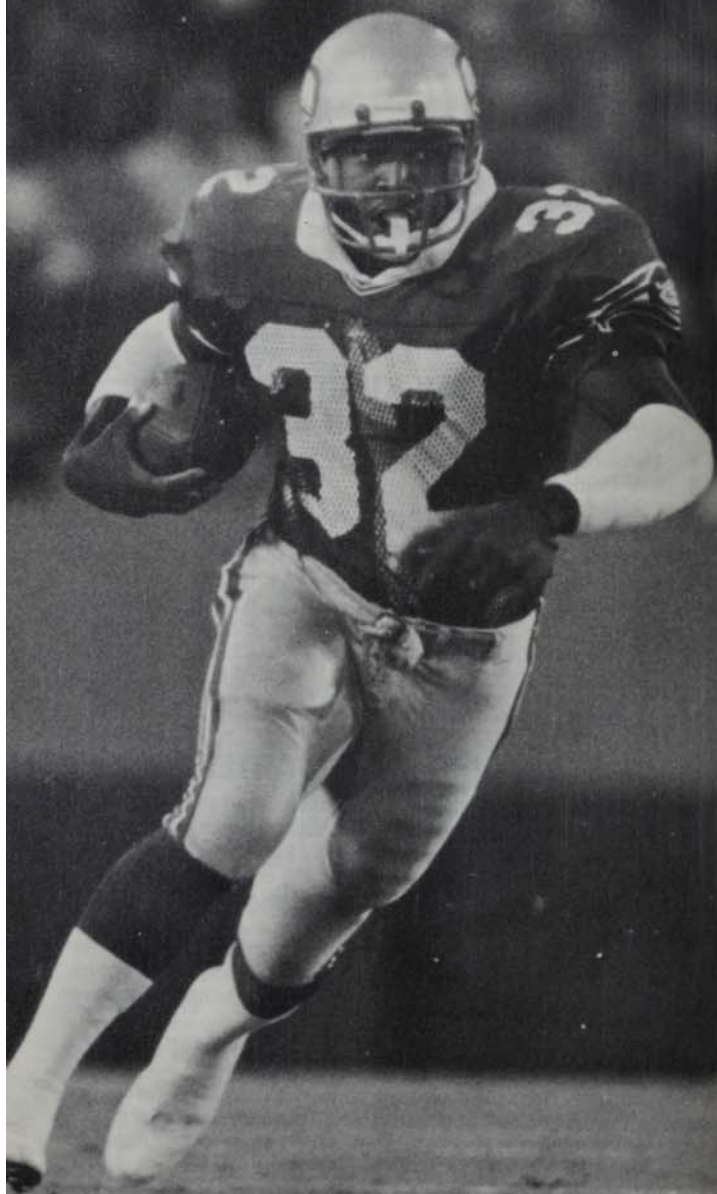
Downstairs contains a 105-man meeting room, six 10-man meeting rooms, a 1,700 square foot weight room, two racquetball courts, an enlarged locker room, training room with rehabilitative facilities, and equipment room.

Upstairs houses the administrative offices, coaches offices, ticket office, and conference rooms.

Outside, the Seahawks are able to practice on three fields, two of natural grass and one artificial turf field. The turf field is covered by a 55-foot high inflatable bubble top eliminating travel to the Kingdome in inclement weather.

To reach the headquarters, take the N.E. 70th Street exit off I-405 travelling either north or southbound. If arriving southbound, take a left at N.E. 72nd Place and another left at 108th Avenue N.E. Go left at N.E. 53rd Street. The headquarters is approximately one-quarter mile up N.E. 53rd Street.

From Northbound, go left at the exit stop sign and left at N.E. 72nd Place, crossing back over I-405. Take a left at 108th Avenue N.E. and a left at N.E. 53rd Street.

CUTDOWN DATES

National Football League clubs will observe the following cutdown dates for the 1988 season; rosters must be trimmed to 60 players by Tuesday, August 23. The final cutdown, to 47 players will be on Monday, August 29.

INSTANT REPLAY APPROVED FOR 1988

For the third consecutive year, NFL clubs have approved a limited system of Instant Replay on a one-year basis.

The system basically stays the same as in 1987 with the exception that the Replay Official will now be assigned to a regular officiating crew and will attend crew meetings the day before each game. League office personnel will no longer be used as Replay Officials. In 1987, there were 490 plays closely reviewed (defined as a contact to the field, but not necessarily stoppage of play). There were 57 reversals in 210 games for an average of one reversal in each four games. In 1986, there were 374 plays closely reviewed resulting in 38 reversals in 224 games.

In 1986, the system was approved by a 23-4-1 vote. In 1987, the vote was 21-7. In 1988, replay was cleared by a 23-5 margin.

The NFL has discussed Instant Replay in some degree or other since the early 1970s. The League experimented in 1976 and 1978 using two basic frameworks—an independent system using cameras, replay machines, and technicians separate from the network covering the game, and a "no frills" approach using existing television coverage.

In 1985, the NFL used the network feed of nine nationally televised pre-season games to experiment with the basic system that later was adopted for 1986 and 1987. A total of 28 plays were examined closely in 1985 (17 confirmed call, 4 were inconclusive, 1 was reversed, and 6 had no replay shown).

What is the objective of this system?

The clubs feel that on certain plays the telecast viewed by the general public should be used to correct an indisputable error. The system will be used to reverse an on-field decision only when the Replay Official has *indisputable visual evidence* available to him that warrants the change.

Is the television network carrying the game part of the review process?

No. Although the Replay Official will be viewing the live network feed, there is no communication to television personnel as to what plays to show or not to show.

What is the step-by-step procedure of play review?

The Replay Official will view game action and a play will be replayed immediately on one of the two monitors, while the other monitor continues to record the live feed.

The Replay Official makes a determination if further study of the play is needed. If not, there is no contact with the field and play continues without interruption.

If the Replay Official believes an error may have been made, the Umpire will be contacted via a headset.

The Replay Official will watch replay(s) on one or both monitors and complete his review within a reasonable period after the play is over.

The Replay Official will inform the Umpire of his decision, and the Referee will make the appropriate announcement on the wireless microphone.

The limited Instant Replay system concentrates on plays of possession or touching (e.g., fumbles, receptions, interceptions, muffs) and most plays governed by the sidelines, goal lines, end lines, and line of scrimmage (e.g., receiver or runner in or out of bounds, forward or backward passes, breaking the plane of the goal line).

However, the Instant Replay system will *not* include the following fouls: clipping; encroachment and offsides; grasp of facemask; false start; defensive pass interference; offensive pass interference; offensive holding and illegal use of hands; illegal batting or punching ball; illegal block on free kick or scrimmage kick; illegal crackback; illegal motion; illegal use of forearm or elbow; illegal use of hands by defense; illegally kicking the ball; illegally snapping the ball; intentional grounding; member of the punting team downfield early; illegal formation; palpably unfair act; piling on; roughing the passer; running into or roughing the kicker; striking, kicking, or kneeling; unnecessary roughness; unsportsmanlike conduct; and use of the helmet as a weapon.
