The Cubs lost one of their own when Ron Santo passed away in the early morning of December 3, 2010. A nine-time All-Star third baseman who hit for power, Santo played 15 major league seasons — including 14 years with the Cubs from 1960-73 — before closing out his career with the White Sox in 1974. In 1990, he joined the WGN Radio broadcast team and provided color commentary for Cubs games through the 2010 campaign.

Besides his impact both on the field and in the radio booth, Ron touched many lives through his work for the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation, helping to raise much-needed funds to continue the hope to find a cure for diabetes, a disease that he was diagnosed with at the age of 18.

On the Field

Ron produced Hall of Fame-worthy numbers in his 15-year big league career. The right-handed hitting slugger batted .277 with 365 doubles, 342 home runs and 1,331 RBI in 2,243 big league contests with the Cubs (1960-73) and White Sox (1974), making nine All-Star teams and winning five Rawlings Gold Glove awards for his play at third base.

Some of his career numbers that stand out include:

- Ron led the N.L. in assists for seven-straight seasons from 1962-68, tying a Senior Circuit record.
- He recorded a major league record eight-straight seasons with 90 RBI as a third baseman.
- In 1965, he tied a major league record with 164 games played at third base.
- Ron hit safely in a then modern-day Cubs record 28-straight games from May 31-July 4, 1966.
- In 1967, he set a big league record for the second-straight season with 393 assists at third base.
- He ranks in the Cubs' top-10 all-time rankings in multiple categories:
 - ◆ 1,071 walks rank second.
 - ◆ 337 home runs rank fourth.
 - ◆ 2,126 games played, 7,768 at-bats, 1,290 RBI and 756 extra-base hits rank fifth.
 - ◆ 3,667 total bases rank sixth.
 - ◆ 2,171 hits rank seventh.
 - ◆ 1,109 runs scored rank eighth.
 - ◆ 353 doubles rank ninth.

In the Broadcast Booth

Ron began his broadcasting career in 1990, teaming up with Thom Brennaman and Bob Brenly in the WGN Radio booth. Prior to the 1996 season, Pat Hughes was hired as the station's play-by-play man and would team with Ron for the next 15 seasons.

Pat and Ron had a close, unique relationship in the booth as the two were able to play off each other and entertain fans on a daily basis. Ron never hid his passion for the Cubs and wore his feelings on his sleeve through the inevitable ups and downs that come throughout a baseball season.

Ron's enthusiasm for the game, and the Cubs, permeated from the booth to the clubhouse and the field. Prior to gametime, he would interview players and the team's skipper, with those chats becoming more like friendly conversations between two close friends. He was not only a member of the team, but also one of its biggest fans.

A Charitable Cub

For all the lives Ron touched through his 35 years with the Cubs as a player and broadcaster, he positively affected countless others with his efforts to raise awareness and funds for the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation. Playing with diabetes his entire career, Ron wanted to help fight the disease and assist people afflicted with it any way he could.

In 1972, he endorsed the JDRF's annual Ron Santo Walk to Cure Diabetes, an event that has raised more than \$40 million to support diabetes research and continued hope for a cure.

Diabetes would eventually claim Ron's legs when doctors had to amputate both below his knees. In true fashion, Ron turned his struggles into a positive, both through the documentary *This Old Cub* — a film that chronicles his fight with diabetes while helping to raise funds for the JDRF — and by sharing his insights with fellow diabetes patients whenever he could.

The Cubs will recognize Ron's career as all uniformed personnel will wear commemorative No. 10 patches during the 2011 season. In addition, Chicago will dedicate a statue of Ron, August 10, before the 7:05 p.m. CT game against the Washington Nationals.

1916-2010

*1945 N.L. MVP,
Four-Time N.L. All-Star,
Forever a Cub.*

Cubs legend Phil Cavarretta — who played for the North Siders from 1934-53 and also managed the club in his final three seasons — passed away on December 18, 2010, at the age of 94. Cavarretta was the 1945 National League Most Valuable Player, and his 20 seasons with the Cubs are a franchise record for a position player.

Phil, a left-handed batter and thrower who played first base and roamed the outfield, finished his big league career with a .293 batting average, 347 doubles, 99 triples, 95 home runs and 920 RBI between the Cubs and White Sox (1954-55).

Local Beginnings

Born in Chicago, Phil attended Lane Tech High School in the city and signed with the Cubs in 1934. He would make his major league debut in September of that season. The 18 year old was the youngest player in the league, and in his first Wrigley Field appearance on September 25, he hit a solo home run to help down Cincinnati, 1-0.

Phil would go on to bat .381 in seven contests in his 1934 debut season. The following year, as the team's permanent replacement at first base for Charlie Grimm, he appeared in 146 contests, batting .275 as a rookie with 82 RBI and helping the club win the 1935 N.L. pennant, thanks in part to a 21-game winning streak in September.

A Special 1945 Season

After enjoying his first All-Star selection in 1944, batting .321 and leading the N.L. with 197 hits, Phil had an even better 1945 campaign, helping the Cubs win the N.L. pennant and play the franchise's most recent World Series appearance.

Again named to the N.L. All-Star squad, Phil would go on to lead the league with a .355 batting average and a .449 on-base percentage in 132 games en route to N.L. MVP honors — he was just the fourth Cub to win MVP accolades, joining Frank Schulte (1911), Rogers Hornsby (1929) and Gabby Hartnett (1935).

Phil batted .423 with a .500 on-base percentage and .615 slugging mark in the 1945 World Series against the Detroit Tigers. However, Detroit would win the Series in seven games.

Standout Career

In his 20 seasons with the Cubs, Phil helped the franchise to three N.L. pennants and World Series appearances in 1935, 1938 and 1945. He batted .317 in 17 post-season contests, which is second-highest in franchise history behind Stan Hack's .348 mark. His 17 playoff games are ninth-most for a Cubs position player.

Among his other accomplishments, Phil's .355 batting average in 1945 is a club record for a left-handed hitter, and was one of three times he led the team in hitting (also in 1944 and 1947). His 1,304 hits, 241 doubles and 70 triples amassed in the 1940s were decade-highs for the team.

All told, Phil's 1,953 games played for the Cubs ranks sixth in franchise history, while his 99 triples rank fifth. His 794 walks are seventh-most in Cubs history, and his 968 runs scored, 896 RBI and 532 extra-base hits rank 10th in franchise annals.

Annual events such as Prostate Cancer Foundation Home Run Challenge and Major Leaguers Strike Out Breast Cancer shine a spotlight on diseases affecting thousands of Americans.

Youth and Special Needs Baseball

McCormick Foundation's Cubs Care grants support organizations committed to bringing quality sports programming to the children of Chicago. Each year, more than 13,000 children and young adults participate in sports programs supported by Cubs Care grants.

Programs funded through Cubs Care include:

Rookie League — A partnership with the Chicago Park District, Rookie League is an introductory league for six to nine year olds. The league has grown to 96 locations with 521 teams across Chicago. Each year, more than 8,000 children from neighborhoods throughout the city can participate in the program free of charge.

Inner City Youth Baseball — Inner City Youth Baseball provides recreational activities for more than 260 kids ages nine to 12 who live in Chicago Housing Authority developments and scattered site housing throughout Chicago. The program is operated in partnership with the Chicago Police Department, Chicago Housing Authority and the Chicago Park District. It also helps encourage participation of African Americans in baseball by exposing African American youth to the game.

Reviving Baseball in the Inner Cities (RBI) — The Reviving Baseball in Inner Cities (RBI) program of the Union League Boys & Girls Clubs of Chicago reaches approximately 300 mostly minority teens ages 13 to 18 living in some of the poorest communities in Chicago. Grants typically cover all program costs so the league can provide equipment, uniforms and instruction at no cost to the participants. The Cubs RBI program boasts three players chosen in the 2008 MLB first-year player draft and one selected in the both the 2007 and 2010 MLB first-year player drafts.

Special Recreation Programs

The Chicago Park District's Special Recreation programs are geared towards helping children and adults with special needs. These programs include **Beep Baseball** for the visually impaired, **Buddy Baseball** for the physically challenged, **Deaf & Hard of Hearing softball** for the hearing impaired and **Alternative Athletic Conference (AAC)** softball for those with learning/behavioral problems.

Wheelchair Cubs

The Rehabilitation Institute of Chicago (RIC) created the RIC Cubs wheelchair softball team to expand athletic opportunities for physically challenged adults. The RIC Cubs are

tremendously talented athletes and have won the Wheelchair World Series in 2002, 2004, 2005, 2006 and 2008.

A Cubs Care grant helped create Illinois' first-ever public wheelchair baseball stadium in 2003.

Reaching Out to the Latino Community

The Cubs are committed to connecting and building a lasting partnership with the Latino community in Chicago. In 2011, more than 40 Cubs games will be broadcast in Spanish on WRT0-AM 1200, and made available on television via SAP. Spanish-language publications and broadcasts, baseball programs and relationships with charitable organizations serving Latino communities throughout the area, and around the world, are growing.

Little Cubs Field, Humboldt Park

The Chicago Cubs partnered with the YMCA of Metropolitan Chicago, the Chicago Park District and the Parkways Foundation to construct the \$2 million Little Cubs Field in Humboldt Park. Cubs All-Stars Carlos Zambrano and Geovany Soto helped open the facility, along with Alderman Billy Ocasio, Chicago Park District Superintendent Tim Mitchell and local youth baseball players from Humboldt Park.

The design of Little Cubs Field highlights some of the well-known elements of Wrigley Field. The scoreboard is reminiscent of the famed Wrigley Field marquee and seating features covered grandstands with a rooftop like the Friendly Confines.

The Grand Opening of Little Cubs Field took place May 30, 2009 - Cubs pitchers Angel Guzman and Carlos Marmol were on hand for the festivities.

During the 2010 season, Geovany Soto, hosted a baseball clinic at Humboldt Park.

ILAC Centro Educacion para la Salud Integral, Dominican Republic

Chicago Cubs Charities contributed \$25,000 in 2010 to fund diabetes research and treatment, support a surgical recovery room in the Dominican Republic and to provide support for schools and education-related facilities.

Tom, Pete and Todd Ricketts visited the facility in January 2011. The donation was matched by the Major League Baseball-Dominican Development Alliance.

LosCubs.com

The Cubs launched a Spanish language Web site in April 2007, Loscubs.com. The site provides Spanish-speaking fans with up-to-date news, team information, game recaps and exclusive player profiles and stories, all in Spanish.

Player Initiatives

Every Cubs player participates in giving back to the community. Whether signing baseballs to be used for fundraising efforts, visiting schools and hospitals throughout Chicagoland or spending time with fans at Wrigley Field, the organization's players have made an impact in the community. Some highlights include:

In 2010, Carlos Zambrano started the Big Z Foundation which aims to help underprivileged families in third world countries and specific Chicago communities. Carlos launched his new foundation with the Fogo de Chao dinner and silent auction event in January.

Aramis Ramirez teamed up with the Chicago Public Library to film a Public Service Announcement in Spanish encouraging kids to read. In combination with the video, posters were made of Aramis for the campaign, also in Spanish.

Starlin Castro was awarded the 2010 State of Illinois Athletic Achievement Award for National Hispanic Heritage Month. This award was presented by Secretary of State Jesse White.

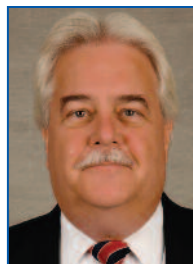

Future Hall of Fame pitcher Greg Maddux was named assistant to the general manager January 11, 2010.

- © His responsibilities include assisting the coaching staffs at major league and minor league spring training, assisting in the development of Cubs minors leaguers during the regular season and assisting the baseball operations department in talent evaluation.
- © Retired from baseball in December of 2008 as the eighth-winningest pitcher in the history of the game with 355 victories, 133 of which occurred during his 10 seasons with the Cubs.
- © Won the first of his four Cy Young Awards with the Cubs in 1992 when he went 20-11 with a 2.18 ERA (65 ER/268.0 IP) in 35 starts.
- © Originally selected by the Cubs in the second round of the 1984 Draft, Greg went 133-112 with a 3.61 ERA during two stints with the Cubs from 1986-92 and 2004-06 ... his 298 starts and 1,305 strikeouts with the Cubs rank fifth and sixth, respectively, in franchise history.
- © Greg also earned the first two of his eight National League All-Star nods with the Cubs and won six of his major league record 18-career Gold Glove Awards during seasons he pitched for Chicago.
 - ♦ He is the first pitcher in major league history to win four-consecutive Cy Young Awards (1992-95).

CUBS OWNERSHIP HISTORY

On August, 21, 2009, the Ricketts family signed a definitive agreement with Tribune Company to acquire a 95 percent interest in the Chicago Cubs National League Baseball Club, Wrigley Field and Tribune Company's approximately 25 percent interest in Comcast SportsNet (CSN) in a transaction valued at \$845 million. The Ricketts family has management control of the joint venture as its 95 percent owner.

Tribune retains a five-percent ownership interest.

On October 6, 2009, Major League Baseball owners unanimously approved the transaction by a vote of 29-0.

When the transaction closed October 27, 2009, the Ricketts family became only the eighth owner of the Chicago Cubs since the franchise's inception 133 years ago in 1876 when William A. Hulbert began as the club's first owner. Prior to the Ricketts family, the Cubs had only two owners in the last 90 years, including 62 years of family ownership starting in 1919 when William Wrigley, Jr. purchased the franchise. In 1932, Philip K. Wrigley took control upon his father's death. In 1977, William Wrigley took over the club following the passing of his father, Philip, before selling to the Tribune Company four years later in 1981.

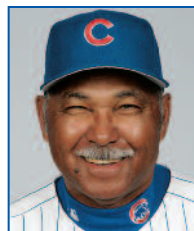

1905	Charles Murphy ... Murphy's \$125,000 purchase price was financed by Cincinnati Times-Star owner Charles Taft
1914	Charles Taft ... Taft bought the Cubs from Charles Murphy
1916	Charles Weeghman ... a team owner in the defunct Federal League, Weeghman and nine others purchased the Cubs from Taft and moved the club to Weeghman Park at the corner of Clark and Addison
1919	Wrigley family ... William Wrigley Jr. purchased control of the team from Weeghman and renamed Weeghman Park to Cubs Park. In 1926, the ballpark's name was changed to Wrigley Field. Philip K. Wrigley took over in 1932 and William Wrigley took control in 1977.
1981	The Tribune Company ... the Tribune's purchase of the Cubs and the Friendly Confines from the Wrigley family ended the longest continuous operation of a franchise by the same family in one city.

Billy Williams — Senior Advisor

Billy enters his fifth season as senior advisor to the club ... he had been serving as special assistant to the president since November 1, 2001.

- © Spent his club-record 31st year in a Cubs uniform in 2001 as the team's first base coach ... also spent his 15th season as a member of the Cubs' coaching staff - tying the club mark.
 - ♦ Joined the Cubs organization in 1956 and made his major league debut in 1959 ... played for the club from 1959-74 and had a trio of stints on the coaching staff (1980-82, 1986-87, 1992-01).
- © During his 18-year major league career, including 16 seasons with the Cubs, he batted .290 with 2,711 hits, 426 home runs and 1,475 RBI ... the six-time National League All-Star hit 20 or more homers 14 times, had 90-plus RBI 10 times and batted at least .300 five times.
 - ♦ Homered 392 times in a Cubs uniform - the third-highest total in club history ... also ranks among the team's all-time top-five in games played, at-bats, runs scored, hits, total bases, singles, doubles, extra-base hits, RBI and walks.
 - ♦ Was the National League Rookie of the Year in 1961 after setting Cubs rookie records for homers (25) and RBI (86).
 - ♦ In 1970, he led the N.L. in runs scored (137) and tied for the league lead in hits (205) ... batted .322 with 42 homers and 129 RBI.
 - ♦ Was *The Sporting News'* Major League Player of the Year in 1972 ... led the N.L. in batting average (.333) while recording 37 homers and 122 RBI.
 - ♦ Played in a then-N.L. record 1,117 consecutive games September 22, 1963-September 2, 1970 ... during the streak, he was utilized as a pinch hitter just four times.
 - ♦ Was traded to Oakland October 23, 1974, for infielder Manny Trillo and pitchers Darold Knowles and Bob Locker ... spent two seasons with the A's - and saw his only career post-season action in the 1975 American League Championship Series against Boston.
- © On July 26, 1987, he was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, N.Y. ... his uniform number was retired by the Cubs August 13, 1987, as No. 26 flies from Wrigley Field's right field flagpole.
- © On September 7, 2010, had a statue of his likeness dedicated by the Cubs at Wrigley Field ... his statue sits at the corner of Addison Street and Sheffield Avenue.
- © Was born on June 15, 1938, in Whistler, Ala.
- © Billy and his wife, Shirley, have four daughters: Valarie, Nina, Julia and Sandra ... they also have six grandchildren: William, Nicolette, Jasmine, Jeran, Christian and Kendall.

CONSECUTIVE-GAME STREAKS

A consecutive-game playing streak shall be extended if a player plays one-half inning on defense, or if he completes a time at-bat by reaching base or being put out. A pinch-running appearance does not extend a streak. If a player is ejected from a game by an umpire before he can comply with the requirements of this rule, his streak shall continue.

A consecutive-game hitting streak shall not be terminated if all a player's plate appearances result in a base on balls, hit batsman, defensive interference or sacrifice bunt. The streak shall end if the player has a sacrifice fly and no hit.

Mike became the 51st manager in Cubs history, August 23, 2010, replacing Lou Piniella, who announced his retirement the previous day ... on October 19, 2010, Mike agreed to a two-year contract with a club option for the 2013 season.

- © The Cubs posted a 24-13 record (.649) with Mike at the helm for the team's final 37 contests of the 2010 campaign ... that was the majors' second-best record in that span, trailing only Philadelphia (27-12/.692).
 - ♦ The Cubs went 8-3 in their first 11 games under Mike ... he was the first Cubs skipper to win at least eight of his first 11 games since Jim Essian was 8-3 in 1991.
 - ♦ Chicago was 17-8 in Mike's first 25 games as skipper - that was the best start for a Cubs skipper in 78 years ... Charlie Grimm posted a 20-5 mark in his first 25 games in 1932 (thanks to Ed Hartig for his research assistance).
- © Became just the fifth manager to post a .600 or better winning percentage as a mid-season replacement for the Cubs ... Whitey Lockman previously turned the trick with a 39-26 mark (.600) in 1972 after replacing Leo Durocher.
 - ♦ The three others to replace someone midseason and record a .600 winning percentage for Chicago: Frank Chance in 1905, Charlie Grimm in 1932 and Gabby Hartnett in 1938.

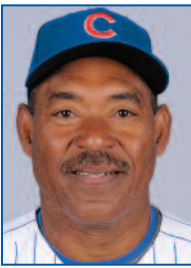

Mike was the first person to make a mid-season Cubs managerial debut since a two-day stretch during the 2002 campaign — Rene Lachemann replaced Don Baylor as manager for one game (a 4-3 loss in Atlanta on July 5) ... the following day, Bruce Kimm replaced Lachemann in a 7-3 win in Atlanta, July 6.

For 19 seasons, Ernie Banks delighted Wrigley Field fans with his long home runs and cheerful disposition. He hit 512 home runs, surpassing the 40-roundtrippers mark five times. He hit 277 of his homers as a shortstop — a National League record. He also holds the N.L. single-season mark for homers by a shortstop (47 in 1958). The 14-time All-Star won the N.L. Most Valuable Player Award following both the 1958 and 1959 campaigns.

Banks, whose No. 14 flies from the left field foul pole at Wrigley Field, was elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1977. He was voted to Major League Baseball's All-Century team in 1999.

Born on January 31, 1931 in Dallas, Texas, Banks played for the Cubs from 1953-71 and served as a coach from 1967-73. He made his major league debut September 17, 1953.

Following Whitey Lockman's ejection on May 8, 1973, coach Ernie Banks took over the reigns as acting manager becoming the first African-American to manage a major league team.

In 2008, Banks was honored by the Cubs with a statue at Wrigley Field, commemorating his illustrious career.

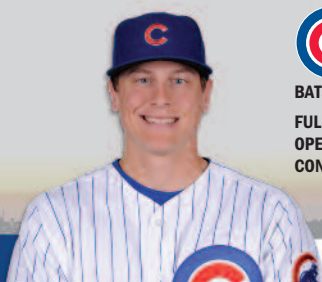

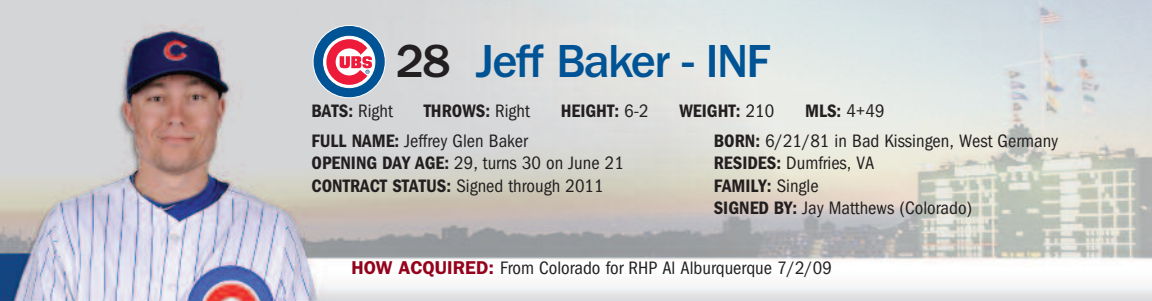
GAME DEFINITIONS

RECORD BREAKERS AT THE GATES

In 2008, the Chicago Cubs set a single-season attendance record by drawing 3,300,200 fans at Wrigley Field, eclipsing the previous record mark of 3,252,462 set in 2007.

In addition to setting a Wrigley Field record, the 3,300,200 is the largest single-season attendance mark for any franchise or venue in the history of the city of Chicago.

The Cubs reached three million fans on September 2, faster than any other season in franchise history, as that night's crowd of 39,846 vs. the Houston Astros brought the Cubs and Wrigley Field beyond the three million mark in the club's 74th home date of 2008, surpassing the previous record of 75 home dates to three million fans in 2007.

The Cubs have had three million fans in home attendance in each of the last seven seasons starting in 2004 when the club reached the mark for the first time.

The Cubs are one of only five teams in Major League Baseball to reach three million fans in each of the last seven seasons starting in 2004, joining the Dodgers, Yankees, Angels and Cardinals.

The Cubs mark for scoring in consecutive games is 127, set from June 15, 1958-May 13, 1959. The team record for scoring in consecutive contests in one season is 109, set in 1943 (May 23-September 18).

The longest streak for Cubs pitchers without hurling a shutout is 106 games, set in 1901 (May 18-September 20).

On June 29, 1897, the Cubs scored at least one run in every inning in a 36-7 victory at Louisville. That was the only time in club history that the team scored at least one run in every frame. The last time the Cubs surrendered at least one run in every inning took place May 5, 1999, vs. Colorado at Wrigley Field.

Since 1900, the Cubs have thrown three consecutive shutouts seven times, with the last occurrence taking place July 21-July 24, 1992 – when the Cubs won 1-0 and 3-0 at Cincinnati and 1-0 at Houston.

The last time the Cubs threw shutouts in both games of a doubleheader occurred July 11, 1965, vs. St. Louis at Wrigley Field (identical 6-0 scores).

The Cubs were held scoreless in a National League-record 48 consecutive innings June 15-June 21, 1968. The club was blanked in four straight games June 16-June 20.

The last time the Cubs allowed three or fewer runs in every game of a three-game series was September 17-19, 2010 at Florida – Chicago swept the Marlins by scores of 2-0, 5-3 and 13-3. In fact, that was part of an 11-game stretch in which Cubs pitchers allowed three or less runs in each contest from September 10-22.

The last time the Cubs allowed fewer than three runs during a Wrigley Field three-game set occurred May 26-28, 2008 vs. Los Angeles (N.L.) (3-1, 3-1, 2-1 (10)).

From July 5-July 7, 2001, the Cubs scored 38 runs over a three-game span – winning by scores of 13-4 at New York and 15-9 and 10-6 at Detroit. Over the three-game span, the Cubs recorded 50 hits – including 21 for extra bases (12 doubles, four triples, five homers).

In 1930, the Cubs established a team record by reaching the 10-runs plateau in five-straight games June 1-June 6. During that stretch – the only time in club history that the team had a double-digit runs streak surpassing three games – the Cubs defeated Pittsburgh 16-4 on June 1 at Wrigley Field before going on a road trip. They swept the Boston Braves over a three-game span June 3-June 5 by scores of 15-2, 18-10 and 10-7, then went to Brooklyn and beat the Dodgers 13-0 on June 6.

During a 20-1 victory over Los Angeles (N.L.) May 5, 2001, the Cubs scored eight times during both the seventh and eighth innings. This was only the fifth time in major league history that a team plated at least eight runs in consecutive frames. The list:

Dempster: Facts and Information

Ryan enters his eighth season with Chicago and his 14th in the majors since he made his big league debut with Florida in 1998 ... he owns six double-digit victory campaigns (2000-02, 2008-10) and has reached 200.0 innings pitched six times.

- Ⓢ In 2000, was the first Canadian pitcher to go to the Mid-Summer Classic since the Cubs' Fergie Jenkins in 1972.
- Ⓢ Was the Marlins' Opening Day starter in 2001 after going to Japan as part of the Major League All-Star tour following the 2000 campaign.
- Ⓢ Struck out the side in the ninth inning of the 2008 All-Star Game at Yankee Stadium ... became just the second pitcher in major league history to strike out the side in the ninth inning or later in an All-Star Game.
 - The Milwaukee Braves' Gene Conley accomplished the feat in 1955 when he struck out the A.L.'s Al Kaline, Mickey Vernon and Al Rosen in the 12th inning (thanks to Elias Sports Bureau).
- Ⓢ Made 121 starts for Florida from 1998-2002 ... when he was traded from the Marlins in mid-season 2002, he was that franchise's all-time leader in victories (42) and strikeouts (628).
- Ⓢ Is 94-85 with a 4.41 ERA (789 ER/1610.2 IP) in 260 career starts.
- Ⓢ Joins Derek Lowe as the only active pitchers with at least 100 career victories and at least 85 saves ... just 17 pitchers have accomplished the feat in major league history.
- Ⓢ Ranks second among Canadian-born pitchers with 1,840.1 career innings pitched ... Fergie Jenkins is first with 4,500.2.
- Ⓢ Is the third Canadian-born hurler in MLB history to record three 15-win seasons, joining Fergie Jenkins (10 times) and Russ Ford (three times).
- Ⓢ Has converted 87-of-101 save opportunities for Chicago ... the 86.1-percent success rate is second-highest in franchise history (min. 50 opportunities) – Randy Myers converted 86.8-percent of his save opportunities for the Cubs from 1993-95.
- Ⓢ Was named one of the 99 "Good Guys" in professional sports by *The Sporting News* in 2001.

- Ⓢ Was the Chicago Cubs nominee for the Roberto Clemente award in 2006 and 2008, which is given annually to the major league baseball player who combines outstanding skills on the field with devoted work in the community.
 - In 2006, Ryan and his wife, Jenny, established a charitable ticket program called "Dempster's Dugout" that donated 500 tickets to local social service agencies that assist low-income children ... the program has continued the past three seasons.
- Ⓢ In 2009, created the Dempster Family Foundation, dedicated to raising awareness of DiGeorge Syndrome and reaching out to families with children with DiGeorge Syndrome.
- Ⓢ His charitable endeavors in 2003 included assisting the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation and Garth Brooks' Teammates for Kids.
- Ⓢ Following the 2001 season, he was presented with the All Heart Award by the Florida chapter of the Baseball Writers' Association of America – given to the Marlins player who best exemplifies the team's commitment to the South Florida community by making a positive impact and by serving as a role model for others.
 - In 2000, he hosted children from the S.O.S. Children's Village at each of his home starts and he donated \$10 for every strikeout to the KIDS THAT CARE Pediatric and Cancer Fund, created to help build a pediatric bone marrow transplant unit in Miami.
- Ⓢ Graduated from Elphinstone Secondary School in Gibsons, British Columbia, in 1995 – he played baseball, basketball and soccer.

Dempster: 2010 Season

Ryan was 15-12 with a 3.85 ERA (92 ER/215.1 IP) and led the Cubs in victories ... his 34 starts, 215.1 innings pitched and 208 strikeouts also led Chicago in his third season back in the starting rotation.

- Ⓢ The 34 starts tied his career high, also done in 2001 with Florida.
- Ⓢ Went over the 200-strikeout mark for the second time in his career, and was one punchout shy of his career-best 209 strikeouts with Florida in 2000.
 - The 10 seasons between 200-strikeout campaigns are the longest in major league history ... the previous mark was nine seasons, held by Bert Blyleven (1976-85) and John Smoltz (1997-2006) ... thanks to Elias.
- Ⓢ Also led the club with 23 quality starts, including five-consecutive quality efforts, August 4-25.
- Ⓢ Received two or fewer runs of support in 14 of his 34 outings ... was 2-10 in those starts.
- Ⓢ Went 10-5 with a 3.09 ERA (40 ER/116.2 IP) in 18 road starts compared to a 5-7 mark with a 4.74 ERA (52 ER/98.2 IP) in 16 home starts.
 - The 10 road victories tied for the N.L.-lead with Cincinnati's Bronson Arroyo, Colorado's Ubaldo Jimenez and Florida's Ricky Nolasco.
- Ⓢ Was 7-7 with a 3.61 ERA (49 ER/122.0 IP) in 18 starts before the All-Star break ... went 8-5 with a 4.15 ERA (43 ER/93.1 IP) after the Mid-Summer Classic.
- Ⓢ Went 4-0 with a 2.23 ERA (8 ER/32.1 IP) and 25 strikeouts in five starts against Milwaukee ... was 2-7 with a 5.00 ERA (42 ER/75.2 IP) in his 12 other starts against N.L. Central foes.
- Ⓢ Went 2-for-2 at the dish, May 4 against the Pirates ... was his fourth-career multi-hit affair and first since August 18, 2009 at San Diego.
- Ⓢ Spun 7.0 or more frames in a career-high six-straight starts, April 18-May 15.

 - Rode a 26.2-road scoreless innings streak, August 15-September 28.
- Ⓢ Lost three-straight home starts for the first time in his career, August 31-September 23.
- Ⓢ Earned his 100th career-victory, 50th as a Cub, in the Cubs' 1-0 win over the Brewers, September 11.



Dempster: Career Review

2009: In his second season back in the rotation, Ryan went 11-9 with a 3.65 ERA (81 ER/200.0 IP) with a team-leading 172 strikeouts compared to 65 walks in 31 starts ... he reached the 200.0-inning mark for the fifth time in his career.

- Went 7-4 with a 3.97 ERA (40 ER/90.2 IP) at home compared to a 4-5 ledger with a 3.38 ERA (41 ER/109.1 IP) on the road.
 - Went 3-1 with a 2.47 ERA (13 ER/47.1 IP) in his final seven road starts.
 - Did not allow an earned run in 26.0 innings at Wrigley Field, September 3-October 4.
- Was 5-5 with a 4.09 ERA (48 ER/105.2 IP) in 17 starts before the All-Star break ... went 6-4 with a 3.15 ERA (33 ER/94.1 IP) after the Mid-Summer Classic.
- Received two or fewer runs of support in 15 of his 31 outings ... was 1-8 in those starts.
- Lowered his ERA from a season-high 5.40 to 3.83, April 29-June 22 ... he posted a 3.09 ERA (22 ER/64.0 IP) during the span.
- His win July 2 was his 18th at Wrigley Field since rejoining the starting rotation at the start of the 2008 season ... in the last 15 years, the only other Cubs pitcher to win as many as 18 games at Wrigley in a two-year span was Jon Lieber over the 2000-01 seasons ... thanks to Elias Sports Bureau.
- Struck out Philadelphia's Cliff Lee August 13 to pick up the 1,300th punchout of his career.
- Made his 200th career start April 29 at Arizona.
- Placed on the disabled list July 7 with a great right toe fracture ... was activated July 28.
- Tossed 6.0 or more innings in 12-consecutive starts, August 2-September 29.
- Went 8.0 innings September 14 and September 19 ... it was the first time he threw 8.0 or more innings in consecutive games since July 3-8, 2001.
- September 14, he joined John Smoltz as the only pitchers to record at least three-straight 20-save seasons followed by consecutive 10-win campaigns as a starter (thanks to Elias Sports Bureau).
- Earned the 87th victory of his career with September 29's five-hit shutout over the Pirates ... it was his first complete game since June 11, 2008 vs. Atlanta.

2008: Ryan set a career high with 17 victories and was named to the N.L. All-Star Team in his return to the starting rotation after three seasons as Chicago's closer from 2005-07.

- The 17 victories ranked tied for third in the N.L. and tied for the team lead with Ted Lilly ... the 17 victories surpassed his previous career mark of 15 in 2001 with the Florida Marlins.
- Went 14-3 at home, the most victories at Wrigley Field for a Cubs pitcher since Fergie Jenkins won a franchise-record 15 in 1967.
 - Began the season 10-0 at home, the first Cub to accomplish the feat since Rick Reuschel in 1977.
- Became just the second pitcher since 1969 to record 25 or more saves in a season then win at least 17 the following year ... former Tiger John Hiller had 38 saves in 1973 before going 17-14 in 1974.
- His .227 opponent batting average was third-best in the N.L. ... his 2.96 ERA ranked fourth, as did his .739 winning percentage (17-6).
- Twice tied his career high with four-game winning streaks: April 3-30 (six GS) and May 26-June 22 (six GS).
- Went 69.2-consecutive innings without allowing a home run at Wrigley Field, June 11-September 3.
- Laid down 19 sacrifice bunts to lead the majors and set a franchise mark for a pitcher.
- Went the distance for his only complete game of the season, June 11 against Atlanta ... was his first complete game since September 25, 2002 at Wrigley with Cincinnati.
- Got the nod in Game One of the NLDS vs. the Dodgers, his first career post-season start ... allowed seven walks in 4.2 innings of work in Chicago's 7-2 setback.

2007: Ryan went 28-for-31 in save situations in his fourth season as a Cub, good for a 90.3-percent rate of success ... that was the third-best mark in the N.L. and fifth-highest in baseball.

- The 90.3-percent success rate was the second-highest in a single season for any Cub (since 1957), topped only by his 94.3 rate of success in 2005 (33-for-35).
- Produced a 3.48 ERA (12 ER/31.0 IP) in 31 save situations.
- Moved into sole possession of fourth place on the Cubs all-time saves list April 7 in Milwaukee, notching his 61st save for Chicago.
- Landed on the disabled list with a strained right oblique June 26 (retroactive to June 23) ... made two rehabilitation appearances with Triple-A Iowa, July 17-19.
- Activated from the disabled list July 20 and tossed a scoreless ninth inning the next day vs. Arizona.
- Recorded his 1,000th career strikeout in the ninth inning, September 5 vs. the Dodgers, fanning Shea Hillenbrand.
- Converted a season-high 13 consecutive save opportunities, June 11-September 2.
- Pitched a perfect eighth inning October 4 in Game Two of the NLDS, striking out two batters in an 8-4 Cubs loss at Arizona.

2006: Finished the season with 67 strikeouts and 24 saves in 33 chances ... ranked first in the National League with 64 games finished.

- Carried over a consecutive-saves streak from 2005 and converted a club-record 26 consecutive-save opportunities, August 2, 2005-May 1, 2006 ... the previous record was 22 by Joe Borowski, August 5, 2003-May 23, 2004.
- Allowed two runs April 23 at St. Louis to end a 30.1-inning scoreless streak dating to August 16, 2005.
- Picked up his 50th career save July 18 against Houston.
- Appeared in his 300th career game August 8 at Milwaukee.
- Finished the season just one save shy of tying Phil Regan for fourth place on the Cubs' all-time saves list ... however, he did not convert his last four save opportunities of the season, going 0-2 with an 18.00 ERA (4 ER/2.0 IP) in those four contests.

2005: Ryan converted 33 of 35 save opportunities in his first turn as a closer ... also made six starts early in the season, becoming the first Cub in franchise history to record at least 20 saves in the same season as making at least one start.

- Was 4-0 with a 1.85 ERA (12 ER/58.1 IP) in his 57 relief outings, holding opponents to a .218 average.
- Became the eighth Cub in club annals to record 30 or more saves in a single season ... his 94.3-save percentage was tops in club annals.
- Ranked eighth in the National League in saves and ninth in the league in games finished (53).
- Converted a season-high 19-straight saves, August 2 through the end of the season, tying Tom Gordon for the club's single-season high.
- Opened the season in the rotation, making six starts and going 1-3 with a 5.35 ERA before being shifted to the bullpen.
- Worked a personal and club-high 21.1-scoreless innings over his final 22 games ... it was the longest such stretch by a Cub reliever since Les Lancaster hurled 30.2-scoreless innings in 1989.
- Was named the MLB DHL Delivery Man of the Month for September, going 13-for-13 in save chances and striking out 19 batters in 15.2 innings on the mound ... batters hit just .189 off the closer.

2004: Ryan pitched in 23 late-season games with Chicago despite having undergone "Tommy John" surgery on his right elbow just one year earlier ... was 1-1 with two saves and a 3.92 ERA.

- Limited opponents to a .208 average, the lowest of his career.
- Allowed just one of 11 inherited runners to score.
- Opened the year on the 60-day disabled list, continuing rehabilitation from his August 4, 2003 operation.
 - Posted a 1.96 ERA in five rehab starts for Single-A Lansing ... also had a six-game (four starts) rehab stint at Triple-A Iowa.
- Was reinstated August 1 and made his Cub debut that same day, pitching 0.2 scoreless innings against Philadelphia.
 - It was his first major league appearance since July 28, 2003, and his first M.L. relief appearance since June 25, 2003.
- Earned his first big league save September 15 vs. Pittsburgh, pitching 2.0 scoreless innings.

2003: Struggled through an injury-plagued campaign before undergoing "Tommy John" surgery in August.

- Ⓢ In 22 games (20 starts) for Cincinnati, he was 3-7 with a 6.54 ERA.
- Ⓢ Was the victim of four blown saves by the Reds bullpen – including three in his last eight starts.
- Ⓢ Began the season 1-4 with a 7.62 ERA in 10 games before going on the 15-day disabled list May 23 with an inflamed nerve in his neck.
 - Due to the neck injury, he missed his scheduled start May 9 – the first time he had been scratched during his major league career.
 - His relief appearance the following day vs. Milwaukee snapped a string of 133-consecutive starting assignments ... it was his fourth career relief appearance.
- Ⓢ Was reinstated June 7 following two injury rehab starts at Triple-A Louisville ... went 2-3 with a 5.65 ERA in 12 games (11 starts) before returning to the disabled list July 31 with inflammation in his right elbow.
- Ⓢ Made his final outing July 28 vs. Philadelphia, receiving a no-decision in a 6-5 win ... three days later, he went on the D.L. (retroactive to July 29).
 - August 4, he had season-ending surgery to remove a bone chip behind his right elbow and to repair a complete tear of the ulnar collateral ligament ... the bone chip and "Tommy John" surgeries were performed by Dr. Timothy Kremchek.

2002: Combined to go 10-13 with a 5.38 ERA in 33 starts for Florida and Cincinnati.

- Ⓢ Surpassed the 200.0-inning level for the third-consecutive season.
- Ⓢ Threw four complete games on the season: a 3-2 loss April 19 at Atlanta, an 11-3 victory May 12 vs. Los Angeles (N.L.), a 4-0 loss June 28 at Tampa Bay and an 8-2 win September 25 at Wrigley Field.
- Ⓢ Began the season with Florida and was 5-8 with three complete games and a 4.79 ERA in 18 starts.
- Ⓢ Went 5-5 with a 6.19 ERA in 15 starts for the Reds.
 - When he was traded to Cincinnati in July, he joined fellow Canadian Chris Reitsma on the Reds pitching staff ... they combined to beat Los Angeles 12-4 July 30.
- Ⓢ His 10 strikeouts September 14 against the Cubs were the most by a Reds pitcher all season.

2001: Won a then career-high 15 games, going 15-12 with a 4.94 ERA in 34 starts with the Marlins.

- Ⓢ Became only the second Marlins pitcher to win 10 decisions prior to the All-Star break, joining Chris Hammond (1993).
- Ⓢ Was named the N.L. Pitcher of the Week for July 2-8 after allowing one unearned run and eight hits in two starts.
- Ⓢ Went 4-1 with a 1.61 ERA in July – becoming just the second Florida pitcher to record four wins in a month.
- Ⓢ In his final start of the campaign – a 20-3 loss October 5 at Atlanta – he established a club record for walks in an inning (six in the first).
- Ⓢ At the plate, he recorded 16 sacrifice bunts – a club single-season record for pitchers ... July 19 against the Mets, he set a team mark with three sac bunts.

2000: Was selected to the N.L. All-Star team during his first full big league season ... went 14-10 with a 3.66 ERA in 33 starts.

- Ⓢ Fanned 209 batters in 226.1 innings of work ... the strikeout total ranked fourth in the league and set a club record.
 - Became only the second Canadian pitcher to record 200 strikeouts in a season (Fergie Jenkins, 1967-1971 and 1974).
- Ⓢ In a 3-0 victory May 7 against the Mets, he threw the fifth one-hitter in Marlins history ... allowed only a sixth-inning double to Mike Piazza during his first career complete game.
- Ⓢ Went to the All-Star Game in Atlanta, although he did not pitch.
 - Was the youngest player on the N.L. squad and the first Canadian pitcher to be selected since Jenkins in 1972.

1999: Opened the year at Triple-A Calgary and joined Florida May 7... went 7-8 with a team-high 126 strikeouts in 25 starts.

- Ⓢ On September 7 against Los Angeles (N.L.), he threw 7.0 shutout innings in a 2-1 win ... in that start, he opposed fellow Canadian Eric Gagne – who threw 6.0 scoreless frames.
 - It was the first N.L. game featuring a pair of Canadian-born starting pitchers since the Cubs' Fergie Jenkins and St. Louis' Reggie Cleveland opposed each other on July 28, 1973.

1998: Saw his first big league action, appearing in 14 games (11 starts) for the Marlins.

- Ⓢ Also made seven starts for Double-A Portland and five starts for Triple-A Charlotte.
- Ⓢ Made his major league debut May 23 – a relief appearance against Pittsburgh ... retired the first three batters he faced, including his first career strikeout (Kevin Polcovich).
- Ⓢ On June 1 at Wrigley Field, he suffered the loss (10-2) in his first big league start.
- Ⓢ Earned his first major league victory June 28 vs. Boston, allowing one run in 7.0 innings in a 5-1 contest.

1997: Led Single-A Brevard County with 10 victories, 165.1 innings pitched and 131 strikeouts in 26 starts.

1996: Began the year with Texas' Single-A Charleston club before being traded late in the season to the Florida organization ... finished the campaign at Single-A Kane County.

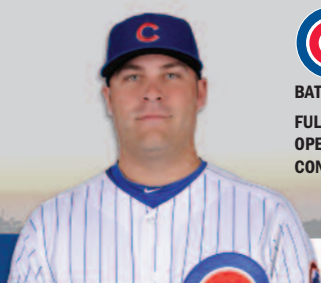

TRIPLE PLAYS - LAST TIME IT HAPPENED

The Cubs have been involved in 76 triple plays since 1876, turning 40 and hitting into 36. The Cubs have hit into the last three triple plays they've been involved in (most recently May 14, 2000, at Montreal).

On May 10, 1997, in San Francisco, the Cubs turned their last triple play. The Giants' Stan Javier faced Amaury Telemaco in the fifth inning with Kirk Rueter on second base and Darryl Hamilton on first. Javier hit a fly ball to short center field, with second base umpire Bob Davidson invoking the infield fly rule. The ball dropped in, and both baserunners were thrown out attempting to advance (center fielder Brian McRae to third baseman Jose Hernandez to second baseman Ryne Sandberg).

The last triple play turned at Wrigley Field was by San Francisco on May 8, 1998 (first baseman Charlie Hayes to shortstop Rich Aurilia). The last time the Cubs turned a triple play at The Friendly Confines occurred June 2, 1983, vs. Pittsburgh - when Pirates pitcher Rick Rhoden hit into an around-the-horn triple killing (third baseman Ron Cey to second baseman Ryne Sandberg to first baseman Bill Buckner).

On May 30, 1927, shortstop Jimmy Cooney turned the only unassisted triple play in Cubs history. In the fourth inning of the Cubs' game in Pittsburgh, Cooney caught Paul Waner's line drive, stepped on second base to retire Lloyd Waner, then tagged Clyde Barnhart off first.

Kosuke begins his fourth season with the Cubs following nine years with the Chunichi Dragons in the Japan League ... he earned N.L. All-Star honors in 2008, his debut season with the Cubs.

- Ⓢ Has increased his batting average, home run total and OPS in each of his first three big league campaigns.
- Ⓢ Was elected to start the 2008 All-Star Game at Yankee Stadium, becoming the franchise's first rookie outfielder to start a Mid-Summer Classic.
- Ⓢ Is the first Japanese player in franchise history.
- Ⓢ Earned Central League Most Valuable Player honors in 2006 when he batted .351 with 31 home runs and a career-high 104 RBI for Chunichi.

- Ⓢ Came off the bench in 43 games, and hit .359 (14-for-39) with a .432 on-base percentage.

- Ⓢ His .375 on-base percentage was 16 points higher than his .359 mark in 2008 ... his slugging percentage (.421) improved 42 points from his previous season's .379 mark.
- Ⓢ Collected 54 extra-base hits, second-most on the club (Derrek Lee, 73).
- Ⓢ His 11 home runs marked a career high, eclipsing the 10 he hit in 2008.
- Ⓢ Appeared in 113 games (105 starts) in center field and 44 games (24 starts) in right field ... recorded a .994 fielding percentage (2 E/312 TC) and had five outfield assists.
- Ⓢ Batted .270 (120-for-444) with 10 homers off right-handed pitching ... had a .164 average (9-for-55) with one long ball off southpaws.

2008: After nine seasons with the Chunichi Dragons, Kosuke became the first Japanese-born Cub and the first rookie outfielder to start an All-Star Game in franchise history ... he led Chicago with 81 walks in 150 games in his rookie campaign.

- Drew 55 of his 81 walks in the first half - the 55 free passes were the most for a Cub before the break since Sammy Sosa drew 60 in 2002.
 - The 81 walks were second-most by a Cubs rookie, surpassed only by Eddie Stankey's 92 free passes in 1943.
- Made his major league debut Opening Day vs. Milwaukee and went 3-for-3, notching his first career hit with a second-inning double off Ben Sheets ... tied the game at 3-3 with a ninth inning, three-run homer off Eric Gagne, his first major league long ball.
 - Became the first Cubs rookie to start and make his major league debut in right field on Opening Day since Billy Williams in 1961.
 - Tied Cubs record with three hits in his major league debut, also done by Doug Dasenczo, September 2, 1988 vs. Cincinnati.
 - Was the 12th player since 1956 to notch multiple hits and RBI in his Cubs debut and first since Jeff Reed accomplished the feat July 10, 1999 at the White Sox ... in addition, was the first player to homer in his Cubs debut since Henry Rodríguez did so March 30, 1998.
- His 79 runs led N.L. rookies and was second in the majors behind Jacoby Ellsbury (98).
- Hit .296 (84-for-284) through the end of June, before he posted a .207 average (45-for-217) to close out the season.
- With a walk in his first plate appearance April 2, became the first player since Kaz Matsui in 2004 to reach base safely in his first five career plate appearances.
- Reached safely five times April 7 at Pittsburgh and April 22 vs. the Mets ... after just 20 team games, was the first Cubs rookie since Ryne Sandberg in 1982 to reach base safely five times in two games in an entire season.
- Set a career high with four hits May 1 vs. Milwaukee.
- Connected for his 200th professional home run July 31 at Milwaukee.
- Slugged his first career pinch-homer August 24 vs. Washington.
- The following day, set a career mark with four RBI in a 3-for-4 effort in Pittsburgh.
- Appeared in all three games of the NLDS against the Dodgers, going 1-for-2 off the bench in Game Three in Los Angeles.

2007: Kosuke batted .294 with 22 doubles and 13 home runs in 81 games for Chunichi ... his season was cut short when he underwent surgery to remove bone fragments in his right elbow August 20.

- Was sporting a Central League-leading .443 on-base percentage at the time his season ended.
- He walked more times (69) than he struck out (66).
- Of his 79 hits on the season, 35 went for extra bases (44.3-percent).
- Drew a walk in nearly 20-percent of his plate appearances, coaxing 69 walks in 348 trips to the plate.
- Recorded six outfield assists while producing a .983 fielding percentage (177 TC/3 E).

2006: Eamed Central League Most Valuable Player honors when he batted .351 with 31 home runs and a career-high 104 RBI.

- His .351 batting average gave him the batting title, 28 points ahead of his next closest competitor.
- Recorded a league-best .438 on-base percentage, 36 points ahead of his next closest competitor.

CUBS FROM JAPAN

Kosuke Fukudome made his major league debut, March 31, 2008 vs. Milwaukee (went 3-for-3 with a double, home run and three RBI), becoming the first Japanese-born Cub. So Taguchi became the second Japanese-born Cub when he appeared in six September games during the 2009 campaign.

At least three other Japanese born major leaguers have spent time in the Cubs system, but did not play in a big league game as a Chicago Cub. Steven Randolph (born in Okinawa) was acquired by the Cubs from the Diamondbacks in mid-January 2005, but was released in early April 2005. Keith McDonald (born in Kokosuka) signed a minor league contract with the Cubs in November 2002, he played six games for the Cardinals in 2000 and 2001. Hideo Nomo was in the Cubs minor league system for three weeks in April 1999.

In his final season with the Rays, Matt set career marks with 15 victories and 204.2 innings pitched ... he threw the first no-hitter in franchise annals, July 26 vs. Detroit ... the 15 wins were second-most in franchise history (David Price, 19 in 2010).

- Ⓢ His 15 victories were tied for 10th in the A.L.
- Ⓢ Held opponents to a .197 batting average with runners in scoring position, fourth-lowest in the A.L.
- Ⓢ Allowed 28 homers, fourth-most in the A.L. ... threw 12 wild pitches, tied for fifth-most in the A.L.
- Ⓢ Did not allow a run in the first inning in 17-straight starts from June 24-September 25 ... was the second-longest streak of its kind in 2010, trailing only San Diego's Mat Latos (22 starts).
- Ⓢ Recorded seven starts of at least 8.0 innings pitched while allowing two runs or less, tied for sixth-most in the A.L.
- Ⓢ Began the season 3-0 with a 0.75 ERA (2 ER/24.0 IP) in his first three starts ... became the first hurler to begin a season with three starts of at least 8.0 innings having allowed one earned run or less since Curt Schilling in 1998.
 - Was the first A.L. pitcher to turn the trick since eventual Cy Young winner, Roger Clemens, in 1991.

- Ⓢ Went a career-high nine starts without a win before his 4-0 combined shutout victory, September 19 vs. Toronto.

2008: In his first full season of major league experience, and his first with the Rays, Matt went 11-9 with a 3.70 ERA in 30 starts despite spending 16 games on the disabled list with radial nerve irritation in April ... helped the Rays to their first World Series appearance.

- Ⓢ Held opponents to a .245 batting average, ninth-lowest in the A.L.
- Ⓢ Was 7-4 against the A.L. East with a 2.54 (27 ER/95.2 IP) in 15 starts.
- Ⓢ Tied the club mark by hurling two shutouts, tied with several others for the AL lead.
- Ⓢ Ranked third in the A.L. with three complete games.
- Ⓢ Tossed his first career complete game, a one-hit effort, June 26 at Florida ... had faced the minimum 18 batters before Hanley Ramirez' homer led off the seventh inning.

GARZA'S NO-HIT EFFORT

Matt Garza's no-hitter, July 26, 2010, vs. Detroit, made him only the third pitcher in the last 45 years to face the minimum 27 batters in a no-hitter that was not a perfect game, joining Philadelphia's Terry Mulholland in 1990 and the White Sox Mark Buehrle in 2007 ... other notes from Garza's no-hitter:

- Ⓢ It was the fifth, and final, no-hitter in 2010 - that was the most in one season since 1991, when seven were thrown.
- Ⓢ Garza's no-hitter came just 31 days (and 10 home games after) Arizona's Edwin Jackson threw the first no-hitter in Tropicana Field history ... prior to that, 1,006 games had been played at the Trop without a no-hitter.
- Ⓢ Opposing starter, Detroit's Max Scherzer, held the Rays hitless until there were two outs in the bottom of the sixth, when Matt Joyce hit a grand slam ... just six weeks before on June 13 at Wrigley Field, neither the White Sox Gavin Floyd nor the Cubs Ted Lilly allowed a hit until the bottom of the seventh.
- Ⓢ Prior to Garza, the longest no-hit bids in Tampa Bay history were 7.2 innings, by Dewon Brazelton (June 25, 2004 vs. Florida) and Tony Saunders (April 22, 1999 vs. Baltimore).

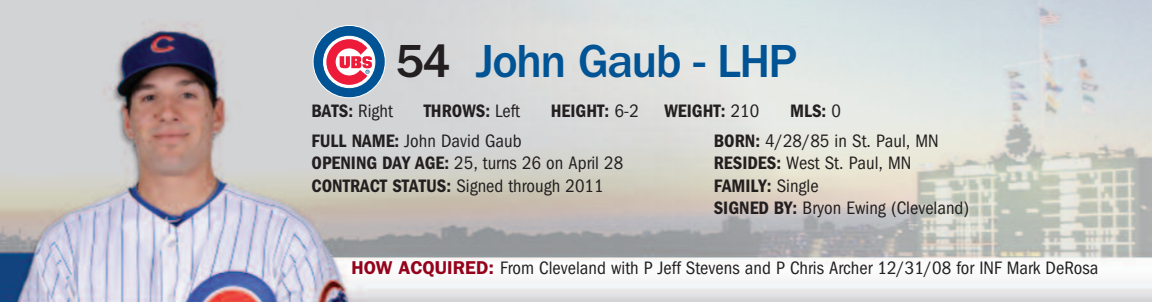

John begins his second full year with Chicago after he was acquired from Pittsburgh with Tom Gorzelanny July 30, 2009 ... he re-signed as a major league free agent, November 20, 2009, inking a two-year deal through the 2011 season.

- Is 21-18 with six saves and a 4.24 ERA (195 ER/414.0 IP) in 448 career relief appearances with Pittsburgh (2003-09) and the Cubs (2009-10).
- His 443 games pitched since the start of the 2004 season ranks second-most among southpaws ... Trevor Miller is first with 462 outings.
- Made six relief appearances for Team USA in the 2009 World Baseball Classic.
- In 2004, established the Pittsburgh rookie record with 68 appearances by a left-handed pitcher.
- Rated as the Pirates ninth-best prospect by *Baseball America* prior to the 2001 season.
- A 1997 graduate of San Gabriel (Calif.) High School ... was a three-year letterman in baseball ... named All-California Interscholastic Federation in baseball and the league's MVP his senior year.

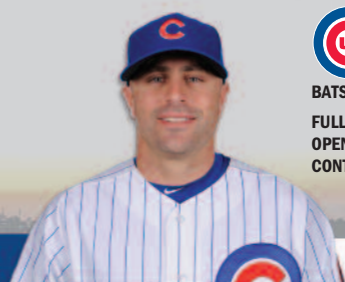

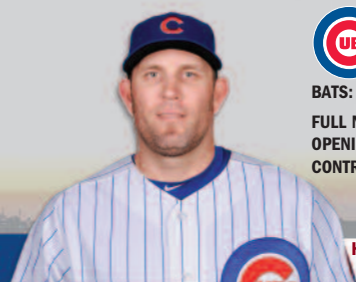

DOUBLE DOWN

The Cubs hit a club-record 340 doubles in a season twice in club annals — 1931 and 2007. In 2007, the club averaged 2.1 doubles per contest while the 1931 squad averaged 2.2 doubles over the 154-game schedule.

In 2008, three Cubs — Aramis Ramirez (44 doubles), Derrek Lee (41) and Geovany Soto (35) — had 35 or more doubles. It marked the ninth time since 1901 that three Cubs amassed 35 or more doubles in the same season. The 120 doubles between them was tied for the third-highest total of any Cubs threesome (in 2007, Derrek Lee had 43, Alfonso Soriano had 42 and Aramis Ramirez had 35), and the most since the 1932 trio of Riggs Stephenson (49), Charlie Grimm (42) and Billy Herman (42) collected a club-record 133 doubles. In 1930, Kiki Cuyler (50), Woody English (36) and Hack Wilson (35) combined for 121 doubles.

Chicago has reached 300 doubles in a season nine times, including five of the last eight seasons entering the 2011 campaign.

Sean made his major league debut with Chicago in 2006 ... has pitched primarily out of the bullpen since the start of the 2008 season, logging a 2.96 ERA (46 ER/140.0 IP) and a 10-8 mark with two saves in 153 relief outings in the past three seasons.

In 1973, following the tragic death of Roberto Clemente, the award was named to honor the man whose spirit and goodwill will always be remembered. The 12-time All-Star and Hall of Famer was killed in a plane crash in 1972 delivering food and medical supplies to earthquake victims of Nicaragua. The award, sponsored by John Hancock Financial Services, recognizes those individuals who truly understand the value of helping others.

A panel of baseball dignitaries, including Vera Clemente and Commissioner Allan H. (Bud) Selig, annually selects the winner from a list of 30 candidates, one from each Major League Baseball Club. These local winners are announced in September during Roberto Clemente Day. The winner of the national Roberto Clemente Award is announced during a pre-game ceremony at the World Series. Past winners include Craig Biggio, Jamie Moyer, Jim Thome, Curt Schilling, Al Leiter, Tony Gwynn, Willie Mays, Ozzie Smith, Cal Ripken, Jr., Albert Pujols and Derek Jeter.

In his final season with the Rays, Carlos led the club with 28 home runs and took over the franchise mark with 144 long balls in his four years with Tampa Bay ... was limited to 144 games after battling plantar fascia in his right foot.

- Ⓢ Batted .196 (95-for-484) with 28 homers, 84 RBI and 87 walks - was one of just seven players in baseball with at least that many homers, RBI and walks, and the only to do so in less than 150 games played.
- Ⓢ Landed on the 15-day disabled list, August 1-16 with a right plantar fascia sprain ... his D.L. stint included a one-game rehab assignment with Single-A Charlotte.
- Ⓢ His 28 blasts were third-most all-time among players who hit under .200 in a season.
 - Mark McGwire hit 29 homers and batted .187 for St. Louis in 2001 ... Mark Reynolds hit 32 homers with a .198 average in 2010 for Arizona.
- Ⓢ Homered in the franchise-record six-straight games, June 6-12, becoming the first player to do so since Oakland's Frank Thomas, September 5-11, 2006.

- Ⓢ Made the start May 4 vs. San Francisco, his first since he left April 24's game in St. Louis with a left calf strain.

- Ⓢ Recorded his 12th career multi-homer game June 14 vs. Florida, hitting a two-run homer off Josh Beckett and adding a two-run blast off Travis Smith.

SAVE RULE

Rule 10.20 tells the official scorer to credit a pitcher with a save when:

(1) He is the finishing pitcher in a game won by his club, and; (2) he is not the winning pitcher, and; (3) he qualifies under the following conditions: (a) he enters the game with a lead of no more than three runs and pitches for at least 1.0 inning, or; (b) he enters the game with the potential tying run either on base, at bat or on deck, or; (c) he pitches effectively for at least 3.0 innings.

When a relief pitcher enters a game in a save situation and departs or the game ends with the save situation no longer in effect because he has given up the lead, he is charged with a "blown save." If the save opportunity still exists when he leaves the game, he is not charged with a save opportunity.

If the pitcher has not given up the lead when he leaves the game, though the save opportunity may no longer exist because of added runs scored by his own team, he is not charged with a save opportunity.

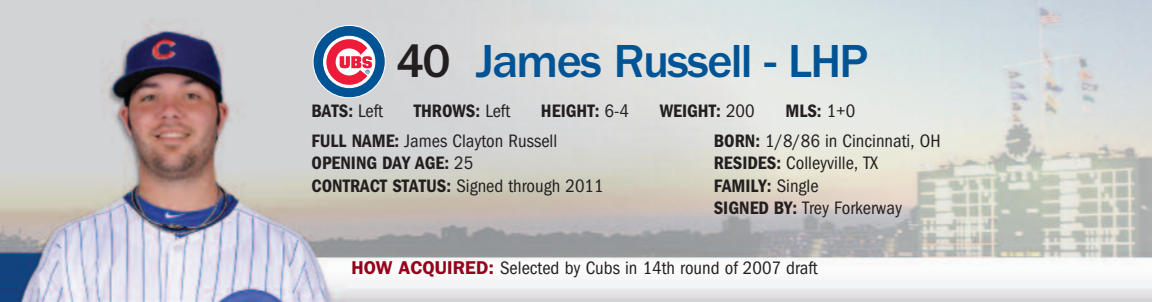

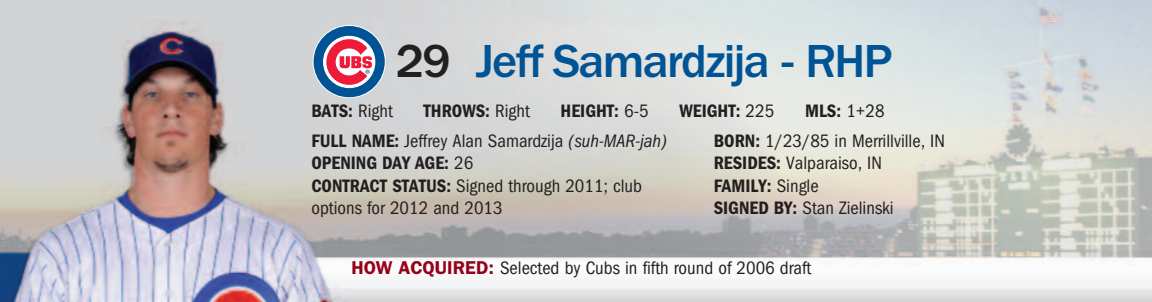

Jeff, who was selected by the Cubs in the 2006 First-Year Player Draft, made his major league debut in 2008 ... he signed a five-year major league deal with the Cubs, January 19, 2007, with club options for the 2012 and 2013 seasons.

- Is 4-5 with a 5.95 ERA (54 ER/81.2 IP) in 53 major league appearances (five starts) ... owns a 31-28 mark with a 4.30 ERA (232 ER/485.1 IP) in 112 minor league contests, including 86 starts.

Carlos begins his second season with the Cubs after he was acquired from Seattle with cash, December 18, 2009, for outfielder Milton Bradley ... has played in all or part of nine major league seasons with Philadelphia (2002-03), Minnesota (2004-07), Seattle (2008-09) and Chicago (2010).

- Ⓢ Has recorded four 10-win seasons, including a 10-6 mark with Chicago last season ... with Minnesota, was 14-8 in 2004, 11-15 in 2006 and 13-14 in 2007.
- Ⓢ Has started a season 5-0 three times in his career: 2002 with Philadelphia, 2004 with Minnesota and 2010 with the Cubs.
 - Is the seventh player in big league history to start 5-0 with at least three clubs, joining Johnny Allen, Mudcat Grant, Tommy John, Roger Clemens, Pedro Martinez and Aaron Sele.
- Ⓢ He has walked 238 batters in 1,241.2 innings pitched, an average of only 1.7 walks per 9.0 innings.
- Ⓢ He made 27 or more starts in five-straight seasons from 2004-08.
- Ⓢ Is 24-11 with two saves and a 4.23 ERA (159 ER/338.2 IP) in 152 games (34 starts) in his career against the National League, including a 10-3 mark and a 3.64 ERA (46 ER/113.2 IP) in 42 games (13 starts) against the National League Central.

Soriano: Facts and Information

Alfonso is a seven-time All-Star who has belted 20 or more home runs in nine-consecutive seasons (2002-10) ... has hit .271 (543-for-2,005) with 106 homers and 279 RBI in 508 games for Chicago since signing an eight-year deal with the Cubs as a free agent in November of 2006.

- Ⓢ Is one of just six players to hit at least 20 homers in every season since 2002, joining Adam Dunn, Carlos Lee, David Ortiz, Albert Pujols and Alex Rodriguez.
- Ⓢ Has been a full-time outfielder since 2006, and his 64 outfield assists rank second in the majors in that span (Jeff Francoeur, 68).
- Ⓢ Belted a career-best 46 home runs and stole 41 bases in 2006, becoming just the fourth player in MLB history to reach the 40-40 mark.

In his fourth season with the Cubs, Alfonso led the club with 40 doubles and a .496 slugging percentage, and was second with 24 home runs, 79 RBI and 67 runs scored ... it marked his fifth 40-double campaign (also 2002, 2005-07).

- Ⓢ Reached the 40-double mark, October 2 in Houston ... is one of five players to have five 40-double seasons since 2002, joining Bobby Abreu, Todd Helton, Albert Pujols and Brian Roberts.
- Ⓢ His 147 games played were the most since appearing in a career-best 159 contests in 2006 with Washington.
- Ⓢ The 79 RBI were his most since knocking in 95 with Washington in 2006.

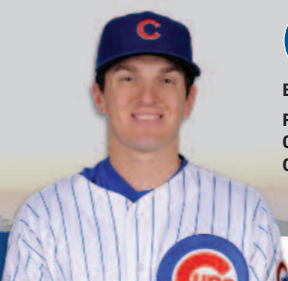

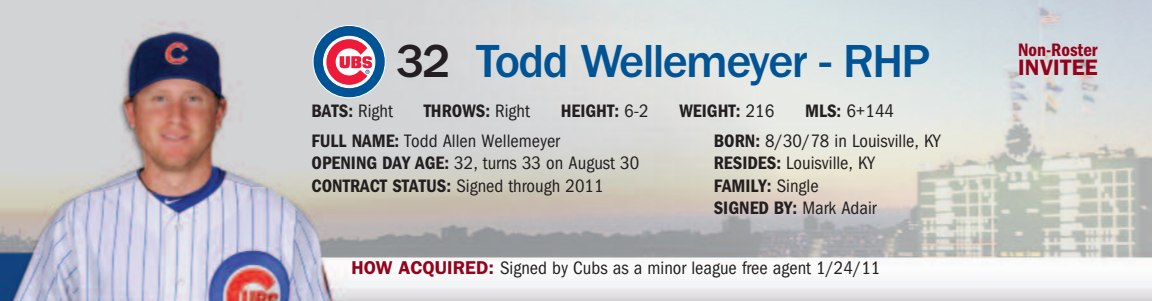

TEEN TALK

The youngest player to see action with the Cubs was Milt Scott, who was just 16 years, eight months old when he made his major league debut September 30, 1882.

Since 1900, the youngest Cubs position player was Danny Murphy, who was 17 years, nine months old when he made his debut June 18, 1960. He also is the youngest Cub to hit a home run, as he went deep for the first time September 13 that season against Cincinnati (18 years, 20 days old). He was the last teenager to make the Cubs opening day roster (19 years old in 1962).

The youngest pitcher in Cubs history was Dick Ellsworth, who was 18 years, three months old when he made his big league debut June 22, 1958.

The last teenager to appear in a game for the Cubs was 19-year-old outfielder Oscar Gamble, who played in 24 games for the Cubs during the 1969 season. The last Cubs teenage pitcher was 19-year-old Rick James, who appeared in three games in 1967. The last teenage pitcher to make the Cubs' opening day roster was 19-year old Al Epperly in 1938.

The 2011 season marks Randy's 10th year in professional baseball after he was selected by the Cubs in the 38th round of the 2002 First-Year Player Draft ... 2010 marked his first full major league season after making his big league debut in 2008.

2007: After beginning the season on the disabled list with right shoulder tendinitis, Kerry appeared in 22 games for Chicago, all in relief ... made his season debut, August 5 - his first big league outing in 14 months.

- Ⓢ Held the opponent scoreless in 18 of his 22 outings.
- Ⓢ Went 1-1 with a 1.04 ERA (1 ER/8.2 IP) in eight rehabilitation outings with Rookie League Mesa, Single-A Peoria and Double-A Tennessee from July 14-31.
- Ⓢ Activated from the disabled list August 3 ... made his season debut August 5, tossing a scoreless inning vs. the Mets.
 - Marked his first major league appearance since June 6, 2006 at Houston.
 - Was his first relief appearance since August 29, 2005 vs. Los Angeles (N.L.).
- Ⓢ Made three scoreless relief appearances to start his season (3.2 IP).
- Ⓢ Pitched in both ends of September 15's doubleheader in St. Louis.
 - Earned his first big league win since May 29, 2006 at Houston, and his first career major league win in relief in the first game.
- Ⓢ Finished the season by stringing together eight consecutive scoreless appearances dating to September 13 (9.2 IP).
- Ⓢ Pitched in two games of the NLDS against Arizona, working a total of 3.0 innings, allowing one run to score and striking out two.

2006: Kerry battled right shoulder injuries for the third-straight season, as he appeared in just four games with the Cubs ... he began the year on the disabled list recovering from right shoulder surgery ... after starting four games from May 18-June 6, he landed back on the disabled list for the remainder of the season with right shoulder stiffness.

- Ⓢ Tossed 10.0 innings in his two rehab starts at Triple-A Iowa and Single-A Peoria, May 7-13, finishing with a 0.90 ERA (1 ER/10.0 IP) with 15 strikeouts and three walks.
- Ⓢ In his first start of 2006, tossed 5.0 innings in a losing effort against the Nationals May 18 at Wrigley Field ... allowed four runs on five hits - including three solo home runs - while striking out six in the 5-3 loss.
- Ⓢ Earned his first win of 2006 in a 7-3 victory vs. Cincinnati May 29 ... tossed 6.0 innings, allowing two runs (one earned) on five hits and one walk while striking out four.
 - Recorded 1-2-3 innings in the first, second, fifth and sixth.
 - Went 2-for-2 at the plate ... doubled in his first at-bat then delivered an RBI-single in his second plate appearance.

2005: Kerry battled injuries throughout the year, missing approximately three months of the season as he made three trips to the disabled list ... was shut down for good on August 30, undergoing arthroscopic surgery the next day.

- Ⓢ Was on the disabled list May 1-June 29, July 21-August 5 and August 30-end of the season.
- Ⓢ Started the Cubs home opener, April 8 against Milwaukee - but was not involved in the decision in a 12-inning 6-3 Brewer win.
- Ⓢ Left his April 30 start after just 3.0 innings of work with a right shoulder strain and went on the disabled list May 3 with a right shoulder strain ... remained on the DL until June 29.
 - Made three rehab outings with Triple-A Iowa.
- Ⓢ Was reinstated to the active list, June 29 vs. Milwaukee, and started that afternoon ... pitched 6.0 innings (1 ER) in a 3-2 Cub win.
- Ⓢ Worked a season-high 7.2 innings in earning the win, July 9 at Florida (8-2) ... it was his first win since April 24.
- Ⓢ Left his start, July 20 at Cincinnati, with a stiff right shoulder (3.0 IP).
 - Began his second stint on the 15-day disabled list July 25 (retroactive to July 21).
 - Went to Single-A Peoria for a rehab assignment on July 31, where he saw action in two games.
- Ⓢ Was reinstated to the active list, August 5 and moved to the bullpen ... was 0-1 with a 2.25 ERA (3 ER/12.0 IP) and four holds in 11 relief appearances.
 - Worked a season-high 8.0-consecutive scoreless innings, August 5-19, spanning seven outings.
 - Held opponents to a .100 average and struck out 17 batters while issuing just five free passes.
- Ⓢ Made his first major league relief appearance, August 5 in New York, working 1.0 scoreless inning in a 9-5 Met win.
- Ⓢ Was shut down for the remainder of the season on August 30 ... underwent arthroscopic surgery on his right shoulder on August 31.
 - The one-hour surgery - which was performed by Dr. Timothy Kremchek - entailed reinforcement of the labrum, debridement of the rotator cuff and debridement of the bursa.

2004: Kerry moved up to fifth on the Cubs all-time strikeout list (fanning 144 batters in 140.1 innings) yet spent two months of the season on the disabled list.

- Ⓢ Posted four double-digit strikeout games, giving him 41 for his career – the most of any Cub pitcher since the start of the expansion ERA (since 1961).
- Ⓢ Served two stints on Major League Baseball's suspended list (May 14-20 and August 16-22) ... was suspended in April for confronting umpire Eric Cooper, and in August for hitting Jeff Kent with a pitch after both benches had been warned.
 - ♦ On April 17, he worked 8.2 innings in a 3-2 Cub loss ... was being replaced by Kent Mercker when he was ejected.
 - ♦ Was ejected from the August 22 contest after 4.2 innings with a 10-2 lead.
- Ⓢ Made his second career Opening Day start in a 7-4 win in Cincinnati.
 - ♦ Was the first Cub starter since Claude Passeau to win consecutive Opening Day starts (1941-1942).
- Ⓢ Struck out 11 batters in his April 11 victory at Atlanta (10-2), including seven-straight strikeouts from the third-fifth innings, tying a club record (for consecutive strikeouts by a starter).
- Ⓢ Combined to hurl a four-hit shutout with Kent Mercker and LaTroy Hawkins April 24 at New York (7.0 IP).
- Ⓢ Left a May 11 contest in Los Angeles with tightness in his right triceps after 2.0 innings of work ... spent two months of the season on the disabled list due to the injury (May 12-July 11).
 - ♦ Prior to going on the D.L., Wood was 2-3 with a 2.53 ERA (12 ER/42.2 IP).
 - ♦ Was 5-6 with a 4.14 ERA in 15 games after being activated from the disabled list.
 - ♦ Made one rehab start with Triple-A Iowa.
- Ⓢ Picked up the win in his first start after being activated from the disabled list (July 11 at St. Louis), snapping the club's five-game losing streak.
- Ⓢ Hit his seventh career homer, August 14, off the Los Angeles Dodgers' Kaz Ishii in a 2-0 shutout.
 - ♦ Became the fourth Cub pitcher since 1969 to homer in a Cub shutout ... all four homers have been solo shots.

2003: Went 14-11 with a major league-high 266 strikeouts and a 3.20 ERA in 32 starts ... his ERA was eighth in the N.L. as he was named to the All-Star team ... he was the first Cub to lead the N.L. in strikeouts since Fergie Jenkins in 1969 with 273.

- Ⓢ Limited opposing batters to a .203 average – the second-lowest mark in the N.L.
- Ⓢ Reached the 200-strikeout level for the fourth time during his five-season career.
 - ♦ His strikeout total was the third-best single-season total in Cubs history (since 1900).
 - ♦ Had 11 double-digit strikeout games.
 - ♦ On August 11, he reached the 1,000-strikeout mark for his career in his 134th major league game.
- Ⓢ Plunked a big league-high 21 opposing batters.
 - ♦ Was the first big leaguer to hit more than 20 batters in a season since California's Tom Murphy (21) in 1969 ... the last N.L. pitcher to surpass the 20-mark was Cincinnati's Jake Weimer – in 1907 (23).
- Ⓢ Made his first career Opening Day start, March 31 at New York (N.L.), and was the winner in a 15-2 affair ... at 25 years of age, he was the Cubs' youngest Opening Day hurler since Ray Burris in 1976.
- Ⓢ On June 7 against Roger Clemens and the Yankees, he picked up the 50th victory of his big league career in a 5-2 contest.
- Ⓢ Pitched a three-hitter in the Cubs 4-1 victory at Cincinnati, June 18 ... retired the first 17 batters he faced before giving up a sixth-inning single to Reggie Taylor.
- Ⓢ In his final start of the first half, July 9 vs. Florida at Wrigley Field, he went the distance in a 5-1 victory – allowing three hits and one run while striking out 12 batters ... in his first start of the second half July 19 at Florida, he went the distance in a 1-0 contest – allowing two hits and five walks while fanning eight batters.
 - ♦ The combined five hits allowed over the two starts were the fewest by a Cubs pitcher in back-to-back route-going efforts since Burt Hooton (two-hitter on September 21, 1971, vs. New York-N.L. and no-hitter April 16, 1972, vs. Philadelphia).
- Ⓢ Made his All-Star Game debut, July 15 at U.S. Cellular Field, hurling a scoreless fourth inning for the National League squad.
- Ⓢ Over his final six regular-season starts, he went 3-1 with a 0.84 ERA.
 - ♦ Threw the fifth shutout of his M.L. career in a 2-0 affair September 17 vs. New York (N.L.).
 - ♦ In a 6-0 win at Cincinnati, September 23, he had a no-hitter through 6.1 innings before surrendering a Wily Mo Pena infield single.
- Ⓢ Pitched in four post-season affairs, as the Cubs fell to the Marlins in the NLCS ... went 2-0 with a 1.76 ERA (3 ER/15.1 IP) and 18 strikeouts in two Division Series starts against Atlanta and went 0-1 with a 7.29 ERA (10 ER/12.1 IP) in two starts against Florida in the NLDS.
 - ♦ Hit a two-run homer off Mark Redman in Game Seven of the NLDS, a 9-6 Cubs defeat.

2002: Surpassed the 200.0-innings mark for the first time during his professional career (213.2), making a career-high 33 starts and going 12-11 with four complete games, 217 strikeouts and a 3.66 ERA.

- Ⓢ Reached the 200-strikeout level for the third time – and for the second consecutive season ... was the first Cub to record back-to-back 200-strikeout campaigns since Fergie Jenkins' five-year run from 1967-1971.
- Ⓢ Surrendered 169 hits – allowing four or fewer hits 14 times ... held opponents to a .221 average.
 - ♦ Over a five-start stretch from May 2-May 25, he worked at least 6.0 innings each outing while allowing four or fewer hits ... over the span, he gave up just 16 total hits in 37.0 innings.
- Ⓢ Was third in the N.L. in strikeouts and was sixth in both strikeouts per 9.0 innings (9.1) and opponents' batting average ... tied for fifth in the league in complete games.
- Ⓢ On May 7 against St. Louis at Wrigley Field, he hurled the third shutout of his big league career in an 8-0 contest ... tossed his second complete game of the year, May 25, in a 5-1 victory in Houston.
- Ⓢ On August 23 at Arizona, he went the distance but took the loss in a 3-2 contest ... in 8.0 innings, he allowed three hits, three runs and three walks while striking out 12 batters.
- Ⓢ Suffered another complete-game loss September 18 at New York-N.L. (2-1).
- Ⓢ In the fourth inning of his September 2 start vs. Milwaukee, he tied a big league record when he became the third pitcher in Cubs history to strike out four batters in an inning.
 - ♦ In the bottom half of the fourth, he hit his fourth M.L. homer – a two-run shot off Andrew Lorraine ... had a career-high three RBI.
- Ⓢ Worked 66.2 innings in his 11 losses – with the Cubs scoring 21 runs in those contests ... also had seven no-decisions in which the Cubs were leading at the time of his removal from the game.

2001: Was 12-6 with a 3.36 ERA in 28 starts ... fanned 217 batters in 174.1 innings while holding opponents to a big league-low .202 batting average.

- Ⓢ His strikeout total ranked fifth in the majors, while his ratio of 11.2 strikeouts per 9.0 innings ranked second.
 - ♦ Fanned at least 10 batters in eight starts.
- Ⓢ Went 11-2 with a 2.71 ERA over his final 20 starts.
 - ♦ Had a three-game losing streak May 3-May 13 ... snapped the streak May 19, defeating Arizona 6-2 – which started a personal six-game winning streak (May 19-June 17).
- Ⓢ On May 25 vs. Milwaukee at Wrigley Field, he pitched his second career one-hitter in a 1-0 shutout ... allowed just two walks while striking out 14 Brewers – the lone hit he surrendered was a Mark Loretta single leading off the seventh inning.
- Ⓢ Ranked ninth in the N.L. in ERA and tied for eighth in winning percentage (.667).
- Ⓢ Was on the disabled list August 4-September 7 with right shoulder tendinitis.
 - ♦ Made his last start before going on the disabled list August 3 at Los Angeles (N.L.) and earned his 10th win of the season in a 2-1 decision ... in 8.0 innings of work, he allowed three hits, a Shawn Green solo homer and two walks while striking out nine batters.

2000: Returned to the Cubs after missing the 1999 campaign and went 8-7 with a 4.80 ERA in 23 starts ... fanned 132 batters in 137.0 innings and held opposing batters to a .226 average.

- Ⓢ Opened the season on the disabled list in order to continue his right elbow rehabilitation ... after making two starts for Single-A Daytona and one for Triple-A Iowa, he returned to the majors May 2.
 - ◆ Earned the victory that evening in an 11-1 decision, working 6.0 innings and allowing three hits, one run (a Dayle Ward solo homer) and four walks while fanning four batters.
 - ◆ On the first pitch he saw as a batter, he hit a two-run homer off Jose Lima.
- Ⓢ Had his first double-digit strikeout game since the surgery August 27 vs. Los Angeles (N.L.), fanning 11 batters in 7.0 innings of work.
- Ⓢ On September 12 at Cincinnati, he tossed the second complete-game of his pro career, allowing four hits and two walks in a 2-1 win.
- Ⓢ Over his final starts, he allowed seven earned runs in 30.1 innings while fanning 31 batters,
 - ◆ In his final start of the year, September 27 vs. Philadelphia, he fanned 10 in 8.0 innings and picked up the win (1-0).
- Ⓢ Was on the disabled list July 30-August 21 due to a left oblique strain ... also was on the suspended list September 8-September 10 as a result of his actions during an August 27 affair vs. Los Angeles (N.L.).
 - ◆ Due to the muscle strain, he hit left-handed in his August 22 and August 27 starts.

1999: Missed the entire season after undergoing surgery to repair the torn ulnar collateral ligament in his right elbow (April 8, Dr. James Andrews) ... did not throw off a mound again until December 20 at the Cubs' Mesa, Ariz., minor league complex.

1998: Became just the fourth Cubs player – and the club's first pitcher – to win the Jackie Robinson N.L. Rookie of the Year Award ... went 13-6 with 233 strikeouts and a 3.40 ERA in 26 starts.

- Ⓢ Ranked third in the N.L. in strikeouts ... led the league in strikeouts per 9.0 innings (12.6) and opponents' batting average against (.196).
 - ◆ His strikeout total set the Cubs 20th-century rookie record, surpassing the 225 recorded by Tom Hughes in 1901 ... was the first Cub to reach the 200-strikeouts mark since Fergie Jenkins in 1971 (263).
- Ⓢ Made his major league debut April 12 at Montreal after the Cubs purchased his contract from Triple-A Iowa and took the loss (4-1) ... struck out seven batters in 4.2 innings – including the first batter he faced.
- Ⓢ Picked up his first major league win in his Wrigley Field debut April 18 against Los Angeles-N.L. (8-1) ... in the Cubs eight-run first inning, he recorded his first big league hit and RBI (off Hideo Nomo).
- Ⓢ On May 6 in just his fifth big league start, he fanned 20 Houston Astros and allowed just one hit in a complete-game 2-0 win ... allowed a third-inning single to Ricky Gutierrez and hit Craig Biggio with a pitch in the sixth, earning N.L. Player of the Week honors for May 4-May 10.
- Ⓢ In a 9-4 victory over Philadelphia June 20, he hit his first big league homer (off Matt Beech).
- Ⓢ Set the Cubs 20th-century single-season rookie strikeout record in his final start of the season August 31 vs. Cincinnati, fanning Brett Tomko for strikeout No. 226 ... two innings later, he hit a two-run homer off Tomko.
- Ⓢ Missed the last month of the regular season due to a sprained ulnar collateral ligament in his right elbow.
- Ⓢ Returned to the mound in the Division Series, as he started Game Three against Atlanta ... took the loss (6-2), allowing one run and three hits in 5.0 innings.

1997: Went 10-9 with a 4.57 ERA in a combined 29 starts for Double-A Orlando and Triple-A Iowa ... in 151.2 innings, he fanned an organization-high 186 batters while holding opponents to a .181 average.

1996: Led the Cubs farm system in strikeouts in his first full professional season, fanning 136 batters in 114.1 innings at Single-A Daytona ... went 10-2 with a 2.91 ERA in 22 starts.

1995: Made one start for Rookie-League Fort Myers and two for Single-A Williamsport in his first pro season.

On May 6, 1998, in just his fifth big league start, Kerry Wood fanned 20 Houston Astros and allowed just one base hit in a complete-game 2-0 win at Wrigley Field ... allowed only two baserunners, giving up a single to Ricky Gutierrez in the third inning and hitting Craig Biggio in the sixth.

The 20 strikeouts:

- ◆ Tied the major league record for a nine-inning game set by Boston's Roger Clemens (April 29, 1986, and September 18, 1996).
- ◆ Eclipsed the National League record of 19 reached by Providence's Charlie Sweeney (June 7, 1884), St. Louis' Steve Carlton (September 15, 1969), New York's Tom Seaver (April 22, 1970) and New York's David Cone (October 6, 1991).
- ◆ Exceeded the M.L. rookie record of 18 strikeouts, which had been reached by the Philadelphia Athletics' Jack Coombs on September 1, 1906, and by Montreal's Bill Gullickson (against the Cubs) on September 10, 1980.
- ◆ Surpassed the Cubs mark of 17, set by Jack Pfeister in a 15-inning outing May 30, 1906, vs. St. Louis.

Carlos is a three-time N.L. All-Star (2004, 2006, 2008) and etched his name in the record books by throwing the 13th no-hitter in franchise history, September 14, 2008, against the Astros at Miller Park in Milwaukee ... the 2011 season marks his 14th year in the Cubs organization.

- © Owns a 116-74 record with Chicago ... is just the third Cubs pitcher since 1900 to reach 116 wins before his 30th birthday, joining Ed Ruelbach and Fergie Jenkins.
- © Has seven 10-win seasons (2003-08, 2010), including a career-high 18 victories in 2007.
- © His 1,441 strikeouts rank second in franchise history ... Fergie Jenkins is first with 2,038 punchouts.

Carlos was 11-6 with a 3.33 ERA (48 ER/129.2 IP) in 36 games, 20 starts, for Chicago ... was 11-5 with a 3.19 ERA (40 ER/113.0 IP) in his starts, including an 8-0 mark and a 1.41 ERA (11 ER/70.1 IP) in his final 11 outings dating to August 9.

- © His 1.41 ERA, August 9 to the end of the season, was third-best in baseball behind Felix Hernandez (0.96) and Roy Oswalt (1.28) ... his eight wins in that stretch tied for the majors' most with Boston's Jon Lester.
- © Surrendered two or fewer earned runs in each of his final 11 starts ... was the first time a Cub has done that in a single season since Rick Reuschel did so from May 24-July 7, 1977.
- © His 3.33 season ERA was his lowest since a 3.26 mark in 2005.
- © Was 0-1 with a 4.32 ERA (8 ER/16.2 IP) in 16 relief appearances.

- Finished the campaign 14-6 with a 3.91 ERA (82 ER/188.2 IP) in 30 starts.
- Tossed 2.0-shutout innings in the Mid-Summer Classic, appearing in relief of starter Ben Sheets.
- Hit four homers to lead major league pitchers.
- Landed on the disabled list for the first time in more than six years when he was placed on the 15-day D.L. with a mild right shoulder strain June 21 (retro to June 19) through July 4.
- Went 7-2 with a 3.77 ERA (41 ER/98.0 IP) in 16 starts at Wrigley Field ... his .778 home winning percentage ranked tied for 12th in the majors.
- Was 10-3 with a 2.84 ERA (38 ER/120.1 IP) in 18 starts prior to the All-Star break ... went 4-3 with a 5.80 ERA (44 ER/68.1 IP) in 12 starts after the Mid-Summer Classic.

- Belted his 14th career home run July 19 at Houston (Wandy Rodriguez), passing Fergie Jenkins for the franchise mark by a pitcher.
- Made his 200th career start July 24 ... tossed 7.0 innings of two-run, six-hit ball in the Cubs 6-3 win over the Marlins.
- Tagged with the loss in Game Two of the NLDS vs. the Dodgers ... allowed seven runs in 6.1 innings of work, however, just three were earned runs.

2007: In his seventh season with Chicago, Carlos established career highs with 18 victories and 34 starts while going 4-2 with a 3.44 ERA (14 ER/36.2 IP) in six September outings.

- His 18 victories marked a career high, surpassing 16 victories in both 2004 and 2006, and were the most by a Cubs hurler since Mark Prior won 18 in 2003.
- His 12 road victories led the majors, as he went 12-4 with a 3.06 ERA (39 ER/114.2 IP) in 17 starts away from Wrigley Field.
 - His 12 road wins were the most by a Cub since Fergie Jenkins won 13 in 1970.
- Batted .247 (20-for-81) on the season with two doubles, two homers and five RBI.
- His 43 June strikeouts led the majors ... the last time he struck out that many in a single month was May of 2006 when he punched out 47.
- Went 9-2 with a 1.43 ERA (13 ER/81.2 IP), June 6-August 3, allowing two or fewer earned runs in 11 of those 12 starts.
- Carried a no-hitter into the eighth June 16 vs. San Diego before allowing a one-out single to Marcus Giles. ... went the distance in the club's 1-0 setback.
- Matched his career high with 12 strikeouts, allowing three hits over 8.0 innings of work in a 5-1 victory over the White Sox, June 22.
- Named the N.L. Pitcher of the Month for July, going 5-1 with a 1.38 ERA (6 ER/39.0 IP) in six starts.
- Suffered a career-high, five-game losing streak over six starts, August 3-September 3 ... was 0-5 with an 8.29 ERA (31 ER/33.2 IP) in that span.

- Ranked second in the N.L. with a .208 batting average against ... was fourth in the N.L. with 210 strikeouts ... in addition, his .696 winning percentage ranked third.
- Named to the National League All-Star team for the second time in his career (also 2004) ... did not pitch in the Mid-Summer Classic.
- His .696 winning percentage (16-7) was the highest for a last-place team since Roger Clemens went 21-7 (.750) for the 1997 Toronto Blue Jays ... special thanks to Elias Sports Bureau.
- Became the first Cubs pitcher since 1995 to have a 10-game road winning streak, as he went 10-0, August 17, 2005-July 25, 2006 ... he joined Steve Trachsel (1994-95) as the only two Cubs to accomplish the feat since 1930.
- Strung together a career-high, nine-game winning streak, June 5-July 30, becoming just the third Cubs pitcher to win at least eight-straight decisions since the start of the 1985 season.
 - Greg Maddux won nine-straight decisions in 1988, while Jaime Navarro won eight straight in 1996.
- Tied the Cubs single-season record for home runs by a pitcher with six long balls ... Fergie Jenkins hit six homers for Chicago in 1971.
- Won the **Louisville Slugger** Silver Slugger award, batting .151 with six homers and 11 RBI on the season.
- Went 6-0 with a 4.15 ERA (18 ER/39.0 IP) in six July starts en route to N.L. Pitcher of the Month honors.
- Collected his 50th career victory with 8.0-shutout innings against the Washington Nationals in a 4-0 win May 16 at Wrigley Field.
- Carried a no-hitter into the eighth inning at Houston June 5 before Preston Wilson singled with one out.
 - Belted his first home run of the season, becoming the first pitcher to hit a home run in a game in which he threw 7.0-plus innings and allowed no more than one hit since Montreal's Floyd Youmans June 8, 1986 against Philadelphia.
- Recorded his first career stolen base July 15 vs. the Mets.
- Endured the shortest outing of his career September 4 vs. Pittsburgh ... lasted just 1.1 innings before leaving the game with lower back stiffness.
- Tied his previous career high with his 16th victory of the season in an 11-4 win September 23 at Cincinnati ... tossed 7.0 innings, allowing four runs on six hits and three walks while striking out seven.

2005: Carlos made his first career Opening Day start and proved to be the team's ace, winning a team-high 14 games ... also led the club in strikeouts (202) and earned run average (3.26) for a starter.

- Was 14-6 with a 3.26 ERA in 33 starts ... was 10th in the National League in ERA and third in opponents batting average against.
- Surpassed the 200-strikeout mark for the first time in his career, fanning 202 batters.
 - Ranked sixth in the N.L. in strikeouts and 10th in strikeouts per 9.0 innings (8.1).
- Earned his first win of the season April 9, holding Milwaukee to one hit over 7.1-scoreless innings in a 4-0 combined shutout.

- Worked into the ninth inning in a 4-2 defeat of Houston August 17, throwing 116 pitches and striking out 10 batters (for his seventh career double-digit strikeout game).
 - Hit a solo home run off Roy Oswalt, becoming the first Cub pitcher in franchise history to record more than one career homer against the Astros.

2004: Carlos – who was honored with his first career All-Star selection in just his third full season in the majors – set a then career high with 16 wins and posted a career-best 2.75 ERA.

- Ⓢ Finished fourth in the National League in ERA and tied for fifth in wins ... also was sixth in opponents batting average against (.225), eighth in strikeouts (188) and strikeouts per 9.0 innings (8.1) and tied for ninth in walks (81).
- Ⓢ Was third in the N.L. in home ERA (2.38), sixth in road ERA (3.13) and third in day ERA (2.01).
- Ⓢ Surpassed the 200.0-innings mark for the second-straight season, as he hurled 214.0 innings in 2003 and 209.2 in 2004.
- Ⓢ Was selected the N.L. Pitcher of the Month in September ... went 4-0 with a 1.01 ERA (4 ER/35.2 IP) in five starts.
- Ⓢ Went 9-4 with a 2.61 ERA in the first half of the season en route to being named to his first All-Star team ... at 23 years and 43 days old, Zambrano was the youngest Cub to ever appear in an All-Star Game.
 - Worked the fourth inning of the Mid-Summer Classic, surrendering a RBI-triple to Alex Rodriguez.
- Ⓢ Worked 6.0 or more innings in 26 of his 31 starts, including his second career complete-game shutout.
- Ⓢ Was issued a five-game suspension by Major League Baseball for his actions in a July 19 game vs. St. Louis.
 - Was ejected from the game for hitting Jim Edmonds with a pitch after both benches had been warned.
- Ⓢ Struck out a career-high 12 batters May 2 at St. Louis for his third career double-digit strikeout game.
- Ⓢ Flirted with a no-hitter for the second time in his career August 23 against Milwaukee ... Geoff Jenkins' seventh-inning, one-out double was the first hit he allowed.

2003: Spent his first full season as a major league starter, going 13-11 with three complete games and a 3.11 ERA in 32 starts spanning a team-high 214.0 innings ... worked at least 6.0 innings in 27 of his starts.

- Ⓢ Finished seventh in the National League in ERA and eighth in innings pitched.
- Ⓢ Was eighth in the N.L. in ERA both on the road (3.22) and at home (3.00), joining Mark Prior as the two Cubs ranked among the league Top 10 in both categories.
 - Only two Cubs pitchers over the previous 30 seasons finished a season in the N.L. top-10 in ERA both at home and on the road – Rick Reuschel (1977) and Greg Maddux (1992).
- Ⓢ Allowed nine homers while inducing 24 batters to ground into double plays ... the only other full-season big league starter with fewer than 10 homers allowed was Boston's Pedro Martinez (seven in 186.2 innings).
 - When he surrendered a homer to San Francisco's Edgardo Alfonzo July 31, it was the first he had allowed since June 6, a stretch of nine-consecutive homer-free starts.
- Ⓢ At 21 years of age on Opening Day, he was the youngest Cub to appear on the Cubs season-opening roster since Greg Maddux (20) in 1987 ... made his first start of the season April 5 against Cincinnati at Great American Ball Park and earned the 9-7 victory.
- Ⓢ On May 3 vs. Colorado, hit his first big league homer off Darren Oliver.
- Ⓢ Was one of the league's top pitchers after the All-Star Break, going 7-3 with three complete games and a 2.51 ERA in 13 starts ... in 93.1 innings of work, he allowed five homers.
- Ⓢ Won five-consecutive starts, July 20-August 12 ... it was the first winning streak of more than two games during his big league career.
- Ⓢ In his first two starts of the second half, he allowed one earned run in 14.2 innings – and was 4-for-7 at the plate with a homer and four RBI.

On June 29, 1937, Cubs first baseman Jimmy Collins set a National League record by not having any fielding chances in the Cubs' 11-9 victory over the Cardinals in St. Louis. Left fielder Augie Galan and catcher Gabby Hartnett each had eight of the Cubs' 27 putouts, followed by second baseman Billy Herman (4), shortstop Billy Jurgens (3), center fielder Joe Marty (2), starting right fielder Frank Demaree (1) and substitute right fielder Phil Cavarretta (1). Herman had both Cubs assists in the game on force plays at second base.

The only other N.L. first baseman to accomplish that feat was the Cubs' Fred McGriff — on August 15, 2002, vs. Houston. Catchers Todd Hundley (14) and Joe Girardi (3) recorded 17 of the club's 27 putouts via the strikeout route. Shortstop Alex Gonzalez had the Cubs' only assist on a ninth-inning ground out.

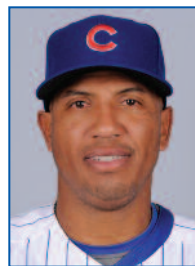

The Chicago Daily News, noting all the youngsters in the Chicago camp, used the nickname "Cubs" for the first time in its March 27, 1902 edition.

THE FRIENDLY CONFINES OF WRIGLEY FIELD

Entering the 2011 campaign, there have been 12,082 home runs hit at Wrigley Field — 6,074 by the Cubs, 5,926 by their opponents and 82 by Federal League clubs (1914-1915).

The ballpark's single-season homer high is 233, recorded in 2004 (137 by the Cubs). The Cubs' top Wrigley Field homer total is 137, also in 2004. Opponents hit 125 long balls at Wrigley Field in 2006, their most of any season.

GOING DEEP AGAIN AND AGAIN

The Cubs homered 15 times over a three-game period August 10-August 12, 2002, hitting six homers August 10 at Colorado's Coors Field, five on August 11 at Coors Field and four on August 12 at Wrigley Field.

The 15 homers tied a National League three-game mark accomplished three previous times — most recently by Cincinnati in 1999 (September 4-September 6).

2010 SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

FINAL STANDINGS: The Cubs finished the 2010 regular season with a 75-87 record, fifth in the N.L. Central Division, 16-games behind the Cincinnati Reds ... Chicago was as high as second in the division on May 4 with a 13-14 record.

- © Chicago's largest deficit was 21.5-games on September 2.
- © The Cubs previously finished fifth or lower in the division in 2006, when a 66-96 record placed them sixth in the N.L. Central.

ABOUT THE SEASON: Chicago sat at a season-high .500 mark four times on the season: 4-4, 5-5, 10-10 and 13-13 (following play on May 2) ... it marked the first time Chicago did not reach at least one-game over .500 in a season since 2002.

- © Chicago had a season-high, six-game winning streak, September 13-19 ... the team had a season-long, seven-game losing streak, July 27-August 3.

INSIDE THE NUMBERS: The Cubs played 54 one-run games, tied for fifth-most in the majors ... the team was 22-32 (.407) in those contests - the 32 one-run losses were most in the majors, and the .407 winning percentage was second-to-last, ahead of Detroit (.381).

- © Of Chicago's 162 games played, 83 were decided by two or fewer runs with the team going 37-46 in those contests.
- © After finishing the first half of the season with a 39-50 record, Chicago went 36-37 after the All-Star break.
- © The Cubs were 49-59 against right-handed starting pitchers and 26-28 against left-handed starters.

TURNING THINGS AROUND: Chicago went 19-10 in the final month of the season (including 2-1 in October), giving the club its first winning month of the season ... it was the first time in 117 years the Cubs managed a winning record in the season's final month after recording sub-.500 marks in every other month.

- © The only other time the franchise accomplished this feat was way back in 1893 ... after logging a losing record in each of the first four months that season, the Cubs went 13-8 in September for its first winning month.

QUADE'S MANAGERIAL DEBUT: Mike Quade became the 51st manager of the Cubs August 23, making him the sixth Cubs manager born in Illinois, joining Albert Spalding (1876-77), Hank O'Day (1914), Phil Cavarretta (1951-53), Lou Boudreau (1960) and Jim Marshall (1974-76) ... this list excludes the Cubs' "College of Coaches," used from 1961-65.

- © Quade began his managerial career with a 17-8 record in his first 25 games, the best start by a Cubs manager since Charlie Grimm in 1932 - Grimm went 20-5 in his first 25 games after replacing Rogers Hornsby.

SWEET LOU: Lou Piniella retired following August 22's game vs. Atlanta ... he finished his 23-year managerial career with a 1,835-1,713 (.517) all-time record, including a 316-293 mark (.519) in three-plus seasons with the Cubs ... his 1,835 victories rank 14th all-time in major league history while his 316 Cubs wins rank eighth in franchise annals ... with N.L. Central titles in 2007 and 2008, Piniella was the first manager to lead the Cubs to consecutive post-season berths since Frank Chance in 1906-08.

- © May 16th vs. Pittsburgh, Cubs skipper Lou Piniella recorded his 1,800th major league managerial victory ... he became the 14th manager in the history of baseball to reach the milestone.

YOUNG GUNS: Chicago used 18 rookies in 2010, including 12 pitchers ... of the 18 rookies utilized, 11 made their major league debut: pitchers Andrew Cashner, Casey Coleman, Thomas Diamond, Scott Maine, Marcos Mateo, James Russell and Brian Schlitter; catcher Wellington Castillo; infielders Darwin Barney and Starlin Castro, and outfielder Brad Snyder.

QUITE A TRIP: The Cubs went 8-1 (.889) during a nine-game trip to Milwaukee (2-1), St. Louis (3-0) and Florida (3-0), September 10-19 ... it was the team's most successful trip of at least nine games in franchise history (thanks to Elias).

LEADING MEN: The Cubs held a lead in each of the first 10 games of the season, something the club had not done in 72 years ... the team last had a longer streak to start the season in 1938, leading its first 19 games of the season.

THIS STREAK IS WAY BACK...: The Cubs homered in a franchise-record 20-consecutive games against the Astros from September 14, 2008 through April 16, 2010 ... the last big league club to own a longer homer streak against one club is the Philadelphia Phillies - they went deep in 22-straight games against the Milwaukee Brewers from May 17, 2006-September 24, 2009.

QUALITY EFFORTS: Chicago's starting pitchers led the N.L. and were second in the majors with 96 quality starts ... Oakland led the majors with 103 quality efforts.

- © The 96 quality starts were Chicago's most since recording 100 in 2003.

START ME UP: Cubs starters went 10-straight games allowing two or fewer earned runs, April 16-25, logging a 1.74 ERA (12 ER/62.0 IP) in that stretch ... Chicago's starters had previously gone 10-consecutive contests with two or fewer earned runs, April 10-22, 2001, during an 11-game stretch.

GOOSE EGGS: With 14 shutouts in 2010, Cubs pitchers recorded their most shutouts since blanking the opponent 14 times in 2003 ... the team's hitters were shut out 15 times, the most since being blanked 15 times in 2006.

- © Chicago's hurlers recorded the 14 shutouts without a complete-game effort, a franchise record.
- © Of the team's final 23 games dating to September 8, 13 of them resulted in a shutout ... Chicago's final seven-game trip on the season resulted in five shutouts, with the Cubs going 3-2 in those games.

SCORELESS STREAKS: Chicago's bullpen closed the season with a 28.0-inning scoreless streak dating to the ninth inning September 23 vs. the Giants ... it was the bullpen's longest scoreless innings streak since a 29.1-inning run, August 13-17, 1982.

- © Cubs pitching logged 27.0-consecutive scoreless innings before allowing three runs in October 2's seventh inning at Houston ... that was the team's longest streak since a 28.0-inning run, June 25-29, 2005.

LEADING SWEEP: In their three-game sweep of Milwaukee, April 23-25, the Cubs did not trail in any of the games ... the club previously enjoyed a three-game sweep in which it either led or was tied for every inning of the series September 7-9, 2009, during a three-game sweep in Pittsburgh (thanks to Elias Sports Bureau).

REACHING 300: Derrek Lee and Alfonso Soriano hit their 300th career home runs just two days apart ... Lee hit his 300th career blast June 9 in Milwaukee off Randy Wolf while Soriano belted his June 11 vs. the White Sox off Jake Peavy.

© Lee and Soriano became the 126th and 127th players in big league history to join the 300 home run club ... nine players have now hit their 300 home run as a Cub - the 2010 duo was the first to do so since Sammy Sosa, June 26, 1999 vs. Philadelphia's Robert Person.

BACK SO SOON?: Randy Wells took the mound May 31 in Pittsburgh on just two days rest after his start May 28 vs. St. Louis lasted 16 pitches (six batters faced, six hits) ... Wells became the first Cubs pitcher in almost 20 years to make a pair of starts in a roughly 72-hour span ... the previous Cubs starter to do so was Mike Bielecki, who made a start on June 12, 1990 against the Mets (1.1 IP) and another start on June 15 against the Phillies (7.0 IP).

© In addition to Wells and Bielecki, only three other Cubs pitchers have made two starts in this span of time in the last 30 seasons: Greg Maddux (July 7 and 10, 1987), Scott Sanderson (May 18 and 20, 1986) and Doug Bird (September 27 and 30, 1981) ... thanks to Ed Hartig for his research assistance.

CUBS HIT 20,000 GAMES: June 26 at the White Sox, the Cubs became the first franchise to play 20,000 regular season games ... the organization owned a 10,197-9,643 (.514) all-time record with 160 ties and no-decisions in its first 20,000 games since its inception in 1876.

© In their first 20,000 games, the Cubs and their opponents scored 181,642 runs ... just counting the 360-feet covered by runners who scored, that totals over 12,300 miles - equivalent to over 1.5 trips around the Earth at the equator.

FUTURE FUN: The Cubs had two players and two minor league managers participate in the 2010 XM All-Star Futures Game, Tuesday, July 13 at Angel Stadium ... Peoria infielder Hak-Ju Lee played for the World Team while Daytona outfielder Brett Jackson was part of the U.S. squad.

© Triple-A Iowa manager Ryne Sandberg was a coach on the World Team while Double-A Tennessee manager Bill Dancy was a coach on the U.S. Team.

HE'S A SAVIOR: Closer Carlos Marmol saved over half of Chicago's 75 victories in 2010 (38 saves) ... the Cubs previously had a closer turn the trick in 1998, when Rod Beck recorded a save in 51 of the team's 90 wins.

© Marmol set a major league record, averaging 15.99 strikeouts per 9.0 innings pitched ... that surpassed Eric Gagne's 14.98 mark in 2003 for the highest rate by a reliever.

CASTRO CRACKS TOP-10: Starlin Castro finished his rookie season with a .300 batting average, 10th-best among National League qualifiers ... he became the first Cubs rookie to bat at least .300 and finish in the top-10 among N.L. qualifiers since Bill Madlock hit .313 in 1974 to finish fifth in the Senior Circuit.

© Castro's .300 batting average was third among N.L. rookies behind Houston's Chris Johnson (.308) and San Francisco's Buster Posey (.305).

© Castro's 39 multi-hit games, 31 doubles and five triples all ranked third among N.L. rookies ... his 139 hits ranked fourth.

SIX HITLESS INNINGS: Randy Wells had a no-hitter through six innings July 3 vs. the Reds ... Ted Lilly went eight innings without allowing a hit vs. the White Sox, June 13 ... according to Elias, it's the first time since 2004 that two Cubs starting pitchers reached the seventh inning without allowing a hit in games played at Wrigley Field in the same season.

© In 2004, Matt Clement went 6.1 innings without allowing a hit against the Mets, April 25 (Karim Garcia broke it up with a home run), and Carlos Zambrano also went 6.1 without allowing a hit against the Brewers, August 23 (broken up by a Geoff Jenkins double).

SEASON ACHIEVEMENTS: Aramis Ramirez reached 25 home runs for the sixth time in his Cubs career, and is one of six players to have six or more 25-home run seasons with Chicago ... he joined Sammy Sosa (12 times), Billy Williams (10), Ernie Banks (10), Ron Santo (8) and Ryne Sandberg (6).

© Alfonso Soriano reached 40 doubles, giving him five seasons with 40 or more two baggers (2002, 2005-07, 2010).

© Carlos Zambrano allowed two or fewer earned runs in his final 11 starts of the season ... Elias reports that ties the club record since 1912, done seven other times - the previous pitcher to do so in a single-season was Rick Reuschel in 1977.

The ballpark's single-season homer high is 233, recorded in 2004 (137 by the Cubs). The Cubs' top Wrigley Field homer total is 137, also in 2004. Opponents hit 125 long balls at Wrigley Field in 2006, their most of any season.

A GRAND TIME WAS HAD BY ALL

The Cubs have hit 291 grand slams in franchise history, including three in 2010, five in 2009 and seven in 2008.

The Cubs record for grand slams in a season is nine, recorded in 1929 by Hack Wilson (2), Rogers Hornsby (2), Charlie Grimm (2), Riggs Stephenson, Norman McMillan and Kiki Cuyler. McMillan's roundtripper was of the inside-the-park variety.

The club's first grand slam was hit by pitcher Larry Corcoran on June 20, 1882, off Worcester's Lee Richmond at Chicago's Lakefront Park.

The only Cubs to hit more than two grand slams in one season are Ernie Banks (5 in 1955), Wildfire Schulte (4 in 1911) and Sammy Sosa (3 in 1998). Sosa hit grand slams in back-to-back games July 27-July 28 of that season, becoming the first Cub to accomplish that feat.

On June 3, 1987, the Cubs and Houston Astros combined to hit three grand slams – tying a major league single-game record. Two Cubs hit bases-loaded roundtrippers – Brian Dayett (off Bob Knepper) and Keith Moreland (off Julio Solano). Houston's Billy Hatcher hit a grand slam in the contest off Rick Sutcliffe.

On August 16, 1890, Chicago batters Tom Burns and Malachi Kitttridge both connected for fifth-inning grand slams off Pittsburgh's Bill Phillips – for the franchise's only multiple grand slam inning.

ROARING 20'S

The Cubs have been involved in two of the highest scoring games in major league history, defeating Philadelphia 26-23 on August 25, 1922, at Cubs Park, and falling to the Phillies 23-22 on May 17, 1979, at Wrigley Field.

The Cubs have scored at least 20 runs in a game 15 times since 1900. The last time they reached that scoring plateau occurred May 5, 2001, at Wrigley Field – a 20-1 victory over Los Angeles. Their last 20-plus runs affair on the road took place August 18, 1995, at Colorado (26-7).

The last time the Cubs surrendered 20 runs in a game took place July 3, 1999, at Philadelphia (21-8 loss). The Cubs have allowed 20-plus runs 12 times since 1900.

PITCH OUTS

The Cubs set a team mark in 1999 by utilizing 25 different pitchers.

The club mark for most left-handed pitchers to see mound action in a season is 10 – a figure reached in both 1999 and 2000. Prior to the 1999 campaign, the team record of eight had stood since 1966.

The team mark for most strikeouts by a reliever is 11, set by Dave Hillman during a 7.2-inning relief stint May 28, 1959, against Los Angeles.

The last Cubs position player to take the mound for the Cubs was third baseman Gary Gaetti, who saw relief action July 3, 1999, at Philadelphia.

Since the advent of divisional play in 1969, the only Cub to record a save in his major league debut was Todd Wellemeyer (May 15, 2003, at Milwaukee).

The last Cubs rookie to hurl back-to-back complete games was Rich Hill in 2006 (September 16 vs. Cincinnati, September 22 at Cincinnati).

Hill finished with two complete games in 2006, making him the first Cubs rookie with more than one complete game in a season since Frank Castillo tossed four in 1991.

The best career start recordwise for a Cubs pitcher is 8-0, recorded by King Cole in 1910. The worst start belongs to Jim Brewer, who began his Cubs career 0-8 in 1961.

On July 17, 1918, Lefty Tyler pitched a Cubs-record 21 innings in a route-going 2-1 win against Philadelphia. He gave up 13 hits and one walk while striking out eight.

Three years earlier, on June 17, 1915, reliever George "Zip" Zabel was called into a game against Brooklyn with two out in the top of the 1st inning at West Side Grounds. He had to pitch 18.1 innings before earning the win, as the Cubs won 4-3 in the 19th inning.

The Cubs played 5,717 contests between Milt Pappas' near-perfect game in 1972 and Carlos Zambrano's no-hitter in 2008. Over that stretch, Cubs pitchers threw 21 one-hitters, with the last one taking place September 29, 2007, against the Reds in Cincinnati — when Rich Hill (6.0 IP), Sean Marshall (2.0 IP) and Scott Eyre (1.0 IP) combined on a one-hitter at Great American Ball Park.

Entering 2011, the Cubs have gone a Major League record 45 full seasons since they were last no-hit, surpassing the mark set by the St. Louis Cardinals from 1920 to 1959. According to the Sporting News Complete Baseball Record Book, the American League record is 44 years, accomplished by the New York Yankees from 1959 to 2002.

Entering this campaign, the Cubs have played 7,177 games since they were no-hit by Los Angeles' Sandy Koufax in 1965 (a span of just over 45 years). Since Koufax's perfect game, the Cubs have had 21 one-hitters tossed against them, with the last one occurring August 21, 2009 — when Los Angeles' Randy Wolf, George Sherrill and Jonathan Broxton combined to accomplish the feat at Dodger Stadium (Ryan Theriot singled to left in the third inning for the Cubs' lone knock). The last pitcher to take a no-hitter into the 9th inning against the Cubs was Florida's Alex Fernandez — on April 10, 1997, at Wrigley Field (broken up by a Dave Hansen single).

HISTORICAL INFORMATION

Highlights In Cubs History

1876: The first game in the history of the Chicago National League franchise took place April 25, as Albert Spalding pitched the first N.L. shutout in the Chicago White Stockings' 4-0 win at Louisville ... Spalding also had the first hit in franchise history, while center fielder Paul Hines scored the first run on a throwing error in the second inning.

- © The first home run in N.L. history was hit by the White Stockings' Ross Barnes on May 2 in a 15-9 victory in Cincinnati.
- © The creation of the N.L. was credited largely to William A. Hulbert, who held the dual role of league president and Chicago president until 1882 ... with the assistance of manager Albert Spalding, Hulbert drafted the N.L. constitution and by-laws in 1875.
- © Of the eight original charter members of the National League, only the Cubs have operated continuously in the same city.

1880: The North Siders won 21-straight games, June 2-July 8, including one tie (June 4).

1883: Chicago set major league records when it scored 18 runs and collected 18 hits in September 6's seventh frame ... the Cubs went on to beat Detroit 26-6.

1903: In October, the Cubs and White Sox held the first of the semi-annual "City Series" ... at points from 1903-1942, the two teams met following the regular season for a crosstown set as long as neither team made the Fall Classic.

- © In the inaugural year, the Chicago teams ended with seven wins apiece ... what would have been the deciding game was cancelled due to weather.

1906: The Chicago club went 116-36 in setting major league records for wins in a season and winning percentage (.763).

- © The Cubs and White Sox met in the first and only all-Chicago Fall Classic ... it also marked the first time two teams from the same city met in the World Series ... the Cubs fell to the White Sox, four games to two.

1907: "Cubs" was officially adopted as the nickname of the team ... the Cubs then went on to win their first World Series, defeating Detroit in five games.

1908: The Cubs were World Series champions for the second straight year, defeating Detroit four games to one.

1911: Frank "Wildfire" Schulte became the first player in the majors to hit at least 20 doubles, 20 triples and 20 homers in a single season.

1916: The Cubs moved into Weeghman Park (now known as Wrigley Field).

1921: William Wrigley Jr. became the Cubs' majority owner.

- © Wrigley's involvement with the team began in 1916, when a 10-man syndicate led by Charles Weeghman purchased the club from Charles Taft ... in 1919, Wrigley purchased Weeghman's shares to have controlling interest.
- © After Wrigley's death in 1932, his interest passed to his son, Philip K. Wrigley ... upon Philip's death in 1977, principal interest in the ballclub was left to his son, William Wrigley.
- © The sale of the club to Tribune Company in 1981 ended the longest continuous operation of a franchise by the same family in one city.

1924: The first Cubs game was broadcast on the radio ... Hal Totten transmitted the April 23 home opener from the Wrigley Field roof ... Chicago routed the Cardinals 12-1 in the contest.

THE CHICAGO CUBS — SINCE 1876

The Chicago National League franchise is in its 136th season in 2011. During the first 135 N.L. campaigns, the team played 20,088 contests – and won 10,240 times.

1930: Hack Wilson established a M.L. record by driving in 191 runs while hitting 56 home runs – a club/N.L. record that lasted until 1998.

- © The largest crowd to see a baseball game at Wrigley Field (51,556) took place June 27 vs. Brooklyn ... of that number, 30,476 were Ladies' Day guests and 1,332 were passholders.

1935: The Cubs won 21-straight September games in capturing the N.L. pennant.

1945: The Cubs went to their 10th World Series, falling to Detroit in seven games.

1946: Chicago aired its first game on television ... the April 20 home opener was carried out on WBKB with "Whispering Joe" Wilson calling the 2-0 loss to the Cardinals.

1958: Ernie Banks became the first member of a team with a losing record to win the MVP Award ... also was named the N.L. MVP in 1959, becoming the first N.L. player to win the award in consecutive seasons.

1960: Don Cardwell threw a no-hitter against St. Louis in his Cubs debut May 15 ... became the first pitcher in baseball history to hurl a no-hitter in his first game for a club.

1970: Billy Williams became the first player in N.L. history to appear in 1,000 consecutive games, reaching that mark April 30 ... his streak extended to 1,117 games before ending September 3.

1973: Following Whitey Lockman's ejection May 8, coach Ernie Banks takes over the reins as acting manager, becoming the first African-American in major league history to manage a team.

1982: On May 25 at San Diego, Fergie Jenkins became the seventh pitcher in baseball history to record 3,000 strikeouts.

- © **On August 22, Ernie Banks became the first Cub to have his uniform number (14) retired.**

1984: The Cubs clinched their first N.L. Eastern Division title September 24 in Pittsburgh (4-1), marking the first time since 1945 that the club advanced into the postseason ... the Cubs went 96-65 under N.L. Manager of the Year Jim Frey.

- © The Cubs fell to San Diego in the NLCS three games to two.

1987: Andre Dawson became the first player from a sixth-place team to win the N.L.'s MVP Award, hitting 49 homers and driving in 137 runs.

- © **On August 13, Hall of Famer Billy Williams had his No. 26 retired.**

1988: The first Wrigley Field night game took place August 8 against Philadelphia ... the game was rained out after 3.5 innings with the Cubs leading 3-1.

© The first official night contest took place August 9 vs. New York, with the Cubs winning 6-4 ... the first pitch was thrown by Mike Bielecki at 7:05 p.m. - a called strike to Lenny Dykstra.

1989: The Cubs won their second N.L. Eastern Division title when they defeated Montreal 3-2 at Olympic Stadium September 26 ... the Cubs compiled a 93-69 record under N.L. Manager of the Year Don Zimmer before falling in the NLCS to San Francisco four games to one.

© For only the fifth time, teammates finished as the top two votegetters in the Jackie Robinson N.L. Rookie of the Year balloting ... Jerome Walton, who had a club-record 30-game hitting streak during the season, won the award, while Dwight Smith finished second in the voting.

1990: Ryne Sandberg hit a league-high 40 home runs, the third-highest single-season total for a second baseman behind the 42 hit by St. Louis' Rogers Hornsby in 1922 and Atlanta's Davey Johnson in 1973.

© Sandberg also set a then M.L. record by playing errorless ball in 123 straight games at second base, June 21, 1989-May 17, 1990 ... the feat still stands as the N.L. mark.

1993: Sammy Sosa became the first player in Cubs history to record a 30-homer/30-steal campaign (33 homers, 36 steals).

1995: The Cubs won their 9,000th game May 21 at Los Angeles, defeating the Dodgers 2-1 in 13 innings ... the Cubs have won more games than any other one-city professional franchise.

© Sammy Sosa hit the 10,000th homer in Cubs history August 14 in Los Angeles (off Tom Candiotti).

1998: The Cubs went to post-season play as the N.L.'s Wild Card club after defeating San Francisco 5-3 in a one-game tie-breaker ... the Cubs were swept by Atlanta during the Division Series.

© Sammy Sosa, who battled St. Louis' Mark McGwire for the major league homer record, earned N.L. Most Valuable Player honors ... Sosa finished the campaign with 66 homers - four behind McGwire - while leading the majors with 158 RBI and 134 runs scored.

© Kerry Wood was named the league's Rookie of the Year after going 13-6 in 26 starts with 233 strikeouts ... on May 6 vs. Houston, he tied the M.L. single-game mark by fanning 20 batters while allowing just one hit in a complete-game 2-0 win.

2000: The Cubs opened the season in Tokyo, marking the first regular season games ever held outside of North America ... the March 29 season opener is the Cubs earliest regular season contest in franchise history.

2001: Sammy Sosa became the first player in M.L. history to reach the 60-homers mark in three different campaigns ... he also became the first player to have a trio of three-homer games in one season.

© Sosa had a club-record 425 total bases for his second career 400-plus campaign (416 in 1998).

© On May 24-25, Jon Lieber and Kerry Wood hurled back-to-back complete-game one-hit shutouts.

2003: On September 27, the Cubs clinched their first-ever National League Central Division title when they swept a double-header vs. Pittsburgh by scores of 4-2 and 7-2 while Houston lost to Milwaukee 5-2 ... the Cubs won the division one season after going 67-95.

© The Cubs came within a victory of heading to the World Series, as they defeated Atlanta three games to two in the Division Series before falling to Florida four games to three in the NLCS.

© Cubs pitchers fanned a major league-record 1,404 batters while allowing 1,304 hits - the highest differential in big league annals ... Kerry Wood (266) and Mark Prior (245) finished 1-2 in the major league strikeout race.

© **On September 28, the Cubs retired the uniform number - No. 10 - of longtime third baseman/broadcaster Ron Santo.**

2004: On August 7 at San Francisco, Greg Maddux won his 300th career game, becoming the 22nd pitcher in major league history to do so.

© He was the second Cub to win his 300th game while donning a Cub uniform, joining Grover "Ol' Pete" Alexander in that distinction.

2005: Derrek Lee won the N.L. batting title after leading all three Triple Crown categories for much of the season ... the first baseman batted .335 and also led the National League in hits, total bases, doubles, slugging percentage and extra-base hits.

© Greg Maddux struck out his 3,000th career batter, becoming the second Cub in franchise history to record 3,000 strikeouts (also Fergie Jenkins) ... the Cubs are the only major league franchise to have two pitchers surpass the mark in their uniform.

♦ Endured a two-hour, 43-minute rain delay prior to the start of the game on July 26, fanning San Francisco's Omar Vizquel in the third inning for the milestone strikeout.

© **On August 28, the Cubs retired the uniform number - No. 23 - of Hall of Fame second baseman Ryne Sandberg.**

2007: On September 28, the Cubs clinched their second N.L. Central Division title when they defeated the Cincinnati Reds on the road, 6-0, and the Milwaukee Brewers fell at home to the Padres, 6-3 ... Chicago became the first club to win the Central after finishing last the season before (66-96 in 2006).

2008: The Cubs won their second straight N.L. Central Division title by defeating the St. Louis Cardinals 5-4 at Wrigley Field September 20 ... the Cubs won a N.L.-leading 97 games, marking the most wins for the Cubs since posting 98 in 1945.

© Chicago earned the 10,000th win in franchise history in a 7-6, 10-inning victory at the Rockies April 23.

© The Cubs tied a N.L. record by sending eight representatives to the Mid-Summer Classic ... Geovany Soto became the first-ever N.L. rookie catcher to start the contest.

© Carlos Zambrano hurled the Cubs first no-hitter in 36 years September 14 vs. the Astros at Miller Park ... Ted Lilly, Jeff Samardzija, Carlos Marmol and Bob Howry followed the next day by combining on a one-hitter ... it marked the first time in M.L. history that a team had allowed just one hit in consecutive games.

© The Cubs drew a franchise record 3,300,200 fans in 81 home dates at Wrigley Field, surpassing their previous record of 3,252,462 fans in 2006 ... the 3,300,200 season total was the highest single-season total for any franchise in the history of Chicago professional sports.

2009: October 28 marked the first day under The Ricketts Family, ending a 28-year run under Tribune Company ... The Ricketts are the first family to own the Cubs since the Wrigley clan sold the team in 1981.

© The Cubs finished with an 83-78 mark, good for second in the N.L. Central ... prior to 2007, Chicago previously finished first or second in its division three consecutive years from 1935-38 during a four-season run.

© The Cubs and WRT0-1200 AM partnered to broadcast over 20 games in Spanish in 2009 ... it marked the first time in over 14 seasons that the Cubs featured a Spanish broadcast.

© **On May 3, the Cubs retired the uniform number - No. 31 - of Fergie Jenkins and Greg Maddux.**

2010: The Cubs played the 20,000th contest in franchise history, June 26 ... a 3-2 setback to the White Sox at U.S. Cellular Field.

NAMES AND NUMBERS

A total of 1,882 players have appeared in at least one game for the Chicago National League ball club. The team's single-season record for most players used is 51 (in 2000), while the single-year mark for most pitchers utilized is 25 (in 1999).

The most popular last names in Cubs history belong to Smith (16), Johnson (11), Williams (10) and Brown (9). The longest last names in Cubs history – 13 letters each – belong to Gene DeMontreville (1899), Todd Hollandsworth (2004-05) and Ken Raffensberger (1940-41). There have been 19 Cubs with last names consisting of three letters, most recently Derrek Lee (2004-10), Felix Pie (2007-08), Chad Fox (2005, 2008-09) and Jake Fox (2007, 2009)

HEY NOW, YOU'RE AN ALL-STAR

Ernie Banks was selected to the National League All-Star team 14 times, the highest total for a Cubs player. Ryne Sandberg ranks second in club history with 10 All-Star appearances (nine starts).

The only Cub to earn Most Valuable Player honors was Bill Madlock, who had a game-winning two-run bases-loaded ninth-inning single off the White Sox's Rich Gossage in the 1975 contest. Madlock shared MVP honors with the New York Mets' Jon Matlack.

Seven Cubs batters have hit All-Star home runs, most recently Alfonso Soriano in the 2007 contest off Seattle's J.J. Putz. The others: Augie Galan (1936 off Detroit's Schoolboy Rowe), Hank Sauer (1952 off Cleveland's Bob Lemon), Ernie Banks (1960 off Boston's Bill Monbouquette), George Altman (1961 off Boston's Mike Fomiele), Billy Williams (1964 off Kansas City's John Wyatt) and Andre Dawson (1991 off Boston's Roger Clemens).

Cubs pitchers have earned five All-Star wins — Bob Rush (1952), Larry Jackson (1963), Bruce Sutter (1978 and 1979) and Lee Smith (1987). Cubs relievers have picked up four saves (Lon Warneke in 1936, Don Elston in 1959, Sutter in 1980 and Randy Myers in 1995). Cubs pitchers have suffered four All-Star losses — Bill Lee (1939), Claude Passeau (1941 and 1946) and Johnny Schmitz (1948).

Passeau is the only Cubs pitcher to start in the All-Star Game, taking the loss in the 1946 Midsummer Classic at Boston's Fenway Park.

The youngest Cubs player selected to the N.L. All-Star team was Greg Maddux, who was 22 years old at the 1988 Midsummer Classic in Cincinnati. As he did not participate in that contest, the nod as the youngest Cub to play in the All-Star Game goes to 23-year-old Ron Santo in 1963. The youngest Cubs pitcher to appear in an All-Star Game was 23-year-old Carlos Zambrano (2004).

The oldest Cub to play in an All-Star Game was 38-year-old Ernie Banks, who made his 13th and final All-Star appearance in the 1969 Classic in Washington, DC.

Three Cubs managers have guided the N.L. All-Star team — Charlie Grimm (1936 and 1946), Gabby Hartnett (1939) and Dusty Baker (2003).

Three All-Star Games have been played at Wrigley Field — in 1947, in 1962 and in 1990. The American League won all three games by scores of 2-1, 9-4 and 2-0.

PHILLING UP THE SCOREBOARD

On August 25, 1922, the Cubs topped Philadelphia 26-23 at Cubs Park in the highest-scoring game in major league history. The teams combined for 51 hits, 23 walks and 25 men left-on-base. A 10-run second inning followed by a 14-run outburst in the fourth helped the Cubs build a 25-6 lead. Philadelphia fought back and had the bases full when the last out was recorded in the ninth inning.

On May 17, 1979, Dave Kingman hit three homers and drove in six runs, but Philadelphia's Mike Schmidt answered with two homers – including the game-winner in the 10th – to give the Phillies a 23-22 victory in baseball's highest-scoring game since the 1922 affair. The Cubs had trailed 21-9, but rallied and tied the score in the eighth.

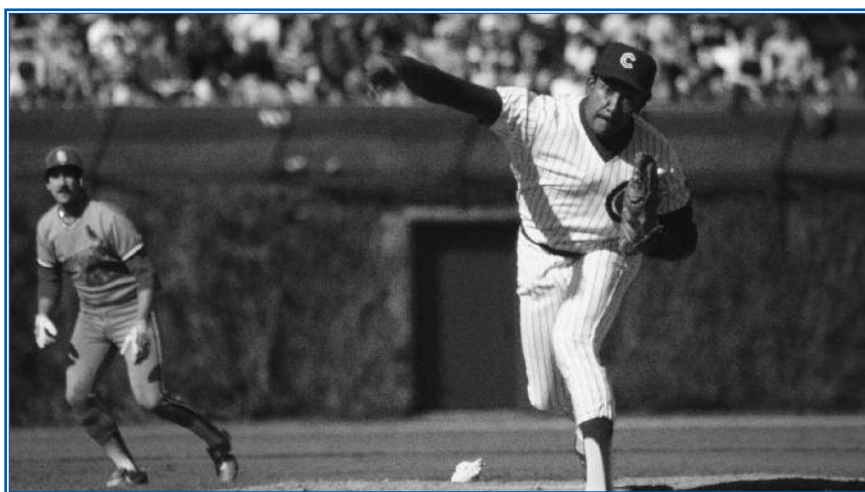

CUBS TELEVISION BROADCASTS

Since 2007, every Cubs regular season game has been televised, and all 162 regular season games in 2011 will be televised, as well. Without the hard work of many from WGN Television and Comcast SportsNet, this would not be possible.

- Ⓢ WGN telecasts are headed up by Director Skip Ellison, in his 10th season working with the Cubs ... Marc Brady enters his 14th season with the WGN telecast, third as a producer, while Doug Stanton is in his third season as associate producer.
- Ⓢ Comcast SportsNet telecasts are produced by Bob Albrecht, entering his 13th season working Cubs telecasts ... Dave Turner handles director duties for the 13th straight season while Tamra Anderson enters her seventh season as associate producer.

MEDIA POLICIES

WORKING PRESS CREDENTIALS: Season and daily press credentials are issued with the intention they will be utilized for the working press in order to provide coverage of the Chicago Cubs at Wrigley Field. Requests for daily credentials must come directly from the affiliation's editor, producer or director on company letterhead at least 48 hours prior to the game requested. Members of the Media must have photo identification available at all times. The Chicago Cubs do not credential freelance writers unless the writer is currently on assignment with a specific news organization. It is the responsibility of the requesting affiliation to confirm receipt and subsequent approval/denial of access to the game in question.

PHOTO CREDENTIALS: Season and daily photo credentials are issued only to photographers on assignment for news-gathering organizations and representatives of companies recognized and/or licensed by Major League Baseball. Requests for photo credentials are the same as the procedure outlined above. The Chicago Cubs do not credential freelance photographers. All flash photography is prohibited at Wrigley Field. Please be advised that priority in all photo bays will be granted to news organizations on nightly deadlines. All mono- and tripods of any sort are strictly prohibited from the field at all times. Any use of photographs taken other than for news-gathering purposes or MLB officially licensed products will be considered a violation of existing trademark and copyright restrictions. As an opportunity to change locations mid-game, photographers are permitted to move along the warning track behind home plate. Photographers are prohibited from stopping and photographing while changing photo bays. Alcoholic beverages are prohibited from any photo bay or camera well at all times.

INTERNET MEDIA: Only licensees of Major League Baseball Enterprises have exclusive rights to simulate accounts, descriptions or pitch-by-pitch reproductions of Major League Baseball games on the Internet. No transmission by any other media, specifically including the Internet and any other online network, of any information about the game, including (but not limited to) any account, description, picture, video, audio, reproduction or other information concerning any MLB game will be permitted to originate from inside the ballpark (including from a camera feed already positioned within the ballpark). Reproduction of such accounts without a license from Major League Baseball Enterprises is a violation of the policies of MLB and the Chicago Cubs. A breach in such policy will result in revocation of credentials and may be subject to litigation. The Chicago Cubs adhere to Major League Baseball's guidelines and do not credential websites unless they are affiliated with recognized national or regional news media organizations. No freelance Internet sites will be credential without following the same guidelines for freelance journalists.

LIVE TRANSMISSIONS: Affiliations not licensed by MLB and non-rightsolders of the Chicago Cubs and MLB (television, radio and internet sites) are prohibited from providing live telecasts, radio broadcasts, game simulations, pitch-by-pitch accounts, as well as from using live or taped material originating from inside the ballpark during a period commencing with the conclusion of batting practice and ending with the conclusion of the game. Live transmissions will be permitted until the conclusion of the club's rightsolders' (radio or television) post-game programming. Radio stations and assigned correspondents for out-of-town reports are permitted to give inning or half-inning score updates, but at no time may the file reports once play is in progress.

ROVING CAMERAS: Roving cameras in the seating area of the ballpark are strictly prohibited unless approved by the Cubs media relations department. Due to space limitations, roving cameras are not allowed to shoot from the bleachers. Any camera light in the seating area of the ballpark is strictly prohibited. If a photo light comes on during the game, umpires will stop play. Still photographers must shoot from the designated camera wells and photographer areas. Interviews are not permitted in the ballpark during the game unless approved by the Cubs media relations department. If approved, interviews may only be conducted on the concourse between innings, not in the stands while the game is in progress.

WORKING PRESS BOX: Seating in the main press box is prioritized by daily print media, visiting public relations departments, visiting beat writers and area radio and television representatives not on the air during games. The press box consists of six radio/TV booths equipped for live broadcasts. Keeping with MLB and club policy, no person under 18 is permitted into the press box on game days. Alcoholic beverages are prohibited from the working press box prior or during the game. The press box is equipped with wireless internet capabilities; the password can be found on the seating cards in the press box and is also posted in the back of the press box.

FIELD ACCESS: All members of the media with credentials allowing access onto the field may conduct interviews at specific times prior to the start of the game. The field must be cleared 60 minutes before the beginning of the game. At no time are media permitted in fair territory or anywhere beyond first- or third-base. Alcoholic beverages are prohibited from the field at all times.

BATTING PRACTICE: Members of the media are prohibited from standing, photographing or conducting interviews from the area surrounding the cage while batting practice is in progress.

CELLULAR PHONES: The use of cellular phones for radio interviews while on the field and in the clubhouse is strictly prohibited. Any and all telephone interviews must be arranged in advance with the Chicago Cubs media relations department. An exception to the usage of a cellular phone for an interview is in the dugout, only after receiving advance permission from the player or staff member to be interviewed.

MEDIA PHONES: Members of the press may utilize three charge-a-call phones located in the back of the pressbox. Media wanting to set up a season-long phone line may contact the Cubs media relations department. In addition, media can make toll-free calls or use their calling cards on any of the designated phones provided by the Cubs in the press box. These phones are installed for the use of all media in the press box for working conditions only.

AUTOGRAPHS: Credentialed members of the media are strictly prohibited from requesting autographs or equipment at Wrigley Field. Officials will revoke credentials immediately, no exceptions.

CLUBHOUSE ACCESS: Members of the media must have a specific working purpose to gain admittance to the clubhouse. The Cubs home clubhouse opens 3½ hours prior to game-time and is closed during stretch and batting practice times. The clubhouse will re-open upon the conclusion of batting practice and closes one hour prior to the start of the game. The clubhouse will re-open 10 minutes after the conclusion of the game. Access to the visiting Wrigley Field clubhouse will be determined by the visiting club's policies.

PRESS DINING: A press dining room is located adjacent to the broadcast booths on the press level, and is available to credentialed members of the media with access to the working press box, as well as credentialed photographers and credentialed radio and TV personnel. Press meals are \$8.

REGLAS DE PRENSA

CREDENCIALES DE PRENSA: Credenciales de prensa diarias y credenciales para la temporada completa son entregadas con la intención que la prensa cubra y publique reportajes de los Chicago Cubs y Wrigley Field. Solicitudes para un pase de prensa de un día tienen que venir directamente del editor, productor o director de la institución a la que pertenece el reportero, en papel membretado y ser entregadas 48 horas antes del juego solicitado. Los miembros de la prensa tienen que tener una identificación con fotografía disponible todo el tiempo. Los Chicago Cubs no autorizan credenciales para reporteros sin afiliación, a no ser que estos sean asignados una historia específica por un medio de prensa autorizado. Es la responsabilidad del medio de prensa de confirmar el recibo de la solicitud y subsecuentemente el aprobar o negar la credencial para la fecha del juego.

CREDENCIALES PARA FOTÓGRAFOS: Las credenciales diarias y de temporada completa para fotógrafos son entregadas a fotógrafos asignados por medios de prensa y organizaciones autorizadas por Major League Baseball. Los requisitos para solicitar credenciales para fotógrafos son los mismos ya definidos en el párrafo anterior. Los Chicago Cubs no autorizan credenciales para fotógrafos sin afiliación. La fotografía con flash esta prohibida en Wrigley Field. Por favor tenga en cuenta que los medios de comunicación con ediciones nocturnas tienen prioridad en las zonas reservadas para fotógrafos. Los trípodes de cualquier tipo están estrictamente prohibidos en el campo de juego. Cualquier otro uso de las fotografías que no sea para información y noticias o para productos autorizados oficialmente por MLB será considerada una violación de las restricciones de derechos de la marca registrada y de los Cubs. Como oportunidad para cambiar de sitio, a los fotógrafos se les permite caminar por detrás de la línea de home plate. Los fotógrafos tienen prohibido parar y tomar fotos mientras cambien de sitio. Las bebidas alcohólicas están prohibidas en las zonas reservadas para fotógrafos.

MEDIOS DE PRENSA DE INTERNET: Solamente licencias autorizadas oficialmente por Major League Baseball Enterprises, tienen derechos exclusivos de simular cuentas, descripciones o reproducciones de pitcheo por pitcheo de juegos de Major League Baseball en el Internet. No están permitidas transmisiones por Internet de ningún otro medio o network en línea, información acerca del juego incluyendo (pero sin limitación a), cualquier cuenta, descripción, imagen, video, sonido o reproducción de cualquier otra información acerca de cualquier juego de MLB desde dentro del campo de juego (incluyendo cámaras posicionadas en el campo). La reproducción de estas cuentas sin la debida autorización de Major League Baseball Enterprises es una violación de las pólizas de MLB y de los Chicago Cubs. La violación a esta regla resultará en la revocación de credenciales y puede estar sujeto a litigación. Los Chicago Cubs se unen a las reglas de Major League Baseball y no autorizan credenciales para sitios de Internet a no ser que estén afiliados a medios de prensa reconocidos nacional o regionalmente. Los sitios de Internet sin afiliación no obtendrán credenciales a no ser que califiquen.

TRANSMISIONES EN VIVO: Organizaciones sin licencias de MLB o personas afiliadas a los Chicago Cubs y MLB (televisión, radio y sitios de Internet) Tienen prohibido proveer transmisiones en vivo, simulaciones de juegos, cuenta de pitcheo por pitcheo así como usar material obtenido en vivo o pregrabado desde el campo de juego en el periodo desde el final de la practica de bateo hasta el final del juego. Las transmisiones en vivo se permitirán hasta la conclusión del segmento post-game y los derechos del dueño (Radio o Televisión). A estaciones de radio y corresponsales que viajan con el equipo se les permite transmitir el marcador (puntuación) cada entrada o media entrada del juego, pero no se les permitirá reportar cuando la jugada esta en progreso.

CÁMARAS AMBULANTES: Las cámaras grandes están prohibidas en la zona de los asientos a no ser que sean aprobadas por el departamento de medios de comunicación de los Cubs. Debido a limitaciones de espacio, las cámaras grandes están prohibidas en la zona de los Bleachers. Cualquier luz de cámara esta prohibida en la sección de asientos de Wrigley Field. Si se enciende una luz de cámara fotográfica durante la jugada, los árbitros pararán la acción. Los fotógrafos tienen que tomar las fotos desde las zonas asignadas para los fotógrafos. Entrevistas no están permitidas en el campo de juego durante el mismo, a no ser aprobado previamente por el departamento de medios de comunicación. Si son aprobadas las entrevistas se llevaran a cabo en un sitio aprobado, en el lapso antes de empezar la entrada, nunca durante la jugada o en los asientos.

SALA DE PRENSA: Los asientos en la sala de prensa tienen como prioridad a la prensa escrita, departamentos de relaciones publicas visitantes, reporteros visitantes y miembros de la radio y TV que no están al aire durante el partido. La sala de prensa consiste de seis espacios equipados para transmisiones en vivo de Radio o TV. Siguiendo las reglas de MLB y el equipo, no se permite la entrada a menores de 18 años a la sala de prensa los días de juego. Las bebidas alcohólicas están prohibidas a cualquier hora. La sala de prensa esta equipada con servicio de Internet inalámbrico. La clave para usarlo la encontrará en las tarjetas localizadas en su asiento y también estará localizada en la parte de atrás de la sala de prensa.

ACCESO AL CAMPO DE JUEGO: Todos los miembros de la prensa con credenciales con acceso al campo de juego pueden conducir entrevistas durante horarios específicos antes del juego. El campo de juego tiene que ser despejado al menos 60 minutos antes del partido. A ninguna hora se le permitirá a la prensa acceso al campo de acción dentro de las líneas demarcatorias entre primera y tercera base. Las bebidas alcohólicas están prohibidas dentro del campo de juego a cualquier hora.

PRÁCTICA DE BATEO: Se les prohíbe a los miembros de la prensa tomar fotos o entrevistar a los jugadores mientras estos están practicando el bateo.

TELÉFONOS CELULARES: El uso de teléfonos celulares para entrevistas en el campo de juego o vestidores esta estrictamente prohibido. Todas las entrevistas telefónicas tienen que ser planeadas con anticipación y con el permiso del departamento de medios de comunicación de los Cubs. Una excepción al uso de teléfonos celulares sería en la área del dugout, y solo recibiendo permiso del jugador o de un miembro del departamento de medios de comunicación para conducir la entrevista.

TELÉFONOS PARA PRENSA: Miembros de la prensa pueden utilizar uno de tres teléfonos de paga localizados en la parte trasera de la sala de prensa. La prensa que desee una línea telefónica para toda la temporada debe ponerse en contacto con un miembro del departamento de medios de comunicación. Los teléfonos aceptan números gratuitos y tarjetas telefónicas. Los teléfonos son para el uso de todos los miembros de la prensa para cumplir con los compromisos de trabajo solamente.

AUTÓGRAFOS: Todos los miembros de la prensa con credencial, tienen estrictamente prohibido pedir autógrafos o equipo de Wrigley Field. A los infractores de esta regla se les revocará la credencial inmediatamente sin excepciones.

ACCESO A LOS VESTIDORES (CLUBHOUSE): Los miembros de la prensa tienen que tener un propósito de trabajo específico para obtener acceso a los vestidores. Los vestidores de los Cubs se abren tres horas antes del juego y esta cerrado durante el entrenamiento y práctica de bateo. El Clubhouse se abrirá al final de la práctica de bateo y cerrará una hora antes del principio del partido. El Clubhouse abrirá de nuevo 10 minutos al partir de la conclusión del partido. Acceso al vestidor del equipo visitante en Wrigley Field será determinado por las reglas del equipo visitante.

COMIDA PARA LA PRENSA: El comedor para la prensa esta localizado adyacente de la sala de prensa y de los palcos de TV y esta abierto a todos los miembros de la prensa con credencial. Cada almuerzo o cena cuesta \$8.

2011年メディア方針

報道関係者入場証

リグリーフィールドにおけるシカゴ・カブスの報道に使用する目的のみ、シーズン期間中および毎日の入場証を発行する。入場証の申請は必ず提携先の編集長、製作者や部長が社用箋にて、希望する試合の最低48時間前に直接提出しなくてはならない。報道関係者は常に有効な写真付き身分証明書を持参すること。シカゴ・カブスはフリーランス記者への入場証を発行しないが、特定メディアの現役フリーランス記者は除く。受領の確認や当該試合の入場許可/拒否は申請を行った提携先の責任の下行われる。

撮影許可証

シーズン期間中および毎日の撮影許可証の発行はMLBによる認可および/または許可された記事取材機関と会社代表者の指定したカメラマンのみ対象となる。撮影許可証の申請手順は上述と同じである。シカゴ・カブスはフリーランスカメラマンへの撮影許可証は発行しない。リグリーフィールドにおけるフラッシュ撮影は一切禁止である。すべての撮影場所は連夜締め切りのある報道機関に優先的に与えられる。グラウンドにおけるいかなる種類の一脚や三脚の使用も禁止である。報道取材やMLB公式商品に使用する目的以外の写真は既存の商標と著作権の違反であると見なされる。試合開始後のカメラマンの移動は、ホームプレート後部のウォーニング・トラックに沿ってのみ可能である。撮影場所を変える途中、立ち止まったり撮影を行ったりすることは一切禁止である。アルコール飲料の撮影場所への持込は常に禁止されている。

インターネットメディア

インターネットにおけるメジャーリーグの野球報道における、シミュレーション、解説または投球ごとの再現等の占有権を有するのはMLB機構のライセンスのみである。その他のメディア、特にインターネットやそれ以外のオンラインネットワークを含むいかなるメディアによる試合情報の放送も禁止である。球場内（球場内に既に設置されているカメラも含む）から発信される報道、記述、写真、ビデオ、音声、再現並びにMLBの試合に関するいかなる情報も許可されない。MLB機構の許可なく上記の報道の再現を行うことはMLBとシカゴ・カブスの方針に違反するものである。方針の不履行の際は、入場許可証の取り消し、さらには訴訟の可能性もある。シカゴ・カブスは、メジャーリーグのガイドラインを厳守しており、そのウェブサイトが世間に認識された全国的または地方の報道機関に所属しない限り、入場許可証を発行しない。フリーランスのジャーナリストと同じガイドラインに従わない限り、フリーランスのインターネットサイトに対しても入場許可証を発行しない。

メディアの食事 メディアの食事ルームはメディア階にあり、放送ブースに隣接している。記者席への入場許可を有する報道関係者や入場許可証をもつカメラマンやラジオ・テレビ局員が対象である。食事代は8ドルである。

生放送

MLBの許可を得ていない提携先、シカゴ・カブスとMLBの権利所有者以外（テレビ・ラジオ・インターネットサイト）によるテレビ生放送、ラジオ放送、試合シミュレーション、投球ごとの報道及び打撃練習終了後から試合終了後にかけての球場内の生放送並びに録画資料の提供はいずれも厳禁である。生放送はクラブの権利所有者（ラジオかテレビ）の試合後の放送が終了するまでは認められる。ラジオ局および指定された通信員が市外へ報道する際は、インテグロもしくはハーフィニングごとの点数の更新は行ってもよいが、試合進行中に報道を行ってはならない。

移動式カメラ

カブス広報部による承認がない限り、球場の座席部分における移動式カメラの使用は厳禁である。スペースの制約上、外野席からの移動式カメラを用いた撮影も認められない。球場の座席部分でのカメラライトの使用は厳禁である。試合中にライトが点灯した場合、審判員はプレーを中断する。スチール写真のカメラマンは指定された撮影場所から撮影しなくてはならない。カブス広報部による承認がない場合、試合中の球場内でのインタビューは許可されない。承認された場合は、試合中のスタンド内ではなく、インテグロ間にコンコース内でのみ可とする。

報道記者席 記者席は、日刊メディア、ビジター広報部、ビジター担当記者と試合を報道しないラジオ局ならびにテレビ局の代表を優先とする。記者席は生中継のために設置してある6つのラジオ/テレビのブースからなる。MLBとクラブの方針に基づき、18歳未満の者の試合日の記者席立入を禁止とする。記者席へのアルコール飲料の持込は、試合開始前並びに試合中は禁止である。記者席は無線インターネットが備えられている。パスワードは、記者席の座席カードに記載されており、また記者席の後部にも掲示されている。

球場への入場

グラウンドへの入場許可証を持つ報道関係者は、試合開始前の指定された時間内であればインタビューを行ってもよい。試合開始60分前には、グラウンドを離れること。いかなる場合もフェアグラウンド並びに一塁・三塁より奥へ立ち入りを禁止する。アルコール飲料の持込は一切禁止である。

打撃練習 打撃練習中、報道関係者は柵の周辺に立ったり、撮影・インタビューを行ったりしてはならない。

携帯電話 球場内およびクラブハウスでの携帯電話を用いたラジオインタビューは一切禁止である。電話インタビューは事前にシカゴ・カブスのメディア広報部に申し込んだものに限定される。唯一の例外として、事前にインタビュー対象者の選手もしくはスタッフの許可を得た上で、ダッグアウトにおける携帯電話を用いたインタビューは可能とする。

報道関係者用電話 報道関係者席の後方にある3台の有料電話が利用可能である。シーズン中の電話回線の設置を希望するメディアは、カブス広報部に連絡のこと。カブスが指定する電話でフリーダイヤルやコーリング・カードを利用して通話することができる。ただしこれらは業務に關係する通話のみとする。

サイン

入場許可証を持つ報道関係者は、リグリーフィールドでサインや用具を求めてはならない。例外なく、直ちに入場許可証を取り消す。

クラブハウスへのアクセス

報道関係者は特定の業務目的がない限り、クラブハウスへの入場は認められない。カブスのホームクラブハウスは試合開始時刻3時間半前に開放され、ストレッチおよび打撃練習中は閉鎖される。打撃練習終了後に再度開放、試合開始の1時間前に閉鎖される。試合終了10分後にはまた開放される。リグリーフィールドのビジタークラブハウスのアクセスはビジタークラブの方針に従うこととする。

WRIGLEY FIELD INFORMATION

History of Wrigley Field

Wrigley Field, which was built in 1914, is playing host to professional baseball for the 98th season in 2011 – and to the Cubs for the 96th year. Wrigley Field is the second-oldest ballpark in the major leagues behind Boston's Fenway Park (1912).

- © The Friendly Confines has been the location of such historic moments as:
 - ♦ Babe Ruth's "called shot," when Ruth allegedly pointed to a bleacher location during Game 3 of the 1932 World Series ... Ruth then hit Charlie Root's next pitch for a homer.
 - ♦ Gabby Hartnett's famous "Homer in the Gloamin' " September 28, 1938, off Pittsburgh's Mace Brown.
 - ♦ The great May 2, 1917, pitching duel between Jim "Hippo" Vaughn and the Reds' Fred Toney ... both Vaughn and Toney threw no-hitters for 9.0 innings before Cincinnati's Jim Thorpe (of Olympic fame) drove in the only run in the 10th inning ... Toney finished with a no-hitter.
 - ♦ Ernie Banks' 500th career home run May 12, 1970, vs. Atlanta's Pat Jarvis.
 - ♦ Pete Rose's 4,191st career hit, which tied him with Ty Cobb for the most hits in baseball history ... Rose singled off Reggie Patterson September 8, 1985.
 - ♦ Kerry Wood's 20-strikeout affair in 1998.
 - ♦ Sammy Sosa's 60th home runs in 1998, 1999 and 2001.
 - ♦ Greg Maddux's 3,000th career strikeout July 26, 2005.
 - ♦ Tom Glavine's 300th career victory August 5, 2007.
 - ♦ The 1947, 1962 and 1990 All-Star Games.

Originally known as Weeghman Park, Wrigley Field was built on the grounds once occupied by a seminary.

- © Weeghman Park was the home of Chicago's entry in the Federal League and was the property of Charles H. Weeghman ... the club was known as both the Federals and the Whales.
- © The cost of building Weeghman Park, which had a seating capacity of 14,000, was estimated at \$250,000 ... the infield and outfield consisted of more than 4,000 yards of soil and four acres of bluegrass.
- © The first major league game at the ballpark took place April 23, 1914, with the Federals defeating Kansas City 9-1 ... the first homer in ballpark history was hit by Federals catcher Art Wilson – a two-run shot in the second inning off Kansas City's Chief Johnson.
- © When the Federal League folded for financial reasons after the 1915 campaign, Weeghman purchased the Cubs from the Taft family of Cincinnati and moved the club to the two-year-old ballpark at the corner of Clark and Addison streets.
- © The first National League game at the ballpark was played April 20, 1916, when the Cubs beat the Cincinnati Reds 7-6 in 11 innings ... a bear cub was in attendance at the game.
- © The park became known as Cubs Park in 1920 after the Wrigley family purchased the team from Weeghman ... it was named Wrigley Field in 1926 in honor of William Wrigley Jr., the club's owner.

The original vines were purchased and planted by Bill Veeck in September 1937 ... Veeck strung bittersweet from the top of the wall to the bottom, then planted the ivy at the base of the wall.

- © Ernie Banks' uniform number (14) is imprinted on the flag which flies from the left field foul pole, directly above Ron Santo's No. 10 and Fergie Jenkins' No. 31 ... Ryne Sandberg's No. 23, Billy Williams' No. 26 and Greg Maddux' No. 31 fly from the right field foul pole.

The Wrigley Field bleachers and scoreboard were constructed in 1937 when the outfield area was renovated to provide improved and expanded seating ... the original scoreboard remains intact.

- © The score-by-innings and the pitchers' numbers are changed by hand ... the numbers signaling batter, ball, strike and out, along with "H" and "E" – to signify hit and error – are eyelets.
- © No batted ball has ever hit the center field scoreboard ... two baseballs barely missed – a homer hit onto Sheffield Avenue (right-center) by Bill Nicholson in 1948, and one hit by Roberto Clemente onto Waveland Avenue (left-center) in 1959.
- © One of the traditions of Wrigley Field is the flying of a flag bearing a "W" or an "L" atop the scoreboard after a game ... a white flag with a blue "W" indicates a victory; a blue flag with a white "L" denotes a loss.

Wrigley Field added lights in 1988.

- © The first night game took place August 8 against Philadelphia, but was rained out in the fourth inning.
- © The first official night game occurred August 9 vs. New York, when the Cubs defeated the Mets 6-4.
- © In 2011, Wrigley Field will be celebrating its 24th year of playing host to baseball under the lights.
 - ♦ The Cubs entered the 2011 season having played 449 home night contests (going 233-216).

Wrigley Field has been the site of numerous construction projects since 1981.

- © New office space was created and old offices refurbished in the administrative area behind home plate in 1981-1982, while the ticket office was built directly behind home plate in 1983.
- © During the winter of 1984, a new home clubhouse was completed under the third base stands ... the visitors' clubhouse was renovated in 1990.
- © In 1989, private boxes were constructed on the mezzanine level, formerly occupied by the press box and broadcast booths ... a press box and broadcast booths were constructed in the upper deck directly behind home plate ... other improvements included a food court in the upper deck.
 - ♦ Following renovations in 1994 and 1995, there are 61 private boxes.
- © An elevator was added to the third base concourse in 1996.
- © Following the 2005 season, the Cubs expanded the bleachers, adding a restaurant in the batter's eye and a window to Sheffield Avenue in right field.
- © In the winter of 2007, Wrigley underwent a major field renovation project to remove the field's crown, install an intricate drainage system underneath and create a new playing surface.
- © The beautification of the Wrigley Field campus also included the installation of personalized pavers beginning near the corner of Sheffield and Addison, running down Addison Street towards Clark Street and the Wrigley Field marquee.
- © Prior to the 2010 season, the back of the centerfield scoreboard was fully renovated for the first time since it was installed in 1937 ... restrooms were remodeled and fitted with new fixtures ... a new viewing plaza was created adjacent to the indoor batting cage to provide fans the opportunity to watch batting practice, and an upscale club was added to the mezzanine suites down the left field line.

Spring Training 2011 will mark the 33rd consecutive spring training that the Cubs have spent in Mesa and the 15th at the HoHoKam Stadium/Fitch Park facilities ... in 2010, the club was 18-12-3 during the Cactus League campaign.

- © HoHoKam Stadium is operated by the city of Mesa with assistance from the HoHoKams, a local service organization.
- © Mesa is the second-largest city in the Phoenix metropolitan area and the third-largest city in Arizona ... Mesa is located southeast of Phoenix and Scottsdale.
 - ♦ With a population of more than 460,000, Mesa ranks as one of the fastest growing cities in the United States (among those with populations of at least 200,000) and the 38th-largest city in the country — bigger than Atlanta and Miami.
 - ♦ Mesa was founded in January 1878 and was incorporated in July 1883 ... the area of the city is 128 square miles.
- © The telephone number for the Mesa Convention and Visitors Bureau is 1-800-283-MESA.

The Cubs began play at the new HoHoKam Stadium in 1997.
