MARK WALTER **CHAIRMAN & OWNER**

Mr. Walter grew up in Iowa and received a B.S. from Creighton University and a J.D. from Northwestern University.

Earvin Johnson is a partner of Guggenheim Baseball Management. He became part owner of the Los Angeles Dodgers on May 1, 2012. After an NBA Hall of Fame career, Johnson became an entrepreneur, a philanthropist and a motivational speaker. Johnson is chairman and CEO of Magic Johnson Enterprises (MJE), which provides high-quality products and services that focus primarily on ethnically diverse and underserved urban communities through strategic alliances, investments, consulting and endorsements. The conglomerate, the No. 1 brand in Urban America, is comprised of multiple business entities and partnerships that include Canyon Johnson, a \$1 billion real estate fund; Yucaipa Johnson, a \$500 million private equity fund; ASPIRE, a new African-American television network; SodexoMAGIC; Magic Airport Holdings; T.G.I.F. Friday's Restaurant; Inner City Broadcasting Corporation; Magic Johnson Bridgescape Academies, and Vibe Holdings, LLC. Johnson is the chairman of the multi-cultural media company that houses the Vibe, Uptown, and Soul Train brands. Johnson also serves as chairman and founder of the Magic Johnson Foundation, where his unwavering commitment to transform Urban America continues through HIV/AIDS Awareness & Prevention Programs, Community Empowerment Centers, and the Taylor Michaels Scholarship Program. After an All-America college basketball career at Michigan State in which he led the Spartans to the 1979 NCAA championship, Johnson enjoyed a 13-year career with the Los Angeles Lakers of the National Basketball Association (NBA). He was a member of five championship teams and won the Most Valuable Player Award and the NBA Finals MVP Award three times each. He was a 12-time All-Star and a nine-time member of the All-NBA First Team. He won a gold medal with the original Dream Team at the 1992 Olympics in Barcelona. In 1996-97, Johnson was selected to the NBA's 50th Anniversary All-Time Team. In 2002, he was inducted into the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame.

Boehly is also president of Guggenheim Partners, where he joined in 2001 to establish and lead the corporate credit business for the firm, which has become a globally leading credit investing operation. Prior to joining Guggenheim, Boehly focused on special situations and high-yield investments as a vice president at Whitney & Co., where he also initiated the firm's bank loan investing business. Prior to his tenure at Whitney, Boehly concentrated on leveraged finance at Credit Suisse First Boston. Boehly received his BBA from the College of William & Mary and spent a year studying at the London School of Economics.



ROBERT (BOBBY) L. PATTON, JR. OWNER

Bobby Patton is a partner of Guggenheim Baseball Management. He became part owner of the Los Angeles Dodgers on May 1, 2012. Patton principally operates oil and gas properties in Texas and Kansas and has additional investments in many other sectors, including ranching and insurance. He serves on the Board of Security Benefit Corporation and the Advisory Council of the University of Texas College of Liberal Arts. He also serves as the tournament chairman of the Crowne Plaza Invitational PGA Tour event at Colonial Country Club in Fort Worth, Texas. Patton received a B.B.A. from the University of Texas as well as a J.D. from St. Mary's University and LLM from Southern Methodist University. Patton resides in Fort Worth, where he was born and raised.



PETER GUBER OWNER

Peter Guber is a partner of Guggenheim Baseball Management. He became part owner of the Los Angeles Dodgers on May 1, 2012. Guber is also chairman and CEO of Mandalay Entertainment, a multimedia entertainment vehicle in motion pictures, television, sports entertainment and new media formed in 1995. Guber has been an important and influential executive in the entertainment and communications industries for more than 30 years. Films he personally produced or executive produced or through Mandalay include Rain Man, Batman, The Color Purple, Midnight Express, Gorillas in the Mist, The Witches of Eastwick, Missing, Flashdance, Soul Surfer and The Kids Are Alright have earned more than \$3 billion worldwide and garnered more than 50 Academy Award nominations. Guber is also owner and co-executive chairman of the Golden State Warriors of the National Basketball Association. He earned his B.A. from Syracuse University, and J.D. and LLM at New York University.

STAN KASTEN PRESIDENT & CEO

Stan Kasten became president and CEO of the Los Angeles Dodgers on April 30, 2012. For more than three decades, Kasten has been a highly respected sports figure and has developed a reputation for creating winning sports franchises.

In 1999, Kasten became the first sports figure to hold the title of president of three different teams in three different major sports simultaneously. He accomplished this unique feat with Major League Baseball's Atlanta Braves, the National Basketball Association's Atlanta Hawks and the National Hockey League's Atlanta Thrashers.

Kasten's professional career is highlighted by the Braves 1995 World Championship. Under his tenure, the Braves and Hawks made a combined 30 post-season appearances and claimed 15 division titles, including 12 in a row during the Braves' unprecedented run from 1991-2003.

He was president of the Washington Nationals from 2006-10, where he worked to re-energize a dormant baseball fan base and simultaneously establish a crown jewel franchise in Washington, D.C.

Kasten has been a member of numerous MLB, NBA and NHL ownership committees during his professional career, including NBA committees on marketing, player pensions and expansion and the NBA Board of Governors, MLB's owners negotiating committee and chairman of the Player Personal Development Committee, and the NHL's Board of Governors and its executive committee. He is also a former trustee of the Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame.

Throughout his impressive sports career, Kasten has relied on three pillars – scouting and player development, enhancing the fan experience and community outreach – to establish franchises built for long-term success on and off the field.

In 1979, at age 27, Kasten became the youngest general manager in NBA history with the Hawks. He held the position until 1990. Kasten became the Hawks' president in 1986. During his lengthy tenure in the Hawks' front office, Kasten became the first – and

only – NBA executive to win back-to-back Executive of the Year awards in 1986-87. With the help of future NBA Hall of Famer Dominique Wilkins, Kasten was able to build Atlanta into a perennial playoff contender, posting four consecutive 50-win seasons from 1986-89, and set franchise attendance records. In the 1990s, Kasten guided Atlanta to a stretch of seven consecutive playoff appearances, including three 50-win seasons.

Kasten also became president of the Braves in 1986. From 1987-2003, the Braves won more games than any other team in MLB. As president of the Braves, Kasten helped assemble talented teams that consistently competed for a world championship. Led by manager Bobby Cox, the Braves teams of that era were built around a deep pitching staff that featured Greg Maddux, Tom Glavine, Steve Avery and John Smoltz. The cornerstone of the Braves' lineup was All-Star third baseman Chipper Jones. From 1991-2005, the Braves won 14 consecutive division titles, five National League pennants and the 1995 World Series.

In 1999, when the NHL awarded Atlanta an expansion team, Kasten added the title of president of the Thrashers, as well as chairman of the newly constructed Philips Arena. He was also involved in the design and construction of Turner Field. Kasten held all three positions until 2003, when he stepped down.

A native of Lakewood, N.J., Kasten is a graduate of New York University and Columbia University Law School. Kasten and his wife, Helen, have four children: Alana, Corey, Sherry and Jay.

TOMMY LASORDA SPECIAL ADVISOR TO THE CHAIRMAN

Regarded by many as baseball's most popular ambassador, Tommy Lasorda begins his 63rd season in the Dodger organization and seventh as Special Advisor to the Chairman. He was named Vice President in 1996 after retiring as manager, a position he held for the previous 20 seasons. Lasorda assumed all player personnel responsibilities when he was named the Dodgers' interim General Manager on June 22, 1998. He relinquished his General Manager duties when he was promoted to Senior Vice President on Sept. 11, 1998. In his current position, Lasorda reports directly to the Office of the Chairman, serving as an advisor on all areas of the Dodger organization for Owner & Chairman Mark Walter.

Lasorda's current responsibilities include scouting, evaluating and teaching minor league players, acting as an advisor and ambassador for the Dodgers' international affiliations, and representing the franchise at more than 150 speaking engagements and appearances to various charities, private groups and military personnel each year. He has spoken to troops at more than 40 military bases around the world, including a five-country goodwill tour in 2009.

Lasorda compiled a 1,599-1,439 record and won two World Championships, four National League pennants and eight division titles in an extraordinary 20-year career as the Dodgers' manager. He ranks 17th with 1,599 wins and 16th with 3,038 games managed in Major League history. His 16 wins in 30 NL Championship Series games managed were the most of any manager at the time of his retirement in 1996. He is one of only five managers to manage the same team for 20 years or more, joining Walt Alston, Connie Mack, John McGraw and Bobby Cox.

Lasorda's role in the globalization of the game of baseball is now more evident than ever before, as Commissioner Allan H. (Bud) Selig appointed him as the Official Ambassador of the inaugural World Baseball Classic in 2006, and again for the 2009 Classic that was played at Dodger Stadium. In that capacity, Lasorda served as a spokesperson for the tournament and continued his travels around the globe to promote the game of baseball, as he has visited 28 countries in his lifetime - Australia, Canada, Columbia, China, Chinese Taipei, Cuba, Denmark, England, the Dominican Republic, Italy, Japan, Mexico, Monaco, Norway, Panama, Puerto Rico, Scotland, South Korea, Spain, Sweden, Venezuela, Bermuda, Egypt, Iraq, Afghanistan, Turkey, Ireland and throughout the United States. In 2008, he was awarded with the Order of the Rising Sun, Gold Rays with Rosette by the Emperor of Japan for his contributions to Japanese baseball. He has made countless trips to Japan over the years, serving as a key liaison between the Dodgers and the Orix Buffaloes in their "friendship" agreement. Lasorda was also the Dodger ambassador for other "friendship" agreements that the Dodgers had with other Asian teams including the LG Twins from Korea and the Sinon Bulls from Taiwan. He also threw out the first pitch in the China Baseball League's first "World Series" in 2002. As baseball's ambassador, Lasorda has been called upon by Commissioner Selig to star in ad campaigns on behalf of Major League Baseball. In 2009, Lasorda had his portrait installed in the Smithsonian Institution's National Portrait Gallery. The portrait, which measures 60x50 inches, was painted by Everett Raymond Kinstler, and was presented to the Smithsonian as part of the celebration of his 60th season with the Dodgers.

During his six-decade career, Lasorda has met seven U.S. Presidents - Richard Nixon, Gerald Ford, Jimmy Carter, Ronald Reagan, George H.W. Bush, Bill Clinton and George W. Bush, who asked Lasorda to serve as a delegate to the U.S. National Day at the World Exposition in Aichi, Japan in June 2005. The World Exposition was not the first time President Bush called upon Lasorda for his assistance, as the Hall of Fame manager participated in the festivities surrounding the President's inauguration in January 2005. Two months later, Lasorda made a visit to the White House to represent the Dodgers in a ceremony that posthumously awarded Jackie Robinson with the Congressional Gold Medal. In 2007, Lasorda joined Dodger legend Don Newcombe in leading a contingent of Little Leaguers from Los Angeles to Washington D.C. for a tee-ball game on the South Lawn of the White House.

In 1997, Lasorda was elected to the National Baseball Hall of Fame by the Veterans Committee in his first year of eligibility. He was the 14th manager and 52nd Dodger inducted into the Hall of Fame. In 2007, Lasorda was asked by the Hall of Fame to be a member of the committee

on managers and umpires, leading to the elections of Billy Southworth and Dick Williams to Cooperstown. He served the Hall in the same capacity in 2009 that led to the election of Whitey Herzog and Doug Harvey. In 2011, he served on the Golden Era committee that elected longtime Chicago Cub Ron Santo. Though the National Baseball Hall of Fame is his most prestigious honor, Lasorda has been enshrined in 17 different sports and cultural Halls of Fame, including the Brooklyn Dodgers HOF (2009), Canadian Baseball HOF (2006), Italian American Sports HOF (1989) and California Sports HOF (2006). Lasorda's uniform number (2) was retired by the Dodgers on Aug. 15, 1997 and the main street that leads to the entrance of Dodgertown in Vero Beach, FL was renamed Tommy Lasorda Lane on March 5, 1997. He also threw out the first pitch in Game 7 of the 1997 World Series.

During the 2000 Olympic Games in Sydney, Australia, Lasorda managed an underdog United States team to the Gold Medal over the highly favored Cuban National team just five days after celebrating his 73rd birthday. The Olympic Gold Medal, which Lasorda considers his greatest professional achievement, marked his return to the dugout after his retirement in 1996.

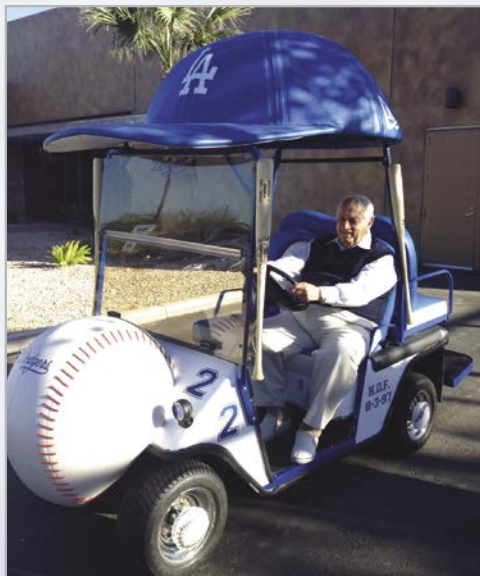
Lasorda posted a 3-1 record as the NL manager in four All-Star Games. He joined St. Louis' Gabby Street (1930-31) as the only managers in NL history to win league titles in his first two seasons when he led the Dodgers to titles in 1977-78. Lasorda also managed nine of the Dodgers' 16 Rookies of the Year, more than any other big league skipper in history. Prior to replacing Hall of Famer Walter Alston as manager on Sept. 29, 1976, Lasorda spent four seasons in Los Angeles on Alston's coaching staff from 1973-76. He spent eight seasons as a manager in the Dodgers' minor league system at Pocatello (1965), Ogden (1966-68), Spokane (1969-71) and Albuquerque (1972). Lasorda also spent four years as a Dodger scout after retiring as a player following the 1960 season. An astounding 75 players Lasorda managed in the minor leagues went on to play in the Majors.

Lasorda compiled an 0-4 record and 6.52 ERA as a left-handed pitcher in parts of three Major League seasons with the Brooklyn Dodgers (1954-55) and Kansas City Athletics (1956). In all, he spent 14 seasons in the minor leagues from 1945-60 and he served two years in the military from 1946-47.

He has won numerous awards throughout his career, including being named Minor League Manager of the Year by *The Sporting News* in 1970, Manager of the Year by UPI and AP in 1977, Manager of the Year by AP in 1981 and NL Manager of the Year by *Baseball America* and Co-Manager of the Year by *The Sporting News* in 1988. In September 2006, Lasorda received the Branch Rickey Award from the Denver Rotary Club for his lifetime of community service. Lasorda has been a spokesperson for the American Heart Association and regularly visits patients at the Tom Lasorda Heart Institute at Centinela Hospital Medical Center in Inglewood, CA, which opened on Nov. 6, 2000. He is also an official spokesperson for the Prostate Cancer Foundation, which is an official MLB charity that promotes prostate cancer awareness. The Professional Baseball Scouts Foundation gives an annual award in his name for the most outstanding manager of the year and in 2006, the first year of its existence, Lasorda received the award as the Manager of the Century. Lasorda also sits on the board for the Statue of Liberty/Ellis Island Foundation and the U.S. Army Recruiting Advisory Council. In December 2011, Rawlings presented him with the Rawlings Heart of Gold award for his philanthropic efforts. He has received honorary doctorate degrees from Pepperdine University, St. Thomas University, Cal State Long Beach, University of Phoenix, Concordia University, the University of Hawaii, Argosy University, Cypress College and Marymount College. In February 2003, he was honored by Cal Tech when he became only the second person to ever have an asteroid named after them. His asteroid is #6128, otherwise known as Asteroid Lasorda.

Many of Lasorda's greatest accomplishments and stories have been compiled in *I Live For This* his autobiography that came out three seasons ago, which he co-wrote with *Los Angeles Times* columnist Bill Plaschke. His first book, *The Artful Dodger* was released in 1986.

Lasorda and his wife, Jo, have been married for 62 years. They reside in Fullerton, CA, and will celebrate their 63rd wedding anniversary on April 14, 2013. The couple renamed a gymnasium and youth center in memory of their son, Tom Jr., in Yorba Linda, CA on Sept. 7, 1997. They are also the proud grandparents of Emily Tess (17), the child of their daughter, Laura Lasorda.

DON NEWCOMBE **SPECIAL ADVISOR TO THE CHAIRMAN**

Don Newcombe enters his 56th season in the Dodger organization. "Newk" pitched eight seasons for the Brooklyn and Los Angeles Dodgers (1949-51), ('54-58) and is credited with starting the first Community Relations department in Major League Baseball in 1970. Since 2009, Newcombe has been a Special Advisor to the Chairman.

In 2011, Tigers pitcher Justin Verlander joined Newcombe as one of two men in baseball history to win the sport's three major honors - Rookie of the Year, Most Valuable Player and Cy Young Award. In January 2012, Newcombe introduced Verlander at the Baseball Writers Association's annual dinner where Verlander received his 2011 Cy Young and MVP Awards.

Last year, Newcombe was honored by Major League Baseball with the "Beacon of Hope" award at the annual Civil Rights game in Atlanta.

Newcombe, 86, spent the first seven years of his 10-year big league career with the Brooklyn Dodgers before joining the franchise in its move to Los Angeles in 1958. The right-handed pitcher helped the Dodgers win their first World Championship in 1955, leading the National League that season with an .800 winning percentage (20-5). That season, he also became the first NL pitcher to hit seven home runs in a season.

The New Jersey native was a four-time National League All-Star and registered a record of 149-90 with 1,129 strikeouts and a 3.56 ERA, 136 complete games and 24 shutouts. He pitched in three World Series and at 22 years old in 1949, he became the second rookie ever to start the opening game of a World Series, striking out 11 Yankees in eight innings.

In 1951, Newcombe won 20 games for the first time in his career and then missed the following two seasons while serving his country during the Korean War. He later won 20 games again in 1955 and led the league with 27 wins in 1956.

Following his Major League career, Newcombe signed with the Chunichi Dragons of Japan's Nippon Professional Baseball in 1962 and became the first former Major League player to play in the Japanese League. He batted .262 with 12 homers in 279 at-bats before ending his playing career.

In 1980, his final year of eligibility, Newcombe received 59 votes (15.3 percent) for enshrinement in the National Baseball Hall of Fame.

When he signed with the Newark Eagles of the Negro Leagues in 1944 at age 17, Newcombe had no idea he was on the verge of changing the course of sports history. Newcombe, Jackie Robinson and Roy Campanella, were often overlooked for their important roles in the country's Civil Rights movement.

Dodger President Branch Rickey had decided to integrate Major League Baseball, as an unwritten rule had prevented blacks from playing since the 1880s.

Rickey secretly began scouting players from the Negro Leagues and he eventually signed Robinson, catcher Campanella and Newcombe. In 1946, the trio broke the minor league color barrier as Robinson played at Triple-A Montreal while Newcombe and Campanella were standouts for the Class B Nashua Dodgers of the New England League.

Robinson joined the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1947 and he won National League Rookie of the Year honors. Campanella was promoted to the Dodgers in 1948 and Newcombe finally arrived in May 1949. From 1949 to 1956, the Dodgers played in five World Series and narrowly missed the playoffs in 1950 and 1951.

While the Dodgers were winners on the field, the trio still faced challenges off the field. There were death threats, isolation, degradation and insults hurled by fans and opponents, along with snide comments from certain Dodger teammates. Throughout the early 1950s, there were some hotels and restaurants that wouldn't serve black players during the season.

After his career, Newcombe had a fateful meeting with Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., just 28 days before Dr. King's assassination in 1968. Concluding a tour of speech-making, protest marches and peaceful demonstrations, King had dinner at Newcombe's home in Los Angeles before King returned to Atlanta.

According to Newcombe, King said, "Don, you'll never know how easy you and Jackie and (Larry) Doby and Campy (Roy Campanella) made it for me to do my job by what you did on the baseball field."

Newcombe continues to make dozens of appearances throughout the Los Angeles area each season, speaking to youngsters and participating in the Dodgers' Alumni Association. Through the years, he has helped numerous people, in and out of baseball, with their battles against substance abuse.



DR. FRANK JOBE **SPECIAL ADVISOR TO THE CHAIRMAN**

A legend in the field of medicine and baseball, Dr. Frank Jobe enters his sixth season as a Special Advisor to the Chairman and 49th season in the Dodger organization. Amazingly, more than 37 years have passed since Jobe made history and altered the sport forever.

It was 1974 when Dodger pitcher Tommy John was diagnosed with a ruptured medial collateral ligament (MCL) in his left elbow, an injury that previously had no cure. That is, until Sept. 25, when Jobe tried a procedure in which he removed a tendon from John's forearm and repaired his elbow. John, who had won 124 games prior to the operation, went on to pitch 14 years after the operation, compiling 164 more victories in that time, without ever missing a start due to elbow problems.

Since then, Jobe has performed hundreds of Tommy John surgeries on pitchers of every level, helping to resurrect the careers of countless big leaguers, and his fellowship program at the Kerlan-Jobe clinic has trained more than 250 fellows through the years.

On Feb. 21, 2008, the Dodgers announced that Jobe had been promoted to Special Advisor to the Chairman and he took part in a special pregame ceremony at Holman Stadium in Vero Beach, FL. Jobe was honored again in front of the home crowd at Dodger Stadium on Sept. 23, 2008 in a ceremony that included his two most famous patients, John and former Dodger Orel Hershiser, among others.

Of course, since Jobe's experiment on John, several things have changed about the procedure. What was once a four-hour surgery can now be done in about an hour. The success of the procedure not only depends on the surgery but the surgeon, the player and the rehabilitation program. Though Jobe originally put John's chances of returning to the Major Leagues at less than five percent, Jobe now estimates that 92 to 95 percent of patients will return as good, if not better, than prior to the surgery.

In fact, the procedure has become so valuable that in recent years, players have signed multi-year contracts just months after they have the surgery in expectation of a high-level return.

At their annual dinner in 2012, Jobe was honored by the Professional Baseball Scouts Foundation with the Dave Winfield Humanitarian Award. Jobe was inducted by the Baseball Reliquary into the Shrine of the Eternals on July 20, 2012. He was also inducted into the PBATS (Professional Baseball Athletic Trainers Society) Hall of Fame in spring 2012. In honor of the 30th anniversary of his ground-breaking efforts, the Dodgers honored Jobe on March 31, 2004 prior to a Spring Training game in Vero Beach, FL, and again during the year at Dodger Stadium.

Jobe began his association with the Dodgers in 1964 when he joined his mentor, Dr. Robert Kerlan, the original Los Angeles Dodgers team physician. He took over the care of the team in 1968 and six years later made history with John.

Thanks to his passion to help players return to the field, Jobe found himself in the right place again 16 years after saving John's career, as he reconstructed the right shoulder of former Cy Young Award winner Orel Hershiser, another procedure that had never been successfully performed on a Major League pitcher.

Hershiser's rehabilitation was a success and he presented Jobe with the game ball from his 100th career victory, which came in 1991, his first win after the surgery. Former Dodger Darren Dreifort made a similar gesture while rehabilitating at Dodger Stadium. His trophy featured a plastered replica of Dr. Jobe's hands holding a surgical instrument with a handwritten message from the Dodger pitcher.

"When you first begin working out after the surgery, it's frustrating and it gets to be monotonous," said Dreifort. "But the flip side is without the surgery and Dr. Jobe, you wouldn't be out there playing catch."

Jobe, a native of North Carolina who studied at Loma Linda Medical School and did his residency at Los Angeles County Hospital, has often been mentioned as a candidate for enshrinement in the National Baseball Hall of Fame, alongside other non-playing personnel like former Dodger Owner Walter O'Malley.

A review of the careers he's rescued lends credence to the argument.

"The most satisfying feeling in medicine is to watch a patient from the time of the injury until he's well and back to 100 percent," said Jobe. "This is very satisfying because it's something I took part in from the beginning."

"Also, it's interesting that sports surgery in particular really wasn't developed until the late 1950s. So when Tommy came along in the 1970s, there was an opportunity and I happened to be the right guy in the right place."



SANDY KOUFAX SPECIAL ADVISOR TO THE CHAIRMAN

Hall of Famer Sandy Koufax returned to the Dodgers in January 2013 to serve as Special Advisor to Dodgers' Chairman Mark Walter. Koufax's role includes attending a portion of Spring Training to work with Dodger pitchers and consulting with the team throughout the year.

One of the most dominating pitchers in the game's history, Koufax was the first Major Leaguer to pitch four no-hitters, including a perfect game. He was the youngest player (age 36) and the first pitcher inducted into the Hall of Fame (1972) who had more strikeouts than innings pitched. In 12 Major League seasons, he had a career record of 165-87, a 2.76 ERA, 2,396 strikeouts, 137 complete games and 40 shutouts.

Koufax was the MVP and Cy Young Award winner in 1963 and also won Cy Young Awards in 1965 and '66. He was a member of Dodgers' world championship teams in 1955, '59, '63 and '65, earning MVP honors in 1963 and '65, when he pitched two shutouts. His postseason record was 4-3 with a 0.95 ERA. He was selected to seven consecutive All-Star Games from 1961-66.

From 1962-66, Koufax led the National League in earned run average and shutouts. He was the strikeouts leader four times, setting a single-season mark with 382 in 1965, and had the most wins three times, with totals of 27, 26 and 25.

He was the first pitcher to average fewer than seven hits allowed per nine innings pitched in his career (6.79) and to strike out more than nine batters (9.28) per nine innings. He also became the second pitcher in baseball history to have two games with 18 or more strikeouts, and the first to have eight games with 15 or more strikeouts.

In his last 10 seasons, batters hit .203 against him with a .271 on-base percentage and a .315 slugging percentage.

Koufax was the first pitcher to win multiple Cy Young Awards, as well as the first pitcher to win a Cy Young Award by a unanimous vote. He is also the only pitcher to win three Cy Young Awards in the era in which the award was presented to one pitcher, rather than one in each league.

On June 4, 1972, Koufax's uniform No. 32 was retired alongside those of fellow Dodger greats Roy Campanella (39) and Jackie Robinson (42).

NED COLLETTI
GENERAL MANAGER

Ned Colletti enters his eighth season as General Manager of the Los Angeles Dodgers, making him the fifth-longest tenured GM in the National League since his appointment on Nov. 16, 2005. In this capacity, he is responsible for overseeing the team's baseball operations, including all scouting, player personnel and player development.

Colletti is the 10th general manager in Los Angeles Dodger history and is entering his 32nd year in Major League Baseball. Since Colletti joined the Dodgers, inheriting a team that finished with a 71-91 record, the team has posted a 597-536 record (.527), the most wins by a National League general manager in that span and the third-best overall mark in the NL behind the Phillies (.563) and Cardinals (.531). Among NL West opponents, the Dodgers lead second-place San Francisco by 18 games during the seven-year span. In his last 16 seasons as a general manager or assistant general manager, Colletti has finished over .500 14 times, went to the postseason seven times and had teams eliminated on the last day twice and next to the last day twice. He reached 500 victories as a GM in 2011, hitting that milestone in 953 games, which was faster than every GM in Dodger history besides Buzzie Bavasi (895 games).

Over the last seven seasons, the club has the best ERA in the Major Leagues, six winning campaigns and reached the postseason three times. The Dodgers appeared in postseason play three of his first four seasons (2006, 2008, 2009), making him the first general manager in Dodger history to accomplish that feat. In 2009, the Dodgers finished the regular season with the best record in the National League for the first time since 1983 and swept the National League Division Series for the second consecutive season to reach the NLCS in consecutive seasons for the first time since 1977-78. In 2008, the Dodgers won the NL West and swept the Cubs in the Division Series to reach the NLCS, capturing their first postseason series victory since their World Championship season of 1988. In 2006, his first year as a GM, Colletti assembled a Major League team that tied for the National League Western Division title and reached the postseason as the National League Wild Card.

The 2013 Dodgers demonstrate Colletti's commitment to acquiring the game's top talent through all possible avenues, building this year's club through the draft (Matt Kemp, Clayton Kershaw, Chad Billingsley), key trades (Andre Ethier, Hanley Ramirez, Carl Crawford, Adrian Gonzalez), free agency (Zack Greinke, Brandon League) and international signings (Hyun-Jin Ryu). Much of the team's core has been locked up long-term with Crawford (2017), Gonzalez (2018), Greinke (2018) and Kemp (2019) signed for at least the next five seasons.

Colletti has renewed the club's focus on finding talent throughout the globe with additions both in the club's front office in International scouting and through free agent signings this year, including Cuban outfielder Yasiel Puig and top Korean left-hander Hyun-Jin Ryu. Under Colletti, the Dodgers have further solidified their roots in Asia with the free-agent signings of Takashi Saito (2006) and Hiroki Kuroda (2007) as well as inking Robert Boothe, the club's first Japanese amateur signing. In addition, the Dodgers played the first-ever Major League exhibition games in China in March 2008 and traveled to Taiwan for a goodwill series against a group of Chinese Professional Baseball League All-Stars during Spring Training in 2010. The Dodgers have also been active in Central America and the Caribbean with amateur free agents Rubby De La Rosa (Dominican Republic) and Kenley Jansen (Curacao) reaching the Majors in recent years and the club's working agreement with the La Guaira Tiburones in Venezuela, signed in 2009, which reestablished a presence in that country.

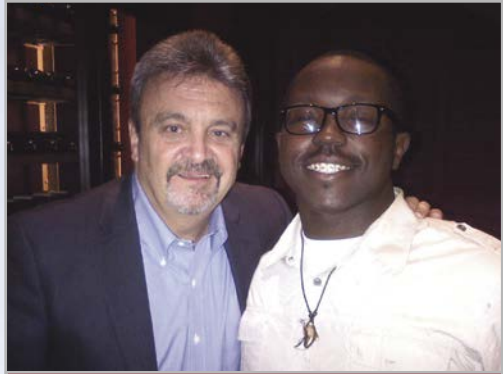
Colletti and his staff have focused heavily on developing top talent at the minor league level and in the last two seasons, Dodger affiliates have posted a .536 combined winning percentage (818-708), which is the second-highest mark among Major League teams. In addition, Dodger farm teams have made eight postseason appearances in the last two years with the 2011 Rookie-level Arizona Summer League Dodgers winning a league title. For the past six seasons, the Dodgers have executed an offseason Winter Development Program for top prospects, which includes instruction both on and off the field. In addition to learning the game from Dodger legends like the late Duke Snider, Tommy Lasorda, Maury Wills, Don Newcombe, Wes Parker and others, the young players take part in classroom sessions that help acclimate them to Los Angeles and the Major Leagues upon their eventual arrival. Since the Winter Development Program's inception in 2008, 36 participating players have reached the Major Leagues. Colletti also created the Dodger Pride Awards, which honor the organization's top minor league players each month.

Colletti has become known throughout the game for his success at obtaining talent during the season, particularly at the trade

deadline. This past season, he acquired All-Stars Hanley Ramirez (Marlins), Brandon League (Mariners), Shane Victorino (Phillies), Josh Beckett (Red Sox), Carl Crawford (Red Sox) and Adrian Gonzalez (Red Sox) along with left-handed specialist Randy Choate (Marlins), utilityman Nick Punto (Red Sox) and right-hander Joe Blanton (Phillies). The nine-player trade with Boston, which consummated on Aug. 25 and sent five players to the Red Sox, was the largest trade in Los Angeles Dodger history. Among the key contributors he has added in midseason in the past several years are three likely Hall of Famers – Greg Maddux (twice), Manny Ramirez and Jim Thome – as well as veterans Ted Lilly, Scott Podsednik, Ryan Theriot, Casey Blake, Vicente Padilla, George Sherrill, Ronnie Belliard and Jon Garland. Colletti's first trade as GM netted All-Star outfielder Andre Ethier, while he continued to hold onto several key players who have become the nucleus of the team, including All-Stars Chad Billingsley, Kemp and Kershaw as well as A.J. Ellis and Dee Gordon, among others. Colletti's acquisition of Manny Ramirez has been deemed by many as the greatest trade in Dodger franchise history, as he traded for the perennial All-Star just minutes before the trade deadline in 2008. Ramirez went on to put together two of the greatest months in team history before continuing his torrid hitting during the postseason. That trade, and the subsequent play of Ramirez, was named the top moment in Los Angeles sports in 2008 by the Los Angeles Sports Council.

During his tenure, the Dodgers and Colletti have been recognized for excellence, both locally and at a national level. Topps named the Dodgers as Organization of the Year in 2010 with the prestigious award, which dates to 1966, recognizing the Major League team that has shown outstanding performance, depth and talent throughout their organization. Similarly, the Dodgers were recognized as *Baseball America's* 2006 Organization of the Year as the Major League team reached the postseason spurred by homegrown talent and a deep farm system. That offseason, the *Los Angeles Daily News* named him Sportsman of the Year in Los Angeles, the Los Angeles Sports Council tabbed him as Co-Executive of the Year, which he shared with his great friend, Brian Burke, then GM of the Anaheim Ducks and the Pitch & Hit Club of Chicago dubbed him Major League Executive of the Year.

Prior to joining the Dodgers, Colletti spent 11 seasons with the San Francisco Giants, the last nine years as the assistant general manager. During his time in that position, the Giants posted an 813-644 record (.558), an average of more than 90 wins per season. Since the beginning of the 1997 season, the club had played just 14 games that did not have playoff implications and during that nine-year span, the team advanced to the postseason four times and was eliminated on the final day of the season on two occasions.

NED COLLETTI IN THE COMMUNITY

As part of his commitment to the city and the people of Los Angeles, Colletti continues to expand his role in helping others. In 2012, he was honored with the Los Angeles City College (LACC) Foundation Partners with Youth Award for his extraordinary commitment to and steadfast support of at-risk youth.

During the last two offseasons, as part of a fund-raising event, Colletti has read poetry and helped raise nearly \$60,000 for Get Lit, a city program designed to provide youth with an opportunity to develop in areas of literature, writing, reading and poetry. During the last several years he has contributed both time and financial assistance to the program.

In 2011, Colletti and the Dodgers continued to partner with Guide Dogs of America, sponsoring a third guide dog to assist the visually impaired. In October 2011, Colletti partnered with radio personality Peter Tilden and Colletti's friends from the band Chicago, who played a benefit concert, raising thousands of dollars for GDA and the Foundation for Fighting Blindness.

In 2009 he received a Humanitarian Award from A Place Called Home, located in South Central Los Angeles which provides at-risk youth with a secure, positive environment empowering them to take quality and direction of their lives through programs in education, arts and well-being. The last two years he has increased his role with APCH by helping fund six college scholarships and acting as a mentor to high school and college students.

Since being introduced to the A Better LA program by former USC football coach Pete Carroll five years ago, Colletti has helped create a relationship with the coaches from the Dodgers and the coaches from that program as well as partnering with the Dodgers on contributing financial resources. The role of A Better LA is to empower community leaders to transform their neighborhood, and to give them the tools to do so.

And this season, as he has done throughout his time in Los Angeles, Colletti will donate tickets to local community-based organizations and the families of enlisted servicemen and women, giving them the opportunity to watch batting practice from the field, have dinner, visit in the general manager's box and enjoy a game.

From 1997-2004, the Giants posted a .570 winning percentage, the best eight-year record in San Francisco history and the third-best record in Major League Baseball. The club's .585 mark from 2000-04 was its best five-year mark as well.

Prior to joining the Giants, Colletti worked for the Chicago Cubs, beginning his Major League career in 1982. He worked for three years in media relations before transitioning to the baseball operations department while handling salary arbitration cases, assisting in player acquisitions, evaluations and contract negotiations. He was a member of the organization when the Cubs won National League East Division titles in 1984 and 1989 and was honored with Major League Baseball's Robert O. Fishel Award in 1990.

The Chicago native graduated from Northern Illinois University and East Leyden High School in Franklin Park, IL, the same high school attended by Washington Redskins head coach Mike Shanahan, New York Knicks general manager Glen Grunwald and former NBA head coach Jimmy Rodgers. He was inducted into the Triton College Sports Hall of Fame in 1993, entering the same time as former Major League players Kirby Puckett, Lance Johnson and Jeff Reboulet.



BOB WOLFE
EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT

Long-time baseball executive Bob Wolfe was named Executive Vice President of the Dodgers on June 7, 2012. Wolfe rejoined Dodgers President and CEO Stan Kasten with whom he teamed at the Atlanta Braves and Washington Nationals. Wolfe served as executive vice president of the Nationals from 2006-11.

Wolfe had worked in various capacities with the Braves and NBA's Atlanta Hawks for more than 20 years, including serving as Braves senior vice president of administration from 1992-2003. After working in the Braves' accounting department from 1980-84, Wolfe accepted a position as Hawks' business manager in 1985. He was named vice president/business manager of the Hawks in 1988 and subsequently enjoyed membership on both the Braves and Hawks foundations.

Wolfe's expertise in baseball and facility management includes stadium development and operations, finance and administration, sales and marketing, food and retail services, and minor-league business operations.



LON ROSEN
EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT, CHIEF MARKETING OFFICER

Lon Rosen, who has more than 25 years of experience in the sports and entertainment industry, has returned to the Los Angeles Dodger organization as Executive Vice President and Chief Marketing Officer.

Rosen previously served in the same role for two years starting in 2004 before rejoining Magic Johnson Enterprises. This time, he is working with Johnson, one of the new owners of the Dodgers. Rosen was instrumental in assisting Johnson and the Guggenheim Partners in acquiring the Dodgers on May 1, 2012 in what was the largest team sports transaction in history.

Rosen, who was influential in guiding Magic Johnson Enterprises to be recognized as one of the most successful minority business companies in the country, will oversee all activities for the Dodgers' marketing, sales, advertising, communications, community affairs and government relations.

Prior to returning to the Dodgers, Rosen focused his efforts for Magic Johnson on business development, television productions, sports consulting and new media ventures in addition to his representation of broadcasters, coaches, hosts and other entertainment personalities.

Upon graduation from college, Rosen headed to the Fabulous Forum, where he began his sports career with the NBA's Los Angeles Lakers and the NHL's Los Angeles Kings. He worked his way from an internship into a promotion as Director of Promotions for the Lakers, Kings and the Los Angeles Forum's Special Events, where he served seven years (1980-87).

From there, he started his own sports marketing company, First Team Marketing, and moved into sports marketing and sports representation. His first client was Hall of Famer Johnson.

Rosen, a University of Southern California graduate, resides in Los Angeles with his wife, Laurie, and their two sons, Michael and Brian.



SAM FERNANDEZ SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT & GENERAL COUNSEL

Sam Fernandez begins his 31st season with the Dodgers and 14th as Senior Vice President and General Counsel. He was appointed to his current position in 2000. Fernandez joined the organization and was named General Counsel on June 1, 1984. He was assigned the additional responsibilities of Assistant Secretary in 1987 and Secretary in 1998. Before joining the organization, Fernandez was an associate with the law firm of Latham & Watkins from 1980-84 and served as the Dodgers' resident counsel from Feb. 1, 1983 until he formally joined the team.

During his tenure with the Dodgers, Fernandez has been responsible for overseeing all of the team's legal affairs. His duties have included negotiating and drafting contracts with the team's broadcasting partners, concessionaires, sponsors and players, licensing the team's marks and other intellectual property, leasing the stadium for concerts and films and supervising all litigation. In addition to those duties, Fernandez has also overseen the Human Resources department since 2010.

Fernandez has worked on matters ranging from the establishment of the Dodgers' training facility in the Dominican Republic to serving on the Board of Directors of Major League Baseball Properties, Inc. He has also served on the Boards of Directors of Los Angeles Dodgers, Inc., Major League Baseball Enterprises, Inc., The Pediatrics and Family Medical Foundation in Los Angeles, the Southern California Chapter of the American Corporate Counsel Association and the Leadership Advisory Board for the Association of Media & Entertainment Counsel.

In 2013, the Los Angeles County Bar Association's Corporate Law Departments Section named Fernandez Outstanding Corporate Counsel of the Year. In 2009, he was awarded the Sports Counsel of the Year Award for outstanding service to a sports league or team by the Association of Media and Entertainment Counsel (AMEC). In 2002, Fernandez was honored as Alumnus of the Year by the Los Angeles Chapter of the University of California, Hastings College of the Law.

Fernandez graduated magna cum laude from UCLA in 1976 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in sociology and political science. He received his Juris Doctor in 1980 from the University of California, Hastings College of Law, and was elected to the Order of the Coif. He was admitted to the practice of law in 1980 and is an active member of the California State Bar, the Los Angeles County Bar Association and the American Bar Association. Fernandez and his wife, Susan, reside in Manhattan Beach, CA. They have two children, Kristina and Mike.



RENATA SIMRIL SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT, EXTERNAL AFFAIRS

Renata Simril was appointed Senior Vice President, External Affairs by the Dodgers on Sept. 10, 2012. Simril, a former deputy mayor under Mayor James Hahn, came to the Dodgers from Jones Lang LaSalle, where she served as managing director of the financial and professional services firm's public institutions practice. In that role, she guided the firm's overall business development strategy, marketing and branding for the Southwest region.

Prior to that, Simril was senior vice president with Forest City Enterprises, where she was responsible for Southern California operations. She also served as deputy mayor for Economic Development in the Hahn administration. In this capacity, she oversaw and managed five of the city's community and economic development departments and led policy, legislative and budget affairs. Before going to city hall, Simril held various positions with for-profit and non-profit organizations. She began her career as a policy deputy for former City Council member Mark Ridley-Thomas. Simril served as a Military Police Officer in the United States Army prior to earning a B.A. in urban studies from Loyola Marymount University and a master's in real estate development from The Price School of Public Policy at USC.



JANET MARIE SMITH

SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT, PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT

Renowned architect and urban planner Janet Marie Smith was named the Dodgers' Senior Vice President of Planning and Development on Aug. 6, 2012. Smith is overseeing upgrades and enhancements to Dodger Stadium. This post reunites Smith with Dodger President Stan Kasten. Smith worked for Kasten in a similar position to create the Atlanta Braves' Turner Field and the Atlanta Hawks' Philips Arena.

Smith is probably best known in the baseball world for her work on the influential Oriole Park at Camden Yards. Smith worked for the Orioles from 1989-94 as vice president of planning and development during the design and construction of the park. Opening in 1992, Camden Yards immediately became the standard-bearer for a new wave of traditional baseball parks that have been built in subsequent years. Smith played an instrumental role in the design of the ballpark, creating a state-of-the-art unique facility that blends with the urban context of downtown Baltimore while taking inspiration from baseball parks built in the early 20th century.

Prior to joining the Dodgers, Smith had a second tour with the Orioles as vice president of planning and development from September 2009-August 2012. In that role, Smith directed renovations and expansion of the Orioles' new spring training facility in Sarasota, FL, as well as upgrades and enhancements to Oriole Park at Camden Yards to celebrate the park's 20th anniversary.

From 2002-09, Smith served as senior vice president of planning and development for the Boston Red Sox, overseeing the preservation of historic Fenway Park and leading the program that placed this significant ballpark on the National Historic Register.

From 1994-2000, Smith held the position of president of Turner Sports and Entertainment Development, a division of Turner Broadcasting System, and was the vice president of Planning and Development for the Atlanta Braves. Her work in Atlanta helped transform the 1996 Olympic Stadium into Turner Field, home of the Braves, and she also oversaw the development of the Philips Arena, home of the NBA Atlanta Hawks and NHL Atlanta Thrashers.

Smith also worked as senior advisor of planning and design with Baltimore-based Struever Bros. Eccles & Rouse on many of their development and rehab projects from Nashville, TN to Providence, RI, including concept planning for the renovation of the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, CA. She was also part of the THINK team, one of the final two teams in the competition for the World Trade Center site in New York City in 2002.

In 2012, the Boston Baseball Writers honored Smith with a Special Achievement Award for her work at Fenway Park. In 2011, she was named in the Inaugural Class of the Sports Business Journal "Game Changers: Women in Sports Business."

Before working in sports, Smith worked on urban development projects, including Pershing Square in Los Angeles and Battery Park City in New York City, where she served as coordinator of Architecture and Design.

Smith holds a Master's degree in Urban Planning from City College of New York and a bachelor of architecture degree from Mississippi State University. She is an associate member of the Urban Land Institute, American Institute of Architects and the American Planning Association. She also serves on the board of directors for Berklee College of Music in Boston and the advisory board for the University of Michigan Sports Management Program.

A native of Jackson, MS., Smith resides in Baltimore with her husband, Bart Harvey, and their three children.



MICHAEL YOUNG SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT OF CORPORATE PARTNERSHIPS

Michael Young is entering his fifth season with the Dodgers. In his role, he oversees corporate partnership sales, and is responsible for overseeing and developing the joint sales strategies and relationships with Dodgers' media partners. He also sits on the board for the club's Spring Training home, Camelback Ranch - Glendale.

In 2011, Young was responsible for forging the new radio broadcast partnership between the Dodgers and Clear Channel's KLAC, which has been the catalyst for the increased market share and growth of the Dodgers' radio network.

2013 is Young's 28th year in professional sports (10 as a professional football player and 18 in the front office). He joined the Dodgers following 13 years with the Denver Broncos, where he was responsible for corporate partnerships, marketing and branding. While with the Broncos as the Senior Director of Special Projects for the NFL club, he developed and was responsible for the Broncos' Corporate Sponsorship department.

Young also served as the Executive Vice President of the Arena Football League's Colorado Crush. Along with NFL Hall of Famer John Elway, he helped develop the team from the ground up and the Crush won the Arena League championship in just its third season.

Young, 51, successfully made the transition to the Broncos' front office after a 10-year career as a wide receiver in the NFL. He played for the Los Angeles Rams (1985-88), Broncos (1989-92), Philadelphia Eagles (1993) and Kansas City Chiefs (1994). He was the Broncos' leading receiver in 1991.

The Visalia, CA, native was a two-sport athlete at UCLA, where he was an Academic All-Pac 10 selection in 1984 and led all receivers in the Bruins' Rose Bowl Championship. Following the 1985 Fiesta Bowl, in which he was the leading receiver, he was drafted by the Rams. Young also played two seasons on the UCLA baseball team, before being drafted by the New York Mets. He graduated from UCLA with a bachelor of science degree in Sociology.

Young credits his career in sports to the Dodgers' legendary team physician, Dr. Frank Jobe. Shortly after Young separated his left shoulder as a 16-year-old prospect, the Dodgers' scouting department arranged for Dr. Jobe to perform shoulder surgery that would put his athletic career back on track.

Young sits on the Advisory Board of the Los Angeles Sports and Entertainment Commission and is on the board of the Los Angeles Sports Council. He also serves on the steering committee for UCLA's Institute for the Economics of Sports and Society. Young is a past spokesman for the Colorado Special Olympics and the Juvenile Diabetes Foundation. He is a member of the Advisory Council for the Recreation & Tourism Department at Cal Poly University.

Young and his wife, Jill, reside in Pasadena and have three daughters, Christine, Britteny and Madison.



TUCKER KAIN CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER

Tucker Kain joined the Los Angeles Dodgers in August 2012 as Chief Financial Officer. Kain is also Managing Director of Guggenheim Baseball Management, LP, the Club Ownership Group. Previously, Kain was a Vice President at Guggenheim Partners in New York City, working in the corporate credit group overseeing an investment portfolio in

excess of \$2 billion. Kain grew up in Cleveland, OH, and received a bachelor of arts in Economics from Williams (MA) College.



BOB ENGLE VICE PRESIDENT, INTERNATIONAL SCOUTING

Long-time international scout Bob Engle was named Vice-President of International Scouting for the Dodgers on Nov. 1, 2012. Engle, who served in the same capacity for the Seattle Mariners since 2004, has been in Major League Baseball since 1974 and has been instrumental in the signing of four Cy Young Award winners. Engle, who also has worked for the Baltimore Orioles and Toronto Blue Jays, was instrumental in the scouting and signing of Cy Young Award winners Roy Halladay, Chris Carpenter, Pat Hentgen and Felix Hernandez. Hired as Midwest Scouting Supervisor by the Orioles in 1974, Engle moved to the Blue Jays two years later and spent the next 24 years with Toronto. He was hired by the Blue Jays in 1976 as Eastern Scouting Supervisor, promoted to Eastern Regional Scouting Director in 1982, and to Director of Scouting in 1990. He continued his advancement in the Blue Jays organization, becoming Assistant General Manager in 1995 and Senior Advisor, Baseball Operations in 1997.

Engle joined the Mariners in 2000 as Senior Advisor to the Vice-President and General Manager of Baseball Operations. He was named Director of International Operations in 2004 and was promoted to Vice-President, International Operations in 2007.

Voted East Coast Scout of the Year in 2011, Engle is a member of the Pennsylvania Hall of Fame. He attended Mesa (CO) College before graduating from the University of Colorado, Boulder. Engle and his wife, Barbara, reside in Tampa, FL.



VANCE LOVELACE VICE PRESIDENT, PLAYER PERSONNEL

Vance Lovelace enters his 13th season with the Dodgers and first as Vice President, Player Personnel.

In his current capacity, Lovelace is responsible for scouting the Major League club and working directly with GM Ned Colletti regarding roster moves and player acquisitions. Lovelace, a key member of the decision-making core, joined the Dodgers as a professional scout in 2001, and was promoted to Special Assistant on Nov. 7, 2006. His career in baseball operations began in 1997 as a pitching coach and assistant general manager for the New Jersey Jackals of the Northern League, a position he held for three seasons.

Lovelace enjoyed a 13-year career (1981-94) in professional baseball, appearing in nine games in three seasons in the Major Leagues with the Angels (1988-89) and Mariners (1990) as a left-handed pitcher.

After being drafted in the first round (16th pick) in 1981 by the Cubs, he was traded in 1983 to Los Angeles with Dan Cataline for Ron Cey. At the time, Colletti was a member of Chicago's front office.

That season, Lovelace won eight games for the Dodgers' Single-A affiliate in Vero Beach before posting a 3.88 ERA in 16 starts for Double-A San Antonio in 1984. He split time with those two teams in 1985, appearing in 18 games before the Angels drafted him from Los Angeles in December of that season. He made his big league debut in the 17th inning of a game on Sept. 10, 1988 vs. Texas.

Lovelace also played for the China Trust Whales in Taiwan in 1995.

The Tampa, FL native was a member of the 1979 Belmont Heights Senior League World Series team alongside fellow future Major Leaguers Dwight Gooden and Floyd Youmans.



RICK RAGAZZO VICE PRESIDENT, PRO SCOUTING

Rick Ragazzo enters his sixth season with the Dodgers, 25th in professional baseball and first as Vice President, Pro Scouting. In his role, Ragazzo is responsible for the Organization's professional scouts and reports directly to General Manager Ned Colletti.

Ragazzo, a key member of the baseball operations decision-making core, assists Colletti with Major League roster moves and player acquisitions. He joined the Dodgers after 19 years with the San Francisco Giants' organization, where he headed the club's international operations, particularly in Latin America and the Pacific Rim, and assisted GM Brian Sabean on Major League matters, signing numerous Latin players.

Prior to joining the Giants, Ragazzo served as an assistant coach at Fullerton College (1985-88) and Loyola Marymount University (1988-90). He began his professional baseball career as an area scout for the Giants in July 1990. He scouted the Southern California and Hawaii territories for six years before being promoted to the international position in 1997.

He holds a bachelor's degree in Physical Sciences from California State University, Fullerton and a master's degree in Education Administration from Azusa Pacific University.

Ragazzo and his wife, Eileen, reside in Leona Valley, CA and have four sons, Austen, Ryan, Dominic and Trevor.



DE JON WATSON VICE PRESIDENT, PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

De Jon Watson enters his seventh year with the Dodgers and first as Vice President, Player Development. In this role, he is responsible for developing and evaluating all players in the Dodgers' minor league system, appointing all minor league managers and coaching staff, as well as all coordinator and instructor positions. He also oversees the club's winter ball participation and relationships between the Dodgers and their minor league affiliates.

Watson serves as an advisor to General Manager Ned Colletti on 40-man roster moves and Major League acquisitions in addition to overseeing all minor league transactions.

In 2010, Topps named the Dodgers as Organization of the Year. The prestigious award dates back to 1966 and highlights the Major League team that has shown outstanding performance, depth and talent throughout their Major and Minor League teams.

Watson and his staff conducted the sixth annual Winter Prospect Development Program this January that included instruction both on and off the field. In addition to learning the game from Dodger legends like Maury Wills, Don Newcombe, Steve Yeager, Ramon Martinez and others, the young players take part in classroom sessions that help them acclimate to Los Angeles and the Major Leagues upon their eventual arrival. Since the Winter Development Program's inception in 2008, 36 participating players have reached the Major Leagues, including 2012 participants Michael Antonini, Alex Castellanos, Stephen Fife, Shawn Tolleson, Scott Van Slyke, Nathan Eovaldi, Dee Gordon, Javy Guerra, Josh Lindblom and Josh Wall.

Since joining the Dodgers, Watson has brought several former Dodger players back into the fold as minor league instructors, including Tim Wallach, Franklin Stubbs, Aaron Sele, Matt Herges, Martinez and Jody Reed.

In 2009, Watson spearheaded the team's effort to return to Venezuela, where the franchise signed a partnership with the La Guaira Tiburones to help develop talent that will eventually reach the big leagues.

Watson, 46, is beginning his 28th year in professional baseball. He joined the Dodgers from the Cleveland Indians, where he was the Director of Professional Scouting for three seasons (2004-06), working directly with the general manager on building the Major League roster through trades and free agent acquisitions. Prior to joining the Indians, the Baldwin Hills, CA native served as the Reds' Scouting Director from 1998-00, where more than 25 of his draft choices reached a Major League 40-man roster, including future big leaguers Adam Dunn and Austin Kearns. He moved to the professional scouting side with the Reds in 2001 and 2002.

Watson first began working in baseball in 1991 with the Florida Marlins following a five-year playing career in the Royals' organization. He started as an area scout in Los Angeles and was a member of Florida's front office when the club won its first World Championship in 1997.

A graduate of Santa Monica High School, Watson was an outfielder/first baseman at West Los Angeles Community College, where he played for current Dodger scout Artie Harris and was a third-round draft choice of the Royals. He and his wife, Joal, reside in Maricopa, Arizona with their daughter, Mia, and sons, Michael, De Jon Jr. and Jianni.



LOGAN WHITE

VICE PRESIDENT, AMATEUR SCOUTING

Logan White begins his 12th season with the Dodgers and first as Vice President, Amateur Scouting. In this capacity, White's primary responsibilities are overseeing the organization's amateur scouting efforts, including the annual June First-Year Player Draft, along with assisting the GM in various capacities.

In 2010, Topps named the Dodgers as Organization of the Year. The prestigious award dates back to 1966 and highlights the Major League team that has shown outstanding performance, depth and talent throughout their Major and Minor League teams.

Prior to being promoted to Assistant GM in 2007, White served as the Director of Amateur Scouting for the Dodgers for five seasons. In that role, he headed up the draft selections or signings of 25 players, including five All-Stars, who have appeared in the Major Leagues for the Dodgers in the past five seasons - Tony Abreu, Chad Billingsley, Jonathan Broxton, Ivan De Jesus, Rubby De La Rosa, Blake DeWitt, Scott Elbert, A.J. Ellis, Javy Guerra, Chin-lung Hu, Eric Hull, Kenley Jansen, Matt Kemp, Clayton Kershaw, Andy LaRoche, Brent Leach, James Loney, Russell Martin, James McDonald, Russ Mitchell, Xavier Paul, Eric Stults, Ramon Troncoso, Cory Wade and Delwyn Young. Along with his staff of amateur scouts, White's history of success in the draft helped lead to the Dodgers being named Baseball America's 2006 Organization of the Year.

With White in charge of amateur scouting, the Dodgers have built a core of homegrown talent, reaching the NLCS twice in the past five seasons. The Dodgers' June 2004 First-Year Player draft was rated by Baseball America as the best draft in the National League and second best in baseball. Its 2003 draft was tabbed as the best in the Major Leagues by the publication and its 2002 draft was rated as the fourth-best draft in baseball. The Dodgers were the only team to have their draft rated in the top five in each of those three seasons.

Last year, White tabbed infielder Corey Seager with the 18th overall selection in the First Year Player Draft. Seager was named a 2012 mlb.com organizational All-Star and was the first position player drafted in the first round by White since James Loney in 2002. His second-round choice, Paco Rodriguez, became the first player from the 2012 draft class to reach the Major Leagues.

The strategy of taking pitchers with his first pick has paid dividends, as the team has graduated several draftees to the Major Leagues, including Billingsley, Broxton, Kershaw and Elbert while a plethora of pitching talent remains in the minor leagues, including Zack Lee, Chris Reed and fellow first-round draft choices Aaron Miller (2009) and Chris Withrow (2007), among others.

The Dodgers' scouting success hasn't been limited to the first few rounds, either, as the team's 17th-round pick in 2002, Martin, emerged as a two-time All-Star catcher, while Kemp, a sixth-round selection, was the National League's MVP runner-up in 2011.

In addition to his work at the amateur level, White played a significant role in the signing of Takashi Saito, a non-roster invitee in 2006 who became one of the game's top closers, as well as the scouting and signing of right-hander Hiroki Kuroda, who joined the Dodgers in 2008 following a successful professional career in Japan.

Prior to joining the Dodgers, White spent seven years with the Baltimore Orioles as the West Coast Supervisor with responsibilities including overseeing all area scouts from the Western part of the United States, as well as evaluating players in Canada and Australia.

White's scouting experience is extensive, as he served as the West Coast Supervisor for the San Diego Padres from 1993-95, an area scout with Baltimore from 1990-92 and an associate scout with the Seattle Mariners from 1988-89.

He was a minor league pitcher in the Seattle Mariners' organization from 1984-87 and was signed by Jeff Malinoff.

Originally from Portales, NM, White graduated from Western New Mexico University with honors and was an Academic All-American in 1984. In 1996, he was inducted into the Western New Mexico University Hall of Fame.

White, his wife, Deena, and son, Logan, Jr., reside in Gilbert, AZ.



GERRY HUNSICKER SENIOR ADVISOR, BASEBALL OPERATIONS

Gerry Hunsicker, former general manager of the Houston Astros and most recently a senior vice president with the Tampa Bay Rays, was named senior advisor for baseball operations by the Dodgers on Oct. 18, 2012. Hunsicker will assist General Manager Ned Colletti and President and CEO Stan Kasten with the Dodgers' big league club while also lending his expertise to international scouting and development, pro scouting and Minor League development.

Hunsicker was instrumental in refocusing Tampa Bay's international scouting and helped establish academies in both the Dominican Republic and Venezuela. Hunsicker was the Houston general manager from 1996-2004, during which time the club won four division titles. The team reached the World Series in 2005. In 1998, when the Astros won 102 games, he was named The Sporting News executive of the year. He served in various management positions with the New York Mets before rejoining the Astros. Hunsicker filled several roles for the Astros from 1978-81, including traveling secretary, minor league pitching coach, scout and assistant to the general manager. From 1981-83, he worked for Tal Smith Enterprises in Houston and was involved in preparing salary arbitration cases.

After the 2004 season, Hunsicker resigned from the Houston general manager job with one year remaining on his contract, but continued as a Houston advisor. In 2005, he joined the new management group in Tampa Bay and assisted Executive Vice President of Baseball Operations Andrew Friedman in reshaping the baseball operations department. Before moving to professional baseball, Hunsicker was assistant athletic director and assistant baseball coach at Florida International University, where he received a master's degree in management after doing his undergraduate studies at St. Joseph's (PA) University. Hunsicker is a member of the St. Joseph's baseball and athletic halls of fame, as well as the Texas Baseball Hall of Fame.



ALEX TAMIN DIRECTOR OF BASEBALL CONTRACTS, RESEARCH & OPERATIONS

Alex Tamin begins his second season with the Dodgers as Director of Baseball Contracts, Research and Operations.

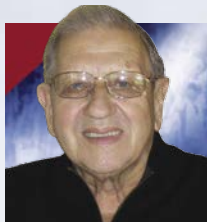
In his role, Tamin works closely with General Manager Ned Colletti on all matters relating to the major league team including trades, roster transactions and free agent signings. He is also the point person on all of the club's arbitration-eligible players, reaching agreements in 2012 with AJ Ellis and Ronald Belisario.

Tamin also oversees the club's day-to-day baseball research and operations to provide information, statistical profiles and decision tools for the club's personnel transactions.

Prior to joining the Dodgers, Tamin spent more than 15 years representing a number of Major League teams - including the Dodgers - in player salary arbitrations and contract negotiations. In that role, he represented clubs in successful arbitration hearings against Cy Young winner Eric Gagné and All-Stars Jered Weaver, Kevin Millwood and Francisco Rodriguez. Tamin also maintained a legal practice focused on complex commercial litigation during that time.

He graduated from the Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, MD in 1992 and completed his J.D. at the UCLA School of Law in 1995.

Tamin and his wife, Jennifer, reside in Stevenson Ranch, CA with their sons, Brandon and Matthew, and daughter, Brooke.



KEN BRACEY

SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO THE GENERAL MANAGER

One of the most respected scouts in baseball, Ken Bracey enters his fourth season with the Dodgers following 37 seasons in the San Diego Padres' organization. He was named Special Assistant to General Manager Ned Colletti on Dec. 21, 2009.

Bracey joined the Padres in their inaugural 1969 season and has worked as an area scout, a national crosschecker, a minor league manager and, most recently, as a Major League scout from 1991-2009, where he was a part of the Padres' pennant-winning clubs in 1984 and 1998. He had worked continuously for the club from 1969-87 and again from 1990-2009 and served as a scout with the Brewers from 1987-90.

The Dunlap, IL resident was honored in 2004 as the Midwest Scout of the Year.

Bracey pitched nine seasons in the minor leagues with the Yankees' and Giants' organizations. He and his wife, Nancy, have two daughters and six grandchildren.



TONEY HOWELL

SPECIAL ASSISTANT, PRO SCOUTING

Toney Howell enters his seventh year with the Dodgers and his responsibilities include Major League scouting, consulting on player trades, acquisitions and roster moves in addition to other special assignments.

Before joining the Dodgers, Howell was a professional and Major League scout for the Milwaukee Brewers for three seasons (2004-06).

Prior to his time with the Brewers, he spent eight seasons (1996-2003) with the Texas Rangers as a professional scout. His career in scouting began in 1985 with the Chicago Cubs as an amateur scout, a position he held for 10 seasons. He was also a minor league hitting instructor for the Cubs.

Howell attended the Ohio State University, where he played baseball as an outfielder and football as a strong safety for three years, twice being named an All-American in both sports. He was drafted by the Cincinnati Reds following his junior year in 1980 after leading the nation in batting average.

In addition to his professional playing career, which included brief stints with the Houston Astros in 1984 and 1985, Howell was an alternate in the 1992 Olympics as a third-degree black belt in Tae Kwon Do.

In 2010, Howell was named the MLB Executive of the Year by the Pitch & Hit Club of Chicago, a professional baseball organization formed more than 60 years ago to promote goodwill toward the game and fellowship among professionals in baseball.

He and his wife, Coclough, have four children, Nicole (26), Dejon (25), James (24) and Toney Jr. (22).



STAN CONTE VICE PRESIDENT, MEDICAL SERVICES

Stan Conte begins his first season as Vice President, Medical Services for the Dodgers.

In his role, Conte, 58, manages the Major and minor league medical departments and also handles medical risk assessment and injury management.

Conte, regarded as one of the top experts in physical therapy and conditioning in professional sports, joined the Dodgers as Head Athletic Trainer in October 2006 following 15 seasons with the San Francisco Giants, including seven as head athletic trainer and physical therapist. Prior to his promotion in 2000, he served as the team's assistant athletic trainer and coordinator of strength and rehabilitation for the previous eight years.

Conte received his B.S. in physical therapy at California State University, Northridge in 1978 and his doctorate of physical therapy at Boston University in 2010. He lectures locally and nationally on the treatment and rehabilitation of sports injuries, and authored "Major League Disability Days: An Eleven-Year Study," which was published in the prestigious American Journal of Sports Medicine. He has served on several MLB committees, including the co-chairman of the Analytic Committee and member of the Injury Surveillance System as well as on the expert panel of the MLB Research Committee.

Conte and his wife, Nancy, reside in San Carlos, CA and have two children, Nick and Alison.



MAURY WILLS INSTRUCTOR

Maury Wills returns for 2013 in his role as an instructor for the Dodgers' Major League and minor league players. In this capacity, Wills serves as a baserunning and bunting coach during Spring Training as well as throughout the regular season in Los Angeles. Wills has also worked with the Dodgers' prospects during the Winter

Development Program.

In 2010, Wills was voted as the fifth-greatest Los Angeles Dodger of all-time by readers of the Los Angeles Times.

Wills, 80, first came to Spring Training with the Dodgers in 1951 at the age of 18 and worked his way up through the farm system, making his Major League debut with Los Angeles on June 6, 1959. He played 14 Major League seasons with the Dodgers, Pirates and Expos and had a career batting average of .281 with 586 stolen bases, the 19th-highest total in Major League history.

The seven-time All-Star helped to transform the game of baseball with his speed in the 1960s, as he led the league in stolen bases for six consecutive seasons from 1960-65, including a then-Major League record of 104 in 1962. That season, he earned the National League Gold Glove Award and NL Most Valuable Player honors when he batted .299 with 130 runs, 208 hits, six homers and 48 RBI in 165 games.

The Washington, DC native appeared in four World Series with the Dodgers (1959, 1963, 1965 and 1966), including World Championships in his first three visits to the Fall Classic.

He was the first player to bat on artificial turf when he came up to hit on April 18, 1966 at the Houston Astrodome and singled up the middle off Turk Farrell.

Even during his playing career, Wills began managing in Hermosillo, Mexico between seasons in 1970-71 and was voted the top manager in the league. He realized his dream of becoming a Major League manager when he served as skipper of the Seattle Mariners during the 1980-81 seasons.

Wills also spent six years as a baseball analyst for NBC Sports on the Major League Baseball Game of the Week and one year as an HBO network in-studio sports personality. He also has been a trainer for 15 different Major League baseball teams, teaching the art of base-running and stealing and trained the Osaka, "Hankyu Braves" in Japan for four years.

Under then-Governor Ronald Reagan, Wills was the Chairman of Athletics for Youth in the State of California. He has also worked as Assistant to Pittsburgh's Mayor Barr in Youth Relations and was Assistant to the District Attorney of Clark County, Nevada for Youth Programs. He was involved with the Red Ribbon Program, a national organization dedicated to the prevention of drug abuse whose slogan is "Hugs not Drugs," and he is a Youth Drug Program Role Model for the Redondo Beach Crime Watch. Wills also makes numerous appearances for the Dodgers' Community Relations Department throughout the year.

Wills has written three books, *It Pays to Steal* (1963), *How to Steal a Pennant* (1976) and *On the Run* (1992).

COMMUNITY



Dodger pitcher Clayton Kershaw was named the recipient of the 2012 Roberto Clemente Award prior to Game Four of the 2012 World Series.

At just 24 years old, Kershaw, who has been a dedicated man of service to communities both local and abroad, is the youngest player to ever win the Clemente Award. This prestigious award recognizes a Major League Baseball player who best represents the game through positive contributions on and off the field, including sportsmanship and community involvement. "It means everything," Kershaw said. "It's really hard to put into words how much it means to me. It means more than any individual award I could ever receive. What Roberto Clemente did, not only on the field – he was such an incredible player – but off the field, his humanitarian work and the things he was doing, it really means so much and it's really humbling to be in the same sentence as him. It's just really fulfilling."



ROBERTO CLEMENTE AWARD

The annual award pays tribute to Clemente's achievements and character by recognizing current players who truly understand the value of helping others. It is named for the Hall of Famer and 15-time All-Star who died in a plane crash on New Year's Eve 1972 while attempting to deliver supplies to earthquake victims in Nicaragua.

"His accomplishments on the mound at such a young age are well known to baseball fans, but I am delighted that our game can shine a light on Clayton's extraordinary efforts with his wife Ellen to make a difference in the lives of children in Zambia," MLB Commissioner Allan H. "Bud" Selig said. "Clayton Kershaw is a leader through his inspiring example, and he is a wonderful representation of the enduring, philanthropic spirit of Roberto Clemente."

In 2010, Clayton Kershaw followed his new bride Ellen to Lusaka, Zambia in Africa where Ellen had been doing missionary work for several years. Kershaw met Hope, a young girl that Ellen met on a previous trip, and quickly understood Ellen's passion and the immense need for helping the children of Zambia.

Before the 2011 season, Kershaw's Challenge was launched. With a goal of "Strikeout to Serve" and an original mission to raise enough money to buy land in Lusaka on which to build an orphanage, "Hope's Home," Kershaw committed to donate \$100 to Kershaw's Challenge for every strikeout he threw during the season and asked fans to join him in the journey.

In January 2012, the Kershaws, having raised enough money for the land, returned to Lusaka to find the perfect location for an orphanage and purchased the land. Ground was not yet broken but the vision was becoming a reality.

On January 5, 2013, the Kershaws, along with their closest family and friends who made the trip with them, were present for the official opening of Hope's Home, now known in Lusaka as the Arise Africa orphanage. Eight children from some of the most dire circumstances, now have a place to call home. They are experiencing a real roof over their head, mattresses to sleep on, running water and three meals a day - all completely new to them. With the help, guidance and mentoring of three housemothers, Armond, Brian, Peter, Alliness, Hope, Nelly, Dorothy and Andrew are thriving in their new home.

Knowing the need to help children and families at home in the U.S., the mission of Kershaw's Challenge has expanded. It will continue to help sustain Hope's Home and to expand resources in Lusaka to reach and help more children. Kershaw's Challenge now provides support to the Peacock Foundation, Mercy Street and I Am Second; all non-profit organizations that help at-risk and traumatized children and their families in Los Angeles, youth near Kershaw's hometown in Dallas and people nationwide respectively.

The Los Angeles Dodgers and the Los Angeles Dodgers Foundation have the profound ability to expand their positive influence and resources to communities throughout the region. From the team's long-standing reputation and player prestige to the stadium and field of play on which the Dodgers operate, the history and assets make the franchise one of the most revered and recognized brands not only in this region but in the world. These assets offer the potential to create significant positive social impact.

The Dodgers have created a new formula that ensures that both the Los Angeles Dodgers Community Relations department and the Los Angeles Dodgers Foundation are strategically aligned and mutually supportive of each other's respective mission.

Our new formula for giving is:

Sports + Education + Health = Success on and off the field.

SPORTS AND RECREATION

The first pillar of the team's new formula is Sports and Recreation. The Foundation will continue to put its resources behind building Dreamfields throughout the Los Angeles area. Community Relations will support that initiative by conducting kids and coaches clinics, making sure that a new generation of baseball fans has the tools and direction to enjoy America's pastime.

EDUCATION AND LITERACY

The second pillar of the team's formula is Education and Literacy. Just as important as giving kids a safe and well-equipped place to play is the need to offer them assistance that will benefit them in the classroom. The Foundation has several education and literacy programs that it will support and Community Relations will bolster those efforts with initiatives of its own.

DODGERS IN THE AFRICAN AMERICAN COMMUNITY

Jackie Robinson's signing with the Brooklyn Dodgers organization in October 1945 not only changed a nation, but also paved the way for other African-American players to join the Dodgers and become Major League stars. No other player in baseball history faced the scrutiny and pressure as Robinson did during his rookie season with Brooklyn. Robinson made his Major League debut on April 15, 1947 and 50 years later his uniform No. 42 would be retired by all Major League teams. On the field, Robinson won the first Rookie of the Year Award in 1947 and was the National League's Most Valuable Player in 1949. He compiled a lifetime .311 batting average in 10 seasons and was named to the Hall of Fame in 1962 in his first year of eligibility.

While Robinson was based in Canada during the 1946 season at the Dodgers' Triple-A farm club in Montreal, pitcher Don Newcombe and catcher Roy Campanella were making history in the United States playing for Brooklyn's Class-B Nashua (NH) affiliate of the New England League. Campanella was promoted to the Dodgers in 1948 and he eventually became a three-time N.L. MVP and member of Baseball's Hall of Fame. Newcombe joined the Dodgers a year later and would become the first player in baseball history to win the sport's three major honors - Rookie of the Year (1949), MVP (1956) and Cy Young Award (1956).

Continuing the club's history with the African American community we are committed to elevating the presence of African Americans in the game of baseball - both on the field and just as importantly off the field.

In January of this year, the Dodgers sponsored and participated in the 28th Annual Kingdom Day Parade in South Los Angeles with Dodger All-Star Matt Kemp serving as the Celebrity Grand Marshal. The Kingdom Day Parade is a day of

celebration that remembers the life and

legacy of civil rights leader, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. King along with his wife, Coretta Scott King, paved the way to establish equality, justice and social unity throughout this country.

Dodger alumni rode in the parade in a Dodger fire truck where they were greeted by more than 300,000 spectators that lined MLK and Crenshaw Blvds.

The City of Los Angeles celebrated the 2013 African American Heritage Month with an Opening Ceremony on Friday, February 8 in Council Chambers at City Hall honoring the contributions and traditions of African Americans. With the theme, "Continuing the Dream, African Americans at the Crossroad of Freedom and Equality," Dodger legends Don Newcombe, Maury Wills and "Sweet" Lou Johnson joined Mayor Antonio R. Villaraigosa to recognize this year's honorees, Danny Glover, LL Cool J and LeVar Burton, with the City's highest honor and a special Jackie Robinson baseball jersey. The event was attended by 250 business, faith-based, community and civic leaders from throughout Los Angeles.

On April 15, 2013 in a game vs. San Diego, the Dodgers will celebrate the life and legacy of Jackie Robinson. A series of special activities will precede the game as well as bringing together community leaders, business leaders and celebrities from the African American community to pay respects to Jackie Robinson. The first 40,000 fans in attendance will receive a first of its kind commemorative

statue of Jackie Robinson, Don Newcombe & Roy Campanella statue.

Mirroring the footprint of Viva Los Dodgers and a vision of centerfielder Matt Kemp, Beats and Baseball will take place on July 27. This event will be free to fans with tickets to the day's game and will feature new and up-and-coming urban musical acts from the African American community and an appearance by Matt Kemp.

The Dodgers are also leading the way to bring back the Annual Jazz on the Grass (JAZZ) benefit, produced by noted director and producer Oz Scott and his wife, Lynne. JAZZ will be held on October 5 to help raise funds for The Los Angeles Dodgers Foundation and the Team 42 Scholars of the Jackie Robinson Foundation's Education and Leadership Development Program. JAZZ will feature a list of nationally and internationally renowned musical artists bringing together prominent African American business, civic and community leaders, as well as entertainers and celebrities.

THE DODGERS AND THE LOS ANGELES LATINO COMMUNITY

Since 1958, the Dodgers have been the MLB leader in Hispanic market outreach. More than 40 percent of Dodger fans are of Latin American descent and each season, the Dodgers attract more than one million Latino fans. Fifty-five years ago, the Dodgers instituted the first and now longest-running Spanish-language radio broadcast. The Dodgers were also one of the first MLB teams to implement a Spanish-language Web site, losdodgers.com. Dodger Spanish-language radio broadcasts run on Univision America's 1020 AM KTNQ, the home of the Dodgers' Spanish-language broadcasting team - Hall of Famer Jaime Jarrín, broadcaster Pepe Yñiguez and legendary Dodger pitcher Fernando Valenzuela. The station broadcasts all 162 regular-season

games, select Spring Training games and is the fourth Spanish-language radio home of the Dodgers since the team moved to Los Angeles. This season, the Dodgers will continue to broadcast select games in Spanish on PRIME TICKET with Dodger Coach Manny Mota as analyst and Dodger broadcaster Jorge Jarrin serving as the play-by-play announcer. This marks the fourth season that the Dodgers have had a Spanish-language television broadcast.

The Dodgers have also played a major role in fostering Latin American talent, having signed hundreds of players from Latin American countries throughout the team's history. In 2012, the Dodgers signed more than 30 Latin American players. The Dodgers celebrate Los Angeles Latino culture and the legacy of Latin American Dodgers past and present each year with "Viva Los

Dodgers Days," a season-long initiative with events scheduled each Sunday of every Dodger homestand. Starting two hours before each Sunday game, fans enjoy live music and a family-friendly celebration. Former and current Dodgers sign

autographs for fans and special guests have included MLS stars and boxing champions. Current Latino Dodgers that made appearances at Viva Los Dodgers Day in 2012 included Adrian Gonzalez, Luis Cruz, Hanley Ramirez, Javy Guerra, Alex Castellanos and Paco Rodriguez.

Musical talent has included both Latin Grammy and Grammy-nominated artists. The initiative culminates

yearly with "La Gran Fiesta: Viva Los Dodgers" and the 2013 season will mark the fourth year of the "Viva Los Dodgers Day" initiative.

In Arizona at Camelback Ranch - Glendale, members of the Mexican media have visited during Spring Training for five years in a row. Representatives from Mexican media outlets are extended hospitality in an effort to continue the Dodgers' connection with Mexico. Jarrín, Valenzuela and Yñiguez host the group as they attend games and are given access to Dodger players and coaches for interviews and photo opportunities. This year will mark the first year in which the Mexican media contingent will visit Dodger Stadium.

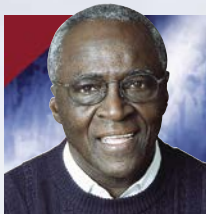

“SWEET” LOU JOHNSON

COMMUNITY AFFAIRS LIAISON

“Sweet” Lou Johnson is beginning his 32nd season as a member of the Dodgers’ Community Affairs department and his 35th as a member of the organization. In his current capacity, the former Dodger outfielder makes dozens of appearances throughout Southern California on behalf of the team each year.

Johnson, 78, will forever be remembered for his heroics in the 1965 World Series when his home run in Game 7 of the Fall Classic against the Minnesota Twins gave the Dodgers their third world championship. He played for Los Angeles from 1965-67 as part of an eight-year big league career with the Dodgers, Cubs, Angels, Indians and Braves.

The Lexington, KY native played for the Kansas City Monarchs of the Negro Leagues before a long minor league career with several franchises. The Dodgers acquired him in exchange for Larry Sherry prior to the 1964 season and became the team’s regular left fielder for three seasons after Tommy Davis suffered an ankle injury in 1965.

That year, Johnson hit 12 homers to tie for the team lead and stole 15 bases, he was second on the club in home runs in 1966 (17) when he helped the team reach the World Series against Baltimore and also finished second in homers for the Dodgers in 1967 (11).

On Sept. 9, 1965, Johnson played left field and had the only hit for either team in Sandy Koufax’s perfect game against the Cubs.

In an eight-year big league career, Johnson posted a .258 average with 48 home runs and 232 RBI in 677 games. Johnson resides in Los Angeles with his wife Sara.



RON CEY

MARKETING & COMMUNITY RELATIONS

Ron Cey begins his 32nd season in the Dodger organization and his 17th year as a member of the front office. In this capacity, he makes numerous appearances on behalf of the team in the community and in conjunction with the club’s corporate sponsors.

Cey, 65, spent 17 seasons in the Major Leagues, including 12 with the Dodgers from 1971-82. Nicknamed “The Penguin,” he was a six-time National League All-Star and is the franchise’s all-time home run leader among third basemen with 228. He retired as the Los Angeles Dodgers’ all-time home run leader, a mark that was surpassed by Eric Karros.

A lifetime .261 hitter with 316 home runs and 1,139 RBI in 2,073 games, Cey will forever have his name etched in Dodger lore for his performance against the Yankees in the 1981 World Series, when he batted .350 with six RBI to earn Tri-MVP honors as the Dodgers captured their fifth World Championship.

Cey spent eight and a half seasons alongside Bill Russell, Davey Lopes and Steve Garvey, as the Dodger infielders set a record that will likely never be broken. The record-setting infield was depicted on a bobblehead on May 29, 2012 as part of the Dodger Stadium Greats Bobblehead Series in Dodger Stadium’s 50th Anniversary season. In 1980, Cey, Steve Garvey, Reggie Smith and Dusty Baker gave the Dodgers and Major League Baseball its first 30-home run quartet.

In a 2010 *Los Angeles Times* fan poll, Cey was voted as the 12th greatest all-time Los Angeles Dodger player.

The Tacoma native attended Washington State University and was drafted by the Los Angeles Dodgers in the third round of the 1968 amateur draft. He made his big league debut on Sept. 3, 1971 and subsequently appeared in four World Series with the Dodgers (1974, 1977, 1978 and 1981).

He and his wife, Fran, reside in Woodland Hills and have two children, Dan and Amanda.

The previous record was set by Pittsburgh's Max Carey with 31 straight in 1922...led the NL in stolen bases in 1975 (77) and 1976 (63) and ranks second all time in Dodger history (behind Maury Wills, 490) with 413 stolen bases...played in one Division Series, six League Championship Series and four World Series, winning the 1981 World Series with the Dodgers...stole 10 bases in the 1981 postseason...In Game 4 of the 1981 World Series, was 2-for-5, stole two bases, scored two runs and had two RBI, including the game-winning RBI in an 8-7 victory over the New York Yankees...played in four consecutive All-Star Games (1978-1981) and was the top vote-getter in 1980...he became the fifth captain in Dodger history in 1978 and served until July 1979 (the previous captains were Pee Wee Reese, Duke Snider, Maury Wills and Willie Davis)...won the 1978 NL Rawlings Gold Glove Award at second base...is the Dodgers' all-time home run leader for second basemen (98)...owns Dodger record for most career leadoff home runs (28)...hit a Dodger record seven leadoff home runs in 1979...played in more games at second base than anybody in Los Angeles Dodger history (1,150)...was the Dodgers' Opening Day second baseman seven times...ranks 25th all time with 557 stolen bases...ranks in the top 10 all time in Los Angeles Dodger history in hits (8th, 1,204), at-bats (7th, 4,590), runs (5th, 759), triples (6th, 39), total bases (9th, 1,744) and stolen bases (2nd, 418).

COACHING CAREER

McGwire takes the reins as the Dodger hitting coach after three successful seasons in the same position with the St. Louis Cardinals...during his time as hitting coach, St. Louis led the NL in batting average (.269), on-base percentage (.337) and batting average with runners in scoring position (.274), ranked second in runs (2,263), fourth in slugging percentage (.416) and third in OPS (.753) in the three-year span... the Cardinals ranked second, first and first in the NL the last three seasons in batting average and first in on-base percentage the last two seasons...McGwire's tenure in St. Louis was highlighted by the Cardinals' 2011 season, when St. Louis led the NL in batting average (.273), on-base percentage (.341), slugging percentage (.425, T-1st), OPS (.766) and runs scored (762), while striking out a National League-low 978 times en route to a World Series title.

PLAYING CAREER

In a 16-year Major League career with the Athletics and Cardinals, McGwire hit 583 home runs (363 with Oakland), the 10th-most in baseball history...in 1998, McGwire broke Roger Maris' single-season home run record, set in 1961, of 61 home runs on Sept. 8 against the Chicago Cubs' Steve Trachsel... McGwire went on to hit 70 home runs that season. He followed that up with 65 homers in 1999...a 12-time Major League All-Star and 1987 Rookie of the Year, McGwire was also named in 1999 to the Major League Baseball All-Century Team...McGwire also holds records for most home runs by a rookie (49) and career at-bats per home run (10.6)...in 1997, he became only the second Major Leaguer, after Babe Ruth, to hit 50 or more homers in consecutive seasons and he became the first player to hit 20 home runs with two different teams in one season, hitting 24 homers for the Cardinals after arriving in a July 31 trade from Oakland...in addition to breaking the single-season home record in 1998, McGwire led all Major Leaguers with a .752 slugging average, second in NL history to Rogers Hornsby's .756 average in 1925...he hit a game-winning homer in the ninth inning of Game 3 in 1988 World Series against the Dodgers and helped lead the A's to a World Series championship title run in 1989 when Oakland defeated the San Francisco Giants...hit an Oakland record and Major League-leading 52 home runs in 1996, becoming just the 14th player in Major League history to hit 50 home runs...was a first-round pick by the A's (10th overall selection) in the 1984 First-Year Player Draft out of the University of Southern California...McGwire was *The Sporting News* National Player of the Year, an All-American and Pac-10 Player of the Year in 1984 at USC, where he played for legendary coach and former Brooklyn Dodger Rod Dedeaux...was also a member of Team USA at the 1984 Olympics in Los Angeles.

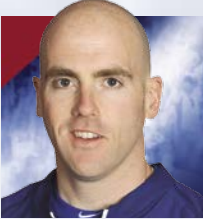


STEPHEN DOWNEY

SCOTT AKASAKI DIRECTOR, TEAM TRAVEL

Scott Akasaki enters his 14th season with the Dodgers and third as Director, Team Travel. The previous six seasons, he was Manager of Team Travel following five seasons in the club's Asian Operations Department, most recently as the Manager of Japanese Affairs.

Akasaki, 36, was the first Asian-American to be named to the post in Major League history and is just the fifth team travel representative for the Dodgers since they moved to Los Angeles in 1958.

In his current capacity, Akasaki coordinates all of the Major League club's travel during Spring Training, the regular season and the postseason. Specifically, he is responsible for Spring Training scheduling, flight negotiations and scheduling, hotel negotiations and booking, game-day ticket requests, as well as bus and equipment truck transportation. He is also in charge of the Major League team's Spring Training home and visiting clubhouses, and team travel budgets. Akasaki also has served as an interpreter for Japanese Dodger players.

In 2008, Akasaki spearheaded the team's trip to Beijing, the team's simultaneous departure from Vero Beach, and the full squad's reunion in Phoenix. In 2009, he was instrumental in the club's move into its new spring home, Camelback Ranch - Glendale. In 2010, Akasaki coordinated the Dodgers' travel for their multi-city goodwill series to Taiwan during Spring Training.

A cum laude graduate of Claremont McKenna College, Akasaki double majored in government and legal studies. He also commits his time to increasing awareness of syringomyelia, a neurological disorder in which tumors or cysts form within the spinal cord.

MITCH POOLE DODGER CLUBHOUSE MANAGER

Turner joined the Dodgers in 1978 as a bat boy and became the assistant visiting clubhouse manager in 1980, a job he held until the end of the 1990 season, when he was named to his current position.

He is single and resides in Diamond Bar.



ERIC HANSEN ASSISTANT DIRECTOR, TURF AND GROUNDS

Eric Hansen enters his 17th season as the Dodgers' Assistant Director of Stadium Operations for Turf & Grounds. Prior to joining the Dodgers, he spent six years as the Field Superintendent for the Toronto Blue Jays' Spring Training facility in Dunedin, FL. He was previously the assistant superintendent at Hills of Lakeway Golf Course in Austin, TX from 1988-90.

Hansen received a bachelor's degree in biological sciences from Southern Illinois University and was a high school teacher and coach for seven years before earning his bachelor of science degree in agronomy from Texas A&M University.

He and his wife, Nancy, have one son, Stephen (23), and reside in Shadow Hills, CA.

MEDICAL GLOSSARY

- ABSCESS:** an infection, which produces pus; can be result of a blister, callus, wound or laceration.
- ANAPHYLACTIC SHOCK:** shock that is caused by an allergic reaction.
- ANTERIOR CRUCIATE LIGAMENT (ACL):** a primary stabilizing ligament within the center of the knee joint that prevents hyperextension and excessive rotation of the joint. A complete tear of the ACL necessitating reconstruction could require up to 12 months of rehabilitation.
- ANTI-INFLAMMATORY:** any agent, which prevents inflammation, such as aspirin or ibuprofen.
- ANTERIOGRAM:** a film demonstrating arteries after injection of a dye.
- ARTHROGRAM:** x-ray technique for joints using air and/or dye injected into the affected area; useful in diagnosing meniscus tears of the knee and rotator cuff tears of the shoulder.
- ARTHROSCOPE:** an instrument used to visualize the interior of a joint cavity.
- ARTHROSCOPY:** a surgical examination of the internal structures of a joint by means of viewing through an Arthroscope. An arthroscopic procedure can be used to remove or repair damaged tissue or as a diagnostic procedure in order to inspect the extent of any damage or confirm a diagnosis.
- ASPIRATION:** the withdrawal of fluid from a body cavity by means of a suction or siphonage apparatus, such as a syringe.
- ATROPHY:** to shrivel or shrink from disuse, as in muscular atrophy.
- AVASCULAR NECROSIS:** death of a part due to lack of circulation.
- BAKER'S CYST:** localized swelling of a bursa sac in the posterior knee as a result of fluid that has escaped from the knee capsule. A Baker's cyst indicates that there is trauma inside the knee joint that leads to excessive fluid production.
- BONE SCAN:** an imaging procedure in which a radioactive-labeled substance is injected into the body to determine the status of a bone injury. If the bone at the injury sight takes up the radioactive substance, the injury will show a "hot spot" on the scan image. The bone scan is particularly useful in the diagnosis of stress fractures.
- BRACHIAL PLEXUS:** network of nerves originating from the cervical vertebrae and running down to the shoulder, arm, hand and fingers.
- BURSA:** a fluid-filled sac that is located in areas where friction is likely to occur, then minimizes the friction; for example between a tendon and bone.
- CAPSULE:** an enclosing structure which surrounds the joint and contains ligaments, which stabilize that joint.
- CAT SCAN:** use of a computer to produce a cross-sectional view of the anatomical part being investigated from x-ray data.
- CELLULITIS:** inflammation of cellular or connective tissue.
- CERVICAL VERTEBRAE:** group of seven vertebrae located in the neck.
- COLLATERAL LIGAMENT:** on either side of and acting as a radius of movement, a hinge joint, as of the elbow, knee and wrist.
- CONCUSSION:** jarring injury of the brain resulting in dysfunction. It can be graded as mild, moderate or severe depending on loss of consciousness, amnesia and loss of equilibrium.
- CONTUSION:** an injury to a muscle and tissues caused by a blow from a blunt object.
- DEGENERATIVE JOINT DISEASE:** changes in the joint surfaces as a result of repetitive trauma.
- DELTOID LIGAMENT:** ligament that connects the tibia to bones of the medial aspect of the foot and is primarily responsible for stability of the ankle on the medial side. Is sprained less frequently than other ankle ligaments.
- DELTOID MUSCLE:** muscles at the top of the arm, just below the shoulder, responsible for shoulder motions to the front, side and back.
- DISC, INTERVERTEBRAL:** a flat, rounded plate between each vertebrae of the spine. The disc consists of a thick fiber ring, which surrounds a soft gel-like interior. It functions as a cushion and shock absorber for the spinal column.
- DISLOCATION:** complete displacement of joint surfaces.
- DUSKY:** areas of decreased temperature may indicate arterial compromise and decreased tissue viability.
- ECCYMOSIS:** bleeding into the surface tissue below the skin, resulting in a "black and blue" effect.
- EDEMA:** accumulation of fluid in organs and tissues of the body; swelling.
- EFFUSION:** accumulation of fluid in various spaces in the body. Commonly, the knee has an effusion after an injury.
- ELECTROMYOGRAM (EMG):** test to determine nerve function.
- EPICONDYLITIS:** inflammation in the elbow due to overuse.
- ERYTHEMA:** inflammatory redness of the skin.
- EXUDATE:** any fluid that has exuded out of a tissue or its capillaries, specifically because of injury or inflammation.
- FRACTURE:** breach in continuity of a bone. Types of fractures include simple, compound, comminuted, greenstick, incomplete, impacted, longitudinal, oblique, stress or transverse.
- GADOLINIUM MRI:** the chemical gadolinium is injected into the joint being studied to enhance the diagnosis image of the structures under investigation.
- GRADE ONE INJURY:** a mild injury in which ligament, tendon, or other musculoskeletal tissue may have been stretched or confused, but not torn or otherwise disrupted.
- GRADE TWO INJURY:** a moderate injury in which musculoskeletal tissue has been partially, but not totally torn which causes appreciable limitation in function of the injured tissue.
- GRADE THREE INJURY:** a severe injury in which tissue has been significantly, and in some cases totally, torn or otherwise disrupted causing a virtual total loss of function.
- HEMATOMA:** tumor-like mass produced by an accumulation of coagulated blood in a cavity.
- ILLIOTIBIAL BAND:** a thick, wide fascial layer that runs from the iliac crest to the knee joint and is occasionally inflamed as a result of excessive running.

MEDICAL GLOSSARY

INFLAMMATION: the body's natural response to injury in which the injury site might display various degrees of pain, swelling, heat, redness and/or loss of function.

LABRUM: an edge, rim or lip-shaped structure found in the shoulder joint.

LIGAMENT: band of fibrous tissue that connects bone to bone or bone to cartilage and supports and strengthens joints.

MAGNETIC RESONANCE IMAGING (MRI): imaging procedure in which a radio frequency pulse causes certain electrical elements of the injured tissue to react to this pulse and through this process a computer display and permanent film establish a visual image. MRI does not require radiation and is very useful in the diagnosis of soft tissue, disc and meniscus injuries.

MENISCECTOMY: an intra-articular surgical procedure of the knee by which all or part of the damaged meniscus is removed.

MENISCUS: crescent-shaped cartilage, usually pertaining to the knee joint; also known as "cartilage." There are two menisci in the knee, medial and lateral. These work to absorb weight within the knee and provide stability.

METACARPALS: five long bones of the hand running from the wrist to the fingers.

METATARSALS: five long bones of the foot, running from the ankle to the toes.

PATELLA TENDINITIS: inflammation of the patellar ligament; also known as "jumpers knee."

PATELLOFEMORAL JOINT: articulation of the kneecap and femur. Inflammation of this joint can occur through: 1) acute injury to the patella, 2) overuse from excessive running particularly if there is an associated knee weakness, 3) chronic wear and tear of the knee, 4) as a result of poor foot mechanics. Patellofemoral irritation can lead to chondromalacia, which in its most chronic condition, could require surgery.

PHLEBITIS: inflammation of a vein.

PLICA: fold of tissue in the joint capsule and a common result of knee injury.

POSTERIOR CRUCIATE LIGAMENT (PCL): a primary stabilizing ligament of the knee that provides significant stability and prevents displacement of the tibia backward within the knee joint. A complete tear of this ligament necessitating reconstruction could require up to 12 months of rehabilitation.

RECONSTRUCTION: surgical rebuilding of a joint using natural, artificial or transplanted materials.

ROTATOR CUFF: comprised of four muscles in the shoulder area that can be irritated by overuse. The muscles are the supraspinatus (most commonly injured), infraspinatus, teres minor and subscapularis.

ROTATOR CUFF IMPINGEMENT SYNDROME: a microtrauma or overuse injury caused by stress, and the four stages are: 1) tendinitis with temporary thickening of the bursa and rotator cuff; 2) fiber dissociation in the tendon with permanent thickening of the bursa and scar formation; 3) a partial rotator cuff tear of less than one cm and 4) a complete tear of one cm or more

SCAPULA: shoulder blade.

SCIATICA: irritation of the sciatic nerve resulting in pain or tingling running down the inside of the leg.

SCIATIC NERVE: major nerve that carries impulses for muscular action and sensations between the low back and thigh and lower leg; it is the longest nerve in the body.

SHIN SPLINT: a catch-all syndrome describing pain in the shin that is not a fracture or tumor and cannot be defined otherwise.

SPONDYLITIS: inflammation of one or more vertebrae.

SPONDYLOLISTHESIS: forward displacement of one vertebra over another below it due to a developmental defect in the vertebrae.

SPONDYLOSIS: abnormal vertebral fixation or immobility.

SPRAIN: injury resulting from a stretch or twist of the joint and causes various degrees of stretch or tear to the muscle or tendon tissue.

STRAIN: injury resulting from a pull or torsion to the muscle or tendon that causes various degrees of stretch or tear to the muscle or tendon tissue.

STRESS FRACTURE: a hair-line type break in a bone caused by overuse.

STRESS X-RAY: a continual x-ray taken when a portion of the body is stressed to its maximum in order to determine joint stability. This is a test utilized in some ankle injuries.

SUBLAXATION: partial dislocation of a joint. The term usually implies that the joint can return to its normal position without formal reduction.

TARSALS: a group of seven bones of the foot consisting of the calcaneus, talus, cuboid and three cuneiform bones.

TENDINITIS: inflammation of the tendon and/or tendon sheath, caused by chronic overuse or sudden injury.

TENDON: tissue that connects muscle to bone.

THORACIC OUTLET COMPRESSION SYNDROME: a neuro-vascular disorder of the upper extremity common in throwing.

TOMOGRAPH: a special type of x-ray apparatus that demonstrates an organ or tissue at a particular depth.

TRANSVERSE PROCESS: small lateral projection off the right and left side of each vertebra that functions as an attachment site for muscles and ligaments of the spine.

TRIANGULAR CARTILAGE: a connective tissue characterized by its nonvascularity and firm consistency; located on the little finger side of the wrist.

ULNAR NERVE: nerve in the elbow commonly irritated by excessive throwing.

WRIST: the junction between the two forearm bones (radius and ulna) and the eight wrist bones (trapezium, capitate, hamate, pisiform, triquetrum, lunate and scaphoid).

- Went 13-7 in 30 starts to lead the Red Sox and ranked among AL leaders in ERA (2.89, 5th), opponent average (.211, 3rd), WHIP (1.03, 4th), winning percentage (.650, 7th), strikeout-per-walk ratio (3.37, 11th)...his ERA, average against and WHIP were the lowest marks in his 10 full MLB seasons

- On July 21 against the Giants, fired his second complete-game shutout (previous: July 30, 2008 vs. San Francisco) and his third career complete game...it was the Dodgers' first complete game of the season and first since Eric Stults' nine-inning effort on May 9, 2009 against the Giants
- Tied a career high by striking out 13 batters on Sept. 26 at Arizona...fanned 11 batters on May 31 vs. Arizona

2009

- The National League All-Star went 12-11 with a 4.03 ERA in 32 starts in his second season as a full-time starter
- Led the Dodgers with 12 victories, one more than Randy Wolf...also led the club with 11 losses...ranked second on the club with 196.1 innings, trailing Wolf's 209.1 innings...also ranked second with 179 strikeouts, trailing Clayton Kershaw's 185

- Hit .305 with 15 homers and 68 RBI in 156 games and stole a career-high 60 stolen bases...earned his third All-Star selection and was honored as the game's MVP

- Made 105 starts, including 103 in left, one in center and one at designated hitter
- For the first time in his career, did not increase his batting average from one season to the next
- Collected his 1,000th career hit on April 11 vs. Baltimore and stole his 300th career base on July 7 vs. Kansas City...became the seventh player in Major League history to reach 1,000 hits and 300 SB before his 27th birthday, joining Rickey Henderson, Ty Cobb, Tim Lincecum, Cesar Cedeño, Eddie Collins and Sherry Magee
- On June 19 vs. the Cubs, knocked second career grand slam off Scott Eyre to give the Rays a 6-3 lead in their eventual 8-3 win...slam was the key hit in a seven-run seventh inning
- Suspended for four games for on-field actions in the brawl on June 5 at Boston, one of five Rays suspended (also

James Shields, Jonny Gomes, Edwin Jackson and Akinori Iwamura) and one of eight players total (Coco Crisp, Jon Lester and Sean Casey for Boston)...served suspension from June 13-17

- Legged out five triples over a six-game stretch from July 26-Aug. 1, the first Major Leaguer to do that since he did it in July 2004...prior to that, the last big leaguers with five triples over six game were Boston's Jim Rice (July 1978) and San Francisco's Willie Mays (Sept. 1960)...tripled in three straight games July 29-Aug. 1, the first Ray ever to do so (did it again in three consecutive contests, July 28-31, 2009)
- Suffered a subluxation of his right middle finger tendon on Aug. 9 at Seattle, sidelining him until Sept. 26...the injury occurred on a check-swing against Mariners closer J.J. Putz in the 10th inning...underwent surgery (Dr. Donald Sheridan) on Aug. 14 in Phoenix to repair it...after returning, played in two games, but did not get an at-bat
- Hit .290 (18-for-62) with two homers, three doubles, a triple, eight RBI, seven stolen bases, nine runs and a .468 slugging percentage and started in left field in all 16 postseason games...became the first player in the live ball era (since 1920) to start in his team's postseason opener without a regular-season at-bat during the month of September
- Was a perfect 7-for-7 in stolen base attempts, tops in the playoffs and part of the club's postseason-record 24 stolen bases
- Matched the all-time postseason and ALCS record for a single game with five hits in Game 4 of the ALCS at Fenway Park on Oct. 14, going 5-for-5 with two singles, two doubles and one triple...finished the ALCS with a .345 batting average (10-for-29), four RBI, three stolen bases and three runs

2007

- Hit a career-best .315, establishing a then-club record, with a career-high 37 doubles, 11 homers and 80 RBI in 143 games
- Selected to the 78th All-Star Game by AL Manager Jim Leyland, his second career All-Star selection...became the first two-time All-Star in club history...entered the game at San Francisco in the fifth inning in left field and went 1-for-2 with a homer off Milwaukee's Francisco Cordero, the first Ray to hit a homer in the All-Star Game
- Increased his average for the fifth consecutive year dating back to 2002...became the seventh player since 1900 to improve his average over five straight seasons (min. 250 at-bats in each campaign)
- Won his fourth AL stolen base crown (shared with Baltimore's Brian Roberts) with 50 steals
- Batted .318 (62-for-195) vs. left-handed pitching, fourth best among left-handed hitters in the Majors
- Hit a club-record .342 (102-for-298) on the road, the fourth-best mark away from home in the Majors and second best in the AL...tallied a .444 clip (12-for-27) at Yankee Stadium, tops in the AL
- Batted a Major League-high .397 (62-for-156) in day games, the second highest such mark in club history...Aaron Ledesma batted .420 (42-for-100) in 1998
- Belted a go-ahead grand slam, the first of his career, at home on April 24 off the Yankees' Mike Myers
- On July 30 vs. Toronto, was not in the lineup due to a sprained right wrist but entered the game as a pinch-runner in the ninth inning with the Rays trailing by a run...stole second and scored the tying run on Josh Wilson's two-out single, then led off the 11th inning with a walk-off homer to give the Rays a 5-4 win...was his third career walk-off homer
- Beginning on July 30, went 28-for-49 (.571) over his next 12 games, including a stretch in which he had a club record eight straight multi-hit games from Aug. 4-11 (.595, 22-for-37)...named AL Co-Player of the Week July 30-Aug. 5 (6 G, .591, 13-for-22, 2B, 3 HR, 6 RBI, 8 R, 3 SB)...marked second career weekly award (also May 22-28, 2006)
- Hit .388 (50-for-129) in August, the best month of his career...50 hits led the Majors and are a Rays monthly record
- Suspended for two games, Sept. 13-14, as a result of being ejected on Sept. 3 vs. Baltimore after arguing a call at first base
- Missed the last 12 games of the season with a left groin strain...suffered the injury on Sept. 16 at Seattle

- Led the American League with 58 steals and 16 triples, batting .305 with 18 homers and 77 RBI in 151 games
- Named Tampa Bay's team MVP and received the Champion Award from the Tampa Bay Chapter of the BBWAA... became the first player to win both the MVP and Champion Award in the same year (Carlos Peña since did it in 2007 and Crawford did it again in 2010)...also named Houston Area Player of the Year by the Houston Chapter of the BBWAA
- Became just the second player all time to increase his home runs and batting average over four consecutive seasons (min. 250 at-bats per season)...joined Hall of Famer Rogers Hornsby, who did it from 1918-22
- Is one of six players in the modern era (since 1900) to reach at least 18 home runs and 58 steals in the same season...New York's (NL) Jose Reyes also did it in 2006 (19 HR, 64 SB), making them the first to accomplish the feat since Rickey Henderson with Oakland in 1991
- Marked his third consecutive season pacing the AL in triples...became just the fifth player all time to lead the AL in triples in three straight seasons joining Elmer Flick (1905-07), Sam Crawford (1913-15), Zoilo Versalles (1963-65) and Lance Johnson (1991-94)...Versalles was also the last AL player to reach double digits in homers and triples in three straight seasons
- Had 104 doubles, 60 triples and 48 home runs before turning 25...the only other players to do that are Buddy Lewis and Arky Vaughan
- Finished sixth in the AL in batting with runners in scoring position (.348) and multi-hit games (59), 10th with 183 hits and tied for eighth in outfield assists with a career-high-tying 10
- Was the only Ray to have enough plate appearances to qualify for the batting title...led Tampa Bay in most offensive categories, including games (151), at-bats (600), average (.305), on-base percentage (.348), slugging percentage (.482), OPS (.830), runs (89), hits (183), triples (16), sacrifice bunts (9) and steals (58)...59 multi-hit games set a club record...started a team-high 148 games, including 144 in left field, one in center and three as the designated hitter
- Named AL co-Player of the Week with Detroit's Justin Verlander for May 22-28, his first monthly honor...hit .484 (15-for-31) over the week with three homers, five RBI and eight stolen bases
- Went 5-for-5 with five runs and four stolen bases on May 24 at Toronto, all of which set club records at the time... was the first player to get five hits and four steals in a game since Rickey Henderson on April 11, 1988 for Toronto vs. the Yankees...followed that up with three hits and two more steals the next night at Boston, becoming the first player since divisional play began in 1969 to get eight hits and six steals over two games
- On July 5 vs. Boston, stole second, third and home all by the fourth inning...was the first Major Leaguer to "steal for the cycle" in a game since Colorado's Tom Goodwin in 2000...reached his 200th career stolen base on the second steal of the game

2005

- Batted .301 in 156 games and finished with career-high 194 hits and also had 46 steals, 81 RBI and 15 home runs... in modern Major League history (since 1900), only six players have reached those numbers in a season, including Craig Biggio (Houston, 1998), Alex Rodriguez (Seattle, 1998), Johnny Damon (Kansas City, 2000), Jose Reyes (New York Mets, 2006) and Hanley Ramirez (Florida, 2007)
- Became the first American Leaguer to have 15 homers and 15 triples in a season since Toronto's Lloyd Moseby in 1984 (15 triples, 18 homers)...was the sixth player since World War II to reach 30 doubles, 15 triples and 15 homers
- Led the AL in triples (15) for the second consecutive season
- Finished the year with 35 hits against the Yankees, batting .407 (35-for-86) in 19 games...was the first AL player with as many hits against an opponent since Kansas City's George Brett went 36-for-80 (.450) vs. the Angels in 1975
- Had 25 more chances than any other Major League left fielder and had the best fielding percentage (.994) among AL left fielders with 100 or more starts...made 150 starts overall, with 142 in left and eight in center...in total, ranked fourth in fielding percentage among AL outfielders with at least 100 starts at .995
- On April 6, hit the sixth inside-the-park home run in Tampa Bay club history, the first of his career, and added a triple in the Rays' six-run eighth inning...became the first AL player to have a triple and an inside-the-park homer in the same game since Boston's Dwight Evans on July 4, 1988 vs. Kansas City
- Tied a club record with four extra-base hits on Aug. 2 at Texas, two doubles and two triples
- Did not get a plate appearance the last five games of the season due to a sore left wrist...was batting .371 (33-for-89) in September

2004

- Reached double-digit home runs for the first time in his career (11) and batted .296 with 26 doubles, a Major League-high 19 triples and 55 RBI in 152 games

- Earned first All-Star selection and named the Rays' MVP by the Tampa Bay Chapter of the BBWAA
- Led the AL with 59 steals, which set a then-club record (he passed with 60 in 2009)...were 23 more than Seattle's Ichiro Suzuki who finished second in the circuit, the biggest margin in the AL since 1989 when Rickey Henderson had 32 more than Cecil Espy...was second in the Majors behind Milwaukee's Scott Podsednik (70)
- At the age of 23, became the fifth youngest player since 1900 to win back-to-back stolen base titles (AL or NL)
- Led the Majors with 19 triples, which also established a Tampa Bay franchise record
- Only two players since 1900 have reached his totals for steals (59) and triples (19) in the same season: Ty Cobb (1911, 24 triples and 83 stolen bases; 1912, 23 triples and 61 stolen bases) and Juan Samuel (1984, 19 triples and 72 stolen bases)
- Set a club record with 104 runs (he passed in 2010)...Rays were 49-33 when he scored a run, 14-5 when he scored at least two
- Was the first MLB player since Ichiro Suzuki in 2001 with at least 50 steals and 50 extra-base hits in a single season
- Reached 175 hits and 50 steals in each of his first two full seasons...became the seventh player in Major League history to have reached those figures in their first two full MLB campaigns, joining Eddie Collins (1909-10), Willie Wilson (1979-80), Tim Lincecum (1982-83), Mookie Wilson (1982-83), Juan Samuel (1984-85) and Tony Womack (1997-98)
- Was the toughest to double up in the Majors, grounding into only two double plays in 626 at-bats
- Started 144 games: 115 in left field, 25 in center field, four at designated hitter...didn't make his first error of the season until Aug. 24, his 123rd game...had gone a string of 133 games without one dating back to Sept. 13, 2003
- Houston native was voted by the player ballot to his first All-Star Game at Houston's Minute Maid Park...the day of the All-Star Game, was honored by Houston Mayor Bill White at City Hall...pinch-hit and played left field, going 0-for-2...22-year-old was the youngest Ray to be selected to an All-Star Game...also the youngest position player on the AL squad and second-youngest player overall on the AL team behind the Angels' Frankie Rodriguez
- Jammed left knee sliding into first base on Oct. 2 at Detroit, ending his season on the second to last day...MRI revealed only a bruise
- *Baseball America* named him the best 22-year-old in the Majors following the season
- After the season, chosen for the MLB All-Star Tour of Japan...batted .346 (9-for-26), second best on the team behind Toronto's Vernon Wells (.407)...also had one homer and five stolen bases as the All-Stars went 5-3 on the tour

2003

- In his first full big league season, batting .281 with a team-leading nine triples, an AL-best 55 steals, five homers and 54 RBI in 151 games
- Paced the AL with 55 steals...topped Tampa Bay's previous club record of 31 by Jason Tyner in 2001 (since passed several times)
- At 22 years, 54 days old, became the fifth-youngest player since 1900 to win a league stolen base crown behind Ty Cobb (20 years, 292 days with Detroit in 1907), Richie Ashburn (21 years, 199 days with Philadelphia in 1948), Rickey Henderson (21 years, 286 days with Oakland in 1980) and Tim Lincecum (22 years, 19 days with Montreal in 1981)
- Joined Rocco Baldelli as the first 21-year-olds to start in the same outfield on Opening Day since the 1972 Phillies started Greg Luzinski (21) and Mike Anderson (20)...combined with Baldelli for 361 hits, the most by teammates each 22 or younger at season's end since Richie Ashburn and Granny Hamner of 1949 Phillies (362)...the two finished first (Crawford, 55) and seventh (Baldelli, 27) in the AL in steals, the youngest teammates with 25 SB each since 1910 when Josh DeVore and Fred Snodgrass of the New York Giants accomplished the feat
- Hit the 17th Opening Day walk-off home run in Major League history on March 31...knocked a two-out, three-run, ninth-inning homer off Boston's Chad Fox, giving the Rays a 6-4 win...was the eighth American Leaguer to do it
- Also hit a three-run, walk-off homer off Chicago's (AL) Billy Koch to lift the Rays to a 4-3, come-from-behind win on July 4...was the first walk-off homer ever hit on July 4
- Stole a then-club record 19 straight bases from July 12-Aug. 19
- Served a three-game suspension, July 19-21, as a result of a fight between the Rays and Pirates on June 13
- In a poll conducted by *Baseball America*, selected by AL managers as the second fastest baserunner in the league behind Ichiro Suzuki

- Batted .263 with 10 home runs and 61 RBI over 105 games in an injury-shortened season...missed 55 games while on the disabled list from April 29 to June 27 with a strained left calf

- In his final season with San Diego, batted .298 with 31 home runs and 101 RBI and ranked among the NL leaders in games played (160, T-5th), hits (176, 7th), home runs (31, T-8th), RBI (101, 12th), total bases (302, T-6th), walks (93, 3rd), intentional walks (35, 2nd), on-base percentage (.393, 5th), slugging percentage (.511, 9th) and OPS (.904, 7th)

KOUFAX'S PERFECT GAME

The only perfect game in Dodger history was authored by Hall of Fame left-hander Sandy Koufax on Sept. 9, 1965 in front of 29,139 at Dodger Stadium. During the 1-0 victory over the Chicago Cubs, Koufax struck out 14 batters and improved his season record to 22-7. Koufax struck out the final six Cubs he faced - Ron Santo, Ernie Banks and Byron Browne in the eighth inning; Chris Krug, Joe Amalfitano and pinch-hitter Harvey Kuenn in the ninth. The Dodgers managed just one hit and a walk off Cubs left-hander Bob Hendley (2-3), who also pitched the distance. The only hit - Lou Johnson's two-out bloop double to right field in the seventh inning - didn't matter in the scoring. Johnson opened the fifth inning with a walk, advanced to second on Ron Fairly's sacrifice bunt, stole third base and scored when catcher Krug's throw sailed into left field. In addition to Koufax becoming the first pitcher to hurl four no-hitters in his career, the 1-hour, 43-minute game also featured a Major League record for fewest runners left on base by both teams (1).

A MONTH FOR THE AGES

In April 2012, Kemp was unanimously voted as the National League Player of the Month as he posted one of the greatest calendar months in MLB history:

- Led the Majors with a .417 batting average, 12 home runs and an .893 slugging percentage, while topping the NL in RBI (25), hits (35) and runs (24)
- Established a new franchise record with 12 April homers, the fifth-most ever during the month behind Albert Pujols (14, 2006), Alex Rodriguez (14, 2007), Luis Gonzalez (13, 2001) and Ken Griffey, Jr. (13, 1997)
- Joined Tony Perez (CIN, 1970), Larry Walker (COL, 1997) and Barry Bonds (SF, 2004) as the only four players since 1921 to finish April with a .400 batting average, 10 or more homers and at least 20 RBI

- Had a breakout season in 2011, taking home the National League Cy Young Award, winning the league's pitching Triple Crown, playing in his first All-Star Game and earning his first Rawlings Gold Glove Award
- Also picked up the Players Choice Award for Outstanding NL Pitcher, selected as a Sporting News NL All-Star, won the Warren Spahn Award as the Majors' top left-hander and honored by the Negro Leagues Baseball Museum as the NL Pitcher of the Year with the Bullet Rogan Award
- Became the eighth different Dodger pitcher to win the Cy Young Award as a Dodger took home the award for the 10th time...earned 207 overall points and appeared in the Top-3 on every ballot, garnering 27 first-place votes out of the possible 32 votes...was the second-youngest Dodger to be honored with a Cy Young Award behind Fernando Valenzuela (20, 1981) and the youngest National Leaguer to win since Dwight Gooden, who won the award in 1985 at the age of 20 with the Mets

- Was the third different Dodger pitcher to win the Triple Crown, joining Dazzy Vance (1924) and Sandy Koufax (1963, 1965 and 1966), and led the Majors with a 2.28 ERA, tied with Ian Kennedy for the NL lead with 21 wins and ranked first in the league with 248 strikeouts
- Ranked among the NL leaders in opponents' batting average (.207, 1st), winning percentage (.808, 21-5, 2nd), innings pitched (233.1, 3rd), complete games (5, 3rd), shutouts (2, T-2nd) and WHIP (0.98, 1st)

- Earned the league's Player of the Week honor for the period of June 20-26, going a perfect 2-0 with a 1.00 ERA (2 ER/18.0 IP)...tossed a two-hit shutout of the Tigers on June 20 and allowed just two runs in a complete-game victory over the Angels on June 26
- Also had a career year at the plate, setting career highs in batting average (.225), runs (10), hits (16) RBI (4) and on-base percentage (.267)...tied for the NL lead among pitchers in the third, ranked second in hits and finished with the third-highest batting average and on-base percentage

only pitchers in Dodger franchise history since 1901 to appear in the Top-10 in ERA when they were 21 years or younger...Kershaw is the first in the Majors to do so since Rick Ankiel in 2000

- Won five consecutive games from June 21-July 18 and posted a 0.73 ERA (3 ER/37.0 IP) over that time
- Allowed 6.26 hits per nine innings, which was the best in baseball
- Left-handers managed to hit just .173 against him, which was the sixth-best mark vs. lefties in the Major Leagues
- Posted a 2-0 record to go along with a 1.14 ERA (3 ER/23.2 IP) in four Interleague starts
- The opposition hit just .188 against him with runners in scoring position...the average went down to .133 with RISP and two out
- Allowed just seven home runs on the season and two in one game just once (April 26 at COL)
- In close and late situations, batters went just 3-for-22 (.136) without an RBI

- Worked a combined 169.0 innings with the Dodgers and Jacksonville, 47.0 innings more than his 2007 total of 122.0
- Burst onto the scene as a 19-year-old in Spring Training (turned 20 on March 19), joining big league camp the first week in March...in his first appearance on March 9 vs. Boston, retired the side in the fourth inning on 10 pitches...got Mike Lowell to pop out, induced J.D. Drew on a broken-bat groundout and struck out Sean Casey looking on a knee-buckling curveball

- Bridegrooms (or Grooms) (1889-1891)** - Six players were married in the offseason
- Ward's Wonders (1891-1893)** - After Brooklyn manager John Montgomery Ward
- Foutz's Fillies (1893-1897)** - After Brooklyn manager Dave Foutz
- Trolley Dodgers (1896-1898)** - The heavy concentration of electric trolley car tracks in front of Eastern Park caused fans to dodge the trolleys to reach the park. Manhattanites and other visitors began calling the Brooklyn fans Trolley Dodgers. The name eventually was given to the team.
- Dodgers (1899-PRESENT)** - Shortened version of Trolley Dodgers. The Brooklyn National League Baseball Club referred to their team as the Dodgers on their World Series programs in 1916 and 1920.
- Superbas (1899-1924)** - After the vaudeville group named Hanlon's Superbas. Ned Hanlon was the Dodger manager.
- Robins (1915-1931)** - After Brooklyn manager Wilbert Robinson
- The Flock (1931-1957)** - The Flatbush Flock- A nickname given to the team by newspaper writers
- Bums (1937-1957)** - More commonly known as Dem Bums. An endearing nickname derived from the Loveable Bum cartoon of newspaper cartoonist Willard Mullin. This nickname could only be used by a rabid Dodger fan. If a non-Dodger fan called the Brooklyn team Bums, it was reason enough to fight.

SEASON IN REVIEW



The Dodgers made a flurry of trades during the 2012 season including a nine-player swap with Boston on Aug. 25, the largest trade in Los Angeles Dodger history. First baseman Adrian Gonzalez, obtained in the Red Sox trade, homered in his first at-bat with the club, sending the Dodger Stadium crowd into a frenzy.



2012 DODGER SEASON-IN-REVIEW NOTES

- **SO CLOSE:** The Dodgers finished the campaign in second place in the NL West with an 86-76 record in their second season under manager Don Mattingly. It was the club's second year in a row with a record above .500 and its sixth winning season in the last seven years. Los Angeles finished the season by going 7-1 in its last eight games, but ended up 2.0 games behind St. Louis for the second National League Wild Card and 8.0 games behind San Francisco in the NL West standings. The Dodgers celebrated Dodger Stadium's 50th anniversary in 2012 and went 45-36 at home to improve to 2,317-1,750 (.570) all-time at Dodger Stadium and posted a winning record on the road with a 41-40 mark, just the team's third winning season on the road since 2003.
- The Dodgers went over the three million mark in attendance for the 26th time in franchise history, which is a Major League record, finishing the season with an attendance mark of 3,324,246, the third highest in the NL.
- **A NEW ERA:** On March 27, it was announced that the Dodgers would be sold to Guggenheim Baseball Management and the sale process was completed on May 1. The new ownership group that includes Mark R. Walter as its controlling partner, as well as Earvin "Magic" Johnson, Todd Boehly, Peter Guber, Stan Kasten and Bobby Patton was introduced to the media and fans at a news conference at Dodger Stadium on May 2.
- **KING(S) OF THE HILL:** Los Angeles finished the season ranked third in the Majors in both team ERA (3.34) and opponents' batting average (.238). Dodger pitchers surrendered just 122 home runs, the lowest total in the big leagues and seven less than its closest competitor, the Washington Nationals (129 homers allowed this season). Los Angeles starters posted a 3.41 ERA (3rd, MLB), while the club's relievers posted a 3.19 ERA, the third-lowest mark among NL bullpens. Since pitching coach Rick Honeycutt was appointed prior to the start of the 2006 campaign, the Dodgers lead the Majors in team ERA (3.77) and rank second in both opponents' batting average (.248) and strikeouts (8,544).
- The two new veterans in the club's starting rotation both posted double-digit wins and career-best ERA marks during the season with Aaron Harang (10-10, 3.61) and Chris Capuano (12-12, 3.72) making key contributions in their first season in Los Angeles.
- **HEY NEW GUY:** The Dodgers acquired eight players via five trades during the 2012 campaign, including the largest trade in Los Angeles Dodger history that netted the club right-hander Josh Beckett, outfielder Carl Crawford, first baseman Adrian Gonzalez and infielder Nick Punto in a nine-player swap with Boston on Aug. 25. The club also acquired former All-Stars Brandon League (Seattle), Shane Victorino (Philadelphia) and Hanley Ramirez (Miami) in addition to left-handed specialist Randy Choate (Miami) and right-hander Joe Blanton (Philadelphia).
- **APRIL SHOW-ERS:** The Dodgers posted a National League-best .696 (16-7) winning percentage in the month of April, the club's best April since 1983 (14-6, .700) and the sixth-best mark in Los Angeles history. Outfielder Matt Kemp was unanimously voted as the Budweiser Presents National League Player of the Month, leading the Majors with a .417 batting average (35-for-84), 12 home runs and an .893 slugging percentage, while topping the NL in RBI (25), hits (35) and runs (24). Kemp's 12 April homers set a new franchise record and were the fifth-most ever during the month behind Albert Pujols (14, 2006), Alex Rodriguez (14, 2007), Luis Gonzalez (13, 2001) and Ken Griffey, Jr. (13, 1997). The Oklahoma native joined Tony Perez (CIN, 1970), Larry Walker (COL, 1997) and Barry Bonds (SF, 2004) as the only players since 1921 to finish April with a .400 batting average, 10 or more homers and at least 20 RBI. In addition, Kemp's 75 total bases in April tied for the eighth-most all-time.
- Kemp was awarded NL Player of the Week honors for the periods of April 4-8 and April 9-15 to become the first player to win back-to-back National League Player of the Week honors to begin a season and was the first player ever to win the award for three consecutive weeks (dating back to the week of September 25, 2011) since the award's inception in 1974. The only other player to capture consecutive Player of the Week awards to begin a season was Tony Armas, who accomplished the feat in the American League in 1981 while with the Oakland Athletics.
- **BURNERS:** The Dodger roster featured two of the league's top basestealers with Shane Victorino and Dee Gordon. Victorino ranked fourth in the National League with a career-high 39 stolen bases, including 15 in 53 games with Los Angeles, while Gordon was eighth with 32 steals in 87 games. At the time of Gordon's thumb injury on July 4, he led the Majors with 30 steals.
- **CRUZ CONTROL:** Luis Cruz had his contract selected from Triple-A Albuquerque on July 2 and led the Dodgers with a .297 batting average the rest of the way, including a .325 mark with runners in scoring position (25-for-77). Cruz belted his first career home run on July 20 off New York's Johan Santana and posted the second-longest hitting streak of the season by a Dodger, hitting safely in 12 consecutive games from July 17-29 at a .300 clip (15-for-30). The 28-year-old drove in runs in his first four games with the club, becoming the first Dodger to have an RBI in his first four games with the club since Jimmy Wynn did so in six straight from April 5-10, 1974.
- **FOR THE RECORD:** The Dodgers set several franchise records during the campaign:
 - Matt Kemp had an RBI in nine consecutive games from Sept. 25, 2011-April 10, 2012, tying Roy Campanella (May 30-June 5, 1955) and Augie Galan (Sept. 18-28, 1944) for the Dodger franchise record.
 - Aaron Harang established a franchise record on April 13 at Dodger Stadium by striking out nine consecutive Padre hitters, breaking Johnny Podres' franchise record of eight set on July 2, 1962 vs. Philadelphia. He finished the night

with 13 Ks in 6.1 innings, tying his career high for strikeouts (Sept. 29, 2007) and became the first Dodger pitcher in the last 90 seasons to have 13 or more strikeouts in a game when pitching fewer than 7.0 innings.

- Andre Ethier broke Ron Cey's 35-year-old Los Angeles Dodger franchise record with 10 consecutive hits from Aug. 22-25 and tied the franchise record set by Brooklyn Robin Edward Konetchy on June 28-July 1, 1919. He recorded two consecutive four-hit games on Aug. 24-25, marking the first time the feat has been accomplished by a Dodger since Manny Ramirez did it on Aug. 29-30, 2008
- **GAME OVER:** The trio of Ronald Belisario, Kenley Jansen and Brandon League proved to be one of the game's best back-end relief corps:
 - Belisario tied for the Major League lead with eight wins as a reliever (8-1) and ranked among the NL relief leaders in ERA (2.54, 17th), opponents' batting average (.187, 5th), WHIP (1.07, 14th), innings pitched (71.0, T-15th) and groundball percentage (80.0, 3rd). Belisario posted a 1.53 ERA in 29 first-half appearances, the third-best mark among NL relievers.
 - Jansen successfully converted 25 of 31 save opportunities and ranked among the NL relief leaders in wins (5, T-10th), ERA (2.35, 8th), opponents' batting average (.146, 3rd), strikeouts (99, 3rd) and WHIP (0.85, 3rd). Jansen reached the 100.0 career innings pitched mark in May, having fanned 167 batters, which were the second-most all-time through that career milestone behind only Craig Kimbrel's 170 Ks.
 - League went 2-1 with six saves and a 2.30 ERA in 48 appearances since he was acquired from Seattle on July 30. The 29-year-old finished the campaign by firing scoreless relief in 20 of his last 21 appearances since Aug. 21, allowing just one run (1 ER/22.1 IP, 0.40 ERA) and eight hits (8-for-70) in that span.
- **GOING, GOING, GONZO!** Adrian Gonzalez finished the season on a 15-game hitting streak from Sept. 19-Oct. 3, which was the longest run of the year by a Dodger. Gonzalez batted .390 (23-for-59) with three doubles, two homers and six RBI during the streak and hit .297 with 10 doubles, three homers and 22 RBI in 36 games with Los Angeles. Overall, Gonzalez ranked fifth in the Majors with 47 doubles between Boston and Los Angeles and his .392 batting average with runners in scoring position (67-for-171) was the second-highest mark in the big leagues.
- **REPEAT:** After winning the National League Cy Young Award last season, Clayton Kershaw topped the Majors with a 2.53 ERA in 2012 and ranked among the NL leaders in wins (14, T-16th), strikeouts (229, 2nd), opponents' batting average (.210, 2nd), innings pitched (227.2, 2nd), WHIP (1.02, 1st), pickoffs (11, 1st), quality starts (25, T-2nd) and home runs allowed per 9.0 innings (0.63, 6th). Kershaw finished second in the NL Cy Young voting and was the first pitcher to lead the NL in ERA in consecutive seasons since Randy Johnson (2001-02, ARI) and the first Dodger to do so since Sandy Koufax led the league in ERA in five consecutive seasons from 1962-66. The last pitcher to lead the Majors in consecutive seasons was Pedro Martinez, who did so in 2002-03.
- Kershaw reached the 200-strikeout mark (229) for the third consecutive season as he became just the sixth Los Angeles Dodger with three such seasons and just the fifth to do it three years in a row, joining Sandy Koufax (1961-66), Don Drysdale (1962-65), Hideo Nomo (1995-97) and Fernando Valenzuela (1984-86).
- Kershaw won 12 straight home decisions from May 2, 2011-April 27, 2012, tying Ed Roebuck (6/4/60-8/29/62) and Orel Hershiser (9/20/84-10/2/85) for the longest home winning streak in L.A. Dodger history.
- Kershaw fired 22.0 consecutive scoreless innings from May 8-19, which was the longest scoreless streak of his career.
- **ON THE DOTTED LINE:** Andre Ethier signed a five-year extension on June 12 that will keep him in Dodger blue through at least 2017 and continued to show why he was so deserving during the 2012 season:
 - Ethier led the NL with a .325 batting average against right-handed pitchers (109-for-335) and reached the 20-homer mark for the fourth time in the last five seasons.
 - Ethier tied for 14th in the NL with his team-leading 36 doubles as he became the first Dodger in franchise history to hit 30 or more doubles in six consecutive seasons. Only four others have six 30-double seasons (though not in a row): Steve Garvey (1974-76, 78-79, 82), Jackie Robinson (1947-51, 53), Dixie Walker (1940-41, 43-45, 47) and Zack Wheat (1910, 16, 21, 24-26).
 - The 30-year-old reached 1,000 career hits with his second-inning homer on Sept. 4 against the Padres.
- **WALK OFF THIS WAY:** The Dodgers led the National League and ranked second in the Majors behind only Oakland with 12 walk-off wins. Eight different Dodgers picked up a walk-off RBI with A.J. Ellis leading the charge with three walk-off RBI (walk, single, homer).
- **A HELPING HANLEY:** Hanley Ramirez tied for the Major League lead with 19 combined game-winning RBI, including seven as a Dodger. Ramirez batted .338 with runners in scoring position (23-for-68) with Los Angeles and tied for 14th in the NL with 44 RBI from July 25 through the conclusion of the season.
- **THAT MASKED MAN:** A.J. Ellis was named the winner of the seventh annual Roy Campanella Award, which is given to the Dodger player who best exemplifies the spirit and leadership of the late Hall of Fame catcher. Ellis made his first Opening Day start in 2012 and was a steady presence behind the plate all season, ranking second on the club with 133 games played and fourth among big league catchers with 131 games and 1,151.0 innings caught. Ellis'

3.35 catcher's ERA led the Majors (min. 100 starts) and he threw out 28 would-be basestealers, which tied for the fourth-most in the big leagues. At the plate, Ellis ranked 11th in the NL with a .373 on-base percentage, tied for 13th with 65 walks and hit 13 homers, the most he's hit at any level in his professional career.

- **LIVING UP TO THE BILLING-SLEY:** Chad Billingsley posted double-digit victories (10-9) for the sixth consecutive season, joining Cole Hamels as the only NL pitchers to accomplish that feat, and has yet to have a losing season at any level in his 10-year professional career. Billingsley won six consecutive starts for the first time in his career from July 23-Aug. 19, going 6-0 with a 1.30 ERA (6 ER/41.2 IP) in that span, and became the first Dodger to accomplish the feat since Kevin Brown won seven in a row from May 14-June 17, 2003.
- Billingsley recorded his 1,000th career strikeout on July 7, becoming just the 12th Los Angeles Dodger to reach that mark.
- **FEELING THE G-LOVE:** Los Angeles ranked fifth in the NL with a .984 team fielding percentage. Several players had standout seasons in the field:
 - Mark Ellis ranked second among Major League second basemen with a .994 fielding percentage as he committed just three errors in 910.1 innings this season. Ellis' .991 career fielding percentage as a second baseman is the second-highest all-time behind Placido Polanco's .993 mark.
 - Shane Victorino tied for sixth in the NL with nine outfield assists, including two as a Dodger.
 - Luis Cruz made just four errors and posted a .983 combined fielding percentage in 76 games at second base, shortstop and third base.
 - Andre Ethier had a streak of 282 games (276 starts) without an error (July 10, 2010-July 25, 2012), which was the second-longest active run among non-pitchers in baseball behind only Franklin Gutierrez. It was the second-longest errorless run by a Dodger outfielder behind only Brett Butler's 306-game run from 1992-94.
- **LIKE ROYALTY:** Matt Kemp (fan vote) and Clayton Kershaw (manager's selection) represented the Dodgers in the Midsummer Classic on July 10 in Kansas City. It was a second consecutive All-Star selection for both as Kershaw fired a scoreless fifth inning in the National League's 8-0 win, while Kemp captained the NL Home Run Derby squad before sitting out the game with a hamstring injury.
- **LET'S TURN THREE:** On April 15 against San Diego, the Dodgers turned the 14th triple play in team history (dating to 1900) and the club's first triple play since June 13, 1998. The play started when the Padres' Jesus Guzman bunted the ball in front of the plate with runners on first and second base and then the Dodgers turned the around-the-horn triple play, catcher A.J. Ellis to third baseman Juan Uribe (force out at third) to shortstop Dee Gordon (force out at second base) to first baseman James Loney (force out at first).
- **BACK-TO-BACK-TO-BACK:** The Dodgers hit three consecutive home runs in the second inning on Aug. 18 at Atlanta, when Hanley Ramirez, James Loney and Luis Cruz went deep with one out. It was the first time the Dodgers hit back-to-back-to-back home runs since June 12, 2007 vs. New York-NL (Wilson Betemit, Hong-Chih Kuo, Matt Kemp).
- **LOS ANGELES 5-0:** The Dodgers used 50 players this season, which tied for the third most in the NL, as 20 players had at least one stint on the disabled list and 10 finished the season on the 60-day DL. Seven Dodgers made their Major League debuts as second-round pick Paco Rodriguez became the first member of the 2012 First-Year Player Draft to make his Major League debut (Sept. 9 at SF), joining Alex Castellanos (May 31 vs. MIL), Stephen Fife (July 17 vs. PHI), Elian Herrera (May 15 vs. ARI), Shawn Tolleson (June 7 at PHI), Scott Van Slyke (May 9 vs. SF) and Josh Wall (July 22 at NYM) who all appeared in their first MLB games during the season.
 - Left-handed pitcher Michael Antonini made the first two Major League roster appearances of his career from April 24-27 and later on May 28 (recalled prior to the game and optioned after the game), but never made an appearance. The 27-year-old was designated for assignment on July 31 and was later outrighted to Triple-A Albuquerque on Aug. 3.
 - In addition, outfielder Alfredo Silverio and right-handed pitcher Chris Withrow were recalled and transferred to the 60-day disabled list on Sept. 1 (right elbow surgery) and Sept. 2 (right lat. strain), respectively.
 - After being acquired from Boston on Aug. 25, Carl Crawford spent the rest of the season on the 60-day disabled list
- **NOTHING MINOR ABOUT IT:** For the second consecutive season, Dodger affiliates posted one of the top combined winning percentages among big league teams, ranking third with a .531 mark (404-357), with four of seven farm teams reaching the postseason. Triple-A Albuquerque, Double-A Chattanooga and the Rookie-level AZL Dodgers all fell in their league semifinals, while Rookie-advanced Ogden lost in the Pioneer League championship series for the third consecutive season.
 - Triple-A Albuquerque right-hander and Pacific Coast League Pitcher of the Year John Ely was selected as the Dodgers' Branch Rickey Minor League Pitcher of the Year, while Single-A Rancho Cucamonga outfielder Joc Pederson was honored as the organization's Minor League Player of the Year.

MAJOR LEAGUE WAIVER RULES

There are four types of waiver requests- Major League Waivers, Special Waivers, Outright Waivers and Unconditional Release Waivers.

Major League Waivers are necessary for any player assignment between Major League clubs made from Aug. 1 until the day after the close of the regular season. Waivers are not needed for Major League assignments during the rest of the year. The trading deadline in which waivers are not needed is July 31.

Special waivers are irrevocable. They are required for a Major League club to outright a player to a minor league club from September 1 until the 30th day of the following season.

Outright Waivers are irrevocable. They are required for a Major League club to outright a player to a minor league club from the 31st day of the regular season until August 31.

Unconditional Release Waivers can be secured at any point during the year.

In 1974, first baseman Steve Garvey became the only Dodger to be elected to the All-Star Game as a write-in candidate. Garvey's name didn't appear on the ballot at the beginning of the season, but a .338 batting average through May gained national attention. Garvey went 2-for-4 with a double and RBI in the National League's 7-2 victory over the American League at Pittsburgh's Three Rivers Stadium. Garvey was named All-Star Game MVP, an honor he would also win in 1978.

DOUBLE TROUBLE

In 1953, Brooklyn's Carl Furillo won the batting title with a .344 mark and Roy Campanella took home the RBI crown with 142. Since then, no National League team has had two different players lead the league in those two categories. The last American League team to do so was the 2001 Mariners, who had Ichiro Suzuki (.353) and Bret Boone (141) accomplish the feat. Since 1920, the year that the RBI became an official statistic, this has happened only 14 times in the Major Leagues and just three times in the National League. ALL-STAR NOTES

MANAGING JUST FINE: Joe Torre managed the American League All-Star team six times, the fourth-most all-time behind Casey Stengel (10), the Dodgers' Walter Alston (9) and Joe McCarthy (7). Alston's seven victories are the most ever by an All-Star skipper. The other Dodgers who have managed in the Midsummer Classic are Leo Durocher (1942, 1948), Burt Shotton (1950) and Tom Lasorda (1978-79, 1982, 1989).

THE HOMETOWN HURLER: In 2004, Houston's Roger Clemens became just the 10th pitcher to start a game in his home ballpark. The Dodgers' Don Drysdale was the fifth to do so when he took the mound on Aug. 3, 1959 at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum.

BEHIND THE MIC: Several Dodger broadcasters or former Dodgers have announced All-Star Games, led by Hall of Famers Vin Scully (1959, 1962-1963, 1983, 1985, 1987, 1989) and Jaime Jarrin (26 times). Others to call the action or provide color at the Midsummer Classic include Al Helfer (1955-57), Pee Wee Reese (1966-68), Sandy Koufax (1967-68), Maury Wills (1973) and Don Drysdale (1978, 1980, 1982, 1984, 1986).

HONORARY CAPTAINS: Four Dodger greats have had the honor of serving as the honorary captain of the National League. Roy Campanella was given that honor in 1980 for the game at Dodger Stadium, while Duke Snider (1982), Sandy Koufax (1985) and Don Drysdale (1989) were also named honorary captains.

MOST VALUABLE: Only twice in All-Star history has the game's MVP come from the same team in consecutive years. San Francisco's Willie Mays and Willie McCovey won the award from 1968-69 while the Dodgers' Don Sutton and Steve Garvey were named as the All-Star Game's Most Valuable Player in 1977 and 1978. Garvey also won the award in 1974.

ROOKIE ALL-STARS: There have been 35 rookies named to the National League All-Star team, including 16 pitchers, and the Dodgers have accounted for five of those players. Don Newcombe (1949), Fernando Valenzuela (1981), Steve Sax (1982), Mike Piazza (1993) and Hideo Nomo (1995) all made the squad in their first big league seasons, while Nomo and Valenzuela are two of the four pitchers in either league to start a game in their rookie season, joining Dave Stenhouse (1962) and Mark Fidrych (1976).

BIG D TOPS THE CHARTS: In All-Star history, Don Drysdale has struck out 19 batters, the most of any pitcher in either league. His 19.1 innings pitched are also the most, while his 10 All-Star selections are tied for third with Steve Carlton and Roger Clemens for the third most among pitchers.

RIGHT OFF THE BAT: David Ortiz homered in his first career official All-Star at-bat in 2004, becoming the 13th player to accomplish that feat. The third player was the Dodgers' Jim Gilliam, who went deep on Aug. 3, 1959 in the game played at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum.

BACK-TO-BACK JACKS: In the 1975 All-Star Game, Steve Garvey and Jimmy Wynn hit back-to-back homers, marking just the third time in history that two players have homered consecutively in the Midsummer Classic and the only time that both players were on the same team. The feat was accomplished twice after Garvey and Wynn, most recently by Derek Jeter and Magglio Ordonez in the 2001 All-Star Game.

HOME RUN DERBY: The Dodgers have had just four players participate in the Home Run Derby during All-Star Weekend since the first derby took place in 1985. Mike Piazza participated in back-to-back years (1993, 1994) while Raul Mondesi (1995) Hee-Seop Choi (2005) and Matt Kemp (2011) were the other Dodgers that took part in the event.

BROOKLYN AND LOS ANGELES ALL-TIME ROSTER

Brooklyn, an incubator of baseball in the pre-Civil War era, had such strong clubs as the Atlantics, Eckfords and Excelsiors and didn't take to professional baseball until joining the American Association in 1884. The AA champs of 1889 had so many newlyweds on the roster they were known as the Bridegrooms. The club moved into the National League the following year and became dubbed the Trolley Dodgers because of the maze of streetcar tracks in the borough. The name shortened to Dodgers and became permanent, although during the managerial tenure of Ned Hanlon (1899-1905) it was changed to Superbas, and in Wilbert Robinson's reign (1914-1931) the team was often referred to as the Robins. But the name Dodgers is associated with some of baseball's all-time greats.

UNIFORM NUMBERS IN DODGER HISTORY

Since 1932, hundreds of players and coaches have put on a Dodger uniform, wearing every single number from 1 to 77 as well as 97 and 99. On April 15, from 2007-11, the Dodgers all wore No. 42 to celebrate the 60th-64th anniversaries of Jackie Robinson breaking the color barrier. Pitcher Joe Beime's No. 97 was the highest number ever worn by a player during a regular-season game until Manny Ramirez donned No. 99 in 2008. Pee Wee Reese's No. 1 was officially retired on July 4, 1984, one of nine numbers that have been retired. HISTORY OF THE DODGER UNIFORM

1900s

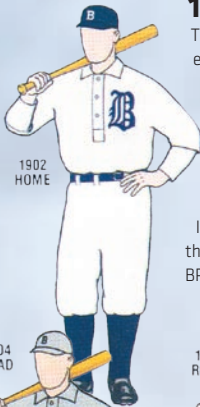
The Dodgers started the new century as champions of the National League - in effect, World Champs since the American League was still a minor league. The Brooklyns of 1900 wore the standard white at home and gray on the road.

Home caps were solid white with rounded "pill-box" shape crown. Road caps were the same in gray. Stockings were solid maroon at home, black on the road. Shirts were the standard buttoned front with a fold-down collar style. The road shirts displayed BROOKLYN in arched block capitals while the home shirts were plain or with an Old English B on the left breast.

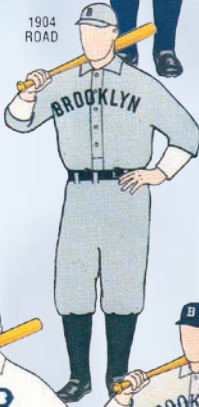
In 1902, the home trim color was changed to BLUE (probably navy shade) and the caps were now solid blue with a white B in front. The trim color on the BROOKLYN road suits continued to be black, but the cap color was solid gray with a black B in front starting around 1903. They kept this same overall uniform look through 1907, the only changes being a smaller Old English B at home and the dark blue cap replacing the gray model.

The uniforms were re-designed for 1907, retaining the blue as standard trim color throughout. At home, the Old English B was replaced by a fancy capital B - a letter style that was to be used repeatedly for the next five decades in Brooklyn. This style B in fact was still used on the Brooklyn caps in their final season in Flatbush (1957). But the new road uniforms for 1907 were daring indeed. Instead of the standard plain gray, they were made from a gray cloth with a fine blue "cross-hatch," or checked pattern. This material evoked comments throughout the league and even ridicule. Enough, perhaps, to dissuade the club not to repeat the unusual flannels for 1908. This fabric was historic in that it was one of the first attempts to dress up the monotonous gray of the road flannels and was an experimental forerunner of the more acceptable pinstripes of later years. And the cross-hatch idea itself would resurface in the later history of Brooklyn uniforms. The 1908 road uniforms were once again your basic gray with the BROOKLYN name in fancy capital letters. In 1909, a pair of stripes (gray or white) were added to dress up the solid navy blue stockings.

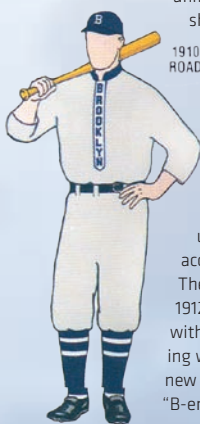

1910s

In keeping with the latest trend in uniform shirts, the 1910 uniforms replaced the fold-down collar with the short stand-up "cadet" style. The only trim feature on the new home whites was a letter B enclosed in a "diamond" design on the left sleeve.

The new road gray shirts accented the new cadet collar in solid navy and the name BROOKLYN was displayed vertically in small capital letters down the button panel (another current trend). The following season (1911), fine, narrow pinstriping was used on the gray traveling uniforms - already an acceptable and popular alternative to plain gray. The final season at old Washington Park was in 1912, and the Superbas celebrated the occasion with another new set of uniforms. Bold pinstriping was included on the home whites, even on the new cap crown. Cap visors were solid blue and the "B-enclosed-in-a-diamond" design was on the cap

front. The road grays duplicated the pinstriping and included a solid navy cap with the same logo design in white. The stage was set for a new beginning in a brand new concrete and steel facility in 1913.

The Brooklyn's opened Ebbets Field in 1913 with spruced up new uniforms. The pinstriping was repeated, but the cadet collar, button panel and sleeve ends were in solid navy on both home and road jerseys. The name BROOKLYN in vertical white lettering was revived on the button area of the road shirt. The navy caps were the standard round crown by now and included a white trip stripe around the base of the crown. The white stripes on the blue home stockings were now wider and bolder, while the gray road stockings featured a single wide band of blue.

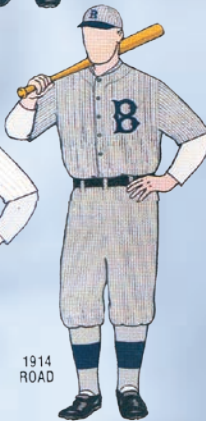

In 1914, the new uniforms were somewhat toned down - the extra navy trimmings were removed and the new V-neck collar style replaced the cadet version. It was pinstripes once again, but the cap was re-done in matching pinstripe material with a solid blue visor. The fancy capital B from 1909 was resurrected on both shirt fronts as well as cap fronts. Both home and road stockings featured the wide blue band about halfway down.

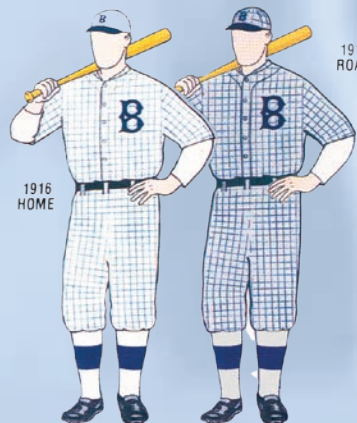

The "Robins" (as they were now being called) opened the 1916 season in a bold new version of the "cross-hatched" pinstriping of 1907. This time it was wider spacing and it was used on the new home whites as well as the road suits. Except for the unique pattern, the graphics were the same as 1915. The idea was more acceptable now - just another variation of the now widely accepted pinstripes. But also, this Brooklyn team was a pennant contender all the way, checked uniforms notwithstanding. The fans and the media seldom find reason to criticize a winner in any costume. Win they did, and met the Boston Red Sox in the World Series. No cigar, but those unusual uniforms thus became a part of baseball lore. It was back to regular pinstripes in 1917 and the following seasons of the decade.



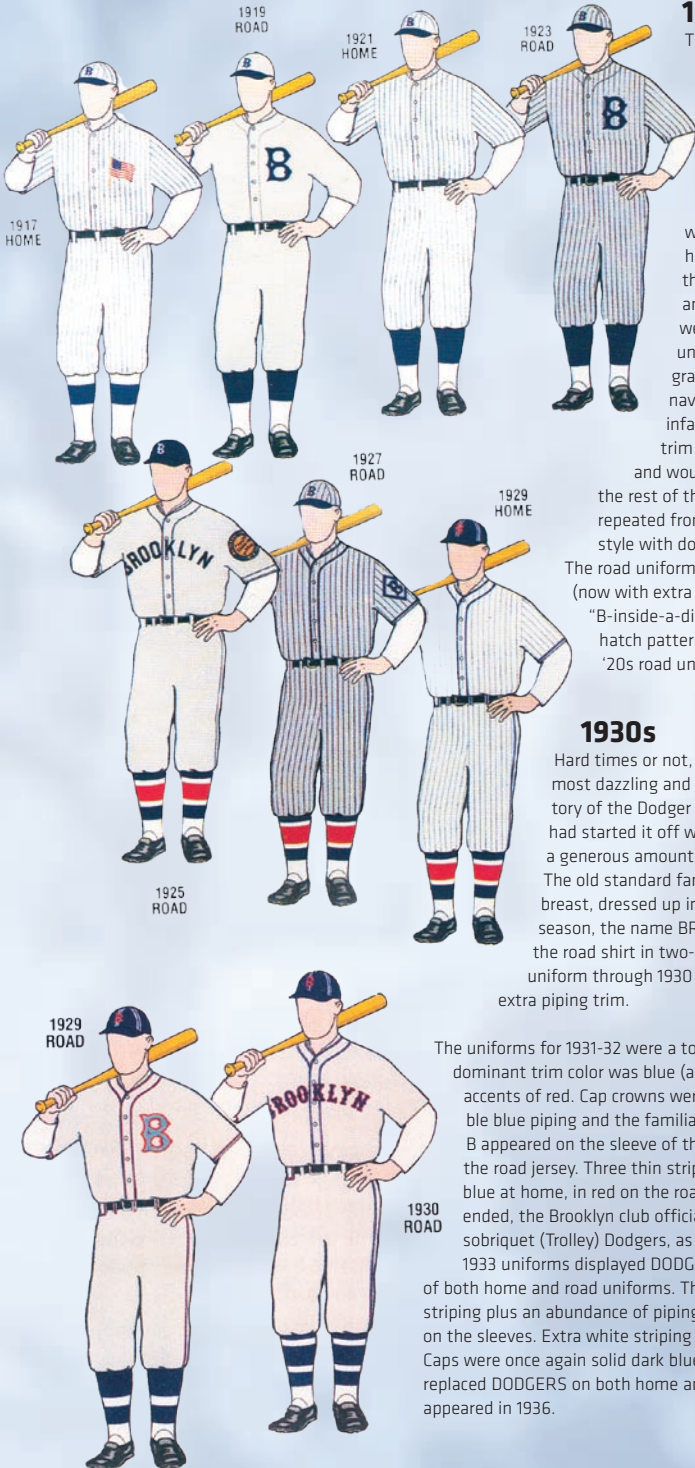

HISTORY OF THE DODGER UNIFORM



1920s

The bland, pinstriped uniform set continued through the early '20s for the "Trolley Dodgers." The National League celebrated its 50th year in 1925 and Brooklyn spruced up its appearance to observe the milestone. As with all NL teams, a large circular blue and gold patch was displayed on the left breast of the home shirts and on the left sleeve of the road grays. Dazzling new red, white and blue stockings were introduced as well as some new piping trim. The road uniforms had a whole new look - plain gray with the name BROOKLYN in archred navy block capitals, the same as the infamous 1907 "checked" uniforms. Piping trim was becoming quite fashionable and would be used on Brooklyn uniforms for the rest of the decade. The home uniforms were repeated from 1926-29 except for a dressier cap style with double piping down the crown seams. The road uniforms for 1926 reverted to the pinstripes (now with extra piping trim) and a version of the "B-inside-a-diamond" logo on the sleeve. The cross-hatch pattern was even revived briefly in the late '20s road uniform.

1930s

Hard times or not, the decade of the '30s produced the most dazzling and creative uniform designs in the history of the Dodger franchise. The 1929 road uniforms had started it off with a return to the basic gray but with a generous amount of blue and red double piping trim. The old standard fancy capital B was displayed on the left breast, dressed up in piping trim outline. The following season, the name BROOKLYN reappeared on the front of the road shirt in two-color fancy capital letters. The home uniform through 1930 was still the plain pinstripes with extra piping trim.

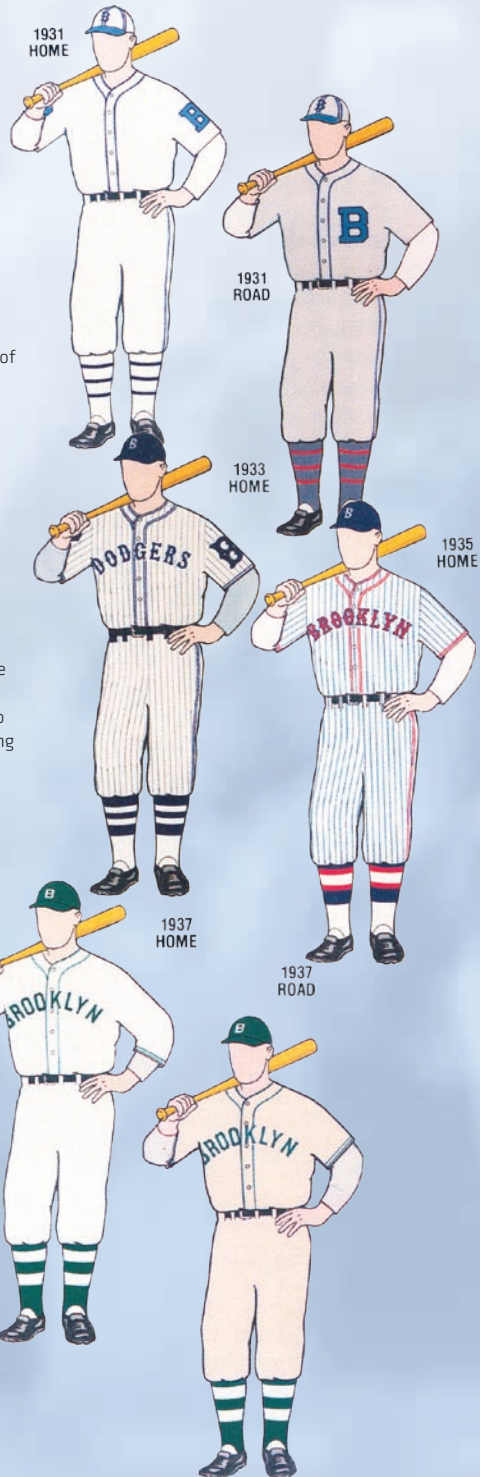
The uniforms for 1931-32 were a total redesign from top to bottom. The dominant trim color was blue (a lighter shade than navy) with some accents of red. Cap crowns were white or gray with blue visors, double blue piping and the familiar blue B in front. A new block capital B appeared on the sleeve of the home shirt and the left breast of the road jersey. Three thin stripes appeared on the stockings - in blue at home, in red on the road. With the Wilbert Robinson era ended, the Brooklyn club officially adopted the on-again, off-again sobriquet (Trolley) Dodgers, as their team nickname. The restyled 1933 uniforms displayed DODGERS in fancy capitals across the chest of both home and road uniforms. The '33 home uniforms restored the pinstriping plus an abundance of piping embellishments and a large fancy B on the sleeves. Extra white striping was also added to the blue stockings. Caps were once again solid dark blue. From 1934-36 the name BROOKLYN replaced DODGERS on both home and road suits. Solid blue stockings appeared in 1936.

HISTORY OF THE DODGER UNIFORM

In an era of unprecedented experiments in new color combinations and excessive embellishments, the Dodgers took perhaps the boldest step thus far in the decade by introducing GREEN trimmed uniforms for 1937. No, it wasn't an April Fool's joke. It was a legitimate uniform design for the coming season. Except for the choice of color which was considered "unthinkable" for baseball uniforms, the overall design was a bit conservative for the period - solid dark cap, BROOKLYN in plain block letters, minimum piping. In addition to the daring selection of green, the road uniforms also crossed a new frontier in baseball uniform schemes by using tan in place of gray on the '37 road suits. This bold idea only survived one season but it had the equivalent impact of Charles Finley's green and gold uniforms in the '60s, even without the exposure of widespread color printing and color television coverage.

Brooklyn management "came to its senses" in 1938 with yet another overhaul of their uniform designs. The more conventional ROYAL BLUE ("Dodger Blue") was restored as the sole trim color. The new nickname DODGERS was worked into a slanted script (a new trend in the '30s) with an underline flourish and was displayed on both home and road shirt fronts. The 1938 season must be recorded as a historic milestone in the evolution of Dodger uniforms - this script DODGERS has remained intact through the years and is a permanent fixture on today's uniforms and no doubt will continue as far into the future as anyone can see. For '38 only, the home cap crown was white with blue piping. Other minor trim features from 1938 have also endured - solid blue stockings and undersweaters, no piping trim on the home whites and a consistent minimal piping on the gray road jerseys.

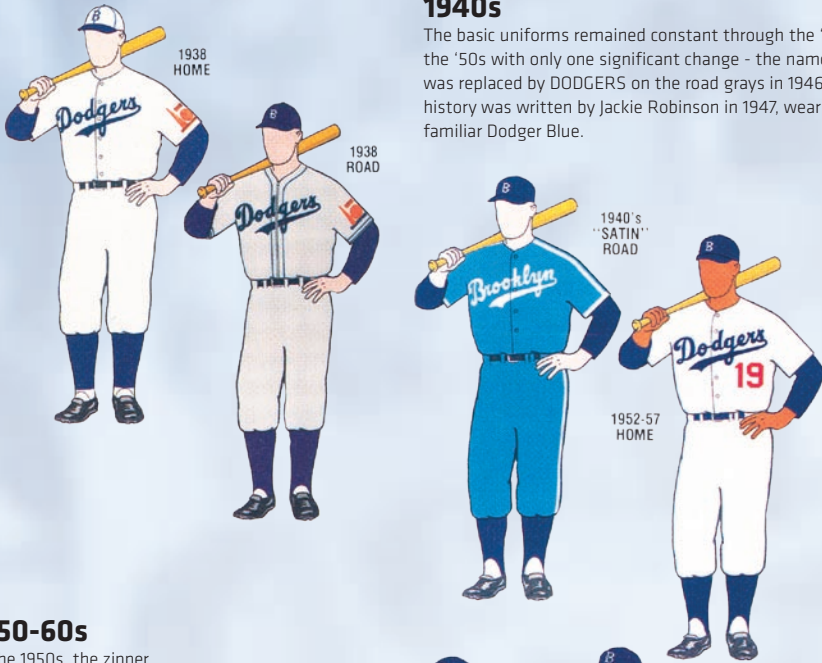
A couple of minor changes were included in the 1939 set. Zippered fronts (another trend) replaced buttons and an equivalent script BROOKLYN was displayed across the road jersey. The solid blue cap with fancy white B endured through the final season in Flatbush. With the advent of night baseball at Ebbets Field in the '40s, an unusual hybrid version of the familiar Dodger uniform was developed. Instead of the usual flannel, a highly reflective satin fabric was used with the idea that it would improve viewing the games under the arc lights. The home version included extra blue striping down the shoulders and on the sleeve ends. Also, the belt tunnels were solid blue and there was a heavy blue stripe down the trouser leg. The satin road suit was a bit more unique - the material color was a rich pale blue and the trim (including script BROOKLYN) was added in white. Curiously, some of these unusual trim characteristics would reappear decades later with the advent of double-knit fabrics.

1940s

The basic uniforms remained constant through the '40s and into the '50s with only one significant change - the name BROOKLYN was replaced by DODGERS on the road grays in 1946. Baseball history was written by Jackie Robinson in 1947, wearing the now familiar Dodger Blue.



1950-60s

By the 1950s, the zipper front was history and buttons were once again standard. In 1952, the player's number was repeated on the left front of the home jersey in RED - the first Major League club to do so. Many teams followed this precedent in subsequent years. After so many futile tries, the Brooklyn Dodgers finally captured the grand prize in 1955 with a thrilling World Series victory over the hated Yankees. Despite another pennant in 1956, owner Walter O'Malley was determined to seize the opportunity of a franchise on the West Coast and Major League Baseball in Brooklyn was no more after 1957. Major League Baseball was an instant hit on the West Coast in 1958. Sadly, Brooklyn fandom deserved a better fate, but the transfer was otherwise a glorious event and successful beyond O'Malley's wildest dreams. Attendance was phenomenal, aided by the enormous seating capacity of the Coliseum and the instant resumption of the rivalry with the Giants. The permanency of the move was sealed forever with a World Championship in 1959, only their second season in Los Angeles. O'Malley was committed to continuation of team tradition, and the uniforms were repeated intact - except for the L.A. on the caps and the script LOS ANGELES on the otherwise familiar traveling suits. Also, the red player's numeral was now included on the front of the new road shirts.



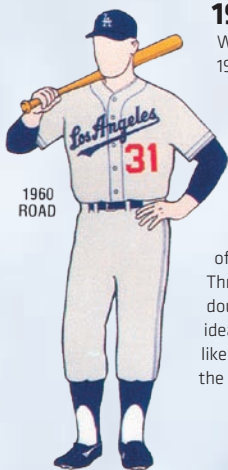

1970-2010s

When the Dodgers adopted the double-knit fabrics in the early 1970s, changes were made on the road jerseys. Blue and white piping was added to the collar, down the shoulder line and on the sleeve ends. Also, with the team's West Coast identity now firmly established, the name LOS ANGELES was dropped and DODGERS was restored as before on the road shirt. A few seasons later the collar and shoulder piping were dropped and the road uniform of today's Los Angeles Dodgers was presented. In 1972, the Dodgers introduced names on the back of the road jerseys which remained there until the 2005 season. Throughout the hectic years of bizarre color combinations and the double-knit style features, the Dodgers' image has personified the idea of a consistent tradition. The Dodgers of today look very much like the Dodgers of 1938 and most probably like the Dodgers of the future.

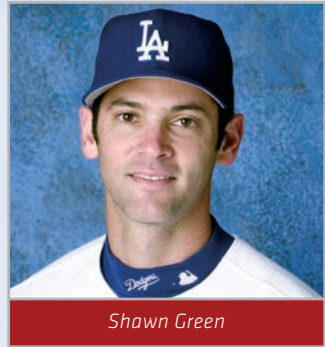

THIS DATE IN DODGER HISTORY

January 1, 2008: The Dodgers enter their first-ever float in the Rose Parade, marking the beginning of a year-long celebration of the team's 50th anniversary in Los Angeles.

January 5, 1982: Dodger announcer Vin Scully is elected to the Hall of Fame.

January 10, 1984: Don Drysdale is elected to the Hall of Fame.

January 17, 1958: The Dodgers complete arrangements to play home games in the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum for the 1958 and 1959 seasons.

January 19, 1972: Sandy Koufax becomes the youngest member to be elected to the Hall of Fame at the age of 36.

January 23, 1962: Jackie Robinson is elected to the Hall of Fame just days shy of his 43rd birthday.

January 29, 1967: Former Dodger President and General Manager Branch Rickey is elected into the Hall of Fame.

January 29, 2004: Frank McCourt becomes the fourth owner of the Los Angeles Dodgers.

February 1, 1988: The Dodgers sign free agent outfielder Kirk Gibson.

March 1, 2009: The Dodgers play their first-ever game at Camelback Ranch-Glendale

March 2, 2005: Hall of Famer Jackie Robinson is honored posthumously by receiving the Congressional Gold Medal during ceremonies in the rotunda of the United States Capitol building in Washington, DC.

March 4, 1912: Groundbreaking ceremonies are held for the construction of Ebbets Field.

March 8, 1966: Casey Stengel is elected to the Hall of Fame.

March 11, 1953: Holman Stadium in Vero Beach is dedicated to Bud L. Holman. The Dodgers beat the Philadelphia Athletics, 4-2, in front of 5,532.

March 15, 1970: Peter O'Malley becomes president of the Dodgers, succeeding his father, Walter, who assumes the position of chairman of the board.

March 15, 2008: The Dodgers host the Padres at Wukesong Stadium in Beijing, in Major League Baseball's first-ever game on Chinese soil.

March 17, 2008: The Dodgers play their last Spring Training game at Holman Stadium in Vero Beach, FL. Vero Beach hosted the Dodgers during Spring Training for 60 years.

March 21, 1987: The Dodgers dedicate Campo Las Palmas in the Dominican Republic, a camp designed for young Latin players to help further the growth of baseball.

March 29, 2008: A Guinness World Record 115,300 fans watch the Dodgers take on the Boston Red Sox in an exhibition at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum that raises more than \$2 million dollars for ThinkCure!, the team's official charity.

March 31, 2011: Don Mattingly picks up his first win as Dodger Manager as Los Angeles defeats San Francisco 2-1 on Opening Day at Dodger Stadium.

April 2, 1962: The California Angels and Los Angeles Dodgers play their first game ever against each other, as the Angels edge the Dodgers, 6-5 and begin the Freeway Series.

April 3, 2006: A Dodger Stadium regular season-record crowd of 56,000 fans sees the Dodgers face the Braves on Opening Day.

April 5, 1913: Ebbets Field opens as 25,000 fans see the Brooklyn Dodgers, behind Nap Rucker, beat New York, 3-2, in an exhibition game. Casey Stengel hits the first home run in the new ballpark.

April 6, 2005: The Dodgers are recognized by *Guinness World Records* Book as having registered the "Highest Cumulative Attendance for a Baseball Franchise."

April 7, 1969: Bill Singer is credited with the first official save in baseball history

April 8, 1994: Atlanta Braves' Kent Mercker no-hits the Dodgers, 6-0, becoming the fifth opposing pitcher to no-hit the Dodgers since they came to Los Angeles and is only the second no-hitter by an opponent at Dodger Stadium. Dodger rookie pitcher Chan Ho Park also makes his historic Major League debut, pitching the ninth inning.

April 9, 1913: The Brooklyn Dodgers play their first regular-season game at Ebbets Field as Nap Rucker blanks Philadelphia, 1-0.

April 9, 1981: Fernando Valenzuela makes his first Major League start, substituting for Jerry Reuss, on Opening Day and blanks the Astros, 2-0.

April 10, 1962: Dodger Stadium opens with 52,564 fans in attendance to see the Dodgers and Reds, with Cincinnati winning, 6-3.

April 11, 1947: Jackie Robinson becomes the first African-American player to sign a Major League contract as he does so with the Brooklyn Dodgers.

April 11, 1962: Jim Gilliam homers and Sandy Koufax goes the distance as the Dodgers beat the Reds, 6-2 in the club's first win at Dodger Stadium.

April 13, 1954: Future Hall of Famer Walter Alston makes his debut as a Dodger manager, the first of 23 consecutive seasons with the club.

April 13, 2012: Aaron Harang establishes a franchise record by striking out nine consecutive Padre hitters, breaking Johnny Podres' old mark. He finished the night with 13 Ks in 6.1 innings, tying his career high for strikeouts (Sept. 29, 2007) and became the first Dodger pitcher in the last 90 seasons to have 13 or more strikeouts in a game when pitching fewer than 7.0 innings.

April 13, 2009: In the club's home opener, Orlando Hudson becomes the second L.A. Dodger to hit for the cycle and the first since Wes Parker in 1970...the contest against the Giants was Hudson's first home game as a Dodger.

April 14, 1964: Sandy Koufax tosses a 4-0 shutout over the Cardinals in the only Opening Day start of his career.

April 15, 1947: Jackie Robinson plays his first Major League game, thus becoming the first African-American player to play in the Major Leagues.

April 15, 2007: The Dodgers celebrate the 60th Anniversary of Jackie Robinson breaking the color barrier as each player and coach wears his retired No. 42 in a nationally televised game against the Padres. Los Angeles won, 9-3.

April 15, 2009: At 21 years and 27 days, left-hander Clayton Kershaw becomes the youngest pitcher in L.A. Dodger history to strike out at least 13 batters in game, when he fans 13 against the Giants.

April 16, 1983: Playing for the Padres at Dodger Stadium, former Dodger Steve Garvey appears in his 1,118th consecutive Major League game to set a NL record.

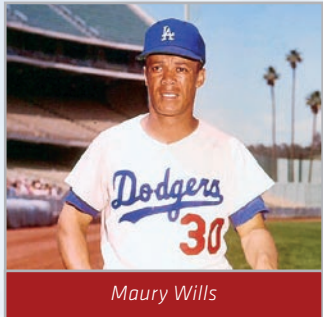
- April 18, 1950:** Vin Scully joins Red Barber and Connie Desmond in the broadcast booth.
- April 18, 1958:** Before a crowd of 78,672 at the Coliseum, the Dodgers play their first game in Los Angeles and defeat the San Francisco Giants, 6-5.
- April 19, 1890:** The Dodgers (a.k.a. Bridegrooms) play their first National League game at Washington Park and lose to the Boston Braves, 15-9.
- April 19, 1956:** In the first Dodger game played at Roosevelt Stadium in New Jersey, Roy Campanella collects his 1,000th Major League hit.
- April 21, 1890:** The Dodgers win their first National League game with a 7-6 decision over the Braves.
- April 21, 1967:** After 737 games in Los Angeles, Dodger fans experience the first rainout since the club's move West.
- April 22, 1958:** The first night game in Los Angeles is played at the Coliseum as the Dodgers defeat the Chicago Cubs, 4-2.
- April 23, 1958:** Pee Wee Reese plays in his 2,000th game and Gil Hodges hits his 300th homer.
- April 24, 1962:** Sandy Koufax ties his own team record by striking out 18 Cubs in a 10-2 victory.
- April 25, 1976:** Rick Monday of the Cubs saves the American flag as he rescues it from two dissidents who try to burn it in the Dodger Stadium outfield. The following season, Monday begins an eight-year career with the Dodgers.
- April 27, 1891:** The Dodgers play their first home game at Eastern Park, the second of seven ballparks they would call home in franchise history.
- April 27, 1929:** Brooklyn Dodgers relief pitcher Clise Dudley becomes the first player to hit a home run on the first Major League pitch thrown to him.
- April 28, 1985:** Fernando Valenzuela sets a Major League record of 41 consecutive innings without allowing an earned run to start the season.
- April 30, 2012:** Matt Kemp rips his 12th home run of the month, setting a new Dodger franchise record for homers in April
- April 30, 2011:** Andre Ethier goes 2-for-4 to set a Major League record for the longest all-time April hitting streak at 26 games, passing Joe Torre's old mark of 22 games set in 1971.
- May 1, 1920:** The Dodgers and the Boston Braves play 26 innings -- the longest in Major League history only to tie the Boston Braves, 1-1. Dodger pitcher Leon Cadore pitches all 26 innings, including 20 consecutive scoreless innings.
- May 2, 2012:** The new Dodger ownership group that includes Mark R. Walter as its controlling partner, as well as Earvin "Magic" Johnson, Peter Guber, Stan Kasten, Bobby Patton and Todd Boehly are introduced to the media and fans at a news conference at Dodger Stadium. On May 5 at Wrigley Field, the Dodgers 5-1 victory over the Cubs becomes the first win in the Guggenheim Baseball Management era.
- May 4, 1919:** The first Sunday game following the approval of the Sunday Baseball Bill by the New York state legislature is played at Ebbets Field as the Dodgers beat the Braves, 6-2.
- May 6, 2009:** The Dodgers establish a modern-day record by winning their 13th consecutive home game to start the season and also tie a Dodger Stadium record for the club's longest home winning streak in the ballpark's 47-year history.
- May 6, 2011:** Andre Ethier picks up three hits at New York-NL to extend his hitting streak to 30 games, the second-longest run in franchise history. He would go 0-for-4 the next day, bringing the streak, which started on April 2, to an end.
- May 7, 1959:** A Major League-record 93,103 fans salute Roy Campanella as the Dodgers and Yankees play an exhibition game in the Los Angeles Coliseum.
- May 7, 1970:** Wes Parker becomes the first L.A. Dodger to hit for the cycle (single, double, triple and home run) in a game against the New York Mets.
- May 11, 1963:** Sandy Koufax pitches a no-hitter against the San Francisco Giants and the Dodgers win, 8-0.
- May 12, 1956:** In the first no-hitter to be nationally televised, Carl Erskine blanks the Giants, 3-0, and records his second no-hitter.
- May 13, 1958:** Charlie Neal's opposite-field home run becomes the first to clear the right field fence at the Coliseum
- May 13, 1991:** Mike Scioscia catches his 1,219th game as a Dodger to become the all-time leader in games caught in L.A. history.
- May 13, 2004:** After singing the National Anthem and God Bless America prior to the game against the Cubs, Jose Lima turned in the longest relief outing of his career, posting 5.2 scoreless innings.
- May 14, 1968:** Don Drysdale starts his 58 consecutive scoreless inning streak with a 1-0 shutout of the Cubs.
- May 17, 2008:** Chan Ho Park, Hong-Chih Kuo, and Takashi Saito are the first trio of pitchers from different Asian countries to pitch all nine innings of a big league game.
- May 20, 1972:** In the fastest game ever at Dodger Stadium (one hour, 30 minutes), Al Downing two-hits Houston, 3-0.
- May 21, 2008:** Hiroki Kuroda and Takshi Saito are the first Japanese starter and reliever to record both the win and the save in the same big league game.
- May 23, 2002:** Shawn Green becomes the 14th player in Major League history to hit four home runs in a game as the Dodgers rout Milwaukee, 16-3. Green sets a Major League record with 19 total bases and ties a Major League mark scoring six runs. The club sets a new team record with eight home runs.
- May 24, 1973:** Willie Davis becomes the first Los Angeles Dodger to get six hits in a 16-inning game against the New York Mets.
- May 26, 1971:** Maury Wills singles in the fifth inning vs. San Francisco for the 2,000th hit of his career.
- May 27, 1957:** The Dodgers and Giants are granted permission to move to the West Coast by National League club owners.
- May 28, 2001:** Paul Lo Duca ties a Dodger record by recording six hits against Colorado as they outlast the Rockies, 7-6, in 11 innings. Shawn Green has four hits, including the game-winner.

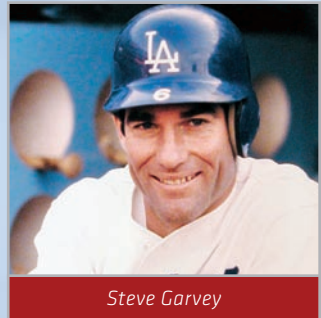
- May 30, 1962:** Maury Wills homers right-handed and left-handed in a game as the Dodgers sweep a doubleheader against the Mets.
- May 31, 1968:** Don Drysdale's consecutive scoreless streak continues when umpire Harry Wendelstedt rules Giants' Dick Dietz did not attempt to get out of the way of Drysdale's bases-loaded pitch (streak ends on June 8 at 58.2 innings pitched).
- June 1, 1955:** Duke Snider becomes the first Dodger to hit three homers in a game on two separate occasions when he does it for the second time at Ebbets Field against the Braves.
- June 3, 1958:** Voters elect to allow the Dodgers to purchase land in Chavez Ravine for the new stadium.
- June 3, 1983:** Second baseman Steve Sax and catcher Dave Sax become the first brothers to start in the same game for the Dodgers in a contest against the New York Mets.
- June 3, 1989:** The Dodgers play their longest game in team history, seven hours and 14 minutes, but lose to the Houston Astros, 5-4, in an L.A.-record 22 innings. The Dodger use a team-record nine pitchers, including infielder Jeff Hamilton.
- June 4, 1972:** Jackie Robinson (42), Roy Campanella (39) and Sandy Koufax (32) have their uniform numbers retired at Dodger Stadium.
- June 4, 1964:** Sandy Koufax throws his third no-hitter, the only one on the road, by fanning 12 Philadelphia batters and winning, 3-0.
- June 4, 1990:** Ramon Martinez strikes out 18 Atlanta batters in a 6-0 win over the Braves to tie the Dodger record of Sandy Koufax.
- June 5, 1977:** Walter Alston, Dodger manager for 23 years, has his number (24) retired.
- June 8, 1955:** Pitcher Tommy Lasorda is optioned to the Dodgers' Triple-A affiliate in Montreal to make room on the roster for Sandy Koufax.
- June 9, 1982:** Dodger broadcaster Vin Scully has his star placed on the Hollywood Walk of Fame.
- June 10, 1975:** Davey Lopes steals second base against Montreal to begin his Major League-record string of 38 consecutive stolen bases.
- June 12, 2005:** Hee-Seop Choi slugs three home runs vs. Minnesota, marking the 16th time in franchise history that a player has accomplished that feat and the first Major League of Asian descent to go deep three times in a game. He would hit three more homers over the next two games for a total of six in three games, becoming just the 12th player in Major League history to accomplish that feat.
- June 14, 1995:** Hideo Nomo breaks a 41-year-old Dodger rookie record as he records 16 strikeouts in an 8-5 victory over the Pirates. The franchise mark was previously held by Karl Spooner, who had 15 in a 1954 game vs. the New York Giants.
- June 14, 2006:** Matt Kemp slugs a home run off San Diego's Scott Linebrink, his seventh homer since reaching the big leagues. Kemp becomes just the fifth player in Major League history to hit seven homers in his first 18 days in the big leagues.
- June 15, 1938:** A crowd of 38,748 at Ebbets Field watches the first night game in New York (Reds' Johnny Vander Meer no-hitter).
- June 18, 1997:** Hideo Nomo and Shigetoshi Hasegawa become the first Japanese players to appear in the same Major League game as the Dodgers and Angels square off in Interleague Play.
- June 18, 2003:** Paul Lo Duca hits in his 25th straight game as the Dodgers defeat division-leading San Francisco, 8-2. It is the longest hitting streak by a Dodger since Steve Sax hit in 25 in 1986.
- June 18, 2004:** In their first-ever regular-season visit to Dodger Stadium, the Yankees fall to the Dodgers, 6-3, before the third-largest regular-season crowd in Dodger Stadium history (55,207).
- June 19, 1938:** The legendary Babe Ruth dons a Dodger uniform for the first time as a coach and takes batting practice with the team.
- June 19, 1952:** Carl Erskine pitches the first of his two no-hitters as he defeats Chicago, 5-0.
- June 19, 1973:** Willie Davis hits a home run for his 2,000th Major League hit against Atlanta.
- June 20, 2008:** The Dodgers receive a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame. The star sits on Hollywood Boulevard, near Highland.
- June 23, 1973:** The Dodger infield of Steve Garvey, Davey Lopes, Bill Russell and Ron Cey begins its 8 1/2 years together as they start the second game of a doubleheader against the Reds.
- June 24, 1947:** Jackie Robinson steals home for the first of a Major League-record 19 times as a Dodger.
- June 24, 1955:** Sandy Koufax makes his Major League debut
- June 25, 1984:** Bill Russell becomes the L.A. Dodger leader in games played with 1,953. He went on to play in 2,181 games.
- June 27, 1980:** Pitcher Jerry Reuss no-hits the San Francisco Giants, 8-0, at Candlestick Park.
- June 28, 2008:** The Dodgers beat the Angeles, 1-0, despite getting no-hit for the 19th time in franchise history.
- June 29, 1990:** Left-hander Fernando Valenzuela becomes the first Dodger in 10 years to throw a no-hitter as he blanks the Cardinals, 6-0.
- June 30, 1962:** Sandy Koufax throws the first of his four no-hitters, and the first in Los Angeles, blanking the New York Mets, 5-0, at Dodger Stadium.
- July 1, 1990:** More than 80 former Dodgers converge on Dodger Stadium to participate in the Equitable Oldtimers Game and celebrate the team's 100th Anniversary.
- July 2, 1958:** A crowd of 66,485 pushes the Dodgers over the one million mark for the first time in the West as they draw 1,016,285 in just 35 games.
- July 2, 2002:** Eric Gagné reaches the 30-save mark faster than any other pitcher as he preserves a 4-0 victory over the Arizona Diamondbacks.
- July 3, 1974:** Mike Marshall extends his Major League record by appearing in his 13th consecutive game and saves his 11th in a 4-1 win over the Reds.
- July 3, 2004:** Eric Gagné converts his 84th consecutive save opportunity, setting the Major League record before finally having the streak snapped two days later.
- July 3, 2007:** Takashi Saito recorded his 47th save in his first 50 big league save opportunities, becoming the first Major League pitcher to accomplish the feat.
- July 4, 1959:** Maury Wills becomes the Dodger shortstop when he is called up from the minors to replace Don Zimmer, who had injured his foot
- July 4, 1980:** Don Sutton sets a Dodger record by pitching his 52nd career shutout, 4-0, over the Giants.
- July 5, 1991:** In a 4-1 loss to the Braves, Dodger catcher Gary Carter collects his 2,000th career hit.
- July 6, 1912:** The cornerstone for Ebbets Field is set.
- July 6, 1942:** Leo Durocher becomes the first Dodger to manage in the All-Star Game.
- July 6, 1955:** Sandy Koufax makes his first Major League start.

- July 8, 1980:** The 51st All-Star Game takes place at Dodger Stadium before 56,088 fans and Jerry Reuss gets the win in a 4-2 National League victory.
- July 8, 2005:** Jeff Kent registers his 2,000th career hit, a single off Roger Clemens, becoming the 66th player in Major League history to combine 300 home runs with 2,000 hits.
- July 9, 1996:** Mike Piazza is named MVP of the All-Star Game in Philadelphia. Before family and friends, Piazza drives in two runs with a 445-foot home run and a double. He is the first Dodger to win MVP honors since Steve Garvey in 1978.
- July 11, 1978:** With a pair of hits and two RBI in the All-Star Game, Steve Garvey is named the Most Valuable Player for the second time in four years.
- July 13, 1954:** Manager Walter Alston manages in his first of a record nine All-Star Game appearances.
- July 14, 1995:** Ramon Martinez tosses his first no-hitter, blanking the Florida Marlins, 7-0. Martinez strikes out eight and faces just one batter over the minimum.
- July 17, 1976:** Hall of Famer Walter Alston wins his 2,000th game as a manager as the Dodgers edge the Chicago Cubs, 5-4.
- July 18, 1978:** Don Sutton picks up his 200th career win as he bests the Pirates, 7-2.
- July 20, 1970:** Bill Singer, recently recovered from hepatitis, throws the only Dodger no-hitter in the '70s, as he blanks the Phillies, 5-0, at Dodger Stadium.
- July 21, 1956:** Hall of Famer Pee Wee Reese gets his 2,000th career hit
- July 21, 2002:** Dave Hansen breaks Manny Mota's club career pinch-hitting mark with his 107th off the bench against the San Francisco Giants.
- July 23, 1962:** Jackie Robinson is inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame.
- July 23, 1974:** As a write-in candidate, Steve Garvey makes the NL All-Star squad and is named MVP as he gets two hits and drives in a run.
- July 26, 1985:** Pedro Guerrero reaches base safely for the 14th consecutive at-bat vs. Cubs to set a Dodger record, two shy of Ted Williams' Major League mark.
- July 26, 1998:** Longtime Dodger pitcher Don Sutton and Dodger broadcaster Jaime Jarrín are inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame.
- July 26, 2007:** Brad Penny defeats the Rockies at Coors Field, running his record to 13-1 on the year and making him the first starting pitcher in Los Angeles Dodger history to win 13 of his first 14 decisions.
- July 28, 1991:** Pitcher Dennis Martinez of the Montreal Expos becomes the first opponent in Dodger Stadium history and only the second hurler in stadium history to toss a perfect game as he sets down 27 straight Dodgers before a crowd of 45,560.
- July 29, 1996:** Tommy Lasorda announces his retirement as Dodger manager.
- July 31, 1974:** Ron Cey drives in a then-L.A. Dodger-record eight runs, including two three-run homers in a 15-4 win over the Padres.
- July 31, 1984:** The Dodgers play host to the 1984 Olympic Summer Games baseball competition. Teams from eight countries participate in the demonstration tournament with Japan defeating the USA in the finals.
- July 31, 2008:** The Dodgers acquire future Manny Ramirez in a trade-deadline deal. Ramirez would put together two of the best months in Dodger history, hitting .396 with 17 home runs, 53 RBI and a .743 slugging percentage
- August 1, 1890:** "Oyster" Burns becomes the first Dodger to hit for the cycle in a 20-1 win over Pittsburgh.
- August 2, 1981:** Jackie Robinson becomes the first baseball player ever depicted on a United States postage stamp.
- August 3, 1962:** Don Drysdale wins his 20th game with an 8-3 victory over Chicago, making it the earliest date for a National League pitcher since 1918.
- August 5, 1979:** Don Sutton becomes the Dodgers' all-time strikeout leader with his 2,487th career strikeout in an 8-1 win over the San Francisco Giants.
- August 5, 1969:** Pittsburgh's Willie Stargell hits what is considered the longest home run at Dodger Stadium, a blast of 506 feet and six inches over the Right Field Pavilion.
- August 7, 1972:** Sandy Koufax is inducted into Baseball's Hall of Fame.
- August 7, 1979:** Manny Mota ties Smokey Burgess' all-time pinch-hit record of 144 hits with a single against the Houston Astros.
- August 8, 2003:** Eric Gagné sets a Major League record by converting his 39th consecutive save to start a season.
- August 9, 1975:** Davey Lopes steals his 32nd consecutive base against the New York Mets, breaking Max Carey's Major League mark.
- August 11, 1951:** The first game of a doubleheader with the Braves is the first Major League contest to be broadcast in color.
- August 13, 1982:** Against San Francisco, Steve Sax steals his 41st base to break Rudy Law's Dodger record for stolen bases by a rookie.
- August 14, 1998:** Don Sutton's uniform number 20 is retired against the Atlanta Braves at Dodger Stadium. He becomes the 10th player or manager in franchise history to receive this honor.
- August 15, 2006:** The Dodgers defeat the Florida Marlins for their 17th victory in 18 games, marking the first time they accomplished that feat since May/June 1899 when the team was still known as the Brooklyn Superbas.
- August 17, 1992:** Kevin Gross records the only no-hitter of the Major League season and the first one of his career blanking the Giants, 2-0.
- August 18, 2001:** Against the New York Mets, Shawn Green drives in his 100th RBI, becoming the first L.A. Dodger left-handed hitter to reach the century mark in RBI.
- August 23, 1958:** Gil Hodges cracks his 14th career grand slam and the first in Los Angeles Dodger history
- August 23, 1989:** In a 22-inning marathon the Dodgers defeat the Expos, 1-0, on Rick Dempsey's homer in the top of the 22nd. It was the Dodgers' second 22-inning game of the season. Dodger broadcaster Ross Porter sets a mark by calling all 22 innings on his own.
- August 24, 1974:** Davey Lopes steals an L.A. Dodger-record five bases against the St. Louis Cardinals. It gave him a Major League-record 38 consecutive stolen bases, though he was later caught stealing to end the streak.

- August 25, 2012:** The Dodgers acquire Adrian Gonzalez, Josh Beckett, Carl Crawford and Nick Punto from the Red Sox in arguably the biggest trade in franchise history. In his first game, Gonzalez belts a three-run homer at Dodger Stadium in his very first at-bat.
- August 25, 2012:** Andre Ethier breaks Ron Cey's 35-year-old Los Angeles Dodger franchise record with 10 consecutive hits from Aug. 22-25 and tied the franchise record set by Brooklyn Robin Edward Konetchy on June 28-July 1, 1919
- August 26, 1939:** With Hall of Famer Red Barber broadcasting at Ebbets Field, the Dodgers play the Reds in the first baseball game ever to be televised.
- August 27, 1988:** Tommy Lasorda gets his 1,000th victory as a Dodger skipper when the Dodgers defeat the Philadelphia Phillies, 4-2.
- August 28, 1945:** Dodger President Branch Rickey tells Jackie Robinson that he has been chosen as the first African-American to play in the Major Leagues.
- August 28, 2002:** Eric Gagné sets a new single-season franchise record for saves with his 45th of the year.
- August 29, 2006:** For the first time in franchise history, the Dodgers start and end a game with a home run, as Rafael Furcal leads off the contest with a homer vs. Cincinnati and Ramon Martinez's 16th-inning walk-off homer ends the game.
- August 31, 1950:** Gil Hodges hits a club-record four home runs and also gets a single against the Boston Braves.
- August 31, 1959:** Sandy Koufax ties a Major League record as he strikes out 18 Giants
- September 1, 1890:** The Dodgers and Pittsburgh play in the first-ever Major League tripleheader and the Dodgers win all three games.
- September 2, 1979:** Manny Mota gets his 145th career pinch-hit, breaking Smokey Burgess' all-time record.
- September 2, 2003:** Eric Gagné sets a Major League record by recording his 55th consecutive save
- September 3, 1975:** Steve Garvey starts his Dodger-record consecutive games playing streak in a game at Cincinnati.
- September 4, 1966:** The Dodgers become the first team in the history of baseball to draw two million fans both at home and on the road in the same season as they beat the Reds, 8-6, in Cincinnati.
- September 6, 1981:** With his seventh shutout, Fernando Valenzuela ties a National League record for shutouts in a rookie season as he gets his 12th win over St. Louis.
- September 7, 2001:** Shawn Green puts himself in the record books as he belts two home runs against the St. Louis Cardinals to become the Dodgers all-time single-season leader with 44. He goes on to hit 49 that season to set the club record.
- September 7, 2004:** Robin Ventura hits a pinch-hit grand slam homer, the 18th grand slam of his career to move him into third place on the all-time Major League list.
- September 8, 2004:** One day after Robin Ventura cracked a pinch-hit grand slam, Olmedo Saenz did the same thing, marking the first time in Major League history that a team had pinch-hit grand slams in back-to-back games.
- September 9, 1965:** Sandy Koufax pitches a perfect game and his fourth no-hitter with a 1-0 win over the Chicago Cubs at Dodger Stadium. There is only one hit in the game (by Lou Johnson), a Major League record.
- September 11, 1947:** At age 21, Ralph Branca becomes the youngest Dodger 20-game winner as he defeats the Cardinals, 4-3.
- September 12, 1947:** The *Sporting News* names Jackie Robinson Rookie of the Year.
- September 12, 2000:** Dave Hansen hits his Major League-record seventh pinch-hit home run of the season off Arizona's Curt Schilling and breaks Johnny Frederick's 1932 mark of six.
- September 13, 1925:** Dazzy Vance throws a no-hitter against the Phillies only five days after one-hitting them.
- September 14, 1993:** Mike Piazza hits his 29th and 30th homers, setting a new Major League rookie record for catchers
- September 15, 1978:** The Dodgers become the first team to record over three million in attendance, as they draw 4,7188 for a Don Sutton shutout against Atlanta to put them at 3,011,368 for the season.
- September 15, 2009:** Andre Ethier hits a two-run walk-off homer off Pittsburgh's Phil Dumatrait in the 13th inning to tie a Major League record with four walk-off home runs in a season.
- September 16, 1957:** In a historic move, the Los Angeles City Council agrees to a contract with the Dodgers in which the city will sell them 300 acres in Chavez Ravine.
- September 17, 1996:** Hideo Nomo throws his first no-hitter as he blanks the Colorado Rockies, 9-0, at Coors Field. It is the 20th no-hitter in franchise history.
- September 17, 2010:** Don Mattingly is announced as the ninth manager in Los Angeles Dodger history, effective at the end of the season. Mattingly also becomes the 27th skipper in franchise history.
- September 18, 2006:** Trailing 9-5 against San Diego in the bottom of the 9th inning, the Dodgers tie a Major League record with four consecutive homers by Jeff Kent, J.D. Drew, Russell Martin and Marlon Anderson, marking just the 4th time in history the feat had been accomplished. The four homers in an inning equaled the franchise record. After falling behind 10-9 in the 10th inning, Nomar Garciaparra hits a walk-off, two-run homer in the bottom of the frame, the team's 7th home run of the game to tie their Dodger Stadium record.
- September 20, 1961:** The Dodgers defeat the Cubs, 3-2, in the last game played at the Coliseum, as Sandy Koufax fans 15 and Norm Sherry hits the last home run there.
- September 20, 1993:** Dave Hansen sets a new Dodger single-season record with his 18th pinch-hit of the year against Cincinnati.
- September 22, 1957:** Duke Snider hits the final Dodger home run at Ebbets Field.
- September 23, 1962:** Maury Wills steals his 97th base to break Ty Cobb's Major League record.
- September 23, 2008:** Manny Ramirez's two-run double in the first inning makes him just the second player (Carlos Beltran, 2004) in Major League history to record 50 RBI in both leagues in the same season.
- September 24, 1929:** Johnny Frederick belts his Major League rookie-record 52nd double in an 8-6 loss to the Phillies. It still remains a Dodger record.
- September 24, 1957:** The Dodgers play their last game ever at Ebbets Field as Danny McDevitt shuts out the Pirates, 2-0.
- September 24, 2009:** Matt Kemp becomes the first Dodger in franchise history with at least 25 homers, 100 RBI and 30 stolen bases in a single season.
- September 25, 1965:** Sandy Koufax breaks Bob Feller's Major League record of 348 strikeouts for the season and goes on to post a 2-0 shutout over St. Louis.
- September 25, 1997:** Mike Piazza collects three hits against Colorado to give him 195, breaking the Major League record for most hits in a season by a player whose normal position is catcher.
- September 25, 2008:** The Dodgers clinch their 10th division title when an afternoon loss by Arizona gives them the NL West championship. Los Angeles reaches the playoffs for the third time in five seasons, the fourth time they have done that in L.A. Dodger history

- September 29, 1976:** Tommy Lasorda is named to succeed Walter Alston as manager of the Dodgers.
- September 29, 2000:** Gary Sheffield ties Duke Snider's club record of 43 home runs in a season with a home run in San Diego.
- September 29, 2006:** Takashi Saito registers his 23rd save of the season to set the franchise rookie record. The next day, he notches No. 24 to extend the mark for saves by a rookie to 24.
- September 30, 1956:** The Dodgers defeat Pittsburgh, 8-6, for the NL title as Don Newcombe wins his 27th game of the season.
- September 30, 1984:** Against San Francisco, Bill Russell plays in his 2,000th game as a Dodger.
- September 30, 2007:** The Dodgers set a single-season franchise record for paid attendance with 3,857,036, surpassing the previous mark set in 2006.
- September 30, 1995:** The Dodgers clinch their first Western Division title in seven years as they defeat the Padres, 7-2.
- October 1, 1974:** The Dodgers clinch the National League West title with an 8-5 win over Houston. Don Sutton wins his 19th game, Mike Marshall appears in a record 106th game and the Dodgers reach 100 wins for the second time in Los Angeles.
- October 1, 1990:** Right-hander Ramon Martinez becomes the youngest Dodger to win 20 games since Ralph Branca in 1947 as he defeats the Padres, 2-1. In the process he completes his 12th game and finishes as the Major League leader.
- October 1, 1993:** Mike Piazza sets a new Dodger rookie record for RBI as he drives in his 107th run of the year against San Francisco breaking the mark of 106 held by Del Bionnette since 1928.
- October 2, 1953:** In a classic pitcher's duel, Carl Erskine strikes out 14 Yankees, including Mickey Mantle four times, setting a then-World Series single-game record as the Brooklyn Dodgers defeat New York, 3-2, in Game 3 of the World Series.
- October 2, 1955:** Duke Snider becomes the first Major Leaguer to have four homers in a World Series when he belts two in Game 5, helping the Dodgers to a 5-3 victory over the Yankees
- October 2, 1963:** Dodger pitcher Sandy Koufax goes the distance in Game 1 of the World Series, limiting the Yankees to six hits and striking out 15 for a then-World Series single-game record as Los Angeles defeats New York, 5-2.
- October 2, 1965:** Sandy Koufax strikes out 15 Milwaukee Braves on two days rest to bring his season total to 382. It is his 26th win, as the Dodgers clinch the National League flag.
- October 2, 1966:** Sandy Koufax gets his 27th win at Philadelphia to give the Dodgers back-to-back pennants.
- October 2, 1977:** With Dusty Baker's 30th homer on the final day of the season against Houston at Dodger Stadium, the Dodgers set a Major League record by having four players on the same team to hit 30 or more home runs in a season. Ron Cey, Reggie Smith and Steve Garvey are the others.
- October 2, 1985:** The Dodgers clinch the NL West as the Dodgers beat Atlanta, 9-3, and Cincinnati loses in San Diego.
- October 2, 2004:** Steve Finley's walk-off grand slam clinches the NL West for the Dodgers, erasing a 3-0 deficit in the bottom of the ninth inning against the Giants. It was the Dodgers' 10th grand slam of the year, marking a new franchise single-season record.
- October 3, 1916:** The Dodgers clinch their first-ever World Series appearance as they beat the Giants, 9-6, for the NL pennant.
- October 3, 1947:** Cookie Lavagetto breaks up Yankee starting pitcher Bill Bevens' no-hitter in the ninth inning with a two-out, two-run double helping the Dodgers steal Game 4 of the World Series from New York, 3-2.
- October 3, 1951:** Bobby Thomson's dramatic game-winning home run gives the New York Giants a 5-4 victory over the Dodgers in the deciding playoff game for the National League pennant.
- October 3, 1962:** Maury Wills steals three bases against the Giants to give him a then-Major League single-season record 104.

October 9, 1988: Mike Scioscia ties Game 4 of the NL Championship Series with a two-run homer in the ninth inning. Kirk Gibson later wins the game on a 12th-inning homer, 5-4.

October 9, 2004: Facing a 2-0 deficit in the NL Division Series, Jose Lima pitches a complete-game, five-hit shutout at Dodger Stadium, marking the only complete game of the entire 2004 postseason in Major League Baseball.

October 10, 1920: In Game 5 of the World Series against the Indians, Cleveland second baseman Billy Wambsgans converts what is still the only unassisted triple play in the World Series.

October 11, 1978: In a classic World Series confrontation, rookie Bob Welch strikes out Yankee slugger Reggie Jackson with two outs in the bottom of the ninth inning to give the Dodgers a 4-3 victory in Game 4.

October 12, 1988: Orel Hershiser continues his masterful season as he shuts out the New York Mets, 6-0, and gives the Dodgers the National League pennant before 55,693 fans at Dodger Stadium.

October 14, 1965: The Dodgers win their third World Championship in seven seasons as they best the Minnesota Twins, 2-0, in Game 7. Sandy Koufax tosses his second shutout of the series and "Sweet" Lou Johnson homers in the fourth inning.

October 15, 1988: Kirk Gibson belts a dramatic two-out ninth-inning, pinch-hit, two-run homer to give the Dodgers a 5-4 victory over Oakland in Game 1 of the World Series.

October 19, 1981: Rick Monday's thrilling ninth-inning homer propels the Dodgers to a 2-1 victory in the fifth and decisive game of the National League Championship Series in Montreal.

October 20, 1988: The Dodgers defeat the Oakland A's, 5-2, in Game 5 of the World Series and capture their sixth World Championship.

October 23, 1945: In a historic move, Dodger President Branch Rickey announces that the Dodgers have signed Jackie Robinson to their Triple-A Montreal club.

October 26, 1950: Walter O'Malley becomes the new president and chief stockholder of the Dodgers.

October 28, 1981: Pedro Guerrero hits a homer and drives in five runs as the Dodgers defeat the Yankees, 9-2, and win their fifth World Series Championship, the first under Manager Tommy Lasorda.

November 1, 1942: Branch Rickey is named the General Manager of the Dodgers.

November 1, 1951: Roy Campanella wins the first of his three National League MVPs

November 5, 2007: Joe Torre becomes the 8th Manager in Los Angeles Dodger history and the 26th in franchise history

November 7, 1974: Mike Marshall becomes the first relief pitcher to win the Cy Young Award.

November 10, 1988: Orel Hershiser is unanimously named as the recipient of the National League Cy Young Award.

November 13, 2003: Eric Gagné captures the National League Cy Young Award, becoming just the ninth reliever in Major League history to take home the award.

November 15, 2005: The Dodgers name Ned Colletti the 10th General Manager in Los Angeles Dodger history.

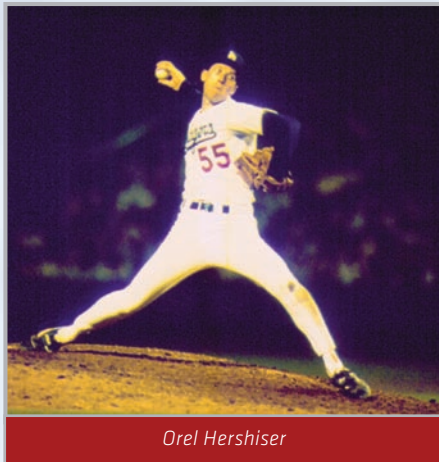

Harold Pee Wee Reese played 16 seasons at shortstop for the Brooklyn and Los Angeles Dodgers (1940-42, 1946-58) and was a member of seven Brooklyn pennant-winning teams, including the World Championship club of 1955. A 10-time National League All-Star, Reese appeared in more games at shortstop (2,014) than any player in franchise history and is also the Dodgers' all-time leader in runs scored (1,338) and walks (1,210). His leadership qualities were recognized by Manager Walter Alston, who appointed "The Little Colonel" as team captain. Reese was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 1984.

Tommy Lasorda had a tough act to follow when he succeeded future Hall of Famer Walter Alston as Dodger manager with four games left in the 1976 season. But like Alston, Lasorda went on to enjoy a lengthy and highly successful tenure at the helm. Piloting the Dodgers until the 1996 campaign, he racked up 1,599 victories to rank 13th on the all-time Major League managerial list, winning two World Series titles (1981 and 1988), four NL pennants and eight division titles. The Duke of Flatbush was among the game's most feared hitters during his 16 seasons with the Brooklyn and Los Angeles Dodgers (1947-62), playing on a pair of World Championship teams (1955 and 1959) and in six World Series overall. The eight-time All-Star center fielder ranks as the franchise's career leader in home runs (389) and runs batted in (1,271) and during the 1950s he topped all Major Leaguers with 326 homers and 1,031 RBI. He slugged four home runs in both the 1952 and 1955 World Series and he holds the Brooklyn Dodger single-season mark of 43 homers, which led the National League in 1956. His 136 RBI in 1955 topped the NL. Snider was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 1980.

Junior Gilliam played his entire 14-year Major League career (1953-66) in a Dodger uniform, both in Brooklyn and Los Angeles, contributing to four World Championship clubs (1955, 1959, 1963 and 1965) and seven pennant winners overall. He appeared in 1,976 games to rank fifth on the franchise's all-time games played list, seeing action at second base, third base and in the outfield. In 1953, he was selected as the National League Rookie of the Year. The durable right-hander spent 16 of his 23 Major League seasons with the Dodgers and more than made his mark in team history, ranking as the franchise's all-time leader in wins (233), games pitched (550), innings pitched (3,814), strikeouts (2,696) and shutouts (52). A four-time All-Star, he pitched in three World Series (1974, 1977 and 1978) with the Dodgers, led the National League in shutouts (9) in 1972, was the NL ERA leader (2.21) in 1980 and a 21-game winner in 1976. He made his big league debut with the Dodgers in 1966 and stayed with the team through 1980, before leaving and rejoining the club in 1988. Sutton finished his career with 324 wins and 3,574 strikeouts and was enshrined in the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 1998.

Walter Emmons Alston was a virtual unknown when he took over the helm of the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1954, but he became well-known in a hurry. The long-time minor league skipper guided his first Dodger team to 92 wins and followed that by piloting the 1955 Dodgers to 98 victories and their first World Championship in franchise history. He went on to lead the Dodgers to six more National League pennants and three more World Series titles (1959, 1963 and 1965) in a 23-year career in which he tallied 2,040 victories to place sixth on the all-time managerial wins list. His 3,658 total games managed rank eighth all time. Alston, who played in one Major League game, that with the St. Louis Cardinals in 1934, was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 1983.

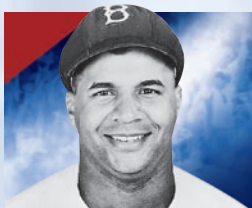

Among the most dominating pitchers in the game's history, the left-hander won 165 games and compiled 2,396 strikeouts in 2,324.1 innings with 40 shutouts in his 12-year Dodger career (1955-66). A three-time Cy Young Award winner and the National League MVP in 1963, Koufax was also World Series MVP in both 1963 and 1965, when he hurled a pair of shutouts. He led the NL in ERA five straight seasons from 1962-66, was the strikeouts leader four times and was tops in wins on three occasions with totals of 27, 26 and 25. In addition, Koufax pitched an NL-record four no-hitters, including a perfect game in 1965, and set the National League single-season mark with 382 strikeouts in 1965. He was inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1972.

In 10 seasons with the Brooklyn Dodgers (1948-57), Campy was a force both at the plate and behind the plate. The catcher played on five pennant-winning clubs, including the World Champions of 1955. That season, the eight-time All-Star became a three-time National League Most Valuable Player award winner after collecting 32 home runs and 107 RBI. He also garnered MVP honors in 1951 and 1953, when he led the league with a Brooklyn-record 142 RBI to go with a career-high 41 home runs. Jack Roosevelt Robinson made a historic entrance into Major League Baseball in 1947 as the first African-American player in the history of the game. His outstanding debut season netted him the inaugural Rookie of the Year award, which now bears his name, and spring-boarded him to a stellar 10-season career in which he was part of six Brooklyn Dodger pennant-winners, among them the World Championship club of 1955. In 1949, the six-time all-star won the National League batting title (.342) en route to earning MVP honors. Robinson, a first baseman as a rookie, starred as a second baseman for the next five seasons, before moving on to play third base and the outfield. He was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 1962.

One of the game's fiercest competitors, the hard-throwing right-hander pitched 14 seasons (1956-69) for the Brooklyn and Los Angeles Dodgers, ranking second on the franchise career list in wins (209), games pitched (518), strikeouts (2,486), innings pitched (3,432.1) and shutouts (49). The NL strikeout leader in 1959 and 1960, Big D earned the leagues' Cy Young Award in 1962, when he won 25 and topped the league in strikeouts for a third time. A member of three World Championship clubs (1959, 1963 and 1965) and two other pennant winners (1956 and 1966), he set a then-Major League record in 1968, tossing 58.2 consecutive scoreless innings, including a record six straight shutouts. Drysdale gained induction into the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1984.

On Oct. 9, 2003, the 100th Anniversary of former Dodger owner and Hall of Famer Walter O'Malley's birth, a website was created to honor and salute the extraordinary life and achievements of the former Dodger President, who is widely regarded as one of Major League Baseball's most influential leaders and visionaries during his 37 years in the game. O'Malley was elected to the National Baseball Hall of Fame by the Veterans Committee on Dec. 3, 2007 and was inducted during ceremonies on July 27, 2008. On July 9, 2008, the Los Angeles Coliseum Commission unveiled a bronze plaque honoring Walter O'Malley in its "Coliseum Court of Honor" at the Coliseum's peristyle end. It was only the 55th plaque that the Coliseum Commission has awarded to those "that have had a definite impact upon the history, glory and growth of the Coliseum." As one of the Internet's largest biographical sites, walteromalley.com offers a rich multimedia experience, with more than

1,500 pages. It includes extensive background on O'Malley; a history of Dodger Stadium (which he privately built and financed in 1962) and the Dodger franchise; a section dedicated to Dodgertown and Holman Stadium, which he also built; historic documents dating back to the 1940s; and a collection of rare photos, cartoons, memorabilia and video & audio clips. The site has received multiple honors from the Web Marketing Association in the "Sports" category in its "WebAward" global competition.

Dodger Stadium is known throughout the world for its breathtaking views of Downtown Los Angeles, the San Gabriel Mountains and the Elysian Hills.



DODGER STADIUM

Dodger Stadium has been the home of unique and special moments, Hall of Famers and World Champions. From no-hitters to Nomo-mania, Most Valuable Players and Cy Young Award winners to World Series victories, Dodger Stadium has a rich history that places it among the truly great venues in sports history. With musical extravaganzas that have included rock, pop and opera royalty, a papal visit and unique events such as motorcycle racing and monster truck events, Dodger Stadium is also among the great entertainment destinations in the country. It is the third oldest continually used park in Major League Baseball and stands as one of the most unique and picturesque settings in sports, carved as it is into the hillside of Chavez Ravine overlooking downtown LA to the south and the San Gabriel mountains to the north.



Through the years, Dodger Stadium has seen legendary moments, such as Sandy Koufax's perfect game in 1965, the rise of Fernandomania in 1981, Kirk Gibson's walk-off home run in Game 1 of the 1988 World Series (one of 20 World Series games), the 1980 All-Star Game, the 1984 Olympic Games baseball competition, the 2009 World Baseball Classic Final and events such as a Mass conducted by Pope John Paul II and concerts by the biggest names in the business like The Beatles, Michael Jackson and U2.

One of the true cathedrals of baseball, Dodger Stadium has hosted more than 147 million fans since it opened its doors in 1962. The club topped the 3.85 million mark in 2007, which stands as the all-time franchise record.

The ballpark's rich history began with Dodger President Walter O'Malley's foresight five decades ago. In 1957, O'Malley lobbied for a new stadium to be built for his Brooklyn club, but when a deal could not be reached, the Dodgers made the unprecedented move to California. In September of that year, the city of Los Angeles agreed to give 300 acres of land to the Dodgers in exchange for the deed to Wrigley Field in Los Angeles and their commitment to construct a 50,000-seat stadium. While Dodger Stadium was being built, the Dodgers played at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum through 1961, before the true Opening Day – April 10, 1962 – when the Dodgers finally played in their new home before 52,564 fans. The 56,000-seat Dodger Stadium, the first privately financed ballpark since Yankee Stadium in 1923, was designed by O'Malley and architect Emil Praeger. It has parking for 16,000 automobiles on 21 terraced lots adjacent to the same elevations as the six different seating levels.

Dodger Stadium has seen improvements in the past from the addition of suites to new scoreboards

and a renovation of the field level. Now in its 52nd season, Dodger Stadium is undergoing its most ambitious improvements to date including both visible changes and behind the scenes upgrades to the aging infrastructure. HD video screens and a new sound system, more spacious concourses, restrooms and concessions and expanded and renovated clubhouse and a state-of-the-art WiFi network will help evolve one of Los Angeles' best-known landmarks into a technologically advanced, fan-friendly entertainment venue. Many of the architectural touches that make Dodger Stadium unique are repeated

in the new additions, inspired by exploring the venue as well as researching the original, well kept, Walter O'Malley archives.

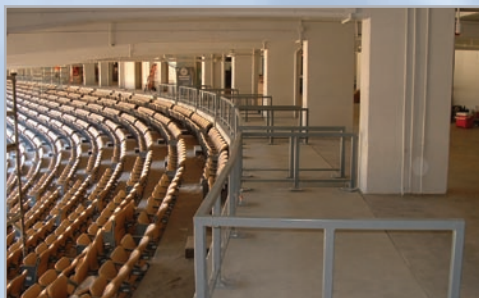
Since opening its gates, Dodger Stadium has hosted eight World Series and the Dodgers have won four World Championships (1963, 1965, 1981 and 1988), eight NL pennants (1963, 1965, 1966, 1974, 1977, 1978, 1981, 1988), 11 NL Western Division crowns (1974, 1977, 1978, 1981, 1983, 1985, 1988, 1995, 2004, 2008, 2009) and two NL Wild Card berths (1996, 2006). The stadium has also hosted 3,939 regular-season games, with the Dodgers posting a 2,224-1,715 (.565) record during that time.

Dodger Stadium continues to be a major part of the history and tradition of the Dodgers. It is the home of one of baseball's most storied franchises, a destination for a worldwide fan base and a monument for a bustling, multicultural city. For 51 years, Dodger Stadium has been a home for a team and a community. Its history lives on.

WHAT'S NEW

Prior to the 2013 season, the Dodgers launched a series of stadium improvements designed to create ways to enhance the experience for fans and upgrading the facility to the 21st century. Upgrades include new High Definition video boards in left and right field which restore the original hexagonal shape of the original 1962 boards; a new sound system for the seating bowl, a state-of-the-art Wi-Fi network powered by new electrical service; wider concourses on all levels with standing room areas with views of the playing field; expanded and renovated restrooms including family restrooms and fan assistance centers; food service enhancements and two new team stores; new entry plazas at the Reserve and Top Deck; kids play areas on the Reserve level; a new home team clubhouse; expanded and enhanced training/conditioning areas; and new batting cages for both the home and visitor clubhouses. The Dodgers have also made a conscious effort to display the rich history of the team, painting murals on the concourses, displaying exhibits honoring the players whose numbers are retired, the Cy Young award winners, MVP awards and the team's Gold Glove awards. These areas will also be on the daily tours of Dodger Stadium for fans.

The new video screens will be the first 10mm 1080p light emitting diode (LED) displays in Major League Baseball. The new scoreboards are significantly percent larger than the previous boards, providing the capability for a greater amount of video content and statistical information than ever before. Driven by a new high-definition broadcast quality control room, the scoreboards will feature the latest outdoor display technologies. The original distinctive hexagonal shape returns to both boards.

HISTORY

- The first game in Dodger Stadium history was held on April 10, 1962. Left-hander Johnny Podres made the start against the Cincinnati Reds. Kay O'Malley, wife of Dodger President Walter O'Malley, threw out the ceremonial first pitch to catcher John Roseboro.
- Hall of Famer Willie Stargell of the Pittsburgh Pirates is the only player to twice hit a ball out of Dodger Stadium (Aug. 5, 1969 and May 8, 1973). Mike Piazza is the only Dodger to clear the roof (Sept. 21, 1997).
- Of the six Dodger World Series championships, the only title clinched on their home field was 1963 when Los Angeles swept the New York Yankees, capped by a 2-1 victory in Game 4. The other clinching sites were Yankee Stadium (1955 and 1981), Chicago's Comiskey Park (1959), Minnesota's Metropolitan Stadium (1965) and the Oakland-Alameda County Coliseum (1988).
- The first three uniform numbers retired by the Dodgers were Hall of Famers Sandy Koufax (32), Roy Campanella (39) and Jackie Robinson (42) during Oldtimers Day ceremonies in 1972. Other retired numbers honor Pee Wee Reese (1), Tommy Lasorda (2), Duke Snider (4), Jim Gilliam (19), Don Sutton (20), Walter Alston (24) and Don Drysdale (53).
- In 1978, the Dodgers became the first team in Major League history to draw more than three million fans in one season (3,347,845). The 2012 season marked the 40th consecutive season the Dodgers drew more than two million fans at Dodger Stadium and the 46th time overall, the most by any Major League team.
- The only All-Star Game in Dodger Stadium history was the 1980 Mid-Summer Classic, won by the National League, 4-2.
- The only perfect game in Dodger history was pitched by Sandy Koufax at Dodger Stadium in a 1-0 victory against the Chicago Cubs on Sept. 9, 1965.
- The first Dodger to hit three home runs in a game at Dodger Stadium was Shawn Green on Aug. 15, 2001.
- The only Dodger to hit for the cycle at Dodger Stadium was Orlando Hudson on April 13, 2009.
- Right-hander Ramon Martinez holds the Dodger Stadium single-game record with 18 strikeouts against the Atlanta Braves on June 4, 1990.
- The Dodgers in 2005 were honored by the Guinness Book of World Records as having the "Highest Cumulative Attendance for a Baseball Franchise" dating back to 1901.
- In 1978, Dodger Stadium became the first ballpark to host more than three million fans in a season when the Dodgers drew 3,347,845 in attendance. Following another three million in attendance in 1980, the Dodgers set the all-time Major League season attendance record in 1982, drawing 3,608,881 fans. Twenty-four years later, the Dodgers broke the franchise mark for paid attendance in 2006, as their total topped the National League for the third consecutive season.
- When the Dodgers hosted Game 1 of the NLCS against the Phillies in 2009, Dodger Stadium became the No. 1 site for playoff games in National League history, surpassing the old Busch Stadium with 107 postseason contests. Dodger Stadium ranks third overall, behind just the Old Yankee Stadium (322) and Fenway Park (146). The stadium has also hosted 41 League Championship Series games, which ranks fourth in baseball history.
- The Dodgers went over the three million mark in attendance for the 26th time in franchise history in 2012, which is a Major League record, finishing the season with an attendance mark of 3,324,246 – the third highest in the NL.
- The all-time attendance mark at Dodger Stadium stands at 147,150,466.

UNIQUE EVENTS

- Pope John Paul II celebrated a Mass at Dodger Stadium on Sept. 16, 1987. The event drew a stadium-record crowd of 63,000 (pictured right).

- Entertainers to perform at Dodger Stadium include: The Rolling Stones, The Beatles, KISS, Madonna, The Bee Gees, Elton John, Simon and Garfunkel, Michael Jackson, David Bowie, Genesis, Eric Clapton, U2, the Dave Matthews Band, Bruce Springsteen and The Three Tenors.
- The Harlem Globetrotters played an exhibition game at Dodger Stadium on Feb. 4, 1964. The basketball court was placed on the infield.
- In 1966, Elvis Presley filmed a race-car scene at Dodger Stadium for the movie "Spinout."

INTERNATIONAL

- Dodger Stadium played host to the eight-team 1984 Olympic Baseball tournament; the opening ceremonies of the 1991 United States Olympic Festival and the finals of the 2009 World Baseball Classic.
- In 1966, the Dodgers received a 10-foot-tall stone lantern gift from Japanese Hall of Famer Sotaro Suzuki as a token of friendship between the Dodgers and Japan. The Dodgers rededicated the stone lantern in 2003 and maintain it and the surrounding Japanese garden, located in the hills above parking lot 6.

ORIGINAL CONSTRUCTION

- Elevations at "Chavez Ravine" ranged from 400 feet to 700 feet above sea level. More than 8 million cubic yards of earth was moved to reshape the area.
- Dodger Stadium was the first privately financed stadium since Yankee Stadium, built by a brewery in 1923.
- The Dodgers played at the Los Angeles Coliseum from 1958-61 and groundbreaking ceremonies for the original Dodger Stadium construction were held on Sept. 17, 1959.
- There were more than 25,000 separate pieces of precast concrete used to build the original Dodger Stadium. Each piece of concrete was marked and catalogued.

- The original dugout level seats at Dodger Stadium were inspired by a similar layout of dugout seats at Korakuen Stadium, where the Dodgers played during their 1956 Japan goodwill tour. These seats have since been replaced by the Dugout Seats and the Baseline Seats

- Dodger Stadium's restrooms and concessions are constructed of a uniquely shaped concrete block providing a decorative pattern to the walls. Precast panels by artists adorn the landscaped berms separating each level of the stadium.

- Dodger Stadium was designed so that each of the nine levels of the park has entries at grade as the hillside rises around the structure. The engineers used the terrain of the site to allow access directly from each level without requiring fans to use stairs or an elevator. Parking is located so that it too has access to each level

- The original color scheme of Dodger Stadium, which is evident in the seats today, is a result of the study of popular colors in the 1960's, reflective of the California spirit. Originally, the seats, parking signage and tickets on each level were all color coded.
- The distinctive inverted precast panels of the Top Deck and the zig-zag roof of the pavilions are unique architectural features.

On May 7, 1959, the Dodgers and Yankees played before an exhibition crowd of 93,103 at the Los Angeles Coliseum in honor of Roy Campanella, the highest single-game attendance mark for a Major League game.

TOP 60 NATIONAL LEAGUE ATTENDANCE MARKS

The 2012 season marked the 40th consecutive season the Dodgers drew more than two million fans at Dodger Stadium (1973-2012) and the 46th time overall – the most by any Major League team.

The Dodgers established a then-Major League record when they drew 3,608,881 fans in 1982. The NL implemented a new attendance counting system in 1993, and the Rockies recorded the largest single-season total in Major League history with 4,483,350 fans in their first Major League season. Through the 1992 season, attendance figures in the NL were counted by the number of fans in attendance and the AL counted total tickets sold. Both leagues currently count total tickets sold.

The Dodgers hold the Major League record for drawing more than three million fans on 26 occasions. They became the first team to play before five million fans in a season – combining home and road totals – in 1978 when the total reached 5,494,204 and have since played in front of more than five million 23 more times.

The Dodgers have averaged more than 2.8 million fans a season since coming to Los Angeles in 1958. The Dodgers hit the million mark in 22 dates in 1981, the two million mark in 46 dates in 1982 and the three million mark in 67 dates in 1982 – all three established then-Major League records. DODGER STADIUM RAINOUTS

The 17th rainout in Dodger Stadium history occurred on April 17, 2000, marking the last rainout and the only Dodger home game to be rained out during the last 12 seasons. In 1999 the Dodgers also had one home game washed out (April 11, 1999), ending the club's then record 856 consecutive-game streak without a rainout. Prior to that, the Dodgers' last home rainout was three consecutive games against the San Diego Padres April 19-21, 1988. Prior to 1976, the Dodgers were rained out only once – against the St. Louis Cardinals on April 21, 1967. The 1967 rainout ended a streak of 737 consecutive games at Dodger Stadium without a postponement. The second home rainout, on April 12, 1976, stopped a string of 724 straight games. Currently, Dodger Stadium has gone 1050 games without a rainout, which is the all-time club record. The mark was established July 22, 2010.

DODGER STADIUM GROUND RULES

LEFT-AND-RIGHT-FIELD FOUL POLES - The ball is IN PLAY when it hits below railing (white section of foul pole). Any ball hitting foul pole above railing (yellow section) is considered a HOME RUN.

DUGOUTS - The television wells, photography wells and dugouts are considered bench. Any ball that strikes any forward facing dugouts is considered IN PLAY.

BACKSTOP SCREEN - Any ball striking guide wire supporting backstop is considered OUT OF PLAY.

CAMELBACK RANCH - GLENDALE

A true oasis of baseball, Sonoran desert-inspired Camelback Ranch - Glendale (CR-G) offers fans more than the convenience and comfort of the largest stadium in the Cactus League. The site also features unique grounds that include picturesque walking trails, immaculate landscaping and an orange grove. The Dodgers and White Sox training grounds are separated by a flowing water feature that cuts across the five-acre lake.

For more than 60 years, the Dodgers had hosted Spring Training in Vero Beach, FL, where the team's Dodgertown complex became known around the world as one of the most family-friendly venues in all of sports. But a move just five-plus hours by car and one hour by air from the generations of families in Southern California that bled "Dodger Blue" seemed to be the perfect match.

One of the major focuses in the design of Camelback Ranch - Glendale was to bring a little of Vero Beach to Glendale. Fans receive close access to players and in some areas they are divided by a simple yellow cord. This sort of intimacy is a direct connection to how fans interacted with Dodger players for decades at Vero Beach.

In addition to serving as the Spring Training home of the Dodgers and White Sox, the CR-G campus has become home for all Dodger minor league operations throughout the year, including

the franchise's team in the Rookie-level Arizona League and a Fall Instructional League team.

SPRING TRAINING

ATTENDANCE

- In the Dodgers' first season at CR-G, the franchise established a record with a cumulative attendance of 131,134 in their 14-game season at Camelback Ranch with an average attendance of 9,367, which also established a new franchise mark.
- Largest crowd: 13,655, March 17, 2012, Giants vs. Dodgers (Cactus League record).
- Camelback Ranch-Glendale (CR-G) has hosted six of the 10 largest crowds in Cactus League history with the Dodgers holding four of the top five all-time single-game attendance marks:

CAMPUS

- CR-G rests on land owned by the City of Glendale but within the limits of the City of Phoenix. Glendale originally purchased the land to protect Glendale Municipal Airport from encroachment.
- More than 40,000 tons of sand, nearly 10,000 tons of infield clay, more than 1,100 irrigation heads and 1.3 million square feet of Bermuda sod were used to build the stadium playing field, 12 practice diamonds and three practice infields.
- The five-acre water feature (connected lake, river and pond) divides the campus into east (Dodgers) and west (White Sox) and provides irrigation for fields and landscaping plus aesthetic enhancement. It utilizes reclaimed water from the City of Glendale water treatment plant. The water system is "green." Its run-off returns to the natural water table under the dry bed of the Aqua Fria River to the west.
- An orange grove – a touch of Dodgertown, Southern California, and Arizona – is located beyond the left-field wall of replica Dodger Stadium. Grapefruit and lemon trees also adorn the campus.
- Landscaping includes approximately 5,000 plants and trees.
- Site work (mass excavation) began on Nov. 5, 2007. Building construction started in April 2008. The complex was completed in approximately 13 months. More than 5,000 workers contributed to the effort. Local workers comprised 95–98 percent of the work force.

STADIUM

- The stadium, largest in the Cactus League, offers more than 10,300 fixed seats and grass seating for 3,000-plus fans. There also are four large suites, eight mini-suites, a press box, a suite-level Legends Deck and an outfield All-You-Can-Eat area that sits beyond left field.
- Architects (HKS, Dallas) designed CR-G with sweeps and angles to avoid a big-box look. Natural materials – real stone veneer, architectural metal panels (“rusty panels” or aged CORE 10) and three-tone faux painting – were used for external finishes to blend into the desert surroundings. Caramel-colored stadium seats and stone retaining walls further the natural look. The Gabion retaining walls of stone entrapped in wire mesh required five to 10 trucks per day to haul rock onto the site for months to provide material to build the walls.
- Most fans enter CR-G’s stadium through the main gates in center field (Center Field Courtyard) after walking through the campus from the parking lots.
- The hitters’ background in center field is framed by Afghan pine trees.
- The stadium playing field is 12 feet below grade, stadium seating is elevated 12 feet above grade and the surrounding stadium buildings are elevated around the main field for unobstructed views.
- Prior to the 2012 season, a shading project was completed that added an additional 800 shaded seats to the stadium.

TEAM FACILITIES

- The Dodgers separate their Major and minor leaguers in two buildings beyond the stadium’s left-field wall; one building beyond the right-field wall combines White Sox Major and minor leaguers.
- The baseball buildings contain more than 118,000 square feet of Major and minor league clubhouse space.
- Two of the 12 practice fields (four Major League, eight minor league) replicate the Dodger and White Sox home ballparks with exact dimensions of Dodger Stadium and U.S. Cellular Field, respectively. Three additional infields also were created.

VERO BEACH, FL (1948-2008)

Prior to the move to Camelback Ranch - Glendale, the Dodgers' 50th anniversary on the West Coast in 2008 coincided with the 60th anniversary of Dodgertown, their Vero Beach, FL Spring Training home from 1948-2008.

The Dodgertown complex was home to some of the most memorable players and personalities of both Brooklyn and Los Angeles lore. The personalized street signs within the complex honored such Hall of Famers as Jackie Robinson, Sandy Koufax, Roy Campanella, Duke Snider, Pee Wee Reese, Don Drysdale, Tommy Lasorda, Walter Alston, Don Sutton, Vin Scully and Jaime Jarrín.

Prior to Vero Beach, the Dodgers spent their Spring Trainings at various camps from 1901-48 in North Carolina, South Carolina, Arkansas, Georgia, Louisiana, New York, Cuba and the Dominican Republic.

The Dodgers first set up camp at the invitation of a local businessman, Bud Holman, after the city needed a tenant to occupy a former World War II Naval Air Station. The camp became the most unique baseball training facility in the country, a destination for international baseball visitors. The complex also grew into six practice fields, four indoor batting and pitching tunnels, a pool, tennis court and more.

Dodgertown wasn't the product of a single blueprint, rather its roots came from the various personalities and ambitions of those with the ballclub and local community.

Hall of Fame executive Branch Rickey conceived the idea of the farm system during his tenure with the St. Louis Cardinals in the late 1930s. Rickey joined the Dodgers in 1942 as team president and kept his scouts looking for talent, despite a depleted supply of ballplayers due to World War II. Rickey knew the war wouldn't last forever.

Meanwhile, the city of Vero Beach was looking for a tenant for the naval air station that the United States built during World War II. One of the city's most dynamic civic leaders and an influential businessman would make the best of an otherwise bleak situation.

Holman opened a Cadillac dealership in 1923 and became interested in aviation. In 1932, he convinced Eastern Airlines to make Vero Beach a fueling stop. By 1935, Vero Beach was the smallest U.S. city to have direct airmail service.

During World War II, the airport and naval base in Vero Beach turned the tiny town into a military community. Holman didn't know much about baseball, but when the idea of inviting a Major League franchise came along, Holman reportedly asked his wife which was the best team to invite. His wife replied, "The Dodgers," and Holman contacted Rickey at the Dodger offices in Brooklyn, New York. Holman knew Rickey had 26 minor league teams and wanted a chance to prove Vero Beach could host a full-scale training camp.

Rickey dispatched Buzzie Bavasi, the general manager of the Dodgers' Nashua, New Hampshire farm team. Bavasi was supposed to visit other potential sites at Ft. Pierce and Stuart, but never had a chance. Holman's hospitality during a party on Nov. 2, 1947 convinced Bavasi the facilities already were in place, especially because of Vero Beach's airport.

The original concept of Dodgertown was to provide a classroom environment for players and coaches with enough land so personnel could discuss baseball at any point in the day. Because there were so many Dodger minor league ballclubs, many affiliates and working groups were assigned different colored uniforms to help keep drills and other daily itineraries on schedule.

In a 1954 book collaborated with team photographer Barney Stein, "The Rhubarb Patch - The Story of the Modern Brooklyn Dodgers," broadcaster Red Barber recalled Rickey's fascination with the potential layout of a training camp.

"Rickey dreamed about having everybody in one central place where he could see everything and everyone," Barber wrote. "Tremendous planning was involved, entailing constant staff work. Ballgames were being played on diamonds all day long. Instruction work kept the batting tees and cages busy, the sliding pits filled. ... Rickey dreamed that by force teaching, training and close observation, a new player might be ready for the Majors in a year's less time than otherwise."

The Dodgers brought their minor league operations to Vero Beach in 1948 and in 1952 Dodger President Walter O'Malley and New York-based architect Emil Praeger decided to build an intimate-style stadium with unobstructed views. The stadium was built by excavating 20,000 cubic yards of sand, marl and muck. The excavation was turned into a two-acre fishing lake and stocked by the United States Wildlife Service. The fill formed into mounds, which were compacted and rolled. Four-inch reinforced concrete was poured over the mounds to make the stands.

"Holman Stadium," named by O'Malley after Bud Holman, was officially dedicated on March 11, 1953. An overflow crowd of 5,532 watched the Brooklyn Dodgers defeat the Philadelphia Athletics, 4-2.



With the passage of time, the Dodgertown property gradually developed and maintained signature attractions such as a strings area for pitchers, the street signs named after Hall of Fame players and managers and "Campy's Corner," an area outside the dining room where Hall of Fame catcher Roy Campanella held court with young players following the 1958 auto accident that left him paralyzed. There were other special rooms named in honor of longtime Los Angeles-area sportswriter Bob Hunter, photographer Herb Scharfman, trainer Bill Buhler, and Dodger team physician Dr. Frank Jobe.

Beginning in 1983, Dodgertown hosted the twice-yearly Dodgers Adult Baseball Camps, featuring instruction from Dodger stars of the past.

During their final Grapefruit League season in 2008, the Dodgers honored many of their heroes of the past as well as several longtime Dodgertown employees who left an indelible mark on the franchise over the past 60 years. On March 17, 2008, the final Dodger Spring Training contest took place at Holman Stadium. The Dodgers lost to the Astros that afternoon, but the lasting image of current players forming a "bat tunnel" and saluting Dodger Hall of Fame Manager Tommy Lasorda as he walked off the field for the final time in Vero Beach will stick with any fan of baseball, the Dodgers, Spring Training or Dodgertown for a lifetime to come. When Lasorda exited, the music coming from the PA system was "Simply the Best," and could have just as easily been meant to describe the 61 seasons of Dodgertown in Vero Beach, FL.

DODGERTOWN – A HOME TO THE WORLD

International visits became a tradition at Dodgertown. The Dodgers hosted professional teams from Asia on 13 different occasions. Most recently the Osaka Buffaloes of the Japanese League trained at Dodgertown in the fall of 2003 for the second consecutive year. The Samsung Lions professional baseball team from Taegu, Korea trained at Dodgertown in 1985, 1992, 1993, 1996, and 1997. In addition to the Lions' five visits, the Tokyo Giants trained in Vero Beach in 1961, 1967, 1971, 1975, and 1981. The Chunichi Dragons from Nagoya, Japan trained at Dodgertown in 1988. The Sinon Bulls became the first Taiwanese team to train at Dodgertown when they began a week of workouts in February 1999.

SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO THE GM – PAT CORRALES



Pat Corrales, a former Major League player, manager and bench coach and a veteran of 53 years in baseball, was hired by the Dodgers on Nov. 5, 2012 as special assistant to General Manager Ned Colletti.

After his playing career, Corrales managed for nine years in the big leagues with the Texas Rangers (1978-80), Philadelphia Phillies (1982-83) and Cleveland Indians (1983-87). He was the first major league manager of Mexican-American descent and became only the fourth manager to manage in both leagues in the same season (Philadelphia and Cleveland in 1983).

When he was hired in 1990, former Atlanta Braves' manager Bobby Cox tabbed Corrales to be his bench coach. Corrales coached alongside Cox for nine years, a period that was part of the Braves' reign of 14 consecutive National League East titles. The Los Angeles native joined the Washington Nationals as a bench coach in 2007-08 and returned in mid-season in the same capacity for the Nationals in 2009 and 2011 while also spending time during those years evaluating their minor league system.

Corrales, 71, was a star at Fresno (Calif.) High School and had a nine-year Major League career as a catcher with the Phillies (1964-65), St. Louis Cardinals (1966), Cincinnati Reds (1968-72) and San Diego Padres (1972-73).

SPECIAL ASSISTANT, PRO SCOUTING - BILL MUELLER



Former American League batting champion Bill Mueller enters his eighth season in the Dodger organization and sixth as a Special Assistant. He returned to the front office for the 2008 season after serving as the Dodgers' interim hitting coach during the second half of the 2007 season. In his current capacity, he assists the GM with special projects and player evaluation on the Major and minor league levels.

Mueller, 42, became the fourth-youngest coach in Dodger history in 2007 when he took over the hitting coach duties on June 14. The only coaches younger than him were Mark Cresse (27), Rube Walker (32) and Ron Roenicke (35).

He joined the front office following an 11-year Major League playing career with the Giants, Cubs, Red Sox and Dodgers. He finished his career with a .291 lifetime batting average, 85 home runs and 493 RBI in 11 seasons and was a member of the 2004 World Champion Boston Red Sox.

In 2003, Mueller enjoyed his best season in the Major Leagues, winning the American League batting title and a Silver Slugger Award at third base while setting career highs in average (.326), hits (171), homers (19) and RBI (85).

The Maryland Heights, Missouri native made five postseason appearances, including the 2004 World Series in which he hit .429 (6-for-14), helping the Red Sox sweep the Cardinals in four games. In 1,182 career games in the field, primarily at third base, Mueller compiled a .958 fielding percentage.

Mueller's time with the Dodgers marks his third stint with Colletti, with the first two coming when Colletti was the Assistant General Manager in San Francisco.

Mueller and his wife, Amy, reside in Mesa, Arizona with their children Lexi, Tucker and Dawson.

SPECIAL ASSISTANT, PLAYER PERSONNEL - JOSH BARD



Josh Bard enters his first season in the Dodgers' front office as a Special Assistant, Player Personnel. The switch-hitting catcher had a .254 batting average in 10 seasons in the Major Leagues with Cleveland (2002-05), Boston (2006), San Diego (2006-08), Washington (2009) and Seattle (2010-11). He joined the Dodger organization in 2012 as a back-up catcher for the Isotopes.

The New York native batted a career-high .338 with 40 RBI in 93 games for San Diego in 2006. Bard saw action in the 2006 NLDS series going 1-for-7 in three games.

Originally selected by Colorado in the third round (100th overall) of the 1999 First-Year Player draft, he was a two-time All-American and All-Big 12 selection (1998-99) for Texas Tech. Bard hit .366 with 43 home runs and 232 RBI in three seasons with the Red Raiders and was a member of Team USA in the 2001 Baseball World Cup.

Bard and his wife, Lindsay, have two children, Luke and Hannah.

SPECIAL ASSISTANT, PLAYER PERSONNEL - JUAN CASTRO



Juan Castro begins his third season in the Dodger front office after he was immediately hired by Dodger General Manager Ned Colletti following his retirement as a player on July 10, 2011. In his current capacity, Castro assists all Dodger minor leaguers in defensive development while also evaluating all levels of player development. Castro worked with the Dodgers' prospects during the Winter Development Program the past two offseasons.

The native of Mexico retired in 2011 after 17 years in the Major Leagues, including parts of eight seasons with the Dodgers. Castro hit .229 in 1,103 career games, primarily as a sure-handed shortstop. Castro originally signed with the Dodgers as a non-drafted free agent on June 18, 1991 and spent four full seasons in the Dodger minor league organization, before his Major League debut with the big club on Sept. 2, 1995.

In addition to his career with the Dodgers (1995-99, 2009, 2010, 2011), the infielder also spent time with the Reds (2000-04, 2006-08), Twins (2005-06), Orioles (2008) and Phillies (2010). He finished his career with

a .977 career fielding percentage in 571 games at shortstop, which is tied for 15th all time among players with at least 500 games played at the position.

Castro is one of the most prolific Mexican players in Major League history, ranking fifth among Mexican-born players in games (1,103), at-bats (2,627) and doubles (123) while finishing seventh in home runs (36), runs (253), hits (601) and RBI (234). Castro represented Mexico during the inaugural World Baseball Classic in 2006.

In addition to his glove work at shortstop, Castro owns a .982 career fielding percentage in 251 games at second base and a .954 mark in 264 games at third base.

Castro currently resides in Peoria, AZ with his wife and four children: Juan Jr., Alex, Melissa and Daniel.



SPECIAL ASSISTANT, PLAYER PERSONNEL - AARON SELE

Aaron Sele enters his fifth season in the Dodgers' front office and fourth serving as a Special Assistant. The Minnesota native pitched 15 seasons in the Major Leagues with the Red Sox, Rangers, Mariners, Angels, Dodgers and Mets, compiling a 148-112 record and 4.61 ERA in 404 games.

A two-time American League All-Star, Sele was part of the Angels' 2002 World Championship team and pitched in the postseason four times.

He was one of five Major League pitchers to reach at least 17 wins in each of the three years from 1998-2000, joining Pedro Martinez, Randy Johnson, Greg Maddux and David Wells. The right-hander logged a career-best 19 wins in 1998 and ranked second in the AL in wins and shutouts in 1999 while finishing third in the league with a career-high 186 strikeouts and fourth with a .667 winning percentage.

Sele finished third in BBWAA AL Rookie of Year voting in 1993 and was originally selected by Boston in the first round (23rd overall) of the June 1991 First-Year Player Draft. He was a first-team All-American at Washington State University and was a member of Team USA in the summer of 1990.

Sele and his wife, Jennifer, have four daughters, Katherine, Claire, Caroline and Charlotte.



SPECIAL ASSISTANT, PLAYER PERSONNEL - JOSE VIZCAINO

Jose Vizcaino joined the Dodgers' front office in 2008 after an 18-year big league career that started when he was signed by the Dodgers as a 17-year-old out of San Cristobal in the Dominican Republic. Now in his sixth season as a special assistant, Vizcaino works on special projects in baseball operations and serves as an on-field instructor during Spring Training. He also instructs at the Dodgers' academy in the Dominican Republic, Campo Las Palmas. Two of his key responsibilities are evaluating the players in the Dodgers' minor league system as well as advising General Manager Ned Colletti on Major League acquisitions.

Vizcaino, 44, came up through the Dodgers' farm system in the 1980s. He made his Major League debut on Sept. 10, 1989 as the second-youngest player in the National League that season and also played for Los Angeles in 1990 before moving on to a productive career with the Cubs, Mets, Indians and Giants. Colletti, then with the Cubs in 1990, was instrumental in the trade that brought Vizcaino to Chicago. Vizcaino and Colletti were also together when both were with the Giants.

He returned to the Dodgers in 1998 and played with the club through 2000, when he was traded to the New York Yankees and helped them to a World Championship. Vizcaino played for the Houston Astros from 2001-05 before finishing his career with the Giants and Cardinals in 2006.

The switch-hitting Vizcaino posted a .270 batting average with 36 home runs, 480 runs batted in and 74 stolen bases in parts of 18 seasons in the Majors. He played primarily as a shortstop but appeared at all four infield positions and left field, compiling a .976 lifetime fielding percentage.

Vizcaino appeared in the postseason six times, including the 2005 World Series with the Houston Astros and the 2000 Fall Classic, in which his game-winning single in the 12th inning of Game 1 ended the longest game in World Series history and propelled the Yankees to a title in five games over the Mets.



SENIOR ADVISOR, PLAYER DEVELOPMENT - GENE CLINES

Gene Clines, who enjoyed a 10-year big league playing career from 1970-79, enters his seventh season with Los Angeles and his third season as a Senior Advisor, Player Development.

Clines joined the Dodger organization as the outfield/baserunning coordinator in 2007 and then spent three seasons as the hitting coordinator for the Dodgers' minor league system.

Clines' coaching career is highlighted by 20 years of Major League coaching service with five different franchises (Cubs, Astros, Mariners, Brewers and Giants). Prior to coming to the Dodgers, he spent four seasons in the Cubs' organization from 2003-06, serving two years as first base coach (2003-04) and two as hitting coach (2005-06). He spent six years as San Francisco's hitting and outfield coach from 1997-2002 and also served as the hitting coach with Milwaukee (1994-95), Seattle (1989-92) and Houston (1988). Following his final year as a big league player in 1979, Clines remained with the Cubs as first base coach under manager Bob Kennedy, and remained with the team until 1981.

Clines' playing career was highlighted by three trips to the postseason with the Pirates (1971, 1972, and 1974), including a World Series title in 1971. He had his best season in the Majors with the Pirates in 1972, batting .334 in 107 games.

He attended Contra Costa Junior College in San Pablo, CA.



SENIOR ADVISOR, PLAYER DEVELOPMENT - CHARLIE HOUGH

Charlie Hough begins his third year as a Senior Advisor, Player Development after serving as the Single-A Inland Empire pitching coach from 2007-10 in his second stint as a coach in the Dodger organization. His coaching career began in 1996 as the Dodgers' High-A affiliate pitching coach, a position he held until 1997. He was promoted to the big leagues as the Dodgers' pitching coach and served for two seasons (1998-99). Hough was also the Mets' pitching coach in 2001 and 2002.

The 25-year Major League veteran and former All-Star knuckleballer was drafted by the Dodgers in the eighth round of the 1966 amateur draft and pitched for the Dodgers for 11 seasons (1970-80). The right-hander also pitched for the Rangers (1980-90), White Sox (1991-92) and Marlins (1993-94), compiling a 216-216 career record with 61 saves and a 3.75 ERA.

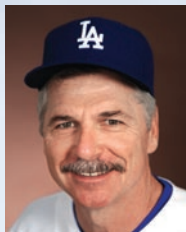


SPECIAL ADVISOR, LATIN AMERICA - RAMON MARTINEZ

Ramon Martinez returns for a fourth season with the Dodger front office and his third as a Senior Advisor, Latin America after playing with the club for 11 seasons from 1988-98.

Martinez posted a 135-88 record with a 3.67 ERA in his 14 Major League seasons with the Dodgers, Red Sox (1999-2000) and Pirates (2001). He was selected to the 1990 National League All-Star Team and twice finished in the top five in NL Cy Young voting (1990 (2nd), 1995 (5th)). He made five Opening Day starts for the Dodgers, ranks seventh on the club's all-time wins list with 123 and is sixth on the club's all-time strikeouts list with 1,312.

FIELD COORDINATOR – BRUCE HINES



Bruce Hines returns for a fourth season as the Dodgers' Minor League Field Coordinator and 29th as a coach/manager.

Hines, 54, spent the 2009 season as the Mariners' third base coach after holding a variety of minor league coaching positions with the Angels including Field Coordinator (2006-08), Infield Instructor (2002-05), Roving Outfield Instructor (2001), Roving Defense Instructor (1988-90, 1998- 2000) and Roving Hitting Instructor (1987). He was also the Angels' First Base Coach in 1991.

Hines has a 278-233 (.544) record in seven seasons as a minor league manager in the Angels' and Athletics' organizations, reaching the postseason with Triple-A Vancouver in 1997 with a first place first-half finish in the Pacific Coast League. He also managed the Rookie-level Arizona Summer League Angels (1995-96) and led the Rookie-level AZL Athletics to back-to-back first place finishes in 1992 and 1993. Hines started his managing career with two seasons at the helm of Single-A Salem in 1985 and 1986.

Selected by the Padres in the 18th round of the 1980 First-Year Player Draft, Hines batted .236 in three minor league seasons in the San Diego and Oakland organizations. His father, Ben Hines, was a Dodger coach from 1985-86 and 1988-93. He graduated from the University of LaVerne in 1980 and resides in Mesa, Arizona with his wife, Wendy.

HITTING COORDINATOR - ERIC OWENS

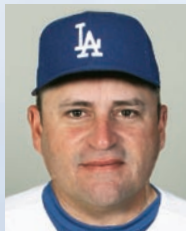


Eric Owens enters his third season with the Dodger organization as hitting coordinator after five seasons coaching in the Angels' minor league system. He served as the Angels' Roving Outfield, Baserunning and Bunting Coordinator in 2009 and 2010 and was the hitting coach with Double-A Arkansas in 2008, when the Travelers won the Texas League championship. Owens began his coaching career with two seasons as the hitting coach with Single-A Cedar Rapids from 2006-07. Under his tutelage, the Kernals led the Midwest League in home runs and stolen bases in 2007.

Owens' Major League playing career spanned nine seasons with the Reds (1995-97), Brewers (1998), Padres (1999-2000), Marlins (2001-02) and Angels (2003). He posted a .264 batting average with 26 home runs, 214 RBI and 126 steals in 806 career games. Owens, 41, was originally selected by the Reds in the fourth round of the 1992 First-Year Player Draft out of Ferrum (VA) College, where he played football and baseball. At Ferrum, he earned first team All-American honors in 1991 and 1992, batting over .400 in each of his three seasons and setting school career records for batting average (.430), stolen bases (68) and triples (18). Along with teammate and future Major League closer Billy Wagner, he led the school to the NCAA Regionals three times.

Born in Danville, VA, he is married (Bridget) with four children (Alyssa, Makayla, Montana and McKenzie) and resides in Phoenix.

PITCHING COORDINATOR – RAFAEL CHAVES



Rafael Chaves returns for a fifth season as the Dodgers' Minor League Pitching Coordinator after serving as a pitching coach in the New York Yankees system in 2008 and in the Seattle Mariners organization for 11 seasons from 1998-2007.

In 2008, Chaves was the pitching coach with the Yankees' Triple-A Scranton/Wilkes-Barre club, which won the International League championship and led the circuit with a 3.67 team ERA.

In the Seattle chain, the Puerto Rico native served as the Major League Pitching Coach for two seasons from 2006-07. He also served in the same capacity with Triple-A Tacoma (2004-05), Double-A San Antonio (2002-03), Single-A San Bernardino (2001), Single-A Wisconsin (2000), Rookie-level Everett (1999) and the AZL Mariners (1998).

OUTFIELD/BASERUNNING COORDINATOR – DAMON MASHORE



Damon Mashore joins the Dodger organization after four seasons coaching in the Angels' minor league system. Mashore served as the interim manager of the Angels' Single-A Inland Empire affiliate last season and was a hitting coach with the organization from 2008-11. He previously managed the Rookie-advanced Missoula Osprey (D-backs) of the Pioneer League in 2007.

Mashore, 42, played 12 professional seasons as an outfielder with the Athletics, Angels, Giants, D-backs and Cardinals organizations, including three Major League seasons from 1996-98 with Oakland and Anaheim. The son of former big league outfielder Clyde Mashore was selected by Oakland in the ninth round of the 1991 draft out of the University of Arizona.

INFIELD COORDINATOR – PAT LISTACH



Pat Listach enters his first season as Dodgers' Infield Coordinator after spending the last two seasons on the Chicago Cubs' coaching staff as their third base coach (2012) and bench coach (2011).

Listach brings 13 years of coaching experience to the Dodgers in both the Chicago (2000-08, 2011-12) and Washington (2009-10) organizations. He was the Nationals' third base coach in 2009 and 2010. He served six years as hitting coach in the Chicago system, beginning with Single-A Lansing in 2000 and Triple-A Iowa from 2001-2005. He managed Triple-A Iowa in 2002 and 2008 and Double-A West Tennessee in 2006 and Tennessee in 2007. From 2006-08, Listach led two clubs to postseason appearances in three years, guiding Double-A Tennessee in 2007 and Triple-A Iowa in 2008 to the playoffs. He was named the Pacific Coast League Manager of the Year in 2008.

Listach, 45, played in six Major League seasons with the Brewers (1992-96) and Astros (1997), batting .251 with 116 steals, five homers and 143 RBI in 503 big league games, primarily as a shortstop. He was named the 1992 American

League Rookie of the Year.

The Spring, Texas resident lives with his wife, Cari, and children Mariah, Hollie, Patrick, Blaine, Catrina and Jacob.



CATCHING COORDINATOR – TRAVIS BARBARY

A former Dodger big league bullpen catcher and minor league player, coach and manager, Travis Barbary enters his seventh season as the Minor League Catching Coordinator and 19th year in the Dodger organization overall.

After starting his post-playing career by serving as Catching and Pitching Coach for the Cotuit Kettleers of the Cape Cod League in 1995, Barbary was a coach for the Dodgers' Single-A Savannah affiliate in 1996 and 1997. The following season he joined the Major League club as bullpen catcher, a position he held through the 2001 campaign. In 2002, Barbary was named hitting coach for Single-A South Georgia with his Waves team tying for second in the South Atlantic League with a .269 team batting average. He made his managerial debut in 2003 and guided Rookie-advanced Ogden to a berth in the Pioneer League playoffs. He also managed the Single-A Columbus Catfish in 2006 following his two seasons at the helm in Ogden.

Barbary, a native of Anderson, SC, caught two seasons (1992-93) at the University of Virginia. Prior to that, he played at Spartanburg (SC) Methodist Junior College, where he was an all-conference catcher.

His father, Eddie Barbary, played for two seasons from 1967-68 in the Pittsburgh organization and his grandfather, Red Barbary, played in one Major League game, appearing as a pinch-hitter for the Washington Senators in 1943.



COORDINATOR OF ARIZONA INSTRUCTION – JOHN SHOEMAKER

John Shoemaker enters his third season in the role of Coordinator of Arizona Instruction (also: 2009-10), overseeing the year-round minor league operation of the facility, after spending the last two seasons as the manager of Single-A Great Lakes. Shoemaker has been a player, coach, manager or coordinator in the Dodger organization since 1977, compiling a 1258-1230 managerial record in that time and winning Southern League championships with Double-A Jacksonville in 2001 (co-champions) and 2005 and also a Single-A South Atlantic League crown with Savannah in 1996.

Shoemaker started his coaching career as the hitting coach at Single-A Vero Beach for six seasons (1981-86) before starting his managerial career with Vero Beach in 1987. Shoemaker has managed at every level during his 19 years as a minor league skipper, including one season at Triple-A with Las Vegas (2003), eight seasons at Double-A with San Antonio (1989-91) and Jacksonville (2001, 2005-08), eight seasons at Single-A with Vero Beach (1987-88, 1997-98, 2000), Yakima (1993), Savannah (1995) and Great Lakes (2011) and two seasons in rookie ball with the GCL Dodgers (1992) and Great Falls (1995).

Shoemaker played four seasons of minor league ball with the Dodgers from 1977-1980 after being selected by the club in the 35th round of the 1977 draft. The Chillicothe, OH native played baseball and was captain of the basketball team at Miami (OH) University. His basketball talents earned him a sixth-round selection by the Chicago Bulls in the 1978 NBA draft.



ASSISTANT HITTING COORDINATOR – TODD TAKAYOSHI

Takayoshi, 42, begins his first year in the Dodgers' organization. He spent the past 11 seasons as a coach in the Angels' organization, including the last six years as the Angels' roving hitting coordinator, while serving in a dual role in 2011, when he was also the club's field coordinator.

Takayoshi was a two-time batting champion as a left-handed hitting catcher during his four years of affiliated baseball in the Angels' farm system from 1993-96.



ASSISTANT PITCHING COORDINATOR – RICHARD KNAPP

Knapp, 51, joins the Dodger organization and brings more than 30 years of professional baseball experience. He was the Royals' minor league pitching coordinator last season after serving as the pitching coach of the Detroit Tigers from 2009-2011. Knapp pitched in five minor league seasons from 1983-87 in the Padres and Rangers organizations. Prior to his time with the Tigers, Knapp served as a minor league pitching coach and coordinator for 13 seasons with the Minnesota Twins. He also served the Texas Rangers as pitching coach and a player at every minor league level for 13 seasons. Knapp has coached winter ball for the Aragua Tigers and La Guaira Tiburones of the Venezuelan League and has been a pitching coach in the Arizona Fall League.

He graduated with a degree in sociology from Virginia Tech. He resides in Port Charlotte, Fla., with his wife, Sharon. The couple has a daughter, Leah, and a son, Ricky, who currently pitches at Florida Gulf Coast University.



DIRECTOR, INTERNATIONAL AND MINOR LEAGUE OPERATIONS – JOSEPH REAVES

Joseph A. Reeves has been active in baseball and international affairs for more than a quarter century. In his current role, he heads all international business operations for the Dodgers and the club's relationships with its minor league partners. He was instrumental in the planning and execution of the Dodgers' 2010 Taiwan series against the Chinese Professional Baseball League All-Stars and the club's historic trip to Beijing during 2008 Spring Training. He also served as the Dodgers' point person for the 2009 World Baseball Classic and helped the club establish a presence in Venezuela in 2009 with an agreement with La Guaira Tiburones. As the main liaison between the Dodgers and the organization's five minor league affiliates, Reeves created the "Route of Champions" program, which fosters partnership, communication and a two-way path to excellence.

Before joining the Dodgers in 2007, Reeves was a foreign correspondent for United Press International and the Chicago Tribune, based in Beijing, Hong Kong, Manila, London, Vienna, Warsaw and Rome. From 1992-95 he was a beat writer covering the Chicago Cubs for the Tribune and wrote his first book, "Warsaw to Wrigley: a Foreign Correspondent's Tale of Coming Home from Communism to the Cubs," which was runner-up for the Casey Award as Best Baseball Book of the Year. In 1995, Reeves returned to Hong Kong to work on a Master of Philosophy Degree at the University of Hong Kong. His thesis on the history of baseball in Asia was published in hardback and paperback under the title: "Taking in a Game." It won national research awards from the Society for American Baseball Research, The Sporting News and the University of Nebraska.

Reeves received his undergraduate degree in journalism from Louisiana State University and has a PhD in Educational Leadership and Policy Studies from Arizona State University.

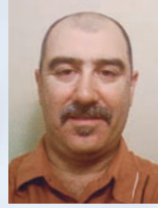

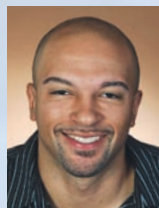

BROCK, HIATT SHARE MINOR LEAGUE HOME RUN MARK

In 1982, while helping Triple-A Albuquerque win the Pacific Coast League championship, first baseman Greg Brock slugged 44 home runs to set a new single-season record for a Dodger minor leaguer. In 2001, Phil Hiatt matched Brock's mark, with his 44 round-trippers for Triple-A Las Vegas leading all of minor league baseball. Hiatt, who was honored as the 2001 PCL Most Valuable Player, returned to the 51s in 2002 and hit 23 more dingers to set a then-Las Vegas franchise mark with 67 career homers, a mark since broken by Chin-Feng Chen.

MANAGER – LORENZO BUNDY

Lorenzo Bundy enters his third season as Triple-A Albuquerque manager and his sixth season as a minor league manager in the Dodger organization. Bundy previously managed Triple-A Las Vegas from 2007-08 and the Rookie-level AZL Dodgers in 2010.

In 2012, Bundy guided the Isotopes to an 80-64 record, the most wins in franchise history, and also took home the Pacific Coast League Manager of the Year Award. Overall, Bundy has accumulated a 678-706 record in 11 seasons as a minor league manager in the Montreal (1990-94), Florida (1997) and Los Angeles organizations. He guided Bradenton to the Gulf Coast League Southern Division title in 1990 and has also managed in the Mexican Winter League, where he was twice named Manager of the Year.

He began his coaching career as a player/coach with Jacksonville in 1989 and served on a big league staff on a trio of occasions, working as the Marlins' outfield and baserunning coach in 1998, the Rockies' bullpen coach in 1999 and the Diamondbacks bench coach. He was also employed as a coach in the Marlins (1995-96), Rockies (2000-02) and Red Sox (2002) minor league systems.

In eight seasons as a professional player, Bundy hit .318 with 135 home runs and 534 RBI in the Minor Leagues and the Mexican League.

HITTING COACH – FRANKLIN STUBBS

Franklin Stubbs will make his debut as Albuquerque's hitting coach and will embark on his fifth season with the Dodger organization. As Double-A Chattanooga's hitting coach in 2012, Stubbs' guided the Lookouts to the second-best batting average in the Southern League with a .273 team batting average and posted the league's best slugging percentage with a .444 mark. Stubbs served as the hitting coach at Single-A Inland Empire in his first two seasons with the club.

The former Dodger first baseman, who was originally a first-round draft pick of the team in 1982, spent the first 12 years of his coaching career in the Atlanta Braves' chain. Stubbs served as the hitting coach at the Braves' Double-A Mississippi club from 2007-08 and in the same position for Single-A Myrtle Beach for two seasons from 2005-06. He was a roving instructor in the Braves' system from 2003-04 and spent four seasons from 1999-2002 as the Braves' minor league hitting instructor.

Stubbs started his coaching career in 1997 as a coach for Rookie-level Danville and became manager the following season, leading the club to a 30-38 record in his only season as a manager.

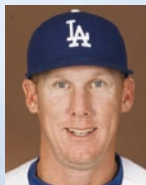
The 51-year-old helped the Dodgers to their World Series title in 1988, playing 115 games that season and chipping in with two RBI in the Fall Classic against Oakland. The North Carolina native hit 104 home runs and played in 945 games in 10 Major League seasons with the Dodgers (1984-89), Astros (1990), Brewers (1991-92) and Tigers (1995).



PITCHING COACH – GLENN DISHMAN

Glenn Dishman enters his third season as pitching coach of the Isotopes and ninth season overall with the Dodger organization. Dishman has served as a pitching coach at all levels of the organization, including stints with the Rookie-level AZL Dodgers (2010), Double-A Chattanooga (2009), Double-A Jacksonville (2008), Single-A Great Lakes (2007), Single-A Vero Beach (2006) and Single-A Columbus (2005). The former big league hurler also served as the pitching coach for the North Shore Honu of the Hawaiian Winter League following the 2006 season.

In 2004, Dishman was an assistant coach at Ohlone College in Fremont, CA after wrapping up an 11-year professional playing career. The right-hander was signed out of Texas Christian University by San Diego in 1993 and made his big league debut with the Padres in 1995. He pitched the following season with the Padres and Philadelphia Phillies and with the Detroit Tigers in 1997, appearing in 33 big league games overall. While playing in the minors, Dishman earned Northwest League All-Star honors with Spokane in 1993 and Texas League All-Star accolades in 1994.

MANAGER – JODY REED



Jody Reed enters his first season as Chattanooga's manager, coaching in his third season in the Dodger organization. Last season, Reed served as the organization's infield coordinator. In 2011, the former Dodger managed the Rookie-level Arizona League Dodgers to a league championship and was named as the circuit's Manager of the Year. He also served as the Camelback Ranch – Glendale coordinator of instruction in 2011.

Reed opened his coaching career with four seasons with the Yankee organization from 2007-10. He was the Yankees' minor league defensive coordinator in 2009-10 and managed the Rookie-level Gulf Coast League Yankees from 2007-08, guiding the club to the GCL title in 2007 and earning league "Manager of the Year" honors that season in his coaching debut.

Reed, 49, enjoyed an 11-year Major League career with the Red Sox (1987-92), Dodgers (1993), Brewers (1994), Padres (1995-6) and Tigers (1997). In 1990 with Boston, he led the American League with 45 doubles and ranked 10th in the AL with 173 hits. He played his college ball at Florida State University and founded the "Jody Reed Baseball School," which helps kids develop the physical and mental skills needed to prepare for a future in baseball.

HITTING COACH – ORV FRANCHUK

Orv Franchuk joins the Dodger organization as hitting coach for the Lookouts after more than 30 years of experience in professional baseball. In 2011, he managed the Edmonton Capitals of the independent North American League to the league's championship. He was a roving instructor for the organization in 2012 after the team withdrew from the league. He was a hitting coach in the San Diego Padres organization, working in Double-A San Antonio (2009) and Triple-A Portland (2010). He served as minor league hitting coordinator in the Houston Astros system during the 2007-08 seasons and was with the Boston Red Sox for four seasons in the same role from 2003-06. Franchuk spent eight years in the Oakland organization and managed Single-A Vancouver in 2002, following four years as Oakland's roving hitting and catching instructor (1998-2001). He was the hitting coach for Triple-A Edmonton from 1995-97. Prior to joining the A's, he spent seven seasons as a scout (1988-94) and hitting coach (1989-94) in the Angels system and was also a scout for Cincinnati for eight years (1977-84).

A native of Amesbury, Alberta, Canada, he was a coach for the Canadian National Team at the 1977, 1980 and 1981 World Baseball Championship and he coached the Canadian Olympic Team in the Olympic qualifying tournament in Cuba in 2006 and in the World Baseball Championships in Taiwan in 2007.

Franchuk graduated from Pepperdine University in 1967 and earned a master's degree from California State University, Long Beach in 1975. The 69-year-old resides in Boise, Idaho with his wife, Susan. The couple has two sons, Shawn and Cody, and a daughter, Nicole.



PITCHING COACH – HECTOR BERRIOS

Hector Berrios returns for a third season with the Dodger organization and the first as Chattanooga's pitching coach after 13 years in the Blue Jays' (1998-2002) and Mets' (2003-10) minor league systems. Berrios was the pitching coach at Single-A Rancho Cucamonga last year and has experience in that role in varying levels of the Mets minor league chain, including stints with the Rookie-level GCL Mets (2005, 2010), Double-A Binghamton (2009) and Single-A Brooklyn (2003-04, 2006-08).

Berrios, 45, played professionally from 1984-92 for affiliates of the Royals (1984-85), Tigers (1987-90), Angels (1991), Dodgers (1992) and Cubs (1992), compiling a 31-25 record with three saves and a 3.90 ERA in eight minor league seasons.

He was an All-Conference pitcher at Connors State College (OK) after graduating from James Monroe High School in the Bronx, NY, where he was selected to the 1979 All-City team as a pitcher and an outfielder.

Season Summary: The season turned around in the second half for the Lookouts. MANAGER - CARLOS SUBERO

Carlos Subero enters his first season as manager of Single-A Rancho Cucamonga and fifth year with the Dodger organization after managing Double-A Chattanooga from 2010-2012, Single-A Inland Empire in 2009. The 39-year-old native of Venezuela led the Lookouts to the playoffs in 2011 after clinching the Second-Half North Division title with a 42-27 record after the All-Star break.

Subero has a combined 729-776 record (.484) as a minor league skipper and previously managed the White Sox's Double-A Birmingham club in 2008 to a 74-63 record and a Southern League playoff berth. He also spent nine seasons in the Texas Rangers' minor league system, including two as a hitting coach with the Gulf Coast League Rangers and seven as a manager with the Gulf Coast League Rangers (2001-02), Single-A Clinton (2003-05) and Single-A Bakersfield (2006-07). Subero's clubs reached the postseason in each of his three seasons with Clinton. Subero played six seasons of Minor League Baseball from 1990-95 with the Kansas City, Pittsburgh and Texas organizations. He is a 1988 graduate of Gran Columbia High School in his native Caracas.

HITTING COACH - JOHNNY WASHINGTON

Johnny Washington enters his first season as Single-A Rancho Cucamonga's hitting coach and fifth with the Dodger organization after spending last year as a coach at Camelback Ranch and the three seasons prior as the hitting coach with Rookie-advanced Ogden. The Raptors reached the playoffs during each of Washington's seasons in Ogden with the club ranking among the Pioneer League offensive leaders each season, including 2010 when the team led the circuit in team batting average (.298), on-base percentage (.365) and slugging percentage (.468).

Washington retired as a player two days into the 2009 season and enjoyed a seven-year professional career as an infielder in the Rangers' (2003-06) and Dodgers' (2008-09) organizations in addition to two years in independent leagues. The 27-year-old was selected by Texas in the 27th round of the 2003 draft after playing at Mount San Jacinto (CA) Junior College from 2002-03.



PITCHING COACH - MATT HERGES

Matt Herges enters his second season as Single-A Rancho Cucamonga's pitching coach after serving as the pitching coach for Rookie-level AZL Dodgers in 2011, his first season in the coaching ranks.

Herges was originally signed by the Dodgers as an amateur free agent out of Illinois State University in 1992. The right-hander made his big league debut with the Dodgers in 1999 and compiled a 20-13 record with a 3.38 ERA in 151 games (four starts) during his three seasons with the club. Herges retired after the 2009 season having pitched for eight teams during his 11 seasons in the Majors, posting a 43-35 record with a 3.91 ERA in 567 games (four starts). He reached the World Series as a member of the Rockies in 2007 and did not allow a run in 10 career postseason appearances (11.0 IP).

MANAGER – RAZOR SHINES

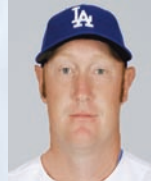
Razor Shines enters his first season as the Great Lakes' manager after serving last season as the team's hitting coach. Before joining the Dodger organization in 2012, Shines spent three seasons as a Major League base coach with the White Sox (2007) and Mets (2009-10) and eight seasons as a minor league manager. Shines started his coaching career in 1994 as the hitting coach for Cincinnati's Triple-A Indianapolis club and made his managerial debut in 1995 with Single-A Charleston of the South Atlantic League. Mike Eylward, 33, joins the Dodger organization in 2013 as the Loons' hitting coach. Eylward spent the last four seasons as a coach in the Angels' organization, including the past two years as the hitting coach for Single-A Cedar Rapids. In 2009 and 2010, he was the hitting coach for the Rookie-League Orem Owlz.

Eylward played primarily as a corner infielder in eight professional seasons in the Angels (2001-07) and Phillies (2008) organizations after his selection in the 44th round of the 2001 First-Year Player Draft out of the University of South Florida. In 855 games, playing mostly first and third base, he compiled a career .285 batting average with 75 home runs and 471 RBI. Eylward and his wife, Kristin, and son, Aiden reside in Clearwater, Fla.

MANAGER – DAMON BERRYHILL

Damon Berryhill returns for a fifth season as manager of Rookie-advanced Ogden and has led the club to the playoffs in four consecutive seasons, including a franchise-record 44 wins in 2010. Radinsky and his wife, Darlenys, have two daughters, Shylene and Raychel, and a son, Scott. He resides in Thousand Oaks and is the lead singer of the alternative punk rock band "Pulley" and was formerly the front man for "Ten Foot Pole." Radinsky, 45, owns a skateboard park and museum in Simi Valley and graduated from Simi Valley High.

Record: 44-32, Pioneer League South Division champions, lost in the Pioneer League Championship Series, 2-1

Season Summary: The Raptors had another stellar season, but lost for the third straight year in the Pioneer League Championship, this time losing the best of three series, 2-1, to the Missoula Osprey (Arizona Diamondbacks). The Raptors dropped Game 3, 10-0. The Raptors won the Pioneer League South Division title in both halves of the season, then defeated Grand Junction 11-9 in the decisive Game 3 of the league semifinals. Season Summary: The Dodgers lost 7-3 to the Rangers in the one-and-done semifinals. Third baseman and 2012 24th-round pick Paul Hoenecke (22) batted .382 with five home runs and 38 RBI in 41 games. Catcher Tyler Ogle (22) played just 16 games with the AZL team, but batted .483 with five home runs and 24 RBI. He was promoted three times during the season, finally ending up playing one game with Triple-A Albuquerque. In the regular season finale with the Isotopes, the 2011 ninth-round pick went 3-for-3 with four RBI. MANAGER – PEDRO MEGA

Pedro Mega returns for his seventh season as manager of the Santo Domingo Dodgers after guiding the club to a 38-32 record and a third-place finish last season. He previously served as the infield coordinator at Campo Las Palmas, the Dodgers' academy in the Dominican Republic, in 2005 and 2006. The 2013 season will be Mega's 13th full year and 14th overall campaign as a Dodger manager in the Dominican Summer League after previously spending time as a player and coach in the organization.

During his tenure as a skipper, Mega has compiled a 496-392 mark for a .559 winning percentage. His managerial career is highlighted by the 2000 season, when he guided Santo Domingo to a 49-21 regular season record and the Dominican Summer League championship. The following season, he piloted Santo Domingo to a 44-28 mark and a second-place finish. Mega also led the Dodgers to second-place finishes in the DSL North Division in 2004, 2007 and 2012.

Mega became a manager for the first time early in the 1998 season for Santo Domingo, replacing Antonio Bautista, who left to become a bench coach for the Sinon Bulls of the Chinese Professional Baseball League in Taiwan as part of a friendship agreement between the Bulls and the Dodgers that began in 1996. His first full season as manager was in 1999.

An infielder, Mega joined the Dodger organization as a player in 1992 and was active in the Dominican Summer League through 1995. He was a player/coach for La Romana in 1994 and 1995 and was a full-time coach there in 1996 and 1997.

LASORDA'S 1970 INDIANS AMONG ALL-TIME BEST FARM TEAMS

In 1970, Tommy Lasorda managed one of the most successful teams in minor league history. His Triple-A Spokane Indians posted a 94-52 regular-season record to cruise to the Northern Division title by 26 games and then his club swept Southern Division-winner Hawaii, four games to none, in the championship series to capture the Pacific Coast League crown. There were 17 members of that Spokane squad who went on to play in the Major Leagues, including shortstop Bobby Valentine, who won the league batting title (.340). Among others on the team were Bill Buckner (.335), Steve Garvey (.319, 15 homers, 87 RBI), Charlie Hough (12-9, 18 saves, 1.95 ERA), Tommy Hutton (.323), Davey Lopes (90 hits, 11 steals), Tom Paciorek (.326, 17 homers, 101 RBI), Bill Russell (.363 in 55 games), Jerry Stephenson (18-5, 2.82 ERA) and Geoff Zahn. Lasorda, who had guided Ogden to three straight Pioneer League titles (1966-68), was honored as *The Sporting News* 1970 Minor League Manager of the Year. Lasorda later piloted Albuquerque to a PCL crown in 1972.

DSL DODGERS 2012 SEASON-IN-REVIEW

Record: 38-32, Dominican Summer League Boca Chica Northwest Division third place

Season Summary: The Dodgers finished 12 games out of first place. Out of 35 teams, the DSL team finished first with a .280 batting average. On the mound, the Dodgers were 17th with a team ERA of 3.44. Venezuelan infielder Josmar Cordero had an impactful 2012. The 21-year-old hit safely in all 25 June games and was one of the league's best players, ranking in the top 10 in batting average (.362, fourth), RBI (47, fourth), hits (83, third), home runs (6, tied for eighth), doubles (19, fifth) and slugging percentage (.533, fifth). Dominican middle infielder Melvin Santana (21) batted .315 and finished fifth in the league with 51 runs. Dominican left-hander Wander Beras (24) led the league with 95 strikeouts, and he did it in 77.2 innings. Jose Diaz joined the starting rotation on June 29 and flourished. The 21-year-old Dominican right-hander finished ninth in the league with a 1.49 ERA and third with a 0.83 WHIP. Overall, he was 4-1 in 15 games.

DAVIS A MINOR LEAGUE BATTING CHAMP AS WELL

Former Dodger star Tommy Davis, who won back-to-back batting titles in the Major Leagues in 1962-63, prepared for the big leagues by also capturing a pair of batting crowns while in the Dodger minor league system. In 1957, playing for Kokomo (IN) of the Class D Midwest League, Davis topped the circuit with a .357 average, also leading the league in hits (185), runs (115) and stolen bases (68). Then in 1959, Davis won the Pacific Coast League batting championship with a .345 mark and a league-leading 211 hits for Triple-A Spokane. He won NL batting titles for the Dodgers in 1962 and 1963 with averages of .346 and .326, respectively.

INTERNATIONAL

INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS

As the popularity of Major League Baseball stretches across the world, so does the Dodgers' continuing search for young talent, whether it comes from the ranks of high schools and colleges in the United States or from countries around the world. Throughout their history, in both Brooklyn and Los Angeles, the Dodgers have played a major role in the development of international baseball and have been on the forefront of forging relationships with countries around the world. Below is a summary of the Dodgers' international involvement by region:

AFRICA

- In 1991, the Dodgers hosted the Nigerian National Baseball team at Dodgertown as they prepared for the International Baseball Association's Youth Championships in Brandon, Canada.
- Dodger pitcher Clayton Kershaw has visited Lusaka, Zambia during the past three offseasons. The Cy Young Award winner and his wife Ellen focus their charitable work on an organization called Arise Africa, which raises money to help build orphanages in Zambia. Through "Kershaw's Challenge," the pitcher has donated more than \$100,000 to the charity and their orphanage, Hope's Home, opened in 2012.
- Kershaw and his wife also wrote a book entitled "Arise" about their work in Africa that was released in January 2012.

AUTRALIA

- In 1986, Dodger shortstop Craig Shipley became the first native-born Australian to play in the Majors. Since then, Australians Luke Prokopec, Jeff Williams and Trent Oeltjen have also played for Los Angeles.
- In 2000, Tommy Lasorda managed Team USA to an Olympic gold medal in Sydney.

CANADA

- The Dodgers have had numerous Canadian players on their roster, both in Brooklyn and Los Angeles. Among them are Paul Quantrill, Eric Gagné, Russell Martin, who became the first Canadian catcher in All-Star history and just the third Canada native to start at any position in an All-Star Game, and Blake Hawksworth.
- Jackie Robinson made his professional baseball debut with the Triple-A Montreal Royals in 1946 and won the International League batting title while taking the team to the Little World Series.
- The Brooklyn and Los Angeles Dodgers had a minor league affiliate in Montreal, Canada from 1939-60.
- Current Special Advisor to the Chairman Tommy Lasorda also spent many years in Canada playing for the Dodgers' Triple-A Montreal Royals, and August 23, 1958 was named Tommy Lasorda Day in the city. Lasorda was also inducted into the Canadian Baseball Hall of Fame on June 24, 2006.

CHINA

- In 1980, the Dodgers began a relationship with the China Baseball Association to help the development of baseball in China.
- In 1984, Dodger coaches were sent to Kunming, China for a two-week clinic with Chinese coaches. In the following years, the Dodgers would send many coaches to China to help the national program while continuing to host Chinese coaches in both Los Angeles and Vero Beach.
- In 1986, Peter O'Malley paid for construction of a baseball stadium in Tianjin, 75 miles southeast of the capital. Named Dodger Stadium, it still exists and is home to the Tianjin Lions of the Chinese Professional Baseball League founded in 2002.
- In 1990, the Dodgers participated in the dedication ceremonies for the first-ever Mitsui Little League Baseball Friendship Field in Guangzhou.
- In 2000, the Dodgers held one-week baseball clinics in Guangzhou.
- In May 2002, Tommy Lasorda and Director of Asian Operations Acey Kohrogi visited Beijing as guests of honor at the Chinese Baseball League's championship game. The following June, the Dodgers hosted the Chinese National Baseball team in its visit to Los Angeles and allowed the team to work out at Dodger Stadium.
- In July 2007, an MLB and U.S. State Department sponsored delegation of baseball coaches from China, representing the China Baseball Association, visited with Tommy Lasorda at Dodger Stadium and received instruction in hitting, fielding, nutrition and team management.

- In the spring of 2008, a split-squad of Dodgers, highlighted by Joe Torre, Andruw Jones and Matt Kemp, traveled to Beijing, China to play against the San Diego Padres at Beijing's Wukesong Stadium in the first-ever Major League games played in that country.



The Dodgers signed then 21-year-old Cuban outfielder Yasiel Puig to a seven-year contract in 2012, marking the club's reintroduction to the international free agent market. Puig appeared in 23 games with Dodger affiliates last season.

CUBA

- The first Cuban pitching star, Dolf Luque, played for the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1930 and 1931.
- The Dodgers held Spring Training in Cuba in 1947.
- The Dodgers announced the signing of Cuban outfielder Yasiel Puig on June 29, 2012.

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC

- The Dodgers signed 17 players from the Dominican Republic in 2012
- As part of the annual Dodgers' Community Caravan, in February 2011, the LA Fire Department, Los Angeles City Councilman Tom LaBonge and Los Bomberos President Bernie Ventura joined Dodger General Manager Ned Colletti and former shortstop Rafael Furcal in announcing the donation of an LAFD fire truck to Furcal's hometown of Loma de Cabrera, Dominican Republic. The donation announcement, a momentous project to Furcal, received local, national and international media attention.
- Fernando Valenzuela traveled to the Dominican Republic for the first time ever to be inducted into the Latino Baseball Hall of Fame at Casa de Campo in La Romana in February, 2011. Dr. Leonel Fernandez Reyna, the President of the Dominican Republic, presented the award.
- A statue of Hall of Fame Manager Tommy Lasorda was unveiled at the Latino Baseball Hall of Fame's Paseo de los Inmortales in February 2012. Lasorda is a founding member of the Latino Baseball Hall of Fame and the organization's Goodwill Ambassador. The Hall of Fame annually bestows the Tommy Lasorda Award for a non-Latino who makes significant contributions to Latino baseball and past winners include former Dodger President Peter O'Malley.
- Lasorda managed in the Dominican Republic for three seasons, winning two championships and one Caribbean Series championship (1973-74).
- Dodger players from the Dominican Republic have included Pedro Guerrero, Adrian Beltre, Raul Mondesi, Manny Mota, Ramon Martinez, Manny Ramirez, Jose Lima and current Dodgers Elian Herrea, Hanley Ramirez and Juan Uribe.
- Numerous Dodgers play in the Dominican Winter League each year, and during the 2012 offseason that included shortstop Hanley Ramirez, catcher Tim Federowicz, shortstop Dee Gordon, infielder/outfielder Elian Herrera and top prospects
- Longtime Dodger coach Manny Mota's Manny Mota International Foundation contributes money, baseball items and other goods to the Dominican every year.

JAPAN

- Three postseason tours of Japan by Brooklyn and Los Angeles Dodger teams following the 1956, 1966 and 1993 seasons led to return visits by the Tokyo Giants during Spring Training in Vero Beach on five occasions (1961, 1967, 1971, 1975 and 1980).
- After their 1956 Japan tour, the Dodgers invited Shigeru Mizuhara, manager of the Yomiuri Giants, along with pitcher Sho Horuchi and catcher Shigeru Fujio, to train in Vero Beach with the Dodgers in 1957.
- In 1962, Japanese baseball coach Kaoru Betto traveled the entire season with the Dodgers, studying the American method of training.
- Dodger minor league manager Pete Reiser visited Japan in the fall of 1963 to coach the Tokyo (Toei) Flyers.
- In 1964 and 1965, the Dodgers conducted coaching clinics in Japan. Scouting Director Al Campanis visited Kawasaki to conduct the 1964 clinic for the Taiyo Whales and then-scouts Tommy Lasorda and Kenny Myers conducted the 1965 clinic in Tokyo and Miyazaki for the Tokyo Giants.

- In 1966, the Dodgers received a two-ton, 10-foot tall, stone lantern gift from Japanese Hall of Famer Sotaro Suzuki as a token of friendship between the Dodgers and Japan and to commemorate the opening of Dodger Stadium in 1962. The Dodgers re-dedicated the stone lantern in 2003 and maintain it and the garden surrounding it to this day.
- During the 2009 World Baseball Classic, the Dodgers and Japanese dignitaries visited the garden and the lantern was lit the entire series.
- In 1979, Tommy Lasorda managed the National League All-Star Team in a seven-game series in Japan.
- Tommy Lasorda hosted a week-long baseball clinic in Japan with Senichi Hoshino in 1981.
- In 1987, the Chunichi Dragons sent two rookies to play for the Sarasota Dodgers (Takeshi Yamasaki and Tetsuo Arakawa) and the next year, the entire Dragons team visited Dodgertown with five players remaining in the minor league system. In 1989, pitchers for the Dragons played for the Vero Beach Dodgers and Kissimmee Dodgers.
- After the 1993 season, the Dodgers played five exhibition games in Asia as part of the Friendship Series tour, three in Taipei, Taiwan and two in the Fukuoka Dome in Fukuoka, Japan.
- The Waseda University baseball team from Tokyo visited Dodgertown for two weeks in 1994, and the Dodgers continue their working relationship with the school. Each year, the Dodgers host interns from Waseda University for several weeks and teach them about American culture and baseball.
- In 1995, Hideo Nomo became only the second Japanese born player to appear in the Major Leagues. The Nomo signing and his success opened the doors for Japanese players in the United States.
- In 2000, the Dodgers signed a Friendship Agreement with the Osaka Kintetsu Buffaloes and Tommy Lasorda visited the team more than 15 times in three years to help with baseball instruction and scouting.
- In June 2005, Tommy Lasorda was asked by President George W. Bush to serve as a delegate to the U.S. National Day at the World Exposition in Aichi, Japan, one of more than 20 visits he has made to Japan.

- In June 2007, Japanese Ambassador Ryozo Kato, Consul General Kazuo Kodama and Executive Director of the Japan America Society Doug Erber met with Dodger owners and executives at Dodger Stadium.
- In 2008, the Dodgers were named "Organization of the Year" by the Asian Business League.
- In December 2008, Hall of Fame Manager and Special Advisor to the Chairman Tommy Lasorda was presented with the Order of the Rising Sun award by Consul General of Japan Junichi Ihara for his contributions to Japanese baseball. Lasorda has been working with teams and players from Japan since the 1960s. He is credited with helping the early success of the Tokyo Giants in the '60s, the success of Hideo Nomo when he came to the Dodgers, the turnaround of the Osaka Kintetsu Buffaloes as part of their Friendship Agreement with the Dodgers in 2001, and the tremendous success of the World Baseball Classic, an international tournament which was won by Japan in 2006 and 2009.
- In March 2009, Japan played against Korea before a sellout crowd at Dodger Stadium to win its second World Baseball Classic championship. Japan edged Korea 5-3 in 10 innings to win the WBC.
- In February 2010, Dodger Stadium hosted baseball teams from Meiji University and Waseda University for workouts. Meiji University's baseball team then traveled to Camelback Ranch-Glendale for a camp held through March 6.
- After Japan was devastated by an earthquake and tsunami in 2011, the Dodgers hosted a drive-through relief event at Dodger Stadium to help raise money for the American Red Cross Japan relief efforts. Pitcher Hiroki Kuroda also gathered his teammates, as well as Hall of Fame Manager Tommy Lasorda, to sign autographs for donations to the

relief efforts during a Spring Training game at Camelback Ranch – Glendale.

- During the 2011 season, the Dodgers formed a relationship with popular Japanese brand Sanrio and created a limited edition ticket package with Hello Kitty that included a Hello Kitty Dodger plush giveaway and visits to Dodger Stadium by Hello Kitty and friends. A Hello Kitty Mini Bobblehead will be given away to fans at Dodger Stadium on July 1, 2012.
- The Dodgers held Japan Day on June 28, 2012 Japan Tourism Agency (JTA) with a Hello Kitty mini bobblehead giveaway and on September 5, 2012 the Dodgers had Hello Kitty throw the first pitch on the Hello Kitty tote bag giveaway day.
- Notable Japanese Dodgers include Hideo Nomo, Dave Roberts, Takashi Saito and Hiroki Kuroda.

KOREA

- Tommy Lasorda hosted clinics and lectures in Korea in 1981 with Senichi Hoshino.
- In 1990, the Dodgers hosted the team presidents for the Korean Baseball Professional League for a baseball workshop and seminar, which allowed the executives to study all aspects of the Dodger organization.
- On Sept. 9, 1990, the Dodgers became the first Major League team to have a game broadcast in the Korean language in the United States.
- In 1994, pitcher Chan Ho Park became the first Korean to play in the Major Leagues.
- In 1995, the Hanyang University baseball team from Korea visited Dodgertown during Spring Training.
- In 1999, the Dodgers entered into a working agreement with the LG Twins of the Korean Baseball Organization. The Twins visited and trained at Dodgertown in 2000.

- In March 2009, Korea played against Japan before a sellout crowd at Dodger Stadium. Japan defeated Korea 5-3 in 10 innings to win the WBC.
- The Dodgers announced the signing of left-handed starting pitcher Hyun-Jin Ryu on December 9, 2012. When he makes his Dodger debut, Ryu will become just the 14th South Korea native to play in the Majors and the fourth to play for the Dodgers behind Hee-Seop Choi (2004-2005), Jae Seo (2006) and Chan Ho Park (1994-2001, 2008), who was the first Korean to play in the Majors when he made his debut in 1994.

MEXICO

- Pitcher Fernando Valenzuela made his Major League debut in 1980. The native of Sonora, Mexico became an international sensation in 1981 and helped the Dodgers win the World Series.
- The Dodgers took a trip to Monterrey, Mexico during Spring Training in 1991 for a two-game exhibition against Industriales de Monterrey and the Milwaukee Brewers. The Dodgers also played exhibition games in Mexico City prior to the 1964 season against the Red Devils and in 2003 against the New York Mets.
- Representatives of the Mexican media visit Glendale, Arizona during Spring Training each year, a tradition that started in 2008. Hall of Fame Broadcaster Jaime Jarrín, Dodger legend Fernando Valenzuela and broadcaster Pepe Yñiguez host the group each year as they watch Dodger games and interview Dodger players.
- In 2006 and 2009, Dodger legend Fernando Valenzuela served as a coach for Team Mexico during the World Baseball Classic.
- As part of Viva Los Dodgers 2009, the Dodgers hosted members of the 1957 Little League World Series Championship Team from Monterrey, Mexico. The Little Giants became the first Mexican team to ever win the 1957 Little League World Series in Williamsport, Pennsylvania and spent a day at Ebbets Field with the Brooklyn Dodgers. The Monterrey team's visit with the Dodgers was their first in L.A after their Brooklyn visit more than 50 years ago.

- The 2011 Mexican Little League team visited Dodger Stadium in August 2011 prior to playing in the Little League World Series as guests of Fernando Valenzuela. Later that month, Valenzuela called Little League headquarters where the Mexican little leaguers were gathered for a pep talk before the Little League World Series International Championship Game.
- Other notable Mexicans who have played for the Dodgers include Juan Castro, who currently serves as a Special Assistant, Baseball Operations, Antonio Osuna and Ismael Valdez.
- The Dodgers signed four players from Mexico in 2012.
- Fernando Valenzuela, Adrian Gonzalez, Luis Cruz and Juan Castro will be a part of Team Mexico for the 2013 WBC.
- Fernando Valenzuela was inducted into the Caribbean Baseball Hall of Fame in Hermosillo, Sonora, Mexico on February 3, 2013.

RUSSIA

- In 1988, Ramaz Goglidze, president of the Soviet Baseball Federation, visited Dodgertown along with Russian baseball coaches Alexander Artatov and Ctela Cheehradze. On April 17, 1988, Dodger officials attended the groundbreaking ceremony for Matsumae Baseball Stadium at Moscow University.

TAIWAN

- Following the 1993 season, the Dodgers were the first Major League Baseball team to play in Taiwan when they competed against the Chinese Professional League All-Stars for three games as part of the Dodgers' Friendship Baseball Series.
- In 1996, the Dodgers established a working agreement with the Sinon Bulls of the Chinese Professional Baseball League. The Bulls became the first team from Taiwan to train in Latin America when they visited Campo Las Palmas in 1997, 1998, 1999 and 2003.
- Dodger pitcher Hong-Chih Kuo in 2000 became the first Taiwanese high school player to sign a professional baseball contract.
- In November 2002, the Dodgers became the first team with two Taiwanese players on their Major League roster – pitcher Hong-Chih Kuo and outfielder Chin Feng Chen. On September 9, 2002, Chen became the first Taiwanese player in the Majors. Kuo became the fourth after his debut in 2005.
- On Jan. 29, 2007, the Dodgers signed right-handed pitcher Chin-hui Tsao to a one-year contract, giving them three out the four Taiwanese-born players to ever appear in a Major League game. In 2007, Chin-lung Hu made it four out of five.
- During Spring Training 2010, the Dodgers traveled to Taiwan and played three games against a team from the Chinese Professional Baseball League (CPBL). This was the Dodgers' second trip to Taiwan, first since 1993.
- The Dodgers and the Taiwan Tourism Board partnered during the 2010 and 2011 seasons.
- In 2011, the Dodgers were the first MLB team to be awarded the Taiwan Tourism Award presented by Taiwanese Premier Wu Den-Yih at a ceremony attended by Taiwan's President Ma Ying-jeou.
- In September 2011, the First Lady of the Republic of China (Taiwan) Mei-Ching Chow Ma visited Dodger Stadium for the first time and threw out a ceremonial first pitch.

VENEZUELA

- Hall of Fame Manager and Special Advisor to the Chairman Tommy Lasorda served as a coach/manager for Venezuela's most popular team, the Caracas Leones, in 1971-72.
- Los Angeles has seen many Venezuelans don a Dodger uniform, including Wilson Alvarez, Henry Blanco, Vic Davalillo, Carlos Hernandez, Enzo Hernandez, Omar Daal, Roger Cedeno, Giovanni Carrara, Cesar Izturis, Dioner Navarro, Luis Maza, Ronald Belisario, Carlos Monasterios, Juan Rivera.
- Izturis is the Dodgers' all-time leader in games played among Venezuelans with 590 and was the focus of an international media blitz in 2005 to help him reach the All-Star Game. The successful campaign helped earn him a spot representing his home country at the Midsummer Classic
- In 2009, Dodgers Director of International Relations Joe Reaves and Assistant GM Dejon Watson visited Venezuela to formally announced a partnership with the Venezuelan Professional Baseball League and the Tiburones de La Guaira.
- 2011 marked the third year the Dodgers partnered with the Tiburones de La Guaira and they finished second in the Venezuelan Winter League. The Dodgers' Triple-A coach Glenn Dishman served as the team's pitching coach.
- The Dodgers signed 8 players from Venezuela in 2012.
- Dodger pitcher Ronald Belisario will represent Venezuela in the 2013 World Baseball Classic.

WORLD BASEBALL CLASSIC

- In the inaugural World Baseball Classic in 2006, Tommy Lasorda served as an Ambassador for Major League Baseball.
- The Dodgers had several players participate in the inaugural WBC, including Hong-Chih Kuo (Taiwan), Olmedo Saenz (Panama), Odalis Perez (Dominican Republic) and Chin-lung Hu (Taiwan).
- Dodger legend Fernando Valenzuela helped coach the Mexican national team in the 2006 and 2009 WBCs.
- Dodger pitcher Jonathan Broxton played for the U.S. in the 2009 World Baseball Classic and catcher Russell Martin played for Team Canada.
- The 2009 World Baseball Classic semi-final and final games were held at Dodger Stadium from March 21 – 23, 2009.
- Hall of Fame Manager Tommy Lasorda served as Global Ambassador for the 2009 World Baseball Classic.
- Dodgers on 2013 WBC rosters include – Ronald Belisario (Venezuela), Luis Cruz (Mexico), Adrian Gonzalez (Mexico), Hanley Ramirez (Dominican Republic) and Nick Punto (Italy).
- Additionally Fernando Valenzuela will return as pitching coach for Team Mexico. Dodger Special Assistant, Player Personnel Juan Castro will also serve on Mexico's coaching staff. Dodger scout Mike Brito will also join Team Mexico.

MISCELLANEOUS

- Dodger Stadium played host to the 1984 exhibition baseball tournament at the Olympic Games in Los Angeles.
- Special Advisor to the Chairman Tommy Lasorda has made two trips to Italy, the first to lecture about baseball and the second to host clinics throughout the country in the 1990s. During the second trip a team was named for him, the Tommy Lasorda Tollo All-Stars.
- On May 19, 1993, Dodger Stadium hosted the first baseball game to be broadcast in four languages – Chinese, English, Korean and Spanish.
- The Dodgers have played exhibition games in the Bahamas, the Dominican Republic, Japan, Taiwan, China, Cuba, Mexico and Puerto Rico. In addition, coaches from Australia, Holland, Italy, Nicaragua, and Nigeria have studied the training techniques of the Dodger staff.

CAMPO LAS PALMAS

The Los Angeles Dodgers' baseball academy in the Dominican Republic, Campo Las Palmas, enters its 26th year in Dodger player development, having officially opened on March 27, 1987. It was the first-of-its kind facility and has since been replicated by numerous teams throughout baseball. The Dodgers' history in the Dominican Republic began in 1948 when they held Spring Training there. In 1972, the organization signed a working agreement with the Tigres de Licey.

Several years later, former team president Peter O'Malley visited the country and had Dodger Advisor, Latin America Scouting and Player Development Ralph Avila buy land for the new academy. Campo Las Palmas is located in the town of Guerra, just east of the Dominican Republic's capital city of Santo Domingo. It is located on 75 acres of land and the academy is equipped with two full and two half baseball fields, a dining room,

kitchen, recreation room and two two-story dormitories that accommodate up to 100 players. In addition to baseball instruction, Dodger prospects receive academic instruction.

The Dodgers educational program at Campo Las Palmas focuses on five pillars: English, American culture, nutrition, finance and computers and technology.

During the offseason, numerous Dominican players return from the U.S. to their native country to train at Campo Las Palmas and participate in instructional leagues. The Dodgers house approximately 40 prospects at any given time. The facility has developed some of the game's top talent during the past two decades, including Pedro Martinez, Ramon Martinez, Raul Mondesi and Adrian

Beltre were signed and developed at Campo Las Palmas. Current Dodger pitcher Kenley Jansen of Curacao was also signed during a tryout at Campo Las Palmas.

In 2005, Hall of Fame Manager and Special Advisor to the Chairman Tommy Lasorda arranged for three buses to be donated to Futuro Vivo and in 2008, he coordinated the donation of another bus to be given to the Association of Sports Journalists in the Dominican Republic. The Dodgers continue their commitment locally to Futuro Vivo, a school located in Santo Domingo that was adopted by the organization. The school offers education, nutrition and medical assistance to more than 500 underprivileged children.

In 2008, a contingent of Dodger executives, including General Manager Ned Colletti, Special Assistant to the Chairman Tommy Lasorda and Special Assistant, Player Development Jose Vizcaino visited the Dominican Republic to interact with scouts, media members and local business associates. New improvements in 2009 included enhancements to the weight room, training room and restrooms on site. Additionally, former Dodger outfielder Henry Cruz was appointed to the Campo Las Palmas staff.

In 2011, Campo Las Palmas saw several renovations including a 24-hour energy and water sanitation system. The facility is overseen year-round both locally and by the Dodgers' Baseball Operations staff.

CREDENTIALS: Credentials will be issued only to accredited media members. Season credentials will be issued only to those news agencies that have covered the Dodgers on a regular basis for the past three consecutive seasons and will be approved at the discretion of the Dodgers' Public Relations Department. All credential requests for regular season Dodger home games should be submitted through <http://credentials.mlb.com> by the outlet affiliate manager and must be received at least 24 hours in advance to allow for verification and processing. Credential requests for weekend games must be submitted by 5 p.m. on the previous Friday. Please make certain all credential requests are confirmed by the Public Relations office prior to arrival at the stadium. Credentials can be picked up four hours prior to game time at the Dodger Stadium press entrance, located off of the media parking lot (Parking Lot P). Proper photo identification is required for pick up. Credentials must be displayed at all times.

PARKING: Media parking is located in Parking Lot P (Top of the Park). Media should enter Dodger Stadium through Gate A, which is located at the intersection of Elysian Park Ave. and Stadium Way, and check in at the guard-gated booth on the far right. After checking in, security will direct media to park in Lot P. Season media credentials will serve as season-long parking passes and all media with daily credentials will be on the day's media parking list. The media parking list is submitted to Gate A 24 hours in advance, so all media who are credentialed after the 24-hour deadline will need to pay for general admission parking. All media members are requested to enter Dodger Stadium through the media parking entrance. Please note that during sellouts, high profile games (i.e. Opening Day) and the postseason, we may not be able to accommodate all media in Parking Lot P and different media parking rules may apply.

CLUBHOUSE: Both the Dodgers' and visiting team's clubhouses are located on Level 1 (Dugout Club level). Only media credentialed with clubhouse access will be admitted inside. The training room and all areas besides the clubhouse itself are closed to all media. Before the game, the clubhouse is only open to credentialed media from 3 1/2 hours prior to game time until the start of batting practice. After the game, the clubhouse opens to the media no later than 10 minutes after the last out.

DUGOUTS: The Dodgers' dugout is located on the third base side and the visitor's is on the first base side.

ELEVATORS/ESCALATORS: Elevators/escalators are located directly behind home plate. Elevators are available on all levels and escalators are available between the Club/Suite/Press box Level and field and loge levels. On the field level, the first door on the left at the bottom of the escalators will lead to one flight of stairs leading down to the clubhouses and field entrance.

FIELD: Only credentialed media with field access will be allowed on the field before the game. All media must clear the field 45 minutes prior to game time unless given special permission by the PR department.

PRESS BOX AND DINING ROOM: The Vin Scully Press Box is located on Level 5 (Club/Suite Level) directly behind home plate. The media dining area, located in the main press box, is open two hours prior to game time. Beverages and snacks are available during and after the game. The cost for each pregame meal is payable in the press dining room.

INTERNET: Wireless internet access for the media will be available free of charge in the Vin Scully Press Box and the photographer wells. Login instructions with user name and password will be posted. Should media encounter problems logging on, they should contact a member of the Dodgers' Public Relations Department.

TELEPHONES: Several charge-a-call phones are located in the Vin Scully Press Box.

MEDIA DRESS CODE: Major League Baseball requests members of the media covering games to dress in an appropriate and professional manner that reflects their respect for their colleagues, the teams and the players they are covering. Clubhouses, dugouts, press boxes, interview rooms and the playing

field are working areas, and MLB expects members of the media to adhere to a business casual dress code. A full description of MLB's media dress code can be found at www.mlbpressbox.com.

BATTING PRACTICE TIMING: Batting practice times are listed on the final page of the Media Information section of the Media Guide.

AUTOGRAPH POLICY: Credentialed members of the media are prohibited from requesting autographs at any time on the field or in the clubhouse. Violation of this rule will result in immediate credential revocation.

DAILY NOTES: Daily notes, statistics, lineup cards and other media information will be available in the Vin Scully Press Box prior to game time. Quotes, statistics, postgame notes, box scores and play-by-play sheets will be available after the game. Daily game notes and other media information are also available on DodgersPressbox.com or MLBPressbox.com to media registered on the site.

GAME TICKETS: Complimentary media tickets, subject to availability, must be requested at least 24 hours in advance for Tuesday-Friday games and by 2 p.m. on Friday for weekend and Monday games. Approval will depend upon availability, frequency of use and the discretion of the public relations director. Tickets, limited to four per series, can be picked up at the Club Level Will Call window in parking lot D outside of the Dodger offices on the day of the game. Proper photo identification is required and tickets must be picked up by the person whose name is listed at willcall. The willcall window opens 90 minutes prior to game time.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Photographers are not allowed on the field during the game at any time. Photo wells are located at each end of the home and visiting dugouts and photographers who wish to shoot from the photo wells must receive approval from a member of the Dodgers' Public Relations staff or a team photographer in advance. Special arrangements for use of the press box level positions or other photographer locations can be made by contacting the Public Relations Department in advance. Still photography, including with cell phones or mobile devices, is not allowed in either clubhouse unless authorized by the Public Relations Department of each club.

LIVE TRANSMISSION: Non-rightsholders are permitted to transmit live reports prior to and after games at Dodger Stadium. Live transmissions must be cleared ahead of time by the Dodgers' Public Relations Department at (323) 224-1301 and all truck parking and equipment requirements, including park and power fees, should be arranged in advance by contacting brandib@ladodgers.com. All television live shots must be done in designated areas. Live shots will not be permitted from the clubhouse. Live television reports by non-rightsholders are prohibited while the rightsholder is on the air or the game is in progress. Radio stations and assigned correspondents for out-of-town reports are allowed to give inning or half-inning score updates. At no time can they file reports once play is underway. Violation of the above policies will result in immediate credential revocation.

TELEVISION STATISTICAL ASSISTANCE: The Public Relations department can refer statisticians for visiting club television.

POSTSEASON: Auxiliary press seating during the postseason will exist on the Reserve Level behind home plate. In addition, conference rooms on the club level and media dining will be available for media seating. The postseason interview room is located behind the Dodger clubhouse and can be reached by taking the stairs at the end of the third base line. A photographer workroom will also be located in this area. Media seating will be assigned during the postseason and seating diagrams will be posted in all media work areas.

DISABLED ACCESS: The media parking lot and press box are equipped for disabled media members. For press box access, take the elevator to Level 5. For field and clubhouse access, take the elevator to Level 1. Turn left to enter the Dodgers' clubhouse. To access the field, enter the Dugout Club on Level 1. The ushers will direct media to the lift allowing entrance to the field.

POSTEMPORADA: Asientos auxiliares para la prensa durante la postemporada existirá en el Nivel Reserve detrás del plato de home. También, los cuartos de conferencia en el nivel del club y comedor de los medios serán disponibles para asientos para los medios. El cuarto de entrevistas para la postemporada está localizado detrás del clubhouse de los Dodgers y puedes llegar allí yendo hasta los escalones al final de la línea de la tercera base. Un cuarto de trabajo para los fotógrafos también estará ubicado en esta área. Asientos para los medios serán asignados durante la postemporada y gráficos de los asientos serán mostrados en todas las áreas de trabajo de los medios.

ACCESO PARA DISCAPACITADOS: El estacionamiento y press box para los medios de comunicación están preparados para miembros de los medios que son discapacitados. Para acceso para el press box, toma el elevador hacia el Nivel5. Para acceso para el terreno y el clubhouse, toma el elevador hacia el Nivel 1. Toma una izquierda para entrar al clubhouse de los Dodgers. Para acceso al terreno, entra el Dugout Club en el Nivel 1. Los acomodadores dirijan a los medios hacia el ascensor que permite la entrada al terreno.

クレデンシャル: メディアパスは許可を受けたメディアのみに発行されます。シーズンパスは最近3シーズン 継続してホームゲームを取材してきたメディアのみを対象に、広報部の判断により発行されます。パスの申請は当方で確認と事務処理のため24時間前までに、担当マネージャーが<http://credentials.mlb.com>から行ってください。週末のゲームについては金曜日の午後5時までに申請してください。当日はパスが広報部より発行されているかを必ず確認してから、スタジアムにお越しください。パスは試合開始の4時間前から、メディア用駐車場 Lot P 付近のメディア入口にて受け取り可能です。受け取りの際は写真入り身分証明書提示が必要です。パスはスタジアム内で常に見えるように携帯してください。

ド内はビジネスカジュアルでお願いします。より詳しいドレスコード規定は www.mlbpressbox.com でご確認ください。

打撃練習: 打撃練習の時間は、メディアガイド内メディアインフォメーション欄の最終ページに記載されています。

サイン: パスを持つメディアが、グラウンドおよびクラブハウス内でサインを求めることは固く禁じられています。違反したメディアは直ちにパスを剥奪されます。

メディア資料: ゲームノート、記録データ、スタメンカード、その他資料が記者席にて試合前に配布されます。コメント、記録データ、ポストゲームノート、ボックススコア、試合詳細は試合後に配布されます。なおゲームノートについては、DodgersPressbox.comかMLBPressbox.comでも見られます。サイト上で登録を行ってください。

無料チケット: メディア用無料チケットは、火曜日から金曜日の試合は24時間前までに、週末と月曜日の試合は金曜日午後2時までに申請してください。空席状況や申請頻度によりご提供できない場合もありますので、あらかじめご了承ください。チケットはClub Level 4枚までで、Lot D 上階のドジャースオフィス正面にある Sign-Up Will Call 窓口にて、写真入り身分証明書を提示の上試合当日にお受け取りください。窓口は試合開始の90分前にオープンします。

 매치 데그 야구단은 게임을 다루는 모든 언론인들에게 적절하고 전문성 있는 복장으로 모든 동료들과 팀, 선수들을 존중해 줄 것을 요구합니다. 클럽하우스, 더그아웃, 기자회견, 인터뷰실과 경기장은 업무 환경이며 MLB는 모든 언론인으로 부터 비즈니스 캐주얼 복장 규정을 지킬 것을 요구합니다. MLB의 언론인 복장 규정의 자세한 설명은 www.mlbpressbox.com에서 찾으실 수 있습니다.

배팅 연습시간: 배팅시간은 배투런 미디어가이드 자료에 있는 매치 데그 장에 안내되어 있을 것입니다.

사인 방침: 유자격 언론인은 필드와 클럽하우스 어디에서도 사인을 요청하는 것을 금지합니다. 이 방침을 위반하면 자격증이 즉각 취소됩니다.

당일 경기 노트: 경기 노트와 통계 및 다른 자료들은 경기 시간 전에 Vin Scully 기자실에서 제공됩니다. 인공문, 통계, 경기 후 노트, 박스 스코어 및 자세한 경기 보고지는 경기 후에 제공됩니다. 당일 경기 노트는 또한 DodgersPressbox.com이나 MLBPressbox.com 사이트에 가입하신 분에 한해서 사용할 수 있습니다.

選手更衣室、選手休息區、媒體室、採訪中心、以及競賽場地都屬於媒體工作區域，大聯盟要求所有媒體成員都遵守Business Casual(半正式休閒)的穿著規範。所有大聯盟的媒體服裝規定，可上網至 www.mlbpressbox.com 查詢。

賽前練習時間: 賽前練習時間列於媒體手冊(Media Guide)最末頁的媒體資訊區。

索取簽名: 嚴禁任何持有採訪證件之媒體成員於球場或選手更衣室內索取簽名。違反此規定者將立即被註銷採訪資格。

每日筆記: Vin Scully 媒體室將於每場賽前提供每日筆記、統計數字、攻守成績、以及其它媒體資訊。訪問目錄、統計數字、賽後筆記、比賽名錄，以及比賽紀錄表江於賽後提供。在DodgersPressbox.com或MLBPressbox.com登錄之媒體成員亦可於該網站取得每日賽事筆記。

球員門票: 週二至週五之免費媒體門票須於開賽最少二十四小時前提出申請。週末及週一之免費媒體門票須於前周五下午兩點前提出申請。免費媒體門票數量有限，核准與否由道奇隊依數量及每人使用頻率決定，每系列戰以四張為限。門票可於比賽當日在俱樂部樓層(Clubhouse)道奇辦公室外停車場D之領票窗口(Will Call)領取。領取時須出示有照片之正式身分證明文件，並由領票名單上之本人親自領取。領票窗口於每場比賽賽前九十分鐘開放。

攝影記者: 攝影記者不得於賽事進行中任何時刻進入競賽場地。攝影記者區位於地主隊及各隊休息區尾端。攝影師若需使用攝影記者區、媒體室、或其它任何攝影位置，請事先向公關部門提出申請。若無事先得到公關部門之許可，攝影記者嚴禁於選手更衣室內使用任何器材，包括行動電話或任何行動裝置，進行攝影。

現場直播須事先聯絡道奇公關部(323) 224-1301獲得許可。所有工程車停車費用、取得費用，以及現場直播畫面必須於事先聯絡brandib@ladodgers.com取得許可。所有相關書面必須於事先指定之區域進行。嚴禁於選手更衣室內進行任何現場直播。嚴禁任何無線賽轉播權之媒體於球賽轉播進行時做任何現場報導。廣播電臺以及指定之境外媒體可於每局或每半局換場時提供球賽快報，但嚴禁於比賽進行中提供任何報導。任何違反以上規定之行為，該媒體成員之採訪證件將立即被註銷。

電視轉播統計數字服務: 公關部門可為各隊電視轉播單位提供統計數字服務。

季後賽: 季後賽時，媒體區將擴大至本壘後方之頂層看臺(Reserve樓層)。部分媒體成員將被安置於俱樂部樓層(Club樓層)之會議室以及媒體餐廳內。季後賽訪問區位於道奇選手更衣室後方，媒體成員可經由三壘後方之樓梯前往。該區同時亦會設置攝影記者工作區。季後賽媒體成員座位表將於各媒體室公佈。

VIN SCULLY HALL OF FAME BROADCASTER

In late August 2012, Southern Californians and baseball fans worldwide breathed a sigh of relief as Hall of Fame Dodger broadcaster Vin Scully announced he would return for an unprecedented 64th season with the organization. Said Scully: "The new ownership of the Dodgers has revitalized the city, the team, the fans and myself. I am so convinced of their great purpose and leadership that I eagerly look forward to joining them in pursuit of the next Dodgers championship."

Scully continues to rewrite the record book of his trade each and every time he goes on the air. With awards and accolades beyond comprehension, Scully's standing as the greatest sportscaster of all time was reaffirmed by the American Sportscasters Association (ASA), which at a 2010 event put his name atop the list of the 50 greatest to ever sit behind a microphone. The Hall of Famer's 63 years of consecutive service with the Dodgers is the longest of any sports broadcaster with one team. Scully will call all Dodger home games and road games in California and Arizona for PRIME TICKET, KCAL and KLAC.

In January 2013, he was bestowed with the Allan H. "Bud" Selig Executive Leadership Award at the annual Professional Baseball Scouts Foundation dinner, which is given to those who have made great contributions to the game of baseball.

The ASA, a non-profit organization that recognizes achievements in sports broadcasting, also elected Scully as the top sportscaster of the 20th century in a vote by more than 500 national members of the organization in 2000, topping such broadcasting icons as Howard Cosell, Mel Allen and others. And while the latest poll by that organization put the "Voice of the Dodgers" atop the list of all-time greats, that group is not alone. In the 2005 book "Voices of Summer," Scully was named as baseball's all-time best broadcaster based on "longevity, continuity, network coverage, kudos, language, popularity, persona, voice knowledge and miscellany." Each criterion was rated from 1-10, with the perfect score being 100. Scully was the only broadcaster to reach that number.

Scully, whose vivid yet simplistic description of a baseball game has thrilled fans for years, joined Hall of Fame announcer Red Barber and Connie Desmond as part of the Brooklyn Dodgers' broadcast team in 1950, just a year after graduating from Fordham University. Scully, who played outfield for two seasons on Fordham's baseball team, called baseball, basketball and football games for the University's radio station. In 1982, 32 years after he first became a Dodger broadcaster, he reached the pinnacle of his sparkling career in baseball when he was inducted into the Broadcaster's wing of the National Baseball Hall of Fame as the Ford C. Frick Award recipient.

In 2009, Scully was inducted into the National Association of Broadcasters Hall of Fame, which recognizes individuals and programs that have made a significant and lasting contribution to the broadcasting industry. The NAB represents more than 8,300 radio and television broadcasters before the Federal Communications Commission and Congress and a plaque in his honor will be permanently displayed at the NAB building in Washington, DC. Previous inductees to the NAB Radio Hall of Fame include Mel Allen, Gene Autry, Red Barber, Jack Buck, George Burns, Harry Caray, Bing Crosby, Herbert Hoover, Bob Hope, Casey Kasem, Larry King, Rush Limbaugh, Edward Murrow, Ronald Reagan and Orson Welles.

Also in 2009, The American Sportscasters Association selected Scully as the Top Sportscaster of All-Time. The same organization previously honored him as the Top Sportscaster of the 20th century in 2000 and inducted him into the American Sportscasters Association's Hall of Fame in 1992.

During the 2008 calendar year, Scully was inducted into the Sports Broadcasting Hall of Fame in New York City as well as the California Sports Hall of Fame. He was honored on the field at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum before the team's record-setting game in March and a plaque was unveiled in his honor at the historic venue. He received the Art Gilmore Career Achievement Award from Pacific Pioneers Broadcasting and was honored by WFUV, the radio station he helped form at his alma mater Fordham, during its 60th anniversary celebration. Scully also received an honorary Doctor's of Law degree from Pepperdine, the university's highest honor.

DODGER TELEVISION FIRSTS

The Brooklyn Dodgers and Cincinnati Reds were the first clubs to appear on television when an NBC experimental station televised the first game of a doubleheader on Aug. 26, 1939.

Sixteen years later, on Sept. 28, 1955, the World Series was televised in color for the first time. The first game of the Fall Classic between the New York Yankees and Brooklyn Dodgers was won by New York, but the Dodgers would go on to capture their first and only World Series title in Brooklyn.

When Scully first began broadcasting in 1950, the Dodgers had yet to win a single World Series and were known affectionately as “Dem Bums.” Gasoline cost 27 cents a gallon, a postage stamp was just three cents and the minimum wage was only 75 cents per hour. Three years later, at the age of 25, he became the youngest person to ever broadcast a World Series game and in 1955, he had his most memorable moment behind the microphone, as he called the Dodgers’ first and only championship in Brooklyn. The following season, Scully once again found himself in the enviable position of calling what he would later say was the greatest individual performance he had seen - Don Larsen’s perfect game in the World Series - a broadcast that made national news again in 2009 when the MLB Network launched on January 1 with the rare footage of that game.

Though he cut his proverbial teeth on radio, Scully is often known for letting the pictures tell the story on television. His most memorable call for Dodger fans likely came in Game 1 of the 1988 World Series, when a hobbled Kirk Gibson’s two-out, two-strike, two-run homer gave the Dodgers a victory over the highly-favored Oakland A’s.

“High fly ball into right field, she is gone,” Scully said before remaining silent for more than a minute. The next words he spoke continue to be replayed almost nightly at Dodger Stadium. “In a year that has been so improbable, the impossible has happened.”

Scully’s voice is often dubbed the “soundtrack to summer” in Los Angeles, where generations of fans have grown up listening to him call Dodger games. He continues to call all Dodger home games and road games in California and Arizona. While Scully handles all nine innings of the team’s television broadcasts, the first three innings of each of his games is simulcast on radio.

As such, in 2005, USA Today ranked the Dodgers’ radio broadcast team as Major League Baseball’s best, based on a technical rating, a fan rating and an entertainment rating. Scully and his colleagues, Rick Monday and Charley Steiner, earned 28.5 points out of a possible 30.

On April 21, 2001, the press box at Dodger Stadium was named in Scully’s honor.

In addition to his Dodger broadcasts, the multi-talented broadcaster called play-by-play for National Football League games and PGA Tour events on CBS-TV from 1975-82 and play-by-play for Major League Baseball’s Game of the Week, three World Series and four All-Star Games on NBC-TV from 1983-89. Scully also called play-by-play for the World Series on CBS Radio from 1990-97. In all, he has called 25 World Series and 12 All-Star Games.

In 2009, Scully hosted “Scully & Wooden for the Kids” alongside UCLA coaching legend John Wooden. The once-in-a-lifetime event featured Scully and Wooden sharing insights, philosophies, memories and wisdom before a sold-out audience of more than 7,000 people. Proceeds from the event benefited Mattel Children’s Hospital UCLA, Children’s Hospital Los Angeles and City of Hope through ThinkCure!, the official charity of the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Scully portrayed himself in “For Love of the Game,” the 1999 Universal Pictures release starring Kevin Costner. During the 1999 World Series, Scully served as master of ceremonies at Major League Baseball’s All-Century Team unveiling at Atlanta’s Turner Field. He was named best of the century in Los Angeles Sports broadcasting by the Long Beach Press-Telegram and the poet laureate of baseball by USA Today. He has also lent his voice to Sony Playstation’s MLB video game.

He and his wife, Sandra, reside in Los Angeles.

JAIME JARRÍN

HALL OF FAME BROADCASTER

Jaime Jarrín, among the most recognizable voices in Spanish language broadcasting and one of two current Dodger Hall of Fame announcers, begins his 55th season in the radio booth. Jarrín, “the Spanish Voice of the Dodgers” is also heard on PRIME TICKET’s SAP channel. The Dodgers, with Jarrín and longtime broadcaster Vin Scully, are the first Major League club to feature a pair of Hall of Fame announcers.

Jarrín celebrated his 50th season with the Dodgers in 2008 and was honored by the team on the anniversary of his arrival to the United States, June 24. Jarrín was recognized for his service that day with appearances throughout Los Angeles and received a special award from the publisher and general manager of Hoy, LA Times Media Group’s Spanish-language newspaper. Last season, the Dodgers honored Jarrín’s 54th season as part of the club’s season-long celebration of Dodger Stadium’s 50th Anniversary. A Jaime Jarrín T-Shirt, featuring an excerpt of Jarrín’s famous home run call “¡Se va, se va, y se fue... despidala con un beso!” and Tribute Night on June 11 sold more than 50,000 tickets. This season, the Dodgers will hold Jaime Jarrín bobblehead night on May 25 (4:15 p.m. vs. STL).

In the 2005 book “Voices of Summer,” Jarrín was named as baseball’s all-time best Spanish-language broadcaster based on “longevity, continuity, network coverage, kudos, language, popularity, persona, voice knowledge and miscellany.” He was rated 28th overall among all broadcasters. Jarrín became the club’s No. 1 Spanish-language broadcaster in 1973, 14 years after he first joined the Dodgers. He was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame on July 26, 1998 in Cooperstown, NY as the recipient of the Ford C. Frick Award. Named in honor of the former broadcaster and Commissioner of Baseball, the Frick Award has been given annually since 1978 to a broadcaster “for major contributions to the game of baseball.”

The Quito, Ecuador native began working for HCJB in his home country when he was just 16 years old and went on to become the announcer for the National Congress of Ecuador. He came to the United States on June 24, 1955 and four months later, watched the Dodgers win their first World Series, which was when he fell in love with baseball. Shortly thereafter, he began working for KWKW in Los Angeles, where he was the news and sports director when the Dodgers moved to Los Angeles in 1958. For the first six-plus years as the Dodgers’ broadcaster, Jarrín did not travel and would recreate the games on radio while listening to the English-language broadcast from a studio. From 1962 to 1984, Jarrín called close to 4,000 consecutive games spanning 22 seasons, never missing a game. The streak was broken only when he took charge of all Spanish-language radio coverage and production for the 1984 Olympic Games in Los Angeles.

In addition to his work calling Dodger games, Jarrín found himself at the center of many international news broadcasts, including the funeral of President John F. Kennedy, Pope John Paul II’s visit to America and several important meetings between foreign leaders and Presidents Richard Nixon and Lyndon B. Johnson. Jarrín became a household name across the country in 1980-81 when he served as the interpreter for Mexican pitching phenom Fernando Valenzuela during a period known as Fernandomania. The left-hander became an analyst in 2003 and continues to work alongside Jarrín.

On August 23, 2009, Jarrín participated, along with Fernando Valenzuela and Pepe Yñiguez, in the first-ever regular season, dedicated, Spanish-language telecast of a Dodger game. Dodger broadcast partner PRIME TICKET aired the afternoon game against the Cubs on their sister network, FOX Sports West. When he was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame, Jarrín became only the second Spanish-language announcer to achieve that honor, joining Buck Canel. Jarrín was also the first recipient of the Southern California Sports Broadcaster Association’s President’s Award in February 1998.

He was given the highest award by the National Association of Hispanic Journalists in June 1998 and received a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame in Septem-

ber 1998. On June 21, 2002 Jarrín was inducted into the California Broadcasters Association Hall of Fame and on August 23, 2003, he was inducted into the Hispanic Heritage Baseball Museum during pre-game ceremonies at Dodger Stadium. In early 2004, he was honored by the Southern California Sports Broadcasters with the 2003 Foreign Language Sports Broadcaster Award and inducted into the Southern California Sports Broadcaster's Hall of Fame. Jarrín was honored again by the SCSB with the foreign-language broadcaster of the year award in 2003, 2004, 2005, 2007, 2008 and 2009. In 2009 he was honored by the Society of St. Vincent DePaul for his commitment to changing the lives of at-risk youth in the community.

His other honors included being awarded La Gran Cruz al Merito en El Grado de Comendador (the highest medal awarded to non-military personal) in his native Ecuador in January 1992 and being named as one of the top 100 Influential Hispanics in the United States in Hispanic Business Magazine in 1990. He won Golden Mike Awards in 1970 and 1971 and became the first Latin American to win that award. In 2000, he spoke at the MLB Rookie Development seminar, which is designed to prepare top minor league prospects for the Major Leagues. He has called more than 30 world championship boxing title bouts throughout the world for radio and television stations in Latin America, including the Thrilla in Manila between Muhammad Ali and Joe Frazier.

He has called 19 All-Star Games and 25 World Series, including the 2005 Fall Classic in which he served as the emcee for MLB's Latin Legends ceremony. His broadcasts of the All-Star Game, League Championship Series and World Series on CBS, the Latina Broadcasting Network, Cadena Latina and Caracol from 1989 to 1999 were carried on more than 300 stations.

In March 2006, Jarrín served as a play-by-play announcer for the inaugural World Baseball Classic. In 2011, Jarrín was honored by the American Federation of Television and Radio Artists (AFTRA) Foundation with a AFTRA Media and Entertainment Excellence Award. Also in 2011, Jarrín was the Hall of Fame recipient for the Associated Press Television-Radio Association (APTRA).

Jarrín studied philosophy, letters, journalism and broadcasting at Central University of Ecuador in Quito. Jarrín remains connected to his native Ecuador, presently funding a baseball academy in Guayaquil for kids between the ages of 7 and 12 with the help his friends and colleagues across MLB, with hopes of growing the sport in Ecuador.

The Dodger legacy for Jarrín now spans three generations in his own family as his son Jorge completed his first season as play-by-play announcer in Spanish for PRIME TICKET and his grandson Stefan played for the 2011 champion Arizona League Dodgers before being traded to Philadelphia last season.

Jarrín and his wife, Blanca, reside in Los Angeles.

RICK MONDAY BROADCASTER

Former Dodger outfielder and two-time Major League All-Star Rick Monday begins his 21st season as a Dodger broadcaster and 29th season overall with the organization, including eight as a player. He also spent three years calling Dodger games on cable television. The Emmy-Award winning broadcaster can be heard on the Dodgers' flagship station AM 570 Fox Sports Los Angeles and across the

Dodgers Radio Network.

In 2005, *USA Today* ranked the Dodgers' radio broadcast team, featuring Vin Scully, Monday and Charley Steiner, as Major League Baseball's best, based on a technical rating, a fan rating and an entertainment rating. The trio earned 28.5 points out of a possible 30.

In his current role, Monday serves as an analyst for all 162 games alongside play-by-play announcer Charley Steiner. For every game throughout the season, Monday is also a co-host on the radio pre-game show and in 2008, he was one of the hosts of the Dodgers' online webisodes titled "Inside Dodgertown."

Monday, who joined the Dodgers' broadcast team in 1993, began his broadcasting career as a sports anchor on KTTV in Los Angeles in 1985 while also calling play-by-play and hosting the pregame show for Dodger games on DodgerVision and Z Channel. He was nominated for an Emmy as host of the Dodgers' pregame show on KTTV's "Dodger Central" in 1988 and he earned an Emmy for Live Sports Coverage in 2001. Monday was also a color commentator for CBS-TV at the College World Series championship game in 1988. He moved to San Diego in 1989 and called play-by-play for the Padres on radio and television for four seasons.

The 2011 season marked the 35th anniversary of one of the most dramatic moments of Monday's playing career. While playing for the Chicago Cubs in 1976, he saved the American flag from being burned by two protesters in left field at Dodger Stadium on April 25. Al Campanis, former Dodger Vice President, Player Personnel, presented the flag to Monday after it was used as evidence in the case against the two protesters and former U.S. President Gerald Ford presented Monday with a Bicentennial Commendation for his service to others. On June 27, 2006, in honor of the 30th anniversary of his heroic efforts, the 109th Congress passed a senate resolution honoring Monday for his courage and patriotism and he was a guest of former President George W. Bush at the White House on several occasions. In 2011, Monday saving the flag was listed as the 19th greatest moment in LA sports history in an *Los Angeles Times* fan survey.

In 2006, Monday released his first book, "Tales from the Dodger Dugout," a retrospective on the 1981 World Championship club on which he played a key role.

A star at Arizona State University (ASU), Monday led the Sun Devils to the 1965 College World Series Championship and earned All-American and College Player of the Year honors before the Kansas City Athletics made him the first player ever selected in the Major League First-Year Player Draft. He was inducted into the ASU Hall of Fame in 1975. He also serves on the Advisory Board for ASU Baseball.

Monday made his Major League debut in 1966 and was named to the American League Rookie All-Star Team that year.

After spending six seasons with the Athletics, including an appearance on the 1968 American League All-Star team, and five seasons with the Cubs, Monday joined the Dodgers as part of a five-player trade in 1977. He played eight seasons for the Dodgers, helping them to a World Championship in 1981 and three NL pennants (1977, 1978, 1981), and was named to the NL All-Star squad in 1978. Overall, Monday compiled a .264 career batting average with 241 home runs and 775 RBI while appearing in five League Championship Series and three World Series.

The former left-handed hitter is also known for his dramatic, game-winning home run in the ninth inning of Game 5 of the 1981 N.L. Championship Series at Montreal, which gave the Dodgers a 2-1 victory and a berth in the World Series.

In 1977, Monday received the inaugural Humanitarian Award presented by Major League Baseball and in 1995 he was honored with the William A. Shea Distinguished Little League Graduate Award, which is given to a Major League Baseball player or individual who best exemplifies the spirit of the Little League Baseball program. A list of additional awards can be found below.

Monday and his wife, Barbaralee, who make regular visits to various veteran's hospitals throughout the year, reside in Vero Beach during the offseason.

CHARLEY STEINER BROADCASTER

Four-time Emmy Award-winner Charley Steiner enters his ninth season as a play-by-play announcer for the Dodgers. The veteran broadcaster will call the action for all games on the Dodgers' flagship station, AM 570 Fox Sports Los Angeles, alongside Rick Monday.

Before joining the Dodgers, Steiner broadcast three years for the New York Yankees on WCBS Radio and the YES Network. While with the Yankees, Steiner and his partner John

Sterling received the A.I.R. (Achievement in Radio), for best play-by-play.

Prior to his seasons with the Yankees, Steiner spent 14 years at ESPN, where his responsibilities ranged from anchoring SportsCenter to working play-by-play for Major League Baseball on ESPN Radio and Television. He was also the play-by-play voice for ESPN 2's Saturday Primetime football. He served as SportsCenter's primary boxing reporter/analyst and also contributed to the Emmy and CableACE Award-winning Outside the Line series. His nationally-acclaimed coverage of the Mike Tyson trial in Indianapolis earned him a Clarion award.

In December 2010, Steiner delivered the commencement address at his alma mater Bradley University's mid-year commencement and received an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree from the university. Steiner graduated from Bradley in 1971 and was inducted into the school's Sports Hall of Fame in 1995. He is also a member of Bradley's Centurion Society, which recognizes university alumni who have brought national and international credit to the school, and in 1991 received Bradley's Lydia Moss Bradley Award, which honors those who have given outstanding service to the school. Steiner has established the Charles H. Steiner Endowed Scholarship, which is given annually to Bradley broadcasting majors and in 2012 he was the keynote speaker at Bradley's Fifth Summit on Communication and Sport.

In 2009, Steiner won two Emmys for his broadcast work with PRIME TICKET for the network's "True Blue Stories," which aired during the Dodgers' 50th anniversary season.

In 2008, Steiner had the distinction of calling the Dodgers' historic two-game series in Beijing, China, the first ever Major League games played on Chinese soil. Steiner has called games in six different countries as he was also behind the microphone for ESPN in 1999 when MLB opened the season for the first time in Monterrey, Mexico and the first-ever Major League game in Puerto Rico in 2001. Steiner also called the 2004 Opening Day festivities for the Yankees in Tokyo, Japan.

In 2005, his first season with the Dodgers, USA Today ranked the club's radio broadcast team, featuring Hall of Famer Vin Scully, Rick Monday and Steiner, as Major League Baseball's best.

Steiner also has provided the reading voice for several books-on-tape, including Jane Leavy's "Sandy Koufax: A Lefty's Legacy," "Play Ball! (A Tribute to Our National Pastime)," and "As They See Them" by Bruce Weber, a book about Major League Baseball umpiring. He also served as the narrator for the DVD "Dodger Blue: The Championship Years," which was produced by Major League Baseball Productions.

In 2013, Steiner was once again behind the microphone for the World Baseball Classic, calling games for Major League Baseball International. In 2006, he served as the lead play-by-play announcer for XM Radio at the inaugural World Baseball Classic and hosted a radio show on XM from 2006-09. He also broadcast the 2009 World Baseball Classic for MLB.

He began his professional broadcasting career in 1969 at WIRL Radio in Peoria, Illinois as a newscaster. After a nine-month stint at KSTT Radio in Davenport, Iowa, Steiner moved to Connecticut, where he served as News Director at WAVZ radio in New Haven and, later, at WPOP radio in Hartford.

After a year and half in Cleveland working at WERE radio and WKYC television as a sportscaster, Steiner moved home to New York, where for the next seven years, he was the morning sportscaster on WOR radio, while serving as sports director for the RKO Radio Network.

In addition, Steiner called the play-by-play for the USFL New Jersey Generals and, later, for the New York Jets on WABC radio. He won the UPI Best Radio Sportscaster award for New York, New Jersey and Connecticut in 1981, 1983 and 1985, and the New York State Broadcasters Award for best radio play-by-play in 1983, 1984 and 1987 before joining ESPN. He spent five years calling the action for the Harvard-Yale football game each fall.

Steiner resides in Los Angeles and is originally from New York.



FERNANDO VALENZUELA BROADCASTER

The 2013 season marks Fernando Valenzuela's 11th as the color commentator for the Dodgers' Spanish-language radio broadcasts, keeping Fernandomania alive and well in Los Angeles. Valenzuela offers insight from a 17-year big league career alongside Hall of Fame broadcaster Jaime Jarrín and Pepe Yñiguez during all Dodger home

games and select road games.

Last season, on August 21, 2012, Valenzuela was honored with a bobblehead night celebrating his no-hitter on June 29, 1990. Valenzuela tossed the first Dodger no-hitter in a decade, blanking the St. Louis Cardinals, 6-0. It also marked the first time in the modern baseball era that two no-hitters have been pitched on the same day as Oakland pitcher Dave Stewart had thrown a no-hitter in Toronto prior to Valenzuela's. This promotion marked the fourth time that Valenzuela has been featured on a Dodger Stadium bobblehead, the most in Dodger Stadium history. The game was a sell out with more tickets than Opening Day 2012.

This offseason, on February 3, 2013, Valenzuela was inducted into the Caribbean Baseball Hall of Fame (Pabellón de la Fama del Caribe) during the 2013 Caribbean Series in Hermosillo, Sonora, Mexico. He was elected by a media contingent from Mexico, Puerto Rico, Venezuela and the Dominican Republic and like those at Cooperstown, the Caribbean winter-league inductees are required to be named on 75% of the ballots. Valenzuela earned 175 of a possible 200 points. On Friday, February 1, Valenzuela was part of the opening ceremonies for the new Estadio Sonora in Hermosillo where he threw the ceremonial first pitch in front of a sold out crowd and hundreds of media members. Valenzuela was honored for his big league career in addition to his career in la Liga Mexicana del Pacífico (LMP) as a pitcher for Mayos de Navojoa, Naranjeros de Hermosillo and Águilas de Mexicali where he played his last three professional seasons of his baseball career (2004-06).

In 2011, the city of Los Angeles and Los Angeles Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa selected the legendary lefty as the Hope of Los Angeles awardee. Valenzuela was honored at City Hall as part of LA's opening ceremonies for Latino Heritage Month. In 2008, Valenzuela was honored by National Spanish-language television network Univision at the first annual "Premios Deportes" as one of the most prominent Hispanic athletes in history with a lifetime achievement award, "Premio Leyenda Deportiva."

The 2011 season marked the 30th anniversary of Valenzuela's appearance on the scene as the emergency starter on Opening Day, 1981. He hurled a 2-0 shutout over the Houston Astros, one of five shutouts in his first eight starts that season. The improbable success near the beginning of his tremendous Major League career sparked "Fernandomania," a phenomenon which remains not only one of the most memorable periods in Dodger history but also in Southern California sports history. While leading the Dodgers to the World Championship that season, he became the first player in Major League history to be named Rookie of the Year and win a Cy Young Award in the same season. He baffled hitters with his signature screwball and packed opposing stadiums throughout the National League, while also earning the All-Star Game start in Cleveland. He still holds the rookie record for consecutive scoreless innings (35.0), as he began his Major League career with a 10-0 record and a 0.40 ERA (4ER/90.0 IP) including his late season call-up in 1980.

In 17 big league seasons, Valenzuela compiled a 173-153 record and a 3.54 ERA with Los Angeles, California, Baltimore, Philadelphia, San Diego and St. Louis. He was named to the National League All-Star team for six consecutive seasons from 1981-1986 and in 1986 he won 20 games while also earning the Rawlings Gold Glove Award. On June 29, 1990 Valenzuela reached the pinnacle of any pitcher's career, as he tossed a no-hitter while blanking the St. Louis Cardinals, 6-0. The southpaw's success and longevity allowed him to etch his name in the Dodger record books, as he ranks among the top 10 all-time in nearly every pitching category in Los Angeles Dodger history including wins (141, 5th), complete games (107, 4th), strikeouts (1759, 4th), shutouts (29, 5th), starts (320, 4th) and innings pitched (2,348.2, 4th). Among the all-time franchise leaders, Valenzuela is eighth in victories, fifth in strikeouts, seventh in shutouts and seventh in starts. His six Opening Day starts rank third in Los Angeles history to Don Drysdale and Don Sutton.

In 1986, Valenzuela completed 20 of his starts, the last big league pitcher to accomplish that feat. In fact, since 1980, only two pitchers have even reached 15 complete games in a year. But far more important than the

statistics he posted was the effect he had on baseball. When he made his Major League debut, he was just the seventh Mexican to play for the Dodgers and his impact on the game internationally is incalculable. He was inducted into the Hispanic Heritage Baseball Museum during pre-game ceremonies at Dodger Stadium on August 23, 2003 and in 2002, his first season eligible for Hall of Fame consideration, the left-hander garnered 31 votes. In July 2006, he was inducted into Baseball Reliquary's Shrine of the Eternals in Pasadena. In the 2009 World Baseball Classic, Valenzuela was the pitching coach for Mexico.

In February 2007, at its annual awards luncheon, the Southern California Sports Broadcasters Association named Valenzuela, a native of Navajoa, Sonora, Mexico, as the co-winner of the Foreign Language Broadcaster of the Year Award, marking his first such honor. In 2011, Valenzuela received his second Foreign Language Broadcaster of the Year Award. On August 23, 2009, Valenzuela participated, along with Hall of Fame Broadcaster Jaime Jarrín and Pepe Yñiguez, in the first-ever regular season, dedicated, Spanish-language telecast of a Dodger game. Dodger broadcast partner PRIME TICKET aired the afternoon game against the Cubs on their sister network, FOX Sports West.

In 2010, Valenzuela was the subject of an ESPN "30 for 30" film "Fernando Nation." The Dodgers supported the creation of the film directed by Cruz Angeles on the cultural impact of his career. "Fernando Nation" was added to ESPN's fall schedule and premiered on ESPN Deportes on October 24 and on ESPN on October 26. In 2011, Valenzuela made his first trip to the Dominican Republic to be inducted into the Latino Baseball Hall of Fame at Casa de Campo in La Romana.

Throughout his 10 seasons as a broadcaster, Valenzuela has teamed up with the Dodgers to bring children's groups from the community to select home games as part of the Amigos de Fernando Program. Valenzuela is committed to the Dodgers' Dreamfields program regularly attending dedications and participating in clinics. As a result of this and his continued community involvement, the Reviving Baseball in Inncities Program (RBI) honored Valenzuela with a Lifetime Achievement award at its annual banquet in February 2007. Valenzuela also hosted a Carne Asada Sunday event during the 2009 season. All proceeds from the event, at which fans got the chance to meet Valenzuela and enjoy carne asada with him, benefited the Dodgers Dream Foundation. Valenzuela supports the development of baseball in Mexico, hosting Little League teams from Mexico at Dodger Stadium and also maintaining a relationship with La Liga Mexicana del Pacifico (LMP), a league in which he played several years. Valenzuela returns to the 2013 WBC as pitching coach on Team Mexico. Valenzuela coached in the 2006 and 2009 World Baseball Classic tournaments. He is an avid golfer, active participant in the Dodgers' Latino initiatives including the year-long Viva Los Dodgers days and regularly participates in charity golf tournaments.

Valenzuela and his wife, Linda, have four children, Ricky, Fernando Jr., Linda and Maria Fernanda. He resides in Los Angeles.



On August 21, 2012, Valenzuela's first pitch on his bobblehead night was caught by Dodger infielder Luis "Cochito" Cruz. Valenzuela and Cruz are both native sons of Navajoa, Sonora, Mexico, and Cruz first met and was introduced to Valenzuela when he was a young boy by his father, Luis Cruz Sr., a former center fielder in the Mexican League.

PEPE YÑIGUEZ BROADCASTER

Spanish-language broadcaster Pepe Yñiguez begins his 15th full season and 16th overall with the Dodgers. After covering select broadcasting assignments for the Dodgers in 1998, Yñiguez made his debut in 1999 as a full-time broadcaster.

Yñiguez has been a member of the Dodgers' Spanish-language broadcast since 1992 and hosted the Dodgers' pre and post-game shows, "Hablando con los Dodgers," in 1993. He now calls play-by-play for all Dodger games on Univision America's KTNQ 1020, the Dodgers' Spanish-language radio broadcast home, alongside Hall of Fame Broadcaster Jaime Jarrín and Dodger legend Fernando Valenzuela.

In 2010 and 2011, Yñiguez also called select Dodger games in Spanish on PRIME TICKET alongside Dodger coach Manny Mota. In 2011, he called play-by-play for 27 games on television.

Since 1992, Yñiguez has broadcast numerous events for FOX Sports International, including every World Series from 1997-2005. In 1997, he called the All-Star Game at Jacobs Field in Cleveland alongside Tito Fuentes and Dennis Martinez. He has also broadcast the annual Caribbean Series.

From 1993-95, Yñiguez served as the color commentator for Los Angeles Raiders broadcasts. During past offseasons, he also hosted "Central Deportiva," a weekly sports talk show airing Sunday afternoons, on KWKW in Los Angeles.

Yñiguez has two daughters - Karissa and Jaquely - and two sons - Edgar and Alenrry - and resides in La Habra, CA.



ERIC COLLINS BROADCASTER

Eric Collins, 43, enters his fifth season as part of the Dodger broadcast team, calling play-by-play for road games outside of Arizona and California alongside analyst Steve Lyons on KCAL and PRIME TICKET.

Following his inaugural season on the Dodger broadcast in 2009, the Cleveland native was honored with the Harry Caray Broadcaster of the Year Award from the Pitch & Hit Club of Chicago, a professional baseball organization formed more than 60 years ago to promote goodwill toward the game and fellowship among professionals in baseball.

In addition to his work on the Dodger broadcasts, Collins serves as the lead play-by-play football announcer and one of two main basketball announcers for the Big Ten Network. He began his duties there in 2010 and also calls baseball and other spring sports for the network. Collins anchors the sports desk at NBC's Chicago affiliate, WMAQ-TV, twice a week as well.

Before joining the Big Ten Network, Collins was a play-by-play announcer for ESPN/ABC for seven years in its college football and basketball coverage. For six years, he called ESPN's College Baseball Super Regionals.

He is also one of the nation's preeminent voices for women's softball, having called the sport's World Cup for ESPN for the first five seasons that it was been played. Collins served as a play-by-play announcer at the Women's College World Series in 2007 and 2008 and also toured with Team USA on its Pre-Olympic Tours in 2004 and 2008.

Collins was the lead play-by-play announcer for NBC in its baseball coverage of the 2008 Olympic Games in Beijing, China. He performed radio and television play by play for the Chicago White Sox on occasions in 2004 and 2008.

Prior to joining ESPN/ABC, Collins spent four seasons calling minor league baseball for the Schaumburg Flyers and the Rochester Red Wings. He has served as a pregame and postgame host for the White Sox and Cubs and as a sideline reporter for the Chicago Bulls from 1997-2002.

Collins earned a Bachelor's degree from St. Lawrence University in Canton, NY prior to earning a Master's from Syracuse University.

He and his wife, Keri, make their home in Chicago with their daughters, Beatrice, 7, and Harriet, 4.



STEVE LYONS BROADCASTER

Steve Lyons enters his ninth season as a part of the Dodger broadcast team, as he provides analysis on road television broadcasts outside of Arizona and California and on PRIME TICKET's "Dodgers Live" pre and post-game show. As a part of PRIME TICKET's "Dodgers Live" team, Lyons provides analysis for a 30-minute pre-game show and full post-game coverage for all Dodger game telecasts on the network.

Lyons first earned national notoriety as a commentator on Fox Sports' coverage of Major League Baseball from 1996-2006, where he earned three National Emmy Awards and two additional Emmy nominations during his tenure with the network.

He began his Fox career as an analyst for the network's Saturday Baseball Game of the Week studio show, and made the natural transition to baseball analysis for Fox's game coverage. Lyons also served as one of the primary anchors on the Fox Sports Net News Desk, broadcasting nightly across all 21 FSN regions. He served as a color analyst on the Arizona Diamondbacks broadcasts for 50 games in 2003.

Lyons' nine-year Major League career included playing for the 1986 American League Champion Boston Red Sox team and the 1992 National League Champion Atlanta Braves. Lyons posted a career .262 batting average while playing for the Red Sox (1985-86 and 1991-93), Chicago White Sox (1986-1990), Braves (1992) and Montreal Expos (1992).

Known throughout baseball for his personality and wit, Lyons penned the 1995 autobiography "Psychoanalysis," which details his time in the minor leagues up through his retirement from the Major Leagues in 1993. He also released the book "The Psycho 100: Baseball's Most Outrageous Moments" in 2009.

Lyons, who attended Oregon State University, resides in Hermosa Beach. He has three daughters, Kristen (35), Kori (28) and Ally (14) and one grandson, Anthony (14).

VOICES OF SUMMER

In 2005, author Curt Smith released the book "Voices of Summer" which ranked the top 101 baseball broadcasters of all-time and the Dodgers had a total of 11 current or former broadcasters crack the list.

Among those were Vin Scully (1st), Ernie Harwell (3rd), Red Barber (5th), Jaime Jarrin (28th), Ross Porter (61st), Don Drysdale (63rd), Al Helfer (69th), Jerry Doggett (88th) and Connie Desmond (90th). Former Dodger Pee Wee Reese, who never broadcasted for the club but announced games for CBS and NBC's Game of the Week from 1960-68 after a 16-year big league career with the Dodgers, ranked 86th. Dodger broadcaster Charley Steiner was saluted by the author as one of four who nearly cracked the list.

The book ranked baseball's all-time greatest 101 announcers by "longevity, continuity, network coverage, kudos, language, popularity, persona, voice knowledge and miscellany." Each criterion was rated from 1-10, with the perfect score being 100.

Scully was the only broadcaster to reach that number.



JORGE JARRÍN BROADCASTER

Jorge Jarrín will join legendary Dodger Coach Manny Mota for a second season as play-by-play announcer for all games televised in Spanish on PRIME TICKET, while also serving as a co-host of Dodger Talk on AM 570 Fox Sports Los Angeles. In addition to his broadcasting duties, since 2004, Jarrín has overseen the Spanish-language Dodger radio broadcast sales, expanded the Dodger Spanish Radio Network and is directly involved in the Dodgers' Latino marketing initiatives.

Jarrín served as KABC Talk Radio's "Captain Jorge" for covering traffic from Jet Copter 790 from 1985 to 2011. The Associated Press of California honored Jarrín with four top awards for his work in reporting the Los Angeles Riots following the verdict of the LAPD/Rodney King trial. Additionally, the Associated Press also honored the Dodger broadcaster with an award for his live coverage of a Highway Patrol pursuit and hostage situation.

Jarrín is also the recipient of the coveted "Golden Mike Award" for "Best Live Coverage of a Late Breaking News Story" in 1993, given by the Southern California Radio and TV News Association. In 2001 and 2002 Jarrín was teamed with Jose Mota to form Direct TV's "Major League Baseball Game of the Week" broadcast team to all of Latin America. Also during this period, he filled in as a sports anchor on the KTLA News at 10:00 p.m.

Jarrín is most proud of his father, Hall of Famer Jaime Jarrín, longtime Spanish-language broadcaster for the Dodgers. Baseball continues as an integral part of the Jarrín family fabric. Jarrín's son, Stefan, was drafted and signed by the Dodgers in the 2011 MLB Draft before being traded to Philadelphia last year. An infielder, Stefan was a part of the 2011 MLB Arizona Rookie League Championship Dodgers, the first minor league championship team in the Dodger organization since 2005.

Jorge is actively involved in a number of charitable endeavors including Stillpoint Family Services, Villa Esperanza, the Ronald McDonald House of Pasadena and AltaMed Health Services. Jorge and his wife, Maggie, have been married 30 years and have three sons: Andrew, Phillip and Stefan.



MANNY MOTA BROADCASTER

Legendary Dodger Coach Manny Mota enters his fourth year as a Dodger broadcaster, calling all games televised in Spanish on PRIME TICKET. He celebrated his 50th season with the Dodgers in 2012. Mota serves as the analyst alongside Jorge Jarrín. Mota began calling games for the Dodgers in 2010 and his full bio can be found in the coaching section of the guide.

AGE IS JUST A NUMBER

In Dodger history, there have been 15 players who have made their big league debut before their 19th birthday, including Tommy Brown, the youngest Dodger to take the field when he did so on Aug. 3, 1944 at the age of 16 years and 173 days old. The most recent 18-year old to play for Los Angeles was Willie Crawford, who was 18 years and 9 days old when he played on Sept. 16, 1964.

Conversely, there have been just 14 players to appear for the Dodgers after turning 42, with the most recent case being David Wells, who was 44 years and 131 days old in his last game on Sept. 28, 2007. The oldest Dodger was Hoyt Wilhelm, who pitched for the Dodgers at 49 years and 349 days old on July 10, 1972.

RULES OF INTEREST

Batting Champion Qualifications: a batting champion must have 502 or more actual plate appearances (the equivalent of 3.1 appearances for each of the 162 scheduled games). If, however, there is any player with fewer than the required number of plate appearances whose average would be the highest if he were charged with the required number of official at-bats, then the player shall be awarded the batting championship.

Blown Save Definition: when a relief pitcher enters a game in a save situation and departs or the game ends with the save situation no longer in effect because he has given up the lead, he is charged with a "blown save." If the save opportunity still exists when he leaves the game, he is not charged with a save opportunity. If the pitcher has not given up the lead when he leaves the game, though the save opportunity may no longer exist, he is not charged with a save opportunity.

Consecutive Streaks: a consecutive hitting streak shall not be terminated if the player's plate appearances (one or more) result in a base on balls, hit batsman, defensive interference or sacrifice bunt. A sacrifice fly shall terminate the streak.

Consecutive-Game Hitting Streaks: a consecutive-game hitting streak shall not be terminated if all the player's plate appearances (one or more) result in base on balls, hit batsman, defensive interference or sacrifice bunt. The streak shall terminate if the player has a sacrifice fly and no hit.

Consecutive-Game Playing Streak: a consecutive-game streak shall be extended if the player plays one-half inning on defense, or if he completes a time at bat by reaching base or being put out. A pinch-running appearance only shall not extend the streak, if an umpire ejects a player from a game before he can comply with the requirements of this rule, his streak shall continue.

Determining the Magic Number: determine the number of games yet to be played, add one, and then subtract the number of games ahead in the loss column of standings from the closest opponent.

Determining Earned Run Average: multiply the number of earned runs by nine; take the number and divide it by the number of innings pitched.

Determining Slugging Percentage: divide the total bases of all safe hits by the total times at bat (at-bats do not include walks, sacrifices, hit by pitcher, or times awarded first because of interference or obstruction).

Determining On-Base Percentage: add the total of hits, walks and hit by pitches and divide by the total of at-bats, walks, hit by pitches and sacrifice flies.

Determining Fielding Average: divide the total putouts and assists by the total of putouts, assists and errors.

Earned Runs Rule: the determination of earned run is as follows:

An earned run is a run for which the pitcher is held accountable. In determining earned-runs, the inning should be reconstructed without the errors and passed balls; and the benefit of doubt should always be given to the pitcher in determining which bases would have been reached with errorless play. Until 1969, the reliever could not be charged with an earned run if he entered the game after the side could have been retired but for an error, no matter how many runs he subsequently gave up in that inning. Now, runs scored by batters who reach base off the reliever are charged as earned on that pitcher's record. They are not, however, shared as earned against the team as a whole. Therefore, a discrepancy may occur between the total earned runs charged against a team and the sum total of the earned runs charged against in the individual pitchers of that team. (Rule 10.18 (i))

Earned Run Average Champion Qualifications: to win the earned-run average championship a pitcher must pitch at least as many innings as the number of games scheduled for each club in his league that season and have the lowest earned-run average.

Emergency (60-Day) Disabled List: minimum period of inactivity is 60 calendar days. No limit on number of players on list at one time but shall only be used when club is at a maximum of 40 players under control. Players on 60-day list do not count against 40-man roster. Players placed on this list after Aug. 1 shall remain there for the balance of the season. Day 1 begins after said player's last game appearance.

Fielding Championship Qualifications: the individual fielding champions shall be the fielders with the highest fielding average at each position, provided:

- (1) A catcher must have participated as a catcher at least one-half the number of games scheduled for each club in his league that season;
- (2) An infielder or outfielder must have participated at his position in at least two-thirds of the number of games scheduled for each club in his league that season;
- (3) A pitcher must have pitched at least as many innings as the number of games scheduled for each club in his league that season.

EXCEPTION: if another pitcher has a fielding average as high or higher, and has handled more total chances in a lesser number of innings, he shall be the fielding champion.

First-Year Player Draft (Amateur Draft): Major League Clubs meet once a year for the purpose of drafting free agent player talent. Selection of a free agent entitles the club to the exclusive right of negotiation with that player. Approximate date of draft meetings: summer (early June). Clubs choose in inverse order of Major League standings, selecting free agents and previous draftees who had not signed contracts but had instead enrolled in four-year colleges and since had either completed his junior year or become 21 years of age.

Free Agency:

- I. Six years of Major League Service is required to be eligible.
- II. A player has 15 days from the first day following the World Series to file for free agency.

RULES OF INTEREST (CONTNUED)

Major League Waiver (ML): this type of revocable waiver is common as it is used to either option a player to a club's minor league affiliate or assign a player outright to another major league club from Aug. 1 to the end of the regular season. A player claimed on this type of waiver may be pulled back by the requesting club. This is known as a waiver withdrawal. Generally a club needs to secure this type of waiver in order to option a player if the date of the assignment is three or more years after the date the player first reported to a Major League club during a championship season. One year shall be deducted from the above three-year period for each season in which the player may have been charged with an option prior to first reporting to a Major League club during a championship season. A claimed player pulled back by the requesting club may not be assigned and cannot be placed on waivers again. When ML waivers are asked for a second time in the same period the request shall state that is irrevocable.

Regular (15-Day) Disabled List: the minimum period of inactivity is 15 calendar days. No limit on number of players that may be on at one time.

Rookie Qualification: a player shall be considered a rookie unless, during a previous season, he has (a) Exceeded 130 at-bats or 50 innings pitched in the Major Leagues; or (b) Accumulated more than 45 days on the active roster of a Major League club or clubs during the period of a 25-man limit (excluding time in military service or time on the disabled list).

Save Rule: a pitcher shall be credited with a save when he meets all three of the following conditions:

- (1) He is the finishing pitcher in a game won by his club, and
- (2) He is not the winning pitcher, and
- (3) He qualifies under one of the following conditions:
 - a) He enters the game with a lead of no more than three runs and pitcher for at least one inning,
 - b) He enters the game regardless of the count, with the potential tying run either on base, at-bat, or on deck (that is, the potential tying run is either already on base or is one of the two first batsmen he faces), or
 - c) He pitches effectively for at least three innings.

Tough Save: the reliever comes into the game with the tying runs on base and saves the game. Example: reliever comes in with a 5-3 lead, two outs and the bases loaded in the ninth inning.

Trading Regulations: the trading deadline is July 31. Trades may be made with any other Major League club in the period from the end of the championship season through July 31 without waivers. Waivers are required, however:

1. If the assignment is to another major league club; from August 1 and ending the day after the end of the season.
2. If assignment is to a minor league club, with right of recall, after acquiring three years of major league service; at any time during the year.
3. If assigned to a minor league club without right of recall, after acquiring three years service; at any time during the year.
4. If assigned to a minor league club, without right of recall, at any time prior to acquiring three years of service, special waivers are required between Sept. 1 and the opening of the following season. If player is claimed, request may be withdrawn. If no claims are made, club has seven-day period in which to make assignment to minor leagues.

Unconditional Release Waiver (UR): this irrevocable waiver is used for the purpose of an unconditional release of a player. At the time of the request the player shall be removed from all player limits. A player may be informed of the club intention to release him on a weekend, but the actual waiver process won't begin until the following business day. During the time a player is on an unexpired waiver request bulletin he may discuss employment with other clubs but may not contract with another club. If the player has been claimed, he must be informed the end of the two-day period that his contract has been claimed. The player has five days from the time he was notified of the claim to either accept the assignment or terminate his contract. If the player terminates his contract, he forfeits termination pay. Termination pay may vary.

Waiver Rules: a permission granted from all 30 clubs to assign a Major League player's contract to another Major League team or a minor league affiliate. Such permission is granted only for a specific period of time. The actual request is filed through the Commissioner's Office and is not disclosed to the public until the contract is rewarded.

Winning Pitcher: the starting pitcher will be credited with the win only if the pitcher has pitched at least five complete innings and his team not only is in the lead when he is replaced, but remains in the lead for the remainder of the game. EXCEPTION: the "must-pitch-five-complete" rule in respect to the starting pitcher shall be in effect for all games of six or more innings. In a five-inning game, credit the starting pitcher with a game won only if he has pitched at least four complete innings and his team not only is in the lead when he is replaced, but remains in the lead the remainder of the game. When the starting pitcher does not meet the preceding criteria and more than one relief pitcher is used, the victory shall be awarded on the following basis:

- (1) When, during the tenure of the starting pitcher, the winning team assumes the lead and maintains it to the finish of the game, credit the victory to the relief pitcher judged by the official scorer to have been the most effective.
- (2) Whenever the score is tied, the game becomes a new contest insofar as the winning and losing pitcher is concerned.
- (3) Once the opposing team assumes the lead, all pitchers who have pitched up to that point are excluded from being credited with the victory except the current pitcher.
- (4) The winning relief pitcher shall be the one who is the pitcher of record when his team assumes the lead and maintains it to the finish of the game. EXCEPTION: do not credit a victory to a relief pitcher who is ineffective in a brief appearance, when a succeeding relief pitcher pitches effectively in helping his team maintain the lead. In such cases, credit the succeeding relief pitcher with the victory.

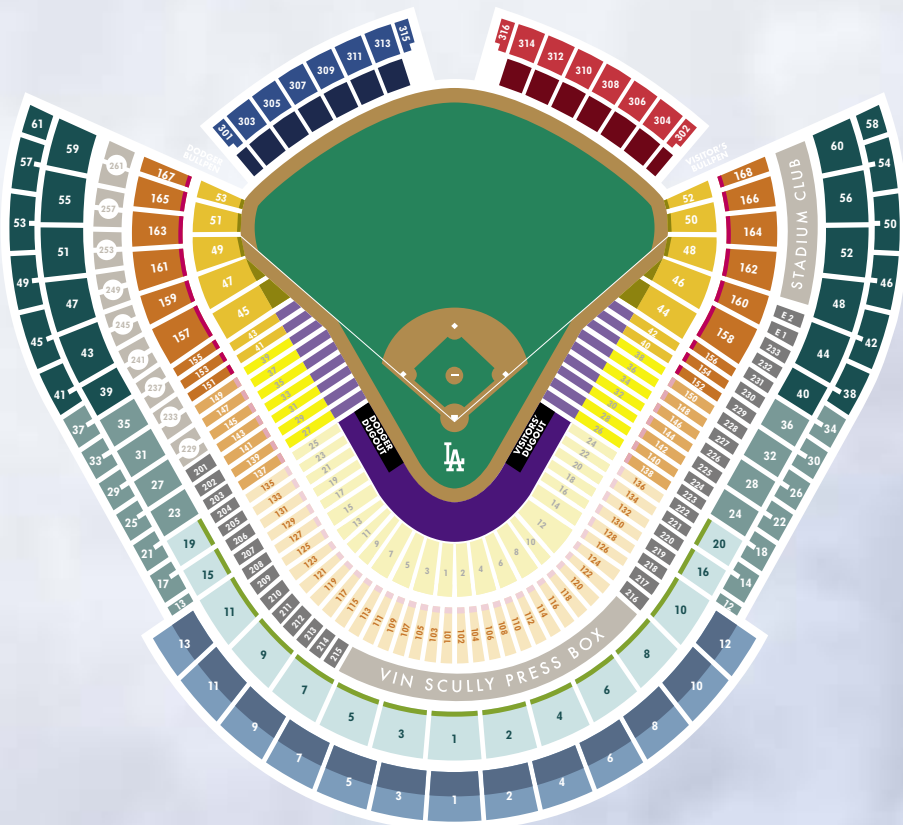
