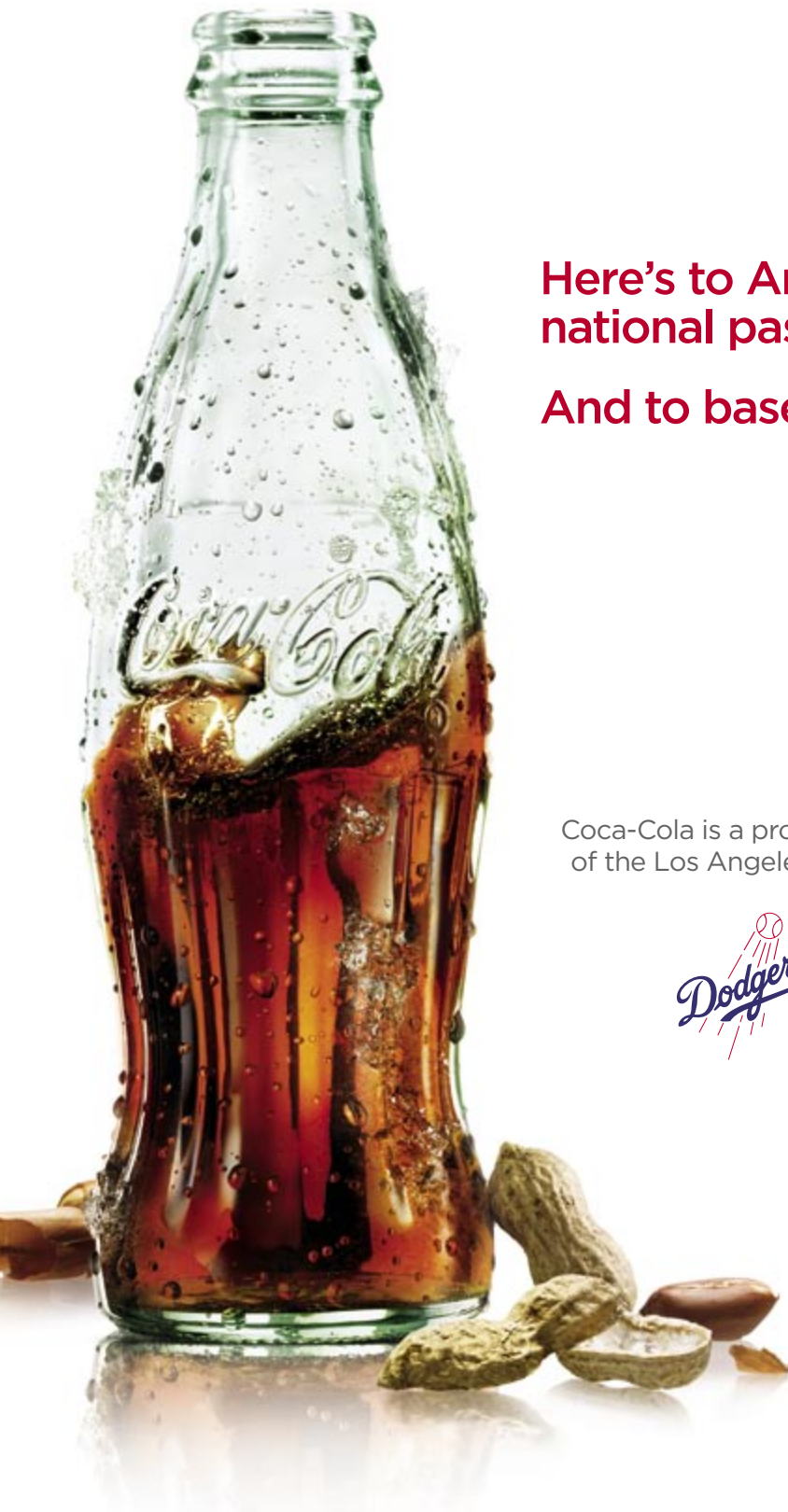

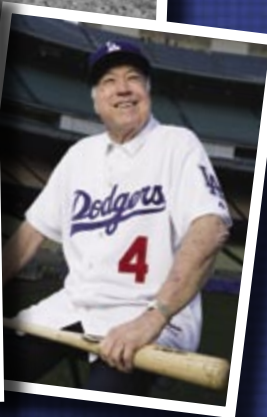
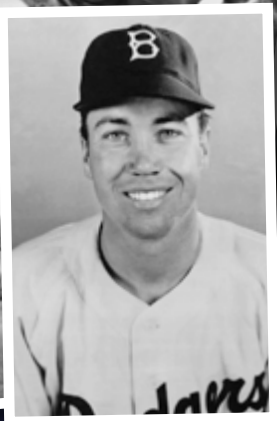

OWNER & CHAIRMAN

Frank H. McCourt Jr. became the fourth owner of the Los Angeles Dodgers after receiving unanimous approval from Major League Baseball on January 29, 2004. McCourt has established four goals - to field a championship-caliber team each and every year; to provide the fans with the best experience in sports; to give back to the community in a meaningful way; and to always treat one another with integrity and respect.

Under his stewardship, the Dodgers have reached postseason play four of the last seven seasons, joining the Phillies and Cardinals as the only National League teams to accomplish that feat. The 2009 club had the best record in the National League, won an NL West title for the second consecutive season, and swept its first-round opponent for the second time in as many years, reaching back-to-back National League Championship Series for the first time in 31 years (1977-78). Prior to McCourt purchasing the team, the franchise had not reached the NLCS or won a postseason game in the previous 15 years.

The team's success on the field can be attributed primarily to the organization's commitment to finding top amateur talent around the globe, developing those players to play baseball "The Dodger Way" and to supplement that talent through free agency and trades, when necessary.

In addition to the team's performance, the significant enhancements to Dodger Stadium have contributed to record attendance, as the team's five highest attendance marks have all coming during his tenure.

McCourt has invested \$150 million in stadium improvements designed to allow Dodger Stadium, which is entering its 50th season, to thrive in modern times. Recent improvements include replacing all of the seats in the stadium bowl; installing a new playing surface, including drainage improvements; renovating concourses with new and expanded concessions and other amenities; reconfiguring the parking lots to improve traffic flow (including a new transportation center); doubling the size of the Dugout Club; renovating the Stadium Club; creating two new Baseline Box Clubs; making significant upgrades to the video in-game experience; and completing numerous structural and voluntary seismic upgrades.

In 2009, another of McCourt's visions became a reality with the creation of Camelback Ranch - Glendale, a state-of-the-art year-round training facility in Arizona that brought Dodger Spring Training close to Southern California fans for the first time. The fans responded by setting a Cactus League record for attendance. The site was honored by Ballpark Digest with an Editor's Choice award, as the publication called Camelback Ranch "a bold re-imagining of the Spring Training complex, bringing in the feel of a classic training camp with all the amenities of today... Camelback Ranch-Glendale provides plenty of great memory-making moments for fans old and young."

In 2008, McCourt enhanced the team's legacy of both embracing change and bringing baseball to other parts of the world by playing the first Major League Baseball games (exhibition) in China. Last year, the Dodgers returned to the Far East for a pair of exhibition games in Taiwan.

McCourt's commitment to the community is realized through the Dodgers Dream Foundation, which focuses on four key "bases" - first, recreation; second, education; third, health; and "home plate", the environment. Each base has a signature program: the Dodgers Dreamfields initiative has built or refurbished 10 baseball fields around Los Angeles and is committed to building another 40; the Dodgers Scholars program is a collaboration with the Jackie Robinson Foundation, and provides 42 college scholarships per year; ThinkCure! is the club's official charity, in partnership with City of Hope and Children's Hospital Los Angeles, from which nearly \$1 million has already been granted; and to complete the community diamond, the organization has made a commitment to the environment and will "Think Blue and Act Green," as recent projects have been undertaken to help clean the L.A. River and the Pacific Ocean via a partnership with Heal the Bay.

In addition to the front office staff and management team, McCourt relies on the guidance of three Special Advisors -- former pitching star and social pioneer Don Newcombe (appointed in 2009); medical pioneer Dr. Frank Jobe (appointed in 2008); and legendary Hall of Famer Tommy Lasorda (appointed in 2006).

While McCourt's efforts have greatly benefited the franchise over the past seven years, they expand beyond Dodger Stadium. In September 2008, McCourt purchased the Los Angeles Marathon with the goal of turning it into a world class race. Last year, he delivered a new stadium-to-sea course that led runners past a number of Los Angeles landmarks from Dodger Stadium through West Hollywood, Beverly Hills, Veteran's Administration property and Santa Monica. For his efforts, McCourt was honored by the Santa Monica Chamber of Commerce in 2010.

In 1977, the Boston native founded The McCourt Company (now the McCourt Group), which specializes in the development of major commercial real estate projects. His real estate development roots span five generations, and his family has been associated with many major Boston real estate projects, including the city's Back Bay, Logan Airport, and Boston's waterfront. McCourt earned a reputation as a visionary leader and influential businessman, leaving a positive and lasting impact on the city of Boston and revolutionizing Boston's new Seaport. Today, this booming area boasts a new convention center, hotels, offices, residential buildings and numerous commercial, government and cultural facilities. The McCourt Company moved to Los Angeles in 2006.

McCourt serves on the Board of Directors of Georgetown University, from which he graduated in 1975, and co-chaired Georgetown University's Third Century Campaign (New England Region), which raised more than \$1 billion for the university. He is active in an array of educational, trade, civic and charitable organizations, including serving as President of the Dodgers Dream Foundation, and Founding Chairman of ThinkCure!

McCourt has four sons -- Drew, Travis, Casey and Gavin -- whom he has often said he expects will someday take over as stewards of the Dodger franchise.

A HISTORY OF DODGER OWNERSHIP

When Frank McCourt officially purchased the Dodgers from News Corp. on January 29, 2004, he became owner of one of the most successful franchises in Major League Baseball history. Since the Dodgers entered the National League in the 1890 season, they have made 27 postseason appearances, the second most in the Major Leagues and have made 18 World Series appearances, second most all time to the New York Yankees.

TOMMY LASORDA

SPECIAL ADVISOR TO THE CHAIRMAN

Regarded by many as baseball's most popular ambassador, Tommy Lasorda begins his 62nd season in the Dodger organization and sixth as Special Advisor to the Chairman. He was named Vice President in 1996 after retiring as manager, a position he held for the previous 20 seasons. Lasorda assumed all player personnel responsibilities when he was named the Dodgers' interim General Manager on June 22, 1998. He relinquished his General Manager duties when he was promoted to Senior Vice President on Sept. 11, 1998.

In his current position, Lasorda reports directly to the Office of the Chairman, serving as an advisor on all areas of the Dodger organization for Owner & Chairman Frank McCourt. Lasorda's current responsibilities include scouting, evaluating and teaching minor league players, acting as an advisor and ambassador for the Dodgers' international affiliations, and representing the franchise at more than 100 speaking engagements and appearances to various charities, private groups and military personnel each year. He has spoken to troops at more than 40 military bases around the world, including a five-country goodwill tour in 2009 with Admiral Mike Mullen, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. They visited troops throughout the Middle East.

Lasorda compiled a 1,599-1,439 record and won two World Championships, four National League pennants and eight division titles in an extraordinary 20-year career as the Dodgers' manager. He ranks 17th with 1,599 wins and 16th with 3,038 games managed in Major League history. His 16 wins in 30 NL Championship Series games managed were the most of any manager at the time of his retirement in 1996. His 61 postseason games managed ranks fifth all-time behind Joe Torre (138), Bobby Cox (136), Tony LaRussa (107), and Casey Stengel (63). He is only one of five managers to manage the same team for 20 years or more, joining Walt Alston, Connie Mack, John McGraw and Bobby Cox.

Lasorda's role in the globalization of the game of baseball is now more evident than ever before, as Commissioner Selig appointed him as the Official Ambassador of the inaugural World Baseball Classic in 2006, and again for the 2009 Classic that was played at Dodger Stadium. In that capacity, Lasorda served as a spokesperson for the tournament and continued his travels around the globe to promote the game of baseball, as he has visited 28 countries in his lifetime - Australia, Canada, Columbia, China, Chinese Taipei, Cuba, Denmark, England, the Dominican Republic, Italy, Japan, Mexico, Monaco, Norway, Panama, Puerto Rico, Scotland, South Korea, Spain, Sweden, Venezuela, Bermuda, Egypt, Iraq, Afghanistan, Turkey, Ireland and throughout the United States. In 2008, he was awarded with the Order of the Rising Sun, Gold Rays with Rosette by the Emperor of Japan for his contributions to Japanese baseball. He has made countless trips to Japan over the years, serving as a key liaison between the Dodgers and the Orix Buffaloes in their "friendship" agreement. Lasorda was also the Dodger ambassador for other "friendship" agreements that the Dodgers had with other Asian teams including the LG Twins from Korea and the Sinon Bulls from Taiwan. He also threw out the first pitch in the China Baseball League's first "World Series" in 2002.

As baseball's ambassador, Lasorda was called upon by Commissioner Allan H. (Bud) Selig to star in an ad campaign on behalf of Major League Baseball during the 2006 postseason. The campaign, entitled "Tommy's Tough Love," featured Lasorda in a tuxedo, motivating fans to continue to watch baseball even though their favorite team was not in postseason play.

In 2009 Lasorda had his portrait installed in the Smithsonian Institution's National Portrait Gallery. The portrait, which measures 60x50 inches, was painted by Everett Raymond Kinstler, and was presented to the Smithsonian as part of the celebration of his 60th season with the Dodgers.

During his six-decade career, Lasorda has met seven U.S. Presidents - Richard Nixon, Gerald Ford, Jimmy Carter, Ronald Reagan, George H.W. Bush, Bill Clinton, and George W. Bush, who asked Lasorda to serve as a delegate to the U.S. National Day at the World Exposition in Aichi, Japan in June 2005. The World Exposition was not the first time that President Bush has called upon Lasorda for his assistance, as the Hall of Fame manager participated in the festivities surrounding the President's inauguration in January 2005. Two months later, Lasorda accompanied Frank McCourt, in addition to the family of Jackie Robinson, during a visit to the White House to represent the Dodgers in a ceremony that posthumously awarded Robinson with the Congressional Gold Medal. In 2007, Lasorda joined Dodger legend Don Newcombe in leading a contingent of Little Leaguers from Los Angeles to Washington D.C. for a tee-ball game on the South Lawn of the White House.

In 1997, Lasorda was elected to the National Baseball Hall of Fame by the Veterans Committee in his first year of eligibility. He was the 14th manager and 52nd Dodger inducted into the Hall of Fame. In 2007, Lasorda was asked by the Hall of Fame to be a member of the committee on managers and umpires, leading to the elections of Billy Southworth and Dick Williams to Cooperstown. He served the Hall in the same capacity in 2009 that led to the election of Whitey Herzog and Doug Harvey.

Though the National Baseball Hall of Fame is his most prestigious, Lasorda has been enshrined in 17 different Halls of Fame, including the Chattanooga Professional Baseball HOF (2010), Brooklyn Dodgers HOF (2009), Philadelphia Sports HOF (2009), Ogden Professional Baseball HOF (2009), Albuquerque Baseball HOF

(2009), Inland Empire 66ers HOF (2009), International League HOF (2008), Pacific Coast League HOF (2006), Canadian Baseball HOF (2006), Italian American Sports HOF (1989), California Sports HOF (2006), Montgomery County Coaches HOF (2002), South Atlantic League (2001), Albuquerque Baseball HOF (2007), Louisiana Italian American HOF (1985), and the Rhode Island Italian American HOF.

Lasorda's uniform number (2) was retired by the Dodgers on Aug. 15, 1997 and the main street that leads to the entrance of Dodgertown in Vero Beach, FL was renamed Tommy Lasorda Lane on March 5, 1997. He also threw out the first pitch in Game 7 of the 1997 World Series.

During the 2000 Olympic Games in Sydney, Australia, Lasorda managed an underdog United States team to the Gold Medal over the highly favored Cuban National team just five days after celebrating his 73rd birthday. The Olympic Gold Medal, which Lasorda considers his greatest professional achievement, marked his return to the dugout after his retirement in 1996.

Lasorda posted a 3-1 record as the NL manager in four All-Star Games. He joined St. Louis' Gabby Street (1930-31) as the only managers in NL history to win league titles in his first two seasons when he led the Dodgers to titles in 1977-78. Lasorda also managed nine of the Dodgers' 16 Rookies of the Year, more than any other big league skipper in history.

Prior to replacing Hall of Famer Walter Alston as manager on Sept. 29, 1976, Lasorda spent four seasons in Los Angeles on Alston's coaching staff from 1973-76. He spent eight seasons as a manager in the Dodgers' minor league system at Pocatello (1965), Ogden (1966-68), Spokane (1969-71) and Albuquerque (1972). Lasorda also spent four years as a Dodger scout after retiring as a player following the 1960 season. An astounding 75 players Lasorda managed in the minor leagues went on to play in the Majors and he serves as a godfather to nearly a dozen of their children.

Lasorda compiled an 0-4 record and 6.52 ERA as a left-handed pitcher in parts of three Major League seasons with the Brooklyn Dodgers (1954-55) and Kansas City Athletics (1956). In all, he spent 14 seasons in the minor leagues from 1945-60 and he served two years in the military from 1946-47.

He has won numerous awards throughout his career, including being named Minor League Manager of the Year by The Sporting News in 1970, Manager of the Year by UPI and AP in 1977, Manager of the Year by AP in 1981 and N.L. Manager of the Year by Baseball America and Co-Manager of the Year by The Sporting News in 1988. He was the recipient of the Association of Professional Baseball Players of America's inaugural Milton Richman Memorial Award with Sparky Anderson in 1987, the BBWAA Philadelphia Chapter's Humanitarian Award in 1993, Los Angeles Junior Chamber of Commerce's Award of Merit in 1997, Touchdown Club of Columbus' Baseball Ambassador of the Year in 1997, Arete's Courage in Sports Award in 1997, and was honored by the President of the Dominican Republic in 1997 for his dedication to the game of baseball throughout his career. In September 2006, Lasorda received the Branch Rickey Award from the Denver Rotary Club for his lifetime of community service.

Lasorda has been a spokesperson for the American Heart Association and regularly visits patients at the Tom Lasorda Heart Institute at Centinela Hospital Medical Center in Inglewood, CA, which opened on Nov. 6, 2000. He is a founding member of the Professional Baseball Scouts Foundation and serves on its Board of Directors. The PBSF now gives an annual award in his name for the most outstanding manager of the year and in 2006, the first year of its existence, Lasorda received the award as the Manager of the Century. Lasorda also sits on the board for the Statue of Liberty/Ellis Island Foundation, and the U.S. Army Recruiting Advisory Council.

Three years ago, Lasorda was part of the selecting committee for the All-Time Rawlings Gold Glove Awards and was also asked to be a part of a committee to rank the 100 Most Powerful People in Sports by BusinessWeek and ESPN.

He has received honorary doctorate degrees from Pepperdine University, St. Thomas University, Cal State Long Beach, University of Phoenix, Concordia University, the University of Hawaii, Argosy University and Cypress College. In February 2003, he was honored by Cal Tech when he became only the second person to ever have an asteroid named after them. His asteroid is #6128, otherwise known as Asteroid Lasorda.

Many of Lasorda's greatest accomplishments and stories have been compiled in "I Live For This," his autobiography that came out in 2007, which he wrote with Los Angeles Times columnist Bill Plaschke. His first book, "The Artful Dodger" was released in 1986.

Lasorda and his wife, Jo, have been married for 60 years. They reside in Fullerton, CA, and will celebrate their 61st wedding anniversary on April 14, 2010. The couple renamed a gymnasium and youth center in memory of their son, Tom Jr., in Yorba Linda, CA on Sept. 7, 1997. They are also the proud grandparents of Emily Tess (15), the child of their daughter, Laura Lasorda.





DR. FRANK JOBE SPECIAL ADVISOR TO THE CHAIRMAN

Dodgers

A legend in the field of medicine and baseball, Dr. Frank Jobe enters his fourth season as a Special Advisor to the Chairman and 47th season in the Dodger organization. Amazingly, more than 35 years have passed since Jobe made history and altered the sport forever.

It was 1974 when Dodger pitcher Tommy John was diagnosed with a ruptured medial collateral ligament (MCL) in his left elbow, an injury that previously had no cure. That is, until Sept. 25 when Jobe tried a procedure in which he removed a tendon from John's forearm and repaired his elbow. John, who had won 124 games prior to the operation, went on to pitch 14 years after the operation, compiling 164 more victories in that time, without ever missing a start due to elbow problems.

Since then, Jobe has performed more than 1,000 Tommy John surgeries on pitchers of every level, helping to resurrect the careers of countless big leaguers and his fellowship program at the Kerlan-Jobe clinic has trained more than 250 fellows over the years. On Feb. 21, 2008, the Dodgers announced that he had been promoted to Special Advisor to Chairman Frank McCourt and he took part in a special pregame ceremony at Holman Stadium in Vero Beach, FL. Jobe was honored again in front of the home crowd at Dodger Stadium on Sept. 23, 2008 in a ceremony that included his two most famous patients, John and former Dodger Orel Hershiser, among others.

"Dr. Jobe's contribution to the game is only bested by the exemplary character he has bestowed upon our organization for more nearly 50 years," McCourt said. "If ever a person had Hall of Fame credentials, it is this history-making medical pioneer."

Of course, since Jobe's experiment on John, several things have changed about the procedure. What was once a four-hour surgery can now be done in about an hour and the rate of recovery has increased exponentially. Though Jobe originally put John's chances of returning to the Major Leagues at less than five percent, Jobe now estimates that 92 to 95 percent of patients will return as good, if not better, than prior to the surgery.

In fact, the procedure has become so valuable that in recent years, players have signed multi-year contracts just months after they have the surgery in expectation of a high-level return.

In honor of the 30th anniversary of his ground-breaking efforts, the Dodgers honored Jobe on March 31, 2004 prior to a Spring Training game in Vero Beach, FL and again during the year at Dodger Stadium.

Jobe, who began his association with the Dodgers in 1964 and has been their orthopedic doctor since 1968, found himself in the right place again 16 years after saving John's career, as he reconstructed the right shoulder of former Cy Young Award winner Orel Hershiser, another procedure that had never been successfully performed on a Major League pitcher.

Hershiser's rehabilitation was a success and he presented Jobe with the game ball from his 100th career victory, which came in 1991, his first win after the surgery. Former Dodger Darren Dreifort made a similar gesture while rehabilitating at Dodger Stadium.

His trophy featured a plastered replica of Dr. Jobe's hands holding a surgical instrument with a handwritten message from the Dodger pitcher.

"When you first begin working out after the surgery, it's frustrating and it gets to be monotonous," said Dreifort. "But the flip side is without the surgery and Dr. Jobe, you wouldn't be out there playing catch."

Jobe, a native of North Carolina who studied at Loma Linda Medical School and did his residency at Los Angeles County hospital, has often been mentioned as a candidate for enshrinement in the National Baseball Hall of Fame, alongside other non-playing personnel like former Dodger owner Walter O'Malley.

A review of the careers he's rescued lends credence to the argument.

"The most satisfying feeling in medicine is to watch a patient from the time of the injury until he's well and back to 100 percent," said Jobe. "This is very satisfying because it's something I took part in from the beginning. Also, it's interesting that sports surgery in particular really wasn't developed until the late 1950s. So when Tommy came along in the 1970s, there was an opportunity and I happened to be the right guy in the right place."

DON NEWCOMBE

SPECIAL ADVISOR TO THE CHAIRMAN

Don Newcombe enters his 56th season in the Dodger organization and 41st year as the team's director of community relations. In 2009, he added a new title as Special Advisor to Chairman Frank McCourt.

Still the only man in baseball history to win the sport's three major honors - Rookie of the Year, Most Valuable Player and Cy Young Award - Newcombe played an often overlooked role in the country's civil rights movement, along with Dodger teammates Jackie Robinson and Roy Campanella.

Newcombe, 83, spent the first seven years of his 10-year big league career with the Brooklyn Dodgers before joining the franchise in its move to Los Angeles in 1958. The right-handed pitcher helped the Dodgers win their first World Championship in 1955, leading the National League that season with an .800 winning percentage (20-5). That season, he also became the first NL pitcher to hit seven home runs in a season.

The New Jersey native was a four-time National League All-Star and registered a record of 149-90 with 1,129 strikeouts and a 3.56 ERA, 136 complete games and 24 shutouts. He pitched in three World Series and at 22 years old in 1949, he became the second rookie ever to start the opening game of a World Series, striking out 11 Yankees in eight innings.

In 1951, Newcombe won 20 games for the first time in his career and then missed the following two seasons while serving his country during the Korean War. He later won 20 games again in 1955 and led the league with 27 wins in 1956.

Following his Major League career, Newcombe signed with the Chunichi Dragons of Japan's Nippon Professional Baseball in 1962 and became the first former Major League player to play in the Japanese League. He batted .262 with 12 homers in 279 at-bats before ending his playing career.

In 1980, his final year of eligibility, Newcombe received 59 votes (15.3 percent) for enshrinement in the National Baseball Hall of Fame.

When he signed with the Newark Eagles of the Negro Leagues in 1945, Newcombe had no idea he was on the verge of changing the course of sports history. Dodger President Branch Rickey had decided to integrate Major League Baseball, as an unwritten rule had prevented blacks from playing since the 1880s.

Rickey secretly began scouting players from the Negro Leagues and he eventually signed Jackie Robinson, catcher Roy Campanella and Newcombe. In 1946, the trio broke the minor league color barrier as Robinson played at Triple-A Montreal while Newcombe and Campanella were standouts for the Class B Nashua Dodgers of the New England League.

Robinson joined the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1947 and he won National League Rookie of the Year honors. Campanella was promoted to the Dodgers in 1948, and Newcombe finally arrived in May 1949. From 1949 to 1956, the Dodgers played in five World Series and narrowly missed the playoffs in 1950 and 1951.

While the Dodgers were winners on the field, the trio still faced challenges off the field. There were death threats, isolation, degradation and insults hurled by fans and opponents, along with snide comments from certain Dodger teammates. Throughout the early 1950s, there were some hotels and restaurants that wouldn't serve black players during the season.

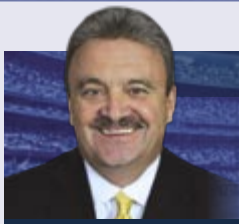
After his career, Newcombe had a fateful meeting with Dr. Martin Luther King, just 28 days before his assassination in 1968. Concluding a tour of speech-making, protests marches and peaceful demonstrations, King had dinner at Newcombe's home in Los Angeles before King returned to Atlanta.

According to Newcombe, King said, "Don, you'll never know how easy you and Jackie and (Larry) Doby and Campy (Roy Campanella) made it for me to do my job by what you did on the baseball field."

Ten years after his retirement in 1960, Newcombe started the Dodgers' Community Relations Department in 1970. He makes dozens of appearances throughout the Los Angeles area each season, speaking to youngsters and participating in the Dodgers' Alumni Association. In that role, he has helped numerous people in their battles against substance abuse.

NED COLLETTI GENERAL MANAGER



Ned Colletti enters his sixth season as General Manager of the Los Angeles Dodgers, a position to which he was appointed on Nov. 16, 2005. In this capacity, he is responsible for overseeing the team's baseball operations, including all scouting, player personnel and player development.

Colletti is the 10th general manager in Los Angeles Dodger history and is entering his 30th year in Major League Baseball. During his five years at the helm of the club, the team has reached the postseason three times, making him the first general manager in Dodger history to accomplish that feat. Colletti reached 400 victories as a GM in 2010, hitting that milestone in 744 games, which was faster than every GM in Dodger history besides Buzzie Bavasi (723 games).

Since Colletti joined the Dodgers, inheriting a team that finished with a 71-91 record, the team has posted a 429-381 record (.530), the second-best mark in the National League behind the Phillies (.563). Among NL West opponents, the Dodgers lead second-place Colorado by 14.5 games during the five-year span. Among the 30 current Major League GMs, only Brian Cashman, Theo Epstein, Billy Beane and Doug Melvin constructed teams that reached the postseason in at least three of their first five years.

Most recently, Topps named the Dodgers as Organization of the Year in 2010. The prestigious award dates back to 1966 and highlights the Major League team that has shown outstanding performance, depth and talent throughout their Major and Minor League teams.

Since joining the Dodgers, Colletti has been charged with competing for the postseason each year while keeping the team's abundance of young talent intact for the future. To that end, he has put together a team for 2011 centered around a core group of players under the age of 28 while surrounding them with established veterans under first-year manager and former American League MVP, Don Mattingly, whom Colletti hired.

During the offseason, Colletti signed 10 free agents - including four starting pitchers - to significantly upgrade the pitching staff. In addition, he inked infielder Juan Uribe and reliever Matt Guerrier to three-year deals to solidify the roster.

Colletti has quickly become known throughout the game for his success at obtaining talent during the season, particularly at the trade deadline. Among the key contributors he has added in midseason over the past several years are three likely Hall of Famers - Manny Ramirez, Greg Maddux (twice) and Jim Thome - as well as veterans Ted Lilly, Scott Podsednik, Ryan Theriot, Octavio Dotel, Casey Blake, Vicente Padilla, George Sherrill, Ronnie Belliard and Jon Garland. Colletti's first trade as GM netted outfielder Andre Ethier, while he continued to hold onto several key players who have become the nucleus of the team, including All-Stars Jonathan Broxton, Chad Billingsley and Hong-Chih Kuo, as well as Matt Kemp, James Loney and Clayton Kershaw, among others.

Colletti's acquisition of Ramirez has been deemed by many as the greatest trade in Dodger franchise history, as he traded for the perennial All-Star just minutes before the trade deadline in 2008. Ramirez went on to put together two of the greatest months in team history before continuing his torrid hitting during the postseason. That trade and the subsequent play of Ramirez was named the top moment in Los Angeles sports in 2008 by the Los Angeles Sports Council.

In 2009, the Dodgers finished the regular season with the best record in the National League for the first time since 1983 and swept the National League Division Series for the second consecutive season to reach the NLCS in consecutive seasons for the first time since 1977-78. In 2008, the Dodgers had won the NL West and swept the Cubs in the Division Series to reach the NLCS, capturing their first postseason series victory since their World Championship season of 1988.

Colletti and his staff have focused heavily on developing top talent, as they have executed an offseason Player Development Program for the past four winters which includes instruction both on and off the field. In addition to learning the game from Dodger legends like Duke Snider, Tommy Lasorda, Maury Wills, Don Newcombe, Wes Parker and others, the young players take part in classroom sessions that help acclimate them to Los Angeles and the Major Leagues upon their eventual arrival. Since the Winter Development Program's inception in 2008, 23 participating players have reached the Major Leagues, including 2010 participants John Ely, Kenley Jansen, Jon Link and Carlos Monasterios. Colletti also created the Dodger Pride Awards, which honor the

for the National League Western Division title and he oversaw the continued success of a farm system that earned the Dodgers 2006 Organization of the Year honors from Baseball America. At the completion of his first year as GM, the Los Angeles Daily News named him Sportsman of the Year in Los Angeles, the Los Angeles Sports Council tabbed him as Co-Executive of the Year, which he shared with his great friend Brian Burke, then GM of the Anaheim Ducks. Colletti also earned Major League Executive of the Year honors from the Pitch & Hit Club of Chicago, a professional baseball organization formed more than 60 years ago to promote goodwill toward the game and fellowship among professionals in baseball.

Prior to joining the Dodgers, Colletti spent 11 seasons with the San Francisco Giants, the last nine years as the Assistant General Manager. During his time in that position, the Giants posted an 813-644 record (.558), an average of more than 90 wins per season. Since the beginning of the 1997 season, the club had played just 14 games that did not have playoff implications and during that nine-year span, the team advanced to the postseason four times and was eliminated on the final day of the season on two occasions.

Colletti played an important role in helping assemble the Giants' club through trades and free agency. From 1997-2004, the Giants posted a .570 winning percentage, the best eight-year record in San Francisco history and the third-best record in Major League Baseball. The club's .585 mark from 2000-04 was its best five-year mark as well. In his 14 seasons as a General Manager or Assistant General Manager, teams he has been associated with have finished over .500 in 12 seasons, qualified for the postseason seven times and were eliminated on the last day twice.

Prior to joining the Giants, Colletti worked for the Chicago Cubs, beginning his Major League career in 1982. He worked for three years in media relations before transitioning to the baseball operations department while handling salary arbitration cases, assisting in player acquisitions, evaluations and contract negotiations. He was a member of the organization when the Cubs won National League East Division titles in 1984 and 1989 and was honored with Major League Baseball's Robert O. Fishel Award in 1990.

The Chicago native graduated from Northern Illinois University and East Leyden High School in Franklin Park, IL, the same high school attended by Washington Redskins head coach Mike Shanahan, former Toronto Raptors general manager Glen Grunwald, and former NBA head coach Jimmy Rodgers. He was inducted into the Triton College Sports Hall of Fame in 1993, entering the same time as former Major League players Kirby Puckett, Lance Johnson and Jeff Reboulet.

Colletti has made a commitment to the Los Angeles community and for the sixth consecutive season, during select home games, he will donate his personal Dodger tickets to local community-based organizations and the families of enlisted service men and women, allowing them a chance to enjoy a Dodger game and spend time in the general manager's box. For the second consecutive year, Colletti and the Dodgers have partnered to make a significant financial commitment to the Guide Dogs of America. In 2009, he was honored with the Humanitarian Award from A Place Called Home, an organization that helps mentor and teach young at-risk students in the Los Angeles area. He also teamed with former USC football coach Pete Carroll with his inner-city program, A Better LA.

He has been a guest speaker at many law firms as well as a guest lecturer to students who attend the law schools of Stanford University, the University of Michigan, the University of Illinois, DePaul University in Chicago, and students from the Marshall School of Business and the Annenberg School of Communication at USC.

His brother Doug has been a member of the Chicago Bears' radio broadcast team for the past 24 seasons. He and Gayle have a son, Lou, and a daughter, Jenna.

organization's top minor league players each month.

Since coming to Los Angeles, Colletti has renewed the club's focus on finding talent all around the globe, including in Asia, where he signed free agents Takashi Saito in 2006 and former All-Star Hiroki Kuroda in 2007. The team also inked Robert Boothe, its first amateur signing from Japan and solidified its roots in China, where the Dodgers played the first-ever Major League exhibition games in March 2008. Last spring, the Dodgers made their first trip to Taiwan since 1993 and in 2009, the Dodgers signed a working agreement with the La Guaira Tiburones in Venezuela, reestablishing a presence in that country after several years away.

In 2006, his first year as a GM, Colletti assembled a Major League team that tied

Jeff Ingram enters his first season as Vice Chairman of the Los Angeles Dodgers. Ingram has worked closely with the McCourt family for 15 years, first as the family's banker and then as a senior officer in the family business. He first joined the Dodger organization in 2004 as Executive Vice President, Business Development.

In his current role, Ingram's responsibilities include advising ownership on strategic initiatives and working closely with the leaders of each operating unit to support their businesses and ensure execution of their goals. Ingram also has overall responsibility for all finance and capital raising activities for the Dodgers and related entities.

Ingram led the effort to relocate the Dodgers' Spring Training home to Glendale, AZ, from Vero Beach, FL, and is on the board of Camelback Ranch - Glendale, which includes members of both the Dodgers and White Sox organizations. He works closely with the baseball operations department in building strong relationships with the club's minor league affiliates.

He joined the McCourt family business in 1999 as Vice President, Capital Markets and managed the family's diversification into professional sports. Prior, Ingram was a commercial banker for nearly two decades. He served as Vice President and then Team Executive and Director for BankBoston, N.A. in the Real Estate and Restructured Real Estate Departments. He has also been employed by Bank of Tokyo Trust Company as Supervising Credit Analyst, Banking Officer and ultimately Assistant Vice President following a stint at Morgan Guaranty Trust Co., where he served as a Credit Investigator. In each of these positions, he specialized in commercial real estate and has been involved in transactions totalling billions of dollars in nearly all facets of the industry.

Ingram graduated from the University of Rhode Island with a Bachelor of Science degree in Business Administration, as well as high distinction from the honors program in finance.

He and his wife, Jane, have two children, Julie (20) and John (18).



GEOFFREY WHARTON

CHIEF OPERATING OFFICER

Geoffrey P. Wharton enters his second season as Chief Operating Officer of the Los Angeles Dodgers. Wharton oversees all business operations of the Dodgers, including marketing, sponsorships, ticket sales, stadium operations, finance, communications, legal affairs and all administrative and support functions. He is also responsible for the Next 50 project, which is designed to ensure Dodger Stadium's place as the home of the Los Angeles Dodgers for the next 50 years.

Wharton was formerly a Senior Managing Director of the international real estate firm, Tishman Speyer Properties. During his first years with the company, he directed the firm's leasing activities in the United States and Germany. He was the partner in charge of the venture that redeveloped, leased and managed Rockefeller Center as well as leading its events program which included the nationally televised Christmas Tree Lighting, the world acclaimed Louis Vuitton Car Class, the annual spring sculpture exhibit and the collaboration with NBC's Today Show that produced the outdoor concert series. He also directed the company's restoration of the Chrysler Building and the redevelopment of the adjacent Kent Building, which included Philip Johnson's architectural intervention between the two buildings to create the Chrysler Center. He led the company's early visioning for the new Yankee Stadium.

Wharton served as the Managing Director for the venture that controlled the World Trade Center. Following the events of September 11, 2001, he led the venture's master planning efforts for the redevelopment of the World Trade Center site and the design, development and approval process for 7 World Trade Center which remains the only new office building constructed on the site.

Wharton was the President of Douglas Elliman, one of New York City's largest residential real estate brokerage firms, where he directed the reorganization of the company and its sale and transition from a subsidiary of a public company to private ownership.

More recently, he has collaborated with and consulted to major real estate owners on the master planning and development of large-scale urban projects in New York City, Washington, D.C., Las Vegas, New Orleans and Los Angeles.

Wharton graduated from Brown University with a Bachelor's degree in political science and from the New York University School of Law with a JD degree. He served as Chairman of the Ethics Committee of the Real Estate Board of New York and a trustee of the LIJ-North Shore Healthcare System, the Parson's School of Design, Muhlenberg College and The Educational Alliance.

He lives in Los Angeles with his wife, Susan. He has a son, James, and a daughter-in-law, Sara.

SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT
& GENERAL COUNSEL

Sam Fernandez begins his 29th season with the Dodgers and 12th as Senior Vice President and General Counsel. He was appointed to his current position in 2000. Fernandez joined the organization and was named General Counsel on June 1, 1984. He was assigned the additional responsibilities of Assistant Secretary in 1987 and Secretary in 1998. Before joining the organization, Fernandez was an associate with the law firm of Latham & Watkins from 1980-84 and served as the Dodgers' resident counsel from Feb. 1, 1983 until he formally joined the team.

During his tenure with the Dodgers, Fernandez has been responsible for overseeing all of the team's legal affairs. His duties have included negotiating and drafting contracts with the team's broadcasting partners, concessionaires, sponsors and players, licensing the team's marks and other intellectual property, leasing the stadium for concerts and films and supervising all litigation. Beginning in 2010, he took on the additional responsibility of overseeing Human Resources.

Fernandez has worked on matters ranging from the establishment of the Dodgers' training facility in the Dominican Republic to serving on the Board of Directors of Major League Baseball Properties, Inc. He has also served on the Boards of Directors of Los Angeles Dodgers, Inc., Major League Baseball Enterprises, Inc., The Pediatrics and Family Medical Foundation in Los Angeles, the Southern California Chapter of the American Corporate Counsel Association and the Leadership Advisory Board for the Association of Media & Entertainment Counsel.

In 2009, Fernandez was given the Sports Counsel of the Year Award for outstanding service to a sports league or team by the Association of Media and Entertainment Counsel (AMEC). Founded in 2005, the Media and Entertainment Counsel of the Year Awards are the only awards designed to honor attorneys who are part of the leadership at the major global media and entertainment companies. In 2002, Fernandez was named Alumnus of the Year by the Los Angeles Chapter of the University of California, Hastings College of the Law.

Fernandez graduated magna cum laude from UCLA in 1976 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in sociology and political science. He received his Juris Doctor in 1980 from the University of California, Hastings College of Law, and was elected to the Order of the Coif. He was admitted to the practice of law in 1980 and is an active member of the California State Bar, the Los Angeles County Bar Association and the American Bar Association.

Fernandez and his wife, Susan, reside in Manhattan Beach, CA. They have two children, Kristina and Mike.

Howard Sunkin manages the overall public affairs efforts of the Dodgers, and McCourt Group, ranging from federal, state and local government relations to strategic policy initiatives related to transit, real estate development and economic development. While managing the Community Relations Department of the Los Angeles Dodgers, he is also part of a team focused on the philanthropic endeavors and community outreach. As a director of the Los Angeles Marathon – a McCourt Group company – Sunkin advises on sponsorship development, operations and business development strategies. He is also a member of the board of ThinkCure!, the Dodgers' official charity, which raises funds for research to cure cancer.

Sunkin joined Frank McCourt in January 2004 as an outside consultant and key strategic member of the transition team following the purchase of the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Sunkin worked previously for nearly two decades as a public affairs professional in the Los Angeles market. He served as Vice President of Local Public Affairs with Cerrell Associates Inc., one of Los Angeles' oldest and most reputable public affair firms. Prior to joining the Dodger organization, Wilhelm served as Chief Financial Officer of McCourt Group, advising on the parent company's cash management and strategic investments. Wilhelm's tenure as a strategic advisor to Frank McCourt began in 2001.

Since 2001, Wilhelm has advised on more than 30 acquisitions of sports properties. Focusing on buy-side engagements in all four major leagues, Wilhelm successfully closed acquisitions including the Los Angeles Dodgers, Washington Nationals, Cleveland Cavaliers, Anaheim Ducks, Seattle Supersonics and Georgia Force. Wilhelm focused on acquisition due diligence, asset valuation, operational analysis, capital structuring, facility financing, strategic analysis, capital raise, vendor negotiations and league issues and approvals. In addition to team acquisitions, Wilhelm advised on multiple facility financings including new or renovated facilities for the Atlanta Falcons, Florida Marlins, Oakland Athletics, Pittsburgh Penguins, San Diego Padres and San Francisco 49ers.

Prior to his sports finance career, Wilhelm developed a strong background in mergers and acquisitions at GMAC as a Senior Analyst in the business development group. Wilhelm evaluated numerous acquisitions throughout the commercial and consumer finance industry with valuations ranging between \$10 million and \$10 billion. CHIEF REVENUE OFFICER

Michael Young is entering his third season as the Dodgers' Chief Revenue Officer, a position to which he was named on May 22, 2009. Young is the first person to hold that title in Dodger history and in his current role, he oversees corporate partnership sales, ticket sales and premium seating.

Young joined the Dodgers following 13 years in the front office of the Denver Broncos, where he was responsible for corporate partnerships, marketing and branding. While serving as the Senior Director of Special Projects for the NFL club, he doubled as the Executive Vice President of the Colorado Crush, the city's Arena Football League team. He played a key role, along with owner Pat Bowlen, in developing the Broncos' relationship with Nike and orchestrating the re-branding of the organization, including new uniforms, which have become the template for the majority of all new uniform designs in football today.

Young, 49, successfully made the transition to the Broncos' front office after a 10-year career as a wide receiver in the National Football League. He played for the Los Angeles Rams (1985-88), Broncos (1989-92), Philadelphia Eagles (1993) and Kansas City Chiefs (1994). He was considered one of the NFL's most reliable third-down receivers and was the Broncos' leading receiver in 1991.

The Visalia, CA native was a two-sport athlete at UCLA, where he was an Academic All-Pac 10 selection in 1984 after teaming up with current UCLA Head Football Coach Rick Neuheisel to lead all receivers in the Bruins' Rose Bowl Championship. Following the 1985 Fiesta Bowl, in which he was the leading receiver, he was drafted by the Los Angeles Rams. Young also played two seasons on the UCLA baseball team, batting .311 before being drafted by the New York Mets. He graduated from UCLA with a Bachelor of Science degree in Sociology.

Young credits his career in sports to the Dodgers' legendary team physician, Dr. Frank Jobe, who currently serves as a Special Advisor to the Chairman. Shortly after Young separated his left shoulder as a 15-year-old prospect, Dr. Jobe performed shoulder surgery that would put his athletic career back on track.

Young sits on the Advisory Board of the Los Angeles Sports and Entertainment Commission and is on the board for the Los Angeles Sports Council. He is a "Pink Tie Guy" for Susan G. Komen for the Cure and a past Spokesman for the Colorado Special Olympics and the Juvenile Diabetes Foundation. He is a member of the Advisory Council for Recreation & Tourism Department at Cal Poly University.

Young and his wife, Jill, have three daughters, Christine (23), Britteny (19) and Madison (11).

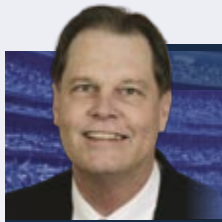

TICKET OPERATIONS

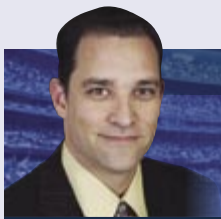

VICE PRESIDENT,

Josh Rawitch is entering his 17th season in Major League Baseball, 15th with the Dodgers and fourth as the team's Vice President of Communications. In his current capacity, he is responsible for the overall communication efforts of the organization, including baseball and business media relations, publications and team history. During his tenure with the Dodgers he has also overseen the broadcasting and community relations departments.

Rawitch, 34, is the organization's primary spokesperson and is responsible for the club's internal communications efforts while assisting in the team's strategic planning. He directs the team's social media strategies and has operated a daily corporate blog for the last five years called "Inside the Dodgers." In 2009, the club became the first in Major League Baseball to create a program in which independent bloggers received media credentials and access to cover the team.

A bilingual Spanish-speaker, Rawitch directs the team's media strategies within the Hispanic marketplace and has overseen the club's public relations efforts for their historic trip to China in 2008, as well as their international exhibition games in Mexico City in 2003 and Taiwan in 2010. He has overseen media relations at two National League Championship Series and has assisted the league office at the 2009 All-Star Game.

He joined the Dodgers in 1995 in the Advertising and Special Events Department and spent parts of five seasons in the team's marketing department before moving over to Public Relations in 2000. He left the organization for two seasons and helped to integrate MLB.com, the league's official website, from an independently operated site to a profitable venture that now covers all 30 Major League teams and receives well over one hundred million visits per season from fans across the world.

During his time with MLB Advanced Media, Rawitch served as a daily beat reporter, covering the Dodgers in 2001 and the Giants in 2002. He was the lone American journalist to cover the Caribbean Series, All-Star Game, League Division Series, League Championship Series and World Series in 2002.

He returned to the Dodgers in 2003 as the Assistant Director of Public Relations and was promoted to Director prior to the 2005 season before adding the Broadcasting Department to his responsibilities in 2007 and Community Relations in 2010.

The Los Angeles native attended Indiana University, where he received a Bachelor's degree in Sports Marketing and Management with a minor in Business. He has served as a guest instructor at his alma mater and is in his second year as an adjunct professor at USC's Annenberg School for Communication, where he teaches a course titled Sports Public Relations.

Rawitch is on the board of directors for the Los Angeles Chapter of the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation. He received the High Five Award from the Southern California Sports Broadcasters Association in 2009.

Prior to joining the Dodgers, Vandemore spent one year at Navigant Consulting, Inc. and two at FTI, Inc. in the litigation consulting and support practices, where she evaluated strategic options available to clients with respect to accounting and finance related issues, prepared economic damages analyses and authored numerous expert witness reports and declarations.

Vandemore began her career working for the accounting firm Coopers & Lybrand (currently PricewaterhouseCoopers) as an auditor in Los Angeles. While in LA, she worked with both public and private clients in a variety of industries.

De Jon Watson enters his fifth year with the Dodgers and fourth as Assistant General Manager, Player Development. In this role, he is responsible for developing and evaluating all players in the Dodgers' minor league system, appointing all minor league managers and coaching staff, as well as all coordinator and instructor positions. He also oversees the clubs' winter ball participation, Latin American player development and relationships between the Dodgers and their minor league affiliates. Watson serves as an advisor to General Manager Ned Colletti on 40-man roster moves and Major League acquisitions in addition to overseeing all minor league transactions.

In 2010, Topps named the Dodgers as Organization of the Year. The prestigious award dates back to 1966 and highlights the Major League team that has shown outstanding performance, depth and talent throughout their Major and Minor League teams.

Watson and his staff conducted the fourth annual Winter Prospect Development Program this January that included instruction both on and off the field. In addition to learning the game from Dodger legends like Duke Snider, Maury Wills, Don Newcombe, Wes Parker, Ramon Martinez and others, the young players take part in classroom sessions that help them acclimate to Los Angeles and the Major Leagues upon their eventual arrival. Since the Winter Development Program's inception in 2008, 23 participating players have reached the Major Leagues, including 2010 participants John Ely, Kenley Jansen, Jon Link and Carlos Monasterios.

Since joining the Dodgers, Watson has brought several former Dodger players back into the fold as minor league instructors, including Tim Wallach, Lenny Harris, Franklin Stubbs, Aaron Sele, Matt Herges and Jody Reed.

In 2009, Watson spearheaded the team's effort to return to Venezuela, where the franchise signed a partnership with the La Guaira Tiburones to help develop talent that will eventually reach the big leagues.

Watson, 44, is beginning his 26th year in professional baseball. He joined the Dodgers from the Cleveland Indians, where he was the Director of Professional Scouting for three seasons (2004-06), working directly with the general manager on building the Major League roster through trades and free agent acquisitions. Prior to joining the Indians, the Baldwin Hills, CA native served as the Reds' Scouting Director from 1998-00, where more than 25 of his draft choices reached a Major League 40-man roster, including future big leaguers Adam Dunn and Austin Kearns. He moved to the professional scouting side with the Reds in 2001 and 2002.

Watson first began working in baseball in 1991 with the Florida Marlins following a five-year playing career in the Royals' organization. He started as an area scout in Los Angeles and was a member of Florida's front office when the club won its first World Championship in 1997.

A graduate of Santa Monica High School, Watson was an outfielder/first baseman at West Los Angeles Community College, where he played for current Dodger scout Artie Harris and was a third-round draft choice of the Royals.

He and his wife, Joal, reside in Maricopa, Arizona with their daughter, Mia and sons, Michael and De Jon Jr.



LOGAN WHITE
ASSISTANT GENERAL
MANAGER, SCOUTING



Logan White begins his 10th season with the Dodgers and fifth as Assistant General Manager, Scouting. In this capacity, White's primary responsibilities are overseeing the organization's amateur and international scouting efforts, including the annual June First-Year Player Draft, along with assisting the GM in various capacities.

In 2010, Topps named the Dodgers as Organization of the Year. The prestigious award dates back to 1966 and highlights the Major League team that has shown outstanding performance, depth and talent throughout their Major and Minor League teams.

Prior to being promoted to Assistant GM in 2007, White served as the Director of Amateur Scouting for the Dodgers for five seasons. In that role, he headed up the draft selections or signings of 22 players, including three All-Stars, who have appeared in the Major Leagues for the Dodgers over the past four seasons - Tony Abreu, Chad Billingsley, Jonathan Broxton, Blake DeWitt, Scott Elbert, A.J. Ellis, Chin-lung Hu, Eric Hull, Kenley Jansen, Matt Kemp, Clayton Kershaw, Andy LaRoche, Brent Leach, James Loney, Russell Martin, James McDonald, Russ Mitchell, Xavier Paul, Eric Stults, Ramon Troncoso, Cory Wade and Delwyn Young. Along with his staff of amateur scouts, White's history of success in the draft helped lead to the Dodgers being named Baseball America's 2006 Organization of the Year.

With White in charge of amateur scouting the Dodgers have been able to build a club that has a core of homegrown talent and has reached the NLCS twice in the past three seasons. The Dodgers' June 2004 First-Year Player draft was rated by Baseball America as the best draft in the National League and second best in baseball. Its 2003 draft was tabbed as the best in the Major Leagues by the publication and its 2002 Draft was rated as the fourth-best draft in baseball. The Dodgers were the only team to have their draft rated in the top five in each of those three seasons.

Right-handed pitcher Zach Lee, the club's first-round pick last season, was considered a Top 10 talent who had committed to LSU to play quarterback, but White and General Manager Ned Colletti convinced him to sign with the Dodgers and he quickly was tabbed as one of the organization's top prospects by Baseball America. Lee was the eighth pitcher taken with the Dodgers' first overall pick in the nine drafts under White since 2002, with the lone exception being Loney, another high school pitching phenom, who was drafted as a first baseman and has become a fixture on the big league club.

The strategy has paid dividends, as the team has graduated several draftees to the Major Leagues, including Billingsley, Broxton, Kershaw and Elbert while a plethora of pitching talent remains in the minor leagues, including Lee and fellow first-round draft choices Aaron Miller (2009), Ethan Martin (2008) and Chris Withrow (2007), among others.

The Dodgers' scouting success hasn't been limited to the first few rounds, either, as the team's 17th-round pick in 2002, Martin, emerged as a two-time All-Star catcher, while Kemp, a sixth-round selection, earned Gold Glove and Silver Slugger honors in 2009.

In addition to his work at the amateur level, White played a significant role in the signing of Takashi Saito, a non-roster invitee in 2006 who became one of the game's top closers, as well as the scouting and signing of right-hander Hiroki Kuroda, who joined the Dodgers in 2008 following a successful professional career in Japan.

Prior to joining the Dodgers, White spent seven years with the Baltimore Orioles as the West Coast Supervisor with responsibilities including overseeing all area scouts from the Western part of the United States, as well as evaluating players in Canada and Australia.

White's scouting experience is extensive, as he served as the West Coast Supervisor for the San Diego Padres from 1993-95, an area scout with Baltimore from 1990-92 and an associate scout with the Seattle Mariners from 1988-89. He was a minor league pitcher in the Seattle Mariners' organization from 1984-87 and was signed by Jeff Malinoff.

Originally from Portales, NM, White graduated from Western New Mexico University with honors and was an Academic All-American in 1984. In 1996, he was inducted into the Western New Mexico University Hall of Fame.

White, his wife Deena and son, Logan, Jr., reside in Phoenix, AZ.



KEN BRACEY
SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO THE
GENERAL MANAGER

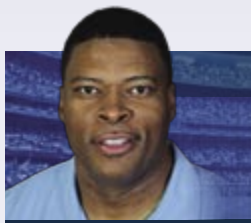
One of the most respected scouts in baseball, Ken Bracey enters his second season with the Dodgers following 37 seasons in the San Diego Padres' organization. He was named Special Assistant to General Manager Ned Colletti on Dec. 21, 2009.

Bracey joined the Padres in their inaugural 1969 season and has worked as an area scout, a national crosschecker, a minor league manager and, most recently, as a Major League scout from 1991-2009, where he was a part of the Padres' pennant winning clubs in 1984 and 1998. He had worked continuously for the club from 1969-87 and again from 1990-2009 and served as a scout with the Brewers from 1987-90.

The Dunlap, IL resident was honored in 2004 as the Midwest Scout of the Year.

Bracey pitched nine seasons in the minor leagues with the Yankees' and Giants' organizations.

Toney Howell enters his fifth year with the Dodgers as a Special Assistant to the General Manager. His responsibilities include Major League scouting, consulting on player trades, acquisitions and roster moves in addition to other special assignments.

Before joining the Dodgers, Howell was a professional and Major League scout for the Milwaukee Brewers for three seasons (2004-06).

Prior to his time with the Brewers, he spent eight seasons (1996-2003) with the Texas Rangers as a professional scout. His career in scouting began in 1985 with the Chicago Cubs as an amateur scout, a position he held for 10 seasons. He was also a minor league hitting instructor for the Cubs.

Howell attended the Ohio State University, where he played baseball as an outfielder and football as a strong safety for three years, twice being named an All-American in both sports. He was drafted by the Cincinnati Reds following his junior year in 1980 after leading the nation in batting average. In addition to his professional playing career, which included brief

stints with the Houston Astros in 1984 and 1985, Howell was an alternate in the 1992 Olympics as a third-degree black belt in Tae Kwon Do.

In 2010, Howell was named the MLB Executive of the Year by the Chicago Pitch & Hit Club of Chicago, a professional baseball organization formed more than 60 years ago to promote goodwill toward the game and fellowship among professionals in baseball.

He and his wife, Coclough, have four children, Nicole (24), Dejon (23), James (22) and Toney Jr. (20).



VANCE LOVELACE
DIRECTOR, PRO SCOUTING &
SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO THE GM



Vance Lovelace enters his 11th season with the Dodgers and second as Director of Pro Scouting. He remains as a Special Assistant to the General Manager, the role he had filled for the previous three seasons.

In his current capacity, Lovelace is responsible for the organization's professional scouts and reports directly to GM Ned Colletti regarding roster moves and player acquisitions. Lovelace, a key member of the decision-making core, joined the Dodgers as a professional scout in 2001, and was promoted to Special Assistant on Nov. 7, 2006. His career in baseball operations began in 1997 as a pitching coach and assistant general manager for the New Jersey Jackals of the Northern League, a position he held for three seasons.

Lovelace enjoyed a 13-year career (1981-94) in professional baseball, appearing in nine games over three seasons in the Major Leagues with the Angels (1988-89) and Mariners (1990) as a left-handed pitcher.

After being drafted in the first round (16th pick) in 1981 by the Cubs, he was traded in 1983 to Los Angeles with Dan Cataline for Ron Cey. At the time, Colletti was a member of Chicago's front office.

That season, Lovelace won eight games for the Dodgers' Single-A affiliate in Vero Beach before posting a 3.88 ERA in 16 starts for Double-A San Antonio in 1984. He split time with those two teams in 1985, appearing in 18 games before the Angels drafted him from Los Angeles in December of that season. He made his big league debut in the 17th inning of a game on Sept. 10, 1988 vs. Texas.

Lovelace also played for the China Trust Whales in Taiwan in 1995.

The Tampa, FL native was a member of the 1979 Belmont Heights Senior League World Series team alongside fellow future Major Leaguers Dwight Gooden and Floyd Youmans.



BILL MUELLER
SPECIAL ASSISTANT,

Former American League batting champion Bill Mueller enters his sixth season in the Dodger organization and five as a Special Assistant. He returned to the front office for the 2008 season after serving as the Dodgers' interim hitting coach during the second half of the 2007 season. In his current capacity, he assists the GM with special projects and player evaluation on the Major and minor league levels. Two of his key responsibilities are evaluating the players in the Dodgers' minor league system as well as advising Colletti on Major League acquisitions.

Mueller, 40, became the fourth-youngest coach in Dodger history in 2007 when he took over the hitting coach duties on June 14. The only coaches younger than him were Mark Cresse (27), Rube Walker (32) and Ron Roenicke (35).

He joined the front office following an 11-year Major League playing career with the Giants, Cubs, Red Sox and Dodgers. He finished his career with a .291 lifetime batting average, 85 home runs and 493 RBI in 11 seasons and was a member of the 2004 World Champion Boston Red Sox.

In 2003, Mueller enjoyed his best season in the Major Leagues, winning the American League batting title and a Silver Slugger Award at third base while setting career highs in average (.326), hits (171), homers (19) and RBI (85).

The Maryland Heights, Missouri native made five postseason appearances, including the 2004 World Series in which he hit .429 (6-for-14), helping the Red Sox sweep the Cardinals in four games. In 1,182 career games in the field, primarily at third base, Mueller compiled a .958 fielding percentage.

Mueller's time with the Dodgers marks his third stint with Colletti, with the first two coming when Colletti was the Assistant General Manager in San Francisco.

Mueller and his wife, Amy, reside in Mesa, Arizona with their children, Lexi, Tucker and Dawson.



RICK RAGAZZO
SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO THE
GENERAL MANAGER

Rick Ragazzo enters his fourth season with the Dodgers and 20th in professional baseball. As a Special Assistant to General Manager Ned Colletti, Ragazzo is responsible for Major League scouting as well as assisting the general manager with Major League roster moves and player acquisitions.

Ragazzo, a key member of the baseball operations decision-making core, joined the Dodgers after 17 years with the San Francisco Giants' organization, where he headed the club's international operations, particularly in Latin America and the Pacific Rim, and assisted GM Brian Sabean on Major League matters. Among the numerous Latin players he was responsible for signing was left-handed pitcher Francisco Liriano.

Prior to joining the Giants, Ragazzo served as an assistant coach at Fullerton College (1985-88) and Loyola Marymount University (1988-90). He began his professional baseball career as an area scout for the Giants in July 1990. He scouted the Southern California and Hawaii territories for six years before being promoted to the international position in 1997.

He holds a Bachelor's degree in Physical Sciences from California State University, Fullerton and a Master's degree in Education Administration from Azusa Pacific University.

Ragazzo and his wife, Eileen, reside in Leona Valley, CA and have four sons, Austen, Ryan, Dominic and Trevor.



AARON SELE
SPECIAL ASSISTANT,
BASEBALL OPERATIONS &
PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

Aaron Sele enters his third season in the Dodgers' front office and second as Special Assistant, Baseball Operations & Player Development. The Minnesota native pitched 15 seasons in the Major Leagues with the Red Sox, Rangers, Mariners, Angels, Dodgers and Mets, compiling a 148-112 record and 4.61 ERA in 404 games.

A two-time American League All-Star, Sele was part of the Angels' 2002 World Championship team and pitched in the postseason four times.

He was one of five Major League pitchers to reach at least 17 wins in each of the three years from 1998-2000, joining Pedro Martinez, Randy Johnson, Greg Maddux and David Wells.

The right-hander logged a career-best 19 wins in 1998 and ranked second in the AL in wins and shutouts in 1999 while finishing third in the league with a career-high 186 strikeouts and fourth with a .667 winning pct.

Sele finished third in BBWAA AL Rookie of Year voting in 1993 and was originally selected by Boston in the first-round (23rd overall) of the June 1991 First-Year Player Draft.

He was a first-team All-American at Washington State University and was a member of Team USA in the summer of 1990.

Sele and his wife, Jennifer, have four daughters, Katherine, Claire, Caroline and Charlotte.



MARK SWEENEY
SPECIAL ASSISTANT,
BASEBALL OPERATIONS &
PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

Mark Sweeney enters his third season in the Dodgers' front office and second as a Special Assistant, Baseball Operations & Player Development. Prior to moving into his current role, he served as the Dodgers' assistant coach in 2009 following his retirement as a player.

Sweeney, 41, spent 14 seasons in the Major Leagues as one of the best pinch-hitters in baseball history, finishing second all time in pinch hits with 175. He trails just Single-A Great Lakes Hitting Coach Lenny Harris, who had 212. In 2007, Sweeney surpassed Dodger coach Manny Mota for second place all time, collecting his 151st pinch hit on July 27. Less than two weeks later, Sweeney was traded to the Dodgers, where he finished out his career.

The Massachusetts native played 1,218 games with the Cardinals (1995-97), Padres (1997-98, 2002, 2005), Reds (1999), Brewers (2000-01), Rockies (2003-04), Giants (2006-07) and Dodgers (2007-08), compiling a lifetime .254 batting average, with 42 homers and 250 RBI.

Sweeney's best season came in 2005 with San Diego, when he established career highs in games (135), at-bats (221), hits (65), doubles (12), average (.294) and stolen bases (4). In 17 career postseason contests, Sweeney hit .357 (5-for-14) with three runs scored, a double and an RBI. The 1991 graduate of the University of Maine went 2-for-3 with an RBI in three games during the 1998 World Series for the Padres.

The Dodgers originally selected Sweeney in the 39th round of the June 1990 First-Year Player Draft out of Maine, but he returned for his senior season and was drafted by the Angels the following year.

Sweeney and his wife, Cindy reside in San Diego with his step-daughters, Jaden (10) and Kendall (7).



JOSE VIZCAINO
SPECIAL ASSISTANT,
BASEBALL OPERATIONS &
PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

Jose Vizcaino joined the Dodgers' front office in 2008 after an 18-year big league career that started when he was signed by the Dodgers as a 17-year-old out of San Cristobal in the Dominican Republic. Now in his fourth season as a special assistant, Vizcaino works on special projects in baseball operations and serves as an on-field instructor during Spring Training. He also instructs at the Dodgers' academy in the Dominican Republic, Campo Las Palmas. Two of his key responsibilities are evaluating the players in the Dodgers' minor league system as well as advising General Manager Ned Colletti on Major League acquisitions.

Vizcaino, 42, came up through the Dodgers' farm system in the 1980s. He made his Major League debut on Sept. 10, 1989 as the second-youngest player in the National League that season and also played for Los Angeles in 1990 before moving on to a productive career with the Cubs, Mets, Indians and Giants. Colletti, then with the Cubs in 1990, was instrumental in the trade that brought Vizcaino to Chicago.

Vizcaino and Colletti were also together when both were with the Giants.

He returned to the Dodgers in 1998 and played with the club through 2000, when he was traded to the New York Yankees and helped them to a World Championship. Vizcaino played for the Houston Astros from 2001-05 before finishing his career with the Giants and Cardinals in 2006.

The switch-hitting Vizcaino posted a .270 batting average with 36 home runs, 480 runs batted in and 74 stolen bases in parts of 18 seasons in the Majors. He played primarily as a shortstop but appeared at all four infield positions and left field, compiling a .976 lifetime fielding percentage.

Vizcaino appeared in the postseason six times, including the 2005 World Series with the Houston Astros and the 2000 Fall Classic, in which his game-winning single in the 12th inning of Game 1 ended the longest game in World Series history and propelled the Yankees to a title in five games over the Mets.



MAURY WILLS INSTRUCTOR

Maury Wills returns in 2011 in his role as an instructor for the Dodgers' Major League and minor league players. In this capacity, Wills serves as a baserunning and bunting coach during Spring Training as well as throughout the regular season in Los Angeles. Wills has also worked with the Dodgers' prospects during the Winter Development Program.

In 2010, Wills was voted as the fifth-greatest Los Angeles Dodger of all-time by readers of the *Los Angeles Times*.

Wills, 78, first came to Spring Training with the Dodgers in 1951 at the age of 19 and worked his way up through the farm system, making his Major League debut with Los Angeles on June 6, 1959. He played 14 Major League seasons with the Dodgers, Pirates and Expos and had a career batting average of .281 with 586 stolen bases, the 19th-highest total in Major League history.

The seven-time All-Star helped to transform the game of baseball with his speed in the 1960s, as he led the league in stolen bases for six consecutive seasons from 1960-65, including a then-Major League record of 104 in 1962. That season, he earned the National League Gold Glove Award and NL Most Valuable Player honors when he batted .299 with six homers, 48 RBI and 208 hits in 165 games.

The Washington, DC native appeared in four World Series with the Dodgers (1959, 1963, 1965 and 1966), including World Championships in his first three visits to the Fall Classic.

He was the first player to bat on artificial turf when he came up to hit on April 18, 1966 at the Houston Astrodome and singled up the middle off Turk Farrell.

Even during his playing career, Wills began managing in Hermosillo, Mexico between seasons in 1970-71 and was voted the top manager in the league. He realized his dream of becoming a Major League manager when he served as skipper of the Seattle Mariners during the 1980-81 seasons.

Wills also spent six years as a baseball analyst for NBC Sports on the Major League Baseball Game of the Week and one year as an HBO network in-studio sports personality. He also has been a trainer for 15 different Major League baseball teams, teaching the art of base-running and stealing and trained the Osaka, "Hanky Braves" in Japan for four years.

Under then-Governor Ronald Reagan, Wills was the Chairman of Athletics for Youth in the State of California. He has also worked as Assistant to Pittsburgh's Mayor Barr in Youth Relations and was Assistant to the District Attorney of Clark County, Nevada for Youth programs. Currently he is involved with the Red Ribbon Program, a national organization dedicated to the prevention of drug abuse whose slogan is "Hugs not Drugs," and he is a Youth Drug Program Role Model for the Redondo Beach Crime Watch. Wills also makes numerous appearances for the Dodgers' community relations department throughout the year.

Wills has written two books, "How to Steal a Pennant," (1976) and "On the Run," (1992).

DODGERS IN THE COMMUNITY



The Dodgers dedicated their 10th Dodgers Dreamfield at Northridge Little League in February.

A high school senior gets much-needed financial aid to go to college. A youngster takes batting practice and pitches off the bullpen mound at Dodger Stadium. Kids in the hospital forget about their illnesses for a few moments when a Dodger appears in their rooms. Little Leagues get to play on picturesque fields, thanks to efforts by the Dodgers to help youngsters play in improved facilities. And researchers receive funding to help in the fight against an awful disease.

These are just a few examples of the hundreds of lives that the Dodgers touch every year through their community efforts. The Dodgers Dream Foundation was founded in 1998 to provide educational, athletic and recreational opportunities for the youth of the Greater Los Angeles community and more than 100,000 tickets were donated to organizations throughout the Greater Los Angeles area.



James Loney was the Dodgers' 2010 nominee for the Roberto Clemente Award. The first baseman was nominated because of his dedication to giving back to the community coupled with his accomplishments on the baseball field.

EDUCATION

One of the signature programs of the Dodgers Dream Foundation is the Dodger Team 42 Scholars program, a partnership with the Jackie Robinson Foundation that awards 42 college scholarships annually to minority students selected by the Jackie Robinson Foundation. The Dodgers also took 20 disadvantaged youth from the El Monte City School District on a back-to-school shopping spree at the Staples in El Monte last season. The kids received \$100 apiece courtesy of the Dodgers Dream Foundation to shop for school supplies.

“SWEET” LOU JOHNSON COMMUNITY AFFAIRS LIAISON



“Sweet” Lou Johnson is beginning his 30th season as a member of the Dodgers’ community affairs department and his 33rd as a member of the organization. In his current capacity, the former Dodger outfielder makes dozens of appearances throughout Southern California on behalf of the team.

Johnson, 78, will forever be remembered for his heroics in the 1965 World Series when his home run in Game 7 of the Fall Classic against the Minnesota Twins gave the Dodgers their third world championship. He played for Los Angeles from 1965-67 as part of an eight-year big league career with the Dodgers, Cubs, Angels, Indians and Braves.

The Lexington, KY native played for the Kansas City Monarchs of the Negro Leagues before a long minor league career with several franchises. The Dodgers acquired him in exchange for Larry Sherry prior to the 1964 season and he became the team’s regular left fielder for three seasons after Tommy Davis suffered an ankle injury in 1965.

That year, Johnson hit 12 homers to tie for the team lead and stole 15 bases, earning him 24th place in the National League MVP voting. He was second on the club in home runs in 1966 (17) when he helped the team reach the World Series against Baltimore and also finished second in homers for the Dodgers in 1967 (11).

On Sept. 9, 1965, Johnson played left field and had the only hit for either team in Sandy Koufax’s perfect game against the Cubs.

In an eight-year big league career, Johnson posted a .258 average with 48 home runs and 232 RBI in 677 games.

STEVE GARVEY

Steve Garvey enters his 30th season in the Dodger organization and 15th year as a member of the front office. In his current role, the former All-Star first baseman makes numerous appearances on behalf of the team in the community and in conjunction with the club's corporate sponsors.

Garvey, 62, played for the Dodgers from 1969-82, becoming one of the most popular players in franchise history while setting the Los Angeles Dodger record for games played at his position (1,672). A 10-time All-Star and the National League's Most Valuable Player in 1974, Garvey established the National League record for consecutive games played with 1,207.

In his 19-year big league career, including 14 seasons with the Dodgers, Garvey posted a .294 batting average with 272 home runs and 1,308 RBI in 2,332 games played.

A four-time Gold Glove Award winner, Garvey had 200 or more hits in six seasons and batted .393 in 10 All-Star Games en route to twice winning All-Star Game MVP honors (1974, 1978).

In a 2010 *LA Times* fan poll, he was voted as the sixth greatest all-time Los Angeles Dodger player.

A native of Tampa, FL, Garvey played 193 consecutive errorless games at first base to set a Major League record and his eight and a half seasons alongside fellow Dodger infielders Davey Lopes, Bill Russell and Ron Cey is a record almost certain to remain in perpetuity. In 1980, Garvey, Ron Cey, Reggie Smith and Dusty Baker gave the Dodgers and Major League Baseball its first 30-home run quartet.

The most dramatic moment of his career was his game-winning home run in the ninth inning of the decisive Game 4 of the 1984 NL Championship Series which beat the Chicago Cubs and propelled the San Diego Padres to their first-ever National League Pennant and World Series appearance. It marked the fifth time that Garvey would play in the Fall Classic, including appearances with the Dodgers in 1974, 1977, 1978 and 1981, when he helped the franchise capture its fifth World Championship.

From 1993-98, he served as an analyst for CBS' coverage of the College World Series and since 1988, he has owned his own company, Garvey Communications, and is also a highly sought-after motivational speaker, traveling both domestically and abroad to speak at corporate functions.

A father of seven children, Garvey and his wife, Candace, reside in Los Angeles.

FANS WRITE IN GARVEY TO ALL-STAR TEAM

In 1974, first baseman Steve Garvey became the only Dodger to be elected to the All-Star Game as a write-in candidate. Garvey's name didn't appear on the ballot at the beginning of the season, but a .338 batting average through May gained national attention. Garvey went 2-for-4 with a double and RBI in the National League's 7-2 victory over the American League at Pittsburgh's Three Rivers Stadium. Garvey was named All-Star Game MVP, an honor he would also win in 1978.



RON CEY

Ron Cey begins his 30th season in the Dodger organization and his 15th year as a member of the front office. In this capacity, he makes numerous appearances on behalf of the team in the community and in conjunction with the club's corporate sponsors.

Cey, 63, spent 17 seasons in the Major Leagues, including 12 with the Dodgers from 1971-82. Nicknamed "The Penguin," he was a six-time National League All-Star and is the franchise's all-time home run leader among third basemen with 228. He retired as the Los Angeles Dodgers' all-time home run leader, a mark that was surpassed by Eric Karros.

A lifetime .261 hitter with 316 home runs and 1,139 RBI in 2,073 games, Cey will forever have his name etched in Dodger lore for his performance against the Yankees in the 1981 World Series, when he batted .350 with six RBI to earn co-MVP honors as the Dodgers captured their fifth World Championship.

Cey spent eight and a half seasons alongside Bill Russell, Davey Lopes and Steve Garvey, as the Dodger infielders set a record that will likely never be broken. In 1980, Cey, Steve Garvey, Reggie Smith and Dusty Baker gave the Dodgers and Major League Baseball its first 30-home run quartet.

In a 2010 *LA Times* fan poll, he was voted as the twelfth greatest all-time Los Angeles Dodger player.

The Tacoma native attended Washington State University and was drafted by the Los Angeles Dodgers in the third round of the 1968 amateur draft. He made his big league debut on Sept. 3, 1971 and subsequently appeared in four World Series with the Dodgers (1974, 1977, 1978 and 1981).

He and his wife, Fran, reside in Woodland Hills and have two children, Dan and Amanda.

THE DODGERS AND THE HISPANIC COMMUNITY IN LOS ANGELES

Since 1958, the Dodgers have been the leader in MLB in Hispanic market outreach. More than 40 percent of Dodger fans are of Hispanic descent. Each season, the Dodgers attract more than 1 million Hispanic fans. Fifty-three years ago, the Dodger instituted the first and now longest-running Spanish-language radio broadcast. The Dodgers were also one of the first MLB teams to implement a Spanish-language Web site, losdodgers.com.

ON THE AIR

The Dodgers Spanish-language radio broadcast now runs on Univision Radio's KTNQ 1020AM, the home of the Dodger's All-Star Spanish-language

broadcasting team – Hall of Famer Jaime Jarrín, Broadcaster Pepe, and Dodger pitching legend Fernando Valenzuela. The station broadcasts all 162 regular-season games and is the fourth Spanish-language radio home of the Dodgers since the team moved to Los Angeles.



The Dodgers have also played a major role in fostering Hispanic talent having signed more than 100 players from Latin American countries throughout the team's history. The organization has also been at the forefront of Hispanic player development through their facility in the Dominican Republic Campo Las Palmas and Dodger Stadium has been the home to top Hispanic talent including Fernando Valenzuela, Manny Mota, Pedro Guerrero,



Alejandro Peña, Ramon Martinez, Wilson Alvarez, Adrian Beltre, Nomar Garciaparra, Rafael Furcal, and Manny Ramirez, just to name a few.

The Dodgers celebrated the Los Angeles Hispanic community throughout the 2010 season with "Viva Los Dodgers Day," a season-long celebration that occurred each Sunday of every Dodger homestand celebrating Hispanic culture in Los Angeles and the legacy of Latin American Dodger players past and present. Starting two hours prior to each Sunday's game, fans enjoy live music and a family-friendly celebration. The initiative culminated with La Gran Fiesta: Viva Los Dodgers.

The Dodgers will celebrate the 30th anniversary of "Fernandomania" all season long in 2011. Fernando Valenzuela was the emergency starter on Opening Day 1981.

The phenomenon of "Fernandomania" ensued shortly thereafter. While leading the Dodgers to the World Championship that year, he became the first player in Major League history to be named Rookie of the Year and to win a Cy Young in the same season. To commemorate "Fernandomania" the Dodgers will have a Fernando Valenzuela fleece blanket night on April 19 (vs. ATL) and a Bobblehead giveaway of the legendary lefty on July 26 (vs. COL).

On Sept. 17, 2010 the Dodgers announced that Donald Arthur Mattingly would become the 27th manager in franchise history and the ninth skipper in Los Angeles Dodger history beginning with the 2011 season. Mattingly, who won the 1985 AL MVP, was a six-time All-Star and nine-time Rawlings Gold Glove winner during a 14-year playing career for the New York Yankees. The Evansville, IN native was previously the Dodger hitting coach from 2008-10.

COACHING CAREER

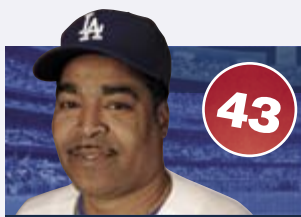

Hit .304 during his 20-year Major League career with San Francisco (1962), Pittsburgh (1963-68), Montreal (1969) and the Dodgers (1969-80, 82) while becoming baseball's all-time pinch-hit leader with 150, a mark since broken by Lenny Harris and Mark Sweeney...batted .357 off the bench in 1979 and registered 15 pinch hits to surpass Smokey Burgess' career Major League record of 144...compiled a .319 (106-for-332) average as a pinch-hitter and a .315 average (605-for-1,923) overall during his career with Los Angeles ... retired as a player in 1980, but was activated on Aug. 29 of that year when Reggie Smith went on the DL...had three hits in seven pinch-hit at-bats after returning to baseball for his 19th Major League season at the age of 42 ... was the first player selected in the 1968 Major League expansion draft by the Montreal Expos...in 1969 appeared in 31 games for Montreal, batting .315 before being traded with Maury Wills to the Dodgers for outfielder-first baseman Ron Fairly and infielder Paul Popovich...selected to the 1973 All-Star squad after leading the NL with a .351 first-half average...with 816 games as a Dodger, ranks fourth in that category among all players born in the Dominican Republic, trailing just Pedro Guerrero, Adrian Beltré and Raul Mondesi.

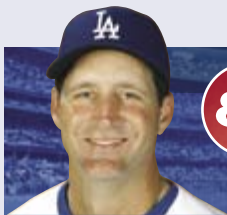

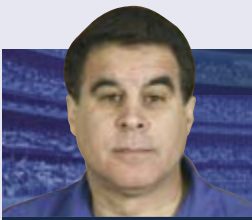

Turner joined the Dodgers in 1978 as a bat boy and became the assistant visiting clubhouse manager in 1980, a job he held until the end of the 1990 season, when he was named to his current position.

He is single and resides in Diamond Bar.



SCOTT AKASAKI
MANAGER, TEAM TRAVEL

Scott Akasaki enters his seventh season as the Dodgers' Manager of Team Travel following five seasons in the club's Asian Operations Department, most recently as the Manager of Japanese Affairs.

Akasaki, 34, was the first Asian-American to be named to the post in Major League history and is just the fifth team travel representative for the Dodgers since they moved to Los Angeles in 1958.

In his current capacity, Akasaki coordinates all of the Major League club's travel during Spring Training, the regular season and the postseason. Specifically, he is responsible for Spring Training scheduling, flight negotiations and scheduling, hotel negotiations and booking, game-day ticket requests, as well as bus and equipment truck transportation. He is also in charge of the Major League team's Spring Training home and visiting clubhouses, and team travel budgets. In 2008, Akasaki spearheaded the team's trip to Beijing, the team's simultaneous departure from Vero Beach, and the full squad's reunion in Phoenix. In 2009, he was instrumental in the club's move into its new spring home, Camelback Ranch - Glendale. This past season, Akasaki coordinated the Dodgers' travel for their multi-city goodwill series to Taiwan during Spring Training.

A cum laude graduate of Claremont McKenna College, Akasaki double majored in government and legal studies. He also commits his time to increasing awareness of syringomyelia, a neurological disorder in which tumors or cysts form within the spinal cord. He resides in Pasadena with his wife, Tiffany, and their newborn daughter, Miya.



ERIC HANSEN
ASSISTANT DIRECTOR, TURF AND GROUNDS

Eric Hansen enters his 15th season as the Dodgers' Assistant Director of Stadium Operations for Turf & Grounds. Prior to joining the Dodgers, he spent six years as the Field Superintendent for the Toronto Blue Jays' Spring Training facility in Dunedin, FL. He was previously the assistant superintendent at Hills of Lakeway Golf Course in Austin, TX from 1988-90.

Hansen received a BA degree in biological sciences from Southern Illinois University and was a high school teacher and coach for seven years before earning his bachelor of science degree in agronomy from Texas A&M University.

He and his wife, Nancy, have one son, Stephen (21), and reside in Shadow Hills, CA.

MEDICAL GLOSSARY

ABSCESS: an infection, which produces pus; can be result of a blister, callus, wound or laceration.

ANAPHYLACTIC SHOCK: shock that is caused by an allergic reaction.

ANTERIOR CRUCIATE LIGAMENT (ACL): a primary stabilizing ligament within the center of the knee joint that prevents hyperextension and excessive rotation of the joint. A complete tear of the ACL necessitating reconstruction could require up to 12 months of rehabilitation.

ANTI-INFLAMMATORY: any agent, which prevents inflammation, such as aspirin or ibuprofen.

ANTERIOGRAM: a film demonstrating arteries after injection of a dye.

ARTHROGRAM: x-ray technique for joints using air and/or dye injected into the affected area; useful in diagnosing meniscus tears of the knee and rotator cuff tears of the shoulder.

ARTHROSCOPE: an instrument used to visualize the interior of a joint cavity.

ARTHROSCOPY: a surgical examination of the internal structures of a joint by means of viewing through an Arthroscope. An arthroscopic procedure can be used to remove or repair damaged tissue or as a diagnostic procedure in order to inspect the extent of any damage or confirm a diagnosis.

ASPIRATION: the withdrawal of fluid from a body cavity by means of a suction or siphonage apparatus, such as a syringe.

ATROPHY: to shrivel or shrink from disuse, as in muscular atrophy.

AVASCULAR NECROSIS: death of a part due to lack of circulation.

BAKER'S CYST: localized swelling of a bursa sac in the posterior knee as a result of fluid that has escaped from the knee capsule. A Baker's cyst indicates that there is trauma inside the knee joint that leads to excessive fluid production.

BONE SCAN: an imaging procedure in which a radioactive-labeled substance is injected into the body to determine the status of a bone injury. If the bone at the injury sight takes up the radioactive substance, the injury will show a "hot spot" on the scan image. The bone scan is particularly useful in the diagnosis of stress fractures.

BRACHIAL PLEXUS: network of nerves originating from the cervical vertebrae and running down to the shoulder, arm, hand and fingers.

BURSA: a fluid-filled sac that is located in areas where friction is likely to occur, then minimizes the friction; for example between a tendon and bone.

CAPSULE: an enclosing structure which surrounds the joint and contains ligaments, which stabilize that joint.

CAT SCAN: use of a computer to produce a cross-sectional view of the anatomical part being investigated from x-ray data.

CELLULITIS: inflammation of cellular or connective tissue.

CERVICAL VERTEBRAE: group of seven vertebrae located in the neck.

COLLATERAL LIGAMENT: on either side of and acting as a radius of movement, a hinge joint, as of the elbow, knee and wrist.

CONCUSSION: jarring injury of the brain resulting in dysfunction. It can be graded as mild, moderate or severe depending on loss of consciousness, amnesia and loss of equilibrium.

CONTUSION: an injury to a muscle and tissues caused by a blow from a blunt object.

DEGENERATIVE JOINT DISEASE: changes in the joint surfaces as a result of repetitive trauma.

DELTOID LIGAMENT: ligament that connects the tibia to bones of the medial aspect of the foot and is primarily responsible for stability of the ankle on the medial side. Is sprained less frequently than other ankle ligaments.

DELTOID MUSCLE: muscles at the top of the arm, just below the shoulder, responsible for shoulder motions to the front, side and back.

DISC, INTERVERTEBRAL: a flat, rounded plate between each vertebrae of the spine. The disc consists of a thick fiber ring, which surrounds a soft gel-like interior. It functions as a cushion and shock absorber for the spinal column.

DISLOCATION: complete displacement of joint surfaces.

DUSKY: areas of decreased temperature may indicate arterial compromise and decreased tissue viability.

ECCYMOSSIS: bleeding into the surface tissue below the skin, resulting in a "black and blue" effect.

EDEMA: accumulation of fluid in organs and tissues of the body; swelling.

EFFUSION: accumulation of fluid in various spaces in the body. Commonly, the knee has an effusion after an injury.

ELECTROMYOGRAM (EMG): test to determine nerve function.

EPICONDYLITIS: inflammation in the elbow due to overuse.

ERYTHEMA: inflammatory redness of the skin.

EXUDATE: any fluid that has exuded out of a tissue or its capillaries, specifically because of injury or inflammation.

FRACTURE: breach in continuity of a bone. Types of fractures include simple, compound, comminuted, greenstick, incomplete, impacted, longitudinal, oblique, stress or transverse.

GADOLINIUM MRI: the chemical gadolinium is injected into the joint being studied to enhance the diagnosis image of the structures under investigation.

GRADE ONE INJURY: a mild injury in which ligament, tendon, or other musculoskeletal tissue may have been stretched or confused, but not torn or otherwise disrupted.

GRADE TWO INJURY: a moderate injury in which musculoskeletal tissue has been partially, but not totally torn which causes appreciable limitation in function of the injured tissue.

GRADE THREE INJURY: a severe injury in which tissue has been significantly, and in some cases totally, torn or otherwise disrupted causing a virtual total loss of function.

HEMATOMA: tumor-like mass produced by an accumulation of coagulated blood in a cavity.

MEDICAL GLOSSARY

ILLIOTIBIAL BAND: a thick, wide fascial layer that runs from the iliac crest to the knee joint and is occasionally inflamed as a result of excessive running.

INFLAMMATION: the body's natural response to injury in which the injury site might display various degrees of pain, swelling, heat, redness and/or loss of function.

LABRUM: an edge, rim or lip-shaped structure found in the shoulder joint.

LIGAMENT: band of fibrous tissue that connects bone to bone or bone to cartilage and supports and strengthens joints.

MAGNETIC RESONANCE IMAGING (MRI): imaging procedure in which a radio frequency pulse causes certain electrical elements of the injured tissue to react to this pulse and through this process a computer display and permanent film establish a visual image. MRI does not require radiation and is very useful in the diagnosis of soft tissue, disc and meniscus injuries.

MENISCECTOMY: an intra-articular surgical procedure of the knee by which all or part of the damaged meniscus is removed.

MENISCUS: crescent-shaped cartilage, usually pertaining to the knee joint; also known as "cartilage." There are two menisci in the knee, medial and lateral. These work to absorb weight within the knee and provide stability.

METACARPALS: five long bones of the hand running from the wrist to the fingers.

METATARSALS: five long bones of the foot, running from the ankle to the toes.

PATELLA TENDINITIS: inflammation of the patellar ligament; also known as "jumpers knee."

PATELLOFEMORAL JOINT: articulation of the kneecap and femur. Inflammation of this joint can occur through: 1) acute injury to the patella, 2) overuse from excessive running particularly if there is an associated knee weakness, 3) chronic wear and tear of the knee, 4) as a result of poor foot mechanics. Patellofemoral irritation can lead to chondromalacia, which in its most chronic condition, could require surgery.

PHLEBITIS: inflammation of a vein.

PLICA: fold of tissue in the joint capsule and a common result of knee injury.

POSTERIOR CRUCIATE LIGAMENT (PCL): a primary stabilizing ligament of the knee that provides significant stability and prevents displacement of the tibia backward within the knee joint. A complete tear of this ligament necessitating reconstruction could require up to 12 months of rehabilitation.

RECONSTRUCTION: surgical rebuilding of a joint using natural, artificial or transplanted materials.

ROTATOR CUFF: comprised of four muscles in the shoulder area that can be irritated by overuse. The muscles are the supraspinatus (most commonly injured), infraspinatus, teres minor and subscapularis.

ROTATOR CUFF IMPINGEMENT SYNDROME: a microtrauma or overuse injury caused by stress, and the four stages are: 1) tendinitis with temporary thickening of the bursa and rotator cuff; 2) fiber dissociation in the tendon with permanent thickening of the bursa and scar formation; 3) a partial rotator cuff tear of less than one cm and 4) a complete tear of one cm or more

SCAPULA: shoulder blade.

SCIATICA: irritation of the sciatic nerve resulting in pain or tingling running down the inside of the leg.

SCIATIC NERVE: major nerve that carries impulses for muscular action and sensations between the low back and thigh and lower leg; it is the longest nerve in the body.

SHIN SPLINT: a catch-all syndrome describing pain in the shin that is not a fracture or tumor and cannot be defined otherwise.

SPONDYLITIS: inflammation of one or more vertebrae.

SPONDYLOLISTHESIS: forward displacement of one vertebra over another below it due to a developmental defect in the vertebrae.

SPONDYLOSIS: abnormal vertebral fixation or immobility.

SPRAIN: injury resulting from a stretch or twist of the joint and causes various degrees of stretch or tear to the muscle or tendon tissue.

STRAIN: injury resulting from a pull or torsion to the muscle or tendon that causes various degrees of stretch or tear to the muscle or tendon tissue.

STRESS FRACTURE: a hair-line type break in a bone caused by overuse.

STRESS X-RAY: a continual x-ray taken when a portion of the body is stressed to its maximum in order to determine joint stability. This is a test utilized in some ankle injuries.

SUBLAXATION: partial dislocation of a joint. The term usually implies that the joint can return to its normal position without formal reduction.

TARSALS: a group of seven bones of the foot consisting of the calcaneus, talus, cuboid and three cuneiform bones.

TENDINITIS: inflammation of the tendon and/or tendon sheath, caused by chronic overuse or sudden injury.

TENDON: tissue that connects muscle to bone.

THORACIC OUTLET COMPRESSION SYNDROME: a neuro-vascular disorder of the upper extremity common in throwing.

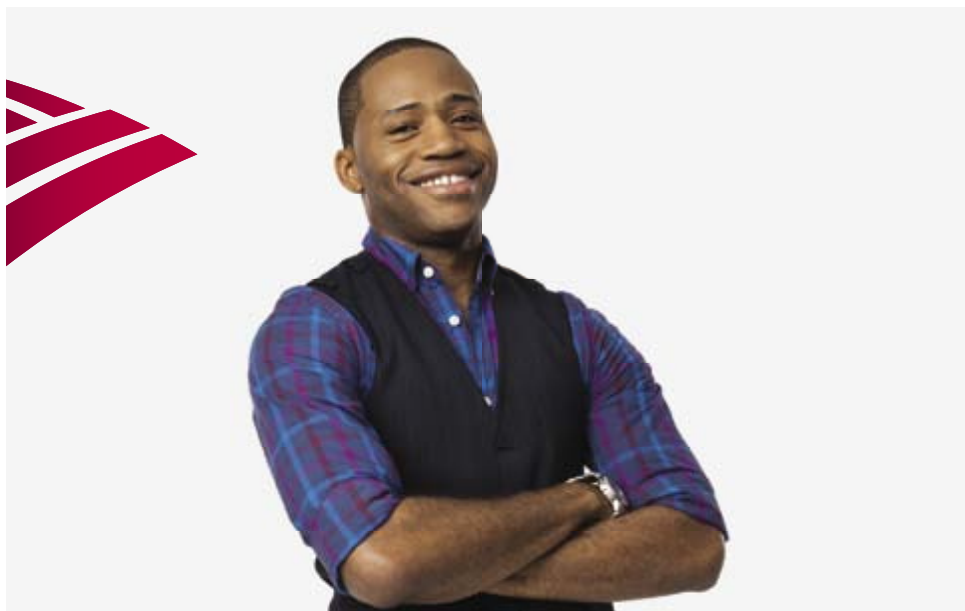
TOMOGRAPH: a special type of x-ray apparatus that demonstrates an organ or tissue at a particular depth.

TRANSVERSE PROCESS: small lateral projection off the right and left side of each vertebra that functions as an attachment site for muscles and ligaments of the spine.

TRIANGULAR CARTILAGE: a connective tissue characterized by its nonvascularity and firm consistency; located on the little finger side of the wrist.

ULNAR NERVE: nerve in the elbow commonly irritated by excessive throwing.

WRIST: the junction between the two forearm bones (radius and ulna) and the eight wrist bones (trapezium, capitate, hamate, pisiform, triquetrum, lunate and scaphoid).

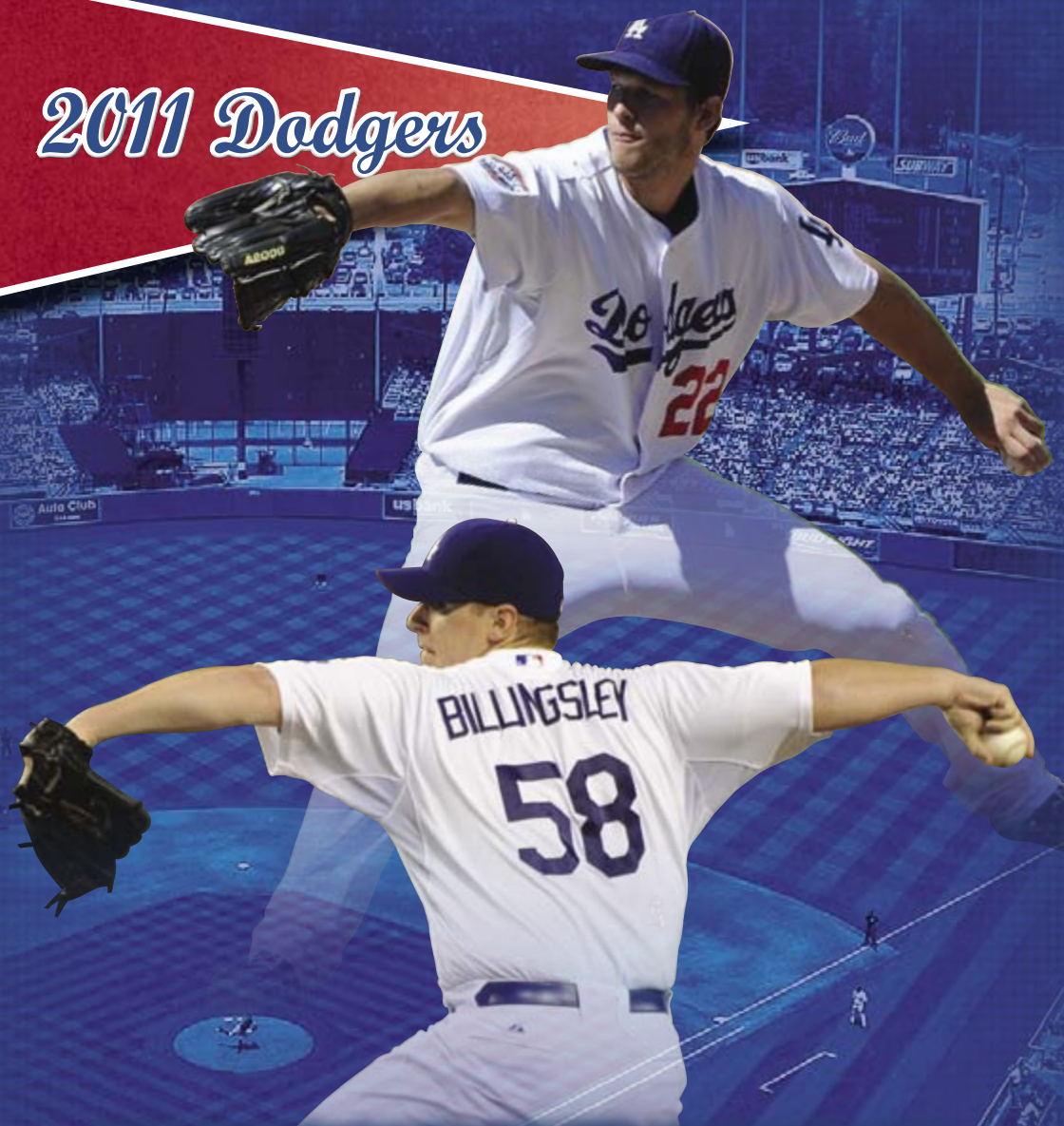

Right-hander completed his fifth Major League campaign with Los Angeles going 12-11 and now boasts a winning record in each of his eight professional seasons...is 59-41 with a 3.55 ERA in 160 career Major League games (131 starts)...his 59 big league victories are more than any other pitcher in the 2003 draft class by a wide margin and his 52 wins since 2007 are tied for eighth among current National League pitchers...tossed a career-long 24.2 scoreless innings from July 21-Aug. 5, 2010...posted a 3.05 ERA in 15 starts after the 2010 All-Star break...made his first All-Star team in 2009 and led the staff with 12 wins...has won a club-best 52 games over the past four seasons...in 2009, ranked 12th in the NL with 179 strikeouts and his 551 strikeouts since the start of the 2008 season ranks sixth in the NL over that time...ranked first among Dodger starters with a 3.14 ERA in 2008...also led the Dodgers with 201 strikeouts, which ranked fifth in the National League and ninth in the Majors...in 2008, was the first Dodger pitcher since 2001 to strike out 200 batters in a season...was rated as the 24th-best player in Major League Baseball under the age of 29 in the 2008 Bill James Handbook...his 19 victories during his first two seasons were the most by a Dodger since Kazuhisa Ishii won 23 games from 2002-03...began the 2007 season with a 7-0 record, becoming the first Dodger to start a season with seven consecutive victories since Matt Herges in 2001...was named the Dodger organization's Branch Rickey Minor League Pitcher of the Year in 2004 and 2005...was rated by *Baseball America* as the club's top prospect entering the 2006 season...also was tabbed by the publication as the best pitching prospect in the Southern League and the pitcher with the best breaking ball...has struck out a career-high 13 batters on two different occasions (July 13, 2008 vs. FLA and Sept. 26, 2010 at Arizona)...made his Major League debut on June 15, 2006 at San Diego and fanned Mike Cameron in the first inning for his first big league strikeout...notched his first big league victory on July 18, 2006 at Arizona...fired his first Major League shutout on July 30, 2008 vs. San Francisco, allowing just five hits...won his first-ever postseason start in Game 2 of the NLDS at Wrigley Field in 2008...originally selected in the first round (24th overall) of the June 2003 First-Year Player Draft.

CAREER SUMMARY

- ◆ Had a stellar first half of the season, going 3-0 with 21 saves and a 2.11 ERA in 39 games, and was named to his second-consecutive NL All-Star team... ranked ninth among NL relievers in ERA before the All-Star break...successfully converted 19 of his 21 save opportunities, including a stretch of 18 straight from May 7-July 8...his 19 saves in the first half tied for ninth on the circuit

- ◆ Named to his second NL All-Star squad and walked in his only plate appearance in the Midsummer Classic on July 13...was named to the team as an injury replacement on the Sunday before the game...ranked second in the NL with a .333 batting average (81-for-243) in 58 games before the All-Star break
- ◆ Posted a .460 slugging percentage, which was the second-highest mark of his career behind only his .573 mark over 36 games in an injury-shortened 2008 season
- ◆ Batted .306 (105-for-343) out of the leadoff spot, the third-highest mark in the top spot in the NL...the Dodgers went 44-38 when he started as the club's leadoff hitter
- ◆ Hit .310 as a left-handed batter against right-handed pitchers, the 10th-best mark in the National League (min. 200 at-bats)...batted .277 (31-for-122) from the right side of the plate
- ◆ Batted .354 (45-for-127) with runners on base and .316 (25-for-79) with runners in scoring position, including a perfect 3-for-3 with the bases loaded... hit .324 (35-for-108) from the seventh inning and later and .311 (28-for-90) with two outs
- ◆ Ranked fourth on the team with 66 runs scored despite playing in only 97 games...the Dodgers went 31-17 when he scored a run and 13-2 when he scored twice
- ◆ Led the Dodgers with 22 stolen bases in 26 attempts...stroked a team-best seven triples
- ◆ Tied a career high for the third time with five hits on June 15 at Cincinnati...tied for 18th in the NL with 13 games with three or more hits...had 34 multi-hit games in just 97 contests
- ◆ On June 13 vs. Angels, hit his 26th career first inning leadoff home run...was his 14th in a Dodger uniform, which ranks second in franchise history behind Davey Lopes' 28
- ◆ Appeared in 97 games, missing a total of 52 games while on the disabled list due to a strained left hamstring from April 28-May 25 and a low back strain from Aug. 3-Sept. 3...was placed on the bereavement list from June 17-23 while mourning the loss of his father
- ◆ Named Farmers Insurance Dodger Player of the Month for June after ranking seventh in the National League with a .362 batting average (34-for-94) and tying for fourth on the circuit with 21 runs in 22 games in the month...also had six doubles, three triples, three homers, 16 RBI and four steals in June
- ◆ Batted .512 (22-for-43) during his season-long 10-game hitting streak from June 26-July 6, which included seven-consecutive multi-hit games from June 26-July 3
- ◆ Scored a run in 12 straight games from June 24-July 6 to set a new Los Angeles Dodgers' record...the next longest run-scoring streak in Dodger history is Brooklyn Dodger Zack Wheat's 13-game streak from Aug. 18-28, 1925
- ◆ Selected as the Bank of America Presents NL Player of the Week Award for June 28-July 4, batting a Major League-best .538 (14-for-26) with nine runs, two homers and five RBI in six games
- ◆ Hit the 100th home run of his career on July 30 at San Francisco with a third-inning solo shot off Tim Lincecum...drove in the 500th run of his career on July 8 with a seventh-inning two-run homer off of Randy Wells, giving the Dodgers a 3-2 comeback victory over the Cubs
- ◆ Moved into third place on the Los Angeles Dodgers' all-time games played list at shortstop with 572
- ◆ Rated by *Baseball America* as having the National League's best infield arm and as the circuit's third-best bunter in the publication's 2010 annual "tools" issue

2009

- ◆ Started 141 of the Dodgers' 162 games at shortstop, including 69 of 74 after the All-Star break
- ◆ His 150 games played were his most since 2006, when he played in 159 games in his first year in a Dodger uniform
- ◆ Batted .296 (42-for-142) against left-handers and .261 (123-for-471) against right-handers
- ◆ Stole only 12 bases, his lowest total in any of his nine full Major League seasons
- ◆ Committed 20 errors to tie for third among National League shortstops with Washington's Cristian Guzman behind San Diego's Everth Cabrera (23) and Houston's Miguel Tejada (21)
- ◆ Hit .330 (37-for-112) in 27 games in September/October to rank second on the team...led the club in September/October with eight doubles and 21 runs scored
- ◆ Reached base safely in 24 straight games to end the season, batting .350 (35-for-100) with 12 walks, a hit batsman and a .425 on-base percentage
- ◆ Hit safely in 14 of his last 15 games beginning September 14, batting .387 (24-for-62) with 13 runs scored to raise his average to .269 from .256
- ◆ Had a season-high 12-game hitting streak from September 14-29, when he batted .404 (21-for-52) with 12 runs scored...in fact from September 4 through the end of that streak, hit safely in 21 of 22 games, batting .344 (32-for-93) with 20 runs scored in that time
- ◆ Stole six bases in his final 15 games after going 43 consecutive games without a stolen base from July 29-September 13
- ◆ Hit two first-inning lead-off home runs: April 16 vs. San Francisco and August 5 vs. Milwaukee...has 25 such homers in his career, 13 in a Dodger uniform
- ◆ Reached base safely in each of his first 24 games played through May 4, but batted only .257 (26-for-101) with 12 walks and a .336 on-base percentage in that span...was one of only four players to accomplish the feat, joining Carlos Beltran, Nick Markakis and Albert Pujols
- ◆ On June 6 vs. Philadelphia, hit a game-tying solo homer off Brad Lidge with one out in the ninth to tie it at 2-2
- ◆ Had a season-high four hits three times: July 3 at San Diego, September 22 and 24 at Washington
- ◆ Went 10-for-14 (.714) in a three-game series at Washington from September 22-24...since the franchise moved to Los Angeles

after the 1957 season, only one other Dodger player had a .700-or-higher average in at least 12 at-bats in one series...Jimmy Wynn was 13-for-18 (.722) in a four-game set against the Padres in 1974 (thanks Elias)

- ◆ Had an 11-game hitting streak from July 20-31, when he batted .373 (19-for-51) with eight runs scored...would go on to hit safely in 17 of 18 games through August 7, batting .329 (28-for-85) during that time...had a 10-game hitting streak from June 5-17, but batted just .294 (10-for-34) in that time
- ◆ Started each of the Dodgers' eight postseason games...tied with Andre Ethier for the club lead with six hits in the Division Series vs. St. Louis, batting .500 (6-for-12) with a triple and two RBI in three games

2008

- ◆ Missed 125 games with an injured lower back...went on the 15-day disabled list on May 13 (retroactive to May 6), and did not return until September 24...had surgery on his back on July 3...finished the year hitting .357 (51-for-143) with five homers and 16 RBI in just 36 games
- ◆ Appeared in four games (three starts) during the final week of the season...struck out as a pinch-hitter in his first game on Sept. 24 vs. San Diego...then started three straight games at shortstop from September 25-27...went 2-for-9 with a walk and two strikeouts in the four games
- ◆ From Opening Day to May 5, led the Dodgers with a .366 average (49-for-134), 12 doubles, five homers, 34 runs scored, a .448 on-base percentage, and a .597 slugging percentage in 32 games...batted leadoff in 31 of those games

- ◆ Underwent back surgery on July 3...the one-hour, 15-minute procedure, called a microdiscectomy, was performed by Dr. Robert Watkins at Marina Del Rey Hospital
- ◆ Began a rehabilitation assignment on June 30, played one game, and had to shut it down again due to continued soreness...was transferred to the 60-day disabled list on July 4, when Nomar Garciaparra returned to the 40-man roster from the 60-day disabled list
- ◆ Appeared in eight postseason games, batting .258 (8-for-31) with a home run, three RBI and nine runs scored
- ◆ Hit three first-inning leadoff home runs, running his career total to 23...turned the trick April 12 vs. San Diego, April 21 at Cincinnati, and May 5 vs. New York Mets...has 11 such homers as a Dodger to rank second in franchise history behind Davey Lopes, who hit 28 from 1973-81
- ◆ Tied a career high with five hits on April 30 at Florida, going 5-for-6 with a double and three runs scored...also had five hits July 10, 2005 vs. Milwaukee with Atlanta
- ◆ Scored at least one run in 10 straight games from April 23-May 3 (16 total)

2007

- ◆ Began the season on the 15-day disabled list after suffering a sprained left ankle during Spring Training when he collided with Jason Repko in center field on March 22...came off the DL on April 13 but was never at full strength throughout the season
- ◆ Snapped a streak of seven consecutive seasons in which his teams reached the postseason, the second-longest active streak in the NL behind Jason Marquis (8)
- ◆ Put together one of the greatest three-game stretches in Major League history from May 13-15...became the first player in Los Angeles Dodger history and just the fifth Major Leaguer in the last 55 years to record three consecutive four-hit games...during the tear, had eight straight hits, which tied the L.A. Dodger record held by Ron Cey... went 2-for-4 the day before the three-game stretch to give him 14 hits in 16 at-bats, becoming the first Major Leaguer to accomplish that feat since Derek Bell from April 20-24, 2000...also became the fifth Los Angeles Dodger with two consecutive four-hit games, joining Willie Davis (1966), Manny Mota (1969), Jimmy Wynn (1974) and Steve Garvey (1976)
- ◆ Tied his career high and the Dodger season high with a 15-game hitting streak from May 12-30, raising his average from .218 to .309 during the streak
- ◆ Became the first Dodger since Jason Repko in 2005 to hit two triples in a game when he accomplished the feat on June 13 against the Mets
- ◆ Hit two leadoff home runs during the season to give him 20 in his career and eight as a Dodger, moved into fourth in franchise history behind Davey Lopes (28), Johnny Frederick (10), and Jim Gilliam (9)
- ◆ Ranked second on the Dodgers with 25 stolen bases, including a career-high four on Sept. 15 vs. Arizona to join Kenny Lofton as the only Major Leaguers to steal four bases in a game in 2007...had a span of eight stolen bases in four games, joining Maury Wills as the only Los Angeles Dodgers to accomplish that feat
- ◆ Was 12-for-12 in stolen bases during the month of September and will enter 2008 with a streak of 13 consecutive steals without getting caught
- ◆ Among all Major League shortstops, ranked second with a 4.92 range factor, which is calculated similarly to ERA (by adding a player's putouts and assists and dividing by nine...those with the best range tend to have more putouts and assists per nine innings than other shortstops)...only Colorado's Troy Tulowitzki (5.39) was better
- ◆ Batted .313 vs. left-handed pitchers and .254 vs. right-handers
- ◆ Batted .397 (29-for-73) when putting the first pitch in play
- ◆ Batted .298 (88-for-295) at Dodger Stadium
- ◆ Had his best months in May (.371 average and .441 on-base percentage) and July (.324 BA and .372 OBP)
- ◆ Had a Dodger season high and equaled his career high with four runs scored on Aug. 22 at Philadelphia
- ◆ The Dodgers were 73-65 in games in which he started
- ◆ His eighth-inning, game-winning homer gave the Aquilas a 2-1 victory for the Dominican League title...hit .361 with a .395 OBP during the regular season and then led all Dominican players during the round-robin tournament in RBI (15) and stolen bases (7)... was tied for the lead with three triples and second in the league with 27 hits...during the playoffs, he got on base at a .398 clip and posted a .440 slugging percentage

2006

- ◆ In his first season with the Dodgers, ranked among National League leaders in hits (196, T-5th), multi-hit games (62, 4th), at-bats (654, 4th), games played (159, T-6th), plate appearances (736, 4th), singles (140, 2nd), stolen bases (37, 7th), runs scored (113, 10th), home batting average (.333, 9th), bunt hits (9, 6th), average with runners in scoring position (.346, 8th) and was the ninth hardest player to double up in the NL (one GIDP per 93.4 at-bats).

- ◆ Finished 14th in NL MVP voting...received one seventh-place vote, three ninth-place votes and one 10th-place vote
- ◆ Was awarded the inaugural Roy Campanella Award as the "Most Inspirational Dodger" as voted upon by his teammates and coaches
- ◆ His career-high 196 hits were the most by a first-year Dodger since Johnny Frederick logged 206 for Brooklyn in 1929
- ◆ Set career highs in batting average (.300), games (159), RBI (63), and hits (196) and tied his career high in homers (15) and walks (73)
- ◆ From May 1 through the end of the season, batted .317 with all 15 homers and 61 of his 63 RBI...ranked eighth in the league in average during that span
- ◆ His 113 runs scored were the most by a Dodger since Shawn Green (121 in 2001) and the most by a Dodger leadoff hitter since Maury Wills (130 in 1962)...scored 100 runs for the fourth consecutive season since 2003, one of only five Major Leaguers to accomplish that feat...his 113 runs rank fourth on the L.A. 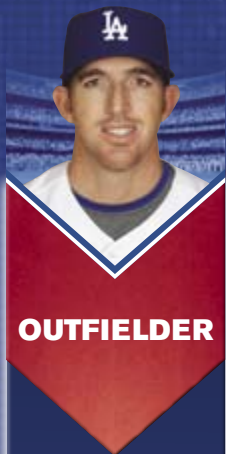

CAREER SUMMARY

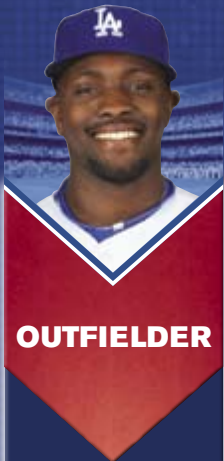

CAREER SUMMARY

Left-handed reliever made his first All-Star Team and completed a dominating campaign in 2010, his 11th season in the organization...finished the season going 3-2 with a 1.20 ERA (8 ER/60.0 IP) and 12 saves in 56 games...became the first-ever Taiwanese All-Star...his 1.200 ERA was the lowest in Dodger history among pitchers with at least 50.0 innings pitched, besting Eric Gagne's 1.202 ERA in 2003...led all Major League relievers in ERA...allowed just 29 hits on the season and limited the opposition to a .139 batting average...that mark led all Major League relievers...opponents' .192 slugging percentage against him was also tops among big league relievers...in 2009, won his first career postseason game in Game 2 of the NLCS vs. Philadelphia on Oct. 16...in 2008, his first full season in the big leagues, the left-hander was one of the best relievers in baseball...in an award given by MLB.com, was voted by the fans as the 2008 Set-Up Man of the Year...battled left rotator cuff and left elbow injuries in 2007, but bounced back to lead National League relievers in 2008 with a 1.69 ERA...is 12-15 with 13 saves and a 3.19 ERA in 178 Major League games (14 starts) over six seasons...has struck out 309 batters in 265.1 innings of work, an average of 10.5 per nine innings... accompanied the club to China in March 2008 for the first-ever Major League Baseball games played on Chinese soil...also traveled with the team to Taiwan in March 2010...hit the first home run in Major League history by a Taiwanese-born player when he went deep on June 12, 2007 vs. New York Mets...holds the record for the fewest wins at the time of a postseason start, as he had only one Major League win entering Game 2 of the 2006 NLDS against the Mets...participated in the inaugural World Baseball Classic in 2006 for Team Chinese Taipei...was the first Taiwanese high school player to ink a professional contract when he signed with the Dodgers...made his Major League debut on Sept. 2, 2005 at Colorado...beat the Mets at Shea Stadium on Sept. 8, 2006 in his first big league start and recorded his first big league win...was originally signed by the Dodgers as a non-drafted free agent on June 19, 1999.

- ◆ Batters were 11-for-86 (.128) with runners on and 6-for-49 (.122) with runners in scoring position...the opposition was 1-for-28 (.036) with RISP and two outs

◆ Went 7-4 with a 3.52 ERA in 12 starts with the Dodgers after being acquired on July 31 along with Ryan Theriot from the Cubs in exchange for Blake DeWitt and minor league pitchers Kyle Smit and Brett Wallach...returned to the Dodger organization after being originally drafted by the club in 1996

- ◆ Overall, went 10-12 with a 3.62 ERA in 30 combined starts with the Dodgers and Cubs...reached the 10-win plateau for the eighth consecutive year on the final day of the season
- ◆ Tossed 6.0 or more innings in 24 of his 30 starts (10 of 12 starts with LA) while going 7.0 or more innings 15 times this season (seven with LA)
- ◆ Tied with Tim Hudson and Josh Johnson for the ninth-lowest opponents' batting average in the NL, holding the opposition to a .229 average...limited right-handed hitters to a .213 batting average (125-for-587), the fifth-lowest average among qualifying National League starters
- ◆ Walked just 44 in 193.2 innings this season for an average of 2.04 walks per 9.0 innings, the second lowest mark in the National League behind Philadelphia's Roy Halladay (1.08)...permitted an average of just 9.94 baserunners per 9.0 innings (214 BR/192.3 IP), the sixth-fewest on the Senior Circuit

- ◆ On Aug. 19 against Colorado, struck out a season-high 11 batters and allowed just two hits in his third career shutout and the fifth complete game of his career...at one point, set down 19 consecutive Rockies hitters in his fourth start in Dodger blue
- ◆ With Los Angeles, limited opposing hitters to a .218 batting average (61-for-280) with 77 strikeouts in 76.2 innings, while walking only 15...opposing batters hit just .189 (10-for-53) with 21 strikeouts with runners in scoring position and he held right-handed hitters to a .196 batting average (46-for-235)
- ◆ Went 4-1 with a 2.09 ERA (10 ER/43.0 IP) in his six starts at Dodger Stadium, while limiting opposing hitters to a .163 average (24-for-147) at home

- ◆ Finished his third season in Chicago with a career-low 3.10 ERA (61 ER/177.0 IP) and a 12-9 mark in 27 starts, while earning a spot on the National League All-Star Team ... recorded 21 quality starts
- ◆ Was his second career All-Star honor and first since 2004, but did not appear in the National League's 4-3 setback.
- ◆ Went 3-3 with a 2.95 ERA (19 ER/58.0 IP) in the second half of the season (nine starts) ... began the year 9-6 with a 3.18 ERA (42 ER/119.0 IP) in 18 starts prior to the All-Star Break.
- ◆ Lowered his monthly ERA each of the first three months of the season: 3.80 in April, 3.32 in May and 3.12 in June.
- ◆ Was shelved July 25, retroactive to July 21, with left shoulder inflammation...was activated Aug.17 and made the start that night in San Diego, tossing 6.0 shutout innings...while on the D.L., had arthroscopic surgery on his left knee.
- ◆ Ranked third in the Majors with a 1.87 home ERA (19 ER/91.1 IP) ... had a 4.41 ERA (42 ER/85.2 IP) away from the Friendly Confines...tossed 6.0 or more innings in each of his 13 home starts.
- ◆ Tied a single-season club record with 12 consecutive home quality starts, April 13-Sept. 3.

- ◆ Underwent arthroscopic surgery on his left shoulder on Nov. 3 in Los Angeles ... the surgery was performed by Dr. Lewis Yocum.

- ◆ Set career marks with 17 victories and 184 strikeouts while tying his career high with 34 starts ... his 204.2 innings of work narrowly missed his career high of 207.0 innings pitched in 2007.
- ◆ Finished the season 17-9 with a 4.09 ERA (93 ER/204.2 IP) in 34 starts... his 17 victories were the most by a Cubs southpaw in 38 years since Ken Holtzman won 17 games in 1970.
- ◆ His 184 strikeouts were the fourth-highest single-season total by a southpaw in franchise history ... the top three: Ken Holtzman with 202 strikeouts in 1970, Hippo Vaughn with 195 in 1917 and Dick Ellsworth with 185 in 1963.

- ◆ Went 10-4 with a 3.77 ERA (48 ER/114.2 IP) in 19 road starts ... became just the second Cubs lefty to win 10 games on the road ... Dick Ellsworth also accomplished the feat, going 10-5 away from Wrigley in 1963.
- ◆ Went 17-6 with a 3.58 ERA (74 ER/186.0 IP) in his final 30 outings after beginning the season 0-3 with a 9.16 ERA (19 ER/18.2 IP) in his first four starts.
- ◆ Was 8-3 with a 3.32 ERA (33 ER/89.1 IP) in the second half of the season ... began the year 9-6 with a 4.68 ERA (60 ER/115.1 IP) in 20 starts prior to the All-Star Game.
- ◆ Surrendered a career-high 32 home runs.
- ◆ Combined to go 8-1 with a 3.79 ERA (32 ER/76.0 IP) in 12 starts in May and June.
- ◆ Was 7-5 with a 4.50 ERA (45 ER/90.0 IP) in 15 home starts.

- ◆ Opponents batted .230 off the southpaw, second lowest in the A.L...left-handed hitters batted .196 (sixth in A.L.) and right-handed batters hit .238.
- ◆ Allowed a team-high 26 home runs, 22 by right-handed hitters.
- ◆ Made his Blue Jays debut on April 9 at Boston in the Red Sox home opener and recorded a no-decision in Toronto's first win of the season.
- ◆ Spun a complete-game two-hitter on April 26 at Minnesota in his 100th career game, 75th start.
- ◆ On Aug. 23 vs. Boston, he pitched his second complete game of the season and first shutout as a Blue Jay...was his fourth career complete effort and second career shutout.

In Dodger history, there have been 15 players who have made their big league debut before their 19th birthday, including Tommy Brown, the youngest Dodger to take the field when he did so on Aug. 3, 1944 at the age of 16 years and 173 days old. The most recent 18-year old to play for Los Angeles was Willie Crawford, who was 18 years and 9 days old when he played on Sept. 16, 1964.

Conversely, there have been just 14 players to appear for the Dodgers after turning 42, with the most recent case being David Wells, who was 44 years and 131 days old in his last game on Sept. 28, 2007. The oldest Dodger was Hoyt Wilhelm, who pitched for the Dodgers at 49 years and 349 days old on July 10, 1972.

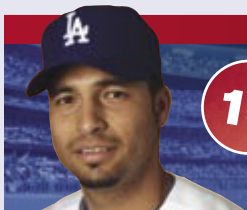

Greys (1884-1888) - From the color of their uniforms. They were also called the Brooklynns and the Church City Nine

Bridegrooms (or Grooms) (1889-1891) - Six players were married in the offseason

Ward's Wonders (1891-1893) - After Brooklyn manager John Montgomery Ward

Foutz's Fillies (1893-1897) - After Brooklyn manager Dave Foutz

Trolley Dodgers (1896-1898) - The heavy concentration of electric trolley car tracks in front of Eastern Park caused fans to dodge the trolleys to reach the park. Manhattanites and other visitors began calling the Brooklyn fans Trolley Dodgers. The name eventually was given to the team.

Dodgers (1899-PRESENT) - Shortened version of Trolley Dodgers. The Brooklyn National League Baseball Club referred to their team as the Dodgers on their World Series programs in 1916 and 1920.

Superbas (1899- 1924) - After the vaudeville group named Hanlon's Superbas. Ned Hanlon was the Dodger manager.

Robins (1915- 1931) - After Brooklyn manager Wilbert Robinson

The Flock (1931-1957) - The Flatbush Flock- A nickname given to the team by newspaper writers

Bums (1937-1957) - More commonly known as Dem Bums. An endearing nickname derived from the Loveable Bum cartoon of newspaper cartoonist Willard Mullin. This nickname could only be used by a rabid Dodger fan. If a non-Dodger fan called the Brooklyn team Bums, it was reason enough to fight.

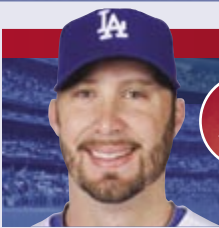

KOUFAX'S PERFECT GAME

The only perfect game in Dodger history was authored by Hall of Fame left-hander Sandy Koufax on Sept. 9, 1965 in front of 29,139 at Dodger Stadium. During the 1-0 victory over the Chicago Cubs, Koufax struck out 14 batters and improved his season record to 22-7. Koufax struck out the final six Cubs he faced – Ron Santo, Ernie Banks and Byron Browne in the eighth inning; Chris Krug, Joe Amalfitano and pinch-hitter Harvey Kuenn in the ninth. The Dodgers managed just one hit and a walk off Cubs left-hander Bob Hendley (2-3), who also pitched the distance. The only hit – Lou Johnson's two-out bloop double to right field in the seventh inning – didn't matter in the scoring. Johnson opened the fifth inning with a walk, advanced to second on Ron Fairly's sacrifice bunt, stole third base and scored when catcher Krug's throw sailed into left field. In addition to Koufax becoming the first pitcher to hurl four no-hitters in his career, the 1-hour, 43-minute game also featured a Major League record for fewest runners left on base by both teams (1).

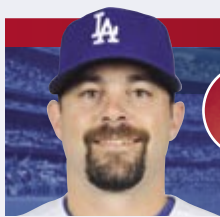

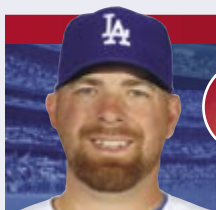

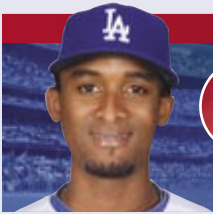

2010 DODGER NOTES

BY THE SLIMMEST MARGIN - At 80-82, the Dodgers posted their first losing season since going 71-91 in 2005. The Dodgers have finished below .500 just four times since 1990 (1992, 1999, 2005 and 2010) and have only posted a losing record 13 times since moving to Los Angeles in 1958 (1958, 1964, 1967, 1968, 1979, 1984, 1986, 1987, 1989, 1992, 1999, 2005 and 2010).

THAT'S A LOT OF WS - Dodger Manager Joe Torre announced on Sept. 17 that he was stepping aside from the position at season's end. Torre finished his three seasons as a Dodger skipper with a 259-227 record (.533), which is the eighth-highest winning percentage among Dodger managers with at least 50 games managed. Torre walks away with 2,326 career managerial victories, which ranks fifth on the all-time list, behind Connie Mack (3,731), John McGraw (2,763), Tony LaRussa (2,638) and Bobby Cox (2,504).

*Torre's record-tying streak of 14 consecutive postseason trips came to an end in 2010. His 84 playoff victories are the most all-time.

DON OF THE DODGERS - The Dodgers also announced on Sept. 17 that hitting coach Don Mattingly would pilot the Dodgers in 2011, making him the ninth skipper in Los Angeles Dodgers' history and the franchise's 27th manager. Mattingly has served on Joe Torre's staff as the bench or hitting coach for the last seven seasons with the Yankees and Dodgers. Mattingly was tapped to manage the Phoenix Desert Dogs in the 2010 Arizona Fall League, which runs from Oct. 12-Nov. 18.

TRADER NED - Dodger General Manager Ned Colletti completed his fifth season at the helm of the Dodgers and the club now owns a 429-381 record (.530) under his watch. Los Angeles has also won two playoff series and won eight postseason contests since Colletti took over in November 2005. In 2010, Colletti bolstered the Dodgers by acquiring Scott Podsednik, Ted Lilly, Ryan Theriot, Octavio Dotel and Rod Barajas before Aug. 31. Since taking the reins on Nov. 16, 2005 Colletti has acquired 25 Major League players via trade, including Andre Ethier, Manny Ramirez, Casey Blake, Greg Maddux, George Sherrill, Ryan Theriot, Jon Garland and Jim Thome.

NO PLACE LIKE IT - The Dodgers' paid attendance was 3,562,320 in 2010, an average of 43,979 per game. Both of these figures ranked third in the Major Leagues and second in the National League, trailing just the Phillies and Yankees. The 3.56 million is the seventh highest in L.A. Dodger history and the club has now reached the three million mark in home attendance for 15 consecutive years.

THE MANY FACES OF MY TOWN - The Dodgers' roster and disabled list at the end of the season represented nine different countries (Australia, Canada, Dominican Republic, Japan, Netherlands, Nicaragua, Taiwan, the United States and Venezuela). The final piece of that puzzle was completed on Sept. 7, when the Dodgers purchased the contract of Australian Trent Oeltjen. The 27-year-old Aussie was a bat boy during the 2000 Olympics in Sydney, Australia and was chosen to work for the United States and skipper Tommy Lasorda during the Gold Medal Game against Cuba. He is the fourth Dodger to be born in Australia, joining Craig Shipley, Luke Prokopec and Jeff Williams.

*Mexico native Juan Castro was briefly on the team in August, meaning the club represented 10 countries during the season.

RIGHT AROUND THE CORNER - The Dodgers' first Spring Training game at Camelback Ranch - Glendale is slated for Sunday, Feb. 27, 2011 vs. the Angels. In 2010, the Dodgers completed their second season in the Cactus League and drew 124,502 fans to Camelback Ranch over 14 home games. The club also played 13 road contests, two games in Taiwan and one in Las Vegas during the spring season.

2010 DODGER NOTES (CONTINUED)

THE WORLD OF DODGERTOWN - For the second time in three years, the Dodgers traveled to the Far East as the club visited Taiwan and took on the CPBL All-Stars for two games March 13 and 14. It was the Dodgers' second trip to Taiwan and first since 1993. In 2008, Los Angeles visited Beijing and nine players and coaches made both trips to Asia - Hong-Chih Kuo, Chin-lung Hu, Lucas May, Xavier Paul, John Lindsey, Eric Stults, Joe Torre, Lorenzo Bundy and John Shoemaker.

THE OLD WEST - The Dodgers were 40-32 against the National League West in 2010, good for a winning percentage of .556, which was the eighth-best record within the division in the Majors this season. Los Angeles was helped by a 13-5 mark against Arizona and an 11-7 record facing Colorado.

PROMISING START - After a dismal April that saw the club go 9-14, the Dodgers righted the ship in May, going 20-8 in the month of May and reeling off a season-high nine-game winning streak. The club was in first place and a season-high 11 games over .500 as late as June 16 and headed into the All-Star break on July 12 with a 49-39 record. Los Angeles was swept over four games in St. Louis to begin the second half and finished with a mark of 31-43 (.419) after the break, the club's worst half since going an identical 31-43 in the second half of 2005.

THE FANTASTIC FOUR - A quartet of Dodger All-Stars, the most for the franchise since 1995, helped the National League win 3-1 and beat the American League for the first time since 1996 in the All-Star Game at Angel Stadium on July 13. Jonathan Broxton tossed a scoreless ninth for the first save by a Dodger in an All-Star Game since Jim Brewer in 1973, Andre Ethier started in center field and went 1-for-2 and Rafael Furcal entered the game in the sixth inning, walking in his only at-bat. Hong-Chih Kuo surrendered the only run of the night for the NL, allowing an unearned run in the fifth after his throwing error. Broxton and Kuo were the first tandem of Dodger relievers to make the All-Star team in club history.

- Kuo was the first-ever All-Star from Taiwan and ranked third among all relievers with a 0.99 ERA at the break. In the first half, he had not allowed a left-handed batter to collect a hit (0-for-30).

- Broxton was 3-0 with and 2.11 ERA and 19 saves in 21 chances at the break.

- In 58 games, Furcal was batting a league-leading .333 at the All-Star break.

- At the break, Ethier was hitting .324 with 14 homers and 54 RBI. He was voted as a starting outfielder for the National League, tallying 2,784,419 votes to rank second among NL outfielders, about 50,000 ahead of Atlanta's Jason Heyward and about 200,000 behind Milwaukee's Ryan Braun. He became the first Dodger outfielder to make the All-Star team since Shawn Green (2002) and the first to be voted in by the fans since Darryl Strawberry in 1991.

THE BUCKS START HERE - Dodger starters Clayton Kershaw and Chad Billingsley led the staff with 13 and 12 wins, respectively. Kershaw posted a 2.91 ERA to lead the Dodger starters and as a group Rick Honeycutt's staff of starters posted a 3.99 ERA, which ranked eighth in the National League. Overall, the Dodgers' staff ERA of 4.01 also ranked eighth in the NL. Los Angeles' .234 opponents' batting average after the All-Star break ranked second in the Major Leagues, trailing just San Francisco's .230 mark. Since Honeycutt became the pitching coach in 2006, the Dodger staff's 3.90 ERA is the best in Major League Baseball.

SIMPLY THE BEST - Dodger reliever Hong-Chih Kuo posted the best ERA in baseball at 1.200. Kuo also recorded the best ERA in the 127-year-old franchise's history (min. 50 IP), besting Eric Gagné's 1.202 mark set during the 2003 season. Kuo's .139 opponents' batting average (29-for-208) ranked second-best in Dodger history behind only Gagné's .133 mark (37-for-279) in 2003.

- Kuo allowed just one run at Dodger Stadium over 31.0 innings (0.29 ERA), which is the best all time among pitchers who tossed at least 20.0 innings. The left-hander held lefty hitters to a .095 average (6-for-63) and one extra-base hit. Against the National League West, Kuo had a 0.33 ERA (1 ER/27.2 IP) in 24 games.

GROWING UP FAST - The year of 2010 was a big one for Dodger left-hander Clayton Kershaw, who posted career bests in wins (13), strikeouts (212), innings (204.1) and starts (32) while posting a 2.91 ERA to lead the starting staff. Kershaw was one of only 12 pitchers in the Majors to reach 200.0 innings and strike out more than 200 this season and he led all big league southpaws with 212 Ks. Just two left-handers have had more strikeouts in a season in franchise history - Sandy Koufax (1961-66) and Fernando Valenzuela (1984 and 1986).

- Kershaw tossed his first career complete game and shutout on Sep. 12 at San Francisco, allowing just four hits to beat the Giants 1-0. The Texas native had the most contests in franchise history (80) without a complete game.

WE'LL MISS YOU BRAD - Dodger catcher Brad Ausmus caught his 1,938th and final game on the last day of the season as he announced his retirement after 18 seasons, three Gold Gloves, one All-Star appearance and six trips to the postseason. At 41 years and 172 days, he was the oldest catcher to start a game since former teammate Craig Biggio did so at 41 years, 289 days on Sept. 29, 2007.

THE TALENTED ROOKIE - Dodger reliever Kenley Jansen was converted from a catcher in the middle of the 2009 season and the results have been astonishing. After getting called up to the big leagues on July 23, Jansen went 1-0 with four saves and a 0.67 ERA (2 ER/27.0 IP) in 25 games for the Dodgers. The 23-year-old's earned run average was the fourth-lowest mark by a rookie in Major League history (min. 25 IP). The right-hander struck out 41 and held the opposition to a .130 average (9-for-44), including a .063 mark (3-for-48) vs. righties.

HEAD OF STEAM FOR 2011 - Dodger center fielder Matt Kemp closed out the season on a high note, homering in his final five games to finish with a career-best 28 home runs. Kemp played in all 162 games for the Dodgers, joining Seattle's Ichiro Suzuki as the only players in the Majors to do so in 2010. The Oklahoma native's streak of 204 consecutive games played is the longest active streak in the Major Leagues, just ahead of Suzuki's 192-game streak.

- Kemp became the 11th Los Angeles Dodger and the seventh outfielder in club history to slug 25 or more home runs in consecutive seasons. The last Dodger to accomplish this feat was Shawn Green in 2001 and 2002.

- Kemp also hit a grand slam on Sept. 29, giving him five in his career. He is tied for the second most grand slams in the Majors over the past three seasons. Albert Pujols (six) is the only player with more bases-loaded homers than Kemp over that span with Jason Kubel, Alexei Ramirez and Alex Rodriguez also having five slams since 2008. (Source: John Labombarda, Elias)

SOUTHERN CALIFORNIA BOYS - After Rod Barajas was claimed by the Dodgers from the Mets on Aug. 22, the Dodgers had a decidedly local flavor to the team. Barajas, who was born in Ontario and attended Cerritos Junior College, joined trade deadline-acquisition and Torrance native Ted Lilly on a roster that already included Jeff Weaver (Northridge), Reed Johnson (Riverside) and late-season call-up Jay Gibbons, who lives in Moorpark and went to college at Cal-State Los Angeles.

- Lilly, Gibbons and Barajas were key contributors over the season's last month and a half. Barajas hit .297 and belted five home runs in just 64 at-bats; Gibbons became the primary left-handed bat off the bench and hit .280 with five homers and 17 RBI in 75 at-bats; Lilly was the Dodgers' Farmers Insurance Player of the Month for August, when he went 5-1 with a 3.29 ERA over six starts. Overall, Lilly went 7-4 with a 3.52 ERA in 12 starts for Los Angeles.

2010 DODGER NOTES (CONTINUED)

SUPERMAN - Dodger infielder and 2010 Roy Campanella Award winner Jamey Carroll had a stellar season for the Dodgers, playing in a career-high 69 games at shortstop and making just four errors (.986). The Campanella Award is voted on by the Dodgers' uniformed staff and given annually to the Dodger player who best exemplifies the spirit and leadership of the late Hall of Fame catcher. Carroll also led the Dodgers with a .379 on-base percentage while hitting .291 in 133 games. In 48 games and 126 total chances at second base, Carroll, who signed a two-year contract last December, did not make an error.

SEPTEMBER TO REMEMBER - Dodger catcher A.J. Ellis will likely remember his on-field performance in September for quite some time. Ellis batted .455 (15-for-33) with three doubles, six RBI and a .561 on-base percentage during the month. The Kentucky native saw his average rise from .174 to .278 over his final 18 games of the season.

FEEL GOOD STORY OF THE SEASON - On Sept. 8, 2010 at San Diego's PETCO Park, Dodger 33-year-old first baseman John Lindsey was announced in a Major League game for the first time, although he didn't record an official plate appearance as Dodger manager Joe Torre immediately pinch-hit for him with Andre Ethier. Lindsey batted and flied out the next night, becoming the oldest (33 years and 222 days old) non-Asian born player since 2002 to appear in the Major Leagues. Lindsey spent parts of 16 seasons in the minor leagues, before getting the call to the show on Sept. 6. He collected his first Major League hit on Sept. 12 at Houston and made the rounds on all of the major media outlets before fracturing his hand on Sept. 25.

*According to Dave Smith at retrosheet.org, Lindsey is the 20th player in Major League Baseball since 1920 to debut without stepping between the white lines. The last time it happened was on Sept. 22, 2002 when the same situation played out for Oakland's Cody McKay. The only other Dodger on this list is Billy Ashley, who debuted on Sept. 1, 1992 only to be pinch-hit for by Tommy Lasorda with Mike Scioscia.

IT'S TIME FOR DODGER BASEBALL - Dodger broadcaster Vin Scully announced on Aug. 22 that he will return to the broadcast booth for an unprecedented 62nd season in 2011, calling all Dodger home games and those road games against National League West Division opponents. Scully's 61 years of service constitute the longest tenure of any broadcaster in sports history. While he handles all nine innings of the team's television broadcasts on PRIME TICKET and KCAL 9, the first three innings of each of his games are also simulcast on KABC 790 AM.

IT STARTS AT THE TOP - Dodger shortstop Rafael Furcal battled injuries all season long, but was stellar in his 97 games and finished the season with a .300 average for the third time in his five seasons with Los Angeles. Furcal was named to his second-career All-Star team and ranked fourth on the team with 66 runs scored despite playing in only 97 games. The Dodgers went 31-17 when he scored a run and 13-2 when he scored twice. Furcal led the club with 22 stolen bases and seven triples, while moving into second place on the Los Angeles Dodgers' all-time games played list at shortstop with 572, passing Jose Offerman's 571 on the final day of the season.

*Furcal scored a run in 12 straight games from June 24-July 6 to set a new Los Angeles Dodger record...the longest run-scoring streak in Dodger history is Brooklyn Dodger Zack Wheat's 13-game streak from Aug. 18-28, 1925.

*Furcal was selected as the Bank of America Presents N.L. Player of the Week Award for June 28-July 4, batting a Major League-best .538 (14-for-26) with nine runs, two homers and five RBI in six games.

STEADY AS HE GOES - Dodger first baseman James Loney played in 161 of the Dodgers' 162 games and finished second on the club with 88 RBI after collecting 90 RBI in each of the past two seasons. Loney has played in 480 games since the start of the 2008 season, which is tied with Robinson Cano for the third most in baseball over that time, trailing Prince Fielder and Adrian Gonzalez (482). The Texas native's consistency also shone through in the field as he made just four errors on the season and posted a .997 fielding percentage, which tied him for second in the NL. Loney also ranked fifth in the National League with a career-high 41 doubles and became the fifth Dodger since 1990 to reach 40 doubles in a season.

IN THE COMMUNITY - The Dodgers continued their strong support of the Greater Los Angeles community in 2010 with events like the sixth annual Dodgers Dream Foundation (DDF) Bowling Extravaganza, hosted by James Loney; the annual DDF Golf Invitational; the third annual ThinkCure! Weekend, which raised more than \$400,000 for the official charity of the Los Angeles Dodgers that raises funds to find a cure for cancer; several individual player programs; the 2011 Calendar shoot, which partnered Dodger players with youngsters from the Los Angeles County Department of Children and Family Services; several hospital visits throughout the season and much, much more.

*Dodger pitcher Chad Billingsley was named the Dodgers' Marvin Miller Man of the Year by his teammates



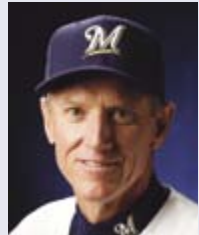

Lopes returns to the Dodger family in 2011 for the first time in 30 years. He will serve as the club's first base coach and baserunning/outfield coordinator.

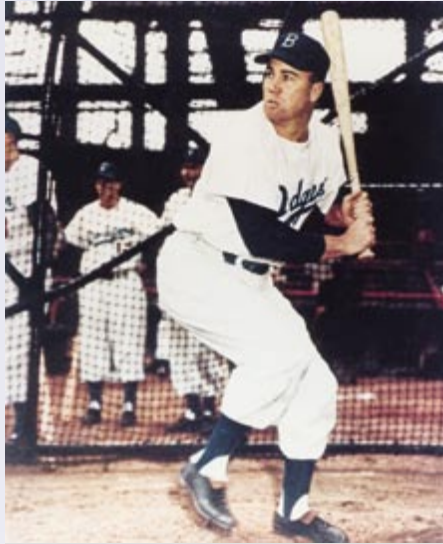

DOUBLE TROUBLE

In 1953, Brooklyn's Carl Furillo won the batting title with a .344 mark and Roy Campanella took home the RBI crown with 142. Since then, no National League team has had two different players lead the league in those two categories. The last American League team to do so was the 2001 Mariners, who had Ichiro Suzuki (.353) and Bret Boone (141) accomplish the feat. Since 1920, the year that the RBI became an official statistic, this has happened only 14 times in the Major Leagues and just three times in the National League. Of those three times, two were accomplished by Dodger teammates – Furillo and Campanella in 1953 and Pete Reiser (.343) and Dolph Camilli (120 RBI) in 1941. The only other National League teammates to accomplish the feat played for the 1946 Cardinals -- Stan Musial (.365) and Enos Slaughter (130 RBI). Source: Retrosheet

ALL-STAR NOTES

MANAGING JUST FINE: Joe Torre managed the American League All-Star team six times, the fourth-most all-time behind Casey Stengel (10), the Dodgers' Walter Alston (9) and Joe McCarthy (7). Alston's seven victories are the most ever by an All-Star skipper. The other Dodgers who have managed in the Midsummer Classic are Leo Durocher (1942, 1948), Burt Shotton (1950) and Tom Lasorda (1978-79, 1982, 1989).

THE HOMETOWN HURLER: In 2004, Houston's Roger Clemens became just the 10th pitcher to start a game in his home ballpark. The Dodgers' Don Drysdale was the fifth to do so when he took the mound on Aug. 3, 1959 at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum.

BEHIND THE MIC: Several Dodger broadcasters or former Dodgers have announced All-Star Games, led by Hall of Famers Vin Scully (1959, 1962-1963, 1983, 1985, 1987, 1989) and Jaime Jarrin (26 times). Others to call the action or provide color at the Midsummer Classic include Al Helfer (1955-57), Pee Wee Reese (1966-68), Sandy Koufax (1967-68), Maury Wills (1973) and Don Drysdale (1978, 1980, 1982, 1984, 1986).

HONORARY CAPTAINS: Four Dodger greats have had the honor of serving as the honorary captain of the National League. Roy Campanella was given that honor in 1980 for the game at Dodger Stadium, while Duke Snider (1982), Sandy Koufax (1985) and Don Drysdale (1989) were also named honorary captains.

MOST VALUABLE: Only twice in All-Star history has the game's MVP come from the same team in consecutive years. San Francisco's Willie Mays and Willie McCovey won the award from 1968-69 while the Dodgers' Don Sutton and Steve Garvey were named as the All-Star Game's Most Valuable Player in 1977 and 1978. Garvey also won the award in 1974.

ROOKIE ALL-STARS: There have been 35 rookies named to the National League All-Star team, including 16 pitchers, and the Dodgers have accounted for five of those players. Don Newcombe (1949), Fernando Valenzuela (1981), Steve Sax (1982), Mike Piazza (1993) and Hideo Nomo (1995) all made the squad in their first big league seasons, while Nomo and Valenzuela are two of the four pitchers in either league to start a game in their rookie season, joining Dave Stenhouse (1962) and Mark Fidrych (1976).

BIG D TOPS THE CHARTS: In All-Star history, Don Drysdale has struck out 19 batters, the most of any pitcher in either league. His 19.1 innings pitched are also the most, while his 10 All-Star selections are tied for third with Steve Carlton and Roger Clemens for the third most among pitchers.

RIGHT OFF THE BAT: David Ortiz homered in his first career official All-Star at-bat in 2004, becoming the 13th player to accomplish that feat. The third player was the Dodgers' Jim Gilliam, who went deep on Aug. 3, 1959 in the game played at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum.

BACK-TO-BACK JACKS: In the 1975 All-Star Game, Steve Garvey and Jimmy Wynn hit back-to-back homers, marking just the third time in history that two players have homered consecutively in the Midsummer Classic and the only time that both players were on the same team. The feat was accomplished twice after Garvey and Wynn, most recently by Derek Jeter and Magglio Ordonez in the 2001 All-Star Game.

HOME RUN DERBY: *The Dodgers have had just three players participate in the Home Run Derby during All-Star Weekend since the first derby took place in 1985. Mike Piazza participated in back-to-back years (1993, 1994) and Raul Mondesi (1995) also took part in the event on one occasion. In 2005, Hee-Seop Choi took part in the first international home run derby, representing his home country of South Korea.*

CEY, GUERRERO AND YEAGER SHARE WORLD SERIES MVP HONORS

Prior to the 2001 World Series when both Randy Johnson and Curt Schilling were named Most Valuable Players, the 1981 World Series was the only other Fall Classic to have more than one MVP. The Dodgers defeated the New York Yankees, four games to two, in 1981 and Ron Cey, Pedro Guerrero and Steve Yeager were named Tri-MVPs. Cey batted .350 with one home run and six RBI, Guerrero hit .333 with two homers and seven RBI while Yeager batted .286 with two home runs and four RBI.

BROOKLYN AND LOS ANGELES ALL-TIME ROSTER

Brooklyn, an incubator of baseball in the pre-Civil War era, had such strong clubs as the Atlantics, Eckfords and Excelsiors and didn't take to professional baseball until joining the American Association in 1884. The AA champs of 1889 had so many newlyweds on the roster they were known as the Bridesgrooms. The club moved into the National League the following year and became dubbed the Trolley Dodgers because of the maze of streetcar tracks in the borough. The name shortened to Dodgers and became permanent, although during the managerial tenure of Ned Hanlon (1899-1905) it was changed to Superbas, and in Wilbert Robinson's reign (1914-1931) the team was often referred to as the Robins. But the name Dodgers is associated with some of baseball's all-time greats.

UNIFORM NUMBERS IN DODGER HISTORY

Since 1932, hundreds of players and coaches have put on a Dodger uniform, wearing every single number from 1 to 77 as well as 97 and 99. On April 15, 2007, 2008, 2009 and 2010 the Dodgers all wore No. 42 to celebrate the 60th-63rd anniversaries of Jackie Robinson breaking the color barrier. Pitcher Joe Beimel's No. 97 was the highest number ever worn by a player during a regular-season game until Manny Ramirez donned No. 99 in 2008. Pee Wee Reese's No. 1 was officially retired on July 4, 1984, one of nine numbers that have been retired. 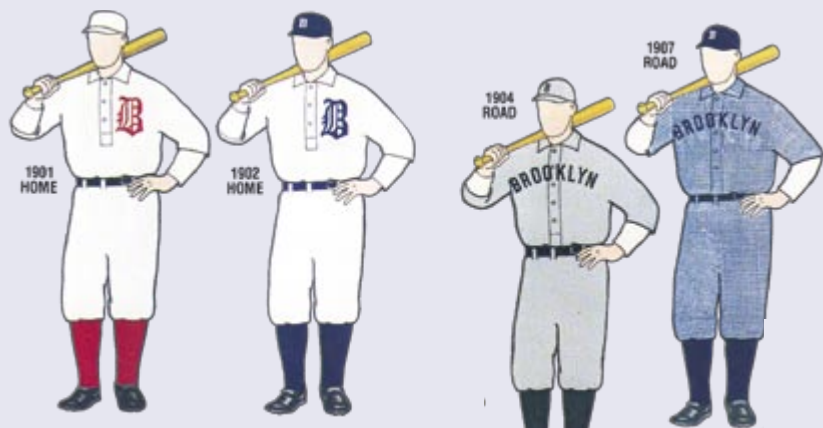

HISTORY OF THE DODGER UNIFORM

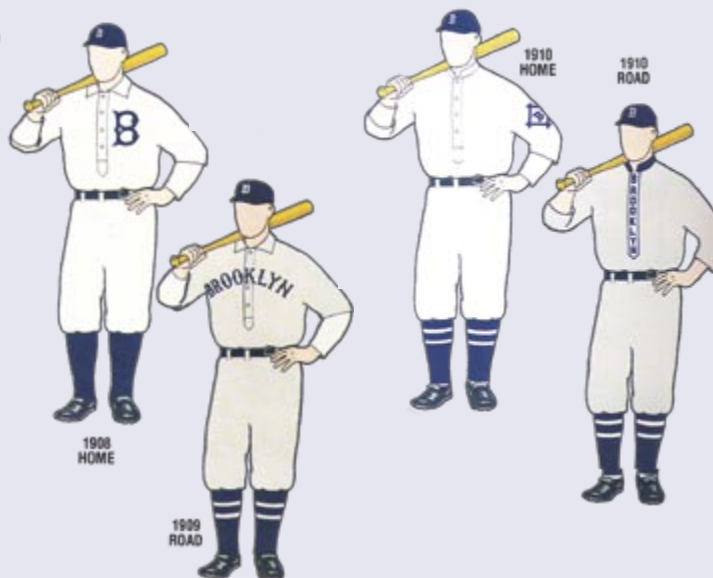
1900s

The Dodgers started the new century as champions of the National League - in effect, World Champs since the American League was still a minor league. The Brooklyns of 1900 wore the standard white at home and gray on the road. Home caps were solid white with rounded "pill-box" shape crown. Road caps were the same in gray. Stockings were solid maroon at home, black on the road. Shirts were the standard buttoned front with a fold-down collar style. The road shirts displayed BROOKLYN in arched block capitals while the home shirts were plain or with an Old English B on the left breast. In 1902, the home trim color was changed to BLUE (probably navy shade) and the caps were now solid blue with a white B in front. The trim color on the BROOKLYN road suits continued to be black, but the cap color was solid gray with a black B in front starting around 1903. They kept this same overall uniform look through 1907, the only changes being a smaller Old English B at home and the dark blue cap replacing the gray model.

The uniforms were re-designed for 1907, retaining the blue as standard trim color throughout. At home, the Old English B was replaced by a fancy capital B - a letter style that was to be used repeatedly for the next five decades in Brooklyn. This style B in fact was still used on the Brooklyn caps in their final season in Flatbush (1957). But the new road uniforms for 1907 were daring indeed. Instead of the standard plain gray, they were made from a gray cloth with a fine blue "cross-hatch," or checked pattern.



This material evoked comments throughout the league and even ridicule. Enough, perhaps, to dissuade the club not to repeat the unusual flannels for 1908. This fabric was historic in

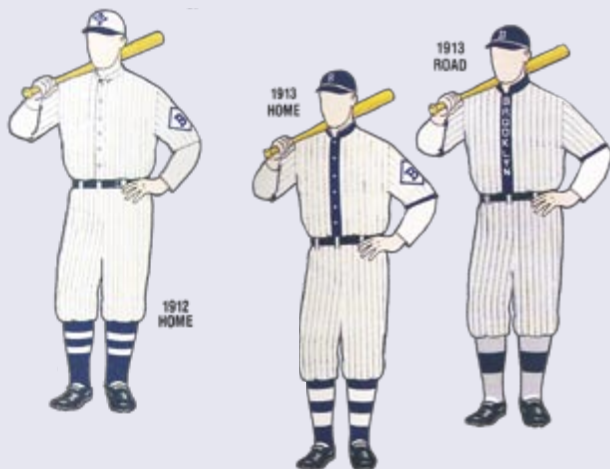


that it was one of the first attempts to dress up the monotonous gray of the road flannels and was an experimental forerunner of the more acceptable pinstripes of later years. And the cross-hatch idea itself would resurface in the later history of Brooklyn uniforms. The 1908 road uniforms were once again your basic gray with the BROOKLYN name in fancy capital letters. In 1909, a pair of stripes (gray or white) were added to dress up the solid navy blue stockings.

1910s

In keeping with the latest trend in uniform shirts,

the 1910 uniforms replaced the fold-down collar with the short stand-up "cadet" style. The only trim feature on the new home whites was a letter B enclosed in a "diamond" design on the left sleeve. The new road gray shirts accented the new cadet collar in solid navy and the name BROOKLYN was displayed vertically in small capital letters down the button panel (another current trend). The following season (1911), fine, narrow pinstriping was used on the gray traveling uniforms - already an acceptable and popular alternative to plain gray. The final season at old Washington Park was in 1912, and the Superbas celebrated the occasion with another new set of uniforms. Bold pinstriping was included on the home whites, even on the new cap crown. Cap

visors were solid blue and the "B-enclosed-in-a-diamond" design was on the cap front. The road grays duplicated the pinstriping and included a solid navy cap with the same logo design in white. The stage was set for a new beginning in a brand new concrete and steel facility in 1913.



The Brooklyns opened Ebbets Field in 1913 with spruced up new uniforms. The pinstriping was repeated, but the cadet collar, button panel and sleeve ends were in solid navy on both home and road jerseys. The name BROOKLYN in vertical white lettering was revived on the button area of the road shirt. The navy caps were the standard round crown by now and included a white trip stripe around the base of the crown. The white stripes on the blue home stockings were now wider and bolder, while the gray road stockings featured a single wide band of blue.

In 1914, the new uniforms were somewhat toned down - the extra navy trimmings were removed and the new V-neck collar style replaced the cadet version. It was pinstripes once again, but the cap was re-done in matching pinstripe material with a solid blue visor. The fancy capital B from 1909 was resurrected on both shirt fronts as well as cap fronts. Both home and road stockings featured the

wide blue band about halfway down.

The "Robins" (as they were now being called) opened the 1916 season in a bold new version of the "cross-hatched" pinstriping of 1907. This time it was wider spacing and it was used on the new home whites as well as the road suits. Except for the unique pattern, the graphics were the same as 1915. The idea was more acceptable now - just another variation of the now widely accepted pinstripes. But also, this Brooklyn team was a pennant contender all the way, checked uniforms notwithstanding. The fans and the media seldom find reason to criticize a winner in any costume. Win they did, and met the Boston Red Sox in the World Series. No cigar, but those unusual uniforms thus became a part of baseball lore. It was back to regular pinstripes in 1917 and the following seasons of the decade.

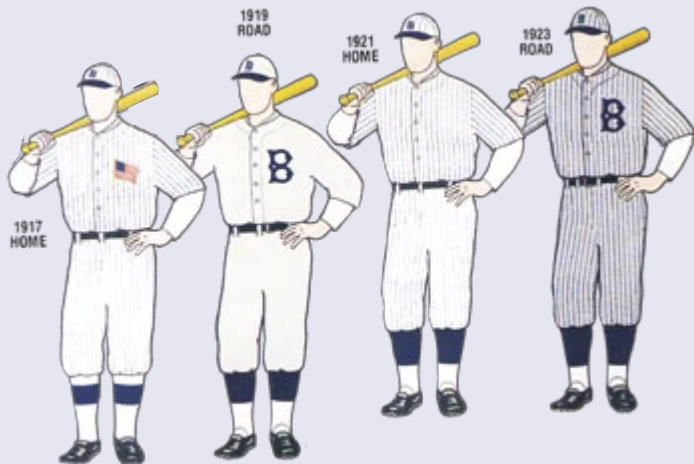

1920s

The bland, pinstriped uniform set continued through the early '20s for the "Trolley Dodgers." The National League celebrated its 50th year in 1925 and Brooklyn spruced up its appearance to observe the milestone. As with all NL teams, a large circular blue and gold patch was displayed on the left breast of the home shirts and on the left sleeve of the road grays. Dazzling new red, white and blue stockings were introduced as well as



some new piping trim. The road uniforms had a whole new look - plain gray with the name BROOKLYN in arched navy block capitals, the same as the infamous 1907 "checked" uniforms. Piping trim was becoming quite fashionable and would be used on Brooklyn uniforms for the rest of the decade. The home uniforms were repeated from 1926-29 except for a dressier cap style with double piping down the crown seams. The road uniforms for 1926 reverted to the pinstripes (now with extra piping trim) and a version of the "B-inside-a-diamond" logo on the sleeve. The cross-hatch pattern was even revived briefly in the late '20s road uniform.



1930s

Hard times or not, the decade of the '30s produced the most dazzling and creative uniform designs in the history of the Dodger franchise. The 1929 road uniforms had started it off with a return to the basic gray but with a generous amount of blue and red double piping trim.

The old standard fancy capital B was displayed on the left breast, dressed up in piping trim outline. The following season, the name BROOKLYN reappeared on the front of the road shirt in two-color fancy capital letters. The home uniform through 1930 was still the plain pinstripes with extra piping trim.

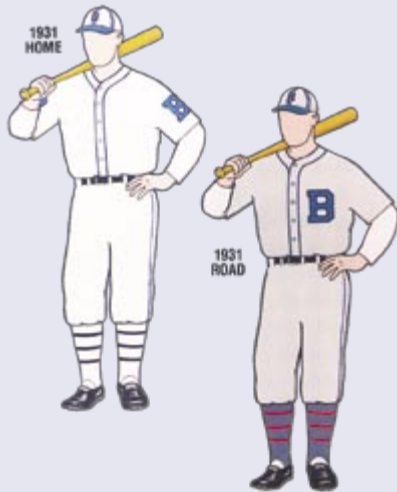
The uniforms for 1931-32 were a total redesign from top to bottom. The dominant trim color was blue (a lighter shade than navy) with some accents of red. Cap crowns were white or gray with blue visors, double blue piping and the familiar blue B in front. A new block capital B appeared on the sleeve of the home shirt and the left breast of the road jersey. Three thin stripes appeared on the stockings - in blue at home, in red on the road. With the Wilbert Robinson era ended, the Brooklyn club officially adopted the on-again, off-again sobriquet (Trolley) Dodgers, as their team nickname. The restyled 1933 uniforms displayed DODGERS in fancy capitals across the chest of both home and road uniforms. The '33 home uniforms restored the pinstriping plus an abundance of piping embellishments and a large

fancy B on the sleeves. Extra white striping was also added to the blue stockings. Caps were once again solid dark blue. From 1934-36 the name BROOKLYN replaced DODGERS on both home and road suits. Solid blue stockings appeared in 1936.

In an era of unprecedented experiments in new color combinations and excessive embellishments, the Dodgers took perhaps the boldest step thus far in the decade by introducing GREEN trimmed uniforms for 1937. No, it wasn't an April Fool's joke. It was a legitimate uniform design for the coming season. Except for the choice of color which was considered "unthinkable" for baseball uniforms, the overall design was a bit conservative for the period - solid dark cap, BROOKLYN in plain block letters, minimum piping. In addition to the daring selection of green, the road uniforms also crossed a new frontier in baseball uniform schemes by using tan in place of gray on the '37 road suits. This bold idea only survived one season but it had the equivalent impact of Charles Finley's green and gold uniforms in the '60s, even without the exposure of wide-spread color printing and color television coverage.



Brooklyn management "came to its senses" in 1938 with yet another overhaul of their uniform designs. The more conventional ROYAL BLUE ("Dodger

Blue") was restored as the sole trim color. The new nickname DODGERS was worked into a slanted script (a new trend in the '30s) with an underline flourish and was displayed on both home and road shirt fronts. The 1938 season must be recorded as a historic milestone in the evolution of Dodger uniforms - this script DODGERS has remained intact through the years and is a permanent fixture on today's uniforms and no doubt will continue as far into the future as anyone can see. For '38 only, the home

cap crown was white with blue

piping. Other minor trim features from 1938 have also endured - solid blue stockings and undersweaters, no piping trim on the home whites and a consistent minimal piping on the gray road jerseys.



A couple of minor changes were included in the 1939 set. Zippered fronts (another trend) replaced buttons and an equivalent script BROOKLYN was displayed across the road jersey. The solid blue cap with fancy white B endured through the final season in Flatbush. With the advent of night baseball at Ebbets Field in the '40s, an unusual hybrid version of the familiar Dodger uniform was developed. Instead of the usual flannel, a highly reflective satin fabric was used with the idea that it would improve viewing the games under the arc lights. The home version included extra blue striping down the shoulders and on the sleeve ends. Also, the belt tunnels were solid blue and there was a heavy blue stripe down the trouser leg. The satin road suit was a bit more unique - the material color was a rich pale blue and the trim (including script BROOKLYN) was added in white. Curiously, some of these unusual trim characteristics would reappear decades later with the advent of double-knit fabrics.

HISTORY OF THE DODGER UNIFORM



1940s

The basic uniforms remained constant through the '40s and into the '50s with only one significant change - the name BROOKLYN was replaced by DODGERS on the road grays in 1946. Baseball history was written by Jackie Robinson in 1947, wearing the now familiar Dodger Blue.

1950-60s



By the 1950s, the zipper front was history and buttons were once again standard. In 1952, the player's number was repeated on the left front of the home jersey in RED - the first Major League club to do so. Many teams followed this precedent in subsequent years. After so many futile tries, the Brooklyn Dodgers finally captured the grand prize in 1955 with a thrilling World Series victory over the hated Yankees.

Despite another pennant in 1956, owner Walter O'Malley was determined to seize the opportunity of a franchise on the West Coast and Major League Baseball in Brooklyn was no more after 1957. Major League Baseball was an instant hit on the West Coast in 1958. Sadly, Brooklyn fandom deserved a better fate, but the transfer was otherwise a glorious event and successful beyond O'Malley's wildest dreams. Attendance was phenomenal, aided by the enormous seating capacity of the Coliseum and the instant resumption of the rivalry with the Giants. The permanency of the move was sealed forever with a World Championship in 1959, only their second season in Los Angeles. O'Malley was committed to continuation of team tradition, and the uniforms were repeated intact - except for the L.A. on the caps and the script LOS ANGELES on the otherwise familiar traveling suits. Also, the red player's numeral was now included on the front of the new road shirts.

HISTORY OF THE DODGER UNIFORM

1970-2000s

When the Dodgers adopted the double-knit fabrics in the early 1970s, changes were made on the road jerseys. Blue and white piping was added to the collar, down the shoulder line and on the sleeve ends. Also, with the team's West Coast identity now firmly established, the name LOS ANGELES was dropped and DODGERS was restored as before on the road shirt. A few seasons later the collar and shoulder piping were dropped and the road uniform of today's Los Angeles Dodgers was presented. In 1972, the Dodgers introduced names on the back of the road jerseys which remained there until the 2005 season. Throughout the hectic years of bizarre color combinations and the double-knit style features, the Dodgers' image has personified the idea of a consistent tradition. The Dodgers of today look very much like the Dodgers of 1938 and most probably like the Dodgers of the future.



In 2011, the Dodgers will wear throwback jerseys from their Brooklyn days on six different dates. In 2005, the club celebrated the franchise's first World Championship with commemorative jerseys (above).



The Dodger home uniform, which has remained virtually unchanged since coming to Los Angeles, had one minor change in 2005, as the team removed the players' names across the back of the jersey (left).

In 2007, the names were put back on (right).

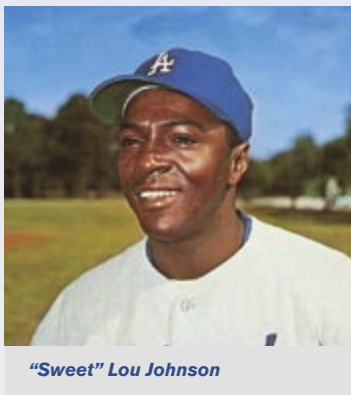

THIS DATE IN DODGER HISTORY

January 1, 2008: The Dodgers enter their first-ever float in the Rose Parade, marking the beginning of a year-long celebration of the team's 50th anniversary in Los Angeles.

January 5, 1982: Dodger announcer Vin Scully is elected to the Hall of Fame.

January 10, 1984: Don Drysdale is elected to the Hall of Fame.

January 17, 1958: The Dodgers complete arrangements to play home games in the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum for the 1958 and 1959 seasons.

January 19, 1972: Sandy Koufax becomes the youngest member to be elected to the Hall of Fame at the age of 36.

January 23, 1962: Jackie Robinson is elected to the Hall of Fame just days shy of his 43rd birthday.

January 29, 1967: Former Dodger President and General Manager Branch Rickey is elected into the Hall of Fame.

January 29, 2004: Frank and Jamie McCourt's bid to purchase the team is unanimously approved by Major League owners, making them just the fourth owners of the Los Angeles Dodgers.

February 1, 1988: The Dodgers sign free agent outfielder Kirk Gibson.

March 1, 2009: The Dodgers play their first-ever game at Camelback Ranch-Glendale

March 2, 2005: Hall of Famer Jackie Robinson is honored posthumously by receiving the Congressional Gold Medal during ceremonies in the rotunda of the United States Capitol building in Washington, DC.

March 4, 1912: Groundbreaking ceremonies are held for the construction of Ebbets Field.

March 8, 1966: Casey Stengel is elected to the Hall of Fame.

March 11, 1953: Holman Stadium in Vero Beach is dedicated to Bud L. Holman. The Dodgers beat the Philadelphia Athletics, 4-2, in front of 5,532.

March 15, 1970: Peter O'Malley becomes president of the Dodgers, succeeding his father, Walter, who assumes the position of chairman of the board.

March 15, 2008: The Dodgers host the Padres at Wukesong Stadium in Beijing, in Major League Baseball's first-ever game on Chinese soil.

March 17, 2008: The Dodgers play their last Spring Training game at Holman Stadium in Vero Beach, FL. Vero Beach hosted the Dodgers during Spring Training for 60 years.

March 21, 1987: The Dodgers dedicate Campo Las Palmas in the Dominican Republic, a camp designed for young Latin players to help further the growth of baseball.

March 29, 2008: A Guinness World Record 115,300 fans watch the Dodgers take on the Boston Red Sox in an exhibition at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum that raises more than \$2 million dollars for ThinkCure!, the team's official charity.

April 2, 1962: The California Angels and Los Angeles Dodgers play their first game ever against each other, as the Angels edge the Dodgers, 6-5 and begin the Freeway Series.

April 3, 2006: A Dodger Stadium regular season-record crowd of 56,000 fans sees the Dodgers face the Braves on Opening Day.

April 5, 1913: Ebbets Field opens as 25,000 fans see the Brooklyn Dodgers, behind Nap Rucker, beat New York, 3-2, in an exhibition game. Casey Stengel hits the first home run in the new ballpark.

April 6, 2005: The Dodgers are recognized by *Guinness World Records* Book as having registered the "Highest Cumulative Attendance for a Baseball Franchise."

April 7, 1969: Bill Singer is credited with the first official save in baseball history

April 8, 1994: Atlanta Braves' Kent Mercker no-hits the Dodgers, 6-0, becoming the fifth opposing pitcher to no-hit the Dodgers since they came to Los Angeles and is only the second no-hitter by an opponent at Dodger Stadium. Dodger rookie pitcher Chan Ho Park also makes his historic Major League debut, pitching the ninth inning.

April 9, 1913: The Brooklyn Dodgers play their first regular-season game at Ebbets Field as Nap Rucker blanks Philadelphia, 1-0.

April 9, 1981: Fernando Valenzuela makes his first Major League start, substituting for Jerry Reuss, on Opening Day and blanks the Astros, 2-0.

April 10, 1962: Dodger Stadium opens with 52,564 fans in attendance to see the Dodgers and Reds, with Cincinnati winning, 6-3.

April 11, 1947: Jackie Robinson becomes the first African-American player to sign a Major League contract as he does so with the Brooklyn Dodgers.

April 11, 1962: Jim Gilliam homers and Sandy Koufax goes the distance as the Dodgers beat the Reds, 6-2 in the club's first win at Dodger Stadium.

April 13, 1954: Future Hall of Famer Walter Alston makes his debut as a Dodger manager, the first of 23 consecutive seasons with the club.

April 13, 2009: The Dodgers draw 57,099 fans on Opening Day for the largest crowd in the 47-year history of Dodger Stadium.

April 13, 2009: In the club's home opener, Orlando Hudson becomes the second L.A. Dodger to hit for the cycle and the first since Wes Parker in 1970...the contest against the Giants was Hudson's first home game as a Dodger.

April 14, 1964: Sandy Koufax tosses a 4-0 shutout over the Cardinals in the only Opening Day start of his career.

April 15, 1947: Jackie Robinson plays his first Major League game, thus becoming the first African-American player to play in the Major Leagues.

April 15, 2007: The Dodgers celebrate the 60th Anniversary of Jackie Robinson breaking the color barrier as each player and coach wears his retired No. 42 in a nationally televised game against the Padres. Los Angeles won, 9-3.

THIS DATE IN DODGER HISTORY

April 15, 2009: At 21 years and 27 days, left-hander Clayton Kershaw becomes the youngest pitcher in L.A. Dodger history to strike out at least 13 batters in game, when he fans 13 against the Giants.

April 16, 1983: Playing for the Padres at Dodger Stadium, former Dodger Steve Garvey appears in his 1,118th consecutive Major League game to set a NL record.

April 18, 1950: Vin Scully joins Red Barber and Connie Desmond in the broadcast booth.

April 18, 1958: Before a crowd of 78,672 at the Coliseum, the Dodgers play their first game in Los Angeles and defeat the San Francisco Giants, 6-5.

April 19, 1890: The Dodgers (a.k.a. Bridegrooms) play their first National League game at Washington Park and lose to the Boston Braves, 15-9.

April 19, 1956: In the first Dodger game played at Roosevelt Stadium in New Jersey, Roy Campanella collects his 1,000th Major League hit.

April 21, 1890: The Dodgers win their first National League game with a 7-6 decision over the Braves.

April 21, 1967: After 737 games in Los Angeles, Dodger fans experience the first rainout since the club's move West.

April 22, 1958: The first night game in Los Angeles is played at the Coliseum as the Dodgers defeat the Chicago Cubs, 4-2.

April 23, 1958: Pee Wee Reese plays in his 2,000th game and Gil Hodges hits his 300th homer.

April 24, 1962: Sandy Koufax ties his own team record by striking out 18 Cubs in a 10-2 victory.

April 25, 1976: Rick Monday of the Cubs saves the American flag as he rescues it from two dissidents who try to burn it in the Dodger Stadium outfield. The following season, Monday begins an eight-year career with the Dodgers.

April 27, 1891: The Dodgers play their first home game at Eastern Park, the second of seven ballparks they would call home in franchise history.

April 27, 1929: Brooklyn Dodgers relief pitcher Clise Dudley becomes the first player to hit a home run on the first Major League pitch thrown to him.

April 28, 1985: Fernando Valenzuela sets a Major League record of 41 consecutive innings without allowing an earned run to start the season.

April 30, 1898: Brooklyn plays its first game at new Washington Park and 15,000 fans show up.

May 1, 1920: The Dodgers and the Boston Braves play 26 innings -- the longest in Major League history only to tie the Boston Braves, 1-1. Dodger pitcher Leon Cadore pitches all 26 innings, including 20 consecutive scoreless innings.

May 4, 1919: The first Sunday game following the approval of the Sunday Baseball Bill by the New York state legislature is played at Ebbets Field as the Dodgers beat the Braves, 6-2.

May 6, 2009: The Dodgers establish a modern-day record by winning their 13th consecutive home game to start the season and also tie a Dodger Stadium record for the club's longest home winning streak in the ballpark's 47-year history.

May 7, 1959: A Major League-record 93,103 fans salute Roy Campanella as the Dodgers and Yankees play an exhibition game in the Los Angeles Coliseum.

May 7, 1970: Wes Parker becomes the first L.A. Dodger to hit for the cycle (single, double, triple and home run) in a game against the New York Mets.

May 11, 1963: Sandy Koufax pitches a no-hitter against the San Francisco Giants and the Dodgers win, 8-0.

May 12, 1956: In the first no-hitter to be nationally televised, Carl Erskine blanks the Giants, 3-0, and records his second no-hitter.

May 13, 1958: Charlie Neal's opposite-field home run becomes the first to clear the right field fence at the Coliseum

May 13, 1991: Mike Scioscia catches his 1,219th game as a Dodger to become the all-time leader in games caught in L.A. history.

May 13, 2004: After singing the National Anthem and God Bless America prior to the game against the Cubs, Jose Lima turned in the longest relief outing of his career, posting 5.2 scoreless innings.

May 14, 1968: Don Drysdale starts his 58 consecutive scoreless inning streak with a 1-0 shutout of the Cubs.

May 17, 2008: Chan Ho Park, Hong-Chih Kuo, and Takashi Saito are the first trio of pitchers from different Asian countries to pitch all nine innings of a big league game.

May 20, 1972: In the fastest game ever at Dodger Stadium (one hour, 30 minutes), Al Downing two-hits Houston, 3-0.

May 21, 2008: Hiroki Kuroda and Takshi Saito are the first Japanese starter and reliever to record both the win and the save in the same big league game.

May 23, 2002: Shawn Green becomes the 14th player in Major League history to hit four home runs in a game as the Dodgers rout Milwaukee, 16-3. Green sets a Major League record with 19 total bases and ties a Major League mark scoring six runs. The club sets a new team record with eight home runs.

May 24, 1973: Willie Davis becomes the first Los Angeles Dodger to get six hits in a 16-inning game against the New York Mets.

May 26, 1971: Maury Wills singles in the fifth inning vs. San Francisco for the 2,000th hit of his career.

May 27, 1957: The Dodgers and Giants are granted permission to move to the West Coast by National League club owners.

THIS DATE IN DODGER HISTORY

May 28, 2001: Paul Lo Duca ties a Dodger record by recording six hits against Colorado as they outlast the Rockies, 7-6, in 11 innings. Shawn Green has four hits, including the game-winner.

May 30, 1962: Maury Willis homers right-handed and left-handed in a game as the Dodgers sweep a doubleheader against the Mets.

May 31, 1968: Don Drysdale's consecutive scoreless streak continues when umpire Harry Wendelstedt rules Giants' Dick Dietz did not attempt to get out of the way of Drysdale's bases-loaded pitch (streak ends on June 8 at 58.2 innings pitched).

June 1, 1955: Duke Snider becomes the first Dodger to hit three homers in a game on two separate occasions when he does it for the second time at Ebbets Field against the Braves.

June 3, 1958: Voters elect to allow the Dodgers to purchase land in Chavez Ravine for the new stadium.

June 3, 1983: Second baseman Steve Sax and catcher Dave Sax become the first brothers to lose in the same game for the Dodgers in a contest against the New York Mets.

June 3, 1989: The Dodgers play their longest game in team history, seven hours and 14 minutes, but lose to the Houston Astros, 5-4, in an L.A.-record 22 innings. The Dodger use a team-record nine pitchers, including infielder Jeff Hamilton.

June 4, 1972: Jackie Robinson (42), Roy Campanella (39) and Sandy Koufax (32) have their uniform numbers retired at Dodger Stadium.

June 4, 1964: Sandy Koufax throws his third no-hitter, the only one on the road, by fanning 12 Philadelphia batters and winning, 3-0.

June 4, 1990: Ramon Martinez strikes out 18 Atlanta batters in a 6-0 win over the Braves to tie the Dodger record of Sandy Koufax.

June 5, 1977: Walter Alston, Dodger manager for 23 years, has his number (24) retired.

June 8, 1955: Pitcher Tommy Lasorda is optioned to the Dodgers' Triple-A affiliate in Montreal to make room on the roster for Sandy Koufax.

June 9, 1982: Dodger broadcaster Vin Scully has his star placed on the Hollywood Walk of Fame.

June 10, 1975: Davey Lopes steals second base against Montreal to begin his Major League-record string of 38 consecutive stolen bases.

June 12, 2005: Hee-Seop Choi slugs three home runs vs. Minnesota, marking the 16th time in franchise history that a player has accomplished that feat and the first Major Leaguer of Asian descent to go deep three times in a game. He would hit three more homers over the next two games for a total of six in three games, becoming just the 12th player in Major League history to accomplish that feat.

June 14, 1995: Hideo Nomo breaks a 41-year-old Dodger rookie record as he records 16 strikeouts in an 8-5 victory over the Pirates. The franchise mark was previously held by Karl Spooner, who had 15 in a 1954 game vs. the New York Giants.

June 14, 2006: Matt Kemp slugs a home run off San Diego's Scott Linebrink, his seventh homer since reaching the big leagues. Kemp becomes just the fifth player in Major League history to hit seven homers in his first 18 days in the big leagues.

June 15, 1938: A crowd of 38,748 at Ebbets Field watches the first night game in New York (Reds' Johnny Vander Meer no-hitter).

June 18, 1997: Hideo Nomo and Shigetoshi Hasegawa become the first Japanese players to appear in the same Major League game as the Dodgers and Angels square off in Interleague Play.

June 18, 2003: Paul Lo Duca hits in his 25th straight game as the Dodgers defeat division-leading San Francisco, 8-2. It is the longest hitting streak by a Dodger since Steve Sax hit in 25 in 1986.

June 18, 2004: In their first-ever regular-season visit to Dodger Stadium, the Yankees fall to the Dodgers, 6-3, before the third-largest regular-season crowd in Dodger Stadium history (55,207).

June 19, 1938: The legendary Babe Ruth dons a Dodger uniform for the first time as a coach and takes batting practice with the team.

June 19, 1952: Carl Erskine pitches the first of his two no-hitters as he defeats Chicago, 5-0.

June 19, 1973: Willie Davis hits a home run for his 2,000th Major League hit against Atlanta.

June 20, 2008: The Dodgers receive a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame. The star sits on Hollywood Boulevard, near Highland.

June 23, 1973: The Dodger infield of Steve Garvey, Davey Lopes, Bill Russell and Ron Cey begins its 8 1/2 years together as they start the second game of a doubleheader against the Reds.

June 24, 1947: Jackie Robinson steals home for the first of a Major League-record 19 times as a Dodger.

June 24, 1955: Sandy Koufax makes his Major League debut

June 25, 1984: Bill Russell becomes the L.A. Dodger leader in games played with 1,953. He went on to play in 2,181 games.

June 27, 1980: Pitcher Jerry Reuss no-hits the San Francisco Giants, 8-0, at Candlestick Park.

June 28, 2008: The Dodgers beat the Angeles, 1-0, despite getting no-hit for the 19th time in franchise history.

June 29, 1990: Left-hander Fernando Valenzuela becomes the first Dodger in 10 years to throw a no-hitter as he blanks the Cardinals, 6-0.

June 30, 1962: Sandy Koufax throws the first of his four no-hitters, and the first in Los Angeles, blanking the New York Mets, 5-0, at Dodger Stadium.

July 1, 1990: More than 80 former Dodgers converge on Dodger Stadium to participate in the Equitable Oldtimers Game and celebrate the team's 100th Anniversary.

July 2, 1958: A crowd of 66,485 pushes the Dodgers over the one million mark for the first time in the West as they draw 1,016,285 in just 35 games.

July 2, 2002: Eric Gagné reaches the 30-save mark faster than any other pitcher as he preserves a 4-0 victory over the Arizona

July 3, 1974: Mike Marshall extends his Major League record by appearing in his 13th consecutive game and saves his 11th in a 4-1 win over the Reds.

July 3, 2004: Eric Gagné converts his 84th consecutive save opportunity, setting the Major League record before finally having the streak snapped two days later.

July 3, 2007: Takashi Saito recorded his 47th save in his first 50 big league save opportunities, becoming the first Major League pitcher to accomplish the feat.

July 4, 1959: Maury Wills becomes the Dodger shortstop when he is called up from the minors to replace Don Zimmer, who had injured his foot.

July 4, 1980: Don Sutton sets a Dodger record by pitching his 52nd career shutout, 4-0, over the Giants.

July 5, 1991: In a 4-1 loss to the Braves, Dodger catcher Gary Carter collects his 2,000th career hit.

July 6, 1912: The cornerstone for Ebbets Field is set.

July 6, 1942: Leo Durocher becomes the first Dodger to manage in the All-Star Game.

July 6, 1955: Sandy Koufax makes his first Major League start.

July 6, 1980: Duke Snider has his uniform No. 4 retired in pregame ceremonies.

July 8, 1949: History is made as Don Newcombe, an African-American pitcher, faces Hank Thompson, an African-American batter from the Giants.

July 8, 1980: The 51st All-Star Game takes place at Dodger Stadium before 56,088 fans and Jerry Reuss gets the win in a 4-2 National League victory.

July 8, 2005: Jeff Kent registers his 2,000th career hit, a single off Roger Clemens, becoming the 66th player in Major League history to combine 300 home runs with 2,000 hits.

July 9, 1996: Mike Piazza is named MVP of the All-Star Game in Philadelphia. Before family and friends, Piazza drives in two runs with a 445-foot home run and a double. He is the first Dodger to win MVP honors since Steve Garvey in 1978.

July 11, 1978: With a pair of hits and two RBI in the All-Star Game, Steve Garvey is named the Most Valuable Player for the second time in four years.

July 13, 1954: Manager Walter Alston manages in his first of a record nine All-Star Game appearances.

July 14, 1995: Ramon Martinez tosses his first no-hitter, blanking the Florida Marlins, 7-0. Martinez strikes out eight and faces just one batter over the minimum.

July 17, 1976: Hall of Famer Walter Alston wins his 2,000th game as a manager as the Dodgers edge the Chicago Cubs, 5-4.

July 18, 1978: Don Sutton picks up his 200th career win as he bests the Pirates, 7-2.

July 20, 1970: Bill Singer, recently recovered from hepatitis, throws the only Dodger no-hitter in the '70s, as he blanks the Phillies, 5-0, at Dodger Stadium.

July 21, 1956: Hall of Famer Pee Wee Reese gets his 2,000th career hit

July 21, 2002: Dave Hansen breaks Manny Mota's club career pinch-hitting mark with his 107th off the bench against the San Francisco Giants.

July 23, 1962: Jackie Robinson is inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame.

July 23, 1974: As a write-in candidate, Steve Garvey makes the NL All-Star squad and is named MVP as he gets two hits and drives in a run.

July 26, 1985: Pedro Guerrero reaches base safely for the 14th consecutive at-bat vs. Cubs to set a Dodger record, two shy of Ted Williams' Major League mark.

July 26, 1998: Longtime Dodger pitcher Don Sutton and Dodger broadcaster Jaime Jarrin are inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame.

July 26, 2007: Brad Penny defeats the Rockies at Coors Field, running his record to 13-1 on the year and making him the first starting pitcher in Los Angeles Dodger history to win 13 of his first 14 decisions.

July 28, 1991: Pitcher Dennis Martinez of the Montreal Expos becomes the first opponent in Dodger Stadium history and only the second hurler in stadium history to toss a perfect game as he sets down 27 straight Dodgers before a crowd of 45,560.

July 29, 1996: Tommy Lasorda announces his retirement as Dodger manager.

July 31, 1974: Ron Cey drives in a then-L.A. Dodger-record eight runs, including two three-run homers in a 15-4 win over the Padres.

July 31, 1984: The Dodgers play host to the 1984 Olympic Summer Games baseball competition. Teams from eight countries participate in the demonstration tournament with Japan defeating the USA in the finals.

July 31, 2008: The Dodgers acquire future Hall of Famer Manny Ramirez in a trade-deadline deal. Ramirez would put together two of the best months in Dodger history, hitting .396 with 17 home runs, 53 RBI and a .743 slugging percentage.

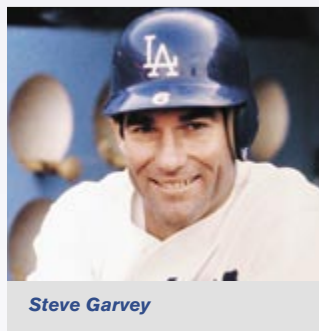
August 1, 1890: "Oyster" Burns becomes the first Dodger to hit for the cycle in a 20-1 win over Pittsburgh.

August 2, 1981: Jackie Robinson becomes the first baseball player ever depicted on a United States postage stamp.

August 3, 1962: Don Drysdale wins his 20th game with an 8-3 victory over Chicago, making it the earliest date for a National League pitcher since 1918.

August 5, 1979: Don Sutton becomes the Dodgers' all-time strikeout leader with his 2,487th career strikeout in an 8-1 win over the San Francisco Giants.

August 5, 1969: Pittsburgh's Willie Stargell hits what is considered the longest home run at Dodger Stadium, a blast of 506 feet and six inches over the Right Field Pavilion.

August 7, 1972: Sandy Koufax is inducted into Baseball's Hall of Fame.

August 7, 1979: Manny Mota ties Smokey Burgess' all-time pinch-hit record of 144 hits with a single against the Houston Astros.

August 8, 2003: Eric Gagné sets a Major League record by converting his 39th consecutive save to start a season.

August 9, 1975: Davey Lopes steals his 32nd consecutive base against the New York Mets, breaking Max Carey's Major League mark.

August 11, 1951: The first game of a doubleheader with the Braves is the first Major League contest to be broadcast in color.

August 13, 1982: Against San Francisco, Steve Sax steals his 41st base to break Rudy Law's Dodger record for stolen bases by a rookie.

August 14, 1998: Don Sutton's uniform number 20 is retired against the Atlanta Braves at Dodger Stadium. He becomes the 10th player or manager in franchise history to receive this honor.

August 15, 2006: The Dodgers defeat the Florida Marlins for their 17th victory in 18 games, marking the first time they accomplished that feat since May/June 1899 when the team was still known as the Brooklyn Superbas.

August 17, 1992: Kevin Garvey records the only no-hitter of the Major League season and the first one of his career blanking the Giants, 2-0.

August 18, 2001: Against the New York Mets, Shawn Green drives in his 100th RBI, becoming the first L.A. Dodger left-handed hitter to reach the century mark in RBI.

August 23, 1958: Gil Hodges cracks his 14th career grand slam and the first in Los Angeles Dodger history

August 23, 1989: In a 22-inning marathon the Dodgers defeat the Expos, 1-0, on Rick Dempsey's homer in the top of the 22nd. It was the Dodgers' second 22-inning game of the season. Dodger broadcaster Ross Porter sets a mark by calling all 22 innings on his own.

August 24, 1974: Davey Lopes steals an L.A. Dodger-record five bases against the St. Louis Cardinals. It gave him a Major League-record 38 consecutive stolen bases, though he was later caught stealing to end the streak.

August 26, 1939: With Hall of Famer Red Barber broadcasting at Ebbets Field, the Dodgers play the Reds in the first baseball game ever to be televised.

August 27, 1988: Tommy Lasorda gets his 1,000th victory as a Dodger skipper when the Dodgers defeat the Philadelphia Phillies, 4-2.

August 28, 1945: Dodger President Branch Rickey tells Jackie Robinson that he has been chosen as the first African-American to play in the Major Leagues.

August 28, 2002: Eric Gagné sets a new single-season franchise record for saves with his 45th of the year.

August 29, 2006: For the first time in franchise history, the Dodgers start and end a game with a home run, as Rafael Furcal leads off the contest with a homer vs. Cincinnati and Ramon Martinez's 16th-inning walk-off homer ends the game.

August 31, 1950: Gil Hodges hits a club-record four home runs and also gets a single against the Boston Braves.

August 31, 1959: Sandy Koufax ties a Major League record as he strikes out 18 Giants

September 1, 1890: The Dodgers and Pittsburgh play in the first-ever Major League tripleheader and the Dodgers win all three games.

September 2, 1979: Manny Mota gets his 145th career pinch-hit, breaking Smokey Burgess' all-time record.

September 2, 2003: Eric Gagné sets a Major League record by recording his 55th consecutive save

September 3, 1975: Steve Garvey starts his Dodger-record consecutive games playing streak in a game at Cincinnati.

September 4, 1966: The Dodgers become the first team in the history of baseball to draw two million fans both at home and on the road in the same season as they beat the Reds, 8-6, in Cincinnati.

September 6, 1981: With his seventh shutout, Fernando Valenzuela ties a National League record for shutouts in a rookie season as he gets his 12th win over St. Louis.

September 7, 2001: Shawn Green puts himself in the record books as he belts two home runs against the St. Louis Cardinals to become the Dodgers all-time single-season leader with 44. He goes on to hit 49 that season to set the club record.

September 7, 2004: Robin Ventura hits a pinch-hit grand slam homer, the 18th grand slam of his career to move him into third place on the all-time Major League list.

September 8, 2004: One day after Robin Ventura cracked a pinch-hit grand slam, Olmedo Saenz did the same thing, marking the first time in Major League history that a team had pinch-hit grand slams in back-to-back games.

September 9, 1965: Sandy Koufax pitches a perfect game and his fourth no-hitter with a 1-0 win over the Chicago Cubs at Dodger Stadium. There is only one hit in the game (by Lou Johnson), a Major League record.

September 11, 1947: At age 21, Ralph Branca becomes the youngest Dodger 20-game winner as he defeats the Cardinals, 4-3.

September 12, 1947: The *Sporting News* names Jackie Robinson Rookie of the Year.

September 12, 2000: Dave Hansen hits his Major League-record seventh pinch-hit home run of the season off Arizona's Curt Schilling and breaks Johnny Frederick's 1932 mark of six.

September 13, 1925: Dazzy Vance throws a no-hitter against the Phillies only five days after one-hitting them.

September 14, 1993: Mike Piazza hits his 29th and 30th homers, setting a new Major League rookie record for catchers

September 15, 1978: The Dodgers become the first team to record over three million in attendance, as they draw 47,188 for a Don Sutton shutout against Atlanta to put them at 3,011,368 for the season.

September 15, 2009: Andre Ethier hits a two-run walk-off homer off Pittsburgh's Phil Dumatrait in the 13th inning to tie a Major League record with four walk-off home runs in a season.

September 16, 1957: In a historic move, the Los Angeles City Council agrees to a contract with the Dodgers in which the city will sell them 300 acres in Chavez Ravine.

September 17, 1996: Hideo Nomo throws his first no-hitter as he blanks the Colorado Rockies, 9-0, at Coors Field. It is the 20th no-hitter in franchise history.

September 17, 2010: Don Mattingly is announced as the ninth manager in Los Angeles Dodger history, effective at the end of the season. Mattingly also becomes the 27th skipper in franchise history.

September 18, 2006: Trailing 9-5 against San Diego in the bottom of the 9th inning, the Dodgers tie a Major League record with four consecutive homers by Jeff Kent, J.D. Drew, Russell Martin and Marlon Anderson, marking just the 4th time in history the feat had been accomplished. The four homers in an inning equaled the franchise record. After falling behind 10-9 in the 10th inning, Nomar Garciaparra hits a walk-off, two-run homer in the bottom of the frame, the team's 7th home run of the game to tie their Dodger Stadium record.

September 20, 1961: The Dodgers defeat the Cubs, 3-2, in the last game played at the Coliseum, as Sandy Koufax fans 15 and Norm Sherry hits the last home run there.

September 20, 1993: Dave Hansen sets a new Dodger single-season record with his 18th pinch-hit of the year against Cincinnati.

September 22, 1957: Duke Snider hits the final Dodger home run at Ebbets Field.

September 23, 1962: Maury Wills steals his 97th base to break Ty Cobb's Major League record.

September 23, 2008: Manny Ramirez's two-run double in the first inning makes him just the second player (Carlos Beltran, 2004) in Major League history to record 50 RBI in both leagues in the same season.

September 24, 1929: Johnny Frederick belts his Major League rookie-record 52nd double in an 8-6 loss to the Phillies. It still remains a Dodger record.

September 24, 1957: The Dodgers play their last game ever at Ebbets Field as Danny McDevitt shuts out the Pirates, 2-0.

September 24, 2009: Matt Kemp becomes the first Dodger in franchise history with at least 25 homers, 100 RBI and 30 stolen bases in a single season.

September 25, 1965: Sandy Koufax breaks Bob Feller's Major League record of 348 strikeouts for the season and goes on to post a 2-0 shutout over St. Louis.

September 25, 1997: Mike Piazza collects three hits against Colorado to give him 195, breaking the Major League record for most hits in a season by a player whose normal position is catcher.

September 25, 2008: The Dodgers clinch their 10th division title when an afternoon loss by Arizona gives them the NL West championship. Los Angeles reaches the playoffs for the third time in five seasons, the fourth time they have done that in L.A. Dodger history

September 27, 2004: Adrian Beltre hits a grand slam off Colorado's Shawn Estes to tie Mike Schmidt for the most home runs in a single season by a third baseman in Major League history (48).

September 28, 1962: Maury Wills steals his 104th base of the season, after breaking Ty Cobb's big league record (96) on Sept. 23

September 28, 1963: Tommy Davis gets two hits and finishes with a .326 batting average and becomes the youngest player (24) to win two consecutive National League batting crowns.

September 28, 1988: Orel Hershiser pitches his 59th consecutive scoreless inning, as he throws 10 shutout innings against the San Diego Padres, and breaks Don Drysdale's 1968 Major League mark of 58 consecutive scoreless innings.

September 28, 2006: At Coors Field in Denver, rookie James Loney hits two home runs and has an L.A. Dodger record-setting nine RBI, which ties Gil Hodges for the franchise single-game record.

September 29, 1976: Tommy Lasorda is named to succeed Walter Alton as manager of the Dodgers.

September 29, 2000: Gary Sheffield ties Duke Snider's club record of 43 home runs in a season with a home run in San Diego.

September 29, 2006: Takashi Saito registers his 23rd save of the season to set the franchise rookie record. The next day, he notches No. 24 to extend the mark for saves by a rookie to 24.

September 30, 1956: The Dodgers defeat Pittsburgh, 8-6, for the NL title as Don Newcombe wins his 27th game of the season.

September 30, 1984: Against San Francisco, Bill Russell plays in his 2,000th game as a Dodger.

September 30, 2007: The Dodgers set a single-season franchise record for paid attendance with 3,857,036, surpassing the previous mark set in 2006.

September 30, 1995: The Dodgers clinch their first Western Division title in seven years as they defeat the Padres, 7-2.

October 1, 1974: The Dodgers clinch the National League West title with an 8-5 win over Houston. Don Sutton wins his 19th game, Mike Marshall appears in a record 106th game and the Dodgers reach 100 wins for the second time in Los Angeles.

October 1, 1990: Right-hander Ramon Martinez becomes the youngest Dodger to win 20 games since Ralph Branca in 1947 as he defeats the Padres, 2-1. In the process he completes his 12th game and finishes as the Major League leader.

October 1, 1993: Mike Piazza sets a new Dodger rookie record for RBI as he drives in his 107th run of the year against San Francisco breaking the mark of 106 held by Del Bisenette since 1928.

October 2, 1953: In a classic pitcher's duel, Carl Erskine strikes out 14 Yankees, including Mickey Mantle four times, setting a then-World Series single-game record as the Brooklyn Dodgers defeat New York, 3-2, in Game 3 of the World Series.

October 2, 1955: Duke Snider becomes the first Major Leaguer to have four homers in a World Series when he belts two in Game 5, helping the Dodgers to a 5-3 victory over the Yankees

October 2, 1963: Dodger pitcher Sandy Koufax goes the distance in Game 1 of the World Series, limiting the Yankees to six hits and striking out 15 for a then-World Series single-game record as Los Angeles defeats New York, 5-2.

October 2, 1965: Sandy Koufax strikes out 15 Milwaukee Braves on two days rest to bring his season total to 382. It is his 26th win, as the Dodgers clinch the National League flag.

October 2, 1966: Sandy Koufax gets his 27th win at Philadelphia to give the Dodgers back-to-back pennants.

October 2, 1977: With Dusty Baker's 30th homer on the final day of the season against Houston at Dodger Stadium, the Dodgers set a Major League record by having four players on the same team to hit 30 or more home runs in a season. Ron Cey, Reggie Smith and Steve Garvey are the others.

October 2, 1985: The Dodgers clinch the NL West as the Dodgers beat Atlanta, 9-3, and Cincinnati loses in San Diego.

October 2, 2004: Steve Finley's walk-off grand slam clinches the NL West for the Dodgers, erasing a 3-0 deficit in the bottom of the ninth inning against the Giants. It was the Dodgers' 10th grand slam of the year, marking a new franchise single-season record.

October 3, 1916: The Dodgers clinch their first-ever World Series appearance as they beat the Giants, 9-6, for the NL pennant.

- November 5, 2007:** Joe Torre becomes the 8th Manager in Los Angeles Dodger history and the 26th in franchise history
- November 7, 1974:** Mike Marshall becomes the first relief pitcher to win the Cy Young Award.
- November 10, 1988:** Orel Hershiser is unanimously named as the recipient of the National League Cy Young Award.
- November 13, 2003:** Eric Gagné captures the National League Cy Young Award, becoming just the ninth reliever in Major League history to take home the award.
- November 15, 2005:** The Dodgers name Ned Colletti the 10th General Manager in Los Angeles Dodger history.
- November 18, 1966:** Sandy Koufax retires.
- November 21, 1956:** Don Newcombe becomes the first National Leaguer to win MVP and Cy Young awards in the same season.
- November 24, 1953:** Walter Alston is named Dodger manager. Alston goes on to manage 23 seasons for the Dodgers, winning four World Championships.
- December 8, 1955:** Roy Campanella wins his third National League MVP Award.

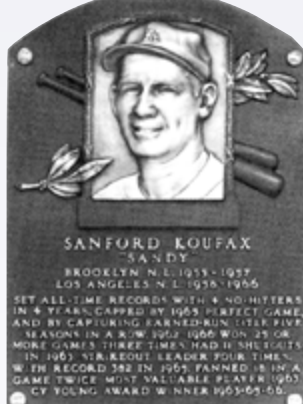
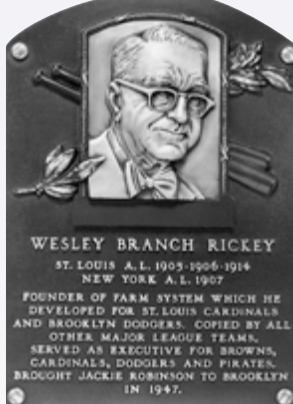
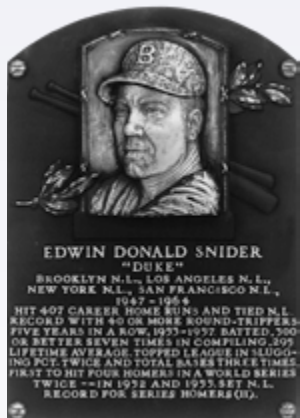

Tommy Lasorda had a tough act to follow when he succeeded future Hall of Famer Walter Alston as Dodger manager with four games left in the 1976 season. But like Alston, Lasorda went on to enjoy a lengthy and highly successful tenure at the helm. Piloting the Dodgers until the 1996 campaign, he racked up 1,599 victories to rank 13th on the all-time Major League managerial list, winning two World Series titles (1981 and 1988), four NL pennants and eight division titles. Prior to joining the big league staff as a coach in 1973, he had a successful eight-year stint as a minor league manager, helping the development of several future Dodger stars. The former Brooklyn Dodger pitcher was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 1997.

The 'Duke of Flatbush' was among the game's most feared hitters during his 16 seasons with the Brooklyn and Los Angeles Dodgers (1947-62), playing on a pair of World Championship teams (1955 and 1959) and in six World Series overall. The eight-time All-Star center fielder ranks as the franchise's career leader in home runs (389) and runs batted in (1,271) and during the 1950s he topped all Major Leaguers with 326 homers and 1,031 RBI. He slugged four home runs in both the 1952 and 1955 World Series and he holds the Brooklyn Dodger single-season mark of 43 homers, which led the National League in 1956. His 136 RBI in 1955 topped the NL. Snider was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 1980.

The durable right-hander spent 16 of his 23 Major League seasons with the Dodgers and more than made his mark in team history, ranking as the franchise's all-time leader in wins (233), games pitched (550), innings pitched (3,814), strikeouts (2,696) and shutouts (52). A four-time All-Star, he pitched in three World Series (1974, 1977 and 1978) with the Dodgers, led the National League in shutouts (9) in 1972, was the NL ERA leader (2.21) in 1980 and a 21-game winner in 1976. He made his big league debut with the Dodgers in 1966 and stayed with the team through 1980, before leaving and rejoining the club in 1988. Sutton finished his career with 324 wins and 3,574 strikeouts and was enshrined in the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 1998.

Walter Emmons Alston was a virtual unknown when he took over the helm of the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1954, but he became well-known in a hurry. The long-time minor league skipper guided his first Dodger team to 92 wins and followed that by piloting the 1955 Dodgers to 98 victories and their first World Championship in franchise history. He went on to lead the Dodgers to six more National League pennants and three more World Series titles (1959, 1963 and 1965) in a 23-year career in which he tallied 2,040 victories to place sixth on the all-time managerial wins list. His 3,658 total games managed rank eighth all time. Alston, who played in one Major League game, that with the St. Louis Cardinals in 1934, was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 1983.

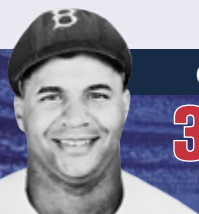

Among the most dominating pitchers in the game's history, the left-hander won 165 games and compiled 2,396 strikeouts in 2,324.1 innings with 40 shutouts in his 12-year Dodger career (1955-66). A three-time Cy Young Award winner and the National League MVP in 1963, Koufax was also World Series MVP in both 1963 and 1965, when he hurled a pair of shutouts. He led the NL in ERA five straight seasons from 1962-66, was the strikeouts leader four times and was tops in wins on three occasions with totals of 27, 26 and 25. In addition, Koufax pitched an NL-record four no-hitters, including a perfect game in 1965, and set the National League single-season mark with 382 strikeouts in 1965. He was inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1972.

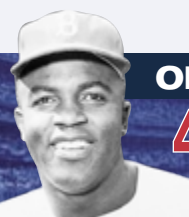

In 10 seasons with the Brooklyn Dodgers (1948-57), Campy was a force both at the plate and behind the plate. The catcher played on five pennant-winning clubs, including the World Champions of 1955. That season, the eight-time All-Star became a three-time National League Most Valuable Player award winner after collecting 32 home runs and 107 RBI. He also garnered MVP honors in 1951 and 1953, when he led the league with a Brooklyn-record 142 RBI to go with a career-high 41 home runs. Campanella, whose career was cut short due to a tragic automobile accident that left him paralyzed, was inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1969.

Jack Roosevelt Robinson made a historic entrance into Major League Baseball in 1947 as the first African-American player in the history of the game. His outstanding debut season netted him the inaugural Rookie of the Year award, which now bears his name, and spring-boarded him to a stellar 10-season career in which he was part of six Brooklyn Dodger pennant-winners, among them the World Championship club of 1955. In 1949, the six-time all-star won the National League batting title (.342) en route to earning MVP honors. Robinson, a first baseman as a rookie, starred as a second baseman for the next five seasons, before moving on to play third base and the outfield. He was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 1962.

One of the game's fiercest competitors, the hard-throwing right-hander pitched 14 seasons (1956-69) for the Brooklyn and Los Angeles Dodgers, ranking second on the franchise career list in wins (209), games pitched (518), strikeouts (2,486), innings pitched (3,432.1) and shutouts (49). The NL strikeout leader in 1959 and 1960, Big D earned the leagues' Cy Young Award in 1962, when he won 25 and topped the league in strikeouts for a third time. A member of three World Championship clubs (1959, 1963 and 1965) and two other pennant winners (1956 and 1966), he set a then-Major League record in 1968, tossing 58.2 consecutive scoreless innings, including a record six straight shutouts. Drysdale gained induction into the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1984.

On Oct. 9, 2003, the 100th Anniversary of former Dodger owner and Hall of Famer Walter O'Malley's birth, a website was created to honor and salute the extraordinary life and achievements of the former Dodger President, who is widely regarded as one of Major League Baseball's most influential leaders and visionaries during his 37 years in the game. O'Malley was elected to the National Baseball Hall of Fame by the Veterans Committee on Dec. 3, 2007 and was inducted during ceremonies on July 27, 2008. On July 9, 2008, the Los Angeles Coliseum Commission unveiled a bronze plaque honoring Walter O'Malley in its "Coliseum Court of Honor" at the Coliseum's peristyle end. It was only the 55th plaque that the Coliseum Commission has awarded

to those "that have had a definite impact upon the history, glory and growth of the Coliseum." As one of the Internet's largest biographical sites, walteromalley.com offers a rich multimedia experience, with more than 1,500 pages. It includes extensive background on O'Malley; a history of Dodger Stadium (which he privately built and financed in 1962) and the Dodger franchise; a section dedicated to Dodgertown and Holman Stadium, which he also built; historic documents dating back to the 1940s; and a collection of rare photos, cartoons, memorabilia and video & audio clips. The site has received multiple honors from the Web Marketing Association in the "Sports" category in its "WebAward" global competition.

The Los Angeles Dodgers ushered in a new modern era of Spring Training on March 1, 2009 when Camelback Ranch - Glendale officially became their new preseason home. On that date, 11,280 fans came to watch the Dodgers host their co-tenants, the White Sox, in the club's first-ever contest at Camelback Ranch.

The Dodgers went on to post a franchise-record-setting cumulative attendance of 131,134 in their inaugural 14-game season at Camelback Ranch with an average attendance of 9,367, which also established a new franchise mark.

The accolades, terrific attendance and overwhelmingly positive reaction to the Dodgers' new Spring Training complex confirmed what Dodger Owner and Chairman Frank McCourt had thought for a long time: The Dodgers needed to be closer to their fans in Los Angeles. For more than 60 years, the Dodgers had hosted Spring Training in Vero Beach, FL, where the team's Dodgertown

complex became known around the world as one of the most family-friendly venues in all of sports. But a move just five-plus hours by car and one hour by air from the generations of families in Southern California that bled "Dodger Blue," seemed to be the perfect match.

"The opening of Camelback Ranch in 2009 was the culmination of a long journey designed to give Dodgers fans a shorter journey," said McCourt, who had the vision for the 141-acre complex. "Since the start of this process, we sought to bring the Dodgers closer to the people of Southern California. They have supported this team for more than half a century on the West Coast, and while we loved our spring home

on the East Coast, we know that over the next 50 years, far more fans of the Dodgers can enjoy Spring Training."

Camelback Ranch - Glendale is a joint venture between the Dodgers and the Chicago White Sox, and the two teams share a state-of-the-art ballpark, which is the largest in the Cactus League. With a capacity of over 13,000, the ballpark has over 10,000 fixed seats and can accommodate an additional 3,000 on the outfield berms. It also has 12 luxury suites, a party deck and a unique center field rotunda entrance. The architectural features include natural stone veneers, tri-color faux staining, rusty metal panels, Gabion wall systems, earth-tone

(caramel) stadium seat color and other appointments to blend with the natural desert colors of Arizona. In addition to its modern amenities and design, dramatic mountain views from within the park create one of the most inviting Spring Training atmospheres in all of baseball.

Located on Camelback Road just west of Loop 101 in the West Valley area of Maricopa County, the first-rate baseball facility has views of the Estrella Mountains to the south and White Tanks to the west. It includes more than 118,000 square feet of Major and minor league clubhouse space, 13 full baseball fields and three half-fields. The site features walking trails, landscaped grounds with almost 5,000 plants and trees, an orange grove and a stocked two-acre lake between the Dodgers and White Sox facilities.

"One of the things we really focused on was to make sure we brought some of Vero Beach to Glendale," said McCourt. "Most importantly, fans will notice the lack of fences and lack of barriers. One thing that made Dodgertown very memorable for our fans is the intimacy and accessibility of fan to player. No fences, no barriers. Just a simple little yellow cord and we've brought that to Camelback Ranch as well so that our fans can get up close and personal with our players."

In addition to serving as the spring-training home of the Dodgers and White Sox, the CR-G campus has become home for all Dodger minor league operations throughout the year, including the franchise's team in the rookie-level Arizona League in the summer following the MLB Draft and a Fall Instructional League team.

"Having all of our player development programs operate out of one location is a huge benefit to the Dodgers," said Dodger General Manager Ned Colletti. "Even better than that, it's just a short flight from Los Angeles which will allow many of our staff members to stop in and check on the progress of our young talent."

Additionally, CR-G also has hosted one Arizona Fall League game each of the past two autumns. During the 2010 Fall League season, the Phoenix Desert Dogs, skippered by Dodger manager Don Mattingly and including seven Dodger prospects – LHP Scott Elbert, RHP Javy Guerra, RHP Jon Link, RHP Justin Miller, OF Trayvon Robinson, IF Jerry Sands and C Matt Wallach – appeared at CR-G.

Former Dodger second baseman Jody Reed begins his first year coordinating the efforts for the Player Development Department once Spring Training is over. Reed will be aided by infield coach Daisuke "Duke" Yamashita and Camelback Ranch pitching coach Jim Slaton.

In keeping with the theme of player development, one of the Dodgers' six fields is an exact replica of the dimensions, turf and grounds of Dodger Stadium, allowing minor league players to get a sense of what it would be like to play in their ultimate destination.

With ticket prices starting as low as \$8 and free parking in addition to luxury options like suites, fans who have never before been able to make

the trip to see the Dodgers during Spring Training will get to take part in the entire experience.

In addition to the accessibility of the practice fields and the actual game experience, fans are encouraged to come out to Camelback Ranch - Glendale early and spend a day enjoying the sound of baseball and the sound of music on game days alongside the lake.

The formal groundbreaking for the facility was Nov. 19, 2007, the start of an ambitious 15-month plan to have the complex ready by Spring Training 2009. But teamwork by a talented group of more than 900 people, from HKS Architects, Mortenson Construction, Arizona Sports and Tourism Authority, the cities of Phoenix and Glendale, the State of Arizona, the two baseball franchises and many more were able to complete construction in near-record time.

Camelback Ranch - Glendale has become a multi-use facility, available to host concerts, sporting events and corporate outings, in addition to Spring Training. Glendale has its own Sports and Entertainment District, which features the arena of the NHL's Phoenix Coyotes and University of Phoenix Stadium that serves as home to the NFL Arizona Cardinals, Tostitos Fiesta Bowl and BCS National Championship Game every four years.

In 2010, the Dodgers played 17 games at Camelback Ranch, including two games against the White Sox in which they were considered the road team. The Dodgers opened up their third season at CR-G hosting the Angels on Feb. 27.

VERO BEACH, FL (1948-2008)

Prior to the move to Camelback Ranch - Glendale, the Dodgers' 50th anniversary on the West Coast in 2008 coincided with the 60th anniversary of Dodgertown, their Vero Beach, FL Spring Training home from 1948-2008.

The Dodgertown complex was home to some of the most memorable players and personalities in both Brooklyn and Los Angeles lore. The personalized street signs within the complex honored such Hall of Famers as Jackie Robinson, Sandy Koufax, Roy Campanella, Duke Snider, Pee Wee Reese, Don Drysdale, Tommy Lasorda, Walter Alston, Don Sutton, Vin Scully, and Jaime Jarrin.

Prior to Vero Beach, the Dodgers spent their Spring Trainings at various camps from 1901-48 in North Carolina, South Carolina, Arkansas, Georgia, Louisiana, New York, Cuba, and the Dominican Republic.

The Dodgers first set up camp at the invitation of a local businessman, Bud Holman, after the city needed a tenant to occupy a former World War II Naval Air Station. The camp became the most unique baseball training facility in the country, a destination for international baseball visitors. The complex also grew into six practice fields, four indoor batting and pitching tunnels, a pool, tennis court and more.

Dodgertown wasn't the product of a single blueprint, rather its roots came from the various personalities and ambitions of those with the ballclub and the local community.

Hall of Fame executive Branch Rickey conceived the idea of the farm system during his tenure with the St. Louis Cardinals in the late 1930s. Rickey joined the Dodgers in 1942 as team president and kept his scouts looking for talent, despite a depleted supply of ballplayers due to World War II. Rickey knew the war wouldn't last forever.

Meanwhile, the city of Vero Beach was looking for a tenant for the naval air station that the United States built during World War II. One of the city's most dynamic civic leaders and an influential businessman would make the best of an otherwise bleak situation.

Holman opened a Cadillac dealership in 1923 and became interested in aviation. In 1932, he convinced Eastern Airlines to make Vero Beach a fueling stop. By 1935, Vero Beach was the smallest U.S. city to have direct airmail service.

During World War II, the airport and naval base in Vero Beach turned the tiny town into a military community. Holman didn't know much about baseball, but when the idea of inviting a Major League franchise came along, Holman reportedly asked his wife which was the best team to invite. His wife replied, "The Dodgers," and Holman contacted Rickey at the Dodger offices in Brooklyn, New York. Holman knew Rickey had 26 minor league teams and wanted a chance to prove Vero Beach could host a full-scale training camp.

Rickey dispatched Buzzie Bavasi, the general manager of the Dodgers' Nashua, New Hampshire farm team. Bavasi was supposed to visit other potential sites at Ft. Pierce and Stuart, but never had a chance. Holman's hospitality during a party on Nov. 2, 1947 convinced Bavasi the facilities already were in place, especially because of Vero Beach's airport.

The original concept of Dodgertown was to provide a classroom environment for players and coaches with enough land so personnel could discuss baseball at any point in the day. Because there were so many Dodger minor league ball clubs, many affiliates and working groups were assigned different colored uniforms to help keep drills and other daily itineraries on schedule.

In a 1954 book collaborated with team photographer Barney Stein, "The Rhubarb Patch - The Story of the Modern Brooklyn Dodgers," broadcaster Red Barber recalled Rickey's fascination with the potential layout of a training camp.

"Rickey dreamed about having everybody in one central place where he could see everything and everyone," Barber wrote. "Tremendous planning was involved, entailing constant staff work. Ballgames were being played on diamonds all day long. Instruction work kept the batting tees and cages busy, the sliding pits filled. ... Rickey dreamed that by force teaching, training and close observation, a new player might be ready for the Majors in a year's less time than otherwise."

The Dodgers brought their minor league operations to Vero Beach in 1948 and in 1952 Dodger President Walter O'Malley and New York-based architect Emil Praeger decided to build an intimate-style stadium with unobstructed views. The stadium was built by excavating 20,000 cubic yards of sand, marl, and muck. The excavation was turned into a 2-acre fishing lake and stocked by the United States Wildlife Service. The fill formed into mounds, which were compacted and rolled. Four-inch reinforced concrete was poured over the mounds to make the stands.

"Holman Stadium," named by O'Malley after Bud Holman, was officially dedicated on March 11, 1953. An overflow crowd of 5,532 watched the Brooklyn Dodgers defeat the Philadelphia Athletics, 4-2.

With the passage of time, the Dodgertown property gradually developed and maintained signature attractions such as a strings area for pitchers, the street signs named after Hall of Fame players and managers,



and "Campy's Corner," an area outside the dining room where Hall of Fame catcher Roy Campanella held court with young players following the 1958 auto accident that left him paralyzed. There were other special rooms named in honor of longtime Los Angeles-area sportswriter Bob Hunter, photographer Herb Scharfman, trainer Bill Buhler, and Dodger team physician Dr. Frank Jobe.

Beginning in 1983, Dodgertown hosted the twice-yearly Dodgers Adult Baseball Camps, featuring instruction from Dodger stars of the past.

During their final Grapefruit League season in 2008, the Dodgers honored many of their heroes of the past as well as several longtime Dodgertown employees who left an indelible mark on the franchise over the past 60 years. On March 17, 2008, the final Dodger Spring Training contest took place at Holman Stadium. The Dodgers lost to the Astros that afternoon, but the lasting image of current players forming a "bat tunnel" and saluting Dodger Hall of Fame Manager Tommy Lasorda as he walked off the field for the final time in Vero Beach will stick with any fan of baseball, the Dodgers, Spring Training or Dodgertown for a lifetime to come. When Lasorda exited, the music coming from the PA system was "Simply the Best," and could have just as easily been meant for the 61 seasons of Dodgertown in Vero Beach, FL.

DODGERTOWN – A HOME TO THE WORLD

International visits became a tradition at Dodgertown. The Dodgers hosted a professional team from Asia on 13 different occasions. Most recently the Osaka Buffaloes of the Japanese League trained at Dodgertown in the fall of 2003 for the second consecutive year. The Samsung Lions professional baseball team from Taegu, Korea trained at Dodgertown in 1985, 1992, 1993, 1996, and 1997. In addition to the Lions' five visits, the Tokyo Giants trained in Vero Beach in 1961, 1967, 1971, 1975, and 1981. The Chunichi Dragons from Nagoya, Japan trained at Dodgertown in 1988. The Sinon Bulls became the first Taiwanese team to train at Dodgertown when they began a week of workouts in February, 1999.

THINK BLUE

In a half-century, Dodger Stadium has established itself as one of baseball's true landmarks and Los Angeles' iconic destinations. The historic ballpark enters the 2011 season as the third-oldest continually used park in Major League Baseball and still is one of its most attended and loved sports venues.

Through the years, Dodger Stadium has seen legendary moments such as Sandy Koufax's perfect game in 1965, the rise of Fernandomania, Kirk Gibson's walk-off home run in Game 1 of the 1988 World Series and most recently the thrilling run of back-to-back National League playoff appearances in 2008 and 2009.

In addition, Dodger Stadium has hosted World Series games, the 1980 All-Star Game, the 1984

Olympic Games baseball competition, the 2009 World Baseball Classic Final and events such as a Mass conducted by Pope John Paul II, concerts and in 2011 motocross and monster truck spectacles.

One of the true cathedrals of baseball, Dodger Stadium has hosted more than 140 million fans since it opened its doors in 1962, including 3,562,320 in 2010, which was the second-highest attendance in the National League and third in all of baseball. The club topped the 3.85 million mark in 2007, which stands as the all-time franchise record.

When the Dodgers hosted Game 1 of the NLCS against the Phillies in 2009, Dodger Stadium became the No. 1 site for playoff games in National League history, surpassing the old Busch Stadium with 107 postseason contests. Dodger Stadium ranks third overall, behind just the Old Yankee Stadium (322) and Fenway Park (146). The stadium has also hosted 41 League Championship Series games, which ranks fourth in baseball history.

This January and February saw the venerable stadium play host to both Supercross motorcycle racing and a monster truck competition for the first time. The Monster Energy AMA Supercross race and Advance Auto Parts Monster Jam were held at Dodger Stadium on Jan. 22 and Feb. 19, 2011, respectively.

In February of 2010, Dodger Stadium hosted the first-annual Dodgertown Classic, a college baseball double-header featuring national powers USC, UCLA, Oklahoma State and Vanderbilt. The second Dodgertown Classic took place on March 13 with USC, UCLA, Georgia and St. Mary's College.

In 2009, Dodger Stadium played host to the second World Baseball Classic finals and semifinals, culminating in a championship for the Japanese team before a sellout crowd on March 24, 2009.

The ballpark's latest renovations were done prior to the 2010 season. Most notably, changes were made to the Stadium Club to include outdoor seating. Dodger Stadium underwent an unparalleled restoration project prior to the 2006 season, as every seat in the stadium was replaced in a single offseason with the club returning to the stadium's original color scheme from Opening Day 1962 while also introducing other modern-day amenities designed for the enjoyment of fans.

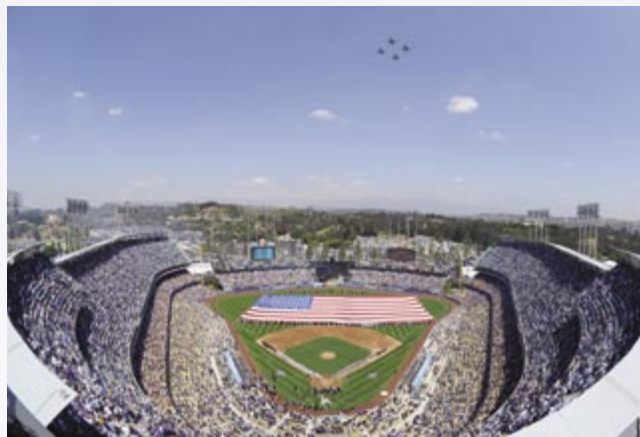
In April of 2008, Dodger Owner and Chairman Frank McCourt introduced the "Next 50 Years" plan in a Dodger Stadium press conference, outlining for the first time what will be done to Dodger Stadium to modernize, enhance, and improve the beloved ballpark. McCourt's vision will include a dramatic, tree-lined, beautifully landscaped center field entrance to the park that will serve as a promenade to shops, restaurants and a Dodger interactive museum. Parking

will improve, the Top of the Park will get a facelift and increased effort will go into ensuring the project "Think Blue and Act Green." The stadium will become as environmentally responsible a baseball stadium as there is in America. The Dodgers' plans reflect the environmentally-sensitive practices supported by the Natural Resources Defense Council in their "Team Greening Program," a collaboration with Major League Baseball.

During the 2007 offseason, the Dodgers completely renovated the field level concourse, nearly doubling the number of points of sale and restrooms while also adding two new all-inclusive clubs for Baseline seat ticket holders. The Baseline Box Clubs are located on both the first and third base sides at the

vision of Dodger Owner and Chairman Frank McCourt, as Dodger Stadium remains one of the crown jewels in professional sports and a landmark to West Coast expansion in Major League Baseball.

In 1957, O'Malley lobbied for a new stadium to be built for his Brooklyn club, but when a deal could not be reached, the Dodgers made the unprecedented move to California. In September of that year, the city of Los Angeles agreed to give 300 acres of land to the Dodgers in exchange for the deed to Wrigley Field in Los Angeles and their commitment to construct a 50,000-seat stadium. While Dodger Stadium was being built, the Dodgers played at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum through 1961, before the true Opening Day - April 10, 1962 - when the Dodgers finally played in their new home before 52,564 fans. Since that day, the beauty of Dodger Stadium has awed spectators with a breathtaking view of downtown Los Angeles to the south; green, tree-lined Elysian hills to the north and east; and the San Gabriel Mountains beyond.

The 56,000-seat Dodger Stadium, the second privately-financed ballpark in baseball history, was designed by O'Malley and architect Emil Praeger. It has parking for 16,000 automobiles on 21 terraced lots adjacent to the same elevations as the six different seating levels.

More than 3,400 trees cover the 300 acres of beautiful landscape, which is maintained by a full-time staff of gardeners. The Dodgers employ a full-time grounds crew and maintenance staff that keeps all aspects of the stadium in immaculate condition throughout the season, making Dodger Stadium one of the best-maintained facilities in the country.

In 1978, Dodger Stadium became the first ballpark to host more than 3 million fans in a season when the Dodgers drew 3,347,845 in attendance. Following another three million in attendance in 1980, the Dodgers set the all-time Major League season attendance record in 1982, drawing 3,608,881 fans. Twenty-four years later, the Dodgers broke the franchise mark for paid attendance in 2006, as their total topped the National League for the third consecutive season.

For more than three decades there were few changes made at Dodger Stadium. However, after the 1999 season, new field-level seats were added down the foul lines beyond the dugouts and an expanded dugout section, known as the Dugout Club, was added. Luxury suites were also built on the Club Level and have since been upgraded to provide some of the most unique amenities in baseball (flat screen TVs and computers with high-speed internet access).

After the 2002 season, a new video board - DodgerVision - replaced the previous one in left field while more improvements to Dodger Stadium occurred after the 2004 season. These included the new dugouts that were deeper

from front to back with modern-day amenities, including a waist-high wall of safety netting across the front of the dugout that has become standard in ballparks across the nation. Additionally, the dugouts were moved closer to the field by 20 feet, allowing for several more rows of Dugout Club seats and additional seating down the foul lines. The DodgerVision crew is also responsible for providing the music heard throughout Dodger Stadium. A team of 22 people is required to run the DodgerVision audio/video operation each game.

At the conclusion of the 2005 season, the Dodgers announced their plans to replace all the seats at Dodger Stadium, marking the fourth time in a seven-year span that the club would make stadium improvements. In addition to the seating bowl returning to its original color

end of the Field Level concourse and offer all-inclusive buffet dining, carryout options, a full-service bar and private restrooms.

The organization installed a new energy-efficient cooling system and replaced the entire stadium lighting system with Musco's Light Structure, which is designed to increase the quantity and quality of the lighting on the field while substantially reducing energy consumption.

The Dodgers also began the 2007 season with a new parking lot system in place that ended up substantially reducing the amount of waiting time going into the ballpark and exiting Dodger Stadium.

The ballpark's rich history began with Dodger President Walter O'Malley's foresight five decades ago and has continued with the

scheme from 1962 - yellow, light orange, turquoise and sky blue - a traditional "box seating" concept was introduced to the baseline area and the concrete throughout the venue was refreshed and repaired. The wooden chairs from the Club Level, the last original seats from 1962, were also refurbished during the offseason and returned to the same location along the third-base side of the ballpark.

Additionally, the Dodgers replaced the stadium's rubberized warning track with the traditional dirt surface previously used in Dodger Stadium through the 1999 season, while an LED scoreboard was installed from foul pole to foul pole along the base of the Loge Level. The \$20 million renovation project included the outdoor seating terrace that can accommodate 500 people outside the Loge Level entrance in left field.

While numerous enhancements have taken place at the stadium over the past decade, the playing surface at Dodger Stadium has remained the same since 1995. It features Prescription Athletic Turf (PAT), which was created and installed by the Cincinnati-based Motz Group, using the latest agronomic and engineering technology to manage field moisture through controlled drainage and irrigation. The 100,000 square feet of Bermuda grass is grown on pure sand, beneath which a vacuum chamber is laid over a water-tight plastic barrier that forcibly extracts water during heavy rains. New moisture gauges monitor the field's water level in coordination with a microprocessor that controls drainage functions. A computer controller has the ability to reverse the scenario and sub-irrigate when the sand's moisture reading drops below the optimal level.

Clearly, the work on the field paid off, as the Dodger Stadium field was named the best in baseball by Sports Illustrated in 2003 in a poll of Major League players. Of the responses, 23.2 percent of players rated Dodger Stadium as the best-quality playing field, more than twice as many as any other stadium. In February of 2009, the stadium grounds crew completely replaced the grass in the infield and outfield. In February of 2011 at the conclusion of the Monster Jam, the grass in the infield and outfield had to be replaced again in time for the second Dodgertown Classic on March 13. The process involved the nearly 550 truckloads of dirt being removed from the field. The underlying 100,000 square feet of sod had to be removed and sand, an inch deep across the field, had to be replaced. The same amount of sod as before was then brought back in and rolled onto the stadium ground. After a manicuring process, the field looks as pristine as ever.

Since opening its gates, Dodger Stadium has hosted eight World Series and the Dodgers have won four World Championships (1963, 1965, 1981 and 1988), eight NL pennants (1963, 1965, 1966, 1974, 1977, 1978, 1981, 1988), 11 NL Western Division crowns (1974, 1977, 1978, 1981, 1983, 1985, 1988, 1995, 2004, 2008, 2009) and two NL Wild Card berths (1996, 2006). The stadium has also hosted 3,777 regular-season games, with the Dodgers posting a 2,137-1,640 (.566) record during that time.

Dodger Stadium has also been the home of the world famous Farmer John Dodger Dog since the early 1970s, and Dodger fans continue to be treated to some of the best food around the globe.

The stadium hosted the Major League Baseball All-Star Game in 1980 and the Olympic Games' baseball competition in 1984. The eight-team competition during the 1984 Olympic Games marked baseball's greatest involvement in the Olympic Games to that point.

The Olympic spirit returned to Los Angeles again in 1991, as Dodger Stadium hosted the Opening Ceremonies for the United States Olympic Festival. Later that summer, the stadium showcased the top amateur baseball players from around the world in the second annual International Baseball Association World All-Star Game. In 2004, the Olympic Torch relay in Los Angeles concluded at Dodger Stadium as Rafer Johnson lit the cauldron at Chavez Ravine, several hours after Frank McCourt ran the second leg in Venice.

Dodger Stadium has been the site of numerous non-baseball major events, as Pope John Paul II celebrated Mass at Dodger Stadium on Sept. 16, 1987. Entertainers from around the world have performed here as well, such as KISS, The Rolling Stones, Madonna, The Beatles, The Bee Gees, Elton John, Simon and Garfunkel, Michael Jackson, David Bowie, Genesis, Eric Clapton, U2, the Dave Matthews Band and Bruce Springsteen and the E Street Band. Dodger Stadium also staged one of the world's greatest entertainment events in 1994, when internationally-renowned tenors Jose Carreras, Placido Domingo and Luciano Pavarotti reunited for a spectacular concert performance "Encore - The Three Tenors" with conductor Zubin Mehta. In its early years, Dodger Stadium even staged other sporting events such

as boxing, a basketball game featuring the world-renowned Harlem Globetrotters and a ski-jumping exhibition. From 1962-65, the American League's Los Angeles Angels called Dodger Stadium home.

In 2006, walking tours of the stadium were reinstated in a 90-minute format. Tours begin and end at the Top of the Park Gift Shop and include the Tommy Lasorda Training Room, Stadium Club, Luxury Suites, Dugout Club, Umpires Tunnel and the Dodgers' home dugout.

But the one constant has been Los Angeles Dodgers baseball, which continues to create a mystique like few other entertainment events. Under the ownership and direction of Frank McCourt, Dodger Stadium continues to be one of the most popular destinations in Southern California.

NANCY BEA HEFLEY

Southern California native Nancy Bea Hefley joined the Dodgers as the team's stadium organist in 1988. Like her predecessor, Helen Dell, Hefley played the piano and the accordion as a child. Hefley later played music in Las Vegas casinos and horse shows. Over the years, she has amassed a repertoire of more than 2,000 songs and she maintains a spreadsheet of every anthem performer she has accompanied at Dodger Stadium. During the 2008 Rose Parade on New Year's Day in Pasadena, Hefley played "Take Me Out to the Ballgame" and other familiar tunes on the Dodgers' 50th anniversary-themed float (pictured at left).

MUSICAL STARS AT DODGER STADIUM

- In 1966, The King of Rock n' Roll Elvis Presley filmed three days worth of road race sequences in the parking lot for "Spinout", his 22nd feature movie
- The Beatles played their second to last concert together at Dodger Stadium on August 28, 1966. That show was preceded with a concert in San Francisco. Shortly thereafter, the Beatles broke up
- Dodger Stadium has been home to a couple memorable reunions. In 1983, Simon and Garfunkel took the stage together once again and on June 23, 2007, The Police reunited after nearly 20 years apart
- Elton John played two soldout dates at Dodger Stadium, October 25 and 26, 1975. Decked out in a sequined Dodger uniform, John was the first musician to perform in the ballpark after the Beatles in 1966
- On July 16, 1994, Dodger Stadium was the site of "Encore - the Three Tenors", a concert reuniting tenors Plácido Domingo, José Carreras, and Luciano Pavarotti. High profile attendees included George and Barbara Bush, Al Gore, Arnold Schwarzenegger, Tom Cruise, Gene Kelly, and Frank Sinatra who stood and applauded after Carreras' rendition of "My Way"
- Several other entertainers have performed at Dodger Stadium including: The Rolling Stones, Bruce Springsteen and the E Street Band, Michael Jackson, David Bowie, Eric Clapton, Madonna and U2



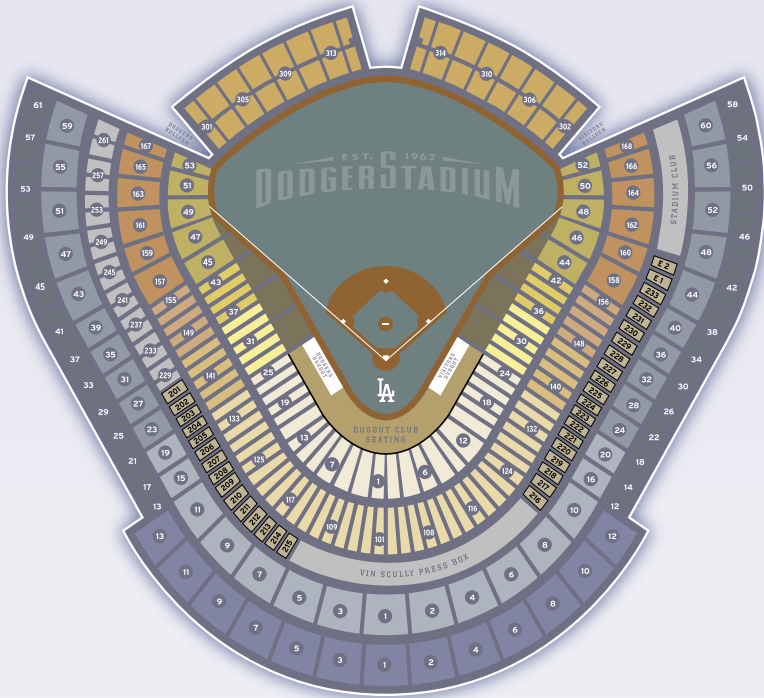

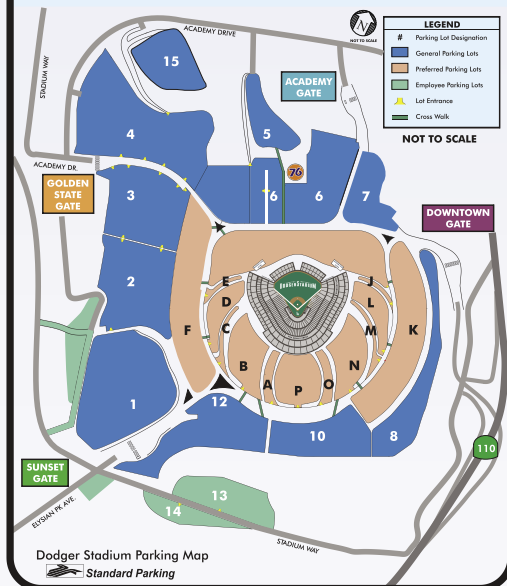
DUGOUTS - The television wells, photography wells and dugouts are considered bench. Any ball that strikes any forward facing dugout is considered IN PLAY.

DODGER STADIUM RAINOUTS

The 17th rainout in Dodger Stadium history occurred on April 17, 2000, marking the last rainout and the only Dodger home game to be rained out during the last 11 seasons. In 1999 the Dodgers also had one home game washed out (April 11, 1999), ending the club's then record 856 consecutive-game streak without a rainout. Prior to that, the Dodgers' last home rainout was three consecutive games against the San Diego Padres April 19-21, 1988. Prior to 1976, the Dodgers were rained out only once – against the St. Louis Cardinals on April 21, 1967. The 1967 rainout ended a streak of 737 consecutive games at Dodger Stadium without a postponement. The second home rainout, on April 12, 1976, stopped a string of 724 straight games. Currently, Dodger Stadium has gone 888 games without a rainout, which is the all-time club record. The mark was established last year on July 22.

TOP 60 NATIONAL LEAGUE ATTENDANCE MARKS

The 2010 season marked the 38th consecutive season the Dodgers drew more than two million fans at Dodger Stadium (1973-2010) and the 44th time overall – the most by any Major League team.

The Dodgers established a then-Major League record when they drew 3,608,881 fans in 1982. The NL implemented a new attendance counting system in 1993, and the Rockies recorded the largest single-season total in Major League history with 4,483,350 fans in their first Major League season. Through the 1992 season, attendance figures in the NL were counted by the number of fans in attendance and the AL counted total tickets sold. Both leagues currently count total tickets sold.

The Dodgers hold the Major League record for drawing more than three million fans on 25 occasions. They became the first team to play before five million fans in a season – combining home and road totals – in 1978 when the total reached 5,494,204 and have since played in front of more than five million 23 more times. In 2004, they topped the six-million mark for the first time and have accomplished that feat in each of the past seven seasons.

The Dodgers have averaged more than 2.8 million fans a season since coming to Los Angeles in 1958. The Dodgers hit the million mark in 22 dates in 1981, the two million mark in 46 dates in 1982 and the three million mark in 67 dates in 1982 – all three established then-Major League records. 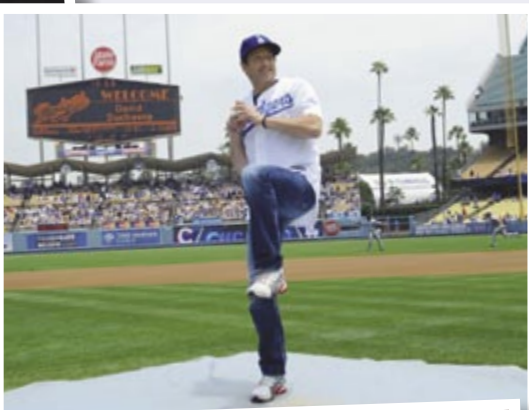

SENIOR ADVISORS - PLAYER DEVELOPMENT



P.J. CAREY

P.J. Carey enters his third season as a Senior Advisor, Player Development and his fifth year with the Dodger organization. Carey was the Dodgers' Minor League Field Coordinator from 2007-08, where he was responsible for coordinating the instruction of players throughout the Dodgers' farm system.

Prior to joining the Dodgers, Carey was a minor league manager for 23 seasons (1980-2006). He joined the Colorado Rockies at their inception in 1993, and managed six different teams in the Rockies' organization. He was named Manager of the Year in the Arizona Rookie League in 1998 and 2000, guiding the team to an Arizona Rookie League-record 42 wins and the league championship in 1998. In 1996, he won the South Atlantic League Manager of the Year Award for leading Single-A Asheville to an 88-52 record and a first-half championship.

A former catcher, Carey started his playing career in the Phillies' organization with Rookie-level Pulaski in 1972 and caught in the minor leagues for four seasons before beginning his coaching

career. A 1970 graduate of Scranton (PA) Prep High, he was a roommate of basketball coach, P.J. Carlesimo. P.J. and his wife, Katherine, reside in Tucson.



GENE CLINES

Gene Clines, who enjoyed a 10-year big league playing career from 1970-1979, enters his fifth season with Los Angeles and his first season as a Senior Advisor, Player Development. Clines spent the previous three seasons as the hitting coordinator for the Dodgers' minor league system after joining the organization in 2007 as the outfield/baserunning coordinator.

Clines' coaching career is highlighted by 20 years of Major League coaching service with five different franchises (Cubs, Astros, Mariners, Brewers and Giants). Prior to coming to the Dodgers, he spent four seasons in the Cubs' organization from 2003-06, serving two years as first base coach (2003-04) and two as hitting coach (2005-06). He spent six years as San Francisco's hitting and outfield coach from 1997-2002 and also served as the hitting coach with Milwaukee (1994-95), Seattle (1989-92) and Houston (1988). Following his final year as a big league player in 1979, Clines remained with the Cubs as first base coach under manager Bob Kennedy, and remained with the team until 1981.

Clines' playing career was highlighted by three trips to the postseason with the Pirates (1971, 1972, and 1974), including a World Series title in 1971. He had his best season in the Majors with the Pirates in 1972, batting .334 in 107 games.

He attended Contra Costa Junior College in San Pablo, CA.



CHARLIE HOUGH

Charlie Hough begins his first year as a Senior Advisor, Player Development after four seasons as the pitching coach for Single-A Inland Empire in his second stint as a coach in the Dodger organization. His coaching career began in 1996 as the Dodgers' High-A affiliate pitching coach, a position he held until 1997. He was promoted to the big leagues as the Dodgers' pitching coach and served for two seasons (1998-99). Hough was also the Mets' pitching coach in 2001 and 2002.

The 25-year Major League veteran and former All-Star knuckleballer was drafted by the Dodgers in the eighth round of the 1966 amateur draft and pitched for the Dodgers for 11 seasons (1970-80). The right-hander also pitched for the Rangers (1980-90), White Sox (1991-92) and Marlins (1993-94), compiling a 216-216 career record with 61 saves and a 3.75 ERA.



RAMON MARTINEZ

Ramon Martinez returns for a second season with the Dodger front office after playing with the club for 11 seasons from 1988-98. Last year, he served as a roving guest instructor for the Dominican Summer League Dodgers.

Martinez posted a 135-88 record with a 3.67 ERA over his 14 Major League seasons with the Dodgers, Red Sox (1999-2000) and Pirates (2001). He was selected to the 1990 National League All-Star Team and twice finished in the top five in NL Cy Young voting (1990 (2nd), 1995 (5th)). He made five Opening Day starts for the Dodgers, ranks seventh on the club's all-time wins list with 123 and is sixth on the club's all-time strikeout list with 1,312.



FIELD COORDINATOR - BRUCE HINES

Bruce Hines returns for a second season as the Dodgers' Minor League Field Coordinator after spending the the 2009 season as the Mariners' third base coach.

Hines, 53, has 26 years of coaching and managing experience. Prior to the Mariners, he served in a variety of minor league coaching positions with the Angels including Field Coordinator (2006-08), Infield Instructor (2002-05), Roving Outfield Instructor (2001), Roving Defense Instructor (1988-90, 1998-2000) and Roving Hitting Instructor (1987). He was also the Angels' First Base Coach in 1991.

Hines has a 278-233 (.544) record in seven seasons as a minor league manager in the Angels' and Athletics' organizations, reaching the postseason with Triple-A Vancouver in 1997 with a first place first-half finish in the Pacific Coast League. He also managed the Rookie-level Arizona Summer League Angels (1995-96) and led the Rookie-level AZL Athletics to back-to-back first

place finishes in 1992 and 1993. Hines started his managing career with two seasons at the helm of Single-A Salem in 1985 and 1986.

Selected by the Padres in the 18th round of the 1980 First-Year Player Draft, Hines batted .236 in three minor league seasons in the San Diego and Oakland organizations. His father, Ben Hines, was a Dodger coach from 1985-86 and 1988-93. He graduated from the University of LaVerne in 1980 and resides in Mesa, Arizona with his wife, Wendy.



PITCHING COORDINATOR - RAFAEL CHAVES

Rafael Chaves returns for a third season as the Dodgers' Minor League Pitching Coordinator after serving as a pitching coach in the New York Yankees system in 2008 and in the Seattle Mariners organization for 11 seasons from 1998-2007.

In 2008, Chaves was the pitching coach with the Yankees' Triple-A Scranton/Wilkes-Barre club, which won the International League championship and led the circuit with a 3.67 team ERA.

In the Seattle chain, the Puerto Rico native served as the Major League Pitching Coach for two seasons from 2006-07. He also served in the same capacity with Triple-A Tacoma (2004-05), Double-A San Antonio (2002-03), Single-A San Bernardino (2001), Single-A Wisconsin (2000), Rookie-level Everett (1999) and the AZL Mariners (1998).



HITTING COORDINATOR - ERIC OWENS

Eric Owens enters his first season with the Dodger organization as hitting coordinator after five seasons coaching in the Angels' minor league system. He served as the Angels' Roving Outfield, Baserunning and Bunting Coordinator for the last two seasons and was the hitting coach with Double-A Arkansas in 2008, when the Travelers won the Texas League championship. Owens began his coaching career with two seasons as the hitting coach with Single-A Cedar Rapids from 2006-07. Under his tutelage, the Kernals led the Midwest League in home runs and stolen bases in 2007.

Owens' Major League playing career spanned nine seasons with the Reds (1995-97), Brewers (1998), Padres (1999-2000), Marlins (2001-02) and Angels (2003). He posted a .264 batting average with 26 home runs, 214 RBI and 126 steals in 806 career games. Owens, 40, was originally selected by the Reds in the fourth round of the 1992 First-Year Player Draft out of Ferrum (VA) College, where he played football and baseball. At Ferrum, he earned first team All-American

honors in 1991 and 1992, batting over .400 in each of his three seasons and setting school career records for batting average (.430), stolen bases (68) and triples (18). Along with teammate and future Major League closer Billy Wagner, he led the school to the NCAA Regionals three times.

Born in Danville, VA, he is married (Bridget) with four children (Alyssa, Makayla, Montana and McKenzie) and resides in Phoenix.



OUTFIELD/BASERUNNING COORDINATOR - RODNEY MCCRAY

Rodney McCray enters his fourth year in the Dodger organization as the Outfield/Baserunning Coordinator. Prior to joining the Dodgers, McCray spent six seasons with the Reds' organization from 2000-05. In his first season with the Reds, he served as the Outfield Coordinator followed by four seasons as the Outfield/Baserunning Coordinator. In 2005, he was the Hitting Coach for Triple-A Louisville.

McCray began his professional coaching career in 1994 as an Outfield/Hitting coach for Lethbridge of the Independent Pioneer League. McCray then went on to scout for San Diego in 1996 before returning to the coaching ranks in 1997 at Single-A West Palm Beach in the Montreal system. McCray also coached at Single-A Lansing in the Kansas City system in 1998. Originally selected by San Diego in 1984, the former outfielder played 10 professional seasons, including Major League stints with Chicago (AL) from 1990-91 and New York (NL) in 1992. He is best

known for running straight through the outfield fence while chasing a fly ball during a Pacific Coast League game on May 27, 1991 while playing for the Vancouver Canadians.

PLAYER DEVELOPMENT AND INTERNATIONAL OPERATIONS



INFIELD COORDINATOR - MATT MARTIN

Matt Martin is in his fifth season with the Dodgers as Minor League Infield Coordinator. Before joining the Dodgers, Martin was with the Yankees for two years, serving as manager of their Gulf Coast League affiliate in 2006 after one season as the club's hitting coach in 2005. Prior to his time with the Yankees, he was the Infield Coordinator for the Baltimore Orioles.

Martin, 42, was selected by the Cincinnati Reds in the 36th round of the 1991 First-Year Player Draft and he played four seasons in their minor league system.

His post-playing career began with the Detroit Tigers as a Roving Instructor for the first half of the 1997 season and as the manager for the Tigers' New York-Penn League affiliate for the second half. For the next seven seasons, he was the Tigers' Double-A hitting coach.

Martin and his wife, Julie, reside in Lubbock, Texas with their daughter, Jade (10/28/09).



CATCHING COORDINATOR - TRAVIS BARBARY

A former Dodger big league bullpen catcher and minor league player, coach and manager, Travis Barbary enters his fifth season as the Minor League Catching Coordinator and 17th year in the Dodger organization overall.

In 2006, Barbary managed the Single-A Columbus Catfish following two seasons at the helm of the Rookie-advanced Ogden Raptors. In his inaugural campaign as a minor league manager in 2003, Barbary guided Ogden to a berth in the Pioneer League playoffs.

After starting his post-playing career by serving as Catching and Pitching Coach for the Cotuit Kettleers of the Cape Cod League in 1995, Barbary was a coach for the Dodgers' Single-A Savannah affiliate in 1996 and 1997.

The following season he joined the Major League club as bullpen catcher, a position he held through the 2001 campaign. In 2002, Barbary was named hitting coach for Single-A South Georgia with his

Waves team tying for second in the South Atlantic League with a .269 team batting average.

Barbary, a native of Anderson, SC, caught two seasons (1992-93) at the University of Virginia. Prior to that, he played at Spartanburg (SC) Methodist Junior College, where he was an all-conference catcher.

His father Eddie Barbary played for two seasons from 1967-68 in the Pittsburgh organization and his grandfather Red Barbary played in one Major League game, appearing as a pinch-hitter for the Washington Senators in 1943.



EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, ASIAN OPERATIONS - ACEY KOHROGI

The 2011 season marks Eizaburo "Acey" Kohrogi's 23rd year in professional baseball and his 17th with the Dodgers. This past offseason, he became the Dodgers' Executive Director of Asian Operations after originally taking on the title of Director of Asian Operations in March 1998, when the Dodgers became the first Major League Baseball team to open an office in Asia. He had previously been the Assistant to the President.

During his tenure with the Dodgers, the Asian players who have signed with the club include Hideo Nomo, Hong-Chih Kuo, Kazuhisa Ishii, Chin-lung Hu, Hee-Seop Choi, Takashi Saito and Hiroki Kuroda, among others.

Before joining the Dodgers, Kohrogi worked for Japan Sports System Company from 1989 to 1995, where he was the Acting Owner of two minor league teams, the Vancouver Canadians and the Visalia Oaks.

He and his wife, the former Susan Ikuhara, the daughter of Akihiro "Ike" Ikuhara, who served as the Assistant to Dodger President Peter O'Malley for 27 years, reside in Hermosa Beach, CA with their daughters Sophie and Sara and son Kai.



DIRECTOR, INTERNATIONAL OPERATIONS AND MINOR LEAGUE RELATIONS - JOSEPH REAVES

Joseph A. Reaves has been active in baseball and international affairs for more than a quarter century. In his current role, he heads all international business operations for the Dodgers and the club's relationships with its minor league partners. He was instrumental in the planning and execution of the Dodgers' 2010 Taiwan series against the Chinese Professional Baseball League All-Stars and the club's historic trip to China during 2008 Spring Training. He also served as the Dodgers' point person for the 2009 World Baseball Classic and helped the club establish a presence in Venezuela in 2010 with an agreement with La Guaira Tiburones. As the main liaison between the Dodgers and the organization's five minor league affiliates, Reaves created the "Route of Champions" program, which fosters partnership, communication and a two-way path to excellence.

Before joining the Dodgers in 2007, Reaves was a foreign correspondent for United Press International and the *Chicago Tribune*, based in Beijing, Hong Kong, Manila, London, Vienna, Warsaw and Rome. From 1992-95 he was a beat writer covering the Chicago Cubs for the Tribune before returning to Hong Kong to work on his Master's degree. His thesis on the history of baseball in Asia was published in hardback and paperback under the title: "Taking in a Game." It won national research awards from the Society for American Baseball Research, *The Sporting News* and the University of Nebraska.

Reaves received his undergraduate degree in journalism from Louisiana State University and has a PhD in Educational Leadership and Policy Studies from Arizona State University.

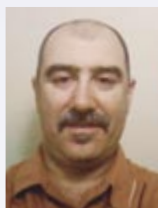

LASORDA'S 1970 INDIANS AMONG ALL-TIME BEST FARM TEAMS

In 1970, Tommy Lasorda managed one of the most successful teams in minor league history. His Triple-A Spokane Indians posted a 94-52 regular-season record to cruise to the Northern Division title by 26 games and then his club swept Southern Division-winner Hawaii, four games to none, in the championship series to capture the Pacific Coast League crown. There were 17 members of that Spokane squad who went on to play in the Major Leagues, including shortstop Bobby Valentine, who won the league batting title (.340). Among others on the team were Bill Buckner (.335), Steve Garvey (.319, 15 homers, 87 RBI), Charlie Hough (12-9, 18 saves, 1.95 ERA), Tommy Hutton (.323), Davey Lopes (90 hits, 11 steals), Tom Paciorek (.326, 17 homers, 101 RBI), Bill Russell (.363 in 55 games), Jerry Stephenson (18-5, 2.82 ERA) and Geoff Zahn. Lasorda, who had guided Ogden to three straight Pioneer League titles (1966-68), was honored as The Sporting News 1970 Minor League Manager of the Year. Lasorda later piloted Albuquerque to a PCL crown in 1972.

MANAGER - LORENZO BUNDY

Lorenzo Bundy begins his second stint as the manager of the Dodgers' Triple-A affiliate after compiling a 141-146 record as the manager of Triple-A Las Vegas from 2007-08. Bundy served as the manager of the Rookie-level Arizona League Dodgers last season and guided the club to a 30-25 record.

Bundy has accumulated a 498-543 record in eight seasons as a minor league manager in the Montreal (1990-94), Florida (1997) and Los Angeles organizations. He guided Bradenton to the Gulf Coast League Southern Division title in 1990 and has also managed in the Mexican Winter League, where he was twice named Manager of the Year.

He began his coaching career as a player/coach with Jacksonville in 1989 and served on a big league staff on a trio of occasions, working as the Marlins' outfield and baserunning coach in 1998, the Rockies' bullpen coach in 1999 and the Diamondbacks bench coach. He was also employed as a coach in the Marlins (1995-96), Rockies (2000-02) and Red Sox (2002) minor league systems.

In eight seasons as a professional player, Bundy hit .318 with 135 home runs and 534 RBI in the Minor Leagues and the Mexican League.

HITTING COACH - JOHN VALENTIN

John Valentin enters his fourth season with the Dodger organization and makes the jump to Triple-A hitting coach after holding the same position with Double-A Chattanooga last season. The 44-year-old served as a manager in the Dodger system in 2008 and 2009, leading Chattanooga to a 65-74 record in 2009 and guiding Single-A Inland Empire to a 68-73 record in 2008, including a 38-34 mark in the second half to earn a Wild Card berth in the California League playoffs. He began his coaching career in 2006 as the hitting coach of the Mets' Double-A Binghamton team.

Valentin played the majority of his career with the Boston Red Sox as a shortstop from 1992-2001. A veteran of 11 Major League seasons, Valentin is the only player in Major League history to complete an unassisted triple play (July 8, 1994 vs. Seattle Mariners) and hit for the cycle (June 6, 1996 vs. Chicago White Sox). He won the American League Silver Slugger award at shortstop in 1995 and belted three homers in the 1999 AL Division Series to lead Boston over the Cleveland Indians. He yielded the reigns of shortstop to former Los Angeles Dodger Nomar Garciaparra in 1997, converting to a second baseman and eventually shifting to third base after a season-ending injury to starter Tim Lincecum. Valentin spent three more seasons with the Red Sox before ending his career with the Mets. He is the owner of Julia's Restaurant in Atlantic Highlands, New Jersey.



PITCHING COACH - GLENN DISHMAN

Glenn Dishman enters his first season as pitching coach of the Isotopes and seventh season overall with the Dodger organization. Dishman has served as a pitching coach at all levels of the organization, including stints with the Rookie-level AZL Dodgers (2010), Double-A Chattanooga (2009), Double-A Jacksonville (2008), Single-A Great Lakes (2007), Single-A Vero Beach (2006) and Single-A Columbus (2005). The former big league hurler also served as the pitching coach for the North Shore Honu of the Hawaiian Winter League following the 2006 season.

In 2004, Dishman was an assistant coach at Ohlone College in Fremont, CA after wrapping up an 11-year professional playing career. The right-hander was signed out of Texas Christian University by San Diego in 1993 and made his big league debut with the Padres in 1995. He pitched the following season with the Padres and Philadelphia Phillies and with the Detroit Tigers in 1997, appearing in 33 big league games overall. While playing in the minors, Dishman earned Northwest League All-Star honors with Spokane in 1993 and Texas League All-Star accolades in 1994.

MANAGER - CARLOS SUBERO

Carlos Subero enters his second season as manager of Double-A Chattanooga and third year with the Dodger organization after managing Single-A Inland Empire in 2009. The 38-year-old native of Venezuela managed the White Sox's Double-A Birmingham club in 2008 to a 74-63 record and a berth in the Southern League playoffs. He spent the previous nine seasons in the Texas Rangers' minor league system, including seven as a manager with the Gulf Coast League Rangers (2001-02), Single-A Clinton (2003-05) and Single-A Bakersfield (2006-07). He has a combined 514-575 record (.472) as a minor league manager.

Subero guided his Clinton club to the Midwest League playoffs in 2003 and 2004. In 2003, he led the club to a 74-64 regular season, and lost to Kane County in the semifinals after an opening-round win over Cedar Rapids. In 2004, his Clinton squad finished 69-66 and lost to Beloit in the semifinals after an opening-round triumph against

Kane County.

Subero played six seasons of Minor League Baseball from 1990-95 with the Kansas City, Pittsburgh and Texas organizations. He is a 1988 graduate of Gran Columbia High School in his native Caracas.

HITTING COACH - FRANKLIN STUBBS

Franklin Stubbs makes the jump to Double-A and returns for a third season with the Dodger organization after serving as the hitting coach at Single-A Inland Empire in his first two seasons with the club.

The former Dodger first baseman, who was originally a first-round draft pick of the team in 1982, spent the first 12 years of his coaching career in the Atlanta Braves' chain. Stubbs served as the hitting coach at the Braves' Double-A Mississippi from 2007-08 and in the same position for Single-A Myrtle Beach for two seasons from 2005-06. He was a roving instructor in the Braves' system from 2003-04 and spent four seasons from 1999-2002 as the Braves' minor league hitting instructor.

Stubbs started his coaching career in 1997 as a coach for Rookie-level Danville and became manager the following season, leading the club to a 30-38 record.

The 50-year-old helped the Dodgers to their World Series title in 1988, playing 115 games that season and chipping in with two RBI in the Fall Classic against Oakland. The North Carolina native hit 104 home runs and played in 945 games over 10 Major League seasons with the Dodgers (1984-89), Astros (1990), Brewers (1991-92) and Tigers (1995).



PITCHING COACH - CHUCK CRIM

Chuck Crim enters his first season as the Lookouts' pitching coach after leading the Single-A Great Lakes pitching staff to a Midwest League-best 3.44 team ERA last season. He made his coaching debut in 2009 as the pitching coach with Rookie-advanced Ogden after spending the 2007 and 2008 seasons as a Dodger amateur scout in the central and southern California regions. Prior to scouting, he served as the head pitching director at SHO-ME Baseball Camp in Branson, Missouri from 1995-2002. He then served as the head baseball coach at Canyon High School in Santa Clarita from 2003-05.

Crim enjoyed an eight-year Major League playing career with the Brewers (1987-91), Angels (1992-93) and the Cubs (1994). He went 47-43 with 45 saves and a 3.83 ERA in 449 games. He led the American League with 70 appearances in 1988 and 76 games in 1989. As a rookie with the Brewers in 1987, he earned two of the club's Major League-record 13 wins to start the season. Crim was the primary set-up man to Milwaukee closer Dan Plesac to jump-start his career.

MANAGER - JUAN BUSTABAD

Juan Bustabad will take the managerial reins of Single-A Rancho Cucamonga in the franchise's first season as a Dodger affiliate. Bustabad enters his 12th season with the Dodger organization and is coming off a banner season with Great Lakes, where he won Single-A Midwest League "Manager of the Year" honors by leading the Loons to a minor league-best 90-49 record last year. Great Lakes reached the postseason in two of Bustabad's three years as manager before falling in the league semifinals in both 2009 and 2010. Last season, he was selected by *Baseball America* as the Midwest League's "Best Managing Prospect" in its annual tools issue, while picking up his 700th-career victory (708-554) and seventh division championship in his 14th season as a minor league manager.

Bustabad has compiled an impressive 491-383 record over nine seasons as a manager in the Dodgers' minor league system. Bustabad has guided seven of those teams to the playoffs with four reaching the league finals (Rookie-advanced Great Falls Dodgers in 2000 and Rookie-level GCL Dodgers in 2001, 2006 and 2007).

Bustabad, 49, began his post-playing career as a coach with Single-A Yakima in the Dodger organization in 1990 and managed the Indios de Charallave of the Venezuelan Summer League in 1991. Bustabad was a roving infield coach in the Dodger system in 1992 and was a coach for co-op Rookie-level Lethbridge in 1993. The Havana, Cuba native spent his first three seasons as a minor league manager with the GCL Marlins (1994-96), leading the 1994 and 1995 teams to back-to-back East Division titles. He then managed Single-A Utica and Single-A Kane County in 1997 and 1998, respectively, before becoming the hitting coach for Single-A Brevard County in the Marlins chain in 1999.

An infielder, Bustabad played nine seasons professionally, including his final three in the Dodger system with Double-A San Antonio (1987-88) and at Triple-A Albuquerque in 1989. After being selected in the first round by Boston in the January 1980 amateur draft, Bustabad played six seasons in the Red Sox' organization.

HITTING COACH - MICHAEL BOUGHTON

Michael Boughton enters his first season as the Rancho Cucamonga hitting coach after holding the same position with Single-A Great Lakes for the past two seasons. Boughton joined the Dodger organization as the hitting coach of Rookie-advanced Ogden in 2008 and has helped his teams qualify for the playoffs in each of his three seasons.

Boughton, 36, spent the previous eight years instructing baseball in the Dallas area. He owned the Rookie Baseball Academy in Dallas from 2003-06 and was the head instructor of the Dallas Baseball Academy from 2000-03. Boughton also served as an assistant coach at Northwood University from 2000-01. He was a 12th-round draft pick of the Arizona Diamondbacks in 1996 and played in their system until 1998. He also played in the Ranger organization from 1998-99.

Boughton and his wife, Aina, have three children, Noah, Hannah and Matthew and reside in Dallas, TX.

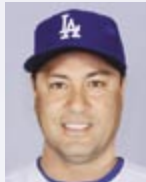


PITCHING COACH - HECTOR BERRIOS

Hector Berrios joins the Dodger organization after 13 years of coaching in the Blue Jays' (1998-2002) and Mets' (2003-10) minor league systems. Berrios served as pitching coach at various levels of the Mets' system, including stints with the Rookie-level GCL Mets (2005, 2010), Double-A Binghamton (2009) and Single-A Brooklyn (2003-04, 2006-08). His Brooklyn teams in 2003 and 2004 ranked among the New York-Penn League leaders, ranking third (2.97 ERA) and second (3.12), respectively.

MANAGER - JOHN SHOEMAKER

John Shoemaker enters his first season as the manager of the Loons after spending the previous two years as Camelback Ranch - Glendale Coordinator of Instruction, overseeing the year-round minor league operation of the facility.

Shoemaker has been a player, coach, manager or coordinator in the Dodger organization since 1977, compiling a 313-247 managerial record in that time and winning a Southern League championship with Double-A Jacksonville in 2005. Prior to his most-recent Jacksonville stint from 2005-08, he managed Triple-A Las Vegas in 2003 and Jacksonville in 2001, when his Suns posted an 83-56 overall mark and won both first and second-half East Division crowns en route to being declared Southern League co-champions. In 1996, he piloted Single-A Savannah to the South Atlantic League title.

Following his playing days, Shoemaker was the hitting coach at Single-A Vero Beach for six seasons (1981-86) before starting his managerial career with Vero Beach (1987-88). His 1988 Vero Beach club went 75-62, winning a first-half championship. He returned to manage Vero Beach for three seasons (1997-98, 2000), and his 1997 team reached the Florida State League finals. After his first stint at Vero Beach, Shoemaker moved up to manage Double-A San Antonio for three seasons (1989-91), leading the 1990 club to a 78-56 record, a second-half division title and a Texas League finals appearance.

Shoemaker has also managed Rookie-level St. Lucie (1992) and Great Falls (1995) and Single-A Yakima (1993). He returned to Vero Beach in 1994 as hitting coach, a position he also held for San Antonio in 1999. In 2002, he was the organization's defensive instructor.

Shoemaker played four seasons of minor league ball with the Dodgers from 1977-1980 after being selected by the club in the 35th round of the 1977 draft. The Chillicothe, OH native played baseball and was captain of the basketball team at Miami (OH) University. His basketball talents earned him a sixth-round selection by the Chicago Bulls in the 1978 NBA draft.

HITTING COACH - LENNY HARRIS

Lenny Harris begins his first season as Great Lakes hitting coach and his third season with the Dodger organization after two years as the Camelback Ranch Senior Hitting Coach. He was the Nationals' hitting coach in 2008 and also served as Washington's Minor League Infield Coordinator from August 2006-May 2007, his first job in the coaching ranks.

The 46-year-old enjoyed an 18-year big league career from 1988-2005, and is baseball's all-time leader with 212 pinch hits. He also ranks fourth in baseball history with 90 pinch RBI. Harris donned a Dodger uniform from 1989-93, and batted .279 with 116 walks and only 115 strikeouts in 578 games in that time.



PITCHING COACH - KREMLIN MARTINEZ

Kremlin Martinez makes the jump to Single-A Great Lakes as he enters his eighth year with the Dodgers' organization. He served in the same position with Rookie-advanced Ogden in 2010 after four seasons as the pitching coach of the Rookie-level Dominican Summer League Dodgers from 2006-09. From 2004-05, he served as a part-time scout and assistant pitching coach in the Dominican Republic.

Martinez was signed by the Indians out of the Dominican Republic in 1999 and played two seasons in their organization, going 7-7 with a 5.70 ERA in 32 games (15 starts). He underwent knee surgery in 2000 and retired after attempting a comeback with the Twins in 2001.

MANAGER - DAMON BERRYHILL

Damon Berryhill returns for a third season as manager of Rookie-advanced Ogden after leading the club to its second-straight playoff berth and a franchise-record 44 wins in 2010. Prior to his two seasons in Ogden, Berryhill managed the Texas Rangers' Single-A Bakersfield club in 2008.

The 45-year-old spent four seasons in the Texas system overall, the first three as the minor league catching coordinator. Before joining the Rangers, he served as the catching coordinator in the Diamondbacks' system from 2003-04. Berryhill began his coaching career with the Angels in 2002, serving as a coach with Single-A Rancho Cucamonga.

The Laguna Beach native enjoyed a 10-year Major League career with the Cubs (1987-91), Braves (1991-93), Red Sox (1994), Reds (1995) and Giants (1997). The former catcher appeared in three postseasons in 1992-93 with Atlanta and 1997 with San Francisco. HITTING COACH - JOHNNY WASHINGTON

Johnny Washington begins his third season as the hitting coach of Rookie-advanced Ogden after retiring as a player two games into the 2009 season with Single-A Inland Empire. Under Washington's tutelage in 2010, the Raptors led the Pioneer League in team batting average (.298), on-base percentage (.365) and slugging percentage (.468). In 2009, Washington's first season as a coach, Ogden ranked second in the league with a .289 team batting average and led the circuit with a .469 slugging percentage.

Washington enjoyed a seven-year professional career as an infielder in the Rangers' (2003-2006) and Dodgers' (2008-09) organizations and two years in independent leagues. The 26-year-old was selected by Texas in the 27th round of the 2003 draft after playing at Mount San Jacinto (CA) Junior College from 2002-03.



PITCHING COACH - BILL SIMAS

Bill Simas begins his coaching career after pitching 13 seasons professionally, including an 18-19 record with 23 saves and a 3.83 ERA in 308 games over six Major League seasons with the White Sox from 1995-2000. He spent the 2003 season with the Dodger organization, going 4-0 with a 2.06 ERA in 27 games (four starts) with Triple-A Las Vegas and the Rookie-level GCL Dodgers. In 2000, Simas was inducted into the Single-A Lake Elsinore Hall of Fame after posting a 5-2 record with 13 saves and a 2.11 ERA in 37 games with club in 1994.

Simas, 39, attended Fresno City College after graduating from St. Joseph High School in Santa Maria, CA. He resides in Fresno with his wife, Kimberly, and children, Kegan and Kohl.

MANAGER - JODY REED

Jody Reed returns to the Dodger organization as manager of the Arizona League Dodgers and Camelback Ranch - Glendale coordinator of instruction after spending the last four seasons with the Yankee organization. Reed was the Yankees' minor league defensive coordinator for the past two seasons and managed the Rookie-level Gulf Coast League Yankees from 2007-08, guiding the club to the GCL title in 2007 and earning league "Manager of the Year" honors that season in his coaching debut.

Reed, 48, enjoyed an 11-year Major League career with the Red Sox (1987-92), Dodgers (1993), Brewers (1994), Padres (1995-6) and Tigers (1997). In 1990 with Boston, he led the American League with 45 doubles and ranked 10th in the AL with 173 hits. He played his college ball at Florida State University and founded the "Jody Reed Baseball School," which helps kids develop the physical and mental skills needed to prepare for a future in baseball.

HITTING COACH - LEO GARCIA

Leo Garcia returns for a third season as the hitting coach for the Arizona League Dodgers. Garcia spent the previous eight years as a coach and coordinator in the San Francisco minor league system, serving as that organization's Latin America Coordinator in 2007 after six seasons as the hitting coach for the Giants' rookie-level Arizona League club in Scottsdale from 2001-06. The 48-year-old also managed the Giants' Dominican Summer League team in 2000.



PITCHING COACH - MATT HERGES

Matt Herges begins his coaching career with the same organization that signed him as an amateur free agent out of Illinois State University in 1992. The right-hander made his big league debut with the Dodgers in 1999 and compiled a 20-13 record with a 3.38 ERA in 151 games (four starts) during his three seasons with the club. Herges retired after the 2009 season having pitched for eight teams during his 11 seasons in the Majors, posting a 43-35 record with a 3.91 ERA in 567 games (four starts). He reached the World Series as a member of the Rockies in 2007 and did not allow a run over 10 career postseason appearances (11.0 IP).



DAVIS A MINOR LEAGUE BATTING CHAMP AS WELL

Former Dodger star Tommy Davis, who won back-to-back batting titles in the Major Leagues in 1962-63, prepared for the big leagues by also capturing a pair of batting crowns while in the Dodger minor league system. In 1957, playing for Kokomo (IN) of the Class D Midwest League, Davis topped the circuit with a .357 average, also leading the league in hits (185), runs (115) and stolen bases (68). Then in 1959, Davis won the Pacific Coast League batting championship with a .345 mark and a league-leading 211 hits for Triple-A Spokane. He won NL batting titles for the Dodgers in 1962 and 1963 with averages of .346 and .326, respectively.

MANAGER - PEDRO MEGA

Pedro Mega returns for his fifth season as manager of the Santo Domingo Dodgers after guiding the club to a 40-31 record and a third place finish last season. He served as the infield coordinator at Campo Las Palmas, the Dodgers' academy in the Dominican Republic, in 2005 and 2006. The 2011 season will be Mega's 11th full year and 12th overall campaign as a Dodger manager in the Dominican Summer League after previously spending time as a player and coach in the organization.

During his tenure as a skipper, Mega has compiled a 418-331 mark for a .558 winning percentage. His managerial career is highlighted by the 2000 season, when he guided Santo Domingo to a 49-21 regular season record and the Dominican Summer League championship. The following season, he piloted Santo Domingo to a 44-28 mark and a second-place finish. Mega also led the Dodgers to second place finishes in

the DSL North Division in 2004 and 2007.

Mega became a manager for the first time early in the 1998 season for Santo Domingo, replacing Antonio Bautista, who left to become a bench coach for the Sinon Bulls of the Chinese Professional Baseball League in Taiwan as part of a friendship agreement between the Bulls and the Dodgers that began in 1996. His first full season as manager was in 1999.

An infielder, Mega joined the Dodger organization as a player in 1992 and was active in the Dominican Summer League through 1995. He was a player/coach for La Romana in 1994 and 1995 and was a full-time coach there in 1996 and 1997.

CAMELBACK RANCH - GLENDALE

In addition to being home to Dodgers' Spring Training, Camelback Ranch - Glendale is also the year-round campus for the club's Player Development operation. The complex hosts the club's Rookie-level Arizona League affiliate and its Fall Instructional League team.



CAMELBACK RANCH PITCHING COACH- JIM SLATON

Jim Slaton begins his first season as Camelback Ranch pitching coach after spending his first three seasons with the organization as the club's Triple-A pitching coach. In 2008, Slaton filled in for Ken Howell as the Dodgers' bullpen Ccach. Before joining the Dodger organization, Slaton spent 11 seasons in the Mariner organization and served as the club's bullpen coach from 2005-07. In 2004, Slaton was a special assignment pitching coach in Seattle's minor league system. He spent five seasons as the pitching coach for Triple-A Tacoma (1999-2003) and two seasons in the same capacity at Single-A Lancaster (1997-98). He also spent two seasons as pitching coach in the Cubs' organization at Single-A Daytona (1995-96) and coached three seasons in the Athletics' organization (1992-94), making stops at Rookie-level Medford and Rookie-level Scottsdale.

The native of Long Beach, CA pitched 16 seasons in the Majors with Milwaukee (1971-77, 1979-83), Detroit (1978, 1986) and California (1984-86). He earned 151 Major League victories during his career and was named to the 1977 American League All-Star team. He was the winning pitcher in Game 4 of the 1982 World Series vs. St. Louis and finished his career in Milwaukee as the franchise's all-time pitching leader in games, innings, starts, wins, strikeouts and shutouts.

DODGERS NAMED TOPPS 2010 ORGANIZATION OF THE YEAR

The Dodgers were named Topps' 2010 Organization of the Year, marking the record-setting sixth time the franchise has earned the honor. The Organization of the Year award dates back to 1966 and highlights the Major League team that has shown outstanding performance, depth and talent throughout their Major and Minor League teams. The award is presented annually based on the number of players in the organization that have received Topps awards during the season. Los Angeles previously earned Organization of the Year honors from Topps in 1967, 1970, 1981, 1990 and 1997.

The Dodgers' individual winners included: Nick Atkins (Player of the Month - Arizona Lg.); Brian Cavazos-Galvez (Player of the Month - Midwest Lg.); Leon Landry (Player of the Month - Pioneer Lg.); Jake Lemmerman (Class A All-Star/Trautman Award - Pioneer Lg.); John Lindsey (Class AAA All-Star/Player of the Month - Pacific Coast Lg.); Russell Mitchell (Class AAA All-Star); Elisaul Pimentel (Player of the Month - Midwest Lg.); Kyle Russell (Player of the Month - California Lg.); Jerry Sands (Player of the Month - Midwest Lg.)

2010 MINOR LEAGUE YEAR IN REVIEW



TRIPLE-A ALBUQUERQUE: Albuquerque posted a 72-71 record and finished in second place in the American Southern Division, 1.0 game behind Oklahoma City. IF **John Lindsey** led all full-season minor leaguers with a .353 batting average and a .657 slugging percentage in 107 games for Albuquerque before his Sept. 6 call-up to the Dodgers. He became the first-ever Isotope to win the Pacific Coast League batting title and was selected to the league's All-Star Team and to the All-Pacific Coast League team as the designated hitter, while leading the club with 25 home runs and the Dodger chain with 97 RBI. IF **Russ Mitchell** joined Lindsey on the All-PCL squad as the third baseman and was also voted by his fellow players and coaches as the team's MVP. He ranked ninth in the league with a .315 batting average and was fourth on the circuit with 38 doubles to go along with his 23 home runs and 87 RBI in 127 games. The Isotopes led the league in team batting average (.302) and runs (871) thanks in part to Lindsey and Mitchell but also because of their outfielders; PCL All-Star **Jay Gibbons** (.347, 19 HR, 83 RBI), **Xavier Paul** (.325), **Jamie Hoffmann** (.310, 91 runs), **Trent Oeltjen** (.347) and **Michael Restovich** (.305). RHP **Tim Corcoran** led the club with nine wins and 107.0 innings. The Isotopes were also successful off the field with the team receiving the Pacific Coast League's 2010 Larry MacPhail Award, which is awarded to the organization that demonstrates the year's best promotional effort as voted on by PCL Presidents and General Managers. During the season, the Dodgers and Isotopes announced a two-year extension to their Player Development Contract through the 2012 season.



DOUBLE-A CHATTANOOGA: The Lookouts finished in fourth place with a 65-74 record in their second year as a Dodger affiliate. The club went 33-36 in the season's first half and 32-38 after the All-Star break. IF **Corey Smith** powered the Chattanooga offense and ranked second in the Southern League with 86 RBI in 115 games. Smith started the All-Star Game for the North Division Team at third base and was also selected as the designated hitter on the league's Postseason All-Star squad after batting .275 with 34 doubles and 13 home runs in 115 games. After starting the season at Single-A Inland Empire, RHP **Kenley Jansen** blossomed as the Lookouts' closer. The 22-year-old went 4-0 and saved all eight of his opportunities, while posting a 1.67 ERA and striking out 50 in just 27.0 innings over 22 games to earn a promotion to the big leagues on July 23. He also earned the save for the North Division All-Stars in the team's 3-2 victory on July 12. Chattanooga had two of the league's top three base stealers with IF **Dee Gordon** leading the circuit with 53 stolen bases and OF **Trayvon Robinson** ranking third with 38 steals. Robinson was also third in the league with 73 walks and a .404 on-base percentage. The Lookouts had four All-Stars with RHP **Jon Huber**, who led the club with 18 saves, joining Smith, Jansen and Robinson on the squad. Gordon and RHP **Jesus Castillo** were also selected to the team, but did not play due to Gordon's participation in the XM All-Star Futures Games and Castillo's promotion to Albuquerque. IF/OF **Jerry Sands** and RHP **Rubby De La Rosa** were originally assigned to the Great Lakes Loons, but made a major impact with Chattanooga after midseason promotions. Sands led the club with 17 home runs in 68 games and finished the season with 35 combined home runs, which tied for third among all minor leaguers. De La Rosa went 3-1 with a 1.41 ERA and limited opponents to a .215 batting average in eight starts after his July 23 promotion. During the season, the Dodgers and Lookouts announced a four-year extension to their Player Development Contract through the 2014 season.



SINGLE-A INLAND EMPIRE: Inland Empire finished in fifth place in the California League's South Division with a 50-90 record. The 66ers went 26-44 in the season's first half and 24-46 after the All-Star break. RHP **Nate Eovaldi** represented the club on the California League All-Star Team after posting a 2.91 ERA (15 ER/46.1 IP) in his first eight starts through the end of May. Eovaldi also threw the first two complete-game shutouts of his career on May 31 and July 3. IF **Chris Gutierrez** led the club with a .312 batting average and ranked second in the league with a .416 on-base percentage in 121 games. The Dodgers' first-round selection in the 2008 draft, RHP **Ethan Martin**, led the club with nine victories. 2009 first-round pick, LHP **Aaron Miller**, posted a 2.92 ERA and struck out 99 batters over 101.2 innings with the 66ers and reached the Double-A level in his first full professional season. OF **Kyle Russell** opened the season with the 66ers and tore up California League pitching before his June 7 promotion to Chattanooga, leading the circuit in home runs (16), extra-base hits (31) and slugging percentage (.692) in 53 games. Russell also ranked fourth in the league with a .354 batting average, ranked second with 53 RBI and had the third-highest on-base percentage (.448) at the time of his promotion. RHP **Kenley Jansen** opened the season with Inland Empire, going 1-1 with a 1.50 ERA (3 ER/18.0 IP) and 28 strikeouts in 11 appearances before his May promotion to Chattanooga.



SINGLE-A GREAT LAKES: The Great Lakes Loons were selected as *Baseball America*'s Low Class-A Team of the Year after finishing the 2010 campaign with a franchise-record 90 wins and a 90-49 record, the best mark in Minor League Baseball. In the playoffs, Great Lakes won its first-round best-of-three series 2-1 over Fort Wayne (Padres) before falling to the eventual champions, Lake County (Indians) in the Eastern Division Championship Series. Manager **Juan Bustabad** guided the Loons to a second-half Eastern Division title with a 47-23 record after going 43-26 in the first half. The Loons' third-year skipper was recognized as Midwest League Manager of the Year and also named as the league's "top managerial prospect" by *Baseball America* in its annual tools issue. Bustabad also reached a personal milestone in 2010, winning his 700th game in 14 years as a minor league manager. Great Lakes posted a league-best 3.44 team ERA, led by RHP **Allen Webster**, who ranked third on the circuit with a 2.88 ERA and tied for the league lead

with 12 victories. Webster, RHP **Will Savage** and RHP **Luis Vasquez** represented the Loons' pitching staff on the Eastern Division All-Star Team along with infielders **Jerry Sands**, **Christian Lara** and **Rafael Ynoa**. Sands went 1-for-2 with a two-run home run and was named the game's "Top Star." Loons outfielders **Brian Cavazos-Galvez** and **Blake Smith** were named to the Midwest League Postseason All-Star Team. Cavazos-Galvez set a franchise record with a 24-game hitting streak from July 2-26 and finished with the league's second-best batting average (.318) and slugging percentage (.520). Smith's 19 home runs ranked fourth in the league and his .488 slugging percentage tied for seventh on the circuit. The Dodgers' Minor League Pitcher and Player of the Year both started their seasons with the Loons. **Rubby De La Rosa** went 4-1 with a 3.19 ERA in 14 games (five starts) with Great Lakes before his July 23 promotion to Chattanooga, while **Jerry Sands** ranked among the league leaders in batting average (.333, T-2nd), home runs (18, 1st), RBI (46, 2nd), on-base percentage (.432, 2nd) and slugging percentage (.646, 1st) in 69 games as a Loon. During the season, the Dodgers and Loons announced a four-year extension to their Player Development Contract through the 2014 season.



ROOKIE-ADVANCED OGDEN: The Raptors set a franchise record with 44 victories and won the Pioneer League South Division title in both halves of the season with a 23-15 record in the first half and a 21-16 mark in the second half. Ogden qualified for the playoffs for the second consecutive season but fell to Helena (Brewers) in the League Championship Series after defeating Orem (Angels) in a first-round matchup. The club was led by Pioneer League MVP **Jake Lemmerman**, who ranked among the league leaders in batting average (.363, 2nd), slugging percentage (.610, 3rd), on-base percentage (.434, 3rd), doubles (24, 1st) and home runs (12, 6th). The shortstop was joined on the Pioneer League All-Star team by league saves leader RHP **Shawn Tolleason** (17), who allowed just two runs in 28.2 innings, and RHP **Red Patterson** (6-1, 3.33 ERA). OF Nick Akins led the league with 15 home runs in 47 games and earned an Honorable Mention on the league's All-Star team along with C **Michael Pericht**, IF **Blake Dean**, LHP **Greg Wilborn** and OF **Leon Landry**, who ranked fifth in the league with a .349 batting average. Ogden led the circuit in hitting with a .298 team batting average and also scored a league-best 494 runs in 75 games. During the season, the Dodgers and Raptors announced a four-year extension to their Player Development Contract through the 2014 season.



ROOKIE-LEVEL ARIZONA LEAGUE DODGERS: The Arizona League Dodgers posted their first winning record with a 30-25 mark, including a strong 13-8 record away from Camelback Ranch - Glendale. OF **Nick Akins** paced the Dodgers' offense early, hitting .400 (30-for-74) with six home runs and 24 RBI before being promoted to Rookie-level Ogden. Despite playing only 20 games, his six home runs tied him for second in the league. IF **Charlie Mirabal** led the team in hitting over the course of the entire season, ending with a .295 average (38-for-129), and OF **James Baldwin** finished the season with 17 stolen bases, including a six-steal game against the Padres on July 17. The AZL Dodgers featured three pitchers who were promoted to Ogden by year's end. RHP **Arismendy Ozoria** posted a 4-1 record with a 2.78 ERA and 37 strikeouts in 35.2 innings of work. RHP **Gustavo Gomez** led the team with 38 strikeouts, while walking only 13, and the club's second-round selection in the 2010 draft, RHP **Ralston Cash**, began his career with a 2-2 record in eight starts, with an opponents' batting average of only .248.

In 1982, while helping Triple-A Albuquerque win the Pacific Coast League championship, first baseman Greg Brock slugged 44 home runs to set a new single-season record for a Dodger minor leaguer. In 2001, Phil Hiatt matched Brock's mark, with his 44 round-trippers for Triple-A Las Vegas leading all of minor league baseball. Hiatt, who was honored as the 2001 PCL Most Valuable Player, returned to the 51s in 2002 and hit 23 more dingers to set a then-Las Vegas franchise mark with 67 career homers, a mark since broken by Chin-Feng Chen.

INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS

As the popularity of Major League Baseball stretches across the world, so does the Dodgers' continuing search for young talent, whether it comes from the ranks of high schools and colleges in the United States or from other countries around the world.

Throughout their history, in both Brooklyn and Los Angeles, the Dodgers have played a major role in the development of international baseball.

Here is a summary of the Dodgers' involvement among the various regions of the world:

DOMINICAN REPUBLIC

- ◆ As part of the annual Dodgers' Community Caravan, in February 2011, the LAFD, Los Angeles City Councilman Tom La Bonge and Los Bomberos President Bernie Ventura joined Dodgers General Manager Ned Colletti and short stop Rafael Furcal in announcing the donation of a LAFD fire truck to Furcal's hometown Loma de Cabrera, Dominican Republic. The donation announcement, a momentous project to Furcal, received local, national and international media attention
- ◆ Fernando Valenzuela traveled to the Dominican Republic for the first time ever to be inducted into the Latino Baseball Hall of Fame at Casa de Campo in La Romana in February 2011. Dr. Leonel Fernandez Reyna, the President of the Dominican Republic, presented the award

JAPAN

- ◆ Three postseason tours of Japan by Brooklyn and Los Angeles Dodger teams following the 1956, 1966 and 1993 seasons led to return visits by the Tokyo Giants during Spring Training in Vero Beach on five occasions (1961, 1967, 1971, 1975 and 1980).
- ◆ After their 1956 Japan tour, the Dodgers invited Shigeru Mizuhara, manager of the Yomiuri Giants, along with pitcher Sho Horuchi and catcher Shigeru Fujio to train in Vero Beach with the Dodgers in 1957.
- ◆ In 1962, Japanese baseball coach Kaoru Betto traveled the entire season with the Dodgers, studying the American method of training.
- ◆ Dodger minor league manager Pete Reiser visited Japan in the fall of 1963 to coach the Tokyo (Toei) Flyers.
- ◆ In 1964 and 1965, the Dodgers conducted coaching clinics in Japan. Scouting Director Al Campanis visited Kawasaki to conduct the 1964 clinic for the Taiyo Whales and scouts Tommy Lasorda and Kenny Myers conducted the 1965 clinic in Tokyo and Miyazaki for the Tokyo Giants.
- ◆ In 1966, the Dodgers received a two-ton, 10-foot tall, stone lantern gift from Japanese Hall of Famer Sotaro Suzuki as a token of friendship between the Dodgers and Japan and to commemorate the opening of Dodger Stadium in 1962. The Dodgers re-dedicated the stone lantern in 2003.
- ◆ In 1979, Tommy Lasorda managed the National League All-Star Team in a seven-game series in Japan.
- ◆ Tommy Lasorda hosted a week-long baseball clinic in Japan with Senichi Hoshino in 1981
- ◆ In 1987, the Chunichi Dragons sent two rookies to play for the Sarasota Dodgers (Takeshi Yamasaki and Tetsuo Arakawa) and the next year, the entire Dragons team visited Dodgertown with five players remaining in the minor league system. In 1989, pitchers for the Dragons played for the Vero Beach Dodgers and Kissimmee Dodgers.
- ◆ After the 1993 season, the Dodgers played five exhibition games in Asia as part of the Friendship Series tour, three in Taipei, Taiwan and two in the Fukuoka Dome in Fukuoka, Japan.
- ◆ The Waseda University baseball team from Tokyo visited Dodgertown for two weeks in 1994, and the Dodgers continue their working relationship with the school. Each year, the Dodgers host interns from Waseda University for several weeks and teach them about American culture and baseball.
- ◆ In 1995, Hideo Nomo became only the second Japanese-born player to appear in the Major Leagues. The Nomo signing and his success opened the doors for Japanese players in the United States.
- ◆ In 2000, the Dodgers signed a Friendship Agreement with the Osaka Kintetsu Buffaloes and Tommy Lasorda visited the team more than 15

KOREA

- ◆ Tommy Lasorda hosted clinics and lectures in Korea in 1981 with Senichi Hoshino.
- ◆ In 1990, the Dodgers hosted the team presidents for the Korean Baseball Professional League for a baseball workshop and seminar, which allowed the executives to study all aspects of the Dodger organization.
- ◆ On Sept. 9, 1990, the Dodgers became the first Major League team to have a game broadcast in the Korean language in the United States.

- ◆ In June 2007, Japanese Ambassador Ryozyo Kato, Consul General Kazuo Kodama and Executive Director of the Japan America Society Doug Erber met with Dodger Owner and Chairman Frank McCourt and Dodger President and Vice Chairman Jamie McCourt at Dodger Stadium.
- ◆ In 2008, the Dodgers were named "Organization of the Year" by the Asian Business League
- ◆ In December 2008, Hall of Fame Manager and Special Advisor to the Chairman Tommy Lasorda was presented with the Order of the Rising Sun award by Consul General of Japan Junichi Ihara for his contributions to Japanese baseball. - ◆ In 1999, the Dodgers entered into a working agreement with the LG Twins of the Korean Baseball Organization. The Twins visited and trained at Dodgertown in 2000.
- ◆ In March 2009, Korea played against Japan before a sellout crowd at Dodger Stadium. Japan defeated Korea 5-3 in 10 innings to win the WBC.

TAIWAN

- ◆ Following the 1993 season, the Dodgers were the first Major League Baseball team to play in Taiwan when they competed against the Chinese Professional League All-Stars for three games as part of the Dodgers' Friendship Baseball Series.
- ◆ In 1996, the Dodgers established a working agreement with the Sinon Bulls of the Chinese Professional Baseball League. The Bulls became the

first team from Taiwan to train in Latin America when they visited Campo Las Palmas in 1997, 1998, 1999 and 2003.

- ◆ Pitcher Hong-Chih Kuo in 2000 became the first Taiwanese high school player to sign a professional baseball contract.
- ◆ In November 2002, the Dodgers became the first team with two Taiwanese players on their Major League roster – pitcher Hong-Chih Kuo and outfielder Chin Feng Chen. On September 9, 2002, Chen became the first Taiwanese player in the Majors. Kuo became the fourth after his debut in 2005.
- ◆ On Jan. 29, 2007, the Dodgers signed right-handed pitcher Chin-hui Tsao to a one-year contract, giving them three out of the four Taiwanese-born players to ever appear in a Major League game. In 2007, Chin-lung Hu made it four out of five.
- ◆ During Spring Training 2010, the Dodgers traveled to Taiwan and played three games against a team from the Chinese Professional Baseball League (CPBL). This was the Dodgers second trip to Taiwan, first since 1993.
- ◆ The Dodgers and the Taiwan Tourism Board announced a partnership in 2010
- ◆ In 2011, the Dodgers were the first MLB team to be awarded the Taiwan Tourism Award presented by Taiwanese Premier Wu Den-Yih at a ceremony attended by Taiwan's President Ma Ying-jeou

CHINA

- ◆ In 1980, the Dodgers began a relationship with the China Baseball Association to help the development of baseball in China.
- ◆ In 1984, Dodger coaches were sent to Kunming, China for a two-week clinic with Chinese coaches. In the following years, the Dodgers would send many coaches to China to help the national program while continuing to host Chinese coaches in both Los Angeles and Vero Beach.



The Dodgers visited the Great Wall of China during their historic trip in 2008 and faced the Padres in the first-ever big league games on Chinese soil.

- ◆ In 1986, Peter O'Malley paid for construction of a baseball stadium in Tianjin, 75 miles southeast of the capital. Named Dodger Stadium, it still exists and is home to the Tianjin Lions of the Chinese Professional Baseball League founded in 2002.
- ◆ In 1990, the Dodgers participated in the dedication ceremonies for the first-ever Mitsui Little League Baseball Friendship Field in Guangzhou.
- ◆ In 2000, the Dodgers held one-week baseball clinics in Guangzhou.
- ◆ In May 2002, Tommy Lasorda and Director of Asian Operations Acey Kohrogi visited Beijing as guests of honor at the Chinese Baseball League's championship game. That following June, the Dodgers hosted the Chinese National Baseball team in its visit to Los Angeles and allowed the team to work out at Dodger Stadium.
- ◆ In July 2007, an MLB and U.S. State Department sponsored delegation of baseball coaches from China, representing the China Baseball Association, visited with Tommy Lasorda at Dodger Stadium and received instruction in hitting, fielding, nutrition and team management.
- ◆ In the spring of 2008, a split-squad of Dodgers, highlighted by Joe Torre, Andruw Jones, and Matt Kemp traveled to Beijing, China to play against the San Diego Padres at Beijing's Wukesong Stadium in the first-ever Major League games played in that country

AUSTRALIA

- ◆ In 1986, Dodger shortstop Craig Shipley became the first native-born Australian to play in the Majors. Since then, Australians Luke Prokopec and Jeff Williams have also played for Los Angeles.
- ◆ In 2000, Tommy Lasorda managed Team USA to an Olympic gold medal in Sydney.

MEXICO

- ◆ Pitcher Fernando Valenzuela made his Major League debut in 1980. The native of Sonora, Mexico became an international sensation in 1981 and helped the Dodgers win the World Series.
- ◆ The Dodgers took a trip to Monterrey, Mexico during Spring Training in 1991 for a two-game exhibition against Industriales de Monterrey and the Milwaukee Brewers. The Dodgers also played exhibition games in Mexico City prior to the 1964 season against the Red Devils and in 2003 against the New York Mets.
- ◆ Representatives from Mexican media will visit Glendale, Arizona during Spring Training for the second year in a row. Representatives from Mexican media outlets made their first trip to Arizona in 2008 and were hosted by Dodger Hall of Famer Jaime Jarrin, Dodger legend Fernando Valenzuela, and fellow broadcaster Pepe Yñiguez. The Dodgers continued the trip to Camelback Ranch-Glendale for members of the Mexican media in 2009 and 2010.
- ◆ In 2009, Dodger legend Fernando Valenzuela served as a coach for Team Mexico during the World Baseball Classic
- ◆ As part of Viva Los Dodgers 2009, the Dodgers hosted members of the 1957 Little League World Series Championship Team from Monterrey, Mexico. The Little Giants became the first Mexican team to ever win the 1957 Little League World Series in Williamsport, Pennsylvania and spent a day at Ebbets Field with the Brooklyn Dodgers. The Monterrey team's visit with the Dodgers was their first in L.A after their Brooklyn visit more than 50 years ago

CANADA

- ◆ The Dodgers have had numerous Canadian players on their roster, both in Brooklyn and Los Angeles. Among them are Canadians Paul Quantrill (2002-03), Eric Gagné (1999-2006) and catcher Russell Martin (2006-present), who became the first Canadian catcher in All-Star history and just the third Canada native to start at any position in an All-Star Game.
- ◆ Jackie Robinson made his professional baseball debut with the Triple-A Montreal Royals in 1946 and won the International League batting title while taking the team to the Little World Series.
- ◆ The Brooklyn and Los Angeles Dodgers had a minor league affiliate in Montreal, Canada from 1939-60.
- ◆ Current Special Advisor to the Chairman Tommy Lasorda also spent many years in Canada playing for the Dodgers' Triple-A Montreal Royals, and August 23, 1958 was named Tommy Lasorda Day in the city. Lasorda was also inducted into the Canadian Baseball Hall of Fame on June 24, 2006.

CUBA

- ◆ The first Cuban pitching star, Dolf Luque, played for the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1930 and 1931.
- ◆ The Dodgers held Spring Training in Cuba in 1947.

RUSSIA

- ◆ In 1988, Ramaz Goglidze, president of the Soviet Baseball Federation, visited Dodgertown along with Russian baseball coaches Alexander Artatov and Ctela Cheehradze. On April 17, 1988, Dodger officials attended the groundbreaking ceremony for Matsumae Baseball Stadium at Moscow University.

VENEZUELA

- ◆ The Dodgers' ties are also connected to, Hall of Fame Manager and Special Advisor to the Chairman Tommy Lasorda who served as a coach/manager for the team's most popular team, the Caracas Leones, in 1971-72. Los Angeles has also seen 13 players from that country don a Dodger uniform: Wilson Alvarez, Henry Blanco, Vic Davalillo, Carlos Hernandez, Enzo Hernandez, Omar Daal, Roger Cedeno, Giovanni Carrara, Cesar Izturis, Dioner Navarro, Luis Maza, Ronald Belesario and Carlos Monasterios.
- ◆ Izturis is the Dodgers' all-time leader in games played among Venezuelans and was the focus of an international media blitz in 2005 to help him reach the All-Star Game. The successful campaign helped earn him a spot representing his home country and making him one of just 28 Venezuelans to be named to the roster of a Midsummer Classic
- ◆ In 2009, Dodgers Director of International Relations Joe Reaves and Assistant GM DeJon Watson visited Venezuela to formally announce a partnership with the Venezuelan Professional Baseball League and the Tiburones de La Guaira.

WORLD BASEBALL CLASSIC

- ◆ In the inaugural World Baseball Classic in 2006, Tommy Lasorda served as an Ambassador for Major League Baseball.
- ◆ The Dodgers had several players participate in the inaugural WBC, including Hong-Chih Kuo (Taiwan), Olmedo Saenz (Panama), Odalis Perez (Dominican Republic), and Chin-lung Hu (Taiwan).
- ◆ Dodger legend Fernando Valenzuela helped coach the Mexican national team.
- ◆ Dodger pitcher Jonathan Broxton played for the U.S. in the 2009 World Baseball Classic and catcher Russell Martin played for Team Canada.
- ◆ The 2009 World Baseball Classic semi-final and final games were held at Dodger Stadium from March 21 – 23, 2009.
- ◆ Hall of Fame Manager Tommy Lasorda served as Global Ambassador for the 2009 World Baseball Classic.

MISCELLANEOUS

- ◆ Dodger Stadium played host to the 1984 exhibition baseball tournament at the Olympic Games in Los Angeles.
- ◆ Special Advisor to the Chairman Tommy Lasorda has made two trips to Italy, the first to lecture about baseball and the second to host clinics throughout the country in the 1990s. During the second trip a team was named for him, the Tommy Lasorda Tollo All-Stars.
- ◆ In 1991, the Dodgers hosted the Nigerian National Baseball team at Dodgertown as they prepared for the International Baseball Association's Youth Championships in Brandon, Canada.
- ◆ On May 19, 1993, Dodger Stadium hosted the first baseball game to be broadcast in four languages – Chinese, English, Korean and Spanish.
- ◆ The Dodgers have played exhibition games in the Bahamas, the Dominican Republic, Japan, Taiwan, Cuba, Mexico and Puerto Rico. In addition, coaches from Australia, Holland, Italy, Nicaragua, and Nigeria have studied the training techniques of the Dodger staff.

CAMPO LAS PALMAS

The Los Angeles Dodgers' baseball academy in the Dominican Republic, Campo Las Palmas, enters its 25th year in Dodger player development. It was the first-of-its-kind facility and has since been replicated by numerous teams throughout baseball.

The Dodgers' history in the Dominican Republic began in 1948 when they held Spring Training there. In 1972, the organization signed a working agreement with the Tigres de Licey. Several years later, former team president Peter O'Malley visited the country and had Dodger Advisor, Latin America Scouting and Player Development Ralph Avila buy land for the new academy.

Campo Las Palmas is located in the town of Guerra, just east of the Dominican Republic's capital city of Santo Domingo. It is located on 75 acres of land and the academy is equipped with two full and two half baseball fields, a dining room, kitchen, recreation room and two two-story dormitories that accommodate up to 100 players. In addition to their baseball instruction, Dodger prospects receive academic instruction. The Dodgers educational program at Campo Las Palmas focuses on five pillars: English, American culture, nutrition, finance and computers and technology.

During the offseason, numerous Dominican players return from the U.S. to their native country to train at Campo Las Palmas and participate in instructional leagues. The Dodgers house approximately 40 prospects at any given time. The facility has developed some of the game's top talent during the past two decades, including Pedro Martinez, Ramon Martinez, Raul Mondesi, and Adrian Beltre. Current Dodger on the 40-man roster, Ramon Trancoso, was signed and developed at Campo Las Palmas. Dodger minor leaguer Kenley Jansen of Curacao was also signed during a tryout at Campo Las Palmas.

The Dodgers continue their commitment locally to Futuro Vivo, a school located in Santo Domingo that was adopted by the organization. The school offers education, nutrition and medical assistance to more than 500 underprivileged children.

In 2008, a contingent of Dodger executives, including General Manager Ned Colletti, Special Assistant to the Chairman Tommy Lasorda, and Special Assistant for Baseball Operations, Jose Vizcaino, visited the Dominican Republic to interact with scouts, media members, and local business associates. Throughout each year, Dodgers assistant GMs and baseball operations staff visits and oversee player development at Campo Las Palmas. New improvements in 2009 included enhancements to the weight room, training room and restrooms on site. Additionally, former Dodger outfielder Henry Cruz was appointed to the Campo Las Palmas staff.

CREDENTIALS: Credentials will be issued only to accredited media members. Season credentials will be issued only to those news agencies that have covered the Dodgers on a regular basis for the past three consecutive seasons. Season credentials will be approved at the discretion of the Dodgers' Public Relations Department. All credential requests for regular season Dodger home games should be submitted through <http://credentials.mlb.com> by the outlet affiliate manager and must be received at least 24 hours in advance to allow for verification and processing. Credential requests for weekend games must be submitted by 5 p.m. on the previous Friday. Please make certain all credential requests are confirmed by the Public Relations office prior to arrival at the stadium. Credentials can be picked up four hours prior to game time at the Dodger Stadium press entrance, located off of the media parking lot (Parking Lot P). Proper photo identification is required for pick up. Credentials must be displayed at all times.

PARKING: Media parking is located in Parking Lot P (Top of the Park). Media should enter Dodger Stadium through Gate A, which is located at the intersection of Elysian Park Ave. and Stadium Way, and check in at the guard-gated booth on the far right. After checking in, security will direct media to Lot P. Season media credentials will serve as season-long parking passes and all media with daily credentials will be on the day's media parking list. The media parking list is submitted to Gate A 24 hours in advance, so all media who are credentialed after the 24-hour deadline will need to pay for general admission parking. All media members are requested to enter Dodger Stadium through the media parking entrance. Please note that during sellouts, high profile games (i.e. Opening Day) and the postseason, we may not be able to accommodate all media in Parking Lot P and different media parking rules may apply.

CLUBHOUSE: Both the Dodgers' and visiting team's clubhouses are located on Level 1 (Dugout Club level). Only media credentialed with clubhouse access will be admitted inside. The training room and all areas besides the clubhouse itself are closed to all media. The clubhouse opens to credentialed media 3 1/2 hours prior to game time, is closed during batting practice and then closes one hour before game time. The clubhouse opens to credentialed media 10 minutes after the last out of the game.

DUGOUTS: The Dodgers' dugout is located on the third base side and the visitor's is on the first base side.

ELEVATORS/ESCALATORS: Elevators/escalators are located directly behind home plate. Elevators are available on all levels and escalators are available between the Club/Suite/Press box Level and field and loge levels. On the field level, the first door on the left at the bottom of the escalators will lead to one flight of stairs leading down to the clubhouses and field entrance.

FIELD: Only credentialed media with field access will be allowed on the field before the game. All media must clear the field 45 minutes prior to game time.

PRESS BOX AND DINING ROOM: The Vin Scully Press Box is located on Level 5 (Club/Suite Level) directly behind home plate. The media dining area, located in the main press box, is open two hours prior to game time. Beverages and snacks are available during and after the game. The cost for each pregame meal is payable in the press dining room.

INTERNET: Wireless internet access for the media will be available free of charge in the Vin Scully Press Box and the photographer wells. Login instructions with user name and password will be posted. Should media encounter problems logging on, they should contact a member of the Dodgers' Public Relations Department.

TELEPHONES: Several charge-a-call phones are located in the Vin Scully Press Box.

BATTING PRACTICE TIMING: Batting practice times are listed on the final page of the Media Information section of the Media Guide.

AUTOGRAPH POLICY: Credentialed members of the media are prohibited from requesting autographs at any time on the field or in the clubhouse. Violation of this rule will result in immediate credential revocation.

DAILY NOTES: Daily notes, statistics, lineup cards and other media information will be available in the Vin Scully Press Box prior to game time. Quotes, statistics, postgame notes, box scores and play-by-play sheets will be available after the game. Daily game notes and other media information are also available on DodgersPressbox.com or MLBPressbox.com to media registered on the site.

GAME TICKETS: Complimentary media tickets, subject to availability, must be requested at least 24 hours in advance for Tuesday-Friday games and by 2 p.m. on Friday for weekend and Monday games. Approval will depend upon availability and frequency of use. Tickets, limited to four per series, can be picked up at the Club Level Will Call window in parking lot D outside of the Dodger offices. Proper photo identification is required and tickets must be picked up by the person whose name is listed at willcall. The willcall window opens 90 minutes prior to game time.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: Photographers are not allowed on the field during the game at any time. Photo wells are located at each end of the home and visiting dugouts and photographers who wish to shoot from the photo wells must receive approval from a member of the Dodgers' Public Relations staff or a team photographer in advance. Special arrangements for use of the press box level positions or other photographer locations can be made by contacting the Public Relations Department in advance. Still photography is not allowed in either clubhouse unless authorized by the Public Relations Department of each club.

LIVE TRANSMISSION: Non-rightsholders are permitted to transmit live reports prior to and after games at Dodger Stadium. Live transmissions must be cleared ahead of time by the Dodgers' Public Relations Department at (323) 224-1301 and all truck parking and equipment requirements, including park and power fees, should be arranged in advance by contacting brandib@ladodgers.com. All television live shots must be done in designated areas. Live shots will not be permitted from the clubhouse. Live television reports by non-rightsholders are prohibited while the rightsholder is on the air or the game is in progress. Radio stations and assigned correspondents for out-of-town reports are allowed to give inning or half-inning score updates. At no time can file reports once play is underway. Violation of the above policies will result in immediate credential revocation.

TELEVISION STATISTICAL ASSISTANCE: The Public Relations department can refer statisticians for visiting club television.

POSTSEASON: Auxiliary press seating during the postseason will exist on the Reserve Level behind home plate. In addition, conference rooms on the club level and media dining will be available for media seating. The postseason interview room is located behind the Dodger clubhouse and can be reached by taking the stairs at the end of the third base line. A photographer workroom will also be located in this area. Media seating will be assigned during the postseason and seating diagrams will be posted in all media work areas.

DISABLED ACCESS: The media parking lot and press box are equipped for disabled media members. For press box access, take the elevator to Level 5. For field and clubhouse access, take the elevator to Level 1. Turn left to enter the Dodgers' clubhouse. To access the field, enter the Dugout Club on Level 1. The ushers will direct media to the lift allowing entrance to the field.

CREDENCIALES: Credenciales serán distribuidos solo para miembros de los medios de comunicación. Credenciales para la temporada serán distribuidos solo para esas agencias de noticias que han cubierto a los Dodgers regularmente durante las últimas tres temporadas consecutivas. Credenciales para la temporada serán aprobadas a la discreción del Departamento de Relaciones Publicas de los Dodgers. Solicitaciones para Credenciales Diarias para todos los juegos locales de los Dodgers durante la temporada regular deberían ser enviada por credentials.mlb.com por un editor o productor y deberían ser pedidas por lo menos 24 horas antes del juego para permitir la verificación y el proceso. Solicitaciones para credenciales para juegos en los fines de semanas deberían ser sometidas antes de las 5 p.m. del viernes anterior. Por favor asegure que las solicitudes de credenciales son confirmadas por la oficina de Relaciones Publicas antes de la llegada al estadio. Credenciales podrán ser recogidas cuatro horas antes del inicio del juego en la entrada de la prensa del Dodger Stadium, localizado cerca del estacionamiento de los medios de comunicación (Estacionamiento P). Fotografías no son permitidas en ninguno de los clubhouses solo si son autorizados por el Departamentos de Relaciones Publicas de ambos equipos.

TRANSMISION EN VIVO: Los que no son dueños de derechos son permitidos transmitir reportes en vivo antes y después de los juegos en el Dodger Stadium. Transmisiones en vivo deben ser aprobados con tiempo por el Departamento de Relaciones Publicas de los Dodgers al número (323) 224-1301 y todos los requisitos de los estacionamientos para los camiones y su equipaje, incluyendo el cobro para el estacionamiento y electricidad, debe ser arreglado por avanzado contactando brandib@ladodgers.com. Todas las imágenes en vivo por la televisión deberían ser hechas en las áreas designadas. Imágenes en vivo no serán permitidos desde el clubhouse. Reportes por televisión en vivo por dueños de los derechos son prohibidos mientras el dueño de los derechos está en el aire o el juego está en progreso. CREDENTIALS 취재허가증: 취재허가서는 공인 언론사에게만 발급됩니다. 시즌 자격증은 지난 3개 시즌 연속으로 정기적으로 다저스를 취재한 언론사에게만 발급될 것입니다. 시즌 자격증 요청을 수락하는 것은 다저스 홍보실의 재량입니다. 모든 정규 시즌 경기 자격증 요청은 <http://credentials.mlb.com> 통해 제출하여야 하며 확인 및 처리가 가능하도록 적어도 24시간 이전에 제출되어야 합니다. 주말 게임에 대한 취재허가 요청은 전 주 금요일 오후 5 시까지 제출해야 합니다. 모든 요청은 경기장 도착 전에 정보실에서 확인되게 해야 합니다. 자격증은 경기 시간 4시간 전에 언론 인명 주차장 P에 있는 다저스 스타디움 언론인 전용 입구에서 찾아갈 수 있습니다. 찾아갈 때에는 사진이 붙은 신분증을 제시해야 합니다. 자격증은 항상 보이게 달아야 합니다.

PARKING 주차: 주차장 P (Top of the Park)는 언론인 전용 주차장입니다. GAME TICKETS 경기 입장권: 무료 언론인 입장권은 수급 형태에 따라 제공되며, 화-금요일 경기의 경기 24시간 전에 그리고 주말 및 월요일 경기의 경우 금요일 오후 2시까지 요청해야 합니다. 승인된 수급 형태와 사용 빈도에 따라 결정됩니다. 시리즈당 4매로 한정되는 입장권은 다저스 사무실 밖 주차장에 있는 Club Level Will Call 창구에서 찾아가서 됩니다. 사진이 붙은 신분증을 제시해야 하고 입장권을 요청한 분이 직접 받아야 합니다. Will Call 창구는 경기 90분 전에 엽니다.

VIN SCULLY HALL OF FAME BROADCASTER

Entering an unprecedented 62nd season broadcasting the Dodgers, Vin Scully continues to rewrite the record book of his trade each and every time he goes on the air. With awards and accolades beyond comprehension, Scully's standing as the greatest sportscaster of all-time was recently reaffirmed by the American Sportscasters Association (ASA), which at a 2010 event put his name atop the list of the 50 greatest to ever sit behind a microphone. The Hall of Famer's 61 years of consecutive service with the Dodgers is the longest of any current sports broadcaster with one team.

The ASA, a non-profit organization that recognizes achievements in sports broadcasting, also elected Scully as the top sportscaster of the 20th century in a vote by more than 500 national members of the organization in 2000, topping such broadcasting icons as Howard Cosell, Mel Allen and others. And while the latest poll by that organization put the "Voice of the Dodgers" atop the list of all-time greats, that group is not alone. In the 2005 book "Voices of Summer," Scully was named as baseball's all-time best broadcaster based on "longevity, continuity, network coverage, kudos, language, popularity, persona, voice knowledge and miscellany." Each criterion was rated from 1-10, with the perfect score being 100. Scully was the only broadcaster to reach that number.

Scully, whose vivid yet simplistic description of a baseball game has thrilled fans for years, joined Hall of Fame announcer Red Barber and Connie Desmond as part of the Brooklyn Dodgers' broadcast team in 1950, just a year after graduating from Fordham University. Scully, who played outfield for two seasons on Fordham's baseball team, called baseball, basketball and football games for the University's radio station. In 1982, 32 years after he first became a Dodger broadcaster, he reached the pinnacle of his sparkling career in baseball when he was inducted into the Broadcaster's wing of the National Baseball Hall of Fame as the Ford C. Frick Award recipient.

In 2009, Scully was inducted into the National Association of Broadcasters Hall of Fame, which recognizes individuals and programs that have made a significant and lasting contribution to the broadcasting industry. The NAB represents more than 8,300 radio and television broadcasters before the Federal Communications Commission and Congress and a plaque in his honor will be permanently displayed at the NAB building in Washington, DC. Previous inductees to the NAB Radio Hall of Fame include Mel Allen, Gene Autry, Red Barber, Jack Buck, George Burns, Harry Caray, Bing Crosby, Herbert Hoover, Bob Hope, Casey Kasem, Larry King, Rush Limbaugh, Edward Murrow, Ronald Reagan and Orson Welles.

Also in 2009, The American Sportscasters Association selected Scully as the Top Sportscaster of All-Time. The same organization previously honored him as the Top Sportscaster of the 20th century in 2000 and inducted him into the American Sportscasters Association's Hall of Fame in 1992.

During the 2008 calendar year, Scully was inducted into the Sports Broadcasting Hall of Fame in New York City as well as the California Sports Hall of Fame. He was honored on the field at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum before the team's record-setting game in March and a plaque was unveiled in his honor at the historic venue. He received the Art Gilmore Career Achievement Award from Pacific Pioneers Broadcasting and was honored by WFUV, the radio station he helped form at his alma mater Fordham during its 60th anniversary celebration. Scully received an honorary Doctor's of Law degree from Pepperdine, the university's highest honor.

When Scully first began broadcasting in 1950, the Dodgers had yet to win a single World Series and were known affectionately as "Dem Bums." Gasoline cost 27 cents a gallon, a postage stamp was just three cents and the minimum wage was only 75 cents per hour. Three years later, at the age of 25, he became the youngest person to ever broadcast a World Series game and in 1955, he had his most memorable moment behind the microphone, as he called the Dodgers' first and only championship in Brooklyn. The following season, Scully once again found himself in the enviable position of calling what

DODGER TELEVISION FIRSTS

The Brooklyn Dodgers and Cincinnati Reds were the first clubs to appear on television when an NBC experimental station televised the first game of a doubleheader on Aug. 26, 1939.

Sixteen years later, on Sept. 28, 1955, the World Series was televised in color for the first time. The first game of the Fall Classic between the New York Yankees and Brooklyn Dodgers was won by New York, but the Dodgers would go on to capture their first and only World Series title in Brooklyn.

he would later say was the greatest individual performance he had seen - Don Larsen's perfect game in the World Series - a broadcast that made national news again in 2009 when the MLB Network launched on January 1 with the rare footage of that game.

Though he cut his proverbial teeth on radio, Scully is often known for letting the pictures tell the story on television. His most memorable call for Dodger fans likely came in Game 1 of the 1988 World Series, when a hobbled Kirk Gibson's two-out, two-strike, two-run homer gave the Dodgers a victory over the highly favored Oakland A's.

"High fly ball into right field, she is gone," Scully said before remaining silent for more than a minute. The next words he spoke continue to be replayed almost nightly at Dodger Stadium. "In a year that has been so improbable, the impossible has happened."

Scully's voice is often dubbed the "soundtrack to summer" in Los Angeles, where generations of fans have grown up listening to him call Dodger games. In 2011, he will continue to call all Dodger home games and the club's road games against NL West and AL West opponents. While Scully handles all nine innings of the team's television broadcasts, the first three innings of each of his games is simulcast on radio.

As such, in 2005, USA Today ranked the Dodgers' radio broadcast team as Major League Baseball's best, based on a technical rating, a fan rating and an entertainment rating. Scully and his colleagues, Rick Monday and Charley Steiner, earned 28.5 points out of a possible 30.

On April 21, 2001, the press box at Dodger Stadium was named in Scully's honor.

In addition to his Dodger broadcasts, the multi-talented broadcaster called play-by-play for National Football League games and PGA Tour events on CBS-TV from 1975-82 and play-by-play for Major League Baseball's Game of the Week, three World Series and four All-Star Games on NBC-TV from 1983-89. Scully also called play-by-play for the World Series on CBS Radio from 1990-97. In all, he has called 25 World Series and 12 All-Star Games.

In 2009, Scully hosted "Scully & Wooden for the Kids" alongside UCLA coaching legend John Wooden. The once-in-a-lifetime event featured Scully and Wooden sharing insights, philosophies, memories and wisdom before a sold-out audience of more than 7,000 people. Proceeds from the event benefited Mattel Children's Hospital UCLA and Childrens Hospital Los Angeles and City of Hope through ThinkCure!, the official charity of the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Scully portrayed himself in "For Love of the Game," the 1999 Universal Pictures release starring Kevin Costner. During the 1999 World Series, Scully served as master of ceremonies at Major League Baseball's All-Century Team unveiling at Atlanta's Turner Field. He was named best of the century in Los Angeles Sports broadcasting by the Long Beach Press-Telegram and the poet laureate of baseball by USA Today. He has also lent his voice to Sony Playstation's MLB video game.

He and his wife, Sandra, reside in Los Angeles.



On April 21, 2001, the Dodgers dedicated the Vin Scully Press Box at Dodger Stadium, named after the club's Hall of Fame broadcaster. According to the National Baseball Hall of Fame, Scully's 61 years of service is believed to be the longest tenure of any broadcaster in sports history.

VIN SCULLY'S BROADCASTING HIGHLIGHTS INCLUDE:

- ◆ Three perfect games (Don Larsen in 1956, Sandy Koufax in 1965 and Dennis Martinez in 1991) and 19 no-hitters
- ◆ Johnny Podres' shutout of the Yankees in Game 7 of the 1955 World Series, which gave the Dodgers their first World Championship
- ◆ The Dodgers' first game in Los Angeles at the Coliseum on April 18, 1958
- ◆ The Dodgers' return to the Coliseum on March 29, 2008 in front of a Guinness World record-breaking crowd of 115,300
- ◆ The Dodgers-Yankees exhibition game on May 7, 1959 that honored Roy Campanella before a then-Major League record 93,103 fans at the Los Angeles Coliseum
- ◆ The Dodgers' playoff win over the Milwaukee Braves and World Series victory over the Chicago White Sox in 1959, which gave them their second World Championship; and other World Championship seasons in Los Angeles in 1963, 1965, 1981 and 1988

RICK MONDAY BROADCASTER

Former Dodger outfielder and two-time Major League All-Star, Rick Monday begins his 18th season as a Dodgers broadcaster and 26th season overall with the organization, including eight as a player. He also spent three years calling Dodger games on cable television. The Emmy-Award winning broadcaster can be heard on the Dodgers' flagship station KABC 790 and across the Dodgers Radio Network.

In 2005, *USA Today* ranked the Dodgers' radio broadcast team, featuring Vin Scully, Monday and Charley Steiner, as Major League Baseball's best, based on a technical rating, a fan rating and an entertainment rating. The trio earned 28.5 points out of a possible 30. In 2010, Monday received the Radio Color Commentary Award from the Southern California Sports Broadcasters

In his current role, Monday serves as an analyst for all 162 games alongside play-by-play announcer Charley Steiner. For every game throughout the season, Monday is also a co-host on the radio pre-game show and in 2008, he was one of the hosts of the Dodgers' online webisodes titled "Inside Dodgertown."

Monday, who joined the Dodgers' broadcast team in 1993, began his broadcasting career as a sports anchor on KTTV in Los Angeles in 1985 while also calling play-by-play and hosting the pregame show for DodgerVision and Z Channel. He was nominated for an Emmy as host of the Dodgers' pregame show on KTTV's "Dodger Central" in 1988 and he earned an Emmy for Live Sports Coverage in 2001. Monday was also a color commentator for CBS-TV at the College World Series championship game in 1988. He moved to San Diego in 1989 and called play-by-play for the Padres on radio and television for four seasons.

The 2011 season marks the 35th anniversary of one of the most dramatic moments of Monday's playing career. While playing for the Chicago Cubs in 1976, he saved the American flag from being burned by two protesters in left field at Dodger Stadium on April 25. Al Campanis, former Dodger Vice President, Player Personnel, presented the flag to Monday after it was used as evidence in the case against the two protesters and former U.S. President Gerald Ford presented Monday with a Bicentennial Commendation for his service to others. On June 27, 2006, in honor of the 30th anniversary of his heroic efforts, the 109th Congress passed a senate resolution honoring Monday for his courage and patriotism and he was a guest of former President George W. Bush at the White House on several occasions.

In 2006, Monday released his first book, "Tales from the Dodger Dugout," a retrospective on the 1981 World Championship club on which he played a key role.

A star at Arizona State University (ASU), Monday led the Sun Devils to the 1965 College World Series Championship and earned All-American and College Player of the Year honors before the Kansas City Athletics made him the first player ever selected in the Major League First-Year Player Draft. He was inducted into the ASU Hall of Fame in 1975. He also serves on the Advisory Board for ASU Baseball.

Monday made his Major League debut in 1966 and was named to the American League Rookie All-Star Team that year. After spending six seasons with the Athletics, including an appearance on the 1968 American League All-Star team, and five seasons with the Cubs, Monday joined the Dodgers as part of a five-player trade in 1977. He played eight seasons for the Dodgers, helping them to a World Championship in 1981 and three NL pennants (1977, 1978, 1981), and was named to the NL All-Star squad in 1978. Overall, Monday compiled a .264 career batting average with 241 home runs and 775 RBI while appearing in five League Championship Series and three World Series.

The former left-handed hitter is also known for his dramatic, game-winning home run in the ninth inning of Game 5 of the 1981 N.L. Championship Series at Montreal, which gave the Dodgers a 2-1 victory and a berth in the World Series.

In 1977, Monday received the inaugural Humanitarian Award presented by Major League Baseball and in 1995 he was honored with the William A. Shea Distinguished Little League Graduate Award, which is given to a Major League Baseball player or individual who best exemplifies the spirit of the Little League Baseball program. A list of additional awards can be found below.

Monday and his wife, Barbaralee, who make regular visits to various veteran's hospitals throughout the year, reside in Vero Beach during the offseason.

CHARLEY STEINER
BROADCASTER



Four-time Emmy Award-winner Charley Steiner enters his seventh season as a play-by-play announcer for the Dodgers. The veteran broadcaster will call the action for all games on the Dodgers' flagship station, KABC 790, alongside Rick Monday.

In December 2010, Steiner delivered the commencement address at his alma mater Bradley University's mid-year commencement and received an honorary Doctor of Humane Letters degree from the university. Steiner graduated from Bradley in 1971 and was inducted into the school's Sports Hall of Fame in 1995. He is also a member of Bradley's Centurion Society, which recognizes university alumni who have brought national and international credit to the school, and in 1991 received Bradley's Lydia Moss Bradley Award, which honors those who have given outstanding service to the school. In 2000 Steiner established the Charles H. Steiner Endowed Scholarship, which is given annually to Bradley broadcasting majors.

In 2008, Steiner had the distinction of calling the Dodgers' historic two-game series in Beijing, China, the first ever Major League games played on Chinese soil. Steiner has called games in six different countries as he was also behind the microphone for ESPN in 1999 when MLB opened the season for the first time in Monterrey, Mexico and the first-ever Major League game in Puerto Rico in 2001. Steiner also called the 2004 Opening Day festivities for the Yankees in Tokyo, Japan.

In 2005, his first season with the Dodgers, *USA Today* ranked the club's radio broadcast team, featuring Hall of Famer Vin Scully, Rick Monday and Steiner, as Major League Baseball's best.

In 2009, Steiner won two Emmys for his broadcast work with PRIME TICKET for the network's "True Blue Stories," which aired during the Dodgers' 50th anniversary season.

Steiner spent 14 years at ESPN, where his responsibilities ranged from anchoring SportsCenter to working play-by-play for Major League Baseball on ESPN Radio and Television. He was also the play-by-play voice for ESPN 2's Saturday Primetime football. He served as SportsCenter's primary boxing reporter/analyst and also contributed to the Emmy and CableACE Award-winning *Outside the Line* series. His nationally-acclaimed coverage of the Mike Tyson trial in Indianapolis earned him a Clarion award.

Prior to joining the Dodgers, Steiner spent three seasons on New York Yankee broadcasts for WCBS Radio and the YES network. While with the Yankees, Steiner and John Sterling received the best play-by-play award from the New York A.I.R. (Achievement in Radio) Awards.

Steiner also has provided the reading voice for several books-on-tape, including Jane Leavy's "Sandy Koufax: A Lefty's Legacy" and "As They See Them" by Bruce Weber, a book about Major League Baseball umpiring. He also served as the narrator for the DVD "Dodger Blue: The Championship Years," which was produced by Major League Baseball Productions.

Steiner served as the lead play-by-play announcer for XM Radio at the inaugural World Baseball Classic in March 2006 and hosted a radio show on XM from 2006-09. He also broadcast the 2009 World Baseball Classic for Major League Baseball International seen around the world.

He began his professional broadcasting career in 1969 at WIRL Radio in Peoria, Illinois as a newscaster. After a nine-month stint at KSTT Radio in Davenport, Iowa, Steiner moved to Connecticut, where he served as News Director at WAVZ radio in New Haven and, later, at WPOP radio in Hartford.

After a year and half in Cleveland working at WERE radio and WKYC television as a sportscaster, Steiner moved home to New York, where for the next seven years, he was the morning sportscaster on WOR radio, while serving as sports director for the RKO Radio Network.

In addition, Steiner called the play-by-play for the USFL New Jersey Generals and, later, for the New York Jets on WABC radio. He won the UPI Best Radio Sportscaster award for New York, New Jersey and Connecticut in 1981, 1983 and 1985, and the New York State Broadcasters Award for best radio play-by-play in 1983, 1984 and 1987 before joining ESPN. He spent five years calling the action for the Harvard-Yale football game each fall.

Steiner resides in Los Angeles and is originally from New York.



STEVE LYONS BROADCASTER



Steve Lyons enters his seventh season as a part of the Dodger broadcast team, as he provides analysis on television broadcasts outside of the NL West. He earned national notoriety as a staple of Fox Sports' coverage of Major League Baseball from 1996-2006, where he earned three Emmy Awards and two additional Emmy nominations during his tenure with the network.

He began his Fox career as an analyst for the network's Saturday Baseball Game of the Week studio show, and made the natural transition to baseball analysis for Fox's game coverage. Lyons also served as one of the primary anchors on the Fox Sports Net News Desk, broadcasting nightly across all 21 FSN regions. He served as a color analyst on the Arizona Diamondbacks broadcasts for 50 games in 2003.

Lyons' nine-year Major League career included playing for the 1986 American League Champion Boston Red Sox team and the 1992 National League Champion Atlanta Braves. Lyons posted a career .262 batting average while playing for the Red Sox (1985-86 and 1991-93), Chicago White Sox (1986-1990), Braves (1992) and Montreal Expos (1992).

Known throughout baseball for his personality and wit, Lyons penned the 1995 autobiography "Psychoanalysis," which details his time in the minor leagues up through his retirement from the Major Leagues in 1993. He also released the book "The Psycho 100: Baseball's Most Outrageous Moments" in 2009.

Lyons, who attended Oregon State University, resides in Hermosa Beach. He has three daughters, Kristen (33), Kori (26) and Ally (12) and one grandson, Anthony (12).

VOICES OF SUMMER

In 2005, author Curt Smith released the book "Voices of Summer" which ranked the top 101 baseball broadcasters of all-time and the Dodgers had a total of 11 current or former broadcasters crack the list.

Among those were Vin Scully (1st), Ernie Harwell (3rd), Red Barber (5th), Jaime Jarrin (28th), Ross Porter (61st), Don Drysdale (63rd), Al Helfer (69th), Jerry Doggett (88th) and Connie Desmond (90th). Former Dodger Pee Wee Reese, who never broadcasted for the club but announced games for CBS and NBC's Game of the Week from 1960-68 after a 16-year big league career with the Dodgers, ranked 86th. Dodger broadcaster Charley Steiner was saluted by the author as one of four who nearly cracked the list.

The book ranked baseball's all-time greatest 101 announcers by "longevity, continuity, network coverage, kudos, language, popularity, persona, voice knowledge and miscellany." Each criterion was rated from 1-10, with the perfect score being 100.

Scully was the only broadcaster to reach that number.



ERIC COLLINS BROADCASTER



Eric Collins enters his third season as part of the Dodger broadcast team, calling play-by-play for road games outside the National League West alongside analyst Steve Lyons on KCAL and PRIME TICKET.

Following his inaugural season on the Dodger broadcast in 2009, the Cleveland native was honored with the Harry Caray Broadcaster of the Year Award from the Pitch & Hit Club of Chicago, a professional baseball organization formed more than 60 years ago to promote goodwill toward the game and fellowship among professionals in baseball.

In addition to his work on the Dodger broadcasts, Collins serves as the lead play-by-play football announcer and one of two main basketball announcers for the Big Ten Network. He began his duties there in 2010 and also calls baseball and other spring sports for the network.

Before joining the Big Ten Network, Collins was a play-by-play announcer for ESPN/ABC for seven years in its college football and basketball coverage. For six years, he called ESPN's College Baseball Super Regionals.

He is also one of the nation's preeminent voices for women's softball, having called the sport's World Cup for ESPN all five seasons that it has been played. Collins served as a play-by-play announcer at the Women's College World Series in 2007 and 2008 and also toured with Team USA on its Pre-Olympic Tours in 2004 and 2008.

Collins, 41, was also the lead play-by-play announcer for NBC in its baseball coverage of the 2008 Olympic Games in Beijing, China. He performed radio and television play by play for the Chicago White Sox on occasions in 2004 and 2008.

Prior to joining ESPN/ABC, Collins spent four seasons calling minor league baseball for the Schaumburg Flyers and the Rochester Red Wings. He has served as a pregame and postgame host for the White Sox and Cubs and as a sideline reporter for the Chicago Bulls from 1997-2002.

Collins earned a bachelor's degree from St. Lawrence University in Canton, NY prior to earning a Master's from Syracuse University.

He and his wife, Kerri, make their home in Chicago with their five-year-old daughter Beatrice and two-year old daughter, Harriet.

JAIME JARRÍN HALL OF FAME BROADCASTER

Dodgers

Jaime Jarrin, among the most recognizable voices in Spanish-language broadcasting and one of two current Dodger Hall of Fame announcers, begins his 53rd season in the radio booth. Jarrin, “the Spanish Voice of the Dodgers” is also heard on Prime Ticket’s SAP channel. The Dodgers, with Jarrin and longtime English-language broadcaster Vin Scully, are the only Major League club to feature a pair of Hall of Fame announcers.

In the 2005 book “Voices of Summer,” Jarrin was named as baseball’s all-time best Spanish-language broadcaster based on “longevity, continuity, network coverage, kudos, language, popularity, persona, voice knowledge and miscellany.” He was rated 28th overall among all broadcasters.

Jarrin became the club’s No. 1 Spanish-language broadcaster in 1973, 14 years after he first joined the Dodgers. He was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame on July 26, 1998 in Cooperstown, NY as the recipient of the Ford C. Frick Award. Named in honor of the former broadcaster and Commissioner of Baseball, the Frick Award has been given annually since 1978 to a broadcaster “for major contributions to the game of baseball.”

The Quito, Ecuador native began working for HCJB in his home country when he was just 16 years old and went on to become the announcer for the National Congress of Ecuador. He came to the United States on June 24, 1955 and four months later, watched the Dodgers win their first World Series, which was when he fell in love with baseball. Shortly thereafter, he began working for KWKW in Los Angeles, where he was the news and sports director when the Dodgers moved to Los Angeles in 1958. For the first six-plus years as the Dodgers’ broadcaster, Jarrin did not travel and would recreate the games on radio while listening to the English-language broadcast from a studio.

From 1962 to 1984, Jarrin called close to 4,000 consecutive games spanning 22 seasons, never missing a game. The streak was broken only when he took charge of all Spanish-language radio coverage and production for the 1984 Olympic Games in Los Angeles.

In addition to his work calling Dodger games, Jarrin found himself at the center of many international news broadcasts, including the funeral of President John F. Kennedy, Pope John Paul II’s visit to America and several important meetings between foreign leaders and Presidents Richard Nixon and Lyndon B. Johnson.

Jarrin became a household name across the country in 1980-81 when he served as the interpreter for Mexican pitching phenom Fernando Valenzuela during a period known as *Fernandomania*. The left-hander became an analyst in 2003 and continues to work alongside Jarrin.

Jarrin celebrated his 50th season with the Dodgers in 2008 and was honored by the team on the anniversary of his arrival to the United States, June 24. Jarrin was recognized for his service that day with appearances throughout Los Angeles and received a special award from the publisher and general manager of Hoy, L.A.’s weekly Spanish-language newspaper, during the day’s pregame ceremonies.

On August 23, 2009, Jarrin participated, along with Fernando Valenzuela and Pepe Yñiguez, in the first-ever regular season, dedicated, Spanish-language telecast of a Dodger game. Dodger broadcast partner PRIME TICKET aired the afternoon game against the Cubs on their sister network, FOX Sports West.

When he was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame, Jarrin became only the second Spanish-language announcer to achieve that honor, joining Buck Canel. Jarrin was also the first recipient of the Southern California Sports Broadcaster Association’s President’s Award in February 1998.

He was given the highest award by the National Association of Hispanic Journalists in June 1998 and received a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame in September 1998. On June 21, 2002 Jarrin was inducted into the California Broadcasters Association Hall of Fame and on August 23, 2003, he was inducted into the Hispanic Heritage Baseball Museum during pre-game ceremonies at Dodger Stadium. In early 2004, he was honored by the Southern California Sports Broadcasters with the 2003 Foreign Language Sports Broadcaster Award and inducted into the Southern California Sports Broadcaster’s Hall of Fame. Jarrin was honored again by the SCSB with the foreign-language broadcaster of the year award in 2003, 2004, 2005, 2007, 2008 and 2009. In 2009 he was honored by the Society of St. Vincent DePaul for his commitment to changing the lives of at-risk youth in the community.

His other honors included being awarded La Gran Cruz al Merito en El Grado de Comendador (the highest medal awarded to non-military personal) in his native Ecuador in January 1992 and being named as one of the top 100 Influential Hispanics in the United States in Hispanic Business Magazine in 1990. He won Golden Mike Awards in 1970 and 1971 and became the first Latin American to win that award. In 2000, he spoke at the MLB Rookie Development seminar, which is designed to prepare top minor league prospects for the Major Leagues.

He has called more than 30 world championship boxing title bouts throughout the world for radio and television stations in Latin America, including the Thrilla in Manila between Muhammad Ali and Joe Frazier. He has called 19 All-Star Games and 25 World Series, including the 2005 Fall Classic in which he served as the emcee for MLB’s Latin Legends ceremony. His broadcasts of the All-Star Game, League Championship Series and World Series on CBS, the Latina Broadcasting Network, Cadena Latina and Caracol from 1989 to 1999 were carried on more than 300 stations.

In March 2006, Jarrin served as a play-by-play announcer for the inaugural World Baseball Classic. In 2011, Jarrin was honored by the American Federation of Television and Radio Artists (AFTRA) Foundation with a AFTRA Media and Entertainment Excellence Award.

Jarrin studied philosophy, letters, journalism and broadcasting at Central University of Ecuador in Quito. His son, Jorge – “The Captain” – covers traffic for English and Spanish radio stations in Los Angeles and works for the Dodgers in the Partnerships department.

Jarrin and his wife, Blanca, reside in Los Angeles.

PEPE YÑIGUEZ BROADCASTER

Spanish-language broadcaster Pepe Yñiguez begins his 13th full season and 14th overall with the Dodgers. After covering special broadcasting assignments for the Dodgers in 1998, Yñiguez made his debut in 1999 as a full-time broadcaster while also assisting the club in its community and publicity efforts in Spanish-speaking areas. During past off seasons, Yñiguez has hosted "Central Deportiva," a weekly sports talk show airing Sunday afternoons on KWKW.

Since 1992, Yñiguez has broadcast numerous events for FOX Sports International, including every World Series from 1997-2005. In 1997, he called the All-Star Game at Jacobs Field in Cleveland alongside Tito Fuentes and Dennis Martinez. He has also broadcast the annual Caribbean Series, which pits the winners of the Mexican, Venezuelan, Puerto Rican and Dominican Republic Winter Leagues.

Yñiguez has worked on the Dodgers' Spanish-language broadcast since 1992 and hosted the Dodgers' pre and post-game shows, "Hablando con los Dodgers," in 1993. From 1993-95 he also served as the color commentator for Los Angeles Raiders broadcasts.

Yñiguez also calls Dodger games alongside Dodger coach Manny Mota for FSN PRIMETICKET on select dates throughout the season that offer Spanish-language commentary.

Yñiguez has two daughters – Karissa and Jaquely – and resides in La Habra, CA.



FERNANDO VALENZUELA BROADCASTER

2011 marks Fernando Valenzuela's ninth season as the color commentator for the Dodgers' Spanish-radio broadcasts, keeping Fernandomania alive and well in Los Angeles. Valenzuela, 49, offers insight from a 17-year big league career alongside Hall of Fame broadcaster Jaime Jarrin and Pepe Yñiguez during all Dodger home games and select road games.

In 2008, Valenzuela was honored by National Spanish-language television network Univision at the first annual "Premios Deportes" as one of the most prominent Hispanic athletes in history with a lifetime achievement award, "Premio Leyenda Deportiva." The awards show aired nationally on the network on July 20.

In February 2007, at its annual awards luncheon, the Southern California Sports Broadcasters Association named Valenzuela, a native of Navajoa, Sonora, Mexico, as the co-winner of the Foreign Language Broadcaster of the Year Award, marking his first such honor. In 2011, Valenzuela received his second Foreign Language Broadcaster of the Year Award.

On August 23, 2009, Valenzuela participated, along with Hall of Fame Broadcaster Jaime Jarrin and Pepe Yñiguez, in the first-ever regular season, dedicated, Spanish-language telecast of a Dodger game. Dodger broadcast partner PRIME TICKET aired the afternoon game against the Cubs on their sister network, FOX Sports West.

The 2011 season marks the 30th anniversary of Valenzuela's appearance on the scene as the emergency starter on Opening Day, 1981. He hurled a 2-0 shutout over the Houston Astros, one of five shutouts in his first eight starts that season. The improbable success near the beginning of his tremendous Major League career sparked "Fernandomania," a phenomenon which remains not only one of the most memorable periods in Dodger history but also in Southern California sports history.

While leading the Dodgers to the World Championship that season, he became the first player in Major League history to be named Rookie of the Year and win a Cy Young Award in the same season. He baffled hitters with his signature screwball and packed opposing stadiums throughout the National League, while also earning the All-Star Game start in Cleveland. He still holds the rookie record for consecutive scoreless innings (35.0), as he began his Major League career with a 10-0 record and a 0.40 ERA (4ER/90.0 IP) including his late season call-up in 1980.

In 17 big league seasons, Valenzuela compiled a 173-153 record and a 3.54 ERA with Los Angeles, California, Baltimore, Philadelphia, San Diego and St. Louis. He was named to the National League All-Star team for six consecutive seasons from 1981-1986 and in 1986 he won 20 games while also earning the Rawlings Gold Glove Award.

On June 29, 1990 Valenzuela reached the pinnacle of any pitcher's career, as he tossed a no-hitter while blanking the St. Louis Cardinals, 6-0.

The southpaw's success and longevity allowed him to etch his name in the Dodger record books, as he ranks among the top 10 all-time in nearly every pitching category in Los Angeles Dodger history including wins (141, 5th), complete games (107, 4th), strikeouts (1759, 4th), shutouts (29, 5th), starts (320, 4th) and innings pitched (2,348.2, 4th). Among the all-time franchise

leaders, Valenzuela is eighth in victories, fifth in strikeouts, seventh in shutouts and seventh in starts. His six Opening Day starts rank third in Los Angeles history to Don Drysdale and Don Sutton.

In 1986, Valenzuela completed 20 of his starts, the last big league pitcher to accomplish that feat. In fact, since 1980, only two pitchers have even reached 15 complete games in a year.

But far more important than the statistics he posted was the effect he had on baseball. When he made his Major League debut, he was just the seventh Mexican to play for the Dodgers and his impact on the game internationally is incalculable. He was inducted into the Hispanic Heritage Baseball Museum during pre-game ceremonies at Dodger Stadium on August 23, 2003 and in 2002, his first season eligible for Hall of Fame consideration, the left-hander garnered 31 votes.

In July 2006, he was inducted into Baseball Reliquary's Shrine of the Eternals in Pasadena. In the 2009 World Baseball Classic, Valenzuela was the pitching coach for Mexico.

In 2010, Valenzuela was the subject of an ESPN "30 for 30" film "Fernando Nation." The Dodgers supported the creation of the film directed by Cruz Angeles on the cultural impact of his career. "Fernando Nation" was added to ESPN's fall schedule and premiered on ESPN Deportes on October 24 and on ESPN on October 26. In 2011, Valenzuela made his first trip to the Dominican Republic to be inducted into the Latino Baseball Hall of Fame at Casa de Campo in La Romana.

Throughout his eight seasons as a broadcaster, Valenzuela has teamed up with the Dodgers to bring children's groups from the community to select home games as part of the Amigos de Fernando Program. As a result of this program and his continued community involvement, the Reviving Baseball in Innercities Program (RBI) honored Valenzuela with a Lifetime Achievement award at its annual banquet in February 2007. Valenzuela also hosted a Carne Asada Sunday event during the 2009 season. All proceeds from the event, at which fans got the chance to meet Fernando and enjoy carne asada with him, benefited the Dodgers Dream Foundation.

Valenzuela and his wife Linda have four children, Ricky, Fernando Jr., Linda and Maria Fernanda. He resides in Los Angeles.

DODGERS PARTICIPATE IN LONGEST NINE-INNING GAME

The Dodgers and San Francisco Giants played in the longest nine-inning game in Major League history - four hours, 27 minutes - on the night of Oct. 5, 2001 at Pacific Bell Park with the Dodgers earning the 11-10 victory. That mark was broken by the Yankees and Red Sox (4:45) on Aug. 18, 2006. The Dodger/Giant game had broken the previous mark of 4:22, which had been reached twice. During the historic contest, the Giants' Barry Bonds hit homers No. 71 and 72 to break the single-season home run mark. The Dodgers have also been involved in two of the other longest nine-inning games in big league history:

RULES OF INTEREST

Batting Champion Qualifications: a batting champion must have 502 or more actual plate appearances (the equivalent of 3.1 appearances for each of the 162 scheduled games). If, however, there is any player with fewer than the required number of plate appearances whose average would be the highest if he were charged with the required number of official at-bats, then the player shall be awarded the batting championship.

Blown Save Definition: when a relief pitcher enters a game in a save situation and departs or the game ends with the save situation no longer in effect because he has given up the lead, he is charged with a "blown save." If the save opportunity still exists when he leaves the game, he is not charged with a save opportunity. If the pitcher has not given up the lead when he leaves the game, though the save opportunity may no longer exist, he is not charged with a save opportunity.

Consecutive Streaks: a consecutive hitting streak shall not be terminated if the player's plate appearances (one or more) result in a base on balls, hit batsman, defensive interference or sacrifice bunt. A sacrifice fly shall terminate the streak.

Consecutive-Game Hitting Streaks: a consecutive-game hitting streak shall not be terminated if all the player's plate appearances (one or more) result in base on balls, hit batsman, defensive interference or sacrifice bunt. The streak shall terminate if the player has a sacrifice fly and no hit.

Consecutive-Game Playing Streak: a consecutive-game streak shall be extended if the player plays one-half inning on defense, or if he completes a time at bat by reaching base or being put out. A pinch-running appearance only shall not extend the streak, if an umpire ejects a player from a game before he can comply with the requirements of this rule, his streak shall continue.

Determining the Magic Number: determine the number of games yet to be played, add one, and then subtract the number of games ahead in the loss column of standings from the closest opponent.

Determining Earned Run Average: multiply the number of earned runs by nine; take the number and divide it by the number of innings pitched.

Determining Slugging Percentage: divide the total bases of all safe hits by the total times at bat (at-bats do not include walks, sacrifices, hit by pitcher, or times awarded first because of interference or obstruction).

Determining On-Base Percentage: add the total of hits, walks and hit by pitches and divide by the total of at-bats, walks, hit by pitches and sacrifice flies.

Determining Fielding Average: divide the total putouts and assists by the total of putouts, assists and errors.

Earned Runs Rule: the determination of earned run is as follows:

An earned run is a run for which the pitcher is held accountable. In determining earned-runs, the inning should be reconstructed without the errors and passed balls; and the benefit of doubt should always be given to the pitcher in determining which bases would have been reached with errorless play. Until 1969, the reliever could not be charged with an earned run if he entered the game after the side could have been retired but for an error, no matter how many runs he subsequently gave up in that inning. Now, runs scored by batters who reach base off the reliever are charged as earned on that pitcher's record. They are not, however, shared as earned against the team as a whole. Therefore, a discrepancy may occur between the total earned runs charged against a team and the sum total of the earned runs charged against in the individual pitchers of that team. (Rule 10.18 (i))

Earned Run Average Champion Qualifications: to win the earned-run average championship a pitcher must pitch at least as many innings as the number of games scheduled for each club in his league that season and have the lowest earned-run average.

Emergency (60-Day) Disabled List: minimum period of inactivity is 60 calendar days. No limit on number of players on list at one time but shall only be used when club is at a maximum of 40 players under control. Players on 60-day list do not count against 40-man roster. Players placed on this list after Aug. 1 shall remain there for the balance of the season. Day 1 begins after said player's last game appearance.

Fielding Championship Qualifications: the individual fielding champions shall be the fielders with the highest fielding average at each position, provided:

- (1) A catcher must have participated as a catcher at least one-half the number of games scheduled for each club in his league that season;
- (2) An infielder or outfielder must have participated at his position in at least two-thirds of the number of games scheduled for each club in his league that season;
- (3) A pitcher must have pitched at least as many innings as the number of games scheduled for each club in his league that season. **EXCEPTION:** if another pitcher has a fielding average as high or higher, and has handled more total chances in a lesser number of innings, he shall be the fielding champion.

First-Year Player Draft (Amateur Draft): Major League Clubs meet once a year for the purpose of drafting free agent player talent. Selection of a free agent entitles the club to the exclusive right of negotiation with that player. Approximate date of draft meetings: summer (early June). Clubs choose in inverse order of Major League standings, selecting free agents and previous draftees who had not signed contracts but had instead enrolled in four-year colleges and since had either completed his junior year or become 21 years of age. Each organization may select only one player for each of its major league, AAA and AA rosters but is not limited to the number of picks for the "A" level.

Free Agency:

- I. Six years of Major League Service is required to be eligible.
- II. A player has 15 days from the first day following the World Series to file for free agency.
- III. By Dec. 7, former club must offer to arbitrate or becomes ineligible to re-sign player. By Dec. 19, player must accept offer or on January 9 former club becomes ineligible to sign the player. (Ineligible club regains eligibility the following May 1).

Major League Waiver (ML): this type of revocable waiver is common as it is used to either option a player to a club's minor league affiliate or assign a player outright to another major league club from Aug. 1 to the end of the regular season. A player claimed on this type of waiver may be pulled back by the requesting club. This is known as a waiver withdrawal. Generally a club needs to secure this type of waiver in order to option a player if the date of the assignment is three or more years after the date the player first reported to a Major League club during a championship season. One year shall be deducted from the above three-year period for each season in which the player may have been charged with an option prior to first reporting to a Major League club during a championship season. A claimed player pulled back by the requesting club may not be assigned and cannot be placed on waivers again. When ML waivers are asked for a second time in the same period the request shall state that is irrevocable.

Regular (15-Day) Disabled List: the minimum period of inactivity is 15 calendar days. No limit on number of players that may be on at one time.

Rookie Qualification: a player shall be considered a rookie unless, during a previous season, he has (a) Exceeded 130 at-bats or 50 innings pitched in the Major Leagues; or (b) Accumulated more than 45 days on the active roster of a Major League club or clubs during the period of a 25-man limit (excluding time in military service or time on the disabled list).

Save Rule: a pitcher shall be credited with a save when he meets all three of the following conditions:

- (1) He is the finishing pitcher in a game won by his club, and
- (2) He is not the winning pitcher, and
- (3) He qualifies under one of the following conditions:
 - a) He enters the game with a lead of no more than three runs and pitcher for at least one inning,
 - b) He enters the game regardless of the count, with the potential tying run either on base, at-bat, or on deck (that is, the potential tying run is either already on base or is one of the two first batsmen he faces), or
 - c) He pitches effectively for at least three innings.

Tough Save: the reliever comes into the game with the tying runs on base and saves the game. Example: reliever comes in with a 5-3 lead, two outs and the bases loaded in the ninth inning.

Trading Regulations: the trading deadline is July 31. Trades may be made with any other Major League club in the period from the end of the championship season through July 31 (5:00 p.m.) without waivers. Waivers are required, however:

1. If the assignment is to another major league club; from August 1 and ending at 5 p.m. EDT the day after the end of the season.
2. If assignment is to a minor league club, with right of recall, after acquiring three years of major league service; at any time during the year.
3. If assigned to a minor league club without right of recall, after acquiring three years service; at any time during the year.
4. If assigned to a minor league club, without right of recall, at any time prior to acquiring three years of service, special waivers are required between Sept. 1 and the opening of the following season. If player is claimed, request may be withdrawn. If no claims are made, club has seven-day period in which to make assignment to minor leagues.

Unconditional Release Waiver (UR): this irrevocable waiver is used for the purpose of an unconditional release of a player. At the time of the request the player shall be removed from all player limits. A player may be informed of the club intention to release him on a weekend, but the actual waiver process won't begin until the following business day. During the time a player is on an unexpired waiver request bulletin he may discuss employment with other clubs but may not contract with another club. If the player has been claimed, he must be informed the end of the two-day period that his contract has been claimed. The player has five days from the time he was notified of the claim to either accept the assignment or terminate his contract. If the player terminates his contract, he forfeits termination pay. Termination pay may vary.

Waiver Rules: a permission granted from all 30 clubs to assign a Major League player's contract to another Major League team or a minor league affiliate. Such permission is granted only for a specific period of time. The actual request is filed through the Commissioner's Office and is not disclosed to the public until the contract is rewarded.

Winning Pitcher: the starting pitcher will be credited with the win only if the pitcher has pitched at least five complete innings and his team not only is in the lead when he is replaced, but remains in the lead for the remainder of the game. **EXCEPTION:** the "must-pitch-five-complete" rule in respect to the starting pitcher shall be in effect for all games of six or more innings. In a five-inning game, credit the starting pitcher with a game won only if he has pitched at least four complete innings and his team not only is in the lead when he is replaced, but remains in the lead the remainder of the game. When the starting pitcher does not meet the preceding criteria and more than one relief pitcher is used, the victory shall be awarded on the following basis:

- (1) When, during the tenure of the starting pitcher, the winning team assumes the lead and maintains it to the finish of the game, credit the victory to the relief pitcher judged by the official scorer to have been the most effective.
- (2) Whenever the score is tied, the game becomes a new contest insofar as the winning and losing pitcher is concerned.
- (3) Once the opposing team assumes the lead, all pitchers who have pitched up to that point are excluded from being credited with the victory except the current pitcher.
- (4) The winning relief pitcher shall be the one who is the pitcher of record when his team assumes the lead and maintains it to the finish of the game. **EXCEPTION:** do not credit a victory to a relief pitcher who is ineffective in a brief appearance, when a succeeding relief pitcher pitches effectively in helping his team maintain the lead. In such cases, credit the succeeding relief pitcher with the victory.

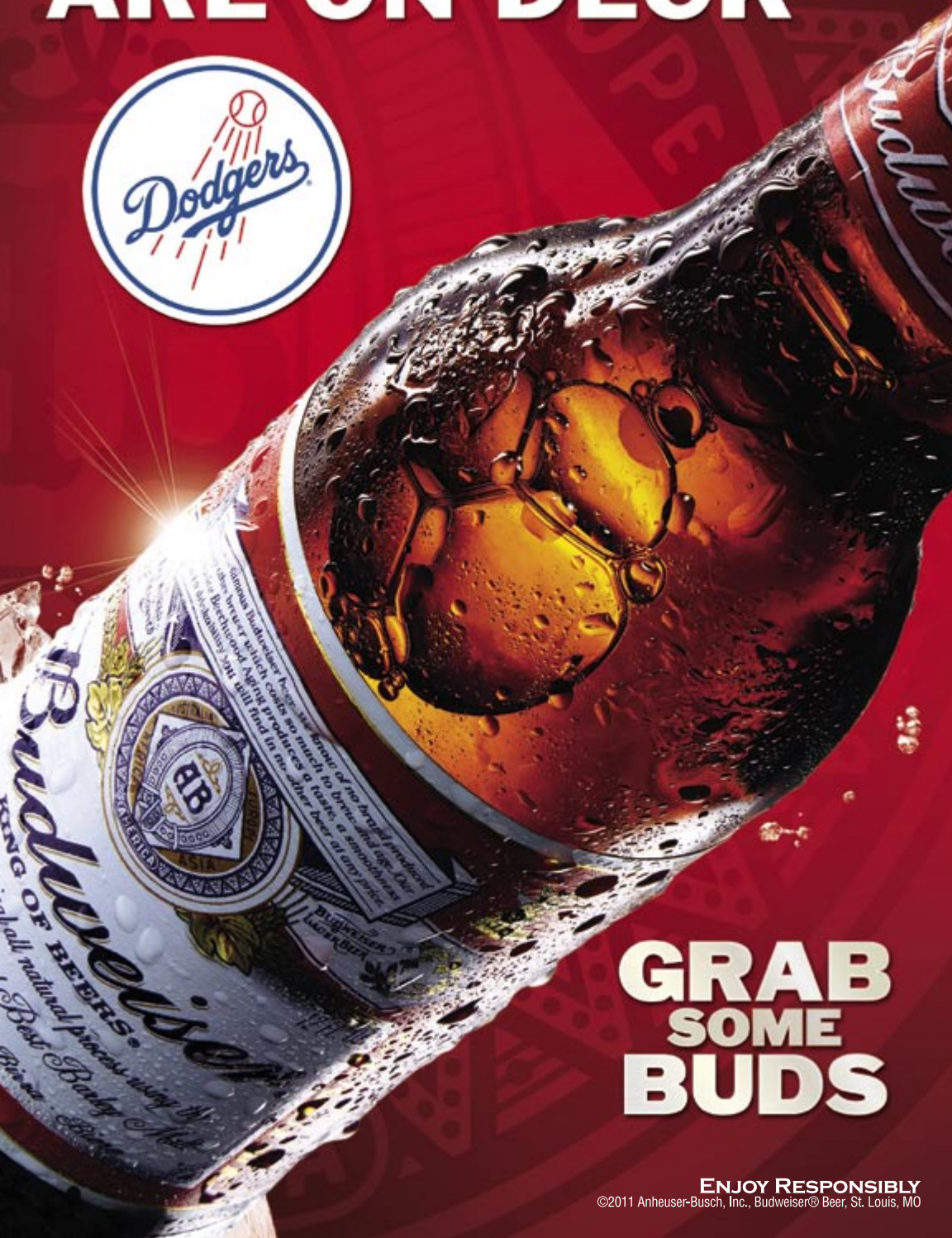
