



The 2014 Cubs season marks the 100th anniversary of Wrigley Field's inaugural campaign in 1914, when it was known as Weeghman Park and hosted the Federal League's Chicago Federals ... this marks the 99th season the Cubs have called Wrigley Field home ... Wrigley Field is the second-oldest ballpark in the major leagues, behind Boston's Fenway Park (1912).

- © The Friendly Confines has been the location of such historic moments as:
 - Babe Ruth's "called shot," when Ruth allegedly pointed to a bleacher location during Game 3 of the 1932 World Series ... Ruth then hit Charlie Root's next pitch for a homer.
 - Gabby Hartnett's famous "Homer in the Gloamin'" September 28, 1938, off Pittsburgh's Mace Brown.
 - The great May 2, 1917, pitching duel between Jim "Hippo" Vaughn and the Reds Fred Toney ... both Vaughn and Toney threw no-hitters for 9.0 innings before Cincinnati's Jim Thorpe (of Olympic fame) drove in the only run in the 10th inning ... Toney finished with a no-hitter.
 - Ernie Banks' 500th career home run May 12, 1970, vs. Atlanta's Pat Jarvis.
 - Pete Rose's 4,191st career hit, which tied him with Ty Cobb for the most hits in baseball history ... Rose singled off Reggie Patterson September 8, 1985.
 - Kerry Wood's 20-strikeout affair in 1998.
 - Sammy Sosa's 60th home runs in 1998, 1999 and 2001.
 - Greg Maddux's 3,000th career strikeout July 26, 2005.
 - Tom Glavine's 300th career victory August 5, 2007.
 - The 1947, 1962 and 1990 All-Star Games.

Originally known as Weeghman Park, Wrigley Field was built on the grounds once occupied by a seminary.

- © Weeghman Park was the home of Chicago's entry into the Federal League and was the property of Charles H. Weeghman ... the club was known as both the Federals and the Whales.
- © The cost of building Weeghman Park, which had a seating capacity of 14,000, was estimated at \$250,000 ... the infield and outfield consisted of more than 4,000 yards of soil and four acres of bluegrass.
- © The first major league game at the ballpark took place April 23, 1914, with the Federals defeating Kansas City 9-1 ... the first homer in ballpark history was hit by Federals catcher Art Wilson - a two-run shot in the second inning off Kansas City's Chief Johnson.
- © When the Federal League folded for financial reasons after the 1915 campaign, Weeghman purchased the Cubs from the Taft family of Cincinnati and moved the club to the two-year-old ballpark at the corners of Clark and Addison streets.
- © The first National League game at the ballpark was played April 20, 1916, when the Cubs beat the Cincinnati Reds 7-6 in 11 innings ... a bear cub was in attendance at the game.
- © The park became known as Cubs Park in 1919, following the resignation of Charles Weeghman as team president at the December 1918 board of Directors meeting - shortly after William Wrigley Jr. had assumed the title as largest stockholder in the club ... in 1926, with Mr. Wrigley owning more than 50 percent of the team stock and having purchased the land of the park in 1924, the field was renamed Wrigley Field.

The original vines were purchased and planted by Bill Veeck in September 1937 ... Veeck strung bittersweet from the top of the wall to the bottom, then planted the ivy at the base of the wall.

- © Ernie Banks' uniform number (14) is imprinted on the flag which flies from atop the left field foul pole, directly above Ron Santo's No. 10 and Fergie Jenkins' No. 31 ... Ryne Sandberg's No. 23, Billy Williams' No. 26 and Greg Maddux' No. 31 fly from the right field foul pole.

The Wrigley Field bleachers and scoreboard were constructed in 1937 when the outfield area was renovated to provide improved and expanded seating ... the original scoreboard remains intact.

- © The score-by-innings and the pitchers' numbers are changed by hand ... the numbers signaling batter, ball, strike and out, along with "H" and "E" - to signify hit and error - are eyelets.
- © No batted ball has ever hit the center field scoreboard ... two baseballs barely missed - a homer hit onto Sheffield Avenue (right-center) by Bill Nicholson in 1948, and one hit by Roberto Clemente onto Waveland Avenue (left-center) in 1959.
- © One of the traditions of Wrigley Field is the flying of a flag bearing a "W" or an "L" atop the scoreboard after a game ... a white flag with a blue "W" indicates a victory; a blue flag with a white "L" denotes a loss.

Wrigley Field added lights in 1988.

- © The first night game took place August 8 against Philadelphia, with Rick Sutcliffe on the mound, but was rained out in the fourth inning.
- © The first official night game occurred August 9 vs. New York, when the Cubs defeated the Mets 6-4.
- © In 2014, Wrigley Field will celebrate its 27th year of night baseball.
 - The Cubs entered the 2014 season having played 538 home night contests (going 266-272).

Wrigley Field has been the site of numerous construction projects since 2005.

- © Following the 2005 season, the Cubs expanded the bleachers, adding a restaurant in the batter's eye and a window to Sheffield Avenue in right field.
- © In the winter of 2007, Wrigley underwent a major field renovation project to remove the field's crown, install an intricate drainage system and create a new playing surface.
- © The beautification of the Wrigley Field campus also included the installation of personalized pavers beginning near the corner of Sheffield and Addison, running down Addison Street towards Clark Street and the Wrigley Field marquee.
- © Prior to the 2010 season, the back of the centerfield scoreboard was fully renovated for the first time since it was installed in 1937 ... restrooms were remodeled and fitted with new fixtures, a new viewing plaza was created adjacent to the indoor batting cage to provide fans the opportunity to watch batting practice and the PNC Club was added to the mezzanine suites down the left field line.
- © Prior to the 2012 campaign, the right field bleachers were transformed to the Budweiser Patio ... the area provides fans with a rooftop experience inside the ballpark, and adds a 75-foot LED board just above the right field fence.

8/21/1954 — The Harlem Globetrotters beat the U.S. All-Stars, 57-51, in front of 14,000 fans.



Wrigley Field's center field scoreboard and outfield bleachers have been in existence since 1937.



1970 — The Cubs installed 42-inch baskets atop the outfield wall. The baskets were part of a crack-down on rowdy bleacher fans after several fans brawled with ushers and special police on Opening Day.



8/8/1988 — Rick Sutcliffe threw the first pitch vs. the Phillies in Wrigley Field's first-ever night contest ... the game would be postponed due to rain.



Ron Santo made his major league debut with the Cubs in 1960 (courtesy: National Baseball Hall of Fame).

1969 — Chicago finished with a 92-70 record, its most victories since 1945 (98 wins).

1984 — Wrigley Field saw its first post-season action since 1945 as the Cubs fell to the Padres in the NLCS, three-games-to-two. That season, a new 6,000 square foot Cubs clubhouse was built under the third base stands.

1963 — The Bears defeated the New York Giants, 14-10, to claim the NFL title before a crowd of 45,801.

1970 — The Chicago Bears final year at Wrigley Field ... the Bears first played at the Friendly Confines in 1921.

The Chicago Sting, of the North American Soccer League, used Wrigley for home games from 1978-1982 and 1984.

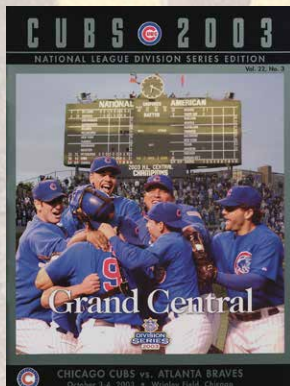
1989 — The Cubs advanced to the postseason for the second time in six seasons, but fell to the Giants in the NLCS, four-games-to-one.



1990 — Wrigley Field hosted Major League Baseball's All-Star Week, including the Old-Timer's Game and the Mid-Summer Classic.



A major multi-year restoration of Wrigley Field is planned, making the ballpark a destination for the next 100 years.



1998 — Chicago reached the postseason as the N.L. Wild Card, but was swept in the NLDS by Atlanta, three-games-to-none.

Winter, 2005 — The outfield bleachers were expanded and a new batters' eye suite was constructed for the 2006 season.

11/20/2010 — Wrigley Field hosted a Big Ten college football game between Northwestern and Illinois.

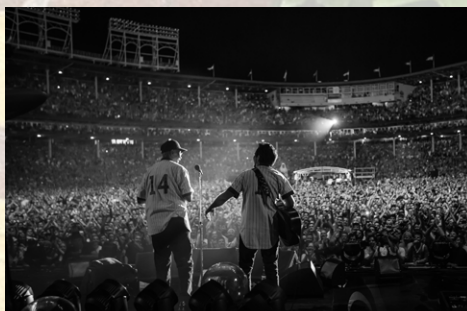

Cubs players, coaches, broadcasters and front office personnel embark on an annual two-day excursion visiting schools, neighborhoods and communities in the Chicago-land area.

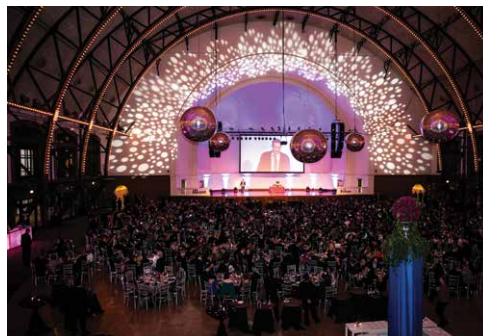
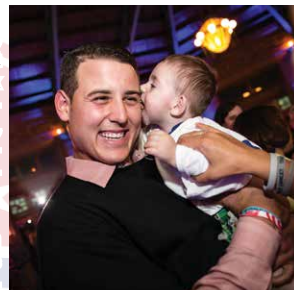

100 Gifts

In 2014, to celebrate the 100th year of Wrigley Field, Cubs Charities will recognize this historic celebration by giving gifts to the community through "100 Gifts of Service", a yearlong program featuring Cubs players and associates engaging in community service projects large and small.

Cubs Charities Signature Programs

In 2013, Cubs Charities launched signature programs to address the needs of Chicago's youth and to reflect our commitment to baseball, health, fitness and education in communities throughout Chicago.

Cubs Scholars

The Cubs Scholars Program launched in 2013 with an inaugural class of five scholars. The program aims to offer quality scholarship and financial contributions for Chicago inner-city high school students, coupled with a program designed to promote academic achievement and encourage post-secondary educational advancement.

The Cubs Scholars Program rewards both individual students and the non-profit organizations which support their development. It provides college scholarships to high achievers and grants to the nonprofit programs which nominate and support them.



Each of the five Cubs Scholars will receive a four-year college scholarship of \$5,000 per year upon their enrollment in a four-year college or university. In addition, the Cubs Scholars will participate in Cubs College Prep throughout their senior year of high school and into college. Cubs College Prep partners each Cubs Scholar with a Cubs Front Office Associate mentor who will work with them through their senior year and in the transition to college. This program of mentoring, leadership and continued support will offer an educational, motivational and social experience with events like career days with Cubs Associates, corporate partner career seminars and tours, motivational seminars with Cubs alumni and executives and social events such as Cubs games and on-field recognition ceremonies.

In addition to Cubs College Prep, Cubs Charities will sponsor each of the five Cubs Scholars in a one-year college preparation program offered by Chicago Scholars, an established mentoring program serving inner-city children. Students in the Chicago Scholars program have a 95% college graduation rate. The program includes seminars, workshops and mentoring designed to prepare each student for college success. Importantly, Chicago Scholars tracks students and offers established curriculum for measuring success and keeping students on track towards college graduation. Cubs Scholars will continue participating in Chicago Scholars' program throughout their four years of college to maximize their chances for college graduation.



Cubs on the Move Fitness Trolley

The Cubs and Cubs Charities are committed to improving the health of Chicago's inner city children. To help address the increasing obesity problem and to promote fitness overall, Cubs Charities developed the Cubs on the Move Fitness Trolley to promote a fitness plan and healthy eating campaign, and encourage kids to "Play Every Day." The mission of the Cubs on the Move Fitness Trolley is to get kids active and healthy.

In 2013, more than 300 children from four schools across the city of Chicago participated in the Cubs on the Move Fitness Trolley, which motivates youth to "Play Every Day." The students participated in group exercise led by Chicago Athletic Clubs and learned basic baseball skills through Cubs non-profit partner, Urban Initiatives at four select elementary schools: Tarkington School in Marquette Park, Gunsaulus School in Brighton Park, Otis Elementary in West Town and Lloyd School in Cragin using the Cubs Trolley for transportation, music and activation. Cubs on the Move Fitness Trolley participants received water from Aquafina and a nutritious snack every visit supplied by Testa Produce.

The Cubs on the Move Fitness Trolley brought together Cubs Associates, Cubs corporate partners, Cubs philanthropic partners, Cubs ownership and Cubs players to impact the health of kids in the Chicago community.

Kids who followed the Cubs on the Move Fitness Trolley plan and monitored their exercise schedule through weekly fitness logs were rewarded with a trip to a Cubs game and honored on Wrigley Field prior to a game.

Cubs Charities Diamond Project

A thriving community is a healthy community — one that offers youth the chance to play, supports the civic spirit of sportsmanship and embraces elders as coaches, mentors and allies. Local athletic fields make it happen.

The Cubs Charities Diamond Project will launch in 2014 in order to expand opportunities for children to play baseball, create or preserve green space in underserved neighborhoods and to foster a love of the game. Through the Diamond Project, Cubs Charities provides funds to non-profit, neighborhood-based organizations to support capital improvement projects that improve the quality, safety and accessibility of local baseball fields or indoor training facilities with the technical assistance of Local Initiatives Support Corporation (LISC) Chicago.

Cubs Charities Diamond Project grant resources fall into the following categories:

- Field Surface Grants: to help finance the resurfacing of baseball fields.
- Indoor Training Amenities: to equip gymnasiums or facilities with amenities that will allow for indoor play and baseball skills training during the offseason.
- General Field/Stadium Support: for capital projects not associated with the actual field.

Cubs Care

In 2013, Cubs Charities and Cubs Care, a fund of the McCormick Foundation, provided charitable grants of more than \$2.3 million to deserving area non-profit organizations that provide youth sports, health and fitness and youth education programming in Chicago.

Youth and Special Needs Baseball

McCormick Foundation's Cubs Care grants support organizations committed to bringing quality sports programming to the children of Chicago. Each year, more than 12,000 children and young adults participate in sports programs supported by Cubs Care grants.

Examples of programs funded through Cubs Care include:

Rookie League - A partnership with the Chicago Park District, Rookie League is an introductory league for six to 12 year olds. The league has grown to 96 locations with 521 teams across Chicago. Each year, more than 8,000 children from neighborhoods throughout the city can participate in the program free of charge.

Inner City Youth Baseball - Inner City Youth Baseball provides recreational activities for more than 360 kids, ages nine to 12, who live in Chicago Housing Authority developments and scattered site housing throughout Chicago. The program is operated in partnership with the Chicago Park District. It also helps encourage participation of African Americans in baseball by exposing African American youth to the game.

Reviving Baseball in the Inner Cities (RBI) - The Reviving Baseball in Inner Cities (RBI) program of the Union League Boys & Girls Clubs of Chicago reaches approximately 300 mostly minority teens ages 13 to 18 living in some of the poorest communities in Chicago. Grants typically cover all programs costs so the league can provide equipment, uniforms, and instruction at no cost to the participants. The Cubs RBI Junior All-Star team appeared in the RBI World Series in 2013.

RBI Girls' Softball - The RBI Girls' Softball program aims to expose girls, ages 11 through 14, to competitive league play. The program was piloted in 2010 with four teams and was so well received the league has now expanded to eight teams with more than 100 participants. A grant awarded by Cubs Care helped create more opportunities for young girls interested by softball.

Girls In The Game - Girls in the Game provides and promotes sports and fitness, health education and leadership development to enhance the overall well-being of girls. Girls in the Game uses sports to teach girls the important life lessons of teamwork, voice, leadership, confidence and healthy choices. Grants from Cubs Care help expand the organization's direct service and provide increased weekend and school break programming.

Special Recreation Programs - The Chicago Park District's Special Recreation programs are geared towards helping children and adults with special needs. These programs include Beep Baseball for the visually impaired, Buddy Baseball for the physically challenged, Deaf & Hard of Hearing Softball for the hearing impaired and Alternative Athletic Conference (AAC) softball for those with learning/behavioral problems.

Wheelchair Cubs - The Cubs support the RIC Caring for Kids program which provides introductory sports and recreation programs for children with physical disabilities in the greater Chicagoland area. RIC uses the Cubs Care grants to support its competitive wheelchair softball teams and fund two adaptive summer camps in 2013 to help promote independence.

African American Outreach

In addition to the team's efforts to increase the participation of African American youth in baseball through the team's RBI program, the Cubs are stepping up their efforts to strengthen their relationships in the African American community.

The Cubs hosted Jackie Robinson Day at Wrigley Field in conjunction with the movie premier of the Jackie Robinson biopic '42'. The Cubs also participated in Real Men Cook on the South side and the Bud Billiken back-to-school parade to promote education. The Cubs are ongoing sponsors of the Chicago Football Classic and Black Ensemble Theater. Last winter, the Cubs donated toys during the holidays on the South and West sides of Chicago to hundreds of children and families in need.



Hispanic Outreach

The Cubs relationships with charitable organizations and programs serving Latino communities throughout the area, and around the world, are growing. Last summer, the Cubs participated in Festival Cubano, one of the largest Hispanic festivals in Chicago. In September 2013, the Cubs celebrated Hispanic Heritage month by hosting a Roberto Clemente Day reception for Hispanic business, civic and community leaders across Chicago.

Dominican Republic

Last May, following the opening of the Cubs new baseball academy in the Dominican Republic, Cubs Charities contributed \$20,000 to build a new playground in Hato Viejo III.

Spring Training Ushers in Cubs Park and a Brand New Facility

Spring Training 2014 marks the debut of a new complex in Mesa, Ariz., that will house both the Cubs major league and minor league spring operations in February and March, and will be utilized year-round by the organization. The complex consists of Cubs Park, a brand-new major league facility that will host Cubs Spring Training games and numerous minor league contests throughout the year, and modern practice fields and facilities spread over 142 acres.

- © The complex is located on the former Riverview Golf Course, and is bordered by the 101 and 202 interchange in Mesa.
- © The complex replaces both Mesa's Fitch Park and "new" HoHoKam Stadium, which housed Cubs Spring Training operations from 1997-2013.
 - For comparison, the new 142-acre Spring Training complex is nearly twice as large as the 79 combined acres between Fitch Park and HoHoKam Stadium.
- © This marks the 36th consecutive Spring Training that the Cubs will spend in Mesa, dating to 1979 ... it is the organization's second stint in Mesa, as the Cubs trained there from 1952-65.
- © The Cubs new complex features 16 batting tunnels, including 12 indoors, and 22 pitching mounds. The former Fitch Park, where the Cubs began Spring Training prior to the start of the Catcus League schedule, had eight pitching mounds and four batting tunnels.
 - Additionally, the complex features Cubs Park, a 15,000-capacity stadium, as well as four practice fields, two major league fields and a half-sized field.
- © The 70,000-square foot main building houses Cubs offices, both major and minor league clubhouses, a 7,500-square foot workout facility, training facilities including a hydrotherapy room and a 120-seat theater.

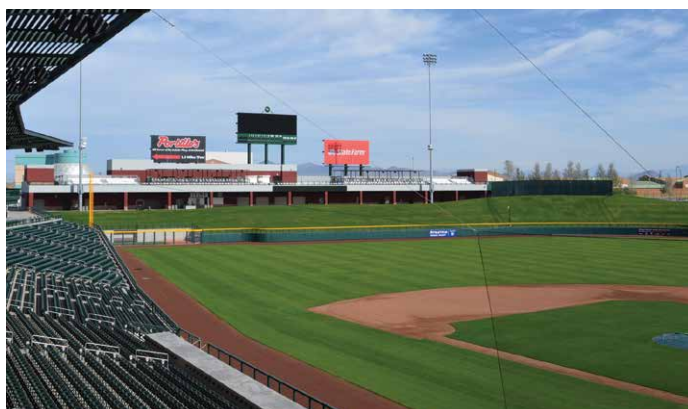

- © Five of **Baseball America's** top-six Cubs prospects heading into 2014 have been acquired in the past two years: No. 2 Kris Bryant (via 2013 draft), No. 3 C.J. Edwards (via trade), No. 4 Albert Almora (via 2012 draft), No. 5 Jorge Soler (signed in 2012) and No. 6 Pierce Johnson (via 2012 draft).
- © Acquired first baseman Anthony Rizzo from San Diego, along with minor league pitcher Zach Cates, January 6, 2012, for pitcher Andrew Cashner and outfielder Kyung-Min Na ... Rizzo was named the 2012 National League Rookie of the Month for July.

- © Since joining the Cubs, the organization has acquired first baseman Anthony Rizzo via trade, selected outfielder Albert Almora and infielder Kris Bryant with its first pick in the 2012 and 2013 drafts, respectively, signed free agent pitcher Edwin Jackson and signed Cuban outfielder Jorge Soler, a top prospect in the organization.

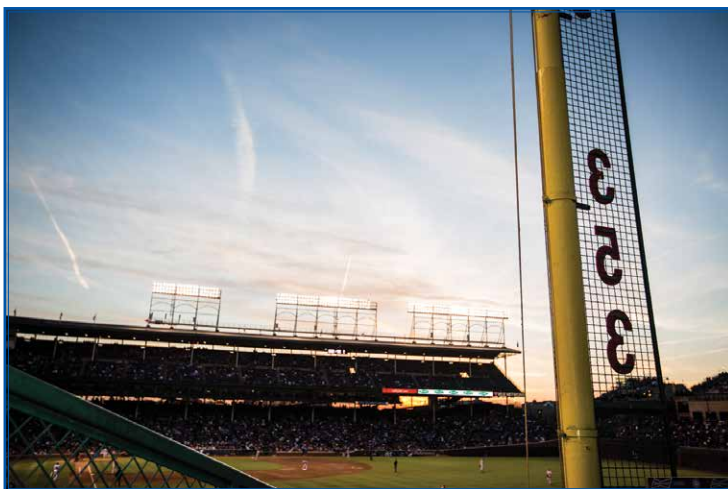

GAME DEFINITIONS

Night Game: Any game scheduled to start after 5 p.m. is considered a night game. If a game is scheduled to start at 5 p.m. and is delayed by rain or for any other reason, it is considered a day game. If a game is scheduled to start at 5:01 p.m., it is considered a night game.

Tw-Night Doubleheaders: Any twi-night doubleheader scheduled to start after 4 p.m. is considered two night games. If a twi-night doubleheader begins before 4 p.m., both contests are considered day games.

Tie Game: A regulation game that is called by the umpire-in-chief when both teams have the same number of runs is a tie game. Player performances are official and are entered in the records, but the game does not count in the league standings and may be rescheduled at a later date.

Suspended Game: A game becomes a suspended game if it has progressed far enough (4 1/2 or 5 innings) to be an official game and is stopped because of (1) a curfew imposed by law, or (2) a pre-arranged time limit, or (3) darkness when a local law prohibits turning on the lights or when lights are not available.

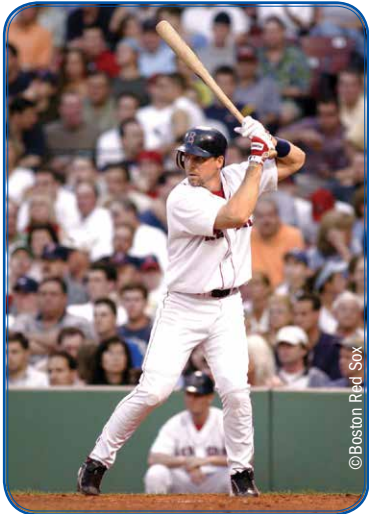

CUBS OWNERSHIP HISTORY

On August 21, 2009, the Ricketts family signed a definitive agreement with Tribune Company to acquire a 95 percent interest in the Chicago Cubs National League Baseball Club, Wrigley Field and Tribune Company's approximately 25 percent interest in Comcast SportsNet (CSN) in a transaction valued at \$845 million. The Ricketts family has management control of the joint venture as its 95 percent owner. Tribune retains a five-percent ownership interest.

On October 6, 2009, Major League Baseball owners unanimously approved the transaction by a vote of 29-0.

When the transaction closed October 27, 2009, the Ricketts family became only the eighth owner of the Chicago Cubs since the franchise's inception 133 years prior in 1876 when William A. Hulbert began as the club's first owner. Prior to the Ricketts family, the Cubs had only two owners in the last 90 years, including 62 years of family ownership starting in 1919 when William Wrigley, Jr. purchased the franchise. In 1932, Philip K. Wrigley took control upon his father's death. In 1977, William Wrigley took over the club following the passing of his father, Philip, before selling to the Tribune Company four years later in 1981.

- 1905Charles Murphy ... Murphy's \$125,000 purchase price was financed by Cincinnati Times-Star owner Charles Taft
- 1914Charles Taft ... Taft bought the Cubs from Charles Murphy
- 1916 Charles Weeghman ... a team owner in the defunct Federal League, Weeghman and nine others purchased the Cubs from Taft and moved the club to Weeghman Park at the corner of Clark and Addison
- 1919Wrigley family ... William Wrigley Jr. purchased control of the team from Weeghman and renamed Weeghman Park to Cubs Park. In 1926, the ballpark's name was changed to Wrigley Field. Philip K. Wrigley took over in 1932 and William Wrigley took control in 1977.
- 1981The Tribune Company ... the Tribune's purchase of the Cubs and the Friendly Confines from the Wrigley family ended the longest continuous operation of a franchise by the same family in one city.

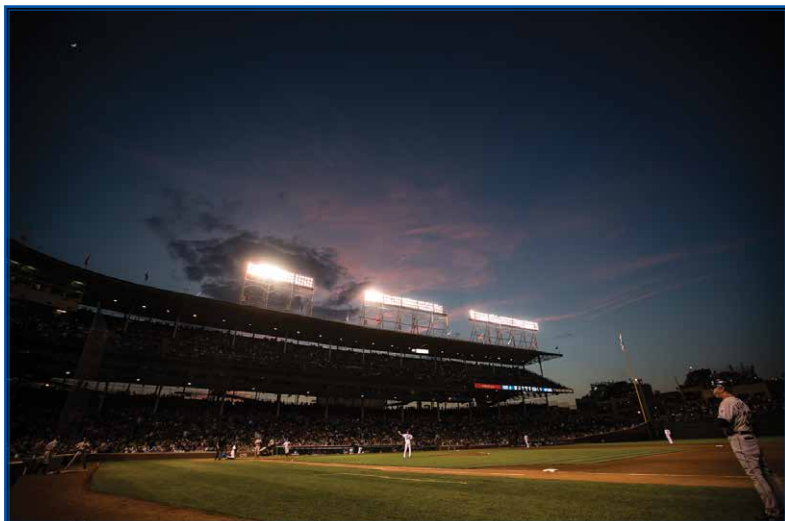

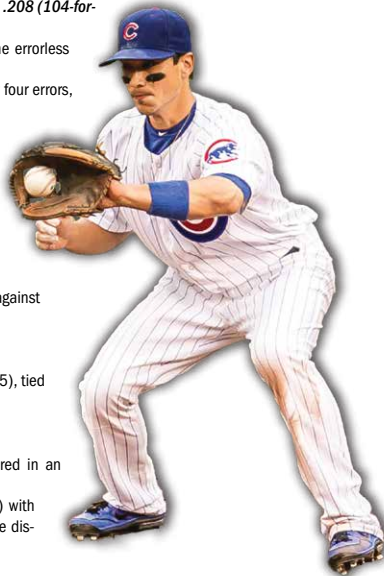

Darwin led Major League second basemen with a .993 fielding percentage (4 E/603 TC), and batted .208 (104-for-501) with a career-high tying seven home runs and 41 RBI in 141 games with Chicago.

- © Began the year with a 71-game errorless streak at second base and finished it with a 52-game errorless streak.
- © Ranked second among National League second basemen in defensive WAR (1.4) and made only four errors, the fewest by any everyday second baseman.
- © Ranked fourth in the N.L. with 603 total chances at second base ... ranked fifth in the Senior Circuit with 363 assists.
- © Recognized as the Cubs 2013 Wilson Defensive Player of the Year Award winner ... one player from each club is recognized.
- © Played 141 games at second base, making 139 starts.
- © Was the sixth-hardest player to strike out in the N.L., fanning once every 8.7 plate appearances.
- © Grounded into 22 double plays, most on the club and fifth in the National League.

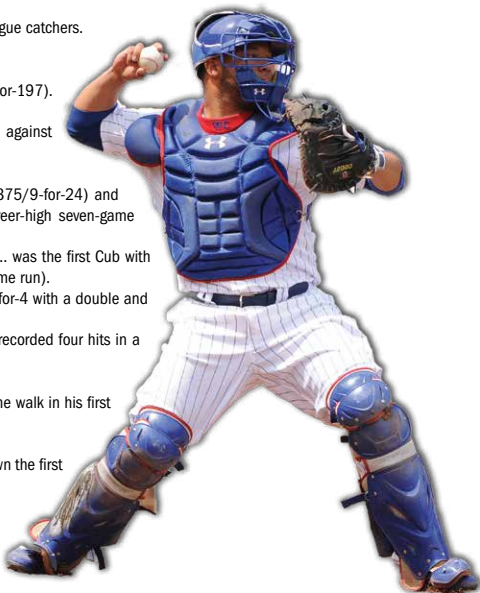

Castro: Facts and Information

Starlin enters his fourth full season with Chicago, having been named to the N.L. All-Star team in both 2011 and 2012 ... his 692 hits since debuting, May 7, 2010, lead the National League and rank fourth-most in the majors ... additionally, his 692 hits in his first four big league seasons (2010-13) are a modern day franchise record, surpassing Glenn Beckert's 691 hits in 1965-68.

- Ⓢ In 2012, became the first player in franchise history to play at shortstop in all 162 games in a season.
- Ⓢ On August 28, 2012, agreed to terms on a seven-year contract that includes a club option for an eighth season in 2020, covering all four arbitration seasons and at least three free agent seasons.
- Ⓢ With 10 home runs in both 2011 and 2013, and 14 long balls in 2012, became just the fourth Cubs shortstop since 1901 to record at least three 10-homer seasons.
 - Joins Ernie Banks (eight times while manning shortstop from 1954-61), Shawon Dunston (five times between 1986-95) and Jose Hernandez (three times between 1995-99).
 - Castro and Banks are the only Cubs shortstops to accomplish the feat three-straight seasons.
- Ⓢ At 21 years of age in 2011, became the franchise's youngest All-Star and the youngest player (and first 21-year-old) to ever lead the N.L. in hits (207).
 - Was 21 years, 188 days old when the 2011 campaign ended with him leading the N.L. with 207 hits ... prior to 2011, the youngest N.L. hits champ was the Cubs Charlie Hollocher in 1918, who with 161 hits was 22 years, 83 days old at the end of that season.
- Ⓢ Went 0-for-1 with two stolen bases in the 2011 All-Star Game at Chase Field in Arizona.
 - Became just the fifth player with two stolen bases in the All-Star Game and first since Kenny Lofton in 1996.
 - Was the first Cubs shortstop to participate in the All-Star Game since Shawon Dunston in 1990.
- Ⓢ Is the 10th major league player in the modern era (since 1900) to collect at least 200 hits at 21-years-old or younger.
- Ⓢ Overall, he became the 16th player in franchise history to reach the 200-hit mark ... marked the 22nd overall season of 200 or more hits in team history.
- Ⓢ Made the jump from Double-A to the majors in 2010.
- Ⓢ Finished 10th among N.L. qualifiers with a .300 batting average in 2010 ... was the first Cubs rookie to hit at least .300 and finish in the N.L. top-10 since Bill Madlock was fifth with a .313 mark in 1974.
- Ⓢ Was named to the 2009 All-Star Futures Game for the World Team ... went 1-for-1 with a run scored in the World's 7-5 win over the USA.
- Ⓢ Named the best prospect in Chicago's system by **Baseball America** heading into the 2010 campaign ... the publication named him the seventh-best prospect prior to the 2009 season.

Castro: 2013 Season

Starlin appeared in 161 games in his third full-season as the club's starting shortstop ... hit .245 (163-for-666) with 34 doubles, two triples, 10 home runs and 44 RBI ... set a career high, going 29-straight games without an error at shortstop from July 21-August 21.

- Ⓢ His day off, June 25, snapped a streak of 269-consecutive games played, as his previous off day was August 22, 2011 vs. Atlanta.
 - The 269-game streak is the franchise's longest since Sammy Sosa played in 388-straight games from 1998-2000.
- Ⓢ Batted .251 (125-for-498) off right-handers and .226 (38-for-168) off southpaws, an anomaly considering his career .297 mark vs. lefties.
- Ⓢ Had four game-winning RBI and 10 go-ahead RBI ... had 17 two-out RBI.
- Ⓢ Led the team with 44 multi-hit efforts, second-most among N.L. shortstops ... Milwaukee's Jean Segura had 47.
- Ⓢ Finished the campaign with a .967 fielding percentage (22 E/676 TC) at shortstop ... committed just eight errors in his final 85 games from June 26 through the end of the season, and his .979 fielding percentage in that stretch ranked fourth among N.L. shortstops.
- Ⓢ Was 2-for-4 with a stolen base on Opening Day in Pittsburgh ... first Cub with at least two hits and a steal on Opening Day since Corey Patterson did so Opening Day 2002 against Cincinnati.
- Ⓢ Set a single-season career high, and tied his career mark, with a 14-game hitting streak, April 6-22 ... he batted .317 (20-for-63) during the run that matched his 14-gamer that overlapped the 2011 and 2012 campaigns.
- Ⓢ Hit a walk-off RBI double against Sergio Romo, April 13 vs. the Giants, giving Chicago a 4-3 win ... hit his first homer of the season earlier in the game off Matt Cain.
- Ⓢ Collected the 100th double of his career, April 18 vs. Texas.
- Ⓢ After committing four errors in his first 16 games, had just one in his next 25 contests (102 TC), April 21-May 17.
- Ⓢ Batted leadoff for the first time on the season, May 10 in Washington ... finished 2-for-5 with a pair of doubles, an RBI and a run scored.
- Ⓢ July 21 in Colorado, tied his career high with four hits ... finished 4-for-5 with a double and a run scored.
- Ⓢ Moved to the leadoff position in the batting order, August 21, and remained there the rest of the season, batting .260 (40-for-154) in 40 games.

2012: Starlin was named to the National League All-Star team for the second-straight season, and became the first player in franchise history to play at shortstop in all 162 games in a season ... he set career marks with 12 triples, 14 home runs, 78 RBI, 36 walks and 25 stolen bases in his second full major league campaign.

- © Was the only player in the majors with at least 10 homers, 10 triples, 25 stolen bases and 75 RBI, and the first player to do so in the National League in five years (Philadelphia's Jimmy Rollins in 2007).
- © Is the first Cub since Sammy Sosa in 1995 to record at least 75 RBI and 25 stolen bases in the same season.
- © Is the first Cubs infielder to appear in all 162 games in a season since Hall of Famer Ron Santo did so in 1968 ... the 162 games played at shortstop are a franchise record.
- © His 161 starts at shortstop are a franchise record, surpassing the previous single-season mark of 158 starts at shortstop by Ivan Dejesus in 1978 and Don Kessinger in 1968.
- © His 78 RBI led major league shortstops and were the most by a Cubs shortstop since Ernie Banks drove in 80 runs in 1961.
- © His 12 triples made him one of just six Cubs in the last 50 years to reach that mark, and the first since Juan Pierre had 13 three-baggers in 2006.
- © Led the club with 51 multi-hit games, tied for ninth-most in the N.L.
- © Finished with a .964 fielding percentage (27 E/758 TC) at shortstop ... the 27 errors tied for the most in the majors with Pittsburgh's Pedro Alvarez.
- © Tied his career high with two stolen bases on both April 7 and April 8 vs. Washington ... turned the trick a third time, April 28 in Philadelphia.
- © Had two hits, April 8 vs. Washington, to extend his consecutive games reaching base safely streak to 43 contests dating to August 15, 2011 - that is the second-longest stretch by a Cub since 1918, surpassed only by Riggs Stephenson's 44-game streak in 1928.
 - The two hits on April 8 also gave him a career-high 14-game hitting streak dating to September 17, 2011, surpassing a 13-game run, August 29-September 12, 2011.
 - Both streaks would end, April 9 vs. Milwaukee, after an 0-for-5 night at the dish.
- © His 10 stolen bases in April were the most by a Cub in the first month of the season since Brian McRae had 12 steals in 1996.
- © Reached 500 career hits, September 7 in Pittsburgh, becoming only the 28th player in major league history to record his 500th career hit before turning 23-years-old, with the only other active player being New York's Alex Rodriguez.
 - Reached the milestone at 22 years, 167 days, the youngest to accomplish the feat since Robin Yount in 1977 at the age of 21 years, 297 days.
- © Twice tied his career high with four hits in a game: June 23 in Arizona and September 19 vs. Cincinnati.
- © Batted .306 (64-for-209) in his final 54 games dating to August 8.
- © Tied his career high with two doubles, October 2 vs. Houston.

2011: In his first full major league campaign, Starlin led the Senior Circuit, and was fourth in the majors, with 207 hits, and earned N.L. All-Star honors ... became the youngest All-Star in franchise history ... he recorded five hitting streaks of 10 or more games, the first Cub to do so since Hall of Famer Billy Williams in 1970.

- © His 207 hits were fifth-most by a 21-year-old (or younger) in the 111 years of modern major league history.
- © Reached base safely in 40-straight games to close out the season, breaking the 82-year-old club mark for a shortstop ... Cubs shortstop Woody English had owned the mark by reaching in 34-straight games in 1929.
 - Is the first Cub to reach safely in 40-straight games since Jerome Walton's 43-game streak in 1989.
- © Batted .307 on the season, sixth-best in the N.L.
- © Collected 57 multi-hit games, tied for the N.L. lead with Philadelphia's Hunter Pence, Los Angeles' Matt Kemp and New York's Jose Reyes.
- © Led the Senior Circuit with 674 at-bats ... his nine triples tied for fifth and his 291 total bases ranked ninth.
- © Batted .342 (53-for-155) vs. lefties, fourth-best in the N.L. ... hit .309 (107-for-346) on the road, sixth-best in the N.L.
- © Became the first Cub with eight triples prior to the All-Star break since Ryne Sandberg had 11 in 1984.
- © Tied his career high with four hits four times: April 16 vs. Colorado, April 23 vs. the Dodgers, May 11 vs. St. Louis and August 13 at Atlanta.

- © Had a then career-high 13-game hitting streak, August 29-September 12, batting .350 (21-for-60) during the run.
- © Scored a run in 10-straight games, July 30-August 9 ... is the first Cub to turn the trick since Mark DeRosa scored in 10-straight games, May 9-19, 2008.
- © Committed 29 errors, second-most in the majors behind Baltimore's Mark Reynolds (31).
- © Began the year as the youngest player in the major leagues.
- © Made his first career Opening Day start and went 3-for-5 with two runs scored vs. Pittsburgh, April 1.
- © Batted leadoff for the second time in his career, April 3 vs. Pittsburgh, and went 3-for-4 with two triples, a run scored and a walk ... previously hit leadoff August 8, 2010 vs. Cincinnati (0-for-4).
- © First player under the age of 22 to amass 10 hits in a team's first five games since Adrian Beltre did so at 21 years of age for the Dodgers in 2000.
- © Became just the third Cub since 1919 to collect at least two doubles and two triples in the team's first five games: Ron Santo in 1964 (2 2B, 2 3B) and Charlie Neal (3 2B, 2 3B).
- © Committed three errors in April 25's second inning vs. Colorado - was the first Cub to commit three miscues in an inning since Jaime Navarro, August 18, 1996 vs. Houston (third inning).
- © His 40 hits in April are second-most in Cubs history behind Mark Grace's 42 hits in April of 1996.
- © Had a then career-high 11-game hitting streak (20-for-44/.455) from June 16-27.
- © Collected his 200th hit of the season, September 23 in St. Louis, recording a single off Chris Carpenter to lead off the game.

2010: Starlin began the year at Double-A Tennessee, but was promoted to Chicago, May 7, and became the Cubs everyday shortstop ... he batted .300 (139-for-463) with 31 doubles, five triples, three homers and 41 RBI in 125 games for the big league club.

- © Was third among N.L. rookies in doubles and tied for third in multi-hit games (39) and triples ... was fourth with 139 hits.
- © Batted .340 (81-for-238) at home, the fourth-best average in the N.L. ... his .339 average (43-for-127) against lefties was tied for fourth.
- © His 39 multi-hit efforts were the most by a Cubs rookie since Mark Grace had 41 in 1988.
- © Became the first Cubs rookie to record six-straight multi-hit games (August 29-September 4) since Don Johnson in 1944.
- © Collected 41 hits in August, the most for a Cubs rookie in any month since Ernie Banks had 43 hits in August of 1954.
- © Had a .950 fielding percentage (27 E/544 TC) in 123 games at shortstop ... his 27 errors were second-most among shortstops, behind fellow rookie Ian Desmond of Washington (34 E).
- © Selected from Double-A Tennessee May 7, and that night in Cincinnati went 2-for-5 with a three-run homer in his first career plate appearance.
 - Added a three-run triple en route to a six-RBI game, the most RBI recorded by a player in his first major league contest.
- © At 20 years and 44 days, was the youngest Cub to make his major league debut since Oscar Gamble, August 27, 1969, at the age of 19 years, 250 days.
 - Became the third-youngest player in big league history to hit a homer in his first career at-bat, and the youngest in the last 60 years ... he trailed only Whitey Lockman (18 years old in 1945) and Ted Tappe (19 years old in 1950).
- © Also became the youngest Cub ever to make his debut at shortstop, surpassing Marty Shay at 20 years, 144 days on September 16, 1916.
- © July 15 vs. Philadelphia, recorded a straight-steal of home in the second inning, becoming the first Cub with a straight-steal of home since Brian McRae, April 13, 1996 at San Francisco.
- © From July 10 through the end of the season, hit .325 (89-for-274) for the fourth-best average in the N.L.
- © Knocked in a run in five-straight games, July 20-25, becoming the first Cubs rookie to do so since Mike Fontenot, June 25-30, 2007.
- © Collected a career-best four hits three times: August 4 vs. Milwaukee, August 12 in San Francisco and August 22 vs. Atlanta.

Kyuji begins his second season with the Cubs after his first campaign was cut short due to an injured right elbow that necessitated Tommy John surgery in June ... prior to joining the Cubs, he pitched 12 seasons with the Hanshin Tigers in Japan's Central League.

- Ⓢ Appeared in 12 games for Chicago, going 1-1 with two saves and a 5.25 ERA (7 ER/12.0 IP), walking two and striking out 14.
- Ⓢ Named the Cubs ninth-best prospect heading into the 2013 season by **Baseball America**.

CUBS FROM JAPAN

The Cubs have had four Japanese-born players in their 138-season history: outfielders Kosuke Fukudome and So Taguchi, right-handed pitcher Kyuji Fujikawa and left-handed pitcher Hisanori Takahashi.

Fukudome made his Cubs debut, March 31, 2008 vs. Milwaukee (went 3-for-3 with a double, home run and three RBI), becoming the first Japanese-born Cub. He went on to appear in 513 games for Chicago, spanning four seasons from 2008-11. Taguchi played in six games for Chicago during the 2009 campaign.

Fujikawa pitched in 12 games for Chicago in 2013 before missing the season's final four months due to an elbow injury that necessitated Tommy John surgery. Takahashi made the 2013 club out of Spring Training after signing a minor league deal with the organization. He pitched in three April games for Chicago before he was designated for assignment.

At least three other Japanese-born major leaguers have spent time in the Cubs system through 2013, but did not play in a big league game as a Chicago Cub. Steven Randolph (born in Okinawa) was acquired by the Cubs from the Diamondbacks in mid-January 2005, but was released in April of that year. Keith McDonald (born in Kokosuka) signed a minor league contract with the Cubs in November 2002, he played six games for the Cardinals in 2000 and 2001. Hideo Nomo was in the Cubs minor league system for three weeks in April 1999. Ken Kadokura was signed to a minor league contract with an invitation to Spring Training in 2009, but did not appear with the Cubs in the regular season.

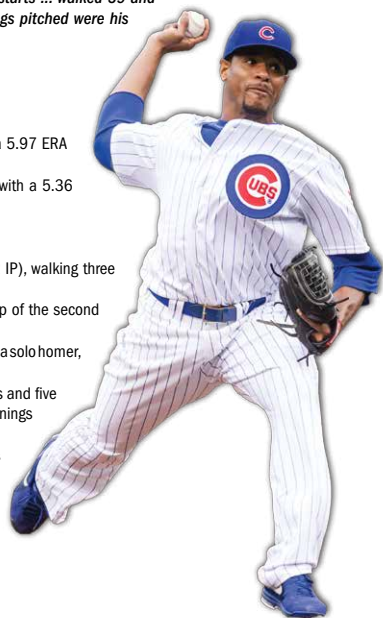

In his first season on the Northside, Edwin went 8-18 with a 4.98 ERA (97 ER/175.1 IP) in 31 starts ... walked 59 and struck out 135 ... marked his eighth-straight season with at least 30 starts, but his 175.1 innings pitched were his fewest since 2007 with Tampa Bay (161.0 IP).

- Ⓢ Led the majors with 18 losses ... the Cubs were 10-21 in his 31 starts.
- Ⓢ Allowed just 16 home runs in 175.1 innings pitched.
- Ⓢ Walked two or fewer batters in 21 of 31 starts, including five no-walk outings.
- Ⓢ Posted 14 quality starts, ranking third on the team (Travis Wood 24; Jeff Samardzija 19).

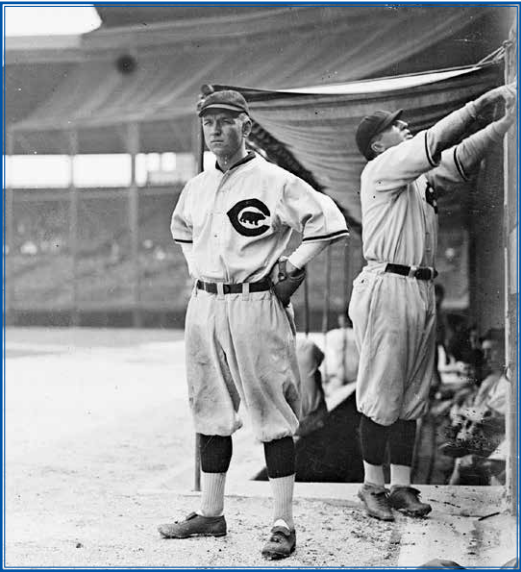

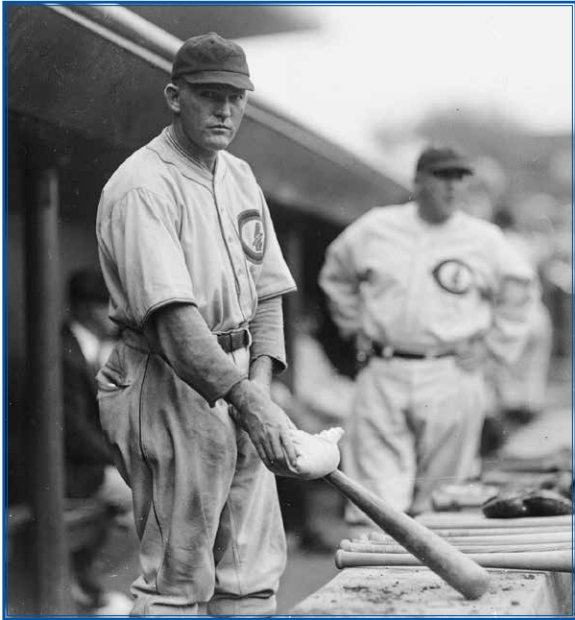

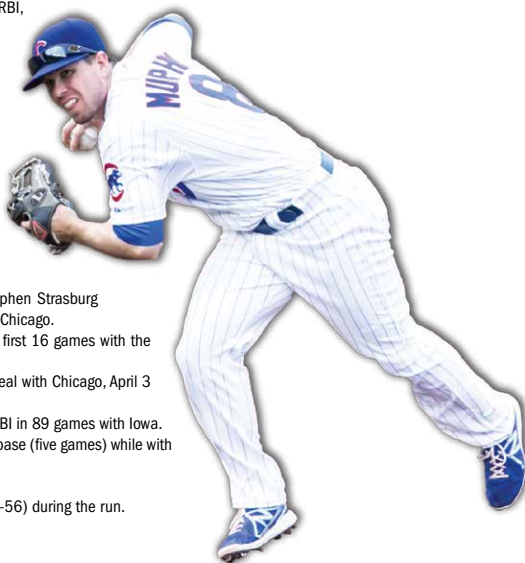

CUBS OWNERSHIP HISTORY

On August 21, 2009, the Ricketts family signed a definitive agreement with Tribune Company to acquire a 95 percent interest in the Chicago Cubs National League Baseball Club, Wrigley Field and Tribune Company's approximately 25 percent interest in Comcast SportsNet (CSN) in a transaction valued at \$845 million. The Ricketts family has management control of the joint venture as its 95 percent owner.

Tribune retains a five-percent ownership interest.

On October 6, 2009, Major League Baseball owners unanimously approved the transaction by a vote of 29-0.

When the transaction closed October 27, 2009, the Ricketts family became only the eighth owner of the Chicago Cubs since the franchise's inception 133 years prior in 1876 when William A. Hulbert began as the club's first owner. Prior to the Ricketts family, the Cubs had only two owners in the last 90 years, including 62 years of family ownership starting in 1919 when William Wrigley, Jr. purchased the franchise. In 1932, Philip K. Wrigley took control upon his father's death. In 1977, William Wrigley took over the club following the passing of his father, Philip, before selling to the Tribune Company four years later in 1981.

1876William A. Hulbert ... owned the Chicago White Stockings and became one of eight charter members of the National League

1882Albert Spalding and John Walsh ... Spalding – the former player, sporting goods tycoon and team president – and Walsh took over after the death of William A. Hulbert

1905Charles Murphy ... Murphy's \$125,000 purchase price was financed by Cincinnati Times-Star owner Charles Taft

1914Charles Taft ... Taft bought the Cubs from Charles Murphy

1916Charles Weeghman ... a team owner in the defunct Federal League, Weeghman and nine others purchased the Cubs from Taft and moved the club to Weeghman Park at the corner of Clark and Addison

1919Wrigley family ... William Wrigley Jr. purchased control of the team from Weeghman and renamed Weeghman Park to Cubs Park. In 1926, the ballpark's name was changed to Wrigley Field. Philip K. Wrigley took over in 1932 and William Wrigley took control in 1977.

1981The Tribune Company ... the Tribune's purchase of the Cubs and the Friendly Confines from the Wrigley family ended the longest continuous operation of a franchise by the same family in one city.

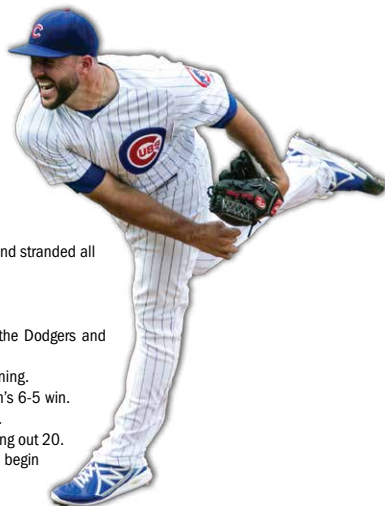

RECORD BREAKERS AT THE GATES

In 2008, the Chicago Cubs set a single-season attendance record by drawing 3,300,200 fans at Wrigley Field, eclipsing the previous record mark of 3,252,462 set in 2007.

In addition to setting a Wrigley Field record, the 3,300,200 is the largest single-season attendance mark for any franchise or venue in the history of the city of Chicago.

The Cubs reached three million fans on September 2, faster than any other season in franchise history, as that night's crowd of 39,846 vs. the Houston Astros brought the Cubs and Wrigley Field beyond the three million mark in the club's 74th home date of 2008, surpassing the previous record of 75 home dates to three million fans in 2007.

ERNIE BANKS — MR. CUB



For 19 seasons, Ernie Banks delighted Wrigley Field fans with his long home runs and cheerful disposition. He hit 512 home runs, surpassing the 40-roundtrippers mark five times. He hit 277 of his homers as a shortstop – a National League record.

He also holds the N.L. single-season mark for homers by a shortstop (47 in 1958). The 14-time All-Star won the N.L. Most Valuable Player Award following both the 1958 and 1959 campaigns.

Banks, whose No. 14 flies from the left field foul pole at Wrigley Field, was elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1977.

He was voted to Major League Baseball's All-Century team in 1999.

Born on January 31, 1931 in Dallas, Texas, Banks played for the Cubs from 1953-71 and served as a coach from 1967-73. He made his major league debut September 17, 1953.

Following Whitey Lockman's ejection on May 8, 1973, coach Ernie Banks took over the reins as acting manager becoming the first African-American to manage a major league team.

In 2008, Banks was honored by the Cubs with a statue at Wrigley Field, commemorating his illustrious career.

In 2013, Banks was presented with the Presidential Medal of Freedom, an award given to those who have made "an especially meritorious contribution to the security or national interests of the United States, world peace, cultural or other significant public or private endeavors."

It is the highest civilian award of the United States.

TRIPLE PLAYS — LAST TIME IT HAPPENED

The Cubs have been involved in 76 triple plays since 1876, turning 40 and hitting into 36. The Cubs have hit into the last three triple plays they've been involved in (most recently May 14, 2000, at Montreal).

On May 10, 1997, in San Francisco, the Cubs turned their last triple play. The Giants' Stan Javier faced Amaury Telemaco in the fifth inning with Kirk Rueter on second base and Darryl Hamilton on first. Javier hit a fly ball to short center field, with second base umpire Bob Davidson invoking the infield fly rule. The ball dropped in, and both baserunners were thrown out attempting to advance (center fielder Brian McRae to third baseman Jose Hernandez to second baseman Ryne Sandberg).

The last triple play turned at Wrigley Field was by San Francisco on May 8, 1998 (first baseman Charlie Hayes to shortstop Rich Aurilia). The last time the Cubs turned a triple play at The Friendly Confines occurred June 2, 1983, vs. Pittsburgh — when Pirates pitcher Rick Rhoden hit into an around-the-horn triple killing (third baseman Ron Cey to second baseman Ryne Sandberg to first baseman Bill Buckner).

On May 30, 1927, shortstop Jimmy Cooney turned the only unassisted triple play in Cubs history. In the fourth inning of the Cubs' game in Pittsburgh, Cooney caught Paul Waner's line drive, stepped on second base to retire Lloyd Waner, then tagged Clyde Barnhart off first.

THERE'S NO PLACE LIKE HOME

The Cubs won 16 consecutive games Jon Lieber started at Wrigley Field from May 24, 2001-May 6, 2002. He had a personal 13-0 mark over the 16-start span.

The stretch is tied for the longest winning span for a pitcher at Wrigley Field since the ballpark was built in 1914. The club previously won 16-straight. Lon Warneke starts May 27, 1932-April 18, 1933 (Warneke went 13-0 at home over the span).

The ballpark record for consecutive victories by an individual is 15, set by Bill Lee from September 7, 1935-August 26, 1936 (17 starts).

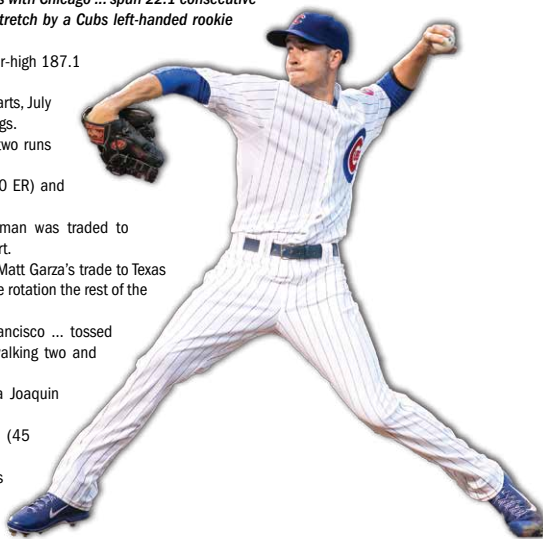

- Ⓢ Is 4-9 with a 4.69 ERA (50 ER/96.0 IP) in 20 major league starts dating to 2012 ... was 2-6 with a 3.93 ERA (29 ER/66.1 IP) in 13 starts last year.
 - ♦ Had 22.1 consecutive scoreless innings on the road from July 27-September 12, 2013, the longest stretch by a Cubs left-handed rookie pitcher in club history.

Russell: Facts and Information

James has spent nearly all of the last four seasons in Chicago's bullpen after he made his big league debut in 2010 ... he was selected by the organization in the 14th round of the 2007 draft, and his 215 games pitched since the start of 2011 lead all left-handers and rank seventh-most in the majors.

- Owns a 3.47 ERA (85 ER/220.1 IP) and a 10-9 record in 267 major league relief outings ... made five starts in 2011, going 0-5 with a 9.33 ERA (19 ER/18.1 IP).
- His 57 appearances for Chicago in 2010 made him just the eighth Cubs rookie southpaw to reach 50 outings in a campaign.
- The lefty went 11-16 with a 4.68 ERA (130 ER/250.0 IP) in 71 minor league games (40 starts).

- Participated in the 2011-13 Cubs Caravans.

Russell: 2013 Season

James led the Cubs, and ranked tied for 10th in the N.L., with 74 relief appearances in his fourth season with Chicago ... went 1-6 with a 3.59 ERA (21 ER/52.2 IP) and a team-leading 19 holds.

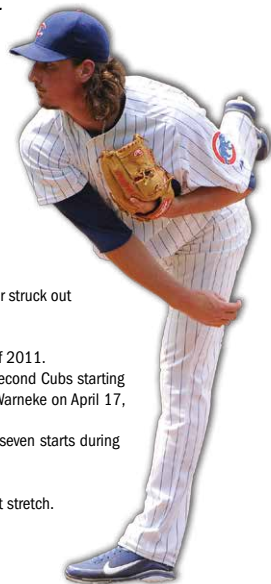

Jeff set career marks with 33 starts, 213.2 innings pitched and 214 strikeouts in his second full season in the starting rotation for Chicago ... is the first Cubs pitcher to reach both 200 strikeouts and 200 innings since Ryan Dempster in 2010 (208 strikeouts, 215.1 innings) ... went 8-13 with two complete games, one shutout and a 4.34 ERA (103 ER/213.2 IP) in his 33 outings.

- © His 19 quality starts ranked second on the club (Travis Wood, 24).
- © Spun two complete games, including his first career shutout, a two-hit effort, May 27 at the White Sox ... also went the distance, August 19 vs. Washington.
- © Named N.L. Co-Player of the Week with Miami's Jose Fernandez for the period ending August 26 ... was 2-0 with a complete game and a 1.59 ERA (3 ER/17.0 IP) in two starts ... walked two and struck out 12.

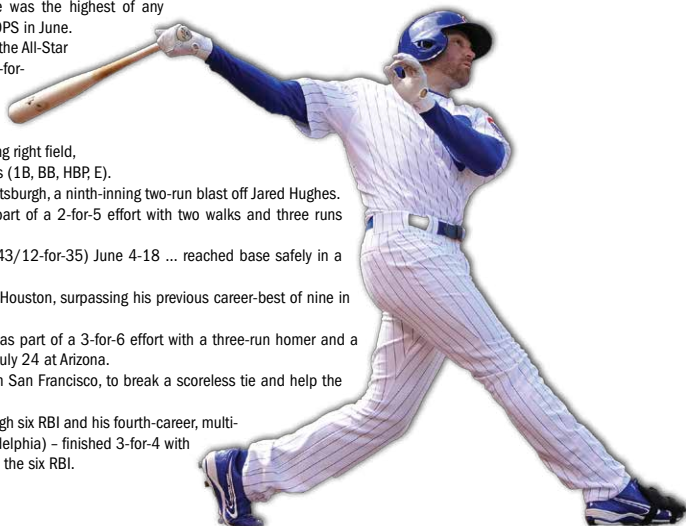

Special Waivers are irrevocable. They are required for a major league club to outright a player to a minor league club from September 1 until the 30th day of the following season.

Outright Waivers are irrevocable. They are required for a major league club to outright a player to a minor league club from the 31st day of the regular season until August 31.

Unconditional Release Waivers can be secured at any point during the year.

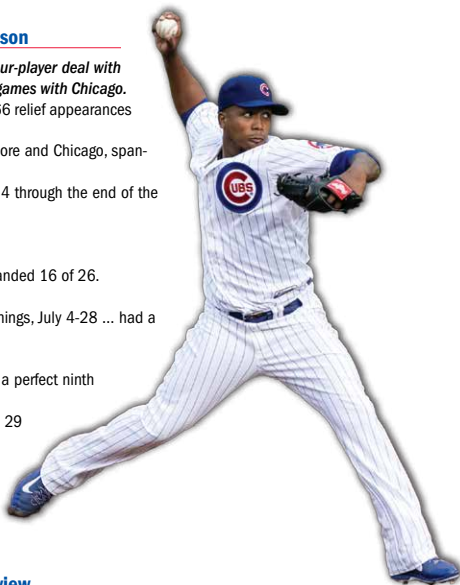

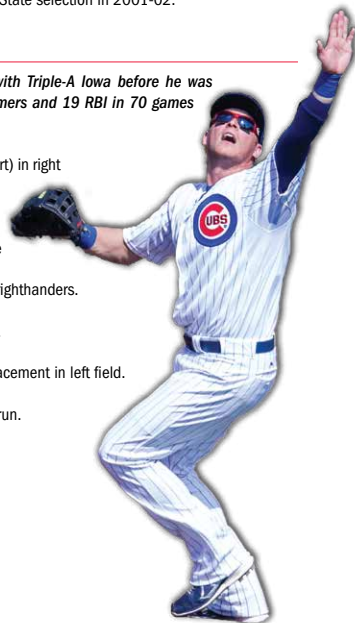

DOUBLE DOWN

The Cubs hit a club-record 340 doubles in a season twice in club annals – 1931 and 2007. In 2007, the club averaged 2.1 doubles per contest while the 1931 squad averaged 2.2 doubles over the 154-game schedule.

In 2008, three Cubs – Aramis Ramirez (44 doubles), Derrek Lee (41) and Geovany Soto (35) – had 35 or more doubles. It marked the ninth time since 1901 that three Cubs amassed 35 or more doubles in the same season. The 120 doubles between them was tied for the third-highest total of any Cubs threesome (in 2007, Derrek Lee had 43, Alfonso Soriano had 42 and Aramis Ramirez had 35), and the most since the 1932 trio of Riggs Stephenson (49), Charlie Grimm (42) and Billy Herman (42) collected a club-record 133 doubles. In 1930, Kiki Cuyler (50), Woody English (36) and Hack Wilson (35) combined for 121 doubles.

Chicago has reached 300 doubles in a season nine times, including five of the last 11 seasons entering the 2013 campaign.

The Cubs mark for scoring in consecutive games is 127, set from June 15, 1958-May 13, 1959. The team record for scoring in consecutive contests in one season is 109, set in 1943 (May 23-September 18).

The longest streak for Cubs pitchers without hurling a shutout is 106 games, set in 1901 (May 18-September 20).

On June 29, 1897, the Cubs scored at least one run in every inning in a 36-7 victory at Louisville. That was the only time in club history that the team scored at least one run in every frame. The last time the Cubs surrendered at least one run in every inning took place May 5, 1999, vs. Colorado at Wrigley Field.

Since 1900, the Cubs have thrown three consecutive shutouts seven times, with the last occurrence taking place July 21-July 24, 1992 — when the Cubs won 1-0 and 3-0 at Cincinnati and 1-0 at Houston.

The last time the Cubs threw shutouts in both games of a doubleheader occurred July 11, 1965, vs. St. Louis at Wrigley Field (identical 6-0 scores).

The Cubs were held scoreless in a National League-record 48 consecutive innings June 15-June 21, 1968. The club was blanked in four straight games June 16-June 20.

The Cubs have allowed three or fewer runs in every contest of a three-game series in each of the last four seasons, including twice in 2013 (most recently July 26-28 at San Francisco) and six times in 2012. In 2010, the Cubs held the Marlins to three or fewer runs in their three-game set from September 17-19; that was part of an 11-game stretch in which Cubs pitchers allowed three or less runs in each contest from September 10-22.

The last time the Cubs allowed three runs or fewer during a Wrigley Field three-game set occurred May 26-28, 2008 vs. Los Angeles (N.L.) (3-1, 3-1, 2-1 (10)).

From July 5-July 7, 2001, the Cubs scored 38 runs over a three-game span — winning by scores of 13-4 at New York and 15-9 and 10-6 at Detroit. Over the three -game span, the Cubs recorded 50 hits — including 21 for extra bases (12 doubles, four triples, five homers).

In 1930, the Cubs established a team record by reaching the 10-run plateau in five-straight games, June 1-June 6. During that stretch — the only time in club history that the team had a double-digit runs streak surpassing three games — the Cubs defeated Pittsburgh 16-4 on June 1 at Wrigley Field before going on a road trip. They swept the Boston Braves over a three-game span June 3-June 5 by scores of 15-2, 18-10 and 10-7, then went to Brooklyn and beat the Dodgers 13-0 on June 6.

During a 20-1 victory over Los Angeles (N.L.) May 5, 2001, the Cubs scored eight times during both the seventh and eighth innings. This was only the fifth time in major league history that a team plated at least eight runs in consecutive frames. The list:

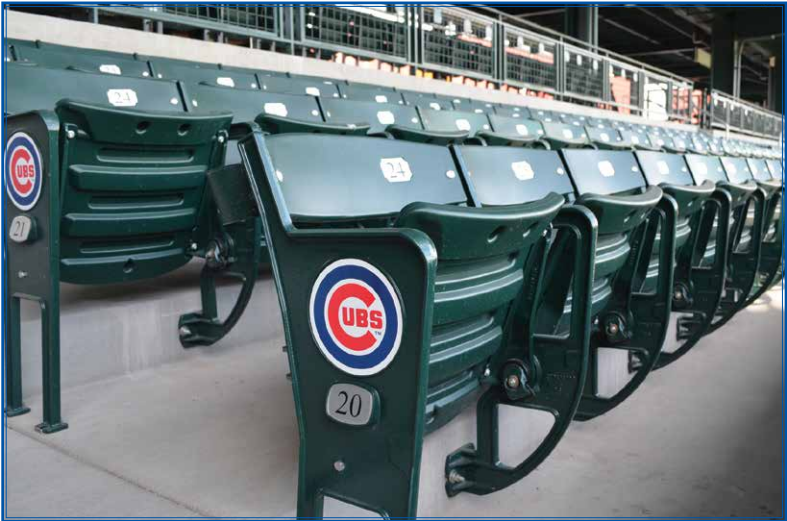

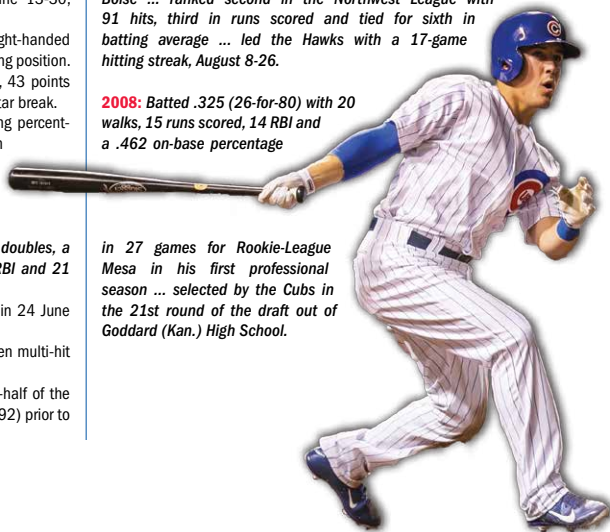

In 1973, following the tragic death of Roberto Clemente, the award was named to honor the man whose spirit and goodwill will always be remembered. The 12-time All-Star and Hall of Famer was killed in a plane crash in 1972 delivering food and medical supplies to earthquake victims of Nicaragua. The award, sponsored by John Hancock Financial Services, recognizes those individuals who truly understand the value of helping others.

A panel of baseball dignitaries, including Vera Clemente and Commissioner Allan H. (Bud) Selig, annually selects the winner from a list of 30 candidates, one from each Major League Baseball Club. These local winners are announced in September during Roberto Clemente Day. The winner of the national Roberto Clemente Award is announced during a pre-game ceremony at the World Series. Past winners include Craig Biggio, Clayton Kershaw, Jamie Moyer, Jim Thome, Curt Schilling, Al Leiter, Tony Gwynn, Willie Mays, Ozzie Smith, Cal Ripken, Jr., Albert Pujols and Derek Jeter.

All-Star team and led the Cubs with 24 quality starts ... set a career mark with 200.0 innings pitched, becoming the first Cubs southpaw to turn the trick since Ted Lilly in 2008 (204.0) ... all told, posted a 3.11 ERA (69 ER/200.0 IP) and went 9-12 in a career-high 32 starts for Chicago.

- Ⓢ Named to the N.L. All-Star team by N.L. Manager Bruce Bochy ... did not appear in the game.
 - Joined Ted Lilly (2009) and Dick Ellsworth (1964) as the only Cubs left-handed starting pitchers to make the All-Star team in the last 50 seasons.
- Ⓢ His 24 quality starts ranked tied for fourth in the N.L. and tied for sixth in the majors.
 - The 24 quality starts are the most by a Cubs left-handed pitcher since Ken Holtzman had 25 in 1970.

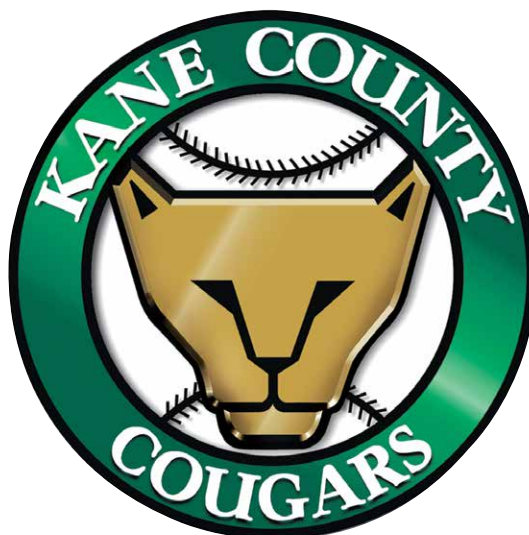

SAVE RULE

Rule 10.20 tells the official scorer to credit a pitcher with a save when:

(1) He is the finishing pitcher in a game won by his club, and; (2) he is not the winning pitcher, and; (3) he qualifies under the following conditions: (a) he enters the game with a lead of no more than three runs and pitches for at least 1.0 inning, or; (b) he enters the game with the potential tying run either on base, at bat or on deck, or; (c) he pitches effectively for at least 3.0 innings.

When a relief pitcher enters a game in a save situation and departs or the game ends with the save situation no longer in effect because he has given up the lead, he is charged with a "blown save." If the save opportunity still exists when he leaves the game, he is not charged with a save opportunity.

If the pitcher has not given up the lead when he leaves the game, though the save opportunity may no longer exist because of added runs scored by his own team, he is not charged with a save opportunity.

On-Base Percentage — (H+BB+HBP)/(AB+BB+HBP+SF): Hits plus walks plus hit-by-pitch divided by at-bats plus walks plus hit-by-pitch plus sacrifice flies.

Win-Loss Percentage: Number of games won divided by total games played.

Magic Numbers: Compute the number of games remaining, add one, then subtract the number of games ahead in the loss column of the standings of the closest opponent.

The last time the Cubs swept four consecutive series of any length took place in 1970, when the club won 11-straight contests from April 14-April 27:

April 14-15-16 — 3-game sweep vs. Philadelphia
April 17-18 — 2-game sweep vs. Montreal

April 24-25-26 — 3-game sweep vs. Houston
April 27 — Won first game of a series in Pittsburgh
April 21-22 — 2-game sweep vs. St. Louis

In 1935, the Cubs had a club-record 21-game winning streak from September 4-September 27. That streak also marked the last time the Cubs swept four straight series of at least three games. The breakdown:

On May 6, 1998, in just his fifth big league start, Kerry Wood fanned 20 Houston Astros and allowed just one base hit in a complete-game 2-0 win at Wrigley Field ... allowed only two baserunners, giving up a single to Ricky Gutierrez in the third inning and hitting Craig Biggio in the sixth.

The 20 strikeouts:

- Tied the major league record for a nine-inning game set by Boston's Roger Clemens (April 29, 1986, and September 18, 1996).
- Eclipsed the National League record of 19 reached by Providence's Charlie Sweeney (June 7, 1884), St. Louis' Steve Carlton (September 15, 1969), New York's Tom Seaver (April 22, 1970) and New York's David Cone (October 6, 1991).
- Exceeded the M.L. rookie record of 18 strikeouts, which had been reached by the Philadelphia Athletics' Jack Coombs on September 1, 1906, and by Montreal's Bill Gullickson (against the Cubs) on September 10, 1980.
- Surpassed the Cubs mark of 17, set by Jack Pfeister in a 15-inning outing May 30, 1906, vs. St. Louis.

Kerry opened the game with five straight strikeouts and later had stretches in which he fanned five in a row and seven in a row.

Became just the second pitcher in M.L. history to strike out as many batters as his age ... 17-year-old Cleveland Indians rookie Bob Feller fanned 17 Philadelphia Athletics batters on September 13, 1936.

2013 SEASON HIGHLIGHTS

FINAL STANDINGS: The Cubs finished the 2013 regular season with a 66-96 record, fifth in the N.L. Central Division, 31.0 games behind the Cardinals ... it marked the Cubs fourth-straight sub-.500 campaign dating to 2010.

- © The Cubs went 31-50 at Wrigley Field ... it marked the first time Chicago lost 50 games at home in a season, and its .383 home winning percentage was the franchise's lowest in a non-strike season.
- © Chicago was 35-46 on the road, a 12-win improvement after the team went 23-58 away from the Friendly Confines in 2012.
- © The Cubs had a season-high five-game winning streak, May 26-31 ... just prior to that, the team had a season-long six-game skid, May 19-25.

INSIDE THE NUMBERS: Chicago went 30-25 from May 26-July 28, a .545 winning percentage that was fourth-best in the N.L. in that span ... however, Chicago went 18-41 (.305) in its final 59 games beginning July 29.

- © The Cubs went nearly .500 against teams outside their division in 2013 at 41-45 while turning in a 25-51 mark against the National League Central, tied for the lowest winning percentage (.329) by any team against its own division in baseball (Houston was 25-51 vs. the A.L. West).
- © Chicago was 36-49 (.424) in 85 games decided by two or fewer runs, tied for the seventh-most such games in baseball ... the team was 20-33 (.377) in 53 one-run decisions - the 33 one-run setbacks were fourth-most in the majors.

IT TAKES A VILLAGE: The Cubs used a franchise record 56 players in 2013, surpassing the previous mark of 53 players used in 2012.

- © The Cubs used 43 players prior to the All-Star break, including 24 pitchers - both are franchise records ... Chicago's former record of 41 players used prior to the All-Star break was done during the 2000 campaign.
- © Prior to using 24 pitchers in 2013, the club had previously utilized 20 pitchers prior to the break during four seasons: 2012, 2011, 2008 and 2005.

HELLO, MY NAME IS _____: The Cubs team that took the field for the season finale in St. Louis looked very different than the club that suited up for Opening Day on April 1.

- © Of the 25 players on Chicago's Opening Day roster, less than half - 12 - remained on the active roster at season's end (32 players) ... that left 20 players on the final roster that were not part of the Opening Day roster ... the 13 players no longer on the roster from Opening Day were either traded, outrighted off the 40-man roster or granted their unconditional release.
- © Nate Schierholtz was the lone outfielder remaining from the Opening Day roster, while Anthony Rizzo, Starlin Castro and Luis Valbuena remained from the infield (Darwin Barney was on the D.L.) ... catchers Welington Castillo and Dioner Navarro were both with the team all season.
- © James Russell and Hector Rondon were the lone remaining relievers (Carlos Villanueva moved to the bullpen, back to the rotation and back again to the bullpen) ... the starting rotation featured Jeff Samardzija, Edwin Jackson and Travis Wood, none of whom missed a start all season.
- © Overall, the Cubs saw 33 players make their club debut last season, a franchise record that topped the former mark of 30 players to make their Cubs debut 111 years ago in 1902 ... additionally, the 22 Cubs debuts prior to the All-Star break marked a team record, surpassing 18 in 1949, 1957 and 2000.

NEW FACES: In April of 2013, 14 players made their Cubs debut ... that's the most in a single month in the 98 seasons Chicago has played at Wrigley Field ... the previous high was 13 players making their Cubs debut in both April of 1982 and April of 1995.

- © Three starting pitchers made their Cubs debut within the team's first five games of the season: Edwin Jackson, Scott Feldman and Carlos Villanueva ... it was the first time three starting hurlers made their Cubs debut within the first five games of the season since 1949 when Dutch Leonard (first game), Monk Dubiel (third game) and Dewey Adkins (fifth game) did so.

SOMETHING OF QUALITY: The Cubs recorded 91 quality starts in 2013, tied for fifth-most in the National League and 18 more than the 73 quality efforts Cubs starting pitchers recorded in all of 2012 ... in their 91 quality starts in 2013, Cubs pitchers went 42-21 with 28 no-decisions and a 1.96 ERA (134 ER/616.2 IP) ... the team was 13 games above .500 in those 91 games, posting a 52-39 record.

- © Travis Wood finished tied for sixth in the majors with 24 quality starts ... that was the most by a Cubs left-handed pitcher since Ken Holtzman had 25 in 1970.

THESE PITCHERS CAN HIT: Cubs pitchers recorded 19 RBI in May, a National League record for a pitching staff in a single month ... the 1940 Detroit Tigers received 20 RBI from their pitchers in 1940.

START ME UP: Cubs starting pitchers posted a 2.97 ERA (41 ER/124.1 IP) through the first 20 games of the season, the first time in 10 years that Cubs starters had a sub-3.00 ERA through the first 20 games (2.72 ERA through 20 games in 2003).

INTERLEAGUE SUMMARY: The Cubs finished interleague play with a 13-7 mark (.650) in 2013, marking the team's first winning season against the A.L. since going 8-4 in 2007 ... the 20 games played and 13 victories against the A.L. are single-season franchise records, as the 13 wins surpass nine victories in 1997, 2001 and 2003 ... Chicago owns a 121-134 (.475) all-time record in interleague play dating to 1997.

- © Anthony Rizzo's 21 interleague RBI are tied for the most by any Cub in a single season with Sammy Sosa, who had 21 RBI against the A.L. in 2000 ... Alfonso Soriano's seven interleague homers in 2013 are second-most by a Cub in a single season (Sosa had nine in 2000).

ON THE DOUBLE: Anthony Rizzo (40 doubles) and Nate Schierholtz (32 doubles) became the first Cubs left-handed hitting teammates to each reach 30 doubles in the same season since Jacques Jones (32 doubles) and Juan Pierre (31 doubles) in 2006.

RARE AIR: The Cubs saw their first 25 games of the season decided by four runs or less, a new franchise record ... the previous club record of 21 games to start a season with all contests decided by four runs or less took place 105 years ago in 1908.

- © The 25 games to start a season with all contests decided by four runs or less is the second-longest streak in major league history, behind the 1914 Detroit Tigers (33 games).

SAVE ME!: The Cubs had three pitchers record multiple saves in April: Kevin Gregg (four), Kyuji Fujikawa (two) and Carlos Marmol (two) ... in 45 Aprils since the save became an official MLB statistic in 1969, the Cubs for the first time have seen three pitchers record multiple saves within the season's first calendar month.

IN A PINCH? NO PROBLEM: May 3 vs. the Reds, the Cubs became the first N.L. team since 1993 to have at least four pinch-hitters reach safely in one inning when pinch-hitters Dioner Navarro (singled) Dave Sappelt (singled), Scott Hairston (walked) and Cody Ransom (walked) all reached safely in the ninth inning.

- © The previous N.L. club to turn the trick was the Atlanta Braves, who had five pinch-hitters reach safely in the seventh inning, September 21, 1993 at Montreal.

WINNING ALL OVER THE PLACE: The Cubs had a unique three-game stretch in which they won in three ballparks: May 26 at Great American Ball Park, May 27 at U.S. Cellular Field and May 29 at Wrigley Field ... it marked the first time since 1946 that the Cubs had at least a three-game winning streak in which each victory was at a different ballpark.

- © In 1946, The Cubs beat the Pirates at Wrigley Field on May 12, then beat the Phillies at Shibe Park, May 15 ... May 18, the Cubs beat the Giants at the Polo Grounds, and the next day, the Cubs beat Brooklyn at Braves Field.

SLAMMING GOOD TIME: The Cubs received grand slams in consecutive games (May 30 vs. the White Sox by Travis Wood, and May 31 vs. Arizona by Scott Hairston) for the first time since July 27-28, 1998 in Arizona (both by Sammy Sosa).

- © Chicago previously hit grand slams in consecutive games at Wrigley Field, September 15-16, 1972 vs. the Mets (by Jim Hickman and Burt Hooton).

DRAWING A BLANK: The Cubs were shut out in three-straight home games - August 3-4 vs. the Dodgers and August 12 vs. the Reds - for the first time since August 20-21, 1924 vs. the Boston Braves (DH on August 20) and Brooklyn Dodgers.

- © All told, the Cubs endured a franchise-record 33-inning scoreless streak at Wrigley Field from the fifth inning of August 2's game vs. the Dodgers through the first inning of August 13's affair vs. the Reds - the streak was snapped by a Nate Schierholtz two-run homer in the second inning.

CHARITABLE CUBS: Chicago Cubs Charities made significant contributions in the community donating more than \$2.3 million to Chicago area non-profit organizations in 2013.

TEEN TALK

The youngest player to see action with the Cubs was Milt Scott, who was just 16 years, eight months old when he made his major league debut September 30, 1882.

Since 1900, the youngest Cubs position player was Danny Murphy, who was 17 years, nine months old when he made his debut June 18, 1960. He also is the youngest Cub to hit a home run, as he went deep for the first time September 13 that season against Cincinnati (18 years, 20 days old). He was the last teenager to make the Cubs opening day roster (19 years old in 1962).

The youngest pitcher in Cubs history was Dick Ellsworth, who was 18 years, three months old when he made his big league debut June 22, 1958.

The last teenager to appear in a game for the Cubs was 19-year-old outfielder Oscar Gamble, who played in 24 games for the Cubs during the 1969 season. The last Cubs teenage pitcher was 19-year-old Rick James, who appeared in three games in 1967. The last teenage pitcher to make the Cubs' opening day roster was 19-year old Al Epperly in 1938.

12 years: Larry Gura (1970-1973 ... 1985) and Dave Martinez (1986-1988 ... 2000)

11 years: Greg Maddux (1986-1992 ... 2004-2006)

10 years: Lonny Frey (1937 ... 1947)

The longest span between homers for the team belongs to Billy Jurgens, who went nine years, 22 days between Cubs homers August 2, 1938, through August 24, 1947 (both homers were hit at the Polo Grounds). Jurgens was a Cub from 1931-1938 and in 1946-1947.

IF AT FIRST ...

On June 29, 1937, Cubs first baseman Jimmy Collins set a National League record by not having any fielding chances in the Cubs' 11-9 victory over the Cardinals in St. Louis. Left fielder Augie Galan and catcher Gabby Hartnett each had eight of the Cubs' 27 putouts, followed by second baseman Billy Herman (4), shortstop Billy Jurges (3), center fielder Joe Marty (2), starting right fielder Frank Demaree (1) and substitute right fielder Phil Cavarretta (1). Herman had both Cubs assists in the game on force plays at second base.

The only other N.L. first baseman to accomplish that feat was the Cubs' Fred McGriff — on August 15, 2002, vs. Houston. Catchers Todd Hundley (14) and Joe Girardi (3) recorded 17 of the club's 27 putouts via the strikeout route. Shortstop Alex Gonzalez had the Cubs' only assist on a ninth-inning ground out.

KEEPING THE ROTATION TOGETHER

The Cubs utilized as few as seven starters in a campaign as recently as 2004, when the only pitchers to start for the club were Matt Clement, Greg Maddux, Sergio Mitre, Mark Prior, Glendon Rusch, Kerry Wood and Carlos Zambrano.

Since 1900, the club mark for fewest starters in a season is six – set in 1901. During the 19th century, the team utilized as few as two starters in four seasons, most recently during a 98-game 1883 campaign (Larry Corcoran 53 starts, Fred Goldsmith 45 starts).

GRAND SLAM FACTS AND FIGURES

The Cubs have hit 297 grand slams in franchise history, including three in both 2012 and 2013.

The Cubs record for grand slams in a season is nine, recorded in 1929 by Hack Wilson (2), Rogers Hornsby (2), Charlie Grimm (2), Riggs Stephenson, Norman McMillan and Kiki Cuyler. McMillan's roundtripper was of the inside-the-park variety.

The club's first grand slam was hit by pitcher Larry Corcoran on June 20, 1882, off Worcester's Lee Richmond at Chicago's Lakefront Park.

The only Cubs to hit more than two grand slams in one season are Ernie Banks (5 in 1955), Wildfire Schulte (4 in 1911) and Sammy Sosa (3 in 1998). Sosa hit grand slams in back-to-back games July 27-July 28 of that season, becoming the first Cub to accomplish that feat.

On June 3, 1987, the Cubs and Houston Astros combined to hit three grand slams – tying a major league single-game record. Two Cubs hit bases-loaded roundtrippers – Brian Dayett (off Bob Knepper) and Keith Moreland (off Julio Solano). Houston's Billy Hatcher hit a grand slam in the contest off Rick Sutcliffe.

On August 16, 1890, Chicago batters Tom Burns and Malachi Kittridge both connected for fifth-inning grand slams off Pittsburgh's Bill Phillips – for the franchise's only multiple grand slam inning.

20-RUN GAMES IN CUBS HISTORY

The Cubs have been involved in two of the highest scoring games in major league history, defeating Philadelphia 26-23 on August 25, 1922, at Cubs Park, and falling to the Phillies 23-22 on May 17, 1979, at Wrigley Field.

The Cubs have scored at least 20 runs in a game 15 times since 1900. The last time they reached that scoring plateau occurred May 5, 2001, at Wrigley Field — a 20-1 victory over Los Angeles. Their last 20-plus runs affair on the road took place August 18, 1995, at Colorado (26-7).

The last time the Cubs surrendered 20 runs in a game took place July 3, 1999, at Philadelphia (21-8 loss). The Cubs have allowed 20-plus runs 12 times since 1900.

SEEING DOUBLE

Since the advent of divisional play in 1969, the Cubs have only had one instance in which starting pitchers struck out 10 batters in three straight games. From May 11-13, 1969, Ken Holtzman (vs. San Francisco), Fergie Jenkins (vs. San Diego) and Dick Selma (vs. San Diego) all went the distance — and struck out 10 batters apiece — in consecutive Wrigley Field affairs.

PUTTING ON THE HITS

In 2003, the Cubs recorded 20 hits, July 20 at Florida, and 21 on July 21 at Atlanta — marking the first time since the advent of divisional play that the club had back-to-back 20-hit efforts.

CUBS PITCHING FACTS

The Cubs set a team mark in 2013 by utilizing 31 different pitchers.

The club mark for most left-handed pitchers to see mound action in a season is 10 – a figure reached in both 1999 and 2000. Prior to the 1999 campaign, the team record of eight had stood since 1966.

The team mark for most strikeouts by a reliever is 11, set by Dave Hillman during a 7.2-inning relief stint May 28, 1959, against Los Angeles.

The last Cubs position player to take the mound for the Cubs was third baseman Joe Mather, who saw relief action August 27, 2012 vs. Milwaukee.

Since the advent of divisional play in 1969, only two Cubs have recorded saves in their major league debuts: Todd Wellemeier (5/15/03 @ MIL) and Kyuji Fukukawa (4/1/13 @ PIT).

The last Cubs rookie to hurl consecutive complete games was Rich Hill in 2006 (September 16 vs. Cincinnati, September 22 at Cincinnati).

Hill finished with two complete games in 2006, making him the first Cubs rookie with more than one complete game in a season since Frank Castillo tossed four in 1991.

The best career start record-wise for a Cubs pitcher is 8-0, recorded by King Cole in 1910 and Carlos Silva in 2010. The worst start belongs to Chris Volstad, who began his Cubs career 0-9 in 2012.

On July 17, 1918, Lefty Tyler pitched a Cubs-record 21 innings in a route-going 2-1 win against Philadelphia. He gave up 13 hits and one walk while striking out eight. Three years earlier, on June 17, 1915, reliever George "Zip" Zabel was called into a game against Brooklyn with two out in the top of the 1st inning at West Side Grounds. He had to pitch 18.1 innings before earning the win, as the Cubs won 4-3 in the 19th inning.

The last time the Cubs had three straight complete-game shutouts took place in May 1969. Ken Holtzman started the streak May 11 with an 8-0 victory over San Francisco. Fergie Jenkins then blanked San Diego 2-0 on May 12. Dick Selma finished the stretch with a three-hitter in a 19-0 victory over the Padres May 13.

The 27 strikeouts without a walk were the most in any major league nine-inning game.

The National League record for most strikeouts in a nine-inning game is 30. On May 6, 1998, at Wrigley Field, Kerry Wood fanned 20 Houston batters — while Shane Reynolds struck out 10 Cubs in his 8.0 innings of work.

The 1968 club was 10 games under .500 twice, most recently on July 5 (35-45). That team finished the year at 84-78.

In 2007, the club was nine games below .500 at 22-31 and finished eight games above .500 at 85-77 to win the N.L. Central title.

CUBS HOLD MLB RECORD...

The Cubs hold the major league record for consecutive games played (of at least nine innings) without being no-hit ... entering 2014, Chicago has played 7,663 consecutive contests with at least one hit since last being no-hit, September 9, 1965, by the Dodgers Sandy Koufax.

Since Koufax's perfect game, the Cubs have had 22 one-hitters tossed against them, with the last one occurring July 31, 2012 – when Pittsburgh's A.J. Burnett accomplished the feat at Wrigley Field (Adrian Cardenas collected a two-out, pinch-single to right in the bottom of the eighth inning). The last pitcher to take a no-hitter into the ninth inning against the Cubs was Florida's Alex Fernandez – on April 10, 1997 at Wrigley Field (broken up by a Dave Hansen single).

Entering 2014, the Cubs have gone a major league record 48 full seasons since they were last no-hit, surpassing the mark set by the St. Louis Cardinals from 1920 to 1959. According to the Sporting News Complete Baseball Record Book, the American League record is 44 years, accomplished by the New York Yankees from 1959 to 2002.

HISTORICAL INFORMATION

Highlights In Cubs History

1876: The first game in the history of the Chicago National League franchise took place April 25, as Albert Spalding pitched the first N.L. shutout in the Chicago White Stockings' 4-0 win at Louisville ... Spalding also had the first hit in franchise history, while center fielder Paul Hines scored the first run on a throwing error in the second inning.

- © The first home run in N.L. history was hit by the White Stockings' Ross Barnes on May 2 in a 15-9 victory in Cincinnati.
- © The creation of the N.L. was credited largely to William A. Hulbert, who held the dual role of league president and Chicago president until 1882 ... with the assistance of manager Albert Spalding, Hulbert drafted the N.L. constitution and by-laws in 1875.
- © Of the eight original charter members of the National League, only the Cubs have operated continuously in the same city.

1880: The North Siders won 21-straight games, June 2-July 8, including one tie (June 4).

1883: Chicago set major league records when it scored 18 runs and collected 18 hits in September 6's seventh frame ... the Cubs went on to beat Detroit 26-6.

1903: In October, the Cubs and White Sox held the first of the semi-annual "City Series" ... at points from 1903-1942, the two teams met following the regular season for a crosstown set as long as neither team made the Fall Classic.

- © In the inaugural year, the Chicago teams ended with seven wins apiece ... what would have been the deciding game was cancelled due to weather.

1906: The Chicago club went 116-36 in setting major league records for wins in a season and winning percentage (.763).

- © The Cubs and White Sox met in the first and only all-Chicago Fall Classic ... it also marked the first time two teams from the same city met in the World Series ... the Cubs fell to the White Sox, four games to two.

1907: "Cubs" was officially adopted as the nickname of the team ... the Cubs then went on to win their first World Series, defeating Detroit in five games.

1908: The Cubs were World Series champions for the second straight year, defeating Detroit four games to one.

1911: Frank "Wildfire" Schulte became the first player in the majors to hit at least 20 doubles, 20 triples and 20 homers in a single season.

1916: The Cubs moved into Weeghman Park (now known as Wrigley Field).

1921: William Wrigley Jr. became the Cubs' majority owner.

- © Wrigley's involvement with the team began in 1916, when a 10-man syndicate led by Charles Weeghman purchased the club from Charles Taft ... in 1919, Wrigley purchased Weeghman's shares to have controlling interest.
- © After Wrigley's death in 1932, his interest passed to his son, Philip K. Wrigley ... upon Philip's death in 1977, principal interest in the ballclub was left to his son, William Wrigley.
- © The sale of the club to Tribune Company in 1981 ended the longest continuous operation of a franchise by the same family in one city.

1924: The first Cubs game was broadcast on the radio ... Hal Totten transmitted the April 23 home opener from the Wrigley Field roof ... Chicago routed the Cardinals 12-1 in the contest.

THE CHICAGO CUBS — SINCE 1876

The Chicago National League franchise is in its 139th season in 2014. During the first 138 N.L. campaigns, the team played 20,574 games, winning 10,438 contests.

1930: Hack Wilson established a M.L. record by driving in 191 runs while hitting 56 home runs – a club/N.L. record that lasted until 1998.

- © The largest crowd to see a baseball game at Wrigley Field (51,556) took place June 27 vs. Brooklyn ... of that number, 30,476 were Ladies' Day guests and 1,332 were passholders.

1935: The Cubs won 21-straight September games in capturing the N.L. pennant.

1945: The Cubs went to their 10th World Series, falling to Detroit in seven games.

1946: Chicago aired its first game on television ... the July 13 home game was carried out on WBKB with Jack Gibney calling the 4-3 loss to the Dodgers.

1958: Ernie Banks became the first member of a team with a losing record to win the MVP Award ... also was named the N.L. MVP in 1959, becoming the first N.L. player to win the award in consecutive seasons.

1960: Don Cardwell threw a no-hitter against St. Louis in his Cubs debut May 15 ... became the first pitcher in baseball history to hurl a no-hitter in his first game for a club.

1970: Billy Williams became the first player in N.L. history to appear in 1,000 consecutive games, reaching that mark April 30 ... his streak extended to 1,117 games before ending September 3.

1973: Following Whitey Lockman's ejection May 8, coach Ernie Banks takes over the reigns as acting manager, becoming the first African-American in major league history to manage a team.

1982: On May 25 at San Diego, Fergie Jenkins became the seventh pitcher in baseball history to record 3,000 strikeouts.

- © On August 22, Ernie Banks became the first Cub to have his uniform number (14) retired.

1984: The Cubs clinched their first N.L. Eastern Division title September 24 in Pittsburgh (4-1), marking the first time since 1945 that the club advanced into the postseason ... the Cubs went 96-65 under N.L. Manager of the Year Jim Frey.

- © The Cubs fell to San Diego in the NLCS three games to two.

1987: Andre Dawson became the first player from a sixth-place team to win the N.L.'s MVP Award, hitting 49 homers and driving in 137 runs.

- © On August 13, Hall of Famer Billy Williams had his No. 26 retired.

1988: The first Wrigley Field night game took place August 8 against Philadelphia ... the game was rained out after 3.5 innings with the Cubs leading 3-1.

- © The first official night contest took place August 9 vs. New York, with the Cubs winning 6-4 ... the first pitch was thrown by Mike Bielecki at 7:05 p.m. – a called strike to Lenny Dykstra.

1989: The Cubs won their second N.L. Eastern Division title when they defeated Montreal 3-2 at Olympic Stadium September 26 ... the Cubs compiled a 93-69 record under N.L. Manager of the Year Don Zimmer before falling in the NLCS to San Francisco four games to one.

- © For only the fifth time, teammates finished as the top two votegeters in the Jackie Robinson N.L. Rookie of the Year balloting ... Jerome Walton, who had a club-record 30-game hitting streak during the season, won the award, while Dwight Smith finished second in the voting.

1990: Ryne Sandberg hit a league-high 40 home runs, the third-highest single-season total for a second baseman behind the 42 hit by St. Louis' Rogers Hornsby in 1922 and Atlanta's Davey Johnson in 1973.

- © Sandberg also set a then M.L. record by playing errorless ball in 123 straight games at second base, June 21, 1989-May 17, 1990 ... the feat still stands as the N.L. mark.

1993: Sammy Sosa became the first player in Cubs history to record a 30-homer/30-steal campaign (33 homers, 36 steals).

1995: The Cubs won their 9,000th game May 21 at Los Angeles, defeating the Dodgers 2-1 in 13 innings ... the Cubs have won more games than any other one-city professional franchise.

- © Sammy Sosa hit the 10,000th homer in Cubs history August 14 in Los Angeles (off Tom Candiotti).

1998: The Cubs went to post-season play as the N.L.'s Wild Card club after defeating San Francisco 5-3 in a one-game tie-breaker ... the Cubs were swept by Atlanta during the Division Series.

- © Sammy Sosa, who battled St. Louis' Mark McGwire for the major league homer record, earned N.L. Most Valuable Player honors ... Sosa finished the campaign with 66 homers – four behind McGwire – while leading the majors with 158 RBI and 134 runs scored.
- © Kerry Wood was named the league's Rookie of the Year after going 13-6 in 26 starts with 233 strikeouts ... on May 6 vs. Houston, he tied the M.L. single-game mark by fanning 20 batters while allowing just one hit in a complete-game 2-0 win.

2000: The Cubs opened the season in Tokyo, marking the first regular season games ever held outside of North America ... the March 29 season opener is the Cubs earliest regular season contest in franchise history.

2001: Sammy Sosa became the first player in M.L. history to reach the 60-homers mark in three different campaigns ... he also became the first player to have a trio of three-homer games in one season.

- © Sosa had a club-record 425 total bases for his second career 400-plus campaign (416 in 1998).
- © On May 24-25, Jon Lieber and Kerry Wood hurled back-to-back complete-game one-hit shutouts.

2003: On September 27, the Cubs clinched their first-ever National League Central Division title when they swept a doubleheader vs. Pittsburgh by scores of 4-2 and 7-2 while Houston lost to Milwaukee 5-2 ... the Cubs won the division one season after going 67-95.

- © The Cubs came within a victory of heading to the World Series, as they defeated Atlanta three games to two in the Division Series before falling to Florida four games to three in the NLCS.
- © Cubs pitchers fanned a major league-record 1,404 batters while allowing 1,304 hits – the highest differential in big league annals ... Kerry Wood (266) and Mark Prior (245) finished 1-2 in the major league strikeout race.
- © On September 28, the Cubs retired the uniform number – No. 10 – of longtime third baseman/broadcaster Ron Santo.

2004: On August 7 at San Francisco, Greg Maddux won his 300th career game, becoming the 22nd pitcher in major league history to do so.

- © He was the second Cub to win his 300th game while donning a Cub uniform, joining Grover "Ol' Pete" Alexander in that distinction.

2005: Derrek Lee won the N.L. batting title after leading all three Triple Crown categories for much of the season ... the first baseman batted .335 and also led the National League in hits, total bases, doubles, slugging percentage and extra-base hits.

- © Greg Maddux struck out his 3,000th career batter, becoming the second Cub in franchise history to record 3,000 strikeouts (also Fergie Jenkins) ... the Cubs are the only major league franchise to have two pitchers surpass the mark in their uniform.
- © On August 28, the Cubs retired the uniform number – No. 23 – of Hall of Fame second baseman Ryne Sandberg.

2007: On September 28, the Cubs clinched their second N.L. Central Division title when they defeated the Cincinnati Reds on the road, 6-0, and the Milwaukee Brewers fell at home to the Padres, 6-3 ... Chicago became the first club to win the Central after finishing last the season before (66-96 in 2006).

2008: The Cubs won their second straight N.L. Central Division title by defeating the St. Louis Cardinals 5-4 at Wrigley Field September 20 ... the Cubs won a N.L.-leading 97 games, marking the most wins for the Cubs since posting 98 in 1945.

- © The Cubs unveiled a statue of Hall of Famer Ernie Banks prior to the team's Opening Day contest against the Brewers.
- © Chicago earned the 10,000th win in franchise history in a 7-6, 10-inning victory at the Rockies April 23.
- © The Cubs tied a N.L. record by sending eight representatives to the Mid-Summer Classic ... Geovany Soto became the first-ever N.L. rookie catcher to start the contest.
- © Carlos Zambrano hurled the Cubs first no-hitter in 36 years September 14 vs. the Astros at Miller Park ... Ted Lilly, Jeff Samardzija, Carlos Marmol and Bob Howry followed the next day by combining on a one-hitter ... it marked the first time in M.L. history that a team had allowed just one hit in consecutive games.
- © The Cubs drew a franchise record 3,300,200 fans in 81 home dates at Wrigley Field, surpassing their previous record of 3,252,462 fans in 2006 ... the 3,300,200 season total was the highest single-season total for any franchise in the history of Chicago professional sports.

2009: October 28 marked the first day under The Ricketts Family, ending a 28-year run under Tribune Company ... The Ricketts are the first family to own the Cubs since the Wrigley clan sold the team in 1981.

- © The Cubs finished with an 83-78 mark, good for second in the N.L. Central ... prior to 2007, Chicago previously finished first or second in its division three consecutive years from 1935-38 during a four-season run.
- © The Cubs and WRTO-1200 AM partnered to broadcast over 20 games in Spanish in 2009 ... it marked the first time in over 14 seasons that the Cubs featured a Spanish broadcast.
- © On May 3, the Cubs retired the uniform number – No. 31 – of Fergie Jenkins and Greg Maddux.

2010: The Cubs played the 20,000th contest in franchise history, June 26 ... a 3-2 setback to the White Sox at U.S. Cellular Field.

- © The organization unveiled a statue of Billy Williams, September 7, on the corner of Addison and Sheffield.

2011: At 21 years old, Starlin Castro became the youngest All-Star in franchise history ... Castro also finished the season leading the National League with 207 hits, the youngest player to do so (21 years, 188 days old).

- © The Cubs played a franchise-record 10-straight night games, May 14-25 ... the club had twice played nine-consecutive night games, last done July 16-25, 1992.
- © On August 10, the Cubs unveiled a Ron Santo statue at the corner of Addison and Sheffield.

NAMES AND NUMBERS

A total of 1,958 players have appeared in at least one game for the Chicago National League ball club. The team's single-season record for most players used is 56, set in 2013. That same season, the club used 31 pitchers, also a single-season franchise record.

The most popular last names in Cubs history belong to Smith (16), Johnson (12), Williams (10) and Brown (9). The longest last names in Cubs history — 13 letters each — belong to Gene DeMontreville (1899), Todd Hollandsworth (2004-05) and Ken Raffensberger (1940-41). There have been 19 Cubs with last names consisting of three letters, most recently Derek Lee (2004-10), Felix Pie (2007-08), Chad Fox (2005, 2008-09) and Jake Fox (2007, 2009).

HEY NOW, YOU'RE AN ALL-STAR

Ernie Banks was selected to the National League All-Star team 14 times, the highest total for a Cubs player. Ryne Sandberg ranks second in club history with 10 All-Star appearances (nine starts).

The only Cub to earn Most Valuable Player honors was Bill Madlock, who had a game-winning two-run bases-loaded ninth-inning single off the White Sox's Rich Gossage in the 1975 contest. Madlock shared MVP honors with the New York Mets' Jon Matlack.

Seven Cubs batters have hit All-Star home runs, most recently Alfonso Soriano in the 2007 contest off Seattle's J.J. Putz. The others: Augie Galan (1936 off Detroit's Schoolboy Rowe), Hank Sauer (1952 off Cleveland's Bob Lemon), Ernie Banks (1960 off Boston's Bill Monbouquette), George Altman (1961 off Boston's Mike Fomiele), Billy Williams (1964 off Kansas City's John Wyatt) and Andre Dawson (1991 off Boston's Roger Clemens).

Cubs pitchers have earned five All-Star wins — Bob Rush (1952), Larry Jackson (1963), Bruce Sutter (1978 and 1979) and Lee Smith (1987). Cubs relievers have picked up four saves (Lon Warneke in 1936, Don Elston in 1959, Sutter in 1980 and Randy Myers in 1995). Cubs pitchers have suffered four All-Star losses — Bill Lee (1939), Claude Passeau (1941 and 1946) and Johnny Schmitz (1948).

Passeau is the only Cubs pitcher to start in the All-Star Game, taking the loss in the 1946 Midsummer Classic at Boston's Fenway Park.

The youngest Cubs player to be selected to the N.L. All-Star team and appear in the game was Starlin Castro, who was 21 years old at the 2011 Midsummer Classic in Arizona. The youngest Cubs pitcher to appear in an All-Star Game was 23-year-old Carlos Zambrano (2004).

The oldest Cub to play in an All-Star Game was 38-year-old Ernie Banks, who made his 13th and final All-Star appearance in the 1969 Classic in Washington, DC.

Three Cubs managers have guided the N.L. All-Star team — Charlie Grimm (1936 and 1946), Gabby Hartnett (1939) and Dusty Baker (2003).

Three All-Star Games have been played at Wrigley Field — in 1947, in 1962 and in 1990. The American League won all three games by scores of 2-1, 9-4 and 2-0.

BEAR CUBS

The greatest number of players to make their major league debuts in one season for the Cubs is 20 – in 1902. The high number of youngsters that season was one of the primary reasons why the club was nicknamed the “Cubs.” With the raid of National League players by American League teams, many N.L. clubs stocked their spring training rosters with young, unproven players. The Chicago Daily News, noting all the youngsters in the Chicago camp, used the nickname “Cubs” for the first time in its March 27, 1902 edition.

PHILLING UP THE SCOREBOARD

On August 25, 1922, the Cubs topped Philadelphia 26-23 at Cubs Park in the highest-scoring game in major league history. The teams combined for 51 hits, 23 walks and 25 men left-on-base. A 10-run second inning followed by a 14-run outburst in the fourth helped the Cubs build a 25-6 lead. Philadelphia fought back and had the bases full when the last out was recorded in the ninth inning.

On May 17, 1979, Dave Kingman hit three homers and drove in six runs, but Philadelphia's Mike Schmidt answered with two homers – including the game-winner in the 10th – to give the Phillies a 23-22 victory in baseball's highest-scoring game since the 1922 affair. The Cubs had trailed 21-9, but rallied and tied the score in the eighth.

THE SANDBERG GAME

On June 23, 1984, Ryne Sandberg went 5-for-6 with two late-inning dramatic homers and seven RBI in the Cubs' 11-inning 12-11 victory over St. Louis.

Sandberg hit a solo homer off the Cardinals' Bruce Sutter in the bottom of the ninth inning to knot the game at 9-9. Then, after St. Louis tallied twice in the top of the 10th, Sandberg once again knotted the game — this time with a two-run shot off Sutter. Following his game-tying homers, the Cubs won it on Dave Owen's RBI single.

"The Sandberg Game" overshadowed the performance of the Cardinals' Willie McGee, who hit for the cycle.

PINCHED BY A PITCHER

On August 11, 2001, San Francisco's Livan Hernandez was the last pitcher to have a four-hit game against the Cubs — going 4-for-4 with a solo homer and three RBI.

On August 8, 2000, Los Angeles pitcher Darren Dreifort hit a pair of homers in a 7-5 victory over the Cubs at Dodger Stadium.

Dreifort was just the fourth pitcher to record a multi-homer game against the Cubs, joining Cincinnati's Frank Foreman (July 4, 1895), the Boston Braves' Jim Tobin — who hit three homers (May 13, 1942) — and the New York Mets' Walt Terrell (August 6, 1983).

1984 NLCS: Padres Defeated Cubs 3-2

The Cubs advanced into post-season play for the first time since 1945 after winning the National League Eastern Division title with a 96-65 record ... the Cubs then won the first two games of the NLCS at Wrigley Field before dropping the final three contests in San Diego.

- © The Cubs hit five homers and had 16 hits in routing the Padres 13-0 in Game One, as winning pitcher Rick Sutcliffe allowed two hits in 7.0 innings and homered ... behind Steve Trout, the Cubs then won the second game 4-2.
- © San Diego routed the Cubs in Game Three, then won the fourth game 7-5 behind Steve Garvey's five-RBI contest.
- © In the decisive fifth game, Leon Durham's two-run homer and Jody Davis' solo shot gave the Cubs a 3-0 lead entering the bottom of the sixth inning ... San Diego, though, scored twice in the sixth and four times in the seventh to advance to the World Series.

2003 NLDS: Cubs Defeated Braves 3-2

For the first time since winning the 1908 World Series, the Cubs were victorious in a postseason series ... as such, the Cubs qualified for their first trip to the National League Championship Series since 1989.

- Ⓒ The affair was only the third “final and decisive” post-season contest in Cubs history ... the club had dropped Game Seven of the 1945 World Series to Detroit and Game Five of the 1984 NLCS to San Diego.
- Ⓒ With two victories, Kerry Wood became the first Cub to pick up a pair of wins in a post-season series since Hank Borowy in the 1945 World Series ... he fanned 18 batters in the two starts, surpassing the club-record 17 recorded by Hippo Vaughn in the 1918 World Series ... in the series-opening 4-2 victory, he had two hits – and drove in the game-winning run with a two-run double in the Cubs four-run sixth inning.
- Ⓒ In Game Three (a 3-1 Cubs win), Mark Prior went the distance – allowing two hits while fanning seven ... he was the first Cubs pitcher to throw a complete game in the postseason since Claude Passeau accomplished the feat in Game Three of the 1945 World Series ... in the process, he also became the second hurler to throw a two-hitter in a Division Series affair, joining Nolan Ryan (October 6, 1981).

- Ⓒ Soto's long ball made him just the second Cubs rookie to ever homer in a post-season contest ... previously, Cubs rookie Frank Demaree homered off the Yankees Johnny Allen on October 2, 1932, in the fourth game of the 1932 World Series at Wrigley Field..
- Ⓒ The Cubs dropped Game One, 4-1, as Carlos Zambrano went up against Arizona's Brandon Webb ... the game was tied 1-1 before the Diamondbacks scored two runs off Carlos Marmol in the seventh.

The Chicago Cubs do not credential freelance writers unless the writer is currently on assignment with a specific news organization. It is the responsibility of the requesting affiliation to confirm receipt and subsequent approval/denial of access to the game in question.

Photo Credentials: Season and daily photo credentials are issued only to photographers on assignment for news-gathering organizations and representatives of companies recognized and/or licensed by Major League Baseball. Requests for photo credentials are the same as the procedure outlined above. The Chicago Cubs do not credential freelance photographers. All flash photography is prohibited at Wrigley Field. Please be advised that priority in all photo bays will be granted to news organizations on nightly deadlines. All mono- and tripods of any sort are strictly prohibited from the field at all times. Any use of photographs taken other than for news-gathering purposes or MLB officially licensed products will be considered a violation of existing trademark and copyright restrictions. As an opportunity to change locations mid-game, photographers are permitted to move along the warning track behind home plate. Photographers are prohibited from stopping and photographing while changing photo bays. Alcoholic beverages are prohibited from any photo bay or camera well at all times.

Internet Media: Only licensees of Major League Baseball Enterprises have exclusive rights to simulate accounts, descriptions or pitch-by-pitch reproductions of Major League Baseball games on the Internet. No transmission by any other media, specifically including the Internet and any other online network, of any information about the game, including (but not limited to) any account, description, picture, video, audio, reproduction or other information concerning any MLB game will be permitted to originate from inside the ballpark (including from a camera feed already positioned within the ballpark). Reproduction of such accounts without a license from Major League Baseball Enterprises is a violation of the policies of MLB and the Chicago Cubs. A breach in such policy will result in revocation of credentials and may be subject to litigation. The Chicago Cubs adhere to Major League Baseball's guidelines and do not credential websites unless they are affiliated with recognized national or regional news media organizations. No freelance Internet sites will be credential without following the same guidelines for freelance journalists.

Live Transmissions: Affiliations not licensed by MLB and non-rightsholders of the Chicago Cubs and MLB (television, radio and internet sites) are prohibited from providing live telecasts, radio broadcasts, game simulations, pitch-by-pitch accounts, as well as from using live or taped material originating from inside the ballpark during a period commencing with the conclusion of batting practice and ending with the conclusion of the game. Live transmissions will be permitted until the conclusion of the club's rightsholders' (radio or television) post-game programming. Radio stations and assigned correspondents for out-of-town reports are permitted to give inning or half-inning score updates, but at no time may the file reports once play is in progress.

Roving Cameras: Roving cameras in the seating area of the ballpark are strictly prohibited unless approved by the Cubs media relations department. Due to space limitations, roving cameras are not allowed to shoot from the bleachers. Any camera light in the seating area of the ballpark is strictly prohibited. If a photo light comes on during the game, umpires will stop play. Still photographers must shoot from the designated camera wells and photographer areas. Interviews are not permitted in the ballpark during the game unless approved by the Cubs media relations department. If approved, interviews may only be conducted on the concourse between innings, not in the stands while the game is in progress.

Working Press Box: Seating in the main press box is prioritized by daily print media, visiting public relations departments, visiting beat writers and area radio and television representatives not on the air during games. The press box consists of six radio/TV booths equipped for live broadcasts. Keeping with MLB and club policy, no person under 18 is permitted into the press box on game days. Alcoholic beverages are prohibited from the working press box prior or during the game. The press box is equipped with wireless internet capabilities; the password can be found on the seating cards in the press box and is also posted in the back of the press box.

Field Access: All members of the media with credentials allowing access onto the field may conduct interviews at specific times prior to the start of the game. The field must be cleared 60 minutes before the beginning of the game. At no time are media permitted in fair territory or anywhere beyond first- or third-base. Alcoholic beverages are prohibited from the field at all times.

Batting Practice: Members of the media are prohibited from standing, photographing or conducting interviews from the area surrounding the cage while batting practice is in progress.

Cellular Phones: The use of cellular phones for radio interviews while on the field and in the clubhouse is strictly prohibited. Any and all telephone interviews must be arranged in advance with the Chicago Cubs media relations department. An exception to the usage of a cellular phone for an interview is in the dugout, only after receiving advance permission from the player or staff member to be interviewed.

Media Phones: Members of the press may utilize three charge-a-call phones located in the back of the pressbox. Media wanting to set up a season-long phone line may contact the Cubs media relations department. In addition, media can make toll-free calls or use their calling cards on any of the designated phones provided by the Cubs in the press box. These phones are installed for the use of all media in the press box for working conditions only.

Autographs: Credentialed members of the media are strictly prohibited from requesting autographs or equipment at Wrigley Field. Officials will revoke credentials immediately, no exceptions.

Clubhouse Access: Members of the media must have a specific working purpose to gain admittance to the clubhouse. The Cubs home clubhouse opens 3½ hours prior to game-time and is closed during stretch and batting practice times. The clubhouse will re-open 10 minutes after the conclusion of the game. Access to the visiting Wrigley Field clubhouse will be determined by the visiting club's policies.

Press Dining: A press dining room is located adjacent to the broadcast booths on the press level, and is available to credentialed members of the media with access to the working press box, as well as credentialed photographers and credentialed radio and TV personnel. Press meals are \$7.

REGLAS DE PRENSA

Credenciales de Prensa: Credenciales de prensa diarias y credenciales para la temporada completa son entregadas con la intención que la prensa cubra y publique reportajes de los Chicago Cubs y Wrigley Field. Solicitudes para un pase de prensa de un día tienen que venir directamente del editor, productor o director de la institución a la que pertenece el reportero, en papel membretado y ser entregadas 48 horas antes del juego solicitado. Los miembros de la prensa tienen que tener una identificación con fotografía disponible todo el tiempo. Los Chicago Cubs no autorizan credenciales para reporteros sin afiliación, a no ser que estos sean asignados una historia específica por un medio de prensa autorizado. Es la responsabilidad del medio de prensa de confirmar el recibo de la solicitud y subsecuentemente el aprobar o negar la credencial para la fecha del juego.

Credenciales para Fotógrafos: Las credenciales diarias y de temporada completa para fotógrafos son entregadas a fotógrafos asignados por medios de prensa y organizaciones autorizadas por Major League Baseball. Los requisitos para solicitar credenciales para fotógrafos son los mismos ya definidos en el párrafo anterior. Los Chicago Cubs no autorizan credenciales para fotógrafos sin afiliación. La fotografía con flash esta prohibida en Wrigley Field. Por favor tenga en cuenta que los medios de comunicación con ediciones nocturnas tienen prioridad en las zonas reservadas para fotógrafos. Los trípodes de cualquier tipo están estrictamente prohibidos en el campo de juego. Cualquier otro uso de las fotografías que no sea para información y noticias o para productos autorizados oficialmente por MLB será considerada una violación de las restricciones de derechos de la marca registrada y de los Cubs. Como oportunidad para cambiar de sitio, a los fotógrafos se les permite caminar por detrás de la línea de home plate. Los fotógrafos tienen prohibido parar y tomar fotos mientras cambien de sitio. Las bebidas alcohólicas están prohibidas en las zonas reservadas para fotógrafos.

Medios de prensa de Internet: Solamente licencias autorizadas oficialmente por Major League Baseball Enterprises, tienen derechos exclusivos de simular cuentas, descripciones o reproducciones de pitcheo por pitcheo de juegos de Major League Baseball en el Internet. No están permitidas transmisiones por Internet de ningún otro medio o network en línea, información acerca del juego incluyendo (pero sin limitación a), cualquier cuenta, descripción, imagen, video, sonido o reproducción de cualquier otra información acerca de cualquier juego de MLB desde dentro del campo de juego (incluyendo cámaras posicionadas en el campo). La reproducción de estas cuentas sin la debida autorización de Major League Baseball Enterprises es una violación de las pólizas de MLB y de los Chicago Cubs. La violación a esta regla resultará en la revocación de credenciales y puede estar sujeto a litigación. Los Chicago Cubs se unen a las reglas de Major League Baseball y no autorizan credenciales para sitios de Internet a no ser que estén afiliados a medios de prensa reconocidos nacional o regionalmente. Los sitios de Internet sin afiliación no obtendrán credenciales a no ser que califiquen.

Transmisiones en vivo: Organizaciones sin licencias de MLB o personas afiliadas a los Chicago Cubs y MLB (televisión, radio y sitios de Internet) Tienen prohibido proveer transmisiones en vivo, simulaciones de juegos, cuenta de pitcheo por pitcheo así como usar material obtenido en vivo o pregrabado desde el campo de juego en el periodo desde el final de la practica de bateo hasta el final del juego. Las transmisiones en vivo se permitirán hasta la conclusión del segmento post-game y los derechos del dueño (Radio o Televisión). A estaciones de radio y corresponsales que viajan con el equipo se les permite transmitir el marcador (puntuación) cada entrada o media entrada del juego, pero no se les permitirá reportar cuando la jugada esta en progreso.

Cámaras ambulantes: Las cámaras grandes están prohibidas en la zona de los asientos a no ser que sean aprobadas por el departamento de medios de comunicación de los Cubs. Debido a limitaciones de espacio, las cámaras grandes están prohibidas en la zona de los Bleachers. Cualquier luz de cámara esta prohibida en la sección de asientos de Wrigley Field. Si se enciende una luz de cámara fotográfica durante la jugada, los árbitros pararán la acción. Los fotógrafos tienen que tomar las fotos desde las zonas asignadas para los fotógrafos. Entrevistas no están permitidas en el campo de juego durante el mismo, a no ser aprobado previamente por el departamento de medios de comunicación. Si son aprobadas las entrevistas se llevaran a cabo en un sitio aprobado, en el lapso antes de empezar la entrada, nunca durante la jugada o en los asientos.

Sala de prensa: Los asientos en la sala de prensa tienen como prioridad a la prensa escrita, departamentos de relaciones publicas visitantes, reporteros visitantes y miembros de la radio y TV que no están al aire durante el partido. La sala de prensa consiste de seis espacios equipados para transmisiones en vivo de Radio o TV. Siguiendo las reglas de MLB y el equipo, no se permite la entrada a menores de 18 años a la sala de prensa los días de juego. Las bebidas alcohólicas están prohibidas a cualquier hora. La sala de prensa esta equipada con servicio de Internet inalámbrico. La clave para usarlo la encontrará en las tarjetas localizadas en su asiento y también estará localizada en la parte de atrás de la sala de prensa.

Acceso al campo de juego: Todos los miembros de la prensa con credenciales con acceso al campo de juego pueden conducir entrevistas durante horarios específicos antes del juego. El campo de juego tiene que ser despejado al menos 60 minutos antes del partido. A ninguna hora se le permitirá a la prensa acceso al campo de acción dentro de las líneas demarcatorias entre primera y tercera base. Las bebidas alcohólicas están prohibidas dentro del campo de juego a cualquier hora.

Práctica de Bateo: Se les prohíbe a los miembros de la prensa tomar fotos o entrevistar a los jugadores mientras estos están practicando el bateo.

Teléfonos Celulares: El uso de teléfonos celulares para entrevistas en el campo de juego o vestidores esta estrictamente prohibido. Todas las entrevistas telefónicas tienen que ser planeadas con anticipación y con el permiso del departamento de medios de comunicación de los Cubs. Una excepción al uso de teléfonos celulares sería en la área del dugout, y solo recibiendo permiso del jugador o de un miembro del departamento de medios de comunicación para conducir la entrevista.

Teléfonos para Prensa: Miembros de la prensa pueden utilizar uno de tres teléfonos de paga localizados en la parte trasera de la sala de prensa. La prensa que desee una línea telefónica para toda la temporada debe ponerse en contacto con un miembro del departamento de medios de comunicación. Los teléfonos aceptan números gratuitos y tarjetas telefónicas. Los teléfonos son para el uso de todos los miembros de la prensa para cumplir con los compromisos de trabajo solamente.

Autógrafos: Todos los miembros de la prensa con credencial, tienen estrictamente prohibido pedir autógrafos o equipo de Wrigley Field. A los infractores de esta regla se les revocará la credencial inmediatamente sin excepciones.

Acceso a los Vestidores (Clubhouse): Los miembros de la prensa tienen que tener un propósito de trabajo específico para obtener acceso a los vestidores. Los vestidores de los Cubs se abren tres horas antes del juego y esta cerrado durante el entrenamiento y práctica de bateo. El Clubhouse abrirá de nuevo 10 minutos al partir de la conclusión del partido. Acceso al vestidor del equipo visitante en Wrigley Field será determinado por las reglas del equipo visitante.

Comida para la Prensa: El comedor para la prensa esta localizado adyacente de la sala de prensa y de los palcos de TV y esta abierto a todos los miembros de la prensa con credencial. Cada almuerzo o cena cuesta \$7.

Spring Training 2014 will mark the Cubs first year at their new complex in Mesa, Ariz., highlighted by Cubs Park - a 15,000-capacity ballpark ... the complex, located by the 101 and 202 interchange, will house both the Cubs major league and minor league spring operations, and will be utilized year-round by the organization.

- © The Cubs new Spring Training complex consists of Cubs Park, modern practice fields, a world-class workout and training facility, as well as offices and clubhouse spaces ... the campus is spread over 142 acres.
- © This will mark the Cubs 36th-consecutive Spring Training in Mesa ... Chicago spent the previous 17 Cactus League seasons at HoHoKam Stadium and Fitch Park.
- © Mesa is the second-largest city in the Phoenix metropolitan area and the third-largest city in Arizona ... Mesa is located southeast of Phoenix and Scottsdale.
 - With a population of more than 440,000, Mesa ranks as one of the fastest growing cities in the United States (among those with populations of at least 200,000) and the 38th-largest city in the country – bigger than Atlanta and Miami.
 - Mesa was founded in January 1878 and was incorporated in July 1883 ... the area of the city is 128 square miles.
