SEASON

REVIEW

It sure was a roller-coaster ride.

From training camp in the fall, to the season's eventual end in the northern Hub City of Edmonton some 11 months later, the 2019-20 Flames had to scratch, claw and grind their way through ups, downs, and everything in between.

The Flames were coming off an historic 2018-19 campaign, earning the second-highest point total in franchise history (107), thanks to an eye-popping 50-25-7 record, a staggering +64 in the goals for/against column, and 288 tallies in total offence that rocketed the locals from 26th overall the year prior, to second in the league last year.

All of it helped the Flames win their first division title in 13 years, the first regular-season conference banner in nearly three decades, and have their captain – 36-year-old Mark Giordano – bring home a key piece of hardware as the NHL's top rearguard.

Hopes were high for a long post-season run, but they fell to the Colorado Avalanche in the first round.

This year was about making things right, said the players, and atoning for that loss.

With some new faces on board – including Milan Lucic, Cam Talbot and Tobias Rieder – the excitement, too, was already at a fever pitch when camp started.

"Honestly," said top centre Sean Monahan, "if we're asking ourselves how basically the same team can come in and fix what didn't work in the playoffs last year, you're looking at it.

"It's on us.

"All of us, here.

"We know what we have in our group. You look at our team and we're deep. We've got the guys that can put up points, we've got an incredible group of defencemen, we've got great goaltending, and the guys that can step up and provide leadership in the locker-room – including the best captain in the league. In my eyes, we have it all.

"You grind through 82 games to not only make the playoffs, but to position yourself well as the top seed, clinching home ice all the way through, to leave what we did on the table (last year) showed every guy in that locker-room that we need to be better.

"And we will be, because we're more than capable of it."

With optimism abound, the Flames were dealt an early blow when it was announced prior to camp that promising young blueliner and former first-round pick Juuso Valimäki would miss a sizeable chunk of the year due to an off-season training injury.

Even with the expanded campaign, the torn ACL would ultimately cost him the season.

But once the recruits took to the ice, the mood perked up.

Matthew Tkachuk – the lone holdover from a long summer of contract negotiations – inked a fresh, three-year pact after a career-best, 34-goal, 77-point season, and was keen to put the team on his shoulders.

He took an even greater step this year, led the team in scoring, dominating games with his unflappable talent and grating, physical panache, and single-handedly brought the Battle of Alberta back from the dead with a spirited effort in each of the mid-season feuds.

"Having the finish we had last year made it even more clear to me that I want to win with this group. I want to win in Calgary," Tkachuk said. "We were a 100-point team last year and basically everyone's back.

"We're chomping at the bit.

The Flames opened the season with a 5-3 road loss to their playoff nemesis, the Avalanche, before returning to the Scotiabank Saddledome and kicking off

the home slate with a 3-0 win over the Vancouver Canucks.

It was that kind of start for this group as they looked to quell the jitters and find their footing in the wild, wild west.

Win one. Lose one. Win two. Lose two.

But by Halloween, spurred by Tkachuk's magical between-the-legs OT winner over Nashville – a goal for the ages – they finally had something to build on.

It was all part of a wild third period that saw the Flames face a 4-1 deficit at the outset, before Tkachuk levelled the count late, then winning it himself with the goal of the year.

"I try that – it seems – like, once a game," Tkachuk laughed. "I'm lucky it went in. I knew there was very little time on the clock. Very little. Like, a couple seconds. Where the puck was, I didn't think I'd be able to get my feet or my body around to keep it on my forehand. I didn't think I'd have the time to do that, and I didn't want to go ahead of it and backhand smack it, so that was the last resort."

As cheeky as it was, and as easy as No. 19 made it seem, it wasn't always the case for these Flames in the season's early going.

By November, adversity struck and began testing the character, the leadership and the mettle within.

Nov. 14 is one of those days etched in the memory of those on the inside. Beloved teammate TJ Brodie collapsed on the ice during practice, required immediate medical attention and was later transported to hospital.

The image, irrevocably vivid, sent shockwaves around the rink.

Thankfully, the episode was later diagnosed as a fainting spell, and no chronic effects were expected, nor observed over the rest of the season.

But the frightful nature of the incident was not easy to overcome.

So frenzied, so troubling was the sight of that playing out in real time, the moment later became a symbol of what this Flames team was all about:

All in.

All together.

"When he first passed out, he was out," General Manager Brad Treliving said during a widely viewed press conference less than 24 hours later. "By the time I got down to the ice, his eyes were open. I don't know if he was communicating a lot, but he was alert."

"It can happen to anybody, but especially when it's a teammate, I think our team was very affected. (Dr.) Ian (Auld) and I were at the hospital all while TJ was there, and it was a stream – the whole team was up there at some point. They were very affected. We met this morning, updated them, but... the closeness on this team was prevalent when they see a teammate in trouble like that."

**Ward talking about the importance of the dressing room**

Understandably stunned, the Flames lost each of their next four and were below .500 as they entered a tough stretch on one of their annual, east-coast road trips.

Early in the swing, Geoff Ward was promoted to the head-coaching role with the requisite, season-long 'interim' tag, after Bill Peters resigned on Nov. 29.

After Ward took over, the Flames won a season-high seven straight games to begin their march up the standings.

Ward — a teacher by trade — was instrumental in this, establishing an open-door policy from Day 1 that empowered the players to be up front and honest with one another, to speak freely about their challenges, celebrate their successes, and — most importantly — to work collaboratively in a solution-based haven.

"We talked again about the importance of the dressing room," Ward said.

"That's our place. So, as a team, as a family, let's insulate ourselves from the noise on the outside and focus on what we need to do.

"I give a lot of credit to the players, how they're dealing with this, and also to the staff.

"Everyone's done a fantastic job of creating an environment that allows them to move forward with what they do for a living and that's play hockey.

"Anything we can do to build normalcy right now, for ourselves and our players, is a good thing."

It was, perhaps, the most pivotal moment of the season for this team – a ceremonial turning of the page, dutifully driven home by a symbolic gesture from the new boss. As they took to the ice for their first practice of the new era, they did so under the beats of Elton John, Queen and so many more at full volume during drills.



"Hockey's fun," Monahan said. "Coming to the rink and having fun, enjoying yourself, that's what it's all about.

"We're trying to keep the energy up in the dressing room and on the ice. Having music on during practice? That's a first for me.

"And I loved it."

Ward, who worked as an associate under Peters since the fall of 2018, had more than two decades of coaching experience under his belt, including half as an assistant with the Boston Bruins — with whom he won the Cup with in 2011 — and New Jersey Devils.

Naturally, over time, paths cross.

And on that championship-winning B's team of yesteryear, Ward and Lucic grew close.

"He did a great job of getting us to buy into one another, buy into the system and make us believe in ourselves, and each other," Lucic said. "Yeah, the systems and X's and O's are all there, but from a motivational standpoint, bringing guys together and making us believe in each other, that's the biggest thing of all."

At the turn of the calendar, the Flames were 21-17-5, with the division lead locked in their sights.

The annual dads' trip — a good luck charm for this troupe — helped open the new year, and the Flames did their pops proud by rattling off a pair of victories and setting their focus on a pivotal second half.

They carried that momentum into the bye week and emerged from the break in a great position to strike.

After beginning the month with an emotionally-charged Battle of Alberta, the Flames hit the road and took down the first-place Canucks to open a critical, west-coast road swing. Dillon Dube, Derek Ryan and Lucic went off, beginning their late-season charge offensively, while showing signs they could be counted on to provide at both ends of the ice during the most important stretch of the season.

Another youngster, Andrew Mangiapane, continued his surge as a legitimate,



top-six threat, netting a hat-trick in another offensive onslaught, 6-4 over the Anaheim Ducks in the team's return to the 'Dome.

With the club heading into the stretch drive, Treliving loaded up at the trade deadline, adding a pair of defencemen to anchor the third pair, and fortify the powerplay and penalty-kill.

Both Erik Gustafsson (a former 60-point player with the Chicago Blackhawks only two years ago) and Derek Forbort (a shutdown specialist with a knack for rib-rattling body-checks) made an immediate impact and gave the Flames a hefty supply of depth as the spring season approached.

"We're happy with what we got accomplished," Treliving said that day in downtown Boston. "Strategically, we may have had to change gears the last three weeks with our injuries on defence. So, you're sitting here and saying, 'OK, if you are going to look to add to your team, and you have specific assets to use, what's the best way to use them?'"

"You come in here, you're either selling and trying to acquire assets, or you're trying to help your team. Where we're at, right now, we wanted to see if we could push it. We wanted to go to the (dressing) room and say, 'Look, we're trying our best to help.'"

The Flames were rounding into form and were showing signs that they were better suited for the playoffs this time after suffering a disappointing, five-game ouster in April, 2019.

Coming off their longest road trip of the season, their best players were firing at will.

Johnny Gaudreau was on a point-per-game pace in the calendar year; Mikael Backlund finished the month of February with nine goals and 19 points in only 15 games – a stretch that included back-to-back three-point efforts and was quickly becoming one of the league's top pivots; Elias Lindholm was ready to crack the 30-goal barrier for the first time in his career; Tkachuk – routinely the hero – contributed eight goals and a team-leading 23 points in the final 20 games of the regular season, but was far from satisfied.

And then there was the goaltending.

The situation created one of the NHL's elite tandems, with Talbot – the

even-keel vet – offering support at both ends for his up-and-coming colleague, David Rittich. Talbot, in particular, had earned the majority of the reps down the stretch and was one of the league leaders in save percentage with a .927 dating back to Dec. 1.

But then, it all went quiet.

Eerily so.

The sport took a back-seat as our world faced and continues to wrestle with an unprecedented public health crisis.

On May 26 – more than two full months after the rinks went dark – the NHL unfurled an impressive, yet equally ambitious 'return-to-play' plan that included a best-of-five, qualifying-round format to begin the playoffs and help set the field for the official, 16-team tournament.

Twenty-four teams including 12 from each conference returned from the freeze, with training camps opening in the clubs' home cities on July 13. The top four seeds in each conference (as determined by their points percentage when the season was paused), received a

'bye' in the opening round, while the remaining 16 teams had to play their way in.

As the eighth seed in the Western Conference with .564 points percentage, the Flames had a date with the ninth-seeded Winnipeg Jets (.563) in the only all-Canadian matchup on the card.

Meanwhile, those who received a bye – the St. Louis Blues, Colorado Avalanche, Vegas Golden Knights and Dallas Stars from the west, and the Boston Bruins, Tampa Bay Lightning, Washington Capitals and Philadelphia Flyers from the east – played a round-robin 'tournament' with regular-season rules to determine seeding.

The Flames made short work of the Jets, winning the set 3-1 to pocket their first playoff-series triumph since the unforgettable, six-game effort over the Vancouver Canucks in 2015.

The Flames out-scored the Jets 16-6 and looked good in the process, with 11 different-goal-scorers combining to light the lamp in the series and lift the Flames over their former Smythe Division counterparts.

Monahan paced the Flames with a pair of goals and four helpers, while four others – Backlund, Gaudreau, Lindholm and Sam Bennett – had multi-goal showings in the series.

Talbot was a rock between the pipes and entered the official first round with a retina-searing .945 save percentage and

miniscule 1.45 goals-against average.

"You have to have a short memory in the playoffs," appraised Ward following the 4-0 series clincher. "The first series is over and we're not even thinking about it. Our group is happy with that we were able to accomplish in the first round. I think we feel good about where we're at as a team, but we're certainly not satisfied.

"We understand we have a challenge ahead of us in the next round, and that's exactly where the focus is at with our group right now. ... They've given us every



indication that they're ready to get going in Round 2."

The Flames — perhaps more than any other team — were thoroughly enjoying the bubble and wanted to make this once-in-a-lifetime experience last.

"We know what we're here for," Tkachuk said. "The past four months, we've been waiting for this moment. Well, we're here now, and we are for a reason.

"We came here to win.

"We didn't work hard for the last nine, 10 months since the start of the year and four months since the pause to come here for a quick vacation.

"This is a really great team, a group of guys, and we all want to win together."

The Flames opened their official first-round series against Dallas with a 3-2 win, with Dube scoring two of his four playoff goals to help set the tone early. The Stars rallied to tie the game midway through the second period, but Rasmus Andersson — who was an absolute stud on the blueline throughout the drama-filled playoff run — netted the eventual game-winner late in the middle frame to send Calgary to a 1-0 series lead.

The Stars replied with a 5-4 victory in Game 2, with Jamie Oleksiak potting the winner with only 40 seconds left after Rieder and leading scorer Bennett — who again rose to playoff prominence with a stunning offensive effort, along with his usually abrasive, punishing physical game throughout the post-season — scored to even things up in the back half of the third.

The contest proved to be a bit of a turning point, though.

And we're not talking about the scoreboard.

Tkachuk went down with a concussion and was sidelined for the rest of the series, making the march back over this formidable foe just that much more difficult.

But the Flames fought back and delivered a stiff, right hook of their own in Game 3. Backlund and TJ Brodie supplied the offence, while Talbot stopped all 35 shots he faced in a 2-0 shutout victory.

He was incredible. Sensational.

Otherworldly, throughout.

The 33-year-old was just trying to get his career back on track.

What actually transpired went miles beyond that.

Talbot finished the playoffs with a sparkling, .924 save percentage and a 2.42 goals-against average that rivalled some of the best in the bubble.

But the Cup? That remains elusive.

For now, anyway.

The Stars won three straight, including a dramatic, 5-4 overtime finish in Game 5 — one in which the Flames were only 11 seconds away from taking a 3-1 series stranglehold.

But it wasn't to be.

The Flames fell 2-1 in Game 5, and 7-3 in the clinching contest only 48 hours later after assembling a 3-0, first-period lead.

Certainly, there's no quick fix when it comes to managing the emotions of a Cup chase gone awry.

But the Flames — who finished the regular season with a 36-27-7 record — made many of a believer with how they competed in this year's playoffs.

Including, themselves.

The belief that starts — unequivocally — from within.

And that, unlike any previous year, is truly something to build on.

"Now, our guys aren't afraid to have the hard conversations with each other," Ward said. "In order to be successful, you have to be able to deal with each other in different ways — as people, and as players and coaches. And that's a different kind of communication.

"That part is difficult to achieve, because when you talk about what you need from a player, or what players need from each other ... some guys take it as a slight to their self-esteem and they can fall apart on you.

"Now, they realize that the wins are more important than individual goals. All those things are really important to us as we go along into this next stage of becoming a contending team." ■
