JARMO KEKALAINEN
GENERAL MANAGER AND ALTERNATE GOVERNOR

Jarmo Kekalainen was named the third general manager in Columbus Blue Jackets history on February 13, 2013. Since his arrival, the Blue Jackets have enjoyed the best on-ice stretch in club history, posting their three winningest

seasons over the past three campaigns: 2016-17 (50-24-8, 108 pts), 2018-19 (47-31-4, 98 pts.) and 2017-18 (45-30-7, 97 pts.).

Columbus has also registered 42-plus wins in five of the past six campaigns and earned four Stanley Cup Playoff berths during his tenure. The Blue Jackets are one of seven teams to qualify for the playoffs in each of the past three seasons and registered three consecutive winning seasons for the first time from 2012-15.

The first European-born general manager in NHL history, he served as assistant general manager for Finland's World Cup of Hockey 2016 team and at the 2014 Olympic Games in Sochi, Russia, where the squad won the bronze medal. He arrived in Columbus after a stint as the president and general manager of Jokerit in the Finnish Elite League from 2010-13.

Kekalainen spent eight seasons with the St. Louis Blues from 2002-10. He joined the club as director of amateur scouting and was named assistant general manager and director of amateur scouting in 2005. In that role, he was involved in all facets of hockey operations, including professional scouting efforts and overseeing the club's amateur scouting and draft preparations. During his eight years in St. Louis, the Blues drafted players such as David Backes, Roman Polak, David Perron, T.J. Oshie, Patrik Berglund and Alex Pietrangelo.

Kekalainen was a member of the Ottawa Senators organization from 1995-2002, serving as director of player personnel for three years and also overseeing the amateur draft and the club's scouting efforts in Europe. While working with the Senators, he also served as general manager of IFK Helsinki in the Finnish Elite League from 1995 to 1999 and led the club to the league championship in 1998.

As a player, he appeared in 55 career NHL games with the Senators and Boston Bruins during a six-year career. A left wing, he scored five goals and added eight assists for 13 points with 28 penalty minutes, including a career-high 1-5-6 and 14 penalty minutes in 28 games with the Senators during the 1993-94 season. He also played in the American Hockey League and his native Finland before wrapping up his playing career with Vasteras IK in the Swedish Elite League in 1994-95.

Before signing with the Bruins, Kekalainen played two seasons at Clarkson University from 1987-89. He was named to the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference First All-Star Team after tallying 19-25-44 and 47 penalty minutes in 31 games during the 1988-89 season. He also represented Finland at the 1986 World Junior Championships and the 1991 Canada Cup Tournament.

Kekalainen was born on July 3, 1966 in Tampere, Finland. He has a bachelor's degree in management from Clarkson University and a master's in business marketing from the University of Tampere.

He and his wife, Tiina, are the parents of daughters, Emilia and Sofia.



BILL ZITO
**SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT OF HOCKEY OPERATIONS,
 ASSOCIATE GENERAL MANAGER AND ALTERNATE GOVERNOR**

Bill Zito joined the club in August 2013 as assistant general manager and was promoted to associate general manager in September 2018. He was named the team's senior vice president of hockey operations, associate general manager

and alternate governor on June 13, 2019.

Since joining the Blue Jackets, he has been an integral part of the club's management team in the areas of contract negotiations, scouting and player evaluation, salary cap management and budgeting. He also served as general manager of the Cleveland Monsters, Columbus' American Hockey League affiliate, from 2015-19. That Monsters team became the first Blue Jackets affiliate in franchise history to win a Calder Cup championship in 2016.

Zito served as the general manager of the United States Men's National Team that captured bronze at the 2018 IIHF World Championships in Denmark and was a member of the management team for the Team USA squad that won a bronze medal at the 2015 IIHF World Championships.

Zito joined the Blue Jackets after using scouting as a platform to build Acme World Sports into one of the top hockey agencies in the business. In 2013, Forbes ranked Acme as the eighth-most valuable hockey agency in the world with almost \$200 million in contracts under management. In 2007, The Hockey News lauded Zito in their "genius" issue for his scouting prowess, noting his ability to uncover late-round or undrafted, lesser-known players as well as the top picks.

As the agency's founder and president, he represented players such as Vezina Trophy and Conn Smythe Trophy winner Tim Thomas, Vezina Trophy winner Tuukka Rask, Vezina Trophy finalist Antti Niemi and All-Stars Kimmo Timonen and Brian Rafalski.

He is a graduate of Yale University, where he played varsity hockey from 1984-87. After a one-year stint playing hockey in Europe, Zito attended law school at the University of Wisconsin and during that time served as an assistant coach for the Badgers hockey team. Upon earning his law degree, he practiced appellate litigation and sports law in Chicago before founding Acme in 1995.

Zito was born on September 16, 1964 in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. He and his wife, Julie, are the parents of twin daughters, Gigi and Frankie, and son, Billy.



BASIL MCRAE
ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER

Basil McRae was named assistant general manager for the Columbus Blue Jackets on June 13, 2019 after serving the previous three seasons as director of player personnel. He was a scout for the club in 2013-14.

McRae, who has been a part owner of the Ontario Hockey League's London Knights since 2000, also spent two years as alternate governor and general manager of the club from 2014-16. London captured OHL and Memorial Cup championships in 2016. Prior to his original stint in Columbus, McRae

served as a scout for the St. Louis Blues for five seasons.

In addition to two decades of scouting experience, McRae played 16 seasons in the NHL between 1981-96, registering 53 goals and 83 assists for 136 points with 2,453 penalty minutes in 576 games with the Quebec Nordiques, Toronto Maple Leafs, Detroit Red Wings, Minnesota North Stars, Tampa Bay Lightning, St. Louis Blues and Chicago Blackhawks. The Beaverton, Ontario native was a fifth round pick of Quebec in the 1980 NHL Draft.

He and his wife, Jill, are the parents of son, Philip, and daughters, Alexandra and Abigail.



JOSH FLYNN
ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER

Josh Flynn was named as an assistant general manager for the Columbus Blue Jackets on June 13, 2019 after previously serving as the director of hockey administration. He is responsible for assisting in all facets of the hockey operations

department, including salary cap management, contract negotiations and research, salary arbitration, statistical research and strategic planning, and he is the club's liaison to the National Hockey League regarding matters pertaining to the NHL-NHLPA collective bargaining agreement.

Flynn joined the Blue Jackets hockey operations department in June 2008 after spending the previous two seasons with KO Sports Agency in Denver, Colorado, where he worked on contract negotiations for several NHL players represented by the agency.

Flynn was born on December 8, 1982 in Toronto, Ontario. He received a bachelor's degree in political science from the University of Toronto in 2004 and earned his Juris Doctorate from the Sturm College of Law at the University of Denver in 2007.

He and his wife, Jen, reside in Upper Arlington with her daughter, Parker.



CHRIS CLARK
DIRECTOR OF PLAYER PERSONNEL

Chris Clark was promoted to director of player personnel for the Columbus Blue Jackets on June 13, 2019 after spending the previous seven seasons with the club as a development coach and most recently its director of player development.

While continuing to be involved with the development of players throughout the organization, he will have an active role in evaluating personnel at the NHL level and will serve as the general manager of the Cleveland Monsters, the club's American Hockey League affiliate.

A native of South Windsor, Connecticut, Clark registered 103-111-214 and 700 penalty minutes in 607 career NHL games with the Blue Jackets, Washington Capitals and Calgary Flames, including 8-12-20 and 59 penalty minutes in 89 games with Columbus from 2009-11. He spent four-plus seasons with the Capitals, tallying 60-63-123 and 278 penalty minutes in 240 games with the club and serving as captain from 2006-09.

Calgary's third pick, 77th overall, in the 1994 NHL Draft, Clark earned All-ECAC honors during four seasons at Clarkson University from 1994-98. He spent six seasons in the Flames organization from 1998-04, and helped the club reach the 2004 Stanley Cup Final.



RICK NASH
SPECIAL ASSISTANT TO THE GENERAL MANAGER

Rick Nash was named special assistant to the general manager of the Columbus Blue Jackets on June 13, 2019 and will assist the hockey operations department in a variety of areas, including player evaluations, player recruitment and prospect development. The former Blue Jackets captain announced

his retirement as a player following a 15-year career in January 2019.

Nash spent his first nine NHL seasons with the Blue Jackets after the club selected him with the first overall pick at the 2002 NHL Draft and served as the club's captain from 2008-12. He is the franchise's all-time leader in games played, goals, assists and points as he registered 289-258-547 and 568 penalty minutes in 674 games from 2002-12. In 1,060 career NHL games, the Brampton, Ontario native tallied 437-368-805 and

750 penalty minutes with Columbus, NY Rangers and Boston.

Nash was a finalist for the Calder Memorial Trophy as the NHL's top rookie and an All-Rookie Team selection in 2002-03. He won the Maurice "Rocket" Richard Trophy as the NHL's top goal scorer in 2003-04 when he notched 41-16-57 in 80 games and received the NHL Foundation Player Award in 2008-09 for his contributions off the ice and in the community. He appeared in five All-Star Games as a Blue Jacket (2004, 2007, 2008, 2009, 2011) and one as a Ranger (2015), and represented Canada at three Olympic Games (2006, 2010-gold and 2014-gold), four IIHF World Championships (2005-silver, 2007-gold, 2008-silver, 2011) and one IIHF World Junior Championship (2002-silver).

He and his wife, Jessica, are the parents of sons, McLaren and Finn; and daughter, Ellie. The family resides in Upper Arlington.



VILLE SIREN
DIRECTOR OF AMATEUR SCOUTING

Ville Siren was named director of amateur scouting of the Columbus Blue Jackets on July 6, 2016 after serving as the club's head amateur scout since joining the organization on July 8, 2013.

Siren spent nine seasons as a member of the St. Louis Blues scouting staff from 2003-13. During that time, he was instrumental in the club's selection of current NHL players such as Vladimir Tarasenko (1st Rd., 2010), Lars Eller (1st Rd., 2007), Patrik Berglund (1st Rd., 2006) and Roman Polak (6th Rd., 2004).

Prior to joining the Blues, he spent the 2002-03 season working with Tampere of the Finnish Elite League and scouted for the Washington

Capitals from 1999-2002. A defenseman, Siren was selected by the Hartford Whalers in the second round, 23rd overall, of the 1983 NHL Draft and made his NHL debut with the Pittsburgh Penguins during the 1985-86 season. He went on to register 14 goals and 68 assists for 82 points with 276 penalty minutes in 290 career NHL games with the Penguins and Minnesota North Stars from 1985-90.

He also played nine seasons in Finland, Sweden and Switzerland before retiring in 1999, and represented Finland in numerous international competitions including the 1984 and 1992 Olympic Games, 1987 and 1991 Canada Cup tournaments, 1983 and 1984 World Junior Championships and 1985, 1991 and 1993 World Championships. Siren was born on Feb. 11, 1964 in Tampere, Finland. He is the father of a son, Viktor.



CHRIS MOREHOUSE
ASSISTANT DIRECTOR OF AMATEUR SCOUTING

Chris Morehouse was named assistant director of amateur scouting of the Columbus Blue Jackets on July 6, 2016. He most recently served as a pro scout for the club after originally joining the Jackets' scouting department as an amateur scout in 2013.

Morehouse joined the Blue Jackets after graduating from St. Thomas University in Fredericton, New Brunswick. As a player, Morehouse spent three seasons with the Moncton Wildcats of the Quebec Major Junior Hockey League from 2005-08. He played professionally for two seasons in the ECHL and Central Hockey League from 2009-11 before playing two seasons and earning his degree at St Thomas. 



"The upside is enormous," a scout said. "When you're talking potential, it's not a landslide for Hughes, but it's definitive. Hughes' potential is huge. He's an elite skater, an elite thinker and an elite skill player. He has an ability to process and execute at high speeds."

Any concern about Hughes' 5-foot-10, 168-pound frame is negated by the fact the NHL now has a firm place for the undersized ultra-skilled player. And the fact is, while he doesn't seek physical play, he doesn't shy away from it either. "A lot of nights with him, he's a smaller version of McDavid," said another scout.

He defends well, strong down low, has creativity and a finishing touch, and he's strong for his age. And he has some feistiness."

"Just by getting older, he's going to add a dimension to his game. There's a power dimension that isn't there yet."

He helped Russia to a bronze in the Hlinka-Gretzky tournament with eight goals and 11 points in five games and had three goals and eight points in six games at the World Jr. A Challenge.

Zegras actually has a better shot than Hughes but is seen as more of a playmaker than a scorer. Zegras also has some edge to his game. "He has high-level potential," said one scout. "I don't think he's a boom-or-bust guy, but there's a big swath between his top potential and his bottom potential. This guy could be an A-plus or a B-minus."

Zegras has committed to Boston University, and his major junior rights are owned by the OHL Mississauga Steelheads. Either way, he'll need time to develop, but a team willing to be patient may end up with a reward once he matures. His smarts and positioning make him potentially an effective two-way center at the NHL level.

Once he takes on a more prominent role than the one he has, he may prove to be more of a primary player than a secondary one.

"You know with some goalies how they're always scrambling and making acrobatic saves? Then in the NHL they can't stop a beach ball because guys can score from anywhere. This guy just moves so easy. He reads the play really well. He doesn't overreact. He doesn't waste his energy."

With his poise and confidence, it should come as no surprise that Knight is a superior puckhandler, sometimes acting almost as a third defenseman. But he also has a high compete level that you don't often see in goalies who are so calm. "I don't know what tools goaltenders need that this guy doesn't have," said another scout.

overthink the comparable when talking about Heinola. Scouts in Europe are pretty much unanimous in thinking that he resembles a Finnish rookie with



the Dallas Stars. "He's a poor man's Miro Heiskanen," said one scout. "His skating isn't there yet, but his

hockey sense is top-notch, and he has the offense. You can't buy that kind of hockey sense."

Heinola's output with Lukko was actually better than Heiskanen's totals with HIFK in his draft year, but numbers aren't everything, of course. Heinola did get a chance to shine on the international stage with gold-medal Finland at the WJC in Vancouver, playing on a pairing with Chicago rookie Henri Jokiharju. Unfortunately, Heinola's tournament was cut short by an injury in the quarterfinal against Canada. But his skill set is projectable and he'll be a key member of next year's squad, just like Heiskanen was. "He's a pure player," said another scout. "His great hockey sense and mindset allows him to execute well. He's like Heiskanen the way they feel everything and can be cool in the tough moments."

THE BEST OF TIMES for Broberg came at the beginning. Starring for Sweden at the Hlinka-Gretzky under-18 tournament in August, Broberg collected points and accolades, making him an early favorite in the 2019 draft class. But success was harder to find after that.

Broberg made Sweden's WJC team as an injury replacement for Toronto prospect Timothy Liljegren, only to be felled in Victoria by a flu that ran through the Swedish room. "The size and the skating is such an advantage from the get-go," said one scout. "He has hockey sense and he's got good hands. His skating allows him to join the offensive rush and also get back in time on defense. The world juniors was tough for him. Usually players get more confidence, but the (AIK) coaches showed less in him afterwards."

Broberg had a chance to make amends at the world under-18s, but his lofty perch in the draft rankings had already taken a hit. "He started well but has gone down as the season went on," said another scout. "He's big and can skate, but his puck-moving has been questioned. Most guys I know have Victor Soderstrom ahead of him."

THE GERMAN LEAGUE is not the best league in Europe, but anyone who can take a regular shift on defense in the DEL as an 18-year-old is someone who has potential to play in the NHL down the road – and Seider did just that.

Although he didn't command the game because of his rookie status, he did manage to have an increased impact as the season progressed. He was rewarded for his play by being named the DEL's rookie of the year. "The first game I saw him, he looked good, and he looked like a rookie," a scout said. "A month later, he looked good, and he didn't look like a rookie. That's a pretty good transformation at that level. He looks like a solid two-way guy. He looks like an excellent defender who can really move the puck."

With his size and the fact he's a right shot, Seider is an intriguing but raw prospect. He's sure to add another 20 pounds to his tall frame in the coming years. He was a force in the Div. 1A World Junior Championship, leading Germany to the gold medal and a return to the top grouping, where he'll undoubtedly anchor the blueline in 2020.

PATRICK POULIN WAS drafted ninth overall in 1991 and played 634 NHL games on the basis of his size and impeccable work ethic. Twenty-eight years later, the same thing could

be said about his son, Samuel. "The term power forward gets thrown around too cavalierly," said a scout, "but this guy looks like he has some of those attributes."

Another scout said the difference in Poulin was noticeable from the start of the season when he helped Canada win gold at the Hlinka-Gretzky under-18 tournament. He's also added a speed element to his game, which has made him more dangerous offensively. Suddenly, a player who was pegged as a third-liner by many scouts is beginning to show intriguing potential, in part because he increased his compete level. "All you see when you watch this kid play is he makes things happen," said another scout. "I don't know if he's gotten in better shape, but his skating got better throughout the year. It looks like a strength now."

Poulin's rate of production will determine whether he makes it as a second-, third- or fourth-liner in the NHL.

IT WOULD HAVE BEEN understandable if young McMichael had faded into the woodwork as the season went on, but that didn't happen.

Despite London getting Alex Formenton back from the Ottawa Senators in November, getting Vegas pick Paul Cotter from West-ern Michigan two weeks later and adding overager Kevin Hancock at the deadline, the Knights still received solid production from McMichael. "He's the kind of guy who kills you quietly," said one scout. "You won't notice him for most of the game, then you look up and he's got two points. He's not a dynamic player, but he's quietly efficient. He's quick, smart and skilled. He finds holes and makes himself available for chances."

Playing for the Knights doesn't hurt, either. "The London factor kicks in, kinda like Liam Foudy last year," said another scout. "He may go a bit higher because of how well they develop players. He needs to get stronger, though."

McMichael actually out-pointed Foudy, the Columbus first-rounder, this season. Once some of the older Knights graduate, expect the kid to take on a larger role.

AFTER BREAKING HIS wrist in the Hlinka-Gretzky tournament in the summer, Pelletier roared out of the gate in the QMJHL and never looked back, earning recognition as the



league's top prospect for the 2019 draft. Size has always been an issue with Pelletier, but

scouts have been unable to ignore his sublime level of hockey sense. He's also a three-zone player who competes at a very high level. "What the kid does is he puts up numbers at every level he's ever played at," said one scout. "He didn't just put up numbers his draft year. He's put up numbers everywhere he's ever been. Those guys don't do that by accident."

Pelletier posted an 89-point season in 2018-19, using his speed and smarts to get to pucks quickly and knowing what to do once he got them on his stick. Durability is an issue. His touch around the net is not. "His shot is good, but it's more deceptive than it is hard," said another scout. "Goalies seem to have a hard time reading his shot. He gets it off really quickly and on awkward angles and in stride."

His compete level is elite, and he excels at the possession game.

IF LEASON ENDS UP having a productive career, you can count on scouts from all 31 teams having sleepless nights over it. Anyone in the league could have had Leason last year in the seventh



round, but 217 names were called and his wasn't. And he wasn't on anyone's radar to get selected

in 2017, either. This year, there's a good chance the 20-year-old won't even get through the first round without hearing his name.

Stuck on the fourth line with the Tri-City Americans, Leason was dealt to the Prince Albert Raiders early in 2017-18 and responded with 121 points in 109 games with the Raiders over two seasons and represented Canada in the WJC. "The biggest question with Leason is has he figured it out and grown into himself as a player, or is he an older player taking advantage of being an older player?" asked one scout. "I would say it's both."

Even though Leason has made enormous strides this season, there are some scouts who wonder whether his game has room to grow. "He's come a million miles in a short period of time," said another scout. "How much further is he going to go?"

TALK ABOUT ENDING THE season on a high note: Brink was the USHL's forward of the week three times in a row before the playoffs began.

His 1.58 points per game was tops in the league among regular players, and had he not missed a big chunk of time due to injury, he



would've won the scoring title. He was also the MVP at the World Jr. A Challenge, winning gold with Team USA. "I love Bobby Brink," said one scout. "He's close to top-10 good - underrated. He's not a pretty skater, but his hockey sense is special. His determination is excellent - you can toss out names like Joe Pavelski and Jake Guentzel in comparison. He's always the best player on the ice."

A couple other comparative names to toss out there? Brock Boeser and Kyle Connor, two other USHLers with similar goal-scoring totals in their draft years. Brink is smaller than those two, but he gets the job done. "The puck follows him," said another scout. "He makes other players better, and he is a legit playmaker. He's not the prettiest skater, but he gets from A to B. An excellent skill set."

Brink is off to NCAA Denver.

HOGLANDER HAS BEEN on the scene for awhile, getting into his first pro games against men back in 2016-17 when he was with AIK. This season, he played almost exclusively at the



top level for Rogle and showed a lot of growth in doing so. "He's a creative player, and he earned

the trust of his coaches early on this season," said one scout. "He got more and more ice time, going from seven minutes to 14 minutes a night. He does good things out there. He's agile with good hands. He's smaller, so that will be his challenge."

As a late 2000 birthday, he was not eligible for the world under-18s this spring, but his play with the under-20 team all season was successful. The key for evaluators will be to forecast where he can play in their future lineup. "He has lots of energy, lots of creativity," said another scout. "He's always 100 percent with his work ethic. He always starts something when he's on the ice and is hard to play against. He's not smart enough to be the go-to offensive guy, but he can pop up from the second or third line and contribute."

"He's got an absolute rocket of a shot, which he doesn't use enough, plain and simple," said another scout. "So here you've got a guy with a rocket shot, and it's not a weapon. That doesn't mean it can't be."

Robertson's mobility, strength and long reach make him an imposing figure to beat defensively.

Nonetheless, he is a trusted player and saw playoff time in the SHL after the junior squad was knocked out in the semifinal.

So why isn't Beecher rated higher? Well, scouts who have watched him play with the U.S. development team would like to see more consistency of effort. "There are some nights you want him in the first round," said one scout, "and other nights you want him in the fifth round."

Beecher's first-round upside is enhanced by the fact he's an effortless skater who moves as well as any big man in this draft. But one of the knocks on Beecher is that, for all the physical tools he possesses, he sometimes has trouble reading the game. "I don't think he's going to make anyone around him better, but in those roles he doesn't have to," said another scout. "There's a lot of space behind him as he goes into an area, so a good player and a smart player, even if he's not making a play to get you the puck, he's creating space behind him where you can get the puck."

Beecher is set to join NCAA Michigan in the fall.

"He plays reckless, and it's both good and bad," said one scout. "He impacts the other team. The other team knows when he's on the ice. He's hurt players, and he creates anxiety for the other team on the forecheck."

There is a lot of room to grow for Rees. As he develops, he will learn to pick his spots better. That will result in fewer suspensions and fewer possibilities for him to get injured. "He's a little undersized, but the compete and work ethic is second to none," said another scout. "He's going to get bigger and stronger. It's going to happen eventually for him."



improved since Day 1," said one scout. "He excels with the puck, and that team goes as he goes, which

is pretty impressive for a young player. He's strong, has good pace with the puck and a good shot. He just hasn't acclimated to North America yet. Sometimes he's not there the whole game."

That inconsistency was picked up on by another talent hawk, who nonetheless sees impressive upside in the winger. "The first third of his season was really good, and ever since, he's been a bit hit-and-miss," said another scout. "He's super talented but a bit of a weak skater. I don't want to compare him to Vladimir Tarasenko, but he can score, and the puck follows him around."

Like a number of Europeans (including a number of fellow Russians), Firstov is committed to play at NCAA Connecticut, and the Huskies have become adept at developing international student-athletes the past few years.

There's lots to like."

That's the good-cop evaluation of his game. Here's the bad-cop take: "He shows no separation speed, which is a concern," said another scout. "He needs to show more desire in pursuing pucks. He has dropped in my mind. But he has a good hockey mind and can make plays."

Not only did Farinacci captain the Dexter squad, but he also wore the 'C' for Team USA's entry at the summer Hlinka-Gretzky tournament, notching a point per game. He's a Harvard commit.

was just learning the league," said one scout. "He played very well in the second half. Good athlete, good skater, good board play, and he's reliable. They moved him from center to the wing, and it helped. The upside is pretty good."

Not all evaluators were so forgiving, however. "He's just OK for me," said another scout. "He was highly touted coming in. He's a skilled guy and understands the game, but he needs to be more involved and engaged. In London, there's a pecking order for special teams, and he hasn't forced himself onto it." He's a wide-bodied player who is dogged on the puck and plays with a high degree of energy. "If he hits his lowest-case

scenario for potential, there are still a lot of reasons why you want this guy," said one scout. "If he hits his higher potential, then you're laughing all the way to the bank."

Mastro Simone, bound for Boston University, has everything in his game. He can play a physical style despite his size, but he also has the ability to create some offense and is responsible in his own end. To suggest he could be a first-line winger is a stretch, but he has the potential to carve a niche as a second- or third-liner. "At his size, you want his skating to be better, but it's good enough," said another scout. "The question is, is he your F6 or your F9? The good news is he's not going to be any less than your F9."

Mastro Simone has shown good sniping ability in junior. If that translates at the pro level, he's a decent bet to be an F6.

"The negative is I don't know the path he's going on," said another scout. "It sounds like the NCAA would be tough for him to get into. Having said that, he can score in bunches. He's an enigma."

He's not seen as a player who will be on a first power-play unit at the NHL level, but he could be on the second. Scouts love his enthusiastic approach to the game, knowing full well he'll have to play a more controlled style for his game to translate to the next level. ➤ IF SCOUTS ASSESSED Sogaard strictly on his body of work at the world juniors, he wouldn't get drafted at all. Luckily for him, he came to the WHL and put together a very good campaign with Medicine Hat.

Sogaard and Denmark had a tournament they'd rather forget. He gave up more than 30 goals in five games and had a save percentage of .802.

The most intriguing aspect of Sogaard is his size. Simply put, he's an enormous young man, and when he goes post-to-post with the butterfly spread, there's a two-foot area down low where it's almost impossible to score. "He was good when some of those young things he does are compensated by a level playing field," said a scout. "He's not getting any smaller, and he's an elite athlete."

Said another scout: "This is a kid who is tearing up the WHL. He has size and extremely good athletic ability. Then, when you look at how big he is, now it's at another level. But there's sloppiness to his game. There are holes in his game."

Goalies are long-term projects. He's best suited to a team with multiple picks in the second round.
