# September 11, 2001

## 10th Anniversary

It was 10 years ago that the worst terrorist attacks in our nation's history took place on September 11, 2001. The New York Yankees remember all of the men, women and children who lost their lives or had their lives changed forever by that tragic Tuesday morning.

That evening the Yankees were scheduled to host the Chicago White Sox at 7:05 pm with Roger Clemens going for his 20th win of the season. However the original Yankee Stadium would remain silent after a morning of destruction and terrible loss in New York City, Arlington County, Va., and Shanksville, Penn.

Heroes from all walks of life pulled together that day, with many giving the ultimate sacrifice.

At the urging of President George W. Bush, Americans tried as best they could to return to the normal fabric of their everyday lives. Baseball, the most American of institutions, played a major role. One week after the attacks, the Major Leagues resumed its schedule with the Yankees on the road in Chicago vs. the White Sox.

Yankee Stadium reopened for baseball on September 25 with the Yankees hosting the Tampa Bay

Devil Rays. In front of a packed Stadium, the Yankees held a "Tribute to America" prior to first pitch, including a rendition of "Taps," followed by the Harlem Boys Choir performance of "We Shall Overcome." Michael Bolton then sang "Lean on Me," before "God Bless America" was performed. Police, firefighters and emergency workers lined the field with Yankees players as


Challenger, the bald eagle, was walked to the mound and Max Von Essen, the son of Fire Commissioner Thomas Von Essen, sang the national anthem. Wearing caps from the NYPD and FDNY, the Yankees lost an emotional game, 4-0, but still managed to clinch the AL East division title that evening thanks to a Boston loss.

A service in honor of the missing and dead was held at Yankee Stadium on September 23, 2001. Hosted by Oprah Winfrey and James Earl Jones, *A Prayer for America* included performances by Placido Domingo ("Ave Maria"), Bette Midler ("The Wind Beneath My Wings"), Lee Greenwood ("God Bless the U.S.A.") and the Harlem Boys Choir ("We Shall Overcome"), as well as remarks from New York City Mayor Rudolph Giuliani.

The drama of the 2001 postseason provided a welcome distraction from the heartache. Though the Yankees would eventually fall in Game 7 of the World Series to Arizona, the club took pride in its role in the nation's healing process.

## Harold Z. (Hal) Steinbrenner

### Managing General Partner / Co-Chairperson

Hal Steinbrenner begins his 21st season with the New York Yankees organization in 2011 and his third as Managing General Partner / Co-Chairperson. On November 20, 2008, Major League Baseball formalized Mr. Steinbrenner's role as the New York Yankees' managing partner.

Under Mr. Steinbrenner's leadership, the Yankees have retained and enhanced their global popularity while continuing to field championship-caliber teams. In 2010, the franchise led Baseball in home and road attendance, combining to draw 6,595,941 fans while reaching the postseason for the 15<sup>th</sup> time in the last 16 seasons (1995-07, 09-10). In his first full year as Managing General Partner in 2009, the Yankees capped their historic inaugural season in Yankee Stadium with their 27th World Championship.

The 42-year-old son of George Steinbrenner was elected General Partner by the New York Yankees Partnership in 1996, and he held that title for 13 seasons. In 2007, Mr. Steinbrenner was also named Chairman of Yankee Global Enterprises, LLC.

Along with General Partner / Co-Chairperson Hank Steinbrenner, his responsibilities include overseeing all areas of the club's business and baseball operations, and directing financial aspects of the New York Yankees, Yankee Global Enterprises and affiliates. In addition, he serves on the Board of Directors for Legends Hospitality, LLC, a concession and merchandising company developed with the Dallas Cowboys, which operates at the Yankees' and Cowboys' new stadiums.

Mr. Steinbrenner is also Chairman and CEO of Steinbrenner Hotel Properties and holds a seat on both the Board of Directors of the Boys & Girls Club of Tampa Bay and the Special Operations Warrior Foundation.

Mr. Steinbrenner attended Culver Military Academy and graduated from Williams College in 1991 with a Bachelor of Arts degree. He earned a Master's degree in Business Administration from the University of Florida in 1994. Mr. Steinbrenner and his wife, Christina, currently reside in Tampa, Fla.



## Henry G. (Hank) Steinbrenner

### General Partner / Co-Chairperson

Hank Steinbrenner begins his fourth season as General Partner and third season as Co-Chairperson of the New York Yankees. Along with Managing General Partner / Co-Chairperson Hal Steinbrenner, the 53-year-old son of George Steinbrenner is responsible for overseeing all areas of the club's business and baseball operations.

Prior to the 2008 season, Mr. Steinbrenner was directly involved in the delicate negotiations and eventual re-signings of Yankees All-Stars Jorge Posada, Mariano Rivera and Alex Rodriguez, while guiding the managerial search that concluded with the hiring of former Yankees catcher and bench coach Joe Girardi, who led the club to the 2009 World Series title. Mr. Steinbrenner was also part of the collaborative front office effort of the 2008-09 offseason, which led to the signings of free agent first baseman Mark Teixeira and pitchers CC Sabathia and A.J. Burnett, who helped propel the club to the 27<sup>th</sup> championship in franchise history.

Mr. Steinbrenner has served as Chairman and Director of Minch Transit Company, Vice President and Director of Bay Farms Corporation, Vice President and Director of Mid-Florida Hotels Corporation, and has been a member of the board of the Ocala Breeders Sales Company. In the Tampa Bay community, he has been involved in a number of children's charities.

In 2010, Mr. Steinbrenner sponsored and supervised "Hank's Yanks," an 18-and-under summer league baseball team comprised of teenagers from a variety of socioeconomic backgrounds in the New York community. The team—in their first season—captured the championship of Yaphank, Long Island's "Baseball Heaven" league and also won the inaugural "Boss' Cup" game played at Yankee Stadium.

Mr. Steinbrenner attended Culver Military Academy and Central Methodist College. He is the father of four children and resides in Tampa, Fla.

#### Hot Ticket

The Yankees drew 3,765,803 fans in their second season of play in Yankee Stadium in 2010, marking the highest home attendance for any Major League team in 2010...the Yankees also led the Majors averaging 46,491 per game, surpassing their home attendance figures for the 2009 regular season (3,719,358 total/45,918 per game)...marked the eighth consecutive season the Yankees led the AL in attendance (2003-10)...the organization also led the Majors in road attendance (2,830,138)...the Yankees' combined draw of 6,595,941 fans topped the American League for the 12th consecutive season. The Yankees currently own five of the six largest single-season attendance totals in professional sports history, including the all-time mark of 7,325,051 fans in 2006. In addition, the Yankees are the only Major League franchise to reach the four-million mark in home attendance in four straight seasons, accomplishing the feat from 2005-08.

Her present responsibilities include the implementation and integration of various community programs relating to Yankee Stadium. In addition, she serves in a supervisory role for the New York Yankees and Tampa Yankees Foundations, overseeing numerous local, regional and national outreach efforts.

Ms. Steinbrenner has a distinguished record of contributing to community projects and initiatives, including current commitments on the Florida State Fair Authority (Executive Committee, Agricultural Committee, and Chairwoman of the Marketing Committee), Board of Directors of Mary Lee's House (a child protection and advocacy center in Tampa), Board of Directors and Executive Committee of the H.B. Plant Museum, Board of Directors of the New York Pops, and Advisory Committee for the Tampa Salvation Army. She has also held prior board positions with the Children's Cancer Center of Tampa, Boys & Girls Clubs of Tampa Bay, Florida Orchestra, Red Cross of Tampa and Culver Academies.

A Morehead Scholar and 1981 graduate of the University of North Carolina with a Bachelor of Science degree in business administration, Ms. Steinbrenner continues her commitment to the university, serving on the UNC Board of Visitors and the Parents Council. Her daughter, Haley, received her undergraduate degree from UNC in 2008, and her son, Stephen, is currently a senior there.

Ms. Steinbrenner was born in Cleveland, Ohio, and makes her home in Tampa, Fla.



## Jessica Steinbrenner

### General Partner / Vice Chairperson

Jessica Steinbrenner begins her third full season as General Partner / Vice Chairperson for the New York Yankees. The younger daughter of George M. Steinbrenner previously served in the role of Senior Vice President for the team in 2008.

In addition, Mrs. Steinbrenner serves as the Chief Executive Officer of Bay Farms Corporation and serves on the board of the Florida Thoroughbred Breeders' and Owners' Association. She has also authored two children's books: *My Sleepy Room* and *My Messy Room*.

She attended Culver Girls Academy and graduated from Sweet Briar College in Virginia. Mrs. Steinbrenner currently resides in Tampa, Fla., with her husband, Felix, and her four children.



## Joan Z. Steinbrenner

### Vice Chairperson

Joan Steinbrenner holds the position of Vice Chairperson of the New York Yankees. Mrs. Steinbrenner was married to Principal Owner George M. Steinbrenner from 1956 until his passing in 2010.

Mrs. Steinbrenner has participated in many community projects and supported numerous philanthropic organizations. Among her many dignified community roles, she was named State Chairperson for the Florida Special Olympics in 1981 and 1982, and for two years was on the Board of Directors of the National Society to Prevent Blindness. She was also a charter member of Town and Gown, established in 1977 in an effort to form a bond between community supporters in the downtown Tampa area and the University of South Florida.

In addition, Mrs. Steinbrenner was a longtime board member for Children's Home, Inc., and was one of the original members of the H.B. Plant Museum Society. From 1991 to 2000 she served on the Development Council of St. Joseph's Hospital Foundation Board. She currently is a member of the Junior League of Tampa, the Chiselers, and sits on the Board of Directors for the Florida Orchestra.

A graduate of Upper Arlington High School in Columbus, Ohio, and Ohio State University, Mrs. Steinbrenner earned a degree in dental hygiene. She currently resides in Tampa, Fla., with her four children and 13 grandchildren.



## Randy Levine

### President

Randy Levine begins his 12th season as President of the New York Yankees in 2011. He was named to his position in January 2000, becoming the first person to hold the post with the club since 1986.

Under his supervision and guidance, the franchise constructed the state-of-the-art Yankee Stadium, completing the facility on time for the beginning of the 2009 season, which culminated in the franchise's 27th World Championship. Mr. Levine was a principal founder of the YES Network, which was recently named the most-watched regional sports network in the United States for the eighth consecutive year (2003-10).

In 2008, he was instrumental in creating Legends Hospitality, LLC, a new concession and merchandising company with the Dallas Cowboys which currently operates at the Yankees' and Cowboys' new stadiums. In 2004, he helped organize Yankees-Steiner, a leading sports memorabilia company.

Mr. Levine has also played a prominent role in the Yankees' international brand expansion, including the 2007 establishment of a first-of-its-kind working relationship with the Chinese Baseball Association. More recently, he led a 2010 Yankees delegation that visited Tokyo, Beijing and Hong Kong with the 2009 World Series Trophy, marking the first-ever time that the Yankees have brought one of their World Series trophies to Asia. In addition, Mr. Levine helped develop the joint venture agreement in Japan between the Yankees and Yomiuri Shimbun, which is the parent company of the Yomiuri Giants.

In 2007, the Yankees became the first Major League organization to sign players from the Israel Baseball League and also embarked on their first-ever large-scale outreach into Taiwan by holding a clinic for high school players and coaches in Taipei, Taiwan. Mr. Levine is also the Yankees' principal liaison to Major League Baseball and contributes to player negotiations and contract issues.

Mr. Levine has been at the forefront of bringing exciting year-round entertainment and special events to Yankee Stadium. In 2010, he was a driving force that led to a world championship boxing match between Miguel Cotto and Yuri Foreman, a pair of historic concerts featuring JAY-Z and Eminem, a renewed gridiron rivalry between Army and Notre Dame, and college football's newest postseason game—the New Era Pinstripe Bowl.

Mr. Levine's baseball and business vision has also led to record numbers at Yankee Stadium turnstiles. In 2010, the Yankees led Baseball in home attendance for the seventh time in the last eight seasons (2003-08, '10) and have now topped the American League in home attendance in each of the past eight seasons (2003-10). In 2008, his direction helped the club establish the all-time AL single-season attendance record of 4,298,543 to become the only Major League franchise to exceed the 4 million mark at home in four consecutive seasons (2005-08).

Before joining the Yankees, Mr. Levine served as New York City's Deputy Mayor for Economic Development, Planning and Administration. He also served as New York City's Labor Commissioner.

From 1995 through 1997, Mr. Levine was Chief Negotiator for Major League Baseball. In 1996, he negotiated the labor agreement that for the first time included revenue sharing, luxury taxes and Interleague play. Prior to that, Mr. Levine served as Principal Associate Deputy Attorney General and Principal Deputy Attorney General at the United States Department of Justice. He has also served as a special delegate to the United States Department of Labor and was a board member for Hudson River Park. Mr. Levine presently serves on the boards of George Washington University, the ASCPA and the Yogi Berra Museum.

Mr. Levine has served on the Board of Directors of the New Jersey Nets and New Jersey Devils and is a member of the Board of Directors of the YES Network and Legends Hospitality, LLC. He is also an officer of Yankee Global Enterprises, LLC. Mr. Levine serves on the International, Diversity and Labor Policy Committees of Major League Baseball.

Mr. Levine has been a partner in the New York law firm of Proskauer Rose Goetz & Mendelson and is presently Senior Counsel at the law firm of Akin Gump Strauss Hauer & Feld.

Born on February 22, 1955, in Brooklyn, N.Y., Mr. Levine received a Bachelor of Arts degree from George Washington University in 1977, and in 2011 was named as Chair of the school's athletic committee. He received his J.D. from Hofstra University School of Law in 1980. Mr. Levine and his wife, Mindy, reside in Manhattan.

## Felix M. Lopez, Jr.

### Executive Vice President/Chief International Officer

Felix M. Lopez, Jr. begins his second season as Executive Vice President/Chief International Officer in 2011. From 2005-09, he served as Yankees Senior Vice President. His current responsibilities include overseeing the daily operations of George M. Steinbrenner Field, the Himes Player Development Complex and the Single-A Tampa Yankees. He is also involved with the Yankees' Latin Baseball Academy in Boca Chica, Dominican Republic, as well as player development in Latin America.

Under Mr. Lopez's supervision, the Yankees spring training home in Tampa, Fla., has undergone several structural enhancements and renovations in recent years, including the expansion of field box seating and the redesign of the Yankees' clubhouse facilities.

Fan-friendly amenities have been at the forefront of Mr. Lopez's operational strategy, including the design of the Brighthouse Networks Dugout Club, located underneath the field box seats behind home plate. In addition, Mr. Lopez was instrumental in developing the new Tampa Tribune Deck, which was unveiled in 2008. Located beyond the right field wall, the unique and intimate structure features picnic-style seating for 500 people, private concessions and a full bar.

In January 2010, Mr. Lopez headed a Yankees delegation that took the club's 2009 World Series trophy to the Dominican Republic. The visit included stops at the Presidential Palace, U.S. Embassy, National Police Headquarters and Santo Domingo's Quisqueya Stadium for a Dominican Winter League playoff game.

Mr. Lopez also serves on the boards of Yankee Global Enterprises, LLC, and Legends Hospitality, LLC.

Before joining the Yankees, Mr. Lopez was the president and owner of Architecture Design Construction, Inc., a company specializing in commercial construction in the southeastern United States. Born on April 1, 1954, in Havana, Cuba, Mr. Lopez moved to Tampa, Fla., in 1969 and later graduated from Cam Tech School of Construction. He is a member of the Grand Lodge of Free and Accepted Masons of Florida and Nobles of the Mystic Shrine of North America. He also serves on the board of the Gold Shield Foundation and contributes to the efforts of the Police Athletic League (PAL).

Mr. Lopez and his wife, Jessica, reside in Tampa, Fla.



## Lonn A. Trost

### Chief Operating Officer

Lonn A. Trost begins his 12th season as Chief Operating Officer of the New York Yankees in 2011. He was named to the position on January 10, 2000, after serving as the club's Executive Vice President and General Counsel from 1997-99.

Mr. Trost is responsible for the overall day-to-day functioning of the Yankees' operations. Under his direction, the Yankees have seen tremendous growth in brand recognition and sponsorship opportunities, while also establishing single-season home attendance records nine times (1998-99; 2002-08). In 2010, the club led Major League Baseball in home attendance, drawing in excess of 16,000 more fans per game than the combined average of the 29 other Major League teams. It also marked the seventh time in the last eight seasons (2003-08, '10) that the Yankees led the Majors in home attendance and the club's eighth straight season topping the American League.

Additionally, Mr. Trost, along with Hal Steinbrenner and Randy Levine, spearheaded the most complex undertaking in New York Yankees history—construction and development of Yankee Stadium, which is the largest privately funded building project in the history of the Bronx. While remaining true to the architectural grandeur of the 1923 original, the current facility is the most technologically advanced stadium in baseball.

Mr. Trost has played a significant role in Yankee Stadium becoming a year-round multi-purpose home to special events. In 2010, his vision and planning came to fruition with a world championship boxing match between Miguel Cotto and Yuri Foreman, a pair of historic concerts featuring JAY-Z and Eminem, a renewed gridiron rivalry between Army and Notre Dame, and college football's newest postseason game—the New Era Pinstripe Bowl.

Before joining the Yankees, Mr. Trost was a partner and member of the Executive Committee of the law firm of Shea and Gould from 1972 to 1994. He was also a partner at the New York law firm of Herrick, Feinstein from 1994 through 1997. While with these firms, he served as outside general counsel for numerous sports franchises, institutions and agents. Among his clients were the New York Yankees and Mets, the New Jersey Nets and Devils, the National Baseball Hall of Fame, Little League Baseball and TCI Cable.

Mr. Trost was instrumental in the creation of the YES Network and is a member of its Board of Directors. He also serves as an officer for Yankee Global Enterprises and Legends Hospitality, LLC, both of which he participated in founding. While he maintains his responsibilities with the New York Yankees Partnership and the Yankees' other affiliates, he is also actively involved with the Tourette Syndrome Association, with whom he is a member of the Corporate and Professional Council.

Born on May 8, 1945, Mr. Trost began his legal career in 1971 with the United States Justice Department, Office of Chief Counsel (Treasury Department). A 1968 graduate of Hunter College in the Bronx, Mr. Trost received his J.D. from Brooklyn Law School in 1971. It's interesting to note that Mr. Trost's initial employment with the Yankees was as a grandstand vendor in the mid-1960s in the original Yankee Stadium. He resides in Monroe Township, N.J., with his wife, Carol. They have two children, Evan and Audra, and one grandchild, Ariella.



## Brian Cashman

### Senior Vice President, General Manager

Brian McGuire Cashman has literally grown up in the Yankees family. He joined the organization in 1986 as a 19-year-old intern in the Minor League and Scouting Department and now commands one of the most demanding jobs in sports as Yankees Senior Vice President and General Manager.

Over the course of his 24 seasons with the team, he has earned five World Series rings, including four as General Manager, becoming the first GM to win four World Series titles since the Dodgers' Buzzie Bavasi in the 1950s and '60s. Notably, he has won his titles with two different managers — Joe Torre in 1998, 1999 and 2000, and Joe Girardi in 2009.

Mr. Cashman assumed his current post on February 3, 1998. At age 31, he became the second-youngest General Manager in baseball history. In his first season, he became the youngest-ever GM to win a World Series, and with championships in 1999 and 2000, he became the only GM in baseball history to win world titles in each of his first three seasons. A pennant in 2001 gave him four straight League Championships, placing him alongside Hall of Fame Yankees General Managers Ed Barrow (1936-39, four) and George Weiss (1949-53, five) as the only GMs in Baseball history to win four-or-more straight league titles at any point in their careers.

Among his peers, Mr. Cashman has achieved unparalleled success while carrying on the winning tradition of the Yankees. His lifetime winning percentage of .605 (1,272-830-2) is the highest of any General Manager with five seasons of experience since 1950 and marks the best team winning percentage in the Major Leagues during that same stretch. Now in his 14th season, Mr. Cashman has the third-longest tenure among all general managers in baseball and is the longest-serving Yankees GM since Barrow led the team from October 28, 1920 to February 20, 1945.

In all, his clubs have claimed 10 Division titles and six American League championships to go along with four World Series titles. His feat of reaching the playoffs in each of his first 10 seasons (1998-2007) remains unmatched in Baseball history.

In his present role, Mr. Cashman has been involved in dozens of high-profile Major League free-agent signings, including those of A.J. Burnett, Johnny Damon, Orlando Hernandez, Hideki Matsui, Mike Mussina, CC Sabathia, Alfonso Soriano and Mark Teixeira. Mr. Cashman has also executed more than 70 trades involving over 200 players, bringing the talents of Bobby Abreu, Aaron Boone, Curtis Granderson, David Justice, Alex Rodriguez and Nick Swisher to the Bronx.

Recently, Mr. Cashman has focused on rebuilding the Yankees farm system, while still maintaining World Championship talent at the Major League level. The emphasis he and his baseball operations staff have placed on the First-Year Player Draft and international scouting is demonstrated by the organization's homegrown talent, including Manny Banuelos, Dellin Betances, Andrew Brackman, Robinson Cano, Joba Chamberlain, Brett Gardner, Phil Hughes, Jesus Montero, David Robertson and Austin Romine.

There have been three women in Major League history to hold the position of Assistant General Manager, and Mr. Cashman has hired two of them: Jean Afterman, the Yankees' current Vice President and Assistant General Manager; and Kim Ng, who is currently Vice President and Assistant General Manager of the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Various groups have honored the achievements of the Yankees and Mr. Cashman. With the club's recent World Series title, the Yankees were named "2009 Male Team of the Year" by the United States Sports Academy and were nominated as "Team of the Year" in the Laureus World Sports Awards competition. In both 1998 and 2000, the Yankees earned ESPY Awards — presented by ESPN — as "Outstanding Team of the Year," and were named "Organization of the Year" by Baseball America in 1998 and by USA Today in 1999.

Mr. Cashman has been honored as "Executive of the Year" four times: by the Boston Chapter of the BBWAA in 2000 and 2009; and in 1999 and 2003 by the New Jersey Sportswriters' Association. In 2001, he received his third consecutive "40 Under 40" Award presented by Street & Smith's Sports Business Journal to recognize the top 40 people under the age of 40 who have made the greatest impact in the sports business industry. He has since been inducted into the publication's "40 Under 40" Hall of Fame. In 2003, Mr. Cashman was honored by the Latino Sports Writers and Broadcasters Association with their annual "Latino Achievement Award" for his contributions to the Latino media. He was also honored with the 2005 "Ossie Davis Award for Inspirational Leadership," given each year to a key leader in an organization that works to promote opportunity in diversity.

On February 11, 2004, Mr. Cashman was given the honor of ringing the opening bell at the New York Stock Exchange. The market closed at 10,737.70 that day, its highest close since June 13, 2001.

Mr. Cashman remains committed to growing the Yankees brand and increasing the number of people who play and enjoy baseball worldwide. In February 2010, he was part of the Yankees delegation that brought the 2009 World Series trophy to Tokyo, Beijing and Hong Kong. While on the Chinese mainland, the group met with the Chinese Baseball Association to discuss ways the game can be promoted in China. He was also heavily involved in bringing the Yankees to Tokyo for "Opening Series 2004" to honor the 70th anniversary of Major League Baseball's historic tour of Japan, which included Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig.

His career as a full-time Yankees employee began following his graduation from Catholic University in 1989, when Mr. Cashman became a full-time Assistant in Baseball Operations. He was later promoted and transferred to Tampa, Fla., where he served as Assistant Farm Director from 1990 to 1992. He returned to New York and became Assistant General Manager, Baseball Administration in November 1992.

Born on July 3, 1967, in Rockville Center, N.Y., Mr. Cashman grew up in Lexington, Ky. He attended Georgetown Prep in Rockville, Md., before attending Catholic University in Washington, D.C., where he majored in history and played intercollegiate baseball. His love for baseball developed when former Brooklyn Dodger Ralph Branca and his wife, Ann, arranged for him to serve as a bat boy for the Los Angeles Dodgers in spring training in 1982.

Mr. Cashman and his wife, Mary, have a daughter, Grace Eva, and a son, Theodore John.



# Mark Newman

## Senior Vice President, Baseball Operations

Mark Newman begins his 12th season as the Yankees' Senior Vice President of Baseball Operations and his 23rd season with the Yankees. Prior to being named to his current position in 2000, Mr. Newman served as the club's Vice President of Player Development and Scouting from 1997-99.

During his tenure, the Yankees player development system has been recognized for producing homegrown talent including All-Stars Robinson Cano, Phil Hughes, Derek Jeter, Jorge Posada and Mariano Rivera. Under Mr. Newman's supervision over the last decade, the Yankees have drafted and stockpiled talented prospects to evolve into what has been lauded as one of the best player development systems in baseball.

In December 2010, Mr. Newman received the Sheldon "Chief" Bender Award, recognizing his distinguished service to player development.

Over the last five seasons (2006-10), the Yankees' minor league affiliates (from the Dominican Summer League through Triple-A) have produced the most wins and the best winning percentage among all Major League franchises with a combined record of 2,339-1,815 (.563). Over the same stretch, Yankees farm teams captured nine league championships, and in 2008 became the first organization since Houston in 1993 to have its Triple-A and Double-A clubs both win titles in the same season.

In addition to stringing together 15 seasons of Major League postseason play over the last 16 years (1995-2007, '09-10) and winning five World Championships over the stretch, the Yankees are one of only two teams, along with the Cleveland Indians, whose minor league affiliates have combined to post winning records in each of the last 21 seasons since 1990. The Yankees were selected as the "Organization of the Year" by *Baseball America* in 1998 and earned the same honor from *USA Today* in 1999.

Mr. Newman began his career in the Yankees organization in 1989 as Coordinator of Instruction and served in that position until his promotion to Director of Player Development and Scouting in 1996. He was named Vice President of Player Development and Scouting in 1997. In his first role with the club, he oversaw all managers and coaches in the farm system and planned both Major and Minor League spring training.

In 1972, Mr. Newman began his baseball coaching career at 22 years old as the pitching coach for Southern Illinois University. After spending nine successful seasons there—during which he earned his law degree with honors—he was named Head Baseball Coach at Old Dominion University in 1981. Mr. Newman's impressive 321-167-3 record in nine seasons was recognized with his induction into the ODU Hall of Fame in 1997. He was inducted into the SIU Hall of Fame in 2000.



# Jean Afterman

## Vice President, Assistant General Manager

Jean Afterman enters her 10th season as the Yankees' Assistant General Manager in 2011 (ninth as Vice President). She became only the third female to hold such a position in Major League Baseball history.

Ms. Afterman has been an integral part of the Yankees' efforts to spearhead operations in Asia. In her first year with the Yankees, she was instrumental in developing the club's relationship with the Yomiuri Giants of the Japan Central League and the signing of three-time MVP Hideki Matsui. In 2007, she joined team President Randy Levine and General Manager Brian Cashman on a week-long trip to Asia that concluded with a working agreement with the Chinese Baseball Association. She once

again joined Levine and Cashman in 2010, when the Yankees brought the 2009 World Series trophy to Tokyo, Beijing and Hong Kong. While in Hong Kong, Ms. Afterman was given the honor of throwing out one of the ceremonial first pitches at the 2010 Phoenix Cup Tournament, an annual international women's baseball tournament.

Ms. Afterman's contributions and leadership were recognized in 2010, when she was named by *WISE* (Women in Sports and Events) as one of the "Women of the Year," and was tabbed by *New York Moves Magazine* as a "2010 Power Woman." In 2004, Ms. Afterman was named one of the "Power 100" by the *Sporting News* and was selected as one of the "50 Most Powerful Women in New York" by the *New York Post* in 2003 and 2007. Also in 2007, Ms. Afterman was profiled as one of *Crain's New York Business* "100 Most Influential Women in New York Business." In 2008, she was profiled by *Forbes Magazine* as one of the top female executives in baseball.

Ms. Afterman joined the Yankees with a diverse business and legal background, focusing on international sports and licensing with an emphasis on US-Japan matters. In 1996, Ms. Afterman was appointed by the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture to a federal advisory committee, the National Organic Standards Board. Prior to joining the Yankees, Ms. Afterman managed her own practice, providing athletic representation and management with a specialization in arbitration proceedings.

From 1994-99, she was General Counsel at KDN Sports, Inc. and handled business and legal affairs for international baseball clients, including Hideo Nomo, Hideki Irabu, Masato Yoshii, Alfonso Soriano and more than 30 other Major and Minor League players.

Ms. Afterman graduated from the University of California at Berkeley in 1979 and was the recipient of the Rosalynn Schneider Eisner Prize and the Mark Goodson Scholarship Grant. She received her J.D. from the University of San Francisco School of Law in 1991. In 2009, she was named the Katherine Delmar Burke School in San Francisco "Alumni of the Year."

Ms. Afterman maintains an active role in the Bronx community, working closely with P.S. 35, an elementary school in walking distance from Yankee Stadium. Over the last three years, she has organized Yankees-sponsored Read-A-Thons and directed a mentoring program that matches Yankees employees with fourth and fifth grade students. Additionally, she has reached out to high school-aged students through New York City's Explorers program, which engages young people through career-orientation programs. Her work with the group was publicly recognized as she was honored with the 2009 "Exploring Leadership Award."

# Commitment to Community

**T**he New York Yankees organization takes as much pride in the championship baseball played on the field as it does in its charitable endeavors throughout the community. The Yankees' community efforts reach far beyond the Bronx and the tri-state area, encompassing programs and donations throughout the United States and even spanning into Latin America and Asia.

The Yankees strive to create partnerships with programs that support children's initiatives, education enhancement and health awareness. The club's donations, grants, tickets, promotional items and countless other contributions to such programs exceeded \$5.5 million in 2010. Throughout the season, Yankees players and front office personnel make countless visits to various local hospitals, schools and youth groups, and the club makes every effort to recognize community excellence through outreach and during pregame ceremonies.

## YANKEES TURN TRIPLE PLAY AGAINST CANCER

The New York Yankees care about their fans' safety and health away from the diamond, and are committed to raising awareness to take the proper steps in cancer awareness, prevention and detection. In September 2010, the Yankees held three cancer awareness events at Yankee Stadium, offering free cancer screenings and a marrow drive to those in attendance at each of three games at Yankee Stadium.

On September 5, prior to the Yankees-Blue Jays game, Dr. Darrell Rigel, M.D., and his team of dermatologists and medical assistants conducted skin cancer screenings. On September 7, the Yankees and Ed Randall's Bat For The Cure charity provided free prostate cancer screenings for adult men age 40 and over attending that evening's game vs. Baltimore. Doctors and medical technicians from St. Luke's-Roosevelt Hospital Center assisted with the safe and simple screenings. On September 22, the Yankees, New York Blood Center and NewYork-Presbyterian Hospital teamed up for a bone marrow drive at Yankee Stadium while the Yankees played the Tampa Bay Rays. With a simple swab from the inner cheek, participants were added to the Be The Match Registry, which allows for patients to find a needed marrow match.

## WOMEN OF YANKEE STADIUM SUPPORT SAME SKY

The women of Yankee Stadium joined forces with Same Sky (www.SameSky.com) for a special event in the H&R Block Lounge on June 2, 2010, to honor the survivors of the 1994 Rwandan genocide, and in particular, HIV positive women artisans who have handcrafted bracelets through the organization's trade-not-aid initiative to effect change in the country.

The bracelets, made of hand-blown glass beads, allow the wearer to become a part of the movement empowering women everywhere under the same sky. All proceeds from the sales of Same Sky bracelets during the exclusive showing went directly toward training and employing more women artisans in Rwanda.

## SHARPENING THEIR PENCILS

Beginning in 2009, Yankees front office staff members began a mentoring program with students at P.S. 35 in the Bronx. Under the leadership of Yankees Assistant GM Jean Afterman, mentors from various Yankees front office departments have worked

In establishing a "Read-A-Thon" aimed at engaging students in reading and improving their language arts skills, all of the school's 30 classes, comprising more than 700 elementary school students, are participating in a monthly reading competition for Yankees prizes.

## YANKEES GO BOWLING IN THE COMMUNITY

The New York Yankees partnered with New York City's Public Schools Athletic League (PSAL) on a series of community initiatives to commemorate the inaugural New Era Pinstripe Bowl in 2010.

In support of the PSAL, the Yankees installed a new all-grass football field at Harry S. Truman High School in the Bronx. The sod was donated by DeLea Sod Farms, which plants the same type of grass at Yankee Stadium. Yankee Stadium also hosted the PSAL Football Championship Game on December 7, marking the first high school football contest in the current Yankee Stadium in which Fort Hamilton H.S. defeated Abraham Lincoln H.S., 8-6.

Additionally, the Yankees honored the best scholar-athletes in New York City on December 20 at Yankee Stadium during their first annual "MVP Dinner." The occasion brought together a group of 55 male and female student athletes — 11 from each borough — who have led by example in the community, classroom and in their respective sports. The top graduating high school scholar-athlete from each borough was designated as a "Borough Captain" and also recognized during the New Era Pinstripe Bowl.



The Yankees held their 17th Annual Holiday Food Drive at Yankee Stadium on December 16, 2010, presented by White Rose Foods. In conjunction with Bronx clergy, the Yankees distributed the donated food throughout the Bronx to those in need during the holiday season. Fans donating 30 pounds of nonperishable goods received a voucher valid for two tickets to one of 22 designated Yankees games in 2011 (restrictions apply) and a voucher valid for discounted ticket pricing for the 2010 New Era Pinstripe Bowl.

With Yankees Manager Joe Girardi, pitcher Mariano Rivera and Yankees alum Bernie Williams on hand to greet donors, a record-breaking 105,859 lbs. of food and nearly \$1,000 was collected. To help kick off the Yankees Food Drive, White Rose Foods – along with their Good Neighbor Brands Kraft, Unilever, Snapple, Masterfoods, Dornino, Conagra, New World Pasta, Carolina Rice, Clorox, Campbell's, Nestle, Smuckers and General Mills –donated over 40 pallets of food (approximately 60,000 lbs.).

On November 18, the Yankees and White Rose held their annual Pre-Thanksgiving Food Voucher Giveaway, distributing 750 vouchers to Bronx residents for redemption at a local Met Food market or Pioneer Supermarket.

### Teixeira Steps Up for Harlem RBI

In May 2010, first baseman Mark Teixeira and his wife, Leigh, donated \$100,000 to the Harlem RBI Future's Fund for programs supporting programs that guide Harlem RBI's college-bound seniors toward and through higher education. Mark also enlisted as a member of the Harlem RBI Board of Directors and served as a chairperson at the organization's 2010 Bids for Kids Gala.

Additionally, as the Honorary Chair of Harlem RBI's Capital Campaign Committee, Mark will participate in various events to support the organization, including activities with Harlem RBI youth. He will also serve as one of the 2011 Bids for Kids Gala honorees as Harlem RBI celebrates its 20th Anniversary.

Rodriguez contributed \$250,000 to help fund construction and completion of the outpatient center, which offers a child-friendly environment ideal for young patients and their families. The state-of-the-art outpatient center offers treatment in a number of specialties, including cardiac illnesses, asthma, diabetes and neurological disorders, among other health problems. Bronx-Lebanon's pediatric-asthma program, part of its outpatient center, is widely recognized as a model program.

### Granderson Joins White House Initiative

Yankees outfielder Curtis Granderson teamed up with First Lady Michelle Obama in 2010 as a national spokesman for the anti-obesity campaign Let's Move! The nationwide campaign, which addresses the serious epidemic of childhood obesity, has set a national goal of solving the obesity challenge within a generation, so that America's youngest children reach adulthood at a healthy weight.

## CC HONORED FOR COMMUNITY EXCELLENCE

As an active member of the community in the New York metropolitan area as well as in his hometown of Vallejo, Calif., Yankees pitcher CC Sabathia was awarded two special community service awards, recognizing his cross-country charitable endeavors in 2010.

At the January 2011 Baseball Assistance Team Dinner, Sabathia and his wife, Amber, received the Bart Giamatti Award for their many contributions to children, families and communities on both coasts.

In addition, Sabathia was named one of 10 "Dream Team For Public Service" finalists selected for the *Jefferson Awards for Public Service*. The awards, established in 1972 by Jacqueline Kennedy Onassis, U.S. Senator Robert Taft, Jr. and Sam Beard as a Nobel Prize for public service, seek to honor athletes who display an exemplary commitment to service in their community.

## HONORING MILITARY EXCELLENCE

In support of the nation's armed services, the Yankees held their annual "Military Appreciation Day" on June 12, 2010, prior to their game vs. Houston. Paying tribute to the members of the United States Special Operations Command, the Yankees showed an inspirational video dedicated to those helped by the Special Operations Warrior Foundation followed by an on-field recognition of military heroes wounded while in service. The ceremony also featured a donation of \$25,000 from Mattel/Fisher-Price to the Warrior Foundation.

In what has become an annual tradition, the U.S. Army Golden Knights parachuted into Yankee Stadium, landing in the outfield. Former U.S. Army Elite Task Force Ranger Keni Thomas, a member of the Army unit that fought in Somalia in 1993 at the Battle of Mogadishu (later depicted in the film *Black Hawk Down*), sang the national anthem, while the West Point Honor Guard presented the colors. Following the anthem, Lt. General Frank Kearney, Deputy Commander of the United States Special Operations Command, threw out the game's ceremonial first pitch.



# 2010 Yankees HOPE Week

The Yankees kicked off HOPE Week by surprising 13-year-old quadruple amputee **Jorge Grajales** of Ridgewood N.J., with a pool party and barbecue, which included generous donations from Stop & Shop and Party City. Mariano Rivera, Nick Swisher and Brett Gardner, along with Yankees coaches Kevin Long and Mike Harkey enjoyed an afternoon with Jorge, his foster parents John and Faye Dyksen, and his family and friends.

Originally born in Panama, Jorge had his hands and feet amputated as an infant due to an infection. Since age 3, the Dyksen family has taken him into their home for three-quarters of the year through a program called Healing the

Children. At that evening's Yankees game, Jorge and the Dyksens were honored during pregame ceremonies and Jorge threw out the first pitch.

## TUESDAY, AUGUST 17

The Yankees reached out to Morris Plains, N.J., resident **Jane Lang**, who has been blind since birth. Manager Joe Girardi, players Joba Chamberlain, Chad Gaudin and David Robertson, along with former Yankee Tino Martinez surprised

Lang at her house and joined her on her normal trek to Yankee Stadium, using public transportation. Once at the Stadium, Jane received a private tour of Monument Park, with former Yankee Paul O'Neill, where she felt some of the monuments and plaques for the first time. She then went on a private tour of the Yankees Museum and felt the 2009 World Championship Trophy as well as one of Babe Ruth's bats. Prior to the game, Jane and her Seeing Eye dog, Clipper, delivered the lineup card to home plate with Joe Girardi, who also escorted Jane around the base paths following the game.

### WEDNESDAY, AUGUST 18

The Yankees reached out to Sierra Leone-native, civil war survivor and recent high school graduate **Mohamed Kamara**. CC Sabathia, General Manager Brian Cashman and Hall of Famer Reggie Jackson took Mohamed on a surprise tour of the New York Stock Exchange during the morning bell ringing. The Yankees then escorted Mohamed to City Hall, where the group was joined by Derek Jeter, Marcus Thames and Curtis Granderson before meeting with Mayor Michael Bloomberg. Following their trip to City Hall, the Yankees and Mohamed visited the United Nations where His Excellency Mr. Shekou M. Touray, Permanent Representative of Sierra Leone to the United Nations, spoke with Mohamed and the Yankees in a private meeting and accompanied the group on a tour of the General Assembly Hall.



## STATUS

► Re-signed to a three-year contract on October 29, 2010, extending through the 2013 season...was named the 32nd manager in club history on October 30, 2007, becoming the 17th Yankees manager to have played for the club and fourth former Yankees catcher to skipper the team (also Bill Dickey, Ralph Houk and Yogi Berra).

## AT THE HELM IN 2010

► The 2010 season marked his third as Manager of the New York Yankees, guiding the club to a 95-67 record, their second consecutive postseason appearance and 15th playoff berth in the last 16 years...was the second-best record in the AL behind Tampa Bay (96-66) and the third-best in the Majors, also trailing Philadelphia (97-65)...spent the final 69 days of the season (from 7/18 on) within 2.5 games (either ahead, tied or behind) of Tampa Bay.

- Led the Yankees to a Major League-high 48 come-from-behind wins, their second straight season leading the category (51 in 2009)...collected six wins when trailing after the end of the eighth inning, one more than their total from 2009.
- Did not lose more than four straight games, piloting one of just two Major League teams (also Minnesota) to not record a losing streak of at least five games in 2010...the Yankees were the last team in the Majors to be swept in a series of at least three games (9/10-12 at Texas).
- Won 30 series, tied with Tampa Bay for second-most in the AL, behind Minnesota (31).
- The Yankees were 52-29 (.642) at home, tying Detroit for the second-highest home winning percentage in the AL behind Minnesota (53-28, .654)...his 109-53 (.673) record in the current Yankee Stadium (2009-10) marks the Majors' most home wins and highest home winning percentage over the stretch.
- The Yankees led the Majors with a .988 fielding percentage and committed only 69 errors, setting a franchise record for highest fielding percentage and fewest errors in any season...since taking over in 2008, the Yankees lead the Majors with a .987 fielding percentage.
- Earned his 200th win as Yankees Manager on 4/17 vs. Texas...recorded his 300th career managerial win on 5/31 vs. Cleveland.
- Was ejected three times in 2010...has been ejected 14 times in his career, 11 times as a Manager (nine as Yankees manager) and 10 times as a Yankee (also 8/6/99 as a player).
- At 46 years old, is the third-youngest manager in the Majors, behind Cleveland's Manny Acta (42) and Seattle's Eric Wedge (43).

## FANTASTIC FOUR

With a 365-283 (.563) career managerial record, only Ken Macha (368-280, .568 with Oakland from 2003-06) recorded a higher winning percentage in the first four years of his managerial career over the past 20 seasons (since 1991).

## MANAGING/COACHING CAREER

- Led the Yankees to their 27th World Championship in 2009 in his second season, becoming the ninth Yankees manager to win a World Series...in his postseason managerial debut, joined Ralph Houk and Billy Martin as the only three Yankees to play for and manage a Yankees World Championship team...also joined Houk, Bob Lemon and Casey Stengel as the only four Yankees managers to win a World Series in their first postseason as a manager.
- Led the club to a Major League-best 103-59 regular season record in 2009, marking the Yankees' most wins since 2002 (103-58)...became the eighth Yankees manager to collect at least 100 wins in a full season, joining Miller Huggins, Joe McCarthy, Casey Stengel, Ralph Houk, Billy Martin, Dick Howser and Joe Torre...joined McCarthy, Houk, Martin and Howser as the only five Yankees skippers to accomplish the feat

within their first two full seasons with the team...finished third in AL Manager of the Year voting with 34 total points, including four first-place votes.

- ▶ The Yankees' 114 total wins in 2009 (including postseason) tied their second-most ever in a single year behind the 125 victories of the 1998 squad (also 114W in 1927)...a member of the 1998 Yankees (114-48), became the only active Major League manager at the time to both play for and manage teams that won at least 100 games in a season and won a World Series, according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*...became the only Major League manager in the 2000s to lead a team to 100-or-more regular season wins and a World Series title.
- ▶ Earned his 200th career managerial win on 6/7/09 vs. Tampa Bay...earned his 100th win as Yankees manager on 4/29/09 at Detroit.
- ▶ Led the Yankees to a 89-73 record in 2008 in his first season as the club's skipper...was one of only two managers (also the Angels' Mike Scioscia) whose team did not lose more than four consecutive games during the 2008 season...won his Yankees managerial debut on 4/1/08 vs. Toronto (lost his only previous Opening Day as Manager in 2006 with Florida).
- ▶ Earned his 100th career managerial win on 5/22/08 vs. Baltimore...was ejected by HP umpire Chris Guccione in the bottom of the ninth inning in the game.
- ▶ Was named the 2006 National League "Manager of the Year" by the Baseball Writers Association of America and the *Sporting News*...guided the Florida Marlins to a 78-84 record in his first season as a Major League manager...with the award, joined the Houston Astros' Hal Lanier (1986) and the San Francisco Giants' Dusty Baker (1993) as the only managers to win the honor in their managerial debuts...at the age of 41, became the youngest manager in Marlins history (previously 47-year-old John Boles in 1996)...was named Marlins manager just two seasons after retiring as a player prior to the 2004 campaign, marking the shortest time between being an active player (2003) and making a managerial debut (2006) since 1987, when both John Wathan (Kansas City) and Larry Bowa (San Diego) became managers after last playing during the 1985 season.
- ▶ Became the first manager to improve his club's record above .500 after falling at least 20 games below the .500 mark during the same season...the Marlins were a season-low 20 games under .500 on 5/21 (11-31), but then went 62-41 through 9/12 to improve to 73-72...the only other Major League team to return to the .500 mark after falling 20 or more games below was the 1899 Louisville Colonels (managed by Fred Clarke), who were 22 games under at 16-38 and improved to 72-72-3 before finishing with a record of 75-77-3.
- ▶ Managed Anibal Sanchez's no-hitter on 9/6/06 vs. Arizona...was the fourth no-hitter in Marlins history and the fourth no-hitter that Girardi has been a part of, having caught two (Dwight Gooden's on 5/14/96 and David Cone's perfect game on 7/18/99) and been a teammate in one (David Wells' perfect game on 5/17/98)...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, Girardi became the first person since Jeff Torborg to both catch and manage a no-hitter...Torborg managed Wilson Alvarez's no-hitter on 9/11/91 with the White Sox after catching no-hitters by Sandy Koufax (perfect game, 9/9/65), Bill Singer (7/20/70) and Nolan Ryan (5/15/73).
- ▶ Made his coaching debut in 2005, serving as bench coach and catching instructor on Joe Torre's New York Yankees staff...assisted in guiding the Yankees to a 95-67 (.586) record and the American League East title.
- ▶ Appeared in 39 career postseason games as a player, most among all current American League managers...among active Major League managers, only Cincinnati's Dusty Baker (40) appeared in more postseason games as a player.

#### WISE BEYOND HIS YEARS

In 2009, Joe Girardi became the youngest manager in Yankees history to win a World Series. He remains the fourth-youngest World Series-winning manager over the last 34 years (1977-2010) behind Minnesota's Tom Kelly (1987 and '91), the White Sox's Ozzie Guillen (2005) and the Mets' Davey Johnson (1986).

## PLAYING CAREER

- ▶ Played parts of 15 seasons as a catcher in the Major Leagues with the Chicago Cubs (1989-92 and 2000-02), Colorado Rockies (1993-95), New York Yankees (1996-99) and St. Louis Cardinals (2003)...was a member of three World Series Championship teams in New York (1996, 1998-99) and played in a total of six postseasons with the Cubs (1989), Rockies (1995) and Yankees (1996-99).
- ▶ In 1,277 career Major League games, batted .267 (1,100-for-4,127) with 454 runs, 186 doubles, 36HR and 422RBI, finishing with a .991 career fielding percentage while throwing out 27.6% of potential base stealers...batted .184 (21-for-114) with 2 triples and 1RBI in 39 career postseason games.
- ▶ Saw his first Major League action in 1989 as the Cubs' Opening Day catcher...was the first rookie catcher to start a season opener for the Cubs since Randy Hundley in 1966...was selected to *Baseball Digest's* All-Rookie Team...played in four games of the 1989 NL Championship Series against San Francisco, recording one hit.
- ▶ Played his first full big league season in 1990...stole eight bases, the most by a Cubs catcher since Gabby Hartnett's 10 in 1924...ranked second among NL catchers in assists (61) and threw out 33.3% of baserunners attempting to steal (38-of-114).
- ▶ On 8/7/91, in his first game back after missing nearly four months with a strained lower back, suffered a broken nose in a home plate collision with the Phillies' John Kruk.
- ▶ Was selected by the Rockies with the 19th pick in the Expansion Draft from the Cubs...established career highs with 8HR, 55RBI and 63R in 1995 with the Colorado Rockies.
- ▶ Acquired by the Yankees on 11/3/95 from the Rockies in exchange for LHP Mike DeJean...hit a career-high .294 with 2HR and 45RBI for the World Series Champions...stole 13 bases, marking the highest total among big league catchers and a record for a Yankees catcher...stole home on the front end of a double steal on 4/11 vs. Kansas City, becoming the first Yankees catcher to steal home since Jake Gibbs on 7/13/1968...had two triples during the 1996 postseason, including a run-scoring three-base hit off Greg Maddux in Game 6 of the World Series at Yankee Stadium.
- ▶ Was the catcher for Dwight Gooden's no-hitter on 5/14/96 vs. Seattle...in his final season as a player with the Yankees, caught David Cone's perfect game on 7/18/99 vs. Montreal...had a career-high 7RBI on 8/23/99 in a 21-3 victory at Texas, going 4-for-6 with 2 doubles and 1 triple.
- ▶ Rejoined the Cubs organization in 2000 and earned his first and only trip to an All-Star Game that season in Atlanta as a replacement for the injured Mike Piazza (did not play)...when he homered on 5/2/00 vs. Houston off Jose Lima, it was his first Cubs home run since 5/8/92...only one player, Billy Jurgens (nine years, 1938-47), had a longer span between homers with the Cubs.
- ▶ Recorded his 1,000th Major League hit on 5/27/01 vs. Milwaukee off Jimmy Haynes – a seventh-inning, game-winning, two-run double.
- ▶ Was one of the Cubs' co-captains in 2001 and 2002.
- ▶ Played his final career regular season game on 9/28/03 at Arizona with the St. Louis Cardinals...his single in the ninth inning off the Diamondbacks' Edgar Gonzalez gave him 1,100 career hits.

**DID YOU KNOW???** Joe Girardi and Yogi Berra are the only Yankees catchers to be behind the plate for two regular season no-hitters. Girardi was the catcher for Dwight Gooden's no-hitter on 5/14/96 vs. Seattle and David Cone's perfect game on 7/18/99 vs. Montreal. Berra caught both of Allie Reynolds' no-hitters in 1951.

- ▶ Graduated high school in 1982 from the Spalding Institute (Ill.), where he was an All-State selection in baseball.
- ▶ Graduated from Northwestern University in 1986 with a bachelor's degree in industrial engineering...was a three-time Academic All-American and two-time All-Big 10 selection at catcher...was elected to the College Sports Information Directors Hall of Fame on 7/1/07, becoming the first former Major Leaguer to be enshrined...also received the 2007 Distinguished Alumni Award from the Northwestern University Department of Industrial Engineering and Management Sciences...received the NCAA Silver Anniversary Award on 1/14/10, recognizing the personal achievements of a college graduate 25 years following their collegiate athletic career.
- ▶ Established his own charity, Catch 25, which is dedicated to providing support to families and individuals across the country who have been challenged with ALS, Alzheimer's, cancer and fertility issues...Catch 25 provides assistance through scholarships, financial aid and charitable donations and is devoted to serving children and adults that may not otherwise have the financial and emotional support they may need...his father, Jerry, suffers from Alzheimer's...hosts the annual "Remember When, Remember Now" benefit along with Michael Kay in New York City, helping raise funds for his charity and Alzheimer's research.
- ▶ Helped assemble 3,000 comfort packs for troops for Veteran's Day, along with Bank of America, on 11/11/10...collected donations at the Yankees' annual holiday food drive in December 2010.
- ▶ Received the Community Leadership Award from the New York City Chapter of the Alzheimer's Association at it's annual "Forget-Me-Not" gala on 6/1/09.
- ▶ Received the Sweetwater Clifton "City Spirit" Award from the New York Knicks on 11/22/09 for serving as a good Samaritan by stopping to aid a stranded motorist on his way home following the final game of the World Series...was the recipient of the Ben Epstein "Good Guy Award" in 1997, presented annually by the New York chapter of the BBWAA...was honored at the 2007 Lou Gehrig Sports Award Benefit Dinner.

- ▶ Joined New York City Mayor Michael Bloomberg and Roberto Clemente, Jr. in placing the first "pitch" on 7/29/08 at the Third Annual Gracie Mansion Tee Ball Game...hosted by the Mayor's Office, Little League Baseball and the Roberto Clemente Foundation, the game featured five teams, one from each New York City borough and promoted youth exercise as well as team-building sports...was featured on the special edition Dunkin Donuts "Box o' Joe" in April 2010.
- ▶ Unveiled a granite sidewalk marker in the Canyon of Heroes on 6/15/10 with the Alliance for Downtown New York, commemorating the Yankees' ticker-tape parade to honor the team's 27th World Series title.
- ▶ Following his retirement as a player, joined the YES Network as an analyst and won an Emmy Award for hosting *YES' Kids on Deck* series...rejoined YES in 2007, working as an analyst...worked with FOX during the regular season and postseason in '07...was a member of ESPN Radio's team for the 2003 NL Division Series.
- ▶ He and his wife, Kim, have three children, Serena, Dante and Lena...Kim has hosted several charitable events at Yankee Stadium, including fundraisers for stomach cancer research in which fans could purchase blue hair extensions and mohawks.

## Baseball Glossary

### HOW TO FIGURE...

**Batting Average:** (H/AB) Hits divided by at-bats.

**ERA:** (ERx/IP) Multiply earned runs by nine and divide the total by innings pitched.

**Slugging Percentage:** (TB/AB) Total bases (1B=1, 2B=2, 3B=3, HR=4) divided by at-bats.

**On-Base Percentage:** (H+BB+HBP)/(H+BB+HBP+SF)  
Add hits, walks, hit by pitch and divide by the total of hits plus walks plus hit-by-pitch plus sacrifice flies.

**Fielding Percentage:** (PO+A)/(PO+A+E) Total putouts plus assists divided by total chances.

**Winning Percentage:** The number of games won divided by the total games played.

**Magic Number:** Determine the number of games yet to be played, add one, then subtract the number of games ahead in the loss column of the standings from the closest opponent.

### QUALIFYING RULES

**Batting Championship:** To qualify for a batting title, a player must make 502 or more plate appearances or 3.1 plate appearances per team game.

**Pitching Championship:** To qualify for the lowest ERA, a pitcher must throw at least 162.0 innings.

**Fielding Championship:** To qualify as the top fielder:  
(a) a catcher must have played in at least 81 games.  
(b) an infielder or outfielder must have played in at least 108 games.  
(c) a pitcher must have 162.0 innings pitched.

**Rookie:** A player shall be considered a rookie unless, during a previous season or seasons, he has (a) exceeded 130 at-bats or 50 innings pitched in the major leagues; or (b) accumulated more than 45 days on the active roster of a major league club or clubs during the period of the 25-player limit.

**Save:** Credit a pitcher with a save when:

- (1) He is the finishing pitcher in a game won by his club;
  - (2) He is not the winning pitcher, and
  - (3) He qualifies under one of the following conditions:

**2009**

- ▶ Was 13-9 with a 4.04 ERA in 33 starts with the Yankees...his 13 wins and 33 starts were both the second-highest totals of his career (went 18-10 in 34 starts in 2008)...ranked eighth in the American League with 195K...was second in the Majors with 97BB (Arizona's Doug Davis-103BB)...opponents batted .247 (193-for-781, 25HR); LH .217 (91-for-419, 11HR); RH .282 (102-for-362, 14HR)...marked the third-lowest average against left-handed hitters among AL righties and fifth-best in the Majors (min: 200BF)...the Yankees were 21-12 in his starts.
- ▶ Tied Felix Hernandez for the Major League lead with 17 wild pitches...marked a personal single-season career high and was the second-highest total in franchise history behind Tim Lincecum's 23WP in 1990...matched his single-game career-high with 3WP in four games in 2009 (4/19 vs. Cleveland, 5/17 vs. Minnesota, 7/8 at Minnesota and 8/12 vs. Toronto).
- ▶ Made his Yankees debut on 4/9 at Baltimore, recording the win in an 11-2 Yankees victory (5.1IP, 7H, 2ER, 1BB, 6K, 1HR)...was the Yankees' first win of the season.
- ▶ In his second start on 4/14 at Tampa Bay, retired 18 of his first 19 batters faced and carried a no-hitter through 6.0IP.
- ▶ Went winless over seven starts from 4/19-5/22, his longest stretch without a victory in a single season since his last seven starts of the 2005 season w/ Florida.
- ▶ Over an 11-start stretch from 5/27-7/27, was 8-2 with a 2.08 ERA (69.1IP, 16ER) and a .209 opponents average (53-for-253), limiting his opponents to 3ER or less in each outing...held his opponents scoreless three times and had one additional start in which he did not allow an earned run (7/27 at Tampa Bay: 1R/0ER).
- ▶ Was suspended for six games by MLB on 6/4 for "intentionally throwing a pitch in the head area of Nelson Cruz of the Rangers" during the top of the fifth inning on 6/2...served a reduced five-game suspension from 6/21-26.
- ▶ Struck out the side in the third inning in 6/20 loss at Florida on nine pitches (Johnson, Coughlan and Bonifacio - all swinging)...according to *Elias*, became the 40th pitcher all-time to accomplish the feat and just the third Yankee, joining Al Downing (1967) and Ron Guidry (1984).

- ▶ Picked off Ichiro Suzuki twice in 9/18 loss at Seattle, becoming the first Yankees RHP to record two pickoffs in the same game since Wade Taylor on 8/17/91 vs. the White Sox.
- ▶ Won his 100th career game in his final start of the season on 10/4 at Tampa Bay, allowing 2R/1ER in 5.0IP (7H, 1BB, 3K).
- ▶ Made his postseason debut, going 1-1 with a 5.27 ERA in five starts...did not draw a decision in first career postseason start on 10/9 in Game 2 of the ALDS vs. Minnesota (6.0IP, 3H, 1ER, 5BB, 6K, 2HP)...marked the

fewest hits allowed by a Yankee making his first career postseason start since Orlando Hernandez (7.0IP, 3H) in ALCS Game 4 at Cleveland on 10/10/98...earned the win in his first World Series start on 10/29 in Game 2, limiting the Phillies to 1ER on 4H in 7.0IP (2BB, 9K)...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, entered the 2009 playoffs tied with Brian Moehler for the fourth-most regular season starts among active pitchers without appearing in the postseason, behind only Roy Halladay (287), Randy Wolf (275) and Jamey Wright (246).



## 2008

- ▶ Was 18-10 with a 4.07 ERA in 35 games (34 starts) with 231 strikeouts in 221.1IP for Toronto, recording career highs in wins, innings pitched and strikeouts...opponents batted .249 (211-for-849, 19HR); LH .262 (126-for-481, 11HR), RH .231 (85-for-368, 8HR)...held the opposition to a .203 average (57-for-281) their first time through the order, and then allowed a .271 average (154-for-568) thereafter.

- ▶ Opened the season 6-7 with a 5.42 ERA in his first 16 games (15 starts) through 6/19, as the Blue Jays went 7-9...over his final 19 starts, went 12-3 with a 3.12 ERA and 141 strikeouts as the Blue Jays went 13-6...won eight of his last nine decisions.
- ▶ Made his lone relief appearance of the season--and fourth of his career--on 4/16 vs. Texas, allowing 2ER in 1.0IP and recording the loss in the 14-inning contest.

## 2006

- ▶ In his first season with Toronto, went 10-8 with a 3.98 ERA in 21 starts...was limited by two separate stints on the disabled list with scar tissue break-up caused from previous elbow surgery.

- ▶ Went 1-3 with a 4.33 ERA over his first six starts through 7/7...following the All-Star break, posted a 9-5 record with a 3.86 ERA in 15 starts, leading the Toronto staff in second-half wins, starts, innings pitched (100.1) and strikeouts (84).

## 2005

- ▶ Posted a 12-12 record with a 3.44 ERA in 32 starts with Florida...established Marlins career marks for wins (49), losses (50), shutouts (eight), complete games (14), strikeouts (753), games started (131) and innings pitched (847.2)...tied for third in the NL with four complete games.

Al Leiter -5/11/96 vs. Colorado and Kevin Brown-6/10/97 at San Francisco) to accomplish the feat...tied the club record for walks in a game and became the first pitcher in the modern era to issue nine walks in a complete game, nine-inning no-hitter...his 10 baserunners allowed were second only Cincinnati's Jim Maloney who surrendered 12 baserunners in a 10-inning no-hitter at Chicago-NL on 8/9/65...earned NL "Player of the Week" honors.

## 2000

- ▶ Was 3-7 with a 4.79 ERA in 13 starts with the Marlins...made his season debut in the second game of a doubleheader vs. Atlanta on 7/20 after being reinstated from the D.L. earlier that day...recorded his first double-digit strikeout game on 8/28 vs. St. Louis...also hit his first career homer in the same game off Rick Ankiel.
- ▶ Opened the season on the disabled list after suffering a complete rupture of his ulnar collateral ligament in his right thumb during pitcher's fielding practice on 3/14 at spring training in Viera, Fla...underwent surgery on 3/21 at Holy Cross Hospital in Fort Lauderdale, performed by Dr. Brian Fingado.
- ▶ Made three total rehab appearances with Single-A Brevard County and Triple-A Portland, allowing 3ER in 12.1IP (2.19 ERA) with no decisions.

## 1999

- ▶ Went 4-2 with a 3.48 ERA in seven starts for the Marlins in his first Major League action...made his big league debut on 8/17 at Los Angeles-NL after being recalled to make a spot start for Alex Fernandez, allowing 1ER in 5.2IP with 2BB and 4K...became the first starting pitcher in Marlins history to earn a win in his debut...collected his first hit off Mike Judd in his second AB...was optioned back to Double-A Portland after the game.

## Home Sweet Home

The Yankees were 52-29 (.642) at Yankee Stadium in 2010, tying Detroit for the second-highest home winning percentage in the AL behind Minnesota (53-28, .654). It marked their 19th consecutive winning season at home (since 1992)...according to the Elias Sports Bureau, it is the longest current streak of any team in the Majors and the longest such streak by any team since a 21-year streak for the Yankees from 1969-89, which included two seasons (1974-75) at Shea Stadium.

The Yankees completed their first two seasons at Yankee Stadium with a 109-53 (.673) record, marking the most wins and highest home winning percentage over the stretch...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, their 109 victories were the most by a Major League team in its first two seasons at a particular venue, surpassing the previous mark of 106 shared by the 1909-10 Philadelphia Athletics (Shibe Park) and the 1997-98 Atlanta Braves (Turner Field).

The Yankees own the top two highest single-season home winning percentages all time: .805 (62-15) in 1932 and .802 (65-16) in 1961.

- Received his first career Gold Glove Award, second Silver Slugger Award (also 2006) and placed third in AL MVP voting...named to the *Sporting News*' 2010 All-Star team...became the seventh second baseman to win the Gold Glove and Silver Slugger in the same season, joining Dustin Pedroia (2008), Placido Polanco (2007), Bret Boone (2003), Roberto Alomar (1992, '96, '99-2000), Chuck Knoblauch (1997), Frank White (1986) and Lou Whitaker (1983-85).

- Was elected to start in his first career All-Star Game (was also selected in 2006 but did not play due to injury)...went 0-for-1 with 1SF before being removed defensively (Ian Kinsler) in the sixth in the National League's 3-1 win...according to *Elias*, Cano and SS Derek Jeter joined Bucky Dent and Willie Randolph as the only Yankees SS/2B combos to start an All-Star game together...also joined Jeter, Joe Mauer and Albert Pujols as the only Major League players to top four million fan votes in 2010.

- ▶ Hit .343 (12-for-35) with 8R, 4HR and 6RBI in nine postseason games, leading the team in runs, hits and HR and tying for most RBI...hit all 4HR in the ALCS, becoming the first Yankee to hit 4HR in a single ALCS and fifth to do so in a single postseason series (also Reggie Jackson-5HR in 1977 WS, Hank Bauer-4HR in 1958 WS, Lou Gehrig-4HR in 1928 WS and Babe Ruth-4HR in 1926 WS).

## 2009

- ▶ Hit .320 (204-for-637) with 103R, a team-high 48 doubles, 2 triples, 25HR, 85RBI, 30BB and 5SB in 161 games at 2B with the Yankees...established career highs in runs, hits and doubles...ranked third in the AL in hits, tied for third in doubles and placed fourth in total bases (331)...had 67 multi-hit games, second-most in the Majors behind Ichiro Suzuki's 73...struck out 63 times, tied for the fifth-fewest K's among American Leaguers with at least 600 plate appearances in 2009.
- ▶ Batted .309 (68-for-220) vs. left-handed pitchers and .326 (136-for-417) vs. righties...was the sixth-highest average by a left-handed batter vs. LHP in the AL...his 10HR vs. left-handed pitchers were tied for third-most in the AL among left-handed batters.
- ▶ Collected 203H and 25HR as a second baseman, joining Bret Boone (2001) and Alfonso Soriano (2002) as the third second baseman since Rogers Hornsby retired in 1937 to have at least 200H and 25HR in a season as a 2B...over the last 70 years (since 1940), only three other Yankees players have reached those plateaus – Don Mattingly in 1985 and '86, Bernie Williams in 1999 and Soriano in 2002—credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*.
- ▶ Became just the third Yankees second baseman to collect 100R and 200H in the same season, joining Alfonso Soriano in 2002 and Snuffy Stirnweiss in 1944.
- ▶ Along with Derek Jeter, became the fifth pair of Yankees teammates (sixth time) each to collect at least 200 hits in the same season, joining Lou Gehrig and Earle Combs (1927), Gehrig and Joe DiMaggio (1936, '37), Bernie Williams and Jeter (1999) and Alfonso Soriano and Williams (2002)...according to *Elias*, became the first set of teammates to reach 200 hits in a season at the shortstop and second base position.
- ▶ His 48 doubles tied for fourth on the Yankees all-time single-season list and were the second-most all-time among Yankees 2B (Alfonso Soriano, 51 in 2002).
- ▶ Received three seventh-place votes for AL MVP and came in second place in AL Gold Glove balloting.
- ▶ Hit the first unofficial HR in Yankee Stadium history with a second-inning two-run homer in the Yankees' exhibition win on 4/3 vs. the Cubs.
- ▶ Played with the Dominican Republic in the 2009 World Baseball Classic prior to the season, going 3-for-13 (.231) with 2R and 1BB in three games.
- ▶ Batted .366 (34-for-93) with 18R, 5 doubles, 5HR, 16RBI, 6BB and 1SB in April after hitting .151 (16-for-106) with 6R, 3 doubles, 2HR, 7RBI and 7BB in 29 games in April 2008...marked the largest April batting average increase (.215) in the Majors (credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*).
- ▶ Established a career high with 4R in 4/9 win at Baltimore, marking the most runs scored in a game by a Yankees second baseman since Jose Vizcaino on 7/25/00 at Baltimore.
- ▶ Hit safely in 33-of-34 games from 9/17/08-5/1/09...according to SABR's Trent McCotter, was one of two Yankees over the last 50 years to record a hit in 33-of-34 games with an official AB, joining Derek Jeter (39-of-40 twice, 4/8-5/25/07 and 8/20/06-4/6/07)...hit .400 (56-for-140) with 30R, 11 doubles, 6HR, 28RBI over the span.
- ▶ Compiled a career-high-tying and single-season-best 18-game hitting streak from 4/12-5/1...batted .363 (29-for-80) with 14R, 5 doubles, 4HR and 14RBI during the stretch...according to *Elias*, was the longest single-season hitting streak by a Yankees second baseman since Bobby Richardson hit safely in 19 straight in 1959.
- ▶ Recorded his fourth career multi-HR game – and first since 8/30/07 vs. Boston – in 4/25 loss at Boston.
- ▶ Went a career-high 54PA without a strikeout from 5/15-28.
- ▶ Hit his first career "walk-off" HR in the 10th inning and was 1-for-5 in 8/28 win vs. Chicago-AL...collected his 42nd double of the season in 9/16 win at Toronto, establishing a career high...hit his second career grand slam in 9/28 win vs. Kansas City.

## 2008

- ▶ Hit .271 (162-for-597) with 35 doubles, 3 triples, 14HR and 72RBI in 159 games with the Yankees (154 starts at 2B)...batted .292 (50-for-171, 5HR) vs. left-handed pitchers and .263 (112-for-426, 9HR) vs. righties...was the seventh-highest average by a left-handed batter vs. left-handed pitching in the AL.
- ▶ Ranked fifth among AL second basemen with 13HR while playing the position...all but two of his 14 overall homers were solo.
- ▶ Struck out 65 times, tied with Ichiro Suzuki for the fourth-fewest K's among American Leaguers with at least 600 plate appearances.
- ▶ Hit .246 (85-for-346) with 6HR and 38RBI in 93 games prior to the All-Star break...in 66 games following the break, batted .307 (77-for-251) with 8HR and 34RBI.
- ▶ Batted .347 (114-for-329) with 56R, 27 doubles, 2 triples, 11HR and 54RBI in the 87 Yankees wins he played in...hit just .179 (48-for-268) with 14R, 8 doubles, 1 triple, 3HR and 18RBI in the 72 losses he played in...the Yankees were 34-11 when he recorded a multi-hit game.
- ▶ Had 800 total chances, most among AL second basemen, recording a .984 fielding percentage (13E).
- ▶ Hit .151 (16-for-106) in April after batting .306 overall in 2007 and .342 overall in 2006...was the lowest April average among all AL qualifiers (min. 50PA)...hit at a .297 clip (146-for-491) over the remainder of the season.
- ▶ Hit game-winning, pinch-hit HR in the eighth off Al Reyes in 4/14 win at Tampa Bay...was his second career PH home run (also 6/8/05 at Milwaukee)...according to *Elias*, became the first Yankee to hit a go-ahead, pinch-hit HR since Tino Martinez on 6/25/01 vs. Cleveland.
- ▶ Batted .373 (28-for-75) with 17RBI and 11 multi-hit contests over a 20-game stretch from 6/15-7/8 as the Yankees went 12-8...led the team in hits, average and RBI over the span, raising his season average 35 points from .220 to .255.
- ▶ Drove in at least one run in six consecutive games from 6/22-28 (8 total RBI), matching his career-high RBI streak (fifth time)...was part of a stretch in which he recorded at least 1RBI in nine of 11 games from 6/20-7/2 (11RBI total).
- ▶ Hit safely in eight straight games following the All-Star Break from 7/18-26, going 18-for-35 (.514) with 3 doubles, 3HR and 10RBI and six consecutive games immediately following the break...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, became just the fourth player to collect at least 18H and 10RBI in his team's first eight games after the break, joining Cleveland's Earl Averill in 1936 (18H, 12RBI), Detroit's Walt Dropo in 1952 (19, 11) and San Diego's Tony Gwynn in 1988 (18, 10)...also according to *Elias*, became just the second Major Leaguer to produce multi-hit games in each of his team's first six games after the All-Star break and see his team win all six games (also Cincinnati's Wally Berger in 1938).
- ▶ Went a career-high 96 consecutive plate appearances without drawing a walk from 8/20-9/18...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, was the longest such streak by a Yankee since Alfonso Soriano in 2002 (132PA)...averaged 24.38 PA/BB in 2008, seventh-highest in the AL.
- ▶ Appeared in 19 games with Estrellas in the Dominican Winter League, batting .267 with 8 doubles, 1HR and 15RBI.



## 2007

- ▶ Hit .306 (189-for-617) with 93R, 41 doubles, 7 triples, 97RBI and 39BB in 160 games with the Yankees...made 157 starts at 2B.
- ▶ Was tied (with teammate Derek Jeter) for fourth place in the American League with 61 multi-hit games, tied for sixth with 160 games played, ranked seventh with a .329 batting average at night and 10th with 189 hits, 301 total bases and 617 at-bats...drew more walks in 2007 (39 in 160 games) than he did in his previous two seasons combined (34 walks in 254 games).

- ▶ Led all AL second basemen with 97RBI...was the second-highest total by a Yankees second baseman over the last 50 years (Alfonso Soriano drove in 101 runs in 2002).
- ▶ Batted .328 (63-for-192) against lefties...was the second-highest average in the Major Leagues for a left-handed batter against left-handed pitching, trailing only Seattle's Ichiro Suzuki (.331).
- ▶ Hit .274 (90-for-328) with 40R, 24 doubles, 4 triples, 6HR, 40RBI and 15BB in 85 games prior to the All-Star break...in the second half, hit .343 (99-for-289) with 53R, 17 doubles, 3 triples, 13HR, 57RBI and 24BB in 75 games...his 99 second-half hits were tied for fifth-most in the Majors...after hitting 3HR and driving in 33 runs in his first 79G/305AB of the season (from 4/2-7/2), had 16HR and 64RBI in his last 81G/312AB of the season (from 7/3-9/30).
- ▶ Recorded 830 total chances, most among Major League second basemen...was involved in 136 double plays, the most in the Majors by a second baseman since Cleveland's Carlos Baerga in 1992 (138)...recorded 11 assists in 9/12 win at Toronto, the most in one game by a Yankees second baseman since Alfonso Soriano had 11 on 7/9/03 at Cleveland, according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*.
- ▶ Made his second straight Opening Day start at second base, going 1-for-4 with 1R in 4/2 win vs. Tampa Bay...batted in the leadoff position for the first time in his career in 4/5 loss vs. Tampa Bay, going 3-for-5 with 1R and 1RBI...including the final 13 games of 2006 and the first five games of 2007, hit safely in a career-high 18 consecutive games.
- ▶ Committed a career-high three errors in a game in 5/19 loss at the Mets...following 5/19 game, went a career-best 56 consecutive games from 5/20-7/21 without an error...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, it was the longest errorless streak by a Yankees second baseman since Steve Sax in 1991 (71 games from 5/11-8/7/91).
- ▶ Collected a single-game career-high three doubles and tied a career high with four hits in 5/30 win at Toronto, going 4-for-4 with 1R and 1RBI...each of his first six career four-hit games came on the road.
- ▶ Recorded his first career "walk-off" hit with a 10th-inning single on 7/17 vs. Toronto...had five extra-inning hits in 2007, third-most in the American League.
- ▶ Led the Majors with a .385 batting average in July...his 42H were tied for most in the Majors for the month and were the most in any calendar month of his Major League career...was named American League "co-Player of the Week" for the period ending 7/22 (.500, 17-for-34, 8R, 2HR, 9RBI)...was also named AL "co-Player of the Week" for the period ending 8/5 (.478, 11-for-23, 9R, 3HR, 9RBI).
- ▶ Led the Yankees with a .333 average (5-for-15) in five games during the Division Series vs. Cleveland...also hit a pair of home runs and drove in three runs.

## 2006

- ▶ In his sophomore season, batted .342 (165-for-482) with 41 doubles, 15HR and 78RBI in 122 games with the Yankees (115 starts at 2B, four at DH).
- ▶ Earned his first Silver Slugger Award and was selected to his first American League All-Star team (was replaced on roster due to injury)...led the AL with a .364 road batting average and a .363 average versus right-handed pitchers...ranked third in overall batting average (.342) and tied for ninth with 41 doubles...led all Major Leaguers with a .339 average as a second baseman.
- ▶ His .342 batting average was the third-highest for a Yankee in his second season in the Majors (minimum: 400AB)...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, only Joe DiMaggio (.346 in 1937) and Don Mattingly (.343 in 1984) posted higher marks in the season following their rookie year.
- ▶ Went a career-long 160AB without a home run from 4/21-6/8 (a 39-game stretch).
- ▶ Was placed on the 15-day disabled list from 6/27-8/8 with a strained left hamstring (missed 35 games)...suffered the injury while running out a double in the sixth inning of 6/25 loss vs. Florida (second game of a day-night doubleheader)...made four rehab-assignment starts (three at 2B, one at DH) for Double-A Trenton (8/3-6) and was 7-for-15 with 1R, 2 doubles, 2RBI and 3BB.
- ▶ Drove in at least one run in six straight games from 8/15-20 (13RBI total) and had 16RBI over a nine-game span from 8/12-20...hit third in the lineup for the first time in his career in 9/14 win vs. Tampa Bay, going 2-for-4 with 1R, 2 doubles and 3RBI.
- ▶ Hit .373 (41-for-110) in the month of September after posting a .381 average in September 2005 (40-for-105), becoming the first player to post averages of .370-or-higher in consecutive Septembers of at least 100AB since Wade Boggs batted over .400 in three straight Septembers from 1984-86...concluded the season with a 13-game hitting streak...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, it was the longest hitting streak by a Yankee to conclude a season since Reggie Jackson also hit safely in 13 straight games to end the 1980 season.
- ▶ In his final 53 games of the season after being reinstated from the disabled list on 8/8, hit .365 (77-for-211) with 24 doubles, 11HR and 51RBI...the 24 doubles and 51RBI were the most in the Majors over that span...was named American League "Player of the Month" for September, batting .373 (41-for-110) with 15R, 11 doubles, 7HR, 28RBI and reached base safely in 25 of 28 games...hit .133 (2-for-15) in four Division Series games vs. the Detroit Tigers.

## 2005

- ▶ Finished second behind Oakland's Huston Street in American League "Rookie of the Year" voting...hit .297 (155-for-522) with 14HR and 62RBI in 132 games with the Yankees (130 starts at 2B) after his May recall.
- ▶ Led the AL with a .335 road batting average...led AL rookies in batting average, runs (78), hits, doubles (34), multi-hit games (47) and total bases (239)...ranked second with 52 extra-base hits and a .534 slugging percentage, fourth in RBI and fifth in HR...his 34 doubles ranked second on the team behind Hideki Matsui's 45.
- ▶ Began the season with Triple-A Columbus and batted .333 (36-for-108) with 8 doubles, 3 triples, 4HR and a club-high 24RBI in 24 games...hit safely in 21 of his contests with the Clippers...was recalled from Triple-A Columbus on 5/3 and made his Major League debut that night at Tampa Bay, starting at 2B and going 0-for-3.
- ▶ Became the 19th second baseman to start alongside Derek Jeter with the Yankees...was 2-for-4 in 5/4 loss at Tampa Bay, recording his first Major League hit with a third-inning single...doubled in five straight games from 5/10-16, the longest such streak by a Yankee since Raul Mondesi did it in five straight games from 4/1-6/03...went 15-for-27 (.556) in eight games after snapping an 0-for-18 stretch with a third-inning single in 5/10 win vs. Seattle.
- ▶ Established a single-game career high with four hits in 5/15 win at Oakland, going 4-for-5 with 1 double and 1RBI...hit his first career home run—a solo-homer in the eighth—in 5/24 win vs. Detroit...hit two-run, pinch-hit HR in seventh inning of 6/8 win at Milwaukee, the first pinch-hit HR of his career.
- ▶ Hit in 34 of 36 games from 6/12-7/26, including a season-high 13-game hitting streak from 7/9-26...batted .397 (23-for-58) with 10R, 6 doubles, 3HR and 9RBI during the streak...was the longest hitting streak by an AL rookie in 2005...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, it was the longest hitting streak by a Yankees rookie since Derek Jeter hit safely in 17 straight games in 1996.
- ▶ Had 20-game road hitting streak from 6/27-8/5, the longest such streak in the Majors in 2005 and the longest in the Majors since teammate Derek Jeter hit in 26 straight road games in 2003...was also the longest road hitting streak by a rookie since Ichiro Suzuki hit safely in 25 straight road games in 2001 (credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*).
- ▶ Established single-game career high with 5RBI in 9/15 win at Tampa Bay, going 3-for-5 with 3R, 1 double, 1 triple and game-tying, sixth-inning grand slam—the first of his Major League career (off Seth McClung)...drove in 12 runs in a three-game span from 9/14-16, going 7-for-15 with 7R, 2 doubles, 1 triple, and 3HR...recorded his first career multi-homer game in 9/16 win at Toronto with three-run HR and two-run HR and equaled single-game career highs with 3R and 5RBI (for second straight game)...homered in consecutive games (9/15-16) for the first time in his career and—according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*—became only the second rookie in the last 40 years to collect at least 5RBI in each of two consecutive games (also Brian Daubach with Boston in 1999).
- ▶ Was named the AL's "co-Player of the Week" for the period ending 9/18 after batting .429 (12-for-28) with a league-leading 13RBI and 9R...also had eight extra-base hits, including 3HR, 4 doubles and 1 triple while leading the Majors with 27TB...was the first rookie to win the honor since Hideki Matsui (6/29/03).
- ▶ Was named AL "Rookie of the Month" for September, batting .381 (40-for-105) with 22R, 9 doubles, 2 triples, 5HR and 16RBI...hit safely in 23 of 27 games played in the month.
- ▶ Hit .263 (5-for-19) in five Division Series games vs. the Angels with a team-leading 5RBI...delivered three-run double in his first postseason at-bat in Game 1.

## 2004

- ▶ Split the season between Double-A Trenton and Triple-A Columbus, batting a combined .283 (144-for-508) with 29 doubles, 10 triples, 13HR and 74RBI in 135 games...began the season with Trenton, batting .301 (88-for-292) with 7HR and 44RBI in 74 games...played all but four games at second base for the Thunder...hit "walk-off" homer in 6-4 win over Erie on 4/10...at time of promotion to Columbus, was tied for Eastern League lead in triples (8), ranked third in hits (88), tied for sixth in doubles (20) and was tied for 10th in RBI (44).
- ▶ Reached base in 22 consecutive games from 4/16-5/9...hit safely in 23 of last 31 games with Trenton...was promoted to Columbus on 6/28 and went 4-for-4 with 1 double and 3RBI in his Clippers debut...in 61 games with the Clippers, hit .259 (56-for-216) with 6HR and 30RBI...went 13-for-32 (.406) with 1HR and 6RBI in first 10 games with Columbus...also went 6-for-11 (.545) with 2RBI in three playoff games...appeared in the 2004 All-Star Futures Game in Houston, going 0-for-2...was ranked the No. 2 prospect in the Yankees organization by *Baseball America*.

## 2003

- ▶ Began the season at Single-A Tampa, batting .276 (101-for-366) with 5HR and 50RBI in 90 games...on Opening Day with Tampa, went 5-for-5 with 3R and 3RBI at Lakeland...opened the season with an 11-game hitting streak from 4/3-13...was promoted to Double-A Trenton on 7/19 and hit .280 (46-for-164) with 1HR and 13RBI in 46 games...delivered game-winning RBI single in the 10th inning on 7/21 vs. Reading...was ranked the No. 6 prospect in the Yankees organization by *Baseball America*.

## 2002

- ▶ Hit .276 (131-for-474) with 20 doubles, 9 triples, 14HR and 66RBI in 113 games with Single-A Greensboro...led the Bats in hits, RBI and total bases (211)...was named the starting shortstop on the South Atlantic League All-Star team and was tied for second in the league in triples...played in 22 games for short-season Single-A Staten Island, hitting .276 (24-for-87) with 1HR and 15RBI.

## 2001

- Spent the majority of his first professional season with the Gulf Coast League Yankees, hitting .230 (46-for-200) with 3HR and 34RBI in 57 games...also played in two games for Staten Island, going 2-for-8.

- Full name is Robinson Jose Cano...was signed by Carlos Rios...played basketball and baseball at San Pedro Apostol High School in San Pedro de Macoris...father, Jose, was originally signed by the Yankees in 1980 and made his Major League debut with Houston in 1989, pitching in six games.
- Received the 2010 "Joe DiMaggio Toast of the Town" Award from the New York Chapter of the BBWAA...was also given the 2010 "Player Citizen of the Year" Award from latinobaseball.com.
- Purchased and donated an ambulance for his hometown of San Pedro de Macoris in November 2007...was inspired after a friend perished when he did not receive immediate medical attention from a local ambulance following a motorcycle accident and had to be driven nearly one hour away to Santo Domingo...joined the American Red Cross' National Celebrity Cabinet in 2008...visited with young cancer patients at Hackensack University Medical Center in May 2008...participated in the November 2008 announcement of the alliance formed between MLB, the United States Agency for International Development, the Peace Corps and six Dominican Republic non-profit agencies to use baseball as a catalyst to benefit poorer communities in the D.R.

- In his career, is 6-6 with a 3.08 ERA in 123 relief appearances (131.2IP, 110H, 45ER, 42BB, 156K, 8HR)...has made 43 career starts, going 12-7 with a 4.18 ERA (221.2IP, 103ER) with 206K.
- Owens a 10-3 record with a 3.00 ERA (156.0IP, 52ER) and a .233 (138-for-593) opponents average in 81 career appearances (17 starts) against the AL East...is 8-10 with a 4.38 ERA (197.1IP, 96ER) and a .264 (199-for-754) opponents average against the rest of Baseball.

- ▶ Went nine consecutive appearances without allowing a run from 7/28-8/14 (8.2IP, 2H, 3BB, 6K)...was the second-longest such streak in his career, trailing only an 11-game stretch from 8/7-9/7/07 to begin his Major League career.
- ▶ Tossed a season-high 2.0 perfect innings in 7/30 loss at Tampa Bay, striking out three.
- ▶ Allowed 1ER in 3.1IP over three relief appearance in the postseason (4H, 2BB, 3K).
- ▶ Posted one save and a 10.45 ERA without recording a decision in seven spring training appearances (one start), allowing 13H and 12ER in 10.1IP (8BB, 9K, 1HR)...was selected as a member of the Yankees bullpen on 3/25 when Phil Hughes was named the Yankees' fifth starter.

## 2009

- ▶ Was 9-6 with a 4.75 ERA in 32 appearances (31 starts) with the Yankees...the Yankees were 20-11 in his starts, including 15 come-from-behind victories...were 15-4 in his 19 starts at home...opponents batted .274 (167-for-610, 21HR); LH .266 (85-for-319, 11HR), RH .282 (82-for-291, 10HR)...hit an American League-high 12 batters, matching the most HBP by a Yankees pitcher in the 2000s (Randy Johnson, 2005).
- ▶ Allowed a total of 21R (19ER) in the first inning of games (30.2IP, 5.58 first-inning ERA)...combined to allow 73R (64ER) over his other 126.2IP (for a 4.55 ERA in the second inning of the game and beyond).
- ▶ Was 5-3 with a 4.03 ERA in 13 games (12 starts) on the road...went undefeated in his first nine road starts of the season, going 5-0 with a 2.78 ERA (55.0IP, 17ER)...went 4-3 with a 5.28 ERA (90.1IP, 53ER) in 19 starts at Yankee Stadium...was the second-highest home ERA in the AL behind Scott Kazmir (5.95).
- ▶ Did not record a decision in his first three starts of the year and 11 of his first 17 starts of 2009...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, Chamberlain's 10 decisions (7-3) through his first 29 career starts were the fewest in Major League history.
- ▶ Struck out a career-high 12 batters in 5/5 loss vs. Boston, including nine on called third strikes...were the most strikeouts in a game by a Yankees pitcher since Mike Mussina on 5/7/03 at Seattle (12K)...marked the most by a Yankee in a home game since Mussina on 9/24/02 vs. Tampa Bay (12K)...became the youngest Yankee to strike out 12-or-more batters since Al Downing on 6/21/64 (Game 2) at Chicago-AL (13K)...allowed the first four batters of the game to score and first five to reach, after which he permitted just one infield single, 2BB and 1HP with all 12K...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, only two other pitchers since 1900 struck out 12-or-more batters in a game in which they allowed four-or-more first inning runs (Herb Score in 1959 and Nolan Ryan in 1973).
- ▶ *Elias* also noted that Chamberlain became one of five pitchers to strike out 12-or-more batters while pitching less than 6.0 innings in a game (also Cole Hamels in 2006, Curt Schilling in 1997, Kevin Appier in 1994 and J.R. Richard in 1978).
- ▶ Hit a batter in four consecutive starts from 4/24-5/10, matching the longest such streak for a Yankees pitcher in the last 50 years...also Rick Rhoden (1988), David Cone (1998), Orlando Hernandez (2002) and Randy Johnson (2005)-credit: *Elias*.
- ▶ Lost just once over a 17-start stretch from 5/10-8/11...following his defeat on 6/18 vs. Washington, compiled a career-high nine-start undefeated streak from 6/24- 8/11, going 5-0 with a 3.78 ERA (52.1IP, 22ER) over the stretch.
- ▶ Won his first four starts immediately following the All-Star break, posting a 2.03 ERA (26.2IP, 6ER) and a .156 (14-for-90) opponent's average from 7/19-8/6...was 3-0 with a 0.83 ERA over three starts from 7/19-29, allowing just 8H and 2ER in 21.2IP (8BB, 2HP, 1WP, 1BK, 1HR)...became the first Yankees pitcher to limit his opposition to 3H or fewer in three straight starts since Randy Johnson in April 2005.
- ▶ Recorded his first win at Yankee Stadium on 7/19 vs. Detroit, snapping a nine-start winless stretch at Yankee Stadium to begin the season (0-2, 5.36 ERA)...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, it marked the most winless starts at home to begin a season for a Yankees pitcher since 1990 when Andy Hawkins was 0-7 in his first 10 home starts and Tim Lincecum was 0-6 in his first nine home starts at the original Yankee Stadium.
- ▶ Recorded the win on 8/6 vs. Boston despite issuing a career-high 7BB...was the most walks allowed by a Yankees pitcher who also recorded a victory since David Cone walked seven in a 12-3 Yankees win on 4/9/99 vs. Detroit, according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*.
- ▶ Lost his first road start of the season on 8/16 at Seattle and had his career-high nine-start undefeated streak snapped, recording the loss (5.0IP, 7H, 4ER, 3BB, 2K)...prior to the loss, had been 8-0 and tied with Pat Darcy (1974-76) as having the most career post-All Star break wins without a defeat since the Midsummer Classic was first played in 1933.
- ▶ Set a franchise record by pitching 4.0 innings or less in six consecutive starts from 8/25-9/20, according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*...made his lone relief appearance of the season in the final team game of 2009 on 10/4 at Tampa Bay, tossing 1.0 perfect inning (1K).

- ▶ Made 10 relief appearances in the 2009 postseason, going 1-0 with a 2.84 ERA (6.1IP, 9H, 2ER, 1BB, 7K)...earned the win in Game 4 of the World Series, allowing the game-tying run on a solo homer and striking out the side in 1.0IP of relief.

## 2008

- ▶ Was 4-3 with a 2.60 ERA in 42 appearances (12 starts) with the Yankees...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, became the first Yankee since Roy Sherid in 1929 to start his rookie season with at least 10 relief appearances before a mid-season switch resulting in at least 10 starts.
- ▶ Opponents batted .233 (87-for-373, 5HR); LH .247 (46-for-186, 2HR), RH .219 (41-for-187, 3HR)...was 3-1 with a 2.76 ERA as a starter...the Yankees were 8-4 in his starts...in 30 relief appearances, was 1-2 with a 2.31 ERA...as a reliever, retired 25-of-30 first batters faced (83.3%) and prevented 8-of-10 (80%) inherited runners from scoring.
- ▶ Began the season in the Yankees bullpen before making the transition to a starter in late May.
- ▶ Among AL rookies, ranked first in ERA (2.60), second in strikeouts (118), fourth in opponents batting average (.233) and seventh in innings pitched (100.1)...allowed just 5HR, an average of 0.45HR/9.0IP, the second-lowest among all rookie Major Leaguers with at least 75.0IP (behind the Marlins' Chris Volstad, 0.32HR/9.0IP).
- ▶ His strikeout total marked the most by a Yankees rookie in a single season since Orlando Hernandez recorded 131K in 1998...were the third-most in a season by a Yankees pitcher under the age of 23, behind Al Downing's 171 in 1963 and Lefty Gomez's 150 in 1931.
- ▶ Made his first appearance of the season in 4/1 Opening Day win vs. Toronto, tossing a scoreless eighth inning (1.0IP, 1BB, 2K)...made his first Opening Day roster...was placed on the bereavement list from 4/14-19 to be with his hospitalized father, Harlan, in Nebraska (missed five team games).
- ▶ Allowed a "walk-off" single to Joe Crede to suffer his first Major League loss on 4/23 at Chicago-AL...was his fourth appearance in five games.
- ▶ Began the transition from relief pitcher to starter on 5/21 vs. Baltimore, tossing 2.0 scoreless innings (1H, 2BB, 3K)...Manager Joe Girardi announced the move following the game...tossed a relief-appearance career-high 40 pitches on 5/24 vs. Seattle (2.0IP, 1H, 1BB, 2K)...in three "transition" relief appearances, did not allow a run over 5.1IP, holding opponents to 3H and 4BB while striking out eight batters...Girardi announced on 5/30 that Chamberlain would make his first start on 6/3 vs. the Toronto Blue Jays.
- ▶ Allowed 1ER in 2.1IP (1H, 2R, 4BB, 3K, 1BK) without recording a decision in his first Major League start on 6/3 vs. Toronto...threw 62 pitches overall, facing 12 total batters and marking the first time he faced more than nine batters in a single game...opposed Roy Halladay and, according to *Elias*, joined Greg Cadaret as the only Yankee to make his first Major League start against a former Cy Young Award winner...Cadaret recorded the loss against Roger Clemens on 7/7/89 at Fenway Park after making over 100 relief appearances for the A's and Yankees.
- ▶ At 22 years old, joined Yankees pitchers Phil Hughes (21) and Ian Kennedy (23), as the first trio all age 23 or younger, to start a game in the same season for the Yankees prior to September callups since 1993 (Sterling Hitchcock, Mark Hutton and Sam Miltello)...the last Yankees trio to do it as early in the season (prior to 6/4) was Gil Blanco, Al Downing and Mel Stottlemyre in 1965.
- ▶ Held opponents to 3ER or less in each of his first 11 Major League starts from 6/3-7/30, becoming the first pitcher to do so since the Marlins' Josh Johnson in 13 straight starts from 2005-06 (credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*)...was the only Yankees pitcher in 2008 to have at least 11 straight starts and allow no more than 3ER in any of them...was the first Yankee to accomplish the feat since Mike Mussina from 4/4-5/31/06 (12 straight starts)...his 2.23 ERA was the lowest for any Yankees pitcher over his first 11 Major League starts since Mel Stottlemyre in 1964 (1.97 ERA).
- ▶ Earned his first career win as a starter on 6/25 at Pittsburgh, tossing 6.2 scoreless innings...was his first time holding opponents scoreless in a Major League start...tossed a career-high 114 pitches.

- ▶ Had 124K at the time he reached 100.0 career IP on 7/25 at Boston, the most for any Yankees pitcher all time through his first 100.0 innings in the Majors...allowed just 24R in his first 100.0IP, the fewest by a Yankee since Dave Righetti allowed 23 in 1981 (credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*).
- ▶ Was removed from 8/4 loss at Texas in the fifth inning with right shoulder stiffness after allowing 8H, 5ER and 2HR in 4.2IP...had an MRI performed on 8/5 and was seen by Dr. James Andrews on 8/6...was diagnosed with rotator cuff tendinitis and placed on the 15-day disabled list on 8/6 (missed 24 team games).
- ▶ Was reinstated from the 15-day D.L. on 9/2 and returned to the bullpen...made his 21st relief appearance of the season that night at Tampa Bay, allowing 1H and 1BB in 1.1IP.
- ▶ Had a 2.38 ERA in 10 relief appearances after returning from the D.L. on 9/2, allowing 11H and 3ER in 11.1IP (14K) without recording a decision.
- ▶ Entered the 2008 season ranked by *Baseball America* as the Yankees' top prospect and the top pitching prospect in all of Baseball (third-best overall)...was also rated as having the "Best Fastball," "Best Curveball" and "Best Slider" among all pitchers in the Yankees system.

- ▶ Struck out 34 batters in 24.0IP, averaging 12.75 strikeouts per 9.0IP while issuing just 6BB...was the fourth-highest K/9.0IP ratio among Major League relievers with at least 20.0IP...struck out 24 of the 47 batters he recorded a first-pitch strike against (51.1%).

- ▶ Earned his first Major League win on 9/5 vs. Seattle, tossing a perfect seventh inning (1.0IP)...became the ninth Yankees pitcher to record his first Major League win in 2007, further extending the club record (previous six, done in 1946).

Carrasco and the Mets' Grant Roberts, both in 2003).



**DID YOU KNOW???** Former Yankee and Hall of Famer Allie Reynolds (pictured) is one of only four pitchers to record two regular-season no-hitters in the same season, accomplishing the feat in 1951...prior to Reynolds, Cincinnati's Johnny Vander Meer was the only pitcher to hurl two no-hitters in the same season, doing so in back-to-back starts in June 1938...Detroit's Virgil Trucks (1952) and California's Nolan Ryan (1973) are the only other pitchers to match the record.

Reynolds' first no-hitter of the 1951 season came on July 12 vs. Cleveland...his second no-hitter, an 8-0 Yankees victory on September 28 vs. Boston, clinched the American League title for the Yankees.

## 2009

- ▶ Hit .270 (67-for-248) with 48R, 3HR, 23RBI and 26SB in 108 games (63 starts in CF) with the Yankees...went 26-for-31 in stolen base attempts (83.9%), ranking third among all Major League rookies in stolen bases...became the third Yankees rookie over the last 50 years (since 1960) to steal at least 26 bases in a season, joining Alfonso Soriano (43SB in 2001) and Willie Randolph (37SB in 1976).
- ▶ Collected a triple and home run in the same game three times in 2009 (5/13 at Toronto, 5/15 vs. Minnesota and 6/26 at the Mets), becoming the first Yankee to accomplish the feat at least three times in a single season since Hank Bauer in 1957 (also three times)—credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*.

- ▶ Missed three games from 5/18-20 with a bruised right shoulder...suffered injury in 5/17 win vs. Minnesota when he was tagged out at the plate by Joe Mauer...upon his return, reached base safely (via hit, walk or HBP) in 22 straight games with an official PA (including 18 starts) from 5/21-6/26, batting .371 (26-for-70) with 14R, 1 double, 2 triples, 1HR, 5RBI and 9BB.

- ▶ Also had “walk-off” RBI single on 8/16 vs. Kansas City, becoming the first Yankees rookie with two “walk-off” hits in one season since Hideki Matsui in 2003 (credit: *Elias*)...*Elias* also noted that he became the first Major Leaguer to record two game-ending RBI within his first 20 career games since Ted Simmons had two in his first seven ML games spanning from 1968-69.
- ▶ Batted .153 (9-for-59) with 8R, 1 double, 7RBI, 1SF, 2SH and 5SB in 17 games (15 starts in LF, one start in CF) in his first stint with the Yankees before being optioned to Scranton/WB on 7/26...recalled on 8/15 and batted .294 (20-for-68) with 4 doubles, 2 triples, 9RBI and 8SB in 25 starts (16 starts in CF) in his second stint.
- ▶ In 94 overall games with Scranton/Wilkes-Barre, batted .296 (101-for-341) with 68R, 12 doubles, 11 triples, 3HR, 32RBI, 70BB, 11SH and 37SB, while recording 27 multi-hit games...led all Yankees farmhands in SB and tied for fourth in average...at the time of his first promotion, led all Triple-A players in triples, SB and sacrifice hits and ranked first in the International League in walks, was second in OBP (.412) and fourth in runs scored.
- ▶ Hit the first “walk-off” HR in Scranton/WB Yankees history on 4/23 vs. Buffalo, a solo HR in the bottom of the ninth.

- ▶ Was one of three American Leaguers to record 30HR and 20SB, joining Texas' Ian Kinsler and Nelson Cruz...marked his second straight season with at least 20HR and 20SB, becoming one of just three Tigers players to reach the totals in multiple seasons, joining Kirk Gibson (four times) and Alan Trammell (three times).
- ▶ Hit .275 (124-for-451) with 28HR vs. right-handed pitchers and .183 (33-for-180) with 2HR against left-handed pitchers...batted .267 (86-for-322) in 81 games on the road, tying for fourth in the AL with 20 road homers...hit .230 (71-for-309) with 10HR in 79 games at home.
- ▶ Connected for seven leadoff homers, matching his own 2007 Tigers club record.
- ▶ Was selected to the American League All-Star team for the first time in his career...tripled in his only AB (off Heath Bell) and scored the game-winning run in the eighth inning of the 4-3 AL win at St. Louis.
- ▶ Made 155 starts in CF, committing just 3E in 407 total chances (.993 fielding percentage)...ranked fifth in fielding percentage among AL outfielders with at least 125 games...did not commit an error in his first 96 games of the season from 4/6-7/26, a total of 221 errorless chances.
- ▶ Connected for three two-homer games in 2009 (4/21 at Los Angeles-AL, 6/17 at St. Louis and 7/29 at Texas).
- ▶ Hit his 100th career home run on 9/27 at Chicago's U.S. Cellular Field, a solo homer off Daniel Hudson in the first inning.
- ▶ Following the season was tabbed the third-best defensive outfielder in the American League by *Baseball America*.

## 2008

- ▶ Hit .280 (155-for-553) with 112R, 26 doubles, 13 triples, 22HR, 66RBI and 12SB...led the American League in triples, becoming the first Tigers player to lead the league in triples in consecutive seasons since Ty Cobb in 1917 (24) and 1918 (14)...became the fourth player in Detroit history to post double-digit totals in a single-season in doubles, triples, homers and RBI, joining Bobby Veach (1920-21), Ty Cobb (1921, 1925) and Charlie Gehringer (1929-30).
- ▶ Ranked second in the AL in runs scored, becoming the first Tigers player to score 100-or-more runs in back-to-back seasons since Tony Phillips in 1992-93...was the ninth-hardest player to double up, grounding into a double play once every 79.0AB.
- ▶ Led off a game with a home run four times (4/24 vs. Texas, 5/4 at Minnesota, 6/20 at San Diego and 8/27 vs. Cleveland).
- ▶ Began the season on the 15-day disabled list with a non-displaced fracture of the third metacarpal in his right hand...reinstated from the D.L. on 4/23, and hit safely in six of his first seven games back.
- ▶ Established a career high with a 15-game hitting streak from 6/10-27, batting .443 (27-for-61) with 4 doubles, 3 triples, 1HR and 7RBI...scored a career-high 4R in 7/21 win at Kansas City.
- ▶ Equaled a career high five hits on 7/30 at Cleveland, going 5-for-7 with 3R and 2RBI in the Tigers' 13-inning win.
- ▶ Prior to the season, agreed to terms on a five-year contract with a club option for 2013 on 2/4.

## 2007

- ▶ Hit .302 (185-for-612) with 122R, 38 doubles, 23 triples, 23HR, 74RBI and 26SB in 158 games for the Tigers, recording career-highs in runs, hits, doubles, triples, RBI and stolen bases...led the AL in triples, ranked third in runs scored and extra-base hits (84), fourth in total bases (338), sixth in slugging percentage (.552), seventh in strikeouts (141) and tied for ninth in multi-hit games (57).
- ▶ Became the third player in Major League history to collect at least 30 doubles, 20 triples, 20HR and 20SB in a single season, joining the Cubs' Wildfire Schulte (1911) and Philadelphia's Jimmy Rollins (also in 2007)...became the 13th player in Tigers history to post double-digits in doubles, triples, home runs and stolen bases...joined teammate Gary Sheffield as one of seven Tigers all-time to collect at least 20HR and 20SB in a single season.
- ▶ His 23 triples were the most by a Tiger since Ty Cobb finished with 24 triples in 1917, while his 122 runs were the most by a Tigers player since Ron LeFlore scored 126 runs in 1978.

- ▶ Was successful in 96.3 percent of his stolen base attempts (26-for-27), marking the best single-season stolen base percentage by a Tigers player since it became an official statistic in 1920.
- ▶ Hit .337 (166-for-493) with 20HR against right-handed pitchers, ranking fourth in the AL with a .621 slugging percentage and sixth in batting average against righties...batted .160 (19-for-119) with 3HR vs. lefthanders, recording the lowest batting average in the league against left-handed pitchers among qualifiers.
- ▶ Led all Major League outfielders with 428 putouts, tying for eighth in the AL with 10 assists...tied for the third-most putouts by a Tigers outfielder in franchise history with Barney McCosky (1939).
- ▶ Set a Detroit franchise record with seven leadoff homers (4/24 at Los Angeles-AL, 5/9 vs. Seattle, 7/14 at Seattle, 7/23 at Chicago-AL, 8/26 vs. New York-AL, 9/16 at Minnesota and 9/22 vs. Kansas City).
- ▶ Hit his first career grand slam in 4/4 win vs. Toronto, connecting in the third inning off Shaun Marcum...matched his career high with 5RBI (second time).
- ▶ Named the AL "Player of the Week" for 7/9-15 after hitting .500 (8-for-16) with 7R in four games.
- ▶ Batted .283 (96-for-339) with 62R, 24 doubles, 15 triples, 12HR and 43RBI in 85 games prior to the All-Star break, tying for the AL lead with 51 extra-base hits...became the ninth Major League player since 1957 to post double-digit totals in doubles, triples and home runs prior to the All-Star break...hit .326 (89-for-273) with 60R, 14 doubles, 8 triples, 11HR and 31RBI in 73 games following the break.
- ▶ Collected his second career inside-the-park home run off Phil Hughes in 8/26 win vs. the Yankees...stole a career-high three bases in 9/30 win at Chicago-AL in the final game of the season.

## 2006

- ▶ In his first full season at the Major League level, batted .260 (155-for-596) with 31 doubles, 9 triples, 19HR, 68RBI and 8SB in 159 games (153 starts in CF)...led all AL outfielders with a .997 fielding percentage, ranking second with 389 total chances and 385 putouts...was the best fielding percentage by a Tigers centerfielder since Mickey Stanley posted a 1.000 fielding percentage in 1970.
- ▶ Led the American League with 174K, marking the third-highest single-season strikeout total in Detroit club history.

- ▶ Homered and tripled in the first inning in 9/23 win at Kansas City, going 2-for-6 with 2R and 4RBI...became just the fifth Major Leaguer since 1987 to accomplish the feat in the same inning, joining Detroit's Tony Phillips (1991), Arizona's Steve Finley (1999), Detroit's Brandon Inge (2004) and Tampa Bay's Carl Crawford (2005).
- ▶ Recorded his first career multi-homer game in 9/29 loss vs. Kansas City.

## CAREER NOTES

- According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, Hughes' 31 career wins are the most victories by a player the Yankees selected in the first round of the First-Year Player Draft, surpassing the six career wins of Bill Burbach (Yankees 1965 first-round pick).
- Was 23-11 prior to turning 24 on 6/24/10, marking the most wins by a Yankee under 24 since 1965, when Mel Stottlemyre (29 wins) and Al Downing (32 wins) each celebrated their 24th birthday.
- Is 25-17 with a 4.68 ERA (315.2IP, 164ER) in 57 career starts...is 6-1 with a 1.35 ERA (53.1IP, 8ER) in 46 career relief appearances.
- Is 9-0 in his last 12 starts immediately following a Yankees loss (since May 2009).
- Is 9-2 with a 3.27 ERA (85.1IP, 31ER) in 29G/11GS in day games over the last two years (2009-10), including relief appearances.

## 2010

- Went 18-8 with a 4.19 ERA (176.1IP, 82ER) and 146K in 31G/29GS with the Yankees, setting career highs in wins, losses, IP and strikeouts...was tied for fourth in the AL and tied for seventh in the Majors in wins...was tied for fifth in the AL and tied for sixth in the Majors with a .692 winning percentage...lasted at least 5.0IP in 28 of his 29 starts (only exception on 8/25 at Toronto, 3.2IP)...opponents batted .244 (162-for-665, 25HR); LH .235 (81-for-345, 17HR) and RH .253 (81-for-320, 8HR)...the Yankees went 20-9 in his starts.
- Became the second Yankees pitcher age 24 or younger in the last 45 years to win at least 18 games in a season (also Andy Pettitte in 1996, 21 wins)...was the youngest Yankees righthander to win at least 18 games in a season since 23-year old Mel Stottlemyre won 20 games in 1965.

- Allowed 20HR at home (including each of his first 15 total HR allowed), tying Scott Sanderson (20 in 1992) for the most HRs allowed at home in a single season in franchise history, according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*...tied Baltimore's Kevin Millwood and the Dodgers' Ted Lilly for most homers allowed at home in the Majors in 2010...according to *Elias*, became the first pitcher to allow his first 15HR at home since Seattle's Gaylord Perry in 1982...allowed just 5HR in 70.0 road IP.
- Did not hit a batter, becoming the first Yankee since Ron Guidry in 1985 to throw at least 175.0IP in a season and not hit anyone.

- ▶ Received 7.49R/9.0IP of support in his starts, the highest mark among qualifying Major League pitchers.

- ▶ Appeared on his first All-Star roster, receiving his selection via the player ballot...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, became the third-youngest pitcher to represent the Yankees in an All-Star Game (1956-Johnny Kucks age 22; and 1965-Mel Stottlemyre age 23)...was charged with the loss in the 3-1 NL victory (0.1IP, 2H, 2ER), becoming the first Yankee to take the loss in the Midsummer Classic since Tommy John in 1980...faced three batters in the seventh inning, retiring Cincinnati's Joey Votto before allowing back-to-back singles to Cincinnati's Scott Rolen and St. Louis' Matt Holliday (who would both come around to score after he left).

- ▶ Was named the Yankees' fifth starter to open the season by Manager Joe Girardi on 3/25...following spring training, made two starts in extended spring training while remaining on the Yankees' 25-man active roster.
- ▶ Made his season debut in 4/15 win vs. Los Angeles-AL, recording the victory...was his first start since 5/31/09...struck out four of his first seven batters faced.
- ▶ Allowed just 10 combined hits in his first four starts of the season (25.0IP) and 17 combined hits in his first five starts (32.0IP) of 2010...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, became the first Major League pitcher since the Yankees' David Cone in 1999 to limit his opposition to as few hits with as many IP over his first four and first five starts of a season.
- ▶ Carried a no-hitter through 7.0 innings on 4/21 at Oakland, recording the win in a 3-1 Yankees victory (7.1IP, 1H, 1ER, 2BB, 10K)...marked his first double-digit strikeout game, recording eight swinging Ks.
- ▶ Retired 25 consecutive RH batters over three starts from 4/27-5/7 – including all 13 faced on 5/2 vs. Chicago-AL.
- ▶ Won each of his first five decisions to start the season, becoming the youngest Yankees starter to begin a season 5-0 since Whitey Ford in 1950 (9-0)...according to *Elias*, with a 1.38 ERA after his first six starts, became the first Yankee with at least five wins and a sub-1.50 ERA through his first six starts since Bob Turley in 1958 (6-0, 0.83 ERA), and the first Major Leaguer since the Angels' Jered Weaver in 2006 (6-0, 1.12 ERA).
- ▶ Joined Andy Pettitte at 5-0 to start the season, marking just the fourth time in the last 50 years that two Yankees starters each won their first five decisions in the same season...also occurred in 2004 (Kevin Brown and Orlando Hernandez), 2003 (Mike Mussina and David Wells) and 1980 (Ron Guidry and Tommy John), according to *Elias*.

winning percentage of .900 or higher (also 6/22/1900 at Baker Bowl when Brooklyn's Joe McGinnity at 12-1 faced the Phillies' Bill Bernhard also at 12-1).

- ▶ Had 10-1 record and a 3.17 ERA through 6/19, becoming the 12th Yankees pitcher to win at least 10 of his first 11 decisions (all as a starter) to start a season...was the first such Yankee with an ERA at or below 3.17 since Jimmy Key in 1994 (10-1, 2.99 ERA).
- ▶ Took the loss on 6/29 vs. Seattle, snapping a 10-game winning streak at home that dated back to 5/20/09...had been tied for the longest home winning streak in the Majors with teammate CC Sabathia.
- ▶ Made his 50th career start on 8/14 at Kansas City, recording the win (6.0IP, 9H, 3ER, 1BB, OK, 1HR) in an 8-3 Yankees victory...became the youngest Yankee to at the time of his 50th start since Al Downing (at 24 years, 51 days) in 1964, according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*.

- ▶ Was skipped in the rotation from 9/6-14, going nine days without a start...made his first of two relief appearances of the season on 9/10 at Texas, tossing 1.0 perfect inning of relief (1K) in the Yankees' 6-5, 13-inning loss...also tossed 1.0 scoreless inning of relief in his final appearance of the season on 10/2 at Boston in the Game 1 win of a doubleheader.

- ▶ In seven starts, went 3-2 with a 5.45 ERA, allowing 37H and 21ER in 34.2IP (15BB, 31K, 6HR)...held his opponents to 3ER or less in five of his seven starts.
- ▶ Was recalled from Triple-A Scranton/Wilkes-Barre on 4/28 and made the start that night at Detroit, recording the win in an 11-0 Yankees victory...threw 6.0 scoreless innings and struck out six batters (2H, 2BB), snapping a personal four-game losing streak.

- ▶ Earned his first regular-season win as a reliever on 7/17 vs. Detroit, tossing 2.0 scoreless IP while striking out six-of-nine batters faced (3H, 1BK)...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, became just the third pitcher in Yankees history to record at least 6K in a game with all his outs being recorded via strikeout (also Joe Page, 6K vs. Detroit on 9/13/47 and Goose Gossage, 6K vs. Kansas City on 9/1/79).
- ▶ Earned his first career save in 7/23 win vs. Oakland, tossing 2.0 perfect innings...according to *Elias*, became the youngest Yankees pitcher to earn a save of at least six outs since 18-year-old Jose Rijo notched a 3.0-inning save on 4/18/84 at Cleveland.
- ▶ Opened the year with Scranton/WB, going 3-0 with a 1.86 ERA (19.1IP, 4ER) in three starts...allowed only 3BB while striking out 19 batters 19.1IP...opponents were batting .233 (17-for-73) at the time of his recall.
- ▶ Made nine postseason appearances in 2009, going 0-1 with an 8.53 ERA (6.1IP, 11H, 6ER, 4BB, 7K, 1HR)...pitched in all three Division Series wins vs. Minnesota.

## 2008

- ▶ Was 0-4 with a 6.62 ERA in eight starts over two stints with the Yankees (3/31-7/30 and 9/13-28)...the Yankees were 3-5 in his starts...opponents batted .314 (43-for-137, 3HR); LH .333 (20-for-60, 1HR), RH .299 (23-for-77, 2HR)...his eight starts were the third-most all time by a Yankees pitcher in a winless season behind Steve Trout (9, 1987) and Ian Kennedy (9, 2008).
- ▶ Leadoff batters hit at a .412 clip (14-for-34)...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, opponents scored in 12 of the 17 innings the leadoff batter reached, but only two of 20 innings in which he retired the first batter.
- ▶ Opened the season as the youngest pitcher in the Majors and the second youngest player in the Majors behind Arizona's Justin Upton (20 years old, born 8/25/87)...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, was the youngest pitcher to begin a season in the Yankees rotation since Bill Burbach in 1969 (Opening Day age of 21 years, 232 days).
- ▶ Turned 22 on 6/24...made 19 starts with a 5-7 record and 71 career strikeouts before the age of 22...were the most starts, wins and strikeouts by a Yankees starting pitcher prior to his 22nd birthday since Bill Burbach went 6-8 with 76K in 24 starts prior to turning 22 years old on 8/22/69.
- ▶ At 21 years old, joined Yankees pitchers Joba Chamberlain (22) and Ian Kennedy (23) as the first trio—each under age 24—to start a game in the same season for the Yankees prior to September callups since 1993 (Sterling Hitchcock, Mark Hutton and Sam Militello)...the last Yankees trio to do it prior to June 4 of a season was Gil Blanco, Al Downing and Mel Stottlemyre in 1965.
- ▶ With his first start of the season on 4/3 vs. Toronto in the Yankees' third game, became the youngest Yankees pitcher to start one of the team's first three games since Waite Hoyt (21 years, 217 days) took the mound for the club's second game in 1921.
- ▶ Was 21 years old at the start of the season, and—with Ian Kennedy (age 23)—became the fourth pair of pitchers, each under the age of 24, to start for the Yankees within the team's first four games of a season (also Dave Righetti-23 and Mike Morgan-22 in 1982; Hippo Vaughn-23, Ray Fisher-23 and Ray Caldwell-22 in 1911; and Mel Stottlemyre-23 and Al Downing-23 in 1965)—credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*.

- ▶ Underwent an MRI on 5/1 that revealed a stress fracture in his ninth right rib and was placed on the 15-day disabled list that day...was transferred to the 60-day disabled list on 7/18 when the Yankees signed 1B Richie Sexson...was returned from rehab, reinstated from the 60-day D.L. and optioned to Charleston on 7/30...did not allow a run in two relief appearances with Charleston, going 2-0 (6.2IP, 3H, 2BB, 6K)...was promoted to Triple-A Scranton/Wilkes-Barre on 8/6 where he went 1-0 with a 5.90 ERA in six starts...in two postseason starts with Scranton/WB, was 1-0 with a 0.69 ERA, allowing 1ER in 13.0IP and striking out 23 batters (8H, 4BB)...recorded the series-clinching win in Game 4 of the Governor's Cup Series on 9/12 at Durham, allowing just 1ER in 5.0IP and striking out 12 (4H, 4BB) to establish a Scranton/WB single-game playoff strikeout record...his 23K also set a franchise-postseason record.
- ▶ Was recalled from Scranton/WB prior to 9/13 doubleheader vs. Tampa Bay and joined the Yankees the following day...made start on 9/17 vs. Chicago-AL, allowing 1ER in 4.0IP (4H, 2BB, 4K)...allowed three combined earned runs over his final two starts of the season (12.0IP), walking two and striking out 10.
- ▶ Established a career-high with 8.0IP in his final start of the season on 9/24 at Toronto...limited the Blue Jays to 2ER with 0BB and 6K...did not record a decision after the Yankees won in 10th on Bobby Abreu's grand slam.
- ▶ Pitched for the Peoria Javelinas of the Arizona Fall League following the season, making seven starts and going 2-0 with a 3.00 ERA (30.0IP, 10ER).

- ▶ According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, was the youngest Yankees draftee to debut with the Bombers since the amateur draft began in 1965...was the youngest Yankee to debut as a starter since Gene Nelson on 5/4/81 (20 years, 152 days)...became the Yankees' first top draft choice to pitch for the club since Bill Burbach, who was chosen in 1965 (the inaugural year of the First-Year Player Draft).
- ▶ Earned his first Major League win in his second start on 5/1 at Texas...tossed 6.1 hitless innings (3BB, 6K) in the Yankees' 10-1 victory before being removed in the seventh inning with a strained left hamstring...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, it was the furthest into a game that a Yankees starter had been removed with a no-hitter still intact since David Cone on 9/2/96, when he threw 7.0 no-hit innings in his first start after returning from aneurysm surgery (5-0 win at Oakland).

  - ▶ Earned his 11th trip to the All-Star Game in 2010, including his sixth fan-selected start (fifth consecutive start)...went 1-for-2 with 1BB before being removed for PR (Elvis Andrus) in the sixth in the 3-1 National League win on 7/13...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, Jeter and 2B Robinson Cano joined Bucky Dent and Willie Randolph as the only Yankees SS/2B combos to start an All-Star game together...also joined Cano, Joe Mauer and Albert Pujols as the only Major League players to top four million fan votes, finishing second behind Mauer...his 11 All-Star Game selections are tied with Bill Dickey and Mariano Rivera for the fifth-most in club history, trailing Mickey Mantle (20), Yogi Berra (19), Joe DiMaggio (13) and Elston Howard (12)...joins teammate Mariano Rivera as the only players to be named to the All-Star team with their current team at least 11 times, according to *Elias*.

Alomar, J. Thome, O. Vizquel), 1936-38 Yankees (F. Crosetti, L. Gehrig, R. Rolfe) and 1929-30 Philadelphia A's (M. Bishop, M. Cochrane, J. Foss).
- ▶ Earned his fifth career Gold Glove Award...became the sixth shortstop since 1958 (when Gold Glove Awards were first awarded in each league) to win the honor at least five times, and joined Don Mattingly (nine-time winner), Dave Winfield (five), Ron Guidry (five) and Bobby Richardson (five) as the only Yankees to win the award at least five times...recorded a career-best .989 fielding percentage at SS and made just six errors, the lowest full-season total of his career and the fewest among all Major League shortstops in 2010 (min. 110G at SS)...compiled a career-long 52-game errorless stretch from 6/12-8/15.
- ▶ Led the Majors in fielding percentage at SS...with teammate Robinson Cano leading the American League with a .996 fielding percentage at second base, became the first teammates to finish a season as the fielding leaders at shortstop and second base (in either league) since Omar Vizquel and Roberto Alomar for the 2001 Cleveland Indians and the first Yankees to accomplish the feat since Phil Rizzuto and Jerry Coleman in 1949 (credit: *Elias*).
- ▶ Made his 14th Opening Day start at SS for the Yankees on 4/4 at Boston, the most Opening Day starts by a Yankee at shortstop in franchise history...became the oldest shortstop (35 years, 282 days) to start for the Yankees in a season opener since Phil Rizzuto in 1955 (37 years, 200 days)—credit: *Elias*.
- ▶ According to *Elias*, is the only active player to make 14 Opening Day starts, all for the same team, at any single position...is the first shortstop to do so since Barry Larkin started 17 Opening Day games for the Reds (1987-2004)...was his sixth Opening Day start at SS with Alex Rodriguez at 3B, matching Bucky Dent/Graig Nettles (six) and Frank Crosetti/Red Rolfe (six) for most such starts in franchise history.
- ▶ Batted .330 (31-for-94) with 18RBI in April...marked his most RBI in a calendar month since May 2007 (20RBI)...recorded at least 30H in April for the seventh time in his career, one shy of Tony Gwynn's Major League record (credit: *Elias*)...hit 4HR in April for the second straight year after going homerless in April 2008.
- ▶ Hit safely in each of his first 11 games (4/4-17), the longest hitting streak to start a season of his career...according to *Elias*, with Robinson Cano, became the first 2B-SS duo in the Modern Era (since 1900) to each hit safely in nine-or-more of their club's first games of the season...became the first Yankees tandem at any position to each hit safely in each of the team's first 10 games of a season.
- ▶ Hit solo-HR and was 2-for-5 with 2RBI in 4/13 home opening win vs. Los Angeles-AL...has hit safely in nine straight home openers (since 2002), marking the second-longest streak in franchise history, trailing Lou Gehrig (12 straight from 1926-37)—credit: *Elias*.
- ▶ Appeared in his 2,165th game on 5/7 at Boston, surpassing Lou Gehrig (2,164) for sole possession of second place on the Yankees' all-time list.

- ▶ Hit game-winning solo-HR in the sixth inning to lead off the resumption 5/25 suspended-game win at Minnesota...was his first career RBI in a 1-0 Yankees win...became the first Yankee to homer in a 1-0 Yankees victory since Melky Cabrera on 4/28/07 at Cleveland.
- ▶ Recorded six straight multi-hit games from 5/27-6/1, one shy of his career high...overlapping the six-game multi-hit contest stretch, Robinson Cano collected eight straight multi-hit games (5/26-6/2)...according to *Elias*, became the second pair of Yankees teammates to collect at least two hits apiece in each of six straight games, joining Lou Gehrig and Jack Saltzgaver from 7/3-7/34.
- ▶ Hit leadoff HR and three-run HR and was 2-for-4 with 3R, 1BB and 1SB in 6/12 win vs. Houston...was his ninth career multi-homer game and first since 8/27/06 at Los Angeles-AL...was his first multi-homer game at home since 6/18/05 vs. the Cubs...hit his 24th career leadoff HR, tying Rickey Henderson for most such homers in franchise history.
- ▶ Did not drive in a run in a career-high 19 consecutive games from 6/13-7/5 (previous high was 13G from 7/16-30/04)—credit: *Elias*.
- ▶ Collected 2,834 career hits prior to his 36th birthday on 6/26...since 1961, the only players to accumulate more hits prior to turning 36 years old were Hank Aaron (2,956) and Robin Yount (2,868)—credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*.

- ▶ Hit .334 (212-for-634) with 107R, 27 doubles, 1 triple, 18HR, 66RBI and 30SB in 153 games with the Yankees (147 starts at SS, five starts at DH)...was named the "Sportsman of the Year" by *Sports Illustrated*, becoming the first Yankee to win the honor in its 56-year history...also earned his fourth Silver Slugger Award, fourth Gold Glove Award (led all SS with a .986 fielding pct.) and second Hank Aaron Award (as the AL's top offensive player voted on by fans)...named to the *Sporting News* AL All-Star team and finished third in AL MVP voting (193 points)...played in a total of 193 games in 2009, including spring training, World Baseball Classic, regular season, All-Star Game and postseason.

- ▶ Ranked second in the Majors in hits and fourth in batting average...ranked third in the AL in on-base percentage (.406) and tied with teammate Johnny Damon for fourth in the AL in runs scored...ranked third in the Majors with 66 multi-hit games, and third in the AL in road average (.337)...his 107R were the most among regular shortstop in the Majors...ranked third in the Majors with a .395 (70-for-177) average vs. left-handed pitchers in 2009...led the Majors with a .409 OBP as the No. 1 batter in the lineup, while his .336 average (205-for-611) ranked third among Major League leadoff men...recorded 21 three-hit games, the highest such total of his career and third-most in the Majors behind Florida's Hanley Ramirez (24) and Minnesota's Joe Mauer (23)...were the most home runs by an AL shortstop.
- ▶ According to *Elias*, became the oldest player to post a 200-hit season for the Yankees and became the oldest regular shortstop to ever record 200H in a season (previous was Honus Wagner-201H at age 34 in 1908)...became the seventh player in Major League history to collect 200 hits in a season both before age 25 and after turning 34, joining Nap Lajoie, Ty Cobb, Tris Speaker, Paul Waner, Pete Rose and Tony Gwynn...marked the second-highest batting average by a shortstop at age 35 or older in the last 100 years behind Honus Wagner who hit .339 at age 35.
- ▶ Became the oldest player in the last 84 years and one of three players in the modern era (since 1900) to bat .334 and steal 30 bases at age 35-or-older, joining Hall-of-Famers Max Carey (1925), Eddie Collins (1923-24) and Honus Wagner (1909).
- ▶ Surpassed Lou Gehrig (2,721) for most hits in franchise history with his third-inning single to right-field off Orioles starter Chris Tillman in 9/11 loss vs. Baltimore...according to *Elias*, became the sixth different player to hold the Yankees hit record at the conclusion of a season, joining Willie Keeler (1903-11), Hal Chase (1911-22), Wally Pipp (1922-29), Babe Ruth (1929-37) and Gehrig (1937-2009)...was voted as the MLB.com "Moment of the Year"...tied Gehrig with a seventh-inning single to right field off Rays starter Jeff Niemann in 9/9 win vs. Tampa Bay, going 3-for-4 with 1 double, 1BB and 1SB.
- ▶ Along with Robinson Cano (204H), became just the fifth pair of Yankees teammates (sixth time) to each collect at least 200 hits in the same season...also Lou Gehrig and Earle Combs (1927), Gehrig and Joe DiMaggio (1936, '37), Bernie Williams and Jeter (1999) and Alfonso Soriano and Williams (2002)...also joined Cano as the first pair of teammates in Baseball history to reach 200 hits in a season at the shortstop and second base position (credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*).
- ▶ Stole 30 bases in 35 attempts (85.7%), more SB than his totals from '07 and '08 combined (26)...marked his third season with at least 200H and 30SB, the most such seasons for any shortstop.
- ▶ Was the AL's top overall All-Star vote-getter for the first time in his career, garnering 4,851,889 fan votes to earn his 10th career All-Star selection and sixth as the AL's starting shortstop...went 0-for-2 with 2R and 1HBP in the 4-3 American League win in St. Louis on 7/14, playing five innings as the AL's starting SS.
- ▶ Recorded the first unofficial hit by a Yankee at Yankee Stadium with a first-inning double on 4/3 vs. the Cubs in an exhibition game...played for Team USA in the World Baseball Classic, batting .276 (8-for-29) with 2 doubles in eight games (four starts at SS, three at DH).
- ▶ Made his 13th Opening Day start at SS for the Yankees, going 3-for-5 in 4/6 Opening Day loss at Baltimore...were his most hits on Opening Day since 1999 (3-for-3)...are the most Opening Day starts by a Yankees shortstop in franchise history.



According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, prior to Jeter setting the all-time franchise hits record on 9/11/09, Lou Gehrig had held the mark since 9/6/37, when he surpassed Babe Ruth (2,518H)...Willie Keeler led the Highlanders in hits in 1903, their first season in New York, and he remained the all-time leader for New York until Hal Chase passed him in August 1911...Chase led the franchise until September 1922, when he was followed by Wally Pipp (1922-1929), then Ruth (1929-1937).

**DID YOU KNOW???** Derek Jeter hit safely in 92 of 100 games from 7/21/06-5/16/07 (G1), becoming the first player in modern Major League history (since 1900) to accomplish the feat...according to the Society for American Baseball Research, the last player prior to Jeter to accomplish the feat was Wee Willie Keeler, who hit in 93 of 100 games over a stretch from 1898 to 1899.

- ▶ Recorded the first at-bat by a Yankee in Yankee Stadium in 4/16 loss vs. Cleveland...prior to his first-inning plate appearance, the bat used by Babe Ruth to hit the first home run in the first game at the original Yankee Stadium on 4/18/1923 was placed across the plate in a symbolic nod to the original Stadium.
- ▶ Played in his 2,000th career game and hit a solo-HR, in 4/22 win vs. Oakland...struck out in his 8,103rd career at-bat in 4/27 loss at Detroit, surpassing Mickey Mantle for sole possession of first place on the Yankees' all-time at-bats list.
- ▶ Committed his first error of the year in 5/2 loss vs. Los Angeles-AL (sixth-inning throwing error)...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, his 23-game errorless stretch was his longest to start a season of his career.
- ▶ Scored the 1,500th run of his career in the fourth inning of 6/2 win vs. Texas...became the fourth Yankee (also Babe Ruth, Lou Gehrig and Mickey Mantle) to reach the 1,500R plateau...reached the milestone in his 2,035th career game...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, only Rickey Henderson (1,891), Alex Rodriguez (1,903), Mickey Mantle (1,949) and Willie Mays (2,009) did so in fewer games than Jeter in the expansion era (since 1961).
- ▶ Batted at a .358 (122-for-341) clip from 7/1 through the end of the season, leading the Majors in hits and batting average over the stretch.
- ▶ His third-inning RBI double on 8/16 at Seattle was his 2,674th career hit as a shortstop (also has 13 hits as a DH), surpassing Luis Aparicio (2,673) for the most hits in Major League history from the shortstop position (credit: *Elias*).
- ▶ Was 2-for-3 with 1 double and 2BB in 8/25 loss vs. Texas...his first-inning walk snapped a career-long 113 plate appearance stretch (7/28-8/23) without a base-on-balls (previous long was 68 PA in 2000).
- ▶ Stole his 300th career base in the first inning on 9/9, making him one of two players to steal 300 bases with the Yankees (also Rickey Henderson-326).
- ▶ Batted .344 (22-for-64) with 14R, 5 doubles, 3HR and 6RBI in 15 postseason games, leading the team in hits (22)...reached base safely in all 15 contests, trailing only Barry Bonds (17 straight in 2002) and Gary Sheffield (16 straight in 1997) for the longest streak of reaching base in a single postseason...reached base four times in ALDS Game 1 win (single, HR, 2BB)...collected his third career postseason leadoff HR in the ALCS Game 3 loss at Los Angeles-AL, the first leadoff HR by a Yankee in ALCS history...batted .407 (11-for-27) in the World Series, hitting safely in all six games and marking his most hits in any postseason series...became the oldest starting shortstop on a World Series-winning team since Pee Wee Reese in 1955...donated his bat from Game 6 of the World Series to the Baseball Hall of Fame.

## 2008

- ▶ Hit .300 (179-for-596) with 88R, 25 doubles, 3 triples, 11HR and 69RBI in 150 games with the Yankees (147 starts at SS, two starts at DH).
- ▶ Struck out 85 times, the fewest for any full season in his Major League career (previous low was 88K in 2003).
- ▶ Committed 12 errors, marking his fewest miscues since 1998 (nine) while his .979 fielding percentage was his highest since 2005 (also .979)...was the second-fewest errors among AL shortstops with at least 100 games played at the position, trailing only Texas' Michael Young (10)...went 31 consecutive games without an error from 7/8-8/15.
- ▶ Was selected to his ninth All-Star Game...finished second in the AL with 3,737,437 votes (behind teammate Alex Rodriguez)...was 1-for-3 (first-inning infield single) with 1SB in the All-Star Game on 7/15 at Yankee Stadium...following the season, was named to the 2008 *Sporting News* AL All-Star team, which was selected by a panel of 41 general managers and assistant general managers from both leagues...also earned his third consecutive Silver Slugger Award.
- ▶ Was 1-for-4 in 4/1 Opening Day win vs. Toronto...was his 12th Opening Day start at SS for the Yankees, surpassing Phil Rizzuto (11) for the most Opening Day starts by a Yankees shortstop in franchise history...started his fifth straight Opening Day at shortstop with Alex Rodriguez at third base, becoming the first pair of Yankees to start on the left side of the infield in five consecutive years since Graig Nettles and Bucky Dent started six consecutive season openers from 1977-82.

- ▶ Missed six games from 4/8-13 with a strained left quadriceps...was the longest stretch of consecutive DNP's in his career, not counting times he's been on the D.L. (credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*)...upon returning, hit in seven straight games from 4/14-20, going 12-for-31 (.387) with 4R, 2 doubles, 1 triple, 10RBI and 2BB...did not score a run in nine straight games from 4/18-27, the longest such stretch of his career (credit: *Elias*).
- ▶ Hit his first home run of the season and was 2-for-5 with 2R in 5/10 win at Detroit, snapping a 128AB homerless stretch, the longest streak to begin a season of his career (credit: *Elias*).
- ▶ Recorded his first stolen base of the season in his 38th game played (5/18 loss vs. the Mets)...his 37-game streak without a steal was his longest in a single season since going 49 straight games without a steal from 6/4-7/26/96 (credit: *Elias*)...was just his second stolen base attempt of 2008 (also 4/1 vs. Toronto)...the streak of 36 games without a steal attempt was the longest of his career (previous high was 30 games in 1996).
- ▶ Went hitless in five straight games (0-for-18), his longest such streak since going hitless in seven straight from 4/21-28/04...was picked off second base in the top of the sixth inning by Dennis Sarfate in 5/27 loss at Baltimore...according to *Elias*, it was the first time he had been picked off any base since 9/2/98.
- ▶ Turned 34 years old on 6/26...his 2,438 career hits were the most by a Yankee before turning 34 years old (17 more than Lou Gehrig when he turned 34)...was the most among all active players prior to their 34th birthday...in AL history, only Ty Cobb and Robin Yount accumulated more hits than Jeter before turning 34.
- ▶ In 7/12 win at Toronto, hit his 19th career leadoff homer and first since 9/27/05 at Baltimore...was also his 200th home run as a Yankee...the *Elias Sports Bureau* notes that with Jason Giambi (8/9) and Alex Rodriguez (8/12) also hitting their 200th Yankees homers in 2008, they became the first teammates on any club to reach the 200HR plateau together in the same season.
- ▶ Became the 88th player all time—and the sixth active Major Leaguer—to reach the 2,500-hit plateau with his first-inning single in 8/22 win vs. Baltimore...also became the third player in Yankees franchise history to tally 2,500 hits with the club, joining Lou Gehrig (2,721) and Babe Ruth (2,518)...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, only two players in the last 65 years were younger than Jeter (34 years, 57 days) at the time of their 2,500th hit (Hank Aaron in 1967 and Robin Yount in 1989).
- ▶ In 9/7 loss at Seattle, hit solo-HR to mark his 1,000th career RBI...had a third-inning single to tie Babe Ruth (2,518) for second place on the all-time Yankees hit list...collected his 2,519th career hit with a first-inning single off the Angels' Ervin Santana on 9/9 at Los Angeles, surpassing Ruth...marked the first time since 6/22/33 that someone other than Ruth or Gehrig occupied first or second place on the Yankees' all-time hits list (credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*).




### **DEREK JETER'S FAREWELL SPEECH FOLLOWING FINAL GAME AT THE ORIGINAL YANKEE STADIUM (9/21/08)**

"For all of us up here, it's a huge honor to put this uniform on every day and come out here and play. Every member of this organization, past and present, has been calling this place home for 85 years. There's a lot of tradition, a lot of history, and a lot of memories. Now, the great thing about memories, is you're able to pass [them] along from generation to generation. And although things are going to change next year – we're going to move across the street – there are a few things with the New York Yankees that never change. That's pride, it's tradition, and most of all, we have the greatest fans in the world.

"We're relying on you to take the memories from this Stadium, add them to the new memories that come at the new Yankee Stadium and continue to pass them on from generation to generation. So, on behalf of the entire organization, we just want to take this moment to salute you, the greatest fans in the world."

- ▶ Went 6-for-7 in 9/13 doubleheader vs. Tampa Bay, going 3-for-4 in Game 1 loss and 3-for-3 in Game 2 win...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, became the first Yankee to record 3H in each game of a doubleheader in remodeled Yankee Stadium (since 1976) and only the sixth Yankee over the last 40 years to accomplish the feat at any park (Johnny Damon in 2006, Willie Randolph in 1987, Dave Winfield in 1983, Matty Alou in 1973 and Roy White in 1972)...also recorded 3H in the series finale on 9/14, finishing the series 9-for-11 and reaching base in 11 of his 13 plate appearances (1BB, 1HBP)...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, became the fifth player (and second Yankee) to record at least three hits in every game of a series of three games or more at Yankee Stadium joining Boston's Edgar Renteria (2005), the Yankees' Ken Griffey Sr. (1982), Oakland's Reggie Jackson (1973), and Boston's Dom DiMaggio (1949).
- ▶ Tied Lou Gehrig's all-time record of 1,269 career hits at the original Yankee Stadium in 9/14 win vs. Tampa Bay with a fifth-inning solo-HR off David Price, going 3-for-4...in 9/15 win vs. Chicago-AL, tied Gehrig (8,001) for second place on the Yankees' all-time at-bats list (according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, Gehrig had held sole possession of first place on the franchise's all-time list since 9/6/37).
- ▶ With a first-inning single off Gavin Floyd in 9/16 loss vs. Chicago-AL, passed Lou Gehrig (1,269) in all-time hits at the original Yankee Stadium...in the same at-bat, gained sole possession of second place on the Yankees' all-time at-bats list, passing Gehrig (8,001AB)...following the game, his spikes were sent to the National Baseball Hall of Fame.
- ▶ Was 0-for-5 in the final game at the original Yankee Stadium on 9/21 vs. Baltimore, making the last Yankees out on a groundout (third base to first base)...gave a speech to the Stadium crowd following the game...the bat he used during the final home stand was sent to the National Baseball Hall of Fame...his final game speech was voted by fans as the MLB.com "Moment of the Year."
- ▶ Was scratched from the lineup prior to 9/23 win at Toronto (sore left hand)...entered the game at SS in the ninth...originally suffered the injury on 9/20 vs. Baltimore when he was hit by a Jim Miller pitch in his final at-bat of the game...left 9/26 win at Boston in the third inning with a sore wrist...missed final two games of the season.

## 2007

- ▶ Hit .322 (206-for-639) with 102R, 39 doubles, 12HR, 73RBI and 155B in 156 games (153 starts at SS)...ranked third in the American League with 206 hits, tied for fourth with 61 multi-hit games and 639 at-bats, ranked seventh with 14HBP, eighth with a .334 home average, tied for eighth with a .354 average with RISP and ninth with a .322 batting average...batted .418 (28-for-67) with runners in scoring position and two outs, the third-highest average in the Majors...was elected to the AL All-Star team, the eighth All-Star selection of his career (1998-2002; '04, '06-'07)...started at shortstop and was 1-for-3 in the AL's 5-4 win on 7/10 at AT&T Park in San Francisco...also earned a Silver Slugger Award, his second straight.
- ▶ Recorded his sixth 200-hit season...also recorded his 11th career season with 100-or-more runs scored (1996-2002; 2004-'07), tying Babe Ruth for second-most such seasons behind only Lou Gehrig (13) in franchise history.
- ▶ Fashioned 17-game, 19-game and 20-game hit streaks in the first 72 games of the season...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, became the first player since 1950 to record three separate hitting streaks of at least 17 games in the same season and the only player to record three hitting streaks of at least 15 games in his team's first 70 games of a season...collected four separate hitting streaks of at least 15 games in 2007, becoming the first Major Leaguer since 1941 to accomplish the feat (credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*).
- ▶ Was 1-for-4 with 2RBI and 1HP in 4/2 Opening Day win vs. Tampa Bay...was his 11th Opening Day start at SS with the Yankees, tying Phil Rizzuto's franchise record for most starts by a Yankee at SS on Opening Day.
- ▶ Hit safely in 20 straight games from 4/8-5/3 and 23 of his 24 games played with an official at-bat to begin the season...during the 20-game streak, hit .364 (32-for-88) with 17R...including the final 37 games of 2006, hit safely in 59 of 61 regular season games (since 8/20/06)...also reached base safely in each of his 25 games played

to begin 2007 and 66-of-67 games dating back to the previous season (since 8/17/06)...became only the third player in Yankees history to have at least two separate single-season hitting streaks of 20 or more games (also 25 games, 8/20-9/16/06)...Joe DiMaggio had four of them (streaks of 21 and 22 in 1937, 23 in 1940 and 56 in 1941); Don Mattingly had a pair (20 games in 1985 and 24 in 1986).

- ▶ Hit safely in 25 consecutive Interleague games from 6/25/06-6/23/07, batting .396 (40-for-101) with 18R, 11 doubles, 2HR, 11RBI, 13BB and 4SB...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, was the second-longest hit streak in the history of Interleague play (Matt Lawton hit in 37 straight Interleague games from 6/5/99-7/12/01).
- ▶ Reached his 33rd birthday on 6/26 with 2,250 career hits, the most since Robin Yount had 2,391 at that juncture of his career (credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*)...was 83 more hits than Pete Rose (2,167)—Baseball's all-time hits leader—had at the time of his 33rd birthday.
- ▶ Hit safely in the final 15 games of the regular season, batting .386 (27-for-70), 13R, 7 doubles, 1 triple, 3HR and 11RBI during the streak...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, it was the longest hitting streak by a Yankee to close out a season since Bobby Murcer in 1971 (also 15 games).
- ▶ Batted .176 (3-for-17) with 1RBI in four Division Series games vs. Cleveland.

## 2006

- ▶ Finished second in American League Most Valuable Player voting while earning his first Silver Slugger Award and third consecutive Gold Glove Award...hit .343 (214-for-623) with 118R, 39 doubles, 14HR, 97RBI and a career-high 34SB in 154 games (149 starts at SS, five starts at DH)...became just the third player to reach those totals in average, runs, home runs, RBI and stolen bases in a single season, joining Kiki Cuyler with Pittsburgh in 1925 and George Sisler with St. Louis in 1920...received the Hank Aaron Award, recognizing the most outstanding offensive performer.
- ▶ Ranked second in the AL in batting average, runs, average with runners in scoring position (.381) and average vs. left-handed pitchers (.390), ranked third with a .354 home batting average, tied for third with 214H, fourth with a .417 on-base percentage, tied for fifth with 12HBP, seventh with 34SB and ninth with 623AB.
- ▶ According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, became only the fifth player since 1932 to hit .340-or-higher, drive in at least 90 runs and steal 30-or-more bases in the same season, joining Larry Walker (1997), Ellis Burks (1996), Willie Mays (1958) and Jackie Robinson (1949)...was elected to the 2006 AL All-Star team, the seventh All-Star selection of his career...started at SS and was 0-for-3 in the AL's 3-2 win on 7/11 at Pittsburgh's PNC Park.
- ▶ In 4/3 win at Oakland, made his 10th Opening Day start at SS for the Yankees...batted a career-best .398 (35-for-88) in April, hitting safely in 20 of the 23 games played.
- ▶ Became the eighth Yankee to reach the 2,000-hit plateau with a fourth-inning infield single in 5/26 loss vs. Kansas City, joining Lou Gehrig (2,721), Babe Ruth (2,518), Mickey Mantle (2,415), Bernie Williams (2,336), Joe DiMaggio (2,214), Don Mattingly (2,153) and Yogi Berra (2,148)...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, only one of the seven other Yankees with 2,000 hits reached the milestone in fewer games than Jeter's 1,571 (DiMaggio in 1,537 games)...in the expansion era (since 1961), only four players reached the 2,000-hit mark in fewer games than Jeter (also according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*): Wade Boggs (in 1,515 games), Kirby Puckett (1,542), Tony Gwynn (1,560) and Rod Carew (1,562).
- ▶ Missed three games (5/30-6/1) with a sprained right hand...was removed from 5/29 win at Detroit in the fifth inning after suffering the injury in a slide at second base in the third inning...on 6/2 at Baltimore, batted third for first time since 9/28/03 (vs. Baltimore)...left 6/4 loss at Baltimore with a bruised right thumb after being hit by a Rodrigo Lopez pitch in the top of the sixth inning and missed next three games (6/5-7 vs. Boston)...started following three games at DH (6/9-11).

- ▶ Hit .412 (42-for-102) in the month of July, the third time in his career that he has batted .400 or better for a calendar month.
- ▶ Was successful in 14 consecutive stolen-base attempts from 6/13-8/4, including nine straight successful steals of third base...played in the 1,648th game of his career at shortstop on 9/4 at Kansas City, surpassing Phil Rizzuto (1,647) for the most games played at shortstop in franchise history.
- ▶ Hit in a career-high 25 straight games from 8/20-9/16, batting .377 (40-for-106) with 21R, 3HR and 21RBI during the streak...was the longest hitting streak by a Yankee since Joe Gordon hit in 29 straight games in 1942...also reached base safely in 30 consecutive games, the longest such streak by a Yankee in 2006...was 3-for-3 with 3R, 1BB and 1SB in 9/30 loss vs. Toronto...recorded his 2,149th career hit, surpassing Yogi Berra (2,148) for seventh place on the club's all-time list.
- ▶ Hit safely in 36 of the last 37 games to end the season, batting .368 (57-for-155) with 33R, 4HR and 22RBI during the stretch...reached base safely in 41 of his final 42 games.
- ▶ Batted .500 (8-for-16) in four Division Series games vs. Detroit, leading the team with 4R and 4 doubles...tied the Major League record for hits in a single postseason game with five in Game 1 of the ALDS (sixth time, including Hideki Matsui in Game 3 of the 2004 ALCS at Boston), but became only the second player to go 5-for-5 (Atlanta's Marquis Grissom went 5-for-5 in Game 4 of the 1995 NLDS vs. Colorado).

## 2005

- ▶ Hit .309 (202-for-654) with 122R, 19HR, 70RBI and 14SB in 159 games (158 starts at SS), while earning his second consecutive Gold Glove Award...led the American League with a .354 home batting average, ranked second with 122 runs and 62 multi-hit games, third with 202H, tied for third with 654AB, sixth with a .309 batting average and a .389 on-base percentage, and ninth with 77BB...made his ninth Opening Day start at SS on 4/3 vs. Boston.
- ▶ Played in the 1,400th game of his career on 5/10 vs. Seattle and had 1,775 career hits, the most by any player through 1,400 games since Kirby Puckett had 1,830...had a leadoff single in five straight games from 5/11-16, the longest such streak of his career...hit 13th career leadoff home run—and first since 4/29/04 vs. Oakland—in 5/29 loss vs. Boston...did not play on 6/3 or 6/4 at Minnesota (chest cold), missing his first two games of the season.
- ▶ Hit grand slam and solo-HR and was 2-for-5 in 6/18 win vs. Chicago-NL...was his first career grand slam in his 136th career at-bat with the bases loaded...had 156 career home runs before the grand slam, the most home runs by any active player without a grand slam as well as the most by any player in Yankee history...was his first multi-home run game of the season and the seventh of his career (last hit 2HR in a game on 6/27/04 vs. Mets)...the 5RBI tied his career-high (third time)...was 5-for-6 with 5R, 1 double and a solo-HR in 6/21 win vs. Tampa Bay...established a career high with his five runs and tied a career high with 5H (second time, also on 5/23/01 vs. Boston).
- ▶ Hit game-winning solo home runs in consecutive games on 8/11 and 8/12 vs. Texas...made second career start at DH in 8/15 win at Tampa Bay (also 7/7/02 vs. Detroit) and was 1-for-5 with 1R...did not play in 8/22 win vs. Toronto (jammed right thumb)...in the month of August, was tied for the AL lead with 40 hits.
- ▶ Played in the 1,500th game of his career on 9/6 vs. Tampa Bay...over that span, amassed 1,906H and 1,140R...marked the most hits and runs by a Major Leaguer in his first 1,500 games since Joe DiMaggio (1,965H and 1,211R).
- ▶ Drove in at least one run in six straight games from 9/23-28, the longest streak in the Majors in 2005 from the leadoff position in the batting order...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, no player had a longer streak from that spot in the order since Matt Lawton had an eight-game RBI streak for Cleveland in 2002...hit leadoff HR in 9/27 loss at Baltimore, his fifth leadoff HR of the season (also 9/23 vs. Toronto, 9/4 at Oakland, 6/24 vs. NY Mets and 5/29 vs. Boston) and 17th of his career.
- ▶ Batted .333 (7-for-21) with 2HR and 5RBI in four Division Series games vs. the Angels...reached base safely in a Division Series-record 21 straight games (dating back to Game 4 of the 2000 ALDS vs. Oakland) before going 0-for-5 in Game 2.

## 2004

- ▶ Emerged from an early-season slump to hit .292 (188-for-643) with a career-high 44 doubles, 23HR, 78RBI and 235B in 154 games (154 starts at SS)...committed only 13 errors and earned his first career Gold Glove...ranked second in the American League with 16 sacrifice hits, tied for fourth with 44 doubles and 14HBP, was sixth with 111R and 235B, seventh with 188H and tied for eighth with 68 extra-base hits...was elected to the 2004 American League All-Star team, the sixth All-Star selection of his career...was the first Yankees' shortstop to be elected to start the All-Star Game since Bucky Dent in 1981...started at SS in the 7/13 AL win, going 3-for-3 with 1R.
- ▶ Was batting .189 on 5/25, going 36-for-190 in his first 43 games of the season with 17R, 8 doubles, 3HR and 17RBI...in his final 111 games, beginning on 5/26, hit .336 (152-for-453) with 94R, 36 doubles, 20HR and 61RBI.
- ▶ Made his eighth Opening Day start at SS on 3/30 at Tampa Bay in Tokyo, Japan...hit 12th lead-off home run of his career in 4/29 win vs. Oakland—and first since 8/5/03 vs. Texas—to snap an 0-for-32 stretch (longest such stretch of his career)...recorded three straight three-hit games from 5/26-28, marking the second time in his career (also in June 2000)...drove in at least one run in nine straight games from 5/23-6/2...was the longest RBI streak by a Yankee since Don Mattingly drove in at least one run in nine straight games in 1987...missed three games (6/5-8) with tightness in the left groin.

- ▶ Had his 21-game hitting streak at Camden Yards snapped on 6/23, going 0-for-4 (batted .351, 34-for-97, during that span which began on 4/4/02)...hit .396 in 23 games in June (36-for-91) with 24R, 9HR and 17RBI...set a calendar-month career high with 9HR and his .396 average was his highest monthly average since he hit .425 in July 2003.
- ▶ Was 1-for-4 with 1HBP in 7/1 win vs. Boston before being removed from the game in the bottom of the 12th inning after suffering a laceration of the chin, a bruised right cheek and a bruised right shoulder...suffered the injuries after catching a fly ball by Trot Nixon and diving into the stands to end the top of the 12th...was taken to Columbia Presbyterian where precautionary X-rays of his right cheek were negative...started at SS the following night...did not play in two straight games from 7/21-22 because of a small, non-displaced fracture of the fifth metacarpal of his right hand...sustained injury after being hit by a pitch in the sixth inning of 7/20 win at Tampa Bay.
- ▶ Before fifth-inning throwing error in 8/8 win vs. Toronto, had gone a career-high 46 consecutive games without committing an error.
- ▶ Had 17-game hitting streak from 7/30-8/17, batting .338 (25-for-74) with 12R, 1HR and 5RBI over the span...was also the longest hitting streak by a Yankee since Bernie Williams hit safely in 19 straight games from 8/7-28/02...reached the 1,000-run plateau with a solo-HR on 8/24 at Cleveland in his 1,331st game, becoming only the fifth player in the expansion era (since 1961) to accomplish the feat in fewer than 1,400 games...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, he joined Rickey Henderson (1,252 games), Alex Rodriguez (1,261), Kenny Lofton (1,305) and Chuck Knoblauch (1,379).
- ▶ Scored at least one run in 11 straight games from 9/5-15, the longest such streak of his career...it is the longest such streak by a Yankee since Bernie Williams scored in a career-high 13 straight games in 2000...was named the AL's "Player of the Week" for the week of 9/6-12...was the second weekly award of his career (also 8/5/01)...batted in the leadoff position in the batting order in his final 25 games of the season, hitting .388 (40-for-103) with 28R, 11 doubles, 5HR and 18RBI.
- ▶ In 11 postseason games, batted .245 (12-for-49) with 1HR and 9RBI...hit solo-HR to lead off the bottom of the first inning of ALDS Game 2 vs. Minnesota and became the 19th player to homer into the black batters-eye section of the remodeled Yankee Stadium, the third in postseason play (also Reggie Jackson in Game 6 of the 1977 World Series and Seattle's Jay Buhner in Game 3 of the 2001 ALCS)...was his second career leadoff home run in postseason play (also 10/25/00 in Game 4 of the World Series at the New York Mets).

## 2003

- ▶ Rebounded from an early-season injury to hit .324 (156-for-482) with 10HR, 52RBI and 11SB in 119 games (118 starts at SS)...ranked third in the AL in average and 10th in the league with a .393 on-base percentage...was placed on the 15-day disabled list on 4/1 after suffering a dislocated left shoulder in third inning of 3/31 Opening Day win at Toronto...was reinstated from the 15-day D.L. on 5/13 after missing 36 games...hit leadoff-HR in 5/27 win vs. Boston, the 10th leadoff HR of his career and first since 6/1/01 vs. Seattle...was named the 11th team captain in Yankees history by Principal Owner George Steinbrenner on 6/3.
- ▶ Was 37-for-87 (.425) in the month of July (with 17R, 8 doubles, 1HR, 12RBI, and 12BB), the second-highest batting average in the Majors during the month behind only the White Sox' Magglio Ordonez...left 7/7 win vs. Boston in third inning after being hit by pitch on right hand in the first inning...did not start the next day at Cleveland after suffering a bone bruise on his right hand...recorded a season-high four hits in 7/9 win at Cleveland, going 4-for-5 with 1R and a two-run double.
- ▶ Hit leadoff HR and two-run HR and was 2-for-4 on 8/5 vs. Texas...was his second leadoff-HR of the season and 11th of his career...was his first multi-HR game of the season and fourth of his career (last on 9/19/01 at Chicago-AL)...recorded his 1,500th career hit with a third-inning single and was 1-for-6 in 8/16 win at Baltimore...missed five games (9/1-6) after suffering strained rib-cage muscle in 8/31 win at Boston.
- ▶ Hit .314 (22-for-70) with 10R, 2HR and 5RBI in 17 postseason games.

## 2002

- ▶ Batted .297 (191-for-644) with 18HR, 75RBI and 32SB in 157 games (156 starts at SS, one at DH)...ranked third in the American League with 124R and 32SB, fifth in multi-hit games (58), and seventh in hits (191)...became only the fourth player since 1900 to score at least 100 runs in each of seven straight seasons starting with his rookie year...Earle Combs (1925-32) and Ted Williams (1939-49) both did it in each of their first eight seasons; Johnny Pesky did it in each of his first six (1942-50)...with Bernie Williams, were only the second set of teammates to score at least 100 runs in seven consecutive seasons (1996-2002), joining the Yankees' Earle Combs, Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig (1926-32)...was selected by Manager Joe Torre to participate in his fifth consecutive All-Star Game on 7/9 at Miller Park in Milwaukee...pinch-hit and was 0-for-1.
- ▶ In Opening Day loss at Baltimore, hit his 100th career home run with two-run HR in the eighth inning...collected his 500th career RBI with a first-inning double in 4/19 win vs. Toronto...had season-high and team-high 16-game hitting streak from 5/9-25, batting .348 (24-for-69) with 3HR and 6RBI over the stretch.

- ▶ Hit leadoff home run in the first inning and was 1-for-2 with 2R, 2RBI, 1BB, 1SF and 1HBP in 6/1 win vs. Boston...was his ninth career leadoff home run...played in his 1,000th career game and hit a solo-HR in 6/10 win vs. Arizona...was 2-for-4 with 1R, 1RBI, 1BB and a career-high 3SB in 6/28 win at New York-NL...left 7/4 game vs. Cleveland in the top of the third inning after being slid into at second base by John McDonald...missed the following two games with a sprained knee and bruised lower leg...made his first career start at DH in 7/7 win vs. Toronto and hit two-run HR while going 1-for-4 with 2R and 1BB.
- ▶ Recorded season-high four hits in 8/14 win at Kansas City, going 4-for-7...hit in the final five games of the season, going 9-for-21 to raise his average from .292 to .297.
- ▶ Hit .500 (8-for-16) with 6R, 2HR and 3RBI in four Division Series games versus the Angels...collected his 100th career postseason hit in Game 4 at Anaheim on 10/5 (first-inning single off Jarrod Washburn).

## 2001

- ▶ Batted .311 (191-for-614) with 110R, 21HR and 74RBI in 150 games (150 starts at SS)...hit .324 (34-for-105) with 17R, 5HR and 11RBI in 26 games as a leadoff hitter and had nine first-inning hits (seven for extra bases) in 24AB...appeared in only five spring training games, going 3-for-15 with 1RBI...missed first nine games of spring training with inflammation in his right shoulder and final 14 games with a strained right quadriceps...was placed on the 15-day D.L. (retroactive to 3/23) with strained right quad to begin the season...snapped a stretch of five straight Opening Day starts at SS.
- ▶ Was activated from the 15-day D.L. prior to 4/7 game and made first appearance of the season that day vs. Toronto, going 1-for-5...his steal of home in the third inning of 5/5 win at Baltimore was the first by a Yankee since he did it on 6/18/99 at the Angels...established a career high with 5H, hit a solo-HR and was 5-for-5 with 3R and 1 double in 5/23 win vs. Boston...became first Yankee SS to have a five-hit game since Tony Kubek in 1962.
- ▶ Was selected to his fourth consecutive All-Star Game, hitting his first All-Star home run (solo shot in the sixth) in the AL's 4-1 win on 7/10 in Seattle...was the first homer by a Yankee in an All-Star Game since Yogi Berra in 1959...led the AL with 40 hits in July...was named AL "Player of the Week" for 7/30-8/5, batting .524 (11-for-21) in six games with 2HR and 5RBI (his first such award)...hit leadoff HR and was 4-for-5 with 2R and 1RBI in 8/11 loss at Oakland...was his fifth career leadoff HR and first since 8/20/97 at Anaheim...in his next start as leadoff hitter in 8/18 loss vs. Seattle, hit his second straight leadoff home run and fourth in a six-start stretch from the leadoff spot.
- ▶ His seventh-inning throwing error on 8/22 at Texas snapped his 36-game errorless streak...collected 43 hits in August (third-most in AL), marking the eighth time in his career he reached the 40-hit plateau in one month...among active players, only Tony Gwynn had more 40-hit months (19) at that time...missed four games (9/5-9) with a strained left hamstring sustained while running to first base in the second inning on 9/4 at Toronto...in 9/19 win at Chicago-AL, recorded the third multi-HR game of his career and first since 9/9/98 at Boston...in his last 82 games of the season (since 6/24), batted .334 (111-for-332) with 68R, 16HR and 39RBI.
- ▶ Batted .226 (14-for-62) in 17 postseason games...in five Division Series games vs. Oakland, batted .444 (8-for-18)...made famous "flip play" on 10/13/01 in Game 3 at Oakland, relaying Shane Spencer's errant throw to Jorge Posada in time to nail Jeremy Giambi at the plate in the seventh inning...was 2-for-3 in Game 5 of the ALDS and established a Major League record for most career postseason hits with 87 (in 66 games), surpassing Pete Rose's 86 hits (in 67 games)...had his 12-game postseason hitting streak snapped in Game 3 of the ALDS...had his 14-game World Series hitting streak snapped in Game 1 of the World Series...his streak tied Roberto Clemente for the third-longest streak of all time (behind only Hank Bauer, Yankees, 17 straight games, 1956-58; and Marquis Grissom, Atlanta-Cleveland, 15, 1995-97).

## 2000

- ▶ Was a member of his fourth World Series championship team, becoming the first player in Major League history to be named MVP of the Fall Classic and All-Star Game in the same season...the only other player to win both awards in his career is Frank Robinson, World Series MVP in 1966 and All-Star MVP in 1971...at 26 years old, only Joe DiMaggio and Mickey Mantle (at 24) and Billy Martin (25) earned four World Championships at a younger age...hit .339 with 15HR and 73RBI in 148 games (148 starts at SS).
- ▶ Recorded his third straight 200-hit season, becoming only the third Yankee to compile three consecutive 200-hit seasons (joining Lou Gehrig, 1927-29 and Don Mattingly, 1984-86)...joined Bernie Williams in reaching the 100-run plateau for the fifth straight season...was only the third time since 1900 that teammates have each scored 100 or more runs in at least five consecutive seasons...the Yankees' Babe Ruth, Lou Gehrig and Earle Combs accomplished the feat in seven consecutive seasons (1926-32) and Cincinnati's Joe Morgan and Pete Rose broke the 100-run plateau in five straight seasons (1972-76).
- ▶ Reached his 26th birthday on 6/26 with 887 career hits...only two Yankees had more hits at age 26 (Mickey Mantle, 1,080 and Joe DiMaggio, 970)...only three active players at the time had more hits before turning 26 (Roberto Alomar, 1054; Ken Griffey, Jr., 1039 and Ivan Rodriguez, 948)...was selected to his third All-Star Game by Manager Joe Torre...went 3-for-3 with 1R and 2RBI in his first start and was named Most Valuable Player of the 71st All-Star Game in Atlanta...became the first player in Yankees history to be named MVP of the All-Star Game and the fourth shortstop to take home the honor.

- ▶ Made fifth straight Opening Day start at SS...reached base safely in 26 of the first 28 games of the season (4/3-5/6)–including 23 straight from 4/7-5/3...scored his 500th career run on 4/23 at Toronto, becoming only the fourth Yankee to reach the 500-run plateau before his 26th birthday (joining Gehrig, DiMaggio and Mantle)...was hitless in four straight games (5/7-9, 5/11) for the first time since 4/26-29/97...left game in third inning on 5/11 vs. Tampa Bay and missed five games (5/12-17) with an abdominal strain...was placed on the 15-day disabled list from 5/19-27.
- ▶ Compiled a streak of 10 consecutive games with at least one walk from 8/14-23, (14BB total)...was the longest such streak by a Yankee since Jesse Barfield also walked in 10 straight games from 8/9-19/90...reached the 1,000-hit plateau with a fifth-inning single and was 3-for-4 on 9/25 vs. Detroit...at 26, became the second-youngest Yankee to reach 1,000 hits (behind only Mickey Mantle, who was 25 when he collected his 1,000th hit in 1957).
- ▶ Hit .317 (20-for-63) and led the Yankees with 13R and 4HR in the postseason...had his 17-game postseason hitting streak snapped in Game 1 of the Division Series at Oakland, going 0-for-3...was the World Series MVP, hitting .409 (9-for-22) with two doubles, one triple, 2HR and 2RBI in five games...set a five-game World Series record with 19 total bases and tied five-game records with 9H and 6R...also became the eighth player to lead off a World Series game with a home run in Game 4.
- ▶ Became the third shortstop to ever win the World Series MVP Award, joining the Yankees' Bucky Dent in 1978 and Detroit's Alan Trammell in 1984...hit safely in all five World Series games, extending his hitting streak in the Series to 14 games.

## 1999

- ▶ Won his third World Championship in his first four full seasons...only two other Yankee players (Mickey Mantle, 21 years old and Joe DiMaggio, 23 years old) won three championships at a younger age than Jeter (25)...hit .349 with 37 doubles, 24HR and 102RBI in 158 games (all at SS)...set career highs in nearly every offensive category, including batting average, runs (134), hits (219), triples (9), home runs, RBI, and walks (91)...was named to his second All-Star team by Yankees manager Joe Torre (was 0-for-1).
- ▶ Was among the AL leaders in multi-hit games (first-67), hits (first), batting average (second), runs (second), triples (tied for second), on-base percentage (third-.438) and total bases (tied for fourth-346)...his 102RBI were the second-most ever by a Yankees shortstop in a single season behind only Lyn Lary's 107 in 1931...led the Yankees in hits for the fourth straight season and became the first player since Ernie Banks (1954-57) to lead his team in hits in each of his first four full seasons...his 219 hits were the fourth-highest single-season total by a Yankee and most since 1986 (Don Mattingly, 238)...joined centerfielder Bernie Williams as the first pair of Yankee teammates to record 200 or more hits in the same season since DiMaggio and Lou Gehrig accomplished the feat in 1939...became the first player to score at least 100 runs in four straight seasons starting with his rookie year since Jim Gilliam did it for the Brooklyn Dodgers from 1953-56.
- ▶ Reached base safely in each of the first 53 games of the season, the longest streak in the Majors in 1999 and the longest by a Yankee in the post-expansion era (since 1961)...the streak ended in a 7-2 loss on 6/6 vs. New York-NL...had six hitting streaks of at least 10 games, including a season-high 16-game streak from 5/4-22.
- ▶ Tied his career high with 5RBI in a 10-1 win on 5/7 vs. Seattle...posted seven consecutive multi-hit games from 6/7-14, the most by a Yankee since Dave Winfield in 1988...batted third for the first time in his career on 6/18 vs. Anaheim and went 2-for-3 with 2R, 1RBI and 1HBP...also stole home on the front end of a double steal with Chili Davis...hit in the third position from 6/18-7/1, batting .395 (17-for-43) and hitting safely in each of the 11 games...batted fourth for the first time ever on 7/10 at New York-NL...was 0-for-4 with 11BB.
- ▶ Snapped an 0-for-17 skid with the game-winning two-run home run off David Wells in the eighth inning of a 3-1 victory on 8/2 vs. Toronto...the home run was his 20th of the season, making him the first Yankees shortstop ever to hit 20HR in a season.
- ▶ Hit .375 (18-for-48) and led the Yankees with 10R in the postseason...hit safely in all 12 games and 17 consecutive postseason games dating back to 1998, tying Hank Bauer for the all-time record.

## 1998

- ▶ Batted .324 with 19HR and 84RBI in 149 games (148 starts at SS)...finished third in the American League MVP voting behind Juan Gonzalez and Nomar Garciaparra...was among the American League leaders in runs (first-127), multi-hit games (tied for second), hits (third-203), triples (tied for fourth-8), batting average (fifth) and at-bats (sixth-626)...broke the single-season home run record for Yankees shortstops (previously held by Roy Smalley in 1982 with 16)...with 203 hits, joined Phil Rizzuto as the second Yankees shortstop to collect 200 or more hits in a season (Rizzuto had 200 in 1950).
- ▶ Set a Major League record for most runs scored by a shortstop in his first three full seasons with 352, surpassing the previous mark of 343 held by Detroit's Donie Bush from 1908-11...joined Frank Crosetti as the only Yankees shortstops to score 100 or more runs in three or more consecutive seasons (Crosetti did it in four straight seasons from 1936-39)...combined with 2B Chuck Knoblauch to become the first pair of Yankees middle infielders to each hit 15 or more home runs in the same season (Knoblauch had 17)...they also became the third pair of middle-infield teammates in AL history to record at least 30 stolen bases each in a single season (also SS Jack Barry and 2B Eddie Collins of the 1911 Philadelphia Athletics and SS Bert Campaneris and 2B Phil Garner of the 1976 Oakland Athletics)...was named to his first All-Star team by Cleveland manager Mike Hargrove and went 0-for-1 in the game.

- ▶ Drove in a career-high five runs on 5/6 at Texas...had a season-high 15-game hitting streak from 5/2-20, batting .456 (31-for-68) with 4HR and 19RBI during the streak...was placed on the disabled list for the first time in his career on 6/4 with a strained abdominal muscle sustained on a check swing on 6/3 vs. Tampa Bay (missed 12 team games)...was named the American League's "Player of the Month" for August, batting .382 (50-for-131) with 30R, 9 doubles, 4HR and 22RBI in 32 games.
- ▶ With 50 hits in August, he became the first Yankee to collect 50 hits in a month since Joe DiMaggio had 53 in July 1941...joined Alex Rodríguez (54 hits in August 1996) as the only players to reach 50 hits in a month in the 1990s.
- ▶ Started every game of the postseason, batting .235 (12-for-51) with 7R and 3RBI...hit .353 (6-for-17) vs. San Diego in the World Series.

## 1997

- ▶ In his sophomore campaign, batted .291 with 10HR and 70RBI in 159 games (all starts at SS)...led the American League with 748 plate appearances and tied for first with 142 singles...ranked third in at-bats (654) and hits (190) and tied for fourth in games played (159)...also ranked fourth in runs scored (116), tied for fifth in triples (7) and ninth in stolen bases (23).
- ▶ Had a team-leading 57 multi-hit games, tying him for third in the American League...scored at least 100 runs in each of his first two seasons, making him only the second Yankee to accomplish the feat (Joe DiMaggio 1936-37)...became only the fifth Yankee to play 140 or more games in each of their first two seasons seasons (also Earle Combs, Tony Lazzeri, Tom Tresh and Alvaro Espinoza)...in 102 games in the leadoff spot, hit .321 (137-for-427) with 6HR and 45RBI.
- ▶ Collected a hit in a career-high seven consecutive PA from 4/6-8...snapped a career-high 75-game homerless drought with a leadoff homer on 8/7 at Texas...had his first career multi-homer game with 2HR and 4RBI on 8/20 at Anaheim (G2).
- ▶ Started all five games of the Division Series vs. Cleveland at SS, hitting .333 (7-for-21) with 2HR and 2RBI...hit the second of three consecutive home runs in the sixth inning of Game 1 (between Tim Lincecum and Paul O'Neill), marking the first time three consecutive home runs have ever been hit in postseason play.

## 1996

- ▶ Hit .314 with 10HR and 78RBI, winning the American League "Rookie of the Year" Award...was the fifth time a Yankee had won the award and the first since Thurman Munson in 1970...became the club's first Opening Day rookie shortstop since Tom Tresh in 1962...hit his first Major League home run on Opening Day on 4/2 at Cleveland, a solo shot off Dennis Martinez...led the Yankees with 183H and 156 games started (all at SS) and tied with Tino Martinez for the team lead in multi-hit games with 49.
- ▶ Played the most games of any AL rookie (157) and had a stretch of 105 consecutive starts before sitting out the second game of a doubleheader on 9/25 vs. Milwaukee...had a season-high 17-game hitting streak from 9/7-25, the longest by a Yankees rookie since Joe DiMaggio's streak of 18 games in 1936...his 77RBI were the most by a rookie shortstop since Julio Franco drove in 80 in 1980...hit an inside-the-park home run on 8/2 at Kansas City, the first by a Yankee since Alvaro Espinoza on 7/21/90 at Minnesota.
- ▶ Hit .361 with 12R, 1HR and 3RBI in the postseason...scored the game-winning run in the bottom of the 12th inning in Game 2 of the Division Series vs. Texas after 3B Dean Palmer overthrew first base on a Charlie Hayes bunt...hit controversial game-tying home run off Armando Benítez in the eighth inning of Game 1 of the ALCS when a young fan reached over the wall and deflected the ball (Yankees would win 5-4 in 11 innings).

## 1995

- ▶ Saw his first Major League action, batting .250 (12-for-48) with 4 doubles and 7RBI in 15 games across two stints with the Yankees...contract was purchased on 5/29 after Tony Fernandez was placed on the disabled list with a strained rib cage muscle...made 13 starts and batted .234 with 0HR and 6RBI before he was optioned back to Columbus on 6/11...was recalled on 9/3, appearing in two games and raising his average to .250...was named to the International League All-Star team...his .317 batting average led all Yankees minor leaguers and ranked third among Triple-A shortstops...ranked third among Triple-A players with 96R, tied for fifth with 9 triples and was seventh with 154 hits.

## 1994

- ▶ Was named Minor League "Player of the Year" by *Baseball America*, *Sporting News*, *USA Today Baseball Weekly* and *Topps/NAPBL* after hitting .344 with 5HR, 68RBI and 50SB combined at Triple-A Columbus, Double-A Albany and Single-A Tampa...became the first Yankees prospect to win the *Baseball America* and *USA Today* awards...was also named MVP of the Florida State League...his .344 average led all minor league shortstops and ranked 10th in the minors overall...also ranked among all minor leaguers with 186H (second), 103R (10th) and 50SB (tied for 14th)...was named the Yankees "Minor League Player of the Year" after leading the organization in batting average, stolen bases, runs, hits and triples...was named the organization's "Player of the Month" for May after hitting .391 and leading the organization with 31R...earned a June promotion to Albany after hitting .367 in his last 49 games at Tampa.

- ▶ Was the Florida State League's "Player of the Month" for June...had a five-hit game on 6/10 at Sarasota...hit .420 in July at Albany and was named Topps' Eastern League "Player of the Month"...was promoted to Columbus on 8/1...hit safely in 28-of-35 games with the Clippers and did not go hitless in consecutive games...finished the season with a five-game hitting streak, batting .579 (11-for-19), including a 4-for-4 performance on 8/31 vs. Toledo...Yankees affiliates combined for a .621 winning percentage (87-53) with Jeter on the roster and a .502 winning percentage without him (138-137)...committed 25 errors in 616 chances at shortstop...played for Chandler in the Arizona Fall League and hit .278 with 9RBI, 25B and 11 errors in 16 games before he was sidelined with mild inflammation in his right shoulder.

## 1993

- ▶ Was voted the "Most Outstanding Major League Prospect" by South Atlantic League managers after hitting .295 with 5HR, 71RBI and 18SB at Class-A Greensboro...was named to the All-Star team after finishing second in the league in triples (11), third in hits (152) and 11th in batting average...ranked fifth in the organization in batting average...committed 56 errors in 126 games at shortstop, ranking second in the league in errors by a shortstop...was voted by *Baseball America* as the South Atlantic League's "Best Defensive Shortstop," "Most Exciting Player" and "Best Infield Arm."

## 1992

- ▶ Was the Yankees' first-round selection and the sixth pick overall in the June 1992 First-Year Player Draft...was the first high school player chosen in the draft...became the third shortstop in Yankees history selected with a first-round pick, joining Rex Hudler (1978) and Dennis Sherrill (1974)...combined to hit .210 with 4HR and 29RBI in 58 games at Single-A Tampa and Single-A Greensboro...had 12 errors in 211 chances at Tampa and nine errors in 48 chances at Greensboro.

- ▶ Full name is Derek Sanderson Jeter...was signed by Dick Groch...graduated in 1992 from Kalamazoo Central High School (Mich.), where he hit .508 (30-for-59) with 4HR, 23RBI, 21BB and 1K in 23 games as a senior...was 12-for-12 in stolen base attempts, had an .831 slugging percentage and a .637 on-base percentage...hit .557 with 7HR as a junior...was named 1992 High School "Player of the Year" by the American Baseball Coaches Association...was elected into the Kalamazoo High School Hall of Fame in December 2007.
- ▶ Was the recipient of the Joan Payson Award for community service in 1997, presented annually by the New York chapter of the BBWAA...received the New York Press Photographers' annual "Good Guy" Award for 1998...also received the Babe Ruth Award from the New York Chapter of the BBWAA in 2000, awarded annually to the Postseason MVP...was one of three finalists for the 2008 "Marvin Miller Man of the Year" Award given annually by the MLB Players' Association to the player in either league whose on-field performance and contributions to his community inspire others to higher levels of achievement...was the recipient of the Joe DiMaggio "Toast of the Town" Award New York Chapter of the BBWAA for the third time in 2009 (also 1999 and 2000)...also honored along with teammates Andy Pettitte, Jorge Posada and Mariano Rivera with the "Willie, Mickey and the Duke" Award from the New York BBWAA in 2009.
- ▶ Selected as the 2009 "Roberto Clemente Award" winner, given annually to the Major League Baseball player who combines a dedication to giving back to the community with outstanding skills on the baseball field...hosted Saturday Night Live on 12/1/01...was honored with the *Sporting News* "Good Guy in Sports" Award in 2002 and also received an ESPY for the Best Play Award that same year for his "flip play" in Game 3 of the 2001 ALDS at Oakland.
- ▶ Named the No. 1 sports celebrity in WFAN's (660AM) Top 20 New York Athletes of the Last 20 Years in December 2007...selected as a member of *Time Out New York's* "Top 40 under 40" in 2008.
- ▶ Since 1996, his Turn 2 Foundation has enjoyed 15 years of supporting various programs and activities designed to motivate youth to "Turn 2" a healthy lifestyle, academic achievement and leadership development and "turn away" from drugs and alcohol...the Foundation has awarded more than \$10 million to support signature programs in Tampa, where Derek resides, New York, where he works, and West Michigan, where he grew up...along with his "Jeter's Leaders," hosted a leadership conference at the University of Texas at Arlington in August 2008, that brought together high school student leaders from New York, West Michigan, Louisville and Chicago...held his annual Holiday Express on 12/3/10 in New York City...treated students from the Turn 2 Us Program at P.S. 128 and P.S. 4 in Washington Heights to a private screening of "Megamind," at the Coliseum Theater, then joined children involved in the Turn 2 After School Programs for a private carnival themed holiday event at Lost Battalion Hall Recreation Center in Queens...also hosted separate holiday parties at the Air Zoo in Portage, Mich., and Tampa, Fla., later in the month....hosted the eighth Annual Derek Jeter Celebrity Golf Classic in Tampa, Fla., in January 2011...the sold-out event brought together celebrities from MLB, the NBA and the NFL as well as musicians and actors, raising nearly \$1 million...hosts annual baseball clinics in Michigan, New York City and Tampa, as well as an annual fundraising dinner in New York City.

- ▶ Hit .280 (155-for-553) with 87R, 25 doubles, 13HR and 69RBI in 155 games (138 starts at C, eight at 3B) with the Dodgers...walked more times (90) than he struck out (83)...batted in every spot in the lineup except ninth.
- ▶ Tied for the Major League lead in games caught (149), breaking Mike Piazza's Dodgers single-season franchise record (146, 1993 and '96)...ranked second in the Majors with 138 starts at catcher and 1,238.0 innings caught...posted a 3.62 catcher's ERA, the best mark in the NL and second-best in the Majors behind Toronto's Rod Barajas (3.32).





- ▶ Is one of six catchers all-time to hit at least 20HR in eight seasons, joining Mike Piazza (11), Johnny Bench (11), Yogi Berra (10), Gary Carter (9) and Carlton Fisk (8)—credit: *Elias*...is one of eight players to hit at least 250 home runs for his current team, joining Todd Helton, Ryan Howard, Chipper Jones, Paul Konerko, Albert Pujols, David Ortiz and teammate Alex Rodriguez—credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*.
- ▶ According to *Elias*, has homered in more ballparks (28) than any player in Yankees history.
- ▶ Along with Derek Jeter and Mariano Rivera, have become the first trio of teammates in MLB, NBA, NFL and NHL history to appear in a game together in each of 16 straight seasons (credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*).
- ▶ Started 68 consecutive postseason games from 10/27/99 (World Series Game 4)-10/5/05 (Division Series Game 2)...his 46 Division Series games are the third-most on Baseball's all-time list...is third on Baseball's all-time list with 120 career postseason games played...his 119 postseason contests at catcher are the most all-time (Yogi Berra is second with 63)...has 23 postseason doubles, third-most all time.
- ▶ Has caught at least one game in six different World Series, tied for third-most all time with Elston Howard and Wally Schang, trailing Yogi Berra (12) and Bill Dickey (8).

## 2010

- ▶ Hit .248 (95-for-383) with 49R, 23 doubles, 1 triple, 18HR and 57RBI in 120 games (78 starts at C, 28 at DH) with the Yankees...the Yankees were 49-29 in his starts at catcher...caught 10-of-78 (11.4%) potential base stealers.
- ▶ Had 35B, tying his career high (also 35B in 2006)...all 35B came in a nine-game stretch from 8/7-17 after having just 15B in his previous 297G (7/15/07-8/6/10).
- ▶ Made his 11th career Opening Day start at catcher (since 2000), surpassing Thurman Munson (10) and trailing only Bill Dickey (14, 1930-43) for most consecutive starts behind the plate for the Yankees on Opening Day in franchise history...became the oldest catcher (38 years, 230 days) to start an opener for the Yankees since Dickey in 1946 (38 years, 314 days).
- ▶ Hit solo HR in his first AB of the season in the second inning of 4/4 Opening Day loss at Boston, going 3-for-4 with 2RBI and 1BB...was his fourth career Opening Day home run, tied with Mickey Mantle and Yogi Berra for second-most Opening Day home runs in franchise history behind Babe Ruth (five)...was the first of back-to-back homers with Curtis Granderson, becoming the first pair of Yankees to hit back-to-back home runs on Opening Day since Dave Winfield and Steve Kemp on 4/5/83 at Seattle (credit: *Elias*).
- ▶ Hit his 345th career double in the seventh inning of 4/13 home opening win vs. Los Angeles-AL, surpassing Mickey Mantle (344) for sole possession of seventh place in franchise history...is a .444 (16-for-36) hitter in 11 career home openers with 8R, 6 doubles, 4HR, 7RBI and 9BB.
- ▶ Recorded his 1,500th career hit in 4/17 win vs. Texas...became the 19th overall Yankee and fourth Yankee whose primary position was catcher to reach the plateau (also Yogi Berra, Bill Dickey and Thurman Munson).
- ▶ Left 4/28 win at Baltimore in the bottom of the second inning after being hit by a pitch by Baltimore starter Jeremy Guthrie in the top of the inning...suffered a right knee contusion and missed 4/29 game with the injury...missed four games with a strained right calf from 5/4-8.
- ▶ Was placed on the 15-day disabled list on 5/20 (retroactive to 5/17) with a hairline fracture of the bottom of his right foot...was reinstated from the D.L. on 6/2 (missed 15 team games).
- ▶ Hit grand slams in consecutive games on 6/12 and 6/13 vs. Houston, becoming the first Yankee to hit a grand slam in back-to-back games since Bill Dickey on 8/3 (G2) and 8/4/37...according to *Elias*, the only other Yankee to accomplish the feat was Babe Ruth in 1927 and 1929...prior to his grand slam on 6/12, had hit 102HR since his last slam on 7/26/04 at Toronto (off Sean Douglass)...his grand slam on 6/13 was the 251st HR of his career, surpassing Graig Nettles for sole possession of seventh place on the Yankees' all-time list.
- ▶ Drove in at least one run in a career-high eight straight games (10RBI total) from 7/11-24...was the longest such streak by a Yankee since Jason Giambi drove in a run in eight straight from 8/27-9/3/08 and tied for the second-longest streak in the Majors in 2010, trailing only Florida's Jorge Cantu (10 straight from 4/5-15).
- ▶ In 7/20 loss vs. Los Angeles-AL, caught Bobby Abreu stealing 2B in the fifth and the seventh innings, the first time he caught the same runner stealing twice in the same game since 7/29/04 vs. Baltimore (Jerry Hairston, Jr.).
- ▶ Collected his 1,000th career RBI with his run-scoring double in the first inning of 7/23 win vs. Kansas City, going 2-for-3 with 1R, 1 double, 2RBI and 1BB...became the 12th overall

- ▶ Collected his 10th career triple in the first inning of 8/31 win vs. Oakland...became the oldest Yankee to triple since Chili Davis on 9/1/99 at age 39.
- ▶ Was ejected on 9/1 vs. Oakland by HP Umpire Dana DeMuth for arguing balls and strikes...was his sixth career ejection, first since 9/15/09 vs. Toronto.
- ▶ Suffered a mild concussion after being hit with foul tip while catching on 9/7 vs. Baltimore and did not start the Yankees' first two games at Texas on 9/10 and 9/11.
- ▶ Hit game-winning, pinch-hit HR in the 10th inning on 9/14 at Tampa Bay...was his fifth career pinch-hit home run...had been hitless in his previous 10AB as a pinch-hitter in 2010.
- ▶ Played in all nine postseason games, making eight starts at C...hit .267 (8-for-30) with 3R, 2 doubles and 3RBI...Yankees were 3-0 when he scored a run.
- ▶ Underwent arthroscopic surgery on 11/10/10 to correct a small meniscus tear in his left knee...the procedure was performed by Dr. Lee Kaplan in Miami.

## 2009

- ▶ Hit .285 (109-for-383) with 55R, 25 doubles, 22HR and 81RBI in 111 games (88 starts at C and nine at DH) with the Yankees...batted .290 (36-for-124, 5HR) vs. left-handed pitchers and .282 (73-for-259, 17HR) vs. righties.
- ▶ Played in 100 games at catcher in a season in which he turned 38 years old, the most games ever for a Yankees catcher in a season at that age and the most by any catcher since Benito Santiago in 2003 w/ San Francisco...among all-time Major League catchers, only Carlton Fisk (130G, 37HR and 107RBI in 1985 with Chicago-AL) reached Posada's totals in games, home runs and RBI in a season in which they entered at 37 years of age or older.
- ▶ Among Major League catchers, ranked fourth in HR, fifth in RBI and tied for seventh in doubles...ranked seventh in the Majors with a 4.73AB/RBI ratio (383AB, 81RBI)...had the most RBI for any player with fewer than 400 at-bats.
- ▶ Made his 10th straight Opening Day start at catcher (2000-09)...hit solo-HR and was 1-for-3 with 1BB in 4/6 Opening Day loss at Baltimore, his third career Opening Day homer.
- ▶ Hit the first HR in Yankee Stadium history in the fifth inning in the Yankees' 4/16 home opening loss vs. Cleveland.
- ▶ Hit go-ahead, two-run, pinch-hit HR in the seventh and was 1-for-2 in 4/19 win vs. Cleveland...was his third career pinch-hit home run and first since 8/29/04 at Toronto...the home run was reviewed via replay, becoming the first HR to go under umpire review in Yankee Stadium.
- ▶ Caught all 14 innings in 4/22 win vs. Oakland...marked the seventh time in his career he caught at least 14.0 innings and the first since catching 17.0 innings on 6/1/03 at Detroit.
- ▶ Was placed on the 15-day disabled list from 5/5-29 with a Grade 2 right hamstring strain (missed 22 team games).
- ▶ Hit solo-HR and game-winning "walk-off" single in the 12th inning on 7/4 vs. Toronto, going 2-for-6...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, the 12th-inning RBI single—in his 1,533rd Major League game—was his first career "walk-off" RBI in extra innings...the last player whose first extra-inning "walk-off" RBI came as far into his career as Posada's was Tony Fernandez, who accomplished the feat in his 2,123rd game in 2001 w/ Toronto.
- ▶ Was suspended for three games by MLB for his actions during eighth-inning altercation in 9/15 loss vs. Toronto...served his suspension from 9/16-19.
- ▶ Was selected by Joe Girardi to "manage" the Yankees' final regular season game, guiding the team to a 10-2 win on 10/4 at Tampa Bay.
- ▶ Appeared in all 15 Yankees postseason games (10 starts), batting .260 (13-for-50) with 5R, 2 doubles, 2HR and 8RBI...reached base in 14 of the contests...hit go-ahead solo home run in the seventh inning in Game 3 clincher of ALDS at Minnesota.

## 2008

- ▶ Hit .268 (45-for-168) with 13 doubles, 3HR and 22RBI in 51 games with the Yankees before being placed on the disabled list from 7/21 through the conclusion of the season with a right shoulder strain...made 28 starts at C, 15 at DH, three at 1B...marked his most starts at 1B since 2000 (8GS).
- ▶ Was placed on the 15-day D.L. on 7/21 (retroactive to 7/20)...underwent season-ending arthroscopic surgery on his right shoulder on 7/30 at the Hospital for Special Surgery in New York...the procedure was performed by Dr. David Altcheck (missed 63 team games).
- ▶ Was his second stint on the D.L. in 2008...was also on the 15-day D.L. from 4/28-6/3 with a right shoulder strain that was later diagnosed as right rotator cuff tendinitis (missed 32 team games)...had never spent

time on the disabled list prior to the 2008 season...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, at the time of his injury, Posada was one of six current players with at least 10 years of service that had never been placed on the disabled list along with Brad Ausmus, Johnny Damon, Andruw Jones, Derek Lowe and Livan Hernandez...prior to 4/28/08, the Yankees' last game without Posada on the active roster had been 9/1/96 at California (Jim Leyritz started at C).

- ▶ Had started at least 120 games behind the plate in each of his previous eight seasons (2000-07), a streak equaled only by Jason Kendall...caught three of 37 potential base stealers (8.1%).
- ▶ Made his ninth straight Opening Day start at catcher (2000-2008) in 4/1 win vs. Toronto...was 0-for-2 with 1BB in 4/1 Opening Day win vs. Toronto, allowing three stolen bases...missed the next two games from 4/2-3 with a strained right shoulder.
- ▶ Established a career high with three doubles and tied a career best with four hits in 4/23 win at Chicago-AL, going 4-for-5 with 2RBI...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, became the first Yankees catcher to collect three doubles in a game since Buddy Rosar on 4/20/41.
- ▶ Made first appearance on the D.L. on 4/28...was returned from rehab and reinstated from the disabled list on 6/4...started at C and was 1-for-3 with 1BB in 6/5 win vs. Toronto in his first game back...hit safely in eight of his first 11 games following his return from D.L.

## 2007

- ▶ Hit a career-high .338 (171-for-506) while establishing career highs in hits, doubles (42) and slugging percentage (.543)...also hit 20HR and drove in 90 runs in 144 games with the Yankees (125 starts at C, five at DH and one at 1B).
- ▶ Ranked fourth in the American League in average, becoming the first Yankees catcher to finish a season in the top 10 in the league in batting average since Thurman Munson finished 10th in 1978 with a .297 average...also became the only player in Major League history to bat at least .330 with 40 doubles, 20HR and 90RBI in a year in which he caught in at least half of his games played (credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*)...led the AL with a .344 road average, ranked third with a .426 overall on-base percentage, eighth with a .543 slugging percentage and tied for eighth in doubles.
- ▶ Won his fifth career Silver Slugger Award and was named the starting catcher on both the *Baseball America* and the *Sporting News* Major League All-Star teams.
- ▶ His .338 batting average was 61 points higher than in 2006 (.277), the largest increase for any Major Leaguer who qualified for the batting title in 2006 and 2007...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, from 1939-2008, the only other Yankee to improve his batting average by 60 or more points from one season to the next was Bobby Murcer who hit .331 in 1971 after posting a .251 average in 1970 (an 80 point increase)...from 1940-2007, only four players appearing primarily at catcher recorded a higher single-season batting average: St. Louis' Joe Torre (.363 in 1971), the Dodgers' Mike Piazza (.362 in 1997 and .346 in 1995) and Minnesota's Joe Mauer (.347 in 2006).
- ▶ His average never went below .311 (on 4/29) and he never went more than three games without hitting safely...his longest hitless streak of the season was 11AB.
- ▶ His 42 doubles established a franchise record for a catcher, surpassing his own record of 40 set in 2002...joined Ivan Rodriguez (47 in 1996 and 40 in 1998) as the only two catchers in Major League history to have two seasons of 40 or more doubles (credit: *Elias*)...became only the 17th player in Major League history to collect at least 300 career doubles while appearing in at least 1,000 games at catcher.
- ▶ Was selected to the 2007 American League All-Star team, his fifth career All-Star selection and first since 2003...went 1-for-3 with 1 double in 7/10 AL win, pinch-hitting for Josh Beckett in the fifth inning and remaining in game at C.
- ▶ Combined with Alex Rodriguez for a .325 batting average, 74HR and 246RBI...according to *Elias*, no Yankees teammates had combined for numbers that high in each of those categories since 1937, when Joe DiMaggio and Lou Gehrig had a .349BA, 83HR and 326RBI between them.
- ▶ Hit solo-HR—his second career Opening Day HR and the 199th of his career—and was 2-for-4 with 2R in 4/2 win vs. Tampa Bay...hit his 200th career home run in 4/17 win vs. Cleveland.
- ▶ Compiled a career-high 15-game hitting streak from 5/3-20, batting .448 (26-for-58) with 13R, 7 doubles, 3HR and 8RBI...was the longest hitting streak for a Yankees catcher since Bob Geren hit safely in 15 straight games in 1989.
- ▶ Hit solo home runs from each side of the plate and tied career highs with 4H and 4R in 9/4 win vs. Seattle, going 4-for-4 with 1BB...was the second time in 2007 (also 8/1 vs. Chicago-AL) and the eighth time in his career he hit homers from both sides of the plate in the same game, tying Bernie Williams for the second most in team history and marking the most single-game switch-hit HR by a catcher all-time.
- ▶ Recorded his 300th career double and was 2-for-3 with a solo-HR, 3R and 2BB in 9/11 win at Toronto...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, became only the 17th player to reach the 300-double plateau while appearing in at least 1,000 games at catcher.
- ▶ Went a career-high 37 plate appearances without a strikeout from 8/31-9/12 (previous high was 33PA in 1997).

- ▶ Hit a team-best .395 in September (30-for-76), fifth-highest in the AL for the month...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, only two players had a higher September average than Posada in a year in which they caught at least 130 games: the Dodgers' Mike Piazza in 1997 (.406) and Pittsburgh's Jason Kendall in 2004 (.400)...named honorary Yankees Manager for the regular season finale on 10/1 at Baltimore.
- ▶ Batted .133 (2-for-15) in four Division Series games vs. Cleveland.

## 2006

- ▶ Batted .277 (129-for-465) with 23HR and 93RBI in 143 games (121 starts at C, two at DH)...was the sixth time in a seven-year span (2000-06) he hit at least 20HR and drove in at least 80 runs...ranked 10th in the American League with 1RBI every 5.0AB.
- ▶ In 4/3 win at Oakland, made his seventh straight Opening Day start at catcher (2000-06)...hit two-run "walk-off" home run and was 2-for-3 with 2R, 2RBI, 1BB and 2SF in 5/16 win vs. Texas...was his second career "walk-off" HR (also on 5/5/00 vs. Baltimore).
- ▶ Missed two games (5/20-21) with tightness in his upper back...suffered tear in his hamstring tendon behind his left knee on 5/23 at Boston and missed four games (5/24-28)...hit two-run HR and was 1-for-3 with 1BB in 6/11 loss vs. Oakland, hitting his first home run of the season as a right-handed batter and first since 9/22/05 vs. Baltimore (a span of 58AB)...was scratched from lineup on 7/19 vs. Seattle with a bruised right index finger...threw out three runners on 8/8 at Chicago for the second time in his career (also 8/6/02 vs. Kansas City).
- ▶ Snapped career-high 0-for-25 stretch with a second-inning single in 8/14 win vs. the Angels...hit two three-run HRs in back-to-back at-bats in the sixth and eighth innings and was 2-for-3 with 3R and a season-high 6RBI and 1BB in 9/6 win at Kansas City...was his second multi-home-run game of the season (also 4/9 at Los Angeles-AL) and the 13th of his career (all 2HR games).
- ▶ Hit .500 (7-for-14) with 1HR and 2RBI in four Division Series games vs. Detroit.



## 2005

- ▶ Hit .262 (124-for-474) with 19HR and 71RBI in 142 games (122 starts at C, three starts at DH)...threw out 39-of-129 potential base stealers (30.2%)...homered from both sides of the plate in 5/24 win vs. Detroit, hitting solo-HR in the fourth and three-run HR in the fifth.
- ▶ Did not strike out in 32 straight plate appearances before fanning in third inning of 6/3 loss at Minnesota...recorded his 1,000th career hit with a seventh-inning double in 8/20 win at Chicago-AL, going 1-for-2 with 2R and 2BB...did not play in 9/10 loss vs. Boston (jammed right shoulder)...hit solo-HR and three-run HR in 9/22 win vs. Baltimore...was his second multi-HR game of the season (also 5/24 vs. Detroit) and the 11th of his career.
- ▶ Hit .231 (3-for-13) with 1HR, 2RBI and 6BB in five games vs. the Angels in the Division Series...had his streak of 68 consecutive postseason starts snapped in Game 3 of the ALDS (had started each of the Yankees' postseason games since Game 4 of the 1999 World Series).

## 2004

- ▶ Batted .272 (122-for-449) with 21HR and 81RBI in 137 games (126 starts at C)...led the American League in games caught for the second time in his career, becoming the first Yankee to lead the league in games caught more than once since Thurman Munson in 1970, 1972 and 1973...was tied for third in the AL with 88BB and ranked fourth with a .400 on-base percentage.

- ▶ Homered from both sides of the plate (three-run homers in the fifth and seventh innings) and was 2-for-5 with 6RBI in 3/31 win vs. Tampa Bay at Tokyo Dome...accomplished the feat for the fifth time in his career, tying Roy White for third place on the club's all-time list.
- ▶ Missed four games after suffering a broken nose in 5/12 game vs. Anaheim (was hit in the nose by a ball thrown by Angels shortstop Alfredo Amezaga in a double-play attempt in bottom of the second inning)...was taken to Columbia Presbyterian Hospital where he was seen by ear, nose and throat specialist, Dr. Hector Rodriguez and surgery was performed to set the fracture.
- ▶ Drew at least one walk in a career-high 13 straight games from 5/9-29...hit solo-HR and was 2-for-2 with 2RBI in 7/11 win vs. Tampa Bay before being removed in the third with a sprained right ankle (precautionary X-rays were negative)...hit first-inning grand slam in 7/26 win at Toronto, the seventh of his career to tie Charlie Keller for ninth place on the club's all-time list...missed three games from 8/6-8 with a bruised right thumb...missed two games on 8/14-15, suffering from a low-grade viral infection.
- ▶ Hit pinch-hit solo-HR off Jason Frasor in the ninth inning of 8/29 loss at Toronto...was his second career pinch-hit HR (also on 6/16/01 vs. Baltimore off Mike Trombley).
- ▶ Hit .244 (11-for-45) with 2RBI in 11 postseason games...caught every inning of the postseason for the Yankees.

## 2003

- ▶ Ranked third in American League Most Valuable Player voting behind Texas' Alex Rodriguez and Toronto's Carlos Delgado...batted .281 (135-for-481) and established career highs with 30HR and 101RBI in 142 games (131 starts at C, two at DH)...his 30HR tied the Yankees' single-season record for home runs by a catcher (Yogi Berra hit 30 in 1952 and 1956).
- ▶ Earned his fourth consecutive Silver Slugger Award...ranked fifth in the American League with a .405 on-base percentage and sixth with 93 walks.
- ▶ Was elected to start the 2003 All-Star Game at catcher for second straight season, his fourth consecutive All-Star selection (was 0-for-2 at U.S. Cellular Field)...made fourth straight Opening Day start at catcher on 3/31 at Toronto...hit two-run HR in 4/1 win at Toronto, snapping the longest HR drought of his career (140AB/37G since previous HR on 8/17/02)...with seven home runs in April, tied his highest HR total for any single month (also hit 7HR in April 2000 and May 2002)...was ejected in the eighth inning of 5/24 loss vs. Toronto by 2B umpire Fieldin Culbreth for arguing interference call.
- ▶ Tied his career high with four walks in 7/9 win at Cleveland, going 0-for-2 with 1R (also 4BB on 5/30/00 vs. Oakland)...missed two games (8/8-9) vs. Seattle with a stiff neck...tied his career high with four hits (ninth time) in 8/12 win at Kansas City, going 4-for-5 with 2R, 1 double and 2RBI...hit two home runs and was 2-for-5 with 2R and 3RBI in 8/30 win at Boston, snapping an 0-for-17 stretch...was the eighth multi-home-run game of his career and first since 6/28/02 vs. New York-NL.
- ▶ Hit grand slam and was 3-for-4 with 2R, a career-high 7RBI and 1BB in 9/10 win vs. Detroit...the 7RBI were the most by a Yankee since Bernie Williams also collected 7RBI on 6/17/00 vs. Chicago-AL...was his sixth career slam.

- ▶ Was selected to his second All-Star Game, going 1-for-1 in the American League's 4-1 win on 7/10 in Seattle...missed three straight games (7/31-8/2) with a stomach illness...was ejected from 9/3 win by HP Umpire Andy Fletcher in the ninth after being called out on strikes for second time...appealed six-game suspension by MLB and had sentence reduced by one game (served five-game suspension from 9/26-10/1)...hit third grand slam of the season (and career) and tied a season high with 5RBI in 9/18 win at Chicago.
- ▶ Struck out in 12 straight games from 8/30-9/19, the longest such streak by a Yankee since Jim Leyritz also fanned in 12 straight games in 1995.

- ▶ In 5/29 win at Cleveland, tossed a scoreless ninth for his 10th save (1.0IP, 1H, 2K)...was his 58th save in a game in which Andy Pettitte was the winning pitcher, surpassing Bob Welch and Dennis Eckersley (57) for the highest total for any pair of pitchers since saves became an official statistic in 1969 (credit: *Elias*).
- ▶ Did not allow a run over 21 straight appearances from 6/16-8/9, compiling a 22.1-inning scoreless stretch dating back to the ninth inning on 6/12...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, was the fourth-longest scoreless stretch of his career (behind 30.2IP in 1999, 26.0IP in 1996 and 23.0IP in 2005)...did not allow a run in a save situation over 25 save chances from 5/20-8/9, a 25.1-inning scoreless span.

- ▶ Was named AL “Player of the Week” for the period ending 6/1, earning his first career weekly award...in 6/7 win vs. Kansas City, recorded his second win of the season despite allowing a home run to David DeJesus, his first batter faced, on his first pitch (1.0IP, 1H, 1ER, 1K, 1HR)...was his first HR allowed since 8/15/07 vs. Baltimore (Aubrey Huff) and marked the first time he had allowed a HR on his first pitch after entering a game since 8/23/97 at Seattle to Roberto Kelly (credit: *Elias*).
- ▶ Allowed his first run of the season in a save opportunity in 7/5 win vs. Boston...allowed 1ER and loaded the bases with no outs (2HP) before retiring the final three batters of the game to earn his 23rd save...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, it was the first time Rivera escaped a bases-full-none-out jam with the tying run on third in the game’s final inning.
- ▶ In 7/29 loss vs. Baltimore, pitched the ninth to surpass the 1000.0IP plateau...on 8/1 at Los Angeles-AL, allowed one-out ninth-inning “walk-off” RBI-single to Chone Figgins on his first and only pitch of the game as the Angels won 1-0...was the second time he threw just one pitch (also 8/7/05 at Toronto – earned the save).
- ▶ In 8/12 win at Minnesota, allowed game-tying three-run HR to Delmon Young in the eighth for his first and only blown save of the season (1.2IP, 2H, 1ER)...in 8/15 loss vs. Kansas City, allowed the go-ahead run to score on a wild pitch...was just the second time in his career he allowed a run on a wild pitch (also 6/24/00 at Chicago-AL) and his first time allowing the go-ahead run on a WP (credit: *Elias*).
- ▶ Saved all three games of the Yankees’ series at Baltimore from 8/22-24, marking the sixth time in his career he has saved all of the games in a series of three or more games (previous 6/1-3/04 vs. Baltimore)...was also the 19th time in his career he recorded a save on three or more consecutive days...the only other Yankees pitchers to earn a save in each game of a series (of at least three games) are Dave Righetti (1986), Steve Howe (1994) and John Wetteland (twice in 1996).
- ▶ Recorded his 479th career save in 9/15 win vs. Chicago-AL, surpassing Lee Smith (478) for sole possession of second place on Baseball’s all-time saves list.
- ▶ Threw 1.0 scoreless inning in the final game at Yankee Stadium on 9/21 vs. Baltimore, inducing a Brian Roberts groundout to 1B Cody Ransom with the game’s final pitch to secure the Yankees victory.
- ▶ Returned to New York during the season’s final road trip to undergo an MRI on his shoulder that revealed calcification in the AC joint in his right shoulder.
- ▶ Collected his 39th and final save of the season in 9/28 Game 1 win at Boston...tossed 1.1 scoreless innings to save Mike Mussina’s 20th win of the season...was the second time he recorded a save in a pitcher’s 20th win (also Roger Clemens in 2001).
- ▶ Underwent surgery on the AC Joint in his right shoulder on 10/7...procedure was done by Dr. David Altchek at the Hospital for Special Surgery in New York.

## 2007

- ▶ Was 3-4 with a 3.15 ERA and 30 saves in 67 relief appearances for the Yankees...ranked fourth in the American League with 59 games finished and tied for eighth with 30 saves...opponents batted .248 (68-for-274, 4HR); LH .255 (35-for-137, 1HR), RH .241 (33-for-137, 3HR)...converted 30-of-34 save opportunities (88.2%).
- ▶ Saved consecutive games five times and earned the save in three consecutive games once, from 7/14-16...made appearances in consecutive games 11 times and three straight games once...recorded 11 saves of more than 1.0IP...tossed a season-high 2.0IP twice...retired 43-of-67 first batters faced (64.2%)...prevented 19-of-26 inherited runners from scoring (73.1%).
- ▶ In his final 59 appearances of the season (from 4/28), went 2-2 with a 2.23 ERA and converted 30-of-32 save opportunities (64.2IP, 58H, 16ER, 9BB, 66K)...in his first eight games (4/2-27), went 1-2 with a 12.15 ERA while blowing both of his save opportunities (6.2IP, 10H, 9ER, 3BB, 8K).
- ▶ Allowed three-run "walk-off" home run to Marco Scutaro with two strikes and two outs in the ninth inning on 4/15 at Oakland, suffering the loss and blown save...was the first time in his career that he blew a multiple-run lead against a team that was down to its last out with the bases empty (credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*)...according to *Elias*, it was Rivera's first home run allowed on an 0-2 pitch since Marquis Grissom hit a 10th-inning game-winner on 7/14/97 vs. Cleveland...was the fourth "walk-off" home run allowed in his career in the regular season and first since 7/20/06 at Toronto (Vernon Wells)...was also the 14th time that Rivera was on the mound for a "walk-off" loss in a regular season game.
- ▶ Blew his second save chance on 4/20 at Boston, allowing 3H and 2ER in 0.2IP (1K)...following the consecutive setbacks, converted 19 consecutive save opportunities from 4/28-8/12, allowing just 3ER in 22.2IP (1.19 ERA) with no walks and 24K.
- ▶ Recorded saves in both games of a doubleheader on 5/3 at Texas...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, was the fifth time in his career that he has recorded two saves on the same day (in either official doubleheaders or split day/night games), becoming one of only three pitchers in Major League history to accomplish the feat, joining Sparky Lyle and Jose Mesa.
- ▶ Notched his fourth save of the season in 5/30 win at Toronto, his first save and save opportunity since 5/3 at Texas (a span of 27 days)...was the longest gap between save opportunities since becoming the Yankees closer in 1997.
- ▶ Appeared in three games (no save opportunities) in the Division Series vs. Cleveland, throwing 4.2 scoreless innings with 1BB and 6K.

## 2006

- ▶ Went 5-5 with a 1.80 ERA and 34 saves in 63 relief appearances for the Yankees, winning his second consecutive "DHL Delivery Man of the Year" Award and third straight "Rolands Relief Man of the Year" Award...ranked second in the American League with 59 games finished and ninth with 34 saves.
- ▶ Converted 34-of-37 save opportunities (91.9%)...saved consecutive games four times...made appearances in consecutive games nine times, three straight games three times and four consecutive games once...recorded at least six outs in eight appearances (tossed 2.0 innings seven times and 3.0 innings once)...retired 48-of-63 first batters faced (76.2%)...prevented 11-of-18 inherited runners from scoring (61.1%)...opponents batted .223 (61-for-274, 3HR); LH .194 (25-for-129, 1HR), RH .248 (36-for-145, 2HR).
- ▶ Was selected to the American League All-Star team, his eighth career selection...tossed a scoreless ninth to earn the save in the American League's 3-2 victory on 7/11 at PNC Field in Pittsburgh...was his third career All-Star save, tying Dennis Eckersley for most saves in All-Star history.
- ▶ Tossed 3.0 scoreless innings on 5/30 at Detroit to earn the win, marking his longest outing in the regular season since 9/6/96 vs. Toronto when he also went 3.0 innings...in 6/6 win vs. Boston, tossed a perfect ninth for his 12th save of the season and the 391st of his career, surpassing Dennis Eckersley for fourth place on Baseball's all-time list.
- ▶ On 7/20 at Toronto, allowed 11th-inning "walk-off" home run to Vernon Wells to record fifth loss (1.1IP, 2H, 1ER)...was the third "walk-off" home run allowed in his career in the regular season and the first since 7/24/04 at Boston (Bill Mueller)...had gone 51.0 innings without allowing a home run in 2006 and had gone 73.0 innings since he had last allowed a home run (Eduardo Perez on 8/16/05 at Tampa Bay), marking the longest such streak by a Yankees pitcher since Andy Pettitte in 2002 (also 73.0 innings)...missed 22 games from 9/1-20 with a strained right forearm.
- ▶ Made one relief appearance in the Division Series vs. Detroit, allowing 1H in 1.0IP in Game 1 win on 10/13.

## 2005

- ▶ Was 7-4 with a career-low 1.38 ERA and 43 saves in 71 relief appearances...won his second straight "Rolands Relief Man of the Year" Award...also was named "DHL Delivery Man of the Year"...became only the third pitcher in Major League history to save at least 40 games with a sub-1.50 ERA while working 75.0 innings or more (also John Wetteland in 1993 and Eric Gagne in 2003)...led the American League with 67 games finished, was tied for third with 43 saves and was tied for eighth with 71 games...led all American League relievers in ERA and opponent's batting average (.177)...was tied for seventh with 78.1IP...allowed more than one

earned run in an appearance only once (2ER in 2.0IP on 8/13 vs. Texas)...allowed only 1ER on the road in 34 appearances (35.0IP) the entire season (0.26 ERA).

- ▶ Converted 43-of-47 save opportunities (91.5%)...saved consecutive games five times...saved three consecutive games three times...made appearances in consecutive games 13 times and three straight games six times...retired 58-of-71 first batters faced (81.7%)...prevented 16-of-18 inherited runners from scoring (88.9%)...opponents batted .177 (50-for-283, 2HR); LH .177 (25-for-141, 1HR), RH .176 (25-for-142, 1HR).
- ▶ Was selected to the 2005 American League All-Star team, his seventh career All-Star selection...retired the final batter of the All-Star Game at Detroit to record his second career All-Star save.
- ▶ Blew his first two save chances of the season on consecutive days, 4/5 and 4/6 vs. Boston, the first time he blew consecutive save opportunities in the regular season since 7/24/04 at Boston and 7/26/04 at Toronto (he had never blown saves on consecutive days)...following the back-to-back setbacks, converted 31 straight save opportunities from 4/9-8/11, the longest such streak of his career, allowing only 1ER in 31.2IP (0.28 ERA) while limiting batters to a .140 batting average (15-for-107, 3BB, 33K)...allowed only 4ER in his 46 overall appearances during that same span (51.2IP, 0.70ERA).
- ▶ Did not allow a run in 22 appearances from 5/9-7/4 (23.0IP, 8H, 5BB, 23K)...the longest single-season scoreless innings streak by a Yankees pitcher since Mike Mussina threw 23.0 straight scoreless innings in 2001...was the longest such streak by any Yankees reliever since 1999, when Rivera finished the regular season with 30.2 shutout innings, the longest streak of his career.
- ▶ On 8/16 at Tampa Bay, allowed game-tying ninth-inning home run (Eduardo Perez) to record fourth blown save of the season and second in span of three opportunities...prior to blowing the save, had recorded 33 consecutive saves vs. the Devil Rays, the most saves—without a blown save—by a pitcher against one particular opponent in AL history.
- ▶ Recorded saves in each of his two appearances versus the Angels in the Division Series (3.0IP, 1H, 1ER, 1BB, 1K)...recorded the 15th Division Series save of his career in Game 4 vs. the Angels, tossing 2.0 perfect innings for his first two-inning postseason save since Game 5 of the 2003 ALCS at Boston...it also was his Major League-leading 34th career postseason save (in 39 opportunities).

## 2004

- ▶ Was 4-2 with a 1.94 ERA and a single-season franchise-record 53 saves in career-high 74 relief appearances...led the Major Leagues in saves and was tied for fourth in the American League in appearances...his 53 saves tied Randy Myers (Chicago Cubs, 1993) and Trevor Hoffman (San Diego Padres, 1998) for fourth place on Baseball's single-season all-time list...joined Eric Gagne as the only relievers in Major League history to record two 50-save seasons...earned his third "Rolands Relief Man of the Year" Award...converted 53-of-57 save opportunities (93.0%)...saved two consecutive games seven times...saved three consecutive games four times, and saved four straight games once...made appearances in consecutive games 13 times, three straight games seven times, and four straight games once...retired 53-of-74 first batters faced (71.6%)...prevented 11-of-17 inherited runners from scoring (64.7%)...opponents batted .225 (65-for-289, 3HR); LH .234 (36-for-154, 2HR), RH .215 (29-for-135, 1HR)...was selected to the 2004 American League All-Star team, his sixth career All-Star selection...pitched a perfect ninth inning in the American League's 9-4 win on 7/13.
- ▶ In 5/11 win vs. Anaheim, allowed 2ER in 1.0IP to suffer his first blown save of the season, snapping a stretch of 28 consecutive save conversions...in 5/19 win at Anaheim, tossed perfect ninth to record league-leading 15th save in the Yankees' 39th game of the season...became the first Yankees reliever to reach 15 saves in fewer than 50 games into any season...became the 17th pitcher in Major League history—and first Yankee—to reach the 300-save plateau in 5/28 win at Tampa Bay...became the fifth-youngest pitcher to reach 300 saves—at 34 years, 181 days—behind Robb Nen (32 years, 251 days), Lee Smith (33/264), John Wetteland (33/265) and Trevor Hoffman (33/306)...with 11 saves in June, tied his career high for any calendar month.
- ▶ In 7/8 win vs. Tampa Bay, pitched a perfect 1.2 innings (1K) to earn his 30th save...tied the then-American League record for fewest team games in a season to reach the 30-save plateau, joining Bobby Thigpen of the Chicago White Sox (1990) and Boston's Lee Smith (1993), who also reached 30 saves in their team's 83rd game...record later surpassed by the Angels' Francisco Rodriguez in 2008 (76 games)...established an AL record with 32 saves before the All-Star break (two shy of the mark of 34 set by Atlanta's John Smoltz in 2003)...surrendered "walk-off," two-run home run to Bill Mueller in the bottom of the ninth in 7/24 loss at Boston.
- ▶ Recorded save No. 40 in 8/14 win at Seattle (Game 116), becoming the quickest to the 40-save plateau and breaking Bobby Thigpen's record of 118 games set with the Chicago White Sox in 1990...record later broken by the Angels' Francisco Rodriguez in 2008 (98 games)...earned his 45th save of the season in the Yankees' 18-6 win on 8/28 at Toronto, retiring last four batters of the game (entered the game with a 9-6 lead and two runners on base)...became the first Yankee to earn a save in a game in which the Yankees won by at least 12 runs as Ed Figueroa, who earned a save in a 16-3 Yankees win on 5/14/80 vs. Kansas City.
- ▶ Was 1-0 with two saves and a 0.71 ERA in nine postseason appearances...earned his 10th career LCS save in Game 2 vs. Boston...recorded back-to-back blown saves for the first time in his postseason career in Games 4 and 5 of the ALCS at Boston.

## 2003

- ▶ Was 5-2 with a 1.66 ERA and 40 saves in 64 relief appearances with the Yankees...ranked third in the American League with 40 saves despite missing the first 25 games of the season and having only four saves through the Yankees' 59th game...had 36 saves in the final 104 games of the season...converted 40-of-46 save opportunities (87.0%)...saved two consecutive games eight times and three consecutive games twice (6/24-26 and 6/28-30)...retired 44-of-64 first batters faced (68.8%)...prevented 18-of-35 inherited runners from scoring (51.4%)...opponents batted .235 (61-for-260, 3HR); LH .197 (29-for-147, 1HR), RH .281 (32-for-113, 2HR)...made appearances in consecutive games 11 times, three straight games five times and four straight games once.
- ▶ Began the season on the 15-day D.L. (retroactive to 3/25) with a strained right groin...suffered the injury on the last pitch of his 3/24 spring training outing vs. Detroit...was reinstated from the D.L. on 4/29 (missed first 25 games of the season)...made his 2003 debut in 4/30 win vs. Seattle and recorded his first save of the season in 5/1 win vs. Seattle...in 6/13 win vs. St. Louis, pitched a perfect ninth to save Roger Clemens' 300th victory.
- ▶ Did not allow a run in his final 15 appearances of the season (16.1IP, 10H, 3BB, 16K) and saved all 16 of his opportunities from 8/19 through the conclusion of the regular season.
- ▶ Was 1-0 with a 0.56 ERA and five saves in eight postseason relief appearances...also struck out 14 batters without allowing a walk in postseason play...was named American League Championship Series Most Valuable Player, going 1-0 with a 1.13 ERA and two saves in four appearances vs. Boston...earned the win in Game 7, pitching 3.0 scoreless innings—his first three-inning stint since 9/6/96 vs. Toronto.

## 2002

- ▶ Battled through three stints on the disabled list to go 1-4 with a 2.74 ERA and 28 saves in 45 games...in 5/9 win at Tampa Bay, recorded the 225th save of his career to surpass Dave Righetti (224) as the club's all-time saves leader...converted 28-of-32 save opportunities (87.5%)...had to record more than three outs in four of his 28 saves...saved two consecutive games five times and three consecutive twice...retired 35-of-45 first batters faced (77.8%)...prevented 11-of-20 inherited runners from scoring (55.0%)...made appearances in consecutive games 12 times and three straight games twice...opponents batted .203 (35-for-172, 3HR); LH .181 (15-for-83, 1HR), RH .225 (20-for-89, 2HR)...was selected to his fifth All-Star Game by Manager Joe Torre and pitched a scoreless ninth inning (1H) on 7/9 at Miller Park in Milwaukee, as the game ended tied in the 13th inning.
- ▶ Was placed on the 15-day disabled list three separate times in 2002 (entering the season had been placed on the disabled list once in his eight-year Major League career)...was placed on the 15-day D.L. from 6/9-25 with a strained right groin...on 6/26 at Baltimore, struck out the side in first appearance since reinstatement, pitching in the seventh inning for first time since 10/1/00 at Baltimore...was removed from 7/20 win vs. Boston—after six pitches—with tightness in his right shoulder (1H, 1ER in 0.1IP)...was placed on the 15-day disabled list for a second time from 7/26 (retroactive to 7/21) to 8/8 with a mild muscle strain of the right shoulder...was placed on 15-day D.L. for a third time from 8/19 (retroactive to 8/16) to 9/21 with a muscle strain of the right shoulder.
- ▶ Converted 17 consecutive save opportunities from 4/23-7/11 without allowing a run (17.0IP, 8H)...on 7/14 at Cleveland, allowed "walk-off" grand slam by Bill Selby in the ninth inning to suffer his second consecutive blown save and fourth loss on the season (0.2IP, 5H, 6ER, 11BB, 1K)...was his second game-winning home run allowed in 2002 (also Shea Hillenbrand on 4/13 at Boston) and fourth of his career...6ER were the most allowed in a relief appearance in his career.
- ▶ Made one appearance in the Division Series vs. the Angels, saving Game 1 (1.0IP, 1H).

## 2001

- ▶ Went 4-6 with a 2.34 ERA and 50 saves in 71 games...became only the sixth player in Major League history to reach the 50-save plateau in a single season...saved at least 30 games for the fifth straight season, surpassing Dave Righetti for most 30-save seasons by a Yankee.
- ▶ Converted 50-of-57 save opportunities (87.7%)...had to record more than three outs in 13 of his 50 saves...saved two consecutive games nine times and three consecutive games three times (4/27-29; 6/14-16; 7/16-18)...retired 57-of-71 first batters faced (80.3%) and prevented 20-of-25 inherited runners from scoring (80.0%)...made appearances in consecutive games 13 times, three straight games six times and pitched in four straight games once...opponents batted .209 (61-for-292, 5HR); LH .187 (26-for-139, 0HR), RH .229 (35-for-153, 5HR)...was selected to participate in the All-Star Game, but did not attend to rest an injured right ankle.

- ▶ Saved all three games a series vs. Oakland from 4/27-29...in 8/1 win vs. Texas, recorded his 200th career save, pitching 2.0 scoreless innings (2K).
- ▶ Was 2-1 with a 1.13 ERA and five saves in 11 postseason relief appearances...allowed two runs in the bottom of the ninth in Game 7 of the World Series at Arizona and recorded the loss...was his first career blown save in World Series play (had been 8-for-8 in save opportunities)...had converted 23 consecutive saves in postseason play (last blown save was Game 4 of 1997 ALDS at Cleveland).

## 2000

- ▶ Was 7-4, with a 2.85 ERA and 36 saves in 66 appearances...converted 36-of-41 save opportunities (87.8%)...saved two consecutive games three times and three consecutive games twice...was asked to record more than three outs in 13 of his 36 saves...retired 51-of-66 first batters faced (77.3%)...prevented 14-of-24 inherited runners from scoring (58.3%)...opponents batted .208 (58-for-279, 4HR); LH .210 (28-for-143, 1HR), RH .206 (28-for-136, 3HR).
- ▶ Made his first Opening Day appearance on 4/3 at Anaheim and recorded the save, allowing 1ER in 1.0IP...tossed 2.2IP to record his second win of the season on 4/19 at Texas, his longest outing since tossing 3.0IP and earning the win on 9/6/96 vs. Toronto...recorded his first loss and second blown save of season on 5/7 vs. Baltimore, allowing 4H and 3ER in the ninth inning...was the first time he received the loss when leading by two or more runs in the ninth inning or later since 8/2/96 at Kansas City when he allowed 4ER in 0.2IP.
- ▶ Saved both games of 7/8 doubleheader vs. the Mets (Game 1 at Shea Stadium and Game 2 at Yankee Stadium), pitching scoreless ninth innings.
- ▶ Was 0-0 with a 1.72 ERA and six saves in a team-high 10 postseason relief appearances...with his save in Game 5 of the Division Series at Oakland on 10/8, Rivera established the Major League record for most saves in postseason play with 16 (surpassing Dennis Eckersley-15)...had his postseason record scoreless streak end at 33.1IP in Game 6 of the ALCS on 10/17 vs. Seattle, allowing 1ER in 2.0IP...streak had covered 23 appearances, dating back to Sandy Alomar's solo-HR in Game 4 of the 1997 Division Series at Cleveland...surpassed Whitey Ford's 33.0 consecutive scoreless innings from 1960-62...had his World Series scoreless streak snapped at 14.1 innings when he allowed 2ER in the ninth inning of Game 2 vs. the Mets on 10/22...saved Games 4 and 5 of the World Series to bring his career Series saves total to seven, the most all-time, surpassing Rollie Fingers' six.

## 1999

- ▶ Was selected to his 13th All-Star team in 2010—the most among active Major League players—by American League All-Star Manager Joe Girardi (did not play).
- ▶ Owns a .290 (67-for-231) career postseason batting average with 41R, 16 doubles, 13HR and 38RBI in 63 games...is tied for fourth among active Major Leaguers in postseason home runs, ranks sixth in runs scored, and eighth in RBI and on-base percentage (.396).

## 2010

- ▶ Hit .270 (141-for-522) with 74R, 29 doubles, 30HR and 125RBI in 137 games (122 starts at 3B, 12 at DH) with the Yankees...ranked second in the Majors in RBI...had 16 game-winning RBI, tied with Chicago-AL's Paul Konerko and Toronto's Vernon Wells for most such RBI in the AL...led the Majors with 4.18 AB/RBI...13 of his 30HR (43.3%) tied the game or gave the Yankees the lead...58 of his 125RBI (46.4%) either tied the game or gave the Yankees the lead.
- ▶ Had a Major League-leading 48RBI in the seventh inning or later, 20 of which tied the game or put the team ahead...hit four go-ahead home runs in the seventh inning or later and has nine such homers since the start of 2009.
- ▶ Played in 137 games and drove in 125 runs...since RBI became an official statistic in 1920, only nine players (12 occasions) have recorded more RBI while playing 137G or fewer, including just two Yankees—Babe Ruth in 1929 (154RBI) and '32 (137) and Joe DiMaggio in 1939 (126) and '40 (133).
- ▶ Matched his career high with 11 sacrifice flies (also 2000 w/Seattle).
- ▶ Was 9-for-20 (.450) with 3HR and a Major League-leading 34RBI with the bases loaded...tied for most grand slams in the Majors in 2010 and marked the fourth time in his career he hit at least three grand slams in a season (also 1996, '99 and 2007)...according to *Elias*, matches Jimmie Foxx (1932, '34, '38 and '40) as the only players with at least four seasons with three-or-more grand slams...became the third Yankee to hit three grand slams before the All-Star break (also Lou Gehrig – four in 1934; and Don Mattingly – three in 1987).
- ▶ Committed just two errors over his final 81 games (80 starts) at 3B beginning on 5/27...made 5E in his first 43 games of the season (4/4-5/26)...went 45 straight games (44 starts) at third base without making an error from 7/17-9/28, marking the third-longest errorless stretch at 3B in his career (46 games from 5/30-7/23/07 and 61 games from 6/23-9/1/05)...ranked fourth among all Major League third basemen with a .976 fielding percentage...only Jhonny Peralta (5E) and Placido Polanco (5E) committed fewer errors than Rodriguez (7E) among Major Leaguers with at least 100G at 3B.
- ▶ Made his 14th career Opening Day roster...was his sixth Opening Day start at 3B after making eight Opening Day starts at SS...joined Manny Ramirez (seven Opening Day starts in RF and eight in LF) as the only active players to make at least six Opening Day starts at two different positions in their career...the last player to do so at both SS and 3B was Cal Ripken Jr. (credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*)...also made his sixth Opening Day start at 3B with Derek Jeter at SS, matching Bucky Dent and Graig Nettles (six) and Frank Crosetti and Red Rolfe (six) for most such starts in franchise history.
- ▶ Hit just 2HR in April, his lowest home run total of his career for a calendar month (min. 70AB).
- ▶ Reached the 1,000-hit plateau as a Yankee with his second-inning single off Wade Davis in 4/10 win at Tampa Bay...became the 39th player to reach the plateau with the Yankees and first since Jorge Posada on 8/20/05 at the White Sox...had 966H with Seattle (1994-2000) and 569 with Texas (2001-03), becoming the second player to have 1,000H with other team(s) prior to getting 1,000 with the Yankees, joining Dave Winfield (1,134 w/ San Diego from 1973-80; and 1,300 w/ the Yankees from 1981-88, '90)—credit: *Elias*.
- ▶ Hit his 584th career home run in 4/17 win vs. Texas, surpassing Mark McGwire for sole possession of eighth place on Baseball's all-time list...the home run also snapped a 41AB homerless stretch to begin the season, his longest such stretch to begin a campaign since 1995 when he homered in his 49th at-bat and third-longest of his career (did not homer in 54AB in 1994 rookie season).

### Century City

**Alex Rodriguez** has driven in at least 100 runs while playing fewer than 140 games in each of the last three seasons (2008-10)...the only other players ever to have three such consecutive seasons were Joe DiMaggio (1939-41) and Chick Hafey (1928-30)...joins DiMaggio as the only players to also have at least 30HR in each of those three seasons—credit: *Elias*.



### MAN ON

According to STATS Inc., **Alex Rodriguez** has had the hitter before him intentionally walked to load the bases 17 times in his career and he has hit three home runs in those situations...according to STATS Inc., Rodriguez is 5-for-7 with 1BB, 3HR, 1SF and 18RBI in nine plate appearances after Mark Teixeira has been intentionally walked to load the bases in front of him (including postseason).

- ▶ Snapped an 0-for-19 stretch with a first-inning double in 4/30 win vs. Chicago-AL, his longest hitless stretch since a career-high-tying 0-for-21 from 7/25-8/2/07.
- ▶ Did not record an RBI over a seven-game stretch from 5/20-27, marking his longest drought without driving in a run since a nine-game span from 5/9-18/07.
- ▶ Did not play in four games from 6/11-15 (hip flexor tendinitis).
- ▶ Hit game-winning two-run HR in the eighth in 7/1 win vs. Seattle...was his 250th as a Yankee in his 963rd game with the Yankees...according to *Elias*, the only player to reach the 250-homer plateau with the Yankees in fewer games was Babe Ruth (774th game).
- ▶ Had 70RBI prior to the All-Star break for the seventh time in his career, tying Ted Williams for the most such seasons in Major League history...no other player has done it six times (credit: *Elias*).
- ▶ Collected a Major League-best 31RBI in July, marking his most RBI in a calendar month since September 2007 (also 31RBI)...was his fourth 30RBI month as a Yankee (also April and June 2007-both 34RBI), the most such months by a Yankee since Mickey Mantle (July 1952, May 1956, June 1957 and June 1961).
- ▶ Hit first-inning, two-run HR—the 600th HR of his career—in 8/4 win vs. Toronto, becoming the seventh player in Major League history to reach the plateau...at 35 years, 8 days old, became the youngest player ever to hit his 600th career HR, surpassing Babe Ruth (36 years, 196 days)...the home run came in his 2,267th career game, trailing only Ruth (2,044) for fewest games needed to reach the mark...joined Ruth (600th HR on 8/21/31 at St. Louis) as the only players to hit his 600th career homer as a Yankee...came exactly three years to the day after he hit his 500th home run (8/4/07 vs. Kansas City, off Kyle Davies)...snapped a 46AB homerless stretch and an 0-for-17 stretch overall with the homer...hit .196 (9-for-46) with 3 doubles and 8RBI between his 599th and 600th home runs (7/22-8/3).
- ▶ Stole his 300th career base in the sixth inning of 8/8 win at Boston.
- ▶ Hit three home runs (solo-HR and two two-run HRs) in 8/14 win at Kansas City, going 4-for-5...hit the three homers in consecutive plate appearances off three different pitchers (a span of five pitches)...was his fourth career three-homer game and first since 4/26/05 vs. Los Angeles-AL.
- ▶ Missed three games from 8/17-19 with tightness in his left calf and was placed on the 15-day disabled from 8/21-9/5 with the injury (missed 14 team games).
- ▶ Hit 9HR with 28RBI in 25 games over the remainder of the season after being reinstated from the disabled list on 9/5, ranking third in the Majors in home runs and second in RBI over the stretch.
- ▶ Was named the MLB "AL Player of the Month" for September (.309, 25-for-81, 15R, 9HR and 26RBI in 22 games).
- ▶ Hit solo HR in the sixth and two-run HR in the seventh and was 2-for-4 with 1BB in 9/24 loss vs. Boston...were his 609th and 610th career home runs, tying and surpassing Sammy Sosa (609) for sole possession of sixth place all-time...was his 58th career multi-HR game (54th two-homer game) and fourth in 2010.
- ▶ Appeared in all nine postseason games, reaching base in eight of the contests (.219, 7-for-32, 5R, 2 doubles, 3RBI and 4BB).

## 2009

- ▶ Hit .286 (127-for-444) with 17 doubles, 1 triple, 30HR, 100RBI and 14SB in 124 games (113 starts at 3B, nine at DH) with the Yankees...missed 28 team games at the beginning of the season due to injury...became the 12th player all time to reach 30HR and 100RBI in a season in which he played fewer than 125G, first since Manny Ramirez in 2002.
- ▶ The Yankees went 90-44 (.672) following his return from the disabled list on 5/8, marking the best winning percentage in the Majors over the stretch...ranked second in the American League in RBI and tied for second in the AL in home runs after coming off the D.L., trailing only teammate Mark Teixeira.
- ▶ Was involved in scoring or driving in the game-winning or tying run in six of the Yankees' 15 "walk-off" innings in 2009 (two game-ending home runs, one game-tying home run, two game-winning runs scored and hit a pop-up resulting in a two-run "walk-off" error vs. the Mets)...batted .310 (18-for-58) with 8HR and 21RBI in "close and late" situations, tying for second-most HR in the Majors in such situations.
- ▶ According to *Elias*, 15 of his 30HR either tied the game or put the team ahead...had 12HR in the seventh inning or later, seven of which tied the game or put the Yankees ahead...51 of his 100RBI tied the game or put the team ahead, tying for second in the AL with 29 go-ahead RBI...had 33RBI in the seventh inning or later, 15 of which tied the game or put the team ahead.
- ▶ Became the third Yankee to reach the 100RBI plateau in fewer than 125 games in a season (also Joe DiMaggio in 1939 and Bill Dickey in 1936).
- ▶ Was placed on the 15-day D.L. from 4/4-5/8 (retroactive to 3/27)...missed 28 team games...underwent arthroscopic surgery on 3/9 to repair his right hip labrum, remove an impingement in the joint and drain a cyst in the hip...the procedure was performed by Dr. Marc Philippon at the Vail Valley Surgery Center in Vail, Colo...the cyst and tear were discovered during an MRI taken on 2/28...cyst was originally drained on 3/5.
- ▶ In 44 plate appearances during rehab assignment from 4/30-5/7, was 7-for-36 (.194) with 3HR, 8BB and 8K...reported to Tampa on 4/13 to continue his rehab program...was selected to participate in the World Baseball Classic with the Dominican Republic, but was unable to play (hip surgery).
- ▶ Missed the Opening Day active roster for the first time since 1995, snapping a stretch of 13 straight Opening Day starts.
- ▶ Hit three-run HR on his first pitch seen of the season and was 1-for-4 in 5/8 win at Baltimore...became the first Yankee to homer on the first pitch of his first plate appearance of a season since Andy Phillips on 9/26/04 at Boston, in the first PA of his Major League career...was the second time that Rodriguez hit a HR in his first AB of a season (also 2006).
- ▶ Seven of his first 10 hits after returning from the disabled list on 5/8 were home runs...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, was the first Yankee in franchise history to collect 7HR within his first 10H of the season.
- ▶ Homered on four straight days from 5/16-19, marking the eighth time in his career he homered in at least four consecutive games...according to *Elias*, his five streaks of four straight games with a HR as a Yankee tie him with Babe Ruth, Lou Gehrig and Yogi Berra for the most in franchise history.
- ▶ Hit 6HR on the Yankees' 10-game homestand from 5/15-24, matching his most HR hit during any homestand in his Major League career (third time).
- ▶ Reached the 14-year anniversary of his first HR (Tom Gordon on 6/12/95 w/ Seattle vs. Kansas City) with 561 homers...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, his career total of within 14 years of hitting his first were most all time...the next-highest home run totals as of the 14th anniversary of their first were Mark McGwire (552) and Sammy Sosa (539).

- ▶ Hit two-run HR—the 564th of his career to surpass Reggie Jackson for 11th place on Baseball's all-time list—in 6/26 win at the Mets.
- ▶ Hit two-run "walk-off" HR in the 15th inning of 8/7 win vs. Boston, becoming the fifth player in Baseball history to hit a "walk-off" HR in the 15th inning or later to break a scoreless tie, joining Old Hoss Radbourn in 1882 w/ Providence (18th inning), Earl Averil in 1935 w/ Cleveland (15th inning), Willie Mays in 1963 w/ San Francisco (16th inning) and Adrian Garrett in 1975 w/ Chicago-NL (16th inning)—credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*...was his ninth career extra-inning HR.
- ▶ The homer snapped a single-season career-high 72AB homerless stretch dating back to 7/19 (third-longest of career).
- ▶ Two games later, hit the go-ahead solo-HR in the seventh in 8/9 win vs. Boston...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, became the first player in Major League history to snap scoreless ties by hitting home runs in the seventh inning or later twice in one series.
- ▶ Recorded his 2,500th hit with a fifth-inning single in 9/2 win at Baltimore, becoming the 78th player all time to reach the hit total...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau* - at the age of 34 years, 37 days old - became the third-youngest player to reach the 2,500H plateau in the Expansion era, behind Hank Aaron (33 years, 127 days) and Robin Yount (33 years, 289 days)...among active players, only teammate Derek Jeter (1,999G) collected his 2,500th hit in fewer games than him (2,141G).
- ▶ Was ejected for the fifth time in 9/13 win vs. Baltimore in the middle of the fifth by Marty Foster for arguing balls and strikes.
- ▶ Homered twice in the sixth inning of the Yankees' regular season finale win at Tampa Bay on 10/4, with a three-run home run and a grand slam...the 7RBI marked the most in a single inning by an American Leaguer...became the second player in the modern era (since 1900) to drive in seven-or-more runs in an inning (also Fernando Tatís—8RBI on 4/23/99 vs. Los Angeles-NL)...became just the third player in the last 55 years (since 1955) to collect at least 7RBI in a season finale, joining Philadelphia's Dick Allen (7RBI in 1968) and Minnesota's Kirby Puckett (7RBI in 1994 on the day before the strike took effect)...became the 10th player since 1900 to hit two home runs in one inning, one of which was a grand slam...was the second time in his career he has homered twice in the same inning (also 9/5/07 vs. Seattle, marking the sixth time a Yankee has homered twice in the same frame and becoming the first Yankee to accomplish the feat twice in pinstripes).
- ▶ Hit .365 (19-for-52) with 15R, 5 doubles, 6HR and 18RBI in the postseason, leading the team in average, runs, home runs, RBI and tying for tops in doubles...hit three game-tying HR in the seventh inning or later in the 2009 postseason, the most such HR ever for a player in their postseason career (credit: *Elias*)...hit ninth-inning, two-run home run (off Joe Nathan) to tie game in Game 2 win of ALDS vs. Minnesota and solo HR (off Carl Pavano) to tie game in seventh inning of Game 3 ALDS clincher at Minnesota...tied the game with a solo HR (off Brian Fuentes) in the 11th inning of ALCS Game 2 win vs. Los Angeles-AL...matched Bernie Williams (6HR in 1996) for the most HR in a single postseason in franchise history, and was 1HR shy of tying the AL record (7-ANA Troy Glaus-2002 and TB B.J. Upton-2008)...his solo HR on 10/31/09 in Game 4 of World Series at Philadelphia became the first playoff homer to be reviewed by video replay.
- ▶ Drove in a run in 11 games and set a franchise record with 18RBI, falling one RBI shy of the all-time postseason record shared by Sandy Alomar, Jr. (1997, CLE), Scott Spiezio (2002, ANA) and David Ortiz (2004, BOS)...eight of his RBI tied the game or put the Yankees ahead...drove in at least one run in eight straight playoff games from 10/8/07 (ALDS Game 4)-10/20/09 (ALCS Game 4), matching the all-time record, (also Lou Gehrig and Ryan Howard)...joined Boston's David Ortiz (2004) as the only two players to record three game-tying or go-ahead RBI hits in the ninth inning or later in a single postseason.
- ▶ Collected 11 extra-base hits in the 2009 playoffs, tying six others - including teammate Hideki Matsui (2004) - for most in a single postseason (credit: *Elias*)...was hit by a pitch three times in the World Series, tying Pittsburgh's Max Carey (1925) and teammate Mark Teixeira (2009) for the all-time record.
- ▶ Won the Babe Ruth Award from the New York Chapter of the Baseball Writers Association of America as the postseason MVP.

## 2008

- ▶ Hit .302 (154-for-510) with 104R, 33 doubles, 35HR, 103RBI and 18SB in 138 games with the Yankees (131 starts at 3B, seven at DH).
- ▶ Led the American League with a .573 slugging percentage, ranked third with 35HR and a 14.6 AB/HR ratio, fourth with 14HBP, tied for fifth with 104R, fifth with a .392 on-base percentage, seventh with a .316 average vs. right-handed pitchers and a .339 day batting average, tied for eighth with 103RBI, ninth with a 5.0 AB/RBI ratio and 10th with a .324 home batting average...finished eighth in AL MVP voting.
- ▶ According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, recorded his fourth consecutive season (2005-08) of hitting 20-or-more home runs at the original Yankee Stadium...only Babe Ruth (six straight seasons) had a longer such stretch in original Yankee Stadium history (1926-31)...batted .324 (60-for-185) with 17HR and 47RBI in his last 50 games at the original Yankee Stadium beginning 6/7.
- ▶ Was named to his 12th All-Star team, marking his 11th selection via the fan vote and fifth overall selection as a third baseman...tallied the most votes in the Majors (3,934,518) for the second straight season, becoming the first back-to-back leader since Ichiro Suzuki (three seasons, 2001-03)...was 0-for-2 in the 15-inning AL victory on 7/15 at Yankee Stadium, starting at 3B.
- ▶ Following the season, was named to the 2008 *Sporting News* AL All-Star team, which was selected by a panel of 41 general managers and assistant general managers from both leagues...also earned his 10th career Silver Slugger Award.
- ▶ Made his fifth straight Opening Day start at 3B for the Yankees—the 13th OD start of his career—and was 2-for-3 with 1R, 1 double, 1RBI and 1BB in 4/1 win vs. Toronto...started his fifth straight Opening Day at third base with Derek Jeter at shortstop, becoming the first pair of Yankees to start on the left side of the infield in five consecutive years since Graig Nettles and Bucky Dent started six consecutive from 1977-82.
- ▶ Was 0-for-4 in 4/8 loss at Kansas City, striking out a career-high-tying four times for the fourth time in his career (third as a Yankee, first since 8/25/06 at Los Angeles-AL).
- ▶ Was placed on the 15-day D.L. from 4/30-5/20 with a strained right quadriceps (missed 16 team games, Yankees were 6-10)...was his first stint on the disabled list since 7/8-24/00 (w/ Seattle) when he missed 15 games with a right knee strain...originally injured his quad running out a ground ball on 4/20 at Baltimore...missed three games from 4/22-24 (spent three days from 4/21-23 in Miami, Fla., welcoming the birth of his second daughter, Ella Alexander, on 4/21)...returned to the lineup on 4/25 and played in four games before being removed for PH (Damon) in the eighth inning of 4/28 win at Cleveland (left game with discomfort in his right quad).
- ▶ In his final 114 games of the season after returning from the D.L. on 5/20, hit .305 (128-for-419) with 90R, 26 doubles, 31HR, 92RBI, 59BB and 17SB...the Yankees were 68-46 (.596) over the stretch as he led the AL in home runs and ranked third in runs and RBI...was the third-highest winning percentage in the AL following his return.
- ▶ Hit two-run HR on 5/20 vs. Baltimore and solo-HR on 5/21 vs. Baltimore, becoming the first player to homer in each of his first two games after spending at least three weeks on the D.L. since Chris Richard from 7/31-8/1/02 with Baltimore (credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*).

- ▶ Hit game-winning solo-HR in the 12th—his 200th homer as a Yankee—and was 1-for-6 on 8/12 at Minnesota...became the 15th player in franchise history to reach 200 home runs with the Yankees, including two others who did it within the previous month: Derek Jeter (7/12) and Jason Giambi (8/9)...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, it marked the first time that any set of teammates on one club accomplished the feat in the same season...*Elias* also notes that Rodriguez became the second-fastest Yankee to reach 200HR, doing so in 729 games with the club (Babe Ruth reached 200HR with the Yankees in 586 games).
- ▶ Grounded into 11 double plays in the month of August, the most in a single month in franchise history since GDPs were first recorded in the American League in 1939 (credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*).
- ▶ His solo-HR on 9/2 at Tampa Bay was the 1,000th extra-base hit of his career, coming at the age of 33 years, 37 days...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, only Jimmie Foxx (32 years, 294 days on 8/13/40) reached the milestone at a younger age.
- ▶ Hit grand-slam-HR in the first inning and was 2-for-4 with 2R and 1 double in 9/14 win vs. Tampa Bay...according to *Elias*, became the first Yankees cleanup hitter to hit a grand slam after the first three batters of the game reached base since Mel Hall on 6/24/89 at Kansas City and the first such Yankee at Yankee Stadium since Dave Winfield on 7/16/84 vs. Texas.

## 2007

- ▶ Won his third career American League MVP Award and his second in four seasons with the Yankees, hitting .314 (183-for-583) with 143R, 54HR, 156RBI and 245B in 158 games (154 starts at 3B, four starts at DH)...established career highs in runs and RBI...received 26-of-28 first-place votes in BBWAA MVP voting (382 total points)...became the ninth player in Major League history to win at least three MVP Awards and fifth AL player...became the sixth player to win multiple MVPs with the Yankees, joining Lou Gehrig (two), Joe DiMaggio (three), Mickey Mantle (three), Yogi Berra (three) and Roger Maris (two)...became just the fourth player to win the MVP Award three times within a five-year span, joining Roy Campanella, Berra and Barry Bonds.
- ▶ Was elected to the 2007 AL All-Star team, the 11th All-Star selection of his career (1996-98; 2000-07)...was the first time he led the Majors in All-Star balloting (3,890,515 votes)...started at 3B and went 1-for-3 in the 7/10 American League win...also named "Major League Player of the Year" by *Baseball America* and the *Sporting News* and was named starting 3B on each publication's All-Star team...became just the third player in the 72-year history of the *Sporting News* Award to win at least three times, joining Ted Williams (five) and Barry Bonds (three)...received his ninth career Silver Slugger Award, fourth career Hank Aaron Award, the Oscar Charleston Legacy Award and Josh Gibson Award presented by the Negro Leagues Baseball Museum, and was named the MLB.com "Clutch Performer of the Year," This Week in Baseball's "Hitter of the Year" and the Latinosports.com "2007 Latino MVP Player of the Year"...was also named the Sid Mercer "Player of the Year" by the New York chapter of the BBWAA and was selected by his peers as the Players Choice 2007 "Player of the Year" and the American League's "Outstanding Player"...was named American League "Player of the Week" three times in 2007 (4/2-9, 6/4-10 and 9/3-9).
- ▶ Led the Majors in runs, home runs and RBI...since RBI became an official statistic in 1920, became only the fourth player (and the first in the past 50 years) to finish a season with the outright Major League lead in each of those categories, according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*: Babe Ruth (three times: 1920-21, 1926), Ted Williams (1942-also won Triple Crown) and Mickey Mantle (1956-also won Triple Crown)...also led the Major Leagues with a .645 slugging percentage and an average of 1RBI every 3.7 at-bats...tied for the lead with three grand slams.
- ▶ Led the American League with 376 total bases, ranked second with 85 extra-base hits, 21HBP and 1HR/10.8AB, fourth with a .422 on-base percentage, tied for fourth with nine sacrifice flies, seventh with a .326 road batting average and a .340 day average, tied for seventh with 95BB and eighth with a .327 average vs. right-handed pitching.
- ▶ Hit .463 (19-for-41) with 8HR, 21RBI, 9BB and 7K in the ninth inning of games, leading the Majors in ninth-inning homers...tied Philadelphia's Ryan Howard and Houston's Lance Berkman for the Major League lead with 22HR that tied the game or put his team ahead (credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*).
- ▶ Became the fifth player in Major League history to have 140R, 50HR and 150RBI in a season, joining Sammy Sosa (2001), Jimmie Foxx (1932), Hack Wilson (1930) and Babe Ruth (1921, '27) and the first to also record 20SB...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, is only the fourth player to post two seasons of at least 50HR, 130R and 130RBI (2001, '07)...Babe Ruth accomplished the feat four times; Jimmie Foxx and Sammy Sosa both did it twice.

- ▶ With 54HR, established the Yankees franchise record for most home runs in a single season by a right-handed batter...were the most by any Yankees player since Roger Maris (61HR in 1961) and were tied for the fourth-highest single-season total in franchise history...the Yankees were 35-11 in games in which he homered.
- ▶ Established the Major League record for most home runs in a single season by a third baseman with 52 homers (hit two as DH), surpassing Mike Schmidt (48 with Philadelphia in 1980) and Adrian Beltre (48 with Los Angeles-NL in 2004).
- ▶ Finished with 26HR at home, tying his own record (established in 2005) for the most home runs in a single season at Yankee Stadium by a right-handed batter...Yankees were 21-2 in games in which he homered at Yankee Stadium...hit 28HR on the road...only four Yankees have hit more road homers in a single-season: Babe Ruth in 1927 (32), Roger Maris in 1961 (31), Mickey Mantle in 1961 (30) and Jason Giambi in 2003 (29).
- ▶ His 156RBI were the most by a Yankee in a single season since 1937 when Joe DiMaggio had 167 and Lou Gehrig had 159...was the second-highest single-season total by a right-handed hitter in franchise history behind only DiMaggio's 167 in 1937...the total also ranks 10th on the Yankees' all-time single-season list and were the most in the American League since Manny Ramirez in 1999 with Cleveland (165RBI)...drove in 111 runs in his final 105 games of the season...became the first Yankee to record multiple seasons of at least 130RBI (2005, '07) since Joe DiMaggio accomplished the feat in 1937, '38, '40 and '48 (credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*).
- ▶ His 143 runs scored were the highest single-season total in the American League since the Yankees' Rickey Henderson scored 146 runs in 1985 and was the second-highest single-season total by a Yankee in the last 70 years (since 1938).
- ▶ Drove in 100 runs through the club's first 99 games of the season...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, became the first Yankee to reach the 100-RBI mark in fewer than 100 "team games" into a season since 1937, when both Joe DiMaggio (91 games) and Lou Gehrig (96 games) did so.
- ▶ His 24 stolen bases were the most for any player from the cleanup spot in the batting order since Preston Wilson stole 36 bases from that spot for the 2000 Marlins...became just the fourth player all-time to record at least 50HR and at least 20SB in a single season, joining Willie Mays (1955, New York Giants), Brady Anderson (1996, Baltimore) and Ken Griffey, Jr. (1998, Seattle).
- ▶ Hit two-run HR—his third career Opening Day home run and second as a Yankee—and was 2-for-5 with 2R and 1SB in 4/2 win vs. Tampa Bay...was his fourth straight Opening Day start at 3B for the Yankees and 12th Opening Day start of his career.
- ▶ Hit two-run HR and "walk-off" grand slam in the ninth inning in 4/7 win vs. Baltimore, and was 3-for-4 with 4R, 1 double and 1BB...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, became the third player in franchise history to hit a game-ending grand slam with the Yankees trailing when they came to the plate: also Jason Giambi on 5/27/02 vs. Minnesota and Babe Ruth in 1925...marked only the eighth time in franchise history that the Yankees won a game with a "walk-off" grand slam and the first since Giambi in 2002...was his third career "walk-off" grand slam (also on 7/27/02 w/ Texas vs. Oakland and 7/31/03 w/ Texas vs. Boston).
- ▶ According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, became only the second player in AL history to hit six home runs through his team's first seven games, joining Ken Griffey, Jr. (1997)...became the first player in Yankees franchise history to hit 7HR in the team's first 10 games of the season and 8HR in the first 12 games...hit 12HR in the first 15 games of the season, joining Mike Schmidt (12HR in the first 15 games of 1976) as the fastest players in Major League history to reach 12 home runs...drove in 31 runs in the first 16 games of the season, the most of any Major Leaguer over any 16-game span since Sammy Sosa had 32 in May/June 1998.
- ▶ Drove in 16 runs in his first eight games of the season (4/2-11), the most RBI for any AL player through his club's first eight games of a season since Minnesota's Brant Alyea in 1970 (credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*).
- ▶ According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, became the first player in Yankees history (and the only Major Leaguer since 1958) to collect an extra-base hit in each of his team's first eight games of a season...his streak of 11 straight regular season games with an extra base hit (dating back to 2006) was the longest for any player in franchise history, breaking the mark of 10 straight shared by Don Mattingly (1987) and Paul O'Neill (2001).
- ▶ Hit three-run "walk-off" HR in the ninth inning—his third home run in a three-game span—and was 1-for-5 in 4/19 win vs. Cleveland...was his second "walk-off" home run of the season (also 4/7 vs. Baltimore) and seventh of his career (fourth as a Yankee)...according to *Elias*, became the fourth player in Major League history to hit two "walk-off" home runs so early in the season (through his team's first 14 games), joining Pat Burrell (nine games in 2002), Robin Yount (12 games in 1991) and Tommy Henrich (12 games in 1949)...is only the third player in Yankees history to hit a pair of "walk-off" homers within a span of five home games at any point in a season, joining Babe Ruth (August 1922) and Claudell Washington (September 1988) who each hit two "walk-off" home runs in three-game spans.

- ▶ In his 18th game, on 4/23 at Tampa Bay, became the fastest player in Major League history to reach 14HR to begin a season (previous record was held by Albert Pujols, who hit 14HR in the first 24 games of 2006)...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, only two players hit more than 14HR over an 18-game span for their team at any point during a season: Sammy Sosa in 1998 (16) and Barry Bonds in 2001 (15)...three others also hit 14 over a period of 18 games (Rudy York, 1937 Tigers; Albert Belle, 1995 Indians; and Mark McGwire, 1998 Cardinals).
- ▶ Began the season with an 18-game hitting streak, the longest hitting streak by an American Leaguer to start a season since George Brett hit safely in his first 19 games of the 1983 season...dating back to 2006, hit safely in a career-high 23 straight games.
- ▶ Was named the AL "Player of the Month" for April, hitting .355 (33-for-93) and leading the Majors with 14HR, 34RBI and 27R in 23 games...tied the mark for most home runs hit in April (also Albert Pujols in 2006) and finished 1RBI shy of Juan Gonzalez's Major League record for April (35) set in 1998 with Texas...with 14HR, fell 1HR shy of tying a career high for any calendar month (15HR with Texas in August 2003)...established a single-month career high with 34RBI (previous high was 31RBI with Texas in August 2003)...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, became the first player in Major League history to record at least 14HR and 34RBI by the end of April.
- ▶ Became the first Yankee with at least 14HR and 34RBI in any calendar month since Roger Maris in June 1961 (15HR, 35RBI)...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, the only other Yankees with more home runs in a calendar month were Babe Ruth, who did it four times (17 in September 1927; 15 in May 1928, August 1929 and June 1930), Joe DiMaggio (15 in July 1937) and Mickey Mantle (16 in May 1956)...only Harmon Killebrew (15 with the Washington Senators in May 1959) has hit more home runs in any calendar month all time among Major League third basemen.
- ▶ Went 47 consecutive games without committing an error from 5/30-7/23, the longest errorless streak by a Yankees third baseman since he went 61 straight games without an error from 6/23-9/1/05.
- ▶ Hit game-winning solo-HR in the ninth and was 2-for-5 with 2RBI in 6/3 win at Boston...was his second ninth-inning, game-winning home run at Fenway Park since joining the Yankees (also 7/14/05 off Curt Schilling)...over the last 20 years, only two other Yankees have hit a game-winning homer in the ninth inning at Fenway: Bernie Williams and Alfonso Soriano (one each in 2001)...hit grand slam in the ninth—his third ninth-inning homer of the road trip—and was 2-for-4 with 11BB in 6/7 win at Chicago-AL...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, became the second player in Yankees history to hit two grand slams in the ninth inning or later in the same season, joining Darryl Strawberry who hit two pinch-hit grand slams in 1998.
- ▶ Was named the AL "Player of the Month" for June, his second "Player of the Month" Award in 2007, fifth as a Yankee and ninth of his career—the most among American Leaguers...led the AL with 28R, 9HR, 34RBI, a .773 slugging percentage and a .496 on-base percentage, while ranking fourth with a .402 batting average...his 34RBI tied his personal best for any calendar month of his career, which he set in April, and were the most by any Yankee in June since Roger Maris (35RBI) in 1961...no Yankee had posted as high of calendar-month numbers in average, home runs and RBI in over 50 years since Mickey Mantle batted .414 with 16HR and 35RBI in May 1956.
- ▶ Missed his first game of the season in 7/5 win vs. Minnesota (strained left hamstring)...was the only Yankee to start each of the first 81 games of 2007.
- ▶ Set personal highs for home runs (30) and RBI (86) before the All-Star break...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, Lou Gehrig (90 in 1934) is the only player in franchise history to have as many RBI at the break...was the first Yankee to lead the Majors in home runs at the All-Star break since Roger Maris in 1961 (33HR)...led the Major Leagues in runs (79), HR (30) and RBI (86) at the All-Star break, becoming the first player in the Majors to accomplish the feat since the Yankees' Mickey Mantle in 1956 (credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*)...also reached the All-Star break with 20HR for the Major League-record seventh consecutive season.
- ▶ Hit three-run HR in the first inning—the 500th of his career—and was 3-for-4 with 3R, 1BB and 1SB in 8/4 win vs. Kansas City...became the 22nd player in Major League history to reach the 500-HR plateau...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, became the youngest player to hit 500 career home runs (32 years, 8 days), surpassing Jimmie Foxx (32 years, 338 days)...became the third player to hit his 500th home run as a Yankee (also Babe Ruth and Mickey Mantle) and only the second to hit his 500th at Yankee Stadium (Mantle on 5/14/67 off Baltimore's Stu Miller)...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, is one of only two players with at least 500 career HR to have hit 100 or more with three different teams (Seattle-189; Yankees-208; Texas-156), joining Reggie Jackson (Oakland-269; Yankees-144; California-123)...went 28AB between home runs #499 and #500...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, that tied Mickey Mantle for the third-longest homerless streak between #499 and #500 (Jimmie Foxx-61AB, Harmon Killebrew-43AB).
- ▶ His 44HR were the most for a Yankee through the end of August since 1961, when Roger Maris and Mickey Mantle began September with 51 and 48 home runs, respectively (credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*)...hit solo-HR and two-run HR in the seventh inning and was 2-for-3 with 1BB in 9/5 win vs. Seattle...hit two home runs in the same inning for the first time in his career becoming the fourth Yankee to accomplish the feat (first since Cliff Johnson in the eighth inning on 6/30/77 at Toronto).
- ▶ Hit two-run HR and was 2-for-5 with 2R in 9/9 win at Kansas City, homering in his fifth consecutive game (7HR overall) from 9/4-9/9, tying a career high (also 8/11-16/99 and 8/17-21/03)...was the first Yankee to homer in five straight games since Tino Martinez did so from 5/7-11/05...joined Albert Pujols as the only Major Leaguers to homer in at least five straight games in 2007.

- ▶ On 9/28 at Baltimore, became the second player in Major League history (since RBI became an official statistic in 1920) to reach 1,500 career runs and 1,500 career RBI in the same game...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, Houston's Jeff Bagwell reached both milestones on 9/18/04 vs. Milwaukee...became the third-youngest player to reach 1,500 career RBI, behind Jimmie Foxx and Lou Gehrig (credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*)...hit his 54th and final home run of the season in the game, going 3-for-5...came in his 1,903rd career game, marking the fourth-fewest games needed to reach the plateaus since 1920 (when RBIs became an official statistic) behind Lou Gehrig (1,715 games), Ted Williams (1,761) and Jimmie Foxx (1,850).
- ▶ Batted .267 (4-for-15) in four Division Series games vs. Cleveland with 1HR and 1RBI.

## 2006

- ▶ In his third season with the Yankees, hit .290 (166-for-572) with 113R, 35HR, 121RBI and 15SB in 154 games (148 starts at 3B, three at DH)...ranked fourth in the American League in RBI, fifth in runs scored and a .340 average vs. lefthanders, seventh with 139 strikeouts, eighth with 90BB, tied for eighth in home runs and ninth with 1RBI every 4.7 at bats...was elected to the 2006 American League All-Star team, the 10th All-Star selection of his career (1996-98; 2000-06)...started at 3B and was 0-for-2 in the American League's 3-2 victory on 7/11.
- ▶ In 4/3 Opening Day win at Oakland, hit the 12th grand slam of his career...was the fourth grand slam by a Yankee on Opening Day (also Russ Derry on 4/17/45 vs. Boston; Bobby Murcer on 4/9/81 vs. Texas; and Alfonso Soriano on 3/31/03 at Toronto)...became the 56th Yankee to hit a home run on Opening Day...made his third straight Opening Day start at 3B for the Yankees and the 11th of his career...hit two-run HR and solo-HR and scored a season-high four runs in 5/27 win vs. Kansas City.
- ▶ Was named AL "Player of the Month" for May...reached base safely in 25 of 28 games during the month, batting .330 (36-for-109) with 8HR while tying Boston's David Ortiz and Cleveland's Travis Hafner for the AL lead with 28RBI...finished the month with a nine-game hitting streak...was his seventh career "Player of the Month" Award, third as a Yankee, and marked the second consecutive year he won the award for the month of May.
- ▶ Missed two games (6/2-3) at Baltimore with a stomach virus...hit two-run "walk-off" home run (#16) in the 12th inning and was 2-for-5 with 3RBI and 1BB in 6/28 win vs. Atlanta...was the fifth "walk-off" home run of his career and first since 8/4/04 vs. Oakland...was also the first by a Yankee to end an extra-inning game when trailing since 5/17/02 when Jason Giambi hit a 14th-inning grand slam to give the Yankees a 13-12 win vs. Minnesota...the home run was the 100th of his career as a Yankee, making him the third player in Major League history to record at least 100 home runs with three different teams (also 189HR with Seattle, 156 with Texas)...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, Reggie Jackson (269 with KC/Oakland A's, 144 with the Yankees and 123 with California) and Darrell Evans (131 with Atlanta, 142 with San Francisco and 141 with Detroit) also accomplished the feat.
- ▶ In 7/17 win vs. Seattle, committed three errors in a single game for the first time in his career...hit a three-run home run in 7/21 loss at Toronto, six days shy of his 31st birthday, becoming only the eighth player in Major League history to accumulate 2,000 hits before age 31, according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*...joined Ty Cobb (29), Rogers Hornsby (29), Met Ott (30), Hank Aaron (30), Joe Medwick (30), Jimmie Foxx (30) and Robin Yount (30)...was also his 450th career home run and at 30 years, 359 days old, became the youngest player in Major League history to reach the 450 mark, surpassing Ken Griffey Jr. who was 31 years, 261 days old when he hit his 450th career home run on 8/9/01.
- ▶ Was named the AL "Player of the Week" for the week of 8/28-9/3...hit solo-HR and three-run HR and was 3-for-5 with 5RBI in 9/3 win vs. Minnesota...was his fourth multi-home run game of the season and second in a three-game span (also 9/1 vs. Minnesota)...missed two games (9/9-10 at Baltimore) with a stomach virus...made only two errors in his final 34 games at third base (8/19-9/30)...hit .071 (1-for-14) in four Division Series games vs. Detroit.

## 2005

- ▶ Captured his second career American League Most Valuable Player Award, hitting .321 (194-for-605) and leading the American League with 124R and 48HR while driving in 130 runs in 162 games with the Yankees (161 starts at 3B, one start at DH)...became the first Yankee to win the AL home run title since Reggie Jackson (41) in 1980.
- ▶ Led the AL with a .610 slugging percentage, tied for the lead with 162 games played, ranked second with a .321 batting average, .351 home batting average, .421 on-base percentage and 369 total bases, third with 91 walks, 139 strikeouts and a .327 average vs. right-handed pitching, fourth with 130RBI and 78 extra-base hits, tied for fifth with 16HBP, tied for sixth with 194H, and tied for eighth with 53 multi-hit games...joined Willie Mays (New York Giants, 1955), Barry Bonds (San Francisco Giants, 1993) and Larry Walker (Colorado Rockies, 1997) as the only players to bat .300, hit 45 or more home runs and steal 20 or more bases in a single season.
- ▶ Was elected to the 2005 American League All-Star team, the ninth All-Star selection of his career (1996-98; 2000-05)...started at 3B and was 1-for-2 with 1R and 1BB...also earned his eighth career Louisville Slugger "Silver Slugger" Award.

- ▶ Established the franchise record for most home runs in a single season by a right-handed batter (later passed with 54HR in 2007), breaking Joe DiMaggio's mark of 46 set in 1937...his 48 home runs were the most by any Yankee since Roger Maris hit 61 and Mickey Mantle hit 54 in 1961...hit 26 home runs at Yankee Stadium in 2005, establishing the single-season club record for right-handed batters (previous record was 19HR by Joe DiMaggio in 1937 and Gary Sheffield in 2004)...with Hideki Matsui, became the first pair of Yankees to each play in every game in the same season since 1945, when Nick Etten and Snuffy Stirnweiss accomplished the feat for the second straight year (credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*)...committed 12 errors in his second season at third base and only two over his last 91 games of the season...among third basemen with 400 or more chances, only the Rangers' Hank Blalock (11) had fewer errors.
- ▶ On 4/5 vs. Boston, became only the second player to hit a HR into the black "batter's-eye" section of remodeled original Yankee Stadium both as a Yankee and as an opponent (also 8/17/96 w/ Seattle), joining Tony Clark.
- ▶ Hit a three-run HR in the first inning, a two-run HR in the third and a grand slam in the fourth and was 4-for-5 with a career-high 10RBI in 4/26 win vs. the Angels (all HR off Bartolo Colon)...was the 38th multi-homer game of his career and his second of the season (was his third three-home run game and first since 8/17/02 with Texas vs. Toronto)...became the 19th Yankee to hit three home runs in a single regular season game and the first since Tony Clark on 8/28/04 at Toronto (24th time overall)...his 10RBI were the most by a Yankee since Tony Lazzeri established the franchise- and American League record with 11 in a 25-2 win at Philadelphia on 5/24/36 (the Major League record for RBI in a single game is 12 by the Cardinals' Jim Bottomley on 9/16/24 and the Cardinals' Mark Whiten on 9/7/93)...became the 11th player in Major League history to drive in at least 10 runs in a game and the first since Boston's Nomar Garciaparra on 5/10/99 vs. Seattle...became the first and only player ever to accomplish the feat at the original Yankee Stadium.
- ▶ Became the first player to hit eight home runs at Yankee Stadium in April (in a single season)...the previous record was five (by Lou Gehrig in 1933 and Paul O'Neill in 2001)...was named co-winner of the AL's "Player of the Week" award (with White Sox pitcher Jon Garland) for the week ending 5/1...was his ninth career "Player of the Week" Award...was named the AL "Player of the Month" for May...reached base safely in 10 straight plate appearances from 5/26-29.
- ▶ Had his fourth multi-home-run game of the season in 6/8 win at Milwaukee, the 40th of his career (37th 2HR game)...the two home runs were the 399th and 400th home runs of his career...at 29 years, 316 days old, became the youngest player in Major League history to reach the 400 mark...became the sixth player to hit his 400th career home run as a Yankee, joining Babe Ruth (on 9/2/27 at Philadelphia), Lou Gehrig (on 7/10/36 vs. Cleveland), Mickey Mantle (on 9/10/62 at Detroit), Reggie Jackson (on 8/11/80 vs. Chicago) and Gary Sheffield (on 7/27/04 at Toronto).
- ▶ Hit a solo-HR—his second in as many games—and was 1-for-3 with 1HP in 8/26 win vs. Kansas City...his home run was his second "batter's eye" home run of the season (also 4/5 vs. Boston) and the third of his career (also on 8/17/96 with Seattle), tying Danny Tartabull and Bernie Williams for the most by any player.
- ▶ Named AL "Player of the Month" for August...went 61 consecutive games without committing an error from 6/23-9/2...was the longest such streak by an AL third baseman since Boston's John Valentin in 1998 (65 games)...hit solo-HR and was 4-for-5 with 2R and 1 double in AL East-clinching win on 10/1 at Boston...hit six home runs against the Red Sox in 2005, the most by any Yankee since Mickey Mantle hit six in 1964...hit .133 (2-for-15) with 6BB in five Division Series games vs. Los Angeles-AL.

## 2004

- ▶ In his first season with the Yankees, batted .286 (172-for-601) with 112R, 36HR, 106RBI and a team-high 28SB in 155 games (155 starts at 3B)...ranked fifth in the American League in runs and stolen bases, was tied for sixth in home runs, was ninth with 80BB and ranked 10th with 308TB...was elected to the 2004 American League All-Star team, the eighth All-Star selection of his career (1996-98; 2000-04)...started at 3B and was 1-for-3 with an RBI triple in the American League's 9-4 win on 7/13 at Houston's Minute Maid Park.
- ▶ With three-run HR in 5/4 win at Oakland, became the 70th player to reach 350 career home runs and, at 28 years, 282 days old, also became the youngest player ever to reach the 350 mark (previous youngest to reach 350 home runs was Ken Griffey, Jr., who was 28 years, 308 days old)...with his 4RBI on 5/4, he reached 1,001 in his career to become the third-youngest player ever to reach the 1,000 RBI plateau (behind only Mel Ott, 27 years, 94 days; and Jimmie Foxx, 27 years, 236 days)...reached base safely in a career-high 53 consecutive games from 4/18-6/18 (longest previous such streak was 37 straight games from 4/6-6/22/99 w/ Seattle)...was the longest such streak in the Major Leagues in 2004 and the longest by a Yankee within a single season since Derek Jeter reached base safely in the first 53 games of the 1999 season.
- ▶ Hit three-run HR and two-run HR and collected a season-high 5RBI in 6/22 win at Baltimore, his second multi-home-run game of the season (also 5/15 vs. Seattle) and the 35th of his career...was successful in 17 straight stolen-base attempts from 4/20-6/29, the longest such streak of his career...hit two solo home runs in 7/15 win at Detroit, his third multi-homer game of the season and the 36th of his career...was 0-for-1 with 1R and 1HBP before being ejected (fighting) in the top of the third inning of 7/24 loss at Boston.

- ▶ Had 369 career home runs before his 29th birthday, the most of any Major League player...hit two-run "walk-off" HR (#29) in the 11th inning on 8/4 vs. Oakland...was his fourth career "walk-off" HR and first since 7/31/03 (w/ Texas) vs. Boston.
- ▶ Did not play in 8/13 win at Seattle, missing his first game of the season with a viral infection...in 9/6 win vs. Tampa Bay, batted second in the lineup for the first time since 10/2/99 (w/ Seattle vs. Oakland) and was 2-for-4 with two doubles, 3RBI and 1BB...remained second in the lineup for the remainder of the season, batting .301 (28-for-93) with 19R, 3HR and 25RBI in 24 games.
- ▶ Hit .320 (16-for-50) with 11R, 3HR and 8RBI in 11 postseason games...went 4-for-6 with 3RBI in Game 2 of the Division Series, driving in the game-tying run with a 12th-inning double...with five runs scored in Game 3 of the ALCS, matched the single-game postseason record for runs scored (also Hideki Matsui in the same game)...homered in back-to-back games in the ALCS, driving in game-tying run in Game 3 and go-ahead run in Game 4.

## 2003

- ▶ Earned his first American League MVP Award, batting .298 (181-for-607) with 47HR and 118RBI in 161 games with Texas (158 starts at SS, one at DH)...was tied for the Major League lead in home runs and led the AL in HR, runs (124) and slugging percentage (.600)...ranked second in the league in RBI and total bases (364), placed third in extra base hits (83) and was eighth in walks (87) and on-base percentage (.396)...became the third player in the last 71 years to win three consecutive AL home run titles and the fifth since 1954 to top the league in homers, runs and slugging percentage in the same year...was second in the AL in go-ahead RBI (30) and tied for third in game-winning RBI (16), including three consecutive games, 8/17-19.
- ▶ Won his second consecutive Rawlings Gold Glove Award, leading all Major League shortstops with a .989 fielding percentage (8E/699TC), the highest figure in Rangers history and a career best...were the fewest errors ever for a Texas shortstop (among qualifiers) and the fewest of his career...led AL shortstops in double plays (111), tied for second in games (158), and placed third in putouts (227), assists (464) and total chances...longest errorless streak was 33 games from 6/1-7/9...won the AL Silver Slugger Award (SS) for the fifth consecutive year and seventh time overall...won third consecutive AL Hank Aaron Award as league's top offensive player and the [latinosports.com](http://latinosports.com) Latino MVP American League Award.
- ▶ Was elected as starting shortstop for seventh time on the AL All-Star team...went 1-for-3 with 1R on 7/15 at Chicago's U.S. Cellular Field...won Players' Choice Award as the American League's Outstanding Player...won the Negro Leagues Baseball Museum Oscar Charleston Legacy Award (AL MVP) and his third consecutive Josh Gibson Legacy Award (AL Home Run Leader).
- ▶ Tied Philadelphia's Jim Thome for the most home runs in the Majors, becoming the first player to lead Majors in home runs in consecutive seasons since Mark McGwire in 1998-99 and the second Ranger to accomplish the feat (Juan Gonzalez in 1992-93)...homered once every 12.9 at-bats, the AL's top ratio...had three two-homer games (4/16 vs. Anaheim, 8/28 at Kansas City and 9/20 vs. Anaheim)...connected for 10th career grand slam to win the game in the bottom of 11th inning on 7/31 vs. Boston, becoming the 11th player ever with at least two "walk-off" grand slams...tied the club record at the time with home runs in five consecutive games from 8/17-21...had 25 homers in his last 62 games beginning 7/23...led the Majors and tied the club mark for homers in a month with a career-high 15HR in August...of that total, 14 came while playing shortstop, the highest monthly total ever for a player at that position...established team mark for homers vs. an opponent with 11 against Anaheim.
- ▶ Connected for his 300th career home run off Ramon Ortiz on 4/2 at Anaheim at the age of 27 years, 249 days, becoming the youngest player in history to reach the milestone (79 days younger than Jimmie Foxx)...had 322 homers before turning 28, also the most ever by that age...homered as the DH on 8/31/03 vs. Minnesota...drove in 53 runs in last 54 games beginning 7/31...tied for the Major League lead with 31RBI in August.
- ▶ Had appeared in 546 consecutive games—the 25th longest streak in Major League history at the time—before sitting out on 9/24 at Oakland...was first missed contest since 7/23/00 with starts in 542 of those games...had played in all 482 games since joining the Rangers, a club record for consecutive contests...became the 35th player in history to appear in 500 consecutive contests on 8/5 at New York...did not start due to bruised left knee on 6/7-8 vs. Montreal in San Juan, Puerto Rico, but pinch-hit in both games...hit safely in 25 of 26 games from 7/27-8/22 with streaks of 12 (7/27-8/8) and 13 (8/10-22) games, the latter the longest by a Ranger in 2003...selected as the AL and Texas Rangers' "Player of the Month" for August.
- ▶ Tied club record and career-high with five hits on 4/27 vs. New York-AL and followed with 4H on 4/29 in Toronto, the first Ranger ever with nine hits in consecutive games...became the second youngest player ever to score 1,000 career runs at 28 years, 47 days on 9/12 vs. Oakland, topped only by the New York Giants' Mel Ott (27 years, 104 days in 1936).

## 2002

- ▶ Led the Major Leagues with 57HR, 142RBI and 389TB, the first player to lead the Majors in all three categories since Boston's Tony Armas in 1984...batted .300 (187-for-624) and finished among American League leaders in games (tied for first, 162), runs (second, 125), slugging (third, .623), extra base hits (tied for third, 86), multi-hit games (tied for sixth, 57), intentional walks (seventh, 12), on-base percentage (eighth, .392), hits (ninth), walks (ninth, 87), and at-bats (10th)...started 160 games at shortstop while setting career bests for homers, RBI, and intentional walks...selected as the Major League "Player of the Year" by the *Sporting News*.
- ▶ Had the sixth-most home runs in AL history, the most since Roger Maris' AL-record 61 in 1961, and the most ever for a shortstop for the second consecutive year...his 57 homers were tied for the 12th most ever in Major League history and were the most ever in a season for a Major League infielder other than a first baseman...was one shy of the AL record for homers in a season by a right-handed batter, shared by Jimmie Foxx in 1932 and Hank Greenberg in 1938...became just the fifth player in Major League history to post consecutive 50-homer seasons, tying the AL record for consecutive 50-homer campaigns with Babe Ruth (1920-21; 1927-28) and Ken Griffey, Jr. (1997-98).
- ▶ Became the first player to lead the Majors in homers and RBI since Detroit's Cecil Fielder in 1991...was just the third time a shortstop has ever led the Majors in homers, joining the Cubs' Ernie Banks in 1958 (47) and 1960 (41)...the only other times a shortstop has led his league in homers were both in the AL: Vern Stephens of the St. Louis Browns in 1945 (24) and Rodriguez in 2001 (52)...was the first shortstop to lead the Majors in RBI since Banks in both 1958 and 1959 and the sixth all-time, also joining Pittsburgh's Honus Wagner in 1908 and Vern Stephens, then with the Boston Red Sox in 1949 and 1950 (tied both years)...Stephens (three times, also with the Browns in 1944) is the only other shortstop to top the AL in RBI...became first shortstop to lead Majors in total bases since Ripken (368) in 1991...led the AL in total bases for the second consecutive year, the first player to do so since Belle in 1994 and 1995...his 109 homers in 2001-02 are the most ever by an American League player in consecutive seasons.
- ▶ His postseason honors included his first Rawlings Gold Glove and his second consecutive Rangers "Player of the Year" Award...named Major League "Player of the Year" by players in MLBPA Players Choice Award voting and by *Baseball America*...won second consecutive AL Hank Aaron Award as league's top offensive player as well as his second consecutive Josh Gibson Legacy Award from the Negro Leagues Baseball Museum (NLBM) for winning the AL home run crown...finished second in BBWAA AL MVP voting to Oakland's Miguel Tejada (21 first place votes and 356 points) with five first place votes and 254 points.
- ▶ Selected to AL Silver Slugger team for fifth consecutive year and sixth time overall...named as shortstop on *Baseball America* Major League All-Star team and AL All-Star squad selected by the *Sporting News*.
- ▶ Hit 250th career home run on 4/30 at Toronto at 26 years, 277 days of age, the second youngest ever to reach the figure behind Foxx (26 yrs., 269 days)...had Texas-record 10 multi-homer games, one shy of the Major League mark shared by Hank Greenberg (1938) and Sammy Sosa (1998)...tied club record with three homers on 8/17 vs. Toronto, the 11th time that had been done in Rangers history...joined Ernie Banks, Nomar Garciaparra and Miguel Tejada as only shortstops with two three-homer contests.
- ▶ Was the AL "Player of the Month" for both July (.349, 12 HR, 27 RBI) and August (.339, 12 HR, 27 RBI), the first player to win that honor in consecutive months since Cleveland's Albert Belle in August and September, 1995...named the AL "Player of the Week" for 7/11-14 and 8/12-18 (shared with Bernie Williams).

## 2001

- ▶ In his first season with Texas, batted .318 (201-for-632) with 52HR and 135RBI in 162 games...led the American League in homers, runs (133) and total bases (393)...tied for the league lead in games and extra-base hits (87), ranked third in RBI, slugging percentage (.622), tied for third in hit by pitches (16), and was also among the AL leaders in hits (fourth), at-bats (sixth), multi-hit games (sixth, 55), sacrifice flies (tied for sixth, 9), average (seventh) and on-base percentage (eighth, .399)...established Rangers club records for homers, runs, total bases and hit by pitches, had the second most extra-base hits, and the fourth-highest RBI total...became the fourth player, first since 1932, with 50 homers and 200 hits in a season.
- ▶ Was named the Rangers' "Player of the Year" and finished sixth in BBWAA AL MVP voting...named as shortstop on *Baseball America* Major League All-Star team and AL All-Star squad as selected by the *Sporting News*...named the Rangers' "Player of the Month" for May and was a two-time selection as AL "Player of the Week," 4/9-15 and 9/17-23...his .318 average was the second highest of his career since his .358 in 1996...led the AL with a .361 (113-for-313) home average, ranked sixth with a .323 (162-for-501) mark vs. right-handers, and was seventh with a .329 (48-146) average in day games...tied club record with three doubles on 4/7 vs. Seattle...singled for 1,000th hit on 5/5 vs. Chicago-Al.

**2000**

- ▶ Batted .316 (175-for-554) with a career-high 134R, 41HR and 132RBI in 148 games (148 starts at SS) in his final season with the Mariners...was second in the AL in runs scored and ranked among the league leaders in homers (tied for fourth), sacrifice flies (tied for fourth, 11), slugging percentage (fifth, .606), RBI (sixth), extra-base hits (sixth, 77), total bases (tied for sixth, 336), on-base percentage (seventh, .420), walks (10th, 100) and average (15th)...led Seattle in runs, total bases, homers, and sacrifice flies...had AL's third-highest road average at .356 (103-for-289) and .370 (34-for-92) mark vs. left-handers was fourth-best...set a career-high with 100BB...joined Edgar Martinez (three consecutive years from 1995-97) as the only Mariners to have a .300 average with 100R, 100RBI and 100BB in one season.
- ▶ Selected as the Major League "Player of the Year" by *Baseball America*, finished third in AL MVP voting and was named Seattle's MVP by local BBWAA chapter...selected as shortstop on the Major League All-Star teams of the Associated Press and *Baseball America*, as well as the *Sporting News'* AL All-Star squad...named the AL "Player of the Week" for the week of 4/10-16...sustained a concussion while trying to break up a double play on 7/7 vs. Los Angeles-AL...also strained his right knee in the collision and was placed on 15-day disabled list on 7/14 (retroactive to 7/8)...missed 13 games with the injury...activated on 7/24...walked a club-record five times on 4/23 vs. Kansas City and tied team mark with five runs scored on 4/16 at Texas, establishing career-highs in both categories.

**1999**

- ▶ Despite missing 32 games while on the disabled list with a left knee injury, batted .285 (143-for-502) with 42HR and 111RBI in 129 games at SS with Seattle...joined Ernie Banks as the only shortstops in Major League history to hit 40 or more home runs more than once...teamed with David Bell (21) to hit more home runs than any middle-infield combo in Major League history (62)...ranked second on club in runs (110), total bases (294), homers, and RBI...ranked fifth in the AL in homers and sixth in slugging percentage (.586).
- ▶ Won AL Silver Slugger Award...played in just two games before going on D.L. on 4/7...had surgery the following day to repair torn cartilage in his left knee...activated on 5/14 and homered in his first at-bat that night vs. Kansas City...missed 32 games with injury...homered in five straight games from 8/11-16 to become only the fourth Seattle player to homer in five straight games...was at .315 at end of August before hitting .173 in September...scored 15 runs in a six-game span from 5/23-29...recorded his 100th career stolen base on 6/1 vs. Baltimore.

**1998**

- ▶ Batted .310 with 42HR, 124RBI and 46SB in 161 games with Seattle, joining Jose Canseco (1988) and Barry Bonds (1996) as the only players in history with 40 or more homers and 40 or more steals in a single season...led the AL in at-bats (686), hits (213), and multi-hit games (64) and ranked among the league leaders in runs (third, 123), total bases (third, 384), extra-base hits (tied for fourth, 82), RBI (fifth), and homers (seventh)...became the first Mariner ever with at least 30 homers and 30 steals in a season...tied AL record with eight extra base hits over three games from 4/18-20.
- ▶ Was selected as Players Choice AL "Player of the Year" and was Seattle's co-MVP with Ken Griffey, Jr...finished ninth in AL MVP balloting...named to Associated Press Major League All-Star Team and AL All-Star Club picked by the *Sporting News*...won second Silver Slugger Award...batted leadoff for first time in career from 5/10-14...voted starting shortstop for the second straight All-Star Game (third overall selection).

**1997**

- ▶ Batted .300 with 23HR and 84RBI in 141 games (140 starts at SS) with the Mariners...tied for the team lead in doubles (40) and ranked third in hits (176) and total bases (291)...had three hitting streaks of at least 10 games, including a 16-game streak from 6/1-7/3...hit for the cycle on 6/5 at Detroit, with a homer in the first inning, single in the fourth, triple in the eighth and double in the ninth...was the second Mariner ever to accomplish the feat and at 21 years, 10 months, was fifth-youngest in Baseball history to hit for the cycle.
- ▶ Suffered a deep bruise of his chest wall in a collision with Roger Clemens on 6/11 at Toronto...was placed on the 15-day disabled list and missed 14 games...ejected for the first time in his career on 8/9 at Chicago-AL...became the first AL shortstop other than Cal Ripken to start an All-Star Game since 1983 (Milwaukee's Robin Yount).

**1996**

- ▶ In his first full Major League season, batted .358 (215-for-601) with 36HR and 123RBI in 146 games and was selected by both the *Sporting News* and Associated Press as the Major League "Player of the Year"...finished three points behind Juan Gonzalez in AL MVP voting, matching the second-closest AL MVP voting in history...was the AL batting champ with a .358 average, highest for an AL right-handed batter since Joe DiMaggio (.381) in 1939...at 21 years, one month, was the AL's third youngest batting leader ever behind Al Kaline (20, in 1955) and Ty Cobb (20, in 1907)...was the first Major League shortstop to win a batting title since Pittsburgh's Dick Groat in 1960 (.325) and the first in the AL since Cleveland's Lou Boudreau (.327) in 1944...was the third-highest single-season batting average ever for a shortstop.

- ▶ Was a postseason All-Star shortstop and won first AL Silver Slugger Award...led the AL in runs (141), total bases (379) and doubles (54) and ranked among the league leaders in hits (second, 215), extra-base hits (second, 91), multi-hit games (third, 65), slugging percentage (fourth, .631), RBI (eighth, 123), and on-base percentage (eighth, .414)...posted then-records for a shortstop in runs, hits, doubles, extra-base hits and slugging percentage...established Seattle club records for average, runs, hits, doubles and total bases...named the AL "Player of the Month" for August and won league "Player of the Week" awards for weeks ending 8/19 and 9/1...hit in a single-season career-high 20 consecutive games from 8/16-9/4...was on the D.L. with pulled left hamstring from 4/22-5/7.

## 1995

- ▶ Batted .232 (33-for-142) with 5HR and 19RBI in 48 games over four stints with Seattle (5/6-27; 6/8-23; 7/20-8/15; and 8/31-10/2), starting 38 games at SS...connected for first Major League HR off Tom Gordon on 6/12 vs. Kansas City...despite playing in just 54 games at Triple-A Tacoma, batted .360 and was named to *Baseball America's* Triple-A All-Star team...also selected by the publication as the Pacific Coast League's "Most Exciting Player."

## 1994

- ▶ Advanced from Single-A Appleton to Seattle in his first pro season at age 19...hit a combined .300 (144-for-480) with 21HR and 86RBI in 131 games...joined Seattle on 7/7 and made his Major League debut as the starting shortstop on 7/8 at Boston at 18 years, 11 months and 11 days of age, just the Majors' third 18-year-old shortstop since 1900 (Kansas City's Tony LaRussa in 1963 and Milwaukee's Robin Yount in 1974)...became the Majors' first 18-year-old player since Yankees pitcher Jose Rijo in 1984...was the youngest position player in Seattle history with pitcher Edwin Nunez (18 yrs, 10 months, 11 days in 1982) the only younger player...singled off Boston's Sergio Valdez for first hit on 7/9 at Fenway Park (2-for-4, 1SB)...started 17 games at SS before being optioned to Triple-A Calgary for rest of season on 8/2.
- ▶ Started the season at Appleton, hitting .319 in 65 games...went 2-for-4 in pro debut on 4/8 at Quad City and hit first homer on 4/24 vs. Fort Wayne...selected to play in Midwest League All-Star Game on 6/20 but was promoted to Double-A Jacksonville on 6/16...named to Southern League's postseason All-Star squad...homered in first Double-A at-bat on 6/16 against Port City...played in 17 games before joining Seattle...played with Escogido in Dominican Winter League.

The Yankees had gone 6,632 regular season games between turning triple plays, during which every other Major League team had made at least one triple play and the Yankees themselves had hit into nine triple plays.

## 2010

- Was 21-7 (.750) with a 3.18 ERA (237.2IP, 84ER) and 197K in 34 starts with the Yankees, marking his first career 20-win season...opponents batted .239 (209-for-876, 20HR); LH .261 (53-for-203, 4HR) and RH .232 (156-for-673, 16HR)...the Yankees went 23-11 in his starts...finished third in AL Cy Young Award voting and garnered six votes in AL MVP voting (two eighth place, three ninth place and one 10th place).

- Became the first American Leaguer to win 21 games since Cleveland's Cliff Lee in 2008 and just the second Yankee in the last 25 years (since 1986) to reach the total (Andy Pettitte, 21-8 in 2003 and 1996).

- Ranked among the leaders in wins (first in AL, tied for first in Majors), IP (second in AL, third in Majors), winning percentage

- ▶ Made his seventh career Opening Day start, second with the Yankees, on 4/4 at Boston, recording a no-decision in the 9-7 Red Sox victory (5.1IP, 6H, 5ER, 2BB, 4K)...became the 22nd pitcher in franchise history to make multiple Opening Day starts, first since Randy Johnson in 2005 and 2006.
- ▶ Carried a no-hitter through two outs in the eighth inning of a 10-0 win on 4/10 at Tampa Bay until Kelly Shoppach singled to left field (7.2IP, 1H, 2BB, 5K, 11I/69)...was removed immediately following the single...was the furthest he had ever gone in a game without allowing a hit...was the deepest a Yankee had taken a no-hitter since Mike Mussina took a perfect game 8.2IP on 9/2/01 at Boston (Carl Everett single).

- \* 34 different Yankees have had a total of 59 20-win seasons since the franchise was established in New York in 1903.
- \* Red Ruffing, Lefty Gomez and Bob Shawkey have had the most 20-win seasons by a Yankee (four each).
- \* The Yanks' first 20-win season was 1903, when Jack Chesbro set the still-standing, modern era (since 1900) single-season win mark, going 41-12.

- ▶ Suffered the loss on 9/7 vs. Baltimore, his first loss at Yankee Stadium since 7/2/09, snapping a 21-start undefeated streak at home...over the stretch, went 16-0 with a 2.05 ERA (149.0IP, 34ER) as the Yankees went 19-2 in those starts...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, the streak tied Whitey Ford (8/8/64-8/18/65 at the original Yankee Stadium) for the longest undefeated streak of starts by a Yankee at any Stadium (home or away)...it was the longest undefeated streak of starts by any pitcher at any stadium since Johan Santana's 24-start undefeated streak at the Metrodome from 8/6/05-4/2/07...*Elias* also notes that Sabathia's 16-game home winning streak matched Johnny Allen (1932-33) and Ron Guidry (1985-86) for the longest in franchise history.
- ▶ Recorded his 20th win on 9/18 at Baltimore in an 11-3 Yankees victory (7.0IP, 7H, 3ER, 1BB, 4K, 1HR)...won his 21st game on 9/28 at Toronto, limiting the Jays to 3H and 1ER in 8.1IP (2BB, 8K, 1HR).
- ▶ Went 2-0 with a 5.63 ERA in three postseason starts...started ADS Game 1 and ALCS Game 1 - his sixth and seventh career Game 1 starts, putting him in a four-way tie for the fourth-most all time, trailing only Greg Maddux (11), Whitey Ford (8) and Roger Clemens (8).

## 2009

- ▶ Was 19-8 with a 3.37 ERA and two complete games in 34 starts with the Yankees, tying for the Major League lead in wins with Seattle's Felix Hernandez, Detroit's Justin Verlander and St. Louis' Adam Wainwright...was third in the American League with a .232 opponents batting average against (197-for-849, 18HR), and fourth in both IP (230.0) and ERA (3.37)...left-handed batters hit just .198 (39-for-197, 3HR) against him, while righties batted .242 (158-for-652, 15HR)...the Yankees were 22-12 in his starts.
- ▶ With 19 wins, surpassed Dock Ellis' (17-8 in 1976) record for most single-season victories by an African-American pitcher...marked the most wins by a Yankee in his first season with the franchise since Tommy John in 1979 (21-9).
- ▶ Began the season 1-3 with a 4.85 ERA (39.0IP, 21ER) in his first six starts, then posted an 18-5 record with a 3.06 ERA (191.0IP, 65ER) in 28 starts from 5/8 through the end of the season.
- ▶ Led the Majors in wins after the All-Star break, compiling an 11-2 record with a 2.74 ERA in 15 starts...the Yankees went 13-2 in his post-All-Star break starts, which included an 11-start undefeated stretch from 8/2-9/26 in which he went 9-0 with a 2.04 ERA (79.1IP, 56H, 18ER, 19BB, 85K, 6HR).
- ▶ Compiled a 12-6 record with a 3.53 ERA on the road, tying Texas' Scott Feldman and St. Louis' Adam Wainwright for the most road wins among all Major League pitchers...marked the most road wins by a Yankee since Ron Guidry went 13-2 away from the original Yankee Stadium in 1978.

- ▶ Struck out at least seven batters in a career-high seven straight starts from 8/8-9/7, matching Mike Mussina (4/2-5/7/03 – 7GS) and Ron Guidry (7/14-8/15/78 – 7GS) as the only three Yankees pitchers since 1954 to post seven such consecutive games.
- ▶ Made five postseason starts, going 3-1 with a 1.98 ERA (36.1IP, 28H, 9R, 8ER, 9BB, 32K, 4HR, 1HP), limiting opponents to 3ER or less in each outing...started Game 1 in all three rounds, making his two other starts on three-days' rest...earned ALCS MVP after winning both starts with a 1.13 ERA (16.0IP, 2ER)...won his Yankees postseason debut on 10/7 in Game 1 of the ALDS vs. Minnesota (6.2IP, 8H, 2R, 1ER, 0BB, 8K, 1HP), marking just the fifth time in postseason franchise history a Yankees pitcher recorded at least 8K without walking a batter...became the third African-American Yankees pitcher to start a World Series game, joining Dock Ellis and Al Downing...became the seventh Yankee to record three-or-more wins in a single postseason, joining David Wells (1998), Andy Pettitte (2003 and '09), Mike Stanton (2000), Orlando Hernandez (1999 and 2000), Dave Righetti (1981) and Sparky Lyle (1977).

## 2008

- ▶ Went 17-10 with a 2.70 ERA in 35 combined starts with Cleveland and Milwaukee...led the Majors in innings pitched (253.0), complete games (10) and shutouts (five), ranked second in strikeouts (251) and fourth in ERA...despite midseason trade, finished fifth in National League Cy Young Award voting and sixth in NL MVP voting.
- ▶ Opponents batted .237 (223-for-942, 19HR); LH .205 (48-for-234, 5HR), RH .247 (175-for-708, 14HR)...his five shutouts were the most in a single season since Randy Johnson's six in 1998 and his 10CG were the most since Johnson's 12 in 1999)...marked the most innings pitched by any Major League pitcher since Montreal's Livan Hernandez in 2004 (255.0).
- ▶ Lost his first three decisions (0-3, 4GS, 13.50 ERA)...over his remaining 31 starts (beginning 4/22), posted a 17-7 record and a 1.88 ERA, leading the Majors in ERA over the span.
- ▶ Opened the year at Cleveland, going 6-8 with a 3.83 ERA in 18 starts before being acquired by Milwaukee on 7/7...finished with 106 wins as an Indian, ranking second all time among club lefthanders behind Sam McDowell (122).
- ▶ Won a career-high 12 straight decisions over 16 starts from 6/10-8/31, pitching to a 1.55 ERA over the stretch and striking out 126 batters in 128.0IP with only 28 walks.
- ▶ Was acquired by Milwaukee on 7/7 in exchange for OF Matt LaPorta, LHP Zach Johnson, RHP Rob Bryson and a player to be named later (OF Michael Brantley)...became the fifth defending Cy Young Award winner to be traded before the end of the following season, joining Frank Viola, David Cone, Pedro Martinez and Roger Clemens...was leading the AL with 123K at the time of the trade.
- ▶ Went 11-2 with a 1.65 ERA in 17 starts as a Brewer, tossing seven complete games and three shutouts...the Brewers went 14-3 in his starts...opponents batted .222 (106-for-478, 6HR)...after joining the Brewers, led the Majors in ERA, tied Cliff Lee for most wins and ranked second in strikeouts (128)...the Brewers went 41-32 (.562) from 7/8 (Sabathia's first start) through the remainder of the year, recording the fifth-best winning percentage in the NL over the span.
- ▶ Won his first nine decisions over his first 13 starts after joining Milwaukee, winning the NL "Player of the Month" Award in July (4-0, 2.27 ERA) and August (5-0, 1.12).
- ▶ Became the second pitcher in the last 90 years to win his first nine decisions following a midseason change of teams, joining Doyle Alexander who went 9-0 after going from the Braves to the Tigers in 1987.

- ▶ Tossed a one-hit shutout on 8/31 at Pittsburgh in a 7-0 win for his ninth career shutout...lone hit was an Andy LaRoche check-swing dribbler back to Sabathia in the fifth inning.
- ▶ Made each of his final three starts of the season on three-days' rest, going 2-1 with a 0.83 ERA...included was a complete-game, 3-1 win on 9/28 vs. the Cubs to clinch the Brewers' Wild Card berth (9.0IP, 4H, 1R, 0ER, 1BB, 7K) on the final day of the season.
- ▶ Recorded the loss in his only postseason start on 10/2 at Philadelphia in Game 2 of the NLDS, allowing 5ER in 3.2IP.

## 2007

- ▶ Won the American League Cy Young Award after compiling a 19-7 record with a 3.21 ERA and 209K...set career highs in wins, starts (34) and innings pitched (241.0)...became just the second Indian to win the award, joining Gaylord Perry (1972)...marked the most wins by a Cleveland left-hander since Sam McDowell (20) in 1970.
- ▶ Became the first Cleveland left-hander to lead the Majors in innings pitched, the first Indian since Early Wynn in 1954 to lead the AL in innings pitched and the first Indian since Bob Feller in 1947 to lead the Majors in innings pitched...were the most IP by an Indian since Charles Nagy in 1992.
- ▶ Bested Boston's Josh Beckett (119 points to 86) to become the first African-American Cy Young Award winner since Dwight Gooden in 1985 and the first in the AL since Vida Blue in 1971...also placed 14th in AL MVP voting...was named AL "Pitcher of the Year" by the MLBPA and the *Sporting News* and was named Indians "Man of the Year" by the Cleveland chapter of the BBWAA.
- ▶ Tied for first in the AL in starts, tied for second in wins, ranked second in complete games (four), third in pitches thrown (3,582), tied for third in winning percentage (.731), placed fifth in strikeouts and tied for ninth in GIDPs induced (23)...along with teammate Fausto Carmona (19 wins), became the first set of Tribe teammates since 1956 to each win at least 19 games...allowed 2ER or less in 20 of 34 starts and lasted 6.0IP in 32 starts.
- ▶ Reached double-digit wins for the seventh straight season to begin his career, becoming the second pitcher (and only LHP) in club history to accomplish the feat, joining RHP Addie Joss (1902-09)...no other Indians lefty had won 10+ games in seven straight years at any point in his career.
- ▶ Collected the most strikeouts by an Indian since Bartolo Colon (201) in 2001 and the most by an Indians lefthander since Sam McDowell in 1970 (304)...recorded the second-highest K/BB ratio (MLB-best 5.65) by a LHP in MLB history and the highest K/BB ratio ever by an AL lefty...finished second in the AL to Paul Byrd, averaging just 1.38 BB/9.0IP.
- ▶ Became the first pitcher to beat Johan Santana three times in the same season (8/3, 8/29 and 9/3).
- ▶ Made his fourth career Opening Day start and won at Chicago-AL on 4/2 (6.0IP, 8H, 3R/ER)...began the year 5-0 for the first time in his career, winning nine of his first 10 decisions and 12 of his first 14.
- ▶ Went 16 consecutive starts without walking more than one batter from 4/20-7/5, the longest such streak in the Majors in 2007 and longest such stretch by a Cleveland pitcher since 1957.
- ▶ Notched his 1,000th career strikeout in 5/21 win vs. Seattle (Ichiro Suzuki in the fifth inning)...collected his fifth career complete-game shutout on 6/5 vs. Kansas City, then tossed 9.0 shutout innings (ND) in his next start on 6/10 at Cincinnati, a 12-inning 1-0 loss to the Reds...stretched his scoreless innings streak to 22.0 in his 6/15 start vs. Atlanta, but lost a 5-4 decision...was named AL "Player of the Week" for 6/25-7/1 (2-0, 2.25 ERA, 16.0IP, 15H, 4ER, 0BB, 16K).
- ▶ Did not allow a homer over a 41.0-inning stretch from 7/19-8/19...struck out a career-high 13 batters on 9/14 vs. Kansas City.
- ▶ Collected his 19th win of the season and 100th career win in his final start at Kansas City on 9/28 (7.0IP, 8H, 3ER)...became the youngest Major League pitcher (27 years, 70 days) since Greg Maddux in 1993 to win 100 games...of the 16 pitchers to win 300 games from 1900-2007, only three (Christy Mathewson, Maddux and Walter Johnson) were younger than Sabathia at the time of their 100th win...became the youngest Indians lefty ever to win 100 games and youngest overall pitcher since Bob Feller in 1941.
- ▶ Went 1-2 with an 8.80 ERA in three playoff starts (15.1IP, 21H, 15ER, 13BB, 14K).

## 2006

- ▶ In a career-low 28 starts, went 12-11 with a 3.22 ERA...was his sixth straight season to begin his career with double-digit wins, becoming just the second pitcher in club history to accomplish the feat, joining Hall of Famer Addie Joss (first eight seasons 1902-09)...became the only lefty in club history with six straight seasons of 10+ wins at any point in a career.
- ▶ Opponents batted .247 (182-for-738, 17HR); LH .271 (29-for-107, 3HR), RH .242 (153-for-631, 14HR).
- ▶ Led the Majors with six complete games, the most by an Indians LHP since Greg Swindell tossed seven in 1991...had the lowest road ERA (2.90) in the AL and the second-lowest day ERA (2.33) in the AL...ranked third in the AL in ERA, sixth in K/9.OIP (8.03) and opponents' average, and tied for eighth in strikeouts (172).
- ▶ Made his third career Opening Day start on 4/2 at Chicago-AL and left the game in the third inning with a strained right oblique muscle (2.1IP, 3H, 3ER, 1BB, 3K)...was placed on the 15-day disabled list the following day...made a rehab assignment on 4/27 for Triple-A Buffalo vs. Syracuse (5.0IP, 6H, 2R, 1ER, 1BB, 5K)...was his second career stint on the D.L...was activated prior to his 5/2 start vs. Chicago-AL, earning his first win of the season.
- ▶ Named AL "Pitcher of the Month" for May, going 5-1 with a 1.20 ERA in six starts after coming off the D.L. on 5/2...tossed his third career shutout on 5/24 at Minnesota (9.0IP, 6H, 0R, 0BB, 8K)...tossed his seventh career complete game while allowing only 3H in 5/19 win vs. Pittsburgh (9.0IP, 1R/ER, 1BB, 9K).
- ▶ Underwent arthroscopic surgery on his right knee on 9/29 at the Cleveland Clinic to remove torn cartilage.

## 2005

- ▶ Went 15-10 with a 4.03 ERA in 31 starts...ranked sixth in the AL in K/9.OIP (7.37), seventh in strikeouts, tied for eighth in wins and placed 10th in opponents' average...opponents batted .248 (185-for-745, 19HR); LH .248 (27-for-109, 4HR), RH .248 (158-for-636, 15HR).
- ▶ Began the season on the 15-day D.L. (placed on D.L. officially on 3/25; activated on 4/16) after straining his right oblique muscle warming up prior to his first spring start on 3/6 vs. Detroit...was his first trip to the Major League disabled list in his career.
- ▶ Hit his first career homer on 5/25 in Cincinnati in the fourth inning off Elizardo Ramirez...had 4RBI on the year (most by an Indians pitcher since 1972).
- ▶ Lost a career-high five straight starts from 7/6-7/30, then won seven straight starts from 8/5-9/7, recording the longest winning streak for an Indians pitcher since Ken Schrom in June/July of 1986.
- ▶ Tossed a four-hit complete game on 9/7 at Detroit, retiring his last 21 batters faced.
- ▶ Had his 2006 club option exercised by Cleveland and was then signed to a two-year extension through 2008 on 4/27.

## 2004

- ▶ Posted an 11-10 record with a 4.12 ERA in 30 starts...was selected to his second consecutive All-Star team, pitching 1.0 inning in the AL win at Houston...had six potential wins blown by the Cleveland bullpen.
- ▶ Made his second consecutive Opening Day start on 4/5 at Minnesota (7.0IP, 2H, 0R, 4BB, 9K)...was scratched from his start on 4/22 vs. Kansas City due to an irritated left biceps tendon and did not start from 4/17-30.
- ▶ Made his 100th career start on 5/1 vs. Baltimore, earning the win...became only the second Indian to make 100 career starts before age 24, joining Hall of Famer Bob Feller (175GS).
- ▶ Left his start on 6/26 vs. Colorado after 1.0 inning with irritation in his left shoulder...after MRI results in Cleveland were negative, traveled for a second opinion to Birmingham, Ala., on 6/28 to visit Dr. James Andrews, who cleared him to return...was 3-0 with a 2.57 ERA in six June starts (35.0IP, 27H, 10ER, 11BB, 26K).
- ▶ Notched his 50th career win on 7/27 vs. Detroit at the age of 24 years, 6 days, becoming the youngest pitcher to reach 50 career wins since Atlanta's Steve Avery (10/1/93 at 23 years, 170 days)...according to *Elias*, was the youngest active pitcher at the time to reach 50 career wins
- ▶ Tossed the second complete-game shutout of his Major League career on 9/6 at Seattle (9.0IP, 5H, 0R, 1BB, 8K) as he allowed just two runners to second base...sat out last two weeks of season due to a strained right hamstring.

## 2003

- ▶ Was 13-9 with a 3.60 ERA in 30 starts, earning his first career All-Star selection...did not appear in the Midsummer Classic, and at 22 years, 352 days, became the youngest Indians All-Star since RHP Dennis Eckersley in 1977 and the first Tribe All-Star LHP since Greg Swindell in 1989.
- ▶ Ranked sixth among AL pitchers with a 3.09 home ERA, eighth with a 3.38 night ERA and 10th in overall ERA...threw at least 5.0 innings in 29 of his 30 starts as the Indians averaged just 3.8 runs per game during his starts (the fifth worst run support among AL starting pitchers).

- ▶ Made his first career Opening Day start on 3/31 at Baltimore (ND, 7.0IP, 8H, 2ER, Riske BS) and was the youngest Opening Day starting pitcher (22 years, 252 days) in the Major Leagues since Dwight Gooden (22 years, 143 days) started for the New York Mets on 4/8/86 at Pittsburgh...was also the youngest Indians pitcher to start on Opening Day since Eckersley (21 years old) on 4/10/76 vs. Detroit.
- ▶ Tossed his first career complete-game shutout on 8/15 vs. Tampa Bay in a 1-0 win (9.0IP, 4H, 0R, 3BB, 9K)...was the first complete game, 1-0 shutout by a Tribe hurler since Bud Black in 1990 and the Tribe's first 1-0 win since 1997...collected a pinch-hit single off Mike Williams in 15.0-inning game on 6/20 at Pittsburgh in the 11th inning, becoming first Cleveland pitcher with a pinch-hit base hit since Dick Donovan on 7/28/63.

## 2002

- ▶ Went 13-11 with a 4.37 ERA in 33 starts, leading Cleveland pitchers in wins, IP (210.0), starts and strikeouts (149)...was tied for fourth in the AL with a 2.48 day ERA, tied for sixth with 24 induced GDP, ranked seventh with 0.73 HR allowed per 9.0IP (17HR, 210.0IP), ninth with 3,379 pitches thrown and 10th in strikeouts.
- ▶ Became the fifth pitcher since 1987 to win 30 games over his first two seasons in the Majors.
- ▶ Took a no-hitter into the eighth inning of his second start at Detroit on 4/7 before yielding a lead-off single to Randall Simon...collected his first Major League hit on 6/15 at Colorado, a single off Denny Reyes...tossed his first career complete game in 8/18 loss at Anaheim (8.0IP, 8H, 4ER, 3BB, 4K).
- ▶ Signed a four-year contract through 2005 with a club option for 2006 on 2/23.

## 2001

- ▶ Saw his first Major League action as a 20-year-old, going 17-5 with a 4.39 ERA in 33 starts, leading all rookie pitchers in wins, starts (33) and strikeouts (171)...became the first Indians rookie since Gene Bearden (20-7) in 1948 to win 17-or-more games in his rookie season...finished second to Seattle's Ichiro Suzuki in the AL BBWAA "Rookie of the Year" voting with 73 points...was the youngest active player in the big leagues all season...led AL rookie pitchers in innings (180.1) and ERA.
- ▶ Overall among AL pitchers, ranked third in winning percentage (.773) tied for sixth in wins and ranked seventh in strikeouts...his .228 average against (149-for-654) was the second-lowest mark among AL starters...led the AL with 13 road wins...also paced the AL, allowing a league-low 7.44 H/9.0IP.
- ▶ Became the first player to finish a season under 22 years of age with at least 17 wins since Atlanta's Steve Avery (18-8) in 1991 and the first AL pitcher to accomplish the feat since Chicago's Britt Burns in 1980 (19-13)...was the most wins by a left-handed rookie pitcher since Seattle's Dave Fleming in 1992 (17-10).
- ▶ After the season, was named the *Sporting News'* AL "Rookie Pitcher of the Year" and was selected to the *Baseball Digest* & *Topps* Major League All-Rookie Teams.
- ▶ Was a member of the Opening Day roster and made his Major League debut on 4/8 vs. Baltimore, drawing a no-decision in Cleveland's 4-3 win (5.2IP, 3H, 3ER, 2BB, 3K, 1HR)...was the youngest pitcher to start and appear in a game for Cleveland since Julian Tavarez in August 1993...registered his first Major League win in his second start on 4/13 at Detroit (5.0IP, 5H, 4R/ER, 2BB, 2K) in a 9-8 Indians victory.
- ▶ Won the AL "Rookie of the Month" Award in July, going 3-0 with a 2.83 ERA as the Indians went 6-0 in his starts.
- ▶ Won his first postseason start in Game 3 of the ALDS vs. Seattle (6.0IP, 6H, 2ER, 5BB, 5K), becoming the second-youngest pitcher to win a Division Series game behind only the Dodgers' Fernando Valenzuela (defeated Houston in 1981)...also became the youngest Indians pitcher to start a Division Series game and the third-youngest pitcher in Division Series history (youngest in ALDS history) to start a game behind Valenzuela (1981, 20 years, 339 days) and St. Louis' Rick Ankiel (2000, 21 years, 77 days).

## 2000

- ▶ Split the season between Single-A Kinston and Double-A Akron, posting a combined 3.57 ERA (146.1IP, 58ER) in 27 starts over the two stops while striking out an organization-high 159 batters.
- ▶ Began the year at Kinston and went 3-2 with a 3.54 ERA in 10 starts, which included a 9.0-inning, two-hit, complete game shutout in his final start there on 5/23 at Myrtle Beach...was promoted to Akron on 5/27, throwing 5.0 or more innings in 23 of his 27 starts with the Aeros.
- ▶ Started the Hall of Fame Game for Cleveland against the Arizona Diamondbacks on 7/24 in Cooperstown, N.Y...did not record a decision in the outing (3.0IP, 3H, 3ER, 2BB, 4K, HR)...also pitched in the Futures Game in Atlanta, Ga. for Team USA on 7/10.
- ▶ Tabbed as the top prospect in the organization and the No. 2 prospect in the Eastern League by *Baseball America* after the season.

**1999**

- ▶ Missed the first two and half months of the season with a bone bruise in his left pitching elbow...was activated off the D.L. on 6/20 and assigned to short-season Single-A Mahoning Valley...made six starts with the Scrappers, which increased by 1.0-inning increments, before being promoted to Single-A Columbus of the South Atlantic League on 7/17...was promoted to Single-A Kinston of the Carolina League on 8/2 where he spent the remainder of the season...combined on the year between his three minor league stops to go 5-3 with a 3.29 ERA in 16 starts (68.1IP, 47H, 25ER, 36BB, 76K)...overall, minor league hitters hit .198 (47-for-237) off him with 4HR.

**1998**

- ▶ Signed on 6/29 and was assigned to rookie-level Burlington, where he made five starts and struck out 35 batters in 18.0IP (17.50K/9.0IP)...was ranked by *Baseball America* as Cleveland's second-best prospect, the fourth-best prospect in the Appalachian League and was tabbed as having the best fastball in the organization.

- ▶ Full name is Carsten Charles Sabathia...he and his wife, Amber, have two sons, Carsten Charles III and Carter Charles, and two daughters, Jaden Arie and Cyia Cathleen...attended Vallejo Senior High School where he compiled a mark of 6-0 with a 0.77 ERA (46.2IP, 14H, 4ER, 14BB, 82K) during his senior season...was the top high school prospect coming out of Northern California according to *Baseball America*...was also an all-conference tight end in football at Vallejo...had scholarship offers to play college football and had signed a letter of intent at Hawaii...was selected to the 2000 United States Olympic Team Roster and appeared in one pre-Olympic tournament game in Sydney, Australia, but was not on the official 24-man, Gold Medal-winning roster.
- ▶ In 2009, officially established the CC Sabathia Family Foundation's "PitCCh In" along with his wife, Amber...the foundation is committed to the care and needs of inner-city children while helping to raise self-esteem through sports activities and education.
- ▶ Through "PitCCh In," the Sabathias have provided backpacks filled with back-to-school essentials and an autographed photo each of the last two years at his elementary school, Loma Vista School in Vallejo, Calif...replicated the charitable endeavor, along with his wife Amber, on 9/8/10 at P.S. 152 in the Bronx...for Thanksgiving 2009, joined Safeway to deliver 500 dinners to Vallejo families in need...played secret Santa for 22 Vallejo teenagers in foster care for Christmas 2009, taking the kids on a shopping spree...provided holiday gifts to children in need through "Toys for Tots" for the fourth straight year...also provided sports equipment to the Madison Square Boys & Girls Club in New York City in 2009.
- ▶ Renovated Thurmon Field, his former Little League field, in Vallejo, Calif...threw out the first pitch at the field's Spring Classic on 4/19/10...held clinics at the field in January 2010 and 2011, and hosted the Vallejo High Baseball Bash on 1/22/11 to raise funds for his former school...refurbished the Omega Boys & Girls Club in Vallejo in 2010.
- ▶ Took part in Payless ShoeSource's *Payless Gives Shoes 4 Kids* event on 12/9/10, joining children selected by the PitCCh In Foundation and the Madison Square Boys & Girls Club in a group shoe-shopping trip in New York City.
- ▶ Hosted a Christmas Caravan in 2010 with Amber, creating four consecutive days of community events in Vallejo focused on infant, youth, teen and adult programs...refurbished a foster home nursery, held a holiday party at the Kaiser Vallejo Pediatric Ward, hosted a shopping excursion for troubled teens who have overcome challenges and refurbished, redecorated and landscaped the Rosewood Women's Home.
- ▶ Received the Bart Giamatti Award for compassion and community service at the 2011 Baseball Assistance Team (B.A.T.) Dinner...also named a finalist for the 2010 Jefferson Award for Public Service by an athlete...served as Yankees representative for the Pepsi Refresh Project, supporting Out2Play...was honored at the Vallejo Mayor's Community Recognition Dinner on 11/28/09 where he received the Mayor's Achievement Awards.



- Went 3-2 with an American League-leading 45 saves (in 48 opportunities) and a 1.73 ERA in 64 relief appearances in his lone season with the Rays, setting a club record and a career high in saves...struck out 57 batters in 62.1IP with only 14BB...appeared in consecutive games 11 times, three straight three times and a season-high four in-a-row three times (4/30-5/4, 7/3-6 and 9/12-15).

- ▶ Recorded his 15th career multi-HR game in 6/29 loss vs. Seattle, homering twice off LHP Cliff Lee...was his first multi-HR game since 9/8/09 vs. Tampa Bay...marked the second time in his career he hit 2HR off left-handed pitching in the same game (also 5/11/06 w/ Oakland at Toronto – both off Ted Lilly).
- ▶ Was 4-for-4 with 1R, 2 doubles and 1BB, reaching base five times in 7/8 win at Seattle...tied his career high in hits (also 9/8/06 w/ Oakland at Tampa Bay).
- ▶ Scored at least one run in 10 consecutive starts from 7/10-26, tying a career high (also 9/5-15/07) and marking the longest such streak in the AL in 2010.
- ▶ Hit ninth-inning “walk-off” RBI single and was 3-for-5 with 1R, 1HR and 3RBI in 7/16 win vs. Tampa Bay...was his third career “walk-off” hit, second with the Yankees.
- ▶ Collected his 16th career multi-HR game and second of 2010 (also 6/29 vs. Seattle) in 8/2 loss vs. Toronto, going 2-for-5 with a two-run HR and solo HR...moved to CF at the start of the ninth inning, playing the position for the first time since 9/1/08 w/ Chicago-AL at Cleveland.
- ▶ Fouled a ball off his left knee in 8/24 win at Toronto and was removed from the game with a 2-2 count in the seventh...missed the next game on 8/25 at Toronto with soreness in the knee...also missed two games (9/3-4) with left knee stiffness.
- ▶ Hit ninth-inning, two-run “walk-off” HR and was 2-for-4 in 9/8 win vs. Baltimore...was his fourth career “walk-off” hit and third such HR...came one year to the day after his last “walk-off” homer (9/8/09 vs. Tampa Bay off Dan Wheeler)...became the fourth player in Baseball history ever to hit “walk-off” home runs exactly a year apart and first since the Giants’ Jack Clark on 9/4/81 and 9/4/82—credit: *Elias*.
- ▶ Started all nine Yankees postseason games, batting .176 (6-for-34) with 6R, 3 doubles and 2HR...the Yankees were 4-0 when he scored a run.

**2009**

- ▶ Hit .249 (124-for-498) with 84R, 35 doubles, 29HR and 82RBI in 150 games (126 starts in RF, 10 at 1B, four in LF, one at DH) in his first season with the Yankees...batted .250 (84-for-336, 20HR) as a left-handed batter and .247 (40-for-162, 9HR) as a right-handed batter.
- ▶ Ranked third among Major League switch-hitters in home runs, tied for third with 97BB and ranked sixth in RBI...ranked second overall in the AL in walks, marking the most free passes by a Yankees switch-hitter since Jorge Posada in 2000 (107)...ranked second in the AL and seventh in the Majors with 4.26 pitches seen per plate appearance...led the AL with a .585 slugging percentage on the road.
- ▶ Homered from both sides of the plate three times (4/29 at Detroit, 7/27 at Tampa Bay and 9/8 vs. Tampa Bay)...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, his three sets of switch-hit homers tied his high for any season (also 2007) and tied the AL single-season mark, also shared by Tony Clark (1998 with Detroit) and teammate Mark Teixeira, who joined Swisher in accomplishing the feat in 2009.
- ▶ Homered from seven different spots in the batting order (two through eight), becoming the first player to accomplish the feat in one season for the Yankees since Dan Pasqua in 1987—credit: *Elias*...became the first player in franchise history to hit 21 of his first 24HR of the season on the road.
- ▶ He and teammate Mark Teixeira became the third set of Yankees teammates over the last 50 years to each hit at least 25HR in their first full season in pinstripes (also Alex Rodriguez/Gary Sheffield in 2004 and Jason Giambi/Robin Ventura in 2002).

- ▶ Made his Yankees debut in Opening Day loss at Baltimore on 4/6, going 1-for-1 with a pinch-hit double... was his fifth career Opening Day roster.
- ▶ Started his first game of the season on 4/9 at Baltimore in the Yankees first win of the season, going 3-for-5 with 2R, 1 double, 1HR and a career-high-tying 5RBI... according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, became the first player to drive in four-or-more runs in his first career start with the Yankees since Roger Maris on 4/19/60 at Boston, when he went 4-for-5 with 2HR and 4RBI... *Elias* also noted that Swisher became just the second Yankee in franchise history (since RBI became an official statistic in 1920) to record five-or-more RBI in a single game within his first three contests with the club (also Bob Tillman on 8/13/67 at Cleveland, third game w/ NYY, 2-for-5, 1HR, 6RBI).
- ▶ Recorded a hit in each of his first nine games with an official at-bat, the longest hitting streak to begin a season of his career... according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, set a franchise record with nine extra-base hits (4 doubles, 1 triple, 4HR) in his first eight games with the Yankees, surpassing Roger Maris, who had seven in 1960... *Elias* also notes his 11RBI tied the franchise record for most RBI in a player's first eight games with the club, matching Maris in 1960 and Robin Ventura in 2002.
- ▶ Reached base safely in each of his first 17 games, becoming the first Yankee to accomplish the feat since Matty Alou reached in his first 19 games in 1973 (credit: *Elias*).
- ▶ Pitched a scoreless eighth inning (1.0IP, 1H, 1BB, 1K) in 4/13 loss at Tampa Bay, becoming the Yankees' first position player to pitch in a game since Wade Boggs on 8/19/97 at Anaheim... went 1-for-3 with a solo HR, becoming the first Yankee to homer and strike out a batter in the same game since Lindy McDaniel on 9/28/72 at Detroit.
- ▶ Led the team with 7HR and 19RBI in April, becoming the first offseason acquisition to lead the Yankees in March/ April RBI in his first year with the club since Dave Winfield tied Bucky Dent for the team lead with nine April RBI in 1981... also became the first to hold the outright lead in both categories since Bobby Bonds in 1975 (4HR, 15RBI).
- ▶ Hit each of his first 8HR on the road... according to *Elias*, became the first Yankee to hit each of his first 8HR of a season on the road since Bernie Williams in 2003 (first 9HR on the road).
- ▶ Reached base safely in 30 consecutive games from 7/17-8/22, the longest such streak by a Yankee in 2009 and the second-longest streak of his career (36 games in 2006 w/ Oakland).
- ▶ Hit solo-HR in the second and "walk-off" solo-HR in the ninth and was 2-for-3 with 1BB in 9/8 win vs. Tampa Bay... was his second career "walk-off" hit and home run... was his third multi-HR game in 2009 and 14th of his career... marked the eighth time in Baseball history a player homered from both sides of the plate in the same game with one of those home runs being a "walk-off" (also Yankees Mickey Mantle in 1956, Roy White in 1976 and Melky Cabrera on 4/22/09, and Donnie Scott in 1985, Kevin Bass in 1987 and 1989 and Carlos Guillen in 2006)—credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*.
- ▶ Appeared in 14 of the Yankees' 15 postseason games in 2009, batting .128 (6-for-47) with 5R, 2 doubles, 1HR, 2RBI and 7BB... hit his first career postseason homer in Game 3 of the World Series at Philadelphia.

## 2008

- ▶ Hit .219 (109-for-497) with 21 doubles, 24HR and 69RBI in 153 games in his only season with the White Sox (69 starts in CF, 47 at 1B, 16 in LF and 11 in RF)... was his fourth consecutive season with 20-or-more home runs.
- ▶ Led all AL switch-hitters in home runs and finished second in RBI to Texas' Milton Bradley... batted .227 (83-for-365) with 18HR as a left-handed batter and .197 (26-for-132) with 6HR from the right side... hit in eight different spots in the lineup.
- ▶ Led the AL with 4.51 pitches seen per plate appearance and tied for eighth with 82BB... owned the third-lowest batting average among AL qualifiers, ahead of only Oakland's Daric Barton (.214) and Jack Hannahan (.216)... hit .247 (64-for-259) with 19HR at U.S. Cellular Field, while batting .189 (45-for-238) with 5HR on the road... batted .385 (5-for-13) with 2HR and 19RBI with the bases loaded.
- ▶ Made just two errors in 481 chances at 1B (.996 fielding pct.), while making 5E in 202TC as an outfielder (.975).
- ▶ Made his fourth career Opening Day roster and start in 3/31 loss at Cleveland, going 2-for-4 with 2R.
- ▶ Walked in six consecutive plate appearances from 4/4-5 at Detroit, becoming the first player to walk six straight times since Ivan Rodriguez in 2003 and the first White Sox player to do so since Chet Lemon in 1980.
- ▶ Hit his first career leadoff home run off Justin Verlander on 4/6 at Detroit... hit his first career "walk-off" home run on 8/5 vs. Detroit, a 14th-inning, three-run shot off Joel Zumaya... homered in a career-high four straight games from 8/18-21... included was his 100th career home run on 8/20 vs. Seattle.
- ▶ Snapped a career-high 0-for-19 stretch with an eighth-inning double on 9/2 at Cleveland.
- ▶ Went 1-for-4 (.250) with 1R and 2BB in three ALDS games vs. Tampa Bay.
- ▶ Was traded to Chicago-AL from Oakland on 1/3/08 in exchange for RHP Fautino De Los Santos, LHP Giovany Gonzalez and OF Ryan Sweeney.

## 2007

- ▶ Hit .262 (141-for-539) with 36 doubles, 22HR, 78RBI and 100BB in 150 games with Oakland (57 starts in CF, 46 in RF, 39 at 1B, and five at DH)... set career highs in average, doubles, walks and on-base percentage (.381).
- ▶ Ranked sixth in the American League in walks, seventh in pitches per plate appearance (4.25) and 10th in strikeouts (131)... also ranked among the AL leaders in sacrifice flies (tied for fourth, nine), intentional walks (tied for fifth, 12) and percent of pitches taken (seventh, 62.8).

- ▶ His 22HR ranked second among AL switch-hitters behind Cleveland's Victor Martinez (25) and tied for the third-highest total in Athletics history for a switch-hitter...of his 22 homers, 15 were solo shots and 10 either tied the game or gave the A's the lead...had three multi-HR games, homering from both sides of the plate each time (4/23 at Baltimore, 7/26 at Seattle and 9/9 at Texas).
- ▶ Became the third player in Oakland history to start at least 30 games at three different positions, joining Jay Payton (2006) and Jason Giambi (1996)...had a .993 fielding percentage at 1B (3E), .986 in CF (2E) and 1.000 in RF (0E).
- ▶ Hit .291 (44-for-151) with 6HR, 22RBI and a .458 on-base percentage vs. left-handed pitchers and .250 (97-for-388) with 16HR, 56RBI and a .348OBP vs. righties.
- ▶ Established a career high with 5RBI on 5/21 at Chicago-AL, becoming the eighth player in Oakland history to drive in five runs without a home run.
- ▶ Committed his first error of the season on 8/2 vs. Los Angeles-AL in his 98th game...also snapped a career-high 103-game errorless stretch dating back to 9/24/06.
- ▶ Scored a run in 10 consecutive games from 9/5-15 (15R overall).
- ▶ Served a three-game suspension from 9/18-21 after being ejected on 9/16 vs. Texas for charging the mound when he was hit by a Vicente Padilla pitch in his first at-bat...marked his third straight game of being hit by a pitch (also 9/14 and 9/15 vs. Texas)...also homered in each of those games.

## 2006

- ▶ Reached base safely in 36 consecutive games from 4/7-5/19, going 41-for-131 (.313) with 12HR, 33RBI and 35R...hit his first career grand slam on 4/22 vs. Los Angeles-AL off Jeff Weaver.

- ▶ Began the season with Sacramento, batting .269 (119-for-443) with 109R, 29HR, 92RBI and 103BB in 125 games...led all minor leaguers in walks and tied for fourth in runs scored...topped the Pacific Coast League in walks and runs and ranked eighth in on-base percentage (.406)...tied Dan Johnson for the most homers among A's farmhands...reached base safely in 26 straight games from 6/11-7/7...recorded 2HR and 6RBI on 7/24 at Las Vegas...hit 20HR in his last 69 games after homering just nine times in his first 56 contests.

## 2003

- ▶ Split the season between Single-A Modesto and Double-A Midland, combining to hit .256 (122-for-476) with 15HR and 86RBI in 127 games...his 11SF tied for fifth in the minors.

- ▶ Combined to hit .242 (55-for-227) with 6HR and 35RBI in 62 games with Single-A Vancouver and Single-A Visalia...began his career at Vancouver, but was promoted to Visalia after just 13 games.

- ▶ Established the Nick Swisher Foundation "Swish's Wishes" in 2007 to assist children with life-threatening illnesses and to help lift the spirits of kids going through difficult times...in 2009, provided Christmas dinner for the families of children battling cancer at the Ronald McDonald House in New York and was the co-Ambassador to the Entertainment Industry Foundation's Lee Denim Day to help raise money for breast cancer research...continued his practice of hosting "Swish's Wishes Days" at Yankee Stadium, inviting children to his home ballpark throughout the year as he did in Oakland and Chicago...made a \$10,000 donation to the United Way Alliance of the Mid-Ohio Valley in November 2009...also purchased uniforms for the football team at his junior high school.
- ▶ Received a 2011 Thurman Munson Award for his on-field excellence and community service.
- ▶ Is a regular visitor at children's hospitals...supports Lynn Sage Cancer Center in Chicago...in the past, has dyed his goatee pink on Mother's Day to raise awareness for breast cancer and blue on Father's Day to raise awareness for prostate cancer...grew and shaved a mustache in November 2010 as part of November to raise awareness for cancer...provides holiday gifts and a party for mentally challenged children at Janet Pomeroy School in San Francisco...supports UCSF Medical Center in San Francisco, where he served as the honorary chairman for the 2007 Macy's Tree Lighting Ceremony...has also funded programs at the Children's Hospital & Research Center in Oakland and frequently reads books to children in the hospital...teamed with Columbia Pictures in 2007 to host a private screening of the movie *Water Horse: Legend of the Deep* for 400 sick and low-income Bay Area children.
- ▶ Participates in Strikeouts For Troops, a non-profit organization that provides assistance to wounded war veterans and their children by providing "comforts of home" while they recover in military hospitals nationwide...toured U.S. bases in Spain, Greece and Italy on a goodwill mission to visit American soldiers and their families stationed abroad in January 2007...helped fund two programs for low-income children in need at Tony La Russa's Animal Rescue Foundation...participated in adopting 25 military families in need and provided Thanksgiving and Christmas dinner as well as Christmas gifts for the children in 2007, 2008 and 2009.

## CAREER NOTES

- Is one of only three Major Leaguers to reach 30HR and 100RBI in each of the last seven seasons (2004-10), joining Albert Pujols and teammate Alex Rodriguez...according to *Elias*, is one of three first basemen all time to surpass 30HR and 100RBI in seven straight years by age 30 (also Jimmie Foxx and Pujols).
- Is one of just three Yankees first basemen in franchise history to record at least 100R, 30HR and 100RBI in multiple seasons with the club, joining Lou Gehrig (10 times, 1927 and '29-37) and Don Mattingly (twice, 1985-86)...is the only player to accomplish the feat in his first two seasons with the club.
- Is the sixth Yankee all time to hit at least 30HR in each of his first two seasons with the club (also Babe Ruth, Roger Maris, Jason Giambi, Alex Rodriguez and Gary Sheffield).
- Has reached the 25HR plateau in each of his first eight Major League seasons...according to *Elias*, became just the fourth player in Baseball history to accomplish the feat, joining Eddie Mathews (11 seasons), Albert Pujols (10) and Darryl Strawberry (nine).
- Is one of 13 players all-time to hit at least 250 home runs within the first eight years of their Major League career and one of just four active players to accomplish the feat, joining Albert Pujols (319 from 2001-08), Adam Dunn (278 from 2001-08) and Todd Helton (251 from 1997-2004)...his 275 career home runs are the most ever by a switch-hitter in his first eight seasons.
- Has homered from both sides of the plate in the same game 10 times in his career (tied with teammate Nick Swisher for most among actives)...is tied with Swisher, Ken Caminiti, Tony Clark and Mickey Mantle for the second-most such games all-time behind Chili Davis and Eddie Murray (11 each).

## 2010

- Hit .256 (154-for-601) with 113R, 36 doubles, 33HR and 108RBI in 158 games (148 starts at 1B, nine at DH) with the Yankees...was one of nine Major Leaguers in 2010 with at least 100R and 100RBI...led the AL and ranked second in the Majors in runs scored, trailing only the Cardinals' Albert Pujols (115).

- ▶ Was awarded his fourth Gold Glove Award, becoming the Yankees' first repeat winner at first base since Don Mattingly won four straight awards from 1991-94...committed just 3E in 1,310 chances, a .998 fielding percentage...marked the second-fewest errors and second-highest fielding percentage among qualifying Major League first basemen, behind only Seattle's Casey Kotchman...recorded 54 putouts on foul balls, the most for any fielder in 2010—credit: *Elias*.
- ▶ Hit .245 (102-for-417) with 23HR as a left-handed batter and .283 (52-for-184) with 10HR as a righthanded batter...owned a .533 batting average (8-for-15) with 1 double, 1HR and 22RBI with the bases loaded.
- ▶ Over his final 101 games of the season (from 6/8), batted .283 (107-for-378) with 25HR and 74RBI...ranked second in the AL in HRs and tied for fourth in RBI over the stretch...began the season batting just .211 (47-for-223) with 8HR and 34RBI over his first 57 games.
- ▶ Made his eighth career Opening Day roster (second as a Yankee) and seventh Opening Day start at 1B.
- ▶ Was hitless in his first 17 at-bats to start the season, the longest hitless streak to begin a season of his career...snapped streak with a fifth-inning RBI double in 4/10 win at Tampa Bay...was 3-for-4 with 2R, 1 double, 1RBI and 1BB in the game...following the 4/10 game, again went hitless in his next 17AB before snapping the stretch with a second-inning single in 4/17 win vs. Texas.
- ▶ Hit his first HR in 4/18 win vs. Texas, snapping a 40AB homerless stretch to start the season...marked the second-longest such stretch of his career behind a 76AB homerless span to start the 2007 season.
- ▶ Collected 33H and 25RBI in 29 games in May after having 11H and 9RBI in 22 games in April.
- ▶ Recorded his 26th career multi-HR game and third three-homer game in 5/8 win at Boston...became the fourth player in Major League history to have a 3HR game with three different teams, (also Johnny Mize-Cardinals, Giants, Yankees; Dave Kingman- Mets, Cubs, Athletics; and Alex Rodriguez-Mariners, Rangers, Yankees)...became just the second Yankee in franchise history to hit 3HR in a game vs. Boston (also Lou Gehrig on 6/23/27 at Boston).
- ▶ Went 10 games without an RBI from 5/18-28, one game shy of a career-high 11-game span without driving in a run from 5/7-21/04.
- ▶ Hit his 250th career home run in 5/31 win vs. Cleveland, snapping a 56AB homerless stretch.
- ▶ Was removed from 6/1 win vs. Baltimore in the top of the fourth inning with a bruised left foot, suffered on a foul ball in his first-inning at-bat...did not miss a game.
- ▶ Struck out five times in 6/5 loss at Toronto, tying his career high (second time, also 8/18/03 at Detroit)...became the sixth Yankee to strike out five times in a game and first since Melky Cabrera in July 2007.
- ▶ Reached base safely (via hit, walk or hit-by-pitch) in a career-high 42 straight games from 6/6-7/26...marked the longest such streak by a Yankee since Alex Rodriguez reached safely in 53 straight from 4/18-6/17/04.
- ▶ Made his first error of the season—and first since 10/2/09—in 6/13 win vs. Houston, snapping a 64-game errorless stretch.
- ▶ Hit his fifth career grand slam and was 1-for-3 with 1BB in 6/20 win vs. the Mets...was his first grand slam since 8/3/08 w/ Los Angeles-AL at Yankee Stadium (off Edwar Ramirez).
- ▶ Hit safely in a season-high 12 straight games from 6/18-7/1, batting .292 (14-for-48) with 8R, 3HR and 11RBI.
- ▶ Batted .344 (33-for-96) with 26RBI and 20BB in 26 games in July, collecting 11 multi-hit contests...18 of his 33H (54.5%) went for extra bases (10 doubles, 8HR).

- ▶ Became the first player to record both 100R and 100RBI in 2010, reaching the totals in 9/10 loss at Texas.
- ▶ Appeared in seven postseason games (.148, 4-for-27)...hit game-winning homer in ALDS Game 1 at Minnesota in the seventh inning...suffered a torn right hamstring in the ninth inning (running to first base) of the Yankees' ALCS Game 4 loss vs. Texas and missed the Yankees' final two playoff contests.

## 2009

- ▶ Batted .292 (178-for-609) with 103R, 43 doubles, 39HR and 122RBI in 156 games (150 starts at 1B, five at DH) in his first season with the Yankees...hit .282 (122-for-432) with 30HR as a left-handed batter and .316 (56-for-177) with 9HR as a right-handed batter...earned his third Gold Glove Award and third Silver Slugger Award.
- ▶ From 5/8 (when Alex Rodriguez returned to the lineup) through the end of the season, batted .310 (159-for-513) with 89R, 39 doubles, 34HR, 107RBI and 62BB in 131G (the Yankees were 88-43 in those games)...led the AL in home runs and RBI over the span...prior to Rodriguez's return, Teixeira hit .198 (19-for-96) with 14R, 4 doubles, 5HR, 15RBI and 19BB in 25G.
- ▶ Led the American League in RBI and tied Tampa Bay's Carlos Pena for the lead in home runs...led the Majors in home runs (24) and RBI (71) at home...led the AL in go-ahead RBI (31) and ranked second in go-ahead home runs (13).
- ▶ With 103R, 43 doubles and 39HR, was one of only two players in the Majors to collect at least 100R, 40 doubles and 35HR, joining St. Louis' Albert Pujols (124R, 45 doubles, 47HR).
- ▶ Became just the second player ever to lead or tie for the AL lead in home runs in his first season with the Yankees, joining Babe Ruth in 1920 (54HR)—credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*...*Elias* also noted Teixeira was one of three Yankees to lead the AL in RBI in their first season with the club, joining Ruth (136RBI) and Roger Maris (112 in 1960)...became one of just three players to reach 39HR and 122RBI in their first season with the Yankees, joining Babe Ruth in 1920 (54HR, 136RBI) and Jason Giambi in 2002 (41HR, 122RBI)—credit: *Elias*.
- ▶ According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, became the eighth player to hit at least 30HR in his first season with the Yankees (did so in his 112th game of the season), joining Babe Ruth (1920), Roger Maris (1960), Bobby Bonds (1975), Reggie Jackson (1977), Jason Giambi (2002), Alex Rodriguez (2004) and Gary Sheffield (2004)...only two of those players hit their 30th homer fewer games into the season than Teixeira (Maris in 82 games and Ruth in 88 games).
- ▶ Became the fifth Yankee to reach 100R, 40 doubles, 35HR and 100RBI in a season (also Babe Ruth-1921 and '23; Lou Gehrig-1927, '30 and '34; Don Mattingly-1985 and Alfonso Soriano-2002)...is the only player to do so in his first season with the club.
- ▶ Homered from both sides of the plate three times in 2009 (5/4 vs. Boston, 5/18 vs. Minnesota and 9/19 at Seattle)...became the 11th Yankee all time to accomplish the feat and one of three in 2009 (also Melky Cabrera and Nick Swisher)...along with Swisher (2007 and 2009), tied Tony Clark (1998 w/ Detroit) for the most switch-hit homers in a single season.
- ▶ His 43 doubles were the most by a Yankees first baseman in a season since Don Mattingly had 53 in 1986...85 of his 178 hits (47.8%) went for extra bases (43 doubles, 3 triples and 39HR).
- ▶ Was voted as the AL's starting first baseman in the 2009 All-Star Game...went 0-for-3 in the AL's 4-3 win in St. Louis on 7/14, playing five innings at 1B...was named the starting AL All-Star at 1B for the second time in his career (also 2005)...was the first Yankee 1B to start an All-Star Game since Jason Giambi in 2004.
- ▶ Batted .200 (14-for-70) with 3HR and 10RBI in April...hit at .304 (164-for-539) clip over the remainder of the season.
- ▶ Collected the 1,000th hit of his career with a third-inning infield single in 4/24 loss at Boston.
- ▶ Tied a career high with 5BB in 4/25 loss at Boston...also walked five times on 9/23/04 w/ Texas vs. Oakland...is the only current Major Leaguer to walk five times in two games (credit: *Elias*)...*Elias* also noted he became the first player to draw 5BB in two nine-inning contests since Mel Ott who had three (1929, 1943 and 1944)...were the most walks drawn by a Yankee since Roger Maris drew 5BB in a 12-inning game against the Angels on 5/22/62...were the most walks by a Yankee in a nine-inning game since Russ Derry drew 5BB in Game 1 of a doubleheader on 9/6/45 vs. Detroit.

- ▶ Hit 13HR in May, tying a career-high for his most HRs in any calendar month (also July 2004)...were the most by a Yankee since Alex Rodriguez hit 14HR in April 2007...led the Majors in HR and RBI (34) during May and, according to *Elias*, matched the most RBI for a Yankees player in a calendar month over the past 20 years: Tino Martinez (April 1997), Bernie Williams (August 1999) and Alex Rodriguez (April 2007 and June 2007).
- ▶ Both he and Alex Rodriguez each hit 4HR over a four-game span from 5/16-19, becoming the first pair of Yankees teammates since 1977 (Reggie Jackson and Bucky Dent) to accomplish the feat (credit: *Elias*).
- ▶ Hit safely in a career-high 14 straight games from 5/18-6/1...during the stretch, hit .397 (23-for-58) with 14R, 5 doubles, 8HR and 20RBI.
- ▶ Had 47RBI through his first 50 games with the Yankees, matching Harry Rice, Joe Gordon and Roger Maris for the third-most for any player in franchise history over his first 50 games with the team since 1920 when RBI became an official statistic...only Babe Ruth (57) and Joe DiMaggio (56) had more through their first 50 games (credit: *Elias*).
- ▶ Made ninth-inning throwing error in 7/2 loss vs. Seattle, snapping a 72-game stretch at 1B to start the season without committing an error...had been the longest errorless streak in one season for a Yankees first baseman since Tino Martinez went 82 straight games without an error in 1996 (credit: *Elias*)...also snapped a 106-game errorless stretch at 1B overall, dating back to 8/20/08.
- ▶ Snapped a career-long 95AB homerless stretch with solo-HR in 7/9 win at Minnesota.
- ▶ Played in his 1,000th career Major League game in 7/28/09 loss at Tampa Bay, going 1-for-4 with 1R and 1 double...the double was the 250th of his career—and with 228HR—became only the second active player to accumulate at least 250 doubles and 225HR through his first 1,000 games (also Albert Pujols – 273 doubles, 266 HR)—credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*.
- ▶ Drove in his 100th run of the season with a three-run home run in 8/30 win vs. Chicago-AL in his 126th game of the season...according to *Elias*, only four players reached the 100RBI milestone fewer games into their Yankees career than Teixeira: Babe Ruth in 1920 (97 games), Joe DiMaggio in 1936 (102), Roger Maris in 1960 (118) and Tony Lazzeri in 1926 (125).
- ▶ Batted .180 (11-for-61) with 2 doubles, 2HR and 8RBI in the postseason...hit “walk-off” solo home run off Jose Mijares in 11th inning in Game 2 of ALDS vs. Minnesota, marking his first career postseason home run and first career “walk-off” HR (regular and postseason)...was the Yankees’ second “walk-off” homer in ALDS play (also Jim Leyritz in 1995 vs. Seattle)...scored a run in five of the six World Series games...was hit by a pitch three times in the WS, joining Alex Rodriguez (also 2009) and Pittsburgh’s Max Carey (1925) as the only players to get plunked three times in a single Series.

## 2008

- ▶ In 157 combined games with Atlanta and Los Angeles-AL, batted .308 (177-for-574) with 41 doubles, 33HR and 121RBI...ranked sixth in the Majors in RBI.
- ▶ Hit 20 home runs for the Braves and 13 with the Angels in 2008, a year after hitting 13 homers for the Rangers and 17 for the Braves...according to *Elias*, he became the first player in history to hit at least 30 home runs in each of back-to-back seasons while playing for more than one team in both years.
- ▶ Batted .366 (83-for-227) with 18 doubles, 16HR and 52RBI in 64 games after the All-Star break, ranking third in the Majors in batting average behind Manny Ramirez (.388) and Albert Pujols (.368)...hit .271 (94-for-347) with 23 doubles, 17HR and 69RBI in 93 games prior to the break.
- ▶ Opened the season with Atlanta, hitting .283 (108-for-381) with 27 doubles, 20HR and 78RBI in 103 games prior to being dealt...at the time of the trade, ranked fifth in the NL in walks (65) and tied for 10th in doubles (27).
- ▶ Compiled 134RBI in 157 games with the Braves over 2007-08...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, only one Major League player had as many RBI in so few career games for one team – Juan Gonzalez, who had 140RBI for the Indians in 141 games (140 games in 2001 and one game in 2005).
- ▶ Recorded his second career three-homer game in 6/22 win vs. Seattle, homering from each side of the plate for the fifth time in his career...became the first Brave with a three-homer game at Turner Field.
- ▶ Was acquired by the Angels on 7/29 in exchange for 1B Casey Kotchman and RHP Steve Marek...hit .358 (122-for-393) with 14 doubles, 13HR and 43RBI in 54 games with Los Angeles-AL, reaching base safely in 49 of those contests...recorded the highest average, on-base percentage (.449) and slugging percentage (.632) in the AL following the trade, the sixth-most RBI, tied for the sixth-most home runs and tied for the ninth-most hits and extra-base hits.
- ▶ Collected 66H in his first 50 games with Angels, tallying the fourth-most base hits by an Angel in their first 50 contests with the club behind Johnny Ray (79), Alex Johnson (71) and Vladimir Guerrero (70).
- ▶ Hit .386 (39-for-101) in August, ranking fifth in the AL and marking his highest average for any month in his career...hit his first homer as an Angel in 8/3 loss at Yankee Stadium, an eighth-inning grand slam...was just the third player in club history whose first homer as an Angel was a slam.
- ▶ Saw his first career postseason action, batting .467 (7-for-15) with 4R, 1RBI and 4BB in four Division Series games against Boston.

## 2007

- ▶ Combined with Texas and Atlanta to hit .306 (151-for-494) with 86R, 33 doubles, 30HR and 105RBI in 132 games...was acquired by the Braves at the 7/31 trade deadline in a seven-player deal.
- ▶ Was one of just eight players to record a .300 average with 30HR and 100RBI in 2007, doing so in the fewest at-bats (494) and games (132)...Boston's David Ortiz needed the second-fewest at-bats (549) and games (149) to reach the plateaus.
- ▶ Batted .357 (55-for-154) with 6HR off left-handed pitching, and .282 (96-for-340) with 24HR against right-handers...his .405 (53-for-131) average with runners in scoring position ranked third in the Majors (min. 100AB)...was a .382 (50-for-131) hitter during the day and .278 (101-for-363) hitter at night.
- ▶ Opened the year with Texas and batted .297 with 24 doubles, 13HR and 49RBI in 78 games with the Rangers prior to the trade.
- ▶ Tied for second in the AL in May with 27RBI and 19 extra-base hits while hitting .348 with 7HR for the month...his 38 hits were a career high for any month.
- ▶ Was on the 15-day disabled list from 6/9-7/13 with a strained left quadriceps (missed 27 games)...snapped his consecutive games played streak at 507 games.
- ▶ Batted .317 with 17HR and 56RBI in 54 games with Atlanta, hitting safely in 33 of his last 38 games and in 43 of 54 games overall with the Braves...also drove in a run in 32 of his 54 Braves games...had 21 multi-hit games and 14 multi-RBI games, including three contests with four-or-more RBI.
- ▶ Homered in each of his first three games with Atlanta from 8/1-4, becoming the first Brave to accomplish the feat since Gary Sheffield from 4/1-4/02...went 1-for-4 with a three-run homer and 4RBI in his Atlanta debut on 8/1 vs. Houston...walked with the bases loaded in the first inning for his 500th career RBI.
- ▶ Earned the NL "Player of the Month" award in August, hitting .315 (35-for-111) with 32RBI and 10HR...marked the most RBI in the Majors in August and tied for the most homers...named NL "co-Player of the Week" (with Jason Iiringhausen) for 8/20-26, hitting .414 (12-for-29) with 8R, 3HR and 11RBI over the stretch.
- ▶ Homered twice in back-to-back games on 8/19 (vs. Arizona) and 8/20 (at Cincinnati) to become the fourth player in Atlanta history with consecutive multi-homer games and first since Chipper Jones in July 2003.
- ▶ Drove in the "walk-off" run in the 11th inning on 9/22 vs. Milwaukee with an RBI single...homered in three straight games from 9/25-27.

## 2006

- ▶ Played in all 162 games for Texas, batting .282 (177-for-628) with 45 doubles, 33HR and 110RBI...won his second straight AL Gold Glove at first base, becoming the first Rangers first baseman to win the award twice.
- ▶ Became the first Ranger since Pete Incaviglia (1986-90) to record 20-or-more homers in each of his first four Major League seasons and the fourth player in club history to record three consecutive seasons of at least 30 home runs.
- ▶ Led the AL in game-winning RBI (19), ranked third in extra-base hits (79), fifth in doubles, sixth in at-bats (628), seventh in total bases (323), eighth in intentional walks (12) and ninth in walks (89).
- ▶ Collected his third consecutive 100-RBI season, becoming the fourth player in Texas history to accomplish the feat...also became the fourth Ranger to notch 30HR and 100RBI in consecutive seasons...was second on the club with 26 go-ahead RBI as well as 40 two-out RBI.
- ▶ Ranked by *Baseball America* as the best defensive first baseman in a survey of AL managers...posted a .997 fielding percentage (4E, 1572 TC), ranking second among all Major League first baseman behind Tampa Bay's Travis Lee (.998) for the second consecutive season.
- ▶ Hit .302 (51-for-169) off lefties and .275 (126-for-459) against right-handed pitching...totaled 21HR from the left side of the plate and 12HR from the right.
- ▶ Batted .275 (97-for-353) with 9HR and 49RBI prior to the All-Star break...following the break, hit .291 (80-for-275) with 24HR and 61RBI in the second half, ranking first in the Majors in homers, tied for second in RBI, placed fourth in walks (42) and slugging percentage (.604) and eighth in runs scored (51).
- ▶ Named Rangers' July "Player of the Month," batting .316 (15-for-37) with seven home runs and 18RBI.

- ▶ Tied a club record with a career-high 3HR on 7/13 at Baltimore in the first game after the All-Star break, and also tied career high with 7RBI...was the third time he homered from both sides in the same game...according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, he became the first player to hit three-or-more home runs in his team's first game after the All-Star break.
- ▶ Reached base safely in 36 consecutive games from 7/3-8/13 (.352, 44-for-125, 27R, 10HR, 26RBI, 22BB), matching the second-longest streak in the Majors in 2006 behind Orlando Cabrera's 63-game run.
- ▶ Participated in the inaugural World Baseball Classic for the United States, going hitless in four games.

## 2005

- ▶ Hit .301 with 41 doubles, 43HR and 144RBI in 162 games with Texas...set club records for home runs and RBI as a first baseman...established a Major League record for RBI by a switch hitter in a single season, surpassing the previous mark of 136 by the New York Giants' George Davis in 1896...finished seventh in AL Most Valuable Player voting.
- ▶ Led the AL in total bases (370), ranked second in extra-base hits (87), tied for second in RBI (144), placed fourth in home runs (43) and multi-hit games (59), fifth in slugging percentage (.575), tied for sixth in hits (194) and at-bats (644), ranked seventh in doubles (41), tied for seventh in runs (112) and finished 10th in on-base percentage (.379)...batted .366 (59-for-161) with runners in scoring position, placing second in the AL...hit .334 (104-for-311) with 30HR and 88RBI in 81 games at home, recording the fourth-best home average in the AL.
- ▶ Batted .292 (50-171) with 6HR and 29 RBI against left-handers and .304 (144-for-473) with 37HR and 115RBI against right-handers...hit his first 27 home runs from the left side of the plate, the most ever by a switch-hitter from one side of the plate to begin a season.
- ▶ Of his 43HR, 40 came as a first baseman...was the fourth-highest HR total in Major League history by a switch-hitter...became the fourth player in Texas history to record a 40-homer season, joining Juan Gonzalez, Rafael Palmeiro and Alex Rodriguez...became the 30th player all time with 20-or-more home runs in each of his first full Major League campaigns...averaged one HR every 15.0 at-bats, the eighth-best ratio in the AL.
- ▶ Registered 133RBI as a first baseman, leading all Major Leaguers and breaking his own club record of 112RBI as a first baseman, set in 2004...became just the fifth player in Texas history to record consecutive 100-RBI seasons...had the AL's third-best RBI ratio, averaging one every 4.5 at-bats.
- ▶ Earned his first career All-Star nod, receiving 2,187,115 fan votes and becoming the first Texas first baseman elected to start an All-Star game...started at 1B in the AL win on 7/12 at Detroit, going 1-for-3 with a sixth inning HR off Florida's Dontrelle Willis...the homer came from the right side, his first right-handed HR in any game (including spring training) in 2005...participated in the Home Run Derby on 7/11 and homered twice.
- ▶ Received his first career Rawlings Gold Glove Award, joining Rafael Palmeiro (1999) as the only Texas first basemen to claim the honor...made 154 starts at first base and led all qualifying AL first basemen with a .998 fielding percentage (3E, 1483TC), trailing only Cincinnati's Sean Casey among all Major League first basemen...was the eighth-best fielding percentage by a first baseman since 1986...led AL first basemen in total chances (1,483), putouts (1,378) and innings played at the position (1,358.0), and ranked second in assists (102).
- ▶ Earned an AL Silver Slugger Award for the second consecutive year.
- ▶ Named AL "Player of the Week" for the periods of 5/16-22 and 8/29-9/4.
- ▶ Hit his 100th career home run on 9/6 at Minnesota, joining Ralph Kiner, Albert Pujols, Eddie Mathews and Joe DiMaggio as the fifth player in Major League history to reach 100HR in their first three seasons...hit his 100th homer in his 430th career game, becoming one of four then-active Major Leaguers to reach 100 career home runs in 430-or-fewer games (also Albert Pujols-415 games, Mike Piazza-422 and Juan Gonzalez-423).
- ▶ Batted .356 (37-for-104) with 9HR and a Major League-best 35RBI in 27 games in September...marked the highest September RBI total for a Major Leaguer since Don Mattingly had 37RBI in September 1985...matched Carlton Fisk (1977) for the second-highest September RBI total since Divisional play began in 1969.

## 2004

- ▶ In his sophomore campaign, batted .281 (153-for-545) with 101R, 34 doubles, 38HR and 112RBI in 145 games with the Rangers...ranked fifth in the American League in home runs and extra base hits (74), tied for fifth in intentional walks (12), placed sixth in slugging percentage (.560), seventh in RBI and was the eighth hardest to double up, averaging 90.8 at-bats per GDP...led the team in each of those categories as well as on-base percentage (.370)...received his first AL Silver Slugger Award.
- ▶ Had a .313 (51-for-163) batting average with 11HR from the right side and hit .267 (102-for-382) with 27HR from the left side...hit .314 (43-for-137) with runners in scoring position.

- ▶ Recorded the highest home run total in Major League history by a switch-hitter 24 years old or younger, surpassing Mickey Mantle's 37HR in 1955 at age 23...led the AL with 33HR after 6/1...became the 12th player in club history to record a 30-homer season, joining Ruben Sierra (1987) and Mickey Tettleton (1995) as the only switch-hitters to do so...averaged a home run every 14.3 at-bats, the fifth-best ratio in the AL.
- ▶ All 112 of his RBI came as a first baseman, surpassing the club record set by Rafael Palmeiro (105) in 1993.
- ▶ Made 138 starts at 1B, four in RF and two as DH...led AL first basemen in assists (98) and ranked second in total chances...had just one error in his final 35 games (311 chances) in the field.
- ▶ Named AL "Player of the Month" and Rangers "Player of the Month" for July, batting .300 (30-for-100) with 27R, 13HR and 30RBI and becoming the first Texas player other than Alex Rodriguez to win the monthly award since 1999...tied for the Major League lead in homers, RBI and runs scored for the month...was the fourth-highest home run total in club history for a single month...homered 12 times in a span of 18 games from 6/28-7/19, including home runs in five consecutive games from 7/11-19 (5HR) to match a club record...also matched the second-longest home run streak ever by a switch-hitter.
- ▶ Homered from both sides of the plate for the first time in his career in 7/4 win at Houston, including a grand slam...named AL "Player of the Week" for the period ending 7/4...also connected for a grand slam in 7/18 win at Toronto.
- ▶ Recorded his first career four-hit game in 8/17 win vs. Cleveland, hitting for the cycle (third-inning double, fourth-inning homer, fifth-inning triple, seventh-inning single)...became the second player in Rangers history to hit for the cycle in a game, joining Oddibe McDowell who accomplished the feat on 7/23/85 vs. Cleveland...recorded 7RBI in the game, the most in a cycle game since Boston's Rich Gedman on 9/18/85...at the time, became the 14th switch-hitter to hit for the cycle, and first since Jose Valentin on 4/27/00...was the sixth switch-hitter with a cycle in AL history...recorded two hits from each side of the plate in the cycle, becoming just the third known switch-hitter to accomplish the feat (also Mickey Mantle and Wes Parker).

#### HITTING FOR THE CYCLE

On August 17, 2004 vs. Cleveland, Teixeira became the second Rangers player in franchise history to hit for the cycle, joining Oddibe McDowell (July 23, 1985 vs. Cleveland). Was the 245th cycle in Baseball history, 223rd since 1900 and 110th in the American League. Teixeira became the 14th switch-hitter to hit for the cycle and just the sixth American League switch-hitter to accomplish the feat. Was the fifth player to hit for the cycle in 2004 and the first switch-hitter, since 1970, to complete the cycle with a single. Became the first player to hit for the cycle in Rangers Ballpark (formerly Amerquest Field) and the third player to do it in the city of Arlington, joining McDowell and Baltimore's Cal Ripken, Jr. (May 6, 1984) who both accomplished the feat at Arlington Stadium.

## 2003

- ▶ In his first Major League season, hit .259 (137-for-529) with 29 doubles, 5 triples, 26HR and 84RBI in 146 games with Texas...led all rookies in homers and extra base hits (60), ranked second in RBI and walks (44), third in slugging percentage (.480), fourth in hits, total bases (254) and triples, and fifth in runs (66) and doubles...were the second-most homers ever for a Texas first-year player behind Pete Incaviglia (30) in 1986...the total also tied for the third-most ever by a rookie switch-hitter.
- ▶ Selected as the first baseman on the *Baseball Digest* and Topps Major League All-Star Rookie teams...named Rangers "Rookie of the Year" by local BBWAA chapter.
- ▶ Started 104 games at 1B and was also in the starting lineup at 3B (11), LF (10), RF (8) and DH (5)...had never played 1B prior to the 2003 season...ranked fifth among AL first basemen with a .996 fielding percentage (4E, 1006TC)...did not commit an error in his final 36 games at 1B beginning 8/20.
- ▶ Made his first Opening Day roster having played in just 86 professional games, the fewest for a Ranger since Incaviglia went directly from college to the Majors in 1986.
- ▶ Started at DH in his Major League debut on 4/1 at Anaheim, going 1-for-3 with 1BB...went hitless in his first 16AB before doubling off Mark Mulder on 4/9 vs. Oakland...connected for his first homer off Ted Lilly the next day vs. Oakland...hit his first grand slam off Baltimore's Rick Helling on 5/25, marking the first slam for a Texas rookie since Mike Stanley on 7/3/87 at the Yankees.
- ▶ Set a Texas club record for spring training homers (8).

## 2002

- ▶ Combined to bat .318 (102-for-321) with 19HR and 69RBI in 86 games at Single-A Charlotte and Double-A Tulsa in his first professional season...despite missing the first two months of the season, was selected as the third baseman on the *Baseball America* overall Minor League All-Star team as well as the Rangers' "Minor League Player of the Year."

- ▶ Opened season on the D.L. after rupturing a tendon in his left elbow and forearm while attempting to catch a foul pop in March...activated on 6/1 and hit safely in his first 12 games at a .354 (17-for-48) clip...named the Topps Florida State League "Player of the Month" for June.
- ▶ Promoted to Tulsa on 7/12 and hit .316 with 10HR and 28RBI in 47 starts at third base and one as the DH...had a .243 (9-for-37) average with 1HR and 4RBI in 10 Texas League playoff games.
- ▶ Selected as the top prospect in the both the Texas League and Florida State League by *Baseball America*...played for Peoria in Arizona Fall League, batting .333 (33-for-99) with 7HR and 23RBI in 27 games...ranked among the league leaders in slugging (second, .616), homers (tied for third), RBI (tied for fourth) and average (fifth) despite missing the last two weeks of the season with a strained abdominal muscle.

## 2001

- ▶ Was the fifth overall pick by the Rangers in the 2001 First-Year Player Draft, Texas' highest selection since 1989...signed a four-year contract through 2006 on 8/22 and participated in the Rangers' Florida Instructional League program, batting .246 with a team-high 13RBI in 20 games.

- ▶ Full name is Mark Charles Teixeira...he and his wife, Leigh, have two sons, Jack and William and daughter Addison...met his wife, an industrial-design Major, as a freshman at Georgia Tech...signed by Zackary Hoyrst (Rangers)...is an avid golfer...his favorite team growing up was the Baltimore Orioles and his favorite player was Don Mattingly...is a natural right-handed hitter...decided to become a dedicated switch hitter at the age of 13...is of Portuguese decent...his father, John, is a former Navy pilot who played high school baseball with Bucky Dent...his uncle, Pete, played in the Braves minor league system.
- ▶ In 2006, Mark and his wife established the Mark Teixeira Charitable Fund that supported six \$5,000 scholarships at three high schools in the Dallas/Ft. Worth area...in 2007, he increased the number of scholarships to 12...following the 2007 season, he held the first Tex's Holiday Hold 'Em poker tournament that raised over \$55,000 for his foundation...other community groups that have been helped by the Teixeiras include Cook Children's Medical Center, the Arlington Boys & Girls Club and the Arlington Police Department, where they worked to start a local Police Athletic League (PAL) for the youth of Arlington...won the 2006 "Harold McKinney Good Guy Award" as voted on by the Dallas/Ft. Worth chapter of the BBWAA.
- ▶ Teamed up with Coppertone's "Help Strike Out Sun Damage" program in 2009 as a spokesman for the National Foundation for Cancer Research.
- ▶ In May 2010, Mark and Leigh partnered up with Harlem RBI, making a \$100,000 donation to the Harlem RBI Futures Fund to support Harlem RBI's college-bound seniors...in addition, Mark signed up as a member of the Harlem RBI Board of Directors and serves as an Honorary Chair of Harlem RBI's Capital Campaign.





# History of the New York Yankees



**T**he Yankees are Baseball's most storied franchise. With 27 World Championships and 40 American League pennants to its name, the Yankees stand alone in both categories.

The team's glorious history has surprisingly humble origins at the start of the previous century, when the upstart American League declared itself a Major League following the 1900 season. At that time, the league sought to place a team in New York for the 1901 campaign. But due to the political strength of the National League's New York Giants, the American League instead put a team in Baltimore, calling it the Orioles, with the intent to move it to New York as soon as possible.

Managed by John McGraw, the 1901 Orioles finished 68-65 and failed to draw substantial crowds. The following season, McGraw, fearing the team would relocate to New York without him in 1903, precipitated a midseason release from his contract. He immediately teamed with Giants owner Andrew Freedman and Cincinnati Reds owner John T. Brush, helping them acquire a majority interest in the Orioles. With control of Baltimore's players, the pair of owners decimated the squad, divvying up the players between them. On July 17, 1902, the Baltimore Orioles were left with five players on their roster and were forced to forfeit their game against the St. Louis Browns. The American League quickly stepped in and lent Baltimore players from other teams so they could finish the season.


Prior to the 1903 campaign, the two leagues reached a truce, part of which involved the National League agreeing to allow an American League team in New York City. Racehorse owner Frank Farrell and ex-New York chief

of police Bill Devery purchased the remnants of the Baltimore franchise for \$18,000 and reestablished it in upper Manhattan.

The New York Americans, as they were formally named, were New York City's third Major League team, joining the Giants and Brooklyn Dodgers of the National League. They played home games at American League Park, a hastily constructed all-wooden structure at 168th Street and Broadway. Because the site was one of the highest spots in Manhattan, the team was commonly called the "Hilltoppers" or "Highlanders" and their home field "Hilltop Park." The club played its inaugural game on April 22, 1903, at Washington, losing 3-1 to the Senators. The next day, they defeated the Senators, 7-2, recording the very first win in franchise history.

Led by future Hall of Famers Jack Chesboro, Clark Griffith and Wee Willie Keeler, the Highlanders finished with a 72-62 record, 17.0 games out of first place. They nearly captured the American League pennant in 1904—finishing 1.5 games behind the Boston Pilgrims—as Chesboro went 41-12 with a 1.82 ERA in 454.2 innings pitched, setting a modern-era (since 1900) record with his win total. That season marked the first of three second-place finishes for the club between 1904 and 1910.

After a spectacular fire severely damaged the Polo Grounds in 1911, the Highlanders' owners invited the Giants to share Hilltop Park until their home could be rebuilt. Two years later, the Giants returned the favor and allowed the Highlanders to become tenants in their rebuilt and vastly superior facility. With the move in 1913, the

Highlanders officially changed their name to "Yankees," by which they had actually been known for most of their history.

From 1911 to 1919, the Yankees won as many as 80 games in a season only twice. But three key moves—the January 11, 1915, purchase of the ballclub by Colonel Jacob Ruppert and Colonel Tillinghast L'Hommedieu Huston, the 1918 hiring of Manager Miller Huggins by Ruppert (without Huston's blessing) and the 1919 midseason trade for right-handed pitcher Carl Mays (26 wins in 1920 and 27 wins in 1921)—set the stage for the most course-altering transaction in baseball history.

On January 3, 1920, the Yankees purchased the contract of George Herman "Babe" Ruth from the Boston Red Sox for \$125,000 and a \$350,000 loan against the mortgage on Fenway Park.

Ruth's impact was immediate. The Yankees won 95 games in 1920, their highest victory total up to that point, then captured their first American League pennant a year later. With the Babe hitting 54 home runs in 1920—more than any other team in the American League—Yankees attendance at the Polo Grounds doubled to 1,289,422. In 1921, the Giants, being outdrawn in their own park, asked the Yankees to vacate the Polo Grounds as soon as possible. Now bitter rivals, the two teams squared off in the World Series in 1921 and 1922 with the Giants winning on both occasions.

Though he came up on the wrong end in both Series, Yankees pitcher—and 1969 Hall of Fame inductee—Waite Hoyt allowed just one earned run over 35.0 combined innings over the two Fall Classics. Remarkably, he went 2-2 in his five appearances (four starts), including a 1-0, Series-clinching loss (on an unearned run) in Game 8 of the 1921 best-of-nine championship.

With their departure from the Polo Grounds inevitable, the Yankees' owners set out to build a ballpark of their own. Designed to be baseball's first triple-decked structure with an advertised capacity of 70,000, it would also be the first baseball facility to be labeled a "stadium."

Construction began on May 5, 1922, and in only 284 working days, Yankee Stadium was ready for its inaugural game on April 18, 1923 vs. the Boston Red Sox. An announced crowd of 74,200 fans packed Yankee Stadium for a glimpse of Baseball's grandest facility while thousands milled around outside after the fire department finally ordered the gates closed. Appropriately, Ruth christened his new home with a three-run homer to cap a four-run third inning as the Yankees won, 4-1.

Playing in their new stadium, the Yankees won the American League by 16.0 games in 1923, using just eight pitchers all season. Each of their five starters—Bob Shawkey, Joe Bush, Waite Hoyt, Sam Jones and Herb Pennock—won at least 16 games. Yet it was Ruth's tremendous power that people were coming to see, and Yankee Stadium quickly became known as "The House That Ruth Built." Later that season, the Stadium hosted the first of 37 World Series at the structure, and the Yankees won their first World Championship over their former landlord, the Giants.

On June 1, 1925, in a 5-3 loss vs. Washington, Huggins inserted a 21-year-old rookie first baseman as a pinch-hitter for light-hitting shortstop Paul "Pee Wee" Wanninger. No one could have imagined at the time that this appearance would be the first of 2,130 consecutive games played by Lou Gehrig, who, with Ruth and later Joe DiMaggio, anchored some of the greatest ballclubs of all time.

After a tough loss to the St. Louis Cardinals in the 1926 World Series, the Yankees rolled to World Championships in both 1927 and 1928, sweeping Pittsburgh and St. Louis, respectively. The 1927 club, the second Yankees team to be labeled "Murderers' Row" (the first was the 1919 squad), is often the yardstick by which team greatness is measured. During that season, Ruth broke his own single-season home run record (previously 59 in 1921) with his 60th on September 30, 1927, off Washington's Tom Zachary. Gehrig also added 47 homers and 175 RBI.

In his 15 seasons in pinstripes, Ruth helped build a winning tradition with seven American League pennants and four World Championships (also 1932). He finished his unparalleled career with 714 home runs (including 49 with the Red Sox from 1914-19 and six with the Boston Braves in 1935), 12 American League home run titles and six RBI crowns, including five seasons with more than 150 RBI. A charter member of Baseball's Hall of Fame, he remains widely regarded as the greatest player of all time.

Throughout Ruth's time in pinstripes, he often overshadowed the soft-spoken, Manhattan-born Gehrig. Yet the "Iron Horse" posted incredible numbers in his own right. From 1926 through 1938, Gehrig drove in at least 112 runs each season. A member of six World Championship clubs (1927-28, 1932, 1936-38), he finished with a .340 lifetime batting average and 493 career home runs in just 8,001 at-bats. He was the AL's starting first baseman in each of the first five Major League Baseball All-Star Games, and in 1934, he became the first of two Yankees in franchise history (also Mickey Mantle in 1956) to win the Triple Crown, hitting .363 with a career-best 49 homers and 165 RBI. He also still holds the American League record for RBI in a single season with 184 in 1931.

After the 1934 season, Ruth's last in New York, the Yankees purchased the contract of a budding star named Joe DiMaggio from the San Francisco Seals of the Pacific Coast League. Two years later, DiMaggio made his debut in pinstripes and helped the Yankees to an incredible string of four consecutive World Championships under Manager Joe McCarthy from 1936 through 1939. The 1930s also produced one of the game's

greatest lefty-righty pitching combinations in future Hall of Famers Lefty Gomez and Red Ruffing. A four-time 20-game winner—including 24-7 in 1932 and 26-5 in 1934—Gomez posted a 6-0 record over five World Series. Ruffing, who was acquired in May 1930 from the Boston Red Sox for outfielder Cedric Durst and \$50,000, had been 39-96 with the Red Sox since his 1924 rookie season. After coming to the Yankees, however, he forged a legacy worthy of Cooperstown, going 231-124 in pinstripes while posting 20, 20, 21 and 21 wins on the four World Championship clubs from 1936 through 1939. He was also an exceptionally good hitter for a pitcher, totaling 36 career home runs and a .269 lifetime batting average.

From 1931 through part of the 1946 season, the Yankees were led by McCarthy, who compiled a Yankees-record 1,460 wins in his time at the helm. Having also spent time leading the Chicago Cubs (1926-1930) and the Boston Red Sox (1948-50), he stands at eighth place on the all-time managerial wins list with 2,125 victories. With the Yankees, he reached eight World Series (1932, 1936-39, 1941-43), winning a World Championship in all but one—the 1942 Fall Classic against St. Louis.

Sadly, in 1939, Gehrig was diagnosed with a crippling disease, eventually determined to be amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), and his streak of playing in 2,130 consecutive games came to an end on May 2, when he took himself out of the lineup prior to the Yankees' 22-2 win at Detroit. He never played in a Major League game again.

On July 4 of the same season, the Yankees honored their captain with an emotional Lou Gehrig Appreciation Day at Yankee Stadium, and his uniform No. 4 became the first in Baseball to be retired. He died on June 2, 1941.

With Gehrig's retirement, DiMaggio became the pillar of the next generation of Yankees champions. In his 13 seasons in pinstripes (1936-42 and '46-51), DiMaggio made the AL All-Star team every year, and his club played in the World Series in all but three years (1940, '46, '48), winning nine World Series titles. Along the way, he tallied three AL MVP Awards (1939, '41, '47) and batted .324 over his career, marking the third-highest average in franchise history. The legendary "Yankee Clipper" compiled one of the game's most remarkable—and perhaps unbreakable—records in 1941, when he hit safely in an all-time-best 56 consecutive games.

DiMaggio's retirement after the 1951 season at the age of 37 was made easier by the emergence of Mickey Mantle, who played side-by-side with DiMaggio in the outfield in the Yankee Clipper's final campaign. With contributions from future Hall of Famers Yogi Berra, Whitey Ford and Phil Rizzuto, the Yankees were nearly unstoppable from the late 1940s through the early 1960s. Manager Casey Stengel sublimely handled the Yankees juggernaut following his surprising appointment prior to the 1949 season as the club marched to an all-time record five consecutive World Series titles from 1949 through 1953.


His emphasis on platooning players (often to their chagrin) allowed him to exploit matchups in a way not emphasized in his era. Nicknamed "The Old Perfessor," with a vernacular called "Stengelese," he remains one of the most colorful personalities in the game's history.

In 12 seasons as manager of the Yankees, he brought his club to the World Series 10 times, winning on seven occasions (also 1956 and 1958).

Mantle would achieve greatness despite suffering from osteomyelitis (a painful inflammatory bone disease) and numerous other injuries.

The powerful switch-hitter belted 536 home runs, collected 2,415 hits and batted .300 or higher 10 times in an 18-year career. In his first 14 seasons in pinstripes (1951-64), the Yankees missed the World Series only twice (1954 and 1959) and won the Fall Classic seven times. With his .353 batting average, 52 homers and 130 RBI in 1956, he remains the last Yankees player to win the Triple Crown.

Ford, who played his whole career in pinstripes, is the Yankees' all-time wins leader. His lifetime record of 236-106 gives him the second-best career winning percentage (.690) of any modern-era (since 1900) pitcher with 100 or more decisions, trailing only career-Yankee Spud Chandler (.717, 109-43). Ford paced the American League in victories

three times and in ERA and shutouts twice. He still holds many World Series records, including those for wins (10), consecutive scoreless innings (33.0) and strikeouts (94).

The heart of the Yankees for 18 seasons, Berra played on an incredible 14 pennant winners and 10 World Championship teams—a record number for any individual player in Baseball history. He is one of only 10 players in Major League history to win three MVP Awards, and he was selected to the All-Star team in every season from 1948 through 1962.

Rizzuto played on 10 pennant winners and eight World Series championship teams from 1941 through 1956, capturing the league's MVP award in 1950, batting .324 with 200 hits and 125 runs scored. Eventually elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1994, he gave one of the most memorable induction speeches in the history of the ceremony.

Not every notable Yankee was a future Hall of Famer. In Game 5 of the 1956 World Series vs. the Brooklyn Dodgers at Yankee Stadium, right-hander Don Larsen authored one of the game's greatest pitching performances when he retired all 27 Dodger batters for the only perfect game in World Series history.

The Yankees opened the 1960s winning pennants in the first five seasons (1960-64) and World Series titles in 1961 and 1962. Incredibly, in the 29 seasons from 1936 to 1964, the Yankees won 22 pennants and 16 World Championships. The 1961 club is still regarded as one of the best teams in Baseball history. With Mantle and Roger Maris embroiled in a season-long race to break Ruth's single-season home run record, the Yankees rolled to 109 wins en route to a World Championship. Maris broke Ruth's record when he belted his 61st home run on October 1 off Boston's Tracy Stallard at Yankee Stadium in the last game of the season.

Age finally caught up with the ballclub after a seven-game Series loss to the St. Louis Cardinals in 1964. The Yankees would finish above fourth place just once in the next nine seasons and actually fell to last place in 1966 for the first time in 53 years.

The team's fall from grace ended on January 2, 1973, when it was sold by CBS to a group headed by George M. Steinbrenner III. With the addition of Catfish Hunter, Baseball's first marquee free agent, shrewd trades that brought Ed Figueroa, Mickey Rivers, Chris Chambliss and Willie Randolph to the club, and a strong nucleus that included Thurman Munson, Graig Nettles, Roy White and Sparky Lyle, the Yankees returned to the postseason in 1976, ending an 11-year drought (1965-1975) by winning their first American League East title. Then on October 14, 1976, in the deciding Game 5 of the AL Championship Series vs. Kansas City, Chambliss launched a ninth-inning, pennant-winning home run

to put the Yankees back in the World Series.

This newfound success took place in a remodeled Yankee Stadium. The 1974 and '75 Yankees played in Shea Stadium for two years while vast improvements were made to the original Yankee Stadium (for more details, see "History of Original Yankee Stadium").

After a disheartening four-game sweep by the Cincinnati Reds in the 1976 World Series, the Yankees introduced Reggie Jackson—the most prolific slugger of his era—as the

club's newest free-agent acquisition. Jackson capped an exciting 1977 season with one of baseball's greatest individual performances. In the Game 6 World Series-clinching win vs. Los Angeles at Yankee Stadium, "Mr. October" belted three home runs on three swings of the bat to join Babe Ruth as the only players to hit three home runs in a single World Series game.

In 1978, the Yankees overcame a 14.0-game deficit in the American League East to force a one-game playoff with the Boston Red Sox at Fenway Park to decide the American League pennant. Shortstop Bucky Dent erased a 2-0, seventh-inning Red Sox lead with a dramatic three-run homer, and the Yankees went on to a 5-4 win en route to a second straight World Championship over the Dodgers.

The 1978 season also saw the emergence of Ron Guidry as one of the franchise's greatest pitchers. A four-time American League All-Star, Guidry compiled one

of the most dominating seasons in baseball history while becoming known as "Louisiana Lightning." He went 25-3 with a 1.74 ERA in leading the Yankees to their dramatic comeback, compiling a club-record 248 strikeouts and nine shutouts en route to a unanimous selection as the AL Cy Young Award recipient. On June 17, 1978 vs. the California Angels at Yankee Stadium, Guidry set a club record by striking out 18 batters. A five-time Gold Glove Award winner, Guidry also racked up 20-win seasons in 1983 (21-9) and 1985 (22-6).

The 1970s ended with tragedy. Thurman Munson, the Yankees' first captain since Gehrig, was killed when his private jet crashed on August 2, 1979. Only 32 years old at the time of his death, Munson was the undisputed leader of the clubs that won three consecutive pennants and two World Championships. After the captain's death, the Yankees would make only one more World Series appearance (1981) in the next 17 years despite compiling the best record in the Major Leagues during the 1980s.

During this period, Don Mattingly became one of the most popular players in franchise history, batting .307 in a 14-year career (1982-95) played en-

tirely in pinstripes. He compiled an incredible six-year stretch from 1984 through 1989, in which he batted .327 and topped 100 RBI five times, including a career-high 145 in 1985, when he captured the AL MVP Award. A year earlier, he out-duelled teammate Dave Winfield for the 1984 AL batting

crown (.343 to .340), going 4-for-5 on the final day of the season. His performance and loyalty were recognized when he was named the 10th captain in Yankees history from 1991-95.

Winfield, who came to the Yankees as the game's most sought-after free agent in 1981, compiled Hall of Fame credentials in his eight-plus seasons in pinstripes (1981-90). With the Yankees, he belted 205 home runs with 818 RBI and won five Gold Glove Awards.

After a 13-year absence (1982-94), the Yankees returned to postseason play in 1995 as the American League's first-ever "Wild Card" entry. A heart-wrenching five-game loss to the Seattle Mariners in the Division Series marked the start of a 13-year run of consecutive postseason appearances (1995-2007), a record topped only by the Atlanta Braves' 14-season streak (1991-93, 1995-2005).

In 1996 under new skipper Joe Torre, the Yankees returned to the World Series against Atlanta, coming back from an 0-2 deficit to win four straight games, including Games 3, 4 and 5 in Atlanta. Following a Division Series exit in 1997, the Yankees won three straight World titles from 1998 through 2000, giving them four championships in five years. Their 114 victories in 1998 shattered the 44-year-old American League mark of 111 wins set by the 1954 Cleveland Indians (since broken by Seattle in 2001) and their 125 total victories, including 11 postseason wins, remains the highest single-season total in baseball history.

In the last two decades since the signing of non-drafted free agent Bernie Williams in 1991, the Yankees

farm system has produced All-Stars Robinson Cano, Derek Jeter, Andy Pettitte, Phil Hughes, Jorge Posada and Mariano Rivera. In addition, trades and free-agent acquisitions have brought such All-Stars as Wade Boggs, Scott Brosius, David Cone, Jimmy Key, Tino Martinez, Hideki Matsui and Mike Mussina to the Bronx. Another of those players, Paul O'Neill, acquired in a November 3, 1992, trade with Cincinnati, became adored by Yankees fans for his intense and gritty approach. Winner of the 1994 batting title (.359) and often described as a "warrior," he is typically thought of as the heart and soul of the club's turn-of-the-century success.

In 2001, the Yankees fell just shy of becoming the second team in history to win four consecutive World Series titles, but they nevertheless captured the hearts of the nation in the aftermath of the terrorist attacks of September 11. The Yankees dropped the first two games of the Series at the Arizona Diamondbacks' Bank One Ballpark but rallied to win the next three at Yankee Stadium behind dramatic ninth-inning comebacks in both Games 4 and 5. On consecutive nights, Martinez and Brosius erased two-run, ninth-inning Diamondbacks leads with home runs, and the Yankees won both games in extra innings. It was in Game 4 that Jeter earned his "Mr. November" nickname with a 10th-inning "walk-off" home run. The victories marked the first time in World Series history that a team won two games in the same Series when trailing by at least two runs in the ninth inning.

No one personifies the Yankees' success since 1996 more than Jeter, who was a rookie on that squad. Heading into the 2011 season, his 2,926 hits make him Baseball's active hit leader, and his personal career winning percentage of .601 (1,379-914-2) is the best among active Major League players who have played in a minimum of 1,000 games. In 2009, he further cemented his legacy by becoming the Yankees' all-time hits leader (2,747), passing Lou Gehrig (2,721), who had held the mark since 1937. Jeter has also recorded seven 200-hit seasons and is one of two players in franchise history along with Gehrig (eight) with as many as four. In fact, according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, no other player has had as many as four 200-hit seasons while playing at least 100 games at shortstop per year.

Posada and Rivera have crafted special places for themselves in the annals of the franchise. Posada, a 24th-round selection in the 1990 First-Year Player Draft, is one of six catchers in Major League history to hit at least 20 home runs in eight seasons while playing a minimum of 50 percent of his games behind the plate. Known for his toughness and durability, the Puerto Rico-born backstop started at least 120 games in eight consecutive seasons from 2000-07. Rivera, with 559 career saves going into 2011, ranks second on Baseball's all-time list behind only Trevor Hoffman (601). His reputation has been cemented by postseason excellence, which includes an 8-1 record and 0.71 ERA in 94 career postseason games (139.2 innings pitched). His Major League-leading 42 career postseason saves is almost as many as the totals of the second, third and fourth place pitchers on the list combined (44). Additionally, his 2.23 career ERA is the second-lowest all time among pitchers with at least 1,000.0IP since ERA was made an official statistic in 1912 in NL and 1913 in AL (Eddie Cicotte 2.20).

In 2004, the organization acquired Alex Rodriguez in a trade from the Texas Rangers. Since his arrival in the Bronx, the now 13-time All-Star transitioned to a new position at third base and was voted the AL MVP in 2005 and 2007, while becoming the seventh—and youngest—player in baseball history reach the 600-home run plateau in 2007.


Former Yankees catcher Joe Girardi was named the 32nd manager in franchise history on October 30, 2007, heading into the final year of the original Yankee Stadium. The 2008 season was full of nostalgia, and notable events included the third Papal Mass in Stadium history on April 20 and a 15-inning, 4-3 American League victory in the All-Star Game on July 15. Though the Yankees played their last-ever home game in the original Stadium on September 21, defeating the Baltimore Orioles, 7-3, the drama of the season didn't end until its final day as Mike Mussina earned a win in the first game of a doubleheader over Boston at Fenway Park to become the oldest first-time 20-game winner in baseball history.

The 2009 season proved nothing short of storybook material as the club finished the inaugural season in the newly-constructed Yankee Stadium with the best regular season record in the Majors (103-59) and a six-game World Series win over the Phillies. The 2009 season featured 15 "walk-off" wins along with an all-time Major League-record 18-consecutive errorless games from May 14 through June 1. Free-agent acquisitions CC Sabathia (19 wins), A.J. Burnett (13 wins) and Mark Teixeira (second in AL MVP voting, 39 homers, 122 RBI) each played major roles in the club's success.

The most recent season,

2010, will be sadly remembered for the passings of Principal Owner George M. Steinbrenner III and longtime public address announcer Bob Sheppard.

On the field, the season marked the 15th time in the last 16 years (since 1995) that the Yankees had made the postseason. Looking forward, the Yankees will continue to concentrate on procuring and nurturing young talent. Pitcher Phil Hughes and second baseman Robinson Cano are illustrative of the team's commitment to youth and international scouting. With the 2011 season at hand, the Yankees will strive toward the singular goal of bringing a 28th championship back to the Bronx. ✱

# History of the Yankees Uniform

When the Yankees (then "Highlanders") first took the field for their inaugural season in 1903, their uniforms did not resemble the iconic style for which they are known today. A large ornate "N" decorated one breast and a large ornate "Y" the other. Two years later for the 1905 season, the "N" and "Y" were merged side by side into a monogram on the left breast, creating a forerunner of the now legendary emblem.

It wasn't until 1909 that the most recognizable insignia in sports—the interlocking "NY"—made its first appearance on the caps and left sleeves of Highlanders uniforms. The design was created in 1877 by Tiffany & Co. for a medal to be given by the New York City Police Department to Officer John McDowell, the first NYC policeman shot in the line of duty. Perhaps because one of the club's owners, Bill Devery, was a former NYC police chief, the design was adopted by the organization. The familiar "NY" eventually migrated from the left sleeve to the left breast of home uniforms from 1912-16, albeit in a larger version than is currently worn today.

In 1912, their final season at Hilltop Park, the Yankees (as they were commonly known by then) made a fashionable debut at their April 11 home opener by wearing pinstripes for the first time in their history. The club was not the first team to wear pinstripes (eight of Baseball's other 15 teams had already worn them at some point), and they would actually abandon the look in the following two seasons (1913-14). By 1915, though, home pinstripes were back for good.

In 1917, the Yankees removed the "NY" monogram from the jersey and went with a plain, pinstripes-only look. The "NY" remained off the uniform—except for the cap—for the next 20 years until it was reinstated in 1936. Babe Ruth, whose Yankees career spanned 1920-1934, played his entire Yankees career without ever wearing the club's now-legendary insignia on his jersey.

The Yankees utilized numerous cap designs from 1903 until 1921—including pinstripes in 1915, '16, '19 and '21—until they

finally settled on a solid navy cap with the interlocking "NY" insignia in 1922.

The club's road uniforms have remained relatively unchanged since 1918—solid grey with "NEW YORK" in block letters across the chest. The notable exception was from 1927-30, when "NEW YORK" was replaced by "YANKEES." In 1973, with the introduction of more breathable double-knit uniforms, Yankees road jerseys added navy-and-white banded trim to the cuffs of the sleeves as well as white shadowing behind the jersey lettering.

The home uniform remains the Yankees' signature look. With the exception of minor alterations—including bolder pinstripes in the 1940s—it has remained mostly unchanged for more than 70 years.

For the 2008 season, the Yankees wore an All-Star Game patch on their left sleeve and a Yankee Stadium Final Season tribute patch on their right sleeve. In 2009, the club wore a patch on their left sleeve and one on the back of their cap, each to commemorate the inaugural season of Yankee Stadium. And most recently, in 2010, the club wore a "GMS" patch above the NY logo on their jersey front to honor the passing of Principal Owner George M. Steinbrenner III, as well as a patch on their left sleeve as a tribute to the passing of Bob Sheppard. They also wore a black armband on the left sleeve to remember the passing of Ralph Houk. ✎

## Origin of Numbered Uniforms

Numbers first appeared on Major League uniforms on June 26, 1916, when the Cleveland Indians wore large numerals on their left sleeves in an experiment that lasted just a few weeks. Another brief trial by Cleveland the next season and a similar sleeve trial by the St. Louis Cardinals in 1923 both proved temporary. It wasn't until the 1929 season that another attempt was made, as both Cleveland and the New York Yankees began their seasons with numbers as a permanent part of their respective uniforms. Though the Yankees are typically credited as being the team with the longest-standing such policy, it should be noted that the Indians began their season two days earlier than the Bombers, as the Yankees' April 16 Opening Day contest was rained out.

The initial distribution of numbers to the Yankees roster was made according to the player's position in the batting order. Therefore, in 1929, leadoff hitter Earle Combs wore No. 1, Mark Koenig No. 2, Babe Ruth No. 3, Lou Gehrig No. 4, Bob Meusel No. 5, Tony Lazzeri No. 6, Leo Durocher No. 7, Johnny Grabowski No. 8, Benny Bengough No. 9 and Bill Dickey No. 10 (Grabowski, Bengough and Dickey shared the catching duties). By the mid-1930s, other teams adopted the idea, and uniform numbers became the standard for all teams.



# Important Dates in Yankees History



**Hilltop Park, first home of the Yankees**

**Jan. 9, 1903** - Frank Farrell and Bill Devery purchase the defunct Baltimore franchise of the American League for \$18,000, then move the team to Manhattan.

**March 12, 1903** - The New York franchise is approved as a member of the American League. The team will play in a hastily constructed, wooden ballpark at 168th Street and Broadway. Because the site is one of the highest spots in Manhattan, their home field is referred to as "Hilltop Park."

**April 22, 1903** - The Highlanders (as the Yankees were commonly known then) play their first game, a 3-1 loss at Washington.

**April 23, 1903** - Pitcher Harry Howell records the first victory in franchise history, a 7-2 win at Washington.

**April 30, 1903** - The Highlanders notch a 6-2 win vs. Washington in their inaugural home opener at Hilltop Park.

**April 11, 1912** - Pinstripes first appear on Highlanders uniforms, creating a look that would become the most famous uniform design in sports.

**April 1913** - The Highlanders are officially renamed "Yankees" after moving to the Polo Grounds, home of the National League's New York Giants.

**Jan. 11, 1915** - Col. Jacob Ruppert and Col. Tillinghast L'Hommedieu Huston purchase the Yankees for \$465,000.

**April 24, 1917** - George Mogridge becomes the first Yankee to throw a no-hitter in a 2-1 win at Fenway Park.

**Jan. 3, 1920** - The Yankees purchase the contract of Babe Ruth from the Boston Red Sox for \$125,000 and a \$350,000 loan against the mortgage on Fenway Park.

**Oct. 5, 1921** - The Yankees play the first postseason game in franchise history, as Carl Mays tosses a complete game shutout to defeat the New York Giants at the Polo Grounds in Game 1 of the World Series.

**May 5, 1922** - Construction begins on Yankee Stadium.

**May 21, 1922** - Col. Ruppert buys out Col. Huston for \$1.5 million.

**April 18, 1923** - Yankee Stadium opens with a 4-1 win over the Boston Red Sox before an announced crowd of 74,200. Babe Ruth hits the Stadium's first home run.



**Oct. 15, 1923** - The Yankees defeat the New York Giants, 6-4, at the Polo Grounds in Game 6 of the World Series, clinching the first World Championship in franchise history.

**June 1, 1925** - Lou Gehrig begins his record streak of 2,130 consecutive games played, pinch-hitting for "Pee Wee" Wanninger in a 5-3 loss to Washington at Yankee Stadium.

**Oct. 6, 1926** - Babe Ruth becomes the first player to hit three home runs in a single World Series game in Game 4 at St. Louis.

**June 23, 1927** - In an 11-4 Yankees win at Fenway Park, Lou Gehrig become the first (of two) players in franchise history to hit 3HR in a single game against the Red Sox (also see May 8, 2010).

**Sept. 30, 1927** - Babe Ruth breaks his own single-season Major League record by hitting his 60th home run (off Tom Zachary) in a 4-2 win over Washington at Yankee Stadium.

**April 20, 1928** - Yankee Stadium's left field stands are enlarged to three decks.

**Oct. 9, 1928** - In Game 4 of the World Series vs. the Cardinals at St. Louis' Sportsman's Park, Babe Ruth hits three home runs, marking his second three-homer World Series game.

**April 18, 1929** - The Yankees wear numbered uniforms for the first time in their history, two days after the Cleveland Indians permanently adopt them as well (Numbers would become standard for all teams by 1932).

**Sept. 24, 1929** - The Yankees celebrate Babe Ruth Day at Fenway Park by winning, 5-3, over Boston. Ruth goes 2-for-3 with a double and Tom Zachary (pitching for the Yankees) records his final decision of the season, improving to 12-0, still a Major League record for most wins in a season without a loss.

## Origin of the Names "Highlanders" and "Yankees"

When the American League moved the Baltimore Orioles to New York for the 1903 season, the club made its home at 168th Street and Broadway, one of the highest spots in Manhattan. As a result, the team became known as the "Hilltoppers" and their field "Hilltop Park," even though their formal team name was "New York Americans" and formal ballpark name "American League Park."

The name "Highlanders," as the team of that era is most popularly remembered today, also started in the club's formative years. It originated not only as a nod to their elevated Manhattan perch, but also as a

reference to club president Joseph W. Gordon, whose last name conjured up thoughts of the famous British army unit, the Gordon Highlanders.

Other nicknames for the team were "Porch Climbers," "Burglars," and "Invaders"—all three usually reserved for writers sympathetic to the New York Giants, who held lingering animosity at having American League competition in such close proximity.

As early as 1904, however, the name "Yankees" became common in the press. The earliest known use was in an April 7, 1904, article in the *New York Evening Journal* that bore the headline "YANKEES WILL START HOME FROM

SOUTH TODAY," which was published following a successful spring training spent in the Southern U.S. A week later, the same newspaper's coverage of Opening Day was headlined "YANKEES BEAT BOSTON," and the term also appeared in the article's lead sentence.

"Yankees" was a natural fit given the club's formal name, but likely owes its success to newspaper typesetters and editors grateful for a team name with fewer letters than "Highlanders" or "Hilltoppers." When the franchise moved from Hilltop Park to the Polo Grounds in 1913, it officially changed its name to "New York Yankees."

**Sept. 25, 1929** - Manager Miller Huggins, who guided the Yankees to their first six AL pennants and three World Championships, dies of blood poisoning.

**June 3, 1932** - Lou Gehrig becomes the first player to hit four home runs in a single game in the Yankees' 20-13 win at Philadelphia. The news is overshadowed by the retirement announcement of New York Giants Manager John McGraw. Gehrig remains the only Yankee to hit four home runs in one game.

**Aug. 13, 1932** - Red Ruffing throws a complete game shutout and hits a 10th-inning solo home run off Washington Senators pitcher Al Thomas, giving the Yankees a 1-0 victory at Griffith Stadium. Though not the first to do so, no Major League pitcher has since thrown a complete game shutout and hit a home run in a 1-0 game.

**Oct. 1, 1932** - In the fifth inning of the Yankees' 7-5 victory over the Chicago Cubs at Wrigley Field in Game 3 of the World Series, Babe Ruth gestures toward the bleachers before hitting his second home run of the game. Though Lou Gehrig also hits two homers that day, the game will be remembered for Ruth's much-debated "called shot."

**June 6, 1934** - Myril Hoag goes 6-for-6 in a 15-3, nine-inning win in Game 1 of a doubleheader at Boston, becoming the first of only two Yankees to go 6-for-6 in a single game (see June 7, 2008 - Johnny Damon).

**Nov. 21, 1934** - The Yankees purchase Joe DiMaggio from the San Francisco Seals of the Pacific Coast League for \$50,000.

**May 24, 1936** - Tony Lazzeri hits three home runs (including two grand slams) and a triple, setting a still-standing AL record with 11 RBI in a single game in a 25-2 win at Philadelphia.

**April 20, 1937** - The Yankees' 15th season at Yankee Stadium opens with the right-field stands enlarged to three decks. Wooden bleachers are replaced by a concrete structure, and the distance to center field drops from 490 feet to 461 feet.

**May 30, 1938** - A franchise-record crowd of 81,841 attends a doubleheader sweep of the Boston Red Sox at Yankee Stadium.

**Aug. 27, 1938** - Monte Pearson authors the first Yankee Stadium no-hitter by a Yankee, defeating Cleveland, 13-0, in Game 2 of a doubleheader.

**May 2, 1939** - Lou Gehrig's playing streak of 2,130 consecutive games ends when he does not make an appearance in a 22-2 Yankees win at Detroit. Babe Dahlgren plays first base for the Yankees and contributes a double and a home run.

**July 4, 1939** - "Lou Gehrig Appreciation Day" is held at Yankee Stadium in between games of a doubleheader vs. Washington. His uniform No. 4 is the first to be retired in Major League Baseball. Gehrig makes his famous "luckiest man on the face of the earth" speech.

**May 15, 1941** - Joe DiMaggio's 56-game hitting streak begins with a single off Edgar Smith in a 13-1 loss vs. Chicago at Yankee Stadium.

**June 2, 1941** - Lou Gehrig dies of Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis at the age of 37 in the Riverdale section of the Bronx.

**July 17, 1941** - Joe DiMaggio's consecutive-game hitting streak ends at 56 when he goes 0-for-3 in a 4-3 Yankees win at Cleveland. Indians third baseman Ken Keltner twice robs DiMaggio of hits with great fielding plays. DiMaggio hits safely in his next 16 games, giving him hits in 72 of 73 games.

**Jan. 25, 1945** - Dan Topping, Del Webb and Larry MacPhail purchase the Yankees for \$2.8 million from the estate of the late Col. Jacob Ruppert. MacPhail replaces Ed Barrow as President and General Manager.

**May 28, 1946** - The first night game is played at Yankee Stadium, a 2-1 loss vs. Washington before 49,917 fans.

**April 27, 1947** - "Babe Ruth Day" is celebrated at Yankee Stadium and throughout Major League Baseball.

**June 13, 1948** - Babe Ruth's uniform No. 3 is retired at Yankee Stadium's 25th Anniversary celebration. The visit marks the Babe's final Stadium appearance.

**Aug. 16, 1948** - Babe Ruth dies of throat cancer in New York at age 53.

**Oct. 12, 1948** - The Yankees announce that Casey Stengel will replace Bucky Harris as manager.

**Oct. 1-2, 1949** - The Yankees come back from a one-game deficit with two games to play, defeating the Boston Red Sox in the final two games of the season at Yankee Stadium, 5-4 and 5-3, respectively, marking the first of five consecutive American League pennants.

**Oct. 5, 1949** - In Game 1 of the World Series vs. Brooklyn at Yankee Stadium, Tommy Henrich breaks up a scoreless pitchers' duel between the Yankees' Allie Reynolds and the Dodgers' Don Newcombe, hitting a game-winning solo home run in the bottom of the ninth.

**April 17, 1951** - Mickey Mantle makes his Major League debut, going 1-for-4 in a 5-0 win vs. Boston at Yankee Stadium. The game also marks Bob Sheppard's first as Yankees public-address announcer. Boston's Dom DiMaggio is the first hitter announced.

**Sept. 28, 1951** - In an 8-0 Game 1 win in a doubleheader vs. Boston at Yankee Stadium, Allie Reynolds becomes the second of four players in Baseball history to toss two no-hitters in the same season (also Johnny Vander Meer in 1938, Virgil Trucks in 1952 and Nolan Ryan in 1973). Reynolds had previously no-hit the Indians at Cleveland's Municipal Stadium on July 12 in a 1-0 win.

**Dec. 12, 1951** - Joe DiMaggio officially announces his retirement.

**April 17, 1953** - Exactly two years after his Yankees debut, Mickey Mantle hits what is recognized as the game's first "tape-measure" home run, a 565-foot shot off the Senators' Chuck Stobbs at Washington's Griffith Stadium.

**Oct. 5, 1953** - Billy Martin singles home the winning run in the ninth inning of a 4-3, Game 6 victory over the Brooklyn Dodgers at Yankee Stadium. The win clinches the Yankees' fifth-consecutive World Championship.

**Oct. 4, 1955** - Brooklyn's Johnny Podres outduels Yankees starter Tommy Byrne and two relievers, 2-0, clinching the Dodgers' first World Series Championship. The World Series loss snaps the Yankees' string of seven consecutive team appearances in the Fall Classic without losing a Series (1943, '47, '49-'53). It also marks the Yankees' first World Series loss to Brooklyn after wins in 1941, '47, '49, '52 and '53.

**May 30, 1956** - Batting against Pedro Ramos in Game 1 of a doubleheader vs. Washington, Mickey Mantle nearly hits a home run out of Yankee Stadium, with the ball striking the upper deck frieze in right field.

**Oct. 8, 1956** - Don Larsen hurls the only perfect game in World Series history, a 2-0 win over Brooklyn in Game 5 at Yankee Stadium.

**Oct. 10, 1956** - Johnny Kucks pitches a complete game shutout, defeating the Brooklyn Dodgers at Ebbets Field, 9-0, to win Game 7 of the World Series.

**April 22, 1959** - Whitey Ford pitches a 1-0, 14-inning complete game shutout at Washington, allowing just seven hits and striking out 15.

**Oct. 8, 1960** - Second baseman Bobby Richardson sets an all-time World Series record (since tied by Hideki Matsui on 11/4/09 in Game 6 vs. Philadelphia) with 6 RBI in Game 3 of the World Series vs. Pittsburgh, hitting a grand slam in the first inning and two-run single in the fourth inning of a 10-0 Yankees win.

**Oct. 1, 1961** - Roger Maris hits his 61st home run in the season's final game, establishing a then-Major League record and still-standing AL record.

**June 24, 1962** - Jack Reed's two-run, 22nd-inning home run ends the longest game in Yankees history, a 9-7 win at Detroit.

**Oct. 16, 1962** - In Game 7 of the World Series, superb fielding from outfielder Roger Maris holds Matty Alou at third base after a two-out, ninth-inning Willie Mays double. Bobby Richardson then snares a screaming line drive off the bat of Willie McCovey for the game's final out, securing a 1-0, Series-clinching victory over the San Francisco Giants at Candlestick Park. New York scores the game's only run when Tony Kubek grounds into a fifth-inning double play. It would be the last championship for the Yankees for 15 seasons.

**May 22, 1963** - In an 8-7, 11-inning win vs. the Kansas City A's, Mickey Mantle hits the upper deck frieze in right field for the second time in his career, this time off righthander Bill Fischer.

**Nov. 2, 1964** - CBS purchases 80 percent of the Yankees for \$11.2 million. The network later buys the remaining 20 percent.

**May 14, 1967** - Mickey Mantle becomes only the sixth player—and second Yankee—to reach the 500 home run plateau, when he connects off Baltimore's Stu Miller at Yankee Stadium.

**June 8, 1969** - "Mickey Mantle Day" is celebrated at Yankee Stadium and his uniform No. 7 is retired.

**June 24, 1970** - Bobby Murcer hits home runs in four consecutive at-bats over two games of a doubleheader vs. Cleveland at Yankee Stadium.

**Aug. 8, 1972** - The Yankees sign a 30-year lease to play in a remodeled Yankee Stadium. Completion is scheduled for 1976.

**Jan. 3, 1973** - A limited partnership, headed by George M. Steinbrenner III as its managing general partner, purchases the Yankees for a net price of \$8.7 million from CBS.

**April 6, 1974** - The Yankees begin the first of two seasons at Shea Stadium as Yankee Stadium is remodeled. The Yankees will go 90-69 at Shea over the two seasons (1974-75).

**Dec. 31, 1974** - Free agent Catfish Hunter signs a then-record five-year contract.

**Aug. 1, 1975** - Billy Martin replaces Bill Virdon for his first of five stints as manager.

**April 15, 1976** - Remodeled Yankee Stadium opens with an 11-4 win over the Minnesota Twins. The Twins' Dan Ford hits the first home run.

**April 17, 1976** - Thurman Munson hits the first homer by a Yankee in remodeled Yankee Stadium in a 10-0 win vs. the Minnesota Twins (off Jim Hughes).

**Oct. 14, 1976** - Chris Chambliss' ninth-inning home run off Mark Littell in Game 5 of the ALCS vs. Kansas City at Yankee Stadium gives the Yankees their 30th AL pennant and first trip to the World Series since 1964.

**Nov. 29, 1976** - Free agent Reggie Jackson signs a five-year contract.

**Oct. 9, 1977** - The Yankees rally for one run in the eighth inning and three runs in the ninth for a 5-3, series-clinching win in the decisive Game 5 of the 1977 ALCS at Kansas City. Sparky Lyle earns the win for the second consecutive night, finishing the game with 1.1 scoreless innings on no rest following his scoreless 5.1-inning relief appearance at Kauffman Stadium in Game 4.

**Oct. 18, 1977** - Reggie Jackson hits three home runs (on three consecutive pitches) in Game 6 of the World Series vs. the Los Angeles Dodgers at Yankee Stadium. He joins Babe Ruth as the only players to hit three home runs in a single World Series game.

**June 17, 1978** - Ron Guidry establishes a franchise record by striking out 18 batters in the Yankees' 4-0 win vs. California.

**July 24, 1978** - Billy Martin resigns as manager.

**July 25, 1978** - Bob Lemon is named manager, replacing Billy Martin.

**July 29, 1978** - On Old-Timers' Day, the Yankees announce that Billy Martin will return as Yankees manager in 1980 and Bob Lemon will become General Manager (also see June 18, 1979).

**Oct. 2, 1978** - The Yankees, 14.0 games behind Boston as late as July 19, defeat the Red Sox, 5-4, at Fenway Park in only the second one-game playoff in AL history. Bucky Dent's three-run, seventh-inning home run becomes one of the most memorable in Baseball history.

**June 18, 1979** - Billy Martin is rehired as Yankees manager, replacing Bob Lemon.

**Aug. 2, 1979** - Yankees Captain Thurman Munson dies in a plane crash in Canton, Ohio, at age 32. His No. 15 is immediately retired.

**Aug. 6, 1979** - After delivering a eulogy at Thurman Munson's funeral earlier that morning in Canton, Ohio, Bobby Murcer hits a three-run seventh-inning homer and a two-run ninth-inning single, accounting for all five of the Yankees' runs in an emotional 5-4 comeback win vs. Baltimore at Yankee Stadium.

**Dec. 15, 1980** - Free agent Dave Winfield signs a then-record 10-year contract.

**Sept. 6, 1981** - Bob Lemon is named manager for a second time, replacing Gene Michael.

**April 26, 1982** - Gene Michael becomes manager for a second time, replacing Bob Lemon.

**Aug. 3, 1982** - Clyde King is named Yankees manager, replacing Gene Michael.

**July 4, 1983** - Dave Righetti pitches the sixth regular season no-hitter in franchise history and the first since 1951 in a 4-0 win vs. Boston at Yankee Stadium. Righetti strikes out Wade Boggs for the final out.

**July 24, 1983** - The Yankees and Kansas City pitch the infamous "Pine Tar" game at Yankee Stadium. George Brett hits a two-out, ninth-inning home run off Goose Gossage to give the Royals an apparent 5-4 lead. Manager Billy Martin points out that the pine tar on Brett's bat is above the allowable 18 inches and Brett is subsequently called out for using an illegal bat. The Yankees (temporarily) win 4-3 (see Aug. 18, 1983).



**Aug. 18, 1983** - Kansas City's protest is upheld and play is resumed at Yankee Stadium from the point immediately after Brett's home run. Yankees pitcher Ron Guidry plays center field while lefthanded first baseman Don Mattingly plays second base. Royals' reliever Dan Quisenberry retires the Yankees in order in the bottom of the ninth for a 5-4 Royals win.

**April 28, 1985** - Billy Martin is named manager for the fourth time, replacing Yogi Berra.

**Aug. 4, 1985** - The Yankees celebrate "Phil Rizzuto Day" at Yankee Stadium, dedicating a plaque in his honor and retiring his No. 10. The Yankees lose their scheduled game to the Chicago White Sox, 4-1, as Tom Seaver wins his 300th career game.

**Oct. 6, 1985** - Phil Niekro tosses a four-hit complete game shutout in an 8-0 victory at Toronto's Exhibition Stadium for his 300th career win.

**Oct. 17, 1985** - Lou Piniella is named manager, replacing Billy Martin.

**July 18, 1987** - Don Mattingly homers off Texas' Jose Guzman to tie Dale Long's Major League record of hitting a home run in eight consecutive games (Mattingly hits 10 HR during the streak).

**Sept. 29, 1987** - Don Mattingly hits a grand slam off Boston's Bruce Hurst, setting a Major League record (tied by Travis Hafner in 2008) with six grand slams in a season.

**June 23, 1988** - Billy Martin is replaced as manager of the Yankees for the fifth and final time. Lou Piniella is named manager for the second time.

**Dec. 9, 1988** - The Yankees sign a 12-year television contract with the Madison Square Garden Network.

**Dec. 25, 1989** - Billy Martin dies in an automobile accident near Binghamton, N.Y. at age 61.

**Sept. 4, 1993** - Jim Abbott tosses a 4-0, no-hit win vs. Cleveland at Yankee Stadium.

**Aug. 13, 1995** - Mickey Mantle dies of cancer at age 63 in Dallas, Tex.

**Sept. 6, 1995** - Lou Gehrig's Major League record of 2,130 consecutive games played is broken when Baltimore's Cal Ripken, Jr. plays in his 2,131st.

**Oct. 4, 1995** - The Yankees play the longest postseason game in their history, a 15-inning, 7-5 win over Seattle at Yankee Stadium, giving them a 2-0 series lead. The contest was the final Yankee Stadium game for Don Mattingly.

**Nov. 2, 1995** - Joe Torre is named the Yankees' 31st manager.

**Mar. 1, 1996** - The Yankees defeat the Cleveland Indians, 5-2, in the first ever game at Legends Field (renamed George M. Steinbrenner Field in 2008), the club's new spring training home.

**May 14, 1996** - Dwight Gooden hurls the eighth regular season no-hitter in Yankees history, a 2-0 blanking of the Seattle Mariners at Yankee Stadium.

**June 16, 1996** - Mel Allen, the legendary "Voice of the Yankees" from 1939-64, dies at age 83 in Greenwich, Connecticut.

**Aug. 25, 1996** - A monument in honor of Mickey Mantle is unveiled in Yankee Stadium's Monument Park.

**Oct. 23, 1996** - In Game 4 of the World Series at Atlanta's Fulton County Stadium, Jim Leyritz hits a three-run eighth inning homer off the Braves' Mark Wohlers, knotting the game at 6-6. The Yankees went on to win, 8-6, in 10 innings.

**Oct. 24, 1996** - The Yankees' Andy Pettitte (8.1IP) outduels Atlanta's John Smoltz (8.0IP), 1-0, in Game 5 in Atlanta, giving the Yankees a 3-games-to-2 World Series lead.

**Oct. 26, 1996** - In Game 6 of the World Series at Yankee Stadium, John Wetteland closes out a 3-2 win vs. Atlanta, giving the Yankees their first World Championship in 18 years.

**May 17, 1998** - David Wells tosses the first regular-season perfect game by a Yankee, the 14th in Baseball history.

**Sept. 25, 1998** - The Yankees establish an American League record with their 112th win of the season (a 6-1 win vs. Tampa Bay at Yankee Stadium), breaking the mark of 111 by the 1954 Cleveland Indians (they complete the season with a then AL-record 114th victory on September 27 vs. Tampa Bay).

**Oct. 21, 1998** - The Yankees complete an incredible season with a four-game World Series sweep of the San Diego Padres to capture the franchise's 24th World Championship. The 3-0 win gives the club a 125-50 record over the entire season (114-48 in the regular season, 11-2 in postseason).

**March 8, 1999** - Joe DiMaggio dies at age 84 in Hollywood, Fla.

**April 25, 1999** - A monument in honor of Joe DiMaggio is unveiled in Yankee Stadium's Monument Park in front of a sold out Stadium and many of DiMaggio's former teammates. Paul Simon sings "Mrs. Robinson" while standing in center field.

**July 18, 1999** - On "Yogi Berra Day," David Cone tosses the 15th regular season perfect game in Baseball history, one season after David Wells accomplishes the feat. Amazingly, Don Larsen—who tossed a perfect game in the 1956 World Series—throws out the ceremonial first pitch.

**Oct. 27, 1999** - The Yankees play Baseball's last game of the century and complete a four-game sweep of the Atlanta Braves, capturing their 25th World Championship.

**July 8, 2000** - The Yankees and Mets play their first-ever dual stadium day/night doubleheader: Game 1 is a 4-2 Yankees win at Shea Stadium and Game 2 is another 4-2 Yankees win at Yankee Stadium.

**Oct. 21, 2000** - The Yankees' World Series Game 1 win vs. the Mets at Yankee Stadium marks their 13th consecutive victory in World Series play, breaking the 12-game record of the 1927, 1928 and 1932 Yankees.

**Oct. 26, 2000** - The Yankees win World Series Game 5 over the Mets at Shea Stadium, clinching their third consecutive World Championship in the first "Subway Series" since 1956. It marks the first time a club has won three consecutive World Series titles since the 1972-74 Oakland Athletics.

**Oct. 13, 2001** - With a 1-0 lead and two-out in the bottom of the seventh of Game 3 of the ALDS in Oakland, Derek Jeter picks up Shane Spencer's errant throw from the outfield and "flips" the ball in a backhand motion to Jorge Posada, who tags Jeremy Giambi for the final out of the inning. The Yankees go on to win the game, 1-0, and the series 3 games to 2. The play will be known as the "Flip Play."

**Oct. 30, 2001** - President George W. Bush throws out the first pitch prior to the Yankees' 2-1 World Series Game 3 win vs. Arizona at Yankee Stadium.

**Oct. 31, 2001** - In Game 4 of the World Series vs. Arizona at Yankee Stadium, Tino Martinez's two-out, bottom-of-the ninth, two-run home run off Byung-Hyun Kim sends the game into extra innings. Shortly after the stroke of midnight, Derek Jeter wins the game with a "walk-off" solo home run in the 10th, earning him the nickname "Mr. November."

**Nov. 1, 2001** - In the late innings of Game 5 of the World Series vs. Arizona at Yankee Stadium, fans serenade Paul O'Neill, who is playing in his last game at Yankee Stadium. Scott Brosius' two-out, bottom-of-the ninth, two-run home run off Byung-Hyun Kim sends the game into extra innings, and Alfonso Soriano singles in the winning run in the 12th.

**May 17, 2002** - Jason Giambi becomes only the 21st player—and second Yankee—to hit a "walk-off" grand slam with his team trailing by three runs (Babe Ruth did it on 9/24/25). His 14th-inning slam off Minnesota's Mike Trombley erases a 12-9 Twins lead, giving the Yankees a 13-12 win.

**June 13, 2003** - In a 5-2 win vs. the St. Louis Cardinals at Yankee Stadium, Roger Clemens records both his 300th career win and 4,000 career strikeout (Edgar Renteria).

**Oct. 16, 2003** - In Game 7 of the ALCS vs. Boston at Yankee Stadium, Aaron Boone becomes only the fifth player—and second Yankee—to end a postseason series with a “walk-off” home run (also Chris Chambliss, 1976 ALCS vs. Kansas City), when his 11th-inning leadoff solo shot off Tim Wakefield clinches the Yankees’ 39th pennant.

**July 1, 2004** - Derek Jeter makes his most famous catch, diving into Yankee Stadium’s third base stands to nab a 12th-inning popup off the bat of Boston’s Trot Nixon. John Flaherty wins the game with a 13th-inning RBI single.

**April 26, 2005** - Alex Rodriguez hits three home runs (all off Bartolo Colon) and becomes just the second Yankee in franchise history to record at least 10 RBI in a game (also Tony Lazzeri, 11 on 5/24/36) in a 12-4 win vs. the Angels at Yankee Stadium.

**June 15, 2005** - The Yankees announce plans for a new Yankee Stadium to be constructed in Macombs Dam and John Mullaly Parks, which are located on the north side of 161st Street (adjacent to the original Stadium’s longtime site).

**Sept. 25, 2005** - The Yankees conclude their 81-game home schedule at Yankee Stadium with a season attendance of 4,090,696, establishing a single-season American League record. They become only the third franchise in sports history to reach the 4 million mark, joining the Toronto Blue Jays (1991-93) and Colorado Rockies (1993). The Yankees will subsequently break their home attendance mark in each of the next three seasons (2006-08).

**May 16, 2006** - The Yankees tie a franchise record by overcoming a nine-run deficit vs. Texas to win, 14-13, in nine innings. Jorge Posada hits a two-run “walk-off” home run off Akinori Otsuka.

**Aug. 16, 2006** - The Yankees break ground for a new Yankee Stadium, scheduled to be ready for Opening Day 2009.

**Aug. 4, 2007** - Alex Rodriguez becomes the 22nd and youngest (32 years, 8 days) player in Baseball history to reach the 500-home run mark in a 16-8 win vs. Kansas City at Yankee Stadium. He is the third player to hit his 500th career homer as a Yankee, joining Babe Ruth and Mickey Mantle.

**Sept. 5, 2007** - Bob Sheppard works his final game as Yankees Public Address Announcer, a 3-2 win over Seattle.

**Oct. 30, 2007** - Joe Girardi is named the 32nd manager in Yankees franchise history.

**March 27, 2008** - Prior to the Yankees’ final home exhibition game of spring training, Legends Field is renamed George M. Steinbrenner Field.

**June 7, 2008** - Johnny Damon goes 6-for-6 in the Yankees’ 12-11 win vs. Kansas City, matching the franchise record for hits in a nine-inning game (see June 6, 1934 - Myril Hoag) and becoming the only Yankee in original Yankee Stadium history to record six hits in a game of any length. His final hit is a “walk-off” single.

**Sept. 16, 2008** - Derek Jeter singles off Chicago’s Gavin Floyd in the first inning for his 1,270th career hit at Yankee Stadium, surpassing Lou Gehrig for the most all-time hits at the ballpark. Jeter finishes the game 2-for-3 in the 6-2 loss.

**Sept. 21, 2008** - The Yankees play their last ever game in the original Yankee Stadium. Julia Ruth Stevens, daughter of Babe Ruth, throws out the ceremonial first pitch, and Jose Molina hits the park’s final home run in the fourth inning. Following the Yankees’ 7-3 win over Baltimore, Derek Jeter thanks the fans over the Stadium public address system.

**Sept. 28, 2008** - On the final day of the season in the first game of a doubleheader at Boston’s Fenway Park, Mike Mussina records his 20th win of the year, becoming the oldest pitcher in Major League history to win 20 games for the first time.

**Nov. 8, 2008** - Local Bronx high school youth groups are joined by Scott Brosius, David Cone, Jeff Nelson and Paul O’Neill of the Yankees’ 1998 World Championship team and Yankees General Partner and Vice Chairperson Jennifer Steinbrenner Swindal in removing home plate, the pitcher’s rubber and pails of dirt from the original Yankee Stadium, then installing them in the current Yankee Stadium.

**April 3-4, 2009** - The Yankees play their first exhibition games in Yankee Stadium, defeating the Chicago Cubs, 7-4 and 10-1, respectively. Chien-Ming Wang tosses the first pitch in the April 3 contest.

**April 16, 2009** - The Yankees play the first regular season game in Yankee Stadium history, falling to Cleveland, 10-2. CC Sabathia tosses the Stadium’s first official pitch, Johnny Damon records the first hit (first-inning single off Cliff Lee) and Jorge Posada hits the first home run (fifth-inning off Lee).

**May 14 – June 1, 2009** - The Yankees set an all-time Major League mark with 18 consecutive errorless games, safely handling 660 chances over the stretch.

**Sept. 11, 2009** - Derek Jeter breaks Lou Gehrig’s all-time franchise mark of 2,721 hits with a single off Baltimore’s Chris Tillman at Yankee Stadium. Gehrig had held the mark since 9/6/37.

**Oct. 4, 2009** - Alex Rodriguez hits a three-run home run and a grand slam in the sixth-inning of the season finale at Tampa Bay in a 10-2 Yankees victory, setting an all-time AL mark with 7 RBI in an inning.

**Nov. 4, 2009** - The Yankees win their 27th World Championship, defeating Philadelphia in Game 6 of the World Series, 7-3. Hideki Matsui ties Bobby Richardson’s all-time World Series mark (1960 Game 3 vs. Pittsburgh) with 6 RBI. Andy Pettitte records the win, becoming the first pitcher to start and record the win in the clinching game in all three rounds of a single postseason. Manager Joe Girardi joins Billy Martin and Ralph Houk as the only individuals in franchise history to win a World Series with the Yankees as a player and as a manager.



**2009 World Champions**

**May 8, 2010** - Mark Teixeira becomes the second Yankee in franchise history to hit 3 HR in a single game against the Red Sox (also see June 23, 1927), homering in the fifth, seventh and ninth innings of a 14-3 Yankees win at Fenway Park.

**June 12-13, 2010** - Jorge Posada becomes the first Yankee since Bill Dickey (June 3, Game 2 - June 4, 1937) to hit grand slams in back-to-back games as he accomplishes the feat in 9-3 and 9-5 wins vs. Houston.

**July 11, 2010** - Longtime Yankees Public Address Announcer Bob Sheppard passes away at his home in Baldwin, Long Island, at age 99.

**July 13, 2010** - Yankees Principal Owner George M. Steinbrenner III passes away in Tampa, Fla. at age 80.

**Aug. 4, 2010** - Alex Rodriguez becomes the seventh (and youngest) player in Major League history to hit his 600th HR, accomplishing the feat at 35 years, 8 days old in a 5-1 win vs. Toronto off pitcher Shaun Marcum.

**Sept. 20, 2010** - The Yankees dedicate a monument to Principal Owner George M. Steinbrenner III in Monument Park.

# George M. Steinbrenner III (1930-2010)



From 1973 until his passing on July 13, 2010, George M. Steinbrenner III created a legacy of winning unmatched by his peers. His foresight, drive and commitment permanently transformed not only the Yankees organization, but the game of Baseball.

On January 3, 1973, a group of businessmen formed and led by Mr. Steinbrenner purchased the New York Yankees from CBS for a net price of \$8.7 million. It took just five years for his aggressive leadership to turn the organization back into World Champions. In his time as Principal Owner of the club, the Yankees won more pennants (11) and World Series (7) than any other team in baseball, while posting a Major League-best .566 winning percentage (3,364-2,583-3 record) over the stretch.

In addition to the team's on-field success under the direction of Mr. Steinbrenner, the New York Yankees consistently shattered franchise and league attendance records at home and on the road. In 2009, they drew 3,719,358 fans in their first season of play in the current Yankee Stadium, topping the American League in attendance for the seventh straight season (2003-09). The Yankees remain the only franchise in Baseball history to draw more than 4 million fans at home in four consecutive seasons (2005-08).

Most recently, Mr. Steinbrenner's foresight into both sports and business continued to build the value and prominence of the franchise, positioning it for the future. In 2002, *Sporting News* named him the No. 1 "Most Powerful Man in Sports," and *Forbes* magazine has continued to list the Yankees as the most valuable franchise in all of Baseball.

Mr. Steinbrenner's vision led to the creation of YankeeNets, which owned the New Jersey Nets and New Jersey Devils and ultimately led to the launch of the YES Network, a trailblazing enterprise that has been the nation's most watched regional sports network since 2003. Additionally, Mr. Steinbrenner teamed with long-time friend and Dallas Cowboys owner Jerry Jones, creating Legends Hospitality, LLC, a new concession and merchandising company which currently operates at the Yankees' and Cowboys' new stadiums.

In 2006, his participation in the groundbreaking ceremony for the new Yankee Stadium underscored his role as the principal impetus in moving the much-anticipated facility towards its opening in 2009.

Mr. Steinbrenner's tenure of over 37 years exceeded that of any other New York Yankees owner by 13 years (Colonel Jacob Ruppert purchased the Yankees with Tillinghast L'Hommedieu Huston in January 1915, bought out Huston in 1922, and maintained sole ownership in the club until his death in January 1939—a total of 24 years). During Mr. Steinbrenner's time as the sole Principal Owner of the Yankees, the other 29 Major League clubs had over 100 owners or ownership groups.

Mr. Steinbrenner's success in the sports world began at an early age. He was a multi-sport athlete at Culver Military Academy (where he is in the Athletic Hall of Fame) and at Williams College. He began his successful coaching career as an assistant football coach at two Big Ten universities, Northwestern and Purdue. Then he assembled championship basketball teams in the National Industrial and American Basketball Leagues. In 2002, he was honored with the prestigious Gold Medal Award from the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame for a lifetime of "outstanding commitment, dedication and dynamic leadership in his business, as well as his personal life."



Mr. Steinbrenner devoted as much time and effort to the U.S. Olympic Committee (USOC) as he did to his many other sporting endeavors. He was on the U.S. Olympic Foundation Board from 1986-2002 and served as Chairman over the last six years of his tenure. He also was Chairman of the 1989 Olympic Overview Commission, which was created to evaluate the structure and efforts of the U.S. Olympic program, and served as Vice President of the USOC from 1989 to 1992. As a result of

his distinguished service, he was presented with the General Douglas MacArthur USOC Foremost Award and the F. Don Miller United States Olympic Award. In 2005, the U.S. Olympic Foundation created the George M. Steinbrenner Sports Leadership Award in his honor, which celebrates a member of the U.S. Olympic family who has made outstanding contributions to sport.

Additionally, Mr. Steinbrenner was a member of the Baseball Hall of Fame's Board of Directors and served on the NCAA Foundation Board of Trustees beginning in 1990.

Most of Mr. Steinbrenner's philanthropic endeavors were performed without fanfare. However, he was repeatedly recognized by the communities in which he immersed himself. In 1993, he earned the Tampa Civitan Club's "Outstanding Citizen" Award, and in 1998, Tampa Law Enforcement named him "Citizen of the Year" for founding a scholarship fund for the children of slain law enforcement officers. Mr. Steinbrenner was also honored as an "Outstanding New Yorker" by the New York Society of Association Executives in 1997 and credited in 2009 by the Museum of the City of New York as one of the "New York City 400," recognizing "people who have helped create the world's greatest city since its founding in 1609."

In February 2008, the Tampa City Council and the Board of the Hillsborough County Commissioner's Office both passed resolutions endorsing the renaming of Legends Field in Tampa after Mr. Steinbrenner to pay tribute to his numerous contributions to the area. On March 27, 2008, Mr. Steinbrenner—joined by his family—pulled down a curtain draped above the outfield scoreboard to unveil the new name for the Yankees' spring training home: George M. Steinbrenner Field.

In the fall of 2009, George M. Steinbrenner High School opened in Lutz, Fla. The school was named after Mr. Steinbrenner by the Hillsborough County School Board in recognition of his philanthropic involvement in the community, particularly with the school system.

Mr. Steinbrenner was dually honored in January 2011, winning the Joan Payson Community Service Award from the New York chapter of the BBWAA and having his legacy of charitable work recognized at the 22nd annual Baseball Assistance Team (B.A.T.) Dinner.

He is survived by his wife, Joan; sisters Susan Norpell and Judy Kamm, children, Hank, Hal, Jennifer and Jessica; and his grandchildren.

*On September 20, 2010, prior to the team's game vs. Tampa Bay, the Yankees unveiled a monument in Mr. Steinbrenner's honor in Monument Park, reflecting the special connection, appreciation and responsibility that he felt toward Yankees fans.*

Purchased the New York Yankees on January 3, 1973. A true visionary who changed the game of baseball forever, he was considered the most influential owner in all of sports.

In his 37 years as Principal Owner, the Yankees posted a Major League-best .566 winning percentage, while winning 11 American League pennants and seven World Series titles, becoming the most recognizable sports brand in the world.

A devoted sportsman, he was Vice President of the United States Olympic Committee, a member of the Baseball Hall of Fame's Board of Directors and a member of the NCAA Foundation Board of Trustees.

A great philanthropist whose charitable efforts were mostly performed without fanfare, he followed a personal motto of the greatest form of charity is anonymity.

## Chronology of Yankees Ownership

- January 9, 1903:** Frank Ferrell and Bill Devery purchase the Baltimore franchise of the American League for \$18,000 and move the team to New York.
- January 11, 1915:** Col. Jacob Ruppert and Col. Tillinghast L'Hommedieu Huston purchase the Yankees for \$460,000.
- May 21, 1922:** Col. Ruppert buys out Col. Huston for \$1,500,000.
- January 13, 1939:** Col. Ruppert dies.
- January 25, 1945:** Dan Topping, Del Webb and Larry MacPhail purchase the Yankees for \$2,800,000 from the estate of the late Col. Ruppert.
- November 2, 1964:** CBS purchases 80 percent of the Yankees for \$11,200,000, later buys the remaining 20 percent.
- January 3, 1973:** A limited partnership, headed by George M. Steinbrenner as its Managing General Partner, purchases the Yankees from CBS for a net price of \$8.7 million.

## Lou Gehrig Appreciation Day - July 4, 1939

Prior to the Yankees' May 2, 1939, game at Detroit's Briggs Stadium, captain Lou Gehrig gave the umpires his team's lineup card—which did not have his name on it. He watched the entire game from the bench, marking the end of his 2,130-consecutive-games-played streak. "The Iron Horse" was suffering the effects of amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), a disease known since as Lou Gehrig's Disease. He would never play again.

Just over two months later, on July 4, 1939, Lou Gehrig Appreciation Day was held in front of approximately 62,000 fans in Yankee Stadium. Ceremonies took place between games of a doubleheader against the Washington Senators. Gehrig and his teammates were joined by members of the 1927 Yankees. After speeches by Mayor Fiorello La Guardia and Postmaster James A. Farley, Manager Joe McCarthy said his public goodbye to Gehrig: "Lou, what can I say except that it was a sad day in the life of everybody who knew you when you came to my hotel room that day in Detroit and told me you were quitting as a ballplayer because you felt yourself a hindrance to the team. My God, man, you were never that."

Various gifts were presented to Gehrig from club employees and the rival New York Giants. His teammates gave him a trophy, which was inscribed with a poem by *New York Times* writer John Kiernan. As the crowd chanted, "We want Lou; We want Lou..." Gehrig stepped to the microphone to deliver one of the most oft-quoted speeches in American history.

*"Fans, for the past two weeks you have been reading about the bad break I got. Yet today I consider myself the luckiest man on the face of the Earth. I have been in ballparks for 17 years and have never received anything but kindness and encouragement from you fans.*

*"Look at these grand men. Which of you wouldn't consider it the highlight of his career just to associate with them for even one day? Sure, I'm lucky. Who wouldn't consider it an honor to have known Jacob Ruppert? Also, the builder of*



*baseball's greatest empire, Ed Barrow? To have spent six years with that wonderful little fellow, Miller Huggins? Then to have spent the next nine years with that outstanding leader, that smart student of psychology, the best manager in baseball today, Joe McCarthy? Sure, I'm lucky.*

*"When the New York Giants, a team you would give your right arm to beat, and vice versa, sends you a gift—that's something. When everybody down to the groundskeepers and those boys in white coats remember you with trophies—that's something. When you have a wonderful mother-in-law who takes sides with you in squabbles with her own daughter—that's something. When you have a father and a mother who work all their lives so you can have an education and build your body—it's a blessing. When you have a wife who has been a tower of strength and shown more courage than you dreamed existed—that's the finest I know.*

*"So I close in saying that I might have been given a bad break, but I've got an awful lot to live for."*

During the ceremony, Gehrig had his No. 4 retired by the Yankees, becoming the first person in sports to be given such an honor. To this day he remains the only Yankee ever to wear the number.

Gehrig died on June 2, 1941, at his home in the Riverdale section of the Bronx. He was 37.

## Babe Ruth Day - April 27, 1947

On April 27, 1947, Babe Ruth Day was celebrated throughout Major League Baseball, as the Babe said goodbye in an on-field ceremony at Yankee Stadium. Dressed in a topcoat and hat, Ruth, weakened by throat cancer, made the following remarks:



*"Thank you very much, ladies and gentlemen. You know how bad my voice sounds—well it feels just as bad.*

*"You know this baseball game of ours comes up from the youth. That means the boys. And after you're a boy and grow up to know how to play ball, then you come to the boys you see representing themselves today in your national pastime. The only real game—I think—in the world is baseball.*

*"As a rule, some people think if you give them a football, or a baseball, or something like that—naturally they're athletes right away. But you can't do that in baseball. You've gotta start from way down [at] the bottom, when you're 6 or 7 years of age. You can't wait until you're 15 or 16. You gotta let it grow up with you. And if you're successful, and you try hard enough, you're bound to come out on top—just like these boys have come to the top now.*

*"There has been so many lovely things said about me, and I'm glad that I've had the opportunity to thank everybody. Thank you."*

Ruth returned to Yankee Stadium once more, on June 13, 1948, to celebrate the 25th anniversary of Yankee Stadium and have his uniform No. 3 retired.

He died on Aug. 16, 1948, at Memorial Hospital in New York at age 53. His body lay in state at the entrance of Yankee Stadium on Aug. 17 and 18, before his funeral on Aug. 19 at New York's St. Patrick's Cathedral.

# The 1961 Yankees and Roger Maris' 61-Home Run Season

## 50TH ANNIVERSARY

This year marks the 50th anniversary of the historic 1961 season that saw Roger Maris break Babe Ruth's all-time single-season home run mark and the Yankees power their way to a World Series championship, cementing their reputation as one of the best teams of all time.

The Yankees finished the regular season with a 109-53 (.673) record, eight games ahead of the 101-61 (.623) Detroit Tigers. The clubs were just 1.5 games apart in the standings heading into the final full month of the season before the Yankees reeled off a 13-game winning streak from Sept. 1-12 to vault an insurmountable 11.5 games in front. Their massive win total was fueled by a 65-16 mark at Yankee Stadium, the best single-season home record in Major League history.

The club, assembled by General Manager George Weiss, had sluggers up and down the lineup, including Moose Skowron (28 HR), Yogi Berra (22 HR), Elston Howard (21 HR) and "Super-sub" Johnny Blanchard, who hit 21 homers in just 243 at-bats. Of the 240 home runs the Yankees hit, 10 were pinch-hit homers, setting a still-standing single-season franchise mark.

The pitching staff was paced by Whitey Ford, who had a career year, going 25-4 with a 3.21 ERA. Under first-year manager Ralph Houk, Ford took the ball every fourth day for the first time in his career and set career highs in wins, winning percentage (.862), starts (39) and innings pitched (283.0), earning the Cy Young Award as the best pitcher in both leagues. Bill Stafford (14-9, 2.68 ERA), Ralph Terry (16-3, 3.15 ERA) and Rollie Sheldon (11-5, 3.60 ERA) were the Yankees' other top starters, and Luis Arroyo picked up 15 wins in relief, the highest total by a reliever in franchise history.

In the World Series, the Yankees triumphed over Cincinnati, 4-games-to-1, as Ford tossed 14.0 combined scoreless innings, earning wins in Game 1 and 4. With the Series knotted at one game apiece, Game 3 proved pivotal. Down, 2-1, heading into the eighth, Blanchard tied the game with a solo homer before Maris hit a game-winning solo shot in the ninth. The Yankees then outscored the Reds 20-5 over the final two contests to win the first of two consecutive World Series titles.

Much of the season's drama centered on the chase by the M&M Boys – Roger Maris and Mickey Mantle – to break Ruth's seemingly untouchable single-season record of 60 home runs, which he set with the 1927 Murderers' Row Yankees. Maris, the American League MVP in 1960 and 1961, was joined in his pursuit by Mantle, who topped out at 54 home runs after sitting out seven of the club's final 10 games with an abscess in his right hip.

Maris tied Ruth's mark on Sept. 26 at Yankee Stadium with a home run off Baltimore's Jack Fisher in the team's 159th game of the season. Needing one homer to break the record with four games to go (the Yankees had played a tie earlier in the year), Maris was given a full game off prior to going homerless in the first two games of a three-game series against Boston at Yankee Stadium.

In the season's final game on Oct. 1, Maris connected in the fourth inning off Tracy Stallard, hitting a line-drive into the right-field stands for his 61st home run, which turned out to be the only run in a 1-0 Yankees victory. The quiet and humble Maris had to be pushed back onto the field by his teammates for his curtain call.

The chase was not without controversy as writers and fans loyal to Ruth clamored that the record should receive a special notation given that the American League was playing a 162-game schedule in 1961 due to the addition of two expansion teams. With the exceptions of 1901-03 and 1918-19, the AL had always played a 154-game format.

Ford Frick, a former sportswriter and New York City sportscaster who

had previously ghostwritten Ruth's 1928 autobiography *Babe Ruth's Own Book of Baseball*, was the commissioner of baseball at the time. In the middle of the season, he issued the directive that baseball's official record book, *The Little Red Book of Major League Baseball*, compiled by the *Elias Sports Bureau*, should show two records — one for a 154-game schedule and another for a 162-game schedule. Contrary to popular lore, an asterisk was never used for the notation, and separate designations remained in the official record book until 1991, when Major League Baseball finally rescinded the distinction.

Maris' 61 in '61 remains the highest single-season home run total in American League history and the seventh-highest single-season total all time, behind those of Barry Bonds (73), Mark McGwire (70, 65) and Sammy Sosa (66, 64 and 63). *W*

# Bob Sheppard "The Voice of Yankee Stadium"

**B**ob Sheppard will forever be the "The Voice of Yankee Stadium." With his instantly recognizable elocution — in which each syllable was given meticulous attention — Sheppard provided a soundtrack of irreproachable dignity to Yankee Stadium for 57 years.

Sadly, he passed away on July 11, 2010, at his home in Baldwin, N.Y., with his wife, Mary, by his side. He was 99 years old.

Born in Ridgewood, Queens, Sheppard began his tenure as Yankees public address announcer on April 17, 1951—Opening Day of Joe DiMaggio's final season and the day of Mickey Mantle's Major League debut. Among the approximately 4,500 baseball games he worked over his tenure with the Yankees were 121 consecutive postseason contests from 1951 to 2006, including 62 games in 22 World Series.

Sheppard's incredible career behind the microphone started when he volunteered his services for a charity football game in Freeport, Long Island, in the late 1940s. An executive from the Brooklyn Dodgers football team of the All-America Conference was at the game. He liked Sheppard's style ("clear, concise and correct") and hired him. The football Dodgers folded after just one season at Ebbets Field (1948), but one of their opponents—the New York football Yankees—heard Sheppard's booming voice and offered him their PA job at Yankee Stadium. Baseball's Yankees discovered him as a result and offered him their PA role for the 1950 season. Though he turned down their offer due to conflicts with his teaching schedule, he changed his mind the following year.

In addition to his baseball duties, Sheppard was the public address voice for the New York football Giants for 50 seasons—from their move to Yankee Stadium in 1956 until his retirement after the 2005 season. Sheppard also served the New York Titans of the American Football League at the Polo Grounds, the New York Stars of the World Football League at Downing Stadium, the New York Cosmos soccer team, and St. John's University's basketball and football teams. Sheppard also handled PA duties for five Army-Navy football games in Philadelphia.

Some of the events he listed as the most memorable of his incredible career were: Don Larsen's perfect game in Game 5 of the 1956 World Series on October 8, 1956; Roger Maris' 61<sup>st</sup> home run on October 1, 1961; Reggie Jackson's three home runs in Game 6 of the World Series on October 18, 1977; and the Giants-Colts overtime NFL Championship Game on December 28, 1958.

Sheppard attended St. John's College, which eventually became St. John's University. Always a talented athlete, he received a full athletic scholarship to the school,

playing quarterback on the football team all four years. He later enrolled at Columbia University, where he received his master's degree in speech and worked his way up from teacher-in-training to substitute teacher to permanent teacher to department chairman. In order to supplement his teaching salary, Sheppard played semiprofessional football on Sundays in Long Island with the Valley Stream Red Riders and the Hempstead Monitors, earning \$25 a game.

In 1998, Sheppard was presented with the prestigious William J. Slocum "Long and Meritorious Service" Award by the New York chapter of the BBWAA as well as the "Pride of the Yankees" award by the ballclub.


On May 7, 2000, a plaque was dedicated to Sheppard in Monument Park of the original Yankee Stadium to commemorate his 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary season. Additionally, the Yankee Stadium media dining room was named "Sheppard's Place" prior to the 2009 season to commemorate his legacy.

The native New Yorker was elected to the St. John's University Sports Hall of Fame, the Long Island Sports Hall of Fame and the New York Sports Hall of Fame. He was awarded honorary doctorates from St. John's University (Pedagogy) and Fordham University (Rhetoric), and in 2007, received St. John's Medal of Honor, the highest award that the university can confer on a graduate.

Sheppard also made cameo appearances in numerous motion pictures and television shows, including 61\*, *It's My Turn*, *It Could Happen to You*, *Anger Management*, *Seinfeld* and *Mad About You*.

Sheppard announced his final game at Yankee Stadium on September 5, 2007, a 3-2 Yankees victory over the Seattle Mariners.

On September 21, 2008, Sheppard provided a valedictory in the bottom of the seventh inning of the final game at the original Yankee Stadium. Unable to say goodbye in person as he continued to recover from an illness that had kept him away from the Stadium since the final weeks of the 2007 season, Sheppard gave his tribute through a taped segment played on the video board. He recited, "Farewell, old Yankee Stadium, farewell / What a wonderful story you can tell / DiMaggio, Mantle, Gehrig and Ruth / A baseball cathedral in truth."

## Voices Before Sheppard

**H**ard to believe, but Bob Sheppard was not the only Public Address Announcer in the original Yankee Stadium's fabled history. But no one—not even Sheppard himself—could remember who immediately preceded the current Stadium P.A. announcer behind the microphone. After all, the last game by this mystery man would likely have been the fourth and final game of the 1950 World Series between the Yankees and Philadelphia's "Whiz Kids" Phillies.

But, after years of search and research, the answer may have turned up in the transcript of an interview conducted in 1991 by writer Paul Doherty with Don Carney, the producer-director of Yankees telecasts for more than three decades.

Extolling Sheppard's longevity, Carney told Doherty that "Bob's been around forever. He followed Red Patterson, who was the club's Public Relations Director and also did the P.A."

Carney's words give not only the answer but may also explain the mystery. Sheppard's predecessor was widely but anonymously quoted in the newspapers for an infamous gaffe he made during a Yankees-Philadelphia Athletics game on May 31, 1946. "Will the spectators in the front row please remove their clothing..." he began, with the rest of his announcement: "from the front railing," drowned out by the crowd's laughter.

The story got into the papers, but the identity of the speaker did not. Of course, it didn't. The writers didn't want to embarrass their main conduit for information about the club!

Additional research shows that Yankee Stadium was the last ballpark in the Majors to install a public-address system. It debuted in Game 3 of the 1936 World Series and was manned by Jack Lenz and George Levy, two veterans of the time when information was still relayed to the crowd by megaphone.

The careers of Lenz and Levy began in 1915 when the Yankees and Giants shared the Polo Grounds. When the Yankees hopped across the Harlem River in 1923, Levy stayed with the Giants while Lenz took the Yankee post. "I grabbed the offer," Lenz said. "Who wouldn't, with the old Bambino holding forth at the Stadium?"

To do his job, Lenz sat in a box alongside the Yankees dugout (then on the third-base side of Yankee Stadium)

and shouted the batting orders and batteries (each team's pitcher and catcher) as well as the changes throughout the game. Unlike today, players were not announced each time they came to bat and Lenz was called upon only when a change was made.

According to a feature article which appeared in the *New York Evening News* in the early 1930s to celebrate a career of more than 2,000 consecutive games, Lenz—the "mild-mannered megaphone man"—would receive the lineups and batting orders from both managers approximately 15 minutes before the start of the game (3:15 p.m. in those days). After telephoning the press box with the "necessary dope," Lenz would pick up his megaphone and shout the batting orders and batteries. He directed his voice first toward the bleachers, then to the upper tiers of the grandstand and again to the lower stands.

Due to the vast size of their new ballpark, the Yankees actually began the 1927 season with two public address announcers to service Yankee Stadium. After the idea proved successful before a crowd of more than 65,000 on Opening Day, the "two-ply announcer system" of Lenz and Levy was used again for the second game when the crowd was only about 7,000. The experiment was likely short lived.


# Yankees in Cooperstown

There are 47 members of the Baseball Hall of Fame who have played, managed, coached, owned or been a general manager for the New York Yankees at one time or another. The Yankees' first inductee was Babe Ruth, who entered the Hall in its inaugural 1936 class along with Ty Cobb, Walter Johnson, Christy Mathewson and Honus Wagner. The Yankees' most recent inductees are Joe Gordon and Rickey Henderson, who were formally enshrined in Cooperstown on July 26, 2009.

In addition to the 47 individuals below, at least three Hall of Famers worked for the Yankees in other capacities, including Joe Kelley (HOF in 1971 / Yankees Scout from 1915-25), Dick Williams (HOF in 2008 / NYY adviser from 1995-2001) and Pat Gillick (HOF in 2011 / NYY scouting director from 1974-76).

Currently, the choice of which insignia appears on the cap of each Hall of Famer's plaque belongs to the Hall of Fame itself. The decision is based on the "historical accomplishments" of the player and "where that player makes his most indelible mark" (though the wishes of the inductee are always considered). It is important to remember that caps have not always had insignias and some players' images are cast as profiles without visible insignias.



# Yankees Retired Uniform Numbers

Beginning with Lou Gehrig's No. 4 in 1939, the Yankees have retired 15 uniform numbers to honor 16 players and managers.



**1 Billy Martin** (Number retired in 1986)  
**Born:** May 16, 1928 in Berkeley, Calif. • **Died:** Dec. 25, 1989 in Binghamton, N.Y.  
**Height:** 5-11 • **Weight:** 165 • **B/T:** R/R

Had as much "Yankee Pride" as any player or manager to wear pinstripes, and he implanted his own fierce desire to win in his teams. Played an integral part in four World Series in the 1950s as a player, and added another ring managing the Yankees in 1977. His .333 lifetime series batting average is sixth with at least 75 AB on the all-time series list. Combative and daring, Martin was a brilliant baseball strategist and a legend in Yankees history.



**3 Babe Ruth** (Number retired in 1948)  
**Born:** Feb. 6, 1895 in Baltimore, Md. • **Died:** Aug. 16, 1948 in New York, N.Y.  
**Height:** 6-2 • **Weight:** 215 • **B/T:** L/L

Baseball's greatest slugger and the most colorful figure in the game's history. Debuted as a pitcher for the Boston Red Sox, winning 89 games over six seasons before being converted to the outfield because of his tremendous power. Was sold to the Yankees in 1920 and his 54 home runs that year were more than any other American League team. En route to 714 career home runs, won 12 home run titles, hitting 60 in 1927. Added 15 home runs in World Series competition as he led the Yankees to seven Series appearances and four World Championships. A member of the inaugural class of Hall of Fame inductees in 1936.



**4 Lou Gehrig** (Number retired in 1939)  
**Born:** June 19, 1903 in New York, N.Y. • **Died:** June 2, 1941 in Riverdale, N.Y.  
**Height:** 6-1 • **Weight:** 212 • **B/T:** L/L

Durable, powerhitting first baseman who played in an amazing 2,130 consecutive games between 1925 and 1939. Drove in at least 100 runs for 13 straight seasons (1926-38) and established an American League record with 184 RBI in 1931. Compiled a .340 lifetime batting average and belted 493 home runs in a career shortened by terminal illness. Was honored at Yankee Stadium on July 4, 1939, and made memorable, "Today, I consider myself the luckiest man on the face of the earth" speech. Life was immortalized in classic 1942 motion picture, *The Pride of the Yankees*, starring Gary Cooper. Elected to the Hall of Fame in 1939.



**5 Joe DiMaggio** (Number retired in 1952)  
**Born:** Nov. 25, 1914 in Martinez, Calif. • **Died:** March 8, 1999 in Hollywood, Fla.  
**Height:** 6-2 • **Weight:** 193 • **B/T:** R/R

The "Yankee Clipper" is considered by many experts as the best all-around baseball player in history. Was a sensational hitter for average and power, and a splendid, graceful, ball-hawking center fielder. Owned a powerful and accurate arm, and was a daring and alert baserunner. Compiled a .325 lifetime batting average from 1936 to 1951. A two-time batting champion and three-time MVP, he powered the Yankees to the first of four consecutive World Championships in his 1936 rookie season. Many rate his 56-consecutive-game batting streak in 1941 as the top baseball feat of all time. Elected to the Hall of Fame in 1955.



**7 Mickey Mantle** (Number retired in 1969)  
**Born:** Oct. 20, 1931 in Spavinaw, Okla. • **Died:** Aug. 14, 1995 in Dallas, Tex.  
**Height:** 6-0 • **Weight:** 201 • **B/T:** S/R


"The Mick" was the most feared hitter on some of the most successful teams in history. Could run like the wind and hit tape measure homers, like his famous 565-footer in Washington in 1953. In the 14 seasons between 1951 and 1964, he led the Yanks to 12 Fall Classics and seven World Championships. He still owns records for most homers, RBI, runs and walks in World Series play. In 1956, Mantle had one of the greatest seasons ever at the plate, hitting 52 homers with 130 RBI and a .353 average to win the Triple Crown. Elected to the Hall of Fame in 1974.



**8 Yogi Berra** (Number retired in 1972)  
**Born:** May 12, 1925 in St. Louis, Mo.  
**Height:** 5-8 • **Weight:** 191 • **B/T:** L/R

A mainstay behind the plate for some of the most dominating teams in history from the end of World War II until the early 1960s. Although he never led the league in a single major offensive category, he was just the third man to win three Most Valuable Player Awards. Was selected to play in the All-Star Game in 15 successive seasons (1948-62). Played on 14 pennant winners and 10 World Champions, more than anyone in history. Led the Yankees to the 1964 pennant as manager. Elected to the Hall of Fame in 1972.

## 8 Bill Dickey (Number retired in 1972)

**Born:** June 6, 1907 in Bastrop, La. • **Died:** Nov. 12, 1993 in Little Rock, Ark.  
**Height:** 6-1 • **Weight:** 185 • **B/T:** L/R

Regarded as one of the greatest catchers of all-time. A durable and tireless worker, he caught more than 100 games in 13 consecutive seasons (1929-41), an American League record. In 1931, he did not allow a single passed ball in 125 games behind the plate, another AL record. Dickey also excelled at the plate, batting over .300 in 10 of his first 11 full seasons, while hitting 202 homers during his career. He handled Yankees pitching staffs on eight World Series teams, winning seven championships.



## 9 Roger Maris (Number retired in 1984)

**Born:** Sept. 10, 1934 in Hibbing, Minn. • **Died:** Dec. 14, 1985 in Houston, Tex.  
**Height:** 6-0 • **Weight:** 197 • **B/T:** L/R


In one of the most dramatic assaults on a baseball record, Maris caught, then surpassed Babe Ruth's famous home run record of 60. Maris hit 61 home runs in 1961, a Major League record which stood until 1998 and is still the American League mark. The two-time American League MVP (1960-61) is also considered one of the best-fielding right fielders in Yankees history.



## 10 Phil Rizzuto (Number retired in 1985)

**Born:** Sept. 25, 1917 in New York, N.Y. • **Died:** Aug. 13, 2007 in West Orange, N.J.  
**Height:** 5-6 • **Weight:** 150 • **B/T:** R/R

Playing 13 years for the Yankees, "Scooter" went to nine World Series. That stat may best explain why the diminutive shortstop is regarded as a true Yankees legend. He was durable, a skilled bunter and an enthusiastic baserunner with a solid .273 career batting average. In 1950, Rizzuto earned the AL MVP Award, batting .324 with 200 hits, 92 walks and 125 runs scored. He batted .320 in the 1951 World Series and was named Series MVP. He also spent 40 years as a Yankees broadcaster (1957-96) and was elected to the Hall of Fame in 1994.



## 15 Thurman Munson (Number retired in 1979)

**Born:** June 7, 1947 in Akron, Ohio • **Died:** Aug. 2, 1979 in Canton, Ohio  
**Height:** 5-11 • **Weight:** 190 • **B/T:** R/R

Was the undisputed leader and most respected man on Yankees teams that won three consecutive AL pennants (1976-78) and two World Championships. Munson was a tremendous defensive catcher, winning the Gold Glove Award in three consecutive seasons (1973-75). From 1975-77, Thurman drove in more than 100 runs and hit better than .300 in each season. He hit the first Yankees home run in remodeled Yankee Stadium. There is no more tragic date in Yankees history than August 2, 1979, when Munson passed away in a plane crash at age 32.



## 16 Whitey Ford (Number retired in 1974)

**Born:** Oct. 21, 1928 in New York, N.Y.  
**Height:** 5-10 • **Weight:** 181 • **B/T:** L/L

"The Chairman of the Board" was the ace pitcher on great Yankees teams of the 1950s and early '60s. The wily southpaw's lifetime record of 236-106 gives him the best winning percentage (.690) of any left-handed pitcher in the 20th century with 100 or more wins. He paced the American League in victories three times, and in ERA and shutouts twice. The 1961 Cy Young Award winner still holds many World Series records, including 10 wins, 33 consecutive scoreless innings and 94 strikeouts. Elected to the Hall of Fame in 1974.



## 23 Don Mattingly (Number retired in 1997)

**Born:** April 20, 1961 in Evansville, Ill.  
**Height:** 6-0 • **Weight:** 185 • **B/T:** L/L

"Donnie Baseball" was only the 10th captain to be named by the Yankees in their storied history. The premier first baseman of his era, Mattingly was a nine-time Gold Glove winner. The 1985 American League MVP set records for most grand slams in a season (6—since tied) and most home runs in seven consecutive games (9) and eight consecutive games (10). A humble man of grace and dignity, Mattingly carried on the legacy of the pinstripe tradition and dedicated his career to the pursuit of excellence.

## 32 Elston Howard (Number retired in 1984)

**Born:** Feb. 23, 1929 in St. Louis, Mo. • **Died:** Dec. 14, 1980 in New York, N.Y.  
**Height:** 6-2 • **Weight:** 196 • **B/T:** R/R


Became the first black player in Yankees history when he made the club in the spring of 1955. The versatile two-time Gold Glove catcher was an important member of AL pennant-winning Yankees teams in nine of his first 10 seasons with the club. The 1963 American League MVP, Howard was a clubhouse leader who was respected as both a player and a man. Howard's dignified manner off the field and competitive spirit on the field set a powerful example for his teammates.



## 37 Casey Stengel (Number retired in 1970)

**Born:** July 30, 1890 in Kansas City, Mo. • **Died:** Sept. 29, 1975 in Glendale, Calif.  
**Height:** 5-11 • **Weight:** 175 • **B/T:** L/L


In a distinguished 54-year professional career, "The Old Perfessor" emerged as one of the game's greatest managers. His feat of guiding the Yankees to 10 pennants and seven world titles in a 12-year span ranks as one of the top managerial accomplishments of all time. Simply put, Casey Stengel was one of the best things to ever happen to the game of Baseball. He was an authentic baseball ambassador, making the game fun for millions of Americans. Elected to the Hall of Fame in 1966.



## 44 Reggie Jackson (Number retired in 1993)

**Born:** May 18, 1946 in Wyncote, Pa.  
**Height:** 5-10 • **Weight:** 181 • **B/T:** L/L

One of the game's premier power hitters, "Mr. October" blasted 563 career home runs, good for 13th place on Baseball's all-time list. In Game 6 of the 1977 World Series, Jackson hit three home runs, all on the first pitch, as the Yankees beat the Dodgers to wrap up the club's first World Championship since 1962. Jackson was an exciting clutch player and an intimidating clean-up hitter with a .490 career slugging percentage. The 1973 American League MVP once said, "Some people call October a time of pressure. I call it a time of character." He was elected to the Hall of Fame in 1993.



## 49 Ron Guidry (Number retired in 2003)

**Born:** Aug. 28, 1950 in Lafayette, La.  
**Height:** 5-11 • **Weight:** 165 • **B/T:** L/L

Known as "Louisiana Lightning," Ron Guidry was a four-time American League All-Star and three-time 20-game winner. He compiled one of the most dominating seasons in Baseball history in 1978, going 25-3 with a 1.74 ERA. He led the Yankees to a dramatic comeback from 14.0 games behind the Boston Red Sox to capture their second straight World Championship. That season, he also compiled a club-record 248 strikeouts and nine shutouts en route to a unanimous selection as the American League's Cy Young Award winner. On June 17, 1978 vs. California at Yankee Stadium, Guidry struck out 18 Angels, breaking the club's single-game record. With Willie Randolph, he served as the Yankees' co-captain from 1986 through his retirement in 1989. He remains in the Top 10 on the Yankees' all-time list in games pitched (368), innings pitched (2392.0), wins (170), winning percentage (.651), strikeouts (1778) and shutouts (26).



# Yankees by the Numbers

In 1929, the New York Yankees and Cleveland Indians became the first teams to make numbers a permanent part of the uniform. Other teams quickly adopted the idea and, by 1932, uniform numbers became standard for all teams. The Yankees' initial distribution of numbers was made according to the player's spot in the batting order. Therefore, in 1929, leadoff hitter Earle Combs wore No. 1; Mark Koenig No. 2; Babe Ruth No. 3; Lou Gehrig No. 4; Bob Meusel No. 5; Tony Lazzeri No. 6; Leo Durocher No. 7; Johnny Grabowski No. 8; Benny Bengough No. 9; and Bill Dickey No. 10 (Grabowski, Bengough and Dickey shared catching duties). After some exhaustive research, the Yankees' Media Relations staff compiled the following list of Yankees uniform numbers. The list represents uniform numbers worn by coaches (c), managers (m) and players who officially appeared in a regular season game. Yankees retired numbers are denoted in boldface text.





## 1921 American League Champion Yankees - The first pennant-winning team in franchise history

It wasn't until the 19th season in franchise history (after moving to New York from Baltimore prior to the 1903 season) that the Yankees won their first American League pennant, finishing 98-55, 4.5 games ahead of Cleveland. The club was led by Babe Ruth, who batted .378 (204-for-540) with 59 home runs and a career-high 171 RBI. Carl Mays (27-5), Waite Hoyt (19-13) and Bob Shawkey (18-12) fronted a pitching staff that allowed the fewest earned runs in the American League (579). In the World Series, the last of Baseball's three-year experiment with a nine-game format, the Yankees were defeated 5-games-to-3 by the Giants, with whom they shared the Polo Grounds. Hoyt, who lost Game 8, 1-0, on an unearned run in the first inning, went 2-1 (27.0IP) in three complete games. Injuries suffered by Ruth in Game 2 (cut arm while sliding, which later became infected) and Game 5 (wrenched knee) limited him to just one pinch-hitting plate appearance in the final three games of the Series.





## David Cone's Perfect Game

On July 18, 1999, David Cone tossed the 15th perfect game in Baseball history (since 1901) on a day Don Larsen was on hand to throw out the game's ceremonial first pitch. It came only one season after David Wells accomplished the feat and gave the Yankees a record three perfect games in their history, including Don Larsen in the 1956 World Series. Prior to Wells' and Cone's feats, perfect games had only been pitched in consecutive seasons once (by Jim Bunning of the Phillies in 1964 and the Dodgers' Sandy Koufax in 1965) and never by pitchers from the same team. The original Yankee Stadium also became the only park to host as many as three perfect games (Dodger Stadium was the site of perfect games by Koufax in 1965 and Montreal's Dennis Martinez in 1991).

## One-Hit Games

The most-recent Yankee to have a one-hit complete game was Ted Lilly on 4/27/02 in a 1-0 defeat at Seattle, becoming the first Yankee in franchise history to lose a one-hit CG in the regular season (allowed a walk, WP and RBI-single in 7th).

The Yankees' last one-hit complete-game win was by Mike Mussina on

9/2/01 at Boston in a 1-0 Yankees victory...he retired 26 consecutive batters before Carl Everett singled with two outs in the ninth...it was the first complete-game one-hit victory by a Yankee since Jimmy Key on 4/27/93 at California.

The Yankees have had two postseason one-hit complete games...Roger Clemens still holds the all-time record for fewest hits allowed in an AL or NL Championship Series complete game with his one-hit, 15K performance in the Yankees' 5-0 ALCS Game 4 win at Seattle on 10/14/00...Bill Bevens famously lost his one-hit CG in Game 4 of the 1947 World Series vs. Brooklyn...he was one out from a no-hitter when pinch-hitter Cookie Lavagetto doubled in two runs to give the Dodgers a 3-2 victory...Bevens walked 10 batters and had one wild pitch on the day...the World Series marked the last games Bevens and Lavagetto ever played in the Majors.

Yankees with multiple complete-game one hitters are Whitey Ford (3), Bob Turley (3), Lefty Gomez (2), Rip Collins (2) and Vic Raschi (2), while Bill Bevens (see above paragraph) also threw a one-hit CG in the regular season.

One hitters by opponents against the Yankees: The Yankees were last held to 1H on 6/30/07 at Yankee Stadium by Oakland's Chad Gaudin and Rich Harden...the last starter to throw a one-hitter against the Yankees was Mike Maroth on 7/16/04 at Detroit...Joe Wood, Earl Hamilton and Nolan Ryan are the only pitchers with a pair of one-hitters against the Yankees, with both of Hamilton's coming in 1913...Hoyt Wilhelm, who no-hit the Yankees in 1958, also tossed a one-hitter against them in 1959.

# Grand Slams

**Grand slam notes from 2010:** The Yankees hit 10 grand slams in 2010, tying the franchise record set in 1987...Jorge Posada hit grand slams in consecutive games on 6/12 and 6/13/10 vs. Houston, becoming the first Yankee to hit a grand slam in back-to-back games since Bill Dickey in 1937...Alex Rodriguez was one of three Major Leaguers to hit three grand slams in 2010.

# Previous Yankee Stadium All-Star Games

The Yankees have hosted four All-Star Games, including the 2008 Midsummer Classic in Yankee Stadium's final season. The Stadium also hosted the All-Star Game in 1977 (48<sup>th</sup>), 1960 (29<sup>th</sup>) and 1939 (seventh). Only Cleveland's old Municipal Stadium hosted as many All-Star Games as Yankee Stadium. Overall, New York City has hosted eight MLB All-Star Games, the highest total in Major League history, with the Polo Grounds (1934 and 1942), Ebbets Field (1949) and Shea Stadium (1964) also serving as host sites. The 2008 game marked the first time the Midsummer Classic was held in the host team's final season at its ballpark.

Since the game originated in 1933, the Yankees have had the most All-Star players (116) and the highest total All-Star selections (364) of any Major League Baseball franchise. Mickey Mantle owns the most All-Star selections in club history, having been named to 20 All-Star teams (fourth-most all-time). Yankees pitcher Lefty Gomez is the only pitcher in All-Star Game history to earn three wins, having made five career All-Star starts. Joe DiMaggio (13-time All-Star) and Tom Tresh (three-time All-Star), own the distinction as the only Yankees rookies to start for the American League (1936 and 1962, respectively). Of the 80 All-Star Games, a Yankees Manager has skipped the American League team 29 times. Among Yankees on the roster as of Feb. 1, 2011, third baseman Alex Rodriguez leads the team with 13 career trips to the Midsummer Classic, followed by shortstop Derek Jeter and closer Mariano Rivera with 11 All-Star appearances apiece. Jeter holds the distinction as the only All-Star MVP in club history, taking home the honor in 2000 after going 3-for-3 with 1 double and 2 RBI in the AL's 6-3 win at Atlanta's Turner Field. He became just the fourth shortstop to earn the award. Rodriguez led the Majors in All-Star balloting in 2007 and 2008.

## Seventh All-Star Game

July 11, 1939, Yankee Stadium



Yankee Stadium was chosen to host the 1939 All-Star Game due to the World's Fair which was being held at Flushing-Meadows in Queens during the 1939 season. The Cubs' Gabby Hartnett managed the National League squad while Yankees skipper Joe McCarthy led the American League team, which featured 10 Yankees All-Stars, six of whom were starters. Yankees centerfielder Joe DiMaggio was 1-for-4 in the game, hitting a solo home run. Lou Gehrig, who announced his retirement in May of 1939, was an honorary member of the AL squad.

## 29th All-Star Game

National League 6, American League 0  
July 13, 1960 (Game #2), Yankee Stadium



Yankee Stadium was the host site for baseball's second All-Star Game in three days in 1960. The National League completed the All-Star sweep with a 6-0 win, having won Game 1 on July 11 in Kansas City, marking the only year that both All-Star games were won by the same team. Yankees hurler Whitey Ford was the starting pitcher for the AL squad, while fellow Yankees Yogi Berra (catcher), Mickey Mantle (left field), Roger Maris (centerfield) and Bill Skowron (first base) all appeared in the starting lineup. The National League used six different pitchers to combine on the shutout effort and hit an All-Star record-setting four home runs, including one by Willie Mays. The 38,000 fans who attended the game witnessed Ted Williams in his final All-Star appearance.

## 48th All-Star Game

Showcasing its renovation, Yankee Stadium hosted the All-Star Game on July 19, 1977, in a game dedicated to Jackie Robinson. With the Yankees defending their 1976 pennant, Billy Martin managed the AL team on his home field. The National League won its sixth consecutive All-Star Game, part of the Senior Circuit's 11-game win streak. Joe Morgan opened the game with a home run off Jim Palmer as the NL squad scored four first-inning runs. Yankees outfielder Reggie Jackson and second baseman Willie Randolph were AL starters. National League Manager Sparky Anderson described the game's final score by saying, "the only reason we're here is to kick the living hell out of those guys."

## 79th All-Star Game

American League 4, National League 3  
July 15, 2008, Yankee Stadium



In the final Midsummer Classic at the original Yankee Stadium, the American League emerged with a 4-3 win in 15 innings as Texas' Michael Young brought home Minnesota's Justin Morneau with a "walk-off" sacrifice fly. The 4-hour, 50-minute contest was the longest All-Star Game time-wise and tied for the longest ASG in innings (also 1967 at Anaheim, 2-1 NL win). It was the AL's 12th straight All-Star Game victory and ensured American League homefield advantage in the World Series. SS Derek Jeter started and recorded the game's first hit in the first inning. RHP Mariano Rivera pitched 1.2 scoreless innings. Yankees Manager Joe Girardi joined the AL coaching staff as did Yankees Head Athletic Trainer Gene Monahan, who made his fourth All-Star Game appearance (also 1977, '86 and '92). Pregame ceremonies included 49 Hall of Famers, marking one of the largest gatherings of living baseball HOFers ever. The festivities were highlighted by Yankees Principal Owner/Chairperson George Steinbrenner, who delivered baseballs to the ceremonial first pitch participants (Reggie Jackson, Whitey Ford, Yogi Berra and Goose Gosage).

## 1921 WORLD SERIES

Marked the Yankees' first ever World Series appearance in Baseball's last nine-game Fall Classic...Waite Hoyt went 2-1 despite not allowing an earned run in 27.0IP (18H, 11BB) over three starts...is tied with Christy Mathewson (1905) for the most IP without allowing an ER in a single World Series...lost, 1-0, in the Game 8 clincher, tossing a complete game and allowing an unearned run in the first inning...Carl Mays went 1-2 with a 1.73 ERA (26.0IP, 5ER) in his three starts, setting a still-standing record for most innings pitched in a single postseason without allowing a walk...Babe Ruth hit the first of his 15 career World Series home runs in a losing effort in Game 4.

## 1922 WORLD SERIES

# Yankee STADIUM



**T**he New York Yankees began a new chapter in their storied history with the opening of Yankee Stadium in 2009. Located directly across the street from the site of the original, the new Stadium's architecture is a celebration of the spirit and tradition of the franchise. While firmly rooted in the past, the Stadium has a vision toward the future, incorporating the best in technology and state-of-the-art guest services.

All of the Stadium's modern amenities exist within the framework of classic elements of the original, most notably the instantly recognizable frieze that again circles the grandstand. Among the countless fan-friendly elements, massive video boards give Yankees fans more information than ever before, and concessions have been placed on concourses that allow for continuous viewing of the game.

Yankee Stadium, as a living museum, has been designed to set the standard—much like the team has done with its 27 World Championships.

## THE STADIUM SITE

The Yankees are proud to play in the Bronx, which is home to approximately 1.4 million residents and is one of the five boroughs that make up New York City.

The Stadium sits on former parkland from Macombs Dam Park and Mullaly Park, with the Stadium grounds bounded by Jerome Avenue to the west, River Avenue to the east, and 161st Street to the south. The northern edge of the site is located between 162nd Street and 164th Street. In a nod

to tradition, the footprint of the original Stadium has been replicated in the new Stadium.

Yankee Stadium is the fourth permanent home of the New York Yankees, following Hilltop Park (1903-12), the Polo Grounds (1913-22), and the original Yankee Stadium (1923-73, '76-2008). The Yankees also played two full seasons at Shea Stadium (1974-75) in Queens when the original Stadium underwent remodeling.

## HOMAGE TO THE ORIGINAL STADIUM

The current Yankee Stadium evokes the spirit of the original, while restoring many of the lost treasures from before the renovations of 1974-75.

The signature frieze once again outlines the top of the Stadium bowl. As in the past, it is attached to a roof that extends into the Stadium, covering the top rows of the Grandstand.

Monument Park has been relocated to its original position in center field, albeit behind the fence, unlike before the renovation when the monuments were on the playing field. All plaques, monuments and tribute displays for the 16 Yankees who have had their numbers retired are on display for fans, who may visit Monument Park prior to all home games.

On the Main Level, near Gate 6, the Yankees Museum presented by Bank of America—a museum within a museum—tells the story of baseball and the Yankees franchise through various displays of artifacts and memorabilia. Items include a “Ball Wall” with hundreds of signed baseballs from Yankees greats, Thurman Munson’s locker from the original Yankee Stadium and a replica of a locker from the Yankees clubhouse in the current Stadium. On game days, fans are welcome in the museum from the time the gates open until one hour after the game ends. On non-game days, visitors can enjoy the museum as part of Yankee Stadium tours.

Babe Ruth Plaza, located on the south side of the Stadium in between Gates 4 and 6, honors the man proverbially credited with building the original House that Ruth Built. Through a series of storyboards displayed on light posts, the Babe’s life story is recounted throughout the plaza.

## INNOVATIVE ARCHITECTURE AND MODERN AMENITIES

One of the goals in building Yankee Stadium was to bring fans closer to the action in a facility more attuned to modern needs and expectations. The new building is 63 percent larger than the original Stadium with about 500,000 square feet of additional space.


Improved sight lines, wider concourses and the installation of nearly 1,400 high-definition video monitors throughout the Stadium all ensure guests won’t miss a minute of on-field action while in their seats or at concession stands.

In addition to the live game broadcast, these centrally controlled Internet protocol monitors can also provide up-to-the-moment news, scores, weather, traffic information and safety updates.

The Great Hall is a 31,000-square-foot space located between the Stadium’s exterior wall and the interior of the Stadium. Spanning from Gate 4 to Gate 6, it is covered overhead but has massive open-air archways, which help support the Yankees’ “green initiative.” It is home to large banners bearing the images of past Yankees greats from Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig to more modern stars such as Don Mattingly and Paul O’Neill. A 24-foot-high-by-36-foot-wide 10mm true high-definition video board and a 5-foot-by-383-foot LED ribbon board immediately greet guests who enter through this portion of the Stadium.

The audio/visual experience at Yankee Stadium is highlighted by a 59-foot-high-by-101-foot-long 16mm true high-definition centerfield video board, which is flanked by two smaller video boards that display day-of-game lineups and out-of-town scores. Additionally, the entire length of the Terrace Level is spanned by a 3-foot-high, 1,279-foot long full-color LED ribbon board. A distributed sound system optimizes speaker placement for audio quality vastly superior to that in the original Stadium. The entire Stadium is built with a future-proof infrastructure designed by Cisco Systems that is easily adaptable to new technologies.

A 7,000-square-foot state-of-the-art banquet and conference center is designed to meet the needs of guests who wish to host business functions in the ballpark.

## URBAN PLANNING

The site for Yankee Stadium was in part selected for its proximity to mass transit. Like the original Stadium, it is served at the 161st Street/Yankee Stadium subway stop by the No. 4, B and D trains.

Metro-North offers train service to Yankee Stadium from anywhere in its service territory. For more information, call the MTA at (212) 532-4900 or visit [www.mta.info](http://www.mta.info).

As in previous years, Yankee Stadium is accessible by ferry service (800-53-FERRY) and New York City Transit bus lines (718-330-1234).

Pedestrian access points are located at Yankee Stadium's four gates: Gate 2 on Jerome Avenue and 164th Street; Gate 4 at Jerome Avenue and 161st Street; Gate 6 at River Avenue and 161st Street and Gate 8 at River Avenue, south of 164th Street.

## RETAIL & FOOD OPTIONS

There are three distinct retail stores in Yankee Stadium—the 5,825-square-foot Home Plate Team Store in the Great Hall near Gate 4, which houses the largest selection of Yankees merchandise and memorabilia; the New Era Team Store on the Main Level, which sells caps and other Yankees merchandise; and the Great Hall Team Store at Gate 6, which sells various items and is open year-round.

Yankee Stadium is home to two premier dining establishments. The iconic Hard Rock Cafe is open year-round and houses music memorabilia and Yankees-related pieces in a 7,000 square-foot restaurant at Gate 6, and NYY Steak, located above the Hard Rock Cafe, offers an upscale dining experience.

More casual fare can be found at a New York-themed food court located on the third-base side of the Field Level concourse.

Membership restaurants include the Audi Yankees Club on the H&R Block Suite Level and the Mohegan Sun Sports Bar above Monument Park in center field.

## DISABLED SERVICES

Yankee Stadium strives to provide an accessible environment for all of its guests. Wheelchair accessible and aisle transfer seats are available at various price points and locations, and include the Yankees' Premium Offerings seat locations.

There are two dedicated open-captioning video boards for guests who are deaf or have hearing impairments: one in left field, just below Section 233B, and one in right field, just below Section 206. Captioning is also provided on the right-center field televisions, the high-definition video board in the Great Hall, high-definition video monitors throughout Yankee Stadium and on the video board in the New York Yankees Museum presented by Bank of America.

The Yankees extend their appreciation to those who participated in periodic outreach meetings led by

United Spinal Association, which helped build a Stadium that Acting U.S. Attorney for the Southern District of New York Lev Dassin called, "a model of accessibility to people with disabilities."



## BRONX INCENTIVES

Yankee Stadium is one of the premier building projects to take place in the Bronx in the last 50 years. The hard work and dedication of engineers, architects and construction professionals in building and designing the Stadium makes the facility one of the most impressive and fan-friendly venues in Major League Baseball. Equally important was the project's dedication to support local community groups, institutions and residents as the Yankees remain devoted to the long-term development of the Bronx.

Building a new state-of-the-art facility required an army of talented and experienced professionals. As part of the Yankees' commitment to ensure that the Stadium project creates economic opportunities in the Bronx, the Yankees made a concerted effort to recruit a wide range of vendors and employees from the local community. Of the 190 contracts awarded, 63 were allotted to Bronx-based businesses (accounting for over 33 percent of the contracts and resulting in \$133 million in contracts to Bronx-based businesses). The Yankees also stayed committed to hiring at least 25 percent of the total workforce from Bronx residents, again providing incentive to the surrounding community.

## YANKEE STADIUM TIMELINE

**JUNE 15, 2005** – The Yankees announce plans for a new Yankee Stadium to be constructed on parkland north of 161st Street – adjacent to the original Stadium's longtime site.

**AUGUST 16, 2006** – The Yankees break ground for Yankee Stadium at a ceremony featuring George M. Steinbrenner, New York Governor George Pataki, New York City Mayor Michael Bloomberg, Bronx Borough President Adolfo Carrion and Commissioner Bud Selig.

**OCTOBER 2006** – The first concrete is poured.

**DECEMBER 2007** – The first piece of frieze is put in place.

**DECEMBER 2007** – The Stadium is considered 50 percent completed.

**JANUARY 14-15, 2008** – Limestone Panels containing "YANKEE STADIUM" gold lettering are installed above Gate 4.

**MARCH 29, 2008** – Eagle medallions inspired by those on the 1923 Stadium are lifted into place above Gate 4.

**APRIL 2008** – Frieze installation is completed.

**MAY 1, 2008** – A "topping off" ceremony is held to commemorate the completion of Yankee Stadium's steel structure.

**MAY 2008** – The foul poles are installed, along with the first seats.

**JUNE 18, 2008** – The Yankees hold their first press conference at the new Yankee Stadium, announcing a long-term agreement with Seminole Hard Rock Entertainment to open a Hard Rock Cafe near Gate 6. In addition, the Yankees introduce the newly-branded NYY Steak, a prime steakhouse to be located in Yankee Stadium.

**SEPTEMBER 19, 2008** – The massive, blue, backlit "YANKEE STADIUM" lettering above Gate 4 is hoisted and installed.

**OCTOBER 15, 2008** – The first sections of sod are laid.

**OCTOBER 2008** – Lighting in the interior bowl is tested for the first time.

**NOVEMBER 8, 2008** – Yankees executives and former players, including Scott Brosius, David Cone, Paul O'Neill and Jeff Nelson, along with 60 local Bronx high school youth groups remove home plate, the pitcher's rubber and pails of dirt from the original Stadium and install them in the new Yankee Stadium. The participating Bronx youth groups—Youth Force 2020, led by Turner Construction Company, and the ACE Mentor Program at Yankee Stadium, guided by Tishman Speyer—took part in Yankees-sponsored after-school programs relating to the construction and engineering of the new Yankee Stadium.

**JANUARY 23, 2009** – The front office moves in, bringing World Series trophies from 1977 and 2000 to the new building.

**FEBRUARY 2009** – Plaques and monuments are placed in the new Monument Park.

**APRIL 3-4, 2009** – The first exhibition games are played vs. the Chicago Cubs.

**APRIL 16, 2009** – The home opener is played vs. the Cleveland Indians.



The crowd of 54,251 was the largest ever at the current Yankee Stadium.

**New Era Pinstripe Bowl**

**Syracuse-36, Kansas State-34**

The inaugural New Era Pinstripe Bowl marked the second-ever college football bowl game in the Bronx (also Gotham Bowl in 1962). Following an exciting week of events throughout New York City during the week leading up to the game, Syracuse and Kansas State played an instant classic that was decided by one play – a failed two-point conversion by the Wildcats with just over one minute left in regulation.

But referee Arthur Mercante felt Foreman was fit enough to fight through it and allowed the bout to continue.





## History of Original Yankee Stadium

One year after changing the course of Baseball history with the purchase of Babe Ruth from the Boston Red Sox, the Yankees made another acquisition that would forever alter the way the game was watched.

On February 5, 1921, the Yankees issued a press release announcing the purchase of 10 acres of property in the west Bronx. The land, purchased from the estate of William Waldorf Astor for \$675,000, sat directly across the Harlem River from the Manhattan-situated Polo Grounds, which the Yankees had been unhappily sharing with their landlord, the New York Giants of the National League, since 1913.

The relationship between the clubs crumbled after the 1920 season when the Yankees' attendance—boosted by their new slugging sensation—doubled to almost 1.3 million, approximately 25 percent more than that of the Giants. In 1921, the Giants asked the Yankees to vacate the Polo Grounds as soon as possible. With their departure from the Polo Grounds now inevitable, Yankees co-owners Jacob Ruppert and Tillinghast L'Hommedieu Huston set out to build a spectacular ballpark of their own, Baseball's first triple-decked structure. With an advertised capacity of 70,000, it would also be the first to be labeled a "stadium."

Original plans by the architect—the Osborn Engineering Company of Cleveland, Ohio—had the Stadium triple-decked and roofed all the way around. An early press release, in fact, described the Yankees' new home as a field enclosed with towering embattlements rendering the events inside "impenetrable to all human eyes, save those of aviators." But the initial grand design was quickly scaled back with the triple-decked grandstand not reaching either foul pole. Contrary to the owners'

wishes, the action would be visible from the elevated trains that passed by the outfield, as well as from the buildings that would spring up across River Avenue. Fortunately, a purely decorative element survived the project's early downsizing and would become the park's most recognizable feature. A 15-foot-high copper frieze would adorn the front of the roof, which covered much of the Stadium's third deck. It would give Yankee Stadium a stately dignity that no park has possessed—either before or since.

The new stadium would favor left-handed power with the right-field foul pole only 295 feet from home plate (though the right-field fence would shoot out to 429 feet in right-center). The left-field pole measured only 281 feet from the plate, but right-handed hitters would be neutralized by a 395-foot left field and a whopping 460 feet to left-center. The new stadium would also be patron-friendly, boasting an unheard of "eight toilet rooms for men and as many for women scattered throughout the stands and bleachers." (After the Stadium was remodeled 50 years later, it included more than 50 restrooms.) The club's executive offices would be moved from Midtown Manhattan and relocated between the main and mezzanine decks with an electric elevator connecting them with the main entrance.

The construction contract was awarded to New York's White Construction Company on May 5, 1922, with the edict that the job be completed "at a definite price" of \$2.5 million by Opening Day 1923. Incredibly, it was. In only 284 working days, Yankee Stadium was ready for its inaugural game on April 18, 1923 vs. the Boston Red Sox.

An announced crowd of 74,200 fans packed Yankee Stadium while thousands more milled around outside after the fire department finally ordered the

gates closed. Before the game began, John Philip Sousa and the Seventh Regiment Band led both clubs to the flagpole in deep center field, where the American flag and the Yankees' 1922 pennant were raised. Appropriately, Ruth christened his new home with a three-run homer to cap a four-run third inning as the Yankees coasted to a 4-1 win over the Boston Red Sox.

Because it was widely recognized that Ruth's tremendous drawing power made the new stadium possible, *New York Evening Telegram* sportswriter Fred Lieb dubbed it "The House That Ruth Built." Later that season, the Stadium hosted the first of 37 World Series, as the Yankees won their first World Championship, defeating their former landlord, the Giants. Of course, as the original Stadium became the stage for a staggering 26 world titles, it would also become known as "The Home of Champions."

In its early years, when wooden bleachers surrounded the outfield, a grass slope rose toward the outfield walls from foul pole to foul pole. Outfielders, especially Ruth in right, routinely backed up the small hill to pull down fly balls. Advertising signs lined the tops of the bleachers except in right-center, where a lone manually operated wooden scoreboard was large enough to record 12 innings for games played by every club in the two major leagues. Over the years, the board would be replaced by more modern models. The Yankees, in fact, would unveil Baseball's first electronic message board in 1959.

By 1928, the Stadium was ready for its first major face-lift. The triple-decked grandstand in left field was extended beyond the foul pole and several rows of box seats were removed in order to extend the left-field foul pole distance to 301 feet. The right-field grandstand was extended in 1937, allowing for "upper-deck" home runs in both directions. With the grandstand expansion, the remaining wooden bleachers were replaced with a concrete structure, and the distance to center field dropped from 490 feet to a still-distant 461 feet.

In 1932, the Yankees began their tradition of commemorating their heroes with monuments and plaques when they dedicated a monument to Manager Miller Huggins, who had died suddenly during the 1929 season. Five more monuments were added (one each for Lou Gehrig, Ruth, Mickey

Mantle and Joe DiMaggio and one to honor the victims and heroes of the terrorists attacks of September 11, 2001) along with numerous plaques. For years, existing monuments were in the field of play in deep center field, and outfielders occasionally had to work around them to retrieve baseballs hit to that part of the park.

Except for the addition of lights in 1946, the look of Yankee Stadium remained relatively the same until the winter of 1966-67. Then, under the direction of the Yankees' new owner, CBS, the 44-year-old facility received a \$1.5 million modernization, most of which was spent on 90 tons of paint. The brown concrete exterior was painted white as was the timeworn greenish copper frieze. Also, all of the grandstand seats went from green to blue, a color scheme that would be retained when the Stadium was completely remodeled after the 1973 season.

On August 8, 1972, after years of debate about the future of the aging ballpark, the Yankees signed a 30-year lease with the City of New York, which called for Yankee Stadium to be completely modernized in time for the 1976 season. After completing the Stadium's 50th-anniversary in 1973, the Yankees moved to Shea Stadium for two seasons while the majority of Yankee Stadium was torn down and rebuilt.

The most striking change of the modernization was the removal of the numerous obstructive steel columns that supported the second and third decks, as well as the roof. By "cantilevering" the upper decks and lowering the playing field while increasing the slope of the lower stands, sight lines for fans were dramatically improved. Capacity was reduced from 65,010 in 1973 to 54,028 upon reopening as wider plastic seats replaced wooden seats.

Of course, with the removal of the original roof, the Stadium almost lost its most-recognizable feature: the copper frieze. However, an innovative design concept included an exact replica of the frieze atop the new 560-foot-long scoreboard wall, which stretched across the rear of the

bleachers. The board also included Baseball's first "telescreen," which could provide instant replays of the action by employing a then-incredible "nine shades of gray."

Yankee Stadium's exterior changed dramatically, as three escalator towers were added, one at each of the Stadium's three entrances. With seven additional

rows of seats added to the upper deck, the already grand Stadium received an even more majestic look. A 138-foot Louisville Slugger-shaped smokestack, commonly called "The Bat," was added outside the Stadium near the home-plate entrance.

The renovated Stadium also saw the mammoth fence distances in left and center field greatly reduced as "Death Valley" in left-center was brought in from 457 feet to 430 feet, and straightaway center field was slimmed from 463 feet to 417 feet. Subsequent alterations prior to the 1985 and 1988 seasons brought fences in to the configuration that is now replicated in the current Yankee Stadium.

The remodeled original Yankee Stadium reopened on April 15, 1976—with the Yankees topping Minnesota, 11-4. Like its predecessor and successor, it hosted the World Series in its inaugural season. In fact, the remodeled Stadium hosted the Fall Classic in its first three seasons, as the Yankees followed their 1976 Series loss to Cincinnati by winning back-to-back World Series titles in 1977 and 1978 over the Dodgers.

As one of the world's most prestigious addresses, the original Yankee Stadium was also the home for scores of other sports, entertainment and cultural events. While the Yankees were on the road or in the offseason, the Stadium opened its gates to college and pro football, soccer, political assemblies, religious conventions, concerts and even the circus.

Boxing immediately found a home at Yankee Stadium with Benny Leonard winning a 15-round decision over Lou Tondler for the lightweight title just three months after the gates opened on July 23, 1923. When Muhammad Ali stopped Ken Norton on September 28, 1976, it marked the 30th championship fight at the Stadium. All previous title bouts had taken place between 1923 and 1959—perhaps none more memorable than the June 22, 1938, heavyweight championship match between Joe Louis and Germany's Max Schmeling. After suffering a knockout loss in the initial non-title encounter at the Stadium two years earlier, Louis—now the heavyweight champ—avenged his defeat with a stunning first-round KO in the rematch.

Football also became an immediate fixture at Yankee Stadium with the 1923 Army-Navy game inaugurating a rich history of collegiate and professional football matchups. On November 12, 1928, with Notre Dame and Army locked in a scoreless game at halftime, the legendary Knute Rockne made his famous "Win One for the Gipper" pep talk, and the Fighting Irish went on to defeat the Cadets, 12-6.

The New York football Giants also called Yankee

Stadium home from 1956 through 1973 and on December 28, 1958, played in what is widely recognized as "The Greatest Game Ever Played." With the NFL championship at stake, a crowd of 64,185 watched the Baltimore Colts tie the game, 17-17, on a Steve Myrha field goal with seven seconds left. Eight minutes into professional football's first-ever "sudden-death" overtime period, the Colts' Alan Ameche crashed into the end zone from the 1-yard line, ending a contest that would help establish pro football as a major sport.

**I**n the bottom of the seventh inning of the Yankees' final home game on September 21, 2008, a taped valedictory was given on the Yankee Stadium video board by longtime public address announcer Bob Sheppard, who was unable to say goodbye in person as he continued to recover at home from an illness that had kept him away from the Stadium for the entire season. His appearance on screen brought a reverential hush to the crowd as everyone recognized they were about to hear the most perfect of all couplings perhaps for the last time—Bob Sheppard's voice reverberating in the original Yankee Stadium. He said the following:

***"Farewell, old Yankee Stadium, farewell. What a wonderful story you can tell. DiMaggio, Mantle, Gehrig and Ruth, A baseball cathedral in truth."***

The Stadium was also an important stop for religious conventions, especially those of the Jehovah's Witnesses. In 1950, the group began holding conventions at the Stadium, including one that drew 123,707 people on August 8, 1958—the largest single-day event in Stadium history. On October 4, 1965—with the Yankees out of the World Series for only the third time in 17 years—the Stadium held the first-ever Papal Mass in the United States as Pope Paul VI celebrated Mass before a crowd in excess of 80,000. Pope John Paul II also celebrated Mass at the original Yankee Stadium on October 2, 1979, during his tour of the United States.

On August 16, 2006, a groundbreaking ceremony was held for a new Yankee Stadium to be ready for the 2009 season. The location chosen for the new building was the north side of 161<sup>st</sup> Street and River Avenue in the Bronx, directly across the street from the site of the original.

As part of its final season in 2008, Yankee Stadium hosted a third papal visit on April 20 from Pope Benedict XVI, NYU's commencement ceremony on May 14 (believed to be the first ever college commencement in Stadium history) and a 15-inning 4-3 AL victory in the 2008 All-Star

Game on July 15 (the fourth at Yankee Stadium, joining Midsummer Classics in 1939, 1960-Game 2, and 1977).

The building took its final bow on September 21, when the Yankees played the last game in Stadium history. Gates opened at 1:00 p.m., allowing approximately 13,000 fans the opportunity to visit Monument Park and walk around the warning track. With a national Sunday night audience watching on television, all-time Yankees greats, along with the evening's starting lineup, took their positions in the field before Julia Ruth Stevens, daughter of Babe Ruth, tossed out the ceremonial first pitch. Fittingly, the game ended in a Yankees victory, this one over the Baltimore Orioles, 7-3. After the final out, the club assembled by the pitcher's mound at the side of captain Derek Jeter. Over the PA, he thanked the crowd for their years of support, while reminding everyone of the new memories soon to be made. ❧

## Negro Leagues at Original Yankee Stadium

For almost 20 years in the 1930s and '40s, Yankee Stadium was a regular home to Negro Leagues baseball. During that time the greatest black stars of the day drew thousands of fans to watch players prohibited from playing in the Major Leagues at the time. Almost every Negro Leagues player of note over that two-decade stretch played at Yankee Stadium, including Hall of Famers Leroy "Satchel" Paige, John Henry "Pop" Lloyd, "Cool Papa" Bell, Oscar Charleston, Buck Leonard, Hilton Smith and Josh Gibson, who hit some of the longest home runs in the Stadium's history.

Yankee Stadium opened to black baseball on July 5, 1930, when Yankees owner Jacob Ruppert donated the free use of the facility to the New York Lincoln Giants and Baltimore Black Sox for a benefit doubleheader to raise money for the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters, one of America's most prominent black unions. The games raised approximately \$3,500 and included the appearance of Bill "Bojangles" Robinson who entertained the crowd along with the 369<sup>th</sup> Hell Fighters marching band.

Black baseball games at Yankee Stadium usually took place on Sundays when the Yankees played on the road. Sometimes a pair of teams would play a doubleheader, while at other times four-team doubleheaders were scheduled in order to maximize attendance and profits. Bands often performed and celebrities such as Joe Louis and New York City Mayor Fiorello La Guardia were common. Track races and other pregame contests also delighted fans.

In 1931, Lloyd organized an All-Star team of black players named the "Harlem Stars," which played several games at Yankee Stadium. Eventually, that team became the New York Black Yankees of the Negro National League. The club went on to use Yankee Stadium for a portion of their home schedule between 1936 and 1947, often wearing the used

uniforms of the Major League Yankees. In the spring of 1941, Paige, black baseball's greatest pitcher, briefly joined the Black Yankees, pitching and winning his only game in a New York uniform at Yankee Stadium.

Yankee Stadium also served as the venue for black baseball All-Star games and championship contests. One of the most memorable Negro Leagues All-Star games took place on August 27, 1939, when the Negro National League defeated the Negro American League, 10-2, with the help of Gibson's bases-clearing triple.

Ruppert's death in 1939 did not put a stop to black baseball at the Stadium. In fact, the Yankees sponsored a Jacob Ruppert Memorial Cup tournament among Negro National League teams. Ten doubleheaders were held at Yankee Stadium that summer to determine a winner, and on September 24, 1939, the Baltimore Elite Giants were crowned champs in Ruppert's name.

In October 1946, Yankee Stadium was home to two noteworthy exhibition games between an African-American All-Star team managed by Paige and an American League All-Star team led by future Hall of Famer Bob Feller. Cleveland Indians pitcher Bob Lemon hit a home run to win the first game for the AL but Paige out-pitched Feller in the second game to earn a split.

When Jackie Robinson finally broke the color barrier with the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1947, it was a watershed moment in the history of civil rights in the United States. But it did precipitate the decline and eventual extinction of the Negro Leagues.

Black baseball's relationship with the New York Yankees came to a close on August 20, 1961, as stars of the Negro American League gathered for its All-Star Game at Yankee Stadium. Paige, reportedly 55 years old at the time, pitched three scoreless innings and claimed the game's Most Valuable Player honors. **N**

## Previous Homes of the Yankees

### Hilltop Park

American League Park (commonly known as Hilltop Park) was the Yankees' first home. Hastily constructed in just six weeks on one of the highest points in Upper Manhattan, the all-wooden ballpark sat on a block bounded by Broadway, 165th Street, Fort Washington Avenue and 168th Street, in close proximity to the New York Giants' 155th Street home, the Polo Grounds. The first game at Hilltop Park was played on April 30, 1903—a 6-2 win over Washington, started by Hall of Famer Jack Chesbro.

The ballpark had a covered grandstand ringing the infield from first base to third base and uncovered bleachers running up the foul lines. There was seating for approximately 15,000 people, but as was the case in many ballparks of that time, it could accommodate overflow crowds both in the outfield and along foul ground in the infield, occasionally bringing capacity up toward 25,000.

When a fire ravaged the Polo Grounds on April 14, 1911, the Yankees allowed the Giants to play their home games at Hilltop Park until the Polo Grounds could be rebuilt. From April 15 through May 30, the Giants put together a 20-8 record at their temporary home.

The Yankees were successful in their 10 years at Hilltop Park, compiling a 398-342 all-time record there. The club's final game at the structure came on October 5, 1912—an 8-6 win vs. Washington. After the Yankees' lease at Hilltop Park expired at the end of the season, they decided to leave the rickety ballpark to become renters at the Polo Grounds, where the Giants became their landlords. The move, unthinkable years earlier, was facilitated by the Yankees' post-fire hospitality.

In 1914, Hilltop Park was torn down. Currently, its former location is the site of Columbia-Presbyterian Medical Center.

### Polo Grounds

The Yankees called the Polo Grounds home from 1913 through 1922, sharing the park with the New York Giants. Located on West 157th Street and Eighth Avenue in Upper Manhattan, the Polo Grounds was overlooked by a promontory called Coogan's Bluff to the west. To the east was the Harlem River—on the other side of which Yankee Stadium was built in 1923.

The Polo Grounds was constructed with straight sides, and the outfield fences by the foul poles ran parallel to each other and away from home plate. The foul poles in left and right were approximately 277 and 258 feet away from the plate, respectively, while left-center, center and right fields were all in the range of 445-483 feet away from home.

The Yankees compiled a 416-338 all-time regular season record at the uniquely-shaped facility, winning the first two pennants in franchise history while tenants in 1921 and 1922. The club lost both of those World Series to the NL Champion Giants—5 games to 3 in 1921 and 4

games to none with one tie in 1922—in Fall Classics played entirely at the Polo Grounds.

The American Leaguers were welcome tenants as long as they remained less popular than the Giants. But with Babe Ruth's arrival in 1920 and the team's subsequent success, the dynamic quickly changed. After the Yankees started outdrawing the Giants in their own park in 1920 and 1921, the National Leaguers asked the Pinstripers to vacate to a new facility as soon as possible. The 1922 season marked their final season in Manhattan before their April 18, 1923, Yankee Stadium debut in the Bronx.

The Polo Grounds remained home to the Giants until they moved to San Francisco in 1958. It stood empty until 1962 when the Mets arrived to play two seasons there before moving into Shea Stadium. In 1964, the Polo Grounds was demolished. Apartment buildings called the Polo Grounds Towers occupy the site today.

# Monument Park

Since 1932, the New York Yankees have honored their all-time greats with the dedication of monuments and plaques in Yankee Stadium. The tradition continues in the current Stadium in Monument Park, located behind the outfield fence in centerfield.

The first monument was dedicated on May 30, 1932, to the memory of Miller Huggins, who died suddenly in 1929. The diminutive manager guided the Yankees to six American League pennants and three World Championships in his 11-plus seasons.

The first plaque was placed on the center-field wall in April 1940, a tribute to Jacob Ruppert, the former owner who built Yankee Stadium and brought the tradition of winning to the Yankees.

Two additional monuments followed: in 1941 for Lou Gehrig and in 1949 for Babe Ruth. Later plaques were placed in center field for General Manager Ed Barrow (1954) and two great Yankees center fielders, Joe DiMaggio and Mickey Mantle (1969). After his death, Mantle's plaque was removed and replaced

by a fourth monument on August 25, 1996. On April 25, 1999, DiMaggio—who passed away less than two months earlier—was honored with the Stadium's fifth monument. (The two plaques which previously honored DiMaggio and Mantle were donated by the Yankees to the Yogi Berra Museum and Learning Center in Montclair, N.J.).

Originally, the monuments and plaques were part of the playing field. The monuments and Stadium flagpole were located in straight-away center field on the warning track approximately 10 feet in front of the wall. Sometimes long hits and fly balls forced fielders to go behind the monuments to retrieve the baseball.

One tradition of Yankee Stadium before it was remodeled was to allow fans to exit through the center-field gates via the warning track, where they could pause and reflect on the achievements of these honored legends. After Yankee Stadium was remodeled in 1974 and 1975, the monuments and plaques were relocated to an area off the field between the Yankees' and visitors' bullpens.

In 1976, two more plaques were added to memorialize managers Joe McCarthy and Casey Stengel. In the 1980s, plaques were dedicated to Yankees greats Thurman

Munson (1980), Elston Howard and Roger Maris (1984), Phil Rizzuto (1985), Billy Martin (1986), Whitey Ford and Lefty Gomez (1987), Yogi Berra and Bill Dickey (1988), and Allie Reynolds (1989). The Yankee also dedicated two plaques to non-uniformed Yankees legends: the "Voice of the Yankees," Mel Allen (1998); and the "Voice of Yankee Stadium," public-address announcer Bob Sheppard (2000). Yankees greats Don Mattingly (1997), Reggie Jackson (2002), Ron Guidry (2003) and Red Ruffing (2004) are the most recent Bombers to be honored with plaques in Monument Park.

Plaques commemorating the visits of Pope Paul VI in 1965 and Pope John Paul II in 1979 were dedicated by the Knights of Columbus, and a plaque

commemorating the New York Yankees' interlocking "NY" insignia was added to the park in 2001. The most recent plaque was dedicated in 2008 following the visit of Pope Benedict XVI.

In 1985, after the left-center-field fence of the original Stadium was moved in, the Yankees were able to open Monument Park for up-close fan viewing.

By 1988, long lines and increased fan interest caused the Yankees to move the fence in further and expand the area. A special walkway was added with an exhibit honoring those Yankees who have had their uniform numbers retired.

In a pregame ceremony on Sept. 11, 2002, the Yankees dedicated a monument in remembrance of the victims and heroes of the 9/11 tragedy. It was the sixth monument dedicated in Yankee Stadium and the first to non-Yankees personnel.

During the 2010 season, a monument was erected in honor of Yankees Principal Owner George M. Steinbrenner, III, who passed away on July 13, 2010. During a special pregame ceremony on Sept. 20, 2010, the entire Yankees team joined the Steinbrenner family and Yankees alumni in unveiling the monument.

In all, there are seven monuments (for four Yankees players, one manager, one owner and one to commemorate the tragedy of 9/11) and 24 plaques (for 14 players, two managers, one owner, one executive, one PA announcer, one broadcaster, three Papal visit commemorations and one noting the history of the NY logo). **✎**







### Know the signs of a heart attack

**Chest discomfort**—Pain commonly occurs in the center of the chest and lasts more than a few minutes, or goes away and comes back. It can feel like an uncomfortable pressure, squeezing, fullness or pain.

**Discomfort in other areas of the upper body**—Symptoms can include pain or discomfort in one or both arms, the back, neck, jaw or stomach.

**Shortness of breath with or without chest discomfort.**

**Other signs**—Breaking out in a cold sweat, nausea or lightheadedness may also be signs of a heart attack.

**Gender matters**—As with men, women's most common heart attack symptom is chest pain or discomfort.

But women are somewhat more likely than men to experience some of the other common symptoms, particularly shortness of breath, nausea/vomiting, and back or jaw pain.

### Know the signs of a stroke

#### Act F.A.S.T.

**Face**—Ask the person to smile. Does one side of the face droop?

# Yankees Around the Globe

As the game of Baseball continues to grow on a global scale, "America's Pastime" has become infused with talent from all four corners of the world.

The New York Yankees, as one of the most recognized brands in the world, are dedicated to making meaningful and lasting footprints throughout the international Baseball community.

Just under 28 percent of players on Major League rosters on Opening Day 2010 were born outside the United States. For the Yankees, the total was 36.0 percent, with nine of the Yankees' 25 players on the team's Opening Day roster having been born in a foreign country. Among American League clubs, only the Rangers and Angels (10 each) had more foreign-born players on their Opening Day roster. The Yankees' 2010 Major League Opening Day roster was composed of players from six different nations outside the United States (Dominican Republic, South Korea, Mexico, Panama, Puerto Rico and Venezuela), tying for the second-most among all Major League clubs.

Signing and developing exceptional talent from around the globe has become a trademark of the Yankees organization. Some of the club's acquisitions include the American League's all-time saves leader and Panama native Mariano Rivera, five-time All-Star Jorge Posada of Puerto Rico, two-time All-Star Hideki Matsui from Japan, 2006 Cy Young Award runner-up Chien-Ming Wang from Taiwan and All-Star Robinson Cano of the Dominican Republic.

At the minor league level, the organization has signed two Chinese minor leaguers, two players from the Israel Baseball League, and procured top minor league talent from Australia, Brazil, Canada, Colombia, Mexico, Nicaragua and Taiwan. In addition, the Yankees field two Dominican Summer League teams and operate a state-of-the-art Latin Baseball Academy in the Dominican Republic.

## The Latin Béisbol Academy

For the vast majority of the Yankees' Latin American prospects, the Latin Béisbol Academy is the starting point for their professional careers.

Constructed in Boca Chica, Dominican Republic, the Yankees built their academy from scratch, allowing player development personnel to manage every detail of the project, from the trainer's room to the clubhouses to the classrooms. The end result is a four-building, four-field complex with the capacity to house up to 110 players. There is also a small apartment building for coaches and instructors. The academy, which officially opened in June 2005 and was completed in the spring of 2006, has a campus feel to it that is not lost on the ballplayers, many of whom are spending time away from their families for the first time.

Previously, the Yankees had leased a variety of facilities in Latin America for scouting and player development use, but it became apparent that it was necessary to find and develop their own facility.

"We've never had as many fields or batting cages," said Mark Newman, Yankees Senior Vice President of Baseball Operations, at the time the academy opened. "We've never had this level of control over player nutrition or this kind of strength and conditioning facility. All of these things enhance our player development efforts. Already, we've seen the physical, mental, emotional and fundamental maturation of players at a more rapid rate, and we should see it to a greater degree in the future."

As a dedicated investor in Latin American talent, the Yankees make every effort to enhance the instruction the players receive off the field. The complex is staffed with educators who teach American customs and provide one-on-one tutoring sessions. To further these goals, the Yankees created a partnership with Iberoamerican University (UNIBE) in Santo Domingo, a private institution that brings a group of 12 college professors to the academy. The professors teach everything from basic Spanish to three different levels of English, in addition to leading lectures on subjects such as conflict resolution and financial literacy.

The Yankees also arrange for past and present Major League stars, such as Mariano Rivera, Robinson Cano and Reggie Jackson, to be guest lecturers for the prospects. In November 2007, Yankees Manager Joe Girardi visited the Béisbol Academy and spoke to the coaching staff and 55 Latin players, including eight players from the 2006 and 2007 drafts. He also dined with the Yankees' senior Latin staff and watched a Dominican Instructional League game.

The players and staff are also active in local community events as well, hosting annual instructional clinics in the Dominican Republic, Nicaragua and Venezuela. In addition, the Yankees' Latin complex has hosted several R.B.I. (Reviving



Baseball in the Inner City) tournament games and joined the Yankees organization in the 2007 donation of \$65,000 in food and cash to hurricane damaged areas in the D.R. and Nicaragua. The Yankees have also adopted an orphanage in the Dominican town of La Romana, supplying it with food, money and clothing. In July 2010, Dominican Summer League players delivered gifts to ailing children at a local hospital in Santo Domingo. The Latin Beisbol Academy also played host to a fundraiser game against the Dominican National Police Department to raise money for local charities throughout the D.R.

The Yankees field two Dominican Summer League teams and have reached the playoffs in four of the last six years (2005-'07, '09), taking home back-to-back

titles in 2005 and 2006. With the hard work and dedication of the Yankees Player Development staff, the organization looks forward to the future, when these young players can be a part of a World Championship in the Bronx.

## Partners in Japan

During the 2002 season, the Yankees entered into a working agreement with the Yomiuri Giants, winners of 21 Japan Series Championships. Pursuant to the agreement, the teams consented to share baseball information, ideas and strategies. Also in 2002, the Yankees pursued and signed three-time Central League MVP Hideki Matsui. A nine-time Japanese League All-Star and three-time home run champion, Matsui became the first bonafide power hitter to make the transition from Japan to the Major Leagues.

In 2004, the Yankees traveled to Tokyo to open the regular season against the Tampa Bay Devil Rays. The historic trip marked the 70th anniversary of Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig's 1934 All-Star tour of Japan. It also recognized the anniversary of the founding of the Yomiuri Giants franchise, Japan's oldest professional baseball team. The two-game series was just the second-ever Major League season opener to take place in Japan. At the time, the two games were the highest-rated televised Major League games in Japan's history.

## Yankees Teach in Taiwan

In January 2009, the Yankees joined the Chinese Taipei Baseball Association under the auspices of Major League Baseball in holding a clinic for high school pitchers, catchers and coaches at the National Taiwan Sport University's Taoyuan Campus in Taipei, Taiwan. It marked the Yankees' first-ever large-scale outreach in Taiwan and represented the club's initiative in cultivating baseball talent and increasing brand recognition in Asia and the greater international community. The five-day clinic focused on pitching and catching fundamentals and philosophy.

## Yankees and Chinese Baseball Association Reach Memorandum of Understanding

The New York Yankees and the Chinese Baseball Association (CBA) held a press conference in Beijing, China, on January 29, 2007, to announce a Memorandum of Understanding that for the first time formalized a strategic alliance between a Major League Baseball club and the Chinese Baseball Association. During the Yankees' 2009 World Series trophy tour, club officials met with the CBA in Beijing to further the cooperation agreement between the two entities.

The agreement, subject to Major League Baseball's rules, regulations and agreements pertaining to the People's Republic of

China, states that the Yankees will provide the CBA with guidance in training baseball players, including sending coaches, player development staff, scouting and training personnel to China to assist the CBA. The partnership also allows the CBA to send staff to the Yankees' facilities in the United States in furtherance of those goals.

During their 2007 trip, the Yankees were represented in Beijing by team President Randy Levine, Senior Vice President and General Manager Brian Cashman, Vice President and Assistant General Manager Jean Afterman, and Vice President of Corporate Sales and Sponsorship Michael Tusiani. Beijing Womei Advertising Company Limited and SportsCorp China, headed by President and Managing Director Marc Ganis and Managing Director Kenneth Huang, coordinated the meetings and were instrumental in the Yankees' involvement in China.

"This agreement marks another milestone in Baseball's international evolution," Levine said. "We are excited to begin working alongside our friends in the Chinese Baseball Association, and they will receive our full support throughout this exciting process. The Yankees brand is

recognized around the world, and this unprecedented opportunity allows us to further integrate the Yankees name and our proud history of success into Baseball's global landscape."

"It is a great honor to be a part of this unique and exciting opportunity," Cashman said. "Throughout China's history it's easy to see their passion for sports and their determination to excel in all athletic fields. With that belief in excellence, we are proud to begin work with the Chinese Baseball Association, and we will provide all of our available tools and resources to help develop and cultivate their baseball program from the ground up."

The CBA was represented by Chairman Hu Jianguo, Secretary General Shen Wei and Deputy Secretary General Tian Yuan.

On June 16, 2007, the Yankees announced the signings of C Zhenwang Zhang and LHP Kai Liu to minor league contracts, marking the first-ever acquisition by a Major League organization of Chinese baseball players. Both players were members of the Chinese National team that competed in the 2008 Olympics in Beijing.

## Yankees Championship Trophy Tour of the Dominican Republic, Japan and China

Following their 2009 championship season, the Yankees embarked on a world tour with their 2009 World Series Trophy, traveling to the Dominican Republic and Asia.

Led by Chief International Officer and Executive Vice President Felix M. Lopez, Jr., a Yankees contingent took the championship trophy to the Dominican Republic for a three-day tour from Jan. 7-9, 2010. On the first night, the Yankees and the trophy went to the National Palace for a ceremony with Dominican Republic President Dr. Leonel Fernández. Lopez was joined by bench coach Tony Pena, and players Robinson Cano, Damaso Marte, Francisco Cervelli and Edwar Ramirez as well as by several Yankees minor leaguers. The next day, the Yankees visited the U.S. Embassy and the National Police Headquarters. That evening prior to the Dominican Winter League playoff game between the Licey Tigers and Escogido Lions at Quisqueya Stadium in Santo Domingo, Lopez threw out the ceremonial first pitch, and the Yankees displayed the trophy for fans in attendance. In their final day in the D.R., the Yankees placed the trophy on display for residents of the town of Casa de Campo. In the evening, Lopez tossed the ceremonial first pitch at a game between La Romano and Escogido, and the Yankees again displayed the trophy for fans.

Three weeks later, a Yankees delegation including Team President Randy Levine, Senior Vice President and General Manager Brian Cashman, Vice President and Assistant General Manager Jean Afterman and Senior Vice President of Corporate Sales and Sponsorships Michael Tusiani, took the trophy on a six-day tour to Tokyo, Beijing and Hong Kong from Jan. 31 through Feb. 5, 2010.

The contingent was met by fans and media at Tokyo's Narita Airport, marking this first-ever occasion of a Yankees World Series trophy being brought to Asia. The next day, another historic moment took place at the MLB Café in Tokyo as the trophy was displayed alongside the Yomiuri Giants' 2009 Japan Series championship trophy in the first-ever instance of the two titles being side-by-side. Following a press event, the trophies then remained on display throughout the evening.



Hong Kong marked the final stop on the Asian tour, with a Feb. 5, 2010, event at the Hyatt Regency hotel adjacent to the recently-opened K11 Mall. The next morning, the trophy was introduced to players and fans during the opening ceremony for Phoenix Cup 2010, Hong Kong's International Women's Baseball Tournament.

The Yankees thank their partner Delta Air Lines for ensuring the safe transportation of the World Series trophy and appreciate the efforts of SportsCorp China, led by president Marc Ganis.

From there, the trophy traveled to China, where fans in Beijing and Hong Kong had their first opportunity to gaze at Major League Baseball's grandest prize. The trophy tour in China was organized by QSL Sports, which has been active in the promotion of Baseball in the People's Republic of China (PRC) and operates the China Youth Baseball League together with the Chinese Baseball Association. The events in China were hosted by QSL Sports, New World Department Stores (one of the largest owners and operators of department stores in China), and K11, the "World's First Art Mall," which integrates elements of art, culture and nature, while elevating the shopping experience.

On Feb. 3, 2010, Yankees officials met with the CBA in Beijing to further the cooperation agreement between the two entities, after which the groups held a joint press conference at the Kunlun Hotel. Later that evening, the championship trophy made its first public appearance in


### **Yankee Stadium Earns Top Honors**

**ADMISSION TO STADIUM/CREDENTIAL PICK-UP:** All media must enter Yankee Stadium via the Press Gate, adjacent to Gate 4. The Press Gate opens five hours prior to game time. BBWAA cards, MLB-issued passes or credentials issued by the New York Yankees are necessary for admittance. NO OTHER CREDENTIAL WILL BE HONORED. All bags are subject to search upon entry. Photo ID will be required.

**ADMISSION TO FIELD AND DUGOUTS:** On game days, the field and dugouts can be accessed from the Service Level (000) via the Field Access Tunnel (located on the outfield side of the Visitors Clubhouse) or through either team's clubhouse when open to the media during regular clubhouse hours. Take the press elevator or stairs from the Press Gate or Main Press Box down to the Service Level and follow the interior concourse to the right for the Yankees Clubhouse or to the left for the Field Access Tunnel and Visitors Clubhouse. Please note that the field is closed to media at the conclusion of the visiting team's batting practice.

**CLUBHOUSES:** The Yankees Clubhouse is open to those with BBWAA cards, MLB-issued passes or applicable credentials issued by the New York Yankees. NO OTHER CREDENTIAL WILL BE HONORED. The Clubhouse is open from three and a half hours prior to the game until one hour before game time. At times, certain additional restrictions may be imposed. Private corridors inside the clubhouse, including the trainer's room, player's lounge, weight room, etc. are CLOSED TO MEDIA AT ALL TIMES. Visiting clubhouse is governed by the visiting club.



# Yankees Broadcasters



## Michael Kay

Now in his 10th season as the play-by-play announcer for the YES Network and WWOR-TV, Michael Kay immerses himself in all things New York in order to provide his listeners and viewers with original opinions and the most exclusive, up-to-the-minute Yankees information. Additionally, Kay is the host of YES' CenterStage series, hosts his own radio talk show on ESPN 1050 AM in New York and is a frequent contributor to ESPN's Emmy Award-winning *Sports Reporters*. In 2008, he handled play-by-play duties for ESPN Radio Network's coverage of the AL Division Series.

A 21-time Emmy Award nominee and three-time Emmy winner, Kay signed a multi-year extension with the YES Network in 2008 to remain as the club's lead play-by-play voice as well as host on a variety of YES Network programs.

Before joining the YES Network, Kay worked at the MSG Network from 1989-2001 as a Yankees reporter. In 1992, he added the assignment of Knicks locker room reporter to his responsibilities and continued in that role through the 1998-99 season.

In addition to his television work, Kay also worked as a Yankees analyst on WABC Radio from 1992-2002. Kay was a winner with Bob Goldscholl (WBRR) for "Best Sports Reporter" at the 2000 New York Metro Achievement in Radio Awards. After the Yankees' World Series victories in 1996, 1998, 2000 and 2009, Kay and John Sterling were asked by New York City's Mayor to host the post-parade victory celebration at City Hall.

In 1998, Kay also began co-hosting *Sports Talk with John Sterling and Michael Kay*, an MSG-produced nightly sports radio call-in show which aired on WABC Radio during the winter months. During the baseball season, Kay and Sterling hosted *Yankee Talk* which aired 90 minutes prior to all weekend Yankees games.

Shortly after graduating from Fordham University in 1982 with a B.A. in Communications, the Bronx, N.Y., native became one of the hot sports reporters in New York City with a style that combined great reporting skills with quality writing. While at Fordham, he honed his skills working for the school newspaper and radio station, working at Sports Phone and as the public address announcer for the New York Pro Summer Basketball League. In 1982, Kay landed a job as a general assignment writer for the *New York Post*. Two years later he began covering college basketball (1984-85) and then the New Jersey Nets, whom he covered for two seasons before becoming the newspaper's general basketball writer. In 1987, he moved to baseball where he served as his paper's Yankees beat reporter. While he was in that position, he got his first television job with MSG Network as host of the "Hot Stove League" segment of MSG's Sports Night. Kay moved from the *Post* to the *New York Daily News* in 1989, where he covered the Yankees until 1992, when he made the jump to radio. With the move, he became the first newspaper reporter in any sport to make the jump into the broadcast booth full-time, performing both play-by-play and analysis.

Kay was given the Dick Young Award for Excellence in Sports Media by the New York Pro Baseball Scouts in 1995. He was also a part of the Yankees/MSG Production team that was nominated for New York Emmy Awards for six consecutive years. In 1998, he was on the MSG team that won for "Outstanding Live Sports Coverage-Series". In 1996 and '97, he was a member of the MSG team that won New York Emmys for "Outstanding Live Sports Coverage-Single Program" for Dwight Gooden's no-hitter and "The Battle for New York: Yankees vs. Mets".

Kay resides in Hartsdale, N.Y., and is active with the Alzheimer's Association in memory of his mother, Rose, who passed away from the disease in 2006. For the past three years, Kay has joined Joe Girardi for the "Remember When, Remember Now" banquet at the Grand Central Oyster Bar to benefit Girardi's Catch 25 Foundation and Alzheimer's research. He and his wife, Jodi, were married in February.



## Ken Singleton

Former Major Leaguer Ken Singleton enters his 10th season as a game analyst and announcer for YES Network broadcasts of the New York Yankees. Known on the diamond as a consistent power hitter, Singleton has proven to be equally as reliable since joining the radio and television broadcast booths.

Prior to joining YES, Singleton divided his time calling play-by-play and providing commentary at the MSG Network. In 1998, he was part of MSG's production team that won four New York Emmys for its Yankees coverage.

Singleton joined the MSG Network in 1997 from The Sports Network (TSN), where he served as analyst for the Montreal Expos from 1985-96. From 1991-96, he also called play-by-play and served as analyst for CIQ Radio, the Expos' flagship radio network. In 1996 and '97, he was named by FOX Sports as a lead analyst for Saturday afternoon baseball broadcasts. In 1997 and '98, he worked as an analyst for Major League Baseball International.

Singleton enjoyed a 15-year Major League career with the New York Mets, Montreal Expos and Baltimore Orioles, batting .282 with 317 doubles and 246HR. He is one of only 10 players in Baseball history to hit 35 or more home runs in a season as a switch-hitter. He also ranks among the all-time leaders in most Baltimore offensive categories, including homers, RBI and total bases. During his career, Singleton was named to the American League All-Star team in 1977, '79, and '81. He was named Most Valuable Oriole in 1975, '77, and '79 and was a member of the Orioles' 1983 World Championship team. In 1982, he was the recipient of Major League Baseball's Roberto Clemente Award, honoring him for his contributions both on and off the field.

A native New Yorker, Singleton played both baseball and basketball in high school, and also played baseball in the Bronx Federation League at Macombs Dam Park on the current site of Yankee Stadium. After getting a basketball scholarship to Hofstra University and playing baseball as well for one year, Singleton was drafted by the Mets in 1967.


He enjoys golf and reading historical novels and lives with his wife Suzanne in Sparks, Md. He also has three sons and a daughter.



# Yankees Broadcasters



## Jack Curry

Jack Curry joined the YES Network in 2010 as studio analyst, reporter and program contributor, following a 20-year career covering the Yankees for the *New York Times*. In addition, he contributes as a columnist on YESNetwork.com

During his career with the *Times*, Curry authored more than 4,500 articles, covering 18 World Series, 11 All-Star Games and two World Baseball Classics. The New Jersey native also was nominated for a Pulitzer Prize in 1999, and won multiple *Times* Publisher Awards.

Curry's television experience extends back to 1991, when he began contributing to Madison Square Garden Network's Yankees pre-game show and weekly baseball magazine show. He also co-wrote a book with Derek Jeter entitled *Life You Imagine: Life Lessons for Achieving Your Dreams*, which was a *New York Times* best-seller.

A 1986 graduate of Fordham University, Curry resides with his wife, Pamela, in New Jersey.



## John Flaherty

Former Yankees catcher John Flaherty enters his sixth season as a field reporter, studio analyst and game analyst for YES Network telecasts in 2011.

Drafted by Boston in 1988, Flaherty progressed through the Red Sox farm system before joining their Major League squad in 1992. He played 14 seasons in the Majors with Boston (1992-93), Detroit (1994-96), San Diego (1996-97), Tampa Bay (1998-2002) and the Yankees (2003-05), compiling a .252 average with 80HR in 1,047 games.

Flaherty brought his knowledge of the game and his veteran style of leadership to the Yankees clubhouse when he signed as a free agent in 2003. He played in 134 games with the Yankees across three seasons, and will be long remembered for his dramatic pinch-hit, "walk-off" single that defeated the Boston Red Sox in the 13th

inning of a 5-4 victory on June 1, 2004, in the contest that featured Derek Jeter's famous dive in the third base stands.

Flaherty is a New York City native and a graduate of George Washington University. On May 15, 2009, he was awarded an honorary Doctorate of Humane Letters from St. Thomas Aquinas College in Sparkill, N.Y.



## Kimberly Jones

Kimberly Jones returns for her seventh season as a Yankees pregame and postgame clubhouse reporter. She is also a contributor to YES Network's *This Week in Football* and *Yankees Hot Stove* shows, as well as occasionally hosting talk shows on WFAN-AM 660 in New York.

Jones previously spent four-and-a-half years at the *Star-Ledger* (Newark, N.J.), where she covered the New York Giants for three seasons and was the NFL columnist for one. For the 2005 NFL season, she continued to contribute as the *Star-Ledger's* Sunday NFL notes columnist and also appeared as an NFL contributor on *Out of Bounds* on CN8, The Comcast Network.

Prior to moving to New Jersey, Jones worked at the *Central Daily Times* (State College, Pa.), where she was the beat writer for Penn State football and men's basketball.

A native of Dallastown, Pa., Jones graduated from Penn State with a B.A. in Journalism and an M.S. in Exercise and Sport Science. Following graduation, she completed an internship in the communications department of the Big Ten Conference in suburban Chicago.



## Al Leiter

Entering his sixth year with the YES Network, former Yankees pitcher Al Leiter serves as color commentator, providing viewers with insight gained from his 19 years as a player in the Major Leagues. Prior to signing with YES, Leiter had worked as a postseason game analyst for FOX Sports and ESPN.

Originally drafted by the Yankees in 1984, Leiter played parts of 19 professional seasons with the Yankees (1987-89, 2005), Toronto Blue Jays (1989-95), Florida Marlins (1996-97, 2005) and New York Mets (1998-2004). A two-time All-Star (1996, 2000), he was a part of two world championship teams (Toronto in 1993 and Florida in 1997) and became the first pitcher in history to record a victory against all 30 Major League teams. On May 11, 1996, Leiter tossed the first no-hitter in Marlins history in an 11-0 win vs. Colorado.

A native of Bayville, N.J., Leiter has been nearly as busy off the field as he was on it. Since 1996, he has donated more than \$1.5 million to various charities in the New York area and South Florida. In 2000, he was honored by Major League Baseball with the Roberto Clemente Award for his contributions to the community and in 2002, he was appointed to the board of directors of the Twin Towers Fund in New York City. He was named the March of Dimes "Sportsman of the Year" in 2003 and the John V. Mara "Sportsman of the Year" in 2004 by the Catholic Youth Organization. With his wife, Lori, he created "Leiter's Landing," a charitable organization committed to the betterment of youth through education, health care and social and community service. Leiter has also been the recipient of numerous other awards and honors as a result of his charity work, including the 2008 "Breakthrough Spirit Award" at the Children's Cancer and Blood Foundation gala in New York City.



## Paul O'Neill

Paul O'Neill returns for his 10th consecutive season in broadcast television in 2011, serving as a game analyst for the YES Network.

The five-time All-Star outfielder played 17 years in the Majors, spending his final nine seasons in pinstripes. He appeared in six World Series, winning five titles, including four with the Yankees (1996, '98-2000).

Affectionately known as a "warrior" to most Yankees followers, O'Neill began his Major League career in 1985 with the Cincinnati Reds and earned the first of his five World Series championships in 1990. He joined the Yankees in 1993 after eight seasons with the Reds, and in 1994 claimed the American League batting title with a .359 average.

From July 1995 to May 1997, he played in 235 consecutive games in right field without making an error. In 2001, at the age of 38, O'Neill became the oldest player in Major League history to steal 20 bases and hit 20 home runs in the same season.

He lives in his native Cincinnati with his wife, Nevalée, and their three children: Andrew, Aaron and Alexandra. He was named the "Father of the Year" in June 2008 by the National Father's Day Council at its 67th Annual Father of the Year dinner in New York.

# Yankees Broadcasters



## John Sterling

"Yankees win! Theeeeeeee Yankees win!"

If anything has become synonymous with the Yankees' run of success over recent years, it is John Sterling's memorable conclusion to so many Yankees victories. As the radio voice to 162 games a year, plus preseason and postseason, he has called 3,647 games (3,495 regular season/152 postseason) over the last 22 seasons, without missing even one, making him one of the most recognized—and imitated voices—in all of New York sports.

Sterling joined the Yankees broadcast team in 1989 from Atlanta's TBS and WSB Radio, where he called Hawks basketball (1981-89) and Braves games (1982-87). It marked a return to the town where he first achieved fame, hosting a talk show on WMCA from 1971-78, and calling the Nets (1975-80, and as a fill-in, in 1997) and Islanders (1975-78) for WMCA, WJVN, WWOR-TV and SportsChannel.

Sterling also previously broadcasted Morgan State Football (eight years) and Washington Bullets basketball in 1981. In addition to his seven years at WMCA and a year at WSB in Atlanta, he has also hosted talk shows on WFAN and WABC in New York. He has not missed a broadcast since the fall of 1981.

As the host of the YES Network's acclaimed *Yankeeography* series, Sterling has won a total of nine Emmy Awards since 2003. He has also been honored by the New Jersey Sportswriters Association with its Radio-TV Excellence Award (1999), and was the winner of the 2001 Whitney Radio Jimmy Cannon Award. In addition, his call of a Jason Giambi home run on WCBS radio in 2002 was voted the "Best Baseball Call" of the year in a poll conducted by MLB.com. In 2002, Sterling was also honored by the NY Air Awards for being a part of the best play-by-play team on radio.

When he's not in the booth, Sterling serves as a master of on-field ceremonies for major Yankees events, and is well known for his emcee work at City Hall (with his former radio partner Michael Kay) at "Key to the City" ceremonies following Yankees World Series victories.

Sterling enjoys attending Broadway shows and boasts an extensive knowledge of the lyrics to many American pop standards. In 2007, he embarked on his own Broadway venture in a cabaret show titled "Baseball and Broadway" in which he both served as emcee and sang alongside Broadway talent.

For the past 18 years, he has been a spokesman for the Leukemia Society of America. He enjoys reading, movies and swimming. He lives in Bergen County, N.J., and is the proud father of four children: daughter Abigail and triplets, Veronica, Bradford and Derek.



## Suzyn Waldman

Award-winning journalist Suzyn Waldman begins her 25th season either covering or broadcasting the New York Yankees. She joined John Sterling in the radio booth in 2005 as the Yankees' color commentator on WCBS-AM radio, becoming the first woman to hold a full-time position as a Major League broadcaster.

Waldman has spent more than two decades overcoming all the obstacles that go along with being a female sports broadcaster and has risen to the top of her profession. In 2006, she became a permanent part of the "Women in Baseball" exhibit at the Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, and in 2009, her World Series Game 6 scorecard was added to the Hall of Fame's collection, commemorating her being the first female broadcaster to call game action in the World Series.

In 1987, Waldman became the first female voice heard on WFAN-AM in New York, the first all-sports radio station in the country. She was a mainstay on that station for almost 15 years, creating the job of the radio beat reporter, covering both the New York Yankees and New York Knicks. Her news-breaking reports, exclusive interviews and always original and controversial opinions won her countless journalism awards. Her accolades include the "International Radio Award" for her live and emotional reporting from the upper deck of Candlestick Park during the 1989 San Francisco earthquake, the 1996 "NY Sportscaster of the Year" Award from the National Sportscasters & Sportswriters and the 1999 "Star Award" for radio from the American Women in Radio and TV. Waldman became a popular talk show host at WFAN and co-hosted the coveted midday slot until leaving WFAN in 2002 to join the YES Network.

The word "first" invariably precedes the name of Suzyn Waldman in every facet of her television and radio career. The first woman to work on a nationally-televised baseball broadcast, Waldman added another first, being the first woman to provide play-by-play for a Major League team, when she started broadcasting New York Yankees games for WPIX, MSG Network and WNYW/FOX5 in the mid 1990s. The first woman ever to host an NBA pre-and post-game show, Suzyn worked in that capacity for the New York Knicks on WFAN, provided play-by-play for the WNBA on Lifetime TV and was an analyst on St. John's basketball games for MSG and WFAN.

She has been honored by countless organizations, including the Thurman Munson Foundation, the March of Dimes, B'nai B'rith, the Jimmy Fund of Boston and the US Federal Women's Program. In 2006, she received the first Women's Global Health Award from the Albert Einstein College of Medicine at the United Nations. She is a tireless motivational speaker at schools and cancer centers around the country, encouraging young women to pursue their dreams despite any pitfalls they may encounter.

Waldman's life and accomplishments have been the subject of hundreds of magazine and newspaper articles, and chapters in children's and motivational books. She has been profiled on the *Today Show*, *CBS Evening News* with *Dan Rather*, ABC's *20/20* and NBC's *Dateline*.

A native Bostonian with a degree in Economics from Boston's prestigious Simmons College, Suzyn spent 15 years on the Broadway Musical Stage and performed in countless night clubs around the world. She is proudest of her two years starring opposite Richard Kiley in *Man of La Mancha*. She lives in Westchester with her German Shepherds, Gatsby and A.J.



## Carlos Silva

Carlos Silva, a native of Caracas, Venezuela, enters his sixth season producing and engineering Yankees games for WCBS Radio 880 AM (Spanish and English). The 2011 season will mark his 11th year working on Yankees radio broadcasts and his 22nd overall season in baseball. Silva has also worked for ESPN Radio, Phillies Spanish radio as well the NBA's Orlando Magic and New Jersey Nets. He is also responsible for the translations and recording of Spanish broadcast spots throughout the season.

In the offseason, he resides in Tampa, Fla., with his wife, Teresa, and his children Leslie, Kimberly and Matthew.

## Beto Villa

Beto provides Spanish listeners with thorough and thoughtful Yankees coverage. He treasures his pages and pages of statistics of Latin American ballplayers, which he uses during his radiocasts. After beginning his career in 1981, he has had the opportunity to broadcast both the Major League World Series and the Caribbean World Series. He is currently a Senior Editor of [Latinobaseball.com](http://Latinobaseball.com), a Web site covering Latin American players in the Majors and Winter Leagues. Beto has a daughter, Margarita.



## Francisco Rivera

Since 1995, Francisco Rivera has been involved in baseball as a color commentator and play-by-play announcer, including six years in the Yankees' broadcast booth. A native of Morovis, Puerto Rico, he covered the Philadelphia Phillies for "Radio Tropical" from 1995 to 1998 and worked the American League Championship Series in 2003 and 2004 for ESPN. Rivera received his Bachelors Degree in Spanish Literature from Rutgers University and graduated from the Cambridge University-affiliated Miguel Angel Torres School of Communications in Manhattan in 1978. He was one of the pioneers of the talk show *WADO Deportivo* where he worked until 2003, and began his communications career covering NBA basketball for WADO.



## Felix DeJesus

Felix DeJesus, a native New Yorker, enters his sixth season as a back-up commentator for the New York Yankees. He also serves as a Yankees correspondent for WCBS, writes for *Listin Diario* and is one of the co-hosts of *El Mundo de Las Grandes Ligas*, an internet show on MLB Radio.

DeJesus has been involved with the Hispanic market since 1993 when he became the color commentator for the NHL's Florida Panthers. He has worked in all areas of broadcasting, television, radio and the Internet. From 1998 to 2004, he covered Major League Baseball on television for XTRA Innings in New York. He covered the Caribbean World Series in 2002 for New York's Radio Unica 1660 AM and served as one of the play-by-play voices for the international broadcast of the 2007 Caribbean Series. He has also worked for FOX Sports, ESPN International and CNN. In 1999, he became the first announcer to broadcast in SAP for NBC News. DeJesus has also served the last five years as the Spanish language translator for Showtime Championship Boxing.

DeJesus graduated from Fordham University in 1988 with a degree in Economics and currently resides in the tri-state area. He and his wife, Melissa, have three children, Christopher, Brendan and Giselle.

# George M. Steinbrenner Field

This year marks the 16th season the Yankees will play their spring training games at George M. Steinbrenner Field in Tampa, Fla. The complex has also served as the home of the Single-A Tampa Yankees of the Florida State League since it opened in 1996. The field's dimensions are an exact replica of Yankee Stadium in the Bronx, measuring 318 feet down the left line, 408 feet to center field and 314 feet down the right field line. In 2008, the addition of the *Tampa Tribune Deck* in right field expanded the Stadium's capacity to 11,076, making it the largest spring training facility in the Grapefruit League.

Fans will also notice another link to the Bronx with replicas of the Yankees' retired numbers placards from Yankee Stadium greeting them as they enter the complex.

Originally opened in 1996 as Legends Field, the complex was renamed in honor of the late Yankees' Principal Owner and Chairman prior to the Yankees' March 27, 2008, spring training game against the Pittsburgh Pirates. On February 14, 2008, Hal and Hank Steinbrenner announced that the New York Yankees would rename the facility George M. Steinbrenner Field. The name change followed two unanimous resolutions recommending and supporting the change from the Hillsborough County Commission and the Tampa City Council.

"I am humbled and flattered to have this outstanding and totally unexpected honor conferred on me,"

said George M. Steinbrenner at the time the resolution was passed. "I extend my thanks to the Tampa City Council and to the Hillsborough County Commissioners for passing resolutions suggesting and recommending the change. I also thank my family for supporting the renaming of the stadium and for everything they have done for so many years that helped bring about this great day"

The resolution passed by the Tampa City Council on February 7, 2008, cited Mr. Steinbrenner's many charitable donations on behalf of youth activities, hospitals and the arts. The resolution passed by the Board of the Hillsborough County Commissioners on February 6, 2008, recognized Mr. Steinbrenner's numerous extraordinary contributions to the area.
