Managerial Experience: 10th season as Jackals manager (13th overall)

Joe Calfapietra, the longest-tenured manager in the Can-Am League, returns to the Jackals' dugout for his 10th season as the team's field manager in 2011. It will mark his 13th year as a professional manager.

In 2011, Calfapietra guided the Jackals to a 57-36 regular-season record — the team's most wins since 2002 — and a trip to the Can-Am League Championship Series. Under Calfapietra, the Jackals have reached the postseason in each of the past three seasons.

Calfapietra earned his 500th career managerial victory in dramatic fashion on August 26, 2010 when New Jersey defeated Quebec 1-0 on a Carlos Sosa walk-off double in the bottom of the ninth inning, which preserved an Isaac Pavlik complete-game shutout.

In 2009, Calfapietra was named the Can-Am League Manager of the Year after guiding the Jackals to the league's first-half title and a playoff appearance. He also garnered Manager of the Year honors in 2004 when he led the Jackals to a Northeast League championship.

Calfapietra was named Jackals skipper prior to the 2003 season and earned his second Manager of the Year award in 2004 when he led New Jersey past the North Shore Spirit for the Northeast League title.

A three-time league Manager of the Year, Calfapietra has developed a reputation for helping players move from independent to affiliated baseball. Three players he has signed and managed with the Jackals — Craig Breslow, Raul Valdes, and John Lindsey — have reached the major leagues. Since 2006, the Jackals have sold a league-best 25 players to affiliated organizations.

Calfapietra, 42, began his coaching career with the Northern League's Duluth-Superior Dukes in 1994 before spending the 1995 and 1996 seasons with the Aberdeen Pheasants of the Prairie League. In 1997, Calfapietra joined manager Ed Ott's coaching staff with the Allentown Ambassadors as Director of Baseball Operations. Calfapietra was named the Ambassadors manager in 2000 at the age of 29, making him the youngest manager in Northern League history.

After posting an 85-90 managerial record in two seasons with the Ambassadors, Calfapietra left Allentown after five years to guide the expansion Gary SouthShore RailCats in their inaugural season in 2002. Calfapietra led Gary, which played its entire schedule on the road while waiting for its ballpark to be constructed, to a 35-55 team record and was named the Northern League Manager of the Year.

The Royersford, Pa., native played at Eastern College in Saint Davids, Pa., where he was a two-time Division III All-American selection at first base. When he was not drafted out of college, Calfapietra turned to coaching and earned his Master's Degree in Education. He has spent time in the NCAA ranks as an assistant coach at Eastern College, a volunteer assistant at St. Joseph's University, and as the hitting coach and recruiting coordinator at Villanova University.

2011 JACKALS FACTS AND FIGURES

» The Jackals (57-36) returned to the postseason for the third straight year and made easy work of the Pittsfield Colonials in the first round, notching a three-game sweep to snap a string of eight consecutive playoff losses dating back to 2007. The Jackals outscored the Colonials 21-4 in the series, which was played entirely at Yogi Berra Stadium. New Jersey then fell to the Quebec Capitales, 3-1, in the best-of-five Can-Am League Championship Series.

» Two Jackals were voted to the Can-Am League Postseason All-Star Team – southpaw Isaac Pavlik and catcher Myron Leslie. Pavlik, who won his first eight decisions, was named the league's all-star left-handed pitcher after winning 13 games to top his previous career high of eight. The Rutherford native led the league in strikeouts, innings pitched, and games started while ranking second in wins and complete games and third in ERA. In his first season behind the plate, Leslie batted a career-high .328 to finish sixth in the league, besting his previous career high by 40 points while hitting nine homers, driving in 51 runs, swiping a career-best 14 bases, and leading the league in walks.

» A trio of Jackals' left-handed hurlers helped New Jersey sweep Can-Am League Pitcher of the Month honors in 2011. Pavlik took home June honors, going 5-0 with a 1.66 ERA with three complete games. James Leverton followed, finishing July 4-2 with a 1.90 ERA. A.J. Wideman, who was sidelined by a groin injury for much of the first half, went 6-0 with a 1.15 ERA in August as he closed out the season winning his final seven starts.

» The Jackals sold the contracts of three players to major league organizations over an eight-day span from July 25 through August 2: outfielder Leonard Davis, Leverton, and second baseman Argenis Reyes.

» The Jackals powered into the playoffs behind the strength of a 10-game winning streak heading into their final series of the regular season, winning 30 second-half games for just the second time in the franchise's 14-year history



The 2011 Jackals finished 57-36, marking the second-highest win total in franchise history.

JACKALS FRANCHISE TIMELINE

1997

Floyd Hall Enterprises is granted a franchise in the Northeast League.

1998

"Jackals" is selected as nickname of new Northeast League team owned by FHE.

May 30, 1998

The Jackals play their first games as New Jersey sweeps a double-header in Waterbury, beating the Spirit 4-1 and 8-1.

June 5, 1998

The Jackals christen the just-build Yogi Berra Stadium and defeat the Albany-Colonie Diamond Dogs, 2-1, in 13 innings. Outfielder Gary Gollum hits a game-winning home run for the dramatic conclusion.

July 9, 1998

The Jackals clinch the first-half championship in the south division of the Northeast League with a 4-3 win over Waterbury. New Jersey finishes the first half with a 30-12 record and a guaranteed spot in the playoffs.

July 18, 1998

Shortstop Saul Bustos erupts for a Northeast League record three home runs in a 15-5 win over the Adirondack Lumberjacks in Glens Falls, NY.

August 5, 1998

The Jackals gain national notoriety by signing Pete Rose Jr., the son of baseball's all-time hit king. "Junior" bats .424 in the final 12 games of the season.

July-August 1998

Right-hander Kevin Pincavitch allows one earned run in his final 58 innings pitched of the season.

September 2, 1998

Right-hander John DeSilva is named Northeast League Pitcher-of-the-Year.

September 3, 1998

The Jackals play their first-ever postseason game, defeating Allentown, 11-3, at Yogi Berra Stadium. The Jackals will go on to sweep the Ambassadors in the first round of the playoffs.

September 5, 1998

The Jackals rally for six runs in the bottom of the ninth inning to defeat the Albany-Colonie Diamond Dogs, 7-6, in game one of the Northeast League Finals at Yogi Berra Stadium. One day later, New Jersey completes the sweep and wins the Northeast League championship, downing Albany, 4-3.

Winter 1998/99

The Northeast League merges with the Northern League. The Jackals will now play in the Northern League East.

June 18, 1999

Former major league second baseman Mark Lemke makes his professional pitching debut for the Jackals, allowing one run in one inning of relief. Lemke will knuckleball his way to a 5-1 record and 6.68 ERA during the 1999 season.

July 16, 1999

Carmine Cappuccio begins what will turn out to be a 39-game hitting streak, the longest in Northern League history. He will bat .414 with 10 home runs and 51 RBIs during those 39 games.

September 5, 1999

For the second straight season, the Jackals sweep the Allentown Ambassadors in the first round of the playoffs.

September 12, 1999

The Albany-Colonie Diamond Dogs defeat the Jackals, 6-2, in game four of their playoff series and eliminate New Jersey from the second round of the playoffs, three games to one.

October 1999

Outfielder Carmine Cappuccio is selected as the Northern League East Player of the Year and as Baseball America's Independent Player of the Year. He batted .349 with 17 home runs and 75 RBIs for the season.

June 7, 2000

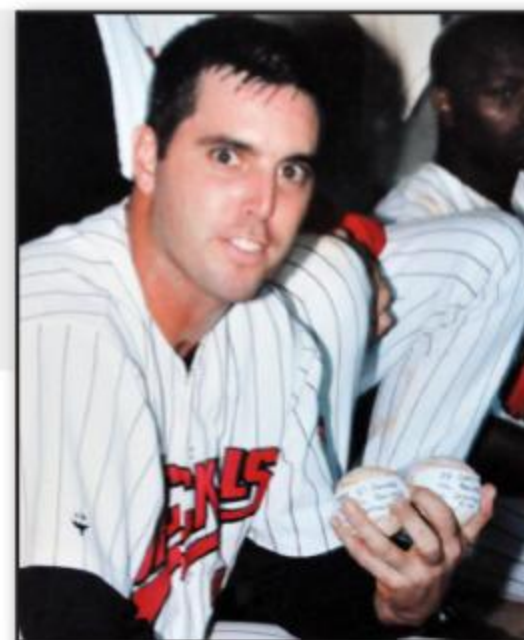
For the first time in franchise history, the Jackals are swept in a doubleheader, dropping 6-3 and 2-1 decisions at home to the Adirondack Lumberjacks. Incredibly, it also marks the first time in franchise history that the Jackals have a sub-.500 record during the regular season (5-7). New Jersey will finish the season 31-53 and will miss the playoffs for the first time in their three-year history.

August 1, 2000

Yogi Berra Stadium plays host to the 2000 Northern League All-Star Game. The East team, managed by New Jersey's Kash Beauchamp, defeats the Central stars, 10-5.

October 2000

Kash Beauchamp resigns as Jackals manager. His three-year record stands at five games over .500. The Jackals later name George Tsamis, the former skipper of the Waterbury Spirit, as their new field manager.



June 25, 2001

The Jackals mourn the loss of John Leroy, who passes away from an aneurysm at age 26. Leroy, who was a member of the Sioux City Explorers at the time of his death, pitched for New Jersey in 2000.



June 29, 2001

Outfielder Aaron Fera smashes two homers and drives in six runs in a win at Adirondack. He will have two more two-homer games during the season and, even though he is signed by the St. Louis Cardinals organization on August 1, Fera establishes a new franchise record by hitting 18 home runs in 2001.

July 31, 2001

Jackals' third baseman Ryan Kane clouts a home run and a double in the Northern League All-Star Game played in Winnipeg. Kane is selected as the game's MVP.

September 7, 2001

The Jackals complete their first-round sweep over the Diamond Dogs with a 7-4 victory at Yogi Berra Stadium on hometown hero David Kennedy's three-run home run in the bottom of the eighth inning.

September 22, 2001

The Jackals finish off the Elmira Pioneers in the fifth and final game of their playoff series, 8-5. Mike Bertotti comes out of the bullpen to strike out 11 batters over the final seven innings in relief of Joel Bennett, who leaves with a sore shoulder.

September 24, 2001

New Jersey scores four runs in the bottom of the eighth inning to beat the Winnipeg Goldeyes, 7-3, in game one of the Northern League finals in Little Falls.

September 28, 2001

The Jackals win their first Northern League championship, beating the Goldeyes, 8-5, in game four in Winnipeg. New Jersey scores four runs in the top of the ninth inning to secure the win. Outfielder Trey Beamon is named post-season MVP after batting .585 with three home runs and 12 RBIs in 12 games. New Jersey goes 9-3 in the postseason.

June 8, 2002

Joel Bennett fires a complete-game, four-hitter as the Jackals beat the Berkshire Black Bears, 6-1. Bennett will not lose another start until August 17, a span of 12 starts. The former major league right-hander will set a Jackals' record by winning 14 games during the season.

June 16, 2002

New Jersey defeats the Elmira Pioneers, 14-0, to begin a then-franchise-record 13-game winning streak. The Jackals will win the first half South Division title and guarantee themselves a spot in the playoffs with a 30-15 record.

June 23, 2002

Joel Bennett sets a team record by striking out 16 batters in a 14-1 victory over the Allentown Ambassadors.

July 14, 2002

The Jackals defeat Quebec, 7-4, and begin a stretch where they will win 19 of 20 games. New Jersey will win the second half South Division title with a 32-12 mark and will post an overall record of 62-27, the best in franchise history.

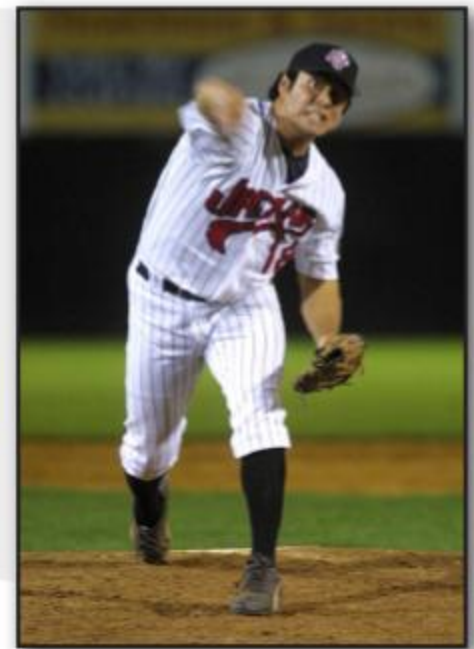
August 12-15, 2002

The Jackals sweep a four-game series in Allentown, winning by an aggregate score of 66-22. Shortstop Chas Terni ties a league record by smacking three home runs in the first game and then ties the league record with three doubles two nights later. In the third game, the Jackals erupt for a franchise-record 28 hits with outfield-

er Billy Brown tying the league mark with six hits in one game. On the 15th, outfielder Travis Bailey drives in six runs, tying the team record as the Jackals score 25 runs in the contest.

August 28, 2002

Jeremy Callier throws the first no-hitter in franchise history, 2-0, over the Berkshire Black Bears. He allows only two base runners in the game, one on a walk and the other on an error. Despite Callier's efforts, the game goes scoreless into the bottom of the ninth inning before the Jackals win the contest on Ryan Kane's two-run home run to complete the walk-off no-hitter.



September 4, 2002

Joel Bennett strikes out 12 and allows only three hits over eight innings as New Jersey wins its playoff opener, 3-0, over the Elmira Pioneers at Yogi Berra Stadium.

September 8, 2002

The Jackals win the fifth and deciding game of their first-round series, winning in Elmira, 6-0. Joel Bennett throws blanks again, allowing six hits and no runs over eight innings.

September 9, 2002

Craig Conway smashes a grand slam and drives in five runs as New Jersey takes the first game of its second-round playoff series against the Adirondack Lumberjacks, 13-1, at Yogi Berra Stadium.

September 14, 2002

With the series against Adirondack tied at two games apiece, trailing 2-1 and down to their last strike of the season, the Jackals rally to score three runs in the ninth inning to beat the Lumberjacks in Glens Falls, NY, 4-2, and win the series. Dave Callahan strokes a bases-clearing double with two outs and a 3-2 count to win the series for New Jersey.

September 21, 2002

In game four of the Northern League championship series, Mikaela Dworken smacks a home run and Aaron Myers allows two runs over 6.2 innings as, for the second straight year, the Jackals beat the Goldeyes to win the league title.

November 2002

After George Tsamis steps down as manager to pursue the same position with the St. Paul Saints, the Jackals hire Joe Calfapietra as the third manager in franchise history. In addition, it is announced that the Northern League East has split with the Northern League Central and will once again play as the Northeast League in 2003.

May 17, 2003

The Jackals take on the Russian National Team in an exhibition doubleheader at Yogi Berra Stadium. New Jersey is victorious by scores of 3-0 and 5-4.

September 4, 2003

A day after Mother Nature forces the cancellation of their first-round Northeast League playoff game, the Jackals bring in a helicopter flown by Andrew MacQueen of Fairfield, who is stationed at Essex County Airport and works for Helicopter Services and Instruction, to circle the infield and outfield for an hour in preparation for game one against the Brockton Rox.



January 23, 2004

The Jackals sign Garden State native Zach Smithlin, who would spend six seasons patrolling the New Jersey outfield. Smithlin would end his Jackals career as the team's all-time leader in games played, hits, runs scored and stolen bases.

July 15, 2004

After picking up four wins in a 24-hour span thanks to back-to-back doubleheader sweeps against the Elmira Pioneers the previous two days, the Jackals defeat the New Haven County Cutters, 6-2, in a one-game playoff at Yale Field in New Haven, CT to clinch the Northeast League first-half title and an automatic playoff berth. The four-game stretch against Elmira included a string of 30 consecutive innings where the Jackals led the Pioneers. The Jackals also won eight of their final 10 games in the first half.

August 6, 2004

Shortstop Chris Rowan clubs his 29th home run in a Jackals uniform, breaking Travis Bailey's team record for career blasts. Rowan would connect on a franchise-record 23 homers during the 2004 season.

September 2004

In the Northeast League Championship Series, the Jackals drop the first two games of the series against the North Shore Spirit at Yogi Berra Stadium. In game three at Fraser Field in Lynn, MA, North Shore builds a 3-0 lead before New Jersey battles back to force extra innings, enabling catcher Jay LaFlair to knock in the game-winning run in the 13th. Trailing 2-1 heading to the ninth in game four, the Jackals even the score on a fielder's choice off the bat of Wady Almonte before a two-run, 11th-inning single by Scott Goodman gives New Jersey the lead and Aaron Myers finishes off the Spirit with his second inning of perfect relief. In the decisive fifth game, the Jackals jump out to an early advantage and Joel Bennett and Myers pitch New Jersey to an improbable Northeast League title.

July 12, 2005

As New Jersey batters the Brockton Rox 16-2 at Yogi Berra Stadium, Joe Calfapietra records his 130th franchise victory, becoming the winningest manager in team history. Calfapietra reaches the milestone in 24 fewer games than the previous record holder, Kash Beauchamp.



July 23, 2005

Craig Breslow, a member of the Jackals bullpen in 2004, makes his major league debut for the San Diego Padres. Breslow is the first former Jackal to reach the major leagues.

July 28, 2005

Jackals' first baseman John Lindsey's contract is sold to the Florida Marlins. Lindsey, who later returned to the Jackals before making his MLB debut with the Dodgers in 2010, was batting .321 with nine home runs and 62 RBIs for New Jersey.

July 29, 2005

Aaron Myers hurls eight innings of two-hit, shutout baseball as the Jackals defeat the Grays, 12-0.

June 22, 2006

With the bases loaded in a 7-7 contest, pinch hitter John Lindsey laces a walk-off single to center field to carry the Jackals past the New Haven County Cutters, 8-7.

June 24, 2006

With rain in the forecast, Joe Calfapietra elects to start reliever Adam Nikolic against the Brockton Rox. Nikolic strikes out three batters in two scoreless frames before regularly-scheduled starter Aaron Myers enters and allows just two hits in seven shutout innings.

July 1, 2006

The Jackals dominate a doubleheader against Sussex, defeating the Skyhawks 13-0 and 10-0. Game one is a continuation of the previous night's contest – the first-ever meeting between New Jersey and Sussex – which was suspended in the third inning.

August 6, 2006

Aaron "Bulldog" Myers tosses the second no-hitter in franchise history as the Jackals defeat the Worcester Tornadoes, 3-0.



November 14, 2006

Ed Ott joins the Jackals coaching staff. The move reunites Ott and Jackals' manager Joe Calfapietra, who served as a coach for the Allentown Ambassadors for three years when Ott was Allentown's manager.

May 27, 2007

Joe Calfapietra earns his 200th managerial win in a Jackals uniform as New Jersey defeats the Sussex Skyhawks, 9-8. Sussex rookie Ryan Lobban, who would later pitch for New Jersey, takes the loss.

July 9, 2007

The Jackals clinch the Can-Am League first-half title with an 8-0 win over the Worcester Tornadoes in Little Falls.

July 29, 2007

The Jackals sell a pair of pitchers to affiliated organizations as southpaw Rusty Tucker's contract is purchased by the Milwaukee Brewers and submariner Hunter Davis joins the Tampa Bay Rays organization.

August 28, 2007

Sandy Madera's grand slam caps a seven-run ninth inning as the Jackals rally past the North Shore Spirit, 9-6, at Fraser Field in Lynn, MA. A day later, North Shore activates manager Vic Davilla, whose walk-off homer helps the Spirit down New Jersey, 7-5.

September 3, 2007

The Jackals drop their sixth straight game, 10-6 at New Haven County, to stumble into the postseason.

September 8, 2007

In game four of their first-round playoff series, the Nashua Pride smash five home runs at Yogi Berra Stadium to force a fifth game. New Jersey's season comes to an end the next night thanks to a 4-0 loss to Nashua.



March 11, 2008

Joel Bennett announces his retirement after a 17-year career that included a pair of major-league stops. In seven dominant seasons with New Jersey, Bennett went 59-19 with a 2.83 ERA.

June 20, 2008

The Jackals announce the signing of long-time nemesis Vic Davilla. Davilla, who had spent 11 seasons competing against the Jackals with the Adirondack Lumberjacks, Albany-Colonie Diamond Dogs, Allentown Ambassadors, and North Shore Spirit, would hit .279 in 15 games with the Jackals before finishing the season with the Brockton Rox.

June 24, 2008

First baseman Juan Tejada homers in three consecutive at-bats as the Jackals sweep a doubleheader at Worcester. Tejada lifts a sixth-inning home run in game one before leaving Hanover Insurance Park twice in the 10-8 nightcap victory.

June 27, 2008

In the longest game in Can-Am League history, the Jackals defeat the Tornadoes, 5-4, in a 20-inning marathon in Worcester that takes six hours, six minutes to complete. In the 20th, New Jersey second baseman Marcus Sanders connects for his first home run of the year to propel the Jackals to a one-run lead at 5-4. In the bottom of the inning, Tom Atlee retires the side in order to notch his first save of the season. Sanders is the star at the plate for New Jersey, going 5-10 with 3 RBIs despite not picking up his first hit until his fourth at bat in the seventh inning. In the win, the Jackals set a franchise record as New Jersey pitchers strike out 21 Worcester batters with Ted Serro and Brandon Martin combining for seven innings of shutout relief.

June 28, 2008

In his seventh professional season, right-hander Tom Atlee earns the win in his first career start as the Jackals down the Nashua Pride, 6-2, at Yogi Berra Stadium.

June 30, 2008

The Jackals score a Can-Am League record 21 runs on a league record-tying 28 hits as they defeat the first-place Worcester Tornadoes 21-10 at Yogi Berra Stadium. In the contest, New Jersey also ties a league record with an 11-run bottom of the fourth inning in which they bang out a league-record 12 hits. Additionally, the Jackals tie their team record with 28 hits.

July 3, 2008

In front of a Can-Am League-record 8,016 fans at Bernie Robbins Stadium, the Jackals slug their way to a 16-14 victory over the Atlantic City Surf.

July 31, 2008

The Jackals suffer their franchise-record ninth straight loss, 4-2, at Quebec.

August 16, 2008

Zach Smithlin's inside-the-park home run helps New Jersey down Atlantic City, 8-0, in front of over 3,800 fans at Yogi Berra Stadium. The round-tripper is just the second of Smithlin's career and his first since 2005.

August 22, 2008

In a ceremony prior to their game against the Brockton Rox, the Jackals retire Joel Bennett's number 28.

May 29, 2009

The Jackals emerge victorious on opening day for the eighth straight season as they down the American Defenders of New Hampshire, 10-0, at Historic Holman Stadium in Nashua, NH.

June 6, 2009

Zach Smithlin breaks an 0-for-12 hitless streak as he collects his 500th career hit in an 8-2 loss vs. Brockton.

June 16, 2009

Continuing a trend of solid early-season pitching, closer Rusty Tucker becomes the third straight Jackals' hurler to earn Can-Am League Pitcher of the Week honors. Starters Isaac Pavlik and Ted Serro had previously taken home league honors.



June 23, 2009

Southpaw A.J. Wideman comes within five outs of a perfect game and the New Jersey Jackals set a league record by winning their 12th consecutive game, defeating Les Capitales de Quebec, 6-0, at Stade Municipal. The win eclipses the previous Can-Am League mark of 11 straight, set by the North Shore Spirit in 2006. A Patrick Deschenes eighth-inning single is the only ball leave the infield against Wideman, who hurls eight shutout innings.

June 25, 2009

The Jackals extend their Can-Am League-record winning streak to 14 games with a 9-7 victory over the Worcester Tornadoes in game one of a doubleheader at Yogi Berra Stadium. However, a 3-1 Worcester win in the nightcap snaps the streak, which began on June 11.

June 28, 2009

Rookie catcher Chris Chiarappa's walk-off, two-run single in the ninth inning helps New Jersey overcome a five-run final-frame deficit en route to an 8-7 win over the Worcester Tornadoes.

July 16, 2009

The Jackals clinch the Can-Am League First-Half Championship and a spot in the playoffs, pounding out 16 hits on their way to an 11-1 victory at Worcester.



July 26, 2009

In game one of a doubleheader, Quebec right-hander and former National League Cy Young Award winner Eric Gagne takes a no-hitter into the seventh inning at Yogi Berra Stadium. Gagne allows back-to-back singles to begin the frame before inducing a game-ending triple play on a grounder to third base off the bat of Juan Tejada.



August 1, 2009

A.J. Wideman takes home Can-Am League Pitcher of the Month honors for the second straight month after compiling a 4-0 record with a microscopic 1.06 ERA in July.

September 4, 2009

A league-high five Jackals are named to the Can-Am League Post-season All-Star Team. First baseman Myron Leslie, shortstop Mike DeJesus, outfielder Jerod Edmondson, left-hander A.J. Wideman, and relief pitcher Rusty Tucker each earn league laurels. Joe Calfapietra is later named league Manager of the Year.



April 11, 2010

Southpaw Raul Valdes earns his first call to the major leagues at age 32 when the New York Mets promote him from Triple-A Buffalo. Valdes, a Cuban defector, went 7-3 with a 2.81 ERA in 17 games (12 starts) for the Jackals in 2006.

May 31, 2010

Former Tampa Bay Rays catcher Shawn Riggins is named Can-Am League Player of the Week after going 8-for-15 with two home runs in New Jersey's season-opening series at Sussex.

June 2, 2010

Left-handed outfielder Kevin Clark homers in his first two at-bats against Pittsfield southpaw Dave Qualben as the Jackals defeat the Colonials, 4-2, in the first game of a doubleheader at Wahconah Park. Pittsfield wins the nightcap, 2-1.

June 15, 2010

A.J. Wideman fans a career-high 10 Worcester batters without allowing a walk in a 7-4 New Jersey victory at Hanover Insurance Park.

June 18, 2010

After Jackals starter Ryan Lobban tosses seven shutout innings, New Jersey's bullpen hits a batter and doles out six walks as the Quebec Capitales plate six runs on just one hit (an infield single) in the top of the eighth inning to hand the Jackals a heartbreaking 6-5 Jackals loss at Yogi Berra Stadium.

June 21, 2010

On a New York Mets off-day, former Jackals' reliever Raul Valdes returns to Yogi Berra Stadium to throw out the first pitch prior to New Jersey's game against the Worcester Tornadoes.

July 2-3, 2010

The Boston Red Sox purchase second baseman Argenis Reyes from the Jackals and assign him to Triple-A Pawtucket. A day later, the Pittsburgh Pirates pluck catcher Jordan Newton from New Jersey and send him to Advanced-A Bradenton.

July 22, 2010

Skyhawks starter Mike Vicaro takes a no-hitter into the eighth inning, but New Jersey southpaw Isaac Pavlik's complete-game shutout carries the Jackals to a 2-0 win over Sussex at Skylands Park. Pavlik took his no-hit bid into the bottom of the fifth.

August 26, 2010

Jackals skipper Joe Calfapietra notches his 500th career managerial win with help from Isaac Pavlik and Carlos Sosa. Pavlik fires his second complete-game shutout of the season and Sosa's walk-off double in the bottom of the ninth inning makes it stand as New Jersey defeats the first-place Quebec Capitales, 1-0, at Yogi Berra Stadium.



September 6, 2010

On the final day of the regular season, the Jackals erupt for six runs in the sixth inning to defeat the Capitales, 9-3, on a rainy night in Quebec City and clinch the fourth and final Can-Am League playoff spot. That same day, former Jackal John Lindsey, a 33-year-old first baseman, makes national headlines when he is called up to the major leagues for the first time in his career during his 16th professional season. At the time, Lindsey is the longest-tenured active minor league player without major league experience.

June 3-4, 2011

In the first-ever meeting between the Jackals and Rockland Boulders, New Jersey falls behind, 10-0, early before a comeback falls just short in an 11-10 loss. The next night, the Jackals erase an early 7-0 deficit to come away with an 8-7 win.

June 6, 2011

The Jackals walk-off with a win – literally – as outfielder Jeremy Slayden draws a bases-loaded free pass after a 12-pitch at-bat in the bottom of the 10th inning.

June 9, 2011

After a lengthy rain delay prior to first pitch, the Jackals finally wrap up an 11-9 victory over the Bears at 1:13 a.m. at Yogi Berra Stadium.

June 10, 2011

Isaac Pavlik throws 73 of his 98 pitches for strikes as he fires the Can-Am League's first complete game of the season.

June 19, 2011

The Jackals pick on the short porch at Rockland's Provident Bank Park, tying a franchise record with five home runs. Mike Jones and Jeremy Slayden each leave the ballpark twice while Leonard Davis knocks a pitch out of the stadium to right center.

June 20, 2011

Manager Joe Calfapietra notches his 400th regular-season win with the Jackals in game two of a doubleheader against the New York Federals.



July 9, 2011

Trailing late, the Jackals rally for six runs in the ninth inning thanks in large part to home runs by Kris Sanchez and Myron Leslie to salvage a series split with a 7-2 victory at Stade Municipal.

July 17, 2011

Left-hander Isaac Pavlik suffers his first loss of the season after beginning the year 8-0. Pavlik finishes the season 13-3.

July 25, 2011

Outfielder Leonard Davis has his contract sold to the Washington Nationals, becoming the first of three Jackals sold to affiliated organizations over an eight-day span. Second baseman Argenis Reyes is sold to the Cleveland Indians on July 31 and southpaw James Leverton has his contract purchased by the Florida Marlins on August 2.



July 30, 2011

The Jackals retire former outfielder Zach Smithlin's number four in a ceremony between games of a doubleheader against the Pittsfield Colonials. The Fair Lawn native spent six seasons with New Jersey (2004-09)

August 9, 2011

The Jackals use back-to-back blasts in the ninth inning by Jordan Newton and Chris White to power past the Quebec Capitales, 9-7, in Quebec City.

August 11, 2011

In one of the most unusual pitching performances in recent memory, Jon Kibler takes a perfect game into the sixth inning in Quebec City only to be chased from the contest after allowing home runs to each of the first four batters he faces in the seventh.

August 29, 2011

The Jackals clinch a playoff spot behind the strength of their 11th win in their last 12 games.

August 31, 2011

Isaac Pavlik, a 10-year veteran, sets a career high with 13 strikeouts while Sean Smith swipes his 46th bag of the season to break the Can-Am League single-season record.

August 23, 2011

The Jackals acquire outfielder Bryan Sabatella in a trade with the Shreveport-Bossier Captains of the American Association in exchange for cash and a player to be named later. Sabatella bats .442 with 16 RBIs and eight stolen bases over the season's final 12 games, going 13-for-20 with runners in scoring position, before leading the team in batting in the postseason.

August 26, 2011

After Kris Sanchez rips a walk-off, pinch-hit single in extra innings in game one of a doubleheader against the Brockton Rox, Sandy Madera smashes a two-run, walk-off homer off the batters' eye in the nightcap with the Jackals down to their final strike of the contest at Yogi Berra Stadium.

September 1, 2011

On the final day of the regular season, the Jackals tie a Can-Am League record with nine stolen bases against the Newark Bears in Little Falls.



September 10, 2011

The Jackals finish off a three-game sweep of the Pittsfield Colonials in the first round of the Can-Am League playoffs. The series helped New Jersey snap an eight-game playoff losing streak that dated back to 2007. The contest marked the final game the Colonials' franchise would play.

September 15, 2011

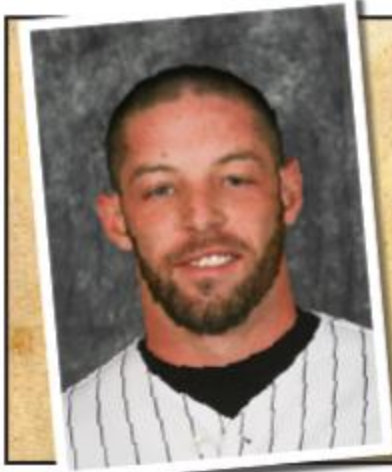
Faced with a must-win game three as Can-Am League Championship Series shifts to Quebec City, Jon Kibler takes a no-hitter into the seventh inning and the Jackals smashed three home runs to extend their season one more day.

September 16, 2011

New Jersey's bullpen has a string of 18.2 consecutive scoreless postseason innings snapped as the Jackals fall to the Quebec Capitales in the fourth and deciding game of the Can-Am League Championship Series in Quebec City.

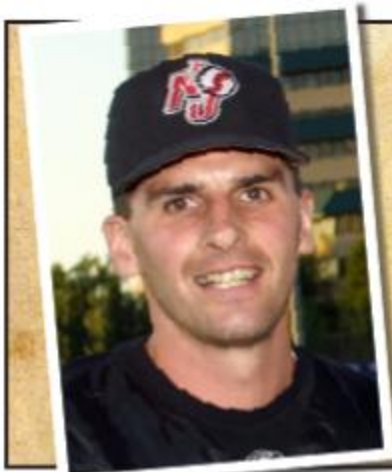

JACKALS HIGHLIGHTS

- » Switch-hitting outfielder spent more time with the Jackals (six seasons) than any other position player in organization history. His 503 career hits in a Jackals uniform are 204 more than any other Jackal. Smithlin also holds the Jackals' career records for games played (472), runs scored (287), and stolen bases (154).
- » Following the 2004 season in which he helped lead New Jersey to a Northeast League title, Smithlin's contract was purchased by the San Diego Padres, but he was not re-assigned after spring training. Upon returning to the Jackals, Smithlin turned in a career year in 2005, batting .358 while leading the Can-Am League with 135 hits and 40 thefts and representing the Jackals at the All-Star Game in Brockton. Three years later, Smithlin once again led the circuit when he swiped 33 bags in 2008.

WORTH NOTING

- » Smithlin's number was retired by the Jackals on July 30, 2011 between games of a doubleheader against the Pittsfield Colonials.
- » After a successful run at Penn State, Smithlin signed with the St. Louis Cardinals as a nondrafted free agent in 2003 and spent his rookie campaign with the New Jersey Cardinals, playing 44 games at the Cardinals' New York-Penn League outpost at Skylands Park before signing with the Jackals in 2004.
- » Smithlin spent his entire eight-year career in the Garden State, including his first professional season in 2003 with the New Jersey Cardinals and brief stints during his final season in 2010 with the Atlantic League's Somerset Patriots and Newark Bears.

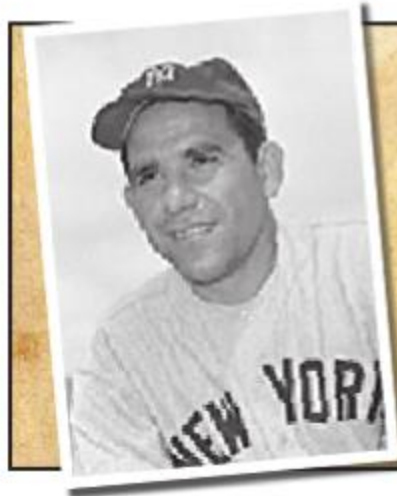
- » In seven seasons with New Jersey (2001-2007), Bennett went 59-19 and posted a 2.83 ERA while striking out 632 batters in 660 innings and leading the Jackals to three league championships (2001, 2002, and 2004)
- » Bennett holds almost every Jackals pitching record, including most wins in a season (14 in 2002), career wins, and strikeouts. On June 23, 2002, he set the team's single-game strikeout record when he fanned 16 Albany-Colonie Diamond Dogs.
- » Arguably Bennett's best season in a Jackals' uniform came in 2003 when he compiled an 8-1 record with a miniscule 1.93 ERA in 12 starts.
- » Bennett announced his retirement following the 2007 season at the age of 38 after 17 seasons and over 1,800 innings.

WORTH NOTING

- » Bennett's number was retired by the Jackals on August 22, 2008 prior to a contest against the Brockton Rox.
- » Bennett appeared in seven major league games for the Phillies and Orioles in 1998 and 1999.
- » During several of his seasons with the Jackals, Bennett pulled double duty, both playing and serving as New Jersey's pitching coach. In each of his final five seasons with New Jersey, Bennett, who spent the offseason as a physical education teacher near his hometown of Binghamton, N.Y., joined the Jackals midway through the season in June.
- » Bennett was selected in the 21st round of the 1991 draft by the Boston Red Sox out of East Stroudsburg University.

- » Berra is a long-time Montclair resident.
- » The Yogi Berra Museum and Learning Center overlooks the stadium's first-base side.
- » Berra Was elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1972 following a 19-year major league career spent entirely with the New York Yankees. He was an 18-time All-Star and a three-time MVP.

» He is one of just six managers in major league history to lead both an American and a National League club to the World Series. As a player and a coach, Berra appeared in 21 World Series.

» While there was never an official ceremony to retire Berra's number at Yogi Berra Stadium, no Jackal has ever worn number eight. Berra's number is one of two number eights retired by the Yankees (the other is fellow catcher Bill Dickey).
