BLUE ROCKS BREAKDOWN

HOME: 0-0 | AWAY: 1-0 | STREAK: W1 | LAST 5: 1-0 | LAST 10: 1-0

OFF TO A GOOD START: The Wilmington Blue Rocks (1-0) were resilient at the plate and ultimately earned a 5-3 victory against the Potomac Nationals (0-1) on Opening Day at Pfitzner Stadium, Thursday night. Third baseman **Emmanuel Rivera** highlighted the offense with a pair of RBI doubles in his Wilmington debut, **Gabriel Cancel** homered in his first at-bat as a Blue Rock and returning first baseman **Chris DeVito** delivered the go-ahead RBI single in the top of the eighth to help Wilmington earn the victory.

ROCKS ON OPENING DAY: With the victory, Wilmington improved to 14-12 all-time on Opening Day. They have won two of the last three openers against Potomac. Last season, the Blue Crew won 6-2 at Frawley Stadium before falling to the P-Nats in 2016 at home, 6-1. This year's opener marked the 16th time the Blue Rocks have played away from Frawley Stadium to start a season.

POWER ALLEY: Five of the eight hits for the Blue Rocks last night went for extra-bases, including four doubles and a home run. Rivera, Cancel and **Kort Peterson** all ripped doubles while Cancel smashed the first home run of the season for the Blue Crew. It was the second straight year the Blue Rocks hit a home run in the opener. Last year, **Roman Collins** hit a three-run blast at Frawley Stadium on April 7 against Potomac.

PROSPECTS AND FAMILIAR FACES GALORE:

-The 2018 roster features 12 returning players from 2017 and five top-30 prospects.

-Outfielder **Khalil Lee** (#1 by MLB.com/#2 per *Baseball America*), catchers **Chase Vallot** (#12 *B.A.*/#26 MLB.com) and **Meibrys Vilorio** (#18 MLB.com/#24 *B.A.*), right-hander **Gerson Garabito** (#16 *B.A.* / #30 MLB.com) and infielder **Emmanuel Rivera** (#11 MLB.com/#27 *B.A.*) are the five rated prospects on the team according to both *Baseball America* and MLB.com. Lee was top-five in SAL in HR (17, T-2nd), walks (65, 3rd), but was first in strikeouts (171) but started season at 18-years-old.

-Notable returners are first baseman **Chris DeVito** who was tied for first on team with 53 RBI and third on team with 10 home runs in 2017. Hit for the cycle on June 2 at W-S. Infielder **D.J. Burt** returns after his 2017 was cut short due to injury. Paced team and finished fifth in the Carolina League with 32 stolen bases. Tied for first on team in walks (64). Vallot returns as a catcher after being one of the youngest players in the league last season. -Led the team in strikeouts (127), but also tied for team lead in walks (64) and was second in home runs (12).

-Other returners include **Anthony Bender, Justin Camp, Cristian Castillo, Grant Gavin, Jared Ruxer, Walker Sheller, Nick Heath** and **Kort Peterson**.

THIRD TIME'S A CHARM FOR KENNEDY: The 2018 season marks the third stint for skipper **Darryl Kennedy** in Wilmington. He previously managed the team in 2014 and 2008.

-In 2014, the Blue Rocks finished 65-72 under Kennedy. That team led the Carolina League with a 3.09 team ERA but finished with the lowest batting.

-In 2008, Kennedy led the Blue Crew to a postseason berth with a Wild Card berth in the second half going 34-36. Wilmington was eliminated in the first round against the Potomac Nationals in the best-of-five series. The Blue Rocks went 69-71 overall in his first year in Wilmington.

-Prior to joining Wilmington this season, Kennedy was at the helm of the Surprise Royals in the Arizona League the past two seasons, going a combined 57-54.

-In 19 total seasons as a manager, Kennedy has been a skipper of eight different teams and has a career record of 851-786, good for a .520 winning percentage.

2018 COACHING STAFF: Hitting coach **Abraham Nunez** and bench coach **Chris Widger** return to Wilmington for their fourth and third seasons, respectively. Both enjoyed solid careers in the MLB combining to play in parts of 21 big-league seasons. The new addition to the staff is pitching coach **Doug Henry**.

-Henry spent the last five seasons with Kansas City as the bullpen coach. He spent 11 seasons in the MLB pitching for the Brewers (1991-94), Mets (1995-96), Giants (1997, 2000), Astros (1998-2000) and Royals (2001).

-He went 34-42 with a 4.19 ERA in 582 career relief appearances and pitched in the postseason for both the Giants (1997 and 2000) and with the Astros (1998-1999).

TAKING CARE OF BUSINESS: Last season, the Blue Rocks and P-Nats played 26 total games.

-The Blue Crew took the head-to-head series 16-10.

-Most of the games were closely knit, with Wilmington outscoring Potomac 101-99.

- Righty **Jace Vines** makes the start for the Blue Rocks tonight.
- He was drafted in the 4th round of the 2016 Draft by Kansas City out of Texas A&M.
- Spent last season with Lexington, Wilmington and Omaha.
- In Lexington, he posted a 9-5 record with a 3.42 ERA in 19 appearances including 14 starts.
- Named a South Atlantic League All-Star.
- Joined the Blue Rocks in mid-July last year and went 3-3 with a 3.60 ERA in seven starts.
- In 40 innings of work he allowed 16 earned runs, struck out 20 and walked 15.
- Also tossed two complete games (both even-inning games) on 8/16 and 9/3.
- Made spot start for Triple-A Omaha and tossed six innings and allowed two earned runs and struck out three.
- Features a heavy sinker, a 4-seam and 2-seam fastball, a slider and change up.
- Was not highly recruited out of high school because he wasn't pitching a lot and said "I wasn't very good and wasn't throwing hard."
- Went 10-1 with 1.77 ERA at Tyler Junior College in 2015 and named NJCAA Division I Pitcher of the Year.
- He also met his wife Emily, who played volleyball at Tyler Junior College.
- The two recently got married in January.
- Attended Texas A&M in 2016, the alma mater of both of his parents.
- Right-hander **Sterling Sharp** will take the mound for the P-Nats tonight.
- The 22-year-old was a 22nd round draft pick by Washington in 2016 from Drury University, a Division II program in Springfield, Missouri.
- He transferred there after playing for Eastern Michigan University.
- He spent last season between Low-A Hagerstown and Potomac.
- With Hagerstown, he made 18 total appearances including 17 starts and posted a 4-9 record with a 3.69 ERA.
- Allowed 100 hits in 92.2 innings and struck out 69 men and walked 14.
- He joined Potomac in the beginning of August and appeared in six games and made five starts.
- Went 2-2 with a 4.78 ERA in 32 innings of work and allowed 39 hits.
- Opposing batters hit .307 against him in the CL.
- He is 9-11 overall in his career with a 3.78 ERA in 36 games with 30 being starts.
- Was drafted twice in his career. The Braves selected him in the 30th round of the 2013 draft before the Nationals chose him in 2016.

THE BOOK ON JACE VINES: It has been quite a whirlwind for Jace Vines over the last half-decade. In high school Vines was primarily a position player who actually turned to pitching only after he lost his starting job at second base. Vines tossed just 20 innings as a senior though and was forced to walk-on at Weatherford Junior College where he red-shirted and served as the team's announcer. Vines then moved on to Tyler Junior College where he flourished. In his one and only season the Prosper, Texas native was tabbed NJCAA Division I Pitcher of the Year and earned NJCAA All-America First Team recognition. He posted a 10-1 record with a 1.77 ERA, 68 strikeouts just seven walks and won the NJCAA Division III National Championship. The effort earned him a scholarship at Texas A&M where he spent one season before being drafted by the Royals in the fourth round last June. After signing for a reported \$375,000 Vines made 12 appearances with the Idaho Falls Chukars in the Pioneer League. He opened last season in Low-A where he was named a mid-season South Atlantic League All-Star and went 9-5 with a 3.42 ERA in 19 games (14 starts) with Lexington. With the Rocks, he made seven starts and went 3-3 with a 3.60 ERA in 40 innings of work. He also made a spot start for Triple-A Omaha last August and did not factor in the decision and allowed just two runs over six innings.

A TASTE OF TRIPLE-A: Some players never get the chance to make the bigs, let alone pitch at the level right below it in Triple-A. Last season, Vines was able to experience what it's like to pitch at the highest minor league level. "That was amazing. When you get a taste of that, you want to get back as soon as you can. I think going there, having success in that outing showed that my stuff can play up there too. I don't think I'm near a complete pitcher in my mind, but when I get my secondary stuff working, tweaking things and making adjustments, I think I'll be ready the next time I get back up there." He found out about his brief promotion when Wilmington was on the road." We were actually getting on the bus from Salem. I think it was the last road trip of the year. Jamie (Quirk) called me in his office and said they need you up there. I thought he meant Double-A at first, but he said he thought they are in Nashville. I said to myself, that's not Double-A. It kind of took me by surprise and I was a little speechless at first, but it was a great time."

A WINDING PATH TO PROFESSIONAL BASEBALL: "In high school I didn't pitch a lot and didn't have any offers. I wasn't throwing very hard and wasn't very good. I walked on at a Division I junior college in Texas. When I was there, my coach took all the redshirts aside and said we need an announcer for the game. This was about two hours before the game and we all looked at each other and said I'm not doing that. I ended up stepping up once they said we would get paid to do it I said I would take that. After that, Vines played at Tyler Junior College and put together a superb season and also met his girlfriend and now wife. "Like I said, God has helped open so many doors and He took me to a new college and that's where I met my wife, Emily. She was at Tyler Junior College and playing volleyball there at the time. I had good success there and the coach helped me tweak some things and it took off from there. I was committed to one school, the coach got fired and Texas A&M came around and offered me and that was the perfect fit for me. Then, I had what I thought was a mediocre year and the Royals took me in the fourth round. It has been amazing ever since."

PLAYING FOR TEXAS A&M: "It was unbelievable to be on that team. The facilities were top notch, the coaching staff, the strength coach and the players you are playing with are players you watched on TV the last couple years. It was such a surreal feeling and to have my parents, who attended the university, relive their memories and come back and see me put the maroon and white and all that stuff. It was a great thing for my family."

LEARNING ON AND OFF THE FIELD: Vines has made it known he is a student of the game and always makes necessary adjustments to become better each season. He also is learning off the field thanks to his recent marriage. "It's just a new experience every day. We got married in January and it was perfect. This is the first time we live together. She's at home right now because we are trying to figure out a living situation. It's been a blessing to not having to miss her, worry about her and to have her on this journey with me. She's my biggest fan and supporter. With a busy schedule during the season, Vines took advantage of the slower schedule in the winter. "It hasn't been too hard. In the offseason it was easy. It wasn't too hard and it's been a lot of fun so far."
