BLUE ROCKS BREAKDOWN

HOME: 3-2 | AWAY: 2-5 | STREAK: L1 | LAST 5: 3-2 | LAST 10: 4-6

ROCKS LATE RALLY FALLS SHORT: A late rally by the Wilmington Blue Rocks (5-7) fell short as the Carolina Mudcats (7-6) took a 7-4 decision Tuesday night at Frawley Stadium. Trailing 7-0 entering the bottom of the ninth, the Blue Rocks scored four runs in the frame and loaded the bases with two outs to bring the potential winning run to the plate, but Gabriel Cancel struck out to end the comeback bid.

LOOKING FOR WINNING HOMESTAND: With a win Wednesday, the Blue Rocks will secure a winning homestand. They took two out of three against Lynchburg in a rain-shortened series while winning the first game of the series over Carolina 5-1 before having a ninth inning rally fall short Tuesday night in a 7-4 setback. This season, the Rocks split their first series of the season with Potomac in a four-game set before getting swept in Salem by the Red Sox.

FIRST "W" FOR STARTING PITCHING: The victory for Monday night's starter **Cristian Castillo** marked the first win by a Wilmington starting pitcher this season.

Bullpen: 4-2 with a 2.03 ERA (48.2IP, 36H, 16R, 11ER, 22BB, 50K, 6 HR)
-Overall, Wilmington's starters have allowed three earned runs or less in 9 of 12 starts.

LONG BALL FUN: The Rocks have clubbed a home run in 8 of the first 12 games, including six consecutive games from April 9-14. With **Meibrys Vitoria's** game-tying, two-run homer in the seventh inning Saturday night against Lynchburg, it marked the sixth straight game the Rocks clubbed a home run. The streak started on April 9 at Salem when **Angelo Castellano** hit his first home run as a Blue Rock. Since, **Xavier Fernandez**, **Chase Vallot**, **Rudy Martin**, and **Khalil Lee** left the yard during the stretch. Wilmington went 2-4 during the six-game span.

LEE PLAYING BEYOND HIS AGE: As one of the youngest players in the CL at just 19-years-old, **Khalil Lee** has shown early on that he can handle Class-A Advanced pitching. -This homestand, Lee is hitting .375 (6-for-16) with three runs scored, a double, home run, three RBI, four walks and has an on-base percentage of .500.
Rankings in CL: He leads the league in on-base percentage (.511) and slugging percentage (.676), second in batting average (.378) and tied for second in walks (10)
-He leads the team in home runs (2), total bases (25), hits (14) and second in RBI (6)
-He has also reached base in every game he has played this season and has a hit in all but one game.

VITORIA HEATING UP: The Blue Rocks backstop **Meibrys Vitoria** is scorching at the plate as of late.

-Over his last five games, the Colombian native is hitting .353 (6-for-17) with a two doubles, a home run and four RBI.
-In his first five games of the season, he hit just .118 (2-for-17) with three walks.

RUNNING ROCKS: As a team, Wilmington leads the CL in stolen bases (24) and have only been caught four times this season. Buies Creek is second in the league with 20.

MILB Ranking: The Blue Rocks lead all of MiLB in stolen bases.
-Saturday night against Lynchburg, the Rocks set a franchise single-game record by swiping five bases. **D.J. Burt** stole two while **Nick Heath**, **Khalil Lee** and **Rudy Martin** all stole a base in the win.
-Outfielder **Rudy Martin** stole another base Tuesday night to move his early-season total to 11 and he has only been caught twice.
-He has stolen at least one base in 7 of his 10 games played.
-He leads the CL in the department.
-Martin also leads all of MiLB with his mark.
-In his career, Martin has stolen 72 bases and has only been caught 13 times.

GOING THE EXTRA BASE: -Of the 87 hits for the Blue Rocks through the first 12 games, 30 of them have gone for extra-bases, accounting for 34% of the total hits recorded by Wilmington.

-Nine different players have hit at least one double and eight different players have hit one home run.
-**Khalil Lee** leads the team with six extra-base hits (three doubles, a triple and two HR.)

FISHING FOR MUDCATS: Wilmington and Carolina will meet just seven times this season. The Blue Rocks play host for the first series before Wilmington will travel to Zebulon, North Carolina to visit the Mudcats from May 10-13. Last season, Wilmington dropped five of the seven contests against Carolina. The Mudcats' roster features the Brewers' top pick in the 2017 draft **Keston Hiura**. Entering the season, the 21-year-old was rated the top-prospect in Milwaukee's system by MLB Pipeline.com and No. 2 per *Baseball America*. Both publications also had him listed as a Top-100 prospect in baseball. (No. 56 MLB Pipeline.com / No. 47 *Baseball America*.) Other notable prospects are pitchers **Marcos Diplan** (No. 12 MLB Pipeline.com / No. 22 *Baseball America*), **Trey Supak** (No. 23 MLB Pipeline.com / No. 25 *Baseball America*) and **Nathan Kirby** (No. 27 MLB Pipeline.com). Carolina also has former first-round picks in **Clint Coulter** (2012) and Kirby (2015).

-Righty **Ofreidy Gomez** makes his second start for the Blue Rocks and third overall appearance for the Blue Rocks today.
-He signed as an international free agent on May 10, 2012.
-Last time out on April 12 against Lynchburg, he made his first relief appearance of the season and worked 3.1 innings, allowed one run on one hit, struck out six, but did walk a career-high six batters.
-He made his first start of the season on April 7 at Potomac.
-He tossed four innings, allowed three earned runs on six hits, walked four and struck out four in a no-decision.
-Spent last season with Low-A Lexington which was his first year in full-season baseball.
-With the Legends, he posted a 7-12 record with a 5.18 ERA in 28 games including 22 starts. He tossed 137.1 innings and allowed 162 hits, 92 runs, 79 earned, 46 walks and struck out 108 batters.
-The 22-year-old Dominican Republic native led the team in and made career-highs in starts, innings pitched, strikeouts and was tied for second in games pitched. He was also tied for the league lead in losses.
-In 2016, he pitched for the Burlington Royals (Rookie/Appalachian League) and in his stateside debut went 5-4 with a 5.20 ERA in 12 starts and tossed a complete game.
-He held opponents to a .236 batting average and struck out 44 batters and walked 27.
-From 2013-2015 he was in the Dominican Summer League and went a composite 3-8 with a 3.90 ERA in 36 games and 15 starts.
-He struck out 94 batters and walked 51.
-Making his first-career start in Advanced-A.
-Features a fastball, curveball and changeup.
-Southpaw **Nathan Kirby** climbs the hill today to make his third start for the Carolina Mudcats.
-His last time out was on April 13 in Winston-Salem where he worked 1.2 innings and allowed four runs on three hits and suffered the loss.
-The Brewers drafted Kirby out of the University of Virginia in the first round of the 2015 Draft (40th overall).
-Rated as No. 27 prospect in Brewers' system according to MLB Pipeline.com
-He has not pitched since 2015 and missed the past two seasons due to injury, including going for Tommy John surgery in September of 2015.
-In his first pro season in Low-A Wisconsin, he went 5-2 with a 5.68 ERA in five games including a pair of starts.
-He tossed just 12 innings and allowed 15 hits, 9R/8ER, seven walks and struck out seven batters before being shutdown for the season.
-In his college days with UVA, he pitched in the College World Series twice in 2015 and earned a save in the third game of the series against Vanderbilt to help clinch Virginia's first National Championship.
-Features a fastball, curveball, slider and changeup.

THE BOOK ON OFREIDY GOMEZ: Ofreidy Gomez was signed by the Kansas City Royals as an international free agent on May 10, 2012. The 22-year-old native of the Dominican Republic spent last season in Low-A Lexington where he pitched in full-season baseball for the first time in his career. With the Legends, he went 7-12 with a 5.18 ERA in 28 games pitched including 22 starts. He set career-highs in games pitched, starts, innings pitched (137.1) and strikeouts (108). He paced the Legends' pitching staff in starts, innings pitched and strikeouts and tied for second in games pitched and was tied for the most losses in the South Atlantic League. Gomez made his stateside debut in 2016 when he pitched for the Burlington Royals, who made it to the Appalachian League Championship Series that season. With Burlington, the righty went 5-4 with a 5.20 ERA in 12 starts and also tossed a complete game. He worked 55.1 innings and allowed 32 earned runs on 46 hits. He struck out 44 batters and walked 27 while holding opponents to a .236 batting average. The righty spent his first three seasons in the Dominican Summer League with the DSL Royals. He made a good first impression in his professional debut season, going 3-0 with a solid 2.35 ERA in 10 relief appearances. He held opponents to a .192 contact clip and struck out 17 men and walked 14. However, his next two seasons were more of a struggle as he made the transition into a starter. In 2014-15, Gomez went a combined 0-8 with a 4.32 ERA in 26 appearances including 15 starts. Gomez made his first relief appearance of the season after piggy-backing off **Anthony Bender** on April 12. He worked 3.1 innings, allowed just one run on one hit, struck out six, but did walk a career-high six batters.

FIRST IMPRESSION OF FULL-SEASON BASEBALL: The 2017 season marked the first season in the right-handers career that he pitched in full-season baseball. Like all pitchers, Gomez found a what worked for him to contribute to his durability last year. "I think I worked on my routine and it helped me a lot. I worked hard every day and focused on what I needed to do. During the season, I continued to work on my pitches during my bullpens and it helped." Last season, Gomez pitched in 26.1 more innings with Lexington (137.1 IP) than he did in his entire career (163.2). "I think there wasn't a big adjustment, but I did only throw about 55 innings in short season the year before. So I just tried to be better every day. I kept working as much as I could to build up my arm strength."

MAKING IMPROVEMENTS IN THE OFFSEASON: Gomez continued to work on his arsenal this offseason to get ready for the increase in competition in the Carolina League. "I worked on all my pitches including my curveball and changeup to make them better pitches off of my fastball. I also focused on the command of my fastball because it's my best pitch. I can control it better than my other three pitches and I can throw it both inside and outside. Especially inside which helps me make it tough on right-handers."

IDOLIZING FORMER DOMINICAN REPUBLIC GREATS: Hailing from a hot bed for baseball talent, Gomez grew up idolizing a trio of former MLB greats that lived two hours east of Gomez in Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic. "I actually have three favorite players. Pedro Martinez, Manny Ramirez and David Ortiz. They were my favorites growing up as a child. I liked when Pedro would pitch aggressively and wanted to be the best every day. He had really good command of his pitches and that's what I want to have. Especially with his fastball, he was able to throw it up and in and I can throw mine in on hitters." The fandom for David Ortiz and Manny Ramirez comes from Gomez being a two-way player when he was younger. "I liked Ortiz and Ramirez because when I was a kid I loved to hit. I don't want to hit in the minor leagues, but with my friends back home I will."

GOALS FOR THE UPCOMING SEASON: Gomez has a few goals he wants to accomplish this season both individually and collectively with the pitching staff. "I want to continue my success from last season with Lexington and do well here (in Wilmington). I would like to continue working on my pitches and finish the year in Double-A. It makes me comfortable being able to pitch with (**Gerson**) **Garabito** and (**Arnaldo**) **Hernandez**. I think we will all do our best to help the team win."

THE BOOK ON ANTHONY BENDER: A hard-throwing righty, **Anthony Bender** was selected by the Kansas City Royals in the 20th round of the 2016 Draft out of Santa Rosa Junior College where he started as a shortstop and moved around the diamond in addition to being a pitcher for the team. Bender is 1 of 10 players on the 2018 roster that was part of the Royals' 2016 draft class. During his career, the 22-year-old has been between both the bullpen and starting rotation. Last season, Bender spent the majority of the campaign with Low-A Lexington. He appeared in 23 games and made eight starts and yielded a 3.93 ERA and went 5-5. In 73.1 innings of work, he allowed 68 hits, 32 earned runs and had a solid strikeout to walk ratio of 74 to 20. Opponents hit .246 against him. He made his first 14 appearances in relief before joining the starting rotation on July 16. He pitched well in his first two starts and twirled 10 combined shutout innings between the pair of starts. He allowed four hits, three walks and struck out 10 batters which earned him the South Atlantic League Pitcher of the Week Award. As a starter for the Legends, he posted a 3.33 ERA (17 ER in 46.0 innings) in nine starts while yielding a 4.88 ERA (17 ER in 31.1 innings) in 15 relief appearances. He made a spot start for Wilmington on September 3 against Lynchburg. The and suffered the loss. He allowed two earned runs on five hits, walked two and struck out three in four innings of work. Bender started his career in the Arizona League in 2016 and went 2-0 with a 3.03 ERA in nine appearances including five starts. He also picked up a pair of saves in as many opportunities while striking out 32 batters and walking four. Bender's fastball is his best pitch, which has been clocked in the mid to upper 90's with potential to hit triple digits. He will be alternating with fellow rotation mate Ofreidy Gomez for starts during the course of the season. On April 12 vs. Lynchburg, Bender made his first start of the season and worked four innings, allowed an unearned run on five hits, walked two and struck out a pair.

STARTING VS. RELIEVING: In his young career, Bender has appeared in 34 total games with 14 of them being starts. However, Bender is more comfortable as a starter than coming into a game as a reliever. "I was a starter in the Arizona League in my first season in the organization. I kind of knew what my routine was when I changed over to a reliever in Lexington. Going back to the starting role mentally wasn't too bad because I knew how to go about it. It was actually new to me going into the bullpen and being ready every day. Going back to the starting rotation was easier for me and I actually like having that five day routine rather than being a reliever."

ON WHAT HE LEARNED IN BRIEF STINT WITH BLUE ROCKS: Bender wasn't a Blue Rock for long last season, making the one start in early September. However, the righty used that opportunity to learn as much as he could. "I noticed a lot. The strike zone is a little tighter, it seems like the hitters were able to recognize the pitches faster and they don't chase as much. The level of competition was more extreme from what I noticed in that start."

GOING TO A JUNIOR COLLEGE INSTEAD OF FOUR-YEAR SCHOOL: There are certainly prestigious four-year schools across the country that have produced major-league talent such as big-time SEC schools. However, Bender chose to go the Junior College route and said it doesn't really bother him that he didn't go to a well-known baseball school. "I don't really look into it that much. People say they went to Vanderbilt or other big schools and I never really had an idea about it. I kind of always knew I was going to go the Junior College route. You talk or see players who have played on TV before and I never was a part of that. I don't think I carry a bigger chip on my shoulder, but it is interesting to see where all these different players went."

HAVING A PLUS FASTBALL AT HIS DISPOSAL: When being scouted by the Royals, the organization saw the potential power arm that Bender has. The Royals made sure to select him when the time came in the 2016 Draft. Now, Bender realizes that his fastball is his best pitch, but also understands that it's important to be able to locate it. "The hitters are getting to the point now where the speed of your fastball doesn't really matter anymore. It's almost like if you have someone out there sitting at 85 m.p.h. it seems like they are dominating more now which is crazy to think about. In the offseason, I did a little work and raised my fastball velocity which is nice because it seems like you have a little more room for error with it and it makes your off-speed stuff more complimentary."
