BLUE ROCKS BREAKDOWN

HOME: 7-6 | AWAY: 6-8 | STREAK: W1 | LAST 5: 3-2 | LAST 10: 5-5

DEUCES WILD IN ROCKS WIN: The Wilmington Blue Rocks came out on top in a back-and-forth battle against the Frederick Keys with an 8-5 victory Friday night at Frawley Stadium. The Blue Rocks strung together four straight innings from the fifth to the eighth in which they plated a pair of runs to help pull away from the Keys in the series opener. Offensively, the Rocks had four different hitters collect multiple hits while **D.J. Burt** drove in a season-high three runs.

OFFENSIVE EXPLOSION: With the 11 hits in Friday night's win, the Rocks have posted double-digit hits in two of the last three games. Outfielder **Brandon Downes** paced the offense with three hits while **Kort Peterson**, **D.J. Burt** and **Emmanuel Rivera** all picked up a pair of hits. Rivera also hit his second homer of the season and reached base four times (2-for-3, R, HR, 2BB). The Rocks racked up a season-high 16 hits on Wednesday at Potomac in a 12-7 win. Overall, the Rocks are 3-0 when they pound out 10 or more hits in a game this season.

TRYING TO GET BACK TO .500: The Rocks are looking to get back to .500 for the third time this season with a win tonight against the Keys.
-The last time the Blue Rocks were at sea-level was on April 21 when they improved to 8-8 with a 12-10 win at Frederick.
-Overall, the Blue Crew are just 1-5 in games that can even their record this season.

LONG BALL FUN: With **Emmanuel Rivera's** solo homer Friday night, the Rocks have now clubbed a home run in 16 of the first 27 games this season.
-It was his first long ball in 24 games with his only other home run coming on April 6 at Potomac.
-Rivera joins **Chase Valot** (5), **Kort Peterson** (3), **Khalil Lee** (2) and **Brandon Downes** (2) to have multiple home runs this season.
-From April 9-14, the Rocks hit a home run in six consecutive games.
-Wilmington went 2-4 during that span and are 9-7 overall when they hit a home run this season.
-The Rocks are tied for fourth in the Carolina League with 18 home runs.

ROLLING ON THE RIVERA: Third baseman **Emmanuel Rivera** has been the most consistent bat in the Wilmington lineup.
-Friday, Rivera clubbed his second homer of the season and reached base four times.
-Rivera posted season-highs with four hits and four RBI in Wilmington's 12-7 win Wednesday at Potomac.
-Over his last 18 games, the Puerto Rico native is hitting .333 (23-for-69) with three doubles, a triple, a home run, 15 RBI, seven walks and has scored nine runs.
-He has also picked up a hit in all but three games during that stretch.
-Rivera had an eight game hitting streak from April 14-22 and hit .313 (10-for-32) during the stretch.
-It stands as the longest hitting streak by a Blue Rock this season.
-He has also been a run producer and leads the team with 19 RBI.
-Leads the team with 29 hits and six doubles.
-Coming off 2017 season in which he won the South Atlantic League batting title. (.310 in 122 gms)

BURT PROVIDING THE HURT: Second-year infielder **D.J. Burt** has been off to a torrid start in his new role with the team.
-He picked up two hits in Friday's win and drove in a season-high three runs.
-Burt has collected a pair of hits in each of his last three games (6-for-10)
-He is hitting .373 (19-for-51) through 15 games this season and has an on-base percentage of .476
-He now has six multi-hit games, which is tied for second-most on the team with **Kort Peterson**.
-Last season, Burt was the primary second baseman. This year, he has been called upon to play both middle infield positions and also made his first-career start in the outfield earlier this year.

DOWNES OFF TO STRONG START: **Brandon Downes** is no stranger to Wilmington and Carolina League pitching and is off to a fast start in his fourth stint with the Blue Rocks.
-On Friday, he posted his first, three-hit game of the season to bump his average to .313 through eight games.
-He also has driven in multiple runs in three of his eight games played since joining the roster on April 26.
-He is already tied for third on the team with two home runs and tied for sixth with eight RBI.
-He has 27 career home runs and is four shy of tying **Raul Gonzalez** (31 HR, 1993-95) for the third-most home runs in franchise history.

RUNNING ROCKS: As a team, Wilmington is second in the Carolina League with 39 stolen bases and have been caught 11 times this season. Buies Creek leads the CL with 48.
-Overall, the Blue Rocks have five different players with multiple stolen bases this season.
-Martin (14), **Nick Heath** (7), **D.J. Burt** (7), Lee (6) and **Gabriel Cancel** (2).
-On April 7, at Potomac, the Rocks set a franchise single-game record by swiping five bases. Martin stole three, while Burt and Heath each swiped a bag in a 5-4 win for Wilmington. The Blue Crew matched the mark on 4/14 at home against Lynchburg.

KEYS POINTS: The Frederick Keys enter this series in fifth place in the Northern Division after a tough start to the 2018 campaign.
-After a solid 3-0 start to the year, the Keys went 5-16 the rest of April.
-Offensively, the Keys are tied for 8th in batting average (.234) fifth in walks (111) and have struck out the fewest times of any team in the circuit (197)
-On the mound, Frederick has the second-highest ERA (4.58), third-most hits given up (242) and have allowed the fifth-most home runs (18).

APRIL IN REVIEW: The Rocks finished the opening month of the campaign with an 11-12 record.
-That was a three win improvement from last season, when the Blue Crew went 8-15 in the first month of 2017.
-Entering May, the Rocks are tied for first in the CL in walks (104), second in stolen bases (37), tied for third in home runs (15), sixth in OBP% (.323) but are last in batting average (.224).
-On the mound, the Rocks finished April tied for third in shutouts (3), sixth in team ERA (3.85) and earned runs allowed (86).

-Righty **Anthony Bender** makes his fifth appearance of the season and third start of the 2018 campaign.
-Selected by the Kansas City Royals in the 20th round of the 2016 Draft out of Santa Rosa Junior College.
-In his last outing on April 29 against Winston-Salem, Bender completed the combined shutout with piggyback partner **Ofreidy Gomez** in a 3-0 blanking of Winston-Salem.
-Bender tossed the final three innings in scoreless fashion, allowed two hits and picked up a strikeout and earned his first save of the season.
-In his last start against Potomac on April 24, he did not factor in the decision.
-Allowed an earned run on three hits, walked four and struck out a batter in 3.1 innings
-During his career, the 22-year-old has been between both the bullpen and starting rotation.
-Last season, Bender spent the majority of the campaign with Low-A Lexington.
-He appeared in 23 games, made eight starts and yielded a 3.93 ERA and went 5-5.
-In 73.1 innings of work, he allowed 68 hits, 32 earned runs and had a solid strikeout to walk ratio of 74 to 20.
-Opponents hit .246 against him.
-He made his first 14 appearances in relief before joining the starting rotation on July 16.
-As a starter for the Legends, he posted a 3.33 ERA (17 ER in 46.0 innings) in nine starts while yielding a 4.88 ERA (17 ER in 31.1 innings) in 15 relief appearances.
-Last year, he made a spot start for Wilmington on September 3 against Lynchburg and suffered the loss. (4IP, 2ER, 5H, 2BB, 3K)
-Bender features a fastball in the upper 90's, along with a curveball, slider and changeup

Righty **Jhon Peluffo** makes his second start of the season and sixth total appearance of the season.
-He signed with Baltimore as a 16-year-old out of Colombia in 2014.
-His last time out on April 29 at Buies Creek was his first start of the season.
-He earned the win and tossed five scoreless innings, allowed three hits, walked two and struck out four.
-The 20-year-old faced the Blue Rocks earlier this season on April 20 in relief.
-He worked two innings, allowed an earned run on three hits, walked one and struck out a batter.
-Last season he spent the entire year with the Delmarva Shorebirds (Low-A/South Atlantic League)
-Went 6-5 with a 3.50 ERA in 23 appearances including 14 starts.
-92.2 IP, 89H, 48R/36ER, 24BB, 74K, BAA .254
-In 2016 he made his stateside debut and split the campaign between Delmarva and the Gulf Coast League.
-Went a composite 3-3 with a 4.44 ERA in 11 starts.
-48.2 IP, 47H, 32R, 24ER, 15BB, 41K, BAA .247.
-In his career, Peluffo has made 44 career starts and 67 total appearances.
-Features a 4-seam and 2-seam fastball, a slider, changeup, cutter and split-finger.

THE BOOK ON ANTHONY BENDER: A hard-throwing righty, **Anthony Bender** was selected by the Kansas City Royals in the 20th round of the 2016 Draft out of Santa Rosa Junior College where he started as a shortstop and moved around the diamond in addition to being a pitcher for the team. Bender is 1 of 10 players on the 2018 roster that was part of the Royals' 2016 draft class. During his career, the 22-year-old has been between both the bullpen and starting rotation. Last season, Bender spent the majority of the campaign with Low-A Lexington. He appeared in 23 games and made eight starts and yielded a 3.93 ERA and went 5-5. In 73.1 innings of work, he allowed 68 hits, 32 earned runs and had a solid strikeout to walk ratio of 74 to 20. Opponents hit .246 against him. He made his first 14 appearances in relief before joining the starting rotation on July 16. He pitched well in his first two starts and twirled 10 combined shutout innings between the pair of starts. He allowed four hits, three walks and struck out 10 batters which earned him the South Atlantic League Pitcher of the Week Award. As a starter for the Legends, he posted a 3.33 ERA (17 ER in 46.0 innings) in nine starts while yielding a 4.88 ERA (17 ER in 31.1 innings) in 15 relief appearances. He made a spot start for Wilmington on September 3 against Lynchburg. The and suffered the loss. He allowed two earned runs on five hits, walked two and struck out three in four innings of work. Bender started his career in the Arizona League in 2016 and went 2-0 with a 3.03 ERA in nine appearances including five starts. He also picked up a pair of saves in as many opportunities while striking out 32 batters and walking four. Bender's fastball is his best pitch, which has been clocked in the mid to upper 90's with potential to hit triple digits. He will be alternating with fellow rotation mate **Ofreidy Gomez** for starts during the course of the season. Last time on the mound for Bender on April 29 he helped complete the combined shutout with Gomez and earned a three-inning save. He allowed just two hits and struck out one in his outing. In his last start on April 24 against Potomac, he did not factor in the decision and lasted 4.2 innings, allowed one earned run, three hits, walked four and struck out one.

STARTING VS. RELIEVING: In his young career, Bender has appeared in 34 total games with 14 of them being starts. However, Bender is more comfortable as a starter than coming into a game as a reliever. "I was a starter in the Arizona League in my first season in the organization. I kind of knew what my routine was when I changed over to a reliever in Lexington. Going back to the starting role mentally wasn't too bad because I knew how to go about it. It was actually new to me going into the bullpen and being ready every day. Going back to the starting rotation was easier for me and I actually like having that five day routine rather than being a reliever."

ON WHAT HE LEARNED IN BRIEF STINT WITH BLUE ROCKS: Bender wasn't a Blue Rock for long last season, making the one start in early September. However, the righty used that opportunity to learn as much as he could. "I noticed a lot. The strike zone is a little tighter, it seems like the hitters were able to recognize the pitches faster and they don't chase as much. The level of competition was more extreme from what I noticed in that start."

GOING TO A JUNIOR COLLEGE INSTEAD OF FOUR-YEAR SCHOOL: There are certainly prestigious four-year schools across the country that have produced major-league talent such as big-time SEC schools. However, Bender chose to go the Junior College route and said it doesn't really bother him that he didn't go to a well-known baseball school. "I don't really look into it that much. People say they went to Vanderbilt or other big schools and I never really had an idea about. I kind of always knew I was going to go the Junior College route. You talk or see players who have played on TV before and I never was a part of that. I don't think I carry a bigger chip on my shoulder, but it is interesting to see where all these different players went."

HAVING A PLUS FASTBALL AT HIS DISPOSAL: When being scouted by the Royals, the organization saw the potential power arm that Bender has. The Royals made sure to select him when the time came in the 2016 Draft. Now, Bender realizes that his fastball is his best pitch, but also understands that it's important to be able to locate it. "The hitters are getting to the point now where the speed of your fastball doesn't really matter anymore. It's almost like if you have someone out there sitting at 85 m.p.h. it seems like they are dominating more now which is crazy to think about. In the offseason, I did a little work and raised my fastball velocity which is nice because it seems like you have a little more room for error with it and it makes your off-speed stuff

THE BOOK ON OFREIDY GOMEZ: Ofreidy Gomez was signed by the Kansas City Royals as an international free agent on May 10, 2012. The 22-year-old native of the Dominican Republic spent last season in Low-A Lexington where he pitched in full-season baseball for the first time in his career. With the Legends, he went 7-12 with a 5.18 ERA in 28 games pitched including 22 starts. He set career-highs in games pitched, starts, innings pitched (137.1) and strikeouts (108). He paced the Legends' pitching staff in starts, innings pitched and strikeouts and tied for second in games pitched and was tied for the most losses in the South Atlantic League. Gomez made his stateside debut in 2016 when he pitched for the Burlington Royals, who made it to the Appalachian League Championship Series that season. With Burlington, the righty went 5-4 with a 5.20 ERA in 12 starts and also tossed a complete game. He worked 55.1 innings and allowed 32 earned runs on 46 hits. He struck out 44 batters and walked 27 while holding opponents to a .236 batting average. The righty spent his first three seasons in the Dominican Summer League with the DSL Royals. He made a good first impression in his professional debut season, going 3-0 with a solid 2.35 ERA in 10 relief appearances. He held opponents to a .192 contact clip and struck out 17 men and walked 14. However, his next two seasons were more of a struggle as he made the transition into a starter. In 2014-15, Gomez went a combined 0-8 with a 4.32 ERA in 26 appearances including 15 starts. The right-hander is coming of his best start with the Blue Rocks as he spun six scoreless innings, allowed just three hits, walked one and set a season-high with nine strikeouts in a winning effort on April 29 against Winston-Salem. He fell one punch out shy of tying his career-high watermark in strikeouts (10).

FIRST IMPRESSION OF FULL-SEASON BASEBALL: The 2017 season marked the first season in the right-handers career that he pitched in full-season baseball. Like all pitchers, Gomez found a what worked for him to contribute to his durability last year. "I think I worked on my routine and it helped me a lot. I worked hard every day and focused on what I needed to do. During the season, I continued to work on my pitches during my bullpens and it helped." Last season, Gomez pitched in 26.1 more innings with Lexington (137.1 IP) than he did in his entire career (163.2). "I think there wasn't a big adjustment, but I did only throw about 55 innings in short season the year before. So I just tried to be better every day. I kept working as much as I could to build up my arm strength."

MAKING IMPROVEMENTS IN THE OFFSEASON: Gomez continued to work on his arsenal this offseason to get ready for the increase in competition in the Carolina League. "I worked on all my pitches including my curveball and changeup to make them better pitches off of my fastball. I also focused on the command of my fastball because it's my best pitch. I can control it better than my other three pitches and I can throw it both inside and outside. Especially inside which helps me make it tough on right-handers."

IDOLIZING FORMER DOMINICAN REPUBLIC GREATS: Hailing from a hot bed for baseball talent, Gomez grew up idolizing a trio of former MLB greats that lived two hours east of Gomez in Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic. "I actually have three favorite players. Pedro Martinez, Manny Ramirez and David Ortiz. They were my favorites growing up as a child. I liked when Pedro would pitch aggressively and wanted to be the best every day. He had really good command of his pitches and that's what I want to have. Especially with his fastball, he was able to throw it up and in and I can throw mine in on hitters." The fandom for David Ortiz and Manny Ramirez comes from Gomez being a two-way player when he was younger. "I liked Ortiz and Ramirez because when I was a kid I loved to hit. I don't want to hit in the minor leagues, but with my friends back home I will."

GOALS FOR THE UPCOMING SEASON: Gomez has a few goals he wants to accomplish this season both individually and collectively with the pitching staff. "I want to continue my success from last season with Lexington and do well here (in Wilmington) I would like to continue working on my pitches and finish the year in Double-A. It makes me comfortable being able to pitch with (Gerson) Garabito and (Arnaldo) Hernandez. I think we will all do our best to help the team win."
