## BLUE ROCKS BREAKDOWN

HOME: 3-3 | AWAY: 4-5 | STREAK: W2 | LAST 5: 3-2 | LAST 10: 5-5

**BLUE ROCKS PITCHING LOCK OUT KEYS:** A strong pitching performance led the way as the Wilmington Blue Rocks tossed a combined shutout and blanked the Frederick Keys by the score of 2-0 Friday night at Nymeo Field. Wilmington starter **Arnaldo Hernandez** turned in his best start as a Blue Rock and tossed six shutout innings while the combination of **Grant Gavin** and **Bryan Brickhouse** tossed the final three innings in scoreless fashion for the first shutout victory of the season for the Blue Crew.

**DOMINANT PITCHING:** Friday night marked the best overall pitching performance by the Rocks through the first 15 games of the season.

-It was the first shutout victory of the campaign and the first time the Rocks blanked an opponent since July 2 when **Scott Blewett** twirled a complete game shutout against Salem at Frawley Stadium.

-Last season, the Rocks tossed 11 total shutouts and coincidentally, earned their first shutout win also on April 20 when the Rocks blanked the Winston-Salem Dash 1-0.

**BLUE CREW BRINGING THE LUMBER:** In the series opening win on Thursday night, the Rocks set new single-game highs this season thanks to their offensive avalanche.

-The 15 runs scored were the most scored by the Rocks this season and the most since 2015 when the Rocks also scored 15 runs against Frederick on July 9 at Frawley Stadium in a 15-10 victory.

-The 14 hits marked a single-game high this season and also the first 10+ hit game for Wilmington of the year.

-The watermark this season for most hits in a game was nine, which the Blue Rocks did twice this season.

-The seven-run fourth inning was also the most runs scored in a single frame this season for the Rocks.

**VALLOT IS GRAND:** **Chase Vallot** has now hit three career grand slams as a Blue Rock.

-He hit the first grand slam by a Blue Rock this season on Thursday night in the first inning.

-Vallot hit two slams in 2017 with his first coming on May 7 at Down East and his other on June 10 against Buies Creek at Frawley Stadium.

-Vallot finished the game on Thursday with five RBI, one shy of tying his career-high.

**LONG BALL FUN:** With **Chase Vallot's** grand slam in Thursday's triumph, the Rocks have now clubbed a home run in 10 of the first 15 games.

-That also includes six consecutive games from April 9-14 where the Rocks hit a home run.

-The streak started on April 9 at Salem when **Angelo Castellano** hit his first home run as a Blue Rock. **Xavier Fernandez**, Vallot, **Rudy Martin**, **Khalil Lee** and **Meibrys Vilorio** all left the yard during the six-game stretch.

-Wilmington went 2-4 during that span and are 4-6 overall when they hit a home run this season.

**LEE PLAYING BEYOND HIS AGE:** As one of the youngest players in the CL at just 19-years-old, **Khalil Lee** has shown early on that he can handle Class-A Advanced pitching.

**-Rankings in CL:** He is first in the league in on-base percentage (.484), tied for second in walks (14), and fourth in slugging percentage (.553)

-He is tied for the team in home runs (2), paces the teams in total bases (26), hits (15) and fifth in RBI (6).

-He had his 11-game on-base streak snapped Wednesday.

-During the streak, he hit .378 (14-for-37) with three doubles, a triple, two home runs, six RBI, 10 walks and posted a 1.186 OPS.

-He also has picked up a hit in all but three games played this season.

**VILORIA HOT AT THE PLATE:** The Blue Rocks backstop **Meibrys Vilorio** is scorching at the plate as of late and picked up his third straight multi-hit game and his fourth over his last five games played thanks to a two-hit game Friday night.

-Over his last six games, the Colombian native is hitting .400 (10-for-25) with four doubles, a home run and five RBI.

-In his first five games of the season, he hit just .118 (2-for-17) with three walks.

-Has a hit in five straight games.

**RUDY BEING RUDY:** **Rudy Martin** has been an exceptional leadoff hitter for the Rocks this season and had his biggest game of the season on Thursday.

-Martin finished 3-for-5, falling a home run shy of the cycle.

-He also tied a career-high with five RBI in the victory.

-He paces the Carolina League and all of MiLB in stolen bases (13).

-First in the CL with 17 walks, which is also top-five in all of MiLB.

-Also second in the league in on-base percentage (.462)

-Has stolen a base in 9 of 14 games this year, including three multi-stolen base games.

-In his career, he has stolen 75 bases and only caught 13.

**RUNNING ROCKS:** As a team, Wilmington is second in the Carolina League with 30 stolen bases and have only been caught five times this season. Buies Creek now leads the CL with 34.

-On Saturday night against Lynchburg, the Rocks set a franchise single-game record by swiping five bases. **D.J. Burt** stole two while **Nick Heath**, **Khalil Lee** and **Rudy Martin** all stole a base in the win.

**GOING THE EXTRA BASE:** Of the 117 hits for the Blue Rocks through the first 15 games, 37 of them have gone for extra-bases, accounting for 32% of the total hits recorded by Wilmington.

-Ten different players have hit at least one double and nine have hit at least one home run this season.

-Left-handed hurler **Cristian Castillo** makes his fourth start of the year.

-Earned his first victory of the season on April 16 against Carolina.

-Tossed five innings, allowed one run on five hits, walked two and struck out five in win.

-Was the Opening Day starter April 5 at Potomac.

-Signed as a free agent out of Mexico at the age of 20 on Dec. 15, 2014.

-Last season with Wilmington, posted a 7-12 record with a 4.13 ERA in 26 starts.

-Finished second on the team in strikeouts (105) and innings pitched (141.2).

-Also ranked fifth in the CL in innings pitched.

-Was one of league's best pitchers during the months of May and June.

-Posted a 5-1 mark with 2.32 ERA in 11 starts during two-month stretch.

-Allowed three earned runs or less in 19 of his 26 starts.

-Named 2017 Carolina League All-Star.

-Against Frederick in 2017: 2-1, 3.26 ERA 3G/3GS, 19.1 IP, 15H, 7ER, 8BB, 15K.

-Earned the Appalachian League Pitcher of the Year in 2016 by going 6-3 with a 3.13 ERA, 73 strikeouts and just 14 free passes in 72 frames.

-He led the league in IP, strikeouts, and WHIP. Was fourth in ERA.

-In his first season in the system in 2015, he was named the

Royals Pitcher of the Year for their Dominican Summer League.

-Yielded a 2.64 ERA and has solid 58 to 15 K:BB ratio in 67.1 innings pitched.

-Grew up idolizing Fernando Valenzuela because he's also from Mexico

and a left-handed pitcher.

-Features a fastball, slider, curveball and changeup and locate all four

pitches very well.

Fellow southpaw **Brian Gonzalez** makes his third start of the season for the Keys.

-He was drafted by the Baltimore Orioles in the third round of the 2014 MLB Draft out of Archbishop McCarthy High School in Florida.

-Last time out on April 15 against Potomac and did not factor in the decision.

-He worked six innings, allowed two earned runs on five hits, walked two and struck out five.

-Made his first start of the season on April 9 at Carolina and suffered the loss.

-Lasted 4.2 innings, allowed three runs, but just one earned, on five hits, walked two and struck out eight.

-Against Wilmington in 2017: 1-2, 2.78 ERA, 4G/4GS, CG, 22.2IP, 18H, 7ER, 13BB, 19K.

-Last season, Gonzalez spent the entire year with Frederick.

-He posted a 5-7 record with a 4.91 ERA in 21 starts. He logged 106.1 innings, 132 hits, 65R/58ER, walked 52 and struck out 85.

-Opponents hit a healthy .306 against the southpaw.

-He tossed at least five innings in 14 of his 21 starts, including 10 outings where he allowed two earned runs or less.

-Spent both 2015 and 2016 with Low-A Delmarva.

-His best season of his career arguably came in 2016 when he went 10-8 in 27 starts and posted a respectable 2.50 ERA in a career-high 147.2 innings pitched.

-He was named a Post-Season All-Star in the South Atlantic League that season.

-Features a fastball, curveball and changeup.

### Pitch Repertoire: Fastball, Changeup, Curveball, Slider

**THE BOOK ON CRISTIAN CASTILLO:** Castillo signed as a 20-year-old out of Mexico in December of 2014 and returns to Wilmington for his second season. In 2017, he went 7-12 with a 4.13 ERA in 26 starts. Last season with Wilmington, the lefty was a Carolina League All-Star and was one of the best pitchers leading up to the mid-summer classic with a 5-1 record and 2.32 ERA during May and June. He also ranked fifth overall in the Carolina League in innings pitched at season's end. The southpaw allowed three earned runs or less in 19 of his 26 starts with the Blue Rocks last season. Since joining the Royals' organization, all he has done in three pro seasons is rack up the accolades at every level he's pitched at. Castillo earned the Appalachian League Pitcher of the Year in 2016 by going 6-3 with a 3.13 ERA, 73 strikeouts and just 14 free passes in 72 frames. He led the league in innings pitched, strikeouts and WHIP, and was fourth in earned run average. In his first season in the system in 2015, he was named the Royals Pitcher of the Year for their Dominican Summer League when he posted a 2.64 ERA, fanned 58 and walked only 15 in 67.1 innings worked. Despite all of his awards for excellence, the six-foot, 190-pounder is not ranked among the Royals top-30 prospects by Baseball America or MLB.com. He did however impress the Royals brass enough to jump both Rookie Idaho Falls and Low-A Lexington a year ago to begin the season with Advanced-A Wilmington. The southpaw was the Opening Day starter for the Blue Rocks this season. In his last time out on April 16 at home against Carolina, he earned his first win of the season and allowed just an earned run on five hits in five innings of work. He walked two and struck out five batters.

**WHAT HE LEARNED FROM 2017:** Making the kind of jump Castillo did can be a tough adjustment for many young pitchers due to the length of the season and the constant stress on a player's body. Castillo recognized the challenges first hand. "I learned how to work during a long season. It was my first year in full-season baseball and it showed me I had to work a little more this offseason to be ready for this year. Last year, I felt a little tired but I think that was part of the process. Now, I feel ready for this season. I worked hard on my conditioning, my legs and I lifted weights to be ready for spring. As a pitcher, legs are always a key when you are on the mound. I believe that and being healthy overall is the most important thing. Without having health, you can't pitch."

**ON HIS ABILITY TO THROW FOUR QUALITY PITCHES:** Although Castillo has yet to be tabbed a top-30 prospect, scouts are impressed with the southpaw's ability to command all four pitches. Castillo thinks the command of his repertoire is vital to his success. "That's helped me a lot in my career. I can throw whatever pitch I want no matter the count. This year, I want to try and throw my slider more. It's become a really good pitch and I have it faster than my curveball, but for me it doesn't matter. I will throw all my pitches, but the slider is something I want to work on." Castillo said he wants to incorporate his entire arsenal right from the start this season. "I had the slider last year, but I didn't use it enough. To start the season, I used only three of my pitches and in the second season I used my slider to give me four pitches. This year, I will start throwing my slider in my first start."

**PROUD OF HIS HERITAGE:** Castillo always cracks a smile when asked what it means to represent his home country of Mexico. "I feel proud to represent my country. I always like to listen to Mexican music before every start in the clubhouse. It helps me get ready and give more than 100% every game." He also grew up idolizing a popular Los Angeles Dodgers pitcher and fellow Mexico native. "I really enjoy watching Fernando Valenzuela who is the most famous player from Mexico and he's a left-hander. So I try to learn from what he did during his games. I never had the chance to meet him, but I was able to learn about him from my family. They taught me a lot about him. Now, I can watch videos of him pitching and enjoy it. Here in the U.S. you face a lot of good hitters and talented players every day. But in Mexico, you need to play very well and be the best you can just to get the chance to be able to play here."

**BEING NAMED OPENING DAY STARTER VS. CL-ALL STAR:** Being named an All-Star and then Opening Day starter a year later could give young pitchers added excitement. For Castillo, the calm demeanor he possesses on the mound translates off the field as well. "It made me proud (to be named Opening Day Starter) because I know I've been working hard to help the team. For me it doesn't matter. Both are really great and I'm just happy I can represent my team and organization."
