America's favorite game is evolving, and that means less stall and more ball. The XFL features exciting gameplay innovations that deliver what football fans have told us they want -- a faster pace of play and more action. With these 5 Gameplay Innovations, 5 Timing Changes, and 5 Common Sense Rules, we're building on traditional football while preserving its authenticity.

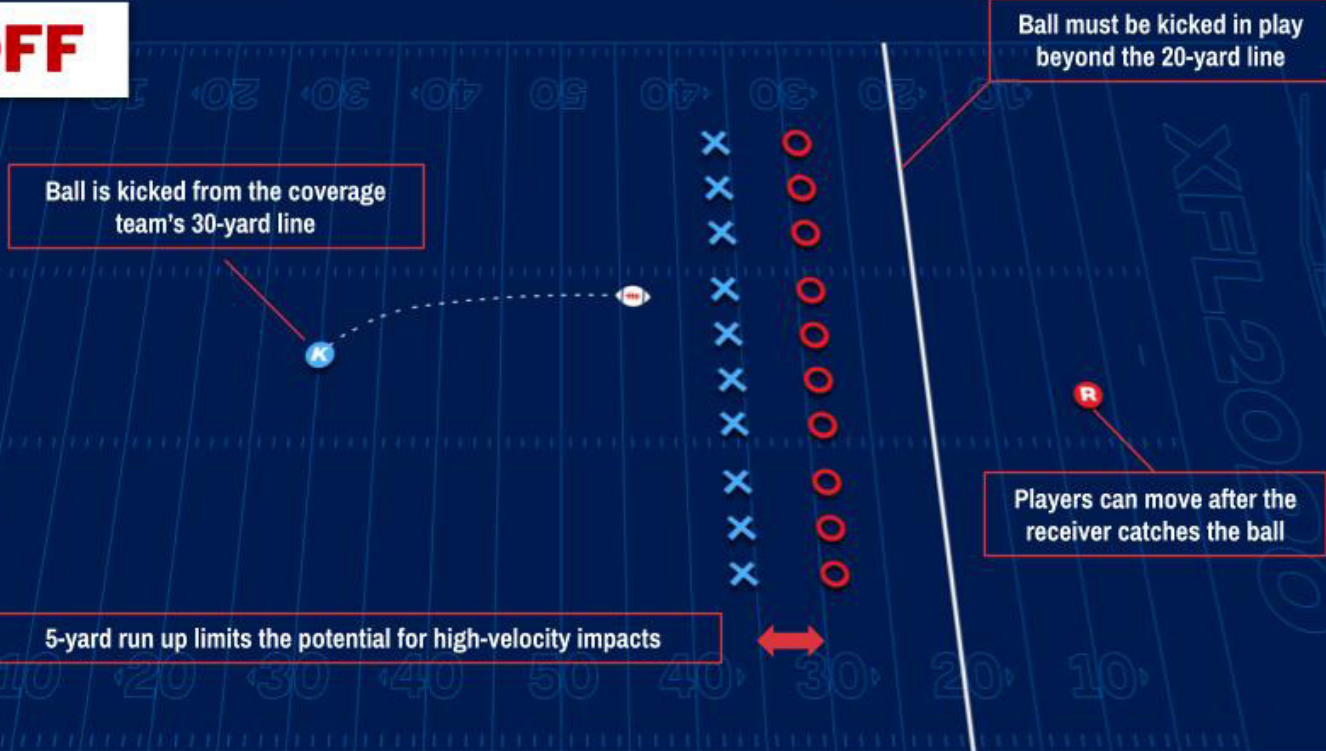

## KICKOFF



## KICKOFF

The kicker kicks from the 25-yard line and must kick the ball in the air and in play between the opponent's 20-yard line and the end zone.

The coverage team lines up on the return side 35-yard line and the return team lines up on the 30-yard line. Each team must have exactly 3 players outside the hash marks on both sides of the ball and cannot move until the ball is caught by the returner.

Out of bounds kicks and kicks that fall short of the 20-yard line will result in an illegal procedure penalty, taking the ball all the way out to the kicking team's 45 yard line.

Players can move when the ball is touched by the returner or 3 seconds after the ball touches the ground (when the official waves his hand down).

If the ball is kicked into the end zone and is downed it is a "Major" touchback and the ball is placed at the return side 35-yard line.

If the ball bounces in bounds and then out of the end zone or is downed in the end zone, the ball is placed at the return side 15-yard line.

## **KICKOFF CONT.**

If a player on the return team touches the ball and it goes out of bounds, the ball is spotted where it went out of bounds.

If a team wishes to run an onside kick, it must indicate this to the official before the play and the two teams will be permitted to line up using traditional football rules [ie. 10 yards apart from the kicking team]. There will be no surprise onside kicks.

**Rationale:** The XFL's proposed rule change will encourage more kick returns while making the play less dangerous by eliminating the 30-yard sprint to collision.





## POINT AFTER TOUCHDOWN

- After a successful touchdown, teams will elect one of the following:
  - 1-point conversion from the 2-yard line
  - 2-point conversion from the 5-yard line
  - 3-point conversion from the 10-yard line

3 POINTS

20% expected success rate

2 POINTS

30% expected success rate

1 POINT

50% expected success rate

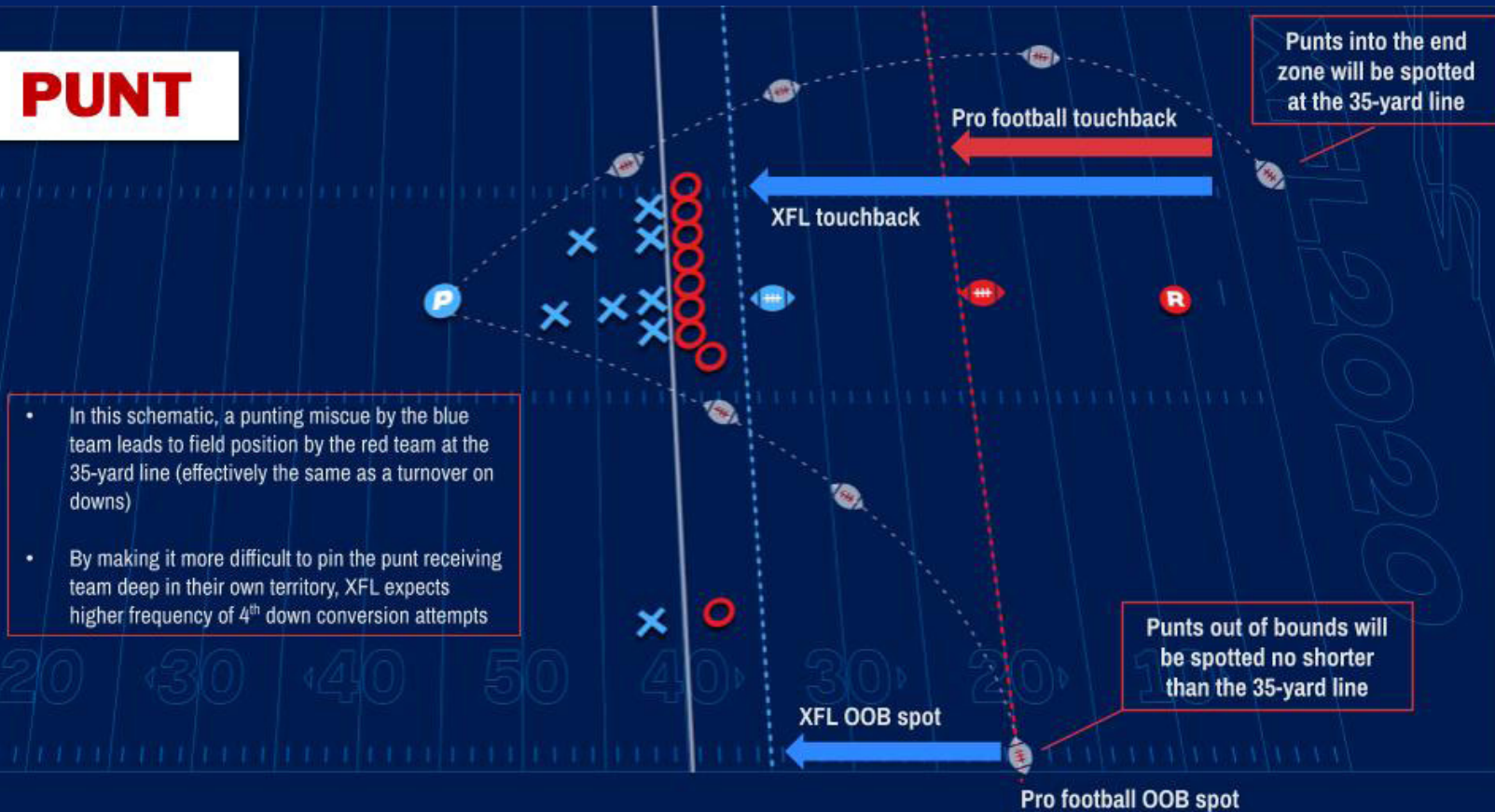
## POINT-AFTER TOUCHDOWN

After a touchdown, the team has the option of running a play from the 2, 5, or 10-yard line, worth 1, 2, or 3 points respectively. The team must run an offensive play and no kicking plays are allowed.

If the defense is able to cause a turnover and return the ball to the opponent's end zone, the resulting score is equal to the number of points the offense was attempting to score on its PAT.

**Rationale:** The XFL has created excitement by replacing a kick with a play from scrimmage. To provide even more excitement, we have added the opportunity for a 3-point play, which means that an 18-point deficit is still a two-possession game. Fans have told the XFL that the 3-point play creates more strategy and innovation for the coaches.

## PUNT



## PUNT

Punting team cannot release past the line of scrimmage until the ball is kicked.

Gunners must line up at the line of scrimmage and are permitted to move laterally once the ball is snapped until it is kicked.

Defenders over the gunner cannot cross the line of scrimmage until the ball is kicked.

If the ball goes out of bounds inside the 35-yard line, it is a "Major" touchback and the ball goes to the 35-yard line.

If a punted ball lands in the opponent's end zone or goes out of the end zone the result is a "Major" touchback, and the ball goes out to the 35-yard line.

Fair catches are permitted (though disincentivized - see Rationale)

## **PUNT CONT.**


**Rationale:** Fans told the XFL that they didn't like the amount of punts (specifically punts in an opponent's territory) and how many punts did not have a return (47% ended in fair catch, out of bounds, or touchback). The XFL has instituted two rule changes to address these concerns: all out of bounds kicks create a touchback (Major to 35), and no punt-coverage players can release until the ball is kicked. This will create an average distance between the punt return and the nearest defender to 11 yards, vs. similar leagues of 6 yards, creating less reason to fair catch.

The XFL touchback changes will create less incentive for teams to punt in an opponent's territory. Our coaches will be incentivized to go for it on 4th down because there is a higher likelihood of a positive punt return, and no ability to "pin" the receiving team with a coffin corner kick.





## DOUBLE FORWARD PASS



First pass completed behind the line of scrimmage

Second pass initiated behind the line of scrimmage

## ***DOUBLE-FORWARD PASS***

If a team completes a forward pass behind the line of scrimmage, that team may throw a second forward pass, as long as the ball has at no time crossed the line of scrimmage.

Once the ball has passed the line of scrimmage, no forward passes are permitted.

**Rationale:** The "Double Pass" is one of the most exciting plays in football and the XFL aims to add excitement while maintaining traditional football. The Double Forward Pass updates the rules to make double passes less risky because the first pass may fall incomplete rather than becoming a fumbled lateral.



The defensive team cannot score. If the offensive team commits a turnover, the play is over immediately.

## **OVERTIME CONT.**

If the defensive team commits a penalty, the offensive team will be allowed to re-attempt from the 1-yard line.

Any subsequent penalty committed by the defensive team on any subsequent play, including in future rounds, will result in a score awarded to the offensive team.

If the offensive team commits a pre-snap penalty, the ball will be moved back from the original spot, pursuant to regular rules and the play will be re-attempted.

If the offensive team commits a post-snap penalty, the play will end and no score will be awarded.

There will be a minimum of 20 seconds between plays with the ball-spotting official working in conjunction with TV and Official Review to signal when the next play begins.

**Rationale:** XFL overtime allows both teams to play offense, in under 10 minutes, and always has a winner.





## 25-SECOND PLAY CLOCK

**XFL Rule:** We will implement a 25-second play clock that begins after the ball is spotted for the next play. It takes 7 seconds on average to spot the ball (average 32 second play clock)

**Rationale:** In order to speed up the game, we wanted to minimize the downtime between plays. Our coaching staffs and teams are going to provide what fans want -- more football during the game.

## COMEBACK PERIOD

**XFL Rule:** Occurs after the 2-Minute Warning in each half.

On plays that end in the field of play, the game clock will be stopped until the ball has been spotted and 5 seconds have run off of the play clock. On incomplete passes and out of bounds plays.

**Rationale:** The most exciting part of the game is the end of each half, and the XFL aims to maximize this excitement. By stopping the game clock after every play, the team that is trailing has a clear way to maximize its remaining time and still have the ability to use its complete playbook, including runs or plays in the middle of the field.

Also, a team cannot "run out the clock" at the end of the game until the opponent has no timeouts and there is 1 minute left (5 second run off on the play clock, so 20 seconds can be run off on a play)

## UP TEMPO GAME CLOCK

**XFL Rule:** Outside the last 2 minutes of each half, the game clock will run after incompletions and out of bounds plays. Aside from incompletions and out of bounds plays, game clock rules outside the last 2 minutes of each half are the same as in traditional football.

**Rationale:** The XFL is aiming to play each game in under 3 hours, but with the same amount of total plays. In order to achieve this goal, the XFL is treating incompletions and out of bounds plays the same as plays that end in the field of play.

## TIMEOUTS

**XFL Rule:** Each team will have 2 one-minute timeouts per half.

**Rationale:** With our rule changes in the last 2 minutes, coaches should not need as many timeouts to help create a comeback. By eliminating one timeout per half, we limit the number of stoppages during the most exciting part of the game. If a play is reviewed and overturned by replay during a timeout, the team that took the timeout will not be charged.

## REPLAY RULINGS

**XFL Rule:** The XFL will have no coaches' challenges and all plays will be subject to review from the Replay Official, who will be stationed in a booth above the field.

Reviewable plays are limited to: [a] Plays involving possession. [b] Plays involving touching of either the ball or the ground. [c] Plays governed by the goal line. [d] Plays governed by the boundary lines. [e] Plays governed by the line of scrimmage. [f] Plays governed by the line to gain. [g] Number of players on the field at the snap. [h] Game administration. [1] Penalty enforcement. [2] Proper down. [3] Spot of a foul. [4] Status of the game clock. [i] Disqualification of a player.

**Exception:** The Replay Official may correct obvious errors involving player safety at any point throughout the game.

**Exception:** The Replay Official may correct any egregious obvious error that may have a significant impact on the outcome of the game in the last five minutes of the 4th quarter or during overtime.

**Rationale:** Review/Replay in football officiating is paramount to how fans view the game. To get the play right is of utmost importance to the XFL and our goal is to provide quality reviews at the right times and in a timely fashion. By eliminating coaches' challenges, we don't rely on the teams to fix miscues by the officials, and by only allowing "common sense" to be applied to officiating we put the fan first instead of the process.

## ***ONE FOOT INBOUNDS***

**XFL Rule:** To catch a ball means that a player: Secures control of a live ball in flight before the ball touches the ground. Touches the ground in bounds with any part of his body, and then Maintains control of the ball long enough to enable him to perform an act common to the game, i.e., long enough to pitch or hand the ball, advance it, avoid or ward off an opponent, etc.

**Rationale:** By simplifying the rules that establish control of the football, we are creating easier ways for officials to determine when a catch is made. When interviewing over 100 players on their opinion, players often said "A catch is made with your hands, not your feet."

## ***DEDICATED BALL-SPOTTING OFFICIAL***

**XFL Rule:** There will be a dedicated Ball Spotting Official who will solely be responsible for quickly spotting the ball and getting a new ball after each play.

**Rationale:** The Ball Spotting Official standardizes the time it takes to spot the ball and gives the XFL an on-field official with control of the game tempo.

## ***SHORTER HALFTIME***

10-minute break, then back to the action.



## COACH-TO-PLAYER COMMUNICATION

**XFL Rule:** While still in development, the goal is for select offensive players to have a Coach-to-Player helmet receiver.

The Coach-to-Player system would allow a member of the coaching staff in the bench area or the coaches' booth to communicate to a player through a speaker in his helmet. Broadcast partners would have access to this communication and may use it during the game.

**Rationale:** By allowing coaches to communicate with all offensive skill players that substitute and change location for each play we can play at a faster pace. Since offense changes much more than defense we only need to adjust the way the offense communicates to players.

## SIMPLIFIED ILLEGAL MAN DOWNFIELD

**XFL Rule:** No ineligible player shall be or have been more than three yards beyond the line of scrimmage until a passer throws a legal forward pass that crosses the line of scrimmage. A player is in violation of this rule if any part of his body is beyond the three-yard limit.

**Rationale:** This rule has become a more important part of football due to the advent of the RPO (Run Pass Option). Due to the way the rule is traditionally written, it is hard to officiate. The XFL has written the rule to be clearer while also helping teams that run the RPO.



The XFL has established "Team 9" for the benefit of the rest of the eight-team league ... and for 40 players still chasing their football dreams.

Team 9 is essentially an extra squad stocked with players available to fill open roster spots on any team in the league at any time.

"In every football league, there is constant churn," XFL CEO and Commissioner Oliver Luck said. "I'm sure every one of these rosters is going to change by the time Week 1 rolls around. They'll bring in new guys or someone pulls a hamstring, it's just inevitable.

"So Team 9 will be ready to roll as a replacement team that's got to be constantly replenished, so all these guys that got the bad news about getting cut, a bunch of them of them are going to be back in the league through Team 9."

Team 9 is based in Arlington, Texas, and will practice at Globe Life Park, home of the Dallas Renegades. While Team 9 will share some resources with the Renegades, such as training and medical services, it will largely function as a separate entity.

Bart Andrus is coaching Team 9. In a career spanning four decades, Andrus has coached in the NFL, CFL, NFL Europe, college and other spring leagues. He was an NFL offensive assistant in Tennessee and St. Louis, won an NFL Europe championship as head coach of Amsterdam in 2005 and was a CFL head coach with Toronto.

Andrus and his staff will install basic offensive and defensive schemes with terms that are universal throughout football. It's not so much about learning specific terminology or building a playbook. Instead, it's about keeping players ready mentally and physically, getting reps in and reinforcing core concepts.

The slimmed-down Team 9 roster won't include specialists (kickers, punters, long snappers) but will have all other position groups and will practice several times per week. XFL team personnel departments will have constant access to Team 9 coaches and players, including film and the ability to attend practices.

## XFL GAME BALL

Two distinctive features make the XFL's official football stand apart from any in sports.

The XFL game ball comes in eight custom looks to match each team's primary color scheme and is distinguished by the following:

The points of each football are wrapped with 'X' marks in white and the team's primary color. This design allows receivers to track the ball easily.

Patent-pending "X-Pebble" grip technology helps players control the ball with a feel that enables a tight spin on throws, and also allows ball carriers to enhance their ball security.

The XFL spent a year developing the game ball with football manufacturer Team Issue in Dallas. The first version was tested with players on the field during the XFL's rules testing last year.

## MAKING THE XFL GAME BALL

Based on feedback from quarterbacks and receivers, adjustments were made and updated versions of the ball were tested over a 10-week period at each 2019 XFL Summer Showcase. Then, after additional feedback from players was received and hours of tape were watched and analyzed, final adjustments were made and the final ball production began in September 2019.

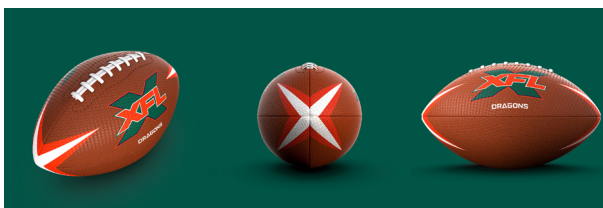

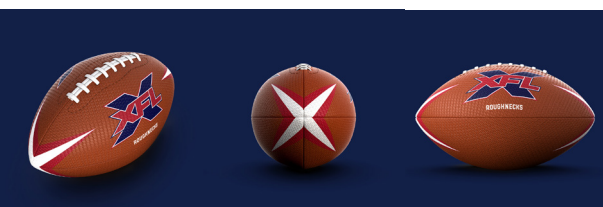
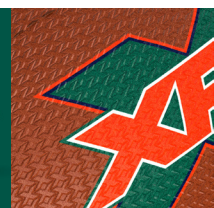

## BOB STOOPS BIO

Stoops boasts a successful legacy and commitment to excellence throughout his career, having posted a winning record in each of his 18 campaigns as a head coach.

He coached 18 seasons at the collegiate level, stepping away from the University of Oklahoma as the winningest coach in school history (190-48, .798). Stoops led the Sooners to a school-record 18 consecutive bowl games, including a National Championship in 2000 in just his second season at the helm.

The Youngstown, Ohio-native coached OU to 10 Big 12 Championships. No other program won more than two conference titles during his 18 years in Norman. Stoops produced 37 All-America First Team selections and 83 NFL Draft picks, while coaching two Heisman Trophy winners. From 1999-2016, no team in the nation had a better winning percentage versus the top 25 or better mark while playing at their home stadium.

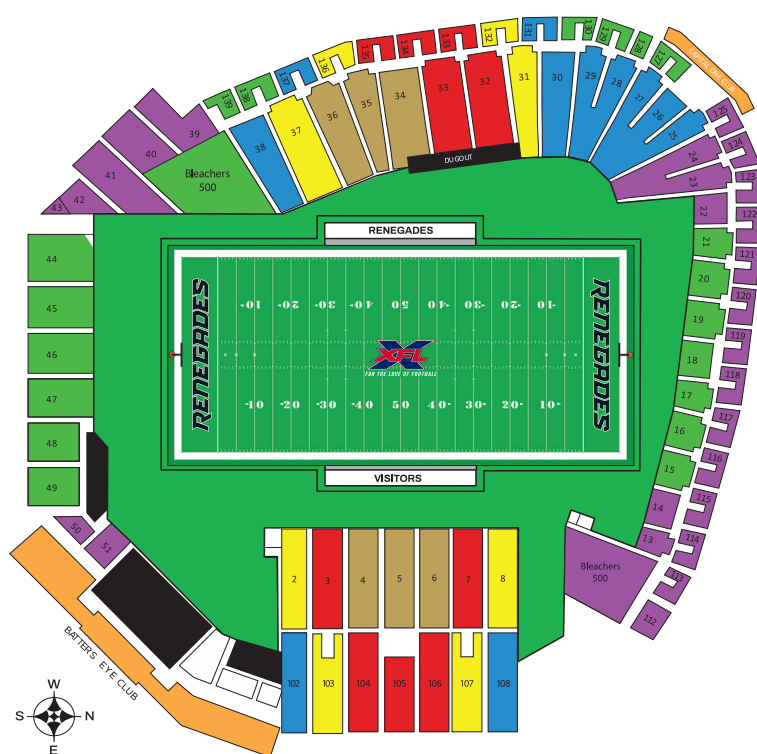

Globe Life Park in Arlington, completed on April 1, 1994, is a state-of-the-art building with the utmost in customer convenience. Yet, the open-air ballpark was designed and built with tradition and intimacy in mind, containing features such as a granite and brick facade and exposed structural steel. Texas architecture is featured throughout, from the outer facade to the Lone Stars in the concourses and on the seat aisles.

This unique complex also includes a four-story office building within the ballpark, a 12-acre lake, and parks and recreation space on the perimeter. Total cost of the project was approximately \$191 million.

To get ready for the Dallas Renegades season, Globe Life Park underwent a \$10 million renovation - completed by Manhattan Construction in just 115 days. The impressive renovation included the following:

- A new seating structure was added in what was formerly left field to accommodate 4,000 more fans and create a more intimate atmosphere.
- 18 rows of seats and the dugout along what used to be the third baseline were demolished.
- A new network television broadcast booth, plus coaches' booths for the home and visiting teams were added at the 50-yard line.
- Seating in the corners of each end zone were reconfigured to accommodate marching bands.
- Over 200 sports light fixtures were relocated/re-aimed to accommodate football and soccer play and broadcast quality.
- Two new locker rooms in what were previously batting cages were added to accommodate multiple events on the same day.
- More than 90,000 square feet of grass and dirt were removed.
- An unmarked, synthetic grass by Shaw Sports Turf was added.

## PEP HAMILTON BIO

Pep Hamilton, Head Coach/GM of the DC Defenders, returns to the city where he played and coached college football [Howard University.]

Hamilton joins the XFL with more than 10 years of coaching experience across five NFL teams: the Cleveland Browns (2016); Indianapolis Colts (2013-15); Chicago Bears (2007-09); San Francisco 49ers (2006) and New York Jets (2003-05).

With the Browns, Hamilton was the associate head coach on offense, and before that, served three seasons as the offensive coordinator for the Colts, who went 22-10 during his first two seasons, winning two AFC South division titles and advancing to the 2014 AFC Championship Game. That season, the Colts set franchise records for passing yards (4,894) and net yards (6,506), with the passing total leading all NFL teams.

During Hamilton's three seasons in Chicago, he worked as the Bears' quarterbacks coach and before that was the San Francisco 49ers offensive assistant and quarterbacks coach. He held the same positions with the New York Jets

for two seasons after beginning his NFL coaching career as the team's offensive quality control coach in 2003.

Hamilton's college career includes two years as the University of Michigan's assistant head coach and passing game coordinator (2017-18), working with head coach Jim Harbaugh. Hamilton joined Harbaugh's staff at Stanford in 2010 as the wide receivers coach, then served as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach (2011-12).

He began his coaching career as the quarterbacks coach at his alma mater, Howard University, for five seasons (1997-2001). Hamilton added the role of offensive coordinator to his responsibilities during his final three seasons. Hamilton earned his bachelor's degree in business in 1997 from Howard where he played quarterback from 1993 to 1996, receiving the school's scholar-athlete award in 1995 and 1996.

He and his wife Nicole have two daughters – April and Elizabeth and a son, Jackson.

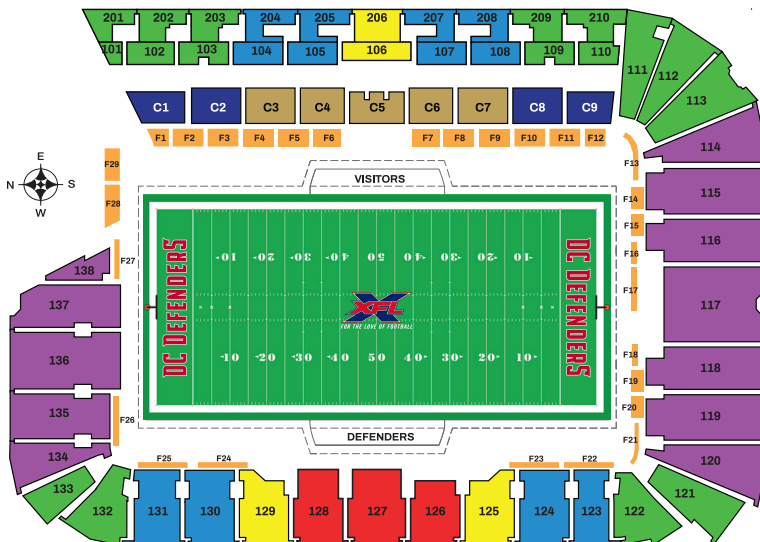

## **JUNE JONES BIO**

June Jones comes to the XFL after two seasons with the CFL's Hamilton Tiger-Cats. Hired as the team's assistant head coach in 2017, he was elevated to interim head coach after an 0-8 start that year. The Tiger-Cats went 6-4 under Jones, and he was appointed head coach for 2018, and took the team to the second round of the playoffs. In December, he stepped down to become associate head coach and offensive coordinator, clearing the way for the promotion of his successor.

Jones is entering his 35th season as a football coach at the high school, college and professional levels. In addition to the Tiger-Cats, he has held head coaching positions at Southern Methodist University (2008-14), the University of Hawaii (1999-2007), and with the NFL's San Diego Chargers (Interim – 1998) and Falcons (1994-96). While leading SMU, Jones was named Conference USA Coach of the Year by The Sporting News in 2009, and Western Athletic Conference Coach of the Year in 1999, 2006 and 2007 while the head coach at Hawaii. In his first season as head coach of the Rainbow Warriors, he led the team to a 9-4 record and a share of the WAC championship. Having finished the prior season 0-12, it was the most significant single-season turnaround in NCAA football history.

After three seasons as the Falcons' offensive coordinator (1991-93), Jones was named head coach in 1994. Despite taking over one of the NFL's worst teams, and having no first or second-round draft picks in his first two years, the Falcons made the playoffs.

In addition to his three seasons as an NFL assistant coach in Atlanta, Jones served as Detroit Lions' quarterbacks and wide receivers coach (1989-90) and Houston Oilers' quarterbacks coach (1987-88). During his 13 years as a coach at the professional level, he worked with Hall of Fame quarterbacks Brett Favre (1991), Warren Moon (1987-88) and Jim Kelly (1984).

Jones began his coaching career in 1983 as quarterbacks coach at Hawaii. After a season, he moved to the United States Football League as wide receivers coach of the Houston Gamblers (1984) and offensive coordinator of the Denver Gold (1985). In 1986, Jones was a co-offensive coordinator of the CFL's Ottawa Rough Riders, joining the team after the USFL folded.

Before coaching, Jones played quarterback for the Falcons for five years (1977-81) and the Argonauts for one season (1982). A native of Portland, Oregon, he signed with the Falcons as a free agent out of Portland State University after earning All-America honors, leading the nation in passing and total offense.

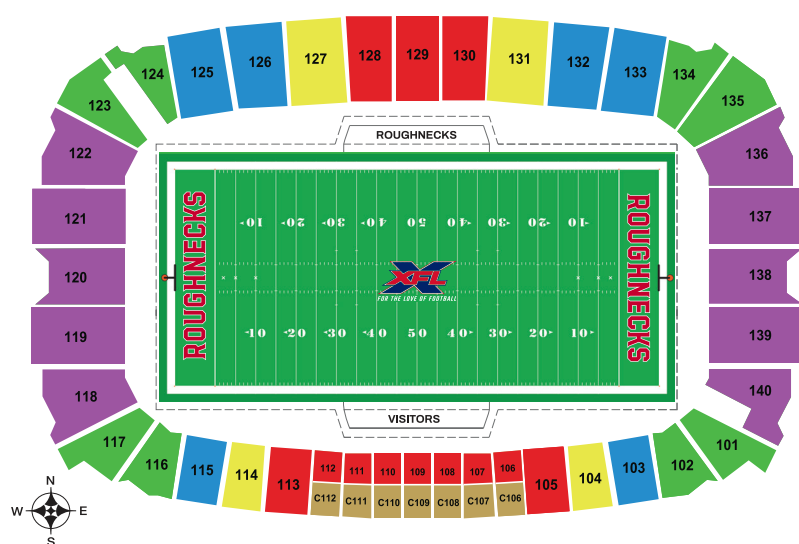

**Locker Room (Visitor):** Located at the west end of the stadium with a field entrance in the northwest corner of TDECU Stadium. Multi-functional locker room can be split and serve two separate teams simultaneously.

**Number of Seats:** A minimum of 40,000 seats.

**Orientation of Stadium:** East-to-west keeping in line with the University's grid system and creating more efficient parking. Sun and shade studies were also conducted to improve the best level of comfort for Houston fans and not affect student-athletes.

**Parking:** Surface lots around the stadium contain 1,114 parking spaces while the stadium parking garage holds 2,268 spaces.

## WINSTON MOSS BIO

Winston Moss was named the inaugural head coach and general manager of the Los Angeles Wildcats on August 5, 2019. The Miami-native is best known for his role as longtime assistant head coach of the Green Bay Packers where he mentored defensive stalwarts including Pro Bowl linebackers A.J. Hawk, Clay Matthews and Julius Peppers.

Moss attended Miami Southridge High School, where he was an all-state linebacker. Moss then joined his hometown University of Miami Hurricanes in 1983, where he was a four-year letterwinner and eventual Miami Sports Hall of Fame inductee in 2015. At Miami, Moss was a part of the 1983 National Championship team that defeated Nebraska in a 31-30 victory in the Orange Bowl — the first in school history.

The Tampa Bay Buccaneers drafted Moss with the 50th pick in the second round of the 1987 NFL Draft. Moss spent four years with the Buccaneers (1987-1990) and started in 60 games. The Buccaneers traded Moss to the Los Angeles Raiders in 1991. Moss played for the Raiders from 1991 to 1994, their last season in Los Angeles before they relocated

back to Oakland. Moss's final stint in the NFL was with the Seattle Seahawks from 1995 to 1997. While Moss posted a strong 431 tackles on the field, his off-the-field conduct also impressed. During his time in the NFL, he was voted Ed Block Courage Award and the NFL Players Association Unsung Heroes Award.

Moss began his coaching career in 2000 with the New Orleans Saints as a defensive quality control coach. The following year, he was promoted to linebackers coach, a position he held through the 2005 season. In 2006, Saints Offensive Coordinator Mike McCarthy left to take a job as the Head Coach in Green Bay. McCarthy then hired Moss as linebackers coach and promoted him to assistant head coach/linebackers in 2007.

Moss was a member of the coaching staff in 2010 that led the Packers to a 31-25 victory over the Pittsburgh Steelers in Super Bowl XLV. Moss coached with Green Bay until 2018.

## FACILITY TIMELINE

**June 2003** – The privately-financed \$150 million project, then known as Home Depot Center, opened as the home of the Los Angeles Galaxy (MLS). It is a multi-use facility home to a 27,000-seat stadium, 8,000-seat tennis stadium, 2,000-seat track & field facility and a 2,450-seat indoor Velodrome.

**Sept. 2003** – On Sept. 21, Germany defeated Sweden 1-0 in extra time in the 2003 FIFA Women's World Cup Final to a crowd of over 26,000.

**Nov. 2003** – The San Jose Earthquakes defeated the Chicago Fire 4-2 in the 2003 MLS Cup. Landon Donovan scored two goals and earned MVP.

**Feb. 2004** – Home Depot Center hosted the first three editions (2004–06) of the USA Sevens, an annual international rugby competition. The first championship match took place on Feb. 15 with Australia defeating Kenya 33-31.

**June 2005** – Hosted the USA Outdoor Track and Field Championships from June 23 -26.

**June 2006** – Canyon Country High School upset Concord De La Salle High School, 27-13, to win the CIF Division I championship in the first State Championship Bowl Games at the Home Depot Center. Home Depot Center hosted championship games from 2006-2014.

**July 2010** – The 2010 CrossFit Games were held on July 16–18. Taking second place on the men's side was Rich Froning Jr., who would go on to win the Games in 2011, 2012, 2013, and 2014. The games were hosted from 2010 - 2017 at the stadium.

**May 2011** – Hosted Andre Ward vs. Arthur Abraham on May 14 for the WBA Super Middleweight World Championship.

**Jan. 2012** – Hosted the AstroTurf NFLPA Collegiate Bowl on Jan. 21, with the National Team beating the American Team 20-14. This was the first college football game held at the stadium.

**June 2013** – Renamed StubHub Center on June 1.

**July 2016** – Hosted the 2016 International Champions Cup match between Paris Saint-Germain and Leicester City on July 30. PSG won the match 4–0 to complete a perfect record in the ICC.

**Aug. 2017** – Transformed a soccer stadium into an NFL-worthy home for the Los Angeles Chargers, by adding 1,000+ new seats and renovations to 43 luxury boxes.

**Sept. 2017** – The Chargers hosted their first home game against the Miami Dolphins. The Dolphins left victorious 19-17.

**Dec. 2018** – Dignity Health lands naming rights in 10-year deal.

**Feb. 16, 2020** – The Los Angeles Wildcats of the XFL will host its first-ever home game against the Dallas Renegades at 12 p.m. PT on ABC.

## KEVIN GILBRIDE BIO

The Guardians will be led by Head Coach and General Manager, Kevin Gilbride. The two-time Super Bowl winning offensive coordinator for the New York Giants will return to the MetLife sidelines after seven years away from the game.

As a head coach, Gilbride spent two seasons leading the San Diego Chargers (1997-98), and five guiding his alma mater, Southern Connecticut State University (1980-84).

Gilbride's coaching career began in the college ranks, first as a linebackers coach at Idaho State (1974-75) and Tufts University (1976-77), and then as defensive coordinator at American International University (1978-79). Following his stint as head coach at SCSU, he spent two seasons at the professional level as quarterbacks/wide receivers coach for the CFL's Ottawa Rough Riders (1985-86), and then returned to college football as passing game coordinator (1987) and offensive coordinator (1988) for East Carolina University. In 1989, Gilbride made the jump to the NFL where he spent the next 25 years on the sidelines as a quarterbacks coach for the Houston Oilers (1989) and New York

Giants (2004-06); offensive coordinator for the Oilers (1990-94), Jacksonville Jaguars (1995-96), Pittsburgh Steelers (1999-2000), Buffalo Bills (2002-03) and Giants (2007-13);

and two seasons as head coach of the Chargers. As quarterbacks coach for the Oilers, he worked with Warren Moon who passed for more than 3,600 yards and 23 touchdowns. A year later, as offensive coordinator, the Oilers scored 405 points, with Moon passing for more than 4,000 yards and 33 touchdowns. As quarterbacks coach for the Giants, he was entrusted with the early NFL career of Eli Manning, and as the team's offensive coordinator, Gilbride and Manning would combine to win a pair of Super Bowl championships (XLII & XLVI).

Gilbride played quarterback and tight end at Southern Connecticut State University, where he earned a Bachelor's degree in Physical Education. He continued his studies at Idaho State University, earning a master's degree in Athletic Administration.

Born in New Haven, Conn., Gilbride resides in Naples, Fla. with his wife, Deborah. The couple has three children, daughters Kelly and Kristen, and son, Kevin M. Gilbride who is the Chicago Bears tight ends coach.

The stadium ranked the #1 Highest Grossing Stadium in the world for non-NFL events in 2010, 2012, 2013, 2014, 2015 & 2016 by Billboard Magazine. In 2011, MetLife was ranked #1 for safety Security magazine's "Security 500" in the Arenas/Stadiums/Leagues/Entertainment division.

The stadium has the ability to transform to accommodate any team or entertainer. These transformations include removable endzones, specific flagpole banners, and signs, exterior uplighting and more.

MetLife stadium leads the way in terms of stadium technology with more than 2,200 HDTVs and four 30'x118' high-definition LED video boards in each corner of the seating bowl. Building-wide Wi-Fi is also provided.

MetLife Stadium was designed by 360 Architects, Ewing Cole, David Rockwell, and Bruce Mau Designs and cost \$1.6 billion and is roughly 2.1 million square feet. Additionally, the David Rockwell Group designed 200+ suites on four separate levels of the stadium, each of which houses about 16-24 people. The MetLife Stadium clubs include the EY Coaches Club, United Rentals Club, Toyota Club, Commissioners Club, and the MetLife 50 Club. There are approximately 28,000 parking spaces and guests can also get to MetLife on the NJ Transit rail station.

# JONATHAN HAYES



## JONATHAN HAYES BIO

Jonathan Hayes was introduced as the first head coach and general manager in St. Louis BattleHawks history on April 18, 2019.

As an NFL player, Hayes was the second-round draft pick of Kansas City in 1985 out of the University of Iowa. He spent nine seasons with the Chiefs before finishing his career with the Steelers (1994-96). Hayes played in 184 NFL games with 153 career receptions for 1718 yards and 13 TDs. He played in three AFC Championship games and one Super Bowl (SB XXX, Pittsburgh vs. Dallas).

In college, Hayes played tight end and linebacker for the Hawkeyes (1981-84), where he was a team captain and earned first-team All-America honors as a senior. He holds a Bachelor's degree in general studies from Iowa.

After his playing career, Hayes reunited with former Iowa teammate Bob Stoops to serve as tight ends coach and special teams coordinator at the University of Oklahoma for four seasons (1999-02). The 2000 Oklahoma team went 13-0 en route to winning the national championship.

Hayes returned to the NFL in 2003, joining the Cincinnati Bengals' as their tight ends coach and worked alongside head coach Marvin Lewis through the conclusion of the 2018 season.

### Personal

Mother was a school teacher and father was in law enforcement, older brother Jay is the defensive coordinator for the BattleHawks.

Hayes resides in Loveland, Ohio with his wife, Kristi, and their four children. Oldest son Jaxson plays in the NBA for the New Orleans Pelicans.

The Dome at America's Center opened on November 12, 1995. The multi-purpose facility has hosted a wide variety of activities including conventions, concerts, consumer shows, exhibits, trade show and conventions. On January 27, 1999, more than 104,000 people filled the complex to participate in the Mass celebrated by Pope John Paul II. The Dome, which added 162,000 square feet of prime exhibit space and more than 60,000 seats to St. Louis' America's Center Convention Complex, making it the first convention facility in the nation built to these exacting state-of-the-art standards of functionality and flexibility. The Dome rises 205 feet over St. Louis and covers 14 acres. In 2005, The Dome hosted one of the most prestigious of American sporting extravaganzas – the Final Four.

## **JIM ZORN BIO**

Seattle and Pacific Northwest legend Jim Zorn was named Seattle Dragons head coach/general manager on February 24, 2019. Zorn brings to the Dragons 25 years of coaching experience, including nine years at the collegiate level (1988-96), 14 years as a pro offensive assistant (1997-2007, 2010-12) and two years as head coach of the Washington Redskins (2008-09). Zorn is the only Redskins head coach to win his first game at Texas Stadium against the rival Dallas Cowboys and in the first season in his offense four starters earned Pro Bowl honors (RB Clinton Portis, TE Chris Cooley, T Chris Samuels and FB Mike Sellers).

Zorn is no stranger to introducing pro football to Seattle. He was the expansion Seattle Seahawks first ever starting quarterback in 1976 and was with the team for nine seasons, earning a spot on the Seahawks Ring of Honor in 1991. He was named the NFLPA's NFC Offensive Rookie of the Year following that initial season and team MVP. He posted three consecutive 3,000-yard seasons and was the first Seahawks QB to record back-to-back 300-plus yard games, a feat he accomplished two times.

Zorn began his pro career in 1975 with the Dallas Cowboys under legendary coach Tom Landry and a draft class which included Randy White, Thomas Henderson and Ed "Too Tall" Jones. A year later he joined the Seahawks before finishing his career with the Green Bay Packers (1985), the Winnipeg Blue Bombers of the Canadian Football League (1986) and the Tampa Bay Buccaneers (1987). He retired as a player following the 1987 season, finishing his career throwing for 21,115 yards.



After his playing career concluded, Zorn began his coaching career overseeing the quarterbacks, wide receivers and kickers at Boise State University from 1988-91. From there, he was offensive coordinator at Utah State from 1992-94 and again overseeing the QBs at the University of Minnesota from 1995-96 where he finished his degree.

Zorn moved into the pro coaching ranks in 1997, returning to Seattle to work with quarterbacks then moved on to Detroit in the same capacity from 1998-2000. He returned to Seattle and Mike Holmgren's staff from 2001-07 where he worked with Matt Hasselbeck who set a then-franchise record in 2003 with 3,841 passing yards. In 2007 Hasselbeck established several Seahawks single-season records and a career high 28 touchdown passes on the way to his third Pro Bowl selection. Following his two seasons as head coach in Washington, Zorn returned as an assistant working for one season in Baltimore [2010] and two seasons with the Kansas City Chiefs [2011-12].

Zorn and his wife, Joy, have three daughters—Rachael, Sarah and Danielle and a son, Isaac.

In 1996, Paul G. Allen obtained an option to purchase the Seattle Seahawks and launched a campaign to win public support for a new world-class football/ soccer stadium and exhibition center. Six years later, the dream became reality as the Seahawks opened the 2002 preseason against the Indianapolis Colts in new Seahawks Stadium, renamed Qwest Field on June 2, 2004. After seven seasons, the field was renamed CenturyLink Field on June 23, 2011. The facility, built atop of the site of the Kingdome, is not only home to the Seahawks, but the stadium accommodates many levels of soccer competition, including Major League Soccer, amateur, international, World Cup and collegiate soccer.

CenturyLink Field is designed with a 68,740 seat capacity, with 5,000 additional seats available for special events, and 1,400 seats for fans with disabilities. With a roof covering 70 percent of the seating area, fans will enjoy wide, comfortable seats with sideline seating a mere 52 feet from the playing field and end-zone seats just 40 feet from the action. The facility also features a dozen elevators and expansive concourses with an ample provision of concessions stands and restrooms.

In addition to having perfect views of the field and surrounding areas, fans experience elements of diversity and culture in part of the Stadium Art Program. In 1998, a request for qualifications yielded a total of 254 responses from around the United States and Canada. After reviewing the full range of submissions, 12 artists and projects were selected. Today, the stadium includes nearly \$2 million worth of art.

68,000 fixed seats – can be expanded to 72,000

63 restrooms (799 toilets/364 urinals) – twice as many as the Kingdome

1,400 seats for people with disabilities and their companions – compared to 70 at the Kingdome

10,000 cubic yards of concrete – equal to a 3' sidewalk from Seattle to Boise, ID

3,756 miles of cable – could reach from Seattle to just beyond the Panama Canal

Over 800 televisions

12 elevators — compared to three at the Kingdome

50 Concession stands/47 Beer Concessions – twice as many per person as the Kingdome

The roof is 760 feet long – the same as three Boeing 747's parked end-to-end

The roof is 210,000 square feet – enough to cover 3.5 football fields

The FieldTurf production used more than 35,000 recycled ground-up tennis shoes and 30,000 recycled ground up tires

The roof contains 5,700 tons of steel – equal to 35 Statues of Liberty or 1,000 Orca whales

100% of the concrete from the Kingdome was processed and recycled (50% built into CenturyLink Field)

Wide concourses offer outstanding views of the Seattle skyline, T-Mobile Park, the Cascades and Mt. Rainier, Puget Sound and the Olympic Mountains.

There is a 2,000 car garage – part of 6,500 spaces near CenturyLink Field.

## **First & Goal Inc.**

In June of 1997, Washington State voters approved a funding package to build a new football/soccer stadium and exhibition center. With that, Paul G. Allen and Football Northwest created First & Goal Inc., an entity that represented the interests of CenturyLink Field in the construction of the new stadium and now manage the stadium and event center on a daily basis.

## MARC TRESTMAN BIO

Marc Trestman was named head coach and general manager of the XFL Tampa Bay franchise on March 5, 2019...He enters his 35th season of coaching at the age of 64 with championship pedigree...Trestman has a reputation as being one of the most keen and innovative offensive minds in professional football...He's a three-time Canadian Football League Grey Cup champion (2009, 2010, 2017) and a two-time Canadian Football League Coach of the Year (2009, 2017)...He enters the 2020 season with an 85-73 (.538) record all-time as a head coach.

Trestman has served in a variety of positions at the major college and professional levels, including head coach of the CFL's Montreal Alouettes (2008-2012) and Toronto Argonauts (2017-2018) as well as the NFL's Chicago Bears (2013-2014)...He led the Alouettes to two Grey Cup titles and the Argonauts to one...He also guided the Alouettes and Bears to the most prolific offensive seasons in team history, including setting Chicago franchise records in total yards, passing yards, completion percentage, passing touchdowns, passer rating, and first downs while setting Montreal franchise records in points scored, passing touchdowns and first downs.

He started his coaching career at the collegiate level as Quarterbacks Coach at the University of Miami, where the team won the national championship in his first year of full-time coaching (1983)...His other coaching stops include: Minnesota Vikings (1985-86; 1990-91), Tampa Bay Buccaneers (1987), Cleveland Browns (1988-1989), San Francisco 49ers (1995-96), Detroit Lions (1997), Arizona Cardinals (1998-2000), Oakland Raiders (2001-03), Miami Dolphins (2004), North Carolina State University (2005-2006) and Baltimore Ravens (2015-16)...Trestman has coached with Bud Grant, Jon Gruden, Jimmy Johnson, Pete Carroll, Tom Moore, Monte Kiffin, and both Jim and John Harbaugh...He has

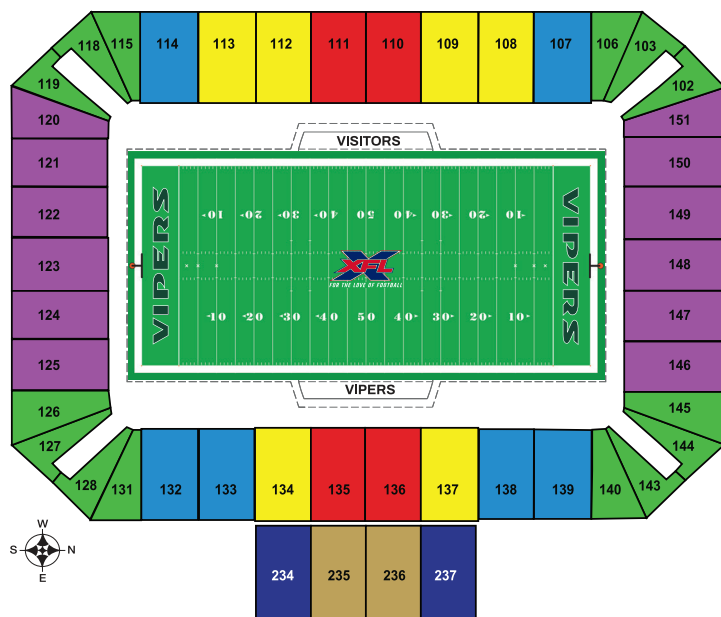

# RAYMOND JAMES STADIUM



The Vipers will be playing their home games at Raymond James Stadium in Tampa, Fla., which is currently home to the NFL's Tampa Bay Buccaneers, the University of South Florida Bulls, and the Outback Bowl...The stadium broke ground in 1996 and hosted its first game on Sept. 20, 1998 – a contest between the Buccaneers and the Chicago Bears.

Official attendance for the stadium is 65,618, but it can hold as many as 75,000 for larger events...Raymond James Stadium has hosted two Super Bowls, including XXXV in 2001 and XLIII in 2009...It will play host to the Super Bowl again in 2021 for Super Bowl LV...Raymond James Stadium saw its largest crowd in stadium history [74,512] when it hosted the 2016 College Football National Championship game between the Alabama Crimson Tide and the Clemson Tigers...Outside of sports, the stadium has hosted numerous large-scale concerts, including artists such as Beyonce, Taylor Swift, Kenny Chesney, NSYNC and others...the largest concert in stadium history was a U2 concert in 2009 that saw over 72,000 people in attendance.

In late 2016, Raymond James Stadium underwent a \$100 million renovation, starting with new high-definition videoboards and ribbon boards...The renovation resulted in a total video display area in excess of 30,000 square feet, which, at the time, was the third-largest of any NFL host venue in the country...Members of the NFL Players Association have consistently rated the field at Raymond James Stadium as the best in the league.
