THE FIRST ALL-STAR GAME

It was in 1933, the year of the Chicago Centennial. The city was strangling in the grip of the Depression. Municipal governments were on the brink of bankruptcy, but a remarkable number of Chicago businessmen invested for a gala, "Century of Progress," which evolved into the famous Chicago "World's Fair."

Ed Kelly, then the mayor of Chicago, approached his friend, Colonel Bertie McCormick, publisher of the *Chicago Tribune*, early in 1933. Kelly thought it would be appropriate if a sports event could be arranged as an adjunct to the Chicago World's Fair.

"We've got the man you want right here," McCormick replied.

And ten minutes later Tribune Sports Editor Arch Ward was in McCormick's office.

Colonel McCormick had some doubts.

"What if nobody shows up?"

Ward was certain he could fill Comiskey Park, the home of the White Sox, and told the publisher, "You can take the losses out of my paycheck."

"If you're that confident we'll underwrite it," McCormick said.

Six months later, baseball's first All-Star Game, matching the best players in the American and National Leagues, was born. The "Game of the Century," as it was billed, was scheduled for July 6th -- a day when eastern teams traveled west and vice-versa -- and Comiskey Park was chosen over Wrigley Field by a coin toss. It was played in ideal weather and drew a paid crowd of 47,595.

Twenty-four future Hall of Famers comprised the first rosters, but few grasped the magnitude of the event. Hall of Famer Joe Cronin, the AL's starting shortstop, said 50 years later, "Although much is being made today of the fact that we played in the 1933 All-Star Game, we also considered it a great honor then because we thought it would be the one and only All-Star Game."

Appropriately, Babe Ruth hit the first All-Star Game home run, a two-run smash that led the American League to a 4-2 victory.

"That's a grand show," said Commissioner Judge Landis, who immediately decreed that the All-Star Game become an annual affair.

"Dad never thought the game would go beyond one year," recalled Tom Ward, Arch's son. "He felt it would be strictly a one-shot thing. He was very surprised."

Ward picked the managers, Connie Mack of the Philadelphia Athletics for the AL, John McGraw of the New York Giants for the NL. The players were chosen by public ballot conducted by 55 newspapers throughout the country, which relayed their tabulations to the Tribune.

Tom Littlewood, who wrote Ward's biography, "Arch - A Promoter Not a Poet," revealed that Ward wasn't the first with the idea. As early as 1915, F.C. Lane, the editor of *Baseball Magazine*, had made a similar proposal. Lane met with the league presidents and some of the club owners but failed to convince them an All-Star Game would be beneficial.

Archibald Burdette Ward was a non-writing sports editor -- his prose was pedestrian, but he was among the outstanding promoters of his time. He also created the College All-Star Football Game and was the architect of the All-America Football Conference, subsequently absorbed by the National Football League.

He was born on December 27, 1886 in Illinois' Kankakee County and was the sports editor of the *Tribune* for 25 years. He died on July 9, 1955 and was buried on the morning of the 22nd All-Star Game.

This season -- 77 years after Arch Ward coordinated the first Major League Baseball All-Star Game -- the event has grown into a spectacular week of events that not only includes the game, but the State Farm Home Run Derby on Gatorade All-Star Workout Day, the XM All-Star Futures Game, the Taco Bell All-Star Legends & Celebrity Softball Game and Major League Baseball All-Star FanFest. Several hundred thousand people will have the opportunity to experience All-Star Week in Anaheim, while more than 100 million fans around the world will tune in or listen to All-Star Week events on television and radio.



ROSTER LIMITS

Each team had 18 players for the first game and 30 of them played, although the American League stayed with its starting lineup - except for pitching changes - until Sam West replaced Babe Ruth defensively in the ninth inning. The standard roster limit was 28 players per team from 1969-1997. The roster limit was increased to 30 players per team in 1998 and remained that way until 2003, when it was increased to 32 players per team. In 2009, a 33rd roster spot was added for each team to carry an additional pitcher. In 2010, rosters were expanded from 33 players to 34, consisting of 21 position players and 13 pitchers.

UMPIRES

From 1933-1948, each league sent two umpires to the All-Star Game. Between 1949-1999, three umpires represented each league. Beginning with the 2000 Midsummer Classic, six Major League Baseball umpires have worked the game. Lon Warneke, who was named to five All-Star teams as a pitcher for Philadelphia and St. Louis, is the only player to also appear in an All-Star Game as an umpire (1952).

MEDIA COVERAGE

Since the first All-Star Game was looked upon as a one-time affair and some viewed it as a *Chicago Tribune* event, the inaugural game was not covered extensively by the newspapers. "Not all of the Major League teams were even represented by writers from their home city," recalled John Carmichael, retired columnist of the *Chicago Daily News* and press box observer at the first game.

For the 2010 All-Star Game, over 2,000 writers, photographers and broadcasters will be credentialed to accommodate the worldwide coverage of the event.

The first televised baseball game did not occur until 1939 when the All-Star Game was already six years old. Network coverage of the All-Star Game began in 1950. The 1950 game at Chicago's Comiskey Park - which was the first extra-inning contest in All-Star Game history - was covered by NBC with Jack Brickhouse announcing. Only three cameras - all black and white - were used. The game was broadcast by 48 stations and was viewed by an estimated 10 million fans.

NBC provided continuous coverage of the All-Star Game from 1950 to 1975. Beginning in 1976, ABC and NBC alternated coverage, with ABC televising during even-numbered years and NBC televising during odd-numbered years. From 1990-1993, CBS provided exclusive coverage of the All-Star Game. In 1994 and 1995, The Baseball Network -- a joint partnership of ABC, NBC and Major League Baseball -- produced coverage of the Midsummer Classic. From 1995-2000, as part of a five-year agreement, NBC Sports broadcasted the All-Star Game in even-numbered years, while FOX televised the Midsummer Classic in odd-numbered years.

This year, FOX Sports will once again provide exclusive domestic coverage of the 81st All-Star Game. In July 2006, FOX signed a seven-year extension to provide regular season, All-Star Game and postseason coverage of Major League Baseball. As part of the agreement, FOX will provide exclusive coverage of the All-Star Game each season from 2007-2013.

Major League Baseball International (MLBI), which works to promote the worldwide growth of baseball through broadcasting, marketing, sponsorship, licensing and game development initiatives, will independently produce the world feed in high and standard definition. Gary Thorne will join former All-Star Rick Sutcliffe to call the action in English. Television crews from ESPN International (worldwide), Fox Sports International, Fuji TV (Japan) and NHK (Japan) will join the MLBI team on site covering the games live. Additionally, news crews from Armed Forces Network (worldwide), Fox Sports (Latin America), Guangdong TV (China) and Rogers Sportsnet (Canada) will converge on Anaheim and file reports from the ballpark.

ESPN will provide exclusive coverage of several other All-Star Week events, including the XM All-Star Futures Game and the Taco Bell All-Star Legends and Celebrity Softball Game on Taco Bell All-Star Sunday and the State Farm Home Run Derby on Gatorade All-Star Workout Day.



Hall of Famer Tony Perez hit a home run in the top of the 15th inning to give the National League a 2-1 victory in the first All-Star Game played in Anaheim in 1967. The 15-inning contest is tied with the 2008 Midsummer Classic at Yankee Stadium as the longest All-Star Game by inning in history.



THIS DATE IN ALL-STAR GAME HISTORY, JULY 13TH

The 2010 All-Star Game will be the 81st Midsummer Classic, and the 12th to be played on the date of July 13th. The American League, who has hosted eight of the previous 11 July 13th games, has a 7-4 advantage in the 11 contests.

1943 - Shibe Park, Philadelphia - A.L., 5-3



The 11th All-Star Game was the first time Philadelphia hosted the Midsummer Classic. It was also the first time the All-Star Game was played at night. Unfortunately, many of the most popular names in baseball, including Joe DiMaggio, Ted Williams and Johnny Mize, were not present because of wartime efforts. It was the only time in the 20th century that a New York Yankee would not play in the All-Star Game.

In the first inning, Stan Musial, in his first of 24 consecutive All-Star Game appearances, knocked in the first run for the National League. The American League answered back in the second inning with a three-run home run from Bobby Doerr before scoring runs in the third and fifth innings. The N.L. rallied to score a run in the seventh inning and received another run from Vince DiMaggio's homer in the ninth. DiMaggio fell a double shy of hitting for the cycle in his three-for-three performance.

Despite outhitting the A.L., the N.L. was unable to deliver the runs and the American League went on to win 5-3, winning their eighth of the 11 All-Star games played.

1948 - Sportsman's Park, St. Louis - A.L., 5-2



The 15th Midsummer Classic was played at Sportsman's Park, the home of both the St. Louis Browns and the St. Louis Cardinals, and it was the second time the All-Star Game was played in the city of St. Louis (also 1940).

The National League had an opportunity to take advantage of an injured American League roster as Joe DiMaggio and Ted Williams were forced into pinch-hitting roles due to their injuries. The N.L. started the scoring early with two runs off Walt Masterson in the first inning, but would not be able to push

across another run in the game. In the second inning, Walter "Hoot" Evans hit a home run for the A.L. in his first All-Star Game plate appearance. In the bottom of the fourth, the A.L. rallied to load the bases before Joe DiMaggio and pitcher Vic Raschi knocked in the three runs to put the A.L. ahead 5-2 for good.

The N.L. tried to keep A.L. hitters off balance with numerous pitching changes, but the end result was the third consecutive victory for the American League. The 1948 All-Star Game was the first in which neither team committed an error during a Midsummer Classic.

1954 - MUNICIPAL STADIUM, CLEVELAND - A.L., 11-9



The 1954 All-Star Game was was the 21st Midsummer Classic and it was the second time that the game had taken place in Cleveland. Municipal Stadium played host with 68,751 fans in attendance, representing the second-highest All-Star Game attendance at the time and currently the third-highest.

The lead was traded back and forth between the teams for most of the game, but with the A.L. trailing by one run in the top of the eighth inning, Dean Stone entered to pitch for the A.L. and threw Red Schoendienst out while he was trying to steal home. In the bottom of the inning, Larry Doby came to the plate as a pinch-hitter and delivered a gametying home run. Later in the inning, after the A.L. had loaded the bases, Nelson Fox came up with a hit that drove in the winning runs for the A.L., ending the N.L.'s four-game winning streak.

Bobby Avila of the A.L. tied the record for most singles in an All-Star Game during the contest with three, while the A.L.'s Al Rosen tied the record for most home runs in an All-Star Game with two. Rosen also tied the record for most RBI with five. The combined 20 runs scored by the two teams also set a record at that time.







1960 (2) - YANKEE STADIUM, NEW YORK - N.L., 6-0

In the summer of 1960, the All-Star Games were played in the form of a double-header. The second game took place in New York and signified the return of Willie Mays to the city where his Major League career began. Mays helped lead the N.L. to a victory, going 3-for-4 with a home run in the third inning. The National League also gathered support from Stan Musial, who had a pinch-hit home run in the seventh inning. Ken Boyer and Eddie Mathews also homered for the continuity. The miching staff combined for a buttout allowing cight



for the senior circuit. The pitching staff combined for a shutout, allowing eight hits in the contest.

The N.L. went on to win 6-0, and it was the first time and only time that they won both All-Star Games in a single season. This Midsummer Classic also represented the eighteenth and final All-Star Game appearance by Ted Williams.

1965 - METROPOLITAN STADIUM, MINNESOTA - N.L., 6-5

The 37th meeting between the American League and the National League was Minnesota's first time hosting the Midsummer Classic. The N.L. lineup was filled with future Hall of Famers and baseball legends, including Willie Mays, Roberto Clemente, Hank Aaron, Willie Stargell, Richie Allen, Joe Torre, Ernie Banks, Pete Rose and Frank Robinson.




Mays started the game off with a lead-off home run that went 415 feet to left field. Mays also had two walks and scored the game-winning run for the N.L. in the seventh inning on an infield single from Ron Santo.

Overall, it was the National League's superior pitching which resulted in their 6-5 victory. Juan Marichal was awarded the Most Valuable Player after pitching three shutout innings. For the first time in All-Star Game history, the N.L. took the Midsummer Classic lead, 18-17-1.

1971 - Tiger Stadium, Detroit - A.L., 6-4

The 43rd Midsummer Classic was the third time the Tigers played host to the All-Star Game, having also hosted the game in 1941 and 1951.





towers over 400 feet from home plate. Frank Robinson also hit a two-run homer, putting the A.L. up 4-3 after three innings. The home run from Robinson was the first time a player had hit a home run for both leagues in All-Star Game history. Roberto Clemente would score the N.L.'s last run in the eighth by hitting a home run in his final All-Star Game appearance.

There were a total of 18 future Hall of Famers to play in the Midsummer Classic, and all six of the home runs hit in the game were hit by future Hall of Famers. The A.L.'s 6-4 victory ended their eight-game losing streak.

1976 - Veterans Stadium, Philadelphia - N.L., 7-1

The 1976 All-Star Game was the third time the A.L. and N.L. met in Philadelphia, but it was the first time the game was played at Veterans Stadium. Philadelphia was chosen as the host site for the Midsummer Classic in honor of America's bicentennial.



The N.L. outhit the A.L. 10-5 and they scored seven runs en route to the 7-1 victory. The N.L. scored early, putting up two runs in the first, highlighted by a Steve Garvey triple. The N.L. added two more runs in the fourth on a two-run homer from George Foster. The only run scored by the A.L. came on a solo home run by Fred Lynn in the fourth inning.

The N.L.'s win was their fifth consecutive victory. Mark Fidrych became only the second rookie to ever start as a pitcher in the All-Star Game, joining Dave Stenhouse, who started the second All-Star Game in 1962.



1982 - Olympic Stadium, Montreal - N.L., 4-1



The 53rd Midsummer Classic was the first time an All-Star Game was played outside of the United States. Olympic Stadium in Montreal was filled with 59,057 fans in attendance, the tenth-highest attended All-Star Game in history.

The American League was able to score a run in the first inning, but was unsuccessful at converting hits into runs over the final eight innings. Rickey Henderson tied the All-Star Game record for most singles in a game with three.

In the second inning, Dennis Eckersley permitted a two-run homer to the N.L.'s Dave Concepcion. The N.L. picked up two more runs in the third and sixth innings, and the game ended with the National League recording their 11th consecutive win over the American League.

1993 - CAMDEN YARDS, BALTIMORE - A.L., 9-3



The American League collected their sixth straight All-Star Game victory in 1993 at Camden Yards in Baltimore, and the game yielded one of the most memorable moments in recent All-Star Game history when imposing left-hander Randy Johnson threw a blazing fastball to the screen with John Kruk at the plate.

The game belonged to Kirby Puckett, who came through with a home run and an RBI-double after failing to collect an extra-base hit in his previous seven All-Star appearances. Puckett's efforts earned him Most Valuable Player honors

and it helped deliver the win the American League and Jack McDowell, who would go on to win the 1993 A.L. Cy Young Award. Puckett became the first player in Minnesota Twins history to win the MVP award. Gary Sheffield, who was traded to the Florida Marlins from the San Diego Padres on June 24th, became the first player from a first-year expansion team to be elected to the All-Star Game starting lineup.

1999 - Fenway Park, Boston - A.L., 4-1



The 1999 All-Star Game at Fenway Park was a celebration of baseball's past and present, and played host to one of the most touching scenes in All-Star Game history.

The pregame ceremonies featured the introduction of 41 baseball legends, including Stan Musial, Hank Aaron and Willie Mays, but the largest ovation belonged to 80-year-old Boston hero Ted Williams. Escorted on a golf cart,

Williams threw out the ceremonial first pitch as stars of the past and present surrounded him for an emotional embrace. Moments later, Red Sox ace Pedro Martinez took the mound and etched his name into All-Star history by striking out the first four batters he faced, and five total in his two innings of work.

The American League capitalized on Pedro's energy and scored two in the bottom of the first inning. The runs proved to be more than enough as the A.L. went on to defeat the National League 4-1, with Martinez picking up the win and MVP honors in front of the hometown fans. The teams combined for 22 strikeouts, an All-Star record for a nine-inning game.





2004 - MINUTE MAID PARK, HOUSTON - A.L., 9-4

The 75th Midsummer Classic was a struggle from the beginning for the National League. Roger Clemens started for the N.L. in front of his hometown fans on two days rest and allowed a two-run homer to Manny Ramirez in the first inning, followed by a three-run shot from eventual Most Valuable Player Alfonso Soriano. The six-run inning was the most



one team had scored in an inning in an All-Star Game since the A.L. tallied a record seven runs in the third inning in 1983. It was also only the second time in All-Star history that a team has scored six runs in a single inning.


The six-run deficit was too much for the N.L., especially after David Ortiz added a 423-foot two-run blast off Carl Pavano in the sixth inning. The N.L. scored three runs in the fourth inning with an RBI-double from Edgar Renteria and a two-run double by Albert Pujols. Mark Mulder picked up the victory for the American League, their seventh consecutive All-Star Game victory. At 73-years-old, National League manager Jack McKeon became the oldest manager to manage an All-Star Game after becoming the oldest manager to manage a World Series in 2003 with the Florida Marlins.

ALL-STAR GAMES IN ANGELS HISTORY

The 2010 Midsummer Classic marks the third All-Star Game played at Angel Stadium. The Angels previously played host to the All-Star Game in 1967 and 1989 when the stadium was called Anaheim Stadium. The American League and National League have split the previous two All-Star Games in Anaheim.

JULY 11, 1967 — ANAHEIM STADIUM, ANAHEIM — N.L., 2-1 (15)

The first All-Star Game in Anaheim was a game for the ages -- a 15-inning, three-hour and 41-minute affair that featured 20 future Hall of Famers.





tied heading into the 15th inning when Cincinnati third baseman Tony Perez hit a solo home run off Oakland'd Jim "Catfish" Hunter to give the N.L. a 2-1 lead. Mets rookie Tom Seaver came in to preserve Don Drysdale's win as Perez went on to collect Most Valuable Player honors, giving the N.L. their second consecutive 2-1 extra-innings victory. Along with the 2008 Midsummer Classic at Yankee Stadium in New York, the 1967 All-Star Game is one of the two longest games by innings.

July 11, 1989 — Anaheim Stadium, Anaheim — A.L., 5-3

The 1989 Midsummer Classic turned into a one-man show as Kansas City's Bo Jackson rare combination of power and speed was on display for the entire game.



In the top of the first inning, with two outs and two men on base in scoring position, Jackson raced from left field to left-center to catch a Pedro Guerrero liner, keeping the National League off the scoreboard. Jackson then led off the bottom of the first inning with a massive 448-foot homer to center field off San Francisco's Rick Reuschel. He later swiped second base, joining Willie Mays as the only players ever to hit a home run and steal a base in an All-Star Game.

The American League went on to win 5-3, with 42-year old Nolan Ryan picking up the win and Jackson taking home the Most Valuable Player trophy. The game marked the first time the A.L. had won back-to-back All-Star Games since 1957-58.

Angel Stadium — Home of the Los Angeles Angels of Anaheim

The Angels have called 2000 Gene Autry Way their home for 32 years since the stadium, then known as Anaheim Stadium, opened in 1966.

The stadium originally seated 43,204, but underwent construction between 1979 and 1980 to accommodate the National Football League's Los Angeles Rams. The modifications allowed room for 65,158 fans for the 1981 baseball season. Following the Rams departure to St. Louis, renovations to the stadium began once again in 1996 and were completed in time for Opening Day in 1998. On April 1st, 43,311 fans watched as the Angels beat the Yankees, 4-1, at the team's newly renovated ballpark, renamed Edison International Field.

Upon its transformation to a baseball-only facility, the stadium was built with convenience, comfort, and courtesy. Some unique amenities included terraced bullpens, widened concourses, new restroom and concession areas, a modernized press box and broadcast booth, family oriented seating sections, state of the art suites and more.



Sunday, October 22, 2002 was an exceptional day at the stadium for the Angels and their fans as the club won its first ever World Series, defeating the San Francisco Giants in Game Seven at home. It was the eighth consecutive time a seventh game had been won by the home team dating back to 1982.





Prior to the 2004 season, the park adopted the name Angel Stadium, which it is still called today. 2006 marked a record year for the Angels as they posted a home attendance of 3,406,790, and in 2009, the Angels recorded the seventh consecutive year of attendance numbers totaling over three million. They finished the 2009 season with a home attendance of 3,240,374, the second-highest in the American League and fifth-highest in the Majors.



Anaheim Stadium — 1989

Angel Stadium of Anaheim has been the host of the Midsummer Classic on two previous occasions, hosting in 1967 and 1989. The 38th and 60th annual All-Star Games were particularly special because both hold a piece of baseball history. On July 11, 1967, the National League beat the American League, 2-1, in a game that remained tied at 1-1 until the 15th inning. The contest was also the longest Midsummer Classic ever at the time, and it remains as one of just two All-Star Games to last 15 innings. Twenty-two years later, on July 11, 1989, with President Ronald Reagan looking on, the American League claimed a 5-3 victory over the National League as the designated hitter was used for the first time in an All-Star Game.








STATE FARM HOME RUN DERBY



MOST VALUABLE PLAYER AWARD

At the conclusion of the 81st All-Star Game, the Ted Williams Most Valuable Player will be presented the Arch Ward Trophy. The award is now presented by Chevrolet.

Most Valuable Player honors of the Midsummer Classic were dedicated in memory of 18-time All-Star Ted Williams, who passed away on July 5, 2002.

The Arch Ward Trophy is named after the late *Chicago Tribune* Sports Editor who convinced his superiors and baseball officials that a match between the greatest players of the American and National Leagues would be a fitting attraction to the 1933 World's Fair in Chicago.

The All-Star Game MVP award was first presented in 1962. Known as the Arch Ward Award until 1969, it was renamed the Commissioner's Trophy in 1970. In 1985, Commissioner Peter Ueberroth returned the trophy's original name in honor of the game's founder.

In the 44-year history of the award, four players have won the honor twice: Willie Mays (1963, 1968), Steve Garvey (1974, 1978), Gary Carter (1981, 1984), and Cal Ripken, Jr. (1991, 2001). Ken Griffey (1980) and Ken Griffey Jr. (1992) are the only father-son combination in All-Star history to win the award. Sandy Alomar, Jr. (1997) and Roberto Alomar (1998) are the only brothers to win the award. Last year's winner was Tampa Bay Rays outfielder Carl Crawford, who made a game-saving grab in left field in the bottom of the seventh inning of a 3-3 game, robbing Colorado Rockies slugger Brad Hawpe of a home run.

Only two players have been selected MVP from the losing team - Brooks Robinson (1966) and Carl Yastrzemski (1970). No MVP Award was given in 2002.





NOTES: The American League won its seventh straight All-Star Game, the third-longest winning streak in All-Star Game history, and they are now unbeaten in the last 13 games (12-0-1) since the N.L. win in 1996 at Philadelphia. Each of the A.L.'s last four victories have come by a single run, matching the longest run of one-run decisions in All-Star Game history (The N.L. won four straight one-run games from 1965-68). Curtis Granderson tripled in his first career All-Star at-bat in the eighth inning, the first All-Star triple since Carlos Beltran in the sixth inning of the 2007 contest. The A.L. retired 18 consecutive batters beginning with the final out in the second inning and ending with a walk to Adrian Gonzalez with two outs in the eighth inning, representing the second-longest string of consecutive batters retired in All-Star Game history (The N.L. retired 20 straight A.L. batters in 1968). Mariano Rivera recorded his fourth All-Star save, the most in history. The two teams combined for just eight strikeouts, the fewest in an All-Star Game since 1962 (also eight). No home runs were hit in the game for the first time since 1999, which was also the last time no player had more than one hit. The game lasted just 2:31, the shortest Midsummer Classic by time since 1988, a 2:26 contest in Cincinnati.



Tampa Bay Rays outfielder Carl Crawford was selected as the Ted Williams Most Valuable Player for the 80th All-Star Game after robbing Colorado's Brad Hawpe of a home run in the seventh inning of a 3-3 game. Crawford was the first Tampa Bay Ray to ever be selected as the All-Star Game MVP, and the first position player to win the award without scoring or driving in a run in the game.





PITCHING FAST FACTS

- * Three pitchers have made All-Star Game starts for both leagues: Vida Blue (A.L. 1971 & 1975, N.L. 1978), Roger Clemens (A.L. 1986 & 2001, N.L. 2004) and Randy Johnson (A.L. 1995 & 1997, N.L. 2000 & 2001).
- * Four rookies have been named the starting pitcher for an All-Star Game: Dave Stenhouse (1962-Game 2), Mark Fidrych (1976), Fernando Valenzuela (1981) and Hideo Nomo (1995).
- * The most consecutive All-Star Game starts by a pitcher is three by Lefty Gomez from 1933-1935 and Robin Roberts from 1953-1955.
- * The New York Yankees have had 11 different pitchers start in the Midsummer Classic. The Cincinnati Reds, Los Angeles Dodgers and St. Louis Cardinals are tied for the second most with eight different pitchers.
- * The Philadelphia Phillies pitching staff started six consecutive times from 1950 to 1955. New York Yankees pitchers have started four consecutive times (1937-1940).
- * Don Drysdale, Lefty Gomez and Robin Roberts are tied for the most All-Star Game starts with five apiece.
- * The first All-Star Game RBI was collected by a pitcher. Lefty Gomez singled in Jimmie Dykes in the second inning of the 1933 Midsummer Classic.

2010 MIDSEASON REVIEW

(Through July 3, 2010)



April 4: The Yankees and Red Sox open the 2010 season with the first "Opening Night" game in Fenway Park history. The 9-7 Boston victory is the 30th time the two clubs meet to begin a season.

April 5: In his first Major League at-bat, 20-year old Braves rookie Jason Heyward hits a three-run home run to spark Atlanta to a 16-5 victory over the Cubs in the season opener...Heyward becomes the sixth Braves player to homer in his debut and the fourth to do so in his first plate appearance.

April 6: Mark Ellis hits a game-ending, two-out RBI-single in the bottom of the 10th inning to lift Oakland to a 2-1 victory over the Mariners.

April 8: Arlington native Vernon Wells hits his fourth homer in three games as the Blue Jays rally for three runs in the ninth inning to stun the Rangers 3-1...Wells finishes the series 6-for-10 with seven RBI and becomes the first Jays player to homer in each of the first three games of a season.

April 9: Sparking a six-run third inning for Arizona, Chris Young hits his second homer in two games and second-career grand slam, leading the D-backs to a 9-1 win over Pittsburgh...Young also matches a careerhigh with five RBI.

April 10: Ryan Howard, Shane Victorino and Jayson Werth drive in three runs apiece and the Phillies offense rolls to a 9-6 win over Houston that sent the Astros to their worst start in 27 years since the 1983 team lost its first nine games...the Phillies finish with 11 hits and reach double-digit hit totals in their first five games for the first time since 1926.

April 12: After 28 seasons inside the Metrodome, the Twins break in Target Field by beating the Boston Red Sox 5-2...Jason Kubel hits the first home run and Carl Pavano earns the first win at the new ballpark.

April 13: Greg Smith wins for the first time in 19 months as the Rockies beat the Mets 11-3...Smith (1-1) strikes out eight batters over seven innings, allowing two runs and six hits for his first Major League win since September 6, 2008, for Oakland against Baltimore.

April 14: In a four-hour, 57-minute marathon, the D-backs outlast the Dodgers in the 11th inning when Chris Young hits a run-scoring single with the bases loaded, and Justin Upton and Stephen Drew homer.

April 15: Ben Sheets, who missed all of the 2009 season recovering from elbow surgery, gets his first win since September 2008 in Oakland's 6-2 victory over the Orioles...the 31-year-old right-hander pitches 6.0 scoreless innings, allowing five hits with four strikeouts and three walks.

April 16: After homering his first time up, Andre Ethier hits his first career grand slam in the Dodgers 10-8 victory over the Giants.

April 17: Ubaldo Jimenez pitches the first no-hitter in the Colorado Rockies' 18-year history and the first in the Majors in the 2010 season, getting help from a spectacular catch by Dexter Fowler in the seventh inning of a 4-0 win over the Braves...the Padres, Mets and Rays are the three remaining franchises without a no-hitter.







April 18: A 10-run first inning, which lasts 14 batters and 28 minutes long, sends Milwaukee to an 11-7 victory over Washington...prior to the game, the Brewers hadn't scored more than eight runs in a game this season.

April 20: Lance Berkman makes his season debut and the Astros get their fourth win in five games after an 0-8 start...Jason Michaels hits a two-run, pinch-hit homer in the eighth inning after Kaz Matsui's sacrifice bunt scored the go-ahead run leading to Houston's 7-5 victory over the Marlins...Berkman doubles and drives in two runs on groundouts to help the Astros to their first home win of the season...Florida's Jorge Cantu continues his 18-game hitting streak with a home run and two RBI.

April 21: Jon Garland, the San Diego's top off-season acquisition, wins his first game with 7.0 strong innings to lead the Padres to a 5-2 win over San Francisco, giving them their sixth straight win...the Padres are now 10-2 at home against the Giants over the past two seasons.

April 22: The Tampa Bay Rays defeat the Chicago White Sox, 10-2, capping a 9-1 road trip...the Rays are now 12-4 overall, the best start in their 13-year history.

April 24: Jorge Cantu's 21-game hitting streak comes to an end when he goes hitless in four at-bats in the Rockies 8-1 win over the Marlins.

April 25: The Colorado Rockies beat the Florida Marlins 8-4 in an emotional win following the untimely passing of the club's president, Keli McGregor...prior to the game, the Rockies held a memorial service in front of a crowd of 35,883 at Coors Field...McGregor's wife and children all threw out ceremonial first pitches while donning jerseys with the number 88, the number their father wore as a tight end at Colorado State.

April 26: Hideki Matsui singled in the fifth inning in the Angels 5-2 win against the Indians reaching his 1,000th Major League hit...Matsui's first big league hit was an RBI-single against Roy Halladay in his first at-bat on March 31, 2003 with the New York Yankees at Toronto.

April 27: Ryan Doumit hits a grand slam and Ronny Cedeno has a solo homer off Trevor Hoffman in a fiverun ninth inning to help the Pirates snap a 22-game losing streak at Miller Park with a 7-3 victory over the Brewers...Milwaukee's home winning streak against Pittsburgh was the longest by one team over another since the Indians beat the St. Louis Browns/Baltimore Orioles 27 consecutive times from 1952-54.

April 28: With two outs in the ninth inning, Howie Kendrick shocks the Indians by laying down a bunt, bringing in Torii Hunter to give the Angels a 4-3 victory...Hunter tied the game with a three-run homer in the sixth.

April 29: The San Diego Padres tied a team record with seven straight singles during a five-run fifth inning in their 9-0 win over the Milwaukee Brewers...the win marked the Padres' seventh straight victory at home and the club's thirteen hits were all singles, including pitcher Wade LeBlanc's career-high third hit of the game.

May 1: Rookie catche, Josh Donaldson gets his first Major League hit in the form of a two-run homer helping the Athletics snap a four-game losing streak with a 4-3 win over the Blue Jays...Donaldson was called up from Triple-A one day prior when Kurt Suzuki was placed on the disabled list.

May 2: In his first Major League win, Jhoulys Chacin allows one hit in 7.0 scoreless innings as the Rockies avoid a three-game sweep with a 4-1 victory over the Giants...Chacin strikes out seven and doesn't allow a hit until Matt Downs' two-out double in the fifth...the Rockies earn a rare victory in San Francisco's waterfront ballpark, where Colorado wins for only the third time in the last 12 games.

May 3: Cesar Valdez records a win in his Major League debut as the Diamondbacks beat the Astros 9-1...after laboring through 60 pitches in just the first two innings, Valdez allows one run in 5.0 innings, giving up five hits and walking three.

May 4: The Tigers lose to the Twins, 4-3 after learning just hours before that their beloved former announcer, Ernie Harwell, passed away at age 92 after a long battle with cancer...he called Tigers games for 42 years of his brilliant 55-year career and became one of the most treasured sports figures in Michigan history...the Twins announced the news to the Target Field crowd during the seventh-inning stretch, putting a picture of his smiling face on the big screen...Twins' fans saluted him with a warm standing ovation.

May 5: Matt Garza becomes the American League's first, five-game winner as the Rays beat the Mariners 8-3 at Safeco Field...Garza permits five hits and two runs in 8.0 innings of work...the victory brought the Rays to an 11-1 record on the road, a Major League-best start away from home since the 2003 Yankees also started 11-1.

May 6: Andre Ethier hits a grand slam in the ninth inning and the Dodgers beat the Brewers 7-3...it was Ethier's second game-ending hit of the season and 11th since the start of 2008, the most in the Majors during that stretch...Ethier has been up twice with bases loaded this season, hitting a grand slam each time.

ANGEL STADIUM, ANAHEIM







May 7: Jered Weaver keeps the Mariners hitless into the seventh inning and Ryan Budde gets his first career home run in the Angels' 8-0 victory over Seattle, ending a seven-game losing streak...Weaver keeps the first 22 Mariners hitless with Budde catching him for the first time in a regular-season game...in the seventh inning, Ken Griffey Jr. recorded one of two hits against the hurler with a single up the middle.

May 8: Hideki Matsui reaches his 1,500th career RBI when he singles home Bobby Abreu as the Angels beat the Mariners 4-3, and Brian Fuentes gets his first save in two weeks and fourth in five opportunities...Matsui becomes the ninth Japanese player to reach the milestone.

May 9: Dallas Braden pitches the 19th perfect game in Major League history, shutting down the Tampa Bay Rays and leading the Athletics to a 4-0 win...it is the sixth no-hitter in Oakland history, the first in 42 years, since Hall of Famer Jim "Catfish" Hunter threw a gem in 1968 against the Minnesota Twins.



May 10: Martin Prado hits his first career grand slam (16th career home run) and Tommy Hanson strikes out eight in 8.0 scoreless innings as the Braves beat the Brewers 8-2...the Braves had not hit a grand slam, prior to Prado's shot, since July 25, 2008.

May 12: Miguel Olivo, who entered the Rockies game against the Phillies having two hits in his last 28 atbats, blasts his first career game-winning hit over the left field wall at Coors Field, giving Colorado a 4-3 victory...Olivo's second career five-hit game included three hits off Phillies ace Roy Halladay.

May 13: In a game called after 8.0 innings due to inclement weather, Ryan Zimmerman has a career game, blasting two homers and driving in a career-high six runs to lead the Nationals to a 14-6 win over the Rockies...both of Zimmerman's homers come off of Jhoulys Chacin, who entered the contest with a streak of 15.1 scoreless innings.

May 14: Alex Rodriguez hits his 19th career grand slam, moving past Frank Robinson into sole possession of seventh place with his 587th home run, powering the Yankees over the Twins 8-4...Rodriguez ties Eddie Murray for third in career slams, trailing only Lou Gehrig (23) and Manny Ramirez (21).

May 15: The Toronto Blue Jays beat the Texas Rangers 6-0 and Ricky Romero gets his first career shutout...Romero strikes out 12 while throwing a five-hitter and Jose Bautista hits two home runs at the plate...Romero lowers his ERA to 2.88 and matched his career-best for strikeouts, while extending his unbeaten streak to five starts.

May 16: The Florida Marlins complete a rare four-game sweep of the New York Mets with a 10-8 victory...two Mets errors help the Marlins score four unearned runs en route to a 7-0 lead...New York cut the margin to 7-6 before Chris Coghlan culminated a 12-pitch at-bat with a three-run, pinch-hit homer in the seventh inning...the four-game sweep was the Marlins first since August 2006.

May 17: Alex Rodriguez hits a game-tying home run off of Jonathan Papelbon in the ninth inning igniting a dramatic 11-9 victory for the Yankees over the Red Sox...the win comes with Marcus Thames' third gameending hit when he connects for a two-run shot just moments after Rodriguez' homer...the Red Sox hit five homers but still lose their eighth consecutive game at Yankee Stadium, their longest road skid against New York since dropping eight straight from 1960-61.

May 19: Mets outfielder Angel Pagan has a monumental night at Nationals Park, hitting an inside-the-park home run and starting a triple play in a 5-3 loss to the Nationals...Pagan becomes the first player in 55 years to accomplish both feats in the same game...despite his accomplishments, the Mets lose for the ninth time in 11 games...Pagan's homer was the first in Nationals Park history and his catch in the fifth inning led to the Mets' first triple play since 2002.

May 20: Ken Griffey Jr. comes through with a pinch-hit, game-winning single, giving Seattle a 4-3 victory over Toronto, and ending a five-game skid...the hit was Griffey's 10th career game-ending hit.





May 21: Jason Kubel and the Twins batter Milwaukee in a 15-3 victory, the Brewers' 10th loss in the last 11 games...Kubel drives in four runs and draws one of eight walks handed out by the Brewers...the Twins, who have baseball's best Interleague record since 2006 at 54-19, are 18-7 against the Brewers during that time, and have outscored them 173-102 in that span.

May 23: Cody Ross hits two of Florida's five homers and Josh Johnson pitches 6.0 sharp innings to help Florida defeat the White Sox 13-0...Ronny Paulino, Dan Uggla, and Jorge Cantu also go deep for the Marlins, who snap a three-game losing streak...Cantu goes 3-for-3 and scores three of the team's seasonhigh 13 runs...Florida has a season-high 18 hits, while Johnson and the bullpen pitch their third shutout.

May 24: Omar Vizquel moves into a tie with Hall of Famer Luis Aparicio for the second-most career hits by a shortstop as the White Sox beat the Indians 7-2, snapping a five-game losing streak...Vizquel, who wears number 11 like his idol, singled in the fifth inning for his 2,764th hit, tying Aparicio...Vizquel's hit total as a shortstop is second only to New York Yankees star Derek Jeter, who entered the week with 2,782.

May 25: Randy Wolf pitches 7.0 scoreless innings, Ryan Braun and Rickie Weeks homer, and Milwaukee snaps an eight-game home losing streak with a 6-1 victory over the Astros...the Brewers, who avoided their longest skid at home in 14 years, had lost 11 of the past 13 overall.

May 26: Ubaldo Jimenez improves to 9-1 and continues his dominant start to the season, extending his current scoreless streak to 16.1 innings and dropping his ERA to 0.88, the best in the Majors...his nine wins also lead the Majors...the hurler throws 8.0 shutout innings, helping the Rockies to a 7-3 win over the D-backs. May 28: The Cincinnati Reds offense continues to stay hot and Sam LeCure records a 15-6 win in his Major League debut versus the Houston Astros...the Reds have homered in 17 straight games, tied for the thirdlongest in club history...the victory puts them nine games above .500 for the first time in four years.

May 29: Roy Halladay throws the 20th perfect game in Major League history as the Philadelphia Phillies beat the Florida Marlins 1-0...Halladay strikes out 11 as a crowd of 25,086 cheer him on until he gets Ronny Paulino to hit a grounder to third for the 27th and final out...the gem was the second perfect game this month, joining Dallas Braden, who did it for Oakland in Tampa on May 9th.



May 30: Max Scherzer returns from a Minor League assignment with 14 strikeouts in 5.2 shutout innings, helping the Tigers beat the Athletics 10-2, ending a four-game losing streak...Scherzer allows two hits, walks four and hits a batter in his first game back...the right-hander fell just two strikeouts shy of Mickey Lolich's team record despite being taken out in the sixth inning.

May 31: Cody Ross hits a three-run home run to spark Florida's biggest inning of the season and Cameron Maybin hits an inside-the-park homer as the Marlins erase an early four-run deficit to beat the Brewers 13-5...Chris Coghlan leads off the seven-run sixth with a single, then adds a two-run triple later in the inning. June 1: Hometown kid Neil Walker of the Pittsburgh Pirates hits his first Major League home run, a tworun shot to left-center field, putting the club ahead of the Chicago Cubs in the eighth, leading to a 3-2 victory...the win is the seventh time the Pirates beat the Cubs this season.

June 2: With two outs in the ninth inning, Armando Galarraga is one out away from recording the 21st perfect game in Major League history before allowing an infield hit to Cleveland's Jason Donald.

June 3: Felix Hernandez leads the Mariners to a 4-1 victory over the Twins, snapping a personal four-game losing streak...in his 150th career start and first win since April, "King Felix" strikes out nine and walks one...in the eighth inning, Hernandez strikes out four Twins batters, marking the third time in Mariners' history a pitcher has struck out four in an inning.









June 4: Arizona breaks a 10-game losing streak with a 7-6 victory over Colorado after Ryan Roberts hits a pinch-hit RBI-single in the ninth...the D-backs also break a string of 31.0 consecutive scoreless innings when Justin Upton blasts a 454-foot, two-run homer in the bottom of the first inning.

June 5: Tommy Hunter leads the Rangers to a 6-1 victory over the Rays after being called up from Triple-A Oklahoma earlier in the day...Hunter pitches a five-hitter in his debut, striking out four and doesn't issue a walk...Hunter began the season on the 15-Day Disabled List because of a left oblique strain he sustained in spring training, and he began a minor league rehab stint on April 28th.

June 6: The Rockies defeat the Diamondbacks 3-2, but Ubaldo Jimenez loses his scoreless innings streak after a franchise record 33.0 innings...he gives up his second home run of the season to Conor Jackson in the eighth inning; marking Arizona's first run against Jimenez in 27.0 innings dating back to August 2009. June 8: The highly anticipated debut of Stephen Strasburg exceeds expectations as he strikes out 14, leading the Nationals to a 5-2 victory over the Pirates in front of a sold-out crowd at Nationals Park...last year's number one overall draft pick allows four hits, two earned runs and doesn't walk a batter through 8.0 innings...his 14 strikeouts are the most in a Major League debut since J.R. Richard fanned 15 in 1971 and ties him with Max Scherzer of the Tigers for most in a game this season...Strasburg strikes out 10 Pirates in a row and stuns the crowd when he strikes out the side in his final inning on just 13 pitches.

June 9: Derrek Lee achievs a career milestone by hitting his 300th home run in the fifth inning against the Brewers...Lee is the seventh player on the Chicago Cubs to reach this achievement and the 126th player in MLB history...his two-run homer helped carry the Cubs to a 9-3 win over the Brewers.

June 10: Russell Branyan of the Cleveland Indians hits a walk-off single to shallow right field in the bottom of the ninth with two outs and the bases loaded...giving the Indians an 8-7 victory over the Red Sox.

June 11: The Rockies and Blue Jays suffer through a cold and rainy two-hour delay...Rockies pitcher Ubaldo Jimenez struggles throughout the game, but his teammates lead the Rockies to a 5-3 victory over Toronto...Jimenez receives his 12th win of the season.

June 12: Cleveland's rookie catcher Carlos Santana hits his first career homer off Nationals pitcher J.D. Martin for the second hit of his career.

June 13: Cubs hurler Ted Lilly brings a no-hitter into the ninth inning, but gives up a lead-off single to Juan Pierre of the Chicago White Sox before being taken out of the game.

June 16: In the eighth inning of a game between the Rangers and Marlins, Michael Young breaks the Rangers' club record with his 1,748th career hit, replacing Ivan Rodriguez as the all-time leader.

June 17: The Rockies score three first-inning runs off Francisco Liriano, which proves to be more than enough for Ubaldo Jimenez...Jimenez goes 8.0 innings, allowing just one run and striking out four to run his season record to 13-1...in the eighth inning, Rockies shortstop Troy Tulowiztki leaves the game after being hit by a pitch on his left wrist...the injury will sideline him for nearly two months.

June 18: Manny Ramirez makes his return to Fenway Park as a Los Angeles Dodger to a mixed reaction from the Boston faithful and goes 1-for-5 in the series opener...his old partner in crime, David Ortiz, slugs a two-run homer in the first to spark the Red Sox bats, and ex-Dodger Adrian Beltre adds another two-run shot in the sixth as Boston goes on to beat the Dodgers 10-6.

June 19: After trailing 9-4 after eight frames, the Minnesota Twins pounced on the Phillies in the ninth, scoring five runs to force the game into extra innings...after matching solo shots from Drew Butera and Ross Gload in the 10th, the Twins took the lead for good in the 11th as Jon Rauch went 2.0 innings to pick up his second win of the year...in Boston, Manny Ramirez hits a solo shot over the Green Monster, but the Red Sox beat the Dodgers yet again, this time on a walk-off single by Dustin Pedroia.

June 20: After splitting the first two games in Yankee Stadium, Johan Santana and CC Sabathia face-off in a rubber match between the Mets and Yankees...the pitchers duel is interrupted when Mark Teixeira launches a grand slam off Santana in the third inning, which provided all the runs necessary as the Yanks go on to win 4-0...in Florida, Josh Johnson defeats the Rays to run his streak to eight consecutive starts allowing one earned run-or-less.

June 21: A.J. Burnett yields six first-inning runs behind home runs from Justin Upton, Adam LaRoche and Mark Reynolds as the Yankees fall 10-4 to the Diamondbacks in the desert...Rodrigo Lopez goes 8.0 strong innings, giving up three runs to pick up his third win of the year...after both teams bring home a run in the ninth inning, the Reds and Athletics head to extras in Oakland...powered by home runs from Joey Votto and Scott Rolen in the 10th, the Reds put four runs on the board to beat the A's 6-4.

June 22: Jaime Moyer ties Robin Roberts' mark for career home runs allowed with 505...Moyer rebounds and shuts down Cleveland as he permits one earned run in 8.0 innings of work to run his record to 8-6 on the season.





June 23: Stephen Strasburg tosses 6.0 innings, allowing nine hits and one run with no walks and nine strikeouts...the performance brought his four-start strikeout total to 41, establishing yet another Major League record...Brian Bannister and the Kansas City Royals shutout the Nationals' bats and take home a 1-0 victory, handing Strasburg his first career loss.

June 24: A night after giving up two ninth-inning homers in Colorado, Jonathan Papelbon allows a Brad Hawpe RBI-single to tie the game at 11-11 after nine innings...Dustin Pedroia saves the day with his 10th-inning two-run blast, his third homer of the day...his five RBI match a career-high and the three-homer performance marks the first time Pedroia has accomplished the feat at any level.

June 25: Arizona Diamondbacks pitcher Edwin Jackson tosses a no-hitter against the Tamps Bay Rays becoming the second player, along with Randy Johnson, to throw a no-hitter for the D-backs...Billy Wagner of the Braves records his 400th career save against the Detroit Tigers.



June 26: David Price collects a career-high 11 strikeouts for the Tampa Bay Rays, helping them to a 5-3 win over the Arizona Diamondbacks...Hideki Matsui hits a grand slam in the bottom of the first inning for the Angels as they defeate the Rockies 4-2.

June 27: Jamie Moyer of the Philadelphia Phillies becomes the 40th player in Major League history to throw 4,000.0 innings...Moyer also allows the 506th home run of his career, setting a new Major League record...the Phillies go on to beat the Toronto Blue Jays 11-2.

June 28: In the first regular season game in Puerto Rico since 2004, the Florida Marlins pound the New York Mets and the formerly undefeated R.A. Dickey 10-3...rookie sensation Mike Stanton hits his second career home run and Ricky Nolasco strikes out nine to record his seventh win of the year for Florida...in Atlanta, Stephen Strasburg is again plagued by a lack of run support as the Nationals are held scoreless by Tim Hudson and the Braves...Strasburg strikes out seven batters and allows three earned runs in 6.1 innings.

June 29: Mariners ace Cliff Lee tosses his third consecutive complete game and fifth of the season, winning his fourth game in June as Seattle defeats the Yankees 7-4 at Yankee Stadium...Minnesota's Denard Span ties a modern-era record with three triples to help the Twins capture an 11-4 victory over the Tigers and reclaim possession of first place in the A.L. Central Division.

June 30:Felix Hernandez follows up Cliff Lee's gem with a two-hit shutout of the Yankees in a 7-0 win...Rangers outfielder Vladimir Guerrero torments his former team with a grand slam and a solo home run in a 4-for-4 performance to lead Texas to a 6-4 win over the Angels at Angel Stadium.

July 2: Reds slugger Joey Votto connects for his 19th home run of the season as Cincinnati scores nine runs in the seventh inning en route to a 12-0 win over the Chicago Cubs...After the Marlins take a 3-2 lead in the top of the 11th inning, Atlanta Braves infielder Omar Infante delivers a walk-off single in the bottom half, scoring the second of two Atlanta runs to give the club a 4-3 victory.

July 3: Brett Gardner hits a grand slam in an 11-run third inning for the Yankees while Andy Pettitte improves to 10-2 in New York's 11-3 win over the Blue Jays...Twins slugger Jim Thome leaves the yard twice to give him 574 career home runs as he passes Twins great Harmon Killebrew for 10th on Major League Baseball's all-time home run list.

ALL-STAR GAME BALLOTING


Since the first All-Star Game in 1933, selection of the All-Star teams has shifted from fans to managers on several occasions. In 1933 and 1934, selection of the All-Star teams was up to the fans, who could vote for the All-Stars through newspaper ads featuring official ballots.

From 1935 to 1946, each league's eight managers selected the participants while the All-Star team managers chose the starters. Balloting for the starting lineups, tabulated by the Associated Press, was returned to the fans from 1947 to 1957. However, a case of ballot stuffing by Cincinnati fans in 1957 prompted Commissioner Ford Frick to make player selection the privilege of managers, players and coaches from 1958 to 1969.

Commissioner Bowie Kuhn returned voting to the fans in 1970. Since then, All-Star Fan Balloting has developed into one of the largest voter participation programs in the U.S. outside of state and national elections.

The 2003 season marked the introduction of the Player Ballot to the All-Star selection process. The National League's players, managers and coaches will elect eight position players and eight pitchers from their league, while the American League's players, managers and coaches will elect nine position players (including the designated hitter) and eight pitchers from their league. Player balloting was conducted during the last week of fan voting.

Since 1970, approximately 363 million ballots have been cast, including more than 200 million since 1990. In 2010, approximately 21.2 million votes were cast, the second-highest figure in history.





New York Yankees second baseman Robinson Cano will make his first start for the American League at second base (second appearance), while Milwaukee Brewers slugger Ryan Braun finished as the leading vote-getter in the N.L. outfield for the third straight year.




MAUER TAKES MLB'S TOP SPOT IN ALL-STAR BALLOTING; PUJOLS PACES NATIONAL LEAGUE

Minnesota Twins catcher Joe Mauer and St. Louis Cardinals first baseman Albert Pujols have finished as their League's leading vote-getters in Major League Baseball fan balloting, which drew 21.2 million ballots in 2010, the second-highest figure in history.

Mauer, now a four-time American League All-Star who has been fan-elected three times, finished as MLB's overall balloting leader with 5,372,606 votes, the third-highest total in Major League Baseball history, trailing only the 6,079,688 votes cast for Ken Griffey, Jr. in 1994 and the 5,397,374 for Pujols in 2009. In the A.L., Mauer was followed by Yankees shortstop Derek Jeter (4,547,485) and second baseman Robinson Cano (4,135,305).

Pujols finished ahead of all National League players for the fourth time in his nine-time All-Star career with 4,380,669 votes, and has now been the N.L.'s starting first baseman for the second consecutive season. Among N.L. players, Pujols was followed by Phillies second baseman Chase Utley (3,616,038) and Brewers outfielder Ryan Braun (2,972,525).





Joe Mauer of the Twins is the first catcher to be MLB's top overall vote-getter since Ivan Rodriguez of the Texas Rangers in 2000. He also joins Rod Carew (1975, 1977-78) as the only other Twin ever to lead all of MLB in votes. Pujols will make his ninth career All-Star appearance and fourth start for the National League.

First All-Star Game as manager...led the Yankees to a Major League-best 49-31 mark through July 3rd...was a member of Terry Francona's staff for the 2008 Midsummer Classic at Yankee Stadium...was named the 32nd manager in Yankees history on October 30, 2007, becoming the 17th Yankee manager to have played for the club and the fourth former catcher, joining Bill Dickey, Ralph Houk and Yogi Berra...in 2009, led the Yankees to their 27th World Championship in his second season as manager, becoming the ninth Yankees manager to win a World Series...became the only current Major League manager to both play for and manage teams that won at least 100 games in a season and won a World Series...led New York to 114 total wins in 2009, tying the second-highest mark in club history behind the 1998 team (125 wins), which he was a member of...was named the 2006 N.L. Manager of the Year by the BBWAA and the *Sporting News* after guiding the Florida Marlins to a 78-84 mark...joined Hal Lanier of the Houston Astros (1986) and Dusty Baker of the San Francisco Giants

(1993) as the only managers to win the honor in their managerial debuts...played 15 seasons as a catcher with the Chicago Cubs (1989-92, 2000-02), Colorado Rockies (1993-95), Yankees (1996-99) and St. Louis Cardinals (2003)...earned his first and only trip to an All-Star Game in Atlanta in 2000 as a replacement for the injured Mike Piazza, but did not play...caught Dwight Gooden's no-hitter on May 14, 1996 vs. Seattle Mariners and David Cone's perfect game on July 18, 1999 vs. Montreal Expos...was a member of three World Championship teams in New York (1996, 98-99) as a player and one as a manager (2009)...batted .267 with 454 runs, 186 doubles, 36 home runs and 422 RBI in 1,277 Major League games...drafted by the Chicago Cubs in the fifth round of the 1986 First-Year Player Draft.

and San Diego Padres (1993)...finished his career with a .233 batting average, 178 hits and 22 homers through 307 M.L. games...was a first-round pick of the Padres (24th overall) in the 1979 First-Year Player Draft.

Wild Card and ultimately winning the franchise's first World Series...became the 17th person to win a World Series as both a player and a manager...honored as 2002 A.L. Manager of the Year by the BBWAA, The Sporting News and USA Today...earned the honor again in 2009 after capturing a third consecutive A.L. West crown, becoming the first manager in MLB history to guide his team to the playoffs six times in his first 10 seasons...Played 15 Major League seasons as a catcher with the Dodgers (1980-92), San Diego (1993) and Texas (1994)...named to the N.L. 




