The Commissioner Deane R. Beman

Deane R. Beman is in his second year as Commissioner of the PGA Tournament Players Division. He moved from the first tee as an active player at the beginning of 1974 and officially succeeded Joseph C. Dey, Jr., on March 1, 1974.

During his years as a player, both amateur and professional, Mr. Beman established an enviable record. He won United States Amateur Championships in 1960 and 1963 and the British Amateur Championship in 1959. He was a member of five Walker Cup teams, four World Amateur Cup teams and four U.S. Americas Cup teams.

At age 29, in 1967, he turned professional and became a member of the Tour. His success continued. He won the 1969 Texas Open, the 1970 Milwaukee Open, the 1972 Quad Cities Open and the 1973 Shrine-Robinson Classic.

He also served as a Player Director of the Tournament Policy Board in 1973.

Prior to turning professional, Mr. Beman was a partner in an insurance brokerage firm in Bethesda, Md. He severed all business connections to assume the role of Commissioner.

The Tournament Policy Board

The Tournament Players Division of the Professional Golfers Association of America conducts the tournament program. Policy is established by a 10-member Tournament Policy Board, composed of the following:

Four Player Directors, elected by the TPD membership. A Player Director serves as Vice President and Executive Committeeman of the PGA.

Three PGA Directors, the national officers of the PGA of America President, Secretary and Treasurer.

Three Independent Directors, representing the public interest. One is Chairman of the Board.

A young Players Advisory Board consults with the Policy Board.

The Policy Board appoints the Commissioner as chief executive and administrative officer. The Tournament Staff, under the Tournament Director, conducts tournament play.

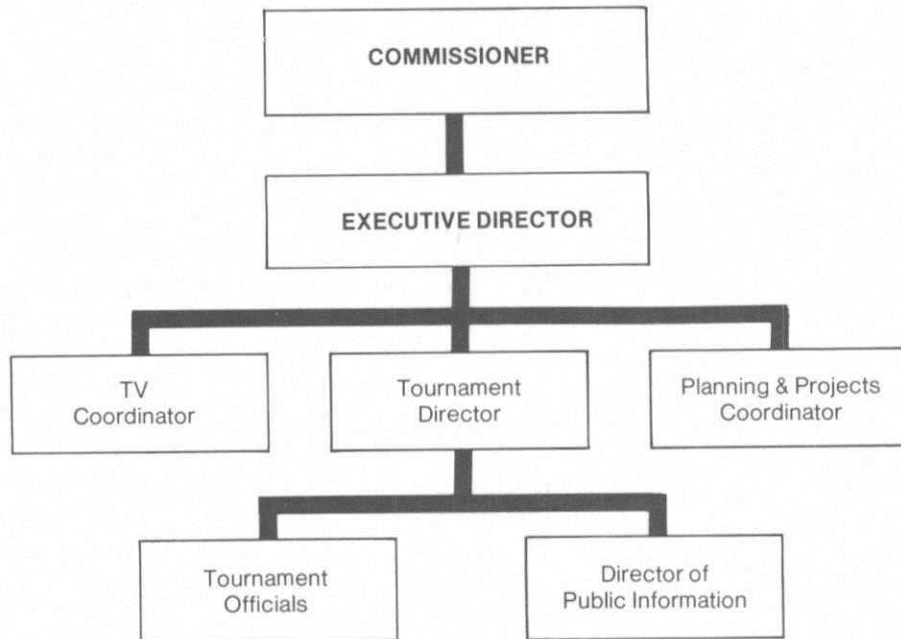

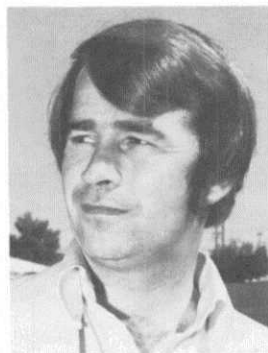

Jack Nicklaus . . .

. . . Winner of First Tournament Players Championship
and the Joseph C. Dey, Jr., Trophy

Jack Nicklaus withstood the strong challenge of J. C. Snead and the thunderstorms to win the Joseph C. Dey, Jr., Trophy in the inaugural Tournament Players Championship at the Atlanta Country Club, Atlanta, Ga.

It was a week to remember, August 29-September 2, not only for the intense competition on one of the Tour's most beautiful-and-challenging courses but also because of the weather.

Jack recorded rounds of 66, 71, 68 and 67 for a 16-under par total of 272. He edged J. C. Snead by two strokes to collect the first-place check of \$50,000.

Play was suspended twice during the first round and finally halted at 7:25 p.m. with 44 players still on the course. They completed their round early Friday morning, and Snead emerged as the first-round leader with an eight-under par 64, one better than Tom Evans and Jerry Heard.

The second round was played in hot-and-humid weather on Friday and Lou Graham tacked his second-straight 67 on the scoreboard for a 134 total and the halfway lead. Snead followed with a 71 for a 135 total. Evans, unfortunately, missed his tee time early in the morning and was disqualified.

It still was hot and humid for Saturday's third round as Snead moved into a three-stroke lead with a 67 and a 14-under par 202. Now, Nicklaus was his closest challenger at 205, as Graham dropped back into a tie for third with Homero Blancas at 207.

When Snead birdied the first two holes on the final day, he opened a five-stroke lead. But, he was not able to find the birdie secret for the rest of the tournament. Snead bogeyed the third while Jack birdied it, and there J. C. lost his momentum. The lead was cut to three. Jack birdied the fourth and now J. C. was two ahead. At the sixth, it became even with J. C. bogeyed and Jack's 12 footer for a birdie found its mark.

Meanwhile, the heavens were crackling all around, and heavy rains forced a suspension of play early in the afternoon, and then another late in the afternoon. Nicklaus now was in command, holding a two-stroke lead with birdies at the 11th and 13th.

Finally, when another suspension came at 6:03 p.m., the players waited until 6:40 when the competition was called off for the day. They resumed at 10 a.m., Monday, with Snead at the 13th and Nicklaus on the 14th. Jack immediately birdied his opening hole with a 22 footer. He bogeyed the 16th, catching a greenside bunker, and then parred in for his two-stroke margin.

The second annual Championship will be contested at the Colonial Country Club in Fort Worth, Tex., August 21-24, 1975.

1974 RECAP

This was not the year Tommy Aaron would like to remember. For the first time in his 14-year career, the former Masters champion did not make the top 60 exemption list. He earned \$31,572.

The likeable Georgian had his moments when he played well, but, for the most part, the slump that struck him in the latter part of 1973 remained. He entered 32 events and missed the cut in 11. He only had two top 10 efforts.

He tied for sixth in the Greater Milwaukee Open after a 68-68 start and had a tie for eighth in the Southern Open in Columbus, Ga. He opened with a pair of 70s in the latter and added a third-day 65 to put him within one of the lead. But, the best he could do on Sunday was a 73.

He had other 65s, such as in the last round of the Phoenix Open to tie for 12th and in the opening round the Doral-Eastern Open, where he tied for 14th.

A good sign came during the last half of the year, as he only missed two cuts in his last 13 starts.

PRIOR YEARS

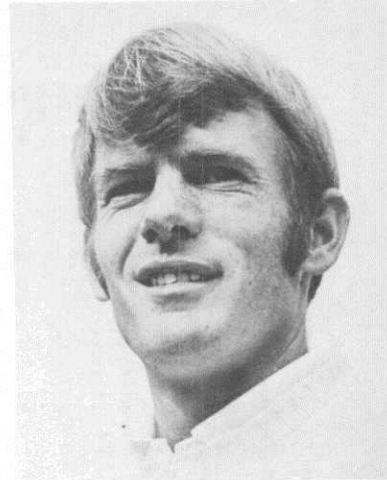
Since joining the Tour in 1961, Tommy Aaron had developed the reputation of being a consistent performer, though never a winner. The number of runner-up finishes he amassed brought him the bride's-maid nickname with which he was often tagged.

He did beat Sam Snead in an 18-hole playoff for the 1969 Canadian Open title, but the tournament was not an official Tour event that year. Thus, his first victory came in the 1970 Atlanta Classic, where he beat some of the best names in golf. At the finish, Dan Sikes, Arnold Palmer, Bert Yancey, Gary Player, Tom Weiskopf, and Jack Nicklaus were all within three strokes of him.

In 1973, he put to rest all the theories and remarks about never not being a consistent winner. He captured the Masters before a home-town crowd with a brilliant finishing round of 68.

In the late 1950s, Tommy dominated amateur golf in Georgia. He also won the Georgia Open three times and the Georgia and Southeastern Amateurs twice each. He was a U.S. Amateur finalist in 1958 and won the 1959 Sunnehanna and 1960 Western Amateur. He was a member of the victorious 1959 Walker Cup team and also a member of the 1969 and 1973 Ryder Cup teams.

1974 RECAP

"It was an unexpected pleasure. I was just trying to hang in there and make a good check — there were just too many good players up there ahead of me," Brian Allin said.

That's all he thought about after a surprise victory in the Doral-Eastern Open with a 16-under 272. The 130-pounder took charge when he birdied 13, and ran off three birds in four holes that eventually gave him \$30,000 and a one-shot victory over Jerry Heard.

Then Buddy caught ahold of the Preston Trail course in the Byron Nelson Classic in Dallas with a third round 63 and another string of three birds in the round at 14, 15 and 16 for another victory. This time the margin was four shots and a record 269 total. His 63, coming with eight birdies, set an 18-hole course record.

Buddy, nearly doubling his best year on the Tour, also was second in the Tournament of Champions despite a third-round 75. He had seven top 10 efforts in 26 events while missing the cut just four times.

PRIOR YEARS

Buddy Allin is one of the Tour's more interesting success stories.

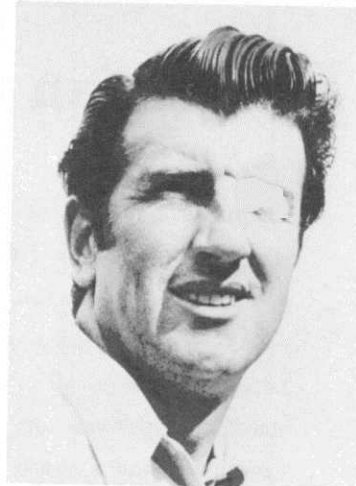
Although he played on the Brigham Young University golf team along with Johnny Miller and Mike Reasor, his amateur career was not marked with outstanding accomplishment.

After Brigham Young, Buddy served a 16-month tour of duty in Vietnam where he was an army artillery officer. He was decorated four times for his military service. He joined the Tour after completing the 1970 Qualifying School.

In 1971, he won the Greater Greensboro Open in a sudden-death playoff over Rod Funseth and Dave Eichelberger. He holed a 20-foot birdie putt from the fringe on the first extra hole.

Buddy's earnings slipped a bit in 1972, but in 1973 he captured his second Tour victory in the Florida Citrus Open — with a 23-under par 265 total. During that week in Orlando, he has 25 birdies and only two bogies. His rounds of 66-65-67-67 represent one of the best performances in Tour history. That he plays his best golf during the first quarter of the year was emphasized by the fact that he logged four other top ten finishes during that period.

1974 RECAP

While George Archer's stroke averaged increased only one-tenth of a point from the year before, the rest of his results show a much wider deficit.

The lanky Archer slumped to the poorest season of his career in 1974, only winning \$18,794 in 29 tournaments. Strangely enough for the always consistent Archer, he missed the cut eight times and never was a serious threat.

In fact, George had only two top 20 finishes and they came in his first three starts. He tied for 20th in the Andy Williams-San Diego Open and then tied for 14th in the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open. A final round 74 hurt his chances there.

While he did have 16 rounds in the 60s, George also found a way to put a few high numbers on the board too, such as 19 rounds of 75 or higher. Nevertheless, he still managed to boost his career earnings to over \$800,000.

PRIOR YEARS

George Archer started playing golf at the age of 12 and when he joined the Tour in 1964 he brought with him a fine amateur background.

In 1963, he won the Trans-Mississippi Amateur, Northern California Open, and San Francisco City

championship. That year he also lost to Deane Beman in the semi-final round of the U.S. Amateur and was low amateur for the third straight year in the Lucky International.

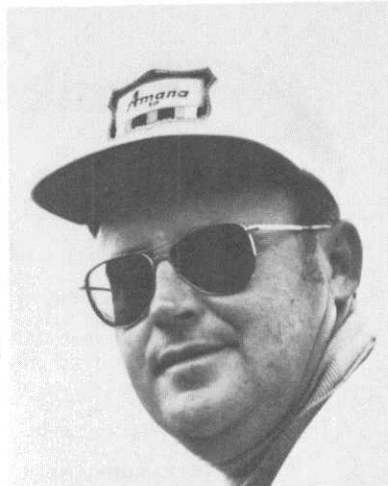
When George won the Lucky in 1965, for his first Tour title, he acknowledged it as "probably the biggest thrill of my life. There were a lot of home folks around, including one kid I used to shoot arrows with back in the sixth grade."

"Big George" won over \$100,000 in 1968, 1969, 1971, and 1972. In each of those years he also captured at least two Tour titles, the most outstanding of which was the 1969 Masters championship when he defeated Billy Casper, George Knudson, and Tom Weiskopf by a single stroke.

After enjoying the prominence of being one of the outstanding performers on Tour, George found 1973 considerably less than exciting. He has some physical ailments but tended to discount them saying his driving was not good and his putting not as sharp as it had been. Normally, he is considered one of the game's finest putters.

His best finishes in 1973 came in the Dean Martin-Tucson Open where he tied for second and in the San Antonio-Texas Open where he was third. His earnings for the year slipped to their lowest since 1966.

1974 RECAP

Trivia question. What player, other than Jack Nicklaus, has won a tournament in each of the last eight years?

Miller Barber kept his record intact with a victory in the Ohio Kings Island Open and in the process moved close to becoming the Tour's ninth million dollar winner.

Actually, despite winning nearly \$100,000 for the fourth time in his career, 1974 was a struggle. "That win was important because it was a hard, difficult year for me. I had a very serious asthma attack and that almost killed me, it was a terrific scare," Barber said.

Miller produced only a third at Phoenix and fourth-place efforts at San Diego and Monsanto before illness took over. He missed three straight cuts in his native Texas and then had only one other top 10 finish (Westchester) before Ohio Kings Island.

He never was seriously pressured at Cincinnati, producing a final-round 72 and a three-stroke victory.

He finished the campaign with \$95,270, missing only four cuts in 26 events.

PRIOR YEARS

In 1973, Miller Barber lost playoffs in the Gr. New Orleans Open (to Jack Nicklaus) and in the L&M Open (to Bert Greene). Then, in November, he turned what could have been a most frustrating year into his greatest in 15 on Tour.

At the Pinehurst Country Club, Miller captured the inaugural World Open Championship, contested that year at 144 holes over two weeks and with a starting field of 240. Miller holed a 25-foot birdie putt on the tough 18th of the Pinehurst No. 2 course to clinch the title and \$100,000 first prize by three strokes over Tour newcomer Ben Crenshaw.

Barber earned \$184,014 that year to rank sixth among the money winners. It was by far his best performance, though he has earned over \$100,000 on two previous occasions.

A member of the 1969 and 1971 Ryder Cup Teams, Miller joined the Tour in 1958. After a number of good years he settled into the role of club professional, at the Apawamis Club in Rye, N.Y.

He was soon convinced to return to the Tour by some of the club members. When he did, he established himself as one of the Tour's premier players. He captured the 1971 Phoenix Open with rounds of 65-64-67-65—261. His 23-under par score was the lowest on Tour since Mike Souchak's 257 in the 1955 Texas Open.

1974 RECAP

Frank Beard waited until the middle of September to turn his year around and when he did he made a major challenge in the \$300,000 World Open for his 11th career victory.

The veteran managed an up-and-down 67-70-75 effort through the first three rounds at Pinehurst. Then in the final round, an eagle at the long 16th put him ahead by one only to drop back into a four-way tie when he bogied the 72nd hole.

On the first sudden-death hole, the 15th, he missed a 10-foot birdie putt. Once again at the 16th he took three putts to get down and winner Johnny Miller managed a birdie, leaving Beard, along with Jack Nicklaus and Bob Murphy, in second with \$23,200.

Beard had won less than \$30,000 entering the World Open, with just one other top 10 finish, a tie for ninth at Monsanto. He also played well in the PGA, shooting 67-69 in the middle two rounds only to drop out of contention with a final round 75 (11th place).

PRIOR YEARS

In 1971, Frank Beard won the Greater New Orleans Open and \$112,337 for eighth place among

the year's money winners. In 1972, he felt his hook-oriented game needed some left-to-right action so he changed. He also dropped to \$56,188 for 40th position on the money list. His stroke average leaped from 71.0 to 72.9.

In 1973, Frank began to regain some of his old success, though he was deprived of a tournament victory. A second-place finish in the Monsanto Open and ties for fifth at Tallahassee and Westchester helped increase his earnings for the year to \$71,901. He had four other top ten finishes.

In 1973, he has 29 rounds of 69 or less, compared to only 17 in 1972. He also improved his stroke average from 72.9 to 71.6.

From the time he joined the Tour in 1963 until the beginning of 1972, Frank recorded 11 Tour titles. He earned over \$100,000 each year from 1967 through 1971 and was the leading money winner in 1969. A member of the 1969 and 1971 Ryder Cup teams, he counts two Tournament of Champions titles and the Westchester Classic crown among his Tour victories.

Approaching the million-dollar mark in Tour earnings, Frank came to the Tour with fine amateur credentials, including two victories in the Kentucky Amateur.

1974 RECAP

Don Bies turned his entire 1974 season around with one exceptional round in late August in the Westchester Classic.

The Tour veteran all but clinched an exempt position with a final-round 66 at Westchester. The effort gave him second place, two shots behind winner Johnny Miller, and the biggest check of his career, \$28,500.

Bies collected two other top 10 checks during the early part of the season, finishing ninth at Heritage and then fourth at Memphis after a 66 in the third round.

Two weeks prior to Westchester also were very productive, gaining ninth and 11th place ties in the PGA and Hartford events respectively.

Bies played in 25 events and only missed the cut four times while finishing with a career high \$70,519.

PRIOR YEARS

In 1968, the Seattle Golf Club, where Don Bies was employed, closed for part of the year to undergo renovations. Don decided to spend the time on Tour.

In only 15 events, he earned over \$30,000, finished fifth in the U.S. Open in Rochester, and made the top 60 in Exemption Points. "My wife and I talked it over later in the year. We felt that since I had the exemption for all of 1969, I should try it," Don explained.

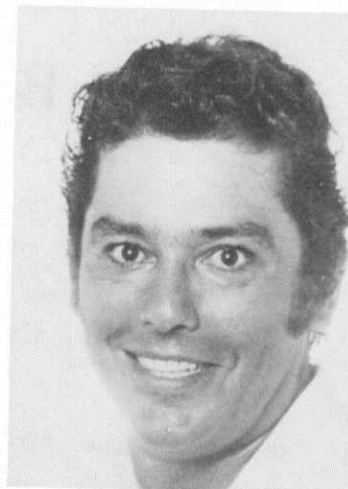
He kept his exempt status the following year, then slipped a little in 1971. However, he stayed with it and a most profitable 1972 resulted.

Another disappointing year awaited Don in 1973, when he earned slightly over \$40,000. But the five-time Washington State PGA champion maintained the fine attitude that has made him one of the most well-liked touring professionals.

"I had my best year on Tour when I was not an exempt player," he said, "so maybe it's a good sign."

One of the more consistent players on Tour, Don has only had to qualify once since joining the tour full-time in 1968, despite not making the top 60 on several occasions.

1974 RECAP

Homero Blancas fell off slightly in 1974 and it probably was somewhat of a frustrating year for him.

In 30 tournaments, he only missed the cut six times and had four top 10 finishes, including two runnerup efforts. But he never seemed to mount an adequate charge to move into the winner's circle.

Homero was second in the Florida Citrus, finishing three shots behind Jerry Heard. He shot a 66 in the third round and then a 70 the final day. Two weeks later he was eighth at Jacksonville despite a final 75 and the next week a strong 69-67 finish netted him a tie for sixth in the Heritage.

An opening 65 and a third-round 67 left him in strong contention at the Byron Nelson but he could do no better than a closing 71 and this left him four shots behind Brian Allin.

He had just one more serious challenge the remainder of the season, shooting 67-71-69 in the TPC but then closing with a 76. Again, at the Sahara, a 64 in the third round placed him among the leaders but he closed with a 80 and 29th place.

PRIOR YEARS

Homero Blancas joined the Tour in 1965 after compiling a fine amateur record while at the University of Houston. He was named to two All-America teams and captured the Southern Intercollegiate. In 1965, Homero was named Tour's Rookie-of-the-Year. He also captured the Mexican Open.

In 1970, Homero earned over \$100,000 and took the Colonial National title by one stroke over Lee Trevino and Gene Littler. Although he had eight top-ten finishes in 1971, he never really threatened. He said problems with his driver was the reason. His earnings slipped to just over half what he had earned the year before.

Homero's game returned to form in 1972. He defeated Lanny Wadkins in sudden-death for the Phoenix Open title, and earned over \$90,000 for the season. During the Phoenix Open he recorded the year's low round on the Tour, a 31-30-61. Also that year he tied for fourth in the U.S. Open and tied for fifth in the Masters.

In 1973, Homero continued his winning performance by outlasting Frank Beard for the Monsanto Open title, earned \$96,964 for 15th on the money list, and played on the U.S. Ryder Cup Team.

As an amateur, he had fired a 55 on the 5,002 yard Premier course, Longview, Texas, to equal the all-time low scoring record.

1974 RECAP

Gay Brewer came close to reversing one of the poorest seasons of his brilliant career midway through the summer at the American Golf Classic in Akron but was forced to settle for a second-place tie.

Brewer, among the top 60 every year except one since 1956, finished with \$41,652 and just two top 10 efforts in 24 appearances.

Gay, who entered the Akron event with just a ninth-place finish at New Orleans to his credit, fashioned a 69-70-71-71 effort to tie Jim Colbert, Ray Floyd and Forrest Fezler for the top spot. In fact, he faced a 20-foot par putt on the 72nd hole that would have given him the victory.

On the opening playoff hole, Firestone's 15th, Brewer was the lone player on the green. Then he three-putted from 42 feet and drop out of contention, settling for the \$13,146 second prize.

Brewer finished no higher than 13th (Canadian Open) the remainder of the year, missing the cut five straight times late in the season.

PRIOR YEARS

Gay Brewer has made two of golf's greatest comebacks during his 18-year Tour career.

In 1966 he bogied the final hole of the Masters to drop into a tie with Tommy Jacobs and eventual winner Jack Nicklaus. The following year at Augusta,

he holed a number of birdie putts on the final nine to defeat playing-partner Bobby Nichols by one stroke.

He had his other — and greater — comeback in 1972. His golfing career and his life became doubtful when he was stricken with a bleeding ulcer the night before the Masters. Not only did he recover, but he went on to capture the Canadian Open championship and finish in the top ten four other times.

Gay took his comeback performance abroad late in 1972 and won the \$300,000 Taiheiyo Club Masters in Japan, where he defeated David Graham in a playoff. His \$65,000 prize there, however, was not the first prize money he'd collected on foreign soil. Previously, he won the 1967 and 1968 Alcan events at St. Andrews and Royal Birkdale, respectively. Each victory was good for \$55,000.

In 1973, Gay had his best year on Tour money-wise. He tied for-second twice and finished in the top ten seven other times enroute to over \$90,000. His seconds came at Tucson and in the American Golf Classic.

He was a member of the 1967 and 1973 Ryder Cup Teams. Gay also holds the 1949 U.S. Junior title.

For the courage he evidenced during his comeback from the near-fatal ulcer, Gay was awarded the Ben Hogan award by the Golf Writers Assn. of America. The award is presented in honor of courage in the face of trying circumstances. Other winners include Hogan, Bobby Nichols and Gene Littler.

1974 RECAP

Billy Casper had another productive year on the Tour despite the fact he missed winning \$100,000 for only the second time in nine years. He also emerged as an international champion, winning the Lancombe title in Paris, France.

Billy played in 20 U.S. events and missed three cuts while collecting five top 10 finishes.

He tied for seventh at San Diego early in the season and then collected his second largest check of the year at the Tournament of Champions (\$10,000), finishing fourth.

His best four-round effort of the year, 69-68-67-69-273, produced a tie for fifth in the Kemper Open. Then a 68-68-68 finish gave him another tie for fifth at Hartford.

Casper's top effort of the year on the Tour was in his last event, the Kaiser, where he opened with a 65 to lead. But in the end he and Lee Trevino were tied for second, eight shots behind Johnny Miller.

PRIOR YEARS

Bill Casper joined the Tour in 1955. He captured his first title in 1956. Through 1973 he had captured 50 Tour titles. The only years in which he captured only one title were 1956, 1961, 1962 and 1971. His only winless year came in 1972.

However, Casper returned to form in 1973. With the promise of a Ryder Cup berth hovering over him, he won the Western Open. Then, in only his second other start before heading for Britain, Billy captured the Sammy Davis, Jr.-Gr. Hartford Open.

Firmly established as one of the game's great players, Billy has twice won the U.S. Open (1959 and, in a playoff with Palmer, 1966) and captured the 1970 Masters in a playoff with Gene Littler. He has won the Vardon Trophy for low stroke average on Tour in 1960, '63, '65, '66, '68.

Bill has been a member of every Ryder Cup Team from 1961 through 1971. Twice he has been named Player-of-the-year (1966 and 1970). He was also the year's leading money winner in 1966 and 1968, became the first person to earn over \$200,000 in a single season (1968), and became the second person to win \$1,000,000 in professional golf. (1970).

1974 RECAP

Bob Charles was all set to give up his TPD card and limit his schedule to his native New Zealand, South Africa and Europe until he finished the Greater Greensboro Open last spring.

Charles, despite great success in other countries, had not won in North America since the 1968 Canadian Open. "The courses in Europe are better suited for my short game. I just wanted to play nine to 12 tournaments over here," Charles said.

All of a sudden, after finishing in a tie for eighth three weeks earlier in Jacksonville, Charles entered Sunday's final round at the GGO one shot ahead of Ray Floyd and Lee Trevino. It stayed that way until he birdied the 17th and Floyd bogied 18, giving Charles the \$44,000 first prize.

He followed a month later with an eighth-place finish in the Tournament of Champions and then a tie for seventh in the Byron Nelson. He only played in six tournaments in the remainder of the season, never finishing higher than 27th.

Charles also produced a victory in early August in the Swiss Open (\$10,000), using consistency (70-70-67-68) to edge Tony Jacklin by a single shot.

PRIOR YEARS

Without question, Bob Charles is the most successful left-hander ever to play professional golf. In 1963, he became the first southpaw ever to win on the U.S. Tour when he captured the Houston event. He has won four times since.

Charles' most dramatic achievement in golf also occurred in 1963. He defeated Phil Rodgers in a 36-hole playoff at Royal Lytham and St. Annes for the British Open title.

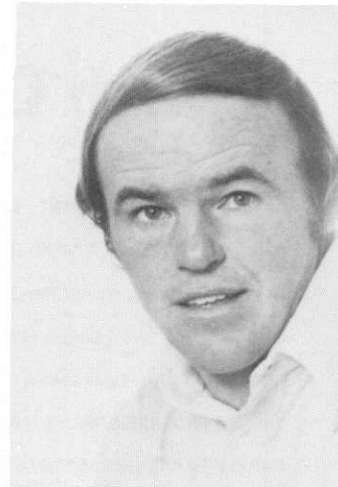
The lanky New Zealander does everything right-handed except games that require two hands. At age five he swung a golf club for the first time, and he swung it left-handed. Since both his parents were southpaw golfers, he never considered changing.

Charles played rugby and cricket during his school years, and worked at a bank in Christchurch, New Zealand, before joining the Tour in 1962.

Regarded as one of the finest putters on Tour, Charles feels his lack of distance has put him at a disadvantage on U.S. courses, which are generally long. Finishing 41st on the money list in 1971, Bob's play has slipped since. However, many feel he has recently returned to winning form.

Since 1954, Charles has captured over 20 major titles around the world.

1974 RECAP

When Jim Colbert thinks of 1974 he will, of course, remember the victory at Akron Firestone in the American Golf Classic.

Then he also might think of the final round at Augusta, where a 73 left him three behind Gary Player. Or he might ponder a moment about the U.S. Open at Winged Foot, standing in fourth place until a final 74 left him fifth.

Colbert, in winning his fourth event in 10 years, charged out of a tight last-day pack and finished with 70-67-74-70 — one over par. Jim, tired from the Open grind the week before, trailed Forrest Fezler by three entering the final round.

He missed an eight-foot putt on 15 for a double bogey but held on for a four-way playoff. He made the same eight footer at 15 on the first sudden death hole to stay 'alive' with Ray Floyd. A two-putt par from 30 feet on the long 16th won the \$34,000 prize.

In the Masters, it was Stockton at 207 and then Colbert and Player at 208 on Easter Eve. But, on Sunday, it took an eagle at 18 to save the 73 and a fourth-place tie. In the Open, he had a third-round string of 3-2-3-3-3-3 to pull into contention with a 69.

Jim also finished fifth at Hartford and ninth at Dean Martin Tucson and Westchester.

PRIOR YEARS

Jim Colbert completed only four of his first ten starts in 1973, but then turned what looked like a bad year into success by capturing the Gr. Jacksonville Open. It was a time he least expected to win, having missed the cut and then withdrawn in the two weeks prior to the event. He went on to record a number of other top ten finishes that year.

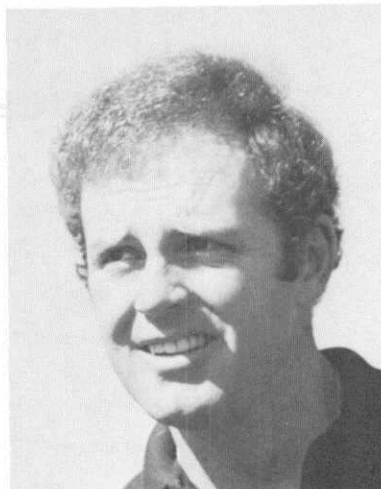
He tied for tenth in the U.S. Open at Oakmont in 1973 after being only one stroke off the 36-hole lead. In 1971, Colbert had finished third in the Open at Merion, two strokes behind Nicklaus and Trevino.

Jim's success in 1972 can be attributed for the most part to the Gr. Milwaukee Open and the Westchester Classic. He won the former and forged a final round 65 to finish second to Nicklaus in the latter. Those two finishes alone netted him \$53,350.

Colbert, an All-State high school football star, went to Kansas State University on a football scholarship. He switched to golf after he lost both his desire and a few front teeth in a freshman game. Having already won the Kansas State Junior Championship at age 11, he was well prepared for collegiate golf. He finished second in the 1964 NCAA Championship and won the 1965 Kansas Amateur.

Jim turned pro in 1966 and captured his first Tour title in 1969 — the Monsanto Open.

1974 RECAP

"So much has been expected of me. I'm so relieved and thrilled that I have finally gained exempt status. Now, I can go on from here," remarked Bobby Cole about a month prior to the end of the 1974 season.

Cole had his most successful year on the Tour, winning \$59,616. Even more important, he challenged for several titles, the most notable the PGA at Tanglewood.

Bobby entered Sunday's final round trailing Lee Trevino by a scant shot and, following an eagle two on the first hole, he held the lead. Five more birdies and five bogies still left him one behind through 15 but a bogey at 16 and a crucial double bogie at 17 ended his chances. He tied for third, taking only five pars in his round.

"Stateside, I learned to play too conservatively over the years and then when I lost a five-shot lead and the South African Masters to Gary Player I decided to become more aggressive, attack the course," Cole said. The next week he won the South African Open.

Cole, who also has struggled with a swing problem (looseness in backswing), started the '74 U.S. campaign on a strong note — fourth in the Florida Citrus and a distant second to Trevino at New Orleans. The week prior to the PGA he finished ninth at Pleasant Valley and the week after a fifth at Hartford.

Bobby was also a strong seventh in the British Open.

PRIOR YEARS

Bobby Cole, until 1974, never realized that long-time goal of becoming one of the U.S. Tour's exempt players. Like other well known young players, he was tabbed for instant greatness before he ever played in his first tournament.

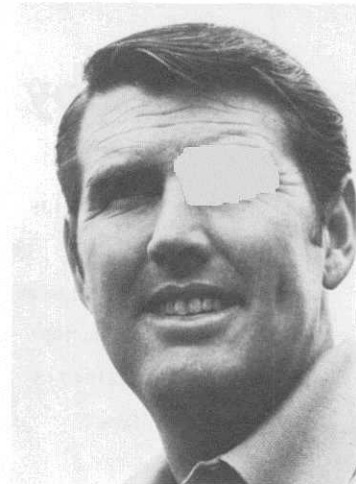
Born in Springs, South Africa, Bobby started playing golf when he was 11.

Then when he was only 18 years old he captured the British Amateur (1966) and remarked to Tony Jacklin the same day that he was going to turn professional. "Pound for pound, Bobby Cole is the longest hitter in the World. He has tremendous potential," remarked Gary Player at the time.

He joined the U.S. Tour in 1968, finishing 90th with \$13,383. He won \$20,803 the next year and slipped to \$8,379 in '71, finishing 10th at Green Island. He finally increased his earnings to \$19,015 in 1972, finishing in a tie for sixth in the American Golf Classic.

His best year ever, prior to '74, was in 1973 when a third-place effort in the Canadian Open helped him earn \$28,874.

1974 RECAP

Charles Coody went without a victory in 1974 but in 30 events he only missed the cut four times while gaining five top 10 finishes.

The former Masters champion, who finished with \$61,464, did post one second-place finish. He closed with a 66 in the Byron Nelson to gain a second-place tie but it was not enough to overtake Brian Allin, who won by four shots.

Two weeks later he ended with a 69 in the Colonial National and tied for seventh and then late in the season he posted ninth, sixth and seventh place efforts at the Tournament Players Championship, World Open and Kaiser respectively.

The former TPD Policy Board member did not play well early in the season, finishing no higher than 29th until the Byron Nelson tournament in Dallas.

PRIOR YEARS

When Charlie Coody came to the Tour in 1963, he brought with him a most impressive amateur record.

He had won 30 amateur titles in his home state of Texas, many while attending TCU, and was state high

school champion in 1954. He qualified for the U.S. Open in 1960 and 1961 while serving a three-year stint in the Air Force. As a semi-finalist in the 1962 U.S. Amateur he was invited to compete in the Masters.

And it is the Masters that has given Charlie some of his greatest moments in golf. In 1969 he held a one stroke lead with three to go. He decided to play the final holes defensively. The decision cost him the title. He bogied in to tie for fifth. Learning from experience, Charlie kept to his game plan two months later and captured the Cleveland Open title.

In the 1971 Masters, Coody finished birdie-birdie-par-par for a 279 and the title that eluded him two years earlier. His win earned him a berth in the 1971 World Series of Golf, which he also won.

Charlie's performance slipped a bit in 1972. In 1973 he had a consistent year despite going winless on the U.S. Tour. He did, however, emerge as an international champion. Within a month's time he won the Wills Open in England and the John Player Classic at Turnberry, Scotland.

Charlie is a recent member of the TPD Policy Board and a past vice-president of the PGA.

1974 RECAP

It takes more than one tournament to make a season, but Chuck Courtney enjoys thinking about his days on the tough Colonial Country Club course in the 1974 National Tournament in Fort Worth, Tex.

This was the first Designated event in Tour history, and there was Chuck, playing some of the finest golf of his career. His even-par 70 the first day put him five behind the leader, Hale Irwin.

Then, Chuck made his move. He fired a splendid 66 the second round to take the 36-hole lead, with a 136, by one stroke over Irwin and Rod Curl. Came the third day, and Courtney still was on top, with another 70 for a 206 total, while Curl rested two strokes away. Jack Nicklaus now was third at 209.

The Californian held in there tough the final afternoon, but his two-over par 72 gave him a 278 total and put him two behind the victor, Curl, and one behind Nicklaus. He earned \$17,750 for his third-place finish.

Chuck also tied third in the Greater Milwaukee Open and tied 10th in the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic. He played in 33 main Tour events and made money in 22. He earned \$51,001.

Early in the year, Chuck won the 36-hole Sun City Open, a Second-Tour event opposite the Phoenix Open.

PRIOR YEARS

Chuck Courtney just missed making the top 60 list of exempt players for 1974. He finished 62nd. His best finish in 1973 came in the Shrine-Robinson where he was fourth.

Courtney, who joined the Tour in 1964, has enjoyed exempt status a number of times in the past. He was one of three rookies to win in 1964, when he took the St. Paul Open. It was an especially pleasing win for Courtney, since his former home was in nearby Minneapolis. He moved to LaJolla, California, with his family when he was 11.

As an amateur, Chuck won the Southern California scholastic championship, the San Diego County Open in 1960, and a pair of San Diego City titles. In 1958, he was runner-up in the National Jaycee championship.

His idol from his younger days was a fellow LaJollan, Gene Littler. Chuck, who worked at the club where Littler played, said: "I used to get the caddie master to let me carry Gene's bags when he came back from the Tour."

Courtney's other Tour victories include the 1967 Puerto Rico Open and the 1969 Tallahassee Open.

1974 RECAP

Bruce Crampton continued his exceptional play in 1974 that has now produced seven straight \$100,000 plus years. The only difference between 1974 and the previous year was the lack of a victory.

Bruce played in 32 events and finished with 13 top 10 efforts while placing 12th on the money list. From February through the end of May, Bruce played in 14 straight events and never finished worse than 32nd.

The native Australian had two strong second-place efforts and in both cases there were first time winners. He fired a brilliant 66 to deadlock Richie Karl at 11 under in the B.C. Open only to lose when the hometown hero birdied the first sudden-death hole.

Then in the Southern Open, a final 65 put him within one shot of Forrest Fezler.

Bruce was also a strong third in the Tournament Players Championship, shooting a final 67, and third at Doral. He was also fifth at Hartford.

PRIOR YEARS

Without a doubt, 1973 was Bruce Crampton's most outstanding year to date. He won four times that year, and was second on five other occasions. Winning over \$270,000, he became the fifth member of golf's exclusive million-dollar club.

Entering 28 tournaments in 1973, Bruce finished in the top ten 15 times. For the first time since Harry Cooper in 1937, a foreign-born PGA member won the Vardon Trophy. Bruce's stroke average for the year totalled 70.576.

Bruce had won over \$100,000 in each of the five years prior to 1973. Much of his success is attributable to the quantity of tournaments in which he competes. For this, his fellow professionals have nicknamed him "Iron Man." From 1969 through 1973, Crampton competed in approximately 150 Tour events.

In 1972, nine of his 13 top ten finishes were ties for fifth or better, including a second in the U.S. Open and a tie for second in the Masters.

During his youth in Australia, Bruce took up golf despite the influence of his parents, who were tennis players.

Well known for his fatalistic views of tournament golf — that fate and luck have a lot to do with winning — his realistic understanding of the game is not lacking.

"To be successful you need ability," he says, "and you must find a way to produce the ability when you need it. You also need the nerve to play certain shots when you have to, and you need luck. The challenge is to find out how to do this and still control your emotions in a tight situation."

1974 RECAP

Ben Crenshaw did not win in his first full campaign on the Tour. But, he had a good year.

Ben finished the campaign with \$71,065 while finishing among the top 10 in six of 26 events. He missed the cut only four times.

In his second tournament of the season, the Dean Martin-Tucson Open, Ben chased Johnny Miller for four days and trailed by just two shots entering the final hole. A bogey, however, resulted in a second-place finish, three shots behind. The next week he was sixth at San Diego, after an opening 65.

Ben registered his second runnerup finish in New Orleans with a third-round 64 but he still finished eight shots behind. During the next three months he managed no better than a 12th place tie in the Byron Nelson until a solid ninth-place effort in the Canadian, where he opened with a 67-68.

He finished ninth the following week at Pleasant Valley and then offered his final challenge of the year in the Southern Open, sharing the lead going into the final day only to shoot a 72 and finish fifth.

PRIOR YEARS

When Ben Crenshaw joined the Tour in the fall of 1973, he came with unparalleled amateur credentials.

Among his many honors were: three-time NCAA champion (tied with Tom Kite in 1972); medalist honors in many major collegiate events; a 69.9 stroke average for 42 competitive rounds in 1973; 1973 Western Amateur match and medal titles; and the 1973 Sunnehanna Amateur title. He was also a

member of the U.S. World Cup team in 1972 and was college All-American three straight years.

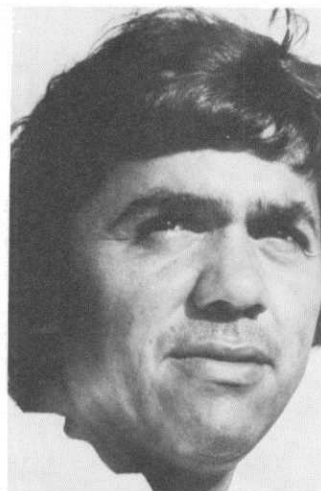
He tied for third in the 1972 Heritage Classic and for sixth in the 1973 Houston Open, both as an amateur. He was also impressive in his amateur appearances in the Masters and U.S. Open.

When Ben entered the TPD Qualifying School, he resolved all questions concerning his ability to perform under the pressure of professional golf. He was 18-under par for the 144-hole Tour qualifier to lead the field by 12 strokes! The event was played at Perdido Bay, in Pensacola, Fla., and the Dunes Golf and Beach Club in Myrtle Beach, S.C. Ben capped his eight-round performance with a spectacular 30 on the back nine at the Dunes.

He went home for the San Antonio-Texas Open the following week, and promptly recorded his first professional victory. The Tour then moved to Pinehurst for two weeks and the 144-hole World Open. After five rounds he was 18 strokes behind leader Tom Watson. A spectacular sixth-round 64 in high winds moved him into a tie for second, six strokes back. Watson skied to a 76. As the event neared conclusion, there was Ben challenging veteran Miller Barber for the title. However, Miller birdied two of the final holes to clinch the title. Crenshaw was second, three strokes back.

Ben also tied for eighth in the Heritage, after turning pro but before gaining his Tour card. For the year of 1973, Ben earned \$76,749 in only nine starts as a professional.

1974 RECAP

Rod Curl's struggle to reach the top 60 went somewhat unnoticed in 1973 and when he opened the '74 campaign by missing the cut and then withdrawing he probably was all but forgotten.

A week later in Tucson, a final-round 67 produced a fifth-place finish. The next week the turn of events made the full cycle and everyone was saying, "watch out" for the three-quarter Wintu Indian in the Andy Williams-San Diego Open.

Poor drives on the 70th and 71st holes hurt his chances and he finished a single shot behind Bobby Nichols — the first second-place finish of his career.

Two months later he posted back-to-back ninth and fourth place finishes at the Heritage Classic and New Orleans. Then, in Houston he trailed the leaders by just one shot going into the final 18 holes but he missed numerous birdie chances and ended by trailing Dave Hill by a shot.

The next week, at Colonial National, Curl was again very undistinguished at the start but in the end very "designated". The 5-5 'Yoso' ("my Indian name, it means Johnny Come From Behind") started the round two shots behind but rallied, then faltered, and then jumped ahead of Jack Nicklaus by a single shot with a curling 30-footer at 16 that netted him the \$50,000 first prize in the Tour's first Designated tournament.

Curl managed another fourth-place tie in the B.C. Open before a wrist injury in early August forced him to leave the tour until late October.

PRIOR YEARS

Since Rod Curl joined the Tour in 1973 he has had steady if moderate success . . . until 1973. That year, he more than tripled his previous best money winning year, and made the top 60.

"It has been a struggle," he admits, "I barely made the ends meet until 1973. I had to learn what most of the other players already knew. I call it going to school."

Throughout 1973, the three-quarters Wintu Indian showed signs of coming on strong again and again, only to lose his momentum. However, in the year's final event, the Walt Disney World Classic, he hung on to finish solo eighth. His \$4,425 check combined with four other top ten finishes to lift him into the top 60.

"1973 might have been the deciding year. I felt I had the ability to make the top 60 and to win \$50,000, but that doesn't mean to say you will," Rod explained.

Rod was 19 before he took up golf. His main sport in high school was baseball. After graduation, he worked in construction in Northern California, near his home town, Redding. He was unable to compile much of an amateur record, though he did well in the 1968 U.S. Amateur at Scioto in Columbus, Ohio. His performance there helped him decide to turn professional, which he did that fall.

1974 RECAP

Looking back on Jim Dent's 1974 season, he actually left little doubt that he belonged in the top 60.

The long-hitting Dent played in 31 events, and although he had just four top 10 finishes, he missed the cut only three times while winning \$48,486.

His first top 10 finish was in the Jackie Gleason-Inverrary Classic where a final-round 66 produced a tie for 10th. He also was fifth at Tallahassee and tied for eighth at Philadelphia.

Jim made his best effort in the World Open at Pinehurst shooting a final-round 66 after a third round 76 to finish in a tie for sixth, winning \$9,750.

He also won the Tournament Players Division driving contest in Atlanta before the TPC with a 324-yard, eight-inch effort.

PRIOR YEARS

During the first three years of his professional career Jim Dent, by his own admission, was known as a pro golfer and not a professional golfer. "There is a big difference. The professionals are the ones who win tournaments and make the top 60," Jim said.

During those first three years Jim Dent actually never came close to the latter category.

Always known throughout his career as possibly the king of the big hitters, he did just that but often had a hard time trying to find the ball.

Jim started as a teen-age caddie in his hometown of Augusta, Ga. at a local course called Augusta National. But he never enjoyed much competition as an amateur, just playing whenever time would permit a few rounds at the "cabbage patch", a local municipal course.

"I remember Jim, quiet, worked hard on his game. He would drive it 312 yards uphill, pin-high, at the eighth, and then 360 yards down hill at the 12th," said Red Douglas, the municipal course pro. Jim finally moved to New Jersey, worked at night as a waiter and played golf days before moving on again to Los Angeles. There his sponsor, Mose Stevens, put him on the Tour.

During those first three years, however, when he was still trying to master that short game, his best year was '73 when he won \$26,393, finishing tied for 11th at both Doral and San Antonio. His best '72 effort was a second-place tie at Disney World.

1974 RECAP

In recent years, Bruce Devlin has been splitting his time between playing on the Tour and designing golf courses. Late in 1974, he said he planned to devote more time to playing, hopeful of getting back on the winning side.

He was a contender several times in 1974, even though he wasn't able to go the distance. In fact, money-wise, he had his poorest season since the days when he was having leg problems in 1967.

Bruce earned \$37,636, his biggest payday coming in the Doral-Eastern Open, gaining a tie for third. He opened with rounds of 67, 69 and 67, but closed with a 71. His only other top 10 finish was in the World Open at Pinehurst, gaining a tie for ninth.

He missed three cuts in his first four tournaments, and then only missed two more in the next 16. His low round was a 66 the opening day in the Sammy Davis-Greater Hartford Open, but had to settle for a tie for 27th.

PRIOR YEARS

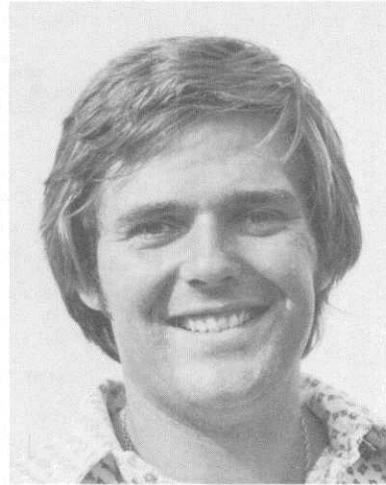
A highly respected international competitor, Bruce Devlin has Australian Open and PGA titles to his credit, along with French and New Zealand Open crowns and the 1970 Alcan, in Ireland.

He has won nine times since joining the Tour after the 1962 Masters. Bruce was winless his first two years here but, after a practice tee session with Jack Nicklaus before the 1964 St. Petersburg Open, he demonstrated the talent that would make him a consistent performer for the next decade.

Bruce enjoyed his best year on Tour in 1972, though heavily involved in golf course design with partner Bob Von Hagge. He finished eighth on the money list that year and won twice, in Houston and in the USI Classic. He was also fifth in the Masters and had four other top ten finishes, including a runner-up finish to countryman David Graham after two holes of sudden-death in the Cleveland Open.

By Bruce's standards, 1973 was somewhat disappointing. Two factors combined to rob him of victory in the Sammy Davis Jr.-Gr. Hartford Open. A record performance by Billy Casper edged Bruce's 65-67-67-66 — 265 by one stroke. Even nature worked against him. After waiting nearly an hour on the seventh tee as a storm swept across the Wethersfield Country Club, Bruce proceeded to top his tee shot an astonishing 80-yards. He laughed about it later.

1974 RECAP

Faced with the distinct possibility of losing his TPD playing card after making only \$1,900 in 1974, Terry Diehl changed the entire situation in four days at the San Antonio-Texas Open and finally emerged with a victory that even he had a hard time believing.

"I was so frustrated and depressed that I considered skipping the tournament," Diehl said. In his rookie season, he had failed to qualify 17 times while finishing only once better than 54th. In fact, he hadn't cashed a check since July.

He made it through the qualifying round with a 73 and then proceeded to shoot 68-65-65-71 — 269 and win the first prize of \$25,000. In fact, his 19 under par total was the second lowest of the year on the tour.

His 54-hole total of 198 was a low for the year and it gave him a four-stroke lead going into the final round. Then, a three-putt bogey at the 10th put him back into a tie for the lead. He birdied two of the final five holes and then watched Mike Hill miss a 15-footer at the 18th to give him the victory.

"I can't believe it," he said. "It's beyond my wildest dreams. All year I've worked and worked and beat balls and beat balls and there was a lot of strain and disappointment. But this is the greatest thing that has happened in my whole life."

PRIOR YEARS

Terry Diehl started playing golf at age 12 in his hometown of Rochester, N.Y. He had always been involved in sports, so it was a natural development to

try his hand at golf. By age 16, his game was good enough to prompt his father to say: "If I were you, I'd start hitting a lot of golf balls and forget about some of those other sports."

Terry, one of New York State's better amateur golfers, has an excellent competitive record back home. His victories there include the 1964 State Sub-Junior title; 1965 & 1967 State Jaycee; 1965-1967 Rochester Junior; 1966 State Junior; 1969 State Amateur, and a runner-up finish in the 1970 State Amateur.

While his collegiate performance was not outstanding, he did tie for second in the 1969 NCAA championship.

He turned professional in 1972 and worked in his home town before applying to the TPD Qualifying School in 1973. Just prior to the School, he felt his right-to-left game would benefit from a change. He learned to fade the ball. The consistency that resulted added to his confidence, as did the ability to hook or fade the ball whenever necessary. "These courses out here demand you shape your shots to the hole," he explained.

Since receiving his player's card, Terry has spent most of his time working on his short game. "I've always had a good talent for hitting the ball, but I've needed to work on my scoring. I needed to work on the shots from 125-yards in, sand shots, and putting," he said.

How did he find Tour life in his rookie year? "I was not bothered by the travel as much as I anticipated," he said. "I expected worse, but it was difficult for my wife and family. It's all part of the deal, though."

1974 RECAP

It was beginning to feel like old times for Dale Douglass, as he challenged for the titles in a few events and climbed into the ranks of the top 60 for the first time since 1971.

The slim Coloradoan collected \$50,663 and had four top 10 finishes in 32 starts. He missed the cut in six tournaments, but three of those were in his first four starts.

Dale's strongest run came late in the summer, during a five-week stretch starting with the B.C. Open in Endicott, N.Y. He tied for eighth there with a second-day 67. The next week he tied for fourth in the Canadian Open with the help of a second day 65; and added another tie for fourth the following week at Pleasant Valley.

Two weeks later in the Sammy Davis-Greater Hartford Open, he couldn't keep up with the birdie birage, but he followed in the Westchester Classic with a tie for seventh. He opened with a 67-66 at Westchester and collected his third \$7,000-plus check in four weeks.

PRIOR YEARS

Until 1972, Dale Douglass was one of the Tour's most consistent players, gaining exempt status during five of six years starting in 1966. Then he faltered in '72 and '73, winning a total of just over \$42,000 in two years before regaining his old form in 1974.

Born in Wewoka, Okla., Douglass honed his golf as a player at the University of Colorado and then turned pro in 1960. He hit the Tour trail in 1963, with the backing of a group of Denver businessmen.

It took him six years to find a winning formula, which he finally achieved in the 1969 Azalea Open and again in the Kemper Open. The 1970 Phoenix Open was his other tour success.

Quiet and unobtrusive with a wry sense of humor, Douglass says his only unusual difference from Mr. Average Guy is the two "ss" ending his name. As an afterthought, he adds, "that and the 19 I took at Pebble Beach in 1967. I keep hoping they will forget it, but it pops up every time I have an interview. They never mention I finished with all pars from there."

He has an often repeated philosophy about his game: "I feel that if you keep hitting the ball near the hole and keep putting at it, some of them are bound to fall. Golf is like auto racing — you can't make a game plan, you just go out hoping for the best."

1974 RECAP

Lee Elder's 1974 season can be wrapped up into a few scant moments on Sunday, April 21, in the Monsanto Open at Pensacola, Fla.

An 18-foot birdie putt on the fourth playoff hole gave Elder his first tournament victory and put an ending to the belabored story about becoming the first Black to play in the Masters.

It did not come easy. It was set up on rounds of 67-69-71-67 (10 under) that enabled him to tie England's Peter Oosterhuis. He finished regulation play with a birdie-par-birdie-birdie finish and then watched Oosterhuis miss short putts on the first two playoff holes that would have won it.

"I'm so elated, I don't know what to say. I want to cry," Elder said. He trailed by two shots entering the final round but finally, a five-foot birdie putt on the 72nd hole, after a brilliant second shot from behind two trees, clinched a tie for Lee.

"We finally won," Lee said to his wife, Rose.

Appearances, exhibitions and other new demands on his time cut into his effective tournament play. He managed only one other top 10 finish, a fourth at Pleasant Valley, while also placing a strong 11th in the PGA. Earlier, he finished in a tie for sixth at Florida Citrus.

PRIOR YEARS

Lee Elder joined the Tour after the 1967 Qualifying School. Previously, he had played for a

decade on the United Golf Association tour, at one point winning 21 of 23 events.

In his rookie year of 1968, Lee won \$31,691 and a lot of prestige among his fellow golfers. He tied Jack Nicklaus and Frank Beard in the American Golf Classic. Beard dropped out of the sudden-death playoff early, and Lee took Nicklaus to the fifth hole before Jack won with a birdie. "I showed the greatest golfer in the world that I could hit a few licks, too," Lee said.

After a disappointing season in 1970, Lee came back strong enough to be an exempt player for the 1972 season. He capitalized on his position, winning over \$70,000, good for 32nd in both money and exemption points.

Late in the summer of 1972, Lee competed in the USI Classic, skipped the L&M Open, then played the Gr. Hartford Open. For the two events he was 25-under par, but was unable to win. In the first he finished three strokes back of Bruce Devlin and lost to an 18-foot Trevino birdie putt on the first hole of sudden death in the latter.

In 1972, Lee continued his outstanding performance. Earning over \$80,000, he was again second in the USI Classic, this time two strokes behind Lanny Wadkins. He tied for third at Hartford after a brilliant final-round 64. He was two strokes behind winner Billy Casper.

In 1971, at the invitation of Gary Player, Lee played in South Africa. The trip attracted worldwide attention due to South Africa's apartheid policy. While there, Lee won the Nigerian Open.

1974 RECAP

Until Forrest Fezler arrived in Columbus, Ga. in September, the year was a repeat of 1973. Since joining the Tour in 1971 Forrest had a great track record for second-place finishes—five times, plus three close thirds. In 1974, he managed back-to-back second-place efforts in the U.S. Open and the American Golf Classic, losing the latter in a playoff.

Fezler never led in the Southern Open until the final day when he produced a five-under par 65 and a one-stroke victory. Forrest birdied six of the first 10 holes during the final round. "Winning, not the money, was the big thing. I had to get over that image of finishing second," Fezler said.

Fezler started slow, missing the cut four times while producing an eighth place tie in the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open during the first three months. A final round 70 left him one short of Hale Irwin in the U.S. Open and the following week he was in a four-way playoff at Akron only to drop out with a bogie on the first hole.

PRIOR YEARS

Forrest Fezler came to the Tour via the 1971 Qualifying School after a fine amateur career.

He was the 1969 California State Amateur champion. He had lost to Johnny Miller the year before during the semi-finals. Forrest was also

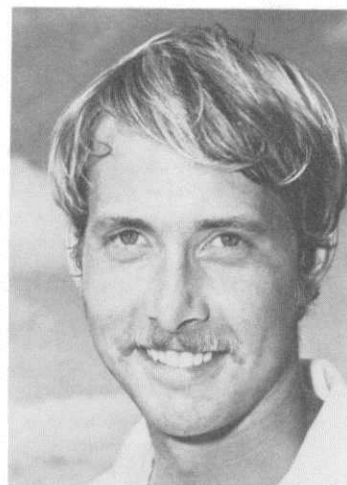
the 1969 Northern California Amateur and California Junior College State champion.

His first full year on Tour—1972—was not outstanding. After going seven weeks in the summer without making a check, he did manage to finish strongly to earn over \$26,000. However, Forrest has soared to the top of professional golf since then.

He challenged again and again for a title in 1973, only to find that one of golf's super-stars had beaten him. He finished second to Trevino in the Jackie Gleason, second to Weiskopf in the Canadian Open, and second to Gary Player in the Southern Open. In the American Golf Classic, he led by two strokes after 54 holes, only to tie for fifth behind Bruce Crampton. He also tied for third in the IVB-Philadelphia Classic, again behind Weiskopf.

But it was a remarkable year for the sophomore tourist. He won \$106,390 to finish 13th on the money list. That was the most collected by a non-winner in 1973.

A one-time back-up quarterback to Jim Plunkett during high school in San Jose, Forrest is known among his fellow professionals as "Fuzzy"—because of his mustache and hairstyle. His mother and father are named Fern and Floyd, and his brother and two sisters named Phil, Phyllis and Fauna. (He has a niece and nephews named Timmy, Tammy, Tommy, and Travis.) His brother is a low handicap golfer and his parents play in the middle handicap range.

1974 RECAP

Ray Floyd returned to his old ways in 1974, and despite the fact that he failed to win, the campaign was the best ever—moneywise—for the 12-year veteran. He finished with a career high, \$119,385, with eight top 10 finishes. He only missed the cut twice the entire year.

Floyd had a chance for the Greater Greensboro title until he bogied the 72nd hole and in the process dropped back into a second-place tie with Lee Trevino. They were one behind Bob Charles.

"I've got some personal goals now after playing for five years on the tour without a purpose," explained Floyd, who admits his confidence and attitude changed within the last year. "It's mostly a different attitude, I don't let everything bother me."

Floyd opened with a record 65 (29 on front nine) at Firestone in the American Golf Classic and held on to the lead until he shot 75 in the third round. He made the four-way playoff with a final 70 and then a par 3 at the 15th forced him and Jim Colbert to the 16th where a bogie dropped him into a tie for second.

Raymond finished third in his next outing, the B. C. Open, with a 68-68 finish, then tied for fourth in the Canadian and 11th in the PGA before getting a solo second at Hartford with a final 66, four shots behind Dave Stockton.

PRIOR YEARS

As a youngster, Ray Floyd wavered between a career in baseball or professional golf. When he won the 1960 National Jaycees tournament, his mind was made up.

In his rookie year of 1963 he won the St. Petersburg Open and was chosen Rookie-of-the-Year. He won again in 1965, and then stepped into the limelight in 1969.

That year, he won the Jacksonville Open, American Golf Classic, and the PGA Championship. He finished eighth on the money list with \$109,957.

Floyd has been a non-winner since 1969. Certainly disappointing were 1972 and 1973 when he finished 70th and 77th on the money list, respectively. However, Ray has begun to take the game more seriously and can be found on the practice tee more than in the past.

Floyd was born in Ft. Bragg, N.C., son of an Army man who now is co-owner of the Cypress Lakes Club in Fayetteville, N.C. Today, Ray remains an avid baseball fan, specifically the Chicago Cubs. He can periodically be found in their lockerroom, or with them on the practice field.

1974 RECAP

Rod Funseth, hopeful of duplicating his best-ever season of 1973, never really got untracked in 1974, finishing with \$27,507.

At the outset, it appeared as if he would have another fine year, finishing in a tie for third in his first event, the Bing Crosby ProAm. He posted rounds of 72-70-72.

Then, the next week, a third-round 69 helped him finish 24th at Phoenix but then he missed four cuts in the next six events before using a final 68 to place 14th in the Heritage.

Rod did not come close to that effort the remainder of the season except for a 15th place tie in the World Open. He played in 27 events, making money in 15 while missing the cut nine times.

Part of his problem was a hand injury, making it difficult for him to swing the club with his former authority.

PRIOR YEARS

Without a doubt, 1973 was Rod Funseth's best year on the tour. By mid-season he had surpassed his previous money winning high of \$63,567, set in 1971.

Success came early in '73 when he won the first event, the Glen Campbell—Los Angeles Open, his second Tour victory. His 276 was three strokes better than Tom Weiskopf, Dave Hill, David Graham and Don Bies.

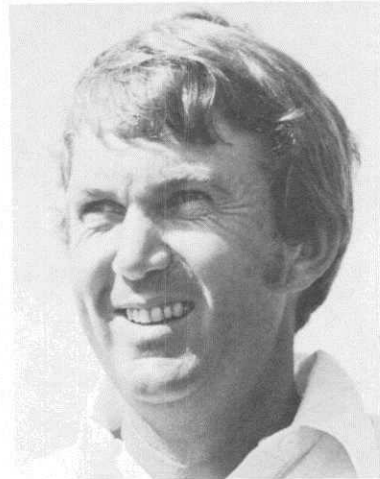
Then, with a closing 64, he was eighth at Phoenix, fifth at both Tucson and Crosby (with a final 69 in gale-force winds) and that gave him \$43,775 and within \$4,500 of what he had won all of the previous year.

"I could never figure it out because I really didn't think I was playing that well but the ball kept going in the hole," Rod said.

In 1972, Rod had four finishes in the top 10, the best being a tie for third at Jacksonville and Tallahassee. In 1971, he lost in a three-way playoff with Dave Eichelberger and Buddy Allin at Greensboro and then added two third-place finishes for a total of \$63,567.

He turned pro in '56 and joined the tour in '61 after working at various clubs as an assistant. Among other top Tour efforts are a second in 1967 in the 500 Festival at Indianapolis, ties for third in the '65 and '66 Canadian Opens, a third in the '68 Phoenix Open and then a victory there in 1965.

1974 RECAP

Al Geiberger had the low feeling—like many others have had at one time or another—that he might never win another tournament. But if you took one look at him on a sunny Sunday last fall, out in the Nevada desert, you probably figured he was a rookie who had just won his first tournament.

Geiberger ended an eight-year victory drought and crusade against a wealth of personal problems, winning the Sahara Invitational in Las Vegas by three strokes.

Not since the PGA in 1966 had Geiberger tasted victory. It wrote an end to five years of frustration that had caused Geiberger to consider quitting the Tour. The slim, peanut-butter loving Geiberger had developed some internal physical problems that at one time reduced his schedule to where he played no more than two weeks at a time.

Geiberger was inconsistent through the first three months of 1974, missing the cut three times while finishing sixth at Tucson. He produced another strong third at Monsanto and then waited until the middle of August to make a late charge, finishing eighth in the PGA with a closing 66, 24th in the TPC, and ninth at Kaiser before the Sahara victory.

"Every time you get in contention someone will ask how long has it been since you won and all you do is cut some years off and mumble a lot," Geiberger said. "Winning became more and

more important and it also seemed harder and harder to do. Second place means nothing to me at this stage of my career."

PRIOR YEARS

Akron's Firestone Country Club was good to Al Geiberger in the mid-1960s. He won the American Golf Classic there in 1965 and the following year captured the PGA Championship there.

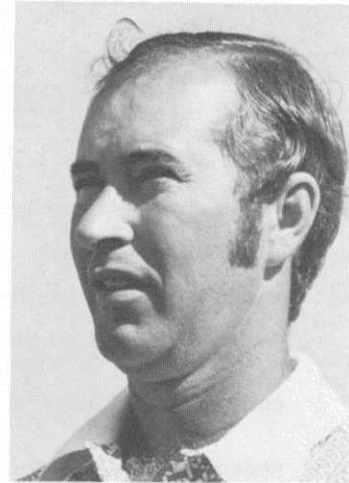
After two more good years an internal disorder sent him home for long periods of time. He had to cut back on his schedule and he suffered through four rather lean years.

Al came back strong in 1973, however. He had lost some of the consistency for which he had been known, and his physical ailment still hampered him some, but not to the extent it had.

His two biggest weeks came during the Atlanta Classic and the World Open. He finished third in the former and tied for fourth in the latter. His winnings that year put him over the half-million dollar mark in career earnings.

Known as one of the fine long iron players in the game, Al's training ground was at the University of Southern California, from where he was graduated in 1959. While there, Al compiled a 34-2 record on the golf team. He won the Pacific Coast Conference title twice, the Southern California Collegiate title twice and was National Jaycee champion in 1954.

1974 RECAP

Except for the fact that Johnny Miller happened to be playing, Gibby Gilbert could have won his second career tournament in 1974.

Gibby fashioned a credible 71-71-68 in the first three rounds of the Sea Pines Heritage event, only to land in second place, four shots back of Miller. At one point in the final round, he sliced the lead to two shots but that was as close as he came, finally gaining a solo second and \$23,250.

Three weeks later a 68-69 finish gave Gibby sixth in the Monsanto Open and then a second-round 65 helped him to a tie for 11th in the Kemper and in turn finish in the top 40 on the money list.

He did not play up to those early standards the remainder of the season, finishing no better than 18th while missing three cuts. But in 29 events, he missed just five cuts while winning \$69,992.

PRIOR YEARS

Gibby Gilbert earned his player's card at the 1967 Qualifying School where he was second low qualifier to Bobby Cole. That school also produced such Tour notables as Deane Beman, Orville Moody, Bob Murphy, Tony Jacklin and Lee Elder.

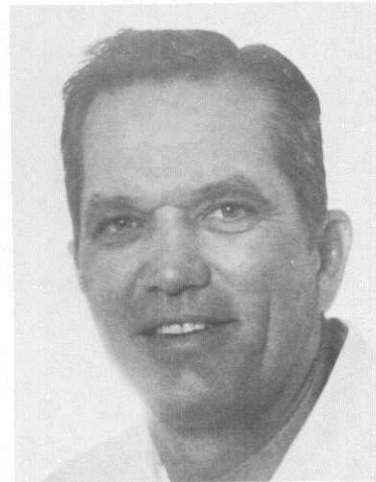
His rookie year produced slim earnings, but he vaulted into prominence in 1970 when he won over \$65,000, due principally to a victory in the Houston Champions International.

He held a Tour record in 1971, when he recorded six consecutive birdies en route to a tie for second in the Westchester Classic. In 1972, however, his earnings slipped. By the spring of 1973, Gibby was ready to trade his Tour career for a position in golf sales. Then, suddenly, his performance improved.

Beginning with the American Golf Classic in mid-June he made the cut in 13 straight events, solidifying his position in the top 60 and making him a contender once again. Perhaps the highlight of the year was a remarkable course record 62 on the first day of the 144-hole World Open on the famed Pinehurst No. 2 course. It shattered the previous record by three strokes—though Tom Watson came along the next week to equal it.

Gibby, who was born without a name—just C. L. Gilbert, Jr.—began to make a name for himself in golf at age 13 when he first took up the sport. He played on the Central High team and also the golf team at the Univ. of Chattanooga. In 1962, he quit college, married, and became an assistant professional in Hollywood, Florida.

1974 RECAP

Bob Goalby has been one of the Tour's outstanding players for many years but in 1974, the solid, consistent play that had been his forte was not to be seen.

Bob played in 25 events but only made money in 13 to collect \$18,058, his lowest total in a decade. Oftentimes, it was one round that made the difference, such as in the Masters in Augusta, where he had an opening day 76, but finished 71-72-68 for a tie for 22d.

His best finish was a tie for 14th in the Doral-Eastern Open with a 69-69 close and a tie for 17th in the American Golf Classic at Akron Firestone, where he started with a 75, but finished 70-71-70.

Interestingly enough, his best finishes came on three of the toughest courses the tourists face all year.

His low round of the year was a 66 the second day of the Greater Greensboro Open. He finished with a stroke average of 72.9.

PRIOR YEARS

Bob Goalby was an outstanding athlete at Belleville, Ill., High, winning 11 letters. He turned down one major league baseball offer and en-

rolled at the University of Illinois to play football, but stayed only one year. His heart was in golf and he wanted to be a part of the Tour.

After winning six amateur tournaments in 1955-56, he turned professional in 1957.

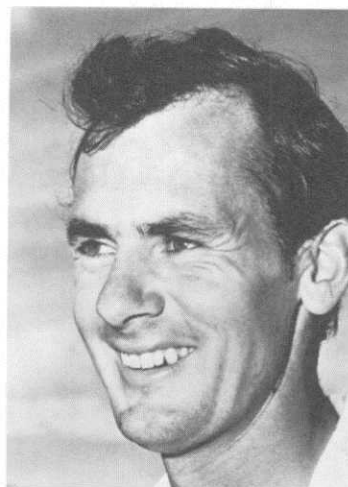
Through 1973, Bob held 11 Tour titles, the highlight being the 1968 Masters, which he won with an 11-under par 277. At the time, it was the fourth lowest winning score at Augusta.

Since his first victory in the 1958 Greensboro Open, the name Bob Goalby has been well-known in sports circles as one of the game's top players. He owns one long-standing record with eight straight birdies in the fourth round of the 1961 St. Petersburg Open at the Pasadena Golf Club.

His last three victories—1969 Robinson, 1970 Heritage and the 1971 Bahamas Open, came in the latter part of the schedule. The need to win was there, and characteristic of Bob, he went out and won.

Bob had four more top 10 finishes in 1973, his best a tie for third at St. Louis where, after an opening 55, he fought Gene Littler down to the final holes. He also had a solo fourth at Quad Cities and a solo fifth at Milwaukee, producing two eagles in the same round.

1974 RECAP

Few players were consistently better in the last two months of the season than David Graham, who regained his exempt status after winning \$61,625.

Prior to his last six tournaments, David was facing a battle to reach the top 60. During those later tournaments, he won over \$30,000, closing out with a sixth-place tie at Sahara after shooting 67-67.

He had finished ninth at Westchester, 12th in the Tournament Players Championship, 11th in the Southern and seventh at Ohio Kings Island.

He also finished 14th in the Heritage Classic and sixth at New Orleans despite fourth-round efforts of 74 and 73 respectively. At Akron, he posted a sizzling 65 in the third round only to close with a 77 and fall out of contention.

David played in 29 events and missed the cut only seven times while gaining top 10 status in six tournaments.

PRIOR YEARS

David Graham began his tournament career in the late 1960's, playing in the Australian and Far East circuits. In 1969, David tied for first place in the Singapore Open, after making the lowest-ever tournament round (62) but lost the playoff.

"I won about \$65,000," says David, who

loves to spend time designing and working with golf clubs. "If I had won that many tournaments in America, I would have made \$400,000."

Graham came to the 1970 ATP Qualifying School rated by some observers as a "sure thing" to get his player's card, but he failed to get it. The following week, David went to Buenos Aires where he and Bruce Devlin teamed to win the World Cup for Australia. Graham placed second in the individual scoring.

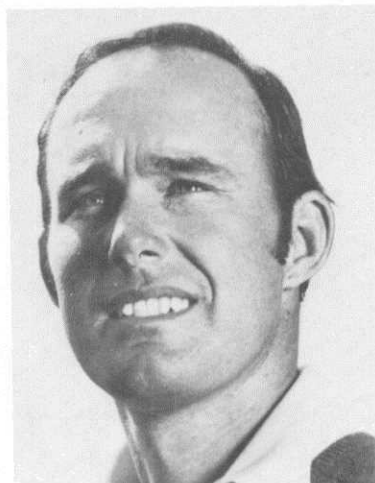
Then in 1971, Graham won the Caracas Open and Japanese Airlines Tournament. He also qualified easily at the ATP school. He proceeded to win \$10,062 in his first year.

He really exploded in 1972, finishing 38th on the money list with \$57,827. He used a set of Australian-made irons that Arnold Palmer gave him (in exchange for an old Tommy Armour putter) to finish sixth in the Western Open. Then he tied Devlin for the Cleveland Open title at 278 and finally won on the second sudden-death hole with a par.

David also tied for first at the Liggett & Myers Open at 285 along with Larry Ziegler, Lou Graham and Hale Irwin but was eliminated on the first extra hole. In a non-Tour event, the Taiheiyō Club Masters in Japan, he lost in a playoff to Gay Brewer.

In 1973 he dropped off to \$43,062 and just missed the top 60. His best finish was a second place tie at Los Angeles.

1974 RECAP

It went, for the most part, unnoticed, but Lou Graham did finish third in the 1974 U.S. Open. It was simply a case of excellent play that possibly did not receive the proper attention.

For the seventh time in eight years, Lou finished among the top 50. In 1974, once he settled down in mid-May, he only missed the cut twice while collecting six top 10 finishes.

Lou started very slowly, winning less than \$6,000 through the first 13 tournaments. Then he finished seventh in the Colonial National Invitation with a final 66 and the next week tied for second at the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic, two shots behind Gary Player.

From this point on it was smooth sailing as he backed up his Open effort with a ninth at Milwaukee, a fourth in the Canadian with a 67-67 finish and then a solid fifth in the Tournament Players Championship with a 67-67 start.

PRIOR YEARS

In March of 1973, Lou Graham had three consecutive weeks that might well have been the most interesting of his career.

It started at Jacksonville, where he opened with 68-67 and finished tied for second, one stroke back of winner Jim Colbert. The next

week, in New Orleans, he held a two-stroke lead after three rounds but a bogey on the final hole bumped him out of a tie for first with Jack Nicklaus and Miller Barber. (Nicklaus won the play-off.) Then, at Greensboro, a second-day 64 helped him to share the 54-hole lead with Billy Casper. He finished tied for second, one stroke behind winner Chi Chi Rodriguez.

Lou's steady play in 1972 and 1973 (he won the L & M Open in 1972 in a sudden-death play-off with Larry Ziegler, Hale Irwin, and David Graham, when he holed a 25-foot birdie putt on the third hole), earned him a berth on the 1973 Ryder Cup team.

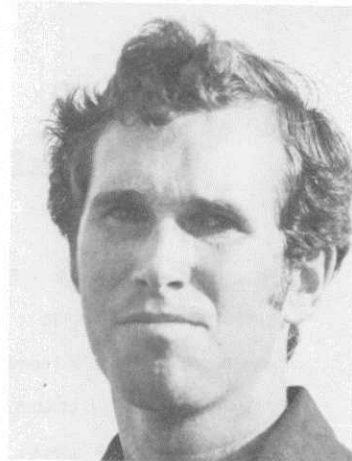
Lou took up the game at age 10, and earned himself a scholarship to Memphis State, where he stayed for three years. "I didn't like school from the day I went into first grade," he admits.

He enlisted in the Army and, despite seemingly interesting duty in the President's Honor Guard, it was too much like school. "I wanted out from the day I got in," he echoed.

When he finally did get out, in 1962, he turned professional and worked in a Baltimore club before joining the Tour in 1964. He developed steadily, but in 1968 he developed tendonitis in his left hand, which eventually required corrective surgery.

His other Tour victory came in the 1967 Minnesota Classic.

1974 RECAP

Hubert Green moved in with the superstars in 1974, winning four tournaments and finishing third on the money list with \$211,709, trailing only Johnny Miller and Jack Nicklaus.

His first triumph came in the Bob Hope Desert Classic when he fired a final-round 65 to pass Bert Yancey with a 19-under par total of 341 for the five-day event. It was his sixth start of the year.

He then added the Greater Jacksonville Open crown five weeks later. He continued to play well through the spring, with five top 10 finishes, including a tie for second at the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic and a tie for ninth in the Masters. Then came the IVB-Philadelphia Classic, and he won again, with three solid closing rounds of 67, 66 and 68.

At Jacksonville, he was tied with Jim Wiechers starting the last day, but four straight birdies on holes seven through 10 put him in command. At Philadelphia, he was two ahead of Johnny Miller when the last day started, and finally won by four.

His final victory was saved for the last event, the National Team Play Championship at Walt Disney World. Paired with hometown pal Mac McLendon they won by a single shot.

Hubert also tied for third in the PGA Championship and the Phoenix Open. He collected checks in 23 of 30 tournaments and was in the top 10 on 12 occasions.

PRIOR YEARS

Despite one disappointing year—1972—since receiving his Tour card at the 1970 Qualifying School, Hubert Green's brief career has established him as one of the game's premier players.

In his rookie year, 1971, he earned over \$73,000 and captured the Houston Champions International in a playoff with former PGA champion Don January. He also had a second, third, and two ties for fourth that year.

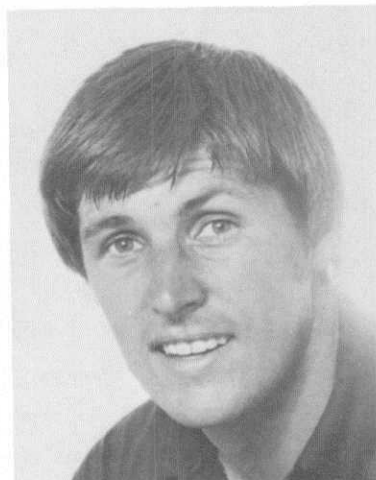
Although a bad year by Hubert's standards, 1972 did have its rewards. He married Judi Rowlands, whom he had met during the San Diego tournament. ("I was looking for my parents and I found Hubert," Judi says.) It was a turning point in his career. After missing the cut in nine of his first 26 tournaments, he completed the year with ten straight in-the-money finishes.

The following year marked the coming of age of Hubert Green, touring professional. After missing the cut in four of his first six events, he found his game and won the Tallahassee Open. En route to a late season win in the B. C. Open, he collected eight other top ten finishes. He captured the B.C. Open by six strokes after second and third round 65s, a performance bettered only by Sam Adams who had back-to-back 64s the following week in Quad Cities. Later, he tied for fourth in the Walt Disney World.

At year's end Hubert had won \$114,397, good for 11th place among the money winners.

Prior to turning professional, Hubert compiled an excellent amateur record. Generally confined to the deep South, he won seven titles, including the Southern twice. He turned down a Walker Cup nomination to attend the 1970 Qualifying School.

1974 RECAP

You can be assured that Jerry Heard never will miss playing the Tour during the month of March in Florida.

Easily one of the most consistent players on Tour—eight top 10 finishes in 24 starts—Jerry collected a cool \$59,000 with a nifty 1-2-3 swing through the Sunshine State in 1974.

Jerry started at Orlando in the Florida Citrus, where he rejected a new swing and went back to "my way," and proceeded to post a 15-under par 273 and a three-stroke victory worth \$30,000. It was the second straight triumph for Heard in the Citrus.

The next week he opened with a 65 at the Doral-Eastern Open but missed a 10-footer on the 71st hole and then a severe double bogey at the 72nd left him one-shot behind Brian Allin. He won \$17,100. The third-place effort at Jacksonville was the result of a final 68, but it still left him three-shots behind Hubert Green.

He entered the final round at the Kemper Open with a three-stroke lead over Bob Menne and Lee Trevino. But, he was forced into a playoff with Menne and bogied the first hole to finish with the \$28,500 runnerup check.

Jerry also finished second at Sahara, shooting a 66 in the third round, third at Tucson and fifth in the Tournament of Champions.

PRIOR YEARS

Jerry Heard's \$100,000 career started at age 11, when he took up golf. A year later he was

playing par golf as the result of daily practice at the driving range of a municipal course operated by his father.

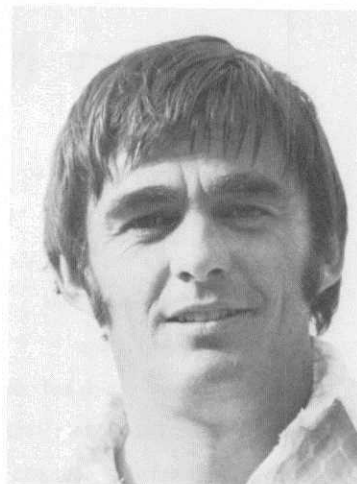
In 1968 he dropped out of Fresno State College in order to attend the TPD Qualifying School. His rookie year produced little more than \$10,000 and, in 1970, he earned but \$133 in his first five tournaments. Then, in May, Jerry got married and his career turned around. He had five top ten finishes for the year, and earned \$44,919.

In 1971, Jerry won the American Golf Classic by three strokes and collected \$112,389 for his work that year. The next year produced two more victories—in the Florida Citrus and Colonial—and over \$137,000. He had 11 top ten finishes that year.

He went winless in 1973, and his earnings dropped to \$94,223. However, he did manage a pair of seconds—on two of the country's tougher courses: Colonial in Ft. Worth and Harbour Town on Hilton Head Island. In the Colonial he finished one stroke behind Tom Weiskopf and tied with Bruce Crampton. In the Sea Pines-Heritage Classic on the Harbour Town Golf Links he tied with Grier Jones, five strokes behind a hot Hale Irwin.

"There's only one goal I've ever set," Jerry explains. "I want to win \$100,000 a year. If you do that you usually have to win a tournament or two."

1974 RECAP

Dave Hill's second best year on the Tour never got untracked until May. Even then, he remarked with his usual candor, "I don't expect to win. I'm not playing well."

This was at Houston, where four days later, during a 36-hole final, he shot a 74 in the morning round and then a 32-33-65 that tied the course record and gave him an 11th career victory.

During a six-tournament stretch midway through the summer Hill again made an impressive run at titles. He finished third in the Kemper with a 66-65 finish, then 11th at Philadelphia despite a final 72, third at Milwaukee with a final 73, third at Pleasant Valley with a final 75 and then third at the PGA.

At Tanglewood in the PGA, Hill trailed by just three shots entering the final day after an opening 74, but his putter balked and all he managed was a closing 69, still three shots behind.

Dave challenged again at Sahara but a final-round 72 left him tied for second, three shots behind Al Geiberger.

PRIOR YEARS

Ever since he joined the Tour in 1959, Dave Hill has been a prominent and colorful figure, and he has developed into one of the leading performers on the Tour.

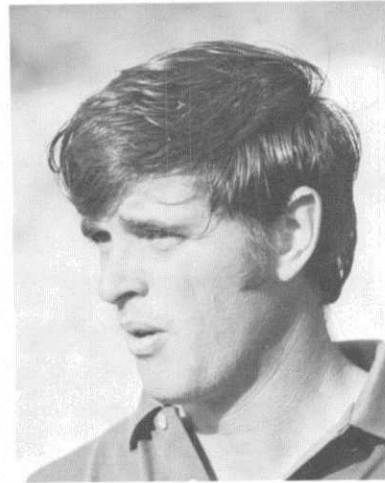
His record stayed below the \$50,000 mark until 1969, when he captured three titles and \$156,423 for second place in money winnings. That year he also won the Vardon Trophy with a 70.344 average for 90 rounds and was a member of the Ryder Cup team.

He finished tenth on the money list in 1970 and then, in 1971, began to limit his tournament play, though he still finished among the money leaders. In 1972 he further limited his tournament schedule and in 21 events won once, tied for second once, and had six other top ten finishes, none worse than a tie for sixth.

Dave collected his tenth victory in 1973 by winning the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic for the fourth time. He missed the cut but once in 21 events and his exceptional play, which included nine top ten finishes, gained him a berth on the 1973 Ryder Cup team.

He did not rejoin the Tour in late September after the Ryder Cup matches but underwent knee surgery for the removal of a cartilage. The knee had been bothering him for some time.

1974 RECAP

Mike Hill gained exempt status and his highest money finish ever on the strength of two strong late season efforts.

A consistent 68-71-69-68 at the Sahara Invitational was good enough to tie brother David for second place, three shots behind Al Geiberger.

Then in the following tournament, the San Antonio-Texas Open, he attempted to overtake winner Terry Diehl on the final day, needing to make a tough 15-footer on the 72nd hole for a tie. He missed and settled again for second place.

Mike also finished fourth in the Southern Open, fifth at Hartford with a 67-69-68 effort and eighth in the B. C. Open.

He played in 30 events and missed the cut on six occasions while reaching the top 10 another six times.

PRIOR YEARS

Mike Hill's career offers the record of a man who plays gut-level golf.

Mike decided to try the Tour in 1966, when brother Dave was establishing himself. Mike missed gaining his Tour card that year, and the

next, and the next. However, his persistence gained him the card in 1968.

He had two moderately successful years, then broke into the winner's circle when he captured the 1970 Doral-Eastern Open. The following year he found himself with only two finishes in the top ten prior to the Westchester Classic in late July. From that point on he cashed checks in 11 of 12 tournaments to gain exempt status.

In 1972, he was again fighting for his "exemption" life as the Tour moved through its final phases in the autumn. He arrived in San Antonio looking to make a big enough check to help him toward the top 60. When he left, he had the San Antonio-Texas Open title safely in hand, by two strokes over Lee Trevino.

A disappointing year lay ahead of Mike in 1973. His best finish was a tie for fifth at Sahara, and he earned slightly over \$44,635.

Mike grew up caddying with brother Dave at the Jackson (Michigan) Country Club, which adjoins the family farm. After high school, Mike spent 42 months in the Air Force. He then enrolled at Arizona State and remained there for two years before returning home to drive a truck.

However, Mike will tell you that he had it easier starting out than his brother Dave. "I had a sponsor and Dave didn't. Also, I have a great golfer to set me straight when things go wrong."

1974 RECAP

"It's like pressure I've never seen before. I'm sure leading the Masters or the Open couldn't be worse," remarked Joe Inman prior to the start of the year's final 'official' tournament, the San Antonio-Texas Open.

Inman entered the week battling five or six others for the final exempt positions. Joe responded with a 69-66-70-70 and a tie for 13th, to gain 55th place.

Inman got going in the spring, finishing 15th, 14th and 13th three straight weeks at Jacksonville, Heritage and Greensboro. Three weeks later at Tallahassee a third-round 63 brought him from seven back into contention at 204, three behind. A final 71 produced a second-place tie.

He also finished fifth at Houston, sixth at Quad Cities and seventh in Philadelphia. He suffered through a bad stretch of five events in late summer, but his 17th at the Sahara Invitational in Las Vegas and his San Antonio finish clinched his exempt status.

PRIOR YEARS

Joe Inman is the latest in a long line of outstanding Wake Forest graduates to play on the Tour.

He started his brilliant amateur career by winning the Carolinas Open in 1968. He gained All-American honors in 1969 while keeping the Deacons in the NCAA title picture and then later that same spring he won the North-South Amateur.

A member of the 1969 Walker Cup team, he also won the 1970 North Carolina State Amateur before graduating from the TPD Qualifying School in 1973. He played in a few events that year, winning \$1,331.

Joe has unusually perceptive views concerning his future.

"Most people are victims of escalating goals," he explains. "My own goals are family oriented—my wife and children, and a house. However, I'm very, very happy about being able to make my living by doing what I love, and that's playing golf."

When Joe joined the Tour, one of the things he could not understand was taking a week off here and there.

"I couldn't figure out why the players didn't compete every week," he said. "Now, after a year of the Tour, and the pressure, and the problems involved with travelling all over the country, I know."

1974 RECAP

Hale Irwin's outstanding play in the 1974 Masters gave him an indication that he could win a major event.

The strong fourth-place effort at Augusta convinced him mentally. Three weeks before the U.S. Open, he had dreamed he had won the Open and so told his wife.

Hale shot 73-70-71 at Winged Foot and trailed Tom Watson by one shot entering the final round. "I'm not a birdie machine. I do well on courses where it takes just six or seven under to win," remarked Irwin. While the contenders were dropping aside on Sunday, Irwin birdied No. 9, slipped with bogeys at 15 and 16, then made a gutty 10-foot par putt at 17 before tapping in at 18 from inches.

"I'm not going to change now because I won the Open. It has done a lot for my ego but it won't alter my personality," Irwin, who won \$35,000, said.

Irwin had two impressive finishes early in the season, taking fourth in the Hawaiian open with a final 66, then second (\$29,697) at the Jackie Gleason with a 69-69-68 finish after an opening 73. He also was seventh at Jacksonville before the Masters effort, second at Philadelphia a week before the Open and fourth in the Western.

He finished the season with equally-impressive figures—missing just one cut in 23 starts while finishing in the top 10 eight times.

Hale also won the Picadilly World Match Play title in England, beating Gary Player, two and one in the final. It was worth \$24,000.

PRIOR YEARS

At 29 years of age, Hale Irwin is a Tour veteran. He has progressed steadily and rapidly since joining the Tour in 1968—to the point where he is considered one of the steadiest players. He is always a contender, especially on the harder courses, as evidenced by his victories.

Twice he has won the Sea Pines Heritage Classic, played on the Harbour Town Golf Links on Hilton Head Island, S.C. It is considered by many as being among the country's premier courses. After his victory there in 1973, Hale admitted: "I have a very great loving for this course. It's like meeting an old friend." Rounds of 69-66-65-72 gave him a five-stroke victory.

One of the better iron players on Tour, Hale had 23 top ten finishes in 1972-1973.

Hale believes a player must come of age in golf. He must learn to control his emotions, develop his ability, and find a winning attitude. "Some players just fall into a win, others will never be winners. Winning is being the best at that which you can do the best," he says.

A two-year, All-Big Eight defensive safety from the Univ. of Colorado, Irwin won the NCAA golf title in 1967 and earned his Tour credentials in the Spring of 1968 at the Qualifying School.

1974 RECAP

It must have been a frustrating year for Jim Jamieson. Every time he started to play well, something would happen to disrupt his momentum.

After missing the cut in his first two events of the year, he came back with a strong finish in the Florida Citrus. After opening with a 70-72, he closed with rounds of 67-67 to tie for second behind Jerry Heard, who was at the start of one of the best three-week performances on Tour.

Four weeks later, Jim opened with a 66-67 in the Greater Greensboro Open, and ultimately finished sixth after closing with back-to-back 70s. Then the wheels came off the Jamieson machine for the first time.

In his next six events, he missed the cut five times. Again, however, he recovered. He tied for 11th in the IVB-Philadelphia and later tied for fifth in the American Golf Classic. But it was not the end of his troubles.

Starting with the Canadian Open in late July, where Jim missed the cut, he was forced to withdraw from his next two events, then missed the cut in the Sammy Davis Jr.-Gr. Hartford Open. In the following six weeks, he missed the cut two more times. He came to the San Antonio-Texas Open, the last tournament of the year where exemption points would be awarded, not sure of an exempt player status for 1975.

It was here that Jim showed some of the talent that he had demonstrated in the past. Perhaps he was also more at ease than at any other time during the year, as his wife had given birth

to their second son only a few weeks earlier.

After opening rounds of 69-67, Jim finished with two more 69s and tied for tenth. It was just enough to assure him a spot among the 60 leaders on the exemption point list for the coming year.

Playing in 33 events, Jim missed 12 cuts and had 4 top ten finishes. He was also forced to withdraw twice.

PRIOR YEARS

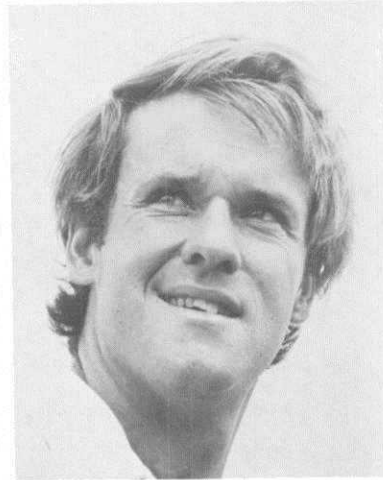
Jim Jamieson is another example of how marriage can help the career of a touring professional.

In his first nine tournaments of 1970 he missed the cut six times, then failed to qualify in his next three starts. He left the Tour, married Donna Pfister, and returned to the Tour to win money in 16 straight events. The following year he increased his earnings to over \$40,000, but failed to make the top 60 on the Exemption Point list. In 1972, however, Jim walked into the limelight of championship golf.

He won the Western Open by six strokes and his eight-stroke lead after 54 holes was the largest on Tour that year. He had seven other top ten finishes, including a tie for second in the PGA and tie for fifth in the Masters. He teamed with Tom Weiskopf that year to represent the U.S. in the World Cup.

His 1973 performance was a little disappointing, but he did earn \$67,925 and had a tie for third in the Masters for his best performance of the year.

1974 RECAP

Grier Jones did not have the type of season that he is accustomed to but still managed to finish among the top 50 for the fifth time in the last six years.

Grier, bothered by a bad hand and illness (eight withdraws), finished in the money in 15 of 23 events. He had three top 10 finishes.

He fashioned a 71-69-72 in the year's first tournament, Bing Crosby, to finish second behind Johnny Miller. Then he was ninth two weeks later at Tucson.

During one stretch in the summer, he had to withdraw from six of seven tournaments. The one tournament he played in was his second most productive of the year. He posted a third round 66 at Milwaukee to challenge leader and eventual winner Ed Sneed but had to settle for second when he could do no better than 71 on the final day.

He had only one other strong effort, 11th place at Hartford.

PRIOR YEARS

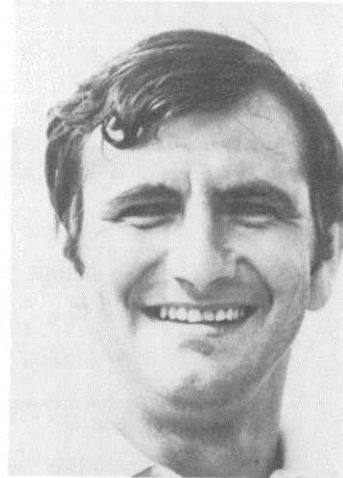
Grier Jones had a good year in 1973 despite a bad back which has severely hampered his game the last few years. He earned \$83,871 and had seven top ten finishes, the best being seconds at San Diego and Heritage.

Since he joined the Tour in 1968, Grier has had two highpoints in his career. The first came during the amateur-professional transition period. He won the 1968 NCAA Championship, Big Eight Championship, Oklahoma Intercollegiate, Oklahoma Invitational and Broadmoor Invitational, and was named to the NCAA All-American Team. He then graduated from the TPD Qualifying School as No. 1 qualifier and proceeded to win Rookie-of-the-Year honors in 1969, finishing 50th on the money list.

In 1970 he upped his money-winnings rank to 36th, then fell to 72nd in 1971 and lost his exempt status. He then found the next highpoint in his career.

In 1972, Grier finished fourth on the money list with \$140,177 and captured two Tour titles: the Hawaiian and Robinson. He also finished second in the National Team Championship paired with Johnny Miller. He had 13 top ten finishes that year.

1974 RECAP

The old saying "hometown boy makes good" is the entire story of Richie Karl's 1974 season. He won the B.C. Open in his hometown of Endicott, N.Y., the hard way, beating Bruce Crampton in a playoff.

Richie received a new lease on his pro golf career after producing four good, steady rounds —70-67-68-68—and a final 11-under par 273 total that was worth \$30,000.

"The playoff didn't bother me. I've had that for the last four years every Monday," Karl said. He entered the tournament with just \$256.38 in official winnings. "I came home after Greensboro and tossed my clubs in a closet until I realized that you have to make it fun when you play," added Richie, who grew up on the 10th fairway of the En Joie Golf Club.

Karl became the first host pro or assistant to win a regular Tour event since Earl Stewart won the Dallas Open in 1961. He started the final round in a tie for the lead but he birdied five of the first six holes for a 31 and a six-stroke lead. Bogies at 15 and 16 enabled Crampton to

catch him and force the playoff, but a 35-foot birdie on the first extra hole (the 15th) settled the issue.

Richie played in 24 events, making money in just five while missing the cut 13 times.

PRIOR YEARS

Richie Karl provided the golfing world with a very brief background prior to his qualifying for the Tour in 1971.

He grew up in Endicott, N.Y., playing in some local amateur tournaments before entering the Army in 1964. During 1965 and 1966, when he was stationed in Alaska, he captured the state amateur titles.

During his first two years on the Tour he won just over \$11,000, having one brief moment of fame when he led after the first round in Atlanta in '72 with a 66. He also won a second Tour event in 1971, the Yuma Open.

He increased his earnings to \$10,448 last year, posting a fifth-place tie at Tucson.

1974 RECAP

Easily one of the most consistent money winning players on the Tour is youthful Tom Kite. And he demonstrated why in 1974, missing just one cut while winning \$82,055 with eight top 10 efforts.

Tom, who has shown great ability to shoot low scores during the final two rounds to enter many a title chase, did the same in 1974. A third-round 68 in the opening event, the Bing Crosby Pro-Am, produced a third-place tie after a 71-75 start.

Another third-round 64 at Kemper pushed him into the picture but then a final 73 dropped him to 23rd place. He fired 69-66 efforts in his middle two rounds at Canada only to close with a 73 and then at Hartford a third-round 66 left him in the chase until Sunday's 70.

Following the third at Crosby, Tom was sixth at Glen Campbell-Los Angeles and fourth in the Heritage.

He also fashioned another strong effort in June, finishing eighth, eighth and ninth at Philadelphia, the U.S. Open and the American Golf Classic. At the Open, a second-round 70 helped but a third-round 77 hurt his chances. He led briefly during the final round at the American Golf Classic only to finally finish with a 74.

PRIOR YEARS

Tom Kite was named Rookie-of-the-Year in 1973 but, more importantly, he became an ex-



empt player after only one year on Tour.

He demonstrated a consistency that few other players have. In 35 starts he missed the cut only three times. Even more impressive, he went through a string of 23 events without missing a cut, and he went the distance in 29 of his last 30 tournaments.

Although he did win the Second Tour's hope of Tomorrow, he did not have as many high finishes in regular Tour events as he would have liked. Among his better performances were a solo fifth in the Ohio Kings Island and a tie for seventh in the Sammy Davis Jr.-Gr. Hartford Open, where he finished 63-65.

Tom started golf at age six, spurred on by the enthusiasm of his father. "He helped me very much," Tom says. "He made everything possible for me."

He captured his first title at age 11—an age group junior event at the Country Club of Austin. He decided to take the game seriously at age 14 and began entering major amateur events. In 1970, he was medalist in the Western Amateur, runner-up to Lanny Wadkins in the U.S. Amateur, and second in the Southern Amateur.

In 1972, Tom shared NCAA honors with Ben Crenshaw, was first in the All-American, and finished 19th in the U.S. Open.

Tom was named to the All-American team in 1970-1972, was a member of the 1970 World Amateur team and the 1971 Walker Cup Team.

1974 RECAP

Gene Littler left no doubt that he still is one of the outstanding players on the Tour as he finished the 1974 campaign with his second most successful money season, winning \$102,822.

Littler fashioned a third-round 65 and a sixth-place tie at Phoenix in the second tournament of the year and the next week was ninth at Tucson despite a second-round 75.

He made a run in his hometown at the Andy Williams-San Diego Open with a final 66 but all he could get was a second-place tie for the second time in five years. Another final-round 66 produced an eighth-place tie at the Jackie Gleason.

Gene followed with two fifth-place finishes midway through the season at Tournament of Champions and the Western Open, where a third-round 79 kept him out of serious contention. His final 67 gave him a solo fourth in the Tournament Players Championship. He concluded the campaign with sixth and seventh place efforts in the World Open and Kaiser International.

Gene entered 25 tournaments, made the top 10 on 10 occasions and missed the cut just three times.

Internationally, Gene went to Japan in October and won the Pacific Masters and its \$65,000 first-place check.

PRIOR YEARS

Since Gene Littler joined the Tour after his victory in the 1953 U.S. Amateur, he has been one of the most respected of golf professionals. The steady performance that produced 25 Tour titles earned him the nickname "Gene the Machine" but, in the spring of 1972, it appeared as if the "Machine" had finished his career.

He underwent surgery for cancer of the lymph glands that spring. However, to the astonishment and joy of the golf world, re-joined the Tour the following October. The following July, some 16 months since his surgery, Gene captured the St. Louis Children's Hospital Golf Classic in a tense duel over the final holes with Bruce Cramp-ton, Lee Trevino, Bert Yancey and Bob Goalby.

Despite a stomach virus that hospitalized him just prior to the tournament, he posted rounds of 66-66-68-68 for the title. Earlier in the year, Gene had received the Golf Writers of America Ben Hogan Award for his courageous recovery.

Among the highlights of Gene's golfing career is the 1961 U.S. Open title and positions on every Ryder Cup Team from 1961 through 1971. He tied Billy Casper after 72 holes in the 1970 Masters, but lost the playoff.

On Tour in the mid-'50s, Gene captured the Tournament of Champions three consecutive years (1955-1957). During that time, he was known as one of the "affluent trailer kids."

1974 RECAP

By the end of April, John Mahaffey already had collected three second-place finishes and over \$85,000 but he still failed to taste victory.

John went over the \$100,000 mark for the second straight year, had seven top 10 efforts in 24 appearances and missed the cut just one time.

He finished third in the Bob Hope Desert Classic and the next week was in contention at the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open until a final-round 71 left him in second, two shots behind Dave Stockton.

A bout with the flu kept him off the Tour for several weeks but he returned to challenge at Jacksonville, gaining a solo second, three shots behind Hubert Green. John also tied for second in the Tournament of Champions, shooting a consistent 70-70-71-70 to finish one behind Johnny Miller.

John was also eighth at Phoenix and ninth in the PGA, shooting a 67 on the final day.

PRIOR YEARS

John Mahaffey is one of the brightest young stars on Tour and even Ben Hogan will be among the first to say so, too. The two played a

practice round in May, 1971, at the Houston Champions Club where John was working for Jackie Burke and Jimmy Demaret.

"The next day, he asked me to join him again," John recalled. "After that, Mr. Hogan asked if I'd like a special invitation to play in the Colonial National in Fort Worth the next week." John accepted, and finished tied for 12th.

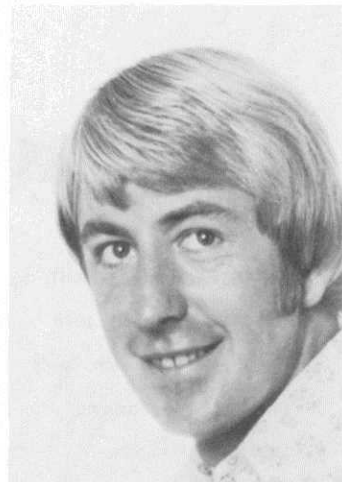
John earned his players' card in the fall of that year and he has been a superb addition to the Tour ever since. As a rookie, he won \$57,779 to finish in 39th place. He had a second in the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic.

The next year, John won his first crown, the Sahara Invitational in Las Vegas and had 11 other top 10 finishes to earn \$112,536 for 12th place. The week before in the Kaiser International, John told everyone of his physical-conditioning program, and how much better he felt. He finished fourth there.

John had a fine amateur record. He was named to the Collegiate All-America teams in 1969 and 1970 and received the Sports Illustrated Award of Merit in 1969. In 1970, while starring for the University of Houston, he won the NCAA crown and tied for low amateur in the U.S. Open.

John was an outstanding basketball player at Kerrville High in Texas.

1974 RECAP

Jerry McGee had the strong year he hoped for in 1974. He was consistent throughout the first half of the season but had just one strong finish, a sixth-place tie at New Orleans.

Then, suddenly, in his backyard, at Akron Firestone in the American Golf Classic, he moved into the halfway lead along with Ray Floyd after shooting 67-69. When rains delayed play on Saturday, his chronic aching back tightened and he shot 74. In the final round two quick birdies put him back into contention but two bogeys—and a double bogey ended his chances.

"Looks as if I'm just not destined to win—this may do me in," Jerry said.

He was far from finished, however. He challenged at Hartford, gaining a final fifth-place tie. The next week at Westchester, three 68's earned him a fourth and the biggest check of his career—\$11,750. Then a final-round 67 netted him a fifth-place spot at Ohio Kings Island.

He played in 35 events, finished in the money 25 times with five top 10 finishes.

PRIOR YEARS

Jerry McGee joined the Tour in 1967. At the end of 1971 he found himself an exempt player, and wondering if he'd ever play golf again.

He jumped out to a fast start that year, amassing over \$54,000 through the Canadian Open early in July. Then he pulled ligaments in his thumb and was forced to sit the rest of the year out. However, his winnings were enough for exempt status. In 24 tournaments, he had missed the cut only three times.

"The longer I was at home," he said, "the more I wondered if I'd ever play again."

He did play again, and then wished maybe he hadn't. In his first three starts in 1972, he missed the 36-hole cut. However, when he finished with a 68 to tie for 35th in the Hawaiian Open, he began to feel his game come together. At year's end he was again an exempt player. His most impressive finish was a tie for fifth in the Masters, which he described as "the biggest thrill I've ever had in golf." That year he also won four automobiles in the "closest-to-the-pin" contests.

Jerry's earnings slipped again in 1973, when the best finish he could manage was a third in the Southern Open.

1974 RECAP

When Mac McLendon walked into the winner's circle after the Walt Disney World National Team Championship, the 1974 Tour's final event, he had two things on his mind. He was relieved at knowing he would be around for another year on Tour, let alone as an exempt player, because he had just about run out of money. Uppermost in his mind, however, was appreciation for his partner in the Team Championship, Hubert Green.

"I definitely think Hubert is one of the Tour's superstars," Mac said. "I've learned an awful lot about the mental aspects of golf just from playing with Hubert these past few days."

But it was more than a fine partner that brought Mac the Disney title. "For the past few weeks I've practiced more than I ever have," he admitted after the tournament. The practice paid off. During the first two days of the competition Mac birdied seven of the eight par threes!

Starting the final round two strokes behind leaders Bert Yancey and Ed Sneed, Mac birdied four times on the front side to put them in the thick of the competition. After Hubert birdied 10 and 12 on the back nine, Mac added another birdie on 14, and that tied them for the lead. Hubert's birdie on 17 assured them the title. Bert Yancey and Ed Sneed and J. C. and Sam Sneed were one-stroke back.

Mac and Hubert have been friends for about 13 years, and it was Hubert who introduced Mac to the girl who became Joan McLendon, a classmate of Hubert. Said Joan after the tournament's conclusion: "When Mac was getting ready

to come up here to the Disney, he asked me to go with him because he felt that he was going to win. I believed him."

This year, Mac entered 29 events, and made the cut 13 times. His stroke average was 72.9.

PRIOR YEARS

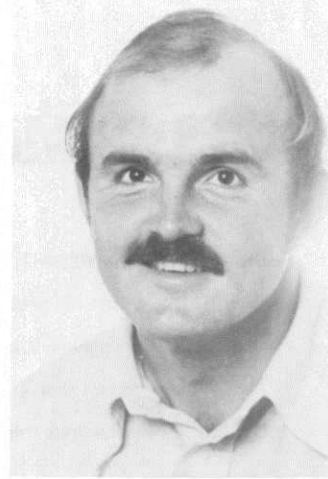
Mac McLendon won the first tournament he entered as a professional golfer, the 1968 Magnolia State Classic on the Second Tour. He went on to win \$40,469 in just six months of his rookie year.

Since then, the Tour has been a struggle for Mac, who prefers to use his nickname rather than his full name of Benson R. McLendon, Jr. Among other things, he has asthma and it often acts up during the California swing when the smog becomes severe in places such as Los Angeles.

Curiously, it was his asthma that brought him to the Tour. After graduating from LSU, he attended graduate school and took nine hours toward a Masters in Business Administration. At that time he was drafted by the Selective Service but refused for military duty because of his asthma. Unhappy with his courses and not sure of his future, he decided to try the Tour. He has been there ever since.

Not one of the Tour's long hitters, Mac has consistency and the ability to keep the ball in play. As an amateur, he won the Southeast Conference's individual championship in 1965, 1966, and 1967.

1974 RECAP

The success of Steve Melnyk's year centered around two weeks in May.

When Steve came to the Houston Open, his best finish had been a tie for 30th in the New Orleans Open. A second-round 65 put him in contention in Houston. Rain occasioned a 36-hole final round and he fired back-to-back 70s to tie for second.

The following week, during the tough Colonial National Tournament, golf's first designated event, he carried through on his momentum and tied for seventh.

During the rich summer segment of the Tour, Steve managed to finish high enough often enough to make sizeable checks, his best effort being a tie for ninth in the Canadian Open where he closed with rounds of 67-68.

It was not until the year's final event, the San Antonio-Texas Open, that Steve was assured of a place among the top 60 exempt players. One of the leading amateur players a few years ago, perhaps Steve has finally begun to find some of the success predicted for him.

In 34 tournaments, he missed only 5 cuts. He

did not qualify only once, and withdrew once, making money in 25 starts. His stroke average was 71.8.

PRIOR YEARS

Steve Melnyk joined the professional Tour in 1971 and because of his brilliant amateur career, big things were expected at the very outset.

Steve, a 1969 University of Florida graduate, captured the 1969 U.S. Amateur championship and then followed by winning the 1971 British Amateur. In both years, he was a member of the U.S. Walker Cup team.

He graduated from the TPD Qualifying School in 1971, after finishing fifth at Jacksonville as an amateur. Then in 1972, in his first full year on the Tour, he won \$31,434 while finishing third at Tallahassee and winning a second Tour event, the Canongate Open.

Last year Steve finished 66th on the final exemption point list, winning a total of \$46,143. His best effort was a second place tie at Phoenix.

1974 RECAP

Bob Menne stood over his second shot at the 72nd hole of the Kemper Open in Charlotte, N.C., thinking of what he had promised himself the night before.

"If I have a shot at it, you better believe I'm going for it."

Menne proceeded to loft his approach shot to within six feet of the flagstick, and then he dropped the putt to tie Jerry Heard at 18-under par 270. They proceeded to the first extra hole, and Heard suffered a bogey, while Bob was able to manage his par to gain the victory and a check for \$50,000.

This was the second Designated Tournament of the year, so the victory was all the sweeter for Menne in that he won over a field that offered the very best talent in the game. It was his first Tour victory.

Prior to the Kemper, Menne only had won \$7,750 and seriously was thinking about leaving the Tour. "I had been about as low as you could get," the five-year veteran said. "This makes it all worthwhile."

That was Menne's only top 10 finish and he ended the year with \$61,682, while earning money in 16 of 33 events.

PRIOR YEARS

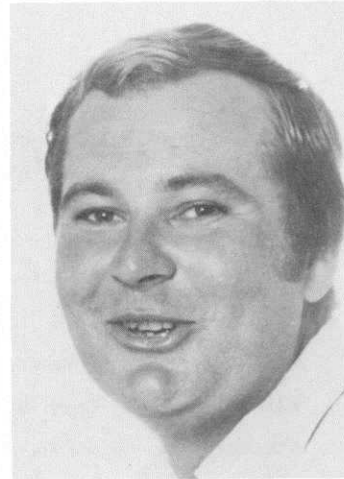
Unlike many of the tour veterans, Bob Menne did not have a glamorous amateur career. In fact, he failed in his only attempt at the TPD Qualifying School and "still wasn't ready" when he finally joined the tour.

His father, Allan, and two uncles started him with a set of junior clubs at the age of 13. He gained the finals of the state amateur when he was 16 but never managed a victory in three more attempts before becoming an assistant pro in N. Reading, Mass. (Hillview) at the age of 23. He spent two years at Reading and two more at Indian Ridge in Andover, Mass.

"When I was 25 I failed at the TPD school, which was the best thing that ever happened to me," related Bob. "But I still wasn't ready when three members approached me and the first few years was a great education with gradual improvement. I had no actual preparation for the tour."

He almost gained a victory in 1970 in the National Airlines event, leading the first day with a 64 and then keeping a tie for the top spot entering the final round. "I led until the 12th hole and then got the jitters," he said. Birdies at two of the final three holes produced a playoff with Lee Trevino, which he lost after missing a four footer on the second extra hole.

1974 RECAP

Allen Miller had one big week during 1974. While all of the winners were playing in the Tournament of Champions, Allen was in Tallahassee achieving a victory which was, to him, of far greater importance.

Posting rounds of 65-67-69-73, 14-under par, Allen led all the way in winning the \$18,000 first prize. The victory of course gave him an exempt status for a year.

The crucial shot of the tournament for Miller was a little chip to within a foot of the cup on the par 5, 17th hole on Sunday. The shot produced a birdie and a final one-stroke victory over veteran Dan Sikes and rookies Eddie Pearce and Joe Inman.

"It was like the whole world got off my back," remarked Miller.

Allen finished ninth two weeks later at Houston but the remainder of the campaign he finished no higher than 29th, missing the cut six more times and a total of 14 in 36 appearances.

PRIOR YEARS

Gordon Glenz of the TPD Staff is credited by Allen Miller as getting him started in the competitive phase of the game. Allen was 11 years old and lived across the street from the Osceola Golf Course in Pensacola.

"Gordy took a special interest in me," Allen says, "and gave me lessons right up until I went to college."

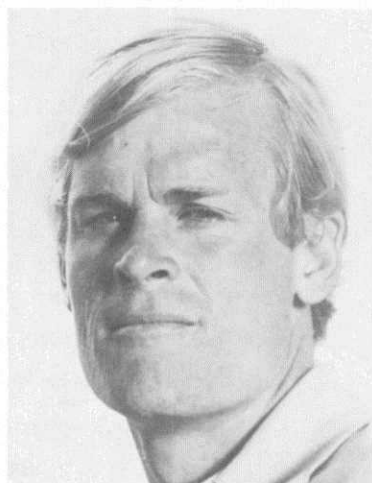
Allen established an outstanding record as an amateur. In 1965, he won the Junior Orange Bowl title in Miami and also the Florida State high school crown. He then headed for the University of Georgia.

Twice, he was on the U.S. Walker Cup team, 1969 at Cherry Hills in Denver; and 1971 at St. Andrews, Scotland. He also was on the 1970 U.S. Eisenhower Cup team.

He was brilliant in 1970, winning six good amateur tournaments, including the Canadian Amateur by 10 strokes and the Trans-Mississippi title for the second time.

During his rookie year of 1972 on the Tour, his best finish was a tie for fifth in the Heritage Classic. In 1973, his best was a tie for second in the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic with Lee Trevino, one in back of Dave Hill. He collected 46,431 exemption points to finish 63rd on the list.

1974 RECAP

Johnny Miller left little doubt as to who was No. 1 in 1974. His eight individual triumphs in only 21 appearances was the best since Arnold Palmer's 1960 effort.

His final bankroll of \$353,021.59 enabled him to shatter Jack Nicklaus' single-season mark of \$320,542 in 1972.

"I'm going to have to sit down and do a lot of thinking about next year," Miller said. "This has been sort of ridiculous, and I've got to keep everything in perspective."

Miller made his 1974 entrance by winning the first three events on the calendar—Crosby, Phoenix and Tucson, finishing a total of 37-under par. In fact, his first 23 rounds were at par or less as he proceeded to finish fourth in the Bob Hope before 'slumping' to fifth at the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open.

His fourth victory was at Heritage and then a month later he captured the Tournament of Champions. He played seldom during the next 15 weeks, finishing third at Philadelphia, but re-entered the scene at Westchester, finishing 19-under par and winning by two shots. He added the \$60,000 jackpot in the World Open, winning a four-way playoff, and the Kaiser title in his backyard (home is located on the eighth hole) before another solid sixth at Sahara.

He did not play well in the major events (best, 15th Masters) and then admitted, "I would never trade this year for one major title, no matter what anyone else says."

PRIOR YEARS

There never has been any question about the talents possessed by Johnny Miller. The first touch of greatness came in a flash of brilliance never before seen in the United States Open.

As Johnny entered the final round of the 1973 Open at Oakmont, Pa., he was six strokes behind the leaders. He started his Sunday's work with four straight birdies and finished with nine for the day—plus one bogey—for a record-smashing eight-under par 63 and won the coveted title by one stroke over John Schlee. It has been acclaimed as one of the greatest rounds ever played.

That was his only 1973 victory, but he did have 10 top 10 finishes and earned \$127,833. He joined with Jack Nicklaus in the World Cup in the fall and won the individual crown while the team brought the Cup back to the U.S.

Johnny joined the tour in the fall of 1969 and made the cut in his first seven events. His first victory came in the 1971 Southern Open, winning by five shots. Earlier in the year, he posted a spectacular 61 in the Phoenix Open.

The next year, the All-American from Brigham Young won the Heritage Classic and tied with Jack Nicklaus for second place in the Masters. Johnny's money climbed to \$99,348. He lost the Bing Crosby in a sudden-death playoff to Jack Nicklaus.

In the 1973 Bob Hope Desert Classic, his fourth-day 63 was a course record at Tamarisk and it led to a tie for second.

Johnny did win the 1964 U.S. Junior championship. In his first U.S. Open start at the Olympic Club in 1966, he was eighth.

1974 RECAP

A painful thumb injury was Bob Murphy's main story for 1974. It kept him out of action for four months and limited his action to just 19 events. He finished in the money in all but four of these.

Despite the inactivity, Murphy did mount several challenges for victory, the most notable in the World Open at Pinehurst. He grabbed the first-round lead with a 34-31-65. He followed with 74-73 but rallied with a 69, including a birdie on the 72nd hole, to finish at 281 and tied for first with three others.

He bogied the first hole, settled for \$23,200, and watched Johnny Miller win No. 7.

Prior to his injury in late March, he tied for fourth in both the Bob Hope (with closing 66) and Florida Citrus events. He also was a strong sixth in the Tournament Players Championship with a 69-68 finish.

PRIOR YEARS

The Bob Murphy success story is one of the more interesting ones on the Tour. For example, he was a highly-regarded baseball player when

he went to the University of Florida on a scholarship. An injury forced him out of action during his freshman year, so he turned to golf. He won the 1965 United States Amateur title and the 1966 NCAA crown.

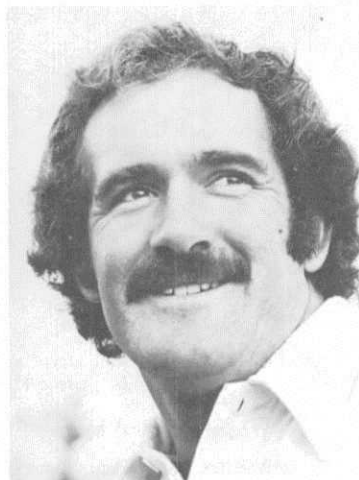
He attended the fall qualifying school in 1967 and obtained his card. His performance the next year was one of the finest ever turned in by a first-year man. He collected \$105,595, which was the most ever won by a rookie. Lanny Wadkins topped that mark in 1972.

Most of his rookie-year money came in a three-week stretch, when he was second in the Westchester Classic and then won the Philadelphia and Thunderbird tournaments the next two weeks.

He wasn't able to match that mark in 1969, but came on strong again in 1970, winning \$120,639 with a victory in the Greater Hartford Open highlighting the year. He lost the 1972 Hawaiian Open in a sudden-death playoff to Grier Jones, and in 1973 he lost the Westchester Classic to Bobby Nichols when the latter eagled the 72nd hole to gain the tie and then rolled in a 25 footer on the first extra hole to win.

Late in 1972, he did enjoy the taste of victory in Australia, winning the Wills Masters.

1974 RECAP

Dwight Nevil, 61st on the magic exempt list in 1973, had somewhat solved that problem early in 1974.

He opened with a 65 in the Hawaiian Open, closed with a 68 and finished fourth, winning the second highest check in his career, \$9,680. The following week a closing 67 gave him an eighth-place tie in the Bob Hope Desert Classic.

During Masters week Dwight won his second straight Magnolia Classic, cut from 72 to 36 holes by rain. He finished with 64-69-133, two shots ahead.

Consistency (70-68-72-72) gave him a tie for fifth in the American Golf Classic and then he registered eighth and ninth place efforts in the Southern and Pleasant Valley events.

The former Dallas fireman played in as many events as anyone (40), missing the cut 10 times while finishing in the top 10 on seven occasions.

PRIOR YEARS

The first item on Dwight Nevil's list of things to do in 1973 was to completely overhaul his swing. He did it in stages, working successively on the position of his left hand, right hand, and

right arm. As a result, he recorded two Second Tour victories.

By the fall of that year, he said: "All the changes are made and I feel like I'm going to win some money now." He promptly finished second in the B.C. Open with a 12-under par 272 and the following week tied for second in the Quad Cities Open with a 13-under 271. Two weeks and 25 under par, but no victory.

At the year's end, Dwight found himself 61st on the Exemption Point list. He had missed being an exempt player by less than \$400. Had he finished one stroke lower in the year's final event, the Walt Disney World Classic, he would have earned the needed \$400. He had bogied the 72nd hole.

Dwight had little national amateur experience, though he did play on his high school team and the North Texas State team during his years there.

He worked in a Dallas fire department for six months before joining the Air Force. In 1969, he won the World Wide Air Force Championship. He joined the Tour in 1971. In 1972, he opened with rounds of 66-65 in the Westchester Classic and ultimately finished third, for his best finish that year.

1974 RECAP

All Bobby Nichols did in 1974 was go out and win a couple of golf tournaments while it seemed as if the attention was being diverted elsewhere.

Johnny Miller had won the first three events and in the fourth, Andy Williams-San Diego, Rod Curl was making a major bid along with hometown favorite Gene Littler. By Sunday Nichols quietly and steadily moved into a tie with Curl.

When Bobby triple bogied the seventh it looked tough but birdies at 16 and 17, where a bold approach hit a spectator and bounced back 15-feet away, allowed him to sneak by both Curl and Littler by a single shot. "I had only three bogies all week, but I never really felt confident," Bobby said.

Five months later in the Canadian Open, Nichols received a vital putting tip from Canadian friend Gary Cowan and shot 67-67-68-68, winning the \$40,000 prize by four shots. After he birdied 13 and 14 on the final day, he hardly was challenged.

The victory was especially important to Bobby since it led him into the World Series of Golf at his home course, Akron's famed Firestone. He finished third behind Gary Player and Lee Trevino.

In between victories, Bobby finished fourth at Pleasant Valley, sixth in Hawaii and seventh in both the Masters and Doral. He played in 27

events and only missed the cut five times. He collected \$124,747 for his best-ever year.

PRIOR YEARS

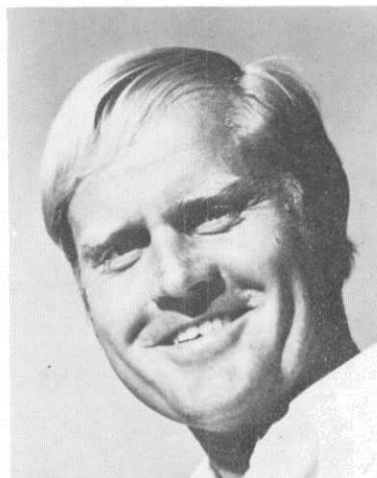
The head professional at the Firestone Country Club in Akron, Bobby Nichols has proven himself capable of winning the big event. Among his victories he includes the 1964 PGA Championship, the 1970 \$300,000 Dow Jones, and the 1973 Westchester Classic.

Bobby took the Westchester in sensational style. Forced to play the third and fourth rounds on Sunday due to inclement weather earlier in the week, Bobby finished with 70-65, coming from five strokes off the lead at the start of the final round. He eagled the 509-yard 72nd hole with an 18-foot putt to tie Bob Murphy, then sank from 25 feet for birdie to win on the first hole of sudden death.

Bobby was also runner-up in the 1967 Masters. One of the Tour's more popular players, he was a football and basketball star in high school until he suffered a tragic car crash. He turned to golf during his recuperation and, while attending Texas A&M, won the 1956 Southwest Conference title.

In 1962, Bobby received the Ben Hogan Award for his courageous recovery. He was named to the 1967 Ryder Cup Team.

1974 RECAP

Jack Nicklaus won two tournaments, \$238,178, and finished in the top 10 in 13 of 17 individual tournaments. That is a splendid record by nearly anyone's standards but for Jack, it was something of an off year.

A major championship eluded him, but take a closer look at the record. He tied for fourth in the Masters, was 10th in the U.S. Open at Winged Foot, second to Lee Trevino in the PGA at Tanglewood and second to Gary Player in the British Open.

His first victory came in early February when he captured the Hawaiian Open by three strokes with a 17-under par total of 271. An opening-day 65 was a big boost there.

Over the Labor Day weekend, Jack added his

second title, in the Tournament Players Championship on the Atlanta Country Club course. This was an important triumph, in that it was the first TPC and he received the Joseph C. Dey, Jr., Trophy. He had to outlast the thunderstorms and the strong challenge of J. C. Snead to get it.

"I had not won in a long time," Jack said, "so I wanted the TPC very badly. I feel as if I salvaged at least a part of the year with this win."

Two weeks later in the World Open at Pinehurst, Jack tied with Johnny Miller, Bob Murphy and Frank Beard, but Miller won the playoff. He had another second, in the Colonial National at Fort Worth, where a bogey at the 71st hole dropped him one behind Rod Curl.

Prior to the World Open, Jack was one of the inductees into the World Golf Hall of Fame.

1974 RECAP

Andy North gave every indication in 1974 that he is a player to be watched in the years to come. The tall, good-natured fellow moved into the ranks of the top 60 in this, his second full year on Tour.

His biggest moment came in the Houston Open, when he opened with a 73, but added scores of 68, 67 and 69 for a 277 total to finish in a tie for second, one stroke behind Dave Hill. Because of an earlier rain postponement, the final 36 holes were played on Sunday. Later, Andy said, happily, "I played well in the morning, but I really tired in the afternoon."

He also had a tie for fourth in the Jackie Gleason-Inverrary Classic, despite a slow 73 start. His only other top 10 finish was a solo eighth in the Hawaiian Open, thanks to a 67-68 finish.

He entered 34 tournaments and only missed the cut five times, which is a good example of his steady play. His largest paycheck came in Houston, \$11,706, and he finished with \$58,409 for the year.

PRIOR YEARS

It took a serious knee problem to get Andy North off the basketball courts and football fields

and onto a golf course. When he was in the seventh grade it was discovered that a bone in his knee had ceased to grow and was disintegrating. He was on crutches for 18 months.

Finally, he was told that one game he could play was golf—if he rode in a cart. Since his father was a low handicapper, this was fine with the family. With the help of his dad and Lee Milligan, then the head pro at Nakona CC in Madison, Wis., Andy's career in golf was started.

He did come back to play high school basketball and was all-state in his senior year, but he also won the Wisconsin state high school golf title in 1966 and 1967. He won the state amateur in 1969 and was runner-up in the Wisconsin State Open in 1968 and 1969.

He then moved on to the University of Florida and became an All-American for three years. He won the 1971 Western Amateur and the Houston All-American titles. During his sophomore year at Florida, he underwent corrective surgery on the knee and it has been fine ever since.

He joined the tour in 1973, just missing the top 60 (64th) while winning \$48,672. He won the Little Crosby title and then was third at Monsanto and Ohio Kings Island.

1974 RECAP

Arnold Palmer, except for his first year on the Tour in 1955, never has finished lower than 27th on the exemption point list. Along came 1974 and he won only \$36,293, and finished 75th. As the 1960 U.S. Open champion, though, he is exempt for life.

Arnold played in 21 events and missed the cut six times, but he still was one of the biggest favorites with the folks in the galleries. He'll never lose that touch. Certainly, one of his highest honors came in 1974, when he was one of the original inductees into the World Golf Hall of Fame at Pinehurst, N.C.

During the week of the U.S. Open, all was forgotten. The nostalgia fans came out in full force at Winged Foot where a 33 during the final nine of the second round gave him a 143 and a

share of the lead, erasing from memory that fact that he had missed the cut in the three previous tournaments.

"I can't elaborate on the reasons but winning would do so much for me at this point in my career," remarked Arnold. He posted a 73 on Saturday to drop three shots behind and then a final-round 76 allowed him no better than a fifth-place tie.

Two weeks later in the Western Open a consistent 74-72-74-74 never really vaulted him into the title picture but it did produce another fifth-place tie. He showed more encouraging signs at Canada with a 69-71-68-69 that left him in 13th place but he finished no higher than 28th the remainder of the season, missing the cut in both the TPC and the World Open before teaming up with Lanny Wadkins to finish 25th at Disney.

1974 RECAP

Eddie Pearce was well on his way to becoming a serious contender for Rookie-of-the-Year honors until a motorcycle got the best of him in mid-March. The backyard accident sidelined him for six weeks with a broken collarbone and in the process stopped a strong start.

In only his fourth tournament, he was second to Jack Nicklaus in the Hawaiian Open with a final-round 66, winning \$25,000. At the time, it placed him 14th on the money list.

Tallahassee was his first start following the accident and he fashioned a consistent 68-68-70-69 to tie for second.

He never really got back in the groove the remainder of the season, missing the cut five times while finishing ninth in the Tournament Players Championship. He was also 13th in the Southern Open and 17th in the American Golf Classic.

PRIOR YEARS

Few young players have come out of Florida with more impressive credentials than Eddie Pearce. As a junior, he won nearly every tourna-

ment in which he competed in the Sunshine State.

He started to play the game at the age of four under the watchful eye of his father in Tampa. At age 12, he broke 70 for the first time with a 69. At age 16, he won the U.S. Golf Association Junior Championship at Brookline, Mass., and was runner-up to Ben Crenshaw in the International Jaycees tournament in Tulsa, Okla.

Eddie headed for Wake Forest on an Arnold Palmer Scholarship. As a freshman, he won the North and South title at Pinehurst and was third in the National Collegiate. The next year, he was runner-up in the U.S. Amateur and the North and South.

He was one of the youngest ever to win the Florida Open, and did that at Lehigh Acres at age 18. In 1968, at age 16, he was one of the few ever to compete in the U.S. Open, National Juniors and National Amateur championships.

He turned professional in the fall of 1972 and missed in his bid to earn a Tournament Players' card. He did win more than \$50,000 on the mini-tours the next year and finally earned his TPD card in the fall of 1973.

1974 RECAP

Gary Player had another of his outstanding years, and it was climaxed by his induction into the World Golf Hall of Fame at Pinehurst, N.C.

The South African won two of the major golf championships—the Masters and the British Open—and he added the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic to his long list of honors. He also collected \$108,372 on the U.S. Tour, marking the fifth time in the last six years he has passed the century mark.

His first triumph was in the Masters, and it was a third-day 66 that made it possible. He finished with a 10-under par total of 278 for a two-stroke margin. He equaled a course record at Augusta National with five straight birdies, the 12th through the 16th, en route to the 66.

He opened 69-68 at Royal Lytham in the British Open but a third-round 75 prevented a rout. However, he started birdie-birdie in the final round and added an eagle at the sixth and birdie at the seventh to take command. It was his eighth major championship and third British crown.

In Memphis, Gary was five-strokes back with 17 holes to play, but he recorded a five-under par 67 for a 15-under total of 273 to gain the

\$35,000 first-place check. He opened with a 65 there.

Playing in 15 U.S. events, he missed the cut only twice and was in the top 10 five times. Elsewhere, he won his 13th South African Masters, but lost in the finals of the Picadilly World Match Play in England to Hale Irwin.

PRIOR YEARS

Gary Player claims a great golfer is someone who can win anywhere in the world. He has accomplished that feat and has to be considered one of the great "world players".

Perhaps his greatest achievement is having won golf's four major championships: the U.S. Open (1965), the British Open (1959, 1968, 1974), the PGA (1962 and 1972) and the Masters (1961 and 1974). In this respect, he ranks with Gene Sarazen, Ben Hogan and Jack Nicklaus. In fact, he is the only foreign competitor to have won the Masters.

He started off in 1973 with an operation in January and never really began to play well—except for a 12th place finish in the U.S. Open—until September when he finished seventh at Hartford, won the Southern Open and placed fifth in the Heritage.

1974 RECAP

Victor Regalado probably will share the 1974 storybook success story with Richie Karl and Terry Diehl.

Regalado, a bona fide Merry Mexican, finished the season with \$61,848 and \$40,000 of that came out of Sutton, Mass., where he overtook veterans Dave Hill and Tom Weiskopf to win the Pleasant Valley Classic.

He entered the Pleasant Valley tournament having won a total of \$16,776 in less than two full years on the tour. He opened with a 68, giving credit to Forrest Fezler and Homero Blancas for several putting lessons, and then added 72-69-69.

Through nine holes on Sunday, Victor still seemed out of serious contention after shooting a 38. But, he birdied both 10 and 12 (20 footer) and then dropped another 20-foot birdie putt on 15 to take the lead. He made a key 10-foot par putt at 17 and then upstaged challenger Weiskopf at 18 by making an eight-foot birdie putt.

Victor had one other top 10 finish in '74, a strong third-place effort at Ohio Kings Island where he was in serious contention until a double bogie at 18 for a final 73. He won \$8,983.

PRIOR YEARS

Winning golf tournaments was a habit Victor Regalado enjoyed during his years prior to joining the Tour in the fall of 1972.

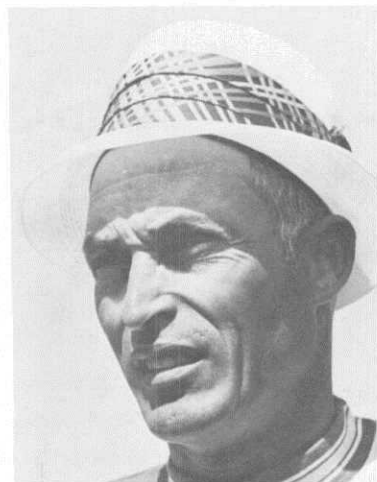
He started to play the game at age 11 at the Tijuana Country Club, which was located only about two blocks from his home. The first tournament he entered was the Pan-American Juniors at Tijuana CC, and he won it, at age 14.

Victor won numerous events in Central America during the next few years, but among his most impressive were the Mexican Amateur in 1970, the Mexican PGA in 1972 and the Mexican Masters in 1972 and 1973. He was runner-up to Lee Trevino in the 1973 Mexico Open.

Victor also won the San Diego City Amateur titles in 1967 and 1970. Twice, he represented his homeland in the World Amateur Eisenhower Cup Matches, 1968 and 1970. In the latter competition in Spain, he was the low individual.

Twice, he was selected to play for Mexico in the World Cup, 1972 and 1973. During his rookie 1973 year on the Tour, his best finish was a tie for 14th in the B.C. Open. He won \$9,512 for the year.

1974 RECAP

Maybe Juan (Chi Chi) Rodriguez, who failed to win in 1974 for the first time in the last three years, did come up with the winning "line" of the season.

Chi Chi missed his chance in the Sahara Invitational in Las Vegas—he had closed to within one shot of Al Geiberger—after finishing the short par five 18th on Sunday. After hitting a shot in the water, another in the woods and finally taking a triple-bogey eight, he remarked: "I knew before the week was out I'd figure some way to make a hard eight."

Chi Chi, with his 72 finish—after opening with 68-68-69—finished in a tie for sixth.

He won his biggest check of the year in the Canadian Open, grabbing the lead after shooting 68-63. But, a third-round 74 eventually hurt his chances as he finished in a tie for fourth. Juan was also eighth in the Kemper with a second-round 65, eighth at Jacksonville and sixth in the Florida Citrus.

PRIOR YEARS

Juan "Chi Chi" Rodriguez learned to play golf as a youth in Puerto Rico by hitting tin cans with guava tree limbs. When he turned 19, he felt the pressures of family responsibility, so he joined the Army "to make money, more than I could have caddying at Dorado Beach."

He came to the Tour in 1960, and never finished higher than sixth until he won the 1963 Denver Open.

Chi Chi, whose effervescent personality once brought him the title "The Clown Prince of the Tour," lost his exempt status as the result of surgery in his arms late in 1970 and thus a poor season in 1971. Consequently, he made up his mind to take the game more seriously. The result? Nine top ten finishes plus a victory in the Byron Nelson Golf Classic and \$113,503 for the season.

In 1973 he captured the Gr. Greensboro Open with rounds of 68-66-67-66. He was also a contender in the Masters the following week, until a final round 76 dropped him into a tie for tenth.

One of the most respected and well-liked touring professionals, a sense of having to do things for other people has been one of the motivating factors behind his career.

1974 RECAP

John Schlee will remember one big putt in 1974, one that probably vaulted him back into top 60 status.

He was in contention during the first three rounds of the Canadian Open with 69-66-69 but during the final round had managed no better than even par through 17 holes. Then he made a 16-foot birdie putt on the final hole, allowing him to tie Larry Ziegler for second and win \$18,500.

"I've never had a putt worth so much, it was kind of fun," he confessed, knowing that if he missed he would have shared third with five others. He and Ziegler finished four shots behind winner Bobby Nichols.

During the last three months of the season a back injury forced him to withdraw from four tournaments. Despite the injury, however, he turned in a gutsy effort in the PGA. He shared the first-round lead with two others at 67 and then a 22-foot birdie putt on the final hole of the second round left him in sole possession of the halfway lead at 135.

"When your signs are right you can do anything," measured the Tour's resident astrologist. Maybe the 'signs' were a little off the final two days since he shot 75-75 and finished in a tie for 17th.

The week prior to the Canadian, a third-round 65 vaulted him into contention at the B. C. Open but a final 70 allowed him to finish no better than in a tie for fifth. He also finished eighth at Philadelphia despite a closing 75.

PRIOR YEARS

There will be more good years on the Tour for John Schlee, but none may ever quite match 1973 in his mind. Most significant, his first victory in eight years of trying came in the Hawaiian Open, when he overtook Tom Watson on the final day and eventually won by two strokes. He was four strokes behind Watson when he left the first tee that warm afternoon.

It also was a special year because he nearly won two more, the most impressive being his second-place finish in the U.S. Open at Oakmont. He was tied for the lead after the third round, but Johnny Miller roared from far back with his historic 63 to win the crown by one stroke.

Late in the year, John lost a sudden-death playoff in the Kaiser International to Ed Sneed, but his \$118,017 for the year gave him what he called "financial security, at last."

John joined the Tour in 1965 for a brief spell, and was on it fulltime in 1966. He played well enough to be the Rookie-of-the Year. He was the medalist in the first Players' School in 1965, so his performance was not unexpected. The next four years were rather lean ones, but he made the top 60 exemption point list in 1971 and has been there ever since.

A Memphis State University man, he was an Army paratrooper for two years. Among his hobbies are astrology and photography.

1974 RECAP

Dan Sikes probably had a slight inkling at the very outset of 1974 that it might be a demanding year. He missed the first five cuts and his low round over the stretch was 71.

He then responded in the fashion that has distinguished his fine 14-year career, finishing in the money in 17 of the next 19 events. He won a total of \$44,166, his lowest total since 1966.

Dan made a strong move at Tallahassee, opening with 67-69-67 to challenge Allen Miller on the final day. But a closing 72 left him in a tie for second, one-shot behind.

He was 19th in the Colonial National with a second-round 68 and then during a three-week stretch in late July and early August he was seventh in the B.C. Open, ninth at Pleasant Valley and 17th in the PGA with a final round 68.

He played in 25 events and finished in the money 17 times.

PRIOR YEARS

A member of the Florida Bar Association, Dan Sikes joined the Tour in 1961 because "I can't make this much money this fast in law," he said.

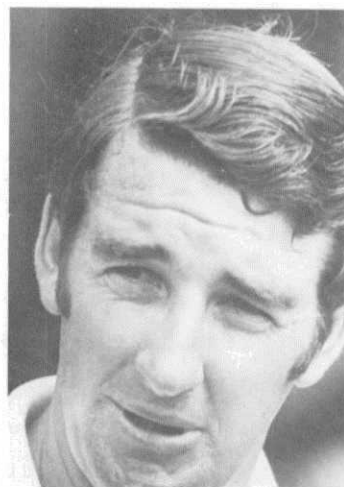
Fittingly, Dan has served as a Player-Director on the TPD Policy Board.

A graduate of the University of Florida and of their Law School, Dan served a hitch in the Army, during which he won the All-Army Championship. He also holds the 1957 National Public Links title.

Undoubtedly, Dan's finest year on Tour came in 1967. He won twice that year, at Jacksonville (his home town) and at Philadelphia. He was also second to Jack Nicklaus in the rain-delayed Westchester Classic. After "missing the cut" repeatedly in the second round, only to find the round washed out by the rain, Dan ultimately fired a 62 the day the second round was completed. It was the first Westchester Classic, and the tournament has been good to him since. He tied for second the following year, was third in 1969, and tied for third in 1973.

In 1973, Dan came back strong after a bad year and had his third best money-winning year. Twice he finished second, once in his hometown of Jacksonville and again in the Byron Nelson Golf Classic. This latter was a heartbreaker. Holding a three-stroke lead going into the final holes, Lanny Wadkins emerged from the pack to birdie five of the last seven holes for a 31 and he and Dan headed for the first hole of a sudden-death playoff. Lanny won it as Dan bogeyed.

1974 RECAP

J. C. Snead again reached the lofty \$100,000 plateau and for the second straight year he accomplished the feat without winning a tournament. In fact, his '74 total of \$164,486 was the highest for a non-winner.

Consistency was again J. C.'s strong suite as he finished in the top 10 in 11 of 30 events. He had three second and two third-place efforts. The Ryder Cup team member finished out of the top 30 only four times.

He finished third early in the season in the Dean Martin-Tucson and Hawaiian Opens and then was fifth midway through the season at the Kemper Open and American Golf Classic. The next week he challenged Tom Weiskopf in the Western Open only to watch Tom Watson breeze by both of them on the final day. He and Weiskopf finished second, two shots behind.

J. C. again finished second in the first Tournament Players Championship, this time to Jack Nicklaus by two shots. The following week he needed to make a 13-foot putt on the 72nd hole to tie Forrest Fezler in the Southern Open but it slid off to the right.

PRIOR YEARS

J. C. Snead made his move in the major championships in 1973, and barely missed going the distance twice. He was second in the Masters to Tommy Aaron and tied for third in the PGA. It was a big year for Jesse, as he had nine finishes in the top 10, cracked the \$100,000 barrier for the first time, and was named to the U.S. Ryder Cup team for the second time.

J. C. dreamed of being a major league baseball player in his youth and after playing in the farm system of the old Washington Senators for a while, he gave up on that ambition in 1964 and turned to golf.

He worked as an assistant pro to Charlie Beverage at the Century Country Club in Westchester County, N.Y., and admits he spent most of his time playing and practicing. Twice he tried to gain a spot on the tour in the qualifying school and failed, but once he earned his PGA card in 1968, he packed his suitcase.

After three rather lean years, J. C. struck it rich in 1971, winning the Tucson and Doral-Eastern Opens within the span of three weeks. Later in the year, he lost a playoff to George Archer in the Greater Hartford Open. The year netted \$92,929, and a coveted spot on the U.S. Ryder Cup team. The next year, he won the IVB-Philadelphia Classic and had six top 10 finishes.

1974 RECAP

"It's good to know that you can win again," Ed Sneed said following a victory in the 1974 Greater Milwaukee Open. "I've seen it happen before, a guy gets it together one week and then you never hear of him again.

"I didn't want that to happen to me," added the soft-spoken ex-Ohio Stater who won his first tournament in 1973.

Sneed fashioned a 12-under par 66-67-71-72 and in the process led all four rounds at Milwaukee. "Nobody gave it to him. It's tough to lead all four rounds," said runner-up Grier Jones, who trailed by four shots.

Sneed posted 14 birdies during the first two rounds (66-67) and then finished just one under during the final 36 holes. He one putted 10 times during his first round and had just 55 putts in the first two rounds.

During the first half of the year he struggled with two severe cases of the flu and had all of his wisdom teeth pulled. He missed seven cuts. He challenged again at Quad Cities, finishing sixth, and a final-round 65 gave him 14th in the B.C. Open.

In the year's closing event, the Walt Disney World National Team Play Championship, Ed and Bert Yancey had the third-round lead, but they finished tied for second.



PRIOR YEARS

Tom Weiskopf knew all along that his close friend, Ed Sneed, would be a winner on the tour. While Ed battled to stay alive during his first four years, Weiskopf kept insisting that there wasn't any reason for Ed not to make the top 60 exemption list.

Finally, in 1973, Sneed put it all together in the Kaiser International at Napa, Calif., winning the tournament after a sudden-death playoff with John Schlee. The weekend before, Ed won the New South Wales Open in Australia, with an eagle at the 17th and a 10-footer at the 18th. He then caught a plane for San Francisco and made it to Napa in time for the Monday qualifier—thanks to the day gained via the International dateline.

Ed started to play golf at "about 13" when he would visit his grandparents. He was born and reared in Roanoke, Va. He went to Ohio State University and by the time he was a senior, he was No. 1 man on the golf team. He won the Ohio Intercollegiate and the Columbus district crowns.

He earned his playing privileges in 1969, but split his time over the next two years between the Tour and Walker Inman's pro shop at Scioto Country Club in Columbus. Ed made the Tour a fulltime job in 1971. The next year, he did win the Maumelle Open, a second-Tour event in Little Rock, Ark.

1974 RECAP

Bob Stanton long will remember the 1974 San Antonio-Texas Open. It was there that he fashioned a consistent 67-68-69-69—273 to finish in a tie for seventh and earn \$3,687. It moved him into the top 60 on the exemption point list for the first time.

Actually, it was an exceptional effort through the final weeks of the season that netted the Australian the exempt status. A final round 67 gave him a solo fifth in the World Open, and \$12,300. Actually, he only was one stroke behind the four players who played off. That was the tournament, though, that put him into position to make a run at the top 60.

He missed the cut the next week in the Ohio Kings Island, but tied for 22nd in the Kaiser International at Napa, Calif., thanks to a third-round 64. The following week in the Sahara Invitational at Las Vegas, he had another third-round 64, and finished tied for ninth.

Earlier in the year, Bob had two other ties for ninth, in the Monsanto Open at Pensacola and the Houston Open. He finished with \$45,215 and earned money in 25 of 31 individual events.

PRIOR YEARS

Although Bob Stanton had no amateur background, his long list of proven international

credits stamped him as a potentially strong U.S. Tour player.

Bob secured an apprentice professional's job when he was 15 in his native Australia. After working for three years he played on the Australian tour in '65, then traveled to Europe the following summer and won the German Open.

Also in 1966, he came to the States and was the second-leading qualifier (four shots behind Harry Toscano at 576, 144 holes) in what at the time was the largest class ever to be approved for the Tour. Bob left the Florida school immediately to play in the Australian Dunlop International, proceeding to tie Arnold Palmer after 72 holes and then win in sudden death on the second hole.

He won only \$11,112 in his first full year on the tour, 1967, but victories also came in the Tasmanian Open, again in the Dunlop and the New South Wales P.G.A. He won \$20,550 in '68, finishing second in the American Golf Classic and third at the Western Open and then increased his earnings to \$32,289 the following year, finishing second in the Avco Classic at Pleasant Valley.

Bob just missed making the top 60 in 1970, finishing 61st, with money winnings of \$56,213. He was second in the Florida Citrus and third in the National Airlines. Personal problems forced him to miss almost all of the 1971 and 1972 seasons winning \$4,691 and \$4,766.

1974 RECAP

For the first time in nine years, Ken Still failed to finish among the top 60. In fact, his position on the point list (82nd) was his lowest since 1963.

Ken got off to a slow start, with just two top 20 efforts in the first three months—20th in the Hope and 19th at L.A.

Then he opened with a 66 at Greensboro and proceeded to gain a 13th place tie. Three weeks later a 68-69 start produced an 11th place tie at Tallahassee and then in the Canadian Open an opening 65 gave him a share of the lead. He finished 18th and the next week was 16th at Pleasant Valley despite a final 74.

His best effort of the season came at Westchester where he went 70-79-68-70 for a ninth place tie.

Part of Ken's problems this year could be attributed to a neck injury which required traction. He only was able to enter one event from mid-May to mid-July.

He won \$31,961 for the season, collecting checks in 17 of 26 events.

PRIOR YEARS

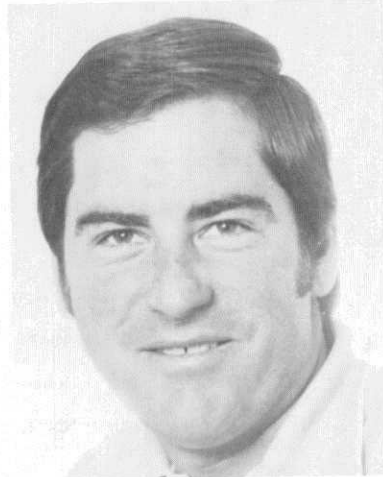
In 1953, Ken Still turned professional, at age 18. He waited seven years before joining the Tour, in 1960. It was another nine years before he captured his first of three Tour titles.

In 1969, he won the Florida Citrus and Milwaukee events, and earned \$72,514 for his best year on Tour. The following year he won the Kaiser International Open in sudden-death over Lee Trevino and Bert Yancey.

One of the Tour's most avid sports fans, Ken played baseball in high school, but turned to golf after investigating a job as a caddie at the Firecrest Golf Club. Ken is always rooting for his fellow competitors. "I like to see everyone play well," he says.

Ken's best tournament in 1973 came in the Gr. Greensboro Open, where he finished one stroke behind Chi Chi Rodriguez, the winner. He made up five strokes the final round with a seven-under-par 64. He was delighted with the effort, saying, "It's the most under par I've ever been in one round of a tournament."

1974 RECAP

Dave Stockton and his magic putter experienced their best season in 1974. He produced single season career highs with three victories, a total of \$155,105 and a near miss at Augusta in the Masters.

Stockton captured his eighth Tour victory in the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open, beating back a challenge of veteran Sam Snead and John Mahaffey on the final day to win with an eight-under par 276, just one stroke off of Ben Hogan's course record at Riviera.

"Sam birdied the 17th and told me on the 18th tee he birdied the final two holes here in '50 to beat Hogan and it kind of startled me," recalled Stockton. He then hit a three wood second shot 235 yards, landing just 12 feet from the pin. "It's the best golf shot I ever hit," Dave said. He birdied the final hole.

Stockton's second victory of '74 came at Quad Cities, where he trailed by six shots entering the final round. But a closing 64 gave him a one-shot edge and once again Snead was one of his challengers.

Dave recorded the lowest 36-hole total of the season in the Sammy Davis-Hartford Open, a 12-under 130 total. He finished with 69-69 and an easy four-shot victory. It prompted a phone call that evening from an earlier pro-am partner, President Gerald Ford.

Not to be forgotten was a second-place tie with Tom Weiskopf in the Masters, two shots behind Gary Player. He led by one after the third

round at 207 but a final 73, with 19 putts on the front nine, hurt his chances and a bogey at 16 ended it.

PRIOR YEARS

Dave Stockton was on the Tour for three years, barely getting along, when he suddenly discovered the secret of winning. Since then, Dave has been one of the game's outstanding players.

His first triumph came in the 1967 Colonial National Invitation in Fort Worth, on one of the game's toughest courses. He also teamed with Laurie Hammer that year to win the Haig Scotch Foursome crown.

He won twice in 1968—the Cleveland Open and the Greater Milwaukee Open—but saved his finest week for 1970 when he outdueled Arnold Palmer and the extreme heat at Tulsa's Southern Hills to win the PGA.

Dave is a descendant of a Declaration of Independence signer from New Jersey. He started to play the game seriously at age 17, following an injury to his back in a surfing accident. Dave—just as his father, Gail, did—went to the University of Southern California, and became the captain of the golf team.

In winning in Milwaukee in 1973, Dave had a 63 the third day for his low round of the year. It was one of 32 rounds he posted in the 60s. Always a consistent player, he made 28 cuts in 31 starts that year. Thanks to a last-day 67, he finished second in the Houston Open, one behind Bruce Crampton.

1974 RECAP

Leonard Thompson finally reached the high goal he had established for himself in 1973—making over \$100,000 and even more important, winning a Tour tournament.

Thompson entered the winner's circle in late February, grabbing the \$60,000 first prize in the Jackie Gleason-Inverrary Classic. He was over the \$100,000 mark by early August, finally finishing the year with seven top 10 finishes in 32 appearances.

Thompson went into the final round at Inverrary tied with Roy Pace and Tommy Aaron. He scrambled with seven birdies and three bogies but a 10-foot putt at 10 gave him the lead for good and an eventual one-shot victory over Hale Irwin.

"I really didn't think about the money. And I wasn't nervous, tense yes," Thompson said. "Winning gave me a lot of self-satisfaction, something you can't put into words." He donated \$10,000 of his share to the tournament beneficiary, the Boys Clubs of America.

In the next four weeks, Leonard finished sixth in the Florida Citrus, 12th at Doral, fourth at Jacksonville and fifth at Heritage. Following a ninth-place effort in the Tournament of Champions, he failed to finish in the top 10 again until fall, placing third at Ohio Kings Island and fourth at Kaiser.

PRIOR YEARS

Leonard Thompson played for Wake Forest from 1965 through 1969, and played with such fellow tourists as Lanny Wadkins and Joe Inman. In 1967, Leonard was named the "most valuable" Deacon.

He missed in his first attempt to obtain a player's card on the Tour, but once he did make it in the fall of 1971, his career has gone straight toward the stars. He earned nearly \$40,000 in 1972, his rookie year, with a solo second in the Tallahassee Open his best finish. He was 61st on the exemption point list.

Leonard set a goal of winning \$75,000 in 1973, and he easily sailed past that, especially after his third-place finish in the World Open, for which he received \$27,513. He also tied for third in the Kemper Open in Charlotte, N.C., after a 67-65 start gave him a two-stroke lead. So, in his home state, he pocketed more than \$42,000.

When the season closed, big Leonard had \$91,158 for the year. He had five other top 10 finishes and posted 34 rounds in the 60s. His performance in the Western Open probably was the most unusual on the tour for the year. He tied for 20th, firing rounds of 77, 64, 74 and 65.

Prior to joining the tour, Leonard spent a year as an assistant professional at the Possum Trot course in North Myrtle Beach, S.C.

1974 RECAP

The highlight of Lee Trevino's 1974 campaign came in mid-August at Tanglewood Golf Club in Clemmons, N. C., when he captured his fifth major championship in seven years, the 56th PGA.

Lee reached the \$200,000 plateau for the fourth straight year, adding two other titles along with the PGA. He won his 16th Tour event in March, the Greater New Orleans by the biggest margin of the year (eight strokes) and with the lowest score (267, 21-under par).

He arrived at Tanglewood and found a new putter in the attic of a widow's home he was renting. He opened with a disappointing 73, fashioned a second-round 66 with five of the birdie putts exactly three feet, then a third-round 68 to lead Jack Nicklaus and Bobby Cole by one shot. His final 69 for a four-under par total of 276, was one better than Jack.

Lee also mastered another problem—Firestone Country Club. He won the \$50,000 first prize in the World Series of Golf, defeating Gary Player on the seventh playoff hole. Both tied at 139 and five playoff holes were held Sunday but darkness forced a halt until Monday morning.

Lee played in 26 events and finished in the top 10 on 13 occasions, including second-place efforts at Greensboro, Byron Nelson and Kaiser. Greensboro came the week after New Orleans and a fourth-place effort at Hartford followed the PGA win.

PRIOR YEARS

No one noticed when Lee Trevino played in the 1966 United States Open at the Olympic Club in San Francisco. It was his only start on the Tour that year. The incredible Lee Trevino story began the next June, though, when he entered the Open at Baltusrol, N.J., finished fifth and won \$6,000. He was on the Tour to stay.

It seems appropriate that a man of his tremendous talents would make his first victory the U.S. Open, and he did it in 1968 at Oak Hill in Rochester, N.Y. He added the Hawaiian Open title to his trophy room later that year.

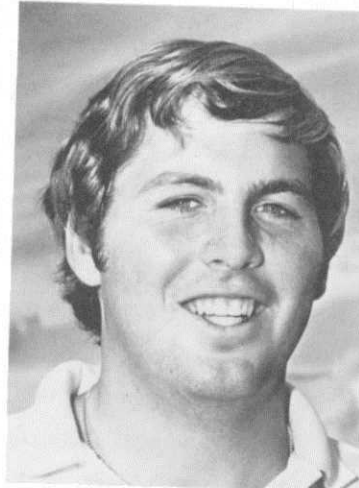
The tale is most impressive indeed. He won another Open in 1971 at Merion, defeating Jack Nicklaus in a playoff. He won the British Open in successive years, 1971 and 1972. He represented the U.S. on World Cup teams, 1968 through 1971 and was the low individual the latter year. He played well on the 1969, 1971 and 1973 Ryder Cup teams.

Lee won the Vardon Trophy for the low stroke average on the Tour by PGA members, 1970, 1971 and 1972.

Meanwhile, he was continuing to win regular Tour events and in six years, 1968 through 1973, he won 13 times. In 1971, he was named PGA Player of the Year as he won the U.S., British and Canadian Opens in a span of five weeks.

Lee had accumulated more than \$1 million in winnings by the end of his sixth full year on the tour, marking the fastest anyone ever had won their "first" million in tournament play.

1974 RECAP

It was a disappointing year for Lanny Wadkins. The young man who had led an unprecedented assault on the Tour his first two years discovered what it is like when everything goes wrong. It is to his credit that he still played well enough to rank among the top players on Tour.

Lanny tied for second at Phoenix, for the third year in a row. After three 69s, he closed with a fine 65 to trail Johnny Miller by one. In the Jackie Gleason-Inverrary Classic he again closed with a 65 to tie for fourth behind fellow alumnus Leonard Thompson. Not until the year's final event, the Walt Disney World National Team Championship, did he mount a substantial charge.

Paired with Arnold Palmer in the Team Championship, the Wake Forest powerhouse started the final round seven strokes off the lead. Six birdies on the front nine thrust them into contention, but their move faltered. They closed with a five-under 67 to finish well back in the field.

It is interesting to note that Lanny had 30 rounds in the 60s in 1973 and only 17 in 1974. His low round for the year was a 65 in both cases.

In addition, he missed nine cuts this year, as opposed to only three the year before. He also withdrew once in 1974, and was disqualified once. For 27 events, his stroke average was 72.2.

In early December, Lanny underwent a 3-hour operation for the removal of his appendix and a diseased gallbladder. Doctors believed that these ailments were partially responsible for his "off year," as the disorders deprived him of his strength and energy. He was expected to miss most of the Western portion of the '75 Tour.

PRIOR YEARS

Everyone knew Lanny Wadkins was going to be a fine young player, but his ascent up the ladder was even more meteoric than expected. After he obtained his players' card in the fall of 1971, he played in four tournaments and collected \$15,921.

He climaxed the next year with a victory in the Sahara Invitational at Las Vegas, besting Arnold Palmer by a stroke and Jack Nicklaus by three. He finished with \$116,616 and 10th place on the money list. It was the most ever won by a first-year player.

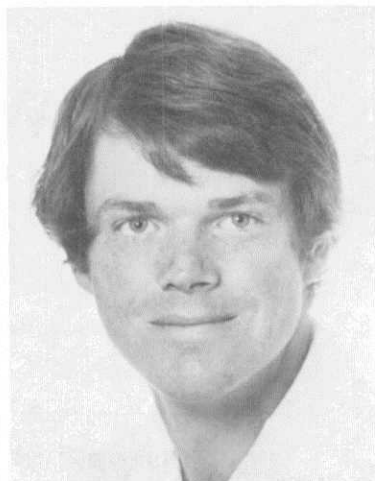
Also that year, he lost a sudden-death playoff in Phoenix to Homero Blancas, and had eight other top 10 finishes.

Last year, the star continued to soar. He won the Byron Nelson Classic in Dallas with birdies on five of the last seven holes to tie Dan Sikes, and then clinched the playoff. He also won the USI Classic in Sutton, Mass.

His check book totaled \$200,455 for 1973 and a fifth-place finish on the dollar list. The record also included runner-up spots in the Kemper, Phoenix and American Golf Classic, while he was third in the PGA and two other events.

As an amateur, Lanny won the 1970 U.S. Amateur, along with the Southern and Western Amateurs. He also was runner-up to Bob Goalby in the Heritage Classic that year. His career started early, winning the 1963 National Pee Wee crown. Lanny was a member of the 1969 and 1971 Walker Cup teams, the 1971 World Amateur Cup team and was a Collegiate All-American in 1970 and 1971.

1974 RECAP

Tom Watson's previous efforts the first two years on the Tour gave strong indication of what might come and when he started out the 1974 season by finishing fourth, ninth and fourth in the Andy Williams-San Diego, Hawaiian and Glen Campbell-Los Angeles events you figured victory was close.

With five holes remaining at the Byron Nelson, Tom was deadlocked with Brian Allin only to watch the eventual winner make three consecutive birdies. Tom finally tied for second, four shots back.

Only a third-round 74 stopped him from finishing no higher than fourth at the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic.

Exactly three weeks later, at famed Winged Foot in the U.S. Open, he had a simple critique on Sunday night. "I blew it." That day, after shooting 73-71-69 to lead by one shot, he posted 39-41-79 and finished in a tie for fifth.

Two weeks later he ended the bridesmaid chapter to his career by staging the best come from behind of the season (six strokes with a 69) to overhaul Tom Weiskopf and win the Western Open and \$40,000.

PRIOR YEARS

Tom Watson was six years old when his father, a one-time scratch handicapper, introduced him to golf. Tom responded by developing into a four-time Missouri State Amateur champion. He also played varsity golf for three years while at Stanford, and was number-one man his senior year. Shortly before he graduated with a psychology degree, he decided to try the Tour.

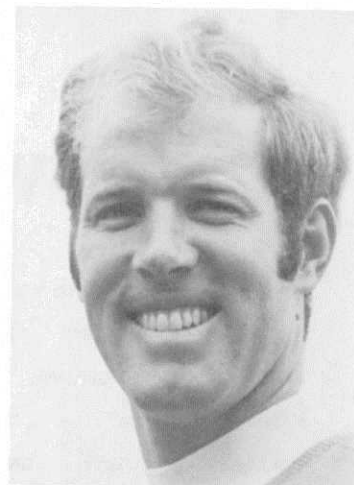
Tom admits he "had only one good tournament" his rookie year, but he was satisfied with his beginnings. He finished 69-66 to finish second by one stroke to Deane Beman in the Quad Cities Open.

In 1973, Tom came closer to victory, but twice let it slip away. He led by three after 54 holes of the Hawaiian Open, but a closing round 75 let John Schlee and Orville Moody slip by him.

Then, in the \$500,000 World Open, he took charge after the fifth round on the strength of a magnificent record-tying nine-under par 62 on the tough Pinehurst No. 2 course. He came from five shots behind Gibby Gilbert to six strokes ahead of the field. Then his superb iron play began to waver, and he finished the tournament tied for fourth.

He did have eight top finishes for the year, however, and collected \$74,973.

1974 RECAP

Tom Weiskopf reached another lofty milestone in his career during 1974—becoming one of golf's elite million dollar winners—and, in the process, finished among the top 20 for the seventh straight year.

He made three serious challenges for titles before finishing second, the first coming in the spring at Augusta. He entered the final round of the Masters in fifth place, trailing by three but when he hit a "fat" shot into the water at 16 it killed his chances. He tied for second, along with Dave Stockton, two shots behind Gary Player.

Tom was the lone player under par (minus one) as he entered the final round of the Western Open with a five-shot lead. He still was tied for the lead after a bogey at 17 but a double bogey at 18 left him with a final 77 and two shots behind Tom Watson in second place.

He finished second at Pleasant Valley to another first-time winner, Victor Regalado. He was also third at Westchester, fifth at Doral-Eastern and Philadelphia and sixth at Heritage.

Tom played in 21 events and proceeded to have nine top 10 finishes.

PRIOR YEARS

Few players in history have come close to the season Tom Weiskopf fashioned in 1973. He

more than attained the greatness everyone had predicted for him.

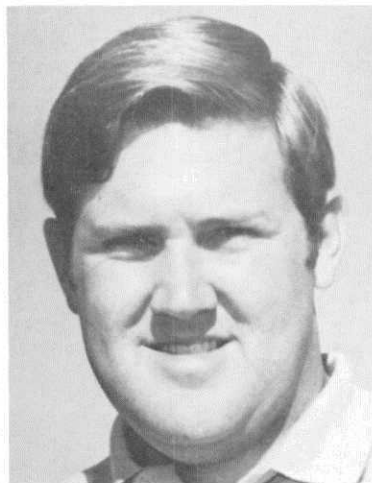
He won four titles on the U.S. Tour, plus the British Open at Troon, Scotland, the annual World Series of Golf, and the South African PGA Championship. In addition, he had three second place finishes and four thirds in the U.S. and a number of top ten finishes overseas. He also distinguished himself in Ryder Cup play.

At one time during the year, he had a streak of five victories in eight tournaments. In all, he had 14 top ten finishes on the U.S. Tour. During his hot streak, 20 of his 40 rounds were in the 60s. He collected \$245,463 for third place on the money list.

A former Western Amateur champion and two-time Ohio Public Links victor, it was four years before Tom captured his first Tour title. While he has not recorded a victory each year, he has played well enough to be among the money leaders at year's end.

While off the Tour during the fall of 1972, Tom defeated Lee Trevino in the 36-hole final of the World Picadilly Match Play in Great Britain, finished second in the Lancome in France, and then teamed with Jim Jamieson to represent the U.S. in the World Cup.

1974 RECAP

Jim Wiechers retained his position in the top 60 for the third straight year, this time earning \$52,383 in 30 tournaments. Once again, though, it was the final round that proved costly to the big, friendly Californian.

One of his biggest disappointments came in the Pleasant Valley Classic. He started 72-67-68 and was challenging Tom Weiskopf for supremacy. However, the best he could manage on the hilly course was a final-day 76, dropping into a tie for fourth, as Victor Regalado came on to win.

He also finished fourth at the Greater Jacksonville Open, as a 67-66 effort for the middle days put him in solid contention, only to see his hopes vanish in a final-round 76.

Jim had two other top 10 finishes, a solo ninth in the Western Open and a tie for 10th in the Greater Greensboro.

He had two 66s for his low rounds of the year, one at Jacksonville and the other in the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open.

PRIOR YEARS

Jim Wiechers joined the Tour via the 1966 Fall Qualifying School. Previously, he had fashioned a successful amateur career that included victories in the Western Amateur and Trans-Mississippi.

He advanced to a number of \$40,000-plus years after an unprofitable rookie season. Then, in 1972, he won \$54,749 despite a six-week layoff due to hepatitis. He capitalized on his exemption for the 1973 season by winning \$78,986, good for 32nd on the money list.

That year, he had eight top ten finishes. Nine times he finished a tournament with a round in the 60s, demonstrating his ability to make a move against the leaders. His best finish came in the Gr. Jacksonville Open where he finished one stroke behind winner Jim Colbert.

He put together rounds of 65-66-69-66 to tie for third at Hartford, two strokes behind Billy Casper.

Although one of the biggest men on Tour at 6' 2" and 205 pounds, much of Jim's success comes from his fine touch around the greens.

1974 RECAP

For the second straight year, Bert Yancey found just enough trouble on the final day in no less than three tournaments to keep him away from victory.

Bert made a strong bid in his fourth start of the year at the Bob Hope Desert Classic, recording the best score on the tour in the last four years—an 11-under par 30-31-61 at Indian Wells—to move into contention. And he missed a three-foot putt at 17.

He still held a three-shot lead going into the final round but a 70, as opposed to Hubert Green's 65, dropped him to second place. He finished 10th the next week in Los Angeles. Three weeks later he posted a final 65 to tie for fifth at the Doral-Eastern Open.

Again, at the U.S. Open, he challenged, shooting a 69 in the second round. But he managed just 73-72 the final two days and finished third, three shots behind Hale Irwin.

The next week in the American Golf Classic he came from the pack on the final day to lead after 10 holes but he double bogied 18, missing a three-footer, that cost him a tie for second or even a spot in the four-way playoff. He finished fifth.

Bert joined with Ed Sneed in the Walt Disney World National Team Play Championship. They led after three days, but finished tied for second.

PRIOR YEARS

Fascinated by golf history and blest with the ability to analyze the golf swing, and the golf champion, Bert Yancey has long been recognized as one of the stand-out performers on Tour. He can often be found giving golf clinics on Wednesdays after the pro-am.

Bert joined the Tour in 1964, and captured his first, second, and third titles in 1966 when he won the Azalea, Memphis and Portland events. Since then he has been a consistent money winner, and proven himself capable of firing the very low round to move into contention.

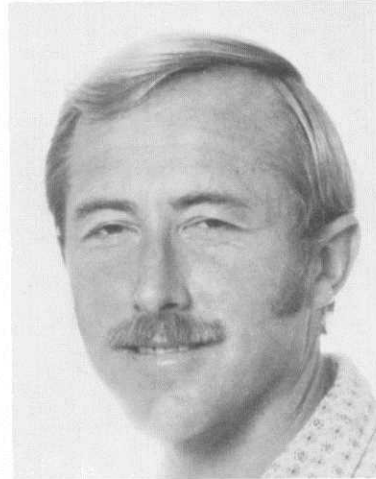
In the last event of 1972, the Walt Disney World, he fired a record tying 64, reeling off seven consecutive birdies, a high for the 1972 Tour.

He developed the bad habit of coming up with the one bad round in 1973. For example, he started with a 74 in the Kaiser, and then came on strong with 69-67-70. His best performance of the year was in the St. Louis Children's Hospital Golf Classic, where rounds of 68-69-68-66 put him three strokes behind Gene Littler.

Bert's one big desire is to win the Masters, and he is a perennial contender. In the 1968 U.S. Open, his five-stroke lead after 45-holes was demolished by an unknown pro from Texas, Lee Trevino. Bert hung on to finish third, behind Lee and Jack Nicklaus.

Bert is also one of the more vocal members of the Tour's weekly Bible study group.

1974 RECAP

Kermit Zarley missed making the top 60 list for the first time in five years and he can look back at 1974 and easily pick out several key tournaments where a strong finish would have made a difference.

Kermit played in 28 events and missed the cut in six while producing three top 10 efforts. He finished 64th on the final point list, 3,500 points behind the 60th position.

A consistent 68-71-68-71 effort at the Dean Martin-Tucson Open gave him a tie for sixth. Then in the Byron Nelson, a final 66 gave him a sole sixth. Another strong 68-68-70-69 effort was good enough for seventh in the Kemper and his largest check of the year, \$8,000.

In three other events he finished 24th—Jackie Gleason Inverrary Classic, Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic and the Western Open. On each occasion he posted a final round of 75.

PRIOR YEARS

Kermit Zarley started his golfing career in Seattle, Washington, where his father owned a restaurant near a public course. Before he at-

tended the University of Houston he had won both the Washington State and Northwestern Amateur championships. During his senior year at Houston he captured the NCAA title.

Since his graduation, "the pro from the moon," (so named by Bob Hope), has had a profitable if not spectacular Tour career. A final round 65 edged Dave Marr by one stroke for the 1968 Kaiser International Open title and his first Tour victory. He followed with the 1970 Canadian Open crown, this time beating Gibby Gilbert with a closing 67.

In 1972, Kermit teamed with close friend Babe Hiskey to win the National Team Championship. Both Kermit and Babe have been active for years in the Tour Bible study classes which they hold each week. That same year, Kermit started the final 18 holes in the U.S. Open only one stroke behind Jack Nicklaus. However, the Pebble Beach winds blew his round to a 79 and he finished sixth.

Kermit enjoyed his second best year on Tour in 1973, thanks mainly to a talent for low final rounds. He closed with a 67 at Quad Cities to tie for second; had a 67-64 finish at Florida Citrus to tie for third, and closed with a 65 to tie for 11th in the St. Louis Children's Hospital Golf Classic.

1974 RECAP

Without a doubt, 1974 was the most productive year ever for personable Larry Ziegler. He easily passed his best previous money year of 1969, \$59,804, while finishing in the money in 30 events.

Ziegler made two challenges for titles—at the Canadian Open and Westchester Classic.

In Canada, Larry set a course record with a second-round 63 and led with a 132. He faltered with a 73 in the third round but rallied for a final 69 and trailed winner Bobby Nichols by just two shots until he bogied the 14th. He watched John Schlee make a 16-foot birdie putt on the final hole to tie him for second, both winning \$18,500.

At Westchester, he was tied for the first-round lead with a 67 and then trailed at the halfway point by just one. A third-round 72, with two penalty shots, dropped him out of contention and he finished in a tie for fifth.

He also finished eighth at Jacksonville, despite a final 73, and seventh at Memphis.

PRIOR YEARS

Larry Ziegler's up-and-down career on Tour took a turn upwards in 1973 when he climbed back into the top 60.

One of the longest hitters on Tour, he came on strong late in the year with a run of success in which he finished in the top 10 in three of seven tournaments and never lower than 14th. He credits fellow pro Doug Ford for the success, stating several times that the former PGA champion made adjustments on several parts of his game.

During the streak in September, he tied for third in the B.C. Open, fifth at Sahara and ninth at Quad Cities.

His first three years on the tour produced just a little over \$8,000. Then in 1969 he found victory in the Michigan Classic but he almost didn't collect a penny. For the first time in Tour history, a sponsor was unable to pay the purse but eventually the TPD paid the entire purse from its general funds.

Such hard luck was not new to Larry. One of seven brothers and six sisters in a not-well-heeled family, he, along with his brothers, quickly learned that long hours caddying would provide some spending money. So Larry became a caddie, and fell in love with golf.

After he was graduated from a St. Louis high school, he went into the Army Reserves for six months active duty and 5½ years on ready reserve. He was associated with clubs in the St. Louis area until he found a sponsor.

Off tour, Larry is a member of the board of directors of the NHL's St. Louis Blues Hockey Club.

QUALIFYING SCHOOL FOR APPROVED TOURNAMENT PLAYERS

The Qualifying School for Approved Tournament Players was initiated in 1965 as the procedure for accrediting new players for the Tour. Since that time 280 men have received Approved Tournament Players membership cards through these Schools.

1974—447 applicants sought admission to the 1974 Qualifying School. Three Regional Tryouts reduced the group to 78 qualifiers and 19 men received credentials after successfully completing the course at the Silverado Country Club in Napa, Calif., and the Canyon Country Club in Palm Springs, Calif. Qualifying was held at eight rounds, four at each locality. The school included classroom instructions and a written final examination.

SUMMARY OF PREVIOUS QUALIFYING SCHOOLS

- FALL 1965**—Forty-nine were accepted to the PGA's first school and 17 were graduated to the Tour. John Schlee was leading qualifier with a score of 583 for 144 holes.
- FALL 1966**—Class included 99 men and 32 were graduated. Harry Toscano was low qualifier with 572 for 144 holes.
- FALL 1967**—A class of 111, including several international stars, attended school. Thirty were graduated and Bobby Cole, of South Africa, was No. 1 graduate. He scored 572 over eight rounds.
- SPRING 1968**—Eighty-one were accepted and 15 were graduated. Bob Dickson led the graduates with 569 for 144 holes.
- FALL 1968**—Seventy-nine attended the school and 30 were graduated. Grier Jones was leading qualifier with 571 for 144 holes. The American Professional Golfers also held a school and graduated 21, headed by Martin Roesink with 585 for 144 holes.
- SPRING 1969**—Enrollment was 91 and 15 were graduated to the Tour after a 72-hole tournament. Bob Eastwood was low qualifier with 291.
- FALL 1969**—For the first time, a system of district tryouts at 54 holes was instituted. A total of 182 applications were accepted and 48 qualified for the School proper at the tryouts. Twelve were graduated to the Tour with Doug Olson being low, at 286, in the school's 72-hole tournament.
- 1970**—Nine district tryouts, at 54 holes, reduced the field of 250 applicants to 60. A 72-hole tournament at Tucson, Arizona produced 18 approved players. Robert Barbarossa was low qualifier with 279.
- 1971**—A system of three regional tryouts at 72-holes was used. A total of 357 applications were accepted and 75 qualified for the school proper at the tryouts. Twenty-three were graduated to the Tour with Bob Zender being low qualifier with 425 for 108 holes. The school was held at PGA National Golf Club, Palm Beach Gardens, Florida.
- 1972**—A record 468 applications were accepted. Eighty-one survived the three regional tryouts with 25 receiving playing privileges. Larry Stubblefield and John Adams were low qualifiers with 434 for 108 holes.
- 1973**—373 applications were accepted by the Division, 78 players survived the regional tryouts, and 23 players received playing privileges on Tour for one year. Ben Crenshaw was the low qualifier for 144 holes. His 558 was 18 under par, 12 strokes ahead of field.

THE VARDON TROPHY

The PGA Vardon Trophy, named in honor of the internationally famous British Golfer, Harry Vardon, was placed in competition among American professionals in 1937 as a successor to the Harry E. Radix Trophy, which, prior to that time, had been awarded annually to the professional having the finest tournament record in play in this country.

Today, the Vardon Trophy, a bronze colored plaque measuring 39" x 27" is awarded each year to the member of the PGA of America maintaining the finest playing average in those events co-sponsored or so designated by the PGA in each such period. A minimum of 80 rounds in tournaments considered official by PGA is required to win.

Each year the PGA of America honors America's leading professional player by presenting him the PGA Player-of-the-Year Award.

This award is made on the basis of playing record for the year, including such things as money winnings, Vardon Trophy scoring average, Ryder Cup points and an overall evaluation of playing achievements.

In the past, selection of the PGA Player-of-the-Year has been made each year by a vote of the PGA membership and the individuals on the PGA national press list. Beginning in 1969 the Award was made by a vote of the PGA Executive Committee. The winner receives a plaque at the President's Dinner during the PGA Annual Meeting.

RYDER CUP MATCHES

The Ryder Cup Matches developed from a match played between representatives of the American and British Professional Golfers' Association in England in 1926. That unofficial match, incidentally, was won by the British 13½ to 1½.

Following this highly successful exhibition, Samuel A. Ryder, a wealthy British seed merchant, offered to donate a solid gold trophy bearing his name to be competed for in a series of matches between professionals of two nations.

In placing the Ryder Cup in competition, the donor set forth certain terms which were to be observed by the parties concerned so long as the matches are conducted. Included among these stipulations are the following:

- (1) The matches will be played every other year on a home-and-home basis;
- (2) While both parties must mutually agree on the specific dates for each match, the host team may select the site and will be responsible for such arrangements and details as are normally the function of a sponsoring group;
- (3) The Matches shall consist of two days of play with the first being devoted to foursomes and the second to single matches;
- (4) Each member of the competing teams must be a member of his country's PGA, and furthermore, must be a native born citizen of that country.

The matches were first officially played for the Ryder Cup in 1927 in the United States. They have been held continuously every other year since except for the period from 1937 when the exigencies of World War II forced their suspension.

From 1927 to date, the United States has won every Ryder Cup match played in this country. It also won on British soil in 1937, 1949, 1953, 1961 and 1965, to run its list of victories to 15 in the 19 matches. The British won at home in 1929, 1933 and 1957. The 1969 match in England resulted in the first tie of the series.

From the start of the series through the 1959 Ryder Cup matches, the competition was comprised of four foursomes matches one day and eight singles matches the other day, each at 36 holes.

In 1961, the format was changed to provide for four 18-hole foursomes the morning of the first day and four more that afternoon, then for eight 18-hole singles the morning of the second day and eight more that afternoon. As in the past, one point was at stake in each match, so the total number of points was doubled.

In 1963, for the first time, a day of four-ball matches augmented the program to add new interest to the overall competition. This brought the total number of points to 32.
