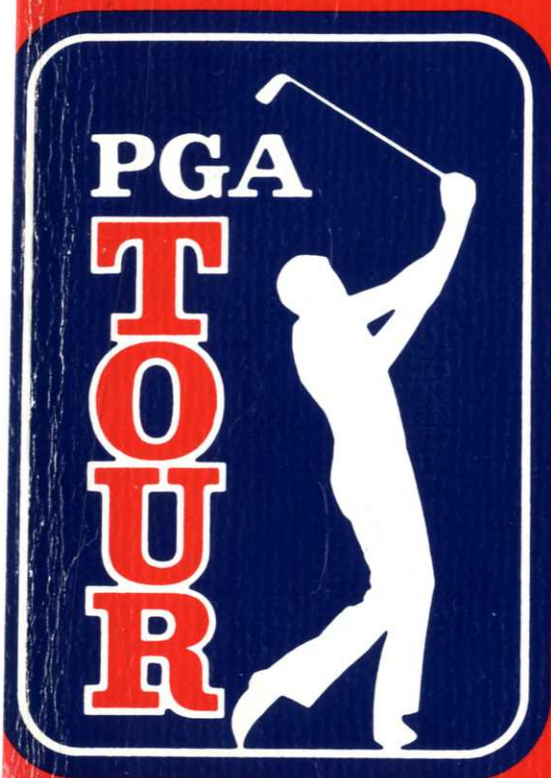

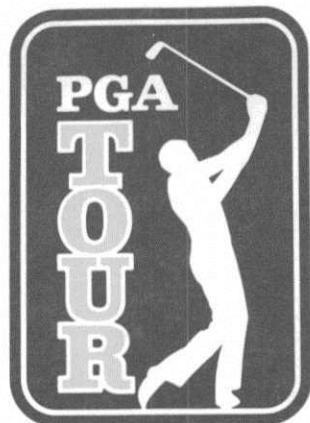

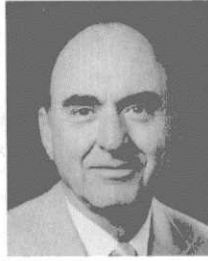

THE TOURNAMENT POLICY BOARD

The Tournament Policy Board establishes goals and policies for the operation of the PGA TOUR. The 10-member Board is composed of the following:

Four Player Directors, elected by the PGA TOUR membership. A Player Director also serves as Vice President of the PGA of America.

Three Independent Directors, representing the public interest. One serves as Chairman of the Board.

Three PGA Directors, who are national officers of the PGA of America.

A Players Advisory Council consults with the Policy Board.

The Policy Board appoints the Commissioner as chief executive and administrative officer of the PGA TOUR. The Tournament Staff, serving under the Commissioner, conducts tournament play.



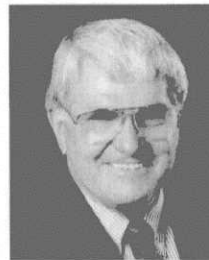

ABOUT THE COMMISSIONER

Deane R. Beman

Entering his 16th year as Commissioner of the PGA TOUR, Deane R. Beman has overseen the most explosive period of growth in the TOUR's history, since succeeding Joseph C. Dey, Jr., on March 1, 1974.

During the Beman administration, the "business side" of the PGA TOUR has shown dramatic growth and now includes many heretofore uncharted paths, each designed to help encourage continued prosperity and to ensure the future of the game.

PGA TOUR Investments, Inc., created just six years ago, has already grown to include 13 "Stadium Golf" facilities nationally, and opened in December, 1986, in Clearwater, FL, the first in a network of "Family Golf Centers." In addition to providing state-of-the-art tournament and teaching golf arenas, Tournament Players Clubs and Family Golf Centers have been instrumental in the growth of PGA TOUR assets, which have climbed from \$730,000 to more than \$70 million during the Beman era.

PGA TOUR Properties, the joint marketing venture of the TOUR and PGA of America, continues to make steady progress in its quest to open new opportunities in golf for commercial sponsors and the TOUR's members. The Nabisco Golf competitions on the Regular TOUR and the Premier Cup involvement with the Senior TOUR, an infusion of millions of dollars combined for players, sponsors and charities, is the largest example of these efforts.

PGA TOUR Productions, introduced in 1985, is the TOUR's first-ever in-house TV/audio-visual production entity, the creative possibilities of which are nearly limitless. Tournament highlight films, vignettes, commercials, specialty pieces and the acclaimed "Inside the PGA TOUR" weekly half-hour show airing on ESPN are several of Production's successful projects.

Other important innovations introduced during the Beman administration include a professional Agronomy department, the Nabisco Stats program, electronic scoreboards, "Official Golf Destinations" and the Centinela Fitness Training Center.

Competitively, the Beman era has witnessed the birth of the SENIOR PGA TOUR which started in 1980 with two events and has grown to 40 events this year. In all, over 90 tournaments are on the combined slate with prize money having increased from \$8.2 million in 1974 to close to \$60 million this year.

The Player Retirement Plan, inaugurated in 1983, has already contributed \$10 million toward the future benefit of active Plan participants, and larger contributions are expected in future years.

Charity, easily the TOUR's leading money winner during the Beman era, continues to benefit at a yearly record pace. Contributions by American Golf Sponsors to charitable organizations rose to another unprecedented total of \$18.4 million and will again be substantially supplemented by \$2 million in the Nabisco Team Charity Competition.

During his active years as a player, Beman established an enviable slate of accomplishments, compiling one of the great amateur records of all time. He won United States Amateur titles in 1960 and 1963 and the British Amateur championship in 1959. As an amateur, Beman was a member of four Walker Cup teams, four World Amateur Cup teams and three U.S. Americas Cup squads.

At the age of 29, in 1967, he left a prosperous insurance brokerage firm in Bethesda, MD, to join the PGA TOUR as a full-time player. During his six-year professional career, he won the 1969 Texas Open, 1970 Greater Milwaukee Open, 1972 Quad Cities Open and 1973 Shrine-Robinson Classic.

Finchem, a graduate of the University of Virginia's law school, assists Commissioner Beman in the administration of the various business interests of the TOUR while handling the company's government relations.

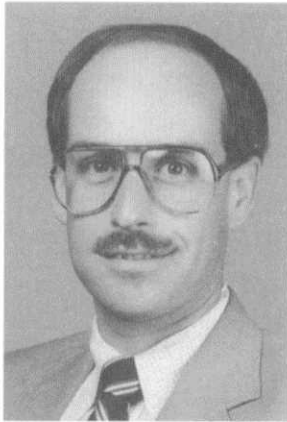

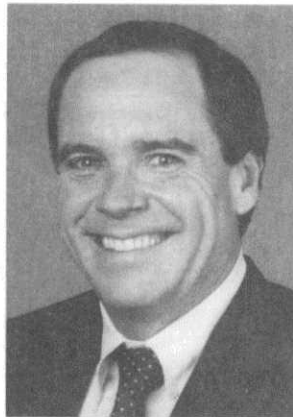

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE PGA TOUR

The precise start of the PGA TOUR defies documentation. We know, for example, that professionals competed against each other from the earliest days of the game in this country. We know, too, that the first United States Open, held in 1895 at Newport, R.I., attracted a field of 10 professionals and one amateur. A second professional tournament, the Western Open, was first held in 1899. It has now observed its 80th anniversary and continues to thrive on the PGA TOUR with a youthful spirit.

However, it would be stretching history beyond reason to say the PGA TOUR started with the Western Open in 1899 because there was not a "tour" at that time. Tournaments continued to spring up across the country during the first decade of this century but they lacked continuity. American-born professionals were rapidly improving and, in 1911, John McDermott became the first home-bred to win the U.S. Open.

In 1913 a commercially-backed "tour" by Englishmen Harry Vardon and Ted Ray helped to popularize the game in this country as the pair attracted "record" crowds everywhere they played. That September a 20-year-old "local boy," Francis Ouimet, defeated both of the visitors in a playoff for the United States Open Championship at Brookline, Mass., and his victory became a golf benchmark. Suddenly, golf became Page One news and a game for everyone.

The forerunner of today's PGA TOUR is traced to the early Twenties when, in the winter, tournaments were held on the West Coast, Texas, and Florida. Golfers played their way into the East and up to Pinehurst in the spring. Those years have been recalled by Johnny Farrell, one of the most active players of that decade and the next, as well as the 1928 U.S. Open champion: "Those tournaments gave the boys some activity in the off-season because most were busy at their clubs in the summer. The summer was when the golf associations would hold regional and national title events."

Resorts, hotels, and Chambers of Commerce realized the publicity value that professional golf brought to their facilities and more tournaments sprang up. Walter Hagen, Gene Sarazen, and Bobby Jones became folk heroes and the Tour was taking shape.

By the Thirties the Tour was growing, and with the PGA of America providing leadership, it attracted throngs despite the financially depressed years at the beginning of the decade. One statistic from those days stands out now with economic poignancy: Paul Runyan was the leading money winner of 1934 with \$6,767. Late in the decade the name of Sam Snead started to appear in headlines with regularity. Then, as the Forties started, Ben Hogan, Byron Nelson, and a host of others gained fame.

After World War II, the Tour became more structured than ever before and continued to grow in popularity until it exploded as the Fifties were turning into the Sixties. (Elsewhere in this TOUR Book, our records such as leading money winner, growth of our purses, etc., reflect this growth).

About this time television began playing a dual role. Telecasts of PGA TOUR events inspired millions to try the game, and, at the same time, the TV rights fees sent purses rolling upward. The bulk of rights fees, which are distributed by the PGA TOUR to all co-sponsors, have gone back into purses, accounting for the tripling of prize money in the last decade.

It was late in 1968 when the touring professionals picked up the reins of control of the Tour. Joseph C. Dey was the first Commissioner of what was then called the Tournament Players Division. He served from early 1969 through February 28, 1974, and was succeeded by Deane R. Beman, who took office on March 1, 1974.

During the Beman administration, the value of tournament purses has escalated at an unprecedented rate; PGA TOUR assets have grown from \$730,000 in 1974 to more than \$70 million today, and total revenues have increased from \$3.9 million to more than \$125 million in the same time span.

The competitive scope of the PGA TOUR is much broader than a decade ago, due to the introduction of the Senior PGA TOUR, the sports success story of the 1980's.

In October of 1980, the PGA TOUR moved to its present National Headquarters Building in Ponte Vedra, FL, and just three weeks later, the Tournament Players Club at Sawgrass (owned and operated by the TOUR) beckoned in the era of Stadium Golf.

The Tournament Players Club concept has since been expanded to 13 other cities, and three years ago the PGA TOUR opened its first Family Golf Center in Clearwater, FL. This new addition to the TOUR family is expected to grow at a rate similar to that of the Tournament Players Clubs.

ALL EXEMPT TOUR PRIORITY RANKINGS

Each PGA TOUR player has earned a rung on the priority ranking system that will be used in selecting tournament fields. The complete ranking system, in order of priority, is as follows:

I. SPECIAL EXEMPTIONS

1. Winners of PGA Championship or U.S. Open prior to 1970 or in the last 10 calendar years.

If two or more players are tied based on the number of such tournaments won, the player who is higher on the official PGA TOUR career money list shall be eligible.

- X. VETERAN MEMBERS**— If not otherwise eligible and if needed to fill the field, Veteran Members (players who have made a minimum of 150 cuts during their career), in order of their standing on the PGA TOUR career money list.

NABISCO GOLF AND PGA TOUR SET FOR ANOTHER SEASON

Year-long consistency will once again be a premium on the 1989 PGA TOUR due largely to the impact of the \$5.5 million Nabisco Golf program. The program was designed to reward players for quality and consistency of play and, in keeping with the PGA TOUR tradition of providing contributions to charity throughout North America. Year-long races for individual and team honors will culminate with the Nabisco Championships—the TOUR's richest event offering a \$2.5 million purse and a \$450,000 first prize, October 26-29 at Harbour Town GL, Hilton Head Island, SC.

The program was in response to the popular Nabisco Challenge and Vantage Cup competitions of 1986 which were consolidated into a stronger, more cohesive program. RJR/Nabisco assumed sponsorship activities on the PGA TOUR including the electronic scoreboard systems which have enhanced on-site spectator viewing since 1981.

The following components make up Nabisco Golf.

Individual Competition

The Nabisco Individual Competition awards PGA TOUR pros for year-long consistency and excellence. This season-long competition offers a \$1 million Bonus Pool with a \$175,000 first prize for the player who has earned the most money at season's conclusion. Significantly, all Bonus Pool payouts count as official money. The top 30 PGA TOUR members will also earn the right to compete at the season-ending Nabisco Championships. Last year Curtis Strange claimed the title and with it became the TOUR's first ever one season million dollar winner thanks to the \$360,000 first place prize and the \$175,000 season ending bonus from the Individual Competition.

Team Charity Competition.

The Nabisco Team Charity Competition, formerly the Nabisco Challenge, promises an exciting finish when it also culminates at the Nabisco Championships. Last November each participating PGA TOUR tournament sponsor selected a four-man "team." The K mart Greater Greensboro Open made Joey Sindelar the Draft's first pick ending Payne Stewart's two year reign as the first choice at the fourth annual draft held this past year in Hawaii. Any dollars earned by each member in the Individual Competition will be credited to his team, and at season's end, \$2 million will again be donated to the charities represented by the participating tournaments. First prize is \$500,000. The charity team competition will be decided by the cumulative official money totals for the four team members. The Independent Insurance Agent Open took top honors a year ago and Houston area charities benefitted.

Nabisco Championships

The Nabisco Championships will not only culminate the Nabisco Competition, but it will serve as an exciting, dramatic conclusion to the PGA TOUR campaign. The TOUR's largest purse, \$2,500,000 will be at stake for the top 30 pros. Eligibility will be limited to the top 30 money winners (PGA TOUR members) through the event preceeding the Nabisco Championships. In addition the \$2 million Team Charity Competition will be settled as will the year-long Bonus Pool. The \$5.5 million Nabisco Golf prize monies will be decided at the Nabisco Championships. Moreover, the Arnold Palmer Award, symbolic of leading the PGA TOUR official money list, will probably be contingent on the outcome of the Nabisco Championships.

NABISCO STATS

An integral part of the PGA TOUR since 1980, the Nabisco Stats program has helped to clearly indicate who the most skilled TOUR players are in a variety of categories.

A total of 10 statistical categories are charted each week of the season with Nabisco rewarding the 10 individual champions with a \$25,000 bonus at season's end.

The ten stat categories are: Scoring, Driving Distance, Driving Accuracy, Greens In Regulation, Par-Breakers, Putting, Eagles, Birdies, Sand Saves and All-Around.

Statistics are gathered at each TOUR event by the walking scorers who accompany each group of players. The TOUR's Official Statistician then enters the raw data into an on-site computer, which then feeds the information back to TOUR Headquarters in Florida. There the weekly lists and standings are tabulated. Epson computer products are used to gather and compile the data.

Since its inception, the Nabisco Stats program has proven to be a real eye-opener. Prior to 1980, only the most sophisticated golf fans would have recognized Calvin Peete's amazing accuracy off the tee. However, with Calvin now winning the last eight consecutive Driving Accuracy titles, almost everyone realizes that Calvin is the game's most accurate player.

Another benefit of the Nabisco Stats program is felt by the players. Many of today's TOUR players have found the statistical printouts available at each TOUR site to be an excellent source of information about their own respective games. For example, a player can be working on his bunker play in practice and can chart on a weekly basis his progress through the keeping of statistics.

In order to be eligible for the Nabisco Stats program, a player must complete a minimum of 50 rounds in 1989.

NABISCO SCOREBOARDS

The PGA TOUR over the years has introduced many innovations to enhance the spectator enjoyment of the tournaments. One such innovation was "Stadium Golf," another was the electronic scoreboards. The introduction of the Nabisco Scoreboards in 1981 provided up-to-the-minute information about action on the course to all spectators.

The electronic Nabisco Scoreboard systems that travel the PGA TOUR are indeed a phenomenon. Not only do they bring status reports, current scores, biographical and statistical information, special reports and messages to players and fans spread out over many acres, but they also survive a gamut of weather conditions as well as the vagaries of travel as the two systems leapfrog around the nation.

In 1988 they became even more phenomenal with the introduction of new state-of-the-art technology. By the end of the 1988 TOUR schedule the existing systems were replaced by scoreboards featuring the new "Glowcube" technology from Daktronics Inc. of Brookings, S.D.—the manufacturer of the electronic scoreboards for the 1988 Winter Olympics. This "Glowcube" technology driven by new Epson computers will allow for faster scoring, better graphics and will feature the use of radio signals to transmit the data. The need for telephone lines from the greens to the scoreboards and from the scoreboards to the computer center in the van will be eliminated.

Nabisco Golf will be responsible for the transport, set up and maintenance of the new electronic Nabisco Scoreboard systems while PGA TOUR personnel will be responsible for the on-course operation during tournament week.

The Nabisco Scoreboard system is all just a part of Nabisco's major contribution to the PGA TOUR. The interest of Nabisco Brands, Inc., is helping the PGA TOUR towards its goal of making professional golf the world's greatest spectator sport.

CHARITABLE CONTRIBUTIONS CONTINUE TO GROW

In keeping with the TOUR's motto of "the leading money winner on the PGA TOUR is Charity," the PGA TOUR and the American Golf Sponsors (AGS) were delighted to announce in late 1987 that charitable contributions from TOUR events had passed the \$100 million mark.

Last year was the 12th consecutive record breaking year according to AGS figures with some \$18.4 million going to charitable concerns across the country. That figure exceeded the year old mark of \$17.6 million raised in 1987.

Beginning in 1938 with a \$10,000 pledge to charity at the Palm Beach Invitational, several TOUR events now donate in excess of \$1 million annually. In fact, every PGA TOUR event donates its net revenue to charitable organizations of every kind.

It is, of course, the hard work of thousands of dedicated volunteers at each TOUR stop that have made this largesse possible and it is they who are the heroes in this story.

"We have said for years that charity is our leading money winner," said Commissioner Deane R. Beman. "We have never meant for that saying to be just a catch phrase, we've always meant it and there's no doubt that the golf world has been doing its fair share to help others who are less fortunate."

People from all walks of life have benefitted from the \$125-plus million that has been contributed to charity. TOUR events annually benefit hospitals, youth groups, research groups, educational foundations and countless other projects.

"It's a real credit to the tournament organizations and the commercial sponsors that we can not only improve our purse each year, but our contribution to charity as well," said Ted May, President of the AGS.

The Fitness Center has made its impact over the past five years with many players finding the center and the available technicians an invaluable aid to their success on the TOUR. In fact, many players have commented that they would have been unable to compete in some tournaments without this facility and the training staff to administer to them.

In addition to the involvement of Diversified Products, one of the top names in exercise equipment on the market today, several other leading companies in their field will add to the quality of the Fitness Center.

Coppertone (a product of Schering-Plough, Inc.), the leading manufacturer of skin care products in the country, will be providing their products to the CFC in 1989. Coppertone, after extensive research with TOUR players has developed a line of skin care products which are now available in leading pro shops.

The products contributed by each sponsor of the Fitness Center has helped make the facility such a success that a similar Fitness Center was introduced on the Senior TOUR in late 1986.



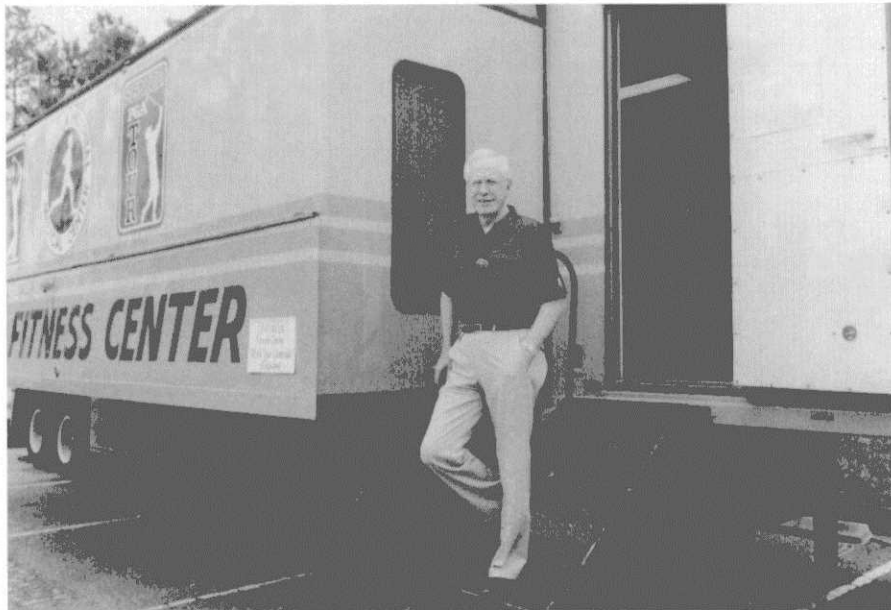

TOURNAMENT PLAYERS CLUBS

The brainchild of the PGA TOUR, the Tournament Players Club concept has within the decade of the 80's gone from a dream to a network that now encompasses 13 courses in eight states.

It was the TOUR's view that the spectator had been left out in golf course design throughout the years and when it came time for the PGA TOUR to build its own home course, the opportunity presented itself to build a course that not only challenged the players, but allowed spectators to see the action as never before.

It's called "Stadium Golf" and once you've viewed a tournament on a Stadium Golf Course, you'll understand why the network has grown so rapidly in such a short period of time.

Spectator mounds abound that afford fans unrestricted views whether on tee shots, fairway shots or on the greens. In fact, the 18th hole at the original TPC at Sawgrass can accommodate crowds of some 30,000 people—all with a clean view of the action. You won't see any periscopes at an event on a Players Club.

The network began with the club at Sawgrass where it annually hosts the THE PLAYERS Championship and quickly grew into the present number of 13. All TPC's are designed to host PGA TOUR or Senior PGA TOUR events and to date the clubs have been designed by some of the top architects in the business—Pete Dye, Jack Nicklaus, Arnold Palmer, Arthur Hills, Jay Morrish, Bob Cupp and the Von Hagge/Devlin team to name a few.

In addition, one of the things that adds a bit of spice to all TPC's is that a PGA TOUR player (or in some cases, two) are assigned to serve as a consultant to the designer. To date, Ed Sneed, Tom Weiskopf, Fuzzy Zoeller, Hubert Green, Craig Stadler and Ben Crenshaw have been among those lending their expertise to the TPC Network.

Truly a nationwide country club, a membership at one TPC affords the member a chance to play at any of the other clubs across the country and an opportunity to view the greatest players in the world in action on his own course once a year.

In fact, Tournament Players Clubs are developed only in places where such courses will substantially improve tournament sites. In short, they are built with the guidance and expertise of the PGA TOUR and financed by the local real estate developers, to provide fans with the best possible atmosphere in which to enjoy tournament golf, and to offer a challenging and rewarding golf experience for members. Only in cases where local tournament sponsoring organizations whole-heartedly endorse such deals are Tournament Players Clubs practical or prudent.

While there is ultimately no definitive number of Tournament Players Clubs planned, the PGA TOUR will always judge a potential site's merits with the concerns of the fans, the developer and the local tournament sponsors in mind.

Since the Tournament Players Club at Sawgrass opened in 1980, the TPC Network has now truly become "the best set of clubs in America."

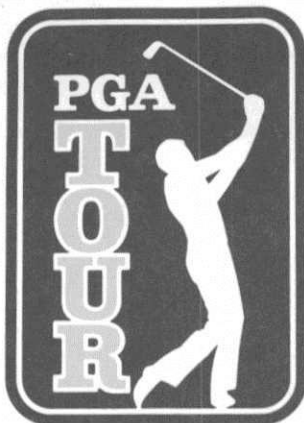

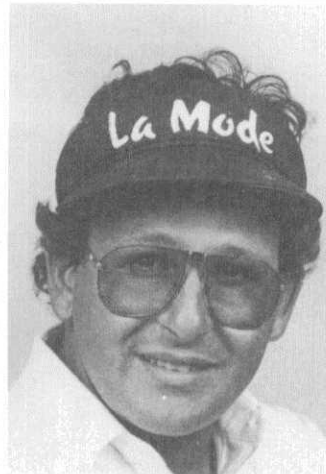

Fulton Allem has been a strong player on the South African Tour for the last few years, but little did he know what it would mean when he won the 1987 South African PGA Championship. The victory carried an invitation to the NEC World Series of Golf at Firestone Country Club in Akron and it was the trip to Akron that turned his career around.

He played four solid rounds and finished alone in second place, just three strokes behind Curtis Strange with a score of 2-under-par 278. He earned \$86,400 and that was more than enough for him to qualify for his TOUR player's card. And, it also let him finish among the top 125 money winners for the year and thus gain exempt status.

"I was planning on going to the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall," he said, "but I wasn't looking forward to all the pressure that goes with it. I felt I could play well enough to be on the PGA TOUR if I had the opportunity."

He made the most of his opportunity. In fact the first three months of 1988, he had his exemption assured for 1989 with a solo fifth place in the Hawaiian Open and then a tie for third place in THE PLAYERS Championship. He finished 65-68 at the Tournament Players Club. His 65 equaled the low round of the championship and his final two rounds were the best.

He won \$89,000 in those two events but he went on to enjoy success elsewhere. Just as important, the personable Allem gained many friends wherever he went.

The husky Allem did try the TOUR's Qualifying Tournament once. It was 10-years ago when he still was in his teens but was not successful.

Allem has been a winner on his home circuit but he points out, "I had 18 second-place finishes before I finally won."

As it was reported in South Africa, "The dynamic Allem couldn't break through after 10 tough years of trying but he subsequently annexed four titles in one year.

"The cherry on top was his superb win in the Lexington PGA over a difficult Wanderers course in late January (1987) where he outdueled a plucky Hugh Baiocchi over the final stretch to claim the most important success of his career thus far."

Fulton started to play golf at age 7 under the encouragement of his father. Through the years, it has been his father who has been there to teach him the fine points of the game.

He was a good junior player but did not travel extensively to establish himself as an international amateur.

"Gary Player was a big influence," he said. "He was so serious about his golf that I tended to be the same way. I couldn't take it lightly like some of the amateurs, so, I decided to take the plunge and I turned pro when I was just 19."

Even today, Player is his favorite. "I have the highest respect for Gary and what he has done," Fulton said, "but I've always liked Jack Nicklaus, too."

"What I admire so much about Gary is that he has grinded all the way from nothing and has beaten the giants. He has guts and determination. He never gives up. I just love the man."

Isao is one of the finest gentlemen to play the game and a marvelous addition to every tournament in which he competes. He is Japan's all-time greatest player and the example he has set over the years has influenced many young Japanese players.

Isao hit the shot that was heard around the golfing world in 1983, and Jack Renner still shakes his head in disbelief whenever someone mentions it.

The stage was the Waialae Country Club at the Hawaiian Open and the set was the 18th hole. Renner was in the scoring tent behind the green, carefully going over his card. He was finished with a 19-under par total of 269.

The final group of the day was walking down the 18th fairway and Isao Aoki was in it. At this point, as he headed for his golf ball in the left rough, some 128 yards from the flagstick on the par five hole, he was one-stroke behind Renner. He needed a birdie to tie, but it would not be easy to get, coming from the tall grass with his third shot.

As Renner studied his card, he heard a roar from the crowd that would shake the palm trees. He assumed Isao had hit the ball close.

Instead, he had holed out with a pitching wedge for an eagle three and the victory. "This is the greatest thrill of my career," he was to say later. He thus became the first player from Japan ever to win on the PGA TOUR.

Isao was introduced to golf as a caddy at the Abiko Golf Club while attending Abiko Junior High School. During that time, he was known as the "Tower," after the Tokyo Tower, which resembles the Eiffel Tower, for he was the tallest among the caddies.

He practiced early in the mornings and every evening when there were no members playing the course. Even at that time, it was said he was a good putter and short-game player. Today, if you ask him what is the strongest part of his game, without hesitation, he will say, "putting."

He turned professional in 1964 but it took him seven years to win his first tournament, the Kanto PGA. In his 25-year professional career, he has won 53 tournaments in Japan—including five PGA Match Play titles. Twice, he has won in England—the 1978 World Match Play Championship and the 1983 European Open. Five times, he has been Japan's leading money winner.

He has won most of the important events in his homeland, but his most cherished victory came in the Fall of 1983 when he won the Japan Open for the first time. He had been a runner-up on four previous occasions. He won it again in 1987.

George Archer keeps telling people it's nice to be able to enjoy the scenery and play golf for a living. "I try not to let anything bother me. I'm delighted to be out here playing the game I enjoy."

You can imagine how "delighted" he was in 1984 when he was able to win again—at age 44—in the Bank of Boston Classic. It was his first victory in eight injury-riddled years.

When he tied for second place in the Southern Open in 1986, he was almost as pleased. "I made enough money (\$23,100) to be assured of finishing among the top 125 money winners and keeping my exempt status," he said.

He wasn't able to enjoy the exempt status, however, as he underwent an operation on his left shoulder that put him on the shelf for nearly all of the first half of 1987. He only played in nine events.

With a "special medical extension," he was back last year and once again it was the Southern Open that helped him return to the top 125. He tied for third this time. It was special since he was out for five weeks in the late summer after undergoing an operation on his right knee. At age 49, he became the oldest player ever to gain exempt status.

George has been one of the TOUR's finest players for a number of years—when health permitted—but one has to wonder how great he could have been if he had been able to remain healthy.

Three times, George has had major surgery. In 1975, he underwent the knife to repair a torn tendon in his left wrist and his effectiveness in 1974, 1975 and part of 1976 was seriously affected.

He had an excellent 1977, winning \$113,944, but he then encountered a back problem that required surgery in early 1979. He had two discs fused and then the shoulder in 1986.

Over his lengthy career, which started in 1964, George has been known for his putting stroke, so it seems appropriate that he owns the all-time TOUR record for fewest putts in a tournament. In the 1980 Sea Pines Heritage Classic, he only needed 94.

As a pro he has won 13 events, including three in 1968, but the year following was his most memorable when he captured the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am and his one major championship when he beat out Billy Casper, George Knudson and Tom Weiskopf in The Masters Tournament.

When your name is Tommy Armour III, it does attract a little extra attention. There are not many in the game who can say their grandfather—known as Silver Scot—was a winner of the United States, and British Opens, plus the PGA Championship.

The Silver Scot passed away in 1968 but he would have been proud of the effort put forth by his grandson this past year. After several years of trying, Tommy moved in among the leading 125 money winners to earn exempt status for this year. He did it with several solid performances, such as five finishes among the top 12.

He first qualified for the TOUR in the fall of 1981 but his 1982 season was not what he had hoped it would be. Every year since then, he tried to get his card back but each time he barely missed.

So, he would travel the world, spending most of his time on the European and Asian Tours where he had enjoyed exempt status.

"It was a great experience," he said. "The main thing I was able to play in real golf tournaments." Each year, he became a little better and his patience paid off handsomely in the fall of 1987 when he finished tied for eighth place in the TOUR's Qualifying Tournament.

He learned a valuable lesson early last year. "I started out with new equipment and a new driver," he explained. "After I missed five straight cuts in the spring, I said to myself, 'What are you doing with this new stuff?'"

"I went back to my old equipment and the next two weeks, I was 11th in the Kemper Open and 10th at the Westchester Classic."

As he also said, "after that, there were several more times when I was just a shot or two away from the big cheese."

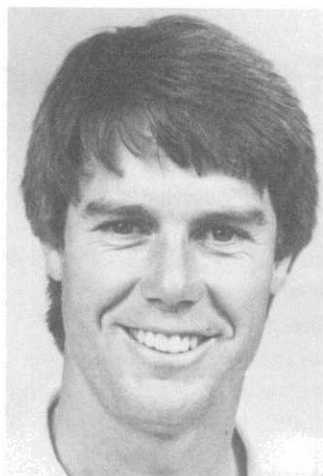
Tommy said he was "about 10" when he started to play the game, going out with his "Mom or Dad."

He played junior golf all around southern California, winning the occasional tournament. He played high school golf in Las Vegas. "I played baseball, too, but since the golf and baseball seasons were at the same time, I decided it was best for me to stick with."

Tommy went on to Lincoln Trail College in southern Illinois and then on to the University of New Mexico. "We played the Western Juniors in Albuquerque and I liked the course and the school so much that I decided to go there," he said.

While at New Mexico, he did win the William Tucker Intercollegiate event and he helped the Lobos to a fifth place in the NCAA Championship.

Every young player in the game could learn a valuable lesson from Paul Azinger. Even he admits his career has been "amazing" and truly it has.

In just a few short years, he has gone from struggling to make a living on the PGA TOUR to the very head of the class. Two years ago, he won three times and was named Player-of-the-Year by the PGA and Golf World magazine.

After enjoying a fine season in 1986, he started the new year by winning his first start, the Phoenix Open with a 65-67 finish. His next victory was in the Panasonic-Las Vegas Invitational and it came in dramatic fashion. He holed a putt of 30 feet for an eagle three on the last hole.

He also won the Canon-Sammy Davis Jr.-Greater Hartford Open and finished the year in grand style with \$822,481 in official money. He was second to Curtis Strange.

He gained world-wide attention at Muirfield in Scotland in the British Open. He led Nick Faldo by one stroke with two holes to play, but a bogey-bogey finish dropped him in to the runner-up spot.

Last year he won again in the Hertz Bay Hill Classic. He shot three rounds of 66, one of them being the last day, to win by five shots over Tom Kite.

He also was second in the PGA Championship. He led by one stroke going in to the final round and even though he shot an even-par 71, Jeff Sluman blitzed the course with a 65 to win it.

Consistency has become a key word for Paul. He had 10 top 10 finishes last year in 27 starts and collected nearly \$600,000.

As a senior in high school, he couldn't break 40, he said, because "I didn't play much and didn't practice at all." He was busy working in his father's marina in Sarasota pumping gas along with scraping and painting boats.

When it was time to go to college, he decided he wanted to play more golf. His first stop was Brevard Junior College where Jim Suttie was his coach. "He introduced me to John Redman and John has taken me to the level I'm at now."

As Paul points out, back in 1979, "my average score was about 77. The next year, working with John, it was down to around 72. Two years later, in the Fall of 1981, I earned my TOUR card in the Qualifying School."

Dave Barr had to be pleased with the way he played toward the end of last year. He didn't win, but he had six top 10 finishes in one seven tournament stretch. "I was so close a few times," he said.

On one of those occasions, he tied with Mark Brooks and Joey Sindelar in the Canon Sammy Davis Jr. Greater Hartford Open but Brooks won on the second extra hole with a birdie.

A third-round 61 in the Southern Open helped him to finish third and a last round of 66 gave him a fourth in the Canadian Open. It was his finest season.

Dave's first victory on TOUR was in the 1981 Quad Cities Open in a five-way playoff and he won again in the 1987 Georgia Pacific Atlanta Classic with a brilliant 23-under-par score of 265.

Dave received considerable national attention in the 1985 United States Open championship when he battled Andy North all the way to the wire before finishing in a tie for second place with Denis Watson and Tze-Chung Chen.

Dave always has been successful in his native Canada. He has won 12 Canadian Tour titles including the 1985 Canadian PGA Championship and the 1988 Canadian Tournament Players Division title. He also led the Canadian Order of Merit four times, including last year.

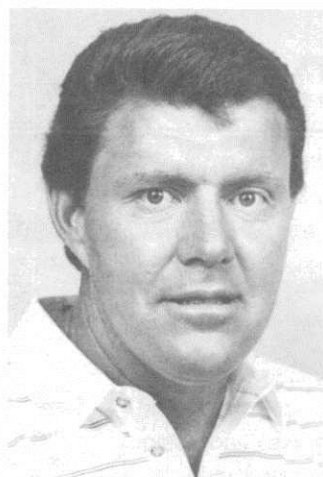
He has played on eight Canadian World Cup teams and in 1983 he won the individual title and in 1985 he joined with Dan Halldorson to give Canada the team championship.

When the final round started at the 1981 Quad Cities Open, Dave was five strokes behind Victor Regalado. A closing 66 shot him into a tie at the end of regulation play with Halldorson, Woody Blackburn, Frank Conner and Regalado.

It was eight holes later (only one playoff in TOUR history has been longer), that Dave managed a par and that was all he needed to gain his elusive triumph.

"This is great," he said. "It's what we all play for out here. When things are not going well, you sometimes wonder if you made the right decision. Winning makes it all worth it."

Andy Bean has been one of the game's leading players for more than a decade but the last couple of years have been difficult for him.

He developed tendinitis in his right elbow early in the spring of 1987 and was forced to miss several important tournaments. Even when he did try to play, it wasn't the vintage Bean, the Bean who had won 11 times in the previous 10 years. "Maybe I tried to come back too soon," he said, "and as a result, I've been very disappointed with my play since then."

He did play admirably in the Ryder Cup matches in the fall of 1987, winning his singles against tough Ian Woosnam. In best-ball when he was paired with Payne Stewart on the second day, Andy birdied four of the first five holes at Muirfield Village. They won easily.

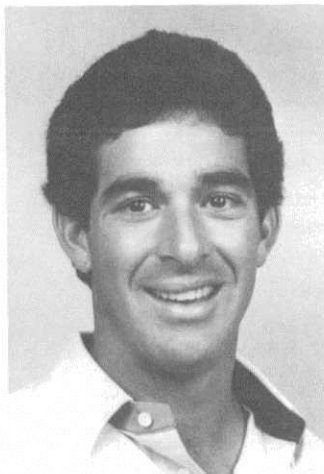
It is easy to understand why the Doral Country Club is one of his favorite stops. He won the Doral-Eastern Open three times. It was his first on TOUR in 1977 and he repeated in 1982 and 1986.

Andy certainly had the background to become a professional golfer. As a youngster, he lived on Jekyll Island, GA, where his father was associated with a golf course. When he was 15, the family moved to Lakeland, FL, where his father bought a course.

"I was lucky," says Bean, "because my parents never made me do much work around the course. They let me go play." And play he did.

He is one of the biggest men in the game and he has the personality and the heart to match his size. Wherever the game is played, he always is one of the more popular men in the field.

Chip Beck had the kind of season in 1988 that many have been expecting of him since this talented young man joined the TOUR in 1979.

This past season Chip finished second on the money list with a whopping \$916,818. He won twice and came close a third time losing in a playoff late in the year at the Disney.

He broke through with his first-ever win at the fabled Riviera Country Club taking home the Los Angeles Open title with a brilliant 17-under par effort. He won again two months later at the USF&G Classic with a near record performance of 26-under par 262.

He earned a spot in the Disney playoff with a 25-under par performance and his brilliant scoring earned him the 1988 Vardon Trophy with a scoring average of 69.46.

"This was my best year," said Beck. "The consistency I desire was represented in the Vardon Trophy."

"The first win was great," added Beck. "I feel like my career really started after that tournament. With a career-year behind him, Beck looks ahead to 1989 with great expectations.

"I've got a lot of goals I want to accomplish," said the personable Beck. "I look forward to the challenges of next year."

Chip well remembers the day he was introduced to golf. He was only 10-years old at the time, and his mother was going to the Highland Golf Club in Fayetteville, NC, to attend a clinic that was to be given by the head professional.

Once he started to hit balls, he was hooked. He played all summer and the golf career of Chip Beck was well under way. By the end of the summer, he won the Pee Wee division at the club.

A journalism major at the University of Georgia, he enjoyed considerable success on the Bulldog golf team before setting his sights on the TOUR. As a senior, he was named the Athlete of the Year, and that's the first time a golfer had ever been honored at Georgia. He won six collegiate events, such as the Southern Intercollegiate three times and the All-America championship hosted by the University of Houston. He also won the Dixie Intercollegiate and was an All-America choice three years, twice being on the first team.

Jim Benepe lived the dream at the 1988 Beatrice Western Open. He was making his first ever start on the PGA TOUR, thanks to a sponsor's exemption, when the sun set on Sunday evening of that week, he was the champion.

"I'm just overwhelmed," he said. "What a thrill to win the Western Open."

He played four solid rounds on the tough Butler National course. His scores of 71, 68 and 69 for 8-under-par 208 placed him four-strokes behind Peter Jacobsen entering the final afternoon.

He proceeded to play a strong round of 70 for a 10-under-par 278. He dueled Jacobsen through most of the incoming nine and then had to wait by the edge of the green for Peter to finish. All Peter needed was a par to win but, unfortunately he hit his second shot over the green and into the water. He finished with a double bogey and Jim had his victory.

"Although Peter gave me this tournament," he said graciously, "it still makes all the hours of hard work and sacrifice worth it. There is no feeling like winning."

Jim was quite familiar with the Western and Butler National since he was a standout player at Northwestern University. He had a fondness for the tournament as a former winner of the Western Junior championship and one year was medalist in the Western Amateur.

Benepe began playing the game at the age of seven in Sheridan, WY, when his father started to show him a few of the fundamentals. He progressed steadily and in 1982 he won the Wyoming State Amateur stroke play title and the next year he captured the state's amateur match play crown.

He went on to Northwestern where he obtained a bachelor's degree in psychology. Along the way, he won four collegiate events, was 1986 co-champion in the Big 10 and earned All-American honors.

He was determined to make it all the way to the PGA TOUR. He went to the Qualifying Tournament in the fall of 1986 but didn't make it.

"I knew I needed more experience to prepare myself for the TOUR," he said, so he went overseas and also competed on the Canadian Tour. Success followed him. He won the 1987 British Columbia Open, led the Canadian Tour Order of Merit (money list) and was named the Rookie of the Year. Early last season, he won the Victorian Open in Australia.

Jim is a fine striker of the ball, but he occasionally seeks the help of Claude Harmon Sr., or Dick Harmon.

Incidentally, during his school days he was an excellent swimmer and he won several Wyoming state titles.

Ronnie Black continued his successful journey on the PGA TOUR last year with another \$100,000-plus season. He was in position to win the Canon Sammy Davis Jr. Greater Hartford Open, being tied for the lead going into the last round. He finished tied for fourth place, just one stroke out of a three-man playoff.

A few days before he headed for the Southern Open in Columbus, GA, in the fall of 1983, Ronnie confided: "I know I belong on the TOUR after the year I've had. I'm not satisfied, but I know I've played even better than what the money list shows."

At that point, he had accumulated more than \$40,000 and was assured of exempt status for 1984. The finest was yet to come.

He was at his best on the Green Island course and, when most people were cheering for Sam Torrance, the flamboyant Scot who stopped off on his way to the Ryder Cup matches, Ronnie came from three-strokes behind to tie Sam at 9-under-par 271. Then, Black gained the victory with a six-foot putt for a birdie on the fourth extra hole.

It was just a warm-up for the 1984 campaign. His biggest day came on the Kingsmill course in the Anheuser-Busch Classic. He trailed Willie Wood by seven strokes entering the last round, but he shot an 8-under-par 63 to edge Wood by a stroke.

The 1985 season was a disappointing one for Black on the golf course, but it was quite a year for him overall. In addition to getting married, he also moved into a new home. It had some effect on his game.

Ronnie was nine-years old when he first picked up a golf club. His father was the basketball coach at Lovington (NM) High School, so he grew up in a sports atmosphere. "Dad told me then that I couldn't go to the course until I was able to hit the ball from our front yard, across the road and over a fence on the other side. It was a shot of about 75 yards."

His older brother, James, became the head professional at Pinewood Country Club in Beaumont, TX, and as Ronnie came of age, James took him under his wing. "He recruited me for Lamar University and I worked in his shop for a while," Ronnie said. "Mostly, though, he let me play and practice."

Until he went to Lamar, he had never played on a course with bunkers or one of championship caliber, but he always dreamed of someday playing on the PGA TOUR.

He went to the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1981 and made it. His first stop was the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open in January of 1982 and he recalls, "That was the very first TOUR tournament I had ever seen in person. I was low qualifier at Randolph Park with a 66 and thought I was going to knock everyone dead. I have to admit, I had a rude awakening coming."

Phil Blackmar admits his rookie season of 1985 on the PGA TOUR was even better than he expected it would be.

He won the Canon Sammy Davis Jr. Greater Hartford Open in a playoff over Dan Pohl and Jodie Mudd as he birdied the first extra hole to earn \$108,000. He went on to collect a healthy \$198,537 for the year.

"It wasn't really a surprise," he said of the victory, "but I hadn't planned on it either. I did know that if I got hot, I could win. It was just a question of being lucky and getting hot at the right time."

He could have made the same statement last year after the Provident Classic in Chattanooga, TN. He won the title and \$81,000 after a playoff against Payne Stewart. Phil rolled in a birdie putt on the first extra hole to clinch it.

"It made my year," he said. "I was on the verge of playing well for several weeks, even if the results didn't show it."

He has been close to victory on several occasions, such as a tie for second in the 1987 Pensacola Open and a tie for third in the 1986 Vantage Championships. Both of these late-season finishes helped him to complete successful years.

Phil started in the game as a youngster and he had a teacher with good credentials—his father. Phil's dad won the National Lefthanders title in 1965 and he introduced Phil to the game.

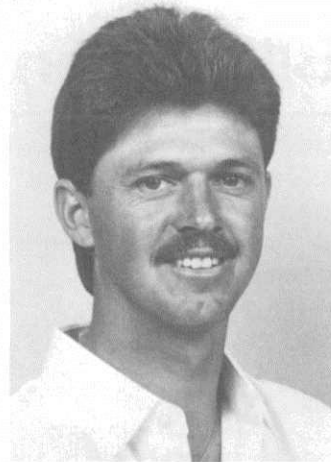
In fact, his dad has caddied for him on numerous occasions. Phil was a three-time All-Southwest Conference selection while at the University of Texas and after graduation in 1979, he enjoyed similar success on the mini-tour circuit.

He performed splendidly at the 1984 Qualifying Tournament at La Quinta, CA, shooting rounds of 69-72-70-66-70-72—419 to finish one shot in back of medalist Paul Azinger.

With his TOUR card firmly in hand, Blackmar headed out on TOUR with a good attitude and a plan of attack.

"I recognize my limitations. I'm not one of the pure strikers out here," he said. "However, when I get hot I'm going to try and run the table."

It took awhile for Jay Don Blake to settle in to life on the PGA TOUR, but once he did, he started to establish himself as a solid player and one who will contend frequently.

He has had a few disappointments in the game, but everytime he has been able to bounce back and move on to even greater success.

When Jay Don was a youngster in St. George, Utah, he spent most of his time on the nine-hole course that was adjacent to his family's home. Since his mother, father and four brothers all played the game, it was the natural thing for him to do. By the time Jay Don was 12, he knew that he wanted to play golf for a living. With little formal instruction (he's never taken a lesson), he set out to accomplish his goal.

He attended Utah State and for the first two years, was merely content with showing a little improvement. However, his junior year "things started to come together."

He won the NCAA title his junior year and then carried over the feeling from "my first real big confidence boost" to have an outstanding senior year that saw him named as the 1981 College Player-of-the-Year.

He nearly repeated as the NCAA champion, losing by a single shot to Ron Commans after he held a six-shot lead entering the final round. Despite that disappointment, he was ready to turn pro and earn his spot on TOUR.

He found out it wasn't that easy. After he didn't make it through the Qualifying Tournament on his first attempt, he stepped away from the highly-competitive game for a couple of years.

Gradually, he started to get back into it. After enjoying some success on secondary tours, he tried again in the fall of 1986 and he made it. After a slow start in 1987, his climb up the money list began in earnest in mid-summer and by year's end, he easily finished among the leading 125 money winners.

Last year, he was off to a rapid start with a tie for 10th place in the Shearson Lehman Hutton-Andy Williams Open his best. "I was consistent early on," he said, "and my game felt comfortable."

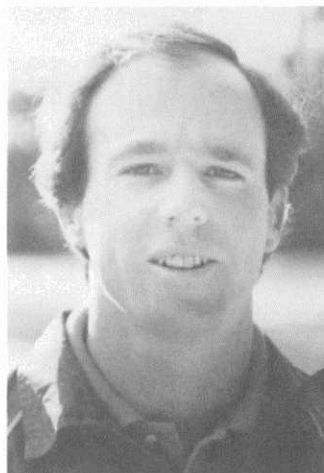
His game slipped a little in the Spring, and he said it was "because I became too critical instead of just going out, playing the way I knew I could play and having some fun."

He did enjoy a taste of victory in mid-summer even though it was not on the PGA TOUR as he captured the Utah State Open.

After his rookie season, he said, "I really didn't know how good I was when I got out here. I knew I was out with the big boys but I wasn't sure where I stood."

Everyone seems to know now and Jay Don figures to be around for a long time.

The 1988 season was a memorable one for Bill Britton. He not only returned to the top 125, but he also topped the \$100,000 mark for the first time.

For Bill, it was a reward for perseverance and hard work over the years. Times have not always been kind to the competitive man from New York, but he kept faith in himself and reached new heights last year.

He began his TOUR career in 1980 and showed good progress through the next three years. In fact, he finished 57th on the money list in 1982 with over \$75,000. During that season he had his best ever finish, a playoff loss to Hal Sutton at the Walt Disney World Classic. Bill had played brilliantly with a closing 64 to force the overtime.

From 1983 through 1987 though, Bill struggled and did not even play on TOUR in 1986.

"I wondered," admitted Britton. "When you lose your card as often as I had, you have to wonder. I thought I could play well enough, but if not for my first two years out here I would have packed it in."

This past year, however, Britton regained his form and had easily his best year to date.

He contended after three rounds at both the Beatrice Western Open and the Provident Classic (after shooting 63 the first day) and he credits the resurgence to a variety of factors.

"It all started around Atlanta when I started practicing good things," said Britton. "I practiced poorly in 1983 and lost it, but I feel much better now. I feel like I'm playing like I did in 1981 and 1982.

"My concentration and my swing are better," added Britton. "It's nice to walk in the locker-room and hear someone say 'nice playing last week', I hadn't heard that in awhile."

The smallish Britton (5-7, 140) is one of the game's most dogged competitors and his success last year was enjoyed by many.

Bill began his golfing career when he used to sneak under the fence at a public course near his home in Staten Island, NY. He enjoyed amateur success winning the Metropolitan Amateur in 1974 and 1975 and he also won the Metropolitan Open in 1975.

He won the National Junior College title while at Miami Dade North and then attended the University of Florida where he graduated in 1979. He then joined the TOUR in the spring of 1980.

It all came down to one putt, and Mark Brooks didn't hesitate. He had seen this putt before, he knew the exact line that he was looking for, and he knew that it was just an extended version of a putt that he had made just a few minutes earlier.

However, when the putt rolled into the cup, Brooks had done something for the first time in his life. He had won a PGA TOUR event. Brooks had also put together four spectacular rounds of 66-65-69-69—269, and was now the 1988 Canon Sammy Davis Jr., Greater Hartford Open Champion.

Brooks won this tournament the hard way, in a playoff with seasoned TOUR players Joey Sindelar and Dave Barr. His 269 total assured him of his best finish ever in his TOUR career, but he wanted it all.

After Sindelar knocked his tee shot into the water on the first playoff hole, it came down to Brooks and Barr on the second hole. And Brooks, a Fort Worth, TX native sank his 10-foot birdie effort, a recap of the putt that he had made several minutes earlier, to take home the \$126,000 first prize.

"It was the same line as my 3 1/2-foot par putt in regulation. I gave the winning putt just a little more," said Brooks.

However, unlike some of his peers, Mark was still the same quiet reserved person that he had been before winning.

"This will take a few days for it all to sink in," said Brooks. "There are so many things that you don't think about, out on the course, so many things that you shouldn't think about. Things like the playing in the Masters and such. My only goal was make good golf swings; that was the ticket all week."

He nearly won again late in the year losing in a playoff to Tom Purtzer at the Gatlin Brothers Southwest Classic. He gained entry into sudden death with a 50-foot eagle on the final hole.

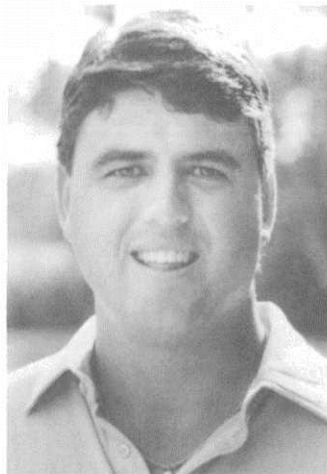
"I exceeded all of my expectations last year," said Brooks. "My first goal was to stay away from Qualifying School. Winning was just icing on the cake."

Mark began the game at the age of eight, while visiting his grandparents. His grandfather was an avid golfer, and soon had Mark feeling the same way.

He enjoyed much success at the high school and junior levels, winning several titles. From there he moved on to the University of Texas, where he was a two-time All-America selection.

He obtained his TOUR card four different times, only to have to go back to Qualifying School at the end of the year.

Being a rookie in any sport is tough, but particularly in golf where if you don't play well, you don't get paid and you don't get to play the next year. No one realized this more than Billy Ray Brown when he missed the cut at the 1988 Centel Classic, the last PGA TOUR event of the year.

When he didn't make the cut, Brown had to go home and wonder whether or not he had made enough money to stay in the top 126 on the money list. Before the Centel tournament, Brown was 122nd on the money list, with several people behind him who could pass him in this event. Finishing 126th or better would make life easier for Brown in every respect, due mainly to the fact that he would not have to go back to the TOUR's Qualifying School. By finishing 126th or better, he would retain his playing privileges for another year.

"I was scared to death," said Brown, "I didn't want to go back to the Q-School. And I knew to the penny what everyone had to make in order to pass me. The last eight weeks I was really on edge. I made the cut in six of eight tournaments and missed the cut in the others by one stroke.

"After I missed the cut at Centel, I kept calling the press room to see what was happening," Brown continued.

What happened was that Brown survived. He was passed by Chris Perry, Leonard Thompson and Jim Gallagher, but he was in at the 125th spot on the money list.

"Being a rookie, I knew such a small number kept their cards after that first year," Brown said. "My goal was to keep my card. But now that I've made it, I feel that I can upgrade my goals a bit. I feel I might now be in a position to scare some people."

Despite the fact that Brown had to sweat out whether or not he was going to keep his playing card, he nevertheless had a respectable year. He entered 31 tournaments and made the cut in 21 of them. He also finished in the top 25 five different times, including a T3 finish at the Provident Classic.

While at Provident, Brown put together rounds of 69-69-65-66 for a 269 total, tying him with Jim Dent and Mark Hayes. Brown finished five strokes behind Payne Stewart and Phil Blackmar, but the \$23,400 check was his biggest of the year, and gave him the chance to keep his card.

"The Provident tournament was a big boost for me," said Brown. "I played well there."

It is no great surprise that Brown has done as well as he has, due to his excellent amateur background. As a freshman at the University of Houston in 1982, he won the NCAA Championship. He finished his four years at Houston as a four-time All-America selection.

Although winning the NCAA Championship was a wonderful accomplishment for Brown, it also raised expectations for him. His next three years at Houston were good, but never quite what he wanted them to be.

While at Houston, Billy Ray was teammates with Steve Elkington, Billy Tuten and David Tenuis. During that time, the Cougars won three NCAA team championships, and all three are members of the PGA TOUR.

Brown was raised in a very athletic household. His dad was a center for the Oakland Raiders of the National Football League, and his brother played tackle for the St. Louis Cardinals.

Ken Brown knows he never will experience another year quite like 1987. There were so many special moments, such as his wife, Dawn, presenting him with their first born, Billy, on June 1.

Then there was the Ryder Cup matches at Muirfield Village in Dublin, OH. Ken was a part of the European team that won the Cup for a second straight time but the first ever on American soil.

The week after the Ryder Cup, Ken was positively brilliant in winning the Southern Open by seven strokes. He never was headed after shooting 65 and 64 the first two days.

Before going to the Southern, he already had won more than twice as much money as he had in any of his first three years on TOUR. He had played well all season, so the victory was the icing on his cake.

During his first three years on TOUR, he spent considerable time shuttling back and forth between the U.S. and his home in England. He did enjoy success on both sides of the ocean, but two years ago he decided "to spend a little more time over here to see if I can establish myself as a really good player."

Besides, with the family, he wanted to cut back on his traveling.

Three years ago, he lost the European Open in a playoff to Greg Norman and was second to Ian Woosnam in the European Tournament Players Championship, but his fine play earned him a berth for the fifth time on the Ryder Cup team.

Ken started in the game at age 12. There was a golf course nearby his home in England, and he said, "it was a natural thing to go over there and caddy and play."

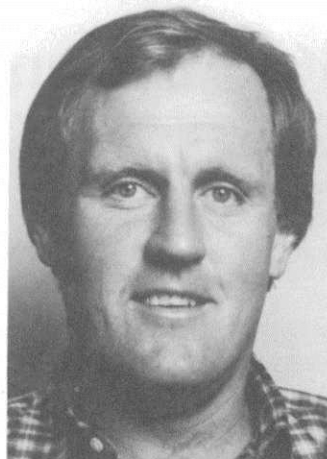
When he was 15-years old, he thought he'd like to play on the professional tour, and did turn pro when he was 18. He worked in a golf shop for a year and then headed out on the British/European circuit.

He advanced rapidly. As a 20-year old in 1977, he found himself on the Ryder Cup team for the matches against the U. S. at Royal Lytham in England. He won the Irish Open in 1978 and again played in the Ryder Cup competition in 1979.

During his first six years, he only had the one victory but a lot of good finishes. "I was putting too much pressure on myself, especially the last day," he explained.

After winning the Dutch and Kenya Opens in 1983, he decided to give the PGA TOUR a try. In the Qualifying School in the Fall, he tied for 20th place. In 1984, in a break from the U. S. tour, he won the Glasgow Classic.

George Burns will be enjoying the rewards of winning the 1987 Shearson Lehman Bros.-Andy Williams Open for many, many years.

He not only earned the title with a tournament record score of 22-under-par 266 and a first-place check for \$90,000, he also collected \$40,000 in zero coupon Treasury certificates that will be worth \$200,000 in 20 years.

In an effort to attract a strong field, Shearson Lehman Brothers offered the coupons to the leaders each day. If there was a tie, the certificates carried over to the next day's play.

Burns won the first day with a brilliant round of 63. He was tied by Craig Stadler the second day and Ray Floyd and J.C. Snead were tied after the third round, so the second-and-third day certificates carried over to the final round.

George was two-strokes behind entering the last round, but he used two eagles on the incoming nine to win by four strokes and had a last round of 65. As a result, he collected all four of the certificates. If held to their 20-year maturity, they will be worth \$200,000.

George played in considerable pain last year and, finally, in October, he had an operation on his right shoulder to eliminate a calcium build-up. "It was bone-on-bone," he said. "With my up-right swing, it put a lot of pressure on it so they went in and cleaned out a lot of debris."

He experienced little success during 1988, but managed to win the Chrysler Team Championship with Wayne Levi at season's end.

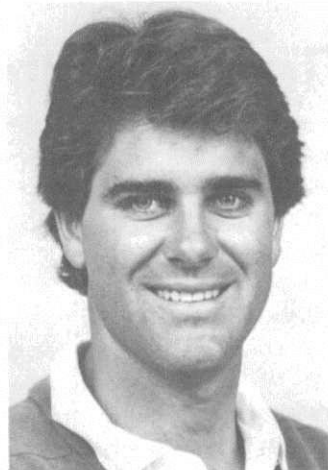
George's first victory came in 1979 at the Walt Disney World National Team Play event and he had Ben Crenshaw for a partner. Early the next year, he won the Bing Crosby National Pro-Amateur.

Burns was too busy playing all sports in high school on Long Island to concentrate on golf. He lettered in football and basketball and entered the University of Maryland with the primary purpose of playing football, in addition to earning a degree.

He was a defensive end for the Terps, but recalls, "I realized I wasn't going to go anywhere in football." He concentrated on golf from his freshman year forward.

The Oakwood Country Club in Coal Valley, IL, will always be a special place for Curt Byrum and it's all because the sponsors of the Hardee's Golf Classic chose to give him one of their exemptions.

It turned out to be the week in 1986 that turned his career around. He had lost his membership on the PGA TOUR the year before so he had spent the first six months of the season searching for games.

Hardee's was to be his first TOUR start of 1986 and he played exceptionally well. A 64 the first day left him one stroke behind Bob Lohr. A 70 the next for a 134 total kept him close to the lead but when he came back with another 64 the third day, he was in front of Mark Wiebe by two strokes.

The two of them fought their way through the final round and Curt still was leading by one going to the 17th hole. There, he bogeyed. Mark birdied to take the lead and he went on to win. Nevertheless, Curt held on to second place and collected \$43,200.

With that amount, he again was eligible to obtain special TOUR membership and he made the most of it.

A month later, he joined with Bobby Nichols in the Showdown Classic at Jeremy Ranch in Utah—a popular Senior PGA TOUR event—and he played brilliantly as they won the title.

He used that confidence to put together an excellent 1987 campaign in which he won \$212,450 with a runnerup finish at the prestigious Memorial Tournament at Muirfield Village.

"I was very happy with the 1987 season; I accomplished all of my goals," said Byrum.

The 1988 season started promisingly, but Curt was disappointed with the middle of the year.

"I had a better year in 1987," said Byrum. "Money wise it was about the same, but that doesn't mean much."

Curt and his younger brother Tom grew up in Onida, South Dakota. "We used to have a nine-hole course with sand greens there," Curt said. "It's grown over now, but when Tom and I are home, we get out the mowers and cut down a couple of the fairways so we can practice."

He was exceptional as a high school athlete. He was all-state as a quarterback in football and as a guard in basketball. His senior year in 1977, he was named the South Dakota Athlete of the Year.

He was recruited by the University of New Mexico to play golf so that's where he decided to go.

He left school after three years and went to work at Marco Island, FL, so that he could meet Ken Venturi and get his help. Curt was still an amateur at the time but Ken took him under his wing and they still work together.

He went through the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1982, the first time he tried it. He played in 1983 and in 1984 without a lot of success. He had to return to the Qualifying Tournament again in the Fall of 1985, only this time he didn't make it.

He seemed to be headed for a long, lost year until the good folks at Hardee's came along.

Tom Byrum may have accomplished a first on the PGA TOUR. He went from riding bulls in the rodeo to playing golf at its highest level on the PGA TOUR.

A little grin crosses his handsome face when he explains, "I used to spend my summers in the 4-H Club rodeos. Did it for seven years. I used to do a little of everything but I was best at riding the bulls."

After a slight pause, he added, "but that gets very old at a young age. That was when I started to play more golf."

It was a good move. As a rookie in 1986, he was impressive in compiling four top 10 finishes with his best being the runner-up in the Southwest Classic. In 1987, he challenged several times and took a huge step up the money ladder.

There were a couple of highlights to last season. The biggest came in April when his wife, Dana, presented him with their first born, Brittini René.

It was a successful year on the golf courses, too. His best was a tie for second in the Pensacola Open after leading by four strokes going into the final round, thanks to 64-65 for the middle two days.

"My goal each year," he said, "is to become better than the year before."

A lot of hard work and patience has paid off for Tom, but he also points to the week of the Hardee's Golf Classic in July of 1986 as one that had a tremendous impact on his life on TOUR.

His older brother, Curt, who had lost his TOUR card at the end of 1985, received a sponsor's exemption and finished second and earned \$43,200. That was enough to get his playing privileges back so the Byrum brothers were a team again.

"Curt has helped me with my game more than anyone else," Tom said. "We know each other's swings and we constantly watch each other. A lot of the success I've had happened after he came back on TOUR."

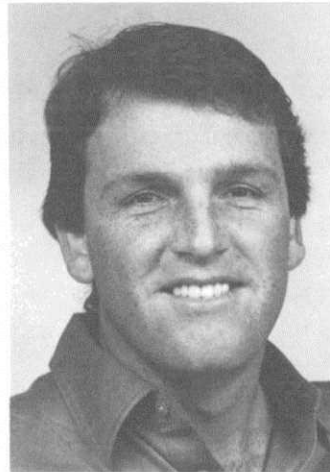
After he was graduated from high school, Tom headed for New Mexico where Curt was going to the University. He took a part-time job at a country club in Albuquerque and became a walk-on for the golf team. He played for two years, one of them with Curt, and then transferred to New Mexico State where he did exceptionally well.

"That was when I decided to see how far I could go in the game," he said. After he was graduated in 1984 with a degree in Sociology, he entered the TOUR's Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1984. He didn't make it. "I simply wasn't ready," he said, matter of factly.

He played in Asia in the Spring of 1985 and the experience was invaluable. He went back to the Q-School in the Fall of 1985 and made it easily, finishing third.

The folks up in Onida, South Dakota—all 850 of them—are mighty proud of the Byrum boys and well they should be.

Mark Calcavecchia will tell you there is nothing quite like living a dream and then one day discover that dreams really do come true.

He has been living that dream to the fullest. The first big week came in the fall of 1986 when he won the Southwest Classic. The next spring, he won the Honda Classic and went on to a \$522,423 year.

Last year, his star continued to rise. He won the Bank of Boston Classic by a stroke over Don Pooley with the help of a last-day 66.

He said, "When you win out here, five things have to happen. You have to drive the ball great, hit the terrific irons, chip like a fiend, putt like a demon and be as lucky as heck."

He has done it all.

After his family moved from Laurel, Nebraska, to the Palm Beach area in Florida when he was 13-years old, he discovered he could play golf every day of the year. "I couldn't believe it at first," he said, "and the greatest thing was playing golf on Christmas Day afternoon."

He enrolled at the University of Florida and played well, but after three years, he felt "it was time to move on."

He turned professional in January of 1981 and six months later, he qualified for his TOUR card. He was barely 21-years old. As he recalls, "I didn't have the mental capability to play against these guys. I was overwhelmed."

His move up the ladder started in the Spring of 1986. He entered the Open qualifier for the Doral-Eastern Open and earned one of the four-spots. His first round of 65 at Doral was good enough for the first-round lead. He went on to tie for eighth place and won \$13,500 in his first start of the year.

In September, he made his move. He tied for seventh in the Bank of Boston Classic, tied for ninth in the Greater Milwaukee Open (thanks to a third-round 63) and the next week took charge in the Southwest Classic in Abilene.

David Canipe tried the PGA TOUR circuit back in the mid-70's with little success. But after years of triumph on the mini-tours, he returned to the TOUR in 1987 and in 1988 he broke through into the top 125 for the first time.

After graduating from the University of Georgia, where he teamed with Bill Kratzert and Lyn Lott to name a couple, Canipe set his sites on the PGA TOUR. He first appeared in 1976 and he played off and on through 1980 earning only a couple of thousand dollars total.

"That was back in the days of Monday qualifiers," recalled Canipe. "Monday qualifiers and myself didn't get along very well."

Canipe headed to Florida after the 1980 season to tackle the then extensive mini-tour system. After an estimated 25 victories, though, Canipe decided to come back out on the fledgling Tournament Players Series circuit sponsored by the TOUR.

He won the 1984 Provident Classic in Chattanooga and his success on that level heightened his desire to try the big league again. When the Space Coast tour in Florida started to encounter difficulties, Canipe headed back to the PGA TOUR Qualifying School in the fall of 1986.

"I had done a heckuva lot better on the mini-tours than I had on the PGA TOUR," said Canipe. "However, when I had some success on the TPS and the mini-tour wars started I was almost forced to go back out on the TOUR to try and support myself."

It was an excellent decision for Canipe although 1987 was not as good a year as he would have liked. He earned only \$36,927 to finish 167th on the money list and he was forced to return to the Q-School.

He finished tied for eighth at the 1987 school and returned to the TOUR with confidence. Early on the West Coast he finished tied for ninth at the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am and collected a check for \$18,900.

In May, though, his career took a turn around. He posted scores of 71-69-68-68 over three windswept courses in Las Vegas to finish tied for fourth at the lucrative Panasonic Las Vegas Invitational to take home a check for \$52,361.

"Las Vegas was the turning point of my comeback," said Canipe. "I wasn't sure I'd be successful until then. I felt like I was going to play better, but not rock solid sure."

He ended up topping the \$100,000 mark for the year and finished in 100th spot on the money list to easily insure his playing status for 1989.

A North Carolina native, Canipe grew up on a course in Fayetteville and had a successful junior career as well as a solid collegiate career.

Jim Carter knew he had the game to play on the PGA TOUR but even he admits he was pleasantly surprised by his West Coast swing at the start of the 1988 season.

Jim was one of the hottest players in the game. He tied for ninth at the Phoenix Open, his first start. He then tied for fourth in the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am; tied for sixth at the Hawaiian Open and tied for 13th in the Los Angeles Open. He accumulated nearly \$80,000 in those four events.

"I wasn't worried about what happened at the start of the year," he said, "and just let things happen. After that, I think I started to put too much pressure on myself."

He still enjoyed a banner year for a second-year player, showing every promise of being one of the finest young pros in the game.

Although he is a little on the quiet side, Jim has made his presence felt at every level of competition. The folks in Arizona know all about Jim Laver Carter.

His high school team won the state interscholastic title in 1979 and he might have won the individual crown except a fellow named Willie Wood from Tucson was too good.

"Willie was too good for everyone," Jim says with a smile. "None of us could beat him."

The big prize in his basket is the NCAA Championship for Arizona State University in 1983 in Fresno, CA. Twice he won the Arizona State Amateur and the Southwest Amateur championships.

There have been many great athletes come out of ASU, but in 1984 Jim was named the university's Athlete-of-the-Year.

Jim started to play the game at age nine. "I just went out with a friend of mine," he said, and that was all he needed to get hooked on the game of golf. "Then I started to go out with my dad and wed try to play nine holes a lot of evenings."

As time went along, his father started to take him to junior tournaments around the state and his career was launched.

"I used to play all sports," he said. He was on the varsity wrestling team as a sophomore, "but I gave up everything else to play golf."

Whenever he had the opportunity, he would watch the TOUR events on television and always dreamed of being out with the stars of the game.

After he was graduated from ASU in 1984, he tried to obtain his TOUR card in the Fall of 1985 and didn't make it. He went back the next fall and succeeded.

He had a decent freshman year on TOUR, winning \$60,102 but finished 134th on the money list. He went back again in the Fall of 1987 and easily made it through to improve his position on the exempt list.

Tze-Chung Chen had several opportunities to win during his first four years on the PGA TOUR but when another came along early in his fifth season, he took advantage of it.

Ben Crenshaw was the victim in the 1987 Los Angeles Open at the famed Riviera Country Club.

T. C. (as he generally is known) and Ben were playing together the last afternoon. Ben made a marvelous birdie putt of 16 feet on the 18th green. Chen faced a putt of about 14 feet to tie — and he made it. "When Ben made that putt," T. C. said, "I thought he had won. I just told myself, 'Don't be short. Even if you three-putt, don't be short.'"

On the first extra hole, Ben was bunkered in two after driving onto a gravel path. Chen was on the green, 12 feet from the cup. T. C. managed his par, while Ben suffered a bogey.

T. C. was 17-years old when he first started to play golf and in just eight years, he found himself on the PGA TOUR.

He gained a certain level of notoriety when he tied for the lead in the 1983 Kemper Open with four other players, only to lose in the playoff to Fred Couples. He gained world-wide attention at the 1985 United States Open championship at Oakland Hills, Michigan.

He equaled the competitive course record with a first-day five-under-par 65. He added a 69 for a six-under-par 134 and held a one-stroke lead after two rounds. He increased it to two strokes over Andy North after another 69 put him at seven-under-par 203.

His dream came to a shattering halt on the fifth hole of the final day when he suffered a quadruple-bogey eight (at one point he double hit the ball trying to pitch from deep rough) and then bogeyed the next three. He finished the day with a 77 and in a tie for second place with Denis Watson and Dave Barr, one-stroke behind the new champion, North.

His older brother, Tze-Ming Chen, started him in the game, and he still does very well on the Asian/Japan Tours. In the fall of 1983, Tze-Ming won the Dunlop Phoenix tournament in Japan by defeating Tom Watson in a playoff. Tze-Ming qualified for the 1984 World Series of Golf, and during the week at Firestone Country Club, T.C. caddied for his brother.

The Chens lived near a golf course in Taipei, and T.C. said, "everyday, I would watch people play golf, and then I would caddy for my brother."

He progressed so rapidly, that in 1980, he was selected to play on Taiwan's World Amateur Cup team and competition was held in Pinehurst. "I finished second to Hal Sutton," he said proudly.

He turned professional just after that, and played on the Asian Tour for two years, "I thought it would be good for me to come over here and try for the experience," he said.

When he needs help he goes to his brother, but it is difficult since he is so far away. "It takes 15 hours from Los Angeles," he pointed out.

He finished second at Kingsmill in the A-B Classic, just a stroke behind Mark McCumber, thanks mainly to middle rounds of 66 and 65 on a par 71 course.

He had two top 10 finishes during the first half of 1988 but towards the end, he started to put together a little of the consistency he has been seeking. His best round was a 64 to open the Gatlin Brothers Southwest Classic.

He has been working extensively with David Rasmussen of Milwaukee.

When Bobby joined the TOUR in the summer of 1980, he did so with considerable fanfare. His amateur credentials were rather impressive, to say the least.

He made it onto the TOUR without going through the Qualifying Tournament by earning enough money during the spring and early summer to meet the minimum money guidelines for new membership.

Bobby started to play golf at age 10, using his father's old clubs. Lee Martin, who was the pro at the Carmel Valley Ranch at the time, gave him his first lessons. "I worked at the club, doing odd jobs," he recalls, "and my pay was playing privileges. Mainly, I picked up range balls."

When he was 13, Ben Doyle assumed duties at the club, and he became Bobby's tutor.

He was successful in California Junior golf, and in 1976 and 1977, he was the state's leading point getter. In 1977, he won the California State junior title.

He moved on to Brigham Young University, where, for three years, he worked on his golfing skills and his education. "I wanted that balance," he said, "and that is why I chose BYU."

He received an associates degree in French in 1980, and speaks the language fluently.

Keith Clearwater believed he had the golf game to win on the PGA TOUR but, as he said, "when it will happen, you just don't know."

Even in his wildest dreams, however, he never pictured himself winning the way he did, first with back-to-back six-under-par 64s the final day of the prestigious Colonial National Invitation Tournament and then closed the official season by winning the Centel Classic. He became the first "rookie" in a decade to win two in a year.

Consider these figures. His total score of 14-under-par 266 equaled the Colonial record set in 1985 by Corey Pavin. And, his final two rounds of 12-under-par 128 on Sunday put him in a class by himself in the record book.

"This is just the greatest experience of my life," he said, "at least on the golf course."

Keith was five strokes out of the lead at the halfway mark and then had to face a 36-hole windup on Sunday since the second round on Friday was rained out and had to be played on Saturday.

His 64 moved him into a tie for second place, just one stroke behind Ben Crenshaw who was leading at nine-under-par 201. He stayed close to the lead through the early going in the afternoon and then made his move on the back nine with birdies at the 11th, 12th, 13th and 15th holes. He won by three strokes over Davis Love III and collected \$108,000.

He gained more national attention at the U. S. Open at the Olympic Club in San Francisco when he equaled the Open record with a six-under-par 64 in the third round.

Keith struggled a bit last year, but it's always tough to follow up a really good year with another one. You have a new outlook usually and Keith was no exception.

"I had a lot of distractions in 1988," said Clearwater who became a father for the second time last June. "There's a big difference playing well with huge expectations and responsibilities, but I think things are going to go well."

Keith started in the game at age 12. "There was a municipal course near our home in Walnut Creek (CA), and I'd sneak across the fence with my buddies. As soon as I started to play, I knew I wanted to be a golfer."

He enjoyed success at the high school and junior level and then moved on to Brigham Young University where he was a teammate of such TOUR players as Bobby Clampett, Rick Fehr and Richard Zokol. He earned All-America status in 1981, the year he helped to lead BYU to the NCAA team championship.

The Clearwaters have made Utah their home for nearly a decade, but when he seeks help with his game, he goes to Mike LaBauve at Alta Mesa in the Phoenix area.

If awards were given for "determination to succeed," Lennie Clements would be one of the prime candidates.

He has been on the TOUR since the Spring of 1981 and each year his peers know he will be getting better because they know he works hard at the game.

"My short game got me out here," he said, "but the last couple of years, my long game and my putting have improved considerably. I feel I'm becoming more consistent."

One of the high points of 1988 was a victory in the Spalding Invitational, a non-TOUR event in the Monterey area. He had a 62 and a 63 that week and won a playoff over Ken Green, Dan Pohl and Tim Norris.

Lennie earned his right to play in the big time the hard way. After failing to make it in the TOUR school, he made it via the Open Qualifying, finally meeting the minimum money guideline in his 10th and final chance at the 1981 Magnolia Classic. He won \$3,150 there after a tie for fifth, and became a member the next week at the Tallahassee Open.

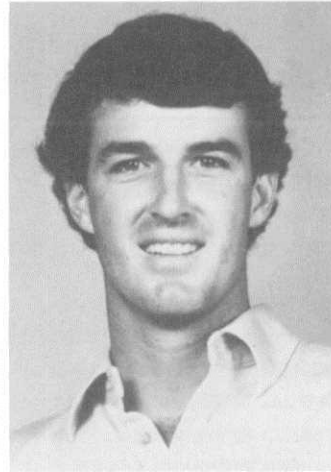
He blossomed into a force to be reckoned with in 1986 with four top ten finishes and \$112,642 in earnings. It was easily his best year on TOUR to that point.

He continued his fine play in 1987 collecting a career high \$124,989 with three top ten finishes. He was a contender until late in the game at the U.S. Open before he eventually finished tied for ninth and later in the year he tied for fourth at the Beatrice Western Open.

He said he has been working to lengthen his game off the tee. "I've made a couple of other positive changes in my swing, changes I had to make to stay on TOUR."

Two fellows from San Diego, Jack Harden and Ben Stewart, have been the most instrumental in molding his game. Driving, short irons and putting are the strong points, and, when things are going well, he plays the ball left to right.

It is safe to say Russ Cochran is the finest lefthanded golfer on the PGA TOUR and probably is the best since Bob Charles of New Zealand was winning TOUR events in the 60's and early 70's.

Each year he seems to be contending more often and that pleases him. "I'm happy to be able to play good golf and raise a good family," he said. "Each year I try to figure out a way to improve the level of my game."

He joined the TOUR in 1983 and, although he did not enjoy a great success on the regular TOUR, he did win \$100,863 and two events on the old Tournament Players Series. That, really launched him on his way to success. He has had three \$100,000-plus years since then.

Early last spring he was able to put together back-to-back top ten finishes in the MCI-Heritage Classic and USF&G Classic. That was a first for him. He was able to collect more top 10 finishes than ever before and certainly more top 25 finishes.

He definitely "improved the level" of his game, and he knows there are even better days ahead.

Although he easily retained his exempt status through 1985 and 1986, he wasn't up to par physically and it cut into his effectiveness. He struggled early in 1987, but by the end of April, his game started to come around. At one stretch, he made the cut in 11 straight events.

The highlight of that season was a tie for second in the Federal Express-St. Jude Classic in Memphis. He finished just one stroke behind Curtis Strange and many of his friends from Kentucky were there to see him do it.

Russ started in golf when he was about 10-years-old. He used to go to a neighboring course with his older brother. A couple of years later, when he won a state age-group tournament, he truly was hooked. He played junior golf in the area and then through high school, winning the state scholastic title in 1975. He went to the University of Kentucky and played for three more years.

Oh, yes, he does play lefthanded. "When I was younger, I used ladies' clubs because they were the only lefthanded ones I could find. Several people told me I should switch around and try to play right-handed, but no one made a real effort to change me, so I stayed with it. I do everything left-handed, anyway."

Including accepting healthy checks on the PGA TOUR.

Everyone loves to see a young man rewarded for hard work, so it has been especially pleasing to see John Cook enjoy several very good years on the PGA TOUR.

While physical problems cut into his effectiveness in 1982, 1984 and 1985, he has shown that when healthy, he's one of the best.

He was never better than he was during The International at Castle Pines near Denver in August of 1987. He went the distance in the tournament that uses a modified Stableford system for scoring and earned \$180,000. It was an eagle three at the 17th hole that put him over the top.

"I'm not much of an eagle person," he said, "and I wasn't thinking eagle at the time." He hit a 4 iron for his second shot to 12 feet and made the putt. "I turned an average year into a good one," he said.

A week after Jan presented him with Jason, their third child, in January of 1986, John played extremely well in the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic. It was his first start of the year and he tied with his good friend, Donnie Hammond. Unfortunately for John, Donnie won the playoff with a birdie on the first extra hole.

In 1983, when he earned \$216,868, he won the Canadian Open in a stirring six-hole playoff over Johnny Miller and accumulated seven top ten finishes.

The one that got away in 1983 though, left a scar for awhile. Hal Sutton was in the scoring tent behind the 18th green after his final round of the Tournament Players Championship with a five-under par 283. John was on the 18th tee, needing a par four to tie. Unfortunately, he hooked his tee shot into the water at the Players Club, suffered a double bogey and tied for third place.

One of his best-ever efforts on TOUR came in the 1981 Bing Crosby National Pro-Amateur, when he was tied with Hale Irwin, Ben Crenshaw, Bobby Clampett and Barney Thompson. John finally won the title on the third extra hole. Due to heavy rains, it was a 54-hole tournament.

He has always known of the thrill of victory. He tasted it early when in 1974 he defeated Gary Hallberg for the World Junior crown. John's biggest title came in 1978 when he won the U.S. Amateur Championship. The next year, he lost in the final to Mark O'Meara.

Jack Nicklaus and Tom Weiskopf convinced him he should go to Ohio State, even though his school years were spent in southern California.

He was an All-American choice three years, and in 1979, he helped the Buckeyes win the NCAA team title. In December of 1983, he was on the U.S. World Cup team with Rex Caldwell and they combined to win the team championship.

There are few players in the game with the talent of Fred Couples. He continually displays an ability to rise to the occasion, especially on the more difficult courses.

It was never more clearly demonstrated than in the 1984 Tournament Players Championship on the TPC at Sawgrass where every shot must be precise.

Fred took the lead the second day with a brilliant record-tying eight-under par-64 and he stayed in front the rest of the way. He had to fight off the challenges of the game's finest players to get the victory. Seve Ballesteros and Tom Watson were chasing him after the third round and the final margin was only one stroke over Lee Trevino.

The 1986 season was a forgettable one for Couples, but he returned more determined than ever in 1987. His hard work paid off with his third TOUR triumph at the Byron Nelson Classic where he beat Mark Calcavecchia in a playoff.

Last year, he knocked at victory's door several times. He lost the Phoenix Open in a playoff to Sandy Lyle. A last-round 65 gave him a third place at the Buick Open. He was fourth at the MCI Heritage Classic and a week earlier, he was fifth in the Masters tournament.

He does admit, "I need to practice and play harder."

Fred's first victory came the hard way in the Kemper Open on the demanding Congressional Country Club course. He had to defeat Gil Morgan, Scott Simpson, Barry Jaeckel and Tze-Chung Chen in a playoff. On the second extra hole, the 211-yard 16th, he hit a splendid five-iron shot to within two feet of the hole and he made it for his victory. "I felt like crying," he said. "I've never hit a shot that amounted to so much."

He convinced a lot of people at the 1982 PGA Championship at Southern Hills in Tulsa that his future was very bright indeed. Fred shot a closing four-under par 66 to gain a tie for third place, but during the first round, he really had eyes popping. He birdied the last six holes for a championship record score of 29.

Couples was introduced to golf by his father, who works for the Seattle Parks & Recreation Department. So all sports were a natural with him. Within a few years, he was competing in junior-golf events in the Seattle area.

Anytime Ben Crenshaw wins a golf tournament, it is one of those wonderful moments in the game. There probably isn't a player in the game who is more loved by his fans and peers.

So, his victory in the 1984 Masters Tournament was extra special. As he thought about what he had accomplished, he said slowly, "It's a sweet, sweet thing. I don't think there ever will be anything sweeter for me."

Ben's 67 gave him the first-round lead over Lee Trevino by one stroke, but he slipped back the next two days. He was four-strokes behind Mark Lye after two days and two-strokes behind Tom Kite after the third.

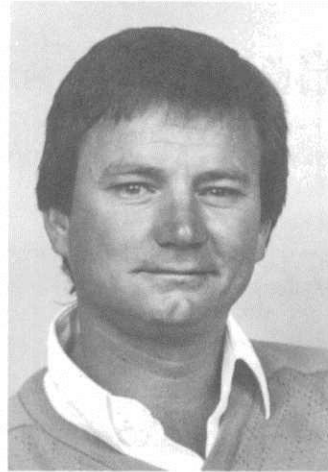
Through the final round, he shot a four-under-par 68 and won by two over Tom Watson with an 11-under-par 277. "Ben deserved it," Watson said later. "He's been in the hunt in a lot of major championships. This is his first, and I know what it must mean to him."

He followed the great year with a horrible season in 1985 but it wasn't diagnosed until late in the year that he was suffering from a hyperactive thyroid.

Once on the proper medication, he came back with another super year in 1986, highlighted by victories in the Buick Open and the Vantage Championship. "It feels tremendous to win," he said. "Last year (1985) was totally bleak because I didn't know what was wrong."

He won the USF&G Classic in 1987 and compiled 14 top 10 finishes in only 24 starts. Last year, he won the Doral-Ryder Open, finished second in the Colonial National Invitation and third in the GTE-Byron Nelson Classic. Briefly, he had another outstanding campaign.

If you are looking for a good example of what perseverance can do for you, you need look no further than to Mike Donald.

He has had to work hard in order to move up the ladder on the PGA TOUR—harder than most people—but during the last few years he has been enjoying some of the game's rewards.

For the first time in his career, he earned well over \$100,000 in 1984 and he repeated the performance in 1986, 1987 and 1988. "I learned to be more patient with myself and my game," he said.

A tie for third in the Canadian Open highlighted the 1986 campaign. His best in 1987 was a tie for second in the Federal Express-St. Jude Classic in Memphis.

"I stood on the last tee at Memphis with a chance to win my first," he said, "but I was pleased that I was able to hang in there all the way."

Well liked by his peers, Mike was elected in the fall of 1987 to a four-year term as a Player Director on the TOUR's Policy Board.

When Mike was in the ninth grade, he gave up baseball to concentrate on golf. It was a good move. He went on to Broward Community College and won the National Junior College championship. It earned him a Chris Schenkel scholarship to Georgia Southern College.

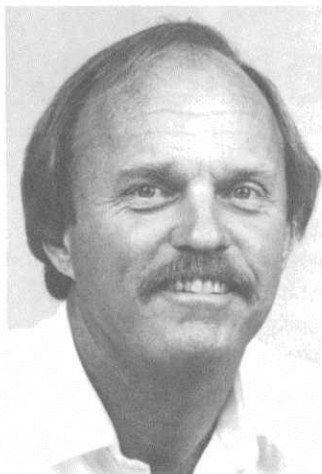
In his first tournament at Georgia Southern, he finished fifth, not bad at all when you consider the players who were 1-2 respectively were Jay Haas of Wake Forest and Chip Beck of Georgia. His parade didn't last long though, because "I had a conflict with the coach and they took my scholarship away."

So Mike headed for home. "I didn't have any money, so I delivered flowers and umpired baseball games for a year." Georgia Southern brought in a new coach the next year and Mike was back in school. Before he returned though, Mike was impressive again as he went to the finals of the 1978 North and South Amateur before losing to Gary Hallberg.

Mike started in the game at age 12. "My parents bought me a set of clubs because they didn't know what else to buy me. I loved to play baseball and I had everything I needed for that sport. They just wanted to get me something different and, even though they didn't play golf, they thought it would be a good sport for me."

In December of 1984, he joined with Vicki Alvarez of the LPGA to win the JC Penney Mixed Team Classic.

Bob Eastwood has been able to enjoy the good life on the PGA TOUR but early in his career, there was a time when he wondered if he would ever be able to say that.

He found it difficult to sum up his performances in 1984. So he simply said, "Incredible. I knew I was capable of winning. It was just a matter of time for me to get everything together." "Time" turned out to be in his 13th year as an active player, and he not only broke through with his first victory, but he won his second as well.

He won again in 1985 but his victory in the Byron Nelson Classic came in a rather unexpected fashion. He trailed Payne Stewart by two strokes as Payne played the last hole. Surprisingly, Payne double bogeyed the 18th to drop back into a tie with Bob. On the first extra hole, Bob won the title.

His first victory was in the 1984 USF&G Classic in New Orleans and then he won the Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic. He also tied for third in the World Series of Golf that year.

Last year was not his best financially, but he pointed out, "I believe it was my best year ever for hitting the ball. I just had problems making putts when I had to make them."

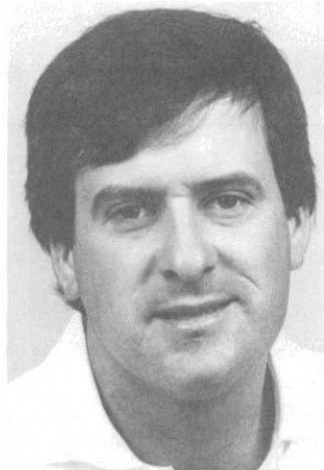
He was four years old when he started to play golf. His father was in the golf business in Stockton, CA., and helped to build the Dry Creek Ranch golf club in the 1960s. It was a family affair.

His skills surfaced early, as he won city amateur titles in Stockton and Sacramento. He won the 1966 California State Amateur and while at San Jose State, he won the West Coast Athletic Conference title.

Bob headed for the TOUR Qualifying school in the Spring of 1969 and he not only made it through, but he was the medalist. His life on the TOUR had to wait awhile, though. In October of that year, he went into the Army and was not discharged until October of 1971. So, he really didn't join the TOUR full-time until 1972.

Several people have helped him along the way, such as Bob Warner in junior golf and Tom LoPresti during his college and early days on TOUR; but in recent years, Butch Baird has been his guiding hand on the practice tee.

David Edwards had a tough act to follow in 1988. His own.

In his first start of the season, he finished second in the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic, winning \$108,000 as he came through with rounds of 65 and 67 the last two days and finished two strokes behind the winner, Jay Haas.

It set up another good season for David and the experience was similar to the one he enjoyed in 1984. "That year," he recalls, "I surpassed so many of my goals I had set for myself by the end of May that I didn't know what to do. It was by far my best year."

David's biggest week of 1984 came in the Los Angeles Open on the famed Riviera Country Club course. He shot a magnificent final-round seven-under par 64 to win by three over Jack Renner.

"Riviera always has been one of my favorite courses, and because of that, the Los Angeles Open always has been my No. 1 choice. So, to win there was something very special to me."

The victory put him in the 1984 Masters Tournament for the first time and the experience was all he expected it to be—and more. A final-round 67 boosted him into a tie for third place.

David enjoys telling people how he got started in the game. "I was about 12-years old," he said, "and I played because my brother Danny (who is five years older) played. That's all there was to it. All I did when I was growing up was tag along. I did whatever he did. He was the one who talked me into getting a set of clubs."

In the fall of 1980, they carried their brother relationship to the ultimate, winning the Walt Disney World National Team Championship.

David has enjoyed his share of success during his career, but he said it hasn't been easy. "At every level, from juniors, through high school, then college and now on the TOUR, I have had to start at the bottom and work my way up. I haven't been any instant success."

He always found that success, though. He won the Oklahoma State Junior title in 1973, and won the National Collegiate championship for Oklahoma State in 1978, and twice was named to the collegiate All-America team.

You know there will never be a dull moment when Dave Eichelberger is around and this friendly fellow is around a lot of the time on the PGA TOUR. He enjoys playing and you can count on him being in at least 30 events a season. He's also the kind of guy the sponsors and fans alike enjoy having on the scene.

He has won four times during his years on TOUR and last year he demonstrated his fondness for certain courses. His best finish was a tie for sixth place in the Bay Hill Classic and he won that event in 1980.

He also tied for 11th in the Greater Milwaukee Open, and his first two TOUR triumphs came there in 1971 and in 1977.

His last victory was in the 1981 Tallahassee Open and it came in a playoff with Bob Murphy and Mark O'Meara. Dave missed a putt of three feet at the final hole that would have given him the victory, but he claimed the title on the first extra hole.

Dave started in the game at age 13 in the junior programs at his family's club in Waco, TX. It wasn't until he went to Oklahoma State University that his game started to blossom. He reached the semi-finals of the 1964 U.S. Amateur Championship at the Canterbury Club in Cleveland and the next year represented Uncle Sam on the Walker Cup and Americas Cup teams.

He came out of the TOUR's Qualifying Tournament in 1967 and steadily worked his way toward a \$108,312 season in 1971 that placed him ninth on the money list. The victory in Milwaukee was the highlight.

His game has had its peaks and valleys through the years but few peaks were higher than in March of 1980 when he mastered the cold, biting wind to win the Bay Hill Classic. He was superb.

That same year, he ran away with "Eagle" honors in the statistical program, making 16 of them. It prompted the question, "How many Eichels did Eagleberger have?"

His game started to slide after the \$122,352 year in 1980, all the way down to \$9,934 in 1984. That was when he started to rebuild his swing. Since then, bit-by-bit, his game has improved.

"It involved a grip change," he said. "It's still not there, but it's getting closer. I worked it out on my own and I feel it really will help me in the long run. It already has helped and should prolong my career."

He's not exactly like Crocodile Dundee, but he does come from the outback of Australia. Unlike Dundee, however, he didn't spend his youth hunting crocs, he spent them playing golf and that has turned out to be a wise choice for Steve Elkington.

Another in a long line of Australians to enjoy success here on the PGA TOUR, Elkington had a good rookie season in 1987 and then improved on it last year to firmly establish himself as a PGA TOUR player.

He grew up idolizing Bruce Devlin and says that he was often compared to him back home although Steve modestly attributes that to "the fact that we were both skinny."

While winning the Doug Sanders Junior World Championship in 1981, Elkington was spotted by University of Houston coach Dave Williams who recruited the no-longer skinny Elkington to play for the Cougars. He had an excellent career at Houston winning All-America honors twice, collecting two individual Southwest Conference titles and he helped lead the Cougars to two NCAA Championships.

It was while attending Houston that he first had thoughts of playing the TOUR, but first he spent a year on the European circuit as a tuneup.

"Playing in Europe was the best thing that ever happened to me," said Elkington. "It really got me ready for the PGA TOUR and I needed the experience because the TOUR is even tougher than I thought it would be."

Despite discovering an early season allergy to grass that obviously made playing golf difficult, Elkington got off to a strong start with two top ten finishes early in 1987 highlighted by a tie for eighth at the Honda Classic. It would prove to be his best finish of the year and it propelled him to exempt status for 1988.

Good things have been expected of Elkington ever since he won the Australian-New Zealand Amateur in 1980 and the Australian Amateur in 1981. He attributes his success to playing a lot as a child.

"I grew up in the Outback and we really didn't have much to do so we spent all of our time playing, caddying, etc.," said Elkington. "I've been going at it pretty strong since I was 10 years old."

His reward was the scholarship to Houston, although he admits he almost left and he credits Coach Williams for keeping him here in the U.S.

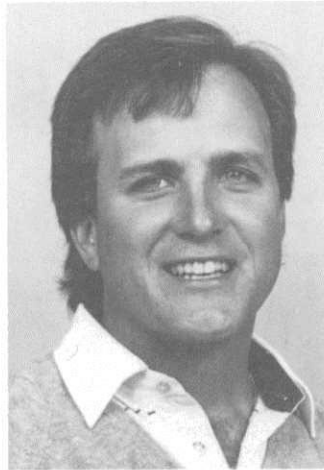
"I ended up having a great time at the University of Houston, but if it wasn't for Coach Williams I probably wouldn't have stayed at first," recalled Elkington. "I'm glad that I did."

And what about those childhood comparisons to Devlin?

"Bruce Devlin is still my favorite player, I really looked up to him and now he's a neighbor and a friend," smiled Elkington.

He might just turn out to be as good a player as Mr. Devlin as well.

It didn't take a ton of bricks to fall on his head, but it did take a life-threatening rockfall to convince Brad Fabel that life as a professional golfer wasn't so bad.

After a standout high school career in Kentucky, Fabel enrolled at the University of Houston to play golf. One season later, though, Fabel had transferred to Brevard JC in Florida where he stayed for another year.

He returned home to Kentucky "burned out on golf" and went to work in the coal mines of his native state. He quit playing altogether for three years before a mining accident changed his mind about the game.

Fabel then enrolled at Western Kentucky University and resumed playing golf with an eye on joining the PGA TOUR eventually.

He played well in the Qualifying Tournament in the fall of 1984 and then made the best of his opportunities with a strong West Coast swing to open the 1985 season.

His best finishes came later, however, as he tied for third place in the Quad Cities Open and the Greater Milwaukee Open.

"Once I finished third at the Quad Cities Open and made over \$17,000, I figured that I was safe and would keep my card for 1986," said Fabel.

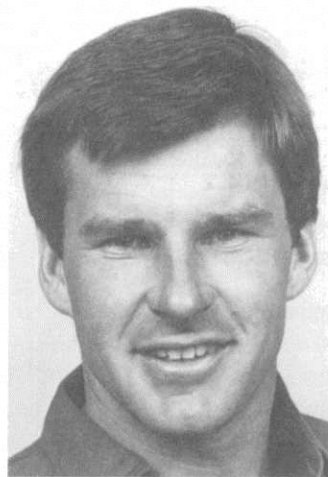
The 1987 campaign was another good one for Fabel despite some nagging back pains that reduced his schedule to only 25 events. He still managed to win \$90,024 and he had two top ten finishes with a solo fifth at the Hardee's Golf Classic his best effort.

Last year, his ball striking became more consistent and he went on to his best financial season. "I changed my game in March," he said, "and went from a draw to a fade. With my back, it's easier to hit the fade."

His tie for fourth place at Hardees' was especially satisfying since he had a 66 and three rounds of 67.

It's obvious that Brad's best days are ahead of him.

Nick Faldo has moved to a new plateau during the last couple of years. He now is recognized as one of the dominant players on the European Tour and certainly one of the finest in the world.

He had been enjoying success for a long time, but his victory in the 1987 Open Championship at Muirfield in Scotland assured him a place in British golf history.

He nearly became the first Englishman since Tony Jacklin to hold both the U.S. and British Open titles, but after an exceptional four days of play, he lost the 1988 U.S. crown in a playoff to Curtis Strange at The Country Club in Brookline, 71 strokes to 75.

Jacklin won the British Open in the summer of 1969 and the U.S. Open in June of 1970.

Nick was challenged most of the way in the British Open last year at Royal Lytham but Seve Ballesteros' 65 the last day let him outdistance everyone.

His steadiness led to the victory at Muirfield. He started the final round one-stroke behind Paul Azinger and went out and shot 18 straight pars. Azinger was in the lead through 16, but when he bogeyed the 17th and 18th holes to drop one-shot behind and Nick had his crown.

He was awarded an MBE - Member of the British Empire.

Nick became a member of the PGA TOUR in March of 1981. His only victory was in the 1984 Sea Pines Heritage Classic. He has been a member of the last six European Ryder Cup teams and played a major role in the European victories in 1985 and 1986.

He compiled an amazing record in the summer of 1983. After playing in 11 early season events in the U.S. he went back to the European Tour and won three straight, starting with the French Open.

He went to win two more, finish second in two and was third in three others. In 16 starts, he had 11 top 10 finishes and compiled a stroke average of 69.03. He easily finished as the European Tour's leading money winner.

He said at one time, "I never would have had the year in Europe that I had without the experience I gained in the States. My play improved so much just by playing here."

A couple of years ago, he started to rebuild his swing under the watchful eye of David Leadbetter in the Orlando area.

When Brad Faxon was enjoying a very successful season during his final year at Furman University, he started to think about the game of golf as a career. "It wasn't until then," he said, "that I realized I was good enough to play on the TOUR."

There wasn't any doubt in the minds of those who followed him through his young career that he was good enough. Brad had enjoyed success at all levels of the game.

Three times he won the Rhode Island State Junior championship. Twice he won the Rhode Island State Amateur and on two other occasions, in 1980 and 1981, he won the New England Amateur titles.

He won 11 times during his collegiate days, and in 1983, won three of the finest awards given to college golfers, the Fred Haskins, Golf Magazine and the NCAA Coaches awards as the Player-of-the-Year. He also was named to the U.S. Walker Cup team that year.

During those later years, he had a taste of TOUR competition. He played in three U.S. Opens, and in 1983 at Oakmont, was the low amateur.

At one time, Brad's grandfather owned a golf course on Cape Cod, and that's where his father, a scratch golfer, learned to play. "I was about five-or-six years old when Dad started me," Brad said, "and I played in my first tournament when I was 13."

It was with that sort of background that Brad launched his PGA TOUR career in the Fall of 1983. He entered the Qualifying School and had little trouble making the grade.

Gradually, his game continued to develop and it was solid the week of the 1986 Provident Classic in Chattanooga (opposite U.S. Open). He shot 67-62-69-63—261 for the victory. Even though it wasn't an official victory, the \$54,000 was official money.

His consistency level has improved each year and it is reflected in his official earnings as he continues to climb up the ladder of success.

He had a stretch in July last year when he put together 12 rounds—through three tournaments—under par. His best finish was a tie for third in the Beatrice Western Open and followed it with a tie for eighth at the Canon Greater Hartford Open and a tie for 16th at the Buick Open. He earned a tidy \$81,620 for his efforts.

In the Summer of 1984, he visited with Dr. Bob Rotella, the noted sports psychologist. "I had heard of Dr. Rotella when I was in college," Brad said, "and I've always been interested in sports psychology. He has helped me with the mental aspects of the game."

Brad said his natural shot "probably is a draw," but has the ability to play the ball both ways.

During his years on the PGA TOUR, Ed Fiori has demonstrated an ability to win. His first victory came in the 1979 Southern Open when he defeated Tom Weiskopf in a playoff. Two years later, he won the Western Open by four strokes. He started the week with a 74 but fought back with rounds of 67, 69 and 67 on the demanding Butler National course.

He was at his finest in the 1982 Bob Hope Classic. He played brilliantly with rounds of 70, 65, 66, 69 and 67 to tie with Tom Kite and then won it in a playoff.

He can't explain what happened in 1984 when he was never a challenger—especially after he enjoyed a good money year in 1983. The only bright spot was a victory and \$20,000 in the Jerry Ford Invitational in Vail, CO, a non Tour event.

He returned to the leader boards early in 1985 when he had four top 10 finishes in five West Coast appearances with a tie for third in the Hawaiian Open his best effort.

He had a profitable stretch early last year when he finished fourth in the Los Angeles Open, 11th in the Doral-Ryder Open and tied for second in the Honda Classic. He earned nearly \$110,000 in those three successive starts.

The stocky Fiori started in the game at age seven. "We lived next to a course in Downey, CA and I used to sneak through the strands of barbed wire to play. About twice a week, they would catch me and my pal and chase us off. A neighbor had given me a few clubs to use."

After high school, Ed started to work at odd jobs around southern California, mainly in construction work. He also found enough time to play considerable golf, "wherever I could find a game."

One of those golf excursions took him to a tournament in Guadalajara, Mexico. He birdied the last four holes to get into a playoff with Craig Stadler and Jack Renner. Stadler won the playoff, but a University of Houston alumnus was there and was impressed. He recommended him to the Cougars.

"I had been out of high school for four years, so I went to Wharton Junior College for a semester, sat out a semester and then transferred to Houston."

His second year, the Cougars won the NCAA team title, and Ed was named to the All-American team. "Until then, I had not thought much about joining the PGA TOUR, but that was what all the guys on the team talked about . . . getting on the TOUR."

He dropped out of Houston in the Spring of 1977, played in a few mini-tour events and then headed for the Q-School.

Raymond Floyd surely will be remembered as one of the most remarkable players in the history of the PGA TOUR.

Toward the end of the 1970s, there were indications that maybe, just maybe, he was nearing the end of his career. Instead, he came back with years that made him the envy of the TOUR. He won well over \$350,000 in 1981 and 1982 and a total of six tournaments.

In 1987 he continued to amaze as he came from behind on Sunday at Shinnecock Hills with a dazzling 66 to become the oldest U.S. Open champion in history. He later captured the Walt Disney World/Oldsmobile Classic title while earning well over \$300,000 for the fourth time in his brilliant career.

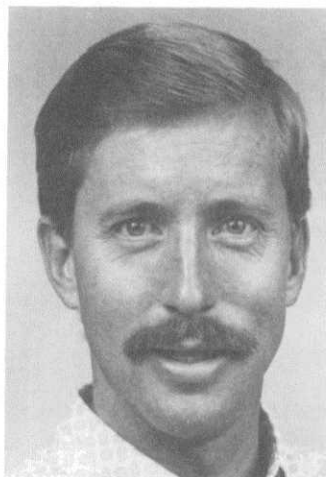
"The U.S. Open has always been one of my goals," said Floyd. "I don't think my career would have been complete without the Open."

His victory in the 1982 PGA Championship at Southern Hills in Tulsa was also extremely impressive. He started with a seven-under par 63 and led all the way. He said of the 63, "without a doubt, it was the best round of golf I've ever played, anywhere in my life."

His second and third round totals of 132 and 200 respectively established PGA Championship records and he was heading for a 72-hole mark until he double bogeyed the last hole for a 272, missing the record by one. "I wasn't concerned about the record at all," he said, "I just wanted the victory."

Floyd grew up in Ft. Bragg, NC, the son of an Army man who now is co-owner of the Cypress Lakes Golf Club in Fayetteville. Although he was exposed to golf at an early age, Ray chose to pursue baseball until he won the National Jaycees golf title in 1960.

Dan Forsman is one of those fellows who becomes more impressive—and successful—each year.

"I feel like I'm still young and improving and trying to learn," said Forsman. "There's a great deal more wisdom and scoring knowledge that I need to acquire."

Four years ago, Dan gained his first victory in rather impressive fashion. He was six-strokes behind Bob Tway after two rounds of the Lite Quad Cities Open. He shot a superb seven-under-par 63 the third day to take the lead and then a closing 67 gave him the victory by one over Tway.

In 1986, he struck it rich again in the rain-shortened Hertz Bay Hill Classic. Rounds of 68 and 67 gave him a two-stroke lead after two rounds and then he held off the strong challenges of Ray Floyd and Mike Hulbert in the third (and last) round to win by a stroke. He earned \$90,000.

Dan had his best year yet in 1988 with a runnerup finish at the Hardee's representing his best outing, but he's a player who is not satisfied with the ordinary.

"I need to add more consistency in order to ultimately be a top player on TOUR," he said.

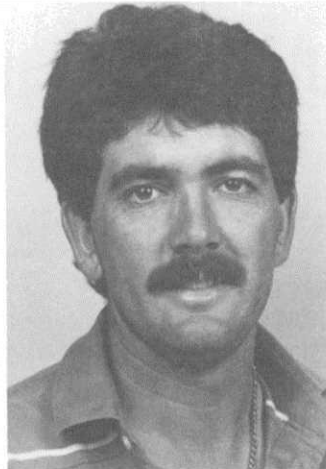
Dan started to play golf at age 13, being introduced to the game by his father, an avid golfer. Although he was born in Wisconsin, the family moved to the San Francisco area "When I was about two."

He played his golf at the Los Altos Country Club and started to play in the Northern California junior program, competing against the likes of Bobby Clampett and Joey Rasset.

Dan qualified for the 1982 U.S. Open at Pebble Beach and it was the first time he had ever competed against the TOUR pros. He was fortunate one day to have a practice round with Seve Ballesteros. At the time, Dan was working as an apprentice at the Camelback Country Club.

David Frost has everything it takes to be one of the big winners in the game and he is already regarded as one of the truly fine ball-strikers on the TOUR.

Last season it all came together for Frost as he claimed not only his first title, but a second. He won for the first time taking home the Southern Open title in a playoff over Bob Tway and then won a few weeks later at the Northern Telecom Tucson Open. He also won the 1988 Merrill Lynch Shoot-Out Final that same week in Tucson.

He ended up ninth on the money list with \$691,500.

A resident of Dallas, TX, he joined the TOUR in 1985. He came close to getting his first victory in the Houston Open that year. He was only one-stroke away from the lead after three rounds and even though he shot a closing 69, he still finished one behind Raymond Floyd. It was worth \$44,000.

He was even better in 1986. His first playoff experience came in the Western Open. He tied with Fred Couples after three rounds, but they both dropped back into a tie with Tom Kite and Nick Price after 72 holes. Kite won the playoff with a birdie on the first extra hole.

The 1987 season was an excellent one for Frost as he posted three runnerup finishes at the Hertz Bay Hill Classic, the Canadian Open and the Southern Open en route to earning a whopping \$518,072.

David started in the game at age 14. "I would caddy for my Dad," he said. He played in his first South African Amateur when he was 18. At age 20, he won the Western Province match play title in Cape Town as an amateur and in 1980, he still was an amateur when he lost in the final of the South African match play. He also played in the British Amateur that year. Three times he was selected to play on the South African National amateur team.

The trend was being established as he steadily refined his game. He turned professional in 1981. The following year, he ventured to the United States and "I tried to play on the mini-tour, but I didn't do much."

He went back home and, in the 1982-83 season, he finished second in the South African Order of Merit. Then he was off to the European tour and he continued to play well. In 1984, he won the Cannes Open in France as he made a 20-footer to save par at the 17th hole and another 20-footer for a birdie to win at the 18th.

When Jim Gallagher Jr., set out on the 1985 Tournament Players Series (TPS) trail, he had one goal in mind—to be the leading money winner and re-gain his exempt status on the PGA TOUR.

After winning the rain-shortened Magnolia Classic in a playoff to start the TPS season, he was well on his way towards achieving that goal. In his next TPS start he was eighth at the Tallahassee Open and then, in his third outing of the year, he rolled home a 25-foot birdie putt on the final hole to win the Charley Pride Golf Fiesta, and he was home free.

A former star at the University of Tennessee, Gallagher comes from a golfing family and there was little doubt that Jim Jr., would be a golfer.

"My dad has been a club professional for 26 years and he started me at age two," remembered Gallagher. "He didn't always have time to teach me, though, so I learned with my Mom."

His father is the professional at Meshingomesia CC in Marion, IN, and that's where Jim played most of his early golf.

"I used to sneak out on the course, but my Dad always caught me every single time."

Like most youngsters, Gallagher played all sports. However, he was cut from his high school basketball team when he was a sophomore and he decided to cast his lot with golf.

"Getting cut was the best thing that ever happened to me," he said.

After attending Tennessee, Gallagher qualified for the PGA TOUR in fall of 1983 on first try. His first year, though, was a bit of a disappointment to him as he finished 148th on the money list earning \$22,249.

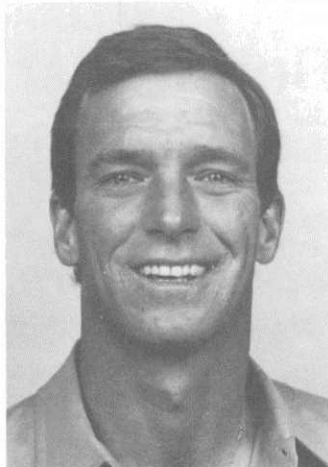
"I didn't play a whole lot early in the year, but I finished in the top 150," said Gallagher of 1984. "It was a good first year, but I was disappointed that I had to go back and play in the Fall (1984) Q-School."

"Losing my card was good for me because it got me hungry again," he said. "I went out on the TPS with a goal and accomplished what I wanted."

He regained his full exempt status the hard way last year. He lost his card at the end of the 1987 season and played only on sponsor exemptions. A tie for second at the Greater Milwaukee Open, though, vaulted him into contention for the top 125 and he played well down the stretch to finish 124th on the money list with \$83,766.

Now that he has returned to the TOUR full-time, look out for Jim Gallagher, Jr.

Buddy Gardner can always look at the 1987 Big "I" Houston Open as the tournament someone "took away" from him. He didn't lose it, Jay Haas simply went out and won it.

Trailing by a stroke going to the final hole, Haas, who was playing ahead of Gardner, holed a putt of 70 feet for a birdie and a 12-under-par 276. A few minutes later, Buddy had to two putt from 80 feet for his par and force a playoff. Jay won it on the first extra hole.

It was a big disappointment to Buddy because it would have been his first triumph after a decade of trying. As consolation, he did use the event as the springboard to his most financially rewarding campaign.

He had another good year in 1988 and he saved the best until near the end of the season. A final-round 65 propelled him into a third-place finish in the Gatlin Brothers Southwest Classic and he earned \$27,200. It easily moved him over the \$100,000 mark.

Buddy first qualified for the TOUR in the Fall of 1977, but in his first full year of 1978, he won only \$5,637 and lost his card. He went back to the Q-School the Fall of that year and earned it back. Starting in 1979, he failed to qualify for the first four events, and then hit paydirt. He tied for second behind Bruce Lietzke in the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open. It set up a very good year, winning \$71,468. He also tied for second in the Anheuser Busch Classic in the fall.

"I wasn't ready the next year," he admits. "I didn't use the time to my advantage."

To make matters worse, at the Walt Disney World Team Championship, he was in a pick-up football game. Running for a pass, he tripped over a lawn chair and tore all the ligaments in his left wrist. He tried to play with it, but eventually had to have the wrist put in a cast for two months.

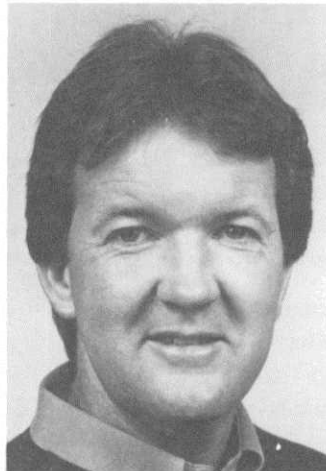
The two most important changes in his life have occurred off the golf course. On May 28, 1983, he married Susan, a nurse from Birmingham, AL, and on February 1, 1987, Brooke Marie was born. "Those are the two people who mean the most," he said proudly.

Buddy started in the game at age five. "We lived about 100 yards from the first tee of the Bonnie Crest Country Club in Montgomery (AL). Everyone in the family played golf, so it was natural for me to play, too."

At one time, Buddy recalls, the juniors competition in that area was pretty tough, "with the likes of Bill Rogers, Mike Reid, Mac McLendon and myself competing against each other."

He won the Alabama State high school golf championship as a senior and went to Auburn University on a scholarship.

Bob Gilder has been playing with his old enthusiasm the last couple of years and it shows in his record.

He enjoyed two strong weeks in June last year when a second-round 65 helped him to a tie for fifth in the Kemper Open. Two weeks later, he challenged until near the end in the U.S. Open. He finished tied for eighth but, after three rounds, he was only one stroke out of the lead.

A few weeks later, a 66 start and 68 finish gave him a tie for sixth place in the PGA Championship.

"This was a rebuilding year for me," he said. "With the experience I've had, I've learned more about my swing and, hopefully, I'll be able to score better when I'm not playing well. That's a big key out here."

Players dream of having years such as he enjoyed in 1982 when he won three times and earned \$308,648. He was sixth on the money list and his exceptional play earned him a position on the 1983 Ryder Cup team.

Each time he won in 1982, he put on a marvelous display of scoring. His winning total of 14-under-par 266 in the Byron Nelson Classic was the lowest ever shot in the 16 years the tournament was played at Preston Trail.

His 19-under-par 261 in the Manufacturers Hanover Westchester Classic set a tournament standard and his week was highlighted by a double eagle two on the 509-yard 18th hole the third day. He only needed a driver and three wood. Finally, he won the Bank of Boston Classic.

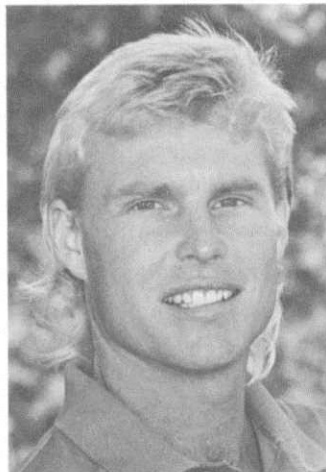
After the first five weeks of 1983, he was heading for another splendid year. He won the Phoenix Open in a playoff over Rex Caldwell, Johnny Miller and Mark O'Meara.

Bob starred for the Arizona State University golf team—winning the 1973 Western Athletic Conference title—and was a teammate of Howard Twitty and Tom Purtzer. After graduation in 1973, he tried for his TOUR card three times without success. Meanwhile, in 1974, he won the New Zealand Open in a playoff over Jack Newton and Bob Charles.

In the Fall of 1975, he did earn his playing privileges.

In his first start of 1976, he missed the cut in the Tucson Open. The next week at the Phoenix Country Club, he overtook Roger Maltbie the final afternoon to win by two strokes.

Bill Glasson believes he has moved to a new plateau on the PGA TOUR and after his solid performance through 1988, surely he has.

He was able to win again, this time in the B.C. Open after taking a three-stroke lead over Joey Sindelar into the final round at the En-Joie Golf Club and holding it. He shot all four rounds in the 60s with the third-day 6-under-par 65 the key.

A month earlier, he had three straight top 10 finishes, climaxed by a 68-67 finish in the Canadian Open and a tie for second place. Finally, he finished the season with a two stroke victory in the Centel Classic.

It was a big year in another way. Maxwell Alexander was born five days after his B.C. victory to Bill and his wife Courtney.

Bill's first year on TOUR was in 1984 but, even though he won the Driving Distance statistical category, he lost his player's card at the end of the year. He returned to the Qualifying Tournament at the end of the year and regained it. He made the most of his new opportunity.

He finished eighth in the 1985 Andy Williams Open to earn \$11,200 and two stops later he took home another big check, this one for \$18,250 after his tie for fifth at the Hertz Bay Hill Classic. In his next stop, he collected another \$18,050 at the Panasonic Las Vegas Invitational.

Feeling instilled with confidence, and with his card all but assured for 1986, Glasson travelled to the long and difficult Congressional Country Club for the Kemper Open.

After three rounds, Glasson stood at four-under-par 212, six-shots back of Larry Mize.

However, Glasson caught fire on Sunday while Mize struggled and when Glasson reached the par-four 18th hole, he needed a 50-foot putt to claim the lead. His long putt ran true and dropped in the hole for a stunning birdie that held up as the final groups finished behind him.

His long putt was one of the most exciting moments on the PGA TOUR in 1985 and the victory was worth \$90,000.

Pained by bad knees that have faced surgery three times, the victory had a second benefit beyond the money. It allowed Bill to pick his spots the rest of the season and to rest his knees whenever necessary, something he has continued to do.

As a result, has become a consistent money winner and challenger. In 1987, he tied for second in the Provident and Centel Classics and was seventh in the Tournament Players Championship after playing solidly the first three days.

Wayne Grady has been able to make the most of his opportunities and now has settled into his role as a player with considerable potential and capable of challenging any time.

He went over the \$100,000 mark for the second time in his four-year career and he was off to a fine start last year as he tied for fifth place in his second event, the Honda Classic.

Twice he has finished as a runner-up in TOUR play — in the 1985 Buick Open and in the 1987 Bank of Boston Classic. At the Buick, he led by two strokes with eight holes to play but Ken Green came on fast to win. The runner-up finishes are nothing new to this personable Australian. Prior to winning the German Open in 1984, he went through a six-year winless stretch but had 17 second-place finishes.

As a youngster, Wayne wanted to be a pilot in the Australian Air Force. He didn't start to play golf until he was 14 years of age and then turned professional two-years later. He worked in pro shops, but realized it was not the life he wanted, at least not at that time.

He applied to get his amateur status back and was able to do so later in the year. He played a lot of amateur golf around Queensland and then turned professional again in 1978 when he was 21-years old. During those years, he worked under the wing of Charlie Earp at Royal Queensland. He's the same man who has worked with Greg Norman for years.

Later in 1978, he did win the West Lakes Classic in Australia and collected \$12,000. "I thought this was an easy way to make a living," he says, "and I got lazy."

He continued to play on the Asian tour but with little success. Along about 1983, he realized it was time to buckle down and go to work on his game. It was the start of his success story.

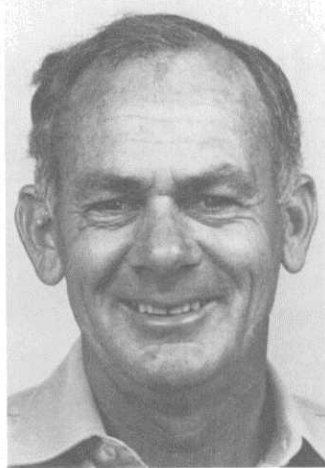
He played for a short while in Europe in 1983 and showed a little profit. The next year, his earnings leaped, thanks to the victory in the German Open. The week prior to his triumph, he was second in the Benson & Hedges International after Sam Torrance birdied the last hole to beat him.

Wayne made a few appearances on the PGA TOUR in 1984 because "I wanted to see what it was like." He shot a 68 the first day in the Byron Nelson Classic and was only one-stroke out of the lead. A last-day 77, however, dropped him well off the pace.

"I played in about seven tournaments on a foreign exemption," he said, "and didn't feel all that comfortable, but I was determined to give it a try in the Qualifying School." He finished in sixth place at LaQuinta, CA in 1984.

He will be on the TOUR for many years, following in the footsteps of Peter Thomson, Bruce Crampton, Bruce Devlin and David Graham.

There have been many highlights in the spectacular career of David Graham, too many to mention, but everyone knows his victories in the 1979 PGA Championship and the 1981 United States Open Championship would be enough to last many a man a lifetime.

David, the proud man that he is, will treasure those moments forever.

He won well over \$100,000 in six straight seasons, with the high mark being reached in 1983. He collected the tidy sum of \$244,924. One of the highlights of that year was a victory in the Houston Coca-Cola Open when he came from five strokes behind the last afternoon.

David has established a remarkable record for a fellow who started in the game with a pick-up set of left-handed clubs.

At the Merion Golf Club in the 1981 U.S. Open Championship, he trailed George Burns by three strokes after three rounds. He then played what many have called one of the finest finishing rounds in the history of the tournament. He shot a three-under-par 67 for a total of seven-under 273, one stroke better than Burns and Bill Rogers.

As Rogers said at the awards ceremony, "David Graham hit 18 greens in regulation and in the last round of the U.S. Open, that is unbelievable."

Not many of his eight victories have been easy. His first was in the 1972 Cleveland Open and he had to defeat his close friend, Bruce Devlin, in a playoff.

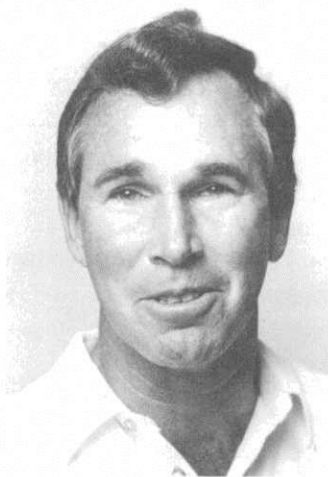
When he won the PGA Championship in 1979, he was cruising and then he double bogeyed the 18th hole to let Ben Crenshaw tie him. He won it with a birdie on the third extra hole.

In the Memorial Tournament in 1980, Tom Watson was headed for an apparent victory, but David won it with a 30-foot birdie putt at the 18th.

David was only 14-years old when he found the left-handed clubs in his garage in Windsor, Australia. He played with them for two years before making the switch to righthanded. As a 16-year old, he worked in a golf shop in Melbourne and, after a three-year apprenticeship, took a head job at a nine-hole course in Tasmania.

Late in the 1960's, he embarked on the tournament circuit, first through Australia and the Far East. It was a road that has taken him to the very top.

Hubert Green has every reason to be proud of the exceptional record he has compiled during his two decades on the PGA TOUR. His 19 victories place him 22nd on the all-time list and he has the 1977 United States Open and 1985 PGA Championships as his highlights.

He won the Open at Southern Hills in Tulsa. He captured the PGA in a stirring duel with Lee Trevino at Cherry Hills in Denver.

He was two strokes behind Trevino after two rounds, but moved three strokes in front of Lee after the third round. Hubert was able to hold his game together on the treacherous greens and win by two over Trevino.

He nearly made it 20 victories in the Spring of 1986, but Andy Bean caught him on the closing holes in the Doral-Eastern Open and then won with a birdie on the fourth extra hole.

A low point to his exceptionally fine career came during the 1983 season when he suffered with a shoulder problem. Microscopic surgery in the Fall of that year corrected the situation.

Hubert had a stretch of about seven years through the 1970s when he was devastating and certainly one of the outstanding players in the world. During one three-week period in 1976, he won three straight tournaments—Doral-Eastern Open, Greater Jacksonville Open and the Sea Pines Heritage Classic.

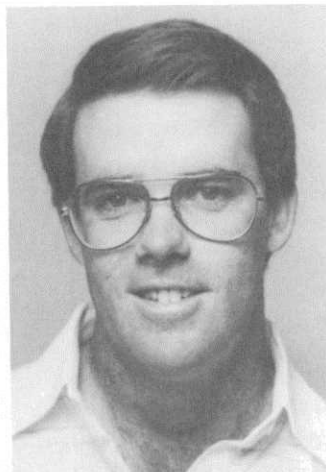
In 1977 he won the United States Open in a gutsy performance at Southern Hills in Tulsa. While his swing may have appeared a little unorthodox, it was highly effective.

Hubert started to swing a club at age five, but as he was going through the teen years, he played all sports. "My father was a believer in sports," he says. "He wanted me to play them all, but as I became older, I eliminated one after the other as I realized I wasn't good enough or big enough to play them." As a result, he began to concentrate more on golf.

He turned professional in 1970 and worked for a summer as an assistant pro at Merion Golf Club in Ardmore, PA. He qualified for his TOUR card in the fall of that year.

Success came quickly. In the Houston Champions International, he tied Don January and then birdied the first extra hole for the victory. He was named the "Rookie-of-the Year."

Ken Green found the easiest way to turn a discouraging year into a brilliant one; win tournaments back-to-back.

He did just that when he captured the Canadian Open by one stroke with a second-day 65 on the tough Glen Abbey course; and the next week used a third-round 61 for an easy victory in the Greater Milwaukee Open at the Tuckaway Country Club.

The "discouraging" part came in the spring. He three putted the final green in the K mart Greater Greensboro Open to drop back into a tie with Sandy Lyle and then the big Scotsman won it with a birdie on the first extra hole.

A few weeks later in the Manufacturers Hanover-Westchester Classic, he tied with Greg Norman, David Frost and Seve Ballesteros. Seve won the playoff with a birdie.

Late in the year, he had another disappointment. He was tied with Andrew Magee in the Pensacola Open but three putted the final green to finish tied for second.

Nevertheless, it was a great year for Ken Green and his performance elevated him onto a new plateau, one that is reserved for superstars.

Ken's first year on the TOUR was in 1982, but he had to return to the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1982 and again in 1984 to keep his playing hopes alive.

It was in 1985 that he finally broke through, winning the Buick Open by four strokes with a 20-under par 268.

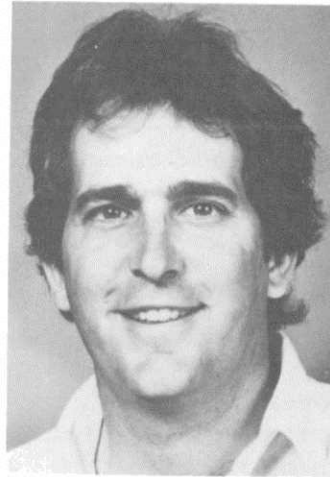
He showed that it was no fluke, though, when he came back in 1986 to win the inaugural International tournament on his way to picking up \$317,835 for the year.

It would seem obvious that the modified Stableford scoring system used at The International is good for him because the next year he nearly won again. He finished second and collected \$108,000.

Ken started playing golf at age 12 when his family moved to Honduras where his father was the principal at the American School.

"The only choices we had in Honduras were to play soccer or golf," Green recalled. "I didn't want to kick the ball, so I just went to golf."

Jay Haas has been one of the more highly-regarded players on the PGA TOUR for several years and one of the most popular among his colleagues.

Jay quietly goes about his business, wins a few tournaments, challenges numerous times and collects a healthy amount of money.

Three years ago, for example, he had a hot stretch in the spring when he recorded four straight top 10 finishes including a tie for seventh at the Tournament Players Championship and a tie for sixth at the Masters tournament.

In 1987, he was hot in the same stretch, but climaxed it with a playoff victory over Buddy Gardner in the Big "I" Houston Open. Jay holed a putt of 70 feet on the final hole to tie Buddy and then won it with a par on the first extra hole.

Last year, he started fast, winning the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic and a few weeks later was second to Steve Pate in the Shearson Lehman Hutton-Andy Williams Open. Last fall, he simply smiled and said, "It was a very gratifying year."

Jay had big seasons in 1981 and 1982. He won twice each year, and it was his performance late in 1982 and early 1983 that earned him a position on the U. S. Ryder Cup team.

With former Masters champion Bob Goalby as his uncle, it was a foregone conclusion that Jay would become a professional golfer. Bob started him early and has helped him through every stage of his career.

"I was about five years old when I started to swing a golf club," Jay recalls. With a wide grin, he went on, "Bob had a club that was broken in half, so it actually was about my size. He put a grip on it, and that was the start. It wasn't long after that he put several more clubs together."

Under the tutelage of Goalby, Jay went on to win the Illinois state high school championship in 1972 and then headed for Wake Forest. His junior year was the big one. "I had one stretch when I played some of the best golf of my life," he said. It started with him winning three of his Walker Cup matches, then advancing to the fifth round of the British Amateur; the third week he was low amateur in the U.S. Open at Medinah; and finally, he won the NCAA championship at Ohio State University.

After winning the Greater Milwaukee Open in 1987, Gary Hallberg decided to "step back and get away from the game a little bit." He felt he needed time to relax.

As a result, his effectiveness was curtailed but he did enjoy a couple of exciting days when he won the two-day Jerry Ford Invitational in Vail, CO, (a non-TOUR event) and \$20,000.

His victory in Milwaukee provided a much-needed boost to his confidence as he won by two strokes with a 19-under-par 269.

The one shot that clinched it came on Monday after the final round was interrupted on Sunday by the weather. He was in the rough short of the green at the par three 17th hole, but he chipped in from 50 feet for a birdie. It gave him all the daylight he needed.

Gary's first TOUR victory was in the 1983 Isuzu-Andy Williams-San Diego Open. He nearly won it again in 1984 but Gary Koch shot a splendid final-round 65 at the Torrey Pines Golf Club to tie him and then won the playoff with a birdie on the second extra hole.

He trailed Tom Kite by four strokes entering the last round in 1983 and proceeded to shoot a six-under-par 66 to edge Kite by one. He had an eight-foot birdie putt at the final hole and he made it. "My heart was pumping like it's never pumped before," he said.

Gary was an impressive winner all through his amateur career and instant stardom was expected once he joined the PGA TOUR. He became the first player ever to earn his TOUR card by winning the minimum \$8,000 needed at the time to obtain playing privileges without going through the Qualifying School. In 11 tournaments, he won \$64,244. He finished the year with six top 10 finishes.

Gary started in the game at age nine when his father brought home a set of old clubs. Once he started to play, he loved the game and worked diligently at it. So much so, in fact, that his Dad finally had to tell him to ease up and not be so serious. He eventually earned a scholarship to Wake Forest, and he went on to become the first four-time, first-team All-America choice. He was the NCAA champion in 1979 and won a total of 14 college tournaments.

During his early teen years, he also played hockey, and it wasn't until he went to Wake Forest that he started to think about being a professional golfer.

Dan Halldorson was looking forward to another good year in 1987 when he headed for the MCI Heritage Classic, but while on Hilton Head Island, he dislocated three ribs. It was over a month before he returned to the TOUR and, when he did so, he still wasn't physically right.

"I wore a brace for two months because I was anxious to play," he said. "Because of it, I developed some bad swing habits and it took me awhile to get everything straightened out."

He struggled again last year while continuing to work on finding his old form.

"I'm still rebuilding my swing," said Halldorson. "I have spurts of greatness, but I have a tendency to lapse back into bad habits. I'm getting closer, though."

It was in 1980 that he enjoyed perhaps his biggest year. He won the Pensacola Open and then joined with Jim Nelford to give Canada the World Cup team title. He joined with Dave Barr to give Canada another World Cup team championship in 1986.

Dan first qualified for the TOUR in the Fall of 1974, but he only won \$619 in 1975 and lost his card. He spent the next three years playing all across Canada.

He won a few times and piled up a number of second-place finishes, but decided in 1978 that he wanted another shot at the U.S. TOUR.

He made it through the Qualifying School, and early in 1979, he tasted success. After two rounds of the Hawaiian Open, he was tied for the lead with Fuzzy Zoeller and George Burns, but finally tied for seventh.

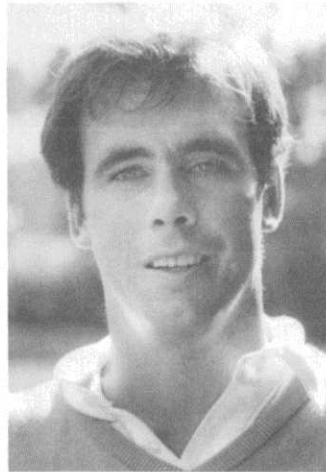
Even though he finished 116th on the 1979 money list, he believed the top 60 in 1980 was a realistic goal. After he finished second to Jim Colbert in the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open, winning \$32,400, he knew it was.

He already was assured of exempt status for 1981 with a position among the top 60 money winners when he headed for Pensacola. After two rounds of 68-67 at Perdido Bay, he was tied with Gary Hallberg and Tom Kite at nine-under 135. A 70 the third day left him three in back of Bob Mann, but his final-round 70 was all he needed to regain the lead.

The Halldorson family lived across the street from a golf course in Winnipeg, so he started in the game at an early age. He even built a practice range in his back yard.

In his home province, he has won the Manitoba Juniors, the Manitoba PGA and four times the Manitoba Open. In 1981 and 1982, he was honored as the Canadian Playing Professional of the Year.

Jim Hallet will never forget his first visit to the Augusta National Golf Club for the Masters Tournament in 1983.

He was a 23-year old amateur and qualified by reaching the semi-finals of the 1982 United States Amateur Championship.

The first day, this extremely-personable young man shot a 4-under-par 68—the same as Arnold Palmer and Seve Ballesteros. The next day, he found himself paired with Arnold and Seve.

"That was the biggest thrill I've ever had," he said. "Actually, I believe I was leading through 27 holes."

Eventually, Jim shot a 1-over-par 73 for a 141 total, while Seve had a 70 that day and Arnold a 74. Seve went on to win while Jim finally finished tied for 40th place.

It was exciting, but this fellow tends to create excitement. And, he knows how to win.

Jim is another in a long line of golfers in the Hallet family. His grandfather was a head professional and his father worked for a while as an assistant to Art Wall in the Poconos.

Nevertheless, Jim used to dream of being a hockey player. He was, and a good one, too, until his Alma Mater, Bryant College, dropped the sport. "That's when I turned to golf on a more fulltime basis," he says, "but I played just about every sport because I've always been competitive."

His first taste of success was at age 14 when he won the Northeast Junior Classic on Paul Harney's course in Massachusetts. A few years later, he lost the major Northeast Amateur Classic in a playoff to Chris Perry.

Before earning his TOUR card in the fall of 1987, however, he did win such Open titles as Rhode Island, Massachusetts and British Columbia. Playing around the world to gain needed experience, he even finished as the leader in the 1987 Asian Order of Merit.

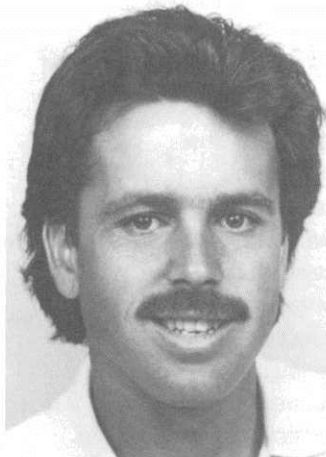
He turned professional in 1984 and it wasn't until his fourth attempt at the Qualifying Tournament that he made it through. That was in the fall of 1987 and he finished second, just one stroke behind John Huston.

Before he started his first full season on TOUR—he had played in a number of events prior to 1988 on Sponsor's exemptions—he was married and, with Holly, went to the Bahamas Classic Pro-Am on their honeymoon in early January.

Even though he did not win last year, he was more than satisfied with his TOUR start. He was a contender on several occasions and his best finishes turned out to be ties for fifth place at the Kemper and Buick opens.

"I was pretty consistent," he said, "and that pleased me."

Donnie Hammond has a reason to be proud of his progress on the PGA TOUR. His first victory came in the 1986 Bob Hope Chrysler Classic when a final round of 66 let him tie with John Cook and then he won the playoff with a birdie on the first extra hole.

Although he did not win in 1987 or 1988, his consistency level went up a couple of notches and, with it, his level of confidence.

With a grin, he said, "It took me six years to realize the importance of the short game. I never enjoyed practicing it but I do now and I've seen the positive results."

He's also proud of the fact he obtained his pilot's license for single engine planes.

When Donnie made his bid to join the PGA TOUR, he established a record that may stand forever. He was the medalist in the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1982 by an incredible 14 strokes.

Ben Crenshaw won by 12 strokes in the Fall of 1973 and most people thought no one would ever come close to that mark.

Donnie played his six rounds in 13-under-par 419. He opened with rounds of 66 and 68, followed with a 71, and then stunned everyone with a then record 7-under par 65 on the demanding Tournament Players Club course in Ponte Vedra, FL.

One of the keys, he said, came the first day. He started at No. 10 at the TPC and "When I walked to the 18th green (his ninth hole), I looked up and there was my Dad in the stands. I was three under at the time and I stayed pumped up all week."

His home was in Frederick, MD, and the old Baltimore Colts of the NFL had their pre-season training camp not too far away at Westminster College. "I would go with Dad to watch them, and then we'd play a nine-hole course there. I only had four-or-five irons, but I seemed to pick it up quickly. When he saw that, he bought me a set. I was 13 at the time."

Donnie played at Frederick High School and then went to Jacksonville University. In three years, he won five college events, including the Sun Belt Conference title in 1979 by six strokes.

Morris Hatalsky has won three times on the PGA TOUR but the last may have been the most satisfying. It was in the 1988 Kemper Open in a playoff over Tom Kite and it came after a five year winless stretch.

"It definitely was one of the highlights of my career," he said. "It was very satisfying."

His par on the second extra hole was good enough to collect the biggest check of his career, \$144,000.

Morris knows the meaning of hard work, patience and faith. He will tell you, "to be successful, you have to be willing to pay the price to get better."

In July of 1983, he won the Greater Milwaukee Open in a playoff over George Cadle. The next week, he lost a playoff to Danny Edwards in the Miller High Life QCO and then tied for eighth in the Anheuser-Busch Classic. He went on to his first \$100,000-plus year.

The first time he reaped the rewards of his dedication was in the Fall of 1982 when he won the Hall of Fame Classic on the famed No. 2 course at Pinehurst, winning by two strokes over Jerry Pate and D.A. Weibring.

He nearly returned to the winner's circle again in 1987, but close friend Larry Nelson edged him out at the Walt Disney World/Oldsmobile Classic. Still, it was a good year.

A few years ago, he started to spend considerable time working on the mechanics of his swing. As a result, his ability to score improved.

"It was something I had to do," he explains. "I've not only learned a lot about the golf swing but about myself as well. I know the work will pay off for many years."

Morris started in golf at age 10 after his brother gave him a set of clubs. "I fell in love with the game right away," he said. Living in San Diego, it wasn't long until he was competing on the junior level and winning. At age 17, for example, he won the Mexico National Junior title, and in 1969, was the San Diego high school golfer of the year.

After two years at Arizona State University, he transferred to the United States International University and continued to play well. While a freshman at Arizona State, he was a teammate of Howard Twitty, Tom Purtzer and Bob Gilder.

It took a few years for Lon Hinkle to get his feet firmly established on the PGA TOUR, but when he did, he became a very good player, indeed. He won a little over \$40,000 through his first five years, but starting in 1977, he has been able to collect nearly \$1.3 million.

He hit a high mark in 1979, winning \$247,693 and finishing third on the money list. His earnings dipped in 1982 when he suffered with a shoulder injury. But, he rebounded in 1983 with another \$100,000-plus year and generally has played well ever since. In 1986, he became affiliated with the Eagle Bend Country Club in Big Fork, Montana. "We're going to spend the summers up there," he said, "and it's given me a new lease on my golfing life."

Chatting about his early days on TOUR, he says, "my goals were too low. My main goal was to survive. When things would go bad over here, I'd bail out and go overseas to find an easier game."

On one of those trips, he met Edith, a Swiss beauty, and she gave him a new purpose to life.

While his first victory was in the 1978 New Orleans Open, he had his biggest year in 1979, winning the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am in a playoff over Mark Hayes and Andy Bean. He also won the World Series of Golf, outlasting Larry Nelson to the wire.

Lon's father is a Professor in Literature at San Diego State University, and Lon started in the game of golf at age 13, shortly after the family moved from Granville, Ohio, to San Diego. He'd play golf every day.

There are seven Hinkle children and in the early days, it wasn't unusual for all of them to be competing in junior golf tournaments around southern California.

Lon received a mental boost in 1980 when he finished third to Jack Nicklaus in the United States Open and PGA Championships. Although Jack won both by comfortable margins, Lon learned in those two experiences that he could win the significant championships.

His biggest enjoyment in 1981 came in the National Long Drive contest. He won with a belt of 338 yards, six inches and became the first TOUR player ever to win it.

Scott Hoch is starting to be recognized as a player who can post very low numbers and it doesn't make any difference when or where he is playing.

Three years ago, he won the coveted Vardon Trophy for low stroke average on the TOUR with a 70.08 mark. He played his best golf in mid-summer when he had five top 10 finishes in seven-starts.

Two years ago, he was a contender for the Vardon again. "It was close to being a great year," he said. "I had the opportunities to win a couple."

He had an exceptional stretch of 19 tournaments, starting with the Tournament Players Championship, without missing the cut. He finished third on four occasions.

His biggest disappointment came in the Memorial Tournament. His 18-under-par 198 was a tournament record for 54 holes and he was leading by four strokes over Don Pooley, but the latter came on strong the last day to win while Scott dropped to third.

Last year, Scott went well over the \$300,000 mark for the second straight year.

Scott qualified for the PGA TOUR in the Fall of 1979 but before he had a chance to tee it up in his first start, the 1980 Phoenix Open, he jarred his back and had to withdraw. The pain became so severe he could not even swing a club. It wasn't until the Atlanta Classic in June—the 23rd tournament of the year—that he was able to play 72 holes. He went 15 weeks without even trying to enter.

A few weeks later, in the Quad Cities Open, he shot a course-record 63 the first day and never was headed. He went on to set a tournament record 14-under-par 266 and edged two of his former Wake Forest teammates, Curtis Strange who was second, and Gary Hallberg, who finished third.

He was raised in an athletic family and started to play golf at age eight. His father, Art, preceded him at Wake Forest, earning All-American honors in baseball and then played professionally until injuries shortened a promising career. Scott's brother, Buddy, is a professional bowler.

At Wake Forest, he was a teammate of Strange, Jay Haas, Bob Byman and David Thore when the Demon Deacons won the 1975 NCAA team title.

Mike Hulbert will tell you his rookie season of 1985 may not have been too impressive on paper, "but I probably had more fun on the TOUR than anyone who won only \$18,000."

You can imagine how much fun he has had the last three seasons as he has earned more than \$600,000 and won the 1986 Federal Express-St. Jude Classic in Memphis along the way.

What made the victory all the more exciting for Mike was the fact that he had to outduel his closest friend, Joey Sindelar, all the way to the finish. "I still can't believe it," Mike was saying long after the final putt had dropped. "I don't know when it will hit me."

The Hulbert-Sindelar relationship goes all the way back to their days as kids in Horseheads, NY. "Joey's family lived by the golf course," Mike recalls. "When I first started to go over there, I met Joey and we became friends right away. We'd play every day and we'd play as many holes as we could."

"We didn't have any formal instructions. I picked up tidbits from my dad and Joey's dad and we helped each other as much as we could."

There was no doubt in Mike's mind that Joey was the better player. As they grew older, Joey headed for Ohio State University. Mike, meanwhile, started scouting around for a smaller school with a good program and he finally settled on East Tennessee State.

He went there on his own but he soon impressed the coaches enough to obtain a scholarship. His senior year, he was named third team All-American. After he was graduated, he tried the TOUR's Qualifying Tournament four times without success.

Finally he made it in the Fall of 1984 and said, "It was the highlight of my life."

His skills started to show early in 1986. In his third start, the Shearson Lehman Brothers Andy Williams Open, he tied for third place. He pointed out, "I missed a putt of four feet on the last hole that would have put me in the (Bob Tway-Bernhard Langer) playoff." He won \$23,400.

Five weeks later in the final round of the Hertz-Bay Hill Classic, he birdied five of the first six holes and three of the last four to shoot a 64. He tied with Ray Floyd for second place, just one stroke behind Dan Forsman.

His steady play continued but his next strong finish didn't come until the PGA Championship at Inverness. A 69-68 start helped him to tie for seventh place. "That was a big one," Mike said, "because it qualified me for the (1987) Masters."

Two weeks later, he earned his victory at the Colonial Country Club in Memphis with a 68-69 finish for an eight-under-par 280. It was worth \$109,064.

After John Huston earned medalist honors in the TOUR's Qualifying Tournament in the fall of 1987, the word was out to watch him closely. "This young man has the talent to be around for a long time," the insiders were saying.

Although he was not quite as consistent as he wanted to be during his rookie season of 1987, he displayed his immense skills when he finished third in the Hawaiian Open with a 6-under par 66 the last day at Waialae Country Club; and a tie for fourth place at the Memorial Tournament at Muirfield Village.

"Hawaii was a big boost," he said. "I didn't hit the ball that solid, but I putted exceptionally well."

He said life on the TOUR is "about what I thought it would be," and was exceptionally pleased to report that "I've played better golf in the latter half of the season than I did the first of the year. I've been working hard on my swing and it's just a matter of going out and performing."

John's father was a good player in the Orlando area and at the age of seven, it was Dad who first put the clubs in his hands. "I enjoyed the game right away and the more I played the more I wanted to play."

He was "about 11" when he started to play in small junior tournaments near his home. In 1978, he helped to lead Dunedin (FL) High School to a second place in the state scholastic championships.

He went on to Alexander City Junior College where he met Gene Sauers and when Gene moved on to Georgia Southern College, John matriculated to Auburn University. They still are the best of friends and last fall played in the Chrysler Team Championship together.

"I knew from day one that I wanted to play on the TOUR," he said. "I was 13 years old when I saw my first TOUR event. It was the Greater Jacksonville Open at Deerwood Country Club."

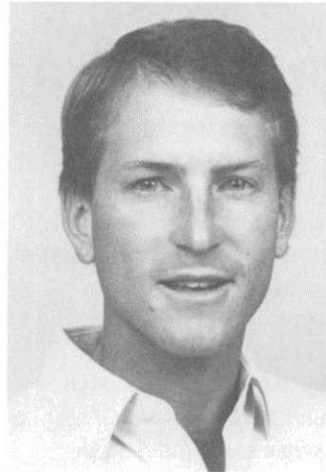
After he turned professional in 1983, he tried the TOUR's Qualifying School with little success. It wasn't until the fall of 1987—his fifth attempt - that he did make it.

"I just wasn't ready the first couple of years," he admits. "I was ready in the fall of 1986, though, but I couldn't putt those greens at PGA West in La Quinta (California)."

He added with a laugh, "Everyone told me that the greens broke toward Indio, but I never did figure out where Indio was. They kept moving the town on me."

That's not likely to happen again.

John Inman will tell you he has had the finest teacher in the game. His older brother, Joe. "All I've ever learned about the game has been from Joe," he said shortly after winning the Provident Classic in Chattanooga, TN in 1987. It was his first victory and paved the way to a splendid rookie season. He had rounds of 65, 67, 67 and 66 for a 15-under-par 265 on the par 70 Valleybrook course and walked away with \$81,000.

"I felt very comfortable coming down the stretch," he said, "and managed to keep my composure. That helped me to make the 15 footer I needed on the last hole to win."

John said he has been playing golf "for as long as I can remember. I've seen pictures when I was 18-months old and I had a golf club in my hand. But, I suppose I was about six-years old when I remember really trying to play for the first time.

"Playing golf is all I've ever wanted to do. Joe is 15 years older than I am, so when I came along, he took care of me.

"I'll never forget all he wanted me to do was chip and putt. He said I could beat a lot of people if I could get the ball up and-down from around the greens consistently.

"Joe also taught me to visualize the shot," John continued. "You see a picture of what you want to do and then you try to make the picture happen. The first time I tried it, it worked. I couldn't believe it."

After John was graduated from high school, he did break from family tradition. He went to the University of North Carolina instead of Wake Forest. "Everyone in the family went to Wake, but when I saw North Carolina, I knew it was the place for me."

During his years there, he won 10 collegiate events including the 1984 NCAA Championship at Bear Creek Golf World in Houston. His 17-under par score broke the previous mark of 15-under set by Ben Crenshaw.

During his final two years, he was a teammate of Davis Love III.

During those days, he knew the TOUR was his destination. He tried the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1985 and did not make it. He missed by a stroke. He played on the TPA tour for a year and then was successful in obtaining his TOUR card in the Fall of 1986.

"I was well prepared for TOUR life," John said. "I saw it a lot as a spectator, watching Joe and everyone else play. I caddied for Joe on a few occasions and I also played in a couple of events before I got my card.

"Joe prepared me well for it. You know about all the travelling, but it was difficult at first."

Now that he has settled in, you can expect John to carry on the fine golfing tradition of the Inman family.

The great players always seem to find a way to win, to keep a good round going, to keep a streak alive. Even during those moments when the situation appears near impossible, they have the skills to execute.

Hale Irwin has been known as one of the brilliant shotmakers in the game and when you mix in the competitive heart he possesses, you have a man who knows no boundaries.

As an example of his consistency, he went from early 1975 through the 1978 schedule—covering 86 tournaments—without missing a 36-hole cut. That's the third best streak in TOUR history.

Many of his victories have been on some of the more difficult tests in the game. His first two were in the Heritage Classic in 1971 and again in 1973 on the demanding Harbour Town Golf Links.

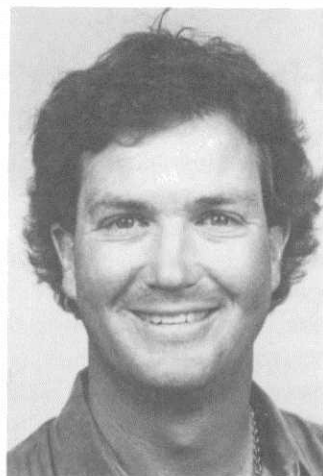
His two greatest triumphs came in the 1974 United States Open at Winged Foot and the 1979 Open at Inverness.

The Butler National, Riviera, Pinehurst No. 2, Muirfield Village and Pebble Beach are true classic courses and Hale has won on them all. In fact, he won twice at Muirfield in the Memorial Tournament in 1983 and 1985.

In 1984, he gained a victory in a rather unusual fashion. In the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am, he needed a birdie on the testy 18th at Pebble Beach to tie Jim Nelford, who already had finished his round. Hale's tee shot went far to the left, hit a rock on the Carmel Bay beach and ricocheted back onto the fairway. He made his birdie. On the second extra hole of the playoff, he hit a poor three wood into a bunker, but then struck one of the great two irons of his career to nine feet and he made it for the victory.

While at the University of Colorado, Hale won the 1967 NCAA golf championship. A great athlete, he was a starter at quarterback as a sophomore and then became an All-Big Eight Conference defensive back his last two years.

Last year was Peter's most rewarding financially, but it also was a frustrating year. Three times he finished second and in each case, victory was so close.

All he had to do to win the Beatrice Western Open was par the last hole. He double bogeyed and Jim Benepe claimed his first victory. He was one stroke away from tying for the lead in two others. The end result was a great year, earning \$526,765 with six top 10 finishes.

Peter battled a ruptured disc in his back in 1987 and admitted, "I'm swinging and playing well only when the back allows." Obviously, it was much better last year.

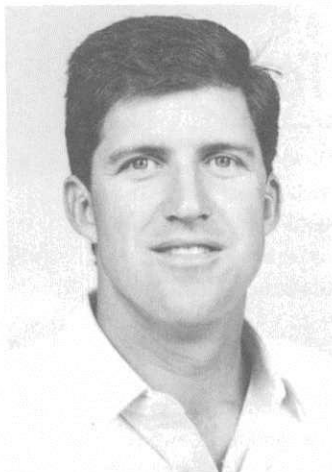
His first victory was in the 1980 Buick-Goodwrench Open. The next year, he nearly won it again, only to lose in a playoff to Hale Irwin.

Peter started in the game at age 12. His father taught him the fundamentals, and his older brother, David, also helped considerably. "They are about the only teachers I've ever had," he says.

Steve Jones knows there is no substitute for experience. "The more you play, the more experience you have but the important thing is to learn from your experiences, good and bad."

He drew from that experience last year in the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am and the result was the first victory of his TOUR career.

He admitted lessons learned in such events as the 1987 MCI Heritage Classic helped him to win at Pebble.

Steve was leading the 1987 MCI-Heritage Golf Classic by one stroke as he stood on the 18th tee the last afternoon on the Harbour Town golf links. Obviously, he was playing very well with rounds of 67, 66 and 67 the first three days.

All he wanted to do now was put his tee shot in the middle of the fairway. As he took the club back, the wind changed slightly and he came off the ball and hit it out-of-bounds to the right. A double-bogey six followed and he lost the title by one stroke to Davis Love III.

"I've tried to use the Heritage as a positive," he said.

Steve started in the game at age 12 under the watchful eye of his father on a nine hole course in Yuma, CO. He went on to play in small junior tournaments around Yuma and also a few elsewhere in the state.

"The first time I played," he said, "I shot a 56 and each year I would drop from three-to-six strokes."

Golf was fun in those days, but the Jones boys were into other sports as well. Steve ran track and played golf in high school, but he earned all-state honors for basketball.

He knew at an early age that his career would be in golf, so when he moved on to the University of Colorado, he concentrated on the game.

He grew up reading golf magazines for tips and instruction. "When I'd see a tip in the magazine, I'd go right out and try it," he said, smiling. "I developed my putting stroke and my chipping style from reading those tips. They all came from the magazines."

These days, Paul Purtzer, who is the Director of Golf at Gainey Ranch Golf Club in Scottsdale, AZ, has been Steve's tutor. Paul played on the TOUR several years ago and is the older brother of Tom Purtzer.

Steve's first Qualifying Tournament was in the Fall of 1981. He played with a jammed thumb but made it. He tried to play in early 1982 but finally had to stop in June of that year and underwent corrective surgery in September.

He went back through the Q School in the Fall of 1984 and was successful. He returned in the Fall of 1986 in an effort to improve his position on the exempt list after finishing 136th for the 1986 season.

This time, he played superbly, winning medalist honors by four strokes.

Tom Kite is known as one of the outstanding players in the world and, just as important, he is one of the game's finest good-will ambassadors. He is highly respected wherever he goes.

His career is full of highlights, mainly because he is one of the more consistent players in the game. During one stretch, he won at least one tournament in seven consecutive years.

The string was broken last year but twice he lost in playoffs - to Morris Hatafsky in the Kemper Open and to Curtis Strange in the Nabisco Championships. He also was second to Paul Azinger in the Hertz Bay Hill Classic.

He finished the season with a career high of \$760,405 to rank fifth and he also became the fourth player to go over the \$4-million mark in earnings.

Tom earned the Arnold Palmer Trophy as the leading money winner in 1981. It was quite a year. He also won the first of his two Vardon Trophies for low score average, had 21 top 10 finishes in 26 starts and was eighth or better in his last 10 starts. The Golf Writers of America named him Player-of-the-Year.

His victory in the 1983 Bing Crosby National Pro-Am was highlighted by a record 62 at Pebble Beach. Two years ago when he won the Kemper Open, he did so by seven shots.

Kite's life in golf began at age 6, when his father put a club in his hand for the first time and urged him to give it a try. At 11 he won his first tournament, an age-group event at the Country Club of Austin, TX. He began to take the game seriously three years later.

A few months after Kenny Knox started to play golf at age nine, he knew this was the game for him. "I never thought about anything else," he says. "My family is in the construction business, but when I was in high school, they wouldn't let me touch a hammer."

It was his dedication that led to his success in high school golf, and then at Florida State University and finally all the way to becoming a winner on the PGA TOUR. He won the 1986 Honda Classic the hard way, by refusing to buckle under the pressure and turning back the challenges of such players as Andy Bean, John Mahaffey, Clarence Rose and Jodie Mudd, to name a few.

He followed with another fine season in 1987 with the highlight being the victory in the Hardee's Golf Classic. He won by a stroke over Gil Morgan with a tournament record 15-under-par 265.

This is another one of those heart-warming success stories. He started to play when his parents joined the Columbus (GA) Country Club. A year later, he was participating in junior tournaments in the area.

As a sophomore in high school, the team won the Georgia State championship and Kenny finished third in individual play. The next year, the family moved to Tallahassee, FL. When he was graduated, he moved on to Florida State and attained more success.

In those days, his only thought was to play on the PGA TOUR but he found it a difficult goal. He first went to the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1978 and he tried a total of seven times before he succeeded in the Fall of 1981.

He found himself bouncing on and off the TOUR through the next four years. By the end of 1985, he was in 146th position on the money list. He retained a membership, but would be well down the priority list for entry in the 1986 season.

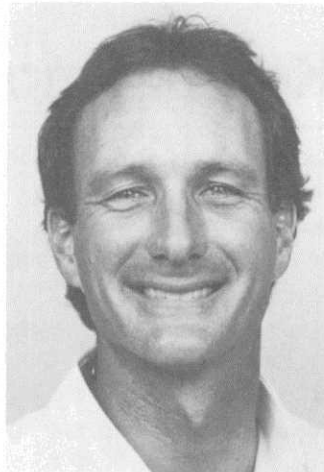
He did not play at all on the West Coast. It didn't appear as if he would get into the Honda Classic either, so he shelled out \$100 entry fee and took his chances in the Open qualifier. He shot a 67 and gained the fourth-and-last position.

He surprised a few people by taking the first-day lead on the TPC at Eagle Trace course with a 6-under-par 66. The next day, he birdied the final two holes for a 71 and a 137 total. He led by one over Bean.

The third day, the wind blew extremely hard. On a day when the average score for the field was more than 79 strokes, Kenny shot an 80. It wasn't surprising that his one-over-par 217 was only two strokes out of the lead being shared by Bean and Rose.

The last afternoon, he was amazingly calm under the pressure. While others fired and fell back, Kenny made the critical shots when he had to make them. His 70 for a one-under-par 287 was one better than Bean, Mahaffey, Rose and Mudd. He continued to play very well the rest of the year to establish his position as one of the better players in the game.

Gary Koch has been known for years as one of the truly nice guys in the business, well liked by his peers and by tournament sponsors.

Other players know him as a solid, hard-working professional while the sponsors see him as one who will do whatever he can to help make each event a success.

So, when Gary Koch came on strong to win the Panasonic-Las Vegas Invitational in early May of last year, it was a popular victory.

To Gary, it was an experience beyond words. After four straight good years, everything came apart in 1987 and he fell off the charts, finishing 175th on the money list. He said it was "burnout." He had to rely on sponsor exemptions to get into most tournaments and that's what he received at Las Vegas.

Weather forced the tournament to be played at 72 holes instead of the scheduled 90 holes and Gary shot 68-73-66-67—274 and his 14-under-par score was one better than Peter Jacobsen and Mark O'Meara.

"To know I can still play with the best players in the world," he said, "is a great feeling. The \$250,000 is nice, but that feeling of knowing I belong is nice, too."

Gary's best previous year was 1984 when he won twice and on both occasions, he came from six-strokes back to catch the leaders and then he won in playoffs. He defeated Gary Hallberg in the Andy Williams-San Diego Open and George Burns in the Bay Hill Classic. In both situations, he did it with a birdie on the second extra hole.

Gary was a brilliant amateur player. He won such titles as the 1970 U.S. Junior, three Florida State Juniors and won the 1969 Florida State Open as a 16-year-old. He won 10 tournaments at the University of Florida and was a runner-up twice in the NCAA Championship.

Twice, he played for Uncle Sam in Walker Cup competition and once on a World Amateur Cup team.

Bernhard Langer moved from out of the shadows and into the sunshine as one of the world's outstanding players in 1985, especially after his back-to-back victories in the Masters Tournament and the Sea Pines Heritage Classic.

Bernhard was six-strokes off the pace at the halfway mark at the Augusta National Golf Club, and he was at his brilliant best during the final two rounds. He shot a pair of 68s to overtake a struggling Curtis Strange and won by two strokes over Strange, Raymond Floyd and Seve Ballesteros.

The next week, Langer took the lead after the third round on the Harbour Town links and then was tied by Bobby Wadkins, but the German star won it all on the first extra hole with a par.

Bernhard already was considered one of the better players on the European Tour when he headed for the United States and the 1981 World Series of Golf at the Firestone Country Club.

It was his first exposure to life on the PGA TOUR and he wanted to make a good impression. He did that—and more. "At one point early in the back nine the last day," he recalls vividly, "I was tied for the lead. It was a good feeling because I knew then that I could play over here. Until you do it, you never can be certain." He went on to finish in a tie for sixth place.

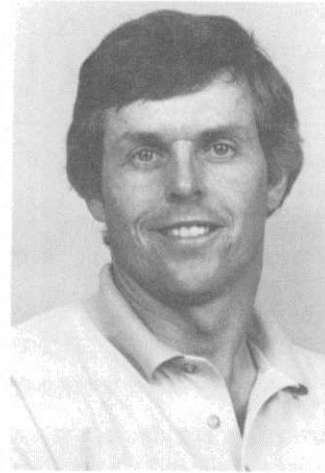
In the Spring of 1984, he played in eight PGA TOUR events, made the cut in all eight and had three top 10 finishes. He earned \$82,465, easily enough to qualify for his TOUR card.

After three extremely successful seasons, his play last year was limited due to an aggravating back problem.

Bernhard started in the game as a caddy at age nine at the Augsburg Country Club in his hometown of Anhausen, West Germany. After a few weeks, he decided he wanted to play. With a laugh, he said, "They made me play up-and-down the practice range until I reached a certain standard and then they let me on the course."

For the next seven years, he would play, practice and caddy whenever he could. In 1972, when he was finished with his formal schooling at age 15, he headed for Munich and went to work as an assistant professional at the Munich Golf and Country Club. Heinz Fehring was the head pro, and he became Bernhard's first and only teacher.

Wayne Levi has a good reason to be proud of his record. He averaged a victory a year through his first eight full years on the TOUR and played in the MONY Tournament of Champions on eight straight occasions.

The string was broken in 1986 mainly, he said, because of his putting. "I hit the ball well enough. I didn't have the consistency on the greens."

He came on strong in the latter half of 1987 to enjoy a profitable season. He said with a laugh, "In the early part of the year, I spent too much time studying the stock market and it affected my game. I hit the ball as well as ever, but it was my putting that let me down again."

He enjoyed a profitable 1988 season highlighted by a tie for second at the B.C. Open in his native upstate New York. Off the course, Wayne and his wife Judy celebrated the birth of their fourth child, Brian.

He has been able to succeed on TOUR without devoting 100 percent of his efforts to the game. His family is very important and he spends as much time as possible with them.

As an example, prior to his victory in the 1983 Buick Open, he skipped five of the preceding six events, saying, "I wanted to be home to see Lauren crawl (their second-born) and I want to be there to see her walk. There will be many more tournaments, but you get to see that only once."

On a historical note, when he won the 1982 Hawaiian Open, he did so using Wilson's Optic Orange ball. He thus became the first player to win a TOUR event while using a colored golf ball.

Wayne started to play golf at age 13, mainly because his pals were playing the game. He fell in love with it almost immediately. During his days at Herkimer High School in upper New York State, he never lost a match, and won the 1970 New York State Interscholastic title. During his two years at Oswego State College, he lost only once.

In the summer of 1972, he headed for Florida so that he could devote 12 months of the year to his game. After two years of mini-tour action, he tried for his TOUR card, but didn't make it on his first two attempts. Meanwhile, he played wherever he could find a game throughout Florida and, during the summer months, on the New England circuit. He won numerous events, and his first was the 1973 New Hampshire Open.

When Bruce Lietzke's game is right—and it usually is—he is one of the finest players in the game. It has been said, and rightly so, that he is capable of winning anywhere at any time under any condition.

So, it wasn't a surprise when he came from four strokes behind during the last round of the Honda Classic in 1984 to tie Andy Bean and then win the tournament on the first extra hole.

It was a surprise, however, that he did not win again until the GTE Byron Nelson Classic last season. He had to birdie the first extra hole of his playoff with Clarence Rose to get the victory. It was special, he said since Byron has been one of his idols for many years. He also finished second twice in 1988, at the B.C. and Pensacola Opens.

During the week of the 1982 Canadian Open, even though he was playing well, he kept insisting that he didn't expect to win. He held a two-stroke lead going into the final round at Glen Abbey, and told everyone he felt he had a good chance to win, but didn't expect to win. He did, of course, by two strokes over Hal Sutton.

It is hard to believe, but there was a time when Bruce put his golf clubs in the closet and wasn't certain if he wanted to continue with the game. It was in the Spring of 1973, shortly after he left the University of Houston.

"I had played so much through high school and college that I was tired of it," he said. At that time, he said he was through with the game. "Oh, I suppose, in the back of my mind, I knew I would get back to it."

Six-months later, he did, and he turned professional in 1974. He missed by one stroke in his first attempt at qualifying for the PGA TOUR, but he made it in the Spring of 1975.

He played well on TOUR almost from the start, although his first victory did not come until the 1977 Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open when he defeated Gene Littler on the fourth extra hole. A couple of weeks later he won again in the Hawaiian Open.

Bruce started to play golf at age five when brother Duane, then an assistant professional in Wichita, Kansas, gave him a cut-down set of clubs.

Bob Lohr said, "I'm pretty proud, leading wire-to-wire, after never having won before." And well he should have been as he birdied the fifth extra hole of his playoff with Chip Beck to win the Walt Disney World/Oldsmobile Classic last October.

Bob played brilliantly all week, to say the least. He opened with a 10-under-par 62 on the Palm course, added a 67 at Lake Buena Vista for a 15-under-par 129 and then a 66 at Magnolia for a 21-under-par 195.

He posted a 4-under-par 68 at Magnolia in the final round with a birdie on the final hole, while Beck had a 66 with a bogey on the 18th. They were tied at a tournament-record total of 25-under-par 263.

They both birdied the first extra hole, parred the next two and birdied the fourth. Then came the deciding hole. Beck three putted from 60 feet, missing his par from eight feet. Bob was over the green in two, chipped five feet beyond and then made a good comebacker for the triumph.

Bob has been considered one of the better young players in the game the last couple of years as he steadily has moved up the ladder of success.

After he came out of the Qualifying School in the fall of 1984, he didn't set any specific goals, "except to finish among the 125 money winners." I've never been a goal-oriented person," he explained. "Sometimes you can reach a goal and where do you go from there? I just want to continue to improve and learn what I can.

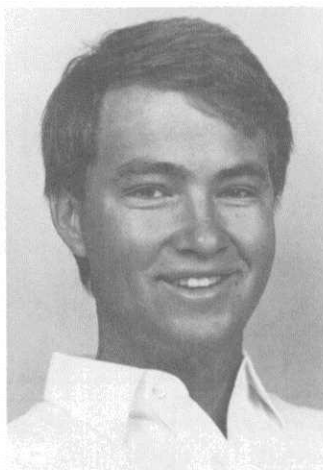
"If you play your own game and put a good score on the board, it doesn't make any difference what the other people do. It sounds simple enough, but it is something you have to learn and adjust to it."

Bob started to play the game at a relatively-young age, but he also was an outstanding baseball pitcher as a youngster. He continued to pitch through high school, but when he went to Miami University in Ohio, he had to make a decision, since both sports were played in the spring. It wasn't an easy decision, but he decided to stay with golf.

Is there pressure on the TOUR? He says there is some but adds, "Pressure is when you're on the mound, the bases are loaded, it's the bottom of the ninth and you have a 3-and-0 count on the batter."

Wherever the "pressure" is found, he's managed to handle it well. For more proof, check the results of the 1988 Walt Disney World/Oldsmobile Classic.

Davis Love III said, "I started to play golf as soon as I could walk. As long as I can remember that's all I've wanted to do. When I was nine-or-10 years old, there wasn't any doubt in my mind. I wanted to be a pro."

It was a natural happening. When Davis was just a tot, his father was playing on the TOUR. For many years, until his tragic death last fall, Davis Love Jr. was regarded as one of the premier teachers/technicians in the game.

"Whenever I would be doing something with Dad," Davis said of his early days, "it would be playing golf."

He became a father himself this past year as his wife presented him with a daughter, Alexia, in June. It had an effect on his game.

"I didn't play as much as I wanted to last year with the arrival of the baby," said Davis. "I'm working hard on my game and looking forward to a good year."

Since he had spent all of his life in the golfing environment, he knew the PGA TOUR wouldn't be an easy road to travel. He knew it would take hours of hard work to stay one stroke ahead of the next guy.

"What I didn't realize," he said, "was how much fun it would be. I've met so many nice people, made good friends and done things I never would have been able to do if it wasn't for the TOUR."

It was a good first year for the three-time All-American and former Walker Cup player. He was in position to win on a couple of occasions and it was disappointing not to get the victory, but looking at the season as a whole, it was a good one.

He established himself early as one of the longest hitters in the game and went on to finish first in the EPSON driving distance stats, averaging 285.7 yards.

In 1987, Love proved that he's also one of the best players in the game, winning the MCI Heritage Classic on the Harbour Town Golf Links. He was also second at the Colonial NIT and went on to win \$297,378.

"Winning at Harbour Town was special because it was so close to home and on a course where you need to hit it straight and putt well," said Love. "The win also got me into all the special events that I always dreamed of playing in."

Love points to a round in the 1986 Tournament Players Championship as a big turning point in his development.

"I was paired with Ben Crenshaw the last day. I had a really good round (67) while playing in front of a lot of people with one of the stars in the game."

"That day, something told me I belonged. I'm not certain I would have had the year I've had without that experience."

As long as Mark Lye is playing golf, there never will be another afternoon such as the hot-and-humid one at the Pleasant Valley Country Club in Sutton MA, in September of 1983.

After seven years of battling on the TOUR, he finally won his first tournament, coming from eight strokes behind the last day with a brilliant eight-under-par 64 to win by one shot over John Mahaffey, Jim Thorpe and Sammy Rachels. He finished birdie, par, birdie, birdie.

An emotional sort, Mark said, "I was beginning to believe winning was out of my reach. It isn't that you're not good enough, it's just that some people can't rise to it."

He came back with another very good year in 1984, with his performance in the Masters Tournament standing out. He led by two strokes after two rounds and was the center of national media attention. He finally finished tied for sixth.

He had the finest round of his career in the third round of the 1984 Walt Disney World Classic. He shot a course record 11-under-par 61 at the Palm Course.

Mark put together another good year in 1988 as he went over the \$100,000 mark for the fourth time in his career. Slight swing changes that he made a couple of years ago started to pay off handsomely.

Although he now resides in Ft. Myers, FL, he grew up on the fairways of the Silverado Country Club in Napa, CA and it was there in the 1979 Kaiser International that he nearly won his first tournament. With the cheers of his hometown friends ringing in his ears, he was tied with Lon Hinkle for the third-round lead, but finally had to settle for something less as several others came on strong at the wire.

As soon as Mark started to play the game, he knew he would be a golfer for the rest of his life. He received his first set of clubs as a nine-year old, and he played every day, all day.

He played all over California, and in 1970, he was the No. 1 junior on the state's point system. As a 12-and-13-year old, he was winning tournaments.

He headed for San Jose State after being graduated from high school, and it was difficult at first, because he still had not started to sprout. As a freshman, he was five-feet-nine, 125 pounds. By the end of the next year, he was close to his present size of six-feet-two, 175 pounds.

After graduating from San Jose State, he set his sights on the TOUR, but first headed for Europe for more experience. He tried the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1975 and missed and again in the spring of 1976 and missed. He was off to Europe, and then Australia after that, and blossomed a winner. In fact, he won the 1976 Australian Order of Merit. In the Fall of 1976, he was back in the Qualifying School, and he made it.

Sandy Lyle may never again experience the thrill he received when he won the Open Championship at Royal St. George's in England in the summer of 1985. However, his victory in the 1988 Master's Tournament is one they will talk about for a long time, too.

Sandy became the first "home" winner of the Open since Tony Jacklin won at Royal Lytham in 1969 and only the second since Max Faulkner won in 1951.

He was three strokes off the lead after three rounds. He commented, "Things just hadn't clicked for me. My swing wasn't quite right and the putts weren't dropping. Then, bingo, suddenly I had achieved my life's ambition. The birdie putts I holed at the 14th and 15th holes were the key."

He won by a stroke over Payne Stewart.

Sandy found more success in the spring of 1987. He won the Tournament Players Championship and, with it, a 10-year exemption to all PGA TOUR co-sponsored events.

It wasn't easy. He tied with Jeff Sluman and then he had to go to the third extra hole on the TPC at Sawgrass course to win it.

"This tournament still is fairly new to Britain," he said, "but it's one of the majors in my mind right now."

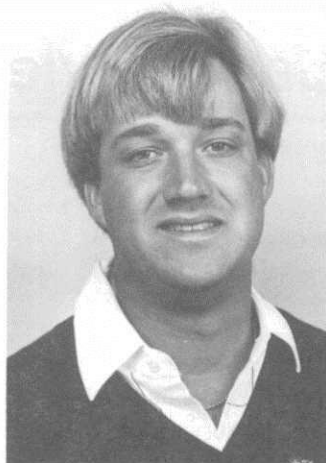
Sandy had a brilliant season on the PGA TOUR in 1988. He won the Phoenix Open in a playoff over Fred Couples. He won the K mart Greater Greensboro Open in a playoff over Ken Green.

The next week it was the Masters. He moved in front the second day and stayed there the rest of the way, although he needed one of the great five-iron shots in the history of the game to win it. He was in the left fairway bunker on the final hole. Using a five-iron, he struck it perfectly. The ball landed well beyond the hole and rolled back down the slope to 10 feet. He made the birdie putt for a one-stroke margin over Mark Calcavecchia.

Sandy was born in England but because of his Scottish heritage, he has always played for Scotland in team events. It was logical for him to be attracted to the game at an early age. His father, Alex, was a golf professional for many years, although he is retired now.

He progressed rapidly and in 1977 played against the United States as a member of the British Walker Cup team. He turned professional later that year.

Andrew Magee took a huge step forward last season as he went all the way to the top. He came from four-strokes behind the last afternoon to win the Pensacola Open at the Tiger Point Country Club. It was his first triumph.

Even before he went to Pensacola, he was enjoying his most productive year, thanks to such strong finishes as a tie for fourth in the Memorial Tournament.

"I have to give credit to two people," he said. "Jim Flick in Scottsdale has helped me tremendously with my game and Dr. Bob Rotella the sports psychologist from the University of Virginia has helped me with my confidence."

Andrew was more than satisfied with his rookie season of 1985 and one of his more enjoyable weeks came at the Bank of Boston Classic. He started to play the game at age 11 at the urging of his older brother and that same brother caddied for him in Sutton, MA.

He still recalls with fondness two things that happened that first year.

"The first one was being paired with Jack Nicklaus during the third round of the Doral-Eastern Open. I'll never forget it." Andrew tied for 10th place and it was his first healthy check of the year.

The second one was two weeks later in the Hertz-Bay Hill Classic. After rounds of 73, 69 and 68, he was only two strokes out of the lead which was being shared by Fuzzy Zoeller and Curtis Strange. He was paired with them the last afternoon, but Andrew didn't fare as well as he had hoped. "The experience of being there with them was great," he said.

The next one was in the Byron Nelson Classic when he shot a first-round seven-under-par 64. It was especially satisfying because he spent many of his growing up years in the Dallas area.

Finally, he played some of his finest golf of the year at the Canon-Sammy Davis Jr.-Greater Hartford Open. He had a 65 the third day en route to a tie for sixth place and he earned his biggest check of the year—\$19,425. "It was the check that put me over the hump for my exemption," he said.

After getting started in the game by his brother, he progressed gradually until he reached the University of Oklahoma. He had a good spring as a sophomore and then his game took the quantum leap. He became a three-time All-America choice.

"I started to think about the TOUR because I had a few older friends who were going to the Qualifying Schools and making it, fellows such as Willie Wood and Mark Brooks."

When John Mahaffey's game is right, there are few who can strike the ball with the same crispness. Such has been the case the last few years.

Certainly one of the highlights of his splendid career came in the 1986 Tournament Players Championship. He came on strong during the final round to overtake Larry Mize and win by a stroke on the TPC at Sawgrass course. A seven-under-par 65 the third day put him in position to make the last-day charge.

The check for \$162,000 helped him to his best financial year ever on TOUR.

He also enjoyed profitable years in 1984 and 1985. He won the Bob Hope Classic in 1984 after defeating Jim Simons in a playoff and he won the Texas Open in 1985 by defeating Jodie Mudd in a playoff.

While John wasn't happy with his 1988 performance, he realizes it was a transition year as he and wife Susie welcomed John D. Mahaffey III, their first child, into the family.

Still, he finished with over \$200,000 in earnings for the fourth time in his distinguished career.

Part of his success is related to a swing change he made in 1983. "I made some positive changes to help my longevity on TOUR. I added some distance without jeopardizing a lot of accuracy. It gave me a more positive outlook."

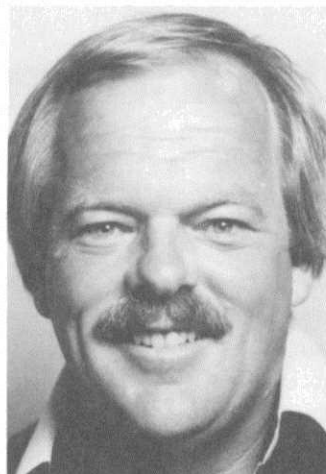
John joined the PGA TOUR in the Fall of 1971 after a fine amateur career. He won the 1970 NCAA championship for the University of Houston.

His first victory was in the 1973 Sahara Invitational in Las Vegas. Physical problems hit him for the first time at the 1976 PGA Championship at Congressional. He suffered a hyperextended tendon in his left elbow. It gradually became worse toward the end of the year, and it practically was impossible for him to compete early in 1977.

He was completely healthy again by mid-1978, and enjoyed a six-month stretch when he played as well as everyone knew he could. He won the PGA Championship at Oakmont in a playoff over Tom Watson and Jerry Pate, and the next week he won the American Optical Classic in Sutton, Mass.

He was named to the World Cup team that played in Hawaii, and he won medalist honors. When the new year dawned, he won the Bob Hope Desert Classic.

Roger Maltbie has always been his own man, as they say, but he also has been highly respected by his peers.

He has had to overcome adversity but when he has been on his game he has been brilliant, indeed, as the five TOUR victories attest.

The key one had to be the NEC World Series of Golf at Firestone Country Club in 1985 because it provided him with a 10-year exemption. In addition to his on-course performances, he has helped to shape the destiny of the TOUR, serving for four years as a Player Director on the Policy Board.

The personable Californian was one of the bright young stars in the game after winning the Quad Cities Open and the Pleasant Valley Classic back-to-back during his rookie year of 1975. After the latter triumph, he left his winner's check of \$40,000 in a restaurant near the tournament site. The sponsor issued a new one and, at last report, the original still hangs on the wall behind the bar.

The next year, he won the Memorial Tournament at Muirfield Village, defeating Hale Irwin on the fourth extra hole of their playoff.

After that, he struggled for several seasons, partly due to injuries, but bounced back in grand style by winning the Manufacturers Hanover Westchester Classic and the NEC World Series of Golf.

He came close twice in 1986, as Fuzzy Zoeller edged him out in the Heritage Classic on Hilton Head Island and he lost a playoff to Mac O'Grady in the Canon Sammy Davis Jr. Greater Hartford Open.

There were several highlights to the 1987 season. He was tied for the lead after three rounds of the Masters Tournament but finished tied for fourth. He was third in the Westchester Classic.

"The real highlight," he said smiling, "was on March 3. That's when Spencer Davis was born."

Roger was teammate of Forrest Fezler at James Lick High School in San Jose, Calif. As a sophomore, Roger beat Forrest, who was then a senior, for the county scholastic title. Maltbie went on to win the Northern California Amateur in 1972 and 1973, and the California State Open in 1974.

Even before he had his first lesson in the ABC's, Dick Mast was learning how to swing a golf club. "I don't know how old I was when I first started to play," he said, "but I probably was about four years old."

His father, Ken Mast, built the public course in Bluffton, OH, and was the head professional there for years. "I wanted to be just like him," Dick adds, "and I know that all I ever wanted to be was a pro."

Just like his dad, Dick became a fine player but the skills needed to be a PGA TOUR player seemed to be just a whisper away. He was a dominant player on the mini-tours but, until 1986, success on the TOUR was just a dream.

"I probably tried the Qualifying School a dozen times," he said. He was successful on four occasions but until 1986 he never was able to make the best of it.

His game was shown definite improvement each year since then and he went over the \$100,000 mark for the first time last year. "I've become more and more comfortable with TOUR life," he said. "I've worked on physical conditioning and I know that has helped, too."

He lost his playing privileges for the third time at the end of the 1979 season and, for the most part, spent the next five years playing wherever he could find a game. He did so with tremendous success, winning more than two dozen events.

"I learned how to win," he said, "and after all of that, I now have a different perspective of life. Now, I want to play, instead of having to play. I used to go out each week thinking I had to win and it put extra pressure on me. Now, I've learned to say, 'I'll win this week, the Lord willing.' There's a big difference."

With his new outlook came regained confidence. He gained national attention in the regional qualifying tournament in the Fall of 1985 at Palmdale in Sarasota, FL. His final round of 12-under par 60 gave him a spectacular 32-under par score of 256 for the week.

He has been working mostly with Ralph Mann and Fred Griffin of the Jack Nicklaus Golf Academy at Grand Cypress near Orlando, FL.

The Mast family moved to St. Petersburg, FL, when Dick was a sophomore in high school and he played against the likes of Gary Koch and Andy Bean.

He went on to St. Petersburg Junior College but his heart was in the game. He went to work as an assistant to his dad in the summers at Lost Creek Country Club in Lima, OH in the early 1970's.

Blaine McCallister became part of TOUR history when he won the 1988 Hardee's Golf Classic at the Oakwood Club in the Quad Cities area.

His middle two rounds of 62-63—125 equaled the all-time lowest score ever posted on the TOUR. Ron Streck set the standard when he won the 1978 Texas Open in San Antonio.

With opening-and-closing rounds of 68, Blaine finished with a 19-under-par 261 and won by three strokes over Dan Forsman.

"Oh what a feeling," the personable Texan said. With a grin, he added, "Maybe I can hang out with some of the big boys now." He came close in the 1986 Bank of Boston Classic but his good friend, Gene Sauers, birdied the third extra hole of their playoff to win it.

Nevertheless, he was happy since he collected \$48,600 for second place and that was enough to push him up among the top 125 money winners for the year. Since then, his career has progressed steadily toward the top.

Blaine started to play golf at age 14 in Fort Stockton, TX, with a couple of friends. "I thought it was neat how far you could hit the ball," he recalls.

He went on to win the 1977 Texas State High School championship. Ken Wright, who was the pro at the Fort Stockton Golf Club, helped him through those early years.

He received a scholarship to the University of Houston and became a four-year letterman. He roomed with Fred Couples one year and with CBS sportscaster Jim Nantz the other three.

He qualified to play on the TOUR in 1982 and 1983 but had little success. He missed in his attempts to regain his playing status in 1984 and 1985.

Charlie Epps, the head pro at the Houston Country Club, helped to turn his game around. Putting was one of Blaine's weaknesses because "I seemed to see too much break when I putted righthanded.

"I do everything lefthanded except play golf," Blaine recalls. "Charlie suggested I try putting lefthanded."

It took awhile to get used to the feel but gradually more putts started to drop. "I can see the line a lot better," he said, "Now I believe I'm more of an all-around player."

With his new stroke, he has added more consistency to his game and is not throwing away shots as he said he did in the earlier years on TOUR.

It was a highly-emotional scene as Mark McCumber walked onto the 18th green at THE PLAYERS Championship, his head held high, as the thousands in the gallery roared in salute to the champion-to-be.

Mark proceeded to win this coveted title at the Tournament Players Club with a TPC at Sawgrass record score of 15-under par 273. He had rounds of 65-72-67-69 to win by four strokes over Mike Reid.

Mark had been recognized as one of the finest players in the game for several years — he had won five previous events — but THE PLAYERS moved him up another notch.

He started on TOUR in the Spring of 1978 and was a winner of the Doral-Eastern Open twice, in 1979 and 1985. He enjoyed a banner year in 1983, winning the Western and Pensacola Opens.

He added the Anheuser-Busch Classic title to his collection in 1987 with a final round of 66 helping immensely.

Until the last two years, 1983 was his best as he collected \$268,294. Since he only won \$31,684 the year before, it represented an increase of \$ 236,610 in a year.

He credits part of his success in recent years to his work with Bert Yancey and the importance of a "pre-shot routine."

He also is extremely proud of the work of Mark McCumber and Associates, the design-arm of McCumber Golf the company he helps to operate with his brothers.

They have numerous courses either completed or in the design stage, but one that opened in the fall of 1987 was Summer Beach on Amelia Island, FL. They have worked on many courses, but as he says, "the last dozen or so have been Mark McCumber design courses." One of the new projects is a Family Golf Center in Jacksonville.

Rocco Mediate was too busy pitching baseballs as a youngster to even think about pitching golf balls. "I didn't get my first set of golf clubs until I was 16-years old," he said. "I always played baseball and I was a pitcher for about 12 years."

Once he started to play a little golf, however, he was hooked. "My Dad never pushed me, but he encouraged me," Rocco said. "I only played in three tournaments as a senior in high school and then I went to California (PA) State College for 18 months. After that, I transferred to Florida Southern and that is where I really learned to play."

Jim Ferree, a prominent member of the Senior PGA TOUR, was the head professional at Westmoreland Country Club near Rocco's home in western Pennsylvania. He credits Jim with "getting me started," and he still sees Ferree on occasions.

During his years at Florida Southern, Coach Charlie Matlock "was a heck of an influence on me." Rocco's home in Greensburg, PA, is only a few miles from Latrobe, the home of Arnold Palmer, and he'll never forget the day he first had the opportunity to play with Arnold at the Latrobe Country Club. "I was only 19 and a friend of my family had set it up. When I went over there, I thought it was to play the course. I had no idea Mr. Palmer would be there."

Even today, their friendship remains strong and Rocco occasionally has the opportunity to play a leisurely round with Arnold. "He has given me a lot of encouragement and that means a lot to me."

He admits he didn't have a lot of amateur experience when he attempted to qualify for the TOUR in the Fall of 1985, but he made it. He finished 174th on the money list in 1986. He lost his player's card but returned to the Q-Tournament in the Fall of 1986 and finished fourth.

"My first year was a success even though I only won about \$20,000," he said. "I learned where I needed to improve and I learned so much about life on the TOUR, you know, travelling, how to handle everything."

A lot of hard work on his golf game helped considerably and he came along to enjoy a truly fine season in 1987. His best finish was a tie for second to John Inman in the Provident Classic in Chattanooga, TN. Oddly enough, Rocco's best in a major amateur event was in the 1984 Western Amateur and he lost in the final there to John Inman.

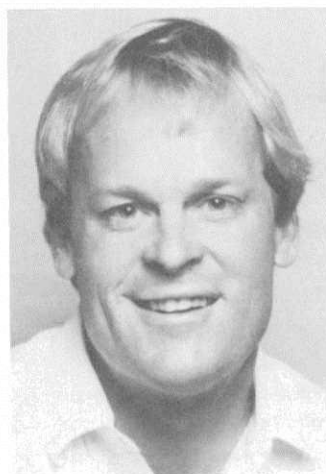
Rocco continued to improve last year topping the \$100,000 for the second consecutive year. Along the way he got married (Linda) and moved to Ponte Vedra, FL, the home of the PGA TOUR.

"I've been working hard to improve my short game and it got a little better last year," said Rocco. "I'm trying to be more consistent."

The last couple of years, Rocco has been working with Rick Smith of the Gaylord (MI) Treetops Resort. "He is the one who has helped me to reach this level," he said.

Throughout his career, when Johnny Miller has been playing well, he has been awesome. He always has been able to make the game appear so easy, driving the ball long-and-straight; rifling his irons dead on the flagsticks and holing putts from all corners of the greens.

Miller's arrival as a star always has been tied to his final-round 63 and victory in the 1973 U.S. Open at Oakmont, but it was in 1974 that he won eight times and set what was then a record of \$353,021. He won the first three events of the year.

The next year, Johnny's clubs were blazing again. He won the Phoenix Open to start the year with a 24-under-par score, and the next week won the Tucson Open with a 25-under score. In each tournament, he had a round of 61.

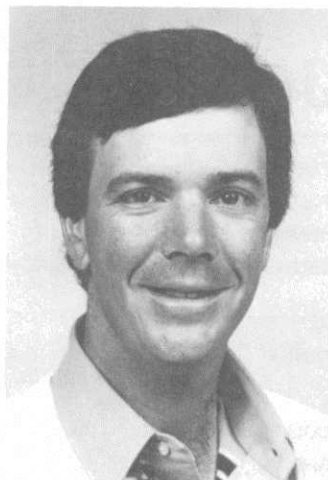
No one has touched back-to-back efforts like that since.

Johnny won for the 23rd time in the 1987 AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am and it was something special. It was his first victory in four years and was especially satisfying because "it was in front of a lot of friends, since I grew up in San Francisco."

He came close to having a banner year in 1983. He did win the Honda-Inverrary Classic but he lost two others in playoffs—the Phoenix Open to Bob Gilder and the Canadian Open to John Cook. In mid-December, he joined with Jack Nicklaus and they won the Chrysler Team Invitational. It was especially significant since Johnny is the tournament's official host.

One of the many highlights of his magnificent career was winning the 1976 British Open championship at Royal Birkdale. Jack Nicklaus and Seve Ballesteros tied for second.

Larry Mize will be known forevermore in golf history as the man who made the "impossible" shot to win the 1987 Masters Tournament.

Setting the stage, Larry made a gutsy eight-foot putt for a birdie on the final hole to tie with Greg Norman and Seve Ballesteros at three-under-par 285.

The playoff started at No. 10, but Seve was eliminated when he three putted on the first hole. Larry and Greg parred.

On the 11th, Larry's approach sailed far to the right of the green, some 140 feet from the cup. Norman was on the right fringe.

Using a sand wedge, Larry's chip was absolutely perfect and rolled dead center for a birdie. Slightly dazed by the turn of events, Norman missed his long putt for a birdie.

It was the second victory of his TOUR career. The first was in the 1983 Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic when he made a birdie putt of 25 feet to edge the likes of Fuzzy Zoeller, John Mahaffey and Chip Beck.

He lost the 1986 Kemper Open to Norman in a playoff that lasted six holes.

Even before his victory in the Masters, Larry was considered a solid player, who could win at any time. He was at his brilliant best throughout 1987, winning \$561,407 and ranking seventh on the money list. As far back as his rookie season of 1982, Larry displayed the intensity needed to succeed.

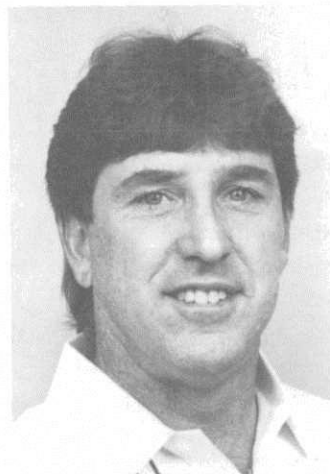
Just when it appeared as if he had no chance to make the exempt list for 1983, he fooled everyone. He had won \$14,787 with two tournaments remaining on the 1982 schedule, so his chances were slim, indeed, of making the top 125 money winners.

However, he proceeded to tie for ninth in the Pensacola Open and then tie for 11th in the Walt Disney World Classic to win \$14,000 and finish the year in 124th place with \$28,787.

Since the first time he picked up a club at the age of nine, Larry Mize has been totally in love with the game. He only had a few lessons in the formative years, as his father, a scratch handicapper, pointed him in the right direction.

He went to Georgia Tech, where he was No. 1 for three years and captain of the team for two. Along the way he also won an Atlanta Amateur championship.

If you think Gil Morgan was delighted with his play during the latter half of 1987, you should have seen him during the early months of the 1988 campaign.

He underwent surgery for a torn rotator cuff in early September of 1986. Dr. Frank Jobe of the Centinela Hospital Medical Center performed the operation and while it was declared successful, he couldn't be certain how well he would perform in the heat of battle.

It was nearly nine months before Gil was back on the firing line as he returned for the 1987 Panasonic-Las Vegas Invitational in early May. During the middle of summer, he was near the top of his game again.

At the Hardee's Classic, a third-round 63 gave him the lead, but he finally finished second to Kenny Knox. He also finished in the top 10 in his next two starts, as well.

He was positively amazing early last year when he finished in the top eight in seven straight events, starting with a tie for seventh place in the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic and finishing with a tie for second in the MCI Heritage Classic.

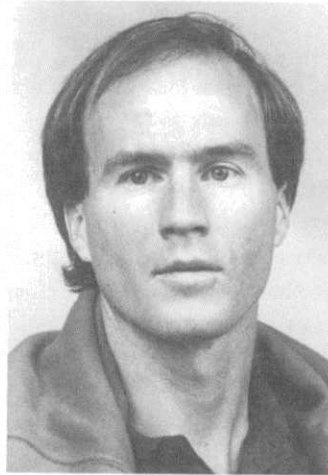
Through the years, Gil has been one of the more personable players in the game. He is quiet by nature but he always has been able to create excitement on the course with his exceptional play.

In 1983, for example, he won the first two tournaments of the year—the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open in a playoff over Lanny Wadkins and then the Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open.

His biggest victory was in the 1978 World Series of Golf when he defeated Hubert Green in a playoff and finished the year as the No. 2 money winner behind Tom Watson. With his powerful, fluid swing action, he always has been able to play the more difficult courses well.

Gil started to play the game at age 15. When he was a junior at East Central State in Oklahoma, he decided to pursue it as a career, along with his goal of some day obtaining a degree in optometry. He won the Oklahoma collegiate championship in 1967, but waited until he earned his doctorate in optometry before turning professional in 1972.

Those who have followed Jodie Mudd throughout his career knew he had the game to be successful. He was only 22-years old when he joined the TOUR in the Spring of 1982 and it took him a couple of years to become comfortable with life on the road.

His game started to fall into place in the latter half of 1984 and in 1985, he blossomed out as a genuine contender. He finished second three times and on two of those occasions, he lost in playoffs.

Last year he shed the contender title and became a champion winning at the Federal Express St. Jude Classic in Memphis. The win was not only his first, but it held significance as well.

"I waited a long time to win so close to home," he said.

"I just want to keep doing what I'm doing," added Mudd who had easily his best year in 1988. "I want to make the right shots, the right decisions at the right times. That's what it boiled down to for me."

He said he is more at ease with himself, having realized that "golf is not a do-or-die situation. You have to learn how to take advantage of the good shots and save strokes and wash the bad ones out of your mind. I've learned a lot about myself and how to handle the good and the bad."

Jodie became an official member of the PGA TOUR in April of 1982, the week after the Masters Tournament. As an amateur, he tied for 20th at Augusta that year. His first pro start was the Tallahassee Open and he tied for 30th, winning \$675. The next week, he played in the USF&G Classic and tied for fifth place, pocketing \$10,537.

That was sufficient for him to meet the minimum money guideline that was in effect at that time, and he was a TOUR regular the next week in the Houston Open.

Jodie came from a golfing family, and in the early days, he caddied for his father. He continued to play golf in high school but also excelled in basketball. "I gave up basketball in my senior year, though," he said, "so I could concentrate on golf."

After playing in a couple of events in Florida, he accepted a scholarship to Georgia Southern College. There, his game blossomed. Twice he won the United States Public Links Championships, in 1980 and 1981. He won the prestigious Sunnehanna Amateur in 1981 and was a member of the U.S. Walker Cup team the same year. He won eight collegiate events.

Tsuneyuki (Tommy) Nakajima is recognized around the world—along with Isao Aoki—as one of the finest players in the history of golf in Japan.

He has been the leader in the Japan Order of Merit four times and by winning nine tournaments in 1983 and seven more in 1986, he has become a dominant player in his homeland.

Certainly, winning the Japan Amateur Championship in 1973 at the age of 19 ranks as one of the highlights of his splendid career, but his impressive record also shows he has won the Japan PGA on three occasions and the Japan Open Championship twice.

In all, he has won 40 times on the Japan Tour. He has a right to be proud of his efforts in the Nissan Cup, (now the Kirin Cup) matches in the Fall of 1986. He won individual honors by two strokes over Bernhard Langer with an 18-under-par 270 and he also led the Japan PGA team to victory, defeating the European PGA team in the final.

He obtained the nickname Tommy while playing in the 1981 Australian Masters. The television announcers had a problem trying to pronounce Tsuneyuki and Tommy seemed to be close enough.

Tommy started to play golf as a nine-year old with the help of his father. Through the early years, his father was his only teacher. He turned professional in 1975 at the age of 21 and his progress was steady all the way to the top.

In 1981, he was second only to Aoki on the Japan Order of Merit and the following year he became the leader with five victories and collected what was then a record \$270,000. He was the leader again in 1983, 1985 and 1986.

As you might expect, he still says Aoki and Jack Nicklaus are his two "most admired" people in the game. An extremely personable-and-pleasant fellow, he has attracted a large following worldwide.

Tommy's first full year on the PGA TOUR was in 1983. He wanted to win enough money to become a member without having to go through the Qualifying Tournament. He did so, with \$45,351 in a limited number of events. A big boost came when he finished fourth in the Greater Greensboro Open.

Tommy did not play that frequently in the U.S. in 1985 and 1986, but came back in 1987 with a respectable year. He tied for sixth in the Hertz Bay Hill Classic and challenged until the final holes of the third round of the U.S. Open at the Olympic Club. He double bogeyed the last when he hit his second shot in a cedar tree by the 18th green. It became a lost ball and he finally tied for ninth place.

Last year, he had his best-ever finish, a solo third in the PGA Championship, thanks to a last day 67. It led to his best money year.

Larry Nelson enjoyed a superb season in 1987 and he said it was because of two factors—patience and the desire to work harder on his game.

"It was a discouraging first half," he said, "but it turned out to be my best year."

Indeed it did, starting with his playoff victory over Lanny Wadkins in the PGA Championship at Palm Beach Gardens, FL. Two months later, his brilliant 9-under-par 63 the last afternoon gave him the Walt Disney World/Oldsmobile Classic title.

He was a proud man at the 1988 Georgia Pacific-Atlanta Classic. He gained his 10th victory after a brilliant display through the first three rounds, shooting 63-66-66—195 (21-under par) and then a final 73 to win by one.

Larry's first major championship was in the 1981 PGA before thousands of his hometown followers at the Atlanta Athletic Club. He won by four strokes over Fuzzy Zoeller.

The 1983 U. S. Open at Oakmont has to go down as one of his great performances. He was seven strokes off the pace after two rounds but his 6-under-par 65 the third day lifted him to within a stroke of the co-leaders, Tom Watson and Seve Ballesteros.

The last day, it turned out to be a battle between Larry and his good friend Watson. When severe thunderstorms stopped play for the day, Larry was on the 16th tee and Watson on the 15th.

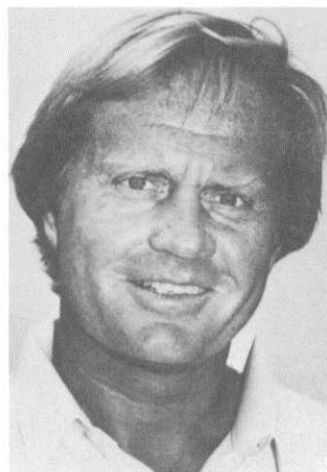
The next morning, Larry hit a four wood shot to the back of the green, some 62 feet from the cup. Incredibly, he made it for birdie and went on to win by one. His 10-under-par 132 for the last two rounds set an Open record.

There are not many stories on the PGA TOUR more unusual than Nelson's. Only four years after he started to play golf, and after playing only one 72-hole tournament, he was on TOUR.

Larry lettered in baseball and basketball in high school and attended Southern Tech for a year before he was drafted and spent two years in the military. After his discharge in 1968, he tried college again and also worked as an illustrator at the Lockheed plant near his home.

He went to a driving range one day in 1969, liked hitting balls so much that he went to work in pro Bert Seagraves' shop at the Pine Tree Club in Kennesaw, GA. He turned pro six months after that.

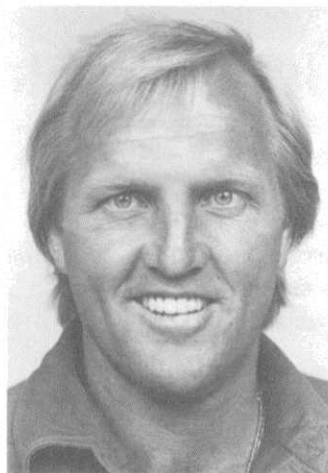

Greg Norman may be the most charismatic player in the game today and with his incredible skills, he does generate excitement.

He has posted many victories worldwide and most of them have been impressive, indeed. Even when he doesn't win, he can make it exciting.

Last year, his only TOUR victory was in the MCI-Heritage Classic but he also lost two other opportunities in playoffs—to Curtis Strange in the Independent Insurance Agent Open and to Seve Ballesteros in the Manufacturers Hanover Westchester Classic.

He missed nearly two months of the season with an injured wrist. In the second round of the U.S. Open, on the ninth hole, he strained it severely when hitting a ball off a tight lie and the club hit a boulder.

He truly was incredible in 1986. He won twice on the TOUR, was second four times and had 10 top 10 finishes in 19 U.S. starts. Overseas, he won the British Open, European Open, Suntory World Match Play and then three in a row in his native Australia.

In all four of the more significant championships, he was in the lead going into the final round. He led by one stroke going into the last day of the Masters Tournament and finished tied for second. He led by one after three days at the U.S. Open and finally tied for 12th place. He led by four at the PGA Championship and finished second. He led by one after three days of the British Open.

All of the performances in the States led to his being the No. 1 money winner with a record \$653,296. He was \$516 ahead of Bob Tway.

After all that success, 1987 was a disappointment to him since he didn't win on TOUR. He lost a playoff to Larry Mize in the Masters Tournament and also tied for second in the Beatrice Western Open.

Only one other player in the history of the PGA TOUR has shot a lower 72-hole score than Tim Norris. Mike Souchak won the 1955 Texas State Open in San Antonio with a 27-under par 257.

When Norris blitzed the Wethersfield Country Club course in the 1982 Sammy Davis Jr. Greater Hartford Open, he shot 25-under par 259. Only Byron Nelson in the 1945 Seattle Open, and Chandler Harper in the 1954 Texas Open, have ever shot as low as 259. Tim was on the verge of matching Souchak's mark until he bogeyed two of the final four.

He really could not explain his superlative play except to say that he had very positive thoughts all week. Although his record did not show it, he said, "I had been playing well for several weeks but everything just jelled at Hartford."

Prior to his victory, Tim went to a little longer shaft in his irons. "That enabled me to hit the ball a little further, higher and softer into the greens. I figured if I could shorten each hole by 10 yards, that has to help me."

After a fine amateur record, Tim was able to earn his TOUR card in the fall of 1980 and went on to have a decent rookie year, winning \$32,424. Late in the fall he suffered a sprained right hand. He tried to qualify for the first tournament, the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open, but the pain was too intense. He did not return to the TOUR until the Tallahassee Open in late April where he tied for 45th. He didn't make another cut until the Greater Milwaukee Open in early July. Unfortunately, the hand still gave him problems through the end of the year.

He underwent a hand operation in the fall of 1982 and didn't return to the TOUR in 1983 until the Tournament Players Championship.

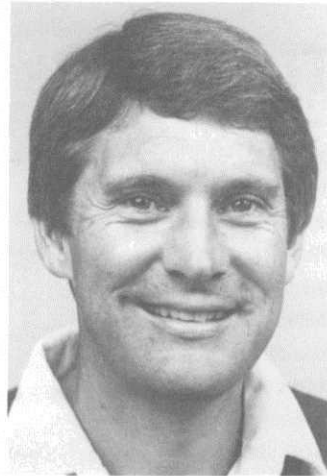
He started in the game at age six in Fresno, CA. He had a few tennis lessons and didn't care for that game, and then moved on to golf, encouraged by his stepfather.

"I took a liking to it right away," he said. As he grew older, he would watch golf on television. He didn't make his high school team until his senior year. He went on to Fresno State and played well there. He was selected as an All-American twice. In his first start as a professional, he won the 1980 California State Open by five strokes.

He enjoyed steady success in 1983 through 1986, but fell to 132nd on the money list in 1987 and returned to the qualifying tournament.

The start of the 1988 campaign was a slow one for Norris as he didn't cash a check until May. He closed, however, with 66 at the Buick Open and finished fourth to take home \$33,600 and then late in the season added a T18 worth \$9,128 at the Disney tournament to clinch a spot in the top 125.

Andy North has had many wonderful days on the PGA TOUR and he always thought there never would be another week like the one he enjoyed in 1978 when he won the United States Open Championship at Cherry Hills in Denver.

But there was another. It came in the Summer of 1985 at Oakland Hills in Birmingham, MI, when he won the Open Championship again, this time in a tense duel with several players who had opportunities to win. At the end, it was Andy at one-under-par 279 and one stroke better than Tze-Chung Chen of Taiwan, Dave Barr of Canada and Denis Watson of Zimbabwe.

At Cherry Hills, he led by four strokes with five holes to play. There were some anxious moments before he was through, though. When he hit his tee shot on the 18th hole, he needed a bogey to win—and that's what he scored. After being bunkered in three, he blasted to four feet and he made it to gain the victory.

It was a struggle for Andy in 1983 and 1984, due mainly to a painful right elbow. It was thought to be tendinitis, but closer examination revealed a bone spur. He underwent an operation and had it removed in the Fall of 1983. As it turned out, it was "about the size of a piece of gravel."

An unusual ailment helped lead North to golf when he was in the seventh grade in Madison, WI. A bone in his knee had stopped growing and was disintegrating. While on crutches for 18 months he was told to give up his pursuit of basketball and football but that he could play golf—if he rode in a cart.

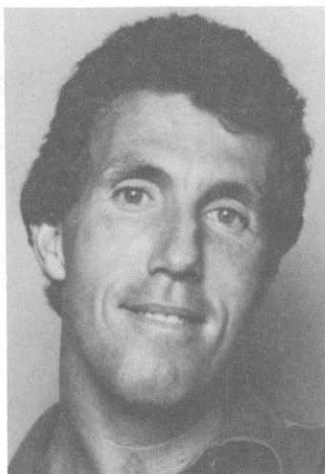
Since Andy's father was a low-handicap golfer, the game was no stranger to the family and he progressed quickly. He also returned to basketball and was chosen all-state as a high school senior, but by then golf was his dominant sport.

North won the Wisconsin high school championship in 1966 and 1967, the State Amateur in 1969 and placed second in the Wisconsin Open in 1968 and 1969. After entering the University of Florida he was chosen All-American for three years and won the 1971 Western Amateur.

Andy underwent a knee operation in October of 1987 "to clean the joint surfaces," but he admits, "I came back way too early, and it's taken a long time to get my swing back."

Meanwhile, he also is becoming involved in golf course design work.

Mac O'Grady has won twice during his first five years on TOUR and enjoyed financial success, but he said the latter half of 1988 was important because "I learned to laugh at the game and myself.

"You realize you are a frail human being in a vast universe in a galaxy of many galaxies. What is important is to be a civilized human being."

Mac's first victory was in the 1986 Canon Sammy Davis Jr. Greater Hartford Open in a playoff over Roger Maltbie. He also won the MONY Tournament of Champions to start the 1987 campaign.

Last year was not as productive, even though he went over \$100,000 in earnings again.

As he said after the 1987 campaign, "My five-year residency program on the TOUR is over and I now can shake hands with corporate America. I hope to maximize the efficiency ratio of my management resources."

Mac believes he set a TOUR record even before he became a member of the family. "I went through the Qualifying School 17 times before I made it," he said. "The first time was in October of 1971."

After he finally succeeded in the Fall of 1982, he has made the most of his opportunities. In 1985, he broke through and established himself as a solid contender. He finished third three times; one of them being at the Panasonic-Las Vegas Invitational and it was worth \$64,000. That one week, he won more than he had in either of his first two years.

A high note was hit during the 1985 Byron Nelson Classic when he set a course record of 8-under-par 64 the first day at Las Colinas. He finished tied for third place.

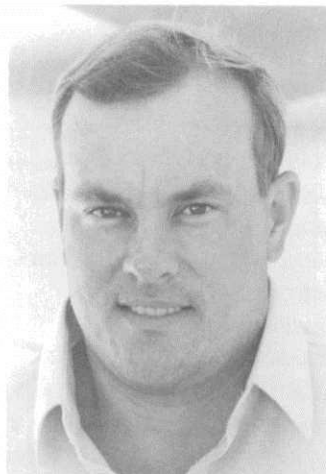
He once said, "I've played so many places around the world during the last 10 years or so, being on the PGA TOUR is like celebrating Christmas every day."

The Mac O'Grady story is an intriguing one. Actually, his real name is Phil McGleno, but in 1978, for a variety of reasons, he changed it to Phillip McClelland O'Grady. McClelland is for Bob McClelland, a fellow who has been like a father to him for years; and O'Grady was his mother's maiden name.

Mac was one of seven children and they lived in Minneapolis, MN, until moving to Los Angeles in 1960. He started to caddy when he was 12, both at Riviera and Bel-Air Country Clubs.

As a youth, he was filled with frustrations, and in an attempt to wash them away, he did everything from ride a bike for great distances, practice yoga and even worked hard on being able to play the game right-and-left handed. Of course, he plays right-handed now, but still putts left-handed.

David Ogrin says "my mind came of age as a TOUR player" in 1988 and indeed it must have. He enjoyed his finest season.

He reached several milestones, such as going 20 consecutive tournaments without missing the cut — the best on TOUR last year; registering 17 straight rounds at par or less; and also posting back-to-back top 10 finishes for the first time in his career.

The highlight of the year came one June 20 when his wife, Sharon, presented him with their first born, Amy Rene. "Believe me," he says, "that definitely helped my game and my outlook."

David came close to getting his first official victory on the TOUR in the 1985 St. Jude Memphis Classic but Hal Sutton had other ideas.

"I felt I finally played to my potential," David said. "I played an entire tournament my way and found out it was good enough. Except for Hal's great putt, I might have been the winner."

Sutton came on strong the last afternoon with a 7-under 65 at the Colonial Country Club to tie Ogrin at 9-under par 279. On the first extra hole, Sutton rolled in a long birdie putt from the back fringe to win it.

He did win the 1987 Deposit Guaranty Classic in Hattiesburg, MS. A final-round 64 gave him a one stroke margin over Britain's Nick Faldo. It was worth \$36,000, and while the victory is considered "unofficial," the money definitely counted.

If you ask David when he was introduced to the game, he'll smile and tell you, "Legend has it I was born with a club in my hands. When I was two-years old, my dad had one of his clubs break, so he sawed off the shaft, put a grip on it and I started to swing away."

There was a time when David was considering baseball as a career. "I had dreams of being a switch-hitting catcher," he says with a laugh, "but my love of golf was too much."

In 1975, David won the Illinois State Interscholastic title. Then he went to Texas A&M on a scholarship. He won three collegiate events, including the 1979 Harvey Penick Invitational in Austin. Hal Sutton was the runner-up.

"I wanted to go as far as I could in the game," he said, "and I made it through the TOUR's Qualifying School on my fourth attempt." That was in the Fall of 1982 at the Tournament Players Club.

"It isn't often one dreams a dream" he said, "and then when he reaches the dream, realizes it is even better than the dream. The TOUR is all I dreamed it would be, and more."

As long as Mark O'Meara plays the game, he probably will never experience another year quite like 1984. He won his first TOUR title, the Greater Milwaukee Open. Suddenly, victories—such as the back-to-back triumphs in the 1985 Bing Crosby National Pro-Am and the Hawaiian Open—were expected of him.

What made 1984 so unusual was the rest of the story. He finished second five times, third three times and had a total of 15 top ten finishes—high on the TOUR. He earned \$465,873 and finished second to Tom Watson in the race for the Arnold Palmer Award as the year's leading money winner. He only trailed Watson by \$10,387.

Every time he was asked to explain his sudden rise to the top, he always pointed the finger at Hank Haney, the man from Houston who helped turn his game around.

"I've always played on natural instincts," Mark has said, "but I knew I needed something better. Hank had me swinging more on a plane. I was always too upright and that led to inconsistency.

Even though he has not won on TOUR since the 1985 Crosby and Hawaii events, he has been a winner. He won the 1985 Kapalua International in a playoff over Corey Pavin and then went to Japan to win the Fuji Sankei Classic. Early in 1986 he won the Australian Masters and in 1987 he won the Lawrence Batley International in England.

He has had good solid seasons the last two years with two of his better efforts being in the 1987 PLAYERS Championship and a tie for third in the 1988 U.S. Open.

He started to play the game at age 13 after his family moved to Mission Viejo, CA. A golf course was next to their home and, at the time, Mark didn't know many of the kids in the neighborhood. So, he would slip onto the course and play.

He wanted to make the golf team as a freshman at Mission Viejo High School, and he did. His junior year, the team won the state championship.

He wanted to play well enough to earn a college scholarship, and he did that, too, going to Long Beach State University. His next goal was to be classified as an All-American, and he made the third team as a freshman and second team as a senior.

He broke onto the national scene in a big way in 1979, winning the United States Amateur at Canterbury in Cleveland, defeating John Cook in the finals.

Arnold Palmer has been honored by many people from many nations during his distinguished career as an athlete and businessman but one of his most cherished moments came late in 1980 when it was announced by Commissioner Deane R. Beman that, starting in 1981, the leading money winner on the PGA TOUR would receive the Arnold Palmer Award.

Since Arnold was the TOUR's leading money winner for so many years, the first player to reach the \$1 million mark in winnings and, generally, did so much to popularize the game, Commissioner Beman said it would be appropriate to give the 1980 inaugural award to Arnold himself.

Palmer won the U.S. Amateur championship in 1954 and joined the TOUR the next year.

Jerry Pate has a flair for the dramatic and it never was more evident than during the closing stages of the 1982 Tournament Players Championship, which was being held for the first time on the demanding Tournament Players Club at Sawgrass course.

He was battling Brad Bryant, Bruce Lietzke and Scott Simpson for the lead and the coveted victory. Just when it appeared a playoff was imminent, Pate birdied the treacherous little 17th hole with a 15-foot putt; and then birdied the 440 yard 18th by lofting a five iron brilliantly to within two feet for another birdie. On one of the more difficult courses on TOUR, he played the final seven holes in four-under par.

Then, as he stood on the final green at the awards ceremony, he coaxed TOUR Commissioner Deane R. Beman and course architect Pete Dye to the edge of the bulkhead and pushed them both in the lake. Finally, he dove in himself.

It was his second such act of showmanship. He did it the first time after winning the 1981 Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic, diving into the large lake to the left of the 18th green.

A severe shoulder injury in mid-1982 seriously affected his once-brilliant career. He has had three operations to repair damage to the shoulder, the last one being in mid-July of 1987 by Dr. Frank Jobe. "I'll be back," he said confidently.

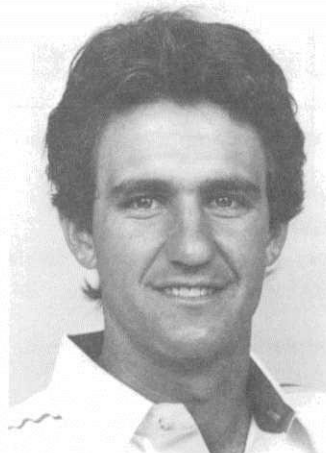
Meanwhile, he also has developed a blossoming golf course design business and has done impressive work on several courses. One of his latest was the Valley Course at the TPC at Sawgrass with Pete Dye.

He has left his signature on several others, including Tiger Point, where the Pensacola Open was played; and Palm Beach Polo, the home of the Chrysler Team championship.

Jerry has also left his mark on television. He has become a prominent on-course commentator for all ABC golf telecasts.

Pate literally burst into world-wide attention as a PGA TOUR rookie in 1976. His last swing in the U.S. Open, a five-iron from the rough at Atlanta Athletic Club, left him a two-foot birdie putt for a two-shot victory, and his closing 63 in the Canadian Open was good for a four-stroke victory over Jack Nicklaus. His total of \$153,102 in official earnings was the most ever won by a rookie until Hal Sutton bettered it in 1982.

Steve Pate knocked on the door on several occasions and close followers of the game knew it was just a matter of time until the former standout at UCLA claimed his first victory.

When he decided it was time to go through, he did more than knock on the door. He stepped all over it and charged through to three victories in a span of less than five months.

The first was in the Southwest Classic in Abilene, TX, in late September of 1987. He came from four-strokes behind the last afternoon to win by one.

He started the new year in spectacular fashion, winning the rain-shortened MONY Tournament of Champions at LaCosta by one stroke over Larry Nelson. Five weeks later, he won again by a stroke in the Shearson Lehman Hutton-Andy Williams Open in LaJolla, CA. Jay Haas was the victim this time.

Although he did not win again the rest of the year, he did finish second in the International and third in the U.S. Open. He earned well over a half-million dollars. "I wasn't disappointed with the year at all," he said grinning.

After his first triumph, he said with a smile, "You have to play well to win, but you also have to play well at the right time."

Steve came close to winning in his rookie year of 1985. He was tied with Wayne Levi after 72 holes in the Georgia Pacific-Atlanta Classic but lost on the second extra hole to Levi's birdie putt of 12 feet.

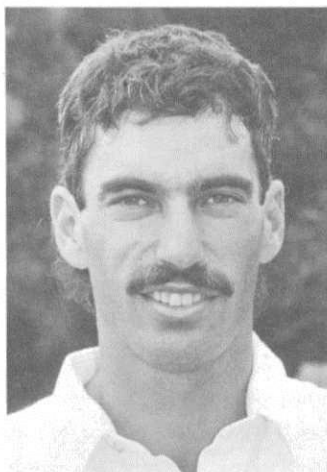
It prompted him to comment, "Yes, I'm a little disappointed but Wayne had to birdie three of the last four holes we played to beat me. I was having fun and it was a blast being on television."

Steve started to play golf at the age of nine, mainly because his parents played and they encouraged him. In his first competition, at age 11, he recalls shooting a 107. He progressed well enough to make his high school team in Santa Barbara as a freshman. In his senior year, he won the California Interscholastic Federation title. He moved on to UCLA.

Jim Petralia of the Annandale Country Club in Pasadena also has been a big help. "He was in Santa Barbara for awhile and I started to work for him when I was 16," Steve said.

Oh, yes, he does get asked frequently if he is related to Jerry Pate. The answer is no.

Corey Pavin kept his string alive last year and can say he now has won a tournament during every year he player on the PGA TOUR.

He was not enjoying a vintage Pavin season until the latter part of the campaign and when he arrived in San Antonio for the Texas Open presented by Nabisco, his clubs were blazing.

His 64-63—127 gave him a three-stroke lead and he increased it to five shots after adding a 66 the third day. His final round of 66 at Oak Hills put him at 21-under 259 for an eight shot triumph.

He became only the fifth player in TOUR history to break 260. Mike Souchak owns the all-time mark at 257 and Corey joins three others at 259.

Corey won the Houston Coca-Cola Open in his rookie season of 1984. He won the Colonial National Invitation in 1985 and his 14-under par 266 established a tournament record.

He became the last player to successfully defend a title when he won the Hawaiian Open in 1986 and 1987. He also added the Greater Milwaukee Open to his list in 1986 and the Bob Hope Chrysler Classic in 1987 when he made a dramatic birdie putt on the final hole.

When Corey collected \$260,536 in his first year, it was — at that time — the most money ever won by a rookie. In 1985, he compiled 13 top 10 finishes — more than any other player.

The last few years, Bruce Hamilton has been his mentor.

Corey started in the game at age eight and it wasn't long before he was receiving his first taste of competition. It was in 1977 that he won his first two important titles. As a 17-year old, he captured the Junior World crown and also became the youngest ever to win the Los Angeles City Men's Amateur.

He was very successful during his years at UCLA, winning 11 tournaments including the PAC-10 championship in 1982.

When Corey failed to get his TOUR card in his first attempt in 1982, he took his golf game overseas. He was successful, to say the least. He won the South African Open, the German Open and the Calberson Classic in France.

The Calvin Peete success story is one that will live forever in the history of the PGA TOUR. In a five-year span in the mid 1980s, he won nine times and established himself as one of the truly great ball-strikers in the game.

The most prestigious title came in March of 1985 when he won the Tournament Players Championship at Sawgrass. It assured him of exempt status for the following 10 years.

Four of his victories came in a brilliant 1982 campaign and he has been a leader in such statistical categories as driving accuracy and greens in regulation almost from the beginning of the program. He has played on two Ryder Cup teams as well.

Lower back problems put him on the sidelines for much of 1987. There were some weeks when he tried to make an adjustment in his swing so he could play, but that only made matters worse. The result was his poorest season in a decade. Happily, he says the back is fine now.

He won the Golf Writers' Ben Hogan award in 1983. It goes annually to the individual who had to overcome a physical handicap or illness to play the game. As a youngster, Calvin suffered a broken left elbow and even today, he cannot extend the arm. So much for golf's straight-left arm principle.

In 1984, when Calvin won the Texas Open in San Antonio, he had two rounds of 67 and two rounds of 66. It assured him of his first Vardon Trophy for low stroke average—70.56.

Born in Detroit, Mich., Calvin spent most of his life on a Florida farm with his 18 brothers and sisters—through two marriages by his father. He was forced to drop out of school at an early age.

While still a teenager, Peete got into the business of selling goods to migrant farm workers. The field hands had little chance of getting into the city stores, so Peete would pack clothes, rings, watches, jewelry and anything else he could squeeze into his station wagon and take off. Wherever the migrant workers went, Peete was not far behind. From Florida it was a series of selling stops along dusty roads as far north as Rochester, N.Y.

Peete had friends in Rochester, and each year his buddies would invite him to play golf. "I always turned them down," Peete said, "I thought the game was silly. Who wants to chase a little ball around under the hot sun?"

Finally, in 1966, when he was 23 years old, Calvin tried the game with his friends. Peete improved rapidly and he began to play in amateur tournaments. Eventually he entered the PGA TOUR's Qualifying School. He failed on his first try. And the second. But he made it the third time, in the Spring of 1975.

There was a time when Chris Perry had to make a very big decision. As a strong-armed righthander, he compiled a 9-0 pitching record as a ninth grader with a 0.91 earned run average and he also carried a healthy .325 batting average.

But, he also loved to play golf.

"My Dad never said I had to follow him," Chris remembers, "but he did say things are so specialized in sports today that I would have to make a decision. I couldn't do everything."

His dad, Jim Perry, knew something about such things. He was an outstanding pitcher for many years in the major leagues, starring for Cleveland, Minnesota, Detroit and finally with Oakland.

"By the time I was 13-or-14-years old," Chris adds, "I knew I wanted to play professional golf. In Minnesota (his dad pitched for the Twins for 10 years), you play golf and baseball for six months and skate for six months." And skate he did. High school ice hockey is a big, big sport there and Chris was captain of his team his senior year. "I played hockey for eight-or-nine years as a defenseman," he said.

When it was time to move on to college, he selected Ohio State University "because of its great tradition. Being from the north, I didn't want to go south and play golf 12 months of the year. As soon as I saw Ohio State, I fell in love with everything about it."

The feeling was mutual. Chris went on to win 14 collegiate events, shattering the "victory" record of Jack Nicklaus. He was a first-team All-America choice for three years.

After he was graduated in 1984, he made his first attempt at the TOUR's Qualifying School in the Fall and he made it easily.

His first three years were successful ones in the development process of a young player as he earned exempt status as one of the leading 125 money winners.

He was in grave danger of losing his card in 1988, but a T3 at the season's final event, the Centel Classic, boosted him into 121st spot on the money list. His check for \$29,000 gave him a final total of \$85,546 for the year.

He prefers to play the ball from right to left, "but I like to work it both ways. My iron game improved a lot during the year."

Oh, yes, his dad played a major role in his development as a young player. "We'd go to spring training with him and play the courses in Florida. He's still a good player and carries about a 4 handicap now, but I sure wouldn't give him two strokes a side."

Kenny Perry will always look at the 1987 Panasonic-Las Vegas Invitational as the tournament that started him on the road to success.

"It was a turning point," he said of his tie for fourth place. "I was tied for the lead after three rounds (with Hal Sutton, Ken Brown and Dan Pohl). I played in the last group on Sunday and I shot a 69. It gave me a lot of confidence."

Paul Azinger had a final round of 64 and won the tournament, while Sutton finished second, Curtis Strange third and Kenny tied with Brown for fourth place. He earned \$55,000.

"I had to learn how to play in front of so many people," he went on. "It's hard to concentrate, but I learned how to go out and play my own game and not think about them. It isn't easy."

He went on to have a successful year, winning more than \$100,000 and he did the same thing last year.

He said of 1988: "It was identical to my rookie year. I had about the same amount of success and had two really good chances to win, at Greensboro and Hartford. I enjoyed the feeling of being in contention.

He added, "The money is great but you also want to be one of the best and that means you have to win."

Kenny started to play golf when he was seven under the encouragement of his father. "Dad used to be a scratch golfer and he still is my biggest fan," Kenny said.

His first competition came when he was 11 and he went on to have a fine high school career — he won the 1978 Kentucky State High School Championship — and also played well while at Western Kentucky University.

Norman Head of Bowling Green, KY, who now is retired, has been Kenny's teacher since he was a freshman in college. "I really believe in his theories and owe a lot of my success to him.

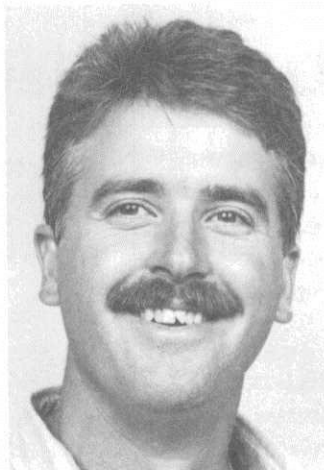
"He stressed ball striking more than chipping and putting but he never lets you forget you have to work on all aspects of the game."

Kenny tried the TOUR Qualifying Tournament three times before he made it in the Fall of 1986.

"The TOUR was what I expected in a lot of ways," he said, "but there is more travelling than I anticipated. It's tough being away from Sandy and the kids but I can see the hard work paying off."

There can be no question about that. Kenny Perry has made it.

Dan Pohl waited a long time for 1986 to come along and happen. He had been successful through his first seven full years on the PGA TOUR, but he had not been able to win.

In 1986, he won twice — in the Colonial National Invitation and the NEC World Series of Golf. He also finished second to Greg Norman in the Panasonic Las Vegas Invitational. In those three events, he won \$358,200.

While victory eluded him in 1987, Pohl added another feather to his cap by making the Ryder Cup team and by winning the prestigious Vardon Trophy.

He earned a career high \$465,269 and also won the first stats All-Around title, indicative of the strength of his overall game.

"To have had a good year (1986) and come back with another one is very satisfying," said Pohl. "The Ryder Cup selection was a real honor; anytime you represent your country and your fellow players, it's a real thrill."

As for his length off the tee, Dan was the TOUR leader the first two years such statistics were kept. In his best year, he averaged 280.1 in 1981.

Although he started in the game at age five, baseball and basketball were his first loves.

He earned his TOUR card on his second attempt, in June of 1978, but the following 12 months profited him only \$1,047. He went back to the school in June of 1979 and regained his playing privileges.

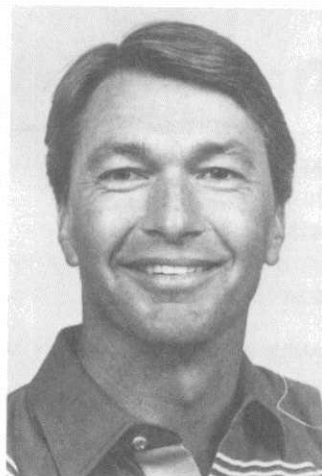
With new vigor, he attempted to qualify for the Canadian Open and Danny Thomas-Memphis Classic, but could gain only alternate status. He didn't get in either one.

The next week, he qualified for the Western Open, and suddenly, he was in the spotlight. With three holes to play on Sunday afternoon at the Butler National Golf Club, Dan Pohl was in the lead.

"I had played solid all day," he said, "but you can't believe how pumped up I was. I thought I was putting good swings on it, but the ball started to act like it was shot out of a cannon. I hit every approach shot over the green on the last three, and bogeyed each one of them."

He tied for third, only one stroke out of the Larry Nelson-Ben Crenshaw playoff, won by Nelson. Nevertheless, he won \$17,400, and he was here to stay.

Don Pooley has been waiting for a year such as 1987 to come along. It easily was his best season on TOUR with the victory in the Memorial Tournament serving as the highlight.

"It was my best year in a lot of ways," he said. "It was pleasing because I played well when I was in contention."

He also will be remembered for his million-dollar hole-in-one at the Hertz Bay Hill Classic. The \$1 million was offered as a prize for an ace on the 17th hole during the final round.

Pooley used a 4 iron for the 192-yard shot and the ball hit the flagstick about two feet above the cup and dropped straight down. The Arnold Palmer Children's Hospital in Orlando received \$500,000. Don gets the other half — in monthly installments of \$2,083.33 for the next 20 years.

Don began slowly last year due to some physical ailments, but a strong finish helped him top the \$200,000 plateau for the third consecutive year.

"It was a year marred by illness and injury," recalled Pooley. "I'm planning on better things in 1989."

In 1985, he won the coveted Vardon Trophy with a 70.36 scoring average for 97 rounds.

The Don Pooley story is an interesting one. It shows what a person can do who is willing to work at his profession and, as he says, also have a faithful God.

After suffering through a miserable year in 1979, winning only \$6,932 due mainly to muscle spasms in his back and tendinitis in his left hand, he rebounded with a \$157,973 year in 1980. The improvement of \$151,041 was the biggest jump on TOUR that year.

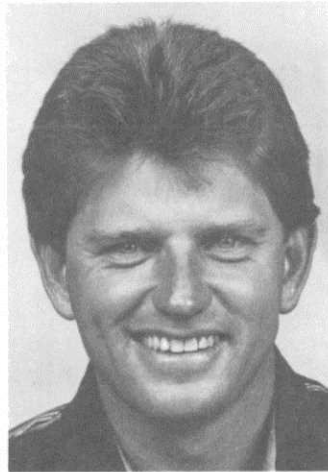
His first victory came at the B.C. Open in 1980. He was tied with Lee Trevino at 10-under par 203 after three, and his closing 68 gave him a one-stroke margin over Peter Jacobsen, while Trevino slipped into a tie for third.

Don says he has been playing golf for as long as he can remember. He received his first set of clubs on his seventh birthday.

He improved at each level of competition, and was the No. 1 man on his Riverside High School team and then played No. 1 on the University of Arizona team.

He played the mini-tours for a while after college, and it wasn't until his third attempt at the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1975, that he obtained his card.

What happened from that point on was, he not only held the round together, but he nearly put his entire golf career together.

Nick birdied the sixth hole that day, and then birdied five of the first seven holes on the second nine for a 36-30—66. He was in the lead by one stroke over Jack Nicklaus and Bobby Clampett. And, that's where he stayed the rest of the week, winning by four strokes over Nicklaus with a 10-under par 270.

The victory was worth \$100,000, but more important, it gave him a 10-year exemption for all PGA TOUR co-sponsored events. Since he qualified for the World Series by virtue of his play on the South African Tour earlier in the year, his \$100,000 did not count in official earnings. Thus, his record only shows \$49,435 won in 1983.

He made a big jump on the money list two years ago when he had six top 10 finishes. He lost the Western Open in a playoff to Tom Kite. Fred Couples and David Frost also were involved.

In the third round of the 1986 Masters Tournament, he shot a course record 63 and eventually finished tied for fifth place.

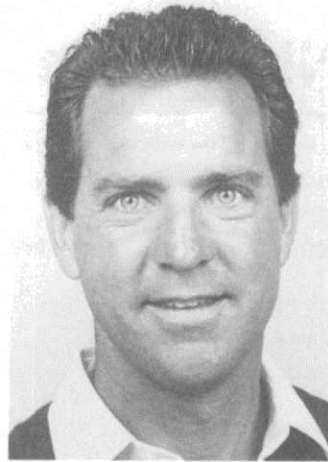
Nick had another excellent year on TOUR in 1988, but his biggest moment occurred in the British Open where he was edged in the final round for this title despite a closing round of 69.

Nick started in the game as an eight-year old caddy for his brother in Rhodesia (now Zimbabwe). He progressed rapidly as a player, and by the time he was 17, he had an invitation to compete in the Junior World tournament at Torrey Pines in LaJolla, CA. "Everyone said I should go," he recalls, "so my mother and brother paid my way. They figured that if I didn't do well, I would get competitive golf out of my system." He fooled them. He not only played well, but he won.

He played on the South Africa and the European Tour as an amateur in 1975, and then went into the Rhodesian Air Force for the next two years. He was out in time to play on the South African Tour as a professional in the Fall of 1977.

His greatest disappointment came at Royal Troon in Scotland in the 1982 British Open. He led by three strokes with six holes to play but dropped four shots on his way to the clubhouse, letting Tom Watson slip in with the victory.

Tom Purtzer will tell you that no matter what else he accomplishes in the game, it isn't likely to give the satisfaction he experienced when he won the 1984 Phoenix Open although his triumph in the Gatlin Brothers-Southwest Classic last fall might come close.

He has spent most of his life in the Phoenix area and through the final round at the Phoenix Country Club, there wasn't any doubt about who most of the thousands in the gallery wanted to win.

He won in rather spectacular fashion, too. On the par 5 18th hole, he put his second shot into a bunker on the right, but he played a brilliant explosion shot. The ball stopped about two feet from the cup. He made the putt for a birdie and a one-stroke victory over Corey Pavin.

It gave Tom a six-under-par 65 for the sunny afternoon and a total of 16-under-par 268.

Tom was four strokes behind entering the last round of the Southwest at Abilene, TX. His 8-under par 64 — with an eagle at the last hole for 19-under par 269 gave him the lead. Along came Mark Brooks with an eagle at the 18th on a putt of 50 feet to tie him.

On the first extra hole, Tom won it all with a par.

One of the longest drivers on TOUR, he has averaged nearly 270 yards through each of the last eight seasons. Over the years, some of his finest performances have been on the more difficult courses.

His first victory was at Riviera, for example, in the 1977 Glen Campbell-Los Angeles Open.

Tom got an early start in golf because his father, Horace, enjoyed the game.

"Dad was a good golfer," Purtzer said, in recalling his own background in the game. "I guess he was a two or a three handicapper when I was very young. He wanted both of his sons to play the game and Paul and I were given cut-down clubs. We started hitting the ball when we were eight or nine. (Paul is Director of Golf at the plush Gainey Ranch in Scottsdale, AZ, and a former TOUR player).

"Meanwhile, I liked baseball and football and played both. When I got to high school I gave up baseball. I played high school football and then concentrated on golf."

Purtzer continued to play golf for Arizona State and became one of the better collegiate players. He also won both the Arizona State amateur title and the Southwest Open in 1972.

It isn't every rookie who is good enough or tough enough to win in his first year on TOUR, but Sam Randolph is not your average player, either.

Sam started in the game at age eight and at all levels of amateur play, he was dominant. He won the 1981 Junior World title, the California State Amateur and then reached the pinnacle when he won the 1985 U.S. Amateur championship.

He continued that line of success in his rookie season of 1987 on the PGA TOUR with a victory at the Bank of Boston Classic and earnings of \$180,378. He was consistent, too, making the cut in 18 of 24 starts with six top 25 finishes to his credit.

Randolph opened with rounds of 67-68 at Pleasant Valley CC in Sutton, MA, and then added a brilliant third round 64 to take the lead heading into the final round. He was awarded his first title when rain washed out efforts to play the fourth round. He collected \$90,000 and a two-year exemption on TOUR for his efforts.

"My goal was to win and make over \$100,000," said Randolph. "Halfway through the year that seemed a little out of reach, but I just got hot at the right time."

His father is the club pro at LaCumbre CC in Santa Barbara and Sam took up the game on his own initiative saying, "My dad didn't force me, he encouraged me to play everything."

At age 14, Randolph began to get serious about the game and started to think about the possibility of playing on the TOUR. His brilliant junior record earned him a scholarship to University of Southern California where he earned second-team All-American honors as a frosh and then won three-straight first-team honors. He won 13 collegiate tournaments along the way.

Randolph left USC in 1986 and earned his card at his first PGA TOUR Qualifying Tournament with rounds of 69-72-70-72-71—426 over the difficult Dunes Course at LaQuinta Hotel and the TPC at PGA West.

His success on the amateur ranks had another benefit for him; he was able to play in a few professional tournaments before joining the TOUR.

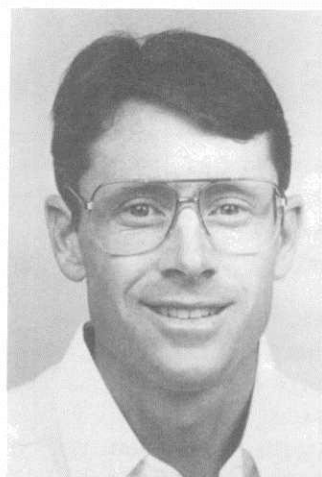
"I was lucky enough to be able to play in the Masters and the Open as an amateur, so I got to know a lot of guys before I came out on TOUR," said Randolph. "It was still tough, though; I improved as the year went along and I learned how to make cuts."

A solid striker of the ball, Randolph did indeed struggle in his first few months on TOUR, but a tie for fourth at the USF&G Classic in New Orleans earned him \$20,667 and gave him the boost of confidence he needed to be a success in his rookie year.

"Winning makes everything look a little different to me now," said Randolph. "Now when I see my name on the leaderboard I'll try and climb it instead of wondering if I can."

There's no doubt that we're going to see Sam Randolph's name on the leaderboard many times in the years to come.

Mike Reid found it difficult to express his feelings after the NEC World Series of Golf last year. And, for good reason. He had just won the coveted title by defeating Tom Watson in a playoff.

Reid and Watson tied at 5-under-par 275 and on the first extra hole, Mike made his par while Tom bogeyed.

It truly was the culmination of many years of hard work and dedication. The victory - the second of his career - gave him a 10-year exemption to all TOUR co-sponsored events.

There also were tears in Mike's eyes as he proudly accepted the winner's check in the Seiko-Tucson Open in the fall of 1987.

Mike has been one of the TOUR's more consistent players for many years but as good as he was, he could not break through and win. So, as his 11th season was coming to a close, he played brilliantly and won by four strokes. His victory also was extremely popular with his peers.

Mike enjoyed a treat in August of 1983 when he teamed with Bob Goalby for the Shootout at Jeremy Ranch in Park City, UT. This was a Senior PGA TOUR event, and the elder statesmen of the links were to choose a player from the regular TOUR. Mike and Bob teamed perfectly and they won by a stroke over the Billy Casper-Jim Nelford combination.

Mike's father was a Colonel in the Air Force when he retired, but during his growing-up days, Mike was in many different cities. At an early age, he realized golf was a game he could play alone, and it was a game that gave him something in common with others no matter where they lived.

His older brother, Bill, is head professional at the Tournament Players Club of Scottsdale, AZ, and has been Mike's biggest teacher. He also credits the John Geerstens, Senior and Junior, with assisting him.

Mike went to Brigham Young University, and was a teammate of Jim Nelford, John Fought and Pat McGowan. The first time he attempted to get his TOUR card, he made it, in the Fall of 1976. He progressed up the ladder the next three years, and his closest bout with victory was in the 1978 Pensacola Open. He lost in a playoff to Mac McLendon.

Larry Rinker started to play the game at the age of six when his brother, Laine, began taking him to junior golf clinics. Larry played in his first Florida State Junior tournament at the age of 12 and continued to play through high school and at the University of Florida.

While playing for the Gators, he won the 1978 Southeastern Conference championship and, upon graduation, was presented the Doug Beldon Award for athletic/academic excellence.

While playing on the mini-tours, he won 10 tournaments including six in 1980 and was voted the "player-of-the-year" by Florida Golf Week magazine.

Larry's first national exposure came at Pebble Beach in the 1982 United States Open Championship. He was in the final twosome of the third round and, after 40 holes, was tied for the lead. He eventually tied for 15th place.

Larry came into his own in 1984 after finishing second in the USF&G Classic in New Orleans. He finished 60th on the money list as he earned \$116,494.

He enjoyed a tremendous year in 1985. During the first three months, he had won more money than he had in any other single season. He earned big checks when he tied for second place in the Bing Crosby National Pro-Am and was third by himself in the Tournament Players Championship.

In 1985, Larry led the TOUR in eagles with 14. He also joined with his sister, Laurie Rinker, to win the JCPenney Mixed Team Championship.

Larry returned to the \$100,000-plus circle last year with one of his more consistent years. He has been working with John Redman. The improvement in his game has been noticeable.

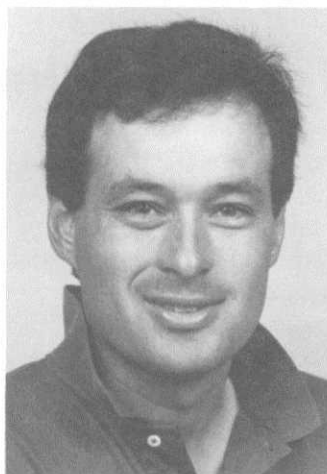

Loren Roberts would like to believe that he is on the PGA TOUR to stay; not as just another player but one who will continue to be a contender more frequently.

It has taken a great deal of patience on his part, but this mild-mannered Californian has emerged as a quality player after seven years on the TOUR. A different putter and a change of strokes seems to have made the difference.

Loren enjoyed good seasons in 1984 and again in 1985 when he comfortably gained exempt status, but his work with the blade on the greens started to diminish and the next two years were less than expected.

"I changed from a blade putter to a mallet," he said, "and I added two-and-a-half inches to the shaft so I would be more upright. And, with the heavier putter, I started to see immediate results."

There was more. "I used to be a stiff-wristed and shoulder putter, but I switched at the start of the year (January of 1988) to more hand action. It gave me more feel."

"I was always a pretty good putter, but I seemed to have one day when I'd be terrible. I started to have trouble with the speed, too. I had to do something to get more feel."

A look at his record for last year will tell you he made a good move. In his second start of the year, he tied for sixth place in the Hawaiian Open, although he collected bigger checks later in the summer with top 10 finishes in the Manufacturers Hanover-Westchester Classic and the Federal Express-St. Jude Classic in Memphis.

Interestingly enough, in 1984 when he earned exempt status for the first time, his two best efforts were at Westchester and Memphis.

Loren didn't start to play the game seriously until he was about 16-years old. He played a lot of tennis and baseball in high school in San Luis Obispo, CA, but the golf coach convinced him to concentrate on golf.

He worked for a while as an assistant pro at the San Luis Obispo Country Club. He said, "I didn't really set out to be a professional; it just sort of happened."

Through the years, his best finish on the TOUR was a third place in the Andy Williams-San Diego Open in 1985. He opened with a 65 at Torrey Pines, added three more rounds in the 60s and finished alone in third place, just one stroke out of the Woody Blackburn-Ron Streck playoff.

He has worked hard to reach this level and he gives considerable credit to Jim Swagerty, who was a head professional in the Los Angeles area for many years, but now is retired and living in San Diego.

Through most of his golfing career, enthusiasm for the game has been one of the strong points for Bill Rogers. No one in the game seemed to be having more fun than Bill.

While winning the 1981 World Series of Golf gave him a 10-year exemption to all PGA TOUR co-sponsored events, the spark that was present earlier in his career has diminished somewhat in recent seasons.

His last victory was in the 1983 USF&G Classic in New Orleans. "I had a very positive attitude," he said. "It was never the same after that."

Even in his fondest dreams, it would have been difficult for Bill to picture himself having a year such as 1981 and being named PGA Player-of-the-Year.

Winner of the World Series of Golf, the Heritage Classic and the Texas Open on TOUR, plus the British Open, Japan's Suntory Open and New South Wales Open in Australia; Rogers was dazzling once he got his act together starting with the Tournament Players Championship.

The year had a strange beginning. He was seventh in the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open and fourth in the Bob Hope Desert Classic. Then his game nearly fell apart. He missed cuts in five of his next six starts. He only tied for 51st in the TPC, but it was there, at Sawgrass, that he could see his game taking shape again. Indeed it did, because he won the Heritage Classic the next week.

Bill started to play at age nine in Montgomery, AL. The family moved to Texarkana, TX, shortly after that and Bill began to play competitive golf by the time he was 13. Although his father and brother started him, it was Jerry Robinson, professional at Northridge Country Club in Texarkana, who taught him the fine points of the game.

While attending the University of Houston, he was a roommate of Bruce Lietzke and the latter nicknamed him the "Panther." As Bill recalls, "I was the jumpy type. I never wanted to miss anything."

Bill's father was a lieutenant colonel in the Air Force and from age three to six, he lived in Germany; from age six through eight, he lived in Morocco, North Africa.

Clarence Rose gets better every year and last season he put together back-to-back efforts that nearly netted him a pair of victories.

He tied Bruce Lietzke in the GTE Byron Nelson Classic but lost the playoff on the first extra hole as Lietzke birdied. Clarence had all four rounds in the 60's en route to a 9-under-par 271 and collected \$81,000.

The next week, he moved down the road a few miles to Fort Worth and his first three rounds of 67, 68 and 65 for 10-under-par 200 on the tough Colonial Country Club course gave him a three-stroke lead in the Colonial National Invitation Tournament.

Unfortunately, he finished with 74 and a fifth-place finish but collected another \$30,000. The Texas total of \$111,000 spearheaded his drive to his best financial year ever.

He enjoyed the first big week of his career at the 1985 Southern Open when he started with a 64 and added three more rounds in the 60s to finish in second place, just two strokes behind his good friend, Tim Simpson.

In 1986, he had the two finest weeks of his TOUR life when he posted 66-68 for the last two rounds of the Los Angeles Open to finish as the runner-up to Doug Tewell; and the next week he tied for second place in the Honda Classic just one stroke behind Kenny Knox.

He had the fourth runner-up finish of his career in April of 1987 in the Greater Greensboro Open. He was two strokes in back of Scott Simpson.

Regarding course management, he said, "I do try to go for birdies and I make a lot of them, but I'm also trying to cut back on my mistakes." He has had well over 300 birdies in each of the last six years. He's also one of the longer drivers on TOUR.

Clarence's father was a "very good golfer," and he started him at about age 12. "I played baseball all the time, but once I started into golf, that ended my days in baseball," he said.

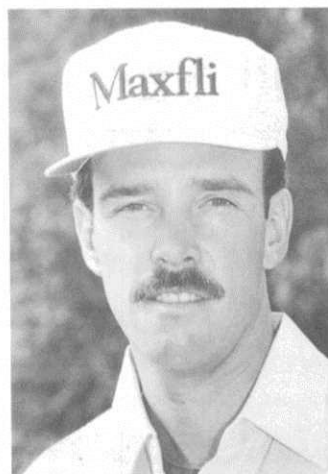
He won his first junior tournament at age 14, the North Carolina State Jaycees. He went on to win the North Carolina State Amateur, too.

He gained All-American status while at Clemson and in June of 1981, he entered the PGA TOUR School. He qualified easily, gaining a tie for fourth at Walt Disney World. "My last year at Clemson," he said, "I started to think about the possibility of being on the TOUR. I knew that's what I wanted, so I left school and spent about eight months just getting ready for it."

Until he started on TOUR, he played from right to left, but he changed his game over and now favors the fade.

He constantly checks his weekly statistics, and through those numbers, he believes he is better able to diagnose his strengths and weaknesses.

Dave Rummells grew up in the small town of West Branch, Iowa, where "about the only thing we had to do was play golf on a nine-hole course."

His father introduced him to the game at the age of five, but Dave says it really was his childhood friends who played together and we sort of taught one another how to play," he said.

His pals taught him well. Last year was his third on the PGA TOUR and he challenged several times with his best-ever finish being a tie for third place in the Bank of Boston Classic.

He challenged in the PGA Championship after middle rounds of 64 and 68, but a last-day 75 dropped him to sixth place.

All-in-all, it was very good year. "I'm really starting to feel comfortable out here," he said. "I've learned how to cut down on making so many bogies, as I did my first two years. You could say I've played smarter golf."

A golf scholarship sent him to the University of Iowa. After he graduated in 1981, he turned professional and headed for Florida.

He failed in three attempts to gain his PGA TOUR card, but he played the mini-tours and continued to practice every day outside his mobile home.

"I bought a mobile home in Iowa and had a friend tow it down to Orlando," said Rummells. "I'm next to a big open field where I can hit balls. That's why I moved there."

A good showing at the 1985 Qualifying Tournament earned Dave his PGA TOUR card and he struck paydirt quickly finishing in a tie for ninth at the Hawaiian Open and cashed a check for over \$11,000.

A few weeks later he finished a strong tie for 10th at the Tournament Players Championship and picked up another \$21,600 and he was on his way. During the course of his week at the difficult TPC, Rummells equalled Tom Watson's course record when he posted six consecutive birdies during his second round en route to a seven-under-par 65.

He also collected a big paycheck at Las Vegas, but he suffered an injury during that event and was forced to take six weeks off after he completed the tournament.

He set a goal of winning at least \$100,000 in 1987 and he easily achieved it. "The year was really consistent," he said. "Since I saw most of the courses for a second time, I know when and where not to be aggressive."

Dave Rummells has certainly come a long way from that nine-hole course in West Branch, Iowa.

When Bill Sander joined the PGA TOUR in the Spring of 1978, he thought "here we go. This is going to be fun."

He had won the U. S. Amateur Championship the summer before at Bel-Air Country Club in Los Angeles. At age 19, he was one of the youngest in modern times to do so. The next year, he played on the Walker Cup and World Amateur Cup teams.

He did miss in his first attempt to obtain his TOUR card in the Fall of 1977 but made it easily the next Spring.

"My first tournament," he recalls vividly, "was the Western Open. I played beautifully and on the last day, I was paired with Andy Bean. Andy won the tournament and I won a nice check. I thought it was great.

"The next week in Milwaukee, I played well again and was one-under par after 36 holes but I was shocked to discover I had missed the cut. The next week, I shot a 69 in the Monday qualifier for the Quad Cities Open and didn't make it.

"That's when I said to myself, 'Welcome to the TOUR'."

The years that followed were not too kind to Bill. It wasn't until 1985 when he tied for fourth in the Canadian Open and tied for seventh in the St. Jude-Memphis Classic that he finally broke through and earned exempt status.

"I had a good start in 1987 with two top 10s on the West Coast," he said. "I did well at Greensboro and Atlanta but for some reason, I started to fiddle with my swing." Toward the end of the year, he reverted back to his old swing and the results were better.

He had his "best-ever" finish last year in the Los Angeles Open. He started the week with a 70, and then added marvelous rounds of 69, 66 and 66 to tie for second place behind Chip Beck.

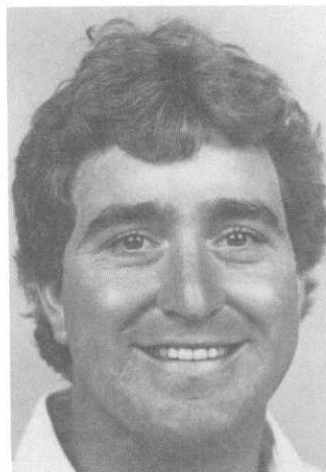
"I was off to a great start," he said, "but I was a little disappointed with the summer because I was ill. Toward the end of the year, I was much better again."

Bill started to play at age 13 when he was caddying at Inglewood Country Club in Seattle. He won three straight Seattle City Amateur titles, the first as a 17-year old.

During his early years, Billy Derrickson, who was the head pro at Inglewood, helped him the most. When he came on TOUR, he started to listen to suggestions from everyone. It took him awhile to realize he had to play his own game.

When everything is going right, he prefers to play right to left. Iron play, plus chipping and putting, are the strongest parts of his game.

Quietly, Gene Sauers has been elevating himself into the position of being one of the better players in the game.

The last few years, his name has appeared more frequently on the leaderboards of the PGA TOUR. He went all the way in the Fall of 1986 when he won the Bank of Boston Classic in a playoff over Blaine McCallister.

Interestingly enough, his best finish in 1987 was in the same tournament and he tied for second behind Sam Randolph.

The one that got away in 1987 was in his own backyard. He has lived all his life in Savannah, GA, and on nearby Hilton Head Island in the MCI-Heritage Classic, he was tied for the lead going into the final round. A third-day 64 put him in that position, but a 73 the last afternoon dropped him into a tie for third place.

He put together another good year in 1988. "Overall, I was pleased with it," he said. "I need to work on my short game, my chipping and putting to be more consistent."

His ability to finish strong helped him considerably. His was third in the Anheuser-Busch Classic with a 67-66 finish. He was fourth in the Hawaiian Open with 67-69 the last two days and also in the Las Vegas Invitational with 68-68 finish.

It all added up to the most profitable year of his career and he has collected more than \$500,000 over the last two seasons.

Gene went through the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1983. He was the youngest player on the circuit when he started in 1984, but during the early weeks of the season, he didn't get into many tournaments.

Once the three-time Georgia State Open champion got his chance to play consistently towards the end of the season, he made the most of his chances. His steady play down the stretch was highlighted by a tie for fifth at Pensacola in the final event of the season.

The 1985 season started out in similar fashion. In mid-season, though, Sauers got his chance to play regularly and capitalized with a strong three-week stretch that saw him finish in a tie for 16th at Quad Cities, a tie for 4th at Buick and a tie for 11th at the B. C. Open. His check for \$18,000 at Buick propelled him into the top 125 money winners, a position he would not relinquish.

Gene started in the game at age nine when he would tag along with his father and brother out to the golf course on the weekends.

"They'd bring along an extra club and I'd hit it around," Sauers recalls. "My brother was a good golfer (played at Columbus College) and I'd go out to practice with him and beat balls around."

"It's always been the dream of my life to be able to say I've won on the PGA TOUR. Now that I've done it, I can't describe the feeling."

Tom Sieckmann was one happy fellow after he won the 1988 Anheuser-Busch Golf Classic in a playoff over Mark Wiebe at the Kingsmill Golf Club.

Wiebe, who won the same title in 1985, masked his own disappointment with kind words for his friend.

"Tom is really a fine player," he said. "He's been grinding it out, paying his dues, paying a LOT of dues. I'm sorry for me but I'm really happy for him."

The victory was rather unexpected. Everyone knew Tom had the skills to win, but prior to the A-B Classic, he had won money in only three of 16 events. He missed the cut in his opener at Phoenix and then tied for fourth place in the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am for his all-time best TOUR finish. The next week, he tied for 23rd in the Hawaiian Open.

Then came a horrible stretch when he missed the cut in 12 straight events before coming through with a tie for 19th in the Western Open—the week before going to Kingsmill.

He stayed close to the lead through the first two rounds and then was tied with Peter Jacobsen and Kenny Knox after three at 12-under-par 201. While Jacobsen and Knox faltered slightly, Wiebe took the lead midway through the incoming nine with a birdie at the 13th to go 14-under-par. He finished at that figure.

Sieckmann birdied the 13th to go 14, but bogeyed the 15th to drop a shot off the pace. He came back with a birdie at the 17th and eventually tied at 14-under-par 270.

Tom and Mark both parred the first extra hole and then Tom won it on the next by making a par from the left fringe while Wiebe missed the green, chipped long and two putted for bogey.

He was a basketball player as a youngster, but as the years moved along, he knew golf would be his game. He went to the University of Nebraska, but soon transferred to Oklahoma State University.

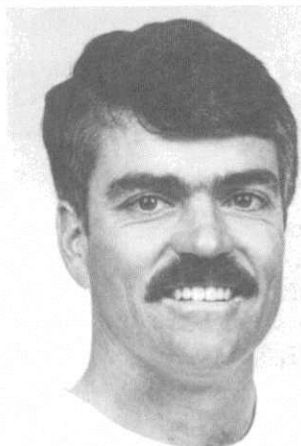
Mike Holder, the Cowboys' golf coach, said, "Bob Tway and Willie Wood were our best players in those days but Tom was with them and they formed one of the best teams I've ever had."

He had his problems trying to get on the PGA TOUR, but whenever he went elsewhere to look for a game, he found success. He won several times overseas and 1981 was the banner year when he won three times—the Philippine Open, Thailand Open and the Brazilian Open.

He finally made it onto the TOUR in a rather impressive fashion. He tied for second in the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1984. He earned \$30,052 for his first year in 1985 with a tie for 12th place in the Byron Nelson Classic his best. Unfortunately, he finished 143rd on the money list.

He went back to the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1985 in an effort to improve his position on the priority list. He did that as he earned medalist honors.

Scott Simpson has been a strong, steady player for many years so it wasn't surprising to those who follow the game closely that he could win the grandest prize of them all—the United States Open Championship.

He did it in 1987 at the Olympic Club in San Francisco, winning by one stroke over Tom Watson. He did it with a brilliant final nine holes as he registered three birdies and saved par on three other occasions with splendid recovery shots.

His birdies came in succession, starting at the 14th hole where he hit a seven iron to four feet and made the putt. Then he made putts of 30 feet at the 15th and 15 feet at the 16th. He finished the day with a 2-under-par 68 and a total of 3-under-par 277.

"I feel overwhelmed that I could win a tournament such as the U.S. Open," he said. "This totally is a dream come true for me."

Earlier in the year, he braved the wind and cold to win the Greater Greensboro Open. By season's end, he had earned \$621,032 and was ranked fourth. He had 10 top 10 finishes in 25 official starts.

His first victory on TOUR was in the 1980 Western Open and he admitted it came as something of a surprise. He took the lead after the second round and finished with all four rounds at par or less. He also won the 1984 Manufacturers Hanover Westchester Classic, thanks to a 6-under-par 65 the final afternoon.

Scott had an excellent amateur record, winning the National Collegiate titles in 1976 and 1977 for the University of Southern California. "It was after I won it the first time that I thought I would make a career in golf, and someday turn professional. I felt if I could win over a field such as that, then maybe I had a chance."

He also won two PAC-8 titles for the Trojans and was a member of Uncle Sam's Walker Cup team in 1977. He seemed to be a sure thing.

Yet, he met the disappointment that so many young players have had to face, twice failing to make it through the TOUR's tough Qualifying School. He finally made it the third time, in the Fall of 1978.

There may never be another week on the PGA TOUR for Tim Simpson to compare with the one he experienced during the 1985 Southern Open. It was the week when he took the final step and won his first tournament.

Tim has always had the talent to succeed—and he has been successful—but if there was any one thing that kept him from the winner's circle, it probably was his putting.

A keen student of psychology, he has been working with Dr. Bob Rotella, the sports psychologist. It was Rotella who told him, "from my observations and from what I've heard from others, the one missing link in your game is your putting." He stressed the need for Tim to relax more.

During the week of the Southern Open at the Green Island Country Club, the hard work and dedication paid off. In fact, after he shot 12-under-par 64-64—128 the first two days, he said, "In the 22 years I've been playing golf, I've never hit the ball better. I haven't missed a shot in two days."

He held the Southern Open lead through the third and fourth rounds, holding off the challenge of Clarence Rose.

He nearly won the Southern again in 1987. He tied for second place with a splendid 66 the final afternoon. His most impressive performance of the year came in the Tournament Players Championship. A third-round 66 helped him to a solo third place.

A rotator cuff problem cut into his effectiveness early last year but he went on to another fine season and continuing his role as one of the game's leading players.

Tim's father, Jack, started him in the game as a seven-year old and he went on to win junior championships of Atlanta and Georgia. "I owe a lot to my father," he said. "He worked hard so I could afford to play and he has always stood behind me. He has been the guiding force in my life."

Another who helped to mold his game is Art Kraft Jr., the pro at the Ansley Country Club in Atlanta. "I've been working with Art since I was 15-years old," Tim said.

Tim went on to the University of Georgia and earned all-Southeastern Conference and All-America honors. He won the Southern Amateur in 1976. In the Spring of 1977, he earned his player's card.

Those who know Tim also know there are three other people who have helped turn his career around — his wife, Kathy, son Christopher and daughter Katie. "They gave purpose to my life," he said.

Joey Sindelar is a player with extremely impressive credentials and each year his position rises a few notches. He's close to the best now.

As an example of how other people view his talents, he was the first player chosen in the Nabisco Team Charity draft last fall, by the Kmart Greater Greensboro Open.

Joey won twice last year—in the Honda Classic and The International—to raise his TOUR total to five through five seasons. He also was second twice—losing in a playoff at Hartford—and had 10 top 10 finishes. He was near the money lead all year and finally finished third with \$813,732.

When he talks of his golf game and his goals, he always says, "we." He'll tell you, "We talked it over and decided . . ." The other party in the "we" is his father, the man who first put a club in Joey's hands when he was six-years old.

"My Dad always stressed that if anything is worth doing, it's worth doing right. He's always been behind everything I've done.

Through high school, Joey knew that if he was going to go to college, it would have to be on a scholarship, so he worked extra hard on his golf game. There were offers, but he decided on Ohio State because "I had met a few of their players when I would go to amateur tournaments, and they were really nice to me.

"The fact that Jack Nicklaus, Tom Weiskopf and Ed Sneed had played for Ohio State helped to influence me, too," he added with a smile.

He was devastating for the Buckeyes. He won 10 collegiate events and in 1981, he won the Big Ten championship by 12 strokes. He was named Ohio State's Athlete-of-the-Year in 1981.

Along the way, he managed to sweep the New York State titles—Junior, Amateur and Open championships.

The PGA TOUR was his goal, though, and he made it through the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1983, finishing in a tie for third.

His first win came at the Greater Greensboro Open when he holed an eight-foot-par-saving putt on the 72nd hole to win by one and then later in the year he won again at the B. C. Open edging Mike Reid for the title in front of his hometown fans.

Jeff Sluman turned in one of the great finishing rounds in PGA Championship history and won going away in August of 1988.

He started the last day three strokes behind Paul Azinger and then proceeded to shoot a brilliant 6-under-par 65 to win by three strokes over Azinger. Jeff had two birdies and an eagle (holed a sand wedge shot from 115 yards) on the outgoing nine, and returned with three birdies and a lone bogey.

"I accomplished one of the things I've always wanted to do," he said, "and that was to win. And, to make my first one a major, well, that's very special to me."

During the last four years, Jeff has climbed steadily up the ladder of success. "Practice," he said, "more than anything else and maybe a little sharper mentally," when asked for the reasons.

He also finished third in the 1988 K mart Greater Greensboro Open after starting with a tournament record 15-under-par 64-65—129.

Jeff nearly had his first victory in the 1987 Tournament Players Championship, but he lost on the third extra hole of his playoff to Sandy Lyle.

When introduced to the game of golf at an early age, he had no goals or aspirations to be a professional golfer. Started in the game by his family at age four, Sluman didn't even think about turning pro until after his senior year at Florida State University. After a solid collegiate career that saw him win the Metro Conference title, Sluman opted for a career in golf.

Sluman turned professional in 1980 and in the fall of 1982 he earned his PGA TOUR card. However, he won only \$13,643 in 1983 and finished 171st on the money list and lost his playing privileges.

After sitting out the 1984 season, Sluman returned to the Qualifying Tournament in the Fall of 1984 and posted rounds of 74-74-69-70-74-72—433 to finish 23rd and regain his player's card.

Jeff won the 1985 Tallahassee Open when it was part of the Tournament Players Series, so it was unofficial. It also was special, however, since he had three rounds of 65 and won by a stroke over Gary Player and former FSU teammate Kenny Knox.

J. C. Snead remembers it as the most satisfying week of his fine career. It was the week of the 1987 Manufacturers Hanover Westchester Classic and, at age 46, he won it in a playoff over Seve Ballesteros. It was his eighth victory since starting on the TOUR in the fall of 1968, but it also was his first since he won the 1981 Southern Open in a playoff over Mike Sullivan.

J. C. moved in contention at Westchester with a six-under par 65 the third day and it put him three strokes in back of Mike Reid.

The last afternoon, he fashioned a one-under-par 70 for an eight-under-par 276, while Seve's 72 left him with the same score.

"I birdied the last two holes," J. C. said, "and Seve came along behind me and did the same thing."

On the first extra hole, Ballesteros drove the ball behind a pine tree and that was the start of his problems, while J. C. routinely parred it for a victory.

Those who know J. C. well, know him as a fellow with a great sense of humor and a heart as big as all-outdoors. However, with a touch of brusqueness and a sly smile, he'll deny it all.

He has a wonderful sense of humor. Several years ago, he decided he wanted to go by his full name, Jesse Carlyle. After a few weeks of not playing well, he informed everyone he was going back to using J. C. because "Jesse Carlyle hasn't been playing worth a damn."

Jesse Carlyle, although constantly mentioned as the nephew of the legendary Sam Snead, stands on his own performance record. He was a superb athlete in other sports while growing up in Hot Springs, and at one time, sought a career in baseball. He was in the Washington Senators' farm system before turning to golf as a career in 1964.

He worked for a couple of years as an assistant pro at the Century Country Club in Westchester County, NY, before obtaining his TOUR card. He burst into prominence in 1971 by winning twice in a three-week period at Tucson and Doral immediately before and after the PGA Championship at Palm Beach Gardens, FL.

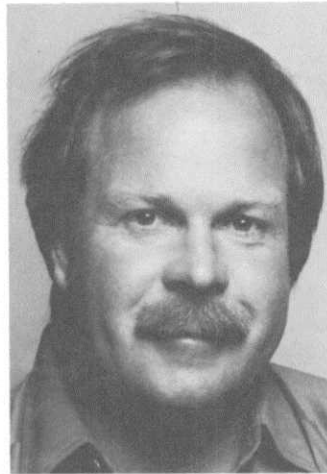

Whatever Craig Stadler accomplishes during the rest of his career, his followers will fondly remember 1982. It was the year he broke away from the field and went from being a good player to a superstar.

He won four times, starting the year by capturing the first event, the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open. He won two of the year's more significant events, the Masters Tournament in a playoff over Dan Pohl and the World Series of Golf in a playoff over Raymond Floyd. His other victory was in the Kemper Open by an impressive seven strokes.

He won the Arnold Palmer Award as the leading money winner, as he earned \$446,462. Until 1985, only Tom Watson and Mark O'Meara had won more in a single season. He said there were two keys to his improved play. First, he drove the ball better than ever, and he putted much better.

In 1985, he led the Bob Hope Classic through the third and fourth rounds but Lanny Wadkins tied him the last afternoon with a 65 and then Lanny won the playoff with a birdie on the fifth extra hole. He also finished second in the Hawaiian Open. It's interesting to note that he was 47-under par in the Hope and Hawaiian tournaments, yet finished second twice.

One of these years, he figures to win the Hawaiian Open. In 1987 he tied the course record with a 62 in the third round to take the lead, but Corey Pavin shot a 64 the last afternoon to tie him and then Corey won the playoff with a birdie on the second extra hole.

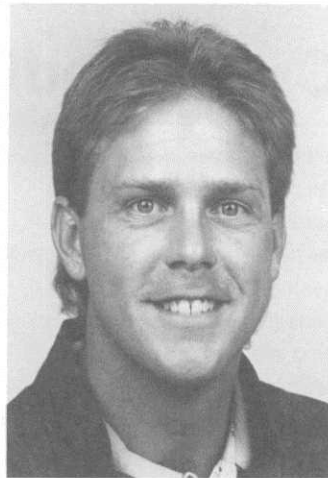
He joined the TOUR in the spring of 1976, and gained his first victory in the Bob Hope Desert Classic in January of 1980. Later in the year, he added the Greater Greensboro Open title to his laurels.

Before turning professional in 1975, Craig compiled an excellent amateur record, highlighted by his victory in the 1973 U. S. Amateur Championship at the Inverness Club in Toledo.

He had given some thought to leaving the University of Southern California after that triumph, but changed his mind. He went on to be an All-America choice in 1974 and 1975 and was named to the 1975 Walker Cup team. He also has played on two Ryder Cup teams.

Craig first played the game at age five with the assistance of his father and really became interested at age "eight or nine."

There should be a place in the history book of golf for what Payne Stewart did after he won the Hertz-Bay Hill Classic in March of 1987.

To the surprise of everyone, he donated his entire check of \$108,000 to the Florida Hospital Golden Circle of Friends Home "in memory of my father," William Louis Stewart, who died of cancer two years previous to the day.

"I had set a goal of winning," he said, "and I wanted to do something special in my father's name. He was the man who helped me more than anyone else to play this game."

It was a long time between victories although few people knocked at the door more often. He won the 1982 Quad Cities Open and then the 1983 Walt Disney World Classic, but nothing else until Bay Hill. Interestingly enough, his home is on the Bay Hill course.

Three years ago, for example, Payne had 16 top 10 finishes in 29 starts and earned \$535,389.

In his pastel plus-fours, socks and cap, Payne certainly has become the most colorful dresser on TOUR. People frequently now ask him what he is going to wear each day.

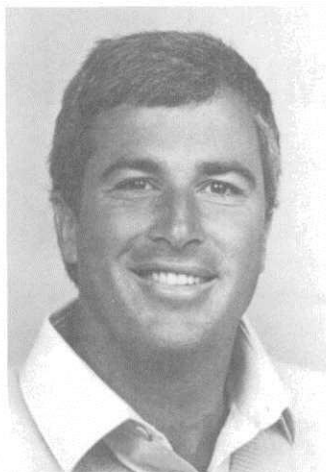
Payne's golfing career progressed in an orderly fashion through junior programs, high school and finally to a golf scholarship at Southern Methodist University. While there, Payne won several collegiate events, including the 1979 co-championship of the Southwest Conference. Quite simply, he was on a roll when he finished school, and he felt confident he was ready to conquer the PGA TOUR.

As so many others before him, Payne failed at the Qualifying School in the Fall of 1979.

A two-year stint in Asia (1980-81) proved to be just what the doctor ordered.

With victories in the 1981 Indian and Indonesian Opens under his belt, plus his marriage to Tracey Ferguson, an Australian girl he met while in Malaysia, Payne returned to the U. S. to attend the 1981 spring Q School. This time he was successful, and it was off to the "main event."

Curtis Strange now stands with the greats in the history of the game. He gets a little embarrassed when someone mentions it, but as Hale Irwin said, "Curtis is the best player in the world today." Period!

All you have to do is look at his record. He has won the coveted Arnold Palmer Award as the leading money winner on TOUR in three of the last four years - and set records each time. Last year, he collected a staggering \$1,147,644 and became the first to go over \$1 million in a year.

It was a brilliant 1988. Highlighting the season was an impressive United States Open playoff victory over Nick Faldo of England, 71 to 75 at The Country Club in Brookline, MA.

He climaxed the season with another effort in the Nabisco Championships, defeating Tom Kite in a playoff at Pebble Beach with a birdie on the second extra hole (the 17th on the course). He lofted a four iron to within 18 inches of the cup.

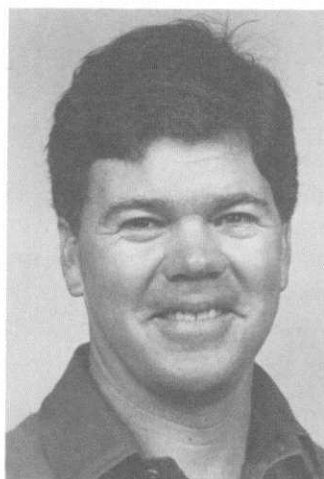
It was worth \$360,000 plus the season-long bonus money of \$175,000 for a total of \$535,000 official. He also led the Independent Insurance Agent Open team from Houston to first place in the Nabisco Team Charity competition, so Houston received \$500,000 for its charities.

Earlier in the year, Curtis won the Independent Insurance Agent Open in a playoff over Greg Norman and also the Memorial Tournament.

It gave him 11 triumphs in the last four years on TOUR. He was everyone's player-of-the-year in 1988.

Curtis started to play at age seven, "and by the time I was eight, I was playing every day." His father was a golf professional and owned the White Sands Country Club in Virginia Beach, Va.

Mike Sullivan is one of those fellows with considerable potential and when he has been physically ready to go, he has played some marvelous golf. Over the years he has had some problems with his back and that doesn't help his big, powerful swing.

Mike's talents were never better displayed than they were in the final round of the Texas Open last fall. He shot a spectacular 7-under-par 28 for the first nine holes - the low nine on TOUR last year - and finished with a 7-under par 63. It vaulted him into a tie for fifth place. A few weeks earlier, a 69-67 finish gave him a tie for fourth in the Canadian Open. His only TOUR victory came in the 1980 Southern Open at Columbus, GA. A second-round 63 gave him the lead he never relinquished and he won by five strokes. The next week, he nearly did it again, finishing in a tie for second at the Pensacola Open.

In 1981, he almost made it two Southern titles in a row, as a last-day 64 placed him in a tie with J. C. Snead but Snead won it in a playoff on the second extra hole.

Another victory came his way in 1984 when he teamed with Don January to win the Shootout at Jeremy Ranch in Utah on the Senior PGA TOUR. "I went to the University of Florida with Don's son Tim, and that's when I first met him."

His back simply would not let him perform up to his expectations in 1985 and 1987.

His fastest start was in 1980 when he opened the season in superstar fashion. He tied for second in the Bob Hope Desert Classic and finished third the next week in the Phoenix Open, earning \$44,600 for those two splendid efforts. He had won, in those two outings, more than he had won in any full season prior to that. Three weeks later, Mike suffered severe back muscle spasms and was off the TOUR for five weeks.

Mike played a lot of golf with his father when he was a youngster. "He was a scratch amateur, and taught me everything in those days."

Living in Ocala, Fla., his father took him to see the Florida Citrus Open in Orlando, and the old Greater Jacksonville Open. He went to the University of Florida briefly—and had Andy Bean for a roommate—but he wanted to play golf, and not go to school.

He missed twice in attempting to qualify for the TOUR, but made it in the Fall of 1976.

In the 1978 Buick Open, he tied with Jack Newton of Australia but lost the playoff.

Hal Sutton keeps searching for ways to get better but true to the mark of a great competitor, he says he isn't as good as he knows he can be and expects to be.

His first victory was in his rookie season of 1982. He won twice in 1983, added two more in 1985 and was a double winner again in 1986. During the "non-win" years, he knocked at the door constantly, but something always seemed to happen to keep him out.

Two years ago, a superb final round of 64 in the Phoenix Open at the new TPC of Scottsdale nearly was good enough to catch Paul Azinger, but the Zinger held on to win his first.

At the 1987 Panasonic Las Vegas Invitational, Hal was closing in on victory again, but Azinger came roaring from out of the pack, made eagle at the final hole with a long, long putt, and won by a stroke over Hal. He also was second to Mike Reid in the Seiko-Tucson Open.

His greatest season had to be 1983. He won the Tournament Players Championship and the PGA Championship and went on to be the No. 1 money winner with \$426,668.

Although his father did not play the game, Hal said he always was the "moving force behind me." A friend of his father's sent him a set of clubs when he was 11, and that was the start. "I played some team sports, but it was discouraging because I never seemed to be on a good team. I decided I wanted to win or lose on my own ability and that's why I chose golf."

As a 12- and 13-year old, he would take his father's cart and "sometimes play 72 holes a day." He said he only had mediocre success until his junior year at Centenary College, although he did win the Louisiana State Junior title in 1974.

Hal won the 1980 U. S. Amateur at the Country Club of North Carolina and was named Golf Magazine College Player of the Year, also in 1980. At the time, there was talk that he might forever remain an amateur.

"I went to work for my Dad and would go as long as a month without playing at all," he said. "When I did try to play, I didn't have any feel. I had put so much into the game to that point, I felt it was senseless to give it all up. I could always go back into business, but in later years, I couldn't go back to the game at the level I wanted. So I decided to turn professional and go on TOUR."

There was never any doubt in Brian Tennyson's mind. He knew as a 12-year old that he wanted to play on the PGA TOUR.

It took him awhile to make it - four attempts in the TOUR's Qualifying Tournament - but he was successful in the fall of 1987. Now, after just one season, Brian has established himself as one of the better young players in the game.

"Actually," he said with a smile, "I was a little disappointed with my first year, but I was also happy to achieve a couple of my goals. I wanted to win at least \$100,000 and that would let me keep my TOUR card.

"The TOUR is a little different than I thought it would be. I thought I was very well prepared, since I had played a lot of tournament golf here and overseas, but it was tough adjusting to it at first."

He demonstrated his skills early in the season with four good rounds at the USF&G Classic and the next week he tied for fourth place in the Independent Insurance Agent Open in Houston.

"Do you realize," he said grinning, "that I shot a lower score (275) than the winner did the year before in Houston (Jay Haas, 276), yet I still lost by five strokes."

Just for the record, the three players ahead of him were Curtis Strange and Greg Norman in the playoff won by Strange and Tom Kite was alone in third place. That's heavyweight competition.

Brian started to play golf at about the age of eight. The youngest of nine children, his mother and father were the first to put a club in his hands. An older brother, Roger, is a Class A PGA teaching professional.

Brian played through high school and he also lettered in soccer. He went to Ball State University and played for four more years, winning eight events and gaining All-American status. That's also where he met his wife, Jeanne.

He turned professional after graduation and tried three times to qualify for the TOUR with out success. In 1986, he only missed by a stroke.

So, he played where he could including 10 tournaments on the Asian Tour in 1987 and he won twice, the Indian Open and the Philippine Open.

He turns to Mike Adams, the Director of Golf at the Academy of Golf at the Hills of Lakeway in Austin, TX, when he needs help. "Without Mike's help," he said, "I'd probably be looking for another line of work. He made the big change in my game."

There were many memorable accomplishments on the PGA TOUR in 1986 and Doug Tewell's performance in the Los Angeles Open has to rank with the best of them.

Playing the great Riviera Country Club course, Doug shot rounds of 66 and 63 the last two days and won by seven strokes over Clarence Rose. He took the lead the third day when he birdied the first six holes and then set sail for the victory.

He saved his best until near the end in 1987. After taking a month off the TOUR, he went to the Pensacola Open. It was close until the final nine holes, then he ran away from the field and eventually won by four strokes.

He finished with an 8-under-par 64 at the Buick Open last summer and it vaulted him into a second place finish, just two strokes behind Scott Verplank.

Last year also was the year Doug branched out into golf resort management as a project consultant. He has the skills and foresight needed to be very successful.

Doug said he "will remember forever" his first round in the 1985 PGA Championship at Cherry Hills Country Club. He shot a course record 64 and went on to a respectable tie for 12th place.

His biggest year was in 1980 when he won twice, in the Sea Pines Heritage Classic in a playoff over Jerry Pate; and in the IVB-Philadelphia Classic. In the latter event, he was 10-strokes behind after two rounds but closed brilliantly with 65-67 to win by one over Tom Kite.

Doug started to play golf at about age 12 and his first teacher was Labron Harris, Sr. at the Lakeside club in Stillwater, Okla.

After being graduated from Oklahoma State University, he worked as an assistant professional for two years and then moved on as head pro at the Pinetop Country Club in Pinetop, Ariz. This is Leonard Thompson's 18th year on the PGA TOUR and the big fellow from Wake Forest has had his moments of glory.

Three years ago, he finished third twice, in the Pensacola Open and in the Greater Greensboro Open, but it was a tie for fifth place in the Western Open that brought him satisfaction.

"I had a putt of 12 feet on the last hole to get in the playoff," he recalls. "Even though I missed it, it was satisfying to play well on a tough course and be in contention." (Tom Kite won the four-way playoff).

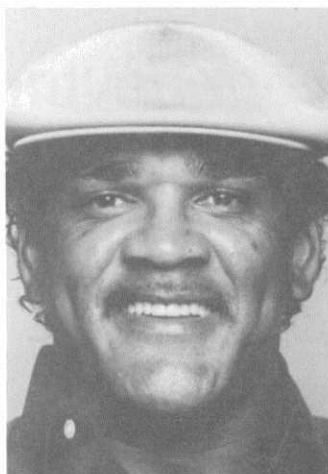
In 1981, Leonard had a day to remember as he shot a course record 31-31—62 at Glen Abbey Golf Club in the Canadian Open. He only missed one green but still birdied as he chipped in from off the edge. He used the same golf ball for 18 holes and then presented it to the Royal Canadian Golf Association for its museum at Glen Abbey.

Leonard joined the TOUR in the fall of 1971, earning his card in his second attempt at the Qualifying School. He had sharpened his game at Wake Forest and was a teammate of such players as Lanny Wadkins and Joe Inman.

He progressed steadily and in 1974 won at Inverrary and eventually went over the \$100,000 mark for the first time. His victory at Pensacola came as he sank a 50-foot putt on the final hole for a birdie and a two-stroke margin over Curtis Strange.

A native North Carolinian, one of the highlights of his career was the course record seven-under par 29 on the back nine at Pinehurst No. 2, set in the 1977 Colgate Hall of Fame Classic.

Jim Thorpe may be in the record book for a long time as the last player to win back-to-back match play championships.

He capped a brilliant 1985 season by defeating Jack Renner in the final of the Seiko-Tucson Match Play event and he followed with a repeat victory in Tucson in 1986 when he defeated Scott Simpson. Each victory was worth \$150,000.

Tucson returned to the stroke-play format in 1987 but Jim had to miss it. He underwent surgery on his left wrist/thumb on September 30. He also had to miss most of last year because of it, so he is playing in 1989 on a "special medical extension." He added last fall, "it feels good again."

Four years ago, Jim even went beyond his own dreams as he compiled an outstanding record. He won twice, in the Greater Milwaukee Open when he outdueled Jack Nicklaus down the stretch and then in Tucson.

He nearly won for a third time. In the Western Open, he came from behind the last afternoon to tie amateur Scott Verplank. Unfortunately for Jim, Verplank won the playoff with a par on the second extra hole.

He is the ninth of 12 children. He grew up in a large home off the second fairway at the Roxboro (NC) Golf Club where his father, Elvert, was the greens superintendent. He says with a laugh, "We used to go out after dark and hit shots by the back porch light."

Jim was quite a football player in high school and earned a scholarship to Morgan State. He was a running back, and a powerful one at that, but after a year, he abandoned the sport and then left school after two years to devote more time to golf.

"There were five boys in the family," Jim says, "and my father was the one who started me playing golf, but in those days, I would rather play football. My brother, Chuck, was the best golfer in the family."

Chuck was on the PGA TOUR in the early 1970s and it was Chuck who gave Jim some sound advice regarding the TOUR. "I couldn't hit my long irons very well, so one day Chuck said we should go to Pinehurst and he would help me with my game. We played and practiced and played some more. Finally, one day, Chuck said, 'You're ready!'"

Jim obtained his TOUR card in the Fall of 1975, but he only won \$2,000, so he went home again. In the Fall of 1978, he was back in the School, this time better prepared, and was co-medalist with John Fought in the Q-School. Early the next year, he let everyone know he was indeed ready, as he tied with Tom Watson for second place in the Joe Garagiola-Tucson Open, two strokes behind Bruce Lietzke.

It would take a book this size to tell the Lee Trevino story but, briefly enough, he already has left his mark as one of the great players and personalities in the history of golf.

He has won 27 times on the TOUR. As entertaining as he has been on the golf course for the last two decades, he now has developed into one of the leading golf analysts as he sits in the booth for NBC telecasts.

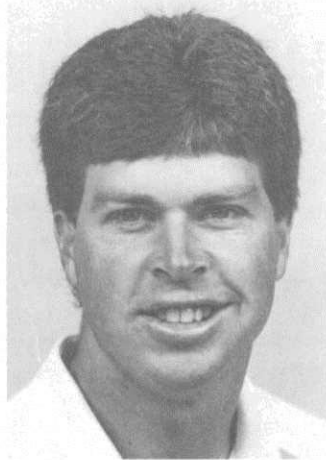
When Lee won his second PGA crown in 1984, it was one of the outstanding sports stories of the year. At age 44, he outlasted Gary Player and Lanny Wadkins at Shoal Creek, AL, by shooting all four rounds in the 60's.

Until he won the 1984 PGA, Trevino had gone three-and-a-half years without a victory. His problem had been his back. He suffered with pain, sometimes severe, but never complained publicly. He always maintained his "Merry Mex" attitude. Some believe his problems originated when he was struck by lightning at the 1975 Western Open. In November of 1976, he underwent an operation for a herniated disc.

Lee's greatest year on TOUR was 1980 when he collected three titles, \$385,814, and won his fifth Vardon Trophy with a scoring average of 69.73 for 82 rounds. His average was the lowest on TOUR since Sam Snead's 69.23 in 1950.

Trevino tied for 54th in the 1966 U.S. Open at Olympic Club in San Francisco. A year later at Baltusrol, he placed sixth in the U. S. Open, and was on the TOUR to stay. Twelve months later, he was entertaining everyone at the marguerita party at Oak Hill CC, Rochester, where he had just won the 1968 U.S. Open. Lee won the U. S. Open again in 1971, defeating Jack Nicklaus in a playoff.

It was a year to remember for Bob Tway in 1986 and with the talent he displayed, he could go on to have many more. He certainly is one of the more skilled players in the game.

He was the TOUR's leading winner with four victories. He highlighted the season by dramatically holing a bunker shot on the final hole to win the PGA Championship after a tense duel with Greg Norman.

He went on to be named the PGA Player-of-the-Year. He finished as the No. 2 money winner with \$652,780 and remarkably, was only \$516 behind Norman. However, he added another \$500,000 to his account at the end of the season as the winner of the inaugural season-long Vantage Cup competition.

He broke through for the first time in the 1986 Shearson Lehman Brothers-Andy Williams Open. Due to weather, only 54 holes were played and Bob found himself tied with Bernhard Langer but he went on to win the playoff with a par on the second extra hole.

A second-round 63 set the stage for his triumph in the Manufacturers Hanover Westchester Classic. He finished with a 64 in Georgia-Pacific Atlanta Classic and passed Hal Sutton on the way to the bank.

Last year, he lost twice in playoff to Steve Jones in the AT&T Pebble Beach Pro-Am and to David Frost in the Southern Open.

During his years at Oklahoma State University, Bob earned All-American status three times. He won the 1981 Fred Haskins award as the outstanding college-player-of-the-year.

Working under the watchful eye of Mike Holder, the golf coach at OSU, his game matured rapidly. However, it seemed he could play well until it came time to tee it up in the Qualifying School. The first three times he tried to get through it, he missed.

Bob started to play golf at age five. "I'd follow my grandfather and father around the course," he said. He was "about seven" when he played in his first junior tournament.

The family moved to Marietta, GA, when he was a youngster and Bob played basketball during his first two years in high school. Golf was his game, though.

Howard Twitty came on strong toward the end of last season and was able to retain his exempt status, although he was not especially happy about his overall performance in 1988.

After enjoying good seasons in 1986 and 1987 he was expecting to keep his game on a high level, but, at one stretch early last year, he failed to make the cut in eight of nine starts. He rebounded to save a good season, commenting, "it's taken a lot of hard work on my swing and my putting."

He knows, though, he may never again play the game as well as he did in a stretch of 3½ tournaments in mid-summer of 1980. He went through 14 rounds with 13 of them being in the 60's and was 57-under-par.

One of those weeks ended in a victory, as he defeated Jim Simons on the sixth extra hole in the Sammy Davis, Jr.-Greater Hartford Open. In the others, he was second in the Greater Milwaukee Open, fifth in the Quad Cities Open, and, after the victory, he started 64-66 in the IVB-Philadelphia Classic but then the bubble burst.

Howard's first TOUR victory came the year before in the B. C. Open when he outplayed two close friends, Tom Purtzer and Doug Tewell on the 72nd hole. They were tied through 71, but Howard managed a par on the home hole and that gave him the victory.

One of the biggest men on the TOUR at six-feet-five, 200 pounds, he once was asked why he didn't concentrate on football. With a grin, he replied "I like to keep my blood in my body."

Twitty believes now that his ample physical proportions probably slowed his progress in golf at an early age. He started to play at age 10 but it wasn't until he was a senior in high school in Phoenix that his game started to develop.

"I was about 6'3" when I was a sophomore," he recalls, "and I was terrible. I guess I just needed time to catch up with my body. I didn't have the coordination that I needed."

As a sophomore and junior at Arizona State, Twitty really showed progress, however. He won the important Sunnehanna and Porter Cup amateur events and, when he was a senior, he finished right behind the co-champions of the NCAA championship, Ben Crenshaw and Tom Kite from the University of Texas.

Twitty turned pro in 1973 and twice failed in the PGA TOUR Qualifying School before meeting success in June, 1975. That was the same year he also won the Thailand Open during a second trip to the Far East circuit.

By winning the 1988 Buick Open, Scott Verplank finally was able to put to rest the pressure of trying to win a PGA TOUR event as a professional. It had taken Verplank over two years to fulfill the expectations of most of the golfing world, after winning the 1985 Western Open as an amateur.

Scott fired four steady rounds of 66-66-70-66 to take the Buick title, and his 268 total tied him for the second best score ever at the Warwick Hills Country Club.

Since winning the Western Open, Verplank's professional play had not been what everyone expected. He had struggled through his first two seasons, and finished out of the top 125 money winners both years. Because of this he ended up losing his exemption for winning the Western, and he was forced to go to the Qualifying School for the first time. He survived the grueling ordeal, and finished a very respectable sixth, which earned him back his TOUR card.

However, 1988 was much the same as the previous two years, and Scott was having difficulty making the cut. In fact, before his win at the Buick Open, he had missed the cut in two of the last four tournaments that he entered.

Verplank then decided that he was going to play the game the way that he used to play it. In other words, just go out and have fun. He made a conscious effort to smile before and after every shot that he hit, regardless of how well the shot was played.

At the start of the final round, Verplank was tied with TOUR veteran Howard Twitty and old collegiate rival, Steve Elkington. However, the final round proved to be extremely good to Verplank, as he was able to capitalize on the rain-softened greens, while his counterparts would fall by the wayside.

Leading after three rounds was not exactly an unfamiliar position for Verplank, as he also led after three rounds in the 1985 Western Open. In his quest to become the first amateur to win a TOUR event since Gene Littler in 1954, Verplank captivated the golfing world with his coolness under pressure during the Western.

After a final round of 74 in the Western, Verplank was tied with veteran Jim Thorpe. In the ensuing playoff, both players parred the first extra hole, however on the second, Verplank's par was good enough for the victory.

Scott started to play golf at the age of nine. By the time that he was in high school, he knew that he wanted to play the game forever.

"I worked very hard at my game, because I really wanted to get a scholarship," said Verplank.

He went on to attend Oklahoma State University and graduated from there in the spring of 1986. Meanwhile, as an amateur, he continued to win amateur events at a rapid rate. He won the 1984 U.S. and Western Amateurs, was a member of the 1985 Walker Cup team.

Bobby Wadkins is now in his 15th year on the PGA TOUR and it is interesting to see how vastly improved his game has become during the last few seasons.

He has won more than a three-quarters of a million dollars in the last two years and has accumulated numerous top 10 finishes.

"Hopefully, I'm a late bloomer," he said smiling, "and my best years are still to come. If I keep knocking on the door, I'll win."

Strangely enough, as well as he has played, he is winless on the TOUR, although he has lost twice in playoffs and has been a winner overseas.

In 1985, he lost the Sea Pines Heritage Classic in a playoff to Bernhard Langer. In 1979, he lost a playoff in the IVB-Philadelphia Classic to Lou Graham after Graham came from six-strokes behind with a 64 on the last afternoon to catch him.

Overseas, he won the 1978 European Open and has won the 1979 and 1986 Dunlop Phoenix event in Japan.

Bobby is approximately 20-months younger than his brother, Lanny, and while Lanny was more spectacular on the national amateur level and now during his years on the TOUR, they both were standouts in junior golf around their home territory of Richmond, Va.

They kept the city junior title in the family for six straight years, with Lanny winning four.

Through the years, Bobby and Lanny have worked on their games together, but a couple of years ago, Bobby went to Peter Kostis for extra help. The results have been dramatic. For example, in three years, he has knocked nearly a stroke-and-a-half off of his scoring average.

After high school—where he also was a standout basketball player—Bobby headed for the University of Houston and his two closest friends there—and now—were Bill Rogers and Bruce Lietzke.

After one year, though, he transferred to East Tennessee State and earned All-American status in 1972 and 1973.

He earned his TOUR card in the Fall of 1974.

Lanny Wadkins will surely go down in golf history as one of the outstanding players of all time. He has compiled such a brilliant record that it is impossible to single out his greatest achievement. He has won the PGA Championship, THE PLAYERS Championship, and the World Series of Golf.

Seven times he has won at least two tournaments in the same season and, in 1985 when he won three times, he was named the PGA Player-of-the-Year. Through the years, he has won 18 times, played on five Ryder Cup teams and now is approaching \$4 million in earnings.

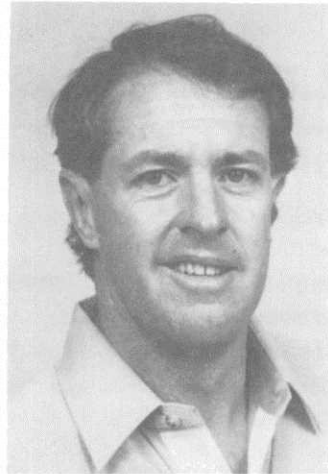
Last year, he won the Hawaiian Open with a pair of 66s for his final two rounds and also won the prestigious Colonial National Invitation Tournament with a rather spectacular 65 the last afternoon.

Lanny's approach to the game is quite simple, really. He attacks the course constantly. "I get a big kick out of playing that way," he says.

For example, he won the 1977 PGA Championship in a playoff over Gene Littler at Pebble Beach; and later that summer, won the World Series in a marvelous performance at Firestone.

Two years later, when weather conditions bordered on the unplayable, with wind gusts up to 45 miles per hour, he won the Tournament Players Championship at Sawgrass with a 5-under par total of 283—five better than runner-up Tom Watson.

When Denis Watson was asked to give an assessment of his performance in 1984, he smiled and said, "It was an incredible result to a lot of hard work; a couple of years of hard work."

He joined Tom Watson as the only three-time winner on the PGA TOUR in 1984; came within a whisker of winning PGA Player-of-the-Year honors; and finished fourth on the money list with \$408,562. Compare that, if you will, with his 1983 total of \$59,284, which was his previous best.

Actually, his brilliant performance was centered on three tournaments in a seven-week span late in the summer. He broke through with a victory in the Buick Open, thanks to a 63-68 finish.

After he was 33rd in the PGA Championship, he won the NEC World Series of Golf at Firestone Country Club. He shot a course record 8-under-par 62 the second day and stayed in front the rest of the way to collect a check for \$126,000. He missed the cut in his next two outings, and then won the TOUR's richest payoff of \$162,000 in the Panasonic-Las Vegas Invitational.

While he enjoyed a good season in 1985, he said, "I was within a couple of shots of an unbelievable year." True enough. He finished tied for second in the U.S. Open, just one stroke behind Andy North. Trying to defend his World Series of Golf title, he was tied with Roger Maltbie after three rounds, but Roger shot an exceptional 66 the last day to win it and Denis finished second.

An injury to his right hand curtailed his effectiveness in 1986 but, healthy again in 1987, he responded with a splendid season. However, tendinitis in his right elbow limited his play last year. "There's some little thing in there that's driving me crazy" he said.

There were several factors that boosted him into prominence. First of all, he has been working for several years with David Leadbetter on his golf swing; and has worked on the mental aspects of the game with Dr. Bob Rotella of the University of Virginia. He gives them both considerable credit.

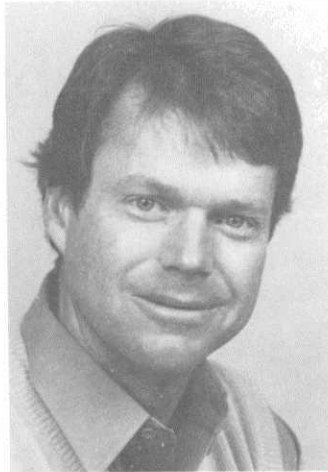
Denis earned his TOUR card in the Spring of 1981.

His father started him in the game when they lived in Rhodesia. He was 14-years old at the time, and two years later, his handicap was down to a one. "That's when I started to think about turning professional."

He played all sports, including cricket, rugby, tennis and competed in track and field, but golf was his love, no doubt about it. He turned pro when he was 19.

"Gary Player and Dale Hayes said I should give the TOUR a try," Watson said. "Then Gil Morgan told me he thought my game was well suited for the American courses and even Howard Twitty encouraged me to come over here. So, I did."

Tom Watson's position as one of the all-time greats in the history of golf is unquestioned. For many years, he was the dominant player in the game. The fact that he was the PGA Player-of-the-Year a record six times and the leading money winner five times attests to that.

He has won five British Opens, two Masters Tournaments and one United States Open. He has won 32 times on the PGA TOUR.

Possibly, the sweetest victory of all came in the fall of 1987 in the Nabisco Championships in San Antonio, TX. He was vintage Watson as he led all the way to capture the \$360,000 winner's check. As he said, "I'm probably the happiest man in the world today."

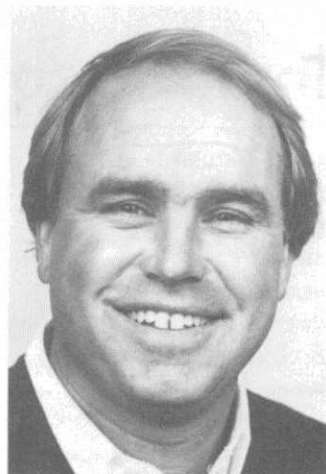
As long as the game is played Tom will be remembered for the brilliantly-executed pitch shot he made from off the 17th green at Pebble Beach in the 1982 United States Open.

As you recall, his two iron off the tee on the par three hole bounced in heavy rough on the left side of the green. He was tied with Nicklaus, who already had completed his round. Par seemed the absolute best Tom could do. Instead, he hit the perfect shot, and holed it for a birdie two. He went on to birdie the last hole and win his first Open by two over Nicklaus.

In 1987, he nearly won his second Open, but lost by one stroke to Scott Simpson at the Olympic Club. Triumph eluded him last year when he lost the NEC World-Series of Golf in a playoff to Mike Reid.

His biggest year was in 1980 when he won six times on TOUR, plus the British Open, and won a record \$530,808. He was the first player to break the half-million dollar mark.

D. A. Weibring is one of the more popular players in the game, so anytime he works his way into contention, he has a lot of people pulling for him.

That certainly was the case at the rain-shortened 1987 Beatrice Western Open when he turned back the challenge of Larry Nelson and Greg Norman to win by a stroke. Over the years, he has shown an ability to do well in the more significant championships. He finished second to Calvin Peete in the 1985 Tournament Players Championship. It took a final round of 6-under-par 66 by Peete to beat him. D.A.'s 11-under-par 277 was worth \$97,200.

He tied for fourth in the PGA Championship three years ago and was tied for third in the 1987 PGA, just one stroke out of the Nelson-Lanny Wadkins playoff. Last year, he finished tied for third in the U.S. Open and was fifth in the Western.

He also is sprouting out into the business world and has joined with a few friends to form Golf Resources, Inc. The company will work in the areas of marketing, promotion, consulting and assisting in the development of courses.

D. A. has had his good years but he also has suffered through a few, too, because of injuries. He injured his left wrist at the 1983 Phoenix Open. He said, "I never could get going, even though I tried to play with it." Finally, he had to take two months off in the early spring.

The setback was frustrating since he was coming off his best money year, winning \$117,941 in 1982, and anticipated even greater returns in 1983.

His first victory came in the 1979 Quad Cities Open. He was tied with Calvin Peete through 14 holes the last day, but D. A. took charge at the par five 15th, registering an eagle and taking the lead to stay.

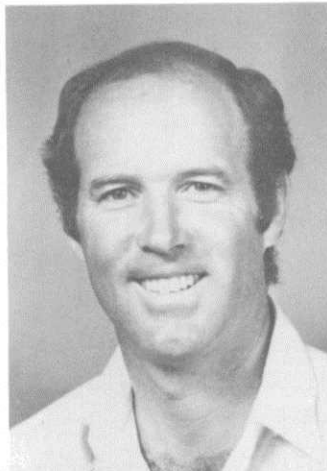
It was a popular victory. A graduate of Illinois State University, D. A. had a number of his followers from his hometown of Quincy, IL, there to cheer him on. He said, "If I had to pick a place to win my first tournament, the Quad Cities would be it."

In the 1980 Andy Williams San Diego Open, he fired a final round 65 to tie Tom Watson, but Watson went on to win on the first extra hole.

He explained how the use of his initials came about.

My father's name also is Donald Albert, and when I was a youngster, Mom decided she didn't want me to be called 'Little Don,' or 'Junior,' so she started to call me D. A. It has been with me ever since."

Tom Weiskopf has become one of the more highly respected golf course architects during the last few years, working mainly with Jay Morrish. But the urge to play the game always has been close to the surface, too.

Tom was one of the more dominant figures in the game for nearly two decades, winning 15 times on the PGA TOUR, plus such overseas events as the 1973 British Open Championship at Troon in Scotland.

He had to leave the TOUR a few years ago mainly because of a right shoulder injury - torn rotator cuff - that required an operation in 1986. "It's perfect now," he says.

He is using his career earnings of more than \$2.2 million for his exemption. "I earned it," he said, "and I still want to play some, so I decided to use it this year."

His course architecture business keeps him busy, so he wasn't certain how many events he would be able to play. He has approximately 15 courses open now with one with one of his gems being the Tournament Players Club of Scottsdale, the home of the Phoenix Open.

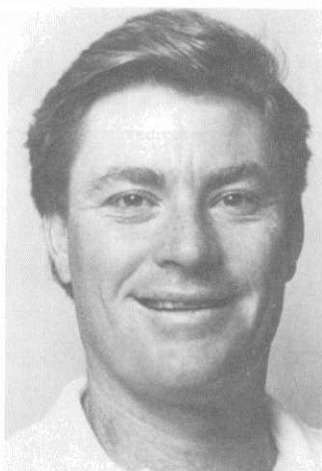
The game was not all-consuming to him. He would take time away from the TOUR to be with his family and also to trod through the bush country in search of wildlife trophies, especially sheep and elk. He also spent time in the television broadcasters booth and was very good, indeed.

During his more active years, he usually responded to a challenge. For example, in 1973 when he set a personal goal, he won five times in an eight-week period, including the British and Canadian Opens. Several groups named him Player-of-the-Year.

Few victories gave him as much satisfaction as the 1982 Western Open. After winning the 1962 Western Amateur, he was invited to participate in the 1964 Western Open. It was his first start as a professional and he won \$487.50.

Incidentally, when the top 60 money winners was the prime basis for exempt status, he finished in that group 17 straight years, through 1982.

Mark Wiebe has become one of the solid players in the game and, at his current rate of progress, there appears to be no limit to what he can accomplish.

After a relatively poor rookie season in 1984, he came on strong in 1985 to win the Anheuser-Busch Golf Classic in a playoff over John Mahaffey. Three years ago he won the Hardee's Golf Classic with rounds of 69, 65, 66, and 68 for a 12-under-par 268.

It was a good year in 1986 for other reasons, too. He had four rounds in the 60s as he finished second in the Byron Nelson Classic and tied for third place in the AT&T Pebble Beach National Pro-Am. His earnings, obviously, increased significantly.

"The best part of the year was in September," he said. "That's when Taylor Lynn was born and she is a special one for us."

His victory in the Anheuser-Busch Classic came after he three-putted the final hole for a bogey and dropped back into a tie with Mahaffey. On the first extra hole, however, he ended it quickly with a long birdie putt.

Last year, he nearly won the Anheuser-Busch Classic again. A third round 64 put him in position and then a final round 68 gave him a tie with Tom Sieckmann at 14-under par 270. Unfortunately for Mark, Tom won the playoff with a par on the second extra hole. A few other strong finishes helped him to his best money year.

A two-time high school player of the year, Wiebe attended Palomar Junior College in California and won the state junior college title before going on to star at San Jose State.

Upon leaving the Spartans for whom he earned All-America honors, he decided to join the PGA TOUR. He would be frustrated in his attempts more than once, but finally made it at the Fall, 1983 Qualifying Tournament.

His rookie year, though, was like that of many other newcomers to the world of the PGA TOUR, a disappointment. He earned only \$16,257 and finished 166th on the Official Money list and once again had to return to the Qualifying Tournament.

A solid fourth place finish in the 1985 Q-Tournament allowed Wiebe to play in a number of early season events, but it was not until his fourth place finish at Westchester at mid-season that he collected a big check. One month later he claimed his victory and his future was set.

A considerable part of the credit, he says, goes to Carl Welty of the LaCosta staff.

Every year on the PGA TOUR seems to bring with it at least one storybook tale. In 1987, Robert Wrenn became the latest player to suddenly and unexpectedly leap into the limelight.

The year started slowly for Robert and by mid-summer, he only had a little more than \$15,000 in earnings for the year. He entered the Buick Open, almost unnoticed.

An opening round of 7-under-par 65 drew him a little attention, but after all, it was only Thursday. His second round of 9-under-par 63 tied the course record and people sat up and took strong notice that this young man could indeed play the game.

Still, though, many expected the 27-year old to fade under the pressure of the weekend. They were wrong, very wrong.

A third round score of 67 put him at 21-under-par 195 for 54 holes and eliminated virtually any doubt that here was the tournament winner. He started the final round with a six-shot lead and quickly extended it with birdies on two of the first three holes. He then took dead aim at the PGA TOUR's All-Time record of 27-under par for 72 holes.

A birdie on the 17th hole got him to 26-under and he hung a chip for birdie on the lip on the final hole to finish at 262 and win by seven shots over his nearest competitor. He collected \$108,000 for his efforts, over \$30,000 more than he had won in his first two and a half years alone.

"This week was one dream after another," said a smiling Wrenn afterward. "Everyday it was like some outer force took over for me. It's just one of those weeks where everything came together for me."

A brilliant 8-under-par 62 in the final round of the Texas Open last year let him finish second alone to Corey Pavin. Overall, he thought "1988 was my most consistent year. My play week-after-week has been getting better," he said.

Robert was a third-year professional out of Wake Forest when he first made it in the TOUR's Qualifying Tournament in the fall of 1984. He had a moderately-successful first year but struggled in his second year of 1986. It was all part of the learning experience.

Robert (it is Robert, not Bob) was introduced to the game at age 12 by his father Bob (his mother is Bobbie) and he eventually progressed well enough to earn a scholarship to Wake Forest where he earned a degree in Communications in 1981.

He showed his promise by winning the 1981 Trans-Mississippi Amateur and then enjoyed some success on the Asian circuit winning the 1983 Indonesia Open.

Until the 1984 PGA Championship at Shoal Creek, AL, few people really knew what Fuzzy Zoeller had to endure to play golf on the TOUR. Few people knew he constantly suffered with severe back pains because Fuzzy always was smiling and joking with those around him.

He arrived in Shoal Creek amid a torrent of publicity because of his magnificent performance in winning the United States Open Championship a few weeks earlier at Winged Foot. In the Open, he was tied with Greg Norman after 72 holes, and then the next day, Fuzzy was at his brilliant best, winning the 18-hole playoff by eight strokes, 67 to 75.

The morning he was to play his first round in the PGA, his back was so painful he barely could move. He was rushed to the hospital and remained there for nearly a week.

A month later, he was in Las Vegas to defend his title in the Panasonic Invitational, but his back condition worsened and he went to the Hospital for Special Surgery in New York City. The diagnosis was that a "couple of discs had ruptured" and surgery was necessary.

Fuzzy was back on TOUR in 1985 for the Doral-Eastern Open at the end of February. He was delighted to tie for 46th place. The next week, he tied for 20th in the Honda Classic and then he won the Hertz Bay Hill Classic by shooting 66-67 the last two days. He went on to enjoy one of his best money years.

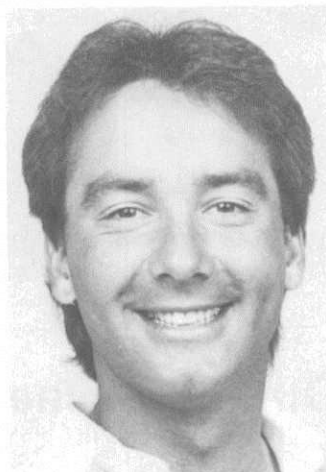
"The back problem started when I was playing high school basketball," he explains. "I was submarined and the back has bothered me from time-to-time ever since."

Fuzzy blossomed as a superstar in 1979 when he won the Andy Williams San Diego Open and also the Masters Tournament. He was six strokes in back of Ed Sneed starting the last round at Augusta National, and when he finished, he was thinking second place. As he sat in the scorers' tent at the 18th green, with Tom Watson, he watched Sneed bogey the last hole to force a three-way playoff. Fuzzy defeated Ed and Tom on the second extra hole.

Fuzzy was back with a vengeance in 1986 winning three times and collecting well over \$300,000 for the second time in his career.

"Anytime you beat these guys once is gratifying," said Zoeller. "To win three times is really something."

Richard Zokol has every reason to be happy with his last two campaigns. He definitely has moved upward, although he still remembers the one that got away.

He was leading the 1988 Hawaiian Open by two strokes going into the final round after his 7-under-par 65 on Saturday. He battled Lanny Wadkins down the final hole before bowing by a stroke. Wadkins shot a closing 66 to take the victory.

"I believe I've taken my game to a higher level," the Canadian said of his play last year. "Overall, it was my best year."

He enjoyed a good year in 1987, too, with three top 10 finishes. One was a tie for seventh place in the Canadian Open. He collected five-figured checks in six of his last seven starts.

Even more important, his wife, Joanie, presented him with twin sons on October 14, 1987.

When Richard Zokol had his best career year in 1985, he was anxious for the 1986 season to start. That year, though, would prove to be a big disappointment for Zokol and he was forced again to return to the TOUR's Qualifying Tournament.

When Richard was working on his golf game during his teenage years in his native Canada, he always kept an eye on Jim Nelford.

"I didn't know him then," Richard said, even though they both were from the Vancouver area. "Jim was a couple of years ahead of me and he seemed to win everything. When he went on to Brigham Young University, I could see how much his game improved, so I wanted to follow in his footsteps."

When it was time for Richard to head for college, he wrote to Karl Tucker, the golf coach, to inquire about the possibilities of going there. "He told me that since I didn't have a good amateur record, they couldn't offer me a scholarship," he recalls.

Soon afterwards, Zokol and Nelford were competing against each other in the British Columbia Amateur and after three rounds, Zokol was leading. "We talked about it, and Jim said he would call the coach and recommend me. The next thing I know, Coach Tucker said I should come down to Provo.

"The day after the tournament, I drove 24 hours straight through, and entered the school without a scholarship, but I was there. I made the team and for three years, I roomed with Bobby Clampett."

He enjoyed an especially proud moment at the 1984 Canadian Open. He tied for fifth place, and that represented the best finish by a Canadian in their national championship in 26 years.



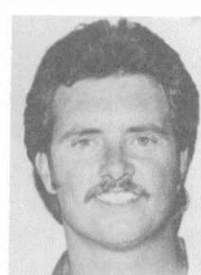

CURTIS STRANGE WINS THIRD PALMER AWARD

Curtis Strange became the first player in TOUR history to earn more than \$1 million in a single season as he claimed the 1988 Arnold Palmer Award with a record \$1,147,644 in earnings.

Strange, who also won the award in 1985 and 1987, became the first player to win consecutive Palmer Awards since its inception in 1981. In fact, he is the only one to win the award more than once.

His record setting year included four wins and topped the old mark of \$925,941 he set just last year.

The trophy, a bronze casting of "Arnie," will be awarded to Strange for the third time at the PGA TOUR's National Awards Show in early January.

The other past recipients of the award are Tom Kite (1981), Craig Stadler (1982), Hal Sutton, (1983), Tom Watson (1984), Curtis Strange (1985) and Greg Norman (1986).

MERRILL LYNCH SHOOT-OUT SERIES

A real winner in its first two seasons, the Merrill Lynch Shoot-Out Series will return bigger and better than ever in 1989.

A 10-man competition covering nine holes of play, the Merrill Lynch Shoot-Out Series will be held at 17 different PGA TOUR events in 1989 with the top players collecting \$3,000 from the \$10,200 purse.

What is a Shoot-Out? The format is easy to understand and a pleasure to watch. Ten players begin and on each hole, and the player with the highest score is dropped from the field. Should ties exist, a sudden death playoff is held requiring each of the players involved to execute a pitch shot, a chip or a long putt. The player farthest from the hole is eliminated.

The field for each Shoot-Out consists of that tournament's defending champion, the six leading money winners entered into that tournament and three sponsor selections.

At season's end, a Shoot-Out championship will be held (date and place TBA) in which 10 players will vie for \$250,000 in prize money, with \$90,000 going to the winner. David Frost won the title last year at Ventana Canyon in Tucson, AZ.

The field for the final competition consists of the top five money winners on the 1989 PGA TOUR Official Money List, the top three money winners from the season-long Shoot-Out Series and two sponsor selections.

The 1989 Merrill Lynch Shoot-Out Series Competition's will be held on the Tuesday of tournament week.

THE VARDON TROPHY

The Vardon Trophy is awarded each year by the PGA of America to the PGA TOUR player who posts the season's best scoring average. The system was amended in 1988 to allow all TOUR members to compete for the prestigious award provided they have played in 60 rounds. The new system also uses an "adjusted" score for purposes of computing the scoring average. The adjusted score is computed based upon the average score of the field at each tournament. As a result, a player's adjusted score may be higher or lower than his actual score. For example, a player shoots 70 each day at a tournament while the field average was 73. His 280 total would then be adjusted to 268 since he actually played 12 shots better than the field did during the tournament. The Vardon Trophy is a bronze colored plaque measuring 39" by 27".

Each year the PGA of America honors the TOUR's leading player by presenting him with the PGA Player of the Year Award.

The award now is made on the basis of playing record for the year. Points are awarded on the following basis: 30 points to winner of Masters, U.S. Open, British Open, PGA Championship. 20 points to winner of THE PLAYERS Championship, NEC World Series of Golf. 10 points to winners of all other co-sponsored or approved events. Points also awarded to top 10 on the year's money list and top 10 on year's scoring average list (20 for first, 18 for second, 16 for third, etc. down to 2 for 10th).

RYDER CUP MATCHES

The Ryder Cup Matches developed from a match played between representatives of the American and British Professional Golfers' Association in England in 1926. That unofficial match, incidentally, was won by the British 13½ to 1½.

Following this highly successful exhibition, Samuel A. Ryder, a wealthy British seed merchant, offered to donate a solid gold trophy bearing his name to be competed for in a series of matches between professionals of the two nations.

From the start of the series through the 1959 Ryder Cup matches, the competition was comprised of four foursome matches one day and eight singles matches the other day, each at 36 holes.

In 1961, the format was changed to provide for four 18-hole foursomes the morning of the first day and four more that afternoon, then for eight 18-hole singles the morning of the second day and eight more that afternoon. As in the past, one point was at stake in each match, so the total number of points was doubled.

In 1963, for the first time, a day of four-ball matches augmented the program to add new interest to the overall competition. This brought the total number of points to 32.

In 1977, the format was altered once again. This time there were five foursomes on the opening day, five four-ball matches on the second day, and ten singles matches on the final day. This reduced the total number of points to 20.

For 1979, eligibility for the Great Britain-Ireland side was expanded to include all British PGA/European TPD members who are residents of European nations.

The 1989 Ryder Cup Matches will be played September 22-24 at The Belfry, Sutton-Coldfield, England. Ray Floyd 1989 Captain.

THE RYDER CUP

The USA PGA squad selection is based upon an accumulation of Ryder Cup points from the beginning of the calendar year 1988 through the 1989 PGA Championship. The top 10 point-getters qualify for the 12 man team. The 1989 PGA Champion, provided he meets eligibility requirements, is also an automatic team member. Then, for the first time in America's history, the U.S. Captain will select one additional player to complete the team. If the 1989 PGA Champion is currently amongst the top 10 point-getters then Captain Raymond Floyd will pick another player to complete the team.

Points are awarded to the first 10 positions in each PGA TOUR event on the following basis:

PGA Championship, U. S. Open Masters and the British Open: 1st-125; 2nd-90; 3rd-80; 4th-70; 5th-60; 6th-50; 7th-40; 8th-30; 9th-20; 10th-10.

All other PGA TOUR events: 1st-75; 2nd-45; 3rd-40; 4th-35; 5th-30; 6th-25; 7th-20; 8th-15; 9th-10; 10th-5.

If a player who is ineligible finishes in one of those positions, no points are awarded for that position. In order to be eligible, a player must be a U.S. citizen and a member of the PGA of America.

MEDIA REGULATIONS

The General Regulations

The following regulations are to be followed by *all* members of the Media:

1. An *ARMBAND* is necessary to walk inside the galley ropes. Remain *not more than an arm's length from the ropes*, so as to blend into the gallery and appear to be a part of the gallery at all times.
2. Players are not to be distracted during play. DO NOT interview players or ask them to pose for photographs during their round.
3. DO NOT interview players or ask them to pose for photographs during their practice sessions prior to their round except by prior arrangement with the player.
4. If an interview is to be conducted in the practice areas, either the range or the putting green, it must be done by PRIOR ARRANGEMENT WITH THE PLAYER and up against the ropes and NOT in the middle of the areas where it could be distracting to other players.
5. DO NOT disturb players at their 18th green and/or scoring tent until after they have checked, signed and returned their scorecards.

Working Press Regulations

To avoid embarrassment to you and distraction to the contestants:

1. Do not walk or stand in playing areas.
2. Follow directions of marshals and other officials.
3. Do not interview during play. The leading players each day—and others requested—will be interviewed following their rounds in the Press Room interview area.

Tape Recorder Regulations

1. All tape recorder work should be done in the proximity of the Press Room and/or Clubhouse.
2. Tape recorders are *NOT* permitted in the locker room.
3. Tape recorders are *NOT* permitted within the playing area of the golf course unless written permission has been granted from the PGA TOUR and/or the tournament sponsor.

Rain Delay Guidelines

1. During rain delay situations, NO ONE other than players and essential staff will be permitted in the locker room. This means the Media is not permitted in the locker room in such situations. However, whenever possible, arrangements will be made to provide players for interviews during such situations.
2. Fully accredited members of the news media WILL BE WELCOMED into the locker room at all other times to carry out their assigned duties. (Note: Cameras and tape recorders are NOT permitted.)

PHOTOGRAPHY REGULATIONS

This Tournament is essentially for the players and spectators. Fair play requires that there be no noise or other distractions. The interests of all others must be subordinated to the players interests. The result of any one shot could decide the Tournament.

Only ACCREDITED PHOTOGRAPHERS for RECOGNIZED NEWS MEDIA will be permitted to take pictures during the Tournament. Photo assistants may be issued a credential, but not photo arm bands for access inside the ropes. Photography will be restricted to news use. Commercial and personal photography is prohibited (except that spectators may take pictures on practice days and during a Pro-Am). Free lance photographers shooting on speculation will NOT BE ACCREDITED.

The following regulations apply to accredited news and television photographers and videotape cameramen as a condition of the privilege of taking pictures:

General—All Photographers

A photographer must not ask a player to pose or in any way verbally distract a player during a round.

If a player or an official requests that no photographs be taken in a certain situation, the request must be honored immediately, without discussion.

A camera must not be pointed at a player about to make a stroke in any manner which might tend to disturb him or distract his attention.

At the 9th and the 18th greens, photographers must not approach, delay or distract a player until he has checked, signed and returned his scorecard to the proper official. Under the Rules of Golf, a player turning in an incorrect scorecard in stroke play may be disqualified.

Cameras are not permitted in the locker room.

Use of golf carts or other means of transportation on the course during tournament play is prohibited.

Still Photographers

Only still photographers to whom armbands have been issued will be permitted inside gallery ropes. They must station themselves immediately inside such ropes, and not more than an ARM'S LENGTH FROM THE ROPES, so as to blend into the gallery and appear to be part of the gallery. They must not take conspicuous positions in the open. Any photographer who violates this regulation will forfeit the right to working inside the ropes and possibly to work at the tournament.

Close-up action shots are prohibited.

All pictures must be taken at appreciable distances, as far from the players as possible and from angles which are not acute to the line of play.

When working at a green, photographers must not position themselves directly in a player's putting line.

Pictures, even from a distance, may not be made until the player has completed his stroke. The photographer must not release his camera shutter until the shot is made.

Television/Videotape Cameramen

Television and videotape filming may be done from inside the gallery ropes, or from areas approved by the PGA TOUR. All camera personnel who have been issued PHOTO armbands will be permitted inside the gallery lines but this does not include other members of the crew. Camera personnel must station themselves immediately inside the gallery lines, not more than an arm's length from those lines, so as to blend into the gallery. They must not take conspicuous positions in the open.

Filming may be done from such locations during a player's stroke, provided modern equipment that produces a minimum of noise is used.

Post-round interviews must be filmed far enough away from the arena of play to eliminate the possibility of distraction to those competing.

Difficulties will be avoided if photographers are fair and will treat players as they themselves would wish to be treated in similar circumstances.

The cooperation of all photographers will be appreciated.

Because tournament and amateur golf experiences often involve travel, the PGA TOUR has formed "Travel Partner" alliances with airlines, cruise lines, car rental companies, even foreign countries.

An exciting new travel activity is the "Official Golf Destination (OGD)." So far, tourism groups in **Jamaica, Puerto Rico, the Bahamas, and Florida's First Coast** (the Jacksonville area) have joined with the PGA TOUR to promote golf tourism in their areas, and more will be added in '89.

Resorts in official destination areas may participate in the TOUR's Agronomy Program. Joint efforts by TOUR agronomists and greens superintendents at resort courses mean quality playing conditions at OGD golf courses.

Another travel partner of the PGA TOUR, **Delta Air Lines** promotes air travel to golf destinations, and offers discount air travel to TOUR players and staff.

The "Golf Ahoy" program by **Royal Caribbean Cruise Line** is a boon to TOUR players who want to become Host Golf Professionals for a cruise, a venture that enhances the cruise for vacationers as well.

The Marriott Corporation offers discounts on its top-quality hotel accommodations across the country to PGA TOUR players and staff.

And **National Car Rental System** has aligned with the PGA TOUR to provide players and staff with reasonable rates on new, top-of-the-line rental cars.

On-Site Marketing Partners

Some companies co-sponsor PGA TOUR tournaments. Still others—"Marketing Partners"—operate in partnership with the PGA TOUR to provide a whole range of functions to the tournaments themselves.

SportsBand is new to the PGA TOUR in 1989. This on-course "radio station" allows fans to rent lightweight headsets and keep abreast of what's happening all over the tournament course. Golf-related features are part of the package.

The Nabisco Stats program is computed daily on **Epson Computers**, another marketing partner of the PGA TOUR. At the end of each season, winners in each statistical category compete in the Epson Stats Match®

At almost every tournament TOUR staff members have access to Buick courtesy cars for the entire tournament week, thanks to **Buick Motor Division** of General Motors.

Many PGA TOUR co-sponsored tournaments feature a host of related activities. **Gatorade Youth Clinics** introduce youngsters to the game of golf by offering instruction from PGA TOUR pros, along with a variety of gifts for each young participant. **Merrill Lynch Shoot-Outs** and **MCI Pro-Celebrity Long Distance Competitions** allow touring pros to win additional prize money, and the events are fun for fans, too.

MCI also provides players' locker rooms with long-distance telephone service.

Nikon and **Kodak** provide service to the national media through their presence at on-site tournament press facilities.

Two top-flight golfing magazines, **Golf Digest** and **Golf Magazine**, are involved with the PGA TOUR at tournament sites. Golf Magazine provides copies of **TOUR Magazine**, and Golf Digest offers **Senior TOUR Journal** at senior events. Both publications are targeted directly at PGA TOUR fans.

Other PGA TOUR Partners

Ram Golf, a leading name in the golf industry, is the exclusive distributor of the PGA TOUR line of clothing worn by many players at TOUR events. Pro shops around the country carry Ram's complete line of TOUR clothing and accessories.

In Japan, **Dentsu** distributes a variety of TOUR materials to Japanese golfers and handles Japanese TV coverage of TOUR tournaments.

A carpet company, **Karastan Bigelow**, offers discounted commercial carpet to golf facilities owned or operated by PGA TOUR pros, and gives members and staff discounts on home carpeting as well.

The **Michelin Tire Company** joins with the TOUR to produce the annual National Long Drive Contest held in the Bahamas. This nationally televised event showcases the longest hitters in golf and is always a good show.

New to the TOUR in 1989 are **Carrera** glasses made by **Optyl Eyewear Fashion International Corporation**. Eyecare is important to all people, but in particular to professional athletes especially those that spend such a great deal of time outdoors. This new agreement will help protect our players from potential long range problems.

In 1988, **MasterCard International**, through **Maryland Bank, N.A.**, joined with the PGA TOUR and the PGA of America to offer affinity credit cards for golfers. A percentage of each purchase charged to the cards is returned to PGA TOUR charities.

KIRIN WORLD MONEY LIST

The Kirin World Money List consists of all official money won in co-sponsored events on each of the four participating golf circuits (U.S. PGA TOUR, PGA European Tour, Japan PGA, Australia/New Zealand PGA Tour).

The Kirin World Money List was initially formulated as a qualification vehicle for the 1985 World Championship of Golf. It has become evident since then, however, that the list provides a standard by which world-class players could be compared, regardless of whether or not they competed regularly in head-to-head competition.

Since the initial Kirin World Money List was compiled, many have come to believe that this list will ultimately become the world standard for judging professional golfers' performances on an international basis.

The 1989 Kirin World Money List will be compiled from Sept. 1, 1988 through August 30, 1989 in order to best accommodate the various start and finish times of the four circuits involved. On the PGA TOUR, the 1989 Kirin World Money List will end at the NEC World Series of Golf and the Chattanooga Classic on Aug. 27, 1989.

The 1989 Kirin Cup World Championship of Golf will be held at the Yomiuri CC, Tokyo, Japan, Nov. 2-5. Yomiuri has hosted the event twice before.

SPORTSBAND

SportsBand will join the PGA TOUR in full force in 1989 with 20 events on schedule for the season.

SportsBand offers a closed circuit radio broadcast that allows spectators to stay informed as to the action on all parts of the course along with commentary and feature information of interest to golf fans.

The SportsBand broadcast can be heard through a light-weight ear piece that accompanies a small radio receiver that can be rented at the tournament site for a nominal daily fee.

The units have been tested over parts of the past two seasons and have met with critical acclaim.

The live reports come from the SportsBand team of roving reporters and anchored in on-site studios. The result is a first class broadcast in terms of both content and reception.
