Coaching her first WNBA All-Star Game...Dunn, who is currently in her second season as head coach of the Indiana Fever, guided the team to the Eastern Conference Semifinals in 2008...Notched three postseason appearances as an assistant coach with Indiana between 2004-2007...Helped her team to the Eastern Conference Finals in 2005, 2007...Served as the head coach of the Seattle Storm from 2001-2004, reaching Western Conference Semifinals in 2002...Selected perennial all-stars Lauren Jackson and Sue Bird in consecutive drafts as Storm general manager...Entered 2009 with 542 career wins as a college and professional coach...Named ABL Coach of the Year with the Portland Power in 1997-98 season...As a head coach at Purdue, led Boilermakers to seven NCAA tournaments, four Sweet Sixteen appearances, and a trip to the 1994 Final Four...Also was head coach at Miami, Mississippi, and Austin Peay as part of 25-year college coaching career through which she posted a .635 winning percentage...Dunn is a member of the Athletic Hall of Fame at Miami and Austin Peay.

Coaching his first WNBA All-Star Game...Named WNBA Coach of the Year in 2001 (Cleveland) and 2007 (San Antonio)...As head coach and general manager of the Silver Stars, Hughes has appeared in the postseason in consecutive seasons, reaching the WNBA Finals in 2008, Western Conference Finals in 2007...He is the only coach in WNBA history to reach the playoffs as head coach with three different franchises (San Antonio, Cleveland, Charlotte)...Spent one season as assistant commissioner of the Mid-American Conference (MAC)...Took Cleveland Rockers to three postseason appearances from 2000-2003 following 7-25 record in the season prior to his arrival...Led Charlotte Sting to 10-10 record and earned first postseason victories for franchise in 1999...As assistant coach with the University of Toledo women's basketball squad, helped team to 27-4 mark and a NCAA tournament berth during the 1996-97 season...Named 1979 Sertoma Ohio Coach of the Year as head coach of Madison Plains High Schools boys' basketball team.

Alana Beard will make her fourth All-Star appearance in 2009, this time as a starter for the Eastern Conference. Beard currently ranks sixth in the league in scoring (18.5) and third in steals per game (2.9). The second overall pick in the 2004 WNBA Draft, Beard has started in all games that she has played in. Beard has more than 2,800 career points, 720 rebounds, 518 assists, and 325 steals. She is a three-time WNBA All-Defensive team member and in 2004 set a new Mystics' record for most steals in a season (69).

Eighth Season ... Fifth All-Star Game

Tamika Catchings will make her sixth All-Star appearance in 2009 as a starter for the Eastern Conference, which makes her a six-time WNBA All-Star. Catchings received the most votes for the second time, having also earned the honor in 2006. So far in the 2009 season, Catchings has led the Indiana Fever to an 11-3 record, first place in the East. She sits on top of the charts in steals per game (3.3), while ranking in the top 20 in points (13.3), top 10 in rebounds (6.4) and assists per game (3.9). The two-time Olympic gold medalist is a defensive specialist and has garnered two Defensive Player of the Year Awards and is a six-time All-WNBA team member. She has more than 3,600 career points, 1,700 rebounds, 800 assists and 560 steals. Catchings was selected third overall in the 2001 WNBA Draft by the Fever and was not a rookie until the following season due to an injury. In her first full season in the league, Catchings averaged 18.6 points, 8.6 rebounds, and 3.7 assists per game, and was selected as the 2002 Rookie of the Year.

Shameka Christon will make her first appearance as a WNBA All-Star for the 2009 season. She currently leads the New York Liberty in scoring (19.0 ppg) and ranks in the top five in the WNBA. Christon was selected fifth overall by the Liberty in the 2004 WNBA Draft. In her five years with the Liberty, Christon and her team have advanced to the Playoffs every year but one, where she has averaged double-digits in scoring in the post-season. Christon has collected more than 2,000 career points, 580 rebounds, and 240 assists.

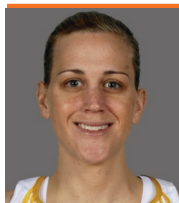

Fourth Season... First All-Star Game

The Rio de Janeiro, Brazil native will make her first All-Star game appearance, as a reserve for the Eastern Conference. In her second year with the Atlanta Dream, de Souza has finally hit her stride after suffering a fractured leg in 2008. Through 17 games she has staked her claim as the league's top rebounding force, with league bests in total rebounds (146) and rebounds per game (8.6). She ranks sixth in total blocks (24) and is averaging a career-best 11.5 points per game. The Los Angeles Sparks signed de Souza as a free agent in 2002. She won a WNBA championship in L.A. in 2002, and was selected by the Dream from the Connecticut Sun in the 2008 expansion draft. She competed for Brazil in the 2004 Olympics in Athens, Greece.

Ninth Season ... Third All-Star Game

Katie Douglas, the 2006 All-Star MVP, was selected to her third All-Star Game for the 2009 season, her first as a member of the Indiana Fever. Douglas and the Fever are off to an 11-3 start, which is the best record in the WNBA so far. Douglas leads the Fever in points per game (16.6), eighth overall in the league. In her first season with the Fever in 2008, Douglas became the first player besides Tamika Catchings to lead the club in points per game (15.6) since 2001. She also led the Fever in assists (106) and 3-point field goals (57) and was second in steals (53). Douglas is a two-time All-WNBA team member and three-time All-Defensive Team. She has over 3,200 career points, 1,000 rebounds, 660 assists, and 410 steals. As a member of the Connecticut Sun for five years, Douglas and her squad made two Finals appearances and reached the playoffs every year.

Candice Dupree is playing in her third All-Star Game and first as a starter for the Eastern Conference. She currently ranks in the top 10 in points per game (15.7) and blocks per game (1.1) and is among the top 15 in rebounds per game (6.6). Dupree entered the 2009 season with 1,566 career points, 712 rebounds, and 111



blocks. The Chicago Sky selected Dupree as the sixth overall pick in the 2006 WNBA Draft. In her first three seasons in the league, Dupree has started every game she played in except for three and has averaged more than 13 points per game each season. Dupree ranked in the top five in rebounding and top 15 in scoring throughout the 2008 and 2007 seasons.

Second Season ... First All-Star Game

Sylvia Fowles, who is trying to lead the Chicago Sky to their first playoffs in franchise history, will make her All-Star debut as a starter for the Eastern Conference. So far in the 2009 season, Fowles leads the league in rebounds per game (8.6), is second in double-doubles (4) and ranks sixth overall in blocks per game (1.7). The Sky selected Fowles second overall in the 2008 WNBA Draft. Despite being limited to 17 games in her first season due to a knee injury, Fowles finished with an average of more than 10 points and 7.5 rebounds per game. The 2008 Olympic gold medalist also recorded the first-ever goaltending in league history. Fowles collected more than 2,200 points and 1,500 rebounds in her four years at Louisiana State University.

Eighth Season ... Second All-Star Game

The Sun's Asjha Jones', who played college ball at UConn, will play her second WNBA All-Star Game in front of her hometown WNBA and college fans. Jones currently ranks in the top ten in points per game (16.6), and leads the Sun in both scoring and rebounding (5.8 rpg). Jones was selected fourth overall by the Washington Mystics in the 2002 WNBA Draft, and played two seasons there before being traded to the Sun. Jones has reached the playoffs in all but one season in her seven-year career, and has reached the WNBA Finals twice. Jones has collected more than 2,600 career points, 1,100 rebounds, and 395 assists. The former University of Connecticut product won two championships as a Husky, where she collected 1,502 career points and 794 rebounds.

Sancho Lyttle will make her first WNBA All-Star appearance as an Eastern Conference reserve. Lyttle, in her first season with the Atlanta Dream, is in double digits in scoring for the first time in her career and ranks in



the top 20 in points per game (13.5). She also ranks in the top ten in rebounds (6.7) and steals (2.2) per game. Lyttle was selected fifth overall by the Houston Comets in the 2005 WNBA Draft, she played four seasons with the Comets before joining the Dream through the Expansion Draft for the 2009 season. Lyttle is on pace to reach 1,000 points, with more than 800 career points to date and has collected more than 670 rebounds and 150 assists.

Sixth Season... First All-Star Game

Jia Perkins will make her first WNBA All-Star appearance, joining Chicago Sky teammates Candice Dupree and Sylvia Fowles as members of the Eastern Conference All-Stars. Perkins currently ranks fourth overall in the league in steals (2.4) and places in the top 15 in points (15.5) and assists (3.6) per game. After spending her first two seasons with the Charlotte Sting, Perkins joined the Sky via the expansion draft prior to the 2006 WNBA season. In her four seasons with the Sky, Perkins has increased her scoring average every season. In 2008, she led the Sky in scoring with 17 points per game, which tied her for 10th in the league. As a full-time starter in 2008, Perkins had career bests in points (577), rebounds (137) and steals (64). She has more than 1,600 career points, 460 rebounds, and 350 assists.

Katie Smith will make her seventh WNBA All-Star appearance for the Eastern Conference. Smith currently leads the Detroit Shock with 14.7 points per game and ranks in the top 15 in the league. Smith is a two-time WNBA champion with the Shock, a Finals MVP, a three-time Olympic gold medalist, and a member of the WNBA All-Decade Team. The Minnesota Lynx originally signed Smith in 1999, where she spent six seasons before being traded to Detroit, where she is now in her fourth season. Smith became the first woman in U.S. basketball history to score 5,000 points on July 13, 2005. She scored her 6,000th career point (ABL/WNBA) at Minnesota on August 16, 2007. The third all-time leading scoring in the WNBA has more than 5,200 career points, 1,000 rebounds, and 900 assists.

ALL-STAR GAME THROUGH THE YEARS

2007 – East 103, West 99 at Verizon Center (Washington, D.C.)

The East All-Stars escaped Washington, D.C. with their second consecutive midsummer classic victory despite nearly blowing a 12-point lead in the game's final two minutes. All-Star Game MVP Cheryl Ford paced the East, led by Head Coach Bill Laimbeer, to the 103-99 victory with 16 points and 13 rebounds. Fellow Shock teammate Deanna Nolan added 11 points and four rebounds. The Indiana Fever was well represented as Tamika Catchings posted 15 points and 11 rebounds alongside Katie Douglas' team-high 18 points.

The East pushed their lead to 89-75 on a Candice Dupree layup with six minutes left on the clock. Tina Thompson, who notched 19 points, and Becky Hammon, 13 points, both nailed three-pointers to cut the deficit to three with 47 seconds remaining. Anna DeForge pushed the East lead back to five with a jumper seconds later to seal the victory for the hosts. Lauren Jackson, 14 points and five rebounds, and Diana Taurasi, 13 points and nine assists, both contributed for the West in the losing effort.

2006 – East 98, West 82 at Madison Square Garden (New York, N.Y.)

In their seventh attempt, the East finally broke their All-Star Game slump with a convincing 98-82 victory in New York. After losing the first six All-Star games, the East defeated the heavily-favored West behind MVP Katie Douglas' 16 points. Shock teammates Cheryl Ford and Katie Smith, 13 and 14 points, respectively, contributed to the East's statement win. The Sun featured all five of their starters in the contest, with Douglas, Lindsay Whalen, and Margo Dydek taking the opening tip. Whalen had 10 points, pulled in five rebounds and spread around six assists, while Dydek, the WNBA all-time leader in blocked shots, had rejected four shots and had nine rebounds.

Minnesota rookie Seimone Augustus was the lone West player in double figures with 16 points. Comets center Michelle Snow had nine points to go along with a game-high 11 rebounds. WNBA great Lisa Leslie had nine points and seven rebounds in limited action for the West. The visitors struggled to shoot effectively all game long, shooting just 36 percent (32-for-89) from the field. The East led by as many as 27 points in a game they controlled by nine points at the half.



ALL-STAR GAME THROUGH THE YEARS

2005 – West 122, East 99 at Mohegan Sun Arena (Uncasville, Conn.)

In an exciting game that featured multiple dunks, the West reaffirmed their dominance over the East with their sixth straight All-Star Game victory. Behind leading-vote getter and MVP Sheryl Swoopes' 15 points and four rebounds, the West brushed aside the East with ease by a tally of 122-99. Swoopes posted 11 points in the first half to pace the West to a 52-43 lead at the intermission. The East cut the lead to 74-66 on Taj McWilliams' three-point play with 13 minutes left. However an 18-4 run by the West, spearheaded by three-point shots from Sparks' teammates Lisa Leslie and Chamique Holdsclaw, sealed the win. Other highlights included Lisa Leslie's dunk and Detroit's Deanna Nolan's 20 points.

2003 – West 84, East 75 at Madison Square Garden (New York, N.Y.)

After Lisa Leslie was forced to leave the game with a bruised knee, her Sparks teammate Nikki Teasley took over and led the West to a nine-point victory over the East. Teasley, who was named the game's MVP, collected 10 points, six rebounds, six assists and five steals to help the West improve to 5-0 all time. Leslie scored all of her 17 points in the first half but exited with 14:33 remaining and her team behind, 50-46. After West teammate Lauren Jackson blocked a shot from Swin Cash, Jackson collided with Cash, sending the Detroit Shock forward into Leslie's right knee.

A jumper by Nykesha Sales gave the East a 54-52 lead with 11:40 to play, but the West countered with a 14-0 run over the next four minutes. Yolanda Griffith scored half of her 14 points during the burst, including a layup off a behind-the-back pass from Teasley. The East pulled within 71-68 on a three-pointer by Detroit's Deanna Nolan with 2:39 remaining, but Teasley stole the ball from Dawn Staley and nailed a three of her own with 2:15 left and the East would get no closer.

Tamika Catchings of the Indiana Fever scored 17 points, Nolan had 15 and Tari Phillips of the New York Liberty chipped in 13 for the East, who shot just 26 percent in the second half (12-of-46) after connecting at 49 percent (18-of-37) in the first half for a 46-38 halftime lead.

2002 – West 81, East 76 at MCI Center (Washington, D.C.)

MVP Lisa Leslie collected 18 points and 14 rebounds and came up with two key blocks down the stretch as the West recorded its fourth straight All-Star Game win, 81-76 over the East. Leslie made 6-of-13 shots from the field, 6-of-10 from the free-throw line and was credited with four blocked shots en route to her third MVP award. Moments after Leslie twice rejected Tari Phillips; the New York Liberty star was called for a foul with 51 seconds to play. Tina Thompson of the Houston Comets made both free throws to put the West in front for good, 77-76.

Charlotte Sting guard Andrea Stinson missed a runner with 36 seconds left and Leslie stripped the ball from Phillips 11 seconds later. Comets forward Sheryl Swoopes made two foul shots and Thompson was 2-of-2 from the line after Phillips fouled out with four seconds to play. Thompson led all scorers with 20 points and Lauren Jackson of the Seattle Storm added 15 off the bench. Tamika Catchings of the Indiana Fever scored 12 points but was the only player in double figures for the East.

The teams battled to a 40-40 halftime deadlock, but the East did not take a second-half lead until Phillips sank two free throws to make it 50-48 with just over 16 minutes left. Tamecka Dixon of the Sparks answered immediately after with a 3-pointer for the West. The East shot just 33 percent (28-of-84) from the field and was outrebounded, 50-44. The West were not much better at 38 percent (31-of-81), making just 4-of-22 3-pointers.



ALL-STAR GAME THROUGH THE YEARS

2001 – West 80, East 72 at TD Waterhouse Center (Orlando, Fla.)

Although she didn't get the start, Los Angeles Sparks center Lisa Leslie still notched 20 points, nine rebounds, and three blocked shots off the bench to lead the West to their third straight All-Star Game win over the East. In the 80-72 win in Orlando, Leslie captured her second career MVP award, after claiming the prize in the inaugural All-Star Game in New York two years prior. Yolanda Griffith, the starting center for the West, added 17 points and seven rebounds to pace the starting unit. Rookie Lauren Jackson of Seattle scored 11 points in her All-Star debut.

Four players reached double figures for the East: Cleveland's Merlakia Jones had 12, and Miami's Elena Baranova tallied 10, as did the hometown Orlando duo of Taj McWilliams-Franklin and Nykesha Sales. Despite trailing by 19 points with 4:46 to play, Richie Adubato's East club used a 16-3 run - with four points each by McWilliams-Franklin and Jones - to slice the West's lead to 78-72 with 17.3 seconds left. However the East got no closer, as Jackie Stiles added a pair of free throws with 16.2 ticks remaining.

2000 – West 73, East 61 at America West Arena (Phoenix, Ariz.)

Houston Comets star Tina Thompson was named the game's MVP with a double-double on 13 points, 11 rebounds and three steals, while center Lisa Leslie added 16 points and six rebounds to secure the 73-61 win in Phoenix. Yolanda Griffith posted a double-double of her own on 10 points and 10 rebounds and Mwadi Mabika pitched in with five points and 10 rebounds.

The East fell in their second consecutive All-Star Game behind notable 10 point and nine rebounds efforts from Orlando's Taj McWilliams-Franklin and New York's Tari Phillips. Chamique Holdsclaw added in nine points and four rebounds in the losing endeavor. The East managed a disappointing 29.4 field goal shooting percentage (25-for-85) and tallied only 28 points in the paint compared to the West's total of 46.

1999 – West 79, East 61 at Madison Square Garden (New York, N.Y.)

The inaugural midseason classic at Madison Square Garden saw the West run away with the victory. Up 43-29 at halftime, the visitors never looked back and rode the performances of MVP Lisa Leslie and Utah Starzz star Natalie Williams to the 79-61 win. Leslie notched 13 points, five rebounds and three blocks to pace the West, while Williams scored 14 points and pulled in eight rebounds to aid in the winning effort. Yolanda Griffith pitched in 10 points, five rebounds and three blocks and Sheryl Swoopes posted eight points, eight rebounds and three blocks as well.

Stingy defense from the West kept every player from the East in single digits, with Taj McWilliams, Shannon Johnson and Sandy Brondello leading the way with eight points apiece. The East struggled from the free throw line (5-for-9), while the West flourished in victory (15-for-19). The winning squad also dominated inside, outscoring the East 50-22 on points in the paint.

2009 WNBA ALL-STAR SKILLS CHALLENGE

Overview

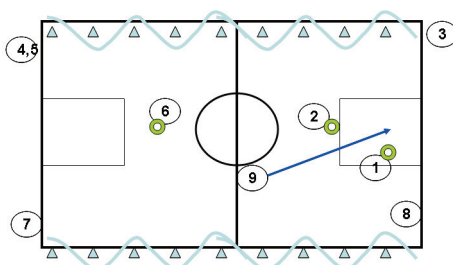
Four teams of three players (3 WNBA players) will compete in the single-round Skills Challenge. The team with the fastest time wins.

Procedure

- **Player #1** will be preset under the basket on a designated shooting spot.
- When prompted by the music, **Player #1** will make a lay-up from the right side. **Player #1** gets her own rebound and passes the ball to a preset **Player #2** (local fan).
- **Player #2** (positioned at a shooting spot at the free throw line) has 3 opportunities to make one free throw.
- Once a successful free throw is made OR all three free throw chances have been missed, **Player #2** must then take a ball from the ball rack and dribble to the baseline where she will then serpentine the full length of the court through 7 cones.
- **Player #2** shoots a layup.
- **Player #2** passes the ball to **Player #3** (preset at a shooting spot at the top of the 3-point arc).
- **Player #3** has three opportunities to make a 3-pointer.
- Once a successful 3-pointer is made OR all three 3-point chances have been missed, **Player #3** must then take a ball from the ball rack and dribble to the baseline where she will serpentine the full length of the court through 7 cones.
- **Player #3** will then pass the ball to **Player #1** who is preset at center court.
- Clock will stop when **Player #1** puts the ball through the basket.

Tiebreaker

The tied teams will each run through the Skills Challenge in its' entirety a second time. The fastest time wins.



2009 WNBA ALL-STAR THREE-POINT SHOOTOUT

Overview

Six shooters will compete in the two round competition. The winner will be determined by the shooter who accumulates the most points in the final round.

- Two rounds of competition – With the top three shooters from the first round advancing to the finals.
- Five shooting stations around the 3-point line, with 4 WNBA balls & 1 All-Star (money ball) each.
- Each participant has one minute to shoot as many balls as she can.
- WNBA balls are worth one point. The special ball is worth two points (money ball).
- The money ball at each station may be shot only after all four WNBA balls from that station are shot.
- In the Finals, players will shoot in ascending order of First Round scores (i.e. - Sue-18, Ann-20, Jen-23).
- Players may not start on or over the three-point line while shooting. A basket does not count if the line is violated.

Tiebreakers

- In the event of a tie in the First Round, there will be a 24-second shootout to break the tie. If there is still a tie, the process will be repeated until the tie is broken.
- In the event of a tie in the FINAL Round, there will be a FULL 60-second shootout to break the tie. If there is still a tie, the process will be repeated until the tie is broken.
