ACADEMIC SUCCESS

Graduation Success Rate

The Southern Conference matched or exceeded the FCS average in seven men's sports and four women's sports for Graduation Success Rate scores released in October. Forty-nine SoCon programs earned perfect scores of 100 for the cohort, with 31 women's programs and 18 men's teams achieving the standard. Furman had a league-best 10 programs do so and Samford had nine. Samford was the lone SoCon school to exceed the FCS average in every sport it sponsors.

Academic Progress Rate

Eight Southern Conference sports met or exceeded the national average and 25 league teams achieved perfect scores in the most recent APR data. Nine of the 10 SoCon members had at least one sport that posted a perfect score of 1,000, with Furman leading the way with five and Mercer following with four. UNC Greensboro, Samford and Chattanooga had three each, while The Citadel, ETSU and Western Carolina had two each and Wofford had one.

Thirty-three SoCon student-athletes earned CoSIDA Academic All-District honors, with football leading the way with nine selections. Seven league student-athletes went on to earn Academic All-America honors, with Mercer defensive lineman Jack Raines earning first-team honors; Chattanooga wide receiver Bryce Nunnelly, Mercer men's basketball guard Djordje Dimitrijevic and Furman track and field and cross country runner Savannah Carnahan taking second-team distinction; and Mercer softball outfielder Allie Jones, Chattanooga track and field and cross country runner Abby Bateman and Wofford track and field multis student-athlete William Stout earning third-team honors.

ACADEMIC AWARDS

Academic All-SoCon

To be eligible for the academic all-conference teams, student-athletes must carry at least a 3.3 cumulative grade-point average at the conclusion of the semester and were required to compete in at least one-half of their teams' competitions. Because of the cancelation of the spring season, the participation requirement was modified for this year's spring team to include projected starters and key contributors. In addition, the student-athletes must have successfully completed at least three semesters at their institutions, making true freshmen and first-year transfers ineligible for inclusion. The fall academic all-conference team included 351 student-athletes, while the spring team, which includes all winter and spring sports, saw 621 student-athletes earn a record 742 spots on the team. It should be noted that because of the COVID-19 pandemic, some schools instituted measures of academic relief this year.

SoCon Academic Honor Roll

The academic honor roll consists of student-athletes who participated in varsity sports and posted a 3.0 grade point average or higher for the academic year, were eligible the entire academic year and were members of the final squad lists. A league-record 2,646 student-athletes from the 10 member institutions and 17 associate members garnered the distinction, with 710 earning the Commissioner's Medal, awarded to student-athletes who attain a GPA of 3.8 or higher throughout the year, a record since the standard was raised from 3.5 prior to 2015-16. It should be noted that because of the COVID-19 pandemic, some schools instituted measures of academic relief this year.

SOCON POSTGRADUATE SCHOLARSHIPS

The Southern Conference has awarded 183 postgraduate scholarships since 1990-91, from modest beginnings of two in that first year to 10 in each of the last eight years. The recipients are nominated by their schools and selected by the Southern Conference Graduate Scholar Committee. The scholarships, worth \$2,000 each, are awarded to student-athletes about to receive their undergraduate degrees who intend to pursue advanced degrees in graduate or professional school. The student-athletes are evaluated on academics, athletics and community service.

SOCON ACADEMIC EXCHANGE

Created as a partnership of the conference office and the chief academic officers of the member institutions, the SoCon Academic Exchange was launched in October 2014. The mission statement is as follows:

"The SoCon Academic Exchange is a cooperative educational program of the Southern Conference designed to provide collaborative learning activities and opportunities to benefit students, faculty and staff of the member institutions."

One of the SAE's major initiatives is the SoCon Undergraduate Research Forum (SURF), an annual event geared toward students seeking experience in presenting their research projects in the arts and humanities in addition to the STEM disciplines.

Another byproduct of the SAE was the creation of the annual All-Southern Conference Faculty and Staff awards presented by the commissioner at a sporting event on campus. Recipients are determined by the administrations of each campus.

An entrepreneurship competition is planned to be introduced in 2021.

The Southern Conference and Eblen Charities teamed up throughout the championships to provide awareness and to help combat childhood hunger through the Hoops Against Hunger program. An information booth was set up at Harrah's Cherokee Center Asheville to provide information about childhood hunger and to accept cash or food donations. The Hoops Against Hunger Hotel Challenge also took place during the tournament at local hotels as each hotel had a collection bin in its lobby. Two winners of the Challenge were selected and the Hilton Garden Inn Downtown (3,239 food items) and the Hyatt Place Downtown (2,500 food items) were recognized at halftime of the men's championship game. Awareness of the Hoops Against Hunger program was also displayed through the Hoops Against Hunger Relay Challenge during halftime of each tournament game and by the team coaching staffs wearing Hoops Against Hunger lapel pins.

VMI redshirt senior wrestler Neal Richards and Furman senior women's golfer Natalie Srinivasan are the 2019-20 Bob Waters Southern Conference Male Athlete of the Year and SoCon Female Athlete of the Year, respectively.

Richards becomes the just the second VMI student-athlete to be named the SoCon Male Athlete of the Year and the first since Johnny Mapp in 1953-54. Richards also becomes just the second wrestler to earn the award, joining Appalachian State's Austin Trotman, who took the distinction in 2011-12.

Richards was named a second-team All-American by the National Wrestling Coaches Association this season, becoming just the third Keydet and first since 1999 to earn All-America honors. The 174-pounder shared SoCon Championship Most Outstanding Wrestler honors in 2020, taking the award for the second straight season after winning the league title in the weight class and qualifying for the NCAA Championships for the third time in his career.

The South Chesterfield, Virginia, native finished the 2019-20 season with a 38-7 record that included six major decisions, seven technical falls and five pins. In addition to his 174-pound title at the SoCon Wrestling Championships, Richards also claimed the crown in that weight class at the All-Academy Championships. He won 18 of his final 19 matches to close the season and earned a spot on the Virginia Sports Information Directors all-state first team.

Richards, who graduated with a degree in civil engineering, is commissioning in the United States Army. Srinivasan becomes the ninth Paladin to earn the SoCon Female Athlete of the Year award and the second Furman women's golfer to be honored, joining Caroline Peek (1993-94).

A first-team All-America selection by both Golfweek and the Women's Golf Coaches Association, Srinivasan was named the PING WGCA National Player of the Year and won the ANNIKA Award presented by Stifel, given annually to the top female U.S. collegiate golfer and voted on by players, coaches and members of the golf media. Srinivasan also won the inaugural Juli Inkster Senior Award presented by WorkDay, which recognizes the highest-ranked women's collegiate golfer in her final year of NCAA eligibility.

The Spartanburg, South Carolina, native, who led the conference and set a Furman single-season record with a stroke average of 70.78 over 18 rounds, concluded her career as the top-ranked active collegiate golfer according to Golfstat after winning three tournaments during her senior year: the Glass City Invitational, the Lady Paladin Invitational and the Moon Golf Open. Srinivasan also finished as the runnerup at the Darius Rucker Invitational and posted five top-20 finishes over six tournaments. She ended her Paladin career with a program-best 72.6 stroke average over 118 rounds while earning

a second invitation to the Augusta National Women's Amateur.

Srinivasan graduated summa cum laude with a degree in health sciences, finishing with a 3.90 grade point average. The Furman Dean's list selection is also a three-time member of the WGCA All-American Scholar Team and SoCon Academic Honor Roll.

Srinivasan was the recipient of the Winston Babb Memorial Award, which is given by the Furman Chapter of Omicron Delta Kappa to the woman in each class who has demonstrated the most outstanding qualities of leadership, scholarship, and service to the university. Off the course, she has devoted time volunteering with Prisma Children's Hospital and LPGA/USGA Girl's Golf Organization.

The Athlete of the Year Awards are selected annually by the Southern Conference athletics directors and a media member representing each conference school. The award recognizes athletic achievement, academic performance and civic involvement. Prior to 1990-91, the award was selected solely by members of the Southern Conference Sports Media Association. Beginning in 1991-92, the men's award was named after the late Bob Waters, who was Western Carolina's head football coach from 1969-88.



DID YOU K N O W ?

The title game of the Ingles SoCon Men's Basketball Championship presented by General Shale sold out for the third time in four years in 2020. This year's average attendance of 4,927 was the tournament's highest since averaging 5,551 fans per session in 2012, the first year the tournament had been in Asheville, North Carolina, since 1995.

SPRING SPORTS

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the spring season was canceled in mid-March. Before their seasons were canceled, however, SoCon squads and student-athletes were well on their way to successful campaigns.



MEN'S TENNIS

Mercer senior Olivier Stuart was ranked as high as No. 46 in the ITA singles rankings, the highest in program history, and finished the season ranked No. 71. Stuart went 17-8 overall on the season, including an 8-4 mark at No. 1 singles in the spring. In doubles play, Furman's Jake Munns and Jake Bhangdia were ranked No. 40 nationally. The duo went 8-2 at No. 1 in the spring.



WOMEN'S TENNIS

Furman's women went 13-4 and were ranked No. 43 in the ITA team rankings, with senior Katarina Kozarov checking in at No. 16 in the singles rankings and going on to earn All-America honors. Two of the Paladins' doubles teams were nationally ranked, with Julia Adams and Madison Dillon sitting at No. 28 and Kozaroz and Adams rated No. 36. Chattanooga's duo of Emma Van Hee and Caroline Gibbens finished the season ranked No. 76. ETSU earned a 4-0 win over No. 49 Appalachian State on March 1 for its highest ranked win in program history.

MEN'S GOLF

UNCG and ETSU both won tournament titles during the season, with the Spartans winning consecutive tournaments spanning the fall and spring seasons and the Bucs, ranked No. 26 nationally, adding a trio of runnerup finishes to their win in Hawaii. Individually, seven different SoCon student-athletes won or shared medalist honors throughout the season. UNCG senior Jonathan Brightwell earned All-America honors from the GCAA and Golfweek and finished the season ranked No. 13 nationally. ETSU's Jack Rhea finished the season ranked No. 36 and earned All-America honorable mention from both organizations, while teammate Shiso Go was also ranked inside the top 100, finishing at No. 90.



WOMEN'S GOLF

Furman senior Natalie Srinivasan was named the WGCA PING National Player of the Year and won the ANNIKA Award and the inaugural Juli Inkster Senior Award after winning three tournaments and finishing as the topranked active golfer in the Golfstat national rankings. Srinivasan was one of eight SoCon players to finish first in a tournament this season, while three league squads earned team wins. As a team, the Paladins were ranked No. 35 nationally. ETSU's Tereza Melecka spent time in the top 50 in the world amateur golf rankings and Srinivasan has been ranked inside the top 10.



OUTDOOR TRACK And field

Outdoor season had barely begun in the SoCon, with only Mercer's women's team competing before the season was called off. The Bears picked up several event wins in their season debut at the Jaguar Open.

MEN'S LACROSSE

Air Force, High Point and Richmond each spent time in the national rankings this year, with the Falcons pulling off one of the biggest upsets of the season with a 14-13 win over No. 5 Duke to open the campaign. Mercer sophomore attackman Sean Goldsmith finished the abbreviated season as the Division I leader in goals per game (4.86), twice matching the SoCon record with seven goals in a game and earning Inside Lacrosse Maverik Media All-America honorable mention alongside Richmond's Sean Menges and Jason Reynolds.



BASEBALL

Several league teams got off to hot starts, with six finishing with at least 10 wins and four finishing with three losses or fewer. Samford finished with a 13-2 mark that including a nine-game win streak, with Wofford just behind at 14-3, including a 4-3 win over No. 14 Auburn in what would be its last game of the season. Mercer

won its first 11 games of the season en route to a 13-3 record, while ETSU's eight-game win streak was halted by No. 20 Tennessee to end the season at 12-3. ETSU pitcher Landon Knack, who led Division I with 51 strikeouts and a 51.00 strikeoutto-walk ratio, and Samford second baseman Brooks Carlson, who led DI with a .644 on-base percentage, earned first-team All-America honors from Collegiate Baseball. Knack was taken in the second round of the MLB First-Year Player Draft by the Los Angeles Dodgers, while Western Carolina's Chase Walter and Wofford's Brett Rodriguez signed free-agent deals with the San Diego Padres and Seattle Mariners, respectively.

WOMEN'S LACROSSE

Mercer was off to a 5-2 start when the season was curtailed, with sophomore Hailey Rhatigan leading the league in scoring at 4.86 points per game. Furman's Hannah Demis finished the season leading the SoCon and in the top 10 in Division I in assists (20) and assists per game (2.86).



SOFTBALL

The SoCon's seven softball teams had yet to get into conference play when the season was canceled, but defending regularseason champion UNCG was off to a 15-7 start to the year and ETSU earned its first-ever win over a ranked opponent when it downed No. 20 Tennessee on March 1. Freshman hurler Savannah Rice pitched a gem in her first game in a Western Carolina uniform, tossing a complete-game shutout as the Catamounts played spoiler in Clemson's inaugural home game by defeating the Tigers 2-0 in game one of a doubleheader on Feb. 12. Emily Coltharp of preseason SoCon favorite and defending SoCon tournament champion Chattanooga was hitting .415 through 21 games, while teammate Celie Hudson was leading the league with a 1.92 ERA.
