CLINTON, Miss. | Alabama State University won the 2018 SWAC women's cross country title at Choctaw Trails, besting Grambling 73-82 to regain the crown.

Led by Arion Span, who finished second overall, the Lady Hornets had three runners place in the top 15, and four in the top-16. Maryiah Archibald finished ninth overall, and Vinnelle Grant finished 13th overall as the Lady Hornets claimed their seventh title in the last eight years.

Prairie View A&M finished third (91), while Jackson State (98) was fourth. Defending champion Mississippi Valley State rounded out the top five with 109 points.

Southern (115), UAPB (166), Alcorn State (172) and Texas Southern (192) completed the field.

Scholasticah Kemei of Mississippi Valley State easily outdistanced the field to claim her second-straight Women's Runner of the Year award. The junior won with a time of 17:18.8, more than a minute ahead of Span (18:33.05).

Alabama State's Ritchie Beene was named SWAC Women's Cross Country Coach of the Year.

ARKANSAS-PINE BLUFF GOLDEN LIONS





CLINTON, Miss. | Arkansas-Pine Bluff placed four runners in the top 20 to bring home the 2018 Southwestern Athletic Conference Men's Cross Country title.

The Golden Lions tallied 62 points, besting Prairie View A&M. The Panthers finished second for consecutive seasons, scoring 76 points. Grambling State finished third with 78 points. Wade Garner led the way, finishing fourth with a time of 26:20.3. Laurel Heath took 10th overall with a time of 26:50.44.

Rounding out the standings were Southern (98), Jackson State (102), Texas Southern (120), Alabama State (157), Missisippi Valley (195) and Alcorn State (220)

Vincent Langat bested the field with a time of 25:11.32 to earn the 2018 SWAC Men's Cross Country Athlete of the Year award for the second year in a row. Texas Southern's Hilary Maiyo was close behind, claiming second (25:20.91), and Levante Williams finished third (25:28.57).

UAPB coach Chris McCoy was named SWAC Men's Cross Country Coach of the Year.

HOWARD **BISON**





PRAIRIE VIEW, Texas | In a tale of two halves, Howard won its third SWAC Women's Soccer Tournament, besting Grambling State 1-0 for the 2018 title Sunday afternoon at the Prairie View A&M Soccer Complex.

This is the third title for coach Brent Leiba's Lady Bison, and the first since 2015.

Howard joins Mississippi Valley State as the only programs to win three SWAC Women's Soccer Tournament championships.

After being shut down for much of the match, Howard finally broke through as tournament Most Valuable Player Jordan Taylor got behind the Grambling defense to settle a Thalia Boucher pass and blast one over the reach of Hanna Johnson at the 52nd minute. The mark ended the Lady Tigers' shutout streak at 901 minutes and was Taylor's second goal of the tournament.

From that point, momentum shifted with Howard (13-6-1) putting Grambling on its heels, outshooting the top-seeded Lady Tigers 9-5 in the final 45 – compared to an 11-0 edge for Grambling in the first half. The Bison had a pair of chances but were unable to convert. However, the Lady Tigers were unable to revive the offensive pressure with which they dominated the first half, ultimately falling just short of its third soccer tournament crown.

Grambling (14-8) was quick out of the gate upon first touch and managed an open look at

the goal just seven minutes in after a header by Chloe Robinson just made it over the reach of Howard keeper Alayah Hightower. However, Bison defender Marley Christian was there to clean it up, as a sliding strike prevented the goal.

The Lady Tigers continued to stay the aggressive route, as Florence David managed to get a header on a corner kick, but the shot was just wide of the twine. Undeterred, Grambling kept the Bison on their heels with constant pressure, but Howard remained strong at the point of attack.

Alyssa Ozuna had perhaps the best opening of the half for Grambling, but her shot went off the right crossbar just out of range for Hightower.

Grambling edged Howard 16-9 in shots taken, with a 10-5 advantage in tries on goal. Hightower made nine saves for a clean sheet. Grambling had five corner kicks to Howard's two.

ALL-TIME SWAC CHAMPIONS

2018 Howard





ITTA BENA, Miss. | In a hard-fought four-set affair, Alabama State (23-17) bested in-state rival and top seed Alabama A&M to win the 2018 Southwestern Athletic Conference Women's Volleyball Tournament Sunday afternoon at R.W. Harrison HPER Complex.

Alabama State won the first two sets by scores of 25-13 and 25-15. Alabama A&M took set three 25-22, but the Lady Hornets rebounded to claim their third-straight championship – and fifth in the last six years – with a 25-19 set four win

A stalemate initially, Candace Martin's cross-court smash keyed a frame-turning run for the Lady Hornets, who then went ahead 10-7 on a Bayle' Bennett ace. The Lady Hornets pushed their lead to double-digits behind Bennett's effectiveness, as she put away six kills and three aces in the frame to power the defending champions to a decisive set one win.

Misfires from the Lady Bulldogs aided Alabama State's 8-4 run to open the second set, and a trio of smackdowns from Krysta Medearis increased the advantage to 14-9 in favor of the Lady Hornets.

With Alabama ASM unable to get going offensively – or slow down Alabama State's attack – the Lady Hornets built a 22-11 advantage after a pair of spikes and a block from Martin. After an AAMU timeout, the Lady Bulldogs showed some life with a quartet of points to get within seven, but the Lady Hornets yielded no more,

as Bennett closed the frame with a service ace.

With championship hopes dimming, Alana Cox began asserting herself for the Lady Bulldogs, who were the aggressors to begin the third frame. Cox put away four spikes as AAMU jumped ahead 14-10. The early advantage ultimately carried the Lady Bulldogs to a crucial set three win, as a late charge by Alabama State was stuffed by a Jaelin Gant kill.

In the fourth set, 2018 Tournament Most Valuable Player Bennett rose to the occasion, smoking three kills to push Alabama State ahead. Cox led AAMU (23-15) with 10 kills. Terra Brooks posted nine kills and 16 digs, and Megan Evans dished out 25 assists.

LORMAN, Miss. I In a thrilling back-and-forth affair, Alcorn State rallied late and controlled the fourth quarter to outlast Southern 37-28 to claim their third SWAC Football Championship in the past five seasons and 16th conference title overall on Saturday at Jack Spinks-Marino Casem Stadium.

The Braves (9-3) advance to the Celebration Bowl as Alcorn State will represent the SWAC in the Air Force Reserve Celebration Bowl against MEAC representative North Carolina A&T, who also won their conference. The historic match up will take place on Saturday, Dec. 15 from Mercedes-Benz Stadium in Atlanta, Ga. with a kickoff set for noon ET / 11 a.m. CT.

In front of a capacity crowd of 22,500 fans, redshirt junior quarterback Noah Johnson combined for 282 yards as he completed 18-of-25 passes for 135 yards and ran 16 times for 147 yards with two rushing touchdowns. Johnson was named the Offensive Most Valuable Player.

Brelion Hollis tied the team-high in tackles with seven and also had a half a tackle for a loss of three yards with half a sack to lead the Braves. The junior linebacker from Monroe, La. was named the Defensive Most Valuable Player of the Game.

It also marked the first SWAC Championship title in three seasons for head coach Fred McNair, who has made it to the big game in all three seasons at the helm.

SWAC Newcomer of the Year De'Shawn Waller averaged a robust 11.1 yards per carry as the junior racked up a game-high 177 yards on just 16 totes. Waller also flirted with the record for most yards in a SWAC title game (Fellow Brave Darryan Ragsdale-191 rushing yards versus Grambling State in the 2015 championship game).

Waller came out on hot early as he broke through with two first quarter touchdowns, one on a 13-yard scamper with 8:35 remaining to a cap an eight-play, 75-yard drive in 3:51, and the second on a game-breaking 83-yard touchdown run where he burst by all defenders without hardly being touched with 6:03 left.

The 83-yard run was the second longest in SWAC Football Championship Game history. Ragsdale retained his record-holding 84-yard touchdown in the 2015 title game against Grambling State.

In the fourth quarter, Waller came alive again as the Atlanta, Ga. native put it away with a 14-yard touchdown run up the middle to finish out a clock-eating 5:12 drive that spanned 68 yards on nine plays.

Sophomore quarterback Ladarius Skelton gave the Jaguars (7-4) opportunities to win as the sophomore finished 12-of-22 passes for 194 yards with one touchdown and one interception. The Pine Bluff, Ark. native added 100 yards on 22 rushes and three touchdowns on the ground.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. | The Southern University Jaguars outlasted Jackson State 45-41 to win the 2019 Toyota SWAC Women's Basketball Tournament Championship.

This is the first championship for Southern since 2010, and coach Carlos Funchess is the first coach since Cynthia Cooper-Dyke to guide a SWAC team to the tournament title in his or her first year on the sidelines.

A tight one from the opening tip, Christina Ellis carried the Jackson State offense early, matching Southern point for point on her own during the first quarter. In the second, the Jaguars turned things around behind back-to-back layups by Taneara Moore that brought them within two.

With Jackson State slogging through a five-minute drought without a field goal, Jaden Towner tied the game at 14 with a corner jumper. Kaisah Lucky broke the Lady Tigers' cold snap with a shot, but Courtney Parsons snapped a three-minute scoreless streak for the Jaguars with a make of her own.

After a Marneisha Hamer layup rattled out, Parsons converted on the other end to put Southern ahead with 55 seconds left before the break. The Jaguars closed the half on a 6-0 run, taking a 20-16 lead into intermission.

Southern continued to stay a step ahead of Jackson State as the third quarter progressed thanks to the play of 2019 Tournament Most

Valuable Player Alyric Scott, with the Jaguars cashing in on interior opportunities. However, Hamer refused to let the Lady Tigers fade, scoring 10 points in the frame.

An Ellis drive pulled Jackson State within three as the third quarter came to a close, and Hamer converted one of two free throws to inch the Lady Tigers closer with 7:41 left in the game. Hamer later knocked down a jumper to tie the game at 33 with 6:34 left.

Southern's Skylar O'Bear knocked down a three to put the Jaguars up 36-33, and Taylor Lattimore cut the JSU deficit to one with a perfect trip to the line. Lucky followed suit to put Jackson State ahead, but Scott answered on the other end for Southern. Parsons drained a trey to increase the Jaguars' lead to 41-37, but Hamer answered with a jumper to put the Lady Tigers back within one possession.

Scott again converted from close to make the contest 43-39 with 1:02 left, and though Ellis made a pair of free throws to bring JSU back within a basket, Brittany Rose found Rishonti Cowart alone on the other end, who cashed in on a point-blank layup to keep the Jaguars ahead, as Jackson State was unable to convert on several chances in the final seconds.

Scott led the Jaguars with 14 points, 15 rebounds and a pair of steals. Parsons added nine points and seven assists. Hamer led all players with 17 points, adding eight rebounds, and Ellis scored 12 points.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. | Overcoming a 13-point deficit early on, Prairie View A&M (22-12) topped Texas Southern (21-13) in a thrilling 92-86 contest to win the 2019 Toyota SWAC Basketball Tournament.

The win takes Coach Byron Smith and the Panthers to March Madness for the first time since 1998.

With Tyrik Armstrong having the hot hand early, Texas Southern rushed to a 13-4 advantage over the top-seeded Panthers.

The Tigers built a 20-7 lead following a Trayvon Reed dunk with a little over 13 minutes left, but Prairie View A&M fought back with an overwhelming 19-4 barrage over the next six minutes to take a 26-24 lead.

The cross-town rivals traded points until the Panthers pushed the pace late, with 2019 Toyota SWAC Basketball Tournament Most Valuable Player Gary Blackston converting consecutive buckets to give PVAMU a 41-35 lead. The Panthers kept the advantage the rest of the frame.

In the second half, it was Prairie View A&M that got off to the hot start, as a sudden 6-0 run pushed its lead to 51-41. Jalyn Patterson then got going for Texas Southern, cutting the Panthers' lead down with a trio of layups. Eden Ewing and Combs each followed with scores on the inside as the Tigers tied the game.

Antione Lister buried back-to-back threes to put PVAMU back in front, but Patterson responded with a three-pointer to bring TSU within one, and Devocio Butler converted a three-point play to put the Tigers ahead 63-62.

After PVAMU reclaimed the lead with a Taishaun Johnson basket, both sides traded points. With the contest tied at 81 with 2:35 left, Dennis Jones converted a driving layup with 2:00 left to put PVAMU ahead 83-81. Patterson knotted it back up with 1:25 left, and Darius Williams sank a pair of free throws to put the Panthers up 85-83 with 1:12 remaining.

Reed tapped home a Patterson miss to tie the game with 36 seconds left, and PVAMU's Devonte Patterson sank a pair of free throws to put the Panthers up 87-85 with 26 seconds to go, and Jones sealed the championship for Prairie View A&M with clutch shooting from the line the rest of the way.

Blackston led PVAMU with 17 points, six steals and four rebounds. Jones added 17 points and three steals.

J. Patterson paced Texas Southern with 24 points and five assists. Combs scored 13 points and grabbed 10 rebounds.

ARLINGTON, Texas | Prairie View A&M took the long road to the 2019 Southwestern Athletic Conference Women's Bowling Tournament Championship with a pair of victories over Jackson State Sunday at the Bowling International Research and Training Center.

The victory is the first title for head coach Glenn White and the Lady Panthers since 2015. The win also earns Prairie View A&M a spot in a play-in match with a berth to the NCAA Bowling Championships on the line.

Alexes Burton was named the tournament's Most Valuable Bowler.

Jackson State earned game one 154-145 as Capri Howard knocked down 27 of a possible 30 pins in the final frame to close it out for the Lady Tigers. The Lady Panthers rebounded with a flourish in game two, leaving no open frames through the first nine as they tied the match with a 194-140 game two win.

Prairie View A&M took a 2-1 lead after Crystal Cline took advantage of an open 10th frame by Jackson State to seal the game for the Lady Panthers 190-174. After the Lady Panthers took a 3-1 lead following a 202-169 win in game four, Jackson State regrouped, leaving no open frames in game five and winning 208-188.

Violet Kirk delivered a clutch strike in the ninth frame that propelled Jackson State to a match-tying 190-156 win in game six, but the

Lady Tigers squandered open frames early in game seven as Prairie View A&M forced the winner-take-all second match with a 181-151 victory.

Prairie View A&M carried that momentum into the second matchup, winning game one 173-143 and starting strong in game two with three strikes and a spare. The Lady Panthers went on to win the game 204-187.

Jackson State surged to begin the third game, but midway through Prairie View A&M overtook the Lady Tigers as JSU left the fourth and fifth frames open. With JSU ahead 157-153, Cline posted solid counts on the 10th frame as the Lady Panthers won the turn 169-157 and took a 3-0 lead. Howard had a chance to extend the match, but an open final frame in game four sealed the title for the Lady Panthers.



ALEXANDRIA La. | The Alabama State Lady Hornets claimed the 2019 SWAC Women's Golf Championship title behind dominant performances from their field of five golfers.

Alabama State has now claimed six out of the last seven SWAC Championships including winning back-to-back titles (2018, 2019).

ASU, who led by 24 strokes following the opening round, ended the tournament with a 605 and finished 49 strokes ahead of second place Texas Southern. The Lady Hornets had four players shoot 79 or better, and had the best five rounds of the day individually between the teams competing.

Texas Southern finished second in the tournament with a 654, while Prairie View A&M finished third with a two-day total of 702.

The Lady Hornets dominated the final day with all five players finishing inside the top five, including Shania Jones with medalist honors. She finished the tournament with a three-over par (147), including a final round 71 to claim the title; while teammate Jade Sanders finished second with a six-over par (150) after a final round 79.

Kei Harris, who entered the day tied for fifth, fired a final round 76 to finish third with a 10-over par (154); one shot ahead of teammate Mack Bailey in fourth at 11-over (155). Abigail Pederson rounded out the top five for Alabama State with a two-day total of 14-over par (158).







MONTGOMERY, Ala. | Alabama State claimed the 2019 Southwestern Athletic Conference Softball Tournament Championship with an 8-4 victory over Texas Southern, rebounding from a 6-2 loss to the Lady Tigers in the first game of the day.

This marks the second title in four years for coach Chris Steiner-Wilcoxson and the Lady Hornets.

Game 1

A big second inning was the difference for Texas Southern in the first championship game of the day.

After a scoreless first, Alabama State had a prime scoring chance in the top of the second, loading the bases with no outs. However, TSU pitcher Naomi Reyes and the Lady Tigers got out of the jam unscathed and immediately took control as Madi Marek led off the bottom of the second with a solo home run to left.

With Alabama State starter Vanessa Bradford struggling with her command, Texas Southern loaded the bases and scrapped together two more runs. Julia Bilbao scored Tevanae Tate with a single to right, and Bradford walked in another run. Charlene Castro came on to relieve Bradford, but Lauryn Banks drew a bases-loaded free pass to make it 4-0 TSU. The inning ended when Marek hit into a force out at third.

Texas Southern continued to build its

advantage, as Terren Vinson singled to right to score Marissa Padron. Ebony Wiltz then scored on a wild pitch to make it 6-0.

Game 2

After Bilbao and Kelsey Riley drew walks off of Alabama State's Justine Jean, Texas Southern's Banks put the Lady Tigers on the board with a single to left, scoring Riley. The Lady Tigers managed to load the bases with two out, but Marissa Padron lined out to Jean to end the inning.

Castro led off with a double for Alabama State in the top of the second, sparking a chance. After Alabama State loaded the bases, a mishandled grounder allowed Castro to score and tie the game. James scored on a sac fly by Casey Durham to put Alabama State ahead.

Texas Southern tied the game with a RBI single from Tate but Alabama State was gifted three runs during the top of the fourth thanks to a trio of errors.

In the bottom of the fifth, Texas Southern loaded the bases with no outs with a pair of walks sandwiching a Marek single. Texas Southern pushed one across, but the Lady Hornets escaped further damage. The Lady Tigers continued to fight back, but stranded two in the sixth. From there, the Lady Hornets added three insurance runs for Jean, who closed it out in the final frame on her way to the 2019 SWAC Softball Tournament Most Valuable Player award.

Southern landed the first blow thanks to a RBI double by Ashanti Wheatley that scored Tyler LaPorte, who drew a leadoff walk. However, the Hornets ended the damage there as Hunter David flied out and Wheatley was tagged out at third following the ensuing throw-in.

After a 1-2-3 inning, the Jaguars added to the lead with a two-run blast by Bobby Johnson. The sides traded scoreless innings until the top of the fifth, where the Jaguars added to their lead. There, Coby Taylor was hit by a pitch and Javeyan Williams laid down a bunt, beating the tag at first before LaPorte dropped a flare to right for a two-run triple.

Johnny Johnson scored LaPorte on a double down the left field line and stole third, scoring on a RBI sac fly by David. LaPorte later put the contest out of reach with a three-run shot over the left field wall and with the Hornets unable to figure out Southern starter Eli Finney, the Jaguars added five runs for insurance down the stretch, cruising to their first SWAC tournament championship since 2009.

ATLANTA, Ga. I A dominant second-half effort was not enough for the Alcorn State University football team, as it fell shy of its sixth Black College National Championship in a 24-22 loss to North Carolina A&T State University during the 2018 Air Force Reserve Celebration Bowl.

North Carolina A&T (10-2) wasted no time getting on the board, taking the game's opening possession and marched 65 yards in five plays to tack on a touchdown via a 17-yard touchdown pass from Lamar Raynard to Zachary Leslie. After the sides traded punts, Alcorn (9-4) methodically traveled 84 yards in a 14-play, 7:12 drive capped by a Corey McCullough 29-yard field goal to put its first points on the board.

The contest evolved into a defensive struggle through much of the second quarter, as the Braves' defense completely bottled up the Aggies rushing attack. However, Noah Johnson and the Alcorn offense were slow to capitalize. On their second possession of the quarter, Johnson was picked off by North Carolina A&T's Timadre Abram, who returned it 21 yards down to the Alcorn 27-yard line.

The Braves' defense stiffened on the ensuing drive, forcing a pair of Raynard incompletions as the Aggies settled for a 36-yard field goal by Noel Ruiz that made the game 10-3 with 8:33 left in the half. Defense continued to rule until North Carolina A&T's final possession of the half, where Raynard managed to find some room in the Alcorn secondary. Raynard hit Leslie for a 22-yard gain and connected with receiver Elijah Bell on three occasions during the drive, the final pitch-and-catch a 27-yard scoring strike to cap a six-play, 70-yard drive

that 2:30 off the clock. After the point after, the Aggies held a 17-3 lead with 53 ticks left in the half.

Despite the deficit, Alcorn didn't blink as Johnson took the Braves down the field with his legs and arm, sandwiching a 13-yard scamper between a pair of 14-yard receptions by Chris Blair. Johnson then hooked up with Juan Anthony for a 26-yard completion, allowing McCullough to tack on another field goal – this one from 25 yards out – as the half came to a close.

After punting on its opening drive of the third quarter, Alcorn's defense stepped up to halt an Aggie drive as Brady Smith picked off a Raynard pass at the Braves' 31-yard line.

Though the Braves stalled on the ensuing possession, the defense again rose to the occasion. A pair of Alcorn penalties put North Carolina A&T near midfield, and the Aggies appeared poised to strike after Raynard found Leslie for a 44-yard completion that brought the MEAC champions to Alcorn's 9-yard line. The Braves allowed nothing further, as Raynard threw a pair of incompletions and on fourth down, Alcorn's Brelion Hollis snuffed out a Ernest Bush pass to Leroy Hill, stopping the latter for a loss of six on fourth and goal.

Johnson was 11-of-27 for 128 yards and rushed for 120 yards on 14 attempts. Waller carried the ball 19 times for 167 yards as Alcorn outrushed North Carolina A&T 328-94. Defensively, Hollis paced the Braves with 10 stops and 2.5 tackles for loss. Alcorn outgained North Carolina A&T 451-324, and edged the Aggies in total first downs. 20-17.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. | For the sixth-straight year, the Southwestern Athletic Conference has recognized Alabama State University as the winner of the James Frank Commissioner's Cup.

The Hornets athletics program, which also won the Sadie Magee/ Barbara Jacket Award for the seventh-consecutive year, earned ten SWAC championships this past year to garner the honors.

Prairie View A6M and Alabama State won a share of the C.D. Henry Award as both programs finished with 72 total points in the men's final standings. The trophies were formally presented at the league's annual spring meetings.

"The Southwestern Athletic Conference would like to congratulate Alabama State University and Prairie View A&M University on outstanding athletic seasons," said SWAC Commissioner Dr. Charles McClelland.

"This past year, both programs exemplified excellence in the field of athletics in a wide variety of sports. We're extremely pleased to be able to recognize the achievements and hard work of the student-athletes and athletic support staffs at both institutions with the crowning of the Magee/Jacket and James Frank Commissioner's Cup awards for Alabama State and the C.D. Henry Award for Alabama State and Prairie View A&M."

Magee/Jacket Award

The Lady Hornets totaled 109.5 points to beat out secondplace finisher Prairie View A&M (89.5 points).

Alabama State captured seven team titles, including women's cross country, volleyball, indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, qolf, tennis and softball.

Rounding out the standings are Texas Southern (71), Southern (67), Grambling State (61.5), Jackson State (57), Alabama A6M (51), Arkansas-Pine Bluff (38.5), Alcorn State (38), and Mississippi Valley State (28)

The Magee/Jacket Award is presented to the top women's athletic program in the SWAC. It is named after former Jackson State women's basketball coach Sadie Magee and former Prairie View A&M track and field coach Barbara Jacket.

Magee was the first women's basketball coach at Jackson State, compiling four SWAC regular season titles and three-straight National Association of Women's Sports National Championships from 1978-1980.

Jacket led the Prairie View A&M to eight cross country, nine indoor

and five outdoors SWAC titles from 1965 to 1991. She was also the head coach of the 1992 U.S. Women's Olympic Track team that brought home four gold medals, three silver medals and three bronze medals from Barcelona, Spain.

C.D. Henry Award

Prairie View A&M (72), and Alabama State (72 points) each claimed a share of the league's men's all-sports award finishing in a tie.

The Panthers captured team championships in men's basketball and men's golf. PVAMU claimed back-to-back golf titles and ended a two-decade long drought by claiming the 2019 SWAC Tournament title in men's basketball.

Alabama State claimed three men's titles during the year winning championships in indoor track and field, outdoor track and field, and tennis.

Finishing in third through tenth, respectively, were Arkansas-Pine Bluff (59), Jackson State (57), Texas Southern (50.5), Southern (46.5), Grambling State (41.5), Alcorn State (36.5), Mississippi Valley State (27), and Alabama ABM (24).

The Henry Award is presented to the top men's athletic program in the SWAC. The award is named for C.D. Henry, former Grambling State chairman of the College of Health, Physical Education, and Recreation Department from 1958-74, as well as serving as the executive officer and secretary-statistician for the SWAC in 1968-73.

Henry became the first African American assistant commissioner of any conference office when he joined the Big Ten Conference in June of 1974.

James Frank Commissioner's Cup

With 109 points from the Magee/Jacket Award and 73 from the Henry Award standings, ASU took first place with 182 total points. Prairie View A&M finished second with a combined 165 points.

Texas Southern finished third with 121.5 total points, and Jackson State tallied 114 total points to earn fourth place.

Southern (113.5), Grambling State (103), Arkansas-Pine Bluff (97.5), Alabama A&M (75), Alcorn State (74.5) and Mississippi Valley State (55) round out the final standings.

The Commissioner's Cup, named for former league commissioner James Frank who led the SWAC from 1983 through 1998, is awarded to the university compiling the highest combined total of men's and women's all-sport points.

The Henry and Magee/Jacket Awards are presented to the top men's and women's athletic programs in the SWAC. They are awarded on a 12-point system for all sports, except women's soccer which is on a 13-point system. Point values are based on place at the conclusion of the regular season with first place receiving the maximum points allowed. Sports such as cross country, track and field and golf which do not have conference standings during the regular season will have points awarded based on finish at SWAC championships.



BIRMINGHAM, Ala. The Southwestern Athletic Conference celebrated the enshrinement of the league's 2018 Hall of Fame class on Friday evening at the Sheraton.

Alcorn State's Dave Washington, Jr., Alabama State's Larry Watkins, Grambling State's Ralph A. Garr, Sr., Jackson State's Eric Strothers, Prairie View A&M's Nathaniel Gross, Southern's Roger Cador, and longtime league administrator Lonza Hardy were among those recognized during a gala attended by fellow hall of famers and league dignitaries.

The newest members of the Hall of Fame were selected from a list of nominees who were submitted by his or her respective institution. The nominees were then elected for induction by the selection committee from members appointed by SWAC Presidents and Chancellors.

Washington was a key contributor for the Braves at linebacker under coach Marino Casem as the team won the 1968 and 1969 Black College National Championships. Washington went on to enjoy a 10-year career in the NFL, garnering All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors during stints with Denver, San Francisco and Buffalo.

Watkins, who was joined by former players and current coaches, is synonymous with Alabama State baseball, having played for the team as a centerfielder nicknamed the "Toy Cannon." The Hornet lifer coached the program for more than 30 years, amassing a school-record 513 victories and numerous postseason appearances. Currently, he serves as a Special Assistant to the Athletic Director at his alma mater, and the Hornets' home field carries his namesake alongside former ASU coach Herbert Wheeler.

Garr was one of the greatest hitters to ever suit up for the Grambling baseball program, hitting.585 – a figure that led the nation – during the 1967 season, during which the Tigers posted a 35-1 regular season record. Garr was then drafted in the third round by the Atlanta Braves, where he won the National League batting title in 1974, garnering All-Star honors as well that season. Garr hit better than .300 five times in his career and earned a spot in the Atlanta Braves Hall of Fame in 2006.

Strothers is a member of Jackson State's 1,000-point club, starring as an all-conference forward from 1987-1991. Strothers twice earned All-SWAC honors – during his junior and senior seasons – and averaged 17.4 points per game in the 1991 season, leading the Tigers to a SWAC regular-season and tournament championship.

One of the most dominant sprinters in the SWAC during his competitive days, Gross starred at Prairie View during the late 1990s. He was a member of Prairie View A&M's first indoor track and field championship team (1998) and also helped lead the Panthers to team titles in 1999 and 2000. The Hockley, Texas native won multiple titles in the 200-meter, 400-meter and 4x100-meter relay events.

Cador is one of the SWAC's greatest coaches, regardless of sport, after an illustrious 32-year career as coach of the Southern Jaguars baseball program. Building the Jaguars into a perennial power during his heyday, Cador won 913 games in his career, amassing a winning percentage of .604. In addition, Cador won 14 SWAC championships over his time as Southern's skipper.

2018 SWAC HALL OF FAME

Hardy spent nearly four decades within the SWAC, making his mark in the realm of sports information as well as athletics administration. As sports information director of Alcorn State (1980-86) and Southern (1986-89), Hardy was recognized as the league's sports information director of the year four times in the decade. From there, Hardy became athletics director at Mississippi Valley State University in 2001 and during his six-year tenure, the Delta Devils and Devilettes won five conference titles in softball, women's soccer and men's basketball. After a similar tenure of success at Hampton University from 2007-2011, Hardy returned to the SWAC as athletics director of the University of Arkansas at Pine Bluff, where Hardy restructured the school's compliance and academic services and ultimately oversaw a significant increase in student-athlete graduation rates as well as athletics fundraising. UAPB also won the 2012 SWAC Football Championship under Hardy's leadership.







BIRMINGHAM, Ala. | The Southwestern Athletic Conference revealed its 2018 postseason soccer honors, with Mississippi Valley State's Laadi Issaka, Grambling State's Haileigh Adams and Justin Wagar, Howard's Jordan Taylor and Southern's Chioma Eriken taking home individual accolades. The teams and award winners were determined in a vote among the league's coaches and sports information directors.

Issaka collected Offensive Player of the Year accolades for the second time in her decorated career after an exceptional season where she scored 20 goals, dished out seven assists and accounted for a nation-leading 47 total points. The senior striker, who shared the honors in 2016, is the nation's active leader in career total points.

Adams picked up Defensive Player of the Year honors after helping to anchor a Lady Tigers' defense that has not conceded a goal in seven straight matches. A one-time defensive player of the week honoree, Adams aided the Lady Tigers in allowed just 1.11 goals per game and limiting opponents to a combined 78 shots on goal.

Taylor, the 2018 SWAC Freshman of the Year led the Bison in scoring with 14 points, finding the twine six times during the season and adding a pair of assists. The Wadsworth, Ohio native earned offensive player of the week honors twice this year, scoring the game-winner on three separate occasions this season.

Eriken earned the 2018 SWAC Goalkeeper of the Year award. She leads the SWAC as well as the nation in saves (150) and saves per game (10.00). Ranking second in the league with a .847 save percentage, the Mesquite, Texas native put up five matches with 10 or more saves and is responsible for the most saves in a single match by any player in the country thanks to a 22-stop effort versus Grambling on Oct. 5

Wagar earned his second SWAC Coach of the Year award in as many seasons after he guided the Lady Tigers to a 12-7 record (9-1 SWAC) and the conference regular season title. Under Wagar's direction, Grambling allowed 1.11 goals per game and boasted the second-best scoring margin among all teams. Thanks to ferocious defense, Grambling outscored SWAC opponents 20-1 during play and has not allowed a goal in seven straight matches entering tournament play.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. I The Southwestern Athletic Conference revealed its 2018 postseason volleyball honors, with Alabama State's Candace Martin and Alabama A&M's Maya Evans, Megan Evans and Alana Cox taking home individual accolades. The teams and award winners were determined in a vote among the league's coaches and sports information directors.

The SWAC all-conference teams consist of 18 student-athletes split across two teams.

For the first time since 2014, the SWAC awarded Co-Player of the Year, with Martin and Ma. Evans sharing the honors after establishing themselves as two of the league's premier two-way players. Martin, a 6'O senior middle blocker from Memphis, Tenn. put down 212 kills on a strong .276 attack percentage, the latter ranking third in the league. Additionally, the defensive force led the SWAC in total blocks (112).

Ma. Evans, a 6'1 middle hitter from Houston, led the league in hitting percentage by a significant margin, converting a sparkling .382 of her attacks into kills. The sophomore collected 247 putdowns with 74 total blocks, 31 service aces and 60 digs, accumulating 307 total points. The four-time SWAC Setter of the Week winner posted 15 matches where she accumulated an attack percentage of .400 or better, and 11 matches with a .500 hit clip.

Me. Evans claimed Setter of the Year and Newcomer of the Year honors, after orchestrating a Lady Bulldogs attack that paced the league in most every significant statistical category. The 6'O sophomore dished out 1019 total assists – a figure that ranks No. 2 in the conference – and averaged a league-best 8.86 helpers per frame. Posting 18 matches with 30 or more assists on the season, the Houston native also picked up 186 digs and was a factor offensively with 84 kills on a.317 attack percentage and 32 service aces.

Cox was named the 2018 SWAC Freshman of the Year. Amassing 313 total kills on a .208 hit percentage, the 6'0 hitter from Madison, Ala. ranks in the top five of league standings for kills per set and points per set. On defense, she added 122 digs and 76 total blocks.

Augustine was named Libero of the Year for the second-straight season. The senior posted 392 digs, good for fourth-most in the SWAC. She averaged the third-most digs per set (3.66), and posted 20 matches with 10 or more digs. Augustine is the first player since Southern's Diamond Williams (2014-15) to garner consecutive top libero honors.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. | The Southwestern Athletic Conference released its 2018 All-Conference Teams on Thursday with 12 players from the SWAC East Division champions Alcorn State being tabbed for the most individual honors. The teams were announced two days prior to the 2018 Toyota SWAC Football Championship at Jack Spinks-Marino Casem Stadium on the campus of Alcorn State University in Lorman, Miss., after ballots were cast by the league's head coaches and sports information directors. In all, 48 players were named to this year's All-Conference teams.

After helping lead the Braves to a conference-best eight-win season, Alcorn State quarterback Noah Johnson was the voters' choice for the SWAC Offensive Player of the Year award. Following up on his Preseason All-SWAC First team nod, Johnson delivered as the redshirt junior completed a conference best 63.4 percent of his passes (168-of-265) and threw for 1,944 yards with 15 touchdowns against eight interceptions. Additionally, Johnson thrived as a dual threat by accounting for the fifth highest total of rushing yards in the conference with 813 yards on the ground and seven touchdowns. He was second in the SWAC in total yards of offense with 2,757.

De'Arius Christmas was tabbed as the SWAC Defensive Player of the Year for a second consecutive season after he racked up 55 tackles, 11 tackles for a loss, 5.5 sacks, two interceptions with one returned for a touchdown and two forced fumbles.

Alcorn State redshirt junior transfer De'Shawn Waller was named the SWAC Newcomer of the Year after the running back ranked fourth in the conference in rushing yards with 871 and was also tied for second in the SWAC in rushing touchdowns with nine and was ranked second in average rushing yards per contest with 108.9.

Arkansas-Pine Bluff wide receiver Dejuan Miller was named the SWAC Freshman of the Year after ranking tied for first in the conference in receptions with 56, third in receiving yardage with 801, and was tied for second in receiving touchdowns with six. The Belle Glade, Fla., native was also third in receiving yards per game with 72.8 and was second in receptions per contest with 5.1.

Fred McNair was dubbed the SWAC Coach of the Year after leading the Braves to a fifth straight SWAC East Division crown. Alcorn State was first in points allowed per game (20.6), boosted the conference's best run stopping defense (allowed 93.2 yards per game), tied for second most interceptions (12), most sacks (45) and limited opponents to the least amount of first downs per game (15.9). On offense, Alcorn State was ranked second in the conference in points per game (33.2), first in total average yards of offense (471.3) and was first in rushing yards per game (274.3).

Prairie View A&M had the second most total amount of selections on the teams with nine (seven on Second Team), Arkansas-Pine Bluff followed with seven selections (five on First Team) while Alabama A&M and Alabama State each had five choices apiece named to the teams. The Bulldogs had two players named to First Team and the Hornets had one player honored with a First Team slot.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. | Grambling State University senior guard Shakyla Hill was named the 2018-19 Southwestern Athletic Conference Women's Basketball Player and Defensive Player of the Year. The announcement comes as part of the league's reveal of its 2018-19 all-conference teams and honorees.

Additionally, Alabama State's Ayana Emmanuel was named SWAC Freshman of the Year, Jackson State guard Kaisah Lucky earned Newcomer of the Year accolades, and Southern University coach Carlos Funchess won Coach of the Year honors. The teams and individual awards were voted on by the league's head coaches and sports information directors.

Hill led the league in points (18.7), assists (6.0) and steals per game (4.5), also ranking second in rebounds per game at 7.6. The Little Rock, Ark. native also set a new SWAC career steals record this season. She scored in double figures in 29 of 30 games and was named SWAC Player of the Week six times. The senior also became the first player in NCAA history – man or woman – to record two quadruple-doubles in a college career, achieving the feat versus UAPB on Feb. 2.

Emmanuel led Alabama State in scoring at 13.4 points per game, a figure that ranks sixth in the conference. The Pompano Beach, Fla. native flashed as one of the league's top sharpshooters, connecting on 39 percent of her tries from beyond the arc and ranking second in the league in free-throw percentage (.798).

Lucky guided Jackson State toward becoming the league's best offense, as the Lady Tigers led the SWAC in points per game (70.1), field-goal percentage (.440) and three-point percentage (.330). The Brooklyn, N.Y. native averaged 8.6 points, 5.3 assists, 4.6 rebounds and 1.5 steals per game for Jackson State.

Under Funchess' direction, the Jaguars earned the regular-season championship, posting a 17-12 record (14-4 SWAC). Southern boasted the second-ranking scoring defense in the league and posted two separate win streaks of at least five games this season.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. | Texas Southern University forward Jeremy Combs was named the 2018-19 Southwestern Athletic Conference Men's Basketball Player and Newcomer of the Year. The announcement comes as part of the league's reveal of its 2018-19 all-conference teams and honorees.

Prairie View A&M's Dennis Jones won the Defensive Player of the Year honor, Jackson State's Jayveous McKinnis earned Freshman of the Year accolades, and Prairie View A&M coach Byron Smith was named Coach of the Year. The teams and individual awards were voted on by the league's head coaches and sports information directors.

Combs was second in the league in points (16.9) per game, leading the SWAC in rebounds per game (9.0) and ranking near the top of the conference heap in field-goal percentage (.601). The Dallas, Texas native recorded 11 double-doubles on the season and earned player of the week honors five times.

Jones led the league in steals at 2.0 and served as a lynchpin of an aggressive Panthers defense that led the league in steals per game (8.6) and turnovers per game at (18.1).

McKinnis averaged 8.3 points, 7.7 rebounds and a league-best 2.1 blocked shots per game for the league's top ranked scoring defense. A first-team All-SWAC honoree at center, McKinnis shot a conference-best 67.3 percent from the field.

Smith guided the Panthers to their first regular-season championship since 2003, posting a 17-1 record in SWAC play (19-12 SWAC). PVAMU's 19 wins are the most by the team in this decade. Prairie View A&M's offense averaged more than 73 points per game, ranking second in the conference.

Prairie View A&M's Alexes Burton was named Bowler of the Year after posting a league-best average pinfall of 210.04 per game during league play in leading the Lady Panthers to the regular-season championship. 



BIRMINGHAM, Ala. | The Southwestern Athletic Conference revealed its 2019 All-Conference Softball teams and awards on the eve of the 2019 SWAC Softball Tournament, with Alabama A&M's Tamia Lee-Barbadillo and Cassandra Brown, Alabama State's Alexis Sydnor, Prairie View A&M's Crystal Castillo and Grambling State's Rikkelle Miller earning individual honors.

The All-SWAC team was determined based on a vote by the league's coaches and sports information directors.

Lee-Barbadillo earned Player and Hitter of the Year honors after a standout season highlighted by a SWAC-best 11 home runs and 35 runs scored. The first-team All-SWAC shortstop hit a teambest .371, amassing 46 hits, nine doubles, a .726 slugging percentage and 30 RBIs as she led the Bulldogs to its second-straight Eastern Division championship.

Brown garnered Coach of the Year honors after leading Alabama A&M to a 22-17 record (11-7 SWAC) in her first year at the helm. This is the second-straight season Alabama A&M has had the Coach of the Year. The Bulldogs ranked top five in the conference in several offensive categories, including home runs, doubles, RBIs, slugging percentage and overall fielding percentage.

Sydnor hit .405 on her way to Newcomer of the Year honors. The Hornets' leading hitter, the junior ranked top two in steals, hits and batting average. The Opelika, Ala. native posted 49 hits, scored 31 runs and drove in 24 RBIs with a .570 slugging percentage.

Castillo was named Pitcher of the Year after posted a 12-4 record in the circle. The league leader in victories, Castillo also picked up four saves. Castillo held opponents to a .204 batting average and led the conference with 90 strikeouts, posting a 2.62 ERA.

The entire first and second team – which honors 22 players over eight teams – is listed on the next page. Texas Southern led with six total selections, and Prairie View A&M followed with five. Alabama State picked up four selections, Alcorn State had three players honored. Grambling State and Alabama A&M each received a pair of honorees, and Southern and Mississippi Valley had one selection each.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. | The Southwestern Athletic Conference announced its 2019 All-Conference Baseball teams and award winners, with individuals from Alabama State, Southern and Jackson State receiving individual honors.

The teams and award winners were decided in a vote by the league's coaches and sports information directors, with the honors handed out during a reception.

Alabama State senior outfielder Yamil Pagan and Southern senior third baseman Tyler LaPorte shared the highest individual award, earning Co-Player of the Year honors after leading their respective teams to division championships.

LaPorte hit .376 on the season, leading the league in hits (83) and doubles (17) while stealing 20 bases. LaPorte scored 53 runs and hit five home runs while driving in 55 RBIs and slugging .548 on the season.

Pagan, who also won Hitter of the Year honors, established himself as perhaps the conference's premier power hitter, leading the league in home runs (13), total bases (122), runs (63) and slugging percentage (.632) as he drove in 50 RBIs and hit for an average of .368.

Alabama State's Darren Kelly earned Pitcher of the Year honors, posting a 5-2 record on the season with a 3.14 earned run average. He allowed two earned runs or fewer in nine of his 11 appearances on the season, striking out 55 batters.

Teammate Ricardo Rivera was named Freshman of the Year after leading the Hornets with six victories from the mound. He struck out 42 hitters on the season, posting a 4.83 ERA.

Equon Smith of Jackson State garnered the Newcomer of the Year award, hitting .362 with 55 runs scored and 39 stolen bases. Smith drove in 36 runs and picked up 72 total hits on the season.

Southern's Connor Whalen earned Relief Pitcher of the Year honors after a sparkling season where he posted a 0.00 ERA in 13 appearances. Whalen was 4-0 with seven saves, allowing five hits all season as the Jaguars' closer. Jaguars coach Kerrick Jackson was named Coach of the Year after guiding Southern to a remarkable turnaround. After finishing last in the Western Division in 2018, the Jaguars went 28-21 (18-6 SWAC), earning the No. 1 seed in the division as well as out-of-conference wins over then No. 8 LSU, New Orleans, Florida A&M, Memphis and Nicholls State.

Southern led all teams with six total selections to the team, and Alabama State collected five slots across the first and second teams. Jackson State and Grambling State each saw four players honored. Texas Southern had two honorees, and UAPB, Alabama A&M and Mississippi Valley State each had one honoree.
