METLIFE STADIUM HOME OF THE GIANTS



In 2010, the Giants moved into a beautiful, new, state-of-the-art stadium built just a few yards from where Giants Stadium stood for more than three decades. MetLife Stadium is the nation's finest football stadium. It seats 82,500 fans and is one of the NFL's most technologically advanced stadiums.

MetLife Stadium took more than 4 million man-hours and \$1.6 billion to build. The stadium features more than 9,000 club seats, 221 suites and 130,000 square feet of state-of-the-art club lounges. The first row of seats is just 46 feet from the sidelines and the sightlines are superb. The Giants' home is 2.1 million square feet, compared to Giants Stadium's 900,000 square feet. It has four 30 feet by 118 feet high-definition video screens, a 350,000 square foot outdoor plaza filled with interactive activities for fans of all ages.

On Feb. 2, 2014, MetLife Stadium hosted a historic event. It was the site of Super Bowl XLVIII, the first Super Bowl to be played outdoors at a cold weather venue. The Seattle Seahawks defeated the Denver Broncos, 43-8.

In its inaugural 2010 season, the Giants' home was known simply as New Meadowlands Stadium. On Aug. 23, 2011 the Giants, Jets and MetLife announced the signing of a 25-year agreement to name the teams' home venue MetLife Stadium.

"Our partnership with the Giants and Jets goes back to 2008 when we became the first cornerstone sponsor here at the stadium," said Steven A. Kandarian, president and chief executive officer of MetLife. "This expanded partnership provides significant benefits for both sides. MetLife secures the naming rights to a world class venue that will extend the reach of our brand to levels unmatched in the industry. And the Jets and Giants gain a sponsor with a history of financial strength and a brand as strong and storied as their own. MetLife Stadium is clearly one of the world's premier sports marketing facilities."

The NFL's premier venue opened for business in 2010. In addition to being the only stadium that is home to two NFL teams and Super Bowl XLVIII, it hosts dozens of non-NFL events each year including concerts, NCAA football and lacrosse games and international soccer matches.

The entire Meadowlands Sports Complex has been renamed The MetLife Sports Complex.

"It is truly an honor for our team to be affiliated with such a wonderful partner," said John Mara, president and chief executive officer of the Giants. "I know how much MetLife means to so many in New York and New Jersey, as an employer, as a trusted provider of financial services, and as a great corporate citizen. The company's huge presence and influence in our area makes it a natural fit for this stadium and the strength, stability and quality of MetLife matches perfectly with the characteristics that the Giants try to achieve in all aspects of our aspirations. MetLife is a true leader in its industry and brings a powerful, well-known brand that reflects very well on our stadium and what we're trying to accomplish here. For the Giants in particular, MetLife's reputation and long history are very appealing qualities that resonate with us on a very basic level. We are both organizations that value heritage and legacy."

"MetLife Stadium immediately joins the ranks of the most prestigious, high-profile sports-branded venues in the world, and that's the way it should be," said Steve Tisch, the Giants' chairman and executive vice president. "If you look at MetLife and the marketing and branding assets they have, you can understand how proud we feel that they have selected our stadium as the one they want their name on. Clearly MetLife realizes what a unique situation we have: two NFL home teams and twice as many games over the course of the season. And of course, we are very proud that MetLife has recognized just what a fantastic, one-of-a-kind facility this stadium is."

The 2019 season will be the Giants' 10th in MetLife Stadium. They are 36-36 in regular-season games and 1-0 in the postseason, defeating Atlanta in a 2011 NFC Wild Card game on their way to winning Super Bowl XLVI. MetLife Stadium has hosted numerous prestigious events, including NFL, college football and soccer games, and concerts. In 2014, the stadium was the site of Super Bowl XLVIII, the first outdoor Super Bowl played in a "cold weather" city. Seattle defeated Denver, 43-8.

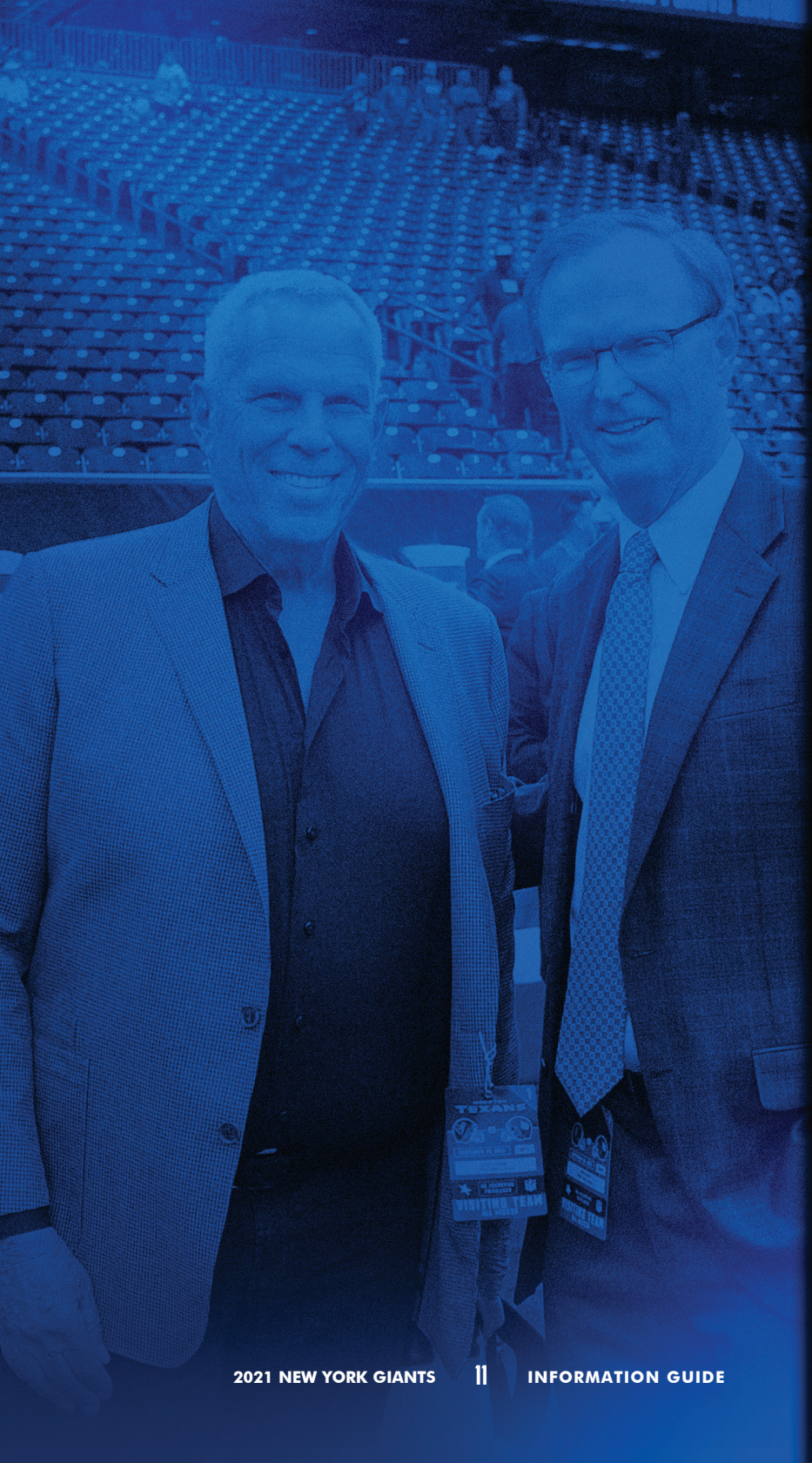

EXECUTIVES


JOHN K. MARA
PRESIDENT AND CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

John K. Mara is in his 31st season with the Giants. The franchise's President and Chief Executive Officer, he assumed the team presidency upon the passing of his father, Wellington Mara, in 2005. Mara joined the Giants in 1991 as General Counsel and later added the title of Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer.

With team Chairman Steve Tisch, Mara was at the forefront of the planning and negotiations for MetLife Stadium, where the Giants began playing their home games in 2010 after 34 seasons in Giants Stadium. In addition, Mara, Steve Tisch and Jonathan Tisch, as well as Jets owner Woody Johnson, headlined the bid committee that helped convince the NFL owners to award Super Bowl XLVIII to the new stadium. Seattle and Denver played in the game on Feb. 2, 2014. The first Super Bowl to be held in a cold-weather outdoor venue was an overwhelming success, both in the week prior to the game and on game day.

Mara, one of the NFL's most prominent and respected owners, is the chairman of the league's Management Council Executive Committee, and he played an important role in negotiating the 2011 and 2020 collective bargaining agreements with the NFLPA. He also serves on several other NFL committees, including for the last 20 years on the influential Competition Committee, which studies all aspects of the game and recommends rules and policy changes to NFL clubs. Mara also serves on

the NFL's Health and Safety, Compensation, Workplace Diversity and Legalized Sports Betting committees.

Mara has been affiliated with the Giants his entire life. The franchise was founded in 1925 by his grandfather, Tim Mara. Wellington Mara was one of the most influential, respected and beloved executives in NFL history. Tim and Wellington Mara are both enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

Since John Mara joined the organization in an official capacity, the Giants have participated in 10 playoffs, won five NFC East titles and played in three Super Bowls, winning two.

Born in New York City on Dec. 1, 1954, Mara grew up in Westchester County in White Plains and graduated from Iona Prep High School in New Rochelle. He attended Boston College where he received a B.S. degree in marketing, graduating with Cum Laude honors in 1976. Mara earned his law degree from Fordham University in 1979. He specialized in labor and employment law and litigation at two Manhattan firms prior to joining the Giants.

Mara serves on the Board of Directors of Saint Vincent's Hospital in Harrison, N.Y. and Boys Hope Girls Hope of New York.

John and his wife, the former Denise Walter, have five children and 13 grandchildren.



STEVE TISCH

CHAIRMAN AND EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT

Steve Tisch is an Academy-award winning producer; partner at Escape Artists Productions; Chairman, Executive Vice President and Co-Owner of the New York Football Giants; and a committed philanthropist. He is the only person with both an Oscar and a Super Bowl ring, winning Best Picture for *Forrest Gump* in 1994 and receiving two Super Bowl rings as Chairman of the Giants for Super Bowls XLII and XLVI.

For more than four decades, Steve has successfully produced compelling stories in film and television, from the critically acclaimed television movie, *The Burning Bed* starring Farrah Fawcett, to *Risky Business*, the sleeper hit that helped launch Tom Cruise's career. Other film credits include *Lock, Stock and Two Smoking Barrels*, *American History X*, *Snatch*, *The Weather Man*, *The Pursuit of Happyness*, *Seven Pounds*, *The Taking of Pelham 123*, *The Back-Up Plan*, *Hope Springs*, *The Equalizer*, *Southpaw*, *The Equalizer 2*, *The Upside* and *Troop Zero*. The next feature release for Escape via Columbia Pictures is *The Man from Toronto*, followed by *A Journal For Jordan*. Currently in production for Escape is *Being the Ricardos*, with Amazon Studios.

On the television side, Escape Artists' first straight to series show, *Perpetual Grace, LTD.*, is currently streaming on EPIX. Also currently streaming on Apple TV is Season 1 and 2 of *Servant*, in collaboration with M. Night Shyamalan, with Season 3 currently in production. Tisch also served as an Executive Producer alongside Steven Spielberg and Alex Gibney on *Why We Hate*, a six-part docu-series which aired recently on The Discovery Channel, examining the origins and dangers of hate. Next up on the TV slate for Escape is *Dr. Death*, based on the *Wondery* podcast, premiering on Peacock this June.

Steve Tisch has been involved with the New York Giants since his father, Preston Robert Tisch, purchased 50 percent of the franchise in 1991. In 2005, Steve was named Executive Vice President, and with the passing of his father that year, he assumed the additional title of Chairman. He worked closely with John Mara, President and CEO of the Giants, on the planning and construction

of MetLife Stadium, which was completed in the spring of 2010 and ranked as the number one grossing stadium in the world in 2012. Steve also helped win the successful bid to bring Super Bowl XLVIII to MetLife Stadium in February 2014. Tisch and Mara were named Best NFL Owners by *Forbes* in 2011.

Tisch is also active in philanthropy, generously contributing his time and resources to a variety of organizations in the arts, health and education. Recognizing the value of storytelling and its ability to increase dialogue and understanding, Steve made a transformative gift to Tel Aviv University, elevating its Department of Film and Television into a full school, now named The Steve Tisch School of Film and Television. The school has won top prizes at film festivals around the world and is Israel's leading institution of film and television studies. It has been ranked by *The Hollywood Reporter* among the top 15 international film schools for three years in a row. Tisch was awarded an honorary doctorate degree from Tel Aviv University in 2016.

Tisch made a leadership gift to the David Geffen School of Medicine for the UCLA Steve Tisch BrainSPORT Program, the single largest donation from an individual to a medical center for a concussion-related initiative. The gift created the first U.S. fellowship to train pediatric neurologists who specialize in sports concussions, and established the world's most sophisticated research, prevention, diagnosis and treatment program for concussions and brain injuries with a particular emphasis on young athletes.

Steve Tisch is currently on the Board of Trustees of the Los Angeles County Museum of Art, is a founding Trustee of The Geffen Theatre in Los Angeles, is on the Board of Advisors of the Tisch School of the Arts at New York University and The Preston Robert Tisch Brain Tumor Center at Duke University, and previously served on the board of the Sundance Institute.

Tisch resides in both Los Angeles and New York City.

SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT, PLAYER PERSONNEL

Chris Mara joined the Giants as Vice President of Player Evaluation on July 29, 2003. He was promoted in 2011 to Senior Vice President of Player Personnel, a position in which he evaluates both college and professional players.

This is Mara's second tour of duty with the franchise. He joined the Giants' staff prior to the 1979 season and over the next 14 years Mara was a member of the club's player personnel department. Mara was a scout during the franchise's first two Super Bowl Championship seasons in 1986 and 1990.

Following his first stint with the Giants, Mara spent eight years (1994-2001) operating ProRate, Inc., an independent football scouting service contracted by as many as 15 NFL franchises. The service provided an evaluation of the free agent market in the NFL.

Mara spent 2001-02 as the President/General Manager of the New Jersey Gladiators of the Arena Football League. He oversaw a myriad of responsibilities including ticket sales, operations, and the arena lease. Mara's primary focus was on player personnel and player contracts. He brought his extensive knowledge of professional football to the team and revived the struggling franchise in just one season.

After a difficult first season, the Gladiators posted a 9-5 record in 2002 and a first-place finish in the Eastern

Division of the National Conference. Posting the biggest turnaround in AFL history, the Gladiators finished the 2002 regular season with seven more victories than the previous year and qualified for the playoffs for the first time in franchise history.

Mara graduated from Iona Prep in New Rochelle, N.Y. where he was a standout defensive back for three seasons, winning All-Catholic High School Athletic Association recognition after his senior year.

He began his collegiate career at Springfield College, where he was a defensive back on the freshman team and lettered on the varsity golf team. He then transferred to Boston College, where he earned a B.A. in the arts and sciences. During his scholastic and collegiate days, Mara spent many summers working at Giants training camps. During the regular season, he worked with broadcast teams from both CBS-TV and NBC-TV, as well as with visiting and home radio broadcast groups.

Mara was born in New York City. He is married to the former Kathleen Rooney and the couple has four children - Daniel, Kate, Rooney and Conor - and five grandchildren, Judith Kailee, Wellington Rooney, Ann MacKenna, Blaise Rooney (Daniel's children) and a granddaughter (Kate's daughter).



JONATHAN TISCH

TREASURER

Jonathan Tisch is Chairman and CEO of Loews Hotels & Co and Co-Chairman of the Board and a member of the Office of the President of Loews Corporation.

Tisch has led Loews' expansion and emergence as a prominent and respected hotel company with a widely praised culture that embraces the power of partnerships – with team members, guests, communities and owners. He was voted "Hotelier of the World" by HOTELS magazine.

Recognized as a statesman for the multi-billion-dollar travel and tourism industry, Tisch is a leader both nationally and locally. He is Chairman Emeritus of the United States Travel Association, previously founded and served as Chairman of the Travel Business Roundtable and served as Chairman of the American Hotel and Lodging Association. For nearly six years Jon was Chairman of NYC & Company, the city's official tourism agency, and was Chairman of New York Rising, established to bring back visitors and revive the economy after 9/11. Crain's New York Business named him one of the "Top Ten Most Influential Business Leaders" and inducted him to their Hall of Fame, which recognizes individuals who have transformed the City in both their professional work and in their civic and philanthropic activities.

Tisch is a champion of corporate responsibility

and civic engagement and was a recipient of the US President's Service Award. More than 25 years ago, he initiated the Loews Hotels Good Neighbor Policy. He is currently Vice Chair Emeritus of the Board of Trustees of his alma mater, Tufts University, where he is also the naming benefactor of the Jonathan M. Tisch College of Civic Life. He is a founding board member and Vice Chair of The Shed, New York City's new cultural institution of and for the 21st century, and a member of the Board of Trustees of the Hospital for Special Surgery (HSS). In 2017, he was honored by the NYU School of Professional Studies with the naming of the Jonathan M. Tisch Center of Hospitality, of which he has been a driving force for years.

Tisch is the author of three best-selling books: *The Power of We: Succeeding through Partnerships*; *Chocolates on the Pillow Aren't Enough: Reinventing the Customer Experience*; and *Citizen You: Doing Your Part to Change the World*. He was the host of the Emmy nominated television series *Beyond the Boardroom*.

Jon was instrumental in bringing the 2014 Super Bowl to the metropolitan area, serving as Co-Chair of the bid committee and then as Co-Chair of the NY/NJ Super Bowl Host Committee.

DAVE GETTLEMAN

SENIOR VICE PRESIDENT AND GENERAL MANAGER

Dave Gettleman, a veteran with more than 30 years of experience as an NFL scout and executive, was introduced as the Giants' general manager on Dec. 29, 2017. He is just the fourth person to hold that position since 1979, following Pro Football Hall of Famer George Young, Ernie Accorsi and Jerry Reese.

In his first three seasons as G.M., Gettleman overhauled both the roster and the organization's scouting and personnel departments with the goal of establishing an era of consistent success.

His first draft class was highlighted by running back Saquon Barkley, the No. 2 overall selection in 2018, who set numerous records in his first season and was selected the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year. Barkley is the first player in Giants history to rush for at least 1,000 yards in each of his first two seasons.

Thanks to a pair of trades in 2019, the Giants had three first-round selections for the first time ever. That draft delivered to the Giants several outstanding players. The 10-man class was highlighted by quarterback Daniel Jones, selected sixth overall. In his debut season, Jones started 12 games and set franchise rookie records with 459 passes, 284 completions, 3,027 yards and 24 touchdown passes. The former records had all stood since Charlie Conerly set them in 1948. Jones' 24 touchdown passes led all rookie quarterbacks in 2019 and were the fourth-most by a rookie in a single season in NFL history. Jones' two-year totals are 907 attempts, 564 completions (62.2%) for 5,970 yards, 35 touchdowns and 22 interceptions. The passes, completions and yardage totals are the most in franchise history through 27 games for a player who began his career with the Giants.

Several other 2019 draft choices contributed in their inaugural season. Defensive tackle Dexter Lawrence, also chosen in the first round, started every game and was a stout defender against both the run and pass. Fifth-round choice Darius Slayton had one of the finest seasons by a rookie wide receiver in Giants history, leading the team with 740 receiving yards and eight touchdowns and finishing fourth with 48 catches. His receptions total was tied for the fifth highest by a rookie in team history. Third-round selection Oshane Ximines had 4.5 sacks.

The Giants also had 10 selections in the 2020 draft and were one of six teams to receive at least one start from each of their first five draft choices. Andrew Thomas was selected fourth overall and Xavier McKinney was taken in the second round, the first tackle and safety, respectively, to be chosen. Thomas played in every game, starting 15, and joins fellow 2020 rookies Matt Peart and Shane Lemieux to form the nucleus of the Giants revamped offensive line. McKinney and fellow defensive back Darnay Holmes also started.

Gettleman emerged from the 2021 draft with both an impressive group of players and vital additional selections in 2022. Running his ninth draft as a general manager, Gettleman traded down for the first

time, dealing the 11th overall selection to the Chicago Bears for their 2021 first and fifth-round choices (Nos. 20 and 164), plus 2022 first and fourth-round choices. The Giants then selected Florida wide receiver Kadarius Toney.

The following evening, Gettleman traded the Giants' second-round selection, No. 42, to the Miami Dolphins for the 50th selection and a third-round choice in the 2022 draft. They then took Azeem Ojulari, an outside linebacker from the University of Georgia.

Gettleman moved in the opposite direction in round three, sending the 76th overall pick and the fifth-round choice they acquired from the Bears to the Denver Broncos for the 71st selection, where they secured Central Florida cornerback Aaron Robinson.

Toney, Ojulari and Robinson are all expected to contribute to the Giants this year.

Gettleman has also acquired several veterans who have been important contributors. In 2020, inside linebacker Blake Martinez started all 16 games, was one of the team's captains and paced the Giants and was third in the NFL with 151 tackles (86 solo). Cornerback James Bradberry led the team with three interceptions, was one of three players tied for second in the NFL with 18 passes defended and was selected to his first Pro Bowl. Defensive tackle Leonard Williams had a team-high 11.5 sacks and was twice named NFC Defensive Player of the Week. Defensive back Logan Ryan joined the Giants on Sept. 4 and played in all 16 games. A cornerback for most of his career, Ryan started 13 games at safety and finished second on the team with 92 tackles (67 solo). Graham Gano made 31 of 32 field goal attempts, a .9687 percentage that is the second highest in Giants history and was the highest among the 21 NFL kickers who attempted at least 25 field goals in 2020.

Gettleman was the Carolina Panthers' general manager from 2013-17. In his four full seasons with the Panthers, they won three consecutive NFC South Division titles, an NFC Championship and played in Super Bowl 50. Gettleman received The Sporting News' 2015 NFL Executive of the Year Award after the Panthers compiled a league-best 17-2 record.

Carolina's NFC South titles from 2013-15 marked the first time the Panthers earned three consecutive postseason berths in franchise history. Carolina joined Denver and New England as the only franchises with at least three consecutive division titles from 2013-16.

The Panthers' 34 regular-season victories over that time represent the team's best-ever three-year stretch.

Prior to his arrival, the Panthers had four consecutive non-winning seasons and had not qualified for the playoffs since 2008.

Gettleman previously spent 15 seasons with the Giants (1998-2012) — one as the assistant director of pro personnel, 13 as director, and the final season as the team's senior pro personnel analyst. Prior to coming to the Giants, Gettleman was a scout for the Buffalo Bills

and Denver Broncos.

Gettleman was instrumental in the acquisitions of numerous players who helped the Giants advance to Super Bowls XXXV, XLII and XLVI. In 2000, he was a driving force in the free agent signings of Lomas Brown, Glenn Parker and Dusty Zeigler, which vastly improved the offensive line. The Giants also acquired eight-year veteran linebacker Mike Barrow, who started all but one game at middle linebacker and finished second on the team in tackles.

The 2007 world champions received huge contributions from acquisitions highly touted by Gettleman. They included leading receiver Plaxico Burress, who caught the Super Bowl-winning touchdown pass; defensive captain and leading tackler Antonio Pierce; center Shaun O'Hara; tackle Kareem McKenzie; defensive tackle Fred Robbins; linebacker Kawika Mitchell; cornerbacks Sam Madison and R.W. McQuarters; running back Reuben Droughns; and Lawrence Tynes, the only kicker in NFL history with two game-winning overtime field goals in the postseason.

Four years later, the Giants won another championship with Gettleman-inspired acquisitions playing a key role. They included safety Antrel Rolle and linebacker Michael Boley, the team's top two tacklers with 96 and 91, respectively; defensive tackles Chris Canty and Rocky Bernard; and punter Steve Weatherford.

Gettleman has been part of seven Super Bowl teams, including three winners, with four franchises. He was with Buffalo in 1990 and 1991; Denver in 1997; the Giants in 2000, 2007 and 2011; and Carolina in 2015. The Broncos and the 2007 and 2011 Giants won the championship. Gettleman has been associated with 16 playoff teams in his NFL career.

When Gettleman arrived in Charlotte in January 2013, the Panthers had won a total of 15 games in the previous three seasons and were in a challenging salary cap situation. Gettleman was able to keep the core of the roster together, add important pieces, and help launch their three-year division title streak. And though he did not have the benefit of a full college scouting season or a full complement of draft choices -- Carolina had just five -- he engineered a draft that produced defensive tackles Star Lotulelei, who became one of the NFL's best run stoppers, and Kawann Short, who had 11 sacks and was a Pro Bowler in 2015.

Subsequent Carolina drafts under Gettleman's direction delivered outstanding players such as Pro Bowl guard Trai Turner, second team All-Pro tackle Daryl

Williams, receiver Kelvin Benjamin and linebacker Shaq Thompson. Gettleman also demonstrated an aptitude for finding under-the-radar prospects who became productive players, such as guard Andrew Norwell, as well as undervalued free agents like safety Kurt Coleman, wide receiver Ted Ginn and running back Fozzy Whittaker.

Gettleman entered the NFL in 1986 as a scouting department intern for the Buffalo Bills. He became a full-time scout for Buffalo after the 1987 draft. Following a year as an area scout, Gettleman was assigned as the Bills' representative to the BLESTO scouting combine and continued in that capacity through the 1992 draft as the Northeast area scout. From June 1992 through December 1993, Gettleman worked as a regional scout for BLESTO, concentrating in the East and Midwest regions. In January 1994, Gettleman joined the scouting department of the Broncos, for whom he spent more than four years in the East and Southeast regions.

Gettleman joined the Giants in the spring of 1998 as director of pro personnel Tim Rooney's assistant. He was promoted to pro personnel director in the spring of 1999 upon Rooney's retirement.

After the Giants won Super Bowl XLVI in February 2012, Gettleman became the team's senior pro personnel analyst.

Gettleman began his football career as a teacher/coach at Spackenkill High School in Poughkeepsie, N.Y. As the head coach from 1973-78 and 1980-81, Gettleman led his teams to two league titles and one Section 1 Bowl berth. He spent a season as a volunteer assistant at Cal State Long Beach in 1979. Gettleman joined the faculty of Kingston High School in 1982 and became the head coach in 1984, leading his team to a Section 1 Bowl berth.

Born in Boston, Gettleman earned a bachelor's degree from Springfield College in 1972. He played offensive tackle on the freshman football team. Gettleman has two master's degrees: one in physical education from Southern Connecticut State in 1978 and another in sports administration from St. Thomas University in 1986. He and his wife, Joanne, have three children, Aaron (wife Melissa), Sam (wife Rachael) and Ana Jane.

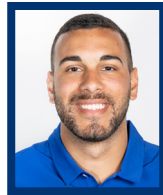

Joe Judge was named the 19th head coach in Giants history on Jan. 8, 2020.

The Giants finished Judge's first season as head coach in second place in the NFC East at 6-10, their best record since they were 11-5 in 2016. That included a 3-5 mark in MetLife Stadium, their finest home record since they were 7-1, also in 2016.

In addition, the 2020 Giants won three consecutive road games in Washington on Nov. 8, Cincinnati on Nov. 29 and Seattle on Dec. 6. It was their first three-game road winning streak since they defeated Dallas, the Jets and Carolina spanning the 2011-12 seasons.

The Giants' 4-2 NFC East record was also their best since 2016, when they were 4-2. They swept division foes Dallas, Philadelphia and Washington at home for the first time since 2005.

Under Judge, the Giants ended long losing streaks to two NFC East opponents in 2020. On Nov. 15, they defeated Philadelphia in MetLife Stadium, 27-17, to stop a four-year, eight-game losing streak to the Eagles that included a 22-21 defeat in Lincoln Financial Field on Oct. 22. They had last defeated the Eagles on Nov. 6, 2016 by a 28-23 score. In their season finale on Jan. 3, the Giants ended a seven-game losing streak to Dallas with a 23-19 victory. They had last defeated the Cowboys on Dec. 11, 2016, a 10-7 victory in MetLife Stadium. The Giants swept the season series with their third division rival, the Washington Football Team.

The Giants were a challenging team to play against all season. From Oct. 11 through Nov. 8, their five games were decided by a total of 10 points, the first time in their history they played five consecutive games with such a small cumulative margin. The previous NFL team with five games decided by no more than 10 points was the 1987 Chicago Bears. The Giants also played five straight games decided by three or fewer points in a single season for the first time in their history.

The Giants' defense ranked 12th in the NFL, allowing 349.3 yards-per-game. It was their best defensive finish since 2016, when they were 10th in the league by allowing 339.7 yards a game. The Giants' rushing defense ranked 10th, allowing 111.4 yards a game, also their best figures since 2016 (when they were tied for third at 88.6 rushing yards a game). The passing defense tied for 16th by giving up 237.9 yards game, the team's lowest figure since 2013, when the Giants allowed 223.3 yards a game through the air and were 10th in the league.

The Giants allowed less than 21 points in four consecutive games from Nov. 8-Dec. 6, their first such streak in the regular season since Sept. 19-Oct. 10, 2004.

Offensively, the Giants exceeded 100 rushing yards in seven consecutive games from Oct. 18-Dec. 6, their longest streak since they hit the century mark in nine straight games in 2010. Their 62.1 completion percentage was the seventh-highest single-season figure in franchise history.

Judge, 39, brought to his first head coaching job 15

years of experience, including the last eight with the New England Patriots. In 2019, Judge was both the Patriots' special teams coordinator and wide receivers coach, the only NFL coach to hold those positions concurrently.

He joined the Patriots in 2012 as the team's assistant special teams coach, a position he held for three years. Judge was elevated to special teams coordinator in 2015 following Scott O'Brien's retirement and was given the additional responsibility of coaching the wide receivers in 2019 after Chad O'Shea left the Patriots to become the Miami Dolphins' offensive coordinator.

In his 15 seasons as an NFL and collegiate assistant coach, Judge has been a part of five championship teams. He was on the Patriots' staff when they won Super Bowls XLIX, LI and LIII. New England reached the playoffs in every one of Judge's eight seasons, played in the AFC Championship Game in each of his first seven seasons and advanced to four Super Bowls. In addition, he coached at the University of Alabama when the Crimson Tide won BCS titles in 2009 and 2011.

Judge coached for 11 seasons under two of the most successful coaches in football history in Nick Saban and Bill Belichick.

Although the Patriots' wide receivers and special teams both underwent significant turnover because of injuries, each unit made numerous positive contributions to the 2019 Patriots, who finished 12-4 and won the AFC East title.

Julian Edelman, the Super Bowl LIII MVP, caught 100 passes for a career-high 1,117 yards and had a team-high six touchdown receptions.

Under Judge's leadership in 2019, the Patriots finished in the Top 10 in the NFL in three significant special teams categories - punt return (8.0-yard average), punt coverage (6.3) and kickoff coverage (20.9) and finished third in Rick Gosselin's highly-regarded NFL special teams rankings.

Judge coached a group of elite special teamers that included Matthew Slater, Brandon Bolden, Justin Bethel and Nate Ebner. In 2019, the Patriots blocked a team-record four punts, the first team to accomplish that feat since the Philadelphia Eagles in 2014. Slater, Ebner, Bolden and J.C. Jackson all blocked kicks, Bethel recovered two fumbles and Slater one. Slater, who was selected to his eighth Pro Bowl as a special teamer, also scored a touchdown on a blocked punt, as did rookie Chase Winovich.

Under Judge's tutelage, kicker Stephen Gostkowski led the NFL in scoring four times and was elected to the Pro Bowl in 2013, 2014 and 2015. With 156 points in 2017, Gostkowski became the first player in NFL history with five 150-point seasons. He is one of three players to lead the league in scoring in at least five seasons. While playing under Judge, Gostkowski was named AFC Special Teams Player of the Week five times and AFC Special Teams Player of the Month three times.

From 2012-18, Edelman was one of the most productive punt returners in the NFL. He is second in Patriots

history with a career punt return average of 11.7 yards, which also ties him for eighth all-time in the NFL.

In 2015, Edelman played in only nine games and returned 10 punts. But Judge plugged in another wide-out, Danny Amendola, who led the NFL with a 12.0-yard average on 23 runbacks. In addition, Keshawn Martin had the longest kickoff return in the AFC with a 75-yard return vs. Tennessee.

Judge has also overseen standout kickoff return performances. In 2016, Dion Lewis scored on the longest kickoff return touchdown in team postseason history with a 98-yard return vs. Houston in an AFC Divisional Playoff Game. That season, Judge's kickoff team led the AFC and was third in the league in kickoff drive start position and the punt team finished second in the NFL in opponents' return average.

The 2018 Patriots ranked second in the NFL with a 27.0-yard kickoff return average. The unit was led by Cordarrelle Patterson, who was third in the league with an average of 28.8 yards a return, including a 95-yard touchdown at Chicago.

From 2012-16, New England blocked seven field goals, the NFL's second-highest total. The Patriots blocked two field goal attempts and one punt in 2017 and two punts in 2018.

In 2017, the kickoff and kickoff receiving teams each finished third in the NFL in average drive start position, and Lewis led the AFC and finished fourth in the NFL with a 24.8-yard return average. Punter Ryan Allen also enjoyed a successful season under Judge, limiting opponents to just 23 punt returns for a 4.6-yard average, the lowest in team history. Slater was chosen for his seventh consecutive Pro Bowl, matching Steve Tasker for most special teams Pro Bowl honors in NFL history.

In February 2019, Judge's special teams were prominent in the Patriots' Super Bowl LIII victory against the Los Angeles Rams. New England's punt team pinned the Rams' offense deep in their own territory throughout the game, forcing the Rams to start three of their drives inside their own 10-yard line. Special teams were also critical in a Week 7 victory at Chicago, scoring touchdowns on a kickoff return and a blocked punt.

Judge began his coaching career at his alma mater, Mississippi State, where he was a graduate assistant from 2005-07. He served as the special teams/linebackers coach at Birmingham-Southern in 2008. The following year, he began a three-year stint as a football analyst/special teams assistant under Saban at Alabama.

The Crimson Tide special teams were consistently outstanding during Judge's tenure. They boasted a first-team All-America kicker and Groza Award finalist (Leigh Tiffin, 2009), a first-team All-America return specialist (Javier Arenas, 2009), an SEC all-freshman punter (Cody Mandell, 2010) and a returner who finished his career ranked second all-time in NCAA return yards (Arenas).

Judge was born in Philadelphia, Pa. He graduated from Lansdale Catholic High School in Lansdale, Pa., where he played quarterback and threw for more than 2,000 yards. Judge played at Mississippi State from 2000-04, earning three letters. He was also named to the SEC Academic Honor Roll and made the Dean's List.

Judge's father, Joseph, played football at Temple University and later with the Hamilton Tiger-Cats of the CFL.

Judge and his wife, Amber, a former Mississippi State soccer player, have four children – Sean (15), Michael (12), Emma Riley (10) and Ella Grace (7).

JASON GARRETT

OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR

Jason Garrett is in his second season as the Giants' offensive coordinator. It his second stint with the team; Garrett was the Giants' backup quarterback from 2000-03.

In 2020, Garrett coached in the NFC East for the 14th consecutive season. The offense helped the Giants finish with a 4-2 record within the division, their best since 2016, when they were 4-2. The Giants swept NFC East foes Dallas, Philadelphia and Washington at home for the first time since 2005.

Despite losing star running back Saquon Barkley to a season-ending knee injury in Week 2, the Giants rushed for 110.5 yards a game, a 5.2-yard improvement over the previous season. They rushed for at least 100 yards in nine of 16 games and were 6-3 in those games. The Giants exceeded 100 rushing yards in seven consecutive games from Oct. 18-Dec. 6, their longest streak since they hit the century mark in nine straight games in 2010.

In Daniel Jones' second season as starting quarterback, the Giants completed 62.1% of their passes, the seventh-highest single-season figure in franchise history. From Nov. 2 against Tampa Bay until the season finale vs. Dallas on Jan. 3, Jones threw a career-high 177 passes without an interception. That was a contributing factor to the team committing 22 turnovers, or 11 fewer than they recorded in 2019.

Jones had 65 rushing attempts for 423 yards, the team's second-highest total and the record for a Giants quarterback in the Super Bowl era. His 6.5-yard average was the NFL's highest among the 91 players with at least 50 rushing attempts in 2020.

Evan Engram was selected to the Pro Bowl, the first Giants tight end so honored since Jeremy Shockey in 2006. Engram was second on the Giants with 63 receptions, one less than the career high he set as a rookie in 2017.

Prior to joining the Giants, Garrett spent 9½ years as the head coach of the Dallas Cowboys. His teams were 85-67 in the regular season and won three NFC East titles (2014, 2016 and 2018). He was selected the NFL Coach of the Year in 2016.

Garrett was Dallas' offensive coordinator from 2007 until his appointment as interim head coach midway through the 2010 season. He was named the eighth head coach in Cowboys history on Jan. 5, 2011.

Including his stints as a player (1992-99) and coach (2007-19), Garrett spent 20 years in the Dallas organization. He was a member of Cowboys teams that won six division titles and three Super Bowl championships. He also played for the 2000 Giants, who advanced to Super Bowl XXXV.

The Cowboys consistently had one of the NFL's most productive offenses under Garrett. In 2019, Dallas had league-high averages of 431.5 yards a game and 6.5 yards per play. The Cowboys were second in the NFL in passing yardage (296.9 a game), fifth in rushing (134.6), tied for second in third-down conversion percentage (47.1 with 96 success in 204 opportunities) and sixth with an average of 27.1 points a game.

That continued a trend of offensive excellence by Dallas during Garrett's tenure. When the Cowboys finished with the NFL's top-rated offense in 2019 it marked their eighth finish in the top 10 with Garrett as either coordinator or head coach. They were second in 2007 and 2009, 10th in 2010 and 2013, sixth in 2012, seventh in 2014 and fifth in 2016.

Under Garrett's tutelage, 16 different Dallas offensive players earned 54 total trips to the Pro Bowl. The players included quarterbacks Tony Romo and Dak Prescott, running backs DeMarco Murray and Ezekiel Elliott, wide receivers Miles Austin, Dez Bryant and Amari Cooper, tight end Jason Witten and several offensive linemen.

In 2018, the Cowboys were 10-6 and won their third NFC East championship in five years. It was the first time Dallas recorded three consecutive winning seasons since a streak of five from 2005-09. The club was 7-1 in the second half of the season after starting 3-5. The turnaround was similar to that led by Garrett in 2010. The Cowboys were 1-7 when he was named coach and went 5-3 in the final eight games.

With injuries to the club's top-two quarterbacks, Romo and Kellen Moore, Dallas entered the 2016 season with rookie fourth-round draft choice Prescott at the helm of the offense. After losing the season opener, the club won a franchise-record 11 consecutive games and won the division title and top seed in the NFC playoffs with a 13-3 record that was tied for the best mark in Cowboys history.

Garrett guided the 2014 Cowboys to an NFL-best tying 12-4 record. The team had three players lead the league and establish single-season club records - DeMarco Murray rushed for 1,845 yards en route to Offensive Player of the Year honors, Dez Bryant caught 16 touchdown passes and Romo completed 69.9% of his passes and had a 113.2 quarterback rating. The Dallas offense was second in the league in with 6,138 total yards. The club also had eight players selected to the Pro Bowl.

Garrett began his coaching career when he began a two-year stint as the quarterbacks coach for Nick Saban and the Miami Dolphins in 2005.

In 2007, Garrett returned to Dallas as the Cowboys' offensive coordinator under Wade Phillips. He was named assistant head coach the following year and kept those dual titles until being named interim head coach in 2010.

As a player in Dallas, Garrett learned under championship coaches Jimmy Johnson and Barry Switzer, while serving as a backup to Troy Aikman in offenses directed by Norv Turner and Ernie Zampese. He joined the Giants in 2000 as a backup to Kerry Collins and played for offensive coordinator Sean Payton, who also went on to win a Super Bowl as a head coach. Garrett ended his career by splitting the 2004 season with Tampa Bay and Miami.

Garrett played in 41 career regular-season games with nine starts (all with Dallas, including five in 1998). He completed 165 of 294 passes for 2,042 yards, 11 touchdowns and five interceptions. Garrett was 6-3 as an NFL starter. In his second career start on Thanksgiving Day 1994, Garrett led the Cowboys to a franchise-record 36 second-half points

and a 42-31 victory against the Green Bay Packers. Garrett threw for 311 yards and two touchdowns and was named the NFC Offensive Player of the Week.

Garrett entered the NFL as an undrafted rookie with the New Orleans Saints in 1989 and spent that season on their developmental squad. He was released prior to the 1990 season and spent that fall as an assistant coach at Princeton. In 1991, Garrett played with the San Antonio Riders of the World League and the Ottawa Rough Riders of the Canadian Football League. He was on the Cowboys' practice squad in 1992.

As a senior at Princeton University in 1988, Garrett was named the Ivy League's Player of the Year and honorable mention All-America. He earned his degree in history in 1989. Garrett was an all-league quarterback and safety at University High School in Chagrin Falls, Ohio.

Garrett is a member of a highly successful football family. His late father, Jim, spent more than 30 years in the NFL as a coach and scout, including a stint as a Giants assistant from 1970-73. His brother, John, is the head coach at Lafayette College. Another brother, Judd, has been a long-time assistant coach as well as the Cowboys' director of pro scouting.

Garrett and his wife Brill founded their charitable foundation, Jason Garrett Starfish Charities, in 1997 with the goal of enriching the lives of young people. The principle activity of the foundation is a leadership forum and a one-day football camp for high school athletes, which is held each summer at Princeton in conjunction with the AthLife Foundation.

Patrick Graham is in his second season as the Giants' defensive coordinator/assistant head coach. Graham was the team's defensive line coach in 2016-17.

Graham has 12 years of NFL coaching experience with four teams. He has coached in the playoffs in eight of those seasons and has been part of teams that have won seven division titles, two conference championships and one Super Bowl (XLIX).

The Giants' defense improved significantly in Graham's debut season as coordinator. The unit ranked ninth by allowing 357 points, 94 fewer than their total in 2019.

The defense was 12th in the NFL by allowing 349.3 yards-per-game after finishing 27th at 377.3 yards the previous season. It was their best defensive finish since 2016, when they were 10th in the league by allowing 339.7 yards a game. Giants opponents averaged just 5.3 yards a play, the NFL's ninth-lowest figure.

One year after placing 20th in the NFL, the rushing defense ranked 10th, allowing 111.4 yards a game. That was also their best figure since 2016 (when they were tied for third at 88.6 rushing yards a game). The pass defense jumped from 28th in the league in 2019 to a tie for 16th by giving up 237.9 yards a game, the team's lowest figure since 2013, when the Giants allowed 223.3 yards a game through the air and were 10th in the league.

In 2020, the Giants recorded 40 sacks of opposing quarterbacks, their highest total since they had 47 in 2014 and four more than they had in 2019. Leonard Williams led the team with 11.5 sacks, the most by a Giants' player since Jason Pierre-Paul's 14.5 in 2014.

Inside linebacker Blake Martinez, Pro Bowl cornerback James Bradberry and safety Logan Ryan were veterans who excelled in their first season in Graham's defense. Martinez led the Giants and was third in the NFL with 151 tackles (86 solo). Bradberry started all 15 games in which he played, led the team with three interceptions and was one of three players tied for second in the NFL with 18 passes defended. Bradberry, who was often assigned to cover the opposition's best wide receiver, finished with 53 tackles (43 solo), two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Ryan, a cornerback most of his career, started 13 games at safety and finished second on the team with 92 tackles (67 solo), 1.0 sack, one interception, nine passes defended, three forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries.

Graham was the Miami Dolphins' defensive coordinator in 2019. He led a unit that had a constantly evolving cast of players because of roster transactions and injuries. The secondary's best player, former first-round draft choice Minkah Fitzpatrick, was traded to Pittsburgh on Sept. 17. Cornerback Xavier Howard played in five games before going on injured reserve with a knee injury. Safeties Reshad Jones, a two-time Pro Bowler, and Bobby McCain appeared in four and nine games, respectively, before they were placed on I.R. on the same day.

Despite the changes, the defense helped Miami win five of its last nine games after an 0-7 start. In the season

finale on Dec. 29, the Dolphins earned a 27-24 victory at New England that cost the Patriots – who won the first meeting 43-0 – a first-round bye. Graham's defense limited the Pats to 352 yards, 18 first downs and three third-down conversions.

Prior to joining the Dolphins, Graham spent the 2018 season as the Green Bay Packers' inside linebackers coach and defensive run game coordinator. Under his tutelage, Martinez totaled 144 tackles (91 solo) and a career-high 5.0 sacks. Green Bay's defense limited opponents to 4.3 yards per rush, which was 13th in the league.

In his second season with the Giants in 2017, Graham helped Pierre-Paul lead the team with 8.5 sacks and Damon Harrison posted 76 tackles, which led all NFL defensive tackles.

The previous year, Graham's unit was instrumental in the Giants' defense becoming the most improved in the NFL. The team allowed 158 fewer points and 1,290 fewer yards than it did in 2015. Their 17.8 points per game allowed was second in the NFL and the team's best since 2002.

Graham began his NFL coaching career in New England, where he spent seven seasons with the Patriots (2009-15). He was a coaching assistant in 2009 before being promoted to defensive assistant in 2010 and linebackers coach in 2011. Graham moved to defensive line from 2012-13 before returning to the linebackers in 2014-15.

During his tenure with New England, the Patriots won the AFC East title all seven seasons, the conference championship twice and Super Bowl XLIX. In his five years as a position coach (2011-15), New England led the NFL in takeaways (150) and was tied for fourth in sacks (214).

In 2015, Graham's linebacker unit helped the team finish ninth in total yards allowed (339.4) and 10th in points allowed (19.7). Jamie Collins tied a Patriots record with five forced fumbles, earned the first Pro Bowl selection of his career and was named second-team All-Pro.

The 2014 Patriots finished their season with a Super Bowl victory against Seattle. Graham's linebackers helped the team's defense rank eighth in the league in points allowed (19.6) and ninth in rushing yards allowed (104.3) despite Jerod Mayo and Don'ta Hightower missing 14 games combined due to injury. Collins led the team with 115 tackles (74 solo) and also totaled four sacks and four forced fumbles.

Graham worked with the Patriots defensive line for the second straight year in 2013. Though nose tackle Vince Wilfork was lost for the season in Week 4, New England's defense finished fifth in the league in sacks (48) and 10th in points allowed (21.1). The team's five top sack totals all came from defensive linemen, topped by defensive end Chandler Jones (11.5).

In 2012, Graham helped Wilfork earn first-team All-Pro honors and a fifth Pro Bowl selection. Wilfork totaled 59 tackles (41 solo) with three sacks, two forced fumbles and six fumble recoveries. Rob Ninkovich transitioned from

linebacker to defensive end and totaled eight sacks.

Graham's first season as a position coach was in 2011 with the linebackers. New England was 13-3 and AFC champions and Mayo led the team with 103 tackles (97 solo) and became the first Patriots player to total 100-plus tackles in each of his first four seasons.

Graham spent the 2010 season as a defensive assistant with the Patriots, who finished second in the NFL with 38 takeaways and eighth in points allowed (19.6). He began his NFL coaching career in 2009 as a coaching assistant with New England.

Graham joined New England following two seasons (2007-08) as a graduate assistant at Notre Dame, where he worked with the defense. He spent three seasons (2004-06) as an assistant coach at Richmond, mentoring tight ends

from 2005-06 and the defensive line in 2004.

Graham began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Wagner (2002-03), while he pursued an MBA with a concentration in finance. He coached the junior-varsity team to an undefeated season and also served as strength and conditioning coach and academic coordinator.

Graham played collegiately at Yale, where he was a defensive lineman for the 1999 team that shared an Ivy League title with Brown. He earned his bachelor's degree in sociology with a concentration in economics and African American studies.

A native of Waterbury, Conn. (born in Des Plaines, Ill.), Graham and his wife, Pamela, have two children, Morgan and Silas.

Thomas McGaughey (pronounced muh-GAY-hee), is in the fourth season of his second stint with the Giants and his fourth as their special teams coordinator. He was previously a coordinator for three other NFL teams.

Two of the best placekicking performances in Giants history have occurred under McGaughey in the previous three seasons.

In 2020, Graham Gano made 31 of 32 field goal attempts, a .9687 percentage that is the second highest in Giants history. Gano's predecessor, Aldrick Rosas made 32 of 33 attempts, a success rate of .9696, in 2018.

Gano's .9687 percentage was the highest among the 21 NFL kickers who attempted at least 25 field goals in 2020. His only miss was on a 57-yard try in Chicago in Week 2. Gano followed by making his next 30 field goal attempts, the longest streak in Giants history. Josh Brown hit 29 straight attempts in 2014-15.

The record-setter was a 50-yard field goal with 6:27 remaining in the fourth quarter against Dallas on Jan. 3. It was Gano's fifth field goal of the season of 50 or more yards, including four against the Cowboys. That is a franchise single-season record. Brown (2014) and Rosas (2018) each had four. Gano tied an NFL record by becoming the first player in Giants history to kick three field goals of 50 or more yards in a game at Dallas on Oct. 11. He kicked field goals of 55, 50 and 54 yards, plus a 28-yarder.

Riley Dixon placed 28 punts inside the opposition 20-yard line, tying him with the Rams' Johnny Hekker and the Bears' Pat O'Donnell for the NFL's third-highest total. In three seasons with the Giants, Dixon has averaged 45.4 yards on 205 punts, the second-highest average in franchise history (minimum 150 punts), trailing only Steve Weatherford's 46.3-yard average on 311 kicks from 2011-14.

The Giants finished sixth in the NFL with an 11.4-yard punt return average. Safety Jabrill Peppers had 15 of the Giants' 20 punt returns and average 12.5 yards with a long return of 20 yards.

In 2019, the Giants' kickoff coverage team led the NFL and finished in the top two for the season straight season by allowing an average return of just 18.1 yards. The punt coverage team was tied for fifth as opponents averaged only 5.7 yards a return. Conversely, the Giants were fourth and 10th, respectively, in the NFL in punt (9.8 yards) and kickoff (23.5 yards) return average.

Dixon's 42.3-yard net average was a franchise record since the statistic was first kept in 1976. He set the previous mark of 41.8 yards in 2018.

In McGaughey's first season leading the Giants' special teams in 2018, Rosas was selected to the Pro Bowl and named second-team All-Pro after missing just one field goal attempt and one PAT. His 32 field goals were the fifth-highest total in Giants history.

Rosas' .970 field goal percentage was a Giants record and was just 1/100th of a percentage point behind NFL leader Robbie Gould, a former Giant. On Dec. 2, Rosas kicked the longest field goal in Giants history, a

57-yarder against Chicago in MetLife Stadium.

Michael Thomas led the Giants with nine special teams tackles (six solo) and was the NFC special teams player in the Pro Bowl.

That season, the Giants finished second in the NFL in kickoff coverage, limiting opponents to an average return of 20.4 yards, and seventh in punt coverage with a 6.6-yard average.

Prior to returning to the Giants, McGaughey spent two seasons as the Carolina Panthers' special teams coordinator. Initially hired as Carolina's assistant special teams coach in February 2016, McGaughey was named coordinator six months later when the late Bruce DeHaven transitioned to the role of senior advisor to special teams.

In 2017, the Panthers ranked fifth in the NFL with a franchise-record 42.4-yard net punting average, and eighth by allowing an average of just 5.9 yards on 30 opponent punt returns. Gano played in the Pro Bowl after leading the league with a franchise-record .967 success rate on field goal attempts (29 of 30).

In McGaughey's first season with the Panthers, Carolina led the NFL and tied the team record with three blocked field goals. Carolina's kickoff coverage unit limited opponents to an NFL-best average of 18.1 yards per return.

McGaughey was the San Francisco 49ers' coordinator in 2015. The 49ers ranked second in the league with four blocked field goals and eighth in punt coverage, allowing an average return of just 6.4 yards.

In 2014, McGaughey coached the Jets' special teams. The kickoff return team finished fifth in the NFL with an average drive start of the 24.1-yard line, while the coverage group was seventh by limiting opponents to an average of 21.8 yards per return.

From 2011-13, McGaughey was the special teams coordinator/defensive assistant at Louisiana State. In those three seasons, the Tigers scored seven special teams touchdowns, and McGaughey coached three All-Americans, including future Giants Odell Beckham, Jr. and Brad Wing, plus Tyrann Mathieu. McGaughey coached more than 40 future NFL players at LSU.

McGaughey was first on the Giants' staff from 2007-10, when he was the special team assistant coach under current assistant Tom Quinn. In his first season, the Giants won Super Bowl XLII. The following year, McGaughey helped produce the Pro Bowl battery of kicker John Carney, punter/holder Jeff Feagles, and long snapper Zak DeOssie as the Giants won the NFC East.

McGaughey initially came to the Giants following two seasons (2005-06) as the Denver Broncos' assistant special teams coordinator.

McGaughey was the special teams coordinator at his alma mater, the University of Houston, in 2003 and added cornerbacks coach to his responsibilities in 2004.

After getting his start in the NFL as an intern in the Houston Texans' pro scouting department in 2001, McGaughey gained experience coaching on the profes-

sional level as a minority intern with the Kansas City Chiefs during training camp that year. He was hired as an assistant special teams coach in 2002.

Between his internship and full-time position with the Chiefs, McGaughey spent the spring of 2002 in NFL Europe as the Scottish Claymores' defensive backs coach and special teams coordinator, helping the team rank at or near the top of the league in punting average, punt return average, kickoff return average and field goal percentage.

McGaughey began his coaching career at Houston as a graduate assistant in 1997. He handled defensive backs and special teams at Willowridge High School in Houston

from 1998-2001.

McGaughey played for the Houston Cougars from 1991-95 and was special teams captain as a senior. He was a three-time letter-winner on the track team, competing in the 110-meter hurdles. McGaughey majored in kinesiology and sports administration,

He was briefly with the Cincinnati Bengals and Philadelphia Eagles in 1996 and played in NFL Europe and was a member of the Barcelona Dragons team that won the World Bowl in 1997.

He and his wife, Erika, have three children, sons Thomas (Trey) and Trenton, and daughter Taylor.

RYAN ANDERSON

DEFENSIVE QUALITY CONTROL

Ryan Anderson is in his first season as a Giants defensive quality control coach.

Anderson joined the Giants after a two-year stint as the safeties coach at Elon University. Elon plays in the Colonial Athletic Association, which postponed its 2020 season until spring 2021.

In his first season at Elon in 2019, the defense finished fourth in the 12-team conference by allowing 24.5 points a game. Defensive back Greg Liggs, Jr. set the program's FCS single-season interception record with eight, was a Buck Buchanan Award finalist and first-team All-CAA selection. Liggs was also named a unanimous first-team All-American. Anderson also helped develop standouts Cole Coleman and Tre'Von Jones, who combined for 141 tackles.

Anderson was the defensive coordinator at Hampton University in 2018, when the Pirates finished the season with a six-game winning streak and a 7-3 record. The defense forced 18 turnovers while allowing only 191.1 passing yards per game. After allowing an average of 39.5 points in the first four games, Anderson's unit gave up only 20.8 points on average during the winning streak.

Anderson was the inside linebackers coach at East Carolina in 2016-17. He worked with the inside linebackers and defensive ends at Vanderbilt in 2015, when the defense ranked 23rd in the nation by allowing just

21.0 points a game. It also ranked among the NCAA's best in fourth down defense (4th), first down defense (5th), red zone defense (6th), third down defense (7th), interceptions (13th) and takeaways (13th). Linebacker Zach Cunningham was named first-team All-SEC honors after ranking among the league leaders in tackles for loss (16.5), tackles (103), solo tackles (69), forced fumbles (4) and recovered fumbles (3).

In his second year at Vanderbilt, Anderson helped develop linebacker Nigel Bowden into a freshman all-SEC performer. Bowden topped all first-year conference players with 78 tackles, the first Commodore to top 75 stops since 1998.

Anderson was the defensive line coach at Reinhardt (Ga.) University in 2012. Prior to that, he was the linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator for one season at Cumberland (Tenn.) University, guiding the Phoenix to No. 1 in the country in third down defense and No. 9 in total defense in the NAIA rankings.

Anderson's first coaching stop was in 2009 at E.C. Glass (Va.) High School, where he mentored the linebackers and tight ends.

Anderson graduated in 2009 with a degree in psychology from Presbyterian College, where he was a three-year letter-winner as a linebacker. He earned a master's degree in education and community development & action from Vanderbilt in 2015.

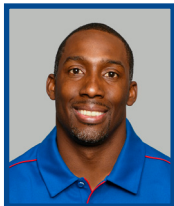

ANTHONY BLEVINS

ASSISTANT LINEBACKERS/SPECIAL TEAMS ASSISTANT

Anthony Blevins is in his fourth season with the Giants and first as the team's assistant linebackers coach/special teams assistant. He spent the 2020 season as the assistant defensive backs coach and the previous two years as the Giants' assistant special teams coach.

Last season, Blevins helped develop a pass defense that jumped from 28th in the league in 2019 to a tie for 16th. The Giants allowed 237.9 yards game through the air, a 26.2-yard improvement over their 2019 average and the team's lowest figure since 2013, when they gave up 223.3 yards a game through the air and were 10th in the league. Cornerback James Bradberry was selected to his first Pro Bowl after leading the team with three interceptions and tying for second in the NFL with 18 passes defended. Another newcomer, Logan Ryan, moved from cornerback to safety and finished second on the Giants with 92 tackles (67 solo). Ryan teamed with Jabrill Peppers to give the Giants a strong last line of defense. Blevins helped develop Xavier McKinney and Darnay Holmes, who made significant contributions as rookies.

Blevins assisted special teams coordinator Thomas McGaughey in 2019, when the Giants finished seventh in Rick Gosselin's special teams rankings. The team's kickoff coverage team led the league and finished in the top two for the second straight season by allowing an average return of just 18.1 yards. The punt coverage team was tied for fifth as opponents averaged only 5.7 yards a return. Conversely, the Giants were fourth and 10th, respectively, in the NFL in punt (9.8 yards) and kickoff (23.5 yards) return average.

Punter Riley Dixon was ninth in the league with a 42.3-yard net average, a franchise record since the statistic was first kept in 1976. He set the previous mark of 41.8 yards in 2018.

The previous year, kicker Aldrick Rosas was selected to the Pro Bowl and was named second-team All-Pro after making 32 of 33 field goal attempts and 31 of 32 extra point tries. The 32 field goals were the fifth-highest total in Giants history.

Rosas' .970 field goal percentage was a Giants record and was just 1/100th of a percentage point behind NFL leader Robbie Gould, a former Giant. Rosas' 127 points tied Ali Haji-Sheikh (1983) for the fifth-highest total in Giants history. He hit his final 19 field goal attempts, then the second-longest streak in Giants history.

Before joining the Giants, Blevins spent five years as a coaching assistant/special teams with the Arizona Cardinals.

During his time with the Cardinals, Blevins helped special teamer Justin Bethel get selected to three consecutive Pro Bowls (2013-15) after leading the team in

special teams tackles each season. In 2013 and 2015, Bethel was named first-team All-NFL by the Pro Football Writers Association.

David Johnson was fifth in the NFL with a 27.2-yard kickoff return average and set a franchise record with a 108-yard touchdown in 2015.

All-Pro Kicker Chandler Catanzaro tied the NFL record for the most consecutive field goals to begin a career (17) and established a franchise rookie record with 114 points in 2014. The following season, Catanzaro finished third in the NFL with 137 points, which was also the second-highest single-season total in franchise history.

Dave Zastudil's 45.7-yard punting average in 2013 was the third-highest in franchise history. A year later, Drew Butler tied for the NFL lead with 34 punts inside the 20.

In 2017, Blevins coached rookie Budda Baker, who was selected as the NFC special teams representative in the Pro Bowl. Baker led the Cardinals with 16 special teams tackles and was selected All-Pro by the AP and the Pro Football Writers Association.

Blevins spent the 2012 season as the cornerbacks coach at his alma mater, the University of Alabama-Birmingham, following three seasons at Tennessee State (2009-11) coaching special teams and cornerbacks. He also worked at the University of Tennessee-Martin in 2008 coaching cornerbacks while serving as recruiting coordinator.

Blevins was a part of the NFL's Bill Walsh Diversity Coaching Fellowship Program with the Indianapolis Colts in 2011, the Cardinals in 2010, and the Chicago Bears in 2008.

A three-year letter winner, Blevins played cornerback at UAB from 1995-98. He played professionally for the Mobile Admirals of the Regional Football League (1999), the Birmingham Steeldogs of AFL2 (2000), and for the Birmingham Thunderbolts in the XFL from 2000-01.

Blevins began his coaching career as the secondary coach and team community liaison at Meadowcreek High School in Gwinnett, Ga. in 2003-04. From 2005-07, he served as a graduate assistant at Mississippi State, helping coach wide receivers and defensive backs for the Bulldogs while also assisting special teams.

A native of Birmingham, Blevins graduated from UAB in 1998 with a bachelor's degree in sociology and earned a master's in instructional technology in 2006 from Mississippi State. In the fall of 2015, he earned a PhD in instructional systems & workforce development from Mississippi State.

Carter Blount is in his first season as a Giants defensive quality control coach.

Blount spent the previous three seasons as a special teams quality control analyst at the University of Tennessee. In Knoxville, he worked under Volunteers head coach Jeremy Pruitt, now the Giants' senior defensive assistant.

Tennessee was Blount's fourth stop in the Southeastern Conference. In 2017, he was the University of Alabama's special teams analyst. He held the same position in 2016 at LSU, where he was elevated to special teams coordinator for the Tigers' victory against Louisville in the Citrus Bowl.

Prior to his year in Baton Rouge, Blount spent the 2015 season as the special teams quality control coach at

the University of Georgia.

In 2014, Blount was the cornerbacks coach and special teams coordinator at Birmingham Southern College.

Blount was previously at the University of South Alabama, where he was a defensive graduate assistant during the 2013 season and special teams graduate assistant and specialists coach in 2011-12.

In 2009-10, Blount was a special teams intern and worked with Joe Judge at Alabama, his alma mater. He graduated in 2011 with a degree in exercise and sport science. Blount also has a master's degree in health education from South Alabama.

Blount grew up in Mobile, Ala., where he attended Murphy High School. He and his wife, Amanda, have a one-year-old daughter, Audrey Kate.

BURTON BURNS

RUNNING BACKS

Burton Burns is in his second year as the Giants' running backs coach.

In his debut season with the team in 2020, Burns molded a productive unit despite the loss of star back Saquon Barkley with a season-ending knee injury in Week 2.

The Giants rushed for at least 100 yards in nine times and were 6-3 in those games. They exceeded 100 rushing yards in seven consecutive games from Oct. 18-Dec. 6, their longest streak since they hit the century mark in nine straight games in 2010.

Four different running backs rushed for a touchdown for the Giants in 2020. Wayne Gallman, Jr. led the way with six, followed by Dion Lewis with two and Alfred Morris and Devonta Freeman with one apiece. That was the most Giants backs with a rushing touchdown since 2013, when they also had four — Brandon Jacobs, Andre Brown, Peyton Hillis and David Wilson.

Gallman tied his career high by playing in 15 games with a career-best 10 starts and led the Giants with career-high totals of 147 carries, 682 yards, a 4.6-yard average and six touchdowns. He rushed for a touchdown in each of five consecutive games (six total scores) from Oct. 22 to Nov. 29, which is tied for the third-longest streak in Giants history.

Morris and Freeman - two players signed during the season — finished second and third in rushing yardage among running backs the former with 228 yards and the latter with 174.

Prior to joining the Giants, Burns spent 13 years at the University of Alabama, the last two as assistant athletic director for football. He served as the associate head coach and running backs coach from 2007-17. Burns was joined on the Alabama staff by Giants coach Joe Judge from 2009-11.

Burns was regarded as one of the nation's finest running backs coaches during his 20 seasons as a college assistant. He coached Heisman Trophy winners Mark Ingram in 2009 and Derrick Henry in 2015, plus finalist Trent Richardson in 2011. Prior to his tenure at Alabama, Burns coached running backs at Clemson for eight seasons (1999-2006) and before that at Tulane for four years (1995-98).

In his final year on the field with the Crimson Tide in 2017, Burns' backfield boasted Damien Harris, Bo Scarbrough, Josh Jacobs, Najee Harris and Brian Robinson Jr. The group combined to gain 2,415 yards and 25 touchdowns, led by Damien Harris, who had 1,008 rushing yards and 11 touchdowns.

Burns developed a trio of talented backs in 2016 with Harris leading the team with 1,037 yards while averaging 7.1 yards per carry. Scarbrough finished with 812 yards and 11 touchdowns on 125 carries. Jacobs had 567 yards and four scores. Burns also spent that season as the Tide's special teams coordinator, helping Eddie Jackson post a 23.0-yard punt return average on 11 runbacks. Punter JK Scott ranked fourth nationally with a 47.2-yard average.

In 2015, Henry stepped into the starting role and flourished with a school- and SEC-record 2,219 yards, the fifth-highest single-season total in college football history. He scored 28 touchdowns on 395 carries. Henry was just the third back in league history to record four 200-yard rushing games, while setting the Alabama record with ten 100-yard rushing games.

Henry was second Tide player to win the Doak Walker and Maxwell Awards and the first Alabama player to capture the Walter Camp Player of the Year.

Burns had a pair of running backs on the cusp of 1,000 rushing yards in 2014 with Henry leading the team with 990 yards, while junior T.J. Yeldon finished with 979 yards on the ground. The pair both finished with 11 rushing touchdowns apiece. The Tide averaged 206.6 rushing yards per game in 2014.

The previous season, Yeldon rushed for 1,235 yards and 14 touchdowns while sophomore backup Kenyan Drake accounted for 694 yards and eight scores. Eddie Lacy, a second-round draft pick by Green Bay in 2013, earned NFL Rookie of the Year honors.

In 2012, Lacy and Yeldon combined to rush for 2,430 yards and 29 touchdowns (32 total scores). The pair became the first Alabama running backs to rush for more than 1,000 yards in the same season. The Tide was second in the SEC with an average of 227.5 yards per game.

Under Burns, the 2011 Crimson Tide rushing offense finished first in the conference with 214.5 yards per game. In addition to being selected as a Heisman Trophy finalist, Richardson became the first Alabama player to win the Doak Walker Award as the nation's top running back. He was named the SEC Offensive Player of the Year, ranking fifth in the nation and first in the league with 129.2 yards on the ground per game. Richardson's 21 rushing touchdowns set the school record and tied for second in SEC history. He equaled the school and SEC record with 24 total touchdowns.

Despite playing in only 11 games each, Ingram led Alabama in 2011 with 875 yards and 13 touchdowns, followed by Richardson's 700 yards with six touchdowns. In 2009, Ingram was awarded Alabama's first Heisman Trophy and earned unanimous All-America honors after rushing for 1,658 yards and 17 touchdowns while adding 32 receptions for 334 yards and three scores. In the BCS National Championship Game against Texas, Ingram and Richardson (a true freshman) each rushed for 100-plus yards to help Alabama win its 13th national title.

Burns also developed one of the nation's strongest running games in 2008, when Alabama finished third in the SEC with an average of 184.6 rushing yards per game. Glen Coffee, a first team All-SEC selection and third-round draft choice of the San Francisco 49ers, led the way with 1,383 yards on the ground. Ingram rushed for 728 yards and earned Freshman All-SEC honors.

In his first year at Alabama in 2007, Burns helped tailback Terry Grant set school records for rushing yards (891) and touchdowns (eight) by a freshman.

An assistant coach at Clemson from 1999-2006, Burns tutored star runners such as 2005 ACC Rookie of the Year James Davis, 2006 freshman record-setter C.J. Spiller, Reggie Merriweather, Travis Zachery and Duane Coleman. In 2006, Davis led the Tigers with 1,187 rushing yards on 203 carries and scored 17 touchdowns, while Spiller had 938 rushing yards and 10 touchdowns. The Tigers averaged 5.7 yards per carry during the 2006 regular season.

In 1995, Burns began a four-year stint as the running backs coach on Tommy Bowden's staff at Tulane, where he mentored former NFL back Jerald Sowell. The Green Wave was 19-4 in 1997-98, including a perfect 12-0 campaign and No. 7 final ranking in '98. In 1997, Tulane averaged 182.9 yards per game on the ground, a figure that improved to 202.4 yards the following year.

Burns spent nine seasons as assistant head coach and offensive coordinator for his alma mater, St. Augustine High School in New Orleans before going to Tulane. Burns helped lead St. Augustine to district titles in 1987,

1992 and 1993, his second stint at the school. His first experience as a coach also was at St. Augustine, where he served as an assistant from 1977-79 and helped the school win three other district championships on the way to consecutive state titles in 1978-79. Burns also coached at New Orleans' Booker T. Washington High School in 1980 before a five-year stint as an assistant coach at Southern University in Baton Rouge, La., from 1981-85.

Burns played fullback from 1971-75 at Nebraska under Hall of Fame coach Tom Osborne. A member of three Cornhusker teams that won at least nine games, Burns participated in the Orange Bowl, Cotton Bowl and Sugar Bowl.

Burns earned a bachelor's degree in education from Nebraska in 1976. He is married to the former Connie Winder. The couple has three daughters, Amber, Christy and Erin, and a son, Damon. They have one granddaughter, Kendal Mackenzie, one grandson, Braylon, and a son-in-law, Sylvester Anderson.

RUSS CALLAWAY

OFFENSIVE QUALITY CONTROL

Russ Callaway is in his first season as the Giants' offensive quality control coach.

Callaway comes to the Giants from LSU, where he spent the 2020 season as a senior offensive analyst. He was previously the offensive coordinator at Samford University in Birmingham for five years. In 2019, his final season in that position, the Bulldogs tied for second in the Southern Conference with a 32.2 points-per-game average and ranked second with 239.2 passing yards a game and fourth in the league with an average of 403.7 yards a game.

One of Callaway's standout players at Samford was quarterback Devlin Hodges — currently with the Los Angeles Rams — who earned the Walter Payton Award as the top offensive player in FCS football in 2018, when he set a school record with 4,283 yards. The three-time SoCon Offensive Player of the Year and All-American, passed for an FCS-record 14,584 career yards, breaking the old record set by Steve McNair.

In 2018, Samford's offense led the nation in passing yards per game (392.7). The unit ranked fourth nationally in total offense (515.9 yards-per-game), and eighth in both red zone offense (.898) and first downs (298).

Callaway arrived at Samford after spending two seasons as the wide receivers coach and recruiting coordinator at Murray State University.

In his first season with the Racers, Callaway mentored a group of receivers that saw seven receivers catch at least 15 passes and combine for 20 touchdowns. The group was anchored by All-American Walter Powell, who caught 66 passes for 837 yards and 13 touchdowns in 10 games.

Callaway was a defensive analyst on Nick Saban's staff at the University of Alabama in 2011-12, when the Crimson Tide won back-to-back BCS National Championships. In his role at Alabama, Callaway assisted defensive coordinator Kirby Smart with the inside linebackers. The Tide defense posted four shutouts and held six opponents to 10 points or less.

Callaway played collegiately as a quarterback at Valdosta State. He was a two-time captain and was a member of the Blazers' 2007 national championship team.

After his playing career was cut short by injury, Callaway spent his final year working with the quarterbacks as a student assistant at VSU.

Callaway graduated from Valdosta State in 2010 with a degree in business management.

Callaway and his wife, Taylor, have one daughter, Maris Faye Callaway, and one son, Samuel Ingram Callaway. His father, Neil, is a coaching veteran, and is currently the offensive line coach at Purdue University.

DEREK DOOLEY

TIGHT ENDS

Derek Dooley, a 26-year coaching veteran, is in his second year on the Giants' staff and his first as the team's tight ends coach. He was the senior offensive assistant in his debut season with the team.

Before joining the Giants, Dooley spent two years as the University of Missouri's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach. In his first season in 2018, Dooley engineered a significant turnaround of Missouri's offense. The Tigers were 13th nationally in total offense with an average of 481.8 yards a game, 18th in both scoring (36.6 points a game) and third-down conversions (46.4%). They ranked third in the SEC in all three of those categories. Missouri scored 443 points, second-highest total in program history in a 13-game season and set a Missouri bowl game record by amassing 637 yards in the 2018 AutoZone Liberty Bowl.

Under Dooley's tutelage, quarterback Drew Lock became a more complete quarterback, compiling career-best marks in completion percentage (62.9), fewest interceptions (eight), completions (275), rushing yards (175) and rushing touchdowns (six). Lock was a finalist for three major national awards (Manning Award, Uinitas Golden Arm Award, Lowe's Senior CLASS Award) and earned second-team All-SEC honors for his outstanding play, which included 3,498 yards and 28 passing touchdowns. Lock was a second-round draft choice of the Denver Broncos in 2019.

Prior to Missouri, Dooley was the Dallas Cowboys' wide receivers coach under Giants offensive coordinator Jason Garrett from 2013-17. During his five-year stint, he coached wideout Dez Bryant to three Pro Bowl selections. In 2014, Bryant was named first-team All-Pro after he established a club single-season record with a league-best 16 touchdown catches while finishing with 1,320 yards. Dooley's receivers played a big role in quarterback Dak Prescott's transition to the NFL in 2016. Leading the way was a breakout campaign from Cole Beasley, who led the team with career-high totals of 75 catches and 833 receiving yards.

Dooley was the head coach at Louisiana Tech from 2007-09 and Tennessee from 2010-12. The Vols earned a bowl berth in his first year at Tennessee, and in 2012, Dooley's

offense broke multiple records, including the second-most yards in a season (5,711), a school-record combined 1,303 yards in consecutive games and the fourth-most points in UT history (434).

At Louisiana Tech, Dooley doubled as the school's athletic director for the last two years of his tenure. He led the Bulldogs to an 8-5 mark in 2008, including the school's first postseason victory in 30 years in the Independence Bowl. Tech finished second in the Western Athletic Conference that season and played in a bowl game for only the third time since joining the major college ranks in 1989.

Prior to becoming a head coach, Dooley worked with Garrett on the Miami Dolphins' staff under Nick Saban in 2005-06. At Miami, he oversaw the development of tight end Randy McMichael, who ended his Dolphins career as the team's all-time leader in receptions by a tight end.

Dooley served on Saban's LSU staff as the recruiting coordinator and tight ends coach from 2000-02 and then running backs coach and special teams coordinator from 2003-04. The Tigers won the 2003 BCS National Championship, and Dooley was promoted to assistant head coach the following year.

He began his coaching career in 1996 as a graduate assistant at Georgia under defensive coordinator Joe Kines. Dooley was the wide receivers coach and co-recruiting coordinator at Southern Methodist University from 1997-99.

Dooley earned a bachelor's degree in government and foreign affairs from the University of Virginia and then a law degree from the University of Georgia in 1994. Before embarking on his coaching career, Dooley practiced law at a private firm in Atlanta for two years.

Dooley is the youngest son of Vince Dooley, who coached Georgia for 25 seasons, won six SEC titles and the 1980 national championship, and is enshrined in the College Football Hall of Fame.

Dooley and his wife, Dr. Allison Jeffers Dooley, are the parents of sons John Taylor and Peyton, and daughter, Julianna.

Jerome Henderson, a 15-year NFL coaching veteran, is in his second season as the Giants' defensive backs coach.

In 2020, Henderson was instrumental in improving a pass defense that jumped from 28th in the league the previous season to a tie for 16th. The Giants allowed 237.9 yards game through the air, a 26.2-yard improvement over their 2019 average and the team's lowest figure since 2013, when they gave up 223.3 yards a game through the air and were 10th in the league. Cornerback James Bradberry was selected to his first Pro Bowl after leading the team with three interceptions and tying for second in the NFL with 18 passes defended. Another newcomer, Logan Ryan, moved from cornerback to safety and finished second on the Giants with 92 tackles (67 solo). Ryan teamed with Jabrill Peppers to give the Giants a strong last line of defense. Henderson helped develop Xavier McKinney and Darnay Holmes, who made significant contributions as rookies.

Prior to joining the Giants, Henderson spent four years as the Atlanta Falcons' defensive passing game coordinator/secondary coach.

In 2019, Henderson molded a group of young defensive backs into a productive unit that helped the Falcons finish second in the NFC South. Cornerback Desmond Trufant led the team with four interceptions, despite being limited to nine games because of toe and forearm injuries. Safety Ricardo Allen started all 16 games and was third on the team with 84 tackles. Damontae Kazee tied for fourth with 69 and was second with three interceptions. The defense recorded 87 passes defended (5.4 a game).

In Henderson's third year with the Falcons in 2018, the defense recorded 15 interceptions, tied for the ninth-most in the league, and tallied 72 passes defended. Kazee, then a second-year pro, enjoyed a breakout season and tied for the NFL lead with seven interceptions.

In 2017, Henderson helped coach a defense that only allowed 6.7 passing yards per attempt, which was below the league average of 7.0 yards. The pass defense also saw a jump from year one to year two under Henderson's leadership, as the defense only allowed 232.8 passing yards per game and finished 11 in the NFL last season in pass defense.

In Henderson's first Falcons season in 2016, he coached a young secondary that helped the defense rank in the top five in interceptions returned for touchdowns (three). The team's 279 interception return yards and 89 passes defended were both third in the NFL.

Before joining the Falcons, Henderson spent four seasons as the Dallas Cowboys' secondary coach under Jason Garrett, now the Giants' offensive coordinator. In 2015, Dallas limited opponents to 227 passing yards per game, which ranked fifth in the NFL. Henderson's unit surrendered 19 passing touchdowns, tied for the third-fewest in the NFL, and 29 passes of 25-plus yards, which ranked ninth.

The previous season, Henderson saw his unit improve in passing yards allowed, yards per attempt, interceptions, passing touchdowns, and passes of 25-plus yards. During the 2013 season, he led the defensive backfield as the entire unit made the switch from a 3-4 defense to a 4-3 scheme.

In his first year in Dallas, Henderson was tasked with integrating two new starting corners in veteran free agent Brandon Carr and first-round draft choice Morris Claiborne. Carr led the team with three interceptions - returning one for a touchdown - while Claiborne picked off one pass and had a fumble return for a touchdown.

Prior to arriving in Dallas, Henderson spent three seasons as a secondary coach in Cleveland, where his defensive backs recorded seven of the club's nine interceptions in 2011 and finished second in the NFL in passing defense. He was instrumental in the development of cornerback Joe Haden and safety T.J. Ward, both of whom were consensus All-Rookie selections in 2010.

Before his stint in Cleveland, Henderson spent three seasons as a member of the New York Jets' coaching staff. He led the defensive backs in 2008, when cornerback Darrelle Revis earn a Pro Bowl berth after leading the team with five interceptions. Henderson split duties as an assistant defensive backs coach and director of player development in 2007 after originally joining the club in the latter position the previous year.

Henderson was selected by the New England Patriots in the second round of the 1991 NFL Draft, after starring at Clemson. He played eight seasons in the NFL as a defensive back with the Patriots (1991-93, 1996), Buffalo Bills (1993-94), Philadelphia Eagles (1995), and Jets (1997-98). He appeared in 98 games with 34 starts and recorded nine career interceptions. Henderson played in Super Bowl XXVIII with the Bills and Super Bowl XXXI as a member of the Patriots.

Henderson grew up in Statesville, N.C., and played at Clemson University from 1987-90.

He and his wife, Traci, have three children, Jazmin and twins Taylor and Tyler.

AMOS JONES

ASSISTANT COACH – SPECIAL PROJECTS & SITUATIONS

Amos Jones, a four-decade coaching veteran, is in his second season as the Giants' assistant coach/special projects and situations. This is Jones' 41st consecutive year as a high school, collegiate or NFL coach and his 15th straight in professional football.

Jones twice went to the Super Bowl with the Pittsburgh Steelers (including a victory in Super Bowl XLIII) and had 15 players receive AFC or NFC players of the week awards.

In 2019, Jones was the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' assistant special teams coach. That season, the Bucs' Matt Gay was the NFL's best rookie kicker. He finished fifth in the league with 124 points by making 27 of 35 field goal attempts and 43 of 48 extra point tries. The points, field goals and extra points were all franchise rookie records, as was his 58-yard field goal vs. the Rams. Gay hit five of eight attempts from 50 or more yards. In addition, kickoff specialist Bradley Pinion led the NFL with 88 touchbacks, 14 more than runner-up Wil Lutz of New Orleans.

Jones was the special teams coordinator of the Cleveland Browns in 2018, when Britton Colquitt set a franchise record and finished sixth in the NFL with 32 punts inside the 20-yard line. The Browns were second in the NFL with 290 punt return yards.

Before joining the Browns, Jones was the Arizona Cardinals' special teams coordinator from 2013-17. Jones helped Justin Bethel earn three consecutive Pro Bowl selections (2013-15) after leading the Cards in special teams tackles each season. Bethel also blocked three field goals and was named Special Teams Player of the Month in December 2014. In 2017, rookie Budda Baker earned Pro Bowler honors as a special teams player. Kicker Chandler Catanzaro tied the NFL record for the most consecutive field goals to begin a career (17) and established a franchise rookie record with 114 points in 2014.

In 2015, Catanzaro finished third in the NFL with 137 points, the second-highest single-season total in franchise history. He was named Special Teams Player of the Week following Week 14 in 2015, his third career selection.

Catanzaro also had his first two career game-winning field goals, a 32-yarder to beat Cincinnati and a season-long 47-yarder in a victory against Minnesota.

Dave Zastudil tied for the NFL lead with 35 punts inside the 20-yard line and his 45.7-yard gross punting average in 2013 was the third-best single-season total in franchise history. The following year, Drew Butler tied for the NFL lead with 34 punts inside the 20 and Arizona's kickoff unit was fourth in the league with an average opponent drive starting at the 20.6-yard line.

Jones went to Arizona after working in Pittsburgh for six seasons, the first five as a special teams assistant and then as special teams coach in 2012. In Jones' final season, Shaun Suisham made 28 of 31 field goal attempts and Chris Rainey had 1,035 kickoff return yards, the third-most in team history.

Jones was instrumental in the development of Antonio Brown, who in 2011 set a Steelers record with 2,048 all-purpose yards, including 1,062 yards on returns. Brown scored on an 89-yard kickoff return as a rookie in 2010 and a 60-yard punt return the following season. Brown finished the 2011 season with a 27.3-yard kickoff return average and earned his first trip to the Pro Bowl as a returner.

In 2009, the Steelers were the NFL's top kickoff return team with a franchise record 1,581 yards, including Stefan Logan's Pittsburgh record 1,466 yards.

Before entering the NFL, Jones coached at Mississippi State (2004-06), James Madison (2003), Cincinnati (1999-02), British Columbia of the Canadian Football League, Tulane (1995-96), Pittsburgh (1992), Alabama (1990-91, 1981-82) and Temple (1983-88).

A native of Aliceville, Ala., Jones was a safety and running back at Alabama (1978-80), where he played under legendary head coach Paul "Bear" Bryant, winning back-to-back national championships in 1978-79.

Jones and his wife Stacey have four children: Daughter Samantha (Corey) and sons Joshua, Nathan and Jeremy.

FREDDIE KITCHENS

SENIOR OFFENSIVE ASSISTANT

Freddie Kitchens, a 22-year coaching veteran who has been in the NFL since 2006, is in his second year with the Giants and his first as the senior offensive assistant.

Kitchens was the tight ends coach in 2019, when Evan Engram became the first Giants' tight end since Jeremy Shockey in 2006 to be selected to the Pro Bowl. Engram played all 16 games for the first time and started a career-high 14 games. He was second on the Giants with 63 receptions, one less than the career high he set as a rookie in 2017. Engram's catches gained 654 yards. He also had six rushing attempts for 26 yards. Engram's 63 catches were the sixth-highest single-season total by a tight end in Giants history.

Second-year pro Kaden Smith played in 15 games with 12 starts and finished second among the team's tight ends with 18 receptions for 112 yards.

Prior to joining the Giants, Kitchens spent two seasons with the Cleveland Browns. He was the team's running backs coach/associate head coach before being promoted to offensive coordinator for the final eight games of the 2018 season. Kitchens was Cleveland's head coach in 2019. Under Kitchens, the Browns beat all three of their AFC North rivals (Baltimore, Cincinnati and Pittsburgh) in the same season for the first time since the division came into existence in 2002.

In 2019, Kitchens' offensive skill players were among the most productive in the NFL. With wide receivers Jarvis Landry (83 catches for 1,174 yards and six touchdowns) and Odell Beckham, Jr. (74 receptions for 1,035 yards and three scores), the Browns were one of six teams — and one of just two in the AFC — with two 1,000-yard receivers. It was just the second time in franchise history that Cleveland had multiple players with 1000+ yards (2007 with Kellen Winslow and Braylon Edwards).

Landry and Beckham combined for 157 catches and 2,209 yards, the latter figure ranking seventh among teammates in combined receiving yards last season. They ranked third in both receptions and yards in a season by a Browns duo. In 2013, Josh Gordon and Jordan Cameron combined for 167 receptions and 1,563 yards and in 2007, Winslow and Edwards had 162 catches and 2,395 yards.

In addition to the wide receivers' production, Nick Chubb finished second in the NFL with 1,494 rushing yards. Cleveland was the only AFC team and joined Carolina and Dallas as the only teams with two 1,000-yard receivers and a 1,000-yard rusher (Christian McCaffrey was both for the Panthers).

Landry, Beckham and Chubb combined for 4,001 yards from scrimmage, the fourth-highest total by a trio of NFL teammates and the most by an AFC threesome in 2019.

Kitchens has coached with some of football's best and most successful coaches. He was a graduate assistant at LSU in 2000 under Nick Saban. Six years later, Kitchens broke into the NFL with the Dallas Cowboys under Bill Parcells, who won two Super Bowls with the Giants and is a Pro Football Hall of Famer. Kitchens was one of six assistants from that 2006 Cowboys staff who went on to

become an NFL head coach, joining Anthony Lynn, Todd Haley, Tony Sparano, Mike Zimmer and Todd Bowles. He spent five years in Arizona with Bruce Arians, who led the Tampa Bay Buccaneers to a Super Bowl victory last season.

In 2018, Kitchens took over as the Browns' offensive coordinator following Week 9 and helped the unit to a dramatic turnaround. During the second half of the season, the Browns finished among the league leaders in several categories including yards per game (fourth with 395.1), passing touchdowns (tied for fourth with 19) and total touchdowns (tied for sixth with 25). Cleveland surrendered just five sacks during the second half of the season — by far the lowest total of any team in the league — compared to 33 in the first half. The Browns also scored touchdowns on 19 of 24 trips to the red zone while posting a 5-3 record.

That season, Kitchens played a key role in the development of several rookies, including quarterback Baker Mayfield. The No. 1 overall draft choice set an NFL rookie record with 27 touchdown passes and finished sixth in rookie passing yardage with 3,725, despite starting just 13 games. Nick Chubb set a Browns rookie record with 996 rushing yards, including recording the longest rush in Browns history and the second-longest run by rookie in NFL history (92 yards vs. Atlanta on Nov. 11). In addition, guard Joel Bitonio was selected to his first Pro Bowl and wide receiver Jarvis Landry was named to his fourth.

Prior to joining the Browns, Kitchens spent 11 seasons with the Arizona Cardinals. He coached the tight ends from 2007-12, the quarterbacks from 2013-16 and the running backs in his final year.

In 2017, Arizona acquired Adrian Peterson in a mid-season trade. Peterson, who ranks fifth on the NFL's career rushing list, led the Cardinals with 448 yards despite playing in just six games. During his time as quarterbacks coach, Kitchens helped Carson Palmer establish multiple single-season team records, including passing yards (4,671), touchdown passes (35) and passer rating (104.6). Palmer also became the only player in Cardinals history to throw for 4,000 yards in multiple seasons (2013, 2015-16). In 2015, the Cardinals had the top-ranked offense in the NFL for the first time in team history and set numerous single-season team records including points (489), touchdowns (59), touchdown passes (35), total net yards (6,533) and first downs (373).

Kitchens began his NFL coaching career in 2006 as the Dallas Cowboys' tight ends coach. That season, Kitchens worked with Jason Witten, who was selected to the Pro Bowl.

Prior to the NFL, Kitchens spent seven years coaching on the college level with stops at Mississippi State (2004-05), North Texas (2001-03), Louisiana State (2000) and Glenville State (1999). Giants coach Joe Judge was a senior on the 2004 Mississippi State team.

A starter at quarterback for the University of Alabama from 1995-97, Kitchens finished his playing career with 4,668 yards and 30 touchdown passes for the Crimson Tide. He finished his collegiate career ranked third in school his-

tory in career attempts, fourth in career passing yards and fifth in career completions. Kitchens also played baseball at Alabama his freshman and senior seasons, but a pectoral injury forced him to miss his sophomore and junior campaigns.

A native of Gadsden, Ala., Kitchens earned high school All-America honors and was named Mr. Football in the state of Alabama his senior season at Etowah High School.

Kitchens and his wife, Ginger, have two daughters, Bennett and Camden.

JEREMY PRUITT

SENIOR DEFENSIVE ASSISTANT

Jeremy Pruitt, who was a part of five national championship teams as a collegiate coach, this year makes his NFL debut as the Giants' senior defensive assistant.

In 14 years coaching college players, Pruitt mentored 59 NFL draft choices, including 16 first-round selections, 22 All-Americans and 21 all-conference first-team honorees. He was a two-time finalist for the Broyles Award as the nation's top assistant coach and was named the national Recruiter of the Year in 2012. Pruitt coached the country's No. 1 defense in 2013, 2016 and 2017. He won national titles with Alabama in 2009, 2011-12 and 2017 and with Florida State in 2013, as well as four conference championships. Pruitt coached in 14 bowl games.

Pruitt joined the team after a three-year stint as the head coach at the University of Tennessee, where he was 16-19 from 2018-20.

In 2019, Pruitt's Volunteers finished the season with six consecutive victories and seven wins in their last eight games to finish 8-5 - 5-3 in the Southeastern Conference – including a 23-22 defeat of Indiana in the TaxSlayer Gator Bowl. Tennessee was the only team in the country to overcome a 13-point deficit in the final five minutes during the 2019 season. The Vols ranked 23rd in the nation in total defense (334.5 yards a game) and finished in the top 20 nationally in pass defense (194.0) and interceptions (15).

Prior to leading the Volunteers, Pruitt was the defensive coordinator and inside linebackers coach at Alabama (2016-17) and the coordinator and defensive backs coach at Georgia (2014-15) and Florida State (2013). Pruitt's

initial stint with the Crimson Tide was from 2007-12, where he first worked with Giants coach Joe Judge and was director of player development and then defensive backs coach for three years each.

Pruitt mentored some of college football's very best defensive players, including 2017 National Defensive Player of the Year Minkah Fitzpatrick, 2016 Butkus Award winner Reuben Foster, 2016 National Defensive Player of the Year Jonathan Allen and top 10 NFL draft picks Jalen Ramsey, Roquan Smith, Leonard Floyd, Mark Barron and Dee Milliner.

His first collegiate job was at West Alabama, where he coached defensive backs and earned his bachelor's degree in 1999. In 1998 and from 2000-06, Pruitt coached at three Alabama high schools – Plainview, Fort Payne and traditional powerhouse Hoover, where he coached the defensive backs for three seasons and was the coordinator for two.

Pruitt grew up in Rainsville, Ala., about 45 minutes south of Chattanooga.

He played collegiately at Middle Tennessee and Alabama, serving as a two-year starter at safety for the Blue Raiders, before transferring to the Crimson Tide and playing in 16 games as a reserve defensive back for Gene Stallings. He totaled 79 tackles and three interceptions at MTSU. Pruitt wore jersey No. 27 with the Crimson Tide and was a member of the 1996 SEC Western Division Championship team that won the Outback Bowl.

Pruitt and his wife Casey have three sons, Jayse, Ridge and Flynt, and a one-year-old daughter, Shelby.

Tom Quinn, the longest-tenured member of the Giants' coaching staff, is in his 16th consecutive season as a member of the Giants' coaching staff. For the fourth year in a row he is an assistant special teams coach, the position he held in his first season with the team in 2006. In 2007, Quinn became the Giants' special teams coordinator, a position he held through the 2017 season.

In 2020, Graham Gano made 31 of 32 field goal attempts, a .9687 percentage that is the second highest in Giants history. Gano's predecessor, Aldrick Rosas made 32 of 33 attempts, a success rate of .9696, in 2018.

Gano's .9687 percentage was the highest among the 21 NFL kickers who attempted at least 25 field goals in 2020. His only miss was on a 57-yard try in Chicago in Week 2. Gano followed by making his next 30 field goal attempts, the longest streak in Giants history. Josh Brown hit 29 straight attempts in 2014-15.

Riley Dixon placed 28 punts inside the opposition 20-yard line, tying him with the Rams' Johnny Hekker and the Bears' Pat O'Donnell for the NFL's third-highest total. In three seasons with the Giants, Dixon has averaged 45.4 yards on 205 punts, the second-highest average in franchise history (minimum 150 punts), trailing only Steve Weatherford's 46.3-yard average on 311 kicks from 2011-14.

In 2019, the Giants' kickoff coverage team led the league and finished in the top two for the season straight season by allowing an average return of just 18.1 yards. The punt coverage team was tied for fifth as opponents averaged only 5.7 yards a return. Conversely, the Giants were fourth and 10th, respectively, in the NFL in punt (9.8 yards) and kickoff (23.5 yards) return average.

Punter Riley Dixon was ninth in the league with a 42.3-yard net average, a franchise record since the statistic was first kept in 1976. He set the previous mark of 41.8 yards in 2018.

In 2018, Rosas was selected to his first Pro Bowl after making 32 of 33 field goal attempts and 31 of 32 extra point tries. The 32 field goals were the fifth-highest total in Giants history. Rosas' .970 field goal percentage was a Giants record and was just 1/100th of a percentage point behind NFL leader Robbie Gould, a former Giant.

The Giants finished second in the NFL in kickoff coverage, limiting opponents to an average return of 20.4 yards, and seventh in punt coverage with a 6.6-yard average.

In 2016, the 11-5 Giants received significant contributions from several of Quinn's special teams players.

Kickers Brown and Gould combined to make 21 of 22 field goal attempts, a 95.5 percent success rate. The previous mark of 93.8 percent was set in 2015.

Gould joined the team on Oct. 20 and made all 12 of his field goal attempts, including two (from 26 and 40 yards) in the NFC Wild Card Game in Green Bay.

Brad Wing punted 93 times for a 40.9-yard net average that was then a single-season Giants record. Wing was named the NFC Special Teams Player of the Week for Weeks 14 and 15 for his outstanding play in victories vs.

Dallas and Detroit. He was the first Giants player to win back-to-back Special Teams Player of the Week awards since they were instituted in 1984.

Dwayne Harris was selected to his first Pro Bowl after leading the Giants in kickoff and punt returns for the second straight season. He finished fifth in the NFL with a 24.2-yard average on 22 kickoff returns, and he averaged 5.9 yards on 29 punt returns.

The Giants blocked two field goal attempts in 2016. Pro Bowl cornerback Janoris Jenkins was named NFC Special Teams Player of the Week after a victory against New Orleans on Sept. 18, when he returned a blocked field goal 65 yards for a touchdown.

In 2015, Quinn's units finished second in the Dallas Morning News' annual comprehensive ranking of the NFL's special teams. The Giants were seventh in the league with a 10.2-yard punt return average, and 10th with a 24.9-yard kickoff return average. They were fifth in the NFL in kickoff coverage, allowing just 20.3 yards per return.

In his first season with the Giants, Harris finished third in the NFL with a 28.7-yard average on 22 kickoff returns, including a 100-yard runback vs. Dallas on Oct. 25. Brown played in his first Pro Bowl after scoring 134 points, the highest total of his 14-year career. Brown made 30 of 32 field goal attempts in 2015, a franchise-record 93.8 percent success rate.

In 2014, the Giants' kickoff coverage team ranked second in the NFL, holding opponents to an average return of just 18.3 yard. Brown made 24 of 26 field goal attempts, a 92.3 percent success rate that was then the highest in Giants history. That season, the Giants led the NFL with five special teams takeaways.

Quinn's special teams underwent significant changes in the Giants' 2011 championship season. Steve Weatherford became the team's punter. Aaron Ross was the most frequently used punt returner and Devin Thomas and rookies Da'Rel Scott and Jerrel Jernigan combined for 47 kickoff returns.

Zak DeOssie, the snapper on both punts and placekicks, was selected to his second Pro Bowl in three seasons in 2010. The Giants' kickoff coverage unit was ranked fourth in the NFL, allowing an average return of only 19.7 yards.

In 2008, three of the Giants' special teams players — kicker John Carney, punter Jeff Feagles and DeOssie — played for the NFC Pro Bowl team.

Carney was signed just prior to the season because Lawrence Tynes was sidelined with an injury. Quinn quickly integrated Carney into the kicking unit and the veteran succeeded on 35 of 38 field goals attempts (92.1 percent). Carney's 35 field goals tied the team single-season record, which he shares with Ali Haji-Sheikh (1983) and Jay Feely (2005).

That season, Feagles had a career-high net average of 40.2 yards on 64 punts. The Giants allowed only 140 punt return yards ranked third in the NFL in punt coverage, giving up an average of only 5.9 yards a return.

The special teams overcame adversity and performed

well in Quinn's first season as coordinator in 2007, when the Giants won Super Bowl XLII. Long-snapper Ryan Kuehl suffered a season-ending injury in training camp, and the Giants used rookie snappers Jay Alford (on placekicks) and DeOssie (for punts) the entire year. Tynes made 23 of 27 field goal attempts (85.2 percent), plus a game-winning 47-yarder in overtime in the NFC Championship Game in Green Bay.

Quinn coached in the collegiate ranks for 15 years

before joining the Giants.

He grew up in Southern California, where he played at Foothill High School in Tustin. From 1986-90, Quinn was a linebacker at the University of Arizona, where he played on three bowl teams. He earned a bachelor's degree in interdisciplinary studies in 1990 and a master's in education the following year.

Quinn and his wife, Alison, have a son, Shane, and two daughters, Logan and Riley.

Rob Sale, a 14-year collegiate coaching veteran, is in his first season as the Giants' offensive line coach and first in the NFL.

Sale spent the previous three seasons as the offensive coordinator and line coach at the University of Louisiana at Lafayette. In 2020, the Ragin' Cajuns ranked third in the Sun Belt Conference with an average of 33.6 points-per-game. They ranked fifth in the league with an average of 421.5 yards a game, tied for third at 6.3 yards a play and were fourth in rushing with an average of 213.0 yards a game.

Two Louisiana players were among the league's top five rushers. First-team all-conference selection Elijah Mitchell was second with 878 rushing yards (87.8 a game) and third with 6.2 yards a carry and Trey Ragas was fifth with 758 yards and fourth with 5.8 yards an attempt. Mitchell was selected by the San Francisco 49ers in the sixth round of the 2021 NFL Draft and Ragas was signed as a rookie free agent by the Las Vegas Raiders. The Ragin' Cajuns rushed for 344 yards and averaged 8.2 yards-per-carry while scoring 10 touchdowns in a 70-20 victory against ULL Monroe.

Three linemen - O'Cyrus Torrence, Ken Marks and Shane Vallot, were second and third-team all-conference.

Louisiana was ranked as high as 16th and won its final seven games to finish 10-1, including 7-1 in the Sun Belt.

In 2019, Sale's offense set numerous school records, including total yards (6,918), touchdowns (69), rushing yards (3,604), rushing touchdowns (42) and passing touchdowns (27).

The Ragin' Cajuns' offensive line featured two NFL draft choices in Robert Hunt and Kevin Dotson. Hunt became the third-highest draft pick in team history when he was selected 39th overall by the Miami Dolphins, while Dotson, who was named to several All-America teams, was taken by the Pittsburgh Steelers with the 135th pick.

Quarterback Levi Lewis became the first 3,000-yard passer in program history (3,050) and threw a school-record 26 touchdown passes (26).

Six offensive players earned All-Sun Belt honors.

In his first season coaching the Louisiana offense, Ragas, Mitchell and Raymond Calais each rushed for more

than 700 yards, paced by Ragas' 1,149 yards and nine touchdowns. Mitchell led the Sun Belt with 16 touchdowns and ran for 985 yards of his own. Calais also impressed under Sale's system, tallying 754 yards and seven scores, highlighted by a school-record, 92-yard touchdown scamper against Georgia State.

That season, five linemen started all 14 games and Dotson (first team) and Hunt (second team) received all-conference honors.

Sale was the offensive line coach/running game coordinator at Arizona State in 2017, when the Sun Devils averaged 31.9 points, 427.6 total yards and 179.9 rushing yards a game.

In 2016, Sale was the offensive line coach at ULM. That season, the Warhawks ranked third in the Sun Belt with 181.3 rushing yards per game and allowed just 19 sacks.

Sale served as the line coach at Georgia in 2015, when the Bulldogs averaged 375 yards a game. The offensive line — led by All-SEC first-team offensive tackle John Theus — helped the team rush for more than 190 rushing yards per game.

Sale spent three seasons at McNeese State serving as the offensive line coach for the Cowboys from 2012-13 before being elevated to co-offensive coordinator in 2014. In his final season, the Cowboys offense averaged 32.4 points, 396.5 total yards and 221.9 rushing yards a game.

From 2007-11, Sale gained his first college coaching experience as a strength and conditioning assistant and offensive analyst at Alabama. He began his coaching career as the offensive line coach at Catholic High of Pointe Coupee in New Roads, La. in 2006.

Sale played in 35 games with 25 starts, including 13 at right guard as a senior in 2002, at LSU. As a junior, he started at both center and guard when the Tigers won the SEC title. During his sophomore season, he started the final five games of the regular season and the Peach Bowl at left guard.

Sale was a four-year letter-winner and an all-state offensive lineman as a junior and senior at Neville High School in Monroe.

Sale and his wife Amanda have two sons, Tripp and Briggs.

JERRY SCHUPLINSKI

QUARTERBACKS

Jerry Schuplinski is in his second season as the Giants' quarterbacks coach and his ninth in the NFL.

In his first year with the team in 2020, the Giants completed 62.1% of their passes, the seventh-highest single-season figure in franchise history.

Daniel Jones started all 14 games in which he played and completed 62.5% of his throws (280 of 448 passes) for 2,943 yards, 11 touchdowns and 10 interceptions for a passer rating of 80.4. From Nov. 2 against Tampa Bay until the season finale vs. Dallas on Jan. 3, Jones threw a career-high 177 passes without an interception. In addition, Jones had 65 rushing attempts for 423 yards, the team's second-highest total and the record for a Giants quarterback in the Super Bowl era. Pro Football Hall of Famer Fran Tarkenton previously held the record with 306 yards in 1967. Jones' 6.5-yard average was the NFL's highest among the 91 players with at least 50 rushing attempts in 2020.

Schuplinski was the Miami Dolphins' quarterbacks coach in 2019, when he helped the team finish 12th in the NFL with 237.8 passing yards a game. Veteran quarterback Ryan Fitzpatrick threw 20 touchdown passes — his highest total since 2015 — and Miami won five of its last nine games after an 0-7 start.

Before joining the Dolphins' staff Schuplinski spent six seasons (2013-18) with the New England Patriots. He was a coaching assistant for three seasons before beginning a three-year stint as the team's assistant quarterbacks coach. New England won three Super Bowls (XLIX, LI and LIII), four AFC titles and advanced to the conference championship game in every season Schuplinski was on the Patriots' staff under Bill Belichick and with Joe Judge.

Schuplinski spent his final three seasons in New England working closely with Tom Brady. In 2018, Schuplinski's final year with the team, the Patriots won Super Bowl LIII while finishing eighth in passing, averaging 266.1 net passing yards per game. Brady was seventh in the NFL with 4,355 passing yards and 10th with 29 passing touchdowns, earning his 14th Pro Bowl selection.

The previous season, Schuplinski helped Brady win

his third NFL Most Valuable Player Award. Brady was the NFL's leading passer, throwing for 4,577 yards. His 32 passing touchdowns and 102.8 passer rating were both third in the league. The Patriots led the NFL in total offense, averaging 394.2 yards per game, and finished second in scoring, averaging 28.6 points per game.

In Schuplinski's first season as assistant quarterbacks coach in 2016, the Patriots won Super Bowl LI. Brady was named Super Bowl MVP after he passed for 466 yards and two touchdowns in a dramatic come-from-behind overtime victory against Atlanta. Patriots quarterbacks set an NFL record with 258 pass attempts without an interception to start the season. With Brady out for the first four games of the season, Schuplinski's extensive early season prep work with quarterbacks Jimmy Garoppolo and Jacoby Brissett helped the team start 3-1 in Brady's absence.

Schuplinski got his start in the NFL in 2013 with the Patriots as a coaching assistant. During his three years in that position, New England won Super Bowl XLIX and compiled a 36-12 (.750) regular-season record.

Prior to New England, Schuplinski spent six seasons (2007-12) as the linebackers and special teams coach at Case Western Reserve in Cleveland. During his tenure, Schuplinski mentored 22 University Athletic Association (NCAA Division III) all-conference selections.

Schuplinski was head coach and athletics director at Trinity High School in Garfield Heights, Ohio from 2002-06. He began his coaching career as a running backs and special teams coach at his alma mater, John Carroll, from 2000-01.

Schuplinski played collegiately at John Carroll University, where he was college teammates with former NFL linebacker London Fletcher and Houston Texans general manager Nick Caserio and Patriots offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach Josh McDaniels. He graduated from the school with his bachelor's degree in business administration/marketing in 1999 and his master's degree in business administration in 2001.

Schuplinski and his wife, Megan, have four daughters, Macy, Bryn, Jaxi and Josy.

Kevin Sherrer is in his second season with the Giants and his first as the linebackers coach. In his debut season with the team in 2020, he coached the inside linebackers, a position he held the previous two years at the University of Tennessee, where he was also co-defensive coordinator in 2018 and special teams coordinator in 2019.

Sherrer coached at three Southeastern Conference schools – Alabama, Georgia and Tennessee – as well as South Alabama.

Last season, inside linebacker Blake Martinez started all 16 games, was one of the team's captains and led the Giants and was third in the NFL with 151 tackles (86 solo). Martinez also had 3.0 sacks, nine tackles for loss, six quarterback hits, one interception, five passes defended, two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery. Martinez posted double-digit tackles in eight games, including a season-high 14 (eight solo) against Washington on Oct. 18).

Martinez and the linebackers were among the primary reasons the Giants' defense ranked 12th in the NFL, allowing 349.3 yards-per-game. It was their best defensive finish since 2016, when they were 10th in the league by allowing 339.7 yards a game. The Giants' rushing defense ranked 10th, giving up 111.4 yards a game, also their best figures since 2016 (when they were tied for third at 88.6 rushing yards a game).

In 2019, the Tennessee defense on which Sherrer coached finished sixth in the nation's best collegiate conference, the Southeastern, allowing 334.5 yards a game, and seventh in scoring defense, giving up 21.7 points a game. The Volunteers were fourth in passing defense, surrendering 194.0 yards-per-game. Despite missing two games, inside linebacker Daniel Bituli led the team in both total (88) and solo (52 tackles) and was named to the All-Southeastern Conference second team.

In his role as special teams coordinator, Sherrer helped Tennessee finish second in the conference in field goals (23), field goal percentage (85.2), punt return average (15.7-yard average on 15 runbacks) and finished tied with Alabama with a league-best three punt return touchdowns.

That Vols team won its final six games, including a victory against Indiana in the Gator Bowl, to finish 8-5.

In Sherrer's first season at Tennessee in 2018, the Volunteers' defense was one of the most improved in college football, climbing 74 spots in the national run defense rankings with opponents rushing for nearly 100 yards less than in 2017 (154.5, down from 251 yards the previous year). The Vols also moved up 45 spots nationally in third-down defense with opponents converting just 39% percent of their third downs compared to 45.2% in 2017.

Bituli led the team with 79 tackles and fellow inside linebacker Darrin Kirkland Jr. was fourth with 51.

Sherrer was the University of Georgia's outside linebackers coach from 2014-17 and helped lead the Bulldogs to an SEC Championship and a spot in the

National Championship Game in the 2017 season.

While in Athens, Sherrer coached three linebackers that were selected in the NFL Draft in Lorenzo Carter (the Giants' third-round choice in 2018), Leonard Floyd (2016) and Jordan Jenkins (2016). He also helped coach inside linebacker draft choices Roquan Smith (2018), Ramik Wilson (2015) and Amarlo Herrera (2015). Sherrer coached five players who have received All-SEC honors and two All-Americans, as Carter earned Freshman All-American honors in 2014 and Smith received consensus All-America honors in 2017.

The Bulldogs finished in the top 20 in total defense during all four of Sherrer's seasons and finished the season ranked in the top 16 in scoring defense three times. In 2017, Georgia's defense was tied for third in the country in scoring defense, fourth in total defense and second in pass defense.

Carter earned second-team All-SEC honors and was third on the team in tackles (61), fourth in sacks (4.5) and tied for third in tackles for loss (7.5), while leading the Bulldogs with three forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries.

Sherrer was the defensive coordinator/defensive backs coach at South Alabama in 2013, when the Jaguars ranked third in the nation with 3.17 sacks per game and 17th with 7.25 tackles for loss per game. South Alabama had three defensive players earn All-Sun Belt honors on defense in defensive linemen Romelle Jones and Alex Page and linebacker Enrique Williams.

Sherrer's first full-time job in college football was as the director of player development for Alabama from 2010-12. His responsibilities included assisting Crimson Tide student-athletes with academics, community outreach and their personal lives. During his tenure, Bama posted a 35-5 overall record while winning back-to-back BCS national titles in 2011 and 2012.

Prior to becoming a college coach, Sherrer was an accomplished high school assistant coach at Alabama high school powerhouse Hoover (2005-09), Spain Park (2001-04) and Tuscaloosa County (1996-97). In his first season on the staff at Hoover, the Bucs won the state 6A championship, a feat they would repeat in 2009. The Buccaneers posted a 61-12 overall record while Sherrer was on the staff.

Sherrer was also the defensive backs coach at Spain Park High School from 2001-04. He got his start as a coach as an assistant at Tuscaloosa County High in 1996-97 seasons. Sherrer helped lead the Wildcats to the state 6A championship in his second year on the staff.

Between his time at Tuscaloosa County and Spain Park, Sherrer spent three years (1998-2000) as a graduate assistant at Alabama on head coach Mike DuBose's staff. He assisted on defense while also helping to coordinate scout teams, video breakdown and on-campus recruiting. The Tide won the 1999 SEC title and played in the Orange Bowl that season.

Sherrer was a three-year letter winner as a tight end

at Alabama from 1993-95, helping the Crimson Tide to a 29-7-1 overall record and two SEC West Division titles in that span. He earned his degree in physical education from Alabama in 1996 and a master's degree in higher

education administration from the school in 2000.

Sherrer and his wife Carrie have twin sons, Kaleb and Kyle.

SEAN SPENCER

DEFENSIVE LINE

Sean Spencer, a 21-year college coaching veteran, is in his second season as the Giants' defensive line coach.

In Spencer's first year with the team in 2020, Leonard Williams finished with a career-high 11.5 sacks, the most by a Giants' player since Jason Pierre-Paul's 14.5 in 2014. His 11.5 sacks were 7.5 more than any of his teammates, 4.5 more than his previous best total (in 2016) and 11.0 more than he had in 2019. Williams was named the NFC Defensive Player of the Week twice in the season's final five weeks — after victories in Seattle on Dec. 6 and against Dallas on Jan. 3 (when Williams had a career-best 3.0 sacks).

The Giants' 40 sacks were their highest total since they registered 47 in 2014.

The line helped the Giants' defense rank 12th in the NFL, allowing 349.3 yards-per-game. It was their best defensive finish since 2016, when they were 10th in the league by allowing 339.7 yards a game. The Giants' rushing defense ranked 10th, allowing 111.4 yards a game, also their best figures since 2016 (when they were tied for third at 88.6 rushing yards a game). The passing defense tied for 16th by giving up 237.9 yards game, the team's lowest figure since 2013, when the Giants allowed 223.3 yards a game through the air and were 10th in the league.

Prior to joining the Giants, Spencer spent six seasons at Penn State, where he was also associate head coach and run game coordinator his final two years.

Under Spencer, the Nittany Lions' line was traditionally one of the nation's best. In 2019, Penn State had 45 sacks, the seventh-highest total in the country and third highest in the Big Ten. It was Penn State's fifth consecutive season with at least 40 sacks, the first such streak for the Nittany Lions since team sacks were recorded in 1988. Defensive end Yetur Gross-Matos was fifth in the conference with a team-high 9.5 sacks and was named All-Big Ten first team for the second straight year.

That season, Spencer's linemen were also significant contributors to Penn State's run defense, which finished first in the nation by allowing only 2.6 yards-per-carry and fifth in the country and first in the conference by surrendering just 95.0 yards a game.

In 2015 and 2018, Penn State led the nation in sacks, first with 50 and then with 47 (3.6 a game). In the latter season, the Nittany Lions ranked fourth in the country

with 8.2 tackles for loss a game.

In 2018, the defense was a frequent fixture in the opposition's backfield, leading the country in sacks (3.62) for the second time in four years and ranking fourth in tackles for loss (8.2). The previous season, the line helped the defense finish in the Top 25 in FBS in scoring defense (7th; 16.5), sacks (7th; 3.23), rushing defense (14th; 118.0), total defense (17th; 329.5), takeaways (23rd; 25) and tackles for loss (25th; 7.2).

The line played a pivotal role in Penn State's Big Ten Championship run in 2016, when the defense finished seventh in FBS in tackles for loss (8.1) and 19th in sacks (2.86).

In 2015, the defensive line not only paced a unit that led the FBS in sacks (3.54 a game) but was sixth in tackles for loss (8.2) and 14th in total defense (324.5). Under Spencer's guidance, former walk-on Carl Nassib won the Rotary Lombardi Award, Lott IMPACT Trophy, Hendricks Award and Woodson-Nagurski Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year while breaking the Penn State single-season sacks record with 15.5 in 2015. Nassib became Penn State's 13th unanimous Consensus All-American.

Spencer led a unit that in 2014 helped Penn State finish No. 3 in the FBS rushing defense (100.5) and second in total defense (278.7).

During his 2011-13 tenure at Vanderbilt, Spencer's defensive lines helped Vanderbilt finish in the top 25 in the nation in total defense all three years. The Commodores recorded 28, 31 and 28 sacks under Spencer, with the defensive line posting 42.5 tackles for loss in 2013.

Spencer coached the Bowling Green defensive line in 2009-10, when he mentored Chris Jones to All-Mid-American Conference honors and helped the Falcons to the 2009 Humanitarian Bowl.

Spencer had two stints at Massachusetts, coaching the defensive line in 2001-03 and in 2007-08. He also has coached at Hofstra (2006), Villanova (2005), Holy Cross (2004), Trinity College (1998-2000), Shippensburg (1996-97) and Wesleyan (1995).

Spencer was a three-year starter at safety at Clarion (Pa.) University where he earned a bachelor's degree in political science. He and his wife, Allyson, have a daughter Alysia (17).

Tyke Tolbert, an 18-year NFL coaching veteran, is in his fourth season as the Giants' wide receivers coach, a position he previously held with Arizona, Buffalo, Carolina, and Denver.

In 2020, Sterling Shepard led the Giants and tied his career high with 66 catches — the third season he finished with 65 or 66 — was second with 656 yards and tied Darius Slayton for the team lead with three touchdown catches.

Shepard had game-high totals of eight receptions for 112 yards and scored touchdowns on a 23-yard run and a 10-yard catch in the season finale vs. Dallas on Jan. 3. It was the first time in Shepard's five-year, 65-game career he scored two touchdowns in a game.

Slayton led the Giants with 751 receiving yards and a 15.0-yard per-catch average and was third on the team and second among the wideouts with 50 catches.

In 2019, Tolbert coached a productive group that did not have a receiver play all 16 games. The Giants had four different receivers with at least 100 yards in a game (wideouts Shepard, Slayton and Golden Tate and tight end Evan Engram). That had not happened since 2012, when the 100-yard receivers were Hakeem Nicks, Victor Cruz, Domenik Hixon and Ramses Bardeen.

Slayton missed the first two games with a hamstring injury but had one of the finest seasons by a rookie wide receiver in franchise history. The fifth-round draft choice from Auburn led the team with 740 receiving yards and eight touchdowns and was fourth with 48 catches. Slayton is among the top five rookies in Giants history in receptions, yards and touchdown catches.

Shepard missed six games with a concussion but started all 10 games in which he played and led the Giants with 57 catches. His 576 receiving yards were third on the team.

In 2018, Shepard started all 16 games and finished second among the wideouts with career-high totals of 66 catches (one more than his rookie total in 2016) and 872 yards. He scored four touchdowns. Despite missing the final four games with an injury, Odell Beckham, Jr. led the wide receivers with 77 catches for a team-high 1,052 yards and six touchdowns.

Prior to joining the Giants, Tolbert spent seven years with the Broncos, who won Super Bowl 50 in February 2016.

From 2012-16 one of Tolbert's Denver standouts, Demaryius Thomas, had at least 90 catches and 1,000 receiving yards in every year to join Pro Football Hall of Famer Marvin Harrison (5) and Troy Holt (6) as the only players to reach those marks in at least five consecutive seasons. Thomas was selected to the Pro Bowl in each of those seasons.

Tolbert was also instrumental in the continued development of Emmanuel Sanders, who signed with the Broncos in 2014, was selected to his first two Pro Bowls (2014, 2016) and produced the first three 1,000-yard receiving seasons of his career.

Thomas and Sanders formed one of the best wide receiver duos in the league. In 2016, Thomas (1,083) and Sanders (1,032) each topped 1,000 receiving yards for the third consecutive year to become just the seventh pair of wide receivers in NFL history to accomplish that feat as teammates. The previous season, Thomas (1,304 yards) and Sanders (1,135) turned in a productive year despite the Broncos using multiple starting quarterbacks.

Tolbert coached the NFL's top wide receiver tandem in 2014, when Thomas (111 catches, franchise-record 1,619 yards, 11 touchdowns) and Sanders (101, 1,404, 9) combined for the most receptions (212) and receiving yards (3,023) by an NFL duo. Thomas earned his third Pro Bowl selection and joined Pro Football Hall of Famers Jerry Rice and Harrison as the only receivers in NFL history with three consecutive 1,400-yard, 10-touchdown seasons. Thomas' 2014 campaign included a team-record seven consecutive 100-yard receiving games and a 226-yard outing vs. Arizona in Week 5 that represented the highest single-game total in club history.

Sanders was named to his first Pro Bowl in 2014 after posting the fourth-most receiving yards (1,404) and fifth-most catches (101) in league history by a player in his first year with a new team.

In 2013, Tolbert coached a unit that produced three players with 10-plus touchdowns (Thomas — 14; Eric Decker — 11; Wes Welker — 10) along with two 1,000-yard performers (Thomas — 1,430; Decker — 1,288) as Denver scored 606 points, an NFL single-season record that still stands. Thomas, whose 14 receiving scores tied a franchise record, earned his second Pro Bowl honor. Thomas and Decker became just the second pair of teammates (Cris Carter/Randy Moss, Minnesota, 1998-99) to post 1,000 yards and 10 touchdowns each in consecutive seasons.

Tolbert's 2012 wide receiver group helped Denver's fifth-ranked passing offense score at least 30 points in a team-record 11 games. Third year wideouts Decker and Thomas became the youngest tandem in NFL history to record 1,000 yards and 10 touchdowns each in a season, while veteran Brandon Stokley became one of 10 players to post 40 receptions and five touchdowns after the age of 36.

Thomas and Decker emerged as solid targets under Tolbert's instruction in 2011, combining for 376 receptions for 1,163 yards (15.3-yard avg.) and 12 touchdowns in Denver's run-heavy offense led by quarterback Tim Tebow.

Tolbert coached in Buffalo in 2004, when wide receiver Lee Evans lead all NFL rookies with nine touchdown receptions and a 17.6-yard average per catch.

In Tolbert's only season with the Cardinals in 2003, Anquan Boldin earned Offensive Rookie of the Year honors and set an NFL-rookie record with 101 catches for 1,377 yards, the second most by a rookie in league history.

Tolbert's first professional coaching experience was

in the NFL’s Minority Internship Program with the Detroit Lions during training camp in 1997, and again in the Cardinals’ camp in 2001.

Tolbert began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Louisiana State in the spring of 1994 and Northeast Louisiana that fall. He coached wide receivers at Ohio in the spring of 1995, before returning that fall to Northeast Louisiana, where he tutored the team’s tight ends for three seasons.

After coaching tight ends at Auburn in 1998, Tolbert

spent the next three years (1999-2001) as the wide receivers coach/recruiting coordinator at Louisiana-Lafayette. He served as the tight ends coach/recruiting coordinator at Florida in 2002, before making the jump to the NFL the following season.

A wide receiver, Tolbert was a three-year letterman at LSU. The Conroe, Texas native graduated from LSU with bachelor’s and master’s degrees. Tolbert and his wife, Linda, have two daughters, Morgan and Madison.

MIKE TREIER

ASSISTANT DEFENSIVE BACKS

Mike Treier is in his second season with the Giants and his first as the team's assistant defensive backs coach. He will assist Jerome Henderson in coaching the secondary. In Treier's debut season with the Giants in 2020, he was the team's defensive quality control coach, his first NFL position.

The defensive staff coached one of the NFL's most improved units last season. The defense ranked ninth in the league by allowing 357 points, 94 fewer than their total in 2019.

The Giants were 12th in the league by allowing 349.3 yards-per-game after finishing 27th at 377.3 yards the previous season. It was their best defensive finish since 2016, when they were 10th in the league by allowing 339.7 yards a game. Giants opponents averaged just 5.3 yards a play, the NFL's ninth-lowest figure.

One year after placing 20th in the NFL, the rushing defense ranked 10th, allowing 111.4 yards a game. That was also their best figure since 2016 (when they were tied for third at 88.6 rushing yards a game). The pass defense jumped from 28th in the league in 2019 to a tie for 16th by giving up 237.9 yards game, the team's lowest figure since 2013, when the Giants allowed 223.3 yards a game through the air and were 10th in the league.

Treier joined the Giants from Marshall University, where he coached from 2017-19 in his second stint with the school.

In 2019, Treier was the safeties coach and recruiting

coordinator for a Thundering Herd team that finished 8-5, including 6-2 in Conference USA. In addition to his duties as safeties coach and recruiting coordinator, Treier was also heavily involved in Marshall's special teams, especially in the punt game where the Herd excelled during Treier's entire tenure.

Treier spent a second season as Marshall's cornerbacks coach in 2018, when the Herd was 9-4 overall and 6-2 in the conference and finished third in the league by allowing only 21.8 points a game. Marshall tied for fifth in the conference with 12 interceptions. Cornerback Chris Jackson was named second-team All-Conference USA and Steven Gilmore was selected to the league's all-freshman team.

Treier returned to Marshall as the cornerbacks coach in 2017. Jackson, then a sophomore, was chosen honorable mention all-conference after leading the team with three interceptions.

In 2016, Treier was named the secondary coach at UT-Martin. By the end of that season, he had been promoted to the SkyHawks' defensive coordinator position.

Treier first coached at Marshall in 2013-15, when he was a graduate assistant.

Treier was raised in Lancaster, Pa. and attend Penn Manor High School in Millersville, Pa. He has a bachelor's degree in business management from Temple University.

BEN WILKERSON

ASSISTANT OFFENSIVE LINE

Ben Wilkerson is in his seventh season as an NFL coach and fourth as the Giants' assistant offensive line coach.

In 2020, three offensive linemen - center Nick Gates, right guard Kevin Zeitler and right tackle Cam Fleming — were among the five Giants players to start all 16 games. It was the first season in which the Giants had three offensive linemen start every game since 2016, when center Weston Richburg, right guard John Jerry and left tackle Ereck Flowers started all 16 games.

Gates, a college tackle who played center in a game for the first time in the season opener, played in all 1,013 offensive snaps. He was the only player to participate in 100% of the team's plays.

The Giants were one of six teams to receive at least one start from each of their first five draft choices in 2020, and three of those players were offensive linemen — tackles Andrew Thomas (who started 15 games) and Matt Peart and guard Shane Lemieux (who started each of the final nine games).

The offensive line helped Daniel Jones have the most productive season by a rookie quarterback in Giants history in 2019. Jones set franchise rookie records with 459 passes, 284 completions, 3,027 yards and 24 touchdown passes. That final figure led all rookie quarterbacks in 2019 and were the fourth-most by a rookie in a single season in NFL history. Only Baker Mayfield (27 in 2018), Peyton Manning (26 in 1998) and Russell Wilson (26 in 2012) had more.

The offensive line was also pivotal in helping Saquon Barkley rush for 1,003 yards in 13 games to become the first player in Giants history to rush for at least 1,000 yards in each of his first two seasons.

In Wilkerson's first year with the team in 2018, the offensive line overcame injuries and effectively blended veterans and young players into a cohesive unit that helped Barkley break numerous records and win the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year award and Eli Manning complete 66.0% of his passes, the highest rate of his 15-season career.

The Giants utilized five different starting offensive line combinations in 2018, when Solder and Hernandez were the only linemen to start all 16 games. Hernandez was the Giants' first rookie offensive lineman to start every game since right tackle Justin Pugh in 2013.

Despite playing behind a group of players that frequently changed, Barkley led the NFL with 2,028 yards from scrimmage and rushed for a Giants rookie-record 1,307 yards. Eli Manning threw 21 touchdown passes against just 11 interceptions, his lowest total in 10 years.

Prior to joining the Giants, Wilkerson spent three

seasons as the Chicago Bears' assistant offensive line coach.

Wilkerson helped coach an offensive line that paved the way for Jordan Howard to rush for 2,435 yards and 15 touchdowns in the 2016-17 seasons. In 2017, the Bears ranked 11th in the NFL with a 4.2-yard average per carry.

In 2016, Howard gained 1,313 yards on the ground, the second-highest total in the NFL that season, and the most by a Bears rookie in franchise history. The Bears offense also ranked third in club single-season history in gross passing yards (4,139) and net passing yards (3,969), and second in passing first downs (212). In his second season, the Bears also saw improvement in yards per game (356.5), yards per play (5.9), rushing yards per play (4.57), passing yards per game (248.1) and sacks per pass attempt (5.01).

Prior to joining the Bears' coaching staff, Wilkerson had five years coaching experience at the collegiate and high school levels, as well as three years playing in the NFL.

In 2014, he taught physical education and was an assistant football and track coach for North Shore Senior High School in Houston.

Before his time at North Shore High, Wilkerson spent two seasons as the offensive line coach at Grambling State University (2012-13). He coached with the Pittsburgh Steelers during their 2012 training camp as a part of the Bill Walsh Minority Internship program.

Wilkerson began his coaching career at his alma mater, Louisiana State University, as an offensive graduate assistant in 2010, and then as an offensive administrative intern in 2011.

The Port Arthur, Texas native played in 32 games over three NFL seasons with the Cincinnati Bengals (2006) and Atlanta Falcons (2007-08) after entering the league as an undrafted free agent with the Bengals in 2005. He was also with the Florida Tuskers of the UFL (2009) before beginning his coaching career.

Wilkerson started 41 games at center for LSU over the course of four seasons (2001-04), as the Tigers compiled a 33-8 record during his career. As a senior, he was a co-recipient of the Rimington Trophy, awarded to the top center in college football. During his junior season, the Tigers captured the BCS National Championship as Wilkerson started all 14 games and was one of six finalists for the Rimington Trophy.

Wilkerson and his wife, Angi, have four children: daughters Brianna, Isabella and Jordan, and a son, Benjamin II.

OFFENSIVE QUALITY CONTROL

Nick Williams is in his second season with the Giants and his first as an offensive quality control coach. He was an offensive assistant in his first year as an NFL coach in 2020.

Prior to joining the Giants, Williams spent three seasons as the wide receivers coach at Southern Illinois University. He also served as the program's liaison with NFL teams.

In 2019, sophomore transfer Avante Cox, who caught six passes in two seasons at the University of Wyoming, led the 7-5 Salukis with 47 receptions, 617 yards and five touchdown catches. Cox was named second-team All-Missouri Valley Conference and to the league's all-newcomer team.

The previous season, SIU's offense featured one of the league's top wideouts in Raphael Leonard, who led the team with 57 catches for 847 yards and 7 TDs. After the season, he signed with the Jacksonville Jaguars.

In Williams' first season at Southern Illinois in 2017, his receiving corps scored 18 touchdowns, led by junior Darrell James, who had 47 catches for 773 yards and eight scores. James earned all-conference honors.

Williams began his coaching career a volunteer offensive analyst in 2012 under Nick Saban at the University of Alabama, his alma mater. He was responsible for wide receiver scrimmage production and organized and ran the scout team offense.

Williams spent the 2013 season as the offensive graduate assistant at Valdosta State.

He was the wide receivers coach at Jacksonville State from 2014-16, when the Gamecocks went 23-0 in the Ohio Valley Conference. In 2015, JSU spent 11 weeks at ranked No. 1 in the nation and lost the national championship game. Williams moved to SIU in 2017.

Williams' receiving corps at JSU set a school record with 3,102 receiving yards in 2015. Josh Barge was a first-team All-OVC wide receiver after hauling in 92 catches for 1,145 yards and 11 touchdowns, all school records.

Williams earned a spot on the Alabama football team as a walk-on and contributed as a wide receiver and on special teams. He helped the Crimson Tide win national championships in 2009, 2011 and 2012. Alabama was 49-5 and won two SEC titles during his playing career. Williams graduated from Alabama with a degree in business management.

Williams' father, Bobby Williams, is a longtime coach, who served as Alabama's tight ends and special teams coordinator when Nick played for the Crimson Tide. Giants running backs coach Burton Burns was also on staff during 2009-12 seasons. From 2000-02, Bobby Williams was head coach at Michigan State (succeeding Saban) and when he was the Miami Dolphins' running coach under Saban in 2005-06 he worked with Giants coaches Jason Garrett and Derek Dooley. Bobby Williams is currently the tight ends coach and special teams coordinator at the University of Oregon.

Jody Wright, a 17-year coaching veteran, is in his second year on the Giants' coaching staff and his first as the offensive assistant. He was the team's defensive assistant in his debut season with the team in 2020.

During Wright's season on the defensive staff, the unit was one of the most improved in the NFL.

The defense ranked ninth in the league by allowing 357 points, 94 fewer than their total in 2019. The Giants were 12th in the league by allowing 349.3 yards-per-game after finishing 27th at 377.3 yards the previous season. It was their best defensive finish since 2016, when they were 10th in the league by allowing 339.7 yards a game. Giants opponents averaged just 5.3 yards a play, the NFL's ninth-lowest figure.

Wright spent the 2019 season, his first in the NFL, as an offensive assistant working with the running backs for the Cleveland Browns under coach Freddie Kitchens, now the Giants' senior offensive assistant. That season, running back Nick Chubb finished second in the NFL with 1,494 rushing yards.

Before joining the Browns, Wright spent 14 years working on the collegiate level. He was the offensive line and assistant head coach at the University of Alabama at Birmingham in 2018, when the school won its first Conference USA championship and bowl game. Wright was also the running backs coach at UAB in 2014, when he helped guide Jordan Howard, who set numerous school records including the single season rushing

(1,587) and rushing touchdowns (13) marks.

Wright had two stints at the University of Alabama under Nick Saban. He was a graduate assistant/offensive analyst from 2010-12 and the director of player personnel from 2015-17. He was part of four national championship teams (2011, 2012, 2015 and 2017) and signed three consecutive No. 1 recruiting classes. Wright was the passing game coordinator/tight ends coach at Jacksonville State in 2013 and the graduate assistant/ coordinator of football operations at Mississippi State from 2005-09.

Wright graduated from Jacksonville State in 2004 and earned his master's degree from Mississippi State in 2009.

An Alabama native, Wright was a two-time all-state running back at Pickens Academy (Carrollton, Ala.) in high school, where he helped the school to three state titles. He signed with Jacksonville State as a running back before knee injuries cut short his career and he became a student assistant coach. His father, Lynn Wright, has won nine football state titles in Alabama and is a member of the Alabama Independent School Association (AISA) and the University of West Alabama Halls of Fame. His brothers are both successful head football coaches in Alabama. Josh is the coach at Tuscaloosa Academy and Jonathan is the coach at Bessemer Academy.

Wright is married to the former Meredith Hocutt of Tuscaloosa. They have a son Thomas (4) and daughters Wellesley (2) and Landon, who was born in April.

VICE PRESIDENT OF FOOTBALL OPERATIONS &
ASSISTANT GENERAL MANAGER

Kevin Abrams is in his 23rd season with the Giants and his fourth as the team's Vice President of Football Operations. He has also been the team's Assistant General Manager for 20 years. Abrams was previously the Giants' salary cap analyst for three years.

Abrams works with the college scouting and pro personnel departments to evaluate players, is responsible for strategic planning related to football operations, compliance with the NFL's Collective Bargaining Agreement, Data & Innovation, managing the salary cap and negotiating player contracts.

In July of 1999, Abrams was hired to fill the newly created position of salary cap analyst. He came to the Giants from the NFL Management Council, where he helped to monitor the league-wide salary cap and analyzed all new player contracts with respect to the

Collective Bargaining Agreement. Prior to working at the Management Council, Abrams completed internships and graduate work in player personnel, recruiting, public relations and corporate relations with the Washington Football Team, the Ohio University football program, the Buffalo Bills and the London Monarchs.

Abrams was raised in Toronto, Canada. He completed his undergraduate degree at the University of Western Ontario and earned his master's degree in sports administration from Ohio University.

MARK KONCZ

CO-DIRECTOR OF PLAYER PERSONNEL

Mark Koncz is in his fourth season in the Giants' personnel department and first as Co-Director of Player Personnel. Koncz joined the Giants as a personnel consultant prior to the 2018 NFL Draft.

In his current role, Koncz evaluates both pro and college players while working closely with general manager Dave Gettleman and vice president of football operations and assistant general manager Kevin Abrams on all personnel decisions and strategic planning.

Koncz was a member of the Carolina Panthers' organization from 1994-2017, and he was their director of pro scouting from 2000-17. He worked under Giants general manager Dave Gettleman, who held the same position with the Panthers for the four seasons prior to the 2017 season.

Koncz and his pro scouting staff helped the Panthers win three consecutive NFC South titles from 2013-15, and the 2015 conference championship and a berth in Super Bowl 50. He and his department evaluated NFL, Canadian and Arena League players in preparation of filling roster needs both in and out of season. When an injury created a need during the season, it was their responsibility to be ready with a list of recommended

players to fill that need. Koncz and his staff also recommended veteran players to sign as unrestricted free agents and reserve futures when the roster size increased to 90 players at the end of the season. The pro scouting department helped the Panthers coaches during the season by providing in-depth scouting reports for the Panthers' upcoming opponents.

Koncz began his Carolina career as an intern in the ticket office in 1994 and moved to football operations the following year. In October 1995, he was promoted to the manager of football operations, overseeing the team's travel, budgets, and day-to-day activities of the team.

Koncz moved to the pro scouting department in 1998 and was named the director of pro scouting two years later.

Koncz attended Barrington High School in Illinois and was a 1990 graduate of the University of Kansas, where he was a three-year letterman and a three-year starter for the Jayhawks, serving as team captain his senior year. CO-DIRECTOR OF PLAYER PERSONNEL

Tim McDonnell is in his first season as the Giants' Co-Director of Player Personnel, having previously serving as the Assistant Director of Player Personnel for two seasons. Prior to that, he spent six years as a Pro Scout for the Giants.

In his current role, McDonnell evaluates both pro and college players while working closely with general manager Dave Gettleman and vice president of football operations and assistant general manager Kevin Abrams on all personnel decisions and strategic planning.

Before joining the Giants, McDonnell worked for eight years in the Notre Dame football program in a variety of roles, the last six as the director of player personnel/director of football personnel, a role in which he organized and administered the Irish recruiting efforts. McDonnell also served as a liaison between the Irish and NFL personnel, helped coordinate the walk-on program, and assisted in managing the roster under coaches Charlie Weis & Brian Kelly.

McDonnell is a 2005 graduate of the College of the Holy Cross in Worcester, Mass., and a three-year football letterman as a receiver. He was the inaugural recipient of the Daniel Allen Sportsmanship Award in 2005, presented to the Holy Cross varsity athlete who best exemplifies the qualities of sportsmanship that coach Daniel Allen exhibited throughout his life. He also received the 2004 Unsung Hero Award as the player who supported the team spiritually, emotionally and physically for the good of the team.

A native of Harrison, N.Y., McDonnell graduated from Iona Prep before starting his collegiate career at Holy Cross. McDonnell is the grandson of Wellington Mara, the Giants' late and much-loved former president and a Pro Football Hall of Famer, and the late Ann Mara.

McDonnell is married to the former Marisa Meister. The couple has four young sons, Jack, Conor, Timothy and Wellington ("Wells").


CHRIS PETTIT
DIRECTOR OF COLLEGE SCOUTING

Chris Pettit is in his fourth season as the Giants' director of college scouting. Prior to being named to that position in 2018, he was an area scout for 13 years.

The Giants acquired several outstanding players in the four NFL drafts since Pettit assumed his current position. Running back Saquon Barkley, the team's first-round choice in 2018, set numerous franchise records, was the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year and is the only player in Giants history to rush for more than 1,000 yards in each of his first two seasons. In 2019, the Giants selected quarterback Daniel Jones sixth overall. Jones' two-year totals are 907 attempts, 564 completions (62.2%) for 5,970 yards, 35 touchdowns and 22 interceptions. The passes, completions and yardage totals are the most in franchise history through 27 games for a player who began his career with the Giants.

The Giants also had 10 selections in the 2020 draft and were one of six teams to receive at least one start from each of their first five draft choices. Andrew Thomas was selected fourth overall and Xavier McKinney was taken in the second round, the first tackle and safety, respectively, to be chosen. Thomas played in every game, starting 15, and joins fellow 2020 rookies Matt Peart and Shane Lemieux to form the nucleus of the Giants revamped offensive line. McKinney and fellow defensive back Darnay Holmes also started.

In 2021, the Giants added an impressive six-man draft class and three extra selections in the first four rounds of the 2022 draft, including the Chicago Bears' first-round selection.

Pettit joined the Giants' scouting staff in 2005 after spending the 2004 season as a scouting intern for the team. He first worked for the Giants as a training camp pro personnel intern from 1998-2000.

Prior to joining the Giants, Pettit was the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Huntington High School on Long Island, which won division championships in 2001 and 2003, and was the runner up in the Long Island championship in 2003.

Pettit spent the 2002 football season as an offensive assistant coach at the University of Wisconsin, where he worked with the running backs and assisted in the preparation of scouting reports for upcoming opponents, as well as recruiting. Wisconsin defeated Colorado in the 2002 Alamo Bowl.

Pettit attended the University of Maryland on a lacrosse scholarship. He played on teams that reached the national finals in 1997 and 1998. Pettit graduated from Maryland with a bachelor's degree in sports management.

Pettit is a native of Long Island, N.Y. He and his wife Jill have two children, Chris and Jessa.


STEVEN PRICE
PRO PERSONNEL MANAGER

Steven Price, who has 16 years of NFL experience, is in his first season as the Giants' pro personnel manager. Price will oversee the evaluations of Giants' opponents and NFL players including free agents.

Price was a pro scout with the Houston Texans the previous three seasons. Prior to joining the Texans, he spent eight seasons with the Minnesota Vikings personnel department. Price worked as a college area scout in 2017, when he evaluated draft eligible prospects in the northeast region. From 2012-16, Price served as a BLESTO scout covering the Midwest region. He originally joined the Vikings as a personnel intern for the 2010 and 2011 seasons.

Price began his NFL career when he worked in the Carolina Panthers' equipment room from 2002-05. In

2007, he interned in the Panthers public relations department. Price joined the Vikings for the 2008 season as an operations intern before attending graduate school. With the Vikings, Price assisted the player development department aiding rookies in their transition to the NFL and preparing players for life after football.

MATT SHAUGER

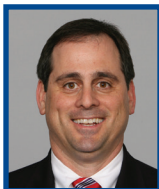
SENIOR PRO SCOUT/FOOTBALL SYSTEMS ANALYST

Sternfeld has participated in five Super Bowls, and in all of them he either worked for the Patriots or played against them. The first was Super Bowl XX, when the Patriots played Chicago. Sternfeld was also a member of the Patriots' organization when they played in Super Bowl XXXI in January 1997 and won Super Bowl XXXVI five years later. Sternfeld has participated in two Super Bowls with the Giants, winning the championship in 2007 and 2011.

Sternfeld joined the Patriots as an intern in 1981. The following year, he began a two-year stint as an administrative aide. In 1984, Sternfeld was named the Patriots' ticket office manager, a post he held for three years.

In 1987, he joined the scouting department for five years before returning to the ticket office, where, during his second tenure, franchise tickets sales reached record highs.

Sternfeld returned to the scouting department in January of 1995 and remained there for the rest of his tenure in New England.

Sternfeld is a native of Long Island. He attended Locust Valley (N.Y.) High School before earning a business degree at Northeastern University. Sternfeld and his wife Anne have two children, Anna and Tim.

GIANTS NOTES:

- Barkley rushed for 1,307 yards as a rookie and 1,003 yards in 2019 to become the first player in Giants history to rush for at least 1,000 yards in each of his first 2 seasons.
- On Dec. 22, 2019, Barkley set a franchise record with 279 yards from scrimmage (189 rushing and 90 receiving) in an overtime victory at Washington...The previous record of 276 yards was set by Tiki Barber vs. Philadelphia on Dec. 28, 2002. Barber rushed for 203 yards and added 73 receiving yards...Barkley's 279 yards was the highest total by any NFL player in 2019.
- Barkley, Carolina's Christian McCaffrey and New Orleans' Alvin Kamara were the only NFL players who totaled more than 1,000 rushing and 1,000 receiving yards in 2018-19.
- In 2018, Barkley had the greatest rookie season in Giants history, one that was capped when he was named the Offensive Rookie of the Year, matching the achievement of wide receiver Odell Beckham, Jr. in 2014. Barkley and Beckham are the only 2 Giants to win the award in its 58-year history. Beckham was the franchise's first Rookie of the Year since Hall of Fame linebacker Lawrence Taylor won the defensive award in 1981.
- Barkley also received 2 significant though unofficial honors. He was named the Pepsi NFL Rookie of the Year, an award that is determined by a fan vote on NFL.com. In addition, he received the FedEx Ground NFL Player of the Year award. The other finalists were Dallas' Ezekiel Elliott and Todd Gurley. Kansas City quarterback Patrick Mahomes was named FedEx Air NFL Player of the Year. The FedEx Air & Ground NFL Players of the Year awards are a culmination of weekly awards presented by FedEx throughout the NFL season.
- Barkley was the first Giants running back chosen for the Pro Bowl since Tiki Barber made the last of his three consecutive appearances in 2006. He was the first Giants rookie to go to the game since Beckham in 2014, and the team's first rookie running back to be so honored since Tucker Frederickson in 1965. Frederickson was the top overall selection in that year's draft. Running back Ron Johnson was a Pro Bowler in his first season with the team in 1970, but he was acquired in a trade after spending his rookie year with the Cleveland Browns.
- Barkley set Giants rookie records with 1,307 rushing yards, 91 receptions (tying the mark Beckham set in 2014), and 15 total touchdowns (11 rushing, 4 receiving).
- Barkley was the first rookie to lead the Giants in

rushing since Andre Williams in 2014 (with 721 yards) and the first to lead the club in receptions since Beckham that same season.

- Barkley was the first running back to lead the Giants in catches since Barber did with 69 in 2003, and the first player to lead the team in rushing and receiving in the same season since Barber in 2003 (1,216 rushing yards, 69 catches).
- Barkley finished 2nd in the NFL in rushing yardage, 127 yards behind Elliott (1,434 yards). The 2nd-place finish was the highest by a Giants player since Barber was 2nd in 2005 with a team-record 1,860 yards – 20 yards behind NFL Most Valuable Player Shaun Alexander of Seattle.
- Barkley's 91 receptions were a record for an NFL rookie running back. The former record of 88 was set by New Orleans' Reggie Bush in 2006.
- The 91 catches easily surpassed the previous Giants running back record, Barber's 72 catches in 2001... Barkley needed only 6 games to break the former franchise record for receptions by a rookie running back, which had been 37 by Bobby Duhan in 1968.
- Barkley set a Giants record with 14 receptions (for 80 yards) at Dallas (9/16). The previous record of 13 was set by Barber, also in Dallas (on Jan. 2, 2000). Barkley's 14 catches were tied for the 3rd-highest total ever by an NFL running back.
- Barkley's 14 receptions tied the NFL rookie record, regardless of position, set by Philadelphia receiver Don Looney against Washington on Dec. 1, 1940, and tied by Washington running back Roy Helu, Jr. vs. Carolina on Nov. 6, 2011.
- Barkley led the NFL with a Giants rookie-record 2,028 yards from scrimmage, 27 more than Elliott. They were the only two players in the league with at least 2,000 scrimmage yards. Barkley was the first Giants player to lead the NFL in yards from scrimmage since Barber did in 2005 with a franchise-record 2,390 (1,860 rushing/530 receiving).
- Barkley broke the franchise rookie record for yards from scrimmage that had been held by Beckham, who had 1,340 yards in 2014.
- Barkley's 15 total touchdowns broke the former Giants rookie record of 12 that had been shared by Bill Paschal (1943) and Beckham (2014). It was the 6th time in Giants history a player scored at least 15 touchdowns in a season: Joe Morris (21 in 1985, 15 in 1986), Gene "Choo-Choo" Roberts (17 on 1949), Barber (15 in 2004), and Brandon Jacobs (15 in 2008).
- Barkley's 11 rushing touchdowns were also a Giants rookie record. The former mark of 10 had been held by Paschal since 1943.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS:

- In 3 seasons, Barkley has started all 31 games in which he played... Totals include 2,344 rushing yards on 497 carries (4.7-yard avg.) and 17 touchdowns, plus 149 receptions for 1,219 yards (8.2-yard avg.) and 6 scores.
- Barkley's 2,344 rushing yards are the 3rd-highest total in a player's first 3 seasons in Giants history, behind Rodney Hampton (2,655) and Eddie Price (2,422). His 3,563 yards from scrimmage are 2nd behind Beckham. (4,169).
- Barkley is the 20th player to run for at least 2,000 yards in a Giants uniform.
- Barkley and Beckham are the only players Giants history to exceed 1,000 scrimmage yards in each of their first 2 seasons.
- Barkley reached 2,500 scrimmage yards in his 21st career game, tying former Giants running back Ottis Anderson (21 games) and Billy Simms (21) for the 4th-fewest games to reach 2,500 career yards in NFL history. Through 25 career games, Barkley had registered at least 100 scrimmage yards in 17 games, tying Sims for the 4th-most such games by a player in his first 25 career games in league annals.
- Barkley has rushed for at least 100 yards in 11 games, tying him with Eddie Price for 6th in franchise history, behind Tiki Barber (38), Joe Morris (19), Rodney Hampton (17), Brandon Jacobs (13) and Ahmad Bradshaw (12). The Giants are 5-6 when Barkley rushes for at least 100 yards.
- Barkley had at least 1 reception in each of his first 30 games, a record for a Giants' running back to start a career. The streak ended when he did not have a reception at Chicago (9/20). Ron Johnson had the previous record with 26 games (1970-72).
- Barkley's 4 rushing touchdowns of at least 65 yards were the most in the NFL in 2018-19. Tennessee's Derrick Henry was 2nd with 3... In that same span, Barkley had 9 runs of at least 50 yards, 4 more than anyone else.
- In 2020, Barkley played and started in only the season's first 2 games... He suffered a torn right ACL and meniscus on the first play of the 2nd quarter in Chicago on Sept. 20 and missed the remainder of the season... He had 19 carries for 34 yards and 6 receptions for 60 yards... Elected one of the Giants' team captains.
- Because of his injury, Barkley ended the season with 497 career carries. If he had 3 more attempts, his 4.71-yard average would have tied Tiki Barber for the Giants' career record.
- Barkley had 15 carries for 6 yards and 6 receptions for 60 yards in the season opener vs. Pittsburgh (9/14)... It was his 2nd-lowest rushing total in a full game (he ran for one yard at the Jets on Nov. 10, 2019)... His 6 catches tied Darius Slayton and Sterling Shepard for the team lead.
- Although he participated in just 8 offensive plays, Barkley led the Giants with 28 rushing yards on 4 carries at the Bears... He did not catch a pass, ending at 30 his Giants-record streak for the most consecutive games with a reception by a running back to start a career in a Giants uniform.
- In 2019, Barkley started all 13 games in which he played. He missed 3 games – the first absences of his career – because of a sprained ankle he suffered at Tampa Bay (9/22). Barkley did not play vs. Washington (9/29), Minnesota (10/6) and at New England (10/10)... Finished the season with team-leading figures of 217 carries for 1,003 yards and 6 touchdowns. Coupled with his 1,307 yards in his debut season, Barkley was the first

Giants back with consecutive 1,000-yard seasons since Jacobs in 2007-08.

- Barkley's 1,000-yard season was the 25th in Giants history.
- Barkley was 2nd on the team with 52 receptions, for 438 yards and 2 touchdowns.
- Barkley rushed for more than 100 yards in 4 games – at Dallas (9/8), vs. Buffalo (9/15), vs. Miami (12/15) and at Washington (9/22). That increased to 11 his number of 100-yard games, tying him with Eddie Price for 6th on the franchise's all-time list.
- Barkley opened the season by rushing for 120 rushing yards on 11 carries and catching 4 passes for 19 yards at Dallas. Barkley's first run of the season gained 59 yards, which was the longest first carry in any season by a Giants player since the 1970 merger. It was also the longest first rushing attempt of a season by any player since Pittsburgh wide receiver Darrius Heyward-Bey's 60-yarder at Miami on Oct. 16, 2016 (his only rushing attempt of the season) and the longest by a running back since Oakland's Jalen Richard ran for 75 yards at New Orleans on Sept. 11, 2016.
- Rushed for 107 yards on 18 carries, including a 27-yard touchdown on the game's first series, and caught 3 passes for 28 yards vs. Buffalo (9/15)... Became the 3rd player in Giants history to begin a season with two 100-yard rushing games, joining Price in 1952 and Rob Carpenter in 1983.
- It was Barkley's 18th career game and he set several milestones. Barkley rushed for at least 100 yards for the 9th time in those 18 games. The previous high total for 100-yard performances in the first 18 games by a Giants back was 5 by Price in 1950-51. The previous NFL player to rush for 100 or more yards in at least 9 of his first 18 games was Denver's Clinton Portis in 2002-03. Portis had 10 such games... Barkley also had 15 games with at least 100 yards from scrimmage, tying him with Pro Football Hall of Famer Eric Dickerson for the most such performances in the first 18 games in a career. Prior to Barkley, the highest total by a Giants player in his first 18 games with the team was 10 by Ron Johnson from 1970-72... Barkley reached career totals of 1,500 rushing yards and 500 receiving yards in his 18th game to join Pro Football Hall of Famer Edgerrin James as the only players in history to reach both of those marks that quickly.
- Barkley rushed for a then career-low 10 yards on 8 carries and caught 4 passes for 27 yards at Tampa Bay before leaving the game late in the first half with a sprained right ankle. His foot got caught under safety Mike Edwards after a 6-yard reception. Barkley missed the next 3 games.
- In his return to action, Barkley ran for 72 yards on 18 carries, including a 7-yard touchdown, and caught 3 passes for 8 yards vs. Arizona (10/20)... Totaled 143 scrimmage yards at Detroit (10/27) with 64 rushing yards and a season-high 8 receptions for 79 yards, including a 4-yarder for the Giants' final touchdown... Rushed for 28 yards and caught a season-long 65-yard pass vs. Dallas (11/4).
- Finished with season-high totals of 24 carries and 2 touchdowns vs. Miami (12/15), when he rushed for 112 yards and scored on runs of 1 and 10 yards... Also caught 4 passes for 31 yards to gain 143 yards from scrimmage, tying his 2nd-highest total of the season.
- Barkley set a franchise record with 279 yards from scrimmage (189 rushing and 90 receiving) in an overtime victory at Washington (12/22). The previous record of 276 yards was set by Barber vs. Philadelphia on Dec. 28,

2002. Barber rushed for 203 yards and added 73 receiving yards... Barkley's 279 yards was the highest total by any NFL player in 2019.

- Barkley is tied for 3rd on the Giants' single-game total yardage list. David Wilson is first with 327 yards (227 kickoff returns, 100 rushing) vs. New Orleans on Dec. 9, 2012. Domenik Hixon gained 303 yards (230 kickoff returns, 51 punt returns, 22 receiving) at New Orleans on Oct. 18, 2009. Barkley is tied with Joe Scott, who totaled 279 yards (22 rushing, 35 receiving, 207 kickoff returns, 15 after receiving a lateral) vs. the Los Angeles Rams on Nov. 14, 1948.

- Barkley's 189 rushing yards were a career high. He had 22 carries, the longest a 67-yard touchdown run. He set his previous best in his only other game in Washington; on Dec. 9, 2018, he ran for 170 yards, including a 78-yard touchdown.

- Barkley rushed for 359 yards in 2 games in Washington. That is the highest total by an NFL player in his first 2 road games vs. an opponent since Pro Football Hall of Famer Eric Dickerson ran for 401 yards for the Rams vs. the Cardinals (1984-86).

- Barkley's 189 yards was the highest total by a Giants running back since Oct. 7, 2012, when Bradshaw ran for 200 yards in a victory vs. Cleveland.

- Barkley had 108 rushing yards on his 4th carry. That was the fewest attempts a Giants back needed to reach 100 yards since Dec. 31, 2005, when Barber did it in 3 carries at Oakland. One of those runs was a team-record 95-yarder. Barkley's previous low number of carries to reach 100 yards was 8, which he did on Dec. 9, 2018 at Washington.

- In Washington, Barkley also caught 4 passes for a season-high 90 yards, including a 51-yarder and a 33-yard touchdown. He was the 2nd Giants player in 2019 to score rushing and receiving touchdowns in the same game and both players did it vs. Washington. On Sept. 29, Wayne Gallman, Jr. scored on a 6-yard catch and a 1-yard run. It was the 3rd time Barkley scored rushing and receiving touchdowns in the same game.

- The game in Washington was the 2nd in which Barkley had rushing and receiving gains of 50+ yards in the same game. On Oct. 11, 2018, he had a 67-yard run and a 51-yard catch vs. Philadelphia.

- Barkley was the 5th player with at least 275 scrimmage yards and both a rushing and receiving touchdown in a single game since 1970, joining Priest Holmes (Week 13, 2001 and Week 12, 2002), Chris Johnson (Week 2, 2009), Herschel Walker (Week 15, 1986) and Delvin Williams (Week 9, 1976).

- Barkley also joined Billy Cannon (Dec. 10, 1961), Williams (Nov. 7, 1976) and Holmes (Nov. 24, 2002) as the only players in NFL history with at least 175 rushing yards, 90 receiving yards and 2 touchdowns in a game.

- While Barkley was setting the franchise record with 279 yards from scrimmage, Daniel Jones threw for 352 yards and 5 touchdowns. The Giants were the first team in NFL history to have a player with 275+ scrimmage yards and a player with 5 touchdown passes in the same game.

- In the season finale vs. Philadelphia (12/29), Barkley rushed for 92 yards on 17 carries, including a 68-yard touchdown, and caught 3 passes for 25 yards for 117 scrimmage yards.

- With his 67 and 68-yard touchdown runs, Barkley became the first Giants player with touchdown runs of at least 65 yards in consecutive games... Barkley's 68-yard run was the Giants' longest of the season. The previous

long was his 67-yarder one week earlier.

- Barkley's 68-yard touchdown run was the 3rd-longest score of his career. He scored on the 78-run vs. the Redskins in FedEx on Dec. 9, 2018 and on a 68-yard run in his first NFL game, vs. Jacksonville on Sept. 9, 2018.

- Barkley's 117 yards vs. Philadelphia was his 3rd consecutive game, 7th of the season and the 20th game in his career with at least 100 scrimmage yards, which tied him with Clinton Portis for the 4th-most of any player in his first 2 seasons. Pro Football Hall of Famers Edgerrin James and Dickerson had 27 and 26, respectively, and Billy Sims had 21.

- As a rookie in 2018, Barkley started all 16 games. He was the first rookie running back in Giants history to start every game, the first running back to do so since Rashad Jennings in 2015, the first rookie since Sterling Shepard in 2016, and the first Giants first-round draft choice to start each game since right tackle Justin Pugh in 2013.

- Second-round draft choice Will Hernandez also started all 16 games, at left guard. It was just the 2nd time since the 1970 merger that the Giants had multiple rookies start every game; in 1981, linebacker Lawrence Taylor (first round) and nose tackle Bill Neill (5th round) were the starters.

- Barkley finished the season with 261 rushing attempts for 1,307 yards (5.0-yard avg.) and 11 touchdowns, and 91 catches for 721 yards (7.9-yard avg.) and 4 scores. All but the receiving touchdowns were team-high totals.

- Barkley's 1,307 rushing yards was the 7th-highest total in Giants history... He was the Giants' first 1,000-yard rusher since Bradshaw ran for 1,015 yards in 2012.

- Barkley and Denver's Phillip Lindsay (1,037 yards) were the 57th and 58th rookies to rush for at least 1,000 yards since the NFL went to a 16-game season in 1978... Barkley's 1,000-yard season was the Giants' first since Bradshaw's in 2012.

- Barkley's 1,307 yards were 477 more than the No. 2 rookie on the franchise's list — Tuffy Leemans' previous record of 830 yards, set in 1936.

- Barkley was the 3rd consecutive running back chosen within the top 5 draft selections to rush for more than 1,000 yards in his rookie season. Elliott (4th overall in 2016) ran for 1,631 yards in his debut season, and Jacksonville's Leonard Fournette (4th overall in 2017) ran for 1,040 yards.

- Barkley rushed for more than 100 yards 7 times, a Giants rookie record. Before the 2018 season, Eddie Price had held the mark since 1950, when he hit the century mark 3 times... Barkley was the first Giants back with seven 100-yard games in a season since Barber had 8 in 2006.

- In his NFL debut vs. Jacksonville (9/9), Barkley had 18 carries for 106 yards, including a 68-yard touchdown run in the 4th quarter, plus 2 receptions for 22 yards. He was the first Giants back to run for at least 100 yards in his NFL debut. His 68-yard run was the longest by a Giants player in his first game. And it was the longest run by a player in his NFL debut since Sept. 11, 2016, when Oakland's Jalen Richards scored on a 75-yarder at New Orleans.

- Barkley was the first Giants rookie running back to start a season-opening game since Sean Bennett in 1999 (excluding fullback Shane Smith in 2017; Smith had no rushing attempts that season).

- The following week, Barkley caught a Giants-record 14 passes, for 80 yards, at Dallas (9/16)... Barber held the previous mark with 13 receptions on Jan. 2, 2000, also in a

road game vs. the Cowboys. In his first three career games, Barkley ran for 28 yards on 11 carries in the game.

- In Week 3, Barkley rushed for 82 yards on 17 attempts, including a 15-yard touchdown, and caught 5 passes for 35 yards... His 21 receptions are a record for a Giants rookie in his first 3 games and his 27 catches in his first 4 games broke Sterling Shepard's record of 20, set in 2016.

- When he ran for 130 yards vs. Philadelphia (10/11), Barkley became just the 2nd Giants rookie running back in the Super Bowl era to rush for at least 100 yards vs. the Eagles. Barber ran for 114 yards in Philadelphia on Dec. 7, 1997.

- Barkley rushed for 142 yards vs. Tampa Bay (11/18) and 101 at Philadelphia (11/25) to become the 2nd Giants rookie in history with back-to-back 100-yard rushing games. The first was Price, who ran for 156 yards vs. the New York Yanks on Dec. 3, 1950, and 103 yards 7 days later at Philadelphia.

- Barkley extended his streak of 100-yard games to a Giants rookie record 4 with 125 vs. Chicago (12/2) and a season-high 170 at Washington (12/9). He was the first Giants back with 4 consecutive 100-yard rushing games since Barber had 5 in a row from Nov. 20-Dec. 17, 2005.

- Barkley's 170 rushing yards at Washington was the 2nd-highest total by a rookie in Giants history. Bill Paschal ran for 188 yards vs. Washington on Dec. 5, 1943. Barkley also has the 6th (142 vs. Tampa Bay), 8th (130 vs. Philadelphia), and 9th (125 vs. Chicago) biggest rushing games by a Giants rookie... Barkley has 7 of the top 12 single-game rookie rushing totals in Giants history.

- Barkley's 170 rushing yards in Washington was the highest by a Giants player since Jennings ran for 170 yards on Jan. 3, 2016, in a loss to Philadelphia.

- In that 40-16 victory in Washington, Barkley rushed for 170 yards on 14 carries, a 12.1-yard average that was the 4th-highest in a game in Giants history — and the largest in a road game (minimum 10 attempts):

- 14.33 - Derrick Ward, vs. Carolina, Dec. 21, 2008 (15-215)
- 13.30 - Frank Reagan, vs. Rams, Dec. 1, 1946 (10-133)
- 12.23 - Tuffy Leemans, vs. Green Bay, Nov. 20, 1938 (13-159)
- 12.14 - **Saquon Barkley, at Washington, Dec. 9, 2018 (14-170)**

- In Washington, Barkley scored on a 78-yard run that was the 2nd-longest by a rookie in Giants history; Bradshaw ran for an 88-yard touchdown at Buffalo on Dec. 23, 2007. Barkley's 78-yard run was the Giants' longest since Bradshaw's 88-yarder. It is tied for the 4th-longest touchdown run and 7th-longest run overall in Giants history with Barber's 78-yard score vs. Arizona on Dec. 3, 2000.

- Barkley also had a 52-yard run to set up another Giants touchdown in Washington. He was the first Giants back with 2 runs of 50 or more yards in one game since Barber on Dec. 30, 2006 — also in a victory in FedExField. In his final career regular-season game, Barber scored touchdowns on runs of 55 and 50 yards.

- Barkley had seven 40+ yard runs and six 50+ yard runs to lead the NFL in each category. The six 50-yard runs were the highest single-season total by a Giants player since the 1970 merger and were twice as many as any other NFL player had in 2018; Isaiah Crowell of the Jets was 2nd with 3.

- Barkley's 91 receptions tied Beckham's Giants rookie record, were the highest total ever by a Giants player other than a wide receiver, and was tied for the 4th-

highest total in franchise history:

- 107 Steve Smith (2009)
- 101 Odell Beckham, Jr. (2016)
- 96 Odell Beckham, Jr. (2015)
- 91 **Saquon Barkley (2018)**
- 91 Odell Beckham, Jr. (2014)

- Barkley's 91 receptions placed him 2nd among NFL running backs. Carolina's Christian McCaffrey set a league record for running backs with 107 catches.

- From Oct. 11-28, Barkley had 9 receptions vs. Philadelphia, Atlanta and Washington to become the first player in Giants history with at least 9 catches in each of 3 consecutive games. He was the first NFL running back to accomplish the feat since St. Louis' Steven Jackson in 2006.

- Barkley's 721 receiving yards were a record for a Giants rookie running back. David Meggett held the former mark with 531 yards in 1989... The 721 receiving yards are the 7th-highest total ever by a Giants rookie, and just 1 yard less than the team's 2017 first-round draft choice, tight end Evan Engram, had in his debut season:

- Barkley had a 50-yard run and a 55-yard reception vs. Philadelphia (10/11) to become the first Giants player with a run and a catch of 50+ yards in the same game since Oct. 10, 2004, when Barber had a 58-yard run and a 55-yard reception in a victory in Dallas.

- In that game vs. the Eagles, Barkley almost became the first Giants player in history with 100 yards rushing and receiving in the same game. He had 130 and 99.

- Barkley had receptions of 57 (a touchdown thrown by Beckham at Carolina) and 55 (from Manning vs. Philadelphia) yards. He was the first Giants running back with 2 catches of 55+ yards in a season since Barber in 2004, and the first Giants rookie back to do it since Meggett in 1989.

- Barkley's 2,028 yards from scrimmage was the 4th 2,000-yard season in Giants history and the most by Giants players since Barber had 2,127 (1,662 rushing/465 receiving) in 2006, his final season.

- Barkley was the 3rd rookie in NFL history with 2,000 yards from scrimmage:

- Barkley finished with a season-high 229 yards from scrimmage vs. Philadelphia, which was then the 7th-highest total in Giants history.

- Barkley was the 2nd player in NFL history to begin a career with at least 6 consecutive games with 100 or more scrimmage yards. The only other player to accomplish the feat was Kareem Hunt, whose streaks were 7 games and 885 yards.

- Barkley had another streak of 6 consecutive 100-yard games later in the season. He is one of 7 rookies in NFL history with 6 consecutive games with at least 100 scrimmage yards, joining Eric Dickerson, L.A. Rams (1983-10 games), Edgerrin James, Indianapolis (1999-9 games), Kareem Hunt, Kansas City (2017-7 games), Kevin Jones, Detroit (2004-7 games), Jamal Lewis, Baltimore (2000-7 games), and Clark Gaines, Jets (1976-7 games).
- Barkley was the first NFL rookie with at least 1,200 rushing yards and 600 receiving yards since Detroit's Billy Sims in 1980.
- Barkley exceeded 100 yards from scrimmage in 13 games, tying Dickerson's NFL rookie record. James had 12 such games.
- Barkley was also the 5th rookie with at least 1,900 scrimmage yards and 15 touchdowns in a single season in NFL history:

- In 2018, Barkley accounted for 33.5% of the Giants' rushing and receiving yards, the 2nd-highest total by any NFL player:

- With 11 scores on the ground, Barkley was the first Giants back with double-digit rushing touchdowns since Brandon Jacobs in 2008.
- Barkley had 5 touchdowns from scrimmage of 50 or more yards, the most ever by a Giants rookie and the most by any Giants player since Beckham had 5 in 2015. Barkley was the first NFL rookie with five 50+ yard touchdowns from scrimmage since Minnesota wide receiver Randy Moss in 1998. Only Billy Howton of the 1952 Green Bay Packers had more such touchdowns as a rookie (6).
- In the Giants' games vs. Tampa Bay (11/18) and at Philadelphia (11/25), Barkley scored both rushing and receiving touchdowns (on 5 and 2-yard runs and a 6-yard catch vs. the Buccaneers, and a 51-yard run and 13-yard catch vs. the Eagles). He was the first Giants player to score on both a run and a reception in back-to-back games since Elvin (Kink) Richards on Dec. 3 and 10, 1933 vs. Pittsburgh and at Philadelphia. Before Barkley, the last Giants player to have multiple games with running and receiving touchdowns in the same season was Ron Johnson in 1973.
- Barkley is one of 4 rookies in NFL history to hit that double in consecutive games. He was one of 2 rookies to

accomplish the feat in November 2018 and one of 2 players to do it in a Giants uniform. Cleveland's Nick Chubb scored rushing and receiving touchdowns in Weeks 12 and 13. Richards of the 1933 Giants and Rodney Culver of the 1992 Indianapolis Colts are the only other rookies to score a rushing and receiving touchdown in consecutive games.

- In the victory vs. Tampa Bay, Barkley was the first Giants running back to score 3 touchdowns in a game since David Wilson vs. New Orleans on Dec. 9, 2012 — but one of Wilson's scores was on a kickoff return (and 2 runs). Before Barkley, the last Giants back to score 3 touchdowns from scrimmage had been Bradshaw, who had 3 one yard runs vs. Buffalo on Oct. 16, 2011.
- The last Giants back to score on a run and reception in the same game had been Bradshaw, who scored touchdowns on a 5-yard run and 10-yard catch against Dallas on Jan. 1, 2012.
- Barkley was the first Giants back with 2 rushing touchdowns in a game since Rashad Jennings at Jacksonville on Nov. 20, 2014 (runs of 2 and 17 yards).

COLLEGE:

- Barkley played in 38 games with 32 starts at Penn State...Finished his collegiate career with 671 rushing attempts for 3,843 yards (5.7-yard avg.) and 43 touchdowns...Averaged 101.1 yards per game on the ground...Also caught 102 passes for 1,195 yards (11.7-yard avg.) with 8 scores...Returned 18 kickoffs for a 27.8-yard average and 2 touchdowns...Amassed 5,538 total yards on 791 touches for averages of 7.0 yards per play and 145.7 yards per game...Barkley finished his career as Penn State's all-time leader in rushing touchdowns (43) and total touchdowns (53), surpassing Lydell Mitchell's marks of 38 rushing and 41 total touchdowns, respectively, from 1969-71...Barkley capped his career as the school's career all-purpose yards leader (5,538), surpassing Larry Johnson (5,045; 1999-2002)... Ranked No. 22 at the conclusion of his career on Penn State career receiving yards list (1,195).
- Finished his career No. 2 on Penn State's career scoring list (318 points), which were the most in Penn State history by a non-kicker, besting Mitchell's 246 points... Set the school record with a touchdown scored in 15 straight games, a streak that began at Purdue (10/29/16) and ended at Michigan State (11/4/17)...Had 13 multi-rushing touchdown games in his career (2 in 2015, 4 in 2016, 7 in 2017), and 17 multi-touchdown games (2 in 2015, 6 in 2016, 9 in 2017)...Tallied 4 career games with 3-or-more touchdowns (2 in 2016, 2 in 2017)...Recorded 9 career games with 200-plus all-purpose yards (4 in 2016, 5 in 2017) and is 1 of just 2 Nittany Lions to reach the 5,000 all-purpose yard mark.
- Barkley became the only player in Penn State history and just the 4th in the Big Ten to gain 3,000 rushing and 1,000 receiving yards in a career...Was the 7th player in Penn State history to reach 3,000 career rushing yards, finishing 2nd on Penn State's career rushing yards list (3,843), trailing only Evan Royster (3,932; 2007-10)... Joined Royster as the only 2 rushers in Penn State history with three 1,000-yard rushing seasons.
- Barkley concluded his career tied for 5th with 15 career 100-yard games (5 in each of his 3 seasons, including three 200-yard efforts (2 in 2016, 1 in 2017) which was 2nd in program history...Concluded his career as the school's record-holder in receiving yards by a running back (1,195), passing Tony Hunt's mark of 799 yards (2003-06), and doing so with 26 fewer receptions.

- In Penn State bowl history, Barkley ranks 2nd in rushing yards (400) and is tied for 2nd in receptions (17)...His 92-yard rushing score in the 2017 PlayStation Fiesta Bowl broke the Penn State and Fiesta Bowl record for longest rush.

- As a junior in 2017, Barkley played in all 13 games with 12 starts...Selected team captain, named Penn State's Most Valuable Player and earned the Captain's Award at the team's annual awards banquet...Finished with 217 rushing attempts for 1,271 yards (5.9-yard avg.), and career-high-tying 18 touchdowns...Also caught 54 passes, more than his first 2 seasons combined (48), for 632 yards (11.7-yard avg.) and 3 touchdowns...Had a career-high 1,903 yards from scrimmage on 271 touchdowns (146.4 a game, 7.0 per touch)...Added 15 kickoff returns for 426 yards (28.4-yard avg.) and 2 touchdowns...Scored a career-high 23 touchdowns (1 more than his 2016 total).

- Led the Big Ten in rushing for the 2nd consecutive season...Was the 24th FBS player to produce 1,000 rushing yards and 500 receiving yards in a season since 2000...Set the Penn State single-game all-purpose yards mark with 358 at Iowa (9/23, including 211 yards rushing, 94 yards receiving, and 53 yards on kickoff return), topping Curt Warner's previous mark of 341 vs. Syracuse in 1981...Barkley's 12 receptions vs. Iowa were the most in school history by a running back, and were the most by a Big Ten running back since Indiana's Stephen Houston had 12 at Purdue (11/24/12).

- Barkley's 92-yard touchdown run vs. Washington in the PlayStation Fiesta Bowl (12/30/17) was tied for the longest rush in program history, equaling the mark of Blair Thomas (1986; Syracuse - non-touchdown) and Bill Belton (2014; at Indiana).

- Capped his career as 1 of 2 players in Penn State history with multiple 100-point seasons, scoring 132 in 2016 and 138 in 2017, joining Kevin Kelly (2005-08)...Tied the program single-season record with 2 kickoff return touchdowns, equaling the marks of Chuck Peters (1940), Curt Warner (1980) and Derrick Williams (2008).

- Received the Paul Hornung Award as college football's most versatile player...Finished No. 4 in the Heisman Trophy voting, the highest finish by a Penn State player since Larry Johnson finished 3rd in 2002...Selected as a finalist for the Maxwell Award, Doak Walker Award, Lombardi Award and Walter Camp Player of the Year Award...Became the 100th first-team All-American in Penn State history...Was Penn State's 42nd consensus All-American and first Nittany Lion offensive player since Johnson in 2002.

- Named the Big Ten's Graham-George Offensive Player of the Year for the 2nd straight season...Was the first Big Ten running back and 3rd Big Ten player to earn multiple Player of the Year awards in the conference's history, joining Miller (2012-13), and Purdue's Drew Brees (1998 & 2000)...Named first-team All-Big Ten at both running back and return specialist from both the coaches and media panels...Earned Big Ten Offensive Player of the Year, along with first-team all-conference at running back and all-purpose player from the AP.

- In 2016, started all 14 games...Finished with career-high totals of 272 carries, 1,496 yards, and 18 touchdowns (a figure he matched in 2017)...Also caught 28 passes for 402 yards and a career-best 4 touchdowns, and scored 132 points...Had 1,927 all-purpose yards...Barkley's 1,496 rushing yards were the 5th-highest total in Penn State history... Barkley and Tyler Davis (128) became the first set of teammates to score 100 points in the same season in

Penn State history...Barkley's 22 total touchdowns and 18 rushing scores are each 5th on the school's single-season list...The 22 total touchdowns were the most since Larry Johnson scored 23 in 2002...Led the Big Ten in both total and rushing touchdowns...Was No. 1 in the Big Ten with 140.9 all-purpose yards a game.

- Name 2nd-team All-American by The Sporting News and 3rd team by the AP...Selected All-Big Ten first team by the conference coaches, and a unanimous choice by the media.

- As a true freshman in 2015, Barkley played in 11 games with 6 starts, missing 2 games due to injury...Had 182 rushing attempts and broke Penn State's freshman (true or redshirt) single-season record with 1,076 rushing yards, surpassing D.J. Dozier's mark of 1,002 set in 1983...Tied 2 of Dozier's record with 7 rushing touchdowns and five 100-yard games...Caught 20 passes for 161 yards and 1 touchdown...Broke the school freshman (true or redshirt) single-season mark for all-purpose yards with 1,237, surpassing the mark set by Dozier (1,191; 1983).

- Named 2nd-team All-Big Ten by both the coaches and media...Named to Football Writers Association of America (FWAA), Sporting News and USA Today's Freshman All-America team...Selected BTN.com Big Ten Freshman of the Year and earned BTN.com All-Freshman Team laurels...Selected 2nd-team All-Big Ten by the AP.

- Had 1 carry for 1 yard in his collegiate debut at Temple (9/5)...The following week, rushed for 115 yards on 12 carries and scored his first touchdown on a 9-yard run vs. Buffalo (9/12).

as a sophomore...Ranked as the 9th-best running back in the nation and the top prospect in Pennsylvania by 247Sports...Rated by Scout among the top 5 prospects in the state...Lettered in basketball and track...Won the gold medal in the eastern Pennsylvania Conference boys 100 meters.

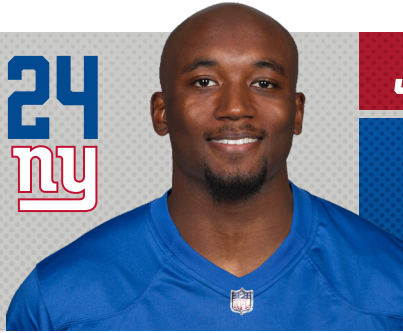

- Engram has played in 50 regular-season games with 39 starts...Totals include 216 receptions for 2,420 yards (11.2-yard avg.) and 13 touchdowns...He also has 13 rushing attempts for 83 yards and one touchdown.

- Engram's 216 catches place him 5th among tight ends in Giants history, behind Jeremy Shockey (371), Bob Tucker (327), Mark Bavaro (266) and Aaron Thomas (247).

- In 2020, Engram played all 16 games for the first time in his career and started a career-high 14 games... Finished 2nd on the Giants with 63 receptions, one less than the career high he set as a rookie in 2017... Engram's catches gained 654 yards, the 2nd-highest total of his career and 3rd-highest on the team...Added 6 rushing attempts for 26 yards...Scored one receiving and one rushing touchdown.

- Engram's 63 catches were the 6th-highest single-season total by a tight end in Giants history and his 654 yards were the 8th-highest.

- Engram caught at least one pass in all 16 games, increasing his streak to 45 consecutive games in which he played with at least one reception.

- Scored each of his touchdowns in NFC East road games, the first touchdown on a 3-yard run at Dallas (10/11) and his 2nd on a 16-yard reception at Washington (11/8).

- Caught a season-high seven passes – for 65 yards – at Baltimore (12/27)...Engram had 6 receptions in 4 games, all on the road: at Chicago (9/20), at the Rams (10/4), at Philadelphia (10/22) and at Cincinnati (11/29).

- Engram gained a career-high 129 yards against the Bengals...His previous best was 116 yards at Dallas on Sept. 8, 2016...It was his 3rd career 100-yard game and first since he totaled 113 yards at Tampa Bay on Sept. 22, 2019...The 129 yards tied Darius Slayton's output in Dallas for the Giants' highest total of the season.

- Engram's 53-yard reception on the game's first series in Cincinnati was the Giants' longest completion and third-longest offensive play of the season...He also had a 44-yard catch to become the first Giants player with two catches of 44 or more yards in the same game since Oct. 22, 2018, when Sterling Shepard had 58 and 53-yard receptions in Atlanta.

- Engram led the Giants with 32 receiving yards (on 4 catches) in Seattle. That was the lowest total by a Giants yardage leader since another tight end, Shockey, had a

team-high 26 yards in a victory vs. the Miami Dolphins in London on Oct. 28, 2007.

- In 2019, Engram was limited to 8 appearances and 6 starts due to injuries...Inactive with a knee injury at New England (10/10)...Returned to play in the next 3 games, but hurt his foot vs. Dallas (11/4)...Missed the remainder of the season and was placed on injured reserve on Dec. 17...Led the Giants tight ends and finished 5th on the team with 44 receptions for 467 yards and 3 touchdowns...Added 3 carries for 7 yards.

- Engram finished with a career-high 11 receptions for 116 yards, including a one-yard touchdown at Dallas (9/8)...The receptions and yardage totals were the highest for a Giants tight end since Nov. 11, 2007, when Shockey caught 12 passes for 129 yards in a home game vs. the Cowboys.

- At Tampa Bay (9/22), Engram caught 6 passes for 113 yards to become the first Giants tight end with multiple 100-yard games in a season since Shockey in 2005 (4)...

On the first play of the 2nd half, Engram caught a short Daniel Jones pass and turned it into a 75-yard touchdown. It was the Giants' longest play of the 2019 season and the longest touchdown reception ever by a Giants tight end. The previous long was a 71-yarder by Aaron Thomas vs. Philadelphia on Oct. 17, 1965...The 75-yarder was also the longest reception of Engram's career. His previous long catch was a 54-yarder vs. Tampa Bay on Nov. 18, 2018.

- Engram had 6 receptions vs. Minnesota (10/6) and the Cowboys in his final game of the year...Scored his final touchdown of the season on a 2-yard catch at Detroit (10/27).

- In 2018, played in 11 games with 8 starts...Inactive for 3 games with a knee injury (9/30-10/11), did not play at Philadelphia (11/25) due to hamstring injury suffered in pregame warmups and was inactive vs. Chicago (12/2)...Led the Giants tight ends and finished 4th on the team with 45 catches for 577 yards (12.8-yard avg.) and 3 touchdowns...Caught at least one pass in every game he played...Scored at Dallas (9/16), vs. Washington (10/28), and vs. Dallas (12/30)...Had a then career-long 54-yard reception vs. Tampa Bay (11/18)...In the season's final 4 games, Engram caught 22 passes for 320 yards...Posted season-high totals of 8 catches vs. Tennessee (12/16) and 87 yards at Indianapolis (12/23).

- Engram's 64 receptions were the 5th-highest total by a tight end in team history. The top spot is held by Shockey (74 catches in 2002). Mark Bavaro (1986) and Shockey (2006) had 66-catch seasons, and Shockey caught 65 passes in 2005.

- Engram was the first rookie tight end to lead the Giants in receptions. His 6 touchdown catches were a franchise record for a rookie tight end, surpassing Bob Tucker's previous mark of 5, set in 1970. Engram set the mark on a 10-yard pass from Geno Smith at Oakland (12/3).

- Engram caught at least one pass in every game in which he played except the Oct. 8 loss to the Chargers... He scored touchdowns in 4 consecutive games from Oct. 15 to Nov. 12, the longest streak by a Giants player since wide receiver Rueben Randle caught a touchdown pass in each of the final 4 games of the 2015 season.

- Started and had 4 receptions for 44 yards, including a 31-yarder, in his NFL debut at Dallas (9/10)... Scored his first touchdown on an 18-yard reception and caught 4 passes for 49 yards vs. Detroit (9/18).

- Began his 4-game touchdown streak with a 5-yard score while catching 5 passes for 82 yards in a victory at Denver (10/15)... Scored the game's first touchdown on a 5-yard reception and finished with 6 catches for 60 yards vs. Seattle (10/22)... Had a 10-yard touchdown reception among his 4 catches for 70 yards vs. the Rams (11/5)... Caught a 9-yard touchdown pass and finished with 6 receptions for 31 yards at San Francisco (11/12).

- Contributed a season-high 99 yards on 7 catches, including a 10-yard touchdown, at Oakland (12/3)... Had a season-high 8 receptions, for 87 yards, and added a

14-yard run, vs. Philadelphia (12/17)... Caught one pass for 12 yards before leaving the game in the first quarter with a rib injury at Arizona (12/24).

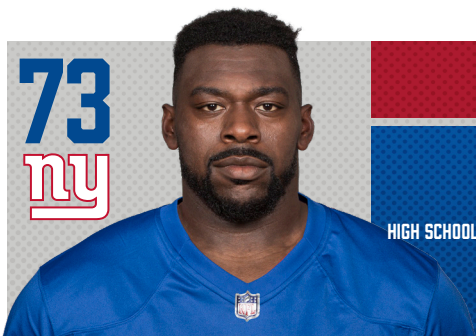

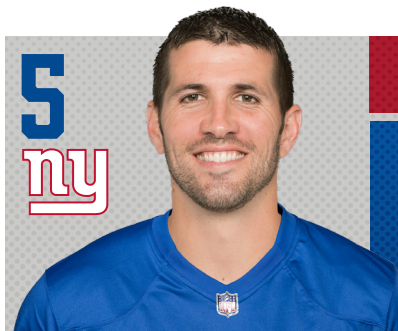

- Originally signed as a rookie free agent by the Baltimore Ravens on May 8, 2009...Waived by Baltimore on Sept. 5, 2009...Signed as a free agent by Washington on Dec. 8, 2009...Waived by Washington on Aug. 28, 2012...Signed as a free agent by Carolina on Nov. 21, 2012...Released by Carolina on July 30, 2020...Signed as a free agent by the Giants on Aug. 19, 2020.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS:

- Gano has played in 150 regular-season and 7 postseason games...He has made 255 of 305 field goal attempts (83.6%) and 327 of 344 extra point tries (95.1%) in the regular season and 12 of 15 field goal attempts (80.0%) and all 18 PATs in the playoffs...Has scored 1,092 regular-season points and exceeded 100 points in each of the 8 seasons in which he played all 16 games...Gano has made 25 of 41 career attempts (61.0%) from 50+ yards...He has touchbacks on 62.3% of his regular-season kickoffs (467 of 750)...Gano was a Pro Bowler in 2017, a 2-time NFC Special Teams Player of the Month and 3-time conference Player of the Week...Ranks 2nd to John Kasay in Panthers history with 742 points (165 field goals, 247 PATs).

- Gano twice kicked last-second field goals to enable the Panthers defeat the Giants...On Oct. 7, 2018, he booted the longest field goal by an opponent in Giants history, a 63-yarder with one second remaining that gave Carolina 33-31 victory in Charlotte...It is 2 yards longer than any other field goal ever kicked against the Giants (61 yards by Philadelphia's Jake Elliott on Sept. 24, 2017). In addition, it is one of 6 kicks tied for the 2nd-longest field goal in NFL history, it was the longest game-winning field-goal in league history and was the longest field goal in Panthers history. The only longer field goal was kicked by Denver's Matt Prater vs. Tennessee in Week 14 of the 2013 season (64 yards)...On Dec. 20, 2015, Gano kicked a 43-yard field goal as time expired gave the Panthers a 38-35 victory in MetLife Stadium.

- In his first season with the Giants in 2020, Gano was the team's kicker in all 16 games...Had one of the finest seasons of his 12-year career and by a Giants kicker...Made 31 of 32 attempts, a .9687 percentage that is the second highest in Giants history. In 2018, Aldrick Rosas made 32 of 33 attempts, a success rate of .9696.

- Gano's .9687 percentage was the highest among the 21 NFL kickers who attempted at least 25 field goals in 2020.

- Gano's 114 points placed him 15th in the NFL and was the 8th time in his career he scored at least 100

points in a season.

- Gano's only miss was on a 57-yard try at Chicago (9/20)...Had he made it, Gano would be the only kicker in NFL history with the longest field goal for a franchise and the longest 3-pointer against that same team.

- After the miss, he made his next 30 field goal attempts, the longest streak in Giants history. Josh Brown hit 29 straight attempts in 2014-15...Gano will carry his streak into the 2021 season.

- The record-setter was a 50-yard field goal with 6:27 remaining in the 4th quarter vs. Dallas (1/3)...It was Gano's 5th field goal of the season of 50 or more yards, including 4 vs. the Cowboys. That is a franchise single-season record. Brown (2014) and Rosas (2018) each had 4.

- Gano kicked field goals of 52, 42 and 47 yards vs. San Francisco (9/27) to become the second kicker in Giants history with 3 field goals longer than 40 yards in a regular-season game. On Dec. 22, 2013 in Detroit, Brown kicked field goals of 41, 52 and 45 yards to become the first Giants kicker to accomplish the feat.

- Gano tied an NFL record by becoming the first player in Giants history to kick 3 field goals of 50 or more yards in a game at Dallas (10/11). He kicked field goals of 55, 50 and 54 yards, plus a 28-yarder. Gano was one of 3 players in 2020 and is one of 12 in NFL history to kick three 50+ yard field goals in a game. The others in 2020 were Tennessee's Stephen Gostkowski (51, 54 and 55 at Minnesota on Sept. 27) and Buffalo's Tyler Bass (54, 55, 58 at Arizona on Nov. 15).

- Gano's 55-yarder was the Giants' longest field goal since Rosas' team-record 57-yarder vs. Chicago on Dec. 2, 2018. Gano's kick is tied with Joe Danelo's 55-yarder vs. New Orleans on Sept. 20, 1981 for the 3rd-longest in Giants history. Ali Haji-Sheikh kicked 56-yard field goals vs. Green Bay on Sept. 26, 1981 and at Detroit on Nov. 7, 1983.

- The only other Giants kicker with multiple 50-yarders in a game is Raul Allegre, who booted field goals of 53 and 52 yards at Philadelphia on Nov. 15, 1987.

- Gano's 5 field goals of 50-plus yards tie him with Lawrence Tynes (2007-12) for the 5th-highest career total in franchise history. Danelo holds the Giants record with 9 from 1976-82.

- Gano missed more extra points (2) than field goal attempts (one). Gano made 21 of 23 PATs.

- Received his 3rd career NFC Special Teams Player of the Week award for his contributions to the team's victory in Washington (11/8), where he kicked field goals of 38, 48 and 42 yards and 3 of his 6 kickoffs were touchbacks...Gano has kicked 3 or more field goals in a game 41 times in his career.

- In 2019, Gano did not play football because of an injury he suffered in practice to his left (plant) leg the previous year.

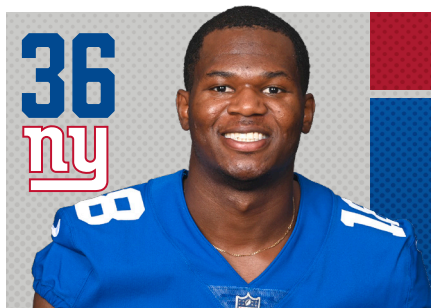

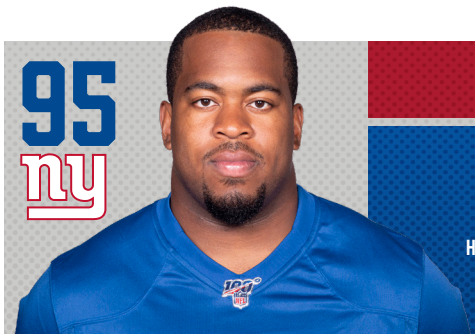

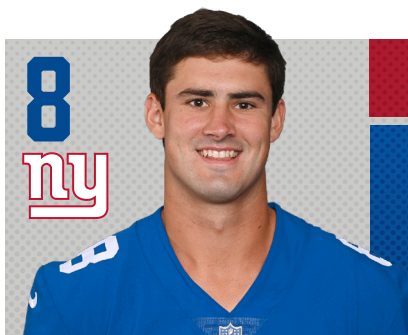

- Originally a first-round (6th pick overall) draft choice by the Giants in 2019.

GIANTS NOTES:

- Jones - the first of the Giants' 3 first-round draft choices in 2019 - was just the 3rd quarterback selected by the Giants in the first round of the NFL Draft. The others were Phil Simms in 1979 and Philip Rivers in 2004...Rivers was soon sent to the Chargers in the trade that brought Eli Manning to the Giants.

- In 2019, Jones joined Arizona's Kyler Murray and Jacksonville's Gardner Minshew as rookie quarterbacks who passed for at least 20 touchdowns. It was just the 2nd season in NFL history in which at least 3 rookie quarterbacks threw at least 20 touchdown passes. In 2012, Russell Wilson, Andrew Luck and Robert Griffin III comprised the trio.

- Jones was the first rookie quarterback in NFL history with 2 games of 300+ passing yards and 4+ touchdown passes – and he had 3 of them.

- Jones threw at least one touchdown pass in each of his first 13 career starts, the 4th-longest streak among quarterbacks who started their careers since the 1970 merger:

- Jones' streak is the 2nd-longest in Giants' history; Hall of Famer Y.A. Tittle threw a touchdown pass in 15 consecutive games from 1962-64. Eli Manning had 3 separate 12-game streaks in his 16-year career. Jones' streak ended in Chicago (9/20).

- Jones has rushed for 702 yards on 110 attempts, a 6.4-yard average that ranks 6th among all players in NFL history with a minimum of 100 carries. It is the highest among the 81 players in Giants history with 110 or more carries.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS:

- In his first 2 seasons, Jones played in 27 games with starts in each of his last 26 appearances...His totals are 907 attempts, 564 completions (62.2%) for 5,970 yards, 35 touchdowns and 22 interceptions for a passer rating of 84.1. The passes, completions and yardage totals are the most in

franchise history through 27 games for a player who began his career with the Giants. Charlie Conerly's 40 touchdown passes and Joe Pisarcik's 35 interceptions are the other 27-game records.

- Jones' 5,970 yards is the 9th-highest total in Giants history. Scott Brunner is 8th with 6,121.

- Jones has 110 rushing attempts for 702 yards (6.4-yard avg.) and 3 touchdowns with a long run of 80 yards.

- Jones is 8-18 as a starter.

- Jones is 4-0 as a starter vs. Washington. The last Giants quarterback to win each of his first 4 starts against an NFC East opponent was Kent Graham, who was 4-0 against Philadelphia in 1998-99.

- In 2020, Jones started all 14 games in which he played. He was inactive at Seattle (12/6) with a hamstring injury and vs. Cleveland (12/20) with hamstring and ankle injuries...He completed 280 of 448 passes (62.5%) for 2,943 yards, 11 touchdowns and 10 interceptions for a passer rating of 80.4...Jones finished 2nd on the Giants with 423 rushing yards on 65 carries (6.5-yard avg.). He ran for one touchdown...Elected one of the Giants' team captains.

- From Nov. 2 vs. Tampa Bay until the season finale vs. Dallas on Jan. 3, Jones threw a career-high 177 passes without an interception. He did not throw a pick in 5 consecutive games. The streak ended when Cowboys safety Donovan Wilson picked off a Jones pass in the 3rd quarter.

- Jones threw a season-high 41 passes 3 times: vs. Pittsburgh (9/14), vs. Tampa Bay (11/2) and at Baltimore (12/27). He had season-high totals in completions (26) and yards (279) against the Steelers. On Nov. 15 vs. Philadelphia, Jones completed a career-best 75% of his passes (21 of 28). Jones had a season-high 2 touchdowns passes in 4 games: vs. Pittsburgh, at Philadelphia (10/22), vs. Tampa Bay and vs. Dallas (1/3).

- Jones completed 17 of 25 passes for 229 yards, 2 touchdowns and one interception vs. Dallas for a 106.9 passer rating that was the 5th-highest of his career and his best in 13 home games. It was his 6th career single-game rating greater than 100.0.

- He completed 16 of 27 passes for 213 yards, no touchdowns and no interceptions for a passer rating of 84.3 in Cincinnati (11/29) before leaving the game with a right hamstring injury he suffered on a 7-yard run in the third quarter.

- Jones had 65 rushing attempts for 423 yards (6.5-yard average), the team's 2nd-highest total and the record for a Giants quarterback in the Super Bowl era. Pro Football Hall of Famer Fran Tarkenton previously held the record with 306 yards in 1967:

- Jones' 6.5-yard average was the NFL's highest among the 91 players with at least 50 rushing attempts in 2020. It was the 2nd-highest in a single season in Giants history among players with 50+ attempts behind Ward Cuff (6.54 average on 80 carries in 1943).

- Since becoming the starter in Week 3 of the 2019 season, Jones has led the Giants in rushing in 9 games, the most by a Giants quarterback in the Super Bowl era.

- Jones led the Giants in rushing 6 times in 2020, a single season record for a Giants quarterback in the Super Bowl era. Jones first set the mark with 3 leading performances as a rookie in 2019. Lamar Jackson, who led Baltimore in rushing 7 times, was the only quarterback to pace his team more often than Jones.

- Jones has rushed for at least 45 yards in 5 different games, the most by a Giants quarterback in the Super Bowl era. Jackson (8) and Arizona's Kyler Murray (7) were the only quarterbacks with more 45-yard rushing games in 2020.

- In the Giants' first victory of the season, vs. Washington (10/18), Jones led the Giants with 74 yards on 7 carries. The yardage total was the highest by a Giants quarterback since Jeff Hostetler ran for 82 yards at New England on Dec. 30, 1990. The 7 rushing attempts were the most by a Giants quarterback since Kerry Collins ran 7 times at St. Louis on Sept. 15, 2002.

- In that game, Jones gained 49 yards on a 2nd quarter run around left end, then the longest run by a Giants quarterback in the Super Bowl era. The previous long was a 47-yarder by Hostetler at Phoenix on Nov. 10, 1991.

- Four days later, Jones broke both rushing records in a Thursday night game in Philadelphia. He led all rushers with 92 yards, the most rushing yards by a Giants quarterback in a game since Frank Filchock had 108 against at Pittsburgh on Oct. 6, 1946. ... Jones gained most of his yards on an 80-yard run in the 3rd quarter. It was the longest run by a Giants' quarterback in the Super Bowl era, easily eclipsing his 49-yarder vs. Washington. The 80-yarder was also the longest run by a quarterback in NFL history that did not result in a touchdown. It was the longest run by an NFL quarterback since Tennessee's Marcus Mariota scored on an 87-yard run against Jacksonville on Dec. 6, 2015.

- Jones's run tied for the 4th-longest in Giants history and was the 2nd-longest that was not a touchdown:

- Jones has had the Giants' longest run in 8 games, the highest total by a quarterback in the Super Bowl era.

- When Jones rushed for a 34-yard touchdown vs. Philadelphia (11/15), it was the 5th game in 2020 in which he had the Giants' longest run. Hostetler was the last Giants quarterback to do that, in 1991. The rushing touchdown was Jones' first since Sept. 22, 2019, when he scored on a pair of 7-yard runs — including the game-winner — at Tampa Bay in his first NFL start.

- Jones' 34-yarder was the longest touchdown run by a

Giants quarterback since Nov. 10, 1991, when Hostetler scored on a 47-yard run in a 21-14 victory at Phoenix.

- The touchdown vs. Philadelphia was Jones' 3rd run of the season of at least 34 yards, the most by a Giants quarterback in a single season in the Super Bowl era and the most by an NFL quarterback in 2020.

- Jones had 9 carries vs. both Philadelphia and Dallas, the highest total by a Giants quarterback since Hostetler had 10 at New England on Dec. 30, 1990, when he rushed for a team-high 82 yards in 13-10 victory vs. the Patriots.

- In 2 games vs. the Eagles, Jones rushed for 156 yards, the highest single-season total by a Giants quarterback against one opponent. The previous mark was Hostetler's 82 yards vs. New England in 1990. Jones had the second highest rushing total by a quarterback vs. a single opponent in 2020; Jackson ran for 169 yards vs. Cleveland — for the 2nd consecutive season.

- As a rookie in 2019, Jones played in 13 games, including starts in each of the last 12 contests in which he appeared... He set franchise rookie records with 459 passes, 284 completions, 3,027 yards and 24 touchdown passes. The former records had all stood since Charley Conerly set them in 1948. They were 299 passes, 162 completions, 2,175 yards and 22 touchdown passes. Jones also threw 12 interceptions and had a passer rating of 87.7.

- Jones' 24 touchdown passes led all rookie quarterbacks in 2019 and were the 4th-most by a rookie in a single season in NFL history. Only Baker Mayfield (27 in 2018), Peyton Manning (26 in 1998) and Russell Wilson (26 in 2012) had more.

- Jones threw a touchdown pass in each of his last 12 games — all starts — the longest streak by a Giants quarterback since Eli Manning threw for a score in 12 straight games in 2008. The Giants' previous rookie record of 9 consecutive games with a touchdown pass to begin a career was set by Conerly in 1948.

- In 2 games against Washington, Jones threw 6 touchdowns, the highest total by a Giants rookie quarterback against a single opponent. The old mark of 5 was set by Charlie Conerly against the Pittsburgh Steelers in 1948.

- Jones finished 2nd on the team with 289 rushing yards, then the 3rd-highest total by a Giants quarterback in the Super Bowl era. He was surpassed only by Fran Tarkenton in 1967 and '68 (306 and 301 yards, respectively).

- Jones led the Giants in rushing yards 3 times, with 28 yards in his starting debut at Tampa Bay (9/22), a season-high 54 yards vs. Dallas (11/4) and 20 yards at the Jets (11/10). He was the first Giants quarterback to lead the team in rushing yards 3 times in a season in the Super Bowl era.

- Jones' 54 rushing yards vs. the Cowboys was the highest yardage total by a Giants quarterback since Dec. 30, 1990, when Hostetler ran for 82 yards in a victory at New England. It was the most rushing attempts by a Giants quarterback since Manning had 6 vs. Dallas on Jan. 1, 2012 — but Manning's total included 3 kneel-downs.

- Jones had runs of 14 and 16 yards vs. Dallas to become the first Giants quarterback with 2 rushes that long in a game since Dec. 18, 1994, when fellow Duke alum Dave Brown had runs of 16 and 17 yards at Philadelphia.

- Jones had the Giants' longest run in 3 separate games, including a season-long 26-yarder at Chicago (11/24).

- In the season finale vs. Philadelphia (12/29), Jones threw a career-high 47 passes and tied another with 28 completions (the 3rd time he hit that total, and the 2nd week in a row). Jones threw for 301 yards, 1 touchdown and 1 interception for a passer rating of 76.6.

- Jones was intercepted by Eagles cornerback Sidney Jones with 3:09 remaining in the 4th quarter, ending his streak of 88 consecutive passes without throwing a pick.

- The 300-yard game was Jones' 2nd in a row and his Giants rookie-record 5th of the season. The five 300-yard games are tied for the 3rd-highest single-season total in franchise history. Manning had 8 in 2011 and 6 in 2015, plus 5 in both 2014 and 2018. Kerry Collins had five 300-yard games in 2001... Jones is tied with Kyler Murray (2019) and Joe Burrow (2020) for the 2nd-most 300-yard games by a rookie quarterback in NFL history. Only Andrew Luck (6 games in 2012) had more.

- Each of Jones' first four 300-yard games occurred when the Giants were the visiting team: at Tampa Bay, Detroit, the Jets and Washington. He was the first NFL quarterback to record his first four 300-yard games on the road since Kirk Cousins did it his first 5 such games for Washington from 2012-15. Manning's first eight 300-yard games all occurred when the Giants were visitors.

- Jones had 15 touchdown passes and no interceptions in his first four 300-yard games. Only 2 other quarterbacks in history have thrown at least 15 touchdown passes in their first four 300-yard games, but they didn't avoid turnovers like Jones: Pro Football Hall of Famer Sammy Baugh (20 touchdowns and 8 interceptions from 1943-47) and Earl Morrall (15 touchdowns and 9 interceptions from 1963-70 — the only four 300-yard games of his career).

- Jones completed 28 of 42 passes for 352 yards, 5 touchdowns and no interceptions for a season-high passer rating of 132.1 in the 41-34 overtime victory in Washington (12/22). He was the first rookie in NFL history with at least 350 passing yards, 5 touchdown passes and zero interceptions in a game.

- Jones was the first rookie in Giants history to throw 5 touchdown passes in a game. He shared the previous record of 4 touchdown passes, which was set by Conerly on Oct. 17, 1948 vs. the Chicago Cardinals and tied by Tom Kennedy on Dec. 11, 1966 vs. Pittsburgh. Jones tied the mark at Detroit (10/27) and at the Jets (11/10).

- Jones was the 5th rookie in NFL history to throw 5 touchdown passes in a game. The others were Detroit's Matthew Stafford vs. Cleveland on Nov. 22, 2009; Tampa Bay's Jameis Winston at Philadelphia on Nov. 22, 2015; and Houston's Deshaun Watson vs. Kansas City on Oct. 8, 2017 and Ray Buivid, who played for the Chicago Bears in 1937-38. On Dec. 5, 1937, he threw 5 touchdown passes in the season finale in Wrigley Field vs. the Chicago Cardinals.

- While Jones threw for 5 touchdowns, Saquon Barkley set a franchise record with 279 yards from scrimmage. The Giants were the first team in NFL history to have one player with 275+ scrimmage yards and another with 5 touchdown passes in the same game.

- Jones joined Dallas' Dak Prescott (twice in 2016) as the only rookie quarterbacks in NFL history with 2 games of at least 300 passing yards, 2 touchdown passes and zero interceptions.

- The game in Washington was Jones' 3rd with at least 4 touchdown passes. The only other rookies in NFL history to do that were Watson and Pro Football Hall of Famer Fran Tarkenton in 1961.

- Jones was the first Giants quarterback to throw 4 or more touchdowns in at least 3 games in 1 season since Manning had 3 such games in 2015. He was the first player in Giants history to throw at least 4 touchdown passes without an interception 3 times in one season.

- The 5 touchdown passes were tied for the 3rd-highest total in Giants history. Hall of Famer Y.A. Tittle threw for 7

scores vs. Washington on Oct. 28, 1962. Tittle (Dec. 16, 1962 vs. Dallas) and Manning (Nov. 1, 2015 at New Orleans) each threw 6 touchdown passes in a game. Jones was the 4th player to throw 5. The others were Manning (Dec. 30, 2012 vs. Philadelphia), Phil Simms (Sept. 7, 1980 at St. Louis) and Tarkenton (Oct. 25, 1970 vs. St. Louis).

- The starting quarterbacks in Washington were Jones and Dwayne Haskins, who were both selected in first round of the 2019 NFL Draft. The only other matchup of quarterbacks from that draft was when Jones started against Arizona's Kyler Murray (10/ 20).

- Jones' 352 passing yards in Washington was the 2nd-highest total by a Giants rookie, behind Conerly's 363 yards at Pittsburgh on Dec. 5, 1948.

- Jones completed 28 of 41 passes for 322 yards, 4 touchdowns and no interceptions at Detroit (10/27). He was just the 2nd rookie quarterback in history to avoid an interception while throwing for at least 300 yards and 4 scores. The first was Tennessee's Marcus Mariota, who on Nov. 8, 2015 had a 371-4-0 line in a 34-28 victory in New Orleans. Jones later accomplished the feat twice more, at the Jets and at Washington.

- In another Oct. 27 game, Jacksonville rookie quarterback Gardner Minshew passed for 279 yards with 3 touchdowns and no interceptions in the Jaguars' 29-15 win vs. the Jets. With Jones and Minshew, Week 8 was just the 2nd in NFL history in which 2 rookie quarterbacks each passed for at least 3 touchdowns and 0 interceptions in the same week, joining Week 16 of the 2018 season (the Jets' quarterback Sam Darnold and Cleveland's Baker Mayfield).

- Jones was the first rookie quarterback to throw 4 touchdown passes in a game since Mayfield on Nov. 25, 2018 at Cincinnati.

- Jones set his then career high with his 3rd touchdown pass in Detroit. He was the first Giants rookie with 3 touchdown passes in a game since Manning on Jan. 2, 2005 vs. Dallas, and the first to do it on the road since Phil Simms on Dec. 9, 1979 at St. Louis.

- When Murray and Jones, the first and 6th players selected in the 2019 NFL Draft started for the Cardinals and Giants, respectively, on Oct. 20, it was the first matchup of rookie starting quarterbacks in the NFL in 2019. It was also the first game in which the first 2 quarterbacks chosen in their draft squared off since Sept. 13, 2015, when Winston (No. 1) played against Mariota (No. 2). In addition, it was just the 9th game since the 1970 merger in which rookie quarterbacks selected among the first 10 choices in the draft started against each other.

- When Jones made his first career start at Tampa Bay (9/22) he became the first Giants rookie to start at quarterback since Jan. 2, 2005 — the final game of Manning's first season — and the first rookie quarterback to make his starting debut since Manning on Nov. 21, 2004.

- Jones completed 23 of 36 passes for 336 yards, 2 touchdowns and no interceptions for a passer rating of 112.7. He also ran for 2 touchdowns while leading the Giants with 28 rushing yards. The Giants overcame a 28-10 halftime deficit to defeat the Buccaneers, 32-31.

- Jones was the first rookie quarterback in the Super Bowl era and just the 2nd overall to throw for at least 300 yards and 2 touchdowns and run for 2 scores in his starting debut. The first was Detroit's Eric Hipple who also passed for 336 yards and was responsible for 6 touchdowns — 4 passing and 2 rushing — in a 48-17 victory vs. Chicago on Oct. 19, 1981.

- Jones and Hipple are the only 2 quarterbacks since the merger with multiple touchdown passes and multiple rushing touchdowns in their first start. The previous rookie

quarterback to hit that double in a game was Buffalo's Josh Allen, who threw for 3 scores and ran for 2 vs. Miami on Dec. 30, 2018 in his 11th career start.

- Jones was the first quarterback to be responsible for 4 touchdowns in his starting debut since Mariota threw for 4 scores at Tampa Bay on Sept. 13, 2015.

- Jones was the first Giants rookie quarterback to win his initial career start since Dec. 7, 1980, when Scott Brunner completed eight of 18 passes for 161 yards, 2 touchdowns and 1 interception in a 27-21 victory at Seattle.

- Jones was the 14th quarterback since the 1970 merger to start his first NFL game in a Giants uniform. Those quarterbacks are 8-6 in their debuts.

- Jones joined Brunner as the only 2 of those 14 quarterbacks to throw 2 touchdown passes in their debut. His 36 passes were the 4th-highest total (strike-replacement starter Mike Busch threw 41 passes in 1987, Joe Pisarcik threw 38 in 1977, and Manning threw 37). But Jones' 23 completions were the most among the 14 first timers. The previous high was Manning's 17. And Jones not only became the first Giants quarterback to pass for more than 300 yards in his debut, he was the first to exceed 200 yards. The previous high was Danny Kanell's 198 yards on Oct. 12, 1997 at Arizona.

- Jones was the first quarterback drafted by the Giants to start a game for them since Dec. 28, 2003 - the final game before Manning's arrival the following spring — when Jesse Palmer, a 4th-round choice in 2001, played the entire game in a 37-24 loss to the Carolina Panthers in Giants Stadium. Palmer completed 18 of 43 passes for 110 yards, 2 touchdowns and 4 interceptions.

- The Giants had last won a game started by a quarterback they drafted on Oct. 31, 1999 at Philadelphia, 23-17 in overtime. Kent Graham, an 8th-round draft choice in 1992 who spent 3 seasons with the Giants, 1 with the Detroit Lions and 2 with Arizona, re-signed with the Giants as a free agent on Feb. 17, 1998. In that Halloween game vs. the Eagles, Graham completed 26 of 41 passes for 241 yards, 1 touchdown and no interceptions.

- The Giants had last won a game started by a quarterback they drafted and who was still with the team after that initial transaction on Oct. 18, 1998, when Kanell led the team to a 34-7 victory against Arizona. Kanell, a 4th-round draft choice in 1996, completed 22 of 36 passes for 259 yards, 3 touchdown and no interceptions.

- Jones scored the Giants' first touchdown on a 7-yard run in the 2nd quarter. It was the first rushing touchdown by a Giants quarterback since Manning scored on a 1-yarder at Indianapolis on Dec. 23, 2018. The 7-yard run was the longest by a Giants quarterback since Manning's 14-yarder on Oct. 1, 2017 — also at Tampa Bay.

- Jones was the first Giants quarterback other than Manning with a rushing touchdown since David Carr scored on a 12-yard run against Oakland in Giants Stadium on Oct. 11, 2009.

- Jones was the first quarterback whose team overcame an 18-point deficit to win in his first career start since Dec. 14, 1997, when Jon Kitna and the Seattle Seahawks fell behind the Raiders in Oakland, 21-3, before rallying for a 22-21 victory.

- Jones was the first NFL quarterback to throw for at least 336 yards in his starting debut since Green Bay's Scott Tolzien passed for 339 yards on Nov. 17, 2013 — vs. the Giants in MetLife Stadium.

- Jones was the first Giants quarterback other than Manning to throw for at least 300 yards since Nov. 2, 2003, when Kerry Collins passed for 303 yards in a victory against

the Jets.

- Jones was the first Giants quarterback to rush for 2 touchdowns in a game since Hostetler on Nov. 10, 1991 (runs of 47 and 4 yards in a 21-14 victory against the Cardinals) and the first with 2 rushing touchdowns in a season since Collins in 1999.

- Jones was the first Giants quarterback with at least 2 passing and 2 rushing touchdowns in a game since Nov. 28, 1948, when Conerly threw scoring passes of 14 yards to Ray Poole and 23 yards to Bill Swiacki and scored on runs of one and 14 yards against the Boston Yankees.

- Jones was credited with his first game-winning drive (a quarterback must lead his team from a 4th-quarter deficit or tie to a victory). He was the first NFL quarterback to do so in his first start since Baltimore's Lamar Jackson on Nov. 18, 2018 vs. Cincinnati.

- Jones' first career touchdown pass was a 75-yarder to tight end Eric Engram. It was the longest first touchdown pass by Giants quarterback since Hostetler's 85-yarder to Stephen Baker at New Orleans on Nov. 26, 1988, and the longest by an NFL player since Arizona tight end Logan Thomas threw an 81-yarder to Andre Ellington on Oct. 5, 2014.

- Jones was the first quarterback to lead the Giants in rushing since Oct. 1, 2000, when Collins ran for 19 yards in a loss at Tennessee.

- Jones improved to 2-0 as a starter when he led the Giants to a 24-3 victory vs. Washington (9/29)... He became the first Giants quarterback to win his first 2 starts since Kanell in 1997 and the first rookie to do so since Simms in 1979. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Jones was the 12th quarterback selected in the first round of the draft since the 1970 merger to win each of his first 2 starts with both starts coming in their rookie year.

- In those 2 games, Jones completed 46 of 67 passes (68.7%) for 561 yards, 3 touchdowns and 2 interceptions. The yardage total was the highest among Giants quarterbacks who began their career in the Super Bowl era, easily topping Kanell's 418 yards in his first 2 starts... Jones' 68.7 completion percentage was the highest by a Giants quarterback in his first 2 starts in the Super Bowl era.

- The quarterbacks for the majority of the Giants' victory vs. Washington were Jones and Haskins. It was the first Giants game in which a rookie quarterback threw a pass for each team since Dec. 18, 2004, when the players were Manning and Pittsburgh's Ben Roethlisberger.

- Jones made his NFL debut when he relieved Manning for the Giants' final series at Dallas (9/8). He completed 3 of 4 passes for 17 yards, with a long completion of 6 yards, and ran once for 5 yards. ... Jones' first career completion was a 5-yarder to running back Wayne Gallman, Jr. on his initial snap... Gained 5 yards on his first pro rushing attempt but lost a fumble that was forced by linebacker Leighton Vander Esch and recovered by Chidobe Awuzie.

- Jones started all 36 games in which he played at Duke from 2016-18... Was a team captain in 2017-18... Two-time recipient of the Carmen Falcone Award as Duke's Most Valuable Player (2016 & 2018)... Three-time Academic All-ACC selection (2016-18)... Two-time ACC Quarterback of the Week (vs. Northwestern and North Carolina in 2018)... Four-time Manning Award Star of the Week recipient (vs. Notre Dame and North Carolina in 2016, and Northwestern and North Carolina in 2018)... MVP of the 2017 Quick Lane Bowl vs. Northern Illinois... Offensive Player of the Game of the 2018 Walk-On's Independence Bowl vs. Temple.

- Completed 764 of 1,275 passes (60%) for 8,201 yards, 52 touchdowns, and 29 interceptions...Added 406 rushing attempts for 1,323 yards (3.3-yard avg.) and 17 touchdowns, caught 2 passes for 6 yards, and punted 5 times for 170 yards...Compiled 9,524 yards of total offense... Averaged 227.8 passing yards per game...Played 2,603 career snaps...Recorded 300+ yards of total offense in 13 games, including a career-high 547 (186 rushing & 361 passing) vs. North Carolina in 2018...Threw multiple touchdown passes in 16 games, including a career-high 5 vs. Temple in his final game in 2018...Completed 20+ passes in 20 games, including a career-high 34 vs. Miami in 2016... Threw for 300+ yards in 9 games, including a career-high 423 yards vs. Temple in 2018.

- Holds Duke single-game records for total offensive yards (547 vs. North Carolina, 2018) and rushing yards by a quarterback (186 vs. North Carolina, 2018) while sharing school game marks for touchdown passes of 20+ yards (3 vs. Temple, 2018), and 50+ yards (2 vs. Pittsburgh, 2018).

- In 2018, Jones started all 11 games in which he played...Suffered fractured left clavicle in the 3rd quarter vs. Northwestern (9/8) and underwent surgery on Sept. 9, forcing him to miss games vs. Baylor and N.C. Central...Received the program's Carmen Falcone Award as Duke's Most Valuable Player, becoming the sixth 2-time recipient of the honor, joining Leo Hart (1969-70), Keith Stoneback (1973-74), Scottie Montgomery (1998-99), Mike Hart (2000-01) and John Talley (2005-06)...Two-time ACC Quarterback of the Week honoree and Manning Award Star of the Week recipient following performances vs. Northwestern and North Carolina.

- Completed 237 of 392 passes (60.5%) for 2,674 yards, 22 touchdowns and 9 interceptions while rushing 104 times for 319 yards (3.1-yard avg.)...Compiled 2,993 total offensive yards...Averaged 243.1 passing yards per game... Caught one pass for 6 yards...Punted twice for 54 yards with both kicks downed inside the opponent 20-yard line... Completed 20+ passes in 6 games, including a season-high 31 vs. North Carolina...Threw for more than 300 yards in 3 games: Pittsburgh (396), North Carolina (361) and Temple (423)...Tossed 3+ TD passes vs. Northwestern (3), Georgia Tech (3), Pittsburgh (4), North Carolina (3) and Temple (5)...Threw a season-long 85-yard pass to wide receiver T.J. Rahming vs. Temple in the Walk-On's Independence Bowl.

- Tallied season-high totals of 31 completions on 54 attempts for 361 yards, 3 touchdowns and one interception, plus 15 rushing attempts for 186 yards with a long of 68 yards and one score vs. North Carolina...Totaled a season-high 547 offensive yards to become the 3rd player in ACC history to post multiple 300-yard passing and 100-yard rushing games, joining Louisville's Lamar Jackson (5) and Clemson's Tajh Boyd (2)...The 547-yard performance ranked as the 5th-highest single-game outing in ACC history, trailing only Louisville's Lamar Jackson (610 vs. Syracuse, 2016), Clemson's Deshaun Watson (588 vs. Pittsburgh, 2016), Miami's Stephen Morris (568 vs. N.C. State, 2012) and Wake Forest's Rusty LaRue (554 vs. N.C. State, 1995).

- Jones' 547 yards vs. North Carolina was a Duke single-game record, as were his 186 rushing yards by a quarterback...Matched Duke's 2nd-highest single-game total for touchdown passes with 5 vs. Temple, 1 shy of the school record of 6 set by Steve Slayden vs. Georgia Tech in 1987.

- Matched Blue Devil single-season records for most games with 3+ touchdown passes (5), most games with

4+ touchdown passes (2), touchdown passes of 20+ yards (11) and touchdown passes of 50+ yards (5).

- Named MVP of the Reese's Senior Bowl after completing 8 of 11 passes (72.7%) for 115 yards and 1 touchdown while rushing for another score in a 34-24 North team victory.

- In 2017, was a team captain...Quick Lane Bowl MVP... Recipient of Duke's Ace Parker Award, an honor presented annually to an individual who displays unparalleled commitment to the team and overcomes adversity to contribute...Started all 13 games and Completed 257 of 453 passes (56.7%) for 2,691 yards, 14 touchdowns and 11 interceptions...Had 161 carries for 518 yards (3.2-yard avg.) and 7 touchdowns...Compiled 3,209 total offensive yards...Punted once for 45 yards...Was one of 6 quarterbacks among Power 5 schools to amass 2,500+ passing yards and 500+ rushing yards, joining Ohio State's J.T. Barrett, Clemson's Kelly Bryant, Louisville's Lamar Jackson, Michigan State's Brian Lewerke and Wake Forest's John Wolford...Opened the season with 29 passes without an interception to push his streak to 202 dating back to 2016, the 2nd-longest run in school history, behind only Thaddeus Lewis, who threw 206 consecutive passes without a pick over the 2007-08 seasons...Set Quick Lane Bowl record with 27 completions and tied the game mark with 2 touchdown passes...Engineered a Duke offense which set Quick Lane Bowl records for offensive plays (92) and time of possession (38:21) while tying the game record for total touchdowns (5), rushing scores (3) and first downs (27).

- In 2016, Received the Carmen Falcone Award as Duke's Most Valuable Player...Academic All-ACC selection... Runner-up to Florida State quarterback Deondre Francois for both ACC Offensive Rookie of the Year...Finished 3rd in the balloting for both ACC Offensive Rookie of the Year and ACC Rookie of the Year by the league's head coaches... Started all 12 games...Completed 270 of 430 passes (62.8%) for 2,836 yards, 16 touchdowns and 9 interceptions while rushing 141 times for 486 yards (3.5-yard avg.) and 7 touchdowns...Set Duke single-season freshman records for attempts, completions, passing yards and touchdown passes, highest completion percentage, most games with 20+ and 30+ completions, most games with 100+, 200+ and 300+ passing yards, and most offensive plays and yards...Jones was the first freshman to lead Duke in passing and total offensive yards since Thaddeus Lewis in 2006...Became the 2nd quarterback in Duke history to post 16+ passing touchdowns and 7+ rushing touchdowns in a single season, joining Thomas Sirk (2015).
- In 2015, did not see game action.

- Originally a 2nd round (40th pick overall) draft choice by the Giants in 2016.

CAREER HIGHLIGHTS:

- Shepard has played in 65 regular-season games with 64 starts, and he started the only postseason game in which he played... Career totals include 313 catches for 3,518 yards (11.2-yard avg.), and 20 touchdowns... The 313 catches place him 11th in franchise history, five behind Hakeem Nicks. Shepard is 20th on the Giants' career list in receiving yardage; Plaxico Burress is 19th with 3,681. With 20 touchdown receptions, Shepard is tied with Reuben Randle and Bobby Johnson for 22nd in Giants history... Shepard's nine 100-yard games place him 10th on the team's all-time list, one behind Burress... Also has 22 rushing attempts for 189 yards (8.6-yard avg.) and one touchdown.

- In 2020, started all 12 games in which he played... Inactive Weeks 3-6 with a toe injury suffered at Chicago (9/20)... Shepard led the Giants and tied his career high with 66 catches – the 3rd season he finished with 65 or 66 – was 2nd with 656 yards and tied Darius Slayton for the team lead with 3 touchdown catches... He caught at least one pass in each game he played, extending his receptions streak to 54 consecutive games.

- Shepard also had 6 rushing attempts (tying his career high) for 49 yards, including a 23-yard touchdown vs. Dallas (1/3) that was his first career touchdown on the ground. It was the longest run by a Giants wide receiver since Dec. 29, 2013, when Jerrell Jernigan ran for a 49-yard touchdown in a victory vs. Washington in MetLife Stadium. Shepard was the 10th NFL wide receiver to rush for a touchdown in 2020.

- Shepard also had a one yard run later in the first quarter. He has each of the last 3 multiple-carry games by a Giants wideout. Shepard had 2 rushing attempts vs. Detroit on Sept. 18, 2017 and at Tampa Bay on Sept. 22, 2019.

- In that season finale, Shepard had game-high totals of eight receptions for 112 yards, his ninth career 100-yard game and first of the season. No other Giants player had more than 2 catches in that game. The yardage total was Shepard's highest since he had 113 yards at Indianapolis on Dec. 23, 2018.

- Shepard scored the Giants' second touchdown on a 10-yard pass from Jones. It is the first time in Shepard's 5-year, 65-game career he scored 2 touchdowns in a game.

- Shepard was the first Giants player with a rushing and receiving touchdown in the same game since Dec. 22, 2019, when Saquon Barkley scored on a 67-yard run and

a 33-yard catch in an overtime victory at Washington.

- Shepard had a season-high 9 catches, for 77 yards, including a 3-yard touchdown at Baltimore (12/27)... The 9 receptions were one shy of his career high (10 vs. New Orleans on Sept. 30, 2018)... Caught 7 passes for 64 yards at Cincinnati (11/29) and 8 receptions for 74 yards vs. Tampa Bay (11/2).

- In his first action after missing 4 games, Shepard caught 6 passes for 59 yards, including a season-long 29-yarder and a 2-yard touchdown, at Philadelphia (10/22)... Opened the season with 6 catches for 47 yards vs. Pittsburgh (9/14).

- In 2019, Shepard started all 10 games in which he played... Missed 6 games with a concussion, including 5 in a row from Oct. 10-Nov. 10... Played in each of the season's final 6 games... Led the Giants with 57 catches... His 576 receiving yards were 3rd on the team and his 3 touchdown catches tied him with tight ends Evan Engram and Kaden Smith for 3rd.

- Shepard joined Darius Slayton, Golden Tate and Engram as Giants with at least 100 receiving yards in a game. It was the first season in which they had 4 players do that since 2012, when the 100-yard receivers were Hakeem Nicks, Victor Cruz, Domenik Hixon and Ramses Barden

- Shepard had season-high totals of 9 catches for 111 yards vs. Miami (12/15)... Finished with 100 yards on 7 receptions, including a season-long 36-yarder, at Tampa Bay (9/22)... Shepard scored touchdowns at the Buccaneers (7 yards), vs. Green Bay (18 yards on 12/1) and at Washington (23 yards on 12/22).

- Shepard's 6 rushing attempts and 72 yards were both career highs... He had the Giants' longest run in 2 consecutive games with 19 yards at Tampa Bay and 23 yards vs. Washington (9/29). He was the first wideout to have the team's longest rush in successive games since Chris Calloway did it 3 games in a row from Nov. 13-27, 1994.

- In 2018, Shepard started all 16 regular-season games for the 2nd time in his first 3 seasons... Finished with career-high totals of 66 receptions (1 more than he had as a rookie and a total he matched in 2020) and 872 yards, and scored 4 touchdowns... Added 3 rushing attempts for 33 yards.

- Scored his first touchdown of the season on a 7-yard reception at Houston (9/23)... Caught a season-high 10 passes, for 77 yards, including a 2-yard touchdown, vs. New Orleans (9/30)... Had 5 receptions for a career-high 167 yards at Atlanta (10/22), including a 58-yarder that was the Giants' longest completion of the season. Odell Beckham, Jr. added 8 catches for 143 yards. It was the first game in which the Giants had 2 receivers gain at least 100 yards apiece since Dec. 28, 2014, when Beckham

finished with 185 yards and a touchdown on 12 catches, and Rueben Randle had 158 yards on 6 receptions... Shepard had receptions of 53 and 58 yards to become the first Giants player with 2 catches of at least 53 yards in a game since Oct. 16, 2016, when Beckham had receptions of 75 and 66 yards vs. Baltimore.

- Shepard caught the game-winning 3-yard touchdown pass with 53 seconds remaining in the 4th quarter at San Francisco (11/12)... Scored on a 3-yard reception at Washington (12/9)... Talled 6 receptions for 113 yards at Indianapolis (12/23)... Shepard's 90 first-quarter receiving yards vs. the Colts were the most by a Giants player since Beckham had 98 in the opening period at Tennessee on Dec. 7, 2014.

- In 2017, Shepard played in 11 games with 10 starts... Led the Giants' wide receivers with 59 catches for a team-high 731 yards... Scored 2 touchdowns... Missed 2 games with an ankle injury, 2 with an illness, and the season finale with a neck injury.

- Shepard twice set his career high with 11 receptions and had the Giants' only three 100-yard receiving games of the season... Had 11 catches for a career-high 142 yards at San Francisco (11/12) and 11 receptions for 139 yards vs. Philadelphia (12/17)... Shepard's 11-catch game vs. the 49ers was the first by a Giants player since Beckham had 11 at Philadelphia on Dec. 22, 2016. Shepard also caught 7 passes for 133 yards at Philadelphia (9/24).

- Shepard scored both of his touchdowns on long catch-and-runs vs. Philadelphia: a career-long 77-yard reception in Lincoln Financial Field (9/24), and a 67-yarder in MetLife Stadium (12/17).

- Caught 5 passes for 54 yards at Tampa Bay (10/1), the only game in his career in which he played but did not start.

- As a rookie in 2016, Shepard started all 16 regular-season games and the NFC Wild Card Game... It was the 2nd consecutive season the Giants' 2nd-round draft choice started every game; safety Landon Collins did it in 2015 (defensive tackle Dalvin Tomlinson made it 3 in a row in 2017)... Shepard was the Giants' first offensive rookie to start every game of his rookie season since Justin Pugh started every game at right tackle in 2013... He was the first rookie wide receiver to start every game for the Giants since Bobby Johnson in 1984, and the first in the NFL since Buffalo's Sammy Watkins in 2014.

- Shepard finished 2nd on the team with 65 catches for 683 yards and 8 touchdowns... Caught at least 2 passes in every game except the victory at Cleveland (11/27), where he did not have a reception... Shepard placed 2nd among NFL rookies in all 3 major statistical categories, trailing only New Orleans' Michael Thomas, who had 92 catches for 1,137 yards and 9 scores.

- Shepard caught 3 passes for 43 yards, including a 9-yard touchdown, in his NFL debut at Dallas (9/11)... He was the first Giants player to catch a touchdown pass in his first game since Beckham on Oct. 5, 2014.

- Shepard had season-high totals of 8 receptions for 117 yards vs. New Orleans (9/18), and followed with 5 catches for 73 yards and a 23-yard touchdown vs. Washington (9/25).

- Shepard was the first player in Giants history to score a touchdown and have more than 100 receiving yards in a game in his first 3 NFL games, and was the first NFL player to do it since Pittsburgh's Martavis Bryant in 2014.

- In a 27-23 victory vs. Philadelphia (11/6), Shepard caught 3 passes for 50 yards, including a 32-yard touchdown, and rookie free agent Roger Lewis, Jr. had a 30-yard touchdown reception. It was the first time the Giants had 2 rookie wide receivers with touchdown catches in the same game since Oct. 5, 1987 when Lewis Bennett and Reggie McGowan accomplished the feat in a strike replacement game vs. San Francisco. Excluding replacement games, it had last happened on Dec. 12, 1954, when Ken MacAfee and Bob Topp did it at Philadelphia.

- With Victor Cruz sidelined with an ankle injury, the Giants started rookie wide receivers Shepard and Lewis in a Monday night game vs. Cincinnati (11/14)... They were the first pair of rookie wideouts to start for the Giants since Dec. 15, 1984, when Bobby Johnson and Lionel Manuel started the regular-season finale vs. New Orleans.

- Shepard had 4 receptions for 56 yards and a 6-yard touchdown vs. Detroit (12/18), and 7 catches for 61 yards and his 8th score of the season on a 13-yard pass at Philadelphia (12/22)... Had 4 catches for 63 yards in his postseason debut in the NFC Wild Card Game at Green Bay (1/8).

COLLEGE:

- In 4 seasons at Oklahoma, Shepard played in 50 games with 41 starts... Started all 37 games in his final 3 seasons... Career totals included 233 receptions for 3,482 yards (14.9-yard avg.) and 26 touchdowns, with a long catch of 75 yards... - Slayton had 3 receptions for 82 yards, including a 46-yarder, in his debut at Tampa Bay (9/22)... Scored his first career touchdown on a 35-yard pass from Daniel Jones in the 2nd quarter vs. Minnesota (10/6), part of a 4-catch, 62-yard performance... Had 2 receptions at Detroit and scored touchdowns on each of them, 22 and 28-yarders, for his first 2-score game.

With 11:53 remaining in the 3rd quarter, his 5-yard score gave the Giants a 14-10 lead they never relinquished in a game they won, 36-20. More significantly, it was the 366th and final touchdown pass of Eli Manning's 16-year career.

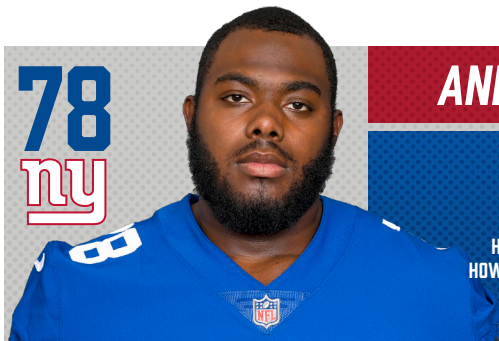

THE VINCE LOMBARDI TROPHY

The Vince Lombardi Trophy is the trophy awarded each year to the winning team of the National Football League's annual championship game, the Super Bowl. It is considered to be the NFL's most prestigious award. The trophy was originally called the "World Championship Game Trophy" when the Super Bowl was originally named the AFL-NFL World Championship Game. It was renamed in 1970 in honor of legendary Green Bay Packers head coach Vince Lombardi.

Since Super Bowl XXX, it is presented to the winning team's owner on the field following the game. Previously, the trophy was presented inside the winning team's locker room.

Unlike trophies such as the Stanley Cup and the Grey Cup, a new Vince Lombardi Trophy is made every year and the winning team maintains permanent possession of that trophy.

Each trophy is handcrafted by Tiffany & Co. master artisans at their workshop in Parsippany, New Jersey. The trophy depicts a regulation-size football in kicking position that is made entirely of sterling silver. It stands 22 inches (55 cm) tall, weighs seven pounds (3 kg), and takes approximately four months and 72 man-hours to create. The words "Vince Lombardi Trophy" and the NFL logo are engraved on the base. After the trophy is awarded, it is sent back to Tiffany & Co. to be engraved with the winning team's name, score, logo and roster if the team wishes.

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — For all NFL teams, each game is a collision of good and bad, of highlights to be savored and lowlights to endure. It is a tussle to maximize the positive while striving to eliminate the negative.

So it was for the Giants in their season opener Monday night against the Pittsburgh Steelers. They had plenty of moments to build on offensively and defensively, players who performed impressively and plays that would have brought cheering fans out of their seats — had there actually been fans in the seats.

But plenty of disappointing plays also punctuated the Giants' 26-16 loss in Joe Judge's coaching debut in empty and silent MetLife Stadium.

Indeed, all the good and the bad were on display in one third-quarter possession, when the Giants traveled 87 yards — from their own nine-yard line to the Pittsburgh four — yet inexplicably and hauntingly scored zero points because Daniel Jones — under pressure from linebacker Bud Dupree — floated a pass to Darius Slayton that was intercepted by defensive tackle Cameron Heyward — the first pick of his 10-year career.

"This is a team that makes a lot of explosive plays," Judge said. "I think [defensive coordinator] Pat [Graham] was able to limit some of the production early on, really do a good job against the run game early on, forced them to be one-dimensional, put a lot of pressure on Ben. That was good for our defense, that limited some of the exposure the guys had. They made adjustments, they're a good team, they're going to take some shots down the field. That's a very talented team, very talented offensive skill group. When you play the Steelers, you have to understand they're going to make plays."

Seldom if ever have the Giants so thoroughly dominated a second half and emerged from a game so disappointed.

Such was their fate Sunday afternoon in Soldier Field.

After falling behind by 17 points in a scoreless first half, the Giants shut out the Bears while scoring 13 points in the final two quarters. They scored a touchdown on a 95-yard drive and after pulling to within four points, gave themselves a chance to win by forcing a missed 50-yard field goal attempt on Chicago's final possession.

The Giants drove all the way to Bears' 10 with four seconds left. On the final play, Daniel Jones threw into the end zone for Golden Tate, who didn't catch the ball and was penalized for offensive pass interference, ending the game in brutal fashion. The loss moves the Giants to 0-2.

"I'm very proud of the way our team fought," coach Joe Judge said. "I'm very proud of the way they finished the game in the second half. . . . I thought the two-minute drive at the end was very telling in the fight we had and at the end with the penalty. Obviously that's something we gotta clean up and we can't shoot ourselves in the foot."

The outcome was only a portion of the Giants' bad news. This was the first game in which Saquon Barkley, Sterling Shepard, Golden Tate, Darius Slayton and Evan Engram were all in uniform together for the Giants. But the myriad possibilities that presented the offense soon dissolved.

Early in the second quarter, Barkley, the team's running back, left the game with a potentially serious injury to his right knee sustained when he was tackled by Eddie Jackson on a six-yard run. Late in the quarter, leading receiver Shepard left the game with a toe injury.

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — Joe Judge declined to offer in-depth postgame analysis of the Giants' loss to the San Francisco 49ers on Sunday, saying he first wanted to "thoroughly review the tape and go over everything we're doing."

It's safe to assume that deep dive will be unpleasant.

There's no getting around it, the Giants absorbed a bad beating in empty MetLife Stadium. Though missing nine starters due to injuries, the defending NFC champions seized control in the second quarter, dominated the second half and rolled to a 36-9 victory. It was the Giants' worst loss in almost three years.

More importantly, it left them at 0-3 with road games the next two weeks in Los Angeles (vs. the Rams) and Dallas. San Francisco won in MetLife Stadium for the second week in a row and improved to 2-1.

The stat sheet was filled with forboding numbers for the Giants. They were outscored in the second half, 20-3, and had sizeable disadvantages in total yards (420-231), first downs (29-13) and time of possession (39:44-20:16). The Giants' running backs totaled 17 rushing yards. San Francisco didn't punt once and scored on all six trips inside the Giants' 20-yard line (four touchdowns and two field goals). The Giants took not one snap in the red zone. They had two turnovers and forced none.

Nick Mullens, who made his first start since the 2018 season finale because Jimmy Garoppolo has a high ankle sprain, completed 25 of 36 passes for 343 yards and one touchdown for a passer rating of 108.9. Mullens is the first 49ers quarterback to throw for 220-plus yards in nine straight starts since Joe Montana did it in 1985-86.

So, where do the Giants go from here?

"We go back to work," Judge said. "I know it's a simple answer, but that's really the solution. We go to work, we work on the fundamentals, we improve on what we do situationally, we keep grinding on a daily basis, and we work to see the results. That's where we go, we go back to work."

If it's true that young NFL teams must learn how to win, the Giants are enduring those growing pains.

For the second time in three weeks, they had a chance to stave off defeat and perhaps earn their first victory of the season and in Joe Judge's tenure as coach with a touchdown in the final minute. Once again, they had to force their way into the end zone to cap an impressive final possession.

Two weeks ago in Chicago, they trailed by four points when they drove 50 yards without a timeout in the final 2:02. But their chance to hold a locker room celebration ended when wide receiver Golden Tate was penalized for offensive pass interference in the end zone on the game's final play.

Late Sunday afternoon, they were eight points behind when they traveled 62 yards to the Los Angeles Rams' 18-yard line with 57 seconds remaining. But on the seventh play of the drive Daniel Jones' pass for Damion Ratley was intercepted by diving cornerback Darius Williams at the five-yard line.

The Giants' only turnover of the game left them no way to escape an 0-4 start.

"Certainly, frustrating for me," Jones said. "There at the end of the game with a chance to score and go for two and tie up the game, and to not do that, certainly frustrating. So, we've got to stay at it and learn and keep moving forward."

"Obviously, we came up a little short today," Judge said. "I'm proud of the way our guys fought, I'm proud of the way they played. We have to make sure we clean up and eliminate some mistakes and keep making more positive plays going down the stretch. I'm proud of the way they fought. They are an improved team from last week, and I'm proud of how they worked last week, I'm proud of the improvement they made. We have to keep pushing on and making strides going forward."

The Giants followed a new script on Sunday but still couldn't stage their first successful ending of the 2020 season.

After scoring an NFL-low 47 points through the season's first four weeks, the Giants erupted for 34 points, 18 more than their previous season high, in AT&T Stadium. Their 20 first-half points were more than they had scored in any full game. The team that hadn't held a lead since opening night jumped out in front by 14 points.

Despite all that, Greg Zuerlein's third field goal of the game and second in the final two minutes, a 34-yarder as time expired, left the Giants with a 37-34 loss to the Dallas Cowboys and an 0-5 record.

"This one hurts, because we feel like we could have won that one," safety Logan Ryan said. "We didn't play well enough to win."

"I think it's been a tough start," quarterback Daniel Jones said. "To say we aren't disappointed would be a lie. We certainly are, it's been a tough start. I don't think anyone on this team is discouraged. We're not going to allow ourselves to be discouraged and let this start affect the rest of this season."

The Giants hurt themselves with a turnover that turned into a Dallas touchdown and penalties that took away two of their own scores. Jones and the Giants had a chance to win the game but punted after a final offensive possession that lasted only 58 seconds. The defense failed to stop Dallas at the end of the first half and the end of the game, the latter even after quarterback Dak Prescott was carted off with a compound fracture of his right ankle in the third quarter. The 2-3 Cowboys scored their final 13 points with Andy Dalton at quarterback.

"I heard Logan say it best, it's at this point in time that there's enough of this, 'We're so close, we're getting there,'" linebacker Blake Martinez said. "It's time to win, this is a result business, we need to go out there and win, get the job done, and it's time for that now."

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — Who had Tae Crowder scoring the Giants' first game-winning touchdown of the Joe Judge era?

Almost certainly, nobody. Crowder, after all, is a rookie linebacker who was the 255th and last player selected in the 2020 NFL Draft. Not exactly a combination of credentials that would prompt thoughts of Crowder's name appearing in the same sentence as "end zone."

But on Sunday afternoon in MetLife Stadium, this year's Mr. Irrelevant was anything but. An alert Crowder scooped up a fumble by Washington quarterback Kyle Allen and sprinted 43 yards to the... end zone. Crowder, who started his second consecutive game, scored the go-ahead points in what became a 20-19 victory against the Washington Football Team that gave the Giants their first victory after five straight losses.

"I wanted to dive on it bad," Crowder said. "One of my goals was to help the team and I know if I could scoop it up and get in the end zone, it would help the team, and it was something we needed at the moment."

Many players at the end of the seventh round soon recede into oblivion. But Crowder took pride in his status and with his title.

"I took it as motivation," he said. "I love the name, I just wanted to get here, get to work with my team. One of my goals for this year was to help the team in any way I can."

And that he did. The score was tied 13-13 and Washington faced a third-and-nine at the Giants' 45 when Kyle Fackrell sacked Allen for an eight-yard loss and forced the ball out of his hands and to the ground. When Crowder first bent down to pick it up, he kicked it forward a few yards before securing it and starting his sprint to the goal line.

For the third consecutive season, the Giants took a double-digit lead in Lincoln Financial Field. This one — 11 points with less than five minutes remaining — looked particularly secure.

But it proved not to be. The Eagles scored two touchdowns in the final 4:38, including Boston Scott's game-winning reception with just 40 seconds remaining, to send the Giants to a heartbreaking 22-11 loss.

It was the Giants' eighth consecutive loss to the Eagles and seventh in a row in Philly, where they held leads of 16 points in 2018 and 14 points last year.

"Ultimately, (we had) too many turnovers and penalties," coach Joe Judge said. "There are things we have to eliminate and things we have to improve on down the second half of the season. There are things that held us back tonight. We've got to give credit where credit is due, and they made plays down the stretch. We have to make more plays ourselves."

"We just have to close out the games," said safety Jabrill Peppers, who was covering Scott on the deciding touchdown. "We had chances to close out the game and we did not execute. That's all it is."

It is that and so much more. The Giants contributed to their undoing down the stretch with a critical dropped pass, a defense that allowed completions of 59 yards on one touchdown drive and 30 yards on another, and seven penalties in the last six minutes.

The Giants, who next play on Monday, Nov. 2 against Tampa Bay, fell to 1-6. Philadelphia improved to 2-4-1.

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — The Giants concluded the first half of their season just as they started it, facing one of the NFL's best teams in MetLife Stadium on Monday Night Football.

On Sept. 14, they hosted the Pittsburgh Steelers in Joe Judge's first game as head coach. The Giants jumped to a 10-3 lead in the second quarter but were eventually worn down by a team that won by 10 points and almost two months later still hasn't lost a game.

But the promise of that night devolved into an unfulfilling half-season. The Giants have lost leads, close games and, far too often, the ball. Those recurring elements were on display again Monday night in a 25-23 loss to the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. The Giants might have pulled the game out had it not been for a questionable non-call on a late two-point conversion attempt (more on that later).

The Giants' last three losses — to Dallas, Philadelphia and Tampa Bay — have been by a total of six points. And they held a fourth-quarter lead in each of them. In earlier defeats to Chicago and the Los Angeles Rams, they had a chance to win or tie the game in the final moments but came up short.

"I think any competitor that's playing in this league wants to win and wants to improve and show that by results," linebacker Blake Martinez said. "It's a results business. So yeah, it's definitely tough, and you want to go out there, after all the hard work, and come out with a win."

"You talk about closing out the games. To me, closing out the games starts at the opening kickoff," Judge said. "It's a culmination of everything you've done for 60 minutes. Again, it's never one player's mistake, it's everything collectively. There's a lot of things that go into it, it's a coach's call, it's how everything operates together on the offense or defense. It's never one play that eliminates you in a game. It's the effect of different plays throughout the game that add up."

On Monday, the Giants owned an 11-point lead in the second quarter and an eight-point advantage at halftime. But Daniel Jones threw three interceptions on the second play of the third quarter (leading to a Bucs field goal) and early in the fourth (setting up Tampa Bay's go-ahead touchdown on Tom Brady's eight-yard pass to Mike Evans).

"I think those were costly mistakes for us that I have to continue to work on and improve," Jones said.

They didn't do it in Chicago, Los Angeles, Dallas or Philadelphia, or at home last Monday night against Tampa Bay. So Sunday, when a 17-point lead had been whittled down to just three and the Giants were in danger of another late and disheartening loss, Joe Judge continually gave his players instructions that were basic and vital.

"The whole message was finish," the Giants' first-year coach said. "That's a thing you could constantly hear a player saying over and over and over. We talked about that before the game, at halftime, throughout the game and on the sideline. We have to finish the game. When we took the field, a number of times in that fourth quarter, the message was finish. The players were ready."

That became obvious. With the Washington Football Team trying to complete an improbable comeback with its backup quarterback, safeties Jabrill Peppers and Logan Ryan - both New Jersey natives - intercepted Alex Smith passes in the final 2:18, a finish that clinched the Giants' 23-20 victory in FedExField. The last two of the Giants' five takeaways secured their second consecutive season sweep and fifth straight victory against Washington.

The Giants are 2-7 and host NFC East leader Philadelphia Sunday. Their last five games have been decided by 10 points and their last four by six points. The Giants' two victories against Washington were by a total of four points, including a 20-19 victory in MetLife Stadium on Oct. 18.

"We knew it was going to be a 60-minute game like it was last time," Judge said. "We knew this was an improved team, who plays very aggressive. They did. They did not disappoint. They gave us everything. We asked our guys to finish and play 60 minutes. We saw that down the stretch. We were able to come away with the result that we were working for this week."

"It's always good when you close it out on defense," Peppers said. "The game shouldn't have been that close to begin with; we had a lot of bonehead plays that put us in that position. But at the end of the day, a W is a W. They all go in the same column. Just going to keep building off this, correct the tape tomorrow, and get ready for a big showdown against Philly."

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — To Giants fans watching the game against Philadelphia on Sunday, their team's 11-point halftime lead was either a cause for optimism or cruel irony.

A double-digit advantage against the NFC East leader was another indication the Giants are moving in the right direction. But it was just 24 days earlier that the Giants owned a fourth-quarter lead of — what else? — 11 points against the Eagles, only to see it dissolve in the final five minutes into a one-point loss. And that defeat was the Giants' eighth straight to their ancient rivals.

Those standing on the pessimistic side of the line surely felt a sense of foreboding when the Eagles took the second half kickoff and covered 84 yards in only five plays, the last a 56-yard touchdown run by Boston Scott — the same player who victimized them for three touchdowns in last season's finale and the game-winning score with 40 seconds remaining on Oct. 22. When Philly tackled on a two-point conversion, the Giants' lead had been trimmed to just three points and thoughts of another Philly nightmare were hard to ignore.

But this time, the Giants responded perfectly. On the ensuing possession, Daniel Jones completed consecutive passes of 27 yards to Sterling Shepard and 38 yards to Golden Tate. The long gains put the Eagles back on their heels and set up Wayne Gallman's second touchdown, on a one-yard run just 2:42 after Scott's score. The Giants had righted the ship and despite another Philly touchdown, went on to defeat the Eagles, 27-17.

But the game might not have ended so favorably had the Giants not quickly countered Philly's touchdown with one of their own.

"I think it's important to execute like that going down the field and have some big plays back to back to get us in position to finish the drive off," coach Joe Judge said. "With this team, we knew they were going to score points continuously, and we had to be able to answer drives. Look, we came out in the second half, I don't think we started out as fast as we wanted to, they did a good job on their part, but we responded the right way. As a team, we responded the right way. I'm proud of the way the players played it on through."

"We were confident in what we were doing all day," Jones said. "From an offensive standpoint, we felt like we were moving the ball and executing. The Eagles came out fast and scored. Being able to answer there was big for us."

The Giants' second straight victory improved their record to 3-7 entering their bye week. They have the same victory total as the division-leading 3-5-1 Eagles. But don't try to convince Judge to peak at the standings.

On Sunday – 72 hours after the holiday – Jones injured his right hamstring in the Giants' third consecutive victory, a 19-17 triumph against the Bengals in Cincinnati. With his status for next week's game against Seattle uncertain, Jones latest issue might open the door for Colt McCoy to temporarily join the starting lineup.

Asked after the game if he is confident this won't be a long-term injury, Jones said, "it's tough to say. I think we'll go back and look at it, examine it and go on from there, so that's my focus now and I'll certainly look to do that as soon as we get back."

Did the doctors and athletic trainers indicate he will be able to play next week in Seattle?

"No, you take it day by day and get back and look at it, examine it and work to improve it every day," he said.

Because the in-depth examination of Jones' leg had yet to begin, coach Joe Judge also had no definitive answers regarding his quarterback's status when he spoke to reporters via Zoom after the game.

"I don't really know much," Judge said. "I actually talked to him on the sidelines in terms of how he was. It was at a point where he couldn't continue in the game, which takes a hell of a lot. Daniel is a really tough dude. So, we'll take a look and see what it is. I don't have much more information than what you guys probably got from the T.V. at the point right now. He just has the doctors and get some MRI's - things like that are standard procedure. We kind of MRI everything around here."

Jones was injured on a seven-yard run with about 11 minutes remaining in the third quarter. He participated in two more plays, including a two-yard pass to Wayne Gallman that he threw without moving his legs, before going to the ground in pain. After he was examined on the field by the Giants' medical staff, Jones left the field and was replaced by McCoy, the 11-year veteran and first-season Giant, who made his first appearance of the season with 9:39 remaining in the quarter.

Jones returned for the start of the Giants' next offensive series. But he lasted just two plays and left the game for good after grabbing his hamstring on a pass to Evan Engram that was incomplete.

"Just felt it on that play and didn't feel like I could get a lot on it really or do what I needed to do to be effective and move the ball and throw it accurately," Jones said. "Just look to rehab it, do whatever I can to heal it up as fast as I can."

Jones concluded his day with 16 completions in 27 attempts for 213 yards and neither a touchdown pass nor an interception.

GIANTS AT SEATTLE DECEMBER 6, 2020 GIANTS 17, SEATTLE 12



The quarterback had last started exactly 14 months ago and hadn't won as a starter since 2014. The backup running back scored two touchdowns for the first time since ... 2014, including the first scoring reception of his nine-year, 110-game career.

But while Colt McCoy and Alfred Morris were two of the Giants' key offensive performers on Sunday, they could not outshine the team's ferocious defense, which held Seattle's high-scoring offense to one touchdown and is getting key contributions from numerous youngsters, including one who has accomplished a statistical feat unmatched by a Giants player in 70 years.

Something special is happening with the Giants. The resurrection of their 2020 season took another great leap forward at Seattle's Lumen Field, where they overcame a scoreless first half to defeat the Seahawks, 17-12. Numerous television analysts quickly labeled it one of the NFL season's biggest upsets. The Giants won their fourth consecutive game, improved to 5-7, solidified their hold on first place in the NFC East and pushed their 0-5 start further toward irrelevance.

"We walked in here confident, I'm not going to lie," safety Jabrill Peppers said. "Team had a different swagger about them, team had a different juice about them today because we knew if we played our brand of football, we knew we could shock a lot of people. The ball rolled in our favor. I'm proud of the way guys fought."

"This has been a fun season," defensive lineman Leonard Williams said. "I think the beginning of the season is when the team and the guys and the coaches proved to each other what type of team we really have. It's easier to be happy and see the good things when you are winning, but I feel like we all see the good things in each other and what we have, even when we were losing. That just helped continue to build our confidence in each other and build on what we have working here. Eventually, it turns into a snowball and it keeps building up. I feel like we have a real culture here now and I love the way this team is going."

McCoy and Morris each appeared in one game during the 2019 season, with Washington and Arizona, respectively. McCoy started against New England on Oct. 6, completed 18 of 27 passes in a 33-7 loss and then was inactive or did not play in the final 11 games.

He saw his first Giants action last week in Cincinnati, where Daniel Jones suffered a hamstring injury that forced him to the inactive list on Sunday. McCoy stepped in and completed 13 of 22 passes for 105 yards, one touchdown and one interception and earned his first victory in a starting role since Oct. 27, 2014, when he led Washington to a win in Dallas.

"I am just so proud to be part of this team," McCoy said. "We had zero points at halftime and the defense was playing lights-out and we rallied together and they helped me out, they calmed me down. I felt like I played a little better as the game went on. I was seeing a lot of things early. They pressured a lot and I wasn't confused on a whole lot of looks, I just was kind of seeing it too quick. I just needed to calm down, take a breath and once we started to run the football, I felt a lot better."

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — The Giants' recent good times were interrupted Sunday afternoon.

Soaring into their MetLife Stadium matchup against the Arizona Cardinals with a four-game winning streak, the Giants were grounded by an ineffective offense and lost, 26-7. The defeat dropped them to 5-8 and likely set up a wild three-week finish to the NFC East title chase. Just one week ago, the Giants earned their most impressive victory of the season, against the Seahawks in Seattle.

"I don't think we had any kind of a hangover from going out to Seattle last week," coach Joe Judge said. "I don't think that's the cause of it. Again, this game is completely independent of anything that has happened before. We simply didn't come out today and we didn't coach well enough and we didn't play well enough. That's the hard truth of it. We have to do a much better job."

They'll get an opportunity next Sunday night against the Cleveland Browns, who are 9-3 entering their dash tomorrow against the Baltimore Ravens.

Quarterback Daniel Jones, who missed the Seattle game with a hamstring injury, returned to the starting lineup, but his comfort level appeared to be less than optimal.

Jones completed only 11 passes, his lowest total in any of his 24 career starts. His 21 attempts and 127 yards were his second-lowest figures. Jones was sacked six times, tying the second-highest total he's absorbed in a game. He fumbled three times, losing one. And for the first time as a pro, he did not have a rushing attempt.

"I think I wasn't able to run like I normally do, but I felt good during the game," Jones said. "I was able to move around the pocket and do what I needed to do throwing the ball. I think I got to do better with that still."

"Something that has been very positive for our offense this year is Daniel being able to run the ball and extend some plays right there," Judge said. "He had a few today. He got outside of the pocket. He had some passes down the sideline. He had a throw away and a completion down there at one point. Obviously, you take away part of the offense in any regard, it's going to affect how everything else complements itself right there."

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — The Giants faced the Cleveland Browns Sunday night with a different play caller, different quarterback and different approach than they had last week against Arizona. But they could not get what they needed most, which was a different outcome.

After spotting the Giants an early lead, the Browns controlled the ball and the game and cruised to a 20-6 prime time victory in MetLife Stadium. The Giants, who dropped a 26-7 decision to the Cardinals on the same field last week, lost their second straight game after four consecutive victories. At 5-9, they are tied for second place in the NFC East with Dallas, one game behind Washington. The Giants play in Baltimore next week before closing the season at home against the Lowboys. If they win both games and Washington loses at least one of its final two games (vs. Carolina, at Philadelphia), the Giants will win the division because they twice defeated Washington.

“Our approach is still going to be the same,” coach Joe Judge said. “It’s going to be come back to work on Wednesday and put everything into it. We have two weeks left, but the reality is, the only thing we can do anything about is this week right here. So, we have to show back up on Wednesday. We’ll have our best week of work as a team. We’re going to need our best performance as a team next Sunday.”

The Giants faced Cleveland with a former Browns coach calling the plays and a former Browns quarterback executing them.

Tight ends coach Freddie Kitchens, Cleveland’s head coach in 2019, assumed play calling duties because offensive coordinator Jason Garrett is away from the team after testing positive for COVID-19. Daniel Jones was inactive with hamstring and ankle injuries, so Colt McCoy played the entire game at quarterback, as he did in a victory in Seattle two weeks ago. The Giants were also missing top cornerback James Bradberry, who is on the Reserve/COVID-19 list. Julian Love moved over from safety to play his spot.

“We never make any excuses or explanations for anyone who is not at the game,” Judge said. “We’re focused on the guys that we have tonight.”

But the Giants’ reality was that they were shorthanded. Judge tried to compensate with an aggressive mentality. On the game’s first series, the Giants faced a fourth down on the Cleveland eight-yard line, from where Graham Gano almost certainly would have put three points on the board.

But before the snap, the field goal unit motioned into a formation that included Gano split wide right and several linemen moving wide left. Holder Riley Dixon took the snap and threw a pass into the end zone over the head of his intended target, center Nick Gates.

“They did a good job,” Judge said. “They obviously fell off and made the coverage. Mike (Priefer, the Browns’ special teams coach) does a real good job of coaching those guys. They were situational - there was a little confusion at first, but they settled on down. We thought we had a chance at it. It was worth rolling the dice right there and playing to our defense. They made a play, we didn’t.”

The Giants stumbled out of the gate at the start of the 2020 season and are now doing everything to get to the finish line. But individual game results will not cloud Joe Judge's view of the big picture or the progress he has seen in his team over the last three months.

That was apparent on Sunday, when the Giants lost their third consecutive game by at least 14 points, 27-13, to the Baltimore Ravens in M&T Bank Stadium.

"I am not trying to take shortcuts, but we are trying to do it the right way," Judge said after his team fell to 5-10. "The results of the last three games are what they are. We are paid to win games. That is what it is, professional football. We have to do a better job coaching, better job playing, we have to do more things to help us win the games. Ultimately, in terms of the character of the team, the work ethic of the team, the toughness of the team, we have the right start to who we are working with and the direction we are going right now. We just need to make sure we do more on the field to get the tangible results."

They didn't get them Sunday, particularly in a first half dominated by the 10-5 Ravens. The Giants owned the ball for only 24:51 and were outgained, 432-269. Baltimore rushed for 249 yards, the most yardage on the ground allowed by the Giants in more than six years. The Giants did not record a sack for the first time in 19 games and converted only one of 10 third-down opportunities.

"Obviously, we didn't do well enough to get the job done today," Judge said. "We give credit to Baltimore. It is a well-coached football team. They are very talented. They play very hard, and it presents a number of issues that we start the game faster and handle it on all phases of the ball. I am proud of the way our guys fought."

Despite their record, the Giants will have a chance to win the NFC East title next week, when they host the Dallas Cowboys in their season finale.

Victories on Sunday by Carolina in Washington and the Cowboys against Philadelphia left Washington and Dallas tied for first place with 6-9 records. The Giants are a game behind. The Eagles were eliminated.

Because it twice defeated the Cowboys, Washington controls its destiny and will win the division with a victory next week in Philadelphia. But if the Giants beat Dallas and Washington loses to the Eagles, there will be a three-way tie atop the NFC East. The Giants would then win the division by virtue of their 3-1 head-to-head record against Washington and Dallas.

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — They did what was necessary to live another day, but for the Giants' season to continue they need help from the Philadelphia Eagles tonight.

The Giants concluded their regular season Sunday with a wire-to-wire 23-19 victory against the Dallas Cowboys in chilly and damp MetLife Stadium. The triumph, which broke a three-game losing streak and was their first against Dallas in eight meetings, improved their record to 6-10.

That will be good enough to win the NFC East championship if the Washington Football Team loses tonight to the Eagles in Lincoln Financial Field. Should that happen, the Giants will be the first six-win playoff team in NFL history, earn their first division title since 2011 and first postseason berth since 2016 and host the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in an NFC Wild Card Game next week.

And if it doesn't, the Giants will still feel good about their season.

"My words for the team at the end of the day was how proud I was that they kept playing," said coach Joe Judge, who led the team out of 0-5 and 1-7 starts. "What they've been able to do, sticking together as a team, all the progress we've made. And ultimately, whatever happens tonight, just be ready to come into work tomorrow and do whatever we have to do. Make the right decisions tonight, make sure we're prepared that if something goes our way, that we're ready to go ahead and play next week. But we'll let tonight take care of itself. We had opportunities for 16 weeks. We came in today, it was a meaningful game, put us in position to have a chance, our guys went out and took care of business, so we'll see what happens in the other game."

"Regardless of what happens tonight, I feel like we won the division," safety Logan Ryan said. "I feel like we swept Washington. I feel like at the first Cowboys game (a 37-34 loss), they had a great play at the end of the game to get them in field goal range and we kind of let that happen. We came back and avenged that with a great play on our end (today). The Philly game, it was a similar thing; we failed in a dramatic fashion in the end. Our two-minute defense was being questioned. Our third-down defense was being questioned, and we came back and pretty much handled Philly the second time. I can't talk too bad about Philly because I'm a Philly fan today. I need all my South Jersey people to flap their wings tonight, so I won't beat up Philly too bad. Other than that, I feel like we're the best team in the division. We definitely deserve to represent the NFC East. We controlled what we could control today."

HISTORY OF THE NEW YORK GIANTS

The city of New York was introduced to professional football on the same day that the city was introduced to the New York Giants. It was a clear sunny October afternoon in 1925 when the Giants took the field to play against the Frankford Yellow Jackets. The Giants lost their home debut by the score of 14-0 to lower their record to 0-3 after opening with two losses on the road. But more importantly, the New York Giants and professional football had arrived.

Tim Mara, a bookmaker (legal at the time) and successful businessman and promoter, purchased the team for a reported \$500. In an era when professional football was in the shadows of baseball, boxing and college football, and professional football teams hailed from the towns of Dayton, Rochester and Columbus, league officials believed that a team in a large market such as New York was exactly what was needed to keep pro football alive.

The Giants struggled financially through the first decade but managed to win their first title in only their third season, going 11-1-1 in 1927. With the fall of the stock market and the Depression that followed, the 1930s were not off to a great start. Tim Mara suffered substantial losses during the crash that threatened the existence of the Giants. With that fear in mind, Tim Mara handed control of the franchise over to his two sons, Jack Mara, who was twenty-two, and Wellington, who was fourteen. Wellington Mara became the youngest owner of a football team and began his storied career as a major player in the Giants organization.

In 1934 the Giants beat the Chicago Bears, 30-13, in nine-degree temperatures at the Polo Grounds in a game that has become famous as the "Sneakers Game." With the Giants trailing 10-3 at the half, head coach Steve Owen provided his squad with basketball shoes to increase traction on the icy turf. The team responded with four touchdowns in the second half to turn the game into a Giants rout.

If there ever were a time for the National Football League and the New York Giants to fold, it would have come during the years of World War II. The NFL decided to

continue during the war despite losing players to military service. Many of the players that stayed behind were older players that were past their prime. Low attendance forced some teams to fold and other teams like the Philadelphia Eagles and the Pittsburgh Steelers to merge into one team. Fortunately, the New York Giants were able to survive the war years and managed to reach three NFL championship games during the 1940s.

The 1950s were filled with Giants players that would become household names and help bring football to a playing field equal to other spectator sports. With the growing interest

in professional football, the Giants continued to make strides to attract the most talented players from the college level. By the time the decade was over, Kyle Rote, Eddie Price, Rosie Brown, Frank Gifford, Sam Huff and Tom Landry would send the Giants and professional football into a new era.

The 1960s marked a decade of change for the Giants. Since they were founded in 1925, the Giants had been a talented team filled with success. The 1960s marked a turning point for our country as well as the Giants. After reaching the title games of 1961, 1962, and 1963 the Giants were hit with injuries and a series of retirements to key players that sent the team through a period of mediocrity.

The Giants in the 1970s could best be described as a team in transition. The team called four different stadiums home, played in three different states, and did not play in one postseason game. Teams like the Green Bay Packers, Chicago Bears, and Giants, so strong in the NFL's formative years, gave way to new powers like Dallas, Pittsburgh and Minnesota.

The Giants ended almost two decades of losing with one of their most prosperous decades in the 1980s. After finishing in last place or next-to-last eight times in the 1970s, the Giants appeared in three wild card games and won two NFC East division titles. Through the draft and key trades, the Giants slowly built a winning program. By 1986 the championship pieces fit together

WHY GIANTS? HOW THE NEW YORK FOOTBALL GIANTS GOT ITS NAME

Owner Tim Mara "borrowed" the Giants' name from the city's Major League Baseball team of the same name. This was not unusual among early day pro football franchises. At one time or another there were NFL franchises named the New York Yankees, Brooklyn Dodgers, Cleveland Indians, Cincinnati Reds, and Detroit Tigers.

and the team was back on top with their first Super Bowl appearance and their first world championship since 1956.

The Giants were back on top of the NFL in 1990, winning their second Super Bowl in a dramatic 20-19 win over the Buffalo Bills. The next two years were filled with coaching changes, quarterback controversies, and a step back into the middle of the pack of the National Football League.

In February, 1991, less than a month after winning their second Super Bowl, it was announced that after 66 years of ownership by the Mara family, a 50% interest in the club had been sold to Preston Robert Tisch by Tim Mara. A native of New York City and a lifelong Giants fan, Tisch is one of the country's most successful businessmen.

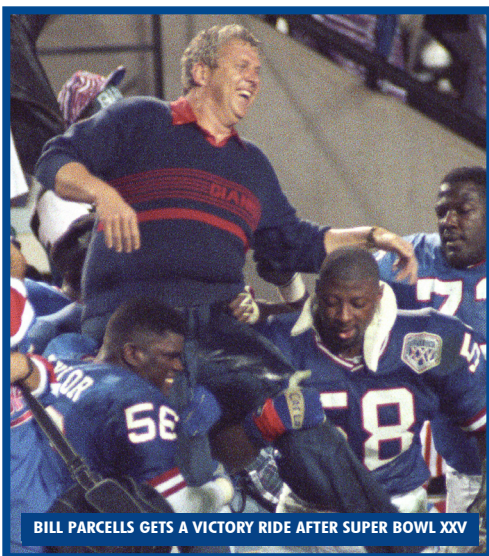
Dan Reeves was hired as coach before the start of the 1993 season, and he helped bring the Giants back into Super Bowl contention. The Giants finished their first season under Reeves tied with the Detroit Lions for the best turnaround in football, going from 6-10 to 11-5. Reeves was named the NFL Coach of the Year by the Associated Press and others for his efforts.

On January 15, 1997, a new chapter in Giants history began when Jim Fassel was named the 15th head coach. In the first season under Fassel's leadership, the Giants captured the NFC East Championship with a 10-5-1 record. The Giants finished the 1997 season with a 7-0-1 Division record to become the first team ever to go undefeated in NFC East Division play. The Giants fell short of a playoff berth in 1998 after overcoming a 3-7 start to finish with an 8-8 record. The Giants were 7-9 in 2000.

In 2000, the Giants returned to the upper echelon of the NFL. They won the NFC East title and earned home field advantage throughout the playoffs with a 12-4 regular season record. The Giants then beat Philadelphia in the divisional playoffs and routed Minnesota, 41-0, in the NFC Championship Game to advance to the Super Bowl for the third time. But they failed to win the game for the first time, falling to the Baltimore Ravens.

The Giants slipped to 7-9 in 2001, losing their last two games to fall out of playoff contention. In 2002, the Giants won their final four regular season games, including an overtime thriller in the regular season finale against Philadelphia, to clinch a wild card playoff berth. In the third period of the postseason game in San Francisco, the Giants led the 49ers, 38-14. But San Francisco rallied for a 39-38 victory.

Because of their impressive stretch run, the Giants began the 2003 season with high hopes. At midseason, they were in the thick of the playoff race with a 4-4 record. But a second-half collapse against Atlanta set the

tone for an eight-game, season-ending losing streak. With two games remaining, the Giants announced that Fassel would not return. On Jan. 6, 2004, Tom Coughlin, a highly-successful head coach at Boston College and with the Jacksonville Jaguars, and a former Giants assistant, was hired as the 16th head coach in Giants history.

In the 2004 NFL Draft, the Giants traded for quarterback Eli Manning, who started the final seven games of his rookie season. The Giants were 6-10 in Coughlin's first year at the helm. In 2005, Manning started every game and the Giants were 11-5 and earned their first playoff berth since 2002 and their first NFC East championship since 2000. The first-place finish was an NFL-record 21st in franchise history. Five Giants were elected to the Pro Bowl, the team's largest contingent since the 1990 Super Bowl champions sent seven. The group was led by running back Tiki Barber, who was second in the NFL in rushing with a team-record 1,860 yards. Barber's 2,390 total yards were the second-highest total in league history. The Giants finished 8-8 in 2006, but made the playoffs as a wild card.

The 2007 season began inauspiciously, with losses in the first two games, but ended as one of the greatest seasons in Giants history. The Giants clinched an NFC Wild Card postseason berth with a victory in Buffalo in their 15th game. The following week, they narrowly lost to the undefeated New England Patriots in the regular season finale to finish 10-6. What followed was one of the greatest postseason runs in NFL history, one that culminated with an upset of the Patriots in an exhilarating Super Bowl XLII. Along the way, the Giants set an NFL

single-season record with 11 consecutive victories away from their home stadium.

The Giants, seeded fifth in the conference, opened postseason play with a 24-14 Wild Card victory at Tampa Bay. Brandon Jacobs scored two touchdowns for the Giants. The following week, the Giants avenged two regular season defeats with a 21-17 triumph over the Cowboys in Dallas in a divisional playoff. Amani Toomer caught two touchdown passes, Jacobs scored on a short run and the defense limited the high-scoring Cowboys to three second-half points.

The Giants captured the conference title with a thrilling 23-20 overtime triumph over the Green Bay Packers in frigid Lambeau Field. The temperature at game time was minus-one degree with a wind-chill factor of minus-23, making it the coldest game in Giants history. Lawrence Tynes — who missed his previous two attempts, including one on the final play of regulation — kicked a 47-yard field goal 2:35 into overtime for the victory. The field goal was set up by Corey Webster's interception of the last pass of Brett Favre's career. Brandon Jacobs and Ahmad Bradshaw scored touchdowns for the Giants and Tynes added field goals of 29 and 37 yards.

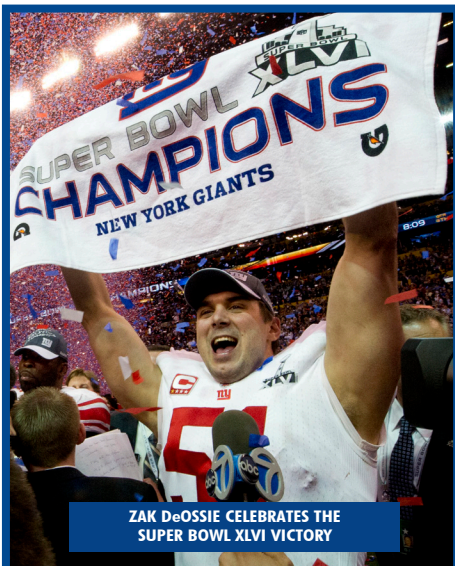
Super Bowl XLII was played in University of Phoenix Stadium in Glendale, Ariz. The Giants were heavy underdogs to a New England team that was 18-0 and was bidding to conclude the second perfect season in NFL history. But it was

the Giants who enjoyed a perfect finish. Trailing, 7-3, entering the fourth quarter, they took their first lead of the game on Manning's five-yard touchdown pass to David Tyree. The score was set up by a 45-yard catch-and-run by rookie tight end Kevin Boss. New England took a 14-10 lead on a six-yard touchdown pass from Tom Brady to Randy Moss with just 2:42 remaining.

The Giants took possession at their own 17 with 2:39 left in the game and Manning proceeded to lead them on one of the great drives in NFL postseason history. The highlight of the 12-play, 83-yard march occurred on third-and-five from the Giants' 44. Manning somehow eluded the grasp of the rushing Patriots line and threw downfield for Tyree, who somehow secured the ball against his helmet for a miracle 32-yard gain. Steve Smith picked up a critical first down before Manning threw the game-winning 13-yard touchdown pass to Plaxico Burress with just 35 seconds remaining. The Giants stopped a desperate last New England possession and won their third Super Bowl in one of the biggest upsets in the game's history.

In 2011, the Giants again won the Super Bowl under very similar circumstances, using a last-minute touchdown to defeat New England, 21-17, in Super Bowl XLVI in Indianapolis. Once again, the Giants shocked the football public by winning the Vince Lombardi trophy. After a home loss to Washington on Dec. 18, their record was 7-7. A loss in either of their final two regular season games would have eliminated them from the playoffs. But they defeated the Jets, 29-14, as the visiting team before routing Dallas on New Year's Night, 31-14, to clinch the NFC East title.

Seeded fourth, the Giants opened the postseason

with their third consecutive convincing victory in MetLife Stadium, a 24-2 triumph over the Atlanta Falcons in an NFC Wild Card Game. The following week, Manning threw for 330 yards and three touchdowns, including a Hail Mary to Hakeem Nicks on the final play of the first half, and the Giants crushed the top-seeded and defending champion Green Bay Packers, 37-20, in Lambeau Field. That advanced the Giants to the NFC Championship Game in San Francisco, where they had lost a regular season game two months earlier. This time, Devin Thomas recovered a fumble on a punt return that was forced by Jacquian Williams that led to Tynes' game-winning 31-yard field goal with 7:54 elapsed in overtime and a 20-17 Giants victory.

In the Super Bowl, the Giants jumped ahead, 9-0, before the Patriots scored 17 consecutive points. Two third-quarter field goals by Tynes lifted them to within 17-15. The Giants trailed by that score when they took possession at their own 12-yard line with 3:46 remaining. Manning then reprised the fourth-quarter magic he had used to win the previous Super Bowl and seven games in the 2011 season. He immediately threw a perfect strike down the left sideline to Mario Manningham for a 38-yard gain. He completed five of six passes on the drive and 10 of 14 in the decisive quarter. Ahmad Bradshaw scored the game-winning touchdown by backing into the end zone on a six-yard run with 57 seconds remaining. The defense withstood one last Patriots rally to secure the Giants' second Super Bowl victory in five seasons and fourth overall.

In 2012, the Giants finished with a winning record for the third year in a row, but their 9-7 mark — the same record they had the previous season, when they won the Super Bowl — left them in second place in the NFC East and out of the playoffs. The Giants finished 6-2 at home, their finest home mark since they were 7-1 in 2008. They were 4-4 at home in 2011 championship season. The Giants scored 429 points, the second-highest total in franchise history; the 1963 Giants scored 448. The 2012 season was the fifth in the 88-year history of the franchise in which the Giants scored more than 400 points. The Giants scored a franchise-record 278 points at home, shattering the old mark of 248, set in 2007. They allowed an NFL-low 20 sacks. The Giants' plus-14 turnover differential was their best since they were plus-25 in 1997. The Giants intercepted 21 passes in 2012, their highest total since they had 27 picks, also in 1997.

The 2013 Giants finished 7-9, the team's first losing record since 2004. That broke a streak of eight consecutive seasons in which the Giants finished .500 or better, their longest such stretch since they played 10 seasons in a row without a losing record from 1954-63. The Giants followed an 0-6 start with four consecutive victories. They were the second team in NFL history to lose its first six games and win the next four (joining the 2009 Tennessee Titans). The Giants struggled offensively all season. They ranked 28th in the NFL in both yards per game (307.5) and points per game (18.4). The Giants scored 294 points, their lowest total in Tom Coughlin's 12 seasons as head coach. The Giants committed an NFL-high 44 turnovers. It was their highest turnover total since 1983, when they had 58 turnovers. The Giants' minus-15 turnover differential was their worst since they were minus-16, also

in 1983. The defense, ranked 26th in the NFL entering Week 6, when it was allowing an average of 395.2 yards per game, finished the season ranked eighth, giving up 332.3 yards a game.

In 2014, the Giants were 6-10, their first double-digit loss season since they had the same record in Coughlin's debut season in 2004. They scored 380 points and allowed 400. It was just the fifth time in franchise history they gave up at least 400 points. Under first-year coordinator and future head coach Ben McAdoo, the Giants finished 10th in the NFL in total offense with an average of 367.2 yards a game, a 59.7 yards-per-game improvement over their 2013 average of 307.5. The Giants were ranked 29th in the NFL in total defense, allowing 375.8 yards a game, after finishing eighth (332.3 yards per game) in 2013. The run defense ranked 30th (135.1 yards a game), while the Giants were 18th vs. the pass (240.6).

A disappointing 2015 season led to a significant change in the franchise's coaching hierarchy. The Giants lost six of their last seven games to finish 6-10 for the second consecutive season. It was their first back-to-back double-digit loss seasons since 2003-04 when they were 4-12 in Fassel's final season as head coach and 6-10 in Coughlin's first. Eight of the 10 losses were by six or fewer points. The Giants lost six games in which they held a lead or were tied in the fourth quarter. They finished under .500 for the third consecutive season, the first time that's happened since they had eight straight losing seasons from 1973-80. The Giants missed the playoffs for the fourth consecutive season, their longest drought since they went 17 years about a postseason berth from 1964-80. The day after the season finale, Coughlin stepped down as head coach. Ten days later, McAdoo was hired to replace him after two seasons as the offensive coordinator.

McAdoo's first season was a success. In 2016, the Giants finished 11-5, good for a second-place finish in the NFC East and their first postseason berth in five years. The team's strength that season was its defense. The Giants were second in the NFL with 284 points allowed, one season after they were ranked 30th by giving up 442 points, the second-highest total in franchise history. The Giants allowed 17.8 points per game, the lowest average by their opponents since 2002, when they gave up 17.4 points a game. They gave up an NFL-low 26 touchdowns (including a league-low 25 opposing offensive touchdowns) and just 15 touchdown passes after surrendering 31 the previous year. The Giants allowed less than 20 points eight times, their highest total since 2008, when they also did it eight times. That enabled them to win an NFL-high six games when scoring no more than 20 points. With a 27-23 victory vs. Baltimore on Oct. 16, the Giants became the third NFL franchise with 700 combined regular-season and postseason victories, joining the Green Bay Packers and Chicago Bears. The 2016 Giants were unable to continue their success in the postseason, losing an NFC Wild Card Game to the Packers in Lambeau Field, 38-13.

YEAR-BY-HISTORY OF THE NEW YORK GIANTS



1925

Tim Mara purchased a National Football League franchise for New York for \$500. Bob Folwell was named head coach and all-time great Jim Thorpe was signed. Thorpe was later released by the team after the third game of the season. The Giants played their first game at the Polo Grounds, losing to the Frankford Yellow Jackets, 14-0. Later that season, more than 70,000 jammed the Polo Grounds to see the Giants play Red Grange and the Chicago Bears. The Giants went 8-4 in their first season.

1926

Bob Folwell left and was replaced by Dr. Joseph Alexander as head coach. Despite an 8-4-1 record in 1926, Tim Mara lost \$40,000. After the season concluded, the seventh place Giants faced the American Football League champion Philadelphia Quakers. The Giants won convincingly, 31-0.

1927

Earl Potteiger replaced Dr. Joseph Alexander in 1927 and the Giants won their first title with an 11-1-1 record. (Note: until the NFL's playoff system was established in 1933, the team with the league's best record was awarded the championship title.) In the 13-game season the Giants defense posted ten shutouts and allowed only 20 points all year.

1928

After a dismal 4-7-2 season in 1928, Tim Mara decided it was best to clean house. Head coach Earl Potteiger and eighteen players were not asked to return for the following season. Tackle Steve Owen would be the only returning starter from that season. It still ranks as one of the most massive turnovers in football history.

1929

Before the season began, Tim Mara purchased a struggling Detroit Wolverines franchise in order to obtain the rights to quarterback Benny Friedman and the best of the Detroit players for the Giants. LeRoy Andrews became the new head coach. The 13-1-1 Giants averaged 25,000 fans, turned a small profit and narrowly lost the NFL title to the Green Bay Packers, who finished 12-0-1.

1930

For the second consecutive season the Green Bay Packers edged out the Giants for the title. Ownership of the club was turned over to Jack and Wellington Mara, the two sons of the founder. On December 14, the Giants played a team of former Notre Dame All-Stars coached by the legendary Knute Rockne. Fifty-five thousand fans turned out at the Polo Grounds to see the Giants win the contest, 22-0. The proceeds of \$115,153 went to the New York Unemployment Fund to help those suffering due to the Great Depression.

1931

After an All-American season at Washington State, center Mel Hein wrote to three NFL teams offering his service. The Giants bid the most at \$150 per game and Hein was signed to a contract. Former tackle Steve Owen was named head coach. The Giants finished in 5th place with a 7-6-1 record.

1932

Considered a rebuilding year, the Giants finished the season with a 4-6-2 record. On November 20, the Giants faced the defending champion Green Bay Packers. Expected to be an easy win for the undefeated Packers, 8-0-1 at the time, the Giants displayed promise for the future with a hard-fought, 6-0, victory. End Ray Flaherty became the NFL's first official pass-reception champion with 21 catches.

1933

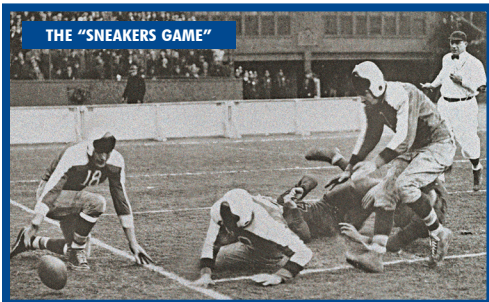
The Giants won the Eastern Division of the newly-divided NFL with an impressive 11-3 record. 1933 was also the year the NFL established a new playoff system and in the league's first championship game, the Giants lost to the Western Division champion Chicago Bears, 23-21, at Wrigley Field in Chicago.

1934

In what is now known as the "Sneakers Game," the Giants defeated the Chicago Bears 30-13 for the NFL title. Trailing 13-3 in the third quarter, some of the Giants players changed into basketball shoes to increase traction on the icy Polo Grounds turf. The Giants responded with a 27-point fourth quarter to capture the championship.

THE "SNEAKERS GAME"



1935

After beginning the season with a 4-3 record, the Giants rolled off five consecutive victories, shutting out their opponents four times, and finished with a 9-3 record and first place in the Eastern Division. The Giants advanced to their third straight NFL championship game, but lost to the Detroit Lions, 26-7, at Detroit.

1936

The initial NFL draft was held in 1936, and the Giants first pick was Art Lewis, a tackle from Ohio University. The Giants finished with a 5-6-1 record, marking only the third time in the team's twelve-year history that it did not have a winning record.

1937

Seventeen rookies helped make up the 25-man roster in 1937, a season that also marked the debut of the now-familiar blue jerseys. The Giants lost to the Washington Redskins on the last day of the season and finished as a runner-up in the Eastern Division with a 6-3-2 record.

1938

A 23-17 victory over the Green Bay Packers produced the Giants third NFL title. A crowd of 48,120 fans attended the title game at the Polo Grounds in New York, a playoff record at the time. With the victory, the Giants earned the distinction of being the first NFL team to win two championship games.

1939

On January 15, the Giants defeated the Pro All-Stars, 13-10, in the first Pro Bowl held at Wrigley Field, Chicago. During the 1939 season, in front of 32,279 fans at Milwaukee State Fair Park, the Green Bay Packers avenged the 1938 loss with a 27-0 drubbing of the Giants in the NFL title game.

1940

The Giants finished third in the East with a 6-4-1 record. Midway through the season, leading rusher Tuffy Leemans was lost for the year with a back injury. Center Mel Hein was the only Giant to win All-Pro honors, accomplishing the feat for the 10th year in a row.

1941

With just 50 seconds to go in the 1941 Eastern Division championship game, the Washington Redskins held a 13-10 lead, but the Giants scored a field goal and a touchdown to win, 20-13, and advance to the NFL title game. In the wake of Pearl Harbor, only 13,341 spectators turned out to see Chicago top the Giants in the title game, 37-9.

1942

After losing many players to the service, the Giants finished with a 5-5-1 record and in third place in the Eastern Division. The Giants recorded a memorable victory in the season opener, defeating the Washington Redskins, 14-7, although they didn't have a first down, gained only one yard rushing and completed just one pass. That pass happened to go for a touchdown. The Giants also scored on an intercepted return and handed the Redskins their only defeat in their championship season.

1943

With the league down to just nine teams due to World War II, the Giants overcame a 2-2-1 start to finish with a 6-3-1 record. The Giants advanced to the Eastern Division championship game where they dropped a 28-0 decision to the Washington Redskins.

1944

Luring quarterback Arnie Herber and back Ken Strong out of retirement, the Giants scored five shutouts en route to the Eastern Division title, but lost the NFL championship game at the Polo Grounds in New York to the Green Bay Packers, 14-7.

1945

The War ended in 1945, but the Giants finished with their worst record to date. The Giants started the year off with a 34-6 win at Pittsburgh, but everything seemed to collapse after the opener. The Giants 3-6-1 record was only one game better than the last place Pittsburgh Steelers.

1946

Quarterback Frankie Filchok, an understudy to Sammy Baugh at Washington, signed with the Giants for a reported \$35,000. Filchok and teammate, back Merle Hapes, were questioned about an attempt by a New York man to fix the championship game with the Chicago Bears. Hapes was suspended indefinitely for the alleged gambling involvement, but Filchok was allowed to continue playing. The Giants went on to lose the title game to Chicago, 24-14.

1947

The Giants went from the title game in 1946 to the cellar, finishing with a 2-8-2 record, including a seven-game losing streak. Halfback Frank Reagan tied for the league lead with ten interceptions for 203 yards. Reagan also tied for the league's punting championship with 61 kicks for a 42.8 average.

1948

The Giants renovation was accelerated in 1948 when they acquired quarterback Charlie Conerly from the Washington Redskins. The franchise reached another milestone in its illustrious existence, but it had nothing to do with their 4-8 record. That season, the Giants signed their first black player, defensive back Emlen Tunnell.

1949

Giants head coach Steve Owen switched from the "A" formation to the "T," which helped the Giants improve to a 6-6 record. Allie Sherman was hired to work with quarterback Charlie Conerly. The Giants shared the Polo Grounds with another NFL team, the New York Bulldogs.

1950

The Giants and New York Bulldogs divided the players of the former All-American Football Conference Yankees. The Giants received a young defensive back from Texas, Tom Landry, and a defensive tackle from Washington, Arnie Weinmeister. The Giants finished with a surprising 10-2 record and tied for first place with the Cleveland Browns, their first season above .500 since the Eastern Division championship season of 1946. The Browns defeated the Giants, 8-3, in the American Conference playoff game.

1951

End Kyle Rote of Southern Methodist was the Giants bonus pick in the draft, but he was injured in the preseason and saw little action. The Giants finished in second place with a 9-2-1 record, behind the only team they would lose to all season, the Cleveland Browns. Fullback Eddie Price led the NFL in rushing with 971 yards.

1952

Tailback Frank Gifford of USC was drafted number one. Playing in his fifth year, Emlen Tunnell gained more yardage on kick returns and interceptions (924) than the league's leading rusher, Dan Towler (894), of the Los Angeles Rams.

1953

Tackle Roosevelt "Rosie" Brown Jr. of Morgan State, a future Hall of Famer, went the Giants 27th pick in the 1953 NFL draft. Steve Owen retired at the end of the season after 23 years as the Giants head coach. Owen was asked to keep his affiliation with the Giants as a scout in the personnel department, a position he held for one year.

1954

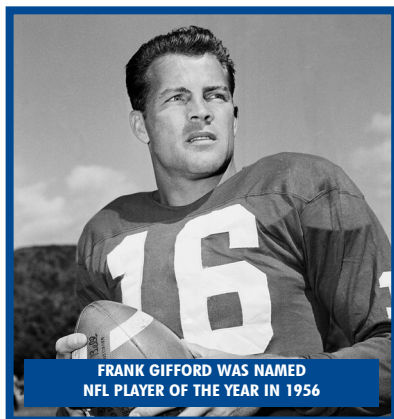
Former Giants end Jim Lee Howell was promoted from end coach to head coach. The Canadian Football League began a series of raids on NFL teams, signing Giants three-time Pro-Bowl defensive tackle Arnie Weinmeister, among others. In an effort to save the Giants and the NFL, Wellington Mara went out and signed the best player in the CFL, Montreal Alouettes halfback Alex Webster.

1955

On August 28, the sudden-death rule was used for the first time in a preseason game between the Giants and the Los Angeles Rams in Portland, Oregon. The Rams won, 23-17, three minutes into overtime. After opening with three straight losses, the Giants got their act together and finished with a 6-5-1 record.

1956

Defensive end Andy Robustelli was obtained from the Los Angeles Rams. The Giants switched their home games from the Polo Grounds to Yankee Stadium. A 47-7 rout of the Chicago Bears produced New York's first NFL championship since 1938. Linebacker Sam Huff, who was originally drafted as an offensive lineman but was switched to MLB when Ray Beck went down with an injury, was voted Rookie of the Year. Frank Gifford was named NFL Player of the Year and tackle Rosie Brown was named the NFL's Lineman of the Year.

1957

The Giants were still in the running for the title in 1957 until they dropped their final three games. For the second straight season Frank Gifford finished in the top ten in both receiving (fourth) and rushing (tenth), with 588 yards receiving and 528 yards rushing. Gifford also completed four of six passes for 143 yards and two touchdowns.

1958

After completing the season at 9-3, the Giants faced a Cleveland Browns team led by running back Jim Brown in the Eastern Conference playoff game. Brown, who had gained an NFL-record 1,527 yards rushing, was held to just eight yards by the stingy New York defense as the Giants prevailed, 10-0. Advancing to the title game, the Giants lost to the Baltimore Colts, 23-17, in the first sudden death overtime in an NFL championship game. That game has been referred to as, "The Greatest Game Ever Played."

1959

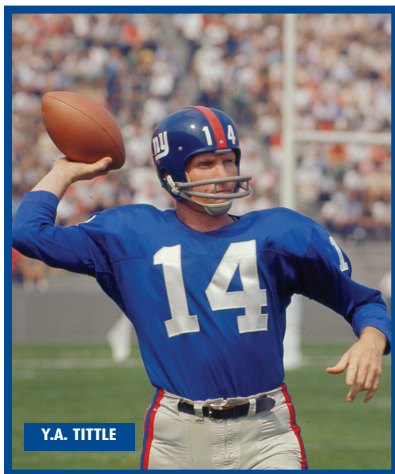
On February 4, assistant offensive coach Vince Lombardi left to join the Green Bay Packers as their new head coach. On February 17, Giants co-founder Tim Mara died. The Baltimore Colts exploded for 24 points in the fourth quarter to defeat New York in the NFL title game for the second straight year.

1960

In February, defensive coach Tom Landry left the team to become the first ever head coach of the expansion Dallas Cowboys. The Giants finished an injury-plagued 1960 season with a 6-4-2 record. Head coach Jim Lee Howell announced his retirement at the end of the season.

1961

The NY logo was added to the helmets for the 1961 season. Allie Sherman replaced the retired Jim Lee Howell as head coach. The Giants obtained quarterback Y.A. Tittle (San Francisco) and end Del Shofner (Los Angeles) in trades. Back Alex Webster gained 928 yards to help the Giants reach the NFL title game. With the league championship on the line, the Giants were no match for the Green Bay Packers, losing 37-0.

1962

Back Frank Gifford, who returned to the team from retirement, quarterback Y.A. Tittle, end Del Shofner and back Alex Webster led the Giants into the NFL title game against the Green Bay Packers. Held in Yankee Stadium, 64,892 fans watched as Green Bay prevailed, 16-7. Defensive end Andy Robustelli was named the NFL's top player.

1963

Quarterback Y.A. Tittle threw 36 touchdown passes and kicker Don Chandler led the league with 106 points (52-pat, 18-fg) in scoring as the Giants romped to their third straight conference

title. Halfback Dick Lynch tied for the league lead with nine interceptions for 251 return yards and a record-setting three touchdowns. With Tittle injured in the second quarter, New York lost yet another bid for the league championship, dropping a 14-10 decision to the Chicago Bears.

1964

Defensive end Andy Robustelli ended his long playing career with the Giants and became a full-time defensive coach. For the first time in 17 years, the Giants finished in last place in their conference with a 2-10-2 record. Backs Alex Webster and Frank Gifford announced their retirement at the end of the season.

1965

Quarterback Y.A. Tittle announced his retirement on January 22 at Mamma Leone's restaurant in New York City. Offensive lineman Jack Stroud also retired. On June 15, Jack Mara died after serving as team president for thirty-one years. The Giants rebounded with a 7-7 record, good enough for second place in the Eastern Conference.

1966

Before the season began, tackle Rosie Brown retired after 13 years of service to the team. The Giants had their worst season to date, finishing with a 1-12-1 record. They allowed a then NFL-record 501 points. Kicker Pete Gogolak became the first American Football League player to cross to the NFL.

1967

On March 7, the Giants announced the acquisition of quarterback Fran Tarkenton from the Minnesota Vikings. To get Tarkenton, the Giants gave up their first and second-round picks in 1967, number one pick in 1968, and second-round pick in 1969. Tarkenton's 29 touchdown passes led the Giants to a 7-7 record and a second place finish in the newly named Century Division of the Eastern Conference.

1968

Opening the season with four straight wins and concluding it with four consecutive losses, the Giants finished with a 7-7 record in Allie Sherman's last season as head coach. End Homer Jones became only the second Giant, behind end Del Shofner, to record 1,000 receiving yards or more in three successive seasons.

1969

The Giants lost, 37-14, to the New York Jets in the first of the annual preseason meetings. Former back Alex Webster replaced Allie Sherman as head coach. After losing seven games in a row, the Giants finished with three straight victories to capture second place in the Century Division with a 6-8 record.

1970

After losing their first three games, the Giants won six in a row, including an upset win over the first place Dallas Cowboys, 23-20. Heading into the final game of the season, the Giants were still in a position to make the playoffs, but they lost a home game

against the Los Angeles Rams, 31-3, and were left out of the postseason with a 9-5 record. Running back Ron Johnson became the Giants first 1,000-yard rusher, totaling 1,027 yards.

1971

After a disappointing 4-10 finish in 1971, quarterback Fran Tarkenton asked for a trade. The Giants obliged and traded him back to the Minnesota Vikings for quarterback Norm Snead, two additional players and draft choices. Bob Tucker became the first tight end in Giants history to lead the league in receptions with 59 catches.

1972

Quarterback Norm Snead, obtained in the Fran Tarkenton trade, led the league in passing and the Giants finished above .500 for only the second time in nine years with an 8-6 record. On November 26, the Giants offense scored eight touchdowns against the Philadelphia Eagles, setting a Giants all time one-game scoring record. Kicker Pete Gogolak added a pair of field goals to bring the final score to 62-10.

1973

Prior to the final game of the season, head coach Alex Webster announced his retirement. New York lost the game 31-7 to the Minnesota Vikings to close out the year at 2-11-1. After two games at Yankee Stadium, the Giants played the rest of their home games at the Yale Bowl in New Haven, Connecticut.

1974

Bill Arnsparger was named the Giants ninth head coach. Quarterback Norm Snead was traded to the San Francisco 49ers. In addition, quarterback Craig Morton was obtained from the Dallas Cowboys. For the second straight season, the Giants won only two games and finished in fifth place in the NFC East with a 2-12 record.

1975

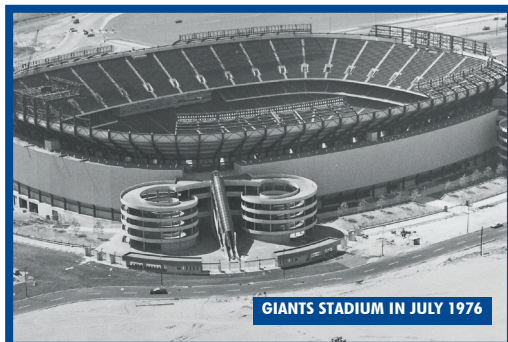
The Giants finished in fourth place in the NFC East with a 5-9 record. The team played all of its home games at Shea Stadium while they waited for Giants Stadium to open. DE George Martin made the team as an 11th round draft choice out of Oregon.

1976

Larry Csonka, the former Miami running back who had played in the World Football League, signed as a free agent. Snead was reacquired from San Francisco. The Giants moved to Giants Stadium in East Rutherford, New Jersey. Arnsparger was fired in midseason and replaced by assistant coach John McVay, who signed a long-term contract following the 3-11 season.

1977

Morton was traded to Denver. The Giants improved to a 5-9 record. McVay went with Joe Pisarcik and Jerry Golsteyn at

quarterback. Csonka rushed for 100 yards on the last day of the season and finished the year with 464 yards.

1978

The Giants had a 5-3 record at the halfway point of the season but lost seven of its final eight games and finished 6-10. Punter Dave Jennings and linebackers Harry Carson and Brad Van Pelt were named to the NFC Pro Bowl team. McVay was fired in late December. Robustelli, who had been the Giants' director of operations since 1974, resigned. George Young was named general manager in January, 1979. He announced the appointment of San Diego Chargers assistant Ray Perkins as head coach.

1979

Before the season began, tragedy struck as defensive tackle Troy Archer was killed in a traffic accident on June 22. Rookie Phil Simms, a first round choice, took over at quarterback. But the Giants had another 6-10 record. Dave Jennings led the NFC with a 42.7-yard punting average.

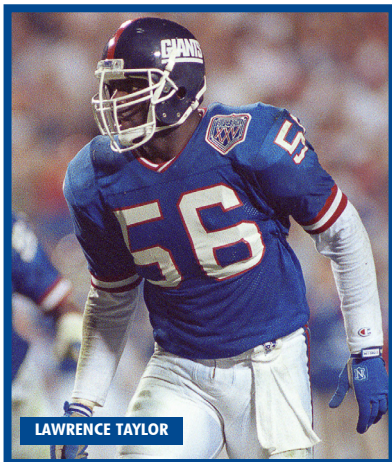
1980

A porous defense allowed opponents to score 425 points, the second-highest total in the NFL. The Giants fell to 4-12. A highlight was a 38-35 defeat of Dallas that ended an eight-game losing streak. Dave Jennings led NFL punters with a 44.8-yard average.

1981

With the second selection in the draft, New York chose Lawrence Taylor, a linebacker from North Carolina. The Giants started slowly, going 2-3, before obtaining running back Rob Carpenter from Houston. Carpenter sparked a three-game winning streak. The Giants lost three straight to drop to 5-6. Second-year quarterback Scott Brunner replaced an injured Phil Simms and the team responded with four victories in the final five weeks, including a 13-10 overtime defeat of Dallas in the season finale that sent them into the playoffs. On December 27, the Giants defeated the Eagles 27-21 in the NFC wild card game. The season ended for New York on January 3 when it was defeated by the 49ers 38-24 in a divisional playoff game.

1982

A wild and turbulent year in which the NFL players' strike shortened the season to just nine games. The final game played before the strike pitted the Giants and Packers on a Monday night from Giants Stadium in which a power failure caused a blackout during the game. Rob Carpenter was a holdout until late November, returning to play in just the final five games. On December 15, head coach Ray Perkins resigned to accept the head coaching job at Alabama, with defensive coordinator Bill Parcells being named to replace him in 1983. The Giants then lost two straight after the Perkins' announcement, and missed the playoffs on the final day of the season with a 4-5 record. Despite the adversity, four Giants — Lawrence Taylor, Harry Carson, Mark Haynes and Dave Jennings — were named to the Pro Bowl.

1983

After breaking even in their first four games for a 2-2 record, the Giants were decimated by injuries during the rest of the year, with a total of 25 players appearing on the injured reserve list at one time or another. With players such as Harry Carson, Phil Simms and Rob Carpenter missing most of the season, and with the club leading the entire NFL in turnovers with 58 on 31 interceptions and 27 lost fumbles, the record tumbled to 3-12-1. The year was also marred by the tragic deaths of assistant coach Bob Ledbetter and former star running back Doug Kotar. Four players were nonetheless named to the Pro Bowl again—Lawrence Taylor, Harry Carson, Mark Haynes and rookie place-kicker Ali Haji-Sheikh who set an NFL record with 35 field goals.

1984

With Phil Simms enjoying his first full season at quarterback, the Giants earned the NFC Wild Card playoff berth, finishing with a 9-7 mark and second place in the NFC East. Simms set three single-season club records with 286 completions in 533 attempts for 4,044 yards. The Giants knocked off the Los Angeles

Rams 16-13 in that wild card game, then bowed to the eventual Super Bowl champion San Francisco 49ers 21-10 in the divisional playoff. Taylor, Carson and Haynes were again named to the Pro Bowl, while head coach Bill Parcells was named NFC East Coach of the Year and five rookies—Karl Nelson, Gary Reasons, Carl Banks, Perry Williams and Bobby Johnson—were named to the All-NFL Rookie team.

1985

With a final 10-6 mark, the Giants put back-to-back winning seasons on the board for the first time in 22 years, won another trip to the playoffs and had their first home playoff game since 1962, winning 17-3 over the defending Super Bowl champion 49ers. Again, the club lost in the divisional playoffs to the eventual Super Bowl champion team, the Chicago Bears, 21-0. Five players Lawrence Taylor, Harry Carson, Phil Simms, Joe Morris and Leonard Marshall were named to the Pro Bowl. There were 12 team records set by this club, and 16 individual club records. Morris set team records with 1,336 rushing yards and 21 touchdowns. Simms set club marks with 40 completions and 513 passing yards in a game. Marshall added another club mark with 15 1/2 QB sacks in a season, while rookie TE Mark Bavaro, an All-NFL Rookie team choice set a club mark with 12 receptions in one game.

1986

The club's first Super Bowl championship, an all-time final record of 17-2, as well as a club record 12 straight victories, made this year the greatest in team history. The Giants also set a record for all-time composite margin of victory in the playoffs, outscoring three opponents 105-23, for an 82-point domination, the most ever in NFL playoff history. Phil Simms was the MVP of the 39-20 Super Bowl victory over Denver after completing a playoff record 88% of his passes (22-25). Lawrence Taylor was named the league's MVP. Joe Morris broke his own club rushing record with 1,516 yards, and eight players—Taylor, Morris, Harry Carson, Leonard Marshall, Jim Burt, Brad Benson, Mark Bavaro and Sean Landeta, were named to the Pro Bowl. Coach Bill Parcells was a unanimous NFL Coach of the Year in all the national polls, the Giants were 10-0 at home, including regular season and the two playoff games, and the team set attendance records at home and on the road.

1987

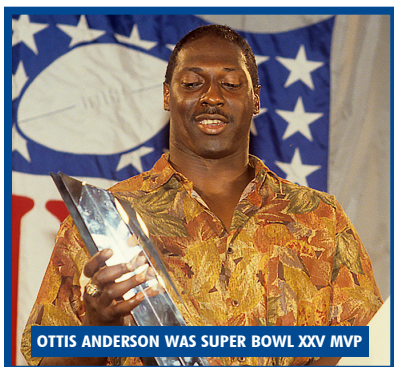
After winning the Super Bowl, the Giants dropped to a 6-9 record, thanks to an 0-5 start in a season that included a players strike and three games with replacement players. In addition, injuries sidelined 11 starters. While the Giants finished with six wins in its final ten games, it was a case of too little, too late. Despite the final record, four players—Lawrence Taylor, Carl Banks, Harry Carson and Mark Bavaro—were selected to the Pro Bowl and all four also were named to various All-NFL teams.

1988

The Giants bounced back and after splitting the first six games, engineered a 7-2 run which had them all alone in first-place in

the NFC East with a 10-5 record heading into the final weekend of the season. But an upset loss to the Jets not only knocked the Giants out of first-place, but also cost them a playoff berth. The Giants 10-6 record gave them a five-year mark of 54-32 (.628), including postseason play. Those 54 victories were the most in club history for any five-year span. Joe Morris set a club record with his third 1,000-plus rushing season and Lionel Manuel had his first 1,000-yard receiving year. Morris also surpassed Alex Webster as the Giants' career rushing leader, moving past the 5,000-yard plateau. Lawrence Taylor was named to his eighth straight Pro Bowl and All-NFL designation and safety Terry Kinard was selected for his first Pro Bowl appearance.

1989

Despite the loss of several starters due to injuries, the Giants won their second NFC East championship in four years with a 12-4 record. Ottis Anderson rushed for 1,023 yards at the age of 32 as the replacement for the injured Joe Morris and rookie David Meggett set club marks with 582 punt return yards and a 12.7 average, while also accounting for 1,807 all-purpose yards. Linebacker Lawrence Taylor equaled an NFL record by being named to his ninth consecutive Pro Bowl, and also ran his league record sack total to 104. Meggett also went to the Pro Bowl and scored a touchdown.

1990

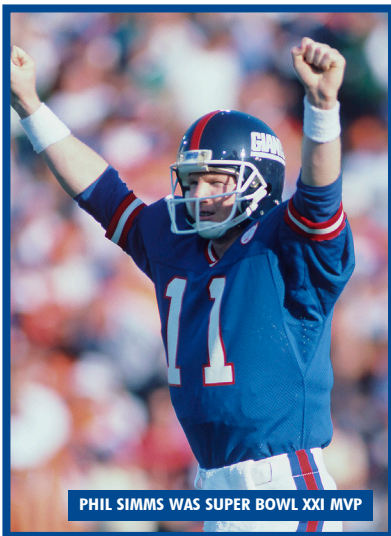
The Giants started the season by winning their first ten games, and eventually won the division with a 13-3 record despite losing Phil Simms late in the year. With Jeff Hostetler at the helm, the club surged through the playoffs to win their second Super Bowl title with a stirring 20-19 win over the Buffalo Bills. Seven Giant players were named to the Pro Bowl, including Lawrence Taylor for a record-setting 10th straight year. Veteran running back Ottis Anderson won Super Bowl MVP honors after rushing for 102 yards. At season's end, the Mara family's sole ownership ended when Tim Mara sold his 50% share of the club to Preston Robert Tisch, who became Chairman and Co-Chief Executive Officer. In May, 1991, head coach Bill Parcells resigned after a career mark of 85-52-1 and was succeeded by offensive coordinator Ray Handley.

1991

In Ray Handley's first year as head coach, the Giants were in contention for another playoff spot late in the year with a 7-5 record, then dropped three straight to finish at 8-8 and out of the playoffs. Jeff Hostetler became the starting quarterback, but was injured late in the season and Phil Simms finished the campaign. Simms added his 15th club record when he passed Charlie Conerly for career TD passes with 179. Rodney Hampton became the fourth back in club history to rush for 1,000 yards when he finished the year with 1,059. Center Bart Oates was named to his second consecutive Pro Bowl.

1992

Ray Handley's team struggled through a 6-10 season as injuries to key players hurt the team. Phil Simms regained his starting quarterback spot, but was limited to starting the first four games before an elbow injury forced him to miss the rest of the season. Before his injury, Simms became just the 14th player in NFL history to surpass 30,000 passing yards. Jeff Hostetler started the next nine games before being forced to the sidelines with a concussion. In the ninth game of the season against Green Bay, Lawrence Taylor injured his Achilles tendon that placed his career in jeopardy. After announcing plans to retire following the season, Taylor re-considered and decided to re-join the Giants. RB Rodney Hampton turned in another outstanding season, rushing for 1,141 yards and earning his first trip to the Pro Bowl. After dismissing Handley, George Young hired former Denver Broncos head coach Dan Reeves to lead the team in 1993.

1993

Dan Reeves and a rejuvenated Phil Simms led the Giants to an 11-5 regular season record. The Giants finished second to Dallas

in the NFC East race, a race that was decided on the final Sunday of the regular season when Dallas defeated the Giants, 16-13, in overtime at Giants Stadium. Reeves became the first Giants head coach to lead his team to the playoffs in his initial campaign since Allie Sherman in 1963. Reeves was selected as NFL Coach of the Year by several organizations, including the Associated Press, which bases its honor on voting by coaches around the league. The Giants earned a wild card berth in the playoffs and defeated the Minnesota Vikings at Giants Stadium, 17-10, in the Wild Card game. San Francisco defeated the Giants, 44-3, at Candlestick Park in an NFC divisional playoff game. Following the San Francisco game, LB Lawrence Taylor announced his retirement, capping a 13-year career that altered the nature of the game. Taylor was elected into the Pro Football Hall of Fame at the conclusion of the 1998 season.

1994

After a 3-7 start, the Giants climbed back into playoff contention with a six-game winning streak that resulted in a 9-7 record. The Giants came into Week 16 needing a victory over the



World Champion Dallas Cowboys, combined with a Tampa Bay Buccaneers victory over the Green Bay Packers, to win a wild card berth. The Giants defeated Dallas, 15-10, but the season ended when the Bucs lost to the Packers, 34-19. Dave Brown won the starting quarterback job in training camp and responded by leading the team to a 9-6 record in games that he started. Rodney Hampton finished the season with 1,075 yards to become the first Giant in history to record four career 1,000-yard seasons. The 1994 season was the first in many years that the Giants roster did not include Lawrence Taylor or Phil Simms. Taylor's jersey number 56 was officially retired at halftime of the Giants-Minnesota Monday Night game on Oct. 10. Simms was released on June 15, prior to the start of training camp.

1995

The Giants concluded the 1995 season with a 5-11 record, their worst mark since 1983 when they were 3-12-1. The Giants lost seven games that were decided on the final drive of the game. In

six of those games, the Giants were either tied or leading at some point in the fourth quarter. A highlight of the 1995 season was the play of Rodney Hampton, who turned in the best season of his six-year career with 1,182 yards rushing on 306 carries. Hampton became the Giants all-time leading rusher (5,989) on 10-29 at Washington on his third carry of the game, a workmanlike two-yard run for a first down. Phil Simms jersey number 11 was officially retired at halftime of the Giants-Dallas Monday Night game on Sept. 4, 1995.

1996

For the first time since 1982-83, the Giants finished with a losing record in consecutive seasons as they closed out the 1996 campaign with a 6-10 record. Following the 23-22 defeat to New England in the season finale, the Giants dismissed head coach Dan Reeves. On January 15, the Giants hired Jim Fassel as the 15th head coach in the team's history. The Giants stood at 5-7 on December 1 after a 20-6 upset of the defending world champion Dallas Cowboys and headed into a game against the Philadelphia Eagles with a chance at the NFC playoff field. In one of the lowest moments of the year, the Giants were officially eliminated from playoff contention with a 24-0 loss to the Eagles. The Giants improved to 6-8 but dropped two consecutive home contests and secured a last place finish in the NFC East for the first time in a non-strike season since 1983. The Giants defense played solid all season, but the offense struggled, finishing last in the National Football League. The Giants ground game failed to generate a 100-yard rushing performer and averaged just 100.3 yards per game, the lowest non-strike total since the Giants had 100.3 in 1964. The Giants defense held the opposition to 10 points or less in six games and had a streak of 7.5 straight games (30 quarters) without allowing the opponent's offense a touchdown pass.

1997

In his first season as head coach of the Giants, Jim Fassel led his team to a 10-5-1 record and the team's first NFC East Championship since the 1990 Super Bowl season. The Giants started the year with a 1-3 record before rebounding to become the 15th team in NFL history to finish in first place in their division the season after finishing in last place. The Giants finished the 1997 season with a 7-0-1 Division record to become the first team ever to go undefeated in NFC East Division play. Second-year QB Danny Kanell filled in for an injured Dave Brown and led the Giants to a victory over the Dallas Cowboys in Week Six. Kanell was eventually named the new starting quarterback and finished with a 7-2-1 record. His season was highlighted by a three-touchdown performance at Philadelphia in a key NFC East victory on December 7. The Giants defense blossomed into one of the NFL's strongest, finishing first in the league with a franchise-record 44 takeaways. The Giants defense led the league in interceptions with 27 and finished third in the NFL with 54 sacks. The season ended when the Minnesota Vikings overcame a 19-3 second half deficit to pull out a 23-22 victory at Giants Stadium in a Wild Card game. Fassel was named NFL Coach of the Year by numerous publications, including *The Sporting News*, which

is determined by a vote of NFL coaches. Jessie Armstead set a team-record with 134 total tackles and was named a starter on the NFC Pro Bowl squad. DE Michael Strahan set a career-mark in sacks, finishing tied for third in the NFL with 14. Strahan was also named a starter for the NFC Pro Bowl squad. At the end of the season, George Young announced that he was leaving the Giants to become Vice President of Football Operations in the National Football League office. Ernie Accorsi was named the team's new General Manager.

1998

After overcoming a 3-7 start, the Giants remained in the hunt for a playoff berth until the final week and finished with an 8-8 record. The Giants won five out of their last six games, including a 20-16 victory over the previously undefeated (13-0) and eventual Super Bowl Champion Denver Broncos. Entering the final game, the Giants needed a victory over Philadelphia, combined with a Tampa Bay loss and an Arizona loss, to qualify as the third wild card participant in the NFC playoff field. The Giants beat the Eagles at Veterans Stadium, but the Buccaneers and Cardinals were victorious to spoil the Giants playoff hopes. Kent Graham replaced Danny Kanell at quarterback after the team fell to 3-7 and finished with a 5-1 record in the starting role. Gary Brown emerged as the Giants top running back, reaching the 1,000-yard mark with a career-best 1,063 yards that included six 100-yard games. Jessie Armstead and Michael Strahan were selected to represent the NFC in the Pro Bowl for the second straight season. Armstead edipsed the 100-tackle mark for the third straight year with 101 tackles (75 solos). Strahan set a career-high with 15 sacks as he triggered a Giants defense that led the league with 54 sacks.

1999

For the second straight year, the Giants entered the final week of the regular season with a chance to make the NFL's postseason field. The difference between the two seasons is that in 1998 the Giants won five of their last six games. In 1999, victories over the Jets and at Buffalo raised the Giants' record to 7-6; however, the Giants dropped their last three games to finish 7-9. It was the team's first losing season in three years under head coach Jim Fassel. The final blow was a 26-18 loss at Dallas, a game that followed the Giants' elimination from the playoff race with Green Bay's victory over Arizona earlier in the day. In spite of the obvious disappointment, a few bright spots emerged for the Giants in 1999. The defense set records on offense, led by Amani Toomer, who established a team single-season record with 79 receptions (breaking Earnest Gray's record of 78 receptions set in 1983). Toomer fell 26 yards shy of the team record of 1,209 receiving yards, set by Homer Jones in 1967. Also, for the first time in the 75-year history of the team, the Giants had four receivers record over 50 receptions in a season: Toomer (79), Ike Hilliard (72), Tiki Barber (66), and Pete Mitchell (58). Jessie Armstead and Michael Strahan were selected to represent the NFC in the Pro Bowl for the third consecutive season. Armstead surpassed the 100-tackle mark for the fourth straight year with 124 tackles (97 solos) and recorded a career-high 9.0 sacks. Strahan recorded 56

tackles (41 solos) and posted 5.5 sacks. QB Kerry Collins started the final six games of the season after replacing Kent Graham in the lineup following the 10th game.

2000

The Giants enjoyed their finest season in a decade, winning the NFC East and home-field advantage in the playoffs with a 12-4 record before defeating Philadelphia and Minnesota to advance to Super Bowl XXXV. The highlight of the season was a 41-0 victory over Minnesota in the NFC Championship game at Giants Stadium. In their first Super Bowl appearance in 10 years, the Giants lost to Baltimore, 34-7. The Giants took a seven-game winning streak into the Super Bowl, a surge that began after Jim Fassel issued his now-famous playoff guarantee on November 22. The Giants finished 7-1 in the division and 7-1 away from Giants Stadium. The seven road victories tied a franchise record set in 1930 (when three of the road games were in Newark, Staten Island and Brooklyn) and marked the first time since 1963 that the Giants lost just one game as visitors. The Giants averaged 125.6 rushing yards a game, a robust 37.5-yard gain over the 1999 average. Quarterback Kerry Collins was sacked 28 times; in 1999 Giants quarterbacks were sacked 42 times. Collins had the best season of his career, setting career highs in passes (529), completions (311), completion percentage (58.8) and touchdown passes (22). Halfback Tiki Barber set a Giants record of 2,085 all-purpose yards (1,006 rushing, 719 receiving, 332 punt returns and 28 on kickoff returns). Amani Toomer caught 78 passes (one less than the franchise record he set in 1999). Ike Hilliard led the team with a 14.3-yard average and eight touchdown catches. The defense was second in the NFL against the run (72.3 yards a game) and fifth in points allowed (15.4 per game). In 359 rushing attempts, opponents had an NFL-best two runs of longer than 20 yards. Jessie Armstead led the team with 102 tackles — his fifth consecutive season with more than a hundred tackles — and was selected to his fourth straight Pro Bowl. Defensive tackle Keith Hamilton had the best season of his nine-year career. He was a dominating run-stopper and he led the Giants with 10 sacks, an impressive feat for a tackle. Defensive end Michael Strahan had perhaps his finest all-around season and raised his sack total from 5.5 in 1999 to 9.5 in 2000.

2001

After a strong 3-1 start, the Giants lost eight of their last 12 games and finished 7-9 and in third place in the NFC East, the third time in as many tries they failed to make the playoffs a season after reaching the Super Bowl. The terrorist attacks in New York and Washington on Sept. 11 — the day after the Giants lost their Monday night opener in Denver — made the rest of season a minor footnote by comparison. After the attacks, many players reached out to victims' families, firefighters, police officers and other rescue workers and their children. Despite the disappointing record, the season included many highlights, notably Michael Strahan setting a new NFL single-season record with 22.5 sacks. Kerry Collins became the first quarterback in league history to throw every one of his team's passes in two consecutive seasons. Collins set team marks for passes (568) and completions (327).

Tiki Barber accounted for 1,782 total yards, Mike Barrow set a team record with 135 tackles, Morten Andersen became the second-leading scorer in NFL history, Howard Cross set a new franchise record for games played (207), Amani Toomer caught more than 70 passes for the third season in a row, rookie Rodney Williams established a team record with a 90-yard punt against the Broncos and Jessie Armstead played in his fifth consecutive Pro Bowl (and was joined in Hawaii by Strahan and Ron Stone). Although they struggled with two three-game losing streaks, the Giants thrilled their fans with scintillating last-second victories over Dallas (in overtime), Arizona and Seattle. After the defeat in Denver — and a week off after the NFL's decision not to play the Sunday after the attacks — the Giants won three straight, against Kansas City, New Orleans and Washington. The winning streak was followed by consecutive heartbreaking 1-point losses to St. Louis and Philadelphia, and a defeat at Washington. The Giants then rebounded with victories over Dallas and Arizona before again dropping three straight to Minnesota, Oakland and Dallas. They played their way back into playoff contention with dramatic triumphs over Arizona and Seattle, but closed the season with losses to Philadelphia and Green Bay.

2002

An exciting and rewarding season concluded with the Giants winning their final four regular season games to finish 10-6 and in second place in the NFC East. More importantly, they earned a Wild Card berth in the NFC playoffs, where they lost a heartbreaking 39-38 game to the San Francisco 49ers. But the game did not diminish the season's many team and individual achievements. The Giants made their 26th appearance in the playoffs, tying them with the Dallas Cowboys for the most postseason appearances in NFL history. They finished the regular season ranked sixth in the NFL in total offense, with 364.1 yards a game. It was their highest ranking and most yards per game since the 1985 Giants finished fifth in total offense with 367.8 yards a game. The Giants improved to 19-5 in regular season December games under Jim Fassel. Many individuals enjoyed outstanding seasons. Kerry Collins completed 335 passes, a Giants record, and was 1st in the NFC and 4th in the NFL with 4,073 passing yards,

breaking the previous team record of 4,044, set by Phil Simms in 1984. Collins completed 61.5 percent of his passes, a career-high and the third-best percentage in team history. Tiki Barber was 4th in the NFL and 1st in the NFC with 1,984 yards from scrimmage (1,387 rushing and 597 receiving). He rushed for 1,387 rushing yards, the second-highest total in team history after Joe Morris' 1,516 yards in 1986. Amani Toomer set team records with 82 receptions for 1,343 yards and established a career-high with eight touchdown catches. Pro Bowler Jeremy Shockey caught 74 passes, the fifth-highest total in Giants history, and a team record for both rookies (shattering the mark of 48 set by Bobby Johnson in 1984) and tight ends (edipsing the 66 passes Mark Bavaro caught in 1986). Michael Strahan was selected to his 4th Pro Bowl in 5 years and from Sept. 22 through Dec. 1, he had at least a half-sack in 10 consecutive games, tying the NFL record set by Denver's Simon Fletcher in 1991 and tied by Tennessee's Jevon Kearse in 1999.

2003

The Giants endured one of their most unpleasant seasons in recent memory, losing their last eight games to finish 4-12. The Giants were 4-4 at midseason. In Game 9, they were tied at halftime with Atlanta, 7-7. But the Falcons scored 20 unanswered second-half points to send the Giants to a defeat from which they would never recover. The Giants finished the season 1-7 at home, the first time since 1983 they won a single home game. Despite their poor record, the Giants had several individual highlights. Michael Strahan led the NFL with 18.5 sacks, the second-highest total of his career, and became the first Giant to twice lead the league in sacks. For the second consecutive year, Strahan and tight end Jeremy Shockey were the only Giants selected to the Pro Bowl. Shockey became the first Giant to be selected to the Pro Bowl in each of his first two seasons since Taylor in 1981-82. Running back Tiki Barber had team-high totals of 1,216 rushing yards (the second-highest total of his career) and 69 receptions. He became the first Giant to lead the team in both rushing and receptions since Joe Dawkins in 1974. Barber finished the season as the franchise's all-time leader in total yards (10,746) and receptions (422) and is second in rushing (5,409 yards). Amani Toomer extended his own team record with his fifth consecutive 1,000-yard season. Quarterbacks Kerry Collins and Jesse Palmer combined to throw a franchise-record 616 passes in 2003. Right guard David Diehl became the first Giants rookie to start all 16 games since Mark Bavaro in 1985. He was one of 14 NFL rookies to start all 16 games in 2003. The team announced with two games remaining that Jim Fassel would not return as head coach. Fassel was replaced by Tom Coughlin on January 6, 2004.

2004

A new era dawned in Giants Stadium in 2004 with the arrival of Tom Coughlin as the 16th head coach in franchise history.

With Coughlin at the helm, the Giants revamped their roster and started the season 5-2. But the Giants couldn't sustain the momentum and lost eight consecutive games before winning the season finale against the Dallas Cowboys. The Giants finished in second place in the NFC East with a 6-10 record, a two-game improvement over their 2003 mark. Running back Tiki Barber set four significant team records and was selected to his first Pro Bowl. He finished first in the NFL with a Giants-record 2,096 yards from scrimmage. Barber was fifth in the league and second in the conference with a team-record 1,518 rushing yards, two more than Joe Morris' total in 1986. He set the record on a game-winning three-yard run with 11 seconds remaining in the finale against Dallas. Barber tied a career high by averaging 4.7 yards a carry. Barber rushed for at least 100 yards in nine games, breaking the team's previous single-season record of eight, set by Morris in 1986. Barber finished the season with 6,927 career rushing yards, edipsing Hampton's former team record of 6,897. The Giants had other standout performers: Willie Ponder averaged an NFL-best 26.9 yards on kickoff returns, the highest average by a Giant since Leon McQuay averaged 27.6 yards in 1974. The Giants finished first in the NFL with a 25.1-yard kickoff return average, the first time since 1953 they led the NFL in that statistical category. Ponder was the first Giant to lead the NFL in average kickoff return yardage since Clarence Childs in 1964. Jeremy Shockey led the Giants with 61 receptions to become the first tight end to top the team since Mark Bavaro had 55 catches in 1987. Bavaro had 55 catches that season. Shockey's team-leading six touchdown receptions were two more than he had in his first two seasons combined. Amani Toomer led the team's wide receivers with 51 catches for 747 yards. It was the sixth consecutive season Toomer had more than 50 receptions and 700 yards. Eli Manning, selected with the top pick in the 2004

draft and then acquired by the Giants in a trade, started the last seven games and finished the season with 95 completions in 197 attempts for 1,043 yards, six touchdowns and nine interceptions. Osi Umenyiora, a second-year defensive end, led the Giants with 7.0 sacks, six more than he had as a rookie. Linebacker Carlos Emmons led the team with 97 tackles (62 solo) and David Tyree had a team-high 23 special teams tackles.

2005

The 2005 season was marked by soaring success and searing tragedy. The Giants finished 11-5 and earned their first playoff berth since 2002 and their first NFC East championship since 2000 before losing an NFC Wild Card Game to Carolina, 23-0. But the Giants' beloved owners, Wellington Mara and Bob Tisch, passed away within three weeks of each other, both from cancer. Mara, an NFL patriarch who was one of the most respected and influential figures in league history, and who had been with the Giants for their entire 81-year history, died on Oct. 25. Tisch, who purchased 50 percent of the franchise in 1991, was a business titan, renowned philanthropist and nonpareil New York City mover and shaker, died on Nov. 15. The Giants were only the fifth

team in NFL history to have five different players score at least seven touchdowns. Tiki Barber scored 11, and Jeremy Shockey, Plaxico Burress, Amani Toomer and Brandon Jacobs scored seven apiece. The Giants had five players selected to the Pro Bowl, their largest contingent since the 1990 Super Bowl champions sent seven players to Hawaii. The Pro Bowlers were Barber, Shockey, Osi Umenyiora, Michael Strahan and David Tyree.

Barber had the greatest season by a running back in Giants history and was selected NFL Player of the Year by Sports Illustrated and a first-team All-Pro by the Associated Press and Pro Football Weekly. He was second in the NFL with a team-record 1,860 rushing yards, shattering the franchise mark of 1,518 he set in 2004. Barber also had 530 receiving yards to become the only player in NFL history with at least 1,800 rushing yards and 500 receiving yards in the same season. His 2,390 total yards were second-most in NFL history. St. Louis' Marshall Faulk had 2,429 yards in 1999 (1,381 rushing, 1,048 receiving). Barber led the NFL in runs of 20 or more yards (16), 40 or more yards

(seven) and 50 or more yards (five). His 263 scrimmage yards at Oakland, 220 rushing yards against Kansas City and 95-yard run against the Raiders were all NFL single-game highs in 2005. Barber's 95-yard run at Oakland was the longest in Giants history and broke a record that stood for 75 years — Hap Moran's 91-yard run vs. Green Bay on Nov. 23, 1930.

Eli Manning threw 557 passes this season, the second-highest total in team history. His 294 completions place him fourth on the Giants' career list and his 24 touchdown passes were the most by a Giant since Fran Tarkenton had 29 in 1967.

Jacobs was the first Giants rookie to score seven touchdowns since Bobby Johnson in 1984 and the first to rush for seven touchdowns since Bill Paschal ran for 10 scores in 1943.

Umenyiora was selected to his first Pro Bowl and was named first-team All-Pro by both the Associated Press and Pro Football Weekly. He was first in the NFC and second in the NFL with 14.5 sacks, the highest total by a Giants player other than Strahan since Hall of Famer Lawrence Taylor had 15 in 1989.

Strahan was third in the NFC with 11.5 sacks. He and Umenyiora combined for 26 sacks, the most by any pair of NFL teammates.

Jay Feely led all NFL kickers with a team-record and career-high 148 points, the first Giants kicker to hold the top spot since Dan Chandler in 1963 (106 points). Jeff Feagles played in all 16 games for the 18th consecutive season (third with the Giants). On Nov. 27 in Seattle, Feagles played in his 283rd consecutive game, a new NFL record. Former Minnesota defensive end Jim Marshall had held the old mark of 282 since retiring in 1979.

Tyree was selected to his first Pro Bowl despite missing three games with an elbow injury, the Giants' first special teams player chosen since Reyna Thompson in 1990.

2006

The Giants finished 8-8 and earned their second consecutive postseason berth, the first time they accomplished that feat since 1989-90. The record was incongruously fashioned with a 3-5 home record and a 5-3 mark away from Giants Stadium.

Tiki Barber ended his record-setting career by rushing for 1,662 yards and catching 58 passes. Eli Manning was tied for fourth in the NFL with 24 touchdown passes. Tight end Jeremy Shockey led the team with 66 receptions and was voted to the Pro Bowl for the fourth time in his five-year career. Plaxico Burress caught 10 touchdown passes, the most by a Giant in 26 years, and was right behind Shockey with 63 catches. Linemen Chris Snee, David Diehl, Shaun O'Hara and Kareem McKenzie played solidly while missing just two games among them.

Defensively, middle linebacker Antonio Pierce led the Giants with 159 tackles (38 more than anyone else on the team), including 93 solo. He was selected to play in his first Pro Bowl as an injury replacement for Brian Urlacher. Safeties Gibril Wilson and Will Demps had 121 and 116 tackles, respectively. Osi Umenyiora led the team in sacks for the third consecutive year (despite missing five games) and tackle Fred Robbins had a solid all-around season.

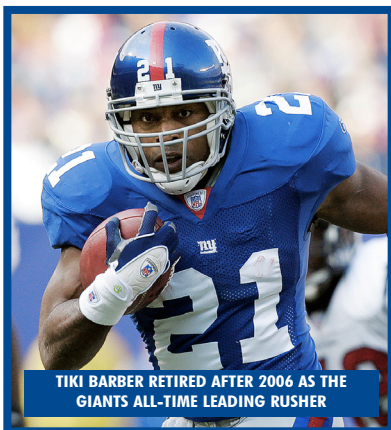
On the debit side, the Giants were never at full strength in the second half of the season because several key players suffered injuries that forced them to go on injured reserve. The group included wide receiver Amani Toomer (knee), seven-time Pro Bowl defensive end Michael Strahan (Lisfranc foot sprain), left tackle Luke Petitgout, three-time Pro Bowl linebacker LaVar Arrington, reserve defensive end Justin Tuck and, late in the year, return specialist Chad Morton.

2007

The 2007 season was one of the most successful, rewarding and memorable in franchise history.

The Giants stumbled to a 0-2 start — then fell behind by two touchdowns at halftime of their third game — before beginning a remarkable turnaround. They rallied to win that game, 14 of their next 18 and concluded the season with an exhilarating and unforgettable 17-14 victory over the New England Patriots in Super Bowl XLII. It was one of the greatest upsets and most exciting championship games in the long history of the National Football League.

Eli Manning threw the game-winning 13-yard touchdown pass to Plaxico Burress with just 35 seconds remaining, giving the Giants a victory over a New England team that entered the



game with an 18-0 record, including a three-point win over the Giants in the regular season finale. After New England had taken a 14-10 lead with just 2:42 remaining in the fourth quarter, Manning completed five passes on an 83-yard drive — including a 32-yarder on the greatest play in Super Bowl history, when he slipped the dutches of the Patriots' pass rusher and threw down field to David Tyree, who somehow secured the ball against his helmet and away from safety Rodney Harrison.

Two days after bringing the Vince Lombardi Trophy back to the metropolitan area, the Giants were lauded by more than a million fans at a ticker tape parade up Manhattan's famed Canyon of Heroes, and later at a rally in Giants Stadium.

The Giants triumphed for the third time in four Super Bowl appearances, won their sixth title game and seventh overall championship. They won Super Bowls following the 1986, 1990 and 2007 seasons, NFL Championship Games in 1934, 1938 and 1956 and the league title in 1927, before the advent of championship games.

But this title was the most improbable of all. The Giants were just the fourth team to start a season 0-2 and reach the Super Bowl (and the third to win it). They finished the regular season at 10-6 and became the first six-loss team to win the Super Bowl since the 1988 San Francisco 49ers. The Giants won just three home games — none after October 21 — to become the first team with a losing home record to ever make the Super Bowl. The Giants were the fifth wild card team — and first from the NFC — to win the Super Bowl. They were the third team to reach the Super Bowl by winning three road playoff games, the second such team to win the Super Bowl and the first from the NFC. The Giants sent an NFL single-season record with 11 consecutive victories away from home (seven regular season, four postseason, including the Super Bowl). Many individuals enjoyed outstanding seasons, games or moments. Eli Manning started every game and threw for 3,336 yards and 23 touchdowns to become the first Giants quarterback since Phil Simms (1984-86) to top 3,000 yards and 20 touchdown passes in each of three consecutive seasons. Brandon Jacobs rushed for 1,009 yards despite missing five games and most of a sixth with injuries. Burress was

unable to practice virtually the entire season because of an ankle injury, but led the team with 70 receptions for 1,025 yards and 12 touchdowns, the highest total by a Giants receiver since Homer Jones had 13 in 1967. Amani Toomer caught 59 passes and became the franchise's all-time leader in receptions with 620. The offensive line — and fullback Madison Hedgecock, acquired off waivers after he was cut by St. Louis — played well throughout the year, a big reason the Giants finished fourth in the NFL in rushing yards, averaging 134.3 a game.

Under new coordinator Steve Spagnuolo, the defense ranked seventh in the NFL, allowing 305.0 yards a game. The Giants led the NFL with 53.0 sacks and set a franchise record with 12 in a victory over Philadelphia on Sept.

30. Osi Umenyiora was third in the NFC and fifth in the NFL with 13.0 sacks and was the lone Giant voted to the Pro Bowl. Justin Tuck became a force on the defensive line and had 10.0 sacks. Michael Strahan, in the final season of his great career, added 9.0 sacks and moved to fifth on the NFL's career list with 141.5. Middle linebacker Antonio Pierce led the Giants with 116 tackles (63 solo). Corey Webster stepped up to play superbly in the playoffs. R.W. McQuarters has intercepted a pass in each of the first three postseason games.

The special teams also played well. Punter Jeff Feagles was one of the NFL's most effective punters in the 20th season of his remarkable career. Kicker Lawrence Tynes, acquired in an offseason trade with Kansas City, succeeded on 23 of 27 field goal attempts and booted the game-winning 47-yarder in overtime in the NFC Championship Game. Domenik Hixon, acquired off waivers in October, became the primary kickoff returner late in the season and brought one back 74 yards for a touchdown in the regular season game against the Patriots.

2008

When the 2008 NFL season began, the Giants had the Vince Lombardi Trophy on display in their lobby and legions of skeptics and doubters who were convinced they had won it more through luck and timing than skill. A popular refrain was that the Giants had simply become a hot team at the right time in the 2007 playoffs. For evidence, the disbelievers cited the Giants' stirring Super Bowl XLII victory over the previously-undefeated New England Patriots. When it was time to make predictions for the 2008 season, most prognosticators placed the Giants second or third in the NFC East.

But the Giants proved them all wrong. No, they didn't win another Super Bowl. But they did capture the division title and the No. 1 seed in the NFC playoffs. They started the season 11-1 and winning 12 regular season games, they became only the fifth defending Super Bowl champion to win more games the season following a championship than they did on their way to winning the title (not counting the strike-shortened 1982 season).

The Giants achieved their success despite losing several key

players from the 2007 championship team, including seven-time Pro Bowl defensive end Michael Strahan (retirement), two-time Pro Bowl defensive end Osi Umenyiora (knee injury suffered in the preseason), four-time Pro Bowl tight end Jeremy Shockey (traded to New Orleans) and wide receiver Plaxico Burress, (who did not play in the season's final month after he was wounded in an accidental shooting).

The day after the season ended with a loss to the Philadelphia Eagles in an NFC Divisional Playoff Game, Coach Tom Coughlin addressed many of the issues that had been raised in training camp.

"What I thought I would start with this morning is to think back to last spring and last summer when all of your questions concerned how this team would respond to winning the Super Bowl," Coughlin said. "Would they be, for lack of a better word, satisfied? Would they be as hungry coming into training camp and beyond training camp as they were in working our way to a Super Bowl championship? I think that our team responded and answered that question. I think we came out, we transitioned, we bridged from the Super Bowl year to the next season very well. Our competitiveness was there, our fire, our attempt to take the success of the Super Bowl season on into the next season was very successful. We were 11-1 and we did come out of camp and play very, very well for a very long time. We, of course, played well and the record stood for that. We didn't finish the season as well as we would have liked to, but I think we answered the questions of what this team was about."

"Twelve and five is not a bad season," general manager Jerry Reese said. "When you set the bar high like that and then all of sudden you get eliminated in the second round it stings. Overall, we had a real good season. It's not where we want it to be, but we said we wanted to be the organization that put our team in position to win the Super Bowl every year. For the last couple of years we have been able to put our team in position to do that. We fell short this time."

The loss to Philadelphia did not mitigate the achievements of a successful regular season. The Giants were one of only two teams to finish in the top nine in both the NFL's offensive and defensive rankings. They rushed for an NFL-leading and

franchise record 2,518 yards and also topped the league with a Giants-best 5.0 yards per carry. The Giants were the first team since 1985 to have two running backs rush for 1,000 yards each (Brandon Jacobs and Derrick Ward).

Seven Giants were selected to the NFC Pro Bowl team: quarterback Eli Manning, center Shaun O'Hara, guard Chris Snee, defensive end Justin Tuck, punter Jeff Feagles and kicker John Carney. Two weeks before the game, long-snapper Zak DeOssie was added as the NFC's need player.

Snee and Tuck were named first-team All-Pro by the Associated Press and fullback Madison Hedgecock, O'Hara and Carney finished second in the voting at their positions. O'Hara, Hedgecock and defensive tackle Fred Robbins were named first-team All-Pro by Sports Illustrated and O'Hara and Snee were selected to The Sporting News' All-Pro first team.

The Giants opened their season at home against NFC East rival Washington in the traditional Thursday night opener showcasing the previous season's Super Bowl champions.

Before the game, the Giants' three Super Bowl championship teams were honored during an inspiring and exciting pre-game ceremony that featured a surprise appearance by Michael Strahan.

A huge inflatable replica of the Lombardi Trophy was wheeled out to midfield as the stadium video boards showed highlights from Super Bowls XXI and XXV. Bob Papa, the voice of the Giants, then introduced the players from those teams that were in attendance: Hall of Famer Harry Carson, Stacy Robinson, Karl Nelson, Brad Benson, Bill Ard, Howard Cross, Rodney Hampton, Otis Anderson, Carl Banks and Mark Bavaro.

"Giants Stadium, you thought I was never coming back," said Strahan, who had announced his retirement three months previously after 15 stellar seasons with the team. "But I had to come back to celebrate the championship with the greatest fans in all of sports. And for one final time, salute my teammates for an incredible championship run. So what I want you to do is, I want you to get on your feet, I want you to make some noise and I want you to be ready to stomp somebody out and welcome the New York Giants Super Bowl champions."

With that, the 79,742 fans in attendance screamed in delight as the 2008 Giants took the field for the first time. At the other end of the stadium, a championship banner was raised.

2009

When the Giants embarked on their 2009 season, the popular belief was that they could succeed because of the strength of a retooled defense, particularly the reinforced front, and a running game that had been the NFL's best in 2008. If a weakness, or at least a unit with multiple questions, existed, it was the untested group of wide receivers.

But someone shredded that script when the games began. The defense did not play as well as anticipated and the rushing attack wasn't as productive as it had been in previous seasons. But the passing game, with Eli Manning having the finest year of his career and record-setting Steve Smith leading a group of receivers that exceeded expectations, was the strongest facet of the team.

The Giants' fortunes unfolded in a similarly unexpected fashion. Playing their 34th and final season in Giants Stadium, they hoped to win their second consecutive NFC East title and extend their franchise record with a fifth consecutive postseason berth. The journey began smoothly, as the Giants won their first five games. But they soon took a wrong turn, veered completely off course and ultimately hit a dead end. The Giants won just three times after that burst from the gate and finished with an 8-8 record and in third place in the division. They finished out of the playoffs for the first time since Tom Coughlin's inaugural season as head coach in 2004.

The Giants were hit by a debilitating series of injuries. Safety Kenny Phillips, their first round draft choice in 2008, played superbly in the first two games but missed the rest of the season because of an arthritic condition in his knee that required surgery. Middle linebacker Antonio Pierce, a team leader, captain and the top tackler, sat out the final seven games with a bulging disk in his neck. Two of the free agents acquired to strengthen the defense, Chris Canty and Michael Boley, missed significant chunks of the season with injuries. Defensive tackle Jay Alford missed the entire year with a knee injury. Gerris Wilkinson led the team in special teams tackles when he was placed on injured reserve with a wrist injury. Running backs Brandon Jacobs and Ahmad Bradshaw and defensive end Justin Tuck played hurt most of the year and offensive linemen Rich Seubert and Kareem McKenzie were sidelined at the end of the season with injuries.

Manning finished the season with 317 completions in 509 attempts (62.3 percent) for 4,021 yards, 27 touchdowns, 14 interceptions and a passer rating of 93.1. The completions, percentage, yards, touchdowns and rating were all career highs. Manning is the third quarterback in Giants history to throw for more than 4,000 yards in a season, joining Kerry Collins (4,073 in 2002) and Phil Simms (4,044 in 1984).

Smith was first in the NFC and second in the NFL with 107 receptions, 25 more than the franchise's previous single-season record-holder (Amani Toomer had 82 in 2002) and 50 more than this season's runner-up, Mario Manningham. Smith's 1,220 receiving yards were the second-highest total in franchise history. Toomer had 1,343 in 2002. Smith joined Toomer, Plaxico Burress (1,214 yards in 2005) and Homer Jones (1,209 yards in 1967) as the only Giants with 1,200-yard receiving seasons. Smith led the NFL with 38 receptions on third down.

Manningham had a break through season with 57 catches (in 14 games) and Hakeem Nicks had 47 receptions for 790 yards, both the third-highest total in history among Giants rookies. Nicks' six touchdown receptions were the most by a Giants rookie since Johnson had seven.

Center Shaun O'Hara and guard Chris Sneer were selected to

their second consecutive Pro Bowls and tackle David Diehl to his first. Tight end Kevin Boss had a solid season with 42 catches and five touchdowns. Cornerback Terrell Thomas started every game and led the team with 101 tackles (67 solo). Defensive end Osi Umenyiora returned from the knee surgery that cost him the 2008 season to record a team-high 7.0 sacks, the fifth time in six seasons he has led the team. Kicker Lawrence Tynes scored a career-high 126 points and Chase Blackburn and Bryan Kehl tied for the team lead with 16 special teams tackles.

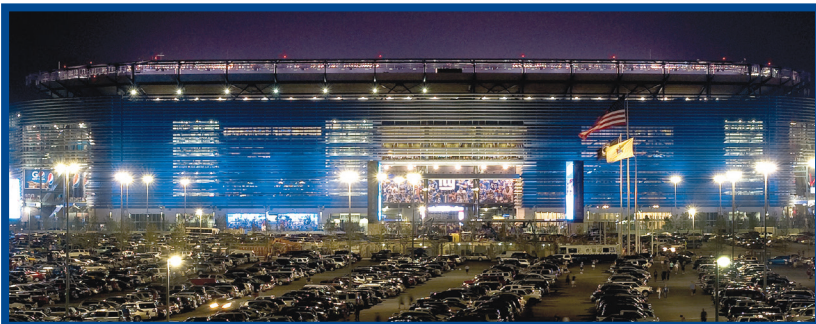
The Giants finished with a record of 155-117 in regular season games in Giants Stadium, including 4-4 in 2009. They were 7-4 in postseason games for a total record of 162-121.

Giants Stadium hosted 477 NFL regular season game played in Giants Stadium, easily the most in league history. Chicago's Wrigley Field is second with 365.

2010

The 2010 season will always elicit mixed reactions from the New York Giants.

Playing their 86th season, the Giants moved into a beautiful new home, New Meadowlands Stadium, which is located just a few yards away from where Giants Stadium, their home from

1976-2009, once stood. The Giants were 10-6, one of a record-tying 13 teams to finish with double-digit victories. They finished the season with the same record as the NFC East champion Philadelphia Eagles, the same record as the eventual Super Bowl XLV champion Green Bay Packers and the same record as the 2007 Giants team that won Super Bowl XLII.

But ultimately, the season did not meet their expectations because the Giants did not make the playoffs. Two losses to the Eagles and another to the Packers in the final seven weeks of the season first cost the Giants the NFC East title and then an opportunity to participate in the postseason. The Giants lost the NFC's last postseason berth on a tiebreaker.

The Giants ended their season with an unusual blend of emotions. They accepted their fate and took responsibility for coming up short, but they were equally defiant in their belief that they are better than a playoff non-qualifier.

"I'm really disappointed to be here talking to you guys about 10-6," general manager Jerry Reese said at his season-ending news conference. "I really felt like we had an opportunity to get into the playoffs and really do some damage when we got there, but it didn't work out that way. I'm really disappointed, even more so than last year because we put ourselves in position and that's what our goal is every year, to put ourselves in a position and we put ourselves in position and we just did not finish the job and that's very disappointing."

Although disappointed at missing the playoffs for the second season in a row, Coach Tom Coughlin had high praise for his players.

"I love this team, I love these guys, I think they're strong character people, we work together on everything, we're all in it together, we're all for one, one for all and that's the way that it has to be," Coughlin said. "It's a group of guys that don't make excuses for anything, they accept responsibility, they accept whatever takes place. They've done an outstanding job this year of adjusting to some very unusual circumstances that surround the game. They've done a good job of that. We've had a couple of huge disappointments, emotionally we weren't to where we should have been. We did come back to a certain level (in the season finale vs. Washington), but it's an outstanding group of guys who by and large are on the same page, they're focused, they come to work, they prepare themselves, they play hard, there are all kinds of personalities just like there always is, but as I said, I'm very, very appreciative of the kind of effort, the attitude, the enthusiasm, and the fact that this year's team was a very responsive team."

The Giants had many impressive statistical achievements in 2010. The offense (fifth) and defense (seventh) each finished in the top 10 of the NFL rankings. Eli Manning set franchise records for completions and completion percentage and became the first Giants quarterback with two 4,000-yard seasons and the second with more than 30 touchdown passes. Ahmad Bradshaw (1,235) and Brandon Jacobs (823) rushed for a combined 2,058 yards. Despite missing three games with injuries, Hakeem Nicks had one of the finest seasons by a wide receiver in Giants history with 79 catches for 1,052 yards and 11 touchdowns. Mario Manningham caught 60 passes, including 85- and 92-yard touchdowns. Osi Umenyiora (10 forced fumbles) and Justin Tuck (five fumble recoveries) tied for the team lead with 11.5 sacks.

But those players and the rest of the team and coaches ultimately exited the season with an empty feeling.

"Overall, I'm disappointed in the outcome of the season," said quarterback Eli Manning, who threw for 4,002 yards and 31 touchdowns, but also tossed 25 interceptions. "We thought we had potential. We thought we had players to make it in the playoffs and make a run, and we didn't accomplish that. We didn't play well enough at times of the season to make it into the playoffs."

"We had a good year," Tuck said. "Ten and six is nothing to hold your head down about. Obviously, it wasn't good enough, and we always have a goal of reaching the playoffs and going deep in the playoffs and hopefully winning the Super Bowl. It didn't happen this year, but we're not going to hold our heads about it. We had opportunities, and you try your best to learn from them. Hopefully, that's being carried over to next year and it gets us to work a little harder in running and work a little harder in lifting and propel us to where we want to be next year."

2011

Late in the afternoon on Dec. 18, 2011, the Giants trudged off the field in MetLife Stadium after a lackluster 23-10 loss to the Washington Redskins. The Giants had not scored a touchdown until 33 seconds remained in the defeat, their fifth in a six-game stretch that included a four-game losing streak. More importantly, the Giants fell to 7-7 and were one defeat from missing the playoffs for a third consecutive season.

But instead of continuing their freefall, the Giants rose up and concluded the season with one of the most inspiring and memorable runs in the 87-year history of the franchise, one that ended with a victory over New England in Super Bowl XLVI — their second championship in five seasons.

The surge began with a Dec. 24 victory over the Jets in which the Giants were the visiting team. Eight days later, the Giants routed Dallas in a winner-take-all showdown for the NFC East title. The Giants finished 9-7 and became the first team to win the division with fewer than 10 wins since the 1970 merger.

The Giants opened their playoff run with a 24-2 rout of Atlanta in MetLife Stadium. They followed that up with road victories that avenged regular season losses to Green Bay and San Francisco, the latter a 20-17 overtime thriller in the NFC Championship Game.

That advanced the Giants to the Super Bowl, where they found a familiar foe in the Patriots, the same team they defeated

four years earlier in Super Bowl XLII. This time, Ahmad Bradshaw scored the game-winning touchdown on a six-yard run with 57 seconds remaining and the defense knocked down Tom Brady's last-play pass into the end zone to clinch the 21-17 victory.

Eli Manning completed 30 of 40 passes for 296 yards to win his second Super Bowl MVP award as the Giants became the first seven-loss team to win a Super Bowl.

During the regular season, the Giants set franchise records with 6,161 total yards and 4,734 net passing yards. Manning set Giants marks with 589 passes and 359 completions. Wide receiver Victor Cruz established a team record with 1,536 receiving yards while catching 82 passes. Hakeem Nicks had 1,192 yards to give the Giants two 1,000-yard receivers for the first time in franchise history.

Ahmad Bradshaw missed four games with a foot injury, but led the team with 659 rushing yards and nine touchdowns.

Second-year pro Jason Pierre-Paul had 16.5 sacks, the fourth-highest total in team history.

2012

The 2012 Giants finished 9-7 and in second place in the NFC East. It was the eighth consecutive season in which the Giants finished .500 or better, their longest such streak since they played 10 seasons in a row without a losing record from 1954-63. The Giants finished with a winning record for the third consecutive season, the first time they had done that since 1988-90 (when they were 10-6, 12-4, 13-3).

Despite extending those streaks, they did not earn a post-season berth. The Giants lost control of their playoff destiny with back-to-back late-season defeats in Atlanta and Baltimore. They routed Philadelphia in their finale, but soon learned they were eliminated when Chicago beat Detroit.

The Giants compiled numerous impressive statistics in 2012. They scored 429 points, the second-highest total in franchise history; the 1963 Giants scored 448. The 2012 season was the fifth in the 88-year history of the franchise in which the Giants scored more than 400 points. The Giants scored a franchise-record 278 points at home, shattering the old mark of 248, set in 2007. In their last three home games — victories over Green Bay, New Orleans and Philadelphia — the Giants scored 38, 52 and 42 points.

The 2012 team allowed an NFL-low 20 sacks. The Giants were fourth in the NFL in both takeaways (35, four more than they had in 2011) and turnover differential (plus-14, a significant improvement over 2011's plus-7). The plus-14 was the Giants' best turnover differential since they were plus-25 in 1997. The Giants intercepted 21 passes in 2012, their highest total since they had 27 picks, also in 1997.

The Giants finished the 2012 season with 72 penalties for 578 yards, both franchise-low totals for a 16-game schedule.

Eli Manning passed Phil Simms and became the Giants' career leader in completions (2,612) and touchdown passes (211).

Four Giants were selected to the Pro Bowl: Manning, guard Chris Snee, wide receiver Victor Cruz and defensive end Jason Pierre-Paul.

2013

In 2013, a strong finish was not enough for the Giants to overcome a poor start and they finished 7-9, their first losing record since they were 6-10 in 2004. They were third in the NFC East for the second season in a row.

The Giants put themselves in a deep hole by losing their first six games for the first time since 1976, when they lost their first nine games. They did, however, follow their 0-6 start with four consecutive victories to become just the second team in NFL history to lose its first six games and win the next four (the other team was the 2009 Tennessee Titans). Overall, the Giants won seven of their last 10 games.

All nine of the Giants' losses were to teams that finished .500 or better, the first time that happened since their 5-11 season in 1995. The Giants lost home games to both of the teams that played in Super Bowl XLVIII, Seattle and Denver.

The offense struggled much of the season. The Giants' offense ranked 28th in the NFL in both yards per game (307.5) and points per game (18.4). The Giants scored 294 points, their lowest total in Tom Coughlin's 10 seasons as head coach. They were shutout at Carolina and vs. Seattle, the first time since 1996 they did not score twice in the same season. The Giants scored more than 27 points just once, in their 36-31 opening night loss in Dallas.

The Giants committed an NFL-high 44 turnovers. It was their highest turnover total since 1983, when they had 58 turnovers. The Giants' minus-15 turnover differential was their worst since they were minus-16, also in 1983.

Defensively, the Giants improved throughout the season. The defense ranked 26th in the NFL entering Week 6, when it was allowing an average of 395.2 yards per game, finished the season ranked eighth, giving up 332.3 yards a game. That was a significant improvement over the 2012 season, when the defense was ranked 31st, allowing 383.4 yards per game. The unit was 14th in the league against the run (108.9 yards a game) and 10th vs. the pass (223.3). The Giants were 18th in scoring defense, allowing 23.9 points a game. Entering Week 6, they were 32nd and last in scoring defense, giving up 36.4 points a game.

The defense was not responsible for nine of the 42 touchdowns allowed by the Giants, who surrendered an NFL-high nine return touchdowns (three apiece on interceptions, fumble returns and punt returns).

2014

The 2014 Giants finished 6-10, their first double-digit loss season since 2004 and their first back-to-back losing seasons since

2003-04. They were a streaky team, with a seven-game losing streak surrounded on both sides by three-game winning streaks.

The Giants were the third-place team in the NFC East for the second year in a row. They were 2-4 in NFC East games. The Giants swept Washington and were swept by Dallas and Philadelphia.

The Giants scored 380 points and allowed 400. It was just the fifth time in franchise history they gave up at least 400 points. The offense finished 10th in the NFL with an average of 367.2 yards a game, a 59.7 yards-per-game improvement over their 2013 average of 307.5. It was the team's largest one-year jump since 2005, when the Giants were ranked fourth in the league with an average of 361.7 yards game. That was a 66.6 yards-per-game increase over their 2004 average of 295.1.

The Giants set franchise records for completed passes with 383 (shattering the former mark of 359, set in 2011) and completion percentage with 63.1 (the former record of 62.9 was set in 2010). They finished with their second-highest totals in franchise history in passes attempted (607) and net passing yards (4,272).

The Giants' defense allowed 6,012 net yards, the third-highest total by their opponents in franchise history. They yielded 6,134 yards in 2012 and 6,022 in the 2011 championship season.

The Giants were ranked 29th in the NFL in total defense, allowing 375.8 yards a game, after finishing eighth (332.3 yards per game) in 2013. The run defense ranked 30th (135.1 yards a game), while the Giants were 18th vs. the pass (240.6). The Giants finished the season with 47 sacks, their highest total since they had 48 in 2011.

2015

The Giants were 6-10 for the second season in a row in 2015, their first back-to-back double-digit loss seasons since 2003-04 when they were 4-12 in Jim Fassel's final season as head coach and 6-10 in Tom Coughlin's first. Eight of the 10 losses were by six or fewer points. The Giants lost six games in which they held a lead or were tied in the fourth quarter.

The Giants finished under .500 for the third consecutive season, the first time that's happened since they had eight straight losing seasons from 1973-80. They missed the playoffs for the fourth consecutive season, their longest drought since they went 17 years about a postseason berth from 1964-80.

The 2015 Giants scored 420 points, the fifth-highest total in franchise history. Their 331 first downs were tied for the fourth-highest total in team history, and were just five fewer than their 2014 total. The Giants' 5,956 net yards were the third-highest total in their history.

With an average of 372.3 yards per game, the Giants finished eighth in the NFL in total offense, one season after finishing 10th in yardage. It is their first back-to-back top 10 finishes since they had a streak of four consecutive seasons from 2008-11.

In 2015, the Giants set franchise records for pass attempts (623, the old record was 616 in 2003), and completions (392, the old record was 383 in 2014). The Giants totaled 4,347 net passing yards, the second-highest total in franchise history. The record of 4,734 was set in 2011. The Giants threw 36 touchdown passes in 2015 (35 by Eli Manning), the second-highest total in franchise

history; the 1963 Giants threw 39 touchdown passes.

The Giants allowed 442 points the second-highest total in franchise history (501 in 1966).

2016

The Giants sharply improved their fortunes in Ben McAdoo's first season as head coach in 2016, when they finished the regular season with an 11-5 record and in second-place in the NFC East, after finishing 6-10 each of the previous two years. The five-game improvement in victories is their biggest since 2005, when they were also 11-5 one year after finishing 6-10. The Giants qualified for their first playoff berth since 2011, when they won Super Bowl XLVI. It was their 32nd postseason appearance, tying them with Dallas and Green Bay for the most in NFL history. The Giants' season ended with a 38-13 loss to the Packers in an NFC Wild Card Game. The Giants finished 7-1 at home, their best record in the seven-year history of MetLife Stadium (previous best: 6-2 in 2012) and their best home record since they were 7-1 in Giants Stadium in 2008. They won their last six home games, their longest such streak since they won their first six games at home in 2008. The Giants finished 4-2 in NFC East games, their best record within the division since they were 4-2 in 2013. Their 2-1 record in division road games was their best since they were 2-1 in 2013. With their 27-23 victory against Baltimore on Oct. 16, the Giants became the third NFL franchise with 700 combined regular-season and postseason victories. At the conclusion of their 92nd season, the Giants were 708-597-33. The Packers were 764-575-37, and the Chicago Bears were 761-586-42. The Giants had a vastly-improved defense in 2016. They were second in the NFL with 284 points allowed, one season after they were ranked 30th after giving up 442 points. The Giants allowed 17.8 points per game, the lowest average by their opponents since 2002, when they gave up 17.4 points a game.

2017

The 2017 season began with optimism but ended in disappointment for the Giants, who lost their first five games on their way

to a 3-13 record. The 13 losses were a franchise record, and the three victories were the team's fewest since 1983, when the Giants finished 3-12-1. The Giants finished 2-6 in MetLife Stadium, their fewest home victories since they were 1-7 in 2003. They scored 246 points, their lowest total since they scored 243 in 2003. On Dec. 4, the Giants were 2-10 when general manager Jerry Reese and head coach Ben McAdoo were dismissed from their duties. Assistant general manager Kevin Abrams was named interim G.M. and defensive coordinator Steve Spagnuolo became the interim head coach. The Giants were 1-3 under Spagnuolo, defeating the Washington Redskins in their season finale. When Eli Manning did not play at Oakland on Dec. 3, it ended his streak of 210 consecutive regular-season starts (plus 12 in the postseason) dating back to his rookie season in 2004. Tight Evan Engram, the Giants' 2017 first-round draft choice, finished the season with team-high totals of 64 catches and six touchdowns. Safety Landon Collins was the Giants' only Pro Bowl representative, but was unable to play in the game after fracturing his arm in Week 16. On Jan. 22, the Giants named Pat Shurmur their new head coach.

2018

The Giants finished the season 5-11 and in fourth place in the NFC East in Pat Shurmur's first season as head coach. Twelve of the Giants' 16 games were decided by seven or fewer points, tying them with Philadelphia and Pittsburgh for the most in the NFL. The Giants were 4-8 in those games. The Giants scored 369 points after scoring 246 in 2017. The 123-point increase was the Giants' largest from one season to the next in 85 years, and their largest ever when the seasons had the same number of games. In 1933, the Giants scored 244 points in a 14-game regular season, one year after scoring 93 points in 12 games, an increase of 151 points. The team's per-game averages in points, and total, rushing, and passing yards all improved in 2018. When Eli Manning took his first snap of the season he played in his franchise-record 217th regular-season game. Saquon Barkley had the greatest rookie season in Giants

history and was named the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year. Barkley set numerous franchise rookie records, including rushing yards (1,307), Touchdowns (15), rushing touchdowns (11) and receptions (91, tied with Odell Beckham, Jr.). Aldrick Rosas was named second-year All-Pro after making 32 of his 33 field goal attempts, a Giants-record a .970 percentage. Rosas was one of five Giants selected to the Pro Bowl, including Barkley, safety Landon Collins., linebacker Olivier Vernon and safety Michael Thomas (as a special teamer) were later named to the NFC team. Left tackle Nate Solder and rookie left guard Will Hernandez participated in all 1,027 offensive snaps. Linebacker Alec Ogletree led the Giants and all NFL linebackers with five interceptions. He tied the single-season record for interceptions by a Giants linebacker, set by Jerry Hillebrand in 1963. Ogletree returned two of the interceptions for touchdowns; he was he only NFL player with two interception return touchdowns in 2018, and the first linebacker in Giants history to score twice on interception returns in a season.

2019

The Giants were 4-12 and third-place finishers in the NFC East in Pat Shurmur's second and final season as coach. Eli Manning played the final four games of his career and won his last start, on Dec. 15 vs. Miami, to finish with a regular-season record of 117-117. Manning is the only player in Giants history to play 16 seasons with the team. He played in a franchise-record 236 regular-season games (234 starts). Quarterback Daniel Jones started 12 games and set franchise rookie records with 459 passes, 284 completions, 3,027 yards and 24 touchdown passes. The former records had all stood since Charlie Conerly set them in 1948. Jones' 24 touchdown passes led all rookie quarterbacks in 2019 and were the fourth-most by a rookie in a single season in NFL history. Only Baker Mayfield (27 in 2018), Peyton Manning (26 in 1998) and Russell Wilson (26 in 2012) had more. Despite missing three games with an ankle injury, Saquon Barkley led the team with 217 carries for 1,003 yards and six touchdowns. Coupled with his 1,307 yards in his debut season, Barkley is the first player in Giants history to rush for at least 1,000 yards in each of his first two seasons. Barkley set a franchise record with 279 yards from scrimmage at Washington on Dec. 22. Jones threw a team rookie-record five touchdown passes in that game as the Giants became the first team in NFL history to have a player with 275+ scrimmage yards and a player with five touchdown passes in the same game. Sterling Shepard missed six games with a concussion but led the Giants with 57 catches. Rookie receiver Darius Slayton had a team-high 740 receiving yards and eight touchdowns and was fourth with 48 catches. Safety Antoine Bethea led the Giants with 110 tackles (81 solo) and Markus Golden 10.0 sacks more than doubled the total of anyone else on the team.

2020

Joe Judge was hired as the Giants' 19th head coach in January and in his first season, the team finished in second place in the NFC East at 6-10, their best record since they were 11-5 in 2016. The Giants were 4-2 in NFC East games, also their best since 2016, when they were 4-2. They swept division foes Dallas, Philadelphia and Washington at home for the first time since 2005.

The Giants held a double-digit lead in six consecutive games from Oct. 11-Nov. 15, their longest such streak in a single season since 1989, when they had a lead of 10 or more points in nine straight games. From Oct. 11 through Nov. 8, the Giants' five games were decided by a total of 10 points, the first time in their history they played five consecutive games with such a small cumulative margin. The Giants also played five straight games decided by three or fewer points in a single season for the first time in their history.

Cornerback James Bradberry and tight end Evan Engram earned their first Pro Bowl selections although the game was not actually played because of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Daniel Jones started all 14 games in which he played and completed 280 of 448 passes (62.5%) for 2,943 yards, 11 touchdowns and 10 interceptions for a passer rating of 80.4. His two-year totals are 907 attempts, 564 completions (62.2%) for 5,970 yards, 35 touchdowns and 22 interceptions for a passer rating of 84.1. Jones rushed for 423 yards on 65 carries, the record for a Giants quarterback in the Super Bowl era. Pro Football Hall of Famer Fran Tarkenton previously held the record with 306 yards in 1967. Jones' 6.5-yard average was the NFL's highest among the 91 players with at least 50 rushing attempts in 2020.

In his first season with the Giants, inside linebacker Blake Martinez started all 16 games for the fourth consecutive season. He was one of the team's captains and led the Giants and was third in the NFL with 151 tackles (86 solo). Martinez tallied at least 147 tackles for the fourth consecutive season.

In his first Giants season, Graham Gano had one of the finest seasons of his 12-year career and one of the best seasons by a kicker in franchise history. He made 31 of 32 attempts this season, a .9687 percentage that is the second highest in Giants history. In 2018, Aldrick Rosas made 32 of 33 attempts, a success rate of .9696.

STADIUMS OF THE NEW YORK GIANTS

The Giants shared the Polo Grounds with the New York Baseball Giants from the time they entered the league in 1925 until they moved to the larger Yankee Stadium for the start of the 1956 season.

In 1973, the Giants announced plans to move to a new stadium in New Jersey for the 1976 season, and the city of New York announced that Yankee Stadium was planning a two-year renovation after the 1973 baseball season. The Giants were allowed to play their first two games of the 1973 season at Yankee Stadium before moving to a new location.

The Giants spent the offseason searching for a place to play their games. The Giants' first choice was the Yale Bowl, but the Yale Bowl representatives turned down the team's first request because it would have meant a blackout for the local schedule due to the blackout rule. The Giants' next choice was to play at Princeton University, but they also turned down the Giants. Things were so bad that when the league announced the 1973 schedule, it didn't even say where the games would be played. In light of the Giants' problems, Commissioner Pete Rozelle, with the help from national politicians, modified the blackout rule so that the rule was only in effect if the game was not sold out in advance. With the rule change came a change of heart by the Yale Bowl representatives. It was official. The Giants would play their first two games of the 1973 season at Yankee Stadium and would play the rest of the schedule and the 1974 season at the Yale Bowl in New Haven, Connecticut.

After the 1974 season, it was announced that the Giants were going back to New York City to play at Shea Stadium until the opening of Giants Stadium in 1976. The Giants

played the first four games of the 1976 season on the road just in case there were any delays with the opening of the new stadium. The Giants made their debut at Giants Stadium on October 10, 1976 against the Dallas Cowboys before a sellout crowd.

In 2010, the Giants moved into beautiful, new, state-of-the-art MetLife Stadium built just a few yards from where Giants Stadium sat for more than three decades. The nation's finest football stadium, it seats 82,500 fans. It is one of the NFL's most technologically advanced stadiums and took more than four million man-hours and \$1.6 billion to build. The stadium features 10,000 club seats, 222 suites and 130,000 square feet of state-of-the-art club lounges. The first row of seats is just 46 feet from the sidelines and the sightlines are superb. MetLife Stadium is 2.1 million square feet, compared to Giants Stadium's 900,000 square feet. It has four 30' by 118' high definition video screens, a 350,000 square foot outdoor plaza filled with interactive activities for fans of all ages.

The 2019 season will be the Giants' 10th in MetLife Stadium. They are 36-36 in regular-season games and 1-0 in the postseason, defeating Atlanta in a 2011 NFC Wild Card game on their way to winning Super Bowl XLVI. MetLife Stadium has hosted numerous prestigious events, including NFL, college football and soccer games, and concerts. In 2014, the stadium was the site of Super Bowl XLVIII, the first outdoor Super Bowl played in a "cold weather" city. Seattle defeated Denver, 43-8.



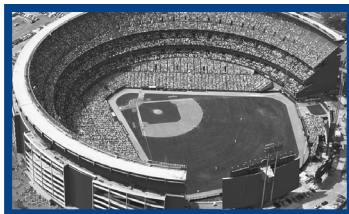

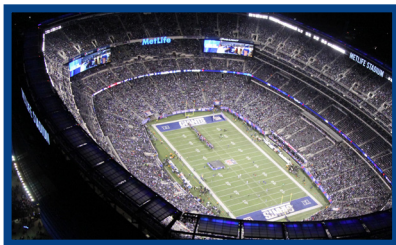

COMMEMORATIVE PATCHES

The Giants have celebrated two major anniversaries by wearing uniform patches on its jerseys. The first was in 1999 for its 75th season, the second coming in 2004 commemorating 80 years.

Over the years, the team has honored deceased players and administrators by wearing memorial



patches. In 1986, the team wore a patch in remembrance of Carl "Spider" Lockhart. In 2001, a "GBY" patch honored longtime general manager George Bernard Young. Most recently, Wellington T. Mara was remembered during the 2005 season with a "WTM" patch after his passing, and a few weeks later, Preston Robert Tisch was added to a patch with Wellington Mara separated by the NY logo.



The Giants honored Hall of Famer, player and coach, Roscoe Brown with a "79" decal on the back of their helmets in after his passing in 2004.

In addition, the team has also worn patches in Super Bowls XXV, XLII and XLVI. Those patches were representations of the NFL's Super Bowl logos for those years.

In 2014, the team wore a patch commemorating its 90th season in the league.

For the 2015 season, the team wore a "ATM" patch on its jerseys honoring the passing of Ann Mara, wife of Wellington Mara.

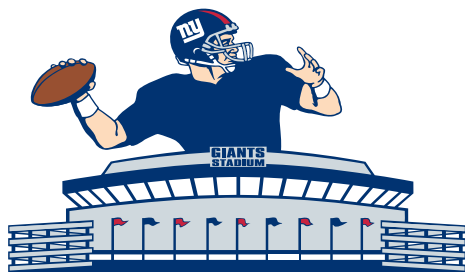

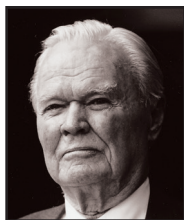

Wellington Mara, along with CB Mike Haynes, Coach Don Shula and C Mike Webster, was a member of the four-man 1997 class of the Pro Football Hall of Fame. Mara and his father Tim, who was the founder of the Giants and a charter member of the Hall of Fame, were the first father and son to be accorded pro football's highest honor. Mara was one of the most influential and beloved figures in American sports history. His entire working lifetime was dedicated to the Giants and the NFL and he helped the Giants produce 21 NFL/NFC first place finishes, 27 postseason appearances and six NFL championships during a 68-season tenure that began with his graduation from Fordham in 1937. Mara passed away on Oct. 25, 2005.

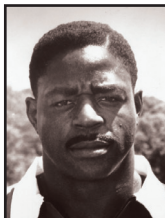
Tim Mara introduced the city of New York to pro football when he purchased the franchise for a reported \$500 in 1925, thus giving the National Football League a vital showcase in the nation's largest city. Mara withstood heavy financial losses his first year until the Giants were saved in the last home game of the season. Mara needed a good showing at the gate to keep the team alive. The Chicago Bears arrived at the Polo Grounds with the most heralded college player of the era, Red Grange, who helped draw a crowd of more than 70,000 people. After seeing so many people attend a Giants game, Mara decided that professional football could be a big success under the right circumstances. Mara bore the brunt of the fight against the rival American Football League in 1926 and the All-American Football Conference from 1946-49. He helped build the Giants into a perennial powerhouse and was honored in 1963 as one of 17 charter members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame.



MORRIS (RED) BADGRO
END

Badgro joined the Giants in 1930 and played six seasons at end. He made a name for himself as a superior defender, excellent blocker and big-play receiver. Badgro helped lead the Giants to the NFL's inaugural championship game in 1933 and he scored the first touchdown in the league's championship game history on a 29-yard pass from Harry Newman in the second quarter. Badgro tied for the NFL receiving title in 1934 with 16 receptions for 206 yards, including one touchdown. He was named to the All-NFL team three times: 1931, 1933 and 1934. Before joining the Giants, Badgro played with the Red Grange-led New York Yankees in the American Football League (12 games in 1927 and one game in 1928). He played pro baseball for three seasons, the first with the Tulsa in the minor leagues and then with the St. Louis Browns for two seasons. Badgro has the distinction of being the oldest player ever to be elected into the Hall of Fame. He was 77 when he was enshrined in 1981.

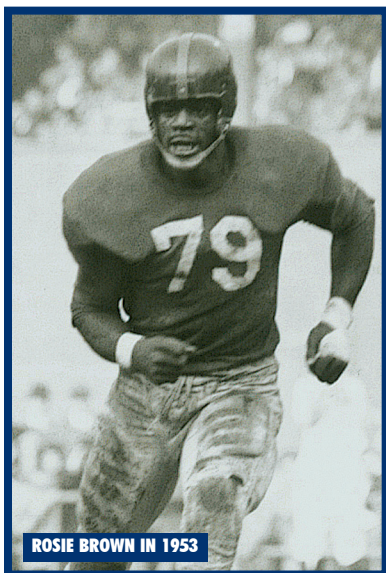

ROOSEVELT BROWN

Brown played for the Giants from 1953 through 1965 after joining the team as a 27th round draft choice, regarded as one of the greatest “sleeper” picks of all time. Brown held the starting tackle spot for 13 straight seasons. During that period, he was named to the Pro Bowl nine times and was selected All-NFL eight consecutive seasons. In 1956, when the Giants won the league title, Brown was named Lineman of the Year by the Associated Press. Brown was a big, strong blocker who had the speed to make a block downfield. He was also used along the defensive front on goal-line stands. Brown helped the Giants advance to the NFL Championship game in 1956, 1958, 1959, 1961, 1962 and 1963. After his playing career, Brown continued his Giants affiliation as a coach before being appointed as a scout, where he has served since the 1971 season. He was immediately named assistant line coach by the Giants after a phlebitis condition forced him to retire in 1966.

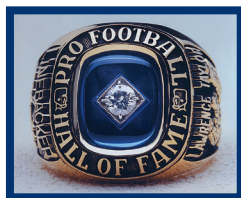

Carson played his entire 13-year NFL career with the Giants. An inside linebacker, he was selected to play in nine Pro Bowls, including seven in a row from 1982-88. Carson led the Giants in tackles six times, was a two-time All-NFL first team selection and was a leader throughout his career and the sole captain of the 1986 Super Bowl champions. Carson joined the Giants as a fourth-round draft choice in 1976 from South Carolina State, where he never missed a game in four seasons, was a two-year captain and a Little All-America selection by the Associated Press. A defensive end in college, Carson successfully moved to linebacker with the Giants so quickly and so successfully that he was voted to NFL All-Rookie team. Carson played 173 games in a Giants uniform – tying him with Keith Hamilton for seventh all-time – and he was a punishing run defender who also intercepted 11 passes. Carson had 17 sacks, 14 fumble recoveries and seven forced fumbles. He had 25 tackles (20 solo) in a Monday night game against Green Bay in 1982 and seven tackles in the Giants’ 39-20 victory over Denver in Super Bowl XXI. During his prime, Carson was the best run-stopping linebacker in the NFL. In the seven seasons from 1981 to 1987, Giants’ opponents averaged only 3.59 yards per rushing attempt, a remarkable achievement for so long a period. During that period, Carson was credited with 856 tackles, including 627 unassisted tackles.

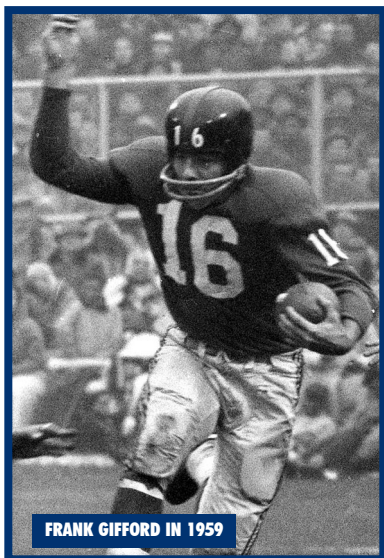

FRANK GIFFORD
 HALFBACK, FLANKER

Gifford played for the Giants from 1952-64, although he voluntarily retired in 1961 due to a serious injury suffered the previous season. He was known as one of the most versatile backs in NFL history. Gifford was the first choice in the draft by the Giants in 1952 after an All-America career at Southern California. He totaled 9,862 combined yards during his career. He rushed for 3,609 yards rushing, caught 367 passes and scored 484 points. Gifford was named to the Pro Bowl as a defensive back in 1953 and as an offensive back the following year - a first in NFL history. He played in seven Pro Bowls and was named All-NFL four times and NFL Player of the Year in 1956. Gifford holds the Giants record with 78 touchdowns. A true triple-threat back, Gifford threw 14 touchdown passes in 60 attempts on the halfback option. He retired after the 1960 season and returned in 1962 at a new position, flanker. The Giants reached the NFL Championship game five times during his career, including their victory in 1956.

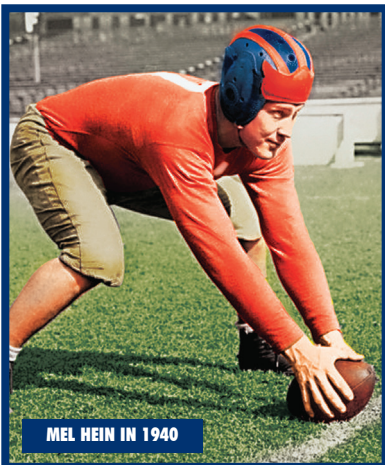

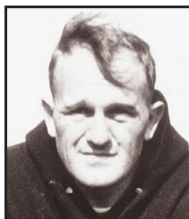
Hein joined the Giants in 1931 and played 15 seasons, tying him with Phil Simms and Michael Strahan for the second-longest tenure in franchise history, behind only Eli Manning (16 seasons). A member of the Hall of Fame's inaugural class in 1963, Hein was named All-NFL eight consecutive years from 1933-40. Following a successful college

career at Washington State, Hein wrote to three NFL clubs offering his services. He joined the Giants after the team submitted the highest salary bid at \$150 per game. Hein was a 60-minute regular for 15 years, playing in 172 games. He never missed a game in high school or college and sat out just one with the Giants, on Nov. 30, 1933 at Brooklyn. He was named the league's Most Valuable Player in 1938 after anchoring a line that helped guide the Giants to the NFL Championship with a 23-17 victory over the Green Bay Packers in the Polo Grounds.

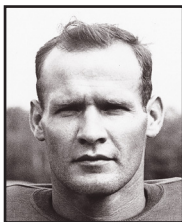
Hubbard played for the Giants from 1927-28 and again in 1936. He was one of the 17 charter members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1963. Hubbard was named All-NFL six years in a row from 1928-33. He played for the Green Bay Packers from 1929-35 and the Pittsburgh Pirates in 1936 before returning to the Giants. He was acquired before the start of the 1927 season in order to help beef up the Giants defense. That season, the defense surrendered only 20 points as the Giants captured their first NFL championship. He went to Green Bay in 1929 in a move that would haunt the Giants, as Hubbard led the Packers to a 12-0-1 record to edge out the 13-1-1 Giants for the league title. The Packers handed the Giants their only loss of the season by a 20-6 score.



SAM HUFF

LINEBACKER
WEST VIRGINIA
ENSHRINED IN 1982

Huff became an immediate star at middle linebacker after he was drafted by the Giants in the third round in 1956 following an All-America career at West Virginia. He played in five Pro Bowls and was named All-NFL four years. Huff won recognition for his great individual efforts against the premier running backs of his era, including Jim Brown of Cleveland, Rick Casares of Chicago and Alan Ameche of Baltimore. He was named the NFL's Outstanding Lineman in 1959. Huff anchored a defense that helped the Giants reach the championship game in 1956, 1958, 1959, 1961, 1962 and 1963. He was traded to the Washington Redskins prior to the 1964 season and has been a color analyst on the Redskins radio broadcasts for many years.



TOM LANDRY

COACH
TEXAS
ENSHRINED IN 1990

Landry was with the Giants as a defensive back from 1950-55 and an assistant coach from 1954-59. The Giants' 1956 championship team not only consisted of players that would eventually be elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame, but it also had one of history's greatest coaching staffs. Head coach Jim Lee Howell had Vince Lombardi coaching the offense and Landry coaching the defense. When the Dallas Cowboys entered the league in 1960, Wellington Mara recommended the Cowboys hire Landry as head coach. Landry coached the Cowboys from 1960 through 1988 and led Dallas to two Super Bowl victories and five NFC titles. Landry coached the Cowboys to 20 consecutive winning seasons.



ALPHONSE (TUFFY) LEEMANS

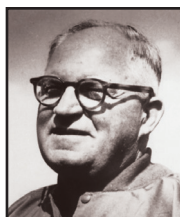
Leemans played for the Giants from 1936-43. He was personally scouted by Wellington Mara and was a second-round draft choice in the inaugural NFL draft in 1936 out of George Washington. Mara sent a telegram setting up a meeting with Leemans to convince him to accept a career in the NFL with the Giants. Leemans was the 1936 College Football All-Star game MVP. He led NFL rushers as a rookie in 1936 with 830 yards on 206 attempts. Leemans was named All-NFL in 1936 and 1939. An aggressive, dedicated do-everything team leader, he totaled 3,142 yards rushing, 2,324 yards passing, 442 yards receiving and threw 16 touchdown passes during his career.

**VINCE LOMBARDI**

COACH

Lombardi was an offensive assistant coach with the Giants from 1954-58 and the head coach of the Green Bay Packers (1959-67) and Washington Redskins (1969). With Lombardi running the offense, the Giants captured the NFL championship in 1956. In 10 years as head coach, Lombardi had a 105-36-6 record. He directed the Packers to five NFL championships in seven years (1961-62 and 65-66-67) and victories in Super Bowls I and II, a feat without equal in pro football history. A guard, Lombardi played his collegiate football at Fordham, where he was one of the legendary "Seven Blocks of Granite."

**STEVE OWEN**

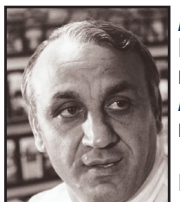

Owen was a four-time All-NFL tackle who played for the Giants from 1926-31, plus a one-game return in 1933. He captained the 1927 team that won the NFL title and held its foes to a record-low total of 20 points. But Owen made his greatest imprint on the sideline, where he coached the Giants for 23 years. He was a co-coach with Benny Friedman in 1930, then assumed the full head coaching responsibility in 1931, a position he kept until 1953. Owens had a coaching record of 153-100-17 and won eight division and two NFL titles. The 153 victories are a Giants record. Some of his coaching innovations include the A-formation offense, the umbrella defense and the two-platoon system.

**BILL PARCELLS**

COACH
WICHITA STATE
ENSHRINED 2013

Parcells was head coach of the Giants for eight years (1983-90) and later held the same position with the New England Patriots, New York Jets and Dallas Cowboys. He led the Giants to victories in Super Bowls XXI and XXV and is one of 13 head coaches with more than one Super Bowl victory. With the Giants, Parcells was 77-49-1 (.610) in the regular season and 8-3 (.727) in the postseason for an overall mark of 85-52-1 (.620). In 19 seasons as a head coach, Parcells was 172-139-1 (.569) in the regular season and 11-8 (.579) in the postseason. His overall record was 183-138-1 (.570). The 172 regular-season victories are the 10th-highest total in NFL history, as are the 183 total victories.

**ANDY ROBUSTELLI**

DEFENSIVE END
ARNOLD COLLEGE
ENSHRINED IN 1971

Robustelli was drafted by the Los Angeles Rams in 1951 and played on two Rams championship teams. In 1956, Wellington traded for Robustelli, who provided a tremendous lift in the Giants' title drive that season. Robustelli, who stayed with the Giants through the 1964 season, played on a winning team in 13 of his 14 pro seasons. He played in eight NFL championship title games and seven Pro Bowls. Robustelli was named All-NFL seven times, two with the Rams and five with the Giants. Robustelli was a durable player who missed only one game in his 14-year career.

KEN STRONG
HALFBACK
NEW YORK UNIVERSITY
ENSHRINED IN 1967

Strong played for the Giants from 1933-35, in 1939 and from 1944-47.

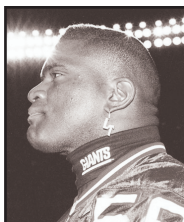
He excelled in every phase of the game - blocking, running, passing, punting, placekicking and defense. At the time of his retirement, Strong was the Giants' career scoring leader with 324 points on 13 touchdowns, 35 field goals and 141 extra points. He scored 17 points to pace the Giants to the 1934 championship game over the Chicago Bears in the famous "Sneakers Game." Strong scored a league-high 64 points in 1933 and was All-NFL in 1934. He began his career with the Staten Island Stapletons in 1932. After four seasons, he joined the Giants. In 1936, he began a two-year stint in the rival AFL. Strong served as a placekicking specialist only when he returned to the Giants from 1944 until 1947. He scored 479 points in his career.



MICHAEL STRAHAN
DEFENSIVE END
TEXAS SOUTHERN
ENSHRINED IN 2014

Strahan played his entire career with the Giants from 1993-2007. A standout as

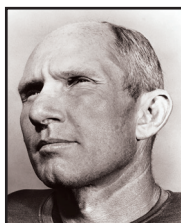
both a run stopper and pass rusher, Strahan joins Hall of Famer Mel Hein and Phil Simms as the only players in Giants history to play 15 years with the team. Strahan played in a franchise-record 216 regular-season games. He was a four-time first-team All-Pro (1997, 1998, 2001 and 2003), a seven-time Pro Bowler and the 2001 NFL AP Defensive Player of the Year. Strahan had 141.5 career regular season sacks, which is the Giants' franchise record and the fifth-highest total in NFL history. Strahan holds the NFL single-season record with 22.5 sacks in 2001. He also led the NFL in 2003 with 18.5 sacks and is the only Giants player to twice lead the league in sacks. Strahan was a captain of the 2007 Giants team that won Super Bowl XLII.



LAWRENCE TAYLOR
LINEBACKER
NORTH CAROLINA
ENSHRINED IN 1999

Taylor joined the Giants as the second overall selection of the 1981 NFL Draft and played his entire 13-year career for the team. When Taylor retired, he was the NFL's No. 2 all-time sack leader in the NFL with 132.5. That total does not include the 9.5 he accumulated as a rookie in 1981 before the sack was an official NFL statistic. Taylor established an NFL record by appearing in 10 consecutive Pro Bowls from 1981-1990. He was named the NFL Rookie of the Year in 1981 and the NFC's Defensive Player of the Week nine times (the award was established in 1984), as well as the conference's Defensive Player of the Month twice, in October 1986 and September 1989. Taylor was a unanimous choice to the NFL's All-1980s team. He was a unanimous selection as the NFL's Most Valuable Player in 1986, when he had a career-high 20.5 sacks, 105 tackles, five passes defended and two forced fumbles.

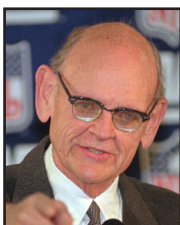
Y.A. TITTLE
QUARTERBACK
LOUISIANA ST.
ENSHRINED IN 1971

The Giants engineered one of the best trades in their long history prior to the 1961 season when they sent guard Lou Cordileone to the San Francisco 49ers for Tittle. The then 35-year old Tittle promptly led the Giants to their 12th Eastern Division championship. Tittle played two seasons in the All-American Conference and 11 in the NFL before joining the Giants. In 1962, Tittle set an NFL record by throwing 33 touchdown passes and tied another mark with seven scoring throws in one game. Tittle had his greatest year as a pro in 1963, when he led the league in passing with 221 completions in 367 attempts for 3,145 yards. His 36 touchdown passes broke his own league mark and set a Giants record that still stands. Tittle's career totals include 2,427 completions, 33,070 yards, 242 touchdowns and 13 games with more than 300 yards passing. He was the NFL Player of the Year in 1957, when he led the 49ers to a tie for the Western Division title, and won the honor again in 1961 and 1963, as he took the Giants to Eastern championships. Tittle was named All-NFL in 1957, 1962 and 1963, and also played in six Pro Bowls.



EMLLEN TUNNELL
DEFENSIVE BACK
TOLEDO/IOWA
ENSHRINED IN 1967

Tunnell was signed by the Giants as a free agent out of Iowa in 1948 and played 11 seasons for the teams. Ignored in the NFL draft, Tunnell walked into the Giants office and asked Tim Mara for a tryout. Tunnell was the first African-American player signed by the Giants. He holds Giants records with 74 interceptions and 261 punt returns. In 1952, Tunnell gained more yards (923) on interceptions and kickoff returns than the NFL rushing leader did running the ball. He earned the nickname "offense on defense." Tunnell was named All-NFL four times and played in nine Pro Bowls.



GEORGE YOUNG
GENERAL MANAGER
BUCKNELL
ENSHRINED IN 2020

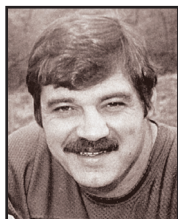
Young was the Giants general manager from 1979-97 and a five-time NFL Executive of the Year. When he was hired, Young took charge of a team that had not reached the playoffs in 15 consecutive years. The Giants were postseason participants in his third season and eight times in his 19 seasons as head of the franchise's football operations (three times – in 1982, 88 and 94 – they were eliminated on the final day of the season). They won three NFC East titles and Super Bowls XXI and XXV. Young was a charter inductee into the franchise's Ring of Honor in 2010. Following the 1997 season, Young left the Giants to take a position as an advisor to commissioner Paul Tagliabue in the NFL office.



ARNOLD WEINMEISTER
DEFENSIVE TACKLE
WASHINGTON
ENSHRINED IN 1984

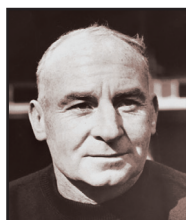
Weinmeister played for the Giants from 1950-53. He was one of the first defensive players to captivate the masses in the same manner a star running back or quarterback could. A big and extremely fast player with great ability to diagnose plays, Weinmeister began his pro career with the New York Yankees in the All-American Football Conference in 1950. He moved to the NFL during the 1950 merger. Weinmeister played two ways in the AFC, but was used exclusively on defense in the NFL.

LARRY CSONKA
FULLBACK
SYRACUSE
ENSHRINED IN 1987

Csonka played for the Giants from 1976-78. He was originally drafted by the Miami Dolphins in the first round in 1968. Csonka left the Dolphins following the 1974 season and played for the Memphis Southmen of the World Football League in 1975. He returned to the Dolphins to finish his career in 1979. A five-time Pro Bowl selection, Csonka put together three consecutive 1,000-yard seasons (1971-73) as Miami advanced to the Super Bowl each year. He excelled in those Super Bowls, averaging 6.3 yards a carry and rushing for more than 100 yards in two of them. Csonka finished his career with 8,081 yards, a 4.3-yard average and 64 touchdowns.



RAY FLAHERTY
END, COACH
GONZAGA
ENSHRINED IN 1976

Flaherty played for the Giants from 1928-29 and 1931-35 and helped the Giants advance to the NFL Championship Game in 1933, 1934 and 1935. He spent the 1930 season coaching at Gonzaga. Flaherty finished with an 80-37-5 record as a coach with the Boston Redskins, Washington Redskins, New York Yankees and Chicago Hornets. Flaherty introduced the screen pass in the 1937 title game when the Washington Redskins scored a 28-21 victory over the Chicago Bears. He suggested to Coach Steve Owen that the Giants wear sneakers in the icy conditions at the Polo Grounds in the 1934 championship game, known as the "Sneakers Game."



BENNY FRIEDMAN
QUARTERBACK
MICHIGAN
ENSHRINED IN 2005

Friedman, a two-time All-America quarterback at Michigan, played with the Cleveland Bulldogs (1927), Detroit Wolverines (1928), Giants (1929-1931) and Brooklyn Dodgers (1932-1934). Following the 1928 season New York Giants owner Tim Mara purchased the Detroit franchise just to secure the services of Friedman. A versatile player, Friedman could run, kick and pass the ball better than any player who preceded him. From 1927-30, Friedman threw 11, 9, 20, and 13 touchdown passes, leading the league each year. In 1928, he topped the league in both rushing touchdowns and touchdown passes; no other player has ever accomplished that feat. His 20 touchdown passes in 1929, including four in one game, were both NFL records for years. Although very durable, a knee injury coupled with the rigors of serving as an assistant coach at Yale, Friedman's productivity dropped in 1931. Still the player-coach managed to earn third-team All-NFL honors that year and second-team All-NFL honors in 1933.



JOE GUYON
HALFBACK
CARLISLE
ENSHRINED IN 1966

Guyon played for the Giants during the championship season in 1927. His career highlight was catching a touchdown pass that gave the Giants a win over the Bears for the 1927 NFL championship. He also played for the Canton Bulldogs in 1920, the Cleveland Indians in 1921, Oorang Indians from 1922-23, the Rock Island Independents in 1924 and the Kansas City Cowboys from 1924-25.

Henry played for the Giants during the championship season in 1927. He was the largest player of his time at 250 pounds. Henry was the bulwark of the Canton Bulldogs' championship lines in the 1920s. He played for the Canton Bulldogs and the Pottsville Maroons in addition to the Giants.



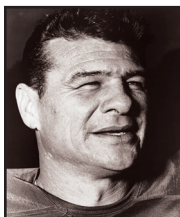
ARNIE HERBER

Herber played for the Giants in 1944 and 1945. Pro football's first great long passer, Herber was the NFL passing leader in 1932, 1934 and 1936. He also played for the Green Bay Packers from 1930-40, and ranks fifth in Packers annals with 64 career touchdowns.



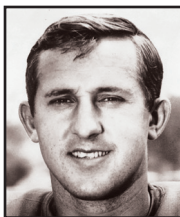
DON MAYNARD

Maynard played for the Giants in 1958. He went on to play for the New York Titans from 1960-62, the New York Jets from 1963-72 and the St. Louis Cardinals in 1973. He caught 633 passes for 11,834 yards (18.7-yard average) and 88 touchdowns. He had at least 50 catches and 1,000 yards in five different seasons. Maynard caught eight passes for 118 yards, including the winning touchdown, against Oakland in the AFL Championship game to help the Jets advance to Super Bowl III.



HUGH McELHENNY
HALFBACK
WASHINGTON
ENSHRINED IN 1970

McElhenny played for the Giants in 1963, when he helped them advance to the championship game. His career totals include 5,281 yards rushing and 360 points. On his first play as a professional, McElhenny scored on a 40-yard touchdown run. He also played with the San Francisco 49ers from 1952-60, the Minnesota Vikings from 1961-62 and the Detroit Lions in 1964.



FRAN TARKENTON
QUARTERBACK
GEORGIA
ENSHRINED IN 1986

Tarkenton played for the Giants from 1967-71. He began his career with the Minnesota Vikings in 1961 before moving to the Giants in 1967 and back to the Vikings in 1972 in blockbuster trades. He retired as the NFL's record holder for career passing yards with 47,003. An elusive scrambler, Tarkenton rushed for 3,674 yards and 32 touchdowns. A four-time All-NFL and nine-time Pro Bowl selection, he led the Vikings to Super Bowl appearances in 1973, 1974 and 1976.



JIM THORPE
HALFBACK
CARLISLE
ENSHRINED IN 1963

Thorpe played for the Giants during their first season in 1925. He was a charter inductee into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1963. Thorpe was the biggest name in football at the time the Giants signed him at the age of 37. He also played for the Canton Bulldogs, Cleveland Indians, Oorang Indians, Toledo Maroons, Rock Island Independents and the Chicago Cardinals. He was the first president of the American Professional Football Association in 1920.

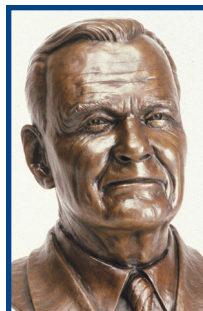

1 RAY FLAHERTY

Flaherty was an end and an assistant coach for the Giants from 1928-29 and 1931-35 and helped the Giants advance to three NFL Championships... Introduced the screen pass in the 1937 title game... Suggested the Giants wear sneakers in the 1934 championship game, known as the "Sneakers Game."

4 TUFFY LEEMANS

Leemans played for the Giants from 1936 through 1943... Was personally scouted by Giants co-owner Wellington Mara... Totaled 3,142 yards rushing, 2,324 yards passing, 442 receiving yards and threw 16 touchdowns.

7 MEL HEIN

Joined the Giants in 1931 and enjoyed a 15-year career... Was named All-NFL eight straight years from 1933-40... Member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame's inaugural class in 1963... Never missed a game in high school or college and sat out just in the NFL, on Nov. 30, 1933 vs. Brooklyn... Named League MVP in 1938.

11 PHIL SIMMS

Owens 19 team records for the Giants, including all-time records with 2,576 completions in 4,647 attempts for 33,462 yards... Owns a .597 winning percentage (95-64, including 6-4 in postseason play) as a starter over his 15-year career... Named MVP of the Super Bowl

after leading the Giants to a 39-20 victory over Denver in Super Bowl XXI.

14 WARD CUFF

Cuff joined the Giants as a fourth-round draft choice from Marquette in 1937 and excelled at several positions in a stint that ended in 1945. A wingback, fullback, halfback, defensive back and kicker, he rushed for 1,766 yards on 330 carries (a 5.3-yard average) and caught 101 passes for 1,477 yards. Cuff scored 18 touchdowns (six rushing, 12 receiving) and made 31 of 70 field goal attempts and 98 of 102 extra point tries. He also had a 12.1-yard punt return average and 13 interceptions.

*14 Y.A. TITTLE

Tittle played for the Giants from 1961-64 season... In 1962, Tittle completed 200 passes in 375 attempts for 3,224 yards... His 33 touchdowns that season set an NFL record and his seven touchdown passes against Washington tied another mark... Had his greatest year as a pro in 1963, leading the league in passing with 221 completions in 367 attempts for 3,145 yards and 36 touchdowns.

16 FRANK GIFFORD

Played for the Giants from 1952-64, though he voluntarily retired in 1961 season because of an injury... Made the Pro Bowl as both an offensive back and defensive back... Seven-time Pro Bowler

and 1956 NFL player of the year... Holds three Giants records: Touchdowns (78), highest average gain (500 attempts) rushing (4.3 yards) and most receiving yards (5,434)... Is fifth on team's all-time rushing list with 3,609 yards and second with 367 receptions... Totaled 9,753 yards in his career.

32 AL BLOZIS

Made an immediate impression on the Giants after arriving in 1942 and quickly earned a starting assignment at tackle... Played in the 1944 championship game with the Giants, he then was sent almost immediately overseas where as a lieutenant in the army he was killed in action in France a brief six weeks later.

40 JOE MORRISON

Was a back and an end for the Giants from 1959 through 1972... Was a dominant figure during his 14-year career with the Giants, accumulating 2,472 yards rushing with 18 touchdowns... A versatile player, Morrison played six different positions: fullback, halfback, flanker, tight end, split end and defensive back.

42 CHARLIE CONERLY

Played for the Giants from 1948 through 1961... Represented the Giants in three Pro Bowls (1951, 1952 and 1957) and was named the NFL's Most Valuable Player in 1959... Ended his career with 1,418 completions and 19,488 yards, both Giants records at the time of his retirement.

50 KEN STRONG

Played for the Giants from 1933-35, 1939 and 1944-47... At the time of his retirement, Strong was the Giants all-time leading scorer with 324 points on 13 touchdowns, 35 field goals and 141 extra points... He scored 17 points to lead the Giants to victory in the 1934 Championship game against Chicago.

56 LAWRENCE TAYLOR

Finished his 13-year career (1981-93) as the No. 2 all-time quarterback sack leader in the NFL with 132.5... Established an NFL record by appearing in 10 consecutive Pro Bowls from 1981-90... Finest statistical season was in 1986 with a career-high 20.5 sacks, 105 total tackles, five passes defensed and two forced fumbles... Earned unanimous selection as the NFL's Most Valuable Player in 1986.

GIANTS IN THE RING OF HONOR



In 2010, the Giants unveiled their Ring of Honor, which commemorates some of the most prominent and influential figures in the 87-year history of the franchise. The original class of 30 players, coaches, executives and owners was joined by five more honorees in 2011. These men have helped the Giants win eight NFL championships and more than 650 games and contributed to them becoming one of the most respected and admired organizations in professional sports.

The names of the men in the Ring of Honor are prominently displayed at each Giants home game in MetLife Stadium above the club level on each sideline.

CLASS OF 2010

TIM MARA

Tim Mara introduced the city of New York to pro football when he purchased the franchise for a reported \$500 in 1925, thus giving the National Football League a vital showcase in the nation's largest city. Mara withstood heavy financial losses his first year until the Giants were saved in the last home game of the season. Mara needed a good showing at the gate to keep the team alive. The Chicago Bears arrived at the Polo Grounds with the most heralded college player of the era, Red Grange, who helped draw a crowd of more than 70,000 people. After seeing so many people attend a Giants game, Mara decided that professional football could be a big success under the right circumstances. He bore the brunt of the fight against the rival American Football League in 1926 and the All-American Football Conference from 1946-49. Mara helped build the Giants into a perennial powerhouse and was honored in 1963 as one of 17 charter members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

WELLINGTON MARA

It is impossible to overstate the influence Wellington Mara had on the Giants and in the NFL. He was one of the most important and influential figures in the history of professional football, a man credited with many of the ideas and innovations that have made the NFL the nation's most popular professional sports league. Mara is the most beloved and influential Giant in history and one of the most significant figures not just in the NFL, but in American sports. He was a vital member of the franchise for each of its first 81 years until his death in 2005. Mara was instrumental in helping the Giants make 26 postseason appearances, including 18 divisional championships and six NFL championships, among them the Super Bowl XXI and Super Bowl XXV titles. Despite his ties to the team, Mara was recognized for always putting the league's interests ahead of what was best for the Giants. He was an invaluable contributor to the NFL as a member of many ownership committees. In 1997, Mara was elected to the Pro Football Hall of Fame, joining his father, Tim Mara, as the first father-son duo elected to the Hall.

JACK MARA

During the very first game the Giants ever played in 1925, Jack Mara followed each play along the sidelines as he held the first down marker. It wasn't long before he held far more important jobs in the organization. Mara was only 22 year old in 1930 when his father, Tim, turned over the ownership of the Giants to him and his younger brother Wellington, who was all of 14. He served as the team's president for 31 years and was in charge of the Giants' business operations. Jack Mara was the driving force behind one of the most significant decisions in franchise history, to move the Giants' home games to Yankee Stadium from the crumbling Polo Grounds prior to the 1956 season. Tim Mara detested Yankees owner

Dan Topping, so it was Jack who negotiated the deal that saved the financial future of the franchise. Jack Mara also lobbied the owners to share television revenue, which helped create the parity that has made pro football America's favorite spectator sport.

BOB TISCH

Preston Robert Tisch — "Bob" to everyone who knew him - realized a longtime dream in 1991, when he became co-owner of the Giants. Soon after the Giants won Super Bowl XXV, Tisch completed negotiations with Tim Mara (son of Jack Mara) and his family for a 50 percent interest in the team. That commenced Tisch's career as an owner of a professional sports franchise, one of many he simultaneously pursued. Tisch led an extraordinarily accomplished life. He was an enormously successful businessman, an extremely generous philanthropist, a postmaster general, a friend of presidents, governors and mayors and a nonpareil New York City mover and shaker. But nothing gave Tisch more pleasure and pride than being the co-owner of the Giants and working on several influential NFL ownership committees. As a member of the National Football League's Finance and Super Bowl Policy Committees, he attained a prominence in the sports arena equal to his position in the world of business.

GEORGE YOUNG

George Young was hired as the Giants general manager on Feb. 14, 1979 and stayed in that position through the 1997 season. He led the franchise out of the bleak 1970s and brought in great players such as Taylor, Simms, Joe Morris, Mark Bavaro and Carl Banks. Young hired Parcells, the head coach of two Super Bowl champions. During his tenure, the Giants earned eight playoff berths, highlighted by victories in Super Bowls XXI and XXV, and compiled an overall record of 155-139-2. He was named NFL Executive of the Year an unprecedented five times — 1984, 1986, 1990, 1993, and 1997. Young also served as chairman of the NFL's Competition Committee.

STEVE OWEN

Owen was a four-time All-NFL tackle who played for the Giants from 1926-31, plus a one-game return in 1933. He captained the 1927 team that won the NFL title and held its foes to a record-low total of 20 points. But Owen made his greatest imprint on the sideline, where he coached the Giants for 23 years. He was a co-coach with Benny Friedman in 1930, then assumed the full head coaching responsibility in 1931, a position he kept until 1953. Owen had a coaching record of 153-100-17 and won eight division and two NFL titles. The 153 victories are still the Giants record. Some of his coaching

innovations included the A-formation offense, the umbrella defense and the two-platoon system. Owen was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1966.

JIM LEE HOWELL

Jim Lee Howell was the Giants' head coach from 1954-60. He quickly added two future Hall of Fame coaches to his staff, Vince Lombardi to lead the offense and Tom Landry, whom he converted from a player, to coach the defense. In Howell's seven seasons as head coach, the Giants played in three NFL Championship Games and defeated George Halas's Chicago Bears, 47-7, in 1956. Howell's regular season record was 53-27-4 record, a .630 winning percentage. He coached six future Pro Football Hall of Fame players in Huff, Robustelli, Brown, Tunnell, Gifford and Don Maynard. Howell stayed with the Giants as Director of Player Personnel until his retirement in 1981.

BILL PARCELLS

When Parcells began coaching the Giants in 1983, the team had finished with a winning record just once in the previous 10 seasons. Parcells led the Giants to the playoffs in his second and third seasons. In 1986, he coached one of the greatest teams in Giants history. That year, the Giants won their last 12 games and finished 17-2, including a 39-20 rout of the Denver Broncos in Super Bowl XXI. Four years later, Parcells led the Giants to a 20-19 victory over the favored Buffalo Bills in Super Bowl XXV. He left the team after that season with a 77-49-1 regular season record. The 77 victories are the second-most in team history, behind Owen's 153. Parcells holds the Giants' record with eight postseason wins.

MEL HEIN

Hein joined the Giants in 1931 and played 15 seasons, which ties him with Phil Simms and Michael Strahan for the second-longest tenure in franchise history, behind only Eli Manning's 16-year career. He was named All-NFL eight consecutive years from 1933-40. Following a successful college career at Washington State, Hein wrote to three NFL clubs offering his services. He joined the Giants after the team submitted the highest salary bid at \$150 per game. Hein was a 60-minute regular for 15 years, playing in 172 games. He never missed a game in high school or college and sat out just one in his NFL career — Nov. 30, 1933 vs. the Brooklyn Dodgers. Hein was named the league's Most Valuable Player in 1938 after anchoring a line that helped guide the Giants to the NFL Championship with a 23-17 victory over the Green Bay Packers in the Polo Grounds. Hein was a member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame's inaugural class in 1963.

GIANTS IN THE RING OF HONOR

KEN STRONG

Strong played for the Giants from 1933-35, in 1939 and from 1944-47. He excelled in every phase of the game - blocking, running, passing, punting, placekicking and defense. At the time of his retirement, Strong was the Giants' career scoring leader with 324 points on 13 touchdowns, 35 field goals and 141 extra points. He scored 17 points to pace the Giants to the 1934 championship game over the Chicago Bears in the famous "Sneakers Game." Strong scored a league-high 64 points in 1933 and was All-NFL in 1934. He began his career with the Staten Island Stapletons in 1932. After four seasons, he joined the Giants. In 1936, he began a two-year stint in the rival AFL. Strong served as a placekicking specialist only when he returned to the Giants from 1944 until 1947. He scored 479 points in his career. Strong was enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1967.

TUFFY LEEMANS

Leemans played for the Giants from 1936-43. He was personally scouted by Wellington Mara and was a second-round draft choice in the inaugural NFL draft in 1936 out of George Washington. Mara sent a telegram setting up a meeting with Leemans to convince him to accept a career in the NFL with the Giants. Leemans was the 1936 College Football All-Star game MVP. He led NFL rushers as a rookie in 1936 with 830 yards on 206 attempts. Leemans was named All-NFL in 1936 and 1939. An aggressive, dedicated do-everything team leader, he totaled 3,142 yards rushing, 2,324 yards passing, 442 yards receiving and threw 16 touchdown passes during his career. He was enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1978.

EMLEN TUNNELL

Tunnell was signed by the Giants as a free agent out of Iowa in 1948 and played 11 seasons for the team. Ignored in the NFL draft, Tunnell walked into the Giants office and asked Tim Mara for a tryout. Tunnell was the first African-American player signed by the Giants. Fifty-two years after playing his last game for the team, he still holds Giants records with 74 interceptions and 261 punt returns. In 1952, Tunnell gained more yards (923) on interceptions and kickoff returns than the NFL rushing leader did running the ball. He earned the nickname "offense on defense." Tunnell was named All-NFL four times and played in nine Pro Bowls. Tunnell was enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1967.

FRANK GIFFORD

A Pro Football Hall of Fame inductee in 1977, Gifford played for the Giants from 1952-64, although he voluntarily retired in 1961 due to a serious injury suffered the previous season. He was known as one of the most versatile backs in NFL history.

Gifford was the first choice in the draft by the Giants in 1952 after an All-America career at Southern California. He totaled 9,862 combined yards during his career. He rushed for 3,609 yards, caught 367 passes and scored 484 points. Gifford was named to the Pro Bowl as a defensive back in 1953 and as an offensive back the following year - a first in NFL history. He played in seven Pro Bowls and was named All-NFL four times and NFL Player of the Year in 1956. Gifford holds the Giants record with 78 touchdowns. A true triple-threat back, Gifford threw 14 touchdown passes in 60 attempts on the half-back option. He retired after the 1960 season and returned in 1962 at a new position, flanker. The Giants reached the NFL Championship game five times during his career, including their victory in 1956.

ROSIE BROWN

Roosevelt Brown played for the Giants from 1953 through 1965 after joining the team as a 27th round draft choice, regarded as one of the greatest "sleeper" picks of all time. Brown held the starting tackle spot for 13 straight seasons. During that period, he was named to the Pro Bowl nine times and was selected All-NFL eight consecutive seasons. In 1956, when the Giants won the league title, Brown was named Lineman of the Year by the Associated Press. Brown was a big, strong blocker who had the speed to make a block downfield. He was also used along the defensive front on goal-line stands. Brown helped the Giants advance to the NFL Championship game in 1956, 1958, 1959, 1961, 1962 and 1963. After his playing career, Brown continued his Giants affiliation as a coach before being appointed as a scout, a position he held from 1971 until his death in 2004. He was immediately named assistant line coach by the Giants after a phlebitis condition forced him to retire in 1966. Brown was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1975.

SAM HUFF

Huff became an immediate star at middle linebacker after he was drafted by the Giants in the third round in 1956 following an All-America career at West Virginia. He played in five Pro Bowls and was named All-NFL four times. Huff won recognition for his great individual efforts against the premier running backs of his era, including Jim Brown of Cleveland, Rick Casares of Chicago and Alan Ameche of Baltimore. He was named the NFL's Outstanding Lineman in 1959. Huff anchored a defense that helped the Giants reach the championship game in 1956, 1958, 1959, 1961, 1962 and 1963. He was traded to the Washington Redskins prior to the 1964 season and has been a color analyst on the Redskins radio broadcasts for many years. Huff was enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1982.

ANDY ROBUSTELLI

Robustelli was drafted by the Los Angeles Rams in 1951 and played on two Rams championship teams. In 1956, Wellington Mara traded for Robustelli, who provided a tremendous lift in the Giants' title drive that season. Robustelli, who stayed with the Giants through the 1964 season, played on a winning team in 13 of his 14 pro seasons. He played in eight NFL championship title games and seven Pro Bowls. Robustelli was named All-NFL seven times, two with the Rams and five with the Giants. Robustelli was a durable player who missed only one game in his 14-year career. He was the Giants' general manager prior to George Young. He was a 1971 Pro Football Hall of Fame inductee.

YA. TITTLE

The Giants engineered one of the best trades in their long history prior to the 1961 season when they sent guard Lou Cordileone to the San Francisco 49ers for Tittle. The then 35-year-old Tittle promptly led the Giants to their 12th Eastern Division championship. Tittle played two seasons in the All-American Conference and 11 in the NFL before joining the Giants. In 1962, Tittle set an NFL record by throwing 33 touchdown passes and tied another mark with seven scoring throws in one game. Tittle had his greatest year as a pro in 1963, when he led the league in passing with 221 completions in 367 attempts for 3,145 yards. His 36 touchdown passes broke his own league mark and set a Giants record that still stands. Tittle's career totals include 2,427 completions, 33,070 yards, 242 touchdowns and 13 games with more than 300 yards passing. He was the NFL Player of the Year in 1957, when he led the 49ers to a tie for the Western Division title, and won the honor again in 1961 and 1963, as he took the Giants to Eastern championships. Tittle was named All-NFL in 1957, 1962 and 1963, and also played in six Pro Bowls. He was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1971.

HARRY CARSON

Carson played his entire career with the Giants from 1976-88. An inside linebacker, he was selected to play in nine Pro Bowls, including seven in a row from 1982-88. Carson led the Giants in tackles six times, was a two-time All-NFL first team selection and was the sole captain of the 1986 Super Bowl champions. Carson joined the Giants as a fourth-round draft choice from South Carolina State, where he never missed a game in four seasons, was a two-year captain and a Little All-America selection by the Associated Press. A defensive end in college, Carson successfully moved to linebacker with the Giants so quickly and so successfully that he was voted to the NFL All-Rookie team. Carson played 173 games in a Giants uniform — tying him with Keith Hamilton for seventh all-time — and he was a punishing

run defender who also intercepted 11 passes. Carson had 17 sacks, 14 fumble recoveries and seven forced fumbles. He had 25 tackles (20 solo) in a Monday night game against Green Bay in 1982 and seven tackles in the Giants' 39-20 victory over Denver in Super Bowl XXI. During his prime, Carson was the best run-stopping linebacker in the NFL. In the seven seasons from 1981 to 1987, Giants' opponents averaged only 3.59 yards per rushing attempt, a remarkable achievement for so long a period. During that period, Carson was credited with 856 tackles, including 627 unassisted tackles. He was enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 2006.

LAWRENCE TAYLOR

Taylor joined the Giants as the second overall selection of the 1981 NFL Draft and played his entire 13-year career for the team. When Taylor retired, he was the NFL's No. 2 all-time sack leader in the NFL with 132.5. That total does not include the 9.5 he accumulated as a rookie in 1981 before the sack was an official NFL statistic. Taylor established an NFL record by appearing in 10 consecutive Pro Bowls from 1981-1990. He was named the NFL Rookie of the Year in 1981 and the NFC's Defensive Player of the Week nine times (the award was established in 1984), as well as the conference's Defensive Player of the Month twice, in October 1986 and September 1989. Taylor was a unanimous choice to the NFL's All-1980s team. He was a unanimous selection as the NFL's Most Valuable Player in 1986, when he had a career-high 20.5 sacks, 105 tackles, five passes defended and two forced fumbles. He was inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1999.

AL BLOZIS

Al Blozis played just three seasons for the Giants, 1942-44. He immediately made a favorable impression on the team after arriving in 1942 and quickly earned a starting assignment at tackle. Blozis played in the 1944 championship game against Green Bay. Immediately after the Giants' loss to the Packers, Blozis was sent overseas to fight in World War II. An Army lieutenant, he was killed in action in France just six weeks later. The Giants retired Blozis' No. 32 jersey.

CHARLIE CONERLY

Conerly is often called the best Giants player not in the Pro Football Hall of Fame. He played his entire career with the Giants from 1948-61 and was a vital member of the 1956 NFL Championship team. Conerly was the NFL Rookie of the Year in 1948, the league's Most Valuable Player in 1959 and a Pro Bowler in 1950 and '56. Conerly ranks third in franchise history in pass attempts (2,833), fourth in completions (1,418), third in yards (19,488) and third in touchdown passes (173).

DICK LYNCH

Lynch was traded to the Giants by the Washington Redskins following the 1958 season for a 1960 fourth-round draft choice. He played for the Giants from 1959-66, a period in which the team played in four NFL Championship Games. Lynch played in 97 regular season games for the Giants (109 in his career) and intercepted 35 passes. In both 1961 and 1963, he led the NFL with nine interceptions. In '63, he also led the league with 251 return yards and three touchdowns. Lynch scored seven career touchdowns, four on interception returns and three on fumble returns.

Although he had a great playing career, Lynch is best known to legions of Giants fans for his 40 years as the analyst on the team's radio broadcast. His last game in the booth was the Giants' epic Super Bowl XLII victory over New England. Lynch died nine months later. "Dick was such an important part of our organization for so many years that we really considered him part of the family," John Mara said.

JOE MORRISON

Morrison was a back and an end for the Giants from 1959 through 1972. A dominant figure during his 14-year career, he totaled 2,472 rushing yards and 18 touchdowns. He also caught 395 passes — the third-highest total in franchise history — for 4,993 yards and 47 scores. A versatile player, Morrison played six different positions: fullback, halfback, flanker, tight end, split end and defensive back. Morrison's No. 40 jersey has been retired by the franchise.

PETE GOGOLAK

Gogolak played for the Giants from 1966-74 and is the highest-scoring player in the history of the franchise with 646 points — 120 more than runner-up Brad Daluiso. He also owns the franchise records for field goals (126) and extra points (268). Beyond his prowess as a kicker, Gogolak is a significant figure in the history of pro football. When he moved from the Buffalo Bills to the Giants, Gogolak became the first prominent player to leave the upstart American Football League for the NFL. Wellington Mara signed him after watching rookie Bob Timberlake miss 13 consecutive field goal attempts. Gogolak was also pro football's first soccer style kicker. Prior to Gogolak, placekickers approached the ball straight on, with the toe making first contact with the ball. Gogolak, who was born and played soccer in Hungary, approached the ball at an angle and kicked it with his instep — the style all kickers use today.

GEORGE MARTIN

Martin joined the Giants as an 11th-round draft choice in 1975, the 262nd overall pick. A long shot to survive his first

training camp, Martin stayed with the Giants for his entire 14-year career. He played in 201 regular season games to become one of just three players in team history to cross the 200-games barrier (Strahan played in 216 games and Howard Cross played in 207). Martin was a leader and catalyst on the 1986 Super Bowl champions (he sacked John Elway for a safety in Super Bowl XXI). He had a knack for making the big play, scoring six touchdowns, a record for NFL defensive linemen since broken by Miami's Jason Taylor. Martin also caught a touchdown pass when he lined up as a tight end in 1980. He is perhaps happiest that he is joining his close friend Carson in the Ring of Honor.

PHIL SIMMS

Simms was George Young's first draft choice in 1979 and he played his entire 15-year with the Giants. He overcame a series of injuries early in his career to become the most productive quarterback in team history. Simms holds the Giants career records for pass attempts (4,647), completions (2,576), yards (33,462) and touchdowns (199). He was 95-64 (.597) as a regular season starter and 6-4 in the playoffs. But Simms is best remembered for his almost flawless performance in leading the Giants to victory in Super Bowl XXI. He completed 22 of 25 passes — including all 10 of his throws in the second half — for 268 yards, three touchdowns and no interceptions in a 39-20 rout of the Denver Broncos. In one of the easiest votes in history, he was selected the game's Most Valuable Player.

MICHAEL STRAHAN

Few players in Giants history were as dependable and productive as Strahan. He seldom missed a practice and played in a franchise-record 216 regular season games. Beginning in 1996, he played in 136 consecutive games before tearing his pectoral muscle midway through the 2004 season. Strahan was selected to seven Pro Bowls, was named the 2001 NFL Defensive Player of the Year and was the Giants' Most Valuable Player that year and in 1998. He was a captain on the 2007 Super Bowl championship team. His 141.5 sacks are the highest official total in team history (Taylor had 142.0 but 9.5 as a rookie in 1981, the year before sacks became an official statistic) and the fifth-highest total in NFL history. He set the league's single-season sack record with 22.5 in 2001 and his NFL-best 18.5 sacks in 2003 made him the Giants' only two-time league leader in that category. Strahan's 868 tackles indicates he was also an excellent defender against the run.

JESSIE ARMSTEAD

Armstead, a five-time Pro Bowler, was the 207th player chosen in the 1993 draft, and the last of the Giants' seven selections (the first-round pick had been used on quarterback

Dave Brown in the previous year's supplemental draft). Three of the seven players taken were linebackers: Marcus Buckley (No. 66) and Tommy Thigpen (No. 123), who never did much, and Armstead, who did it all. Armstead's draft was the last that had an eighth round. He was a special teams dynamo and top-flight reserve his first three seasons before becoming the starting weakside linebacker in 1996. Armstead had a team-high 114 tackles, the first of five consecutive seasons with more than 100. The next year, he had a career-best 134 stops, was selected to his first Pro Bowl and was a catalyst as the Giants won the NFC East title. In 2000 he had one of his best seasons and the Giants routed Minnesota, 41-0, in the NFC Championship Game.

AMANI TOOMER

Toomer joined the Giants in 1996 as a second-round draft choice from Michigan and played his entire 13-year career with the team. He played in 190 regular season games, the fourth-highest total in Giants history. He also played in 11 postseason games, scoring two touchdowns in the Giants' victory over the Cowboys in a 2007 NFC Divisional Playoff Game and finishing with a team-high six receptions in the Super Bowl XLIII triumph over New England. Toomer holds franchise records for catches (668), receiving yards (9,497), touchdown catches (54) and 100-yard receiving games (22). He finished his career with 82 more receptions than runner-up Barber (586) and 4,063 more yards than former record-holder Gifford (5,434). Toomer caught at least one pass in a Giants-record 98 consecutive games before the streak ended in the 2005 season opener vs. Arizona. He holds the Giants' single-season record with 1,343 receiving yards in 2002. Toomer had the three highest single-season receptions totals in team history until Steve Smith shattered his former mark of 82 with 107 catches last year. Toomer also holds the Giants' postseason records for receptions (44), yards (608) and touchdowns (seven). No one else in Giants playoff history has more than three postseason touchdown catches. In addition, Toomer is second in Giants history with 10,924 total yards (Barber is first with 17,359). His total includes 1,060 yards on punt returns, 257 yards on kickoff returns and 110 yards rushing.

TIKI BARBER

Barber joined the Giants as a second-round draft choice in 1997. When he retired following his 10th season in 2006, his name was all over the franchise's record book. Barber owns the Giants marks for rushing attempts in a career (2,217) and in a season (357 in 2005) and rushing yards in a career (10,440), a season (1,860 in 2005) and a game (234 at Washington on Dec. 20, 2006 in his final regular season game). Barber has the top three and four of the top five single-season rushing totals in Giants history and the two highest game totals. His 38

100-yard games are twice as many as No. 2 Joe Morris and his nine 100-yard games in 2004 is another record. Barber has the longest run from scrimmage in Giants history (95 yards at Oakland on Dec. 31, 2005) and his 55 rushing touchdowns are another one of his records. Barber's 17,359 all-purpose yards give him another record. He owns the Giants' top five single-season total yardage figures. Another one of his records is 13 catches at Dallas on Jan. 2, 2000. Barber is also second in franchise history with 586 career receptions. He was selected to three Pro Bowls (2004-06).

CLASS OF 2011

ALEX WEBSTER

Webster played his entire 10-year career (1955-64) for the Giants. He played in 109 games and 47 years after his retirement, he is fourth on the Giants' career lists with 4,638 rushing yards and 1,196 carries. He also caught 240 passes for 2,679 yards and scored 56 touchdowns (39 rushing, 17 receiving). Webster was the second-leading rusher and scorer and the third-leading receiver for the 1956 NFL champion Giants. He was selected to the Pro Bowl in 1958 and 1961, when he ran for a career-high 928 yards. Webster was the Giants' head coach from 1969-73. Webster passed away on March 3, 2012, just three months after being inducted into the Ring of Honor.

BRAD VAN PELT

Van Pelt played for the Giants from 1973-83, when the team had only one winning record, but he was one of the team's very best players. Van Pelt joined Carson, Brian Kelley and later Lawrence Taylor to form the famed group of linebackers known as the "Crunch Bunch." He was selected to play in the Pro Bowl every season from 1976-80. Van Pelt played in 143 games for the Giants in four home stadiums - Yankee Stadium, Yale Bowl, Shea Stadium and Giants Stadium - and for five head coaches - Bill Arnsparger, John McVay, Ray Perkins and Bill Parcells. He had 16 interceptions for the Giants. Van Pelt died on Feb. 17, 2009.

CARL BANKS

Banks was the third overall selection of the 1984 NFL Draft and played for the Giants through the 1992 season. He was one of the premier run-stoppers of his era, a standout on the teams that won Super Bowls XXI and XXV, a Pro Bowler in 1987 and a member of the NFL 1980's All-Decade Team. Banks played in 126 regular season games and had 36.0 sacks, three interceptions and approximately 500 tackles. Banks is still closely affiliated with the Giants; since 2007, he has been an analyst on the Giants' radio broadcasts.

MARK BAVARO

Bavaro is one of the finest all-around tight ends in Giants history. An outstanding blocker, he is also 10th on the franchise's career list with 266 receptions and 15th with 3,722 yards. Bavaro was a starter on the Giants' 1986 and 1990 Super Bowl championship teams and a Pro Bowler in 1986 and '87. In the Giants' first Super Bowl season, Bavaro led the team with 66 catches — twice as many as any teammate — for 1,001 yards to become the only tight end in Giants history with 1,000 receiving yards in a season.

DAVE JENNINGS

Jennings is the most prolific punter in Giants history. A member of the team from 1974-84, Jennings holds the franchise records for punts (931) and yards (38,792). He was selected to play in the Pro Bowl in 1978, '79, '80 and '82. He punted a career-high 104 times in 1979, twice punted for more than 4,000 yards in a season and had a career-best 44.8-yard average in 1980.

CLASS OF 2015

CHRIS SNEE

Snee joined the Giants as a second-round draft choice in 2004 from Boston College. That preseason, he became the starter at right guard and stayed in that position for 10 years. Snee was a two-time Super Bowl champion, a four-time Pro Bowler and an All-Pro in 2010. He started all 141 regular-season games and 11 postseason games in which he played. From 2005-11, he started 101 consecutive regular-season games (plus seven postseason games) before missing a game with a concussion. Snee missed only 19 games in his 10 seasons, including 13 in 2013, his final year.

OSI UMENYIORA

Umenyiora was a member of the Giants Super Bowl XLII and XLVI championship teams. A second-round draft choice in 2003, he played 10 seasons for the Giants. Umenyiora was selected to two Pro Bowls and is fourth on the franchise's career list with 75.0 regular-season sacks. XLVI. He was the only member of the 2007 world champions to play in the Pro Bowl. That season, the Giants had an NFL-high 53 sacks, thanks largely to their three outstanding defensive ends. Umenyiora led the way with 13.0. Tuck, another two-time Pro Bowler, had 10.0, and Strahan had 9.0 in his final season. On Sept. 23, 2007, Umenyiora set the Giants' single-game franchise record with 6.0 sacks of Philadelphia's Donovan McNabb in Giants Stadium. In 10 postseason games, Umenyiora had 5.5 sacks, tying him with Tuck for fourth on that franchise list.

JOHN JOHNSON

Johnson joined the team as an athletic trainer in 1948. He retired at age 90 following the 2007 season, ending a remarkable 60-year career with the franchise. Johnson was on the Giants' sideline for 874 regular-season and 34 postseason games, and he attended thousands of practices. Johnson worked with 12 head coaches, from Steve Owen to Tom Coughlin, and helped keep the Giants running through those 908 games. Generations of players revered Johnson for his wisdom, his friendship and his unique ability to perfectly tape an ankle. Johnson passed away on Feb. 28, 2016, a month shy of his 99th birthday.

JACK LUMMUS

Lummus' entire Giants career consisted of nine games in 1941. He was a 6-3, 200-pound two-way end who that season caught one five-yard pass for a Giants team that finished 8-3 before losing to the Bears in the NFL Championship Game on Dec. 21, two weeks after the attack on Pearl Harbor. On Jan. 30, 1942, with the United States fully engaged in World War II, Lummus gave up his football career to enlist in the Marine Corps Reserves. He was killed in the Battle of Iwo Jima in 1945. He becomes the second member of the Ring of Honor who was killed in a World War II battle. Al Blozis, an Army lieutenant, lost his life in combat in France just six weeks after he played in the 1944 NFL Championship Game vs. Green Bay.

CLASS OF 2016

TOM COUGHLIN

Coughlin was the Giants' head coach from 2004-15. His signature achievements were the Giants' victories against the New England Patriots in Super Bowls XLII and XLVI. Coughlin was just the second man to coach the Giants for at least 12 seasons. Only Hall of Famer Steve Owen, who reigned for 23 full seasons from 1931-53, led the team for a longer time period. With the Giants, Coughlin was 102-90 in the regular season, and 8-3 in the postseason. The 102 victories are second in franchise history to Owen's 151. Coughlin led the Giants to three NFC East titles and five playoff berths. His eight postseason triumphs tie him with Bill Parcells for the most ever by a Giants coach. Coughlin was the team's wide receivers coach from 1988-90, a tenure that ended with the team's victory in Super Bowl XXV.

ERNIE ACCORSI

Accorsi was the Giants' general manager from 1998-2006 after serving as an assistant under George Young for four

seasons. In Accorsi's nine years as G.M., the Giants won two NFC East titles, earned four postseason berths, and advanced to Super Bowl XXXV. He was instrumental in hiring two-time Super Bowl-winning coach Tom Coughlin. Accorsi made the most significant trade in Giants history when he acquired Eli Manning in a draft day deal in 2004. Manning led the Giants to a pair of Super Bowl victories and is without peer among quarterbacks in Giants history. Accorsi also brought in several other key players to the team that won Super Bowl XLII, including Antonio Pierce, Osi Umenyiora, and Plaxico Burress.

JUSTIN TUCK

A third-round draft choice from Notre Dame in 2005, Tuck played in 127 regular-season games with 90 starts in nine Giants seasons. He was a defensive catalyst on the teams that

won Super Bowl XLII and Super Bowl XLVI, a two-time Pro Bowler, and four-time team captain. Tuck was credited with more than 500 tackles. His 60.5 sacks are officially the sixth-highest total in franchise history. Tuck also played in 10 postseason games. He had 5.5 sacks, including two sacks of Tom Brady in each of the Super Bowl victories, when a dominant defensive line was one of the vital components of the Giants' success.

"It was the toughest, roughest football game I ever played in," Owen would say later. With the score tied 7-7, the Bears drove to the Giants' one-yard line, but Owen and Cal Hubbard spearheaded a goal line defense which held the Bears out of the end zone. Hinky Haines then faked a punt from his own end zone and completed a pass to Charlie Corgan for a 58-yard gain that set up the winning score and elation for Tim Mara and the Giants.

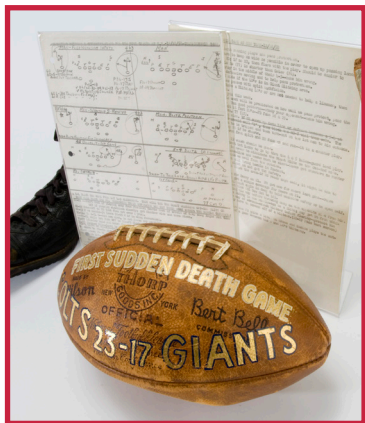

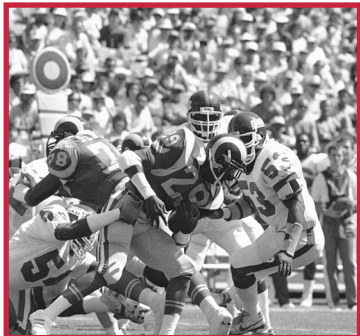

In a stunning collapse, the Giants watched a nine-point lead evaporate in the final two minutes of the game as the season ended in a 23-22 loss to Minnesota. The Giants were in front, 22-13, at the two-minute warning, but the Vikings were at the Giants 49-yard line following a 26-yard punt by P Brad Maynard. Vikings QB Randall Cunningham completed a 19-yard pass to WR Cris Carter to get the Vikings to the Giants 30-yard line with 1:38 left to play, and then he completed a 30-yard touchdown pass to WR Jake Reed to close the gap to 22-20. Minnesota executed an onside kick on the ensuing kickoff that bounced off WR Chris Caloway and into the hands of Minnesota WR Chris Walsh at the Vikings 39. Faced with a third-and-four situation, Cunningham fired a slant pass to Carter, who turned the play into a 21-yard gain to the Giants 34-yard line. The Giants could not get untracked against Baltimore's highly-rated defense, gaining only 152 yards (66 on the ground) and picking up 11 first downs (2 rushing). Quarterback Kerry Collins struggled, completing only 15 of 39 passes for 112 yards and four interceptions. Brad Maynard punted a Super Bowl-record 11 times for a 38.4-yard average. The Giants defense played well, limiting the Ravens to 244 yards and 13 first downs. Baltimore took a 7-0 lead in the first period on a 38-yard pass from Trent Dilfer to Brandon Stokley. Matt Stover added a 47-yard field goal in the second period for a 10-0 halftime lead. The Ravens advantage grew to 17-0 when Duane Starks intercepted a Collins pass and returned it 49 yards for a touchdown early in the third period. The Giants responded with their only touchdown of the day, on Ron Dixon's 97-yard kickoff return. But Baltimore immediately scored on the next kickoff, as Jermaine Lewis returned it 84 yards for a score and a 31-7 lead. The Giants' season ended with a shocking and heartbreaking defeat as they wasted a 38-14 third-quarter lead and fell to the 49ers. Four touchdown passes by Kerry Collins — three to Amani Toomer and one to Jeremy Shockey — a touchdown run by Tiki Barber and Matt Bryant's field goal gave the Giants what seemed to be a commanding 24-point lead with 4:27 left in the third quarter. But the 49ers mounted a quick and complete comeback. Terrell Owens caught a 26-yard touchdown pass from Jeff Garcia, who then ran 14 yards for another score. Jeff Chandler's 25-yard field goal pulled San Francisco to within 38-33. With 1:00 remaining, Garcia threw a 13-yard touchdown pass to Tai Streets. The Giants lost a playoff game in Giants Stadium for just the third time when they fell to the Carolina Panthers, 23-0. Carolina dominated the game, holding big advantages in offensive plays (71-35), time of possession (42:45-17:15), first downs (23-9), total yards (335-132) and rushing yards (223-41). The Giants hurt themselves with five turnovers, including three Eli Manning interceptions on consecutive possessions in the second half (two by Marlon McCree and one by Ken Lucas). Manning also fumbled late in the game. The Giants converted just one of seven third-down opportunities. Steve Smith caught a touchdown pass and ran in for another score and John Kasay kicked three field goals for the Panthers. DeShaun Foster rushed for 151 yards on 27 carries, a 5.6-yard average that was reflective of the Giants' tackling difficulties throughout the game. Jake Delhomme completed 15 of 22 passes for 140 yards. Smith had 10 of those receptions. For the Giants, Tiki Barber rushed for 41 yards, or 75 yards less than his regular season average. The Giants overcame a 10-point fourth-quarter deficit to tie the score, but couldn't prevent the Eagles from driving 46 yards in the final 5:04 for the game-winning score. Tiki Barber rushed for 137 yards in his final NFL game, Eli Manning completed 16 of 27 passes for 161 yards and Plaxico Burress had two touchdown receptions. The Giants also got a pair of field goals from Jay Feely. The Eagles scored on a 49-yard touchdown run by Brian Westbrook, Jeff Garcia's 28-yard touchdown pass to Donte Stallworth and three Akers field goals. Akers' 48-yard field goal — the longest in Philadelphia postseason history — increased the Eagles' advantage to 20-10 with 2:37 remaining in the third quarter. Feely's 24-yard field goal pulled the Giants to within 20-13 just 10 seconds into

the fourth quarter. They tied the game at 20-20 when Eli Manning found Burress in the end zone for an 11-yard touchdown pass with 5:04 remaining. Burress' second touchdown capped a 13-play, 80-yard drive in the rain that took 7:09 to complete. The Giants needed a stop so they could get the ball back and try to win a game. But they never owed the ball again. Westbrook's 13-yard run gave Philly a first down on the Giants' 19-yard line with 1:48 remaining. From there, the Eagles bled the clock until they called timeout with three seconds left. Akers then booted the game-winner.

Before the Giants opened postseason play in an NFC Wild Card Game at Tampa Bay, Tom Coughlin had a simple message for his players: "Let's keep playing." So they did. Carrying their season-long road success into the playoffs, the Giants prevailed, 24-14, over the NFC South champion Buccaneers. They broke a four-game postseason losing streak that began in Super Bowl XXXV — in Raymond James Stadium, the home of the Bucs. The Giants also won their first playoff road game since the 1990 NFC Championship Game in San Francisco. They defeated Bucs quarterback Jeff Garcia, who had beaten them in the playoffs with the 49ers in 2002 and Philadelphia in 2006. Brandon Jacobs scored two touchdowns for the Giants, one on a five-yard reception, the other on an eight-yard run. Jacobs became the first Giants player in history with a rushing and receiving touchdown in the same postseason game. Amani Toomer caught a touchdown pass and Lawrence Tynes kicked a 25-yard field goal for the Giants. Eli Manning completed 20 of 27 passes for 185 yards, the two touchdowns and no interceptions as the Giants won a postseason game for the first time with him taking the snaps. The Giants entered the game with a minus-nine turnover differential, or minus-24 relative to the Bucs' plus-15. Yet they had three takeaways to none for the Bucs. The first, a fumble recovery by Corey Webster on the second-half kickoff, led to Tynes' field goal. The second, a Webster interception in the end zone, likely denied the Bucs points. The third, a pick by R.W. McQuarters with 1:53 remaining, sealed the deal. The Giants played without center Shaun O'Hara (knee) and

cornerback Sam Madison (abdominal). But Grey Ruegamer and Webster filled in superbly (the corner holding Joey Galloway to one nine-yard reception). They were among a large cast of key contributors. Toomer had a game-high seven catches for 74 yards. Rookie Ahmad Bradshaw came off the bench to rush for a game-high 66 yards. Michael Strahan had a career postseason high of nine tackles (eight solo). Gerris Wilkinson, who started for Kawika Mitchell (knee) had seven tackles (five solo). Tank Daniels had two special teams tackles and forced the fumble that Webster recovered. Zak DeOssie also had two special teams tackles. The offensive line allowed only one sack. Tampa Bay took an early lead on Earnest Graham's one-yard run, but Jacobs' two touchdowns gave the Giants a 14-7 halftime advantage. The first score successfully concluded an eight-play, 53-yard drive that took 4:04 to complete. Manning completed five passes for 49 yards in the series. Toomer accounted for 40 yards on three catches. On their next series, the Giants drove 65 yards in seven plays. The biggest play of the series was Manning's 21-yard pass to Steve Smith on third-and-two. Tynes' field goal and Toomer's touchdown midway through the fourth quarter extended the Giants' lead to 24-7 before Tampa Bay added a late score. Toomer scored at the end of a 15-play, 92-yard drive that featured 38 yards rushing by Bradshaw and three Toomer receptions for 27 yards.

The Giants avenged their only road defeat of the season, a 45-35 opening-night loss, with a 21-17 victory over the top-seeded Dallas Cowboys in an NFC Divisional Playoff Game in Texas Stadium. The Cowboys had defeated the Giants twice in the regular season. The Giants became the first team to beat the NFC's No. 1 seed in the divisional round since the current postseason format (six teams from each conference) was adopted in 1990. Amani Toomer scored a pair of touchdowns on receptions of 52 and four yards from Eli Manning. Brandon Jacobs' one-yard touchdown run with 13:29 remaining provided the Giants with the game-winning points. But the victory was not assured until R.W. McQuarters intercepted Tony Romo's pass for Terry Glenn in the end zone with nine seconds remaining. It was the game's only takeaway. Manning had a career-high 132.4 passer rating after completing 12 of 18 passes for 163 yards, the two scores to Toomer and no interceptions. The Giants played with a severely depleted secondary. Sam Madison (stomach) and Kevin Dockery (hip flexor) were inactive. A third cornerback, Aaron Ross, left the game for good in the third quarter with a shoulder injury. That left Corey Webster, McQuarters and Geoffrey Pope — who spent the entire regular season on the practice squad before joining on the active roster on Dec. 31 — as the only healthy corners. All played extensively in the second

half. The secondary, aided by a relentless second-half pass rush, stayed strong throughout the game. The Cowboys scored on Tony Romo's five-yard touchdown pass to Terrell Owens and Marion Barber's one-yard run in the second quarter and Nick Folk's 34-yard field goal in the third. Romo completed 18 of 36 passes for 201 yards and his 64.7 rating was less than half of Manning's. Toomer turned a short Manning pass into a 52-yard touchdown on the Giants' fifth offensive play. After Dallas took a 14-7 lead, Manning led the Giants on a 71-yard drive in the final minute of the half that ended with a four-yard scoring pass to Toomer and a 14-14 halftime tie. Folk gave the Cowboys a 17-14 lead before Jacobs' touchdown on the third play of the fourth quarter gave the Giants the lead for good. But the Cowboys had one last chance when they took possession at the Giants' 48-yard line with 1:50 remaining. Dallas soon faced second-and-11 at the 23. Two incomplete passes left them staring at a fourth down with the seasons of both teams hanging in the balance. Owens was double covered, so Romo threw to the center of the end zone for Terry Glenn. But McQuarters stepped up and picked off the pass, sending the Giants to the NFC Championship Game.

The coldest game in Giants history was also one of the most memorable and satisfying the franchise has ever played. The Giants overcame the elements – and the Packers – to defeat Green Bay in overtime, 23-20, in the NFC Championship Game in frigid Lambeau Field. Lawrence Tynes provided the game-winning points when he kicked a 47-yard field goal with 2:35 elapsed in overtime. Tynes had missed his previous two attempts, including one on the final play of regulation. It was the first time in the history of Lambeau that a visiting player had kicked a field goal of more than 40 yards in a postseason game. The score was set up by Corey Webster's interception on the second play of overtime. The temperature at game time was minus-one degree with winds of 12 miles-an-hour – a numbing wind chill of minus-23. In terms of temperature alone, this was the third-coldest NFL game on record. At the famed Ice Bowl between the Packers and Dallas Cowboys in Lambeau on Dec. 31, 1967, it was 13 below zero at kickoff. In the 1981 Chargers-Bengals AFC Championship Game in Cincinnati, it was nine below. Brandon Jacobs (one-yard run) and Ahmad Bradshaw (four-yard run) scored touchdowns and Tynes added a 29-yard field goal for the Giants. Eli Manning set career postseason highs with 40 passes, 21 completions and 251 yards. Plaxico Burress established a franchise postseason record with 11 catches, for 151 yards. The old mark of 10 was set by Ike Hilliard in the 2000 NFC Championship Game victory over Minnesota. Defensively, the Giants held Green Bay to 28 rushing yards, forced Favre into two late interceptions and limited the Packers to one suc-

cessful third down conversion on 10 tries. The Giants dominated the game statistically, outgaining Green Bay (380-264), rolling up 11 more first downs (24-13) and owning the ball for 40:01 to just 22:34 for the Packers. The Packers scored on Driver's 90-yard catch-and-run and Favre's 12-yard touchdown pass to Donald Lee, plus field goals by rookie Mason Crosby of 36 and 37 yards. Crosby's second field goal, with 11:46 remaining in the fourth quarter, tied the score at 20-20. The Giants had a chance to prevent the score when R.W. McQuarters intercepted a Favre pass at the eight-yard line. But McQuarters was hit by Ryan Grant and fumbled and the ball bounced right to Packers tackle Mark Tauscher, who plucked it out of the air at the 19. It was the Giants' first turnover of the postseason...In overtime, Favre threw a pass to Driver, but Webster stepped up and picked off the ball, returning it nine yards to the Green Bay 34-yard line. Ahmad Bradshaw gained five yards on two runs before Manning's pass for Steve Smith fell incomplete. Tynes then sent the Giants to the Super Bowl with one of the biggest field goals in franchise history.

WORLD CHAMPIONS

Super Bowl XLII had a perfect ending, but the unexpected twist was that it belonged to the Giants. Eli Manning engineered a fourth quarter comeback drive for the ages and concluded perhaps the greatest postseason run in NFL history as the underdog Giants upset the previously undefeated New England Patriots, 17-14, in Super Bowl XLII in University of Phoenix Stadium in Glendale, Ariz. The Giants won their third championship of the Super Bowl era — the first in 17 years - and seventh overall in what will surely be remembered as one of the most exciting title games in NFL history. It was the first of 42 Super Bowls in which the lead changed hands three times in the fourth quarter. Plaxico Burress scored the game-winning points with only 35 seconds remaining on a 13-yard pass from Manning. The score concluded a 12-play, 83-yard drive that commenced immediately after New England had taken a 14-10 lead with less than three minutes remaining. Manning, voted the game's most valuable player, completed 19 of 34 passes for 255 yards, two touchdowns and an interception, which deflected off Steve Smith's hands. David Tyree scored the Giants' first touchdown and made an unbelievable catch on the game-winning drive. Ahmad Bradshaw and Brandon Jacobs combined for 87 rushing yards. Amani Toomer caught six passes for 84 yards and Smith added five for 50 yards.

Lawrence Tynes kicked a 32-yard field goal, which ultimately proved to be the deciding points. The Giants' defense was magnificent. New England averaged almost 37 points a game in the regular season. The Giants held them to 14. The Patriots averaged 411.3 yards a game, but totaled only 274 in the Super Bowl. The Patriots rushed for only 45 yards and did not have a run longer than nine yards. Tom Brady was sacked five times. Brady's six-yard touchdown pass to Randy Moss gave the Pats a 14-10 lead with just 2:42 remaining. Cornerback Corey Webster slipped on the play and New England reached the end zone at the end of a 12-play, 80-yard drive. Manning responded by completing five of nine passes for 77 yards on the game-winning drive. The one everyone will long remember came on a third-and-five from the Giants' 44. Manning, seemingly about to be sacked, escaped, steadied himself and fired a pass down the middle of the field for Tyree, who was closely covered by safety Rodney Harrison. Both players jumped for the ball, which somehow landed on top of Tyree's helmet. But the receiver wrestled the ball away from Harrison for what may well be the greatest catch in Super Bowl history. The 32-yard gain gave the Giants a first down at the New England 24. Three plays later, Smith picked up a huge first down and Manning followed with the game-winning throw to Burress.

The Giants advanced as far as Philadelphia's 17-yard line three times - and had a first down on the 11 on their initial possession - but settled for field goals each time. The Giants converted only three of 13 third down opportunities. Their last five possessions ended, in order, with a missed field goal, twice on downs, an interception and a fumble. The Giants used a smothering defense and an opportunistic, big-play offense to rout the Falcons, 24-2, their first postseason victory since Super Bowl XLII and their first home playoff win since the 2000 NFC Championship Game triumph over Minnesota. Eli Manning threw three touchdown passes - four and 72 yards to Hakeem Nicks and 27 yards to Mario Manningham. The Giants also got a 22-yard field goal from Lawrence Tynes. Manning completed 23 of 32 passes for 277 yards. Brandon Jacobs ran for a career postseason high 92 yards and Ahmad Bradshaw added 63 as the Giants ran for 172 yards, 50 more than their previous high total in the 2011 season. The Giants' 442 net yards was their third-highest total in a postseason game. The defense was even more dominant. The unit did not allow a point - the Falcons' only score was on a safety. Atlanta rushed for only 64 yards, including 41 on 15 carries by Michael Turner, who ran for 1,340 yards in the regular season. The Giants stopped the Falcons on 10 of 14 third down attempts and all three of their fourth-down conversion tries, including a pair of fourth-and-one quarterback sneaks by Matt Ryan.

For the second time in five seasons, the Giants traveled to Wisconsin in January and stunned a higher-seeded Green Bay Packers team. They rode a terrific defensive effort and three Eli Manning touchdown passes to defeat the top-seeded, 15-1, defending Super Bowl Champion Packers, 37-20, an NFC Divisional Playoff Game in Lambeau Field. It was the third time the Giants eliminated the defending Super Bowl champions from the playoffs. The 37-yarder to Nicks was a Hail Mary on the final play of the second quarter. Brandon Jacobs scored on a 14-yard run and Lawrence Tynes kicked field goals of 31, 23 and 35 yards. The Packers scored on Aaron Rodgers touchdown passes of eight yards to fullback John Kuhn and 16 yards to wide receiver Donald Driver, plus Mason Crosby field goals of 47 and 35 yards.

The game-winning kick was set up by an overtime takeaway when Devin Thomas recovered a Kyle Williams fumble on a punt return that was forced by Jacquian Williams. In the fourth quarter, Thomas had recovered a Kyle Williams fumble on a punt, setting up Eli Manning's 17-yard touchdown pass to Mario Manningham. The officials originally ruled that Williams didn't touch the ball and that Thomas had merely downed it. Tom Coughlin challenged the ruling and after review, referee changed the call to a fumble and a recovery. Manning threw for 316 yards and two touchdowns while setting Giants postseason records with 58 passes and 32 completions. The other touchdown was scored by Bear Pascoe, his first as a professional. Tynes kick another 31-yard field goal. Victor Cruz had 10 receptions for 142 yards, including eight for 125 in the first half. Ahmad Bradshaw totaled 126 yards from scrimmage, including 74 on the ground. Chase Blackburn had a team-high seven tackles (five solo). Jason Pierre-Paul had

The Giants won their fourth Super Bowl and eighth championship in franchise history in a game that was eerily similar to their victory over the same opponent in Super Bowl XLIII four years before. Eli Manning completed his first nine passes and 30 of 40 overall for 296 yards and a touchdown to win his second Pete Rozelle Trophy as the game's Most Valuable Player. He was at his best in the fourth quarter, when he hit 10 of 14 passes for 118 yard, including a pinpoint 38-yarder to Mario Manningham to start the game-winning 88-yard, nine-play masterpiece that was completed in 2:49. In addition to Bradshaw's touchdown, the Giants scored on Manning's two-yard touchdown pass to Victor Cruz, Lawrence Tynes field goals of 38 and 33 yards and a safety when Brady was penalized for intentional grounding in the end zone. New England's points came on Brady touchdown passes of four yards to Danny Woodhead and 12 yards to Aaron Hernandez and Steve Gostkowski's 29-yard field goal.

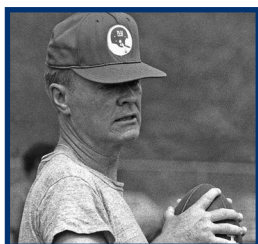
