





TERRY MCGUIRK

Chairman

Terry McGuirk is Chairman & CEO of Braves Holdings, LLC, the parent company of the Atlanta Braves and Braves Development Company. In his role as Chairman and Control Person of the Atlanta Braves, McGuirk maintains executive oversight of all aspects of the Braves franchise including all team and player personnel operations, business operations, Truist Park and representation of the Braves at Major League Baseball ownership meetings. McGuirk is also the Chairman of Braves Development Company, the Braves real estate development entity that owns and operates The Battery Atlanta mixed use development adjacent to Truist Park.

In 2021, McGuirk oversaw the holistic organizational efforts that culminated in the Braves' fourth World Series title.

McGuirk spent 35 years at Turner Broadcasting System, Inc. (TBS), beginning in 1972 as an account executive with WTCG, which later became TBS Superstation. In 1973, he assumed the same role at TBS-owned WRET in Charlotte, N.C. McGuirk returned to Atlanta in 1975 as director of cable relations, where he was instrumental in the launch of TBS Superstation and played a key role in the launch of every Turner network through 2001.

In 1978, McGuirk was named director of special projects for TBS, Inc. and in 1979, was appointed vice president of TBS, Inc. From 1987 to 1991, he served as president of Turner Network Sales and CNN International Sales, Ltd., where he set up the company's international sales and distribution operations. He was elected to the TBS, Inc. board of directors in July 1987. Concurrently, McGuirk was president of Turner Sports where, during his tenure, he was instrumental in securing coverage of the Olympics for cable television for the first time and oversaw the resurgence of the winningest team in baseball, the Atlanta Braves.

As executive vice president, McGuirk served as the company's second in command from 1991

to 1996. When TBS, Inc. merged with Time Warner Inc. in 1996, he succeeded R.E. (Ted) Turner as chairman, president and CEO.

He served as chairman and chief executive officer of the company until March 2001. From that point through December 2003, McGuirk was vice chairman of Turner Broadcasting System Inc., along with being chief executive officer of the company owned Atlanta sports teams, including the Major League Baseball Braves, the National Basketball Association Hawks and the National Hockey League Thrashers.

McGuirk has served on the board of many cable industry-related groups and the International Olympic Committee's Radio and Television Commission. He was the 1989 recipient of the NCTA Vanguard Award for Young Leadership and was inducted into the fellowship of Cable Television Pioneers at the 1996 NCTA Convention.

A native of Bayshore, N.Y., McGuirk is a graduate of Portsmouth Abbey School and holds a bachelor of arts degree in American history from Middlebury College.

McGuirk is on the MLB Executive Council and is the immediate past Chairman of the Board of Major League Baseball's Business and Media Committee, the successor to MLB Advanced Media (MLBAM). He also serves on the MLB Ownership Committee. McGuirk is the chairman of the newly formed Major League Baseball Media Committee.

He is a Trustee Emeritus of both Piedmont Healthcare and The Westminster Schools. McGuirk was the 2000 recipient of the Anti-Defamation League's Stewart Lewengrub Torch of Liberty Award. In 2006, he received the Governors Award from the southeastern chapter of the National Academy of Television Arts & Sciences and, in 2010, he entered the Cable Television Hall of Fame.

Terry and his wife, Nancy, live in Atlanta and have four children.

ATLANTA BRAVES OWNERSHIP

Liberty Media Corporation officially acquired the Atlanta Braves on May 16, 2007, when Baseball Commissioner Allan H. ("Bud") Selig announced that Major League Baseball ownership had approved Turner Broadcasting and Time Warner's sale of the team.

Based in Englewood, Colo., Liberty Media owns interests in a broad range of electronic retailing, media, communications, sports and entertainment businesses. Liberty's Chairman is John Malone and its President and CEO is Greg Maffei.



DEREK SCHILLER

President and CEO, Atlanta Braves

In his 19th season with the Atlanta Braves, President and Chief Executive Officer Derek Schiller manages all business and ballpark

functions of the team. Schiller oversees revenue-driven areas including corporate partnerships, ticket sales, broadcasting, licensing, special events, retail merchandise, and concessions, plus all service-driven departments including client services, guest services, ticket operations, alumni relations, communications, community relations, marketing, people capital, and ballpark operations. As part of his role, Schiller sets the strategic vision for the Atlanta Braves, guides the Braves brand, champions innovation across all areas of the business, and manages the wide array of talented Braves employees.

Outside of the ballpark, Schiller and the executive team have guided the philosophy behind The Battery Atlanta to ensure a seamless integration with Truist Park, in both an aesthetic and strategic capacity. This new approach to adding a massive real estate development as part of a new ballpark has been recognized around the world.

Schiller has been a key factor in guiding the front office to further increase sales and visibility, improve customer service, and become an industry leader with innovations within the business of professional sports, particularly with business analytics and processes, fan engagement, and mobile ticketing and ordering. He also oversaw the addition of the team's diversity and inclusion marketing department, the first team in Major League Baseball to have a defined department within the diversity engagement space.

Under Schiller's direction, the Braves have introduced many technical developments including digital ticketing, variable and dynamic pricing, and a Customer Relationship Management system that has enhanced customer service and data management for both corporate partners and ticket holders. During his tenure, the organization has also placed a focus on expanding fan outreach by creating engaging content on all social media platforms.

Schiller works closely and collaboratively with Braves Chairman Terry McGuirk, President of Baseball Operations Alex Anthopoulos and President of Braves Development Company Mike Plant.

Additionally, Schiller oversees all broadcasting relationships, which include Braves television partner Bally Sports South and Bally Sports Southeast, as well as the team's radio partner, Dickey Broadcasting, and the Braves Radio Network of affiliates across the

Southeast.

As part of the Braves' executive leadership team, Schiller was instrumental in securing plans for Truist Park and The Battery Atlanta and played a pivotal role throughout the design and execution phases of the project. Collaborating with Truist Park planners and architects, Schiller and the executive team tailored the ballpark to authentically represent the organization and its rich history, while creating unique gameday experiences for fans and visitors. Schiller's emphasis on innovation was the driving force behind many of these enhancements, along with technology partnerships that made Truist Park the most technologically advanced venue in all of sports.

Schiller joined the Braves in November 2003 as senior vice president of sales and marketing and was promoted to executive vice president of sales and marketing in August 2007. He came to the Braves after serving as vice president of sales and marketing for the Atlanta Thrashers hockey team since 1998. In that position, he led the development of the Thrashers as an expansion franchise in the National Hockey League, which included the management of all business operations and marketing.

Before joining the Thrashers, Schiller served as vice president of business development for the New York Yankees from 1996 to 1997. While there, he was responsible for all revenue-producing and related functions, including sponsorship sales, marketing, ticket and suite sales, publications, concessions and merchandising, fan services and licensing. He was instrumental in putting together one of the largest sponsorship deals in sports between the Yankees and Adidas.

Schiller earned a degree in engineering from Vanderbilt University. He is on the board of directors of the Metro Atlanta Chamber of Commerce, serves as an executive board member of the Atlanta Convention and Visitors Bureau, and is a board member of the Atlanta Sports Council, the Cobb Chamber of Commerce, and the Jack and Jill Late Stage Cancer Foundation. He also serves on the Truist Atlanta Advisory Council and a number of MLB committees. Schiller is an alumnus of Leadership Atlanta and supports several metro Atlanta charities. Schiller and his wife, Kristin, live in Atlanta and have two children, Luke and Carson.



MIKE PLANT

President and CEO, Braves Development Company

Mike Plant is in his 19th season with the Atlanta Braves, and his fifth as President and Chief Executive Officer of Development. Plant joined the organization as Executive Vice President of Business Operations in November of 2003.

In his role, Plant oversees the Braves real estate and development holdings including The Battery Atlanta, its development and project management teams, design, financing, construction and leasing activities. Braves and Battery security, life safety, parking and government relations are all consolidated under Plant's leadership. He also works with key Braves executives managing all Minor League Team operations and the new Spring Training complex in North Point, Florida.

As part of the Braves executive leadership team, Plant was instrumental in the Braves' efforts to secure and plan SunTrust Park (now Truist Park) and the adjacent mixed-use development, The Battery Atlanta, which opened in Cobb County in April 2017. The creative innovative approach Plant led since inception has been recognized as a leading example of how to structure a successful Public/Private partnership now generating substantial returns for multiple government entities. Oversight and direct responsibility for managing all aspects of design, project management, financing, leasing and construction led to delivering approximately 2.5MM square feet in less than 36 months. A \$300MM, 800,000 square foot phase 2 of The Battery Atlanta started in July 2018. The hallmark of this phase is led by thyssenkrupp, the global leader in urban mobility, and Papa John's Pizza creating their new headquarters at The Battery Atlanta.

Plant joined the Braves after having served as Executive Vice President of Turner Sports since February 2002. In that position, he was in charge of the day-to-day operations of the division, a \$500-million acquisition, promotion and production company that at the time broadcast approximately 1,200 hours of sports programming on various Turner networks.

Before becoming Executive Vice President of Turner Sports, Plant was President of Ted Turner's multi-sport event, The Goodwill Games, and Vice President of Events for Turner Sports. He was responsible for the overall direction and management of The Goodwill Games, as well as all sports properties acquired by Turner Sports.

Prior to joining Turner Sports, Plant was Owner and President of Medalist Sports, a full-service sports marketing company he founded in 1988. Medalist Sports created and operated premier professional cycling events in the United States and China. In addition, Plant was the Associate Executive Director of the United States Cycling Federation in Colorado Springs, Colo., from 1986 to 1988 and the Executive Director of the Canoe and Kayak Team from 1985 to 1986.

Plant was a member of the 1980 U.S. Olympic speedskating team in Lake Placid, NY, and a six-time member of the U.S. World Championship speedskating teams. Since 1980, he has chaired numerous committees and boards for the U.S. Olympic Committee (USOC), the U.S. International Speedskating Association, International Cycling Federation, and USA Cycling. Plant served on the Atlanta Committee for the 1996 Olympic Games (ACOG) Board of Directors and the Board of Trustees for the Salt Lake City Olympic Bid Committee for the 2002 Winter Games.

Plant served two eight-year terms on the USOC's Board of Directors and Executive Committee (1984-1992 and 2003-2011). He was Chairman of the USOC Athletes Council, and Chairman of the Athlete Performance Group (1992-1996). Plant was President of USA Cycling, the National Governing Body for Olympic cycling, from 1995 to 2002, and President of U.S. Speedskating from 2013-2018.

Internationally, Plant served on the International Cycling Federation's (UCI) Executive Committee for 20 years, and was President of three different commissions. In 2009, Plant was elected U.S. Olympic Chef de Mission for the Olympic team for the 2010 Vancouver Olympic Games.

He and his wife Mary have two daughters, Erika and Maddie, and a son, Drew.





ALEX ANTHOPOULOS

President, Baseball Operations and General Manager

Alex Anthopoulos is in his fifth season with the Braves. He joined the club in November 2017 as the executive vice president and general manager. In February 2020, Anthopoulos was promoted to president, baseball operations and general manager, and received a contract extension.

The Braves won the 2021 World Series under his guidance and have won the National League East in each of his first four seasons leading Atlanta's baseball operations department.

He is the 12th Braves general manager since the franchise moved to Atlanta in 1966.

Anthopoulos, who reports to Chairman Terry McGuirk, oversees all aspects of the club's baseball operations. He came to the Braves after spending the 2016 and 2017 seasons as the Los Angeles Dodgers' vice president of baseball operations.

He joined the Dodgers in January 2016 following six seasons as the Toronto Blue Jays' general manager, which culminated in an American League East title in 2015 to snap Toronto's 22-year postseason drought.

Anthopoulos began his baseball career with the Montreal Expos as a media relations intern in 2000 before transitioning to international scouting and serving as Montreal's coordinator for amateur and professional scouting for the 2002 and 2003 seasons. The Expos expanded his duties in 2003, adding the title of Scouting Supervisor for Canada.

He joined Toronto following the 2003 season as a scouting coordinator and earned a promotion to vice president, baseball operations and assistant general manager on January 8, 2006. On October 3, 2009, he accepted the position of senior vice president, baseball operations and general manager.

In voting by his peers, Anthopoulos was selected as *Sporting News'* MLB Executive of the Year at the conclusion of the 2015 campaign.

Born May 25, 1977, Anthopoulos is a native of Montreal, Quebec. He is fluent in English and French, and he also speaks some Spanish and Greek. With his Greek descent, he lent his services to the Greek National baseball team around the 2003 European Championships before helping to assemble the Greek national team for the 2004 Olympics in Athens.

Anthopoulos attended Lower Canada College and Marianopolis College before majoring in economics at McMaster University in Hamilton, Ontario.

He and his wife, Cristina, have a daughter, Julia, and a son, John.

GREG HELLER

Executive Vice President, Chief Legal Officer

The 2022 season marks Greg Heller's 22nd as legal counsel to the Braves. As Executive Vice President and Chief Legal Officer, Heller manages and oversees all legal affairs for the

Braves. Heller also has ultimate oversight for all legal issues related to Truist Park, The Battery Atlanta and for the Braves' spring training facility, CoolToday Park, and had ultimate oversight for all legal matters related to the negotiation, planning and development of all three projects for the Braves organization.

Heller's responsibilities and duties include providing guidance and counsel on baseball operations matters, sales and marketing, broadcasting, stadium and business operations, intellectual property, corporate governance, legislative affairs, employment and litigation.

Prior to serving as Executive Vice President and Chief Legal Officer of the Braves, Heller spent nearly seven years with the TBS sports legal group which included the Braves, the Atlanta Hawks, the Atlanta Thrashers, Philips Arena, the Goodwill Games, the Turner Sports television group (and its NBA, NASCAR, PGA, British Open and MLB properties), and the Turner Sports new media group (and its NASCAR, PGA and PGA TOUR and ACC Select properties).

Heller began his career in sports law as an undergraduate at Indiana University where he graduated cum laude with a Bachelor of Science degree in Sports Marketing/Management. While at Indiana, Heller completed internships with the Peoria Chiefs, a minor league affiliate of the Chicago Cubs, and with the Indiana University athletic department.

Upon graduating from IU, Heller entered law school at Marquette University. While at Marquette, Heller was an active participant in the sports law program, including serving as a member and Student Articles Editor of the Marquette Sports Law Journal, serving as a member of the Sports Law Society, authoring a law review article on the NCAA enforcement process and completing internships with the National Sports Law Institute, Harley Davidson, the Milwaukee Brewers and Reece & Lang PC, the legal division of an Atlanta-based sports management firm.

Upon graduating from Marquette, Heller became an Associate Attorney with the Atlanta firm of Powell Goldstein Frazer & Murphy (now part of Bryan Cave) where he concentrated his practice on general corporate, mergers and acquisitions, securities and sports and entertainment law matters from 1996 to 1997. In the Fall of 1997, Heller joined the Chicago law firm of Horwood Marcus & Berk and continued his practice in general corporate, mergers and acquisitions and sports and entertainment law matters before joining TBS in the Fall of 2000.

Heller serves on Advisory Boards at Marquette University Law School, Indiana University, Blessed Trinity Catholic High School and the Kennesaw State Athletics Association. In 2004, Heller was named by Marquette University as its Sports Law Alumnus Of The Year. In 2017, Heller was named the W.W. Patty Distinguished Alumnus by the Indiana University School of Public Health.

Heller and his wife, Krista, live in Roswell and have four children, Madelyn, Charlie, John and Elizabeth.





JILL ROBINSON

Executive Vice President, Chief Financial Officer

Jill Robinson is in her fifth season with the Braves after joining the organization in April 2018 as chief financial officer and executive vice president.

In her role, Robinson oversees the Braves' entire accounting and finance operations, leading a team of 25 finance and accounting professionals. Robinson also manages the Braves' financial interests in The Battery Atlanta, the world-class mixed used real estate development located around Truist Park.

Prior to joining the Braves, Robinson worked for McKesson Corporation for 16 years in both San Francisco, Calif., and Atlanta, Ga., serving in a variety of roles for the Fortune 50 company. At the time of her departure, Robinson was the chief financial officer and senior vice president for McKesson Technology Solutions, a \$3 billion healthcare technology company.

She began her career at McKesson in 2001 as a director in the procurement finance department, managing a team that provided all accounting and finance functions for the pharmaceutical purchasing organization. Robinson moved to a director's role in Investor Relations in April 2004, before she was promoted to Vice President of Internal Audit in November 2005.



CHIP MOORE

Executive Vice President & Senior Advisor

The 2022 season marks Chip Moore's 45th with the Braves organization. Moore, executive vice president and senior advisor, assists the Braves' executive board with long-

term planning and oversees the club's spring training facility and Florida operations. Moore spent nine years (2009-17) as the Braves' chief financial officer, after spending 12 seasons (1997-2008) as senior vice president and controller. He was named to his current position on February 5, 2018.

Moore was instrumental in the Braves' efforts to secure Truist Park and the club's mixed-use development, The Battery Atlanta, both of which opened in 2017. Moore played an important role in lease negotiations, relocation, design and construction of minor league ballparks in Rome, Ga., Pearl, Miss., and Gwinnett, Ga.

For over 25 years, Moore led the Braves finance and accounting function and played a key role in Braves successes both on and off the field. This included managing financial tasks associated with Braves post-season runs, MLB's 2000 All-Star Game in Atlanta and the many challenges associated with the moves from Atlanta-Fulton County Stadium to Turner Field and finally to Truist Park.

In addition, Moore was an instrumental figure in the lease negotiation, design and construction of the Braves' spring training complex in North Port, Fla., in Sarasota County.

Moore steadily moved up through the organization during his tenure. He began as an usher at Atlanta-

Fulton County Stadium before working nine seasons as a member of the Braves grounds crew. In 1985, he joined the Braves accounting department and rose to assistant controller in 1988 and controller in 1992 before becoming chief financial officer in 2009 and named to his current position in 2018.

Moore also worked on the establishment of the Braves charitable entity, the Atlanta Braves Foundation, and has served on its Board of Directors since inception.

Moore graduated from Oglethorpe University in 1985 with a degree in business administration, majoring in accounting.

Moore serves on the Board of Directors for the Atlanta Braves Foundation. He served on the Minor League Baseball Board of Trustees for 14 years and on the Board of Directors of the South Atlantic League of Professional Baseball for 29 years, including 20 years as its vice president. In 2006, Moore was inducted into the South Atlantic League Hall of Fame for his contributions to the Rome Braves and the SAL. Additionally, Moore has served on the Board of Directors for the International League and Southern League of Professional Baseball. Locally, he serves on the Board of Atlanta Area Council of Boy Scouts.

Chip and his wife, Anne, reside in Kennesaw, Ga., and have two children, Jordan and Will.





DERETTA RHODES, PH.D.

Executive Vice President, Chief Culture Officer

DeRetta Rhodes, Ph.D. is in her fourth season with the Braves after arriving in January 2019. She joined the organization as Senior Vice President of Human Resources before getting promoted to Executive Vice President, Chief People Capital Officer, in January 2021. She was elevated to her current role, Executive Vice President, Chief Culture Officer, in January 2022.

Dr. Rhodes, who oversees people capital initiatives for the organization's Major League and The Battery Atlanta operations, has left a lasting impact in her short time with the Braves.

She has transformed the people capital department, expanded the culture of the organization with training programs and employee resource groups and created an internal diversity, equity and inclusion council. She also managed the organizational changes which became necessary due to the pandemic.

Prior to joining the Braves, Dr. Rhodes was the Executive Vice President/Chief Human Resources Officer of the YMCA of Metro Atlanta, Vice President of Human Resources at First Data, Vice President of Human Resources for Turner Broadcasting and held leadership

positions at Ernst & Young, ADP, HomeGrocer.com and YUM Brand.

Dr. Rhodes received her undergraduate degree from the University of Georgia, her Master's in Business Administration from Clark Atlanta University and her Ph.D. in adult education from the University of Georgia. She is a certified facilitator for the Benchmark 360 assessment by the Center for Creative Leadership, DISC coach and facilitator, qualified facilitator for the Myers-Briggs Type Indicator (MBTI), HOGAN Assessment and HOGAN 360.

A Kansas City native, Dr. Rhodes has also served in the Metro Atlanta community, in various board member roles and activities, most recently: Woodruff Arts Center, 21st Century Leaders, Goodwill of North Georgia, 21st Century Leaders, Woodruff Arts Center and TedX UGA Speaker (March 2018).

She was also recognized as 100 Women of Influence by the Atlanta Business League, and also as National Diversity & Leadership Top 100 HR Professionals.

Dr. Rhodes lives in Atlanta, Ga. with her husband, Leon, and her three sons, Cole, Austin and Jordan.





JOHN SCHUERHOLZ

Vice Chairman, Emeritus

Named Vice Chairman Emeritus by the Braves in 2018, John Schuerholz is in his 57th year in professional baseball and his 32nd season in Atlanta. He served as club president for eight and-a-half years before being named vice chairman in March 2016.

As president and then as vice chairman, Schuerholz was instrumental in the planning and building of Truist Park and the mixed-use development, The Battery Atlanta, which opened in April 2017.

Schuerholz received the game's highest honor in December 2016, when he was elected to the National Baseball Hall of Fame. He was formally inducted into the illustrious club in Cooperstown, N.Y., on July 30, 2017.

Following 26 years as a Major League general manager, from 1982 to 2007, Schuerholz stepped aside as GM after the 2007 season and was named president of the Braves on October 11, 2007. He spent 17 seasons as the Braves' executive vice president and general manager, from 1991 to 2007.

Schuerholz came to the Braves from the Kansas City Royals in October 1990. Under his leadership and guidance as a GM, the Braves achieved unprecedented success, compiling the best record in baseball over those 17 seasons from 1991 to 2007 (1,594-1,092; .593). The Braves established an American professional sports record by winning 14 consecutive division titles from 1991 to 2005 (the 1994 season was not played to completion).

The Braves won five National League pennants, one World Series and several organization of the year awards. The club won 100-or-more games six times under Schuerholz, including five times in seven seasons from 1997 to 2003.

During his career with Baltimore, Kansas City and Atlanta, Schuerholz has been associated with four World Champions (1966, 1985, 1995, 2021), nine pennant winners and 21 division crowns. In 2004, to honor his nearly 40 years of success at the major league level, *Baseball America* named him the recipient of the prestigious Lifetime Achievement Award. Atlanta's overall success in 2005 also helped the Braves earn *Baseball America's* prestigious Organization of the Year award.

When the Braves won the 1995 World Series, Schuerholz became the first executive to be general manager of world championship teams in both the American and National Leagues. In his 26 years as a general manager with Kansas City and Atlanta, his teams totaled an amazing 2,348 wins.

During Schuerholz's time with Kansas City, the Royals won one World Championship, two American League pennants and six division crowns. The *Sporting News* selected him as the Major League Executive of the Year in 1985, when Kansas City won the World Series.

Schuerholz was inducted into the Braves Hall of Fame in August 2016 and the Georgia Sports Hall of Fame in February 2015. In January 2014, he was honored with the Outstanding Achievement in Baseball Award by the Professional Baseball Scouts Foundation. He was inducted into the Atlanta Sports Hall of Fame in 2008 and the Negro Leagues Baseball Museum recognized John as the National League Executive of the Year with its Andrew "Rube" Foster Award in 2001, 2002 and 2005. After the Braves' 1991 worst-to-first performance, Schuerholz was named the Executive of the Year by UPI, the Boston Writers Association and the Maryland Tops in Sports group, Executive of the Year by the Georgia Securities Association and Georgian of the Year by Georgia Trend Magazine.

Schuerholz has served on a variety of Major League Baseball's committees throughout his career, including being appointed by then-Commissioner "Bud" Selig to chair the newly-formed Instant Replay Committee. In three years, the committee oversaw the implementation of expanded replay, creating a modernized, effective system for replay reviews. Schuerholz has also served as chairman of the Pace of Game Committee, and on the Playing Rules Committee.

A native of Baltimore, Schuerholz left a job as a junior high school teacher to join the Orioles in 1966. He moved to Kansas City two years later, and as an administrative assistant, was involved in the expansion draft that created the first ever Royals roster. He was named Assistant Farm Director in 1970 and became Farm Director in 1975. He was promoted to director of player procurement and development in 1976 and vice president-player personnel in 1979. The Royals named Schuerholz executive vice president and general manager in October of 1981, when he was 41.

Born October 1, 1940, Schuerholz is a graduate of Towson (MD) University, where he played soccer and baseball. He was an all-conference choice in baseball and the school's Athlete of the Year in 1962. He was inducted into Towson's Athletic Hall of Fame in 1973 and served on the school's Board of Visitors. Towson's baseball facility is named John Schuerholz Park.

Schuerholz's book, "Built to Win: Inside Stories and Leadership Strategies from Baseball's Winningest GM," was released in the spring of 2006.

He and his wife, Karen, have two children, Gina and Jonathan, and four grandchildren. Jonathan has been in the Braves organization since 2002.



BOBBY COX

Special Assistant to the General Manager

Bobby Cox is in his 12th season in a consulting role for the Braves after retiring from his legendary managerial career following the 2010 campaign.

Cox was awarded baseball's highest honor in 2014, when he was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame, along with fellow managers Tony La Russa and Joe Torre and former players Tom Glavine, Greg Maddux and Frank Thomas.

On September 23, 2009, the Braves announced that Cox had agreed to a contract extension for the 2010 season, and Cox himself announced that he would retire from managing at the conclusion of the 2010 campaign. As part of his contract extension, Cox was given a consulting agreement. In his role, he advises and consults in all areas of baseball operations, including the Major League Club, spring training, minor league operations and scouting. In addition, Cox works with the office of the president on special business projects.

Cox spent 29 seasons as a Major League skipper, including 25 seasons in two stints at the helm of the Braves. His 2,504 wins rank fourth all-time and include a franchise-best 2,149 victories with the Braves and 355 with the Toronto Blue Jays. Cox posted an overall career record of 2,504-2,001-3 (.556). He won his 2,500th game on September 25, 2010, at Washington.

In his final season in 2010, the Braves went 91-71 and claimed the first National League Wild Card in franchise history. The 2010 campaign was Cox's 15th with 90-or-more wins. That tied him for second all-time in 90-win seasons with Hall of Fame skipper Joe McCarthy, one behind John McGraw's record 16. Cox and McCarthy are the only managers in Major League history to compile six 100-win seasons.

Cox won 15 division crowns in his career, including 14 straight in Atlanta that led to five pennants (1991, 1992, 1995, 1996 and 1999) and one World Championship (1995). He had a string of 15 consecutive winning seasons from 1991 to 2005, tying him with Al Lopez and Earl Weaver for third place all-time behind Joe McCarthy (20) and Sparky Anderson (17) for the most consecutive winning campaigns.

Cox was voted the Manager of the Year by the Baseball Writers' Association of America four times (1985 with Toronto and 1991, 2004 and 2005 with Atlanta). The *Sporting News*, in a poll of his peers, honored Cox as the league's top skipper seven times with the Braves and eight times overall. No other manager has won the *Sporting News* award more than three times since the magazine started the balloting in 1936. In 1991, the Associated Press named him Major League Manager of the Year, as he became the first manager to earn that honor in both leagues, having also won it while with the Blue Jays in 1985.

He brought the city of Atlanta its first major professional sports world championship in 1995, when the Braves defeated the Cleveland Indians, four games to two, in the

World Series. The victory also marked the first time a franchise had won a World Series in three different cities.

In 1993, the Braves won 104 games and became the first National League West team to win three straight division titles. The Braves' 400 Club honored Cox with its "Mr. Baseball" award that season.

The Braves' performance in 1991, when they went from worst-to-first and participated in one of the most dramatic World Series in history, earned Cox several post-season honors. Among others, the Associated Press named him Major League Manager of the Year. Cox became the first manager to earn that honor in both leagues, having also won it while with the Blue Jays in 1985.

Cox managed the Braves from 1978 to 1981, compiling a 266-323 record and laying the groundwork for the club's National League West title in 1982. He began a four-year tenure as Toronto's manager in 1982, lifting a habitual last-place team to within one game of attaining a World Series berth in 1985.

In 1982, Cox led the Blue Jays to a 78-84 mark, the best record in their six-year existence. Toronto improved to 89-73 each of the next two seasons and then won the American League East crown by finishing 99-62 in 1985. For his efforts that year, Cox was named Major League Manager of the Year by the Baseball Writers Association of America, the Associated Press and *Sporting News*.

Cox returned to the Braves as general manager in October 1985 and oversaw a farm system which set the foundation for great success. He added the field managing responsibilities on June 22, 1990, then devoted all his time to those duties when the Braves named John Schuerholz as general manager in October of that year.

Cox spent five years in the Dodgers' farm system before being selected by the Chicago Cubs in the November 1964 Minor League Draft. He was acquired by the Braves in a 1966 trade that sent outfielder Billy Cowan to the Cubs. After playing for Triple-A Richmond in 1967, he was traded to the New York Yankees and beat out Mike Ferraro, the Yankees' outstanding spring training rookie, for the third base job in 1968. Cox made the Topps Rookie All-Star team in 1968, but lost his job to roommate Bobby Murcer in '69.

Bad knees forced Cox to retire as a player at the age of 30. He was appointed manager of the Yankees' Class-A Fort Lauderdale club in 1971. He won the Eastern League pennant and championship with West Haven in 1972 and placed second twice and third twice in four years at Syracuse, winning the International League's Governor's Cup in 1976. He served as the Yankees' first base coach in 1977.

Born May 21, 1941, in Tulsa, Okla., Cox graduated from Selma (Calif.) High School in 1959 and attended Reedley Junior College.

He and his wife, Pam, reside in Marietta, Ga. They have three daughters, Keisha, Kami and Skyla. He has five other children, Debbie, Bobby Jr., Connie, Shelly and Randy.

- He previously worked with the Pittsburgh Pirates for eight years as an area scouting supervisor and east coast cross checker.

- Also coached two years in the minors and played three years, all with the Philadelphia Phillies organization, after being drafted out of Seton Hall University in 1989, where he played with Hall of Fame teammate Craig Biggio...He also played with three other major leaguers on that same team: Mo Vaughn, John Valentin and Kevin Morton.
- Inducted into the Seton Hall University Hall of Fame in 2008 and the New Jersey Sportswriter Hall of Fame in 2012 for notable accomplishments in baseball.
- He is also in the New Brunswick High School Hall of Fame with high school teammate Eric Young, Sr. who is the club's current first base/outfield coach.
- Brown, 55, resides in Franklin Park, N.J. with his wife, Casandra, and two children, Dana Jr. and Autumn.



MIKE FAST **Vice President, Baseball Development**

- Mike Fast is in his fourth season with the Braves, after joining the organization in November of 2018...He was promoted to his current role, vice president, baseball development, in March of 2021...Fast spent his first two years in the organization as a special assistant to the general manager.

- Fast, 49, and his wife, Lori, reside in Kingwood, TX with their four children, Madeleine, Zachary, Amelie and Analise.



JASON PARÉ **Assistant General Manager, Research & Development**

- Jason Paré is in his fifth season with the Braves organization after joining the team in December of 2017...The Braves are Paré's fifth organization.
- In his role, Paré is responsible for overseeing all aspects of the Braves' research and development department, as well as supporting the day-to-day functions of the baseball operations group.

- Dixie Keller is in her 22nd season with the organization, including her second as senior director, baseball administration...She is the club's first-ever female director in baseball operations.
- In her role, she works closely with the general manager in all facets of the club's administrative matters relating to the major league team, including player contracts, compliance and transactions...In addition, she oversees the family relations department, supervises the Bill Lucas Fellowship program, and manages the baseball operations financial budgets.

ANDRUW JONES **Special Assistant, Baseball Operations**

- Andruw Jones is in his seventh season as special assistant, baseball operations...He was named to the position in February of 2016 after retiring from a 17-year major-league career.
- In his role, Jones instructs and assists minor-league outfielders during spring training and the regular season, assists with major-league workouts during the spring and consults the baseball operations staff on trades and transactions.

- During his playing career, the former outfielder won 10 Rawlings Gold Glove awards, 1998-2007, tied for the second most of any outfielder in baseball history...Jones was also a five-time N.L. All-Star and finished as high as second in MVP voting in 2005, when he hit a franchise single-season record 51 home runs.
- Jones, 44, played 12 seasons for Atlanta after signing with the Braves as an amateur free agent in 1993... He played his final five seasons with four teams (Los Angeles-NL, Texas, Chicago-AL, New York-AL).



TERRY PENDLETON **Special Assistant, Baseball Operations**

- The 2022 season marks Terry Pendleton's 26th in the Atlanta Braves organization, including his fourth as special assistant, baseball operations.
- Since retiring from a 15-year major-league career, Pendleton served 16 seasons on the Braves coaching staff, 2002-17...He was the bench coach for the final two seasons, moving into that role in May of 2016, when Brian Snitker was named manager.
- Pendleton was also the club's first base coach for five-plus seasons, 2011-16...He began his tenure on the Braves staff in 2002 as the hitting coach, a position he held for nine seasons.
- During his playing career, Pendleton was the 1991 N.L. MVP, the 1992 runner-up in that award, an All-Star and a three-time Gold Glove winner...He won the N.L. batting title in 1991 after hitting .319 with a league-best 303 total bases...He was also the Comeback Player of the Year that season.
- The switch-hitter played five seasons with Atlanta, 1991-94 and 1996, batting .287 with 71 home runs and 322 RBI in 593 games.

- Pendleton began his major-league career with the St. Louis Cardinals, where he spent his first seven seasons...He also played for Florida (1995-96), Cincinnati (1997) and Kansas City (1998).
- He was inducted into the Braves Hall of Fame on January 18, 2019.
- Pendleton played collegiate baseball at Oxnard Community College (CA) and Fresno State University... He was selected by the Cardinals in the seventh round of the 1982 June draft after an All-America campaign with the Bulldogs.
- He was also inducted into the California Community College Athletic Association Hall of Fame in March of 2016.
- Pendleton, 61, and his wife, Catherine, reside in Snellville, Ga...The couple has three children, Stephanie, Terry and Trinity.








- Blasted a 460-foot home run off Philadelphia's Aaron Nola on June 8...The ball had an exit velocity of 116 mph, which stood for 19 days as the hardest-hit home run by a Brave in the Statcast era...He later outdid himself on June 27 when he hit one with a 117.4 mph EV off Cincinnati's Tyler Mahle.

▲ Jorge Soler took possession of the hardest-hit homer on October 3, though, when he homered with a 117.9 mph exit velocity against Noah Syndergaard of the New York Mets.

career game, and no player in major-league history had more leadoff homers through their first 300 career games.

- Made his third career Opening Day start...At 23, became the youngest Braves OF to start consecutive Opening Day games since Andruw Jones, who also started three straight from 1997-99 (Age 19-21).
- Was named NL Player of the Week for the period of April 12-18.

A Selected to his first career All-Star Game in 2019 and started in center field for the National League...He was 21 years, 203 days old on the day of the game, making him the youngest Braves player to start an All-Star Game and the third youngest player in franchise history to earn a selection (Hank Aaron in 1955 and Ozzie Albies in 2018).

A Also participated in the T-Mobile Home Run Derby that week...Defeated Pittsburgh's Josh Bell in the first round, hitting 25 home runs to Bell's 18...Lost in the second round to eventual champion Pete Alonso...The first baseman hit 20 home runs, while Acuña hit 19.

A Won a Louisville Slugger Silver Slugger awards in 2019 and 2020 as one of three N.L. outfielders...His first such award came at age 21, becoming the youngest Braves player to win a Silver Slugger.

A He is one of three National Leaguers in history to win that award in their age 21 season or younger, joining St. Louis 3B Albert Pujols (2001 as a 21-year-old) and Los Angeles P Fernando Valenzuela (1981 as a 20-year-old).

A Braves 2B Ozzie Albies, 22, also received a Silver Slugger in 2019...Acuña Jr. and Albies were the first teammates in major-league history age 22 or younger to win Silver Sluggers in the same season.

A Was the eighth Braves player to win a N.L. Jackie Robinson Rookie of the Year award, capturing 27-of-30 first-

place votes from the Baseball Writers' Association of America (BBWAA) in 2018...RH Craig Kimbrel was the last Atlanta player to receive the award (2011).

A In August 2018, named the N.L. Rookie of the Month after becoming the first N.L. rookie over the previous 110 seasons to collect at least 39 hits and 11 home runs in a calendar month...Hit .336/.405/.698 (39-for-116) with 11 home runs, 21 RBI and six stolen bases in 30 games.

- Has 105 career home runs in his first 395 career games.

A Prior to turning 23, at the time, his 81 homers were the 16th most in history before that birthday...Of the 15 players ahead of him, Acuña Jr.'s 1,404 plate appearances were easily the fewest...In fact, Giancarlo Stanton (1,498) was the only other player on that list with fewer than 1,800 plate appearances.

A In 2019, his first full season, became just the third player in baseball history to hit 40 home runs in a single season prior to his 22nd birthday, joining two Hall of Famers in Eddie Mathews, who hit 47 in 1953 as a 21-year-old, and Mel Ott, who had 42 as a 20-year-old in 1929...Only Ott was younger at the time of his 40th... A Is one of 18 players in the modern era with two 20-homer seasons before his 22nd birthday...Of the 17 prior, seven hit 500 home runs (Mel Ott, Ted Williams, Mickey Mantle, Eddie Mathews, Frank Robinson, Ken Griffey Jr. and Alex Rodríguez), while eight are in the National Baseball Hall of Fame (Ott, Williams, Mantle, Mathews, Robinson, Griffey Jr., Al Kaline and Orlando Cepeda).

A Hit his 50th career home run on 7/21/19 against Washington...He was 21 years, 215 days old at the time of the homer,

the fourth youngest player in baseball history to reach that milestone...The three younger were Mel Ott, Tony Conigliaro and fellow Braves outfielder Andruw Jones.

- ♣ Hit his 60th career home run on 8/13/19, becoming the sixth player in baseball history to hit that many home runs prior to turning 22...He joined Mel Ott (86), Tony Conigliaro (84), Eddie Mathews (72), Frank Robinson (60) and Ken Griffey Jr. (60).
- ♣ Has twice homered in at least four straight games...Is the only player in history to have two home run streaks of at least four games before his 22nd birthday...He first did so in five straight, from 8/11-14/18, to tie the franchise modern-era record for most consecutive games with a homer... He also did so from 8/6-9/19, when he homered in four straight.
- Played in his 300th career game on 9/12/20 at Washington...Had 78 home runs and 58 stolen bases at the time of the game...Is the only player in major-league history to reach 75 home runs and 50 stolen bases by his 300th career game.

 - ♣ Began the 2019 season primarily hitting out of the No. 4 spot...Permanently moved to the leadoff spot on 5/10, where he hit out of the rest of the season and all of 2020.
 - ♣ Had 34 home runs and 78 RBI from the spot of the lineup in 2019, franchise single-season records hitting first.
 - ♣ Led off in the starting lineup for the first time in his career on 7/20/18 at Washington in the first game out of the All-Star break...Went 3-for-4, while hitting a home run and robbing one in the fifth inning...Also stole two bases, and at 20 years, 214 days, became the youngest player in baseball's modern era (since 1900) to homer and steal two bases in the same game.

- A* Became the youngest player in baseball history to hit a grand slam in a postseason game, when he did so at age 20 in Game 3 of the 2018 NLDS vs. Los Angeles... It came on a 3-1, second-inning pitch from RH Walker Buehler...21-year-old Yankees OF Mickey Mantle was previously the youngest (Game 5 of the 1953 World Series)...Acuña Jr.'s slam was the seventh in Braves postseason history and the first since Adam LaRoche hit one in Game 4 of the 2005 NLDS at Houston...It also marked the first slam of Acuña Jr.'s career.
- In his first full major-league season, 2019, hit a team-most 41 home runs and stole a N.L.-most 37 bases, becoming one of five players in baseball history to reach those numbers in a season...The four others are José Canseco (42 HR, 40 SB in 1988), Barry Bonds (42 HR, 40 SB in 1996), Alex Rodríguez (42 HR, 46 SB in 1998) and Alfonso Soriano (46 HR, 41 SB in 2006)...Acuña Jr. is the youngest of that group.

Reached the 30/30 mark in Atlanta's 130th game, the quickest a Braves player has ever accomplished the feat.
 - A* Is the 11th player in Braves history with at least 20 home runs and 20 stolen bases in a season, and the first since 2012, when OF Jason Heyward had 27 homers and 21 steals.
 - A* Also had 26 home runs and 16 stolen bases in 2018...He was the sixth player in baseball history, and the first since Mike Trout in 2012 and 2013, with two 20-homer/15-steal seasons prior to his 22nd birthday.

 - A* 2B Ozzie Albies (21 years, 110 days) also homered in the game...By combined age, Albies and Acuña Jr. were 41 years, 238 days old...The last major league duo younger by combined age to homer in the same game was Ricky Seilheimer (19 years, 331 days) and Harold Baines (21 years, 133 days) for the White Sox on 7/26/80...Seilheimer and Baines were 41 years, 99 days.
- Hit a two-run homer in the 11th inning on 7/3/18 at New York-AL to give Atlanta the 5-3 win... With his game-winning homer, became the only player to hit a game-winning extra-inning home run at Yankee Stadium prior to his 21st birthday.
- Following his rookie season in 2018, was named to the MLB team that played in the 2018 Japan All-Star Series in November...Played in five games and went 5-for-24 (.208) with a home run.

 - At 21, was the youngest player in major-league history to sign a \$100 million contract.
 - He had accrued 165 days of major-league service at the time of the extension...The deal is the largest in history for a player under club control with as little major-league service as Acuña Jr.
 - The contract is the third largest in franchise history, trailing the eight-year, \$135 million deal signed by 1B Freddie Freeman in 2014 and the eight-year, \$168 million deal signed by 1B Matt Olson in 2022.

- He is just the second Atlanta infielder to have at least 30 homers, 100 RBI, 100 runs and 20 stolen bases (Chipper Jones, 1999)...Seven total players have done it in franchise history.
- On September 22, became the youngest second baseman in MLB history with at least 30 homers and 100 RBI...Also became the first Atlanta middle infielder (min. 75% of games) in franchise history with 100 RBI.

A His homer in Game 1 capped a four-run inning...3B Austin Riley homered to start the frame...Riley (23 years, 193 days) and Albies (23 years, 279 days) are the first pair of teammates age 23 or younger to hit a home run in the same inning in postseason history.

- Has two career game-ending hits...Both came in the 11th inning...Hit a solo homer on 6/25/18 off Cincinnati's Dylan Floro...Nearly one year later, on 6/12/19, hit a double off Pittsburgh's Michael Feliz.
 - Had at least 20 homers and 40 doubles in each of his first two full seasons (40 2B, 24 HR in 2018 and 43 2B and 24 HR in 2019)...Became the 11th player in baseball history to accomplish that...Others on the list include Ted Williams, Chuck Klein, Alex Rodríguez, and Albert Pujols...Washington's Ryan Zimmerman was the last to do so (2006-07).
 - Made his major-league debut on 8/1/17 vs. Los Angeles-NL at the age of 20 years, 206 days... Became the youngest player to play for the Braves since RH Julio Teheran in 2011...Teheran also debuted as a 20-year-old.
 - A* First big-league hit was a three-run homer, on 8/3 off the Dodgers' Tony Cingrani...Came in his eighth career at-bat...At 20 years, 208 days, was the youngest Brave to homer since fellow Curacao native Andruw Jones in 1997.
 - A* Hit five triples in 57 games that season... They all came in his first 33 games...The last major-leaguer to produce five triples in their first 33 career games was Kansas City's Butch Davis, who had six through that period in 1983.
 - A* Debuted as MLB.com's second-best second base prospect.
 - Has been on the injured list once in his major-league career...Missed 30 games in 2020 with a bone contusion on his right wrist.
 - A* In his first two full MLB seasons, appeared in all but six of Atlanta's 324 games.
 - On 4/11/19, signed a seven-year, \$35 million contract extension that keeps him under control through the 2025 season...The deal also contains club options for 2026 and 2027.

- Beat the Yankees in the Bronx, April 21, and beat the Mets in Flushing, 1-0, in Game 2 of a doubleheader, June 21...Anderson was born in Rexford, NY, and attended Shenendehowa High School in Clifton Park.

A Anderson became the first native New Yorker to beat the Yankees and Mets in New York in the same season.

• The last native New Yorker to beat two New York teams on the road in a single season was Philadelphia's Jim Konstanty (Strykersville) and Chicago's Turk Lown (Brooklyn) in 1953...Both pitchers beat the Brooklyn Dodgers and the New York Giants in relief that season.

- Started, June 4 vs. Los Angeles-NL, and allowed just one hit and fanned six over 4.1 innings, but took his third loss of the season after the Dodgers scored eight times in the fourth inning.

• Became the second Braves starter in the live-ball era (since 1920) to allow just one hit over at least 4.0 innings but surrender at least four runs.

• Steve Bedrosian allowed one hit, four walks and four runs over 5.0 innings to beat the Giants, 8-7, on October 6, 1985.

- Started on July 11 at Miami and allowed six hits, five walks and four runs over just 2.1 innings... Threw 64 pitches.

• Was placed on the Injured List on July 16 (retro to July 13) with right shoulder inflammation, and missed 39 games.

2021 POSTSEASON

- Made four starts in the postseason and went 2-0 with a 1.59 ERA (3 ER/17.0 IP) and 16 strikeouts... Atlanta went 4-0 in his starts.

MAJOR LEAGUE NOTES

- Made six starts during his 2020 campaign and went 3-2 with a 1.95 ERA (7 ER/32.1 IP) and 41 strikeouts...He finished seventh in N.L. Rookie of the Year balloting.

• He entered the season ranked by MLB.com as Atlanta's top pitching prospect, and as the Braves' No. 3 prospect overall.

• His 41 strikeouts are the most by a Braves pitcher through their first six appearances in the live-ball era, passing Mike Minor who had 36.

- Since the Braves moved to Atlanta in 1966, just one other starter opened their career with six starts and a lower ERA than Anderson's 1.95 mark...David Hale pitched to a 1.83 ERA over six starts between 2013-14.

- Made his major league debut, August 26 vs. NYY, and allowed just one hit and one run over 6.0 innings to earn the win in Game 1 of a doubleheader.

• Carried a no-hit bid through 5.1 innings... Per Elias, Anderson's 5.1 no-hit innings was the longest bid in a debut since Tampa Bay's Brendan McCay on June 29 of last season, and the longest by any Braves pitcher in his debut since the team moved to Atlanta in 1966.

- Debuted against the New York Yankees on August 26 and held them to one run over 6.0 innings to earn the win.

• Prior to Anderson, 11 pitchers had made their debuts as a starter against the Yankees since 2011, with the Yankees going 10-1 in those contests and those starters going 1-7 with a 5.09 ERA.

- Beat the Yankees in his debut, August 26, and beat Boston in his next start, September 1...Became just the second pitcher since 1920 to beat the Yankees and Red Sox in his first two starts.

- A* Became just the 18th pitcher in baseball's live-ball era (since 1920) to start against both the Yankees and Red Sox in their first two games, with the Angels' Jason Dickson doing so last in 1996.
 - A* Of the 17 starters prior to Anderson to face the Yankees and Red Sox in their first two games since 1920 just one had earned the win in both games.
 - A* Cleveland's Luis Tiant beat the Yankees, 3-0 in his debut on July 19, 1964, before beating the Red Sox, 6-1, on July 24.
 - Started on September 12 vs. Washington and set career highs in innings (7.0) and strikeouts (9) while holding the Nationals scoreless over 7.0 one-hit innings.
 - A* Anderson also allowed one hit over 6.0 innings in his MLB debut...He became just the second pitcher over the last 120 seasons to allow one hit or less in two starts of at least 6.0 innings within his first four career appearances...The only other pitcher to do so was Philadelphia's Marvin Freeman in 1986.
 - Made four starts in the 2020 postseason and went 2-0 with a 0.96 ERA (2 ER/18.2 IP) and 24 strikeouts...Pitched Game 2 of the Wild Card Series vs. Cincinnati, Game 2 of the NLDS vs. Miami and Games 2 and 7 of the NLCS vs. Los Angeles.
 - Did not allow a run in any of his first three career playoff starts.
 - A* He was the first pitcher in franchise history to make three straight playoff starts and not allow a run...Anderson is one of just two pitchers in baseball history to open their postseason career with three consecutive scoreless starts of at least 4.0 innings, joining Hall-of-Famer Christy Mathewson...Mathewson pitched shutouts in Game 1, Game 3 and Game 5 of the 1905 World Series in his first three playoff starts.
 - Started Game 7 of the 2020 NLCS and is the first Braves rookie to ever start a winner-take-all playoff game...Anderson started at 22 years, 169 days old, and is the sixth youngest pitcher in history to start a winner-take-all playoff game.
 - A* He is the youngest to do so since Cleveland's Jaret Wright started Game 7 of the 1997 World Series at 21 years, 301 days.
 - A* Bret Saberhagen (1985 World Series & ALCS), Fernando Valenzuela (1981 NLCS), Marty Bystrom (1980 NLCS) and Don Gullett (1972 NLCS) are the only other pitchers younger than Anderson to start a winner-take-all playoff game.
- Made his second career postseason start in Game 2 of the 2020 NLDS and held Miami to just three hits and one walk over 5.2 scoreless innings, striking out eight.
 - A* Blanked Cincinnati in his playoff debut, and became just the third pitcher in franchise history with back-to-back scoreless starts in the postseason...Steve Avery did so in Games 2 and 6 of the 1991 NLCS at Pittsburgh, and Lew Burdette did so in Games 5 and 7 of the 1957 World Series vs. New York.







 - A** Fried became the first Atlanta starter with two shutouts in a single season since Shelby Miller pitched two in 2015, and the first Braves left-hander with two since Tom Glavine in 2000.

Fried blanked the Orioles on just 90 pitches, and shut out the Padres on 98... Since 2000, just Greg Maddux (2000), Miller ('15) and Fried have two shutouts on fewer than 100 pitches for the Braves in a single season.

- Was named NL Pitcher of the Month for September after going 3-0 with a 1.54 ERA (7 ER/41.0 IP) across six starts...It was the first monthly award of his career, and he was Atlanta's first recipient since Kris Medlen in September of 2013.

He fashioned a 17.0-inning scoreless streak during the month, the longest such run of his career, while Atlanta went 5-1 in his six starts.

- Came off the bench and drove a 3-1 pitch into center field to plate the winning run, July 4, giving Atlanta its fifth walk-off win of the season and second of the homestand.
 - Since RBI became an official statistic in 1920, no Braves pinch hitter who was primarily a pitcher has had a walk-off RBI...Research courtesy of the Elias Sports Bureau.
 - Fried batted .273/.322/.327 on the season, and his 15 hits led all pitchers in baseball.

- Missed 11 games on the IL with a blister on his left index finger, 6/19-30.

Was his second stint on the IL this season after also missing time from 4/14 to 5/5 with a right hamstring strain.

Was his third career stint on the IL with a blister on his pitching hand...Also missed time in both 2018 and 2019.

- Started on May 12 vs. Toronto and allowed just two hits and one run over 6.0 innings, but was left with a no-decision in Atlanta's loss, 4-1.
 - Was his first career interleague start that he did not win...Started his career a perfect 7-0 in seven career interleague starts, pitching to just a 2.18 ERA (10 ER/41.1 IP) and striking out 47 against the American League.





 - ✦ Morton made his major league debut with the club on June 14, 2008, beating Los Angeles (AL), 9-4 with 6.0 innings of three-run ball...He made 15 more appearances for the Braves that season, with his last coming on September 21 vs. NYM.

- A* With his first start last season, Morton went 12 years, 194 days between Braves appearances.





The Braves bullpen used 24 different pitchers in a relief role this season, four more than last season and two fewer than the last full season in 2019...Atlanta relievers went 31-33 with a 3.97 ERA (253 ER/573.2 IP) and converted 40-of-67 save opportunities.

Atlanta relievers combined to post a .484 winning percentage (31-33), fifth lowest in the majors...Only Texas (.466), Baltimore (.452), Washington (.354) and Arizona (.349) had worse records...The Braves' 33 losses in relief were also fifth most.



Since the Braves moved to Atlanta in 1966, just one other team had as many 30-appearance relievers... The 2016 club also had nine.

From June 24 until the end of the season, the Braves pitched to a 3.23 ERA in relief, the third lowest mark in baseball.

Greg Maddux pitched to a 1.12 ERA in 1995 and a 1.37 ERA in 1994, while Bill James compiled a 1.53 ERA on the road for the 1914 Boston Braves.
- Turned 22 years old on August 4, 2019 and went 12-3 with a 2.58 ERA (40 ER/139.2 IP) in 24 starts aged 21 or younger...His 24 starts before turning 22 are fourth-most in franchise history since 1908, and the most since Steve Avery made 56 such starts.

 - For his career, the righty allowed one earned run or fewer in 11 of his first 13 starts...Since earned runs became an official statistic in both leagues in 1913, no other pitcher in history had as many such starts among his first 13 career games... In fact, Soroka was the only one to have eight such starts through his first 10 career games.
 - Soroka's 1.07 ERA was the third lowest in history (since 1913) by a pitcher aged 21 or younger in his first eight starts of the season, according to research by the Elias Sports Bureau...Only Los Angeles' Fernando Valenzuela (0.50, 1981) and Oakland's Vida Blue (1.02, 1971) had lower marks through eight starts.
- Had his contract selected from Triple-A Gwinnett on May 1, 2018 and made his major league debut that night at New York (NL)... Made his major league debut at the age of 20 years, 270 days... Was the youngest pitcher to make his debut in a start for Atlanta since RH Julio Teheran debuted at 20 years, 100 days on 5/7/11.
 - At the time of his debut, only five starting pitchers had debuted for Atlanta at a younger age than Soroka - Charlie Vaughan (18 years, 332 days - 9/3/66), Mike McQueen (19 years, 033 days - 10/2/69), Steve Avery (20 years, 060 days - 6/13/90), Teheran and Al Santorini (20 years, 114 days - 9/10/68).
 - Soroka was the youngest starter in the majors to make his debut since Julio Urias did so at the age of 19 years, 289 days for

the Los Angeles Dodgers on 5/27/16.

- ▲ Bryse Wilson debuted for Atlanta at a younger age than Soroka later in the 2018 season.
- Earned the win in his major league debut after allowing just six hits and one run over 6.0 innings, May 1, 2018 at NYM...He fanned five in Atlanta's 3-2 win.
 - ▲ Won his debut at the age of 20 years, 270 days, becoming the youngest Braves pitcher to win his debut since LHP Charlie Vaughan beat Houston in game one of a doubleheader on 9/3/66.
 - ▲ Soroka beat the N.L. East-leading New York Mets...The last time a pitcher as young as Soroka won his major league debut against a team in first place at the time was 1997, when the Dodgers' Denny Reyes beat the San Francisco Giants on 7/13...Reyes was 20 years, 85 days at the time, while the Giants were 52-39 and leading the N.L. West by four games over the Dodgers.
 - ▲ Needed just 80 pitches to complete his 6.0 innings, becoming just the second Braves pitcher to go that long in as few pitches during his major league debut... RHP Ryan Weber went 6.0 innings in 74 pitches on 9/8/15.
- Started at Toronto, June 19, 2018...The Calgary, Alberta native became the youngest Canadian-born pitcher to ever pitch in Canada at 20 years, 319 days.
 - ▲ The previous youngest was MIL's Barry Cort, a Toronto native, who started on 5/3/77 vs. the Blue Jays at the age of 21 years, 18 days.


The Braves hit 239 home runs in 2021, ranking second in the National League and third in Major League Baseball.

The home run total stands as the second-best mark in team history, behind the 249 longballs the 2019 team had...This year's club surpassed the 2003 team that hit 235 home runs.

Thirty-five other teams in MLB history have reached the 239 homer mark in a single season...No other NL East team has more than one season with at least 239 roundtrippers.

Twenty-one players homered for Atlanta in 2021, just the fifth time in franchise history at least 20 different players have homered for the club and the first since the 2006 team also had 21...The franchise record is 22 different players, set by the 1957 Milwaukee Braves.

- In 2021, appeared in 160 games and set career highs in home runs (27), hits (146), doubles (33), RBI (88) and total bases (264).
- Enjoyed his best stretch of the season from July 24 to August 27...Across 31 games within that time frame, hit .355 (43-for-121) with 17 extra-base hits (8 home runs), 31 RBI and 26 runs scored.
 - During the run, his average ranked second in the National League behind teammate Austin Riley (.376), his extra-base hits were tied for fifth, his RBI were tied for second and his runs scored were tied for third.
- Finished the season with 27 home runs, a new career-high total, to set the Braves franchise single-season record for a shortstop.
 - Denis Menke held the original mark (20) for Milwaukee in 1964.

- Went 3-for-4 with 2 home runs and a career-high seven RBI, July 31 vs. Milwaukee.
 - He was just the second Braves shortstop since 1920 with at least two homers and 7 RBI in a game (Jeff Blauser, 5/11/96 at PHI).
- Was the Opening Day shortstop for the fifth consecutive season, the first Braves player to accomplish that since Rafael Furcal also started five straight from 2001-05.

2021 POSTSEASON

- Hit .224 in the postseason with two home runs, four RBI, six runs and three walks.
- In World Series Game 4, hit back-to-back home runs with teammate Jorge Soler.
 - Swanson's longball tied the game at two, while Soler's gave the Braves the lead.

Swanson's home run was the third game-tying homer in Braves World Series history...Lonne Smith (1991 G4) and Henry Aaron (1957 G6) are the others to do it.

- Carried a seven-game postseason hitting streak snapped in World Series Game 2.

It was the longest postseason hit streak of his career and the third-longest on the team in the 2021 playoff run.

MAJOR LEAGUE NOTES

- Began the 2020 season with a 10-game hitting streak, and then had a career-high-tying 11-game hitting streak from 8/12-26...In that latter stretch, batted .417/.429/.667 (20-for-48).

Was one of just seven players in the majors to have multiple double-digit hitting streaks in 2020, joining teammate Freddie Freeman, Seattle's Kyle Lewis, San Diego's Manny Machado, New York-NL's Dominic Smith, Washington's Trea Turner and Boston's Alex Verdugo.

- Went 20-for-43 (.465) hitting balls to the opposite field with a .721 slugging percentage (5 2B, 2 HR)...Batted .258 (90-for-349) in these situations in his first four seasons w/ a .381 slugging percentage.

- Was one of three Rawlings Gold Glove finalists for N.L. shortstops...Was worth 1.4 defensive bWAR, second most in the majors...Colorado's Nolan Arenado had 1.7...Swanson committed only two errors in 60 games.

Since the start of the 2018 season, Swanson's 3.8 defensive bWAR is tied for seventh best among all N.L. players.

- Drove a 1-0 pitch from Washington's Daniel Hudson over the wall on 8/17 to cap a four-run ninth inning and give Atlanta a walk-off win.

The walk-off homer was the first of Swanson's career and his fourth career game-ending RBI...According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Swanson became just the second Braves leadoff hitter with a walk-off homer over the last 40 years...In 2008, Yunel Escobar hit a two-run homer in the 10th inning to beat the Marlins.

Adam Duvall drove a two-run home run out to left to open the scoring in the ninth inning for the Braves before Swanson ended the game...The win was the first for Atlanta in which it hit two ninth-inning homers, one of which was a walk-off, since 4/6/13, when brothers B.J. and

Justin Upton homered to beat the Cubs.

- Hit three doubles on 8/23 against the Phillies... Only three other Atlanta-era (since '66) shortstops have accomplished that, and none since Yunel Escobar on 5/31/09 at Arizona.

Was one of eight players in the major leagues in 2020 to have at least three two-base hits in a game...The seven others also hit three doubles.

- Tied a single-game career best with five RBI on 7/26/20 at New York-NL...Went 3-for-5, falling a triple shy of the cycle.

Hit a two-run home run, his only homer in 62 career games against the Mets...Has at least six homers against each of the other N.L. East teams.

- Was the Opening Day shortstop for the fourth consecutive season, the first Braves player to accomplish that since Rafael Furcal started five straight openers from 2001-05.

MAJOR LEAGUE NOTES

- Over the last four seasons, has committed just 34 errors, in 2,769.2 innings at shortstop...Among players with at least 4,000 innings at that position in that time, his 34 errors are the fewest.

- 2020 was his fifth major-league season, played in all 60 of Atlanta's games and hit a career-best .274/.345/.464 (65-for-237) with 15 doubles, 10 home runs, 35 RBI and 49 runs scored.

Was one of 15 players and three Braves to appear in at least 60 games in 2020...Starling Marte played in a majors-most 61 games after beginning the season with Arizona and finishing the campaign with Miami...Freddie Freeman and Marcell Ozuna also played in 60 games.

They were the only trio of teammates to appear in all of their team's games.

- In 2020, ranked highly in the National League in both runs (49, 3rd), hits (49, 9th).

Produced a career-best 2.6 bWAR...Had 1.5 bWAR in 127 games in 2019.

- His 49 runs scored in 2020 trailed only the totals of Freddie Freeman (51) and San Diego's Fernando Tatis Jr. (50) for the major-league lead.

Only two other shortstops in modern franchise history (since 1900) have scored that many runs in the first 60 games of the season...Rafael Furcal had a record 55 runs through this period in 2003, while Bill Urbanski also scored 49 in 1934.

Scored his 25th run in his 28th game,

becoming the quickest shortstop to 25 runs by games played in the franchise's modern era (previously: Bill Urbanski in 1932, 29th game).

- A* Scored a run in a career-most eight consecutive games, from 8/16-26, the third longest such streak by a Braves shortstop since the team relocated to Atlanta in 1966...Rafael Furcal had the two longer ones (10 games in '03 & 9 games in '00).

A Scored a single-game career-high five runs on 9/9/20 against the Marlins...Is one of just six Atlanta-era players to score that many runs in a game, joining Adam Duvall and Austin Riley, who also did so in that game...Swanson reached base safely five times (3 H, 1 BB, 1 HBP).
- Hit a major league-best .402 (41-for-102) off relievers in 2020...He had 14 extra-base hits (8 2B, 6 HR) and 24 RBI facing relief pitchers.

A Swanson had a .471 on-base percentage in these at-bats, third best in the majors, topped by only teammate Freddie Freeman (.491) and the Mets' Michael Conforto (.480).

A In late and close situations – in the seventh inning or later when games are within one run or the tying run is on deck – went 16-for-32 with a .529 on-base percentage and a 1.404 OPS...He hit three homers in these situations.

A For his career, is a .340/.393/.520 batter in late and close situations.
- Has five career game-ending hits, one in each of the last five seasons.

A Had a walk-off single on April 15, 2021 vs. Miami off Dylan Floro.

A Hit a walk-off single in the ninth inning on 4/7/19 vs. Miami...The game was tied, 3-3.

A Capped a six-run ninth inning on 5/20/18 vs. the Marlins with a two-run walk-off single...The rally was Atlanta's biggest ninth-inning comeback since a seven-run rally on 5/20/10 vs. Cincinnati, exactly eight years prior.

A His first career walk-off was a run-scoring single on 4/17/17 vs. San Diego, breaking a 4-4 tie in the ninth inning.
- In his first full major-league season, 2017, ranked among the top five of N.L. rookies in walks (59, 3rd), runs (59, 4th), hits (113, 5th) and doubles (23, 5th).
- Made his major-league debut on 8/17/16 vs.

Minnesota, in his first full professional season and in his first season in Atlanta's organization... Went 2-for-4 starting at the shortstop and hitting eighth...Became the 14th Atlanta Braves player to record at least two hits in his major-league debut...Finished the campaign with 39 hits in 37 games.

- A* Hit an inside-the-park home run for his first career home run, on 9/6 at Washington...Was just the second Atlanta player to accomplish that, joining Paul Runge, who did so on 7/28/85.

A Added his second home run the next night, also at Washington, to become the eighth player in Atlanta franchise history (since 1966) to hit his first two home runs in consecutive games.
- Has been on the injured list twice in his major-league career.

A Missed just over one month in 2019 with a right foot contusion...Suffered the injury on the basepaths on 7/23 against Kansas City.

A Missed two weeks in May 2018 with left wrist inflammation, and then left Atlanta's game on 9/25 at New York-NL with left wrist soreness...An MRI later revealed a partially torn ligament in his left hand... Following the season, on 11/5, underwent a procedure to remove a loose body in his left wrist...Braves head physician Dr. Gary Lourie performed the procedure in Atlanta.

MINOR LEAGUE NOTES

- After getting drafted first overall in 2015 by Arizona, played in just 127 minor-league games before getting promoted to the majors in 2016, his first full professional season...Has played 11 non-rehab games in the minors since, all coming in 2017 with Triple-A after getting optioned.

2021 YEAR-END NOTES

21 IN '21: The Braves clinched the 21st division title in franchise history this season, beating Philadelphia, 5-3 on September 30 at Truist Park to win the National League East...The 21 division titles are the most in major league history, two more than New York (AL) and Los Angeles (NL)... This season also marks the franchise's 27th postseason berth in the modern era and its fourth straight.

- A* The Braves won a major league-record 14 consecutive division titles from 1991-2005, with the first three coming as NL West champs before moving into the NL East in the strike-shortened 1994 season...They also won the West in 1969 and 1982, and the East in 2013, 2018, 2019, and 2020.
- A* The four straight division titles marks the longest streak in baseball...The Dodgers had won the NL West in eight straight seasons before finishing second to San Francisco this year.
- A* The Braves clinched in game No. 158 of this season...The Braves clinched six other division titles as late in a season, with the last coming in 2005, when they also won the East in game No. 158...They clinched in No. 160 in 2001, and then took the West in 1993 in the final game of the season...They also won the West in No. 161 in 1991, No. 162 in 1982, and No. 161 in 1969.
- A* The Braves became the last National League team to clinch a playoff berth this season and the fifth division winner in baseball...Only San Francisco had to wait longer to clinch their division.
- A* The Braves' four straight playoff appearances marks the club's longest streak since their 14-year run from 1991-2005.
- A* The only other National League teams to make the postseason in each of the last four years are the Dodgers and the Brewers...The Dodgers are working on a nine-season run, while this is also the fourth consecutive postseason appearance for the Brewers...In the American League, New York and Houston have both been in the last four years, with both teams owning five-season runs.

88-73: The Braves went 88-73 this season to win the NL East by 6.5 games over Philadelphia...The 88 wins tie the fewest the club has ever won in a full season in which they captured a division title... The 2001 team also won 88 games...The only other division-winning Braves team that did not win 90 games in a full season was the 1982 club...Last year's club went 35-25 in the shortened season

- A* The 88 wins are the fewest of any playoff team, and if the Braves win the pennant, they will be on the road to open the World Series regardless of opponent...They will, however, host a Wild Card opponent in the NLCS should they beat the Brewers in the division series and San Francisco loses.
- A* This marked the Braves' fourth consecutive winning season...They went 90-72 in 2018, 97-65 in 2019, and 35-25 in 2020...The Braves' 310 wins since 2018 are the second most in the National League, 37 behind Los Angeles for the league lead.
- A* The last time the Braves had fourth straight winning seasons was during a string of five-consecutive winning seasons from 2009-13.
- A* This marks the club's 58th winning season in the modern era (since 1900), and their 32nd since the club moved to Atlanta in 1966...The 32 winning seasons since 1966 are tied for the third most in the National League, and 12 off the lead of the Los Angeles Dodgers...St. Louis has 41, while San Francisco also has 32.

ROSTER: The Braves used 56 different players this season, eight more than the club employed last season.

- A* The Braves used 26 position players and 30 pitchers, with SS Dansby Swanson and 3B Austin Riley leading the way with 160 games played...Swanson and 1B Freddie Freeman led the team with 158 starts, while Riley and 2B Ozzie Albies started 156...LHP Will Smith and RHP Luke Jackson led all relievers with 71 appearances, while RHP Charlie Morton made a team-high 33 starts.
- A* The Braves' 30 pitchers used this season were the second fewest in the major leagues...Only Colorado used less players on the mound with 26.
- A* Swanson and Riley led the National League in games played, while Freeman was tied for third with Pittsburgh's Bryan Reynolds and St. Louis' Tommy Edman...Morton tied for the league lead with his 33 starts, while Smith and Jackson were tied for sixth in appearances.
- A* The Braves used 11 rookies this season, including seven pitchers (RHP Ian Anderson, LHP Tucker Davidson, RHP Jay Flaa, LHP Dylan Lee, LHP Kyle Muller, RHP Spencer Strider and RHP Ty Tice)...The four position players were C William Contreras, C Alex Jackson, INF Sean Kazmar Jr. and OF Cristian Pache...Lee, Muller and Strider all made their MLB debut with the Braves this season.
- A* The seven rookie pitchers were tied for the third fewest in the majors this season, one more than New York (NL) and Oakland.

SNIT: Brian Snitker completed his 45th season in the Braves organization in 2021, and his fifth full campaign as the Braves manager...Snitker took over on an interim basis on May 17, 2016, before being named Atlanta's manager on October 11, 2016...Snitker joined the organization as a non-drafted free agent in 1977.

- A* Snitker is 441-390 (.531) at the major league level and was named NL Manager of the Year in 2018...He was a finalist for the award in 2019, and finished fourth last season.
- A* He moved into fifth place on the club's all-time wins list this season, passing Fredi González with his 435th victory on September 25.
- A* Snitker managed for 20 seasons in the minor leagues, compiling a 1,301-1,309 (.498) record, while five of his clubs advanced to postseason play...He was named Manager of the Year twice while in the minor leagues, winning the award in 1999 and 2000 with Single-A Myrtle Beach.
- A* Snitker is the first manager in franchise history to take the team to the postseason four times in his first five full seasons.

ATTENDANCE: The Braves recorded the second highest attendance of any team in the Major Leagues during the 2021 regular season, welcoming 2,300,247 fans over 78 ticketed dates (tickets sold).

- A* The team has greeted a total of 10,016,426 fans to Truist Park in the four seasons fans have been in the stands.
- A* In 2021, the Braves began with a 33% capacity for their first homestand, 50% for their second homestand and went to 100% capacity beginning on May 7...The team's average attendance for the 78 dates in 2021 was 29,490.
- A* Only the Dodgers had more fans this season than the Braves.
- A* The Braves drew a season-high 41,136 fans on June 5 vs. the Dodgers.

ON THE ROAD: The Braves went 46-35 (.568) away from Truist Park this season, tied for the fifth-best road record in the majors...Since 2018 and the start of this four-season playoff run, the Braves are the second-best road team in the majors with a mark of 156-117 (.571)...Only Los Angeles (NL) at .601 has been better over the last four seasons.

- A* The Braves won a franchise-record 13-straight road games, July 29-August 22, that included sweeping a nine-game road trip through Washington (three games), Miami (three games) and Baltimore (three games), August 13-August 22.
- A* The 1993-94 Braves set the original franchise record with a 12-game road win streak, done over the course of two seasons, from September 25, 1993-April 17, 1994...The previous single-season mark was an 11-game run...The 1890 Boston Beaneaters first set the record from June 20-July 4, before the 1956 team matched the mark, winning 11 straight away from County Stadium, June 17-June 25, as part of a 21-game, six-city road trip.
- A* The last Braves team to go undefeated on a road trip to three different stops was the 1992 club, according to research by the Elias Sports Bureau...That team went 10-0 in Chicago (4-0), Houston (4-0) and St. Louis (2-0) from July 9-July 22.

ONE-RUN GAMES: The Braves played 57 one-run games this season, the second most in the majors...Only New York (NL) played more.

- A* The Braves went 26-31 (.456) in these games, with the 31 losses tied for the second most in baseball...Only the Mets lost more (35)...The Diamondbacks also had 31 one-run losses.
- A* The last Braves team to play more one-run games in a single season was the 1993 club, who had 59 such games.
- A* The modern-era franchise record is 64, first set by the 1916 club and matched in 1961.
- A* The Braves' final 13 losses were all by either one or two runs...The club's previous loss by three or more runs was a 5-0 defeat to San Francisco on August 28.
- A* From 2018-2020, the Braves went 62-34 (.646) in one-run games, the best mark in the majors.
- A* The Braves lost their 73 losses by an average of 2.88 runs per game...That was the second lowest average in the majors...Only Los Angeles had a smaller average at 2.54.
- A* In the club's 88 wins, the Braves' average run differential was 3.91, the highest in the National League.

WIN ONE, LOSE ONE: The Braves went 9-9 in their first 18 completed games out of the All-Star break, alternating wins and losses over that stretch...They began their post-break schedule with a loss to Tampa Bay.

- A* The Braves alternating pattern of wins and losses actually started on July 17 and spanned 17 games, since the club lost their last game before the break.
- A* This streak, however, was erased after the Braves finished a suspended game with the Padres from July 21 on September 24 in San Diego.
- A* In the official record books, the Braves streak reads as a 13-game run, from July 22 to August 3...That 13-game stretch still ties the Braves franchise record.
- A* According to the Elias Sports Bureau, the 17-game streak of wins and losses without the suspended game would be the longest such stretch in major league history...The record of 15 games is held by three teams, with the last being the 2010 Colorado Rockies...That club matched the record from August 3 until August 19.

- A* The first 15-game run of alternating wins and losses was done by the 1974 Philadelphia Phillies from June 4-June 20...The 1981 Dodgers then matched the record with a stretch that began on June 7, sat idle during the player's strike, and ended on August 21.
- A* Prior to this season, the longest such streak in Braves franchise history was a 13-game run by the 1895 Boston Beaneaters.

.500: The Braves did not get over .500 until August 5, when they beat St. Louis, 8-4, to improve to 55-54 (according to the record books, the Braves were not .500 at that time due to a suspended game on July 21 that was not finished until September 24).

- A* After that day, the Braves had a winning record for the rest of the season (again, according to the official record books, the club was 56-56 after a loss to Washington on August 7...But in real time, the club was over .500 every day after August 5).
- A* The Braves were the 28th team in baseball to move over .500...The other two teams, Miami and Texas, never got over .500.

SURGE: The Braves went 36-18 (.667) over their final 54 games, dating to August 3...That was the third-best record in baseball over that stretch, trailing only Los Angeles-NL (42-13, .764) and San Francisco (40-16, .714).

- A* The Braves compiled a 3.45 ERA (186 ER/485.2 IP) over this stretch, again third best in baseball and again trailing Los Angeles-NL (2.69) and San Francisco (2.96).
- A* The Braves scored 282 runs in these 54 games, for an average of 5.22 per game...That run per game average led the National League since that date, and ranked fourth highest in the majors.

ACQUISITIONS: The Braves acquired six players in July, with OF Joc Pederson from Chicago (NL) being the first on July 15.

- A* They got C Stephen Vogt the next day from Arizona, before landing RHP Richard Rodríguez from Pittsburgh, OF Jorge Soler from Kansas City, OF Adam Duvall from Miami and OF Eddie Rosario from Cleveland on July 30.
- A* The five position players combined to hit 46 home runs, score 102 runs and drive in 124 in 754 at-bats.

VS. THE FIELD: The Braves went 14-11 (.560) against the other four National League playoff teams, the best record by any NL playoff team against the field.

- A* Atlanta went 3-3 against the Giants, 2-4 against the Dodgers, 3-3 against the Brewers and 6-1 against the Cardinals.
- A* The Dodgers had a 21-18 (.538) record against the field, while the Giants were 18-20 (.473), the Brewers were 18-21 (.461) and the Cardinals were 19-20 (.487).

INTERLEAGUE: The Braves went 6-14 (.300) against the American League this season, the fourth-worst interleague record in baseball...Only Chicago (NL), Miami, and Arizona were worse.

- A* The Braves went 1-9 against the American League in Atlanta this season, with their only win coming on July 17 against Tampa Bay...Despite the struggles, they were only outscored 61-49 (-12, 1.2 per game) in the 10 games...The Braves only won one home interleague game in a season twice before...The 2007 club and the 1997 team both went 1-5 against the AL in Atlanta.
- A* The 6-14 record tied the club's worst interleague record since the leagues started playing 20 games against each other in 2013...The 2015 team also went 6-14...The 2007 team holds the single-season franchise record for worst interleague record, going 4-11 (.267) against the AL

VS. THE NL EAST: The Braves went 45-31 (.592) against the NL East this season, after they finished 24-16 (.600) in intradivision games last season...They went 46-30 (.605) in 2019 and 49-27 (.645) in 2018.

- A* The club's 164-104 (.612) record against the NL East over the last four seasons is the second best intradivision record in the NL...Only Los Angeles has been better inside their division over this time frame at 173-96 (.643).
- A* This season, the Braves went 10-9 against the Mets and Phillies, 14-5 against the Nationals, and 11-8 against the Marlins.

FIRST PLACE: The Braves were in first place for 51 days this season, and were in the top spot of the NL East from after play on August 15 until the end of the season.

- A* The Braves were never in first place alone prior to August 15...They were tied atop the standings after play on April 28 for one day.
- A* The club finished 6.5 games ahead of the Phillies in the final standings, with that final margin being their high-water mark...They were in every spot in the division, including last place as late as after play on April 17.
- A* The club's biggest division deficit was eight games after play on June 16...They were in third place behind New York and Philadelphia following a 10-8 loss to Boston.

TOUGH DAY: The Braves collected one hit during a doubleheader with Arizona on April 25, becoming the first team in history with that few hits in a doubleheader, according to research by the Elias Sports Bureau...They lost the games 5-0 and then 7-0.

- A* The previous low was two hits, done by Cleveland against Boston on April 12, 1992.
- A* The Braves became just the 11th team since 1901 to collect one hit or less in consecutive games, with Cleveland being the last to do so on June 29 and 30, 2014...Three of those 11 total instances have happened to the Braves franchise (also September 28 and 30, 1916, and September 5 and 7, 1908).
- A* The Braves failed to score in consecutive games for the first time since September 1 and September 2, 2014.

OVERALL PITCHING: The Braves allowed 656 runs this season, sixth fewest in baseball and fourth fewest in the National League...They had a 3.88 team ERA, which ranked eighth in the majors and also fourth in the NL...Opponents batted .234 (1,236-for-5,279) against Braves pitching, which ranked ninth in the majors and fifth in the NL...Atlanta pitchers struck out 1,417, the eighth most in the NL, while walking 516, tied for fifth fewest...The club allowed 183 home runs in 2021, eighth fewest in all of baseball.

- A* Atlanta pitchers walked 516 batters this season, 13th fewest in baseball...Their 3.29 walks per 9.0 innings were 0.49 fewer than last season...The Braves rotation walked 3.05 batters per 9.0 innings, 12th most in the majors, while the Atlanta bullpen walked 3.64, 11th fewest.
- A* The Braves staff induced 1,791 ground balls on the year, 13th most in the majors and ninth most in the NL, while Atlanta's 447 extra-base hits allowed were eighth fewest in baseball.
- A* Just three Braves pitchers - Dylan Lee, Kyle Muller and Spencer Strider - made their major league debuts, and combined to appear in just 13 games on the season (nine by Muller)... Three pitchers debuted in each of the last two seasons for the Braves, after ten Atlanta pitchers debuted in 2018.

STARTERS: The Braves used 11 starting pitchers this year after using 14 different starters in just 60 games last season...Overall, the starters went 57-40 (.588) on the season, the sixth-best record in the majors in 2021 (third best in the National League)...They tossed 837.0 innings, the eighth most in baseball and fifth most in the National League, while their 3.84 ERA (357 ER) was seventh best in the majors.

- A* Last season, Atlanta starters tossed 251.2 innings, the fewest in the National League and third fewest in baseball, while their 5.51 ERA (166 ER) was also highest in the NL and third highest in the league.
- A* The Atlanta staff used just 11 starters this season, tied for the seventh fewest in baseball...Only the A's (9), Astros (9), White Sox (9), Brewers (10), Reds (10) and Red Sox (10) used less...No Braves team has used fewer starters in a single season since the 2015 club used just 10 pitchers.
- A* Four different starters - Ian Anderson, Max Fried, Charlie Morton & Drew Smyly - made at least 23 starts for the club, and combined to start 67% (108-of-161) of Atlanta's games this season...No Braves team has had as many pitchers make as many starts for the club since the 2018 squad also had four.
- A* The Braves pitched two complete games, both shutouts by LHP Max Fried, their first complete games since 2019 and their first 9.0-inning complete games since Mike Foltynewicz pitched two in 2018.

RELIEVERS: The Braves bullpen used 24 different pitchers in a relief role this season, four more than last season and two fewer than the last full season in 2019...Atlanta relievers went 31-33 with a 3.97 ERA (253 ER/573.2 IP) and converted 40-of-67 save opportunities.

- A* Atlanta relievers combined to post a .484 winning percentage (31-33), fifth lowest in the majors...Only Texas (.466), Baltimore (.452), Washington (.354) and Arizona (.349) had worse records...The Braves' 33 losses in relief were also fifth most.
- A* Nine Atlanta relievers - Luke Jackson, Chris Martin, Tyler Matzek, A.J. Minter, Sean Newcomb, Edgar Santana, Will Smith, Josh Tomlin & Jacob Webb - made at least 30 relief appearances.
- A* Just four teams in baseball had more pitchers make at least 30 appearances - Colorado, Detroit, Miami and Seattle each had 10.
- A* Since the Braves moved to Atlanta in 1966, just one other team had as many 30-appearance relievers...The 2016 club also had nine.
- A* From the start of the season until June 24, the day Jesse Chavez debuted with the club, Atlanta pitched to a 4.82 ERA in relief, 24th in the majors.
- A* From June 24 until the end of the season, the Braves pitched to a 3.23 ERA in relief, the third lowest mark in baseball.

SAVES: Atlanta relievers went 40-for-67 in save opportunities, and just four different pitchers recorded a save for Atlanta this season...A franchise record-tying 11 relievers saved a game for the Braves in the last full season in 2019.

- A* Will Smith saved 37 games for Atlanta, while Chris Martin, Sean Newcomb and Jacob Webb each tallied one.
- A* Smith's 37 saves were fourth most in the majors, and the most for a Braves reliever since Craig Kimbrel closed out 47 games in 2014...Smith's total this season tied for the 10th most of any Atlanta closer since the team moved to the city in 1966.
- A* Atlanta blew 27 saves this season, tied for the 11th most in the majors...Smith blew six of his 43 chances, tied for most among relievers to convert at least 30 saves this season.

SHUTOUTS: The Atlanta pitching staff combined to throw 18 shutouts this season, tied for the second most in the majors...Only Milwaukee, with 19, pitched more.

- A* San Francisco also logged 18 shutouts this season.
- A* Atlanta's 18 games without allowing a run were the most since the 1998 club pitched 23 shutouts.
- A* Fifteen of Atlanta's 18 shutouts on the season came after June 17, two more than any other club in baseball...The Brewers pitched 13 in that span.

A TALE OF TWO SEASONS: In 51 games over April and May, Atlanta pitchers combined to post a 4.36 ERA (217 ER/448.1 IP) and a 4.42 FIP, the 10th highest and eighth highest marks in baseball, respectively.

- A* Braves pitchers allowed 68 homers in the season's first two months, tied for seventh most in the majors.
- A* From June through the end of the season, Atlanta pitched to 3.66 ERA (391 ER/962.1 IP) and a 3.96 FIP, the fourth lowest and sixth lowest marks in the majors.
- A* The Braves' 115 home runs allowed over the final four months were sixth fewest in the majors.

LEAD AFTER EIGHT: The Braves went 79-2 when leading after eight innings this season, the sixth-best record in baseball...Only four teams in baseball suffered fewer losses when carrying a lead into the ninth inning this season.

- A* Atlanta lost in Philadelphia, 2-1, on June 9 after carrying a 1-0 lead into the ninth, and lost to Washington, 3-2, on August 7 after allowing three ninth-inning runs.
- A* Over the last two seasons, the Braves are 105-2 (.981) when leading entering the ninth inning...Only the Cubs (84-0), Angels (88-1) and White Sox (108-2) have been better.

TIED AFTER EIGHT: Despite the success when leading entering the ninth inning, Atlanta went just 1-12 (.077) when tied after eight innings this season, easily the worst record in the majors...Arizona, with a 6-13 (.316) record, ranked second.

- A* The Braves pitched to a 6.55 ERA (8 ER/11.0 IP) in the ninth inning when tied entering the frame, the highest ERA in the majors...However, Atlanta's 2.74 FIP in such innings was sixth lowest.

NO HOMERS: The Braves pitching staff held the opponent without a home run 58 times, and went 46-12 (.793) in those games.

- A* The Braves pitched to a 1.58 ERA (89 ER/505.2 IP) in games in which they did not allow a home run, the lowest mark in baseball...The Dodgers, with a 1.65 ERA, ranked second.
- A* Atlanta's 58 games without allowing a homer ranked as the seventh most in the majors, and the Braves' .793 winning percentage in these games was also seventh best.

HOLDS: The Atlanta relief corps amassed 113 holds this season, the second most in the majors, only behind San Francisco's 114.

- A* Luke Jackson (31), Tyler Matzek (24) and A.J. Minter (23) all ranked among the top 10 leaders in holds in baseball.
- A* The only other teams to have at least two relievers rank in the top 10 were St. Louis and Milwaukee.

HIGH-LEVERAGE: Braves relievers appeared in 221 high-leverage situations this year, the most in the majors per Baseball-Reference...The next closest in the National League was San Francisco with 213.

OVERALL OFFENSE: The Atlanta offense combined to bat .244/.319/.435 over 161 games this season, with 239 homers and 790 total runs...Atlanta drew 549 walks on the season and struck out 1,453 times.

- A* Just two NL teams scored more runs than Atlanta, who ranked eighth overall in the majors... Only the Dodgers (830) and Giants (804) scored more runs in the Senior Circuit.
- A* The Braves' .244 average ranked 12th in the majors, as did the club's .319 on-base percentage... Atlanta's .435 slugging percentage was fifth best in baseball, and second highest in the NL (San Francisco - .440).
- A* On the whole, Atlanta's .754 OPS was eighth highest in the majors, and fourth in the NL
- A* The Braves' 549 walks were 12th most in the majors and eighth most in the NL, while their 1,453 strikeouts were 11th most (sixth in NL).

HISTORIC INFIELD: Each member of the Braves infield hit at least 25 home runs this season...First baseman Freddie Freeman (31), second baseman Ozzie Albies (30), third baseman Austin Riley (33) and shortstop Dansby Swanson (27) combine to become just the second infield in baseball history with each member hitting at least 25 longballs.

- A* The 2008 Miami Marlins were the only other big league club to accomplish this...They did it with first baseman Mike Jacobs (32), second baseman Dan Uggla (32), third baseman Jorge Cantú (29) and shortstop Hanley Ramírez (33).

HOME RUNS: The Braves hit 239 home runs this season, ranking second in the National League and third in Major League Baseball.

- A* The home run total stands as the second-best mark in team history, behind the 249 longballs the 2019 team had...This year's club surpassed the 2003 team that hit 235 home runs.
- A* Thirty-five other teams in MLB history have reached the 239 homer mark in a single season... No other NL East team has more than one season with at least 239 roundtrippers.
- A* Twenty-one players have homered for Atlanta this season, just the fifth time in franchise history at least 20 different players have homered for the club and the first since the 2006 team also had 21...The franchise record is 22 different players, set by the 1957 Milwaukee Braves.

EXTRA INNINGS: The Braves went 5-9 in extra-inning games this season and batted just .154 as a team after the ninth inning, the worst mark in the majors.

- A* Kansas City hit just .156 in extra innings to rank 29th, while the closest NL club was the Padres at .170.
- A* The Braves tallied eight total hits in 14 extra-inning games this season, and exactly half of those hits came in one game, May 8 vs. Philadelphia...Atlanta went 4-for-9 in that 8-7, 12-inning win.
- A* Outside of that game versus Philadelphia, the Braves batted just .093 (4-for-43) and scored nine total runs after the ninth inning.

ACQUIRING HOMERS: After they were acquired separately on July 30, outfielders Adam Duvall and Jorge Soler hit 15 and 14 home runs, respectively... The Braves were the first team in baseball history to acquire two outfielders in July who subsequently each hit at least 12 home runs for their new team (credit Stats Perform).

STARTING HOT: The Braves scored the fifth-most first-inning runs in the National League this season, hitting .270 (1st in NL) in the opening frame with 32 home runs (T4th), a .343 one-base percentage (6th) and a .489 slugging percentage (6th).

WITH RISP: Atlanta led the National League with a .267 batting average (333-for-1,245) with runners in scoring position, which was also good for third in Major League Baseball behind Houston (.272) and Toronto (.270).

- A* Also had the highest OPS (.822) in the majors with runners in scoring position and the third-most home runs in National League (54) in such situations.
- A* Atlanta's batting average with runners in scoring position was .006 points higher when there were two outs, leading the majors at a .273 clip.
- A* With two outs and RISP, the Braves' 27 home runs were second in the National League and fourth in the majors...Also led the majors with a n.847 OPS in these situations.
- A* Atlanta's 756 runners left on-base with runners in scoring position and two outs were third-fewest in the National League.

PAIR OF CYCLES: Freddie Freeman and Eddie Rosario each hit for the cycle this season – Freeman on August 18 and Rosario on September 19...It was the second cycle of Freeman's career (also June 15, 2016) and the first for Rosario.

- A* Rosario and Freeman are the only Braves teammates to hit for the cycle in the same season, and the first pair of teammates to cycle in the same season since the Rangers' Adrian Beltre and Shin-Soo Choo did so in 2015.

SEPTEMBER STREAKS: Atlanta had four players with hitting streaks of at least 12 games within the month of September...They were headlined by Adam Duvall's 16-game hitting streak, while Austin Riley, Freddie Freeman and Jorge Soler each had 12-gamers within the month. ..A further breakdown of each streak:

- A* Duvall: 16 games, September 1-20 (18-64, .281, eight home runs, 10 runs, 19 RBI).
- A* Freeman: 12 games, September 9-22 (22-52, .423, three home runs, 13 runs, 9 RBI).
- A* Riley: 12 games, September 14-28 (20-54, .370, three home runs, 11 runs, 11 RBI).
- A* Soler: 12 games, 9 September 2-15, (16-54, .296, two home runs, 9 runs, 6 RBI).

STARTER VS. RELIEVER: The Braves combined to his .255 off of opposing starting pitchers this season, good for the fourth-best average in the National League...Conversely, the Braves hit .026 points lower against relievers at .229 – the fifth-lowest mark in the NL

A Last season the Braves batted an MLB-best .286 (271-for-949) against the bullpen, and scored a majors-most 206 runs against opposing relief...That run total was 30 more than the closest team (Dodgers, 176).





In Game 3 at Truist Park, rookie Ian Anderson became the second pitcher in World Series history to finish with at least 5.0 no-hit innings in an outing (also Don Larsen, NYY, 1956).

KEVIN HOOPER

DIRECTOR OF PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

- Kevin Hooper in 2022 joins the Braves farm system for his first year in the organization.
- He joins Atlanta from the San Diego club, where he served as an infield instructor and field coordinator over the course of six seasons from 2016-21.
- Hooper played professional baseball for nine seasons, appearing in the majors for Detroit in 2005 and '06. He also spent a season with the independent Wichita Wingnuts at the end of his career.
- He was drafted by the Florida Marlins in the eighth round of the 1999 MLB First-Year Player Draft.
- Hooper was inducted into Wichita State's hall of fame in 2005 after ranking highly in many career and season categories.
- In 233 career games as a Shocker, he hit .358 (310-for-866) with 58 doubles, 287 runs scored and 78 stolen bases.
- His single-season accomplishments at WSU include being named a first-team All-American (*College Baseball Insider*) in 1999 and a second-team All-American in 1998 and 1999 by the NCBWA.
- Hooper, 45, resides in Valley Center, Kan., with his wife, Lindsey...Has two daughters, Lucey and Laney.



PAUL DAVIS

DIRECTOR OF PITCHING DEVELOPMENT

- Paul Davis is in his third season in the Atlanta Braves' organization, and his first as the director of pitching development.
- Davis spent his first two seasons in the organization as a pitching coordinator...He was hired in January of 2020.
- Prior to joining the Braves, he was the Seattle Mariners' pitching coach in 2019, his only season on a major-league staff.
- Davis came to the Mariners after a six-year stint with the St. Louis Cardinals organization, where he began his professional coaching career.
- During his Cardinals tenure, he served in five different capacities...In his first year with the organization, 2013, he was rookie-advanced Johnson City's pitching coach...He returned to that role in 2014, but added the responsibilities of coordinator of pitching analytics.
- Davis was then the rehab pitching coach in 2015, before spending two seasons, 2016-17, as the assistant pitching coordinator.
- In his final year with St. Louis, Davis was the manager of pitching analytics, working to assist pitchers at all levels of the organization.
- Davis also has scouting experience...He spent time as a consultant for the Phillies scouting staff, and he worked with the Mets area scouts as a "bird-dog" scout.
- Before getting into professional baseball, he served as the head coaches at Dana College in Blair, Neb., 1995-99, and for the Omaha Indians college summer team, 1998...In five seasons at Dana, Davis was twice named Nebraska-Iowa Athletic Conference Coach of the Year and led the Vikings to a school-record 32 wins and a conference championship in 1996.
- Off the field, he has taught college courses, including working as an adjunct professor in athletic coaching at the University of Nebraska, 2005-12, teaching psychology at Iowa Western Community College, 2005-11, and sports management at Nebraska Wesleyan University, 2007-09.
- Davis graduated from Osceola High School in Kissimmee, Fla. in 1981, where he played baseball for three seasons...He played collegiately at Valencia Community College in Orlando, Fla., 1982-83, and Creighton University, 1984-85.
- Davis, 56, and his wife, Martha, reside in Omaha, Neb... The couple has two sons, Nick and Jake.



DOUG MANSOLINO

ADVISOR, PLAYER DEVELOPMENT

- He was hired by Atlanta in October of 2018 after spending the previous 11 seasons with the Philadelphia Phillies, including the last five as field coordinator.
- Mansolino joined the Phillies in 2008 as the infield coordinator and also spent much of the season managing the Gulf Coast League Phillies (R) to the league championship.
- During his time with Philadelphia, he served a short stint with the major-league club as interim bench coach in 2008, the year the Phillies won the World Series.
- In 2017, he was the recipient of the John Vukovich Award, which is presented annually to an instructor in the Phillies organization that embodies the characteristics of the award's namesake; loyalty, knowledge, dedication, competitiveness, honesty and a terrific work ethic.
- Prior to joining the Phillies, Mansolino spent three years, 2005-07, as the Houston Astros third base coach under manager Phil Garner...In 2006, he was the third base coach for the National League All-Stars.
- Mansolino also worked under Garner with the Milwaukee Brewers, 1998-99, and the Detroit Tigers, 2000-02, in three different roles: first base coach, third base

coach and bench coach.

- Between his major-league stints with the Tigers and Astros, he spent two seasons, 2003-04, with the Pittsburgh Pirates as the roving infield instructor and defensive coordinator.
- Mansolino's first experience on a major-league staff came with the Chicago White Sox, over a five-year period, 1992-96, as first base coach, third base coach and infield instructor.
- He had nine total seasons in the White Sox organization, spending the first four in their minor-league system: field coordinator (1988), roving infield instructor (1989) and defensive coordinator (1990-91).
- Following his time with the White Sox, he managed one season, 1997, in the New York Mets farm system.
- Mansolino began his coaching career in the San Francisco Giants organization as a roving infield instructor and Triple-A coach, 1985-87.
- Mansolino also spent the 1989, 1990 and 1991 off-seasons as a special instructor for two of Korea's major-league clubs...In 1995, he managed Caribes de Oriente in the Venezuelan Winter League
- During his experience on major-league staffs, Mansolino instructed five Hall of Famers: Jeff Bagwell, Craig Biggio, Carlton Fisk, Tim Lincecum and Frank Thomas.
- He graduated from California State University at Long Beach with a bachelor of arts in physical education.
- Mansolino, 65, and his wife, Cindy, have three kids, Nick, Tony and Ariana, and reside in Tennessee...Tony is in his second season as the Baltimore Orioles' third base coach.



JD CLOSSER

CATCHING COORDINATOR

- JD Closser is in his third season as the Atlanta Braves' catching coordinator.
- Prior to joining the Braves, he was in the New York Yankees organization for six seasons, 2014-19, the last two of which he also served as the catching coordinator.

- The Georgia native was originally drafted by the Philadelphia Phillies in 1977.
- Walker, 62, resides in Douglas, Ga. with his wife, Carmen...The couple has three daughters, Kaycee, Leigh Ann and Lauren.



MICHAEL SAUNDERS

OUTFIELD/BASERUNNING COORDINATOR

- The 2022 season marks Michael Saunders' 2nd in the Atlanta Braves organization and his first as the outfield and baserunning coordinator.
- In 2021, Saunders made his managerial debut as the skipper for Low-A Augusta, leading the GreenJackets to a third-place finish in .Low-A East South Division.
- Before joining Atlanta's farm system, Saunders had a nine-year major league career, playing in the big leagues for three different organizations: Seattle (six years), Toronto (three years) and Philadelphia (one year).

- While in school at FSU, Goodwin was the youngest member of the Team USA baseball team that won a gold medal at the 1988 Seoul Olympics.
- Goodwin, 53, resides in Corinth, Tex., and has a son, Satchel.

One of the greatest hitters of all time, Hank Aaron was elected to Baseball's Hall of Fame in January 1982. He missed by nine votes being the first unanimous choice ever in the voting by the Baseball Writers' Association of America. Aaron received 406 of a possible 415 votes for 97.8 percent. Aaron and Frank Robinson were inducted into the Hall of Fame at Cooperstown, N.Y., on August 1, 1982. In his 23-year Major League career, Aaron re-wrote baseball's record book. He holds more Major League batting records than any other player in the game's history. Among his records are Most Runs Batted In, Lifetime (2,297); Most Extra-Base Hits, Lifetime (1,477); and Most Total Bases, Lifetime (6,856). Aaron also ranks second on the all-time list in at-bats (12,364), and home runs (755), third in games (3,298) and hits (3,771), fourth in runs (2,174, tied with Babe Ruth), 10th in doubles (624), 12th in singles (2,294) and is tied for 18th in years of service (23). His most famous home run came in Atlanta on April 8, 1974, when he hit his 715th, breaking Babe Ruth's seemingly untouchable record. He did it before a sellout crowd of 53,775 at Atlanta Stadium. The pitch came in the bottom of the fourth inning, the Los Angeles Dodgers leading 3-1, with a 1-0 count and Darrell Evans waiting on first. Al Downing threw a fastball at 9:07 p.m. that Hank sent over the left field fence. Reliever Tom House caught the ball in the Braves' bullpen and brought it to Aaron in the home plate celebration. On May 17, 1970, Hank singled at Cincinnati to become the first player to compile both 3,000 career hits and more than 500 homers. He joined the 30-30 club (30 HRs and 30 SBs in the same season) in 1963. Aaron played in the Major League All-Star Game 24 times, including the years 1959-61 when two games were played. He was honored as the National League's Most Valuable Player in 1957 and named Player of the Year by Sporting News in 1956 and 1963. He played 21 seasons with the Braves before being traded to Milwaukee for outfielder Dave May and minor leaguer Roger Alexander at the end of 1974. Aaron retired as a player two years later. Aaron was first scouted by Dewey Griggs of the Milwaukee Braves during an Indianapolis Clowns tryout. The Braves eventually were able to strike a deal and beat out the Giants for Aaron's services. In 1952 he was assigned to the Eau Claire, Wisconsin, team of the Northern League. He was the unanimous choice for the Northern League's Rookie of the Year while only playing in 87 games (.336, 9 HR, 61 RBI, 116 hits and 89 runs).

In 1953 he was promoted to the Jacksonville Tars, where he became the first African-American player in the South Atlantic League. Aaron won the batting title (.362) and led the league in RBI (125), runs (115), hits (208) and finished second in home runs (22) and earned the league's MVP award. He began his Major League career in 1954 when a spring training injury forced Bobby Thomson out of the Braves' lineup. In his debut he struck out twice, grounded out, hit into a double play and fouled out. Aaron hit his first home run off Vic Raschi on April 23, 1954. He became the second youngest player to win a batting title (.328) in 1956 and the second youngest to collect his 1,000th hit, off Sandy Koufax in 1959. On June 12, 1967, Aaron recorded his 2,500th hit and achieved his 3,000th hit on May 17, 1970. His 2,000th RBI came on July 3, 1972. During his career, Aaron had a 20-year string of 20 or more home runs. After turning 35, he hit 245 home runs and from the ages 35 to 39 he hit at least 34 home runs a year. Over his 23-year Major League career, he averaged just 63 strikeouts a year, with his highest strikeout total being 97 in 1967. He hit .300 or better in 14 seasons, won the NL home run crown three times and tied for a fourth, led the league in RBI four times and won three Gold Gloves. Aaron hit his 755 home runs off 310 different pitchers, including 12 Hall of Famers. He hit the most off of Hall of Famer Don Drysdale (17), the most in the month of July (152), the most against the Cincinnati Reds (97) and the most in the first inning (124). Aaron hit 400 solo home runs and hit seven of his 755 as a second baseman and had three pinch-hit home runs. He had only one three-homer game, at San Francisco on June 21, 1959. Following his playing career, Aaron joined the Braves' front office on October 7, 1976, for a 13-year tenure as a Braves Vice President and Director of Player Development. In that position, he oversaw the development of many players instrumental in the Braves' 1982 National League West Division championship, including Dale Murphy, who won back-to-back NL MVP awards in 1982-83. From December of 1989 until his death, he served as Braves' Senior Vice President and in February of 2000, Aaron replaced the late Pee Wee Reese on the Hall of Fame Veterans Committee..

Known as the consummate “players” manager, Bobby Cox treated everyone with respect and dignity. He spent 29 seasons as a Major League skipper, including 25 seasons in two stints at the helm of the Braves. His 2,504 wins rank fourth all-time and include a franchise-best 2,149 victories with the Braves and 355 with the Toronto Blue Jays. Cox posted an overall career record of 2,504-2001-3 (.556). The 2010 campaign marked his final season on the bench, as Atlanta went 91-71 and claimed the National League’s Wild Card. The 2010 campaign was Cox’s 15th with 90 or more wins, tying him for second all-time in 90-win seasons with Hall of Fame skipper Joe McCarthy (15) and putting him one behind the legendary John McGraw (16). Cox and McCarthy are the only managers in Major League history to compile six 100-win seasons. On June 8, 2009, Cox posted his 2,000th Braves victory, making him just the fourth skipper in big-league history to claim 2,000 wins with one team, joining Connie Mack (Athletics), John McGraw (Giants) and Walter Alston (Dodgers). On September 29, 2004, in the season’s final home game, Cox earned his 2,000th career victory with a 6-4 decision over the New York Mets. He became just the ninth skipper in big-league history to reach the milestone. Cox won 15 division crowns in his career, including 14 straight in Atlanta that led to five pennants (1991, 1992, 1995, 1996 and 1999) and one World Championship (1995). He had a string of 15 consecutive winning seasons from 1991 to 2005, tying him with Al Lopez and Earl Weaver for third place all-time in consecutive winning campaigns. Cox was voted the Manager of the Year by the Baseball Writers Association of America four times (1985 with Toronto and 1991, 2004 and 2005

with Atlanta). The Sporting News, in a poll of his peers, honored Cox as the league’s top skipper seven times with the Braves and eight times overall. No other manager has won the Sporting News award more than three times since the magazine started the balloting in 1936. In 1991 the Associated Press named him MLB Manager of the Year, as he became the first manager to earn that honor in both leagues, having also won it while with the Blue Jays in 1985. Cox brought the city of Atlanta its first major professional sports championship in 1995 when the Braves beat Cleveland, four games to two, in the World Series. Cox managed the Braves from 1978 to ‘81, compiling a 266-323 record and laying the groundwork for the club’s NL West title in 1982. He began a four-year tenure as Toronto’s manager in 1982, lifting a habitual last-place team to within one game of attaining a World Series berth in 1985. Cox returned to the Braves as general manager in October 1985 and oversaw a farm system which set the foundation for great success. He added the field managing responsibilities on June 22, 1990, then devoted all his time to those duties when the Braves named John Schuerholz as General Manager in October of that year. When Braves owner Ted Turner fired Cox in 1981, Turner was asked at the press conference who was likely to be the next manager. “It would be Bobby Cox if I hadn’t just fired him,” Turner said. “We need someone like him around here.” The Braves retired Cox’s uniform number 6 and inducted him into the Braves Hall of Fame in August 2011. He was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in July 2014, along with two of his former pitchers, Greg Maddux and Tom Glavine.

Tom Glavine won 305 regular-season games in his 22-year Major League career. But it was his eight innings of one-hit, shutout baseball in Game 6 of the 1995 World Series that accounted for his most significant victory. The Braves won 1-0 to capture the first championship in Atlanta history, and Glavine earned the series Most Valuable Player. The left-hander arrived in Atlanta in 1987 and he won 20 or more games each year from 1991 to 1993. He won two Cy Young awards, first in 1991 and then in 1998. From 1993 to 1999, the Braves featured arguably the game's top starting rotation – led by Glavine, Greg Maddux and John Smoltz. Over that seven-year stretch, Atlanta won six NL West Division titles and the League Championship Series in 1995, 1996 and 1999 in addition to the 1995 World Series. Glavine also pitched in two other Fall Classics – in 1991 and 1992. Following the 2002 season, Glavine signed as a free agent with the New York Mets.

He won his 300th game on August 5, 2007, an 8-3 verdict over the Chicago Cubs, becoming the 23rd pitcher and just the sixth left-hander to reach that plateau. Glavine returned to Atlanta in 2008 before retiring after the 2009 season. On the Braves' career lists, Glavine ranks fourth in wins (244) and strikeouts (2,091). He had five 20-win seasons, leading the NL or tying for the lead each time. Glavine's lifetime ledger was 305-203 with a 3.54 ERA, and his 682 games started ranked 12th on baseball's all-time list when he retired. Possessing excellent control, the 10-time All-Star was a master at mixing up the speed of his pitches and locating them on – or just off – the corners of the strike zone. He also won four Silver Slugger Awards. Glavine was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in July 2014, after earning 91.9 percent of the vote in his first year on the ballot.



Chipper Jones went from a first overall draft pick to a first-ballot Hall of Famer. In between, he spent his entire 18-year major league career in a Braves uniform, playing in more games than anyone in Atlanta history (2,499). He is the Atlanta career leader in virtually every offensive category, including hits (2,726), doubles (549), home runs (468), RBI (1,623), runs (1,619), total bases (4,755), extra-base hits (1,055), walks (franchise-record 1,512), on-base percentage (franchise-record .401) and at-bats (8,984). His .303 batting average and .529 slugging percentage rank second and his 38 triples tied for second. On the franchise career lists, Jones is second to Hank Aaron in games, at-bats, runs, hits, doubles, RBI, total bases and extra-base hits; third in home runs and slugging percentage; and tied for fifth in batting average. Jones is the lone switch-hitter in Major League Baseball history with a lifetime .300 batting average and 300-plus home runs. Only Frankie Frisch posted a higher average (.316), only Eddie Murray collected more RBI (1,917) and only

Mickey Mantle (536) and Murray (504) slugged more homers. The Braves selected Jones in the 1990 amateur draft, and five years later he was runner-up for National League Rookie of the Year honors (to Los Angeles pitcher Hideo Nomo). Jones evolved into a premier third baseman and was an eight-time All-Star, including four starts. He was named the 1999 NL Most Valuable Player after batting .319 with 41 doubles, 45 homers, 110 RBI, 116 runs and 126 walks. Five other times he finished in the top 10 in MVP balloting. On July 5, 2007, Jones passed Dale Murphy for the most home runs in Atlanta annals. In 2008, Jones led the league with a .364 batting average (third-best in franchise history). He owns four of the top 10 season on-base percentages in franchise history, including an Atlanta-record .470 mark in 2008. In his first year of eligibility for the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 2018, Jones received 97.2 percent of the vote. He was inducted into the Braves Hall of Fame in 2013 and the Georgia Sports Hall of Fame in 2015..

Greg Maddux became the most dominant pitcher in baseball during his 11 seasons with the Braves from 1993 to 2003. On the heels of winning his first Cy Young Award in 1992 with the Chicago Cubs, Maddux signed with the Braves as a free agent and proceeded to win three consecutive Cy Young awards. With Atlanta, Maddux led the NL in ERA four times (1993, 1994, 1995 and 1998) and wins twice (1994 and 1995). His franchise-record 1.56 ERA during the 1994 season was the second-lowest in the major leagues since Bob Gibson's 1.12 mark in 1968. In 1995, Maddux went 19-2 with a 1.63 ERA while leading the league with 209.2 innings pitched, 10 complete games and three shutouts and helping the Braves win the World Series. On the Braves' career lists, Maddux ranks second in ERA (2.63), fifth in strikeouts (1,828), sixth in wins (194) and 10th in shutouts (21). The right-hander known as "Mad Dog" featured pinpoint control and uncanny late movement on his fastball. After leaving Atlanta, Maddux

had a second stint with the Cubs and before playing for the Los Angeles Dodgers and San Diego Padres. He won 15 or more games for 17 consecutive seasons (1988-2004) – the only pitcher in major league history to do so. Upon his retirement, Maddux ranked eighth all-time with 355 wins and 10th with 3,371 strikeouts. He won a record 18 Gold Gloves, including 10 with the Braves. He was an eight-time All-Star and the NL starting pitcher in 1994, 1997 and 1998. Maddux was inducted into the Braves Hall of Fame in 2009. At the induction ceremony, manager Bobby Cox remarked: "I get asked all the time was he the best pitcher I ever saw? Was he the smartest pitcher I ever saw? The most competitive I ever saw? The best teammate I ever saw? The answer is yes to all of those." Maddux was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 2014, earning 97.2 percent of the vote (the 10th-highest total ever) in his first year on the ballot.

Eddie Mathews is the only player in franchise history to play for the Braves in Boston (1952), Milwaukee (1953-65) and Atlanta (1966). The nine-time N.L. All-Star third baseman ranks second in club annals with 493 home runs; and third with 2,223 games, 8,049 at-bats, 1,452 runs, 2,201 hits, 338 doubles, 1,388 RBI and 4,158 total bases. Mathews finished third in Rookie of the Year balloting in 1952, and the following year was runner-up for Most Valuable Player after leading the NL with 47 home runs (tied for the second-most in Braves' history) to go with a .302 batting average and a franchise-record 135 RBI. Mathews also was the MVP runner-up in 1959, when

he batted .306 with a league-best 46 homers and 114 RBI. He played for the 1957 World Series champions (his 10th-inning two-run homer won Game 4) and the 1958 NL pennant winners. Following the 1966 season, Mathews was traded to the Houston Astros, and he became the seventh player in baseball history to hit 500 career home runs July 14, 1967. He subsequently played for the Detroit Tigers in 1967 and 1968. Mathews returned to the Braves as a coach in 1971 and served as manager from 1972 to 1974, compiling a 149-161-1 record. Mathews was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 1978 and into the Braves Hall of Fame in 1999.

The Braves drafted Dale Murphy No. 5 overall in 1974, but five years later he had yet to reach his potential as a sometime catcher/sometime first baseman. Then, manager Bobby Cox made Murphy a full-time outfielder and from 1980 to 1989, Murphy averaged 31 home runs and 93 RBI. He was the back-to-back NL Most Valuable Player in 1982 (.281, 36 home runs, 109 RBI and 23 stolen bases) and 1983 (.302, 36 home runs, 121 RBI, franchise-record 131 runs scored and 30 stolen bases). In 1983, Murphy became the sixth different player in baseball history with 30 home runs and 30 stolen bases in a season. He led the NL with 332 total bases and tied for the lead with 36 home runs in 1984 and topped the circuit with 37 home runs and 118 runs scored the

following year. From September 26, 1981, to July 8, 1986, Murphy played in 740 consecutive games. He appeared in seven All-Star Games – leading all vote-getters in 1985 – and won five Gold Glove Awards and four Silver Slugger Awards. Throughout his career, Murphy displayed a high moral character, receiving the Lou Gehrig Award in 1985 and the Roberto Clemente Award in 1988. On the Braves' career lists, he is fourth in games played (1,926), runs (1,103), hits (1,901), home runs (371), RBI (1,143) and total bases (3,394), and he is second in each category to Chipper Jones since the franchise moved to Atlanta. "Murph" was inducted into the Braves Hall of Fame in 2000.

Phil Niekro baffled opposing batters with his knuckleball for nearly a quarter of a century. He owns or shares 13 Atlanta career pitching records and is the franchise career leader with 740 games pitched, while ranking second in games started (595), innings pitched (4,622.2), shutouts (43) and strikeouts (2,912); third in wins (268); fifth in complete games (226); and 10th in ERA (3.20). Niekro was a three-time 20-game winner (23 in 1969, 20 in 1974 and 21 in 1979) and won 10 or more games for 14 straight seasons from 1967 until the strike-shortened 1981 campaign. Niekro authored a no-hitter against San Diego on Aug. 5, 1973,

winning 9-0 at Atlanta Stadium. Niekro pitched for the New York Yankees (1984-85), Cleveland Indians (1986-87) and Toronto Blue Jays (1987) before returning to the Braves late in 1987 at the age of 48. On Oct. 6, 1985, Niekro shut out Toronto 8-0 for his 300th career win. Niekro ranks fourth in baseball history with 5,404.1 innings pitched, 11th with 3,342 strikeouts and 16th with 318 wins. Over the course of his 24-year career, he was a five-time All-Star – four times with Atlanta – and won five Gold Glove Awards. “Knucksie” was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 1997 and into the Braves Hall of Fame in 1999.

When Braves General Manager Bobby Cox acquired 20-year-old John Smoltz from Detroit in 1987 for 36-year-old Doyle Alexander, he did so with an eye on the future. Smoltz delivered, excelling as both a starter and reliever over the next two decades. He is the only pitcher in MLB history with 200 wins and 150 saves. In 14 full seasons starting, he won 14 or more games 10 times. Twice, he led the NL or shared the lead in wins (1996 and 2006), innings pitched (1996 and 1997) and strikeouts (1992 and 1996). He ranked in the top 10 in ERA eight times. Smoltz won the Cy Young Award in 1996 while fanning a franchise-record 276. Following "Tommy John" surgery that sidelined him for all of 2000, Smoltz closed for three-plus seasons. He set an NL record with 55 saves in 2002 and finished third for the Cy Young Award. Smoltz became the

16th member of the 3,000-strikeout club on April 22, 2008. On the Braves' career lists, he ranks first in strikeouts (3,011), second in saves (154) and fifth in wins (210). In 40 postseason games with Atlanta, Smoltz was 15-4 with four saves a 2.65 ERA. Smoltz, Tom Glavine and Greg Maddux anchored a pitching staff that helped the Braves win 14 straight division titles from 1991 to 2005 and the 1995 World Series. Smoltz was the only player to be a part of each division championship. Smoltz was an eight-time All-Star who concluded his career with Boston and St. Louis in 2009. He won with the Roberto Clemente Award in 2005 and with the Branch Rickey Award in 2007. He was inducted into the Braves Hall of Fame in June 2012 and was a first-ballot National Baseball Hall of Famer in 2015, joining Glavine and Maddux in Cooperstown.

With 363 wins, Warren Spahn is the winningest left-handed pitcher in baseball history. Spahn spent the first 20 of his 21 major league seasons with the Boston and Milwaukee Braves. He holds franchise records for games started (635), innings pitched (5,046), wins (356) and shutouts (63). On baseball's all-time lists, he is sixth in shutouts and eighth in innings pitched. Famous for his fluid, high-kicking delivery, Spahn won 20 or more games 13 times, a National League record, leading the league on eight occasions. Spahn holds major league records for most seasons topping the league in wins and complete games along with most consecutive seasons leading in wins (5, 1957-61) and

complete games (7, 1957-63). Spahn won the 1957 Cy Young Award and was runner-up in 1958, 1960 and 1961. His 14 All-Star Game selections are the most all-time among pitchers. Spahn spun two no-hitters, defeating Philadelphia 4-0 on Sept. 16, 1960, and the San Francisco Giants 1-0 on April 28, 1961, both at County Stadium in Milwaukee. Spahn debuted with the Braves in 1942 and then served with distinction in the Army for three-plus years, being awarded a Purple Heart. "Spahnkie," who concluded his career with the New York Mets and Giants in 1965, was inducted into the National Baseball Hall of Fame in 1973 and into the Braves Hall of Fame in 1999.

ATLANTA-FULTON COUNTY STADIUM (1966-96)

Atlanta-Fulton County Stadium was home to the Braves from the 1966 season through the 1996 season. The club broke ground on April 15, 1964, and the first game was played on April 9, 1965, when Milwaukee defeated Detroit, 6-3, in an exhibition game before the 1965 regular season. The first regular-season game was played April 12, 1966, vs. Pittsburgh, and the final regular-season contest was played September 23, 1996, vs. Montreal. The final game took place on October 24, 1996, when New York defeated Atlanta, 1-0, in Game 5 of the World Series. The approximate cost of the stadium was \$18 million. The park was completed in 20 months, eight for design and 12 for construction. The architects were two Atlanta firms: Heery and Heery and Finch, Alexander, Barnes, Rothschild and Paschal. The general contractor was the Thompson and Street Company of Charlotte, NC, and Atlanta. The stadium dimensions were 330' down each line, 402' in centerfield and 385' to the power alleys. The stadium wall was 10' and the ballpark had a capacity of 52,769 for baseball. The stadium was also used by the NFL's Atlanta Falcons until the club moved into the Georgia Dome in 1992 and was used as the baseball venue for the 1996 Olympic Games.

TURNER FIELD (1997-2016)

Originally built to serve as the heart of the 1996 Summer Olympics, Turner Field became the home of the Braves in 1997. The team played there through the 2016 season, going 951-667 (.588) in the regular season at the park, while winning 10 NL East titles. The park sits between Ralph David Abernathy Boulevard to the north, Hank Aaron Drive to the east, Bill Lucas Drive to the south and Pollard Boulevard to the west. The \$209-million stadium began construction in 1993 and opened three years later as Centennial Olympic Stadium. The 85,000-seat structure served as the centerpiece of the 1996 Summer Olympics, housing the opening and closing ceremonies, along with track and field events. After the completion of the Paralympic Games in August, the stadium was retrofitted into a baseball only, open-air, natural grass facility over the course of seven months from September until April of 1997. Much of the north end of the stadium was taken out to install the outfield walls, while Entry Plaza, the main entrance to Turner Field, was built after 35,000 seats and part of the track-and-field complex were removed. The Braves played their first game at Turner Field on April 4, 1997, beating the Chicago Cubs, 5-4. The club drew 3,464,488 fans in their first season, the second-highest single-season total in franchise history. Over their 20 seasons at the ballpark, the Braves welcomed 52,439,513 regular season fans to Turner Field, while surpassing two million fans in every year. The Braves beat the Detroit Tigers, 1-0, in Turner Field's final game on October 2, 2016. The club moved their offices out of the ballpark in December of that year, with Georgia State University taking control after purchasing the stadium for \$22.8 million.

MEDIA INFORMATION

QUESTIONS: Please submit all questions regarding credentials, media parking and general media information to Mitch George, mitch.george@braves.com.

MEDIA CREDENTIALS: In accordance with Major League Baseball policy, only requests submitted through <https://credentials.mlb.com> will be considered, and credentials will be issued only to legitimate news-gathering agencies that have applied via the credential website. Requests made in-person, via email, or by phone call will not be considered.

CREDENTIAL SCANNING: In accordance with Major League Baseball policy, credentials are required to be scanned upon entrance to ballpark, entering the clubhouses and accessing the field. All credentials are equipped with barcodes, and security personnel will scan credentials at each location.

MEDIA PARKING: Parking for the media is yet to be determined for the 2022 season. Please email mitch.george@braves.com with requests for parking.

MEDIA ENTRANCE AND CREDENTIAL PICK-UP: Credentials may be picked up and media may enter the park at the 3rd Base Gate of Truist Park, located near the corner of Circle 75 Parkway and Windy Ridge Parkway. Both the media entrance and credential pick-up opens four hours prior to first pitch. To obtain admittance to the ballpark, members of the media must show one of the following: a Major League Baseball Working Pass, BBWAA card or an Atlanta Braves season/daily credential.

PRESS BOX: The Truist Park press box is located on the Upper Level. Live shots and still photographs are prohibited from the press box.

CLUBHOUSES: Per MLB policy, both clubhouses open 3-1/2 hours prior to game time. Each clubhouse closes to the media when that team takes to the field for batting practice. Following the game, the clubhouses re-open to the media within 10 minutes after the last out. Proper credentials must be displayed to access either clubhouse. The clubhouses are limited to credentialed working media only. Still photographers are not permitted in the clubhouse without special permission.

FIELD: Enter the field via the field access tunnel located just beyond the visiting clubhouse. The field and dugout areas must be cleared one hour prior to first pitch. Pregame broadcast interviews and live shots must be done on the warning track or in the dugout. Postgame live shots can be done from the warning track after the teams have left the field.

PHOTO AREAS: A limited number of still photographer concourse level positions are available, subject to team discretion.

BROADCAST BOOTHS: Booths are located in the press box. There are seven total broadcast booths, and booth assignments are posted digitally outside of each. To obtain use of a reserved booth, please contact Beth Marshall, beth.marshall@braves.com, in the communications department.

MEDIA DRESS CODE: In accordance with Major League Baseball policy, media covering games and MLB events are asked to dress in an appropriate and professional manner that respects their colleagues, the teams and the players they are covering. Clubhouses, dugouts, press boxes, interview rooms and the playing field are working areas, and members of the media are expected to adhere to a business casual dress code. In that regard, media members are requested to follow these guidelines:

- Flip-flops are not permitted in clubhouses
- Jeans should be clean, neat and presentable (e.g., ripped jeans should be avoided)
- T-shirts bearing offensive, disrespectful or inappropriate messages are not permitted
- Clothing and hats bearing a professional sports team's logo should not be worn in press area
- Clothing and hats bearing a college/university team's logo should not be worn in press area
- Clothing should be appropriate for a business casual work environment. The following are some non-exclusive examples of apparel that should be avoided:
 - Sheer or see-through clothing
 - Excessively short skirts, dresses or shorts
 - Tank tops, muscle shirts, one-shouldered or strapless shirts
 - Clothing exposing bare midriffs or visible undergarments

We ask all members of the media to respect these guidelines. MLB will consider appropriate actions in those cases in which the guidelines are violated.

RADIO: The Atlanta Braves, WCNN 680 the Fan, All News 106.7, the Atlanta Braves flagship rightsholders, will carry all 162 regular season games and all Spring Training games. The Braves Radio Network includes over 150 affiliates across the Southeast, one of the largest radio affiliates in all major league sports.

TELEVISION: The Atlanta Braves, Bally Sports South, and Bally Sports Southeast will team up in 2022 to bring Braves fans the best and most comprehensive sports television broadcasting in Major League Baseball. Bally Sports South and Bally Sports Southeast, the largest regional sports network, reach seven Southeastern states and have broadcast Braves regular-season and Spring Training games the past 25 seasons.

CHIP CARAY **Bally Sports South & Bally Sports Southeast**



- Caray is in his 13th season as the play-by-play announcer for Braves games on Bally Sports South and Bally Sports Southeast.
- He previously spent five seasons (2005-09) as the play-by-play voice of TBS's Major League Baseball coverage and Braves' broadcasts on Peachtree TV.
- He served as the play-by-play announcer for seven seasons (1998-2004) for Chicago Cubs games on WGN, winning the 2004 Illinois Sportscaster of the Year award
- Caray spent one season as the radio play-by-play announcer for Minnesota's Orlando (AA) affiliate in 1990, two years (1991-92) broadcasting the Atlanta Braves and three campaigns (1993-95) with the Seattle Mariners.
- He worked five years (1996-2000) as a member of the Fox Network's Saturday baseball coverage, including three years as a studio host.
- He is the third generation of Carays to serve as a play-by-play announcer, after his father Skip and grandfather Harry, who was the play-by-play voice of the Cubs from 1982 to 1997...A member of the Hall of Fame, Harry spent 53 seasons as a major league broadcaster... On May 13, 1991, the three generations of Carays worked together on a Chicago Cubs/Atlanta Braves game.
- Chip's broadcast career also includes nine seasons as the television play-by-play voice of the NBA's Orlando Magic and stints calling both University of Florida and Florida State University football and basketball games for the Sunshine Network.
- Caray graduated from the U. of Georgia in 1987, beginning his career with weekend TV sports anchor stints in Panama City, Fla., and Greensboro, NC.
- Chip and his wife Susan have four children: Summerlyn, Christopher, Stefan and Tristan.

JEFF FRANCOEUR **Bally Sports South & Bally Sports Southeast**



- The 2022 season marks Francoeur's fifth season in the broadcast booth and his fourth as lead analyst. He served as a guest analyst for select Braves games in both the radio and television booths during the 2018 season.
- Francoeur retired in 2017 following a 12-year major league career, during which he appeared with Atlanta (2005-09; '16), New York-NL (2009-'10), Texas (2010), Kansas City (2011-'13), San Francisco (2013), San Diego (2014), Philadelphia (2015) and Miami (2016)...He was a career .261 (1,373-for-5,260) hitter over 1,480 games.

- He won a Rawlings Gold Glove award in the N.L. in 2007, and lead the league in outfield assists in three different seasons (2007, '10, '12).
- A native of Atlanta, Francoeur and his wife, Catie have four children - Emma Cate, Brayden, Eleanor and Camden - and reside in Suwanee.

BEN INGRAM **Braves Radio Network**

- 2022 is Ingram's 12th season with the Braves Radio Network...This is his fourth season with a regular role in the radio booth calling play-by-play alongside Jim Powell and Joe Simpson.
- Ingram hosted the Braves pregame show from 2012-2020, and hosted the postgame show from 2011-2019...He has also been the host of the Braves' Clubhouse Report, heard on the flagship station of the Braves, 680 The Fan.
- Prior to joining the Braves Radio Network, Ingram spent six seasons broadcasting minor league baseball with the Jackson Senators, Eugene Emeralds and Mississippi Braves.

- Ingram, a native of Madison, MS, graduated from Mississippi College in Clinton, MS and was named a 2014 Distinguished Alumnus of the year by the Department of Communication.
- Ben also calls college football in the offseason, including the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl.
- He resides in Buckhead.



JOE SIMPSON **Braves Radio Network**

- Simpson is in his 31st season as a Braves broadcaster...He was inducted into the Atlanta Braves Hall of Fame on January 27, 2018.
- The 2022 season will see Simpson continue his role as an analyst on radio broadcasts this season, and he also spent 15 campaigns calling games on Bally Sports South and Bally Sports Southeast.
- He played professionally for 11 seasons, beginning in 1973 when he was drafted by the Los Angeles Dodgers in the third round.
- Simpson joined the Seattle Mariners in 1979 before being traded to the Kansas City Royals in 1983... An outfielder and first baseman throughout his professional career, he retired from the California Angels organization following the 1984 season.

- He had his best season in 1979, when he hit .283 in 120 games for the Mariners.
- Simpson worked as an analyst on Seattle Mariners telecasts for five years before joining Turner Sports in 1992.
- Named "Georgia Sports Broadcaster of the Year" in 1995.
- A native of Norman, Okla., he was an All-American outfielder and first baseman at the University of Oklahoma.
- Joe and his wife Kathy live in Marietta, Ga... They have two children, Meg and Gabe, and one grandson.



JIM POWELL Braves Radio Network



- The 2022 Major League Baseball season marks Powell's 29th as a Major League broadcaster and his 14th year in the Atlanta Braves radio booth.
- He spent the previous 13 seasons as a member of the Milwaukee Brewers broadcast team, teaming up with Hall-of-Famer Bob Uecker longer than any other broadcaster in Uecker's illustrious career.
- In January of 2020, Powell was inducted into the Georgia Association of Broadcasters Hall of Fame, joining former Braves' broadcasters Ernie Johnson, Pete Van Wieren, and Skip Caray in achieving that honor.
- Powell joined the Brewers and WTMJ Radio in 1996 and was named the 1998 NSMA (National Sports Media Association) Wisconsin Sportscaster of the Year...In addition to his radio duties, he spent time as a member of the Brewers television team during the 1999 and 2000 seasons.
- He began his Major League broadcasting career with the Minnesota Twins and WCCO Radio in a reserve role in 1993 and 1994...Prior to this, he accumulated extensive experience at the minor-league level, serving as play-by-play announcer for the Charlotte Knights (1990-91, 1995) and the Columbia Mets (1987-89, 1993-94).
- Powell started his broadcasting career with an internship in the newsroom and sports office at WGST-AM while he was in high school..He then worked at WRFC and WUOG in Athens while attending the University of Georgia, followed by positions in Columbia, South Carolina, with WOLO-TV and then WVOC radio.
- While in Columbia he worked extensively for the University of South Carolina Gamecocks and was an integral contributor to football, basketball, and baseball broadcasts..Powell was named the NSMA South Carolina Sportscaster of the Year in 1990, 1991, and 1995.
- In 1991, Powell was hired by WSB-AM to work weekends, where he covered the Braves, Georgia Bulldogs, and Atlanta Falcons for two years...He also worked for CBS Radio, including calling the Sun Bowl, and called numerous college football games on television for Host Communications.
- He and his wife Emmy, who have been married for 33 years, are active members of their community, supporting numerous charities such as the Rally Foundation, the Child Abuse Prevention (CAP) Fund, Jungle Kids for Christ, the Dunamis Foundation, Camp Kudzu, UGA Miracle, Make a Miracle, and local youth athletic programs. He spends his winters coaching youth basketball and is also an avid tennis player.
- A native of Roswell, Ga., Powell attended the University of Georgia as a National Merit Scholar. He and Emmy have three daughters, Allie, Sabrina, and Julia.

RULES OF INTEREST

PLAYER LIMITS: Forty until Opening Day, when the number of players must be reduced to 26 until Sept. 1, when it becomes 28.

DETERMINING BATTING AVERAGE: Divide the number of at-bats into the number of hits.

DETERMINING EARNED RUN AVERAGE: Multiply the number of earned runs by nine, divide the total by the number of innings pitched.

DETERMINING ON-BASE PERCENTAGE: Add the total of hits, walks and hit by pitches and divide by the total of at-bats, walks, hit by pitches and sacrifice flies.

DETERMINING SLUGGING PERCENTAGE: Divide the total bases of all hits by the total times at-bat (at-bats do not include walks, sacrifices, hit by pitches, or times awarded first base because of interference or obstruction).

DETERMINING FIELDING AVERAGE: Divide the total putouts and assists by the total of putouts, assists and errors.

DETERMINING WINNING PERCENTAGE: Divide the number of games won by the total games won and lost.

DETERMINING THE MAGIC NUMBER: Determine the number of games yet to be played, add one, then subtract the number of games ahead in the loss column of the standings of the closest opponent.

CONSECUTIVE GAME HITTING STREAKS: A consecutive-game hitting streak shall not be terminated if all the player's plate appearances (one or more) result in a base on balls, hit batsman, defensive interference or a sacrifice bunt. The streak shall terminate if the player has a sacrifice fly and no hit.

CONSECUTIVE GAME PLAYING STREAK: A consecutive-game playing streak shall be extended if the player plays one half-inning on defense, or if he completes a time at bat by reaching base or being put out.

QUALIFYING MARKS: To qualify for the batting championship, a player must have a minimum of 502 plate appearances. To qualify for Earned Run Average leadership, a pitcher must have at least 162 IP.

DOCTORED BAT: If a filled or "doctored" bat is used, the player is to be ejected from the game and suspended three days. Any balls hit by an illegal bat do not count. If the umpire sees the illegal bat before it is used, he issues a warning, but there is no penalty.

RELIEF PITCHERS' SAVE RULE: A pitcher is credited with a save when he meets all three of the following conditions; 1) He's the finishing pitcher in a game won by his club, and 2) he's not the winning pitcher, and 3) he qualifies under one of the following conditions: a) he enters the game with a lead of no more than three runs and pitches for at least one inning, or b) he enters the game with the potential tying run either on base, at bat or on deck, or c) he pitches effectively for at least three innings.

MAJOR LEAGUE SERVICE: A full year of service in the Major Leagues is 172 days.

ROOKIE RULE: Not more than 130 at-bats or 50 innings pitched in the Major Leagues during a previous season or seasons, nor more than 45 days on a Major League roster during the 25-player limit (excluding time in military service or on the disabled list.)

DAY / NIGHT GAME: Any game scheduled to start after 5:00 p.m. will be considered a night game. If a game is scheduled to start at or before 5:00 p.m. and is delayed by rain or for any other reason it shall still be considered a day game. However, both games of a two-night doubleheader shall be considered night games. When afternoon and night games are played on the same day and separate admissions are charged, they will be counted as one day game and one night game and will not be considered as a doubleheader.

INJURED LISTS

10-DAY INJURED LIST: Minimum period of inactivity is 10 days. There is no limit on the number of players that may be placed on this list.

7-DAY INJURED LIST: Introduced in the 2011 season, the 7-day disabled list was created specifically for players with concussion symptoms. A 7-day IL stint cannot be backdated by more than five days.

60-DAY INJURED LIST: The minimum period of inactivity is sixty (60) days. Players on or transferred to this list after August 1 shall remain there for the balance of the regular season and post-season. This list may be used only when a club is at the maximum limit of forty (40) players.

REGULATION GAME

REGULATION GAME: A regulation game consists of nine innings unless extended because of a tie score or shortened because 1) the home team needs none of its half of the ninth or only part of it; or 2) because the umpire-in-chief calls the game after five completed innings. A regulation game may be less than five innings if the home team is ahead after the top of the fifth, or takes the lead or ties the score while at bat in the fifth.

TIE GAME: A regulation game that is called by the umpire-in-chief when both teams have the same number of runs is a tie game. Individual player performances are official and are entered in the records, but the game does not count in the league standings and may be re-scheduled at a later date.

SUSPENDED GAME: A game becomes a suspended game if it is terminated for any of the following reasons: 1) a curfew imposed by law; 2) a time limit permissible under league rules; 3) light failure or malfunction of a mechanical field device under control of the home club (including automatic tarpaulin or water removal equipment); 4) darkness because of any law, the lights may not be turned on. No game called because of a curfew or a time limit shall be a suspended game unless it has progressed far enough to have been a regulation game (see above). A game called under provision 3 or 4 shall be a suspended game at any time after it starts. Since 1980, if weather forces the termination of a legal game while an inning is in process, it will become a suspended game if either of the following two conditions exists: 1) the visiting team has scored one or more runs to tie the game and the home team has not scored, or 2) the visiting team has scored one or more runs to take the lead and the home team has not tied the score or taken the lead. If a legal game is tied when called because of weather and neither situation listed above prevails, it is a tie game and must be replayed in its entirety. Suspended games shall be resumed at the exact point of suspension of the original game. A game called at the END of a completed inning AFTER NINE INNINGS for any reason shall be a SUSPENDED game. This rule became effective in 1969.
