Harold Z. (Hal) Steinbrenner

Managing General Partner / Chairperson

Hal Steinbrenner begins his 32nd season with the New York Yankees organization in 2022 and his 14th as Managing General Partner. On November 20, 2008, Major League Baseball formalized Mr. Steinbrenner's role as the New York Yankees' Managing General Partner.

Under Mr. Steinbrenner's leadership, the Yankees have retained and enhanced their global popularity while continuing to field championship-caliber teams. Since taking the position of Managing General Partner, the Yankees' .573 combined winning percentage (1,149-855) is the second-highest in all of baseball.

In 2019, the most recent season with full-stadium attendance, the Yankees drew more than 3 million fans at home for the 21st consecutive season, extending their all-time Major League record. They also led the American League in average home attendance for the 16th time in 17 seasons. The club's Twitter, Facebook and Instagram accounts each have the most followers among Major League Baseball teams, and its reach on TikTok has already grown to the fourth-largest in MLB after only two years on the platform. The Yankees have a global audience of more than 15 million fans over social media on a daily basis.

In recent years, Mr. Steinbrenner and the Yankees organization have focused on improving the experience for fans of all ages by providing more family-friendly and socially oriented spaces at the Yankees' spring training home — George M. Steinbrenner Field in Tampa — and at Yankee Stadium in the Bronx. Steinbrenner Field enhancements have included a complete modernization of the seating bowl and concession areas, and Yankee Stadium now features a dedicated children's zone as well as unique gathering areas for all ticketholders to enjoy.

The 53-year-old son of George Steinbrenner was elected General Partner by the New York Yankees Partnership in 1996, and he held that title for 13 seasons. In 2007, Mr. Steinbrenner was also named Chairman of Yankee Global Enterprises, LLC. In his first full year as Managing General Partner in 2009, the Yankees capped their historic inaugural season in Yankee Stadium with their 27th World Championship.

Mr. Steinbrenner's responsibilities include overseeing all areas of the club's business and baseball operations, and directing the financial aspects of the New York Yankees, Yankee Global Enterprises and their affiliates. He has also overseen the dynamic growth of Yankee Stadium as a marquee all-season entertainment venue. In 2021, Yankee Stadium was transformed into a COVID-19 vaccination center. During the 11-month operation, more than 104,000 shots were provided to members of the community.

In 2019, Mr. Steinbrenner was appointed by Commissioner Rob Manfred to Major League Baseball's Finance Committee, and in 2020, he joined the Labor Policy Committee. Mr. Steinbrenner previously served a four-year term on Major League Baseball's eight-owner Executive Council from 2015-19.

Mr. Steinbrenner also serves on the Board of Directors for Legends, a global premium experiences company delivering holistic solutions for legendary brands in the sports, music and entertainment industry. Legends offers a 360-degree data and analytics fueled service solution comprised of planning, sales, partnerships, hospitality, merchandise and technology solutions. Created with the Dallas Cowboys in 2008, Legends clients include a diverse group of iconic venues, including Yankee Stadium, AT&T Stadium, SoFi Stadium, Allegiant Stadium, Etihad Stadium, Angel Stadium of Anaheim, One World Observatory, Golden 1 Center and the University of Notre Dame, along with renowned properties like the NFL, MLB and the 2028 Los Angeles Olympics. In January 2021, a majority stake was sold to the private equity firm Sixth Street Partners.

Additionally, Mr. Steinbrenner is Chairman and CEO of Steinbrenner Hotel Properties. He also holds the distinction of being Chairman Emeritus for The Board of Directors of the Boys & Girls Club of Tampa Bay Foundation and is Board Member Emeritus for the Special Operations Warrior Foundation.

Mr. Steinbrenner attended Culver Military Academy and graduated from Williams College in 1991 with a Bachelor of Arts degree. He earned a Master's degree in Business Administration from the University of Florida in 1994.





Jennifer Steinbrenner Swindal

General Partner / Vice Chairperson

Jennifer Steinbrenner Swindal begins 2022 in her 14th full season in the role of General Partner / Vice Chairperson of the New York Yankees. She also serves as the President of the New York Yankees Foundation and Co-President of the New York Yankees Tampa Foundation, overseeing numerous local, regional and national outreach efforts.

Within the scope of her roles, which include the implementation and integration of a wide range of community programs relating to the New York Yankees, Ms. Steinbrenner supervises three Tampa-area Children's Holiday Concerts that have been sponsored by the Steinbrenner family for more than 30 years. Five-thousand children annually participate in the events, which provide musical education and exposure to the fine arts. She has also been instrumental in the development and growth of the Bronx Winter Wonderland event, which has seen thousands of local youth visit the Stadium each year for a holiday extravaganza complete with decorations, festive music and food, and a holiday gift for each child in attendance.

Ms. Steinbrenner also serves as Vice President and on the Board of Directors of the Gold Shield Foundation, which was established in 1981 by her father, George M. Steinbrenner III. The foundation, which currently covers seven counties in the Tampa Bay area, works to ensure that the families and dependent children of fallen police officers and firefighters receive early financial assistance and are guaranteed funds towards a college education.

Having previously served in the Yankees Public Affairs Department in 1984-85 and spending 23 years actively participating in the philanthropic community, Ms. Steinbrenner has a distinguished record of contributing to various community projects and initiatives, including her current commitment on the Board of Directors of St. Joseph's Children's Hospital Foundation.

Ms. Steinbrenner holds the honor of Ex-Officio Board Member of Mary Lee's House (a child protection and advocacy center in Tampa). She has also held prior board positions with the Boys & Girls Club of Tampa Bay, Children's Cancer Center of Tampa, Florida State Fair Authority (Executive Committee, Agricultural Committee, and Chairwoman of the Marketing Committee), H.B. Plant Museum at the University of Tampa, New York Pops, Harlem RBI, Florida Orchestra, Tampa Bay Salvation Army, Red Cross Angels of Tampa and Culver Academies. Additionally, Ms. Steinbrenner held the title of Senior Vice President of New Stadium Public Affairs in 2008.

A Morehead Scholar and 1981 graduate of the University of North Carolina with a Bachelor of Science degree in business administration, Ms. Steinbrenner previously served on the UNC Board of Visitors and Parents Council. Ms. Steinbrenner has two children, Haley Swindal Tantleff, and Stephen Swindal, who is the Yankees' Assistant Director of Player Development.

Ms. Steinbrenner was born in Cleveland, Ohio, and makes her home in Tampa, Fla.



Jessica Steinbrenner

General Partner / Vice Chairperson

Jessica Steinbrenner begins 2022 in her 14th full season as General Partner / Vice Chairperson for the New York Yankees. The younger daughter of George M. Steinbrenner previously served in the role of Senior Vice President for the team in 2008.

Ms. Steinbrenner is the owner of Bach Stables, LLC, a thoroughbred breeding and racing operation, and holds the position of Chief Executive Officer of the Steinbrenner-family-owned Bay Farms Corporation. She also served on the board of the Florida Thoroughbred Breeders' and Owners' Association. Ms. Steinbrenner is actively involved in the aftercare of retired thoroughbreds.

Ms. Steinbrenner served as an Executive Producer for the 2018 full length feature film *The Little Mermaid*, the live-action adaptation of Hans Christian Andersen's classic fairy tale, and the psychological thriller *Fear of Rain*, released in 2021. She has also authored two children's books: *My Sleepy Room* and *My Messy Room*.

Ms. Steinbrenner attended Culver Girls Academy and graduated from Sweet Briar College in Virginia. She has four children and four grandchildren, and currently resides in Tampa, Fla.



Randy Levine

President

Randy Levine begins his 23rd season as President of the New York Yankees in 2022. He was named to his position in January 2000, becoming the first person to hold the post with the club since 1986.

Under his supervision and guidance, the franchise constructed the state-of-the-art Yankee Stadium, completing the facility on time for the beginning of the 2009 season, which culminated in the franchise's 27th World Championship. In 2019, the most recent season with full attendance, the Yankees drew more than 3 million fans at Yankee Stadium and topped the American League in average home attendance for the 16th time in 17 seasons.

Mr. Levine was a principal founder of the YES Network, which is the most-watched regional sports network in the United States. He was also the lead negotiator in the sale of 80 percent of the network to 21st Century Fox and in 2019 led the negotiation to buy the YES Network from the Disney Company along with partners Amazon, Sinclair Broadcasting, Blackstone, Mubadala and Red Bird Capital. In 2020, Mr. Levine was named as Chairman of the YES Network. In 2008, Mr. Levine was instrumental in creating Legends Hospitality, LLC, with the Dallas Cowboys, which currently operates at the Yankees' and Cowboys' stadiums, as well as many other world-famous venues, including One World Observatory. Most recently in January 2021, he was a leader in the sale of Legends' majority stake to the private equity group Sixth Street Partners. In 2004, Mr. Levine helped organize Yankees-Steiner, a leading sports memorabilia company.

Mr. Levine has also spearheaded the Yankees' international brand expansion, including a transformational partnership in 2013 with Manchester City Football Club to acquire Major League Soccer's 20th expansion team. New York City Football Club (NYCFC) began play in 2015 at Yankee Stadium and has drawn more than 2 million fans in home attendance in their first seven seasons. NYCFC earned their first MLS Championship in 2021. In 2010, Mr. Levine led a Yankees delegation that visited Tokyo, Beijing and Hong Kong with the 2009 World Series Trophy, marking the first-ever time that the Yankees brought one of their World Series trophies to Asia. In addition, Mr. Levine helped develop the joint venture agreement in Japan between the Yankees and Yomiuri Shimbun, which is the parent company of the Yomiuri Giants.

In 2007 alone, the Yankees became the first Major League organization to sign players from the Israel Baseball League, embarked on their first-ever large-scale outreach into Taiwan by holding a clinic for high school players and coaches in Taipei, Taiwan, and established a first-of-its-kind working relationship with the Chinese Baseball Association. Mr. Levine is also the Yankees' principal liaison to Major League Baseball and contributes to player negotiations and contract issues. He is a member and contributor to the New York Yankees Diversity and Inclusion Committee.

Mr. Levine has been at the forefront of bringing a diverse array of entertainment and special events to Yankee Stadium, transforming the venue into a year-round destination for a variety of college football, soccer, hockey, music, boxing and corporate events. Highlights have included the January 2014 Coors Light NHL Stadium Series featuring the New York Rangers, New York Islanders and New Jersey Devils; international soccer matches showcasing the likes of Manchester City, Liverpool, Real Madrid, AC Milan, Paris Saint-Germain and Chelsea; concerts by Paul McCartney, Madonna, Garth Brooks, JAY Z, Justin Timberlake, Eminem and Romeo Santos; as well as renewing the tradition of college football at the home of the Yankees with over a dozen games featuring iconic institutions such as Notre Dame, Army, Boston College, Syracuse and Penn State.

The Yankees president has also been the driving force behind the creation, organization and implementation of the New Era PinStripe Bowl. The nationally broadcast contest — which has drawn 39,000 fans per game since its inception in 2010 — provides the schools, their alumni and traveling supporters the unparalleled and thoroughly unique opportunity to enjoy a full week of bowl festivities in New York City during Christmas week. In 2018, Mr. Levine organized a Yankees investment in prominent esports company Vision Esports.

Before joining the Yankees, Mr. Levine served as New York City's Deputy Mayor for Economic Development, Planning and Administration. He also served as New York City's Labor Commissioner.

From 1995 through 1997, Mr. Levine was Chief Negotiator for Major League Baseball. In 1996, he negotiated the labor agreement that for the first time included revenue sharing, luxury taxes and Interleague play. Prior to that, Mr. Levine served as Principal Associate Deputy Attorney General and Principal Deputy Attorney General at the United States Department of Justice. He has also served as a special delegate to the United States Department of Labor and was vice chair and a board member for Hudson River Park. Mr. Levine presently serves on the board of the Taylor Hooton Foundation, and in 2021 he was honored with the Taylor Hooton Foundation Legacy Award. Mr. Levine also serves on the board of Hofstra University, and has served on the Boards of the ASPCA, George Washington University and the Yogi Berra Museum.

Mr. Levine has served on the Board of Directors of the New Jersey Nets and New Jersey Devils and is a member of the Board of Directors of the YES Network, Legends Hospitality, LLC, and NYCFC. He is also an officer of Yankee Global Enterprises, LLC. Additionally, Mr. Levine has served or serves on the International, Labor Policy, Diversity and Legislative Committees of Major League Baseball.

Mr. Levine has been a partner in the New York law firm of Proskauer Rose Goetz & Mendelson, was Counsel at the law firm of Akin Gump Strauss Hauer & Feld, and is presently Counsel at the law firm of Jackson Lewis PC.

Born on February 22, 1955, in Brooklyn, N.Y., Mr. Levine received a Bachelor of Arts degree from George Washington University in 1977, and in 2011 was named as Chair of the school's athletic committee. His strategic plan led to the GW basketball team winning its first National Championship, the 2016 National Invitation Tournament. He now serves as vice chair of the Hofstra Athletic Committee. In 2018, *City & State* magazine named Mr. Levine one of its 50 over 50 leaders in New York, and in 2021 the publication included him in their Bronx Power 100 List, featuring leaders in politics, media, business and beyond. *Business Week* listed him as one of the top 100 influential persons in sports. Mr. Levine has also garnered five Emmy Awards for his work with YES Network programming. He received his J.D. from Hofstra University School of Law in 1980. Mr. Levine and his wife, Mindy, reside in Manhattan.

Lon A. Trost *Chief Operating Officer*

Lon A. Trost began working for the New York Yankees in September 1975 as the Yankees' outside counsel and transitioned to serving as the club's Executive Vice President and General Counsel from 1997-99. On January 10, 2000, Mr. Trost was named the New York Yankees Chief Operating Officer in addition to continuing as the club's General Counsel. The 2022 season is Mr. Trost's 47th year representing and/or working for the New York Yankees, a total that does not include Mr. Trost's initial employment with the Yankees as a grandstand vendor in the mid-1960s at the original Yankee Stadium.

Mr. Trost is responsible for the overall day-to-day functioning of the Yankees' operations. Under his direction, the Yankees have seen tremendous growth in brand recognition and sponsorship opportunities, while drawing more than 3 million fans at home for a Major League-record 21 consecutive seasons (1999-2019). During that stretch, the Yankees established single-season home attendance records nine times (1998-99; 2002-08). In addition, the Yankees topped the American League in average home attendance in 16 of 17 seasons from 2003-19.

Additionally, Mr. Trost, along with Hal Steinbrenner and Randy Levine, spearheaded the most complex undertaking in New York Yankees history — construction and development of Yankee Stadium, which is the largest privately funded building project in the history of the Bronx. While remaining true to the architectural grandeur of the 1923 original, the current facility is one of the most technologically advanced sports venues in the world. In the 2016-17 offseason, Mr. Trost facilitated a series of major structural enhancements designed to improve the experience for all fans at Yankee Stadium. The new upgrades included a first-ever children's play zone and seven new social gathering spaces.

Mr. Trost has played a significant role in Yankee Stadium becoming a year-round multi-purpose home to special events. Since 2010, Yankee Stadium has played host to an array of landmark activities that transcend baseball, including the 2014 Coors Light NHL Stadium Series featuring the New York Rangers, New York Islanders and New Jersey Devils; concerts by Paul McCartney, Madonna, Garth Brooks, JAY Z, Romeo Santos, Justin Timberlake and Eminem; a world championship boxing match between Miguel Cotto and Yuri Foreman; as well as renewing the tradition of college football at the home of the Yankees with games featuring iconic institutions such as Notre Dame and Army. In addition, Mr. Trost has been an integral figure in the development and growth of the New Era Pinstripe Bowl — held annually during Christmas week. The event has averaged 39,000 fans since its inception in 2010.

Mr. Trost was also responsible for reintroducing a long-dormant Yankees tradition of hosting marquee professional soccer at Yankee Stadium. Since 2012, some of the most high-profile soccer teams in the world — AC Milan, Chelsea, Liverpool, Manchester City, Paris Saint-Germain and Real Madrid — have played summertime matches in front of more than 200,000 fans. In 2013, the Yankees established a partnership with Manchester City Football Club and jointly acquired Major League Soccer's 20th expansion team. New York City Football Club (NYCFC) began play in 2015 at Yankee Stadium and has drawn over 2 million in home attendance through its first seven seasons. In 2021, NYCFC earned their first MLS Championship title.

Before joining the Yankees, Mr. Trost was a partner and member of the Executive Committee of the law firm of Shea and Gould from 1972 to 1994. He was also a partner at the New York law firm of Herrick, Feinstein from 1994 to 1997. While with these firms, he served as outside general counsel for numerous sports franchises, institutions and agents. Among his clients were the New York Yankees and Mets, the New Jersey Nets and Devils, the National Baseball Hall of Fame and Little League Baseball.

Mr. Trost was instrumental in the creation of the YES Network and is a member of its Board of Directors. In addition, he serves as an officer and on the Board of Directors for Yankee Global Enterprises and is on the Board of Directors for Legends Hospitality, both of which he participated in founding. While he maintains his responsibilities with the New York Yankees Partnership and the Yankees' other affiliates, he is also involved with the Tourette Syndrome Association.

Mr. Trost began his legal career in 1971 with the U.S. Justice Department, Office of Chief Counsel (Treasury Department). A 1968 graduate of Hunter College in the Bronx, Mr. Trost received his J.D. from Brooklyn Law School in 1971. He resides in Monroe Township, N.J., with his wife, Carol. They have two children, Evan and Audra, and six grandchildren, Ariella, Alexander, Aspen, Adley, Bryn and Brooklyn.



Brian Cashman

Senior Vice President, General Manager

Brian McGuire Cashman has literally grown up in the Yankees family. He joined the organization in 1986 as a 19-year-old intern in the Minor League and Scouting Department and now holds one of the most demanding jobs in sports as Yankees Senior Vice President and General Manager.

Over the course of his 36 seasons with the team, he has earned five World Series rings, including four as General Manager. Since the Dodgers' Buzzie Bavasi in the 1950s and 60s, Mr. Cashman is the only general manager to win four World Series titles in that role. Notably, he has won his titles with two different managers — Joe

Torre in 1998, 1999 and 2000, and Joe Girardi in 2009.

Mr. Cashman assumed his current post on February 3, 1998. At age 30, he became the second-youngest General Manager in Baseball history. In his first season, he became the youngest-ever GM to win a World Series, and with championships in 1999 and 2000, he became the only GM in Baseball history to win world titles in each of his first three seasons. A pennant in 2001 gave him four straight League Championships, placing him alongside Hall of Fame Yankees General Managers Ed Barrow (1936-39, four) and George Weiss (1949-53, five) as the only GMs in Baseball history to win four-or-more straight league titles at any point in their careers.

Among his peers, Mr. Cashman has achieved unparalleled success while carrying on the winning tradition of the Yankees. His lifetime winning percentage of .588 (2,223-1,559-2) is the highest of any General Manager with at least 10 seasons of experience whose career began in 1950 or later and marks the best team winning percentage in the Major Leagues during that same stretch.

Now in his 25th season, Mr. Cashman is the longest-tenured General Manager in baseball, and in 2022 he will become the longest-serving Yankees GM in franchise history (Ed Barrow led the team from October 28, 1920, through February 20, 1945).

In all, his clubs have earned 20 berths in the playoffs, including 13 Division titles, six AL pennants and four World Series titles. His feat of reaching the playoffs in each of his first 10 seasons (1998-2007) remains unmatched in Baseball history. In addition, the Yankees have won at least 84 games in all 23 162-game seasons of Mr. Cashman's tenure as General Manager, while the most any other team has reached that plateau over the stretch has been 19 times (Boston). Mr. Cashman has also overseen the growth of the Yankees' Player Development program that has consistently infused the Major League roster with young, elite talent in recent years. By producing the AL "Rookie of the Year" winner Aaron Judge in 2017, as well as runners-up Gary Sánchez in 2016 and Miguel Andújar in 2018, the Yankees were the first club to place a player in the top-two in "Rookie of the Year" voting in three consecutive seasons since the Seattle Mariners from 1999-2001.

There have been four women in Major League history to hold the position of Assistant General Manager, and Mr. Cashman has hired two of them: Jean Afterman, the Yankees' current Senior Vice President and Assistant General Manager; and Kim Ng, who worked for the Yankees from 1998-2001 and became the first female General Manager in MLB history with her appointment by the Miami Marlins during the 2020-21 offseason.

Various groups have honored the achievements of the Yankees and Mr. Cashman. With the club's most recent World Series title, the Yankees were named "2009 Male Team of the Year" by the United States Sports Academy and were nominated as "Team of the Year" in the Laureus World Sports Awards competition. In both 1998 and 2000, the Yankees earned ESPY Awards — presented by ESPN — as "Outstanding Team of the Year," and were named "Organization of the Year" by *Baseball America* in 1998 and by *USA Today* in 1999.

Mr. Cashman has been honored as "Executive of the Year" six times: by *Baseball America* in 2017; the Boston Chapter of the BBWAA in 2000, 2009 and 2017; and in 1999 and 2003 by the New Jersey Sportswriters' Association. In 2001, he received his third consecutive "40 Under 40" Award presented by *Street & Smith's Sports Business Journal* to recognize the top 40 people under the age of 40 who have made the greatest impact in the sports business industry. He has since been inducted into the publication's "40 Under 40" Hall of Fame.

In 2003, Mr. Cashman was honored by the Latino Sports Writers and Broadcasters Association with their annual "Latino Achievement Award" for his contributions to the Latino media.

Philanthropy and community involvement play equally important roles in Mr. Cashman's scope of work. For the past 12 years he has served on the Board of Directors of Covenant House International, which provides services for homeless youth. He was honored by the organization with their Beacon of Hope Award in 2011, having participated in the group's CEO Solidarity Sleepout event in each of the last 11 years. In 2019, Mr. Cashman and the Yankees hosted the event at Yankee Stadium, where Covenant House supporters raised money and drew attention to the cause by sleeping outside in the Stadium's Great Hall.

Mr. Cashman also serves on The Players Alliance MLB Club Executive Advisory Committee and the New York Yankees Diversity and Inclusion Committee.

In each of the last 12 offseasons, Mr. Cashman has rappelled down the 22-story Landmark Building in Stamford, Conn., as part of the Christmas-themed Heights and Lights Program, promoting activity in the city's downtown business district. In 2013, he joined the Board of Directors for TGEN (Translational Genomics Research Institute) Pancreatic Cancer. He also traveled to Vermont in November 2011 to join fellow GMs Theo Epstein and Neal Huntington at an event organized by ESPN's Buster Olney to support farm relief in the wake of Tropical Storm Irene.

For his efforts at work and in the community, Mr. Cashman was presented with the 2018 Joan Payson/Shannon Forde Community Service Award by the N.Y. Chapter of the BBWAA and the 2016 Jacob K. Javits Lifetime Achievement Award by the ALS Association Greater New York Chapter. He was also recognized by the Catholic Youth Organization of New York with the 2011 John V. Mara Sportsman of the Year Award and the 2005 Ossie Davis Award for Inspirational Leadership for promoting diversity in the workplace.

His career as a full-time Yankees employee began following his graduation from Catholic University in 1989, when Mr. Cashman became a full-time Assistant in Baseball Operations. He was later promoted and transferred to Tampa, Fla., where he served as Assistant Farm Director from 1990 to 1992. He returned to New York and became Assistant General Manager, Baseball Administration in November 1992.

Born on July 3, 1967, in Rockville Centre, N.Y., Mr. Cashman grew up in Lexington, Ky. He attended Georgetown Prep in Rockville, Md., and was inducted into the school's Athletic Hall of Fame in 2015. Mr. Cashman also attended Catholic University in Washington, D.C., where he majored in history. He played intercollegiate baseball for the Cardinals, breaking the then-team record for hits in a single season, and was recently named part of the 2020 induction class of Catholic University's Athletic Hall of Fame. His love for baseball developed when former Brooklyn Dodger Ralph Branca and his wife, Ann, arranged for him to serve as a batboy for the Los Angeles Dodgers in spring training in 1982.

Five times under Cashman, the Yankees have recorded the most wins in the Majors: 1998, 2002 (tied w/ OAK), 2003 (tied w/ ATL), 2006 (tied w/ NYM), 2009.

The Yankees' .588 winning pct. under Cashman marks the highest for any MLB team over the stretch (1998-present). Additionally, the club's 2,223 regular season wins over the span are 129 more than the second-best team (BOS-2,094).

Jean Afterman

Senior Vice President, Assistant General Manager

Jean Afterman enters her 21st season as the Yankees' Assistant General Manager and 11th as Senior Vice President in 2022. At the time of her appointment, she became only the third female to hold the position of Assistant General Manager in Major League Baseball history.

Ms. Afterman has been an integral part of the Yankees' efforts and operations in Asia. In her first year with the Yankees, she was instrumental in developing the club's relationship with the Yomiuri Giants of the Japan Central League and signing three-time MVP Hideki Matsui. In 2007, she joined team President Randy Levine and General Manager Brian Cashman on a week-long trip to Asia that concluded with a working agreement with the Chinese Baseball Association. She once again joined Levine and Cashman in 2010, when the Yankees brought the 2009 World Series trophy to Tokyo, Beijing and Hong Kong. While in Hong Kong, Ms. Afterman was given the honor of throwing out one of the ceremonial first pitches at the 2010 Phoenix Cup, an annual international women's baseball tournament.

Her contributions and leadership have been repeatedly recognized throughout her baseball career. Ms. Afterman was selected as one of the "50 Most Powerful Women in New York" by the *New York Post* in 2003 and 2007, and was named one of the 2004 "Power 100" by the *Sporting News*. In 2007, Ms. Afterman was profiled as one of *Crain's New York Business*' "100 Most Influential Women in New York Business," and in 2008, she was noted by *Forbes* as one of the top female executives in Baseball. In 2010, Ms. Afterman was named by WISE (Women in Sports and Events) as one of the "Women of the Year," and was tabbed by *New York Moves* magazine as a "Power Woman." In 2013, she was again profiled on the front page of her hometown newspaper, the *San Francisco Chronicle*.

In more recent years, Ms. Afterman was named one of *Street & Smith's Sports Business Journal's* 2017 "Game Changers," and her story was featured on the YES Network and ESPN.com. She was named one of *Crain's New York Business*' "2019 Most Notable Women in the Business of Sports," and was awarded *Baseball America's* "2019 Trailblazer of the Year Award," becoming the inaugural winner of the honor. In 2021, she was again honored when she was recognized by the *Sports Business Journal* as one of its class of 2021 members of "The Champions: Pioneers and Innovators in Sports Business." She was also saluted for her contributions to baseball during the 2021 offseason with a Baseball Service Award from the New York Pro Scouts Association.

Ms. Afterman is a frequent guest speaker on the topics of women in sports and the business of baseball, having participated in events sponsored by Major League Baseball, Columbia Business School, New York University, SABR, Beyond Sport, the Sports Lawyers Association and WISE, among others. In 2018 and 2019, Ms. Afterman was a member of the Steering Committee for the Integrity and Impact Award presented at the BT Sport Industry Awards in London.

Ms. Afterman joined the Yankees with a diverse business and legal background, focusing on international sports and licensing with an emphasis on U.S.-Japan matters. Prior to joining the Yankees, she managed her own practice, providing athletic representation and management with a specialization in arbitration proceedings. From 1994-99, Ms. Afterman was General Counsel at KDN Sports, Inc., and handled business and legal affairs for international baseball clients, including Hideo Nomo, Hideki Irabu, Masato Yoshii, Alfonso Soriano and more than 30 Major and Minor League players. In 1996, Ms. Afterman was appointed by the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture to a federal advisory committee, the National Organic Standards Board.

A graduate of the University of California at Berkeley in 1979, Ms. Afterman was the recipient of the Rosalynn Schneider Eisner Prize and the Mark Goodson Scholarship Grant. She received her J.D. from the University of San Francisco School of Law in 1991. In 2009, she was named "Alumni of the Year" by the Katherine Delmar Burke School in San Francisco.

For many years, Ms. Afterman maintained an active role in the Bronx community, working closely with P.S. 35, an elementary school within walking distance of Yankee Stadium. For more than a decade, she organized Yankees-sponsored Read-A-Thons and directed a mentoring program which matched Yankees employees with fourth and fifth grade students. Additionally, she has worked with high school-aged students through New York City's Explorers program, which engages young people through career-orientation programs. She received the 2009 "Exploring Leadership Award" for her work with the group.

In 2012 and 2013, she served on the Board of Trustees of the Women's Sports Foundation, and in 2015, she was appointed to serve on the advisory committee that oversees the Commissioner's Front Office and Field Staff Diversity Pipeline Program. In 2018 and 2019, Ms. Afterman served on the Board of Directors of DREAM (formerly Harlem RBI) and in 2020, she joined the Board of the Major League Baseball Players Alumni Association. Most recently, in 2021, Ms. Afterman joined the Board of Beyond Sport.





Michael Fishman

Vice President, Assistant General Manager

Michael Fishman begins his fifth season as a Vice President and eighth season as an Assistant General Manager, working with General Manager Brian Cashman in all areas related to baseball operations, including player acquisitions and evaluation, roster management, staffing and personnel decisions, player contract negotiations and salary arbitration. In addition, he oversees all aspects of the club's baseball research, statistical analysis, and baseball information systems.

The 2022 season marks his 18th year with the Yankees organization, having been hired by the club in July 2005 as a Baseball Operations Analyst. From November 2006 through the 2014 season, he was the club's first Director of Quantitative Analysis, responsible for all of the Yankees' proprietary baseball operations systems and assembling a staff devoted to quantitative research. In this role, he oversaw all statistical research projects, providing information, recommendations and advance scouting reports to the baseball operations department and coaching staff. He also oversaw the baseball operations internship program.

Prior to joining the Yankees, Mr. Fishman was an actuarial associate with AXA Equitable Life Insurance Company.

Born in New York City and raised in Fairfield, Conn., Mr. Fishman graduated summa cum laude and Phi Beta Kappa from Yale University in 2001 with a Bachelor of Arts in Mathematics.

Tim Naehring

Vice President, Baseball Operations

Tim Naehring begins his seventh season as Vice President of Baseball Operations with the Yankees, assisting General Manager Brian Cashman with player acquisitions, roster management and evaluation of all player personnel.

This season marks his 15th with the Yankees, having served as a professional scout from the fall of 2007 through the end of the 2015 season. After covering the minors and Majors in 2008, he was primarily responsible for covering the National League and crosschecking the American League from 2009-15.

Mr. Naehring began his front office career with the Cincinnati Reds during spring training in 1999, becoming a special assistant to general manager Jim Bowden. From October 2000 through 2005, he was the Reds' Director of Player Development, and he also held the role of Minor League Field Coordinator from October 2000 through 2003 and during the 2006 and 2007 seasons.

A native and current resident of Cincinnati, Mr. Naehring is a 1985 graduate of La Salle High School, where he was a three-sport athlete in baseball, soccer and basketball. He attended Miami (Ohio) University from 1985-88 and was named Mid-American Conference Player of the Year after his final season.

In June of 1988, he was drafted by the Boston Red Sox in the eighth round of the First-Year Player Draft. Mr. Naehring went on to play parts of eight Major League seasons with Boston from 1990-97, batting .282 (527-for-1,872) with 49 home runs and 250 RBI in 547 career games before a torn right elbow ligament ended his career on June 23, 1997.

In 1996, Mr. Naehring founded the Athletes Reaching Out Foundation (ARO), which has funded various good works in the greater Cincinnati area, including a mini-Fenway Park in Miamitown, Ohio.

He and his wife, Kris, have a daughter, Jamison, and a son, J.T.

Damon Oppenheimer

Vice President, Domestic Amateur Scouting

Damon Oppenheimer enters his 30th season with the Yankees and 20th as a Vice President in the organization's scouting department. Since 2005, Mr. Oppenheimer has fully directed the Yankees' efforts related to Major League Baseball's First-Year Player Draft, including the evaluation of all eligible players and the Yankees' selections. As part of his responsibilities, he manages all of the club's crosscheckers and area scouts throughout the United States, Canada and Puerto Rico.

Mr. Oppenheimer was twice honored during the 2018-19 offseason. He was first acknowledged by his scouting peers at the Baseball Winter Meetings with the 2018 "West Coast Scout of the Year Award." Then in January 2019, he received the "George Genovese Lifetime Achievement in Scouting Award" from the Professional Baseball Scouts Foundation at the 16th Annual "In the Spirit of the Game" Awards Dinner.

This season marks his eighth with the title of Vice President of Domestic Amateur Scouting. Between 2003 and 2014, he held various other Vice President titles, including those for Amateur Scouting (2007-14), Scouting (2005-06), Player Development and Scouting (2004) and Professional Scouting (2003).

A native of San Diego, Calif., Mr. Oppenheimer began his player development career as a part-time scout for the Padres before finishing his degree at the University of Southern California. He was hired as a full-time scout by San Diego in 1988, continuing in that role until he joined the Yankees as the Midwest crosschecker in 1993.

Mr. Oppenheimer became the team's Western crosschecker for the 1995 season and briefly joined the Texas Rangers as a national crosschecker from November 1995 through July 1996 before returning to the Yankees in August 1996 as a national crosschecker. He also served as the Yankees' director of player personnel from 2000-02.

The former USC catcher batted .364 in 1985, earning Pac-10 All-Conference honorable mention before being selected by Milwaukee in the 18th round of that June's First-Year Player Draft. He appeared in 12 games for Single-A Beloit in 1985 before getting injured the following year in spring training, ending his professional playing career. Mr. Oppenheimer returned to school and received his bachelor's degree in exercise science in 1987.

He and his wife, Tina, reside in Wesley Chapel, Fla., and have three children: A.J., Sierra and Gehrig.



Kevin Reese

Vice President, Player Development

Kevin Reese begins his 21st year with the Yankees organization, his 15th as a scout or member of the front office, and his first as Vice President of Player Development after four years (2018-2021) of heading up the department with the title of Senior Director of Player Development.

Mr. Reese is responsible for setting the long-term strategy and day-to-day direction for Yankees' affiliates in the U.S. and the Dominican Republic, including all player-related and coaching activities. Mr. Reese also manages the hiring and assignments of all affiliate coaches and field staff and directs all player promotions and releases.

Over the last five years, Mr. Reese has overseen a transformation of the Yankees' player development efforts, implementing a collaborative and holistic approach that integrates various Yankees departments, including Performance Science, Baseball Analytics and Player Health & Performance. Under his direction, facilities at all levels have been modernized and expanded and coaching philosophy has been unified to maximize the potential of both players and coaches. Some of the projects that have taken place during his tenure include the construction of a biomechanics lab and pitching development center at the Yankees' minor league complex in Tampa, expansion of the video resources across all affiliates and the build-out of facilities and operational guidelines for player development at Somerset (Double-A) and Hudson Valley (High-A), which joined the Yankees' affiliate system for the 2021 season.

Mr. Reese joined the Yankees Pro Scouting Department at the conclusion of his playing career and held the title of Professional Scout from 2008 through 2014. For the three seasons from 2015-17, he was the Yankees' Director of Pro Scouting, coordinating scout coverage and report intake while using compiled information to help guide trade discussions and free agent signings. Additionally, Mr. Reese scouted the Yankees' own affiliates, organized advance scouting for the postseason and contributed to the construction of the Yankees' Major League and minor league rosters.

A native of San Diego, Mr. Reese was originally selected by the Padres in the 27th round of the 2000 First-Year Player Draft from the University of San Diego, where he was a two-time West Coast Conference first-team selection and was later named to the West Coast Conference's 40th Anniversary All-Conference Team in 2007. On December 18, 2001, he was acquired by the Yankees in exchange for infielder Bernabel Castro.

Over 849 games across eight minor league seasons from 2000-07 (including 2000-01 with the Padres organization), Mr. Reese, a left-handed-hitting outfielder, posted a .292 (953-for-3,269) batting average with 546 runs scored, 192 doubles, 37 triples, 67 home runs, 395 RBI, 372 walks, 138 stolen bases, a .370 on-base percentage and an .804 OPS. Mr. Reese also appeared in 12 Major League games with the Yankees over two seasons (2005-06), batting .385 (5-for-13) with two runs scored, one RBI, two walks and one stolen base.

He and his wife, Laura, reside in Odessa, Fla., and have four children: Jackson, Kannon, Brooklyn and Gwynn.



Yankees HOPE Week



The 2021 season marked the Yankees' 12th annual HOPE Week (Helping Others Persevere & Excel) – an initiative rooted in the belief that acts of goodwill provide hope and encouragement to more than just the recipient of the gesture. Unfortunately, the COVID-19 pandemic prevented the Yankees from hosting the annual event in 2020.

Each day during HOPE Week, the Yankees reach out to an individual, family or organization worthy of recognition and support. Whenever possible, the Yankees will attempt to personally connect with individuals in the settings of their greatest successes at locations that honor the spirit of their noble endeavors. All outreach in the community ultimately culminates with recognition at Yankee Stadium during a Yankees game.

HOPE Week is about people helping people. The one thing everybody has—no matter their background or financial situation—is time. By involving every one of our players and coaches, along with Manager Aaron Boone, General Manager Brian Cashman, our minor league affiliates and front office staff, we are sending the message that everyone can give of themselves to make their community a better place. Equally significant during HOPE Week is garnering publicity for the highlighted causes and organizations. The greatest challenge facing many not-for-profits is generating interest, awareness and funding for their missions.

MONDAY, JUNE 28, 2021

The Yankees kicked off HOPE Week honoring 70-year-old **Gwen Goldman**. In 1961, as a 10-year-old, she wrote the Yankees to ask to be a bat girl. The then-Yankees GM turned down her application, with a letter saying, "a young lady such as yourself would feel out of place in a dugout." Upon recently learning of this slight, the Yankees wanted to fulfill her aspiration in the spirit of recognizing the importance of gender equality. Sixty years to the date of the rejection letter, she was invited to join the team by **General Manager Brian Cashman** and **General Partner Jennifer Steinbrenner Swindal**. On her HOPE Week day, she received her own locker and joined the team in full uniform with pregame & in-game responsibilities on the field and in the dugout. She also spent time before the game with pitcher **Gerrit Cole**, broadcaster **Suzyn Waldman**, and **Manager Aaron Boone**, among many others.

TUESDAY, JUNE 29, 2021

The Yankees teamed up with **Liz & Vilma Kari's AAP(I Belong)** initiative to shed light on the increase of anti-Asian hate crimes that have plagued our country. After Liz Kari's mother, Vilma, was attacked in 2020, Liz began an online platform where others could anonymously submit their own stories. Liz eventually turned those online submissions into an art installation, which was displayed in the Great Hall at Yankee Stadium on her HOPE Week day. Additionally, the Yankees disseminated a PSA in which the **entire team** read AAP(I Belong) submissions to lend their voices to those who have been victims of discrimination.

President's Volunteer Service Award

At the conclusion of each of the last 11 HOPE Weeks (2010-19, '21), the Yankees were honored with the **President's Volunteer Service Award**, given "in recognition and appreciation of commitment to strengthening the Nation and for making a difference through volunteer service." The award has been bestowed by the President's Council on Service and Civic Participation in conjunction with the Corporation for National and Community Service. Every HOPE Week honoree has also received the award.



WEDNESDAY, JUNE 30, 2021

The Yankees saluted the **West 135th Street Apartments Tenant Association**. As New York City endured the devastating effects of the coronavirus in 2020, this group of Harlem senior women banded together to arrange meals to be provided for tenants of their federally subsidized apartment complex. At the height of the pandemic, the group was distributing up to 600 meals a day. This dedicated group pooled their money and used their personal social media accounts to raise funds for a canopy to shield them from the sun along with other essential items such as bags, utensils, water, ice and PPE for the volunteers. On their HOPE Week day, **General Manager Brian Cashman** and **Yankees great David Cone** made a midday visit to the seniors delivering 250 meals prepared and packaged by Yankee Stadium dining provider Legends.

The Yankees celebrated 11-year-old Maryland native **Blake Wheatley**, who is an avid baseball fan and player and also raises money for local charities and programs. Earlier in 2021, he passed out at baseball practice and then learned from doctors that he has a bicuspid aortic valve condition — a congenital heart defect that **Yankees Manager Aaron Boone** also lives with. On his HOPE Week day, Blake toured Monument Park and the Yankees Museum presented by Bank of America (including getting to try on a Derek Jeter game-worn jersey and swing Babe Ruth's bat). During batting practice he met **Boone, Aaron Judge, Giancarlo Stanton** and **Zack Britton** among others, and learned first-hand that there's no reason not to keep dreaming for big things in his life. He also got to play catch on the field with Boone and Britton.

FRIDAY, JULY 2, 2021

To cap off HOPE Week 2021, the Yankees honored 15-year-old high school student **Luke Post**, who was diagnosed with t-cell lymphoblastic lymphoma, an aggressive form of non-Hodgkin's lymphoma. To benefit other teens being treated at the hospital where he was receiving treatment, Luke designed his own "No One Fights Alone" T-shirt to raise money for the hospital to spend on activities like popular books, toys and video games — items teens need to keep their minds engaged in the hospital. Unable to travel due to his treatments, Luke played the video game *MLB The Show* online with Yankees players **Gleyber Torres, Luis Severino, Gio Urshela, Brett Gardner** and **Tyler Wade**, who took him on from the Yankee Stadium Press Conference Room. Luke was later able to visit the Stadium with his family and meet the Yankees on August 6.

Organizational Initiative

The Yankees are proud that HOPE Week has been celebrated by its minor league affiliates with their own local outreach, with teams holding events from 2012-19 (with a pause in 2020 and 2021 due to the COVID-19 pandemic).



Commitment to Community

The New York Yankees are committed to promoting and sustaining cordial and cooperative relationships with their neighbors and community partners; working in conjunction with them to enhance the quality of life throughout the surrounding communities. On a consistent basis, the Yankees partner with community-based organizations to host events at Yankee Stadium and dedicate several millions of dollars in resources to support various outreach efforts that focus on providing positive educational, recreational and social outlets for New York City residents.

2021 COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Blue Chips Program: Established in July of 2021, Blue Chips is a coed youth mentoring and sports program that focuses on bridging the gap between police officers in the NYPD and youth throughout New York City. The program uses sports and education to create safe and cohesive avenues for young individuals to not only interact with each other, but create stronger bonds with local members of the NYPD. Through organized athletic activities, book and drama clubs and community-improvement sessions, Blue Chips aims to break down barriers in inner-city environments to foster career and personal development and help show that there is a "heartbeat behind the badge."

On August 20, the Yankees welcomed Lt. Michael Almonte, coaches and youth members of the Blue Chips program as their guests in a suite. The group interacted in that space, before enjoying the Yankees vs. Twins game later that evening.

Bronx Community Clean-Up Series: In June, the Yankees partnered with Community Board 4 and the NYC Dept. of Sanitation on a Bronx Community Clean-Up Series. The initiative aimed to help fight litter during the summer months by incentivizing local residents to help clean up their local communities on designated days in a competition-style format. Each volunteer received a voucher valid for two tickets to a Yankees home game and was entered into a raffle for special prizes, including a special experience at Yankee Stadium. Overall, 118 volunteers gathered at various locations in the Bronx, combining to collect a total of 4,080 lbs. of trash. In addition, the winning team from the Mt. Eden section of the Bronx (collected 1,590 lbs. of trash) was recognized and welcomed at a Yankee Stadium suite on October 3 to enjoy the Yankees-Rays game.

CUNY and Bank of America Internship Program: In mid-October, the Yankees partnered with CUNY and Bank of America to implement an internship program at Yankee Stadium. A total of three internships were awarded to qualifying students attending a CUNY-affiliated school. These students had the opportunity to gain experience within the Yankees' Community Relations, Human Resources, Partnerships and Stadium Operations departments, respectively. The internships took place from October 2021 through January 2022, and provided each participant with a unique and firsthand look into working in the sports industry.

CUNY Sport Management Mentoring Program: A historic Yankees-CUNY (City University of New York) Partnership Program was implemented as part of the creation of the Yankees' Diversity and Inclusion Committee. The program is predicated on identifying and exposing CUNY students and alumni to career paths, employment, and business opportunities throughout the Yankees organization. This relationship between the Yankees and CUNY, the largest urban university system in the United States, also includes direct immersion into the Yankees Sport Management Mentoring Program which saw CUNY students take part in a six-week virtual series of information sessions with Yankees front office members during the Spring semester of the 2021 academic year. Of particular note, CUNY's demographics include a wide swath of minorities and other individuals who are underrepresented in corporate settings.

Food Bank for NYC Monthly Pop-Up Food Distribution Events: The Yankees and the Food Bank for New York City partnered to assist Bronx residents facing heightened food insecurities in these challenging times by hosting monthly "pop-up" food distributions at Yankee Stadium. The distributions — which began in May and continued through the baseball offseason — provided 500 families per month with access to shelf stable food items and fresh produce. Additionally, those receiving food were able to receive COVID-19 vaccinations at the Yankee Stadium vaccination site, which was open through late December.

Fueling Our Future Program: Health, wellness and grassroots engagement with local communities within the Bronx are pillars of the Yankees' Diversity & Inclusion Committee. As part of the organization's commitment to Bronx-based individuals, the Yankees, Nike and DREAM partnered to launch a youth initiative called "Fueling Our Future," targeting underserved communities. Over the course of five weeks, area youth were provided with resources to promote health and wellness and were given tools to excel in the classroom, on the field/court and in life. The initiative was officially announced on April 15, in recognition of Jackie Robinson Day.

In total, 42 program participants — in recognition of Robinson's uniform number — from DREAM were exposed to informative and interactive speaking engagements with Yankees staff members that featured elements related to mental health with Associate Director of Mental Conditioning Chris Passarella, strength & conditioning with Director of Player Health & Performance Eric Cressey, healthy cooking with Yankee Stadium Executive Chef Matt Gibson, and making healthy food choices with Major League Dietician Drew Weisberg. In addition, all program participants and staff were invited to and welcomed at Yankee Stadium in a suite space on September 5 where they enjoyed the Yankees-Orioles game.

Hispanic Heritage Month: The Yankees again proudly celebrated Hispanic Heritage Month during September and October by recognizing and embracing Hispanic heritage, language, culture and traditions. Highlights included the introduction and availability of Latin-inspired food items such as empanadas, flan and chicken flautas at Yankee Stadium and a unique ticket offer in which fans were able to recognize their Latin-American heritage with a New Era Yankees cap emblazoned with their homeland's flag.

In addition, the organization's celebration of its community achievement award winners again went virtual in 2021. The three individuals/groups listed below were recognized for their outstanding work and contributions to the betterment of the surrounding communities.

Judge's Chambers Frontline Workers Program:

Throughout the 2021 regular season, the Yankees recognized individuals who have dedicated their lives to serving on the frontlines of the COVID-19 pandemic by hosting them in the Judge's Chambers. Guests included personnel in the health, education and social responsibility fields, among others. These individuals have been at the forefront of the city's response to the pandemic, continuously risking their lives for the betterment of others.

New Era Pinstripe Bowl Virtual Mentoring Session: In association with the Yankees and the University of Maryland, the New Era Pinstripe Bowl hosted a virtual mentoring session with youth members from the Kips Bay Boys & Girls Club in mid-December. The interactive forum featured coaches and student-athletes from the University of Maryland who provided valuable insight and personal experiences related to leadership, the importance of an education and the need to focus on and cultivate one's overall wellness.

YANKEE STADIUM BECOMES COVID-19 VACCINATION SITE

From Feb. 5, 2021 through Dec. 22, 2021 — and in association with New York State, New York City, SOMOS Community Care and the New York National Guard — Yankee Stadium served as a mass COVID-19 vaccination site. The initiative was developed not only to address the Bronx's substantial positivity rate at the onset of the pandemic (which was the highest of any borough in the city in February 2021) but to also further mandates from the State and City for fairness and social equity in the vaccine distribution process. During its time in operation, 104,109 vaccinations were administered at Yankee Stadium, with most going to Bronx residents.

New York Yankees Diversity and Inclusion Committee:

Formalized in September of 2020 and announced in February of 2021, the New York Yankees Diversity and Inclusion Committee is dedicated to identifying, engaging and addressing issues related to equality, racial justice and inclusivity. The creation of this group was the result of an extended period of planning and collaboration with community leaders and within the Yankees organization to determine the appropriate framework for imparting meaningful and long-lasting change. Precipitated by the profound impact of senseless tragedies in communities throughout our nation, this Committee's mission focuses on identifying and combating disparities and systemic inequities that obstruct socioeconomic fairness and progress for marginalized groups.

The Committee is comprised of a dedicated and diverse network of Yankees staff members, on-field personnel, alumni, and outside community leaders and business partners. The shared goal has been to identify ways to combine resources and utilize the panel's various prominent public platforms to address and eradicate barriers that impede access, diversity, inclusion and opportunity for our neighbors around Yankee Stadium and in the larger metropolitan community.

NYPD Recruitment Tutoring Sessions: The Yankees partnered with the New York Police Department to host tutoring sessions at Yankee Stadium for individuals interested in becoming a police officer. Led by instructors on the recruitment team of the NYPD's Candidate Assessment Division, these sessions were meant to educate and reinforce the virtues of an NYPD officer and promote the importance of having a diverse and positive impact in our local communities. A group of approximately 40 NYPD recruits were in attendance at Yankee Stadium's Ford Field MVP Club on June 17 and June 21, respectively.

NYPD 44th Precinct Recognition Ceremony: The Yankees partnered with the NYPD to host a special recognition ceremony for Deputy Inspector Charlie Bello at Yankee Stadium on November 16. Bello became the 44th Precinct's first Latino Commanding Officer when he took over the post in June.

T-Mobile WiFi Program: In September, the Yankees Diversity & Inclusion Committee partnered with T-Mobile and the New York City Department of Education (DOE) on an initiative that saw the Yankees make a contribution of \$1 million toward the activation of one year of free unlimited WiFi service for 10,752 children attending Bronx schools on their newly-issued DOE tablets. In addition, the established accounts as a result of this donation will continue to receive free WiFi service for an additional five years via T-Mobile's Project 10Million initiative, a \$10.7 billion program aimed at delivering internet connectivity to millions of underserved student households across the country at no cost to them.

As part of the announcement and implementation of this initiative, Yankees General Manager Brian Cashman, Senior Vice President and Assistant General Manager Jean Afterman, Senior Vice President of Corporate/Community Relations Brian Smith, Bullpen Coach Mike Harkey, former Hitting Coach Marcus Thames and centerfielder Aaron Hicks surprised ninth and 10th-grade students at the Bronx School for Law and Finance (X284) via Zoom to have a conversation about the importance of education and technology.

Yankees-Stonewall Scholars Initiative: Launched at the beginning of the 2018-19 academic year, the Yankees-Stonewall Scholars Initiative celebrates the achievements of New York City Public School graduating seniors who have demonstrated academic achievement, a commitment to equality and impactful support for the LGBTQ community. The initiative has provided \$150,000 worth of college scholarships over the last three years, which includes five separate \$10,000 scholarships that were presented to one student from each of the five boroughs of New York City each year.

The 2021 Yankees-Stonewall Scholars were recognized on June 18, at Yankee Stadium in a special pregame ceremony held in Monument Park that included Yankees Senior Vice President of Corporate/Community Relations Brian Smith, Stonewall Inn Co-owners Stacy Lentz & Kurt Kelly, Pride Live Founder Diana Rodriguez and the Chancellor of the NYC Department of Education Meisha Porter. The acknowledgement took place in front of the permanent plaque that was dedicated in 2019 to commemorate the inclusive spirit of Yankee Stadium and the 50th Anniversary of the events at the Stonewall Inn that sparked the modern LGBTQ Movement.



HOLIDAY CHEER

Annual Holiday Food Drive: The Yankees partnered with members of the Bronx Clergy to virtually host their annual Holiday Food Drive in November and December. In association with Krasdale Foods, funds generated from the online drive were used to purchase almost \$20,000 worth of food that was distributed to families in need throughout the Bronx. In addition, approximately 4,000 food vouchers were also allocated to Bronx residents for redemption at local C-Town or Bravo Supermarkets to assist with the expenses related to preparing a holiday meal.

Thanksgiving Food Voucher Giveaway: The Yankees and Krasdale Foods again teamed up to hold a Thanksgiving Food Voucher Giveaway on November 22. - ▶ Was re-signed by the Yankees on October 19, 2021 to a three-year contract through the 2024 season with a club option for 2025...was named the 33rd manager in club history on December 4, 2017.

AT THE HELM IN 2021

- ▶ Led the Yankees to their fifth consecutive postseason berth, posting a 92-70 record (tied for second place in the AL East).
- ▶ Earned his 300th managerial win on 8/14 at Chicago-AL, becoming just the 10th Manager in Yankees history to accomplish the feat, joining Joe McCarthy (1,460-867), Joe Torre (1,173-767), Casey Stengel (1,149-696), Miller Huggins (1,067-719), Ralph Houk (944-806), Joe Girardi (910-710), Billy Martin (556-385), Clark Griffith (419-370) and Buck Showalter (313-268)...accomplished the feat in his 500th game (and decision) as Yankees Manager, becoming the fifth-fastest Yankees Manager to reach 300 wins in terms of decisions (excludes ties), trailing Ralph Houk (468th decision), Joe McCarthy (469th decision), Casey Stengel (477th decision) and Joe Torre (484th decision).
- ▶ Recorded his 314th managerial win on 9/3 vs. Baltimore, surpassing Buck Showalter (313) for sole possession of ninth place on the Yankees' all-time managerial wins list.
- ▶ Donated his game day salary on Jackie Robinson Day to support The Players Alliance.
- ▶ Took a medical leave of absence from 3/3-5 to receive a pacemaker...the surgery was performed at St. Joseph's Hospital in Tampa.

MANAGERIAL/COACHING CAREER

- ▶ His 328 career managerial wins rank ninth on the Yankees' all-time list...recorded his 314th managerial win on 9/3/21 vs. Baltimore, surpassing Buck Showalter (313) for sole possession of ninth place on the Yankees' all-time managerial wins list...surpassed Lou Piniella (224) on 9/9/20 at Toronto.

**Wild Card / PS - Postseason / T-Tie

- ▶ Is the second manager in Baseball history to reach the postseason in each of his first four managerial seasons, joining Mike Matheny (2012-15 w/ St. Louis, four straight).
- ▶ Is the third manager to make the playoffs in his first four seasons with the Yankees, joining Casey Stengel (first five from 1949-53) and Joe Torre (first 12 from 1996-2007).
- ▶ Was the first manager in Baseball history to guide his team to at least 100 wins in each of his first two seasons as skipper (2018-19)...his 203 managerial wins from 2018-19 trailed only Ralph Houk (205 wins with the Yankees from 1961-62) for most by any manager over his first two seasons at the helm.
- ▶ Placed second in AL Manager of the Year voting in 2019 (received 13 first place votes, nine second place votes and four third place votes) after guiding the Yankees to a 103-59 record, the club's best mark since 2009 (also 103-59) and their Major League-record 21st 100-win season in franchise history...only one other franchise has 10 such seasons (Philadelphia/Kansas City/Oakland Athletics-10)...after going 100-62 in 2018, had back-to-back 100-win seasons for the second time since 1979 (also 2002-04)...the Yankees are one of two teams with consecutive 100-win seasons since 2010, joining the Houston Astros (2017-19)...Yankees batters set a franchise record with 306HR, 1HR shy of the Major League mark set by the 2019 Minnesota Twins (307).
- ▶ Made his managerial debut in 2018...placed fifth in AL "Manager of the Year" balloting, receiving two third-place votes...guided the Yankees to a 100-62 record, the club's best record since 2009 (103-59) and the 20th 100-win season in franchise history...became the sixth manager in Baseball history to lead his team to at least 100 wins in his rookie season, joining Ralph Houk (1961 Yankees, 109-53), Alex Cora (2018 Red Sox, 108-54), Dusty Baker (1993 Giants, 103-59), Sparky Anderson (1970 Reds, 102-60) and Mickey Cochrane (1934 Tigers, 101-53).
- ▶ Became the fourth Yankees manager to lead the team to a postseason berth in his rookie managerial season, joining Ralph Houk in 1961 (won World Series), Yogi Berra in 1964 (lost WS) and Dick Howser in 1980 (lost ALCS).
- ▶ In 2018, Yankees pitchers set franchise records for total strikeouts (1,634) and strikeouts by relievers (753).
- ▶ Made his managerial debut in 3/29/18 win at Toronto, becoming the 11th manager to win his Yankees managerial debut on Opening Day and the 18th to win his Yankees managerial debut at any point during the season...was the fourth consecutive manager to win his Yankees managerial debut (Joe Girardi in 2008 vs. Toronto, Joe Torre in 1996 at Cleveland and Buck Showalter in 1992 vs. Boston).



- ▶ Won his first home game as a manager on 4/3/18 vs. Tampa Bay, becoming the sixth straight Yankees manager to win his home Yankees managerial debut (also Girardi-2008, Torre-1996, Showalter-1992, Merrill-1990 and Dent-1989).
- ▶ With his father, Bob, became the fourth father-son duo to both serve as Major League managers, joining Connie and Earle Mack, George and Dick Sisler and Bob and Joel Skinner...were joined by Buddy and David Bell in 2019 and Luis Rojas and his father, Felipe Alou, in 2020...Bob Boone spent parts of six seasons as a Major League skipper, leading the Kansas City Royals from 1995-97, then guiding the Reds from 2001-03, a stint during which he managed Aaron.
- ▶ Is the 18th Yankees manager to have also played for the club...is one of 10 active managers (as of March 10, 2022) to have played for the franchise he currently manages, joining Kevin Cash (Tampa Bay), Alex Cora (Boston), Craig Counsell (Milwaukee), Terry Francona (Cleveland), A.J. Hinch (Detroit), Mark Kotsay (Oakland), Dave Martinez (Washington/Montreal), Dave Roberts (Los Angeles-NL) and David Ross (Chicago-NL).



PLAYING CAREER

- ▶ Is part of the first family in Baseball history to produce three generations of Major League players...his father, Bob, played 19 seasons from 1972-90, and his grandfather, Ray, had a 13-year playing career from 1948-60...his older brother, Bret, played 14 seasons (1992-2005), including two with Aaron in Cincinnati from 1997-98...all four reached 1,000H at the Major League level.
- ▶ He (126) and brother, Bret (252) are one of 10 sets of brothers to each hit at least 100HR, joining Roberto and Sandy Alomar Jr., Ken and Cleto Boyer, Joe and Vince DiMaggio, Stephen and J.D. Drew, Bob and Irish Meusel, Yadier and Bengie Molina, Melvin Jr. and Justin Upton, Delmon and Dmitri Young, and Corey and Kyle Seager (credit: *Elias*).
- ▶ The 2003 NL All-Star hit .263 (1,017-for-3,871) with 519R, 216 doubles, 126HR, 555RBI and 107SB in 1,152 games over 12 Major League seasons as an infielder with the Cincinnati Reds (1997-2003), Yankees (2003), Cleveland Indians (2005-06), Florida Marlins (2007), Washington Nationals (2008) and Houston Astros (2009).
- ▶ Made his Major League debut with Cincinnati on 6/20/97 to replace his brother, Bret, who was optioned in what is believed to be the first transaction involving brothers...made his Major League debut that night at St. Louis, going 1-for-3 with 1RBI...collected his first hit and RBI in his third plate appearance with an infield single off Matt Morris in the sixth inning...was ejected from the game by HP umpire Gary Darling for throwing his helmet (was just the fourth player in Baseball history to be ejected in his Major League debut).
- ▶ Made his first Opening Day roster with the Reds in 1998...hit his first career HR on 8/26 vs. the Cubs (Kerry Wood).
- ▶ Had arthroscopic surgery to clean out his left knee on 12/8/99, which was performed by Dr. Timothy Kremchek...underwent reconstructive surgery to repair a torn anterior cruciate ligament in his left knee on 8/8/00...the surgery was performed by Kremchek and Dr. James Andrews...suffered the injury on 7/5/00 at St. Louis.
- ▶ Played 103 games with the Reds in 2001, despite being placed on the D.L. with broken bones suffered after being hit by pitches: 5/15-6/14 with a broken hamate bone in his right hand (suffered on 5/14 vs. Houston when he was hit by a Wade Miller pitch and had surgery the next day to remove the bone, performed by hand specialist Dr. Greg Sommerkamp and Dr. Timothy Kremchek), 8/15-31 with a broken right wrist (suffered on 8/14 at St. Louis when he was hit by a pitch by Matt Morris) and 9/24-the end of the season with a broken left thumb (suffered on 9/23 at Milwaukee when hit by a Jamey Wright pitch and had surgery to insert a pin and a wire into the thumb, also performed by Sommerkamp and Kremchek, on 9/27).
- ▶ Hit a career-high 26HR with the Reds in 2002...homered three times on 8/9/02 vs. San Diego, including two in the first inning off Padres starter Brett Tomko...later homered off Tomko in the fourth inning...hit the last of 4,652HR at Cincinnati's Riverfront Stadium/Cinergy Field on 9/22/02 off Philadelphia's Dan Plisac.
- ▶ Helped the Yankees clinch the American League pennant in 2003, hitting a series-ending, "walk-off" home run off Boston's Tim Wakefield in the bottom of the 11th inning of Game 7 in the ALCS...in 54 regular season games with the Yankees—all in 2003—hit .254 (48-for-189) with 31R, 13 doubles, 6HR and 31RBI...was acquired by the Yankees from Cincinnati in exchange for LHP Brandon Claussen, LHP Charlie Manning and cash considerations on 7/31/03...overall, set career highs with 158H, 92R and 96RBI over 160G with the Reds and Yankees in 2003.
- ▶ Missed the entire 2004 season after having two surgeries on his left knee...prior to the season, had surgery on the knee after tearing the anterior cruciate ligament playing in a pick-up basketball game in January in Newport Beach, Calif...the surgery was performed by Dr. Lewis Yocum in Anaheim, Calif., on 2/16...at the time of the injury, was on the Yankees' 40-man roster, but was released on 3/1.
- ▶ Signed a Major League contract with Cleveland as a free agent on 6/26/04...joined Cleveland in July and began experiencing pain and swelling in the surgically repaired knee...underwent a second procedure on 8/20/04 to remove loose bodies and promote cartilage growth in the left knee joint.
- ▶ Reached the 1,000H and 500R plateau for his career in 2008 with Washington.
- ▶ On 3/26/09, underwent open-heart surgery to replace his bicuspid aortic valve, then returned to play for Houston in September 2009...is believed to be the first player to appear in a Major League game following open-heart surgery...played his final Major League game on 10/4/09 at the Mets.
- ▶ Was selected by the Cincinnati Reds in the third round of the 1994 First-Year Player Draft...was selected by the California Angels in the 43rd round of the 1991 First-Year Player Draft, but did not sign.
- ▶ Appeared in 580 minor league games, batting .271 (585-for-2,158) with 346R, 133 doubles, 67HR and 325RBI...was a Pioneer League All-Star in 1994, a Carolina League All-Star in 1995 and a Southern League All-Star in 1996.

- ▶ Prior to joining the Yankees, spent four seasons with Cleveland (2016-19), where he was promoted to Director of Pitching Development...began his time with the Indians as the Lower Level Pitching Coordinator in 2016...from 2017-19, served as the organization's Assistant Director of Player Development, a role in which he oversaw the formation of pitching strategy for the club, collaborating with coaches, coordinators and front office personnel...he also assisted with leadership of the organization's player development staff and the design and execution of the staff's programs, policies and curricula.
- ▶ In 2019, five young starters he worked with contributed for Cleveland at the Major League level...each member of that group—Mike Clevinger, Shane Bieber, Zach Plesac, Adam Plutko and Aaron Civale—were developed in the Indians' farm system, including three (Bieber, Plesac and Civale) who spent their entire minor league careers under his instruction since being drafted together in 2016...the five pitchers combined to produce 13.3 WAR (FanGraphs) over 107 games (105 starts) in 2019, anchoring the starting rotation for a 93-win team.
- ▶ Prior to joining the Indians, spent seven years as the Pitching Coordinator for Cressey Sports Performance in Hudson, Mass., working under current Yankees' Director of Player Health and Performance, Eric Cressey...also coached the Yarmouth-Dennis Red Sox of the Cape Cod League and was the pitching coach at Lincoln-Sudbury High School in Sudbury, Mass. in 2015.
- ▶ Served as an associate scout for the Yankees from 2009-15.



- ▶ Set the Yankees' single-season rookie record with 47 doubles (previous: Joe DiMaggio, 44 in 1936)...were tied with Boston's Fred Lynn (1975) for the most ever by an AL rookie and the second-most by any rookie in Major League history behind only Brooklyn's Johnny Frederick in 1929 (52).
- ▶ Had 76XBH, third-most in a season by a rookie in Yankees history behind Joe DiMaggio (88 in 1936) and Aaron Judge (79 in 2017).
- ▶ Became the first rookie third baseman (min. 50% of games at 3B) in Major League history with at least 40 doubles and 25HR in his rookie season...became the seventh rookie, age 23-or-younger, to reach the marks, joining Hal Trosky in 1934, Joe DiMaggio in 1936, Ted Williams in 1939, Nomar Garciaparra in 1997, Albert Pujols in 2001 and Corey Seager in 2016.
- ▶ Joined Joe DiMaggio (1936) as the only rookies in Yankees history to hit at least 40 doubles and 20HR in a season...joined the Dodgers' Corey Seager (2016) as the only rookies to accomplish the feat since 2007.

- ▶ Was one of four Yankees rookies to hit at least 25HR in a season, joining Aaron Judge (52HR in 2017), Joe DiMaggio (29HR in 1936) and Joe Gordon (25HR in 1938)...was one of four Yankees rookies with at least 20HR since 2016 (also Gary Sánchez-20HR in 2016, Aaron Judge-52HR in 2017 and Gleyber Torres-24HR in 2018).
- ▶ Was the fifth Yankees rookie with multiple grand slams in the same season (6/5 at Toronto and 9/15 vs. Toronto), joining Shane Spencer (three in 1998), Russ Derry (two in 1945), Yogi Berra (two in 1947) and Hideki Matsui (two in 2003).

- ▶ Was one of seven Yankees since 1913 to collect at least 50 multi-hit games in his rookie season, joining Joe DiMaggio (66 in 1936), Earle Combs (65 in 1925), Tom Tresh (54 in 1962), Ben Chapman (52 in 1930), Derek Jeter (50 in 1996) and Phil Rizzuto (50 in 1941)...marked the third-most by an AL rookie over the last 15 seasons (since 2004) behind Mike Trout (56 in 2012) and Delmon Young (55 in 2007).
- ▶ Of his 27HR, 12 tied the game (four) or gave the Yankees the lead (eight)...nine of his HRs came in the seventh inning or later...hit 14 of his 27HR when behind in the count, four more than any other Major League player in 2018.
- ▶ Was the first Yankee, age-23 or younger, to hit 25HR in a season since Bobby Murcer (26HR) at age-23 in 1969.

- ▶ Tied a Yankees franchise record with three straight games with multiple extra-base hits (28th time) from 4/13-17...was the second Yankees 3B with at least 2XBH in three consecutive games, joining Bob Meusel (7/9-11/1920).
- ▶ Hit a solo HR—the first homer of his Major League career—in the ninth inning on 4/17 vs. Miami.
- ▶ Was 4-for-4 with 1R, 2 doubles and 1RBI on 4/22 win vs. Toronto...at 23 years, 51 days old, was the youngest Yankee to have at least 4H in a game since Melky Cabrera (21y, 292d) on 5/30/06 at Detroit...was the youngest Yankee to go 4-for-4 or better since Derek Jeter on 7/2/96 vs. Boston (4-for-4 at 22 years, 6 days)...was the youngest Yankee to go 4-for-4 or better with at least 2XBH since Thurman Munson, who went 4-for-4 with 1 double and 1HR on 7/28/70 at California, at exactly the same age as Andújar (23.051).
- ▶ Hit “walk-off” RBI single—his first career “walk-off” hit—in the ninth and was 2-for-5 with 2R on 5/4 vs. Cleveland...at 23 years, 63 days old, was the second-youngest Yankee with a “walk-off” hit since 2010 (Clint Frazier, 22y, 305d on 7/8/17 vs. Milwaukee)...Gleyber Torres (21y, 144d) hit a “walk-off” HR two days later.
- ▶ Was named AL “Rookie of the Month” for June, his first career monthly award...in 25G, hit .264 (24-for-91) with 10R, 6 doubles, 7HR and 20RBI, leading all Major League rookies in HR and extra-base hits (13) and tying for first in RBI (first in the AL)...was the sixth Yankee (ninth time) to win AL “Rookie of the Month” and the fourth current Yankee to do so, joining Gary Sánchez (Aug. 2016), Aaron Judge (four times in 2017) and Gleyber Torres (May 2018).

- ▶ Recorded his 100th career hit in his 92nd career game (7/23 at Tampa Bay)...among players to debut since 1942, is tied with Gary Sánchez for the third-fastest Yankees to reach 100 career hits, behind Hideki Matsui (81G) and Robinson Canó (87G).

- ▶ With Tyler Wade's debut on 6/27, his on 6/28 and Dustin Fowler debuting on 6/29, the Yankees had position players make their Major League debuts on three straight days for the first time since Jack Little, John Dowd and Bill Otis from 7/2-4/1912 (credit: *Elias*).
- ▶ Was named the winner of the Kevin Lawn "Player of the Year" Award, presented annually to the organization's top performer...the award is dedicated to Kevin O'Brien Lawn—the son of longtime Yankees Vice President and Chief of Operations Jack Lawn—who passed away in 1999.
- ▶ Led all Yankees minor leaguers in season batting average (.315) and doubles (36) and ranked third in RBI (82)...struck out in just 13.6% of his 522PA (71K).
- ▶ Began the season with Double-A Trenton, hitting .312 (79-for-253) with 30R, 23 doubles, 7HR and 52RBI in 67G.



Batting Average: (H/AB) Hits divided by at-bats.

ERA: (ERx9/IP) Multiply earned runs by nine and divide the total by innings pitched.

Slugging Percentage: (TB/AB) Total bases (1B=1, 2B=2, 3B=3, HR=4) divided by at-bats.

On-Base Percentage: (H+BB+HBP)/(AB+BB+HBP+SF)
Add hits, walks, hit by pitch and divide by the total of at-bats plus walks plus hit-by-pitch plus sacrifice flies.

OPS: On-base percentage plus slugging percentage.

Fielding Percentage: (PO+A)/(PO+A+E) Total putouts plus assists divided by total chances.

Winning Percentage: The number of games won divided by the total games played (not including ties).

Magic Number: Determine the number of games yet to be played, add one, then subtract the number of games ahead in the loss column of the standings from the closest opponent.

QUALIFYING RULES

Batting Championship: To qualify for a batting title, a player must make at least 3.1 plate appearances per team game as scheduled at the start of the season. During a 162-game season, the minimum to qualify is 502 plate appearances.

Pitching Championship: To qualify for the lowest ERA, a pitcher must throw at least 1.0 inning per team game as scheduled at the start of the season. During a 162-game season, the minimum is 162.0 innings.

Fielding Championship: To qualify as the top fielder during a 162-game season:

- a catcher must have played in at least 81 games at catcher.
- an infielder or outfielder must have played at his position in at least 108 games.
- a pitcher must have 162.0 innings pitched.

Rookie: A player shall be considered a rookie unless, during a previous season or seasons, he has (a) exceeded 130 at-bats or 50 innings pitched in the Major Leagues; or (b) accumulated more than 45 days on the active roster of a Major League club or clubs during the period of the 26-player limit.

Save: Credit a pitcher with a save when:

- (1) He is the finishing pitcher in a game won by his club;
 - (2) He is not the winning pitcher, and
 - (3) He qualifies under one of the following conditions:
 - a. He enters the game with a lead of no more than three runs and pitches for at least one inning, or
 - b. He enters the game with the potential tying run either on base, at bat or on deck, or
 - c. He pitches effectively for at least three innings
- *No more than one save may be credited each game.

- ▶ Has 10 career postseason saves, seventh-most all time...has posted a 1.71 ERA (21.0IP, 4ER) with six saves, 8BB/11BB and 37K in 17 postseason relief appearances as a Yankee.
- ▶ Converted 56 consecutive save opportunities at Great American Ball Park from 9/25/12-8/4/15, the longest home saves streak by any pitcher since the stat became official in 1969.
- ▶ Was the only relief pitcher ever to be named to four All-Star teams while playing for the Reds.
- ▶ Has made eight career Opening Day rosters (2011-13, '15 w/ Cincinnati and '17-19, '21 w/ the Yankees)...began the 2020 season on the COVID-19 injured list.

2021

- ▶ Went 6-4 with 30 saves (in 34 chances), a 3.36 ERA (56.1IP, 21ER) and 97K in 61 relief appearances...was named to his seventh career All-Star team...opponents hit .182 (36-for-198, 9HR); LH .116 (5-for-43, 1HR); RH .200 (31-for-155, 8HR).
- ▶ His 15.50 K/9.0IP ratio was the second-highest among Major League relievers, trailing only Milwaukee's Josh Hader (15.65)...struck out 39.9% of his batters faced (97K, 243BF), the fourth-highest strikeout rate in the Majors among relievers.

- ▶ Struck out George Springer swinging in the ninth inning on 9/30 at Toronto to record his 1,000th career strikeout, becoming the 13th pitcher in Major League history to record 1,000K as a reliever...according to *Elias*, Chapman was the fastest reliever ever to reach that mark in terms of innings pitched, reaching the milestone in 602.1 innings...surpassed Craig Kimbrel's previous mark (612.2IP)...Chapman (623 relief appearances) was just one of four pitchers to reach 1,000K as a reliever in fewer than 700 relief appearances, joining Goose Gossage (559 relief appearances), Craig Kimbrel (630 relief appearances) and Kenley Jansen (684 relief appearances).

- ▶ Was named AL "Reliever of the Month" for the first time in his career in September...retired 36-of-41 batters faced, tossing 12.0 scoreless innings with six saves in 11G in September (3H, 2BB, 17K).
- ▶ Earned his 200th career save in 9/13 win against Tampa Bay at Citi Field, the 49th pitcher to reach the milestone.
- ▶ In six postseason relief appearances, went 0-1 with three saves, a 1.13 ERA (8.0IP, 1ER) and 16K...closed out ALDS Game 5 at Cleveland with 2.0 scoreless innings (1BB, 4K) to earn his longest save of 2017.

Hardy) matched his Major League-record 105.1 mph fastball clocked by Pitch f/x on 9/24/10 w/ Cincinnati at San Diego.
- ▶ Was traded by the Yankees to the Cubs on 7/25 in exchange for RHP Adam Warren, INF Gleyber Torres, OF Billy McKinney and OF Rashad Crawford.
- ▶ In 28 games for the Cubs, went 1-1 with 16 saves (in 18 chances), a 1.01 ERA (26.2IP, 3ER), 46K and a 15.53 K/9.0IP ratio...his ERA ranked as the fourth-lowest mark by a Cubs reliever all-time in the season's second half (min. 20G)...ranked fourth in the NL in saves after his Cubs debut.

- ▶ Is a four-time All-Star (2021 with the Yankees, 2018-19 with Houston, 2017 with Pittsburgh)...has finished in the top-five of Cy Young Award voting five times (second in 2021, fourth in 2020, second in 2019, fifth in 2018, fourth in 2015).
- ▶ His 2.85 ERA (667.0IP, 211ER) since the start of 2018 is the fifth-best in the Majors (min. 400IP), trailing Jacob deGrom (1.94), Justin Verlander (2.56), Max Scherzer (2.74) and Walker Buehler (2.82).
- ▶ Since 2018, leads the Majors in wins (58), strikeouts (939), K/9.0IP (12.67) and innings pitched (667.0IP), ranks second in opponents' BA (.201), third in winning percentage (.734, 58-21, min. 40 decisions), WHIP (0.99) and WAR among pitchers (20.1 - FanGraphs).
- ▶ Has recorded double-digit strikeouts in 33 games since the start of 2019, most in the Majors over the span (next: Max Scherzer-22)...his 41 games with at least 10K since the beginning of 2018 are also the most in the Majors in that span (Max Scherzer-40).
- ▶ His 243K in 2021 were the second-most by a Yankee in a single season in club history, trailing only Ron Guidry's 248K in 35GS in 1978...his nine double-digit strikeout games in 2021 were tied for the most by a Yankee in a single season in franchise history, joining David Cone (nine in 1998)...his five games with at least 12K were the most in franchise history, surpassing Al Downing's four games in 1963.
- ▶ Did not allow a walk to 149 straight batters from 4/12-5/17...according to *Elias*, his 61K between walks was the most such strikeouts between walks in a single season since 1893.
- ▶ Has tossed at least 7.0IP and allowed 1R-or-fewer 21 times since the start of 2019, the most in the Majors over the span (next: Jacob deGrom, Zack Wheeler and Sandy Alcantara with 17).
- ▶ His career 10.39 K/9.0IP ratio (1,673K/1,449.1IP) is the eighth-highest in Major League history (min. 1,000.0IP).
- ▶ His .201 opponents' BA since joining the American League in 2018 is the sixth-lowest in AL history (min. 500.0IP).
- ▶ Has recorded at least 10K and 0BB in 19 career games, tied for the second-most in the Majors since 2014 (Max Scherzer-23, Clayton Kershaw-19)...his 17 such games since the start of 2018 are the most in the Majors (next: Justin Verlander and Max Scherzer with 11).
- ▶ Recorded at least 7K in 15 consecutive regular season starts from 8/8-G1/20-4/30/21, tied with Pedro Martínez (15GS, 8/19/99-5/12/00) and Nolan Ryan (15GS, 6/25-9/12/89) for the second-longest stretch by a starter in American League history, trailing only Shane Bieber (23GS from 9/20/19-5/16/21).
- ▶ Had a career-best 20-game winning streak from 5/27/19-8/14/20...was tied for the third-longest winning streak in Baseball history behind only Carl Hubbell (24 wins from 7/17/36-5/27/37) and Roy Face (22 wins from 6/7/58-8/30/59-G2)...was the longest winning streak since Chicago-NL's Jake Arrieta also won 20 consecutive decisions from 8/4/15-5/25/16...was part of a 28-start undefeated stretch from 5/27/19-8/19/20, during which he went 20-0 with a 1.97 ERA (182.2IP, 114H, 43R/40ER, 37BB, 270K, 25HR)...his 28-start undefeated streak was tied with Kris Medlen (2009-12) and Dave McNally (1968-69) for the second-longest in Major League history...only Roger Clemens (30GS from 1998-99) had a longer undefeated streak as a starter.
- ▶ Including the postseason, became the first pitcher ever to win 19 consecutive decisions in a single season, accomplishing the feat from 5/27/19 vs. Chicago-NL to ALCS Game 3 at the Yankees on 10/15/19 (16-0 over 22 regular season starts; 3-0 over three postseason starts).
- ▶ In two seasons with the Astros (2018-19), was 35-10 with a 2.68 ERA (412.2IP, 285H, 134R/123ER, 112BB, 602K, 48HR) over 65 starts...led the Majors in strikeouts during that span, just the seventh pitcher in the Modern Era (since 1900) to record at least 600K over two consecutive seasons (also Randy Johnson, Curt Schilling, J.R. Richard, Nolan Ryan, Sandy Koufax, Rube Waddell)...from 2018-19, ranked second in the Majors in wins and K/9.0IP ratio (13.13, min. 300.0IP).

- ▶ Led the Majors with 326 strikeouts in 2019, the 14th-highest total in Baseball's Modern Era (since 1900)...his 13.82 K/9.0IP ratio (326K/212.1IP) in 2019 is the second-highest in Major League history, trailing only Shane Bieber's 14.20 K/9.0IP (122K/77.1IP) in an abbreviated 60-game season in 2020...led the AL in ERA in 2019 (2.50).
- ▶ Is just one of seven Major League pitchers to record double-digit wins in seven of the last nine seasons since 2013 (2013-15, '17-19, '21)...joins Zack Greinke (eight), Max Scherzer (eight), J.A. Happ (seven), Lance Lynn (seven), Jon Lester (seven) and Clayton Kershaw (seven)...went 7-10 in an injury-shortened season in 2016 and 7-3 in a 60-game season in 2020.
- ▶ Eclipsed the 200.0IP mark each season from 2017-19 and was one of five pitchers to hit the mark in four of five seasons from 2015-19 (Zack Greinke, Corey Kluber, Max Scherzer and Justin Verlander).
- ▶ Was the first overall pick of the 2011 First-Year Player Draft, the 15th pitcher (and 11th right-hander) to be chosen first...became the fifth player selected first overall to play for the Yankees, joining Alex Rodriguez (1993, Seattle; 2004-13, '15-16 with the Yankees), Darryl Strawberry (1980, New York-NL; 1995-99 with the Yankees), Tim Lincecum (1968, New York-NL; 1984 with the Yankees) and Ron Blomberg (1967, Yankees; 1969, '71-76 with the Yankees).
- ▶ With a 40-20 record from 2013-15, became just the second Pirates pitcher since 1930 to collect at least 40 wins over his first three Major League seasons, joining John Candelaria (44-18 from 1975-77)...is one of three Pirates pitchers to collect at least 10 wins in each of his first three seasons, joining Bill Swift (first five, 1932-36) and Ray Kremer (first eight, 1924-31).
- ▶ Is 8-5 with a 2.93 ERA (86.0IP, 58H, 29R/28ER, 22BB, 111K, 15HR) in 14 career postseason starts with Pittsburgh (2013, '15), Houston (2018-19) and the Yankees (2020-21)...has allowed 2R-or-fewer in nine of his 14 career postseason starts and 1R-or-fewer in seven of those starts...has tossed at least 7.0 innings in seven of his 14 starts...his 11.62 K/9.0IP ratio is the second-highest in postseason history (min. 50.0IP), behind Kenley Jansen (13.07)...is the only pitcher ever to have at least 12K in three different postseason games...is also just the second pitcher in Major League history to record at least 13K in two postseason games (also Bob Gibson: 13K in 1964 World Series Game 5 at the Yankees and 17K in 1968 World Series Game 1 vs. Detroit)...his .185 (58-for-313) opponents' BA ranks seventh in postseason history (min. 6GS).
- ▶ Is 5-1 with a 1.80 ERA (45.0IP, 21H, 9ER, 9BB, 64K, 7HR) in seven Division Series starts...owns the sixth-lowest ERA in Division Series history (min. 30.0IP), behind Mariano Rivera (0.32), Curt Schilling (0.93), Stephen Strasburg (1.45), Jon Lester (1.71) and Orlando Hernández (1.78)...leads all Division Series pitchers all-time (min. 100BF) with a .135 opponents' BA (21-for-155), 12.80 K/9.0IP ratio and 38.8% strikeout rate.
- ▶ Has made five "winner-take-all" starts, matching Roger Clemens for the most in Major League history...is 1-3 with a 3.91 ERA (25.1IP, 11ER) in those starts...earned the win in 2019 ALDS Game 5 vs. Tampa Bay (8.0IP, 1ER) but took the loss in 2013 NLDS Game 5 at St. Louis (5.0IP, 2ER), 2015 NL Wild Card Game vs. Chicago-NL (5.0IP, 4ER) and 2021 AL Wild Card Game at Boston (2.0IP, 3ER)...received OR of support in those three losses...did not record a decision in 2020 ALDS Game 5 at Tampa Bay at Petco Park (5.1IP, 1ER).
- ▶ As a Yankee, is 2-1 with a 3.98 ERA (20.1IP, 9ER) and 33K in four postseason starts...has recorded at least 8K in three of those four starts...was the first Yankee in franchise history to record at least 8K in three consecutive postseason appearances (2020 ALWC Game 1 - 2020 ALDS Game 5).

- ▶ In his second year with the Yankees, finished second in American League Cy Young Award voting after going 16-8 with two complete games and a 3.23 ERA (181.1IP, 151H, 69R/65ER, 41BB, 243K, 24HR) in 30 starts...opponents hit .223 (151-for-677, 24HR); LH .216 (63-for-292, 13HR); RH .229 (88-for-385, 11HR).
- ▶ Was named via the player ballot to his fourth career All-Star team (also 2018-19 with Houston, 2015 with Pittsburgh).
- ▶ Ranked third in the Majors in strikeouts (243, second in AL), K/9.0IP (12.06, second in AL) and K/BB (5.93, first in AL), tied for third in wins (16, first in AL) and sixth in WAR among pitchers (5.3 - FanGraphs, second in AL)...ranked second in the AL in WHIP (1.06) third in ERA (3.23) and fifth in BB/9.0IP (2.03).
- ▶ Was one of five starting pitchers named to the All-MLB First Team.
- ▶ His 243K were the second-most by a Yankee in a single season in club history, trailing only Ron Guidry's 248K in 35GS in 1978.
- ▶ His nine double-digit strikeout games were tied for the most by a Yankee in a single season in franchise history, joining David Cone (nine in 1998)...were the second-most in the Majors, trailing only Toronto's Robbie Ray (10).
- ▶ His five games with at least 12K were the most in franchise history, surpassing Al Downing's four games in 1963.
- ▶ His six starts with at least 10K and OBB were the most by any Yankee in a single season (previous: Mike Mussina - four in 2001)...were tied for the second-most by a pitcher in a single season in Major League history, trailing his own record of seven such games in 2019.
- ▶ His four games with at least 12K and OBB were the most by a Yankee in a single season in franchise history, surpassing Masahiro Tanaka (three in 2017) and Mike Mussina (three in 2001)...were tied for the most by a pitcher in a season in Major League history (Cole also recorded 4G in 2019, Chris Sale had 4G in 2019 and Roger Clemens had 4G in 1997).

▶ Did not allow a run or walk and notched at least 12K in three starts, tying the Major League single-season record...joined Pedro Martínez (three in 2000) and Sandy Koufax (three in 1965) as the only three pitchers to record three such games in a season (credit: *Elias*).

▶ His seven games with at least 10K and 1R-or-fewer were the most in franchise history (previous: Mike Mussina-5 in 2001, David Cone-5 in 1998 and Ron Guidry-5 in 1978).

▶ Tossed at least 6.0IP without allowing a walk in nine starts, tied with Toronto's José Berríos for the most such starts in the Majors in 2021.

▶ Allowed 2ER-or-fewer in 12 straight regular season starts from 9/5/20-5/12/21...was tied for the longest stretch by a Yankees starting pitcher in franchise history (since ER became an official stat in 1913), joining Whitey Ford's 12-start streak from 8/10-9/28/63 and Chad Green's 12-game stretch as an opener from 6/11/17-8/12/19-G2.

▶ His season-opening eight-game stretch (4/1-5/12) of allowing 2ER-or-fewer was the longest by a Yankees starting pitcher (excluding openers) since Michael Pineda who did so in his first nine starts of 2014 (Chad Green did so in his first 11 opening assignments of 2019).

▶ Surrendered just 3BB in his first eight starts of the season (191BF).

▶ Made his third career Opening Day start (also 2017 and '20) and second with the Yankees on 4/1 vs. Toronto (ND, 5.1IP, 5H, 2ER, 2BB, 8K, 1HR)...with his 8K, became the fifth pitcher in franchise history to collect at least 8K on Opening Day, joining Tim Leary (9K in 1991), Roger Clemens (8K in 1999), David Cone (8K in 1997) and Whitey Ford (8K in 1955)...was the first Yankee to make back-to-back Opening Day starts since Masahiro Tanaka started three straight from 2015-17...was the 24th pitcher in franchise history to make multiple Opening Day starts...collected his 100th strikeout as a Yankee in the fourth inning (Teoscar Hernández, looking).

- ▶ Recorded at least 8K in six consecutive starts from 4/1-30, the fourth-longest streak in franchise history... trailed only CC Sabathia (7G, 6/25-7/26/11), Mike Mussina (7G, 4/2-5/7/03) and Ron Guidry (7G, 7/14-8/15/78)... joined Mike Mussina as the only Yankees pitchers to accomplish the feat in their first six starts of a season (first seven in 2003).
- ▶ Allowed 2ER-or-fewer and notched at least 8K in six straight starts from 4/1-30, tied with Mike Mussina (6GS, 4/9-5/7/03) and Ron Guidry (6GS, 7/20-8/15/78) for the second-longest such streak by a Yankees starting pitcher in franchise history (since earned runs became an official stat in the AL in 1913), trailing only CC Sabathia (7GS, 6/25-7/26/11)...was the first Yankees starter to accomplish the feat in his first six starts of a season (previous: 2GS, five times, four different pitchers)...was the third-longest streak as a starter to begin a season in the Majors since ER became an official stat in the AL in 1913, trailing only Randy Johnson (first nine starts of 2000) and Pedro Martínez (first seven starts of 2000).

- ▶ Recorded double-digit strikeouts in three consecutive starts from 4/18-30, becoming the fifth Yankee in franchise history to accomplish the feat...joined Ron Guidry (four straight from 6/2-17/78), Al Downing (four straight from 7/2-21(G1)/63), David Cone (three straight from 9/2-13/98) and Bob Turley (three straight from 5/6-15 (G2)/55).
- ▶ Tossed at least 6.0IP without allowing a walk in five straight games from 4/18-5/12...was tied with Fritz Peterson's five-game streak from 4/25-5/18/71 for the second-longest such stretch in Yankees history, trailing only David Wells' six-game stretch from 9/6/02-4/10/03.
- ▶ Tossed 6.0 shutout innings on 4/30 vs. Detroit (4H, 0BB, 12K).
- ▶ Was named the AL "Pitcher of the Month" for April after going 4-1 with a 1.43 ERA (37.2IP, 6ER) and 62K in six starts...his 1.43 ERA was the lowest ERA by a Yankee in the month of April since David Cone's 1.04 ERA in 1999...his 14.81 K/9.0IP ratio was the highest ever by a Yankee in a single calendar month while his 62K were the second-most by a Yankee in a calendar month, trailing only Ron Guidry's 64K in June 1978...his 62K were the fourth-highest by any Major League pitcher in the month of April (Shane Bieber-68K in April 2021, Randy Johnson-64K in April 2000 and 63K in April 1999)...led the AL in K/9.0IP (third in Majors), BB/9.0IP (0.72, fourth in Majors) and K/BB (20.67, second in Majors)...tied for the most wins in the Majors and ranked second in the Majors in strikeouts...was the lowest ERA by a Yankees starter who made at least six starts in a calendar month since Ron Guidry's 0.96 ERA in six starts in September 1978...marked his fifth career "Pitcher of the Month" honor and first since September 2019...was the first Yankee to win the award since Masahiro Tanaka in May 2014.
- ▶ Tossed 8.0 shutout innings on 5/12 at Tampa Bay (4H, 0BB, 12K) to earn the win in the Yankees' 1-0 victory...marked his third game in 2021 that he did not allow a run or walk and notched at least 12K, tying the Major League single-season record...joined Pedro Martínez (three in 2000) and Sandy Koufax (three in 1965) as the only three pitchers to record three such games in a season (credit: *Elias*)...collected his 1,500th career strikeout (Brett Phillips swinging in the third)...accomplished the feat in his 212th career game...at the time, was the second-fastest player (in terms of games) to reach the milestone, trailing only Randy Johnson who did it in his 206th career game...was later surpassed by Yu Darvish who accomplished the feat in his 197th career game on 6/21 vs. Los Angeles-NL and Jacob deGrom who notched his 1,500th strikeout in his 198th career game in Game 1 on 7/7 vs. Milwaukee...was his longest scoreless appearance since he tossed a complete-game shutout on 5/4/18 at Arizona.
- ▶ Surrendered a walk to Joey Gallo in the third inning on 5/17 at Texas, his first since a second-inning walk to Lourdes Gurriel Jr. in an eight-pitch plate appearance on 4/12 at Toronto in Dunedin...according to *Elias*, his 61K between walks was the most such strikeouts between walks in a single season since 1893...faced 149 batters between walks.
- ▶ Tossed 7.0 shutout innings in the Yankees' 7-0 victory on 5/22 vs. Chicago-AL (4H, 3BB, 7K).
- ▶ Allowed a career-high-tying 3HR in his loss on 6/27 at Boston.
- ▶ Took a no-decision in 7/4-Game 1 vs. the Mets (3.1IP, 6H, 4ER, 3BB, 6K, 1HR), his shortest regular season start as a Yankee and shortest since 9/12/16 at Philadelphia (2.0IP)...marked just the third time in his career he has tossed fewer than 4.0IP in a start (2.0IP on 6/10/16 vs. St. Louis and 2.0IP on 9/12/16 at Philadelphia).
- ▶ Tossed his third career complete-game shutout in the Yankees' 1-0 win on 7/10 at Houston (also a CGSHO in Game 1 on 9/11/20 vs. Baltimore-7.0IP; CGSHO on 5/4/18 at Arizona-9.0IP)...struck out 12 batters, recording his sixth double-digit strikeout game of the season...was the first Yankees pitcher to toss a complete-game shutout and notch at least 12K since Mike Mussina on 9/24/02 vs. Tampa Bay (12K)...was just the fifth Yankees pitcher in the last 39 seasons (since 1983) to toss a complete-game shutout in a 1-0 win, joining CC Sabathia (7/10/11 vs. Tampa Bay), Ted Lilly (6/22/02 at San Diego), Mike Mussina (9/2/01 at Boston) and Shawn Hillegas (7/20/92 at Oakland)...was his first career win vs. Houston...has now collected a win against all 30 Major League teams...tossed a career-high 129 pitches, the most by a Yankee since Randy Johnson threw 129 pitches on 7/19/06 vs. Seattle...marked the most by any Major League pitcher since Oakland's Mike Fiers on 5/7/19 vs. Cincinnati.



- ▶ Earned his 10th win of the season after tossing his second straight complete game on 7/17 vs. Boston (6.0IP, 5H, 1ER, 2BB, 11K)...was just the second Yankee in the last 23 seasons (since 1999) to toss back-to-back complete games, joining CC Sabathia who did so from 4/16-22/10 (6.0IP on 4/16 vs. Texas and 8.0IP on 4/22 at Oakland)...reached double-digit wins for the seventh time in his career (also 2013-15, '17-19).
- ▶ Took the loss on 7/29 at Tampa Bay (5.1IP, 6H, 8R/7ER, 2BB, 10K, 1HR)...his 8R allowed were the second-most runs he has ever allowed in his career (9R on 4/20/19 at Texas)...his 7ER allowed matched the second-most he has ever allowed, trailing only his 8ER on 4/20/19 at Texas...recorded his fourth straight double-digit strikeout game at the Trop, the longest such stretch by a visiting player at the venue...is tied for the second-longest such streak at the Trop by any player, trailing only Tyler Glasnow's six-game streak (4/12/21-present).
- ▶ Was placed on the COVID-19 injured list on 8/3 and reinstated on 8/16, missing 12 team games.
- ▶ After being reinstated from the COVID i.L. on 8/16, went 5-1 with a 1.35 ERA (33.1IP, 5ER) and 48K in his next six starts (8/16-9/14).
- ▶ Won four straight starts from 8/16-9/1 for the first time since winning eight consecutive starts from 9/8/19-8/3/20...posted a 0.73 ERA (24.2IP, 2ER) with 39K in that span.
- ▶ Posted a career-long 21.2 scoreless inning streak from 8/16-9/1, the longest scoreless streak by a Yankee in 2021 and the longest by a Yankee since CC Sabathia's 23.2 scoreless inning streak in 2011...was the ninth-longest scoreless streak in the Majors in 2021.
- ▶ Tossed 6.0 scoreless innings and earned the win on 8/21 vs. Minnesota, his sixth scoreless start of the season.
- ▶ Struck out Sean Murphy swinging in the sixth inning on 8/27 at Oakland to record his 200th strikeout of the season...was the 16th Yankee (19th time) to record at least 200K in a season and first since Luis Severino (2017-18)...reached the milestone in 24 starts, the fastest Yankee in franchise history to accomplish the feat (previous: David Cone - 25 starts in 1997)...tossed 6.0 scoreless innings, his seventh scoreless start of the season.
- ▶ Struck out a season-high 15 batters on 9/1 at Los Angeles-AL (7.0IP, 4H, 1ER, 0BB, 0HR)...became just the eighth Yankee in franchise history to record 15K in a game, joining Masahiro Tanaka (15K in 7.0IP on 9/29/17 vs. Toronto), Michael Pineda (16K in 7.0IP on 5/10/15 vs. Baltimore), David Wells (16K in 9.0IP on 7/30/97 vs. Oakland), David Cone (16K in 8.0IP on 6/23/97 at Detroit), Ron Guidry (18K in 9.0IP on 6/17/78 vs. California), Whitey Ford (15K in 14.0IP on 4/22/59 at Washington-AL) and Bob Shawkey (15K in 9.0IP on 9/27/19 at Philadelphia-AL-Game 2)...was just the third Yankee in franchise history to record at least 15K without surrendering a walk, joining Pineda and Tanaka...marked his third career game with at least 15K (also 16K on 5/4/18 at Arizona with Houston and 15K on 9/8/19 vs. Seattle with Houston).
- ▶ Left his start on 9/7 vs. Toronto with left hamstring tightness (L, 3.2IP, 5H, 3R/2ER, 2BB, 2K, 1HR, 1BK).
- ▶ Took the loss in the Yankees' 11-1 defeat on 9/19 vs. Cleveland, allowing a season-high-tying 7ER in 5.2 innings (10H, 1BB, 7K, 2HR, 1HP)...marked just the sixth time in his career that he has allowed 7ER in a game...allowed a season-high 10H, his most in a game since 6/30/17 vs. San Francisco (also 10H)...marked just the 10th time in his career that he has allowed double-digit hits...recorded his 231st strikeout of the season with his strikeout of Andrés Giménez in the sixth inning...surpassed Luis Severino (230K in 31GS in 2017) and CC Sabathia (230K in 33GS in 2011) for third place on the Yankees single-season strikeout list.
- ▶ In his final regular season start on 9/29 at Toronto, struck out Teoscar Hernández in the third inning to surpass Jack Chesbro's 239K in 1904 for second place on the single-season strikeout list in franchise history.
- ▶ Started the AL Wild Card Game at Boston and took the loss, allowing 3ER in 2.0IP (4H, 2BB, 3K, 2HR).

- ▶ In his first year with the Yankees, went 7-3 with two complete games and a 2.84 ERA (73.0IP, 53H, 27R/23ER, 17BB, 94K, 14HR) in 12 starts...opponents hit .197 (53-for-269, 14HR); LH .191 (21-for-110, 9HR); RH .201 (32-for-159, 5HR).
- ▶ Placed fourth in AL Cy Young Award voting and received 50 total points, including two second place votes and six third place votes...was named to the 2020 All-MLB Second Team.
- ▶ Among Major League leaders, tied for third in wins (7, tied for second in AL), tied for fifth in starts (12, tied for second in AL), ranked sixth in strikeouts (94, third in AL), seventh in opponents' BA (.197, fourth in AL) and WHIP (0.96, fourth in AL), eighth in K/9.0IP (11.59, third in AL), ninth in K/BB (5.53, fifth in AL), tied for 10th in BB/9.0IP (2.10, sixth in AL) and 12th in ERA (2.84, sixth in AL).
- ▶ His 97.1 average fastball velocity was the best in the AL (tied for fourth in the Majors) among qualified pitchers (FanGraphs).

- ▶ Made his Yankees debut and second career Opening Day start on 7/23 at Washington (also 2017 for Pittsburgh), earning the win in the Yankees' 4-1 rain-shortened victory...was the Yankees third different Opening Day starter in three years (Luis Severino in 2018 and Masahiro Tanaka in 2019)...was credited with a complete-game one-hitter (5.0IP, 1H, 1ER, 1BB, 5K, 1HR, 1HP)...was his third career complete game (also 9.0IP on 7/27/16 vs. Seattle w/ Pittsburgh and 9.0IP on 5/4/18 at Arizona w/ Houston).
- ▶ Made his Yankees home debut on 8/3 vs. Philadelphia and earned the win (6.0IP, 5H, 1ER, 1BB, 4K, 1HR).
- ▶ Collected his 36th career double-digit strikeout game and first as a Yankee in Game 1 on 8/8 at Tampa Bay, allowing 3ER with 10K in 4.2IP (6H, 1BB, 1HR) without recording a decision...became only the second pitcher in franchise history to record at least 10K without completing 5.0IP (also Masahiro Tanaka with 10K in 4.0IP on 6/17/17 at Oakland)...was his shortest career 10K start.
- ▶ Had his 20-game winning streak snapped in Game 1 on 8/26 at Atlanta...was part of a 28-start undefeated stretch from 5/27/19-8/19/20, during which he went 20-0 with a 1.97 ERA (182.2IP, 114H, 43R/40ER, 37BB, 270K, 25HR)...was tied for the third-longest winning streak in Baseball history, the longest since Chicago-NL's Jake Arrieta also won 20 consecutive decisions from 8/4/15-5/25/16...his 28-start undefeated streak was tied with Kris Medlen (2009-12) and Dave McNally (1968-69) for the second-longest in Major League history...only Roger Clemens (30GS from 1998-99) had a longer undefeated streak as a starter.
- ▶ His loss in Game 1 on 8/26 at Atlanta (5.0IP, 5H, 5ER, 2BB, 9K, 3HR) was his first loss since 5/22/19 vs. Chicago-AL...allowed a leadoff HR to Ronald Acuña Jr., his fifth leadoff HR allowed in his career...his 3HR allowed matched a career high (fifth time, first since 7/12/19 at Texas)...his 5R were his most in a game since 5/22/19 vs. Chicago-AL (6R)...his loss also snapped his career-best nine-game winning streak on the road (4/30/19-7/29/20)...was the longest road winning streak by a starting pitcher in the Majors since Shane Bieber's nine-game winning streak from 6/27/18-4/16/19...also snapped a career-best 15-game undefeated streak on the road...went 9-0 with a 1.83 ERA (93.1IP, 19ER) in those 15 starts.
- ▶ Lost three straight starts from 8/26(G1)-9/5, matching the second-longest losing streak of his career (five losses from 8/7/16-4/3/17)...was just his fourth time recording a loss in three consecutive starts (also 7/4-14/13, 8/24/16-4/3/17 and 7/30-8/10/18)...allowed at least 4R in each of those three games, tied for the second-longest such streak of his career (allowed 4R in four straight starts from 5/22-6/8/17)...allowed 14R/10ER over that three-game stretch (5.63 ERA) after allowing only 11ER in his first six starts of the season (2.75 ERA).
- ▶ Allowed at least 1HR in a career-high 10-straight games from 9/29/19-9/5/20...was one of two pitchers in franchise history to allow at least 1HR in each of his first nine games of a season (also Phil Hughes, 12 straight to begin 2012)...of his 27R allowed in 2020, 18 came via the homer (10 solo HRs and four two-run HRs).
- ▶ Went 3-1 with a 1.00 ERA (27.0IP, 3ER) with 34K in four September starts...posted the second-lowest ERA in the Majors during the month of September (min. 25.0IP) and the lowest ERA by Yankees pitcher in a calendar month (min. 25.0IP) since Hiroki Kuroda's 0.55 ERA (33.0IP, 2ER) in July 2013...was only the ninth Yankee in franchise history to record a 1.00 ERA or lower and at least 30K in a single calendar month (min. 25.0IP), joining CC Sabathia (0.92 ERA and 50K in July 2011), David Cone (0.69 ERA and 35K in July 1998), Ron Gaudry (0.96 ERA and 36K in September 1978), Al Downing (0.92 ERA and 33K in August 1969), Whitey Ford (0.90 ERA and 33K in September 1963), Red Ruffing (1.00 ERA and 33K in May 1938), Lefty Gomez (0.60 ERA and 34K in September 1937) and Johnny Allen (0.99 ERA and 31K in July 1935).
- ▶ Tossed at least 6.0IP and allowed 1ER-or-fewer in his final four regular season starts from 9/5-22, only the third Yankee (fourth time) since 2001 to do so in four consecutive appearances (Masahiro Tanaka - 4G from 4/18-6/19/15; CC Sabathia - 5G from 6/20-7/11/10 and 6/25-7/16/11).
- ▶ Tossed at least 7.0IP and allowed 1R-or-fewer in each of his final three regular season starts...was only the third Yankee (fourth time) since 2005 to accomplish the feat, joining CC Sabathia (5G, 6/25-7/16/11) and Iván Nova (3G from 6/6-17/12 and 7/27-8/9/13).
- ▶ Including the postseason, went 5-1 with a 1.79 ERA (45.1IP, 9ER) and 64K in his final seven starts from 9/5-10/9 (four in the regular season, three in the postseason).
- ▶ Struck out 10 batters on 9/5 at Baltimore, his 38th career double-digit strikeout game and third of 2020...struck out each of his first four batters faced, five of his first six and eight of his first nine...retired his first 11BF...struck out Pedro Severino (looking) to lead off the second inning for his 1,400th career strikeout.

- ▶ Earned his 100th career win (in his 203rd game) on 9/16 vs. Toronto, becoming the 38th pitcher in Baseball history to reach 100 wins within his first 203 career games and just the fourth to do so since 2000 (also Mark Mulder, Roy Oswalt and Justin Verlander)...did not allow a hit until a Jonathan Villar double to lead off the sixth inning...retired 15 of his first 16 batters faced (1BB).

- ▶ Made his Yankees postseason debut in AL Wild Card Series Game 1 vs. Cleveland, striking out 13 batters to earn the win (7.0IP, 6H, 2ER, 0BB, 1HR, 1WP)...marked his third career postseason game with at least 12K, the most by a pitcher in Major League history...was the second-highest total by a Yankee in a postseason game, trailing only Roger Clemens' 15K in 2000 ALCS Game 4 at Seattle...was just the second pitcher in Major League history to record at least 13K and not issue a walk in a postseason game (also Tom Seaver's 13K and 0BB in 1973 NLCS Game 1 at Cincinnati)...his 13K were the most by a pitcher in his Yankees postseason debut (previous: 10K by Dave Righetti in 1981 ALDS Game 2 at Milwaukee and 10K by Red Ruffing in 1932 World Series Game 1 vs. Chicago-NL)...was only the second Yankee since 2004 to record double-digit strikeouts in a postseason game (also Hiroki Kuroda's 11K in 2012 ALCS Game 2 vs. Detroit)...marked his second career postseason game with at least 13K (also 15K in 2019 ALDS Game 2 vs. Tampa Bay), becoming the second pitcher in Major League history to record at least 13K in two postseason games (also Bob Gibson: 13K in 1964 World Series Game 5 at the Yankees and 17K in 1968 World Series Game 1 vs. Detroit).
- ▶ Earned the win in ALDS Game 1 at Tampa Bay in San Diego (6.0IP, 6H, 3ER, 2BB/1BB, 8K, 2HR)...was his eighth career postseason win in his 12th career postseason appearance...according to STATS, joined Orlando Hernández (nine wins) as the only pitchers in Major League history to earn at least eight wins in their first 12 playoff appearances.
- ▶ Started on short rest for the first time in his career in ALDS Game 5, allowing his only hit in 5.1IP on a fifth-inning solo HR by Austin Meadows (1H, 1ER, 2BB, 9K, 1HR, 1HP)...his 9K were tied for the second-most by a Yankee in a "winner take all" game behind only Roger Clemens (10K in 2001 World Series Game 7 at Arizona)...was the first pitcher in Major League history to record at least 9K and allow 1H-or-fewer in a "winner take all" game...his strikeout of Austin Meadows to start the game was the 100th strikeout of his postseason career, becoming the fastest to 100K in the postseason in Major League history (79.0IP), surpassing the Dodgers' Clayton Kershaw (80.0IP)...was later matched by Walker Buehler in 2021 (also 79.0IP).

- ▶ In his second year with Houston, finished second in American League Cy Young Award voting after going 20-5 with an AL-best 2.50 ERA (212.1IP, 142H, 66R/59ER, 48BB, 326K, 29HR) in 33 starts...set career highs in wins, innings pitched and strikeouts...posted a 2.64 FIP (FanGraphs)...opponents hit .186 (142-for-762, 29HR); LH .175 (67-for-383, 17HR); RH .198 (75-for-379, 12HR).
- ▶ Led Major League pitchers in strikeouts, K/9.0IP ratio (13.82), strikeout rate (39.9%) and WAR (7.4, FanGraphs), while ranking second in wins and WHIP (0.89) and fourth in innings...led the AL in ERA and opponent OPS (.579) and ranked second in opponents' BA.
- ▶ Was one of five starting pitchers named to the inaugural All-MLB First Team.
- ▶ Was named to his third All-Star team, but did not pitch in the AL's 4-3 win in Cleveland.
- ▶ His 326K were an Astros single-season record and the 14th-highest total in Baseball's Modern Era (since 1900)...was just the sixth pitcher in that span to reach the mark, joining Randy Johnson (5x), Nolan Ryan (5x), Bob Feller, Sandy Koufax and Rube Waddell...marked the Majors' highest strikeout total since Arizona's Randy Johnson (334) in 2002 and the highest by an AL pitcher since California's Nolan Ryan (341) in 1977...was the third pitcher in Astros history to record 300K in a season, following J.R. Richard (313 in 1979; 303 in 1978) and Mike Scott (306 in 1986); was joined by Justin Verlander (300K) in 2019.

- ▶ Set a Major League record with a 13.82 K/9.0IP ratio (326K/212.1IP), surpassing Arizona's Randy Johnson (13.41) in 2001...was surpassed by Shane Bieber's 14.20 K/9.0IP (122K/77.1IP) in an abbreviated 60-game season in 2020...marked the fewest innings in a 300-strikeout season in Baseball history.
- ▶ Became the fourth pitcher in Major League history to notch double-digit strikeouts at least 21 times in one season, joining Arizona's Randy Johnson (23 in 1999, 23 in 2000, 23 in 2001), Los Angeles-NL's Sandy Koufax (21 in 1965) and California's Nolan Ryan (23 in 1973)...beginning 8/7, became the first pitcher ever to compile a streak of nine consecutive double-digit-strikeout performances...recorded at least 10K with 0BB a Major League-record seven times.

- ▶ Finished runner-up in AL Cy Young Award voting to teammate Justin Verlander (171-159)...Verlander received 17 first-place and 13 second-place votes, while Cole received 13 first-place and 17 second-place votes...marked the fifth time in Cy Young Award history that teammates occupied the first two places, also Arizona's Randy Johnson (winner) and Curt Schilling (runner-up) in both 2001 and 2002, the Los Angeles Dodgers' Mike Marshall (winner) and Andy Messersmith (runner-up) in 1974, and the Brooklyn Dodgers' Don Newcombe (winner) and Sal Maglie (runner-up; acquired midseason from Cleveland) in 1956.
- ▶ Took home three of the AL's six "Pitcher of the Month" Awards in 2019, in June, July and September...was the third AL pitcher in five years to take home three "Pitcher of the Month" awards in one season, following Cleveland's Corey Kluber in 2017 and Houston's Dallas Keuchel in 2015.
- ▶ Held left-handed hitters to .175/.235/.352 (67-for-383) with 17HR, 30BB and 182K...his 43.6% strikeout rate vs. lefties is the highest by any pitcher since data was first tracked in 1974 (min. 300BF), eclipsing his own mark of 41.1% in 2018.
- ▶ According to Statcast, threw 1,048 fastballs of at least 97.0 mph, second-most in the Majors to the Mets' Noah Syndergaard (1,392)...registered a 97.2 mph average velocity on the pitch (FanGraphs), second to Syndergaard (97.7) among qualified Major League pitchers.
- ▶ Allowed one-or-zero runs in 17-of-33 starts, tied with St. Louis's Jack Flaherty for the most in the Majors (excluding "openers").
- ▶ Surrendered a career-high 9R and 8ER over 4.1IP in 4/20 loss at Texas...had gone his first 36 starts as an Astro without allowing more than 4R, tying Philadelphia's Tommy Greene (1990-92) for the longest streak by a pitcher to start his tenure with a club in Major League history (excluding "openers")...the streak was later surpassed by Sonny Gray's 38-start streak to begin his tenure with Cincinnati from 2019-20.
- ▶ In 4/30 win at Minnesota, allowed 1H with 11K over 7.0 scoreless innings (3BB, 1WP)...was the ninth game in Astros history with at least 7.0 scoreless innings, 11K and 1H-or-fewer.
- ▶ With 65K in his first seven starts (3/29-4/30), tied Philadelphia's Curt Schilling (1998) for the most strikeouts prior to May in Major League history...has since been surpassed.
- ▶ Was named the AL "Pitcher of the Month" for June after going 3-0 with a 1.89 ERA (38.0IP, 8ER) in six starts...was his second career "Pitcher of the Month" award (also April 2015 with Pittsburgh)...was named the AL "Pitcher of the Month" for July after going 4-0 with a 1.85 ERA (34.0IP, 7ER) in five starts, his second consecutive "Pitcher of the Month" award.
- ▶ In 7/22 win vs. Oakland, recorded 11K to reach 200K on the season (in 133.1IP), the second-fewest innings needed to reach 200 strikeouts in a season in Major League history, trailing only Arizona's Randy Johnson (130.2IP in 2001).
- ▶ Was scratched from his scheduled start on 8/13 at Chicago-AL with right hamstring discomfort...missed two turns in the rotation but did not go on the I.L.

- ▶ Was named AL "Pitcher of the Month" for September after going 5-0 with a 1.07 ERA (42.0IP, 20H, 6R/5ER, 7BB, 74K, 4HR) in six starts...his 74K were tied for the 10th-highest total in a calendar month in the Modern Era (since 1900), and the second-most since 1978 (Chicago-AL's Chris Sale-75K in June 2015)...were the most strikeouts in a month without a loss in Baseball history (previously Boston's Pedro Martinez-70K in September 1999).
- ▶ In a 21-1 win on 9/8 vs. Seattle, celebrated his 29th birthday by recording a season-high 15 strikeouts over 8.0IP (1H, 1ER, 1HR, 0BB)...was the second-highest total of his career (16K on 5/4/18 at Arizona w/ Houston)...his only base runner allowed was a one-out solo HR in the fourth by Shed Long...set a Major League record for strikeouts on a pitcher's birthday, surpassing the 14K by Arizona's Randy Johnson on 9/10/00 at Florida...was one of three double-digit-strikeout performances by a pitcher on his birthday during the 2010s, also Washington's Max Scherzer (11K on 7/27/18 at Miami) and the Angels' Dan Haren (10K on 9/17/10 at Tampa Bay)...joined St. Louis' Chris Carpenter (12K, 0BB on 4/27/05 vs. Milwaukee) as the only two pitchers ever to record at least 10K with 0BB on his birthday...was the first Astros starter to earn a win on his birthday since Roy Oswalt on 8/29/07 vs. St. Louis...was the first pitcher ever to receive at least 20R of support on his birthday.
- ▶ On 8/28 vs. Tampa Bay (6.2IP, 4ER, 14K), 9/2 at Milwaukee (6.0IP, 1ER, 14K) and 9/8 vs. Seattle (8.0IP, 1ER, 15K), became the second pitcher in Major League history to record at least 14K in three consecutive starts, joining Boston's Pedro Martinez from 9/4-15/99 (15K, 17K, 14K)...according to *Elias*, became the first pitcher since 1893 to record at least 14K in fewer than 7.0IP in consecutive games...the 9/2 start came one day after Justin Verlander's 14-strikeout no-hitter, making the duo the first pair of teammates in Major League history to register at least 14K in consecutive games.
- ▶ From 8/22-9/8 became the first pitcher in Astros history and fourth in Major League history to record at least 12K in four consecutive starts (Pedro Martinez-3x, Randy Johnson, Chris Sale).
- ▶ Was named AL "Player of the Week" for 9/23-29 after earning wins on 9/24 at Seattle (7.0IP, 2H, 0R, 0BB, 14K) and 9/29 at Los Angeles-AL (5.0IP, 4H, 1ER, 2BB, 10K, 1HR)...was his first career weekly award.
- ▶ In 9/24 win at Seattle, surpassed J.R. Richard's 1979 Houston franchise record of 313 strikeouts.

- ▶ Went 4-1 with a 1.72 ERA (36.2IP, 21H, 7ER, 11BB, 47K, 4HR) in five postseason starts to lead Houston to the American League pennant...tied the AL record for strikeouts in a postseason (also Texas's Cliff Lee in 2010)...is tied for the second-highest strikeout total by any pitcher in a postseason behind Arizona's Curt Schilling's 56K in 2001...opponents hit .165 (21-for-127).

- ▶ In ALDS Game 5 win vs. Tampa Bay, earned the series-clinching victory with a postseason career-high 8.0IP (2H, 1ER, 2BB, 10K, 1HR)...allowed his only run on a solo HR by Eric Sogard in the second inning...became the third pitcher to complete 8.0IP and allow 2H-or-fewer in a winner-take-all postseason game, joining Kansas City's Johnny Cueto (8.0IP, 2H, 2ER, 0BB, 8K, 1HR) in 2015 ALDS Game 5 vs. Houston and Detroit's Justin Verlander (8.0IP, 2H, 0R, 1BB, 10K) in 2013 ALDS Game 5 at Oakland.
- ▶ In ALCS Game 3 win at the Yankees, tossed 7.0 scoreless innings (4H, 5BB, 7K) to earn his 19th consecutive win (regular season and postseason), a Major League record...his 5BB tied his regular season career high...snapped his streak of 11 consecutive starts (reg. season and postseason) with double-digit strikeouts...became the third Astros pitcher to win each of his first three starts of a postseason, joining Justin Verlander (first 4GS in 2017) and Roy Oswalt (2005), and the first to do so while allowing 1R-or-fewer in all three.

- ▶ In his first season with Houston, went 15-5 with a 2.88 ERA (200.1IP, 143H, 68R/64ER, 64BB, 276K, 19HR) in 32 starts...opponents hit .198 (143-for-723, 19HR); LH .162 (56-for-346, 7HR); RH .231 (87-for-377, 12HR)...had a 6.0 WAR (FanGraphs) and 2.70 FIP.
- ▶ Finished fifth in AL Cy Young voting...led the Majors in K/9.0IP ratio (12.40)...ranked second in the AL in strikeouts, strikeout rate (34.5%), opponents' BA and WAR, tied for third in winning percentage (.750), fourth in ERA and WHIP (1.03), tied for fourth in quality starts (20) and fifth in innings pitched.
- ▶ Was named to his second career All-Star team, his first in the AL...did not pitch in the AL's 8-6 win in Washington.
- ▶ His 276K were 74 more than his previous career high (202K in 2015)...he and Justin Verlander (290K in 2018) were the third and fourth pitchers in Astros history to eclipse 275K in a season, following J.R. Richard (313 in 1979, 303 in 1978) and Mike Scott (306 in 1986)...set a then-franchise record for K/9.0IP ratio (12.40), topping Nolan Ryan's 11.48 in 1987...was the then-third-best mark in AL history, behind Boston's Pedro Martinez (13.20 in 1999) and Boston's Chris Sale (12.93 in 2017).
- ▶ Was the fifth pitcher in Astros history to post an opponents' BA under .200, joining Mike Scott (.186 in 1986), Nolan Ryan (.188 in 1981, .188 in 1986, .195 in 1983), J.R. Richard (.196 in 1978) and Roger Clemens (.198 in 2005).
- ▶ Held left-handed hitters to .162/.250/.269 (56-for-346) with 7HR, 38BB and 160K...at the time, was the fourth-lowest opponents' BA vs. lefties (min. 300AB) since 1974, when data was first available...the only pitchers with lower marks are Boston's Pedro Martinez (.150 in 2000), Chicago-NL's Jake Arrieta (.159 in 2015) and Milwaukee's Mike Caldwell (.160 in 1978)...his 41.1% strikeout rate vs. left-handed hitters surpassed Pedro Martinez (33.0% in 1999) for the Majors' highest mark in that span (min. 300BF), which he then broke himself in 2019 (43.6%).

- ▶ Set an Astros record for strikeouts over a pitcher's first three games with the club (36K), besting the previous record of 33K held by Randy Johnson in 1998...according to STATS Inc., marked the second-highest strikeout total over a pitcher's first three games of a season in the live-ball era (since 1920), behind California's Nolan Ryan (37K in 1973)...his 41K set a club record for strikeouts through any pitcher's first four starts of a season, and was tied for the fourth-most over a pitcher's first four starts with a team in Major League history (Arizona's Randy Johnson-44K in 1999, Boston's Pedro Martinez-44K in 1998, Boston's Chris Sale-42K in 2017, Washington's Stephen Strasburg-41K in 2010)...per *Elias*, his 61K were tied for the third-most over a pitcher's first six starts with a team in Major League history (Arizona's Johnson-63K in 1999, Boston's Sale-63K in 2017, Houston's Johnson-61K in 1998)...his 77K set a Major League record for strikeouts over a pitcher's first seven starts with a team...his 93K were the third-most over a pitcher's first nine starts with a team in Major League history (Houston's Johnson-96K in 1998, Boston's Sale-95K in 2017)...his 101K were tied for the second-most over a pitcher's first 10 starts with a team in Major League history (Houston's Johnson-108K in 1998, Boston's Sale-101K in 2017).
- ▶ Went 10-2 with a 2.52 ERA (128.1IP, 81H, 39R/36ER, 45BB, 177K, 14HR) in 20 starts before the All-Star break...set a franchise record for strikeouts prior to the break (prev. Mike Scott-167K in 1986).
- ▶ Made his Astros debut in 4/1 win at Texas (7.0IP, 2H, 1ER, 3BB, 11K, 1HR)...per *Elias*, became the fourth pitcher in Astros history to record 11 strikeouts in his Astros debut (J.R. Richard-15K on 9/5/71-G2 at San Francisco, Randy Johnson-12K on 8/2/98 at Pittsburgh, Collin McHugh-12K on 4/22/14 at Seattle).
- ▶ In his Astros home debut on 4/7 vs. San Diego, recorded 11K over 7.0 scoreless innings (5H, 0BB)...became the first pitcher to have 11K in each of his first two starts with Houston...his 22K are a club record for a pitcher's first two starts with the Astros...became the first Astros pitcher to post 11K in back-to-back games since Wade Miller from 4/5-11/01.



- ▶ In his third start on 4/13 vs. Texas (7.0IP, 3H, 2ER, 1BB, 14K, 2HR, 1HP), recorded 14K for the first time in his career. ...tied the then-record for strikeouts by an Astros pitcher at Minute Maid Park...became the first Major League pitcher since pitch count data was first tracked to strike out at least 14 batters on 93 pitches or fewer...joined California's Nolan Ryan (1973) as the only pitchers in Major League history (at the time) to start a season with at least 11K in three consecutive games...was later surpassed by Shane Bieber (first 4GS in 2021)...was the fourth pitcher in Astros history to record 11K in three consecutive starts at any point in a season.
- ▶ Set the then-AL strikeout record for April with 61K, topping the previous April of 60K set by Boston's Roger Clemens in 1988...was just the seventh time a pitcher tallied at least 60K in April, also Randy Johnson (4x: 64K in 2000, 63K in 1999, 61K in 2002, 61K in 2001), Clemens and Curt Schilling (61K in 2002)...became the fourth Astros pitcher with 61K in a single calendar month, joining Randy Johnson (61K in Aug. 1998), J.R. - ▶ Compiled a 19.0-inning scoreless streak from 4/1-13.
- ▶ From 4/1-5/9, became the first pitcher to start his tenure with the Astros with eight straight quality starts.
- ▶ Threw his first career shutout on 5/4 at Arizona, striking 16-of-29 batters and allowing just one hit (Chris Owings double in the fifth) and one walk (David Peralta in the fourth)...marked his second career complete game...threw 114 pitches (82 strikes)...struck out six consecutive batters in the second and third, and 9-of-10 from the second through fourth...retired his final 14 batters...set a career high in strikeouts, tied for the second-most in Astros history (Don Wilson-18K on 7/14/68-G1 at Cincinnati, Randy Johnson-16K on 8/28/98 vs. Pittsburgh, Nolan Ryan-16K on 9/9/87 vs. San Francisco, Don Wilson-16K on 9/10/68-G1 at Cincinnati)...marked the 10th game in Major League history that a pitcher recorded at least 16K with 1H-or-fewer in a shutout (also Nolan Ryan-4x, Max Scherzer-2x, Brandon Morrow, Curt Schilling, Kerry Wood)...went 0-for-5 with 5K at the plate, the 16th pitcher since 1900 to strike out five times in a game and first since Chicago-NL's Ted Lilly (0-for-5, 5K) on 6/30/08 at San Francisco.
- ▶ Won seven consecutive decisions from 5/4-6/24, the third-longest winning streak of his career.
- ▶ Recorded his 1,000th career strikeout on 9/21/18 vs. Los Angeles-AL (Kaleb Cowart in the third)...reached the mark in his 158th career game...at the time, only 12 pitchers all-time had hit the milestone in fewer games: Kerry Wood, Tim Lincecum, Corey Kluber, Roger Clemens, Stephen Strasburg, Hideo Nomo, Dwight Gooden, Randy Johnson, Clayton Kershaw, Chris Archer, Frank Tanana and Yu Darvish.
- ▶ Made two postseason starts, going 1-1 with a 3.46 ERA (13.0IP, 9H, 6R/5ER, 2BB, 17K, 1HR)...in ALDS Game 2 win vs. Cleveland (7.0IP, 3H, 1ER, 0BB, 12K, 1HR), became the second pitcher in postseason history to record at least 12K with 0BB, joining New York-NL's Tom Seaver in 1973 NLCS Game 1 at Cincinnati (8.1IP, 6H, 2ER, 0BB, 13K, 2HR)...his lone run allowed was a solo HR by Francisco Lindor in the third...took the loss in ALCS Game 2 at Boston (6.0IP, 5R/4ER).

- ▶ Was acquired by Houston in exchange for RHP Michael Feliz, OF Jason Martin, INF Colin Moran and RHP Joe Musgrove on 1/13/18.

- ▶ Went 7-10 with a 3.88 ERA (116.0IP, 131H, 57R/50ER, 36BB, 98K, 7HR) in 21 starts with the Pirates...opponents hit .289 (131-for-454, 7HR); LH .329 (70-for-213, 3HR); RH .253 (61-for-241, 4HR)...had a 2.5 WAR (FanGraphs) and 3.33 FIP.
- ▶ In 5/26 win vs. Arizona, went 2-for-2 with a three-run HR in the second off Patrick Corbin, his second career HR...added a double in the fourth, the first Pirates pitcher with six total bases in a game since Danny Darwin on 5/29/96 vs. Houston.
- ▶ Left his 6/10 start vs. St. Louis (2.0IP, 0R) in the third inning due to right arm discomfort...was placed on the 15-day D.L. on 6/14 (retro to 6/11) with a strained right triceps...made two rehab starts with Triple-A Indianapolis, tossing 8.0 scoreless innings (4H, 0BB, 12K)...was reinstated on 7/16.
- ▶ Recorded his 500th career strikeout in 7/16 loss at Washington (Bryce Harper in the third).



- ▶ Tossed his first career complete game in just 93 pitches on 7/27 vs. Seattle (9.0IP, 3H, 1ER, 0BB, 6K, 1HP).
- ▶ Went a career-best 10 consecutive starts without surrendering a home run from 5/26-8/13...the homerless streak totaled 60.0IP from the seventh inning on 5/20 to the fifth inning on 8/19.
- ▶ Was placed on the 15-day D.L. on 8/29 (retro to 8/25) with posterior inflammation of his right elbow...was reinstated on 9/12...made one start on 9/12 at Philadelphia (2.0IP, 5ER) and was placed on the 60-day D.L. on 9/13, missing the remainder of the season.

- ▶ Went 19-8 with a 2.60 ERA (208.0IP, 183H, 71R/60ER, 44BB, 202K, 11HR) in 32 starts with the Pirates...opponents hit .239 (183-for-765, 11HR); LH .227 (85-for-374, 5HR); RH .251 (98-for-391, 6HR)...had a 5.1 WAR (FanGraphs) and 2.66 FIP.
- ▶ Finished fourth in AL Cy Young Award balloting...tied for second in the NL in wins and ranked fifth in ERA, seventh in innings and 10th in strikeouts...was one of three finalists for the Rawlings Gold Glove Award for NL pitchers.
- ▶ Was named to his first National League All-Star Team...pitched a scoreless third inning in the NL's 6-3 loss in Cincinnati, striking out Mike Trout and walking Josh Donaldson.
- ▶ He and teammate Francisco Liriano (205K in 2015) became the fifth and sixth pitchers in Pirates history to post a 200-strikeout season, also Bob Veale (4x: 1964-66, '69), Ed Morris (2x: 1885-86), A.J. Burnett (2013) and Oliver Pérez (2004)...joined Burnett as the first two right-handers to do it.
- ▶ His 19 wins were the most by a Pittsburgh pitcher since John Smiley (20-8) in 1991, and the most by a right-hander since Doug Drabek (22-6) in 1990.
- ▶ Was named National League "Pitcher of the Month" for April after going 4-0 with a 1.76 ERA (30.2IP, 22H, 8R/6ER, 8BB, 35K, 1HR) in five starts...was his second career monthly award, and his first "Pitcher of the Month" honor...was the first Pittsburgh pitcher to win the award since Randy Tomlin in June 1992.
- ▶ Became the 2015 season's first 10-game winner on 6/13 vs. Philadelphia (6.0IP, 2R/1ER)...was the first Pirate to earn his 10th win prior to 6/14 of a season since Bob Friend on 6/8/56 and the first to record 10 wins in the team's first 61 games since Vernon Law in Game 56 in 1960.
- ▶ Won six consecutive starts from 5/22-6/18.
- ▶ Prior to the All-Star break, was 13-3 with a 2.30 ERA (117.1IP, 30ER) in 18 starts...was the third Pirate to lead the Majors in wins at the All-Star break, joining Roy Face (12-0, tied for lead) in 1959 and Rip Sewell (12-2) in 1943...became just the second Pittsburgh pitcher to win 13 games prior to the All-Star break, also Dock Ellis (14-3 in 1971).
- ▶ Took the loss in the NL Wild Card Game vs. Chicago-NL (5.0IP, 4ER).
- ▶ Received the Steve Blass Award, given by the Pittsburgh chapter of the BBWAA to the team's most outstanding pitcher.

2014

- ▶ Made just 22 starts with Pittsburgh, going 11-5 with a 3.65 ERA (138.0IP, 127H, 58R/56ER, 40BB, 138K, 11HR)...opponents hit .248 (127-for-512, 11HR); LH .249 (60-for-241, 6HR); RH .247 (67-for-271, 5HR)...had a 2.1 WAR (FanGraphs) and 3.23 FIP.
- ▶ Was placed on the 15-day D.L. on 6/8 (retro. to 6/4) with right arm fatigue...was reinstated on 6/28.
- ▶ Was placed on the 15-day D.L. on 7/8 (retro. to 7/5) with right lat soreness...was reinstated on 8/20...made four rehab starts with Triple-A Indianapolis, logging a 3-1 record and 2.01 ERA (22.1IP, 5ER).
- ▶ In 9/7 win at Chicago-NL, hit his first career home run, a two-run HR off Blake Parker in the seventh.

2013

- ▶ Was selected to the Major League roster on 6/11 and made his Major League debut that night vs. San Francisco, earning the win (6.1IP, 7H, 2ER, 0BB, 2K)...struck out his first batter faced on three pitches (Gregor Blanco)...became the third Pirates pitcher since 1900 to toss at least 6.0 walk-less innings in his debut, joining Len Gilmore on 10/1/1944-G2 at Philadelphia and George Merritt on 9/6/1901 at the New York Giants.
- ▶ In his debut, hit a two-run single off Tim Lincecum in his first career at-bat in the second inning, his first hit since high school...became the fourth starting pitcher since RBI became an official stat in 1920 to earn a win and record at least 2RBI in his Major League debut (Colorado's Jason Jennings on 8/23/01 at New York-NL; Boston-NL's Jim Turner on 4/30/37 at Philadelphia-NL; Philadelphia-AL's George Caster on 9/10/34 at Cleveland).
- ▶ Became the first Pirates pitcher to start and win each of his first four Major League games since Nick Maddox in 1907...also won his final four starts of the season.
- ▶ In 7/23 win at Washington (7.0IP, 2H, 1ER, 1BB, 4K, 1HR, 1HP), also went 2-for-3 with 1RBI...was the first Pirates rookie starter to collect at least 2H while allowing 2H-or-fewer since Hank Gornicki on 8/27/42 vs. Boston-NL.



- ▶ Was the first Pirate since Joe Conzelman in 1913-14 to permit 3R-or-fewer in each of his first 10 career starts.
- ▶ Was named National League "Rookie of the Month" for September after going 4-0 with a 1.69 ERA (32.0IP, 24H, 6ER, 10BB, 39K, OHR) in five starts.
- ▶ In 9/19 win vs. San Diego (6.0IP, 4H, 1ER, 3BB, 12K), recorded his first career double-digit-strikeout effort... were the most strikeouts by a Pirates rookie since José DeLeón had 13K on 8/20/83 vs. Cincinnati.
- ▶ Earned the win in his postseason debut in NLDS Game 2 at St. Louis (6.0IP, 2H, 1ER, 1BB, 5K, 1HR)...also drove in the first run of the game with an second-inning RBI single...according to *Elias*, was the third rookie to record both a victory and a game-winning RBI in a postseason game, joining the Yankees' Spec Shea in 1947 World Series Game 5 at Brooklyn and St. Louis's Paul (Daffy) Dean in 1934 World Series Game 6 at Detroit...in his first career winner-take-all game, took the loss in NLDS Game 5 at St. Louis (5.0IP, 3H, 2ER, 1BB, 5K, 1HR).
- ▶ Was named to the *Baseball America* National League All-Rookie Team.
- ▶ Began the season with Triple-A Indianapolis and was 5-3 with a 2.91 ERA (68.0IP, 44H, 23R/22ER, 28BB, 47K, 4HR) in 12 starts.
- ▶ Entered the season ranked by *Baseball America* as the Pirates' No. 1 prospect and No. 7 prospect in Baseball...was also tabbed by MLB.com as the No. 9 overall prospect.





Former Yankee Allie Reynolds (pictured) is one of only five pitchers to record two regular-season no-hitters in the same season, accomplishing the feat in 1951...prior to Reynolds, Cincinnati's Johnny Vander Meer was the first pitcher to hurl two no-hitters in the same season, doing so in back-to-back starts in June 1938...Detroit's Virgil Trucks (1952), California's Nolan Ryan (1973) and Washington's Max Scherzer (2015) are the only other pitchers to match the record.

Reynolds' first no-hitter of the 1951 season came on July 12 vs. Cleveland...his second no-hitter, took place in Game 1 of a doubleheader on Sept. 28 vs. Boston in an 8-0 win...notably with the Yankees' subsequent victory in Game 2, they clinched the American League pennant.

- ▶ Won the NL Comeback Player of the Year award with the Atlanta Braves after batting .259 (142-for-549) with 96R, 33 doubles, 37HR, 94RBI and 100BB in 155 games...ranked seventh in the Majors (fourth in the NL) in walks, while ranking among NL leaders in home runs (tied for ninth).
- ▶ Became the 10th player (14th instance) with at least 90R, 30 doubles, 3HR, 90RBI and 100BB in his age-33 season or older, and the first since Cincinnati's Joey Votto in 2017.
- ▶ Tied for 10th in the Majors with a 50.0 hard hit percent, according to Statcast (min. 100 batted ball events)...also ranked eighth with a 92.9 mph average exit velocity (min. 200 occurrences).
- ▶ Drew 100BB for the second time in his career (also 109BB in 2016 with Toronto), the first triple-digit walk season for a Braves hitter since Chipper Jones in 2009 (101)...became one of seven players in Atlanta history (since 1966) to walk 100-or-more times in a season, joining Jones (1999, 2002, '09), J.D. Drew (2004), Dale Murphy (1987), Jeff Burroughs (1978), Jimmy Wynn (1976) and Darrell Evans (1973-75).



- ▶ According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, Donaldson's 37HR were the fifth-most homers hit by a player in his first season for the Braves in franchise history, trailing only are Andres Galarraga (44 in 1998), Davey Johnson (43 in 1973), Jeff Burroughs (41 in 1977) and Wally Berger (38 in 1930).
- ▶ His home run total ranked fourth in the Atlanta-era (since 1966) in a single season by a third baseman... only Chipper Jones (45 in 1999 and 38 in 2001) and Darrell Evans (41 in 1973) hit more home runs in a season among third basemen.
- ▶ Became the fifth player in Braves franchise history to hit 35HR and draw 100BB in a season, joining Chipper Jones (1999), Dale Murphy (1987), Darrell Evans (1973) and Eddie Mathews (1954-55, 1960).
- ▶ Committed 13 errors in 148 games at 3B (.969 fielding percentage), which ranked seventh among qualified third basemen...according to Fangraphs, his 15 defensive runs saved at 3B led the NL and ranked second in the Majors behind Oakland's Matt Chapman (18).
- ▶ 29 of his 37HR came after 6/10, when he was ejected after being hit by a pitch by Pittsburgh's Joe Musgrove... during that span, he ranked third in the National League and fifth in the Majors, trailing Cincinnati's Eugenio Suárez (35), New York-NL's Pete Alonso (32), Kansas City's Jorge Soler (31) and Minnesota's Nelson Cruz (30).
- ▶ Reached safely in 20 straight games from 6/29-7/24, hitting .288/.454/.697 (19-for-66) with 14R, 3 doubles, 8HR, 22RBI and 17BB over that stretch...marked his longest on-base streak since a 26 game streak from 6/21-7/23/16.
- ▶ It his 200th career HR on 7/7 off Miami's Trevor Richards, becoming one of 37 active players at the time to reach the 20HR milestone.
- ▶ Went 2-for-4 with 2R, 2HR and 4RBI on 7/12 at San Diego...hit a three-run in the first inning and a solo HR in the eighth...his solo HR also marked his 600th career RBI.
- ▶ Hit safely in 11 straight games from 7/29-8/8, batting .333/.458/.641 (13-for-39) with 6R, 3 doubles, 3HR, 6RBI and 9BB over that stretch...was tied for the second-longest hit streak of his career (12G from 8/21-9/3/16).

2018

- ▶ Split the season between the Toronto Blue Jays and Cleveland Indians, batting .246 (46-for-187) with 30R, 14 doubles, 8HR, 23RBI and 31BB in 52 combined games.
- ▶ Began the year with the Blue Jays, batting .234 (32-for-137) with 22R, 11 doubles, 5HR, 16RBI and 21BB in 36 games...16 of his 32 hits with Toronto went for extra-bases.
- ▶ Was placed on the 10-day disabled list on 4/13 (retroactive to 4/11) with right shoulder inflammation... appeared in two games with Single-A Dunedin before being reinstated on 5/3.
- ▶ Homered in both games of a doubleheader on 5/3 at Cleveland, his first two games after returning from the injured list...became the 11th Toronto batter to homer in both games of a doubleheader.
- ▶ Was placed on the 10-day disabled list from 5/29-8/31 with a left calf strain.
- ▶ Was acquired by the Cleveland Indians along with cash considerations on 8/31 in exchange for a player to be named later (RHP Julian Merryweather)...the trade occurred 20 minutes before the trade deadline.
- ▶ Finished with 106HR as a third baseman for the Blue Jays, 1HR shy of the Toronto record for most career homers by a third baseman (Kelly Gruber, 107).
- ▶ Appeared in 16 games for Cleveland, hitting .280 (14-for-50) with 8R, 3 doubles, 3HR, 7RBI and 10BB...made 12 starts at 3B and two at DH.
- ▶ Was again placed on the 10-day disabled list on 9/3 (retroactive to 9/1) and began a rehab assignment that day with Triple-A Columbus, hitting a grand slam in his first game off Toledo's Warwick Saupold.
- ▶ Was returned from rehab and reinstated from the injured list on 9/11, making his Indians debut that night (0-for-4).
- ▶ From 9/19 through the end of the season, batted .343/.465/.600 (12-for-35) with 6R, 3 doubles, 2HR, 6RBI and 8BB over 11 games.
- ▶ Hit his fifth career grand slam (second of the season) on 9/28 at Kansas City (also 4/9 at Baltimore).
- ▶ Played in all three games of the ALDS against Houston, batting .091 (1-for-11) with 1BB.

2017

- ▶ Hit .270 (112-for-415) with 65R, 21 doubles, 33HR, 78RBI and 76BB in 113 games with the Blue Jays.
- ▶ Hit at least 30 home runs for the third-straight year, becoming the only third baseman in Blue Jays history with multiple 30-or-more homer seasons (37HR in 2016, 41HR in 2015).
- ▶ Led the Majors with 15HR in the first inning (next: Giancarlo Stanton-14)...the last time a player had at least 15 first-inning homers was in 2001 (Alex Rodriguez – 18 and Sammy Sosa – 16).
- ▶ 18 of his 33 homers accounted for Toronto's first runs of the games.
- ▶ Led the AL with 11 game-winning home runs.
- ▶ Missed 38 games from 4/14-5/26 on the disabled list with a right calf injury, marking the first disabled list stint of his career...played in less than 155 games for the first time since 2012 (75G).
- ▶ Recorded a 15-game on-base streak from 5/29-6/16, hitting .352/.462/.741 (19-for-54) with 8R, 3 doubles, 6HR, 12RBI and 11BB over that stretch.
- ▶ Hit a home run into the fifth deck at Rogers Centre (435 feet) on 5/30 vs. Cincinnati, becoming the ninth different Blue Jay to accomplish the feat (11th time)...had been done last by Edwin Encarnacion on 4/21/15 vs. Baltimore.

- ▶ Hit 6HR over an 11-game span from 6/2-11.
- ▶ Led the AL with 24HR after the All-Star Break, the second most in Toronto history (Jose Bautista – 30 in 2010)... also ranked second in slugging percentage (.606) and OPS (.992), fourth in RBI (53) and walks (45), and sixth in total bases (154) after the break.
- ▶ Hit 12HR in August, tied for the most among AL hitters (also Baltimore's Manny Machado and the Yankees' Gary Sánchez)...the 12HR were his most ever in a month and tied for the most all-time by a Blue Jay in August (Jose Bautista-2010, Jose Cruz Jr.-2001, Carlos Delgado-1999).
- ▶ Matched his career-long streak with multiple hits in five-straight games 8/13-17.
- ▶ Hit a three-run home run on 8/15 vs. Tampa Bay...those 3RBI gave him 500 for his career...also marked his third consecutive game with a HR (8/13-15) for the second time in his last 15 games (also 7/31-8/2).
- ▶ Made his first career start at shortstop on 8/20 at Chicago-NL...became the first player to make his MLB debut as a catcher and later start at shortstop since 1971, when Ron Brand accomplished the feat with Montreal.
- ▶ Hit his 100th home run as a Blue Jay on 8/23 at Tampa Bay...was his sixth HR over a six-game span vs. the Rays... his 8HR vs. Tampa Bay in 2017 were the most by a Blue Jay against any opponent since Jose Bautista in 2014 vs. the Yankees (8HR).
- ▶ Collected 10H in the series from 9/14-17 at Minnesota to become the 13th Blue Jay with 10-or-more hits in a series (last: Adam Lind, 10H, 5/23-26/13 vs. Baltimore).
- ▶ Hit 5HR over a three-game span from 9/15-17...the last Toronto batter to hit that many homers over a three-game span was Edwin Encarnacion from 5/18-21/14.
- ▶ Recorded his 29th and 30th homers on 9/17 at Minnesota to become the third Blue Jay to record back-to-back multi-HR games (also Edwin Encarnacion, 5/20-21/14; Jesse Barfield, 9/1-2/83).

2016

- ▶ In 155 games with the Blue Jays, hit .284/.404/.549 (164-for-577) with 122R, 32 doubles, 5 triples, 37HR, 99RBI, 109BB and 75B...finished fourth (200 points) in the AL Most Valuable Player voting behind Mike Trout (356 points), Mookie Betts (311 points) and Jose Altuve (227 points)...earned his second consecutive AL Silver Slugger at 3B...earned his third consecutive All-Star Game selection.
- ▶ Became the sixth player in AL history to score 80R and hit 20HR prior to the All-Star break (Lou Gehrig, 1936; Ted Williams, 1946; Reggie Jackson, 1969; Frank Thomas, 1994; Alex Rodriguez, 2000).
- ▶ His 80R scored prior to the All-Star break represented a club record (surpassing Carlos Delgado in 2003)... it was the most runs scored prior to the break by any player in the Majors since 2008 (Ian Kinsler-84, Hanley Ramirez-80).
- ▶ Became the sixth player in Blue Jays history with consecutive seasons of at least 300 total bases, joining Carlos Delgado (four from 1998-2001), Jose Bautista (two from 2010-11), Shawn Green (two from 1998-99), Joe Carter (two from 1991-92) and George Bell (two from 1986-87).
- ▶ His 109BB set a Blue Jays record for most BB by a third baseman in a season, surpassing the previous mark set by Troy Glaus in 2006 (80BB).
- ▶ Recorded a 10-game hit streak to begin the season from 4/3-14, batting .325/.372/.775 (13-for-40) with 11R, 3 doubles, 5HR, 12RBI and 3BB over that stretch.
- ▶ Hit a grand slam in the 4th inning off Joe Kelly in the home opener on 4/8 vs. Boston...was the first grand slam hit by a Toronto player in a home opener in club history...marked the second grand slam of his career and his first since 6/7/13 at Chicago-AL.
- ▶ Homered in his first at-bat of the of the game on 5/22 at Minnesota, going back-to-back with Jose Bautista to leadoff the game.
- ▶ Batted .368/.487/.705 (35-for-95) with 26R, 6 doubles, 4 triples, 6HR, 24RBI and 22BB over 26 games in the month of June...marked the highest batting average in a single calendar month in his career.
- ▶ Was named the AL "Player of the Week" for the fourth time in his career from 6/13-19, hitting .444/.546/1.000 (12-for-27) with 11R, 4 doubles, 1 triple, 3HR, 9RBI, 6BB and 15B over seven games...marked his fourth career "Player of the Week" honor.
- ▶ In a 20-game span from 6/14-7/5, hit .450 with 28R and 8HR.
- ▶ Reached base safely in a season-high 26 consecutive games from 6/21-7/23, hitting .386/.504/1.177 (39-for-101) with 25R, 6 doubles, 1 triple, 7HR, 24RBI and 21BB...marked the third-longest on-base stretch of his career (also 29G from 4/6-5/7/14 and 28G from 8/25-9/23/13).
- ▶ Reached base safely in all six plate appearances (4R, 4-for-4, 1 double, 1RBI, 2BB) on 7/3 vs. Cleveland... became just the fourth player in team history to notch 4H and 2BB in the same game (Willie Upshaw-1985, Tony Fernandez-1993, Shannon Stewart-2000)...the only other Blue Jay ever to reach safely six times and score 4R in a game is Otto Velez on 6/26/78 vs. Baltimore.
- ▶ Was named to his third All-Star Game (second with Toronto)...was a defensive replacement at third base and went 0-for-1.
- ▶ Recorded an XBH in five consecutive games for the second time in his career from 7/14-18 (also 8/3-7/15).
- ▶ Hit a career-high 3HR on 8/28 vs. Minnesota, including a solo HR in the third inning, a two-run HR in the seventh and a solo HR in the eighth.
- ▶ Recorded a career-high 12-game hitting streak from 8/21-9/3, batting .378/.491/.800 (17-for-45) with 12R, 1 double, 6HR, 12RBI and 10BB during the stretch.
- ▶ Hit 6HR with 11RBI over five games from 8/25-29...the only other Jays to accomplish that feat in a span of 5fve games are Carlos Delgado (1999, 2003) & Ernie Whitt (1987).



- ▶ Batted .417/.462/.667 (15-for-36) with 6R, 6 doubles, 1HR, 5RBI and 3BB nine postseason games...his six doubles in the playoffs marked a franchise-high for most doubles in a single postseason...his .417BA was the best mark among all players during the postseason and also ranks as the second-highest average for a Blue Jay player (min. 35PA) in a single playoff run in franchise history (Paul Molitor, .447 in 1993)...went 4-for-4 with a 1BB in Game 1 of the ALDS, becoming the sixth player in franchise history (seventh time) to record 4H in a single postseason game...was just the second Blue Jays player to reach base safely five times in a playoff game (also Roberto Alomar, 10/1192 at Oakland – 11 innings).

2015

- ▶ Was named the AL Most Valuable Player after batting .297/.371/.568 (184-for-620) with 122R, 41 doubles, 2 triples, 41HR, 123RBI and 73BB...became the second Blue Jay to win Most Valuable Player (also George Bell, 1987)...earned 23 of 30 first place votes (also received seven second place votes)...posted career highs in runs, hits, doubles, HR, RBI...his career-best 57 multi-hit games were tied for fourth in the majors (T-third in AL).
- ▶ Led the Majors in runs scored...ranked first among AL hitters in RBI and XBH (84), slugging percentage, third in OPS (.939) and tied for third in HR.
- ▶ Earned the Hank Aaron Award as the AL's best hitter and earned his first Silver Slugger Award at 3B...was tabbed the "Player of the Year" by *Sporting News* and by the MLB Players Choice Awards (voted by the players).
- ▶ Was named to his second All-Star Game and was the top MLB vote-getter, collecting 14,090,188 total votes...at the time, was the new all-time single-season voting record, surpassing Josh Hamilton's 2012 total of 11,073,744...marked his second consecutive fan-selected start, becoming the second AL third baseman to earn consecutive fan-elected starts with different teams, joining Wade Boggs (1992 with Boston, 1993 with the Yankees).
- ▶ Was just the sixth player (eighth time) in Toronto history to have record at least 120RBI in a single season, joining George Bell (134RBI in 1987), Joe Carter (121RBI in 1993), Shawn Green (123RBI in 1999), Carlos Delgado (134RBI in 1999; 137RBI in 2000; 145RBI in 2003) and Jose Bautista (124RBI in 2010)...was later joined by Edwin Encarnación in 2016 (127RBI).
- ▶ His 116 RBI as a third baseman were the most in a season in club history.
- ▶ Set a franchise record for most RBI by a Blue Jay in his first year with the team, surpassing Paul Molitor's 111RBI in 1993...were also the most by a player in their first year with a new team since Josh Hamilton's 130RBI with Texas and Detroit's Miguel Cabrera 127RBI, both in 2008.
- ▶ Was the fifth player to reach 100 RBI for the first time in a season while playing his first season with a team, joining the Yankees' Babe Ruth in 1920, Oakland's Dave Kingman in 1984, Baltimore's Miguel Tejada in 2004 and Texas' Josh Hamilton in 2008.
- ▶ Became the ninth Blue Jay to hit 40HR in a season and the third player in club history to record 40 doubles/40HR in the same season (also Shawn Green in 1999, Carlos Delgado in 2000).
- ▶ Was the first Blue Jay since 2010 to record at least 30HR and 30 doubles in the same season (Jose Bautista 54HR, 35 doubles; Vernon Wells 31HR, 44 doubles)...was the 15th different player in franchise history to record at least 30HR and 30 doubles in the same season.
- ▶ Became the 20th different player in club history with 30-HR in a season.
- ▶ Was the fifth Blue Jay (seventh time) to hit at least 40HR and record at least 120RBI in a single season, joining George Bell (47HR, 134RBI in 1987), Shawn Green (42HR, 123RBI in 1999), Carlos Delgado (44HR, 134RBI in 1999; 41HR, 137RBI in 2000; 42HR, 145RBI in 2003) and Jose Bautista (54HR, 124RBI in 2010)...was later joined by Edwin Encarnación (42HR, 127RBI in 2016).
- ▶ Recorded his first two HR as a member of the Blue Jays on 4/17 vs. Atlanta...marked his first multi-HR game since 8/12/14 at Kansas City with Oakland...along with Russell Martin, became the first Toronto teammates to hit multiple HR in the same game since Jose Bautista and Colby Rasmus on 6/19/12.
- ▶ Stole two bases for the first time in his career on 4/25 at Tampa Bay.
- ▶ Hit the only two leadoff homers in his career thus far on 5/1 at Cleveland and 5/19 vs. Los Angeles-AL...his HR on 5/1 marked the first time in his career he hit in the leadoff spot.
- ▶ Was named the AL "Player of the Week" from 5/25-31 after hitting .440/.483/1.240 (11-for-25) with 11R, 2 doubles, 6HR, 11RBI, 3BB and 15F over six games.
- ▶ Homered in a career-best four-straight games from 5/25-29.
- ▶ Recorded multiple hits in five consecutive games from 6/7-12, hitting .478/.478/.739 (11-for-23) with 5R, 2HR and 5RBI over that stretch...was the second time in his career he accomplished the feat (also five games from 4/9-13/13).
- ▶ Was named to his second consecutive All-Star Game...was the Major League-leading vote-getter for the Midsummer Classic (14,090,188 total votes)...at the time, was the new all-time single-season voting record, surpassing Josh Hamilton's 2012 total of 11,073,744...marked the third time in the last five seasons that a Toronto player led the Majors in All-Star voting after Jose Bautista finished as the top vote-getter in 2011 and 2014...the Blue Jays became the first team to have different players finish as the top vote-getter in the Majors in consecutive seasons...became the second AL 3B to earn consecutive fan-elected starts with different teams, joining Wade Boggs (1992 with Boston, 1993 with the Yankees)...was the first Toronto 3B and fourth infielder to win a fan election, joining Roberto Alomar (1991-94), John Olerud (1993) and Carlos Delgado (2003)...recorded 2BB in his 2PA in the game.
- ▶ Recorded 35RBI in the month of August, marking a new club record for most RBI in any month (also matched that month by teammate Edwin Encarnación)...the duo joined Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig (June 1930/July 1931) as the second set of teammates with 10-or-more HR and 35-or-more RBI in the same month.

- ▶ Was named the AL “Player of the Week” from 8/3-9 after batting .385/.484/1.039 (10-for-26) with 9R, 2 doubles, 5HR, 8RBI, 5BB and 1SB over seven games.
- ▶ Set a career high with 6RBI on 8/23 at Los Angeles-AL, the most RBI by a Blue Jay in a game since Edwin Encarnación on 6/20/14 at CIN.
- ▶ Recorded his 100th career homer on 9/7 at Boston, a solo HR off Rick Porcello.
- ▶ Hit a “walk-off” solo HR on 9/27 vs. Tampa Bay, his 41st HR of the season...also marked his club record-setting third walk-off homer of the year (also 4/18 vs. Atlanta and 5/26 vs. Chicago-AL).
- ▶ In 11 postseason games, batted .244 (10-for-41) with 9R, 3 doubles, 3HR, 8RBI, 6BB, 1HP and 1SB...became the fifth Blue Jay player in franchise history to hit 3HR in a single postseason, joining Joe Carter (1992), Candy Maldonado (1992), Paul Molitor (1993) and Jose Bautista (2015)...hit his first career postseason HR (in his 50th career postseason AB) in Game 2 of the ALDS...also marked his first career RBI in the playoffs...recorded his second HR of the postseason in Game 4 of the ALDS at Texas...hit his third postseason HR in Game 3 vs. Kansas City.

2014

- ▶ Batted .255 (155-for-608) with 93R, 31 doubles, 2 triples, 29HR, 98RBI and 76BB in 158 games with the Athletics... finished eighth in the AL Most Valuable Player voting.
- ▶ Ranked sixth in the AL in walks, eighth in runs, tied for ninth in HR and games and tied for 10th in RBI and extra base hits (62).
- ▶ Led the A’s in runs, hits, doubles, home runs, RBI, walks and games.
- ▶ Batted .275 (42-for-153) with 14 home runs against left-handed pitching...his 14HR off lefties were the most in the Majors and the most by an Athletic since Mark McGwire also had 14HR off of left-handers in 1995.
- ▶ Earned his first Major League All-Star Game selection, starting at 3B for the AL (0-for-2)...also participated in the 2014 Home Run Derby and lost in a tiebreaker to teammate Yoenis Céspedes in the first round.
- ▶ His 65 RBI prior to the All-Star break ranked seventh in the Majors, while his 20HR was tied for seventh.
- ▶ Reached base safely in a career-best 29 consecutive games from 4/6-5/7 (G1), hitting .303/.387/.563 (36-for-119) with 24R, 10 doubles, 7HR, 24RBI and 16BB over that stretch.
- ▶ Set a career high with five hits (5-for-6) on 9/9 at Chicago-AL, while also hitting a double and driving in four runs.
- ▶ Was traded to the Toronto Blue Jays in exchange for INF Brett Lawrie, RHP Kendall Graveman, LHP Sean Nolin and INF Franklin Barreto on 11/28.

2013

- ▶ In his first full season in the Majors, batted .301/.384/.499 (174-for-579) with 89R, 37 doubles, 3 triples, 24HR, 93RBI, 76BB and 5SB in 158 games with Oakland.
- ▶ Finished fourth in the AL Most Valuable Player voting (222 points) behind Detroit’s Miguel Cabrera (385 points), Los Angeles-AL’s Mike Trout (282.0 points) and Baltimore’s Chris Davis (232 points)...recieved one first-place vote.
- ▶ Led the A’s in games, batting average, RBI, walks, on-base percentage, total bases and extra base hits (64).
- ▶ His 56 multi-hit games were tied for fourth-most in the AL and tied for the sixth-most in the Majors...was the third highest total in Oakland history (since 1968) and fell one short of the record of 57 (Miguel Tejada in 2002; Mark Kotsay in 2004)...also ranked sixth in the AL in on-base percentage, tied for seventh in walks, ninth in slugging percentage and total bases (289), and 10th in RBI.
- ▶ Became the sixth player (eighth time) in Oakland history to hit at least .300 with 20-or-more HR and 90-or-more RBI, joining Miguel Tejada (.308BA, 34HR, 131RBI in 2002), Jason Giambi (.342BA, 38HR, 120RBI in 2001; .333BA, 43HR, 137RBI in 2000; .315BA, 33HR, 123RBI in 1999), Mark McGwire (.312BA, 52HR, 113RBI in 1996), Jose Canseco (.307BA, 42HR, 124RBI in 1988) and Dave Henderson (.304BA, 24HR, 94RBI in 1988).
- ▶ Was the Athletics’ Opening Day starter at 3B.
- ▶ Hit his first career “walk-off” HR in the 12th inning on 4/12 vs. Detroit, a solo HR off Brayan Villarreal...also marked his first career “walk-off” hit.
- ▶ Was named AL “Player of the Week” from 4/22-28, marking his first career weekly honor...batted .546/.633/.864 (12-for-22) with 4R, 7 doubles, 10RBI, 1SB and 1SF in seven games over that stretch.
- ▶ Made his Major League debut at SS in the ninth inning on 5/24 at Houston.
- ▶ Hit his first career grand slam in the sixth inning 6/7 at Chicago-AL, turning a 3-0 deficit into a 4-3 win.
- ▶ From 6/18-7/7, batted .390/.464/.695 (23-for-59) with 11R, 3 doubles, 5HR, 14RBI and 9BB over a 17-game stretch.
- ▶ Batted .323/.415/.551 (54-for-167) with 32R, 13 doubles, 2 triples, 7HR, 30RBI and 24BB from 8/10 through the end of the season.
- ▶ Had a then-career-best 28-game on-base streak from 8/25-9/23.

James P. Dawson Award


Each spring training, the Yankees present the James P. Dawson Award to the outstanding Yankees rookie in spring training, as voted on by the New York Yankees beat writers. The award was established in honor of James P. Dawson (1896-1953), who began a 45-year career with *The New York Times* as a copy boy in 1908. Eight years later, he became boxing editor and covered boxing and baseball until his death during spring training in 1953.

Two winners of the honor, Tony Kubek in 1957 and Tom Tresh in 1962, went on to win the American League "Rookie of the Year" Award. Prior winners are listed below:

- ▶ Was named his first career All-Star team and played the final four innings in LF in 7/9 All-Star Game at Cleveland...homered off San Francisco's Will Smith in only at-bat in the seventh inning for the deciding run in the AL's 4-3 win...was the 21st player to homer in his first career All-Star at-bat and the fifth Ranger to go deep in the Midsummer Classic.
- ▶ Left the game on 7/23 at Seattle in the eighth inning with soreness in right wrist.
- ▶ Was placed on the 10-day injured list on 7/25 (retro .to 7/24)...underwent right wrist surgery to remove a fractured hook of hamate bone on 7/25...the surgery was performed by Dr. Thomas DiLiberti in Dallas...missed the remainder of the season...was transferred to 60-day injured list on 9/20.

2018

- ▶ In 148 games with Texas, batted .206 (103-for-500) with 82R, 24 doubles, 1 triple, 40HR, 92RBI and 74BB...set career highs in hits, doubles and RBI...made 32 starts at 1B, 74 starts in LF, 11 starts in CF, 15 starts in RF and four starts at DH...posted a .990 fielding percentage (2E/204TC) in the outfield.
- ▶ Ranked third in the Majors in home runs, trailing only Oakland's Khris Davis (48) and Boston's J.D. Martinez (43)...his third-place finish in home runs was the best by a Ranger since Josh Hamilton finished the 2012 season tied for second in the Majors in home runs (43HR).
- ▶ With his 40HR in 2018 and his 41HR in 2017, became the fourth player in club history to hit at least 40HR in back-to-back seasons, joining Alex Rodriguez (2001-03), Rafael Palmeiro (2001-02) and Juan Gonzalez (1992-93; 1996-98)...joined Ken Griffey Jr. and Eddie Mathews as the only left-handed batters in Major League history with multiple 40HR seasons prior to their age-25 season.
- ▶ Marked his second straight season of ranking in the top-five in home runs in the Majors (also fifth in 2017)...joined Alex Rodriguez (three straight from 2001-03) and Juan Gonzalez (two straight from 1992-93) as the only Rangers ever to accomplish that feat.
- ▶ His 81HR from 2017-18 were the most by a Ranger in a two-season span since Mark Teixeira (81 from 2004-05).
- ▶ Ranked third in the Majors with a 12.50 AB/HR ratio...ranked sixth in the AL and 10th in the Majors with a 5.43 AB/RBI ratio...ranked 10th in the AL in walks...his club-record 207 strikeouts were the third-highest in the Majors.
- ▶ Led the team in HR (40), SLG (.498), RBI (92), games (148), XBH (65) and total bases (249)...ranked second on the club in OPS (.810) and walks (74) and tied for second in runs scored (82).
- ▶ Hit 15HR off left-handed pitchers in 2018, tied with Colorado's Nolan Arenado for the most in the Majors...his 15HR off left-handed pitchers were also a club record for most HR by a left-handed batter against left-handed pitching (also Rafael Palmeiro in 2003)...were the most by any left-handed batter in the Majors since Chicago-AL's Adam Dunn hit 15HR in 2012.
- ▶ Hit 23HR at home, the most by a Ranger at home since Adrián Beltré's 23HR in 2011.
- ▶ Hit 18HR as a left fielder and 10HR as a first baseman, the only player in the Majors in 2018 with at least 10HR at both an infield and outfield position...was just the third Ranger to hit double-digit home runs at multiple positions (excluding DH), joining Josh Hamilton in 2012 (26HR as CF, 15HR as LF) and Jeff Burroughs in 1973 (18HR as RF, 12HR as LF)...Gallo was the first to do it at both an infield and outfield spot.
- ▶ Homered from seven different spots in the lineup.
- ▶ Homered against 13-of-14 AL opponents (went homerless against the Twins in 5G).
- ▶ Recorded eight outfield assists...his six outfield assists after the All-Star break were tied for the second-most in the Majors, trailing only Oakland's Ramon Laureano (9).
- ▶ Recorded three multi-HR performances: 5/5 vs. Boston, 7/20 vs. Cleveland and 8/8 vs. Seattle.
- ▶ Hit his first career extra-inning HR on 5/1 at Cleveland, hitting a go-ahead solo HR in the 12th inning.
- ▶ After the All-Star break, batted .239/.340/.592 (44-for-184) with 34R, 11 doubles, 18HR and 41RBI in 55 games to raise his batting average from .187 to .206.
- ▶ Drove in a season-high four runs on 8/8 vs. Seattle (3-for-5, 2R, 2HR).
- ▶ Hit his only career pinch-hit HR on 9/23 vs. Seattle with a two-run HR in the eighth inning of Ryan Cook.



2017

- ▶ Made his first career Opening Day roster and spent the entire year at the Major League level for the first time in his career, batting .209/.333/.537 (94-for-449) with 85R, 18 doubles, 3 triples, 41HR, 80RBI, 75BB and 75B in 145 games with the Rangers...set a career high in home runs...appeared at 1B (59G/52GS), 3B (72G/66GS), LF (18G/17GS) and DH (2GS).
- ▶ Was just the sixth player in Rangers history to hit at least 40HR in a season, joining Juan Gonzalez (5x), Alex Rodriguez (3x), Rafael Palmeiro (3x), Mark Teixeira (1x) and Josh Hamilton (1x)...was the first to do since Hamilton in 2012.
- ▶ Recorded his 40th HR of the season at the age of 23 years, 315 days, becoming the second-youngest player in Rangers history to reach 40HR (Juan Gonzalez, 22.331 in 1992)...at the time, only three other players since 2000 hit their 40th home run of the year at a younger age: Albert Pujols in 2003, Prince Fielder in 2007 and Bryce Harper in 2015 (credit: *Elias Sports Bureau*).
- ▶ Ranked fifth in the Majors and third in the AL in home runs (41)...his 10.95 AB/HR ratio ranked third in the Majors and second in the AL, trailing only Miami's Giancarlo Stanton (10.12) and the Yankees' Aaron Judge (10.42)...also ranked among AL leaders in slugging pct. (eighth, .537) and AB/RBI ratio (10th, 5.61).
- ▶ Recorded each of his first four career multi-HR games in 2017, all in Arlington: 4/21 vs. Kansas City, 7/25 vs. Miami, 8/1 vs. Seattle and 9/30 vs. Oakland...his four multi-HR games in Arlington were the most in one season since 2005 (Mark Teixeira-5, Alfonso Soriano-4).
- ▶ Hit home runs in 15 different parks, tied for the second-most in Majors to Tampa Bay's Logan Morrison (16)...at the time, was the second-highest total in club history (16 by Juan Gonzalez in 1999).
- ▶ His 94 hits and 80RBI were the fewest by any Major League player in a 40HR season...at the time, his .209 BA was the second-lowest by any player in a 40HR season, trailing only Adam Dunn's .204 BA in 2012 with Chicago-AL (Gallo surpassed the mark in 2018 when he hit .206 with 40HR).
- ▶ His .209 BA was the fourth-lowest in the AL among qualified hitters...also finished second in the AL with 196 strikeouts...at the time, his 196K were a club record (he surpassed the mark in 2017 with 207K).
- ▶ His 32 singles were the lowest in Major League history for a player with at least 502PA (minimum to qualify in a 162-game season)...the previous low had been 39 singles by Rob Deer for 1991 Tigers.
- ▶ Was named the club's April "Player of the Month" after leading team in HR (7), runs scored (16), total bases (44), and SLG (.550).
- ▶ Hit his first career "walk-off" HR in the ninth inning on 5/12 vs. Oakland (Santiago Casilla).
- ▶ Hit his first career inside-the-park HR on 6/21 vs. Toronto.
- ▶ Set a career high with an eight-game hitting streak from 8/1-9, batting .370/.469/1.185 (10-for-27) with 7R, 1 double, 7HR, 14RBI and 4BB in that span.
- ▶ In August, became just the third player in Major League history to homer nine times in the first 15 days of a month at age 23 or younger according to *Elias*, joining Joe DiMaggio (9 in June 1937) and Harmon Killebrew (9 in May 1959).
- ▶ Walked in a career-high nine straight games from 8/14-30.
- ▶ Posted a 21-game on-base streak from 8/14-9/12.
- ▶ Left the game on 8/20 vs. Chicago-AL following a collision with reliever Matt Bush...was placed on the 7-day concussion disabled list on 8/22 and was reinstated on 8/29.
- ▶ Recorded a career-high-tying eight-game hitting streak from 8/29-9/6(G1), batting .290/.405/.613 (9-for-31) with 7R, 2 doubles, 1 triple, 2HR, 7RBI and 6BB in that span.
- ▶ Recorded his 100th career hit on 9/3 vs. Los Angeles-AL with a single off Andrew Heaney in the second inning...according to *Elias*, became the first player in Major League history to have 40+ HR within his first 100 hits.

2016

- ▶ Appeared in 17 games for the Rangers over three stints with the club (5/23-28, 7/26-8/1, 9/6-10/2), batting .040 (1-for-25) with 2R, 1HR, 1RBI and 5BB.
- ▶ His lone hit with the Rangers was a HR on 7/26 vs. Oakland...finished the season 0-for-22 after his HR.
- ▶ Spent the majority of the season with Triple-A Round Rock, batting .240 (86-for-359) with 71R, 17 doubles, 6 triples, 25HR, 66RBI and 68BB in 102 games...ranked among Pacific Coast League leaders in home runs (tied for third) and AB/HR (second, 14.36)...his .896 OPS ranked seventh among all qualifiers at the Triple-A level.
- ▶ Was tabbed an Organization All-Star by MiLB.com.
- ▶ Following the season, appeared in three games for the Navegantes del Magallanes of the Venezuelan Winter League before suffering a moderate left hamstring strain on 10/27 at Margarita.

- ▶ Homered in back-to-back games from 6/13-14 vs. Minnesota.
- ▶ Struck out in 23 straight games from 6/14-9/20, the longest single-season streak in team history.
- ▶ Was optioned to Triple-A Round Rock on 6/30...in 53 games with Triple-A Round Rock, batted .195 (39-for-200) with 2OR, 9 doubles, 14HR, 32RBI and 27BB.
- ▶ Was recalled from Triple-A on 9/1 and finished the season at the Major League level.
- ▶ Following the season, was tabbed the Rangers' No. 1 prospect and the No. 10 prospect in Baseball overall by *Baseball America*...was also tabbed an Organization All-Star by MiLB.com.

- ▶ With C Erik Kratz (40 years, 76 days) behind the plate for his Major League debut, marked the largest age gap between Yankees batterymates since 1906 when Cy Barger (21 years, 104 days) pitched for the Highlanders with Deacon McGuire (42 years, 285 days) catching on 8/30/1906...marked the largest age gap between any pair of Major League batterymates since 6/24/18 when the Texas Rangers had Bartolo Colon (45 years, 31 days) on the mound and Isiah Kiner-Falefa (23 years, 93 days) behind the plate...prior to that day, the last time there was a larger gap than Kratz and García with the pitcher being the younger member of the duo was the Seattle Mariners' Taijuan Walker (21 years, 17 days) and Henry Blanco (42 years, 1 day) on 8/30/2013—credit: *Elias*.



- ▶ Tossed an immaculate inning in the seventh inning in Game 2 on 7/4 vs. the Mets, becoming the second Yankees pitcher to toss an immaculate inning in 2021, joining RHP Michael King who threw an immaculate inning in the fourth inning on 6/4 vs. Boston...according to *Elias*, the Yankees were just the third team in the last 20 seasons to have two immaculate innings in a single season, joining the 2019 Boston Red Sox (Chris Sale threw one on 5/8/19 and 6/5/19) and the 2017 Boston Red Sox (Craig Kimbrel on 5/11/17 and Rick Porcello on 8/9/17)...according to *Elias*, it was the sixth immaculate inning by a Yankee since 2000, joining Michael King (6/4/21 vs. Boston), Dellin Betances (8/2/17 vs. Detroit), Brandon McCarthy (9/17/14 at Tampa Bay), Iván Nova (5/29/13 vs. the Mets) and A.J. Burnett (6/20/09 at Florida)...Baseball Almanac notes that Ron Guidry (8/7/84 vs. Chicago-AL) and Al Downing (8/11/67 at Cleveland) have also thrown immaculate innings...according to STATS, he was the first pitcher in the Modern Era to toss at least 3.0 perfect innings, notch at least 6K and have an immaculate inning all in the same game.
- ▶ Tossed a perfect ninth inning on 7/7 at Seattle to record his third save of the season (2K)...struck out Jake Fraley to lead off the ninth inning, his 347th career strikeout as a *reliever*...surpassed Lindy McDaniel (346) for sole possession of 11th place on the Yankees' all-time strikeouts list by a reliever.
- ▶ On 7/11 at Houston, allowed 4ER and took his fifth loss (0.1IP, 4H, 1HR)...allowed a "walk-off" HR to Jose Altuve in the ninth...his 4ER allowed were tied for his most as a reliever (fourth time, first since 6/5/21 vs. Boston).
- ▶ Allowed 2ER on 7/22 at Boston (1.0IP, 3H, 1K) and 2ER on 7/27 at Tampa Bay (1.0IP, 1H, 2BB, 2K, 1HR), marking the first time he had allowed earned runs in consecutive outings in 2021 and the first time since 8/26-28/20.
- ▶ On 8/11 at Kansas City, tossed 2.0 scoreless innings of relief to earn his sixth win of the season (1H, 3K, 1WP)...struck out Ryan O'Hearn looking in the sixth inning for his 365th career strikeout as a reliever, surpassing Steve Hamilton (364) for sole possession of ninth place on the Yankees' all-time strikeouts list by a reliever.
- ▶ Recorded a save in three straight outings from 8/16-19...marked the first time in his career that he recorded a save in consecutive outings.
- ▶ Took the loss on 8/29 at Oakland after allowing a go-ahead two-run HR to Tony Kemp in the eighth (1.0IP, 2H, 2ER, 1HR).
- ▶ On 9/5 vs. Baltimore, tossed 2.0 perfect innings of relief (3K)...marked his fifth perfect relief outing of at least 2.0IP in 2021 and first since 7/4-G2 vs. the Mets (3.0IP).
- ▶ Allowed a run in a career-high four straight appearances from 9/8-15 (previous: 3G from 8/21-9/2/16).
- ▶ Surrendered at least 1HR in a career-high three straight games from 9/11-15 (previous: 2G, seven times, last: 8/26-28/20).
- ▶ Took the loss on 9/12 at the Mets after allowing a go-ahead solo HR to Francisco Lindor in the eighth (1.0IP, 1H, 1ER, 1K).
- ▶ Did not allow a run in his final seven appearances of the season from 9/20-10/3, retiring 25 of 31 batters faced over that span (8.1IP, 4H, 2BB, 10K, 1WP).
- ▶ Tossed 1.2 scoreless innings in the AL Wild Card Game at Boston (1H, 1BB, 2K).



2020

- ▶ Went 3-3 with one save and a 3.51 ERA (25.2IP, 10ER) and 32K in 22 relief appearances with the Yankees.
- ▶ Earned the win in his season debut on 7/26 at Washington, tossing 2.0 scoreless innings (11BB, 2K, 1WP).
- ▶ On 8/16 vs. Boston, tossed 1.2 scoreless innings (1H, 1BB, 2K)...struck out Rafael Devers and J.D. Martinez in the eighth, tying Adam Warren (285) for 14th place on the Yankees' all-time list for strikeouts *by a reliever*.
- ▶ Allowed 5ER and 4HR in 2.0IP (5H, 4K) over a two-outing span (G2 on 8/26 at Atlanta and G1 on 8/28 vs. New York-NL)...allowed just 1ER over his first 12.2IP of the season (2H, 4BB/11BB, 17K, 0HR)...had allowed 4HR over his prior 50G (14GS) from 5/22/19-8/16/20.



- ▶ In Game 2 of 8/26 doubleheader at Atlanta, took the loss, allowing a go-ahead HR to Freddie Freeman in the sixth inning (1.0IP, 2H, 2ER, 2K, 1HR)...collected his 286th career strikeout *as a reliever*, surpassing Adam Warren (285) for 14th place on the Yankees' all-time list for strikeouts *by a reliever*.
- ▶ Recorded the loss for the second straight game in Game 1 on 8/28 vs. the Mets (1.0IP, 3H, 3ER, 2K, 3HR)...allowed multiple HRs for the seventh time in his career and allowed 3HR for the third time (also 4HR on 7/8/16 at Cleveland and 3HR on 8/27/16 vs. Baltimore, both as a starter).
- ▶ Pitched on three straight days from 9/2-4 for the first time in his career.
- ▶ Earned his first save of the year (fourth of his career) in Game 1 of 9/4 doubleheader at Baltimore (his third appearance in as many days), allowing 1R/0ER in 1.0IP (1H).
- ▶ Tossed 1.1 scoreless innings on 9/12 vs. Baltimore (1K)...struck out DJ Stewart (swinging) to lead off the seventh inning...was his 294th career strikeout as a reliever, surpassing Hal Reniff (293) for sole possession of 13th place on the Yankees' all-time strikeouts list by a reliever.
- ▶ Went 1-0 with a 3.38 ERA (5.1IP, 2ER) and 8K in four postseason relief appearances...earned his third career postseason win in ALDS Game 4 vs. Tampa Bay at Petco Park, tossing 2.0 perfect innings (2K).

2019

- ▶ Went 4-4 with a 4.17 ERA (69.0IP, 32ER) and 98K in 54 appearances (15 starts) over two stints (3/28-4/23, 5/12-9/29) with the Yankees.
- ▶ Had three appearances with at least 4K and no base runners, tied for the Major League lead (also John Brebbia, Josh Hader and Drew Pomeranz).
- ▶ Went 0-1 with a 3.72 ERA (19.1IP, 8ER) and 32K in his 15 opening assignments...the Yankees went 11-4 in those games...retired 50-of-70 batters faced over his final 13 opening assignments (16.2IP, 12H, 6R/5ER, 7BB, 31K, 2HR) beginning on 5/27...retired 37-of-46BF over nine opening assignments from 5/27-8/12 (12.1IP, 4H, 0R, 4BB, 22K).

- ▶ Made his 100th career relief appearance in 9/15 loss vs. Toronto, tossing 2.1 scoreless innings (3H, 3K).

- ▶ With Dellin Betances (100K), became the second pair of Yankees to each strike out at least 100 batters in relief in the same season (also Betances/Andrew Miller in 2015).
- ▶ Made 29 relief appearances of more than 1.0IP (second-most in the Majors) and 16 of at least 2.0IP...made three scoreless relief appearances of at least 3.0IP...had multiple strikeouts in 30 of his 40 total appearances.
- ▶ Had six relief appearances with at least 5K...since 1992, is one of six relievers with at least six 5K games in a season, joining Félix Peña (10G in 2019), Mariano Rivera (9G in 1996), Octavio Dotel (7G in 2001), Tommy Milone (7G in 2019) and Ryan Yarbrough (6G in 2018).
- ▶ Made nine straight relief appearances of at least 1.1IP from 5/14 (G1) - 6/21, posting a 1.77 ERA (20.1IP, 4ER) with 23K over the stretch.
- ▶ Had multiple strikeouts in eight straight games from 6/25-7/19, tied for the Majors' second-longest streak of the season by a reliever (Craig Kimbrel-9, Chris Devenski-8)...only five Yankees relievers have recorded a longer streak: Aroldis Chapman (15G from 9/3/20-4/22/21), Nick Nelson (9G from 9/21/20-6/3/21), Dellin Betances (9G from 4/17-5/10/14), Mariano Rivera (6/4-7/2/96) and Lindy McDaniel (7/27-8/29/73).
- ▶ Over a six-outing stretch from 7/9-23, tossed 9.1 scoreless and hitless innings, retiring 28-of-32 batters (3BB, 1HP, 16K)...is tied for the fourth-longest single-season streak of scoreless, hitless relief appearances of at least 1.0IP in Yankees history behind Dellin Betances (9G, 6/8-25/18), David Robertson (8G, 9/15-30/17) and Mariano Rivera (7G, 6/3-20/10).
- ▶ Following the All-Star break, struck out 46.2% (61-of-132) of his batters faced, the second-highest pct. in the Majors (min. 100BF) behind Craig Kimbrel (48.3%).
- ▶ From 8/23 through the end of the season, allowed just 1ER with 2BB and 28K (60BF) in 17.0IP over 12 games.
- ▶ Struck out seven of eight batters faced in 2.2 scoreless innings (1H) in 8/30 Game 1 loss vs. Cleveland...marked the most strikeouts in a single game by any pitcher in Major League history when facing eight-or-fewer batters...marked the fewest non-Ks by a pitcher facing eight-or-more batters since the Yankees' Ron Davis struck out eight-of-nine batters on 5/4/81 at California (credit: *Elias*).
- ▶ Collected his 100th strikeout of the season as a *reliever* in the seventh inning of 9/30 win vs. Toronto (Jose Bautista, swinging)...according to *Elias*, the only other Yankees with 100K within their first 50 relief appearances of a season were Dellin Betances (2014), Mariano Rivera (1996) and Joe Page (1947).
- ▶ Went 1-0 with a 4.15 ERA (8.2IP, 4ER) and 11K in five postseason relief appearances...made his playoff debut in the Yankees' AL Wild Card win vs. Minnesota, entering with one out in the first inning (2.0IP, 1H, 1ER, 2BB, 4K)...inherited runners on second and third, stranding both on a pair of strikeouts...became the first Yankee to strike out his first four career postseason batters faced, and the first Major League pitcher to do so since Colorado's Jeff Francis in 2007 NLDS Game 1 at Philadelphia...allowed a grand slam to Francisco Lindor in ALDS Game 2 loss at Cleveland...earned his first postseason win in ALCS Game 4 vs. Houston (2.0IP, 1H, 1R/0ER, 2K).
- ▶ Began the season with Single-A Tampa, making one start (0-1, 2.25 ERA, 4.0IP, 2H, 1ER, 5K)...was transferred to Triple-A Scranton/Wilkes-Barre and went 2-1 with a 4.73 ERA (26.2IP, 14ER) and 33K in five starts.

2016

- ▶ Became the fourth Yankees pitcher since 2000 to record at least 5K in each of his first three Major League starts, joining Masahiro Tanaka (2014, first 11GS), Phil Hughes (2007, first 4GS) and José Contreras (2003, first 7GS).
- ▶ Earned his first Major League win on 7/3 at San Diego (his third career game), allowing 1ER in 6.0IP (3H, 0BB, 8K, 1HR)...was only the third Yankee since 1913 to record at least 8K without walking a batter within his first three career games...joined Rich Beck (7.0IP and 8K on 9/14/65) and Masahiro Tanaka (7.0IP and 8K on 4/4/14) who both did so in their Major League debuts...became the first Yankees pitcher since 1913 to toss at least 6.0IP with 3H-or-fewer and no walks in one of his first three career games.
- ▶ Earned his first Major League save in 7/24 win vs. San Francisco, tossing 2.1 scoreless innings (3H, 1K).



- ▶ Had a career-high 11K in 6.0 scoreless innings in his start on 8/15 vs. Toronto (2H, 0BB), the most by a Yankees rookie since Masahiro Tanaka had 11K on 6/11/14 at Seattle...retired his first 13 batters, including six via strikeout, before Troy Tulowitzki's one-out single to left in the fifth...had streaks of both five and four consecutive strikeouts...was the second rookie pitcher in Yankees history to record at least 11K with no walks and no runs in a game, joining Stan Bahnsen on 8/1/68 at Boston (CG SHO, 3H, 12K)...was the 12th Yankees pitcher (of any experience level) since 1913 to do it, the first since Randy Johnson on 7/26/05 vs. Minnesota (8.0IP, 2H, 11K)...matched the most strikeouts by an AL rookie in 2016 (Detroit's Michael Fulmer, 11K on 5/21/16 vs. Tampa Bay).
- ▶ Was removed from 9/2 loss at Baltimore after 1.2IP with right elbow pain (5H, 4ER, 2BB, 1HR, 3K)...underwent an MRI on 9/3 in Baltimore, revealing a sprained right UCL and a strained flexor tendon...was placed on the 15-day disabled list on 9/7 (retro. to 9/3) with a right forearm tendon injury...was transferred to the 60-day D.L. on 9/18.
- ▶ In 16GS for Scranton/Wilkes-Barre, was 7-6 with a 1.52 ERA and team-high 100K (94.2IP, 68H, 21R/16ER, 21BB, 3HR)...was named to the International League Mid-Season All-Star Team...led IL pitchers in ERA and WHIP, and had the third-lowest ERA among all minor league pitchers (min. 90.0IP)...allowed one-or-zero runs in 10-of-16GS...issued 1BB-or-fewer in 12-of-16GS and allowed 4H-or-fewer in 10-of-16...had a 26.0-inning scoreless streak from 6/15-8/9.

2015

- ▶ Spent the season with Double-A Erie, going 5-14 with a 3.93 ERA (148.2IP, 170H, 84R/65ER, 43BB, 137K, 9HR) in 27 starts...over his final eight starts, posted a 3-0 record with a 1.70 ERA (47.2IP, 42H, 9ER, 11BB, 49K, 1HR) and a .237 (42-for-177) opponents' BA.
- ▶ Was named the Eastern League "Pitcher of the Week" for 8/24-30 after going 1-0 with a 0.69 ERA (13.0IP, 12H, 1ER, 0BB, 14K) over two starts, including a seven-inning complete game.
- ▶ Was acquired by the Yankees from Detroit with RHP Luis Cessa in exchange for LHP Justin Wilson on 12/9/15.

- ▶ Went 6-4 with a 3.11 ERA (130.1IP, 121H, 51R/45ER, 28BB, 125K) in 23 starts with Single-A West Michigan...ranked third in the Midwest League in WHIP (1.14) and ninth in ERA...went 4-1 with a 2.03 ERA (44.1IP, 35H, 10ER, 9BB, 50K) in his final eight starts of the season.

- ▶ In his professional debut, combined to go 4-0 with a 3.54 ERA (20.1IP, 19H, 7ER, 6BB, 10K) in 12 games (two starts) with the GCL Tigers and Single-A Lakeland.
- ▶ Went 1-0 with a 3.00 ERA (3.0IP, 3H, 1ER, 0BB, 6K) in two relief appearances before being promoted on 7/12...in 10G/2GS with Lakeland, went 3-0 with a 3.63 ERA (17.1IP, 16H, 7ER, 6BB, 10K).

STATUS

- ▶ Signed a seven-year contract extending through the 2025 season with a team option for 2026 on February 25, 2019...was originally acquired by the Yankees from the Minnesota Twins in exchange for C John Ryan Murphy on November 11, 2015.

CAREER NOTES

- ▶ Has appeared at all three outfield positions in his career, posting a .992 fielding percentage (1,552TC, 12E) with 34 assists...from 2013-15, led all Twins outfielders in assists (22) and games played in the outfield (243).
- ▶ Has 69HR in 403 games since 8/5/16 after hitting just 3HR in his first 90 games as a Yankee.
- ▶ Ranked third among Major League switch-hitters with 27HR in 2018...was the seventh switch-hitter in Yankees history to hit at least 25HR in a season, joining Mickey Mantle (10x), Bernie Williams (5x), Mark Teixeira (4x), Tom Tresh (3x), Jorge Posada (2x) and Nick Swisher (2x).
- ▶ Since joining the Yankees in 2016, the Yankees have gone 55-12 when he homers.
- ▶ From 2017-18, posted an .838 OPS and a .368 OBP...was one of just eight American Leaguers over the stretch to reach both of those marks with at least 200 games played (also Jose Altuve, Mookie Betts, Alex Bregman, Aaron Judge, J.D. Martinez, José Ramirez and Mike Trout).
- ▶ His 8.4 WAR (FanGraphs) from 2017-18 ranked 10th among all Major League outfielders.
- ▶ Has made seven career Opening Day rosters (2013-14, '16-18, '20-21), including five as a Yankee...began the 2019 season on the 10-day injured list.

2021

- ▶ Hit .194/.294/.333 (21-for-108) with 13R, 3 doubles, 4HR, 14RBI and 14BB in 32 games with the Yankees...missed the final 126 games of the season due to a left wrist injury.
- ▶ Went 3-for-4 with 1 double on 4/13 at Toronto...his seventh-inning double marked the 100th of his career...marked his most hits in a game since 7/6/19 at Tampa Bay (also 3H).
- ▶ Drew a pinch-hit walk and scored the go-ahead run on a wild pitch in the eighth inning on 4/20 vs. Atlanta...snapped his six-game streak without a walk, his longest since a seven-game streak from 9/24/18-5/18/19.
- ▶ Homered in consecutive games from 4/23-24 for the first time since 7/23-24/19.
- ▶ Hit a solo HR in the third inning on 4/30 vs. Detroit, snapping an 0-for-18 stretch.
- ▶ Hit a tie-breaking RBI single in the eighth inning on 5/5 vs. Houston...marked his first go-ahead or game-tying hit in the eighth inning or later since 7/23/19 at Minnesota (go-ahead two-run HR in the ninth inning).
- ▶ Went 3-for-3 with 1R, 1RBI and 1BB on 5/6 vs. Houston, reaching base a career-high-tying four times (15th time, first since 9/21/18 vs. Baltimore)...also tied his season high in hits.
- ▶ Hit .345/.444/.517 (10-for-29) with 6R, 2 doubles, 1HR, 6RBI, 5BB, 1HP and 1SF in his final 10 games from 4/30-5/12.
- ▶ Was placed on the 10-day injured list on 5/16 (retroactive to 5/13) with a left wrist sprain...was transferred to the 60-day I.L. on 5/30...missed the remainder of the season.
- ▶ Underwent surgery on his left wrist on 5/26...the surgery was performed by Dr. Donald Sheridan in Arizona.

2020

2019

- ▶ Hit .235 (52-for-221) with 41R, 10 doubles, 12HR, 36RBI and 31BB in 59 games (55 starts in CF, 1 at DH) in his fourth season with the Yankees.
- ▶ Had six game-tying or go-ahead RBI when trailing in the ninth inning or later (go-ahead two-run HR with two outs in the ninth on 7/23 at Minnesota, game-tying solo HR with two outs in the ninth on 7/6 at Tampa Bay, game-tying two-run single with two outs in the ninth on 5/26 at Kansas City, and a sac fly with one out in the ninth on 5/20 at Baltimore).
- ▶ Missed the Yankees' first 40 games of the season from 3/28 (retroactive to 3/25) - 5/12 on the 10-day injured list with a lower left back strain...combined to hit .167 (3-for-18) with 4R, 2 doubles, 1HR and 1RBI in five rehab games with Single-A Tampa and Triple-A Scranton/WB, with all 3H coming on 5/11.
- ▶ Hit a game-tying two-run single with two outs in the ninth on 5/26 at Kansas City...since 1999, was the seventh *game-tying or go-ahead hit by a Yankee with two outs when trailing by multiple runs in the ninth inning or later*, joining Brett Gardner (HR on 5/5/17 at Chicago-NL), Didi Gregorius (single on 4/30/17 vs. Baltimore), Mark Teixeira (grand slam on 9/28/16 vs. Boston), Alex Rodriguez (HR on 9/17/10 at Baltimore), Shelley Duncan (HR on 8/15/07 vs. Baltimore) and Paul O'Neill (HR on 5/13/01 vs. Baltimore).
- ▶ Homered in three straight games with a plate appearance from 6/4-7, just the second time in his career he homered in three straight games (also 6/17-19/18).
- ▶ His first inning two-run HR on 6/29 at Boston at London Stadium was the first Major League homer ever hit in London.
- ▶ Hit game-tying solo HR in the eighth inning on 7/5 at Tampa Bay, his third career pinch-hit home run.
- ▶ Hit a game-tying ninth-inning solo HR on 7/6 at Tampa Bay...was his fifth career home run in the eighth inning-or-later that either tied the game or gave his team the lead, and his second in as many days.
- ▶ Collected his 500th career hit with a third-inning single on 7/23 at Minnesota...hit go-ahead, two-out, two-run HR in the ninth inning to give the Yankees a 12-11 lead...was his second game-tying or go-ahead HR in the ninth inning or later of the season and third of his career (also game-tying solo HR in the ninth on 7/6 at Tampa Bay and go-ahead two-run HR on 9/26/16 at Toronto).
- ▶ Was placed on the 10-day injured list on 8/4 with a right flexor strain...was transferred to the 60-day I.L. on 9/28...was removed from Game 2 vs. Boston in the middle of the eighth on 8/3 with an elbow injury.
- ▶ Was reinstated from the 60-day injured list and added to the Yankees' postseason roster prior to the start of the ALCS vs. Houston...reached three times (1H, 2BB) in ALCS Game 4 and collected his first hit since 8/3 (Game 2) vs. Boston...hit his second career postseason home run in ALCS Game 5, a three-run HR in the first inning off Justin Verlander that provided the margin of victory...both of his career postseason HRs have been tie-breaking three-run homers off Cy Young winners (broke a 3-3 tie in the third inning of 2017 ALDS Game 2 at Cleveland with a three-run HR off Corey Kluber).
- ▶ Underwent UCL reconstruction surgery on his right elbow on 10/30...the surgery was performed by Dr. Neal ElAttrache in Los Angeles.
- ▶ Signed a seven-year contract extending through the 2025 season with a club option for 2026 on 2/25.

2018

- ▶ Hit .248 (119-for-480) with 90R, 18 doubles, 3 triples, 27HR, 79RBI, 90BB and 115B in 137 games (129 starts in CF, 2 at DH)...set single-season career highs in runs scored, hits, home runs, extra-base hits (48), RBI and walks (previous: 54R, 15HR, 33XBH, 52RBI, 51BB in 2017; 90H in 2015)...ranked fifth in the Majors (min. 500PA) with a 15.5% walk rate and his 20.9% chase rate was seventh-lowest.
- ▶ Ranked third among Major League switch-hitters with 27HR (José Ramirez-39 and Francisco Lindor-38)...was the highest total by a switch-hitting centerfielder (min. half of games at the position) since Carlos Beltrán hit 27HR in 2008...was the seventh switch-hitter in Yankees history to hit at least 25HR in a season, joining Mickey Mantle (10x), Bernie Williams (5x), Mark Teixeira (4x), Tom Tresh (3x), Jorge Posada (2x) and Nick Swisher (2x).
- ▶ Was the fourth centerfielder (min. 50.0% of games in CF) in American League history to post a season with at least 25HR and a walk rate of 15.0% or better, joining Mickey Mantle (9 times), Mike Trout (4) and Larry Doby (2).
- ▶ Hit 11HR in 31G as a leadoff hitter and 16HR in 106G in all other spots in the lineup...had 21HR over his final 88G after hitting just 6HR in his first 49G.



- ▶ Was the first Yankee with multiple inside-the-park HRs in the same season (4/13 at Detroit and 5/19 at Kansas City) since Mickey Mantle (three in 1958)...became the sixth player since 1999 to have multiple ITP HR in the same season, joining Charlie Blackmon (2017), Brandon Barnes (2014), Tony Gwynn Jr. (2010), Mark Teahen (2008) and Jimmy Rollins (2004).
- ▶ Hit .636/.690/1.045 (14-for-22) with 9R, 1 double, 1 triple, 2HR, 5RBI and 6BB in seven games against Kansas City, the third-highest BA by any player against a single opponent in 2018 (min. 15AB) behind only Steve Pearce (.667, 10-for-15 vs. Kansas City) and Scooter Gennett (.654, 17-for-26 vs. Los Angeles-NL)...had multiple hits and reached safely at least three times in each of his six starts vs. Kansas City, tying the Yankees' Roy White (8/15/70-6/4/71) for the longest such streak by an opponent in Royals history.
- ▶ Was placed on the 10-day disabled list from 3/30-4/12 with a right intercostal muscle strain (missed 11 team games)...played two rehab games with Triple-A Scranton/Wilkes-Barre.
- ▶ Hit two-run inside-the-park HR and solo HR in 4/13 win at Detroit...was his first career inside-the-park HR and first by a Yankee since Curtis Granderson on 8/21/11 at Minnesota...it had been 1,022 games since Granderson's homer, the Yankees' second-longest drought with no inside-the-park HRs in team history (1,523 games from 8/30/99-5/14/09)...is the first Yankee to hit both an inside-the-park HR and a homer over the fence in the same game since Hank Bauer on 5/30/56-G2 vs. Washington at Yankee Stadium (STATS/Inc.)...Bauer homered off Camilo Pascual leading off the first inning and hit a two-run inside-the-park home run off Tex Clevenger in the eighth...was his fourth career multi-HR game (first since 6/9/17 at Baltimore).
- ▶ Played in his 500th Major League game in 6/4 Game 1 win at Detroit (0-for-4, 1BB).
- ▶ Hit leadoff HR in 6/26 win at Philadelphia...was his third career leadoff HR and first as a Yankee (first since 9/7/15 at Kansas City w/ Minnesota).
- ▶ Hit two-run HR and two solo HRs and was 3-for-4 with 1BB in 7/1 win vs. Boston...was his first career 3HR game and the first by a Yankee since Alex Rodriguez on 7/25/15 at Minnesota...was the first Yankees leadoff hitter ever to hit 3HR in a game and just the 27th instance in Major League history (joined by St. Louis' Matt Carpenter on 7/20/18)...homered from both sides of the plate for the second time in his career (also 4/13/17 vs. Tampa Bay)...was his fifth career multi-HR game and second of the season (also 4/13 at Detroit-2HR).
- ▶ Had 49BB in 61 games following the All-Star break, tied for second-most in the Majors (tied for first in the AL)...drew at least 1BB in 10 consecutive starts from 7/15-8/2 (13BB total), tied for the longest such streak by a Yankee since Jorge Posada's 11-start walk streak from 5/11-29/04.
- ▶ Scored a career-high-tying 4R in 9/21 win vs. Baltimore (also 8/12/15 vs. Texas).
- ▶ Recorded his first "walk-off" hit as a Yankee and the third of his career (also singles on 5/15/14 vs. Boston and 9/16/14 vs. Detroit) with an 11th-inning double on 9/22 vs. Baltimore to clinch the Yankees' postseason berth.
- ▶ Was removed from 9/24 win at Tampa Bay in the bottom of the fourth inning with a tight left hamstring...missed the following three games with the injury.
- ▶ Hit .222 (2-for-9) with 1R, 1 double and 1RBI in three postseason games...was removed from ALDS Game 1 at Boston in the fourth inning with right hamstring tightness and missed the following two games.

2017

- ▶ Hit .266 (80-for-301) with 54R, 18 doubles, 15HR, 52RBI, 51BB and 105B in 88 games (50 starts in CF, 16 in LF and 10 in RF) in his second season with the Yankees...of his 15HR, 12 were hit at Yankee Stadium.
- ▶ Had his second career multi-HR game (also 5/13/13 vs. Chicago-AL w/ Minnesota) in 4/13 win vs. Tampa Bay...homered from both sides of the plate, the first Yankee to do so since Mark Teixeira on 7/31/15 at Chicago-AL.
- ▶ Hit his first career pinch-hit HR in the eighth inning of 4/19 win vs. Chicago-AL.
- ▶ Reached base safely in a career-high 21 consecutive games from 5/23-6/14...hit .342/.413/.595 (27-for-79) with 16R, 11 doubles, 3HR, 17RBI and 11BB during the stretch.
- ▶ Established career highs with 6RBI and 3 doubles in 6/1 win at Toronto, going 4-for-5 with 2R...was the third Yankee since 1954 with at least 6RBI without a home run (also Jorge Posada-6RBI on 6/6/98 vs. Kansas City and Joe Girardi-7RBI on 8/23/99 at Texas).
- ▶ Was placed on the 10-day disabled list from 6/26-8/10 with a right oblique strain (missed 39 games)...combined to appear in seven rehab games with Triple-A Scranton/Wilkes-Barre and Double-A Trenton from 8/2-9.
- ▶ At the time he was placed on the D.L. on 6/26, had a .398 OBP, ninth-best in the Majors and second-highest in the AL behind only teammate Aaron Judge (.440).
- ▶ Was placed on the 10-day disabled list from 9/3-25 with a left oblique strain (missed 21 team games).
- ▶ Made his postseason debut...in 13 playoff games, hit .196 (9-for-46) with 5R, 2 doubles, 1HR and 5RBI...hit safely in each of his first six postseason games, the sixth-longest hitting streak to begin a postseason career in Yankees history: Thurman Munson (11G), Chris Chambliss (10G), Derek Jeter (9G), George Selkirk (9G) and Earle Combs (7G).
- ▶ Hit his first career postseason homer in ALDS Game 2 loss at Cleveland, a go-ahead three-run HR off Corey Kluber.

2016

- ▶ Hit .217 (71-for-327) with 32R, 13 doubles, 8HR and 31RBI in 123 games (52 starts in RF, 20 in LF and 20 in CF) in his first season with the Yankees...was the only Major League player to make at least 20 starts at all three outfield positions in 2016...was the first Yankee to do so since Joe DiMaggio in 1936.
- ▶ Of the 16 outfield throws of at least 100 mph tracked by MLB Statcast in 2016, three were by Hicks...had an outfield assist to nab Danny Valencia at the plate to end the fourth inning on 4/20 vs. Oakland, with a throw recorded at 105.5 mph by MLB Statcast (the fastest throw by an outfielder in 2016).
- ▶ Made his Yankees debut in 4/5 Opening Day loss vs. Houston, starting in LF...collected his first hit as a Yankee with a seventh-inning single in 4/6 win vs. Houston.



- ▶ Missed four games from 4/23-26 with left shoulder bursitis...suffered the injury in 4/22 win vs. Tampa Bay diving for a fly ball in the fourth inning.
- ▶ Hit game-winning solo HR—his first HR as a Yankee—in the seventh and was 1-for-2 in 5/6 win vs. Boston.
- ▶ Hit .280 (23-for-82) with 4HR and 9RBI in 26 games in August...over the first four months of the season, batted just .187 (39-for-209) with 3HR and 19RBI in 86 games.
- ▶ Was placed on the 15-day D.L. from 9/5 (retroactive to 9/1) – 9/20 with a Grade 2 right hamstring strain...suffered the injury in 8/31 win at Kansas City and underwent an MRI in Baltimore on 9/1.
- ▶ Hit a go-ahead two-run HR in the ninth inning of 9/26 win at Toronto...was his first career game-tying or go-ahead HR in the ninth or later...was his first home run on the road since 9/7/15 at Kansas City w/ Minnesota.

2015

- ▶ Hit .256 (90-for-352) with 48R, 11 doubles, 11HR and 33RBI in 97 games with the Twins...was named the 2015 Charles O. Johnson Award winner for "Most Improved Twin" by the Twin Cities Chapter of the BBWAA.
- ▶ Posted a .996 fielding percentage (254TC, 1E)...tied for 11th in the AL with nine outfield assists.
- ▶ Was placed on the 15-day disabled list on 6/14 with a right forearm strain...played in six rehab games with Triple-A Rochester...was returned from rehab and reinstated from the D.L. on 7/3.
- ▶ Hit .346 (27-for-78) with 15R, 2 doubles, 2 triples, 4HR, 16RBI, 11BB and a .424 OBP in 23 games in July.
- ▶ Hit his first career leadoff HR (off Nick Martinez) in 8/12 win vs. Texas.

Bobby Murcer Recognized

Oklahoma Christian University dedicated the new Bobby Murcer Indoor Training Facility on September 23, 2011.

OCU officials and members of Bobby Murcer's family were on hand to celebrate the opening of the \$503,000 facility, named after the Oklahoma City native and New York Yankees player and broadcaster, who died in July 2008 at age 62 after battling brain cancer.

Although he never attended Oklahoma Christian, Murcer—who attended Southeast High School in Oklahoma City and was one of the state's most famous baseball players before being drafted by the Yankees—had strong ties with many people associated with the university, as he and his wife, Kay, attended Memorial Road Church of Christ, which is located immediately southwest of the OCU campus.

The Bobby Murcer Indoor Training Facility is located on the northwest corner of the Oklahoma Christian campus, next to Dobson Field, where the Eagles' baseball team plays its home games. The 12,800-square-foot facility includes 8,000 square feet of workout space, including batting cages. The facility also includes a clubhouse with showers, an athletic training area, a weight training area and laundry facilities.

The lobby of the facility includes photos from Murcer's playing and broadcasting careers, special wallpaper depicting various scenes from OCU's baseball history and plaques honoring the Oklahoma Christian players who have received NAIA All-America honors through the years.

- ▶ Reached base a career-high-tying five times on 6/24 vs. Kansas City (third time, also 6/11/17 vs. Baltimore and 9/4/17 at Baltimore), going 3-for-3 with 3R, 1 double, 1HR, 2RBI and 2BB...was the first Yankee to reach base five times in a game since Giancarlo Stanton on 9/27/19 at Texas.
- ▶ Played in his 500th career game on 7/3 vs. New York-NL, hitting a solo HR in the sixth inning...his 138 career home runs through 500 career games were the second-most in Major League history by a player through 500 games, trailing only Ryan Howard's 153HR.
- ▶ Stole his first base of the season on 7/6 vs. Seattle, his first stolen base since 8/26/19 at Seattle.
- ▶ Recorded his 500th career hit with a ninth-inning double on 7/9 at Houston...according to STATS, he became the second-fastest Yankee (first 506 games) to collect 500H and 100HR in his career, trailing only Joe DiMaggio (first 395 games).
- ▶ Hit a game-winning solo HR in the Yankees' 1-0 win on 7/10 at Houston...marked the first time the Yankees have won a game by a score of 1-0 in which the only run came via a solo HR since 5/25/10 at Minnesota (Derek Jeter HR in the sixth).
- ▶ Played in his third career All-Star Game on 7/13 at Coors Field (also 2017-18), recording a walk and scoring the AL's first run in the second inning (0-for-2)...started the game in RF and batted cleanup...was the 16th Yankee in franchise history to bat cleanup in the starting lineup of an All-Star Game (33rd time)...was the first since Mark Teixeira in the 2009 Midsummer Classic.
- ▶ Was placed on the COVID-19 injured list on 7/16...missed nine team games...was reinstated on 7/27.
- ▶ Hit a go-ahead RBI single in the 10th inning on 7/28 at Tampa Bay (1-for-3, 1RBI) after entering the game as a pinch hitter in the fifth and remaining in the game in RF...marked his third career hit that gave the Yankees the lead in extra innings (first since a go-ahead solo HR in the 11th inning on 7/5/19 at Tampa Bay).
- ▶ In 26 games from 8/7-9/4, hit .381/.465/.711 (37-for-97) with 17R, 8 doubles, 8HR, 24RBI, 16BB and 4SB in that span...ranked second in the Majors in BA and OBP and third in SLG and OPS (1.176) during that stretch.
- ▶ Reached base in a season-high 20 straight games from 8/7-28, batting .384/.477/.753 (28-for-73) with 15R, 6 doubles, 7HR, 21RBI, 14BB/11BB, 45B and 15F over that span...was the fourth-longest on-base streak of his career, trailing a 32-game streak (5/28-6/30/17), 26-game streak (9/3/17-3/29/18) and a 21-game streak (4/1-26/18).
- ▶ Reached base at least three times in four straight games from 8/12-16, the longest streak by a Yankee since he did so in four straight games from 6/25-30/19...reached base in 12-of-19 plate appearances in that span (7H, 5BB).
- ▶ Recorded his fourth multi-HR game of the season and tied his season high with 5RBI on 8/12 in the "Field of Dreams" game at Chicago-AL in Iowa...hit a go-ahead, three-run HR in the third inning and a two-run HR in the ninth.
- ▶ Was 3-for-4 with 2R, 1 double, 1HR and 4RBI on 8/14 at Chicago-AL, hitting a go-ahead solo HR in the eighth inning and a go-ahead RBI single in the 10th inning...marked his fourth career hit in extra innings that either tied the game or gave the Yankees the lead (second of the season, also go-ahead RBI single in the 10th inning on 7/28 at Tampa Bay).
- ▶ With 5RBI on 8/12 at Chicago-AL in Iowa and 4RBI on 8/14 at Chicago-AL, was the first Yankee to record at least 4RBI in back-to-back games since Gio Urshela from 8/7-8/19 (also 2G)...drove in nine of the Yankees' 20R during their series against the White Sox from 8/12-15.
- ▶ Stole a base in back-to-back games from 8/17-18 for the first time in his career.
- ▶ Hit .306/.363/.611 (44-for-144) with 24R, 8 doubles, 12HR, 33RBI and 14BB in his final 38 games of the season (8/23-10/3).
- ▶ Recorded multiple hits in a career-high five straight games from 8/23-28.



- ▶ Hit a go-ahead RBI single in the ninth inning on 8/26 at Oakland, marking his sixth career hit that put the Yankees in the lead in the ninth inning or later and his third hit of the season (also a go-ahead RBI single in the 10th inning on 8/14 at Chicago-AL and a go-ahead RBI single in the 10th inning on 7/28 at Tampa Bay).
- ▶ Judge and Giancarlo Stanton both hit 10HR in September, the most by a Yankee in a single calendar month since Luke Voit hit 11HR in August 2020...it marked the ninth time in franchise history the Yankees had two players hit double-digit home runs in a single calendar month: Curtis Granderson (10HR) and Mark Teixeira (10HR) in May 2011, Joe Pepitone (10HR) and Mickey Mantle (10HR) in July 1966, Roger Maris (13HR) and Mickey Mantle (14HR) in July 1961, Roger Maris (15HR) and Mickey Mantle (11HR) in June 1961, Roger Maris (14HR) and Mickey Mantle (12HR) in June 1960, Hank Bauer (10HR) and Mickey Mantle (16HR) in May 1956, Lou Gehrig (11HR) and Babe Ruth (10HR) in July 1931, and Lou Gehrig (10HR) and Babe Ruth (15HR) in June 1930.
- ▶ Hit 5HR in a seven-game span from 9/11-17 and hit 9HR in his final 21 games from 9/11-10/3.
- ▶ Hit a game-tying, three-run HR in the eighth inning on 9/13 vs. Minnesota...marked his 12th career HR (third of the season) that either tied the game (four) or gave the Yankees the lead (eight) in the eighth inning or later (also hit a go-ahead solo HR in the eighth on 8/14 at Chicago-AL and a game-tying, two-run HR in the eighth on 9/11 at New York-NL)...marked his 83rd career HR at home, surpassing Robinson Canó (82) for the second-most HR at the current Yankee Stadium.
- ▶ Hit a "walk-off" single in the ninth inning on 10/3 vs. Tampa Bay, clinching the Yankees postseason berth...marked his first career "walk-off" hit and his second career "walk-off" plate appearance (also a bases-loaded, "walk-off" walk in the ninth inning on 5/23/21 vs. Chicago-AL).
- ▶ Was 1-for-4 in the AL Wild Card Game at Boston.

2020

- ▶ Hit .257/.336/.554 (26-for-101) with 23R, 3 doubles, 9HR and 22RBI in 28 games with the Yankees.
- ▶ In nine home games, batted .290 (9-for-31) with 9R, 2 doubles, 5HR, 10RBI and 7BB...seven of his 9H went for extra bases...collected at least one extra-base hit in each of his six home games with a hit.
- ▶ Was named AL "Player of the Week" for the period from 7/27-8/2...hit .368/.478/.316 (7-for-19) with 9R, 6HR, 13RBI, 2BB and 2HP during the week, homering in each of his five games played...was his third career AL "Player of the Week" honor and first since Sept. 2017...was the first Yankee to win the award since DJ LeMahieu in July 2019.
- ▶ Homered in a career-high five straight games from 7/29-8/2 (6HR)...was the 10th Yankee to homer in at least five straight games and first to do so since Alex Rodriguez from 9/4-9/07 (also five straight)...only Don Mattingly (eight straight from 7/8-18/87), Roger Maris (six from 8/11-16/61) and Lou Gehrig (six from 8/28-9/1-31) had longer home run streaks for the Yankees.
- ▶ With Voit homering in five straight games from 8/17-26, became the sixth set of teammates since 1901 to each have five-game home runs streaks in the same season...joined the 1954 Indians (Al Rosen and Larry Doby, 5 each), 1983 White Sox (Greg Luzinski and Ron Kittle, 5 each), 2003 Rangers (Carl Everett and Alex Rodriguez, 5 each), 2006 Pirates (Jason Bay, 6 and Jose Castillo, 5) and 2019 Astros (Jose Altuve and Yuli Gurriel, 5 each)—credit: YES Network.
- ▶ Hit a game-winning, three-run HR in the ninth inning and went 1-for-4 with 2R and 1HP in 7/30 win at Baltimore...was his third career game-tying or go-ahead HR in the ninth inning or later (also 6/6/18 at Toronto: two-run go-ahead HR in the top of the 13th and 7/5/19 at Tampa Bay: go-ahead solo HR in the top of the 11th).
- ▶ Hit a go-ahead three-run HR in the second inning and a game-winning two-run HR in the eighth inning on 8/2 vs. Boston (2-for-4, 2R, 2HR, 5RBI, 1BB), homering in his career-high fifth straight game...was his 10th career multi-*HR* game and first since 7/5/19 at Tampa Bay...was his sixth career multi-*HR* game at Yankee Stadium (first since 9/25/17 vs. Kansas City)...marked his second career game with at least 5RBI (also 6RBI on 9/14/17 vs. Baltimore)...his homer in the eighth was his fifth go-ahead HR of the season, becoming the first player in Major League history to hit five go-ahead home runs in his team's first eight games of a season according to STATS.
- ▶ Hit his seventh homer in Game 1 on 8/5 at Philadelphia (his 10th game), matching Alex Rodriguez (2007) for most by a Yankee through the team's first 10 games of a season in franchise history.
- ▶ Hit his ninth home run of the season on 8/11 vs. Atlanta in the Yankees' 17th game of the season...became the fourth Yankee in franchise history to hit at least 9HR through the team's first 17 games, joining Alex Rodriguez (12 in 2007), Graig Nettles (10 in 1974) and Mickey Mantle (9 in 1956)...collected his 20th RBI on the homer, the fifth-most by a Yankee through the team's first 17 games since 1989 being only Alex Rodriguez (31 in 2007), Bernie Williams (21 in 2000), Nick Swisher (21 in 2012) and Tino Martinez (21 in 1998).
- ▶ Was placed on the 10-day injured list with a right calf strain on 8/14 (retroactive to 8/12)...at the time of his placement on the IL (8/14), led the Majors in HR (9) and slugging pct. (.758), was tied for first in RBI (20), tied for fourth in runs (16), ranked fifth in OPS (1.101) and was tied for eighth in extra-base hits (11).
- ▶ Was reinstated from the 10-day injured list on 8/25 (missed eight team games)...in his first appearance back from the I.L. in Game 2 on 8/26 at Atlanta, went 1-for-3 before being removed defensively in the sixth.
- ▶ Was placed back on the 10-day injured list on 8/28 (retroactive to 8/27) with a right calf strain and reinstated on 9/16 (missed 21 team games).
- ▶ Hit a game-tying RBI single in the eighth inning on 9/25 vs. Miami...was his third game-tying or go-ahead hit in the eighth inning or later in 2020 (also a go-ahead three-run HR in the ninth inning on 7/30 at Baltimore and a two-run go-ahead HR in the eighth inning on 8/2 vs. Boston)...his double in the third inning was his first extra-base hit overall since a solo HR on 8/11 vs. Atlanta.
- ▶ Hit .133 (4-for-30) with 3R, 3HR, 5RBI and 4BB in seven postseason games...each of his 3HR gave the Yankees the lead.
- ▶ Hit a two-run HR in the first inning of ALWCS Game 1 at Cleveland...was his ninth career postseason home run (in his 28th postseason game), tied for the most home runs by a Yankee through his first 28 postseason games (also 9HR by Mickey Mantle, Lou Gehrig and Giancarlo Stanton)...at the time, were also tied for the fifth-most by a player in Major League history through his first 28 postseason games, trailing only Carlos Beltrán (13HR), Nelson Cruz (12HR), George Springer (10HR) and Duke Snider (10HR).



- ▶ Hit his 10th career postseason HR in ALDS Game 1 (his 30th career postseason game), tying Lou Gehrig, Hideki Matsui, Paul O'Neill and Alex Rodriguez for eighth place on the Yankees' all-time list...his 10HR are tied with Lou Gehrig for the most by a Yankee through his first 30 career postseason games...at the time, were also tied for the third-most by any player in his first 30 career postseason games in Major League history, trailing only Carlos Beltrán (14HR) and Nelson Cruz (13HR).
- ▶ His solo HR drove in the Yankees' only run in ALDS Game 5 at Tampa Bay at Petco Park...was his 11th career postseason HR, tying Jorge Posada for seventh place on the Yankees' all-time list...came in his 34th career playoff game, tying Mickey Mantle for most by a Yankee through 34 postseason games in franchise history...at the time, were tied for third-most through 34 playoff games in Major League history behind Carlos Beltrán (14HR) and Nelson Cruz (14HR).
- ▶ Appeared in just two total spring training games (both in New York), going 3-for-7 with 3R, 3HR and 4RBI...did not play in a game during spring training in Florida while recovering from a stress fracture of the first right rib.

2019

- ▶ In 102 games with the Yankees, hit .272 (103-for-378) with 75R, 18 doubles, 27HR and 55RBI...reached the 20HR plateau for the third straight season...of his 27HR, 19 tied the game (four) or gave the Yankees the lead (15).
- ▶ Was named the winner of the 2019 Wilson Defensive Player of the Year Award in RF, his first such award...his seven assists were fourth-most among outfielders who did not commit an error, while his 12.7 UZR (Ultimate Zone Rating) and 19 Defensive Runs Saved ranked third and fifth, respectively, among all outfielders (FanGraphs).
- ▶ Went 2-for-3 with 3R and 2BB in 3/28 Opening Day win vs. Baltimore...with Luke Voit going 1-for-1 with 1R, 1HR, 4RBI, 2BB and 1HP in the game, the duo became the first Yankees to reach base safely at least four times on Opening Day since Alex Rodriguez on 4/6/12 at Tampa Bay and the first Yankees teammates to do so in the same Opening Day game since Rodriguez and Hideki Matsui on 4/3/06 at Oakland.
- ▶ Recorded his eighth career multi-HR game in 4/6 win at Baltimore, his first since 9/25/17 vs. Kansas City (also 2HR).
- ▶ Was removed in the sixth inning of 4/20 win vs. Kansas City after suffering a left oblique injury...was sent NewYork-Presbyterian Hospital for further evaluation and an MRI.
- ▶ Was placed on the 10-day injured list from 4/21-6/21 with a left oblique strain...missed 54 team games...hit .125 (2-for-16) with 2R, 1HR, 2RBI and 3BB in five rehab games with Triple-A Scranton/Wilkes-Barre.
- ▶ Hit leadoff in the starting lineup for the first time in his career on 6/21 vs. Houston (0-for-4).
- ▶ Hit two solo HRs on 7/5 at Tampa Bay, his ninth career multi-HR game...his 11th-inning, game-winning, first-pitch HR had an exit velocity of 116.3 mph...was his second career go-ahead HR in extra innings (also a two-run HR on 6/6/18 at Toronto).
- ▶ Reached in 24-of-57PA in 13 games from 8/16-31 (21H, 3BB) after reaching in 6-of-34PA over his prior 8G (3H, 3BB).
- ▶ Homered in each of the Yankees' 10 series from 8/20-9/22, hitting 14HR in 29 games during the stretch...was homerless over a 13-game span from 8/5-18 leading into the streak.
- ▶ Hit his 100th career home run on 8/27 at Seattle (off Yusei Kikuchi)...came in his 371st career game, becoming the third-fastest player to reach the mark (in terms of games played) in Baseball history behind only Philadelphia's Ryan Howard (Game No. 325 on 6/27/07) and teammate Gary Sánchez (Game No. 355 on 8/23/19)...was later surpassed by Pete Alonso in 2021 (347G)...was the fourth Yankee to hit career HR No. 100 in 2019 (Gardner, Gregorius, Sánchez)...was the seventh player drafted and signed by the Yankees to hit at least 100HR with the club (Gardner, Posada, Jeter, Mattingly, Munson and Pagliarulo).
- ▶ Started in RF in each of the Yankees' nine postseason games...hit a two-run HR in the fourth inning of ALCS Game 2 at Houston...marked his eighth career postseason HR (in his 23rd career playoff game), becoming the fourth Yankee to hit 8HR within his first 23 postseason games (also Lou Gehrig-9HR, Mickey Mantle-8HR and Bernie Williams-8HR).

2018

- ▶ In 112 games with the Yankees, hit .278 (115-for-413) with 77R, 22 doubles, 27HR, 67RBI, 76BB and 65B...the Yankees went 21-6 when he homered in 2018...was a finalist for the AL Gold Glove Award in RF.
- ▶ Hit .352/.471/.699 (69-for-196) with 47R, 14 doubles, 18HR, 45RBI and 20 multi-hit games in 56 contests at Yankee Stadium...did not go consecutive home games without a hit over a 59-game stretch at Yankee Stadium (9/17/17-7/26/18)...hit safely in 17 consecutive home games from 9/17/17-4/16/18...had at least 1RBI in a franchise-record 14 straight home games from 9/18/17-4/7/18...was tied for the fourth-longest such streak in the Majors since RBI became an official statistic in 1920.
- ▶ Appeared in each of the Yankees' first 56 games of the season from 3/29 through Game 2 on 6/4.
- ▶ Hit 25HR before the All-Star break, becoming the fourth player to hit at least 25HR before the break in two different seasons as a Yankee and just the second to do so in consecutive years, joining Roger Maris (1960-61), Mickey Mantle (1956 and '61) and Jason Giambi (2003 and '06).
- ▶ Had a career-long 14-game hitting streak from 9/17/17-3/29/18...had an eight-game streak of drawing at least one walk from 9/24/17-3/29/18, matching the longest streak of his career (also 6/6-13/17).
- ▶ Made his first Major League start (and appearance) in CF in 3/31 loss at Toronto.
- ▶ Hit game-winning two-run HR in the 13th on 6/6 at Toronto...was his first career extra-inning HR and was the latest Yankees HR to break a 0-0 tie since Alex Rodriguez's 15th-inning two-run "walk-off" HR on 8/7/09 vs. Boston.
- ▶ Hit game-winning solo HR in the eighth inning on 6/9 at the Mets...was the third straight game the Yankees hit a go-ahead HR in the eighth-inning-or-later, their first time doing so since 8/29-31/77 (three straight - Chambliss, Rivers and Nettles)...Judge hit two of those homers after having just one go-ahead HR in the eighth-inning-or-later over his first 239 career games.



- ▶ Started in LF and went 1-for-2 with 1R, 1HR, 1RBI and 1BB in the AL's All-Star Game win on 7/17...his solo HR off Scherzer to lead off the second inning was the first of 10HR hit in the game and the first All-Star homer by a Yankee since Jason Giambi in 2003...became the third Yankee to homer in an All-Star Game at age 26-or-younger, joining Joe DiMaggio (1936) and Mickey Mantle (1955 and '56)...was selected by fans to his second straight All-Star team...is one of five position players drafted by the Yankees to make the All-Star team multiple times as a Yankee (also Thurman Munson, Don Mattingly, Derek Jeter and Jorge Posada)...received a fan-elected starting assignment for the second straight year and was the first Yankee to start at least two straight ASGs since Robinson Canó (2010-13) and first Yankees OF to start two straight since Curtis Granderson (2011-12).
- ▶ Was hit by a pitch on 7/26 vs. Kansas City...underwent an MRI at NewYork-Presbyterian Hospital and was diagnosed with a chip fracture of the right wrist (ulnar styloid bone)...was placed on the 10-day disabled list with the injury from 7/27-9/14 (missed 45 team games)...in a simulated game at Yankee Stadium on 9/17, had 11 live at-bats off of RHP A.J. Cole, RHP Chance Adams and minor-league LHP Phillip Diehl.
- ▶ Hit the Yankees' 264th home run of the season with a solo HR in the eighth inning of 9/28 win at Boston, tying the single-season Major League record (1997 Seattle Mariners)...the record was since surpassed.
- ▶ Hit .421/.500/.947 (8-for-19) with 6R, 1 double, 3HR, 4RBI and 3BB in five postseason games...homered in each of the first 3G, becoming the second Yankee to homer in each of the team's first three postseason games in a year, joining Hank Bauer from 1958 World Series Game 1 through Game 3 (note: Johnny Mize homered in 1952 World Series Games 3-5 after missing the first 2G of the Series)...was joined by Giancarlo Stanton in 2020...became the third player to begin a postseason with 3G with at least 2H and 1HR, joining St. Louis' Matt Carpenter in 2014 and the Yankees' Hank Bauer in 1958.
- ▶ Hit a two-run HR in the first inning of the Wild Card Game...with an exit velocity of 116.1 mph, was briefly the hardest-hit postseason HR of the Statcast era (since 2015), until Stanton's HR surpassed it later in the game.

2017

- ▶ In 155 games with the Yankees (141 starts in RF, 10 at DH), hit .284 (154-for-542) with 128R, 24 doubles, 3 triples, 52HR, 114RBI, 127BB and 95B...according to MLB Statcast, his 94.9 mph average exit velocity on balls in play was highest among all Major League hitters...earned his first career Silver Slugger Award.
- ▶ Placed second in AL Most Valuable Player voting, totaling 279 points (2 first place votes, 27 second place votes, 1 third place vote)...was the second rookie all time to finish second in MVP voting, joining Mike Trout in 2012 (won by Miguel Cabrera).
- ▶ Was unanimously named AL Jackie Robinson "Rookie of the Year" by the BBWAA...was the ninth Yankee to win the award and second by a unanimous vote (also Derek Jeter in 1996)...was the only player listed on every ballot.
- ▶ Was named MLB "Rookie of the Year" by *Baseball America*, the first Yankee to win the award since Derek Jeter (1996)...was also named 2017 *Sporting News* AL "Rookie of the Year," as voted on by a panel of AL players...was selected to the Topps MLB All-Star Rookie Team.
- ▶ Led the American League in runs scored (128, second MLB), home runs (52, second MLB), walks (127, second MLB) and ranked second in RBI (114, sixth MLB), on-base pct. (.422, third MLB) and slugging pct. (.627, second MLB)...led the Majors with an 8.2 WAR, the highest by a Yankee since Alex Rodriguez in 2007 (9.6).
- ▶ With a 1.049 OPS, was the fourth rookie in the Modern Era (since 1900) with an OPS of 1.000-or-better: St. Louis' Albert Pujols (1.013) in 2001, Boston's Ted Williams (1.045) in 1939 and Cleveland's Joe Jackson (1.058) in 1911.
- ▶ Had 186 balls hit at least 95 mph, accounting for 55.0% of his balls put in play, the highest pct. in the Majors...hit 7HR with an exit velocity of 117 mph or higher (rest of the Majors: two, both by Giancarlo Stanton).
- ▶ Became the 13th Yankee to lead the AL (or tie for the lead) in home runs and first since Mark Teixeira (tied) in 2009...was the first Yankee to lead outright since Alex Rodriguez in 2007...held at least a share of the AL HR lead every day from 5/28 through the end of the season except one (end of play on 9/6).
- ▶ At the time, his 52HR were the most ever by a Major League rookie (Mark McGwire, 49HR in 1987) and surpassed Joe DiMaggio (29HR in 1936) for most by a Yankees rookie...was surpassed by the Mets' Pete Alonso (53) in 2019.
- ▶ His 52HR were then-tied with Mickey Mantle (52HR in 1956) and Alex Rodriguez (52HR in 2001) for third-most by a player 25-or-younger in Baseball history, trailing only Jimmie Foxx (58HR in 1932) and Babe Ruth (54HR in 1920)...was the fifth Yankee age 25-or-younger to hit at least 40HR in a season.
- ▶ Tied Mickey Mantle (52HR in 1956) for the eighth-most single-season homers in Yankees history and had the second-most by a right-handed hitter (Alex Rodriguez-54HR in 2007).
- ▶ Homered against every AL opponent, the first Yankee to do so since the AL expanded to 15 teams in 2013.
- ▶ Had 33HR at Yankee Stadium, most by a Yankee in a single season at a home venue in franchise history, ahead of Babe Ruth (32 in 1921)...in 77 home games, hit .312/.440/.725 (84-for-269) with 73R, 10 doubles, 33HR, 68RBI and 62BB.
- ▶ Had seven multi-HR games (all 2HR games): 4/28 vs. Baltimore, 5/2 vs. Toronto, 6/11 vs. Baltimore, 9/10 at Texas, 9/14 vs. Baltimore, 9/24 at Toronto and 9/25 vs. Kansas City), tied for fourth-most by a Yankee in a single season at the time (Gleyber Torres notched eight in 2019)...matched Mark McGwire (7G in 1987) for the most ever by a rookie in a single season...at the time, were tied for the fifth-most in a season by any player, age 25-or-younger behind only Ralph Kiner (10G in 1947), Willie Mays (9G in 1955), Reggie Jackson (8G in 1969) and Vladimir Guerrero (8G in 2000)...Gleyber Torres recorded eight such games in 2019.
- ▶ Had 52HR, while Gary Sánchez had 33HR...was just the second time in Yankees history that two teammates, age 25-or-younger, hit at least 30HR in the same season, joining Joe DiMaggio (31HR) and Joe Gordon (30HR) in 1940...with a combined 85HR, set the Major League record for homers by two teammates, each 25-or-younger (surpassed the 2007 Milwaukee Brewers' Prince Fielder-50 and Ryan Braun-34).
- ▶ Hit 30HR before the All-Star Game, one of three rookies ever to reach 30HR prior to the All-Star break (since 1933), along with Mark McGwire (33 in 1987) and Pete Alonso (30 in 2019)...is one of three Yankees ever to hit at least 30HR by the break, joining Roger Maris (33HR in 1961) and Alex Rodriguez (30HR in 2007)...marked the seventh time a Yankee led the Majors in homers at the All-Star break (since 1933): Rodriguez (30 in 2007, Maris (33 in 1961, Maris (27) in 1960, Mantle (29) in 1956, DiMaggio/Keller (19 each) in 1941 and DiMaggio (20) in 1937.



- ▶ His 128R were most by a Major League rookie since Mike Trout in 2012 (129R)...were second-most by a Yankees rookie (Joe DiMaggio-132R in 1936)...the Yankees went 58-27 when he scored a run.
- ▶ His 114RBI were most by a Yankee since Curtis Granderson (119) and Robinson Canó (118) in 2011...the Yankees were 44-20 when he had at least 1RBI and 23-5 when he had multiple RBI.
- ▶ Is the fourth rookie in Yankees history with at least 100RBI in a season: Joe DiMaggio (125 in 1936), Tony Lazzeri (114 in 1926) and Hideki Matsui (106 in 2003).
- ▶ Became the eighth player in Yankees history with at least 100R, 100RBI and 100BB in a season, joining Lou Gehrig (11x: 1926-27, '29-32, '34-38), Babe Ruth (10x: 1920-21, '23-24, '26-28, '30-32), Mickey Mantle (3x: 1954, '56, '61), Charlie Keller (2x: 1941-42), George Selkirk (1939), Bernie Williams (1999) and Jason Giambi (2002)...only Ruth (10x), Gehrig (5x), Mantle (2x) and Giambi accomplished the feat while also hitting at least 40HR...is the fourth Yankee ever with at least 110R, 110RBI and 110BB in a season (Ruth-10x, Gehrig-5x, Mantle-2x).
- ▶ Joined Boston's Ted Williams (1939) as the only players ever with at least 100R, 100RBI and 100BB as a rookie.
- ▶ Had 38 games with at least 1R, 1RBI and 1BB, most by a Yankee since Lou Gehrig in 1936 (43).
- ▶ Became the fourth rookie all-time to draw 100BB *and* score 100R in a season, joining Ted Williams in 1939 (131R, 105BB), Lu Blue in 1921 (103R, 103BB) and Jim Gilliam in 1953 (125R, 100BB).
- ▶ Is one of three players in Baseball history, age 25-or-younger, with at least 125R and 125BB in a season, joining Babe Ruth (1920, age 25) and Ted Williams (1941 and '42, ages 22 and 23).
- ▶ His 127BB set a Major League rookie record, surpassing Cleveland's Les Fleming (106BB in 1942) on 9/10 at Texas (credit: *Elias*)...surpassed Charlie Keller (81BB in 1939) for the Yankees' rookie walk record on 8/9 at Toronto.
- ▶ Is the fifth Yankee in franchise history—and only right-handed batter—with at least 125BB in a season (Ruth-10x, Gehrig-3x, Mantle-3x, Giambi-1x).
- ▶ Was twice named AL "Player of the Week:" 6/5-11 and 9/18-24.
- ▶ Hit .426/.588/1.049 (26-for-61) with 31R, 5 doubles, 11HR, 24RBI and 24BB in 19 games vs. Baltimore...his 31R were the most by any player vs. any opponent in one season since Boston's Ted Williams scored 31R in 1947 vs. St. Louis-AL...*Elias* notes it marked the most by a rookie vs. one team since Joe DiMaggio in 1936 vs. the Browns (31R)...his 11HR were the most by a Yankee vs. a single opponent in a season since 1961, when Roger Maris hit 13HR vs. Chicago-AL and Mickey Mantle hit 11HR vs. Washington-AL...according to *Elias*, tied Cleveland's Hal Trosky (11HR in 22G vs. Chicago-AL in 1934) for the most homers by a rookie against one team in a single season.
- ▶ Was named AL "Rookie of the Month" for April, batting .303 (23-for-76) with 23R, 10HR and 20RBI in 22 games...was the third Yankee ever to hit at least 10HR in March/April (Alex Rodriguez: 14HR in 2007 and Graig Nettles: 11HR in 1974)...ranked among all AL leaders with 23R (1st), a .750 SLG (1st), 10HR (T1st) and 20RBI (T5th) in April...tied a Major League rookie record for the most home runs in April, previously set by Chicago-AL's José Abreu in 2014 and tied by Colorado's Trevor Story in 2016 (credit: ESPN Stats & Info)...was the fourth Yankee ever to win the award (also Hideki Matsui-June 2003, Robinson Canó-September 2005 and Gary Sánchez-August 2016).
- ▶ In April, became the 10th rookie in Major League history with at least 10HR, 10BB, and a .300 batting average in any calendar month...the only other rookies to do so in the prior 40 years were Mike Trout (July 2012) and Gary Sánchez (August 2016)...also accomplished the feat in June and September, while Rhys Hoskins did so in August.
- ▶ Posted a .411 OBP in April (in 22G), a .441 OBP in May (26G) and a .481 OBP in June (28G)...became the third rookie in Major League history to have an OBP of at least .400 in April, May and June (min. 75PA in each month): also St. Louis' Albert Pujols in 2001 and Houston's Greg Gross in 1974.
- ▶ Became the youngest player in Major League history—and the only rookie—to hit at least 13HR through his team's first 26G of the season...was the second Yankee to do so (also Alex Rodriguez-14HR in 2007).
- ▶ Hit two-run HR—on the first pitch of his first career PA at Fenway Park—in 4/26 win at Boston...was the first Yankee to homer in his first career PA at Fenway since Cody Ransom on 9/26/08, who homered on each of the first two pitches he saw...the HR came on his 25th birthday, joining Roger Maris (9/10/66) and Yogi Berra (5/12/47) as the only Yankees to ever homer at Fenway on their birthday...also caught a third-inning foul pop by Xander Bogaerts while tumbling into the right field stands...the play was featured as the No. 1 play on ESPN *SportsCenter's* Top-10.
- ▶ Recorded his first career multi-HR game in 4/28 win vs. Baltimore, hitting solo HR in the fifth and two-run HR in the sixth...at 25 years, 2 days old, was the youngest Yankees outfielder with 2HR in a game since Melky Cabrera (24y, 254d on 4/22/09 vs. Oakland)...collected his second career multi-HR game in 5/2 win vs. Toronto...at 25 years, 6 days old, became the youngest Yankees outfielder with multiple 2HR games since Dan Pasqua (23y, 268d on 7/12/85 and 24y, 217d on 5/22/86).
- ▶ Was named AL "Rookie of the Month" for May after batting .347/.441/.642 (33-for-95) with 17R, 5 doubles, 7HR and 17RBI in 26 games and leading all AL rookies in BA, runs, hits, HR, RBI and OBP, while ranking second in SLG...was his second straight "Rookie of the Month" honor, having also won the award in April...became the first Yankee ever to win the award twice...was the first Yankee to win any monthly award in consecutive months since Don Mattingly was named AL "Player of the Month" in both August and September of 1985.



- ▶ Had a career-long 32-game on-base streak from 5/28-6/30, batting .339/.483/.720 (40-for-118) with 34R, 7 doubles, 1 triple, 12HR, 32RBI and 32BB over the span...was the longest single-season streak by a Yankee since Derek Jeter had a 34-game streak to end the 2012 season (8/27-10/3/12) and the longest single-season streak for a Yankees rookie since Charlie Keller in 1939 (40 games)...reached base safely in 42 consecutive starts from 5/28-7/16 (G1), batting .321 (51-for-159) with 39R, 8 doubles, 15HR, 36RBI and 38BB in his starts over the span.
- ▶ Was named AL "Player of the Month" and "Rookie of the Month" for June, batting .324/.481/.686 (33-for-102) with 30R, 5 doubles, 10HR, 25RBI and 30BB in 28G and reaching safely in every game...was his first career "Player of the Month" nod and his third "Rookie of the Month" honor, having also won the award in April and May...became the first Yankee ever to win three consecutive monthly awards and the first AL player with three straight "Rookie of the Month" honors in a single season since Chicago-AL's José Abreu in 2014...was the first AL player to win three "Rookie of the Month" awards in a row since Mike Trout won four straight from May-August 2012...was the 10th player all time (in either league) to win both awards in the same calendar month and second Yankee (also Gary Sánchez in August 2016).
- ▶ Hit safely in 17 straight home games from 6/10-7/28 (.379/.461/.864, 25-for-66, 20R, 2 doubles, 10HR, 17RBI, 9BB), matching the second-longest single-season streak by a Yankee at the current Yankee Stadium (since 2009): Carlos Beltrán, 18G (7/19-8/26/15) and Robinson Canó, 17G (5/17-6/17/10)...was the longest home hitting streak by a rookie in franchise history (previous: Hideki Matsui, 16G in 2003)—credit: *Elias*.
- ▶ His first-inning solo HR in 6/10 win vs. Baltimore had an exit velocity of 121.1 mph, setting a then-record for hardest hit HR in the Statcast era (since 2015)...was surpassed by Giancarlo Stanton's HRs on 8/9/18 (121.7 mph) and 7/25/20 (121.3 mph).
- ▶ Hit his Major League-leading 20th home run of the season on 6/11 vs. Baltimore, becoming the first rookie in Major League history to be the first player to 20HR in a season...hit 2HR in the game...his sixth-inning solo HR went 495' (per Statcast), the longest measured HR hit in the Majors in 2017.
- ▶ Through the end of play on 6/11, led the AL in all three Triple Crown categories...since RBI became an official stat, was the first time a rookie led his league in each of those categories on 6/1 or later (credit: *Elias*).
- ▶ Was selected to his first career All-Star team after leading the AL with 4,488,702 votes...was the first Yankee to lead the AL in All-Star voting since Jeter in 2009...at age 25, was the youngest player to lead the AL in voting since Ken Griffey Jr. (24) in 1994...was the leading vote-getter in all of Baseball via the Player Ballot...was the third Yankees rookie elected to start an All-Star Game (Hideki Matsui-2003, Joe DiMaggio-1936)...eight prior Yankees rookies were AL All-Star Team reserves: Dellin Betances (2014), Masahiro Tanaka (2014), Willie Randolph (1976), Tom Tresh (1962), Ryne Duren (1958), Bobby Richardson (1957), Spec Shea (1947) and Joe Page (1944)...was the sixth position player drafted by the Yankees to make the All-Star team as a Yankee (Munson, Mattingly, Jeter, Posada and Gardner).
- ▶ Won the Home Run Derby, defeating Minnesota's Miguel Sanó in the final round, 11HR-to-10HR...became the fourth Yankee to win a Derby, joining Robinson Canó (2011), Jason Giambi (2002) and Tino Martinez (1997)...was pitched to by Yankees BP pitcher Danilo Valiente...hit 23HR in the first round, topping Miami's Justin Bour (22HR)...in the semifinals, out-homered NL Rookie of the Year, Cody Bellinger of the Dodgers, 13HR-to-12HR...his 47 total homers hit (in 76 swings) were most ever by a Yankee in the Home Run Derby, surpassing Canó's 32HR in 2011 and second-most in Derby history at the time (2016 winner Giancarlo Stanton hit 61)...four of Judge's homers went at least 500 ft...was the first rookie ever to win the Derby outright (the Angels' Wally Joyner was a co-champion in 1986)...became the first player ever to win both the College and MLB Home Run Derby.
- ▶ Started in RF and went 0-for-3 for the AL in the All-Star Game on 7/11...was the second consecutive Yankees RF to be an All-Star (Carlos Beltrán)...at 25, was 14 years younger than Beltrán (39) in 2016...was the first Yankee to serve as the AL's starting right fielder since Paul O'Neill in 1997.
- ▶ Ended his single-season Major League-record 37-game strikeout streak (7/8-8/20) in 8/22 win at Detroit.
- ▶ Was named September AL "Player of the Month" (second, also June 2017) and "Rookie of the Month" (fourth, also April, May and June 2017)...hit .311/.463/.889 (28-for-90) with 29R, 7 doubles, 15HR, 32RBI and 28BB in 27G, his most HR and RBI in a calendar month in his career...were the most homers by a Yankee in a calendar month since Roger Maris hit 15HR in June 1961...was the fifth Yankee in franchise history to hit at least 15HR in a calendar month (Babe Ruth-4x, Joe DiMaggio-1x, Mickey Mantle-1x and Roger Maris-1x)...led the Majors in runs and walks and led the AL in RBI (2nd MLB), home runs (2nd MLB), slugging pct. (2nd MLB) and on-base pct. (3rd MLB).
- ▶ Reached base safely in his final 25 games (from 9/3), batting .329/.487/.951 (27-for-82) with 29R, 15HR, 31RBI and 28BB...hit 9HR over his final 12 games (from 9/18) and 15HR over his final 25 games (from 9/3).
- ▶ Hit 2HR in 9/10 win at Texas...with Gary Sánchez (2HR) also hitting multiple homers, the duo became the fourth pair of Yankees teammates, both age-25 or younger, with multiple HRs in the same game (also Ron Blomberg-2HR/ Otto Velez-2HR on 9/23/73-G1 at Cleveland; Charlie Keller-3HR/ Joe DiMaggio-2HR on 7/28/40-G1 at Chicago-AL; and Joe Gordon-2HR/Tommy Henrich-2HR on 8/27/38-G2 vs. Cleveland)...also collected his 107th walk of the season, surpassing Cleveland's Les Fleming (106BB in 1942) to set the all-time Major League rookie walks record.

- ▶ Had eight straight games with an extra-base hit (9/20-28), the longest ever by a Yankees rookie.
- ▶ Hit his 49th and 50th home runs of the season in 9/25 win vs. Kansas City, tying and surpassing Mark McGwire (49HR in 1987) for the single-season rookie home run record... was surpassed by the Mets' Pete Alonso in 2019.
- ▶ Made his postseason debut, batting .188 (9-for-48) with 9R, 3 doubles, 4HR and 11RBI in 13 playoff games... his 4HR were the most ever by a Yankees rookie in a single postseason (credit: ESPN Stats & Info)... at the time, his 4HR were tied with Miguel Cabrera (2003) for the third-most by a rookie in a single postseason behind Evan Longoria (6HR in 2008) and Kyle Schwarber (5HR in 2015)... Randy Arozarena hit 10HR in the 2020 playoffs... was the 15th player in Baseball history (and second Yankee) to have 4HR in a single postseason at age 25-or-younger (also Lou Gehrig-4HR in 1928).
- ▶ Made his postseason debut in the Yankees' AL Wild Card win vs. Minnesota, hitting a two-run HR in the fourth... according to *Elias*, became the third Yankee rookie to homer in his postseason debut, joining Shane Spencer (1998 ALDS Game 2 vs. Texas) and Elston Howard (1955 World Series Game 1 vs. Brooklyn)... was the first postseason HR by any Yankees rookie since Hideki Matsui in 2003 World Series Game 2 vs. Florida... both he and Brett Gardner scored 3R, becoming the seventh set of Yankees teammates to each score at least 3R in a postseason game, and only the second since 1962 (Rodriguez/Matsui/Sheffield in 2004 ALCS Game 3 at Boston).
- ▶ Leapt at the right field wall to rob Francisco Lindor of a potential two-run HR for the second out in the top of the sixth in ALDS Game 3 vs. Cleveland... was the first time in his career he robbed a homer (ESPN Stats & Info).
- ▶ Had multiple RBI in three straight home games (ALDS Game 4, ALCS Games 3 and 4), going 4-for-11 with 3R, 2 doubles, 2HR, 7RBI and 2BB in those games... was the second player in Yankees postseason history with at least 2RBI in three consecutive home games (Lou Gehrig: 3G, 1928 World Series Game 1 - 1932 World Series Game 1).
- ▶ Homered in consecutive games (ALCS Games 3 and 4 vs. Houston), becoming the seventh Yankee, age 25-or-younger, to homer in back-to-back playoff games (also Lou Gehrig, three straight; Mickey Mantle, two straight twice; Greg Bird; Derek Jeter; Gil McDougald and Charlie Keller)... was the third Yankee rookie to homer in consecutive playoff games, joining Keller (Games 3-4 in the 1939 World Series vs. Cincinnati) and Shane Spencer (Games 2-3 of the 1998 ALDS vs. Texas)—credit: *Elias*.
- ▶ In ALCS Games 3-5, became the seventh player (second Yankee) in postseason history to tally at least 1RBI, 1XBH and 1BB in three straight playoff games (Gehrig: MLB-record 4G from 1928 World Series Game 2-1932 World Series Game 1)... in each of his four games from ALCS Games 3-6, had at least 1R, 1RBI and 1XBH, becoming the third Yankee to do so in four straight postseason games (also Reggie Jackson and Lou Gehrig).
- ▶ Underwent arthroscopic surgery on his left shoulder on 11/20... the procedure involved a loose-body removal and cartilage clean-up, and was performed by Dr. Neal ElAttrache in Los Angeles at the Kerlan-Jobe Orthopaedic Clinic.

2016

- ▶ In 27 games with the Yankees (24 starts in RF), hit .179 (15-for-84) with 10R, 2 doubles, 4HR and 10RBI... according to MLB Statcast, had a 95.5 mph average exit velocity, second-highest among all Major League hitters (min. 40 batted ball events) behind only the Mariners' Nelson Cruz (95.9).
- ▶ Became the first player in Yankees history to record an extra-base hit in each of his first three career games (Game 1 - HR, Game 2 - HR, Game 3 - double)... became the ninth AL player since 1913 to accomplish the feat.
- ▶ According to ESPN Stats & Info, was the first player in AL history to record at least 1XBH and 1RBI in each of his first three career games... became the seventh player in Yankees history to record RBI in five of his first seven games to begin a Major League career, joining Yungervis Solarte (2014), Hideki Matsui (2003), Joe Buzas (1945), Joe DiMaggio (1936), George Selkirk (1934) and Norm McMillan (1922).
- ▶ Made his Major League debut on 8/13 win vs. Tampa Bay, hitting solo HR in the second off Matt Andriese... the HR came in his first career PA, becoming the fifth Yankee in franchise history (and second in the inning immediately following Tyler Austin's solo HR) to accomplish the feat (also John Miller, Marcus Thames and Andy Phillips)... per ESPN Stats & Info, was the longest HR by a Yankee at Yankee Stadium since 6/10/11 (Alex Rodriguez vs. Cleveland off Fausto Carmona)... became the third player in the history of the current Yankee Stadium to hit a ball into or over the centerfield batters eye glass (also Seattle's Russell Bryanan on 7/2/09 and Houston's Carlos Correa on 4/6/16)... with Austin also making his Major League debut in the game, became the first pair of teammates in Major League history to each homer in their Major League debuts in the same game... there had been just one other game in Baseball history in which two players each hit HRs in their first Major League at-bats, but they were on opposing teams (Brooklyn at Philadelphia on 4/19/38 - the Phillies' Emmett "Heinie" Mueller and the Dodgers' Ernie Koy - both in their first inning)... became the first pair of Yankees to make their Major League debuts as starters in the same game since C Johnny Ellis and CF Jim Little on 5/17/69 vs. California... was signed to a Major League contract and selected to the Yankees' 25-man roster prior to the game.
- ▶ Hit solo HR—his second in as many career games—in 8/14 loss vs. Tampa Bay... according to *Elias*, became the second player in Baseball history to homer in his first at-bat in each of his first two Major League games, joining the Cardinals' Keith McDonald in 2000... was the second player in Yankees history to homer in each of his first two Major League games, joining Joe Lefebvre, who did so from 5/22-23/80... joined Colorado's Trevor Story (first 4G, 6HR from 4/4-8) as the only two players to accomplish the feat in 2016.
- ▶ Was placed on the 15-day disabled list on 9/14 with a Grade 2 right oblique strain... injury occurred on a swing taken in the bottom of the fourth in 9/13 win vs. Los Angeles-NL (was removed in the top of the fifth).
- ▶ In 93 games with Scranton/WB, hit .270 (95-for-352) with 62R, 18 doubles, 19HR and 65RBI... at the time of his call up, ranked second in the IL in RBI and HR/AB ratio (1HR/18.53AB) and fourth in runs scored, home runs and slugging percentage (.489)... was an IL Mid-Season and Postseason All-Star, and an MiLB.com Organization All-Star.
- ▶ Following the season, was named the 2016 Kevin Lawn Award winner as the Yankees' minor league "Player of the Year"... was also tabbed by *Baseball America* as the Yankees' No. 6 prospect, as well as the IL's "Best Power Prospect" and the league's 19th-best prospect.



2015

- ▶ Split the season with Double-A Trenton and Triple-A Scranton/Wilkes-Barre, batting .255 (122-for-478) with 63R, 26 doubles, 3 triples, 20HR, 72RBI and 53BB in 124 games...led all Yankees minor leaguers in home runs and RBI.
- ▶ Played in the SiriusXM All-Star Futures Game in Cincinnati and went 1-for-4 with 1R.
- ▶ Appeared in three postseason games for the RailRiders, batting .364 (4-for-11) with 1RBI and 1BB.
- ▶ Following the season, was ranked by *Baseball America* as the No. 3 prospect in the Yankees organization, the No. 10 prospect in the International League and the No. 15 prospect in the Eastern League...was tabbed by MiLB.com as an Organization All-Star.

2014

- ▶ Made his professional debut, combining at Single-A Charleston and Single-A Tampa to bat .308 (144-for-467) with 80R, 24 doubles, 4 triples, 17HR, 78RBI and a .419 OBP in 131 games...finished the season ranked third among all minor leaguers with 89BB...led all Yankees farmhands in RBI, ranked fifth in HR and sixth in batting average.
- ▶ Was named a SAL Mid-Season All-Star with Charleston...following the season, was tabbed by *Baseball America* as the Yankees' second-best prospect...was also named an Organization All-Star by MiLB.com.
- ▶ After the season, played for Scottsdale in the Arizona Fall League, batting .278 (25-for-90) with 15R, 5 doubles, 4HR and 15RBI in 24G...was selected to the Fall Stars Game and was named AFL "Player of the Week" from 10/28-11/3.

2013

- ▶ Did not appear in a game after being selected by the Yankees in the first round of the First-Year Player Draft.
- ▶ Following the season, was ranked by *Baseball America* as the Yankees' No. 6 prospect.

- ▶ Full name is Aaron James Judge...he and his older brother were both adopted...graduated from Linden High School (Calif.) in 2010.
- ▶ Played baseball for three seasons at Fresno State, where he was a three-time All-Conference first team selection and a 2013 All-America honoree...in his three years, hit .346 (201-for-581) with 41 doubles, 17HR and 355B...won the 2012 TD Ameritrade College Baseball Home Run Derby in Omaha...was named a Louisville Slugger Freshman All-American and the WAC Freshman of the Year in 2011.
- ▶ Played for the Brewster Whitecaps of the Cape Cod League in 2012, earning the team's Citizenship Award for being a positive team member.
- ▶ Was the Yankees' 2021 Heart and Hustle Award winner, his first team award...the award honors active players who demonstrate a passion for the game of baseball and best embody the values, spirit and traditions of the game.
- ▶ Following the 2021 season, was tabbed the winner of the Sid Mercer/Dick Young New York Player of the Year Award by the New York Chapter of the BBWAA.

Core Four

According to Elias, Hall of Famers Derek Jeter and Mariano Rivera, alongside Jorge Posada became the first trio of teammates in MLB, NBA, NFL and NHL history to appear in at least one game together in each of 17 consecutive seasons from 1995-2011. The second-longest trios in Yankees franchise history played 13 years together (Bill Dickey, Lefty Gomez and Red Ruffing from 1930-42; and Whitey Ford, Elston Howard and Mickey Mantle from 1955-67).

Jeter and Posada appeared in 1,693 regular season games together for the Yankees, surpassing Lou Gehrig and Tony Lazzeri (1,659 games) for the most games played together by any pair of teammates in franchise history.

Elias also notes that, in 2013, Rivera and Jeter each played in their 19th season with the Yankees, becoming the first pair of players to be teammates in 19 or more consecutive seasons since Alan Trammell and Lou Whitaker with Detroit, who were also together 19 straight seasons from 1977-95.

The first game in which Derek Jeter, Jorge Posada and Mariano Rivera appeared together was Sept. 28, 1996 at Fenway Park. Jeter started and went 0-for-4. Andy Pettitte also appeared in his first career game with the trio that day, starting and going 2.0IP. Rivera allowed 1ER in 1.0IP. Posada also pinch-hit in the contest, striking out. The Yankees won, 4-2, and the losing pitcher was Roger Clemens.

1978 World Series Champion Yankees

The Yankees' memorable 1978 World Championship club came back from a 14.0-game deficit in the AL East standings at the close of play on July 19 to take the division with a dramatic 5-4, one-game playoff victory over the Boston Red Sox at Fenway Park on Oct. 2. The team went on to defeat Kansas City 3-games-to-1 in the ALCS before winning their second straight Fall Classic over Los Angeles, 4-games-to-2. The club was piloted to the title by Bob Lemon, who led the Yankees to a 48-20 record after taking over following Billy Martin's midseason resignation.

- ▶ Earned his first career Silver Slugger Award after finishing second in the AL in batting average (.327) and fourth in hits (197)...was the fourth Yankee to win the award at second base, joining Robinson Canó (2006, '10-13), Alfonso Soriano (2002) and Willie Randolph (1980).
- ▶ Became the first player in Yankees history to start at least 25 games at three different infield positions in one season (28 starts at 1B, 66 starts at 2B, 47 starts at 3B)...also made one start at DH.
- ▶ Was a finalist for the AL Gold Glove Award at 2B...among second basemen (min. 50GS at 2B), ranked second in the Majors and led the AL with a .993 fielding pct. (2E, 275 TC)...was his third straight season leading 2B in his league in fielding pct. (also 2017-18 in the NL).
- ▶ Led the Majors with 61 multi-hit games, tied for third with 18 games of at least 3H and ranked fourth (second in the AL) in batting average...led the Majors with a .389 (49-for-126) batting average with runners in scoring position and a .667 (10-for-15) average with the bases loaded...was the best batting average with RISP by a Yankee since Paul O'Neill's .428 mark in 1997.
- ▶ Ranked 11th in the AL with a team-leading 102RBI, the most by a Yankee since Aaron Judge in 2017 (114).
- ▶ Reached base safely in 122 of his 142 starts...reached multiple times in 78 of those starts.
- ▶ Reached 100R for the second time in his career (104R in 2016).



- ▶ His 197H were the most by a Yankee since 2012, when Derek Jeter had 216H...had the most multi-hit games (61) by a Yankee since Derek Jeter had 64 in 2012.
- ▶ Hit six leadoff HR (5/29 vs. San Diego, 6/25 vs. Toronto, 7/21 vs. Colorado, 8/3 vs. Boston-G1, 8/13 vs. Baltimore, 8/25 at Los Angeles-NL), most by a Yankee since Alfonso Soriano's club-record 13 leadoff HRs in 2003...hit .325 (175-for-539) with 98R, 29 doubles, 25HR and 92RBI as a leadoff hitter overall, collecting the fifth 25HR season by a Yankees leadoff hitter (also Alfonso Soriano: 38HR in 2002 and 35HR in 2003; Rickey Henderson: 28HR in 1986 and Bobby Bonds: 25HR in 1975)...two of the leadoff HRs came on the first pitch (7/21 vs. Colorado, 8/13 vs Baltimore)...his 92RBI from the leadoff spot were second-most in Yankees history behind Alfonso Soriano (99RBI in 2002).
- ▶ Had four hitting streaks of at least 10G (14G from 6/14-30; 12G from Game 2 on 9/12-27; 11G from Game 2 on 5/25-6/6 and 11G from 4/24-5/9), tied with Tim Anderson for most in the Majors...was the first Yankee with four double-digit hitting streaks in one year since Robinson Canó had four in 2011.
- ▶ Made his Yankees debut in 3/30 loss vs. Baltimore...started at 3B, his first appearance at the position since 6/13/14 at San Francisco w/ Colorado.
- ▶ Hit safely in six straight at-bats from the second inning on 4/10 through the fourth inning on 4/13.
- ▶ Hit his first HR as a Yankee with a fourth-inning solo HR on 4/20 vs. Kansas City.
- ▶ Was removed from 4/28 win at San Francisco in the bottom of the third with right knee inflammation (X-rays were negative)...underwent an MRI on 4/29, confirming inflammation in his right knee from his original contusion suffered in 4/26 win at San Francisco...missed three games (4/30-5/3) with the injury.
- ▶ Hit "walk-off" RBI single in the ninth on 5/7 vs. Seattle, his second career "walk-off" hit (also 9/12/18 vs. Arizona w/ Colorado).
- ▶ Started at 1B and batted leadoff on 5/9 vs. Seattle, the first Yankee to do both in the same game since Wade Boggs on 8/29/95 vs. California.
- ▶ Played in his 1,000th career game on 5/23 at Baltimore.
- ▶ Hit his third career leadoff HR on 5/29 vs. San Diego (first since 6/17/18 at Texas)...was the first of back-to-back HRs with Voit to lead off the game, marking the 10th instance in Yankees history they led off a game with consecutive homers (first since Gardner and Judge on 7/7/18 at Toronto).
- ▶ Was voted AL "Player of the Month" for June after leading the Majors in hits and pacing the AL in runs and RBI during the month, batting .395/.434/.658 (45-for-114) with 26R, 8 doubles, 2 triples, 6HR, 29RBI and 8BB in 25G...were the most hits by a Yankee in a calendar month since Derek Jeter had 46H in August 2009, and the most by an AL player since Baltimore's Tim Beckham had 50H in August 2017...became the seventh different Yankee (22nd time) to amass at least 45H, 16 extra-base hits and 29RBI in a calendar month, and first since Don Mattingly in September/October 1985...marked his first career monthly honor.
- ▶ Had a season-long 14-game hitting streak from 6/14-30, his longest since a 16-game streak from 8/23-9/8/17 with Colorado.
- ▶ Had at least 1H and 1R in 12 consecutive games from 6/16-30, tied for the sixth-longest streak in franchise history, trailing only Hall of Famers Lou Gehrig (15, 1930), Joe DiMaggio (14, 1941) and Babe Ruth (14, 1926; 13, 1921), as well as Bernie Williams (13, 2000)...hit .519 (27-for-52) with 19R, 3 doubles, 2 triples, 5HR, 20RBI and 6BB over the span.

- ▶ Hit 2 doubles in the Yankees' nine-run seventh on 6/30 at Boston in London, the first Yankee with 2XBH in one frame since Brendan Ryan hit 2 doubles in the second inning on 7/28/15 at Texas.

- ▶ Scored a playoff career-high 3R in ALCS Game 1 at Houston...hit a leadoff HR in ALCS Game 5 vs. Houston, the first by a Yankee in the playoffs since Derek Jeter in 2009 ALCS Game 3 at Los Angeles-AL...was the seventh leadoff HR in Yankees history (Derek Jeter-3, Johnny Damon-1, Phil Rizzuto-1, Gene Woodling-1).
- ▶ Tied the game with a two-run HR with one out in the top of the ninth inning in ALCS Game 6 at Houston.
- ▶ Signed by the Yankees to a two-year contract on 1/14/19.

2018

- ▶ Hit .276 (147-for-533) with 90R, 32 doubles, 15HR and 62RBI in 128 games with Colorado...had 12 go-ahead homers, five of which came in the eighth inning or later...of his 15HR, 11 came on the road.



New York Yankees Museum Presented by Bank of America

"Nobody has a story like the New York Yankees," says Yankees Museum Curator Brian Richards.

The New York Yankees Museum Presented by Bank of America is located on Yankee Stadium's Main Level (near Section 210). The museum presents the history of baseball's most legendary franchise through rotating displays of historic artifacts.

Displays include a "Ball Wall" containing autographed baseballs from Yankees past and present; Thurman Munson's locker from the original Yankee Stadium; and all seven World Series trophies won by the Yankees since the Steinbrenner family assumed principal ownership in 1973.

The museum presents exhibits on key players, teams, and achievements in Yankees history. In addition to permanent displays, the museum has featured rotating exhibits including: "Five Great Teams: The 1927, 1939, 1961, 1977, and 1998 New York Yankees"; "Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig: Baseball's Hardest-Hitting Teammates"; "Yankees by the Numbers"; and "Bronx Bombers: The New York Yankees' Home Run Heritage."



- ▶ Made his first career postseason appearance in 2020 ALDS Game 4 vs. Tampa Bay, allowing only 1ER in 4.0IP in the potential elimination game (GS, 3H, 3BB, 4K)...was only the third Yankee since 1982 to allow 1R-or-fewer and toss at least 4.0IP in his postseason debut, joining A.J. Burnett (1R in 6.0IP in 2009 ALDS Game 2 vs. Minnesota) and Orlando Hernández (0R in 7.0IP in 1998 ALCS Game 4)...was just the fourth Yankee in franchise history to start a potential elimination game in his postseason debut, joining Luis Severino (2017 AL Wild Card Game), Masahiro Tanaka (2015 AL Wild Card Game) and Shawn Chacon (2005 ALDS Game 4)... was the only pitcher in group to allow just 1R.
- ▶ Has made two career Opening Day rosters (2018, '21)...started the 2019 season on the injured list and began the 2020 season on the Yankees' taxi squad.

- ▶ Was 4-0 with a 2.59 ERA (31.1IP, 9ER) in five June starts...was the first Yankees rookie starter to go 4-0 or better with an ERA under 3.00 in a calendar month since Stan Bahnsen in May 1968 (4-0, 1.93).
- ▶ Was 6-4 with a 3.53 ERA (81.2IP, 32ER) in 14 starts from April-June and 3-3 with a 4.28 ERA (73.2IP, 35ER) in 15 starts from July-October.
- ▶ On 8/12 vs. Boston, was hit on the head by a flyball during Red Sox batting practice, but made his start the next day.

- ▶ Hit 4HR in a five-game span from 8/15-20...had hit just 2HR in his previous 50 games from 6/16-8/14.
- ▶ Notched 2HR on 8/20 vs. San Francisco, his first multi-homer game since 2017.
- ▶ Hit his second grand slam of the season on 9/13 vs. Pittsburgh.
- ▶ Suffered a moderate lateral right ankle sprain on 9/15 vs. Pittsburgh...returned to the lineup on 9/19 vs. St. Louis.

2018

- ▶ Hit .283 (160-for-566) with 74R, 29 doubles, 1 triple, 25HR, 101RBI and 70BB in 153 games with the Cubs.
- ▶ Reached the 100RBI plateau for his fourth consecutive season, becoming the first Cub to record at least four consecutive 100RBI seasons since Sammy Sosa (nine straight from 1995-2003)...was the first left-handed batter in franchise history to record four 100RBI seasons.
- ▶ Led the NL with 19 game-winning RBI, the first Cub to lead the league in that category since Sammy Sosa tied for the lead with 21 in 2003.
- ▶ Ranked third in the NL in HP (20), seventh in RBI and ninth in OBP (.376).
- ▶ Was placed on the disabled list for the first time in his career on 4/10 (retroactive to 4/6) with lower back tightness...was reinstated on 4/17.
- ▶ After batting .149 (11-for-74) in his first 18 games (3/29-4/30), batted .303 (149-for-492) with 29 doubles, 24HR, 92RBI and 66BB in his final 135 games (5/1-10/1).
- ▶ Hit his fourth-career leadoff home run on 5/1 vs. Colorado, surpassing Rick Monday for the most ever leadoff home runs by a Cubs first baseman.
- ▶ Posted a season-long 11-game hitting streak from 5/18-29.
- ▶ Drove in a run in eight straight games with an at-bat from 6/2-11...was the first Cub to accomplish the feat since Moises Alou had a 10-game streak from 8/20-29/04.
- ▶ Drove in a run in 10 straight home games from 5/25-6/19-G1...was the fourth Cub since the RBI became an official stat in 1920 to accomplish the feat, joining Ray Grimes (13 games, 1922), Hack Wilson (10, 1930) and Bill Nicholson (10, 1943).
- ▶ Hit a game-winning solo homer in the 11th inning on 6/11 at Milwaukee.
- ▶ Reached base in eight of 10 plate appearances in a doubleheader vs. St. Louis on 7/1, going 5-for-7 with 1 triple and 3BB...was the first Cubs batter to reach base eight times in a doubleheader since Mark Grace in 1995.
- ▶ Batted in the leadoff spot in 27 of 28 games from 7/13-8/14...led the NL with a .439 OBP during that span...also ranked fourth with a .340 batting average (35-for-103) over that stretch.
- ▶ Played in his 1,000th career game and hit his fourth career "walk-off" home run on 7/26...was his first "walk-off" HR since 9/15/14 vs. Cincinnati.
- ▶ Made his first career pitching appearance with two outs in the ninth inning of the Cubs 7-1 loss vs. Arizona on 7/23...threw two pitches and forced A.J. Pollock to fly out to center field.
- ▶ Collected his 1,000th career hit on 8/11 vs. Washington with a single in the third inning.
- ▶ Homered in three straight games from 8/21-23, one shy of his career-long streak.
- ▶ Recorded his 1,000th hit as a Cub with a seventh-inning double on 8/27 vs. the Mets.



2017

- ▶ Batted .273/.392/.507 (156-for-572) with 99R, 32 doubles, 3 triples, 32HR, 109RBI and 10SB in 157 games... tied his career high in home runs and RBI...led the club in games played.
- ▶ Was hit by a pitch a NL-leading 24 times...also ranked fourth in the NL in walks, fifth in RBI, ninth in runs scored and HR.
- ▶ Played 157 games at first base, recording a .998 fielding percentage (3E/1,375TC).
- ▶ Hit 10HR off left-handed pitchers...were tied for second-most in the Majors by a left-handed batter, trailing only the Dodgers' Cody Bellinger (12HR).
- ▶ Hit .333 (22-for-66) with 20R, 6 doubles, 7HR, 23RBI and 10BB in 18 games vs. Cincinnati...his 23RBI are tied for the third-most all-time by a Cubs player against the Reds in a single season.
- ▶ Hit a "walk-off" single in the home opener on 4/10 vs. Los Angeles-NL.
- ▶ Homered in three straight games twice: 4/21-23 and 7/15-17.
- ▶ Batted leadoff for the first time in his career in 10 straight games from 6/13-23, and reached safely in each of his first seven contests to lead off a game...became the first player in the last 60 seasons to reach in his first plate appearance in each of his first seven career games batting leadoff...was the second Cubs player since 1946 to reach safely leading off seven-straight team games, joining Richie Ashburn from 6/28-7/3/60.
- ▶ Hit three leadoff home runs: 6/13-14 at the Mets and 6/20 vs. San Diego...was the first Cub since at least 1920 to hit a leadoff home run in each of his first two career games batting leadoff...he was the first Major League player with a leadoff home run in each of his first two career leadoff starts since Arizona's Didi Gregorius on 6/4 at Colorado and 6/6 vs. Atlanta...was the first Cubs player with consecutive leadoff home runs since Tyler Colvin from 7/23-24/10...was the first Cubs first baseman to hit a leadoff home run since Rick Monday on 9/11/76 at Philadelphia.
- ▶ Recorded two hitting streaks of at least 12 games, including a career-high 14-game hitting streak from 6/6-20...hit .420 (21-for-50) with 12R, 5 doubles, 1 triple, 5HR, 17RBI and 12BB in that span.
- ▶ Batted .355 (39-for-110) with 25R, 9 doubles, 7HR, 30RBI and 13BB 29 games in August...his 30RBI were the most by a Cubs player in any month since Sammy Sosa's 36RBI in August of 2001.
- ▶ Was named the NL "Player of the Week" for 8/14-20 after batting .429/.484/.750 (12-for-28) with 5R, 3 doubles, 2HR, 13RBI and 2BB in seven games...was his second career weekly honor.
- ▶ Hit a first-inning grand slam on 8/16 vs. Cincinnati...marked just the third time in franchise history that a cleanup hitter hit a grand slam in the first inning with no outs, joining Hank Lieber (9/12/39 vs. Boston) and Bob O'Farrell (6/14/1923 vs. Brooklyn).
- ▶ Did not allow an error in his final 138 games (4/25-10/1), surpassing Ernie Banks' 126-game streak from 1969-70 seasons for the longest by a Cubs first baseman since at least the live ball era started in 1920.
- ▶ Hit .135 (5-for-37) with 1R, 1 double, 1HR, 6RBI and 2BB in 10 postseason games.

2016

- ▶ Hit .292/.385/.544 (170-for-583) with 94R, 43 doubles, 4 triples, 32HR, 109RBI and 74BB in 155 games with the Cubs...tied his career high in home runs and set a career high in RBI...was named to his third NL All-Star team.
- ▶ Ranked second in the NL in RBI, tied for second in doubles, third in extra-base hits (79), seventh in SLG and OPS (.929) and 10th in OBP.
- ▶ Was named the NL Platinum Glove winner and won his first career Gold Glove after leading all first basemen with 125 assists and ranking fifth among NL first basemen with a .996 fielding percentage (6E/1,399TC).
- ▶ Was the fourth Cubs player in franchise history to hit 40 doubles and 30HR in a season and the first left-hander to accomplish the feat...joined Rogers Hornsby in 1929, Derrek Lee in 2005 and Alfonso Soriano in 2007.
- ▶ Hit .341 (58-for-170) with 12 doubles, 1 triple, 11HR, 82RBI and 35BB with runners in scoring position...his .341 BA was the seventh-best average in that situation in the NL.
- ▶ His 48RBI with two strikes were tied for the Major League lead with Boston's David Ortiz.
- ▶ His 17 game-winning RBI were the second-most in the NL, trailing only Nolan Arenado (22).
- ▶ Hit 8HR in the team's first 19 games, becoming the first Cub to hit 8HR in the Cubs' first 19 games since Billy Williams did so in 1970.
- ▶ His 24RBI in April were the third-most by any Cub in the month of April, trailing only by Derrek Lee's 28RBI in 2005 and Billy Williams' 25RBI in 1970...his 8HR in April were tied for the second-most by a Cubs player in franchise history, trailing only Alfonso Soriano's 10HR in April of 2011.
- ▶ Hit 11HR and recorded 35RBI in the team's first 35 games (4/4-5/14)...according to *Elias*, was just the sixth Cubs player since 1920 (when RBI became an official stat) to record as many HR and RBI in the club's first 35 games of the season...joined Hack Wilson in 1930, Billy Williams in 1930, Dave Kingman in 1979, Andre Dawson (twice - 1987 and 1990) and Sammy Sosa in 2000.
- ▶ Recorded four multi-home run games (4/24 at Cincinnati, 7/20 vs. the Mets, 9/6 at Milwaukee and 9/14 at St. Louis).
- ▶ Reached base safely in a career-high 26-straight games from 4/15-5/14.
- ▶ Homered in three straight games from 4/20-22.
- ▶ His 6RBI on 4/7 at Arizona tied his career high.
- ▶ Recorded his first career inside the park home run on 6/29 at Cincinnati.
- ▶ Was the starting first baseman for the NL All-Star team, his third-straight All-Star appearance...was the first Cub to make three straight NL All-Star teams since Sammy Sosa made five consecutive Midsummer Classics from 1998-2002.
- ▶ Recorded hits in eight-straight at-bats from 7/9-10 at Pittsburgh, collecting four hits each game.
- ▶ Recorded a "walk-off" walk on 8/11 vs. St. Louis.



- ▶ Made his first career appearance at second base when he set up to field a possible bunt attempt on 9/28 at Pittsburgh.
- ▶ Hit .277/.373/.492 (18-for-65) with 11R, 5 doubles, 3HR, 10RBI and 8BB in the Cubs' World Series campaign... went 7-for-14 with 3R, 2 doubles, 2HR and 5RBI in the final three games of the NLCS after going 2-for-26 in the first seven postseason games...after going 0-for-4 in Game 1 of the World Series, proceeded to hit safely in the final six games of the series, including a pair of multi-hit games...went 3-for-5 and hit a two-out, two-run home run in the ninth inning of Game 6 of the World Series...scored a run in the 10th inning of Game 7 of the World Series.

2015

- ▶ Hit .278/.387/.512 (163-for-586) with 94R, 38 doubles, 3 triples, 31HR, 101RBI, 78BB and 17SB in 160 games with the Cubs...was named to his second career All-Star team...set a career high in stolen bases...ranked third in the NL in RBI, fourth in OPS (.899), fifth in OBP, tied for fifth in doubles, sixth in home runs and extra-base hits (72).
- ▶ Hit 30HR for the second straight season, becoming just the second left-handed hitter in franchise history to reach that plateau in multiple seasons...joined Billy Williams who reached the 30HR plateau 13 times.
- ▶ Recorded 94R, 38 doubles, 31 homers, 101RBI, 78BB and 17SB to become just the sixth-left-handed hitter in Major League history to reach those numbers in a single season...joined Babe Ruth (1921, 1923), Barry Bonds (1993, 1998), Ken Griffey, Jr. (1993), Larry Walker (1997) and Bobby Abreu (2001).
- ▶ Hit .294/.409/.472 (48-for-163) with 11 doubles, 6HR and 22BB off lefties...his .409 OBP off left-handers was the third-highest by any left-handed batter in the Majors.
- ▶ Was hit by a pitch 30 times, the most in the Majors and the most in franchise history (previous: 17 by Frank Chance in 1905 and Marlon Byrd in 2010)...were the most HP by a Major League player since Pittsburgh's Jason Kendall was hit 31 times in 1998.
- ▶ His 17SB ranked second among first basemen and were the most by a Cubs first baseman since Leon Durham had 28 in 1982.
- ▶ Recorded a .994 fielding percentage (9E/1,465TC) in 160 games at first base...his 126 assists were the second-most among big league first basemen (Joey Votto, 139)...went 50-straight games without an error from 5/26-7/24.
- ▶ Recorded his 100th career double on 5/19 at San Diego off James Shields.
- ▶ Tied his career high with 6RBI on 5/23 at Arizona.
- ▶ Recorded a 12-game hitting streak from 5/25-6/7, batting .386 (17-for-44) with 8R, 7 doubles, 1 triple, 2HR and 6RBI over that span.
- ▶ Recorded two multi-home run games: 6/5 at Washington and 6/19 at Minnesota.
- ▶ Homered in four straight games from 7/29-8/1...marked the 26th time since 1914 that a Cub homered in four straight games and the first since Alfonso Soriano from 4/30-5/4/10.
- ▶ Was named an NL All-Star for the second straight season, starting at DH (0-for-2)...was the first Cubs player to start an All-Star Game since OF Kosuke Fukudome and C Geovany Soto started in 2008.
- ▶ Hit his second career grand slam on 9/4 vs. Arizona off A.J. Schugel.
- ▶ Batted .188 (6-for-32) with 4R, 2HR, 2RBI, 2BB and 1HP in nine postseason games...homered off the Cardinals' Kevin Siegrist in both NLDS Game 3 and 4...was the first time in postseason history that a batter hit a homer off the same pitcher in consecutive games within one postseason series.

2014

- ▶ In 140 games with the Cubs, hit .286/.386/.527 (150-for-524) with 89R, 28 doubles, 1 triple, 32HR, 78RBI and 73BB...his 32HR set a career high (also tied in 2016 and 2017)...made his first career NL All-Star team.
- ▶ His 32HR ranked second in the NL, trailing only Miami's Giancarlo Stanton...was the first Cub to rank at least second in the NL in homers since Derrek Lee ranked second in 2005 with 46HR.
- ▶ Ranked third in the NL in OPS (.913) and go-ahead RBI (30) and ninth in walks.
- ▶ Was just the seventh Cubs left-handed hitter to reach 32 homers in a season and the first since Rick Monday (32HR in 1976).
- ▶ Batted .300 (42-for-140) with 6 doubles, 7HR and 11BB against lefties...his BA against lefties ranked fourth among NL left-handed hitters while he ranked second in homers (Philadelphia's Ryan Howard-10HR).
- ▶ Hit 11 homers on the first pitch of an at-bat, tied with Baltimore's Nelson Cruz for the most such home runs in the Majors.
- ▶ His 20HR prior to the All-Star break were the most by a Cubs left-handed batter since Rick Monday hit 21 before the break in 1973.
- ▶ Hit a two-run HR and drew 4BB on 4/30 at Cincinnati, becoming the first Cub to hit a homer and walk at least four times since Hee-Seop Choi on 4/16/03 vs. Cincinnati.
- ▶ Recorded three multi-homer efforts: 5/31 at Milwaukee, 7/18 at Arizona and 7/22 vs. San Diego.
- ▶ Won MLB's Final Vote for the 34th roster spot on the National League roster for the All-Star Game...won with over 8.8 million votes...became just the fourth Cubs first baseman to make the NL All-Star team in the last 32 years since 1982, joining Mark Grace (1993, 1995, 1997), Derrek Lee (2005, 2007) and Bryan LaHair (2012).
- ▶ At age 24, became the youngest first baseman in franchise history to make the NL All-Star team, surpassing Phil Cavarretta (age 27 in 1944).
- ▶ Had a 56-game errorless streak from 9/11/13-5/4/14 prior to committing an error on 5/5 vs. Chicago-AL...was the longest errorless streak by a Cubs first baseman since Derrek Lee's 59-game streak in 2010.
- ▶ Was named NL "Player of the Week" for 7/14-20 after hitting .455/.500/1.273 (5-for-11) with 3R, 3HR, 4RBI and 1HP in a three-game series at Arizona to start the second half of the season.



- ▶ Suffered a lower back strain on 8/26 at Cincinnati...missed the next 18 games...did not appear in a game again until 9/15 vs. Cincinnati, hitting a “walk-off” homer to lead off the ninth inning and break a scoreless tie.

2013

- ▶ In his first full Major League season, hit .233 (141-for-606) with 71R, 40 doubles, 2 triples, 23HR, 80RBI and 76BB in 160 games with the Cubs...ranked fifth in the NL in doubles and extra-base hits (65)...led the team and ranked sixth in the NL in walks.
- ▶ His 40 doubles were the most by a Cubs left-handed hitter since Mark Grace had 41 in 2000...his 65 extra-base hits were the team's most by a left-handed hitter since Grace had 65 in 1999.
- ▶ His .997 fielding percentage (5E/1,441TC) at first base ranked third in the NL.
- ▶ His 7HR against left-handed pitching were the fourth-most among NL left-handed hitters.
- ▶ Led the team with 22 go-ahead RBI and 10 game-winning RBI.
- ▶ Hit 8HR in April, tied for second-most by any Cubs hitter in franchise history...trailing only Alfonso Soriano who hit 10HR in April 2011...his 8HR in April were a franchise record for a Cubs left-handed hitter, surpassing Billy Williams (7HR in April 1970) and Henry Rodriguez (7HR in April 2000)...his 20RBI in April were the second-most RBI by a Cubs left-handed hitter in April (Billy Williams, 25 in 1970).
- ▶ Hit a home run on the first pitch he saw to begin the season on Opening Day at Pittsburgh off A.J. Burnett in the first inning.
- ▶ Drove in at least two runs in four of his first nine games to start the season...was the first Cub to accomplish the feat since Michael Barrett in 2006.
- ▶ Recorded three multi-home run games (4/26 at Miami, 8/1 vs. Los Angeles-NL and 8/21 vs. Washington).
- ▶ Set a career high with three doubles on 4/30 vs. San Diego.
- ▶ On 5/13, signed a seven-year contract through 2019 that included club options for both 2020 and 2021.
- ▶ Reached base safely in a career-high 15-straight games from 5/25-6/11.
- ▶ Scored a career-high 4R on 6/23 vs. Houston.
- ▶ Hit 4HR in a five-game span from 7/25-30.
- ▶ Played for Team Italy in the World Baseball Classic in March...batted .235 (4-for-17) with 4R, 2 doubles, 6RBI and 5BB in five games...helped the team reach the second round.

2012

- ▶ Was acquired by the Chicago Cubs along with RHP Zach Cates in exchange for RHP Andrew Cashner and OF Kyung-Min Na on 1/6.
- ▶ Appeared in 87 games with the Cubs, hitting .285 (96-for-337) with 44R, 15 doubles, 15HR, 48RBI and 27BB...made 85 starts at first base and recorded a .995 fielding percentage (4E/735TC).
- ▶ Began the season with Triple-A Iowa, batting .342 (88-for-257) with 48R, 18 doubles, 2 triples, 23HR, 62RBI and 23BB in 70 games.
- ▶ Was recalled on 6/26 and spent the remainder of the season at the Major League level...from the time of his recall to the end of the season, his 48RBI led NL rookies in that span...his 15HR were tied for the second most among NL Rockies in that same stretch.
- ▶ Became the first Cub ever to have three game-winning RBI in his first five games with Chicago...recorded four game-winning RBI in his first 10 games.
- ▶ Hit his first home run as a Cub on 6/30 vs. Houston off J.A. Happ.
- ▶ Was named the NL Rookie of the Month for July after hitting .330 (32-for-97) with 2 doubles, 7HR, 17RBI and 6BB...his 7HR tied a Cubs rookie record for the month of July, joining Gene Baker who hit 7HR in July 1954.
- ▶ Recorded a career-high four hits twice: 7/6 at the Mets and 8/13 vs. Houston.
- ▶ Hit his first career walk-off home run on 7/29 vs. St. Louis with a two-run HR in the 10th-inning.
- ▶ Recorded his first career multi-homer game and first-career grand slam on 9/16 vs. Pittsburgh...hit a two-run homer in the fifth before hitting a grand slam in the sixth...set a career high with 6RBI.

- ▶ Started the Anthony Rizzo Family Foundation in 2012 to help raise money for cancer research, and to provide support to children and their families battling the disease...the foundation donated \$3.5 million to Lurie's Children's Hospital in August of 2017.
- ▶ Was diagnosed with Limited State Classical Hodgkin's Lymphoma in April 2008.
- ▶ Graduated from Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School in Parkland, Fla., where he hit .468 with 48RBI and 28BB as a senior.

The Yankees have finished with a winning record in each of the last 29 seasons (1993-2021), marking the second-longest such stretch in Major League history behind only the franchise's unprecedented streak of 39 straight winning seasons from 1926-1964.

The span is tied with Boston Bruins (29 straight from 1968-96) for the third-longest streak of consecutive winning seasons all-time in the four major sports (MLB/NFL/NBA/NHL) behind only their own 39-season stretch and 32 straight winning seasons by the Montreal Canadiens (1952-83).

- ▶ Led the Majors in wins before the All-Star break, going 14-2 with a 2.31 ERA (128.1IP, 33ER) in 20 starts...was the fourth pitcher in franchise history to record at least 14 wins prior to the All-Star break, joining Mel Stottlemire (14-7 in 24GS in 1969), Whitey Ford (16-2 in 21GS in 1961) and Lefty Gomez (14-2 in 19G/17GS in 1934)...was only the fourth Major League pitcher since 2003 to record at least 14 wins prior to the All-Star break, joining Los Angeles-NL's Clayton Kershaw (14-2 in 19GS in 2017), Chicago-AL's Chris Sale (14-3 in 18GS in 2016) and Colorado's Ubaldo Jimenez (15-1 in 18GS in 2010)...went just 5-6 with a 5.57 ERA (63.0IP, 39ER) in 12 starts after the break.

- ▶ Went 9-6 with a 3.99 ERA (99.1IP, 44ER) in 17 road starts, tying for fourth in the AL in road wins.
- ▶ From 4/7/17-6/26/18, recorded at least 6K in 23 consecutive road starts, the fifth-longest streak in Major League history (Randy Johnson-33GS from 8/22/98-8/14/00; Shane Bieber-28GS from 4/27/19-5/27/21; Pedro Martinez-28GS from 8/24/99-6/21/01; Randy Johnson-25GS from 8/30/00-5/11/02).
- ▶ Made his first career Opening Day start on 3/29 at Toronto, allowing just 1H over 5.2 scoreless innings (3BB, 7K) to earn the win...was the first Yankees starter to earn a win on Opening Day since Chien-Ming Wang on 4/1/08 vs. Toronto...was the first scoreless Opening Day start by a Yankee since Roger Clemens (6.0IP, 3H) on 3/31/03 at Toronto...the 1H marked the fewest by a Yankees Opening Day starter since at least 1908 (matched by Gerrit Cole in 2020)...at 24 years, 37 days, was the youngest Yankees Opening Day starter since Lefty Gomez (23 years, 138 days) on 4/12/32 at Philadelphia-AL...only three pitchers younger than Severino have started for the Yankees on Opening Day: Gomez, Ray Caldwell (23 years, 351 days on 4/11/1912 vs. Boston) and Hippo Vaughn twice (23 years, 3 days on 4/12/1911 at Philadelphia-AL; 22 years, 5 days on 4/14/1910 vs. Boston)...was the fifth-youngest pitcher since 1908 to allow 1H-or-fewer in a scoreless Opening Day start...was the youngest since 21-year-old Bob Feller threw a no-hitter for Cleveland on 4/16/40 at Chicago-AL...was the first Dominican-born pitcher and fourth foreign-born pitcher to start for the Yankees on Opening Day, joining Masahiro Tanaka (Japan) in 2015-17 and '19, Chien-Ming Wang (Taiwan) in 2008 and Orlando Hernandez (Cuba) in 2000.
- ▶ From 4/16-6/4, went 7-0 with a 1.85 ERA (68.0IP, 14ER) over 10 starts, the longest winning streak and longest streak of unbeaten starts of his career...turned in a quality start in each outing, the longest QS streak by a Yankee since Masahiro Tanaka had 16QS in his first 16 Major League starts from 4/4-6/28/14.
- ▶ In 5/2 win at Houston, tossed his first career complete game and shutout (5H, 1BB, 10K)...marked the most strikeouts in a shutout by a Yankees pitcher since Mike Mussina on 9/24/02 vs. Tampa Bay (12K, 2H)...at 24 years, 71 days old, was the second-youngest Yankee since 1972 to toss a shutout, behind Sterling Hitchcock (24 years, 22 days) on 5/21/95 vs. Baltimore (4H)...was the youngest Yankee with at least 10K in a CGSHO since Stan Bahnsen (23 years, 230 days) on 8/1/68 at Boston (12K, 3H)...was the second Yankee since 2004 to throw a shutout against the defending World Series champion (also Iván Nova, 6H on 9/21/13 vs. San Francisco).

- ▶ In six May starts, went 4-0 with a 2.03 ERA (40.0IP, 9ER) and 50K...was the fifth 50-strikeout calendar month by a Yankee since 1969 (Ron Guidry, 64K in June 1978; David Cone, 56K in June 1997; CC Sabathia, 50K in July 2011; Randy Johnson, 50K in July 2005)...was the first Yankee with at least 50K and zero losses in a calendar month since David Cone in June 1997 (2-0, 56K).
- ▶ Won a career-best five consecutive starts from 6/16-7/7.
- ▶ Allowed 3R-or-fewer in 16 consecutive starts from 4/16-7/7, the second-longest streak by a Yankees starter in franchise history, behind Russ Ford's 20-start streak over two seasons from 1910-11.
- ▶ In 7/23 loss at Tampa Bay, recorded his 500th career strikeout in the second inning (Willy Adames), just the third Yankees pitcher to reach the mark prior to his 25th birthday, also Al Downing (644K) and Lefty Gomez (511K).
- ▶ In 9/5 loss at Oakland, reached 500.0 career innings pitched, becoming the 11th Yankee to reach the milestone prior to his 25th birthday, and the first to do it since Dave Righetti from 1979-83.
- ▶ In 9/19 win vs. Boston, induced seven pop-ups...at the time, was tied for the most by a Yankees pitcher in a single game in the last 12 seasons (since 2008), joining Bartolo Colon (8/11/11 vs. Los Angeles-AL).

2017


- ▶ In his first full Major League season, went 14-6 with a 2.98 ERA (193.1IP, 150H, 73R/64ER, 51BB, 230K, 21HR) in 31 starts...held opponents to a .208 BA (150-for-720); LH .221 (72-for-326); RH .198 (78-for-394)...pitched the entire season at 23 years old, the seventh-youngest AL pitcher to start a game.
- ▶ Finished third in AL Cy Young Award voting behind winner Corey Kluber and runner-up Chris Sale...appeared on 27-of-30 ballots and receiving 73 points (3 third place votes, 6 fourth place votes, 1 fifth place vote)...was the highest finish by a Yankees pitcher since CC Sabathia also got third in 2010.
- ▶ Ranked third in the AL in ERA and fourth in strikeouts...his 5.6 WAR (FanGraphs) was third among AL pitchers and fourth in the Majors...was the highest WAR by a Yankees pitcher since CC Sabathia's 6.4 WAR in 2011...was third among qualified AL pitchers with a 3.07 FIP...finished second in the AL in opponents' SLG (.338) and OPS (.603) and third in opp. BA (.208), OBP (.266) and WHIP (1.04)...his 10.71 K/9.0IP ratio was fourth-best in the AL and his 4.51 K/BB ratio was fifth.
- ▶ Posted the lowest ERA by a qualified Yankee since David Cone (2.82) and Andy Pettitte (2.88) in 1997.
- ▶ Recorded the then-highest K/9.0IP ratio by a qualifying pitcher in Yankees history (10.71)...had the lowest opp. BA by a qualified Yankee since Ron Guidry (.193) in 1978, the lowest opp. OBP since David Wells (.265) in 1998, the lowest opp. SLG since David Cone (.332) and Andy Pettitte (.335) in 1997, and the lowest opp. OPS since Ron Guidry (.585) in 1981...marked the best WHIP by a qualified Yankee since Ron Guidry (0.99) in 1981.
- ▶ Was named to his first career AL All-Star Team via the Player Ballot, but did not pitch in the game...at age 23, was the youngest Yankees All-Star pitcher since Mel Stottlemyre (also 23) in 1965.
- ▶ Ranked sixth in the Majors (fourth in the AL) with 230K...is one of five Yankees pitchers to record 230K in a season, joining Ron Guidry (248 in 1978), Gerrit Cole (243K in 2021), Jack Chesbro (239 in 1904) and CC Sabathia (230 in 2011)...were the most by a Yankee, age-23 or younger, surpassing Al Downing's 217 in 1964...were the second-most strikeouts by an AL pitcher, age-23 or younger, in 31 years (since 1987), behind Tampa Bay's Scott Kazmir (239) in 2007.
- ▶ Was the second AL pitcher since 1977 to post a sub-3.00 ERA with at least 225K at age-23 or younger, joining Boston's Roger Clemens (2.48, 238K, age-23) in his AL MVP and Cy Young-winning 1986 season.
- ▶ Recorded his first five career double-digit-strikeout games, tied for fourth-most among AL pitchers...were the second-most at age-23 or younger (Al Downing, eight at age-22 in 1963)...had at least 7K in a Yankees-record 21 games.
- ▶ His 16 starts with 1R-or-fewer led the Majors...were tied for the third-most such starts by a Yankee in a single season since 1908 (Ron Guidry-18 in 1978, Whitey Ford-18 in 1964, Mike Mussina-16 in 2001, Spud Chandler-16 in 1943, Russ Ford-16 in 1910)...allowed 1ER-or-fewer in 17 starts, tied for the Major League lead...were the most by a Yankee since Ron Guidry (21 in 1978).
- ▶ Led the AL with a 2.24 road ERA (96.1IP, 24ER) while going 6-1 in 15 starts...was also the fifth-lowest road ERA in the Majors...was the first Yankee ever to allow 1R-or-fewer in 11 different road starts...went 4-0 with a 0.89 ERA (40.2IP, 4ER) in six road starts after the All-Star break, becoming the second Yankees pitcher in 100 years to allow 1R-or-fewer in at least six consecutive road starts within a single season (Al Downing, seven straight from 5/14-9/14/68)...from 7/15/17-3/29/18, compiled a streak of seven consecutive road starts with 1R-or-fewer, then tied for the AL's second-longest such streak since 1908 (Minnesota's Johan Santana, eight starts from 7/17-9/29/04).
- ▶ On 4/13 vs. Tampa Bay (7.0IP, 5H, 2ER, 1BB, 11K, 1HR) and 4/18 vs. Chicago-AL (8.0IP, 3H, 4R/3ER, 0BB, 10K, 2HR), became the third of five pitchers in Yankees history to record at least 10K and one-or-zero walks in consecutive games, joining Gerrit Cole (4/18/21, 4/24/21 and 4/30/21), James Paxton (4/16/19 and 4/21/19), Masahiro Tanaka (4/9/14 and 4/16/14) and David Wells (9/1/98 and 9/7/98)-credit: Elias...Severino again accomplished the feat from 5/2-8/18 and 5/30-6/4/18.
- ▶ On 6/27 at Chicago-AL, recorded a career-high 12 strikeouts and did not walk a batter over 7.0IP...at 23 years, 127 days old, was the second-youngest Yankees pitcher to fan at least 12 batters in a game, behind Al Downing, who did it six times at age-22 in 1963-64...was the youngest pitcher in club history with at least 12K and 0BB, breaking the mark previously held by Stan Bahnsen (23y, 230d) on 8/1/68 at Boston (12K in 9.0IP CG SHO).



- ▶ On 8/17 at the Mets, recorded his first Major League hit with a bunt single off Steven Matz and scored his first run in the fourth inning.
- ▶ Made his first four postseason starts, going 1-1 with a 5.63 ERA (16.0IP, 10ER)...made his postseason debut in the AL Wild Card Game vs. Minnesota (ND, 0.1IP, 3ER), matching the shortest start by a Yankees pitcher in postseason history (also Art Ditmar in 1960 WS Game 1 at Pittsburgh and Bob Turley in 1958 WS Game 2 at Milwaukee)...earned his first postseason win in ALDS Game 4 vs. Cleveland (7.0IP, 3ER, 9K), becoming the second-youngest Yankee (23 years, 231 days) with 9K in a postseason game, behind Dave Righetti (22y, 314d in 1981 ALDS Game 2 at Milwaukee-10K).

2016

- ▶ Went 3-8 with a 5.83 ERA (71.0IP, 78H, 48R/46ER, 25BB, 66K, 11HR, 3HP, 3WP) in 22 games (11 starts) with the Yankees over four stints with the Yankees (4/4-5/30, 7/25-8/10, 8/12-14 and 9/2-10/2)...was the second-youngest AL pitcher to start a game, behind Minnesota's José Berrios.
- ▶ Was placed on the 15-day D.L. from 5/14-30 with a right triceps strain.
- ▶ Was 3-0 with a 0.39 ERA (23.1IP, 8H, 2R/1ER, 10BB, 25K) in 11 Major League relief appearances...led Major League relievers (min. 20.0 relief innings) in ERA, the second-lowest ERA by a reliever in Yankees history (min. 20.0 relief innings) to Joba Chamberlain's 0.38 ERA (24.0IP, 1ER) in 2007...also led Major League relievers in opp. BA (.105), opp. slugging (.158) and opp. OPS (.367).
- ▶ Went 0-8 with an 8.50 ERA (47.2IP, 70H, 46R/45ER, 15BB, 41K, 11HR) in 11 starts...was the second pitcher in Yankees history to make at least 11 starts in a season without earning a win as a starter (Fred Talbot, 0-8 in 11 starts in 1968)...the Yankees were 2-9 in his 11 starts, losing each of his first nine.
- ▶ Lost six consecutive starts from 4/26-8/14, the longest single-season losing streak by a Yankee since Tim Learly also lost six straight starts from 5/28-6/23/90.
- ▶ Earned his first career ejection on 9/26 at Toronto (by Todd Tichenor, for throwing at Justin Smoak).
- ▶ In 13 games (12 starts) with the RailRiders, went 8-1 with a 3.49 ERA (77.1IP, 30ER).



2015

- ▶ In his first Major League season, went 5-3 with a 2.89 ERA (62.1IP, 20ER) in 11 starts...opponents hit .229 (53-for-231); LH .244 (30-for-123), RH .213 (23-for-108)...recorded a 0.7 WAR (FanGraphs).
- ▶ Was the fourth pitcher in Yankees history to record at least five wins and post an ERA of 3.00-or-lower in his age-21 season or younger, joining Whitey Ford (1950), Hank Thormahlen (1918) and Ray Keating (1914)...since 2009, only five other Major League pitchers have accomplished that feat: Mike Soroka (2019), José Fernández (2013), Madison Bumgarner (2010), Stephen Strasburg (2010) and Clayton Kershaw (2009)...was the first AL starting pitcher to do so since the Royals' Bret Saberhagen (20-6, 2.87) won the AL Cy Young Award as a 21-year-old in 1985.
- ▶ Went 3-2 with a 2.04 ERA (35.1IP, 8ER) and 34K in his first six career starts...was the first Yankees pitcher since 1913 to record at least 30K and an ERA as low as 2.04 in his first six career games...his 2.04 ERA was the lowest by a Yankees pitcher through six career appearances (min. 30.0IP) since Bob Porterfield had a 1.94 ERA (46.1IP, 10ER) in his first six career games (two starts) in 1948.
- ▶ Made his Major League debut at 21 years, 166 days old on 8/5 vs. Boston and took the loss in the Yankees' 2-1 defeat (5.0IP, 2H, 2R/1ER, 0BB, 7K, 1HR)...recorded his first career strikeout (Xander Bogaerts)...was the youngest pitcher to make a start in the Majors in 2015 and the youngest Yankees pitcher to start a game since Phil Hughes was 21 years, 95 days old in his final start of 2007...became the first pitcher in AL history with 2H-or-fewer, no walks and at least 7K in his Major League debut...was the sixth Major League pitcher (third starter) to do it in the Modern Era (since 1900), joining five NL pitchers: Atlanta's Manny Banuelos (5.2IP, 2H, 0BB, 7K on 7/2/15 vs. Washington); Arizona's Max Scherzer (4.1IP, 0H, 0BB, 7K in relief on 4/29/08 vs. Houston); Cincinnati's Johnny Cueto (7.0IP, 1H, 0BB, 10K on 4/3/08 vs. Arizona); Los Angeles-NL's Pete Richert (3.1IP, 0H, 0BB, 7K in relief on 4/12/62 vs. Cincinnati); and the Milwaukee Braves' Don McMahon (4.0IP, 2H, 0BB, 7K in relief on 6/30/57-G2 vs. Pittsburgh)...was the third pitcher in Yankees history to record at least 7K and no walks in his Major League debut, joining Masahiro Tanaka (7.0IP, 0BB, 8K on 4/4/14 at Toronto) and Rich Beck (7.0IP, 0BB, 8K on 9/14/65 at Washington-AL)...was the first Yankees starter since 1913 to take a loss while throwing at least 5.0IP and allowing two baserunners-or-fewer (via H/BB/HP).
- ▶ Debuted in the same series as the Red Sox' Henry Owens (8/4/15), as the two became just the second pair of Yankees and Red Sox pitchers since 1913 to make their MLB debuts as starting pitchers in the same series, joining the Red Sox' Jim Bagby (4/18/38 vs. New York) and the Yankees' Atley Donald (4/21/38 at Boston).



- ▶ Earned his first Major League win on 8/22 vs. Cleveland (6.0IP, 1ER)...at 21 years, 183 days, was then the second-youngest Yankee since 1985 to earn a win, behind Phil Hughes, who earned five wins at a younger age in 2007.
- ▶ Went 9-2 with a 2.45 ERA (99.1IP, 72H, 35R/27ER, 27BB, 98K, 2HR) in 19 starts between Double-A Trenton and Triple-A Scranton/Wilkes-Barre...after the season, was named to *Baseball America's* 2015 Triple-A Post-Season All-Star Team...was named an MiLB.com Organization All-Star.

2014

- ▶ Combined with Single-A Charleston, Single-A Tampa and Double-A Trenton to go 6-5 with a 2.46 ERA (113.1IP, 31ER, 27BB, 127K) in 24 starts...opponents batted .220 (93-for-423, 3HR); LH .197 (34-for-173); RH .236 (59-for-250)...led all Yankees minor leaguers in strikeouts...was tabbed an Organization All-Star by MiLB.com...competed for the World Team in the SiriusXM All-Star Futures Game at Minnesota.
- ▶ Began the season with Charleston, going 3-2 with a 2.79 ERA (67.2IP, 21ER) in 14 starts...was promoted to Tampa on 6/20 and went 1-1 with a 1.31 ERA (20.2IP, 3ER) in four starts...was named FSL "Pitcher of the Week" on 6/30 after throwing 6.0 hitless innings on 6/25 at Clearwater (1BB, 6K)...allowed 0R in his final three starts with Tampa (16.0IP, 6H)...was promoted to Trenton on 7/16 and made six starts with the Thunder, going 2-2 with a 2.52 ERA (25.0IP, 7ER).
- ▶ Following the season, was rated by *Baseball America* as the Yankees' top prospect and the No. 35 overall prospect (No. 16 pitcher)...was tabbed by MLB.com as the No. 23 prospect in baseball.

2013

- ▶ Combined with GCL Yankees 1 and Single-A Charleston to go 4-2 with a 2.45 ERA (44.0IP, 12ER, 10BB, 53K) in 10 appearances (eight starts)...produced a 1.37 ERA (26.1IP, 4ER) and .172 opponents' BA (16-for-93) in six games (four starts) in the GCL...was promoted to Charleston on 7/29 and went 1-1 with a 4.08 ERA (17.2IP, 8ER) in four starts.
- ▶ Following the season, was tabbed by *Baseball America* as the No. 9 prospect in the Yankees organization.

2012

- ▶ Made his professional debut with DSL Yankees 1, going 4-2 with 1.68 ERA (64.1IP, 12ER, 45K) in 14 starts.

Home Sweet Home

The Yankees went 46-35 (.568) at Yankee Stadium in 2021. It marked the Yankees' 30th consecutive winning season at home (since 1992)... according to *Elias*, it is the longest current streak of any team in the Majors and the longest such streak by any team since a Major League-record 47-year streak for the Yankees from 1918-64.

The Yankees collected at least 50 wins at home in each of their first four seasons at the current Yankee Stadium (2009-12)... in 2012, Yankee Stadium became the second ballpark to host the postseason in each of the first four years of its existence, joining Atlanta's Turner Field (first six)—credit: *Elias*.

The Yankees own the two highest single-season home winning percentages all time: .805 (62-15) in 1932 and .802 (65-16) in 1961.

STATUS

- ▶ Was acquired by the Yankees from the Miami Marlins along with cash considerations in exchange for 2B Starlin Castro, RHP Jorge Guzman and INF José Devers on December 11, 2017...contract extends through the 2027 season with a club option for 2028...had a player opt-out following the 2020 season, which he did not exercise.

CAREER NOTES

- ▶ Has homered against every Major League team in his career except Miami.
- ▶ Hit 270HR through his first 1,000 career games...only three players hit as many home runs through their first 1,000 career games: Ryan Howard (279), Ralph Kiner (277) and Harmon Killebrew (272).
- ▶ Hit his 300th career homer in his 1,119th career game, becoming the fifth-fastest player to reach the mark in Baseball history, trailing only Ralph Kiner (1,087G), Ryan Howard (1,093), Juan González (1,096) and Alex Rodriguez (1,117)...at 28 years, 295 days old, was the ninth-youngest player to reach the mark in Baseball history.
- ▶ His 347HR are second-most in the Majors since 2010 (Nelson Cruz-394)...had 308HR through the 2019 season, the 16th-highest total all-time for a player before his 30th birthday.
- ▶ Has hit at least 20HR in 10 of his 12 career seasons... joins Nelson Cruz (11) as the only two players to record as many such seasons since 2010...Stanton and Cruz were the only two players with at least 20HR in each season from 2010-18...was the 11th player ever to hit at least 20HR in each of his first nine Major League seasons.
- ▶ Is one of four players with at least five 35HR seasons since 2012.
- ▶ Has hit at least 25HR in a season eight times (2011-12, '14-18, '21)...is one four players to record as many such seasons since 2011, joining Nelson Cruz (nine), Mike Trout (eight) and Edwin Encarnación (eight)...was one of six players (also Mike Trout, Nelson Cruz, Edwin Encarnación, Anthony Rizzo and Justin Upton) to hit at least 25HR in each season from 2014-18.
- ▶ His 34 career multi-homer games are fourth-most among players who appeared in a game in 2021, behind Albert Pujols (61), Miguel Cabrera (43) and Nelson Cruz (40)...was one of 11 players in Baseball history with at least 32 multi-HR games prior to turning 30 years old.
- ▶ Since the start of his career in 2010, his 13.95 AB/HR ratio leads the Majors (min. 2,500AB)...is the fifth-best mark all-time, behind Mark McGwire (10.61), Babe Ruth (11.76), Barry Bonds (12.92) and Jim Thome (13.76).
- ▶ In the Statcast Era (since 2015), owns 12 of the 13 hardest hits and 22 of the top 27...over the same span, has recorded 115 hits with an exit velocity of 115 mph or higher (next: Aaron Judge-47).
- ▶ Has homered in the same game as teammate Aaron Judge 14 times during the regular season, with the Yankees going 13-1 in those games...10 of those games came in 2021...the duo has also homered in three Yankees postseason games, with the Yankees winning each of those games.
- ▶ With his trade from the Marlins to the Yankees on 12/11/17, became the second reigning league MVP in Major League history to be traded prior to the start of the following season; on 2/16/04, the Yankees acquired reigning AL MVP Alex Rodriguez from Texas in exchange for Alfonso Soriano and a PTBNL (Joaquin Arias)...Elias notes that the only other MVP to change teams in the season following his award was Barry Bonds, who won the NL MVP with Pittsburgh in 1992 and signed with San Francisco as a free agent prior to the 1993 season.
- ▶ Was the fifth player to be acquired by the Yankees the year immediately after leading or tying for a league lead in HRs, joining Babe Ruth (acquired in 1920), Johnny Mize (1949), Alex Rodriguez (2004) and Chris Carter (2017).
- ▶ His acquisition made the 2018 Yankees the second team in Major League history to acquire Baseball's reigning home run champion after leading the Majors in team homers the prior year; the 1919 Yankees led the Majors with 45 home runs, then acquired Babe Ruth (29HR in 1919) from Boston prior to the 1920 season (credit: Elias).
- ▶ Made his postseason debut in 2018...his 1,144 career regular season games at the time of his first playoff game were second-most among active players who have never reached the postseason, behind Seattle's Kyle Seager (1,155G at the time of Stanton's playoff debut)...his 305 regular season home runs led that group, 112 more than second-place Khris Davis (193HR), who also made his playoff debut in the 2018 AL Wild Card Game.
- ▶ Has 9HR through his first 18 career postseason games, tied with Carlos Beltrán for the most by any Major League player...has 8HR in his last 10 postseason games since 2019 ALCS Game 1.
- ▶ Wears an extended helmet flap to protect his face after suffering facial lacerations, small fractures and dental damage when he was hit in the face by a pitch thrown by Milwaukee's Mike Fiers on 9/11/14.
- ▶ His 267HR with the Marlins are most in franchise history...is one of only three active players who hold a franchise's all-time home run lead, joining Evan Longoria (261HR with Tampa Bay) and Mike Trout (310HR with Los Angeles-AL).

- ▶ Is also the Marlins' all-time leader in RBI (672), extra-base hits (479) and total bases (1,983)...ranks second in walks (487), third in runs scored (576), doubles (202) and games played (986) and fifth in hits (960)...his 34.6 WAR are the most by any player in Marlins history (FanGraphs)...his 60 assists lead all Marlins outfielders.
- ▶ Led the Marlins in home runs each season from 2011-17...according to *Elias*, is one of two active players to outright lead the same franchise in home runs in at least seven consecutive seasons, joining Albert Pujols, who led St. Louis in homers in seven straight seasons from 2001-07.
- ▶ Has 36 career home runs against the Nationals, most among active players (next: Freddie Freeman-26)...his 22HR at Nationals Park are most by any visitor in the ballpark's history.
- ▶ Has made 11 Opening Day rosters, seven with the Marlins (2011-17) and four with the Yankees (2018-21)...has reached base safely in 8-of-18 Opening Day plate appearances with the Yankees, going 6-for-16 with 5R, 1 double, 3HR, 7RBI and 2BB.

- ▶ Walked multiple times in consecutive games from 6/22-23 vs. Kansas City for the eighth time in his career and first time since a three-game stretch from 3/28-31/19.
- ▶ Drove in at least 1R in four straight games from 7/18-22, his longest stretch since 9/26-29/18 (also 4G).
- ▶ Made his first appearance of the season in the outfield on 7/30 at Miami and his first appearance since 9/28/19 at Texas.
- ▶ Recorded a season-high 23-game on-base streak from 8/2-27...batted .329/.421/.671 (27-for-82) with 16R, 4 doubles, 8HR, 21RBI, 11BB and 2HP over that span...was the second-longest on-base streak of his career, trailing only his career-long 27-game stretch from 7/24-8/22 (G2)/17.
- ▶ Recorded multiple hits in a career-high five straight games from 8/3-7 (previous: four games, five times).




- ▶ Reached base multiple times in a season-high six straight games from 8/3-8...was his longest streak since his career-high eight-game streak from 9/25/18-3/31/19 (final 5G of 2018 and first 3G of 2019)...batted .455/.538/.636 (10-for-22) with 6R, 1 double, 1HR, 8RBI, 3BB and 1HP in that span.
- ▶ Hit a go-ahead, two-run HR in the ninth inning on 8/12 in the "Field of Dreams" game in Iowa at Chicago-AL...marked his 11th career HR (and third as a Yankee) that put his team in the lead in the ninth inning or later (first since a two-run HR in the 10th inning on 8/7/18 at Chicago-AL).

- ▶ Hit a "walk-off" single in the 11th inning on 9/3 vs. Baltimore, his eighth career "walk-off" hit and his second of the season (also a "walk-off" single on 5/9 vs. Washington)...according to Statcast, his "walk-off" single had an exit velocity of 121.1 mph, tied for the fourth-hardest base hit in the Statcast Era (since 2015) and the hardest base hit of the year.
- ▶ Hit 9HR in a 15-game span from 9/12-28, the most in the Majors over that stretch.
- ▶ His single in the seventh inning on 9/16 at Baltimore had an exit velocity of 120.3 mph, the second-hardest base hit in the Majors in 2021.
- ▶ Homered in back-to-back games from 9/17-18 vs. Cleveland.
- ▶ Was named the AL "Player of the Week" for 9/20-26 after hitting .409/.440/1.000 (9-for-22) with 4R, 1 double, 4HR, 13RBI, 2BB and 1SF in six games...he led the AL in home runs, RBI, SLG and OPS (1.440), tied for the AL lead in extra-base hits (5) and ranked third in BA...it was his eighth career weekly award and first as a Yankee.
- ▶ Drove in 10 of the Yankees' 19R during their three-game set at Boston from 9/24-26...was just the second Yankee in franchise history to record at least 10RBI in a three-game series vs. Boston, joining Mickey Mantle who recorded 10RBI vs. Boston from 5/21-23/54...Stanton is the only Yankee to do so at Fenway Park...was just the second Yankee since 2006 to record at least 10RBI in a three-game series, joining Didi Gregorius who notched 10RBI from 7/22-24/19 at Minnesota...also hit 3HR in that series at Fenway...was the first Yankee to hit at least 3HR in a three-game series at Fenway since Mark Teixeira hit 3HR in three games at Boston in May of 2010.
- ▶ Homered in a season-high-tying four straight games from 9/24-28...marked the fourth time in his career and the second time in 2021 that he homered in four straight games: also 6G from 8/10-15/17, 4G from 8/23-27/21 and 4G from 8/14-17/11...also recorded multiple RBI in a career-high four straight games from 9/24-28 (previous: 3G from 8/11-13/10)...marked the longest such streak by a Yankee since Mike Tauchman's five-game streak from 7/31-8/6/19...recorded at least 4RBI in back-to-back games from 9/24-25 for the first time in his career.
- ▶ Recorded 4HR and 13RBI over 4G from 9/24-28...according to Elias, became just the third Yankees since 1920 to record at least 4HR and 13RBI over a 4G span in September, joining George Selkirk (5HR/13RBI in 1940) and Babe Ruth (4HR/13RBI in 1929).
- ▶ Hit a go-ahead grand slam in the eighth inning on 9/25 at Boston...was the first Yankee to hit a go-ahead grand slam in the eighth inning or later since Gary Sánchez in Game 2 on 8/30/20 vs. the Mets (also eighth inning) and was the first to do so vs. the Red Sox since Mark Teixeira's "walk-off" grand slam in the ninth inning on 9/28/16...was only the third Yankee in franchise history to hit a go-ahead grand slam in the eighth inning or later at Fenway Park, joining Johnny Blanchard (ninth inning on 7/21/61) and Joe DiMaggio (10th inning on 9/10/48).
- ▶ Went 3-for-4 with 1R, 1HR and 1RBI in the AL Wild Card Game at Boston...hit a solo HR in the ninth inning, his ninth career postseason HR...his 9HR through his first 18 career postseason games are tied with Carlos Beltrán for the most by any Major League player.

2020

- ▶ Hit .250 (19-for-76) with 12R, 7 doubles, 4HR, 11RBI and 15BB in 23 games with the Yankees...of his 19H, 11 went for extra bases.
- ▶ Hit a first-inning two-run HR and went 2-for-3 with 1R and 3RBI on Opening Day at Washington...was Major League Baseball's first home run of the 2020 season...was his fourth career Opening Day home run and third with the Yankees (homered twice on 3/29/18 at Toronto in his Yankees debut).
- ▶ Also homered in the Yankees' second game of the season (7/25 at Washington), becoming the ninth player (10th time) to homer in each of the Yankees' first two games in a season and first since Mark Teixeira in 2011...according to Statcast, his homer traveled 483 ft. and had an exit velocity of 121.3 mph...at the time, was the second-hardest hit HR in the Statcast Era (since 2015), behind his own 121.7 mph HR in 2018.
- ▶ Was placed on the 10-day injured list from 8/9-9/15 with a left hamstring strain, missing 32 team games.



- ▶ Hit a game-tying RBI double in the fifth inning on 9/26 vs. Miami (1-for-4, 1R, 1 double, 1RBI, 1BB)...had an exit velocity of 112.9 mph according to Statcast.
- ▶ Hit .308 (8-for-26) with 7R, 1 double, 6HR, 13RBI and 4BB in seven postseason games...his 6HR were tied for most in a single postseason in Yankees history (also Alex Rodriguez-6HR in 15G in 2009 and Bernie Williams-6HR in 15G in 1996)...his 13RBI were tied for the sixth-most by a Yankee in a single postseason, trailing only Alex Rodriguez (18RBI in 15G in 2009), Scott Brosius (15RBI in 13G in 1998), Bernie Williams (15RBI in 15G in 1996), Cecil Fielder (14RBI in 14G in 1996) and Reggie Jackson (14RBI in 10G in 1978).
- ▶ Homered in five straight games from AL Wild Card Series Game 1 through ALDS Game 3, the longest postseason homer streak in franchise history and tied with George Springer (5G from 2017-18) and Carlos Beltrán (5G in 2004) for the second-longest in Major League history (Daniel Murphy, 6G in 2015).
- ▶ Became the first player in Major League history to hit at least 6HR in his team's first five postseason games...was also the first player ever to homer in each of his team's first five games of a postseason (previous record: 4G streaks by San Francisco's Jeffrey Leonard in 1987 and Texas' Juan Gonzalez in 1996).
- ▶ Each of his first five hits went for homers...according to STATS, was the first player in Major League history to have each his first four hits of a single postseason go for home runs.
- ▶ With homers in each of his first five playoff games (ALWCS Game 1 through ALDS Game 3) and a double in ALDS Game 4, became the first player in Major League history to record an extra-base hit in each of his team's first six postseason games.
- ▶ Had 5HR and 11RBI through his first four games of the 2020 postseason...according to STATS, was the first player in Major League history to have at least 5HR and at least 10RBI in any four-game span in a single postseason.
- ▶ Was 2-for-7 with 3R, 2HR, 3RBI, 2BB and 15F in 2G in the ALWCS at Cleveland...hit a solo HR in the ninth in ALWCS Game 1 on 9/29 at Cleveland that had an exit velocity of 116.1 mph.
- ▶ Hit for the "home run cycle" in the ALDS vs. Tampa Bay (a solo HR, two-run HR, three-run HR and grand slam)... joins Nelson Cruz (2011 ALCS) as the only players in Major League history to hit for the home run cycle in a single playoff series. — credit: STATS.
- ▶ Recorded 4RBI in back-to-back postseason games (ALDS Games 1 and 2), becoming only the second player in Major League history to accomplish the feat (also Washington's Michael Taylor in two straight games in 2017)... became only the third Yankee to record at least 4RBI in multiple games in a single postseason, joining Hideki Matsui (5RBI in 2004 ALCS Games 1 and 3) and Yogi Berra (4RBI in 1956 World Series Games 2 and 7).
- ▶ Homered in three consecutive at-bats, in the ninth inning of ALDS Game 1 and the second and fourth innings of ALDS Game 2...according to STATS, was the first player in the Majors to homer in three straight postseason at-bats since San Francisco's Pablo Sandoval (all in Game 1 of the 2012 World Series)...was the first Yankee to homer in three consecutive postseason at-bats since Reggie Jackson, who did it in four straight in 1977.
- ▶ Hit a grand slam in the ninth inning of ALDS Game 1 at Tampa Bay at Petco Park (1-for-4, 1R, 1HR, 4RBI, 1BB), becoming the first DH in franchise history to hit a grand slam in the postseason...was just the 14th player in Yankees history to hit a grand slam in the postseason but the second to do so in as many games...including the regular season, was his eighth career grand slam and his first since 9/20/18 vs. Boston.
- ▶ Recorded his first career postseason multi-HR game in ALDS Game 2, hitting a solo HR in the second and a three-run HR in the fourth...was the 26th multi-HR postseason game by a Yankee and the sixth in the ALDS... was the 20th Yankee all-time to have a multi-HR game (only Yankees with more than one such game: Babe Ruth-4, Lou Gehrig-2, Mickey Mantle-2, Bernie Williams-2)...was the first multi-HR postseason game by a Yankee since Gary Sánchez in 2018 ALDS Game 2 at Boston...his fourth-inning HR was hit at 118.3 mph, the hardest-hit postseason base hit in Statcast history (since 2015).
- ▶ His 25 total bases through ALDS Game 3 matched Randy Arozarena (2020) for the most by any player in his team's five games of a single postseason in Major League history (credit: STATS).
- ▶ Played in just four spring training games (one in Florida and three in New York), hitting .143 (2-for-14) with 3R, 1 double, 1HR and 1RBI...missed time in Tampa with a Grade 1 right calf strain suffered on 2/25.



2019

- ▶ Hit .288 (17-for-59) with 8R, 3 doubles, 3HR, 13RBI and 12BB in 18 games with the Yankees.
- ▶ Reached base safely three times in 3/28 Opening Day win vs. Baltimore...according to Statcast, his first-inning single to right field had an exit velocity of 120.6 mph, the then-fifth-hardest-hit base hit in the Statcast era (since 2015).
- ▶ Was placed on the 10-day injured list on 4/1 with a left biceps strain...began a rehab assignment on 5/20, but was returned from rehab on 5/22 with left calf tightness after appearing in just one game...began a second rehab assignment on 6/11...in six total rehab appearances with Single-A Tampa and Triple-A Scranton/Wilkes-Barre, hit .286 (6-for-21) with 5R, 5HR and 8RBI...was returned from rehab and reinstated from the 10-day I.L. on 6/18.
- ▶ Was placed on the 10-day injured list on 6/26 with a right knee sprain...left 6/25 game with a right knee contusion...was transferred to the 60-day injured list on 8/11...was reinstated on 9/18, missing 73 team games...played in just six Major League games between I.L. stints.
- ▶ Went 8-for-28 with 4R, 2 doubles, 2HR and 6RBI in nine games after returning from his second I.L. stint.



- ▶ Hit the Yankees' 300th home run of the season in the first inning on 9/27 at Texas...reached base five times in the game (3-for-3, 1R, 1HR, 3RBI, 2BB), his 11th career game reaching safely at least five times.
- ▶ Hit .231 (3-for-13) with 1R, 1HR, 2RBI and 4BB in five postseason games, with the Yankees going 5-0 in those contests...had 3BB in ALDS Game 1 vs. Minnesota (had 1BB in 22PA in 2018 postseason)...hit a solo HR in ALCS Game 1 at Houston...missed four games in the ALCS with a low Grade 2 quad strain.

2018

- ▶ Hit .266/.343/.509 (164-for-617) with 102R, 34 doubles, 38HR, 100RBI and 70BB in 158 games (85GS at DH, 37 in RF and 35 in LF) in his first season with the Yankees...reached the 100RBI plateau for the second straight season and third time in his career (105RBI in 2014 and 132RBI in 2017)...reached 100R for the second time (123R in 2017).
- ▶ Was the Yankees' nominee for the 2018 Hank Aaron Award...won the award in both 2014 and '17 with Miami.
- ▶ Batted .316/.391/.645 (48-for-152) with 9 doubles, 1 triple, 13HR and 28RBI off left-handed pitching.
- ▶ His 38HR were fifth-most by a player in his first season as a Yankee, trailing Babe Ruth (54HR in 1920), Jason Giambi (41HR in 2002), Mark Teixeira (39HR in 2009) and Roger Maris (39HR in 1960).
- ▶ With 38HR and 34 doubles, was one of nine Major Leaguers to reach 30 doubles and 35HR in 2018...was the first Yankee to reach those benchmarks in the same season since Mark Teixeira in 2009 (39HR, 43 doubles).
- ▶ Had a Major League-leading 74 batted balls with an exit velocity of at least 110 mph according to MLB Statcast (next: Nelson Cruz-50)...had five of the Majors' 10 hardest-hit home runs of 2018.
- ▶ Had 102R, 38HR and 100RBI, the 12th player in franchise history to reach each of those totals in a single season...was just the fourth to reach those totals in his first season with the club, joining Mark Teixeira in 2009 (39HR, 122RBI, 103R), Jason Giambi in 2002 (41HR, 122RBI, 120R) and Babe Ruth in 1920 (54HR, 136RBI, 158R).
- ▶ Had six games of at least 4H in 2018, tied with Arizona's David Peralta for second-most in the Majors (Boston's Mookie Betts-7)...were the most 4H games by a Yankee since Bernie Williams (7 in 1999).
- ▶ Became the first Yankee to hit at least 20HR before the All-Star break during his first season with the club since Mark Teixeira in 2009 (21HR before the break)...was the first Yankee to do so after being traded to the team since Alex Rodriguez in 2004 (22HR)...was the only player with at least 20HR before the break each season from 2014-18.
- ▶ Went 3-for-5 with 3R, 1 double, 2HR and 4RBI in his Yankees debut in 3/29 win at Toronto, marking his 29th career multi-HR game...according to *Elias*, was just the second player in Yankees history to homer twice in his first game with the club, joining Roger Maris, who began his 1960 AL MVP Award-winning season by going 4-for-5 with 2R, 1 double, 2HR and 4RBI on 4/19/60 at Boston...was the first player to homer in his first plate appearance as a Yankee since Tyler Austin and Aaron Judge did so in consecutive at-bats on 8/13/16 vs. Tampa Bay.
- ▶ Became the second Yankee since 1908 to collect at least 3XBH and 4RBI on Opening Day, joining Roger Maris (3XBH, 4RBI) on 4/19/60 at Boston...along with Chicago-AL's Matt Davidson (3-for-4, 4R, 3HR, 5RBI in 2018), became the first Major League hitters to accomplish the feat since Toronto's J.P. Arenchica (3XBH, 5RBI) on 4/1/11 vs. Minnesota...became the seventh Yankee to hit 2HR on Opening Day, the first since Joe Pepitone on 4/9/63 at the Kansas City A's...his ninth-inning homer to center was measured at 109.4 mph.
- ▶ Hit .218 in April, .264 in May, .298 in June and .323 in July...was the third player in Yankees history to improve his monthly averages by 25 or more points in every month, April through July (min. 50AB each month), joining Melky Cabrera in 2007 (.200, .254, .298, .368) and Didi Gregorius in 2015 (.206, .232, .258, .317)—credit: *Elias*.
- ▶ Hit his third HR of the season in 4/4 win vs. Tampa Bay, becoming the first player ever to hit at least 3HR in the first six team games in his first season as a Yankee.
- ▶ His first-inning single in 4/6 loss vs. Baltimore was his 2,000th career total base.
- ▶ Struck out a career-high, and franchise-record-tying, five times twice on the Yankees' first homestand (4/3 win vs. Tampa Bay and 4/8 loss vs. Baltimore).
- ▶ Played his 1,000th career game on 4/13 at Detroit, becoming the fourth player from the 2007 First-Year Player Draft to reach the 1,000-game milestone, joining OF Jason Heyward, C Matt Wieters and 1B Freddie Freeman...his 270HR were the fourth-most HRs through a player's first 1,000 career games, behind Ryan Howard (279), Ralph Kiner (277) and Harmon Killebrew (272).
- ▶ Hit two-run HR and solo HR and was 3-for-4 with 1 double and 4RBI on 5/2 at Houston, driving in all of the Yankees' runs in their 4-0 shutout victory...was his 30th career two-homer game (and second of the season)...became the ninth player in Major League history to record at least 30 multi-homer games prior to turning 29 years old...was the third player in Baseball history to reach 30 multi-HR games through his first 1,016 career games (also Ralph Kiner-35 and Juan González-30).
- ▶ Hit two solo HRs in 5/8 win vs. Boston...was his 31st career two-homer game, becoming the second player in Baseball history to reach 31 multi-HR games through his first 1,021 career games (Ralph Kiner-35).
- ▶ His fifth-inning single in 5/15 loss at Washington was the 1,000th hit of his Major League career...through his first 1,000 career hits, 499 went for extra bases (211 doubles, 11 triples, 277HR)...was the third player in Baseball history with at least 499 extra-base hits through his first 1,000 career hits (Babe Ruth-517, Adam Dunn-507)—credit: *Elias*.
- ▶ Hit solo HR in 5/19 win at Kansas City...the homer was his 500th career extra-base hit...at 28 years, 192 days old, was the fourth-youngest player to debut since 2000 to reach 500XBH (at that time), trailing: Albert Pujols (26 years, 208 days), Miguel Cabrera (27 years, 40 days) and Prince Fielder (28 years, 141 days)...was later surpassed by Mike Trout (27 years, 36 days) and Nolan Arenado (28 years, 147 days).
- ▶ Made 85 consecutive starts from 5/28-9/1 (46 at DH, 26 in RF, 13 in LF), the longest streak of consecutive starts by a Yankee since Robinson Canó started 176 in-a-row from 8/17/12-8/27/13...according to *Elias*, was the first Yankee to *appear* in at least 85 team games in-a-row since Starlin Castro appeared in 96 straight games from 6/2-9/17/16.
- ▶ Hit two-run "walk-off" HR in the ninth of 6/20 win vs. Seattle...was his sixth career "walk-off" hit (first since a single on 8/19/14 vs. Texas) and fourth career "walk-off" HR (first since 4/18/14 vs. Seattle off Yoervis Medina).



- ▶ Hit game-tying solo HR in the eighth and was 5-for-5 with 2R, 2 doubles, 2RBI and 1BB in 6/24 loss at Tampa Bay, tying his career high in hits (also 8/11/10 at Washington) and times on base (6, also 7/9/17 at San Francisco: 3H, 2BB, 1HP)...was the first 5H game by a Yankee since Curtis Granderson on 4/19/12 vs. Minnesota (5H).
- ▶ Went 9-for-9 with 4R, 3 doubles, 1HR, 4RBI and 2BB over consecutive games at Tropicana Field (6/24 and 7/23)...according to *Elias*, became the first Yankee to record hits in nine consecutive at-bats at one road venue since Lou Piniella also had nine straight hits at Kansas City's Kauffman Stadium from 9/3/82-5/3/83...was the first MLB player to reach safely (via H/BB/HP) at least five times without making an out in consecutive games at one road venue since Cleveland's Michael Brantley on 6/9/14 and 5/15/15 at Texas' Globe Life Park (credit: *Elias*).
- ▶ Was one of five AL All-Star "Final Vote" candidates...was the 10th Yankee to appear on the Final Vote ballot, joining SS Didi Gregorius (2017), OF Brett Gardner (2015), RHP David Robertson (2013), OF Nick Swisher (2010), 1B Jason Giambi (2008), SS Derek Jeter and OF Hideki Matsui (2005), Matsui (2004) and Giambi (2003).
- ▶ Scored at least 1R in a career-high nine straight games from 8/6-14, matching Didi Gregorius (nine straight, 4/20-28) for the longest streak by a Yankee in 2018.
- ▶ Hit his sixth career grand slam (first since a "walk-off" grand slam on 4/18/14 vs. Seattle) in 8/8 win at Chicago-AL...hit 170HR between grand slams.
- ▶ Hit the 300th homer of his career off Francisco Liriano in 8/30 loss vs. Detroit...came in his 1,119th career game, becoming the fifth-fastest player to reach the mark in Baseball history, trailing Ralph Kiner (1,087G), Ryan Howard (1,093), Juan González (1,096) and Alex Rodriguez (1,117).
- ▶ Made his postseason debut, hitting .238 (5-for-21) with 4R, 1HR and 1RBI in five games...played in his first postseason after 1,144 career regular season games...were second-most among active players who had never reached the post season (Kyle Seager-1,155G through 2018)...his 305HR were the most in that group, 112 more than Oakland's Khris Davis (193HR), who also debuted in the 2018 AL Wild Card Game.
- ▶ Homered and stole a base in his postseason debut in the AL Wild Card Game vs. Oakland...the HR had an exit velocity of 117.4 mph, the then-hardest-hit postseason HR of the Statcast era (since 2015), surpassing Judge's 116.1 mph HR from seven innings earlier...was the first Yankee and eighth player ever (Longoria, Podsednik, Beltrán, Edmonds, Alicea, Grace, Versailles) to record both a HR and SB in his postseason debut.

2017

- ▶ Won the National League Most Valuable Player Award after leading the Majors with 59HR and 132RBI and hitting .281/.376/.631 (168-for-597) with 123R, 32 doubles and 85BB in 159 games with the Marlins...tied for the Major League lead with an NL-high 91 extra-base hits and ranked second in Baseball in total bases (377), third in runs scored and fourth in OPS (1.007)...was seventh in the NL in walks...led the Majors with a 10.12 AB/HR ratio...finished sixth in the Majors (fourth among position players) with 6.9 WAR (FanGraphs).
- ▶ Received 302 points in NL MVP balloting to edge Cincinnati's Joey Votto (300 points) in the then-fourth-closest MVP race in Major League history (third-closest NL MVP race)...received 10 first-place votes, 10 second-place votes, 5 third-place votes, 3 fourth-place votes, 1 fifth-place vote and 1 sixth-place vote...was the first MVP in Marlins franchise history, making the Marlins the 27th current franchise to have an MVP winner.
- ▶ Set career highs in runs, hits, homers, RBI, games played, extra-base hits and total bases...homered in a Major League-best 49 different games, ahead of Aaron Judge (45).
- ▶ Earned his second career NL Hank Aaron Award (most outstanding offensive performer), his second NL Silver Slugger Award and his second Players' Choice Award for Outstanding NL Player.
- ▶ Was the sixth player in Major League history to hit at least 59HR in a season (10th occurrence)...marked the most HRs by any Major League player since 2001, when San Francisco's Barry Bonds hit 73 and the Cubs' Sammy Sosa hit 64...was the sixth-highest total by a right-handed batter in Major League history, behind Mark McGwire (70 in 1998, 65 in 1999) and Sammy Sosa (66 in 1998, 64 in 2001, 63 in 1999)...set a new Marlins club record for homers and was the first Marlin to win the Major League HR title.
- ▶ With 59HR, finished 7HR ahead of the AL HR leader Aaron Judge (52HR) and 20HR ahead of the NL runner-up, the Dodgers' Cody Bellinger (39HR)...was the largest margin ever for an NL home run champion over the runner-up, besting the previous mark of 19HR in 1923 (Cy Williams' 41HR to Jack Fournier's 22HR)...according to *Elias*, was tied for the fifth-largest margin by a home run champion in either league, behind four Babe Ruth seasons: 1920 AL (35, Ruth's 54HR to George Sisler's 19HR); 1921 AL (35, Ruth's 59HR to Bob Meusel/Ken Williams' 24HR); 1926 AL (28, Ruth's 47HR to Al Simmons' 19HR); 1928 AL (27, Ruth's 54HR to Lou Gehrig's 27HR)...matched the 1956 AL (20, Mickey Mantle's 52HR to Vic Wertz's 32HR).
- ▶ Became the ninth player (10th time) in Major League history to record at least 10 multi-homer games in one season...was tied for the third-highest single-season total, one behind the Cubs' Sammy Sosa (11 in 1998) and Detroit's Hank Greenberg (11 in 1938)—credit: *Elias*...marked the most multi-homer games since St. Louis' Albert Pujols had 10 in 2009...had 2 in April, 1 in May, 4 in July, 2 in August and 1 in September.
- ▶ Hit 87 batted balls (33HR) with an exit velocity of at least 110 mph according to MLB Statcast, marking the most batted balls (and most HRs) of at least 110 mph by a player in a single season since Statcast began tracking that data in 2015...his third-inning single on 10/1/17 vs. Atlanta left his bat at 122.2 mph, marking the highest exit velocity on a base hit in the Majors from 2015-17...had four of the Majors' 12 hardest-hit home runs of 2017; his 59th and final HR on 9/28 vs. Atlanta (off Rex Brothers) had an exit velocity of 118.7 mph, the third-hardest-hit home run in the Majors in 2017 (behind two Aaron Judge HRs).
- ▶ Of his 59HR, a Major League-high 39 traveled a projected distance of at least 400 feet...his 34th HR on 8/4 at Atlanta (off R.A. Dickey) was his longest of the season, projected at 477 feet.
- ▶ His 132RBI set a Marlins franchise record, breaking Preston Wilson's mark of 121RBI in 2000...was the first player in Marlins history to lead the Majors in RBI...teammate Marcell Ozuna placed third in the Majors with 124RBI, as the Marlins were the first NL club to produce two of the Majors' top-three RBI leaders since the 1976 Reds (George Foster-121, first; Joe Morgan-111, second)...also led the Majors with 38 go-ahead RBI and was third with 18 game-winning RBI...tied for third in the Majors with 32 multi-RBI games (5RBI-1x, 4RBI-5x, 3RBI-13x, 2RBI-13x).



- ▶ Hit 26 go-ahead HRs, the most by any Major League hitter since St. Louis' Mark McGwire hit 30 in 1998...ranked second in the Majors with 23HR with runners on base, trailing only Aaron Judge (24HR with runners on).
- ▶ Hit a franchise-record 31HR in 76 home games (prev.: Stanton, 24 in 2014)...were second in the Majors to the Aaron Judge (33HR) and the most by an NL player at home since 2001 (Barry Bonds-37HR, Sammy Sosa-34HR).
- ▶ In 83 road games, hit a franchise-record 28HR (previously Gary Sheffield, 23 in 1996)...led the Majors in road HRs, the most by any player since San Diego's Adrián González also hit 28HR on the road in 2009...the Marlins had a three-game home series vs. the Brewers (9/13-15) moved from Miami to Milwaukee due to Hurricane Irma.
- ▶ Hit 30HR vs. NL East opponents (8 vs. Atlanta, 8 vs. New York, 8 vs. Philadelphia, 6 vs. Washington)...since intra-divisional play was expanded in 2001, became the fourth player to hit at least 30HR vs. a single division, joining Sammy Sosa in 2001 (37 vs. NL Central), Barry Bonds in 2001 (36 vs. NL West) and Brian Dozier in 2016 (31 vs. AL Central).
- ▶ Hit a Major League-record 47HR from the No. 2 spot in the batting order (previously Milwaukee-NL's Eddie Mathews, 46HR in 1959).
- ▶ Earned three NL "Player of the Week" Awards, second-most weekly awards in the Majors in 2017 (J.D. Martinez-4)—8/6-12; 8/20-26 and 9/17-23 (co-winner with Marcell Ozuna).
- ▶ On 6/2 vs. Arizona, hit a solo HR off Patrick Corbin to collect his 579th career RBI, moving past Mike Lowell (578) for sole possession of first place on the Marlins' all-time RBI list.
- ▶ From 7/5-8/29, hit 30HR in a 48-game stretch...according to *Elias*, became the second player ever to homer 30 times in a stretch of 50G-or-fewer within a season (Barry Bonds, 30HR in 47G from 4/12-6/5/01 and from 4/13-6/7/01)...also hit 23HR in a 35-game stretch from 7/5-8/15, tied for the third-highest total in a 35-game span in Major League history...homered in 10-of-12 games from 8/4-15 (11HR total), including a club-record 9HR in a 10-game span from 8/4-13.
- ▶ Was named via the Player Ballot to his fourth career NL All-Star Team, tying Miguel Cabrera (2004-07) for the most All-Star appearances in Marlins history...started at DH and went 0-for-3 in the game at Marlins Park.
- ▶ Participated in his third Home Run Derby...was eliminated in Round 1 by the Yankees' Gary Sánchez, 17-16.
- ▶ From 7/24-8/22, reached base in a career-best 27 consecutive games, hitting .343/.463/.889 (34-for-99) with 29R, 6 doubles, 16HR, 34RBI and 19BB.
- ▶ Was named NL "Player of the Month" after tying the Major League August record with 18HR...hit .349/.433/.899 (38-for-109) with 28R, 6 doubles, 37RBI and 14BB in 29 games...shares the mark with Detroit's Rudy York, who hit 18HR in August 1937...tied York for the second-highest HR total in any month in Major League history, behind the Cubs' Sammy Sosa, who hit 20HR in June 1998...broke Hanley Ramirez's single-month club RBI record of 33 in June 2009...was his third career monthly award.
- ▶ Became the second player in Major League history to combine for at least 30HR over the span of two consecutive calendar months...joined Cleveland's Albert Belle, who hit 31HR in August/September 1995.
- ▶ From 8/1-15, tied the Major League record by hitting 11HR in the first 15 days of a calendar month, matching Troy Tulowitzki (Sept. 2010), Sammy Sosa (June 1998) and Ralph Kiner (Sept. 1949).
- ▶ From 8/10-15, set a Marlins record by homering in six consecutive games...tied for the then-seventh-longest home run streak in Major League history, two shy of the record of eight games, shared by Ken Griffey, Jr., Don Mattingly and Dale Long.
- ▶ Hit his 43rd HR on 8/14 vs. San Francisco (off Ty Blach), breaking Gary Sheffield's club record of 42HR in 1996...had tied Sheffield with his 42nd HR the previous day, 8/13 vs. Colorado (off Germán Márquez).
- ▶ On 8/27 vs. San Diego, hit his 50th HR (off Clayton Richard), becoming the 28th player to reach the milestone in a single season...with 50HR in the Marlins' first 129 games, was the seventh-fastest player to the number, behind San Francisco's Barry Bonds in 2001 (117th team game), the Cubs' Sammy Sosa in 1999 (121st), St. Louis' Mark McGwire in 1999 (124th) and 1998 (125th), the Yankees' Roger Maris in 1961 (125th) and the Yankees' Babe Ruth in 1921 (125th)...was the eighth-fastest player, by date, to hit 50HR, and the first player to reach the 50-homer mark in August since 2001 (Bonds/Sosa).
- ▶ On 9/28 vs. Atlanta, hit home runs No. 58 (third PA) and No. 59 (fifth and final PA)...in 14PA with a chance to hit a 60th HR, went 5-for-14 (.357) with one double.
- ▶ Was acquired by the Yankees from the Marlins along with cash considerations in exchange for 2B Starlin Castro, RHP Jorge Guzman and INF Jose Devers on 12/11.

2016

- ▶ In 119 games with the Marlins, hit .240/.326/.489 (99-for-413) with 56R, 20 doubles, 1 triple, 27HR, 74RBI and 50BB...marked a career low in batting average but led Miami in home runs for the sixth consecutive season.
- ▶ Won the Home Run Derby at San Diego's Petco Park, defeating the defending champion, Chicago-AL's Todd Frazier, in the final round to become the first Marlin to win the event...set a then-Derby record with 61 home runs over three rounds (24HR in Round 1, 17HR in semifinals, 20HR in finals), topping the previous mark of 41 by Philadelphia's Bobby Abreu at Detroit's Comerica Park in 2005...according to MLB Statcast, his home runs traveled an estimated combined distance of 27,187 feet (5.15 miles)...hit the 10 longest homers and 18 of the 19 longest homers in the contest...also had the 20 hardest-hit homers.
- ▶ Became the first player in Marlins history to homer in four consecutive at-bats, doing so in his final 2PA on 7/5 at the Mets and first 2AB (3PA) on 7/6 at the Mets (walked in his first PA on 7/6)...was the second player in Marlins history to record consecutive 2HR games (also Derrek Lee, 6/9-10/02).
- ▶ Hit his 200th career HR on 7/6 at the Mets (off Jacob deGrom)...at 26 years, 241 days, was the 12th-youngest player in Baseball history to reach the milestone at the time...according to STATS, Inc., was the seventh-fastest ever to reach 200HR, doing so in his 781st game...was the first player in Marlins history to hit 200HR.
- ▶ Won NL "Player of the Week" Award for 7/3-9 (.391, 9-for-23, 6R, 1 double, 1 triple, 4HR, 8RBI, 3BB in 6G).
- ▶ Was placed on the 15-day disabled list from 8/14-9/6 with a left groin strain.



2015

- ▶ Tied for 10th in the NL in home runs despite playing in just 74 games, hitting .265/.346/.606 (74-for-279) with 47R, 12 doubles, 1 triple, 27HR, 67RBI and 34BB for the Marlins.
- ▶ On 4/16 at Atlanta, hit his first HR of the season and 155th of his career, surpassing Dan Uggla (154) to become the Marlins' all-time home run leader.
- ▶ Earned the NL "Player of the Month" Award for June after batting .344/.404/.800 (31-for-90) with 18R, 5 doubles, 12HR and 23RBI in 24 games...was his second career monthly award...during the month, led the Majors in SLG (min. 50PA) and OPS (1.204), tied for the NL lead in homers, was third in XBHs (17) and total bases, and tied for fourth in RBI...set a Marlins record for homers in June, and tied a then-franchise record for HRs in any month.

- ▶ Has made four Opening Day rosters (2017-19 with Pittsburgh and 2021 with the Yankees).

CAREER NOTES

- ▶ With 24HR in his 2018 rookie season and 38HR in 2019, was the third Yankee all-time with multiple 20HR seasons *before turning 23 years old* (also Mickey Mantle, three seasons from 1952-54 and Joe DiMaggio, two seasons from 1936-37)...is one of six middle infielders in Baseball history with multiple 20HR seasons by his age 22 season, joining Cal Ripken Jr. (two, 1982-83), Alex Rodriguez (three, 1996-98), Carlos Correa (three, 2015-17), Ozzie Albies (2018-19) and Fernando Tatis Jr. (2019, '21).
- ▶ Hit 62HR in 267 games from 2018-19, the second-highest total for a Yankee in his first two Major League seasons (Joe DiMaggio, 75HR in 1936-37).

- ▶ Reached base in 17-of-30 plate appearances over seven postseason games, batting .435/.567/.696 (10-for-23) with 5R, 2HR, 5RBI, 7BB and 2SB.
- ▶ Was 5-for-7 with 3R, 1HR, 3RBI and 3BB in 2G in the ALWCS at Cleveland...went 4-for-4 with 3R, 1HR, 3RBI and 1BB in ALWCS Game 1 on 9/29 at Cleveland, reaching base five times...was the first Yankee to reach base safely at least five times in a postseason game since Alex Rodriguez went 2-for-2 with 3BB in 2009 ALCS Game 6 vs. Los Angeles-AL...was the first Yankee to record at least 4H in a playoff game since Ichiro Suzuki in 2012 ALCS Game 1 vs. Detroit (also 4H)...at 23 years, 291 days, was just the second Yankee to record at least 4H in a postseason game prior to his 24th birthday (also Derek Jeter's 4H in 1996 ALCS Game 1 vs. Baltimore at the age of 22 years, 105 days)...was the second-youngest player in Major League history to reach base at least five times in a postseason game (Carlos Correa reached base five times in 2015 ALDS Game 4 vs. Kansas City at the age of 21 years, 20 days)...became the eighth Yankee (first since Hideki Matsui, Gary Sheffield and Bernie Williams all did so in 2004 ALCS Game 3 at Boston) to have at least 4H and 3RBI in a postseason game and the only to do so as a shortstop...with his 3RBI from the No. 7 spot and Gardner's 3RBI from the No. 8 spot, the Yankees became the first team in postseason history to have their No. 7 and No. 8 hitters both record at least 3RBI in the same game (credit: STATS).

- ▶ Hit .278 (152-for-546) with 96R, 26 doubles, 38HR, 90RBI and 48BB in 144 games...set career highs in almost every offensive category...was the second Yankee middle infielder in 100 years to lead the club in home runs (Robinson Canó-27HR in 2013)...received one fifth place and one ninth place vote in AL MVP balloting.
- ▶ Is the second-youngest Yankee to have at least 30HR in a season behind only Joe DiMaggio...his 90RBI were most by a Yankee in a season at age 22-or-younger since Mickey Mantle had 102RBI in 1954.
- ▶ His 38HR were tied for second-most by a middle infielder in team history (min. 50% of G at 2B/SS): 2B Alfonso Soriano (39HR in 2002, 38HR in 2003).
- ▶ Of his 38HR, 21 came vs. the AL East...hit 13HR vs. Baltimore, the most ever by a player vs. a single opponent in a single season in the divisional era (since 1969).
- ▶ Had 16 of his 38HR come in his Major League-best eight multi-HR games...tied the Yankees' franchise record for multi-HR games in a season, joining Alex Rodriguez (2007), Mickey Mantle (1961) and Babe Ruth (1927)...were second-most by any Major League since 2011 behind Giancarlo Stanton (10) with Miami in 2017...was the first player under the age of 23 to record eight multi-HR games in a season (previous record set by Texas's Juan Gonzalez-7 in 1992)...was the second player ever to record eight multi-HR games as a middle infielder in a season, joining Texas's Alex Rodriguez (10 in 2002).
- ▶ Hit 20HR at Yankee Stadium, fifth-most home runs at home by an AL player in 2019...became the sixth player (eighth time) to hit 20 homers at the current Yankee Stadium in a single season and third since 2017 (Aaron Judge-33HR in 2017 and Giancarlo Stanton-20HR in 2018).
- ▶ Batted .394/.467/.045 (26-for-66) with 22R, 4 doubles, 13HR and 20RBI in 18 games vs. the Orioles, hitting safely in 15 of those contests...his 13HR surpassed Chicago-NL's Sammy Sosa (12HR in 1998 vs. Milwaukee) for the most by any player vs. a single opponent in one season in the divisional era (since 1969)...is one of six players ever to hit at least 13HR vs. a single opponent in a season (Yankees' Lou Gehrig-Major League-record 14HR vs. Cleveland in 1936; Yankees' Roger Maris-13HR vs. Chicago-AL in 1961, Milwaukee-NL's Joe Adcock-13HR vs. Brooklyn in 1956, Chicago-NL's Hank Sauer-13HR vs. Pittsburgh in 1954, Philadelphia-AL's Jimmie Foxx-13HR vs. Detroit in 1932)...had five multi-HR games vs. Baltimore, establishing a new Major League record for multi-HR games vs. one opponent in a single season, previously held by Roy Sievers (1955 vs. Kansas City A's), Gus Zernial (1951 vs. St. Louis-AL) and Ralph Kiner (1947 vs. Boston-AL)...STATS, LLC, notes he became the first player in Major League history to hit 10 of his first 12 home runs of a season against the same team...according to STATS, Inc., was the first player to homer in both games of two doubleheaders vs. the same opponent (5/15 and 8/12, both vs. Baltimore) in one year since Philadelphia's Mike Schmidt in 1983 vs. Montreal.
- ▶ Hit two grand slams, becoming the fourth Yankee to hit multiple grand slams in the same season before turning 23 years old, joining Joe DiMaggio (3 in 1937), Mickey Mantle (2 in 1952) and Yogi Berra (2 in 1947).



- ▶ According to the YES Network, with Gary Sánchez hitting 10HR vs. the O's, became the 10th set of teammates in Major League history (fifth set of Yankees) to hit at least 9HR against the same team in a single season and the first since San Francisco's Barry Bonds and Rich Aurilia (9HR each) in 2001 vs. Arizona...the last set of Yankees to do so was Mickey Mantle (11HR) and Roger Maris (9HR) in 1961 vs. the Washington Senators.
- ▶ Hit .338 (25-for-74) with 8R, 6 doubles, 3HR and 14RBI in 19 Interleague games, reaching safely in 16 of those 19 contests...became just the fifth player in Interleague history (since 1998) to begin a season with XBHs in each of his first six Interleague contests (also Milwaukee's Keon Broxton-2017, Texas' Nomar Mazara-2017, Toronto's Matt Stairs-2007 and Philadelphia's Doug Glanville-1999, all 6G streaks).
- ▶ Is one of only two players in Yankees history to have multiple games in the same season in which he went 4-for-4 or better with 2HR (4/4 at Baltimore, 8/22 at Oakland), joining Lou Gehrig in 1934.
- ▶ Through 50 team games (Game 1 on 5/25), hit 12HR...with Gary Sánchez (15HR) and Luke Voit (13HR), became the second trio in Yankees history to reach 12HR apiece by the club's 50th game of the season, joining Mickey Mantle (21HR), Yogi Berra (16HR) and Hank Bauer (13HR) in 1956 (credit: *STATS, LLC*).
- ▶ Made his first career Opening Day roster...at 22 years, 105 days old, was the eighth-youngest player to make an Opening Day roster in 2019, older than only Atlanta's Ronald Acuña Jr., Ozzie Albies and Bryse Wilson, Toronto's Elvis Luciano, Washington's Victor Robles and Juan Soto and San Diego's Fernando Tatis Jr.
- ▶ Became the first Yankee to hit safely in the team's first three games of the season at age 22-or-younger since Bobby Murcer in 1969 (first 9G at age 22).
- ▶ Collected his third career multi-HR game on 4/4 at Baltimore (also 5/21/18 at Texas and 8/1/18 vs. Baltimore), going 4-for-4 with 2R, 1 double and 4RBI, setting a career high in hits...joined Didi Gregorius (4/3/18 vs. Tampa Bay) as just the second Yankee to collect at least 4H, 2HR and 4RBI in a game since 2013...at 22 years, 112 days old, became the youngest Yankee with 4H, including at least 3XBH, in a single game since DiMaggio on 6/28/36 (Game 1) at St. Louis-AL (21y, 216d).
- ▶ Had a career-high 12-game hitting streak from 4/23-5/7, hitting .347 (17-for-49) with 6R, 4 doubles, 1HR, 7RBI, 2BB and 2SB...was the first Yankee, age-22 or younger, to compile at least a 10-game hitting streak since 22-year-old Melky Cabrera had both a 15-game and a 13-game streak in 2007.
- ▶ Played in his 100th career win on 5/9 vs. Seattle (his 159th career game), becoming the quickest Yankees position player to appear in 100 wins since Brett Gardner reached 100 team wins in his 155th game on 4/11/10.
- ▶ Hit 9HR—including three multi-HR games—in 15 games from 5/15 (Game 1) through 5/29...had 1HR over his previous 22 games from 4/17-5/11.
- ▶ Hit 3HR in 5/15 doubleheader vs. Baltimore, the first Yankee with 3HR in a doubleheader since Brett Gardner on 9/12/15 vs. Toronto...at 22 years, 153 days old, joined Joe DiMaggio as the only Yankees under 23 years old to hit 3HR in one day (DiMaggio had 3HR in a DH on 9/13/36 and a 3HR game on 6/13/37, both at St. Louis-AL's Sportsman's Park)...was the seventh-youngest Yankee to homer in both games of a doubleheader and youngest since Johnny Ellis on 5/24/70 (21y, 276d)...hit 2HR in Game 1, his fourth career multi-HR game...at 22y, 153d, became the youngest Yankee to reach four multi-HR games (prev.: Joe DiMaggio, 22y, 166d on 5/10/37 at Chicago-AL).
- ▶ Was also the youngest in franchise history to reach five career multi-HR games (age 22 years, 158 days on 5/20 at Baltimore) and six career multi-HR games (age 22 years, 160 days on 5/22 at Baltimore), surpassing Joe DiMaggio on both occasions (22 years, 198 days to five multi-HR games and 22 years, 200 days to six).
- ▶ Led the Majors with a .462 OBP in June, batting .333/.462/.569 (24-for-72) with 21R, 2 doubles, 5HR, 17RBI and 19BB in 22G...had a 20.4% walk rate (19BB/93PA) after posting a 5.8% walk rate (13BB/226PA) from March-May.
- ▶ Hit his first career grand slam on 6/19 vs. Tampa Bay.
- ▶ Had multiple RBI in three straight games from 6/19-21...hit a homer in each game, homering in at least three straight games for the second time in his career (homered in four straight from 5/21-25/18)...with Gary Sánchez also homering in each of those games, became the first pair of teammates in Yankees history to homer in three consecutive games together (confirmed by *Elias*).
- ▶ Hit a "walk-off" single in the ninth inning on 6/26 vs. Toronto, his third career "walk-off" hit.
- ▶ Collected his 200th career hit on 6/30 in London...at 22 years, 199 days, was the youngest player to collect 200H with the Yankees since Mickey Mantle reached the mark as a 20-year-old in 1952.
- ▶ Was named to his second career AL All-Star team (also 2018) and went 1-for-2...according to *Elias*, was the third Yankee to make two All-Star teams before turning 23, joining Joe DiMaggio and Mickey Mantle...was the third Yankee to record multiple seasons with at least 20HR prior to turning 23, joining Mickey Mantle (3x, 1952-54) and Joe DiMaggio (2x, 1936-37).
- ▶ Hit his 20th homer on 7/24 at Minnesota...with 24HR in his 2018 rookie season, became the third Yankee all-time with multiple 20HR seasons *before turning 23 years old* (also Mickey Mantle, three seasons from 1952-54 and Joe DiMaggio, two seasons from 1936-37)...became the fourth middle infielder in Baseball history with multiple 20HR seasons by his age 22 season, joining Cal Ripken Jr. (two, 1982-83), Alex Rodriguez (three, 1996-98) and Carlos Correa (three, 2015-17)...was his first homer since 6/25 vs. Toronto, snapping a 19-game homerless stretch (6/26-7/23) during which he hit .333 (24-for-72).
- ▶ Hit 13HR in 26 games in August, second-most in the Majors behind only Cincinnati's Aristides Aquino (14HR)...were the most by a Yankee in a calendar month since Aaron Judge hit 15HR in Sept. 2017 and most by a Yankees middle infielder in a single month since 2B Joe Gordon hit 13HR in July 1940...had four multi-HR games, the most in a month by a Yankee since Judge (four), also in Sept. 2017.
- ▶ Hit his second career grand slam on 8/2 and drove in all four Yankees runs in the team's 4-2 win vs. Boston.
- ▶ Collected his fifth 2HR game of the season—and seventh of his career—in Game 2 on 8/3 vs. Boston...at 22 years, 233 days old, was the then-second-youngest player in AL history (and then-seventh-youngest in Major League history) to reach seven career multi-HR games, one week older than the Yankees' Joe DiMaggio (22 years, 226 days on 7/9/37 vs. Washington-AL)...was the second player in Yankees history (and eighth in Major League history) to record five multi-HR games in a season prior to turning 23 years old, joining Joe DiMaggio (5x in 1937 at age 22).



- ▶ Hit 15HR over his final 38 games of the season (from Game 1 on 8/12).
- ▶ Reached base safely in a career-best 22 straight games from 8/12 (Game 1) through 9/4, batting .306/.355/.718 (26-for-85) with 18R, 2 doubles, 11HR, 17RBI and 6BB over the span...since 1955, was the second-longest streak by a Yankee at age-22 or younger, behind Derek Jeter's 23-game streak from 8/31-9/25/96.
- ▶ Went 4-for-8 with 4R, 3HR and 7RBI in 8/12 doubleheader vs. Baltimore, homering once in Game 1 and hitting two three-run HRs in Game 2...at 22 years, 242 days old, was the youngest player in AL history (and fourth-youngest in Major League history) at the time to reach eight career multi-HR games (Juan Soto and Fernando Tatis did so at a younger 22 in 2021)...was his second career doubleheader with 3HR (also 5/15/19 vs Baltimore)...became the only player in 50 years to hit 3HR in a doubleheader twice as a Yankee (credit: *Elias*)...according to STATS, Inc., was the first player to homer in both games of a doubleheader vs. the same opponent twice in one year since Philadelphia's Mike Schmidt in 1983 vs. Montreal.
- ▶ His second HR in Game 2 on 8/12 vs. Baltimore was his 50th career home run...at age 22 years, 242 days, was the third-youngest Yankee to reach the plateau, older than only Mickey Mantle (21 years, 279 days on 7/26/53, Game 1) and Joe DiMaggio (22 years, 226 days on 7/9/37).
- ▶ Went 3-for-4 with 3R, 2HR and 6RBI in Game 2 on 8/12 vs. Baltimore, the third-youngest (22y, 242d) Yankee to record at least 2HR and 6RBI in a game (since RBI became an official stat in 1920), behind Joe DiMaggio (22y, 226d on 7/9/37 vs. Washington-AL) and Lou Gehrig (22y, 34d on 7/23/25 vs. Washington-AL).
- ▶ Hit two solo HRs on 8/17 vs. Cleveland at 22 years, 247 days old, becoming the youngest player in Major League history to record seven multi-HR games in the same season.
- ▶ Hit two solo HRs on 8/22 at Oakland (4-for-4, 3R, 1 double, 2HR, 2RBI), his eighth multi-home run game of the season...at 22 years, 252 days, became the second-youngest player in Baseball history to reach 10 career multi-HR games behind only the New York Giants' Mel Ott (22 years, 163 days)...was his second career game going 4-for-4 or better with at least 2HR (also 4/4/19 at Baltimore)...no other player in Major League history had two such games before turning 24 years old.
- ▶ Hit his 60th career home run on 9/10 at Detroit...at 22 years, 271 days, was the third-youngest Yankee to reach 60HR (Mickey Mantle - 22 years, 199 days; Joe DiMaggio - 22 years, 249 days)...his 256 games were the fourth-fewest by a Yankee to reach 60 career homers (Aaron Judge-197G, Sánchez-201G; DiMaggio-223G).
- ▶ Started at 2B in each of the Yankees' nine postseason games, hitting .324/.375/.703 (12-for-37) with 8R, 5 doubles, 3HR and 10RBI...became the first Yankee to hit 3HR in a single postseason at age-22 or younger and the third-youngest Yankee to hit multiple postseason HRs: Mickey Mantle hit 4HR prior to turning 22 years old (2HR in 1952 World Series at age-20, 2HR in 1953 World Series at age-21); Tony Kubek hit 2HR in 1957 World Series Game 3 at Milwaukee at 21 years, 358 days...led all playoff participants in slugging and OPS (1.078), tied for third with 8XBH, ranked fourth in OBP and tied for sixth in RBI...had a 10-game postseason hitting streak from 2018 ALDS Game 1 at Boston through 2019 ALCS Game 3 vs. Houston, batting .378/.452/.730 (14-for-37) with 8R, 4 doubles, 3HR, 10RBI, 5BB and 2SB during the span...was the second player under age-23 to compile a 10-game postseason hitting streak, joining Texas' Elvis Andrus (12G in 2010)...was the longest by any Yankee since Derek Jeter (11G in 2009-10)...became the first AL player (and seventh Major Leaguer) to collect 7XBH (4 doubles, 3HR) through his team's first six postseason games in a season...his 8XBH are tied for the fourth-highest total in a single postseason in Yankees history...are tied for the most in a postseason by any player age-22 or younger (Los Angeles-NL's Cody Bellinger, 8XBH in 2017; Washington's Juan Soto, 8XBH in 2019)...had at least 1RBI in four straight games from ALDS Game 1 through ALCS Game 1, at the time, tied for the second-longest streak to begin a postseason in club history (Alex Rodriguez-7G in 2009).
- ▶ In ALDS Game 1 vs. Minnesota, hit a go-ahead two-run double in the fifth...in ALDS Game 3 at Minnesota, hit his first career postseason HR and collected his first postseason multi-hit game (3-for-4, 3R, 2 doubles, 1HR, 1RBI, 1SB)...at 22 years, 298 days old, became the second player under the age of 23 in Major League history to record three extra-base hits in a postseason game, joining Houston's Carlos Correa (1 double, 2HR) in 2015 ALDS Game 4 vs. Kansas City at 21 years, 20 days old...was the seventh Yankee of any age to do so, joining Babe Ruth (twice), Robinson Canó, Derek Jeter, Reggie Jackson, Hideki Matsui and Alex Rodriguez.
- ▶ In ALCS Game 1 win at Houston (3-for-5, 1R, 1 double, 1HR, 5RBI), had 3H for the second consecutive game and set a Yankees single-game RBI record for a player 22 years old or younger...at 22 years, 303 days old, became the third-ever player under the age of 23 to record 5RBI in a playoff game (Atlanta's Andruw Jones-5RBI in 1996 World Series Game 1 at the Yankees at 19 years, 180 days old, and Chicago-NL's Addison Russell-6RBI in 2016 World Series Game 6 at Cleveland at 22 years, 283 days old)...tied the Yankees' ALCS RBI record, joining Hideki Matsui, who did it twice (2004 ALCS Game 1 vs. Boston and 2004 ALCS Game 3 at Boston)...with his ALDS Game 3 at Minnesota (3-for-4, 3R, 2 doubles, 1HR, 1RBI, 1SB), was the second player in Major League history with at least 3H, including a double and a HR, in consecutive postseason games, joining Brooklyn's Roy Campanella in 1955 World Series Games 3-4 vs. the Yankees...was the 12th Yankee with 3H in consecutive playoff games and ninth to do so within the same postseason...batted cleanup in ALCS Game 4 vs. Houston, becoming the first Yankee under age 23 to bat fourth in the starting lineup in a playoff game.

2018

- ▶ Hit .271 (117-for-431) with 54R, 16 doubles, 24HR, 77RBI and 42BB in 123 games (104GS at 2B, 15 at SS)...ranked second among Major League rookies in RBI and fourth in HR...hit .538 (7-for-13) with 15RBI with the bases loaded.
- ▶ Ranked third in AL "Rookie of the Year" voting, collecting three second-place votes and 16 third-place votes...was a finalist for the *Sporting News* AL "Rookie of the Year."
- ▶ Of his 24HR, 13 came with runners on base...ranked third in the Majors with seven three-run HR...of his 24HR, 12 tied the game (2) or gave the Yankees the lead (10)...hit 13HR from the ninth spot in the lineup, the most by a Yankee in a single season from the No. 9 spot in franchise history.
- ▶ Is one of nine rookies in Yankees history to hit 20HR in a season and was one of four to do so from 2016-18 (also Gary Sánchez-20HR in 2016, Aaron Judge-52HR in 2017 and Miguel Andújar-27HR in 2018).



- ▶ With teammate Miguel Andújar hitting 27HR, became the first pair of Yankees rookies to hit 20HR in the same season...according to *Elias*, were the eighth set of rookie teammates to both hit 20HR, and the first since Cincinnati's Joey Votto and Jay Bruce in 2008...the Yankees became the sixth team in Major League history with multiple rookies with at least 20HR and 60RBI, joining the 2006 Marlins (Mike Jacobs, Dan Uggla, Josh Willingham), 1982 Twins (Gary Gaetti, Kent Hrbek), 1977 Athletics (Wayne Gross, Mitchell Page), 1975 Red Sox (Fred Lynn, Jim Rice) and 1960 Orioles (Jim Gentile, Ron Hansen).
- ▶ His 24HR marked the second-highest single-season total by a Yankee in his age-21 season or younger, behind 21-year-old Joe DiMaggio (29HR in 1936)...marked the third-most career HRs by a Yankee prior to turning 22, trailing only Mickey Mantle (57) and DiMaggio (29).
- ▶ Had 15HR during the first half, one of five Yankees rookies to hit at least 10HR before the All-Star break, joining Aaron Judge (30HR in 2017), Miguel Andújar (12HR in 2018), Joe DiMaggio (11HR in 1936) and Nick Johnson (11HR in 2002)—credit: *Elias*...joined Andújar as the first Yankees rookies with at least 10HR before the All-Star break in the same season (first team to do so since the 2016 Dodgers: Corey Seager-17, Trayce Thompson-13).
- ▶ His 15HR before the All-Star Game were tied with Robinson Canó (15HR in 2011) for fourth-most by a Yankees second baseman entering the break, trailing only Canó (21HR in 2013, 20HR in 2012 and 16HR in 2010).
- ▶ Was twice named AL "Player of the Week:" 5/21-27 and 8/27-9/2.
- ▶ Started at 2B in first 20 games after his recall, with the Yankees going 17-3...became the first position player in the Modern Era (since 1900) to start and be on the winning side in 16 of his first 17 Major League games.
- ▶ Is the second-youngest Yankee to record at least 17H in his first 15 career games (4/22-5/6), just two weeks older than Ben Chapman, who collected 17H from 4/19-5/4/30...is one of three 21-year-olds in Yankees history to record hits in 12 of his first 15 career games (Joe DiMaggio, Frankie Crosetti)...is the youngest Yankee to collect at least 11RBI through his first 15 games.
- ▶ Made his Major League debut on 4/22 vs. Toronto at 21 years, 130 days old and was the ninth-youngest player to appear in a game in 2018...was the youngest position player to appear in a game for the Yankees since Melky Cabrera (age 20) in 2005...was 0-for-4 after being called from Triple-A Scranton/Wilkes-Barre prior to the game.
- ▶ Collected his first Major League hit in 4/23 win vs. Minnesota (single off Tyler Kinley)...at 21 years, 131 days old, was the youngest Yankee to record a hit since Melky Cabrera (20y, 338d) on 7/15/05 at Boston.
- ▶ Doubled in 4/25 win vs. Minnesota...at 21 years, 133 days old, became the youngest Yankee to record an extra-base hit since Derek Jeter doubled on 9/26/95 at Milwaukee at 21 years, 92 days old.
- ▶ Stole his first career base in 4/30 loss at Houston...at 21 years, 138 days, was the youngest Yankee to steal a base since Bobby Murcer on 9/23/66 vs. Boston (20 years, 126 days)...the loss marked his first time being on the losing side of a Major League game, snapping a career-opening eight-game winning streak...became the fourth position player in the Modern Era (since 1900) to start and be on the winning side in each of his first eight Major League games, joining Atlanta C Evan Gattis (won and started his first 10G in 2013), Washington-AL OF Babe Gangel (first 9G in 1927) and Philadelphia SS Dave Bancroft (first 8G in 1915)...two pitchers also started team wins in their first 8G: St. Louis' Allen Watson (1993) and Chicago-AL's John Whitehead (1935).
- ▶ Was named AL "Rookie of the Month" for May...in 24G, hit .325/.380/.663 (27-for-83) with 13R, 9HR and 24RBI, leading all Major League rookies in batting average, HR and RBI during the month (min. 75AB)...was the fifth Yankee (eighth time) to win AL "Rookie of the Month" and the third current Yankee to do so, joining Gary Sánchez (Aug. 2016) and Aaron Judge (four times in 2017)...teammate Miguel Andújar won in June and August 2018.
- ▶ Hit safely in nine straight games (5/2-11), the youngest Yankee to tally as long a hitting streak since Mickey Mantle had a 10G hitting streak from 6/24-7/3/52 (G1), ending at 20y, 257d.
- ▶ Had 3RBI, including a game-tying two-run ninth-inning single in 5/3 win at Houston...became the youngest Yankee (age 21y, 141d) with a game-tying or go-ahead hit in the ninth inning-or-later since Bobby Murcer (20y, 134d) on 10/1/66 at Chicago-AL (RBI single in the ninth in a 5-3 win)...had 3RBI on 5/4, becoming the youngest Yankee (21y, 141d - 21y, 142d) ever with at least 3RBI in consecutive games (prev. Jerry Priddy, 21 years, 179 days, 5/6-7/41).
- ▶ Hit three-run HR—the first of his Major League career—in 5/4 win vs. Cleveland...at age 21y, 142d, became the youngest Yankee to homer since John Ellis hit an inside-the-park HR on 5/17/69 vs. California (20y, 269d)...was the youngest Yankee to homer over the fence since Bobby Murcer (19y, 117d) on 9/14/65 at Washington-AL...became the youngest player born outside the U.S. to homer for the Yankees (prev. Jesús Montero, 21y, 281d on 9/5/11 vs. Baltimore)...was the youngest Yankees 2B ever to hit a HR (prev. Jerry Priddy, 21 years, 178 days on 5/6/41 vs. Detroit)...was the third Yankee since 1999 to hit a HR with at least two runners on for his first career homer (also Colin Curtis, three-run HR, on 7/21/10 vs. Los Angeles-AL; and Hideki Matsui, grand slam, on 4/8/03 vs. Minnesota).
- ▶ Hit a three-run "walk-off" home run in the ninth inning to win 5/6 game vs. Cleveland, becoming the youngest player in franchise history (21 years, 144 days) to hit a "walk-off" HR (prev. Mickey Mantle, 21y, 185d on 4/23/53 vs. Boston)...according to *Elias*, is the third-youngest Yankee ever with a "walk-off" RBI, older than only Mark Koenig (age 21y, 76d on 10/3/1925 vs. Philadelphia) and Ben Chapman (age 21y, 121d on 4/25/1930 vs. Boston)...was the sixth Yankee with a "walk-off" HR within his first two career HRs, joining Clint Frazier (2017), Alfonso Soriano (1999), Mike Hegan (1967), Bob Grim (1957) and Frank LaPorte (1906).
- ▶ Homered in four straight games (5/21-25)...was 21 years and 163 days old on 5/25 and at the time, was the fourth-youngest player in the Modern Era (since 1900)—and youngest AL player—to homer in his fourth consecutive game (Miguel Cabrera in 2004 at 20y, 362d; Andruw Jones in 1998 at 21y, 138d; Albert Pujols in 2001 at 21y 147d)—credit: *Elias*...Ronald Acuña joined the group later in 2018 (5 straight at age 20y, 239d)...was the second Yankees rookie to accomplish the feat (also Gary Sánchez, 4G from 9/17-21/16)...his four-game HR streak was tied for the longest by a second baseman in franchise history (also Joe Gordon from 7/24-27/40 and Tony Lazzeri from 5/21-24/36).



- ▶ Collected his first career multi-HR game in 5/21 win at Texas, hitting a two-run HR and solo HR...at 21y, 159d old, became the second-youngest player in Yankees history with a multi-HR game (Mickey Mantle hit 2HR on 8/11/52 vs. Boston at 20y, 296d)...both HR came off RHP Bartolo Colon (44.362), who was 23y, 203d older than Torres...according to STATS, marked the third-largest age difference between an older pitcher and younger batter on a HR in Yankees history, behind a Mickey Mantle HR off Satchel Paige (25y, 105d difference) in 1951 and Bobby Murcer HR off Hoyt Wilhelm (23y, 298d difference) in 1969.
- ▶ Collected his second career "walk-off" hit with a 10th-inning RBI single on 5/29 vs. Houston at age 21y, 167d (also a three-run "walk-off" HR on 5/6 vs. Cleveland, age 21y, 144d)...is the youngest player in franchise history with two "walk-off" RBI in the same season...was his first career extra-inning hit.
- ▶ Homered at age 21 years, 182 days on 6/13 vs. Washington, in the same game as Nationals OF Juan Soto (19y, 231d)...according to STATS, their combined age of 41y, 48d was the youngest by opposing players to homer in the same game since Indianapolis' Egyptian Healy and the New York Giants' Mike Tiernan on 5/19/1887.
- ▶ Reached 50 career games on 6/19 vs. Seattle...through his 50th game, had 14HR and 35RBI...at the time, his 14HR were tied for seventh-most in AL history through a player's first 50 career games...were tied with Aaron Judge for third-most by a Yankee through 50G (Gary Sánchez-19 and Kevin Maas-15)...his 35RBI were eighth-most by a Yankee through his first 50 career games.
- ▶ Hit cleanup for the first time in his career on 6/30...at 21 years, 199 days, became the third-youngest cleanup hitter in Yankees history, behind Mickey Mantle (27G from 1951-53, first on 9/29/51-G1 vs. Boston at 19y, 344d) and Lou Gehrig (4G in 1923, first on 9/27/23 at Boston at 20y, 100d)...was the youngest since Mantle hit cleanup on 5/5/53 at Cleveland at 21 years, 197 days.
- ▶ Was the first Yankee—and sixth Major Leaguer—ever to hit at least 15HR in his first 60 career games at age 21-or-younger, joining Cody Bellinger (24), Adam Dunn (17), Willie Mays (17), Albert Pujols (17) and Frank Robinson (16)...became the second rookie in Yankees history to hit 15HR before the All-Star break (Judge-30HR in 2017).
- ▶ Was placed on the 10-day disabled list from 7/4 (effective 7/5) - 7/25 with a right hip strain...was removed from 7/4 win vs. Atlanta in the fifth with the injury...played three rehab games with Single-A Tampa.
- ▶ Was named via the Player Ballot to his first career All-Star team (did not play due to injury)...was the fourth Yankee to be named to the AL All-Star team at age 21-or-younger, joining Joe DiMaggio (age 21 in 1936), Mickey Mantle (ages 20-21 from 1952-53) and Willie Randolph (age 21 in 1976)...was the 12th Yankees rookie selected to an AL All-Star team, joining starters Aaron Judge (2017), Hideki Matsui (2003) and Joe DiMaggio (1936) and reserves Dellin Betances (2014), Masahiro Tanaka (2014), Willie Randolph (1976), Tom Tresh (1962), Ryne Duren (1958), Bobby Richardson (1957), Spec Shea (1947) and Joe Page (1944)...was the fourth Yankee to make the All-Star team as a rookie since 2014 (Betances, Judge and Tanaka) after the team had just one rookie All-Star from 1977-2013 (Matsui in 2003).
- ▶ Hit solo HR and three-run HR in 8/1 loss vs. Baltimore...was his second career 2HR game (also 5/21 at Texas)...became the second player in Yankees history to record at least two multi-HR games before turning 22 years old, joining Joe DiMaggio, who had three in 1936...at 21 years, 231 days old, was the youngest Yankee ever to record a second career multi-HR game, 10 days younger than DiMaggio was on 7/23/36 at St. Louis-AL (21y, 241d).
- ▶ Reached 50RBI in his 74th game on 8/5 at Boston, the seventh-fastest Yankee to 50RBI, behind Joe DiMaggio (46th game), Joe Gordon (53rd), Tony Lazzeri (57th), Bob Meusel (65th), Gary Sánchez (69th) and Mickey Mantle (73rd).
- ▶ Reached 20HR in his 93rd game on 8/27 vs. Chicago-AL, at the age of 21 years, 257 days...at the time, only eight other players as young as Torres in Major League history reached the milestone in as few games (Ronald Acuña Jr., Tony Conigliaro, Carlos Correa, Bob Horner, Albert Pujols, Frank Robinson, Giancarlo Stanton, Darryl Strawberry)...became the third Yankee ever to hit 20HR prior to turning 22 years old (Mickey Mantle-57, Joe DiMaggio-29).
- ▶ Had a career-long streak of four straight games with multiple RBI from 8/30-9/2 (2RBI in each game)...collected the game-winning RBI in consecutive games (two-run single in the eighth on 8/31, two-run HR in the fifth on 9/1).
- ▶ Hit two-run HR and was 1-for-4 in 9/7 win at Seattle...the homer was his 100th career hit and at 21 years, 268 days of age, became the fourth-youngest Yankees player to reach the milestone behind Mickey Mantle (20 years, 193 days), Ben Chapman (21 years, 207 days) and Joe DiMaggio (21 years, 230 days).

2021 in Review

The Yankees clinched their postseason birth on the final day of the regular season with **OF Aaron Judge's** first career "walk-off" hit.

2021 Postseason Summary

PLAYOFF RETURN: The Yankees clinched the 57th playoff appearance in franchise history (119 seasons, 47.9%)... qualified for the postseason for the 23rd time in 27 seasons since 1995 (missing only in 2008, '13-14, '16).

► The Yankees fell to Boston, 6-2, in a "winner-take-all" Wild Card Game at Fenway Park.

THE SKIPPER, TOO: Manager **Aaron Boone** was the second manager in Baseball history to reach the postseason in each of his first four managerial seasons, joining Mike Matheny (2012-15 w/ St. Louis, four straight)...was the third manager to make the playoffs in his first four seasons with the Yankees, joining Casey Stengel (first five from 1949-53) and Joe Torre (first 12 from 1996-2007).

SEEING RED: The 2021 AL Wild Card Game marked only the fifth time that the Yankees faced the Red Sox in a postseason series: 1999 ALCS (won 4-1), 2003 ALCS (won 4-3), 2004 ALCS (lost 4-3) and the 2018 ALDS (lost 3-1)...the Yankees are 12-12 in 24 postseason games vs. the Red Sox (6-6 at home, 6-6 in Boston).

AROUND THE WORLD: The Yankees' Wild Card Game roster featured players born in six different countries: United States (15), Dominican Republic (5), Venezuela (2), Cuba (2), Colombia (1) and Nicaragua (1).

OUT OF THE PARK: Yankees batters have homered in 17 consecutive postseason games (since 2019 ALDS Game 1), the longest postseason streak by any team in Baseball history (previous: Houston's 14-game stretch from 2017-18 and Los Angeles-NL's 14-game streak from 2020-21).

OCTOBER TESTED: Nine of the 26 players on the Yankees' Wild Card Game roster had not appeared in a postseason game prior to 2021: C Rob Brantly, LHP Nestor Cortes, OF Joey Gallo, RHP Domingo Germán, RHP Clay Holmes, LHP Lucas Luetge, LHP Wandy Peralta, LHP Joely Rodríguez and INF Andrew Velazquez.

► 13 of the 26 appeared for the Yankees during the 2020 postseason (Chapman, Cole, Gardner, Green, Higashioka, Judge, King, Loaisiga, Sánchez, Torres, Urshela, Stanton, Wade).

STANTON ISLAND: DH **Giancarlo Stanton** went 3-for-4 with 1R, 1HR and 1RBI in the AL Wild Card Game at Boston...hit a solo HR in the ninth inning, his ninth career postseason HR...his 9HR through his first 18 career postseason games are tied with Carlos Beltrán for the most by any Major League player.

COLE TRAIN: RHP **Gerrit Cole** started for the Yankees...making his fifth career "winner-take-all" start...matched Roger Clemens (five) for the most in Major League history.

2021 Regular Season Summary

ABOVE BOARD: The Yankees clinched their 29th consecutive winning season (since 1993)...marks the second-longest such stretch in Major League history behind only the franchise's streak of 39 straight winning seasons from 1926-64...is tied with the Boston Bruins' 29-season winning streak from 1968-96 for the third-longest streak of consecutive winning seasons all-time in the four major sports (MLB/NFL/NBA/NHL), behind only their own 39-season stretch and 32 straight winning seasons by the Montreal Canadiens (1952-83).

RACE TO THE FINISH: The Yankees made the postseason for the fifth consecutive season (since 2017)...was their 23rd trip to the postseason in the last 27 years since 1995 (missing only in 2008, '13-14, '16)...**Manager Aaron Boone** was the second manager in Baseball history to reach the postseason in each of his first four managerial seasons, joining Mike Matheny (2012-15 w/ St. Louis, four straight)... is the third manager to make the playoffs in his first four seasons with the Yankees, joining Casey Stengel (first five from 1949-53) and Joe Torre (first 12 from 1996-2007).

▶ The Yankees clinched the 57th playoff appearance in franchise history (119 seasons, 47.9%), the most in Major League history (next: Dodgers - 35 including 2021).

DOWN TO THE WIRE: The Yankees clinched their postseason birth on the final day of the regular season with Aaron Judge's first career "walk-off" hit... according to *Elias*, this season marked the fifth time in franchise history in which the Yankees entered the final day of the regular season still in contention to clinch a playoff spot: also 1995, 1978, 1949 and 1904.

A BRONX TALE: The Yankees went 46-35 at Yankee Stadium, clinching their 30th straight winning season at home (since 1992)... according to *Elias*, is the Majors' longest current streak and the longest streak by any team since a Major League-record 47-year streak for the Yankees from 1918-64.

▶ Went 17-2 in a 19-game span at home from 7/17-9/3.

ROAD WARRIORS: The Yankees went 46-35 (.568) on the road this season, the second-best record in the AL and tied for the fifth-best in the Majors...went 20-10 (.667) in their final 30 road games of the season.

CLOSE CALLS: The Yankees played 89 games this season determined by 2R-or-fewer, the third-most such games in the Majors this season, trailing only the Mets (92) and Atlanta (90)...marked just the first time in the last 45 seasons the Yankees have had at least 89 games decided by 2R-or-fewer, their most since 1976 (91G)...their 55-34 (.618) record in those games was the second-best in the Majors this season, trailing only San Francisco (51-30, .630)...marked the Yankees best record in those games since 2013 (50-30, .625)...their 55 wins decided by 2R-or-fewer marked their second-most in a season in franchise history, trailing only their 56 wins in 1961.

SECOND HALF SURGE: The Yankees posted a 50-29 (.633) record in their final 79 games of the season (7/6-10/3)...was the fourth-best record in the Majors in that span, trailing only the San Francisco Giants (45-24, .692), Los Angeles Dodgers (53-24, .688) and Tampa Bay Rays (51-26, .662).

EXTRA, EXTRA! The Yankees went 10-8 in 18 extra-inning games this season...their 18 extra-inning games were their most since 1997 (also 18G)...the last time they played more was 1984 (22G).

▶ The Yankees played three extra-inning games through their first nine games of the season for the fifth time in franchise history (also 3G in 1908, '16, '43, '64).

THE EAST WAS A BEAST: The AL East is the first division to have four teams with at least 90 wins since the 1978 AL East (four of seven).

PITCH PERFECT: Yankees pitchers posted a 3.74 ERA (1,435.1IP, 596ER) this season, the sixth-lowest ERA in the Majors and the third-lowest in the AL...was their third-lowest ERA in the last 36 seasons since 1986, trailing only their 3.72 ERA in 2017 and 3.73 ERA in 2011.

▶ Yankees pitchers also ranked fourth in the Majors in strikeouts (1,569K) and K/9.0IP (9.84), fifth in K/BB (3.19) and sixth in opponents' BA (.231) and WHIP (1.21).

▶ Their 1,569K were the second-most in franchise history, trailing only their 1,634K in 2018.

▶ Posted a 29.0 scoreless inning streak from the sixth inning on 5/18 to the seventh inning on 5/21...was their longest scoreless inning streak since a 31.0 scoreless inning streak from 8/7-9/09 (credit: *Elias*).

▶ Yankees pitchers allowed just 1R over a four-game span from 5/19-22, marking the third time in franchise history the Yankees have allowed 1R-or-fewer over a four-game span (also 1R in 4G - 4/3-6/2002 and 0R in 4G - 5/11-16/1932).

BATTERS' EYES: Yankees batters led the Majors in walks (621BB) for the second straight season...averaged 4.09 pitches/plate appearance, the most in the Majors (next: Seattle - 4.00).

▶ Recorded a season-high 14BB on 7/11 at Houston, their most in a game since 4/26/06 vs. Tampa Bay (also 14BB)...marked just their sixth game with at least 14BB since 1953 (also 14BB on 4/26/06 vs. Tampa Bay, 9/12/04 at Baltimore, 7/20/98 vs. Detroit, 5/14/80 vs. Kansas City and 4/30/68 at Baltimore).

ROLL CALL: The Yankees used a franchise-record 59 players this season (P: 30, C: 3, INF: 13, OF: 13)...their previous record was 58 in 2014.

▶ The Yankees used 15 different starting pitchers for just the seventh time in franchise history: 18 in 1946, 16 in 1989, 16 in 1915, 15 in 1987, 15 in 1959 and 15 in 1907.

COMEBACK KIDS: The Yankees recorded 44 come-from-behind wins this season, the third-most in the Majors, trailing only Boston (47) and Tampa Bay (46).

▶ The Yankees swept the Blue Jays from 6/15-17 despite trailing in the seventh inning or later in each of those games: were trailing 5-3 in the seventh on 6/15, 2-1 in the seventh on 6/16 and 4-3 in the seventh on 6/17... according to STATS, was the first time the Yankees had ever swept a road series of at least three games despite trailing in the seventh inning or later in every game... according to *Elias*, that stretch was the first time the Yankees won at least three straight games after trailing in the seventh inning or later in each of them since a four-game stretch from 5/14-17/09 (1G vs. Toronto; 3G vs. Minnesota).

BRONX BOMBERS: The Yankees hit 93HR in their final 59 games of the season (since 8/1), the second-most in the Majors in that span, trailing only the Toronto Blue Jays (105HR).

WALK IT OFF: The Yankees recorded 11 "walk-off" wins this season, tied for the fourth-most in the Majors behind Colorado (12), Oakland (12) and Philadelphia (12)... marked just the second time in the last 33 seasons (since 1989) the Yankees have recorded at least 10 "walk-off" wins in a season (also 15 in 2009).

▶ The Yankees won three straight home games from 5/8-21 in "walk-off" fashion for the first time since they recorded three straight "walk-off" wins from 5/15-17/09 (all against the Twins).



FOR STARTERS: Yankees starters posted a 3.91 ERA (829.1IP, 360ER) this season...was their lowest ERA since 2014 (3.77) and their third-lowest in the last 38 seasons since 1984 (also had 3.85 ERA in 1998).

- ▶ Posted a 3.67 ERA (405.0IP, 165ER) in their final 80 starts of the season...allowed 3ER-or-fewer in 66 of their final 80 starts and 2ER-or-fewer in 54 of those starts.
- ▶ Recorded 894K this season, the second-highest strikeout total by a Yankees starting pitching staff in franchise history...trailed only the 2017 Yankees (907K).
- ▶ Recorded a 37.0 scoreless inning streak from 5/19-5/25, the second-longest scoreless streak by Yankees starters in franchise history, trailing only a 40.0 scoreless inning streak from 5/10-16/32.
- ▶ Tossed at least 5.0 shutout innings in five straight starts from 5/19-23 (RHP Corey Kluber's 9.0IP on 5/19, RHP Domingo Germán's 7.0IP on 5/20, LHP Jordan Montgomery's 7.0IP on 5/21, RHP Gerrit Cole's 7.0IP on 5/22 and RHP Jameson Taillon's 5.0IP on 5/23)...was the first time in franchise history that Yankees starters have tossed at least 5.0 shutout innings in at least five consecutive starts...were the first Major League team to accomplish the feat since the Washington Nationals did so in five straight starts from 6/20-25/15.

PEN PALS: Yankees relievers posted a 3.50 ERA (606.0IP, 236ER) in 2021, the fourth-lowest bullpen ERA in the Majors and second-lowest in the AL...trailed only the San Francisco Giants (2.97), Los Angeles Dodgers (3.12) and Tampa Bay Rays (3.23).

- ▶ Yankees relievers ranked fourth in K/BB (2.99, second in AL), fifth in K/9.0IP (10.02, second in AL) and opponents' BA (.225, second in AL), tied for fifth in strikeouts (675, tied for second in AL) and sixth in BB/9.0IP (3.36, fourth in AL)

STRIKEOUT MACHINE: Yankees pitchers recorded 15 double-digit strikeout performances (Gerrit Cole-9, Jordan Montgomery-2, Nestor Cortes-1, Domingo Germán-1, Corey Kluber-1, Jameson Taillon-1)...those 15 such outings were the most in Yankees history (previous: 14 in 1963 and 1998)...six different Yankees pitchers recorded at least 10K in a game this season, marking the first time in franchise history six different pitchers have recorded at least 10K in a game in a single season.

- ▶ **LHP Jordan Montgomery** (11K) and **LHP Nestor Cortes** (12K) recorded double-digit strikeout games in back-to-back games from 9/15-16...it marked just the third time in the last 21 seasons that Yankees starters recorded back-to-back double digit strikeout games (AJ Burnett's 12K and CC Sabathia's 10K from 8/27-28/09; CC Sabathia's 10K and Andy Pettitte's 10K from 8/13-14/09)...*Elias* confirmed that Montgomery and Cortes were the first pair of Yankees starters to record at least 11K in back-to-back games.

WINNING WAYS: The Yankees won a season-high 13 straight games from 8/14-27, their longest winning streak since a 13-game winning streak from 9/1-12/61...marked just the ninth time in franchise history the Yankees won 13 consecutive games...their 13-game winning streak matches the second-longest by any Major League team over the last four seasons, trailing only St. Louis' 17-game streak from 9/11-29/21 (Oakland also had a 13-game streak from 4/9-24/21).

- ▶ **Yankees pitchers** posted a 2.61 ERA (114.0IP, 33ER) over their winning streak...held opponents to 3R-or-fewer in nine of those 13 games.
- ▶ **Yankees batters** scored at least 5R in 11 of those 13 games.
- ▶ Entered their game on 8/23 at Atlanta with a nine-game winning streak...faced the Braves who also entered the game with a nine-game winning streak...according to *Elias*, it was the third game in Major League history in which both teams entered with at least nine-game winning streaks and the first since 9/7/1901 between the Pirates (10 straight wins) and the Phillies (nine straight wins).

DOING MORE WITH LESS: The Yankees won eight games this season with 4H-or-fewer, their most such wins in franchise history...won 21 games when scoring 3R-or-fewer, matching their most such wins in the last 43 seasons since 1979 (also 21 in 2008 and 2014).

BLANK SPACE: Yankees pitchers recorded 13 shutouts this season, matching the second-most in the AL this season, trailing only Toronto (15)...were their most in a season since 2005 (14)...marked only the fourth time in the last 40 seasons (since 1982) that the Yankees have recorded at least 13 shutouts in a season (14 in 2005, 16 in 1998 and 13 in 1993).

- ▶ Tossed back-to-back shutouts twice this season (also 5/19-20 at Texas and 7/9-10 at Houston)...prior to this season, had accomplished the feat just once in their previous six seasons from 2015-2020 (2G from 5/1-2/18 at Houston).

SWINGING FOR THE FENCES: Yankees batters homered in a season-high 19 straight games from 9/8-28...was the third-longest home run streak in franchise history, trailing only their Major League record 31-game streak (5/26-6/30/19) and a 25-game streak (6/1-G2-29-G2/41)...hit multiple HR in 11 of those 19 games, hitting 41HR in that span...during that streak, 68 of their 99R scored via the HR.

- ▶ Their 19-game HR streak was the second-longest such streak by any Major League team over the last two seasons, trailing only Cleveland's 20-game streak from 8/15-9/6/21.

FOUR LEAF CLOSERS: The Yankees had seven different pitchers record a save this season...marks just the sixth time in franchise history that the Yankees have had at least seven pitchers record a save in a single season: 2016 Yankees (9), 2019 Yankees (8), 2018 Yankees (8), 1980 Yankees (8) and 1979 Yankees (8).

- ▶ **Yankees pitchers** recorded a save in seven straight games from 8/14-19, their longest such streak in franchise history (since saves became an official statistic in 1969) and tied for the longest such streak in Major League history...were the fifth team (sixth time) to accomplish the feat, joining the 2016 Marlins (7SV from 4/24-30/16), 2006 Tigers (7SV from 5/10-18/06), 2003 Dodgers (twice: 7SV from 5/16-23/03 and 6/10-17/03) and 1989 White Sox (7SV from 7/14-22/89).
- ▶ The Yankees had seven different Yankees pitchers earn a save in August (Aroldis Chapman-3, Chad Green-3, Wandy Peralta-3, Jonathan Loáisiga-2, Albert Abreu-1, Zack Britton-1, Lucas Luetge-1)...according to *Elias*, it marks just the fifth time since saves became an official statistic in 1969 that a team had at least seven different pitchers record a save in a month...the Yankees join the 1973 Braves (seven in June), 1979 Dodgers (seven in September), 2019 Rays (seven in July) and 2020 Rays (nine in August).
- ▶ The Yankees won four straight games from 8/14 through Game 1 on 8/17 with four different pitchers recording a save (RHP Albert Abreu on 8/14 at Chicago-AL, LHP Wandy Peralta on 8/15 at Chicago-AL, RHP Chad Green on 8/16 vs. Los Angeles-AL and RHP Jonathan Loáisiga in Game 1 of 8/17 doubleheader vs. Boston)...*Elias* confirmed that since saves became an official statistic in 1969, it marked the second time in franchise history that the Yankees won four consecutive games, each with a different pitcher earning a save (Zack Britton, Luis Cessa, Dellin Betances and David Robertson earned saves in 3R-or-fewer games from 8/24-26/18).
- ▶ With LHP Zack Britton's save on 8/11 at Kansas City, the Yankees had a different pitcher earn a save in five straight wins for the second time in franchise history (Tommy Kahnle, Zack Britton, Luis Cessa, Dellin Betances and David Robertson earned saves in five consecutive wins from 8/21-26/18) - credit: *Elias*.



NEW YORK GIANTS: OFs Aaron Judge and Giancarlo Stanton both homered in the same game 10 times in 2021, with the Yankees going 9-1 in those games... with Judge's 39HR and Stanton's 35HR, it marked the first time the Yankees had two players hit at least 35HR in a single season since 2011 when Curtis Granderson (41HR) and Mark Teixeira (39HR).

FAST AND FURIOUS: Yankees baserunners recorded 435B after the All-Star break, tied for the sixth-most in the Majors... trailed only Cleveland (665B), Kansas City (665B), Oakland (515B), Texas (515B) and Los Angeles-AL (485B)...recorded 435B in their final 71 games of the season (7/18-10/3) after recording 205B in their first 91G of the season (4/1-7/17).

► **INF/OF Tyler Wade** recorded a career-high 175B, the most by a Yankee since 2017 when Brett Gardner recorded 235B and Jacoby Ellsbury recorded 225B... scored a Major League-leading 12R as a pinch runner this season, the most by a Yankee since 1974 (next: Homer Bush-8R in 1998 and Gerald Williams-8R in 1994).

TRIPLE THREAT: The Yankees turned a franchise-record three triple plays this season: 6/20 vs. Oakland in a 2-1 win, 9th inn., Chapman pitching, Sean Murphy batting, 5-4-3, Urshela to LeMahieu to Gittens; 6/17 at Toronto in Buffalo in an 8-4 win, 1st inn., King pitching, Vladimir Guerrero Jr. batting, 1-3-6-2-5-6, King to LeMahieu to Torres to Sánchez to Urshela to Torres; 5/21 vs. Chicago-AL in a 2-1 "walk-off" win, 9th inn., Chapman pitching, Andrew Vaughn batting, 5-4-3, Urshela to Odor to Voit... their triple play on 6/17 at Toronto was the first 1-3-6-2-5-6 triple play in Major League history.

- According to *Elias*, the Yankees are just the eighth team in the Modern Era to turn three triple plays in a single season, joining the 2016 Chicago White Sox (three), 1979 Boston Red Sox (three), 1979 Oakland Athletics (three), 1965 Chicago Cubs (three), 1964 Philadelphia Phillies (three), 1924 Boston Red Sox (three) and 1911 Detroit Tigers (three).
- The Yankees recorded three triple plays this season after recording just three over their previous 52 seasons from 1969-2020 (4/17/14 at Tampa Bay; 4/12/13 vs. Baltimore; and 4/22/10 at Oakland).
- Prior to this season, the Yankees had never turned more than one in a single season (credit: *Elias*).
- The Yankees now have 27 triple plays in franchise history.
- According to the YES Network, with their ninth-inning triple play on 6/20, the Yankees were the first team to turn a triple play to end a game since Philadelphia did so on 8/23/2009 at New York-NL.
- LHP Aroldis Chapman was the pitcher on the mound for two of those triple plays, becoming just the fourth pitcher since 2006 to be on the mound for multiple triple plays in a single season, joining Minnesota's Martín Pérez (two, 2019), Milwaukee's Zach Davies (two, 2016) and Chicago-AL's Mark Buehrle (two, 2006).

IMMACULATE STUFF: The Yankees had two pitchers throw immaculate innings this season: **RHP Michael King**, who threw an immaculate inning in the fourth inning on 6/4 vs. Boston and **RHP Chad Green**, who tossed an immaculate inning in the seventh inning in Game 2 on 7/4 vs. the Mets...according to *Elias*, the Yankees were just the second team (third time) in the last 20 seasons to have two immaculate innings in a single season, joining the 2019 Boston Red Sox (Chris Sale on 5/8/19 and 6/5/19) and the 2017 Boston Red Sox (Craig Kimbrel on 5/11/17 and Rick Porcello on 8/9/17).

- According to *Elias*, the Yankees have had six immaculate innings since 2000...King and Green are joined by Dellin Betances (8/2/17 vs. Detroit), Brandon McCarthy (9/17/14 at Tampa Bay), Iván Nova (5/29/13 vs. the Mets) and A.J. Burnett (6/20/09 at Florida)... Baseball Almanac notes that Ron Guidry (8/7/84-G2 vs. Chicago-AL) and Al Downing (8/11/67-G1 at Cleveland) have also thrown immaculate innings.
- According to STATS, Green was the first pitcher in the Modern Era to toss at least 3.0 perfect innings, notch at least 6K and have an immaculate inning all in the same game.

CALENDAR DAYS: The Yankees went 21-8 during the month of August...marked just the fifth time in the last 37 seasons (since 1985) they have recorded at least 21 wins in a single calendar month...also went 21-9 in August 2019, 21-7 in August 2009, 22-10 in August 1998 and 21-6 in September 1995.

WE WERE ON A BREAK: The Yankees posted a 500-or-better record before the All-Star break for the 25th consecutive season with an All-Star break (1996-2019, '21)...marks the second-longest streak in Major League history behind the Yankees' 32 straight seasons from 1933-64.

► Went 46-27 after the All-Star break...have posted a winning record after the All-Star break in each of the last 28 seasons with an All-Star break (1993-2019, '21), the second-longest such streak in Major League history, behind their own 32-year streak from 1933-64.

SWEEPING SENSATION: The Yankees swept four straight series from 8/16-24: 1G vs. Los Angeles-AL, 3G vs. Boston, 3G vs. Minnesota and 2G at Atlanta...marked the first time they swept four straight series (since they swept five straight series from 9/16-10/2/60 (credit: *Elias*)).

WELCOME TO THE SHOW: The Yankees had six players make their Major League debuts this season: **OF** Ty Amburgey, **RHP** Luis Gil, **INF** Chris Gittens, **RHP** Brody Koerner, **INF** Hoy Park and **RHP** Stephen Ridings.

- **INF Chris Gittens** was the first Yankee to make his Major League debut this season, making his big league debut on 6/5 vs. Boston...the Yankees were the second-to-last team to have a player make his Major League debut this season (Atlanta was the last)...the Yankees' season-opening 58-game stretch without having a player make his Major League debut was the longest since 2002 when Marcus Thames was the first Yankee to make his big league debut in the Yankees' 64th game of the season (6/10/02 vs. Arizona).
- **OF Ty Amburgey** and **INF Hoy Park** made their Major League debuts on 7/16 vs. Boston and **RHP Luis Gil**, **RHP Stephen Ridings** and **RHP Brody Koerner** all made their debuts on 8/3 vs. Baltimore...prior to this season, the Yankees hadn't had multiple players make their Major League debut in the same game since 8/13/16 vs. Tampa Bay when Aaron Judge and Tyler Austin made their Major League debuts.
- With Gil, Ridings and Koerner all making their Major League debuts on the same day, it marked the first time the Yankees had at least three players make their Major League debut in the same game since 9/18/08 vs. Chicago-AL (Francisco Cervelli, Juan Miranda, Humberto Sanchez)...it marked just the second time in Yankees history that the Yankees had three pitchers make their big league debut in the same game (also 9/26/50 vs. Washington-AL - Lew Burdette, Dave Madison, Ernie Nevel). - credit: *Elias*.
- **RHP Luis Gil** recorded a career-opening 18.2 scoreless inning streak from 8/3-9/8...according to *Elias*, was the longest career-opening scoreless streak by a Yankee in franchise history, surpassing Slow Joe Doyle's career-opening 18.0-inning streak from 8/25(G1)-30(G1)/1906...according to *Elias*, Gil's career-opening 18.2 scoreless inning streak was the longest career-opening scoreless streak by a Major League pitcher since Carson Smith's 19.1 scoreless inning streak from 9/1/14-5/3/15...according to *Elias*, he was the first Major League pitcher since 1893, which was the first season the mound-to-plate distance was 60 feet 6 inches, to toss at least 4.2 scoreless innings in each of his first three career appearances...*Elias* also confirmed that he was the second pitcher in Major League history to toss 4.2 scoreless innings in each of his first three career starts, joining Philadelphia Phillies' George McQuillan, who did so in his first three career starts in 1907 (made his first career appearance as a reliever)...according to the YES Network, he was the only Major League pitcher since 1901 to not allow a run and record at least 15K through his first three Major League games.



NATIONAL ENQUIRERS: The Yankees went 12-8 (.600) against the National League, facing the NL East clubs... have posted a winning record in 20-of-25 Interleague play season series since the advent of Interleague play in 1997 (20-3-2)...went 6-4 at home and 6-4 on the road.

MILESTONE MAN: Manager Aaron Boone earned his 300th managerial win on 8/14 at Chicago-AL, becoming just the 10th Manager in Yankees history to accomplish the feat...joined Joe McCarthy (1,460-867), Joe Torre (1,173-767), Casey Stengel (1,149-696), Miller Huggins (1,067-719), Ralph Houk (944-806), Joe Girardi (910-710), Billy Martin (556-385), Clark Griffith (419-370) and Buck Showalter (313-268)...accomplished the feat in his 500th game (and decision) as Yankees Manager...was the fifth-fastest Yankees Manager to reach 300 wins in terms of decisions (excludes ties), trailing Ralph Houk (468th decision), Joe McCarthy (469th decision), Casey Stengel (477th decision) and Joe Torre (484th decision).

- ▶ Recorded his 314th managerial win on 9/3 vs. Baltimore, surpassing Buck Showalter (313) for sole possession of ninth place on the Yankees' all-time managerial wins list.

COREYBOOK ENDING: RHP Corey Kluber tossed his first career no-hitter, the 12th no-hitter in franchise history and the 11th during the regular season on 5/19 at Texas... was the 10th Yankees pitcher to accomplish the feat in the regular season, joining David Cone (Perfect Game on 7/18/99 vs. Montreal), David Wells (Perfect Game on 5/17/98 vs. Minnesota), Dwight Gooden (5/14/96 vs. Seattle), Jim Abbott (9/4/93 vs. Cleveland), Dave Righetti (7/4/83 vs. Boston), Allie Reynolds (7/12/51 at Cleveland and 9/28/51 vs. Boston-G1), Monte Pearson (8/27/38 vs. Cleveland-G2), "Sad" Sam Jones (9/4/23 at Philadelphia-AL) and George Mogridge (4/24/1917 at Boston)... additionally, Don Larsen threw a perfect game in Game 5 of the 1956 World Series vs. Brooklyn.

- ▶ Allowed only one baserunner, a one-out, four-pitch walk to Charlie Culberson in the third inning...his one baserunner allowed marked the fewest by a Yankee in a no-hitter that wasn't a perfect game...the previous record was two baserunners held by Monte Pearson (2BB) and "Sad" Sam Jones (1BB, 1ROE).

- ▶ Kluber's no-hitter came a day after the Tigers' Spencer Tumbull threw one...according to ESPN Stats & Info, marks the eighth time in Major League history that no-hitters were thrown one-or-fewer days apart and the first since 6/29/90 when Oakland's Dave Stewart and Los Angeles-NL's Fernando Valenzuela threw them on the same day.

- ▶ At 35 years, 39 days, was the 13th pitcher (17th time) to throw a no-hitter at age 35-or-older and the first since Justin Verlander (36 years, 193 days on 9/1/19 at Toronto)...according to STATS, was the first pitcher to toss his first career no-hitter at age 35-or-older since the Yankees' David Cone on 7/18/99 (36 years, 197 days)... joins Cone as the only two Yankees to accomplish the feat at age 35-or-older.

- ▶ Was the fourth Yankees no-hitter to occur on the road and first since Allie Reynolds on 7/12/51 at Cleveland.

- ▶ Was just the third Yankees no-hitter thrown in a night game, joining Allie Reynolds' on 7/12/51 and Dwight Gooden's on 5/14/1996.

- ▶ His 9K were tied for the third-most by a Yankee in a no-hitter, trailing only David Wells (11K, Perfect Game on 5/17/98) and David Cone (10K, Perfect Game on 7/18/99).

- ▶ Became the third pitcher in Major League history to deliver a no-hitter against a team he had pitched for in the same or previous season, joining Terry Mulholland (8/15/90 vs. San Francisco) and Ray Caldwell (9/10/1919-Game 1 at the Yankees) - credit: Major League Baseball.

LET'S PLAY TWO: The Yankees played three doubleheaders, sweeping their doubleheader vs. Boston on 8/17 and splitting their doubleheaders on 5/27 vs. Toronto and 7/4 vs. the Mets...marked their fewest doubleheaders in a season since 2017 (also three).

MISSING IN ACTION: The Yankees placed 35 different players on the injured list for a total of 49 I.L. stints... accounted for a total of 1,556 player-games missed...10 players made multiple I.L. trips: Voit (4), Britton (3), Andujar (2), Urshela (3), Loaisiga (2), O'Day (2), Odor (2), Peralta (2), Torres (2) and Wilson (2)...utilized the 60-day I.L. 12 times and the COVID-19 injured list 15 times.

COLE TRAIN: In his second year with the Yankees, **RHP Gerrit Cole** went 16-8 with two complete games and a 3.23 ERA (181.1IP, 151H, 69R/65ER, 41BB, 243K, 24HR) in 30 starts...opponents hit .223 (151-for-677, 24HR); LH .216 (63-for-292, 13HR); RH .229 (88-for-385, 11HR)... Ranked third in the Majors in strikeouts (243, second in AL), K/9.0IP (12.06, second in AL) and K/BB (5.93, first in AL), tied for third in wins (16, first in AL) and sixth in WAR among pitchers (5.3 - FanGraphs, second in AL)...ranked second in the AL in WHIP (1.06), third in ERA (3.23) and fifth in BB/9.0IP (2.03).

- ▶ His 243K were the second-most by a Yankee in a single season in club history, trailing only Ron Guidry's 248K in 35GS in 1978.

- ▶ His nine double-digit strikeout games were tied for the most by a Yankee in a single season in franchise history, joining David Cone (nine in 1998)...were the second-most in the Majors this season, trailing only Toronto's Robbie Ray (10).

- ▶ His five games with at least 12K this season were the most in franchise history, surpassing Al Downing's four games in 1963.

- ▶ His six starts this season with at least 10K and OBB were the most by any Yankee in a single season (previous: Mike Mussina - four in 2001)...were tied for the second-most by a pitcher in a single season in Major League history, trailing his own record of seven such games in 2019.

- ▶ His four games with 12K and OBB were the most by a Yankee in a single season in franchise history, surpassing Masahiro Tanaka (three in 2017) and Mike Mussina (three in 2001)...were tied for the most by a pitcher in a season in Major League history (Cole also recorded 4G in 2019, Chris Sale had 4G in 2019 and Roger Clemens had 4G in 1997).

- ▶ Did not allow a run or walk and notched at least 12K in three starts this season, tying the Major League single-season record...joined Pedro Martínez (three in 2000) and Sandy Koufax (three in 1965) as the only three pitchers to record three such games in a season (credit: Elias).

- ▶ His seven games with at least 10K and 1R-or-fewer this season were the most in franchise history (previous: Mike Mussina-5 in 2001, David Cone-5 in 1998 and Ron Guidry-5 in 1978).

- ▶ Recorded at least 7K in 15 consecutive regular season starts from 8/8-G1/20-4/30/21, tied with Pedro Martínez (15GS, 8/19/99-5/12/00) and Nolan Ryan (15GS, 6/25-9/12/89) for the second-longest stretch by a starter in American League history, trailing only Shane Bieber (23GS from 9/20/19-5/16/21).

- ▶ Allowed 2ER-or-fewer in 12 straight regular season starts from 9/5/20-5/12/21...was tied for the longest stretch by a Yankees starting pitcher in franchise history (since ER became an official stat in 1913), joining Whitey Ford's 12-start streak from 8/10-9/28/63 and Chad Green's 12-game stretch as an opener from 6/11/17-8/12/19.

ALL THEY DO IS WIN: **RHP Chad Green** recorded a career-high 10 wins, matching the most wins by a Yankees reliever in the last 31 seasons since 1991 (Alfredo Aceves went 10-1 in 2009)...with **RHP Jonathan Loaisiga's** nine wins this year, it marked the second time in Yankees history two relievers recorded at least nine wins in a single season...Goose Gossage (10-11) and Sparky Lyle (9-3) also accomplished the feat in 1978.



SERIES-LY SPEAKING: The Yankees won 10 straight series from 7/27-8/24...was their longest series winning streak since they won 10 consecutive series from 6/22-7/22-G2/54.

▶ The Yankees went undefeated in 11 straight series from 7/27-8/29...was their longest undefeated series streak since a 12-series streak from 6/11-G1-7/24/19 (8-0-4).

STARRY NIGHT: The Yankees had three All-Stars represent the organization in Denver: **OF Aaron Judge, RHP Gerrit Cole** and **LHP Aroldis Chapman**...marked the seventh straight with an All-Star Game (since 2014) the Yankees have had at least three players selected to the AL squad.

▶ **OF Aaron Judge** was named to his third career All-Star team (also 2017-18)...is one of five position players drafted by the Yankees to make the All-Star team multiple times as a Yankee (also Thurman Munson, Don Mattingly, Derek Jeter and Jorge Posada)...also marked his third fan election...is the fifth Yankees outfielder to win at least three fan elections, joining Hall of Famers Dave Winfield (7), Rickey Henderson (4) and Reggie Jackson (4), as well as Bobby Murcer (3)...started the game in RF and batted cleanup...was the 16th Yankee in franchise history to bat cleanup in the starting lineup of an All-Star Game (33rd time)...was the first since Mark Teixeira in the 2009 Midsummer Classic.

▶ **RHP Gerrit Cole** was named via the player ballot to his fourth career All-Star team (also 2018-19 with Houston, 2015 with Pittsburgh).

▶ **LHP Aroldis Chapman** was named to his seventh career All-Star team (also 2012-15 with Cincinnati and '18-19 with the Yankees) via the player ballot.

WHAT A CATCH: With **C Kyle Higashioka's** 10HR and **C Gary Sánchez's** 23HR this season, it marked the eighth time in franchise history the club has had two catchers (min. 50% G at C) record double-digit home runs in a season...also accomplished the feat in 2018 (Austin Romine/Sánchez), 2016 (Brian McCann/Sánchez), 1994 (Jim Leyritz/Mike Stanley), 1993 (Matt Nokes/Stanley), 1962 (Yogi Berra/Elston Howard), 1961 (Johnny Blanchard/Howard) and 1958 (Berra/Howard).

▶ Yankees catchers combined to hit 32HR at the position, the third-most in the Majors, trailing only Tampa Bay (39HR) and Kansas City (34HR).

SEPTEMBER TO REMEMBER: **OF Aaron Judge** and **DH/OF Giancarlo Stanton** both hit 10HR in September, the most by a Yankee in a single calendar month since Luke Voit hit 11HR in August 2020...it marked the ninth time in franchise history the Yankees have had two players hit double-digit home runs in a single calendar month: Curtis Granderson (10HR) and Mark Teixeira (10HR) in May 2011, Joe Pepitone (10HR) and Mickey Mantle (10HR) in July 1966, Roger Maris (13HR) and Mickey Mantle (14HR) in July 1961, Roger Maris (15HR) and Mickey Mantle (11HR) in June 1961, Roger Maris (14HR) and Mickey Mantle (12HR) in June 1960, Hank Bauer (10HR) and Mickey Mantle (16HR) in May 1956, Lou Gehrig (11HR) and Babe Ruth (10HR) in July 1931 and Lou Gehrig (10HR) and Babe Ruth (15HR) in June 1930.

THE COLE NINE YARDS: **RHP Gerrit Cole** tossed his third career complete-game shutout in the 1-0 win at Houston on 7/10 (also a CGSHO in Game 1 on 9/1/20 vs. Baltimore-7.0IP; CGSHO on 5/4/18 at Arizona-9.0IP)...struck out 12 batters, becoming the first Yankees pitcher to toss a complete-game shutout and notch at least 12K since Mike Mussina on 9/24/02 vs. Tampa Bay (12K).

▶ Was just the fifth Yankees pitcher in the last 39 seasons (since 1983) to toss a complete-game shutout in a 1-0 win, joining CC Sabathia (7/10/11 vs. Tampa Bay), Ted Lilly (6/22/02 at San Diego), Mike Mussina (9/2/01 at Boston) and Shawn Hillegas (7/20/92 at Oakland).

▶ Tossed a career-high 129 pitches, the most by a Yankee since Randy Johnson threw 129 pitches on 7/19/06 vs. Seattle...marked the most by any Major League pitcher since Oakland's Mike Fiers on 5/7/19 vs. Cincinnati.

NEXT MAN UP: **LHP Lucas Luetge** and **LHP Wandy Peralta** both made their first career starts...Peralta made his first start on 8/6 vs. Seattle after making his first 242 career appearances as a reliever...according to *Elias*, he was just the second Yankee in franchise history to start a game after making his first 242 appearances out of the bullpen, joining Mike Stanton who made his first career start on 5/9/99 vs. Seattle after making his first 552 career appearances as a reliever...Luetge made his first career start on 8/11 at Kansas City after making his first 152 career appearances as a reliever...according to *Elias*, he was just the sixth Yankee in franchise history to start a game after making his first 152 appearances out of the bullpen, joining Mike Stanton (first 552G before his first start on 5/9/99 vs. Seattle), Wandy Peralta (first 242G before his first start on 8/6/21 vs. Seattle), Pat Clements (first 193G before his first start on 10/2/88 at Detroit), Mike Armstrong (first 181G before his first start on 9/1/86 at Oakland) and Brian Bruney (first 157G before his first start on 4/9/08 at Kansas City).

TROPHY CASE: The Yankees had two pitchers take home "Pitcher of the Month": **RHP Gerrit Cole** in April and **RHP Jameson Taillon** in July...prior to this season, the Yankees had not had a pitcher win the award since Masahiro Tanaka in May 2014...it marked the first time the Yankees have had two pitchers win the award in a single season since 1999 (RHP Hideki Irabu in July and RHP Mariano Rivera in August).

STRIKE 'EM OUT: **Yankees pitchers** recorded 18K on 4/30 vs. Detroit, tying their franchise record for most strikeouts in a nine-inning game (also 18K on 9/29/17 vs. Toronto, 5/10/15 vs. Baltimore, 7/26/11 vs. Seattle and 6/17/78 vs. California which were all by Ron Guidry, the single-pitcher franchise mark).

TEAM EFFORT: The Yankees used a season-high nine pitchers on 8/6 vs. Seattle, their most in a game since 9/27/19 at Texas (also nine pitchers)...marked just the seventh time in franchise history the Yankees used nine pitchers in a single game...marked their most pitchers used in a non-September contest.

▶ According to STATS, it was the Yankees' first game in franchise history in which no pitcher threw 2.0 innings...the Yankees were also the first team in the Modern Era (since 1900) to win an extra-inning game without any pitcher throwing 2.0 innings.

LONG SHOT: **Yankees batters** hit a season-high-tying 5HR on 9/30 at Toronto despite collecting just 6H...were just the seventh Major League team since 1901 to collect 6H-or-fewer and hit as many home runs...were the first team to do since Pittsburgh on 4/9/14 at Chicago-NL (6H, 5HR)...marked their second such game in franchise history (all five of their hits on 7/15/04 at Detroit went for home runs).

PUTTING THE 'NEW' IN 'NEW YORK': Of the 25* players on the Yankees' 2021 Opening Day active roster, nine were not on the club's 2020 Opening Day active roster — P (8): RHP Luis Cessa, RHP Domingo Germán, RHP Corey Kluber, LHP Lucas Luetge, LHP Jordan Montgomery, RHP Nick Nelson, RHP Darren O'Day, RHP Jameson Taillon; C (0): N/A; INF (0): N/A; OF (1): Jay Bruce.

▶ The Yankees' active Opening Day roster included players from Colombia, the Dominican Republic, México, Nicaragua, the United States and Venezuela... *LHP Aroldis Chapman, a Cuba native, served a two-game suspension and was not replaced on the roster.

VETERAN PRESENCE: The Yankees' 25-man* Opening Day active roster featured four players who entered 2021 with at least 10 years of Major League service time: **OF Jay Bruce** (12 years, 125 days), **RHP Darren O'Day** (12 years, 103 days), **OF Brett Gardner** (12 years, 72 days) and **DH/OF Giancarlo Stanton** (10 years, 118 days)...**LHP Aroldis Chapman** served a two-game suspension, but entered the season with 10 years, 9 days of service.



YOU BE THE JUDGE: To start the season, frontline healthcare and public safety heroes populated the Judge's Chamber...to celebrate the incredible work being done by the vaccination staff at Yankee Stadium, representatives of the various organizations collaborating on the effort were seated in the Judge's Chamber on Opening Day.

ALL EYES ON YES: The YES Network's primetime Yankees games this season averaged 306,000 total viewers, outperforming the primetime schedules of all broadcast and cable networks in the New York DMA during the 2021 season...overall viewership of YES' Yankees games this season was up by seven percent compared to 2019 (290,000 vs. 271,000).

BIGGER THAN BASEBALL: C Kyle Higashioka was named the Yankees' nominee for the 2021 Roberto Clemente Award, his first career nomination...the Roberto Clemente Award is the annual recognition of a Major League player who best represents the game of baseball through extraordinary character, community involvement, philanthropy and positive contributions, both on and off the field...an avid supporter of the MLB Urban Youth Academy in Compton, California — which he is a proud alumni of —Higashioka has dedicated a good deal of his free time ensuring that future Major Leaguers in inner-city neighborhoods have an equal opportunity to thrive as those that grew up in less urban environments...in addition to his work with inner-city youth, he is also a devoted supporter of the Special Operations Warrior Foundation (SOWF), a nonprofit organization dedicated to empowering the families of fallen and severely wounded special operations warriors and children of all medal of honor recipients.

HEART AND HUSTLE:The MLB Players Alumni Association named **OF Aaron Judge** as the Yankees' 2021 Heart and Hustle Award winner...the award honors active players who demonstrate a passion for the game of baseball and best embody the values, spirit and traditions of the game. The overall winner will be announced mid-November on MLB Network.

STEPPING UP: In early February, Yankee Stadium opened its doors to serve as a COVID-19 vaccination site...as of October 27, 2021, almost 100,000 vaccine doses have been administered at the Stadium.

ROAD 2 COOPERSTOWN: On 9/8, Derek Jeter was inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame...in 20 seasons as the Yankees' shortstop (1995-2014), he collected a franchise-record 3,465 hits, good for sixth place on Baseball's all-time list...the five-time World Champion garnered 14 All-Star nominations, five Gold Gloves and five Silver Slugger awards...Jeter, who played more seasons (20) and games (2,747) than any other Yankee, was the longest-tenured Captain in team history, holding the role from June 3, 2003 through the end of his career in 2014...he compiled a .593 regular season winning percentage and retired as Baseball's all-time postseason leader in games (158), hits (200), runs (111) and doubles (32)...his 2,674 games played at shortstop are the second-most in Major League history at the position...Jeter joins Phil Rizzuto as the only Yankees shortstops ever elected into the Hall of Fame.

WELCOME BACK, FANS! The Yankees' season opener on 4/1 vs. Toronto marked the first time the Yankees played in front of their fans at home since 2019 ALCS Game 5 vs. Houston (10/18/19) and the first large-scale Yankee Stadium event that hosted fans since the 2019 Pinstripe Bowl on 12/27/19.

DOWN ON THE FARM: The Yankees' seven minor league affiliates combined to go 388-264 (.595), the second-highest winning percentage by any organization...trailed only the Tampa Bay Rays (411-249, .623).

GRAPEFRUIT JUICE: The Yankees went 14-12-2 in spring training games, finishing with a winning spring record for the fifth straight season...**Yankees pitchers** led the Grapefruit League and were tied for third in the Majors with 279 strikeouts, ranked fourth in the Majors with a 3.90 ERA and were tied for fourth in the Grapefruit League with 14 wins.

► **RHP Deivi García** was named the 2021 James P. Dawson Award winner, presented annually to the top rookie in spring training as voted on by Yankees beat writers.

According to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, the first occurrence in 2000 marked the first dual-venue doubleheader in the Majors since September 7, 1903, when the New York Giants and the Brooklyn Superbas (later called the Dodgers) faced off in Game 1 (Giants 6 - Brooklyn 4) at Washington Park in Brooklyn and Game 2 (Brooklyn 3 - Giants 0) at the Polo Grounds in Manhattan.

Played for or Managed Yankees and Mets

Through the 2021 season, there have been 147 players to appear in at least one game for both the Yankees and Mets. The first was "Marvelous" Marv Throneberry, who broke in with the Yankees (1955, '58-59) before joining the Mets via a May 9, 1962, trade with Baltimore. The only other Yankee to play on the Mets in their inaugural 1962 season was Gene Woodling, who played six seasons in the Bronx from 1949-54, winning World Series championships in each of his first five seasons with the club. He was purchased by the Mets from Washington on June 15, 1962. There have been 34 players who have played on World Series-winning Yankees teams who have also appeared in at least one game for the Mets. Conversely, there have been nine World Series-winning Mets (1969-Swoboda; 1986-Elster, Gooden, Jefferson, Mazzilli, Ojeda, Orosco, Santana and Strawberry) to play for the Yankees at some point in their careers.

History & Records

On August 21, 2022, Paul O'Neill will become the 23rd Yankees player or manager to have his number retired by the club. O'Neill spent the final nine seasons of his 17-year MLB career in the Bronx (1993-2001), winning four World Series in pinstripes (1996, '98-2000) and appearing in a fifth (2001). As a Yankee, he batted .303 with 304 doubles, 185 HR, 858 RBI, a .377 OBP and an .869 OPS. He made four AL All-Star teams (1994-95, '97-98) and claimed the AL batting title in 1994 with a .359 average.

History of the New York Yankees



The Yankees are baseball's most storied franchise. With 27 World Championships and 40 American League pennants, the club stands alone in both categories.

The team's glorious history has surprisingly humble origins at the start of the previous century, when the upstart American League declared itself a Major League following the 1900 season. At that time, the league sought to place a team in New York for the 1901 campaign. But due to the political strength of the National League's New York Giants, the American League instead put a team in Baltimore, calling it the Orioles, with the hope of establishing a team in New York as soon as possible.

Managed by John McGraw, the 1901 Orioles finished 68-65 and failed to draw substantial crowds. The following season, McGraw, uncertain about the club's future, precipitated a midseason release from his contract. He immediately teamed with Giants owner Andrew Freedman and Cincinnati Reds owner John T. Brush, helping them acquire a majority interest in the Orioles. With control of Baltimore's players, the pair of owners decimated the squad, divvying up the players between them. On July 17, 1902, the Baltimore Orioles were left with five players on their roster and were forced to forfeit their game against the St. Louis Browns. The American League quickly stepped in and lent Baltimore players from other teams so they could finish the season.


Prior to the start of the 1903 campaign, the two leagues reached a truce, part of which involved the National League agreeing to allow an American League team in New York City. With the Orioles having been dissolved, saloon owner Frank Farrell and ex-New York chief of police Bill Devery were awarded the right to establish a new franchise in New York for \$18,000.

New York's American League entry was the city's third Major League team, joining the Giants and Brooklyn Dodgers of the National League. The new club played its home games at American League Park, a hastily constructed all-wooden structure at 168th Street and Broadway in Manhattan. Because the site was one of the highest spots in the borough, the team was commonly called the "Hilltoppers" or "Highlanders" and their home field "Hilltop Park." The club played its inaugural game on April 22, 1903, at Washington, losing, 3-1, to the Senators. The next day, they defeated the Senators, 7-2, recording the very first win in franchise history.

Led by future Hall of Famers Jack Chesbro, Clark Griffith and Wee Willie Keeler, the 1903 Highlanders finished with a 72-62 record, 17.0 games out of first place. The club nearly captured the American League pennant in 1904—finishing 1.5 games behind the Boston Americans (later known as the Red Sox)—as Chesbro went 41-12 with a 1.82 ERA in 454.2 innings pitched, setting a modern era (since 1900) record with his win total. That season marked the first of three second-place finishes for the club between 1904 and 1910.

After a devastating fire severely damaged the Polo Grounds in 1911, the Highlanders' owners invited the Giants to share Hilltop Park until their home could be rebuilt. Two years later, the Giants returned the favor and allowed the Highlanders to become tenants in their new, vastly superior facility.

Following the move in 1913, newspapers and the public increasingly referred to the club as the "Yankees," which first appeared in the press in 1904. While no official announcement was ever made to formally establish the team's nickname, 1913 is considered the year that "Yankees" became the team's principal moniker.

From 1911 to 1919, the Yankees won as many as 80 games in a season only twice. However, three key moves—the January 1915 purchase of the ballclub by Colonel Jacob Ruppert and Colonel Tillinghast L’Hommedieu Huston, the 1918 hiring of Manager Miller Huggins by Ruppert (without Huston’s blessing) and the 1919 midseason trade for right-handed pitcher Carl Mays (26 wins in 1920 and 27 wins in 1921)—set the stage for the greatest course-altering transaction in baseball history, when on January 5, 1920, the Yankees completed the purchase of the contract of George Herman “Babe” Ruth from the Boston Red Sox for \$100,000 plus interest along with a reported \$300,000 personal loan against the mortgage on Fenway Park.

Ruth’s impact was immediate. The Yankees won 95 games in 1920, their highest victory total up to that point, then captured their first AL pennant a year later. With the Babe hitting 54 home runs in 1920—more than any other *team* in the American League—Yankees attendance at the Polo Grounds doubled to 1,289,422. In 1921, the Giants, being outdrawn in their own park, asked the Yankees to vacate the Polo Grounds as soon as possible. Now bitter rivals, the two teams squared off in the World Series in 1921 and 1922 with the Giants winning on both occasions.

Though he came up on the wrong end in both Series, Yankees pitcher (and 1969 Hall of Fame inductee) Waite Hoyt allowed just one earned run over 35.0 combined innings over the two Fall Classics. Remarkably, he went 2-2 in his five appearances (four starts), including a 1-0, Series-clinching loss (on an unearned run) in Game 8 of the 1921 best-of-nine championship.

With their departure from the Polo Grounds inevitable, the Yankees’ owners set out to build a ballpark of their own. Designed to be baseball’s first triple-decked structure with an advertised capacity of 70,000, it would be the first baseball facility to be called a “stadium” at its inaugural opening.

The team’s upcoming success was masterminded by business manager and future Hall of Famer Ed Barrow, whose responsibilities from 1921 through 1945 included both player personnel and the club’s finances. He developed a fantastic relationship with Huggins from the outset and brought in Paul Krichell, who not only developed the Yankees scouting department but personally signed Lou Gehrig, Phil Rizzuto and Whitey Ford to their first Yankees contracts.

Construction on the original Yankee Stadium began on May 5, 1922, and in only 284 working days, it was ready for its inaugural game on April 18, 1923, against the Boston Red Sox. An announced crowd of 74,200 fans packed the Stadium for a glimpse of Baseball’s grandest facility while thousands milled around outside after the fire department finally ordered the gates closed. Appropriately, Ruth christened the Stadium with a three-run homer to cap a four-run third inning as the Yankees, behind starter Bob Shawkey, won, 4-1.

Playing in their new stadium, dubbed “The House that Ruth Built” by *New York Telegram* sportswriter Fred Lieb, the Yankees won the American League by 16.0 games in 1923, using just eight pitchers all season. Each of their five starting pitchers—Shawkey, Hoyt, Joe Bush, Sam Jones and Herb Pennock—won at least 16 games. In October, the Stadium hosted the first of 37 World Series at the structure, and the Yankees won the first World Championship in franchise history, defeating their former landlord, the Giants, in six games.

Less than two seasons later, one of the greatest players in franchise history was given his chance to crack the lineup. On June 1, 1925, in a 5-3 loss vs. Washington, Huggins called upon Gehrig, a 21-year-old first baseman with 34 career games to his name, to pinch-hit for light-hitting shortstop Paul “Pee Wee” Wanninger. It would mark the first of 2,130 consecutive games played by the “Iron Horse,” who replaced Wally Pipp as the Yankees’ starting first baseman the very next day. The story of Gehrig replacing Pipp because of a headache is a myth. Pipp, who led the AL in homers in 1916 and 1917 and was an integral part of the Yankees’ World Series clubs from 1921-23, had a poor start to the season, and Manager Miller Huggins wanted to see what the younger, much-heralded Gehrig could do.

After the Yankees suffered a tough loss to the St. Louis Cardinals in the 1926 World Series (which famously ended with Babe Ruth making the final out in Game 7 while trying to steal second base), the Yankees rolled to World Championships in both 1927 and 1928, sweeping the Pittsburgh Pirates and St. Louis Cardinals, respectively. The 1927 club, known as “Murderers’ Row,” is often the yardstick by which team greatness is measured. During that season, Ruth broke his own single-season home run record (previously 59 in 1921) with his 60th on September 30, 1927, off Washington’s Tom Zachary. Gehrig also added 47 homers and 173 RBI.

In his 15 seasons in pinstripes from 1920-34, Ruth helped establish a winning tradition with seven American League pennants and four World Championships. He finished his unparalleled career with 714 home runs (including 49 with

the Red Sox from 1914-19 and six with the Boston Braves in 1935). He also tallied 12 American League home run titles and six RBI crowns, including five seasons with more than 150 RBI. A charter member of Baseball's Hall of Fame, he remains widely regarded as the greatest player of all time.

Throughout Ruth's time in pinstripes, he often overshadowed the soft-spoken, Manhattan-born Gehrig, who posted incredible numbers in his own right. From 1926 through 1938, Gehrig drove in at least 112 runs each season. A player on seven World Championship clubs (1927-28, 1932, 1936-39) and a major contributor to the first six, he finished with a .340 lifetime batting average and 493 career home runs in just 8,001 at-bats. He was the AL's starting first baseman in each of the first five Major League Baseball All-Star Games, and in 1934, became the first of two Yankees in franchise history (also Mickey Mantle in 1956) to win the Triple Crown, hitting .363 with a career-high-tying 49 homers and 166 RBI. He also still holds the American League record for RBI in a single season with 184 in 1931.

After the 1934 season, Ruth's last in New York, the Yankees purchased the contract of a budding star named Joe DiMaggio from the San Francisco Seals of the Pacific Coast League. Two years later, DiMaggio made his debut in pinstripes and helped the Yankees to an incredible string of four consecutive World Championships under Manager Joe McCarthy from 1936 through 1939. The 1930s also produced one of the game's greatest lefty-righty pitching combinations in a future Hall of Famers Lefty Gomez and Red Ruffing. A four-time 20-game winner—including 24-7 in 1932 and 26-5 in 1934—Gomez posted a 6-0 record in five World Series. Ruffing, who was acquired on May 6, 1930, from Boston for outfielder Cedric Durst and \$50,000, had been 39-96 with the Red Sox since his 1924 rookie season. After coming to the Yankees, however, he built his Cooperstown credentials, going 231-124 in pinstripes while posting 20, 20, 21 and 21 wins on the four World Championship clubs from 1936 through 1939. He was also an exceptionally good hitter for a pitcher, totaling 36 career home runs and a .269 lifetime batting average.

From 1931 through part of the 1946 season, the Yankees were led by McCarthy, who compiled a Yankees-record 1,460 wins in his time at the helm. Having also spent time leading the Chicago Cubs (1926-30) and Boston Red Sox (1948-50), he is eighth on the all-time managerial wins list with 2,125 victories. With the Yankees, he reached eight World Series (1932, 1936-39, 1941-43), winning a World Championship in all but one—the 1942 Fall Classic against St. Louis.

Sadly, in 1939, Gehrig was diagnosed with a crippling disease, eventually determined to be amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), and his streak of playing in 2,130 consecutive games came to an end. On May 2, he took himself out of the lineup prior to the Yankees' 22-2 win at Detroit. He never played in a Major League game again.

On July 4 of the same season, the Yankees honored their captain with an emotional Lou Gehrig Appreciation Day at Yankee Stadium, and on Jan. 6, 1940, team president Ed Barrow announced that his No. 4 would become the first-ever retired number in baseball. Gehrig passed away from the effects of ALS on June 2, 1941.


DiMaggio became the pillar of the next generation of Yankees champions. In his 13 seasons in pinstripes (1936-42 and '46-51), DiMaggio made the AL All-Star team every year, and his club played in the World Series in all but three years (1940, '46, '48), winning nine World Series titles. Along the way, he tallied three AL MVP Awards (1939, '41, '47) and batted .325 over his career, marking the third-highest average in franchise history. The legendary "Yankee Clipper" compiled one of the game's most remarkable records in 1941, when he hit safely in an all-time-best 56 consecutive games.

DiMaggio's retirement after the 1951 season at the age of 37 was made easier by the emergence of Mickey Mantle, who played side-by-side with DiMaggio in the outfield in the Yankee Clipper's final campaign. With contributions from future Hall of Famers Yogi Berra, Whitey Ford and Phil Rizzuto, the Yankees were nearly unstoppable from the late 1940s through the early 1960s. Manager Casey Stengel sublimely handled the Yankees juggernaut following his surprising appointment prior to the 1949 season, as the club marched to an all-time record five consecutive World Series titles from 1949 through 1953.

His emphasis on platooning players (often to their chagrin) allowed him to exploit matchups in a way not emphasized at that time. Nicknamed "The Old Perffessor," with a vernacular called "Stengese," he remains one of the most colorful personalities in the game's history.

In 12 seasons as manager of the Yankees, Stengel brought his club to the World Series 10 times, winning on seven occasions (also 1956 and 1958).

His staff during the remarkable five-year run of championships was anchored by a trio of starters who each pitched eight seasons with the Yankees and combined for 10 All-Star appearances while with the club. Allie Reynolds, known as "Superchief," went 131-60 with a 3.31 ERA in 295 games (209 starts) from 1947-54, after being acquired from Cleveland in exchange for fellow Hall of Famer Joe Gordon. Reynolds also finished 70 regular season games for the Yankees in an era before the save was an official statistic. The No. 2 starter, Vic Raschi, broke into the Majors at age 27 and didn't become a full member of the Yankees rotation until the second half of the 1947 season. He won exactly 21 games in each of three consecutive years from 1949-51 and tallied a .706 winning percentage (120-50) and 3.47 ERA with

the club from 1946-1953. The least-heralded of the three, "Steady" Eddie Lopat, went 113-59 with a 3.19 ERA with the Yankees from 1948-1955, including an AL-leading 2.43 ERA in 1953.

For all of the great players of the 1950s and early 60s, Mantle overshadowed everyone. He would achieve greatness despite suffering from osteomyelitis (a painful inflammatory bone disease) and numerous other injuries. A powerful switch-hitter, he belted 536 home runs, collected 2,415 hits and batted .300 or higher 10 times in an 18-year career. In his first 14 seasons in pinstripes (1951-64), the Yankees missed the World Series only twice (1954 and 1959) and won the Fall Classic seven times. With his .353 batting average, 52 homers and 130 RBI in 1956, he remains the last Yankees player to win the Triple Crown.

Ford, who played his whole career in pinstripes, is the Yankees' all-time wins leader. Known as the "Chairman of the Board," he posted a lifetime record of 236-106 (.690), giving him the second-best career winning pct. of any pitcher with 100-or-more decisions who started his career in the modern era (since 1900), trailing only career-Yankee Spud Chandler (.717, 109-43, from 1937-47). Ford, the 1961 Cy Young Award winner, paced the AL in victories three times and in ERA and shutouts twice. The diminutive, New York City native still holds many World Series records, including those for wins (10), consecutive scoreless innings (33.0) and strikeouts (94).

The heart of the Yankees for 18 seasons, Berra played on 14 pennant winners and 10 World Championship teams—a record number for any individual player in MLB history. He is one of only 10 players in Major League history to win three MVP Awards and was selected to the All-Star team in every season from 1948 through 1962. Incredibly, he led the Yankees in RBI every season from 1949-55, had more career 100-RBI seasons (five) than Mantle (four), and hit at least 20 homers in 11 different seasons. Known as much for his quotes ("It ain't over 'til it's over" and "I really didn't say everything I said," etc.) as he is for his accomplishments on the field, he remains one of the most beloved players to ever play the game.

Elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1994, Rizzuto was a defensive-minded shortstop who played on 10 pennant winners and eight World Series championship teams from 1941 through 1956, capturing the league's MVP award in 1950 with a .324 batting average and 125 runs scored. Following his playing career, he became a longtime Yankees broadcaster, known for punctuating big moments with his signature phrase, "Holy cow!"

However, not every notable Yankee was a future Hall of Famer. In Game 5 of the 1956 World Series vs. Brooklyn, right-hander Don Larsen authored baseball's greatest pitching performance, retiring all 27 Dodgers batters for the only perfect game in World Series history.

The Yankees opened the 1960s winning pennants in the first five seasons (1960-64) and World Series titles in 1961 and 1962. Incredibly, in the 29 seasons from 1936 to 1964, the Yankees won 22 pennants and 16 World Championships. The 1961 club is still regarded as one of the best teams in baseball history. With Mantle and Roger Maris embroiled in a season-long race to break Ruth's single-season home run record, the Yankees rolled to 109 wins en route to a World Championship. Maris broke Ruth's record when he belted his 61st home run on October 1 off Boston's Tracy Stallard at Yankee Stadium in the last game of the season.

Age finally caught up with the ballclub after a seven-game Series loss to the St. Louis Cardinals in 1964. The Yankees finished above fourth place just once in the next nine seasons, bottoming out in 1966 with the club's first last-place finish since 1912.

The team's fall from grace ended on January 3, 1973, when it was sold by CBS to a group headed by George M. Steinbrenner III. With the addition of Catfish Hunter (baseball's first marquee free agent), shrewd trades that brought Ed Figueroa, Mickey Rivers, Chris Chambliss and Willie Randolph to the club, and a strong nucleus that included Thurman Munson, Graig Nettles, Roy White and Sparky Lyle, the Yankees returned to the postseason in 1976, ending an 11-year drought (1965-1975) by winning their first American League East title. Then on October 14, 1976, in the deciding Game 5 of the American League Championship Series vs. Kansas City, Chambliss launched a ninth-inning, pennant-winning home run to put the Yankees back in the World Series.

This newfound success took place in a remodeled Yankee Stadium after the club played the 1974 and 1975 seasons in Shea Stadium while vast improvements were made to the original facility (for more details, see "History of Original Yankee Stadium").

After a disheartening four-game sweep by the Cincinnati Reds in the 1976 World Series, the Yankees introduced Reggie Jackson—the most prolific slugger of his era—as the club’s newest free-agent acquisition. Jackson capped an exciting 1977 season with one of baseball’s greatest individual batting performances. In the World Series-clinching win vs. Los Angeles in Game 6 at Yankee Stadium, “Mr. October” belted three home runs on three swings of the bat to join Babe Ruth (and now Albert Pujols and Pablo Sandoval) as the only players to hit three home runs in a single World Series game.

In 1978, the Yankees overcame a 14.0-game deficit in the American League East to force a one-game playoff with Boston at Fenway Park to decide the division. Shortstop Bucky Dent erased a 2-0, seventh-inning Red Sox lead with a dramatic three-run homer, and the Yankees went on to win, 5-4. The Yankees then defeated Kansas City for the third straight year in the ALCS, and took care of the Dodgers in six games for their first back-to-back World Series titles since 1961-62.

The 1978 season also saw Ron Guidry compile one of the most dominating pitching seasons in baseball history. On the way to earning his nickname of “Louisiana Lightning,” Guidry went 25-3 with a 1.74 ERA, winning the AL Cy Young Award in unanimous fashion and setting franchise records with 248 strikeouts and nine shutouts. On June 17 that season, Guidry set the single-game club record for strikeouts, fanning 18 California Angels at Yankee Stadium in a game that established the Stadium tradition of fans applauding for a strikeout once a Yankee pitcher reaches two strikes. A five-time Gold Glove Award winner and four-time American League All-Star, Guidry also racked up 20-win seasons in 1983 (21-9) and 1985 (22-6).

Sadly, the 1970s ended with tragedy. Thurman Munson, the 1976 AL MVP and the Yankees’ first captain since Gehrig, was killed when the private jet he was piloting crashed on August 2, 1979, at Akron-Canton Airport in Ohio. Only 32 years old at the time of his death, Munson was the undisputed leader of the Yankees teams that won three consecutive pennants and two World Championships. After the captain’s death, the Yankees would make only one World Series appearance (1981) over the 16-year stretch from 1979-95 despite compiling the best record in the Majors during the 1980s.

During this period, Don Mattingly became one of the most popular players in franchise history, batting .307 in a 14-year career (1982-95) played entirely in pinstripes. He compiled an incredible six-year stretch from 1984 through 1989, in which he batted .327 and topped 100 RBI five times, including a career-high 145

in 1985, when he captured the AL MVP Award. A year earlier, he outdueled teammate Dave Winfield for the 1984 AL batting crown (.343 to .340), going 4-for-5 on the final day of the season. Mattingly’s performance and loyalty were recognized when he was named Yankees captain from 1991-95.

Winfield, who came to the Yankees as the game’s most sought-after free agent in 1981, compiled Hall of Fame credentials in his nine seasons in pinstripes (1981-88, ’90). With the Yankees, he belted 205 home runs with 818 RBI and won five Gold Glove Awards.

After a 13-year absence (1982-94), the Yankees returned to postseason play in 1995 as the American League’s first-ever “Wild Card” entry. A heart-wrenching five-game loss to the Seattle Mariners in the Division Series marked the start of a 13-year run of postseason appearances (1995-2007) — a record topped only by the Atlanta Braves’ 14-season streak (1991-93, 1995-2005).

In 1996 under new skipper Joe Torre, the Yankees returned to the World Series against Atlanta, coming back from an 0-2 deficit to win four straight games, including Games 3, 4 and 5 on the road. Following a Division Series exit in 1997, the Yankees won three straight World titles from 1998 through 2000, giving them four championships in five years. Their 114 regular season victories in 1998 shattered the 44-year-old AL mark of 111 wins set by the 1954 Cleveland Indians (since broken by Seattle in 2001) and their 125 total victories, including 11 postseason wins, remains the highest single-season total in baseball history.

Beginning in the early 90s, the Yankees made a concerted effort to draft and cultivate homegrown talent such as Bernie Williams, Derek Jeter, Andy Pettitte, Jorge Posada and Mariano Rivera. In addition, trades and free-agent acquisitions brought All-Stars such as Wade Boggs, Scott Brosius, David Cone, Jimmy Key and Tino Martinez to the Bronx. Another of those players, Paul O’Neill, acquired in a November 3, 1992, trade with Cincinnati, became adored by Yankees fans for his intense and gritty approach and was given the nickname “warrior.” Winner of the 1994 batting title (.359), he was a key part of the club’s turn-of-the-century success.

In 2001, the Yankees fell just shy of becoming the second team in history to win four consecutive World Series titles, but they nevertheless captured the hearts of the nation in the aftermath of the terrorist attacks of September 11. The Yankees dropped the first two games of the Series at the Arizona Diamondbacks’ Bank One Ballpark but rallied to win the next three at Yankee Stadium behind dramatic ninth-inning comebacks in Games 4 and 5. On consecutive nights, Martinez and Brosius erased two-run, ninth-inning Diamondbacks leads with home runs, and the Yankees won both games in extra innings. It was in Game 4 that Jeter earned his “Mr. November” nickname with a 10th-inning “walk-off” home run. The victories marked the first time in World Series history that a team won two games in the same Series when trailing by at least two runs in the ninth inning.

No one embodies the Yankees’ success since 1996 more than Jeter, who was a rookie on that squad. He played his franchise-record 20th and final season with the Yankees in 2014, retiring with a personal career winning percentage of .593 (1,628-1,117-2) and five World Series rings. He is sixth in baseball history with 3,465 career hits and tops the Yankees’ all-time list in hits, games played (2,747), doubles (544), stolen bases (358), at-bats (11,195), singles (2,595) and hit-by-pitches (170). Jeter also recorded eight 200-hit seasons and is

one of two players in franchise history along with Gehrig (eight) with as many as four. In fact, according to the *Elias Sports Bureau*, no other player in Baseball history has had as more than four 200-hit seasons while playing at least 100 games at shortstop per year. Jeter capped his farewell season with a dramatic “walk-off” RBI-single in his final career game at Yankee Stadium and another RBI-single in his final career at-bat three days later at Boston’s Fenway Park.

Posada and Rivera also crafted special places for themselves in the annals of the franchise. Posada, a 24th-round selection in the 1990 First-Year Player Draft, hit at least 20 home runs in eight different seasons. Known for his toughness and durability, the Puerto Rico-born backstop started at least 120 games in eight consecutive seasons from 2000-07, and retired after the 2011 season having never worn another uniform.

Rivera, who retired at the conclusion of the 2013 season with 652 career saves, became Baseball’s all-time saves leader in 2011, surpassing Trevor Hoffman (601). His reputation was cemented by postseason excellence, which included an 8-1 record and 0.70 ERA in 96 career postseason games (141.0 innings pitched) and an all-time record 33.1 consecutive scoreless postseason innings. His Major League-leading 42 career postseason saves are more than the second and third place totals combined (37). Additionally, his 2.21 career ERA is the lowest all time among pitchers with at least 1,000.0IP since ERA was made an official statistic in 1912 in the NL and 1913 in the AL.

In 2004, the organization acquired Alex Rodríguez in a trade with Texas. After his arrival in the Bronx, the 14-time All-Star transitioned to a new position at third base and was named AL MVP in 2005 and 2007, while becoming the seventh—and youngest—player in Baseball history to reach the 600-home run plateau in 2010.

The original Yankee Stadium took its curtain call in 2008, which was also the first of 10 seasons under manager Joe Girardi. Full of nostalgia and notable events, 2008 featured the third Papal Mass in Stadium history on April 20 and a 15-inning, 4-3 American League victory in the All-Star Game on July 15. Though the Yankees played their last-ever home game in the original Stadium on September 21, 2008, defeating the Baltimore Orioles, 7-3, the drama of the season didn’t end until its final day as Mike Mussina earned a win in the first game of a doubleheader over Boston at Fenway Park to become the oldest first-time 20-game winner in Baseball history.

The following season was storybook material as the club finished the inaugural season in the newly-constructed Yankee Stadium with the best regular season record in the Majors (103-59) and a 2009 World Series win over the Phillies in six games. Free-agent acquisitions CC Sabathia (19 wins) and Mark Teixeira

(second in AL MVP voting, 39HR, 122RBI) each played major roles in the club’s success.

The joy, however, was shortlived as the franchise mourned the losses of Principal Owner George M. Steinbrenner III and longtime public address announcer Bob Sheppard in the summer of 2010.


More recently, the challenging, COVID-affected 2020 season saw DJ LeMahieu (.364 BA) and Luke Voit (22 HR) lead the Majors in those categories, becoming the first Yankees to lead all players in those stats since Mickey Mantle (.353 BA in 1956) and Alex Rodríguez (54HR in 2007).

Going forward, the club looks to build on recent postseason appearances (including 23 in the last 27 seasons since 1995). Manager Aaron Boone won 100 and 103 games in his first two years at the helm in 2018 and 2019, and has a .601 winning percentage through his first four seasons in the dugout.

Additionally, he has a roster infused with young talent, including Aaron Judge, Luis Severino, Gleyber Torres, along with stars Gerrit Cole, Giancarlo Stanton and LeMahieu, among many others.

Judge has been a cornerstone of the Yankees’ recent stretch of five straight postseason appearances, winning the 2017 AL Rookie of the Year Award with a then-all-time rookie record of 52 home runs, along with 114 RBI and a 1.049 OPS. Heading into 2022, his 158 career home runs in 572 career Major League games is the second-most all time in as many games, trailing only Ryan Howard (177HR). In 2021, Judge was voted to the All-MLB first team.

The organization will continue to look to the future with a commitment to complementing player development with shrewd acquisitions to bring a 28th championship to the Bronx. 🍷

The home uniform remains the Yankees' signature look. With the exception of minor alterations—including bolder pinstripes in the 1940s—it has remained mostly unchanged for more than 70 years. The most-recent team-specific tweak to either Yankees uniform set was the switch from glossy to matte road helmets prior to the 2016 season.

In keeping with the team's reverence of tradition, the Yankees have worn "alternate" uniforms just three times in their history. On June 8, 1996, at Detroit, the team wore replica uniforms of the Negro National League's New York Black Yankees; on April 20, 2012, in Boston (on the 100th anniversary of the first game at Fenway Park), the Yankees wore polyester reproductions of their 1912 ensemble; and on August 12, 2021, the Yankees wore retro-inspired away uniforms for the

When the Yankees (then "Highlanders") first took the field for their inaugural season in 1903, their uniforms did not resemble the iconic style for which they are known today. A large ornate "N" decorated one breast and a large ornate "Y" the other. Two years later for the 1905 season, the "N" and "Y" were merged side by side into a monogram on the left breast, creating a forerunner of the now legendary emblem.

It wasn't until 1909 that the most recognizable insignia in sports—the interlocking "NY"—made its first appearance on the caps and left sleeves of Highlanders uniforms. It is thought that the design was inspired by a similar one created in 1877 by Tiffany & Co. for a medal to be given by the New York City Police Department to Officer John McDowell, a policeman shot in the line of duty. Perhaps because one of the club's owners, Bill Devery, was a former New York City police chief, the design was adopted by the organization. The familiar "NY" eventually migrated from the left sleeve to the left breast of home uniforms from 1912-15, albeit in a larger version than is currently worn today.

In 1912, their final season at Hilltop Park, the Yankees (as they were frequently called by then) made a fashionable debut at their April 11 home opener by wearing pinstripes for the first time in their history. The club was not the first team to wear pinstripes (eight of baseball's other 15 teams had already worn them at some point), and they would actually abandon the look in the following two seasons (1913-14). By 1915, though, home pinstripes were back for good.

In 1916, the Yankees removed the "NY" monogram from the jersey and went with a plain, pinstripes-only look. The "NY" remained off the uniform—except for the cap—for the next 20 years until it was reinstated in 1936. Babe Ruth, whose Yankees career spanned 1920-34, played his entire Yankees career without ever wearing the club's now-legendary insignia on his jersey.

The Yankees utilized numerous cap designs from 1903 until 1921—including pinstripes in 1915, '16, '19 and '21—until they finally settled on a solid navy cap with the interlocking "NY" insignia in 1922.

The club's road uniforms have remained relatively unchanged since 1918—solid grey with "NEW YORK" in block letters across the chest. The notable exception was from 1927-30, when "NEW YORK" was replaced by "YANKEES." In 1973, with the introduction of more breathable double-knit uniforms, Yankees road jerseys added navy-and-white

banding trim to the cuffs of the sleeves as well as white shadowing behind the jersey lettering. The home uniform remains the Yankees' signature look. With the exception of minor alterations—including bolder pinstripes in the 1940s—it has remained mostly unchanged for more than 70 years. The most-recent team-specific tweak to either Yankees uniform set was the switch from glossy to matte road helmets prior to the 2016 season. In keeping with the team's reverence of tradition, the Yankees have worn "alternate" uniforms just three times in their history. On June 8, 1996, at Detroit, the team wore replica uniforms of the Negro National League's New York Black Yankees; on April 20, 2012, in Boston (on the 100th anniversary of the first game at Fenway Park), the Yankees wore polyester reproductions of their 1912 ensemble; and on August 12, 2021, the Yankees wore retro-inspired away uniforms for the "Field of Dreams" game against the White Sox in Iowa. Additionally, on three occasions, the Yankees have worn their batting practice caps during regular season games (Aug. 9, 2013, and May 12 and 14, 2014).

In recent years, the Yankees have also participated in other MLB-wide initiatives relating to various holidays, including camouflage and American-flag inspired elements on Memorial Day and Independence Day, and pink and baby blue elements on Mother's Day (to recognize breast cancer awareness) and Father's Day (for prostate cancer awareness).

More recently, the Yankees joined all MLB clubs in wearing special "Players Weekend" jerseys from 2017-19. These jerseys included individualized nicknames on the back, marking the only times the Yankees have had last names or nicknames on the backs of their jerseys.

Additionally in 2017, the Yankees joined all MLB clubs in adding a New Era logo on the left side of their caps. In 2020, the club joined all other Major League teams with a Nike logo on the front of their jerseys. ⚡

Origin of Numbered Uniforms

Numbers first appeared on Major League uniforms on June 26, 1916, when the Cleveland Indians wore large numerals on their left sleeves in an experiment that lasted just a few weeks. Another brief trial by Cleveland the next season and a similar sleeve trial by the St. Louis Cardinals in 1923 both proved temporary. It wasn't until the 1929 season that another attempt was made, as both Cleveland and the Yankees began their seasons with numbers as a permanent part of their respective uniforms. Though the Yankees are typically credited as being the team with the longest-standing such policy, it should be noted that the Indians began their season two days earlier than the Bombers, as the Yankees' April 16 Opening Day contest was rained out.

The initial distribution of numbers to the Yankees roster was made according to the player's respective position in the batting order. Therefore, in 1929, leadoff hitter Earle Combs wore No. 1, Mark Koenig No. 2, Babe Ruth No. 3, Lou Gehrig No. 4, Bob Meusel No. 5, Tony Lazzeri No. 6, Leo Durocher No. 7, Johnny Grabowski No. 8, Benny Bengough No. 9 and Bill Dickey No. 10 (Grabowski, Bengough and Dickey shared the catching duties). By the mid-1930s, other teams adopted the idea, and uniform numbers became standard for all teams. ❧

Top Hat Logo Design

Though not appearing on the uniform, the Yankees "top hat" logo is one of the most identifiable in sports. It was created by well-known, longtime graphic artist Henry Alonzo "Lon" Keller after a commission from then-Yankees co-owner Larry MacPhail. An initial version consisting solely of the Yankees script with a top hat above the "k" first appeared on the cover of the 1946 spring training roster. MacPhail, however, asked Keller to further develop his work. The designer's more elaborate design debuted during the 1946 season and remains largely unchanged to the present day. (Information regarding Keller's contribution was taken from articles in the 1976 Yankees scorecard and the Aug. 22, 1995, edition of *Yankees Magazine*.) ❧



Origin of the Names "Highlanders" and "Yankees"

In the early 1900s, fans, the media and front office personnel did not see club nicknames as the defining elements they are today. People thought of clubs by the city they represented and the league in which they played. Anything beyond that was the work of clever newspapermen trying to freshen up the references to teams in their stories.

Much of the logo- and nickname-oriented merchandise items we have today, such as caps, T-shirts or jerseys simply didn't exist a century ago when games weren't televised and men uniformly wore jackets and ties to the park.

When the Yankees franchise was launched in New York prior to the 1903 season, the enmity between the upstart American League (about to enter its third season) and the long-established National League was just beginning to ebb. It was commonplace for clubs and the media to refer to AL teams as "Americans" and NL clubs as "Nationals," especially as half of the cities with Major League Baseball at the time

had teams in both leagues (Boston, Chicago, New York, Philadelphia and St. Louis). This terminology frequently served to differentiate the New York AL team from the two longstanding NL clubs—the Brooklyn Superbas (as the Dodgers were then known) and the New York Giants—with whom they were now battling for fans.

The club's first home in New York was a rickety wooden structure often referred to as "American League Park." It was located on 168th St. and Broadway, one of the highest spots in Manhattan. As a result, the team became known as the "Hilltoppers" and their field "Hilltop Park."

The name "Highlanders," as the team of that era is most popularly remembered today, also started in the club's formative years. It originated not only as a nod to their elevated Manhattan perch, but also as a reference to club president Joseph W. Gordon, whose last name conjured up thoughts of the famous Scottish army unit, the Gordon Highlanders.

Other nicknames for the team were the "Greater New Yorks" and "Griffiths," the latter of which was a reference to Clark Griffith, who managed the club from 1903-08.

As early as 1904, however, the name "Yankees" became common in the press. The earliest known use was in an April 7, 1904, article in the *New York Evening Journal* that bore the headline "YANKEES WILL START HOME FROM SOUTH TODAY," which was published following a successful spring training. A week later, the same newspaper's coverage of Opening Day was headlined "YANKEES BEAT BOSTON," and the term also appeared in the article's lead sentence.

The name "Yankees" likely owes its success to newspaper typesetters and editors grateful for a team nickname with fewer letters than "Highlanders" or "Hilltoppers."

When the franchise moved from Hilltop Park to the low-lying Polo Grounds in 1913, the media and public dropped the other nicknames (which were no longer fitting) in favor of "Yankees." ❧



Patches & Armbands on the Yankees Uniform

Over the Yankees' history, temporary patches and armbands have been worn to commemorate special occasions and mourn losses in the Yankees family. The list below represents the most thorough compilation of such additions. Annual alterations such as Major League Baseball's Mothers' Day and Fathers' Day ribbons, or permanent additions such as MLB logo patches on the backs of caps and jerseys or the Nike swoosh on the fronts of jerseys in 2020 are not included in the list below.

Important Dates in Yankees History

Jan. 9, 1903 - Frank Farrell and Bill Devery purchase the right to establish a new AL franchise in New York City for \$18,000.

March 12, 1903 - The New York franchise is approved as a member of the American League. The team will play in a hastily constructed, wooden ballpark at 168th Street and Broadway. Because the site is one of the highest spots in Manhattan, their home field is referred to as "Hilltop Park."

Apr. 22, 1903 - The Highlanders (as the Yankees were commonly known then) play their first game, a 3-1 loss at Washington.

Apr. 23, 1903 - Pitcher Harry Howell records the first victory in franchise history, a 7-2 win at Washington.

Apr. 30, 1903 - The Highlanders notch a 6-2 win vs. Washington in their inaugural home opener at Hilltop Park.

May 11, 1903 - John Ganzel hits the first home run in franchise history - an inside-the-park homer at Detroit's Bennett Park off George Mullin in an 8-2 Highlanders victory.

Apr. 29, 1906 - At Hilltop Park, the Highlanders and A's raise \$5,600 to benefit victims of the San Francisco earthquake and fire.

Apr. 11, 1912 - Pinstripes first appear on Highlanders uniforms.

Apr. 21, 1912 - At the Polo Grounds, the Highlanders and Giants stage a benefit game for survivors of the Titanic. The Giants win, 11-2, as \$9,425.25 is raised.

May 3, 1912 - The Highlanders lose at Philadelphia, 18-15. The 33 combined runs tie for the highest total in franchise history (also 5/22/30-G2 and 6/3/32, each in 20-13 Yankees wins at the A's).

Apr. 1913 - The name "Yankees" becomes the predominant nickname of the club after the team moves to the Polo Grounds, home of the National League's New York Giants.

Apr. 5, 1913 - The Yankees play an exhibition game against the Dodgers, losing, 3-2, in the first-ever game at Ebbets Field.

Apr. 17, 1913 - The Yankees play their first home game at the Polo Grounds, losing to Washington, 9-3. It marks the beginning of 10 seasons as tenants of the National League's New York Giants.

Jan. 11, 1915 - Col. Jacob Ruppert and Col. Tillinghast L'Hommedieu Huston agree to purchase the Yankees for \$460,000. The deal is formally completed on Jan. 30.

Apr. 24, 1917 - Lefthander George Mogridge becomes the first Yankee to throw a no-hitter in a 2-1 win at Fenway Park.

Apr. 3, 1919 - In a spaghetti-eating contest during spring training in Jacksonville, Fla., Yankees outfielder Ping Bodie defeats an ostrich named Percy, after Percy passes out following his 11th plate of pasta (credit: SABR Biography Project).

Jan. 5, 1920 - After being announced two days earlier, the Yankees complete the purchase of the contract of Babe Ruth from the Boston Red Sox for \$100,000 plus interest and a \$300,000 loan against the mortgage on Fenway Park.

May 1, 1920 - Babe Ruth hits his first homer as a Yankee in a 6-0 win over the Red Sox at the Polo Grounds.

Feb. 5, 1921 - The Yankees issue a press release announcing the purchase of 10 acres of land in the West Bronx that will eventually become the site of the original Yankee Stadium. The land was purchased from the estate of William Waldorf Astor for \$675,000.

Oct. 5, 1921 - The Yankees play the first postseason game in franchise history, as Carl Mays tosses a complete game shutout to defeat the Giants at the Polo Grounds in World Series Game 1.

May 5, 1922 - The construction contract for Yankee Stadium is awarded to White Construction Company with the edict that the job is to be completed "at a definite price" of \$2.5 million by Opening Day 1923.

Apr. 18, 1923 - Yankee Stadium hosts its first regular season game as the Yankees defeat Boston Red Sox, 4-1, before an announced crowd of 74,200. Thousands more fans are turned away when fire marshalls order the gates closed. Babe Ruth hits the Stadium's first home run — a three-run shot in the third inning — and starter Bob Shawkey records a complete-game win.

Apr. 30, 1923 - The Yankees sign 19-year-old Columbia pitcher and position player Lou Gehrig to a professional contract.

May 21, 1923 - Yankees announce that Col. Ruppert buys out Col. Huston for \$1.5 million to become sole owner of the Yankees.

Sept. 28, 1923 - The Yankees record 30 hits in a 24-4 win over Boston at Fenway Park. The hit total remains the most in a nine-inning game in franchise history.

Oct. 15, 1923 - The Yankees defeat the New York Giants, 6-4, at the Polo Grounds in Game 6 of the World Series, clinching the first World Championship in franchise history.

June 1, 1925 - Lou Gehrig begins his record streak of 2,130 consecutive games played, pinch-hitting for "Pee Wee" Wanninger in a 5-3 loss to Washington at Yankee Stadium.

Oct. 6, 1926 - Babe Ruth becomes the first player to hit three home runs in a single World Series game in Game 4 at St. Louis.

June 23, 1927 - In an 11-4 Yankees win at Fenway Park, Lou Gehrig becomes the first player in franchise history to hit 3HR in a single game against the Red Sox.

Sept. 30, 1927 - Babe Ruth breaks his own single-season Major League record by hitting his 60th home run (off Tom Zachary) in a 4-2 win over Washington at Yankee Stadium.

Apr. 20, 1928 - Yankee Stadium's LF stands are enlarged to three decks.

Oct. 9, 1928 - In Game 4 of the World Series vs. the Cardinals at St. Louis' Sportsman's Park, Babe Ruth hits three home runs, marking his second three-homer World Series game.

Apr. 18, 1929 - The Yankees wear numbered uniforms for the first time, two days after the Indians permanently adopt them as well (Numbers would become standard for all teams by 1932).

Sept. 24, 1929 - The Yankees celebrate Babe Ruth Day at Fenway Park defeating Boston, 5-3. Ruth goes 2-for-3 with a double, and Tom Zachary (pitching for the Yankees) records his final decision of the season, improving to 12-0, still a Major League record for most wins in a season without a loss.



Hilltop Park was home to the Yankees from 1903 through 1912.

June 4, 1933 - Starter Johnny Allen allows a first-inning single to Philadelphia's Ed Coleman, then holds the A's hitless the rest of the way, notching a one-hit shutout in a 6-0 home victory in the second game of a doubleheader.

July 6, 1933 - In the very first MLB All-Star Game, Babe Ruth hits the game's first HR—a two-run shot off the Cardinals' Bill Hallahan—leading the AL to a 4-2 victory at Comiskey Park. Lefty Gomez starts for the AL, tossing 3.0 scoreless IP to earn the win. He also records the first All-Star RBI with a second-inning single.

June 6, 1934 - Myril Hoag goes 6-for-6 in a 15-3, nine-inning win in Game 1 of a doubleheader at Boston, becoming the first of only two Yankees to go 6-for-6 in a single game (see June 7, 2008- Johnny Damon).

Nov. 21, 1934 - The Yankees purchase Joe DiMaggio from the San Francisco Seals of the Pacific Coast League for \$25,000 and five players.

May 24, 1936 - The Yankees tally their single-game franchise-high in runs in a 25-2 win at Philadelphia. Tony Lazzeri is the star with three home runs (including two grand slams) and a triple. His 11 RBI set a still-standing AL single-game record.

Apr. 20, 1937 - The Yankees' 15th season at Yankee Stadium opens with the right-field stands enlarged to three decks. Wooden bleachers are replaced by a concrete structure, and the distance to center field drops from 490 feet to 461 feet.

May 30, 1938 - A franchise-record crowd of 81,841 attends a doubleheader sweep of Boston at Yankee Stadium.

June 22, 1938 - In a rematch of their 1936 bout, Joe Louis KO's Max Schmeling in 124 seconds to avenge his prior loss to the German and retain the heavyweight title in front of 70,043 fans at Yankee Stadium and an estimated 70 million people listening on the radio.

Aug. 27, 1938 - Monte Pearson authors the first Yankee Stadium no-hitter by a Yankee, defeating Cleveland, 13-0, in Game 2 of a doubleheader.

Jan. 13, 1939 - Col. Ruppert passes away, and his estate takes ownership of the ballpark.

Apr. 30, 1939 - Lou Gehrig plays in the last of his 2,130 consecutive games, going 0-for-4 in a 3-2 loss vs. Washington at the Stadium.

May 2, 1939 - Lou Gehrig's playing streak of 2,130 consecutive games ends when he does not make an appearance in a 22-2 Yankees win at Detroit. Babe Dahlgren plays first base for the Yankees and contributes a double and a home run.

June 26, 1939 - At Philadelphia's Shibe Park, the Yankees play their first-ever night game, losing to the Athletics, 3-2.

July 4, 1939 - "Lou Gehrig Appreciation Day" is held at Yankee Stadium in between games of a doubleheader vs. Washington. Gehrig makes his famous "luckiest man on the face of the earth" speech.

May 15, 1941 - Joe DiMaggio's 56-game hitting streak begins with a single off Edgar Smith in a 13-1 loss vs. Chicago.

June 2, 1941 - Lou Gehrig dies of amyotrophic lateral sclerosis at the age of 37 in the Riverdale section of the Bronx.

July 2, 1941 - In an 8-4 win vs. Boston, Joe DiMaggio goes 1-for-5 with a two-run home run, extending his hitting streak to 45 games and surpassing Wee Willie Keeler's single-season Major League record 44-game streak set in 1897.

July 17, 1941 - Joe DiMaggio's consecutive-game hitting streak ends at 56 when he goes 0-for-3 in a 4-3 win at Cleveland. Indians 3B Ken Keltner twice robs DiMaggio with great fielding plays. DiMaggio hits safely in his next 16 games, giving him hits in 72 of 73 games.

Aug. 14, 1942 - The Yankees set a still-standing (and since tied) MLB fielding mark with 7DP in an 11-2 win at Philadelphia.

June 26, 1944 - The Yankees, Dodgers and Giants play a three-way exhibition game at the Polo Grounds to promote the purchase of

war bonds. Each team batted six times and played the field six times while a crowd of 50,000 fans bought \$5.5 million in war bonds. Brooklyn wins by a score of 5 to 1 (Yankees) to 0 (Giants).

Jan. 25, 1945 - Dan Topping, Del Webb and Larry MacPhail purchase the Yankees for \$2.8 million from the estate of the late Col. Jacob Ruppert. MacPhail replaces Ed Barrow as President and GM.

May 28, 1946 - The first night game is played at Yankee Stadium, a 2-1 loss vs. Washington before 49,917 fans.

Apr. 27, 1947 - "Babe Ruth Day" is celebrated at Yankee Stadium and throughout Major League Baseball.

June 29 - July 17, 1947 - The Yankees reel off a franchise-record 19 consecutive wins, outscoring their opposition 119-41.

Oct. 3, 1947 - Yankees pitcher Bill Bevens loses his no-hitter and the game with two outs in the bottom of the ninth as pinch-hitter Cookie Lavagetto doubles home two runs in a 3-2 Dodgers win in Game 4 of the World Series at Ebbets Field.

June 13, 1948 - Babe Ruth's uniform No. 3 is retired at Yankee Stadium's 25th Anniversary celebration. The visit marks the Babe's final Stadium appearance.

Aug. 16, 1948 - Babe Ruth dies of throat cancer in at age 53.

Oct. 12, 1948 - The Yankees announce that Casey Stengel will replace Bucky Harris as manager.

Oct. 1-2, 1949 - The Yankees come back from a one-game deficit with two games to play, defeating Boston in the final two games of the season at Yankee Stadium, 5-4 and 5-3, respectively, marking the first of five consecutive American League pennants.

Oct. 5, 1949 - In Game 1 of the World Series at Yankee Stadium, Tommy Henrich breaks up a scoreless pitchers' duel between the Yankees' Allie Reynolds and the Dodgers' Don Newcombe, hitting a game-winning solo HR in the bottom of the ninth.

Sept. 28, 1951 - In an 8-0 Game 1 win in a doubleheader vs. Boston at Yankee Stadium, Allie Reynolds becomes the second of five players in Baseball history to toss two no-hitters in the same season (also Johnny Vander Meer in 1938, Virgil Trucks in 1952, Nolan Ryan in 1973 and Max Scherzer in 2015). Reynolds had previously no-hit the Indians at Cleveland's Municipal Stadium on July 12 in a 1-0 win.

Dec. 11, 1951 - Joe DiMaggio officially announces his retirement.

Oct. 7, 1952 - Second baseman Billy Martin makes a running catch on a two-out, seventh-inning, based-loaded pop-up off the bat of Jackie Robinson to preserve the Yankees' lead in a 4-2 World Series-clinching Game 7 win at Brooklyn's Ebbets Field.

Apr. 17, 1953 - Mickey Mantle clears the LF wall at Washington's Griffith Stadium with a 565-foot home run off Chuck Stobbs in the fifth inning of a 7-3 Yankees win. Yankees PR representative Red Patterson retrieves the ball and reportedly measures off the distance, giving birth to the phrase "tape-measure home run."

Oct. 5, 1953 - Billy Martin singles home the winning run in the ninth inning of a 4-3, Game 6 victory over the Brooklyn Dodgers at Yankee Stadium. The win clinches the Yankees' all-time record fifth-consecutive World Championship.



Elston Howard became the Yankees' first African-American player on Apr. 14, 1955.

May 30, 1956 - Batting against Pedro Ramos in Game 1 of a doubleheader vs. Washington, Mickey Mantle nearly hits a home run out of Yankee Stadium, with the ball striking the upper deck frieze in right field.

Oct. 8, 1956 - Don Larsen hurls the only perfect game in World Series history, a 2-0, Game 5 win over Brooklyn at Yankee Stadium.

Oct. 10, 1956 - In World Series Game 7, Johnny Kucks pitches a 9-0 complete game shutout over Brooklyn at Ebbets Field.

June 15, 1957 - Following the "Copacabana incident," the Yankees trade Billy Martin to Kansas City with Woodie Held, Bob Martyn and Ralph Terry for Ryne Duren, Jim Pisoni and Harry Simpson.

Apr. 22, 1959 - Whitey Ford pitches a 1-0, 14-inning complete game shutout at Washington, allowing seven hits with 15 strikeouts.

May 7, 1959 - The Yankees and Dodgers play an exhibition game before 93,103 fans at the L.A. Coliseum. The game is played to honor paralyzed Dodgers catcher Roy Campanella.

Oct. 8, 1960 - Second baseman Bobby Richardson sets an all-time World Series record (since tied by Hideki Matsui on 11/4/09 vs. PHI, Albert Pujols on 10/22/11 w/ STL at TEX and Addison Russell on 11/1/16 w/ CHC at CLE) with 6RBI in Game 3 of the World Series vs. Pittsburgh, hitting a grand slam in the first inning and two-run single in the fourth inning of a 10-0 Yankees win.

Sept. 26, 1961 - Roger Maris hits his 60th home run of the season off Baltimore's Jack Fisher in a 3-2 Yankees win at Yankee Stadium, tying Babe Ruth's Major League record.

Oct. 1, 1961 - Roger Maris hits his 61st home run in the season's final game off Boston's Tracy Stallard at Yankee Stadium, establishing a then-Major League record and still-standing AL record. It was the only run in a 1-0 Yankees victory. The ball was caught in right field by local teenager Sal Durante.

June 24, 1962 - Jack Reed's two-run, 22nd-inning home run ends the longest game in Yankees history, a 9-7 win at Detroit.

Oct. 16, 1962 - In Game 7 of the World Series, superb fielding from RF Roger Maris holds Matty Alou at third base after a two-out, ninth-inning Willie Mays double. Bobby Richardson then snares a screaming line drive off the bat of Willie McCovey for the game's final out, securing a 1-0, Series-clinching victory over the Giants at Candlestick Park. New York scores the game's only run when Tony Kubek grounds into a fifth-inning double play. It would be the last championship for the Yankees until 1977.

May 22, 1963 - In an 8-7, 11-inning win vs. the Kansas City A's, Mickey Mantle hits the upper deck frieze in right field for the second time in his career, this time off righthander Bill Fischer.

June 20, 1963 - The Yankees lose to the Mets at Yankee Stadium, 6-2, in the first Mayor's Trophy game between the cross-town rivals.

Nov. 2, 1964 - CBS purchases 80 percent of the Yankees for \$11.2 million. The network later buys the remaining 20 percent.

May 14, 1967 - Mickey Mantle becomes only the sixth player—and second Yankee—to reach the 500 home run plateau, when he connects off Baltimore's Stu Miller in a 6-5 win at Yankee Stadium.

Aug. 23, 1968 - The Yankees play the longest tied game in franchise history, matching Detroit, 3-3, in Game 2 of a doubleheader at Yankee Stadium. Yankees pitcher Lindy McDaniel tosses seven perfect innings in relief in the 19-inning affair.

June 8, 1969 - "Mickey Mantle Day" is celebrated at Yankee Stadium and his uniform No. 7 is retired.

June 24, 1970 - Bobby Murcer hits HRs in four consecutive ABs over two games of a doubleheader vs. Cleveland at Yankee Stadium.

Aug. 8, 1972 - The Yankees sign a 30-year lease to play in a remodeled Yankee Stadium with completion scheduled for 1976.

Jan. 3, 1973 - A limited partnership, headed by George M. Steinbrenner III as its managing general partner, purchases the Yankees for a net price of \$8.7 million from CBS.

Apr. 6, 1973 - At Fenway Park in Boston, the Yankees' Ron Blomberg becomes MLB's first designated hitter. Batting in the top of the first inning, he walks with the bases loaded off Luis Tiant. He goes 1-for-3 with 1RBI as the Yankees lose to the Red Sox, 15-5.

Sept. 30, 1973 - The Yankees play their final game in Yankee Stadium before gets remodeled, losing 8-5 vs. Detroit. Tigers pitcher John Hiller gets Yankees first baseman Mike Hegan to fly out to centerfield for the game's final out.

Apr. 6, 1974 - The Yankees begin the first of two seasons at Shea Stadium as Yankee Stadium is remodeled. The Yankees will go 90-69 at Shea over the two seasons (1974-75).

Dec. 31, 1974 - Free agent Catfish Hunter signs a then-record five-year contract with the Yankees.

Aug. 1, 1975 - Billy Martin replaces Bill Virdon for his first of five stints as manager.

Apr. 15, 1976 - Remodeled Yankee Stadium opens with an 11-4 win over Minnesota. The Twins' Dan Ford hits the first home run.


Apr. 17, 1976 - In a 10-0 win, catcher Thurman Munson homers off Minnesota's Jim Hughes, marking the first home run hit by a Yankee in remodeled Yankee Stadium.

Oct. 14, 1976 - Chris Chambliss' ninth-inning home run off Mark Littell in Game 5 of the ALCS vs. Kansas City at Yankee Stadium gives the Yankees their 30th AL pennant and first trip to the World Series since 1964.


Nov. 29, 1976 - Free agent Reggie Jackson signs a five-year contract.

June 30, 1977 - In an 11-5 win at Toronto, the Yankees hit four HRs in a single inning for the first time in franchise history. Cliff Johnson hits 3HR in the game, including two of the Yankees' four in the eighth inning.

Oct. 9, 1977 - The Yankees rally for one run in the eighth and three runs in the ninth for a 5-3, series-clinching win in the decisive Game 5 of the 1977 ALCS at Kansas City. Sparky Lyle earns the win for the second consecutive night, finishing the game with 1.1 scoreless innings on no rest following his scoreless 5.1-inning relief appearance at Kauffman Stadium in Game 4.

Oct. 18, 1977 - Reggie Jackson hits three home runs (on three consecutive pitches) in Game 6 of the World Series vs. the Los Angeles Dodgers at Yankee Stadium. Jackson, Babe Ruth, Albert Pujols and Pablo Sandoval are the only players to hit at least three homers in a single World Series game.

Apr. 13, 1978 - The Yankees defeat the White Sox, 4-2, in the Yankee Stadium opener on "Reggie!" Candy Bar Day. When Jackson slugs a three-run HR in the first inning, the field is showered with the chocolate and peanut candy bars, which were given out free to fans at the game.

June 17, 1978 - Ron Guidry establishes a franchise record by striking out 18 batters in the Yankees' 4-0 win vs. California.

July 24, 1978 - Billy Martin resigns as manager.

July 25, 1978 - Bob Lemon is named manager, replacing Billy Martin.

July 29, 1978 - On Old-Timers' Day, the Yankees announce that Billy Martin will return as Yankees manager in 1980 and Bob Lemon will become general manager (also see June 18, 1979).

Oct. 2, 1978 - The Yankees, 14.0 games behind Boston as late as July 19, defeat the Red Sox, 5-4, at Fenway Park in only the second one-game playoff in AL history. Bucky Dent's three-run, seventh-inning home run becomes one of the most memorable in Baseball history.

June 18, 1979 - Billy Martin is rehired as Yankees manager, replacing Bob Lemon.

Aug. 2, 1979 - Yankees Captain Thurman Munson dies in a plane crash in Canton, Ohio, at age 32. His No. 15 is immediately retired.

Aug. 6, 1979 - After delivering a eulogy at Thurman Munson's funeral earlier that morning in Canton, Ohio, Bobby Murcer hits a three-run seventh-inning homer and a two-run ninth-inning single, accounting for all five of the Yankees' runs in an emotional 5-4 comeback win vs. Baltimore at Yankee Stadium.

Oct. 28, 1979 - Dick Howser replaces Billy Martin as manager.

Dec. 15, 1980 - Free agent Dave Winfield signs a then-record 10-year contract.

Nov. 21, 1980 - Gene Michael replaces Dick Howser as manager.

May 4, 1981 - Yankees reliever Ron Davis enters in the bottom of the seventh of a 4-2 Yankees win at California. After getting Don Baylor to pop out, he strikes out eight consecutive Angels to record the save. The performance ties the AL record for consecutive strikeouts in a single game, previously set by Nolan Ryan (twice) and later tied by Roger Clemens and Blake Stein. Davis remains the all-time MLB leader in consecutive strikeouts in a relief appearance.

Sept. 6, 1981 - Bob Lemon is named manager for a second time, replacing Gene Michael.

Apr. 26, 1982 - Gene Michael becomes manager for a second time, replacing Bob Lemon.

Aug. 3, 1982 - Clyde King replaces Gene Michael as manager.

Jan. 11, 1983 - Billy Martin is named Yankees manager for the third time, replacing Clyde King.

July 4, 1983 - Dave Righetti pitches the sixth regular season no-hitter in franchise history and the first since 1951 in a 4-0 win vs. Boston at Yankee Stadium. Righetti strikes out Wade Boggs for the final out.

July 24, 1983 - The Yankees and Kansas City play the infamous "Pine Tar" game at Yankee Stadium. George Brett hits a two-out, ninth-inning home run off Goose Gossage to give the Royals an apparent 5-4 lead. Manager Billy Martin points out that the pine tar on Brett's bat is above the allowable 18 inches and Brett is subsequently called out for using an illegal bat. The Yankees (temporarily) win 4-3 (see Aug. 18, 1983).

Aug. 18, 1983 - Kansas City's protest is upheld and play is resumed at Yankee Stadium from the point immediately after Brett's home run. Yankees pitcher Ron Guidry plays CF while lefthanded first baseman Don Mattingly plays second base. Royals' reliever Dan Quisenberry retires the Yankees in order in the bottom of the ninth for a 5-4 Royals win.

Dec. 16, 1983 - Yogi Berra is named manager for the second time, replacing Billy Martin.

Apr. 8, 1985 - At 46 yrs., 7 days old, Phil Niekro becomes the oldest Opening Day starter in Yankees franchise history (and third-oldest all time), allowing 5ER in 4.0IP while picking up the loss in a 9-2 Yankees defeat at Boston.

Apr. 28, 1985 - Billy Martin is named manager for a fourth time, replacing Yogi Berra.

Aug. 4, 1985 - The Yankees celebrate "Phil Rizzuto Day" at Yankee Stadium, dedicating a plaque in his honor and retiring his No. 10. The Yankees lose their scheduled game to the Chicago White Sox, 4-1, as Tom Seaver wins his 300th career game.

Oct. 6, 1985 - Phil Niekro tosses a four-hit complete game shutout in an 8-0 victory at Toronto's Exhibition Stadium for his 300th career win.

Oct. 17, 1985 - Lou Piniella is named manager for the first time, replacing Billy Martin.

June 29, 1987 - At Toronto's Exhibition Stadium, the Yankees defeat the Blue Jays, 15-14, behind a pair of grand slams from Don Mattingly and Dave Winfield.

July 18, 1987 - Don Mattingly homers off Texas' Jose Guzman to tie Dale Long's Major League record of hitting a home run in eight consecutive games (Mattingly hits 10 HR during the streak).

Sept. 29, 1987 - Don Mattingly hits a grand slam off Boston's Bruce Hurst, setting a Major League record (tied by Travis Hafner in 2008) with six grand slams in a season.

Oct. 19, 1987 - Billy Martin is named manager for the fifth time, replacing Lou Piniella.

June 23, 1988 - Lou Piniella is named manager for the second time as Billy Martin is replaced as Yankees manager for the fifth and final time.

July 27, 1988 - Tommy John commits three errors on one play during the fourth inning of a 16-3 Yankees victory vs. Milwaukee. John becomes the first pitcher in the Modern Era to commit three miscues in the same inning.

Oct. 7, 1988 - Dallas Green is named manager, replacing Lou Piniella.

Dec. 9, 1988 - The Yankees sign a 12-year television contract with the Madison Square Garden Network.

Aug. 18, 1989 - Bucky Dent is named manager, replacing Dallas Green.

Dec. 25, 1989 - Billy Martin dies in an automobile accident near Binghamton, N.Y., at age 61.

June 6, 1990 - Stump Merrill is named manager, replacing Bucky Dent.

July 1, 1990 - With a no-hitter intact with two out in the bottom of the eighth at Comiskey Park, the Yankees make three errors behind starter Andy Hawkins, leading to four unearned runs as the Yankees go on to lose, 4-0. While initially ruled a "no-hitter," MLB removes the designation in 1991 after redefining a "no-hitter" as requiring a pitcher(s) to complete at least 9.0IP.

Oct. 29, 1991 - Buck Showalter replaces Stump Merrill as manager.

Sept. 4, 1993 - Jim Abbott tosses a no-hitter in a 4-0 win vs. Cleveland at Yankee Stadium.

Aug. 13, 1995 - Mickey Mantle dies of cancer at age 63 in Dallas, Tex.

Sept. 6, 1995 - Lou Gehrig's record of 2,130 consecutive games played is broken when Baltimore's Cal Ripken, Jr. plays in his 2,131st.

Oct. 4, 1995 - The Yankees play the longest postseason game in their history, a 15-inning, 7-5 win over Seattle at Yankee Stadium won on a two-run homer by Jim Leyritz. The contest was the final Yankee Stadium game for Don Mattingly.

Nov. 2, 1995 - Joe Torre is named the Yankees' 31st manager, replacing Buck Showalter.

Mar. 1, 1996 - The Yankees defeat the Cleveland Indians, 5-2, in the first ever game at Legends Field (renamed George M. Steinbrenner Field in 2008), the club's new spring training home.

Apr. 9, 1996 - The Yankees defeat the Kansas City Royals, 7-3, in a snowy Bronx home opener. Starter Andy Pettitte earns the win as newcomers Joe Girardi (replacing Mike Stanley) and Tino Martinez (replacing Don Mattingly) get booed during pregame introductions. Hitting in the ninth spot, rookie shortstop Derek Jeter goes 1-for-3 with a single.

May 1, 1996 - Outfielder Gerald Williams goes 6-for-8 with 1HR and 3RBI in a 15-inning, 11-6 win at Baltimore. With Myril Hoag (6/6/1934 at Boston) and Johnny Damon (6/7/2008 vs. Kansas City), he is one of three Yankees in franchise history with six hits in a single game.

May 14, 1996 - Dwight Gooden hurls the eighth regular season no-hitter in Yankees history, a 2-0 blanking of the Seattle Mariners at Yankee Stadium.

June 16, 1996 - Mel Allen, the legendary "Voice of the Yankees" from 1939-64, passes away at age 83.

Aug. 25, 1996 - A monument in honor of Mickey Mantle is unveiled in Yankee Stadium's Monument Park.

Oct. 23, 1996 - In Game 4 of the World Series at Atlanta, Jim Leyritz hits a three-run, eighth-inning homer off the Braves' Mark Wohlers, tying the game, 6-6. The Yankees go on to win, 8-6, in 10 innings.

Oct. 24, 1996 - The Yankees' Andy Pettitte (8.1IP) outduels Atlanta's John Smoltz (8.0IP), 1-0, in Game 5 in Atlanta.

Oct. 26, 1996 - In Game 6 of the World Series at Yankee Stadium, John Wetteland closes out a 3-2 win vs. Atlanta, giving the Yankees their first World Championship in 18 years.

June 23, 1997 - With 16K in a 5-2 Yankees win at Detroit, David Cone establishes the Yankees' all-time single-game high for an RHP (since tied by Michael Pineda in 2015).

May 17, 1998 - David Wells tosses the first regular-season perfect game by a Yankee (and 14th in Baseball history), defeating Minnesota 4-0 at Yankee Stadium.

Sept. 25, 1998 - The Yankees set a then-American League record with their 112th win of the season (a 6-1 win vs. Tampa Bay at Yankee Stadium), breaking the mark of 111 by the 1954 Indians.

Sept. 27, 1998 - The Yankees finish their regular season with a 114-48 (.704) mark, becoming the first team since the 1954 Indians (111-43, .721) with a winning pct. above .700.

Oct. 21, 1998 - The Yankees complete an incredible season with a four-game World Series sweep of the San Diego Padres to capture the franchise's 24th World Championship. The 3-0 win gives the club a 125-50 record over the entire season (114-48 in the regular season, 11-2 in postseason).

Mar. 8, 1999 - Joe DiMaggio dies at age 84 in Hollywood, Fla.

Apr. 25, 1999 - A monument in honor of Joe DiMaggio is unveiled in Yankee Stadium's Monument Park in front of a sold out Stadium and many of DiMaggio's former teammates. Paul Simon sings "Mrs. Robinson" while standing in center field.

July 18, 1999 - On "Yogi Berra Day," David Cone tosses the 15th regular season perfect game in Baseball history, one season after David Wells accomplishes the feat. Coincidentally, Don Larsen — who tossed a perfect game in the 1956 World Series — throws out the ceremonial first pitch.

Oct. 27, 1999 - The Yankees play Baseball's last game of the century and complete a four-game sweep of the Atlanta Braves, capturing their 25th World Championship.

Apr. 23, 2000 - In a 10-7 Yankees win at Toronto, Jorge Posada and Bernie Williams become the first pair of teammates in MLB history to each homer from both sides of the plate in the same game.

July 8, 2000 - The Yankees and Mets play the first two-stadium, split doubleheader in nearly 100 years with the Yankees sweeping both games by the score of 4-2. Game 1 took place at Shea Stadium followed by Game 2 that night at Yankee Stadium. It marked the first day-night doubleheader to take place in different venues since the New York Giants and Brooklyn Superbas faced off on 9/7/1903.

Oct. 21, 2000 - The Yankees' World Series Game 1 win vs. the Mets at Yankee Stadium marks their 13th consecutive victory in World Series play, breaking the 12-game record-streak of the 1927, 1928 and 1932 Yankees.

Oct. 26, 2000 - The Yankees win World Series Game 5 over the Mets at Shea Stadium, clinching their third consecutive World Championship in the first "Subway Series" since 1956. It marks the first time a club has won three consecutive World Series titles since the 1972-74 Oakland Athletics.

Sept. 2, 2001 - Mike Mussina comes within one out of a perfect game at Fenway Park, before Carl Everett singles with two outs in the ninth.

Sept. 23, 2001 - Yankee Stadium hosts "A Prayer for America" service for those lost on September 11. It was the first large-scale, formally staged program offered in memory of those killed or missing and presumed dead in World Trade Center attacks.

Oct. 13, 2001 - With a 1-0 lead and two out in the bottom of the seventh of Game 3 of the ALDS in Oakland, Derek Jeter picks up Shane Spencer's errant throw from the outfield and "flips" the ball in a backhand motion to Jorge Posada, who tags Jeremy Giambi for the final out of the inning. The Yankees go on to win the game, 1-0, and the series 3-games-to-2. The play will be known as the "Flip Play."

Oct. 30, 2001 - President George W. Bush throws out the first pitch prior to the Yankees' 2-1 World Series Game 3 win vs. Arizona at Yankee Stadium.

Oct. 31, 2001 - In Game 4 of the World Series vs. Arizona at Yankee Stadium, Tino Martinez's two-out, bottom-of-the-ninth, two-run home run off Byung-Hyun Kim sends the game into extra innings. Shortly after the stroke of midnight, Derek Jeter wins the game with a "walk-off" solo home run in the 10th, earning him the nickname "Mr. November."

Nov. 1, 2001 - In the late innings of Game 5 of the World Series vs. Arizona at Yankee Stadium, fans serenade Paul O'Neill, who is playing in his last game at Yankee Stadium. Scott Brosius' two-out, bottom-of-the-ninth, two-run home run off Byung-Hyun Kim sends the game into extra innings, and Alfonso Soriano singles in the winning run in the 12th.

May 17, 2002 - Jason Giambi becomes only the 21st player — and second Yankee — to hit a "walk-off" grand slam with his team trailing by three runs (Babe Ruth did it on 9/24/25). His 14th-inning slam off Minnesota's Mike Trombley erases a 12-9 Twins lead, giving the Yankees a 13-12 win.

Apr. 8, 2003 - Hideki Matsui hits a grand slam in the Yankee Stadium debut, leading the Yankees to a 7-3 win over Minnesota.

June 3, 2003 - Derek Jeter is named team captain.

June 13, 2003 - In a 5-2 win vs. St. Louis at Yankee Stadium, Roger Clemens records his 300th career win and 4,000th strikeout.

Oct. 16, 2003 - In Game 7 of the ALCS vs. Boston at Yankee Stadium, Aaron Boone becomes the fifth player—and second Yankee (also Chris Chambliss, 1976 ALCS vs. Kansas City)—to end a postseason series with a “walk-off” HR, when his 11th-inning leadoff solo shot off Tim Wakefield clinches the Yankees’ 39th pennant.

Mar. 30-31, 2004 - The Yankees play their first-ever regular season games outside of North America, splitting a pair against Tampa Bay at the Tokyo Dome, losing 8-3 and winning 12-1, respectively.

July 1, 2004 - Derek Jeter makes his most famous catch, diving into Yankee Stadium’s third base stands to nab a 12th-inning popup off the bat of Boston’s Trot Nixon. John Flaherty wins the game with a 13th-inning RBI single.

Apr. 26, 2005 - Alex Rodriguez hits three home runs (all off Bartolo Colon) and becomes just the second Yankee in franchise history to record at least 10 RBI in a game (also Tony Lazzeri, 11 on 5/24/36) in a 12-4 win vs. the Angels at Yankee Stadium.

June 15, 2005 - The Yankees announce plans for a new Yankee Stadium to be constructed in Macombs Dam and John Mullaly Parks, located on the north side of 161st Street (adjacent to the site of the original Stadium).

Apr. 29, 2006 - For the second time in franchise history, the Yankees score in each inning of a game during a 17-6 win vs. Toronto (also 7/26/39 vs. St. Louis).

May 11, 2006 - Hideki Matsui is removed from the game in the top of the first vs. Boston after fracturing his left wrist. According to Rule 10.24 (c), his 1,768 consecutive-games-played streak (1,250 with the Yomiuri Giants and 518 with the Yankees) comes to an end as he did not play one half-inning in the field or complete a time at-bat by reaching base or making an out. His streak as a Yankee is the longest since Lou Gehrig’s (2,130 games).

May 16, 2006 - The Yankees tie a franchise record by overcoming a nine-run deficit vs. Texas to win, 14-13, in nine innings. Jorge Posada hits a two-run “walk-off” home run off Akinori Otsuka.

Aug. 16, 2006 - The Yankees break ground for a new Yankee Stadium, scheduled to be ready for Opening Day 2009.

Aug. 4, 2007 - In a 16-8 win vs. Kansas City, Alex Rodriguez becomes the 22nd and youngest (32y, 8d) player in MLB history to reach the 500-HR mark. He is the third player to hit his 500th career homer as a Yankee, joining Babe Ruth and Mickey Mantle.

Sept. 5, 2007 - Bob Sheppard works his final game as Yankees Public Address Announcer, a 3-2 win over Seattle.

Oct. 30, 2007 - Joe Girardi is named the 32nd manager in Yankees franchise history.

Mar. 18, 2008 - The Yankees visited Blacksburg, Va., to play an exhibition game vs. Virginia Tech to honor the victims and aid in the healing process following the tragic events on the college’s campus on Apr. 16, 2007. Prior to the game at English Field, Yankees players and staff visited the campus’ memorial site.

March 27, 2008 - Prior to the Yankees’ final home spring training game, Legends Field is renamed George M. Steinbrenner Field.

June 7, 2008 - Johnny Damon goes 6-for-6 in the Yankees’ 12-11 win vs. Kansas City, matching the franchise record for hits in a nine-inning game (see June 6, 1934 - Myril Hoag) and becoming the only Yankee in original Yankee Stadium history to record six hits in a game of any length. His final hit is a “walk-off” single.

Sept. 16, 2008 - Derek Jeter singles off Chicago’s Gavin Floyd in the first inning for his 1,270th career hit at Yankee Stadium, surpassing Lou Gehrig for the most all-time hits at the ballpark.

Sept. 21, 2008 - The Yankees play their last ever game in the original Yankee Stadium. Julia Ruth Stevens, daughter of Babe Ruth, throws out the first pitch, and Jose Molina hits the park’s final home run in the fourth inning. Following the Yankees’ 7-3 win over Baltimore, Derek Jeter thanks the fans over the Stadium PA system.

Sept. 28, 2008 - On the season’s final day at Boston’s Fenway Park, Mike Mussina records his 20th win of the year, becoming the oldest pitcher in MLB history to win 20 games for the first time.

Nov. 8, 2008 - Local Bronx high school youth groups are joined by former players Scott Brosius, David Cone, Jeff Nelson and Paul O’Neill and Yankees General Partner Jennifer Steinbrenner Swindal in removing home plate, the pitcher’s rubber and pails of dirt from the original Stadium, then installing them in the current Stadium.

Apr. 3-4, 2009 - The Yankees play their first exhibition games in Yankee Stadium, defeating the Cubs, 7-4 and 10-1, respectively. Chien-Ming Wang tosses the first pitch in the Apr. 3 contest.

Apr. 16, 2009 - The Yankees play the first regular season game in Yankee Stadium history, falling to Cleveland, 10-2. CC Sabathia tosses the Stadium’s first official pitch, Johnny Damon records the first hit (first-inning single off Cliff Lee) and Jorge Posada hits the first HR (fifth-inning off Lee).

May 14 – June 1, 2009 - The Yankees set an all-time MLB mark (since surpassed) with 18 consecutive errorless games (safely handling 660 chances).

Sept. 11, 2009 - Derek Jeter breaks Lou Gehrig’s all-time franchise mark of 2,721 hits with a single off Baltimore’s Chris Tillman at Yankee Stadium. Gehrig had held the mark since 9/6/37.

Oct. 4, 2009 - Alex Rodriguez hits a three-run HR and a grand slam in the sixth inning of the season finale at Tampa Bay in a 10-2 Yankees win, setting an all-time AL mark with 7 RBI in an inning.

Nov. 4, 2009 - The Yankees win their 27th World Series, defeating Philadelphia in Game 6, 7-3. Hideki Matsui ties Bobby Richardson’s World Series mark (1960 Game 3 vs. Pittsburgh) with 6 RBI (since tied by Albert Pujols in 2011 and Addison Russell in 2016). Andy Pettitte records the win, becoming the first pitcher to start and record the win in the clinching game in all three rounds of a single postseason. Manager Joe Girardi joins Billy Martin and Ralph Houk as the only Yankees to win a World Series with the club as a player and manager.

June 12-13, 2010 - Jorge Posada becomes the first Yankee since Bill Dickey (June 3, G2 - June 4, 1937) to hit grand slams in back-to-back games. He accomplishes the feat in 9-3 and 9-5 wins vs. Houston.

July 11 and 13, 2010 - Longtime Yankees P.A. announcer Bob Sheppard passes away at his home in Baldwin, Long Island, at age 99 and Yankees Principal Owner George M. Steinbrenner III passes away in Tampa, Fla. at age 80.

Aug. 4, 2010 - Alex Rodriguez becomes the seventh (and youngest) player in MLB history to hit his 600th HR, accomplishing the feat at 35 years, 8 days old in a 5-1 win vs. Toronto.

Sept. 20, 2010 - The Yankees dedicate a monument to Principal Owner George M. Steinbrenner III in Monument Park.

July 9, 2011 - Derek Jeter becomes the 28th player all time to record 3,000 hits, accomplishing the feat with a third-inning solo home run off David Price in a 5-4 win vs. Tampa Bay. He goes 5-for-5 on the day, matching his personal career high in hits.

July 30, 2011 - In Game 2 of a doubleheader vs. Baltimore, the Yankees score 12 first-inning runs in a 17-3 win, sending 16 men to the plate with 13 reaching base (seven singles, two doubles, 1HR, 2BB and 1E). All nine batters had at least 1H and 1R. The club sets a franchise record for most runs scored in the first inning in any game.

Aug. 25, 2011 - In a 22-9 win vs. Oakland, Robinson Cano, Russell Martin and Curtis Granderson each hit grand slams. The Yankees become the first MLB team to hit three grand slams in a single game.

Sept. 19, 2011 - Mariano Rivera records his 602nd career save, closing out a 6-4 win vs. Minnesota at Yankee Stadium to surpass Trevor Hoffman and become the all-time Major League leader.

Aug. 13-14, 2013 - Alfonso Soriano records 2HR and 6RBI then 2HR and 7RBI in consecutive games vs. Los Angeles-AL. He becomes just the third player all time since RBIs became official statistic in 1920 to record at least 6RBI in consecutive games.

Sept. 22 and 26, 2013 - The Yankees celebrate the career of Mariano Rivera with a 50-minute pregame ceremony, including the unveiling of his No. 42 in Monument Park and a live performance of "Enter Sandman" by Metallica. Four days later at Yankee Stadium, Rivera makes his final career appearance. He is removed from the game by longtime teammates Derek Jeter and Andy Pettitte, who come out of the dugout to make the pitching change.

Aug. 23, 2014 - The Yankees retire Joe Torre's No. 6.

Sept. 7, 2014 - The Yankees hold "Derek Jeter Day" in front of a sellout crowd of 48,110.

Sept. 25, 2014 - Derek Jeter plays his final game at Yankee Stadium, hitting a "walk-off" single to defeat Baltimore, 6-5, after closer David Robertson allows three runs in the top of the ninth to allow the Orioles to tie the score.

May 10, 2015 - Michael Pineda records 16K vs. Baltimore in just 7.0IP, becoming just the third pitcher in franchise history with at least 16K in a single game (LHP Guidry-18K and RHP Cone-16K).

May 24, 2015 - The Yankees retire Bernie Williams' No. 51.

June 19, 2015 - Alex Rodriguez records his 3,000th career hit with a solo HR off Detroit's Justin Verlander at Yankee Stadium.

Aug. 8-9, 2015 - The Yankees are shut out in consecutive games for the first time since 5/12-13/99, having played 2,665 games in between, ending the longest streak of not being shut out in consecutive games in MLB history.

Aug. 22-23, 2015 - The Yankees retire Jorge Posada's No. 20 and Andy Pettitte's No. 46 on consecutive days.

Oct. 1, 2015 - The Yankees record the 10,000th regular season win in franchise history, defeating Boston, 4-1, to clinch a postseason berth and the club's first-ever appearance in the AL Wild Card Game. They are the first AL club to reach the 10,000-win plateau, and — according to the *Elias Sports Bureau* — own the best winning pct. (.569) of any franchise at the time of its 10,000th win.

Aug. 13, 2016 - After the 1996 team was honored for its 20th anniversary in a pregame ceremony, Tyler Austin and Aaron Judge make their MLB debuts and hit back-to-back HRs in the second inning in their first career plate appearances. It marks the first time in MLB history that debuting teammates homered in the same game. There had been just one prior game in MLB history in which two players each hit HRs in their first career at-bats, but they were on opposing teams (on 4/19/38 at Shibe Park, the Phillies' Emmett "Heinie" Mueller & the Dodgers' Ernie Koy — both in the first inn.).

Aug. 14, 2016 - Mariano Rivera's Monument Park plaque is unveiled in a pregame ceremony.

Sept. 28, 2016 - Mark Teixeira hits his 409th and final career home run — a "walk-off" grand slam vs. Boston in a 5-3 Yankees win.

May 7, 2017 - The Yankees outlast the Cubs, 5-4, in 18 innings at Wrigley Field, as the teams combine for an all-time MLB high 48 strikeouts (since tied). Yankees pitchers tie the all-time single-game mark with 26K (third time in MLB history).

May 14, 2017 - In the second of a Mother's Day doubleheader vs. Houston, Derek Jeter's No. 2 is retired and his Monument Park plaque is unveiled.

Sept. 25, 2017 - In an 11-3 win vs. Kansas City, Aaron Judge hits his 49th and 50th home runs of the season, tying and breaking Mark McGwire's all-time MLB rookie home run mark (49HR in 1987).

Oct. 8, 2017 - In ALDS Game 3 vs. Cleveland, Greg Bird hits a solo HR to lead off the seventh, joining Jorge Posada (2001 ALDS G3 at Oakland, fifth inn.) and Tommy Henrich (1949 WS G1 vs. Brooklyn, ninth inn.) as the only Yankees to homer in 1-0 postseason wins.

Oct. 11, 2017 - The Yankees win ALDS Game 5 at Cleveland, 5-2, overturning a two-games-to-none deficit to win the series over the AL's winningest regular season team, Didi Gregorius drives in three runs with a first-inning solo HR and a two-run homer in the third, both off AL Cy Young Award winner Corey Kluber.

Mar. 29, 2018 - Giancarlo Stanton makes his Yankees debut, going 3-for-5 with 1 double, 2HR and 4RBI at Toronto. He becomes just the second Yankee to homer twice in his first game with the club, joining Roger Maris (2HR on 4/19/60 at Boston). He also becomes the seventh Yankee to hit 2HR on Opening Day, the first since Joe Pepitone on 4/9/63 at the K.C. A's.

Apr. 3, 2018 - Didi Gregorius goes 4-for-4 with 1 double, 2HR, 1BB and 8RBI in Yankees' 11-4 home opener win vs. Tampa Bay, setting single-game franchise records for RBI by a shortstop, RBI by a Yankee in a home opener and RBI in the current Yankee Stadium.

May 6, 2018 - At 21 years, 144 days old, Gleyber Torres becomes the youngest Yankee in franchise history to hit a "walk-off" HR with a three-run shot in the ninth inning of a 7-4 win vs. Cleveland.

April 30, 2019 - At Arizona's Chase Field, CC Sabathia fans former batterymate John Ryan Murphy for career strikeout No. 3,000 to become the 17th pitcher and third LHP to reach the milestone.

June 29-30, 2019 - The Yankees sweep Boston in a two-game series at England's London Stadium, the site of the 2012 Olympic Games, in the first two Major League games ever played in Europe. The Yankees emerge victorious in 17-13 and 12-8 slugfests.

September 27, 2019 - A day after the Minnesota Twins become the first team to hit 300HR in a season, the Yankees join them, as Giancarlo Stanton takes Texas's Joe Palumbo deep in the first inning of a 14-7 win at Globe Life Park. It is the first of six Yankees longballs that night, as the club finishes the season with a franchise-record 306 home runs, one shy of the Twins' Major League-record 307.

July 23, 2020 - The Yankees and defending World Series champion Nationals kick off the abbreviated, COVID-19 affected 2020 season with MLB's opening game. Gerrit Cole makes his Yankees debut (5.0IP, 1H, 1R), earning the win in the Yankees' 4-1 victory.

Sept. 15-17, 2020 - The Yankees hit 19HRs in a three game series vs. Toronto (while outscoring them 43-15) to set an MLB mark for HRs over any three-game stretch. In the final game of the series the Yankees hit 5HR in the fourth inn. vs. Toronto (Gardner/LeMahieu/Voit b2b2b; Stanton/Torres b2b), setting a single-inning franchise record and tying the MLB mark (seventh time).

May 19, 2021 - Corey Kluber tosses his first career no-hitter in a 2-0 win at Texas, allowing just one baserunner (BB in the 3rd inn.) while throwing 101 pitches. It was the 12th no-hitter in Yankees franchise history (incl. postseason) and the first by a Yankee since David Cone's perfect game on 7/18/99 vs. Montreal.

May 21, June 17 & June 20, 2021 - The Yankees turned triple plays on each of these dates (vs. Chicago-AL, at Toronto in Buffalo, and vs. Oakland, respectively), setting a single season franchise record and becoming just the eighth team in modern MLB history to record three in a single year. The Yankees had recorded just three triple plays in total over their previous 52 seasons (1969-2020).

October 3, 2021 - The Yankees clinch a postseason berth on the final day of the regular season with a 1-0, ninth-inning, "walk-off" win vs. Tampa Bay. The victory comes on an infield single by Aaron Judge, marking his first career "walk-off" hit.



Lou Gehrig Appreciation Day - July 4, 1939

Prior to the Yankees' May 2, 1939, game at Detroit's Briggs Stadium, captain Lou Gehrig gave the umpires his team's lineup card — which did not have his name on it. He watched the entire game from the bench, marking the end of his 2,130-consecutive-games-played streak. "The Iron Horse" was suffering the effects of amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS), a disease known since as Lou Gehrig's disease. He would never play again.

Just over two months later, on July 4, 1939, Lou Gehrig Appreciation Day was held in front of approximately 62,000 fans at Yankee Stadium. Ceremonies took place between games of a doubleheader against the Washington Senators. Gehrig and his teammates were joined by members of the 1927 Yankees. After speeches by Mayor Fiorello La Guardia and Postmaster James A. Farley, Manager Joe McCarthy said his public goodbye to Gehrig: "Lou, what can I say except that it was a sad day in the life of everybody who knew you when you came to my hotel room that day in Detroit and told me you were quitting as a ballplayer because you felt yourself a hindrance to the team. My God, man, you were never that."

Various gifts were presented to Gehrig from club employees and the rival New York Giants. His teammates gave him a trophy, which was inscribed with a poem by *New York Times* writer John Kieran. As the crowd chanted, "We want Lou; We want Lou...", Gehrig stepped to the microphone to deliver one of the most oft-quoted speeches in American history.

"For the past two weeks you've been reading about a bad break. Today I consider myself the luckiest man on the face of the Earth. I have been in ballparks for 17 years and have never received anything but kindness and encouragement from you fans.

"When you look around, wouldn't you consider it a privilege to associate yourself with such fine-looking men as are standing in uniform in this ballpark today? Sure, I'm lucky. Who wouldn't consider it an honor to have known Jacob Ruppert? Also, the builder of baseball's greatest empire, Ed Barrow? To have spent six years with such a grand



little fellow as Miller Huggins? To have spent the next nine years with that smart student of psychology, the best manager in baseball today, Joe McCarthy? Who wouldn't feel honored to room with such a grand guy as Bill Dickey?

"When the New York Giants, a team you would give your right arm to beat, and vice versa, sends you a gift—that's something. When the groundskeepers and office staff and writers and old-timers and players and concessionaires all remember you with trophies—that's something. When you have a wonderful mother-in-law who takes sides with you in squabbles against her own daughter—that's something. When you have a father and a mother who work all their lives so that you can have an education and build your body—it's a blessing. When you have a wife who has been a tower of strength and shown more courage than you ever dreamed existed—that's the finest I know.

"So I close in saying that I might have been given a bad break, but I've got an awful lot to live for. Thank you."

On January 6, 1940, Yankees team president Ed Barrow announced that No. 4 would be retired from use. To this day, Gehrig remains the only Yankee ever to wear the number.

Gehrig died on June 2, 1941, at his home in the Riverdale section of the Bronx. He was 37. ✎

Babe Ruth Day - April 27, 1947

On April 27, 1947, Babe Ruth Day was celebrated throughout Major League Baseball, as the Babe said goodbye in an on-field ceremony at Yankee Stadium. Dressed in a topcoat, Ruth, weakened by throat cancer, made the following remarks:



"Thank you very much, ladies and gentlemen. You know how bad my voice sounds—well it feels just as bad.

"You know this baseball game of ours comes up from the youth. That means the boys. And after you're a boy and grow up to know how to play ball, then you come to the boys you see representing themselves today in your national pastime. The only real game—I think—in the world is baseball.

"As a rule, some people think if you give them a football, or a baseball, or something like that—naturally they're athletes right away. But you can't do that in baseball. You've gotta start from way down [at] the bottom, when you're 6 or 7 years of age. You can't wait until you're 15 or 16. You gotta let it grow up with you. And if you're successful, and you try hard enough, you're bound to come out on top—just like these boys have come to the top now.

"There's been so many lovely things said about me, and I'm glad that I've had the opportunity to thank everybody. Thank you."

Ruth memorably returned to Yankee Stadium on June 13, 1948, to celebrate the 25th anniversary of Yankee Stadium and have his uniform No. 3 retired.

He died on August 16, 1948, at Memorial Hospital in New York at age 53. His body laid in state at the entrance of Yankee Stadium on Aug. 17 and 18, before his funeral on Aug. 19 at New York's St. Patrick's Cathedral. ✎

George M. Steinbrenner III (1930-2010)



From 1973 until his passing on July 13, 2010, George M. Steinbrenner III created a legacy of winning unmatched by his peers. His foresight, drive and commitment permanently transformed not only the Yankees organization, but the game of Baseball.

On January 3, 1973, a group of businessmen formed and led by Mr. Steinbrenner purchased the New York Yankees from CBS for a net price of \$8.7 million. It took just five years for his aggressive leadership to turn the organization back into World Champions. In his time as Principal Owner of the club (1973-2010), the Yankees won more pennants (11) and World Series (7) than any other team in baseball, while posting a Major League-best .566 winning percentage (3,364-2,583-3 record) over the stretch.

In addition to the team's on-field success under the direction of Mr. Steinbrenner, the New York Yankees consistently shattered franchise and league attendance records at home and on the road. In 2009, they drew 3,719,358 fans in their first season of play in the current Yankee Stadium, topping the American League in attendance for the seventh straight season (2003-09). The Yankees remain the only franchise in Baseball history to draw more than 4 million fans at home in four consecutive seasons (2005-08).

Mr. Steinbrenner's foresight into both sports and business continued to build the value and prominence of the franchise, positioning it for the future. In 2002, *Sporting News* named him the No. 1 "Most Powerful Man in Sports," and *Forbes* magazine has continued to list the Yankees as the most valuable franchise in all of Baseball.

Mr. Steinbrenner's vision led to the creation of YankeeNets, which owned the New Jersey Nets and New Jersey Devils and ultimately led to the launch of the YES Network, a trailblazing enterprise that has been the nation's most watched regional sports network since 2003. Additionally, Mr. Steinbrenner teamed with long-time friend and Dallas Cowboys owner Jerry Jones, creating Legends Hospitality, LLC, a concession and merchandising company which currently operates at the Yankees' and Cowboys' new stadiums.

In 2006, his participation in the groundbreaking ceremony for the new Yankee Stadium underscored his role as the principal impetus in moving the much-anticipated facility towards its opening in 2009.

Mr. Steinbrenner's tenure of over 37 years exceeded that of any other New York Yankees owner by 13 years (Colonel Jacob Ruppert purchased the Yankees with Tillinghast L'Hommedieu Huston in January 1915, bought out Huston in 1923, and maintained sole ownership in the club until his death in January 1939—a total of 24 years). During Mr. Steinbrenner's time as the sole Principal Owner of the Yankees, the other 29 Major League clubs had over 100 owners or ownership groups.

Mr. Steinbrenner's success in the sports world began at an early age. He was a multi-sport athlete at Culver Military Academy (where he is in the Athletic Hall of Fame) and at Williams College. He began his successful coaching career as an assistant football coach at two Big Ten universities, Northwestern and Purdue. Then he assembled championship basketball teams in the National Industrial and American Basketball Leagues. In 2002, he was honored with the prestigious Gold Medal Award from the National Football Foundation and College Hall of Fame for a lifetime of "outstanding commitment, dedication and dynamic leadership in his business, as well as his personal life."



Mr. Steinbrenner devoted as much time and effort to the U.S. Olympic Committee (USOC) as he did to his many other sporting endeavors. He was on the U.S. Olympic Foundation Board from 1986-2002 and served as Chairman over the last six years of his tenure. He also was Chairman of the 1989 Olympic Overview Commission, which was created to evaluate the structure and efforts of the U.S. Olympic program, and served as Vice President of the USOC from 1989 to 1992. As a result of his distinguished service, he was presented with the General Douglas MacArthur USOC Foremost Award and the F. Don Miller United States Olympic Award. In 2005, the U.S. Olympic Foundation created the George M. Steinbrenner Sports Leadership Award in his honor, which celebrates a member of the U.S. Olympic family who has made outstanding contributions to sport.



Additionally, Mr. Steinbrenner was a member of the Baseball Hall of Fame's Board of Directors and served on the NCAA Foundation Board of Trustees beginning in 1990.

Most of Mr. Steinbrenner's philanthropic endeavors were performed without fanfare. However, he was repeatedly recognized by the communities in which he immersed himself. In 1993, he earned the Tampa Civitan Club's "Outstanding Citizen" Award, and in 1998, Tampa Law Enforcement named him "Citizen of the Year" for founding a scholarship fund for the children of slain law enforcement officers. Mr. Steinbrenner was also honored as an "Outstanding New Yorker" by the N.Y. Society of Association Executives in 1997 and credited in 2009 by the Museum of the City of New York as one of the "New York City 400," recognizing "people who have helped create the world's greatest city since its founding in 1609."

In February 2008, the Tampa City Council and the Board of the Hillsborough County Commissioner's Office both passed resolutions endorsing the renaming of Legends Field in Tampa after Mr. Steinbrenner to pay tribute to his numerous contributions to the area. On March 27, 2008, Mr. Steinbrenner—joined by his family—pulled down a curtain draped above the outfield scoreboard to unveil the new name for the Yankees' spring training home: George M. Steinbrenner Field.

In the fall of 2009, George M. Steinbrenner High School opened in Lutz, Fla. The school was named after Mr. Steinbrenner by the Hillsborough County School Board in recognition of his philanthropic involvement in the community, particularly with the school system.

Mr. Steinbrenner was dually honored in January 2011, winning the Joan Payson Community Service Award from the New York chapter of the BBWAA and having his legacy of charitable work recognized at the 22nd annual Baseball Assistance Team (B.A.T.) Dinner.

At the time of his passing, he was survived by his wife, Joan; sisters, Susan Norpell and Judy Kamm; children, Hank, Hal, Jennifer and Jessica; and his grandchildren. ❀

On September 20, 2010, prior to the team's game vs. Tampa Bay, the Yankees unveiled a monument in Mr. Steinbrenner's honor in Monument Park, reflecting the special connection, appreciation and responsibility that he felt toward Yankees fans.

Chronology of Yankees Ownership

- Jan. 9, 1903:** Frank Farrell and Bill Devery purchase the rights to establish a new American League franchise in New York for \$18,000.
- Jan. 11, 1915:** Col. Jacob Ruppert and Col. Tillinghast L'Hommedieu Huston agree to purchase the Yankees for \$460,000. The transfer is formally completed on January 30.
- May 21, 1923:** Col. Ruppert buys out Col. Huston for \$1.5 million (transfer is completed on June 1).
- Jan. 13, 1939:** Col. Ruppert passes away and his estate takes over ownership of the club.
- Jan. 25, 1945:** Dan Topping, Del Webb and Larry MacPhail purchase the Yankees for \$2.8 million from the estate of the late Col. Ruppert (Topping and Webb later buy out MacPhail's share following the 1947 season).
- Nov. 2, 1964:** CBS purchases 80 pct. of the Yankees for \$11.2 million and later buys the remaining 20 percent (Webb sells his 10 pct. share in March 1965 and Topping sells his 10 pct. share in September 1966).
- Jan. 3, 1973:** A limited partnership, headed by George M. Steinbrenner as its Managing General Partner, purchases the Yankees from CBS for a net price of \$8.7 million.
- Nov. 20, 2008:** Hal Steinbrenner named Managing General Partner.



Bob Sheppard - "The Voice of Yankee Stadium"

Bob Sheppard will forever be the "The Voice of Yankee Stadium." With his instantly recognizable elocution — in which each syllable was given meticulous attention — Sheppard provided a soundtrack of irrefragable dignity to Yankee Stadium for 57 years.

Sadly, he passed away on July 11, 2010, at his home in Baldwin, N.Y., with his wife, Mary, by his side. He was 99 years old.

Born in Ridgewood, Queens, Sheppard began his tenure as Yankees public address announcer on April 17, 1951—Opening Day of Joe DiMaggio's final season and the day of Mickey Mantle's Major League debut. Among the approximately 4,500 baseball games he worked over his tenure with the Yankees were 121 consecutive postseason contests from 1951 to 2006, including 62 games in 22 World Series.

Sheppard's incredible career behind the microphone started when he volunteered his services for a charity football game in Freeport, Long Island, in the late 1940s. An executive from the Brooklyn Dodgers football team of the All-America Conference was at the game. He liked

Sheppard's style ("clear, concise and correct") and hired him. The football Dodgers folded after just one season at Ebbets Field (1948), but one of their opponents—the New York football Yankees—heard Sheppard's booming voice and offered him their PA job at Yankee Stadium. Baseball's Yankees discovered him as a result and offered him their PA role for the 1950 season. Though he turned down their offer due to conflicts with his teaching schedule, he changed his mind the following year.

In addition to his baseball duties, Sheppard was the public address voice for the New York football Giants for 50 seasons—from their move to Yankee Stadium in 1956 until his retirement after the 2005 season. Sheppard also served the New York Titans of the American Football League at the Polo Grounds, the New York Stars of the World Football League at Downing Stadium, the New York Cosmos soccer team, and St. John's University's basketball and football teams. Sheppard also handled PA duties for five Army-Navy football games in Philadelphia.

Some of the events he listed as the most memorable of his incredible career were: Don Larsen's perfect game in Game 5 of the 1956 World Series on October 8, 1956; Roger Maris' 61st home run on October 1, 1961; Reggie Jackson's three home runs in Game 6 of the World Series on October 18, 1977; and the Giants-Colts overtime NFL Championship Game on December 28, 1958.

Sheppard attended St. John's College, which eventually became St. John's University. Always a talented athlete, he received a full athletic scholarship to the school,

playing quarterback on the football team all four years. He later enrolled at Columbia University, where he received his master's degree in speech and worked his way up from teacher-in-training to substitute teacher to permanent teacher to department chairman. In order to supplement his teaching salary, Sheppard played semiprofessional football on Sundays in Long Island with the Valley Stream Red Riders and the Hempstead Monitors, earning \$25 a game.

In 1998, Sheppard was presented with the prestigious William J. Slocum "Long and Meritorious Service" Award by the New York chapter of the BBWAA as well as the "Pride of the Yankees" award by the ballclub.

On May 7, 2000, a plaque was dedicated to Sheppard in Monument Park of the original Yankee Stadium to commemorate his 50th anniversary season.

Additionally, the Yankee Stadium media dining room was named "Sheppard's Place" prior to the 2009 season to commemorate his legacy.


The native New Yorker was elected to the St. John's University Sports Hall of Fame, the Long Island Sports Hall of Fame and the New York Sports Hall of Fame.

He was awarded honorary doctorates from St. John's University (Pedagogy) and Fordham University (Rhetoric), and in 2007, received St. John's' Medal of Honor, the highest award that the university can confer on a graduate.

Sheppard also made cameo appearances in numerous motion pictures and television shows, including *61**, *It's My Turn*, *It Could Happen to You*, *For Love of the Game*, *Anger Management*, *Seinfeld* and *Mad About You*.

Sheppard announced his final game at Yankee Stadium on September 5, 2007, a 3-2 Yankees victory over the Seattle Mariners.

On Sept. 21, 2008, Sheppard provided a valedictory in the bottom of the seventh inning of the final game at the original Yankee Stadium. Unable to say goodbye in person as he continued to recover from an illness that had kept him away from the Stadium since the final weeks of the 2007 season, Sheppard gave his tribute through a taped segment which played on the video board. He recited, "Farewell, old Yankee Stadium, farewell / What a wonderful story you can tell / DiMaggio, Mantle, Gehrig and Ruth / A baseball cathedral in truth." ❧

Voices Before Sheppard

Not even Bob Sheppard himself could remember who preceded him as Yankee Stadium's public address announcer. Surprisingly, the history of Sheppard's predecessors at the microphone — or, earlier, the megaphone — spanned four decades and three ballparks before Sheppard's first game on April 17, 1951.

The lineage extends to Hilltop Park in 1910, when the Yankees were commonly called the "Highlanders." On June 11, *Sporting Life* noted a new method of announcing the starting batteries. Writer E.H. Simmons described an unnamed scorecard vendor with a "deep, carrying voice" shouting the names through a megaphone at the start of each game.

In 1913, the Yankees began playing their home games at the Polo Grounds, which was also home to the New York Giants. Jack Lenz and George Levy debuted as announcers for both teams two years later. When Yankee Stadium opened in 1923, Levy continued working with the Giants while Lenz carried his megaphone to the Bronx. "I grabbed the offer," Lenz recalled in 1935. "Who wouldn't, with the old Bambino holding forth at the Stadium?"

Lenz's game-day duties began with receiving the starting lineups from the managers of both teams 15 minutes before the first pitch. After delivering a copy of each lineup to the umpire, Lenz relayed the "necessary dope" to writers in the press box via telephone. He then raised his megaphone and announced the batting orders and batteries — first toward the bleachers, then to the upper tiers of the grandstand, and finally to the lower stands. During games, Lenz occupied Field Box 133 adjacent to the Yankees dugout. He broadcasted each batter's name only once, prior to the first plate appearance by each respective player. Lenz also announced lineup changes made throughout the game.

Lenz became a fixture at Yankee Stadium. Fans chuckled at his occasional malapropisms, such as advertising a doubleheader as "two games for the price of one omission." The *New York Evening Journal* praised Lenz as "the mild-mannered megaphone man" upon announcing his 2,000th game in 1933. Lenz set aside his megaphone to inaugurate Yankee Stadium's public address system during Game 3 of the 1936 World Series.

George Levy occasionally joined Lenz at the Stadium. In 1927, Lenz and Levy announced the Opening Day lineups to 72,000 fans as part of a "two-ply announcer system." Levy replaced Lenz as Yankee Stadium's official announcer by 1939 and was likely responsible for a famous gaffe made on May 31, 1946.

"Will the spectators in the front row boxes please remove their clothing..." Levy began, only to have the second half of the request ("from the front railing") obscured by the crowd's laughter.

Al Frazin served as Yankee Stadium's public address announcer from 1947 through 1950. Frazin, a longtime announcer at Madison Square Garden, handled P.A. duties in the 1930s for the pro football Brooklyn Dodgers, who were owned by future Yankees co-owner Dan Topping. Frazin served in the U.S. Army during World War II and was recalled into active military service in August 1950.

Research indicates that Yankees public relations director Arthur "Red" Patterson handled public address duties immediately prior to Bob Sheppard's debut in 1951. Patterson likely filled Al Frazin's vacated position through the 1950 World Series. 📖



Current Yankees Public Address Announcer Paul Olden

On April 15, 2009, the Yankees announced that Paul Olden would assume full-time duties as Yankee Stadium public address announcer, replacing the iconic Bob Sheppard. Olden, a 12-time Super Bowl public address announcer (1994-2005), first manned the Yankees booth during the team's workout day on April 2. He also worked the team's first-ever Stadium exhibition games vs. Chicago-NL on April 3-4.

Sheppard, the Yankees PA announcer since 1951, had been suffering from a bronchial infection and was last able to perform his role on September 5, 2007. His longtime backup, Jim Hall, handled PA responsibilities in 2008.

Olden had a long broadcasting career prior to taking the Yankees PA position, including three seasons in the Yankees television broadcast booth from 1994-96 alongside Phil Rizzuto and Bobby Murcer. He also called games on the radio for the Tampa Bay Devil Rays (1998-2004), California Angels (1991), and Cleveland Indians (1988-89), as well as for the NFL's New York Jets (1993-96) and Los Angeles Rams (1991-92).

Previously, Olden did fill-in radio work with the NBA's New Jersey Nets (1995-96) and MLB's Angels (1989-90, '92). He was also a full-time radio broadcaster for UCLA's basketball and football teams (1989-1992) and worked for The Football Network (2003), FOX SportsNet LA (1997) and ESPN (1991-92), calling Major League Baseball and college football.

Olden's other prior PA work included the NCAA's Outback Bowl from 2002-05 and USC Trojans baseball from 1972-76. He also did on-air radio work for KPMC and KNX in Los Angeles.

Born in Chicago and raised in L.A., Olden attended Los Angeles City College and Los Angeles Valley College (2006-08). He was presented with a New York Emmy Award for best local sports coverage in 1994 for his work on Yankees telecasts. 📖



The 1927 Yankees - "Murderers' Row"

Many baseball writers and historians consider the 1927 Yankees the greatest baseball team of all time. With a lineup known as Murderers' Row, the Yankees marched to a 110-44 regular season record, leading the AL from wire-to-wire and finishing ahead of the second-place Philadelphia A's by 19.0 games. The club featured seven Hall of Famers in uniform (outfielders Babe Ruth and Earle Combs, first baseman Lou Gehrig, second baseman Tony Lazzeri, pitchers Waite Hoyt and Herb Pennock, and manager Miller Huggins). Additionally, the team was constructed by an eighth Hall-of-Famer (general manager Ed Barrow) and owned by a ninth (Jacob Ruppert).

Ruth had his signature season, hitting 60 home runs, including 17 in September. With his final blast of the year off the Washington Senators' Tom Zachary, he surpassed his own single-season record of 59 set in 1921. Ruth also led the Majors in on-base pct. (.486), slugging pct. (.772), runs (158), walks (137) and strikeouts (89).

Hitting behind Ruth in the clean-up spot, Gehrig won the AL MVP Award, batting .373 with 173 RBI, 117 extra-base hits and 447 total bases. While this marked Gehrig's breakout season, his winning the award had a lot to do with the rules of the time, which prohibited a repeat winner (Ruth had won in 1923). Nevertheless Gehrig's totals for extra-base hits, total bases and RBI are the second-highest, third-highest and tied for the fourth-highest, respectively, in a single season in Baseball history.

As a club, the Yankees led the Majors in almost every offensive category, including runs (975), triples

(103), home runs (158), walks (642), batting avg. (.307), on-base pct. (.384) and slugging pct. (.488). Ruth and Gehrig alone tallied 107 combined homers, just two shy of the New York Giants, who had the second-most as a team in the Majors.

For all the attention that the hitters received, the pitchers were every bit as good. They led the Majors with a 3.20 combined ERA and allowed the third-fewest walks (409) and homers (42) among the Majors' 16 teams. They tossed 82 complete games (second in the AL) and led their league with 11 shutouts.

The group was paced by Hoyt, who had the best overall season of his career, going 22-7 with a 2.64 ERA and tying for the AL lead in wins. Urban Shocker, a four-time former 20-game winner with the St. Louis Browns, went 18-6 with a 2.84 ERA, while dealing with a mitral valve disorder that forced him to sleep sitting up and contributed to his death the following year.

The biggest surprise on the staff was Wilcy Moore—a player recommended to Barrow in 1926 by "bird dog" scout Jack Walsh (popular legend holds that Barrow discovered Moore while reading minor league statistics in *The Sporting News*). Moore became a spot starter as well as the Yankees' principal all-purpose relief pitcher, tossing 213.0 innings (93.0 as a starter, 120.0 as a reliever), going 19-7 with a Major League-leading 2.28 ERA.

The Yankees capped off their season with a four-game World Series sweep of Pittsburgh, outscoring the Pirates 23-10. Ruth hit the only two homers of the Series and Moore tossed a complete game in the clincher. **X**





The 1939 Yankees - "Culmination of a Dynasty"

In a year that the American and National Leagues celebrated the 100th anniversary of the mythologized creation of baseball, the 1939 Yankees overwhelmed opponents with flawless execution and a balanced attack of pitching, defense and clutch hitting. The club tallied 106 regular season victories before taking four straight from Cincinnati to win the last of four consecutive World Series championships.

Discipline and intensity formed the bedrock of the club's success. Talented young stars—harvested from baseball's most fertile farm system—adopted their veteran teammates' no-nonsense attitude. Manager Joe McCarthy even banned card playing, smoking and radio playing from the team's clubhouse.

The season began with concern over Lou Gehrig's declining on-field performance. His severely diminished skills mystified teammates and sportswriters. The ailing first baseman batted just .143 through the first eight regular season games before benching himself on May 2 to end his streak of 2,130 consecutive games played.

Babe Dahlgren assumed first base duties, and the Yankees hit their stride in May. The team soon made a mockery of the American League pennant race, winning 28-of-32 games through June 4, including a 12-game winning streak. On June 26, the Yankees played the first night game in franchise history at Philadelphia's Shibe Park. Two days later they launched 13 home runs in a doubleheader sweep of the A's (by scores of 23-2 and 10-0).

"It hardly seems necessary to say that the Yankees appear headed for their fourth straight pennant," wrote Richards Vidmer in the *Herald Tribune*. "They have everything that a championship club needs, from pitching to power, defensive skill, leadership and a fine balance of youth and experience."

Indeed, the team's success stemmed from this potent blend. The Yankees scored 967 runs and surrendered 556. The 411 run differential remains a modern era (since 1900) record.

On July 4, a reported 61,808 spectators packed Yankee Stadium for ceremonies honoring Lou Gehrig. The team captain had been diagnosed with Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis (ALS), a terminal illness now commonly called "Lou Gehrig's Disease." The honoree stood silently, with head bowed, through speeches and gift presentations. When he finally addressed the crowd, Gehrig uttered one of the most famous declarations ever made on a baseball field, calling himself "the luckiest man on the face of the Earth." He concluded by offering that "I might have been given a bad break, but I've got an awful lot to live for."

Just one week later, Yankee Stadium hosted the seventh annual All-Star Game on July 11. McCarthy managed an AL starting lineup that included six Yankees—Red Ruffing (P),

Bill Dickey (C), Joe Gordon (2B), Red Rolfe (3B), George Selkirk (LF) and Joe DiMaggio (CF). Gehrig served as honorary captain in the AL's 3-1 victory.

Standout performances powered McCarthy's winning machine in 1939. Dickey (.302, 24HR, 105RBI) had a .403 on-base percentage, and Rolfe (.329, 14HR, 80RBI) paced the AL in runs scored (139), hits (213), and doubles (46), while fielding every inning of every game at third base. Gordon (.284, 28HR, 111RBI) was an All-Star in his second big league season, and rookie outfielder Charlie Keller (.334, 11HR, 83RBI) posted what would be his highest career single-season average. Selkirk (.306, 21HR, 101RBI) scored 103 runs in just 128 games.

Red Ruffing led the staff with a 21-7 mark and posted a 2.93 ERA despite an ailing arm. Six other pitchers each won between 10 and 13 games on an evenly-worked staff that led the AL with a 3.31 ERA and had only two pitchers start more than 20 games or toss more than 154 innings (Ruffing-28GS/233.1IP and Lefty Gomez-26GS/198.0IP).

Of all the 1939 Yankees, Joe DiMaggio's star shone the brightest. Despite a torn leg muscle early in the season, the graceful center fielder batted an AL-best .381 (176-for-462) with 30 home runs and 126 RBI in 120 games, earning his "Yankee Clipper" nickname from radio broadcaster Arch McDonald along the way. With 53 RBI in August, he is one of just two players in MLB history to reach the total in any single calendar month (also the Cubs' Hack Wilson, Aug. 1930). Though DiMaggio's batting average hovered above the .400 mark into early September, a late-season eye infection triggered a

September dip. Nonetheless, he went on to earn the first of three career AL MVP Awards (also 1941 and '47).

The Yankees clinched the AL pennant on Sept. 16 and completed the regular season with a 106-45 record. In the World Series, they dispensed with the Reds in Games 1 and 2 at Yankee Stadium in contests timed at 93 and 87 minutes, respectively. On the road at Crosley Field in Game 3, the Bronx Bombers launched four homers, and in Game 4, the Yankees won on "Lombardi's Snooze," with Charlie Keller crashing into Reds catcher Ernie Lombardi and rendering him temporarily immobile. This allowed three runs to cross the plate in the 10th inning in a 7-4 win, giving the Yankees their eighth Series title.

"One can write of these powerful, amazing Yankees only in superlatives," penned veteran sportswriter Fred Lieb at the end of the season. "They have accomplished feats which only a year ago would have been considered unbelievable. ... They have come closer to perfection than any other club in the first 100 years of baseball. Perhaps in another 100 years the feats of this team will have become legendary. Fans still unborn, thumbing through the records of this decade, will ask: 'Could a team have been that good?'"¹⁸

The 1961 Yankees and Roger Maris' 61-Home Run Season

The 1961 Yankees are considered to be among the greatest teams of all time. Led by Roger Maris, who broke Babe Ruth's all-time single-season home run mark, the club powered their way to the 19th World Series championship in franchise history.

The Yankees finished the regular season with a 109-53 (.673) record, eight games ahead of the 101-61 (.623) Detroit Tigers. The clubs were just 1.5 games apart in the standings heading into the final full month of the season before the Yankees reeled off a 13-game winning streak from Sept. 1-12 to vault an insurmountable 11.5 games in front. Their massive win total was fueled by a 65-16 mark at Yankee Stadium, the best single-season home record in Major League history.

The Yankees had sluggers up and down the lineup, including Moose Skowron (28 HR), Yogi Berra (22 HR), Elston Howard (21 HR) and "Super-sub" Johnny Blanchard, who hit 21 homers in just 243 at-bats. Of the 240 home runs the Yankees hit, 10 were pinch-hit homers, setting a still-standing single-season franchise mark.

The pitching staff was paced by Whitey Ford, who had a career year, going 25-4 with a 3.21 ERA. Under first-year manager Ralph Houk, Ford took the ball every fourth day for the first time in his career and set career highs in wins, winning percentage (.862), starts (39) and innings pitched (283.0), earning the Cy Young Award as the best pitcher in both leagues. Bill Stafford (14-9, 2.68 ERA), Ralph Terry (16-3, 3.15 ERA) and Rollie Sheldon (11-5, 3.60 ERA) were the Yankees' other top starters, and Luis Arroyo picked up 15 wins in relief, the highest total by a reliever in franchise history.

In the World Series, the Yankees triumphed over Cincinnati, 4-games-to-1, as Ford tossed 14.0 combined scoreless innings, earning wins in Game 1 and 4. With the Series knotted at one game apiece, Game 3 proved pivotal. Down, 2-1, heading into the eighth, Blanchard tied the game with a solo homer before Maris hit a game-winning solo shot in the ninth. The Yankees then outscored the Reds 20-5 over the final two contests to win the first of two consecutive World Series titles.

Much of the season's drama centered on the chase by the M&M Boys — Roger Maris and Mickey Mantle — to break Ruth's seemingly untouchable single-season record

of 60 home runs, which he set with the 1927 Yankees. Maris, the American League MVP in 1960 and 1961, was joined in his pursuit by Mantle, who topped out at 54 home runs after sitting out seven of the club's final 10 games with an abscess in his right hip.

Maris tied Ruth's mark on Sept. 26 at Yankee Stadium with a home run off Baltimore's Jack Fisher in the team's 159th game of the season. Needing one homer to break the record with four games to go (the Yankees had played a tie earlier in the year), Maris was given a full game off prior to going homerless in the first two games of a three-game series against Boston at Yankee Stadium.

In the season's final game on Oct. 1, Maris connected in the fourth inning off Tracy Stallard, hitting a line-drive into the right-field stands for his 61st home run, which turned out to be the only run in a 1-0 Yankees victory. The quiet and humble Maris had to be pushed back onto the field by his teammates for his curtain call.

The chase was not without controversy as writers and fans loyal to Ruth clamored that the record should receive a special notation given that the American League was playing a 162-game schedule in 1961 due to the addition of two expansion teams. With the exceptions of 1901-03 and 1918-19, the AL had always played a 154-game format.

Ford Frick, a former sportswriter and New York City sportscares who had previously ghostwritten Ruth's 1928 autobiography *Babe Ruth's Own Book of Baseball*,

was the commissioner of baseball at the time. In the middle of the season, he issued the directive that baseball's official record book, *The Little Red Book of Major League Baseball*, compiled by the *Elias Sports Bureau*, should show two records — one for a 154-game schedule and another for a 162-game schedule. Contrary to popular lore, an asterisk was never used for the notation, and separate designations remained in the official record book until 1991, when Major League Baseball finally rescinded the distinction.

Maris' 61 in 1961 remains the highest single-season home run total in American League history and the seventh-highest single-season total all time, behind those of Barry Bonds (73), Mark McGwire (70, 65) and Sammy Sosa (66, 64 and 63). ✽

The 1998 Yankees - “Most Wins in a Single Season”

The 1998 Yankees were one of the most dominant teams in Major League baseball history. Despite starting the season with a three-game losing streak and dropping four of their first five, they proceeded to go 64-16 dating from their sixth game of the year, marking the best single-season 80-game run in franchise history.

Ultimately, the Yankees finished the regular season 114-48 (.704) and won the AL East by 22.0 games, marking the third-largest margin of any league or division winner in Major League history, behind only Cleveland in 1995 (+30.0) and Pittsburgh in 1902 (+27.5). Their regular season winning percentage trailed only the 1927 Murderers’ Row team (.714) for the best in franchise history, and their 125-50 overall record, including the postseason, marks the most single-season wins by any team all time.

The 1998 club excelled at every facet of the game, leading the American League in runs scored (965), runs per game (5.96), on-base percentage (.364), fewest runs per game allowed (4.05) and ERA (3.82). They ranked second in stolen bases (153) and tallied the league’s third-fewest errors (98). Five members of the club (Scott Brosius, Derek Jeter, Paul O’Neill, David Wells and Bernie Williams) were named to the AL All-Star team.

The club fielded a remarkably balanced lineup as

10 different batters hit at least 10 home runs, with no player hitting more than 28. Additionally, the 1998 club became the first team all time to have eight players hit at least 17 home runs in a single season.

Second baseman Chuck Knoblauch was the team’s leadoff hitter (.265 BA, 117R, 17HR, 64RBI), after being acquired from Minnesota for four players just before the start of spring training. He was followed in the second spot by Jeter, who batted .324 (203-for-626) in posting the first of his eight career 200-hit seasons. The future captain led the AL with 127 runs scored while making his first All-Star team.

O’Neill, Williams and Tino Martinez were the Yankees principal 3-4-5 hitters, though Martinez batted cleanup for stretches, including when Williams was on the disabled list with a sprained right knee from June 11 - July 18. O’Neill, in his sixth year with the club after parts of eight seasons with Cincinnati, batted .317 (191-for-602) with 40 doubles, 24HR and 116RBI, setting career highs in hits and runs scored (95). Williams won his only career batting title, posting a .339 (169-for-499) mark with 26HR, 97RBI and a .422 on-base percentage. He also won a Gold Glove for his play in centerfield.

Martinez led the club with 123RBI and solidified the defense at first base. On the opposite corner, Scott Brosius had a career year, batting .300 (159-for-530) with 19HR and 98RBI, making his only All-Star team. The catching duties were split between Jorge Posada (.268 BA, 17HR and 63RBI in 111 games) in his first year as the first-string backstop and Joe Girardi (.276 BA in 78 games).

One of the hallmarks of the club was its depth. Darryl Strawberry hit 24 home runs in just 295 at-bats and Tim

Raines put up a .395 on-base percentage in 109 games. Rookie Shane Spencer lit up the Bronx with 10 homers in 67 at-bats, including eight after being called up in September and seven in the Yankees’ last 11 games of the season. The bench was so strong that over the course of the season, the substitutes (.370) had a better on-base percentage than the starters (.364).

The pitching staff was anchored by David Cone (20-7, 3.55 ERA in 31GS), who tied for the AL and Major League lead in wins. Lefthander David Wells (18-4, 3.49 ERA in 30GS) led the AL with five shutouts and a 1.05 WHIP. Along with tossing a perfect game on May 17 vs. Minnesota, Wells also had eight complete games during the season, a total that no Yankee has equaled since.

Orlando Hernandez added a boost to the rotation following his June call-up. Signed in March as a free agent from Cuba, “El Duque” went 12-4 with a 3.13 ERA in 21 starts. Andy Pettitte (16-11, 4.24 ERA) and Hideki Irabu (13-9, 4.06 ERA) rounded out the rotation, which often got bailed out by utility pitcher Ramiro Mendoza, who went 10-2 with a 3.25 ERA in 41 appearances, including 14 starts. Mike Stanton (4-1, 5.47 ERA in 67G), Jeff Nelson (5-3, 3.79 ERA in 45G) and lefthanded specialist Graeme Lloyd (3-0, 1.67 ERA in 50G in his best career season) provided the bridge to Mariano Rivera (3-0, 1.91 ERA), who notched 36 saves and allowed just four of 24 inherited runners to score.

In the postseason, the Yankees swept Texas in three games in the ALDS, outscoring them 9-1 and outhitting them 23-13. The ALCS was trickier as Cleveland took a 2-games-to-1 series lead before the Yankees won in six games. David Wells earned MVP honors, winning both of his starts in Game 1 and Game 5.

The Yankees met San Diego in the World Series, and the turning point came early. Down 5-2 in the seventh inning of Game 1 at Yankee Stadium, Knoblauch tied the score with a three-run homer. Five batters later, Tino Martinez hit a two-out, full-count grand slam off Mark Langston into the upper deck in right field to cap a seven-run inning in a 9-6 Yankees win.


The Yankees never looked back. They won Game 2, 9-3, and they took Game 3 due to the heroics of World Series MVP Scott Brosius (.471 BA, 8-for-17, 2HR, 6RBI), who got the Yankees on the board in the seventh with a solo home run and then provided the margin of victory with a three-run homer in the eighth, propelling the Yankees to a 5-4 win.

Andy Pettitte held the Padres scoreless over 7.1 innings in Game 4, which was closed out by Mariano Rivera, who recorded his third save of the series and sixth of the postseason. Rivera tossed 13.1 scoreless innings in 10 appearances during the 1998 postseason, allowing just six hits.

The championship was the Yankees’ second in three years (also in 1996) and the first of three consecutive (1998-2000). It marked the highpoint of one of the greatest eras in club history, establishing the yardstick by which all of baseball’s post-integration teams are measured. 🏆

Official Scoring at Yankee Stadium

The Yankees-Tigers contest at the Polo Grounds on May 15, 1922, might be the most significant game in the history of official scoring. In the second inning that wet day, Yankees shortstop Everett Scott failed to come up with a ground ball off the bat of Ty Cobb. Official scorer John Kieran (the first *Sports of the Times* columnist and founding editor of the *Information Please Almanac*) charged an error on Scott. Glancing over his shoulder as he fled the rain that was blowing into the press box, Fred Lieb (national president of the Baseball Writers Association of America and New York chapter chairman) scored it a hit. It was so reported by the Associated Press, for whom Lieb was compiling the box score. As was the custom, Kieran did not announce his call and Lieb, who was probably more interested at that moment in staying dry, did not ask.

The hit/error mattered — a lot. When official American League statistics were compiled (at the end of the season), the one-hit discrepancy was discovered. Cobb's season average was either .401 or .399. A predictable brouhaha ensued. Despite Lieb's willingness to cede to Kieran's official capacity, and despite the BBWAA's December vote that no hit be awarded, AL president Ban Johnson ordered the record to reflect that Cobb earned a hit and thus a .401 average. So it remains, officially, for all time.

As a result of "The Case of the Two-Point Base Hit" (as it was known), official scorers were instructed to contemporaneously communicate their calls to the press box, and the leagues assured the BBWAA that, in the future, a scorer's judgment would not be questioned.

Scorers' calls on close plays have also had a hand in Yankee Stadium no-hitters (and near misses). Had Lieb scored Whitey Witt's leadoff grounder to third on Sept. 11, 1923, an error and not a hit, Boston's Howard Ehmke would be remembered with Johnny

Vander Meer as hurlers of consecutive no-hitters. And had John Drebingler of *The Times* not changed a hit (originally scored an error) back to an error after consulting during the game with Detroit's Johnny Pesky regarding Phil Rizzuto's fourth-inning grounder to short, Virgil Trucks would have thrown only one no-hitter in 1952.

Dan Daniel of the *World-Telegram* scored many Yankees home games during Joe DiMaggio's 56-game hitting streak in 1941, and according to Jerome Holtzman (later the official historian of Major League Baseball), he awarded at least two arguable hits to help keep the streak alive. Four years later, a reversed call on the last day of the season by Bert Gumpert of the *Bronx Home News* gave Yankees second baseman Snuffy Stirnweiss the hit he needed to edge the White Sox's Tony Cuccinello for the AL batting title by .000087.

The cavalcade of scorers who have worked at Yankee Stadium includes some of the giants of the baseball writers industry: Lieb, Daniel, Sid Mercer (an original BBWAA member in 1908), Frank Graham (Lou Gehrig's first biographer), John Drebingler (who covered 203 consecutive World Series games over 34 years), Dick Young (who covered New York baseball for the *Daily News* and *New York Post* for 44 years), Leonard Koppett (author of *The Thinking Fan's Guide to Baseball*), Jack Lang (BBWAA secretary-treasurer for 22 years), Maury Allen (author of over 30 sports books), Red Foley (senior scorer in New York for 15 years) and Bill Shannon (senior scorer in New York for nine seasons and author of *Official Scoring in the Big Leagues*). ❄

Yankees in Cooperstown

Including 2021 inductee Jim Kaat, there are 58 members of the Baseball Hall of Fame who have played, managed, coached, owned or been a general manager for the Yankees at one time or another. The Yankees' first inductee was Babe Ruth, who entered the Hall in its inaugural 1936 class along with Ty Cobb, Walter Johnson, Christy Mathewson and Honus Wagner. Of recent note, 2019 inductee Mariano Rivera became the first person to be unanimously elected via the writer's ballot, receiving a vote all 425 submissions, and 2020 inductee Derek Jeter was named on all but one ballot (396 of 397).

Along with the 58 individuals below, at least three Hall of Famers worked for the Yankees in other capacities, including Joe Kelley (HOF 1971 — Yankees scout from 1915-25), Dick Williams (HOF 2008 — NYY adviser from 1995-2001) and Pat Gillick (HOF 2011 — NYY scouting director from 1974-76). Additionally, HOFers Joe Medwick and Robin Roberts made the Yankees roster out of spring training in 1947 and 1962, respectively, but neither played in an official game as a Yankee.

The *Elias Sports Bureau* notes that there have been nine HOFers who spent their entire playing careers with the Yankees: Earle Combs, Lou Gehrig, Bill Dickey, Joe DiMaggio, Derek Jeter, Phil Rizzuto, Whitey Ford, Mickey Mantle and Mariano Rivera.

Currently, the choice of which insignia appears on the cap of each Hall of Famer's plaque belongs to the Hall of Fame itself. The decision is based on the "historical accomplishments" of the player and "where that player makes his most indelible mark," though the wishes of the inductee are always considered. It is important to remember that caps have not always had insignias and some players' images are cast as profiles without visible insignias.

Yankees Retired Uniform Numbers

Including the impending retirement of Paul O'Neill's No. 21 on August 21, 2022, the Yankees have retired 22 uniform numbers to honor 23 Yankees players and managers. The first player so honored was Lou Gehrig, whose No. 4, was the first retired number in MLB history. Contrary to popular belief, the number was not retired on July 4, 1939 (when the Iron Horse gave his famous "Luckiest Man" speech), but on Jan. 6, 1940, via announcement by team president Ed Barrow.

On April 15, 1997, Major League Baseball retired No. 42 throughout the game to honor the Dodgers' Jackie Robinson. While the number could never again be issued by an MLB team, players already assigned No. 42 could continue to wear it. Mariano Rivera was grandfathered into that decision and was the last active player to use the number. During a pregame celebration on Sept. 22, 2013 (one week prior to his last day in uniform), the Yankees organization also retired the number for him, placing a Yankees-style "42" within the Yankees Retired Number Display in Monument Park. As part of that ceremony, the Yankees also recognized Robinson by unveiling a new bronze plaque to replace the Dodgers-style "42" which had previously been on display.



1 Billy Martin (Number retired: August 10, 1986)

Born: May 16, 1928 in Berkeley, Calif. • **Died:** Dec. 25, 1989 in Binghamton, N.Y.
Height: 5-11 • **Weight:** 165 • **B/T:** R/R

Martin had as much "Yankees Pride" as any player or manager to wear pinstripes, and he implanted his own fierce desire to win in his teams. He played an integral part in four World Series in the 1950s as a player, and added another ring managing the Yankees in 1977. His .333 lifetime World Series batting average is sixth all time among players with at least 75 at-bats. Martin had five separate stints managing the club.



2 Derek Jeter (Number retired: May 14, 2017)

Born: June 26, 1974 in Pequannock, N.J.
Height: 6-3 • **Weight:** 195 • **B/T:** R/R

The face of baseball for a generation of fans, Jeter played a franchise-record 20 seasons with the Yankees from 1995-2014, retiring with a personal career winning percentage of .593 (1,628-1,117-2) and five World Series championships (1996, 1998-2000, '09). A 14-time All-Star and 2020 Hall of Fame inductee, Jeter retired with the sixth-most hits in baseball history (3,465) and played in 16 different postseasons. He tops the Yankees' all-time list in hits, games played (2,747), doubles (544), steals (358), at-bats (11,195), singles (2,595) and hit-by-pitches (170).



3 Babe Ruth (Number retired: June 13, 1948)

Born: Feb. 6, 1895 in Baltimore, Md. • **Died:** Aug. 16, 1948 in New York, N.Y.
Height: 6-2 • **Weight:** 215 • **B/T:** L/L

Most consider Ruth the most colorful figure in the game's history. He started his career as a pitcher for the Boston Red Sox, winning 89 games over six seasons before converting to a full-time outfielder because of his tremendous power. He was sold to the Yankees in 1920 and his 54 home runs that year were more than any other American League team. En route to 714 career home runs, he won 12 home run titles, including 60HR in 1927. A member of the inaugural class of Hall of Fame inductees in 1936, the Bambino also added 15HR in World Series competition, leading the Yankees to seven Series appearances and four World Championships.



4 Lou Gehrig (Number retired by announcement on Jan. 6, 1940. No ceremony)

Born: June 19, 1903 in New York, N.Y. • **Died:** June 2, 1941 in Riverdale, N.Y.
Height: 6-1 • **Weight:** 212 • **B/T:** L/L

Gehrig was a uniquely durable, powerhitting first baseman who played in 2,130 consecutive games from 1925 to 1939. He drove in at least 100 runs in 13 straight seasons (1926-38) and holds the AL record with 184 RBI in 1931. In a career shortened by terminal illness, he compiled a .340 batting avg. with 493 HRs, two AL MVP Awards (1927, '36) and the 1934 Triple Crown. He was honored at Yankee Stadium on July 4, 1939, when he made his memorable "Luckiest Man" speech. That offseason, the Yankees announced that his No. 4 was being retired. He was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1939, and was immortalized in the 1942 film, *The Pride of the Yankees*, starring Gary Cooper.



5 Joe DiMaggio (Number retired: April 18, 1952 at the home opener)

Born: Nov. 25, 1914 in Martinez, Calif. • **Died:** March 8, 1999 in Hollywood, Fla.
Height: 6-2 • **Weight:** 193 • **B/T:** R/R

The "Yankee Clipper" is considered by many experts as the best all-around baseball player in history. The California native was a sensational hitter for both average and power, and a splendid, graceful, ball-hawking center fielder with a powerful and accurate arm. A two-time batting champion and three-time MVP, he compiled a .325 lifetime batting average from 1936 to 1951 and powered the Yankees to nine World Series titles despite losing three complete seasons (1943-45) to military service. Many rate his 56-game hitting streak in 1941 as the top baseball feat of all time. He was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1955.



**6****Joe Torre** (Number retired: August 23, 2014)**Born:** July 18, 1940 in Brooklyn, N.Y.
Height: 6-2 • **Weight:** 212 • **B/T:** R/R

With a calming influence in the clubhouse and a stoic outward expression in the dugout, Torre piloted the Yankees to six World Series appearances (1996, '98-2001, '03) and four championships (1996, '98-2000) during his tenure from 1996-2007. The 2014 Hall of Famer led the club to the playoffs in all 12 seasons at the helm, going 1,173-767-2 (.605) in the regular season and 76-47 (.618) in the postseason, including a 21-11 mark in the World Series. His regular season wins total is second in club history to Joe McCarthy, who went 1,460-867-21 over 16 seasons.

**7****Mickey Mantle** (Number retired: June 8, 1969)**Born:** Oct. 20, 1931 in Spavinaw, Okla. • **Died:** Aug. 13, 1995 in Dallas, Tex.
Height: 6-0 • **Weight:** 201 • **B/T:** S/R

"The Mick" was the most feared hitter on some of the most successful teams in history. Fast and powerful, his reported 565-foot home run in Washington in 1953 brought about the term "tape-measure home run." In the 14 seasons between 1951 and 1964, he led the Yanks to 12 Fall Classics and seven World Championships. He still owns records for most homers, RBI, runs and walks in World Series play. In 1956, Mantle had one of the greatest seasons ever at the plate, hitting 52 homers with 130RBI and a .353 average to win the Triple Crown. A three-time AL MVP (1956-57, '62), he was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1974.

**8****Yogi Berra** (Number retired: July 22, 1972 on Old-Timers' Day)**Born:** May 12, 1925 in St. Louis, Mo. • **Died:** Sept. 22, 2015 in West Caldwell, N.J.
Height: 5-8 • **Weight:** 191 • **B/T:** L/R


Beloved by generations of baseball fans, Berra was part of the foundation of the dominant Yankees teams from the end of World War II through the early 1960s. Although he never led the league in a single major offensive category, he is one of just 11 players all time to win at least three Most Valuable Player Awards. Selected to play in the All-Star Game in 15 successive seasons from 1948-62, he played on 14 pennant winners and an all-time record 10 World Champions. He led the Yankees to the 1964 pennant as manager and was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1972.

**8****Bill Dickey** (Number retired: July 22, 1972 on Old-Timers' Day)**Born:** June 6, 1907 in Bastrop, La. • **Died:** Nov. 12, 1993 in Little Rock, Ark.
Height: 6-1 • **Weight:** 185 • **B/T:** L/R

Regarded as one of the greatest catchers of all time, Dickey was a durable and tireless worker, catching more than 100 games in an AL-record 13 consecutive seasons (1929-41). In 1931, he did not allow a single passed ball in 125 games behind the plate, another AL record. Dickey also excelled as a hitter, batting over .300 in 10 of his first 11 full seasons, while hitting 202 homers during his career. He handled Yankees pitching staffs on eight World Series teams, winning seven championships. He was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1954.

**9****Roger Maris** (Number retired: July 21, 1984 on Old-Timers' Day)**Born:** Sept. 10, 1934 in Hibbing, Minn. • **Died:** Dec. 14, 1985 in Houston, Tex.
Height: 6-0 • **Weight:** 197 • **B/T:** L/R

In one of the most dramatic assaults on a baseball record, Maris surpassed Babe Ruth's single-season record of 60 home runs on the final day of the 1961 season. Maris' 61 homers that season was a Major League record until 1998 and still remains the American League mark. A two-time American League MVP (1960-61), he is considered one of the best defensive right fielders in Yankees history.

**10****Phil Rizzuto** (Number retired: Aug. 4, 1985)**Born:** Sept. 25, 1917 in New York, N.Y. • **Died:** Aug. 13, 2007 in West Orange, N.J.
Height: 5-6 • **Weight:** 150 • **B/T:** R/R

Playing 13 years for the Yankees, the "Scooter" went to nine World Series, winning seven. Diminutive yet tough, he was a skilled bunter and baserunner with a .273 career batting average. In 1950, Rizzuto earned the AL MVP Award, batting .324 with 200 hits, 92 walks and 125 runs. In the 1951 World Series, he batted .320 and was named Series MVP. He also spent 40 years as a Yankees broadcaster (1957-96) tossing around his signature phrase, "Holy cow!" and calling his partners "Huckleberry." He was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1994.

**15****Thurman Munson** (Number retired by announcement on Aug. 3, 1979)**Born:** June 7, 1947 in Akron, Ohio • **Died:** Aug. 2, 1979 in Canton, Ohio
Height: 5-11 • **Weight:** 190 • **B/T:** R/R

Munson was the undisputed leader and most respected man on Yankees teams that won three consecutive AL pennants from 1976-78 and two World Championships in '77 and '78. He was a tremendous defensive catcher, winning three straight Gold Glove Awards (1973-75) and the AL MVP in 1976. In each season from 1975-77, Thurman drove in more than 100 runs and hit better than .300. There is no more tragic date in Yankees history than August 2, 1979, when Munson passed away in a plane crash at age 32.





16 Whitey Ford (Number retired: Aug. 3, 1974 on Old-Timers' Day)

Born: Oct. 21, 1928 in New York, N.Y. • **Died:** Oct. 8, 2020 in Lake Success, N.Y.
Height: 5-10 • **Weight:** 181 • **B/T:** L/L

Over 16 seasons, he posted a 236-106 (.690) career record with a 2.75 ERA, playing for 11 pennant winners and earning six World Series rings (1950, '53, '56, '58, '61-62). Ford owns franchise marks for wins, IP (3,170.1) and shutouts (45), and is second in strikeouts (1,958). He was a 10-time All-Star, having paced the AL in wins three times and leading in both ERA and shutouts twice. The 1961 Cy Young winner and WS MVP still holds many lifetime WS records, including for wins (10), consec. scoreless IP (33.0) and strikeouts (94). He was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1974.



20 Jorge Posada (Number retired: Aug. 22, 2015)

Born: Aug. 17, 1971 in Santurce, P.R.
Height: 6-2 • **Weight:** 215 • **B/T:** S/R


One of the best-hitting catchers of his era, Posada spent each of his 17 Major League seasons with the Yankees, batting .273 with 379 doubles, 275 HR, 1,065 RBI, a .374 OBP and .848 OPS in 1,829 games from 1995-2011. A player on five World Series winners (1996, '98, '99, 2000, '09), Posada was also a five-time All-Star and five-time Silver Slugger winner. He is one of just seven catchers all time to have at least 11 seasons of 17-or-more HRs.



21 Paul O'Neill (Number to be retired: Aug. 21, 2022)

Born: Feb. 25, 1963 in Columbus, Ohio
Height: 6-4 • **Weight:** 200 • **B/T:** L/L

O'Neill spent the final nine seasons of his 17-year Major League career in the Bronx (1993-2001), winning four World Series with the Yankees (1996, '98-2000) and appearing in a fifth (2001). As a Yankee, he hit .303 with 304 doubles, 185 home runs, 858 runs batted in, a .377 on-base percentage and an .869 OPS, claiming the AL batting title in 1994 with a .359 average. Known for his powerful throwing arm from RF, he was a four-time All-Star with the Yankees (1994-95, '97-98).



23 Don Mattingly (Number retired: Aug. 31, 1997)

Born: April 20, 1961 in Evansville, Ill.
Height: 6-0 • **Weight:** 185 • **B/T:** L/L

Respected for his talent, professionalism and humility, "Donnie Baseball" was the premier first baseman of the mid-1980s before back problems robbed him of much of his power at age 29. Nevertheless, he remained the most loved Yankee of his era and a defensive star, tallying nine Gold Gloves in his 14 years in pinstripes (1982-95). The "Hit Man" won the 1984 AL batting title (.343) and the 1985 American League MVP (.324, 35HR, 145RBI), setting the (since-tied) all-time record with six grand slams in a single season.



32 Elston Howard (Number retired: July 21, 1984 on Old-Timers' Day)

Born: Feb. 23, 1929 in St. Louis, Mo. • **Died:** Dec. 14, 1980 in New York, N.Y.
Height: 6-2 • **Weight:** 196 • **B/T:** R/R

Howard became the first black player in Yankees history when he made the club in the spring of 1955. The versatile, two-time Gold Glove Award-winning catcher contributed to nine AL pennant-winning teams in his first 10 seasons with the club. Winner of the 1963 American League MVP (.287, 28HR, 85RBI), Howard was elected to the All-Star Game in nine different seasons (1957-65). A clubhouse leader as a player from 1955-67 and as a Yankees coach from 1969-79, his dignified manner and competitive spirit set a powerful example.



37 Casey Stengel (Number retired: Aug. 8, 1970 on Old-Timers' Day)

Born: July 30, 1890 in Kansas City, Mo. • **Died:** Sept. 29, 1975 in Glendale, Calif.
Height: 5-11 • **Weight:** 175 • **B/T:** L/L

In a distinguished 54-year professional career, "The Old Perfessor" became one of the game's greatest managers. His feat of guiding the Yankees to 10 pennants and seven world titles in a 12-year span from 1949-60 ranks as one of the top managerial accomplishments of all time. Simply put, Casey Stengel was one of the best things to ever happen to the game of Baseball. He was an authentic baseball ambassador, making the game fun for millions of Americans. He was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1966.



42 Mariano Rivera (Number retired by MLB on Apr. 15, 1997. Rivera recognized by NYY on Sept. 22, 2013)

Born: Nov. 29, 1969 in Panama City, Panama • **Height:** 6-2 • **Weight:** 195 • **B/T:** R/R

Rivera is the Majors' all-time leader with 652 career saves. Even more impressive is his 2.21 career ERA, which is the second-lowest mark among pitchers with at least 1,000.0IP since ERA became an official MLB statistic (1912-NL/1913-AL). The "Sandman" pitched 19 seasons, racking up an all-time best 15 seasons of at least 30 saves in 1,115 career games. His postseason dominance is legendary, including MLB record marks with 42 postseason saves, a 0.70 ERA (min: 30.0IP) and 96 appearances. In 141.0 career postseason IP, he allowed just 86H, 11ER, 21BB and 2HR with 110K. He won five World Series (1996, '98-2000, '09) and appeared in two others (2001, '03).





44 Reggie Jackson (Number retired: August 14, 1993)

Born: May 18, 1946 in Wyncote, Pa.
Height: 5-10 • **Weight:** 181 • **B/T:** L/L


"Mr. October" blasted 563 career home runs, including 144 as a Yankee from 1977-81. In Game 6 of the 1977 World Series, Jackson hit 3HR, all on the first pitch, as the Yankees beat the Dodgers to wrap up the club's first World Championship since 1962. He was an All-Star in each of his five years in pinstripes and had his best year with the club in 1980 (.300, 41HR, 111RBI), finishing second in AL MVP voting. Jackson said, "Some people call October a time of pressure. I call it a time of character." He was inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1993.



46 Andy Pettitte (Number retired: August 23, 2015)

Born: June 15, 1972 in Baton Rouge, La.
Height: 6-5 • **Weight:** 225 • **B/T:** L/L

Reliable and consistent throughout his career, Pettitte pitched 15 seasons with the club (1995-2003, '07-10, '12-13), going 219-127 with a 3.94 ERA (447G/438GS, 2,796.1IP, 2,020K). The left-hander is the franchise leader in strikeouts and is tied with Whitey Ford for the most starts. He trails only Ford (236 wins, 3,171.OIP) and Red Ruffing (231 wins, 3,168.OIP) in wins and innings pitched. A three-time AL All-Star (1996, 2001 and '10), Pettitte is the only pitcher drafted by the Yankees to win 200 games in the Majors. As a Yankee, Pettitte went 18-10 with a 3.76 ERA (251.1IP, 105ER) in 40 career postseason starts, winning five World Series titles (1996, '98-2000, '09). He famously started and won all three series-clinching games in the 2009 postseason.



49 Ron Guidry (Number retired: August 23, 2003)

Born: Aug. 28, 1950 in Lafayette, La.
Height: 5-11 • **Weight:** 165 • **B/T:** L/L

Known as "Louisiana Lightning," Ron Guidry was a four-time All-Star and three-time 20-game winner whose 1978 season was one of the most dominant by a pitcher in MLB history. He went 25-3 with a 1.74 ERA in leading the Yankees back from a 14.0-game AL East deficit and winning the AL Cy Young Award in unanimous fashion. He also set still-standing franchise records with nine shutouts, 248 total strikeouts and 18 strikeouts in a single game (June 17 vs. California). From 1986 through his retirement in 1989, "Gator" also served as a co-captain with Willie Randolph. He remains in the Yankees' all-time top 10 in games started (323), innings pitched (2,392.0), wins (170), winning percentage (.651), strikeouts (1,778) and shutouts (26).



51 Bernie Williams (Number retired: May 24, 2015)

Born: Sept. 13, 1968 in San Juan, P.R.
Height: 6-2 • **Weight:** 205 • **B/T:** S/R

Williams played his entire 16-year MLB career with the Yankees (1991-2006), batting .297 (2,336-for-7,869) with 449 doubles, 278HR and 1,257RBI in 2,076 games. A five-time AL All-Star (1997-2001), four-time Gold Glove winner (1997-2000) and one-time Silver Slugger Award recipient (2002), Williams won the 1998 AL batting title with a .339 average. A four-time World Series champion (1996, '98, '99, 2000), he is the Yankees' all-time postseason leader in HR (22) and RBI (80) and ranks third in games played (121). He was named the 1996 ALCS MVP after batting .474 (9-for-19) with 2HR and 6RBI in the Yankees' five-game victory over the Orioles. In Game 1 of the 1999 ALCS vs. Boston, he hit a memorable 10th-inning, "walk-off" home run.



World War I Service

According to Marty Apple's book *Pinstriped Empire*, the following Yankees went into the armed forces in WWI: Walter Bernhardt, Neil Brady, Alex Ferguson, Ray Fisher, Frank Kane, Bill Lamar, Bob McGraw, Ed Monroe, Willie Papp, Muddy Ruel, Bob Shawkey, Walt Smallwood, Sammy Vick and Aaron Ward.

Future Yankees who served in WWI included Carl Mays, Mike McNally, Herb Pennock, Urban Shocker, Ernie Shore and Casey Stengel. Former Yankees Les Nunamaker and Fritz Maisel also served in the "Great War."

Additional research shows that Tom Burr, a Chicago native who attended Chicago Prep in Connecticut and Williams College, is the only Yankee to have been killed in military service. He was a defensive replacement for the Yankees in one game on April 21, 1914 vs. Washington in his only Major League appearance. He was killed in an air training accident on Oct. 12, 1918, in Cazaux, France at age 24.

Yankees Captains

The function of a team captain in baseball has changed over time. Early 20th century baseball rules required teams to designate an active, uniformed player as captain to do many things a modern-day manager typically would take care of, such as changing pitchers, positioning fielders and arguing with umpires. Non-playing managers at that time were limited to directing players from within the confines of the dugout. By the mid-1910s, however, managers assumed the modern responsibilities they have today, and the designation of captain became largely ceremonial. (Please note that extensive research efforts have not uncovered if the Yankees had a captain in 1912. Additionally, Everett Scott filled the role of captain during the 1922 and 1923 World Series.)

All-Time Numerical Roster

In 1929, the New York Yankees and Cleveland Indians became the first teams to make numbers a permanent part of the uniform. Other teams quickly adopted the idea and, by 1932, uniform numbers became standard for all teams. The Yankees' initial distribution of numbers was made according to the player's spot in the batting order. Therefore, in 1929, leadoff hitter Earle Combs wore No. 1; Mark Koenig No. 2; Babe Ruth No. 3; Lou Gehrig No. 4; Bob Meusel No. 5; Tony Lazzeri No. 6; Leo Durocher No. 7; Johnny Grabowski No. 8; Benny Bengough No. 9; and Bill Dickey No. 10 (Grabowski, Bengough and Dickey shared catching duties). After some exhaustive research, the Yankees' Media Relations staff compiled the following list of Yankees uniform numbers.



OPENING DAY HOME RUNS

The Yankees have hit 108 Opening Day home runs in franchise history by 66 different players (most recently by Gary Sánchez in 2021 in a 3-2, 10-inn. loss vs. Toronto). Giancarlo Stanton was the last Yankee to homer *twice* on Opening Day (3/29/18 at Toronto, including one in his first PA as a Yankee). Babe Ruth hit a franchise-high five OD-HRs, and he is followed by Yogi Berra, Mickey Mantle and Jorge Posada (4HR each), and Ruth, Berra and Posada share the Yankees mark having homered in four different OD games.



Posada and Curtis Granderson (2010 at Boston) are the most recent pair of Yankees to hit back-to-back homers in an opener, and they were the first Yankees to accomplish the feat since Dave Winfield and Steve Kemp in 1983 at Seattle.



The 1923 Yankees — The first World Series-winning team in franchise history

Led by Manager Miller Huggins, the 1923 Yankees went 98-54 during the regular season before winning the first World Series in franchise history, 4-games-to-2 over the New York Giants. The season was a turning point for the Yankees in many ways, most notably because it marked the inaugural season of the original Yankee Stadium. The victory also established the Yankees as New York City's dominant team after losses to John McGraw's Giants in the prior two Fall Classics, 5-games-to-3 in 1921 and 4-games-to-0 (with one tie) in 1922.







First Home Runs in Franchise History

The first home run in franchise history was hit by John Ganzel on May 11, 1903. It was a fifth-inning, inside-the-park, solo homer at the Detroit Tigers' Bennett Park off George Mullin in an 8-2 Highlanders victory.

The first home run hit at home in franchise history was by Ernie Courtney on June 1, 1903, at Hilltop Park off Boston's Tom Hughes. The two-run, one-out homer in the bottom of the ninth accounted for the Highlanders' only runs in an 8-2 loss.



1921 American League Champion Yankees The first pennant-winning team in franchise history

The Yankees won their first American League pennant in 1921, finishing 98-55, 4.5 games ahead of Cleveland. The club was led by Babe Ruth, who batted .378 (204-for-540) with 59HR and a career-high 171RBI. Carl Mays (27-5), Waite Hoyt (19-13) and Bob Shawkey (18-12) fronted a pitching staff that allowed the fewest earned runs in the American League (579). In the World Series, the last of Baseball's three-year experiment with a nine-game format, the Yankees were defeated 5-games-to-3 by the Giants, with whom they shared the Polo Grounds. Hoyt, who lost Game 8, 1-0, on an unearned run in the first inning, went 2-1 (27.0IP) in three complete games. Injuries suffered by Ruth in Game 2 (cut arm while sliding, which later became infected) and Game 5 (wrenched knee) limited him to just one pinch-hitting plate appearance in the final three games of the Series.

Reynolds also is one of only five pitchers all time to throw two 9.0-inning no-hitters in the same season (also Johnny Vander Meer-1938 w/ CIN; Virgil Trucks-1952 w/ DET; Nolan Ryan-1973 w/CAL; and Max Scherzer-2015 w/WSH).

Over the first 9.0 innings of the game, Hughes allowed just one baserunner to reach (on a throwing error by 3B Jimmy Austin in the seventh). Perfect Games

Don Larsen - Oct. 8, 1956

World Series Game 5 vs. Brooklyn at Yankee Stadium

With the 1956 World Series knotted at two games apiece, Don Larsen authored what many consider the greatest game ever pitched, a 2-0 perfect game over the Brooklyn Dodgers in front of 64,519 at Yankee Stadium.

Amazingly, Larsen didn't even know he was going to be pitching that day until he got to the Stadium. As was the Yankees' tradition at the time, he arrived in the clubhouse to find a brand new baseball placed in one of his shoes by coach Frank Crosetti, which was manager Casey Stengel's way of letting a pitcher know he was being tabbed to start.

Larsen's date with history came on the heels of a disastrous start in Game 2 in which he was pulled with a 6-1 lead with two out in the second inning. He faced just 10 batters in the outing, allowing four unearned runs on four walks and a single in a game that the Yankees ultimately lost, 13-8.

After realizing he was getting the Game 5 start, Larsen went into the training room and took a nap, only to be awakened less than an hour before the first pitch.

According to the 6-foot-4-inch righthander, he had the best control of his career on that October day, reaching three balls once in the entire game with a full count on Pee Wee Reese in the first inning.

The perfect game was preserved by three notable fielding plays. In the second inning, Jackie Robinson was retired on a groundout that ricocheted off 3B Andy Carey's glove to SS Gil McDougald, who threw out the speedy infielder at first. Additionally, Brooklyn's Gil Hodges was robbed twice, first on a fly to deep left center that was tracked down by CF Mickey Mantle and again in the eighth by Carey on a low liner.

Brooklyn starter Sal Maglie held the first 11 Yankees batters off the bases until Mantle's fourth-inning solo homer into the right-field stands. The balance of the scoring came on Hank Bauer's sixth-inning RBI single which brought in Carey, who had been advanced to second on a sac bunt by Larsen.

In the ninth, Larsen set down Carl Furillo on a fly to right before getting Roy Campanella on a grounder to 2B Billy Martin. As his last gasp, Dodgers manager Walter Alston sent pinch-hitter Dale Mitchell to bat but he was famously called out on strikes by National League umpire Babe Pinelli, who was calling his final game behind the plate after a distinguished career.

The momentum from the win did not carry over to Game 6 at Ebbets Field as Yankees starter Bob Turley lost a 10-inning duel with Brooklyn's Clem Labine, 1-0. Game 7, however, was a romp as sophomore pitcher Johnny Kucks tossed the game of his life, shutting out the Dodgers, 9-0, on three hits and three walks to give the Yankees' their 17th World Championship and avenge their seven-game Series loss to Brooklyn in 1955.

Larsen's performance was the sixth perfect game all time, fourth in the modern era and first since the White Sox's Charlie Robertson blanked Detroit, 2-0, on April 30, 1922, at Navin Field. It remains the only perfect game in postseason history.

Larsen played with seven franchises over his 14-year Major League career, finishing with an 81-91 record. He tallied a 45-24 mark in five seasons with the Yankees before being part of the Dec. 11, 1959, trade that brought Roger Maris to New York from the Kansas City Athletics.

David Wells — May 17, 1998 vs. Minnesota at Yankee Stadium

The 1998 season was full of highlights for the Yankees, a team that went 114-48 on the way to a World Series title. But one of the season's signature moments came on "Beanie Baby Day" in front of 49,820 fans at Yankee Stadium when David Wells pitched the second perfect game in franchise history, matching the feat of Don Larsen, who, like Wells, attended Point Loma H.S. in San Diego.

By the time the game rolled around to the seventh, Wells and his teammates were well aware of what was taking place. The only player willing to talk to him was pitcher David Cone, who tried to ease the tension by saying, "I think it's time...to break out the knuckleball!"

The 34-year-old lefthander struck out nine of his first 17 hitters and 11 over the game, including Twins catcher Javier Valentin three times. He reached three balls on just four batters.

The Yankees gave Wells an early lead, scoring runs on a wild pitch in the second and a Bernie Williams solo-HR in the fourth. They tacked on two more in the seventh on an RBI triple by Darryl Strawberry and an RBI single from Chad Curtis.

In the ninth, Wells got leadoff hitter Jon Shave to pop to Paul O'Neill in right and Valentin to strike out swinging. Pat Meares made the final out, flying out to O'Neill. Delirious fans cheered Wells being carried off the field on his teammates' shoulders. Then they filed out too, clutching their Beanie Babies.

David Cone — July 18, 1999 vs. Montreal at Yankee Stadium

Fans arrived at Yankee Stadium on July 18, 1999, to celebrate Yogi Berra Day, but they left saluting David Cone. The righthander needed just 88 pitches to throw the third perfect game in Yankees history in front of 41,930 fans and a host of legendary Yankees, including Don Larsen, who threw out the game's ceremonial first pitch.

On a day in which the temperature hovered in the 90s, the Yankees gave Cone a 5-0 second-inning lead via a pair of two-run homers from Ricky Ledee and Derek Jeter sandwiched around an RBI-double by Joe Girardi.

Cone's masterpiece, just one season removed from David Wells' perfect game at Yankee Stadium, was a picture of economy. Of the last 20 regular season and postseason perfect games thrown since 1922, Cone required the fewest pitches. It also gave the Yankees a record three perfect games in their history, a mark since tied by the White Sox (Charlie Robertson, Mark Buehrle and Philip Humber). It was the third perfect game at the original Yankee Stadium—the most for any single venue.

Over the course of the game, Cone got 13 outs in the air, four on the ground and 10 via strikeout. The closest he came to allowing a baserunner was with one out in the eighth, when second baseman Chuck Knoblauch made a nice play ranging far to his right before throwing out Jose Vidro at first. The final out was a foul pop to third off the bat of Orlando Cabrera, which was snagged by the sure-handed Scott Brosius. Cone's gem remains the only perfect game in the history of regular season Interleague Play.

All-Star Selections and Starts

The Yankees have had 433 all-time All-Star selections (56 pitchers with 138 selections; and 76 position players with 295 selections). Additionally, the AL team has been skipped by nine different Yankee managers on 32 total occasions.

According to Major League Baseball, on three occasions Yankees elected to start the game were ultimately replaced in the starting lineup (OF Reggie Jackson by Fred Lynn in 1978, SS Derek Jeter by Asdrubal Cabrera in 2011, and 3B Alex Rodriguez by Adrian Beltre in 2011). Conversely, there have been five Yankees who have started the game after replacing the originally elected starters (Bobby Murcer replacing Tony Oliva in the OF in 1971, Thurman Munson replacing Carlton Fisk at C in 1974, Willie Randolph replacing Paul Molitor at 2B in 1980, Graig Nettles replacing George Brett at 3B in 1980, and Derek Jeter replacing Alex Rodriguez at SS in 2000).

There have been 12 Yankee rookies selected to the ASG (Joe DiMaggio-1936, Joe Page-1944, Spec Shea-1947, Bobby Richardson-1957, Ryne Duren-1958, Tom Tresh-1962, Willie Randolph-1976, Hideki Matsui-2003, Dellin Betances-2014, Masahiro Tanaka-2014, Aaron Judge-2017 and Gleyber Torres-2018).

In 1939, Lou Gehrig (who retired earlier that season) was named an honorary AL team member. That selection is not included in totals below.

Formal balloting was not conducted by Major League Baseball in 1945, when the All-Star Game was canceled due to WWII travel restrictions. The AP polled 13 of 16 AL managers who unofficially voted RHP Hank Borowy, 1B Nick Etten, 2B Snuffy Stirnweiss and 3B Oscar Grimes as All-Stars, with the former three as starters. However, the 1945 voting was unofficial and is not included in the totals below.

Two All-Star Games were played each year from 1959-62. Games participated in are noted with "G1" and/or "G2". There was no game in 2020.

Since the game originated in 1933, the Yankees have had the most All-Star players (132) and most total All-Star selections (433) of any Major League franchise... the Yankees have had two ASG MVPs — Derek Jeter (2000) and Mariano Rivera (2013)... Yankees pitcher Lefty Gomez is the only pitcher in All-Star Game history to earn three wins (1933, '35, '37), having made five career All-Star starts... Babe Ruth hit the first-ever All-Star homer in 1933 off the Cardinals' Bill Hallahan... Joe DiMaggio-1936, Hideki Matsui-2003 and Aaron Judge-2017 own the distinction of being the only Yankees rookies to start for the American League... Judge totaled 4,488,702 fan votes in 2017 to become the first Yankee since Derek Jeter (2009) to lead the AL in balloting... Jeter's 481 (13-for-27) career All-Star average is second all time among batters with at least 15 All-Star ABs, trailing only Detroit's Charlie Gehringer (.500, 10-for-20).

All-Star MVPs

(Award given since 1962)

Derek Jeter and **Mariano Rivera** are the only Yankees to be named All-Star MVP. Jeter took home the honor at the 2000 All-Star Game at Turner Field in Atlanta with a 3-for-3 performance with 1R, 1 double and 2RBI. He doubled in the first inning off Randy Johnson, singled and scored in the third off Kevin Brown and had a two-run single in the fourth off Al Leiter in the American League's 6-3 win. Rivera received the honor at the 2013 Midsummer Classic at Citi Field, tossing a scoreless eighth inning (Jean Segura groundout to 2B, Allen Craig lineout to LF, Carlos Gomez groundout to SS) in the AL's 3-0 win.



All-Star Games at the Original Yankee Stadium

The Yankees have hosted four All-Star Games, including the 2008 Midsummer Classic in the original Yankee Stadium's final season. The Stadium also hosted the All-Star Game in 1977 (48th), 1960 (29th) and 1939 (seventh). Only Cleveland's old Municipal Stadium hosted as many All-Star Games as the original Yankee Stadium. Overall, New York City has hosted nine MLB All-Star Games, the highest total in Major League history, with the Polo Grounds (1934 and 1942), Ebbets Field (1949), Shea Stadium (1964) and Citi Field (2013) also serving as host sites. The 2008 game marked the first time the Midsummer Classic was held in the host team's final season at its ballpark.

Seventh All-Star Game

American League 3, National League 1
July 11, 1939, Yankee Stadium



Yankee Stadium was chosen to host the 1939 All-Star Game due to the World's Fair which was being held at Flushing Meadows in Queens during the 1939 season. The Cubs' Gabby Hartnett managed the National League squad while Yankees skipper Joe McCarthy led the American League team, which featured nine Yankees All-Stars (Crosetti, Dickey, Dimaggio, Gomez, Gordon, Murphy, Rolfe, Ruffing, Selkirk), six of whom started. Additionally, Lou Gehrig (who retired earlier that season) was named an honorary member of the AL squad. Yankees centerfielder Joe DiMaggio went 1-for-4 in the game, hitting a solo home run.

29th All-Star Game

National League 6, American League 0
July 13, 1960 (Game #2), Yankee Stadium



Yankee Stadium was the host site for baseball's second All-Star Game in three days in 1960. The National League completed the All-Star sweep with a 6-0 win, having won Game 1 on July 11 in Kansas City, marking the only year that both All-Star games were won by the same team. Yankees hurler Whitey Ford was the starting pitcher for the AL squad, while fellow Yankees Yogi Berra (catcher), Mickey Mantle (left field), Roger Maris (center field) and Bill Skowron (first base) all appeared in the starting lineup. The National League used six different pitchers to combine on the shutout effort and hit a then-All-Star record-tying four home runs, including one by Willie Mays. The 38,000 fans who attended the game witnessed Ted Williams in his final All-Star appearance.

Showcasing its renovation, Yankee Stadium hosted the All-Star Game on July 19, 1977, in a game dedicated to Jackie Robinson. With the Yankees defending their 1976 pennant, Billy Martin managed the AL team on his home field. The National League won its sixth consecutive All-Star Game, part of the Senior Circuit's 11-game win streak. Joe Morgan opened the game with a home run off Jim Palmer as the NL squad scored four first-inning runs. Yankees outfielder Reggie Jackson and second baseman Willie Randolph were AL starters. National League Manager Sparky Anderson described the game's final score by saying, "the only reason we're here is to kick the living hell out of those guys."

79th All-Star Game

In the final Midsummer Classic at the original Yankee Stadium, the American League emerged with a 4-3 win in 15 innings as Texas' Michael Young brought home Minnesota's Justin Morneau with a "walk-off" sacrifice fly. The 4-hour, 50-minute contest was the longest All-Star Game time-wise and tied for the longest ASG in innings (also 1967 at Anaheim, 2-1 NL win). It was the AL's 12th straight All-Star Game victory and ensured American League home-field advantage in the World Series. SS Derek Jeter started and recorded the game's first hit in the first inning. RHP Mariano Rivera pitched 1.2 scoreless innings. Yankees Manager Joe Girardi joined the AL coaching staff as did Yankees Head Athletic Trainer Gene Monahan, who made his fourth All-Star Game appearance (also 1977, '86 and '92). Pregame ceremonies included 49 Hall of Famers, marking one of the largest gatherings of living baseball HOFers ever. The festivities were highlighted by Yankees Principal Owner/Chairperson George Steinbrenner, who delivered baseballs to the ceremonial first pitch participants (Reggie Jackson, Whitey Ford, Yogi Berra and Goose Gosage).

Exhibition Games vs. Mets/Dodgers/Giants

Notable Exhibitions between the Yankees, Dodgers and Giants

The Yankees, Dodgers and Giants played a number of preseason games against each other over the years in Florida and on the East Coast (while heading north from spring training). The clubs also played games in New York just prior to the start of the season. Additionally, many in-season exhibitions were arranged, including the Mayor's Trophy Games (noted in left column) and other charitable endeavors. Some of the most notable games are listed below.

July 4, 1909 - At Washington Park in Brooklyn, the Yankees dropped a benefit game for newsboys, 7-3. Due to a rule banning exhibition games between teams of the AL and NL, the catchers and pitchers switched teams for the contest.

Sept. 4, 1910 - The Yankees defeated the Giants, 4-2, in a newsboys benefit at Washington Park in Brooklyn, with various Dodgers (then known as the Superbas) playing for both teams.

October 1910 - The Yankees and Giants faced each other for the first time in a series of exhibition games following the 1910 regular season (while the World Series was contested elsewhere). Pitcher Christy Mathewson won three of the games as the Giants won the series, 4 games to 2. In a similar exhibition rematch after the 1914 regular season, the Giants again defeated the Yankees, 4 games to 1.

Apr. 21, 1912 - At the Polo Grounds, the Yankees and Giants staged a benefit game for survivors of the Titanic. The Giants won, 11-2, as \$9,425.25 was raised before a crowd of 14,083.

Apr. 5 and 7, 1913 - The Yankees helped the Dodgers (known then as the "Superbas") open Ebbets Field with an exhibition game won by Brooklyn, 3-2, in front of approximately 30,000 fans. Dodgers rookie outfielder Casey Stengel hits the park's first unofficial home run. Two days later, in icy conditions before approximately 1,000 fans at Ebbets field, the Yankees came out on top, 8-4.

Sept. 30, 1917 - On a tiny field at Fort Hamilton in Brooklyn, the Yankees defeated the Dodgers (then known as the Robins), 11-8. Seven "home runs" were hit in a game played for soldiers soon to be sent off to fight in World War I.

Sept. 9 and 24, 1931 - The three local clubs played a two-day, round-robin with proceeds going to the Mayor's Unemployment Fund. In the first game in front of 60,549 fans at Yankee Stadium, the Yankees defeated the Giants, 7-3, netting \$59,642 as Babe Ruth hit the game's only home run. On Sept. 24, the teams played a doubleheader at the Polo Grounds, bringing in \$48,135 for the fund with 44,119 fans on hand. The Giants defeated Brooklyn, 3-1, in Game 1 and the Yankees defeated the Dodgers (then known as the "Robins"), 5-1, in Game 2 behind homers from Lyn Lary, Bill Dickey and Lou Gehrig. Contests among the players were held in between games, including Babe Ruth hitting the longest fungo (421 ft, 8 in.) and Ben Chapman making the longest throw (392 ft, 10 in.).

June 26, 1944 - The Yankees, Giants and Dodgers played a mid-season "three-cornered" exhibition game at the Polo Grounds, which generated over \$6.5 million worth of war bond sales. Each team batted in six innings and played defense for six innings with Brooklyn coming out on top (Dodgers 5 - Yankees 1 - Giants 0). The clubs reprised the format for the sake of charity five years later (see entry for July 11, 1949).

July 9, 1945 - The Yankees defeated the Giants, 7-1, in a rain-shortened 7-inn. game in front of 41,267 at the Polo Grounds. The contest was one of seven interleague games in the Majors to benefit the war effort and serve as a substitute for the All-Star Game, which had been canceled.

July 11, 1949 - In a reprise of their June 26, 1944, exhibition game at the Polo Grounds (see above), the Yankees, Giants and Dodgers played a three-cornered "Night of Champions" benefit game for the N.Y. Heart Fund, Babe Ruth Foundation and Lou Gehrig Memorial Fund. Approximately \$32,000 was raised as 26,120 Yankee Stadium spectators saw Brooklyn win on total runs, 6 to 3 to 3.

Oct. 12, 1958 - In a rare postseason exhibition at Yankee Stadium, a team of AL All-Stars led by Mickey Mantle lost to a team of NL All-Stars led by Willie Mays, 6-2, in front of 21,129.

May 7, 1959 - At the L.A. Coliseum in front of a record baseball crowd of 93,103, the Yankees defeated the Dodgers, 6-2, with net proceeds going to benefit recently paralyzed catcher Roy Campanella.

June 27, 1960 - The Dodgers defeated the Yankees, 4-3, in front of 53,492 in their first game at Yankee Stadium since Don Larsen's perfect game in the 1956 World Series.

July 24, 1961 - The Giants defeated the Yankees, 4-1, in front of 47,346 at Yankee Stadium. Mickey Mantle's solo HR accounts for the Yankees' only run.

Mayor's Trophy Game

In the majority of seasons from 1944-83, the Yankees played the Giants, Dodgers or Mets in an annual mid-season exhibition game. The Mayor's office began sponsoring the contests beginning in 1946 and awarded a trophy to the game's winner. The proceeds from each game supported sandlot baseball programs and other New York charities. The Yankees won 20 of the 32 Mayor's Trophy Games played, going 7-1 vs. the Giants, 3-2 vs. the Dodgers and 10-8-1 vs. the Mets.

Spring Training Games vs. the Mets

The Yankees and Mets used to meet on a regular basis in spring training, dating back to the Mets' inaugural season in 1962. The very first game between the clubs was a 4-3 Mets victory on March 22, 1962, at their spring facility in St. Petersburg. The clubs' last preseason meetings were in 2020 "summer camp" in New York, with the Yankees winning both games (7/18/20 at Citi Field, 9-3; and 7/19/20 at Yankee Stadium, 6-0). The clubs did not meet during 2021 spring training.

Forfeited Games

The Yankees have played in four forfeited games in their history (described below), winning them all. Player statistics from forfeited games count in the historical record, however the final score of each game is officially recorded as 9-0. Interestingly, a forfeited game precipitated the creation of the Yankees franchise.

The Baltimore Orioles were a charter member of the American League in 1901. Prior to their game vs. St. Louis on July 17, 1902, New York Giants owner Andrew Freedman and Cincinnati Reds owner John T. Brush gained a controlling interest in Baltimore with the help of its former manager John McGraw. The two owners then shifted almost all of the Orioles' players to their respective NL teams, leaving the club unable to field a squad. Though the Orioles were forced to forfeit that day, the American League soon stepped in by providing the Orioles with players from other teams so they could finish the season. At the end of the season, the Orioles were dissolved and a new franchise filling its AL spot was established in New York in 1903.

In their short time in Baltimore, the Orioles also participated in three other forfeits, all of which were losses (May 31, 1901 at Detroit; August 21, 1901 vs. Detroit; and June 28, 1902 vs. Boston).

July 2, 1906 at Philadelphia (Game 2): With two outs in the bottom of the ninth inning and the Highlanders leading, 5-1, Columbia Park spectators started swarming the field. According to *The New York Times*, “the three or four policemen on hand to handle the crowd of 11,000 spectators were powerless.” After waiting 15 minutes, umpire Timothy C. Hurst forfeited the game to the Highlanders.

September 3, 1906 vs. Philadelphia (Game 2): With two outs in the bottom of the ninth and the Highlanders trailing, 3-1, with runners on second (Willie Keeler) and third (Wid Conroy), Jimmy Williams hit a grounder to A's shortstop Monte Cross. Keeler ran into Cross just as he was about to handle the ball, allowing the ball to roll into outfield and Conroy and Keeler to score, tying the game. After a heated argument from A's first baseman and captain Harry Davis, umpire Frank O'Loughlin awarded the game to New York.

June 13, 1924 at Detroit: At the start of the ninth inning at Navin Field with the Yankees leading, 10-6, Tigers pitcher Bert Cole threw a pitch that narrowly missed hitting Babe Ruth in the head. Cole immediately hit the next batter, Bob Meusel, with a pitch in the ribs. Meusel's protest incited a riot, leading to both benches becoming involved and the storming of the field by incensed fans. Umpire William G. Evans was forced to forfeit the game to the Yankees when the field could not be cleared. Ultimately, Meusel was fined \$100 and suspended 10 days, Cole was fined \$50 and suspended 10 days, and Ruth received a \$50 fine but no suspension. AL President Ban Johnson said of the fights that day, “They must be staged in a vacant lot, far removed from the ball parks.”

September 30, 1971 at Washington: At Robert F. Kennedy Stadium, unruly fans cascaded onto the field with two outs in the top of the ninth inning and the Senators winning, 7-5, in the last game before the Senators' relocation to Texas for the 1972 season. After three minutes of on-field chaos, including the bases literally being stolen, the umpires awarded the Yankees the victory.



Triple Plays (Special thanks to SABR & YES)

Fielding: The Yankees have turned 27 triple plays in franchise history, including a single-season franchise record three in 2021, matching the all-time mark by any team in a single season (eighth time in MLB history). Prior to 2021, the Yankees had *never turned more than one in a single season*. Interestingly, between 1969 and 2020, the Yankees turned just three total triple plays (4/17/14 at Tampa Bay; 4/12/13 vs. Baltimore; and 4/22/10 at Oakland) with *all three* occurring with CC Sabathia on the mound.

Batting: The Yankees have hit into 28 triple plays in franchise history, including three since 2001. The most recent was in an 8-6 loss on 7/22/2019 at Minnesota, three batters into the game (1st inn., 5-4-3, E. Encarnacion grounder to third after a DJ LeMahieu leadoff walk and an Aaron Judge walk). The others since 2001 were 7/25/17 vs. Cincinnati, 2nd inn., 6-3-5-6 (the only one the Yankees have hit into at the current Yankee Stadium); and 9/27/11 at Tampa Bay, 6th inn., 5-4-3.

Unassisted Triple Plays (Fielding or Batting): The Yankees been involved in one unassisted triple play in franchise history. On 5/29/00 vs. Oakland, former and future Yankee Randy Velarde, playing second base for the A's, caught a sixth-inning line drive off the bat of Shane Spencer with the hit & run on, then tagged Jorge Posada as he approached second base and stepped on the bag to double off Tino Martinez. To set up the moment, the previous batter, Jorge Posada reached base as a result of an error made by Velarde.

During the Series he went 2-1 in three starts, allowing just 5ER in 25.0IP with two walks and 16 strikeouts. The title was the Yankees' second in a row and their 10th in a 16-year span dating to 1947. For Terry, his clutch Game 7 performance was a measure of redemption. Two years earlier he allowed Bill Mazeroski's Game 7, World Series-winning, "walk-off" home run, which gave Pittsburgh the 1960 championship even though the Pirates had been outscored by the Yankees, 55-27, over the course of the Series.



Yankee STADIUM



The New York Yankees began a new chapter in their storied history with the opening of Yankee Stadium in 2009. Located directly across the street from the site of the original, the Stadium's architecture is a celebration of the spirit and tradition of the franchise. While firmly rooted in the past, the Stadium has a vision toward the future, incorporating the best in technology and state-of-the-art guest services.

All of the Stadium's modern amenities exist within the framework of classic elements of the original, most notably the instantly recognizable frieze that again circles the grandstand. Among the countless fan-friendly elements, massive video boards give Yankees fans more information than ever before, and concessions have been placed on concourses that allow for continuous viewing of the game.

Yankee Stadium, as a living museum, has been designed to set the standard—much like the team has done with its 27 World Championships.

HOMAGE TO THE ORIGINAL

The current Yankee Stadium evokes the spirit of the original, while restoring many of the lost treasures from before the renovations of 1974-75.

The signature frieze once again outlines the top of the Stadium bowl. As in the past, it is attached to a roof that extends into the Stadium, covering the top rows of the Grandstand.

Monument Park has been relocated to its original position in center field, albeit behind the fence, unlike before the renovation when the monuments were on the playing field. All plaques, monuments and tribute displays for the Yankees who have had their numbers retired are on display for fans, who may visit Monument Park when it is open prior to home games.

On the Main Level, near Section 210, the **New York Yankees Museum presented by Bank of America**—a museum within the living museum that is Yankee Stadium—presents Yankees history through displays of artifacts and memorabilia. Items include a "Ball Wall" with hundreds of signed baseballs from Yankees greats,

Thurman Munson's locker from the original Yankee Stadium and a replica of a locker from the Yankees clubhouse in the current Stadium. On game days, fans are welcome in the museum beginning 90 minutes prior to the scheduled first pitch until the end of the eighth inning (subject to change based on regulations in place for 2022). On non-game days, visitors can enjoy the museum when Yankee Stadium Tours are in operation.

Babe Ruth Plaza, located on the south side of the Stadium in between Gates 4 and 6, honors the man proverbially credited with building the original House that Ruth Built. Through a series of storyboards displayed on light posts, the Babe's life story is recounted throughout the plaza.

THE STADIUM SITE

The Yankees are proud to play in the Bronx, which is home to approximately 1.5 million residents and is one of the five boroughs that make up New York City.

The Stadium sits on former parkland from Macombs Dam Park and Mullaly Park, with the Stadium grounds bounded by Jerome Avenue to the west, River Avenue to the east, and 161st Street to the south. The northern edge of the site is located between 162nd Street and 164th Street. In a nod to tradition, the footprint of the original Stadium has been replicated in the new Stadium.

Yankee Stadium is the fourth permanent home of the New York Yankees, following Hilltop Park (1903-12), the Polo Grounds (1913-22), and the original Yankee Stadium (1923-73, '76-2008). The Yankees also played two full seasons at Shea Stadium (1974-75) in Queens when the original Stadium underwent remodeling.



INNOVATIVE ARCHITECTURE AND MODERN AMENITIES

One of the goals in building Yankee Stadium was to bring fans closer to the action in a facility more attuned to modern needs and expectations. The new building is 63 percent larger than the original Stadium with about 500,000 square feet of additional space.

Improved sight lines, wider concourses and the installation of nearly 1,400 high-definition video monitors throughout the Stadium all ensure guests won't miss a minute of on-field action while in their seats or at concession stands. In addition to the live game broadcast, these centrally controlled Internet protocol monitors can also provide up-to-the-moment news, scores, weather, traffic information and safety updates.

The **Great Hall** is a 31,000-square-foot space located between the Stadium's exterior wall and the interior of the Stadium. Spanning from Gate 4 to Gate 6, it is covered overhead but has massive open-air archways, which help support the Yankees' green initiatives. It is home to large banners bearing the images of past Yankees greats from Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig to more modern stars such as Don Mattingly and Paul O'Neill. A 24-foot-high-by-36-foot-wide 10mm

true high-definition video board and a 5-foot-by-386-foot LED ribbon board immediately greet guests who enter through this portion of the Stadium.

The audio/visual experience at Yankee Stadium is highlighted by a 59-foot-high-by-101-foot-long 16mm true high-definition centerfield video board, which is flanked by two smaller video boards that display day-of-game lineups, game-in-progress information, statistics and out-of-town scores. Additionally, the entire length of the Terrace Level is spanned by a 3-foot-high, 1,278-foot long full-color LED ribbon board. A distributed sound system optimizes speaker placement for audio quality vastly superior to that in the original Stadium. The entire Stadium is built with a future-proof infrastructure designed by Cisco Systems that is easily adaptable to new technologies.

A 7,000-square-foot state-of-the-art **FedEx Banquet and Conference Center** is designed to meet the needs of guests who wish to host business functions in the ballpark.

URBAN PLANNING

The site for Yankee Stadium was in part selected for its proximity to mass transit. Like the original Stadium, it is served at the 161st Street/Yankee Stadium subway stop by the No. 4, B and D trains.

Metro-North offers train service to Yankee Stadium from anywhere in its service territory, and Yankee Stadium is accessible by New York City Transit bus lines. For more information, call the MTA at 511 or visit www.mta.info.

Pedestrian access points are located at Yankee Stadium's four gates: **Gate 2** on Jerome Ave. and 164th St.; **Gate 4** at Jerome Ave. and 161st St.; **Gate 6** at River Ave. and 161st St.; and **Gate 8** at River Ave., south of 164th St.

RETAIL & FOOD OPTIONS

There are many distinct retail stores in Yankee Stadium, including the **Yankees Team Store behind home plate on the Field Level** (which houses the largest selection of Yankees merchandise) and the **Yankees Team Store at Gate 6** (Please call 646-977-8777 for year-round store hours).



The Yankees Steakhouse is located at Gate 6.

Yankee Stadium is also home to two premier dining establishments. The iconic **Hard Rock Cafe Yankee Stadium** at Gate 6 houses music memorabilia and Yankees-related pieces. The **Yankees Steakhouse at Yankee Stadium**, located above the Hard Rock Cafe, offers an upscale dining experience, including dry aged USDA prime steaks, fresh seafood and an impressive collection of premium wines.

More casual fare can be found at the Pepsi Food Court on the third-base side of the Field Level concourse and in other locations throughout the Stadium. For more information, please visit “Social Areas Open to All Fans at Yankee Stadium” in this section of the book.

DISABLED SERVICES

The Yankees strive to provide an accessible environment for all their Guests at Yankee Stadium. Wheelchair accessible and designated aisle seats are available at various price points and locations and include Yankees Premium seat locations. The Stadium also offers enhanced accessibility for Guests with hearing loss or low vision and for Guests who are deaf or blind. For more information, please visit www.yankees.com/disabledservices. There are two dedicated open-caption video boards for Guests who are deaf or have hearing loss: one in left field, just below Section 233B, and one in right field, just below Section 206. Captioning is also provided on the right-center field video board, the high-definition video board in the Great Hall, high-definition televisions throughout Yankee Stadium and on the video board in the New York Yankees Museum presented by Bank of America.

COMMITMENT TO SAFETY

In 2012, Yankee Stadium became the first sports venue in the United States to be covered with a federal SAFETY Act designation and certification from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security. In 2017, Yankee Stadium became the first sports venue in the United States to be renewed under the SAFETY Act designation and certification by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security.

As part of Major League Baseball’s initiative to standardize security procedures at all 30 Major League parks, all Guests are required to be screened via metal detectors before entering Yankee Stadium. These procedures, which result from MLB’s continuing work with the Department of Homeland Security, are in addition to bag checks that are now uniform throughout MLB.

Due to the enhanced security measures, the Yankees strongly urge all fans to budget extra time for entry into the ballpark when planning their trip to the Stadium.

“Nothing is more important to us at Yankee Stadium than the safety of the fans we serve,” said Yankees Chief Operating Officer Lonn Trost. “To that end, we are committed to the procedures that Major League Baseball and the Department of Homeland Security have asked us to implement. We want our fans to feel safe in Yankee Stadium, and our staff is dedicated to maintaining the highest security standards possible.”

BRONX INCENTIVES

Yankee Stadium is one of the premier building projects to take place in the Bronx in the last 60 years. The hard work and dedication of engineers, architects and construction professionals in building and designing the Stadium made the facility one of the most impressive and fan-friendly venues in the Majors. Equally important was the project’s dedication to support local community groups, institutions and residents as the Yankees remain devoted to the long-term development of the Bronx.

Building a new state-of-the-art facility required an army of talented and experienced professionals. As part of the Yankees’ commitment to ensure the Stadium project created economic opportunities in the Bronx, the Yankees made a concerted effort to recruit a wide range of vendors and employees from the local community. Of the 190 contracts awarded, 63 were allotted to Bronx-based businesses (accounting for over 33 percent of the contracts and resulting in \$133 million in contracts to Bronx-based businesses). The Yankees also stayed committed to hiring at least 25 percent of the total workforce from Bronx residents, again providing incentive to the surrounding community.

In conjunction with the construction of the Stadium, the Yankees also established a \$1 million grant for professional skills training for Bronx residents. Among the supported initiatives was Project H.I.R.E. (Help In Re-entering Employment), which taught Bronx residents functional construction skills for practical use in local building projects. ¹⁸

SUSTAINABILITY INITIATIVES

VISION OF SUSTAINABILITY

The New York Yankees organization recognizes our responsibility to protect and promote the well-being of our community. Accordingly, the Yankees remain committed to inspiring our partners, players, fans and employees to create a sustainable environmental legacy.

In pursuit of these goals, the Yankees seek to measure and minimize identifiable environmental impacts related to our operations, including greenhouse gas emissions, energy use, water use and waste generation. The Yankees are committed to compliance with all applicable environmental regulations, and we support the development of innovative, economic and socially beneficial solutions to help reduce or offset the direct and indirect impacts we engender.

YANKEES BECOME FIRST MAJOR NORTH AMERICAN SPORTS TEAM TO JOIN THE UN SPORTS FOR CLIMATE ACTION FRAMEWORK

On April 3, 2019, the New York Yankees became the first major North American sports team to sign on to the UN Sports for Climate Action Framework, the aim of which is to bring greenhouse emissions in line with the Paris Climate Change Agreement and inspire others to take ambitious climate action. The team joins numerous prominent international organizations committed to the Framework, including the International Olympic Committee, FIFA, the French Tennis Federation-Roland Garros, Paris 2024 Summer Olympics, Rugby League World Cup 2021, Tokyo 2020 Summer Olympics, UEFA, World Surf League, Formula E, and others.

"The New York Yankees are proud to support the United Nations Sports for Climate Action Framework," said Yankees Managing General Partner Hal Steinbrenner. "For many years the Yankees have been implementing the type of climate action now enshrined in the Sports for Climate Action principles, and with this pledge the Yankees commit to continue to work collaboratively with our sponsors, fans and other relevant stakeholders to implement the UN's climate action agenda in sports."

COMMITMENT TO THE UN SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS:

In 2015, 195 countries agreed to adopt the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals that outline the features that comprise a sustainable community. Promoting these "17 Sustainable Development Goals" is fundamental to the operation of Yankee Stadium, and we effort to do so through ecologically intelligent procurement, carefully considered operational practices and collaboration with local agencies and business partners.

Listed below are some of the ecologically intelligent measures being taken at Yankee Stadium to promote sustainability.

High Efficiency LED Lighting: Prior to the 2016 Major League Baseball season, the Yankees installed the newest, most efficient lighting in the world, known as light-emitting diodes (LED). At the time we installed LED field lighting, Yankee Stadium became only the second MLB stadium to use the most state-of-the-art energy-efficient lighting system available. The LED lights used at Yankee Stadium are 40% more efficient and 50% brighter than the previous field lighting used at the Stadium, which were also the most efficient lights available for use at the time. Increased Color Temperature of the light produced results in higher contrast, improving player reaction time, alertness and visual acuity. Improved Color Rendering provides the truest colors the human eye can see. Reduced Flicker Rate means the lighting can now support UHD Ultra Slow Motion filming. Improved optical design with twice the aiming points reduces glare and light pollution, and the energy saved from the new field lighting is enough to power about 45 homes every day.

Energy Efficient Technologies and Design: The Great Hall at Yankee Stadium, through which the majority of guests arrive, is the largest open air public entry at any sports venue in the world, a 31,000 square-foot inspirational space spanning from Gate 4 to Gate 6. By building this area with massive open-air archways that allow for natural cooling and ventilation, the space requires no air conditioning. Through the use of natural air-cooling, the energy savings per game is approximately the same as 125 New York City apartments shutting off their air-conditioning on a hot summer day. The Stadium's interior is controlled by automation technologies designed to identify and eliminate wasted or inefficient energy use. The Stadium's high tech energy management program ensures that energy use is reduced, and the efficiency of all equipment used is optimized. The diverse systems used to operate Yankee Stadium are carefully calibrated to specific usage patterns, reducing the power consumption of lighting and ventilation systems when they're not needed.

Offsetting Unavoidable GHG Emissions: Even the most efficient operations engender unavoidable greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions. Stadium energy use, team and employee travel, motors that require fossil fuel use, non-recyclable waste generation, and occasional leaks of refrigerants are all examples of GHG impacts that the Yankees carefully measure and offset through a collaboration with The South Pole Group. The high quality, third party verified GHG offsets that the Yankees invest in are carefully chosen to advance the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals, benefiting communities in need by promoting new employment opportunities, protecting biodiversity, and improving health and safety, including the distribution of thousands of life-saving high-efficiency cookstoves. As a result, the Yankees are leading the way towards a low-carbon, more sustainable future.



Mass Transit: Yankee Stadium benefits from one of the greatest mass transit systems of any city in the world. Located within close proximity of the subway, Metro-North, buses and other mass transportation systems, visitors to Yankee Stadium have better access to mass transit than at any other stadium in Major League Baseball. Yankee Stadium owns no public parking garages, and guests and employees are encouraged to use public transportation to reduce the number of cars on the road and their GHG emissions.

Composting and Recycling: The Yankees are committed to achieving zero waste and promoting a circular economy based on composting, recycling, and the recovery and use of waste oil. Compostable cutlery and food-service packaging, trays, boxes, plates and cups, are used instead of non-compostable petroleum-based plastics. Food waste is composted and not landfilled, and cardboard, glass, metal, plastics and paper are recycled. Through the overall efforts of fans and Stadium staff, approximately 85 percent of the Stadium's total trash is diverted away from landfills, making Yankee Stadium one of the most successful recycling venues in all of sports. The use of trash compactors for the small percentage of non-recovered waste at Yankee Stadium improves air quality by reducing the number of trash pucker trucks needed. The trucks that are required use Ultra Low Sulfur diesel which produces fewer emissions into the air, and these emissions are offset by the Yankees.

Recovery of Waste Cooking Oil: During the course of a typical season, more than 20,000 gallons of cooking oil from the Stadium are recovered and recycled. This oil is used to produce more than 18,600 gallons of biodiesel fuel which, when used in vehicles, results in a carbon reduction of more than 30,000 pounds—the equivalent of removing approximately 27 cars from the road for a year.

Water Conservation: Yankee Stadium is a responsible steward when it comes protecting New York City's precious and irreplaceable water system. Through careful monitoring and high efficiency plumbing fixtures, Yankee Stadium saves more than 3 million gallons of water each year, a reduction of 22 percent from water use prior to 2009.

Healthy Air Quality: Yankee Stadium uses high-performance filters and a regular replacement program to ensure particle removal effectiveness of MERV 13 or greater, for better air quality and energy efficiency in our HVAC system.

Smart Construction: The structural steel used in the construction of Yankee Stadium was fabricated from recycled material, and the concrete forms were reusable. Used recycled concrete aggregate was incorporated into the concrete design mix. All construction vehicles and equipment were required to use low-sulfur fuel. During construction, 75 percent of construction waste was diverted from landfills.

YANKEES ESTABLISH FIRST ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCE APPOINTEE POSITION IN PROFESSIONAL SPORTS

On Jan. 29, 2019, the New York Yankees announced the creation of an environmental science advisor position, appointing recognized industry leader Dr. Allen Hershkowitz to the new role, the first of its kind in professional sports. The appointment represents a defining moment in the team's decades-long commitment to sustainability, and serves to deepen an existing dedication to environmentally-friendly practices and community-wide awareness. Recognized as one of the most environmentally intelligent and healthiest sports venues in the world, with Hershkowitz as Environmental Science Advisor, the Yankees will look to further advance their efforts and invest in the development of best practices that can be adopted by organizations across the sport sector. Specifically, Hershkowitz will seek to guide new and existing environmental initiatives for the Yankees and at Yankee Stadium, with a primary focus on the areas of energy use, waste management, water conservation, and food services.

YANKEES RECOGNIZED BY NEW YORK STATE AS LEADER IN INNOVATION AND SUSTAINABILITY



At the 13th Annual New York State Environmental Excellence Awards on Nov. 15, 2016, the N.Y. State Department of Environmental Conservation recognized the Yankees among eight New York-based organizations for their state-of-the-art programs and commitment to environmental

sustainability, social responsibility and economic viability.

"DEC is proud to present Environmental Excellence Awards to these eight businesses and organizations that have demonstrated outstanding leadership in adopting innovative solutions to protect our environment and enhance our economy," said DEC Commissioner Basil Seggos. "These projects set a high bar for others to follow in addressing critical environmental and public health issues such as increasing energy efficiency, cleaning up our waters, keeping materials out of landfills, and making our healthcare sector more sustainable."

"It is vitally important that we help promote sustainability and reduce our impact on the environment," said Yankees Senior Vice President of Stadium Operations Doug Behar. "We have implemented an array of green initiatives at Yankee Stadium and continue to look for new and better ways to conserve natural resources, educate our guests and Yankees Team Members, and support and partner with programs that promote sustainability. We are humbled to receive this award from the State and will continue to work hard to further our efforts in sustainability."

YANKEES WIN ENVIRONMENTAL LEADERSHIP AWARD FROM GREEN SPORTS ALLIANCE



On June 4, 2015, with former MLB Commissioner Bud Selig, in attendance, the Yankees received the 2015 Environmental Leadership Award, presented by the Green Sports Alliance. The award recognizes a sports team and venue that best exemplifies the practices of promoting a sustainable environment. Green Sports Alliance members represent nearly 300 sports teams and venues from 20 different sports leagues and 14 countries across the world. Yankees President Randy Levine (third from L) and S.V.P. of Stadium Operations Doug Behar (second from R) accepted the award on behalf of the organization.



Yankee Stadium Achieves WELL Health-Safety Rating

On August 26, 2020, the International WELL Building Institute (IWBI) announced that Yankee Stadium, the home of the New York Yankees, was the first sports and entertainment venue in the world to achieve the WELL Health-Safety Rating for Facility Operations and Management. The rating requirements, which were fulfilled by the club, serve as a blueprint for best operating procedures to help combat COVID-19, while also providing world-class standards for overall health and safety. By achieving this designation, which has been confirmed by a third-party verifier, Green Business Certification Inc. (GBCI), the club can operate with confidence that they are utilizing best practices for players and staff, and that they are appropriately accommodating fans in coordination with Major League Baseball and local governmental authorities.



Launched in June 2020 and created by IWBI, the WELL Health-Safety Rating is informed by guidance developed by the World Health Organization (WHO), U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), global disease control and prevention centers and emergency management agencies, recognized standard-making bodies, such as ASTM International and ASHRAE, and leading academic and research institutions. IWBI has leveraged insights from its Task Force on COVID-19, established at the outset of the pandemic to help business and building leaders integrate actionable insights and proven strategies in the fight against COVID-19 and other respiratory infections.

The WELL Health-Safety Rating achieved by the Yankees is an evidence-based, third-party verified rating for all new and existing buildings and spaces. The WELL Health-Safety Rating provides operational policies, maintenance protocols, emergency plans and stakeholder engagement strategies to help organizations prepare and maintain their spaces in an environment affected by COVID-19. The Yankees joined more than 100 organizations, encompassing over 500 facilities, who enrolled in the documentation-based program at launch and who have begun implementing its scientific guidance.

"The COVID-19 pandemic has underscored to companies in every sector how critically important it is to be prepared for a crisis. The Yankees have demonstrated outstanding leadership by taking immediate and thoughtful action to help support the health and safety of their players, fans and employees," said Rick Fedrizzi, IWBI chairman and CEO. "We are proud to celebrate this achievement with the Yankees."

Adapted from features in the WELL Building Standard (WELL) that focus on facility maintenance and operations, the WELL Health-Safety Rating is designed to guide and empower the actions of large and small businesses alike in taking the necessary steps to maintain facilities that prioritize the health and safety of their staff, visitors and stakeholders. It also serves as an annual process that supports efforts to promote long-term health and safety.

"Working with IWBI to achieve the WELL Health-Safety Rating allowed us to focus and implement the most effective and efficient methods known to help mitigate the risk of COVID-19 transmission for those whose workplace is Yankee Stadium and for the general public, which enjoys the venue for games and events," said Yankees Senior Vice President of Stadium Operations Doug Behar. "Given that WELL criteria has been informed by renowned experts and standard-making bodies in this field gives us confidence that we are taking appropriate preventative measures to support the health and safety of our players, field staff, employees and fans. Reaching this level and receiving third-party verification from GBCI was a long and uncompromising road, but one that is clearly in the best interests of everyone who steps foot into Yankee Stadium."

Yankee Stadium achieved the WELL Health-Safety Rating by implementing features across five categories:

- Air and water quality management, which includes the assessment of ventilation and fresh air supply through mechanical or natural means, and reviewing our inventory of all filters and ultraviolet germicidal irradiation (UVGI) equipment.
- Cleaning and sanitization procedures, including ensuring proper handwashing and surface contact by staff, improving cleaning practices and their frequency, and selecting cleaning products that disinfect without harmful ingredients.
- Emergency preparedness programs, which provide a blueprint for dealing with unforeseen events and providing an actionable plan for re-entry after an emergency event.
- Health service resources, which promote the well-being of employees through screening services, mental health services, seasonal vaccination programs and a smoke-free environment.
- Stakeholder engagement and communications, which include employing proper signage throughout Yankee Stadium and promoting health literacy to employees, partners and patrons, including food service safety verification.

"The Yankees already had many of these strategies in place and used the WELL Health-Safety Rating to further strengthen their COVID-19 response and to document and verify these actions with our third party reviewer GBCI," said Rachel Gutter, IWBI president. "As a result, players, staff and fans can feel confident that the Yankees have implemented our research-backed strategies to provide a safer and healthier environment to play ball."

"Restoring the sports and entertainment sectors is among the most complicated challenges the COVID-19 pandemic has engendered, socially and biologically. The New York Yankees' effort to provide confidence to its players, staff and its community is a model for all sports venues to emulate," said Allen Hershkowitz, Environmental Science Advisor to the Yankees and Co-Chair of the WELL Advisory for Sports and Entertainment Venues.

Yankee Stadium Construction Timeline

JUNE 15, 2005 – The Yankees announce plans for a new Yankee Stadium to be constructed on parkland north of 161st Street – adjacent to the original Stadium's longtime site.

AUG. 16, 2006 – The Yankees break ground for Yankee Stadium at a ceremony featuring George M. Steinbrenner, N.Y. Governor George Pataki, N.Y.C. Mayor Michael Bloomberg, Bx. Borough Pres. Adolfo Carrion & MLB Commissioner Bud Selig.

OCT. 2006 – The first concrete is poured.

DEC. 2007 – The first piece of frieze is put in place.

DEC. 2007 – The Stadium is considered 50% completed.

JAN. 14-15, 2008 – Limestone Panels containing "YANKEE STADIUM" gold lettering are installed above Gate 4.

MAR. 29, 2008 – Eagle medallions inspired by those on the 1923 Stadium are lifted into place above Gate 4.

APRIL 2008 – Frieze installation is completed.

MAY 1, 2008 – A "topping off" ceremony is held to commemorate the completion of the steel structure.

MAY 2008 – The foul poles and first seats are installed.

JUNE 18, 2008 – The Yankees hold their first press conference at the new Yankee Stadium, announcing a long-term agreement with Seminole Hard Rock Entertainment to open a Hard Rock Cafe near Gate 6. In addition, the Yankees introduce the newly-branded NYY Steak, a prime steakhouse to be located in Yankee Stadium.

SEPT. 19, 2008 – The massive, blue, backlit "YANKEE STADIUM" lettering above Gate 4 is hoisted and installed.

OCTOBER 2008 – Lighting in the interior bowl is tested.

OCT. 15, 2008 – The first sections of sod are laid.

NOV. 8, 2008 – Yankees executives and former players, including Scott Brosius, David Cone, Paul O' Neill and Jeff Nelson, along with 60 local Bronx high school youth groups remove home plate, the pitcher's rubber and pails of dirt from the original Stadium and install them in the new Yankee Stadium. The participating Bronx youth groups—Youth Force 2020, led by Turner Construction Company, and the ACE Mentor Program at Yankee Stadium, guided by Tishman Speyer—took part in Yankees-sponsored after-school programs relating to the construction and engineering of the new Yankee Stadium.

JAN. 23, 2009 – The front office moves in, bringing World Series trophies from 1977 and 2000 to the new building.

FEBRUARY 2009 – Plaques and monuments are placed in the new Monument Park.

APR. 3-4, 2009 – The first exhibition games vs. the Cubs are played.

APR. 16, 2009 – The first regular season game is played vs. Cleveland (CLE 10 - NYY 2).



Social Areas Open to All Fans at Yankee Stadium

On Oct. 24, 2016, the New York Yankees announced that Yankee Stadium would undergo its first series of major design enhancements which are intended to improve the Guest experience for fans of all ages. Enhancements prior to the 2017 season included numerous new social gathering spaces and additional dynamic food and beverage areas.

"We have listened to our fans and ticketholders and their top requests were for more family-friendly and socially-oriented spaces at Yankee Stadium," said Yankees Managing General Partner Hal Steinbrenner. "Yankees fans will now have many more dedicated areas for spending time with Guests who have tickets in other sections of the Stadium, allowing all Guests to be able to enjoy the game from multiple vantage points while having unique food and drink options available to them. We are also especially excited to provide an engaging children's play area for families to utilize prior to and throughout the game. Having these types of spaces in Yankee Stadium is fundamental to the expectations of our fans, and we look forward to making them a huge part of the Yankee Stadium experience today and beyond."

The following Yankee Stadium food and drink locations are accessible to all Yankee Stadium Guests, regardless of their ticketed seats. Highlights include:

PLYMOUTH ROCK KIDS CLUBHOUSE: The Plymouth Rock Kids Clubhouse is Yankee Stadium's first-ever children's zone. Shaped like a mini-baseball field with a soft artificial surface, the 2,850-square-foot area is located on the 300 Level in right field and outfitted with Yankees-themed playground equipment, including oversized baseballs, bases and baseball cards. In 2021, overhead screening was added to moderate the temperature in the warm summer months. The Kids Clubhouse is accessible to all Yankee Stadium Guests.

Children may play among the colorful fixtures, including a 6-foot-high replica World Series trophy. Parents can join their children on the play area or choose to oversee them from a nearby dugout. Television monitors ensure that no one misses any game action. There are interactive exhibits, and the Clubhouse includes two family restrooms equipped with changing tables. Nursing mothers will have an additional private space, which includes a television and power outlets for those using electric breast pumps.



"We want our youngest fans to feel as if Yankee Stadium is an extension of their local park or backyard," Steinbrenner said. "The Kids Clubhouse is designed to nurture their love for experiencing games in person, while providing parents the resources they need to keep their children entertained prior to and during the game."

MASTERCARD BATTER'S EYE DECK: Located on the 200 level in center field with a clear, sweeping view of the entire Stadium, the Mastercard Batter's Eye Deck was expanded to 3,500 square feet with drink-rails overlooking the field. This outdoor gathering space features craft beers, cocktails and a large selection of food options.



BULLPEN TERRACES: The YES Network Terrace in left field and the Toyota Terrace in right field (on the 100 Level in the former Sections 239 and 201, respectively) are open-air social gathering areas overlooking the visitors and Yankees bullpens. Both terraces feature their own specialty food and drink options. Drink-rail locations at the landings have power/USB outlets. As a result of the 2017 reconfiguration, all obstructed-view seats in the Bleachers have been removed.

BUDWEISER PARTY DECKS: The 300 Level of the Stadium includes Budweiser Party Decks at Sections 311 and 328, featuring shaded stand-alone bar areas serving beer, cocktails and food. Drink-rail and barstool seating provides fans a relaxed and casual setting from which to enjoy sweeping views of the field and game action.

FIELD LEVEL SPORTS LOUNGE: The Field Level Sports Lounge at Section 134 on the Field Level includes a full bar with craft beers and cocktails. Tables, stools and large-screen televisions tuned to the Yankees broadcast and other live sporting events provide a sports-bar atmosphere on the Stadium's main outdoor concourse in left field. Additionally, power/USB outlets are available for charging phones or tablets.



PEPSI FOOD COURT: Located between sections 125 and 127B on the Field Level, the Pepsi Food Court contains a wide variety food and drink options for all fans. Centered around a bar with large-screen televisions, fans may enjoy the wide-ranging fare at shaded tabletop seating.

STELLA ARTOIS LANDING and MICHELOB ULTRA CLUBHOUSE: The Stella Artois Landing, spanning Sections 232A and 232B in left field, and the Michelob ULTRA Clubhouse, spanning Sections 207 and 208 in right field, will be accessible to fans with game day tickets anywhere in the Stadium. Both locations are covered overhead and are available as pregame party spaces for groups of 20 or more people.

PINSTRIPES BOWL

Maryland 54 – Virginia Tech 10 12/29/21
MVP: QB Taulia Tagovailoa Att: 29,653

Maryland defeated Virginia Tech, 54-10, setting a Pinstripe Bowl record for points. QB Taulia Tagovailoa took home MVP honors, completing 20-of-24 passes for 2TD with 42 rushing yards on four carries. Terps DB Tarheeb Still opened the scoring with a bowl record 92-yard punt return at 12:44 of the first quarter, and WR Darryl Jones (4 rec., 111 yds.) had TD receptions of 70 and 32 yards in the second and third quarters. Virginia Tech fought back to 21-10 with 1:02 left in the second quarter, but Maryland scored 33 unanswered points the rest of the way.

Michigan State 27 – Wake Forest 21 12/27/19
MVP: QB Brian Lewerke Att: 36,895

Michigan State edged Wake Forest, 27-21, in the 10th annual Pinstripe Bowl. Down 7-3 in the first quarter, Spartans senior DT Mike Panasiuk returned a 14-yard interception for a touchdown to put them up 10-7. Despite a 21-20 Wake Forest lead at the half, Michigan State captain and Pinstripe Bowl MVP QB Brian Lewerke (passing: 26-for-37, 320 yards, 1 TD; rushing: 46 yards, 1 TD) put the Spartans on top for good with a 10-yard touchdown pass to WR Cody White. In the second half, the Demon Deacons were limited to 101 yards and shut out despite recovering two fumbles.

Wisconsin 35 – Miami 3 12/27/18
MVP: RB Jonathan Taylor Att: 37,821

Led by sophomore running back and Pinstripe Bowl MVP Jonathan Taylor (205 yards and 1 TD), Wisconsin routed Miami, 35-3, in both schools' first appearances in the Pinstripe Bowl. Carrying the Badgers to a wire-to-wire victory, the defense forced five turnovers that led to 21 points. UW controlled the clock, possessing the ball for nearly 40 minutes, while collecting 406 yards of total offense.



Wisconsin RB Jonathan Taylor led the offense with 205 yards rushing and 1 TD in the school's 2018 Pinstripe Bowl win.

Iowa 27 – Boston College 20 12/27/17
MVP: RB Akrum Wadley Att: 37,667

Despite being outgained in total yards, 383-200, Iowa defeated Boston College, 27-20. The Hawkeyes forced three turnovers while not committing any themselves. New Jersey native Akrum Wadley, who had 283 all-purpose yards (22 carries, 88 yards; 2 receptions, 24 yards; and 171 return yards) earned MVP honors for Iowa in his final college game. Eagles' running back AJ Dillon carried 32 times for 157 yards and one touchdown, and tight end Tommy Sweeney had seven catches for 137 yards and one touchdown.

Northwestern 31 – Pittsburgh 24 12/28/16
MVP: RB Justin Jackson Att: 37,918

Northwestern RB Justin Jackson earned MVP honors as the Wildcats defeated Pitt, 31-24. Northwestern running back Justin Jackson ran for three touchdowns and gained 224 yards, falling three yards shy of tying the NEPB's all-time, single-game rushing record. Despite losing QB Nathan Peterman and RB James Conner to injury, the Panthers led 24-21 early in the fourth quarter before Northwestern answered with a touchdown and field goal. Safety Kyle Queiro sealed the Wildcats' win with an interception on Pitt's final drive.

Duke 44 – Indiana 41 (OT) 12/26/15
Co-MVPs: QB Thomas Sirk/RB Shaun Wilson Att: 37,218

Co-MVPs Thomas Sirk and Shaun Wilson led Duke to its first bowl game victory since 1961, after Indiana kicker Griffin Oakes missed a game-tying, 38-yard field goal attempt in OT. Wilson scored twice, on an 85-yard touchdown run and a 98-yard kickoff return. Indiana's Devine Redding scored a touchdown and had a game-high 35 carries in a losing effort, establishing the all-time NEPB mark with 227 yards rushing. Indiana totaled 667 total yards in the loss, including 389 passing yards by QB Nate Sudfeld. The contest was the first-ever matchup under Yankee Stadium's new LED lights.

Penn State 31 – Boston College 30 (OT) 12/27/14
MVP: QB Christian Hackenberg Att: 49,012

A NEPB record-setting sold out crowd saw the first OT contest in the bowl game's history. After a BC touchdown and subsequent missed PAT on the opening possession of OT, Penn State QB Christian Hackenberg tossed a 10-yard TD pass to WR Kyle Carter to tie the game, 30-30. Kicker Sam Ficken, who tied the game with a 45-yard field goal with 20 seconds remaining in the fourth quarter, clinched the Nittany Lions' victory with a "walk-off" PAT.

Notre Dame 29 – Rutgers 16 12/28/13
MVP: OT Zack Martin Att: 47,122

Notre Dame broke a 13-13 halftime tie by outscoring Rutgers, 16-3, in the second half. Fighting Irish QB Tommy Rees went 27-for-47 for 319 yards and K Kyle Brindza went 5-for-6 in field goal attempts. Notre Dame had possession for 38:23.

Syracuse 38 – West Virginia 14 12/29/12
MVP: RB Prince-Tyson Gully Att: 39,098

In a snow-filled contest, Syracuse junior RB Prince-Tyson Gully had 213 rushing yards (26 carries, 2TDs) and 56 rec. yards (5 catches, 1TD) to win MVP honors. Syracuse's defense held the Mountaineers to 285 total yards and 0-for-14 on third and fourth downs.

Rutgers 27 – Iowa State 13 12/30/11
MVP: RB Jawan Jamison Att: 38,328

The Scarlet Knights led, 17-6, at halftime and put the game away with an 86-yard touchdown pass from QB Chas Dodd to WR Brandon Coleman in the fourth quarter. MVP Jawan Jamison rushed for 131 yards on 27 carries with two TDs.

Syracuse 36 – Kansas State 34 12/30/10
MVP: RB Delone Carter Att: 38,274

The inaugural New Era Pinstripe Bowl was decided by one play – a failed Wildcats two-point conversion with just over one minute left in regulation. Syracuse's Delone Carter rushed for 198 yards on 27 carries with two TDs and QB Ryan Nassib threw for 239 yards (13-for-21) with three TDs. Kansas State RB Daniel Thomas ran for 90 yards on 22 carries with three TDs.



The inaugural 2010 Pinstripe Bowl featured Kansas State and Syracuse, with the Orange winning, 36-34.



OTHER COLLEGE FOOTBALL

Dartmouth 27 – Princeton 10 Att: 21,506 11/9/19
In a matchup that featured two unbeaten Ivy League rivals, Dartmouth was victorious in a thrilling 27-10 win over Princeton. After forcing three first-half turnovers, including a pick-six from senior DE Niko Lalos in the first quarter, the Big Green took a commanding 17-7 lead at the half and never looked back. Dartmouth's run-heavy offense was led by New York native QB Jared Gerbino (3-for-6, 36 passing yards, 16 carries, 97 rushing yards, 2TD). The Big Green never trailed in the game and outgained Princeton in total yards, 293-246.

Notre Dame 36 – Syracuse 3 Att: 48,104 11/17/18
No. 3 Notre Dame dispatched of No. 12 Syracuse, 36-3, as a sold-out crowd watched the highest-ranked matchup in New York City since 1947. The game – played as the ninth installment of Notre Dame's famed Shamrock Series – also marked the first time a top-20 ranked Notre Dame team played in New York City since 1946 (at the original Yankee Stadium). Quarterback Ian Book (23-for-37, 292 yards, 2 TD) led the undefeated Irish on offense, while the defense held Syracuse scoreless until the final minute of the game.

Fordham 54 – Holy Cross 14 Att: 21,375 11/12/16
The 31st Ram-Crusader Cup was the first to take place at the current Yankee Stadium. Fordham's offense was led by QB Kevin Anderson (28-of-33, 426 yards, 3TD) and RB Chase Edmonds (23 carries, 121 rushing yards, 4TD). Edmonds' third rushing score of the day set the Patriot League record for career rushing touchdowns. Fordham outgained Holy Cross in yards, 608-302.

Lafayette 27 – Lehigh 7 Att: 48,256 11/22/14



The site, established through a partnership between New York State, New York City, the New York Yankees, SOMOS Community Care and the New York National Guard, was developed to not only directly address the Bronx's concerning positivity rate—which was the highest among all New York City boroughs—but to also further the State's and City's mandate for fairness and social equity in the vaccine distribution process. During its operation, 104,109 vaccine doses were administered at the Yankee Stadium site.

Babe Ruth Auction 6/15/19
Hunts Auction, Inc. hosted a historic live auction at Yankee Stadium that featured the personal collection of Babe Ruth. With over 400 items sold, the highlight of the auction was a Babe Ruth New York Yankees professional model road jersey dating to the 1928-30 period that sold for a record-breaking \$5,640,000. The jersey is the most expensive piece of sports memorabilia to have ever been sold.

New York City FC



New York City Football Club is an American professional soccer team based in New York City that competes in the Eastern Conference of Major League Soccer (MLS). It was announced as the league's 20th franchise on May 21, 2013, and is the first and only MLS Club located within the five boroughs of New York City. Majority owned by City Football Group (CFG), New York City FC plays its home games at Yankee Stadium, which is also home to minority owner, the New York Yankees.

NYCFC is the defending MLS champion, having won its first-ever MLS Cup on Dec. 11, 2021, defeating the Portland Timbers at their home ground of Providence Park. The contest finished 1-1 after extra time (NYCFC: Taty Castellanos, 41'; POR: Felipe Mora, 90+4'), with NYCFC prevailing, 4-2, in a penalty shootout. Goalie Sean Johnson stopped two of four penalties and Alexander Callens hit the match-clinching kick in the fifth round.

NYCFC made its MLS debut on March 8, 2015, in a 1-1 draw at Orlando City SC. One week later, in its home opener at Yankee Stadium on March 15, 2015, the club earned its first win, defeating the New England Revolution, 2-0. Though the club did not qualify for the postseason in its inaugural season, NYCFC has made the playoffs in each of the last six years (2016-21).

The YES Network is the exclusive local television home for the club.

History of the Original Yankee Stadium

One year after changing the course of Baseball history with the purchase of Babe Ruth from the Boston Red Sox, the Yankees made another acquisition that would forever alter the way the game was watched.

On February 5, 1921, the Yankees issued a press release announcing the purchase of 10 acres of property in the west Bronx. The land, purchased from the estate of William Waldorf Astor for \$675,000, sat directly across the Harlem River from the Manhattan-situated Polo Grounds, which the Yankees had been unhappily sharing with their landlord, the New York Giants of the National League, since 1913.

The relationship between the clubs crumbled after the 1920 season when the Yankees' attendance—boosted by their new slugging sensation—doubled to almost 1.3 million, approximately 25 percent more than that of the Giants. In 1921, the Giants asked the Yankees to vacate the Polo Grounds as soon as possible. With their departure from the Polo Grounds now inevitable, Yankees co-owners Jacob Ruppert and Tillinghast L'Hommedieu Huston set out to build a spectacular ballpark of their own, Baseball's first triple-decked structure. With an advertised capacity of 70,000, it would also be the first to be labeled a "stadium."

Original plans by the architect—the Osborn Engineering Company of Cleveland, Ohio—had the Stadium triple-decked and roofed all the way around. An early press release, in fact, described the Yankees' new home as a field enclosed with towering embattlements rendering the events inside "impenetrable to all human eyes, save those of aviators." But the initial grand design was quickly scaled back with the triple-decked grandstand not reaching either foul pole. Contrary to the owners'

wishes, the action would be visible from the elevated trains that passed by the outfield, as well as from the buildings that would spring up across River Avenue. Fortunately, a purely decorative element survived the project's early downsizing and would become the park's most recognizable feature. A 15-foot-high copper frieze adorned the front of the roof, which covered much of the Stadium's third deck. It would give Yankee Stadium a stately dignity that became its signature.

The new stadium would favor left-handed power hitters with the right-field foul pole only 295 feet from home plate (though the right-field fence would shoot out to 429 feet in right-center). The left-field pole measured only 281 feet from the plate, but right-handed hitters would be neutralized by a 395-foot left field and a whopping 460 feet to left-center. The new stadium would also be patron-friendly, boasting an unheard of "eight toilet rooms for men and as many for women scattered throughout the stands and bleachers." (After the Stadium was remodeled 50 years later, it included more than 50 restrooms.) The club's executive offices would be moved from Midtown Manhattan and relocated between the main and mezzanine decks with an electric elevator connecting them with the main entrance.

The construction contract was awarded to New York's White Construction Company on May 5, 1922, with the edict that the job be completed "at a definite price" of \$2.5 million by Opening Day 1923. Incredibly, it was. In only 284 working days, Yankee Stadium was ready for its inaugural game on April 18, 1923 vs. the Boston Red Sox.

An announced crowd of 74,200 fans packed Yankee Stadium while thousands more milled around outside after the fire department finally ordered the

gates closed. Before the game began, John Philip Sousa and the Seventh Regiment Band led both clubs to the flagpole in deep center field, where the American flag and the Yankees' 1922 pennant were raised. Appropriately, Ruth christened his new home with a three-run homer to cap a four-run third inning as the Yankees coasted to a 4-1 win over the Boston Red Sox.

Because it was widely recognized that Ruth's tremendous drawing power made the new stadium possible, *New York Evening Telegram* sportswriter Fred Lieb dubbed it "The House That Ruth Built." Later that season, the Stadium hosted the first of 37 World Series, as the Yankees won their first World Championship by defeating their former landlord, the Giants. Of course, as the original Stadium became the stage for a staggering 26 world titles, it would also become known as "The Home of Champions."

In its early years, when wooden bleachers surrounded the outfield, a grass slope rose toward the outfield walls from foul pole to foul pole. Outfielders, especially Ruth in right, routinely backed up the small hill to pull down fly balls. Advertising signs lined the tops of the bleachers except in right-center, where a lone manually operated wooden scoreboard was large enough to record 12 innings for games played by every club in the two major leagues. Over the years, the board would be replaced by more modern models. The Yankees, in fact, would unveil Baseball's first electronic message board in 1959.

By 1928, the Stadium was ready for its first major face-lift. The triple-decked grandstand in left field was extended beyond the foul pole and several rows of box seats were removed in order to extend the left-field foul pole distance to 301 feet. The right-field grandstand was extended in 1937, allowing for "upper-deck" home runs in both directions. With the grandstand expansion, the remaining wooden bleachers were replaced with a concrete structure, and the distance to center field dropped from 490 feet to a still-distant 461 feet.

In 1932, the Yankees began their tradition of commemorating their heroes with monuments and plaques when they dedicated a monument to Manager Miller Huggins, who had died suddenly during the 1929 season. Five more monuments were added (one each for Lou Gehrig, Ruth, Mickey Mantle

and Joe DiMaggio and one to honor the victims and heroes of the terrorist attacks of September 11, 2001) along with numerous plaques. For years, existing monuments were in the field of play in deep center field, and outfielders occasionally had to work around them to retrieve baseballs hit to that part of the park.

Except for the addition of lights in 1946, the look of Yankee Stadium remained relatively unchanged until the winter of 1966-67. Then, under the direction of the Yankees' new owner, CBS, the 44-year-old facility received a \$1.5 million modernization, most of which was spent on 90 tons of paint. The brown concrete exterior was painted white as was the timeworn greenish copper frieze. Also, all of the grandstand seats went from green to blue, a color scheme that would be retained when the Stadium was completely remodeled after the 1973 season.

On August 8, 1972, after years of debate about the future of the aging ballpark, the Yankees signed a 30-year lease with the City of New York, which called for Yankee Stadium to be completely modernized in time for the 1976 season. After completing the Stadium's 50th-anniversary in 1973, the Yankees moved to Shea Stadium for two seasons while the majority of Yankee Stadium was torn down and rebuilt.

The most striking change of the modernization was the removal of the numerous obstructive steel columns that supported the second and third decks, as well as the roof. By "cantilevering" the upper decks and lowering the playing field while increasing the slope of the lower stands, sight lines for fans were dramatically improved. Capacity was reduced from 65,010 in 1973 to 54,028 upon reopening as wider plastic seats replaced wooden seats.

Of course, with the removal of the original roof, the Stadium almost lost its most-recognizable feature: the copper frieze. However, an innovative design concept included an exact replica of the frieze atop the new 560-foot-long scoreboard wall, which stretched across the rear of the bleachers. The board also included Baseball's first "telescreen," which could provide instant replays of the action by employing a then-incredible "nine shades of gray."

Yankee Stadium's exterior changed dramatically, as three escalator towers were added, one at each of the Stadium's three entrances. With seven additional

rows of seats added to the upper deck, the already grand Stadium received an even more majestic look. A 138-foot Louisville Slugger-shaped smokestack, commonly called "The Bat," was added outside the Stadium near the home-plate entrance.

The renovated Stadium also saw the mammoth fence distances in left and center field greatly reduced as "Death Valley" in left-center was brought in from 457 feet to 430 feet, and straightaway center field was slimmed from 463 feet to 417 feet. Subsequent alterations prior to the 1985 and 1988 seasons brought fences in to the configuration that is now replicated in the current Yankee Stadium.

The remodeled original Yankee Stadium reopened on April 15, 1976—with the Yankees topping Minnesota, 11-4. Like its predecessor and successor, it hosted the World Series in its inaugural season. In fact, the remodeled Stadium hosted the Fall Classic in its first three seasons, as the Yankees followed their 1976 Series loss to Cincinnati by winning back-to-back World Series titles in 1977 and 1978 over the Dodgers.

As one of the world's most prestigious addresses, the original Yankee Stadium was also the home for scores of other sports, entertainment and cultural events. While the Yankees were on the road or in the offseason, the Stadium opened its gates to college and pro football, soccer, political assemblies, religious conventions, concerts and even the circus.

Boxing immediately found a home at Yankee Stadium with Benny Leonard winning a 15-round decision over Lou Tendler for the lightweight title just three months after the gates opened on July 23, 1923. When Muhammad Ali stopped Ken Norton on September 28, 1976, it marked the 30th championship fight at the Stadium. All previous Stadium title bouts had taken place between 1923 and 1959—perhaps none more memorable than the June 22, 1938, heavyweight championship rematch between Joe Louis and Germany's Max Schmeling. After suffering a knockout loss in the initial non-title encounter at the Stadium two years earlier, Louis—now the heavyweight champ—avenged his defeat with a stunning first-round KO.

Football also became an immediate fixture at Yankee Stadium with Syracuse and Pittsburgh inaugurating a rich history of collegiate and professional matchups on October 20, 1923. Five years later at Yankee Stadium, on November 12, 1928, during halftime of a scoreless Army-Notre Dame contest, legendary coach Knute Rockne made his famous "Win One for the Gipper" speech, spurring the Fighting Irish to a 12-6 victory.

The New York Football Giants also called Yankee Stadium home from 1956 through 1973 and on December 28, 1958, took part in what has since been dubbed "The Greatest Game Ever Played." With the NFL championship at stake, a crowd of 64,185 watched the Baltimore Colts tie the game, 17-17, on a Steve Myrha field goal with seven seconds left. Eight minutes into professional football's first-ever "sudden-death" overtime period, the Colts' Alan Ameche crashed into the end zone from the 1-yard line, ending a contest that would help establish pro football as a major sport.

The Stadium was also an important stop for religious conventions, especially those of the Jehovah's Witnesses. In 1950, the group began holding conventions at the Stadium, including one that drew 123,707 people on August 3, 1958—the largest single-day event in Stadium history. On October 4, 1965—with the Yankees out of the World Series for only the third time in 17 years—the Stadium held the first-ever Papal Mass in the United States as Pope Paul VI celebrated Mass before a crowd in excess of 80,000. Pope John Paul II also celebrated Mass at the original Yankee Stadium on October 2, 1979, during his tour of the United States.

On August 16, 2006, a groundbreaking ceremony was held for a new Yankee Stadium to be ready for the 2009 season. The location chosen for the new building was the north side of 161st Street and River Avenue in the Bronx, directly across the street from the site of the original.

As part of its final season in 2008, Yankee Stadium hosted a third papal visit on April 20 from Pope Benedict XVI, NYU's commencement ceremony on May 14 (believed to be the first-ever college commencement in Stadium history) and a 15-inning, 4-3, AL victory in the All-Star Game on July 15 (the fourth at Yankee Stadium, joining Midsummer Classics in 1939, 1960-Game 2 and 1977).

The building took its final bow on Sept. 21, 2008, when the Yankees played the last game in Stadium history. Gates opened at 1:00 p.m., allowing approximately 13,000 fans the opportunity to visit Monument Park and walk around the warning track. With a national Sunday night audience watching on television, all-time Yankees greats, along with the evening's starting lineup, took their positions in the field before Julia Ruth Stevens, daughter of Babe Ruth, tossed out the ceremonial first pitch. Fittingly, the game ended in a Yankees victory, this one over the Baltimore Orioles, 7-3. After the final out, the club assembled by the pitcher's mound at the side of captain Derek Jeter. Over the PA, he thanked the crowd for their years of support, while reminding everyone of the new memories soon to be made. ❧

In the bottom of the seventh inning of the Yankees' final home game on September 21, 2008, a taped valedictory was given on the Yankee Stadium video board by longtime public address announcer Bob Sheppard, who was unable to say goodbye in person as he continued to recover at home from an illness that had kept him away from the Stadium for the entire season. His appearance on screen brought a reverential hush to the crowd as everyone recognized they were about to hear the most perfect of all couplings perhaps for the last time—Bob Sheppard's voice reverberating in the original Yankee Stadium. He said the following:

"Farewell, old Yankee Stadium, farewell. What a wonderful story you can tell. DiMaggio, Mantle, Gehrig and Ruth, A baseball cathedral in truth."

For almost 20 years in the 1930s and '40s, Yankee Stadium was a regular home to Negro Leagues baseball. During that time the greatest black stars of the day drew thousands of fans to watch players prohibited from playing in the Major Leagues at the time. Almost every Negro Leagues player of note over that two-decade stretch played at Yankee Stadium, including Hall of Famers Leroy "Satchel" Paige, John Henry "Pop" Lloyd, "Cool Papa" Bell, Oscar Charleston, Buck Leonard, Hilton Smith and Josh Gibson, who hit some of the longest home runs in the Stadium's history.

Yankee Stadium opened to black baseball on July 5, 1930, when Yankees owner Jacob Ruppert donated the free use of the facility to the New York Lincoln Giants and Baltimore Black Sox for a benefit doubleheader to raise money for the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters, one of America's most prominent black unions. The games raised approximately \$3,500 and included the appearance of Bill "Bojangles" Robinson who entertained the crowd along with the 369th Hell Fighters marching band.

Black baseball games at Yankee Stadium usually took place on Sundays when the Yankees played on the road. Sometimes a pair of teams would play a doubleheader, while at other times four-team doubleheaders were scheduled in order to maximize attendance and profits. Bands often performed and celebrities such as Joe Louis and New York City Mayor Fiorello LaGuardia were common. Track races and other pregame contests also delighted fans.

In 1931, Lloyd organized an All-Star team of black players named the "Harlem Stars," which played several games at Yankee Stadium. Eventually, that team became the New York Black Yankees of the Negro National League. The club went on to use Yankee Stadium for a portion of their home schedule between 1936 and 1947, often wearing the used uniforms of the Major League Yankees. In the

spring of 1941, Paige, black baseball's greatest pitcher, briefly joined the Black Yankees, pitching and winning his only game in a New York uniform at Yankee Stadium.

Yankee Stadium also served as the venue for black baseball All-Star games and championship contests. One of the most memorable Negro Leagues All-Star games took place on August 27, 1939, when the Negro National League defeated the Negro American League, 10-2, with the help of Gibson's bases-clearing triple.

Ruppert's death in 1939 did not put a stop to black baseball at the Stadium. In fact, the Yankees sponsored a Jacob Ruppert Memorial Cup tournament among Negro National League teams. Ten doubleheaders were held at Yankee Stadium that summer to determine a winner, and on September 24, 1939, the Baltimore Elite Giants were crowned champs in Ruppert's name.

In October 1946, Yankee Stadium was home to two noteworthy exhibition games between an African-American All-Star team managed by Paige and an American League All-Star team led by future Hall of Famer Bob Feller. Cleveland Indians pitcher Bob Lemon hit a home run to win the first game for the AL but Paige out-pitched Feller in the second game to earn a split.

When Jackie Robinson finally broke the color barrier with the Brooklyn Dodgers in 1947 (after having played at the Stadium as a member of the Kansas City Monarchs in 1945), it was a watershed moment in the history of civil rights in the United States. But it also precipitated the decline and eventual extinction of the Negro Leagues.

Black baseball's relationship with the New York Yankees came to a close on August 20, 1961, as stars of the Negro American League gathered for its All-Star Game at Yankee Stadium. Paige, reportedly 55 years old at the time, pitched three scoreless innings and claimed the game's Most Valuable Player honors. ✎



Previous Homes of the Yankees

Hilltop Park

American League Park (commonly known as Hilltop Park) was the Yankees' first home. Hastily constructed in just six weeks on one of the highest points in Upper Manhattan, the all-wooden ballpark sat on a block bounded by Broadway, 165th Street, Fort Washington Avenue and 168th Street, in close proximity to the New York Giants' 157th Street home, the Polo Grounds. The first game at Hilltop Park was played on April 30, 1903—a 6-2 win over Washington, started by Hall of Famer Jack Chesbro.

The ballpark had a covered grandstand ringing the infield from first base to third base and uncovered bleachers running up the foul lines. There was seating for approximately 15,000 people, but as was the case in many ballparks of that time, it could accommodate overflow crowds both in the outfield and along foul ground in the infield, occasionally bringing capacity up toward 25,000.

When a fire ravaged the Polo Grounds on April 14, 1911, the Yankees allowed the Giants to play their home games at Hilltop Park until the Polo Grounds could be rebuilt. From April 15 through May 30, the Giants put together a 20-8 record at their temporary home.

The Yankees were successful in their 10 years at Hilltop Park, compiling a 398-342-8 all-time record there. The club's final game at the structure came on October 5, 1912—an 8-6 win vs. Washington. After the Yankees' lease at Hilltop Park expired at the end of the season, they decided to leave the rickety ballpark to become renters at the Polo Grounds, where the Giants became their landlords. The move, unthinkable years earlier, was facilitated by the Yankees' post-fire hospitality.

In 1914, Hilltop Park was torn down. Currently, its former location is the site of NewYork-Presbyterian Medical Center. ❧

Polo Grounds

The Yankees called the Polo Grounds home from 1913 through 1922, sharing the park with the New York Giants. Located on West 157th Street and Eighth Avenue in Upper Manhattan, the Polo Grounds was overlooked by a promontory called Coogan's Bluff to the west. To the east was the Harlem River—on the other side of which Yankee Stadium was built in 1923.

The Polo Grounds was constructed with straight sides, and the outfield fences by the foul poles ran parallel to each other and away from home plate. The foul poles in left and right were approximately 277 and 258 feet away from the plate, respectively, while left-center, center and right fields were all in the range of 445-483 feet away from home.

The Yankees compiled a 416-338-10 all-time regular season record at the uniquely-shaped facility, winning the first two pennants in franchise history while tenants in 1921 and 1922. The club lost both of those World Series to the NL Champion Giants—5 games to 3 in 1921 and 4 games to none with one tie in 1922—in Fall Classics played entirely at the Polo Grounds.

The American Leaguers were welcome tenants as long as they remained less popular than the Giants. But with Babe Ruth's arrival in 1920 and the team's subsequent success, the dynamic quickly changed. After the Yankees started outdrawing the Giants in their own park in 1920 and 1921, the National Leaguers asked the Yankees to vacate to a new facility as soon as possible. The 1922 season marked their final season in Manhattan before their April 18, 1923, Yankee Stadium debut in the Bronx.

The Polo Grounds remained home to the Giants until they moved to San Francisco in 1958. It stood empty until 1962 when the Mets arrived to play two seasons there before moving into Shea Stadium. In 1964, the Polo Grounds was demolished. Apartment buildings called the Polo Grounds Towers occupy the site today. ❧

Shea Stadium

During the 1974-75 renovation of original Yankee Stadium, the Yankees shared Shea Stadium in Flushing, Queens, with the New York Mets.

These were transitional years for the Yankees, with Bill Virdon managing all but the final two months of the 1975 season when Billy Martin assumed command on Old-Timers' Day. It was Martin's first of five tours of duty as Yankees manager.


The Yankees had a combined 172-150 record over the two seasons, (90-69 at Shea), while drawing 2,561,123 fans over the span. The team made Shea as Yankees-friendly as possible, with the Yankees' top hat logo atop the Shea scoreboard, Bob Sheppard doing the public address announcements and Toby Wright on the organ. The team's plaques and monuments however, were placed in storage until the team's return to Yankee Stadium.

The players occupied the New York Jets clubhouse and used the first base dugout.


The 1974 Yankees nearly made it to the postseason, finishing just two games behind the division champion Baltimore Orioles. That offseason, the team signed Cy Young winner Jim "Catfish" Hunter, a free agent, to a historic five-year contract, and traded Bobby Murcer for Bobby Bonds, who delivered the Yankees' first 30 home run / 30 stolen base season in 1975. Hunter's New Year's Eve signing was announced at a press conference at the team offices in the Parks Administration Building in Flushing Meadow Park across Roosevelt Avenue from Shea. He would go 23-14 in 1975 with 30 complete games and 328.0 innings pitched.

An infamous event at Shea occurred on June 10, 1975, when the Yankees held a Salute to the U.S. Army Day, which featured a 21-gun salute for the Army's 200th anniversary. The percussion from cannon fire proceeded to blow down the outfield fence and set it on fire, resulting in a delay to the start of the game, and national news coverage.

Shea Stadium, named for attorney William A. Shea who spearheaded the effort to bring an expansion team to New York, opened in 1964 and made its farewell after the 2008 season, just like the renovated original Yankee Stadium. ❄️

Picture Perfect

The grandeur of the original Yankee Stadium was a much sought-out location for filming during its existence. The current Yankee Stadium has been featured in film, appearing in *The Adjustment Bureau* (2011), *Megan Leavey* (2016) and *Set It Up* (2018), as well as episodes of television's *Extreme Makeover: Home Edition* (2010), *Entourage* (2011), *White Collar* (2012) and *God Friended Me* (2019). The Stadium was also the site of Mariah Carey's 2009 music video for "I Want to Know What Love Is," and it featured in a widely regarded Facebook Groups commercial in 2019. It has been additionally featured on talk shows such as the *Tonight Show Starring Jimmy Fallon* and *Late Night with Seth Myers* as well as in a segment in ESPN's *Peyton's Place* series.



Monument Park

Since 1932, the New York Yankees have honored their all-time greats with the dedication of monuments and plaques in Yankee Stadium. The tradition continues in the current Stadium in Monument Park, located behind the outfield fence in center field.

The first monument was dedicated on May 30, 1932, to the memory of Miller Huggins, who died suddenly in 1929. The diminutive manager guided the Yankees to six American League pennants and three World Championships in his 11-plus seasons.

The first plaque was placed on the center-field wall in April 1940, a tribute to Jacob Ruppert, the former owner who built Yankee Stadium and brought the tradition of winning to the Yankees.

Two additional monuments followed: in 1941 for Lou Gehrig and in 1949 for Babe Ruth. Later plaques were placed in center field for General Manager Ed Barrow (1954) and two great Yankees center fielders, Joe DiMaggio and Mickey Mantle (1969). After his death, Mantle's plaque was removed and replaced by a fourth monument on August 25, 1996. On April 25, 1999, DiMaggio—who passed away less than two months earlier—was honored with the Stadium's fifth monument. (The two plaques which previously honored DiMaggio and Mantle were donated by the Yankees to the Yogi Berra Museum and Learning Center in Montclair, N.J.)

Originally, the monuments, plaques and Stadium flagpole were located in the field of play on the warning track in straight-away center field, approximately 10 feet in front of the wall. On many occasions, long hits and fly balls forced fielders to go behind the monuments to retrieve the baseball.

One tradition of Yankee Stadium before it was remodeled was to allow fans to exit through the center-field gates via the warning track, where they could pause and reflect on the achievements of these honored legends. After the Stadium was remodeled in 1974 and 1975, the monuments and plaques were relocated to an area off the field between the Yankees' and visitors' bullpens.

In 1976, two more plaques were added to memorialize managers Joe McCarthy and Casey Stengel. In the 1980s, plaques were dedicated to Yankees greats Thurman Munson (1980), Elston Howard and Roger Maris (1984), Phil Rizzuto (1985), Billy Martin (1986), Whitey Ford and Lefty Gomez (1987), Yogi Berra and Bill Dickey (1988), and Allie Reynolds (1989). The team also dedicated two plaques to non-uniformed Yankees legends — the "Voice of the Yankees," Mel Allen (1998), and the "Voice of Yankee

Stadium," public address announcer Bob Sheppard (2000). Yankees greats Don Mattingly (1997), Reggie Jackson (2002), Ron Guidry (2003) and Red Ruffing (2004) had their plaques added prior to the closing of the original Yankee Stadium. At the current Stadium, Tino Martinez, Goose Gossage, Paul O'Neill and Joe Torre (all 2014), Bernie Williams, Willie Randolph, Mel Stottlemyre, Jorge Posada and Andy Pettitte (2015), Mariano Rivera (2016) and Derek Jeter (2017) have had their plaques added as well.

Plaques commemorating the visits of Pope Paul VI in 1965 and Pope John Paul II in 1979 were dedicated by the Knights of Columbus, and a plaque commemorating the Yankees' interlocking "NY" insignia was added to the park in 2001. A plaque was also dedicated in 2008 following the visit of Pope Benedict XVI, and another was added in 2014 to commemorate the 1990 visit of Nelson Mandela.

In 1985, after the left-center-field fence of the original Stadium was moved in, the Yankees were able to open Monument Park for up-close fan viewing. By 1988, long lines and increased fan interest caused the Yankees to move the fence in further and expand the area. A special walkway was added with an exhibit honoring those Yankees who have had their uniform numbers retired.

In a pregame ceremony on Sept. 11, 2002, the Yankees dedicated a monument in remembrance of the victims and heroes of the 9/11 tragedy. It was the sixth monument dedicated in Yankee Stadium and the first to non-Yankees personnel.

During a special pregame ceremony on Sept. 20, 2010, the entire Yankees team joined the Steinbrenner family and Yankees alumni in unveiling a monument for longtime Principal Owner George M. Steinbrenner III, who passed away on July 13 of that season.

Additionally, in the current Yankee Stadium, plaques were added to commemorate the achievements of Jackie Robinson (dedicated on Sept. 22, 2013 — the same day the Yankees honored the career of Mariano Rivera), the life of Nelson Mandela and his June 21, 1990, visit to Yankee Stadium (dedicated on April 15, 2014) and the 50th anniversary of the Stonewall Inn uprising (dedicated on June 25, 2019).

In all, there are seven monuments (for four Yankees players, one manager, one owner and one to commemorate the tragedy of 9/11) and 38 plaques (for 24 Yankees players, three managers, one owner, one executive, one PA announcer, one broadcaster, three Papal visit commemorations, ones recognizing Jackie Robinson, Nelson Mandela, the Stonewall Inn, and one noting the history of the NY logo). ❄

Yankees Around the Globe

As the game of Baseball continues to grow on a global scale, “America’s Pastime” has become infused with talent from every corner of the world.

The New York Yankees, as one of the most recognized brands in the world, are dedicated to making meaningful and lasting footprints throughout the international Baseball community.

The Yankees’ 2021 Opening Day roster (active, injured and restricted list) featured nine internationally-born players. The roster featured players from six different countries outside the U.S. (Colombia, Cuba, Dominican Republic, México, Nicaragua, and Venezuela), tied for the second-most by any team in the Majors in 2021, trailing only the San Diego Padres (nine).

Signing and developing exceptional talent from around the globe has become a trademark of the Yankees organization. Some of the club’s acquisitions include 2019 Hall of Fame inductee and Panamá native Mariano Rivera, five-time All-Star Jorge Posada of Puerto Rico, seven-time All-Star Alfonso Soriano out of the Dominican Republic, two-time All-Star Hideki Matsui from Japan, and 2006 Cy Young Award runner-up Chien-Ming Wang from Taiwan. Japanese pitcher Masahiro Tanaka was a stalwart in the Yankees starting rotation for seven seasons after signing via the posting system in 2014.

The organization has developed top minor league talent from around the world, placing three foreign-born players in the top-three of AL “Rookie of the Year” balloting since 2016 (Gary Sánchez, Miguel Andújar, Gleyber Torres). The Yankees have filled their minor league ranks in recent years by signing players from Australia, Brazil, Canada, China, Colombia, Cuba, the Czech Republic, Israel, México, Nicaragua, Panamá, Poland, South Korea, Taiwan and Venezuela. In addition, the Yankees field a Dominican Summer League team and operate a state-of-the-art Latin Baseball Academy in the Dominican Republic.

The Latin Béisbol Academy

For the vast majority of the Yankees’ Latin American prospects, the Latin Béisbol Academy is the starting point for their professional careers.

Located in Boca Chica, Dominican Republic, the academy was constructed from scratch, allowing player development personnel to manage every detail of the project, from the trainer’s room to the clubhouses to the classrooms. The finished product is a four-building, four-field complex with the capacity to house up to 110 players. There is also a small apartment building for coaches and instructors. Officially opening in June 2005 and finally completed in the spring of 2006, the academy has a campus-like feel to it that is not lost on the ballplayers, many of whom are spending time away from their families for the very first time.

Previously, the Yankees had leased a variety of facilities in Latin America for scouting and player development use, but it became apparent that it was necessary to develop their own facility.

As a dedicated investor in Latin American talent, the Yankees make every effort to provide their players with a well-rounded education off the field. The complex is staffed with educators who teach players academic disciplines such as Spanish and English, along with broad-based life skills such as conflict resolution, financial literacy and American customs. Players are also given guidance on how to deal with the heavy travel inherent to a baseball lifestyle. Throughout their time at the academy, the young Yankees hopefuls participate in clinics with local children, reminding them to always be mindful of their community.

The Yankees also arrange for past and present Major League stars, such as Mariano Rivera and Reggie Jackson, to be guest lecturers for the prospects. The players received a special visitor in January 2011 when professional boxing champion Miguel Cotto paid a visit. In January 2020, Yankees Manager Aaron Boone visited the Béisbol Academy.

The players and staff are also active in local community events, hosting annual instructional clinics in the Dominican Republic, Nicaragua and Venezuela. In addition, the Yankees’ Latin complex has hosted R.B.I. (Reviving Baseball in the Inner City) tournament games, joined the Yankees organization in 2007 to donate \$65,000 in food and cash to hurricane-damaged areas in the D.R. and Nicaragua, and adopted an orphanage in La Romana, D.R., supplying it with food, money and clothing. In 2013, the Yankees donated a fire truck and an ambulance—along with firefighting and medical equipment—to the city of Boca Chica.

In July 2010, Dominican Summer League players delivered gifts to ailing children at a local hospital in Santo Domingo. The Latin Béisbol Academy also played host to a fundraiser game in 2010 against the Dominican National Police Department to raise money for local charities throughout the D.R. And in 2011, select Yankees draft picks held a clinic in San Pedro de Macoris for more than 100 kids, handing out shoes, equipment and uniforms to participants.

The Yankees field a DSL team annually and won back-to-back titles in 2005-06. With the hard work and dedication of the Yankees Player Development staff, the organization looks forward to the future, when these young players will lead the way to a 28th World Championship in the Bronx.

Yankees Sweep London

In June 2019, the Yankees flew across the pond to London, England, to play a two-game series against the rival Boston Red Sox at London Stadium, the first-ever Major League games played in Europe.

While there, the Yankees continued to do their part to grow the game globally through numerous community initiatives.

The day before the London Series opened, the Yankees hosted a baseball clinic at Finsbury Park for approximately 100 youth in the London community, in conjunction with the London Meteorites Baseball and Softball Club. Manager Aaron Boone, as well as former Yankees Carlos Beltrán, Reggie Jackson, Hideki Matsui, Andy Pettitte, Mariano Rivera, Alex Rodriguez and Nick Swisher, served as clinic coaches before a BBQ reception. At the close of the event, the Yankees presented the London Meteorites with a legacy gift that included baseball and softball equipment (bats, baseballs, helmets, gloves, catcher’s gear, etc.).



Yankees Travel to Panamá

In conjunction with Major League Baseball and the Major League Baseball Players Association, the Yankees traveled to Panamá prior to the 2014 season for the “Legend Series,” a set of two exhibition games against the Miami Marlins at Panamá City’s Rod Carew Stadium. The trip served as a tribute to the career of former Yankees reliever and Panamá native Mariano Rivera, who had capped off his Hall of Fame career by retiring as MLB’s all-time saves leader at the conclusion of the 2013 season.

Rivera played host for the weekend, which featured a number of charitable events away from the field. Chief among them was a gala benefitting the Mariano Rivera Foundation, the proceeds of which supported the Children’s Hospital in Panamá City, the largest pediatric hospital in the country. Yankees players also visited the hospital, bringing with them a large donation of toys and spending time with the children.

Rivera also took a Yankees contingent – including General Partner/Vice Chairperson Jennifer Steinbrenner Swindal, President Randy Levine, COO Lonnie Trost, Manager Joe Girardi, hitting coach Kevin Long, bench coach Tony Peña, spring training instructor Willie Randolph, outfielder Brett Gardner and reliever David Robertson – on a behind-the-scenes tour of the Panamá Canal.

The visit marked the first appearance by Major League Baseball in the Central American country since 1947, when the Yankees faced the Brooklyn Dodgers in several exhibition games on a trip that also included stops in Cuba, Puerto Rico and Venezuela.

Yankees Teach in Taiwan

In January 2009, the Yankees joined the Chinese Taipei Baseball Association under the auspices of Major League Baseball in holding a clinic for high school pitchers, catchers and coaches at the National Taiwan Sport University’s Taoyuan Campus in Taipei, Taiwan. It marked the Yankees’ first-ever large-scale outreach in Taiwan and represented the club’s initiative in cultivating baseball talent and increasing brand recognition in Asia and the greater international community. The five-day clinic focused on pitching and catching fundamentals and philosophy.

Yankees and Chinese Baseball Association Reach Memorandum of Understanding

The New York Yankees and the Chinese Baseball Association (CBA) held a press conference in Beijing, China, on Jan. 29, 2007, to announce a Memorandum of Understanding that for the first time formalized a strategic alliance between a Major League Baseball club and the CBA. During the Yankees’ 2009 World Series trophy tour, club officials met with the CBA in Beijing to further the cooperation agreement between the two entities.

The agreement, subject to Major League Baseball’s rules, regulations and agreements pertaining to the People’s Republic of China, states that the Yankees will provide the CBA with guidance in training baseball players, including sending coaches, player development staff, scouting and training personnel to China to assist the CBA. The partnership also allows the CBA to send staff to the Yankees’ facilities in the United States in furtherance of those goals.

During their 2007 trip, the Yankees were represented in Beijing by team President Randy Levine, Senior Vice President and General Manager Brian Cashman, Vice President and Assistant General Manager Jean Afterman, and Vice President of Corporate Sales and Sponsorship Michael Tusiani. Beijing Womei Advertising Company Limited and SportsCorp China, headed by President and Managing Director Marc Ganis and Managing Director Kenneth Huang, coordinated the meetings and were instrumental in the Yankees’ involvement in China.

The CBA was represented by Chairman Hu Jianguo, Secretary General Shen Wei and Deputy Secretary General Tian Yuan.

On June 16, 2007, the Yankees announced the signings of catcher Zhenwang Zhang and left-handed pitcher Kai Liu to minor league contracts, marking the first-ever acquisition by a Major League organization of Chinese baseball players. Both players were members of the Chinese National team that competed in the 2008 Olympics in Beijing.

Partners in Japan

During the 2002 season, the Yankees entered into a working agreement with the Yomiuri Giants, winners of 22 Japan Series Championships. Pursuant to the agreement, the teams consented to share baseball information, ideas and strategies. Also in 2002, the Yankees pursued and signed three-time Central League MVP Hideki Matsui. A nine-time Japanese League All-Star and three-time home run champion, Matsui became the first bona fide power hitter to make the transition from Japan to the Major Leagues.

In 2004, the Yankees traveled to Tokyo to open the regular season against the Tampa Bay Devil Rays. The historic trip marked the 70th anniversary of Babe Ruth and Lou Gehrig’s 1934 All-Star tour of Japan. It also recognized the anniversary of the founding of the Yomiuri Giants franchise, Japan’s oldest professional baseball team. The two-game series was just the second-ever Major League season opener to take place in Japan. At the time, the two games were the highest-rated televised Major League games in Japan’s history.

Yankees Championship Trophy Tour of the Dominican Republic, Japan and China

Following their 2009 championship season, the Yankees embarked on a world tour with their 2009 World Series Trophy, traveling to the Dominican Republic and Asia.

A Yankees contingent took the championship trophy to the Dominican Republic for a three-day tour from Jan. 7-9, 2010. The D.R. leg of the trophy tour included stops at the National Palace for a ceremony with President Dr. Leonel Fernández, who was joined by bench coach Tony Peña, and players Robinson Canó, Damaso Marte, Francisco Cervelli and Edwar Ramírez as well as by several Yankees minor leaguers. The next day, the Yankees visited the U.S. Embassy and the National Police Headquarters. That evening, the Yankees displayed the trophy for fans at the Dominican Winter League playoff game between los Tigres del Licey and los Leones del Escogido at Estadio Quisqueya Juan Marichal in Santo Domingo. On their final day in the D.R., the Yankees placed the trophy on display for residents of the town of Casa de Campo.

Three weeks later, a Yankees delegation consisting of team President Randy Levine, Senior Vice President and General Manager Brian Cashman, Vice President and Assistant General Manager Jean Afterman and Senior Vice President of Corporate Sales and Sponsorships Michael Tusiani took the trophy on a six-day tour to Tokyo, Beijing and Hong Kong from Jan. 31 through Feb. 5, 2010.

The contingent was met by fans and media at Tokyo's Narita Airport, marking this first-ever occasion of a Yankees World Series Trophy being brought to Asia. The next day, another historic moment took place at the MLB Café in Tokyo as the trophy was displayed alongside the Yomiuri Giants' 2009 Japan Series championship trophy.

From there, the trophy traveled to China, where fans in Beijing and Hong Kong had their first opportunity to gaze at Major League Baseball's grandest prize. The trophy tour in China was organized by QSL Sports, which has been active in the promotion of Baseball in the People's Republic of China and operates the China Youth Baseball League together with the Chinese Baseball Association. The events in China were hosted by QSL Sports, New World Department Stores (one of the largest owners and operators of department stores in China), and K11, the "World's First Art Mall," which integrates elements of art, culture and nature, while elevating the shopping experience.

On Feb. 3, 2010, Yankees officials met with the CBA in Beijing to further the cooperation agreement between the two entities, after which the groups held a joint press conference at the Kunlun Hotel. Later that evening, the championship trophy made its first public appearance in China at the New World Department Store, which included traditional Chinese performances and ceremonies. Joining the Yankees delegation were CBA officials, New World representatives and the Beijing Yankees youth baseball team, which is part of MLB's "Play Ball" youth baseball program in China.

Hong Kong marked the final stop on the Asian tour, with a Feb. 5, 2010, event at the Hyatt Regency hotel adjacent to the recently-opened K11 Mall. The next morning, the trophy was introduced to players and fans during the opening ceremony for the 2010 Phoenix Cup, Hong Kong's International Women's Baseball Tournament.

The Yankees thank their partner Delta Air Lines for ensuring the safe transportation of the World Series trophy and appreciate the efforts of Sportscorp China, led by president Marc Ganis.

2021 SEASON RECAP

Yankees Television Broadcasters



Michael Kay

Michael Kay is the Emmy Award-winning Yankees play-by-play announcer for the YES Network who also hosts the network's *CenterStage* series and its various programming specials. The 2021 season was his 30th year broadcasting Yankees baseball: the first 10 years on radio, the latter 20 on YES.

Kay's *CenterStage* show won a 2020 New York Emmy for best Interview/Discussion show. He also won a 2015 New York Emmy Award for his play-by-play work on YES' Yankees telecasts, and a 2017 New York Emmy for his *CenterStage* hosting duties. In total, Kay has earned 16 Emmy wins and 63 Emmy nominations while at YES. He also won CableFAX Program Awards in 2011 and 2013 for his *CenterStage* hosting duties.

In addition, *The Michael Kay Show*, a sports talk show heard weekdays on ESPN Radio 98.7 FM in New York which Kay co-hosts with Don LeGreca, has been simulcast live weekday afternoons on YES since February 2014. *The Michael Kay Show* is the #1-rated afternoon radio show in New York.

The 2022 MLB season will mark the first season in which Kay will co-host, with former Yankees player Alex Rodriguez, special *Sunday Night Baseball with Kay-Rod* alternate broadcasts on ESPN2 that will air alongside ESPN's traditional *Sunday Night Baseball* broadcasts.

In November 2016, Kay was inducted into the New York State Baseball Hall of Fame. He was inducted into the New York State Broadcasters Association Hall of Fame in October 2018. The following month, he was awarded the Lou Gehrig Sports Award by the Greater New York Chapter of the A.L.S. Association.

Kay received the Vin Scully Award for Excellence in Sports Broadcasting from WFUV Radio in November 2018; WFUV is the radio station for Fordham University, Kay's alma mater. Previous recipients of the Vin Scully Award include Dick Enberg, Ernie Harwell, Bob Costas, Al Michaels, Verne Lundquist, Pat Summerall and Mike "Doc" Emrick.

He was inducted into the inaugural Hall of Fame class of the prestigious Bronx High School of Science in February of 2018. In 2005, Kay was honored in his home borough of the Bronx, having an honorary street sign in his name erected on the Grand Concourse.

Kay handled play-by-play duties for the ESPN Radio Network for the 2016 Blue Jays-Rangers American League Division Series, the 2013 Tigers-Athletics American League Division Series and the 2008 Phillies-Brewers National League Division Series. He also was a frequent contributor to ESPN's Emmy Award-winning *Sports Reporters* television show.

Prior to joining the YES Network in 2002, Kay worked at the MSG Network since 1989 as a Yankees reporter. In 1992, he added Knicks locker room reporter to his responsibilities, and continued in that role until the 1998-99 season.

Kay was awarded the Dick Young Award for Excellence in Sports Media by the New York Pro Baseball Scouts in 1995. In 1998, he was on the MSG Network team that won a New York Emmy for "Outstanding Live Sports Coverage - Series." In 1996 and 1997 he was a member of the MSG Network team that won New York Emmys for "Outstanding Live Sports Coverage - Single Program" for Dwight Gooden's no-hitter and "The Battle for New York: Yankees vs. Mets." He was also a part of the Yankees/MSG Network production team that was nominated for New York Emmy Awards for six consecutive years.

In addition to his television work, the Bronx, NY, native worked as Yankees analyst on WABC Radio from 1992 through the 2001 season which concluded with the classic Yankees-Diamondbacks World Series. Kay was a winner of "Best Sports Reporter" honors at the 2000 New York Metro Achievement in Radio Awards. In 1998, Kay also began co-hosting *Sports Talk with John Sterling and Michael Kay*, a nightly sports radio call-in show which aired on WABC Radio during the winter months.

Shortly after graduating from Fordham University in 1982 with a B.A. in Communications, Kay worked at SportsPhone and as the public address announcer for the New York Pro Summer Basketball League.

In 1982, Kay landed the job as general assignment writer for the New York Post. Two years later, he began covering college basketball (1984-85) and then spent two years as the writer covering the New Jersey Nets. In 1987, he moved to baseball at the Post, serving as the Yankees beat reporter. While he was in that position, he got his first television job with MSG Network as host of the Hot Stove League segment of MSG's SportsNight.

In 1989, Kay moved to the New York Daily News, where he was the Yankees beat reporter before taking the job as a Yankees broadcaster on WABC Radio in 1992. With that jump, Kay became the first newspaper reporter in any sport to make the move into the broadcast booth full-time, performing both play-by-play and analysis.

Kay stayed on the radio for 10 years, broadcasting the Yankees' four World Series championships during that time, before moving to the television side to become the lead play-by-play man for YES in 2002.

Kay has been involved in the Baseball Assistance Team (B.A.T.), a charitable organization whose mission is to provide assistance to members of the baseball community. He co-hosted the 2013 B.A.T. fundraising dinner in New York. Kay also was master of ceremonies at the 2013 Thurman Munson Awards fundraising dinner in New York.

Kay is active with the Alzheimer's Association in memory of his mother, Rose, who passed away from the disease in 2006. He also teamed up with former Yankees manager Joe Girardi and Girardi's Catch 25 Foundation to organize annual charity dinners to raise money for Alzheimer's research.

Kay and his wife Jodi Applegate have a daughter, Caledonia Rose Kay, born in January 2013, and a son, Charles Applegate Kay, born in November 2014.





Carlos Beltrán

Carlos Beltrán, who retired in 2017 after wrapping up an illustrious 20-year MLB career, joined the YES Network in January 2022 as New York Yankees analyst.

Beltrán batted .279, hit 435 homers and recorded 1,587 RBI in a Major League career which started with the Kansas Royals in 1998. He played for seven teams during his career -- the Royals, Astros (twice), Mets, Giants, Cardinals, Yankees and Rangers, before retiring after winning the 2017 World Series with the Astros.

The Manati, Puerto Rico native was drafted by the Royals in the second round of the 1995 Amateur Draft. He made his Major League debut on September 14, 1998 and won the American League Rookie of the Year Award in 1999 after batting .293, hitting 22 homers and knocking in 108 runs that year.

Beltrán ranks 47th all-time in MLB career home runs (435), 29th in doubles (565), 34th in total bases (4,751), 41st in RBI (1,587), 46th in games played (2,586), 25th in extra base hits (1,078), 53rd in runs scored (1,582), and 62nd in hits (2,725). He was a nine-time All-Star and won three Gold Glove Awards and two Silver Slugger Awards. Beltrán excelled in the postseason, posting a .307 batting average with 16 homers and 42 RBI in 65 career postseason games.



David Cone

David Cone, the strikeout artist who endeared himself to New York Yankees fans for his numerous clutch performances and for hurling a perfect game in 1999, initially joined YES as a Yankees analyst in 2002. After pitching for the Mets in 2003 and then retiring from baseball, he re-joined YES as an analyst for the 2008 and 2009 seasons. After a year away from the mic, he came back again to YES in 2011 and has been with the network ever since. Cone has won four New York Emmy Awards while at YES.

In 2019, Cone collaborated on a book with YES colleague Jack Curry called *Full Count: The Education Of A Pitcher*, which was a *New York Times* best-seller. In January 2022, it was announced that Cone would become a game analyst on ESPN's Sunday Night Baseball telecasts in addition to his YES duties.

Cone compiled a 194-126 record, 3.46 ERA and 2,688 strikeouts in his 17-year Major League career. He captured the American League Cy Young Award in 1994 and was a five-time All-Star (1988, 1992, 1994, 1997 and 1999). The Kansas City, Mo., native, known for coming up big in critical games, posted an 8-3 post-season record and played on five world championship teams: the 1992 Blue Jays and the 1996, 1998, 1999 and 2000 Yankees.

The flame-throwing right-hander was drafted by the hometown Kansas City Royals in the third round of the 1981 amateur draft and made his Major League debut with the Royals in 1986. He played the next 5½ seasons with the Mets; in 1988, he ran up a 20-3 record, 2.22 ERA and 213 strikeouts, and on October 6, 1991, he struck out 19 Phillies in a game.

After short stints with the Blue Jays and the Royals (again), he joined the Yankees in 1995. Arguably his finest season in pinstripes was 1998, when he was 20-7 with a 3.55 ERA and 209 strikeouts. A year later, on July 18, 1999, he hurled a perfect game against the Montreal Expos, only the second inter-league perfect game in Major League history. Fellow Yankee Don Larsen's World Series gem in 1956 was the first.

While with the Yankees from 1995-2000, Cone was 64-40 with a 3.91 ERA and 888 strikeouts. He pitched for Boston in 2001, sat out the 2002 season, and pitched briefly for the Mets in 2003 before retiring.

Jack Curry

Jack Curry, who covered the New York Yankees and Major League Baseball at *The New York Times* for nearly 20 years as its Yankees beat writer and as a national baseball writer, joined the YES Network in February of 2010 as Yankees analyst, reporter and program contributor, and as a columnist on the Emmy-Award winning YESNetwork.com. He has received five New York Emmy Awards for his work as part of YES' Yankees broadcast team and has received a total of 30 New York Emmy Award nominations.

Curry has co-written two *New York Times* best-selling books: in 2019, he collaborated on a book with YES colleague David Cone called *Full Count: The Education Of A Pitcher*, and in 2000 he co-wrote a book with Derek Jeter entitled *The Life You Imagine: Life Lessons for Achieving Your Dreams*. In addition, his collaboration with YES colleague Paul O'Neill called *A Swing And A Hit* was scheduled to be released in May of 2022.

Curry has also hosted YES' *Yankees Access* specials, which give viewers exclusive, off-the-field, behind-the-scenes looks at some of the most popular Yankees players. He has traveled to the Dominican Republic and Taiwan to report on Yankee feature stories, international travel atypical of regional sports networks.

Since November 2005, Curry has been a regular contributor to YES' *Yankees Hot Stove* show. His television experience actually extends back to 1991, when he began contributing to Madison Square Garden Network's Yankees pre-game show and weekly baseball magazine show.

While at YES, Curry also hosted *JCTV: Jack Curry TV*, the innovative YESNetwork.com original series which featured interviews with some of the biggest names in sports, entertainment and the media.

Curry joined *The New York Times* in 1987 and became the Yankees beat writer in 1991. He was a national baseball writer at the newspaper from 1998 until December of 2009. While at *The Times*, Curry authored more than 4,500 articles, covering 18 World Series, 11 All-Star Games, 10 MLB Winter Meetings and 2 World Baseball Classics. The New Jersey native also was nominated for a Pulitzer Prize for Public Service Reporting at *The Times* in 1999 for co-writing a series on the demise of New York high school sports, and won multiple Publisher Awards at *The Times*, monthly awards that recognize the best journalism at the paper. Curry has also been the chairman of the New York chapter of the Baseball Writers' Association of America.

In January 2013, Curry received the Broadcast Achievement Award from the New Jersey Sports Writers Association. Also that year, he was named "Top Sports Analyst" by the New Jersey-based *201 Magazine*.

Curry is a 1986 graduate of Fordham University, where he earned a Bachelor's Degree in Communications.



John Flaherty

Former New York Yankees catcher John Flaherty joined the YES team in the spring of 2006 as field reporter, studio analyst and game analyst for YES' Yankees telecasts. He has won six New York Emmy Awards while at YES and has earned individual New York Emmy Award nominations in 2010, 2011, 2013, 2017, 2019, 2020 and 2021 for his YES work.

Drafted by Boston in 1988, Flaherty progressed within the Red Sox farm system before joining the parent club in 1992. He played 14 major league seasons with five teams (Red Sox 1992-93, Detroit Tigers 1994-96, San Diego Padres 1996-97, Tampa Bay Devil Rays 1998-02 and the Yankees 2003-05).

He is perhaps best known to many Yankees fans for his 2004 pinch-hit walk-off single that ended a 13-inning regular season game against the Red Sox. In 2005, he became Yankees pitcher Randy Johnson's personal catcher, in addition to backing up starting catcher Jorge Posada. During his MLB career, he had a .252 batting average in 1,047 games and collected 849 hits, including 80 home runs.

Flaherty is a New York City native and a graduate of George Washington University. In 2015, he was inducted into the New York State Baseball Hall of Fame. In 2009, he was awarded an honorary Doctorate of Humane Letters from St. Thomas Aquinas College in Sparkill, N.Y.



Bob Lorenz

Bob Lorenz, who has won 17 Emmy Awards at YES, is the network's primary studio anchor. He hosts the New York Yankees and Brooklyn Nets pre- and post-game shows, as well as *Yankees Hot Stove* and Emmy Award-winning *Forbes SportsMoney* programs. Lorenz also has play-by-play credits to his name at YES, including Yankees regular season and Spring Training telecasts, Staten Island Yankees games and Ivy League football.

Forbes SportsMoney, which Lorenz co-hosts with *Forbes'* Michael Ozanian, captured Emmy Awards in 2012, 2013, 2014 and 2016. Lorenz won three New York Emmy Awards recognizing him as the top sports anchor in New York.

Prior to joining the YES Network in 2002, Lorenz served as an anchor for CNN/Sports Illustrated, which he joined in April of 1991. He hosted CNN's signature weekly sports programming, including *NFL Preview*, *College Football Preview*, *This Week in the NBA*, *SI Cover to Cover* and *Page One*. He also hosted CNN's weekly baseball show from 1992 to 1996 and, from 1994 to 1996, hosted CNN's *College Basketball Preview* and *College Coaches Corner*. In addition to those duties, Lorenz also worked on a variety of programs for CNN's sister networks TBS and TNT, hosting Super Bowl specials and serving as back-up host on *Inside the NBA* on TNT.

Before joining CNN, Lorenz was a reporter and anchor at WPTV-TV in West Palm Beach, Fla. Joining WPTV-TV in 1988, he wrote, produced and anchored four weekend sportscasts. Lorenz earlier served as sports director at KIEM-TV in Eureka, Calif., was a writer at CBS Extravision in Los Angeles and an analyst/anchor for Citicable in Torrance, Calif.

Lorenz is on the Honorary Event Committee for the Connecticut chapter of Make-A-Wish and has emceed its annual Make-A-Wish Ball. He has also emceed the Annual Miracle Ball, which raises money and awareness for the Miracle League of Westchester County in New York.

He holds a degree in broadcast journalism from the University of Southern California.



Meredith Marakovits

Meredith Marakovits was named the YES Network's New York Yankees clubhouse reporter in March 2012. She reports on the team within the network's Yankees game telecasts, pre- and post-game shows, *Yankees Batting Practice Today* and *Yankees Hot Stove*. Marakovits has won five New York Emmy Awards while covering the Yankees at YES and in 2019 she was named to the "Top Women in Sports" list by the trade organization Cynopsis. The Cynopsis list recognizes female trailblazers in the sports industry; Marakovits was named in the On-Air Talent category.

Marakovits also appears on YES' special Yankees programming, contributes to YESNetwork.com, the network's Emmy Award-winning Web site, and has filled in as YES' Brooklyn Nets reporter and pre- and post-game show host. In January 2016, she travelled to the Dominican Republic to interview a number of Yankee players for YES' *Yankees Access* show. She also hosted the weekly *Joe Girardi Show* on YES while Girardi managed the Yankees.

Marakovits frequently appears as a guest on MLB Network shows such as *The Rundown* and *MLB Now*.

Prior to joining the YES team, Marakovits worked for several Comcast SportsNet regional sports networks including SNY in New York, where she was an anchor and contributed to SNY programs *The Wheelhouse*, *Daily News Live* and *GEICO Sportsnite*. At Comcast SportsNet Philadelphia, Marakovits was a Philadelphia 76ers sideline reporter, as well as a contributor to *Toyota Sportsnite*. She was also a fill-in anchor at Comcast SportsNet New England.

On the radio side, Marakovits covered the Yankees and Mets for 1050 ESPN, and contributed elsewhere to WFAN radio in New York. Preceding her work in New York, Marakovits served as the Phillies reporter for 950 ESPN Radio/97.5 the Fanatic in Philadelphia. While there she covered back-to-back World Series, contributed to ESPN and ESPNNews, and appeared on MLB's first reality series, *The Pen*.

Earlier in her career, Marakovits served as the pre- and post-game host and field reporter for the Emmy Award-winning Lehigh Valley Ironpigs Television Network in Allentown, Pennsylvania; the IronPigs are the Phillies' AAA affiliate. She also covered the Reading Phillies (AA affiliate) while there. Marakovits also worked for Service Electric 2's sports division as a sideline reporter for college football, basketball, and indoor football broadcasts.

In December 2013, Marakovits' alma mater, Allentown (Pa.) Central Catholic High School, inducted her into its Rockne Wall of Fame, for her athletic exploits. A Northampton, Pa. native, Marakovits is a graduate of La Salle University in Philadelphia, where she played volleyball and graduated in 2005 with a degree in Communications.





Cameron Maybin

Cameron Maybin, who announced his retirement in January 2022 after a 15-year major league career, joined the YES Network a month later as a New York Yankees analyst.

A native of Asheville, North Carolina, Maybin was selected out of high school by the Detroit Tigers with the 10th overall pick in the 2005 MLB Amateur Draft. Heading into that draft, he was named most promising outfielder and the third-best hitting prospect overall by Baseball America. He made his debut for the Tigers on August 17, 2007, at the age of 20.

Maybin played for 10 teams throughout his MLB career – the Tigers (three times), Marlins (twice), Padres, Braves, Angels, Astros, Mariners, Yankees, Cubs and Mets. He was a member of the 2017 World Series champion Houston Astros.

Maybin batted .254 with 72 homers and 354 RBI in his major league career. The speedy outfielder was also adept on the basepaths, racking up 187 career stolen bases. He had a productive stint with the Yankees in 2019, batting .285 with 11 home runs and an .858 OPS in 82 games with the team. He most notably enjoyed a red-hot stretch during June of that season in which he homered in four straight games.



Nancy Newman

Emmy Award-winner Nancy Newman, who joined YES in 2003, is a studio host for the New York Yankees and the Brooklyn Nets pre- and post-game shows and lead anchor for YES' *Yankees Batting Practice Today* show, which kicks off YES' Yankees game day coverage by providing the latest news, exclusive looks at teams during batting practice, interaction with YES' on-site announcers, interviews and features.

In addition, Newman is the host of the Network's *Yankees Magazine* program which goes behind the scenes and in the community with the New York Yankees. Newman has served as YES' Yankees reporter as well as sideline reporter for the network's Ivy League college football package and *New York Football Sunday* and is now host for The New Era Pinstripe Bowl college football coverage on YES. She has served since 2019 as emcee of the New York State Baseball Hall of Fame induction ceremonies in Troy, NY. Newman has won five New York Emmy Awards while at YES.

Prior to joining the YES Network, Newman held a variety of sports broadcasting positions with the CNN Networks from 1992 to 2002. She hosted *CNN Sports Tonight* and *Latenight* as well as *CNN Sports Sunday* and CNN's Goodwill Games Preview. Newman also hosted and worked on programs for CNN's sister networks, including *CNN Sports/Illustrated* and *CNN Headline News* for which she anchored sports. She served as occasional reporter for CNN's weekly MLB and NFL preview programs and appeared as a panelist on CNN's *Burden of Proof* discussing the NHL. In 2000, she hosted Turner Sports' Emmy-Award-winning coverage of the NHL Atlanta Thrashers inaugural season.

Newman also worked for NBC, having served as an events reporter for the 2004 Olympic Games in Athens, Greece. Newman came to CNN from The Sports Network (TSN), where she worked from 1990-1992 covering Major League Baseball, the NFL, the NHL and horse racing. Newman's reporting there garnered a 1991 Sovereign Award for Outstanding Broadcast.

In 2019, Newman emceed the National Down Syndrome Society's (NDSS) annual gala as it partnered with the Professional Baseball Athletic Trainers Society (PBATS) at Gotham Hall in New York City. In 2015 Newman emceed The Green Sports Alliance Awards at Yankee Stadium honoring the New York Yankees for their dedication to environmental leadership.

Newman earned a Bachelor's degree in English from the University of Toronto which, in 2011 awarded her its Boundless Voice honors.

Paul O'Neill

Paul O'Neill is in his 21st season as the New York Yankees analyst for the YES Network. He has earned three New York Emmy Awards for his work at YES.

O'Neill played Major League Baseball for 17 seasons, from 1985 to 2001. He appeared in six World Series and earned five World Series rings, one with the Cincinnati Reds and four with the New York Yankees. He also played in five All-Star games.

O'Neill began his MLB career in 1985 with the Reds. After eight seasons with the Reds, O'Neill joined the Yankees in 1993, with whom he won the American League batting title in 1994 with a .359 average. From July 23, 1995 until May 7, 1997, O'Neill played 235 games in right field without making an error. In 1997, he led the American League in hitting with men on base with a .429 average. On Aug. 25, 2001, O'Neill became the oldest major leaguer to steal 20 bases and hit 20 home runs in the same season.

He was inducted into the New York State Baseball Hall of Fame in November 2017. In 2008, O'Neill was named "Father of the Year" by The National Father's Day Council at its 67th Annual Father of the Year awards dinner in New York.



Ryan Ruocco

Ryan Ruocco, who joined YES in 2007 as a statistician for the network's New York Yankees telecasts, currently holds down a variety of roles within the network's Yankees coverage. He backs up YES' play-by-play man Michael Kay, fills in hosting YES' Yankees Pre- and Post-Game Shows and periodically handles clubhouse reporting duties. Ruocco also shares play-by-play duties with veteran Ian Eagle on YES' Brooklyn Nets telecasts.

Ruocco has won three Emmy Awards while at YES. He also earned individual New York Emmy nominations in 2015, 2017, 2018, 2019 and 2021 for his Yankees and Nets work at

the network.

In addition to his YES work, Ruocco is one of the primary NBA play-by-play voices on ESPN, was recently named lead play-by-play announcer for the network's women's college basketball package and is the lead play-by-play announcer for the WNBA on ESPN. He also handles periodic NFL play-by-play on ESPN Radio as well as college football and college basketball play-by-play on ESPN's television networks, and he co-hosted ESPN New York Radio's mid-day show.

Ruocco also co-hosts The Ringer's R2C2 podcast with former Yankees pitcher CC Sabathia.

Prior to joining YES, Ruocco handled basketball and football play-by-play at WFUV, Fordham University's radio station while he was a student there. He also hosted WFUV's One on One, New York's longest-running sports call-in show. In 2008, he received Fordham's prestigious Marty Glickman Award, named for the legendary play-by-play announcer.

Ruocco, who grew up in Fishkill, N.Y., graduated on the Dean's List from Fordham in 2008 with a B.S. in Communications.

John Sterling

"Yankees win! Theeeeeeee Yankees win!"

If anything has become synonymous with the Yankees' run of success over recent years, it is John Sterling's memorable conclusion to so many Yankees victories. As the radio voice to 162 games a year, plus preseason and postseason, he has called 5,365 official games (5,163 regular season/202 postseason) over the last 33 seasons, missing only twelve games in his illustrious career, making him one of the most recognized—and imitated voices—in all of New York sports.

Sterling joined the Yankees broadcast team in 1989 from Atlanta's TBS and WSB Radio, where he called Hawks basketball (1981-89) and Braves games (1982-87). It marked a return to the town where he first achieved fame, hosting a talk show on WMCA from 1971-78, and calling the Nets (1975-80, and as a fill-in, in 1997) and Islanders (1975-78) for WMCA, WVNJ, WWOR-TV and SportsChannel.

Sterling also previously called Morgan State Football (eight years) and Washington Bullets basketball in 1981. In addition to his seven years at WMCA and a year at WSB in Atlanta, he has also hosted talk shows on WFAN and WABC in New York. Prior to missing the Yankees four-game series in Tampa Bay from 7/4-7/19 due to illness, he had not missed a broadcast of any kind since the fall of 1981. That series snapped a streak of 5,060 consecutive games broadcasted.


As the host of the YES Network's acclaimed *Yankeeography* series, Sterling has won 12 Emmy Awards since 2003. He has also been honored by the NJ Sportswriters Association with its Radio-TV Excellence Award (1999), and was the winner of the 2001 Whitney Radio Jimmy Cannon Award. In addition, his call of a Jason Giambi home run on WCBS radio in 2002 was voted the "Best Baseball Call of the Year" in a poll conducted by MLB.com. In 2002, Sterling was also honored by the NY Air Awards for being a part of the best play-by-play team on radio.

In 2020, Sterling was presented with the Governer's Award by the National Academy of Television Arts and Sciences.

When he's not in the booth, Sterling serves as a master of on-field ceremonies for major Yankees events, and is well known for his emcee work at City Hall (with his former radio partner Michael Kay) at "Key to the City" ceremonies following Yankees World Series victories.

Sterling enjoys attending Broadway shows and boasts an extensive knowledge of the lyrics to many American pop standards. In 2007, he embarked on his own Broadway venture in a cabaret show titled "Baseball and Broadway" in which he both served as emcee and sang alongside Broadway talent.

In 2016, he was inducted, along with Suzyn Waldman, to the New York State Broadcasters Hall of Fame. At the annual BBWAA Awards dinner in January 2020, he received the Casey Stengel "You Could Look It Up" Award. For the past 27 years, he has been a spokesman for the Leukemia Society of America. He enjoys reading, movies and swimming. He is the proud father of four children: daughter Abigail and triplets, Veronica, Bradford and Derek.

Suzyn Waldman

Award-winning journalist Suzyn Waldman begins her 36th season either covering or broadcasting the New York Yankees and her 18th season as the Yankees' radio color commentator, the first woman to hold a full-time position as a Major League broadcaster.

Waldman has spent more than three decades overcoming all the obstacles that go along with being a female sports broadcaster and has risen to the top of her profession. In 2006, she became a permanent part of the "Women in Baseball" exhibit at the Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, and in 2009, her World Series Game 6 scorecard was added to the Hall of Fame's collection, commemorating her being the first female broadcaster to call World Series game action. She is a member of the NY Broadcasters Hall of Fame.

In 1987, Waldman became the first voice heard on WFAN-AM in New York, the first all-sports radio station in the country. She was a mainstay on that station for almost 15 years, creating the job of the radio beat reporter, covering both the New York Yankees and New York Knicks. Her news-breaking reports, exclusive interviews and always original and controversial opinions won her countless journalism awards. Her accolades include the "International Radio Award" for her live and emotional reporting from the upper deck of Candlestick Park during the 1989 San Francisco earthquake, the 1996 "N.Y. Sportscaster of the Year" Award from the National Sportscasters & Sportswriters Association and the 1999 "Star Award" for radio from the American Women in Radio and TV. Waldman became a popular talk show host at WFAN and co-hosted the coveted midday slot until leaving WFAN in 2002 to join the YES Network.

The word "first" invariably precedes the name of Suzyn Waldman in every facet of her television and radio career. The first woman to work on a nationally-televised baseball broadcast, Waldman added another first, being the first woman to provide play-by-play for a Major League team, when she started broadcasting New York Yankees games for WPIX, MSG Network and WNYW/FOX5 in the mid 1990s. The first woman ever to host an NBA pre-and post-game show, Suzyn worked in that capacity for the Knicks on WFAN, provided play-by-play for the WNBA on Lifetime TV and was an analyst on St. John's basketball games for MSG and WFAN.

She has been honored by countless organizations, including the Thurman Munson Foundation, the March of Dimes, B'nai B'rith, the Jimmy Fund of Boston and the U.S. Federal Women's Program. In 2006, she received the first Women's Global Health Award from the Albert Einstein College of Medicine at the United Nations. She is a tireless motivational speaker at schools and cancer centers around the country, encouraging young women to pursue their dreams despite any pitfalls they may encounter.

Waldman's life and accomplishments have been the subject of hundreds of magazine and newspaper articles, as well as chapters in children's and motivational books. She has been profiled on the Today Show, CBS Evening News with Dan Rather, ABC's 20/20 and NBC's Dateline. In 2016, she was inducted, along with John Sterling, to the New York State Broadcasters Hall of Fame. She was also a recipient of the Gracie Award, which acknowledges outstanding team leadership and individual achievement, focusing on women who are making positive change and who further the discussion of what a fulfilling career in media looks like. In 2021, for the ninth consecutive year, Radio Ink magazine has named Waldman one of the "100 Most Influential Women in Radio."

A native Bostonian with a B.S. in Economics, and an Honorary Doctorate of Journalism from Boston's prestigious Simmons University, Suzyn spent 15 years on the Broadway musical stage and performed in countless night clubs around the world. She is proudest of her two years starring opposite Richard Kiley in Man of La Mancha. She lives in Westchester with her German shepherd, Margo.



Sweeny Murti

Sweeny Murti begins his 22nd season as the Yankees reporter on the team's flagship radio station WFAN and his ninth year as host of the post-game radio show. Murti provides information and analysis on all of the station's programs. He also hosts podcasts and is a featured columnist on WFAN.com. In the 35-year history of WFAN, Murti is just the station's second Yankees beat reporter, preceded only by current radio analyst Suzyn Waldman.

Murti has worked in various roles at WFAN since 1993. He has also frequently appeared on numerous local and national TV outlets including MLB Network and has earned two New York Emmy Awards.

In addition to covering six World Series for WFAN, Murti has worked two Summer Olympics (1996 and 2000) for Westwood One Radio. At the 2000 Sydney Games, Murti called play-by-play of Team USA's Gold Medal game in softball and reported on Team USA's gold medal-winning efforts in baseball, as well as men's and women's basketball.

Murti has donated several items to the National Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, including his scorecards from Derek Jeter's final "walk off" home game in 2014 and CC Sabathia's 3000th strikeout in 2019. He has also authored features in Hall of Fame publications for the inductions of Mike Mussina in 2019 and Jeter in 2021.

Since 2008, Murti has assisted Yankees great Bernie Williams at his annual gala for the Hillside Food Outreach, which helps feed hungry families in the Hudson Valley. Murti also supports efforts for ALS research and patient care.

In 2011, the New York Pro Baseball Scouts honored Murti with the Jim Quigley Memorial Award for Baseball Service.

As a fill-in analyst on the radio broadcasts since 2015, Murti is regarded as the first Indian-American to take part in a Major League Baseball broadcast.

Murti began his broadcasting career at age 12 for Middletown, Pa. Area School District's award-winning student radio station WMSS and graduated with a B.A. from Penn State University's School of Communications in 1992. He lives in New York's Hudson Valley with his wife Jessica, daughter, Caroline, and son, Ryan.

Rickie Ricardo

Rickie Ricardo is in his ninth season as the New York Yankees' Spanish language play-by-play announcer. Prior to joining the Yankees' WADO broadcast team, Ricardo spent seven years in the same role for Philadelphia Phillies, broadcasting their World Series win in 2008 and postseason

run in 2009.

In 2005, he became the daily beat reporter covering the Florida Marlins for Clear Channel radio. George M. Steinbrenner Field

This year marks the 27th season the Yankees will play their spring training games at George M. Steinbrenner Field in Tampa, Fla. The complex also serves as the home of the Single-A Tampa Tarpons of the Low-A Southeast League. The field's dimensions are an exact replica of Yankee Stadium in the Bronx, measuring 318 feet down the left field line, 408 feet to center field and 314 feet down the right field line.

Fans will also notice another link to the Bronx with replicas of the Yankees' retired numbers placards from Yankee Stadium greeting them as they enter the complex.

The facility originally opened in 1996 as Legends Field. However on February 14, 2008, Hal and Hank Steinbrenner announced that it would be renamed George M. Steinbrenner Field. The name change followed two unanimous resolutions recommending and supporting the change from the Hillsborough County Commission and the Tampa City Council. In a pregame ceremony prior to the Yankees' March 27, 2008, spring training game against the Pittsburgh Pirates, the complex was formally renamed in honor of the late Yankees' Principal Owner and Chairman.

"I am humbled and flattered to have this outstanding and totally unexpected honor conferred on me," said George M. Steinbrenner at the time the resolution was passed. "I extend my thanks to the Tampa City Council and to the Hillsborough County Commissioners for passing resolutions suggesting and recommending the change. I also thank my family for supporting the renaming of the stadium and for everything they have done for so many years that helped bring about this great day."

The resolution passed by the Tampa City Council on February 7, 2008, cited Mr. Steinbrenner's many charitable donations on behalf of youth activities, hospitals and the arts. The resolution passed by the Board of the Hillsborough County Commissioners on February 6, 2008, recognizing Mr. Steinbrenner's numerous extraordinary contributions to the area.

Steinbrenner Field Enhancements



During the winter of 2016-17, George M. Steinbrenner Field underwent significant ballpark enhancements. Some of the highlights include:

Multi-level Bullpen Clubs have been constructed on the first and third base lines. The upper level has a shaded private bar area and is exclusive to Loge Box holders, Club Seat members and private groups. The lower level contains a full-scale bar that is open to all patrons with valid tickets to that day's game.

A newly enhanced Right Field Pavilion allows fans to take in the game with the comfort and shade of a beachside bar. Those with tickets to the Pavilion will have access to a pregame buffet serving traditional ballpark fare and will be provided with two free drink tickets that can be used at the Right Field bar. The Pavilion can comfortably accommodate groups of 20-500 and is available for group purchases and individual game sales.

Loge boxes on the first and third base lines offer semi-private, open-aired, canopied seating for four and access to the exclusive premium lounge, located on the upper level of the first base and third base Bullpen Clubs. Food and beverage (water, soda, beer and wine) are all inclusive in the loge boxes, while premium alcohol is a la carte.

The Left Field Deck is an enclosed and shaded group party area. Those with tickets to the deck will have access to a pregame buffet serving traditional ballpark fare and will be provided with two free drink tickets. The Deck can comfortably accommodate groups of 20-100.

Cabanas are available for groups of 10-or-more on a full season, partial-season or game-day basis. This shaded private area is located in the right field alley in close proximity to the Right Field Pavilion. Food and beverage (water, soda, beer and wine) are all inclusive in the cabanas, while premium alcohol is a la carte.






