RANKIN M. SMITH, Chairman of the Board

No one has played a more significant role in the upward swing of Atlanta Falcon fortunes than Rankin Smith. He has spared no expense in securing the best people and then providing them with facilities that are second to none in the National Football League.

He found the people two years ago when he hired Eddie LeBaron as general manager and Leeman Bennett as head coach.

Prior to the 1978 season, Smith gave his support to the construction of the Atlanta Falcon Training Complex in Suwanee, Ga. Construction on the year-round complex began in April, and the club moved into the facility following the preseason training camp.

"We owe it to our fans to play winning football, and hopefully, give them a championship," says Smith. "No fans in football deserve that more. That knowledge is now—and will continue to be—foremost in the minds of everyone connected with our organization."



Certainly, Smith is also deserving of a championship as well. While his role in the Falcon organization is not as active as in past years, Smith has stood behind his employees while earning a reputation throughout the organization for fairness.

Smith has also exhibited a strong penchant for perseverance. He refused to break during the not-so-good early years of the club. It is the same perseverance that has spelled success in all of his endeavors, beginning as a debit agent in Hot Springs, Ark., for the Life Insurance Company of Georgia. He eventually moved all the way to the presidency of the company, which his grandfather had co-founded.

His football interests reach back to his childhood, and he played the game at Bolles Academy in Jacksonville, Fla., before going to the University of Georgia. World War II interrupted any thoughts of playing for the Bulldogs, and he spent the war years as an Air Force combat pilot in the Western Pacific.

On June 30, 1965, Smith became owner of the Falcons when he was awarded the National Football League franchise for \$8.5 million. The corporate name of the Falcons—The Five Smiths, Inc.—is in honor of his children: Rankin, Jr., 31, President of the Falcons; Mrs. Donald (Carroll Christine) Walraven, 30; Mrs. John O. (Dorothy Ann) Knox, 27; Taylor, 26, Administrative Assistant with the Falcons; and Nancy Karen, 21. There is also a new generation of which Smith is very proud, and that's his four grandchildren, John O. and Bryan Knox, ages 8 and 6, respectively, Caroline Smith, one year, and Ryan Smith, six months. Smith is married to the former Charlotte Topping.

RANKIN M. SMITH, JR., President



Rankin Smith, Jr. is entering his third year as President of the Atlanta Falcons, and it is not coincidence that the Falcons have enjoyed their greatest success during that period.

He has been in professional football almost his entire life, beginning as a teenager at the club's inception in 1966.

Since that time Smith worked in almost every capacity for the Falcons in preparation for his move to the team's top position.

When the vacancy for the general manager position was open, it was Smith, along with Director of Player Personnel Tom Braatz, who supplied a list of available candidates, headed by Eddie LeBaron.

Since Smith assumed the presidency of the club, the Falcons have moved into a year-round training facility in Suwanee, Ga., and made the NFL playoffs for the first time in the club history.

"I feel that I know about football and the National Football League after spending nearly fifteen years in one capacity or another," says the 31 year old Smith.

Not only has he experienced football from the front office side, Smith also had a taste of the game as a player during high school when he played on two state championship finalist teams while at Lovett High School. He has not forgotten the lessons he learned.

"We were small and disciplined and very well coached," recalls Smith, who has played a significant role in instilling that same discipline in the Atlanta front office.

"It's got to start at the top," he continues. "If the players have confidence in what is happening in the front office, it is reflected in their performance on the field."

In addition to his preparation from the football side, Smith majored in business at the University of Georgia, and gained added experience while employed by Life of Georgia Insurance. For the Falcons, his duties included directing the program advertising sales, assisting in the bookkeeping and finance operation, working in the ticket office, and handling team travel.

"The challenge before us was big two years ago and that has not changed," says Smith. "We have made progress, but our ultimate goal is a championship. Our fans have been tremendous over the years, and I hope we can reward them with a franchise that is a winner.

Smith is married to the former Rebecca Robinson and they reside in Atlanta. The Smiths are the proud parents of a daughter, Caroline, one year.

EDDIE LEBARON, General Manager

It has not taken Eddie LeBaron long to show why he was referred to as "The Little Magician" during his NFL quarterback career. In only two years, he has inspired the Atlanta Falcons to new levels of accomplishment in the National Football League.

As always, LeBaron has gone about his work in a most quiet, professional manner. In recognition of his achievements with the Falcons, the Georgia State Hall of Fame has selected LeBaron as its "Sportsman of the Year" in 1977 and 1978. Yet, success is something Eddie LeBaron has learned to live with quite comfortably in a lifetime of beating the odds.

At 5-5, he was regarded as too small to play major college football, but eventually ended his college career by quarterbacking the College All-Stars to an upset victory over the Philadelphia Eagles. At 5-9, all the scouts said he was too small to be effective as a professional quarterback, but when he retired in 1962, LeBaron had amassed 13,330 yards passing in an eleven-year career. Those figures would have been even more impressive if he had not missed several years in order to serve in the Korean Conflict. Even there he was exceptional, winning several medals for bravery.

LeBaron started his career as a 135-pound high school tailback. He attended the College of Pacific, playing his freshman year under the legendary Alonzo Stagg. Selected as a Little All-American three times and guiding Pacific to an unbeaten 1948 season, LeBaron capped his college career with the All-Stars' upset of the Eagles. Most of his professional career was spent with Washington, but he's also remembered as the man Tom Landry picked as his first quarterback for the expansion Dallas Cowboys. During his career, LeBaron never stopped working on his law degree and eventually opened up a practice in Reno, Nev., at the conclusion of his playing days.

Later he moved to Las Vegas, but during his 14 years as a lawyer, he always kept a hand in football, either serving as a part-time coach at the University of Nevada at Las Vegas or color analyst for television.

Now, he is playing for higher stakes, but that's not the reason for his return to football on a full-time basis. "The pay is good, but it wasn't that significant in my decision," says LeBaron. "Primarily, I wanted to get back to something I love—football."

LeBaron and his wife, Doralee have three sons, Edward Wayne III, 24, William, 23, and Richard, 12.



LEEMAN BENNETT, Head Coach



By his own admission, Falcon head coach is still learning every day he is in the National Football League. However, his accomplishments in Atlanta are impressive for a man who has been a head coach only two years.

In that time, he has molded the Falcons into a spirited, competitive aggregation. As a result, the Falcons have compiled a 17-15 overall record under his tenure while making the first playoff appearance in the club's history during 1978.

Two years ago, the Falcons established a new modern day record for fewest points allowed in a single season when they limited their opponents to just 129 points.

In 1977, he was recognized as National Football Conference Coach of the Year by United Press International as well as the Kansas City 101 Club. Last year, The Football News selected Bennett as its NFC Coach of the Year.

Yet, the philosophy of Leeman Bennett never waivers.

"The consistent winners in this league are the teams which have remained consistent in leadership through good times and bad," says Bennett. A coach has to be consistent in the way he treats his players and the way he reacts to things."

And while Bennett knows the Falcons were narrow winners in many of their 1978 victories, he sees another side as well.

"Those are the kind of games good teams win, and we worked hard to instill an attitude of winning," says Bennett. "As I have said in the past, people play the game, not X's and O's."

Bennett's theories and philosophy were developed over 14 years as an assistant coach, both on the college level and in the NFL. He played college football at Kentucky, but was never an outstanding athlete by his own admission. Starting in 1960 as a graduate assistant under Blanton Collier, Bennett has worked under some of the top coaches in America, during his apprenticeship. The only break in that training was a two-year Army stint in 1963-64.

His college stops include a year at Kentucky, a season at Pittsburgh (1966), two years at Cincinnati (1967-68), and a year at the U.S. Naval Academy.

Bennett's professional coaching career began at St. Louis in 1970 and he remained with the Cardinals throughout the following season. In 1972, he joined the Detroit Lions, but moved to Los Angeles when Chuck Knox, another Ram assistant, was named head coach. Bennett served as the Los Angeles receiver coach for four years.

Bennett is married to the former Patricia Parrott and they have two sons, Paul, 13, and Greg, 10.

Assistant Coaches

Jim Champion, Defensive Line

It is no accident that the Falcons have established new records for quarterback sacks during each of Jim Champion's first two years as defensive line coach. Nor is it by chance that the rushing average of Falcon foes dropped from 4.5 an attempt two years ago to less than 3.6 per try the last two seasons. Champion has a wealth of coaching experience, beginning at Greenwood, Miss., High School in 1953. In 1957, he went to his alma mater, Mississippi State, and served with the Bulldogs until 1961. In 1962, Champion moved to Vancouver of the Canadian Football League, but switched to the NFL as a member of the St. Louis Cardinal staff in 1966. He returned to Vancouver a year later, as head coach, and remained there until 1970 before going back to the NFL to stay. During the last nine years, Champion has worked for the New Orleans Saints ('71-'72), St. Louis Cardinals ('74-'75), New York Jets (1976) as well as the Falcons ('77-'79). Champion played for the New York Yankees and Dallas Texans professionally. Jim and his wife, Sara Jane, have three sons, Greg, 26, Keith, 25, and Joseph, 15.

Jerry Glanville, Defensive Coordinator and Secondary

Glanville enters his first season as defensive coordinator after handling the Falcon secondary the past two years. Once again he will also be in charge of the secondary, which has earned the reputation as one of the hardest hitting units in the NFL under Glanville. Two years ago, the Falcons established a record for most passes intercepted in a season while limiting opponents to less than 100 yards per game passing. His first college coaching assignment came at his alma mater of Northern Michigan. Other college stops included a year's stay at Western Kentucky (1967) and six years at Georgia Tech (1968-73). While he was at Georgia Tech, the Rambling Wreck made three bowl appearances. He moved to the professional ranks as a member of the Detroit Lions' staff, and remained there until joining the Falcons in '77. Glanville is married, and he and his wife, Brenda, reside in North Atlanta.

John North, Offensive Backfield

Veteran coach John North is beginning his 15th year as a National Football League coach. He came into the NFL as an assistant with the Detroit Lions in 1965, and remained there until joining New Orleans in 1973. North spent three years as head coach of the Saints. Prior to his professional experience, John coached at three colleges, Tennessee Tech (1953-56), Kentucky (1956-62), and Louisiana State (1962-64). While serving at Kentucky under Blanton Collier, two of North's players were Leeman Bennett and Doug Shively, linebacker coach of the Falcons. Following his graduation from Vanderbilt, North had a three-year professional career with Baltimore. He and his wife, Dell, have two children.

Ted Plumb, Receivers

Plumb came to the Falcons from the New York Giants. His coaching career started in 1963 at Raymonville High School and he worked his way up the coaching ladder step by step. His next stop was Lubbock High School and then came two years at Cerritos Jr. College. Plumb moved to the major college level when he went to Texas Christian in 1969 and played a role in developing Norm Buliach and Ross Montgomery during his three seasons with the Horned Frogs. Other college assignments were Tulsa (1971) and Kansas (1972-73) before reaching the professional level. He may have reached that level as a player 15 years earlier had it not been for an injury during a tryout with the Buffalo Bills. He had earned that chance with an outstanding career as a receiver at Baylor, playing in the Gator and Gotham Bowls. He and his wife, Marianna, have three children, Loyal Thomas 17, John Alan, 16 and Molly, 10.

Doug Shively, Linebackers

Shively has handled the linebackers in the Falcons defense the past two years and will once again have the same responsibility in 1979. A former college roommate of head coach Leeman Bennett, Shively is regarded as one of the top young assistant coaches in professional football. The son of former Kentucky Director of Athletics, Bernie Shively, Doug's first professional assignment was with the New Orleans Saints (1974-76). Prior to pro-

essional coaching, he spent 14 years as a college assistant, beginning at Virginia Tech in 1960. From there he returned to his alma mater, Kentucky, for three years, and then coached at Clemson (1970-72). After spending one season at North Carolina, Shively joined the Saints. When new Saints coach Hank Stram took over the club, Shively was the one coach he retained. He and his wife, Patsy, have three children, Chip, 17, David, 16, and Kelly, 13.

Bill Walsh, Offensive Line

Walsh is the overseer of the development of the young talent drafted along the offensive line. The Falcons feel there could not be a better man in charge of the responsibility. It was Walsh who constructed the offensive line of the 1970 Super Bowl Champion Kansas City Chiefs, and molded the careers of such stars as Ed Budde, Jim Tyrer and Jack Rudnay. Walsh served a total of 15 years for the Chiefs, and is beginning his fifth season in Atlanta. A native of Phillipsburg, N.J., Walsh attended Notre Dame and followed his college career as a member of the Pittsburgh Steelers for six seasons (1949-54), earning All-Pro honors on two occasions. Before going into professional coaching, he served as a college assistant at Notre Dame ('55-'58) and Kansas State (1959). He and his wife, Shirley, have six children: Mrs. Al (Sharon) Trivillini, 30; Patricia, 28; Cheryl 23; Mike, 21; Kelly, 18; and Christine, 13.

Dick Wood, Quarterbacks

The development of quarterback Steve Bartkowski can be closely traced to the arrival of Dick Wood last season. Wood has played a role in the careers of NFL quarterbacks such as Ken Stabler and Archie Manning, and his expertise was evident on Bartkowski. Wood is a native of Lanett, Ala., and played collegiately at Auburn University. Following his graduation in 1959, Wood played seven years of professional football. He was the understudy to Johnny Unitas for the Colts in 1960-61 and also played with San Diego, Denver, New York Jets, Oakland, and Miami. His coaching career has included stops at Georgia (1967-68) and Mississippi (1971-73) on the college level and Oakland (1969-70), Cleveland (1974), and New Orleans (1976-77) on the professional level. Dick and his wife, Peggy, have two children, Bart, 21, and Rhonda, 19.

Mike McDonnell, Strength Coach

McDonnell is head coach Leeman Bennett's right hand man, and last winter assumed responsibility for the Falcon weight training program among his duties. Under McDonnell's guidance, nearly the entire Atlanta offensive line reached the 400 pound plateau in the bench press and the overall strength of the squad improved significantly. McDonnell also is in charge of the film exchange program with other NFL teams. Mike played linebacker for Drake University, graduating in 1974. The following season he worked as a graduate assistant at Ohio State University and recently received a masters degree in athletic administration from that school. In 1976 he served with the Los Angeles Rams in special assignments before coming to Atlanta in 1977.

Tom Braatz, Director of Player Personnel

Fifteen drafted players from the last two drafts were on the Atlanta roster at the end of last season, and that is further tribute to the watchful eye of Tom Braatz. Braatz has been with the Falcons since 1966, beginning as a personnel scout and assuming the director of player personnel duties two years later. His experience in the National Football League dates back to his playing days with Washington and Dallas. At both stops, he was a teammate of Falcon General Manager Eddie LeBaron. Upon retirement in 1961, Braatz worked as an arms demonstrator for the Ithica, N.Y. Gun Co. He and his wife, Jeri, have two sons, Tommy, 18, and Jon, 13.

Serving as scouts under Braatz are Bill Jobko, a former Falcon player, Jon Jelacic, also a former Falcon, Bob Riggle, who is remembered by Falcon fans for a brilliant rookie season before a knee injury ended his career, Bill Striegel, who joined the Falcons from United Scouting Combine last year, and Bob Cygalsky, who came to the Falcons in the spring from San Francisco.

Jerry Rhea, Trainer

If there is one man in a football organization who is expected to have all of the answers, it is usually the trainer. It's a position that requires great patience and his competency can determine the success or failure of a season. The Falcons are fortunate to have one of the best in Jerry Rhea. The Texas A&M graduate is entering his ninth year with the club as head trainer, after serving his apprenticeship with the Los Angeles Rams. In addition to his regular season duties of looking after all Falcon injuries, Rhea oversees the team's off-season rehabilitation program. He was born Sept. 12, 1935, in Ennis Texas. He and his wife, Beverly, have one son, John, 20. Rhea is assisted by former Furman University head trainer Jay Shoop, 31. Shoop is in his fourth year with the Falcons and he and his wife Anne, have a daughter, Farrah, two, and a son, James Lynn, six months.

Whitey Zimmerman, Equipment Manager

His title is equipment manager, but he could also be regarded as the club historian since he has served with the team since its inception in 1966. He is the first person to the Falcon training complex everyday during the season, and more often than not, he's the last person to leave. His duties are extensive. In addition to maintaining all equipment and uniforms, his opinions are heavily weighed when it comes time to order new uniforms and he has the last say on all equipment orders. No one is more experienced or qualified to make those decisions than Whitey Zimmerman. Prior to coming to the Falcons, he was an equipment man for the football Cardinals. Zimmerman was born July 25, 1929, in St. Louis, Mo. He and his wife, Shelia, have five children: Jerry, 26; Terri 21; Larry 18; Gregg 14; and Scott 11. Almost as long as Zimmerman in his tenure is assistant Horace Daniel. The native Atlantan was born May 7, 1938. He and his wife, Shirley, have two children, Kim 12 and Kennon 10.

Compiled a 9-5 record as Falcon starting QB. Had seven 200-yard plus games (N.Y. Giants, San Francisco, New Orleans (twice), Chicago, St. Louis, and Philadelphia). Most brilliant performance was 15 of 20 day, 256 yards and a touchdown at San Francisco. He trapped the opposition inside its own 20-yard line 24 times, second in the NFC, and less than half of his punts (49.5%) were returned, and those only for 5.4 yard average (and a long of 21 yards). Indeed, an off-year for John James is excellent for many kickers. However, James is a perfectionist. His idea of a good game came in the season opener against Houston when he pinned the Oilers inside their 10-yard line four times while averaging 42.7 yards per kick. Or against Chicago in 1977 when his punting was so impressive that the Bears eventually declined a penalty against the Falcons after a James punt went out of bounds at the 12-yard line. In each of the last three seasons, James has punted over 100 times, and he has only had one of those kicks blocked. His 109 punts last season were the most anybody has ever kicked in a single season in the NFL. For three consecutive years (1975-1977) he was named the Pro Bowl punter for the NFC, and it wasn't just because he could kick the ball far. In the last two years, he has had 45 kicks inside the 20-yard line. The primary reason is his "Poocher" punt. "Good things can happen with the Pooch if you do it right," explains James. "Kick it to the corner and the guy can mishandle it. Or he can get hit right there. Or we can down it. That's a 75 per cent chance. About the worst thing is it can go into the end zone." Training Complex

The Atlanta Falcons made a permanent move to the Atlanta Metro Area in August of 1978 with the completion of a permanent training complex in Suwanee, Ga. The training facility is the year round home of the Falcons, housing both the administrative and football operations of the team.

Construction of the facility, began April 3, 1978 and the permanent move was made in August. The facility includes three practice fields, locker room facilities, weight room as well as housing all of the administrative offices.

Equipping the weight room is a full set of Nautilus equipment, and a players lounge is included in the locker area.

Prior to coming to Atlanta, the Falcons trained at Furman University for eight years and previously used East Tennessee State University in Johnson City, Tenn., and Black Mountain, N.C., as preseason training sites.

"Our search for a site took a good deal of time because we had to find a unique setting which included an area for a practice facility as well as a motel that could house our players in preseason training," says General Manager Eddie LeBaron.





Special teams proved to be the difference as the Falcons won their second consecutive season opener under head coach Leeman Bennett. After surprise quarterback starter June Jones had overcome a dazzling 73-yard run by Earl Campbell with a 38-yard TD toss to Bubba Bean, the Falcon special team units took charge. Late in the second quarter rookie Tom Pridemore blocked an Oiler punt and teammate Tom Moriarty fell on the football in the end zone for a touchdown. Early in the second half the Oilers tied the score, but Atlanta countered with two field goals (30 and 48 yards) by Fred Steinfort to take a 20-14 decision. In addition to the blocked punt for a score and two field goals, the Falcons special teams downed three punts inside the 10-yard to leave Houston with miserable field position throughout the afternoon. Punter John James averaged 42.7 yards per kick on nine punts, including four in-20 kicks.

Nevertheless, Atlanta trailed only 3-0 until late in the fourth quarter when the Rams scored their only touchdown of the day. Despite the optimism generated by Atlanta's season opening victory over Houston, the loss in Los Angeles still left the Falcons winless in the city. Even more costly than the defeat was the loss of free safety Ray Easterling for the season. The premier defensive back was lost for the year when he sustained a dislocated elbow. 

FALCON RED LETTER DATES

1964

April 15—Ground is broken for Atlanta-Fulton County Stadium.

1965

June 30—Rankin M. Smith, 41-year-old Executive Vice President of Life Insurance Company of Georgia, is awarded NFL franchise for approximately \$8.5 million. **Aug. 20**—"Five Smiths, Inc.," so named for Smith's five children, is registered as corporate name for team. **Aug. 24**—Stockholders are listed as Lindsey Hopkins, Jr., Howard Dobbs, Jr., Cody Laird, Jr., I. M. Sheffield, III, Dorothy Laird Williams, W. Barrett Howell, and M. E. Kilpatrick. **Aug. 29**—Miss Julia Elliott, Griffin, Ga., school teacher is notified that her suggested nickname of the "Falcons" has been chosen to name the team. **Sept. 9**—Bob Paremore of Florida A&M and Gary Barnes of Clemson are the first players signed. **Nov. 27**—Tommy Nobis, All-American linebacker from Univ. of Texas, and quarterback Randy Johnson of Texas A&I are co-first round choices. **Dec. 24**—When season ticket sales reach 45,000, ticket sales are stopped.

1966

Jan. 26—Norb Hecker, a member of Vince Lombardi's staff at Green Bay, is named head coach. **Feb. 15**—Expansion draft finds Falcons selecting 42 players, three each from the 14 established teams. **March 26**—YMCA camp near Asheville, N.C., Blue Ridge Assembly, is named site of Falcons' first training camp. **June 8**—The NFL-AFL Merger announced. **June 14**—Frank Wall is named Vice President & Treasurer. **July 2**—Training Camp opens. **Aug. 1**—Falcons lose 9-7 to Philadelphia in first preseason game. **Sept. 11**—Los Angeles defeats Falcons 19-14 in first regular season game. A 53-yard pass from quarterback Randy Johnson to wide receiver Gary Barnes nets Atlanta its first touchdown. **Nov. 30**—Atlanta defeats New York Giants 27-16 for its first victory. **Dec. 11**—Falcons defeat St. Louis, 16-10, for first Atlanta Stadium victory.

1967

Jan. 31—Frank Wall elevated to role of General Manager. **July 18**—Training camp site shifts to Johnson City, Tenn., and campus of East Tennessee State Univ. **Dec. 15**—Tommy Nobis named All-Pro, thus becoming Atlanta's first player to be honored.

1968

Jan. 22—Tom Braatz is promoted from scout to Director of Player Personnel. **May 13**—Team emblem is replaced on sleeve of jerseys by stripes. **Oct. 1**—Norm Van Brocklin is named head coach, replacing Norb Hecker.

1969

Sept. 21—Falcons win first seasonal opener, beating San Francisco, 21-7. **Oct. 29**—Running back, Junior Coffey, last of the 42 original expansion draftees, is traded to N. Y. Giants. **Dec. 21**—Atlanta defeats Minnesota, 10-7, stopping Vikings 12-game winning streak and giving Falcons 6-8-1 record, best in club history.

1970

Jan. 6—Frank Wall raised to rank of team president, Rankin M. Smith to Chairman of the Board, and Van Brocklin adds title of General Manager. **Sept. 12**—Team concludes finest preseason (4-1) of its history with 20-17 conquest of Miami.

1971

Jan. 3—For first time in team history, ticket prices are raised. Most seats increase in price \$6.00 to \$7.50. **July 19**.—Furman University in Greenville, S.C., becomes the third home of Falcons' training camp. **Oct. 25**—Van Brocklin is given new multi-year contract. **Dec. 19**—Falcons post first winning season in history (7-6-1) after wide receiver Ken Burrow pulls in winning touchdown pass from quarterback Bob Berry in 24-20 victory over New Orleans.

1972

Oct. 1—Running back Dave Hampton scores two touchdowns and rushes for team record 161 yards as Falcons defeat Los Angeles, 31-3, for club's first victory ever over the Rams. Teammate Art Malone also rushes for 103 yards, marking first time in Atlanta's seven-year history that two backs have gained 100 yards or more rushing in one game.

1973

May 14—Falcons trade Bob Berry and a number one draft choice to Minnesota for veterans Bob Lee and Lonnie Warwick. **Sept. 16**—Smashing 35 team records, Falcons defeat New Orleans, 62-7, in season opener. **Nov. 4**—Nick Mike-Mayer kicks five field goals as Atlanta defeats Los Angeles, 15-13. **Nov. 17**—Falcon winning streak reaches a club record seven games with defeat of N.Y. Jets, 28-20.

Nov. 5—Norm Van Brocklin fired as Head Coach/General Manager. **Nov. 6**—Marion Campbell, Atlanta's defensive coordinator, is named Head Coach.

Jan. 9—Marion Campbell signed to new contract as head coach. **Jan. 27**—Falcons trade offensive tackle George Kunz and a draft choice to Baltimore for the number one pick in 1975 NFL draft. Atlanta also got Colts' sixth choice (used on Fulton Kuykendall). **Jan. 28**—Steve Bartkowski selected as No. 1 draft choice in the country. **Feb. 26**—Pat Pepler is named Falcon General Manager. **Dec. 21**.—Running back Dave Hampton becomes only Falcon to every gain 1,000 yards in season with 61 yards against Green Bay in final game of the year.
