

Edward J. DeBartolo, Jr. President

At 33 the youngest owner in the National Football League, Edward J. DeBartolo, Jr., also is one of the nation's top young executives in a major corporation. He is Executive Vice President of The Edward J. DeBartolo Corporation, a versatile and enormously successful company that — among other things — is recognized as the largest shopping center firm in the United States.

The DeBartolo Corporation, founded in 1948 by Edward J. DeBartolo, who is the father of the 49ers' President, has become one of America's great business success stories. Headquartered in Youngstown, Ohio, the Corporation designs, develops, builds, owns and operates regional enclosed shopping malls

throughout the United States.

In addition, the Corporation also owns thoroughbred race tracks, motels, industrial and executive office parks, a foreign trade zone in conjunction with a stevedoring operation, and is a major stockholder in three banks.

As President and General Partner of the San Francisco 49ers, Ltd., Edward Jr. controls 90 percent of the club, with limited partners Jane Morabito and

Franklin Mieuli each owning five percent.

Edward Jr. is a 1968 graduate of the University of Notre Dame, from which his father also graduated. Although he had spent his summers during high school and college working on the construction and maintenance crews of his father's shopping centers, upon graduation from college he went to work in the DeBartolo Corporate Offices. He moved from department to department, learning the many facets of the company which, by then, had grown into a national corporation.

In 1971 he was appointed a vice president, and in 1976 became Executive Vice-President, directing the in-house DeBartolo staff of some 300 engineers, architects, designers, financiers, leasing agents, lawyers, management and operations teams, along with advertising, public relations and marketing personnel.

In his new role, Ed Jr. quickly disproved the myth that bosses' sons have easy jobs and short hours, or even five-days-a-week schedules. From the beginning as the day-to-day operations' director, he found little time for those pursuits he still lists as hobbies — golf and football. The latter, the dominant interest in his life, would become more than just a hobby in 1977 when he became the 49ers' new owner.

Edward Jr. gives generously of his time and influence when it comes to charitable endeavors. He recently joined Danny Thomas in the 1979 campaign for St. Jude, heading up the Youngstown effort which netted the greatest sum of any city its size in the nation. For several years, Ed Jr. also has directed Cancer and Heart Fund Drives, and has served as a director of the local youth center and as a member of the Board of Trustees at Youngstown State University.

His wife Cynthia is his childhood sweetheart, and they are the parents of

three daughters, Lisa Marie 9, Tiffanie Lynn 8, and Nicole Ann 4.


BILL WALSH Head Coach-General Manager

In 1957 Bill Walsh took his first head coaching job in football at Washington Union High School in Fremont. Calif., a small community located in the East Bay across the bridge from San Francisco.

At that time, the 49ers were the Bay Area's lone major league-level professional sports franchise, and were rising as a power in the National Football League. It was in '57, in fact, that the

49ers earned their first playoff trip, losing a late lead and a memorable game to

Detroit that December, 31-27.



Walsh was named the 11th head coach of the 49ers January 9, 1979, at age 47. The naming came following three years of high school coaching, six years as a college assistant, ten years as an NFL assistant, and two years as head coach at a major university. Walsh takes over the 49ers, a team of storied tradition,

following their bleakest campaign, 2-14 in 1978.

A challenge to turn around a floundering team is nothing new to Walsh. The fact he was passed over, or in a couple instances he declined, other head coaching jobs in the NFL does not leave him trembling at the thought of being a rookie head coach at age 47 with last year's losingest NFL team.

If anything, he is philosophical about finally gaining the job that many feel he was destined for at least several seasons ago. "Coaching isn't like civil service." Walsh said at his initial 49ers press conference. "You don't pass an examination to move up. As often as not, getting the right job is a matter of luck and timing."

While biding his time, Walsh gained a reputation as an offensive coach, specifically as a pass offense master. "There's no special secrets to what I have learned or what I know about the passing game," he explains. "I simply have spent a lot of time and put in a lot of hard work mastering techniques of the passing game, techniques that I believe in. As an assistant coach, I decided eventually that the way to succeed was to establish a reputation in one area, and I did that with the pass offense, becoming known as the leading authority — or, at least, one of the best - in that field."

Witness Walsh's coaching results from the last decade: While calling plays for Paul Brown and the Cincinnati Bengals, two of his quarterbacks, Greg Cook (once) and Ken Anderson (twice), claimed NFL passing titles, and two other journeymen Bengals' signal callers, Sam Wyche - now a Walsh aide with the 49ers - and Virgil Carter, had the best seasons of their well-traveled careers;

While with the San Diego Chargers in 1976, he helped turn the Chargers around from a 2-12 team in '75 to a 6-8 club in '76 and made Dan Fouts into one of the league's top passers in what was a single turnaround season for *that* quarterback:

While at Stanford the last two years, Walsh made Guy Benjamin, now with the Miami Dolphins, into an All-America quarterback in 1977, then the following year transformed Benjamin's back-up, Steve Dils, into an All-America and the

nation's leading passer. Dils now is a rookie with Minnesota.

Reversing losing trends has been a part of Walsh's career since that Washington Union High job in '57. There he reversed three years of 1-26 football into a conference championship team with a 9-1 record by his second season.

That led to an appointment as defensive coordinator at the University of California, where he coached under Marv Levy from 1960-62. Walsh moved across the Bay to Stanford to coach under John Ralston in 1963. He coached the secondary and was Ralston's administrative assistant during a three-year tenure.

He started his ten-year professional career as an assistant with the Oakland Raiders in 1966 where he coached the offensive backfield for Al Davis. A year later, Walsh began his eight-year association with Brown and the Bengals, where he directed the offense and coached the quarterbacks and receivers.

When Brown retired at the end of 1975, Walsh moved to the Chargers and served Tommy Prothro as offensive coordinator for a season before Stanford beckoned again. Walsh immediately transformed the Cardinals into an 8-3 club in 1977 and guided them to their first bowl appearance in six years, the Sun Bowl, where they defeated LSU, 24-14. Walsh was named Pacific-8 Conference Coach of the Year.

Walsh's '78 Stanford team posted an 8-4 mark and went to the Bluebonnet

Bowl, where they overcame a 22-0 deficit to defeat Georgia, 25-22.

Nine days after that game, 49ers' Owner and President Edward J. DeBartolo, Jr. named Walsh as the man to take over the 49ers. Twenty days later, DeBartolo also added the title of General Manager to Walsh, giving him total authority over the club.

Bill Walsh was born November 30, 1931, in Los Angeles. He left Los Angeles following his junior year in high school when his parents moved to Hayward, Calif., where Bill finished high school before enrolling at San Mateo

Junior College.

He transferred to San Jose State for his final two years, majoring in education, and playing end on the football team for Coach Bob Bronzan. White working towards a master's degree (which he completed in 1959) and serving a U.S. Army hitch, Bill received his first taste of coaching as a graduate assistant at Monterey Peninsula College and later at San Jose State. That tenure preceeded his being named football coach in Fremont, which was the beginning of his ascension as a football mentor.

He and his wife Geri live near the Stanford campus in Palo Alto and have three children; Steve 22, Craig 19, and Elizabeth 8. Steve is a television writer, while Craig is a sophomore at nearby Menlo College. Elizabeth is in the third

grade.

JOHN RALSTON, Vice President for Administration

JOHN McVAY, Director of Player Personnel

Two of professional football's most visible coaches, John Ralston and John McVay, today are ex-coaches in key administrative roles for the reorganized San Francisco Alors and both sould not be begging about the cityeties.

Francisco 49ers and both could not be happier about the situation.

Ralston, long a top San Francisco Bay Area coach, is enjoying a homecoming of sorts as the 49ers' new Vice President for Administration, where he now works for his former pupil, Bill Walsh. In that capacity, Ralston is in charge of the day-to-day front office operations of the club.

McVay, who established impressive football credentials in Ohio and Michigan, now is a transplanted Californian as the 49ers' Director of Player Person-

nel.

Ralston's preceeding job in the NFL was as offensive coordinator a year ago on Dick Vermeil's staff with the Philadelphia Eagles. Prior to that, except for a year spent out of football in 1977, Ralston was the General Manager and Coach of the Denver Broncos from 1972-76.

For nine years (1963-71), he was head coach at Stanford University, and prior to that tenure, he was head coach for four years at Utah State University.

Following a military hitch during and after World War II with the U.S. Marine Corps, Ralston entered the University of California, where he played linebacker and helped lead Cal to two Rose Bowls. He graduated from the Berkeley campus in 1951, and entered high school coaching in the Bay Area for eight years.

Ralston enjoyed success at each coaching stop. At Utah State, the Aggies were 31-11-1 under Ralston and co-champions of the Skyline Conference twice.

They played in two bowl games, the Sun and Gotham.

Ralston moved on to Stanford and brought the Cardinals to major prominence with a nine-year 55-36-3 record, including two consecutive Rose Bowl victories over Ohio State and Michigan following two Pac-8 championships in 1970 and '71. His final eight seasons at Stanford all were winning ones, Also while there, he coached the West team in the Shrine Bowl in 1965, '66 and '69, and coached in the Hula Bowl.

He then turned around dormant Denver in his first NFL assignment, transforming the Broncos into a perennial contender and being named the AFC Coach of the Year for his efforts in 1973. Denver finished 7-5-2 that season and contended for the AFC West title until the last game of the season. His overall Denver record was 34-33-3, including 9-5 his final year there in '76.

Ralston was born April 26, 1927 in Oakland and spent most of his young life growing up in Michigan. He and his wife Patty have three children, twin daughters Terry and Sherry, and son Larry, and live in Menlo Park, Calif.

McVay's most recent assignment prior to coming to the 49ers was as head coach of the New York Giants. Today the 49ers' chief scout, he originally went to the Giants as an assistant coach in charge of research and development as it was intended for McVay to evolve away from coaching and into an administrator's role.

When the Giants fired Bill Arnsparger at the halfway point of the 1976 season, McVay was named the new head coach. He compiled a two and one-half year mark of 14-23 before being released by the Giants at the end of the 1978 season.

With San Francisco, McVay will work directly with Walsh and Ralston in

evaluating and obtaining pro and college personnel.

A native of Bellaire, Ohio, he prepped at famed Massillon High School in northeastern Ohio, then went on to play center for both Woody Hayes and Ara Parseghian during a three-year playing career at Miami of Ohio. While at Miami, he won All-Midwest and team MVP honors in two of his three varsity seasons.

He began his coaching career with a ten-year stint (1953-62) at the Ohio high school level, including a highly successful tenure at Canton Central Catholic High, before moving to Michigan State for three years (1962-64) as an assistant

on Duffy Daugherty's coaching staff.

McVay spent the next nine years (1965-73) as head coach at the University of Dayton, leading the Flyers to an 8-2 mark in 1966, their first winning season in ten years. He became Dayton's athletic director in 1972, a post he held until joining the Memphis Southmen of the World Football League in 1974.

As Coach-GM for Memphis, McVay's team won a league championship in '74, winning 17 games and leading the league in nearly every offensive category.

He joined the Giants' staff when the WFL disbanded in mid-1975.

McVay was born January 5, 1931, and is the father of three sons — John, Jim and Tim. He and his wife Lee make their home in Redwood City, Calif.

Coaching Staff

MIKE WHITE, Administrative Assistant • Offensive Line

Mike White will continue his long association with Bay Area football in 1979 as one of two offensive line coaches for the 49ers. Also, he has added additional duties as the administrative assistant from Bill Walsh's coaching staff. He is the lone holdover from the 1978 coaching staff.

Prior to coming to the 49ers, White coached at the collegiate level at California and Stanford for 19 years. He spent six of those years as head coach at Cal (1972-77). His 1975 team was co-champion of the PAC-8 and White was named West Coast Coach of the Year that season. In addition, he coached four post-season all-star college teams, all of which were victorious.

As a collegian, Mike earned nine varsity letters at California in football, rugby and track, and served as team captain in each sport his senior year. He was an All-Pacific Coast selection at end for the football team that final year.

Born in Berkeley, Calif., on January 4, 1936, Mike is a graduate of Acalanes High in Lafayette, Calif. He and his wife Marilyn have three children and live in Lafayette.

DENNIS GREEN, Receivers . Special Teams

Dennis Green will direct the 49ers' receivers and special teams this year. Green played a key role in helping Bill Walsh establish an offensive football power at Stanford University and now joins Walsh in San Francisco as one of eight new 49ers' assistant coaches.

Before joining the Stanford staff (1977-78), Green coached at his alma mater, Iowa (1974-76). An outstanding tailback and flanker there, he recorded a school record 175 yards rushing against TCU as a sophomore and gained honorable mention All-Big Ten honors his final two seasons.

Dennis played one season as a defensive back with the British Columbia Lions of the Canadian Football League in 1972, returned to lowa as a graduate assistant following that season, and then spent the '73 season as an assistant at the University of Dayton. There he worked for the 49ers' Director of Player Personnel John McVay, who was Dayton's athletic director at the time.

A Pennsylvania native from Harrisburg, Green was born February 17, 1949. He was an All-State prep football selection at John Harris High School in Harrisburg.

He and his wife Margie are the parents of two children and reside in Santa Clara, Calif.

NORB HECKER, Defensive Backs

Norb Hecker joins the 49ers this year as defensive backfield coach, bringing along more all-around experience than most people gather in a lifetime. For Hecker, it means a return to the pro ranks following a seven-year stint at Stanford University, the last two years coaching on Bill Walsh's staff there.

As a player, Norb was a Little All-America offensive end at Baldwin-Wallace College in northeastern Ohio. His professional career began with the Los Angeles Rams, where he played both offensive end and defensive back (1951-53). He then went to Toronto of the Canadian Football League in 1954, then to

the Washington Redskins a year later.

He returned to the CFL as a player-coach in 1958 with the Hamilton Tiger Cats. Finally, he joined Vince Lombardi as an assitant coach at Green Bay in 1959. At Green Bay he was part of the team's glory years in the 1960s and has two Super Bowl championship rings from his time there.

Hecker, a co-founder of the NFL Players Association, had gone from player-coach for the Packers to assistant coach from 1959-65. He left in 1966 to become head coach of the Atlanta Falcons, a post he held for two and one-half

years.

His final pro stint before going to Stanford in 1972 was three years (1969-

71) as defensive coordinator for the New York Giants.

Norb was born in Olmsted Falls, Ohio, on May 26, 1927. He and his wife Barbara have five children and live in Palo Alto, Calif.

BILLIE MATTHEWS, Running Backs

Billie Matthews will be in charge of the 49ers' running backs in 1979 after eight seasons at UCLA. Included among the UCLA runners Matthews directed from 1971-78 were five 1,000-yard rushers: Kermit Johnson, James McAlister, Wendell Tyler and Theotis Brown (twice). The '73 Bruin squad rushed to 4,403 yards in 11 games.

Billie also spent a season at Kansas (1970) where he coached current pro backs John Riggins and Delvin Williams. Previously, he had an outstanding 12-year (1958-69) prep coaching career at Kashmere High School in his

hometown of Houston, Tex.

A star quarterback at Southern University in Baton Rouge, La., Matthews led his team to an 11-0 record and the National Black championship as a freshman in 1948. During his four years, Southern compiled a 37-4 record.

Matthews was born March 15, 1930, in Houston. He and his wife Gene have

four children and make their home in Redwood City, Calif.

BOBB McKITTRICK, Offensive Line

Bobb McKittrick and Mike White will share offensive line coaching duties for the 49ers in 1979 as McKittrick moves over from the San Diego Chargers. McKittrick has been an NFL coach since 1971, nearly all of that time under Tommy Prothro.

His 20-year association with Prothro began with three years (1955-57) as a Prothro-coached player at Oregon State. He joined the coaching staff at Oregon state in 1961 after three years in the Marine Corps, and then went to UCLA (1965-70) with Prothro.

They later went on to the Los Angeles Rams (1971-72), before once again

moving, this time to the San Diego Chargers.

Bobb took a sabbatical from football in 1973 to do graduate work at his alma mater before re-joining Prothro at San Diego. He also coached under Don Coryell at the conclusion of last season.

McKittrick was born in Baker, Ore., December 29, 1935. He and his wife

Teckla have two children and live in San Mateo. Calif.

BILL McPHERSON, Linebackers

After a long coaching career in the state of California, Bill McPherson left the west coast a year ago to coach linebackers for Dick Vermeil's Philadelphia Eagles. Now he returns to his native area to join Bill Walsh's staff as the 49ers linebackers coach in 1979.

A defensive tackle at Santa Clara in the '50s, McPherson began coaching in 1956 at his high school alma mater, San Jose's Bellarmine Prep (1956-62), following Army service in Korea. He later was the defensive coordinator at Santa Clara (1963-74) for 12 years before moving to UCLA (1975-77) where he first coached with Vermeil.

Bill and his wife Elsie have four children and live in San Jose. He was born

there October 31, 1931.

CHUCK STUDLEY, Defensive Coordinator . Defensive Line

The 49ers' new defensive coordinator is Chuck Studley, who begins his 11th year in the NFL this season.

Studley has been instrumental in developing the young defensive line at Cincinnati, where he coached the past ten seasons under Paul Brown and Bill Johnson.

Studley was a successful college coach before entering the pro ranks. He won two Missouri Valley conference championships as head coach at the University of Cincinnati (1961-68). Chuck also coached the University of Massachusetts to a Yankee Conference title in 1960. He was grid boss at Massachusetts for one year before beginning his 18-year association in Cincinnati.

ter," reports offensive line Coach Bobb McKittrick. "Once he is given the chance to stay at one position, like guard, he could be a fine lineman." The epitome for Ayers, an eighth round draft choice in 1976, came when he had to fill in at defensive tackle during a regular season game. "When I got in there, I looked at one of our defensive linemen and asked him what to do," remembers Ayers. "He said, "Just fake it, that's all I'm doing." Bill Walsh feels Ayers could develop into a starter if given time at one position: "We're going to try and let him develop as a guard. That appears to be where he is best suited."

COLLEGE: Ayers switched between the offensive and defensive lines while at West Texas State. An All-Missouri Conference selection his senior year, he started 32 consecutive games after transferring from the University of Texas.

He has excellent balance and foot work." Barrett, a second round draft choice in 1972, will be called upon to backup at both tackle positions unless he wins back his old starting job at left tackle.

When Jackson went out for the season, Boykin replaced him at fullback for several games, before yielding to Bobby Ferrell. He started eight games, gaining 361 yards on 102 carries. He had an additional 112 yards on 19 pass receptions. "Boykin has good size and power, and is an extremely hard-working player," says Bill Walsh. After being drafted in the tenth round by the Dallas Cowboys, DeBerg was the final player cut from the Dallas roster in 1977 and was acquired on waivers by the 49ers. DeBerg didn't see action at quarterback in '77, remaining on the bench behind Jim Plunkett and Scott Bull.' When Plunkett was released last September, DeBerg stepped in as the starter and opened 11 games. Added pressure was placed on DeBerg when he was asked to call his own plays a year ago: "The amount of knowlege that must be retained is awesome," said DeBerg. This year things should be different. "We will try and take some of that pressure away from Steve by calling most of the plays from the sidelines," says Bill Walsh. "This will give DeBerg time to concentrate on the fundamental things that are so important to a young quarterback." Still in the infant stages of his career, "DeBerg shows all the signs of being a fine NFL quarterback," according to quarterback Coach Sam Wyche.

COLLEGE: DeBerg turned the San Jose State records books upside down during his lone starting season in 1976, passing for 2,084 yards and completing 141 of 262 attempts while throwing 19 touchdowns. He set nine school records and was named the Pacific Coast Athletic Association's Offensive Player of the Year. DeBerg was a JC All-America at Fullerton Junior College before going to

coaches. "He has excellent size and strength for the guard position," says offensive line Coach Bobb McKittrick. "But Walt is going to have to work hard to improve his consistency." Downing has been hampered somewhat by his college background at Michigan, where the run was the major emphasis on offense, "I realize that pass protection is the key to my future in the league," said Downing during the off-season. "I have worked very hard on those skills, and I feel I'll be able to do a better job this season." Bill Walsh added, "Walt made the All-Rookie team last year (UPI), but will face strong competition for his right guard position. We're looking for him to show a lot of improvement."

COLLEGE: Downing was a consensus All-Big Ten pick as a junior and senior while at Michigan. He served as co-captain and made first team All-

America his final year.

PERSONAL: Walt and his wife Sue make their home in Redwood City, Calif., where the 49ers' training facility is located, and where he spent most of his off-season working on conditioning.

Cleveland Elam • 72

DEFENSIVE TACKLE • TENNESSEE STATE • 5th YEAR HT: 6-4 • WT: 251 • BORN: 4-5-52 • (D-4A FOR '75)

PRO: There is little doubt that a man who had 32 quarterback sacks in two years is a force to be reckoned with in the NFL. "Cleveland has been a legitimate All-Pro, and he has one of the best pass rushes in the



league, "says Defensive Coordinator Chuck Studley. "His performance will make the difference between us being a good defensive team or just an ordinary one." A fourth round choice in 1975, Elam suffered through injuries and the adjustment to an unfamiliar position in 1978. "I simply did not have an acceptable year last year," said Elam. "Being moved to defensive end affected me more than I thought it would." Elam has been moved back to defensive tackle, where normally he will line up next to Cedrick Hardman. "With Cedrick and Cleveland together again, we should have one of the strongest pass rushing teams in the NFL," said Studley.

COLLEGE: Elam lettered four years at Tennessee State. He was a versatile performer who played defensive end, tackle, middle and outside linebacker.

PERSONAL: Elam was a standout performer in both basketball and football at Lester High School in Memphis, Tenn., earning all-league recognition in both. A bachelor, he splits his time during the off-season between his hometown of Memphis and in Missouri City, Tex., where he has several business ventures.

Elia was supplanted by Dan Bunz last year and ended up filling in at all three linebacker positions during 1978. A foot injury hampered him throughout much of last season, but the injury is healed and Elia is chomping at the bit: "I am very anxious about playing this year and can't wait for the season to start." Reports Bill Walsh, "Elia is a very physical and aggressive hitter, a smooth athlete, and a good, solid tackler with great pursuit."

COLLEGE: Elia proved he was of value at a pair of positions while at Ohio State. After starting at middle linebacker his sophomore year, he was switched to fullback as a junior and went on to score 14 touchdowns and lead the Big Ten in scoring in 1973. He was moved back to middle linebacker his senior year where he led the team in tackles with 144, including 74 unassisted tackles.

two undistinguished seasons. When rookie Terry LeCount was lost early last year with an injury, Harrison was recalled and ended up starting six of the eight games in which he appeared. He caught 16 passes for 320 yards and a 20-yard average, and had several dazzling, clutch grabs. "Harrison has been used primarily as a long-ball threat," says receivers Coach Dennis Green. "We'll also use him in that manner, but we also feel he can be an intermediate threat as well with his ability to fend off defensive backs and get open in a hurry."

COLLEGE: Following an outstanding freshman year in which he caught 29 passes for 534 yards, Harrison became the first freshman to be named to the All-Southwest Conference team since Doak Walker. SMU then switched to the wishbone offense and did not throw much the rest of Harrison's career there. He ended up with 53 career catches for 1,075 yards and nine touchdowns, ranking

third on the all-time SMU receiving records list.

Simpson, Hofer gained 465 yards rushing on 121 attempts, a 3.8 yard average. He had an additional 170 yards on 12 pass receptions. He also led the squad in touchdowns with seven. Hofer had a notable season on the special teams as well, returning 18 kickoffs for 386 yards, a 21.4 average. By the end of the season, Hofer was voted (by his teammates) the Len Eshmont Award, as the 49ers' most inspirational player. "Paul is a tough, determined runner," says Asst. Coach Billie Matthews. "He is underestimated in this league, with an excellent, quick start his main attribute."

COLLEGE: Hofer played fullback at Mississippi and gained 1,430 yards on 296 carries, a 4.8 yard average, during a four-year career. He also led Ole Miss

in kickoff returns three consecutive years.

PRO: After starting much of last season, and making the UPI All-Rookie Team, Ernie Hughes is not about to sit back and figure he has it made. "There are a lot of things I need to work on before I can really feel comfortable in



this league," says Hughes, a second round draft choice a year ago. "It doesn't matter who you are, if you don't continually work to get better, there is no stability in the NFL." Bill Walsh feels good about his second-year guard: "Ernie is an excellent athlete who constantly is improving. He could start for us again and also be an effective member of the special teams with his size and speed."

COLLEGE: A starter for three years at Notre Dame, he was named to the AP and UPI's second team All-America squads as a senior. Nicknamed the "Enforcer" because of his 400-pound bench press and 4.8 speed, Hughes was a mainstay on the Notre Dame 1977 National Championship team, and received national acclaim for a sparkling Cotton Bowl performance that year against Texas Outland trophy recipient Brad Shearer.

PERSONAL: Hughes was a prep All-America at Capital High School in Boise, Id. He played basketball, track and wrestled as well, and was named his high school's outstanding athlete his senior year. Ernie and his wife Maureen have two children, Jennifer (4/1/77) and Christine (5/25/78), and make their home in Sunnyvale, Calif.

Wilbur Jackson ● 40

PRO: Wilbur Jackson is a bomb waiting to go off after missing all of 1978 with a knee injury, Jackson, a first round draft choice of the 49ers in 1974, was named Rookie of the Year in the NFL that season as he churned



for 705 yards on 174 carries. He also caught 23 passes for an additional 190 yards. He accounted for 2,580 yards and 96 receptions his first four years as a professional, including a career-high 792 yards in 1976. "We will be asking for a lot of different things from our fullback," says Bill Walsh. "Wilbur has the type of versatility — running, blocking and catching the ball — that can help us tremendously." Moved from running back to fullback when Monte Clark took over as head coach in '76, Jackson developed into a fierce blocking back. A healthy Jackson could be the perfect compliment to O.J. Simpson: "I can't emphasize enough how important Wilbur was to my gaining 1,000 yards," said Miami's Delvin Williams of his former 49ers' running mate. "There is no doubt he will get his 1,000 yards one day." Jackson's maturity is another important asset. "He has the character and commitment to the profession that we need," says Walsh. "We have so few veterans on the squad, we need people like Wilbur to hold the team together."

JACKSON, Cont.

COLLEGE: Jackson was the first black football player at the University of Alabama, where he amassed a three-year total of 1,537 yards on just 212 carries for a 7.2 yard average. For the most part, he played just a half per game, due to the heavy rotation of backs used by Bear Bryant at Alabama. But he performed well enough to be named a consensus All-America and play in the Senior Bowl.

PERSONAL: Born in Ozark, Ala., Jackson was a standout athlete at Carroll High School where he earned varsity letters in football, basketball and baseball. Wilbur has spent most of the off-season rehabilitating the knee surgery which held him out last year.



PRO: The operative word for Terry LeCount has been adaptation. He has had to adapt from all-around college handyman to starting wide receiver in the pros. As the split end, LeCount filled a position he never



played prior to joining the 49ers as a fourth round draft choice a year ago. And based on his efforts there, LeCount was once again pencilled in as the starter as training camp opened. In college, LeCount was everything but a receiver. He played safety, running back, quarterback, and returned punts. "Being constantly moved around like that became a bit of a problem,"remembered LeCount. Now it appears wide receiver is his home: "Terry has an excellent future at wide receiver in the NFL," says Bill Walsh. "He has speed, quickness, catches well, and can run very well with the ball after he catches it. He played well as a rookie last year until a wrist injury knocked him out of the lineup." LeCount caught 10 passes for 131 yards in '78, that coming in three early games before he dislocated his wrist against Houston. "When LeCount went out for the season last year," says receivers Coach Dennis Green, "it had more of an effect on the team than most people realize."

"The only problems he had last year were related to his inexperience," said Bill Walsh. "He will be a great defensive lineman in the NFL." Reese never lost his enthusiasm last year: "We had some tough losses that are hard to live with," he said. "But we can have a good team here. It's just a matter of working together and realizing our potential."

O.J. Simpson • 32

RUNNING BACK • USC • 11th YEAR
HT: 6-1 • WT: 212 • BORN: 7-9-47 • (Joined 49ers in trade with Buffalo for five draft choices prior to [3/24/78] '78 season.)

PRO: One final go-around for O.J. Simpson in 1979 or is it? The Juice, seeking Jim Brown's all-time rushing record of 12,312 yards, has said this will be his final year in football. But, he has hedged: "I don't want to say definitely that this is my last year. It depends on the circumstances. For instance, when I started my career in Buffalo, the first three years were so bad that I planned to guit after five years. But then Lou Saban came in as head coach, and I just enjoyed playing so much, I wanted to play forever. If I can run in excess of 1,000 yards this year (he needs 1,537 vards to surpass Brown), and fit into the passing game Bill Walsh has installed, then we can win a few. And who knows? That's why I don't want to commit myself now." Walsh reports he plans to use the 32-year old Simpson often, as Saban did: "We expect O.J. to be at full strength and will use him as much as possible with the idea we want him for all 16 games. Simpson could very well be on the verge of a great final chapter in his football career. He's worked hard to physically prepare himself and his mind is right for a big year. He'll be given the ball most of the time and should be our big ground gainer. We will also use him extensively in the passing game." Says O.J., "Quite frankly, if my knee is healthy, I can still run as fast as any back in the league. Even if I'm not as fast as I used to be. There aren't two or three backs in the league who can outrun me. My shoulder is alright now (injured in the tenth game last year, knocking him out for the season.) Six pieces of cartilage, a cyst behind my knee, and a tumor in the front of the knee were removed surgically during the off-season. I want the NFL career rushing record, but if the record doesn't happen, I can handle not having it. Realistically, this probably will be my final year. But one never

COLLEGE: In a scintillating two years with the USC Trojans, Simpson set 13 school rushing records, led the NCAA in rushing both years with a two-year total of 3,423 yards on 674 carries, earned All-America twice, captured the Heisman Trophy, and led the Trojans to two consecutive Rose Bowl appearances. His career was so stunning after coming to USC from San Francisco City College that he was later named the College Athlete of the Decade (1960s). Also a sprinter for the track team, he was a member of USC's world record-setting 440-yard relay team (38.6) in 1967. While in junior college, O.J. rushed for 2,445 yards on 259 carries.

PERSONAL: O.J. is leaning towards retirement, in-part, following the '79 season because of a television contract with NBC that again will have him assisting with coverage of the Olympics, scheduled for the summer of 1980 in Moscow. Given the name Orenthal James, the native San Franciscan (Galileo High School) has long been a movie actor. Now he also is producing movies, including an off-season effort called "Goldie and the Boxer." In addition,

Included in the deal that sent Delvin Williams to the Dolphins, Solomon led the 49ers in receptions last year with 32 for 458 yards. He was pressed into duty at quarterback the final game of the season when Steve DeBerg and Scott Bull were lost with knee injuries in a 33-14 loss at Detroit. In his first three years in the NFL, Solomon was a return specialist with the Dol-

phins, and had a 22.5 yard average in kickoff returns. He also ran back 71 punts for 810 yards, including a 90-yarder against Baltimore in 1977. In that game, Solomon totaled 245 yards handling kickoff returns, punt returns, and also catching passes and running a flanker reverse. "Freddie is by far the most experienced receiver we have," says Asst. Coach Dennis Green. "Once he catches the ball, anything can happen."

COLLEGE: Solomon played quarterback for the University of Tampa for four years (1971-74), rushing for 39 touchdowns and passing for 11. He had 17 games with more than 100 yards rushing. His career totals were 3,299 yards on 557 carries with 188 completions in 436 passing attempts for 2,504 yards.

PERSONAL: Born and raised in Sumter, South Carolina, Freddle and his wife Deliah are involved in a number of private business ventures during the off-season, one of which includes a commercial films production company. They make their home in Tampa, Fla.

After playing in just nine games last year (and those appearances having been limited to special teams duty), Walker was hoping for just that kind of opportunity. A college fullback, he'll work as a running back with the 49ers.

"The biggest mistake you can make is to carry that meanness too far, though, and be out of control."

COLLEGE: Webb played both defensive tackle and end while at Mississippi State. He played in the Senior Bowl and College All-Star games after

JAMES OWENS • Running Back/Wide Receiver • UCLA

World class hurdler James Owens was the player the 49ers wanted from the beginning of the draft as San Francisco Coach-GM Bill Walsh will attempt to convert the running back to wide receiver to compliment his passing game. "Owens has so many fine qualities about him," reports Walsh. "His speed—he's probably the fastest man in the world in the first 50 yards; he has tremendous body control and quickness; he has played football at UCLA under pressure; he's very bright; he has good hand-to-eye coordination. It will be our job to teach him the position and make him into a top pro pass catcher."

Owens, UCLA's co-MVP as a junior and MVP in the Fiesta Bowl as a senior, finished sixth in the Montreal Olympic Games in the 110 meter hurdles. He finished his college football career as the fourth all-time rusher in Bruins' history with 1,984 yards on 397 carries (a five-yard avg.) although many said he was too small to play the position in the Pac-10. He also caught 21 passes for 200 yards, and scored a total of 14 career touchdowns.

The first player taken on the second round of the draft this year, he is from nearby Sacramento, Calif., and was known as J.O. to his teammates at UCLA. He rushed for more than 100 yards eight times in his career, with a high of 161 yards vs. Washington State last fall, and had two brilliant post-season bowl games at the end of his college playing days. In the Fiesta Bowl, a 10-10 tie with Arkansas, Owens had 121 yards rushing and one touchdown, added a touchdown pass off the halfback option, and caught three passes for 32 yards and a touchdown.

JOE MONTANA • Quarterback • Notre Dame
Ht. 6-3 • Wt: 200 • Born: 6/11/56 • D-3

Everyone knew Bill Walsh was seeking a top quarterback from this year's draft. Which one Walsh really wanted was the only question left to be answered. Notre Dame's Joe Montana became the pick when the 49ers selected the Monongahela, Pa., native as the final choice in Round 3.

"We considered Montana to be among the top two or three quarterbacks in the draft," said Walsh, who had Jack Thompson of Washington State and Phil Simms of Morehead State highly rated with Montana but saw those two signal callers taken in the draft's first seven picks. "Montana is quick, with an excellent arm, and is very intelligent. He'll be working under a different system here than at Notre Dame, where he usually had to hit receivers on the move in crossing patterns. Our system calls for more dishing off to the backs and shorter patterns."

During his college career, Montana completed 269 of 515 passes (52 percent) for 4,121 yards and 25 touchdowns, with 25 interceptions. He was named to several All-America teams last fall after completing 54 percent of his passes (141 of 260) for 2,010 yards and ten touchdowns. As a junior, Montana led the Irish to the national championship.

TOM SEABRON • Linebacker • Michigan Ht. 6-3 • Wt: 209 • Born: 5/24/57 • D-5A

Tom Seabron will be seeking to fill a 49ers' need for an outside linebacker. A four-year letterman at Michigan, Seabron "has excellent speed and is extremely

aggressive," according to linebackers coach Bill McPherson.

Seabron, who was timed in 4.6 in the 40-yard dash, had 100 tackles in his four-year career with 52 unassisted tackles. He was known as an exceptional pass rusher and earned 12 quarterback sacks his final two seasons. Seabron had a slow start at Michigan because of a shoulder separation prior to his sophomore year, but rehabilitated it to full strength by his senior year.

JERRY ALDRIDGE • Running Back • Angelo State Ht. 6-2 • Wt: 220 • Born: 9/17/56 • D-5B

Jerry Aldridge made several college Little All-America teams and was a member of the NAIA Division I national championship team that compiled a 14-0 record in 1978.

During his senior year, Aldridge rushed for 1,820 yards. He had 17 straight games of 100 yards or better over two seasons. He averaged 134.8 yards per game, a school record and the third best mark in Lone Star Conference history.

In addition to his rushes, he caught 14 passes for 102 yards in 1978. Aldridge holds the Angelo State career rushing mark of 3,298 yards (4.9 average). He scored 36 touchdowns, 15 his final year.

RUBEN VAUGHAN • Defensive Tackle • Colorado Ht. 6-2 • Wt; 264 • Born: 8/5/56 • D-6

Strongman Ruben Vaughan, a college middle guard, will be given a chance to make the 49ers as a defensive tackle "because of exceptional athletic ability," according to 49ers Director of Player Personnel John McVay. A two-time All-Big 8 selection, Vaughan has bench pressed 475 pounds and has run the 40-yard dash in 4.7.

Most effective against the run in college, he had a single-game tackling high of 17 stops against Kansas in a 1977 contest. For his career, he racked up 253 tackles, including 108 unassisted tackles.

Despite missing the final four games of 1978 with an ankle injury, Phil Francis rushed for just under 500 yards, averaging 4.5 yards per carry, and was leading the nation in pass receptions with 49 when he went out of the Stanford lineup.

Francis had other injuries that slowed his collegiate career — a concussion, and injuries to both shoulders that were later repaired by surgery. His last operation was prior to his junior season, the year he began playing for Bill Walsh when the latter came to Stanford.

Francis has run the 40-yard dash in 4.6, and Walsh in optimistic he'll fit into the 49ers' passing game as he did at Stanford. "The first time I saw Phil I said he's the type player who can be a good pro running back," said Walsh. "He could give us good, solid help in a backup role as a runner and as a pass receiver." Francis caught 88 passes during his career.

STEVE HAMILTON • Defensive Lineman • Missouri Ht. 6-3 • Wt: 240 • Born: 6/10/56 • D-9

Steve Hamilton is one of two defensive linemen drafted by the 49ers. A tackle at Missouri, Hamilton, according to defensive line coach Chuck Studley, "has excellent size and mobility, and excellent hands, which will help make him a fine pass rusher. He projects as a defensive end for us at this time."

Hamilton had 164 career tackles with 67 solo tackles in three years as a starter. His senior year he stacked up 82 tackles with 33 unassisted tackles.

DWIGHT CLARK • Wide Receiver • Clemson Ht. 6-3 • Wt: 204 • Born: 1/8/57 • D-10A

In their first tenth-round selection, the 49ers added a second receiver to their draft list to go along with first choice James Owens. Dwight Clark, who teamed with Clemson's All-America QB Steve Fuller, was a member of one of the top passing attacks in the nation.

Projected by the 49ers as a pro wide receiver, Clark will be tested with the

idea of being used at both flanker and tight end as a situation receiver.

"Dwight was injured early last seson and missed four games," said quarterback coach Sam Wyche, who personally tried out the Clemson player. "Playing opposite Jerry Butler (first round pick of Buffalo), Dwight did not get a lot of publicity this year. But, he is an excellent receiver, great with his hands."

In three years as a varsity player, Clark caught 55 passes for 845 yards and

a 15.4 average.

HOWARD BALLAGE • Kick Returner/Cornerback • Colorado

Ht. 6-1 • Wt: 182 • Born: 10/7/57 • D-10B

The 49ers consider Howard Ballage a sleeper in this year's draft. Ballage played both running back and wide receiver as a collegian but was drafted for his kickoff return ability and also will be looked at as a cornerback.

In his senior year, Ballage returned 18 kickoffs for 530 yards for a 29.4-yard average. That figure was second best in the nation in 1978. Scout Tony Razzano said, "He has great, natural ability to feel out tacklers, and has outstanding speed and quickness."

Ballage, who scouts timed in 4.48, broke a 100-yard touchdown return

against Nebraska last season.

BILLY McBRIDE • Defensive Back • Tennessee State Ht. 6-1 • Wt: 187 • Born: 7/31/56 • D-11

The 49ers final selection in the '79 draft was Billy McBride, a cornerback from Tennessee State.

The only college defensive back taken by the 49ers in the draft, McBride appears to have a good chance of sticking. "He has all the tools needed to be a cornerback in the NFL," said 49ers' secondary coach Norb Hecker, "so that basically makes him a good prospect. Because he's the only cornerback we decided to select, his chances of making the club are that much better."

McBride picked off four passes for Tennessee State last fall.

The 49ers Historical Highlights

Here are the team's historical highlights beginning with its first year in the NFL:

1950 — The 49ers fell flat on their faces in their NFL debut, winning only three games. A rival coach described them as "not big enough or tough enough."

1951 — In an amazing reversal of form sparked by a great rookie group, the 49ers were in the race to the final day and finished only a half game off the top. Led by Hardy Brown and his famed "shoulder tackle" the club had one of the toughest defensive units in the league, Y.A. Title and Billy Wilson began their great careers.

1952 — After a blazing start, the 49ers slumped in midseason. It can't be written off as unsuccessful for Hugh (The King) McElhenny came off the University of Washington campus to become "Player of the Year" and the most feared runner in football.

1953 — The 49ers had their best NFL showing, 9-3, normally good enough for a championship. But Detroit was 10-2. Two of the San Francisco losses came with Tittle benched because of a severe lacial injury. The three defeats were by a total of nine points. Joe (Jet) Perry became one of the few players in pro history to gain more than 1,000 yards in a single season. Gordy Soltau was the league's top scorer for the second straight year.

1954 — Early momentum was broken by injuries to key players such as Tittle, McElhenny, and Joe Perry, Perry gained more than 1,000 yards again, the first man ever to achieve this distinction.

1955 — With McElhenny hobbled by a foot injury, the 49ers had their second worst season in history under Norman P. Strader who succeeded Shaw as a head coach.

1956 — In Albert's first year at the helm, the 49ers were bogged in last place at midseason with a 1-6 record. They won four and tied one of their last five games for a brilliant stretch drive.

1957 — This undoubtedly was the most emotional and dramatic season in 49ers history. Every game was a "Cliffhanger" and the "Alley-Oop" pass from Tittle to rookie R.C. Owens became a household byword. Emotions reached a peak when the beloved Tony Morabito collapsed and died of a heart attack at the Chicago Bears game on Oct. 27. Trailing 17-7, the 49ers fought back for their greatest victory of all time, 21-17. The magnificent Wilson caught a pass from Tittle for the winning touchdown in the fourth quarter. Tied with Detroit at 8-4 when the season ended, the 49ers lost the playoff game, 31-27, although they held a 27-7 lead in the third quarter.

- 1958 An up-and-down season which finished on a high note when Green Bay and Baltimore were defeated in the last two games. The 6-6 record, however, was blackened by the 33-3 and 56-7 lacings at the hands of Los Angeles and Albert resigned at the end of the year.
- 1959 With Hickey in charge, the 49ers were in contention all the way and John Brodie came into his own at quarterback when he led the team to a 21-20 upset of Cleveland, J.D. Smith, converted from a defensive back, became the second 49ers to accumulate more than 1,000 yards rushing.
- 1960 Hickey saved a seemingly hopeless season when he installed his Shotgun attack and the club captured four of the last five games to finish in a tie for second place. Third-string quarterback Bobby Waters threw the passes that upset Baltimore, 30-22, in the final two minutes.
- 1961 The success of Hickey's Shotgun amazed the football world, expecially the 49-0 victory over Detroit. Quarterback Bill Kilmer, a passing-running rookie from UCLA, was made to order for the new ofense. When the Shotgun was stopped, Brodie took over again in the T and had the finest season in 49er QB annals. Indicating the evenness of NFL competition, the 49ers were playing for a second-place tie, plus a trip to the Runner-up Bowl at Miami, or a fifth-place position on the last day of the season. The Colts again won by three points, but 1961 must remain as one of the most exciting and interesting years in 49ers history.
- 1962 For the first time since 1956, the 49ers finished the frustrating season with more defeats than victories. In so doing, the honored adage of "fit's easier to wn at home than on the road," proved false the 49ers won only one o seven at home, but captured five of seven road contests.
- 1963 Injuries in multitude to key personnel started the 49ers off to a disappointing 2-12 league season. One of the victories, however, was a smashing 20-14 upset of ultimate World Champion Chicago, the only league defeat suffered by the Bears all season.
- 1964 Club chief executive Victory P. Morabito died of a heart attack in May. Injury to key personnel prevented the 49ers from gaining enough offensive momentum to forge a winning season although they proved to be one of the toughest defensive clubs in the league. Outstanding rookie performances by end Dave Parks, quarterback George Mira and linebacker Dave Wilcox also took some of the sting from the 4-10 overall record.
- 1965 Outstanding offensive performances enabled the 49ers to jump from the bottom to fourth place in the Western Division as the team led the NFL in both scoring and total offense. John Brodie was the most productive passer in the NFL, Dave Parks led the league in receiving and rookie Ken Willard and veteran John David Crow, acquired in an off-season trade, led a strong ground game. The over-all record was 7-6-1 and the season-opening 52-24 beating of the Chicago Bears marked the largest number of points ever scored by the 49ers in NFL play.
- 1966 After a somewhat slow start, the 49ers got in gear just before midway in the season and became one of only two teams to beat the eventual World Champion Green Bay Packers. After that, they rolled to a respectable 6-6-2 record and were in the battle for second place in the Western Division until the final league game. Guard John Thomas and end Dave Parks were All Pro, and they joined guard Howard Mudd, center Bruce Bosley, fullback Ken Willard and linebacker Dave Wilcox in the Pro Bowl.
- 1967 An auspicious start (they were 5-1) disintegrated into disappointment for the 49ers as injuries took a heavy toll and a six-game losing streak took them out of the running. Quarterback George Mira came off the bench to lead the squad to two season-ending vitories and salvage a 7-7 record. There were bright spots however, as, with John Brodie in fine form, the 49ers were the only team to beat the power-laden Rams in a league game, guard Howard Mudd and linebacker Dave Wilcox were named to All-Pro teams, and Mudd and center Bruce Bosley played in the Pro Bowl for the second straight time.

- 1968 Under new coach Dick Nolan the 49ers posted a 7-6-1 record as the season turned on key wins over New York, 26-10, and Green Bay, 27-20. Brilliant performances by QB John Brodie, receiver Clif McNeil and running back Ken Willard led a prolific offense, while tackle Charlie Krueger, linebacker Dave Wilcox and defensive back Kermit Alexander, sparked a revitalized defense. McNeil and guard Howard Mudd were chosen All-NFL, and joined by Wilcox, Willard and Alexander in the Pro Bowl.
- 1969 Beset by injuries that nearly decimated the defensive unit, the 49ers struggled through the early part of the season, went five game before beating Baltimore, the first time they had done that in 13 pervious games. It got a little better after that (final record was 4-8-2) and five players Jim Johnson, Dave Wilcox, Elmer Collett, Ken Willard and rookie Gene Washington were selected for the Pro Bowl. Johnson was also All-Pro and winner of the Eshmont Award.
- 1970 This was the greatest year since the club became a member of the NFL in 1950. The 10-3 record was the best as an NFL club, the Western Division (NFC) championship was the first in the NFL. In a season of superlatives, John Brodle was the NFL's "Player of the Year," Bruce Taylor was NFC "Rookle of the Year," Coach Dick Nolan was a near-unanimous choice as NFC "Coach of the year," Brodle, receiver Gene Washington, linebacker Dave Wilcox and cornerback Jimmy Johnson were All-Pro and joined by tackle Len Rhode in being selected for the Pro Bowl.
- 1971 The 49ers forged a 9-5-0 record and won their second consecutive NFC Western Division title, clinching the crown on the final day by beating Detroit, 31-27, the identical score by which the Lions had knocked the 49ers out of championship play in the bitterly-remembered 1957 game. The season was also the club's first in its plush new home, Candlestick Park. Center Forrest Blue, linebacker Dave Wilcox and cornerback Jimmy Johnson were All-Pro and joined in the Pro bowl by Ted Kwalick, Gene Washington, Vic Washington, Cedrick Hardman and Bruce Taylor.
- 1972 Early-season inconsistency compounded by an Injury to John Brodie in the fifth game of the season cast a pall on 49er propects for a third-straight NFC West title, but Steve Spurrier stepped in for Brokie and turned things around with a brilliant, poised performance. In the final quarter of the final game the recovered Brodie relieved Steve, threw two TD passes for 20-17 win over Minnesota that clinched NFC West title No. 3, but Spurrier's nine-game contribution was the key. Center Forrest Blue, defensive back Jimmy Johnson, tight end Ted Kwalick, wide receiver Gene Washington and linebacker Dave Wilcox were All-Pro selections.
- 1973 In what was both a disappointing and significant year, the 49ers were 5-9 after tackling the NFL's toughest schedule and failing victim to a rash of key injuries and an unsettled quarterback statution. It also marked the end of the brilliant careers of quarterback John Brodie and defensive tackle Charlie Krueger, both of whom retired at year's end. Center Forrest Blue and Dave Wilcox were All-Pro and joined in the Pro Bowl by Ted Kwalick, Woody Peoples and Tom Wittum.
- 1974 The 49ers used five different quarterbacks after an injury to starter Steve Spurrier a week before the season opened sidelined him for most of the year. After winning the first two games the club lost a team record seven straight and then closed with a rush, winning four of the last five games to finish the season at 6-8. Running back Wilbur Jackson was named SPORTING NEWS "Rookie of the Year" and was named to the NFL All-Rookie team along with quarterback Tom Owen and defensive back Mike Holmes. Center Forrest Blue and punter Tom Wittum were All-NFC and selected for the Pro Bowl along with Jimmy Johnson. A knee injury forced perennial All-Pro linbacker Dave Wilcox to retire after a brilliant 11-year career with the 49ers.
- 1975 A strong defensive performance throughout the season couldn't offset an erratic offense troubled by an unsettled quarterback situation and a rebuilding offensive line. High point of the 5-9 season was a 24-23 win over Los Angeles in Los Angeles to end a 10-game losing streak to the Rams. At season's end, defensive end Cedrick Hardman was the club's only All-Pro selection and only player chosen for the Pro Bowl. Jimmy Johnson became the club's first-ever two-time Eshmont Award winner.
- 1976 A turnaround year for the 49ers as the team, under coach Monte Clark, posted an 8-6 record, their first winning season since 1972. With new quarterback Jim Plunkett at the controls, the 49ers got off to their best start ever, 6-1, before hitting a mid-season four-game losing streak that knocked the club out of playoff contention. The season saw the emergence of a powerful defensive unit that led the league in quarterback sacks with 61. Delvin Williams set a 49ers single-season

rushing record with his 1,203 yards on the ground. Tommy Hart was named All-Pro and played in the Pro Bowl along with Williams, Cleveland Elam, and Dave Washington. Center Randy Cross was a NFL All-Rookie team selection. Tommy Hart became a two-time winner of the Eshmont Award. Cornerback Jimmy Johnson retired after a brilliant 16-year career with the 49ers.

1977 — In the 32nd year of their existence, the 49ers began an all new era. On March 31, 1977, the club became the property of Edward J. DeBartolo, Jr., and came under the guidance of Joe Thomas as general manager. The changeover was made more dramatic because the San Francisco 49ers were one of the few NFL franchises which had never previously changed ownership or location. On the field, under Coach Ken Meyer, the 49ers ran hot and cold. The club lost its first five games, then won five of the next six before dropping the final three contests for a 5-9 record overall. Strong safety Mel Phillips was named winner of the coveted Eshmont Award. Cleveland Elam was selected All-Pro and played for the NFC team in the Pro Bowl.

1978 — The 49ers suffered through their longest season as the club fell to 2-14 in '78 and three coaches were hired and fired in less than 12 months. First, Pete McCulley departed after nine games with a 1-8 record, and his replacement, Fred O'Connor, was let go at the end of the year as the team won just one of its final seven contests. Bill Walsh was hired as the new Coach and General Manager on January 9, 1979, replacing O'Connor as coach and Joe Thomas as General Manager. Running back Paul Hofer, who replaced acclaimed O.J. Simpson when the newly-acquired star went to the sidelines for the year with a shoulder injury, was named recipient of the Len Eshmont Award. No 49er received post-season honors in '78, as five starters — in addition to Simpson — were lost for the year with injuries.

Stadium Information

The San Francisco 49ers begin their ninth year in Candlestick Park. Candlestick is recognized as one of the better combination football and baseball stadiums in the United States.

The "new" Candlestick was completed in 1972 (the 49ers played in the park while it was still under construction in 1971), when it was completely encircled, carpeted with Astroturf, furnished throughout with comfortable chairs (no bleachers), and surrounded by additional parking space.

The stadium seats 61,197 for football. There are three major ticket plazas and entry levels. Every seat in the stadium is a chairtype, plastic unit for comfort and durability. Completely double-decked, the park features a 7,394-seat mova-

ble section.

In the spring of 1979, the artificial turf was replaced by natural grass.


#### ODDITIES

### 1979 NFL Rules Adopted to Foster Safety

- Prohibit all players on the receiving team from blocking opponents below the waist during kickoffs, punts and field goal attempts.
- 2. Stipulate mandatory equipment for all players to wear when they participate in games; outlined illegal equipment and illegal alteration of equipment.
- Broadened the zone where a crackback block is prohibited from 3 yards to 5 yards on either side of the line of scrimmage.
- 4. Provided that 3 players may be returned from the Injured Reserve after the final cutdown.
- No charged time out in final two minutes to a team whose player has been injured as the result of a personal foul.
- 6. Permission for players to wear elbow and knee pads, in addition to a helmet, during off-season camps and all tryouts.

# 1979 NFL Rule Changes

Prohibited all players on the receiving team from blocking opponents below the waist during kickoffs, punts and field goal attempts.

Stipulated mandatory equipment for all players to wear when they partici-

pate in any game.

Extended the prohibited crackback zone from 3 yards on either side of the line of scrimmage to 5 yards on either side of the line in order to provide a greater measure of protection for the players.

If an offensive player fumbles anywhere on the field during a fourth down play or if a player fumbles on any down after the 2 minute warning in a half, only

the fumbling player is permitted to recover and/or advance the ball.

A team whose player is injured as the result of a personal foul committed during the last two minutes of a half will no longer be charged with a time out if he

is disabled after the penalty has been assessed.

Stipulated that if a member of the receiving team touches a scrimmage kick in the field of play or in the end zone and a member of the kicking team legally recovers the ball in the end zone, the kicking team will retain possession either at the spot of first touch by receivers, or at one yard line.

Clarified the automatic referee's time out whenever a quarterback is sacked behind the line in order to provide for a consistent length of time for the clock to

be stopped before it is restarted again.

Provided for the captain who lost the pre-game coin toss to delay his second

half choice until immediately prior to start of second half kickoff.

A period can be extended to permit a team whose opportunity to catch a scrimmage kick has been interferred with on the last play of a half (but no fair catch signal was given). That team will be allowed to run one play from scrimmage or attempt a field goal from free kick instead of only being permitted to attempt a free kick as in the past.

Any time a player, who has been substituted for, leaves the field on the wrong side of the field or over the end line in the end zone, his team will be penalized five yards from the previous spot whether or not the violation is discovered during the down or at the end of the down. In previous years if the violation was discovered after the down was over, the play had to count and the team was then penalized.

Adjusted numbering of players to allow defensive linemen to wear numbers

in the nineties.

# Also, The Following Was Endorsed By The NFL:

- 1. Head coaches agreed that at their next meeting they would discuss the prohibition of coaching chop-blocking techniques.
- Officiating mechanics will be refined to afford more protection to all players. especially quarterbacks, by the utilization of a quick-whistle.
- 3. All attempts to throw a punch or deliver a kick will be penalized the same as if contact had been achieved by such action.
