Mrs. Victor P. Morabito

The San Francisco 49ers, oldest original major league professional football franchise west of the Mississippi, begin their 31st year representing San Francisco and the Bay Area with the 1976 season, and their 31st year under the basic original ownership with which they began.

Over the previous 30 years, the 49ers have established themselves among the most exciting and colorful teams in professional football. There have been great players, great games and highly-successful seasons.

And there has been established a lasting tradition for operating as an

always first class organization.

That reputation did not come easily and is the result of a strong pioneering effort—and enduring faith.

When Anthony J. "Tony" Morabito, the club's founder, watched the first 49er team take the field in 1946, he had set in motion the first major league professional sports operation ever to originate in the State of California.

Tony, later joined by his younger brother, Victor, survived those early days, many of them tough, struggling days, to achieve a level of success with the 49ers which enabled sports fans of Northern California, in fact, the entire state, to enjoy what has become one of the national hotbeds of professional sport.

In the beginning, the 49ers were members of the All-America Football Conference. They joined the National Football League prior to the 1950 season.

Tony Morabito passed away during the 1957 season, to be succeeded by Vic Morabito as the club's chief executive officer. Upon Vic's death, in 1964, Louis G. Spadia, then general manager, became the team's top working executive. He was named president prior to the 1967 season.

The San Francisco 49ers are a limited partnership with the major interest being held by Mrs. Raymond Fox and Mrs. Victor P. Morabito.

FORTY NINER PROSPECTUS - 1976 NEW COACH - NEW APPROACH . . .

Although yet to coach a down as a head coach, Monte Clark, the new man at the controls of the San Francisco 49ers, has altered the personality, character—and prospects—of the team to such an extent that there is strong feeling that the 49ers will soon be back in the midst of the title chase in the National Football League.

Most of the excitement stems from a two-trade "package" conceived and executed by Clark

shortly after he was named to succeed Dick Nolan as 49er head coach following the 1975 season in which San Francisco won five games, lost nine to finish a distant second, behind Los Angeles, in the NFC Western Division.

The first deal sent nine-year veteran quarterback Steve Spurrier to the newly franchised Tampa Bay Buccaneers in return for two players, wide receiver Willie McGee, obtained by Tampa from Los Angeles, and young linebacker Bruce Elia, a 1975 rookie with Miami, and Tampa's bonus choice in the second round of the college draft.

Only days after that trade, Clark dropped the other shoe, in effect, by announcing that San Francisco had acquired quarterback Jim Plunkett, former Heisman Trophy winner and Stanford All-American.

from the New England Patriots, for two first-round draft choices in 1976, a first and second in 1977, and young quarterback Tom Owen.

Thus, with that package, Clark accomplished a number of positives such as (1) stabilizing the unsettled quarterback situation which had troubled the 49ers ever since the retirement of John Brodie in 1973; (2) bringing back to The Bay Area a player whose fabulous career at Stanford had made him one of the area's all-time favorites; and (3) added youthful depth at positions where the club was in need (wide receiver, linebacker).

McGee, a former collegiate sprinter from Alcorn A&M, is considered a "burner" (he has run the 100-yd. dash in 9.1) and a possible challenger to incumbent wide receivers Terry Beasley and Gene Washington, and Elia, also with good speed, was a 4th-round choice by the Dolphins out of Ohio State and had an impressive rookie year at Miami.

Standing with Plunkett at quarterback will be 15-year veteran Norm Snead, who completed 108 of 189 passes for 1,337 yards and nine TDs before giving up the starting job to Spurrier just past midpoint last year, a drafted rookie, Scott Bull, of Arkansas, Rick Worley, who returns from Canada after having been a 12th-round 49er draft choice in 1975, and two other free agent signees.

And even without a first-round choice, San Francisco's 1976 draft is considered a potentially helpful one. Their first pick was UCLA center Randy Cross, 6-3, 245, and they used the Tampa pick to choose Eddie Lewis, 172-pound cornerback from Kansas. Both of those players will compete at positions where help and depth are needed.

In the fourth round, the 49ers went for Steve Rivera, the gritty little wide receiver from California, compared, by Clark, to Miami's skillful veteran Howard Twilley. That, too, was a popular decision in the 49ers' home area.

In yet another aspect of the "new coach, new approach" theme, Clark moved the 49ers' pre-season training camp from the University

of California at Santa Barbara, some 350 miles away from The Bay Area, to nearby San Jose State University, just 45 miles from San Francisco.

At 39, Clark is the youngest, and at 6-6, 250, also the biggest head coach in the NFL. He comes to San Francisco, where he began his professional career as a player in 1959, after a six-year stint as Don Shula's chief offensive assistant with the Miami Dolphins where he was considered one of the main architects of that club's rise to championship prominence.

CHANGES, CHANGES . . .

In San Francisco, Clark takes over a team that has experienced three troubled years (1973, 5-9: 1974, 6-8: 1975, 5-9) after having won NFC Western Division titles in 1970-71-72.

Yet, despite the disappointments of recent seasons, the 49ers do possess a number of strong points upon which the new coach can build.

On offense, there is a cadre of young running backs with quality— Delvin Williams, who averaged 5.4 yards a carry last year, just a 10th of a yard behind league leader O. J. Simpson, Wilbur Jackson, the club's No. 1 draft choice in 1974, and former UCLA All-American Kermit Johnson, all at halfback, along with fullbacks Larry Schreiber and Sammy Johnson.

Williams and Schreiber were the starters most of 1975 with Williams picking up 631 yards in 117 carries. Clark has indicated there may be a training camp look at Jackson as a fullback bringing up the possibility of a Williams-Jackson backfield tandem, an awe-some prospect to devotees of speed. And both are good receivers.

The wide receiver spots are manned by superbly talented people, seven-year veteran Gene Washington, who caught nine TD passes last year despite the 49ers' offensive stutters, and four-year man Terry Beasley, who matured greatly in 1975. Both are former No. 1 draft choices. The addition of McGee should be a big help and the rookie Rivera is expected to make a strong run.

Note: The last time Gene Washington and Jim Plunkett played together, in Gene's senior season and Jim's sophomore year at Stanford, the combination resulted in 71 completions and eight TDs.

At tight end there is tough veteran Tom Mitchell and a free agent signee from last year, Bill Larson. Mitchell played hurt all of last year and did a good, gutty job in catching 25 passes and three TDs, but help is needed here and the club was unable to draft what it considered a suitable prospect.

That leaves the offensive line. There is good veteran talent here, guards John Watson and Woody Peoples, tackle Cas Banaszek, but the unit simply hasn't worked very well the past couple of seasons.

Clark has faced this sort of problem before at Miami where he took a number of "castoffs"

from other teams and turned them into one of the NFL's best. He will probably call on young giants like Jean Barrett, 6–6, 254, Keith Fahnhorst, 6–6, 265, Jeff Hart, 6–5, 266, along with the rookie Cross, to take a very active part in the reconstruction project.

Bill Reid, the surprising free agent who surfaced to be the team's starting center last year, figures to get a lot of competition for the job, both from Cross and from Barrett, who has started at the position before.

San Francisco's defense, which spent a lot of time on the field in 1975, is considered good (it finished 10th overall in the NFL last year, ninth against the rush, 11th against the pass), but it, too, has needs.

The front four is tough with ends Cedrick Hardman, San Francisco's only Pro Bowl selection last year, and Tommy Hart, and tackles Bob Hoskins and Bill Sandifer. Two rookies from last year, No. 1 choice Jimmy Webb, at tackle, and No. 4 choice Cleveland Elam, at end, made strong impressions in 1975 so the line is young, talented and aggressive.

MORE TO COME .

Hart enters his ninth season, Hardman and Hoskins their seventh and Sandifer his third. Forty Niner defenders tackled opposing passers 40 times last season, fourth-best in the NFC.

At linebacker, veteran Frank Nunley enters his 10th season after having survived a number of challenges for his starting spot in the middle. He'll face still another challenge from secondyear man Greg Collins and from Elia, whose speed and agility make him a prospect.

The outside jobs will be contested by Skip Vanderbundt, in his eighth year. Dave Washington, entering his seventh after having been acquired from Buffalo just prior to last season and Willie Harper, who struggled with injury during much of last season.

Vanderbundt and Washington were the starters through most of 1975, but Harper, a fine player who enters just his fourth year. played quite a bit, and well, in the latter stages of the season. He had been a starter before injury struck him down.

It is in the defensive secondary where there is most concern. The brilliant Jimmy Johnson, still a cornerback after 15 superlative years in the NFL, is now 38 years old, but will return with skills undiminished, for his 16th season.

Bruce Taylor is sound, sometimes outstanding at the right cornerback spot, but strong safety Mel Phillips, one of the best at that job in the league, has broken an arm five times in the past three seasons and his situation is in question.

Regular free safety Ralph McGill was also injured much of last season and his full recovery will be closely checked during the training period.

With both Phillips and McGill out last year, young Tim Anderson, in his first year in the NFL after four years of Canadian football, worked at strong safety and four-year veteran Windlan Hall played at free safety.

Nate Allen, gained in a trade from Kansas City, backed up at the corners.

However, the "iffy" situation prompted the drafting of Lewis, the Kansas cornerback, Anthony Leonard, a cornerback from Virginia Union, and strong safety Jay Chesley, from Vanderbilt.

Forty Niner kickers are good. Punter Tom Wittum finished third-ranked in the NFL, second in the NFC with a 41.9 average after having been the NFC Pro Bowl punter the previous two seasons.

> Rookie place kicker Steve Mike-Mayer was erratic as a field goal kicker (although he hit 50%), but is a deep kickoff specialist, and, besides, he endeared himself forever to 49er fans with a last-second 54-yarder that beat the Rams in Los Angeles.

San Francisco lost Manfred Moore, a reserve running back but a

superb special teams player, to Tampa in the expansion draft, but the acquisition of McGee and the presence of Taylor, McGill and Kermit Johnson provide them with plenty of kick return talent. It is in kick coverage where Moore's loss may be most keenly felt.

TOM WITTUM Many of the 49er problems have already been attacked, perhaps solved, but there are still others to be handled. On the basis of his fast start, nobody's betting that Monte Clark won't handle them.



BY POSITIONS . . .

OFFENSE

Receivers: Gene Washingon, entering his eighth season as a professional, remains one of the top wide receivers in the NFL, now ranks ninth among active receivers in the NFC, 13th in the entire NFL. In his seven seasons to date, he has caught 306 passes for 5,569 yards and 48 TDs. Overall per catch average is 18.2 yards. Terry Beasley, entering just his fourth year,

is the other returning starter. A No. 1 draft choice out of Auburn prior to the 1972 season, Beasley played hardly at all during his first two seasons due to injury, but he made it through 1974 injury-free and stepped into a starting job last year. Has great speed. The 49ers picked up speed burner Willie McGee, former Alcorn A&M sprinter who has run the 100-yd dash in 9.1, a player many observers feel is just beginning to hit his stride after three years in the league (one with San Diego, two with Los Angeles). McGee is the only other veteran. San Francisco drafted California's fireball Steve Rivera, 3rd-ranked receiver in the NCAA last year, in the fourth round and added Kenny Harrison, from SMU, in the ninth. At tight end tough Tom Mitchell returns after having played injured

virtually all of 1975. Behind him are veterans Bill Larson and Len Garrett, both signed on as free agents last year and played very little. Larson caught five passes and Garrett, a late addition, none. SUMMARY: The starters are excellent and the addition of McGee could be a major one. The speed present in the wide receivers gives the club a constant deep threat from both positions.

Running Backs: This unit is staffed with fine, young talent. Larry Schreiber is the elder as he enters his sixth year, while the other veterans, Delvin Williams, Wilbur Jackson and Sammy Johnson, all enter their third season and Kermit Johnson only his second. Williams was the club's leading ground gainer last year with 631 yards in 117 carries for a 5.4 average, an average second in the NFL only to 0. J. Simpson's 5.5. He and Schreiber were the starters with Jackson and Sammy Johnson as the backup men. Kermit Johnson played very little. The 49ers drafted two running backs, Paul Hofer, from Mississippi, in the 11th round, and Darrell Jenkins,

from San Jose State, in the 17th. Coach Clark has indicated that Jackson will get a good look as a fullback in training camp. SUM-MARY: A young group with great promise whose talents should be just maturing.

Quarterback: The acquisition of Jim Plunkett stabilizes an unsettled situation which has troubled the 49ers since John Brodie's retirement in 1973. Plunkett, entering his sixth season, and with a clean bill of health after a struggle with injuries last year, is considered one of the fine young QBs in the game and, while Coach Clark is quick to point out that it is unrealistic to think the 49ers are just one or two players away from greatness, Plunkett's joining the 49ers is one of the most positive moves the team could have

made. In addition to his obvious playing talents, Plunkett is a great favorite in the Bay Area and his presence should inject new enthusiasm, both from within the club and from its followers. Veteran Norm Snead, who started the first seven games last season and wound up the 5th-ranked passer in the NFC, will serve as the backup. In addition, there will be four rookie aspirants in training camp—Scott Bull, 6th-round draft choice from Arkansas, Rick Worley, drafted 12th out of Howard Payne last year, but decided to play in Canada. and

free agent Jack Graham, of Colorado State. SUMMARY: This is now a good, sound position with a certified leader in Plunkett, a veteran backup man in Snead and some strong potential among the rookies.

Line: There are good veterans—tackles Cas Banaszek and John Watson, and guard Woody

Peoples—to blend with a group of highly-promising young players like Keith Fahnhorst, Jean Barrett and Jeff Hart, all of whom played last year, but not consistently enough for this to form into a cohesive unit. Bill Reid, a free agent last year who wound up with the starting center job, will probably face competition from Barrett, who has started at the position in the past, and rookie Randy Cross, from UCLA. Cross was the first player San Francisco drafted this year with their first of two-second-round choices. He could also play guard. Other offensive line draftees were tackle John Ayers (8th), from West Texas State, and Gerald Loper (12th), a guard from Florida. SUMMARY: Good personnel with a balanced blend of veteran and youthful talent. Could develop into an outstanding unit.

DEFENSE

Line: Cedrick Hardman and Tommy Hart continue as a fine set of defensive ends with last year's performance from Hardman confirming the judgment—and the promise—that made him a first-round draft choice six years ago. He was All-Pro on a number of selections and the 49ers' only invitee to the Pro Bowl. Last year also saw an increase in defensive pressure from the inside with tackles Bob Hoskins and Bill Sandifer, and, later, rookie Jimmy Webb, all doing a good job. Cleveland Elam, a 4th-round choice from Tennessee State, showed outstanding promise as a rookie in a backup role to Hardman and Hart. One of the results of the overall improvement was that the 49ers sacked opposing QBs 40 times last season, 4th-best in the NFC. Also returning will be six-year veteran Rolf Krueger, back after 2 year's retirement. There will be two drafted rookies in camp—tackle Johnny Miller (14th), from Livingstone College, and end Reggie Lewis (16th), from San Diego State. SUMMARY: There are three No. 1 choices among the veterans (Hardman, Sandifer and Webb). This is a strong unit that should do nothing but improve.

Linebackers: Good veterans in Skip Vanderbundt, Frank Nunley, Dave Washington and Willie Harper, plus a strong addition in the person of Bruce Elia, a Miami rookie last year who comes to San Francisco via Tampa. Elia is expected to challenge Nunley and last year's 2nd-round choice, Greg Collins, of Notre Dame, in the middle. Harper, an outstanding young player, injured a foot last year and was never able to mount the All-Pro candidacy expected of him, but Washington, acquired in a trade from Buffalo in pre-season, did an outstanding job filling the right side position. Harper will be back and healthy and the competition for the outside linebacking jobs should be intense. Jim Sniadecki, a former 49er back from the WFL,

also joins the competition. Among the newcomers in the battle will be USC's Dale Mitchell, 13th-round choice last year who was injured all season, and drafted rookies Robert Pennywell (6a), from Grambling, and Howard Stidman (15th), from Tennessee Tech. SUMMARY: Harper's return to health and the addition of Elia's speed should improve the overall situation at linebacker. There are good veterans here.

BY POSITIONS . . .

Secondary: The return, for his 16th season, of Jimmy Johnson, the most respected 49er of them all, is of key importance here. He had talked of retiring, but agreed to give his former teammate, Coach Monte Clark, at least one more year. Johnson has been a starter at left cornerback for San Francisco for 14 of his 15 seasons (the one year he was not, he was a starting wide receiver), and, even though he will be 38 this year. his skills have not

visibly diminished and he has had two good years in 1974-75. Last year he won the club's Len Eshmont Award for the second time in his career, the first 49er ever to win it twice since its inception in 1957. On the right corner Bruce Taylor, who goes into his seventh season, has also had two good years back-to-back and has stayed healthy. He is now considered a good, reliable cornerback. Backup man to both Johnson and Taylor is five-year veteran Nate Allen, acquired in a trade from Kansas City last year. Battle-scarred Mel Phillips, who has broken an arm five times in the last three seasons, will make another run at strong safety, where, when healthy, he is considered among the NFL's best. He made it through nine games last year, but Windlan Hall and reclaimed rookie Tim Ander-

son finished up the year. When regular free safety Ralph McGill was hurt, Hall had to move to that vacancy and Anderson, a 49er No. 1 choice in 1971 who returned after four years in Canada, finished the year as the starting strong safety. The return to health of both Phillips and McGill is very important here. San Francisco used the 2nd-round draft choice it got from Tampa in the Spurrier trade to choose Eddie Lewis, a cornerback from Kansas, and also drafted Anthony Leonard (5th), from Yirginia Union, also a cornerback, Jay Chesley (7th), a strong safety from Vanderblit, and Larry Brumfield (13th), from Indiana State. SUMMARY: Johnson's return and the health of Mel Phillips and Ralph McGill are of great importance. If all goes well, this is an eminently effective group.

SPECIAL TEAMS

The 49ers lost an outstanding special teams man when Tampa Bay picked up running back Manfred Moore in the expansion selection. Moore led the team in kickoff returns and was second in punt returns and was the "wedge-breaker" on kick coverage. However, there are a number of good return men available such as Taylor and McGill, who have each led the NFC

at least once in punt returns, Kermit Johnson and Mike Holmes. And Willie McGee was the Rams' leading kickoff returner last year. Punter Tom Wittum is one of the best in the NFL, having represented the club in the Pro Bowl two times, Last year, despite having three kicks blocked, he finished second in the NFC and third in the NFL with a 41.9-yds. average. He is the top active punter in the NFC with a three-year average of 42.3. Steve Mike-Mayer returns for his second year after having hit 50% of his field goal attempts in 1975, his longest being a 54-yarder against the Rams to win the game in the final minutes. Mike-Mayer is also a strong kickoff man. Wittum can also placekick, if needed, and former 49er placekicker Bruce Gossett, inactive last year, will be back for another shot.

A broken leg cut short his 1972 season but he bounced back and was named All-CFL in 1973. Played in 13 games for the 49ers in 1975, starting two games at strong safety in place of the injured Mel Phillips.

COMMENT: From Tim Anderson on his reputation as a hitter—"I try to hit people, hit them hard. I have the ability to hit real nice. That's why I like strong safety. It's a good position for someone who likes hitting and has the desire to compete. I was a cornerback in college and Canada. A corner really just concentrates on the man he's covering, but a strong safety has to do more thinking. You have to make more defensive calls, you're more in the pass coordination and you have to force the run. There's a lot of action at strong safety."

COLLEGE: Consensus All-America at Ohio State where he gained a reputation as an intelligent player and a consistent hard hitter. Teamed with Jack Tatum (now of the Oakland Raiders) to give the Big 10 and Rose Bowl champion Buckeyes one of the best collegiate defensive backfields in the country.

PERSONAL: Born in Colliers, W. Vir., graduated from Follansbee HS, Follansber, W. Vir. Lettered four years in football as a running back and was named All-State his final two prepsensons when he gained over 2,000 yards rushing. Also carned four letters as a baseball pitcher, Married, wife's name is Dianne. They have a son, Tim, Jr., age 3.

PRO: Started all 14 games at right tackle in 1975. Entering his ninth season. Banaszek is generally recognized as one of the most effective tackles in the league. Superior pass blocker, Drafted originally as a linebacker, but an ankle injury kept him out of what would have been his first season (1967). Returned in 1968 scheduled to play tight end, but a trade and an injury opened a tackle position and he moved into a starting job which he has never relinquished.

COMMENT: From Cas Banaszek on holding—"I hold. You have to hold. I defy any offensive lineman not to hold on pass protection. They (defensive ends) can slap you, hold you, shove you, pull you—do anything they want. That's why I have to hold. A lot of times though, you fall into things. Sometimes your hand goes into the right spot when bodies come together, like under the armpit. But you also know when to remove the hand, when you've been there too long.

COLLEGE: Was a tight end for three seasons at Northwestern, All-Big 10 and played in the North-South game after his senior year. Earned three varsity letters and holds Northwestern's career record for pass receptions at 88. Earned one baseball letter at 1st base. Came to college from Gordon Tech high school in Chicago where he earned three letters each in football, basketball and baseball. Was All-State and MVP in both football and basketball.

PERSONAL: Born in Chicago. Is one of five children (2 brothers, 2 sisters). Is married and he and wife, Diann, have a daughter, Jennifer Lynn (4/15/69), and a son, Casimir III (8/4/71), Now lives full time in The Bay Area, plays with the 49er basketball team in the off-season. Is an outstanding golfer. He and former offensive line mates Len Rohde and Randy Beisler are in business together, a cocktail lounge in Los Altos, Calif.

PRO: Very versatile performer who has played all five positions across the offensive line for the 49ers. He will probably be considered a center candidate this season although he will still get some work at guard. Played in nine games in 1975 and started seven, six at left guard and one at center. Started some games at tackle as a rookie in 1973, and has started at both guard and center the past two seasons.

COMMENT: From Jean Barrett on why he considers guard the most difficult line position—"There's a little more to playing guard. For one thing, you're playing against more people. You block against both tackles whenever you face an 'odd' defense and also the middle linebacker. And a guard has to pull, so you're hitting the strong

safety, outside linebackers-or whoever shows up.

MONTE CLARK, Head Coach



COACHING

Monte Clark becomes the San Francisco 49ers' seventh head coach after a six-year stint as assistant to Don Shula at Miami, where he served his first two seasons as offensive line coach before being named offensive coach with the primary responsibility of developing the Dolphin running game. That task he handled with such skill that the Dolphins led the AFC in rushing three times (1972-73-74) and set an NFL single-season rushing record in 1972 (2,960 yds., since broken). Possibly even more impressive was the 1975 accomplishment of finishing fourth in the rushheavy AFC, without the benefit of Larry Csonka and Co. His

Dolphin offensive line, generally regarded as one of the best in the NFL, was composed entirely of castoffs from other teams—Center Jim Langer (Browns), guards Larry Little (San Diego) and Bob Kuechenberg (Eagles, Atlanta), tackles Norm Evans (Houston) and Wayne Moore (49ers)—yet, under Clark's tutelage, in addition to being an effective, cohesive unit, Little became All-NFL four times, Langer All-NFL twice, Kuechenberg, Moore and Evans were All-AFC—and all five of them appeared at least once in the Pro Bowl. Considered a strong teacher of fundamentals, Clark is also regarded as a strong motivator and innovator. During his tenure with Shula, Miami won 67, lost 16 regular season.

PLAYER

Drafted in the fourth round prior to the 1959 season by the San Francisco 49ers, Clark began his professional career as a defensive lineman, played in San Francisco in 1959-60-61 before being traded (for a 4th-round draft choice) to Dallas prior to the 1962 season. At Dallas he switched to offensive tackle and played there one season before being traded to Cleveland. He was starting offensive tackle for seven seasons with the Browns before retiring after the 1969 season to go into coaching as a member of Shula's original Dolphin staff prior to the 1970 season. As a collegian at the University of Southern California, Clark lettered three years as a USC starter playing both offense and defense, mostly defense. He was co-captain of the USC squad in 1958. Monte played football, basketball, baseball and was a discus man in track at Kingsburg High School in Central California.

PERSONAL

Born 1-24-37 in Fillmore, Calif., but grew up and went to high school in Kingsburg.

Married to Charlotte Palm in 1957 and they have three boys—Bryan (7-27-60), Randy (7-3-62) and Eric (3-17-67).

Lived in Redwood City, Calif. throughout his playing career and all three boys were born in Sequoia Hospital there:

NOTES

From Dolphin guard Larry Little: "He's a motivator, a teacher but more than anything, a devout fundamentalist. I attribute whatever success I have had as a professional lineman to Coach Clark. Our offensive line here was just like a family, we felt like we grew up together. I've never known a man more dedicated or one who worked harder. Yet he can lighten up because he's got a dry sense of humor."

From Dolphin center Jim Langer: "He came to the team as a rookie coach and we were all new players to the system. With him leading us, we all just sort of built the thing. He is the most thorough and intense coach I've ever known. He leaves nothing to chance when it comes to preparing his people for a game. I've never worked harder than I did under Coach Clark, but I've never learned more or had a better time."

DOUG GERHART, Offensive Coach
(Quarterbacks and Receivers)

· Coaching

A highly regarded expert on every aspect of the passing game, Gerhart enters his second season as an NFL coach after having spent his first year (1975) as an assistant with the Cleveland Browns. During that one year, in which he was in charge of the Brown passing game, Gerhart's supervision resulted in wide

receiver Reggie Rucker being the leading receiver in the AFC with 60 receptions, tight end Oscar Roan having 41 receptions as a rookie and the Browns being the only team in the AFC with three receivers (running back Greg Pruitt was the 3rd) ranked among the top 15 in the conference. Before joining the Browns, Gerhart had been offensive coordinator at Colorado State University for the 1973-74 seasons. In 1974, CSU led the NCAA in passing with 2,880 yards and a 261.8-yds. per game average, 10th highest average in collegiate history. In that same year, CSU scored 23 TDs by passing. Gerhart began his coaching career at North Hollywood High School in 1959. He became an assistant at Occidental College, his alma mater, in 1965, then took over as head coach there two years later. Was head coach at Occidental in 1967-69 during which time his teams finished first in total offense in the conference all three years. From Occidental, he moved to Princeton as offensive backfield coach in 1970, then to the University of Tulsa as offensive coordinator in 1971-72.

Player

Was outstanding football and baseball player at Occidental College, from which he graduated in 1959. Went directly into coaching upon graduation from college. This will be his 16th year in coaching.

BILLY ATKINS, Defensive Coach (Secondary)

· Coaching

Comes to the 49ers (with whom he began his pro career as a player in 1958) after four seasons as defensive backfield coach for the Buffalo Bills. From 1972 through 1974 Buffalo's pass defense was recognized as among the best in the AFC with such outstanding performers as safety Tony Greene and cornerback Robert James both All-Pro and Pro

Bowl selections during those years. Before joining Lou Saban at Buffalo, Atkins was head coach and athletic director at Troy State University (Alabama) from 1966 through 1971 while his teams compiled an overall 46-14-2 record winning the NAIA National Championship in 1968, three consecutive Alabama Collegiate Conference titles (1967-68-69) and co-championship of the Gulf South Conference (1971). He was NAIA "Coach of the Year" in 1968. Began his coaching career in 1965 at Jordan High School, Columbus. Ga., with a single-season 6-2-2 record.

Player

Atkins was a 3rd-round draft choice out of Auburn by the 49ers prior to the 1958 season, played two years with San Francisco (defensive back and punter), then signed with the Bills of the AFL in 1960. Was All-League with the Bills in 1961 when he led the club with 10 interceptions and a 45-yd. punting average. Those figures also led the AFL and still stand as Buffalo team records. He played in the AFL All-Star Game that season. Was traded to the New York Jets in 1963, then finished his playing career with Denver in 1964. At Auburn he was a fullback, linebacker, punter and kickoff specialist, was All-Conference and the MVP of Auburn's 1957 National Championship team. In high school at Millport (Ala.) At the conclusion of his college career, Atkins played in the North-South Shrine Game, Senior Bowl and College All-Star Game.

ED BEARD, Linebackers

Coaching

The only hold-over member of the previous coaching staff, Beard begins his fourth season as 49er assistant, his third year as linebacker coach. Came to training camp as an active player in 1973, but knee problems forced his retirement prior to the opening of the season and he immediately joined the coaching staff. His first season as a coach he was in charge of

special teams and assistant linebacker coach. Took over as linebacker coach in 1974.

Player

Played for eight years with the 49ers after having been the club's 14th-round draft choice prior to the 1964 season. Didn't join the team until 1965, after a service stint, but promptly took over a starting job as middle line-backer, a position he held until knee problems began to slow him in 1969. Had regained the starting job, along with that of captain of the special teams, in 1972 when the second knee operation occurred, eventually forcing his retirement. Ed won the 49ers' highly-valued Len Eshmont Award, voted by his teammates in recognition of courageous and inspirational play, after the 1971 season. FLOYD PETERS, Defensive Line

· Coaching

Joins Coach Monte Clark's first 49er coaching staff as defensive line coach after having served in the same capacity for the past two seasons with the New York Giants. Prior to becoming a member of the Giants' staff. Peters had been chief scout for the Miami Dolphins in the 13-state Western U.S. Actually began coaching in 1970 serving Vince Lombardi as a player-

coach with the Washington Redskins. With the Giants, in addition to his duties as defensive line coach, Peters worked with the special teams for Coach Bill Arnsparger and was the club's weight training coach.

Player

Peters came into the NFL as an 8th-round draft choice of the Baltimore Colts in 1958, then played 12 seasons as a defensive tackle with Baltimore, Cleveland (during which period he was a teammate of Monte Clark's), Detroit, Philadelphia and Washington. 49ERS 17, VIKINGS 27 Metropolitan Stadium (48,418 sold) (46,479 att.)

The 49ers opened their 30th season of professional football with veteran quarterback Norm Snead at the controls, Defending NFC champion Minnesota jumped out to a quick 13-0 lead on two Fred Cox field goals and a 26-yard fumble return by Terry Brown. The 49ers stormed back to cut the deficit to 13-10 at halftime as Snead completions to Gene Washington and newlyacquired Bob Hayes set up rookie placekicker Steve Mike-Mayer's first professional field goal, a 19-yarder, and a Brace Taylor interception set the stage for a 22-yard Snead to Washington TD pass. The defenses took over until Minnesota exploded for two TDs in the fourth quarter to settle the issue. From Tarkenton hit Brent McClanaban with a 10-yard scoring strike and Chuck Foreman scored from a yard out for the Vikings. EXPANSION INFORMATION

Two new franchises, the Seattle Seahawks and the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, begin on-field competition as members of the National Football League with the opening of the 1976 season.

Seattle will be a member of the NFC Western Division for purposes of standings only. Actually, the Seahawks will play every member of the NFC

once, and will play Tampa Bay.

Tampa Bay will be a member of the AFC West, again for purposes of standings only, but will play every member of the AFC, as well as Seattle.

In 1977, the two teams switch conferences, Seattle moving into the AFC Central, Tampa Bay to the NFC Central. Again, they will each play every

member of their assigned conference as well as each other.

In 1971, after the completion of the merger between the AFL and NFL and the divisional realignments which comprise the current NFL, schedules designating opponents—but not dates and sites—were set through 1978. Obviously, due to the addition of the two new franchises, those earlier schedules no longer apply.



ESHMONT MEMORIAL AWARD—A secret ballot by 49er players the night before the last home game of the season determines the winner of the Len Eshmont Memorial Award—a \$1,000 watch. Eshmont, a Fordham graduate, was a member of the first 49er squad in 1946. He coached at the Naval Academy and the University of Virginia before his untimely death in May, 1957. 49er founder Tony Morabito established the award in 1957. Y. A. Tittle was the first winner. Cornerback Jimmy Johnson won it last year to become the first two-time winner in history. He first won it in 1969.

THE FORTY NINER STORY - 1946-1975

From a modest beginning in 1946, the San Francisco 49ers have grown into one of the most flourishing franchises in professional sports.

A major league football franchise in the City by the Golden Gate had long been the cherished dream of Anthony J. (Tony) Morabito, a native son and 1931 graduate of the University of Santa Clara. Failing to win recognition from the National League, Tony turned to the All-America Conference, which began operations in 1946 with the late Arch Ward, sports editor of the Chicago Tribune, as the guiding genius.

Although the AAC went under after four years of intense competition with the NFL. it proved Morabito's point that San Francisco was a major league city. Sports fans of the entire Bay Area took the 49ers to their hearts and attendance grew by the proverbial leaps and bounds.

The club's success was predicated on Tony's oft-repeated slogan of "Go first class or not at all," and his early organization was built around such honored names as Lawrence T. (Buck) Shaw, head coach; and Frankie Albert, Norm Standlee, Alyn Beals, Johnny Strzykalski and Len Eshmont—all of whom were already top drawing cards in collegiate and pro football.

The 49ers were the perennial runners-up to the mighty Cleveland Browns throughout the history of the AAC and, masterminded by Shaw on the bench and Albert on the field, became noted nationally for daring, colorful football. The AAC ended its short but exciting life when the Browns defeated the 49ers, 21-7. in the championship game of 1949, San Francisco, Cleveland and Baltimore became members of the NFL.

In recent years the 49ers have crowned the realization of Tony Morabito's dream by winning three division titles and, with the move to Candlestick Park, becoming one of the most successful franchises in the NFL.

Here are the highlights, beginning with the first year in the NFL:

1950-The 49ers fell flat on their faces in their NFL debut, winning only three games. A rival coach described them as "not big enough or tough enough."

49ER STORY (Con't)

1951—In an amazing reversal of form sparked by a great rookie group, the 49ers were in the race to the final day and finished only a half game off the top. Led by Hardy Brown and his famed "shoulder tackle," the club had one of the toughest defensive units in the league. Y. A. Tittle and Billy Wilson began their great careers.

1952-After a blazing start, the 49ers slumped in midseason. It can't be written off as unsuccessful for Hugh (The King) McElhenny came off the University of Washington campus to become "Player of the Year" and the most feared runner in football.

1953-The 49ers had their best NFL showing, 9-3, normally good enough for a championship. But Detroit was 10-2. Two of the San Francisco losses came with Tittle benched because of a severe facial injury. The three defeats were by a total of nine points. Joe (Jet) Perry became one of the few players in pro history to gain more than 1,000 yards in a single season. Gordy Soltau was the league's top scorer for the second straight year.

1954—Early momentum was broken by injuries to key players such as Tittle, McElhenny, and Joe Perry, Perry gained more than 1,000 yards again, the first man ever to achieve this

distinction.

1955-With McElhenny hobbled by a foot injury, the 49ers had their second worst season in history under Norman P. Strader who succeeded Shaw as head coach.

1956—In Albert's first year at the beim, the 49ers were bogged in last place at midseason with a 1-6 record. They won four and tied one of their last five games for a brilliant stretch drive.

1957—This undoubtedly was the most emotional and dramatic season in 49er history. Every game was a "Cliffhanger" and the "Alley-Oop" pass from Tittle to rookie R. C Owens became a household byword. Emotions reached a peak when the beloved Tony Morabito collapsed and died of a heart attack at the Chicago Bears game on Oct. 27. Trailing, 17-7, the 49ers fought back for their greatest victory of all time, 21-17. The magnificent Wilson caught a pass from Tittle for the winning touchdown in the fourth quarter. Tied with Detroit at 8-4 when the season ended, the 49ers lost the playoff game, 31-27, although they held a 27-7 lead in the third quarter.

1958-An up-and-down season which finished on a high note when Green Bay and Baltimore were defeated in the last two games. The 6-6 record, however, was blackened by the 33-3 and 56-7 lacings at the hands of Los Angeles and Albert resigned at the end of the year.

1959—With Hickey in charge, the 49ers were in contention all the way and John Brodic came into his own at quarterback when he led the team to a 21-20 upset of Cleveland. J. D. Smith, converted from a defensive back, became the second 49er to accumulate more than 1,000 yards rushing.

1960-Hickey saved a seemingly hopeless season when he installed his Shotgun attack and the club captured four of the last five games to finish in a tie for second place. Third-string quarterback Bobby Waters threw the passes that upset Baltimore, 30-22, in the final two minutes.

1961-The success of Hickey's Shotgun amazed the football world, especially the 49-0 victory over Detroit, Quarterback Bill Kilmer, a passing-running rookie from UCLA, was made to order for the new offense. When the Shotgun was stopped, Brodie took over again in the T and had the finest season in 49er q.b. annals, Indicating the evenness of NFL competition, the 49ers were playing for a second-place tie, plus a trip to the Runner-up Bowl at Miami, or a fifth-place position on the last day of the season. The Colts again won by three points, but 1961 must remain as one of the most exciting and interesting years in 49er history.

1962-For the first time since 1956, the 49ers finished the frustrating season with more defeats than victories. In so doing, the honored adage of "it's easier to win at home than on the road," proved false-the 49ers won only one of seven at home, but captured five of seven

road contests.

1963-Injuries in multitude to key personnel started the 49ers off to a disappointing 2-12 league season. One of the victories, however, was a smashing 20-14 upset of ultimate World Champion Chicago, the only league defeat suffered by the Bears all season.

1964—Club chief executive Victor P. Morabito died of a heart attack in May. Injury to key personnel prevented the 49ers from gaining enough offensive momentum to forge a winning season, although they proved to be one of the toughest defensive clubs in the league. Outstanding rookie performances by end Dave Parks, quarterback George Mira and linebacker Dave Wilcox also took some of the sting from the 4-10 overall record.

1965—Outstanding offensive performances enabled the 49ers to jump from the bottom to fourth place in the Western Division as the team led the NFL in both scoring and total offense. John Brodie was the most productive passer in the NFL, Dave Parks led the league in receiving and rookie Ken Willard and veteran John David Crow, acquired in an off-season trade, led a strong ground game. The over-all record was 7-6-1 and the season-opening 52-24 beating of the Chicago Bears marked the largest number of points ever scored by the 49ers in NFL play.

49ER STORY (Con't)

1966-After a somewhat slow start, the 49crs got in gear just before midway in the season and became one of only two teams to beat the eventual World Champion Green Bay Packers. After that, they rolled to a respectable 6-6-2 record and were in the battle for second place in the Western Division until the final league game. Guard John Thomas and end Dave Parks were All Pro, and they joined guard Howard Mudd, center Bruce Bosley, fullback Ken Willard and linebacker Dave Wilcox in the Pro Bowl.

1967—An auspicious start (they were 5-1) disintegrated into disappointment for the 49ers as injuries took a heavy toll and a six-game losing streak took them out of the running. Quarterback George Mira came off the bench to lead the squad to two season-ending victories and salvage a 7-7 record. There were bright spots, however, as, with John Brodie in fine form, the 49ers were the only team to beat the power-laden Rams in a league game, guard Howard Mudd and linebacker Dave Wilcox were named to All-Pro teams, and Mudd and center Bruce Bosley played in the Pro Bowl for the second straight time.

1968—Under new coach Dick Nolan the 49ers posted a 7-6-1 record as the season turned on key wins over New York, 26-10, and Green Bay, 27-20. Brilliant performances by OB John Brodie, receiver Clif McNeil and running back Ken Willard led a prolific offense, while tackle Charlie Krueger, linebacker Dave Wilcox and defensive back Kermit Alexander, sparked a revitalized defense. McNeil and guard Howard Mudd were chosen All-NFL, and joined by Wilcox, Willard and Alexander in the Pro Bowl.

1969—Beset by injuries that nearly decimated the defensive unit, the 49ers struggled through the early part of the season, went five games before beating Baltimore, the first time they had done that in 13 previous games. It got a little better after that (final record was 4-8-2) and five players—Jim Johnson, Dave Wilcox, Elmer Collett, Ken Willard and rookie Gene Washington—were selected for the Pro Bowl, Johnson was also All-Pro and winner of the Eshmont Award.

1970-This was the greatest year since the club became a member of the NFL in 1950. The 10-3-1 record was the best as an NFL club, the Western Division (NFC) championship was the first in the NFL. In a season of superlatives, John Brodie was the NFL's "Player of the Year," Bruce Taylor was NFC "Rookie of the Year," Coach Dick Nolan was a near-unanimous choice as NFC "Coach of the Year," Brodie, receiver Gene Washington, linebacker Daye Wilcox and cornerback Jimmy Johnson were All-Pro and joined by tackle Len Rohde in being selected for the Pro Bowl.

1971—The 49ers forged a 9-5-0 record and won their second consecutive NFC Western Division title, cinching the crown on the final day by heating Detroit, 31-27, the identical score by which the Lions had knocked the 49ers out of championship play in the bitterlyremembered 1957 game. The season was also the club's first in its plush new home, Candlestick Park, Center Forrest Blue, linebacker Dave Wilcox and cornerback Jimmy Johnson were All-Pro and joined in the Pro Bowl by Ted Kwalick, Gene Washington, Vic Washington, Cedrick Hardman and Bruce Taylor,

1972—Early-scason inconsistency compounded by an injury to John Brodie in the fifth game of the season cast a pall on 49er prospects for a third-straight NFC West title, but Steve Spurrier stepped in for Brodie and turned things around with a brilliant, poised performance. In the final quarter of the final game the recovered Brodie relieved Steve, threw two TD passes for 20-17 win over Minnesota that clinched NFC West title No. 3, but Spurrier's nine-game contribution was the key. Center Forrest Blue, defensive back Jimmy Johnson, tight end Ted Kwalick, wide receiver Gene Washington and linebacker Dave Wilcox were All-Pro selections.

1973.—In what was both a disappointing and significant year, the 49ers were 5-9 after tackling the NFL's toughest schedule and falling victim to a rash of key injuries and an unsettled quarterback situation. It also marked the end of the brilliant careers of quarterback John Brodie and defensive tackle Charlie Krueger, both of whom retired at year's end. Center Forrest Blue and Dave Wilcox were All-Pro and joined in the Pro Bowl by Ted Kwalick, Woody Peoples and Tom Withum.

1974-The 49ers used five different quarterbacks after an injury to starter Steve Spurrier a week before the season opened sidelined him for most of the year. After winning the first two games, the club lost a team record seven straight and then closed with a rush, winning four of the last five games to finish the season at 6-8. Running back Wilbur Jackson was named SPORTING NEWS "Rookie of the Year" and was named to the NFL All-Rookie team along with quarterback Tom Owen and defensive back Mike Holmes. Center Forrest Blue and punter Tom Wittum were All-NFC and selected for the Pro Bowl along with Jimmy Johnson. A knee injury forced perennial All-Pro linebacker Dave Wilcox to retire after a brilliant 11-year career with the 49ers.

1975—A strong defensive performance throughout the season couldn't offset an erratic offense troubled by an unsettled quarterback situation and a rebuilding offensive line. High point of the 5-9 season was a 24-23 win over Los Angeles in Los Angeles to end a 10-game losing streak to the Rams. At season's end, defensive end Cedrick Hardman was the club's only All-Pro selection and only player chosen for the Pro Bowl. Jimmy Johnson became the

club's first-ever two-time Eshmont Award winner.

NINER NOTES

Morabito Fund

The San Francisco 49ers are one of the few organizations in professional sport to fund annual scholarship grants for high school and junior college students. The Morabito Fund, named in memory of the club's founder, provides \$25,000 annually to San Francisco Bay Area students hopeful of attending Bay Area colleges and universities. They are not athletic grants, but are awarded to a student upon recommendation and application based upon the applicant's academic promise. Since its inception in 1968, the fund has averaged 90 grants a year.

Mayor's Youth Bowl

The San Francisco 49ers and The City of San Francisco annually work together in funding many of The City's youth-oriented programs. Each year one of the 49ers' home pre-season games is designated "The Mayor's Youth Bowl," and one-third of the net proceeds from that game are directed toward operating young people's programs in The City. In the two years of its existence, "The Mayor's Youth Bowl" has contributed more than \$200,000 to the youth programs.

"Name" Backfields

The San Francisco 49ers have been known for their "name" backfields. From 1954 through 1956 it was "The Million Dollar Backfield" of Y. A. Tittle, Joe Perry, Hugh McElhenny and John Henry Johnson. Then, in 1960, came "The Alphabet Backfield" of Y. A. Tittle, J. D. Smith, R. C. Owens and C. R. Roberts.

Hall of Fame

Three members of San Francisco's "Million Dollar Backfield" of the mid-1950's are enshrined in Pro Football's Hall of Fame. They are Y. A. Tittle, Joe Perry and Hugh McElhenny. Another member of that same team, tackle Leo Nomellini, is also a member of the Hall of Fame.

Nomellini

Former San Francisco 49er tackle Leo "The Lion" Nomellini is a member of Pro Football's Hall of Fame, but he also has another distinction. He is the only player ever to make All-Pro both on offense and defense since two-platoon all-stars have been selected. Nomellini was an All-Pro choice on offense in 1951 and 1952, then switched to defense and was an All-Pro selection in 1953, 1954, 1957 and 1959 as a defender. Leo also played in 10 Pro Bowl games, two on offense, eight on defense.

Retired Jerseys

The San Francisco 49ers have officially retired five jerseys in their 30-year history. Those retired are, in order of their retirement, No. 34, Joe "The Jet" Perry; No. 39, Hugh McElhenny; No. 73, Leo Nomellini; No. 12, John Brodie; No. 70 Charlie Krueger.


49ERS ON TELEVISION

The 49ers will appear on national television three times in 1976, once in the pre-season and twice in the regular season. Their pre-season games at Seattle, Honolulu, and Los Angeles will be carried live by KBHK-TV, Channel 44, in San Francisco.

The pre-season meeting with the cross-bay rival Oakland Raiders, Aug. 29, at Candlestick Park, will be telecast nationally by the CBS Television Network. CBS will assign the broadcast team.

In addition to the Raider pre-season game, the 49ers will be featured in two Monday night games, one at home and one on the road. The away game will be at Los Angeles on Oct. 11, the home encounter will be Nov. 29 when the 49ers host the Minnesota Vikings. Both Monday night games will start at 6:00 p.m., West Coast time. ABC Television Network will telecast the Monday night games, with Howard Cosell, Frank Gifford, and Alex Karras as the broadcast team. The 49ers last appeared on the Monday night game in 1974, when they hosted Los Angeles at Candlestick.

MEDIA INFORMATION

The football press box at Candlestick Park will open three hours prior to game time, as will the Curley Grieve Room (press room) on the promenade level. Lunch and other refreshments will be available in the press room, and there will be a snack bar in operation in the press box.

Western Union and Sportscom services will both be available in the press box and each will provide runners for copy.

All credential requests should be made to George McFadden in the 49er office no later than Wednesday prior to the game to be covered, if possible. No individual game credentials will be mailed. There is a special press "will call" booth at Gate A at Candlestick Park.


There is a limited amount of photo deck space available, so all requests for camera positions should be made as early as possible. When the space is all allocated, additional requests must be refused. Photo positions are on the second level of the press box and on the balcony areas on either end of the first level outside.

The press box is accessible only from the elevator from ground level. The elevator makes only one stop—at the press box.

With two minutes remaining in each game a member of the 49er public relations staff will guide writers to the team dressing rooms. From the elevator the group will walk the main concourse to the dressing room elevator. There will be no need to go onto the field.

Photographers working on the field are asked to check in at the dugout at the south end (first base line) of the stadium. They will be issued arm bands upon presentation of their credential. Food and drink will be available in the dugout at halftime.

STADIUM INFORMATION



The San Francisco 49ers begin their sixth year in Candlestick Park, now recognized as one of the better combination stadiums in the United States.

The "new" Candlestick was completed in 1972 (the 49ers played in the park while it was still under construction in 1971), and, completely encircled, carpeted with Astroturf, furnished throughout with comfortable chairs (no bleachers), surrounded by adequate parking space, it was an immediate hit as a football facility.

The stadium seats 61.246 for football. There are three major ticket plazas and entry areas, each served by escalators which move spectators to and from the various seating levels. Every seat in the stadium is a chairtype plastic unit for comfort and durability.

Completely double-decked, the park features a 6,000-seat movable section. Astroturf facilitates rapid conversion from baseball to football configuration.

Original ground-breaking for Candlestick Park was in 1958. The expansion program began November 19, 1969.

The stadium covers 141/2-acres on an 82-acre site.

Stadium diameter is 680 feet at its shortest, 840 feet at its longest.

The highest point from field to roof is 120 feet.

There are 29 concession stands, 54 rest rooms.

There are parking spaces for 14,400 automobiles in the stadium and auxiliary lots, as well as space for 175 buses.

Stadium construction required 1,034 tons of structural steel, 8,000 tons of reinforcing steel and 50,000 cubic yards of concrete.

First Aid is located on the main level concourse opposite Section 7.

Police Station is located on main level concourse opposite Section 5.

Lost and Found is in the Burns Security Office on the mezzanine level opposite Section 7

Telephones are located throughout the stadium. Specifically, at each ticket plaza, along the main concourse and along the upper mezzanine level.

"WILL CALL" window is at Gate A, south end of the stadium.

Gates, A. E and F provide escalator service to the upper seating levels and are reversible for exiting after the game.
