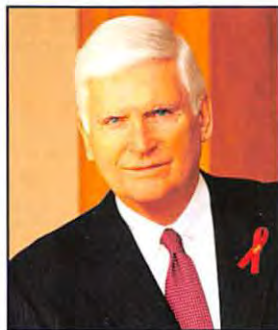

TED PHILLIPS

President & CEO

Phillips was named President and Chief Executive Officer on February 10, 1999. He is the fourth person to serve as president in the organization's storied 88-year history following Michael McCaskey, George "Mugs" Halas, Jr., and George S. Halas. Upon taking the reins of one of the most historic teams in professional sports, Phillips set a course for the Bears to rejoin the NFL's elite. His plan revolves around creating the best fan experience possible and bringing a 10th championship to the league's premier franchise. In nine years, Phillips has reorganized the team's football and business operations along with bringing one of the nation's top football stadiums to Chicago. With the foundation in place, Bears fans have reasons to be excited.

An NFL veteran with 25 years of experience with the Chicago Bears, he is involved in all critical decisions of the Bears, overseeing all aspects of the organization. He has revived the team's proud tradition and orchestrated a team structure to deliver success on and off the field. Phillips has espoused a philosophy of surrounding himself with high character, intelligent and driven individuals who share common goals, striving to make all aspects of the Bears organization the best in the NFL. Emphasizing a team work ethic, Phillips believes that no one area is more important than the overall organization. That philosophy of success at every level of the organization was crucial in the Bears returning to the Super Bowl for the first time in 21 years following the 2006 campaign. Phillips' other highlights include hiring the team's first general manager in over 14 years, reorganizing the club's business operations, returning the Bears training camp to Illinois and presiding over three division championships (2001, 2005 and 2006) after the club went over a decade without winning one.

Soldier Field's atmosphere provides a distinct home field advantage for the team, while allowing patrons to enjoy a first-class experience in the stands, with close to the field seating, outstanding sightlines and high level NFL amenities that are well deserved by the NFL's most enthusiastic and passionate fans. Among the many local and national awards, the Soldier Field project was selected by the *NY Times* as one of the nation's best architectural buildings in 2003, and Midwest Construction selected Soldier Field as "Overall Project of the Year".

During the 2001 off-season, Phillips hired Jerry Angelo, giving new direction to the Bears football operations. He went on to extend Angelo's contract following the 2003 and 2006 seasons, creating continuity and stability across the front office.

Fans have responded favorably since the Bears training camp returned to the State of Illinois in 2002, turning out in record numbers over the three-week training period with some practice crowds exceeding 10,000 in attendance on the campus of Olivet Nazarene University in Bourbonnais, IL.

Phillips served as the Bears' Vice President of Operations for six seasons starting in 1993. Recognized for his many years of handling the Bears' contract negotiations and team finances, Phillips is currently one of only two individuals in the NFL to serve on both the NFL Working Club Executive committee and the NFL Senior Club Executive committee, whose mission is to analyze both the financial and football operations aspects of the Collective Bargaining Agreement. The NFL salary cap system is widely regarded as the best overall financial system in professional sports. Before becoming Vice President of Operations, Phillips served as the Director of Finance from 1987 to 1993, handling all player contract negotiations and overseeing the club's business operations. Phillips joined the Bears staff on September 28, 1983, as the team's Controller, a position he held for four years.

Prior to joining the Bears, Phillips was employed as an auditor and tax accountant with the international accounting firm Ernst & Whinney (now Ernst & Young), from 1979-83. He graduated from the University of Notre Dame in 1979 with a degree in business and accounting. Phillips earned a master of marketing and management degree from the Kellogg Graduate School at Northwestern University in 1989.

Phillips was born in Oneida, N.Y., and grew up in Nashua, N.H. He and his wife, Katie, have three sons: Matthew, Max, and Frank.



JERRY ANGELO

Jerry Angelo

Jerry Angelo has brought a clear vision to Bears football after guiding Chicago to three division championships since joining the team as general manager prior to the 2001 campaign, culminating in the team's 2006 NFC Championship and the organization's first Super Bowl appearance in 21 years. Rewarding core players, building through the draft and managing the salary cap are the cornerstones of Angelo's direction. His plan has created stability in Chicago and generated hope as the Bears continue to build upon a strong nucleus of talent.

Chicago has three division titles over the last seven years, ending an 11-year drought in Angelo's first season in 2001. Angelo's tenure has yielded an overall regular season record of 60-52 (.536), plus a 2-3 postseason mark. Under Angelo's watch, Chicago has registered

the fourth-most regular season wins in the NFC and is tied for the ninth-most in the NFL over that same time. The Bears are one of just seven NFC teams to record three or more winning seasons over the last seven years.

Angelo's mantra during his tenure in Chicago has been "reward your own" and he has followed through by taking a proactive approach with the team's key players. Current players to receive contract extensions since Angelo's arrival include Pro Bowlers Brian Urlacher, Olin Kreutz, Mike Brown, Nathan Vasher and Robbie Gould. Also, nearly 80 percent of the Bears 2008 roster is signed through the next two seasons (not including the 12 2008 draft picks).

The draft, the primary means of bringing new talent to any NFL team, has been accentuated under Angelo. The efforts of his scouting staff have been highlighted after each of the last three seasons as four Bears players drafted by Angelo have received Pro Bowl selections: Lance Briggs (drafted in 2003), Tommie Harris (2004), Nathan Vasher (2004) and Devin Hester (2006). Briggs and Harris have been selected to three consecutive Pro Bowls, Hester has been named to two straight after becoming Chicago's first rookie Pro Bowl selection since 2000 (Brian Urlacher), while Vasher played in the Pro Bowl following the 2005 season.

In the 2008 NFL Draft the Bears had 12 selections, most in the NFC. Angelo and the Bears put an emphasis on offense on Day 1 of the draft by selecting Chris Williams (T) in the first round (14th overall) and Matt Forte (RB) in the second round (44th overall). Angelo's five drafts prior to 2008 produced an aggregate total of 21 rookie starters combining to make 130 starts: 38 in 2003, 30 in 2004, 33 in 2005, 15 in 2006 and 14 in 2007.

Managing the salary cap is a key element to maintaining a team's continuity and providing the ability to sign talent through free agency. Angelo and his staff have excelled in this area allowing the Bears to attract key contributors through the free agent market each off-season of his tenure.

The Bears current roster bolsters such free agent acquisitions as Anthony Adams (UFA - 2007), Desmond Clark (UFA - 2003), Roberto Garza (UFA - 2005), Ricky Manning, Jr. (RFA - 2006), and John Tait (RFA - 2004). Adams, a former second-round pick of San Francisco in 2003 started eight of 11 contests played at DT during the 2007 season for Chicago before missing the final four games due to injury. Clark has started 76 of 78 games played at TE as a Bear and leads the team since that time with 181 receptions. Garza has appeared in all 48 contests with 39 starts over the last three seasons, including 32 straight at RG. Manning, Jr. has appeared in 31 games over the last two seasons as Chicago's third cornerback in nickel packages with 11 starts, ranking third on the team during that time with five interceptions. Tait has started all 57 contests he has appeared in as a Bear at both offensive tackle positions.

Players such as Ruben Brown (LG), Thomas Jones (RB), Fred Miller (RT) and Muhsin Muhammad (WR) were also free agent pick-ups that started for the NFC Champion Bears in 2006.

Free agency has not been the only means used to add talent under Angelo. Adewale Ogunleye (DE) was acquired via trade in 2004 and his 30.5 sacks since that time leads the team. Chicago acquired Brendon Ayanbadejo, who was a Pro Bowl special teams player in 2006 and 2007, in a trade as well. Angelo's personnel department has also found key contributors that were waived by other teams such as Marty Booker (WR, 2008), Pro Bowler Robbie Gould (K, 2005), Hunter Hillenmeyer (LB, 2003), Jason McKie (FB, 2003) and John St. Clair (OL, 2005). Angelo has also guided the Bears to success in acquiring

talent outside of the NFL, signing Rashied Davis (WR) out of the Arena Football League in 2005.

Continuity in the Bears football operations was solidified in the 2004 off-season when Angelo hired Lovie Smith to be the 13th head coach in Chicago Bears history. Angelo and Smith spent five years (1996-2000) together in Tampa Bay, helping build a team that went on to capture a Super Bowl championship in 2002. Angelo created long-term stability for the Bears during the 2007 off-season when he signed Smith to a contract extension through 2011.

In his first season leading the Bears football staff, Angelo helped guide the team to its first division title in 11 years. He was handed the reins of the Chicago Bears football operations on June 12, 2001 as the team's first general manager since 1986 (Jerry Vainisi). Angelo has 39 years of football experience, including 20 as a NFL scout and 21 in the NFC North Division (includes 15 years in former NFC Central Division). He oversees the Bears entire football staff including football operations, personnel and coaching along with all decisions regarding the draft, free agency, trades and the salary cap.

Angelo accepted his current post after spending 14 years overseeing Tampa Bay's scouting department as the Buccaneers' Director of Player Personnel. In Tampa, Angelo helped turn a team that averaged under five wins a season in its first 21 years of existence into a perennial playoff contender, as the Buccaneers averaged almost 10 wins over his last four years with three playoff berths and one NFC Championship appearance (1999). The Youngstown, Ohio, native was a key member in carrying out the philosophy of Tampa's rebuilding process. He contributed to drafting nine Pro Bowlers with the Bucs and was pivotal in recruiting free agents Hardy Nickerson, Jeff Christy and Randall McDaniel, all of whom made trips to Hawaii donning a Bucs uniform. Angelo had a hand in Tampa's 32 Pro Bowl appearances by 14 different players from 1989 to 2000.

Prior to joining Tampa Bay in 1987, Angelo spent five seasons (1982-86) as a regional scout for the New York Giants, including their Super Bowl XXI campaign. He spent 1981 in the Canadian Football League as the Calgary Stampeders linebackers coach. Angelo broke into the NFL as a scout for the Dallas Cowboys in 1980. After playing defensive tackle for three years (1968-70) at Miami of Ohio for coaches Bo Schembechler and Bill Mallory, Angelo graduated with a bachelor's degree in social sciences and a master's in secondary administration while working as a graduate assistant at the university in 1971. He went on to coach eight more years in the collegiate ranks beginning at Colorado State as a part-time defensive line coach (1972) and ending with a five-year stint as the D-line coach at Syracuse (1975-79). In 1973 and 1974, he served as the defensive line coach and recruiting coordinator for the University of Tampa before the Spartans cut the football program.

Jerry and his wife, Bernie, have two daughters, Leisa, who is married to Brad Rice, and Sutton.

Lovie Smith

Lovie Smith enters his fifth season as the head coach of the Chicago Bears with a regular season coaching record of 36-28 (.563). Those 36 wins are tied with Hall of Famer Mike Ditka for second-most wins in a coach's first four seasons with the franchise, one behind Hall of Famer George Halas. Smith also has a 2-2 postseason record, including an NFC Championship and the Bears first Super Bowl appearance in 21 years (2006), to give him the third-most playoff victories in team history behind the six of Halas and Ditka.

Smith set forth with three stated goals when he was hired as the 13th head coach in Chicago Bears history on January 15, 2004: end the decade of dominance by the Green Bay Packers over the Bears, capture the NFC North Division for Chicago and win the Super Bowl. The Bears have won six of eight contests against Green Bay during

Smith's tenure, contributing to Chicago winning the division in 2005 and 2006. Accomplishing his first two directives prior to leading the Bears to within one win of their second Super Bowl title and tenth overall league championship in just his third season at the helm, Smith agreed to a contract extension on February 28, 2007 that maintains his position with the team through 2011.

Smith's 38 overall wins are fourth-most in team history, trailing Dave Wannstedt by just three victories for third all-time in franchise annals. Leading Chicago to division titles in 2005 and 2006, Smith joined Ditka as the only coaches in team history to lead the team to consecutive division titles. He is the first coach in team history to lead the Bears to the playoffs in two of his first three seasons.

Smith, the 2005 NFL Coach of the Year, has successfully laid Chicago's foundation for success in just four seasons on the job by establishing his cornerstone of aggressive defensive play. During Smith's first four seasons at the helm, Chicago ranks fourth in the NFL having allowed 17.8 points per game and third with 124 total touchdowns allowed. Chicago allowed the fewest points in the NFC during the 2005 and 2006 seasons, pacing the entire NFL in Smith's second year with the organization. Under Smith's tutelage the Bears lead the League by allowing the lowest opponent passer rating (72.4), lowest opponent third-down conversion percentage (31.5%) and forcing the most opponent three-and-out drives (234). The Bears also have the second-lowest opponent red zone touchdown percentage in the league (41.0%) and 19 red-zone takeaways during Smith's tenure. Over the last four seasons, the Bears have scored 30.8 percent of their points off opponent turnovers, second-highest in the NFL. After ranking eighth in the NFL with 33 takeaways in 2007, the Bears rank second in the League from 2004-07 with 140 takeaways and 14 touchdowns scored via defensive return, including 11 interception return touchdowns (a franchise-record six coming in 2004).

Chicago has found consistency under the even-keeled hand of Smith's direction, fashioning a regular season home record of 19-13 (.594) from 2004-07 while going 17-15 (.531) on the road during that time. The Bears went 4-4 at Soldier Field in 2007 and 3-5 on the road. Chicago was 6-2 at home in 2006 after going 7-1 in the Windy City during 2005. Chicago was 7-1 on the road in 2006, tied with 1985 and 1986 for the team's best single-season road record since the inception of the 16-game schedule. The Bears were 8-16 (.333) on the road in the three years prior to Smith's arrival. By leading Chicago to records of 11-5 in 2005 and 13-3 in 2006, Smith has guided the Bears to two of their top seven seasons in terms of regular season victories during the era of the 16-game schedule.

Resiliency has also been a hallmark of the Bears throughout Smith's tenure as the team has rallied from a deficit in 21 of their 38 total victories under his direction. During the 2007 season, Chicago won three consecutive road games after trailing in the fourth quarter for the first time in team history.

Smith has returned Chicago to its preferred place as a power in the NFC North, fashioning a divisional record of 14-10 (.583) during his time with the Bears. Smith led Chicago to 5-1 intra-divisional records in each of the 2005 and 2006 campaigns, defeating all three opponents at least once in both seasons, a feat last accomplished by the Bears in 1991. Chicago began the 2006 season with three consecutive wins over divisional opponents for the first time in team history. The Bears also won their first 11 games against NFC opponents in 2006 en route to the second-best intra-conference mark in franchise history.

Registering a career-high 13 wins in 2006 to tie predecessor Dick Jauron for the most victories by a Bears head coach in his third season, Smith led Chicago to home-field advantage in the NFC Playoffs and the team's first NFC Championship since its Super Bowl season of 1985. That gave Chicago 24 regular season wins from 2005-06, the fourth-highest two-season win total in the 87-season history of the franchise. Within those seasons is a stretch of 28 games, from the last 12 games of the 2005 regular season through the 2006 season, in which the Bears compiled a record of 23-5 (.821), the best record in the NFL by one game over Indianapolis during that span. Smith guided the team to wins in its first seven contests in 2006 to register the fourth-best start to a season in team history while allowing the Bears to join Green Bay and Minnesota as the only teams in NFL history to begin four different seasons with 7-0 records. Chicago's seven consecutive wins to start the season allowed Smith to record the League's third-longest win streak for the second consecutive season.



Smith was named the *Associated Press* NFL Coach of the Year for 2005 after becoming the fastest head coach in Bears history to lead the team to a division title, doing so in his second campaign while setting a franchise record for victories by a sophomore head coach with an 11-5 record. The Coach of the Year Award was the sixth all-time for a Bears head coach, more than any other team in the NFL. Smith - who won with 24.5 of 50 possible votes - was the fourth head coach in team history to win the award after team founder George S. Halas in 1963 and 1965, Mike Ditka in 1985 and 1988 and Dick Jauron in 2001. Just the third coach in team history to lead the organization to the playoffs in his second season, Smith guided the Bears to their first-ever NFC North Division title in 2005. En route to the team's second division championship in five seasons, the Bears completed their first season sweep of Green Bay since 1991, a feat they repeated in 2007.

Winning just one of their first four games to start the 2005 campaign, Smith rallied the Bears to become just the 20th NFL team to qualify for the postseason after beginning the season 1-3 since the current 12-team playoff system was instituted in 1990. The Bears turned their season around as Smith guided the team to eight consecutive mid-season wins, the third-longest win streak in the NFL in 2005 and the longest by Chicago since the 1985 Super Bowl team won 12 straight to begin the season. In guiding the team to the No. 2 seed in the NFC Playoffs, Smith led a worst-to-first revival in the NFC North division as the Bears six-win improvement from the previous season was tied for the biggest in the NFL in 2005. The dramatic turnaround made Smith one of just three active NFL coaches to have produced a six-game improvement in the second season of his initial stint as a head coach (Jeff Fisher with the Houston Oilers in 1995 and Andy Reid with the Philadelphia Eagles in 2000).

The Bears posted a 5-11 record in 2004 in Smith's first season as head coach as he presided over the youngest team in the NFL while battling through a spate of injuries that robbed the team of the services of several of its most productive players.

Smith came to Chicago with the reputation for being proficient at instituting positive change after he engineered a dramatic turnaround as the defensive coordinator of the Rams from 2001 through 2003. Known for his acumen in teaching and motivating young talent, Smith took on the added responsibility of assistant head coach with the Rams prior to the 2003 season. In Smith's first season as an NFL defensive coordinator with St. Louis in 2001, Smith helped the Rams return to the Super Bowl after missing the playoffs the previous season as his defense allowed fewer points and total yards per game than the previous year. Smith coached on playoff teams in four of his last five campaigns as an assistant and has done so in seven of his 12 NFL seasons overall.

From 2001-03, the Rams ranked third in the NFL in takeaways and fumble recoveries, tied for sixth in sacks, and tied for eighth in interceptions. Smith helped steward St. Louis to shutouts in both 2001 and 2003, the first white-washings by the Rams organization since 1994. St. Louis won 33 games during Smith's tenure with the team, the third-most in the NFL during that time behind Green Bay and Philadelphia. He capped his stint in St. Louis by orchestrating a unit that ranked among the League leaders in takeaways, defensive touchdowns, and sacks in 2003. In that year, St. Louis led the NFL with 46 takeaways while tying for fourth with 24 interceptions and leading the NFL with 22 fumble recoveries. That season's takeaway total is tied with the 1999 Eagles for the third-highest single-season total in the NFL since 1993. St. Louis ranked fourth in the NFL by scoring five defensive touchdowns in 2003 and also posted the fourth-most sacks in the NFL. In 2002, the Rams defense finished tied for fourth in the NFC and tied for fifth in the NFL in fewest touchdowns allowed while ranking sixth in the NFC and eighth in the NFL in third-down efficiency.

Smith guided St. Louis to a defensive resurgence upon taking over in 2001. Inheriting a defense coming off a season in which it ranked 23rd in the NFL in total defense while allowing over 29 points per game, Smith improved the unit to third in the NFL in total defense while permitting only 17.0 points per game. The St. Louis defense made one-year leaps to third from 13th in the NFL in run defense and to 10th from 27th in pass defense while improving to a conference-high 14 wins from 10 in 2000. The Rams also scored five defensive touchdowns in 2001 while starting seven new players on defense, including two rookies.

Preceding his success in St. Louis, Smith contributed to the revival of Tampa Bay's defense as the Buccaneers linebacker coach from 1996-2000. Tampa's defense hadn't ranked above 20th in the NFL in the four seasons prior to Smith's arrival under head coach Tony Dungy and defensive coordinator Monte Kiffin, but had ranks of 11th in 1996, third in 1997, second in 1998, third in 1999, and ninth in 2000. During the five seasons with Smith on the Bucs staff, the team allowed less than 300 points each year while permitting an average of 16.9 points and 258.8 yards per game. Tampa Bay posted only two defen-

sive touchdowns in Smith's first three years, but improved with two in '99 and a franchise-record six in 2000.

Smith's tutelage has brought out the best in his players throughout his career. As linebackers coach at Tampa Bay, Smith helped Derrick Brooks develop into a perennial Pro Bowl selection and one of the NFL's best linebackers. Brooks made the first career Pro Bowl of his team-record 10 career Pro Bowl appearances in his second season - Smith's first season as his position coach. Also in 1996, Smith helped Hardy Nickerson earn his second career Pro Bowl nod. Brooks and Nickerson made a combined eight all-star appearances under Smith. As St. Louis' defensive coordinator, Smith coached DE Leonard Little and safety Aeneas Williams to a pair of Pro Bowls while DE Grant Wistrom became an All-Pro performer. In Smith's first year with the Rams, Little led the team with a career-high 14.5 sacks en route to registering at least 12 sacks in each of Smith's three seasons with the team. Wistrom recorded 21 of his 53 career sacks during Smith's tenure in St. Louis, ranking second on the team in each of those seasons. Safety Adam Archuleta set the St. Louis Rams sack record for defensive backs under Smith's guidance in 2003 after he and LB Tommy Polley each earned all-Rookie honors in 2001.

Overall, Smith has spent 26 years in coaching at the collegiate and professional levels. He began his coaching career at his hometown high school, Big Sandy High School, in 1980 before moving to Cascia Hall Prep in Tulsa the following year. Two years later, Smith made the jump to the college ranks at his alma mater of Tulsa as linebackers coach, where he stayed through 1986. Smith moved on to coach linebackers at Wisconsin (1987), Arizona State (1988-91), and Kentucky (1992). Smith was the defensive backs coach at Tennessee (1993-94) and Ohio State (1995).

A native of Big Sandy, Texas, Smith led the Big Sandy Wildcats to three consecutive state championships in high school and was all-state three years as an end and linebacker. Smith was a two-time all-America and three-time all-Missouri Conference defensive back at Tulsa.

Lovie and his wife, MaryAnne, have three sons, Mikal, Matthew, and Miles. Lovie is very active in the community and he and his wife have started the Lovie Smith and MaryAnne Smith Foundation which is a scholarship program designed to aid qualified high school students who hail from low socioeconomic backgrounds and give them the ability to afford and attend college. Smith gives much of his time to helping the American Diabetes Association - a foundation near to his heart since his mother suffers from Type-2 diabetes. He participates in ADA sponsored events such as the Tour de Cure Bike Ride, the ADA Care to Cure Gala and their Father's Day Dinner. In addition to the ADA, Smith has actively been involved with Gilda's House, Catholic Charities and the UNICEF/TAP Fund. He also purchases 10 tickets for every home game as part of the Bears ticket exchange program and donates them to Misericordia.

**BOB BABICH**

Defensive Coordinator

Bob Babich

Bob Babich enters his second season as Chicago's defensive coordinator and his fifth year as an assistant coach with the team. Babich assumed responsibility of the Bears defense on February 20, 2007 after three seasons as the team's linebackers coach. The first assistant to join Lovie Smith's inaugural coaching staff, Babich was initially hired by the Bears on January 17, 2004, as the team's linebackers coach. He added the title of assistant head coach for the 2006 season in which Chicago advanced to the Super Bowl for the first time in 21 years.

Under Babich's guidance, the Bears defense finished strong in the second half of the 2007 season. Over the final eight contests, Chicago finished tied for third in the NFL with 20 takeaways. The Bears converted those 20 takeaways into 51 points. With 33 takeaways on the season overall (eighth most in the League), the Bears have now forced 140 takeaways since Babich joined Chicago's coaching staff in 2004, second most in the NFL during that span.

The Bears defense also forced 65 three-and-out drives in Babich's first season as defensive coordinator (most in the NFL) on 214 defensive series. The Bears were the only team in the League to force the opposition into three-and-out drives over 30 percent of the time last season (30.4). Chicago's defense forced the most single-season three-and-out drives in the NFL since 1999 and one of the reasons was their strong play on third down under Babich. In 2007, the Bears defense ranked second in the League, allowing opponents to convert on third down just 32.7 percent of the time (73 of 223). Chicago's defense ranks first in both categories since 2004, forcing 234 three-and-out drives on 842 series and allowing opponents to convert just 31.5 percent of the time on third down (290 of 920).

Chicago also ranked sixth in the NFL in Babich's first season as defensive coordinator with 41 sacks. LDE Adewale Ogunleye led the Bears with nine. Tommie Harris was selected to his third consecutive Pro Bowl after finishing with a career-high eight sacks, second most in the NFL among defensive tackles in 2007.

During Babich's four years with the team, the Bears linebacker corps has been arguably the most productive in the NFL. WLB Lance Briggs was selected to the Pro Bowl for the third consecutive season following 2007. MLB Brian Urlacher, the 2005 NFL Defensive Player of the Year, became just the third player in franchise history to record five sacks and five interceptions in a single season in 2007. Urlacher also led the team in tackles for the seventh time in his eight-year career with 158 and Briggs followed close behind with 140. Either Urlacher or Briggs has led the Bears in tackles in each of Babich's first four seasons with the team, Briggs in 2004 (168) and Urlacher in 2005 (171), 2006 (185) and in 2007 (158). Briggs was the team runner-up in tackles each of the last three years. SLB Hunter Hillenmeyer also developed into a steady performer under Babich's direction, finishing third on the team with a career-high 101 tackles in 2007.

Babich began his NFL coaching career in 2003 with St. Louis where he was hired as the team's linebackers coach to serve under Smith, the Rams defensive coordinator at the time. Babich contributed to that defense improving six ranking positions in points allowed from 2002 while jumping from 22nd in the NFL to first with 46 takeaways, including a League-leading 22 fumble recoveries. St. Louis defenders also ranked fourth in the NFL in sacks in 2003, up from seventh in 2002.

CHICAGO BEARS FIGHT SONG

The Chicago Bears fight song, *Bear Down, Chicago Bears*, was introduced in 1941. Though Jerry Downs is listed as the composer, it actually is a pseudonym for Al Hoffman (who also wrote the words and music for the song *If I Knew You Were Coming, I'd Have Baked a Cake*).

Hoffman's words for the Bears' fight song:

*Bear down, Chicago Bears, make every play clear the way to victory;
Bear down, Chicago Bears, put up a fight with a might so fearlessly.
We'll never forget the way you thrilled the nation with your T-formation.
Bear down, Chicago Bears, and let them know why you're wearing the crown.
You're the pride and joy of Illinois, Chicago Bears, bear down.*

Prior to joining the Rams, Babich spent 19 years as a college coach, of which the final six he served as the head coach at North Dakota State University (1997-2002). In his first head coaching job, Babich amassed a 46-22 career mark by posting five winning seasons with two NCAA Division II playoff appearances. The Bison were 9-2 in the regular season in his first year in 1997 and 12-1 in 2000, reaching the national semifinals before losing to eventual national champion Delta State. Babich's son, Bobby, played for his dad as a freshman at NDSU.

A native of Aliquippa, Pa., Babich served 12 seasons as an assistant coach at the NCAA Division I level at five different schools, most recently instructing linebackers at Pittsburgh (1994-96). Babich began his career as a graduate assistant coach at his alma mater, Tulsa (1984), before being promoted to tight ends coach (1985), assistant offensive line (1986) and strong safeties (1987). It was with the Golden Hurricane that Babich first worked alongside Smith, the school's linebackers coach from 1983-86. From Tulsa, Babich moved on to become an assistant at Wisconsin for two seasons, one as an assistant offensive line coach (1988) and one as tight ends coach (1989). Babich coached linebackers at Bowling Green (1991) and East Carolina (1992-93) before joining the Panthers in 1994.

Babich and his wife, Nancy, have one son, Bobby, daughter-in-law Lacey, granddaughter Lainey Marie, and a daughter, Janie.

Ron Turner

Ron Turner is in his eighth year and fourth consecutive as Chicago's offensive coordinator after improving a Bears passing attack in each of his first three seasons back as the team's play-caller. Previously the Bears offensive coordinator from 1993-96, Turner has directed five of the top 23 offenses in the Bears 88-year history.

Turner was hired for his second stint with Chicago on January 9, 2005, after eight seasons as the head coach at the University of Illinois. Turner contributed to Chicago's appearance in Super Bowl XLI by coordinating an offense that ranked 15th in the NFL in total yards in 2006. During his earlier four years with the Bears as offensive coordinator/quarterbacks coach under head coach Dave

Wannstedt, Turner guided some of the most prolific offenses in club history.

He has continued that success in his second tour with the club as his offenses have contributed to two of Chicago's top four passing attacks of all time in each of the last two seasons. In 2007, the Bears finished with 3,362 net passing yards, third most in team history. A year earlier Chicago led the NFC while tying for second in the NFL with 427 points, the second-highest single-season scoring total in franchise history. The Bears also totaled the fourth-most net passing yards (3,281) and sixth-most touchdown passes (24) in a season in team history in 2006. Chicago reached the 2,000-yard rushing mark (2,099) in 2005 for the first time since 1990 and just the 17th time since 1965.

The Bears have qualified for the postseason in three of Turner's seven seasons with the team. He has coordinated the team's offense in each of its last six playoff contests with Chicago owning a 3-3 record in those contests while averaging 25.7 points per game. Turner also holds the distinction of being the offensive coordinator for each of the top two quarterbacks in Bears history in single-season gross passing yardage. Erik Kramer set the franchise record with 3,838 passing yards under Turner in 1995 while Rex Grossman finished 2006 as the runner-up in that category with 3,193 yards.

In 2007, the Bears passing offense continued to develop under Turner. Chicago quarterbacks threw for over 3,000 net passing yards for the second straight season, a first for the franchise since the 1998-99 campaigns. Chicago has passed for over 3,000 net yards in five of the previous seven seasons under Turner's direction. Last season the Bears passing offense was instrumental in four victories in which Chicago trailed in the fourth quarter as Turner helped direct five fourth quarter game-winning or -tying touchdown drives. The Bears also scored a NFL-high 31 points in the two-minute offense in 2007.

In 2007, the Bears topped over 4,600 yards for the second consecutive season after reaching that mark in each year of Turner's first stint with the team.

The Bears passing offense ranked in the top half of the NFL for a second consecutive year in 2007 after placing next-to-last in 2005. This past season, Chicago averaged over 200 passing yards per game for just the third time in the last 10 seasons. A year earlier in 2006, the Bears passing attack tallied 24 touchdowns, the most in a season since 1999.

Turner's continued revival of Chicago's passing game was led by three quarterbacks in 2006 and 2007: Brian Griese, Rex Grossman and Kyle Orton. In 2007, all three quarterbacks started in victories for Chicago. Griese led the way with 1,803 passing yards in seven contests including 13 pass plays of 25-plus yards. Grossman had 1,411 yards passing in eight games while Orton compiled 478 yards through the air in three starts. The trio compiled 25 pass plays of 25-plus yards over the final 12 contests of the season, tied for third-most in the NFL. Chicago also had 44 pass plays of 20-plus yards after finishing tied for ninth in the NFL with 50 passes of 20 yards or more and tied for third with 12 scoring passes of at least 20 yards a year earlier.

Chicago's rushing attack ranks 14th in the NFL during the last three years under Turner with 5,347 yards on the ground. That includes two of the Bears three highest single-season rushing totals in the last 16 years with 2,099 yards in 2005 and 1,918 in 2006. The 2005 season marked the first time since 1990 that Chicago's offense had over 2,000 yards on the ground.

Chicago topped the 30-point plateau four times in 2007 and accomplished the feat seven times during the 2006 season, the team's most 30-point games in one campaign since registering eight in 1956. The offense has compiled more than 300 total net yards in 18 of their last 32 games after doing so just three times in 2005. Chicago's 38 offensive touchdowns (24 passing, 14 rushing) in 2006 were the unit's highest single-season total since scoring 44 in 1995 -- the third season of Turner's first stint with the team. The

Bears were the only NFL team with six players to record five or more touchdowns in 2006. The last time Chicago had six players combine for at least five touchdowns was 1948.

Imperative to the Bears success in 2005 was Turner's role in grooming fourth-round draft pick Kyle Orton to compile a 10-5 record as the team's rookie starting quarterback. Chicago featured the eighth-ranked running game in the NFL in 2005. The 2,099 rushing yards totaled by the Bears were the franchise's most in a season since 1990 when the team rushed for 2,436 yards. Chicago also tied for the NFL lead with 19 runs of 20 or more yards in 2005 after recording just seven such rushing gains in 2004. On the season, the Bears rushed for over 100 yards in 13-of-16 regular season games, featuring six individual 100-yard rushing performances.

Turner helped Chicago to a 33-33 overall record while directing the offense in his first stint with the team despite working with a different starting quarterback each season. The Bears team completion percentages in 1994 (61.4%) and 1995 (60.2%) rank as the highest in team history. Chicago's net passing yard total of 3,743 in 1995 ranks second in team annals while the total of 3,185 in 1996 was pushed to sixth in team history by the team's totals from 2006 and 2007. With Erik Kramer at quarterback in 1995, the Bears set a team record for passing yards per game with 233.9 while compiling the fifth-most points in team history with 392. Kramer set club records with 29 touchdown passes and 10 interceptions (least among 16-game starters). The 1995 squad produced the third-most total net yards (5,673) and the second-most first downs (340) in team history. The offense also featured a 1,000-yard rusher and two 1,000-yard receivers in 1995, the only such season in team history.

The 31-season coaching veteran concluded his career as the head coach at Illinois as the school's fourth-winningest coach, going 35-57 while guiding the Illini to a pair of bowl bids highlighted by a Big Ten championship in 2001 and a BCS Bowl bid to the 2002 Nokia Sugar Bowl. The unanimous 2001 Big Ten Coach of the Year presided over three of the top six offenses in Illini history in terms of total yards while four of his eight Illinois squads currently rank in the school's top 11 for scoring, including a school-record 390 points in 2001. Three of the top six all-time leading rushers at Illinois and three of the school's top 10 all-time leading receivers played during the Turner era. There were over 20 former Illini who played under Turner on NFL rosters at the end of the 2007 season.

A second-team junior college All-America wide receiver at Diablo Valley Community College, Turner earned a scholarship to the University of the Pacific where he led the Tigers in receiving in 1975 and 1976 and totaled 40 receptions for 666 yards with three touchdowns. He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Pacific before earning his first full-time college job coaching running backs and receivers at Arizona (1978-80). Turner moved on to be an assistant at Northwestern (1981-82), Pittsburgh (1983-84), Southern California (1985-87), Texas A&M (1988) and Stanford (1989-91) before earning his first head coaching job at San Jose State (1992).

Turner was born in 1953 in Martinez, CA. He and his wife, Wendy, have two sons, Morgan and Cameron, and two daughters, Callan and Madison.

DAVE TOUB

Special Teams Coordinator

Dave Toub

Dave Toub enters his fifth season as Chicago's special teams coordinator coming off the second consecutive year in which the Bears were the top-ranked unit in the League (according to the *Dallas Morning News* ranking system). It was the fourth time in the last seven years Toub was associated with a unit ranking No. 1. Toub was hired by the Bears on January 24, 2004, and was voted as the Special Teams Coach of the Year by his NFL coaching peers after the 2006 season. The assistant special teams and defensive line coach for Philadelphia from 2001-03, the Eagles won the special teams titles in Toub's first and last seasons there.

Chicago's special teams unit has ranked among the top third in the NFL throughout Toub's tenure with the team, culminating in becoming just the second team since the system was created in 1990 to finish with the No. 1 overall ranking in back-to-back seasons. Toub coordinated Chicago to special teams rankings of 11th in 2005 and 10th in his first season with the team.

The Bears ranked in the top 10 in the League in 13 of the 22 categories used in the ranking system in 2007 and in the top five in 11 areas. Chicago held the top ranking in kickoff coverage, starting field position after kickoffs, points and blocked kicks. A year after leading the NFL with 179 points scored on special teams, the Bears were once again on top of the League in that category in 2007 with 168 points (seven touchdowns, 31 field goals, 33 extra points). Chicago also blocked eight kicks (four field goals, three punts and one extra point) in 2007 and has 12 blocked kicks in Toub's tenure, second most in the NFL during that span.

In 2007, the Bears return units excelled for the second straight season despite opposing teams attempting unique ways to limit Chicago's returns. The Bears scored an NFL record six kick return touchdowns in 2007 (four punt and two kickoff) a year after tying the league mark at five. Reinforcing the team concept of taking advantage of every opportunity to score, the Bears have an NFL-high 14 kick return touchdowns, including the postseason in Toub's tenure. Chicago finished second in punt return average in each of the last two seasons and has finished in the top 10 in the category in all four years under Toub. Since Toub's arrival, the Bears lead the NFL in punt return yards (2,185), punt return average (11.7 ypr) and punt return touchdowns (nine). Despite teams using a variety of squib kicks on kickoffs in 2007, Chicago still led the NFL in average starting field position after kickoffs, as the Bears offense started on average at their own 33.7-yard line.

Chicago's special teams unit finished first and third, respectively, in kickoff and punt coverage in 2007. The Bears are fifth in punt return coverage (7.4 ypr) since Toub arrived in 2004 and second in kickoff return average (20.4 ypr).

In 2007, Toub became the first special teams coach in team history to send multiple players to the Pro Bowl in consecutive seasons, as specialist Brendon Ayanbadejo and kick returner Devin Hester each were selected for the second straight season. A year earlier marked the first time in team history a special teams coach tutored three Pro Bowl performers in one season when Ayanbadejo, Hester and kicker Robbie Gould all made their first career all-star appearances.

Ayanbadejo had 26 special teams tackles in 2007, after equaling the single-season franchise record with 28 special teams tackles in 2006. Hester broke his own NFL record with six kick return touchdowns in 2007, after setting the mark at five in his rookie season of 2006. In 2007, Gould was one field goal short of tying his own franchise mark of 32 fields goal made and became the first player in team history with back-to-back seasons with 30-plus field goals made. Gould is also the first player in franchise history to have back-to-back seasons with an 85 percent or higher field goal accuracy.

Under Toub the Bears rewrote the history books by establishing and tying the record for longest-play in NFL history all in a year's span, although the record fell in 2007. Nathan Vasher set the record in 2005 with a 108-yard missed field goal return, only to be matched by Hester on the same type of play just 365 days later in 2006. Only eight missed field goals have been returned for touchdowns since the NFL-AFL merger in 1970.

In 2005, Toub's unit ranked second in the NFL in kickoff coverage and 15th in punt coverage. Chicago's kickoff coverage unit ranked 28th in the NFL after three games, but the addition of Gould as a rookie led to improved execution of Toub's coverage plans. The Bears led the NFL by allowing just 18.2 yards per return with Gould kicking off over the final 13 games of the season. The undrafted Penn State

product also ranked second among NFL rookies with 82 points while tying for second all-time among Bears rookies with 21 field goals and a .778 conversion percentage.

The Bears special teams ranked 10th in the NFL in Toub's first season with the team highlighted by a League-low opponent net punt average. Toub molded one of the NFL's top kick coverage units despite losing four leading special teams tacklers from the previous season. He developed Adrian Peterson into the team's special teams tackle leader with a career-high 28.

During his stint with Philadelphia (2001-03), Toub helped Eagles special teams coordinator John Harbaugh earn 2001 NFL Special Teams Coach-of-the-Year honors. A ninth-round draft choice of the Eagles in 1985, Toub returned to Philadelphia 16 years later (2001) as the team's special teams/quality control coach.

Toub spent 15 seasons coaching at the college level before making the jump to the NFL, highlighted by 12 years at Missouri (1989-2000). He coached the defensive line for the final three years of his Mizzou stint (1998-2000), spending the previous nine years (1989-98) as the school's head strength coach. Toub helped produce three all-Big 12 linemen from 1998-2000, including Justin Smith, a first-round draft pick by Cincinnati in 2001. In that capacity he was responsible for the training efforts of 18 varsity sports and, in 1998, was named the Big 12 Conference's strength Coach of the Year. Toub began his coaching career in 1986 at his alma mater, Texas-El Paso, as a graduate assistant. One year later he began a two-year stint as the school's head strength and conditioning coach (1987-88).

A native of Mahopac, N.Y., Toub's NFL playing career included training camp stints with the Eagles in 1985 and the Los Angeles Rams in 1986. His career at UTEP included two all-WAC selections and two Academic all-WAC nominations (1983-84). The two-time team captain was also named the program's most outstanding offensive lineman during his junior and senior seasons. Toub earned his Bachelor of Science and Master's of Education degrees from UTEP.

Toub was born in 1962, in Ossining, NY. He and his wife, Cheryl, have one son, Shane, and one daughter, Nicolette.

**ROB BORAS****Tight Ends**

Rob Boras is in his fifth season as the Bears tight ends coach. Boras was hired on February 11, 2004, following five seasons at UNLV (1999-2003) where he was head coach John Robinson's offensive coordinator for three years.

Under Boras' tutelage, Bears tight ends have accounted for 205 receptions for 2,267 yards and 19 touchdowns. Those totals reflect approximately 19 percent of the receptions (205 of 1,077) and yardage (2,267 of 11,989) during the previous four seasons, while collecting over 30 percent of the team's touchdown receptions (19-of-62) during that time. Chicago's leading receiver among tight ends each of Boras' seasons has been Desmond Clark, who compiled 545 yards in 2007 while finishing second on the team with four touchdown catches. No other

tight end in the NFL has averaged more yards per reception in the last two seasons than Clark's 13.2-yard average. In 2007, under Boras' leadership, Clark teamed up with Greg Olsen and John Gilmore to haul in 86 receptions, the most catches in a single-season for a Bears tight end unit in franchise history and fifth most in the NFL this past season. This year, Boras also helped Clark (545) and Olsen (391) become just the second tight end duo in team history to each have over 300 receiving yards in a single season, joining Emery Moorehead and Tim Wrightman (1985).

During his tenure with the Rebels, UNLV ranked among the nation's leaders in rushing offense, finishing 15th (2002), 16th (2001) and 13th (2000) in rushing. The Rebels also posted 28 individual 100-yard rushing games in 34 contests by seven different players during a three-year stretch (2000-02). Prior to being named offensive coordinator, Boras coached the Rebels offensive line (1999-2000), a group which allowed only 12 quarterback sacks in 2001 and opened holes for a 1,000-yard rusher in consecutive seasons for the first time since 1973-74.

Boras, a two-sport high school standout at Glenbard West in Glen Ellyn, spent one season as the head coach (1998) of NCAA Division III Benedictine University in Lisle, Ill., after four seasons at the University of Texas (1994-97). During his four years with the Longhorns, Boras served as a graduate assistant working with the offensive line (1994), tight ends coach (1995), a special assistant to the team (1996) and tight ends coach and assistant special teams coordinator (1997). During his four-year stint in Austin, Texas was Big 12 champions (1996), Southwest Conference champions (1995) and earned trips to the Fiesta Bowl (1996), Sugar Bowl (1995) and Sun Bowl (1994).

Prior to joining the Longhorns, Boras began his coaching career with his alma mater, DePauw University in Greencastle, Ind., following his graduation in 1992, spending two seasons as offensive line coach (1992-93).

Boras is married, Amy, and has three children: son, Jackson, and daughters, Abigail and Ainsley.

Luke Butkus is in his second season as the Bears offensive assistant/assistant offensive line coach after being hired on February 19, 2007. Signed by the Bears as an undrafted free agent out of the University of Illinois in 2002, Butkus returned to Chicago after beginning his coaching career as a graduate assistant coach with the University of Oregon for two seasons.

A center during his playing days, Butkus moved into coaching at Oregon after finishing his professional football career in 2004 following training camp with the Houston Texans. Prior to that, he played two seasons in NFL Europe, for the Cologne Centurions in 2004 and the Rhein Fire in 2003. Butkus spent most of the 2002 season on the San Diego Chargers practice squad and went to training camp with the team in 2003. He began his career by spending his rookie offseason and first training camp with the Bears after signing as an undrafted free agent.

Butkus played for current Bears coaches Ron Turner and Harry Hiestand as a four-year letterwinner at the University of Illinois from 1998-2001. He was named a third-team All-American his senior year, while also garnering all-Big Ten honors as a team captain.

Butkus is a graduate of Bloom Township High School in suburban Chicago and the nephew of legendary Bears linebacker Dick Butkus. He served as an instructor at the University of Illinois Summer Football Camps from 2002-04 and has done so at the Revie Sorey & Jerry Azumah All-Pro Football Camps since 1995.

Butkus and his wife, Nici, have one son, Benjamin.

**GILL BYRD****Asst. Defensive Backs/Safeties**

Gill Byrd, in his third season in Chicago, was hired on February 20, 2006. Byrd is entering his first season as the Bears assistant defensive backs/safeties coach. In 2007, he served as the assistant defensive backs coach after holding the position of defensive quality control coach in his first year with the team. In his new role, which he was promoted to on January 16, 2008, Byrd will continue to work beside Steven Wilks, with his focus on the team's safety position.

Byrd came to Chicago from St. Louis where he began his coaching career in 2003. His first two seasons were spent as the Rams defensive assistant before being promoted to assistant secondary coach for the 2005 campaign.

Byrd compiled a stand-out 10-year NFL career playing exclusively with the San Diego Chargers and retired after the 1993 season as the team's all-time leader in interceptions (42) and interception return yards (546), two records which he still owns. Chosen by the Chargers with the 22nd overall pick of the first round in the 1983 NFL Draft, Byrd led all NFL cornerbacks in interceptions for three consecutive seasons (1989-91) and paced the Chargers in four straight years (1988-91). Earning All-NFL honors from The Sporting News in 1989 and Football Digest in 1990, Byrd was selected to the Pro Bowl following the 1991 and 1992 seasons. He spent the 1993 season on Injured Reserve with San Diego before retiring. Byrd was inducted into the Chargers Hall of Fame in 1998.

He returned to the NFL with the Green Bay Packers in 1999, serving as the team's executive director/player programs and community affairs for two seasons (1999-2001). In that role, Byrd directed the family assistance program of the Packers' players along with guiding players in continuing education, financial education and career internships. He began his coaching career as a volunteer with the Rams in 2003 under then-defensive coordinator Lovie Smith. Byrd earned a coaching contract at the end of the 2003 season and was promoted to assistant secondary coach in 2005.

Byrd graduated from San Jose State with a degree in finance. He and wife Marilyn have two sons: Gill II, who lettered three years as a defensive back and graduated with a degree in Hotel-Restaurant Tourism from New Mexico State, and Jairus, a redshirt junior cornerback at the University of Oregon.

Darryl Drake is in his fifth season as the Bears wide receivers coach. Drake was hired on February 6, 2004 after coaching 21 seasons at the collegiate level. He came to Chicago after six seasons (1998-2003) as the receivers coach at the University of Texas, adding the title of associate head coach on Mack Brown's Longhorns staff prior to the 2003 season.

Drake's experience at the collegiate level has served him well during his time with the Bears as he worked with young receiving corps in each of his first four seasons in Chicago. Heading into the 2008 season, Muhsin Muhammad was the only receiver with more than four years experience that Drake had opened a season with. Through that time he has helped developed such young talent at

the receiver position as Mark Bradley, Rashied Davis, Devin Hester and Bernard Berrian.

In 2007, the Bears finished with the third highest passing yardage total in team history (3,701 gross yards). Six players finished with over 200 receiving yards, the most for the franchise since 2000. Chicago also had six contests with 250-plus gross passing yards, most in a single season since eight in 1999. Eight players had receptions of 25-plus yards, producing 25 in the last 13 games of the regular season, tied for third-most in the NFL. Drake helped develop Hester, who was in his first year as an NFL receiver, into a big-play threat. Hester had 20 receptions for 299 yards and a team-high 15.0 yards per reception. Hester's two receiving touchdowns went for 81 and 55 yards. The 81-yard TD reception was the longest passing play for the franchise since 1994, as Hester became just the third player in franchise history whose first career TD reception was 80-plus yards.

During the Bears Super Bowl run in 2006, the Bears led the NFL by hauling in 95.9-percent (282 of 294) of catchable balls. The 12 drops equaled Buffalo for fewest in the League.

Under Drake's guidance, Berrian led the Bears with a career-high 951 receiving yards in 2007, the 13th-most receiving yards in Chicago single-season history.

At Texas, Drake guided three different Longhorn wide receivers to first-team all-Big 12 honors and directed three of the most productive receiving duos in UT history. While coaching the only 1,000-yard receivers in the school's history, the Longhorns averaged nearly 10 wins a season. Drake mentored first-round draft pick Roy Williams, who finished his UT career as the leading receiver in school history with 251 receptions for 4,017 yards (16.0 yards per receptions) and 37 touchdowns. He also coached Wayne McGarity, a fourth-round draft pick of the Dallas Cowboys in 1999.

Prior to that, Drake spent one season as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at Baylor (1997) after five seasons coaching wide receivers at Georgia (1992-96). During his time at UG, Drake tutored some of the top receivers in the SEC: Andre Hastings, Brice Hunter and Pro Bowler Hines Ward.

Drake began his coaching career at Western Kentucky as a graduate assistant (1983-84) and spent nine seasons at WKU, working with the receivers (1985-88), the secondary (1989-90) and serving as the passing game coordinator/quarterbacks coach (1991). He starred as a receiver for WKU in 1975 and during the 1977-78 seasons, helping the Hilltoppers to the OVC Championship as a senior and was a member of their 11-2 OVC Championship squad that played in the NCAA D-II Championship game in 1975.

Following his collegiate career, Drake spent time with the Washington Redskins (1979), Ottawa Roughriders of the Canadian Football League (1981) and Cincinnati Bengals (1983). The Louisville, Ky., native earned his bachelor's (1980) and master's (1984) from Western Kentucky.

Drake was an all-state performer in football and an All-American in both track and field and basketball at Flaget High School in Louisville. He and his wife, Sheila, have three daughters, Shanice, Felisha and Marian.

**BRICK HALEY****Defensive Line**

Brick Haley, in his second season as the Bears defensive line coach, was hired on February 23, 2007. The 19-year coaching veteran came to Chicago after three seasons as the defensive line coach at Mississippi State. Haley has been a collegiate coach at eight institutions, including time as a defensive coordinator at Baylor and Troy State.

In his first season with the Bears in 2007, Haley oversaw a defensive line that registered 28 of the Bears 41 sacks. Six different defensive linemen made a mark in the sack department, led by Adewale Ogunleye's nine, which tied for the 19th most in the NFL. Ogunleye also forced six fumbles and recovered a team-high three opponent fumbles. Pro Bowler Tommie Harris registered a career-high eight sacks, second most among NFL defensive tackles in 2007. Alex Brown was the only player on the Bears roster in 2007 with a sack (4.5), interception (one), forced fumble (two) and fumble recovery (two). Under the mentoring of Haley, Chicago defensive linemen registered 25 tackles for losses in 2007.

Prior to joining the Bears the 19-year coaching veteran spent three seasons as the defensive line coach for Mississippi State University (2004-06). Haley helped improve a Bulldogs defense that finished 41st in the nation in 2006 after finishing 113th a year before his arrival. MSU ranked 36th in rush defense in 2006 and 33rd in tackles for loss. Under Haley's watch, Bulldogs defensive end Titus Brown developed into a second-team all-SEC selection after leading the team and ranking fifth in the conference in sacks in 2006. Another Haley protégé, Michael Heard, ranked 10th in the SEC in sacks in 2006. The previous year, Haley coached the SEC leader in sacks (third in NCAA) and tackles for loss (fourth in NCAA) in Willie Evans.

Before arriving at Mississippi State, Haley spent 2002-2003 as Georgia Tech's linebackers coach where he helped the Yellow Jackets to a pair of postseason bowl games. In 2003, he coached a first-team all-ACC performer after Tech's trio of starting linebackers finished the 2002 season as the team's top-three tacklers.

Previously, Haley was the defensive coordinator and linebackers coach at Baylor (1999-2001) after coaching outside linebackers for one season each at Clemson (1998) and Houston (1997). The defensive line coach at Troy State from 1994-96, he was promoted to defensive coordinator following the 1996 campaign before leaving for the position at Houston. Haley coached the defensive line at Austin Peay from 1991-93 after starting his college coaching career as a graduate assistant at Arkansas in 1990. His first coaching job was at Enterprise (Ala.) High School in 1989.

The Gadsden, Ala. native played linebacker at Alabama A&M from 1984-88 and was inducted into the school's Athletic Hall of Fame in 2005. He received Alabama A&M's Inspiration Award in 1987 and was named MVP for the 1988 season. He and his wife, Tina, have three sons: Adrian, A.J. and Jeremy.

THE LAST HELMETLESS PLAYER

Dick Plasman, an end out of Vanderbilt, is regarded by the Pro Football Hall of Fame as the last player to play the game without a helmet. Plasman played for the Bears from 1937-41 and 1944 and was part of World Championship teams in 1940 and 1941. The NCAA made helmets mandatory in 1939 and the NFL followed shortly thereafter. Plasman never wore a helmet in high school, college or the pros but, after a stint in the armed forces, was required to wear a helmet when he returned to the NFL in 1944.



PEP HAMILTON

Quarterbacks

Pep Hamilton, in his second season as the Bears quarterbacks coach, was hired on March 5, 2007. A veteran of five seasons as an NFL assistant with a pair of prior organizations, Hamilton came to Chicago after one season as the offensive assistant/quarterbacks coach of the San Francisco 49ers.

In his first season with the Bears, Hamilton tutored quarterbacks Brian Griese, Rex Grossman and Kyle Orton who led a passing attack that finished with the third-most gross passing yards in team history (3,701). The Bears had six contests in which they had 250-plus gross passing yards and three 300-yard passing games in 2007, both the most since 1999. Hamilton saw all three quarterbacks throw 50-plus-yard scoring strikes as the team developed a big-play offense. It was the first time three Bears signal callers have accomplished that feat since 1986. Under Hamilton's direction the Bears QB-trio teamed up to complete 25 passes of 25 yards or more over the last 13 games of the season, tied for third most in the NFL. Griese and Grossman both led touchdown drives in three consecutive fourth-quarter come-from-behind road wins and Orton closed out the 2007 season with back-to-back victories as the Bears starting QB.

In his lone season in San Francisco, Hamilton helped promising young quarterback Alex Smith make strides in 2006. Smith became the first signal-caller in team history to take every snap from center over an entire campaign while completing 58.1 percent of his passes for 2,890 yards with 16 touchdowns, 16 interceptions and a 74.8 passer rating.

Before joining the 49ers, Hamilton spent three seasons with the New York Jets, joining the team as offensive quality control coach in 2003. In 2004, he was elevated to offensive assistant/quarterbacks coach where he was charged with the responsibility of acclimating free agent QB Quincy Carter to the Jets offensive system. With Hamilton's tutelage, Carter led New York to a 2-1 record in three starts. Hamilton was named the team's wide receivers coach for the 2005 season, helping Laveranues Coles catch 73 passes for 845 yards with five touchdowns to rank 14th among AFC receivers. Hamilton got his first NFL experience working as a summer coaching intern with the Kansas City Chiefs in 2000 and the Washington Redskins in 2001 and a pro scouting intern with the Baltimore Ravens during the summer of 2002.

The former college quarterback began his coaching career with five seasons at his alma mater of Howard University. He was the Bison's quarterbacks coach from 1997-2001 while also serving as the team's offensive coordinator from 1999-2001.

A quarterback at Howard from 1993-96, Hamilton earned the team's scholar-athlete award two consecutive years (1995-96) before graduating with a business degree in 1997. Hamilton and his wife have one son and one daughter.

HARRY HIESTAND

Offensive Line

Harry Hiestand

Harry Hiestand, in his fourth season as Chicago's offensive line coach, was hired on January 11, 2005. Hiestand spent the previous eight seasons serving in the same capacity at the University of Illinois under current Bears offensive coordinator Ron Turner when he was the head coach of the Illini. A 25-year coaching veteran, he has been coaching offensive linemen and tight ends since 1983, and was the offensive line coach for 16 consecutive seasons at three Division I universities.

Taking over an offensive line that allowed the sixth-highest single-season sack total in the NFL in a decade in 2004 (66), Hiestand's offensive lines have averaged 33 sacks per year over the previous three seasons, 14th fewest in the NFL.

Over the final four games of the 2007 regular season, Chicago's offensive line allowed just five sacks, tied for the eighth lowest total in the League.

The Bears offensive line has been the most experienced unit on the team over the last couple of years, led by 10-year veteran Olin Kreutz, who enters the 2008 season starting a team-high 86 consecutive games. In 2007, Kreutz and right guard Roberto Garza were two of four players on offense to start all 16 games.

Chicago's offensive line contributed to the team rushing for at least 100 yards in 25 of 32 regular season games in 2005 (13) and 2006 (12). That was the most games in a two-season span since the 1990-1991 seasons when the Bears rushed for over 100 yards in 28 contests (16 in 1990 and 12 in 1991). From 2005-06 the Bears offense ranked 5th in the NFC and 10th in the NFL in rushing yards (4,017).

Only five teams allowed fewer sacks than the 25 by the Bears in 2006, the lowest total given up by the team since allowing 17 in 2001. The Bears tied for 10th in the league by allowing 31 sacks in 2005, with just 13 over the final eight contests of the campaign.

During his tenure at Illinois, Hiestand tutored 12 all-Big Ten selections on the offensive line. Every senior starting offensive linemen in Hiestand's first seven years with the Illini was signed to an NFL contract.

Hiestand joined Illinois in 1997 after spending three seasons as the offensive line coach at Missouri (1994-96), helping the Tigers produce the ninth-leading rushing attack in the NCAA with a rushing average of 250.7 yards per game in 1996. In that same season, three of Hiestand's offensive linemen earned all-Big 12 honors. Prior to his stint at Missouri, Hiestand coached the offensive line at Cincinnati for five seasons (1989-93), where he was also the run-game coordinator in 1992 and offensive coordinator in 1993. Hiestand also coached tight ends and assisted with the offensive line at Toledo in 1988, was a graduate assistant at Southern California in 1987 and tight ends and assistant offensive line coach at Pennsylvania in 1986.

The Malvern, Pa., native began his coaching career at his alma mater, East Stroudsburg University, after an injury ended his playing. Hiestand played two years at Springfield College before spending one season at East Stroudsburg. Of his seven previous coaching stops, Hiestand has been a part of a league championship team at five of those: East Stroudsburg (1982-83), Penn (1986), USC (1987), Cincinnati (1993) and Illinois (2001). He was also on the Trojan staff for the 1988 Rose Bowl.

Hiestand earned his bachelor's degree in health and physical education from East Stroudsburg in 1983. He and his wife, Terri, have three sons, Michael, Matthew and Mark, and one daughter, Sarah.

Lloyd Lee, in his fifth season on Chicago's coaching staff, was hired on January 23, 2004. Lee will be in his first season as linebackers coach this year after serving as a defensive assistant (2006-07) and as the Bears defensive quality control coach (2004-05). As a defensive assistant, Lee coached the nickel backs for Chicago in 2007 after serving that capacity while assisting with the linebackers a year earlier. Lee was promoted to linebackers coach on January 16, 2008.

In 2006, Lee helped linebackers Brian Urlacher and Lance Briggs to Pro Bowl seasons. The linebacking duo finished first and second on the team in tackles as Urlacher finished with 185 defensive stops, second most in his career, and Briggs with a career-high 176.

Lee joined the Bears following three seasons as a pro scout with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. While at Tampa Bay, Lee assisted the pro personnel department in the recruiting and signing of NFL free agents as well as scouting and compiling reports on free agents and players on the Buccaneers roster.

A native of Bloomington, Minn., Lee entered the NFL as a college free agent with the San Diego Chargers in 1998. Lee spent time on the Chargers roster and practice squad during the 1998 and 1999 seasons. He was a four-year starter at safety at Dartmouth College (1994-98), earning Division I-AA All-America honors and was an all-ECAC selection while helping lead Dartmouth to an undefeated season and Ivy League Championship in 1996. Lee and his wife, Katy, have two daughters, Samaira and Josslyn.

Charles London, in his second season in Chicago, was hired on March 1, 2007. London will enter his first season as the Bears offensive assistant/assistant wide receivers coach. In his first year with the team, London served as the offensive quality control coach. He came to Chicago after three years (2004-06) as an assistant at Duke University, his alma mater.

During the 2007 season, London had a multitude of duties. London assisted Bears wide receivers coach Darryl Drake in developing a group of young receivers. London also focused on breaking down opponent game film and organizing weekly playbooks.

London was elevated to running backs coach at Duke for the 2006 season after spending the prior two years as a graduate assistant for the Blue Devils. During his season as running backs coach, he also assisted with special teams, in addition to his regional recruiting assignments. London's seasons as a graduate assistant were split between working directly with Duke's offensive and defensive coordinators. London spent time during the summer of 2005 as a coaching intern with the New England Patriots through the NFL Minority Internship program. Before getting into coaching, London was the Director of Stadium Operations for Gillette Stadium from 2001-04. He also worked as a Stadium Assistant Manager with the Cleveland Browns from 1999-2001 and as an Events Manager for Disney's Wide World of Sports from 1998-99.

London lettered as a running back at Duke from 1994-1996, appearing in 34 games over three seasons. He also lettered on the Duke track team for two years, competing in the 4x100-meter relay team. London was a member of the 1994 team that played in the Hall of Fame Bowl. He earned Duke's Trinity Teammate Award and Carmen Falcone Award for excellence in athletics and academics in 1996 and the College Football Hall of Fame Foundation Award in 1997. London was a member of the ACC Honor Roll in 1996-97.

London, born in 1975, received a degree in political science from Duke in 1996 before returning to campus to earn a master's degree in humanities in 2006. The Dunwoody, Ga. native was selected to play in the Georgia-Florida All-Star game following his prep career.

TIM SPENCER

Running Backs

Tim Spencer, in his fifth season as the Bears running backs coach, was named to his current position on January 27, 2004. Spencer came to the NFL following 10 seasons of tutoring the ball carriers at his alma mater of the Ohio State University.

Since Spencer has presided at his current position, Bears running backs have led a balanced attack on the ground and through the air. Since 2004, Chicago RBs rank 11th in the NFL with 316 receptions for 2,155 yards. The Bears 6,971 rushing yards over that time ranks tied for 18th in the league.

In 2007, Spencer's unit finished fifth in the NFL with 693 receiving yards on 86 receptions. Adrian Peterson led the way with 420 receiving yards, fourth-most among NFL running backs, on 51 receptions. In his first season with the Bears, Spencer helped Thomas Jones set a Bears single-season record for receptions by a running back with 56.

Under Spencer's leadership, the Bears were one of 12 teams in the NFL in 2007 that had two players rush for 500 or more yards as Cedric Benson and Peterson had 674 and 510, respectively.

In 2006, Spencer's unit fell less than 100 yards shy of reaching the 2,000 rushing yard mark as a team after topping that milestone in 2005 for the first time in 15 seasons.

Spencer was the position coach for Eddie George during his Heisman Trophy-winning season of 1995 during the Buckeyes national championship season in 2002. He was part of three Big Ten championship teams (1996, 1998, 2003) as a coach at OSU and was part of an offensive attack which led the Big Ten in scoring offense and total offense three of his 10 seasons (1995, 1996, 1998). Including George (twice), he produced 1,000-yard rushers six times during his tenure (Pepe Pearson, Michael Wiley, Jonathan Wells, Maurice Claret), including George's school single-season record of 1,927 yards in 1995.

A running back at Ohio State from 1979-1982, Spencer was the second player taken in the 1983 USFL draft where he played one year each for Chicago (1983), Arizona (1984) and Memphis (1985) before signing with the San Diego Chargers (1985-90) where he was a four-year starter at fullback. He returned to Ohio State in 1993 after retiring from professional football to finish his degree requirements and was named to John Cooper's coaching staff prior to the 1994 season.

The Buckeyes' starting fullback as a sophomore, he moved to tailback his final two years and led the team in rushing both of those seasons. He closed out his career with 3,553 yards rushing and still ranks third on OSU's all-time rushing list, trailing only Heisman Trophy winners Archie Griffin (5,589) and George (3,768). Spencer was the Buckeyes' co-captain and MVP as a senior. He also was MVP of the 1982 Holiday Bowl, rushing for 167 yards and two touchdowns in the Buckeyes' 47-17 win over Brigham Young. CHRIS TABOR

Assistant Special Teams

Chris Tabor, in his first season as Chicago's assistant special teams coach, was hired on February 22, 2008.

Tabor comes to the Bears from Western Michigan University where he spent the last two seasons as the Broncos running backs and special teams coach.

Prior to his time in Kalamazoo, he spent four seasons at Utah State where he was the running backs and special teams coach (2005) after being the Aggies assistant head coach in charge of wide receivers from 2002-04.

Tabor spent four seasons with the current Bears special teams coordinator Dave Toub at the University of Missouri (1997-99), beginning as an offensive graduate assistant and moving into the role of the running backs and special teams coach in 2000. In between his time at Missouri and Utah State, Tabor was the head coach at Culver-Stockton College in Canton, Mo., in 2001.

From 1993 to 1996, Tabor built experience at the community college and high school levels, coaching at Central Methodist College (1995-96) in Fayette, Mo., Hutchinson Community College (1994) in Hutchinson, Kansas, and Benton High School (1993) in St. Joseph, Mo.

Tabor graduated from Benedictine College in Atchison, Kansas, where he spent four seasons as a quarterback for the Ravens football team. He earned his master's in education from Columbia College in Columbia, Mo.

RULES of INSTANT REPLAY

A "buzzer system" will be used to signal the call for a replay. Before the final two minutes, the head coach will buzz the referee and replay booth that he challenges a play and wants a review. Within the final two minutes and OT, the booth will buzz the ref. The head coaches will wear a belt pack containing a buzzer. When pressed, the buzzer will simultaneously signal the referee, umpire, and replay booth that a replay is being requested. If the buzzer is not working, the coach needs to throw a flag onto the field to signal his request for replay.

There will be three replay monitors at field level in open-air stadiums. Two will be positioned at opposite 20-yard lines near the sideline wall. A third will be in the runway, for use if the weather is inclement. Two monitors will be in domed stadiums.

COACHES CHALLENGE: Outside of the final two minutes of each half, each team will be permitted two challenges per game that will initiate referee reviews. Each challenge will cost a team a time-out. If a challenge is upheld, the time-out will be restored, but the challenge will not. No challenges will be recognized from a team that has exhausted its time-outs.

FINAL TWO MINUTES OF EACH HALF: After the two-minute warning of each half, and throughout any overtime period, any referee review will be initiated by the replay assistant in the replay booth in the press box. He can initiate as many review requests as he thinks necessary, no matter how many time-outs the teams have. No time-out will be charged for a review initiated from the replay booth.

REFEREE REVIEW: All replay reviews will be conducted by the referee on a field-level monitor after consultation with the other covering officials on the play. A decision will be reversed only when the referee has "indisputable visual evidence" that the call should be changed. The referee cannot initiate a replay review in any instance.

TIME LIMIT: Reviews will be a maximum of 90 seconds, timed from when the referee puts on the head phones to the replay booth.

REVIEWABLE PLAYS: The instant replay system will cover a variety of plays in three main areas—1) sideline, goal line, end zone, and end-line plays; 2) passing plays; and 3) other detectable infractions, such as a runner ruled down not by defensive contact, and the number of players on the field.



ERIC WASHINGTON

Def. Asst./Asst. Def. Line

Eric Washington, in his first season as Chicago's defensive assistant/assistant defensive line coach, was hired on January 16, 2008.

Washington comes to the Bears from Northwestern University where he spent the last four seasons as the Wildcats defensive line coach. He served as a coaching intern for the Chicago Bears during the 2005 training camp, assisting the defensive line. A year earlier, Washington was in the same capacity with the Atlanta Falcons helping mentor the linebackers.

While at Northwestern, Washington tutored such current NFL players as Barry Cofield and Luis Castillo. In 2007, he tutored defensive tackle John Gill to all-Big Ten honorable mention accolades. Gill led Northwestern in tackles for loss with 8.5 and also recorded four sacks in 2007.

Prior to his time in Evanston, Washington served as an assistant coach at Ohio University from 2001-03 tutoring the Bobcats defensive line and also the Bobcats kickoff coverage team.

Washington was commissioned as a Naval Reserve Officer in April 1998 at the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis, Md. He was assigned to the Naval Academy Preparatory School in Newport, RI and served as the defensive coordinator.

Washington began his college coaching career at Texas A&M University as a graduate assistant in 1997, after working as an assistant coach at high schools in Louisiana, Illinois and Texas.

A native of Shreveport, La., Washington earned a B.S. degree in health and physical education, with an English minor from Grambling State University. He played football there for legendary head coach Eddie Robinson.

STEVEN WILKS

Defensive Backs

Steven Wilks

Steven Wilks, in his third season as the Bears defensive backs coach, was hired on February 16, 2006. Wilks spent 11 years as a college coach before joining the Bears, including two seasons as the defensive backs coach at two institutions under Ty Willingham. He coached under Willingham at Notre Dame in 2004 and the University of Washington in 2005. Wilks also has experience as a head coach and defensive coordinator in college.

In Wilks' first two seasons in the NFL, he has helped place an emphasis on takeaways. His defensive backs have combined for 27 of Chicago's 40 interceptions during that span and the Bears secondary has also forced 15 fumbles over the last two seasons, most in the NFL.

In 2007, rookie CB Trumaine McBride, started nine contests while developing under Wilks, a year after then-rookie S Danieal Manning started 14 contests.

This past season, the Bears defensive backs had 10 of Chicago's 16 interceptions. Safeties Danieal Manning and Brandon McGowan finished fourth and sixth, respectively, on the team in tackles while CB Charles Tillman finished fifth.

Prior to joining the Bears Wilks was one of three coaches that went along with Willingham to Washington from Notre Dame where he helped the Irish earn a bowl bid in his lone season there. Previously, Wilks was the defensive backs coach at Bowling Green State in 2003, coaching All-American cornerback Janssen Patton on a team that posted an 11-3 record and became the first team in school history to finish the season in the final national polls (23rd in both the Associated Press and ESPN/USA Today). Patton was the interception leader in the Mid-American Conference that season.

Prior to BGSU, Wilks was the defensive co-coordinator at East Tennessee State in 2002, where he coached three defensive backs to all-Southern Conference honors. His unit contributed to ETSU leading the conference in turnover margin, ranking second in pass efficiency defense and allowing 156.2 passing yards per game. Wilks also coached the defensive backs at Appalachian State in 2001 and Illinois State in 2000. ASU finished the 2001 campaign as the fourth-ranked I-AA school in the country while a pair of ISU defensive backs earned all-conference honors in 2000. Wilks spent 1999 as the head coach at Savannah State, guiding the team to a 5-6 record after serving as the team's defensive coordinator from 1997-98. In 1998, his Tigers led the nation in total defense, earning him Division II defensive coordinator of the year from *American Football Quarterly*. Four players from that team earned all-conference honors led by Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference Player of the Year linebacker Reginald Jackson. Wilks began his coaching career as the defensive coordinator at Johnson C. Smith University from 1995-96.

A defensive back at Appalachian State from 1987-91, Wilks recorded 103 career tackles with four interceptions and four blocked kicks during his career. The Mountaineers qualified for the NCAA I-AA playoffs in 1989 and 1991 with Wilks playing a contributory role. He went to training camp with the Seattle Seahawks in 1992 and played for the Charlotte Rage of the Arena Football League in 1993 as a defensive back and wide receiver. The native of Charlotte, NC, holds a bachelor's degree in communications.

He and his wife, Marcia, have two daughters, Marissa and Melanni.

RUSTY JONES

Director of Physical Development

Rusty Jones, in his fourth season as the Bears strength and conditioning coordinator, was a veteran of 20 NFL seasons with the Buffalo Bills when he was hired by Chicago on February 3, 2005. Jones is just the third full-time strength coach in Bears history since the position was created in 1974.

Jones was named 2006 National Professional Strength and Conditioning Coach of the Year by the Professional Football Strength and Conditioning Coaches Society in February of 2007. The award recognized his proficiency at enacting his renowned conditioning and nutrition program upon his arrival in Chicago. Jones has seen the principles of his program wholeheartedly adopted by the players throughout the roster.

Known around the NFL as one of the finest strength, conditioning and nutrition experts in the business, Jones has created a nutritional and workout programs specifically designed for each Bears player to maximize performance while maintaining year-round health.

Before joining the Bears, he had spent his entire NFL career in Buffalo after being hired in June of 1985. He spent 19 years as the Bills strength and conditioning coordinator before being promoted to director of physical development/assistant to the head coach prior to the 2004 season.

During his tenure in Buffalo, Jones worked under six head coaches including Hall of Famer Marv Levy and worked with over 25 different Pro Bowlers including Hall of Famers Jim Kelly and James Lofton. The Bills qualified for the playoffs in 10 of Jones' 20 seasons with the team, including four consecutive Super Bowl appearances from 1990-93. He gained league-wide notoriety for getting Buffalo's players in top physical condition while the Bills enjoyed success running the "no-huddle" offense in the early 1990's. Prior to joining the Bills in June of 1985, Jones spent two years as the conditioning supervisor for the DeBartolo Corporation, working in Pittsburgh with the Penguins, Spirit and Maulers (1983-84).

Jones earned a physical education degree from Springfield (Mass.) College and taught for two years at Dover High School in New Hampshire. The native of Berwick, Maine and Noble High School returned to Springfield to earn a master's degree in exercise physiology (1979-82), serving as a graduate assistant with the football program during that time.

Jones and his wife, Sharon, have one son, Tyler. Sharon is a professional singer who performed the national anthem before one Bears game in 2006 after doing so many times in Buffalo.



JIM ARTHUR

Strength & Conditioning Coach

Jim Arthur is in his fourth season as the Bears assistant strength and conditioning coach. Arthur came to Chicago after spending three seasons as an intern with the Buffalo Bills. He made the move to Chicago with his Buffalo mentor, Rusty Jones.

Arthur assists Jones with implementing and overseeing the team's strength, conditioning, speed, agility and nutritional programs. He also performs flexibility enhancing techniques, measures and evaluates player body composition while educating the athletes on proper nutritional guidelines, including hydration and muscle glycogen repletion.

Arthur began his coaching career at his alma mater, Springfield (Mass.) College, working as a student assistant until his graduation in 2000, then as a graduate assistant where he earned his Master of Education in Applied Exercise Science in 2002. He interned at Louisiana Tech University during the summer of 2001 and at Boston College while finishing his master's degree in 2002 before joining the Bills.


BOBBY DEPAUL Senior Director of Pro Personnel

Bobby DePaul, in his eighth year as the Bears senior director of pro personnel, has played an instrumental role in Chicago's three division championships achieved during his tenure with the team including the Bears Super Bowl XLI berth. Hired on June 19, 2001, the 19-year NFL veteran came to Chicago after serving as a member of the Philadelphia Eagles player personnel department for four years following an eight-year career as an NFL assistant coach.

DePaul evaluates players in all ranks of professional football, including the CFL and all levels of the AFL, prepares the club for its acquisitions through free agency or the waiver wire and manages the advance scouting of Bears opponents. In addition to supervising the pro personnel department, DePaul has a

hand in day-to-day football operations, assisting with salary cap maintenance, contract negotiations and overseeing the development of scouting football systems technology.

DePaul entered the NFL in 1989, hired by former Bears defensive back Richie Petitbon as a member of Joe Gibbs' coaching staff at Washington where he stayed until 1993 after the Redskins' Super Bowl XXVI victory over Buffalo. The Bowie, Md., native then served on the Bengals coaching staff for three seasons before joining the Eagles as a scout.

Born in 1963, DePaul attended Archbishop John Carroll H.S. in Washington, D.C., where he played fullback and linebacker on a team that lost only once during his three-year varsity career. DePaul attended the University of Maryland and played linebacker on three ACC champion Terrapin squads and made four bowl appearances under former Detroit Lions and San Diego Chargers head coach Bobby Ross. DePaul and his wife, Lisa, have two daughters, Ariel and Ashley.


GREG GABRIEL Director of College Scouting

Greg Gabriel, in his eighth season as the Bears director of college scouting, has coordinated the team's college scouting operation for the last six NFL drafts. Hired by Chicago on June 19, 2001, Gabriel is a veteran of 25 NFL seasons, spending 16 years in the New York Giants scouting department after two years with the Buffalo Bills.

Gabriel's chief job responsibilities are scheduling scouting visits, coordinating scouting meetings and evaluating collegiate players while playing an instrumental role in the development of the Bears draft plan. His first six drafts with Chicago yielded 18 players who started at least one game for the Bears in 2007 and Pro Bowl selections for Lance Briggs (2005-07), Tommie Harris (2005-07),

Devin Hester (2006-07) and Nathan Vasher (2005). Chicago finished the 2007 season with 29 players on its roster drafted or signed as undrafted free agents during Gabriel's tenure with the team, including eight of 22 opening-day starters.

Gabriel came to Chicago after serving as the Director of Player Development for the New York Giants. The Buffalo native joined the Giants scouting department during the 1985 off-season after serving as an area scout for an NFL scouting combine in the Great Lakes area. During his tenure with the Giants, the team went to three Super Bowls, winning two. Gabriel began his NFL career with two years in Buffalo's scouting and film grading department. Prior to entering football, Gabriel was an account executive with Prudential-Bach and later with Dean Witter Reynolds, while working part-time in the scouting department of the Bills.

A native of Buffalo where he was born in 1951, Gabriel prepped at Bishop Neumann High School in Williamsville, N.Y. He was a running back at Canisius College for three seasons while earning his Bachelor of Science degree. Gabriel played eight seasons for the Twin City Geminis, a semi-pro team in the Buffalo area where he also coached the running backs and special teams for one season.

Gabriel and his wife, Robin, married in 2004. Gabriel has three daughters (Liza, Ryan and Kelsey), two stepsons (Ryan and Nolan), one stepdaughter (Emily) and two grandsons (Jordan and Herman).



CLIFF STEIN

Sr. Director of Football Administration and General Counsel

Cliff Stein is in his seventh season with the Chicago Bears. In May 2007, he was named Senior Director of Football Administration and General Counsel.

Stein is the team's lead contract negotiator for all player contracts and assists the general manager in the management and strategic planning of the club's salary cap. He also assists the general manager in the handling of all legal issues in the football operations department. He serves as the liaison between the National Football League Management Council and the club on all CBA / salary cap compliance issues and other legal matters. In addition, Stein serves as the club's general counsel on all general legal matters and liaison to outside counsel.

In 2005, Stein was admitted by the Supreme Court of Illinois to practice law as House Counsel pursuant to Rule 716.

Stein joined the team in February 2002, as the director of player contracts & legal affairs. Prior to joining the Bears, he represented NFL players in contract negotiations and was a certified contract advisor with National Football League Players Association (NFLPA) from 1994 to 2002. Between 1997 and 2002, he was a partner in the law firm Colton & Stein, P.C. in Voorhees, N.J., where he specialized in sports law and civil litigation. In his previous capacity as an NFL agent, Stein performed all salary and endorsement contract negotiations and handled arbitrations, injury grievances, appeals and workers compensation claims.

Stein graduated magna cum laude from Temple University in 1991 and received a B.B.A. degree in business law and finance. He received his Juris Doctor degree from Temple University School of Law in 1994. As a law student he clerked for three Federal Court judges. He was admitted to the practice of law in New Jersey and Pennsylvania in 1994. In 1995, he was appointed by the president of the Pennsylvania Bar Association to serve on the Committee of Legal Ethics and Professional Responsibility. Upon graduation from law school in 1994, he began his legal career as a litigation and labor associate at a large union side labor law firm in Southern New Jersey. In addition to representing professional athletes during his legal career, Stein also became skilled in the art of trial advocacy. Prior to joining the Bears, Stein notched several jury trial victories on behalf of his clients in cases involving significant personal injuries, wrongful death, dram shop liability and insurance litigation. He also served as the municipal prosecutor for the Borough of Audubon, New Jersey in 2001-02.

Stein was born in Philadelphia, Pa. He and his wife Gayle have two children, son Jesse (7) and daughter Brynn (4).

A SPECIAL UNIT

The Chicago Bears special teams finished as the top-rated unit in the NFL in 2006 & 2007 according to a composite ranking system compiled by the *Dallas Morning News*. The system ranks 22 statistical categories, focusing on return yards, coverage, drive starting point, punting categories, field goals, extra points, turnovers, blocked kicks, points and penalties.

In 2007, the Bears ranked No. 1 in four different categories (kickoff coverage, starting point after kickoffs, points scored and blocked kicks) and finished in the top five in 11 of the 22 categories. Since the formula started being calculated in 1990, Chicago is just the second team to win the award in back-to-back seasons (Buffalo 2004 and 2005).

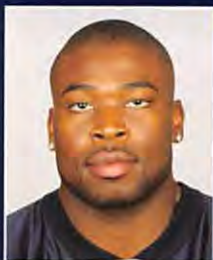

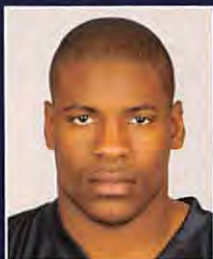

They are also the most NFC Player of the Week awards in team history surpassing Richard Dent (six defensive). Hester tied Hall (2003) for most Special Teams Player of the Week awards in a single season. Hester also earned NFC Special Teams Player of the Month in September.

P **Brad Maynard** was honored as NFC Special Teams Player of the Week following Week 16 vs. GB. It was the first Player of the Week award for Maynard in his 11-year NFL career and marked the first time a Bears punter earned the honor.

QB **Brian Griese** was named NFC Offensive Player of the Week following Week 7 at Philadelphia. It was Griese's third career Offensive P.O.W. award and first with the Bears. The 10-year veteran was honored as AFC Offensive Player of the Week twice with the Denver Broncos (Week 6 of 1999 and Week 1 of 2001).

INSTANT REPLAY'S PLAYERS

The new instant replay system reinstated in 1999 uses digital computer technology, not video tape as was employed from 1986-91. The new system affords quicker access to replays. The system is initiated by challenges from the head coaches (two per game) in all but the final two minutes of each half, and by the replay official in the booth in the final two minutes and overtime. The booth will operate under a "two-minute" mode the entire game, lining up replays of every play in case a challenge is issued.

The system begins with a "live feed" from the network television control truck covering the game. The technician controls the monitor, cuing the live play and replay screens during action. His monitor can accommodate six replay angles of a single play. The replay assistant decides which replays will be relayed to the field monitor and whether an official's time out be called for a review in the final two minutes of a half or overtime. Replay assistants will have an NFL or college football officiating background and is the only direct link to the referee on the field. The video operator, at the instruction of the replay assistant, controls which replays that the on-field referee will view. He can control the speed of the digital video playback. The communicator will advise the replay assistant—who is busy viewing the monitor—before the next play has started, negating the possibility of a replay. He will also report to the replay assistant if an official ruling (e.g., holding, illegal procedure, etc.) has been made on the field, eliminating the need for a replay.

THREE AND OUT

The Bears defense forced a league-high 65 three-and-out drives on 214 series during the 2007 regular season and lead the league in that category since 2004 (see below). The 65 three-and-out drives were the most forced by a team since the 1999 Baltimore Ravens had 75. GEORGE S. HALAS

February 2, 1895 – October 31, 1983

Leading the Chicago Bears for more than a half-century, George S. Halas, the team's founder and head coach for 40 years, was one of the most enduring personalities in sports history. Halas was active with the Bears starting in 1920 when he founded the team.

Halas was born and raised on Chicago's west side and prepped at Crane Tech High School before attending the University of Illinois. In Champaign, he earned a B.S. degree while lettering in football, basketball and baseball. After graduation in 1918, Halas joined the Navy for the first of two tours of duty. He was named Player of the Game in the 1919 Rose Bowl, playing end on the Great Lakes team that beat the Marines 17-0. A commander when he left active duty in 1946, Halas retired as a captain in the Naval Reserve. He was also awarded the Distinguished Citizens Award—the highest honor the Navy can bestow on a civilian.

After leaving the Navy, Halas played right field for the New York Yankees, but a hip injury shortened his baseball career. Halas went to work for a Decatur (IL) corn products firm owned by an enthusiastic sports fan, Mr. A.E. Staley, who sponsored a semi-pro baseball team, and later commissioned Halas to organize an independent football team.

PRO CAREER: As a player, Halas set an NFL record (which stood 49 years until 1972) when he took a Jim Thorpe fumble 98 yards for a TD in a 26-0 win over the Oorang Indians at Wrigley Field (11/4/23). He played end for the Bears from 1920-29 and was named to the NFL all-pro squad of the 1920s.

PRO COACHING CAREER: Three times Halas interrupted his coaching activities by his own volition. He first turned over the leadership to Ralph Jones from 1930 through 1932. In 1942 when he left for the Navy, Luke Johnsos and "Hunk" Anderson shared head coaching responsibilities until '45. John "Paddy" Driscoll coached in 1956-57. Coincidentally, in '33 and again in '46 when Halas resumed coaching, his Bears won world championships.

During the 1940s, his teams reached the height of their power with four straight Western Conference titles; three world championships; a fantastic four-season record (including pre-season games) of 62-7-1 (.899); scored 2,164 points and allowed just 842. The 1940 team, which defeated the Washington Redskins 73-0 for the World Championship, was voted the greatest professional team of all-time by the National Academy of Sports Editors in 1963.

Resuming coaching in 1958, Halas needed five years to develop another champion, when in 1963 the Bears won their eighth championship. *The Sporting News*, AP, and UPI named him Coach of the Year after the 1963 and 1965 seasons. Halas retired from coaching on May 27, 1968, with a career record of 324-151-31. His win total was the best in NFL history until Don Shula broke the mark in 1993. Halas is a charter member of the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

GEORGE S. HALAS, JR.

September 4, 1925 – December 16, 1979



"Mugs" Halas was an integral part of the Chicago Bears before his untimely death in 1979. The son of pro football founder George S. Halas, Mugs spent 30 years in pro football. He joined the Bears' front office in 1950, was named treasurer in 1953, and became president of the club in 1963. In his first season as president, the Bears were NFL champions. Mugs was the second of just four presidents in the franchise's 87-year history. He succeeded his father, George S. Halas, and was followed by Michael McCaskey and current president Ted Phillips. His numerous contributions on a league-level included membership on the executive committee of the NFL Management Council.

Mugs learned football at a young age, serving as a ball boy while growing up. He earned a business degree from Loyola in 1949, before entering pro football on a full-time basis. Mugs is remembered for his love and devotion to the game.

EDWARD W. McCASKEY

April 27, 1919 – April 8, 2003



Edward (Ed) W. McCaskey served as an executive with the Bears for 36 years, serving as Chairman Emeritus of the club from 1999 until his death in 2003. He was the team's second Chairman of the Board, succeeding team founder George Halas in 1983 following 17 years as the team's Vice President and Treasurer. McCaskey married Halas' only daughter, Virginia, in 1943 and joined the team at Halas' request in 1967.

McCaskey was a popular figure within the NFL and was referred to by many as the conscience of the League, as well as a sounding board for many of its leaders. He contributed to numerous charitable and civic organizations on behalf of the Bears and served as the guiding force behind the Brian Piccolo Fund.

Named Defensive MVP by *Pro Football Weekly* in 1982 and started the first 48 games of his career where he established himself as a dominant pass rusher, recording 25 sacks during his first three seasons in the league.

The Chicago Bears, originally called the Decatur Staleys when founded in 1920, wore blue jerseys with tan colored vertical striping in their inaugural season. The vertical stripes were actually strips of leather sewn onto the uniform to help the ball carrier secure the ball.



In 1935 the Bears introduced an orange jersey with black arm stripes and black helmet and by 1958 were wearing the familiar navy blue with burnt orange. The Bears unique "rounded" number style on the uniforms and numbers on the sides of the sleeves of the jerseys date back to the 50's.



The Bears trademark 'C' logo appeared on helmets in 1962 and its use continues through present day although the mark has changed from white to orange and the shape has changed slightly. After 11 years, the white 'C' logo is colored orange with white trim in 1973 and still has the same look today.



The initials GSH were added to the left sleeve in 1984 in honor of the late 'Papa Bear' George S. Halas, who passed away Oct. 31, 1983. The uniform has had a very consistent look from the 1970's with the exception of blue pants with the white jersey introduced in 1984 as a road uniform.



On Oct. 7, 2002 on a Monday Night Football game against Green Bay, the Bears wore their traditional home blue jerseys with the blue pants for the first time. On Nov. 25, 2004, for a Thanksgiving game at Dallas, the Bears wore a throwback orange jersey; then, on Nov. 13, 2005, introduced a new-look orange third jersey and have wore that for one game each season since.

Bears President & CEO Ted Phillips led the franchise to one of the team's greatest off-field achievements with the construction of the lakefront improvement plan which included the new football stadium within the confines of historic Soldier Field. The Bears are entering their sixth season in the new stadium, playing the inaugural campaign in 2003. The aggressive construction schedule lasted just 20 months from the Bears last home game of the 2001 season (vs. PHI, Jan. 19, 2002) until re-opening against Green Bay on Sept. 29, 2003. The project earned many honors for design excellence and was named *Midwest Construction* magazine's overall Project of the Year in 2003.

- **November, 2000**-Bears President and CEO Ted Phillips and his team of experts answer questions and concerns of the Illinois General Assembly at the State Capitol. After three days of gathering support, the Illinois House and Senate passed Bill 1284 on **Nov. 30, 2000**, authorizing the Illinois Sports Facilities Authority to issue approximately \$406 million in bonds to help finance the \$630 million project.
The debt service on the bonds were paid from the surplus and projected growth of the existing two percent Chicago local hotel tax plus a local distributive tax and state hotel tax subsidy. The remaining \$200 million was contributed by the Chicago Bears, including a \$100 million loan from the National Football League.
- **Nov. 15, 2000**-The City of Chicago's Lakefront Improvement Plan was announced publicly by Mayor Richard M. Daley.
The project replaced parking lots with 17 acres of new parkland, built an underground parking structure to serve the Museum Campus and Soldier Field, created easier access to the Museum Campus and added other amenities giving Chicagoans and tourists the ability to enjoy the lakefront year-round.
- **Jan. 5, 2001**-Governor George Ryan signed House Bill 1284, designed to help fund a new stadium and enhance Chicago's lakefront.

The following is a number of facts concerning different elements of the Soldier Field project and the Lakefront Initiative:

LAKEFRONT IMPROVEMENTS

The project created approximately 17 acres of additional waterfront parkland for public enjoyment. This green space was programmed for year-round public uses such as a sledding hill, winter garden, a terraced park, an area for outdoor museum exhibits and other features.

The year-round parking facility created 2,500 new underground parking spaces immediately adjacent to the Field Museum and Shedd Aquarium and 3,100 outdoor spaces between the stadium and McCormick Place to ensure Chicago's great tailgating tradition continues.

SOLDIER FIELD IMPROVEMENTS

The stadium features increased sideline seating from 40% of seats to over 60%, an increased number of new and improved restrooms (over 1,000 restroom fixtures) plus more variety and access at over 350 concession points of sale, three-level United Club lounge, a Bears Ring of Honor throughout the mezzanine level, a Bears Den gallery depicting historical events from Soldier Field's past and a bas-relief of George Halas.

Above and beyond the Bears games, the new Soldier Field is capable of hosting an increasing number of athletic events, prime concerts, and large civic, cultural and educational gatherings. The unique design allows for easy stage setup and take down, along with a field that can accommodate international soccer events.

FUNDING THE LAKEFRONT IMPROVEMENT PLAN

The Bears made a \$224 million contribution to this project, pay annual rent of \$5.7 million and accepted the cost over-run risks on the project. The entire cost of the Lakefront Project (\$630 million) was raised without asking for taxpayers' money. The plan was supported through a local City of Chicago hotel tax which is already in existence. There was no extension or increase of any taxes and the hotel tax was principally paid by visitors and tourists.

PRESERVING HISTORY

The historic colonnades and historic South Wall remained untouched as the new stadium was built within the existing exterior of Soldier Field. The Memorial Water Wall honors all soldiers who have served in the United States Armed Forces. The Wall serves as an educational piece for families and visitors of the museum campus. A Doughboy statue was erected at the entrance of Gate O and the south concourse features a Medal of Honor tribute.



Following 31 seasons of football along the shores of Lake Michigan (pictured, left), the Bears took a brief one-year hiatus from Soldier Field in 2002, playing home games at Memorial Stadium in Champaign so construction of the new Soldier Field (right) could be completed. The first game in the new stadium was Sept. 29, 2003 against division rival Green Bay. The Bears first season at the old venue was in 1971 after spending 50 seasons at Wrigley Field. Soldier Field was opened in 1924 as a 45,000-seat Municipal Grant Park Stadium. The first football game played on its field was November 22, 1924, as a capacity crowd watched Notre Dame edge Northwestern, 13-6.

It hosted the first boxing event which drew a gate of over \$2.5 million (Dempsey-Tunney, 1927), the first ski meet held in a stadium, and the all-time largest football crowd (123,000). The largest crowd for any event in Soldier Field was 260,000 on Sept. 8, 1954, for the Catholic Church's Marian Year Tribute.

The 100,000-seat stadium was dedicated November 27, 1926, with Army battling Navy to a 21-21 tie. The all-time collegiate attendance record of 123,000 plus was established Nov. 26, 1927 as Notre Dame beat Southern Cal 7-6. In the first professional game at the then-mammoth stadium, the Bears defeated the Chicago Cardinals 10-0 on November 11, 1926.

Plans for the stadium started in 1919 as a memorial to the soldiers of WWI. Soldier Field stood on 10,000 pile foundations driving an average depth of 62.5 feet through fill that replaced the lake waters. The new stadium continues to be owned, maintained and operated by the Chicago Park District.

Other stadium notes since the Bears moved to Soldier Field:

- 1971** – September 19, Chicago defeats the Pittsburgh Steelers 17-15 before capacity crowd of 55,701 in the Bears' first game since moving from Wrigley.
- 1979** – The stadium undergoes major reconstruction and renovation prior to the season including new lighting, playing surface, and locker rooms; rebuilding of seating area (new chairbacks, armrests, seats); and improvement of sightlines.
- 1982** – Additional rebuilding of seating areas was completed as well as new concourses with more restrooms and concession areas. A new press box, 60 deluxe skyboxes, and a new scoreboard were also built. Capacity is increased to 66,030.
- 1988** – Surface was changed from artificial turf to natural grass, and 56 skyboxes were added along south rim (increasing the total to 116). Capacity is increased to 66,946.
- 1992** – Four seats are added increasing the capacity to 66,950.
- 1994** – The Park District spends millions to refurbish the stadium for the World Cup soccer tournament. Capacity is reduced by six to 66,944.
- 2000** – Mayor Daley announces Lakefront Redevelopment Project (11/15).
- 2001** – Project receives state and city approval.
- 2002** – Demolition begins on stadium immediately following playoff game (1/19).
- 2003** – Bears return to Soldier Field with Monday night re-opening on September 29 against Green Bay. Capacity is set at 61,500, over 5,000 fewer seats than the old stadium and the second smallest venue in the NFL.

Located on the west side of the stadium on the street-level main concourse, the bas-relief sculpture marks the gateway for a stadium visitor's trip through the history of the Chicago Bears.

Pure and simple, he loved this game that was uncluttered and uncompromising as he was. Its requirements were courage, endurance, self-discipline and a competitive spirit. These were his prerequisites, too.

His teams played the game the same way he did—tough, aggressive and smart.

Often graced by a running back of exceptional ability, the Bears were always marked by a punishing defense that never stopped coming at you.

George Halas was a founder of the NFL and a pioneer of the Chicago Bears. His devotion to both over the decades helped them grow to prominence.

We will always remember his energy, his joy in competing, and his passion for his beloved Bears and Bear fans.

Artist Description:

The bas-relief is a time-line describing George Halas' contribution to the world of football and the history of the Chicago Bears.

Hall of Famers date back from the 1920's when George Halas founded the Chicago Bears, and represent different decades of team history.

The tremendous energy and influence of the two large George Halas reliefs tells the story and balances all of the action. George S. Halas is without doubt the overriding presence in the sculpture.

The laser-etched imagery shows the team in the 1920's - also Halas and his team celebrating a 1940's win against the Washington Redskins, fan images from Wrigley Field, a photo of Halas with George Jr. and Paddy Driscoll, and a fan grouping from the 1980's. Integrated in the composition is the famous "T" formation that George Halas invented.

THE DOUGHBOY STATUE

Just inside Gate O in the Grand Concourse stands the restored Doughboy Statue. Originally installed in Chicago's Garfield Park in the early 1930s, four decades later it was damaged, debased, but not forgotten. Chicago sculpture conservator Andrzej Dajnowski meticulously recast the missing parts and refurbished the entire statue and base to its original condition and it joins the other memorials to the American fighting men and women at Soldier Field.

THE BEARS DEN

Located on the lower concourse of the west grandstands, the Bears Den offers a dramatic, visual walk through Chicago Bears history.



THE RING OF HONOR

Chicago Bears Hall of Fame greats are honored on the mezzanine level Ring of Honor. The 26 Chicago Bears enshrined in the Pro Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio, are the most of any team in the NFL.



THE MEMORIAL WATER WALL

The Memorial Water Wall, a 280-foot long wall of polished green granite with eight medallions honoring the different branches of the armed services, flanks the walkway that leads into the north entrance of the stadium. A veil of water continuously flows over the sculptured memorial.

The Chicago Bears moved into Halas Hall at Conway Park on March 3, 1997. The 38-acre complex is located in Lake Forest off of Route 60 just east of the Tri-State Tollway, approximately four miles from the former Halas Hall. The building is dedicated to Bears' founder, president and coach George Halas. The original Halas Hall, on the Lake Forest College campus, was dedicated by coach Halas in the name of his son, Mugs, in 1979.

The complex includes a 100,000 square foot office building, indoor practice facility, and 2 1/2 outdoor practice fields, surrounded by a jogging path. One of the two 100-yard outdoor fields is equipped with 14 miles of underground heating tubes, enabling the grass to remain soft and growing into early winter, as well as five miles of drain tubing that can capture and disperse nine inches of rainfall per hour and 2.5 miles of cooling pipes for the grass roots.

The main building is almost two football fields long and 100 feet wide. The old Halas Hall had 32,000 square feet of space, while the new building has 100,000. In fact, the entire former Halas Hall would fit into the basement of the new building. Furthermore, the old locker room was 1,400 square feet, while the new one is about 3,000, has 62 lockers with room to quickly expand to 100, and 4 natural light wells. The weight room—perhaps the most spectacular aesthetic area of the complex—is 7,000 square feet, almost four times the size of the 1,800 square foot workout area at the old building. The glass wall on the east side of the weight room is 28 feet high, perfect for viewing the white-tailed deer on their evening romps across the complex grounds. A two-lane lap pool is behind the weight room, and its sixty-foot lanes have built-in resistance currents. The training room is five times the size of its predecessor, and boasts a doctors' office, x-ray facility, medical records storeroom, casting room, whirlpool, cold-dip plunge, steam room and sauna. The football needs are met with eight classrooms, two large meeting rooms/classrooms, and a 150-seat auditorium capable of hosting seminars, television productions and press conferences.

ED McCASKEY MEMORIAL GARDEN AND THE WALTER PAYTON CENTER

The team's indoor practice facility, the Walter Payton Center, was renovated during the summer of 2005 while construction of the Ed McCaskey Memorial Garden was completed in June, 2005.

The Walter Payton Center is a rigid structure, opposed to the inflated "bubble" the team used from 1990-96, and includes a full 100-yard field. The structure is 85 feet high, 200 feet wide and 400 feet long. The renovation included removal of the existing fabric roof and cladding on the outside of the building, replacement of the end walls and installation of a new, state-of-the-art synthetic turf and two-lane running track. A new heating and de-humidification system was also installed.

Located south of Halas Hall, the Ed McCaskey Memorial Garden is a beautifully landscaped, clover-leaf shaped garden bordered by a 30" stone seat wall and piers. A winding gravel road from Halas Hall leads to the opening of the garden where a variety of trees, shrubs and perennials have been planted.

In memory of Brian Piccolo, each season since 1970 a Bears rookie has been honored with the Brian Piccolo Award. In 1992, the award was expanded to include a veteran as well. The Piccolo Award is a special honor voted on by Bears players only, who select a teammate they feel best exemplifies the courage, loyalty, teamwork, dedication and sense of humor of the late Brian Piccolo.

In all, 50 different Bears have won the award including eight on the current roster: Alex Brown (2002), Tommie Harris (2004), Devin Hester (2006), Olin Kreutz (2003, '04 and '06), Greg Olsen (2007), John Tait (2005), Charles Tillman (2003) and Brian Urlacher (2000 and '07).

Brian Piccolo signed with the Bears as a free agent out of Wake Forest in 1965—the same year Hall of Famer Gale Sayers was drafted. The two became roommates, and Piccolo's support of Sayers through a devastating knee injury, as well as Sayers' devotion when Piccolo was stricken with cancer in 1969, became the stuff of legend. Piccolo was in his fourth season when a chest x-ray revealed a malignancy. Several months later on June 16, 1970, he died at age 26 from embryonal cell carcinoma.

Following his death, the Brian Piccolo Cancer Research Fund was established and proceeds were sent to the Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center in New York for research on embryonal cell carcinoma. At the time Piccolo died, the disease was 100% fatal, but today the cure rate is 95%.

With that victory, proceeds from the Brian Piccolo Cancer Research Fund now benefits breast cancer research at Rush Medical Center and provides support to the Clearbrook Center for the developmentally disabled in Arlington Heights.

Since turning its attention to the fight against breast cancer, the Brian Piccolo Cancer Research Fund, as well as all those who have generously joined in its efforts, has raised over \$5 million for research. The fund remains active and welcomes the interest of contributions of others who share its commit-

TOM THAYER: Originally a Bears' fourth-round draft pick in 1983 after an All-America career at Notre Dame, Tom Thayer played for three seasons with the USFL's Chicago Blitz and Arizona Wranglers before joining the Bears. One of the team's strongest players, Thayer earned his starting role at right guard four games into the 1985 season and eventually compiled consecutive game and consecutive start streaks that led the Bears during the late 1980s. Thayer left the Bears in 1992 after a distinguished eight-year career at offensive guard. He retired in 1993 after one season with the Miami Dolphins. Before joining the Bears radio team in 1997, Thayer worked for two years as a Bears analyst on WFLD-TV's pro football programming. A former all-state lineman at Joliet Catholic High, Thayer resides in Chicago.
