ABE GIBRON . . . *Football Career Man*

Abe Gibron is an authentic pro football career man with close to a quarter of a century devoted to his life's work. This is his eleventh year with the Bears. Before 1972, when he became head coach, he had been an assistant seven years (1965-'71) and before that, a player for two (1958-'59).

As a player, he was co-captain and offensive guard. As an assistant, he spent three seasons coaching the offensive line (and in his first year a Bears team scoring record was set with 409 points) and then four handling the defensive forwards.

Abe is as closely identified with the immediate Chicago territory as Lake Michigan... born Sept. 22, 1925, at Michigan City, Ind., which still is his permanent, year-around home with wife, Susie; sons, William Abraham, 12;

James Kahlil, 6; and daughter, Matina Frances, 10.

He is a colorful, earthy phrase-maker and a delight to the media as well as a blunt but understanding realist at human relations that brings his players close to him.

Gibron lettered at and graduated from Purdue in 1949 and Buffalo of the old All-American Conference was his first pro venture. From there, he went on to seven great seasons with the Cleveland Browns, winning all-NFL offensive guard honors three times and playing in five Pro Bowls.

The last three games of 1956 and all of 1957 were spent with the Philadelphia Eagles, just before he came to the Bears.

Retiring as an active player, he went to the Washington Redskins as an assistant for five years beginning in 1960 before coming back here.



So Gibron has been around football too long to become an overnight bubbling, babbling optimist. In only his second year as the Bears' head coach, he sees his off-season personnel moves as the practical way to betterment rather than the prelude to instant miracles that will make all problems disappear.

He is sure the Bears of 1973 have higher quality talent in all sectors, and more of it than the Bears of 1972.

Dealing for NFL-experienced help and selection of blue-chip college prospects all happened on the last two days of January 1973, during the annual college draft session.

Trading of draft choices brought two sound, seasoned offense players—running back Carl Garrett from New England, and tight end Craig Cotton from Detroit. Their statistical credentials are included in the Bearo-

graphical section elsewhere in this year-book but here's how they became Chicagoans:

The Bears had an extra first round choice (from Kansas City as compensation for George Seals) and it came seventeenth. Gibron traded that plus a Bears' third round choice to Detroit for the Lions' nineteenth position on the round and Cotton. Then he sent the nineteenth round right of selection to New England for Garrett.

Actually, the Bears produced FIVE players off the first two rounds. Besides the NFL-seasoned pair, they got Wally Chambers, massive defensive lineman from Eastern Kentucky, on their initial first round draft as well as two on the second round—quarterback Gary Huff of Florida State and another outsized defensive lineman, Gary Hrivnak, from Purdue. The extra second round pick came from Dallas as part of the compensation for Jack Concannon a year ago. The other two-thirds of the compensation were offense tackle Bob Asher and defense tackle Bill Line, each of whom became a regular shortly after reporting August 19, 1972.

The draft choices overall pretty much reflected needs pinpointed by Gibron after he lived with and looked at a 1972 team that wound up 4-9-1, although at the halfway point, the Bears were 3-3-1. Yet, Abe had neither regrets nor did he second guess any decisions he made along the route. He was quick to learn and faster even to improve during his playing days and the knack still was with him as a coach.

He detected those who didn't measure up to his standards of NFL team competence ("... forty guys who want to play football that punishes ... spectators don't belong with those forty.").

He got a little more out of what he had than seemed possible and the Bears were exciting to watch in all but two flat outings during the season.

The first Gibron-imprint Bears team was an old-fashioned one that accented rushing—the 2,360 yards along the ground led the National Conference and was fourth in the league overall. Since 1932, when statistics began to have some meaning, the Bears have led the NFL in rushing eleven times, the best 2,835 yards in 1934.

Bobby Douglass' 968 yards—most ever by any NFL quarterback—won him team individual rushing leadership and his total is the fifth best for any Bear in history. He averaged 6.9 yards per carry, second best of all time in the NFL. Beattie Feathers, another Bear, had 9.9 in 1934.

The special teams provided a lot of the excitement. Two kickoffs were run back for touchdowns, one by Ron Smith (league leader in KO returns) and the other by Earl Thomas. As a team, the Bears averaged 29.3 per KO return to break the old NFL record of 28.9 set by Pittsburgh in 1952.

In the season final at Oakland, rookie Craig Clemons broke through, blocked Jerry De Poyster's punt and Ross Brubacher fell on the ball in the end zone for a touchdown.

And for the second time in two years, the Douglass-to-Dick Butkus battery collaborated on a point after touchdown. This time, it was at

Philadelphia on a bad pass from center and (just as he had against Washington in 1971) Bobby pitched to Butkus in the end zone (just as Dick had been the receiver against the Redskins the year before).

There was trickery too. In a fourth down punt situation against Detroit, Butkus, the up-man, took a direct pass from center, ran 28 yards. Against Minnesota here on another punting situation, Bobby Joe Green passed instead to Cecil Turner for 23 yards. Earlier in that game, on a fake field goal try, Douglass, the holder, arose as he took the ball and ran six yards for a first down.

The Bears had to have stamina as well as competitive heart because in virtually every outing, they began as trailers—in eleven of fourteen games, opponents scored first... in ten games the Bears were behind at the half and in another they were in a tie... one time, they were 31-7 in arrears at the half; another time, 21-0 in the third quarter; still another, 27-7 in the third, and so on.

For the season overall, the Bears allowed only ninety-nine points in the third and fourth quarters while they scored 147.

That contrasts with the first half cumulative total of 176 for opponents to the Bears' 78, alarming evidence of a season-long slow start in every game. In fact, after three or four games in which that scoring pattern was pronounced, a suggestion was made that the Bears warm up two full scrimmage periods in private before going on the field for the formal first half.

The 99 second half points by opponents came from ten touchdowns, nine extra points and ten field goals. In nine games, the enemy didn't even score a third or fourth quarter touchdown so belated though the defensive efforts were, they did show the Bears were capable of halftime adjustment.

Injuries, inevitable probably yet never brought up by Gibrion as an explanation for a sub-500 year, struck savagely at key people. In the final pre-season game at St. Louis, Joe Moore (no. 1 draft choice of 1971) went out for the year with a knee injury requiring surgery.

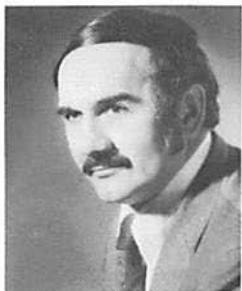
Garry Lyle, finally getting his chance as a starter at safety, was wiped out for the season after a knee injury received in the third game. The next week, defensive end Willie Holman received an Achilles tendon injury and played no more in 1972. Finally, Lionel Antoine, the no. 1 draft choice, needed surgical repair for knee cartilage injured in pre-season and didn't get back till the last two games of the regular schedule.

Moore's loss was a deep blow to the offense since he had a great preseason record (233 yards rushing, a 4.2 average) before his injury.

To wrap up 1972, in the matter of turnovers (which is a euphemism for mistakes) the Bears and opponents were an exact standoff—35 apiece. The Bears lost the ball on 22 fumbles and 13 interceptions; opponents on 14 fumbles, 21 interceptions.

EDMUND "ZEKE" BRATKOWSKI came back as a coach last year to the Bears for whom he played for five seasons. A native of Danville, Ill., he attended the University of Georgia, was NCAA punting leader as a senior and then was drafted by the Bears on the fifth round as a 1953 future. From 1963 through 1968, he was backup quarterback to Bart Starr with the Green Bay Packers, played on three consecutive world championship teams as well as being in the first two Super Bowls. Bratkowski was a Packer backfield coach for two years but was activated as a player again in 1971. His service with the Bears began in 1954, was interrupted by two years in the Army followed by four more playing seasons. He went to the Los Angeles Rams in 1961 and got to the Packers early in 1963. His fourteen NFL seasons show 762 pass completions out of 1,484 attempts for 10,291 yards and 65 touchdowns. He and his wife, Mary Elizabeth, have two sons, Bobby and Steve, and a daughter, Cassie.

JIM CARR, regarded as one of the NFL's sharpest defensive coaches, returns to the Bears' staff this season after having been with the Philadelphia Eagles for three years. Previously, he had been with the Bears in 1969 following three years on the Minnesota Vikings staff. Nicknamed "Gummy", Jim is a native of Kayford, W. Va., who played his collegiate football at Morris Harvey (Charleston, W. Va.) and then had a busy pro career beginning in 1955. He was an outstanding defensive back for the Chicago Cardinals, the Montreal Alouettes of the Canadian League, the Baltimore Colts and the Eagles before winding up as a linebacker with the Washington Redskins in 1964-'65. He, his wife, Lila Lee, and their two children, Kenneth and Gwendolyn, live in Roselle, Ill.

CHARLES "CHUCK" CHERUNDOLO is a pro football career man whose name is well known in NFL circles as a coach and a player. He returned

to the Bears' staff the past two seasons following a previous tenure, 1966 through '68. Between those two periods, he was head coach in 1969 of the Tri-City Apollos (Midland, Mich.) of the Continental League and in 1960-'71, was scout for the Quadra scouting combine that functions for Dallas, Los Angeles, San Francisco and San Diego. His previous coaching career included assignments with Pittsburgh, 1948-'61; Philadelphia, 1962-'63; and Washington, 1964-'65. He was an All-American center at Penn State and then was a line star for the Cleveland Rams, Philadelphia and Pittsburgh from 1937-'48 with four years in the U.S. Navy. He and his wife, Margaret, live in Chicago and are parents of a son, John, a June graduate from Syracuse University law school, and a daughter, Mary Pat.

WILLIAM "WHITEY" DOVELL (pronounced "Doe-Vell") is in his second year with the Bears, following the '72 season in which the offensive line coached by him was a strong factor in winning the team's rushing leadership in the National Conference. Previously, he had been with the Denver Broncos for five seasons after fifteen years at the University of Maryland where he lettered in varsity football under Coach Jim Tatum. An offensive guard, Dovell played in the Gator Bowl twice and the Sugar Bowl once and after graduation, he became freshman coach for three years. Then, for the next twelve years, he coached receivers, both offensive and defensive lines and linebackers at various times. Twenty-two of the players he coached went into pro football. Dovell, a native of Newark, N.J., interrupted his high school education in 1944 to enlist in the Seabees and serve until 1946. He and his wife, Claire, have three daughters, Audrey, Patricia and Lisa, and the family resides in Cary, Ill.

PERRY MOSS is in his fourth season on the Bears' staff. His football career has been a colorful one, beginning at the age of seventeen when,

as quarterback for Tulsa University, he played in the 1945 Orange Bowl. He transferred to the University of Illinois and led the 1946 Big Ten champions to a Rose Bowl victory. Moss also was in two College All Star games and after graduation, he played one year with the Green Bay Packers before going into coaching. He has been athletic director-head coach at Florida State and head coach-general manager of the Montreal Alouettes of the Canadian League among other assignments. Moss, his wife, Jeannette, and two children, Less and Penny Lee, live in Park Ridge, Ill.

JERRY STOLTZ, who grew up on Chicago's South Side, joins the Bears staff this season, following four as a New England Patriots assistant preceded by eight in the collegiate field. He was born in Belleville, Ill., but came to Chicago with his parents and in 1952-'53-'54 was an outstanding prep athlete at Fenger high school. He enrolled at the University of Toledo, lettering and seeing service as a quarterback, a running back or a defensive back with All-Mid-America Conference honors at the latter position. After graduation, he went into coaching and was on staffs at Toledo, Notre Dame, Miami of Ohio and Purdue before going to New England in 1969. He and his wife, Rosemary, and children, Mike, Jeri Marie, Kelly and Patrick, make their home now in Hinsdale.



JOHNSOS

LUKE JOHNSOS leads all the rest in continuity of service with the Bears, first as a player, then coach and, since 1969, director of technical research. He began it all back in 1929 and his name looms large in all accounts of the Bears from that time on. As a player, Luke starred nine seasons, three times winning all National Football League honors at end. In his forty-four years with the Bears organization, he figured as player or assistant coach in seven of their eight championships. Johnsos even was co-head coach from 1942-'45. He was a three-year regular in football and baseball at Northwestern and turned down an offer from the Cincinnati Reds to go with the Bears. His home is Evanston and he and his wife, Rosemary, are parents of a son, Luke, Jr., of Deerfield; four daughters, Judy (Mrs. John Wolford of River Forest); Janet (Mrs. Dean Traflet of La Grange Park); Barbara (Mrs. Brian Kocher of Minneapolis); and Ann (Mrs. Gary Smith of Kansas City). They also have thirteen grandchildren.

ROZY

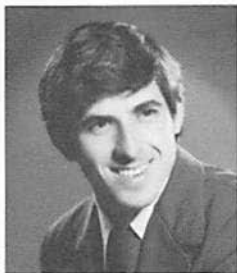
ED ROZY is in his twenty-sixth year with the Bears organization and his third as director of training services. He had been trainer of the Bears beginning in 1947 and continuing through 1970 when he was assigned new responsibilities that still are in the general area in which he is most familiar. Rozy had been longest service active trainer in the NFL and is one of the best known and respected men in his profession in sports. A graduate of Marquette University in 1933, he lettered in football there and then became intramural director of athletics, head trainer of all major sports and coach of a half dozen minor sports teams. From 1944 through 1947, he was a lieutenant in the U.S. Navy. Rozy and his wife, Jo, live in Niles with their two daughters, Mary and Julie.

Director of Professional Talent

ED CODY has been director of professional talent since 1971 after six straight seasons as offensive backfield coach. He came to the Bears first in 1949 as an offensive back and defensive linebacker after beginning his pro career with the Green Bay Packers. Cody earned both bachelor's and master's degrees at Purdue where he captained the football team and won both the Big Ten scoring and ground gaining championships. His coaching career includes the assignment of defensive coach of the Oakland Raiders as well as collegiate positions at the University of California, Santa Barbara; and Washington State. Ed has three daughters, Chris, Kim and Tracey, and all live in Mount Prospect.

Director of Collegiate Talent

JIM PARMER, named director of collegiate talent last February, has top credentials at every level of football. He had been associated with the Blesto-VIII scouting combine, of which the Bears are members, since 1967. The past two years, he has had regional responsibilities. Parmer, lettering in football at Oklahoma A. & M. 1944-'47, was drafted by the Philadelphia Eagles and was a starting back for nine seasons. After retirement, he coached three seasons at Texas Tech, went into insurance work for four years and then joined the Washington Redskins' personnel department. He and his wife, Mary Jean, have two daughters, Sandy and Jaime; and a son, Rich. They have been living in Lubbock, Tex.

Head Trainer

FRED CAITO is new head trainer of the Bears this season, succeeding Bernie Lareau who resigned to become business manager and trainer of the San Antonio, Tex., Spurs of the American Basketball Association. Caito, like Lareau, is a protege of Ed Rozy as well as a graduate of St. Joseph's College, Rensselaer. He assisted Rozy at the Rensselaer training camp in the summers of 1967 and 1968 and, after graduating with a bachelor's degree from St. Joseph's in 1969, he became full-time assistant. Caito also has a master's degree in physical education from Northwestern. A native of Tiffin, O., his home now is Chicago.

LIONEL ANTOINE T 6'6" 255 S. Illinois 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1972, D-1-a Born: 8-31-'50, Biloxi, Miss.

Antoine suffered a knee injury in a 1972 pre-season game at Houston that required repair of cartilage involvements after the third contest of the regular NFL schedule. He had been on the active list as an offensive tackle but did not play in any of those three games. He returned for the season's final pair, at Philadelphia and at Oakland and saw some action on the defensive line in each. At Southern Illinois, Antoine was used at various times at both end and tackle on defense as well as tackle and tight end on offense. Home: Chicago.

BOB ASHER T 6'6" 260 Vanderbilt 3rd Season
Joined Bears: 1972, T-Dallas Born: 6-13-'48, Falls Church, Va.

Asher was a starter in all fourteen games of his first season here and his rapid development and consistent improvement stabilized the right side of the Bears' offensive line. He graded out over ninety percent against some of the toughest defensive linemen in the NFL and is considered one of the Bears' best acquisitions through trade in quite a few years. Asher, an all-American at Vanderbilt, was Dallas' second round choice for 1970 and he got into six games. A knee injury sidelined him all of 1971 but he had an impressive training camp and pre-season schedule record with the Cowboys before joining the Bears August 19, 1972. Home: Chicago.

TOM BEARD T-C 6'6" 260 Michigan St. 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1973, W-Buffalo Born: 6-10-'48, Findlay, O.

Beard, eighth round draft choice of the Denver Broncos for 1971 was on their reserve squad all that season. Traded to Buffalo for a draft choice in September 1972, he got into twelve games, chiefly at offensive tackle and on special teams although he was also used at center occasionally. Home: Battle Creek, Mich.

DOUG BUFFONE LB 6'2" 225 Louisville 8th Season
Joined Bears: 1966, D-4 Born: 4-27-'44, Yatesboro, Pa.

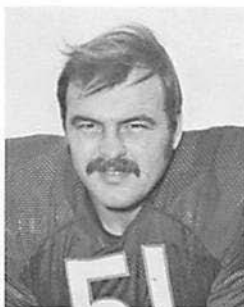
Buffone is widely respected as one of the best outside linebackers in pro football and durability is one of his outstanding qualities. He now has played 98 consecutive NFL games for the Bears and has been starting left linebacker since 1967. The previous season, as a rookie, he was an alternate for then defensive captain Joe Fortunato but he got in most of his playing time with special units, particularly the goal line defense platoon. Buffone's six-year record (covering his career as a starter) shows 452 tackles, 350 assists as well as thirteen interceptions. In 1970, his four interceptions were the most ever by any Bears outside linebacker and his 90 assists were high for the team. His name also shows up in scoring statistics because in 1967, he recovered a Detroit Lions' fumble and carried in for a touchdown. Buffone was Bears player representative at the Conference of the President's Commission on Drug Abuse. He also has conducted a summer football school at North Central College, Naperville, Ill. Home: Deerfield, Ill.

DICK BUTKUS LB 6'3" 245 Illinois 9th Season
Joined Bears: 1965, D-1 Born: 12-9-'42, Chicago

Refer to the Bears career statistics, later in this book, and you'll find Butkus' name in several different categories, including such unlikely ones (for a defense practitioner) as rushing and scoring. He also is in the records section with his four recoveries of opponents fumbles last season lifting his career total to twenty-four, an NFL mark. Some of the fumbles he caused himself since he's an accomplished stripper. It is no wonder then that he has been all-NFL middle linebacker (on major selections) seven times out of eight... Pro Bowl participant eight straight seasons... team leader in tackles-assists eight straight times, too, with a career total of 956-463. Only year he missed all-NFL MLB was 1971. The omission followed surgical reconstruction of loose knee ligaments the previous winter that

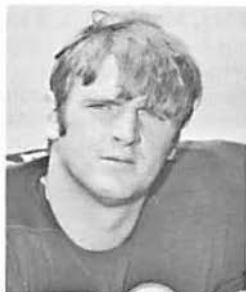
"reduced his efficiency" to a mere 117 tackles, 68 assists; three enemy fumble recoveries and three created; four pass interceptions plus a conversion point when he caught a Bobby Douglass pass in the end zone that beat Washington, 16-15. Last season, on a similar situation at Philadelphia (bad pass from center on a conversion try), Butkus again caught a pass for a point. Earlier in the year, against the Detroit Lions here, he turned a fourth down punting situation into a fake—slicked everybody by taking the snap from center and rushing 28 yards. Home: Chicago Heights.

WALLY CHAMBERS DE 6'6" 250 E. Kentucky 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1973, D-1 Born: 5-15-'51, Phenix City, Ala.

Chambers was the big man of Eastern Kentucky's defense as he led the team in tackles and assists three straight seasons—65-57 in 1970; 85-64 in '71; and 73-44 last season. He's huge physically but his head coach, Roy Kidd, looks beyond height and weight as he remarks admiringly: "He has the quickness, intelligence and aggressiveness to make it big in the NFL." Chambers has 4.8 speed in the forty and climaxed his collegiate eligibility by playing in both the North-South and the Senior Bowl postseason games. He blocked Jerry De Poyster's third quarter punt and Ross Brupbacher recovered in the end zone for the touchdown that brought the Bears into a 14-14 tie at the time. CRAIG COTTON TE 6'2" 225 Youngstown 5th Season
Joined Bears: 1973, T-Detroit Born: 7-7-'47, Elizabeth, Pa.

Cotton welcomed the trade that brought him to the Bears from Detroit where he had always been in the shadows as backer-up for Charlie Sanders. He functioned chiefly for the Lions on special teams his first couple of seasons with them but always responded in emergencies on offense. Last season, filling in for an injured Sanders, Cotton had a big day against the Bears at Soldier Field, catching four passes for 67 yards and a touchdown. He's an excellent blocker. As a collegian at Youngstown (Ohio) State, he had 76 pass receptions for 1,163 yards and ten touchdowns in three seasons. Home: Madison Heights, Mich.

MIKE CREANEY C 6'4" 232 Notre Dame 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1973, D-6 Born: 10-15-'51, Towson, Md.

Creaney is the adaptable sort who lettered at tight end three years at Notre Dame although he had been an All-American High School selection as an offensive and defensive lineman. He played defense his first year at South Bend before he was shifted to tight end. His wide ranging versatility is rounded out by experience at snapping the ball from center in kicking situations. Creaney also is a fine blocker. Home: Towson.

BOBBY DOUGLASS QB 6'4" 221 Kansas 5th Season
Joined Bears: 1969, D-2 Born: 6-22-'47, Manhattan, Kan.

The way Douglass accumulated 968 yards rushing (most in NFL history by a quarterback) is a testimonial to consistency. His 6.9 yards per carry average is second best of all-time, back of the NFL single season record 9.9 by Beattie Feathers, also a Bear, in 1934. Twenty-eight of Douglass' 141 rushes were in double figures and might be called "first down" runs, ranging as they did from as few as ten yards (four times) or eleven (also four) up to a high of 57, followed by an assortment including a forty-three, a thirty-four, a thirty-two, a twenty-six, a pair of twenties, and so on. Twice, he had 100-yard plus days, 127 on 14 at Oakland and 11 on 117 at Cleveland, as well as coming close against Detroit here, 97 on 12. Only twice did he gross less than thirty yards in a game, 29 on nine at St. Louis and 23 on five at Minnesota. But against the Cardinals, he had his best passing day of the season—eight completions out of nine for 182 yards and a touchdown. Douglass' passing statistics for the year were not impressive, yet there were these productive incidents in half a dozen individual games that defy explanation—two touchdowns out of only four completions against Atlanta; one each out of two against Cleveland and in the second game against Minnesota; one each out of three against Los Angeles and in the first game against Minnesota. At Philadelphia, he completed only *ONE* pass—but it was for 44 yards to the Eagle one and the Bears scored on the next play. He accounted for seventeen of the Bears' twenty-seven touchdowns, eight on runs and nine on pass completions. Home: Chicago.

GEORGE FARMER WR 6'4" 214 UCLA 4th Season
Joined Bears: 1970, D-3 Born: 4-19-'48, Chattanooga, Tenn.

Farmer's two touchdown pass receptions in 1972 bombed the enemy—an 85-yarder against San Francisco and one for 73 against the St. Louis Cardinals. The latter was one of five he caught in the 27-10 Bears' victory that day. However, his biggest single game performance was in the 1971 finale against Minnesota when he caught seven for 128 yards. Besides lettering in football three years at UCLA, Farmer was a reserve on the school's 1968-'69 NCAA basketball champions. Home: Los Angeles.

CHARLIE FORD CB 6'3" 195 Houston 3rd Season
Joined Bears: 1971, D-2 Born: 12-10-'48, Beaumont, Tex.

For the second straight season, Ford led the Bears in interceptions, his seven bringing his two-year total to an even dozen. He also was fifth in tackles, fifty, and again more than justified his no. 2 draft rating. For his two NFL seasons, he has 97 tackles and 40 assists. Ford was one of the aces of Houston's great defensive team of 1970 and he also was a starter for the Gray team against the Blue in that postseason game. Home: Missouri City, Tex.

Garrett, one of the two experienced NFL performers obtained in trades during the NFL player selection meeting, had a remarkable four-season yardage total of 6,923 in four categories—rushing, 2,235; pass receiving, 1,158; kickoff returns, 3,043; punt returns, 487. He was an instant success in pro football at Boston after a spectacular collegiate career at New Mexico Highlands University. In 1969, he beat out O. J. Simpson of Buffalo for AFL rookie-of-the-year honors off an all-around showing that totaled 1,909 yards; 691 rushing; 792 kickoff returns; 267 pass receiving; and 159 punt returns. Despite loss of three games playing time in 1972, Garrett had a total offense of 1,344 yards and was fifth in the American Conference in kickoff returns. In July, 1972, he was key-man from the Patriots' end in a trade with Dallas for Duane Thomas that was later called off. He led the nation in scoring with 26 touchdowns as a sophomore at New Mexico Highlands. For his collegiate career, he scored 418 points and gained 3,862 yards rushing. Garrett also was the first three-time Little All-American since Eddie Lebaron. Home: Norwood, Mass.

CONRAD GRAHAM S 6'1" 184 Tennessee 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1973, D-8 Born: 7-10-'51, Winston-Salem, N.C.

Graham was an ace of Tennessee's secondary with seven interceptions in 1972, including one against Georgia in the end zone and another late in the Kentucky game that set up the second Vol touchdown. The Vols defeated Louisiana State, 24-17, in the Bluebonnet Bowl at Houston in December. Graham was a three year regular in a secondary that set two Southeastern Conference records. In 1971, when he had five interceptions, one was a 76-yarder for a touchdown against Penn State. Home: Winston-Salem.

Green is a man with a many faceted personality—oldest Bear in years (37); longest active service, his fourteenth in the NFL and twelfth with the Bears, including membership on the 1963 world champions; holder of NFL career records for most punts, 888; and most yards, 37,996; and he not only plays a guitar but also intones country and western ballads. In the offseason, he operates a large cattle ranch in Florida as well as a thriving premium distributorship. He has come back admirably from knee surgery required in 1968 when an enemy blocked one of his punts. That was only the third blocked kick of his career. Bobby Joe's name also can be found in the Bears' career passing and rushing statistics because he likes to be a tricky faker on fourth down occasionally. Home: Gainesville, Fla.

JIMMY GUNN LB 6'1" 220 Southern Cal. 4th Season
Joined Bears: 1970, D-13 Born: 11-27-'48, Augusta, Ark.

Gunn was captain of the Bears' 1972 specialty teams that provided the cast for such achievements as two touchdowns on kickoff returns... a blocked punt recovered in the end zone for a score... an NFL record high single season average of 29.4 per kickoff return. He's a hard hitter and though he's listed formally as a linebacker—an area of Bears where there's a crowd of super performers—he saw action and statistically, shows 13 tackles, five assists plus two quarterback sacks and two assists. At Southern Cal, Gunn was a consensus All-American defensive end. Home: Los Angeles.

DAVE HALE DE 6'8" 255 Ottawa (Kansas) 4th Season
Joined Bears: 1969, D-12 Born: 6-21-'47, McCook, Neb.

A fractured ankle suffered in the final 1972 preseason game, at St.

Louis, sidelined Hale for the entire schedule. He had returned to the defensive line during the preseason training after having been considered earlier for offensive assignments. He also has seen a lot of service on special units since leaving the Ottawa campus. Hale was a three-sport man in college, defensive end in football, discus thrower and member of the mile relay team in track and regular in basketball. Home: Hickory Hills, Ill.



JIM HARRISON RB 6'4" 235 Missouri 3rd Season
Joined Bears: 1971, D-2 Born: 9-10-'48, San Antonio, Tex.

Harrison, who saw no competitive action whatever until the last two games of his rookie season, was a starter in all fourteen in 1972. He wound up the year as rushing runnerup to Bobby Douglass, with 622 yards on 167 carries but 473 of those yards came in the first six games of the schedule. He had two 100-yard plus performances (20-113 Atlanta; 31-103 in the first game against Minnesota) as well as an 18-for-91 showing in the first date against Detroit. Jim cooled off considerably as far as running for gain was concerned in the final stages of the schedule but his blocking was crisp and effective. Basically a blocking back at Missouri, he got his big chance in the fifth game of 1970 when Joe Moore suffered an injury sidelining him the rest of the way. 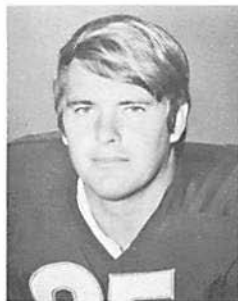

With the Bears, he'll be restored to defense for in two years at Purdue, he saw 555 minutes of varsity action in that area, had 124 tackles, 26 quarterback sacks and broke up 16 passes. The five passes for 65 yards he caught as a senior were only incidental to his overall career value. As a junior, he was NCAA total offense leader with 241.2 per game average that came about solely on passing since his rushing total was a minus 83 yards. He had a five-touchdown day against South Carolina in 1971 and four-TD afternoons against Tulsa that year and against Miami and Kansas last season. Huff's single game yardage high is 409, against Houston last season, and in five other outings, he had 300 or more yards each. At Florida State, he operated out of a pro-style offense. Home: Tampa.

RANDY JACKSON T 6'5" 250 Florida 7th Season
Joined Bears: 1966, D-4 Born: 3-6-'44, Lake City, Fla.

Jackson is the strong man of the interior offensive line, bringing experience and steadiness to his job. Experts see him as just about the most under-rated offensive tackle in the NFL because he not only has all of the physical qualifications but he also provides consistent leadership. Jackson's rookie year was spent on the reserve squad. Breaking in as a regular in 1967, he got into 655 offensive plays that year and has comparable or better annual durability records. ERNIE JANET T 6'4" 250 Washington 2nd Season
Joined Bears: 1972, T-San Francisco Born: 7-22-'49, Renton, Wash.

Janet was San Francisco's second round draft choice for 1971 after having lettered three years at Washington. He spent his rookie season on the Forty Niners' reserve squad and after coming to the Bears, he saw similar service here but got into three late games. Home: Seattle, Wash.

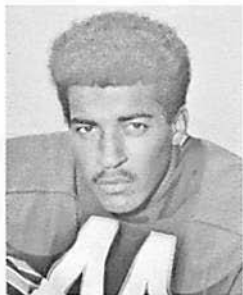
BOB JETER CB 6'1" 200 Iowa 11th Season

Joined Bears: 1972, D-15 Born: 9-28-'49, Detroit

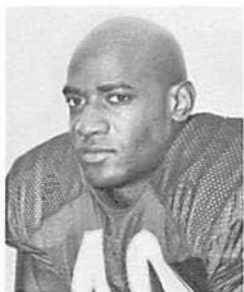

He missed all of last year's schedule after torn ankle ligaments (that didn't require surgery) kept him out of five games in 1971. In the '72 preseason, he displayed drive and running skills with 233 yards and a 4.2 yard average rushing and a touchdown plus three pass receptions for 82 yards, including one for a touchdown. 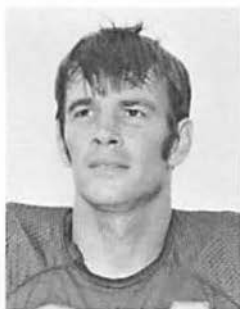

Pifferini was one of the stalwarts of the Bears' excellent special units. As a rookie, he concentrated on those assignments and improved steadily. He has a thorough football background and his dad, Bob, Sr., was center with the Detroit Lions in 1949 and in recent years, has coached at De

Pinder, who cost the Bears two draft choices to Philadelphia, has averaged 4.1 yards rushing (611 yards on 150 carriers) in two seasons here. He had led the Eagles in rushing with 3.9 average in 1970. Last year, Pinder's best afternoon was against his former teammates at Philadelphia when he had 86 yards on 19 rushes. He had a 9-for-40 day (with one touchdown) at Detroit and 6-for-52 and a TD at Green Bay in the course of the year. Home: Chicago.

ANDY RICE DT 6'2" 250 Texas Southern 8th Season
Joined Bears: 1972, W/Kansas City Born: 9-6-'41, Hallettsville, Tex.

Rice brought solidity and experience to give the Bears defensive line depth last season. Until he came here, all of his play was in the AFL (now the AFC) with Kansas City, Houston, Cincinnati and San Diego. He was with Kansas City in the 1966 AFL championship game and the Super Bowl against Green Bay that followed and with Houston in the 1967 AFL title contest. His record shows that he got into 88 of a possible 98 games in his seven pro years. Home: Hallettsville.

DON RIVES LB 6'2" 215 Texas Tech. 1st Season
Joined Bears: 1973, D-15 Born: 8-30-'51, Shamrock, Tex.

Rives led Tech in tackles and assists in both of his last two seasons there. Along the way of his collegiate career, he also became noted for the big play special—such efforts as a pass interception and 38 yards return and, later, a blocked punt in the Sun Bowl, both as a sophomore; and, against Texas A. & M. as a junior, causing a fumble, catching the

Seymour's 17 yard third down pass reception against Minnesota here kept a drive alive that led to a Bears' scoring situation in the 13-10 win over the Vikings. He also scored a touchdown on a 35-yard play that was one of his three catches against the San Francisco Forty Niners. Seymour's NFL debut after he joined the Bears in 1970 was delayed to mid-season because of a muscle injury. However, from there to the finish of the schedule, he had an unusual record of six pass receptions of which four were touchdowns. Home: Deerfield, Ill.

DON SHY RB 6'1" 215 San Diego St. 7th Season
Joined Bears: 1970, FA Born: 11-15-'45, Cleveland

Shy was the Bears' third high rusher last year, averaging 3.8 with 342 yards on 91 tries. His average was better but the yardage total less than in 1971 (3.6 and 420, respectively). Shy's best single game was the 27-10

defeat of the St. Louis Cardinals when he picked up 77 yards on an even dozen rushes. He was Pittsburgh's second round draft choice for 1967 and after two seasons there, he was traded to New Orleans in 1969. Home: Chicago.

JOE TAYLOR CB 6'0" 200 N. Carolina A&T 7th Season
Joined Bears: 1967, FA Born: 12-28-'40, Miami

Seven of Taylor's ten pass interceptions since taking over as a regular cornerback in 1968 have come in the last two years. Four of those (for no return) occurred in 1972 after he had picked off three for 69 yards in 1971. But the one he feels he should have had was the three-point loss at Green Bay Oct. 8 when a Scott Hunter pass from the Bears' 48 was deflected off his fingertips to Jon Stagers on the eleven and the Packer raced in for the score. The responsibilities brought out the best in him—he led the team in pass receptions, twenty for 365 yards and three touchdowns, plus an 82-yard return of a kickoff for another score after taking a handoff from Ron Smith. He will be moved to wide receiver from tight end this year. As a rookie, he caught only three passes, one for 28. Thomas alternated

at tight end at University of Houston his first two years, but became a starter as a senior and got in 244 minutes playing time. He is a brother of Jimmy Thomas, San Francisco running back. Home: Chicago.

Ever the speedster, Turner raised his career kickoff return average to a fraction under 25 per haul with his 409 yards on 16 in 1972. His longest returns were 57 against Minnesota and 37 against St. Louis, both away. The six touchdowns he has scored have come in clusters—four kickoff returns (95, 96, 94 and 88) in 1970 after he had caught and returned two passes (80 and 11, respectively) in 1968. Turner was an NCAA 100-meter dash and long jump champion in college. Home: Houston.

BOB WALLACE WR 6'2" 208 Texas El Paso 6th Season
Joined Bears: 1968, D-2 Born: 10-7-'45, Phoenix, Ariz.

Wallace, again at the more familiar job of wide receiver this year, was tight end two seasons ago and caught 27 passes long with acting as a play messenger. He added weight which had to be pared off last season when he went back to wide receiver and in the process, he saw but little playing time and caught only one pass. In 1969, he led the team with 47 pass receptions but 1970 was a hex year as he suffered a broken hand in preseason and then was sidelined after a knee injury in the fifth game. Home: Phoenix.

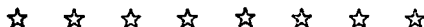
